


Weather summary

High pressure dominated Idaho weather Thursday. Most of the weather system previously in Idaho has moved out of the state as high pressure continues to build into the Pacific Northwest. The sun began to shine over parts of the Gem State during the afternoon as northwesterly winds aloft brought in drier air. Stronger winds associated with the higher pressure blew over most of the state and warmed a weather service statement for gusty winds and a potential of blowing dust in the southeast. Precipitation was light over most of Idaho although a few locations reported more than traces. Moscow had 10 inch, Mullan 05, Lava Hot Springs .08, Grangeville .19 and Grangeville .17. A cold weather system out over the Gulf of Alaska should move in as the weekend approaches. The highest temperature in the state Thursday was 46 degrees at Payette. Spencer reported the lowest at 4 degrees. Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 86 degrees at Alice and Cotulla, Texas. Waterbury, N.Y., reported the lowest temperature at 29 degrees below zero.

Snow stretches from Rockies to Great Lakes

Winter storm watches were issued for today across the northern mountains of Pennsylvania, and much of Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts. A snow advisory was posted for southern New Hampshire and Maine. Meanwhile, arctic cold surged southward across the Plains and Northeast. Early afternoon temperatures were below zero across eastern Montana and the Dakotas, with brisk northwest winds. Temperatures also dipped well below zero overnight and in the morning in Vermont and upstate New York. Afternoon temperatures were in the 70s across much of east Texas and the southern two-thirds of Florida, with 80s along the Texas Gulf coast. Corpus Christi, Texas, reached 84 degrees, equalling a record high set Jan. 6, 1967. The low temperature for the lower 48 states was 34 degrees below zero at Gouverneur, N.Y., at Burlington, Vt., the low of 17 degrees below zero equaled the record low set Jan. 6, 1896.

Heavy snow shrouded an area stretching from the central Rockies into the Great Lakes Thursday while a deep freeze gripped the Plains and northern New England. By Thursday afternoon, 12.2 inches of snow had fallen at Duluth, Minn. Up to 8 inches was reported at Calumet in the upper peninsula of Michigan. Other snow reports included 7 inches at Antioch, Ill., Battle Creek, Mich., and Marcellus, Mich.; 6 inches at Granger, Ind.; Shell Lake, Wis.; and Sturgis, Mich.; 5 inches at Tekonsha, Mich.; and 4 inches at Chicago, Lansing, Mich., and South Bend, Ind. Snow and ice in Wisconsin were blamed for a two-vehicle accident Wednesday that killed a driver near Fort Atkinson, authorities said. In the west, 21 inches of snow was reported Thursday morning at Alta, Utah, and 14 inches fell across the northern and central mountains of Colorado.

Keeping tabs on a final Supreme Court appeal.

Finally about 12:35, the officials told us it was time for Wells to die.

The walk was short — perhaps a couple of hundred feet. The cold outdoor air was a relief, and I carried my coat. I listened. To EchoHawk tell someone — I guard, perhaps — to "call us if anything happens" on the request for a stay of execution.

The call never came.

We passed through a gate and came to a gravel driveway leading to the building where Wells waited. I wondered whether he heard the gravel crunch underfoot as we neared.

Then it became real — I was about to watch a man die.

EchoHawk and Ada County Coroner Erwin Sonnenberg were among the first to enter the witness room. I was right behind them and took the last front-row seat.

The room where Wells would die resembled a tacky motel — fake oak paneling and cheap tan carpeting. A window, covered by vertical blinds, stood between us and the execution chamber.

All talking stopped, and in a blurry few seconds, one of three men inside the execution chamber pushed aside the blinds.

Ten feet away lay Keith Eugene

Wells. Four black straps encircled his body — one at the shins, one at mid-thigh, one at the waist and one at the chest. More straps cinched his wrists.

Tubes led from out of a wall into each of his arms.

Again, the feeling of what was about to happen landed on me — but this time much harder. Light-headed, I took two deep breaths.

Staring at Wells, it seemed odd he would wear shoes — black slip-ons — and white socks. His feet hung just over the end of the table.

He wore blue jeans, a blue prison shirt and a white undershirt. He looked bigger than I had expected.

As if on cue, Wells turned his head toward the witness area, made a "thumbs-up" sign and smiled. I took his smile to mean he was ready to die.

At 12:41, Warden Arvon Arave, standing at Wells' feet, read the death warrant and ordered it to be carried out. He asked whether Wells wanted to make a statement.

No.

"Very well," Arave said.

He gave the signal to begin the execution.

They used three drugs to kill Wells — first an anesthetic, then a drug to prevent muscle spasms, and finally poison.

Wells stared at the ceiling. A minute later, he closed his eyes and took a deep breath. His chest

heaved. In another minute, he stopped breathing.

Warden Arave stood like a soldier at attention, his eyes locked on Wells. In the witness room, not a word was spoken.

About eight minutes into the procedure, a hand appeared through the small slot in the wall from where the intravenous lines ran to Wells. The hand placed a small object on a ledge.

Witnesses guessed this was a signal that the poison had been delivered.

Arave asked Ada County Coroner Sonnenberg to examine Wells. Sonnenberg stepped through a doorway and walked to the table. He unbuttoned Wells' shirt and placed a stethoscope on his heart.

"The time is 12:50, and I pronounce Keith Eugene Wells dead," Sonnenberg said.

The blinds were drawn, and we were escorted from the witness room. We had been there only 10 minutes.

We followed the hallways back to the main foyer by B-Block and rode the van back to the media center. The prisoners again pouched the metal window covers.

"You're going to see him die every night the rest of your life," yelled one.

"They're going to kill your kids next," yelled another.

obeying God by offering the apology, Sartan said.

It was the nation's first execution in 1994 but only Idaho's 10th in this century. Wells was the 227th person executed in the nation since the U.S. Supreme Court reinstated the death penalty in 1976.

Idaho's last execution was Raymond Allen Snowden. He was hanged on Oct. 18, 1957, for the murder and mutilation of a woman he met at a suburban Boise bar.

The execution came despite what some Idaho death penalty advocates fear is a movement by appellate courts away from capital punishment.

Wells was among 29 murderers sentenced to death since Idaho reinstated the death penalty in 1977. He

was the first to be executed, six had their death sentences overturned and a seventh died of liver disease on Death Row.

Three — Karla Windsor, Shawn Scroggins and James Pratt — had their sentences voided by the state Supreme Court and were resentenced to life in prison.

Bryan Lankford's death sentence was overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court because he was not given enough notice that execution was a real possibility. The sentencing judge then imprisoned him for life without parole.

And Michaela's sentences of Jaime Carboneau and Benjamin Ivey were overturned by the state Supreme Court on technicalities.

Charboneau's Jerome County prosecutors decided against seeking

a new death penalty because the small rural county could not afford to keep paying the escalating cost of extended appeals.

And Ivey's sentencing judge settled on life in prison without parole, lambasting the appellate court system as so liberal it would find another way to overturn a death sentence.

Prosecutor for Whitewater probe likely

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Janet Reno suggested Thursday that she might seek appointment of an independent counsel to investigate President Clinton's role in an Arkansas real estate venture if Congress passes a new ethics law.

The New York Times reported today Reno already has decided to seek a court-appointed counsel as soon as Congress acts.

The Times quoted unidentified senior Justice Department officials as saying Reno and her top aides had concluded that seeking an independent prosecutor would be unavoidable if the law was passed.

But Reno didn't go that far in her public announcement, which she made at the start of a news conference.

Depending on the language of a new law "there might be the possibility for me to petition" a federal appeals court "for the appointment of an independent counsel," Reno said.

The old law providing for independent counsels expired a year ago.

A court-appointed counsel would mean removing the investigation of a failed Arkansas savings and loan and of Whitewater Development Co. away from the Justice Department — a step that Republicans on Capitol Hill have been demanding for weeks, arguing the current probe is subject to political interference from the Clinton administration.

Family pulls together, says goodbye to death row inmate

BOISE (AP) — The family of convicted killer Keith Eugene Wells says his willingness to be executed was the ultimate remorse for beating two people to death in Boise's Rose Pub tavern.

"If he didn't have a great heart, why would he do this?" asked Wells' sister, Marinda Prokop. "He's not a monster."

Wells' wife, 6-year-old daughter and extended family met with reporters shortly before his execution early Thursday.

A Statehouse vigil Wednesday night was marked by religious overtones as participants argued against the death penalty. But the mood was raucous during demonstrations at the prison gate. Death penalty advocates cheered Wells' lethal injection and called for the same treatment for the remaining 21 inmates left on Death Row.

The close-knit Mormon family from the Pocatello area said their lives have been on hold through Wells' imprisonment for the 1990 murders and his final days. But they recalled some good times too, producing a collage of photographs of Keith Wells through the years.

"We're a different family. We fight like cats and dogs, but when something happens, we pull together," said his brother, Danny.

Wells' sister, Cletie Fehring, 27, said his life could have been different if the system had spared him instead of jailing him, starting at age 15 for vandalism.

His parents, Paul and Loral Wells, lacked the money to pay for drug treatment or other intervention like the Tough Love program, Fehring said. She also expressed her doubts about prosecutors' accounts of the attack.

"I don't think he was alone in the killing. He wouldn't say. Facts are lacking."

Fehring said tissue and hair under the fingernails of the victims did not match Wells.

Wells' wife, Cindy, 35, said the couple made their peace in their final meetings, although Wells had been fully restrained for her protection.

"Keith and I know we'll meet again. That's why we can let him go," she said, holding her daughter, Tabitha, on her lap. She showed a drawing of a lion sketched and signed by fellow Death Row inmates.

could maneuver the state into killing him.

Thornton and Rev. Tod Brown, bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Boise, in December petitioned Gov. Cecil Andrus to stop Wells' death. Andrus supported the death penalty in extreme cases and said he was not in a position to intervene.

Thornton again asked Idaho to exhibit "awesome restraint" and stop the impending death.

Boise attorney Jon Bauman, chairman of the legal committee for the American Civil Liberties Union in Idaho, said the United States was one of only a few nations in which capital punishment is still a common practice. He said it had little impact on preventing murders, which usually occur in the "heat of passion."

But the half-dozen men at the Statehouse with placards such as "Ask the victims" and "Justice will be served" swelled to more than 100 supporters of the execution several hours later at the prison entrance while opponents dwindled to a dozen.

Immunization works

BOISE (AP) — The chances of more Lake Hazell Middle School students being stricken with meningitis are slim, thanks to a massive immunization effort.

During the past week, nurses at the Central District Health Department in Boise have given free vaccinations to 4,500 people.

Court rules Wood's tape may be released

POCATELLO (AP) — A district judge has ruled that the entire tape recording and transcript of the confession of James Edward Wood will be made public — but the material can't be copied.

Wood, 45, is to be sentenced next week for killing Jeralee Underwood, an 11-year-old carrier for the Idaho State Journal. He faces the death penalty from 6th District Judge Lynn Winnill.

Police testified that Wood confessed to kidnapping the girl off a Pocatello street in June and shooting her the next day. He pleaded guilty to the crimes.

Only small portions of Wood's recorded confession and a 79-page transcript have been made public.

The Idaho Statesman, Boise, filed a formal request for release of the entire confession and Winnill agreed Wednesday. The newspaper, in legal arguments, contended the public has a right to know what factors the judge considered in deciding the appropriate sentence.

In his written opinion, the judge said he had to weigh the public's right to know against protecting "the right of the victim and her family from public disclosure of intimate and highly sensitive information."

The taped confession was played during a pre-sentence hearing before Winnill on Dec. 7-8.

Portions of the tape contained graphic information about what Wood said he did to the girl's body a week after he shot her. Wood was arrested later that day.

Winnill released only 15 pages of the transcript detailing the murder, but excluding post-murder acts.

While acknowledging the public's right to know, Winnill stated that in comparison, "the interests of the victim in this case and her family are distinct and clear in that they had survived a tragedy only to have it revisited upon them by what has been described as a constant barrage of media coverage."

Proseutors objected to The Statesman's request, citing concerns for the family.

The judge said the need for the news media or press to have access to the tape or transcript to assure their reporting accuracy may be valid, but there was a danger that "the motive of some may be to sensationalize the event so as to sell newspapers or improve television and radio station ratings."

White House retaliates against China for illegal product shipments

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Clinton administration slashed the quota for textile imports from China by more than \$1 billion Thursday in retaliation for what it called huge illegal shipments of Chinese products through other countries.

