Clinton wary of N. Korean pledge

WASHINGTON — President Clinton cautiously welcomed North Korea's pledge not to expel U.N. inspectors Thursday but said the communist regime must also agree to freeze its nuclear program during any talks with the United States.

Clinton said the United States would continue pursuing U.N. sanctions while trying to establish how far North Korea is willing to go.

Clinton appeared skeptical about assurances made by President Kim Il Sung to former President Carter Thursday during

Carter's private mission.

"It depends on what the Koreans meant by what they actually said today," Clinton said in a White House press conference.

"If today's developments mean North Korea is genuinely and verifiably prepared to freeze its nuclear program while talks go on ... then we would be willing to resume high-level talks," Clinton said.

"There is a great deal at stake," he said. "We are pursuing our interests with resolve and steadiness. We are hopeful that this de-

velopment today will be positive and we are awaiting further evidence."

Clinton made his remarks after meeting with senior foreign policy and military leaders. He said the United States would do whatever is necessary to protect American forces in South Korea and fulfill security obligations to the government in Seoul.

"There's nothing to be concerned about," the president said.

Asked if North Korea's action would undercut his drive for sanctions, Clinton said, "Not if there is nothing new here."

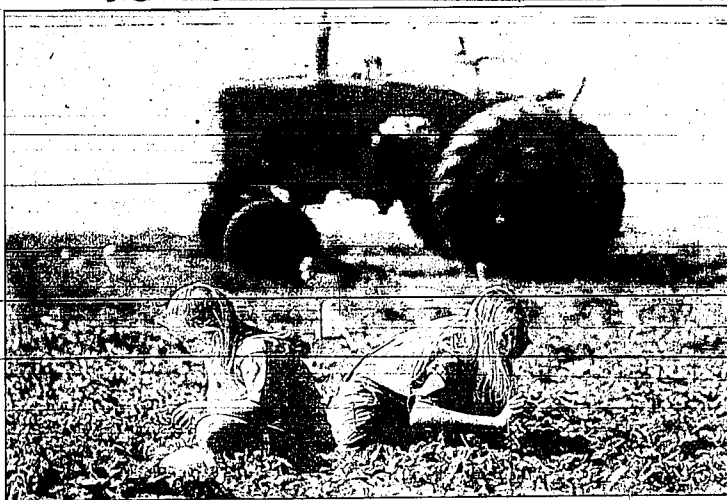
Carter relayed the North Korean position to the White House in a telephone call to

Robert L. Gallucci, the administration's chief coordinator on the nuclear dispute. Carter did not speak to Clinton.

On Capitol Hill Thursday, the Senate urged Clinton to prepare for a possible North Korean attack on U.S. and South Korean troops.

In a 98-0 vote, the Senate approved a non-binding resolution saying the United States "should immediately take all necessary and appropriate actions to enhance the preparedness and safety of United States and Republic of Korea forces to deter and, if necessary, repel, an attack for North Korea."

Senate Democrats balk at compromise

WASHINGTON — Senate Democrats came down hard against talk of health reform compromise Thursday, saying they'll settle for nothing less than universal coverage.

Meanwhile, Democrats in a divided House committee went approval of help for small business — at the expense of tobacco. And members of the Senate Finance Committee, which many see as the most likely to produce a bill that can win final passage, continued to meet behind closed doors.

"There is no universal and there is no comprehensive coverage unless all Americans are assured that as of a certain date they are going to have coverage," said Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., in a packed

Capitol news conference.

At the same time, Democrats in the House Ways and Means Committee closed ranks, voting 24-14 in party-line decisions to increase subsidies for low-income workers, pare down a proposed cigarette tax hike and delay a new long-term care program for the severely disabled.

The votes were victories for Sfin Gibbons, D-Fla., the committee's new chairman who on Wednesday barely got the Democratic support he needed to keep one of his bill's key elements: a requirement that employers pay for their workers' insurance.

"I think we have a critical mass in the committee to pass out a bill that accomplishes the president's goals," said Rep. Benjamin Cardin, D-Md. Kennedy and Sens. Tom Daschle, Jay

Rockefeller, Paul Wellstone and Bob Graham said that if Congress settles for incremental health reform, America's middle class will be hit hard.

"This is a deep moral issue," declared Rockefeller.

"It's about millions and millions of Americans who play by the rules, pay their taxes, and who work every single day and who do not have health insurance and will never have health insurance unless we act here in Congress this year to give them that universal coverage."

The junior senator from West Virginia is one of the most ardent congressional supporters of President Clinton's health reform plan, often responding more harshly than the president against attempts to weaken or undermine the bill.

Simpson at funeral as police hunt weapon

LOS ANGELES — Nicole Brown-Simpson and Ronald Lyle Goldman, slain side-by-side in a brutal attack that has grabbed the attention of the world, were buried in separate funerals Thursday, with O.J. Simpson, a suspect in the killings, silently attending the service for his former wife.

