## Stranded in the South Hills

### Misunderstandings prolong California couple's unscheduled stay in rugged, remote Cassia County

TWIN FALLS — The Cassia County Sheriff's Department had the exact map location of a California couple marooned late last month in the South Hills, but the deputy who rode to the rescue never got within eight miles of the pair.

The deputy, Sgt. Kirby Harkness, said Thursday that he was familiar with the area and understood the map coordinates he got from Twin Falls District Ranger Don Oman. The two men spoke before sundown on the evening of May 25.

But, Kirby said, Oman gave other information that didn't pan out "and that left me with the thought that we had a wrong description."

The stranded couple, Leonard and Alyssa Mattos, wound up spending the night in their stalled car 22 miles southwest of Oakley. They finally got help at 5:30 a.m. the next day and Alyssa, 60, was later hospitalized for dehydration.

The couple were in Twin Falls Thursday to tape a television interview with the New York-based American Journal program.

The incident started when the couple tried to drive west from Oakley en route to U.S. 93 near Jackpot. They were driving a 1995 Dodge Neon; the car was so new that it only had paper license plates. They had been visiting retirement property they own near Coeur d'Alene.

The pair were returning to Fresno, where Leonard has worked for the U.S. Postal Service for 28 years. Alyssa, who said she holds a law degree from New York University, works as a law librarian for a Fresno law firm.

They drove through patches of mud, but never confronted any snow in the road, they said in an interview Thursday. At one point, Leonard, 56, got out to remove a tree from the road; at another point, they followed a mountain lion for 15 minutes as it "loped" down the road ahead of them.

The road got rougher, but Leonard thought they were about to reach U.S. 93. "I got to a point where I said, 'We're almost out of here,'" he said.

At about 10:30 a.m., the car's gas tank was punctured by a sharp rock. Suddenly, the Mattoses' motoring adventure became more serious. Their supplies consisted of some oranges and a few cans of Pepsi.

They built a fire near the car and piled it with green shrubs, trying to make smoke. The thin wisps were barely noticeable in the vast landscape. They tried signaling airplanes with mirrors. Nothing seemed to work.

At 4 p.m., they set out walking.

Leonard carried a 2-foot wooden dowel for protection; they had no firearms with them.

They were climbing to a nearby ridge top when they looked back and saw a green Forest Service truck bumping down the road toward their car. The truck paused next to the stricken red compact, but the driver did not get out to read a note tucked under the windshield wipers.

The truck started moving again and headed straight down the road toward the couple.

"Eureka! We saw him and jumped 14 feet into the air," Leonard said.

He hurried to intercept the truck while

his wife, who is 5-foot tall and barely 100 pounds, tried to keep pace. Leonard reached the truck at a spot about three-quarters of a mile from the stalled car.

The driver, 46-year-old Arnold Solis, stopped. Solis has worked for the Sawtooth National Forest as a part time range technician since 1981. He'd been out checking fences that afternoon and was running late on his way back to town.

Accounts of the ensuing conversation differ. Even the way the two men speak is vastly different; Mattos has a terse, hard-bitten voice, while Solis speaks English more haltingly.

## Korea rattles missiles

SEOUL, South Korea — North Korea issued new threats of war against Japan and South Korea Thursday, apparently trying to frighten them into withdrawing their support for sanctions over the North's nuclear program.

The region is in crisis over North Korea's refusal to permit full nuclear inspections at its main nuclear complex. The North insists its nuclear program is peaceful, but by denying inspectors unfettered access, it has deepened suspicions that it is producing nuclear weapons.

The United States is leading the push for U.N. sanctions to punish North Korea, and Japan and South Korea are its main allies in that effort.

China, the North's only major ally, reiterated its opposition to sanctions and its preference for negotiations. South Korea's foreign minister had flown to Beijing to appeal for China's support when the issue reaches the Security Council.

Also Thursday, former President Carter said he intends to visit both North Korea and South Korea next week and hopes to discuss "important issues of the day with leaders." He emphasized that "I will have no official status relating to the U.S. government."

Secretary of State Warren Christopher, attending a NATO foreign ministers meeting in Istanbul, Turkey, expressed confidence that Japan and China would go along with sanctions against North Korea.

He said there was "nothing new" in Beijing's public statements criticizing sanctions. China has the power to veto sanctions as a permanent member of the council, so its position is crucial.

Later, a senior U.S. official said the administration was considering a Russian proposal for an international conference on the nuclear standoff. The idea is "front and center," said the official, who insisted on anonymity.

Russia wants to pursue diplomacy further before deciding on sanctions. But North Korea focused its animosity on Japan and South Korea Thursday.

If Japan supports a successful push for sanctions, it would be subject to "a deserving punishment," the official Korean Central News Agency said in a dispatch monitored in Tokyo.

In Washington, State Department press officer David Johnson said, "If the intention behind North Korea's bellicose statements is to intimidate the international

## Probe of Espy ties to chicken firm near end

WASHINGTON — Justice Department lawyers are inclined to close an investigation of Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy's relationship with an Arkansas poultry company without filing charges, federal officials said Thursday.

Investigators were trying to determine whether Espy took anything of value from Tyson Foods Inc., a giant in the poultry industry that Espy's department regulates.

Espy declined to discuss the investigation, but his department released a statement saying that he had "cooperated fully and believes there will be a positive outcome."

The White House voiced support for the secretary.

"The president stands behind him," said Press Secretary Dee Myers. "He has done good work on tightening inspections ... and has agreed to cooperate fully with the investigation."

Critics have complained that the poultry industry has gotten favorable treatment from an administration that has clamped down on sanitary conditions in beef slaughterhouses.

Justice Department spokesman Carl Stern acknowledged the investigation Thursday, but refused to provide details. Asked if the department was nearing a decision to wrap up the investigation without filing charges, Stern said, "It's nearing a decision on whether to close."

In addition, a federal law enforcement official who declined to be identified by name said Justice Department lawyers wanted to close the case without prosecution because they believe the only questionable items had a small dollar value.

## Health reform bills advance

WASHINGTON — Democrats and a solitary Republican passed a Clinton-style health insurance plan for all Americans in the Senate Labor-committee Thursday night, despite tepid support elsewhere in Congress for many of its key provisions.

It was the first victory in any congressional committee for health reform.

The 11-6 vote came as Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, the chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, unveiled his own White House-style reform plan that dismayed Republicans who had expected him to take a less partisan tack.

"This really isn't the end. It's really the beginning," said Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., chairman of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee, moments before the vote.

Sen. James Jeffords, R-Vt., a liberal who was the sole Republican cosponsor of the original Clinton plan, joined the Democrats in voting for Kennedy's bill.

Both Democratic proposals would require employers to pick up 80 percent of the premiums for workers and their families, with the smallest businesses allowed

to pay a 1 or 2 percent payroll tax instead. Even some Democrats balked at the so-called employer mandates, and Republicans are almost unanimous against them.

## Gulf war vets win compensation

WASHINGTON — Prodded by veterans who say they have been forsaken by the nation they served, the Clinton administration endorsed a bill Thursday that would compensate victims of mysterious "Persian Gulf Syndrome" ailments.

"This legislation is revolutionary. We have never before provided payment for something we're not even certain exists," Veterans Affairs Secretary Jesse Brown told a House Veterans' Affairs panel.

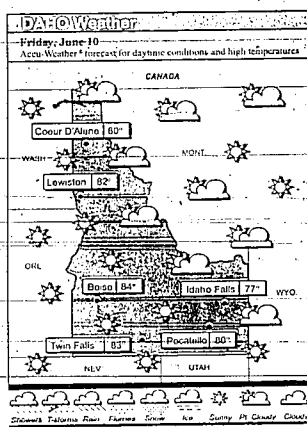
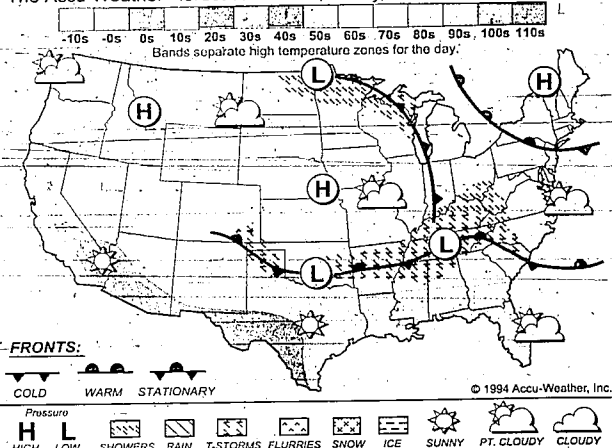
Brown said the administration backed the bill introduced by Rep. G.V. "Sonny" Montgomery, D-Miss., chairman of the full committee. He went one step further, saying a provision requiring veterans to show symptoms within one year of leaving the Gulf was too restrictive.

"We're heading in the right direction although we still have a long ways to go," said Phil Budahn, spokesman for the American Legion. He added that it took 15 years for similar action for Agent Orange victims after the Vietnam War.

## Hail, wind batter South while North shivers in record chill

Thunderstorms brought hail and high winds to parts of the South Thursday, while the North was hit with record cold.

Showers and thunderstorms developed along a front stalled across parts of the southern Plains, the lower Mississippi Valley and portions of the Southeast.

A thunderstorm in Florida produced a tornado north of Homestead, while another tornado formed in eastern Shelby County, Tenn., the National Weather Service said.

Hail as large as golf balls fell in Oklahoma near Goodwell and Eagletown. There also were reports of quarter-sized hail in parts of Oklahoma, Arkansas, Georgia, Mississippi, Alabama and Texas.

Strong winds accompanied the storms. Gusts of 70 mph

were recorded near Checotah, Okla., and 65 mph at Muskogee, Okla. Winds of 64 mph were recorded at Memphis, Tenn.

Winds caused damage — downed trees, power lines or damaged roofs — in Oklahoma, Arkansas and Alabama. Thunderstorm winds also damaged a plane at the airport in Sallisaw, Okla.

Some thunderstorms produced heavy rainfall. For the six hours ending at noon EDT, more than 1.25 inches fell at Muscle Shoals, Ala., while an inch fell at Bluefield, W.Va. More than .75 inch fell at Little Rock, Ark., and Pensacola, Fla., and more than .50 fell at Athens, Ga., and Fayetteville, Ark.

"He rolled down the window about four inches," Leonard said. Soliz said the window was open.

"The first thing I told him was we were frantically looking for a ride out, but he said he couldn't because of government regulations," Mattos said, adding that Soliz began edging away.

"The tears were just rolling down my face," Alyssa added. Soliz said the couple didn't appear to be in distress.

"I didn't come on like a crazy man," Leonard added. "I was very calm and collected."

Soliz said he was suspicious of a late-model car being in such a remote area. He was also unsure of the couple pleading with him for a ride.

"I don't know how a lawbreaker is supposed to look," he said. "I just can't tell."

Several illegal marijuana growers have been caught in the Sawtooth Forest's Cassia Division in recent years, and one man was hit with a shotgun blast at a pot patch in 1986, Oman said.

Soliz told the couple which way to hike for help, then drove away. "We were in total disbelief," Alyssa said. "At first we thought, 'We're saved,' then he's telling us it's four miles over the hill."

Added Leonard: "There was something about him that didn't seem too concerned, like it wasn't his problem to worry about."

Soliz drove back to the Sawtooth Forest office in Twin Falls and left a note for Oman, who is his boss. Soliz said he'd be at home if there were any other questions and left his phone number. He also left a highly detailed section of a U.S. Geological Survey map of the area — with the exact location of the Mattoses' car clearly marked.

The spot was in the Trout Creek

drainage, about four miles north of the Nevada state line.

Oman called the Cassia County Sheriff's Department around 7:30 p.m. and wound up speaking with Harkness. The deputy took the map information and the two men agreed that the location was clear, Oman said.

"He said he knew where this was," Oman said — and Harkness agreed.

"I'm not questioning Don's directions one bit," he said.

But Harkness said he didn't have a map in front of him when he was talking to Oman. The forest ranger used the intersection of Trout Creek and Little Harkness Road as a landmark, but Harkness said the intersection doesn't exist.

"I looked the grid coordinates up, but I couldn't find the intersection he was talking about," Harkness said. When one piece of information out of Kilter, Harkness said he began having doubts about the other coordinates that Oman provided.

"I am not sure if that's the exact spot where this car broke down," Harkness said Thursday. "I was not sure if the vehicle was in there."

Even so, Harkness estimated that he passed within eight or nine miles of the stalled vehicle. He said he stopped searching because he needed to speak with Soliz.

Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said his office tried repeatedly to call Soliz at home, but couldn't. Soliz said he and his family were home all night.

But the Mattoses weren't home that night. They spent the night of May 25 in the back seat of their car, terrified of the mountain lion they'd seen earlier.

At 7:30 a.m., they abandoned the car and started walking west — convinced that U.S. 93 was far away. They made it to the Pincey Cabin and headed north for a couple of miles,

then doubled-back to the cabin when the road appeared to be going the wrong way.

They entered the cabin and found a hat and a leaky canteen, which they took with them.

Then they walked southwest until Alyssa "basically gave up" at a crossroads at about 5:30 p.m. They'd walked 10 to 15 miles and seen no one since the previous day.

They rested in the shade of some roadside trees.

A pickup truck whizzed past, but it was gone before Leonard could flag it down.

Another truck approached and Mattos stood in the road and flagged it down. The driver, a ranch hand who spoke little English, said he had a lot of work and his boss would be angry if he picked up any hitchhikers.

Mattos was in no mood for another rejection. He flourished a \$10 note; the man said he could take them to a nearby ranch house.

At dusk on the second day of their odyssey, the Mattoses were dropped off at the home of Oakley-area rancher Will Bedke. Minutes later, Bedke arrived and drove the couple to an inn in Oakley.

The spent the night of May 26 in Oakley. The next day, a dehydrated Alyssa Mattos went to Cassia Memorial Hospital in Burley, where she spent the night.

While Alyssa was checking into the hospital, Leonard and an Oakley man were driving back into the hills to retrieve the stricken car. They towed it back to Oakley, where the man patched the gas tank.

"He was pretty fair about it," Mattos said. "The whole job — towing and fixing the tank — came to \$159."

Despite their ordeal, the couple said they still like Idaho and plan to retire to their place near Coeur d'Alene.

community, they will not succeed.

The Tokyo government has not backed off on its pledge to support sanctions, but it has ample reason to be nervous about the North.

"Japanese officials are worried about unrest among the nearly quarter-million North Koreans living in Japan, who funnel millions of dollars annually to their homeland."

Defense experts say major Japanese cities lie within range of the Rodong-1 missiles that North Korea has been test-launching.

A New York Times report Thursday said Japan was privately reluctant to seek sanctions. But Assistant

Secretary of State Robert Gallucci supports sanctions to Congress Thursday.

"There are no grounds for portraying U.S. and Japanese views as diverging on this issue," Gallucci told the House in a statement he said was endorsed by the Japanese government.

In Tokyo, however, officials counseled caution.

"We must avoid remarks that might incite North Korea," Foreign Minister Koji Kakizawa told lawmakers Thursday.

South Korea also received new threats from the North.

The military stance of the two Koreas, meanwhile, reflected rising political tensions.

South Korea's defense minister, Rhee Byong-tae, told lawmakers that in the 15 months since the standoff over North Korea's nuclear program began, the North has stockpiled military supplies, expanded underground facilities and deployed artillery and rocket launchers just north of the demilitarized zone.

The South-Korean-foreign minister, Han Sung-ho, and Chinese counterpart, Qian Qichen, met for two hours Thursday. Afterward, Chinese officials insisted that negotiations are the only way to proceed.

Clinton and Kennedy.

It includes a \$2-a-pack cigarette tax, a new 1 percent payroll tax on all employees with 500 or more workers and a 2.5 percent tax on all health insurance premiums to help pay for medical research and training. It would also levy a 50 percent excise tax on all handgun ammunition except .22 caliber.