U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor announced the action after China refused to resume negotiations this week on the U.S. demand for tougher controls and penalties aimed at ending illicit shipments.

An estimated \$2 billion a year in Chinese textiles and clothing have been shipped illegally through at least 25 other countries, including Honduras, Panama and Hong Kong, to the United States, he said.

Illegal Chinese imports could have cost Americans more than 50,000 jobs, Henry A. Truslow III, president of the American Textile Manufacturers Institute, estimated.

As recently as November, U.S. Customs Service officers found Chinese goods

in other nations to disguise their origin, he said.

Chinese firms also have overshipped — sent products directly to the United States even though their export quotas had been filled.

The violations "clearly cost U.S. jobs. Obviously they are selling products in a illegal manner, which is then supplanting U.S. or other products," Kantor told a news conference.

The U.S. retaliation comes amid disputes

between the U.S. and China on human rights and arms sales.

Last spring, the administration extended China's "most favored nation" trade status until this June with the warning it would have to improve trade and human rights practices to win further extensions.

Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen is scheduled to visit China later this month to press for human rights and economic reforms. He will be the highest-ranking U.S. official to visit

China since the bloody 1989 crackdown on democracy demonstrators.

China is by far the largest supplier of textiles and apparel to the United States, with shipments totaling \$7.3 billion a year.

Its overall trade surplus with the United States, about \$25 billion last year, was second only to Japan's.

Ex-colleagues recall colorful politician Thomas 'Tip' O'Neill Jr.

WASHINGTON (AP) — He was a back-room deal-maker, an old warhorse, an over-the-top, whiskey-drinking, cigar-smoking, poker-playing, back-slapper — all the things that American people are said to loathe in their public figures.

But former House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., the consummate politician of 40 years who died Wednesday night, became one of the most popular public men of his times, achieving something akin to folk hero status.

Media advisers called him awkward on television — "too 'hot' for a politician" — but finally gave up and told him to be himself.

Those who associated with him or observed him over his years as speaker of the House said that O'Neill managed, without trying, to convey his real personality over television, the means through which most Americans get to know their political leaders.

"Somehow he projected his humanity," said Washington lawyer Stanley Brand, a longtime O'Neill associate in the House of Representatives.

The speaker's thicket of white hair and his bulbous nose made him so widely recognizable that Madison Avenue saw him as a gem, someone with credibility. He was, as he said in commercials for a light beer, a motel chain, a New England

bank, an airline, a computer company, and Hush Puppies.

"American Express pictured him" — "cardmember since 1973" — sitting on the beach in khakis and a blue cardigan, newspapers scattered about.

Why O'Neill? "He was a legend," said American Express spokeswoman Maureen Bailey. "He was a man universally admired and respected."

Some thought it was in bad taste for him to make ads, but he dealt with the doubts with a candid explanation: He was not a rich man, he said, and he wanted to leave something for the grandchildren.

Retiring House Republican Leader Bob Michel of Illinois — O'Neill's opposite number for his years as speaker — recalled that the Republicans, seeing O'Neill as the embodiment of old-fashioned politics, ran derogatory commercials with a Tip O'Neill look-alike, big nose and all.

"It backfired," Michel said. "He used to tell me, 'You guys made me a celebrity,' and it's true," he said.

"After that I could be walking with him on the golf course and people would say, 'Hey, Tip, Tip, Tip' and wave to him. They wouldn't recognize me. It didn't do us all that much good, I'd say."

For the last six years of Ronald

Reagan's presidency, O'Neill was the only Democratic official wielding power at the national level.

"In 1981, he made a hard choice," Brand said. "He said, 'I can roll over and go along with Reagan or stick to the principles that got me here, even if that means I'm thrown out.' He did that, and, lo and behold, it took hold. The Democrats picked up 26 seats in 1982 and in '86 regained the Senate."

"He was always on the tube during the Reagan era," said his biographer, Paul Clancy. "His personality came straight through — those blue eyes, that gruff face. I think people knew he was leveling with them. Everybody saw Tip as a friend. He came across as the genuine article."

The only comparable politician of the times, said Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., was Reagan. What they shared, he said, was an Irish love of storytelling and a gift for indicating they were having a good time and not acting as if they were doing everyone a favor. That and their status as old men.

"The fact that they were old and trying hard — people liked that," Frank said. "People tend to be more trusting of old people. You can't accuse them of doing something for reasons other than that they believe in it. Their legitimacy comes across."

Neighbors remember O'Neill's loyalty

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Down at Frank's Barber Shop in North Cambridge, former House Speaker Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill Jr. is remembered as a man who never forgot the people he grew up with.

"His loyalty to his district was unreal," barber Frank Minelli said Thursday. "We don't see those kinds of politicians anymore. He was a politician for the people."

O'Neill died of a heart attack Wednesday in Boston after a long battle with cancer. He was 81.

Minelli, who cut O'Neill's hair beginning in the 1950's, said the speaker was a "regular guy" who would quietly help anyone from the old neighborhood who was down and out and in need of a job.

"He was a big bear of a guy, a big teddy bear," Minelli said. "Although O'Neill was proud of his Irish roots, he was friends with everyone — blacks and Jews, Irish and Italians — according to his old buddies from Barry's Corner, an impromptu social club where young men from the neighborhood talked, smoked and played cards."

"Everybody was loyal to him because he had a nice, easy-going

manner. He cared for everybody, rich or poor," said Lenny Lamkin, who met O'Neill playing basketball at a neighborhood gymnasium in 1931.

"He was always a leader," Lamkin said. "He would say, 'Let's go here' and 'Let's go there,' and we'd just follow along with him."

Lamkin followed O'Neill a long way. When Lamkin told O'Neill he was looking for another job, he shortly had one — as manager of O'Neill's district office in Arlington from 1973 until the speaker's retirement in 1987.

"I've lost a dear and lifelong friend. So has the whole country," Lamkin said. "As he grew, he'd be out with the pope and kings, but the next day he was the same guy with us."

"After he went to Washington," O'Neill came back every year for a Barry's Corner reunion banquet, held at the local Veterans of Foreign Wars hall. John Gimigliano, who has a shoe repair shop a few doors down Massachusetts Avenue from Frank's, keeps copies of the poems he wrote to commemorate O'Neill's appearances.

Gimigliano's shop is filled with photos of O'Neill, his family and other neighbors.

"I got a candle lit for Tip. He was my greatest friend," he said.

"He didn't have an office in Cambridge — this was his office. ... When he was in Washington, he'd come down here on Sundays and people used to come in to see him. Kids would come to get his autograph on their homework so they could get higher marks," Gimigliano said.

At Vellucci, a former Cambridge mayor and city council president who was on the Cambridge School Committee when he met O'Neill, said the neighborhood was intensely loyal to O'Neill because he never forgot the struggles of the poor.

"I was the same kind of politician he was and he was the same kind of politician I was," Vellucci said. "We had love in our hearts and we poured it out and gave it away to the lowest of the low, to the poorest of the poor."

"Somebody has to speak up for the voiceless," Vellucci said. "We spoke up for the voiceless."

Pension shortfall increases 40%

WASHINGTON — The gap between promised pensions and the money available to pay them in companies with underfunded plans soared to \$53 billion in 1992, a shortfall that eventually could jeopardize the retirements of millions of Americans.

The Pension Benefit Guaranty Corp. (PBGC), the government agency that insures pensions, said Thursday that underfunded, single-employer retirement plans had \$235 billion in benefit liabilities and just \$182 billion in assets to pay for them — a deficit 40 percent above 1991's \$38 billion.

The PBGC said the underfunding is concentrated in a relatively small number of companies and industries. It said about 72 percent of the underfunding — \$38 billion — is concentrated in plans sponsored by just 50 companies, primarily in the steel, automobile, life and airline industries.

Gore warns of Russian hard-liners

MILWAUKEE — The United States would "be foolish to ignore" the showing of ultranationalists in the recent Russian elections, Vice President Al Gore said Thursday. But such troubles are no reason to steer clear, he declared.

"Democracy does not turn us into angels," Gore said, acknowledging the certain bumps ahead for Russia and its reform efforts.

Subbing for President Clinton, Gore delivered a speech outlining the administration's view of the importance of U.S. involvement in Europe and the democratic reform movement in Russia.

Gore conceded that after the Cold War "some Americans would prefer that we stay out of the world's squabbles and focus only on our challenges here at home."

But he said that "when Europe fights, we suffer; when Europe is safe and free, we thrive."

Crash of twin-engine airplane kills 10

FORT RUMER, Fla. — A fiery plane crash on a rural road killed 10 people, including a Japanese newlywed couple and six relatives.

The twin-engine Beechcraft King Air reported engine trouble shortly after takeoff Wednesday evening, said Jeff Kennedy of the National Transportation Safety Board. It circled and tried to land on an isolated stretch of U.S. 441.

"There was a boom, boom when it hit the two trees, then just a big roar from the fire," Joe De Parisio, who lives nearby and saw the crash.

The fire was so intense it burned the bodies and the plane beyond recognition, investigators said.

Texas senator faces re-indictment

AUSTIN, Texas — Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison was re-indicted Thursday on a felony misdemeanor charge alleging she misused state employees and computer equipment and covered up evidence when she was Texas' treasurer.

The charge carries a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine upon conviction.

The re-indictment, the third against Mrs. Hutchison, accuses her of misusing treasury employees and computers for personal and political purposes and then altering computer archives.

It says the computer files and directories of 10 former top-level employees "were intentionally omitted."

U.S. official resigns over Bosnian policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Warren Zimmerman, a former ambassador to Yugoslavia, is resigning from the foreign service in protest over U.S. policy in Bosnia and other aspects of U.S. foreign policy, a government official said Thursday.

Zimmerman is the fifth State Department official to quit for reasons related to the Bosnia policy over the past 17 months. Of the five, Zimmerman is by far the most senior.

After serving as U.S. ambassador to Belgrade, Zimmerman returned to the State Department in 1992 as director of the Office of Refugee Affairs, the post he was holding at the time of his resignation.

Republican senators urge tighter gay regulations

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican members of the Senate Armed Services Committee will seek congressional action if the administration does not tighten regulations on homosexuals in the military, the senators said Thursday.

Sen. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina, the ranking Republican

on the committee, and Sen. Dan Coats of Indiana said in a letter to President Clinton that they were concerned that Pentagon regulations issued Dec. 22 may undercut federal statutes.

They said guidance to field officers provided in the regulations "appears to place many limits on commanders that are not applicable

Officials hope the new policy will curtail the flow of handguns into the streets, the General Services Administration said.

Federal departments are banned from selling weapons to dealers

unless the GSA grants them a waiver. The new policy means no more waivers will be granted.

Since 1982, the agency said, it has granted 20 such waivers — 13 in the past three years alone — for a total of 61,901 guns. The money collected from the sales was used to buy new firearms for federal use or to defray administration costs, the GSA said.

Kmart steps up store overhaul efforts

Embarking on a New Year's self-improvement program of grand proportions, Kmart Corp., the world's second-largest retailer, said Wednesday it will step up its chain-wide overhaul by relocating hundreds of stores and closing dozens of others, and will sell pieces of its book; home improvement, sports and office supply retail chains.

Company officials said they will look at each store individually to determine if a store will move within its market area. No plans have been made for any Idaho stores.

Behind the moves — particularly the focus on sprucing up the Kmart discount store made famous by the

"blue light special" — is more than a quest to improve sagging profits, which Kmart disclosed Wednesday would be even lower than expected. Kmart's announcements also reflect the cutthroat retail environment that has forced retailers to rethink not only prices but the nuts and bolts of presenting merchandise to value-conscious consumers.

Kmart has in recent years found itself squeezed between Wal-Mart, which has lower prices, and the likes of Sears and J.C. Penney, which have aggressively and successfully remodeled stores and improved their merchandise mix.

Kmart's new store "modernization" plan comes three years after the company announced an initial re-

furbishing program that has resulted in improved apparel sales at remodeled stores.

Kmart said Wednesday it will concentrate on its central business of discount retailing and raise cash for its expanded \$3.2 billion remodeling program by selling stock, ranging between 20 percent and 30 percent, in four of its specialty retail units: the Builders Square home improvement chain, the OfficeMax office supply chain, the Sports Authority sporting goods chain, and a new combined book business composed of Kmart's separate Waldenbooks and Borders chains.