Simpson's children, 6-year-old Justin and 9-year-old Sydney, arrived and left by their father's side. They were sleeping Sunday night when an attacker killed their mother outside their fashionable Brentwood area condominium.

In Westlake Village, 20 miles north of Los Angeles, mourners gathered to grieve for Goldman, 25, a waiter and friend of Nicole Simpson whose body was found a few feet from hers just after midnight Monday. Goldman's sister, who wept as she eulogized him Thursday, spoke to his memory, saying, "I don't know if I ever told you how proud I am of the man you have become."

Even as the funerals were underway, investigators continued investi-

gating the killings and interviewed a new witness, who said she saw a car that resembled one owned by O.J. Simpson parked across the street from the residence of his former wife Sunday at about the time of the murders.

The witness, a young woman who said she jogs in the area every night, said she could not be sure whether anyone was in the car when she jogged past, but her description of the vehicle generally matches the car that police seized from Simpson's home two days ago.

"The woman — who met with a homicide detective in a church parking lot to avoid the crush of media descending around the case — said she was familiar with the cars in the area and noticed this one because it was parked in an unusual location."

"I saw a light colored Ford Bronco or Blazer type car," the woman, who asked not to be identified, said in an interview with the Los Angeles Times. She added that she did not see any activity outside the house.

Police have not released the exact time of death, but sources have placed it roughly between 10 p.m. and 11 p.m. PDT Sunday. The woman spotted the car between 9:45 p.m. and 10:10 p.m., she said.

Monday, police seized a white Ford Bronco from Simpson's home and recovered blood samples from the upholstery in that vehicle. They are testing those samples to determine whether the blood might have come from either of the victims or from Simpson.

Other blood samples taken from the scene of the crime match O.J. Simpson's blood type, sources close to the case have said. Such a match does not prove Simpson was at the murder scene, because many people have the same blood types.

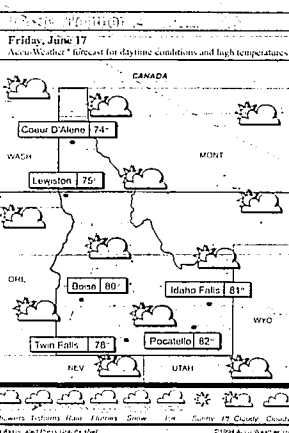
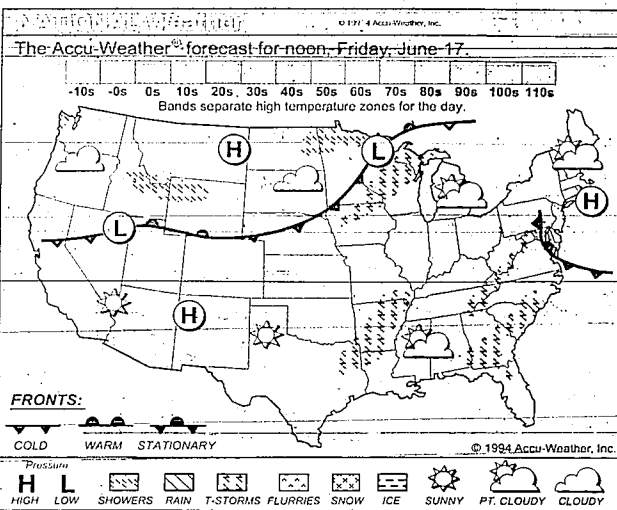
Investigators also are combing clothing, shoes and other items seized from Simpson's home to determine whether any of them contain blood stains and to see whether the tracks found at the murder scene sources said, in Chicago, police roamed a field near the hotel where Simpson briefly stayed Monday.

Weather summary

A trough of low pressure in the upper atmosphere continues to control the weather in the Pacific Northwest. A surface low pressure area in southern Wyoming brought a few light showers to southeast Idaho Thursday morning. Another area of low pressure located in southern British Columbia brought showers to northern Idaho and western Montana for much of the day. Afternoon skies were generally cloudy with scattered light rain falling in the Panhandle, but sunny to mostly sunny in most other locations. Mullan and Grangeville had light rain for much of the afternoon. Totals were generally less than 10 inch although Grangeville reported .59 and Lowell .57. Winds were generally in the 10 to 15 mph range with occasional gusts up to 25 mph in the southern sections. The highest temperature in the state Wednesday was 74 degrees at Malad and Payette. West shivers in record cold while East bakes in record heat