On the other end of Capitol Hill, Rep. Sam M. Gibbons, D-Fla., got off to a late start at the helm of the House Ways and Means Committee after scrambling to make last minute changes in his own health reform package.

Gibbons, acting as chairman in place of Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., said the Congressional Budget Office disagreed with his staff over what it would cost to expand Medi-

care to cover the poor, the uninsured and workers in small businesses.

Gibbons' plan would raise tens of billions of dollars a year by making employers pay health premiums even if a worker were covered under a spouse's health plan. The government would hang on to a large chunk of those premiums from 1998 through 2001, and refund the rest to the employers footing the bill for the family policy.

Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole of Kansas said, "It doesn't look very good to me." And Sen. Malcolm Wallop, R-Wyo., called it "the worst imaginable. It takes the worst of Kennedy, the worst of Clinton and the worst of Chafee and puts them all together."

The Kennedy bill hews closely to the model that the White House laid out last year, with a mandate on

most employers to buy health insurance and a 1-to-2 percent payroll tax instead on those with 10 or fewer employees.

Moynihan would allow small businesses with up to 20 workers avoid buying insurance by paying a 1-to-2 percent payroll tax. But there would be a trigger imposing the mandate on those small businesses if they failed to cover 97 percent of their workers and dependents by the end of 1998 and 98.5 percent by the end of 2000.

The mandate is a key source of division in Congress, and both proposals would have to change radically to win wide support. Fundamental reservations about the administration's far-reaching approach to reform abound in Congress, and many lawmakers feel they can support only much more limited reforms.

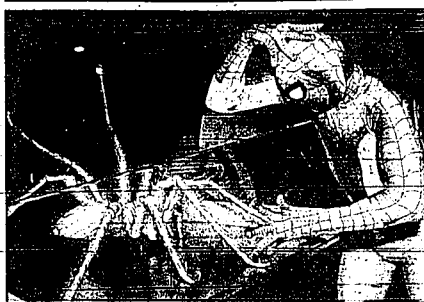

## Creepy, crawly show opens at Smithsonian

WASHINGTON (AP) — Anyone who has ever slipped foot into shoe on a dark, foggy morning will think twice after visiting the Smithsonian Institution's newest exhibit — where a deadly black widow spider can be viewed living in a boot.

One side of the boot is open, better to view the creature which seems to await an unsuspecting toe. Nearby, plastic-topped jewelry box, complete with jewelry, serves as cage for a threatening brown recluse.

Most people have a "shudder response" that makes them jump back involuntarily. That reflex will get a workout at the new exhibit — Spiders — opening Saturday at the National Museum of Natural History.

Exhibit curator Jonathan Coddington knows the reaction well. "Everyone has some sort of attitude about spiders, it seems. It doesn't leave anyone neutral," he said.

Coddington's exhibition combines displays of spider science, spider art, spider folklore and the kind of spider dread that sends creepy little sensations crawling up and down your spine.

Americans and Europeans seem to have more fear of spiders than other cultures, Coddington says, and at points, the displays feed on that reaction. There's a tropical wandering spider, shown wandering over some tasty-looking bananas, and Australia's deadly Sydney funnel-web is nearby.

Are there spiders that Coddington fears?

Well, he prefers the term "respect," and admits there are some he doesn't pick up. But he handles a lot of them in his work, has been bitten by a few.

"Spiders are about as different from humans as you can get, but they face many of the same problems. There is the need to find food, to find a mate, produce offspring, communi-

cate, provide a defense," says Coddington, chairman of the Department of Entomology at the museum.

He says he wants people to better understand spiders so they can appreciate the benefits provided by the eight-legged creatures.

For example, Coddington says people often call to ask how they can get rid of spiders — one subject he claims little knowledge about.

He tells them they have spiders in the house because they have bugs in the house, "spiders don't live on air. If they weren't there, you'd have a lot more insects."

The displays can help the fearful better understand spiders, showing the size range from 10 inches across to smaller than the head of a pin.

"You are always within three feet of a spider," one exhibit proclaims, showing their many living areas from inside homes to beneath snowpicks.

Spiders have a limited social life, Coddington admits, but they are social at least once in their lives, since it takes two to reproduce.

But, he notes, spiders often eat other spiders: so when a male and female meet "they have to have negotiations to determine whether it will be sex or food, and that can lead to misunderstandings."

Some 34,000 species of spiders have been identified and there are probably several times that number alive, says Coddington, who has traveled around the world studying them.

Web architecture is one of his favorite topics. The fancy geometric webs many people admire are really more primitive than those that seem more random, he says. The fancy ones have to be rebuilt every day and can make the spider prey for birds, while the sticky random ones last longer and can be more effective catching prey.

## Vote seeks arms for Bosnians

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a bipartisan slap at President Clinton, the House voted Thursday to force the United States to defund the international arms embargo on Bosnia.

The 244-178 vote means both the House and Senate are now on record behind opening the flow of arms to the Bosnian Muslim government over the objections of the Clinton administration, its NATO allies and Russia. The move came despite the appeals of three top defense and foreign policy officials sent to Capitol Hill by the president before the vote.

Turning Thursday's action into law will require further votes and negotiations between the House and Senate. But the vote put fresh pressure on the administration's policy of neutrality and negotiation between warring Muslim and Serb forces.

White House Press Secretary Dee Dee Myers said, "We'll see what Congress produces. It's not the final version."

Rep. Steny Hoyer, D-Md., a leader of the embargo-lifting effort, said, "For two years now, we have looked the (Serb) aggressor in the eye and said, 'If you go one step further we will take definitive action.' And they took some steps, and we backed up."

"There is an old, old historical lesson: Tyrants never respond to weakness," Hoyer said.

Leading the move to lift the embargo were Hoyer, the Democratic Caucus chairman, and David Bonior, the majority whip. They joined forces behind the amendment written by McCloskey and Ben Gilman, R-N.Y.

After the House voted to defy the arms embargo, it rejected 242-181 a substitute amendment by Hamilton to negate the previous vote and endorse the Clinton position.

The United Nations Security Council, with the support of the United States, imposed the embargo in September 1991. The idea was to keep weaponry in the region to a minimum and thus reduce the violence.

Clinton supports lifting the arms embargo but only if other allies agree. The House measure, passed as an amendment to a defense authorization bill that was approved last Thursday, directs the president to terminate the embargo. It also authorizes him to provide up to \$200 million in arms aid to Bosnia.

Defense Secretary William Perry, Gen. John Shalikshvili, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Deputy Secretary of State Strobe Talbott told about 100 lawmakers in a closed-door meeting Thursday that unilaterally lifting the arms embargo would settle peace efforts and carry consequences beyond Bosnia.

## Reporter, subject of story face attempted murder charge

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — As a journalist, he wrote the wrenching story of her struggle to raise a daughter with Down syndrome.

Now there's more to the story. Police say they were lovers, and that he tried to kill her sleeping husband as she watched, a baseball bat in her hands.

Michael Frazier was charged in a plot with Lisa Whedbee to kill John Whedbee with a butcher knife early Wednesday. Later in the day, Whedbee filed for divorce and a restraining order against his wife.

"This is just so sordid," said Dwight Van de Vate, a Knox County Sheriff's Department spokesman.

Frazier, lifestyles editor at The Oak Ridge in Oak Ridge, won an award for his 1993 Mother's Day story about the Whedbees and their 4-year-old daughter, Brittany, mentally retarded and bedridden since suffering a stroke in 1991.

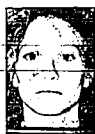
Frazier and the Whedbees attended Trinity United Methodist Church. She sang in the choir. Frazier, himself married, played the organ. Authorities also say she was apparently trapped in an abusive marriage and turned to Frazier for help.

Police say Mrs. Whedbee let Frazier into her Knoxville-area home and the two waited until her husband came home and went to sleep.

Whedbee, 33, an insurance agent, said he awoke to find a man standing over him with a butcher knife and struggled with him. Mrs. Whedbee stood by with a baseball bat and did nothing when her husband called for help, police said.

Whedbee broke free, grabbed the bat and ran. Police say he later identified his attacker as Frazier.

Frazier, 32, was charged with attempted murder and remained in custody Thursday in lieu of \$50,000 bond. Mrs. Whedbee, 31, was

charged with conspiracy to commit murder and released on \$50,000 bond Thursday.

Less than a week ago, Mrs. Whedbee obtained a protective order against her husband that allowed him to remain in the house. She claimed her husband of nearly 12 years had threatened and beaten her, but they agreed to try to work out their differences.

"If you have an abusive relationship, you've got two options — you stay or you leave," said Detective Dan Stewart said. "In her case, she stayed and she sought an option that some people end up doing."

Frazier told police he knew nothing about the attack, Van de Vate said. But Mrs. Whedbee "has been willing to talk to authorities," Van de Vate said, without elaborating.

Peter Esser, publisher of The Oak Ridge, a small afternoon newspaper 25 miles west of Knoxville, had no comment except to confirm Frazier is still an employee.

Frazier's article about the Whedbee family won the 1994 Malcolm Law Memorial Award for feature writing from the Tennessee Associated Press Managing Editors.

## Reno pushes crime measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic members of the House and Senate who will try to write a compromise crime bill lunched Thursday with Attorney General Janet Reno in a session described as a "pep rally" to move action on the measure.

President Clinton said in April that he wanted to sign the measure by Memorial Day, but House and Senate conferees have not yet met, and there is no start date scheduled.

The bill is likely to contain provisions for 100,000 more police on the beat, billions of dollars for prisons and crime prevention and dozens of new death penalties.

A Justice Department official called the lunch a pep rally designed "to rally the troops" and give Reno the chance to emphasize that no one issue should delay the bill.

# U.S. prepares for Japan's royalty

WASHINGTON (AP) — No longer a god, Emperor Akihito of Japan will present a common touch on a visit to the United States designed to ease his country's image as America's toughest economic competitor.

During a 10-day U.S. visit that begins today in Atlanta, Akihito will visit schools and museums and be feted at the White House. He'll even shake hands. But don't ask him about politics or trade.

The visit of Akihito and Empress Michiko "has no political or diplomatic purpose other than to promote friendship and goodwill between our two peoples," said Takakazu Kuregama, Japan's ambassador to the United States.

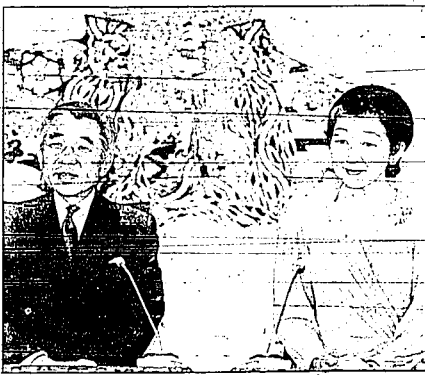
The Japanese constitution, drafted by American occupiers after World War II, declared that the emperor derived his position "from the will of the people" and limited his role to ceremonial functions. No longer was he regarded as a direct descendant of the sun goddess.

Emperor Hirohito, the wartime leader who was the immediate target of the new constitution which took effect in 1947, died in 1989. His son Akihito was born in 1933. When Hirohito died in January 1989, after the longest reign in history, Akihito succeeded him.

The new constitution stripped the emperor of much of his power and his claim to divinity, but nonetheless, his birthday remains a national holiday in Japan and rules of protocol are many and rigid.

President Clinton will mark the emperor's visit Monday with a 21-gun salute, a formal review of troops on the South Lawn and the first white-tie state dinner of his administration.

At dinner, the president will toast

Akihito, who will respond with remarks, not-a-toast: "The emperor does not return toasts," said an official in the State Department protocol office.

When he and the president meet Monday morning at the White House, might trade relations or North Korea's nuclear program come up?

"No," said the ambassador. "Given the constitutional role of the emperor, there is no possibility that they will be discussing such questions."

The purpose is image polishing.

"There is a general desire on the part of the Japanese to freshen up their appearance here in the United States where they are smart enough to realize the general perception of Japan has suffered in recent years," said Stephen Bosworth, president of the U.S.-Japan Foundation.

"I don't think he is coming with a concrete political agenda," said Bosworth. "It's largely a ceremonial event. A lot of Americans will still get a certain amount of excitement from being closer to a living god."

Michel Oksenberg, president of the East-West Center in Honolulu, said the importance of the visit is that it comes "at a juncture in our relations that is critical. More important than that it comes at a time of generational change in the leadership of both of our countries."

The couple's itinerary includes a dozen cities and meetings with two former presidents — Carter and Reagan. They'll stop by several Japanese-American cultural and social institutions.

From Atlanta, where the royal couple will have lunch with Carter and visit the Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change, they will travel to Charleston, S.C., and then go on to Washington.

In the U.S. capital, they'll visit the Freer Gallery to observe the restoration of Japanese art and stop at a center for the handicapped.

In the Washington suburb of Great Falls, Va., the emperor and empress will spend an hour at an elementary school at which students take science courses taught in Japanese.

Will the emperor shake hands with Americans he meets on his journey? "Of course," said an embassy spokesman.

"Their majesties are a very out-reaching couple," said the ambassador. The emperor even had an American tutor.

"Of course, the emperor has a duty to maintain some of the old traditions of imperial life," he said.

One of those is an arms-length relationship with the news media. When he held a news conference in Japan to discuss his trip to America, reporters were required to submit written questions in advance.

## Remaining twin dies year after operation

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Angela Lakeberg, the Siamese twin whose sister was sacrificed to give her a slim chance at life, died Thursday morning just short of her first birthday.

Angela never left the hospital and doctors never managed to wean her from a ventilator. Her lung problems worsened dramatically in the 24 hours before she died at 1 a.m.

No relatives were there when she died, said Beatrice Parker, spokeswoman for the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. "Angela Lakeberg was a sweet little girl," said Dr. Russell C. Raphael, the hospital's director of critical care. "The staff was quite fond of her and we were all pulling for her."

Angela's father, Kenneth Lakeberg, has had a series of legal problems. Facing an auto theft charge, he was transferred today from a drug rehabilitation center to the Jasper County, Ind., jail in northwest Indiana where the family lives. His wife, Reitha, was with her parents near Roselawn, Ind.

Angela and Amy Lakeberg were born joined at the chest on June 29, 1993, at a hospital near Chicago. They shared a deformed heart and fused liver.

Doctors at the Illinois hospital opposed separation, saying there was no reason to put the twins through the ordeal when there was little chance either would survive. The bill for Angela's medical care has topped \$1 million at Children's alone.

Without surgery, both probably

would have died in a few months, doctors said.

The Lakebergs said they were willing to test the odds of surgery. The twins were transferred to Children's Hospital and separated Aug. 20 during a 5½-hour operation in which Amy died.

Because the two shared a single heart, it was known all along that one would not survive. Doctors said Amy was sacrificed because the anatomy of their organs gave Angela the better chance.

Relatives were notified Wednesday night that Angela had worsened and had been resuscitated twice. "I'm sure that the family wants the doctors," said Michael O'Dor of Portage, Ind., Mrs. Lakeberg's brother. "And at least Angela got the best care available and she got the best care that anyone could have gotten."

Mrs. Lakeberg was "in no condition" to talk today, said her mother, Reitha Studer. "It's going to be a bad time for a while," she said. "We can't handle this right now."

Lakeberg, 27, shifted focus from his daughters' plight days after the operation when stories surfaced that he had used money donated for them to buy cocaine.

At one point, he admitted he spent up to \$1,300 on a three-day cocaine binge just days before the surgery. "I lost control of myself," he said.

Then, in October, he was imprisoned for violating probation. He had been put on probation for injuring his cousin in a fight the previous year. He was released in April.

## Investigators find harassment at Treasury

WASHINGTON (AP) — Workers at the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms endured sexual harassment, including lewd comments and unwanted touching, because they feared retaliation if they complained, according to Treasury Department investigators.