The company said it will relocate 800 stores by the end of 1996 — 500 more than originally planned in

1990 — because many stores are too old or too small to remodel. In total, the company said it will have remodeled 670 stores and expanded 700 outlets by 1996, or more than half of Kmart's nearly 2,500 locations in the United States. In addition, Kmart said it will open 177 stores in new markets. Kmart said it will close another 75 stores by 1996, on top of about 75 closed since 1991, but does not anticipate laying off workers.

To cover costs of the modernization program and other non-recurring charges, Kmart will take a pre-tax charge of \$1.3 billion, or \$850 million after taxes against 1993 earnings.

Fred Meyer announces major Utah expansion, remodeling

SALT LAKE CITY — Fred Meyer, Inc., on Thursday announced plans to invest more than \$100 million in new stores and major remodels in the state.

The announcement was made at an employee meeting at a Salt Lake City hotel. Company officials said the investment will bring the stores' full-service food departments, now available in six other states, to Utah.

More than \$60 million is earmarked for adding food departments and the overall remodeling of five of Fred Meyer's 12 Utah stores in 1994. An additional \$40 million

is planned for two new full-service stores.

Fred Meyer officials are also negotiating to buy the Blue Lakes Mall in Twin Falls. Officials said the Utah expansion is part of Fred Meyer's five-year plan to open at least 25 new full-service stores and complete 35 major remodels by the end of 1997. The Utah additions will be financed through cash flow and existing credit lines. The five remodels are scheduled for the Taylorsville, Granger and Holladay stores in the Salt Lake area, as well as stores in North Ogden and Logan in the northern part of the state.

The way we kill killers strips system of dignity

Capital punishment in the United States has evolved into a bizarre ritual. The problem we address is not the penalty itself, but the graceless dance of death that tortures our criminal-justice system in the hours before a prisoner dies.

In the small hours of Thursday morning, the state-of-Idaho put Keith Eugene Wells to death. He was a vile and twisted creature, condemned for killing two people who had the misfortune to cross his path in a Boise tavern.

Wells consented in his own punishment. Even so, his death had to be preceded by the legalistic spasms of a process gone mad. If you stayed up Wednesday night to watch TV coverage of the event, you witnessed an appalling set of rituals.

Liberal lawyers, the reluctant acolytes of our secular cult of doom, fought until the final hour (and beyond) to save Wells' life. Half an hour before Wells' lethal injections were scheduled to begin, they were still in federal court, arguing for a stay.

At 12:01 a.m., with Wells already strapped to the gurney where he would die, officials announced a 10-minute delay.

Ten minutes stretched to 18, and then came word that Wells' self-appointed defenders had filed a new writ.

Next we learned that Sandra Day O'Connor, the Supreme Court justice responsible for reviewing the case, had referred it to her fellow judges for further consideration.

The final news came at 12:37. The high court would not accept a further appeal. The lethal drugs began to flow, and by 12:50 Wells was gone.

This chain of events is common in a modern execution. But why do we do it this way?

Why must the victims' families, the official witnesses, the condemned man's relatives—not to mention the prisoner himself—endure these emotionally draining starts and stops?

Why do we require our highest-ranking judges to abandon their beds and rule hurriedly on the life of a man they have never seen, strapped to a table two time zones away? (Get a move on, Your Honor. People in Idaho are waiting.)

From a technical standpoint, the death of Keith Wells was flawlessly efficient and humane. He suffered far less than his victims, Brandi Rains and John Justad.

But the intricacies of our federal court system, combined with our nation's inability to form a consensus on the death penalty, have turned capital punishment into a routine that strips the dignity from those who take part.

Congress should fix it. If we desire to kill killers, let's be rational and resolute.

Let's do it in daylight. Let's set a schedule and keep to it.

Let's set a routine for appeals that completes the legal process before the man is strapped down, not after. Let's end the suspense that turns every execution into a ghoulish circus.

Taking a human life is a grim and serious business. We should treat it that way.

'Priority' mail is a joke

I have noticed the several letters regarding difficulties individuals have had with the priority mail.

David Adair, retired postal supervisor, responded, "I feel fears are misconstrued. He claims the 'intent' is to provide faster service than regular mail," and that "the mail is handled 'priority' and usually will board transportation first, allowing it to move along first."

If, as Mr. Adair claims, clerks are trained and well-informed, such was not my experience similar to complaints of others. When a very important mailing from Burley to Los Cruces, N.M., was necessary within five days, the postal clerk suggested priority mail. On several occasions, I had seen Postal Service advertisements which informed viewers it was a two-day delivery. Usually 29-cent first-class mail or from New Mexico has occurred in two or three days. In this instance, priority mail arrived in Los Cruces six days later!

As suggested by Mr. Adair, I wrote a letter complaining to the postmaster general. Several months later, I finally received a two-page response full of usual bureaucratic non-answers, no real explanations, no admission

of misrepresentative ads and not even an apology.

My priority mail did not "... Board transportation first, allowing it to move along first," did not arrive in three days as has 29-cent first class mail, and my complaint to the proper authority was a waste of time, stationery and another 29-cent stamp.

In the private sector, such false advertising would result in penalties; such service and handling of complaints erode any confidence of the customers, resulting in complete business failure—but not so for our Postal Service.



The Twin Falls Canal Co. assessment you received with your notice of the Jan. 11 stockholders meeting is not only a new record high, but likely, there is more to come. You really should attend the meeting, not for any enlightening presentations but to experience what is not covered. Certainly, you will want to vote on acceptance of the minutes of last year's meeting—the only opportunity you will have to express an opinion.

The minutes will fail to cover the big expenses of last year because none were discussed. If you were, and are, concerned about the expenditure of \$8 million for defunct power plants, \$400,000 to "limited partners of Bonneville-Pacific" developers of the power plants; a reported \$10 million to Idaho Power for rebuilding of Milner Dam; and the need for this year's item, \$250,000 for a new Twin Falls Canal Co. office building, you'll not get any answers.

And, if you think that the new building just might include a reading table for access to contractual obligations, the State Charter or even the Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws and the like, you'd best think again. Stockholders are deemed incapable of comprehending such documentation.

Since stockholder assessments pay the bills of the Twin Falls Canal Co., shouldn't the stockholders as a body be better informed and consulted on major expenditures and especially those not involved with delivering irrigation water? *The Times-News* reported on Dec. 9, 1993, that Idaho Power has asked the Public Utilities Commission to reduce prices the utility pays for co-generated power. You know, that

such requests may be delayed but rarely denied, so you can guess who gets stuck with making up reduced revenue from power generation using Twin Falls Canal Co. water.

So, come out to the meeting and observe the performances. See if you can identify the ringmaster. May be next year, you should keep your proxy and vote your own shares in addition to voting on the minutes, and thereby use what little influence you can muster to its maximum.

Russia's political bad boy still making waves

SHCHELKOV, Russia (AP) — Bad Vlad is mad.

He's being anubbed by yet another world leader. This time it's President Clinton.

Russian extreme nationalist Vladimir Zhirinovskiy called Clinton a coward Thursday and told him to stay home and play the sax instead of coming to a summit meeting in Moscow next week.

Zhirinovskiy also threatened Japan with a blockade, said France and Germany were "sucking up" to Russian President Boris Yeltsin, and called the West "rotten and moldy."

For good measure, he outlined his plan to become foreign minister. It was a vintage performance by the bad boy of Russian politics, a man whose views have provoked comparisons to Hitler and Mussolini.

Once dismissed as a clown, Zhirinovskiy is now viewed with deepening alarm. His Liberal Democratic Party was the top vote-

getter in December's parliamentary elections.

Clinton's snub comes while Zhirinovskiy still smarts from a disastrous post-election world tour.

He was booted out of Bulgaria, denied a German visa and warned to stay out of France, Austria, Australia and several other countries. Zhirinovskiy claimed Thursday that "things have calmed down" and he'd been invited to Germany, Austria, Spain, France, Norway and Australia.

U.S. officials have made it clear Clinton will not meet Zhirinovskiy during the Jan. 12-15 summit in Moscow.

"He shouldn't show that he's such a coward," said Zhirinovskiy, after picking up his parliament membership card at a brief ceremony in Shchelkovo, his constituency 15 miles east of Moscow.

"What kind of American president is he?" Zhirinovskiy fumed. "He's coming and he's not going to meet

with me? Let him play his saxophone instead of coming here and meeting with nobodies!"

Zhirinovskiy also lumped French

President Francois Mitterrand and German Chancellor Helmut Kohl with Clinton as being cowards.

"All of you in the West have

become rotten and moldy. That's why you got scared that a new, honest, brave man has emerged in Russia," he groused. "You want us to be weak and rot with you. But we won't. Rot without us!"

Having dismissed the West, Zhirinovskiy trained his sights on Japan.

First he tackled the dispute between Russia and Japan over the Kuril Islands, which has stopped the two nations from formally ending their World War II hostilities.

"Why are you afraid to sign a treaty?" he said, glaring into a Japanese correspondent's video camera. "You want to fight? Let's do it! Tomorrow the Pacific Fleet will blockade the Japanese Islands. You will starve to death!"

Russia "will take, not give" territory, he vowed.

Then Zhirinovskiy broached the subject of fishing in the Sea of Okhotsk, part of the Pacific Ocean north of Japan. Trawlers from Japan,

Korea, the Philippines and other nations ply those rich waters.

"We'll drive everybody out of the Okhotsk Sea," he declared. "We'll create a 200-mile zone and you'll have to fish in Australia."

Zhirinovskiy capped his impromptu news conference by outlining his parliamentary strategy.

With 65 out of 450 seats, his party is the second-largest faction, next to the pro-Yeltsin Russia's Choice bloc.

"We'll take the foreign relations committee and I'll be chairman," he said. Next, "there will be a new foreign minister. Me."

Theoretically, the president names the foreign minister — not parliament. But Zhirinovskiy envisions a new, more relaxed role for Yeltsin.

"The president can come to the Kremlin to meet heads of state now and then, hand out awards, receive ambassadors. Apart from that he can stay in his dacha."

Israel, PLO agree to talks

ALLENBY BRIDGE, Occupied West Bank (AP) — Hours after Israel and the PLO announced peace talks were back on track Thursday, Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin pointedly visited this rickety bridge that has come to symbolize sovereignty.

"Israel will be responsible for the external security, for example here," Rabin said, touching on one of the key sticking points in implementing the agreement to give Palestinians limited autonomy.

The border crossings into the Gaza Strip and the West Bank town of Jericho, including the Allenby Bridge, have emerged as a key problem in the talks, which broke down last week.

This is because the Israelis see autonomy in the two areas as a test and insist on keeping tight control over security matters. The Palestine Liberation Organization considers autonomy a step toward statehood and seeks as many trappings of sovereignty as possible.

Palestinian negotiator Saeb Erakat accused Israel on Thursday of "trying to reorganize occupation" instead of ending it, which he said violates the spirit of the last PLO accord.

But Rabin insisted that while Israel wants the Palestinians to run their own lives, it will not compromise on border crossings and other security issues.

"The main purpose is to create new realities of peaceful coexistence of Israelis and Palestinians in the territories and to give security to the Israelis and Israel," Rabin said.

While Rabin spoke, five buses carrying Palestinians from Jordan were backed up at the wooden bridge guarded by Israeli soldiers sitting atop a bunker. Last week, the talks broke down when Israeli negotiators in Cairo, Egypt, claimed the PLO delegation had agreed to Israeli control and a symbolic Palestinian presence at the crossings. The PLO later denied this and introduced a new demand of international presence there.

14 die in road wreck

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — A traffic jam on a highway Thursday caused a three-vehicle accident that killed 14 people and injured seven, traffic officials said.

Thirteen of the fatalities were in a minivan taxi struck by the trailer, and the driver of a pickup truck also was killed. Seven passengers in the pickup truck had to be cut from the wreckage.

There was no immediate explanation for why the trailer broke loose on the road near Rustenburg, 72 miles northwest of Johannesburg.

Yeltsin picks liberal security adviser

MOSCOW (AP) — President Boris Yeltsin named a liberal lawyer as his first national security adviser Thursday but postponed an expected Cabinet reshuffling.

Yuri Baturin, who previously served as a legal adviser to Yeltsin, is regarded as an independent statesman likely to support a generally pro-Western foreign policy as security adviser.