The West shivered under record low temperatures Thursday while the East baked in a record-setting heat wave. Numerous cities set record highs for the date, including Fort Wayne, Ind., (96 degrees), Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., (88), South Bend, Ind., (95), La Crosse, Wis., (94) and Pittsburgh (95). Milwaukee reported a high of 100 degrees, breaking a mark established in 1922 and 1939 and setting a record for the second straight day. The temperature in Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., was the highest record for the date in 84 years. Many other cities tied record highs, including Rochester, N.Y., (93), Toledo, Ohio, (98), Madison, Wis., (93), Youngstown, Ohio, (91) and Washington, D.C., (98). Green Bay, Wis., reported a high of 93 degrees, matching a mark set in 1891. Chicago opened its public pools 10 days

early-to-help its residents cope. Schools in Washington, D.C., and its suburbs closed two hours early. Meanwhile, the West was suffering the opposite problem. The temperature fell to 35 degrees in Great Falls, Mont., tying a 100-year-old record. Other record lows were tied in Havre, Mont., (34) and Santa Maria, Calif., (42). Temperatures fell into the 30s and 40s across the northern Rockies and the Pacific Northwest. Key West, Fla., reported an overnight reading of 82 degrees while Elko, Nev., fell to 29 degrees. Thundershowers once again rumbled across the East and Southeast, the Tennessee and Ohio valleys and parts of the southern central Plains. Some of the thundershowers produced strong winds and hail, downing trees and power lines in Ohio, Indiana, Missouri and Virginia. Heavy rains prompted flood watches for much of Ohio.

Davidians refuse to seek leniency

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Some followers of doomsday prophet David Koresh restated their innocence before a federal judge Thursday and refused to beg for leniency for crimes during a shootout that killed four federal agents. Others asked for mercy, saying they simply wanted to get on with their lives. The sentencing hearing for the eight Branch Davidians opened Thursday before U.S. District Judge Walter Smith. He was expected to sentence them today. "I hope Judge Smith that you have a squeaky clean record," defendant Renee Avram said after a rambling half-hour speech. "I hope you can stand before God. We're all going to stand before God." Smith will sentence the Davidians for their actions during the Feb. 28, 1993, raid at Koresh's compound near Waco. The raid led to a shootout that

mercy as you can on all of us as a group," he said. Fagan, Avram and three others were convicted of voluntary manslaughter, which carries up to 10 years in prison. The five plus two more were convicted of using or carrying a firearm during commission of a crime. Prosecutors are seeking 30-year sentences on that charge, claiming the weapons were automatic or otherwise illegal. Defense attorneys dispute that claim and argue for only five-year terms. An eighth Davidian faces up to 20 years in prison on two other weapons charges. Also Thursday, a construction company gave began preliminary work for cleanup of the Koresh compound. The company will remove lead-contaminated soil, spilled diesel fuel, sewage and other waste left behind after the fire.

Kempthorne, Boise's mayor from 1986-1993, said the bill also would require the federal budget office to consult with local officials before enacting new mandates. "We're now dealing with it on the front end," he said.

Twin Falls County Commissioner Jim Friley said the county would have an easier time keeping up with federal mandates if grant money was available to pay for them.

The county has applied unsuccessfully two years straight for grants to meet standards of the federal Americans with Disabilities Act, Friley said.

Even with some recent modifications, "the courthouse is certainly not up to ADA standards," he said. It would appear that Kempthorne's bill also has the support of the White House.

President Clinton, addressing the nation's mayors on Monday, acknowledged the need for the federal government to help cities and states comply with federal mandates.

"What we do here in Washington, can only work if we give the people in your communities back home the tools they need to get the things done that have to be done," Clinton said.

Leon Panetta, director of the president's Office of Management and Budget, also has expressed his support for legislation curbing unfunded federal mandates. Clinton and Panetta say they appreciate Congressional efforts to achieve bipartisan compromise on the bill.

A majority in both houses of Congress have signed onto Kempthorne's bill and a similar bill introduced by Rep.-Gary A. Condit, D-Wash.

Kempthorne said Thursday he hopes to have the bill passed and signed by the end of the year.

Musician found dead

SEATTLE (AP) — The bass player for Courtney Love's band Hole was found dead Thursday in her bathtub with syringes and what appeared to be drug paraphernalia, police said.

The cause of the 26-year-old Kristen Pfaff's death was not immediately determined. An autopsy was scheduled for Friday.

Love is the lead singer for the alternative punk rock group Hole. Love's husband, Kurt Cobain, lead singer for the ground-breaking grunge-rock band Nirvana, killed himself in April.

The company said Thursday it has no plans to recall boxes already in grocery stores and does not know how many boxes are affected. It described what happened as a technical problem and said the cereal is safe.

trotting with metal detectors as they searched for a defective weapon.

As investigators continued their review of the physical evidence and their interviews with possible witnesses, families of the two victims gathered separately for a pair of funerals.

About 200 close friends and family made their way to Nicole Simpson's funeral at St. Martin of Tours Catholic Church in Brentwood Thursday morning, under sunny skies and the buzz of media helicopters.

O.J. Simpson emerged from one and lingered briefly with other family members outside the side entrance. On both sides, he held the hands of his children.

