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E911 attorney suggests voting on regional concept

TWIN FALLS — Voters should decide the fate of a four-county project to consolidate emergency communications, according to the attorney for the regional E911 project.

At least that is what E911 attorney M. Lynn Dunlap of Twin Falls wrote in a Feb. 9 letter to E911 Project Manager Al Sandner.

"My advice would be to hold a county-by-county election as to whether or not the county residents are in favor of a countywide enhanced E911 system, and if so, whether or not the county residents want their county to become part of a regional E911 system," Dunlap wrote.

But that "wasn't necessarily a recommendation," Dunlap said Thursday.

"Quite frankly, we don't know where we stand right now," he said.

The E911 board is waiting on the Legislature to amend the Emergency Communications Act to clarify the legality of regional E911 systems such as the one proposed for Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Twin Falls counties.

As part of a Lincoln County lawsuit, Judge Ted Wood of Idaho Falls ruled in January that state law does not provide for inter-county E911 systems.

"While the decision by Judge Wood does not outlaw the regional approach, it is certainly clear from his decision that absent appeal, the county sheriffs, one by one, may

raise the same issues and possibly achieve the same result," Dunlap wrote.

"At some juncture, this matter simply needs to be faced with the voters and resolved," he wrote.

Sandner disagreed with Dunlap's suggestion of putting the regional concept to a new vote.

"We don't agree with that at this point," Sandner said Thursday.

He also pointed out that Jerome's City Council has given public approval to the regional E911, and he suggested that Dunlap would be drafting a new letter to clarify his stance.

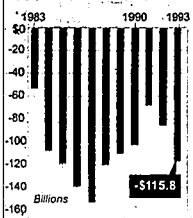

U.S. trade imbalance sets record

WASHINGTON — The United States posted a record trade deficit with Japan last year and the overall imbalance with the world was the worst since 1988, the government said Thursday.

The U.S. trade imbalance widened by 37 percent, to \$115.8 billion, a deterioration blamed on imports growing twice as fast as U.S. exports.

The deficit with Japan shot up by 23.7 percent, to \$59.3 billion, surpassing the old record of \$56.3 billion set in 1987.

The Clinton administration said the figures highlighted why it was aggressively pursuing a new get-tough approach with Japan. Administration officials and private economists did take heart that the deficit for December shrank to the lowest level in a year and said they hoped it pointed to better days ahead.

In other economic news, the Labor Department reported that consumer prices did not go up at all in January, the first time that the monthly cost-of-living index did not rise in more than four years.

"Going into the new year, inflation remains tame," said Laura D'Andrea Tyson, head of the president's Council of Economic Advisors. "We regain on a course of a strong economy and low inflation."

Tyson noted that the \$7.5 billion December trade deficit was 23.5 percent below the November figure and should result in an upward revision in overall economic growth, as measured by the gross domestic product, for the October-December quarter.

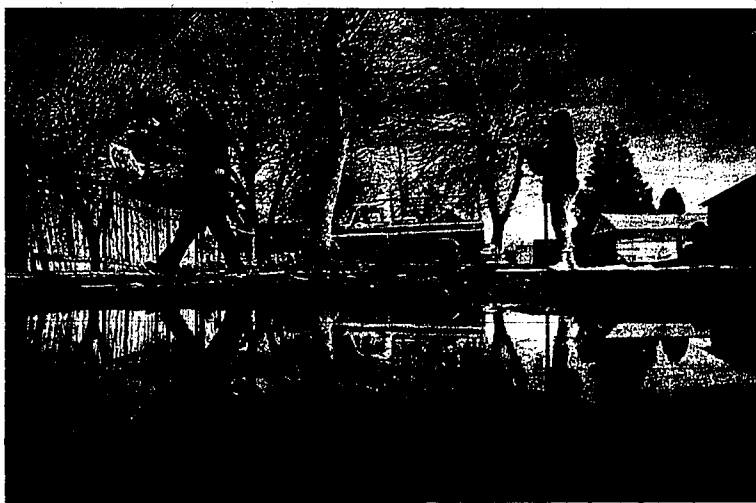
The government initially put growth at a six-year high of 5.9 percent for the fourth quarter. Some analysts said that figure could be revised upward to an astonishing 7 percent based on the December trade performance.

The acceleration in growth was measured to have much impact on the labor market. The government said in a third report Thursday that new claims for unemployment benefits rose by 5,000, to 371,000, last week with the four-week moving average jumping to its highest level in 16 months.

The \$115.8 billion trade imbalance reflected a dramatic 37 percent widening of the gap between imports and exports from the 1992 level of \$84.5 billion.

Both exports and imports hit record highs last year.

Olympic gold medal skier Fraser dies

SUN VALLEY — Sonja Henie could skate, but she couldn't ski her way out of a snowstorm.

That was a problem for film director H. Bruce Humberstone. "Sun Valley Serenade" would look pretty silly with Sonja on her backside in a snowdrift.

So Humberstone told one of his gofers to find him a girl who could ski.

He found a 20-year-old kid named Gretchen Fraser.

"Gretchen was pigtailed and just out of high school, but she substituted for Henie any time she skied," said Doug Oppenheimer of Boise, co-author of a 1976 history of Sun Valley. "Henie would be photographed in the studio, with the wind blowing her hair and scenery flashing by."

It was a precedent. For the next 54 years, Fraser was at the heart of what Sun Valley was really all about.

That long interregnum ended Thursday.

Fraser, winner of the first Olympic gold medal ever awarded an American in alpine skiing, died at the age of 75 at Wood River Medical Center, where she had been admitted Wednesday night.

The Sun Valley Co., which made the announcement, said the cause of death was "natural causes."

Friends said she suffered from heart disease.

"She was a golden girl," said Peggy Grossman, who had known Fraser for 28 years. "A golden girl from a golden age."

"She was a terrific ambassador for Sun Valley," Oppenheimer said. "She had a certain passion for the area."

Fraser came along when Sun Valley was starstruck. Hemingway and Gary Cooper and Lucille Ball and the Shah of Iran came to

call, and there were Austrian ski instructors and five-star French chefs everywhere. But this was America's only European-style ski resort, and it needed a skier to match its mountains.

It found one on Feb. 5, 1948, when Fraser beat Erika Mahringer of Austria by half a second in the Olympic slalom in St. Moritz, Switzerland. She won after waiting 17 minutes in the starting gate to begin her second and final run because the timing system was broken.

A few days later, she almost won a second gold, placing second in the combined slalom and downhill.

"Gretchen winning a gold medal gave Sun Valley stature it didn't have before," Oppenheimer said. "Sun Valley was trying to attract rich tourists from the East at the time, and having her there meant that it could claim to be a serious ski resort, not just a playground for movie stars."

Fraser, a slight, skinny kid from Vancouver, Wash., who missed the chance to ski in

Legal Aid may sue for farm worker insurance

BOISE — If the Legislature doesn't require farmworkers to be covered under workers' compensation, it probably will have to defend the agricultural exemption in court.

All Idaho employers except farmers are required to carry workers' compensation insurance to pay medical bills in case of on-the-job injury. A bill to repeal agriculture's exemption is being considered by the House State Affairs Committee.

"If we don't get the bill passed, we'll look to other avenues," said Erik Johnson, director of the farmworker law unit of Idaho Legal Aid Services.

Johnson told The Times-News Thursday that a court challenge to the agricultural exemption would be "a very strong possibility."

Such a suit would claim that the exemption denies farmworkers equal protection of the law — a violation of the Fourteenth Amendment. The vast majority of farmworkers in Idaho are Hispanic.

The House committee held a second round of hearings Thursday morning on the repeal bill. The panel probably will decide what to do about the issue today, Chairman Pam Ahrens said.

"The committee feels there are legitimate

Drug may delay Alzheimer's

WASHINGTON — Anti-inflammatory drugs used against arthritis also tend to slow or block the onset of mind-destroying Alzheimer's disease, a study suggests.

The study, to be published Friday in the journal Neurology, compared the drug-taking history of 50 pairs of elderly twins and found that the twin who had been taking anti-inflammatory drugs for arthritis was least affected by Alzheimer's.

"We found that the twins who had used anti-inflammatory drugs had four times greater likelihood of being the later-affected and the non-affected member of the pair," said Dr. John Breitner, a

Duke University researcher and lead author of the study. "For identical twins, there was a 10-to-1 difference."

Anti-inflammatory drugs included ibuprofen, piroxicam, naproxen and some steroids that were used for arthritis in the 1950s and 1960s, but which are no longer prescribed. All of these drugs, at proper doses, tend to limit inflammation throughout the body, including the brain.

Dr. Leonard Berg, chairman of the medical advisory board of the national Alzheimer's Association, cautioned that the evidence of benefit "is not convincing enough to advise the population at large to take anti-inflammatory drugs to avoid Alzheimer's. There are side effects to these drugs."

Education Department approves scholarships awarded on race

WASHINGTON (AP) — A scholarship restricted to black students is helping Kathy Cousins pursue her dream of obtaining a doctorate and a college teaching position.

Seeking to provide other minority students with similar opportunities, the Education Department said Thursday colleges and universities may use race-based scholarships to remedy past discrimination or diversify student bodies.

"We want the doors to post-secondary education to remain open for minority students," Education Secretary Richard Riley said.

David Warren, president of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, said the revised policy "restores the vital stream of financial aid dollars" to

minority students.

"These kinds of programs have been around for a long time," said Robert Atwell, president of the American Council on Education. "They are symbolically very important."

Cousins, a second-year doctoral student in mathematics education at the University of South Florida, received her award through one of 25 fellowships provided each year by the Florida Education Fund, created in 1984 to produce black PhDs.

"I did not have a job and I needed the money to come in," Cousins said. "It provided me with the opportunity to pursue my degree."

The future of race-based scholarships had been in limbo since 1990, when the Bush administration first

proposed that they be banned. That order never took effect.

Opponents contend that race-based scholarships violate federal civil rights law and discriminate against white students by shrinking the amount of aid available to them.

"I think they're illegal," said Richard Komer, who was the Education Department's deputy assistant secretary for civil rights under the Bush administration.

Komer, now an attorney with the conservative Institute for Justice, said courts have held that a certain number of seats at a school can't be set aside for a particular race. Using the same argument, he said, "neither could you set aside a particular number of scholarships."

The new Education Department

policy is based on an interpretation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which prohibits recipients of federal funds from discriminating on the basis of race, color or national origin. It allows:

- Aid to disadvantaged students even if it goes disproportionately to minorities.
- Aid awarded on the basis of race or national origin if it is authorized by federal statute.

- Aid based on race or national origin to remedy past discrimination.
- Aid based on race or national origin if it is narrowly tailored to diversify the student body.

Judgment might close city soup kitchen

TOLEDO, Ohio — Toledo's only inner-city soup kitchen may be forced to close because it cannot pay a \$90,000 judgment to a fired employee.

The kitchen's owners have until April to raise enough money to pay the judgment. If they can't, the 25-year-old kitchen that serves 200 hot meals a day to poor people will be sold at auction.

"It's a real slap in the face to the community," said Harvey Savage Jr., president of Kitchen for the Poor. "A lot of people, including children, depend on the kitchen for a hot meal."

Savage's father, the Rev. H.V. Savage, founded the soup kitchen in 1969 after he saw a man digging through a garbage can for food. The kitchen is an outreach program of his church, the Lo Salem Missionary Baptist Church.

Group wants to shut down reactor

WASHINGTON — Nearly 15 years after the Three Mile Island accident awakened the nation to the risks of nuclear-power generation, an environmental group wants to temporarily shut down the lone operating reactor at the Pennsylvania site.

A petition filed with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission could prompt a fresh look at protections afforded people living near reactor sites. The Pennsylvania Institute for Clean Air asked that Unit 1 reactor be taken out of service until all of nearby Harrisburg is brought into an emergency evacuation plan.

At issue is whether communities near the south-central Pennsylvania plant are prepared to safely evacuate residents during an accident similar to the one in early 1979 that saw nuclear fuel melt in the Unit 2 reactor and the subsequent release of radioactive gases into the atmosphere.

New Jersey to pay in job-bias lawsuit

WASHINGTON — The state of New Jersey agreed Thursday to pay more than \$7 million to blacks and women denied jobs as prison guards, police and sheriff's officers because of allegedly biased testing and hiring policies.

Some 450 blacks and women who were rejected will be offered such jobs on a priority basis.

The settlement of a 1988 lawsuit by the Justice Department's civil rights division was the second largest ever obtained by the federal government in a job bias case involving state or local government.

New Jersey agreed to pay \$6.5 million in back pay to black and female applicants affected by the practices. Another \$625,000 will provide retroactive pension benefits to those who are hired and complete probation in the job.

Teen pulls girls from W. Virginia river

ROMNEY, W.Va. — Some people might have frozen when they saw a car carrying two teen-age girls plunge into a river. Not Jason Cannon.

Jason, a 16-year-old high school sophomore, dove into the South Branch of the Potomac River to rescue the girls Wednesday after their car skidded on the ice and mud, went into the river and sank in 20 feet of water.

Jason had been driving behind Christine Malcolm, 16, and Kelly Carr, 13. He dashed 300 yards to call for help, then returned to the river.

The girls managed to get out of the car and swim to the surface. Jason swam out 10 or 15 feet and pulled them to safety.

Taylor to get arthritic hip replaced

LOS ANGELES — Actress Elizabeth Taylor, struggling with painful arthritis in her hip, will undergo hip replacement surgery next month, a spokeswoman said Thursday.

"She's been in pain for some time," said Miss Taylor's publicist, Chen Sam.

Miss Taylor, 61, was hospitalized at St. John's Hospital and Health Center in Santa Monica on Jan. 14 for tests on her hip. She left abruptly when the deadly Jan. 17 earthquake forced evacuation of the hospital.

A statement from Dr. John Moreland, an orthopedic surgeon, said Miss Taylor has osteoarthritis in her left hip, a condition in which cartilage has worn out, "causing painful bone-on-bone contact."

Jimmy Stewart's wife dies of cancer

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — Gloria Stewart, married to venerable actor Jimmy Stewart for 45 years, died of cancer with her husband and family at her side, her son said Thursday. She was 75. Gloria Hatrick Stewart died at the couple's Beverly Hills home Wednesday night, said her son Michael McLean. She had been seriously ill with cancer over the past few months and was hospitalized for a week at Christmashome.

Stewart, the couple's twin 42-year-old daughters, Judy Merrill and Kelly Harcourt, and McLean were with her when she died.

The Stewarts were married in 1949.

Cough, sniffle: Flu season winding down

ATLANTA (AP) — If you haven't come down with it yet, consider yourself lucky: The flu season is winding down.

By the week ending Feb. 5, all states reported influenza, but the number with widespread outbreaks went down to six from 13 the week before, said the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"We're not sure when the peak was, probably in early January," said Nancy Arden, the CDC's chief of influenza epidemiology. There is no way to know how much longer the flu season will last, she said.

States that reported widespread outbreaks by the week ending Feb. 5 were Alaska, Louisiana, Missouri, Ohio, Tennessee and Virginia, though flu was losing its grip in those states as well.

The flu season generally begins in November and outbreaks usually don't occur until December or January. This season got off to an early start and was dominated by cases of the harsh type A Beijing strain that particularly threatened the elderly and the very young.

The CDC did not yet have the number of flu cases and deaths this season but said fewer people than projected caught the flu.

More people got flu shots. Many nursing homes reported about 95 percent of their residents were vaccinated this year.

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AIDS author dies

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Randy Shilts, journalist and acclaimed author of books about AIDS and discrimination against gays, has died. He was 42.

Shilts died late Wednesday or early Thursday at his Sonoma County home, according to the San Francisco Chronicle, where Shilts had worked as a reporter.

The cause of death was not immediately known. The author tested positive for HIV, the virus that causes AIDS, in 1985 but did not reveal his condition until last year.