Yeltsin's press secretary, Vyacheslav Kostikov, said the job was created in accordance with the new constitution, which gives the president strong powers. Yeltsin has said he will maintain Russia's foreign policy despite resistance from Communists and ultranationalists who made strong showings in parliamentary elections.

Yeltsin also has promised to continue his free-market reforms despite opposition from the hard-line groups.

Economic Minister Yegor Gaidar, architect of the reforms, is the only Cabinet member that Yeltsin has specifically said will retain his post.

Yeltsin promised last month to streamline his administration and directed Prime Minister Viktor Chernomyrdin to come up with a new, smaller Cabinet by Thursday.

The ITAR-Tass news agency reported that the reshuffling was postponed, probably until it becomes clear which of Yeltsin's top aides will hold leadership positions in the new parliament that convenes Tuesday.

Czechs will pursue NATO membership alone

PRAGUE, Czech Republic (AP) — The Czech Republic has rejected efforts by some eastern European states to make a united bid for NATO membership, saying it would rather do its own negotiating with the West.

"We do not like organizing of pressure groups," Czech Foreign Minister Jozef Zizlenec told

reporters Thursday.

Requests by former communist states to join the West's security alliance will be on the agenda at a NATO summit Monday in Brussels, Belgium. President Clinton will meet with eastern European leaders in Prague, the Czech capital, after the summit.

Hungary, Poland, Slovakia and

the Czech Republic had been expected to pressure NATO for full membership.

"NATO so far has been reluctant to consider new members, partly for fear of upsetting Russia." Instead, NATO is offering a program of military and political collaboration with East European nations called Partnership for Peace.

Sarajevo artillery fire reaches fevered pitch

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Thunderous Serb shelling shut down Sarajevo's airport lifeline to the world for a second day Thursday and forced government workers to sleep in their offices overnight.

"For Sarajevo, this is one of the worst days since the beginning of the aggression," state-run Bosnian radio reported earlier in the day. "The whole city is under artillery fire from all Serb positions around it."

Five French soldiers were reportedly wounded in two separate incidents. Hospital and morgue officials in Sarajevo reported four dead, including a 2-month-old baby, and 50 wounded, including a pregnant woman. That put Sarajevo's death toll at 37 known victims since Jan. 1.

Fighting flared in other trouble spots across Bosnia, further dimming prospects for peace talks among the country's three warring factions, scheduled for Jan. 18 in Geneva.

Sarajevo, a city of 380,000, was without relief flights, electricity, water and gas. Fighting prevented repair of damaged lines.

The battered Holiday Inn, where most foreigners stay, was hit for a second day, but apparently no one was hurt.

On the opposite side, in Serb-held Grbavica, smoke billowed as several houses came under heavy fire, apparently from Bosnian government troops.

U.S. ambassador shaken by mass Croatian grave

OVCARA, Croatia (AP) — The U.S. ambassador to the United Nations was shaken Thursday by a visit to a mass grave for people believed executed during Croat-Serb fighting in 1991 and said the world must know the "dreary story."

"Yukovar is a symbol of the inhumanity that has taken place during this very tragic war," Madeleine Albright said in a trembling voice, her face pale.

"The people of the world need to know that brave people would be taken, and their lives (snuffed out) in what is basically a garbage dump," she told The Associated Press.

Only a few buildings in the center of the town, which is still controlled by ethnic Serbs, have been repaired.

Malaysian general takes over U.N. mission

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Malaysian Lt. Gen. Abou Sanih Abou Bakar has been appointed commander of United Nations operations in Somalia. Abou Bakar, Malaysia's Army Chief of Staff, will replace Lt. Gen. Ceyik Bir of Turkey, whose term expires Jan. 20. Defense Minister Najib Abdul Razak said Thursday.

This is the first time a Malaysian has been given the honor to lead the U.N. contingent in an international peacekeeping mission. Najib said

Hagerman man faces drug-delivery charge

Wendell Police Chief Stuart Lumpkin said the arson fire was reported shortly after 8 a.m. The Wendell Fire Department responded and extinguished the blaze. Lumpkin said an investigation by his department was completed at 3 p.m. He said someone lit a roll of toilet paper in a plastic dispenser on fire and the blaze took off from there.

An eighth grade student is suspected, Lumpkin said, and arson charges against the juvenile are pending.

Lumpkin said the entire bathroom was damaged by a combination of fire, smoke and water.

Man found in 2nd-floor room says he just wanted a bath

Marvel's cattle reportedly wander

TWIN FALLS — A federal wildlife biologist said Thursday that cattle from private land owned by Hailey environmentalist Jon Marvel may have crossed onto federal land that is closed to grazing.

State Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, and Gooding County rancher Richard Dalton say they've seen cattle on the Bureau of Land Management parcel in Gooding County, which has been closed to grazing since 1979 and now is managed as wildlife habitat.

Marvel leads an environmental group that is trying to bid on a state-lands lease in Ouster County in hopes of removing cattle from part of the land. He hopes ranchers will bid against him, proving that they'll pay more than they currently do to graze livestock on public land.

But Noh, a Kimberly sheep rancher, called attention this week to Marvel's management practices he says raise questions

about Marvel's stewardship of private land.

Gary Wright, a biologist in the BLM's Shoshone District office, said he visited the parcel Thursday afternoon. Wright said he saw no visible sign that cattle had been grazing on the parcel, but that cattle have access to the BLM parcel from Marvel's land because no fence separates the two.

"I'm quite sure there have been cattle" on the BLM parcel, Wright said. "There

doesn't appear to be concentrated use, but there might have been some incidental use."

Wright said he'd been aware for "a couple of years" that no fence separated the two properties. He accepted blame for the incident, saying he had failed to tell Marvel a fence was needed.

"It was a short sight of mine, and I take responsibility for that," Wright said.

Fences between private and public land are typically the responsibility of the private landowner, Wright said.

Forest Service cuts ranchers' grazing permits over deteriorating rangeland

OAKLEY — Five members of the Wild Rose Grazing Association will have their federal grazing permits shortened for persistently flouting the terms of their permits, a Sawtooth National Forest official has announced.

Twin Falls District Ranger Don Oman says he intends to suspend 15 percent of the 1994 grazing time allotted to Bruce, Ray and Bud Bedke, as well as Robert Whiteley and Mike Poulton.

In a letter informing the group of his decision, Oman wrote, "The deteriorating condition of government-owned developments caused by your failure to perform the assigned range improvements is unacceptable." In a Thursday interview, Oman said: "This has been a long-term problem, and we've been very patient with these folks. This is the first time we've taken any permanent action."

Oman's action is the latest development in a long-running dispute between the Oakley-based grazing association and the For-

est Service. The association drew national attention in 1990 when a member was quoted by the New York Times as threatening to kill Oman.

Oman's letter said the ranchers allowed their cows to remain on national forest land beyond an Oct. 29, 1993, removal date. On Nov. 1, some 185 cattle were observed in an area where they shouldn't have been, Oman said. Further, the group failed to maintain Forest Service water tanks and troughs, Oman said.

Ray Bedke said he may appeal Oman's decision to Sawtooth National Forest Supervisor Jack Bills. Bedke declined to comment further.

The alleged infractions occurred in the Goose Creek allotment, which begins about five miles southwest Oakley. The 55,000-acre area is in Idaho, just north of the Utah and Nevada state lines.

Although problems with out-of-season grazing and poor maintenance of government property date back several years, Oman said the 15 percent time penalty was calculated solely on this year's violations.

Oman's action will not affect the number of animals allowed on the area. Last year, the permit was calculated for 1,825 cattle.

"We're trying to administer these lands for the protection of all the resources, while still trying to get some use out of that grazing area," Oman explained. "We owe it to the American people to make sure these lands aren't impaired."

Oman has been the subject of ranchers' complaints and they long have tried to get the Forest Service to transfer him out of the district.

Last spring, Bills announced that Oman is slated for transfer out of the Twin Falls Ranger District as soon as a suitable position for Oman becomes available.

Fairfield District Ranger Madden retires

FAIRFIELD — Longtime Forest Service employee John Madden retired this week after more than 33 years of service — the last 14 as Fairfield District Ranger for the Sawtooth National Forest.

"John will sorely be missed," said Forest Supervisor Jack Bills. "John knew the country very well and cared deeply for the land and resources he was responsible for."

Madden, 56, began his career in the late 1950s and early 1960s with several seasonal jobs in timber management on the Grand Mesa-Uncompahgre National Forest in Colorado.

After graduating from Colorado State University in 1961 with a degree in wildlife management, Madden worked as a range conservationist on the old Freedom District of the Caribou National Forest in Freedom, Wyo.

After a three year stint in the U.S. Army, he returned to the Forest Service as a range conservationist and assistant district ranger in Council on the Payette National Forest's Hornet District.

In 1971 Madden transferred to the New Meadows District on the Payette. He was promoted to the Fairfield District Ranger job in December 1979 and has since served in that position.

In addition to his duties for the Sawtooth

Forest, Madden was the leader of one of 18 Incident Management Teams in the United States — teams of highly trained wildland firefighters.

Madden also is well respected throughout the state for his knowledge and experience with noxious weeds, Bills said.

"Anytime you're associated with an organization for 33 years you have some qualms about leaving it," Madden said in a telephone interview Thursday.

"Retirement is kind of an emotional roller coaster."

He has definite plans for his retirement, including raising some horses on his Fairfield ranch and "lots of fishing and hunting," he said.

Idaho range would be best in U.S.

Nation's airwings would flock to 'finest range in the U.S.' Air Force says

TWIN FALLS — If approved, a proposed Air Force bombing range in southwestern Owyhee County would become "the finest range in the United States, bar none," a senior officer at the Mountain Home Air Force base said Wednesday.

Bombing crews stationed around the country would probably want to use such a state-of-the-art training range, said Col. Jerry Callen, vice-commander of the 366th Composite Wing.

"We envision having other outfits come down and train with us," Callen told The Times-News editorial board.

But if the proposed bombing range isn't approved, Callen said he will continue to train his pilots at the Saylor Creek Bombing Range — and nearby ranges in other states.

"I'll still get the job done," he vowed. "We've got a good facility, even without the training range." Specifically, he noted the availability of empty airspace and good flying weather in southern Idaho.

Although Callen, Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus and some Mountain Home business people are united in their desire for the new bombing range, others aren't convinced that it's needed.

In a 1991 memo, Lt. Gen. Michael Nelson, deputy Air Force chief of staff for plans and operations wrote: "Existing ranges are adequate to support training needs of the Composite Wing and other forces that will use them."

But the proposed bombing range would improve the quality of training in Idaho, Callen said.

In addition to the Saylor Creek Range southeast of Mountain Home, four other bomb training ranges exist within 350 miles; the other ranges are located in Oregon, Nevada and Utah.

The proposed Owyhee County range could be reached by planes from Mountain Home in as little as 8 minutes — as opposed to the 20 minutes it takes to reach the Utah Test and Training Range in northwestern Utah.

It takes about 35 minutes to reach the Nellis Range in southern Nevada — the most distant of the five bombing ranges currently available to Mountain Home pilots.

Using other ranges is an inefficient use of time and money, Callen said, because "all that time flying straight and level is eating up the engines."

"To go to the other bases, we spend a lot of time going to and from," Callen added. "That's time we could be using to work — and our work is fighting."

Callen noted that total flying time for planes under his command is determined by Air Force officials in Washington.

"We've got to get all our training done in a finite number of hours," he said. "We need better quality training and more of it."

Residents question Filer zoning proposal

FILER — More than a dozen people this week voiced their concerns that proposed zoning changes inside and outside the city would affect small businesses and development plans.

The City Council heard public comments Tuesday evening on the Comprehensive Plan and Land Use Map for the city and the "area of impact" just outside city limits.

The state's Local Planning Act requires that all Idaho cities establish an area of impact by Oct. 1 and to determine land use zoning within such areas.

Alan Andrew, who lives in the proposed impact area, was concerned about the size of the area.

"I feel like, in some regards, there is a hiving on the part of the City Council, to be a big metropolitan area. They want to take in, under their umbrella, more ground than is necessary for their future growth," Andrew said.

Warren Fisher, who operates a greenhouse and nursery business in an south west of Filer said: "I live in an area where you'll never be able to serve me (with water and sewer), and it's less than a half of a mile out of town. Why would I want to be in this impact area? What can you offer me? Why don't you just leave me and everybody else who doesn't want in this alone. Just leave us out of it."