After the hour-long service, family and friends paused outside the side entrance, surrounding O.J. Simpson. Guests embraced, chatting and laughing quietly.

At a tiny Westlake Village chapel, roughly 400 of Goldman's friends and relatives followed the pews. Some stood in the chapel's aisle and while others huddled by the doorway and listened to loudspeakers placed outside. Kim Goldman, 22, wept as she said farewell to her brother.

showed the pesticide did not present a health hazard.

The pesticide was "virtually identical" to another that is approved for use on oats, said Austin Sullivan, vice president of corporate communications for General Mills, the nation's No. 2 cereal maker behind the Kellogg Co. of Battle Creek, Mich. "If they (the FDA and the EPA) thought there was a health hazard, they and we would have pulled the product long ago."

The FDA notified General Mills on June 10 that the pesticide, chlorpyrifos-ethyl, was detected in a routine inspection of grain elevators in Duluth and Superior, Wis.

In its subsequent investigation, General Mills found that an independent, licensed pesticide contractor had improperly used the pesticide as a substitute for chlorpyrifos-methyl, a similar chemical that is approved for use on oats.

The improper treatments involving 15 million bushels of oats dated to May 1993.

Rabbi Gary Johnson led the brief service, focusing on the need for faith in the face of such a violent and sudden tragedy.

The burials were haunted by the possibility of exhumations, as Shapiro had said he wanted a leading national pathologist to conduct his own autopsies in order to check the work of the Los Angeles County coroner. Police are nearly ready to forward their investigation to the Los Angeles county district attorney's office, but prosecutors and police are discussing whether to arrest Simpson and then file charges against him or to submit the evidence to a grand jury and seek an indictment.

'Fresh' chicken may be frozen

WASHINGTON (AP) — Celebrity chef Wolfgang Puck pulled out the store-bought chicken and let it hit the table with a sharp thump.

He and lawmakers also went bowling with him.

"I'm surprised they let this through the security check," Puck told members of Congress. "It is more like a weapon than a chicken."

The chicken had been frozen to 20 degrees, still fresh by current standards at the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In fact, it's still fresh until this zero.

Puck's prop was one of several introduced Thursday to show people that "fresh" on that package of chicken may not mean what most people think.

Rep. Edolphus Towns, D-N.Y., caressed one bird from his local supermarket and pronounced it "soft as a baby's bottom," but proclaimed another "hard as a rock." Puck, owner of the trendy Spago restaurant in Los Angeles, and members of Congress from California later took part in a media event in which they bowled with the birds and served California chicken.

California's poultry industry put on the bowling event, which dovetailed with a hearing by Towns' Government Operations subcommittee and a subcommittee chaired by Rep. Gary Condit, D-Calif.

Towns' subcommittee has been investigating whether the Agriculture Department can fairly regulate a meat industry that it also promotes.

The subcommittee, especially Republican members, wanted to examine whether Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy and who had received favors from the poultry industry.

But the matter is under Justice Department review, meaning no witnesses from the department's Office of Inspector General could testify.

California enacted a law last year forbidding poultry that has been chilled below 26 degrees to be labeled fresh. That's near the point

where the freezing begins in turkeys and chicken.

The National Broiler Council and the Arkansas Poultry Federation said that would close California to interstate shipments of "fresh" poultry from Arkansas and other leading broiler states.

The long trip and multiple stops require that trucks often be chilled to temperatures well below 26 to keep the birds from spoiling.

A federal judge in California struck down the California law because it conflicted with federal law. But Espy said in February the department would review the regulations.

"I think we have concern both for consumer perceptions of what is fresh and for food safety issues," Deputy Secretary Richard E. Rominger told Towns' subcommittee. "We want to consider both."

He said the department would hold hearings on the issue starting this summer, and a scientific committee would be reviewing the department's research next month.

The department in 1988 first considered a 26-degree cutoff point for the fresh label, said Lester M. Crawford, former administrator of the Food Safety and Inspection Service.

But Crawford said the industry's National Broiler Council intervened and the idea was dropped.

Kenneth May, a scientist with the National Broiler Council, argued that "freshness is not a simple matter of temperature alone."

"Product freshness is a condition in which a product exhibits various characteristics," he said, including "taste, aroma, bacterial quality and nutritional characteristics."

For example, organisms that cause spoilage cease to grow at 14 degrees, and all water molecules in poultry don't freeze until zero.

Ruling lets U.S. West carry video signals

SEATTLE — In a decision invoking technology, First Amendment rights and rate-reducing competition, a federal judge Wednesday gave US West clearance to offer video programming over its phone lines in Washington and 13 other Western states.

It is the second such ruling at the federal-district-court level and won't result in an overnight alternative to current cable service.

But the decision issued here yesterday by District Judge Barbara Rothstein is a significant step as the federal government tries to catch up to technological and economic realities as regulator and as facilitator of the information superhighway.