Mr. President, about that pickup

Clinton says AstroTurf in his El Camino bed was to protect luggage

WASHINGTON (AP) — The question to President Clinton was pointed and probing: Why DID he put that AstroTurf in the back of his pickup?

Don Imus, the raucous New York radio personality, referred Thursday to Clinton's reminiscing last week about having an El Camino pickup in the 1970s with the bed lined with AstroTurf.

In a telephone interview that veered wildly from the serious to the silly, Clinton gamely explained that he had spruced up the bed of his "Cowboy Cadillac" because he hauled luggage in it.

"It wasn't for what everyone thought it was for when I made the comment, I'll tell you that," he insisted. "I'm guilty of a lot of things, but I didn't never do THAT."

Imus gently chided Clinton with a reference to the president's campaign-days disclaimer that he had tried marijuana but not inhaled.

"That's like saying you didn't inhale, Mr. President," he said. "No, it's just that I didn't inhale in the back of a pickup," Clinton shot back.

The exchange was part of Imus' second interview of Clinton as president after having him on as a regular guest during the presidential campaign.

Professing new deference now that Clinton is president, the host of WFAN-AM's "Imus in the Morning" promised early on that there would be no goofy questions. He was just kidding.

Between questions about weighty matters like Bosnia and trade, Imus took off on Clinton's eating habits. He reminded the president that earlier in the week he had downed double lunches in Ohio, including a "Clinton burger" and that pastrami sandwich and that apple fritter the size of a baby's head.

"Hey, hey, the apple fritter — I had one bite," Clinton protested.

Then, the president seemed to assign his eating binge to forces beyond his control.

"I did get off my diet that day," he allowed. "But I was transported. I mean, I was out there in a place I felt at home in. I was in a little town in Ohio, you know."

Adding a populist flair to his long-winded explanation, he added, "I stopped at this little deli with this guy who had been a butcher's assistant when he was 13 years old and had

finally saved enough money to open his own deli three years ago. And he built it with his hands, and he made this Clinton burger. And I thought, well, I'm going to eat it."

Clinton tried the same Everyman touch again when Imus derided the model home built as part of the failed Whitewater real estate venture the president had

President jokes about pinkeye

WASHINGTON (AP) — With his left eye reddened and swollen nearly shut Tuesday, President Clinton tried to look on the good side.

"I look like a guy who needs health care today — and I do. Thank goodness, I've got it," Clinton told a group of senior citizen leaders at a mid-morning meeting about his health care plan.

Spokeswoman Dee Dee Myers said a White House doctor diagnosed Clinton with conjunctivitis — a contagious inflammation commonly called pinkeye.

Myers said a White House nurse rinsed Clinton's eye with a saline solution and gave him antibiotic eye drops Wednesday night while he watched a college basketball game.

Clinton replied, "It was a little place where a lot of working people without much money were looking for a place to retire and own some property in a beautiful place."

Then, in a gibe at Imus, he continued: "I know that now that you've hit the big time, it's not worthy of you."

Clinton did seem to jump at one of Imus' suggestions: that the president and first lady go on TV's "American Gladiators" to tackle Harry and Louise, the actors who criticize the president's insurance plan in TV ads financed by the insurance industry.

"You know, I wouldn't mind that actually," Clinton said. "The first I heard about them, I thought they were Thelma and Louise."

Clinton says Whitewater link tenuous

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton declared Thursday the Whitewater criminal investigation will cost taxpayers millions of dollars though "most of it has nothing to do with me."

The prosecutor turned his attention to Mrs. Clinton's former law firm.

In Little Rock, Ark., a broadly worded document called a notice subpoena was delivered to the Rose Law Firm this week including "an admonition against any shredding or destruction of materials," said one person employed by the firm.

Special counsel Robert Fiske's admonition directs the firm to preserve information on computers as well as paper documents that may pertain to the investigation, according to a second person who was read portions of the notice by a different Rose employee. Both people spoke on condition of anonymity.

After a report in The Washington Times last week raising the question of shredding, FBI agents asked law firm employees whether they witnessed any documents being destroyed, the first person said.

Attorneys at the Rose Law Firm — who deny any shredding took place — have been gathering material for the wide-ranging investigation of President and Mrs. Clinton's Whitewater Development Corp. real estate venture. Courtiers who deliver packages and whose work area is in the vicinity of the law firm's shredders told the FBI they had no knowledge of any document destruction, said the first person.

Federal regulators, meanwhile, said they had found no basis to recommend any sanctions against the Rose firm for dual representation. The firm had as one of its clients the failed S&L that is part of Fiske's probe, and later it represented the U.S. government in a case against the firm's auditors after the S&L collapsed.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. said there was no conflict of interest under the regulations in effect at the time. The FDIC's examination focused on whether Associate Attorney General Webster Hubbell misled regulators about the Rose firm's prior work for the S&L. It found he didn't.

Clinton contended in Washington that the Whitewater matter was "a simple straightforward thing and it'll be shown to be." He said in a radio interview, "I'm amazed by all the twists and turns of interpretation that's been given."

In response to questions later, Clinton said he reluctantly requested appointment of a special counsel so that "I wouldn't have to fool with it any more. And I'm not spending my time on it."

Both Democrats and Republicans on Capitol Hill had called for appointment of a special counsel to look into Whitewater. Justice Department lawyers from Washington had been handling the matter since November.

The Clintons were 50-50 owners in the venture with James McDougal, the owner of a failed S&L in Arkansas, Madison Guaranty.

"This decision" to appoint a special counsel "is going to cost the taxpayers millions of dollars because what they did was shut down the investigation that was ongoing of the S&L issues down there," Clinton told reporters.

U.S., Vietnam move closer to relations

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — Vietnam and the United States moved closer to establishing diplomatic ties Thursday as Hanoi announced talks to be held in both countries that would touch on human rights in the communist country.

It will be the first time since the end of the Vietnam War in 1975 — when the U.S.-backed government fell to the Communist North — that talks will be held simultaneously in both countries.

The announcement comes two weeks after President Clinton lifted a 19-year trade embargo against Vietnam and proposed the establishment of liaison offices in Hanoi and Washington.

Vietnam appeared to be making a concession by agreeing to talks on human rights violations, the most sensitive issue among Communist Party leaders.

Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Ho The Lan told a news conference the talks would be held in Hanoi at the end of the month.

But she said that both sides "share the view that the normal-ization of relations between Vietnam and the United States is in no way attached to political conditions."

Lan said talks on U.S. financial claims against Vietnam that had been set to begin in Hanoi Tuesday were being rescheduled to allow time to broaden the agenda to include new issues.

One of them, she said, is the establishment of a U.S. liaison office in Hanoi and a Vietnamese liaison office in Washington.

Reports from Washington said the talks are now scheduled for next week.

Lan said she had no information on reports from Washington that Secretary of State Warren Christopher would visit Vietnam in March.

Assistant Secretary of State Winston Lord told Congress last week that Vietnam's respect for human rights will be important for normalizing relations with the United States.

"Vietnam advocates dialogue with all countries including the United States on all issues of mutual concern including the human rights issue," Lan said. The State Department's annual worldwide report on human rights, released Feb. 1, said that while Vietnamese officials have asserted a commitment to human rights, the

government continued with violations in 1993 and still holds political prisoners.

The authorities continued to limit severely freedom of speech, press, assembly and association, as well as worker rights and the right of citizens to change their government," the report said.

The American and Vietnamese representatives who will meet in Hanoi will try to resolve asset claims stemming from the war.

Richard Newcomb, a Treasury Department official, said in congressional testimony last week that U.S. Vietnam assets currently valued at \$290 million remain frozen in the United States.

He said U.S. private claims against Vietnam total \$230 million, mostly American business investments in South Vietnam that were taken by the Communists when the war ended.

Quake fears remain as rebuilding goes on

LOS ANGELES (AP) — One month after the Northridge earthquake, the initial adrenalin rush of fear and bravado has worn off.

Yes, Southern Californians who were jolted awake by the Jan. 17 quake are well into their reconstruction journey.

Collapsed freeways and houses are being fixed. Furniture and other belongings are being replaced.

But frozen emotions also are beginning to thaw.

Without warning, in unguarded moments, tears come, hearts pound and residents realize with resounding dread that this mighty mess isn't over. Not by a long shot.

Behind mind-numbing statistics of 61 dead, 9,000 injured and an estimated \$20 billion in damage stand the unmeasurable statistics of fear, grief, loss and inconvenience.

West Los Angeles psychiatrist Jim Burnett knows firsthand, as well as through patients, just how traumatic life can be these days.

He lost his office, and everything in it, to the earthquake and a wrecking ball. The badly damaged Barrington Building housing his 10-year practice was demolished days after the quake and no one was allowed inside to retrieve belongings.

In Los Angeles alone, 55,236 structures were damaged by the quake. More than 10,000 of those are unfit for habitation.

"If it wasn't in my briefcase, it doesn't exist," Burnett said. Gone are all patient records, office furniture and his medical library.

He has since moved, but reconstructing patient records is frustrating.

"It always keeps me up at night, trying to think of some tiny detail I might have missed about my patients," Burnett said. "Because if I miss something, it could be detrimental to the welfare of my patients."

In therapy sessions, Burnett said, many of his patients exhibit signs of post-traumatic stress. "Very often people get extremely functional, or numb, right after a disaster. And over time, you begin to thaw. Some feelings come through. And everyone's been so damned scared."

The Castillo family represents five of the estimated 21,850 people to seek shelter from the American Red Cross. Herbert, his wife and their children — two girls ages 6 and 5 and a 5-month-old son — have been living at Belmont High School for two weeks.

Ten Red Cross shelters are still open this week with 688 residents. The Castillos are crammed together

with strangers, some of them street people taking advantage of the Red Cross' open-door policy.

"It's like hell," the 29-year-old Castillo said. "They fight all the time. They steal each other's things."

The Castillos moved there because their apartment was uninhabitable. "My wife was scared to stay there," Castillo said. "So we came here."

Castillo, a house painter, is missing work because his equipment was destroyed. The Red Cross, he said, helped him scrape together enough money to find a new apartment.

He hopes to move this week, but plans to return to the shelter — to work.

"They helped me," he said. "And now I've got to help them."

It is Peter Hidalgo's job to put the best spin on Metrolink ridership figures. Since the earthquake, his work has been easy.

Before Jan. 17, an average of 9,500 people daily rode on the 15-month-old system's four routes. That more than tripled, to 31,000, the week after the quake.

Four broken freeways affecting 1 million drivers were responsible for such a drastic change in the commuting behavior of car-addicted Californians. But even freeway collapses weren't enough to keep people on trains.

Metrolink ridership has dropped to about 19,000 daily. Still, Hidalgo said, those numbers are something to celebrate.

"We will be doing well if we can retain 10 percent of those first-time riders," he said. "Long-distance commuter train service is a novelty in Southern California. People enjoy the convenience of driving alone and that's our biggest challenge."

Duane Sawyer is a prime example.

The 40-year-old computer analyst has about a 43-mile commute to work from his Santa Clarita home. He has had to spend two hours getting to work, riding Metrolink to Glendale and then van pooling to his job in Irwindale.

"It's good we have this alternative, but it's about doubled my commuting time," Sawyer said. "I'm going back to driving at the end of the month."

In the Los Angeles Unified School District, 5,311 students at two campuses are still without classrooms.

Those students were given an unexpected vacation. District officials have not yet determined whether the spring term will be extended to make up for lost time.

Tenacious Serbs present tricky adversary in war-torn Bosnia

WASHINGTON — If the haggling in the hills above Sarajevo turns to war, it will be a confrontation between two different military forces with totally contrasting strategies.

NATO will want to hit fast and hard, hoping to terrify the Serbs into handing over their heavy weapons immediately, military strategists say. The Serbs will try to dig in, pick off planes and take prisoners, attempting to crack what they believe is the West's fragile commitment to its Bosnia operation.

In an effort to make sure that it has overwhelming force, NATO is deploying enormous assets and very sophisticated technology in its Bosnian theater of operations.

One of the successes of the Gulf War, a Joint Surveillance Target Attack Radar System (J-STARS), capable of picking out a truck moving along a narrow road, is believed to be operating already to help pinpoint targets.

More than 160 advanced NATO combat aircraft, backed by flying tankers, early warning aircraft and flying command platforms — not to mention search and rescue teams — are ready to go. These will be operating, in all likelihood, out of bases in Italy, France and Britain and off of carriers in the Adriatic.

NATO officials say their pilots are well prepared: Since the United Nations imposed a no-fly zone over Bosnia in April 1993, pilots from the United States, Britain, France and other countries have flown more than 7,000 missions over the hills of Sarajevo.

NATO contingency planning for air strikes began last August.

With a price of \$26 million, one U.S. F-15 attack aircraft may cost more than all the Serbian hardware

that has been systematically destroyed Sarajevo for the past two years.

But the Serbs have the terrain — and probably the winter weather — on their side. The weapons that NATO planes will be trying to hit are small and easily camouflaged in the densely forested hills. Even now, Pentagon officials continue to contradict one another in their estimates of guns and heavy mortars the Serbs have.

The Bosnian Serb military presents other challenges as well. Grimly determined militiamen able to disappear into the countryside are perhaps the most difficult adversaries for a sophisticated Western military to face. This was true in Somalia.

"The more primitive the opponent, the more difficult it is to carry out operations like this," said Col. Clifford Krieger, an Air Force officer who is professor of military strategy and operations at the National War College.

Once the fighters on the ground survive a few air attacks, Krieger said, the psychological advantage begins to shift from attacker to defender.

"After the first bombing raid, the cost of doing business grows," for the attackers, Krieger said. "Those Serbs that are still alive will realize there are ways to handle air attacks. They will start losing their fear."

The Pentagon believes that the

Bosnian Serb forces have some high-altitude SA-2 and SA-6 surface-to-air missiles — like those used against U.S. bombers over North Vietnam in the 1960s — as well as guidance radar. These could challenge NATO's fighters and strike aircraft. But neither type of missile seems to be located around Sarajevo at this point, military sources say.

Of more concern to Western military planners is the Serbs' motley collection of small, shoulder-fired anti-aircraft missiles that are patterned after tried and tested weapons from the Soviet arsenal.

These include the SA-7, which is four feet long, has an infrared guidance system and is lethal up to 15,000 feet. The Bosnian Serbs also have SA-14s, which can hit aircraft flying a little higher.

One of the main problems that NATO planners and pilots will face is uncertainty about just how many guns are out there to be destroyed. Undersecretary of Defense Walter Slocombe estimated last week that the Serbs had 200-300 heavy artillery pieces on the hills surrounding Sarajevo.

Other Pentagon officials continue to put the figure at 100 artillery pieces. Yet other estimates of Serbian artillery in the hills range from 500 to 1,500.

The biggest danger facing NATO leaders, however, may be excessively high expectations. Since the Gulf War, air power has come to be viewed as the ultimate answer to a politician's problems.

The reputation is highly inflated, one of the main U.S. specialists on air war, Eliot Cohen of Johns Hopkins University, warned in the latest issue of Foreign Affairs.

"Air power is an unusually seductive form of military strength," Cohen wrote. "Like modern courtship, it appears to offer gratification without commitment."

Clinton missing chance to make case for Bosnia policy New system helps pilots to navigate

WASHINGTON — Bosnia and the confusing terms of the threatened U.S. military action there followed President Clinton to Ohio this week, but the president was having none of it.

Asked by reporters to clarify whether the United States was softening its demands on the Serbs, a silent Clinton turned his back and gestured to his staff to remove reporters from the restaurant where he was greeting patrons.

As the United States, the United Nations, NATO and the warring parties in Bosnia spar over the best way to end the Bosnian bloodshed, said after conversations the last two days with Clinton, national security adviser Anthony Lake and U.N. officials that the administration would not sign off on a loose interpretation of its ultimatum that the Serbs turn over their heavy guns to U.N. control.

"But," he said, "I am not confident the administration could force the United Nations into accepting a strict interpretation."