Rita Peterson and her husband, John, manufacture boats at a shop at 320 North Street. She was concerned that a zoning change could prevent her family from ex-

panding their business in the future.

"We do employ people from Filer," she said. "We are trying to help with the growth of Filer. Filer City Attorney Fritz Wondrich told Peterson that because of the grandfather clause, future zoning changes would not affect the present business operation on her property. The zoning would only prevent them from starting another type of business at that location, he said."

Peterson was one of a handful of city residents attending the hearing who live in the North Street and Huddelston Road area and currently operate businesses on their properties. The comprehensive plan calls for zoning this area as residential.

Robert Willis, spokesman for Willis Inc. also voiced concern about future zoning changes. Willis and his partner Henry L. Willis, of Twin Falls, manage a plot of 40 acres that is owned by Willis Inc.

"The land is located across U.S. 30 from West One Bank, in the southeast corner of Filer. The comprehensive plan calls for zoning this area as commercial."

"That is a bigger commercial area than the growth in Filer is going to be able to support," Willis said. "Why can't we zone this area as residential?"

The Willis brothers would some day like to develop this area into residential lots.

The City Council agreed to take no action on the proposed comprehensive plan at this time but did schedule a work session for 2 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 20, to discuss some of the issues raised at the hearing.

LaRocco says he will push for wilderness bill

LEWISTON (AP) — Democratic Congressman Larry LaRocco said he will push for passage of a wilderness bill for the 1st Congressional District in the forthcoming session of Congress, which convenes Jan. 25.

LaRocco said he is optimistic the bill will get through the House of Representatives by Easter.

"I am trying to provide some certainty for Idahoans so they know which lands will be protected and which will be available," he said

during a swing through Lewiston Wednesday.

The bill covers the five national forests in the 1st district: the Nez Perce, Clearwater, Panhandle, Payette and Boise.

Of the 4.5 million acres of road-

less land in the forests, the bill would protect 1.2 million as wilderness.

Another half million acres would be in special management while 2.5 million acres would be released for multiple uses.

LaRocco said he plans to make some changes to the bill by the end of the month to take into account the concerns of people he has talked with, including mill workers, mill owners and environmentalists.

One of the changes involves adding a section to protect the rights of private property owners whose lands are adjacent to wilderness areas.

But LaRocco said he does not plan to make major changes to the bill.

Snowmobiler buried under snow lives

GRANGEVILLE (AP) — One day after five snowmobilers were killed in an avalanche near Kalispell, Mont., an Elk City man riding his snowmobile into Buffalo Hump Lake was swept under a sudden snow slide and lived to tell about it.

Daniel Coburn, 37, was with a party of eight people on Saturday about one-half mile northeast of Buffalo Hump Lake, about 60 miles southeast of Grangeville.

The first six people had crossed a small bowl-shaped clearing on their snowmobiles and Coburn was about 30 to 40 feet behind the sixth rider. His 15-year-old son was an equal distance behind him.

Coburn said he noticed the snow start to shift after the sixth rider passed, but the next events happened too quickly for him to react.

"It was literally just a wave of snow. It was as though it was blown out of the side of the mountain like dynamite," Coburn said.

In what he estimates took no more than a second, Coburn was swept under the avalanche. Only his head and arm protruded from the snow. His snowmobile was completely buried.

Coburn said he was packed so tightly into the snow he could not move or twist. It took a half an hour for the others to dig him out and another hour to free his sled.

Search of elementary students upsets parents

HARRISON (AP) — Harrison Elementary parents are angry over what they term an inappropriate search of sixth-grade students.

About 30 youngsters reportedly were searched on Tuesday afternoon after more than \$100 was missing from a classmate.

The money was not found. Some parents are calling the incident a "strip search," and have called law enforcement to investigate. Several are planning to attend the Kootenai County School Board meeting on Monday to complain to trustees, one of whom has a son in the class.

Jayne Cobb said the children were taken into the school multipurpose room and told to take off their socks and shoes.

After back pockets were checked and nothing was found, the principal allegedly took the boys in the bathroom, three at a time, and searched them. A female teacher conducted a

search of the girls.

Cobb said her 12-year-old daughter had to strip her pants and lift her sweatshirt.

"I just never would have dreamed this could happen," Cobb said. "To me, this seems like a strip search. No one has the right to make her do things like that. In one afternoon they basically undermine everything I have taught her."

She said she is consulting a lawyer. Gay Wilson said Principal Ron Hill pulled out the waistband of her son's undershorts to check for the money.

"I wasn't pleased with the way it was handled," she said. "I'm 10 minutes from the school. If they had just said, 'I would have given permission, but I would have demanded to be present.'"

Hill, the principal who is also district superintendent, could not be reached for comment.

The BLM parcel, about 55 or 60 square acres, is south and east of Bliss near the Snake River Canyon and Malad Gorge State Park. It is separate from another parcel described in Thursday's *Times-News*, on which Marvel has a cooperative agreement with the BLM allowing some grazing.

Wright said the BLM will work with Marvel to "rectify the situation" on the closed land. He said Marvel had complied when the BLM asked him two years ago to fence off his land from most of the adjoining public land.

"He's done what we asked," Wright said. "He's been one of our best cooperators in the isolated

wildlife tracts program."

Marvel declined to comment on the matter Thursday evening. He has said that the cattle belong to someone who rents the pasture to him.

Marvel, a Hailey architect, heads the Idaho Watersheds Project, a 5-month-old environmental group that is seeking to obtain a state land lease on 640 acres in Custer County. The lease currently is held by Challis rancher Will Ingram, who uses the land for cattle grazing.

If the BLM ousting Ingram for the lease, it plans to fence off about 40 acres along Lake Creek to keep livestock away. The idea, Marvel says, is to demonstrate that restricting grazing in riparian areas will improve them as habitat for endangered salmon and other wildlife.

Noh has sought to block the scheduled Jan. 28 lease auction. He has questioned whether Marvel and the BLM are qualified to properly manage the Custer County land.

Besides the cattle-trapping issue, Noh has alleged that Marvel has not controlled weeds on part of his private land and allows cattle to be salted near a riparian area. Marvel has responded that the "riparian area" is actually a wastewater ditch.

If Marvel wants to take over an existing land lease, Noh said, he has the responsibility to comply with all federal rules regarding his own land.

"I think it's one of those situations where, if he were an average rancher, it wouldn't be that big a deal," Noh said. "But not if you're taking a holder-than-thou attitude."

Prosecutor reviews her 1st year in office

RUPERT — Gara Newman says her new job gives her an exciting reason to come to an otherwise familiar courthouse in the morning.

She took the office of Minidoka County prosecutor a year ago. But she admits it has not been exactly smooth sailing.

Newman has taken only one felony case to a jury trial. And she hears rumors among fellow court officials that more than the usual number of her other cases have been dismissed or sent back to a lower court.

To make matters worse, she has had to tackle a backlog of misdemeanor charges — a backlog she has vowed to correct.

But she inherited many of those pending cases with the job. Some still are on file from 1988; and her calendar for felony trials is booked until April, she said.

But then again, the former public defender didn't expect the new job to be easy. Newman chalks it up to bad luck, having to learn the ropes and working without a deputy prosecutor for the first 11 months.

Newman said the burden has been greatly relieved since she hired deputy prosecutor E. Scott Paul from Twin Falls County. Paul handles misdemeanors, juvenile offenses and helps prepare materials for preliminary trials and screening of witnesses in felony cases.

Newman said one of the hardest parts of her job is tackling child sexual abuse cases. It's tough deciding whether to push for a jury trial.

"I feel like these little girls, they're my friends and I care about them," she said.

One benefit she sees to being a woman prosecutor in sex abuse cases is that child sex victims are more relaxed around her. Often, a child will be ill at ease simply because the prosecutor is a man, and men are the sex offenders "about 95 percent of the time."

Newman's first sexual abuse case introduced her to the difficulties of being a prosecutor, she said. The victim was a three-year-old girl — the same age as her own son. She was too young to testify because she couldn't name times and dates crucial to the prosecution.

Panel recommends more building funds

MOSCOW (AP) — A committee of politicians, business people and higher education representatives want state leaders to pump up Idaho's permanent building fund.

The Idaho Board of Education committee is cycling the expected \$65 million surplus as an additional source of revenue for the fund. Yet education officials say any extra money from the surplus will only temporarily meet needs.

The board's Blue Ribbon Committee will suggest altering the permanent building fund's revenue formula. Otherwise, members say, any additional money will be a one-time shot in the arm for higher education's construction and maintenance problems.

Committee members expect to recommend a three-step plan at the education board's Jan. 20-21 in Boise. It calls for using some of the expected surplus into public works construction, diverting general tax revenue into the construction budget and possible bond financing.

"We need to develop alternatives that are more stable and tied to the growth of the state," said University of Idaho planning director Joanne Reece. "It must be predictable."

The Boise meeting, scheduled around testimony before the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee, could not come at a better time, said Reece.

Superintendent: Student protest 'misinformed'

RUPERT — Students acted on "misinformation and rumor" Wednesday when they protested the proposed removal of Minidoka County High School Principal, Superintendent Michael Bishop said.

But Bishop would not say why he told Steve Hubschmidt in a letter last week that he would not be a successful principal next year and shouldn't have his contract renewed.

He called it a personnel matter and confidential. "I would (comment) if it was any of the students' business or any of your business to start with," Bishop said in an interview Thursday evening. "But it's not their business and not your business."

Wednesday morning several hundred students staged a "sit-in" protest in the school hallway. That evening about 75 students huddled with signs and blankets outside a closed School Board meeting.

Students said they hope their protest encourages parents to pressure their local School Board members to vote against Bishop's recommendation.

Bishop said he was disappointed that the students disrupted the closed meeting, which was held to discuss the expulsion of some students. He said the parents and students were embarrassed by the protest.

Bishop said he plans to talk about his recommendation for Hubschmidt at the school's regular board meeting Jan. 18.

"It's common knowledge that, especially in education, we set goals each year. My concern is that (Hubschmidt) was not meeting them as soon as we wanted," he said.

Sentence delayed for Rexburg mom

REXBURG (AP) — Gayle Stephens won't be sentenced for neglect in the death of her young son until after the trial of a man accused of killing the child.

Stephens, 20, was to be sentenced Monday, but Magistrate Brent Moss delayed sentencing until after the Feb. 1 murder trial for Darrin Carter.

Carter, 21, Rexburg, is charged with first-degree murder in the April 24, 1993, death of Kristopher Purcell, 21 months.

Prosecutors contend Stephens knowingly left her son in danger when she allowed Carter to babysit him despite past incidents of child abuse.

She pleaded guilty to felony injury to a child and a misdemeanor, failure to report child abuse. It was an Alford plea, in which she maintained her innocence but agreed there was enough evidence to convict her.

District Judge James Herndon issued a gag order, barring anyone involved with the Carter case from commenting publicly about it.

Madison County Prosecutor Sid Brown said he asked for a delay in sentencing because he wanted to avoid pre-trial publicity that could influence jury selection in the Carter case. "It's pretty well known that

Darrin Carter will ask that the trial be moved out of the county," defense attorney Jim Archibald said. "One more big splash of news in Gayle Stephens case will make that possible."

Steelers like visiting Kansas City

Kansas City fans have to be wondering about home-field advantage when the Chiefs play the Pittsburgh Steelers.

The wild-card Steelers (9-7) will be seeking their seventh straight victory at Arrowhead Stadium when they open the AFC playoffs Saturday against the West champion Chiefs (11-5).

Of course, the Steelers have not played against Joe Montana at Arrowhead. Montana is the second-rated quarterback in the AFC and has a brilliant career with San Francisco before this season he had the third highest quarterback playoff rating in NFL history.

Montana will be facing a Pittsburgh club that depends on a defense that ranks first overall in the AFC with an average per-game yield of 283.2 yards and third in the AFC against the rush with an 85.5-yard average. A key member of the defense is cornerback Ron Woodson, who had eight interceptions this season and who returned a punt 80-yards for a touchdown in the Steelers' 27-3 win at Kansas City in 1992.

The other victories in Pittsburgh's streak against the Chiefs were in 1987, 1985, 1979, 1976, 1974. The Chiefs, 7-1 at Arrowhead this season, last beat the Steelers in Kansas City in 1971.