In her ruling, Rothstein endorsed the notion that it no longer makes sense to prohibit phone companies from conveying television content. She noted that current law defining such content by its nature violates the First Amendment.

Her decision comes in the middle of a vast industry transition from one-way broadcast television to interactive, on-demand video and data.

Last August, a federal judge in Virginia made a similar ruling in behalf of Bell Atlantic. That case is being appealed.

US West Communications Inc.

and three other plaintiffs — US West Multimedia Communications — the Washington Independent Telephone Association and Pacific Telecom — brought a suit in November because federal-court decisions like the Virginia one do not apply elsewhere.

The Washington Independent Telephone Association consists of smaller phone companies within Washington. Pacific Telecom offers phone service in 11 states, including Washington.

With the gradual lifting of legal hurdles, technical challenges still face the numerous phone companies nationwide that hope to expand their role as information providers. It's only a matter of time, though — perhaps a few years — before broadband and software solutions are widely in place on phone systems.

Telephone giants and others have contended that if phone companies are allowed to offer video services, there will be no competition, fostering innovation and lower rates for consumers.

Even defendants in the lawsuit — the Federal Communications Commission and Justice Department — previously recommended the video limitations on phone companies be rescinded.

Rothstein ruled that the reasons for the TV prohibition can be addressed in ways far short of an outright ban of phone-company involvement in television.

O.J. faced long odds in escape from projects

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — As a kid, O.J. Simpson faced long odds.

He was born with rickets, was raised in a single-parent home and confronted trouble daily in the housing project where he grew up.

Gangs were a temptation, and young Orenthal James once spent a weekend in juvenile hall after being involved in a fight.

His high school junior varsity coach, Jack McBride, recalled finding Simpson and two other top athletes throwing dice in the boys' bathroom on the first day of football practice.

But Simpson had something the other kids on the block didn't — his mother, Eunice Simpson.

"There were always three meals on the table. The house was kept up and he always had a mother at home he could go to," longtime friend Jon Greenberg said.

When Simpson got into trouble, it

was his mother who helped straighten him out, Greenberg said.

"It could have been very easy for him to get into a lot of trouble around here, but he had the wherewithal and the mind to listen to people with good advice, namely his mother," Greenberg said.

"He made up his mind that he just was going to pull himself above that," agreed Simpson's former high school coach, Jack McCaffrey. "He was motivated in the sense that he knew if he elected to go down and act like the rest of the idiots ... he wasn't going to get anywhere."

All of which makes it that much harder for Simpson's friends and admirers to believe their hero could be involved in the slayings of his ex-wife and a male friend.

"It's just a jolt," said McCaffrey, who coached Simpson at Galileo High School from 1962 to 1965.

McCaffrey met Simpson as a high school sophomore. O.J. was a slow bloomer; in his junior year the team went 0-9. But the next year, the team mustered a respectable 5-3 record, including upsetting favored St. Ignace.

Vera Straighter, raised across the street from Simpson in the Potrero Hill housing projects, remembers the dashing gridiron star of those days.

He'd go to football practice with his little cloths over his shoulder every day, she said. "He was never late for his practice. You could tell he was going to be something."

Simpson used to stop to talk to her, attentions that drove her steady boyfriend, Johnny Straighter, to get into a fight with the future Hall of Famer, she said.

"I was, 'Wow, these guys are fighting over me,'" she said, laughing. The fight over, the three became

friends, and today the Straighters are adamant in their support of Simpson.

"I think the man was set up," declared Straighter's son, Johnny Jr., who lives in the building next to where Simpson grew up.

Friends remember little of O.J.'s father, Jimmy Lee Simpson, who died in 1986. Greenberg said he believes the couple was divorced early in O.J.'s life.

But they all remember his mother, who still lives in San Francisco. A nurse at nearby San Francisco General Hospital, she was a strong, choreographing person, Greenberg said. The Associated Press was unable to reach her for comment.

At his induction into the Hall of Fame, Simpson thanked his mother, saying, "You just don't know what it is to be 8 years old and all your friends think you have the best mother in the neighborhood."

After 33 years, wallet returned

INDIANA, Pa. (AP) — Mary Brewer got her wallet back, and almost everything was there.

Black-and-white snapshots. Three-cent stamp. Driver's license — from 1961. The only thing missing was the \$9 she planned to use to buy vitamins because she was pregnant with her first child. That was 33 years ago.

"There are certain things you remember," said Mrs. Brewer, who is now 52. "It was traumatic. I remember being very upset about it."

Mrs. Brewer was 19 when the wallet disappeared. She left it in her car, which was parked in a bowling-alley parking lot, and went to church. When she came back, the wallet was gone.

A construction-worker named Martin Snyder recently found the wallet between partitions of a wall in the men's room of the bowling alley, which is being demolished. Mrs. Brewer guesses that a thief took her money and ditched the wallet in the bowling alley.

