Water dispute keeps banks cautious

TWIN FALLS - With the Legislature scrambling to head off a mass shut-down of Idaho groundwater pumpers, bankers are

Keeping close watch.

"And we're silently sitting back and waiting for the repercusions," said J.P. Hamilton, chairman of Farmers National Bank of Buhl. "We're taking a wait-and-sec attitude."

see attitude.

This isn't the first time the bankers have had to deal with the threat of their farm customers not getting enough water for their growing season, he said.

During the drought years of 1988 and 1989, bankers looked at each borrower's furm and at his water supply before making a loan. And in many cases the banks lent. less money to the farmers so that the banks were taking less of a risk, Hamilton said.

Banks in the Magic Valley have large enough re-serves to protect them from a bad growing season when farmers can't repay their loans, said Hamilton. But this is the first controlled study to find that anger can be an immediate trigger of a heart attack, aid Dr. Murray Mittle man, the principal author.

15-year-old notes solve Idahoan's mystery death

ATLANTA — The mysterious death of an Idaho man from a pneumonia-like illness so perplexed a rookie federal health investigator that he kept his personal notes on the case for 15 years. Suddenly, a few months ago, those files turned out to be much more than a sentimental keepsake. That's when Dr. Rick Goodman recognized that details about the death — his first case — matched those in a report describing a respirecognized that details about the death — his first case — matched those in a report describing a respiratory disease that was killing dozens of people in the Southwest. —"It just hit me," said Goodman, now an editor at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Toodman confirmed his suspi-cions after painstaking laboratory tests showed that the virus — the same strain that struck the South-west — had killed the man. On March 11, he talked to the victim's widow, who is now remar-ried. She declined to talk with The Associated Press. The CDC asked that the man's name not be re-vealed until his parents had been notified.

Back in 1978, the man's death had sent Goodman to Montpelier, a small town of about 3,000 people in southeastern Idaho, near the Wyoming line.

His job was to find out what had killed the young man, an avid sportsman who was a volunteer freman. Goodman conducted numerous interviews with his widow, muniting buddles and to-owners at a chemical fertilizer plant.

All he found was dead ends. He couldn't even confirm a local physician's belief that cases of respiratory disease were increasing.

"We left, busically, without a clear answer as to what caused his death," Goodman recalled. "It always struck me that we went out there and we didn't find anything."





Welfare plan forces few parents to work

WASHINGTON (AP) — After five years and \$15 billion in new services for the poor, only a fraction of all patents on welfare would be nudged into the work force under the Clinton administration's draft strategy.

control administration's draft strategy. President Clinton raised expecta-tions for sweeping reform when he promised during his campaign to 'end welfare as we know it' and require all able-bodied recipients to take a job after two years on the rolls.

His aides, however, have drafted a plan that initially exempts two-thirds of all parents on welfare from any time limits or work require ments, covering only those both

any time Imits or work requirements, covering only those both-after 1972.

And it takes years before significant numbers of welfare recipients are pushed into a private job or a subsidized work program.

At the end of the plan's first five years, just 200,000 of the estimated—1.67 million young families who will be covered by the new welfare system will either leave the rolls because of various reforms in day care, welfare and health care, or care, welfare and health care, or have a parent working in a subsi-dized job.

The administration argues that it

is smarter, in an era of scarce resources, to move carefully and target its reforms on the younges mothers with the highest risk of long-term welfare dependency and the greatest potential for turning their lives around.

their lives around.
"It is much better to start with a small program that sends a strong signal to new recipients that things are different. And a system that is more easily administered makes a real guarantee that the sanctions are going to be enforced," said a senior administration official who insisted

on anonymity.

But Gerald Whitburn, secretary of health and social services in Wisconsin, questions the decision to leave out significant numbers of parents.

to leave out significant numbers of parents.

"If we're going to move expeditiously to change welfare as we know it, and then exempt two-thirds of the caseload, and in many case the longest term recipients, that 's areful question," Whitburn said.

He cited the case of a Wisconsin woman who signed up for welfare in 1954 and has been on since. "Forty years without a disconnect from the program ... is the kind of case that drives the public alarm."

Acknowledging the uncertain road ahead, Clinton said peace for the former Yugoslavia "depends less on our words today than on the actions of Muslims, Croats and Serbs on the ground tomorrow and in the days to come."

With the Serbs controlling 70 percent of Bosnian territory, their absence from Friday's signing cere-

With the Serbs controlling 70 percent of Bosnian territory, their absence from Friday's signing ceremony spoke to the dimensions of the challenge.