Many employees of the law enforcement agency came to believe that "managers abused their authority by retaliating, harassing or intimidating the work force," investigators found.

In some cases examined by Treasury's Office of Inspector General, workers tolerated years of sexual harassment, including didles left on their desks and unwanted physical contact. Some who did

speak out became the targets of counter-complaints or were transferred against their wishes, investigators said.

Two separate investigative reports by Treasury, completed in May, were obtained by The Associated Press under the Freedom of Information Act. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms is an agency within the Treasury Department.

The probe was undertaken by Treasury's inspector general in response to a January 1993 report on CBS' "60 Minutes," which said the bureau had failed to prevent sexual harassment and had retaliated against those who filed complaints.

On Thursday, Jack Killorin, a

bureau spokesman, said in response to the investigators' findings: "We asked the inspector general to please get involved in this process and are grateful for the view and advice they've given us. We've concurred overwhelmingly with the recommendations."

The bureau has agreed to a number of changes, including setting guidelines on when it is appropriate to investigate alleged misconduct and publicizing to employees the procedures for reporting such incidents.

The bureau also is in the process of establishing "diversity peer groups" to deal with concerns of women, blacks and other minority groups and is naming an ombuds-

man to handle internal issues.

Among the investigated cases, according to Treasury's files, one criminal investigator who filed a sexual harassment complaint found himself facing a 30-day suspension for "engaging in repeated criminal conduct" — because he had pleaded guilty three times to failing to control his barking dog. The suspension was recommended by the boss he had accused of harassment.

In general terms, investigators found that "manipulation of investigative systems, inconsistent management practices, poor communication and a lack of information to management information contributed to a work environment that did not inspire trust or elicit high morale."

## Dole softens stand, lends North his blessing, \$5,000

WASHINGTON (AP) — Four days after snubbing Oliver North's candidacy, Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole bestowed an endorsement and a \$5,000 campaign contribution on his party's nominee for a Senate seat from Virginia.

"I told Ollie that I will do everything possible to assist in his election to the U.S. Senate," Dole said Thursday in a statement issued after an hour-long meeting. "Including, of course, campaigning for him in Virginia."

Dole's comments marked a change from Sunday, the day after North won his party's convention to challenge Democratic Sen. Charles Robb in November. Asked in a televised interview whether Republicans should unite behind North, Dole replied, "I think it's going to take a while to sort that out."

He noted that two independents —

one Republican and one Democrat — might enter the race — and said, "It makes it very difficult for some in the Republican Party."

Dole's weekend comments drew criticism from some Republicans, who said a principal political objective for the party this fall is to gain a Senate majority. In a brief statement issued after his meeting with North, the GOP leader said: "We need 51 Republicans in the Senate so Republicans can help set the agenda for America, and help change course from the Clinton administration's big tax, big spending, big government programs."

For his part, North issued a statement saying he and Dole had a "very productive, cordial meeting this morning. I welcome his full support and look forward to having him join me on the campaign trail in the near future."

## Judge awards Titanic salvage

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — A salvage group has won title as sole owner of the wreck of the Titanic.

U.S. District Judge J. Calvitt Clarke Jr. signed an order saying anything recovered from the sunken liner belongs to RMS Titanic Inc., formerly Titanic Ventures Inc.

Arnie Geller, president and chief executive officer of New York-based RMS Titanic, called Wednesday's decision "a great day" in the history of the Titanic. The liner which sank

April 15, 1912, after striking an iceberg on its maiden voyage, killing more than 1,500 people.

The wreckage was found in 1985 about 400 miles south of Newfoundland and Titanic Ventures salvaged about 1,800 articles in 1987.

But in 1992, another salvager, Marex-Titanic Inc. of Memphis, Tenn., sought claim to the wreck, arguing that RMS Titanic had abandoned the site.

### 'On the spot' suspension may prevent accidents

The best part of Idaho's new "on the spot" license suspension law is its zero-tolerance policy for underage drinkers. It sends an unmistakable message that Idaho won't tolerate teen-agers drinking and driving.

The new law, taking effect July 1, lets police immediately take away the license of a driver caught with a blood-alcohol content over .10 percent. That policy should help reduce Idaho's number of alcohol-related accidents (981 in 1993, including 85 fatalities).

Better still, the law is even stricter for drivers under age 21. For those drivers, an alcohol level of .02 is enough for a license suspension. How much alcohol is .02? For the average teen-ager, one beer probably could do it.

That's good. Teen-agers are relatively inexperienced with cars and equally inexperienced with alcohol. Tackling both challenges at once is an invitation to trouble, as many youthful youngsters have learned.

Instant suspension is an excellent incentive for young drivers to stay sober. Losing a driver's license, that precious ticket to mobility, is a bitter penalty for a teen-ager.

It's damned inconvenient for adults,

too. So the threat of automatic suspension should cause adult drivers to moderate their drinking.

But the new law has one weakness. A little thing like a suspended license won't keep a chronic drunken driver off the road.

Courthouses are full of files on guys who rack-up DUIs until they lose their licenses, then drive without legal privileges. Only jail sentences can get some of those menaces off the road, and then only for a while.

The new law may accelerate the steps of that process, but it can't solve the problem.

One other caution: Dispensing punishment without a trial first is a little disturbing.

The law does allow for an administrative hearing, but the rule's intent seems clear. Suspension will be swift, sure, and largely free of loopholes.

Punishment without trial is a risky business in a democracy. Idaho legislators should keep an eye on the program to make sure no innocent people's rights get stepped on.

Having stated that caveat, however, we think the new law is largely a positive step. If it takes some drunken drivers off the road — especially, drunken teens — it will be worthwhile.

#### What the law does

Starting July 1, here's what will happen if you're caught driving under the influence:

- The police officer will take your license, on the spot.
- You can apply for a 30-day temporary permit, and you can contest the suspension in an administrative hearing.
- For a first offense, you'll lose your license for 90 days. (You can apply for a restricted driving permit for the last 60 days of that.)
- For two offenses in a five-year period, you'll lose your license for a year — with absolutely no driving privileges.

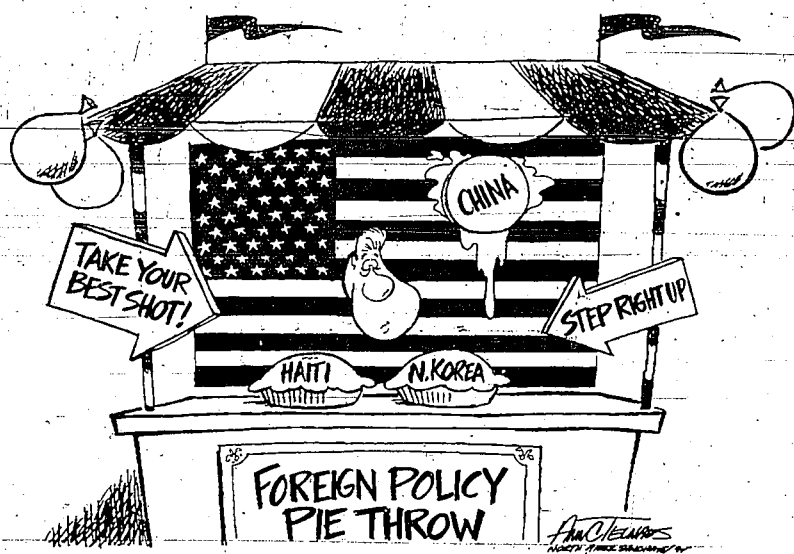
### Thank you, for all the support

## Rally up for health-care reform

OK, team, this is it — rally time. Now or never on health-care reform, and only about four weeks left for you to have any say in how it comes out. The bills are in committee, they're getting down to the lick-log, it's deal-buttin' time.

Remember, you don't have to understand the details of any of the proposals — what your member of Congress needs to hear from you is just what your experience with the current health-care system has been: What happened when you lost your job, what happened when your brother-in-law was in a car wreck, how about your neighbor whose wife got cured of cancer but now he can't leave for a better job because she has a "pre-existing condition"? Just tell them your stories.

"Rep. Joe Doaks, The Capitol, Washington, D.C." and a 29-cent stamp can save you a world of money, worry and pain.

As I've already noted, what Congress does most easily is nothing. The hardest thing to find in Washington, D.C., is that thin sliver of daylight in the wall of obstruction that prevents anything from getting done.

Congress has a majority in favor of health-care reform but, as yet, no majority in favor of any single plan. The hardest thing for them to do is to get a majority to pass a bill that would take effect on Jan. 1, 1995.

That's why they need to hear from their constituents. The only thing that will get them off the dime and their dufls is voter pressure. Believe me, it works.

The funny thing is that as they get down to comparing and contrasting this portion of one plan with the same portion of another, the better single-party looks. That's the one with 92 co-sponsors in the House, and if they'd just pass it as the working model

from which to compromise down, we'd be a lot better off.

The key points in health-care reform are universal coverage, the freedom to choose your own doctor and effective cost control. Cost control is probably what they'll have the most trouble with because anything short of single-payer offers only fifty cent control.

As part of health-care reform, we should also insist on ways to get more general practitioners and nurse practitioners and fewer specialists because the specialists are the ones who really drive up costs.

Primary care — getting a child to a doctor before the kid gets so sick that he needs a zillion dollars' worth of life-saving treatment — has to be one of the goals here. In terms of financing health-care reform, here's the real reason to regret that Rep. Dan Rostenkowski is allegedly a petty crook. Rostenkowski was the only guy around with clout who would talk about taxes to finance this thing.

When you start moaning at the mention of the T-word, keep in mind that taxes to finance health-care reform will be in lieu of, not in addition to, what you are currently paying for health care. The best answer is a broad-based combination of sales and income taxes, but you know how politicians get the fatheads when taxes are mentioned. The Republicans would immediately cast themselves in the role of your heroic defenders, up there to save you from those tax-loving Democrats (thus, of course, costing you a bundle in the long run, and even the short run).

But with Rostenkowski gone, the best bet

is employer mandates, which actually aren't a very good idea in terms of the total economy. They're like a tax on employment, which we don't need with people out of work, and they hit small business harder.

And, of course, they do nothing for the unemployed. However, employer mandates are the deal-killer that some of the obstructionists keep insisting they are. There are various ways to protect small businesses. For one thing, they could form their own giant health-insurance co-op, and for another thing, when Hawaii instituted employer mandates almost two decades ago, the roof did not fall in on small business in Hawaii.

I suggest that you regard the screams of terror now emanating from small business with some skepticism.

Speaking of small businesses, here's a lovely item I found in The Washington Monthly: According to a study done by the Harvard Medical School Center for National Health, 49 percent of workers employed by doctors with their own practices are not offered health insurance. Thanks, doc.

Politically, health-care reform is dicey right now. What you need to remind your representatives in Congress is that they are going to be held responsible not just for what they do but for what they don't do, as well. These folks already rank below morticians in public esteem (no offense to you morticians).

All we need is to spend the summer working these folks trying to write the most important piece of social legislation in 60 years and then screw it up so badly that they can't even produce a law. That'll make 'em all real popular come election time.

Whereas they get nothing but love, praise and hallelujahs for doing the right thing.

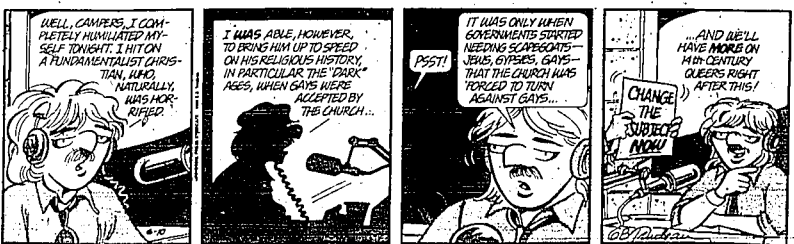

### Battlefronts quiet down in Bosnia

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina — Most of Bosnia's battlefronts were quieter Thursday on the eve of another attempt at a nationwide ceasefire.

There were reports of sporadic fighting, especially around the Serb-held town of Doboj about 60 miles north of Sarajevo.

But U.N. officials said fighting eased in most other areas, including northeastern Bosnia, where government troops recently have made modest gains against Serbs.

Maj. Daere Holloway, a U.N. spokesman in Sarajevo, said the fronts appeared to be even quieter than on Wednesday, when the warring parties agreed on the one-month ceasefire, beginning at noon today.

### N. Yemen president declares cease-fire

SANA'A, Yemen — The northern Yemen president declared a unilateral cease-fire on Thursday — the second this week — but the breakthrough south claimed his troops broke it by launching a surprise attack hours later.

It was not possible to independently verify the south's claim and there was no immediate reaction to the charge from northern leaders.

The impoverished nation of 14 million people on the tip of the Arabian peninsula has been embroiled in civil war since May 4, after months of skirmishes between northern and southern forces.

The fighting shattered the tense 4-year-old union between conservative North Yemen and socialist South Yemen. The south formally seceded two weeks later.

### Judge acquits 3 alleged member of IRA

DUESSELDORF, Germany — A German court on Thursday acquitted three alleged members of an IRA hit squad accused of gunning down a British army major in front of his wife in 1990.

Judge Wolfgang Steffen said prosecutors failed to prove the guilt of Donna Maguire, Sean Hick and Paul Hughes. The three had been charged with collective murder and attempted murder for attacks in Germany and the Netherlands that prosecutors said were committed by an IRA hit squad.

While all three were probably IRA members and led conspiratorial lives in Germany, "there is no proof they were the assassins," Steffen said.

### NATO allows Russia into program

ISTANBUL, Turkey — NATO invited Russia to join in an extensive program of military and political cooperation Thursday, but stressed the West's former arch-enemy cannot have a say in alliance policy-making.

It also assured the rest of Eastern Europe that NATO's wish for closer ties with Moscow did not signal a new Yalta accord to divide the European continent, as happened in 1945.

"Good, cooperative relations between NATO and Russia will be a key element for security and stability in Europe," Secretary of State Warren Christopher and his NATO colleagues said after a one-day meeting.

### Mexico receives money for environment

WASHINGTON — The World Bank Thursday approved \$918 million in loans to help Mexico tackle some of its most pressing environmental problems.

The loans are the first under an agreement signed by the World Bank and Mexican government last year that would provide Mexico with as much as \$1.8 billion in loans for environmental protection over the next three years.

"The Mexican government is committed to rapid and effective progress in upgrading environmental enforcement and reversing past damage," said David de Ferranti, chief of the World Bank's Mexico division.

### Prison riots end; demands are met

MEXICALI, Mexico — Two days of riots at the 1,200-inmate prison in this border town ended peacefully, the government said, announcing that it agreed to demands to replace the warden and some guards.

All inmates were back in their cells late Wednesday, a man who identified himself as an administrator said in a telephone call to the prison.

"Order is beginning to be restored," said Federico Garcia Estrada, a human rights official for the state of Baja California. Estrada helped negotiate an end to the standoff.

# Powerful quake rocks Americas

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — A powerful, unusually deep earthquake centered in Bolivia rocked much of South America and was felt as far away as Canada.

There were no reports of casualties or major damage.

"This is the first time in memory that this has happened, where a quake that far south in South America has been felt up here," said Bruce Presgrave of the U.S. Geological Survey's National Earthquake Information Center in Golden, Colo.

The 8.2 magnitude quake Wednesday night was centered in a sparsely populated area 200 miles northwest of La Paz.

But because it occurred about 400 miles underground, where rocks are more elastic, the shock waves traveled for thousands of miles, said seismologist Jim Mori of the U.S. Geological Survey.

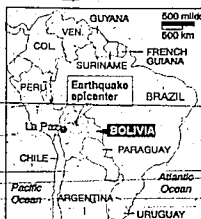
In the Bolivian capital of La Paz, hundreds of people fled swaying buildings Wednesday night. But there was no apparent damage Thursday and utilities were not affected.

Chilean police said thousands took to the streets in panic in northern Chile. Power and telephone lines were cut in several cities.