Adviser says U.S. needs Burma's aid

WASHINGTON — The United States must "engage" Burma, the world's largest producer of opium, if it wants to curtail heroin trafficking in Southeast Asia, President Clinton's top drug policy adviser, says he was told by officials in the region.

However, the United States withdrew its ambassador and terminated financial assistance to Burma six years ago because of human rights violations in the country its rulers now call Myanmar.

Lee Brown, director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy, would not say if his new anti-heroin strategy, which he expects to recommend to Clinton in another month, would seek to change this.

Democrats target Clinton's China policy

WASHINGTON — Four senior Democrats challenged President Clinton's China policy Thursday with a bill to impose targeted sanctions on Chinese goods because of Beijing's poor human rights record.

The bill would revoke China's most-favored-nation trade status on products made by the Chinese army, defense-related companies and certain state-owned enterprises.

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, said he was coming out against Clinton's decision to separate trade and human rights because it "will confirm for the Chinese communist regime the success of its policy of repression on human rights and manipulation on trade."

Women testify for health care reform

WASHINGTON — One after another, women stepped up to the microphone in a congressional caucus room Thursday to tell their most personal stories — about menopause, lumps in their breasts, domestic abuse and bulimia.

In a meeting to push for improved women's care in health reform, hundreds of other women cheered them on.

"All I need to say to all of you is that we've just begun to fight," said Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala, who joined about a dozen congresswomen in hearing what the women had to say.

'Grande Dame of Aspen' dies at 91

ASPEN, Colo. — Elizabeth Nitze Paepeke, the "Grande Dame of Aspen" who helped transform the town from a sleepy mining community into a cultural center, died at her home here Wednesday. She was 91.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Paepeke and her husband, Walter, Aspen became an internationally known center of intellectual dialogue, music and the arts, as well as a famous ski resort.

Mrs. Paepeke was the daughter of William A. Nitze, professor of Romance languages at the University of Chicago. She married Paepeke, the president of the Chicago-based Container Corp. of America, in 1922. Their principal residence was in Chicago. He died in 1960.

Brains of 26 corpses given to school

PHILADELPHIA — The Medical Examiner's office received the brains of 26 corpses without notifying their families and donated the organs to a medical school for anatomy classes, The Philadelphia Inquirer reported Thursday.

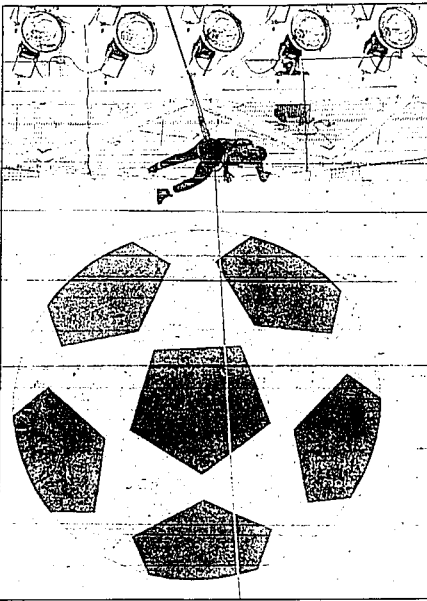
"They didn't give us any information," said Leon White Sr., whose son's brain was removed. "They didn't have to get permission to do something like this?"

The newspaper said that by law, the city should have received the consent of the family before giving the brains to the University of Pennsylvania Medical School.

CHICAGO (AP) — Quick, who are Lothar Matthaus and Marco Antonio Echeverry?

For denizens of a city who automatically think "Da Bears" when you say "football," the question provokes blank stares, wild guesses or worse.

"Those are people?" asks a puzzled North Side physician.

Only avid soccer buffs — scarcer in Chicago than Republicans who will own up to it — know Matthaus and Echeverry are top players for Germany and Bolivia. Their teams meet today in the opening match of the coast-to-coast sprawl called World Cup '94.

President Clinton will be there. So will German Chancellor Helmut Kohl and Bolivian President Gonzalo Sanchez de Lozada.

Hey, singer Diana Ross headlines the pre-game gala — this is big!

So, is the city abuzz with excitement? Gripped by "fossil fuel fever" — in Chicago-gal? Naaaah...

"You mean kickball?" sneers one downtown office worker.

Another dismisses the idea that soccer is a sport.

Chicago, site of five of the 52 games, is outdoing itself to show its best side to an expected 300,000 tourists. On tap are a parade, a downtown festival, a tournament for kids, some ooh-ah fireworks and a lakefront concert by tenor Placido Domingo.

"This is the single most important tourism event that will happen in our lifetime," gushes Leslie Fox, the city's World Cup promotion coordinator.

Chicago is strewn with soccer ball symbols: banners on light poles, stickers on highway signs, posters on city buses.

But the frenzied festooning doesn't impress Derek Rector, who was handing out free tickets to a promotional festival this week.