In an NFC playoff game Saturday, the wild-card Green Bay Packers play at the Central champion Detroit Lions.

Sunday's playoff games will have the Minnesota Vikings at the New York Giants in the NFC and the Denver Broncos at the Los Angeles Raiders in the AFC. All four are wild-card teams.

NFL sets attendance track

NEW YORK (AP) — The NFL has set a record for attendance at its 1993 season, with 277,777 fans for 22 games, breaking the previous record of 15,550,000 in 1990.

The average attendance per game was 62,354, breaking the record of 62,321, set in 1990.

Following the 1990 record, attendance had gone down in each of the last two seasons: 1991, 15,841,459; 1992, 13,828,857.

Packers at Lions

So it cost them the NFC Central title, but maybe the Packers' loss to the Lions in the regular-season finale last week might not have been a bad thing for them. At least instead of playing in frigid Green Bay Saturday, which they would have to do if they had won, they'll be back indoors in the Pontiac Silverdome.

Weather aside, the Packers (9-7) need Brett Favre to be hot, something he definitely was not when he threw four interceptions in 30-20 loss to Lions (10-6) last week.

Barry Sanders, who finished with 1,115 yards, rushing despite not playing since suffering a knee injury on Thanksgiving Day, might see action for the Lions, who are returning to the playoffs for the

first time since 1991. It will be the first playoff game for Green Bay since 1982.

Vikings at Giants

Both low-scoring clubs are hoping that their veteran quarterbacks take charge. Jim McMahon, 8-3 as a starter this year for the Vikings (9-7), won the Super Bowl with the Chicago Bears in 1985. In one of the playoff games en route to the Super Bowl, McMahon led the Bears past the Giants 21-0. Giants quarterback Phil Simms guided New York to victory in the 1987 Super Bowl.

Simms figures to have more help than McMahon because the Giants running game, keyed to Rodney Hampton, is the best in the NFL with a per-game average of 138.1 yards.

The Giants, however, might have a bigger psychological barrier to clear because they lost their last two regular-season games, including the 16-13 overtime defeat by Dallas last Sunday.

Broncos at Raiders

The Raiders (10-6) rallied from a 30-13 deficit in the regular-season finale to beat the Broncos (9-7) 33-30 in overtime at Los Angeles. They also beat the Broncos earlier in the season.

The Broncos will be counting on John Elway, the AFC's top-rated passer, to keep them from being the 14th NFL team to be swept in three games in a single regular-season playoff year. He performed valiantly in defeat last week, passing for 361 yards, the third highest total of his career.

Denver's defense certainly knows about the Raiders' passing combination of Jeff Hostetler to Tim Brown. They connected 11 times for 173 yards and two touchdowns last week.

Rams say they're ready to head out


ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — The Los Angeles Rams said Thursday they will notify the city of Anaheim of their intention to invoke an escape clause in their 35-year stadium lease to explore the option of moving.

The team issued a statement saying that invoking the clause "will allow the Rams the opportunity to fully explore the economic viability of staying in Southern California."

Under terms of their lease, the Rams must give 15 months notice prior to leaving Anaheim Stadium. But the team pointed out that notice can be revoked any time during those 15 months.

"No decision has been made to leave Anaheim Stadium," said John Shaw, Rams executive vice president. He added that the team has not begun negotiations with any other city or stadium authority.

"At this time, I think it is fair to say we are considering the following: Staying in Anaheim, moving to another venue in Southern California, or moving elsewhere," Shaw said. "It should



be emphasized that the overriding concern we currently have is to find the best possible stadium and practice facility for this team to use.

"While we remain uncertain as to where the Rams may be playing in 1995, we can assure our season ticket-holders that the Rams will play all of their 1994 home games at Anaheim Stadium."

Shaw said in the statement that Anaheim Stadium, due to its design and configuration, does not provide the revenues that more modern football stadiums generate. This is an important economic factor affecting the Rams' ability to compete with other NFL clubs in putting a winning team on the field, he added.

Knicks hang on to edge Bucks

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Charles Oakley tied his season-high with 21 points and the New York Knicks survived a fourth-quarter collapse to edge the Milwaukee Bucks 92-86 Thursday night.

Rolando Blackman added a season-best 18 points for New York, which nearly blew a 21-point second-half lead with careless play down the stretch. New York didn't have a field goal in the final 5:40, but Milwaukee could get no closer than four.

After Patrick Ewing's dunk gave New York a 20-point lead midway through the fourth quarter, Jon Barry sparked an 11-0 run with six points, pulling Milwaukee to 83-74 with 2:32 remaining. But Todd Day was short on a 3-pointer and Greg Anthony hit a pair of free throws to break New York's drought.

Murdoch and Barry then hit 3-pointers to get Milwaukee within 85-80 with 1:11 left, but John Starks made five straight free throws to keep New York ahead. Eric Murdoch hit a bucket with eight seconds remaining, trimmed the lead to 90-86, but Blackman made two free throws to wrap it up.

Patrick Ewing added 17 points for the Knicks. Vin Baker led Milwaukee with 18 points, Frank Brickowski added 15 and Murdoch had 14. Barry had 10 points, all in the fourth quarter comeback.

Trail Blazers 116, Hornets 110

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Cliff Robinson scored 21 of his 29 points in the second half as the Portland Trail Blazers came back from a 20-point halftime deficit to beat the Charlotte Hornets 116-110 Thursday night.

Portland took a 15-point lead on a jumper by Jaren Jackson with 2:48 left to play, but the Hornets stormed back to make it 114-110 when Hersey

Hawkins made a 3-pointer with 32 seconds to play. Two free throws by Rod Strickland, who finished with 25 for the Blazers, ended the scoring.

Injured New York grabs Harper

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Knicks, their backcourt depleted by injuries, Thursday acquired veteran guard Derek Harper from the Dallas Mavericks for swingman Tony Campbell and a first-round draft choice in 1997.

"This is an opportunity I've wanted for a long while," an ecstatic Harper said. "I feel fortunate to be part of a good team."

"Derek is an outstanding addition to our backcourt," Eric Grunfeld, the Knicks' vice president and general manager, said. "He is a proven veteran who

brings leadership and savvy, and he is an outstanding outside shooter. With the injury to Doc Rivers, the addition of Derek again gives us great depth in the backcourt."

The Knicks went after a guard as soon as Doc Rivers was lost for the season with a knee injury. Reserve guard Hubert Davis is out for several

weeks with a fractured bone in his right hand.

The Knicks (19-8) also have been without starting forward Charles Smith (knee surgery) since December, while forward Anthony Mason (sprained left ankle) and Campbell (pinched nerve in his left foot) each missed the last two games.

Since Rivers' injury, much-maligned Greg Anthony, a third-year pro, has stepped in as the Knicks' playmaker. The Knicks were 28-7 with Anthony as the starter last season, but they are only 4-4 this season.

Court dismisses widow's lawsuit

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Billy Martin's widow cannot sue for pain and suffering in her husband's death and cannot use snow-covered roads as grounds to collect damages from the town where he died in a truck accident, an appeals court ruled Thursday.

The Appellate Division of state Supreme Court, New York's second level appeals court, dismissed part of Jihannan Martin's suit against William Reddy, the town of Fenton and Ford Motor Credit Co.

Martin, a former major league player and manager, was killed Dec. 25, 1989, when the Ford pickup truck he was riding in slid off a snow-covered road and hit a cable near the entrance to his farm just north of Binghamton. Reddy, a longtime friend of Martin's, was convicted of driving with a blood-alcohol content above the legal limit for intoxication in the crash.

Mrs. Martin filed a suit in 1990 to collect damages for wrongful death and pain and suffering. Thursday's unanimous ruling by the appellate court upheld a decision handed down last February by a state Supreme Court judge in Binghamton.

Baseball owners cannot agree on revenue sharing

ROSEMONT, Ill. (AP) — Baseball's latest attempt to reach an agreement on revenue sharing fell apart one vote short Thursday when a coalition of eight large-market clubs defeated the proposal.

After seven hours of meetings, executive council chairman Bud Selig said the debate would continue when owners reconvene at Fort Lauderdale, Fla., on Aug. 17-18. While the proposal by management executive Richard Ravitch gained 20 votes, a large-market counterproposal received 11 votes.

"I'd be a liar if I said I hadn't hoped we'd come to a conclusion today," said Ravitch, the primary force behind revenue sharing. "We've been at it a long time and it would be nice if we got on to the main event of negotiating with the union."

A three-quarters vote of the 28 teams is needed to pass a proposal, and Ravitch had only 18 when owners debated revenue sharing at Kohler, Wis., on Aug. 10-11. One owner, speaking on the condition he not be identified, said the eight teams blocking Ravitch's

Florida Marlins and Texas Rangers reversed their positions. Marlins chairman H. Wayne Huizenga and Rangers general manager George W. Bush did not attend Thursday's meeting. Huizenga is involved in an attempted takeover of Paramount Communications Inc., and Bush is running to become governor of Texas.

John Harrington of the Boston Red Sox said while Ravitch's plan considered only revenue from broadcasting and ticket receipts, a "large-market alternative took into account all money, including revenue from parking, concessions, luxury suites and stadium advertising."

Louisville wins easily; West Virginia upsets No. 7 Temple

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Greg Minor scored 19 points and No. 11 Louisville used balanced scoring to beat South Florida 80-56 Thursday night in the Metro Conference opener for both teams.

South Florida (7-4) tried to control the tempo using a more deliberate offense than Louisville's last opponent, George Mason. In that game Tuesday night, Louisville set a school record for scoring in a 132-87 victory.

College basketball

But as the Cardinals (10-1) pulled away in the second half, the Bulls forced their shots. Chuckie Atkins' 3-pointer with seven minutes left ended a five-minute scoring drought for South Florida.

South Florida made only 18 of 57 shots (32 percent), compared with Louisville's 46 percent from the field.



2nd-year coach heats up St. Louis

ST. LOUIS (AP) — At least one of St. Louis' top players doesn't know what all the fuss is about. Of course, H. Waldman went to UNLV for two seasons before transferring to St. Louis and has a personal college record of 71-3. So, to Waldman, who has no first name, just an initial, St. Louis' 11-0 start is no big deal.

"You guys are the ones who've made me think about it," Waldman said. "I'm a junior point guard for the Billikens; after an 81-48 victory over Southwest Missouri State on Wednesday, '10-0, now it's a big deal, 11-0 is a bigger deal.'"

"I just try to put it out of my mind." It's getting more and more difficult. Two seasons ago, St. Louis won only five games and finished

with eight players after numerous defections. Last season, new coach Charlie Spoonhour struggled and went 12-17 with only one road victory.

Now the Billikens are one of only seven unbeaten teams left in the country, although they're certainly less heralded than top-ranked Arkansas, No. 3 Duke and No. 6 UCLA, to name three. St. Louis has had to settle for being among the paragraph of teams also receiving votes in the Top 25, getting one vote last week and six this week.

Still, they're the hot ticket in town. Last week, St. Louis set a school attendance record of 17,117 for a victory over Southern Illinois. On Wednesday, a crowd of 13,854 — third highest in school history — watched the Billikens blow out

Southwest Missouri, Spoonhour's old school.

The victory tied the school record for the best start, set in 1948-49 by the defending NIT champions. St. Louis has a chance to break the record against Arizona State in Tucson on Saturday.

Junior guard Scott Highmark can't believe it, because he remembers the bad old days. He and Erwin Cloggett, the team's leading scorer, have been starters since their freshman year, and both topped the 1,000-point mark for their careers in the last two weeks.

"That just means we've been around a long time," Highmark said. "We were kind of forced into Division I basketball."



Technology revolution gives cable TV a run for its money

TWIN FALLS—If you live in the city, 500-channel television is probably less than a mile away.

"That's our goal," said Judy Peppier, public relations director for US West Communications in Idaho. "We're in the third stage of a four-stage project to install a fiber-optic network in 30 cities of Idaho, and we want to have (every home and business) within 6,000 feet of a fiber-optic cable."

Fiber optics could eventually bring you more channels than you could surf through if you stuck with it from "The Today Show" through Letterman, but Ken Walker wants you to know the future is already here.

"We can provide access to 300 channels now," said Walker, who operates Satellite Technology in Twin Falls. "And we've sold more than 13,000 dishes in since we started business in 1977."

Welcome to the brave new world of alternatives to the coaxial cable that's fed the global village into your living

room since Ed Sullivan had his own hair.