Glinton, trying to build on Friday's agreement, urged the Bosnian Serbs 10 join in this effort for a wider peace." And the White House offered immediate benefits for the Muslim and Croat signatories, including the promised opening of an embassy in downtown Sarajevo, perhaps within weeks.

British Prime Minister John Major, in Sarajevo, said the Serbs must comercounderstand "there are no gains to made by continuing fighting."

"We just have to continually put pressure on the Serbs to realize that it's going to be necessary to reach a political settlement," he said.

Nonetheless, initial reaction from the Serbs offered no encouragement. Momcible Krajisnik, president of the self-proclaimed Bosnian Serb Parliament, told the Belgrade-based Tanjug news agency that the federation-was—an "unnatural-creation"—bound to fail.

Markets falter after Greenspan visit

WASHINGTON — The administration scrambled Friday to calm jittery financial markets after President Clinton summoned Federal Reserve Chalman Alan Greensgan to the White House.

"There were no messages given, no messages received" at the hour-long session, said Gene Sperling, a White House economics adviser. "There was a basic agreement that the fundamentals of the economy seemed sound."

Greenspan canceled an engagement in Texas to attend, theiling market concerns about the nature of the meeting.
Both Sperling and Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen denied the session was an attempt to pressure the central bank against raising interest rates at next Tuesday's meeting of Federal Reserve policy makers.
Greenspan "spent a lot of time going through his analysis of the economy," Sperling said.

Communications bill eases wiretaps

WASHINGTON — Unless Congress passes a new telecommunications bill, law enforcement will be crippled in pursuing wiretaps and "crime will claim untold victims who could otherwise be saved," FBI Director Louis Freeh said Friday.

The bill, proposed by the Clinton administration, would require telephone companies to install software in their new digital switching systems that would allow the FBI and other law enforcement agencies to do court-authorized wiretaps.

Freeh said traditional wiretaps, which entail splicing into a telephone line and listening, are insufficient for today's digital networks.


Freeh, who has lobbied intensely for the bill, said the phone companies will not put in the new software voluntarily.

Russia, like other partnership members, would have to agree to share information on defense activities with NATO members and maintain a commitment to democracy.

Perry said Chernomyrdin set no conditions on Russias 's joining.

Chernomyrdin, the No. 2 official below Russian President Boris Yeltsin, said Russian and American officials. "have come very close" to reaching a consensus on how to destroy chemical and biological weapons that remain in the Russian military stockpile. Further talks on those issues will be held in Washington in June, Chernomyrdin said.

Kohl opens old WWII wounds with bid for D-day gala invite

BERLIN (AP) — Every time another big World War Il anniversary comes around, wounds that seem long mended begin to reopen.

Fifty years after the Allies liberated. France with the D-Day invasion that sealed Nazi Germany's fate, Europe's past is once again upsetting its present. A man who was just 14 on D-Day appears to have touched it off.

Germany' relations with France began to sour after it became public that Chancellor Helmut Kohl was angling for an invitation to the gala jubilee the D-Day victors are organizing in Normandy for June 5-6.

The French showed their tempers this week over perceived German attempts to dominate the European Union. On Thursday, the French ambassador was summoned to the Foreign Ministry in Bonn for a talk. If invited to Normandy, Kohl would be the first German leader at a D-Day commenoration. Although the mayor of the central town of Caen wants Kohl present for "an event of rapprochement," plenty of British and French vetrans are dead set against the idea.





BOISE - The push to replenish Idaho's underground water supplies by filling irrigation canals early is short-term bid to keep a few Hagerman-area farmers happy, an Idaho environmental leader said Friday.

"The sole benefit is to make good on Butch Morris' water rights," said Wendy Wilson, executive director of Idaho Rivers United.

"The environmental benefits are incicatal, not planned," Wilson said.
Far from benefitting, animals that depend on the Snake River will lose when large volumes of water are diverted into canal systems, then allowed to soak into the ground-she said.

Jesus² identity changing

Just when you thought you were understanding the life of Jesus and the many sayings attributed to him by the gospel writers, along comes a new Bible that says most of those biblical conversations did not come from the mouth of Jesus.

Well, then, where did-they-come-from?—According to "The Five Gospels," a Bible published by the Jesus Seminar, many of the sayings were added by disciples after Jesus' death. They were added, according to the more than 100 biblical scholars who make up the group, to enhance the image of Jesus as a sage and miracle worker.