Biden said Clinton's "mistake ... is in not going to the American people and stating what the mission here is. He would put Americans at ease and calm their alarms, he would make himself less a target of Republicans setting up unfair markers, plus send a message to the Serbs and the world."

Another Democratic source who has talked to senior officials on the subject this week said that Clinton and his top aides "greatly fear that (U.N. Secretary General Boutros) Boutros-Ghali will accept whatever the Serbs do and the president's only option will be to go along, or use unilateral United States military action, something he doesn't want to do and thinks Congress will oppose."

An administration official said, "There remains a significant difference of opinion over what the ultimate

American people at the appropriate moments." Tuesday was devoted to a presidential speech on crime and Wednesday was devoted to health care, and the White House saw no reason to devote from those efforts, both key domestic issues for Clinton.

But critics and allies of Clinton on Bosnia say he has missed the opportunity this week to make the case for U.S. military action there and left American resolve in question.

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means to us and to the U.N. When he (Clinton) speaks, he should know he is speaking for the coalition that will enforce this ultimatum. He has no certainty of that today."

Clinton last August was rebuffed by the Europeans, when he publicly threatened U.S. military action to end the bloodshed in Bosnia and then found he had no international support and had to pull back. NATO has made repeated military threats since but has not carried them out.

Honor, shame obsolete for modern public figures

So Tonya and Nancy are in Norway together, sharing a practice rink. Nancy Kerrigan is in Lillehammer because an inept hitman failed to whack her knee adequately. Considering that joint's notorious brittleness (ask any retired quarterback), his incompetence seems miraculous.

Tonya "No Comment" Harding is there because of a different kind of failing — an absence of shame. It's a failing all too common in modern public life.

Ever since the attack on Kerrigan, Americans have debated whether the U.S. Olympic Committee should let Harding compete. The common defense raised in Harding's behalf — and the position that ultimately prevailed — was the well-known courtroom standard of innocent until proven guilty.

The argument goes this way: No matter how badly Tonya has behaved, she shouldn't be punished until she has been proven guilty. Let her skate. If she wins a medal and is proven guilty later, authorities can always take the medal away.

That rationale is surely correct. But it also is increasingly the refuge of the swinish and the unrepentant.

Once upon a time, Americans understood and promoted the concept of

disgrace. A person caught participating in something horrid or seamy was expected to slink away in shame. Now he negotiates movie rights.

Part of the change simply reflects our rising threshold of public contempt. If Hester Prynne, Nathaniel Hawthorne's sullied heroine in "The Scarlet Letter," were around today, her dreary little sin wouldn't even merit a guest shot on "Oprah." (Adultery? Sorry, babe, we're looking for something fresher.)

But another part is pure brazenness. Whether the scandal is an assault on a rival skater or revelations about a smelly business deal in a president's past, our modern public figures rely on lawyers and spin doctors to help them ride out the storm.

Rather than slink, they shred.

The challenge for many public figures no longer is to do the honorable thing, but to pretend dignity while dripping mud. Tonya will skate. Sen. Bob Packwood keeps fighting for his diaries. Three years after Tailhook, Adm. Frank Kelso finally announces his retirement, calling the scandal "a difficult chapter" and saluting his own "honor, integrity and leadership."

If these are our children's role models, we're in a peck of trouble.

Was it a bird, a plane, or...?

Interesting, that noisy, unexplained light that flew across central and west Idaho at 10:15 p.m. on Feb. 10 that was seen, heard and reported by many people (Times-News article, "Odd lights brighten night skies" on Feb. 12).

The Air Force says it wasn't their planes or activities and the Defense Command reports it wasn't space debris, a meteor or other craft. So what was it? I've never heard a meteor make any noise, let alone the loud boom and 15 to 20 seconds of thunder-like rumbling I

heard in Picabo. There was no jet noise accompanying it and no lightning present.

This is the third unexplained phenomenon I've observed since Oct. 22, 1993, and, interestingly, came on the day I completed my 15,000-word manuscript that promises to shake the foundations of Christianity. On Oct. 22, 1993, traveling east on I-84 near Mountain Home, I observed a light less than 2 miles away moving parallel to the ground at about 800 feet elevation.

I could determine the approximate range, speed and altitude due to its being in front of the mountains that are near the highway there. We elected the School Board to represent us. Does it?

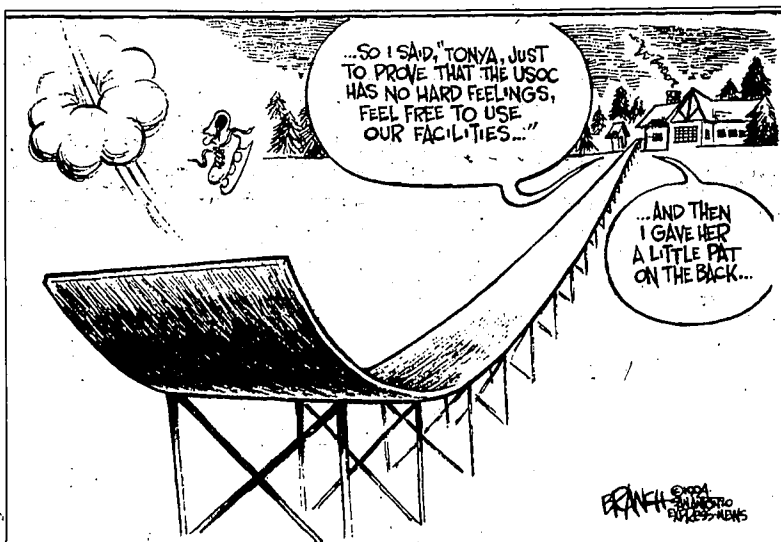

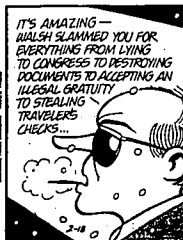

Bosnian Serbs start withdrawing big guns for Sunday deadline

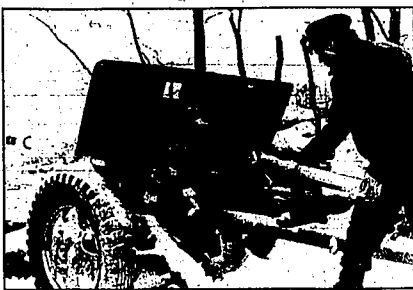
SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Whole convoys of Bosnian Serb artillery withdrew from the hills around Sarajevo Thursday in compliance with a NATO ultimatum to pull back or be bombed.

The pullout reported by U.N. monitors followed a pledge by Bosnian Serb leader Radovan Karadzic to meet NATO's Sunday deadline. Karadzic made the concession under pressure from Russia.

"We do think the war in Sarajevo is finally over," Karadzic told reporters after meeting with Vitaly Churkin, Russia's special envoy, in Pale, the Bosnian Serb stronghold southeast of Sarajevo.

Lt. Col Bill Aikman, a U.N. spokesman in the shell-shattered Bosnian capital, wouldn't specify what sort of equipment was being withdrawn, but said "we're talking heavy weapons."

"Literally they're moving out in convoys, not in individual vehicles," he said. "Clearly there's a major

He said U.N. monitors saw convoys of equipment moving off the

hills, and U.N. commanders received information that withdrawals meeting NATO conditions

would be completed within 36 hours.

It was the first significant Serb withdrawal of heavy guns since NATO issued its ultimatum Feb. 9. NATO has said all heavy guns within a 13-mile radius of Sarajevo must be removed or placed under U.N. control by Sunday or face NATO bombardment.

Serbs have relentlessly shelled the city from their positions in the surrounding hills for nearly two years.

U.N. and NATO officials had earlier reported that the Serbs were dragging their feet. Aikman told reporters that the quickening pace of Serb withdrawals were "a very heartening sign."

"I hope the air strikes will not be necessary, and they will not occur if the Serbs will comply," President Clinton told reporters in Washington earlier Thursday.

Russia has been the most powerful ally of the Serbs, who are their

fellow Slavs and Orthodox Christians.

The promise from Karadzic, coming after the meeting with the Russian envoy, appeared to reflect Serb acceptance that Moscow had reluctantly lined up behind NATO to prevent Western involvement in the war.

But Bosnian Serb generals have defied Karadzic before, and it is unclear whether they would abide by promises made, by their political leadership.

Statements by Gen. Manojlo Milovanovic, Bosnian Serb army chief of staff, reflected the frustration of having to pull back and lose superior battlefield advantage.

"We are openly telling everyone: In case of air strikes, all foreigners who find themselves on our territory will become hostages," Milovanovic said in an interview published in the Friday editions of the weekly *Interveju*, available in Belgrade.

Churkin said the Serbs had agreed to withdraw their heavy weapons from around the Bosnian capital in exchange for a Russian promise to contribute soldiers to any new peacekeeping duties in the city.

In Moscow, President Boris Yeltsin's spokesman, Vyacheslav Kostikov, said the Russian plan and the positive response of the Serbs "make the NATO bombardments groundless."

Greece closes main route for trade in Macedonia

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — The Greeks forged ahead in their fight with Macedonia on Thursday, closing the former Yugoslav republic's main trade route and drawing angry protests from their partners in the European Union.

EU officials criticized Greece for acting without consulting the trade bloc nations, which agreed last year to begin cooperating in developing a common foreign policy.

Premier Andreas Papandreu, furious over Western diplomatic recognition for Macedonia, ordered Wednesday that the northern port of Salonica be closed to all goods bound for landlocked Macedonia except for food and medicine.

The Greeks contend Macedonia's name and national symbols are historically Greek and thus imply a desire to control the northern Greek province that also is called Macedonia.

Greece is trying to pressure its neighbor to change its name and guarantee it will not make claims on Greek territory.

"We want this crisis to be an opportunity to solve the problem," said Foreign Undersecretary George Papandreu, the premier's son.

Macedonia, which denies having designs on Greek land, accused Greece of blackmailing its neighbor by "taking advantage of our position as a landlocked country."

Christopher urges Syria to hold line on attacks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Concerned that violence along the Israel-Lebanon border is spreading, Secretary of State Warren Christopher called Syrian Foreign Minister Farouk Sharrar to urge maximum restraint while Middle East peace efforts proceed.

A rocket attack Wednesday was the first launched from southern Lebanon into Israel since the Shiite Muslim guerrilla group Hezbollah agreed last summer to halt such attacks.

State Department spokesman Michael McCurry condemned the attack Thursday as an effort to disrupt the peace process.

He declined to say whether Israel was being asked not to retaliate, as it customarily does.

But Yossi Beilin, the Israeli deputy foreign minister, said Christopher had told him the United States "will insist on abiding and complying with the agreement" and "will do whatever is possible to prevent a continuation of the development."

"He was very assertive on this issue," Beilin said.

He also quoted Christopher as saying he hoped the attack was "an exception."

McCurry, without going into details, said Christopher called Sharrar a few hours after Wednesday's attack in an effort to keep the conflict from escalating.

Syria has considerable influence in Lebanon through the presence of thousands of troops and a close political relationship with the government in Beirut.

"I think that we continue to believe that attacks, particularly the Katyusha attack, are designed to disrupt the peace process," McCurry said.

"We've seen actions like this before when there has been a gathering of the peace negotiators here in Washington."

The rocket struck a factory Wednesday. No one was injured. It occurred on the 10th day of clashes between guerrillas and Israel-backed forces in southern Lebanon.

Deal to train African armies stirs debate among Israelis

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel has approved a \$50 million deal to send combat veterans to the Congo to train the army, but some Parliament members and some want limits on sending young Israeli men on private military ventures.

Interior Minister Martin Mberri of Congo confirmed that Israelis were training a special presidential guard under a contract with Lavadan, a private Israeli arms supplier.

"The agreement will permit our armed forces to have a new attitude and to respond promptly to instances of social unrest," he told a news conference Wednesday in Brazzaville, Congo's capital.

Mberri's comments were the first government confirmation that it

hired Israeli military experts to help put down an eight-month battle with opposition guerrillas claiming fraud in last year's elections.

About 40 Israelis recently released from elite combat units and led by a retired one-star general are already in the Central African country.

A group of 20 more are slated to join them at a secret training area shortly, despite opposition from Israeli legislators and worried parents.

The Defense Ministry authorized the Israeli company to provide military advice to President Pascal Lissouba, who is fighting rebels loyal to ousted President Denis Sassou-Nguesso.

Militants raise tension in Egypt.

CAIRO, Egypt — Responding to rising threats by Islamic militants, foreign workers are leaving southern Egypt and embassies are telling their citizens to be extra cautious, even in the capital.

The Polish Embassy confirmed Thursday that 23 Polish workers have left the southern city of Assiut to take refuge in Cairo, and the Romanian Embassy said a dozen of its nationals also had moved. The departure of the Poles and Romanians, as well as an undisclosed number of French engineers, came after suspected Muslim extremists Monday fired on a bus carrying Romanian workers to a government-owned cement plant in Assiut.

U.N. agency issues influenza report

GENEVA — The World Health Organization issued its annual recommendations Thursday on the composition of a vaccine to protect millions of people against the next epidemic of flu.

Every year, influenza kills thousands of people — mainly those over 65 or who suffer from diabetes, or heart or lung disease.

The U.N. agency recommends that people most at risk be vaccinated, and estimates 80 percent of those who do are fully protected.

There are three main types of flu virus, all of which change from year to year. This poses health authorities with the problem of coming up with a modified vaccine every year.

Opposition leader rejects ANC plan

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — A leading Zulu nationalist ridiculed the latest peace offering from the ANC as a ploy Thursday, bolstering fears that political unrest may undermine South Africa's historic election in April.

Mangosuthu Buthelezi, leader of the Inkatha Freedom Party, said the ANC's characterization of new political proposals as a compromise was "utter hypocrisy."

White conservatives who also are threatening to boycott the first all-race election April 26-28 also reacted coolly.

But Buthelezi held out hope of an eventual agreement with the African National Congress and President F.W. de Klerk's white-minority government, which led talks on ending apartheid and allowing the black majority to vote.

Cruise ship runs into Virgin Island

CRUZ BAY, U.S. Virgin Islands — The 525-foot cruise ship Starward, which reported crashing into an unknown object five miles off St. John, apparently ran into this U.S. Virgin Island itself.

A Virgin Islands National Park biologist, Ginger Garrison, said Wednesday that she found one of the ship's propellers and parts of another one in the rocks at Duff Point, on St. John's south shore.

"Somebody didn't look up in time," she speculated.

Garrison said it appeared the ship's captain was trying to cover up the incident, which occurred Feb. 10. The ship's owner, Coral Gables, Fla.-based Norwegian Cruiselines, is investigating, said a spokeswoman, Fran Sevcik. Besides damaging coral, the ship dumped about 100 gallons of hydraulic fluid into the sea. None of the 680 passengers aboard was injured.

Blocked roads impede quake teams

LIWA, Indonesia — Rescuers found many roads blocked Thursday when they tried to get to areas rocked by an earthquake that killed at least 184 people on the island of Sumatra in southwestern Indonesia.

A government spokesman, Hotman Atik, said tonight that the death toll was expected to rise. One unconfirmed report said 207 bodies had been recovered.

The earthquake shook southern Sumatra before dawn Wednesday, injuring at least 2,389 people when buildings collapsed on sleeping residents in Liwa and other towns in the province of Lampung, about 125 miles northwest of Jakarta. Atik said 1,016 people suffered serious injuries.

Theft, abortion campaign linked

OSLO, Norway — A clergyman Thursday linked the theft of the Edvard Munch masterpiece "The Scream" to an anti-abortion campaign.

The Rev. Borre Knudsen, a well-known anti-abortion activist, said Norway's most famous painting could be returned if Norwegian television broadcast a film showing a fetus being aborted.

He refused to answer questions about whether anti-abortionists were involved in the theft Saturday at the National Art Museum, which was putting on a Munch exhibition in conjunction with the Winter Olympics in Lillehammer. "We can't publicly state that we know what happened, but we see what happened linked with the issue we feel deeply about," Knudsen, an ordained minister of the state Lutheran Church, said in a radio interview.