"The technology is incredible," says Vince Thompson, who runs King Videocable's Twin Falls operations. "There are going to be changes in television in the next few years that people won't believe. But they're not all going to happen at once and they're not all going to happen here. For now, we feel we provide the best service for the best price to our subscribers, and we feel we'll be competitive for the foreseeable future."

It's certainly true that traditional cable — King Video and other companies in Jackpot, Shoshone, Buhl, Burley-Rupert and the Wood River Valley — dominates Magic Valley television.

Deriving blast from the past

Twin Falls native about to publish Idaho's official history

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls' most famous historian is about to publish the official record of what happened to Idaho.

Leonard Arrington, a 76-year-old retired Brigham Young University professor most famous for "Great Basin Kingdom," an economic history of the Mormon Church, will release "History of Idaho" in mid-March.

The two-volume work was commissioned by the Idaho Legislature in 1989 as part of the state's Centennial celebration.

"It was a big responsibility, but I enjoyed every moment of it," Arrington said Thursday in a telephone interview from his Salt Lake City home.

"When they offered it to me, I jumped at the chance."

The University of Idaho Press is publishing the book, which will sell for \$49.50 in bookstores and statewide. Arrington will be honored at the Idaho Historical Society's annual legislative reception in Boise on Monday, Jan. 17, and state Sen. Laird Noh, the Kimberly Republican who set the project in motion, is trying to arrange for a book signing in the Twin Falls area for later this year.

"The idea came from a similar book done in Wyoming," Noh said. "I proposed it to some other legislators, and they thought it was a good idea."

Noh said he recognized early on that a history of the state backed by the taxpayers' money — \$100,000 was appropriated for the project — could be controversial.

"I guess we really could have had three different histories," he said with a smile. "It took a little selling, but once legislators from all parts of the state were convinced, they supported it. Sen. Ricks was very helpful, and so was Bruce Newcomb."

Mark Ricks, an influential GOP member of the powerful Joint Finance-Appropriation Committee that approved the money for the book, is a farmer from eastern Idaho. Newcomb, now the No. 2 Republican in the House of Representatives, is a Burley-area rancher.

"Really, the more we looked into it, all roads led to Leonard," Noh said. "We considered Carlos Schwantes (a University of Idaho professor who published a widely-praised history of Idaho three years ago), but Schwantes was still writing his own book at the time and he's not a native of the state."

"I realize there is much about Idaho history that can be told from different points of view," Arrington said. "That's why we had a group of five people take a look at the manuscript to make sure it was fair."

They included Schwantes and Merle Wells, the retired Idaho state historian.

"They couldn't have made a better choice," Wells said. "In addition to having a good background in Idaho and economic history, Leonard's a fine writer."

Arrington said the history is thorough and doesn't skirt controversy, such as the 1864 move of the state capital from

Delightfully idiotic: New 'Hot Shots!'

"Hot Shots! Party Deux" (PG-13). A burp-riddled and bawdy lampoon of macho heroics, "Hot Shots! Party Deux" is a predictably idiotic follow-up to the more successful Part One.

Director Jim Abrahams and his cowriter Pat Proft relentlessly send up "Rambo III," though there are slightly less blatant references to "Casablanca," "Apocalypse Now," "The Godfather," "Star Wars" and "Lady and the Tramp."

Abrahams and Proft deliver a familiarly fast-paced comic barrage ranging from side-splittingly sophomoric to gags that make you gag. Charlie Sheen, as action hero Tug Benson (Lloyd Bridges), now commander in chief. Tug, who is nursing a broken heart in a Buddhist monastery, takes on the assignment only after learning that his friend, Col. Denton Walters (Richard Crenna), is missing somewhere between "Iraq and a hard place."

Saddam, a hisping cross dresser on intimate terms with his Dustbuster, has already foiled three rescue attempts when Tug is recruited at the behest of Gen. Tug Benson (Lloyd Bridges), now commander in chief. Tug, who is nursing a broken heart in a Buddhist monastery, takes on the assignment only after learning that his friend, Col. Denton Walters (Richard Crenna), is missing somewhere between "Iraq and a hard place."

His depleted pees peeking through garlands of bandoliers, Tug parachutes into the incognito jungles of Iraq, scrambles through a Beverly Hills back-yard barbecue and eventually winds up behind enemy lines at Saddam's

palace. Most self-respecting action heroes don't go much for girls, but Tug is reunited with his original love interest (Valeria Golino) and also knocks boots with a CIA glamour puss (Brenda Bakke) in spoofs of "No Way Out" and "Basic Instinct." (Washington Post) (Video West, Great American Video)

Symposium surveys Western landscape

TWIN FALLS — This year's Snake River Symposium at the College of Southern Idaho will take the long view.

How long? Well, about as far as the horizon stretches from the 100th meridian.

"AfterImage: Lectures of the American Landscape" will feature a month-long series of discussions by five Westerners who specialize in Western vistas.

"This photo exhibition and public lecture series provides an opportunity for people of the Magic Valley to view some of the best contemporary landscape photography, and to meet and listen to artists, a photo historian, and an art critic discuss the changing role of photography in public perceptions and the environment," wrote Bill Studebaker, director of the Honors Program at CSI, in the symposium guide.

The Honors Program is co-sponsoring the event with the Herrett Museum, which will display the work of photographers Robert Dawson, Mark Klett, Richard Misrach and John Pfahl from Tuesday through Feb. 17.


At the same time, the Sunspot Gallery on the second floor of the Taylor Building will display "Second View: Photographs From the Rephotographic Survey," a collection of pairs of photographs from identical vantage points taken approximately 100 years apart.

Some of the photographers are also the lecturers, starting with Manchester, who will speak on Tuesday, Jan. 18, at 7 p.m. in Room 108 of the Aspen Building.

Manchester, who will talk about the history of landscape photography, is a curator and a photographic historian with a bachelor's degree in art history from Skidmore College and a master's degree in photographic history from State University of New York.

She's now collaborating with her husband, photographer Dawson, on the Water in the West Project, and has written a book based on it, "Arid Waters."

Sting, R.E.M. among Grammy nominants

NEW YORK (AP) — Old favorites dominated this year's Grammy Award nominations. Sting, a 10-time winner, led with six nominations Thursday, including record, song and best album. Multiple winners: Whitney Houston, R.E.M. and Billy Joel each got four.

Five-time winner Alan Menken, who co-wrote the "Aladdin" soundtrack, and eight-time winner David Foster, who helped produce "The Bodyguard" movie soundtrack, received five nominations. Neil Young, who has never won a Grammy, was nominated for record and song of the year for "Harvest Moon."

Sting's "Ten Summoner's Tales" was nominated for best album, while his song "If I Ever Lose My Faith in You" was up for best song and best record. His other nominations were for best male pop vocal performance, best solo rock vocal performance and best long-form video.

Joel was nominated for best record and song for "The River of Dreams," and best album for "River of Dreams." Houston's nominations included best record for "I Will Always Love You," the No. 1 single in the running for top album. R.E.M. picked up a best album nomination for "Automatic for the People."

Others nominated for song of the year are Jim Steinman for Meat Loaf's "I'd Do Anything for Love (But I Won't Do That)" and Menken and Tim Rice for "A Whole New World," which also received a best record nomination. Also nominated for album of the year was Donald Fagen's "Kamakiriad."

The record of the year category recognizes performers. Song of the year recognizes writers. Album of the year recognizes both the artist and the producer.

Billy, a power-pop quartet; rockers Blind Melon; rhythm 'n' blues singer Toni Braxton; Digable Planets, a jazz-inflected hip hop trio, and SWV (Sisters with Voices) were nominated as best new artist.

viewing. King Video alone has 14,200 subscribers in the 29,700 households in Twin Falls, Jerome and Gooding counties, and that number is growing along with the population.

But the cable companies are far from alone. Twin Falls-based Idaho Home Theater, a so-called wireless cable service that picks up broadcast signals and rebroadcasts them to receivers in the homes of its subscribers, has more than 1,000 customers in Twin Falls, Jerome, Gooding and Lincoln counties, and there are thousands of satellite dishes in the same area, Walker says.

"We have a substantial number of people in this area who have to look for alternatives to conventional cable," said Bill Mogensen, who runs IHT.

"If you live in the country and don't have cable, you can get three channels," Walker said. "If you know where to find them."

IHT and Satellite Technology may have gotten into the market to fill that void, but unlike King Video and other cable systems, there are no geographical limits on their growth.

"We transmit a signal that's picked up by a subscriber on private property," Mogensen said. "There's no franchise necessary, and we're not regulated by anybody but the (Federal Communications Commission)."

"We're just as likely to get a subscriber in town as in the country," said Walker, who estimates that 40 percent of customers are city-dwellers. "They come looking for more (programming) variety."

The variety that a satellite dish provides is a selling point for people who can afford the investment, Thompson says, but he thinks most TV viewers balance that with cost. King Video supplies its Twin Falls subscribers with 27 channels for \$21.55, plus premium channels on a fee basis.

"Satellite companies are billing their service on a monthly fee basis, but you're still paying for a dish and a descrambler, and they're expensive," he said. "And even after you pay for that descrambler, there are still channels you don't have access to unless you pay extra."

Walker concedes it's more expensive, but not much more so. Sign a contract and pay him \$32 a month, Walker says, and his company will provide the dish, the IRD (the decoder/descrambler), the know-how and the service.

"It's a turn-key system," Walker said. "We offer about 300 channels, and only about 60 of those are scrambled. If you want those programs, you can order them and you pay a fee."

IHT seeks a middle ground, providing a basic service with 12 channels for \$18.95 a month, plus HBO and the Disney Channel for an additional fee.

"We think the technology offers a lot of potential for expansion, and

Lewis to Boise; the 1896 conviction of "Diamondfield Jack" Davis for the murder of sheepherders in the South Hills, and the celebrated 1907 trial of labor organizer Bill Haywood for conspiracy in the assassination of strike-busting Gov. Frank Steuneger. "It didn't reach any new conclusions about those things," he said. "But I presented all sides."

Much of that material Arrington already knew like the back of his hand, although he hasn't lived in the state for any length of time since he graduated from the University of Idaho in 1939.

But his work includes biographies of Charles Rich, the Mormon pioneer responsible for the settlement of the Bear Lake Basin, and the Eccles family, the Salt Lake City family — they control First Security Bank — who made their fortune in the Wood River Valley silver rush of the 1880s.

"Wherever I've lived, Idaho has really been a second home for me," Arrington said. "I still have a 60-acre farm there that was my dad's, and my brothers still live in Twin."

Arrington's father came to Twin Falls in 1913 and began to buy land. By the time Leonard graduated from Twin Falls High in 1935, the family was among the most prosperous and prominent in Twin Falls County.

After his graduation from the U of I, Leonard earned a doctorate at the University of North Carolina, where he taught briefly before going off to the Army during World War II, when he served in North Africa. After the war, he taught at Utah State, UCLA and at the University of Genoa in Italy, before he returned to Utah where he wrote, among other things, an autobiography of Brigham Young.

"Idaho is a state with an interesting history and interesting personalities," he said. "I hope I've done it justice."

without the obstacles that cable and satellite companies face," Mogensen said. "Because we're a broadcast system, our service is more reliable, and we're in a good position to offer things like pay-per-view because we're flexible. If you want to watch a (pay-per-view) program, all you have to do is call the office and we can turn the signal on to your house."

And, Mogensen and Walker add, they'll still be a market for their services long after fiber optics has turned the conventional cable industry upside down.

That may happen sooner rather than later.

Last May, US West and Time Warner Entertainment signed a deal to build so-called full-service networks — interactive systems carrying

communications, entertainment and information for homes and businesses — over TWE's cable network.

Under the agreement, US West agreed to invest \$2.5 billion in TWE and to provide its telecommunication expertise.

The upshot: If all goes as planned, by 1998 most of TWE's cable systems will be wired for the fiber-optic future, providing not only cable television but video, telephone, entertainment, data and information services. Even in the Magic Valley

"The infrastructure is being completed there," Peppler said. "In some places, it will only be necessary to run a coaxial cable to individual homes to hook it up."