TV Globo, the largest Brazilian television network, reported a large tremor in southern Brazil but no damage or casualties. There were also reports of damage to some buildings in the capital, Brasilia, and in Sao Paulo.

But because the quake was so deep, "there pretty much won't be much damage," Mori said.

The quake was felt as far away as Toronto. Some residents in high-rise



apartments said they saw objects shake for a few seconds. "We just felt the building move from side to side," said Cindy Hill of Toronto.

There were also reports of tremors in California and throughout the Midwest, including Iowa, South Dakota, Nebraska and Minnesota.

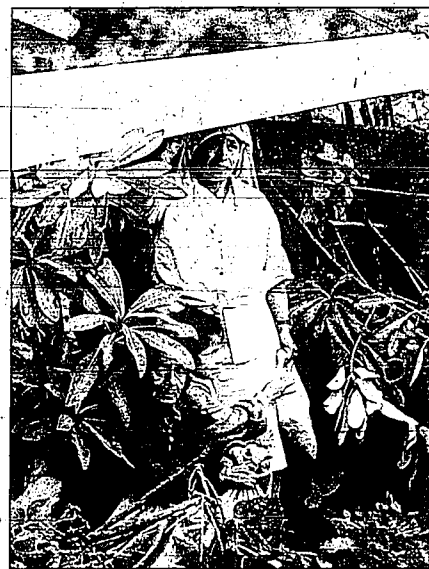
Pat Gill in Sioux City, Iowa, said he "felt a steady bump" while working on the 12th floor of a downtown office building.

"I went out to look at the water cooler," he said. "It was spooky to see the water shaking back and forth."

But the quake lost much of its force as the shock waves traveled from the epicenter, and most people in the United States probably didn't feel it, Mori said.

"The reverberations from the waves will continue for days," he said, but there will be fewer aftershocks than the thousands from more shallow quakes.

A quake of magnitude 7 is capable of widespread, heavy damage, and a magnitude 8 quake can cause tremendous damage.

## Survivors plead for help amid aftershocks

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Hundreds of survivors of an earthquake and massive avalanche removed hundreds of mountainside homes that buried villages Thursday as the government conceded its relief effort was proceeding slowly.

"There are many people without shelter, a lot of misery, abandoned children and orphans, and the job that must be done is enormous," National Police Chief Gen. Octavio Vargas said.

An Indian leader put the death toll from Monday's 6.4 magnitude earthquake at more than triple the government's confirmed count of 253.

Carlos Alberto Sanchez, vice president of the Regional Indian Council of Cauca, said at least 800 people died in the earthquake and ensuing avalanche that roared down the slopes of Nevado del Huila, an 18,975-foot-high volcano, onto dozens of Indian villages.

Hundreds of people spent their third night in the open as aftershocks rattled the region, 180 miles southwest of Bogota.

"We need the government to take us out of here!" shouted an enraged Indian man in Toez on Wednesday, shaking a carved wooden tribal staff adorned with feathers and a small

Columbian flag. "We are afraid the mountain will swallow us."

The national police chief said rescuers were hampered by the remoteness of the region — accessible only by helicopter — and the sheer number of people needing help.

About 70 children who had become separated from their parents were ferried by helicopter to Belalcázar, a village damaged by the quake and avalanche, and put up in a hospital, a school and in tents.

Helicopters delivered food and water and evacuated survivors, with children and the injured having priority.

Rain and low clouds kept the choppers grounded for three hours Wednesday, hampering what was an already slow operation, said Associated Press photographer Fernando Llano, who returned from the disaster site Wednesday night.

"The Aid, Another Disaster," declared El Tiempo, Colombia's most widely read newspaper, in a headline Thursday.

Estimates of the missing ranged up to 1,500, but officials said many may be alive and just unaccounted for. The government said about 2,000 people were left homeless.

## Kigali reveals more killings

KIGALI, Rwanda (AP) — Another massacre.

The word has come to symbolize the Rwandan conflict. This time it involves nine Roman Catholic priests and 63 others killed in the capital.

The United Nations said Thursday it had received reliable reports confirming earlier witness accounts of a massacre that occurred late Monday or early Tuesday in the Nyamirambo district of the city, a southwestern quarter now the scene of some of the heaviest fighting.

The news came just a day after Rwandan rebel radio reported that 13 other Rwandan clergymen, including the Roman Catholic archbishop of Kigali and two bishops, were killed by four rebel soldiers assigned to guard them.

That information was confirmed by a rebel leader conducting cease-fire talks here.

"We are also very, very concerned by what happened," said Col. Frank Mugambage, referring to an incident near Kibagayi, 30 miles west of Kigali. "We are ready to admit it was done by some of our misguided soldiers."

He said one of the soldiers was shot and killed by other rebel groups and three others fled.

Pope John Paul II said he was "profoundly upset" by the Kibagayi massacre, referring to the victims as "the find in heaven" and that their well-loved land denied them.

The Vatican did not comment on the deaths in Kigali.

## Gunman attacks 4 fishermen; 1 dead

**BIG BEAR LAKE, Calif. (AP)** — A gunman killed a fisherman and wounded another during a robbery, and apparently eluded a manhunt in this mountain resort, authorities said.

The gunman and another man fled in a car that crashed on a winding stretch of highway about 70 miles east of Los Angeles, said Sgt. Rick Carr of the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department. The victims' wallets were inside the car.

Sheriff's helicopters, tracking dogs and deputies searched for the pair in the thickly forested San Bernardino Mountains, Carr said. The backwoods search was called off Thursday morning, and authorities speculated the two may have gotten a ride out of the area.

Armen Shakkharian, 47, was killed Wednesday morning

and his friend, Sarkis Aytozian, 28, was shot in the torso. Two other companions were unharmed. Aytozian was listed in good condition after undergoing surgery.

The fishermen were asleep at the lake's Boulder Bay when they were awakened about 5 a.m. by a man knocking on their car window, Carr said.

When the driver rolled down the window, the man pointed a handgun at the men and demanded money.

"After complying, the guy starts to walk away from the car and he turns and fires at the rear of the car. He fired multiple rounds," Carr said.

The shots blasted a large hole in the rear window of the station wagon. The victims drove to a trailer park and reported the shooting.

## Judge overturns Playboy ban

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — A federal judge overturned a ban on sexually explicit magazines at county fire stations Thursday, ruling the First Amendment gives firefighters the right to read such publications.

U.S. District Judge Stephen Wilson said Los Angeles County failed to show that the "quiet reading" of Playboy magazine creates a sexually harassing atmosphere.

"The present policy presents a particularly severe limitation on the plain-

tiff's First Amendment rights," Wilson said.

The judge said his ruling didn't mean firefighters may make lewd comments about a magazine's content or display pictures to unwilling viewers.

County Fire Capt. Steven W. Johnson said in December asking the court to overturn the 2-year-old policy that banned magazines such as Playboy, Penthouse and Playgirl from fire stations.

**HAMILTON, Mont.** — Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., had said it seven times in the last hour, but he tried once more:

"The Clinton health plan will not be enacted. I do not favor the Clinton plan as written — that's the English language. I do not favor it."

The crowd in the tiny Marcus Daly Memorial Hospital cafeteria here grumbled. Some rolled their eyes. Some left the room. Others angrily said they were confused about what Congress was trying to do with the health care system and had little confidence the White House could manage something so complex.

"Can you hear the fear in the room?" growler J. Strahan asked Baucus, a three-term senator who is a co-sponsor of the Clinton plan.

"The fear of having something happen to us that we're not ready for and you're not ready for. I'd like to know what the solutions are before you vote for it."

"I can't see how Clinton can figure this out," concluded Charlie Moody, who builds hot tubs. "He can't even figure out the White House."

Baucus, the second-ranking Democrat on the Senate Finance Committee, spent much of this congressional recess — the last before the committee hopes to adopt a health care plan — trying to reassure Montanans that Congress will not enact the plan he co-sponsored.

"Distancing himself from a plan he thinks is 'intellectually logical' was the only way to get constituents 'to suspend judgment for a nanosecond' and consider changes he believes the

state badly needs," Baucus said. Public opinion "has never been as intense and opposed."

Montana might seem the perfect candidate for rural health care reform. One of 12 people has no health insurance, and consumer health costs rose 400 percent faster than average wages in the last 10 years, according to state officials.

There is not a single doctor in nine of its 56 counties and the state spends more on the Medicaid program for the poor than it does on its two universities.

Montana has not ignored the problem. Last year the state legislature sent a bill to the state's Health Care Authority to come up with state reform recommendations, including assessing the viability of a tax-financed, single-payer system similar to Canada's.

Pat Williams D, the state's only U.S. representative, chairs the House Education and Labor health subcommittee, which recently passed an amended version of the Clinton plan. Polls show Williams a strong front-runner in the November elections but all his Republican challengers in Tuesday's primary have vowed to make the similarities between Williams' plan and the president's an issue.

Likewise, the Senate race of first-term Republican Conrad Burns, who favors incremental reform, pits him against three Democrats who also have distanced themselves to vary-

ing degrees from the White House on health care.

"The American people are expecting some kind of reform, but they don't know what kind," Burns said.

"When you talk about universal coverage, there's always someone in the back of the room who says, 'Now, how you going pay for it?' The silence is deafening."

In the three health care meetings Baucus has held during the recess, many Montanans have expressed strongly held perceptions about how the Clinton plan would work and how it would affect them.

Time and again, people told Baucus that under the Clinton proposal, doctors would work for the gov-

ernment, which would, in turn, own the hospitals. Neither proposition is true, Hazel Brann, of Missoula, said the plan would allow no hip replacements or chemotherapy for older people. There is no such provision in the plan.

Gloria Branscome, of Kalispell, said the government was lying about the 40 million uninsured. "I don't believe that figure at all," she said. Roger Kehew, a lawyer, stomped out of the meeting in Kalispell before Baucus concluded his explanation of the Clinton plan, his pledge not to vote for it, and his careful explanation of possible solutions.

"I don't like being lied to," said Kehew, who said he voted for

Clinton but then had to "repent before God" for his vote. "This is socialism. I don't believe what he's saying. I believe in the Constitution," he said in the hallway.

In Kalispell, where citizens have forced a ballot referendum on whether to eliminate a newly created county building permits department after it began to require permits for building modifications, many people are still furious with Baucus for voting for the Brady law, which requires a five-day waiting period for background checks before gun purchases.

Baucus had armed federal escorts for his first trip home after the vote. "Does anyone agree we don't need universal coverage?" pilot Larry Lane asked Baucus. "We don't need universal coverage. I don't think anywhere the Constitution guarantees medical coverage."

Baucus made the trip home to try to identify Montanans' "comfort level" with the myriad new laws and regulations he will be asked to vote on in the coming weeks as the Finance Committee prepares its health care legislation. But it was clear he was also searching for his own comfort zone, too.

"The real question is, 'What, if anything, should we do as a country about all this?'" Baucus asks the 100 people who showed up at Kalispell's Outlaw Inn to talk about health care. "We can do nothing, that's an option.... We could do wage and price controls... change the tax code so health costs aren't deductible... let managed care groups organize like they're doing... premium caps..."

## Groups target expansion plans for Grand Targhee Ski Resort

**DRIGGS (AP)** — Three groups say they intend to appeal the expansion of Grand Targhee Ski and Summer Resort a few days before the U.S. Forest Service is expected to give it the official go-ahead.

In April, the Forest Service, owner of the land in the Wyoming resort near the Idaho border, approved a plan for ski lift and building expansion.

A 45-day appeal period on the environmental impact statement on the project

expires Wednesday and if no appeals are filed, those plans become final.

But a Jackson, Wyo.-based conservation group, another one in Driggs, and the Teton County, Wyo., commissioners all say they have problems with the plans, which have been in the making for three years.

"It feels like we're starting all over again," resort owner Mary Bergmeyer said Wednesday. "My feeling is that the public is reneging on the public process."

Jeane Klobnak of the Jackson Hole Alliance for Responsible Planning said she hopes her group's cautions can be resolved without holding up the first phase of work.

Bergmeyer said his first step would be the replacement of the main chair lift with a new high-speed quadruple lift.

Klobnak said her group is concerned about the environmental consequences of putting new lifts and a restaurant on Peaked Mountain, adjacent to the existing lifts on Fred's Mountain.

The Jackson Hole Alliance also wants more studies on the resort's effect on wildlife and the nearby Juddiah Smith Wilderness.

Teresa deGroh, senior planner for Teton County, Wyo., said the county intends to appeal to clarify that it will not take over the access road to the resort. She also said the environmental statement needs to better

address employee housing.

"The county is going to appeal, but the commissioners indicated that they felt these are pretty resolvable issues," she said.

Lou Parri, president of Citizens for Teton Valley in Driggs, said his organization has many of the same concerns as the Jackson Alliance.

"Our goal right now is to simply protect the resource, not hamper expansion," he said.

## Test scores down

### 6th grade slips; 8th, 11th grades remain stable

TWIN FALLS — Standardized test scores for Twin Falls sixth-graders slipped this year, but school district officials say they are not alarmed by the numbers.

Results of the national Iowa Test of Basic Skills showed eighth-graders remained steady in comparison to the national average, while 11th-grade results in the Tests of Achievement and Proficiency (TAP) slipped one point.

"Generally speaking, our students are at or above the national average" in the tested areas, especially in the sixth and 11th grades, said Larry Watson, community relations specialist for the Twin Falls School District.

Students in the sixth and eighth grades took the tests in March to evaluate skills in reading, vocabulary, language, work and study skills, and math. High school juniors took the tests in February.

Scores are calculated on a percentile system that shows how students in Idaho and in individual schools compare with the score one would expect students to make nationally.

Last year, Idaho sixth-graders scored in the 50th percentile on the overall test; that slipped to the 46th percentile this year.

Twin Falls sixth-graders slipped three points, but still rank in the 67th percentile overall.

Watson said a host of factors can account for changes in test scores.

"Standardized tests don't test all we teach, and we don't teach everything that's tested," he said.

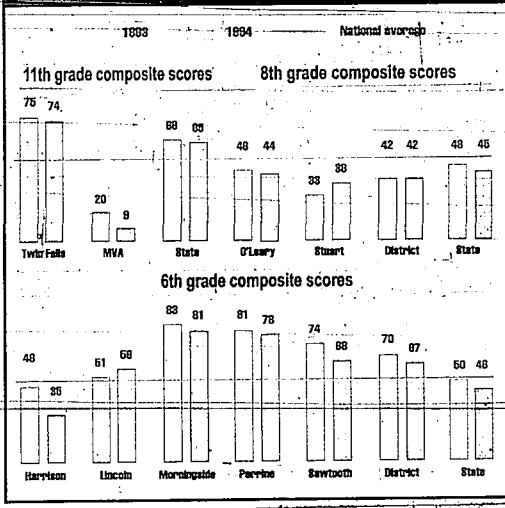
School officials look at four factors when evaluating why test scores change: curriculum, instructional methods and models, the learning character of students, and testing procedures.

Parents should look at their own student's scores and confer to the school to find out the reason for any significant increase or decrease, Superintendent Terrell Donich said.

Variations between schools — Harrison Elementary scored in the 35th percentile, while Morningside hit 81 — do not indicate one school is better than another, Donich said.

Those variations are due primarily to differences in the student population, he said.

Last year, for instance, the district found that few students from high-achieving Morningside were new to the district.

Across town at Harrison, the number of new students, especially those for whom English is a second language, was much higher, Donich said.

"You've got to be real careful how much weight you place on these tests," he said.

But detailed analyses of the scores can give district officials insight into areas of the curriculum that need improving.

## Reservoirs will go dry this year

TWIN FALLS — Record low levels of snowpack virtually across the state in 1994 is expected to leave reservoirs nearly empty, meaning next year's water supply will rely heavily on next winter's snowpack.