Mexican officials, rebels to meet

SAN CRISTOBAL DE LAS CASAS, Mexico — Government and guerrilla negotiators will meet Monday to begin talks to end the peasant rebellion in southern Mexico, the government said Thursday.

Government peace commissioner Manuel Camacho Solis said the talks would be in the southern state of Chiapas, but he wouldn't specify where until Sunday for security reasons.

The announcement followed by less than 24 hours the rebel release of Absalon Castellanos Dominguez, the former governor of the southern state of Chiapas, kidnapped by the rebels Jan. 2, a day after their uprising began.

The Zapatista National Liberation Army attacked and controlled several cities Jan. 1 to demand better treatment for Maya Indian peasants in the state plus better economic conditions.

Police arrested in cocaine raid

BOGOTA, Colombia — Troops raiding a warehouse in Cali arrested two policemen who were guarding cocaine-processing chemicals for the city's drug cartel, officials said Thursday.

The soldiers also seized chemicals worth about \$1.2 million and detained four others in the raid Wednesday, army commander Gen. Rafael Hernandez told reporters.

Japan succumbs, decides to work on trade surplus with U.S.

TOKYO (AP) — Under the threat of U.S. sanctions, the government decided Thursday to develop a wide-ranging package of measures to trim Japan's record trade surplus and possibly head off a trade war.

Prime Minister Morihiro Hosokawa and top trade negotiators agreed to focus on four areas — promotion of imports and foreign investment, deregulation, tougher anti-monopoly enforcement, and fairer government purchasing.

The decision reflects growing anxiety in Japan over U.S. threats of trade retaliation following a breakdown in

talks in Washington last week on reducing the two countries' trade imbalance.

"The ball is in Japan's court," said the chief government spokesman, Masayoshi Takemura.

He said the government needs to plan the package carefully because it

will "lead to a change in style and structure of the entire Japanese economy."

On Thursday, the United States announced the trade deficit with Japan shot up nearly 24 percent last year to a record \$59.3 billion, surpassing the \$56.3 billion set in 1987.

Riss was taken to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, which listed him in stable condition late Thursday.

Phillips, Hostetter leave jail for terms in state facilities

TWIN FALLS — Jodie Hostetter and Tom Phillips have finally gone to the prison.

Until Thursday, the two felons were housed in the Twin Falls County Jail because the Idaho Department of Correction had no room for them.

Jail Administrator Bill Thornquest said Thursday that the department had taken eight prisoners off his hands to Boise at about 10 a.m.

Hostetter was sentenced to three to nine years in a state correction facility after her 2-year-old daughter, Amanda, died in January 1992.

Hostetter pleaded guilty to a child abuse charge in May 1992. Amanda died from a blow to the stomach; Hostetter's former boyfriend, Donnell "Bud" Stradley, was found innocent of first-degree murder in the death.

Phillips was ordered in late September to spend 15 years in prison for molesting a 12-year-old friend of his late daughter.

Schools, government offices close Monday for holiday

TWIN FALLS — Schools, post offices, city halls, county governments, federal offices, the College of Southern Idaho and most banks will be closed Monday for Presidents' Day.

But not everything will be shut down. State liquor stores and most Magic Valley landfills — such as the Minidoka County, Buhl and Twin Falls landfills — will be open.

Stivers to head Winder's run for Idaho governor's office

TWIN FALLS — Former Speaker of the House T.W. "Tom" Stivers of Twin Falls has been named the state chairman of Republican Chuck Winder's gubernatorial campaign.

"Chuck Winder provides a fresh outlook on what needs to be done in the state of Idaho, and more importantly, how to do it," Stivers said in a news release.

Winder also announced that Roger Martell, a senior tax partner with the accounting firm of Deloitte and Touche, would be his state finance coordinator.

Winder is one of four candidates for the Republican gubernatorial nomination. He will face Phil Batt, Larry Eastland and Doug Dorn in a May 24 primary election.

Air Force brass view 'sacred ground'

DUCK VALLEY — Top Air Force and Air National Guard officials from Idaho visited an Indian burial ground inside a proposed bomb training range in southwestern Owyhee County Thursday — and Indian guides who led them there said the officers were moved by what they saw.

"It's more than just a pile of rocks to them now," said Terry Gibson, natural resources director for the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes of Duck Valley.

"The Air Force has always told us we don't have any sacred ground," Gibson said, adding that the military men "were

definitely paying attention today."

The Indians are fiercely opposed to the bombing range proposal. Sonic booms would make life miserable at the Duck Valley Reservation and dummy training bombs would desecrate the graves of 14 braves who died in battle, they maintain.

Thursday's visit included Brig. Gen. Ralph Townsend of the Idaho National Guard and Brig. Gen. David McCloud, commander of the Mountain Home Air Force base. The group picked up tribal officials in a helicopter at Riddle and flew 29 miles northwest to the burial site.

The military officers and their Indian hosts surveyed the 1866 battleground, then built a fire, sang four songs and smoked a

140-year-old pipe to pay homage to the fallen warriors.

"We don't let just anybody participate in these ceremonies," Gibson said, adding: "Afterwards, the general said he hoped our ancestors would have that place to pray in for a thousand years."

"They were touched and moved by what they saw," added Doug McConaughy, tribal advocate.

Several jet fighters passed overhead during the visit and McCloud exclaimed that the noise would be annoying during solemn ceremonies, McConaughy said.

Military jets usually fly much lower over the area than they did Thursday, McConaughy added.

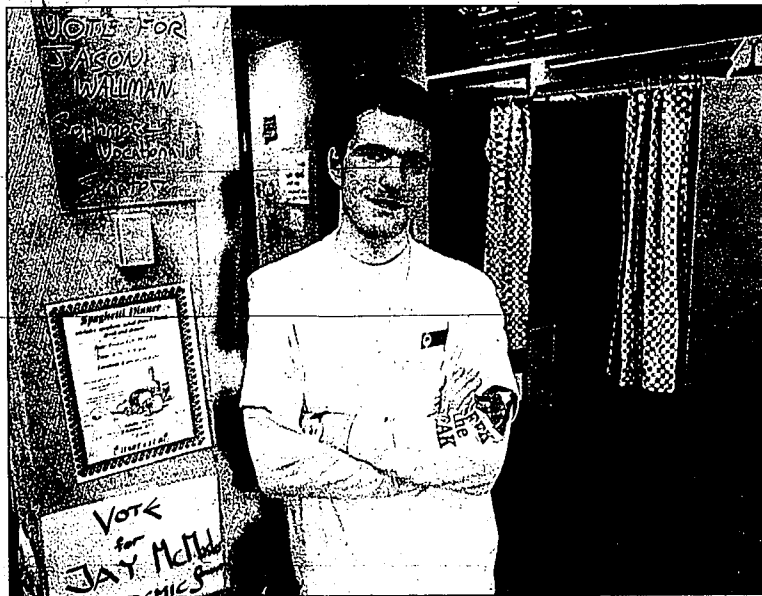
Reached at his home Thursday night, Townsend declined to comment.

However, the Idaho Air National Guard has said in the past that its jets do not need any additional bomb training facilities.

The Saylor Creek Bombing Range southeast of Mountain Home — and other nearby ranges — are sufficient, the Air Guard said in an environmental review document.

The Air Force, too, has said it doesn't need the proposed 25,350-acre bomb training range.

Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus, who says the range would help protect Mountain Home's economy, is pushing for the state to obtain the land in trades, then lease it to the Air Force.

3 CSI student officers, 2 senators give up positions for not making the grade

TWIN FALLS — College of Southern Idaho students are at the polls this week in a special election to replace their student representatives — a third of whom had to resign due to low grades last week.

Three of the four student government officers and two of the 11 senators had to resign because they no longer qualified under grade standards in the constitution of the Associated Students of the College of Southern Idaho.

One officer — Treasurer Rene Malle — was appointed president by the Senate, and other senators were appointed to other officer seats; students are voting to fill the Senate seats.

Student officers and senators must maintain a grade point average of at least 2.5. A 2.5 grade point average would require a student to maintain grades of B's and C's.

"If you set your time you can meet the

requirements. A 2.5 isn't too high," Malle said.

Most colleges require a 2.0 grade point average, but seven years ago the students wrote the higher 2.5 average into their constitution, said Graydon Stanley, director of student activities at CSI.

The shake-up may complicate some student activities.

"They're just at the point where they've got some experience under their belts and to lose a third of them is a problem," Stanley said. "But it's their decision."

The resignations also came in the middle of many student activities run by the Associated Students.

Elections of new senators will conclude Friday.

"I know the senators I have in here can help the new senators," Malle said. His philosophy as the new president will be to throw the senators into the fire and give the responsibilities to help accomplish a myriad of activities.

The Associated Students are arranging a Soldier Mountain ski day, homecoming, Wellness Week and Environmental Week.

On top of that, Malle said the student government is working to set up computer networks with students at other colleges and encourage cultural diversity by promoting CSI in the local Hispanic community.

The new student government is becoming more culturally diverse. Malle is an Italian who last lived in Switzerland. And the new vice president is Selma Penseel from Holland.

Malle isn't in danger of having to resign. He takes 23 class hours, has a part-time job, is active in the Marketing Club, joins friend Buddy Compher Jr. as disc jockey for school dances, and spends all his free time with the Associated Students. But the 20-year-old Malle has a 3.4 grade point average.

But in May, Malle graduates, and a new group of Associated Students must be elected.

Salmon plan 'destined to fail,' Craig tells fisheries officials

WASHINGTON — A federal plan to send more Idaho water downstream to boost salmon recovery is expensive, ignores "good science" and is likely to fail, Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, has charged in a letter to the National Marine Fisheries Service.

The plan for increased water flows during peak salmon migration periods is also "a cynical exercise" that could shatter existing consensus on salmon recovery, Craig wrote. The letter was addressed to Roland Schmitt, Fisheries Service assistant administrator for fisheries.

"Recovery options relying in large part on Idaho water will fail," Craig wrote. "Water is a precious commodity in Idaho."

Craig was responding to last week's Fisheries Service's proposal to boost annual Snake and Columbia river flows to 11.5 million acres feet of water by 1998; current annual flows are around 10.4 million acres

feet. An acre foot of water is enough to cover one acre of land with one foot of water, or 325,851 gallons.

Of the additional water, roughly 500,000 acre feet is expected to come from Idaho, Craig said when the plan was unveiled.

"Frankly, the biological opinion is flawed," Craig wrote, because "the water NMFS is demanding from Idaho simply is not there." Mountain snowpacks are far below average this winter and — even without water year, he wrote.

In a deeper vein, Craig attacked the national fisheries proposal because he maintained it runs counter to findings made by Fisheries Service scientists.

The Fisheries Service salmon recovery scientists found no support for "conventional wisdom" that more young salmon survive when water flows increase. Craig wrote. Some people maintain that higher flows sweep smolts out to sea before their gills become accustomed to fresh water — and keeps them out of the jaws of predators.

Jerome council supports E911 even if Twin Falls pulls out

JEROME — The City Council voiced its support for a regional enhanced 911 emergency response system this week but blasted Twin Falls for pulling out of the regional compact.

"Everyone knows, almost without exception, Twin Falls has entered into a number of projects in the last 25 years and has yet to fulfill any of them," Mayor Gerald Oiler said.

Twin Falls, Jerome, Lincoln and Gooding counties have been trying to set up a four-county E911 system based in Jerome, but a judge in Idaho Falls ruled that existing state law didn't permit multi-county E911 systems.

A bill that would clarify the law has passed a key state Senate committee. "We have a great deal to lose if this isn't done," Fire Chief Jim Auclair said. Councilman Elza Hall told E911 project manager Al Sandner people hadn't been told what the system would do.

"Will it take care of dog calls, burglar alarms, street calls?" Hall said. "All we know is what we read in the newspaper, and one newspaper says one thing and another says something else. I think you've left us out, just because (Twin Falls) is bigger. They pay more, but we pay all we can."

Sandner invited the council members to attend meetings of the South Central Region E911 board.

"All our meetings are open to the public," Sandner said. The next meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. Feb. 23 in the basement meeting room of the Land Title and Escrow building, 237 N. Lincoln.

Councilwoman Charlotte Jacobson asked if the other counties could support the system without the city of Twin Falls.

"We haven't totally figured that out yet. My gut feeling is yes," Sandner said.

"If (Twin Falls) county stays with us, it will be a heavy burden on the city to come back in," Sandner said.

Tominaga joins GOP race for auditor

BOISE — Lynn Tominaga, a former state legislator from Rupert, announced Thursday that he is joining the increasingly crowded Republican primary for state auditor.

Tominaga, 39, said he wants to undertake a complete inventory and valuation of state lands and properties, review the cost-effectiveness of the state's new computerized accounting system, and audit user fees and impact fees charged by cities and counties.

"When I was growing up, my folks taught me that if you find something wrong with what's going on, you do something about it," Tominaga said. "You don't just wait to see if the problem will correct itself."

He is the third Republican to announce his candidacy for state auditor. The others are Ralph Gines, a lawyer and certified public accountant from Boise, and Caldwell accountant Ronald Pollock, who ran unsuccessfully for the GOP nomination in 1990.

Williams is serving his first full term as auditor. In 1992 he lost a bid for the 2nd Congressional District seat to Mike Crapo.

The auditor is Idaho's chief fiscal officer. His duties include paying state employees, maintaining the fi-

nanial reporting and accounting systems, and coordinating the issuance of administrative rules and regulations.

Tominaga, a Minidoka County farmer, was elected to the state Senate in 1984 and served until July 1991, when he resigned to become an analyst and lobbyist for the Idaho Water Users Association.

He will continue working for the water users at least through the May primary.

Tominaga said he's raised nearly half his \$20,000 goal for the primary campaign.

He said he didn't think his lack of an accounting degree will hurt his campaign, saying that the knowledge of state government he gained while serving on the Legislature's budget committee would be more valuable.

"The auditor's office is really a managerial position," he said. "But I've run a small business at my farm, and I know how to do audits and read balance sheets."

Tominaga questioned the growth of the auditor's budget since Democrat J.D. Williams was elected to the office in 1990. The budget for the current fiscal year is \$9.5 million, compared with \$8.25 million in fiscal 1991.

"He (Williams) keeps shifting responsibilities onto the Legislature or to other agencies, so his budget should be going down, but it keeps going up and up," Tominaga said.

In Gov. Cecil Andrus' proposed spending plan for fiscal 1993, however, the auditor's budget would be trimmed slightly to \$9.32 million.

Tominaga also said he'd like the auditor's office to be a "watchdog" over cities, counties and other local government entities that impose special user fees or impact fees.

Many of the smaller communities can't afford full-time financial officers, he said.

County offers homeowners tax reduction

JEROME — Jerome homeowners eligible for a reduction in property taxes are not taking advantage of the savings.

The Circuit Breaker program reduces property taxes for qualified applicants, but many in Jerome County have not applied according to deputy county assessor Bonnie Tolman.

"We know the population of Jerome County has increased considerably, so there must be a lot of people out there who haven't applied for Circuit Breaker. Maybe they don't know about it," she said.

In 1993 581 out-of-state vehicles were registered in Jerome County. That translates into more than 500 new households, she said.

Qualified applicants can get a tax reduction of as much as \$800 on a home and up to one acre of land.

Jerome charts growth in survey

JEROME — In a recent survey Jerome takes a look at itself — a community struggling with the pains of growth.

"The community holds the answers to our weaknesses and our strengths," Forrest Hymas, Economic Community Coordinator, said.

In his new job as coordinator, Hymas surveyed more than 100 residents and summarized their opinions on economics, culture, politics, institutions, and social issues.

Jerome has a stable economic base, a low cost of living, expanding manufacturing opportunities; it is a bedroom community to Twin Falls, has ample access to Interstate 84, has a record of success and is a good place to live, the survey found.

The community shows concern for its youth, has a neighborly attitude and allows individuals to express ideas. It also supports traditional family values and religious activities.