'Grumpy Old Men' gives old warriors chance to shine

"Randy Old Men" is more like "Grumpy Old Men" tells the story of two neighbors who are pushing 70, with plenty of testosterone still coursing through their bodies. Max Goldman (played by Jack Lemmon) and John Gustafson (Walter Matthau) grew up together in Wabasha, Minn., but something came between them in 1938, and they've been feuding ever since. The grumpy old men greet each morning with an exchange of profanities and end each evening with a nasty practical joke (at least one joke, involving Matthau's use of a remote control device to thwart Lemmon's viewing of the Powerball lottery drawing, is a classic). The situation comes to a head when Ann-Margret moves in across the street and both men take a shine to her. Before her arrival, the two had almost forgotten why they were fighting, but once she hits town, the stakes get higher. "Grumpy Old Men" has a high Quibble Factor. John and Max

obviously care about each other, but it's not clear why. There's a subplot involving the Internal Revenue Service that never amounts to much. And Ann-Margret pulling a reverse Michael Jackson doesn't add up. Would she really be attracted to both Lemmon and Matthau instead of someone closer to her own age? None of this, incidentally, matters much. Lemmon and Matthau are charmers, easily sliding into a sharp, comic give-and-take. They've built up a lot of good will in a combined eight decades of acting, so their delight in each other — and in the opportunity to work together — is infectious.

Matthau revels in his grumpiness and gets one of the best Minnesota moments, serving himself a hearty dinner of fried Spam. Lemmon's character favors potato latkes. The actor has a ball with a "morning after" scene that includes parodies of both Tom Cruise and Macaulay

Culkin, neither of whom was born when Lemmon won his first Oscar. There aren't many good roles for older actors, so it's a special kick to see Lemmon's character in scenes with his dad, played by Burgess Meredith with vulgar glee.

Meredith's scenes are mostly at a lake-top gathering of ice-fishing huts, where Lemmon and Matthau have their most heated battles. The huts are a revelation, decorated on the outside with milfoil warnings and on the inside with TVs, turntables spinning Mozart records and space heaters. This frozen Muskiesville offers a fascinating peek into a world we haven't previously seen in the movies.

It's in a hut just like those that the idea for "Grumpy Old Men" was planted in the mind of Hastings, Minn., screenwriter Mark Steven Johnson. He wrote the script as a valentine to his late grandfather, but the movie ends up being a valentine to two old pros having a high old time (and giving the audience one, too). Lemmon, Matthau rekindle on-screen feud in new movie

ST. PAUL, Minn. — "Pussycat," Walter Matthau is saying into the telephone at the Four Seasons Hotel, "I'm with a guy here from St. Paul and he wants to know what you mean by this sentence in your book."

Matthau has paused during an interview to call home. "Pussycat" is his wife of 34 years, Carol, who has known and noshed with most of the elegant, right coast people of the last 40 years and who was the model for the character Holly Golightly in "Breakfast at Tiffany's." The book he's talking about is "Among the Porcupines," the charming, witty memoir Carol Matthau published earlier this year.

The sentence is "Walter is more outrageous now than he ever was." And the woman on the other end of the phone is in her bathroom at the Matthaus' Southern California home, naked and dripping wet because her husband just instructed the maid to fetch her out of the bathtub to talk about how outrageous he is.

Turns out Carol Matthau isn't even sure she wrote the sentence ("I had a bad editor. She took some liberties"). But she agrees "outrageous" is a good word to describe the man who, in the five minutes before the phone call, demonstrated a few quick boxing moves, foot-froited with a publicist and rattled off a list of alternate titles for his new film, "Grumpy Old Men," all of them bad or unprintable or both (a few of the clean alternatives: "The Old Couple," "A Couple Old Guys and a Broad," "A Couple of Minnesotans").

"Neither one of us liked the title at all," agrees Jack Lemmon, 68, who co-stars with Matthau and Ann-Margret in the Minnesota-lensed "Grumpy Old Men." They weren't quiet about it, either. Screenwriter Mark Steven Johnson, who has always liked the title, recalls tuning in "The Tonight Show" several months ago only to see Lemmon telling Jay Leno about the film and the lousy title that had to go.

Well, it didn't go, and now even the stars have cottoned to the title. "The Old Men" part, that's what put me off. I thought no one would

want to see a picture about old men. People don't want to be reminded about getting old," says Matthau, 73. "But when I started telling people the title and they all laughed when they heard it, I realized it's kind of catchy."

Market research clinched it. The movie, which is about a pair of feuding, fustian and ice-fishing aficionados who both fall in love with their new neighbor, was sneak previewed in late autumn. The results convinced Warner Bros. to move the release of "Grumpy Old Men" into the competitive Christmas movie season.

After blows are exchanged, Lemmon and Matthau share a scene in which the audience realizes the men are fighting on auto-pilot because they've forgotten what their 45-year feud is about.

"They started asking test audiences about the title — everyone in the country is a critic now, and I don't know whether that's good or bad — and the audience reaction was favorable," says Lemmon. "They liked 'Grumpy Old Men.'"

He and Lemmon were walking on more like a foot of ice when they shot the ice-fishing scenes. During one, the battle for Ann-Margret comes to a head in a knock-down, drag-out fight, during which Matthau threatens to stab Lemmon with a frozen perch. The fight is played for laughs, but it is undercut by the sadness that is at the heart of the characters' feud. After blows are exchanged, Lemmon and Matthau share a scene in which the audience realizes the men are fighting on auto-pilot because they've forgotten what their 45-year feud is about.

"For both actors, it was a key scene. It reminded Lemmon of a story I heard from the actress Rachel Roberts, who told me she'd been having a fight with her then-husband Rex Harrison. Lemmon says at one moment of heated anger, 'Harrison said, 'I want you out of my house, uh, what is your name?' And then they got into a new argument about him forgetting his wife's name. Sometimes you just lose it, no matter how serious you are."

Matthau thinks the scene works

so well because, on their fifth film together, he and his pal Lemmon have a rapport almost like a married couple. "I'll be having an argument with my wife and the phone'll ring," says Matthau. "I'll answer it and say, 'Gee, let me call you back,' and when I get back to the argument, I can't remember what we were saying. After this many years together, you forget what you're fighting about."

Matthau and Lemmon's own relationship is not nearly as contentious as the Grumpy Old Men's — in fact, they've been looking for a movie that would pair them since they finished their last joint project, "Buddy, Buddy," a dozen years ago. In each of their five films,

they've played variations on these roles. The two have played youngish men ("The Fortune Cookie") and middle-aged men ("The Odd Couple," "The Front Page" and "Buddy Buddy"), but grumpiness is a constant factor.

"Yeah and I'll tell you something," says Lemmon. "If you read a script and you think, OK, Walter in this part and Jack in this part, I can anticipate what Walter will say. He will want it the other way. Always. Walter wants to play the part you'd think of for me. Whether or not that would be good for the movie, that's another question."

As his wont, Lemmon illustrates with a story:

"As Oscar, Walter gave probably the best comedy performance I've ever seen in 'The Odd Couple' opposite Art Carney (as Felix). Paramount flew me to New York to see the thing and find out if I'd want to be in the movie. Walter gives this magic performance, and the studio assumes I would want to play his part, because he's the one getting the notices from the critics. Well, I said, 'I wouldn't dare. I wouldn't have the guts to take the film, but only if Walter played his part.' I told them, 'I'd do the film, but only if Walter played his part.' The irony is, Walter always wanted to play Felix. He thinks Felix is his part, because Oscar's too easy."

"Beethoven's 2nd" (PG). It's just as funny and appealing as "Beethoven" the first. This time the messy St. Bernard falls in love, which potentially means more dogs to rile Charles Grodin's nice but fussy family man, George Newton, who has just gotten used to Beethoven. Debi Mazar is hilarious as the nasty owner of Missy, the object of Beethoven's desires. A family film that can actually be enjoyed by the entire family. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

"Geronimo: An American Legend" (PG-13). A handsome and respectful Western that wants to echo and modernize the myths of the past, the latest film from director Walter Hill is most impressive as a physical piece of filmmaking but it is difficult to warm up to on an emotional level. Wes Studi is especially fierce as the legendary Apache war chief who hated to be fenced in and forced the Army to chase him all over the Southwest. (Twin Cinema)

"Jurassic Park" (PG-13). The poor little rich kid of last summer's movies. Enormous amounts of money and attention have been expended on making the film's half-dinosaur species awfully impressive (though much too intense for small children) but very little has been done to make any of the puny human beings equally involving. In fact, when the big guys leave the screen, you'll be tempted to leave with them. (Twin Cinema)

"Mrs. Doubtfire" (PG-13). Robin Williams can't help but be funny in this situation born in high-concept heaven: divorced dad disguises himself as a nanny to spend more time with his kids. But the rest of the film, though unobjectionable enough, underlines Williams' recent desire to appear in warm, cuddly and terminally bland motion pictures. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

"My Life" (PG-13). Written and directed by "Ghost" screenwriter Bruce Joel Rubin and attempting to deal with big picture issues like life and death in a tale of an L.A. adman (Michael Keaton) who is dying of cancer as his wife (Nicole Kidman) prepares for the birth of their third child. If this sounds glib, manipulative and sappy, you have no idea. (Ace Theatre)

Given the success of the first film, it was inevitable that Whoopi Goldberg and those darn nuns would come back again, but the thrill is definitely gone this time around. Wayne (Mike Myers) and Garth (Dana Carvey), Aurora, Ill., stars of late-night cable-access-TV, are back for more inspired mirth and mayhem as they attempt to stage a huge concert, modestly called Waynestock. Just as much a zany hoot as the first film. With Christopher Walken, Tia Carrere, Ralph Brown. (Twin Cinema)







"We beat the game if East makes the best play at trick one," said West.

"He shouldn't have had the chance," countered North. "We clinch this game if South makes the best play at trick one."

West pushed the game instead of inviting, because of his good holding in intermediate cards. Intermediate (nines and 10s) often make the difference between success and failure.

West led his fourth-best spade, dummy ducked and East won the trick. The spade 10 was returned, South ducking and then winning the third spade with his king. The club ace was cashed, and when no honor appeared, South tried to run the hearts. West discarded a diamond and South's best chance rested with finding both diamond honors with East. He ran dummy's diamond 10, conceding a diamond to East and tuckily found the way to nine-shaky winners.

West claimed that East's play of the spade 10 at trick one would have defeated the game. South would not have dared duck (fearing that West had led from the A-Q) and East could later have reached West's spade 10.

North agreed, but he had the penultimate word. His point was that South should have played dummy's jack at trick one to clarify matters in the spade suit.

They were both right, but it was South who had the last and official word. He was scorekeeper and he posted game and rubber for his side.

Unlike some stars who chalk up more than a decade on a soap, Melody's storylines have always been prominent ones and it is reported that she received the most fan-mail of any cast member on "Y&R."

Scott was raised by her grandmother, who recognized her talents early and enrolled her in a school for performing tots called "The Meglin Kiddies" (which was supervised by Edbel Meglin, the woman credited with launching Shirley Temple's enormously successful career as a child star).

"I loved performing in the U.S.O. shows around Southern California and enjoyed the lip dancing, singing, ballet and jazz classes. I guess I was a ham, but I considered it all fun and never even knew that children were paid to perform until I was much older," Scott recalled.

Scott graduated from "The Meglin Kiddies," troupe early and started doing TV work in television and feature films. She played Tippi Hedren as a kid in Alfred Hitchcock's "Marnie" and was one of the little

school girls in the Clint Eastwood film "The Beguiled." In addition to Eastwood, whom she had a crush on as a pre-teen, Scott worked with other big-name movie stars such as Kirk Douglas, Lauren Bacall, Geraldine Page and Jack Wayne.

After high school, Scott majored in music at the University of Southern California. She returned to acting in a big way, alternating between TV and films.

"I remember the day I got the call about playing Nikki in 'Young and Restless.' I had been offered roles in three other TV pilots and I had to make a decision: I chose the soap opera because I wanted to act and I knew I would get more of an opportunity on a soap than in a pilot which might not even sell. You couldn't ask for a better job than working on soaps. I am so content to be doing what I do, and it also affords me the opportunity to have a real life too."

Scott's real life includes her husband, Edward Scott, an executive producer for "Y&R," and their three children — Ed's daughter Jennifer, Scott's daughter Alexandra, and their daughter Elizabeth.

Along with being one of the leading players in the popular CBS soap and running a house, Scott always makes time for her role as national spokesperson for the Save the Earth Foundation, an organization that funds grants for environmental research. Unlike her Nikki character, who is independent, times Melody Thomas Scott is one focused young woman.