Irrigation water supplies will be only 35 to 75 percent of average across most of southern and central Idaho. Warm weather caused most streams to reach peak flows four to six weeks earlier and much lower than normal, according to the latest report by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Water supply shortages are expected throughout the Wood River and Lost River basins, leaving them with a 66 percent of average water supply.

Because of early snowmelt and low snowpack, streams are expected to flow much below normal during the summer.

In the Upper Snake River Basin, precipitation was 93 percent of average in May and 71 percent of average for the water year.

Reservoir storage for the eight reservoirs is down slightly from May at 89 percent of capacity. According to the report, reservoirs will help provide a near normal irrigation supply for water users. But that may mean low reservoir storage for next year.

For the second month in a row, basins south of the Snake River received above normal precipitation. Northern Nevada received the highest amounts with 125 percent of average precipitation in May. The area has the second highest precipitation of the state at 76 percent for the year.

Salmon Falls Reservoir is at 31 percent of capacity and Oakley is at 25 percent. Water supplies are expected to be less than half of normal.

## Ameristar edges closer to river resort

LAWRENCEBURG, Ind. — Ameristar Casinos Inc., which owns and operates Cactus Petes Resort Casino and The Horseshoe Hotel and Casino in Jackpot, Nev., cleared another hurdle Wednesday night in its attempt to develop a destination resort along the Ohio River.

The Lawrenceburg City Council, in Dearborn County, Ind., unanimously endorsed Ameristar and endorsed Argosy Gaming Co. and Boyd Gaming Co. by a 3-2 vote.

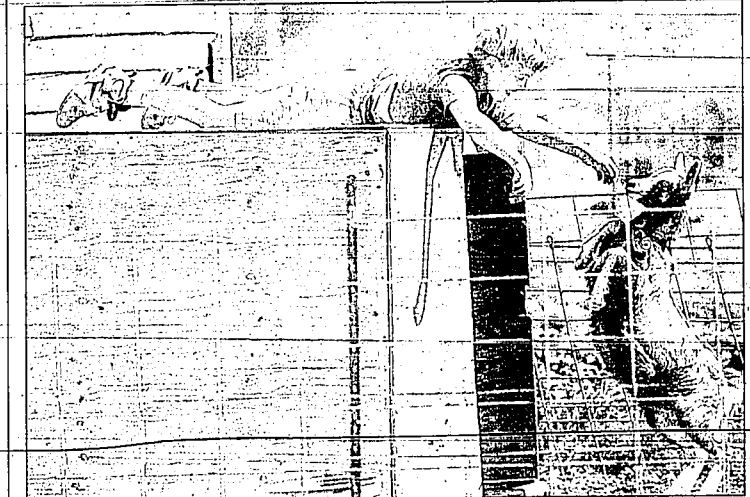
That puts Ameristar in a favorable position to get the single casino license that will be issued by Indiana's Gaming Commission within the next six months.

## Zoning commission OKs Curry development

TWIN FALLS — Vern Doshier of Doshier Realty crossed one more hurdle in his plan to develop agricultural land for housing south of Curry Creek.

## Rim advisory consultant says views provide identity

TWIN FALLS — Views are the most important part of any canyon rim development, a planning consultant said Thursday.

"There isn't much disagreement that the canyon rims are an important part of this area," Consulting Planner Lee Nellis said. "They bring about an overall sense of identity in this community."

The Canyon Rims Land Use Advisory Committee met Thursday to discuss development along the rims of the Snake River and Rock Creek canyons.

Nellis focused the discussion on the aesthetic aspect, saying the canyon rims are a "visual resource."

The canyon rims affect the shape of Twin Falls, and they supplement recreation and are an economic asset to the area, Nellis said.

Nellis suggested narrowing the most important rim views to those at Pillar Falls, Perrine Bridge, Shoshone Falls and Dierkes Lake.

One of the main concerns Nellis pointed out was the visibility of development on the rims from the Snake River. He said that the visibility all depends on the terrain and the contrast of the development with the land around it.

Nellis proposed several recommendations to the committee. First, he suggested that it is preferable to acquire viewpoints above Dierkes Lake and Pillar Falls as development occurs.

Secondly, Nellis proposed to improve viewpoints at Shoshone Falls.

"The good views at the Falls are not used by 99.9 percent of the people who visit them," he said.

Next, Nellis suggested a 300 foot easement above Dierkes Lake to "protect the rugged environment of the area."

"Acquisitions along the Rock Creek Canyon should be planned with views in

# City asks Shoshone citizens to conserve water

**SHOSHONE** — Faced with a declining aquifer, Shoshone city officials are asking residents to voluntarily conserve water this summer.

The Shoshone City Council debated Monday night over whether or not to enforce a mandatory water rationing system, as proposed by Mayor Tim Ridinger. They decided to appeal for voluntary reductions in the amount of water used to water lawns this summer.

"Let's just say please conserve and see

what happens," councilman Joe Andreassen said. "I think we're wasting our time trying to enforce it."

Andreassen pointed out that the odd-even water rationing system used in years past produced no noticeable savings in water consumption.

Since 1990, water usage in Shoshone has ranged from 25 to more than 50 million gallons per month from June through September. Meanwhile, the aquifer water level in two of the city's three wells has declined steadily since 1991 and is currently about 30 feet lower than it was that year.

Declines of another 20 feet or so would

require costly deepening of the city wells to ensure adequate water supply.

"The best way to have water conservation is the big M (money) word," said Ridinger. He recommended automatic sprinkler systems as a water conservation measure for Shoshone residents.

"If the whole town went on timed automatic sprinklers it would save so much money it would probably pay us to go out and put them in," he said.

Ridinger presented the council with a scheme for rotating watering days by sections of the city to reduce consumption. He recommended enforcement by city police officers, but the council sided with An-

dreassen's appeal for voluntary conservation.

"Does this mean take a shower together?"

councilman Dale Stader asked.

"As many as possible," councilman Ken Haught quipped.

In other business, the council gave final approval to a building permit ordinance which limits lot coverage to no more than 30 percent and establishes a minimum building size of 500 square feet for primary dwellings in the city.

The ordinance requires building permits for all new construction, remodeling or additions to existing structures within the city limits. Buildings two stories or higher must have building plans and specifications

stamped and submitted by an architect or licensed engineer.

The council also authorized a letter of protest to Idaho Power complaining about reductions in service at its office in Shoshone.

Idaho Power announced last fall that it intended to close the Shoshone office, but public petitions protesting the closure prompted the utility to change its plans.

"We had a big public hearing and they said they would leave things the way they were," Andreassen said.

The council agreed that reductions in service and hours at the Shoshone office are a violation of that agreement.

## Survey: Anti-gay measure would cost millions

**BOISE** — Complying with the Idaho Citizens Alliance's proposed anti-gay rights initiative at the state's libraries would cost taxpayers more than \$25 million, the Idaho Library Association says.

A survey conducted last month determined that an initial review for materials addressing homosexuality at Idaho's 118 public libraries would cost \$14 million, the association said Thursday.

Ongoing costs of screening new library materials would cost another \$12 million a year, according to the survey the association said was based on "anecdotal responses and educated estimates from Idaho public librarians."

The survey did not include school or other academic libraries, or the costs of physically separating materials, providing adults-

only sections, and reprinting card catalogs to conform.

"This could be millions of dollars more, and the result would be a severely diminished library system in Idaho and an environment restrictive of Idaho citizens' intellectual freedoms," the Library Association said.

"This initiative violates the constitutional rights of all Idahoans, and it violates the principles we as librarians are committed to — free expression of ideas and open access to these ideas," association President Rand Simmons said.

But Idaho Citizens Alliance Chairman Kelly Walton said librarians and other initial opponents were blowing the cost and difficulty of complying way out of proportion.

"They know the average Idaho voter will not side with them on the moral issue, so they're hoping to sway them on an economic is-

sue," Walton said. "And frankly, Idaho's kids are worth more than that."

Besides, he said, the initiative would require segregation only of library materials that clearly promote homosexuality. Walton said that can be done through the normal review process at little or no additional expense.

One section of the initiative proposed for Idaho's November ballot says availability of "books and materials written for adults which address homosexuality" shall not be limited in libraries, "provided access to such materials is limited to adults and meets legal standards as established through the normal library review process."

The Idaho Library Association said that language could mean any material that addresses homosexuality — positively, negatively or neutrally — must be off limits to anyone under 18.

"That would include the Bible, encyclopedias, medical reference books, and even magazines or newspapers with articles on homosexuality."

"The wording of the initiative is so vague that it's hard to tell what Kelly Walton had in mind," said Jen Ray, a board member of the anti-initiative group Don't Sign On.

But Walton said the meaning is unambiguous.

"They're focusing on the word 'adults,' but in the context of the entire initiative it's clear that what we're talking about is material that tells our kids that it's healthy and normal — obvious promotion of the behavior," he said.

"We're not asking for anything new here. All we're asking is that they shield this material from kids the same way they shield them from any other objectionable material."

## Reclamation says not to sue over water issue

**POCATELLO** — A U.S. Bureau of Reclamation attorney is urging irrigators not to sue his agency for releasing water from eastern Idaho reservoirs to flush salmon to the ocean.

Instead, Jack Hockberger on Wednesday called upon them to help work for recovery of the dwindling runs.

Citing previous court cases, Hockberger said whenever there is a disagreement between irrigators and endangered species, the farmers lose.

Irrigators, fearful of water shortages this summer, have protested the release of water on the upper Snake River to mid-salmon migration.

"The public should understand that there is no question that resident fish, recreation and irrigators will all be injured this year if we cannot stop the release of storage (water) out of our system," Committee of Nine chairman Claude Storer wrote in a letter to John Keys, regional Reclamation director.

The committee is composed of irrigator representatives from eastern Idaho.

Keys said Reclamation is only releasing water with authority to and still wants to buy more from willing sellers.

"We're not here to take your water," he said.

Reclamation is under orders from the National Marine Fisheries Service to supply 527,000 acre-feet of water from Idaho for salmon this year. At present, the agency has only 393,000 acre-feet at its disposal, Keys said.

"I've got to move that water down the river," Keys said. "I have no choice."

Reservoirs are expected to be nearly drained by fall and farmers say they have no extra water to sell for the fish.

U.S. Justice Department attorney Fred Disheroon said the government could take the water for an endangered species if it wants. An irrigator's only recourse, he said, would be to sue for compensation.

In addition, state water law will not stand up to the "Endangered Species Act," Disheroon said.

"The federal government is not required to comply with any state law unless it chooses to do so," he said.

The federal government is trying to save the salmon, Disheroon said, because other interests are demanding it, such as the state of Idaho, environmentalists and tribes.

"The only way to solve the problem is to take a pound of flesh out of every sector of the economy," he said.

mind, he said, and park dedication requirements should serve the recreational needs of residential developments.

Finally, Nellis suggested creating the Canyon Rim and Canyon Rim Overlay zoning districts. These two separate zoning districts are needed to deal with the questions raised by mixed use and commercial developments, Nellis said.

"Where we anticipate higher uses, we would use separate zoning," he said.

Since there are no restrictions at all on canyon rim development, Nellis proposed that buildings be set back from the rim so that only rooftops are seen from the river below. The distance of the setbacks depends on the location of the building, according to Nellis.

He also recommended that standards be set for color, form and landscaping of buildings along the

canyon rim so that the buildings will appear to be "softer" and will not detract from the overall appearance of the rim.

"These types of things do not prohibit development, but it makes it more compatible with the canyon rim," he said. We are just making sure that the view isn't dominated by buildings."

The committee is expected to begin making decisions on this proposal at the next scheduled meeting.

## Foresters ponder mushroom harvest

GRANGEVILLE — The Nez Perce National Forest could allow the limited commercial harvest of special forest products which are not conventional timber.

The Salmon River Ranger District is considering a proposal to allow the commercial taking of mushrooms on about 1,000 acres in the Van Creek drainage.

On the Selway District, the commercial harvest of mushrooms, berries, seeds, tree cones and boughs is being studied. The Elk City District is reviewing those products, as well as bear grass, on about 2,000 acres in the Big Elk Creek, Little Creek and Bear Creek drainages. No permits for commercial work will be issued this year on the Clearwater or Red River districts. Anyone who intends to collect the products commercially must buy permits, which are limited in number.

## Bike shop owner helps police mount up

COEUR D'ALENE — One way or another, police will be pedaling to keep the peace in Coeur d'Alene this summer.

But \$900 will make the difference between officers riding old, refurbished bicycles or new 21-speed mountain bikes.

"Last year we used some surplus bikes pieced together," Coeur d'Alene Police Capt. Ken Timmons said. "They weren't very good to start with, but my intent was to piece together more bikes this year."

Timmons planned to put two officers on old bikes again this year when Jordan Keough, owner of Bitterroot Bike and Ski, found a way to outfit police with new bikes. Keough asked one of his bicycle vendors for a good price on bikes and was offered a donation of two if he would buy two others. He in turn offered the four new bikes to Coeur d'Alene police for \$900.

## Officials fund well pollution search

COEUR D'ALENE — Federal officials say it is a long shot finding the source of a solvent in north Coeur d'Alene wells, but they will spend \$500,000 in the search.

"I'll be really surprised if we can find a puddle of (trichloroethylene) in the Spokane-Rathdrum," said Mark Ader, project manager for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Samples taken from both wells in the private Sunrise Terrace Water System since 1990 have revealed the chemical at levels four times higher than government safety standards. Those wells were shut down.

Monthly samples from a Coeur d'Alene city well have shown trace amounts of the solvent since 1992, but they were below the safety guidelines.

## Suspect in nursing-home death at large

BOISE — An elderly man allegedly attacked and killed by his nursing home roommate lies in an unmarked pauper's grave at a Boise cemetery.

No one claimed 65-year-old Marcus Brown after his death last month. So his nude body was wrapped in a sheet and buried in a pauper's grave, courtesy of Ada County taxpayers.

The man believed responsible for putting him in his grave still hasn't been arrested. Three weeks ago, the Ada County prosecutor's office issued a warrant for the arrest of Brown's roommate, Ralph Anderson, 55, on a charge of involuntary manslaughter.

But prosecutors haven't served the warrant. They decline to say why. They say the law prohibits them from saying, but they decline to say which law. Ada County Deputy Prosecutor Mike Reardon wouldn't say why Anderson hasn't been arrested, where he is or what law he was working under.

## Ex-city official faces embezzling charge

SANDPOINT — A former Sandpoint Lions Club official has been charged with embezzling \$14,376 from the community service organization.

Warren Hall, 45, of Sandpoint was arrested Wednesday on a warrant by the Sandpoint Police Department. It alleges he took money from the club during two years when he was treasurer, said Sandpoint Police Chief Bill Kice. Hall resigned from his position with the club on May 13. A search warrant was served at Hall's residence Tuesday night. "He knew it (the money) was coming," Kice said.

## Some Boise wells contaminated

BOISE — Four private water wells serving about 30 Hill Road families contain high levels of a suspected cancer-causing chemical, and residents have been urged to use bottled water.

Ada County planned to distribute free bottled drinking water Thursday to residents of the Casa Real Mobile Home Park and three nearby homes. They were the only places that showed any level of the chemical, a cleaning solvent called petc, out of 21 wells tested.

The well that serves the mobile home park has the lowest level — 1 part per billion — the rough equivalent of one-eighth of a teaspoon in a swimming pool.

## Coeur d'Alene seeks help from court

COEUR D'ALENE — The city of Coeur d'Alene has asked a federal judge to slash at least \$1.6 million from a huge judgment leveled against the city last month.

City Council members said the jury which awarded \$2.4 million to a Utah-based sewage plant contractor did not understand the complexities of the contract dispute. A hearing on the request is scheduled for June 20 before U.S. District Judge William Fremming Nielsen.

Coeur d'Alene two years ago dumped Construct Tech as contractor for a \$6.3 million expansion at the wastewater treatment plant. The city contended there were numerous flaws in the work. The company said the city's action forced it out of business, because it couldn't get bonding for other projects.