Survey respondents praised the city's more than 100 community groups, schools, churches, service clubs and recreation district.

But on the other side of the ledger, job opportunities are

thought to be limited, and available jobs offer low wages and few benefits. The community loses a significant portion of retail sales to Twin Falls and some to Boise. People are concerned about young people staying in the community.

Growth has divided the community. People who resist change conflict with others who favor growth and change. Other problems identified in the survey included: racism, local media, school violence and a lack of long-term charitable assistance.

Politically Jerome has new and dedicated leadership, is quick to respond to community problems and shows improved cooperation and interaction between government units and other communities, according to those surveyed.

Though new leaders are emerging in the community, it is hard to find people willing to run for public office.

"A lot of people move to Jerome because they like the small community atmosphere. But when a small town starts growing and those people moving in bring the problems with them, Jerome starts to lose that home-town attitude. People leave, at least a cause because of problems, but they bring the problems with them," Hymas said.

Budget writers OK training 2 more doctors every year

BOISE (AP) —

Legislative budget writers on Thursday voted to finance the training of two more physicians

under cooperative programs with the universities of Washington and Utah.

The action may be the only definitive one to improve health care in Idaho this legislative session.

"We've been talking about what we should do with our health programs," Democratic Sen. Marguerite McLaughlin of Orofino said. "It's time to get something into the pipeline immediately."

The Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee also increased state support for the Family Practice Residency Programs in both Pocatello and Boise beyond the level recommended by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

And the panel more than doubled, to \$1.1 million, the money available to additional college students through the work-study program. The legislators were taking advantage of the state revenue-producing capability of the state economy to reverse a

three-year trend of declining support for that program.

An overwhelming majority on the committee backed the increase from 15 to 16 in the number of students the state subsidizes annually at the University of Washington and from five to six at the University of Utah. That decision must still be ratified by the full House and Senate.

"The initial cost of the additional seats will do little to change the doctor-educating program's annual \$3 million price tag. But over the four-year course of study, the bill will rise \$170,000, based on current rates."

It is on top of the \$7,500 a year the Washington students pay and nearly \$10,000 the Utah students pay. And the price for both students and the state rises each year.

Still, McLaughlin pointed out that expanding the number of students subsidized each year to 22 only moves the state back toward the training level prior to budget problems that forced cutbacks in 1986.

Duck Valley residents will use Air Force base for health care

MOUNTAIN HOME — Leaders of the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes say they've reached an agreement with Mountain Home Air Force Base for expanded health care — but the accord does nothing to lessen their fierce opposition to a proposed bomb training range in southwestern Owyhee County.

Meetings officials from both sides met at the base Tuesday to settle plans for expanded treatment of tribal members at the base hospital. Training for medical professionals at the small Duck Valley Reservation hospital was also discussed.

Tribal spokesman Doug McConaughy said the health-care agreement is an entirely separate issue from the bombing range proposal — and never the "twin shall meet."

"We are not in a position to compromise on that," McConaughy said. "The only way we'll compromise is if they'll build that bombing range in someone else's backyard — maybe their own."

The health-care agreement bene-

fits everyone, McConaughy said, noting that President Clinton and the U.S. Congress are both pushing for more efficient use of medical facilities.

Duck Valley residents typically go to Boise for medical attention, he added, but it would be cheaper for everyone — including taxpayers — for them to be treated at Mountain Home.

Another benefit of adding the Duck Valley population to Mountain Home's medical facilities is that the combined total will justify the presence of a second orthopedic specialist at the base, McConaughy said.

The understanding over health care is heartening, but the issue of the bomb training range still looms behind all of the tribes' dealings with the Air Force, McConaughy said.

"When this bombing range is put to rest, we'll have a good relationship established between our communities, and we'll be working again," he added.

"There is nothing they can give us that will make us change our po-

sition on the bombing range," McConaughy said. "We support the Air Force and its mission at Mountain Home, but we're not training in that location because it's going to affect our state of mind, our peace and our cultural resources."

Tuesday's talks were not an attempt to lessen the Indians' opposition to the range, said Air Force spokesman L. Don Borchelt.

"It's the right thing to do. We like to be good neighbors," he said.

The range is designed to support the new fighter-bomber-tanker "composite" wing at the air base, which is about 90 miles from the reservation straddling the Idaho-Nevada border.

Up to 80 aircraft would maneuver over 3 million acres of Idaho land while dropping practice bombs in parts of the 25,350 acres of the range.

But the Indians charge it will harm sacred grounds in the range's midst. They also fear increased noise from streaking jets will cause more disruption than current training does now in the 1,600-resident reservation.

Burley students stage large protest over accusations of possible drug use

BURLEY — About 250 students gathered in the hallways of Burley High School Thursday morning to protest officials' rumors about suspected drug and alcohol users in the school.

Students walked out of classes and held a sit-in after an unprecedented move by the school this week.

In order to crack down on drug and alcohol problems, school officials had sought out the parents of selected students.

One girl spoke in tears, another girl read a prepared statement and many yelled in protest of the school's methods.

Many of the 80 parents contacted received a recorded message, which said: "It is rumored that your children may be involved in drugs or alcohol or closely associated with kids who use drugs or alcohol," according to Principal Bob Plotts.

Plotts said he and other school officials went over attendance lists recently and checked off the names of students suspected of using drugs or alcohol or of associating with students who do.

The message invited parents to a Wednesday meeting to discuss drug

and alcohol problems in the school, he said.

The invitations, however, sparked an outcry from students. They said it violated their rights and created family problems. One parent telephoned the American Civil Liberties Union.

The school's spreading of rumors, particularly through a recorded message, is "insensitive at best and shows reckless disregard," said Jack VanValkenburgh, executive director of the ACLU of Idaho.

The school's actions could be grounds for a declaratory judgment or even a lawsuit, depending on a family's claim of how severely they were affected by the rumors, he said.

In this day and age, with the decline of family values, it's terribly ironic to think that school authorities ... are an intrusion and give little apparent thought toward the consequences or alternatives," VanValkenburgh said.

"It's a terrible intrusion upon families, with potential damaging consequences to the relationships between parents and children," he said.

Jen Hawkins, 17, who helped organize the protest, said she has heard of one student who was beaten by his father because of the rumors and several others who were kicked out of their homes.

"A parent hears the word 'drugs' and assumes the worst," Hawkins said. "They should have thought of the consequences of their actions."

Hawkins said the recorded message didn't give parents the chance to inquire further. She said the rumors destroyed students' reputations and showed the school's lack of respect.

But Plotts was staunch in his desire to continue meeting with select parents. It's the only way he knows to get to the heart of the problem, he said. General meetings don't attract the right parents, he said.

"Darn right I'd do it again if we got an end result," Plotts said.

"If we say, 'that's the way things are,' that alternative kind of scares me."

At Wednesday night's meeting, about 35 parents showed up, calling for tougher rules and venting their frustration and anger over the difficulty of stopping students from using drugs or alcohol.

Jen Holland, whose son is recovering from a drinking problem, told Plotts at the Wednesday meeting that the typical five-day suspension for students is like "a vacation."

Her son, who had been suspended, didn't straighten out until he was arrested for drunken driving, she said. Holland said she preferred the school to contact her about rumors so

19, on Thursday to stand trial starting May 3 with her mother, Muriel K. Banes, for last fall's murder of 84-year-old Velma M. Hartley.

Prosecutors allege Banes, 45, paid David O. Noyes \$500 to kill Hartley last Sept. 23, and that Bennett and William C. Schuller II, 20, went to

Hartley's home to make sure she was sleeping that night. Two fishermen found her body 27 miles east of Mountain Home and 10 miles north of Glenns Ferry on Oct. 9.

Banes faces a charge of conspiracy to commit murder or aiding and abetting murder.

Skating world's mighty fall

Rash of mishaps opens way for relative unknowns to skate into contention

HAMAR, Norway (AP) — Down they went, one by one: Brian Boitano, 1988 Olympic gold medalist, eighth; Viktor Petrenko, 1992 Olympic gold medalist, ninth; Kurt Browning, four-time world champion, 12th.

The first chapter of men's figure skating, like Alpine skiing, was full of surprises during Thursday night's technical program.

Kids with names like Alexei, Elvis and Philippe got the jump on Boitano, Petrenko and Browning — champions all — and fired the first shots of what could be a revolution.

In a messy affair of slipping and sliding, Boitano, Petrenko and Browning flopped, giving the kids an opening to skate their way. The champs are all but shut out.

Russia's Alexei Umanov, 20, grabbed first place going into Saturday night's free skate, which will count for two-thirds of the total score.

Right behind Umanov was 21-year-old Elvis Stojko of Canada, Philippe Candolo of France and U.S. champion Scott Davis, both 22.

Even a 21-year-old rank outsider from England named Steven Cousins outperformed the veterans with a perky program that was good enough for seventh place.

Umanov has struggled since winning a bronze medal at last year's world championships. But not on this night. "I expected to skate well," Umanov said before being hustled away by Russian officials.

No one expected Boitano's chances to vanish so quickly — 50 seconds into the night when he botched a triple axel.

"I don't know what happened, I haven't missed it all week," said the 30-year-old skater, who acknowledged he might have been nervous. "Maybe I wasn't in the moment."

"I go to show if the top names make mistakes, (judges) will not hold them in there," Boitano said.

Petrenko was even worse. Using the

same technical program that helped him in Albertville, the Ukrainian gassed up his combination jump, then two-footed a very weak triple lutz. He lacked the flash that usually marks his performances.

Boitano and Petrenko received marks below 5.0 for technical merit from the British judge. Neither could remember the last time they got a mark in the 4s.

Browning had even more trouble. He fell on a triple flip and popped a double axel — a jump he should do effortlessly, but one that has plagued him through the years. At 27, this will be the last Olympics for the decade's most dominant amateur skater. He's almost certain to leave without a medal.

"I've never felt like this before, ever," he said. "It was easy to step into the top three, just a nice skate would have done it."

Umanov, dressed like a minstrel but skating like a magician to "Rigoletto," was magnificent.

He immediately nailed a monstrous

triple axel-double toe loop combination, smiled broadly and sailed through the rest of his 2-minute, 40-second program. His triple lutz and double axel were perfect, then he closed with a series of wonderful spins.

Five of the judges had him first. Three voted for Stojko, and one for Candolo. Stojko used offbeat choreography and a strong finish to take second place. He let out a big sigh when he finished, then yielded the ice to Davis.

Skating to "Zorba The Greek," Davis hit all his required jumps and spins, but the jumps were shaky. His spins, as always, were quick, but his footwork wasn't and he seemed to run out of gas.

It wasn't nearly as inspiring a show as Davis put on when he upset Boitano at the U.S. championships. But it was good enough to give him a solid shot at a medal.

"I heard how Brian and Viktor skated, but I tried to put it out of my mind," Davis said. "It wasn't my best performance, but it was good."

Cross-country team finds rough tracks

LILLEHAMMER, Norway (AP) — Leslie Thompson lost a contact, Keri Petty did not finish and Luke Bodenstener had trouble "finding the groove." It was not an easy day for American skiers on the Birkebeiner cross-country trails.

Two Olympic races were held Thursday: first a 10-kilometer classic for men, then a 10K freestyle pursuit race for women. The women's results were added to those of Monday's 5K race to determine the combined cross-country title.

"I was hoping to move up a little more, but it was a very tough course," said Thompson, who rose from 40th to 32nd despite losing her left contact about halfway through the course. "There's a really big hill about 1K. After the first lap I was just hanging on."

Russia's Lyubov Egorova picked up her second gold medal in these Games with a combined time of 41:38.9, while Bjorn Dahlie of Norway won the 10K classic-style race, blazing in with a time of 24 minutes, 20.1 seconds.

Thompson's time on Thursday was 15 seconds faster than Nina Kemppel of Anchorage, Alaska, but Kemppel held on to 31st overall because of a stronger race on Monday. Kemppel had a combined time of 46:22.6, while Thompson skied to a 46:30.6.

"It was a very rough race, I wasn't skiing smoothly at all," said Kemppel, who started 28th. "I was just hurting. I felt awful."

Ingrid Butts, whose mother was born in Steinkjer, Norway and whose grandmother skied into her 90s, made a modest improvement from 53rd to 50th with an overall time of 48:40.2.

"I was dying out there, I really had a bad race, but there was such energy from the crowd," said Butts. "It's a real hometown, family Olympics."

Petty, of Townsend, VT., was once

of three skiers who did not finish the course. Kemppel, a close friend of Petty's, said she probably dropped out due to recurring back problems. There was no comment from Petty or her coach.

John Aalberg of Salt Lake City, a 34-year-old Norwegian native skied in his second Olympics for the United States, came in 45th, 2:42.2 behind the gold medal winner. Aalberg had surged into 34th place at 5K, but faded on the second half of the course.

Another U.S. skier with ties to Norway came in 52nd. Ben Husaby of Eden Prairie, Minn., whose grandfather was a Norwegian immigrant, was 2:51.2 back. The 29-year-old skier began with a blistering pace that put him 28th after 1.7K, but dropped to 55th at the halfway mark.

Bodenstener, 24, of West Bend, Wis., followed the same pattern, surging to 28th at the 1.7K mark, then fading to 59th halfway. He finished 58th, 3:02.2 behind Dahlie.

"It took me quite a while to find the groove today," Bodenstener said. "I just could not find the extra gear I needed on the hills."

Whatever the results, Lillehammer's crisp snow, sunny skies and warm, encouraging crowds did not go unnoticed. Thompson reveled in the winter sun, and Butts said small groups of Norwegians chanted "Ingrid, Ingrid" all along the course.

"When I am 90 years old and look back I will never forget this experience," said Butts. "I could have come in last and still loved it and still had the most memorable time of my life."

Late goal keeps U.S. medal hopes alive

LILLEHAMMER, Norway (AP) — The United States pulled out a 3-3 tie against Canada on Todd Marchant's goal with 28 seconds left tonight, avoiding a serious blow to its hopes of making the Olympic hockey quarterfinals.

It was the third tie in three games for the Americans, who had to rally from two goals back in the other two.

"When you come back on a team and you tie them you feel as if you've won," Marchant said. "When a team comes back on you and ties you, you feel like you lost."

Canada (2-0-1) still clinched a playoff berth. Sweden (2-0-1) also clinched with a 7-1 win over France, while Slovakia crushed Italy 10-4 and stayed in good position to advance. Russia and Finland looked up two of the eight spots Wednesday.

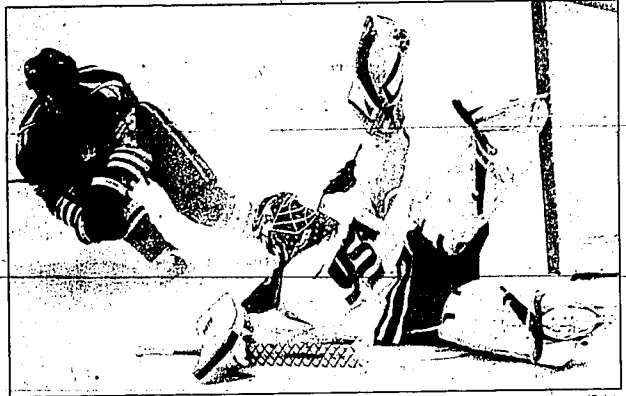
Trailing 3-2, the Americans pulled goalie Garth Snow for an extra skater with 47 seconds to go. Then Canadian Fabian Joseph was penalized for hooking with 42 seconds remaining.

David Roberts passed the puck from just in front of the blue line to Marchant at the right faceoff dot. His wrist shot beat goalie Corey Hirsch. "I didn't see it go in right away and all of a sudden I saw Corey Hirsch turn around," Marchant said. "Then everybody came over and trampled me."

Dwayne Norris' second goal of the game at 1:16 of the third period snapped a 2-2 tie.

"It's not a feeling of a loss. It's a feeling of disappointment," Norris said of the tie. "At the same time, it keeps us without a loss and keeps them without a win."