"Crowd-building is difficult for soccer," Rector says. "People are like, they don't even know what it is. Then they find out and they're worried about riots."

But the security types in the city of big shoulders are confident.

It's a different crowd at the World Cup level, says Jim Frosdof of World Cup USA's local organizing committee. "The people who come over here will spend thousands of dollars. They're not coming over to spend it in jail."

Not all corners of the city are soccer-comatose. In the city's ethnic neighborhoods, whose residents come from countries where soccer is a national passion, there is button-busting elation. For such fans, World Cup is a happy collision of Super Bowl, World Series and Olympics fervor.

World Cup has been the talk of his patrons for weeks, says Herbert Stober, owner of Resi's Bierstube, a boisterous German pub on the northwest side. Stober, born in Karlsruhe, Germany, says he's bringing in his spare TV so tavern patrons can watch the match Friday afternoon.

Assistant editor Howard Chang says the Chicago-based Korea Times will be "covering it every day."

"It means a lot to us because it's the first time World Cup has been held in the United States," says the South Korean-born Chang, "and it's the third straight time South Korea has participated." South Korea plays Spain in the Cup's second contest, Friday evening in Dallas.

Baptists embrace dialogue

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Southern Baptists and Roman Catholics can be more than political soul mates, the nation's largest Protestant denomination declared Thursday.

In a major step toward ecumenism, the Southern Baptist Convention said here again believers may be found in all Christian denominations, and endorsed Baptist-Catholic dialogue.

"We live in a land where there is a demonic onslaught against the forces of decency and righteousness, and we need to stand with good people together," Timothy George, dean of Beeson Divinity School in Montgomery, Ala., told the convention on the final day of its 137th annual meeting.

The declaration overwhelmingly approved by about 7,500 convention delegates places no limits on the freedom of Baptists to persuade other Christians to switch churches. It also acknowledges serious theological differences with Catholics on issues that include papal infallibility and the relation between the Bible and church tradition.

Set against the historical enmity between the nation's two largest religious groups, the formal declaration of the desire for dialogue was seen as historically significant.

AMA alters
way doctors
list income

CHICAGO (AP) — Tired of being told they make too much money, doctors are going to juggle the books to make it seem they're earning less.

The American Medical Association is changing the way it calculates doctors' incomes, lumping the salaries of private practitioners with those of federal government doctors and young doctors in training, who make considerably less.

"Yeah, it's an accounting change," said Dr. Nancy W. Dickey, the AMA's secretary-treasurer. "But the press leaves out the footnotes. Therefore our only choice is to make a change so the numbers show the whole picture. Now the physician looks less like he's gouging America."

The latest calculations, based on 1992 data, show that the mean income of U.S. doctors in private practice is \$177,400 per year. That varies from \$111,600 for general practitioners to \$253,300 for radiologists, the highest paid group.

In contrast, doctors in training earn only \$22,000 to \$30,000 per year. The AMA has not previously collected information on the incomes of government doctors, but they are known to earn much less than doctors in private practice.

The AMA adopted the accounting change at its annual meeting, which ended Thursday. The first reports reflecting the change are expected in two or three years.

"It's an unabashed deception of the public or anyone else who would want to know what physicians make," said Dr. Sidney Wolfe, director of Public Citizen's Health Research Group in Washington, D.C. "It sounds like the kind of snake oil that the AMA is very fond of criticizing others for."

But Dickey argued that the current figures reflect only doctors' prime earning years. They fail to take account of the many years of training that doctors undergo and the long hours they work.

"I think the doctors were trying to say, 'Let's give the whole picture,'" she said.

Doctors leave medical school with an average of \$50,000 to \$100,000 in debt, she said. They spend three to 10 years as residents in training, working 80 to 100 hours per week.

Federal courts have yet to recognize inherent right to own gun

WASHINGTON — Thanks to the efforts of the National Rifle Association, nearly everyone knows that the Second Amendment speaks of "the right of the people to keep and bear arms."

It is less known, however, that no federal court has ever struck down a gun control law based on the Second Amendment.

While the principle remains popular that every law-abiding person has the right to own a gun, most legal experts

say the Second Amendment is something of a dead letter.

"The claim that gun-control laws violate the Second Amendment has no legal or historical basis," 27 prominent law professors said in a statement published recently in several newspapers. They said the public accepts a false view of the amendment because it has been mislabeled by the NRA, which has suffered its biggest legislative defeats in the last year as Congress passed the Brady handgun-control bill and is likely to approve a ban on assault weapons.

Former Chief Justice Warren E. Burger has gone so far as to accuse the NRA of perpetrating a "fraud on the American people" by maintaining that individuals have a right to own guns.

Writing during the bicentennial celebration of the Bill of Rights, Burger said the Second Amendment was intended to ensure that states could maintain their militias.