## Directors: Cultural center will rise anew

WEISER — Directors at the Intermountain Cultural Center and Museum have vowed to rebuild the Weiser facility gutted by fire last weekend.

The blaze apparently started in the center's first-floor gift shop. Flames and smoke moved up the central stairwell and collapsed sections of the second floor, and most windows in the building were broken.

No one involved could estimate the monetary damages, but center board member Shanna Clemens said about 75 percent of the museum's collection was saved.

## Utah deputies seek identity of body

TOOELE Utah — Sheriff's deputies are searching for clues to the identity of a body found in the Great Salt Lake by a Union Pacific conductor.

Marc Brunner said he was en route to Elko, Nev., Tuesday night when he spotted what appeared to be a body in a stretch of water adjacent to the tracks near Black Rock, west of the Great Salt Lake marina.

On his return trip Thursday, Brunner drove to Black Rock, searched the shoreline and scanned the area with binoculars.

## LaRocco sees new mission at INEL

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Congressman Larry LaRocco says the Energy Department is proposing four new missions at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to ease the sting of eliminating the Integral Fast Reactor research program.

The Idaho Democrat said Thursday that agency officials have assured him they intend to propose enough new work at the INEL's Argonne National Laboratory-West to maintain 840 of about 900 jobs at the facility.

LaRocco, who requested the briefing about the site's transition, said the proposals seem to be legitimate research and not just short-term tidbits to keep the Idaho congressional delegation quiet.

"If this was a Band-Aid program, or a make-work thing, it wouldn't be so significant," he said. "But from the information the administration has given me, it's clear they are committing to a solid, substantial program that is important to the nation as a whole."

LaRocco said the proposed new missions include nuclear nonproliferation work, reactor and fuel-cycle safety research, decontaminating

and decommissioning of nuclear sites, and preparing nuclear waste for disposal. Despite what appeared to be good news for the area, Republican Sen. Larry Craig suggested that LaRocco — whose district is in northern and western Idaho — should stay out of eastern Idaho's business.

Craig said he had received the same assurances from the Energy Department months ago but rejected them as a bribe offered to make him back down from his opposition to killing the \$114-million Integral Fast Reactor project. He said LaRocco is helping the Clinton administration sugarcoat shutting down the program.

"Larry LaRocco has become the unwitting dupe for this administration," Craig said.

"Now I would suggest that Larry LaRocco work in his 1st District and leave the saving" of the Integral Fast Reactor to the Republicans with

the INEL in their jurisdictions.

INEL spokesman Brad Bugger confirmed that talks on the new missions are going on between the Energy Department and Argonne, but deferred to Argonne on specifics.

Argonne spokesman Dick Lindsay said he had heard similar proposals for Argonne National Laboratory-West but no firm commitments.

He said he expects a formal announcement from the Energy Department in the next two weeks.

Lindsay said some of his discussions with the agency have indicated the nuclear-waste work may be nothing more than paper studies. In order for the lab to consider a clear-waste project substantial, it would have to involve actual development of disposal-preparation techniques, he said.

"Paper studies tend to be in many cases a waste of money," Lindsay said.

"They are a necessary initial step," but you have to follow up on it or it's worthless. There have been millions of paper studies funded by the government that haven't gone anywhere."

## Representative defends hunting in Mojave

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — An Idaho congressman is taking heat over an amendment that would allow hunting to continue in a portion of California's Mojave Desert.

Rep. Larry LaRocco, D-Idaho, has vowed to keep up the fight.

California's Democrat senators and environmental community are close to getting the House to pass the California Desert Protection Act.

It would create 74 wilderness areas and three new national parks on 6.3 million acres of desert land, protecting them from off-road vehicles, mining exploration and cattle grazing.

But LaRocco has cosponsored an amendment that would designate 1.2 million acres there as a national preserve rather than a national park.

Hunting has always been allowed in the East Mojave Desert area, he said, and hunting is allowed in national preserves while it is not in national parks.

More than 200 members of Congress belong to the Sportsman's Caucus and appear ready to narrowly approve LaRocco's amendment.

"I've been under considerable pressure to drop my amendment. I think that's ridiculous," LaRocco said this week.

His amendment is supported by the National Rifle Association, Foundation for North American Wild Sheep and other hunting groups. But it is opposed by the Sierra Club and other conservation groups, California Democrat Rep. George Miller and even Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt.

The Los Angeles Times called LaRocco's amendment "obnoxious."

"First of all, I think it's bad public policy to move forward and deny traditional users access to lands when there's a viable alternative and solution," LaRocco said.

He is supported by the California Department of Fish and Game, which has said publicly that hunting is the best way to manage game in the East Mojave.

LaRocco has been accused of meddling in another state's affairs after chiding Rep. Carolyn Maloney, D-N.Y., earlier this year for interfering in his own wilderness bill for Idaho's 1st Congressional District.

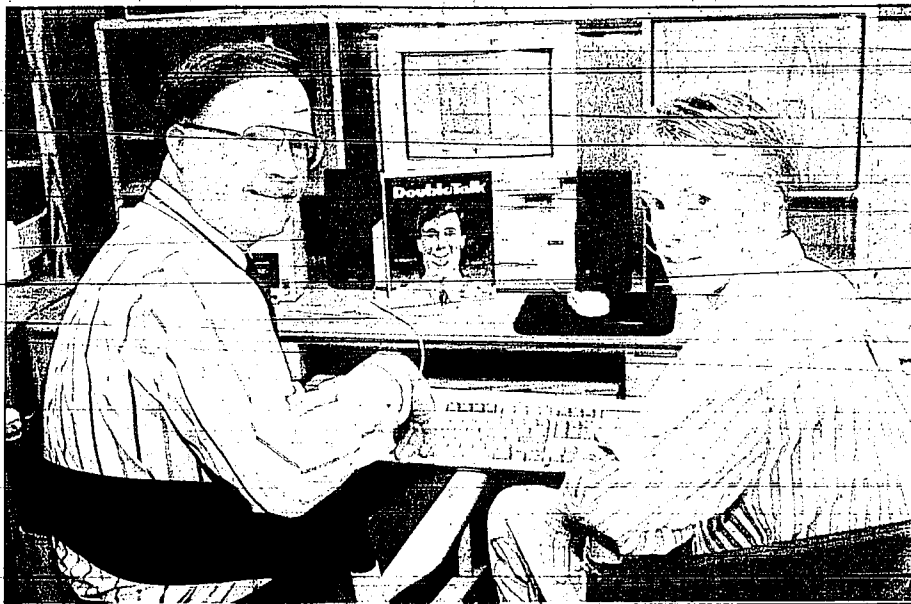

## Double Talk

Computerized version of local financial planner's board game hits market; TV show could develop.

TWIN FALLS — Lots of people stare at cloud formations and see fluffy bunnies; John Boyle sees homophones.

Boyle first began thinking about homophones (words that sound alike, but have different meanings) when he was lying atop a Utah mountain pass watching the clouds go by during a backpack trip in the early '70s. He found a pencil in his backpack and scribbled the words on the top of his sleeping bag.

Since then, he's compiled a file of more than 6,000 sound-alike words and phrases — and he's turned his passion into a hot-selling board game.

This week, the computerized version of Double Talk hits the market.

Double Talk offers its players the fast-paced, brain-teasing challenge of solving a puzzle using homophone clues. The software version adds in sophisticated computer graphics, sound effects and one-on-one computer interactivity.

## Sober, righteous Guitarist-vocalist Campbell tells about music, life, book

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — As Glenn Campbell talks about his music and life story, other issues grab his interest: abortion (he's against), school prayer (for), sobriety (for — after years of seeing life as was against).

"A lot of people think Sodom and Gomorrah is a fairy tale, and it isn't," Campbell said during an interview, wandering away from a question about his autobiography. "It's documented history — you can read it."

His book, "Rhinestone Cowboy," which the gifted guitarist-vocalist was promoting, tells the story of the dirt-poor prodigy from Billstown, Ark. — so small it's not on the map — making his way through a show business Sodom and Gomorrah.

There's the cocaine, the alcohol, Tanya Tucker, wives coming and going including that of then-best friend

Mac Davis, neglected children — the whole (a million) celebrity bottom-out-and-come-back, tell-all scheme. And, there's a little about Campbell's fistful of records that rank with the best in popular music: "By The Time I Get To Phoenix," "Wichita Lineman," "Gentle On My Mind," "True Grit," "Goodbye."

But inside information on the making of those classics, or Campbell's relationships with writer Jimmy Webb and producer Al DeLory will have to wait for another book.

"I never went through a rehab center," the 58-year-old Campbell said, speaking at a friend's home in Nashville before a book signing. He looks tanned and fit, especially considering the years of alcohol and cocaine abuse he details in his book.

"I've been through God's rehabilitation center and it's marvelous," Cause he does it with love and he does it with justice."

Campbell, who lives in Phoenix, used to be reluctant to talk about the relationship with Tucker that made him a tabloid fixture. He's more than willing to answer questions now. In the book, he credits Tucker with taking him to a Las Vegas home where he had his only experience with free-basing cocaine. In "Rhinestone Cowboy" he writes:

"After the divorces, financial losses, emotional depletions, and overall mental bankruptcy that I suffered at the hands of cocaine, my main priority in 1980 was to try to rid myself forever of the demon drug. And so I began to date Tanya. Dating Tanya to escape cocaine was like jumping into a lake to avoid getting wet."

Campbell said he couldn't write his autobiography without touching on the darker parts of his life. "You win five Grammy's, you do a movie with John Wayne, you have a No. 1 smash TV show with 50 million people a week

watching you — and the year or so I had the relationship with Tanya was the most publicized part of my life and everything was negative."

For her part, Tucker has only been quoted as saying: "If Glen truly wants to cleanse himself of past vices, perhaps he might want to look deeper yet for those uncovered pieces of the story."

When not dealing with his personal life, "Rhinestone Cowboy" addresses Campbell's music and career. And it's pretty eventful, with accomplishments like writing the "It's true blonde hair more fun" jingle, and working as a guitar slinger on an astonishing array of hits: "Strangers in the Night" by Frank Sinatra and "Good Vibrations" by the Beach Boys just for starters.

Campbell was also a member of the "Shindig" television show house band, and toured as a member of both the Beach Boys and the C h a m p s ("Tequila"). In the book he criticizes fans who want more out of records and live performances than a diversion. "The unbridled emotions at the Beach Boys' concerts made me realize how empty some people's lives were, and how they foolishly sought fulfillment from something that was intended to be no more than entertainment."

Campbell himself generated some mass hysteria during the three-year run of "The Glen Campbell Goodtime Hour" on CBS. Campbell said he fought to get diverse musical guests on the program. Some of the comedy was written by future comic luminaries like Steve Martin and Rob Reiner. Videotapes of the show will soon be available.

Campbell refused to do any of the controversial, left-leaning humor that his producers, the Smothers Brothers, were known for. But that's not because he disagreed with them.

"Actually, I didn't have an opinion," Campbell said. "I didn't really care. I was brought up where you had to pay your tax to vote. Daddy never voted 'cause he had to pay that tax and we didn't have the money to pay the tax."

"But that's why the show was so good. They wrote it around me, like around my naivete, my shyness, my outlook on life."

Twenty-five years later, Campbell very definitely does have political opinions — most stemming from his conservative Baptist faith.

And the musical gifts that took him from Billstown to Branson are still intact. He feels he's too old for the youth-obsessed country music market, so he makes contemporary Christian albums.

## Kittredge brings tales of West to Ketchum

KETCHUM — Near the haunting stretch of Oregon outback where William Kittredge grew up, there's a string of lakes — Warner Lakes — all of them dry.

For most of the year, they're nothing more than grit in your eye, borne by freshening southwesterly winds off Albert Ridge, the western edge of the Great Basin.

But on the wild scrublands that surround the dry lake beds, there are thousands of antelope, and before they drained the swamps, there were millions of ducks and geese as well. It's a place breathtaking in its remoteness, as different from the Willamette Valley as the Amazon is from the moon.

Before he became a writer, Kittredge ranched and then farmed in the Warner Valley, the scion of a family only Steinbeck could have invented and which only Wallace Stegner would own up to.

"He learned how to hunt and how to fish, how to laugh and how to cry, how to get drunk and how to get sorry, how to spend money and how to rue profligacy. But most of all he learned that to understand the West, you have to understand distance."

Distance dominates the landscape; distance is both the West's curse and its salvation. And dis-

tance defines the people who live there.

Distance has taken Kittredge to Missoula, Mont., now, where he lives in the company of espresso bars, college students and California refugees, reading old newspapers, speaking a little and writing a lot. For what Stegner was to the '60s, Thomas McGuane to the '70s, and Norman Maclean to the '80s, Kittredge is to the '90s.

He's the reigning True Voice of the West, and these days, he's hotter than a ranchhand's check.

"(Kittredge) had to find his own

West and his own identity, and he did both," Stegner wrote before his death a year ago. "More power to him."

Kittredge had spent a decade writing critically-admired short stories and essays that were not widely read, but that changed with the publication of "Hole in the Sky." In his 1992 memoir, he explains how he came to terms with his heritage, with the land and finally with himself.

"Hole in the Sky" has attracted the undivided attention of the literary world and thousands of readers, inside and outside the West.

It's important for what it says about the West, but it's also important for who's saying it. Unlike McGuane and MacLean, Kittredge grew up in the Great Basin, the West's West.

It's a land on the margins, a place where space and light and shadow work fundamental changes on the people who live there, and on how they live with each other.

It's a place of great risks and big failures, where the values of L.A.

and Seattle and Denver are absolutely alien. Kittredge made the Warner Valley and southeastern Oregon's vast Harney Basin metaphors for the West's beating heart.

"What makes Kittredge's memoir so compelling — and at times painful — is that to Kittredge, the ravaging of the land and the demise of his family were inextricably linked," wrote Patrick Connor in the San Francisco Chronicle. "As though a failure of vision was also a failure of the heart."

The Great Basin is the Real West is nothing new, of course. Frank Norris' "McTeague" and Stegner's "Big Rock Candy Mountain," perhaps the two most powerful books ever written about the West, were bleak stories about bleak families in bleak country — tales without sentiment for a land without green.

Even today, the tallest figures in western literature come from the land of the shortest grass. Utah's Terry Tempest Williams, with her stories of Mormonism and family and the ravaging of the land that made both possible, is a rising literary star in the same firmament as Kittredge.

But Kittredge is unique in that his personal redemption brought a clarity of vision he had the wit and good fortune to share. His stories should be told around every campfire.

Boyle is currently working on CD-ROM and sports versions of his game, as well as additional clue packs. All of this may sound quick and easy, but it's not.

"You are looking at an industry that kills 98 percent of all new products in 24 months," said Steve Peck, president of the Dallas-based Game Inventors of America Inc.

Only one in 500 games is successful enough to make money for its inventor, he said.

And the idea is just the start. An inventor also needs lots of expensive legal work to protect his idea, lots of cash to develop prototypes and money to get into the market.

"Basically, you churn the cream and drain off the buttermilk, or the butter will be bitter," Doris Barnes said. "Then you take the cream and pour cold water over it, keep beating it until you start getting butter, and then churn it until it all turns into the same consistency."

That's a whole lot easier said than done. "It's pretty simple once you get used to it," Doris said. "But if you don't do it right, there are a lot of things that can go wrong."

"You're generally looking at six figures to get something off the ground," Boyle said.

Boyle's two brothers-in-law, who live in Salt Lake City and Mesa, Ariz., are his principal investors. His son, Adam, who lives in Orem, Utah, did the programming for the computer version of Double Talk. Another son, Tucker, 18, a computer major at the College of Southern Idaho, did the animation, using an IBM 386 home computer.

"It takes a lot of time," said Tucker, who spent eight hours creating each three-second animation, "but it's fun."