Just 10 seconds into the third period, American Ted Crowley was hit in the face with a Canadian stick.

He dropped to the ice. When he rose, a large circle of blood remained in the left faceoff circle.

No penalty was called and an official wiped away the blood with a towel.

Canada was awarded two penalty shots in the game. Petr Nedved scored on the first at 12:09 of the second period, tying the score 2-2. But Snow stopped Greg Johnson on the other one at 12:11 of the third.

Norris gave Canada a 1-0 lead at 4:46 of the first period. The Americans were plagued by four penalties in the period. While Canada didn't score on any of them, they hurt the U.S. offense.

Canada was hurt by penalties in

the second period with three in the first 8:25 while the Americans got none.

Brian Rolston got his first goal with both teams at full strength, but his second at 9:43 of the second period came with the Americans enjoying a 5-on-3 advantage. He took a pass from Mark Beaupre and shot a 5-foot shot by Hirsch.

In Sweden's victory, Roger Hansson, Hakan Lobb and Peter Forsberg scored in the first period, and the Swedes led 5-0 before France (0-2-1) scored in the second. The Swedes held a 47-10 shooting advantage.

Slovakia (1-0-2) got six goals in the first 13:17 and outshot Italy 40-18. The Italians (0-3) have been

outscored 21-7 in the tournament. Miroslav Satan had three goals and Peter Stastny, Zigmund Palffy and Roman Kotsesk two each for Slovakia.

"It was a very important game in order for us to go further in the tournament," Slovakia coach Julius Supler said. "Although this was against a relatively weak opponent, we had a good start."

Seventh-seeded Finland seemed to be the giant killer, when it knocked out the third-seeded Czech Republic 3-1 and top-seeded Russia 5-0. Now the Finns appear to be the Giants.

They clinched a quarterfinal berth with their second straight shutout, 4-0 over winless Norway.

Harding, Kerrigan ignore each other during skating practice

HAMAR, Norway — Among the hundreds of people who showed up for the Most Famous Figure Skating Practice in Olympic history was Chicago White Sox owner Eddie Einhorn.

"There are only two places in the world to be today, here and Sansato for Michael Jordan's tryout," said Einhorn, a television consultant for the U.S. Figure Skating Association.

Nancy Kerrigan and Tonya Harding practiced together Thursday for the first time since Jan. 6, when Kerrigan was clubbed in the knee at the U.S. championships in Detroit.

Journalists arrived as early as 7 a.m. to stake out a spot for the first 1:25 p.m. training session. Carpenters were on hand at dawn, hammering reinforcement clamps onto the wooden riser that later housed more than 400 reporters and photographers. Five paramedics were called in, on the chance journalists would trample one another.

Security at the Olympic Amphitheatre was quadrupled from 35 officers to 150. Skaters' parents were asked to turn in their passports at the arena door. "The last time I saw security this tight was at the Czech border a few years ago," said John Swallow, father of ice dancer Jerod Swallow.

The skaters arrived in different cars and dressed in separate locker rooms. Kerrigan walked into the arena at 1:25, wearing the same white lace dress she wore the day of the attack. She was on the ice eight minutes before Harding showed up in a brightly flowered dress, escorted by team physical therapist Haik Gharibian.

Kerrigan didn't acknowledge Harding's entrance, and the two skaters did their best to stay out of each other's way.

By the end of the day, they had skated together for 65 minutes. They never spoke and got within three feet

of each other only a half-dozen times. The closest they got was toward the end of the first practice, when Kerrigan was talking to her coaches at rink side. Harding skated directly behind Kerrigan and glanced at her.

Four tidbits of news came out of the Most Famous Figure Skating Practice in Olympic History:

• Harding aggravated an already sore right ankle when she fell into the boards attempting a triple axel.

Duo draws media mob

HAMAR, Norway (AP) — Karen Courtland gazed at the 500 reporters and photographers crammed into a practice hall awaiting her two most famous teammates and her own. "I'm going to start selling hot chocolate and coffee," said Courtland, of Whippany, N.J., as the pack bided time for the media event of the Winter Games: The first joint practice session for Nancy Kerrigan and Tonya Harding.

Hundreds of cameras clicked. Reporters elbowed each other as they strained to get a better look at the rink.

Other skaters were stunned by the attention. "Our Korean nationals had less people — my dad and two others," said Lily Lee, an American skater who competes for South Korea.

Some of the media mob waited more than 5 1/2 hours for the practice to start. Some read books, others talked on cellular phones, and all of them ignored any skater but the sought-after two.

All remained calm, and security officials brought in to control the pack had little to do.

"Compared to what I expected, I thought it went well," said Tom Hatlestad, the official in charge of photographers at the figure skating venue. "I thought it was going to be worse and they wouldn't listen."

One video photographer had his press credentials seized for shooting tape of the practice in violation of the broadcast rules.

You cannot possibly imagine the excitement caused by skaters practicing at the same time

LILLEHAMMER, Norway — I'm riding with a bunch of other professional American journalists in a press bus. The driver has the radio tuned up really loud; he's listening to the play-by-play of an Olympic event, probably cross country skiing. The announcers are very excited. They've been shouting in Norwegian non-stop for at least 30 minutes now. We American journalists are speculating on what they might be saying. Probably something like: "He's passing a tree! My God, now he's passing ANOTHER tree!"

Whatever Olympic event they're shouting about, we're missing it. We're on a MUCH bigger story: Tonya Harding and Nancy Kerrigan are going to practice figure skating AT THE SAME TIME.

You cannot possibly imagine the excitement that this has caused over here. The press corps is in a raving, frothing frenzy over this. And it's not just the Americans: EVERYBODY is excited about this story. Journalists from all over the world are following it. Somewhere in the most remote part of the Amazonian jungle, there is a primitive tribe that is at this very moment working frantically to develop a written language so that it can start a newspaper and send a professional journalist over here to cover the Harding-Kerrigan story.

You should have seen the media reaction Wednesday night when Tonya Harding's breasts arrived at the main Olympic press center. OK, technically they were not her actual breasts; but they were actual photographs of her breasts in a British newspaper. They were immediately reproduced numerous times on Xerox brand copiers (The Official Brand Duplicators of the Olympic Games) and passed

around the media center, where they became the subject of intense scrutiny and professional news analysis. I just wish you young sporting journalists out there could have witnessed, firsthand, this example of how the "press" handle a big story.

Now the press bus is arriving at the figure-skating amphitheater. Outside, on the street, TV camera crews are stacked out, watched by Norwegian police and army personnel. We go inside to the area where, in a little over an hour, Tonya and Nancy are going to practice.

There is a three-word term that journalists use to describe a situation wherein way too many journalists are all jammed together into an area that is way too small. The first two words in this term are "Mongolian Cluster," and the last one is a very bad word that rhymes with "duck." I'll call it an MCF.

This is the worst MCF I have ever been in. Imagine that you are standing on a bathroom along with the entire population of New Jersey, and you get the idea. The scary thing is, many of us journalists are wearing winter garments with exposed Velcro fasteners; under this intense pressure, we are in serious danger of becoming permanently bonded together into one giant, permanent MCF, unable to pull our selves apart, forced to spend the rest of our lives traveling around the world together, filing enormous expense reports.

But despite the physical risk, we courageously remain on the job, and finally — THERE SHE IS! NANCY KERRIGAN! AND THERE'S TONYA! THEY ARE PRACTICING SKATING! WHAT AN UNBELIEVABLE AND SHOCKING NEWS DEVELOPMENT!

Nancy is wearing a white outfit, so we'll remember that she's the good one. Tonya is wearing a wedding dress.

No, I'm kidding. Tonya is wearing what looks like a bathing suit. Her appearance sends the MCF into a frenzy; the photographers, using motorized cameras, frantically take 14.7 million photographs apiece, to go along with the 14.7 million they each took yesterday, and the 14.7 million they will each take tomorrow. The broadcast people mutter into their microphones; the guy next to me is broadcasting this event live, via cellular phone, to Germany. The print reporters are furiously taking notes. I am taking notes also. I cannot help myself. "THEY ARE SKATING AROUND," my notes say.

Of course that is not all that they did. They also jumped. Plus, in the second practice, Tonya — in a news development that, over here, has eclipsed the Kennedy assassination — appeared to twist her ankle.

All in all, it was a MAJOR day for Olympic news, and I cannot help but pity all those Norwegians who, not being professionals, went to actual Olympic competitions, instead of coming to the skating practice area. I mean, what is WRONG with these people?

With a deep staff led by Cy Young Award winners Greg Maddux and Tom Glavine, Atlanta Braves pitching coach Leo Mazzone is understandably excited.

But his enthusiasm is not limited to the established arms. Mazzone wants to get a good look at Terrill Wade, a 21-year-old left-hander who was invited to spring training as a non-roster player.

Because the Braves have left-handers Glavine and Steve Avery in the rotation, Wade already is ticketed for Richmond of the International League. Nonetheless, he'll get plenty of attention from Mazzone. "He can throw hard and can change speeds," Mazzone said. "It will be interesting to see if he can do that under fire."

Yankos

Jim Abbot will always cherish his no-

hitter last season; it's most of last season he'd like to forget. He went 11-14 and never felt at ease during his first season in New York.

"There were times last year when I look things a little too seriously," the left-hander said after arriving at training camp in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. "Maybe I put a little too much pressure on myself."

The Yankees need him to regain his 1991 form, when he won 18 games with a 2.89 ERA for the California Angels.

Rangers

Texas has changed the trim on its uniform from blue to "aggressive" red. But with a 3-4-5 of Will Clark, home champ Juan Gonzalez and Jose Canseco, power — not color — figures to be the key.

"I think Clark will love hitting in this new park," manager Kevin Kennedy said of The Ballpark, which will host its first American League game April 11.

"I figure I lost 10 home runs a year hitting in Candlestick Park (in San Francisco) because of the winds and heavy air," Clark, who likes The Ballpark's

325-foot right-field line. "I've never hit in a place like this."

Cardinals

St. Louis goes to camp with four outfielders, three second basemen and the hope that Mike Perez is ready to succeed the departed Lee Smith in the bullpen.

Manager Joe Torre says Perez has overcome a reluctance to assume that role. "When we started the (winter promotional) caravan he said, 'Anytime you want me to pitch, I'm available.' Torre said: 'We ended the caravan by him saying, 'I'm the closer.'"

Rods

With leading home run hitter Chris Sabo lost to free agency and cleanup man Kevin Mitchell prone to injury, it would be understandable if Cincinnati manager Davey Johnson were worried. But pitching, not hitting, occupies his concerns.

"We couldn't stop the opposition ... he said of last season.

Now he's optimistic about his rotation — Jose Rijo, John Smiley, Tim Lincecum, Tim Lincecum and off-season acqui-

sition Eric Hanson. However, Smiley and Browning are coming off injury-plagued seasons.

Indians

While Cleveland again figures to be an offensive giant in the AL, the pitching staff remains a question mark. But at least the Indians made moves, acquiring six new arms. "We just felt it was time to do something because of the way our everyday players have played," general manager John Hart said.

Among the new pitchers are 36-year-olds Dennis Martinez and Jack Morris, who had a 6.29 ERA last season for Toronto.

Tigers

The right field job is rookie Danny Bautista's to win or lose.

The reason? Defense.

"Let's face it, our pitching hasn't been sensational," manager Sparky Anderson said as the Tigers held their first spring workout for pitchers and catchers. "But a lack of defense ... has contributed to that."

Here comes 'NFL free agency II'

NEW YORK (AP) — For NFL teams, with enough money, there are plenty of attractive players available. For big money there are pass rushers like William Fuller, Clyde Simmons and Sean Jones; linebackers like Ken Norton, Ken Harvey, Tony Bennett and Seth Joyner; defensive backs like Nate Odomes and Mark Collins; and quarterbacks like Scott Mitchell, Bernie Kosar and Chris Miller.

Plus, there's an endless procession of usable running backs. But can any afford them?

The NFL's second free-agent season opens Friday with a wrinkle that, on paper, should promote parity.

Not only is there a \$33.8 million salary cap that will keep the top teams scrambling to re-sign their own players, but a \$30 million signing minimum that will force teams like Tampa Bay, Cincinnati and New England to open their wallets.

The result? Some players seeking big bucks might find themselves with nowhere to go but the bottom of the league.

Others will compete with new players on the market — the Colts, for example, released linebacker Duane Bickett, wide receiver Reggie Langhorne and seven other older players to help pare their payroll. Bickett was named their "franchise player" a year ago and Langhorne led the AFC in receptions with 85 last year, but both are over 30 and Bickett was due to make nearly \$2 million next year.

"We will have to be a player in the market if we're to be a competitor on the field," says Mike Brown, general manager of the normally tight-fisted Bengals. "We expect to be involved."

On the other hand, the New York Giants, who had perhaps the NFL's best free-agent signings last year, are looking first to their own roster — 10 of their 22 starters are unrestricted free agents and four more are of the restricted variety.

"Sure there are guys out there who interest me," general manager George Young says. "But I want to sign my own players first. We're in a totally new atmosphere here. No other league has ever tried to work in a salary cap with so many free agents available."

"So many" is approximately \$90, or about a third of the NFL's players. Of those, 450 are unrestricted, meaning they can go anywhere they want.

But "anywhere" is not likely to be the place where a lot of them can earn a Super Bowl ring. Good teams take care of their own players first. Dallas, seeking its third straight NFL title, is a good example.

The Cowboys, who will have to pay approximately \$8 million of their \$34 million to Troy Aikman and Emmitt Smith, have eight unrestricted free agents they'd prefer not to lose. They include Norton, their best linebacker; center Mark Stepanoski; guards Kevin Gogan, Nate Newton and John Gieseck; fullback Daryl Johnston, and defensive linemen Tony Casillas and Jimmie Jones.

"If we can sign five, I'd say we'd be fine," says owner Jerry Jones. "If you lose three players you can always fill in for them."

Still, the Cowboys' dilemma is obvious.

They are committed to pay \$27 million to the 35 players they have under contract, leaving them just under \$7 million for the others. They can cut some under contract — a lot of veterans will be released and asked to sign at reduced prices to fit in.

But the player the Cowboys may find hardest to keep is Norton, shifted from outside linebacker to the middle this year. He led the team in tackles despite playing with a torn bicep for two-thirds of the season.

He reportedly will seek \$3 million a year, a figure the Cowboys would have trouble fitting into a cap after paying Aikman, Smith, Michael Irvin, Erik Williams and others.

That's the position the Giants are in with Collins, who made \$900,000 last year and is seeking \$2.5 million after bouncing back from two bad seasons with a good one. Young, who last year allowed Carl Banks, Leonard Marshall and Jeff Hostetler to leave, is unlikely to pay that to a 30-year-old comeback.

So who's in demand? Quarterbacks. Three of the six QBs voted to the Pro Bowl were 37 or older.

Mitchell, who filled in admirably in Miami for Dan Marino before separating a shoulder, is probably the most attractive.

Fans serenade White Sox hopeful Jordan

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — Michael Jordan simply couldn't tune out the somewhat off-key version of "Happy Birthday" coming from a sea of voices in the stands where balloons celebrating the occasion blew in the wind.

Jordan, the baseball rookie who turned 31 Thursday, bowed at the waist and thanked his cap in appreciation as he stood in the outfield watched by about 1,500 fans.

He took throws at first base with a taped right hand and several times while transferring the ball from glove to hand, he worked the ball between his legs before making the relay to the plate.

He wasn't showing off; he just looked like a basketball player. For the second straight day, Jordan's bat showed more pop than it did Tuesday when he first held a public workout at Ed Smith Stadium. But once again he was hitting against batting practice pitchers. "I've had a lot more support from the fans than from you guys," Jordan told reporters crowded around his locker.

"The natural tendency is to doubt," he said of criticism he has received.

"I've been taking my hits and I understand that. Some of them have come from former players. I know it's a hard game. I have to work at it."