The Jesus Seminar was started in 1985 by Robert Funk, an academic who operates Westar Institute in California. Funk's idea was to gather a bunch of biblical scholars from colleges, universities and seminaries to attempt to find the authentic words of Jesus. When the Jesus Seminar convenes, the scholars listen to academic papers about specific biblical texts. Then they vote with colored marbles: red-if-the-saying-is-authentic, pupel if it is questionable, blue if the saying probably was not uttered by Jesus and black if it definitely is not authentic Jesus-speak.

Over the course of several years of meetings, this new translation of the Bible began to take shape. The result is a shocking assertion that most of the things Jesus is a credited with saying are not authentic.

For instance, the Jesus Seminar decided

For instance, the Jesus Seminar decided that Jesus hever instructed his followers to the property the So-ceilled Lord's Prayer. Now, don't panic. Just because a bunch of scholars say the most famous prayer in the world is not authentic does not mean we have to stop praying it.

You may wonder just how these scholars know that Jesus did or did not say certain things. First, they compare texts. and language. They watch for cadences in speech and the use of certain words that Jesus was known to use often: For instance, the only thing in the Lord's Prayer that Jesus probably said, according to the Jesus Seminar, was "Our Father. The rest of the prayer is bogus, they say. The first thing Bible students need to remember is that Jesus taught orally. There were no books in those days, no computers to store information and no way to take good notes as Jesus delivered his "apseches." So, ...the. disciples, remembered bits and pieces of Jesus specches and sayings and wrote them down hours or days later.

In some cases, the stories and parables weren't written down until the gospel writers finally sart-down years later to compile a comprehensive record of Jesus life. And it also must be remembered that we have only scraps of the very earliest manuscripts.

At the end of the workday, each worker got one silver coin, prompting those who started early in the morning to complain to the owner. According to the Jesus Seminar Bible, the owner says, "Look, pal, did I wrong you? You did agree with me for a silver coin, didn't you? Take your wage and get out!"

Then the next line has Jesus saying: "The last will be first and the first, last."

But the Jesus Seminar sholars say that was probably not uttered by Jesus but added later as a way of explaining the parable.

Incredible is the word for Archbishop Vinko Puljic's smile. Beyond its charisma, the mere fact that any smile can cross this man's face is incredible.

Consider his circumstances. In the last 22 months, 400,000 Roman Catholics have fled his diocese. That is three out every four. Most priests and nuns have followed their parishioners.

four. Most priests and nuns have followed their parishioners. All 144 churches in his diocese have been damaged, and half have been destroyed. His residence has been shelled five times and

has frequently been without electricity or running water for weeks at a time. In making pastoral visits to some of his flock in outlying sxile camps, he has dodged bullets. The thousands of men, women and children killed in nearly two years of terror include six priests. Famine is becoming a threat that could add to the death toll, he said. Puljic is, the archibishop of Sarajevo, the besieged city and diocese in central Bosnia engulfed in violence. At age 50, he is a young archibishop. He was consecrated in 1991, the last peaceful year in Bosnia-Herzegovina.

How can he smile? He finds reasons to maintain hope in the fragile cease-fire now enforced by threat of NATO air strikes, in whatever help has been sent by outsiders, and in a conviction that the world can't turn its back on what has become a spollighted triggedy.



"I think what we are observing in the denomination is, in a sense, some good news because the rate of

ine denomination is, in a sense, some good news, because the rate of loss has been reduced," said the Rev. Mearle Griffith of the United Methodist General Council on Ministries.

Ministries.

Not only has the rate of membership loss been halved in the last two or three years, he said, but some annual conferences are reporting membership gains.

More conservative religious groups that had enjoyed steady

More conservative religious groups that had enjoyed steady-growth in recent years are now facing leaner years.

The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod reported growing less than a tenth of a percent to 2.6 million members.

The Southern Baptist Convention reported an increase of .83 percent to 15.36 million members.

Sociologist William McKinney, dean of the Hartford Seminary in Connecticul, said bolb membership trends seem to follow sociological trends.


Protestant denominations that have lost up to a third of their members since the mid-1969s are down to a more committed core of members, McKinney said.

"It's hard to lose more people when you start from a smaller base," he said.

Meanwhile, growth in conservative denominations has been slowed by lower population growth in the United States and the fact that many immigrants from Hispanic nations, Asia and the Middle East are not the traditional pool from which conservative Protestant churches draw members, he said.