Boyle recently gave up a financial planning career in Twin Falls to play Double Talk full time. He works up

to 40 hours a week on the game during "slack season" and up to 65 hours a week October to February. He markets his product through toy fairs and is often on the road doing demonstrations and TV promotions.

But the business is turning a nice profit now, he said. Though Boyle declines to say how nice, he said it's a lot more than he would be making in most other lines of work.

"I do drive people nuts, though," said Boyle, with a laugh. "My wife thinks I'm crazy because I listen to words differently than other people, and I break down words and phrases." He added, "I just have a very twisted mind."

That twisted mind is likely to have

lots of people sitting at their computers logging in their Double Talk scores very soon.

Between one and four people can play the computer game, with timed matches for those who prefer to go solo. There are various levels of difficulty and clues available for those willing to forgo points.

Professor Double Talk, a funny little character whose costumes range from cheerleader to baseball player, critiques each player: "Fabulous!" "Ah ha!" "Strike one." If a player is doing too badly, Professor Double Talk melts away into a wordless pool.

Boyle never plans to let Double Talk melt away.

# Video stores stock 'Wayne's World 2'

"Wayne's World 2" (PG-13) Does the video-watching public really want a "Wayne's World 2"? The original 1992 comedy, a lark that ended up grossing more than \$120 million in the United States alone, was a paper-thin extension of the popular "Saturday Night Live" skit that packed enough silliness and occasionally witty — goes to make its brand of dumb and obnoxious humor tolerable.

Now comes the sequel, and the question is whether the characters of Wayne (Mike Myers) and Garth (Dana Carvey), along with their borderline-passe Wayne's "Schwiling!" "Excellent!" "Party on!" remain relevant enough to get away with their moronic antics. How many times, after all, can one laugh at Myers and Carvey in flighty wiseguy "Squeeze me? Baking powder?"

It doesn't help that "Wayne's World 2" is considerably sloppier than the original, or that its meandering story, concerning Wayne's attempts to mount a Woodstock-style mega-concert, has nothing to do with the skit's original premise (two teen-age heavy metal fanatics from suburbia, raising hell on their own public access cable TV show), thus steering the characters away from the format that made them so endearing in the first place.

As "Wayne's World 2" opens, Wayne and Garth have their own pad, thanks to the success of their show. Then Wayne meets Jim Morrison in a dream, where the late singer encourages him to mount a mega-concert.

Taking Morrison's advice to heart ("If you book them, they will come") Wayne and Garth set about organizing the event, promising appearances by everyone from "The Who" to Rip-Taylor to Wayne's singer — girlfriend, Cassandra (Tina Turner), who is being wooed by a slimy record producer (Christopher Walken).

There are a lot of cameos in "Wayne's World 2" (Kim Basinger plays a blonde bombshell who falls for Garth, Drew Barrymore appears as an oversexed office secretary, Harry Shearer is a disc jockey,

Charlton Heston is a gas station attendant and most pay off nicely. There are also a lot of movie spoofs (set-backs on "The Untouchables" especially clever) and a priceless bit involving the Village People. But there's a slapdash feel to "Wayne's World 2" that comes dangerously close to ruining it. The movie, directed by rookie Stephen Herek, is downright ugly at times and devoid of any style. Surik even manages to make concert footage of the dynamic Aerosmith dull. Some

of the performances (particularly, Carver's) are so lazy and perfect, they're embarrassing to watch. More of the jokes tend to be of the really dumb variety (there's nothing here to match, say, the sheer irreverence of the "Laverne & Shirley" bit from the original); others, like an extended spoof of martial arts films, are simply old news.

"My Life" (R): This movie starts with a powerful idea that makes you wonder why somebody didn't think of it sooner:

A man with a terminal disease makes a videotape about his life for the unborn child his wife is carrying. In box-office terms, that's not exactly "Batman," but the emotional potential of this premise is obvious. In fact, the biggest challenge for a filmmaker is to guard against a tear-jerker shamescene.

But Joe Rubin (screenwriter of "Ghost") largely has avoided that trap in writing and directing "My Life." But he has fallen into another one.

Although much of the new film gives up on the strength of its central idea, it's often disappointingly literal. As Rubin sets things up, you go through just about everything with Bob Jones (Michael Keaton), a Los Angeles public-relations executive with terminal cancer, and his wife, Gail (Nicole Kidman), in one of her better, more restrained performances, who is pregnant for the first time.

You look on as Bob receives the tragic diagnosis, visits relatives in Detroit, walks through the house he grew up in, plays with a toy (a small parakeet) from his childhood, deteriorates physically and so on until the predictably bitter end.

You also watch as Gail's pregnancy and as the couple think up baby names, attend a shower, take a Lamaze class and struggle through the delivery.

This scrupulously straightforward approach is not necessarily a weakness or a manipulation, but it doesn't exactly fire the imagination. Watching the movie, you may find yourself affected by one episode or another, but the segments don't build.

At times, it's as if training films for expectant parents and cancer patients had gotten their reels mixed together.

The literalism of the movie is at its best in the clips from the video that Bob is making. Keaton often strikes a refreshingly lighthearted tone as his character instructs the unborn child in such areas as basketball, cooking, shaving (up or down but never sideways), jumper-cable use, music (ignore what Mom says), the right way to enter a room and, very briefly, sex.

In fact, "My Life" might really have been something special had it consisted entirely of Bob's videotape, with all the various story developments somehow implied.

In any case, you get the idea that in the process of making the tape, Bob is re-exploring his life and coming to terms with the end that awaits him.

Where (filmmaker Rubin's literalism reaches its low point is the scene in which Bob's family belatedly grants his childhood wish by arranging to have a circus perform in his back yard. The sequence is clearly meant to be inspirational, but all it is is a sentimental sop.

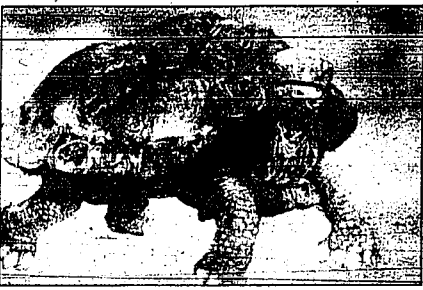
The one portion of "My Life" that isn't entirely literal involves Bob's sessions with a Chinese healer (Haing S. Ngor), during which Bob occasionally sees the famous white light of the "other side." The healer, incidentally, counsels Bob to let go of his anger — especially his anger toward his brother (Michael Constantine), a limited man who would have preferred for his son to have remained in Detroit and to have gone into his scrap-metal business.

What's rather odd, here, is that although healer and, clearly, the film's chief source of forgiveness, the movie presents Bob's father in unflattering terms — as if Rubin were still working off his anger against a parent in the context of this supposedly "life-affirming" movie. # As MTV branches out, is it biting the hand that feeds it?

Ironically, MTV helped create the monstrous music industry that seems to have risen up against it as it explores alternative to mainstream music videos to maintain its legions of followers.

A few years ago, album sales were in the dumps. Alternative rock received no air time on mainstream radio until Nirvana exploded on MTV, swinging the dial to modern music, and "Yo! MTV Raps," a daily block of rap videos, led a rap revolution.

The now-thriving music industry has resulted in more albums from a wider variety of new artists who are making a fortune of music videos. MTV receives 30 to 50 videos a week from the record labels — produced at costs ranging from \$25,000 for low-budget productions to \$450,000 or more for expensive ones — but can't make room for more than 10 of them.

The music industry most forgotten about by MTV is the record company, said one music executive: "To a great degree, MTV is calling all the shots now. They have

more people who want to be on MTV than they want to put on. In the old days, when MTV was starting out, the record industry called the shots. When you leave someone out of your tent and don't serve them, they will find an alternative."

Judy McGrath, president and creative director of MTV vehemently denies the scattered record industry comments that MTV has become a music video monopoly. "If we had that attitude we would be out of business," she said. "That is very offensive to me."

To expose new music, MTV has

specifically created music video shows like "Alternative Nation" and "120 Minutes" for alternative music.

"Headbangers Ball" for hard rock and "The Grid" for dance tunes.

The show's focus of programming MTV delivers into usually showcase music — from the steady tunes and "Dead at 21" to the campy music videos that Beavis and Butt-head have temporarily paralyzed.

"This is cool," "This sucks."

"We do try and do a good job to present (the record companies') music and create an environment for

it," McGrath said. "We struggle every day to play the new videos they give us, and to find a place to play them."

MTV takes credit for breaking such successful artists as Arrested Development, Pearl Jam, Stone Temple Pilots, Counting Crows and Snoop Doggy Dogg. MTV devised "Buzz Bin," a graphic slapped on fringe music videos, to help gain some attention for them. "We absolutely jump on new music with diversity you won't find anywhere, and more quickly than we ever have," McGrath said. "Whether it's Pantera, Soundgarden, the Brand New Heavies, wherever it is, people saw them first on MTV before they heard them on the radio or could buy them in the record store."

Not everyone agrees. "Historically, MTV has followed rather than led in the breaking of acts," said a creative development executive at one of the record companies. "They like to see themselves as a powerful force in exposing new music, and they are. On the other side of things, they don't play something until they're pretty darned

convinced it's going to be a hit and they won't be hung out to dry."

Record labels are now copying up to dozens of alternative music-video outlets springing up around the country. "Record labels love us because MTV doesn't program much M anymore," said Paul Carchedi, the creator of "Rage."

Carchedi, an entertainment attorney, pays \$1,750 for an hour of time every Friday night on Boston superstation WSBK-TV38, and then he sells his own advertising. Two weeks ago, his show clobbered MTV in the local ratings.

Columbia Records credits "Rage" with the worldwide video premiere of the Chicago group Stabbing Westward — leading to consumer demand and the opening spot for the current Depeche Mode tour — six weeks before MTV played the group's video "Normal" on "120 Minutes."

"MTV has dropped the ball in terms of music," Carchedi said. "They used to educate people about new music and break bands. They care anymore. They're looking for the ratings point."

## Iglesias releases 1st English-language album

If Spanish has been the loving tongue for Julio Iglesias, he hasn't done badly in other tongues, either.

His first English-language album, 1984's "1100 Bel Air Place," sold more than 3 million copies and spawned the hit single "To All the Girls I've Loved Before," a duet with Willie Nelson.

That last fact, you might think, would be good reason for Iglesias to pick a Nelson song as the title track for his brand-new English-language album, "Crazy."

Except, I didn't know "Crazy" was a Willie Nelson song. Iglesias says with a laugh, "I only heard it a year ago."

No matter. Everything has been arranged to maximize this record's chances of becoming another hit: the family for English-speaking audiences of "Crazy" and "Let It Be Me," background vocals by Art Garfunkel and Sting, and a duet with Dolly Parton on "When You Tell Me That You Love Me."

Duets are a familiar item on the Iglesias English-language menu,

and the Parton track uses the same trick employed when Julio recorded on Frank Sinatra's "Duets" album: The two never met.

"She did her part, I did mine," he says. "I wanted to sing with her, but it's a funny thing with my duets — they've all been arranged through the record company. So this song with Dolly, it was a beautiful accident."

Modest remarks like that punctuate Iglesias' conversation. Ask whether he considers himself successful in the English-language market, and he says: "Not yet. I feel you need to last through two generations to be successful."

That has not been a problem for the 50-year-old Iglesias in his native Spain, where he began singing almost 30 years ago. He actually sings in six languages — English, Spanish, Portuguese and Italian — but it's Spanish where he has racked up the bulk of his 960 gold and 350 platinum records. Those spring from about 70 albums, most in Spanish.

Enjoy singing in different languages, Iglesias says. "The prob-

lem is, you can't express yourself in English the same way you would in Spanish or French. It's like playing tennis with the right hand or the left hand. Some songs you can do in one language, you cannot do in another."

"I will do a basic album in Spanish, perhaps 15-20 songs, then I go to my producers and we decide what we could include on an album in another language. It depends on the lyrics, the translations and how I feel about it. If I put out an album in French, I want to be able to sing it in France in that language."

There's also a marketing factor: "If you are from the Mediterranean region, like I am, you have to sing in English to enter the English-speaking market. But if you are English-speaking, you don't need another language to enter the world market."

Whatever the tongue, Iglesias says he just likes to sing. He has performed more than 3,000 concerts and has used his celebrity to promote causes from UNICEF to NAFTA.

In fact, the teen-age Iglesias wanted to become a diplomat, before he

discovered soccer and signed with Spain's professional Real Madrid team at 19 as a goalkeeper. After he was temporarily paralyzed in a auto accident, a doctor gave him a guitar to entertain himself during his two-year rehabilitation. The rest is gold and platinum history.

"Music, he says, pretty much took over his life. The romantic ballads and the matinee-idol image aside, he brushes aside talk of his private life: "I don't have much interest in a private life. After many years in the public eye, about the only thing I enjoy very much is my professional life. I love what happens onstage, getting my music to people."

Logically enough, he expects to sing as long as he has a voice.

"What else am I going to do?" he says. He laughs again. "What else can I do?"

But he also wants you to know that he's not taking anything for granted. "I'm very insecure," he says. "Every time I am called in to make an album, I'm afraid it's going to be the last time they will want me."

Not very likely.

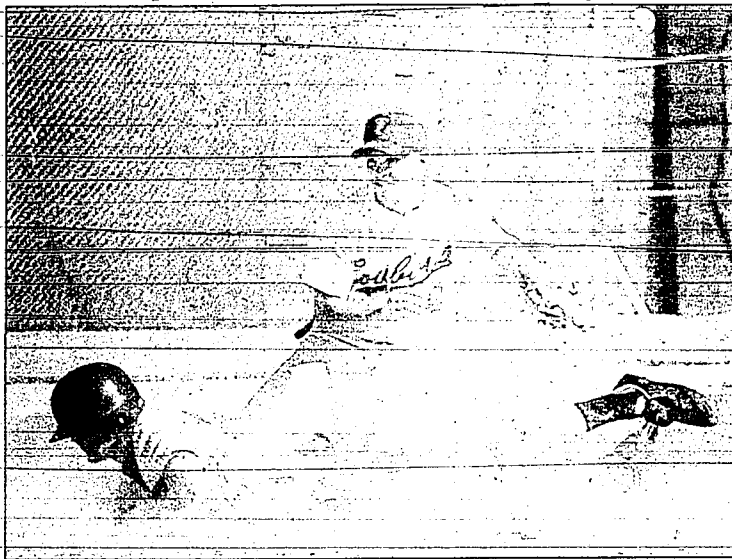

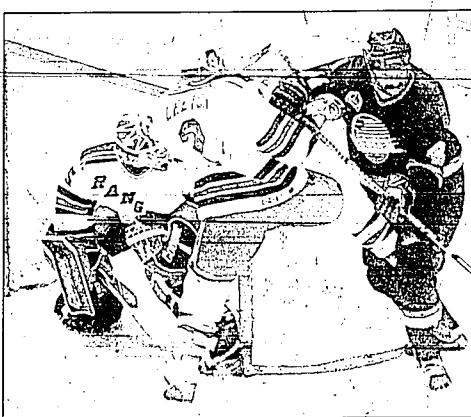

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Larry Cochell says he isn't much of a prognosticator, but his Oklahoma Sooners are getting close to proving him wrong.

"I told our kids in Austin that we'd win the national championship, and I'm not much of a predictor," said Cochell, the only coach to bring three schools to the College World Series.

The Sooners advanced to the series championship game with a 6-1 victory over Arizona State on Thursday, denying the Sun Devils a chance to win another national championship for ailing coach Jim Brock.

Mark Redman pitched a seven-hitter for the fourth-seeded Sooners (48-18), who will play second-seeded Georgia Tech (50-16) for the title Saturday. The final will be the second pitching match that went unbeaten in the series.

Cochell, who also brought Oral Roberts and Fullerton State to the CWS, has never finished better than third. Then again, he never had Redman before.