Jordan, a millionaire many times over, is trying to be one of the guys. "I'm very conscious of that. I'm not trying to wear my image on my sleeve," Jordan said.

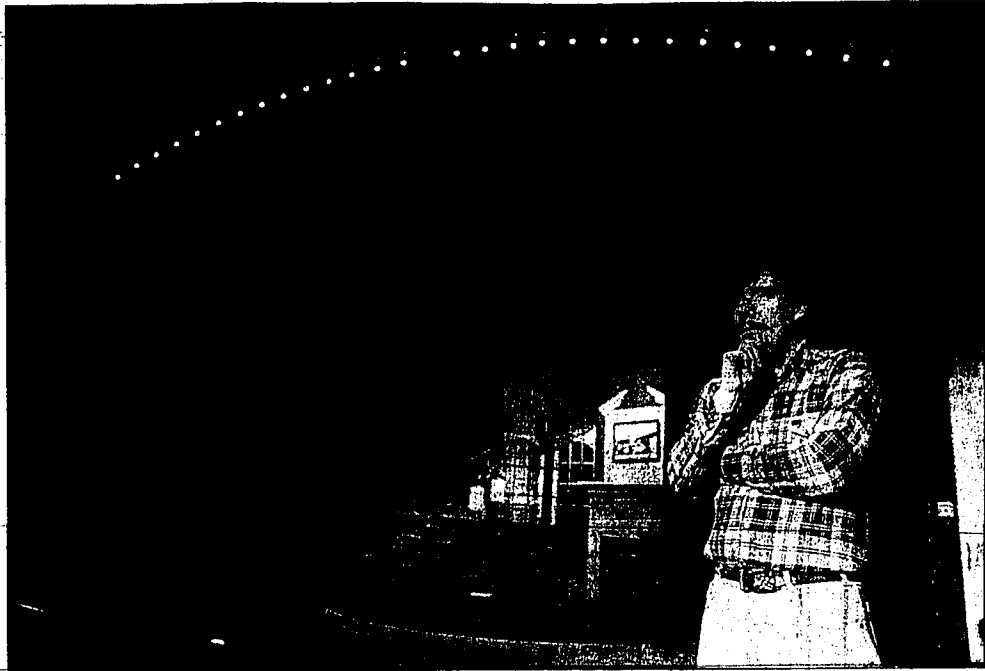

Oakley nurtures cul-de-sac of culture in Magic Valley

OAKLEY — When most of the rest of the Magic Valley was still an unscrupulous real estate agent's dream, the music played on at Howells Opera House.

It played songs of paradise lost and of faithless love, of life on the edge of a treeless, trackless wilderness where culture came on the back of the freight wagon between the bedsprings and the barrels of flour.

Oakley, born in an unpromising dry valley a generation earlier, was always a long-odds proposition — and for its second-generation Mormon pioneers from Utah, a long, long way from a friendly face.

So the settlers cultivated home, hearth, a touch of class. They became Victorians.

"Elaborately detailed homes of brick, stone, wood and intricately cut wooden designs were built to last," wrote retired Brigham Young University professor Leonard Arrington in his new "History of Idaho." "The Oakley image dispels the theory that early farm life was nothing but drudgery, for ornate castles like the Judge

The band played on

Howell house and neighboring mansions were built with pride and a vision of the future.

And when the music of the restless wind grew tedious, Judge B.P. Howells built himself a theater to listen to real thing.

"He liked music," said Kent Severe, a music teacher who serves as president of the Oakley Valley Arts Council. "And he thought the town ought to have a place for it."

Howell's theater will turn 90 this summer,

and it's still the heartbeat of the unlikelyst hotbed of culture in Idaho — a town of 630 a long way from anywhere.

"I think our heritage keeps it going," said Severe, who was one of the founding members of the arts council 15 years ago.

"There's a strong tradition of music and of theater in the community."

The opera house — that's the community's name for the place, not Howell's — is certainly the biggest reason.

"It's just a great place for play or a musi-

cal," said Harlo Clark, an Oakley grocer and College of Southern Idaho drama graduate who's been involved in a dozen different productions. "There are places you can stand on the runway where you just feel like you're standing next to the audience. It's the only theater I know of where the audience sings along. 'Oklahoma' was practically a choral effort."

Every year, the arts council does a spring (actually, late-winter) musical and a fall play, as well as 24th of July pageant (for Oakley Pioneer Days and the Mormons' midsummer holiday) and a free Christmas concert.

"When we as a board get together and decide we want to do a musical or a play, we don't take into consideration what it's going to take to get it done," Severe said. "But somehow, it always does."

There's an informal repertory company of actors in Oakley and elsewhere upon whom to call, but finding a director and an orchestra is tougher.

"The first thing we do is find a director, usually on the basis of what we've seen

when it picked Wilson's tuneful paean to gumption, but it's nice fit, says Kent Severe, the group's president.

"I don't think you could find a better Molly Brown," he said.

Actually, you could, but Debbie Reynolds doesn't do musicals any more.

"I've seen the movie about nine times

and I saw Debbie do it on stage when she was 58," Twiss said. "So when I told Kim I was too old for the part, she said, 'Older than Debbie?'"

With Twiss in the role of the hard-scrabble Missourian who marries a millionaire and survives the sinking of Titanic, and Eric Bedke as Johnny Brown, this play is several times more ambitious than anything the company has attempted so far.

"The Opera House is a small theater," said Harris, who has a strong background in classical dance. "And the script calls for 27 scene changes. We got that down to 20, but it's still a tremendous job."

Happily, the arts council found Leon Hale, a professional designer who works in Burley.

"This is the first time, really, we've had someone with his kind of background doing the sets," Severe said.

But between those sets, Harper must fit two dozen other actors and musicians.

"It's definitely a organizational challenge," she said.

Twiss says she's ready, although she missed a week's worth of 5:30 a.m. rehearsals because she was vacationing in Hawaii with her husband.

"It's OK," she said. "I don't sing any worse at 5:30 in the morning than I do at 8 at night."

Twiss, who did the lead in "Annie Get Your Gun" on a same stage a decade ago, said she loves Wilson's music.

"It's not 'The Music Man,' but it is Meredith Wilson," she said. "There are not a lot of show-stoppers, but it's still great music."

Boise novelist tells tale of Twin Falls' flypaper killer

TWIN FALLS — Before there was Jeffrey Dahmer and Hannibal Lecter, there was Lydia Trueblood-Dockley-McHaffie-Lewis-Meyer-Southard-Whitlock-Shaw, and Lydia had a little trouble with relationships. She poisoned four of her husbands and a brother-in-law in the years during and after World War I, and in the process became — in author William C. Anderson's estimation — perhaps America's first serial killer.

Shocking indeed for a girl from the Salmon Tract. But it's not the fact that she was a murderer that got her written up in Anderson's new biography, "Lady Bluebeard," released this month by Fred Pruett Books of Boulder, Colo. It's how she did them in.

She boiled the arsenic off flypaper and laced their food with it.

Then she climbed out of the fortress-like Idaho State Prison with the help of a trusty she had seduced, and spent a year — Dr. Richard Kimble-like — on the lam.

"Fascinating lady," Anderson said.

A 73-year-old Boise native who served for 20 years in the Air Force and then took up writing, Anderson nurtured the Lydia Southard — she preferred her sixth husband's surname — story for half a century.

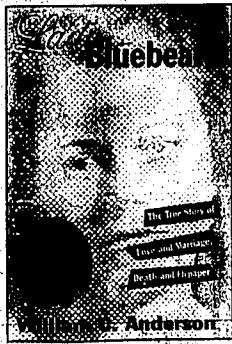
"When I was growing up in Boise, we used to ride our bikes out to the old prison and all the talk then was about Lydia," he said in a telephone interview from his Boise home earlier this week. "She was famous."

Anderson, best known for the Vietnam War story, "Bat-21," that was turned into a 1986 movie starring Gene Hackman and Danny Glover, says his literary agent is already negotiating for a movie deal.

JACKPOT — Boxcar Willie came by his name honestly.

Reared on country music, freight trains and hobos, he was born in tiny Sterett, Texas, the son of a railroad man. The trains traveled less than a stone's throw from little Willie's backyard, and he began imitating train whistles when he was 2.

Hobos who stopped by Boxcar Willie's house spun him some tall tales of their vagabond lifestyles. They also sang and danced for him and cooked him fancy vittles, like rabbit stew.

By the time he was 16, Boxcar Willie was performing his own country songs on a Dallas radio show. When he became a flight engineer Air Force C-5A transport, he kept right on performing at night.

In 1976, after several years as a disc jockey and daytime TV host, Boxcar Willie gambled it all on a hobo character he had created. His first record album, "King of the Road," sold more than 3 million copies, and he was sent touring. By 1978, he had been named Entertainer of the Year in Great Britain.

Music City News awards and a bronze star in the Country Music Hall of Fame's Walkway of Stars quickly followed.

Boxcar Willie still tours a lot, too. And he's big on preserving the past — with it's distinct American sound.

them do before, but not always," Severe said. "After that, we hold auditions, and we're very careful about making them open auditions. We want to make sure anybody who wants to participate can."

"It's a pretty dedicated group," Clark said. "You have to be to drive to Oakley four times a week for a 5:30 a.m. rehearsal."

Piecing together a band is a more precarious process. "We don't have that many musicians to choose from, so we have to call on some of the same people year after year," Severe said.

"There's a strong music program at the high school, so that gives us a pool of musicians to call on, especially violinists," Clark said. "But we have some musicians who have to drive a long way, and they do it year after year."

Still, the musicians and the actors don't get together until a week or two before the play.

"Sometimes you wonder if it's going to work out," Severe said. "But it always has, so far."

It's an all-volunteer effort, but a tight financial squeeze nonetheless.

"We've been struggling," Clark said. "I'd say 5 to 10 percent of our audience is from Oakley. The rest is from out of town."

"Our income is our ticket receipts," Severe said. "The musicals are almost always sold out, but the theater only holds about 285 people."

The rights to a musical such as "The Unsinkable Molly Brown," which opens next week, cost a community theater such as Oakley's hundreds of dollars more expensive than that if we have a lot of sets to build," he said. "And in this play, I think we have 20."

"It's a small theater to begin with

that wasn't built for large productions," said Kim Harris, a Paul Housewife who is directing "Molly Brown." "And the fact that it's on the National Registry of Historic Places means you can't do any real alterations, or even install a double door to get the sets in and out."

"Basically we can't do anything to change the building," Severe said. "We couldn't even put a sign on the front."

Not that it needs one. In its 11-night run, "Molly Brown" will draw between 2,000 and 3,000 people.

"We get tremendous word of mouth, most of it from out of town," Severe said. "That's what keeps us going."

The musical — the arts council's marquee event — draws the crowds. Even so, the fall play — which is much

less costly to produce — and the summer pageant do well, Severe said.

"It's like any other volunteer effort," he said. "Sometimes it's a struggle. But hopefully the result makes it worthwhile. We've done some good plays, and there's a lot more I'd like to do. I'd like to do 'The King and I,' if we could figure out a way to get that many people in the theater."

"I can't wait until Andrew Lloyd Webber's musicals become available," Clark said. "I'd love to do 'Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat' or 'Phantom of the Opera' in there."

"We had an old pipe organ, and when someone would play it for a first time in a while, it would kick up all kinds of dust. The Phantom would feel right at home."

"Maybe they could get Debra Winger to do it," he said. "She's got red hair, just like Lyda."

Southard killed, in "Double Indemnity" fashion, for the insurance money, but she never got rich in the process. She even tried to pay the premium on the policy of one of her deceased husbands after he died, Anderson said.

"She was a girl who grew up poor and wanted to be rich," he said. "It never quite worked out that way."

"Lady Bluebeard" is really two stories: Southard's and Val Ormsby's, a Javen-like Twin Falls car salesman-turned-deputy sheriff who tracked her down. "Val was an interesting character, and certainly a well-known one in Twin Falls before he ever pinned on a badge," Anderson said. "The story is that he sold 125 cars a month, although I don't know if that's true or not."

Ormsby, who had no formal law-enforcement training, followed Southard's trail of homicide from Missouri through Montana to Mexico through California to Hawaii, eventually concluding that her husbands' fatal symptoms that doctors had ascribed to typhoid or influenza were something else.

"It was a great piece of detective work," Anderson said. "That's part of what makes it such a great story."

Anderson invents much of the dialogue for the characters — a screenwriter's technique.

"I wasn't able to talk with any of the original characters because they're all gone," he said. "But the judge let me have a copy of the trial transcript, so I got a pretty good sense of who these people were an how they talked. Relatives of the characters have told me I made them sound authentic."

Southard, born in Missouri, came to Idaho in 1906 after her father saw a promotional poster for the Salmon Tract bearing a picture of a man holding an apple the size of a cantaloupe.

The man with the apple was J.B. Perrine's foreman, Edward Meyer.

Meyer turned out to be Southard's fourth husband — and fifth victim, Anderson says.

"Lyda always claimed she was framed," he said. "She always said

the evidence against her was circumstantial. That's true, but it was overwhelming circumstantial evidence."

Pardoned in 1943, Southard was released to a community that shunned her and to a family that wanted nothing to do with her. She fled to Utah, where she married again, only to be abandoned by her eighth husband.

After she died in 1958, Southard was buried in Twin Falls' Sunset

Memorial Park at 2 in the morning — under a headstone that read "Anna E. Shaw."

"Unverified medical reports supposedly state that Lyda's body was completely hairless at the time of her death," Anderson said. "The arsenic, I suppose, from boiling all that flypaper. She eventually poisoned herself. If it's true, only her family knows, and they're all gone."

Naomi Judd sees more harmony in her future

When Naomi Judd pranced and preened on stages as half of the mother-daughter singing duo known as the Judds, she sometimes said her favorite among their hits was the song "Why Not Me?"

The title suggested a world of infinite possibilities.

Now, on tour to promote her autobiography, "Love Can Build a Bridge," she accepts that one of those possibilities was the life-threatening liver disease that brought her career crashing in 1991 as spectacularly as it had taken off eight years earlier.

She counsels daughter Wynonna, now a successful solo act, against being devastated by bad news. "When bad things happen, I tell Wy, 'There's another way of looking at this,'" she said.

Resting between a morning television appearance and afternoon radio interviews, she propped her feet up on a hotel bed in Detroit. Her face was still made up china-doll perfect, but she was swathed below the neck in a pink terry-cloth robe that emphasized her fragility.

Taped inside the lid of her open suitcase, a picture made clear what is most important in her life. It showed Naomi with daughters Wynonna 29, and Ashley, 25, whom she raised as a young divorcee. In the suitcase

Were two, small, heart-shaped boxes of Valentine candy.

Country notes

"I still bring them something when I come home from a trip," she says, laughing. Not being able to buy simple things for the girls was the hardest part of being a single mother without skills to earn a good living, she says.

"The kids would want to go to birthday parties, and I couldn't buy a gift. They would say, 'Oh, I left it at home,'" she recalls.

"Being a mother ... the kids always saved my life."

When, newly divorced in Hollywood, she fell into a relationship with a man who beat her, it was knowing her young daughters were watching that moved her to leave him. It was Wynonna's growing rebelliousness, asthma attacks and sleepwalking that forced her to move back to her native Kentucky and the rural life that helped form their style of country music.

She wanted her daughters to grow up with the same knowledge of being loved by family, the same sense of connection to the land and to God that she credited with giving her the confidence to change her life.

Known for her glitz princess dresses with giant puffed sleeves and petticoat-flounced

skirts, she now reserves that look for rare public appearances, such as the halftime show at the Super Bowl last month.

At home on her Tennessee farm with Larry Strickland, whom she married in 1989, she usually wears bifocal glasses and no makeup, her hair in a ponytail.

Since the Judds' farewell tour in 1991, her hepatitis has been in remission. But the virus lurks inside her and could attack at any time.

Besides countless hours spent at the kitchen table writing the story of her life in longhand, Judd, 48, has spent most of her time studying the disease, attempting to call on the best resources of body, mind, spirit and medication.

