

NRA head rips Clinton on ban plan The Associated Press

The NRA's Wayne LaPierre took issue with Clinton's distinction between hunting rifles and assault weapons that Clinton says are designed for the battlefield and should be outlawed. "The good guns they don't want to ban and the guns they want to ban all fire the same — none fires any faster, ione makes any bigger holes, none shoot any harder, none make any bigger noise."

LaPierre said on NBC's "Meet the Press.

In recent days, the Clinton administration has-intensified its lobbying far this week's. House wore on legislation to stop production and sale of 19 specific assault guns and coppeat models, and limit detachable mugazines to 10 rounds. The legislation exempts. 'Coyotes' show 'chickens' safely across U.S. border

Mexican nationals with knowledge of area make profession of eluding Border Patrol The Associated Press

The Associated Press

TIJUANA, Mexico — Carlos prowls the levee, 15 feet above the fetid river, skulking under the artificial sparkle of the U.S. Border Patrol's floodingts. This is his place of business, and he's looking for customers.

To the nervous people dressed for cold and danger atop the embankment, Carlos; also dressed in multiple layers, explains the risks that lie ahead and why they need him.

Carlos' clients know him only as a coyote, a guide who escorts illegal inmigrants-into the-olited States — as fews at wo at a time, as many as 16. He calls his clients pollos, or chickens, and he will cam up to \$300 a head to take them as far as Los Angeles.

Carlos, who doesn't supply his list name, will lead the immigrants in a dash across the foul; knee-high water with Border Patrol officers pur-

suing on foot and by truck. They've already wrapped their lower legs in plastic bags as protection from the floating sewage.

If they make it, Carlos will guide them through the prickly brush of southermost California. If they make it, Carlos will take them to a secret spot where a man is waiting with a car or van. If they make it, Carlos and his associate, an American, will drive the immigrants north, stopping near San Clemente.

If they make it, Carlos will tell them to get out and sprint through more brush for about a mile, past a Border Patrol checkpoint:

If they make it, they will rendezvous at another waiting van or car, and another American will drive then the rest of the way to their destination.





Scientists will rescue tortoises if fire rages

GALAPAGOS ISLANDS, Ecuador—If worse comes to worst, if the fire-breaks fail and the huge wildfire rages onward_through the_largest of the_ Galapagos Islands, scientists, say they-will take the rescue of giant tortoises into

their own hands.

They will lift the endangered tortoises, one by one, and haul them miles to safe-

one by one, and must them mines us surIt would not be easy. The humbering
beasts can weigh up to 550 pounds, and,
four or five strong men would be needed
to hoist each one. The volcanic terrain is
jagged, and the toriosis don't like to be
manhandled. It can be done, though.
"They will snap at you a little bit but
they are pretiry docile animals," said
Chanial Blanton, director of the CharlesDarwin Research Station on Sana Cruz
Island, 640 miles off the coast of
Ecuador.

So far, an evacuation of the tortoises hasn't been necessary. A 2-week-old wildfire has seared through 21,000 acres on Isabela Island, but it is still 5 miles from the nearest nesting area of tortoises. And firefighters say the blaze is now under control.

"There is no immediate threat to the tortoises, if the weather stays the same," said Gaston Gusy, a Canadian forest fire management expert.

Scientists worry nevertheless.
The fire already has wreaked have on one of the most precious sites known, to humanity—the Galaprops archipelago of 14 major islands.







High-quality art goes on block

Strong sales, chance make \$200 million worth of works available

NEW YORK — With the big spring art auctions just around the corner, the adenantine is flowing in the art world. Not since the boom years in the late 1980s has there been such a plentiful offering of high-quality art.



Physicist's once speculated that more sets of quarks and leptons might exist as well, but experiments at the CERN atom smasher near Geneva have ruled out additional families.

It was at CERN, in 1984, that physicists first believed they had glimpsed the top quark. But that report was premature and was tretacted upon further review. Soon it became apparent that the top quark was beyond the power of the CERN machine, and the search moved on to Fermilab, about 30 miles west of Chicago.



Summer science schools sprout like cheat grass

TWIN FALLS - If you're sending your kid to summer camp, you have at least four dozen options within Idaho - and many more in sur-rounding states.

But the fastest-growing segment of the in-dustry is represented by the handful of kids chasing monarch butterflies-through-the quakies in the shadow of Mount Moran near Jackson, Wyo.

CHICAGO - Many Alzheimer's patients who find they can't tolerate the only drug approved for treating the disease may be able to take it if they stop taking it briefly then start



