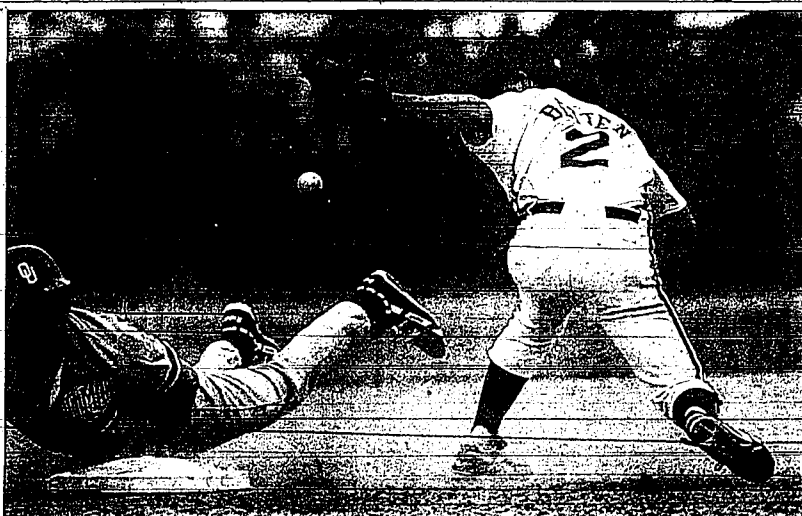

There were no serious injuries.

## Capriati to be released soon

MILAN, Italy (AP) — Jennifer Capriati's father says the teen-age tennis star will be released from a drug treatment center next week.

In an interview with an Italian sports daily, Stefano Capriati also admitted that he put too much pressure on his daughter when she was starting on the tour and predicted that she will "return to play tennis again and will be stronger than before."

Jennifer Capriati, who turned pro just before her 14th birthday, lured pro last year after losing in the first round of the U.S. Open. Now 18, she was arrested May 16 on marijuana possession charges and is undergoing treatment at a rehabilitation clinic in Miami.

"I should have given her more room," her father told La Gazzetta dello Sport. "Instead, I cooked for her and lived with her 24 hours a day. Sometimes she would say, 'I don't want to practice this week.' But I would insist that she prepare for the next tournament."

## Trevino, Floyd lead Seniors money list

ALPHARETTA, Ga. (AP) — This weekend's Nationwide Championship will give Lee Trevino a chance to gain more ground on Ray Floyd in their PGA Senior Tour earnings race.

Trevino has \$683,267 in earnings this year, followed by Floyd with \$598,400.

Trevino will be back to defend his 1993 title when the tournament begins Friday at the 6,781-yard, par-72 Country Club of the South.

Floyd will be absent, but he has announced plans to drop out of the U.S. Open to play in next week's Senior Classic in Nashville.

"I'm playing so well on the Senior Tour now, and Lee and I are having such a great race, I want to channel all of my efforts to playing as well as I can there," said Floyd.

## Minority numbers in baseball management remain unchanged

CINCINNATI (AP) — The percentage of minority employment in the front offices of the 28 major league teams remained unchanged in the last year, baseball owners said Thursday as they concluded their quarterly meetings.

Owners also announced they will continue exploring the possibility of expansion, with 1998 the likely date new teams would start play if owners decide to expand. Boston Red Sox owner John Harrington, the expansion committee chairman, said a decision wasn't likely in the next three months and also said he would speak with cities in the United States, Canada and — for the first time — Mexico.

Burrows shadowing everything else was the possibility that players will go on strike during the second half of this season. Owners will propose a salary cap to the Major League Baseball Players Association

on Tuesday, and the union executive board is expected to set a strike date at its meeting on July 11 in order to force an agreement.

"I think for the union to strike is to take out an unnecessary burden on the fans," management negotiator Richard Ravitch said Thursday. "I hope they don't do it. We really don't want them to do it. We're ready if they do."

"If they think they're going to scare the owners into giving up the necessity of changing the economic system in baseball, they're going to find themselves very wrong. I hope fans don't pay a price for their misjudgment."

Union head Donald Fehr, who worries that owners unilaterally will implement a salary cap after the season, said he wasn't surprised by Ravitch's remarks.

"I have no comment other than the traditional PR war has begun," Fehr

said in New York. "If they don't want a strike, they shouldn't create circumstances that may lead to one."

The minority report, based on figures compiled in late April, showed very little overall change from the previous report, released in December 1992. Minority employment in the front offices of the 28 teams was unchanged at 17, up just 2 percent from 1989. But the number of minority department heads — black, Hispanic and Asian — increased to 10 percent from 7 percent in December 1992.

"I'm pleased with the progress that 'major league' baseball has made," said Charles S. Farrell, national director of Jesse Jackson's Rainbow Coalition-for-Fairness in Athletics. "They're certainly not overwhelming numbers. There has been progress. It should be applauded, but there's much room for improvement."

## Ex-Red makes impact in Atlanta

ATLANTA (AP) — The Atlanta Braves are nearly perfect in the nine games since Roberto Kelly arrived from Cincinnati, and that suits him fine.

"That's the way I wanted to start," said Kelly, who has hit .351 with 13 hits, 10 runs scored, one home run, four RBIs and four stolen bases since the Braves traded Deion Sanders for him on May 29.

"By doing this, it makes it easier to be a part of the team and for the fans to accept me," he said.

The Braves, who were idle Thursday before a weekend series in

Houston, have lost only one game with Kelly on the roster and have raised their record to 37-19, the best in the majors.

"He was a big part of all nine games, scored the winning runs in a couple of games and stole some bases," said manager Bobby Cox.

"He's been in the middle of things." The 29-year-old outfielder, a two-time All-Star, had a .302 average when he came over from the Reds. Since then, he has raised his season totals to .310, four homers, 25 RBIs and 13 stolen bases.

"I think what I've done is what

they expected out of me," he said. Kelly, a .285 career hitter, first came to the majors in 1987 with the New York Yankees. He was traded to Cincinnati in November of 1992.

He has never played in the postseason and is excited about his chances with the Braves, who have been to the playoffs three straight years.

"If I had to be traded, what better team to be traded to?" he asked. "I like my chances a lot better here of going to the playoffs than I did in Cincinnati. I don't think anybody in baseball doubts that the Braves may be the best team in baseball."

## Lucas quits as coach of Spurs

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — John Lucas, who questioned his future with the San Antonio Spurs after ownership smarted over an early playoff exit, resigned as coach Thursday and may now be heading for the Philadelphia 76ers.

Spurs president Jack Diller announced Lucas was released from his contract at his request. Lucas

reportedly had at least two years remaining on his contract, and Diller said there was no monetary settlement.

"It's been clear over the past weeks that John has been questioning — whether he wanted to go forward with the Spurs," Diller said. "If John has any plans to go anywhere else, he has not discussed it with us."

## U.S. companies, big and small, see no slowdown

WASHINGTON — American businesses are going ahead with vigorous plans for modernizing, even though interest rates are rising.

The Commerce Department said Thursday more than 5,000 businesses surveyed, this spring expect to increase investment in new buildings and equipment by 8.3 percent this year. That would be the biggest rise in five years and is higher than projections this winter.

The businesses, questioned during April and May, said they would spend \$634 billion this year, up from \$586 billion last year.

Automobile companies and steel manufacturers plan to lead the way in constructing and modernizing buildings, installing new computer systems and upgrading other equipment and machinery.

When businesses were surveyed in the winter, they projected an 8 percent rise in investment spending this year on top of last year's 7.1 percent advance.

If the 1994 spending plans are realized, it

WASHINGTON — Thirty-year, fixed-rate mortgages averaged 8.25 percent this week, down sharply from 8.55 percent last week, according to a national survey released Thursday by the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp.

Mortgage delinquencies, meanwhile, edged up slightly from January through March, although the percentage of overdue payments remained near a 20-year low.

Three of the country's four regions had increases in late payments, which boosted the

national delinquency rate for the first time in nearly a year. Only the South saw a decline, according to a survey released Thursday by the Mortgage Bankers Association.

The trade group said the share of home owners behind their payments rose to a seasonally adjusted 4.12 percent, from 4.09 percent in the final three months of 1993. The fourth-quarter share was the lowest since a 3.89 percent rate in the first three months of 1973.

Regionally, the past-due rate rose 25 basis points in the West, to 3.51 percent, it was up 7 basis points in the Northeast, to 4.15 per-

cent, and 2 basis points in the North Central region, to 3.69 percent.

It was the lowest since March 31 when the average was 8.04 percent. The average hit a 25-year low of 6.74 percent in October.

On one-year adjustable rate mortgages, lenders were asking an average initial rate of 5.45 percent, down from 5.52 percent last week. Fifteen-year mortgages, a popular option for those refinancing mortgages, averaged 7.79 percent this week, down from 8.02 percent a week earlier.

The rates do not include add-on fees known as points.

projections that the cost of new plant and equipment is not declining as much as anticipated a few months ago.

In other words, said economist Priscilla Trumbull of the WEFA Group, a forecasting

service in Bala Cynwyd, Pa., businesses plan to spend more this year than they had said last winter but now will get less for the money. "Businesses are willing to spend more, but they're not getting the cut in prices they hoped for."

Economists expect capital investment to continue to play a leading role in continued economic growth this year, despite a series of increases by the Federal Reserve in short-term interest rates intended to keep expansion in check.

At least until recently, low interest rates combined with high corporate profits to spur the rise in investments.

Companies particularly have been buying computers and other high-tech equipment to streamline their operations. The latest reports also have shown that payrolls have been expanding more rapidly, with unemployment dropping to 6 percent.

The Labor Department reported Thursday the number of Americans applying for the first time for state unemployment benefits was unchanged last week at a seasonally adjusted 358,000.

## Keaton relives pilot's life

Amelia Earhart, the Kansas woman who captured the imagination of the world with her aviation exploits in the 1920s and 1930s, was never comfortable with her celebrity.

She knew she wasn't the greatest pilot in the world. \_\_\_\_\_

But Earhart had an almost impossible image to live up to, one created by her husband, the wealthy publisher G.P. Putnam, who put his entire publicity machine behind her.

She cringed when her valuable hubby bumbled to everyone within earshot (or within earshot of a radio) that she was "a national treasure," "the ideal of American women" and "the sweetheart of the sky."

And she bridled when he called her Lady Lindy, comparing her to the great Charles Lindbergh. There were times, she wondered, if her husband only meant that she had the angular, gaunt features of the serious Lindbergh.

What she was the best at was tenacity; she claimed to be the best person in the world about not giving up.

And that's the point of "Amelia Earhart: The Final Flight," which premieres at 6 p.m. MDT Sunday on TNT with immediate encores at 10 p.m. and midnight as well as on Wednesday, June 19, 20, 24 and 26.

Earhart has become a legend more for her mysterious disappearance during an attempt to fly around the world in 1937 than for her life. This film with Diane Keaton as Earhart and Bruce Dern as her publisher, husband seeks to correct that imbalance. And it succeeds in a jazzy but poignant way; it's smart and compelling.

## Fox releases fall lineup

The Fox Broadcasting Co., newly armed with National Football League games that helped the network land a dozen stations in a landmark deal, announced a drama-heavy prime-time lineup for fall in its latest bid to achieve parity with CBS, ABC and NBC.

Fox, known for dropping bombshells in late announcements of its schedules, disclosed the coming acquisition of its latest affiliates in time for the presentation of the new schedule to advertisers.

For nostalgia-prone couch potatoes, Fox also announced that one of its back-up series for the 1994-95 season is an updated version of the famous 1960s sitcom "Get Smart," reuniting Don Adams and Barbara Feldon as secret agents.

The youth-oriented network will have the new version of "Get Smart" focusing on their son, who is in his late 20s and, like

his incompetent father, is of the Fox Entertainment  
a "bumbling agent." .... Group, maintained.

At the same time, however, Fox is using its air for showmanship to dilute the impact of serious setbacks in the past season. It flopped in two key areas: late night, where Chevy Chase's show—folded quickly, and news, where its magazine series "Front Line" was in the ratings and now is canceled, to be replaced eventually by a new effort called "Assignment." In addition, Fox, known for its outpouring of series featuring black performers last season, has canceled five of them, including the prestigious "Roc," the controversial but much-praised and ambitious "South Central," and "Boyz n the City." It is seeking a home elsewhere for "The X-Files," "Beverly Hills, 90210," and "In Living Color," "Sinbad" and, previously, "Townsend Television," which starred Robert Townsend.

Several returning series, including "Living Single" and the raucous "Martin," star black performers. Sandy Grushow, president

of the Fox Entertainment Group, maintained, "We're not walking away from our commitment to program black television."

He noted that one of the new one-hour dramas, a police show called "Uptown Undercover," pairs two officers, one black, the other Latino. In addition, he said, another drama, "M.A.N.T.I.S.," is about a "black superhero."

With the cancellation of "In Living Color," Fox is losing one of its trademark series, an irreverent collection of sketches from a black viewpoint. Fox has scheduled as another back-up series a new sketch comedy called "House of Buggin'," which stars Latino comedian John Leguizamo.

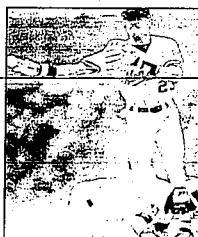

## Daytime Emmy Awards show misses with script

It is quite interesting that all of the major awards for soap operas went to the daytime dramas produced in New York City. "All My Children" picked up the Best Soap Opera Emmy and yet the show's star, Susan Lucci, was not even nominated this year (after 14 nominations and no wins).

Lucci served as host of the Daytime Emmy Awards show and the writers supplied her with ridiculously coy dialogue which she exchanged with her three co-hosts: Peter Bergman, James DePaiva and Drake Hogestyn.

The three "hunks," as Lucci described them, fawned over the diminutive hostess and kept putting their arms around her tony waist while she stroked the lapels of their tuxedos. I've seen more subtlety in a middle-school production of "The Music Man."

The trio of actors also put on a mock contest about who was to go first as Lucci's co-host and that, too, fell flatter than one of the nominees' hairdos after getting caught in a small downpour.

There were some decidedly popular wins this year, such as Justin Davis (Best Supporting Actor for "Guiding Light"), who picked up his fourth Emmy — Couldn't he loan one of his statues to Susan Lucci for a while? — and Hillary B. Smith (Best Actress for her portrayal of defense attorney Nora Gannon on "One Life to Live").

Smith's win was probably the most deserved of the entire winners' circle. She is not only one of daytime's most valid actresses, this past season she was given a substantial storyline playing the lawyer who had an uphill climb defending gang rape victim Marty Saybrook (Susan Haskell,

who won for Best Supporting Actress). She never struck a wrong chord in her long scenes in the courtroom.

Anyone who followed the rape trial was treated to some first-class acting from Ms. Haskell as the victim, Roger Howarth (he also won the Emmy for Best Younger Actor in a Drama Series) as the leader of the gang who raped Marty, and especially Hillary B. Smith.

Backstage, Smith said, "Acting in a daytime serial is like doing a tap dance on a high wire without a net. You get out there and do your thing and hope that your fellow actors are there to catch you in case you start to fall. When you work with a great cast like we have on 'One Life to Live,' you can just go out there and fly every day."

Michael Zaslow, who picked up the Best Actor Emmy for his portrayal of Roger Thorpe on "Guiding Light," spells relief E.M.-Y. "I am so happy and relieved. It's like having a monkey lifted off my third back ... this was my third nomination. It's a very tough competition each year and there are many fine actors who are nominated and each one deserves to win. I'm just elated that I got my chance this year. From now on, I can come to these events and sit back and watch."

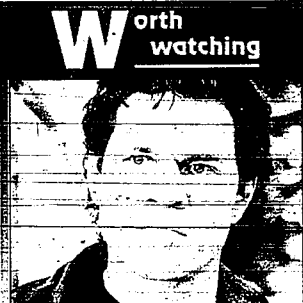