Even on tour to promote the book, she paces herself carefully, with rest time between interviews.

What next? She is unsure, except that "God has something else."

Judd speaks slowly and reflectively. But the spark that wouldn't let her settle for a routine life flared again as she declared that she hopes for more adventure.

"Go to work in the same place every day, see the same people, come home and watch the boob tube. I couldn't stand that."

In a burst of optimism for her future, she adds, "When I'm 65, I'll probably join the Peace Corps."

Patti Tate leads crusade in name of her sister, Sharon

Patti Tate is thinking back.

It's the summer of '69, and she's got her hands on her sister's stomach, feeling the baby inside kick. She was 11 years old then and her 26-year-old sister, actress Sharon Tate, was two weeks away from having her first baby. But on a hot August night, followers of Charles Manson killed seven people, including Sharon Tate, who was repeatedly stabbed as she pleaded for her life and that of her unborn child.

"My sister was everything to me," said Tate, 36. "She was so sweet and such a gentle soul. She was a movie star and beautiful, and in my eyes she was just so big. There wasn't anything I wouldn't have done for her."

Twenty-four years later, there still isn't.

For her sister, Patti Tate has launched a national boycott against Geffen Records after Guns N' Roses, which records on the Geffen label, refused to remove a song written by Manson from its new album, "The Spaghetti Incident?"

Tate said the record company "is putting Manson up on a pedestal for young people who don't know who he is to worship like an idol." She and other members of the Doris Tate Crime Victims Bureau are asking people to write and fax letters of protest to Geffen Records as well as to phone the record company.

Ed Rosenblatt, Geffen Records president, has said that the company "would have preferred that the song wasn't on the album, but given our belief in freedom of speech as well as the clear restraints of our legal agreements with the band, it is not our decision to make. That decision belongs solely to Guns N' Roses. We genuinely regret the distress the situation has caused."

Geffen Records has said neither the Manson nor Guns N' Roses will collect any money from the song, and royalties will be funneled to the son

of one of Manson's victims and to various environmental and crime-victim organizations. But that doesn't satisfy Tate, who recently faced Geffen executives in a private meeting.

"Nothing came out of it," she said, "but it was necessary for me to sit down with them, face to face and ask them, 'Do you realize what you are creating here?' This isn't about whether or not Manson is making money or who is making money. This is about Manson still profiting by becoming a cult hero, an idol to a lot of young kids out there who will buy the album. And that's where violence and crime is hitting us the worst right now, with our kids."

"I wanted to go in there and state exactly where I stood and that I would continue on with the boycott. I needed to touch them with my story, with my sister's story, with her memory."

Rock beat

Throughout her life, Tate, a friendly, soft-spoken woman, has fought to keep the memory of her sister alive because "you don't want people to forget what Manson and his cult did and what others like them are capable of doing," she said.

"Keeping Sharon's memory alive keeps this senseless tragedy alive in the minds of many. We can't go around thinking that 'this won't happen to me, it only happens to other people,' because one day it's going to hit home."

It is also for her sister that Tate crusades for justice on behalf of crime victims, through the efforts of the nonprofit Doris Tate Crime Victims Bureau in Sacramento. The bureau, which advocates passage of legislation for victims and their rights, was founded in 1992 by Doris Tate, who helped forge the crime victims' movement nationwide after her daughter Sharon's murder. Doris Tate died in July 1992 from a brain tumor at the age of 68.

Patti Tate was at her mother's side.

"I promised my mom before she died that I would continue on. This got started because it was her dream to pull together all the victims' groups to make a difference in gov-

ernment and so that we can all stand united," she said.

Tate, who lives with her family in Southern California, is guarded about discussing her personal and professional life. "I have to be real careful," she said. "I do work, but I don't want to say more than that."

"There is still a huge threat out there. My life has been threatened."

Undaunted, she forges ahead.

"I feel so strongly and my family has always felt so strongly that nothing will be accomplished if you just sit down and don't do anything," she said.

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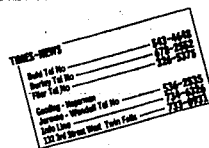
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Hottest movie also in running as dumbest

MIAMI — After the Oscar nominations were announced last Wednesday, Hollywood anxiously waited to see which of the highly-touted nominees — "Schindler's List," "In The Name of the Father" and "The Piano," among others — would best capitalize on the honor over the weekend.

The winner? A so-dumb-it's-funny comedy about a moronic detective investigating the kidnapping of the Miami Dolphins' mascot. No, it's not up for any Oscars. "Ace Ventura: Pet Detective," starring comedian Jim Carrey and Miami Dolphin quarterback Dan Marino, grossed an impressive \$9.7 million last weekend, corraling the first-place slot for a second consecutive week. The movie has become a surprise hit, earning nearly \$25 million so far.

Oscar nominations did little to boost ticket sales. "Schindler's List," up for 12 awards, did the best, grossing \$4.7 million and earning the fifth-place spot. "Philadelphia," bolstered by Tom Hanks' heavily-favored Best Actor nomination, was close behind at \$4.2 million, good enough for seventh.

It would be nice to say "Ace Ventura's" success is due to its plentiful shots of South Beach and the big-screen debut of Dolphins coach Don Shula.

But Miami, match, has little to do with the movie's handy box office victory over Oscar's big guns.

Part of the explanation is shelf life — "Philadelphia," the most recent of the nominees, has already been in release for eight weeks. "Ace Ventura," in comparison, is only 2 weeks old.

Screen saturation is another factor. "Schindler's List," for example, is playing on only 782 theaters nationwide, while "Ace Ventura" is on nearly 2,000 screens.

The Oscar nominees can take heart in the fact that despite its commercial success, the upstart "Ace Ventura: Pet Detective" won't be up for any Oscars any time soon. Another safe bet: "Ace Ventura Part II."

'Blue Chips' plays above the rim

Shaquille O'Neal doesn't dominate "Blue Chips" as thoroughly as he did the Boston Celtics on Tuesday night (36 points, 24 rebounds). With Nick Nolte in the lineup, he doesn't need to.

But it's Shaq, making his motion-picture debut, who in the end turns "Blue Chips" into a slam-jam-thank-you-man experience sure to please basketball fans who aren't looking for more emotional involvement than a typical piglet at the O-rena.

Though filmed mostly in Indiana, "Blue Chips" is no "Hoosiers," a character-rich 1986 movie whose best performances took place below the rim. "Hoosiers," whose basketball scenes were widely panned, is best remembered for Gene Hackman's poignant portrayal of a small-town high school coach and Dennis Hopper's turn as an ex-phenom turned drunk.

The enduring image from "Blue Chips" is likely to be Shaq swinging from the rim after one of the thunderous flying dunks that punctuate the climactic on-court scenes.

But with no further ad, let's turn to the burning question uppermost in everyone's mind: Can Shaq act?

I'll put it this way: He's a much better actor than he is a free-throw shooter. He has to be. An actor can't afford to miss 50 percent of his lines.

Shaq delivers another stellar performance from the wink-and-grin school of acting that serves him so well in TV commercials and real life.

In truth, Shaq doesn't have to act because he's playing himself, which he does charmingly in a scene with schoolchildren and in a college literature class when he rises to denounce the reading list as "culturally biased."

It's Shaq's Orlando Magic teammate, rookie Anfernee "Penny" Hardaway, who surprises in his screen debut as a shy kid from the ghetto. He has an expressive face that registers subtle inner tremors (though sometimes his eyes tend to glaze over).

Hardaway and O'Neal play two of three prize recruits — blue chips — being courted by coach Pete Bell (Nolte), whose program at fictional Western University has fallen on hard times after two national championships.

Bell is renowned for running a clean program whose players excel in the classroom as well as on court. But after the first losing season of his career, and with the media hounds calling for his head, Bell succumbs to the unthinkable: He cheats.

Desperate for a quick fix, Bell looks the other way as fat-cat alumni

funnel gifts and cash to Butch McRae (Hardaway), a cat-quick guard from Chicago. Neon Bodeaux (O'Neal), a bodaciously gifted giant from Louisiana; and the third blue chip, Ricky Roe (former Indiana University star Matt Nover), a dead-eye forward from the Indiana sticks.

All three end up at Western (surprise) and, overnight, return the school to its pre-eminent spot in college basketball. But at a terrible price.

"I've become what I despise," Bell says.

This is supposed to be the larger theme of "Blue Chips," but somehow it gets lost, if not forgotten, in the glitz, dazzle and frequent humor.

It's hard to imagine anyone making a more entertaining or upbeat movie about a major corruption in American life — big-time college sports.

It's unsettling that the first movie to deal with the issue directly is likely to send people out of the theater with geishas smiling on their faces.

"Blue Chips" focuses on flagrant ethical fouls — the outright buying of players that violates NCAA rules.

But the corruption of college sports is deeper and more insidious than portrayed here. "Blue Chips" doesn't deal with the legal brokering that makes the basketball coach the highest paid faculty member at many institutions of higher learning.

But that's another subject for another day. The star power of "Blue Chips," above and below the rim, simply overwhelms the serious stuff and turns the movie into a dunkfest with a feel-good ending.

"Blue Chips" is cameo heaven for basketball junkies, offering glimpses of more than two dozen coaches and players besides marquee stars Shaq, Penny, Nover and Indiana coach Bob Knight, who plays himself.

Larry Bird, who looks more like a Cabbage Patch Kid every day, plays himself, and Celtic great Bob Cousy is the hear-no-evil, see-no-evil athletic director at Western.

Nolte, who observed Knight for two weeks in preparation for the role, gives a terrific performance as the mercurial Bell. (Instead of tossing a chair across the court to a Knight, he drop-kicks a basketball into the stands). Two-time Oscar nominee Mary McDonnell ("Dances With Wolves") delivers a deft performance as Bell's sympathetic ex-wife, J.T.

Movie review

Walsh is oily to the touch as a sleazeball alumnus. Alfre Woodard can't do much with a shallow role as Butch's mother, which makes her a pillar of rectitude one moment, an opportunistic money-grubber the next.

Director William Friedkin ("The French Connection"), a professed basketball junkie, made the basketball sequences almost too dazzling. Edited at super-MTV speed, the scenes are a dizzying blur of arms and legs and uniforms.

No trouble picking out Shaq, though. He's the one hanging on the rim.

"On Deadly Ground" (R). Steven Seagal stars as a roughneck oil derrick worker who saves the world from a giant that's threatening the environment and the Inuit people who live nearby. Directed by Seagal. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

"Ace Ventura: Pet Detective" (PG-13). Every body movement and facial tic of Jim Carrey (of "In Living Color" fame) is so broadly exaggerated here, he is a goodly bit of a ham. Carrey's hammy antics are by comparison. A movie centered around as manic a presence as Carrey's sounds like it could be hell, but his starring debut proves surprisingly capable of provoking unexpected giggles. (Twin Cinema)

"Mrs. Doubtfire" (PG-13). Robin Williams can't help but be funny in this situation born in high-concept heaven divorced dad disguises himself as a nanny to spend more time with his kids. But the rest of the film, though unobjectionable enough, underlines Williams' recent desire to appear in warm, cuddly and terminally bland motion pictures. (Twin Cinema)

Today's South chose a plan to keep East off lead; he couldn't afford a lead through his diamond king. Unfortunately his execution was not good, and an alert West escaped from the impending trap.

Dummy's heart ace won and dummy's trump king went to West's ace. West exited in hearts to dummy's king and South cashed his trump 10 after ruffing a heart high. Hoping to put West on play on the third round of clubs, South cashed his club ace, ready to lead another club toward dummy's king. West saw what was coming and he pitched his club queen under South's ace. This left South with no way to establish clubs without giving East a trick, and the diamond lead by East beat him.

South should have made the game although it was East who held the club length. To succeed, he starts the clubs by leading a low one from his hand. If West plays the queen, South allows him to hold it. If West plays low, dummy's king wins and South ducks the next club completely. West wins but he has no safe lead.

Had East held the queen and played it on the second round, South would win the second club and lead a third round, hoping West would have to win for a game-saving endplay.

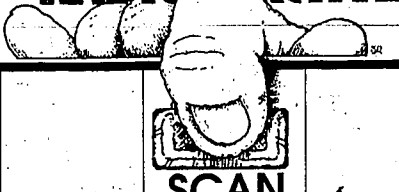

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Partnership leads comic Van Dyke to success

Twenty-some years ago, an insurance salesman fresh from college walked into the Red Dog Saloon in Phoenix and met comedian Jerry Van Dyke for a job.

Van Dyke, who was making a living doing standup, says he wasn't in the greatest position to help. "I was a has-been never-was, working in a toilet," he says.

But Van Dyke read the salesman's work, saw some potential, and offered him \$300 a week, plus room and board, to become his writing partner.

They collaborated for a while, but when the material wouldn't sell, the duo broke up. But not before Van Dyke called an old friend, James Brooks — a former writer on Van Dyke's short-lived "Accidental Family" who was then working on "All in the Family" — and asked him to read the kid's stuff.

Brooks was impressed, and a writer was born. And that, Van Dyke says, is how Hollywood came to know Barry Kemp, the creator of "Coach."

A self-proclaimed late-bloomer, Van Dyke has had his share of showbiz breaks, from guest stints on brother Dick's "The Dick Van Dyke Show" and "The Judy Garland Show" to his own vehicle, "My Mother the Car."

But the 62-year-old comedian, who has been performing since age 16, never expected to obtain true stardom, especially so late in his career.

"I had pretty much hung it up, figuring I'd never be really successful," Van Dyke says. "I just figured it wasn't in the cards for me."

Then, in 1988, Barry Kemp came knocking again. Only this time, the creator of "Newhart" didn't need a job — he was offering one.

Now, six seasons and three Emmy nominations later, Van Dyke is getting a taste of a life that has eluded him for most of his career.

Movie puts twist on plot

Good producers, working from well-written scripts, can turn fact-based adoption movies into pretty effective drama — as long as they manage to find a new twist on the old themes.

Monday night's "Baby Brothers" rises above the standard format.

Susan Nanus' script, drawn from a true story first exposed to the nation through a series of reports on the "Hard Copy" tabloid news show, shrewdly anchors the story line in the complex character of Debbie Freeman (Cybill Shepherd), who wants motherhood so desperately she becomes the victim of a profoundly cruel pair of swindlers.

Debbie personifies a growing number of women who pass up conventional marriage and family plans to forge professional careers. Then, after they've achieved the job success they've sacrificed so much to attain, they begin to long for the road not taken toward motherhood.

She has won the respect of her male colleagues, but has given up on finding a man

where even a non-traditional pregnancy seems a lost cause. She has tried artificial insemination and in-vitro fertilization without success, so single-parent adoption now appears to be the only alternative.

She begins to advertise for a baby through the procedure known as "open adoption," in which the adoptive parent openly negotiates with an expectant mother, usually through a lawyer. That's when her luck starts giving out.

Into Debbie's life comes Leanne (Nina Simasack), a homeless young woman whose husband, Frankie (Tom O'Brien), has been unemployed for some time.

Working through her lawyer (Anna Marie Horsford), Debbie arranges to adopt Leanne's baby at birth,

agreeing to pay full medical costs and living expenses for the family all through the pregnancy.

It's impossible not to sympathize with Debbie when she begins to learn what an expensive and heartbreaking mess she's made of things.

Nanus' teleplay shows what can artists Leanne and Frankie are, long before Debbie catches on to a shiftless bum who steals for a living until Debbie provides him with an income, and his wife is a barefaced liar whose promises mean absolutely nothing.

Gradually, Debbie discovers that Leanne has ignored the pre-birth hearing procedure they agreed to in advance — Leanne continues to smoke and dumps all her vitamins — and has covered up a startling fact about her past: She has given birth to six other babies and sold them to the highest bidder.

What she doesn't learn until it's too late is that Leanne has been "selling" her unborn child to a series of other would-be moms all over the country, collecting advance deposits from women as equally desperate — and foolishly trusting — as Debbie.