"There is no support in the Constitution for the argument that federal and state governments are powerless to regulate the purchase of such

firearms," Burger wrote. "Surely the Second Amendment does not remotely guarantee every person the constitutional right to have a 'Saturday Night Special' or a machine gun without any regulation whatsoever."

Adopted in 1791 as part of the Bill of Rights, the Second Amendment says: "A well-regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed."

The Supreme Court has taken up the meaning of the amendment only once, in a 1939 case that arose over the arrest

of two Arkansas hoodlums. Jack Miller and Frank Layton were stopped crossing state lines and were charged with transporting an unregistered sawed-off shotgun. In 1934, Congress had passed the National Firearms Act to combat Prohibition-era gangsters, and it required registration and a tax to be paid on certain guns.

Lawyers for Miller claimed the gun law violated the Second Amendment, but the high court rejected that view. Its opinion examined the Colonial history behind the Second Amendment and concluded that the framers of the

Constitution sought to protect the states' right to raise militias.

The Second Amendment had "the obvious purpose to assure the continuation and render possible the effectiveness of such (state) forces," the court said. Unless a gun-control law interferes with "the preservation or efficiency of a well-regulated militia, we cannot say that the Second Amendment guarantees the right to keep and bear such an instrument."

Since then, the courts have routinely rejected claims that an individual's right to bear arms is protected.

Clinton plans summer job program

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Clinton administration plans to create more than 600,000 summer jobs for high school and college students Thursday to hire more than 300,000 other teenagers and young adults.

The government will spend \$908 million to create 623,000 jobs for poor youth from age 14 to 21 who live in communities with high rates of unemployment. That is less than the \$1 billion spent two years ago, when the program served more than 780,000 participants. The cost per participant is up from \$1,282 in 1992 to an expected \$1,458 this year.

Assistant Secretary of Labor Doug Ross said the program costs more per person because many participants now also receive mathematics and reading instruction over the summer.

"We're now investing in learning, not just paying you ... to show up on your summer job site,"

Ross said during a news conference.

He said 40 percent of the participants took advantage of the educational offerings, last year, and the agency hopes to raise that to half this year.

Participants in the program earn at least minimum wage. Last year, they worked an average 32 to 36 hours a week for eight weeks. Local program operators determine the kinds of jobs in which they are placed.

Local officials are pushing to increase the number of young workers hired for the summer by private employers from 300,000 last year to 330,000 this year. A series of public service announcements being sent to television stations across the nation include Labor Secretary Robert Reich, Georgetown University basketball coach John Thompson and others describing their summer jobs and thanking entrepreneurs. "Someone gave you a chance, give someone theirs."

Japanese royalty visit U.N., seek seat

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — In a meticulously organized minuet of diplomacy, Japanese royalty on Thursday visited the United Nations, where their country aspires to a permanent seat on the Security Council.

Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali, who favors Japan's membership on the council, greeted the Emperor Akihito and Empress Michiko at U.N. headquarters as U.N. and Japanese flags flew side by side. The U.N. chief rarely leaves his 38th floor office to greet visitors at his front door.

The royal couple also greeted Japanese U.N. staff, and the emperor praised them for contributing to the world organization's efforts to promote peace.

The emperor, wearing a dark blue suit, and the empress, in a beige silk and brocade kimono, toured the General Assembly Hall and the Security Council chamber. The council, however, was not in session when they viewed the vaulted hall decorated with a mural of a phoenix rising from the ashes of World War II.

U.N. security, already tight because of death threats by Islamic extremists against Boutros-Ghali, an Egyptian Coptic Christian, was even more formidable for the Japanese visit. Bomb-sniffing dogs patrolled the carpeted hallways before they arrived.

The royal couple stopped at the Peace Bell, presented in 1954 by the U.N. Association of Japan in the name of the Japanese people. The bell, 3 feet tall and 2 feet in diameter, was cast from coins donated by nations and individuals and bearing the inscription in Japanese: "Long Live Absolute World Peace."

Scientists find kidney disorder gene

NEW YORK (AP) — Scientists have found the gene responsible for most cases of a potentially lethal disorder that progressively disables the kidneys with hundreds of cysts.

The illness, polycystic kidney disease, affects an estimated 500,000 or more Americans and is one of the most common hereditary disorders.

Experts said the discovery will help scientists find out just how the gene causes disease when it is flawed, which in turn may eventually lead to treatments.

No cure is known now.

The gene's discovery should also aid in diagnosing the disease early, before symptoms appear, which can alert doctors to watch for treatable complications such as high blood pressure and kidney infections, experts said. Symptoms, such as pain in one's back or side or the complications of a person's 30s or later.

Although the kidney disease comes in a very rare form that kills

children, the vast majority of cases are diagnosed in adults. About half of people who get the adult form develop potentially deadly kidney damage, and require dialysis or a kidney transplant.

The disease makes hundreds of fluid-filled cysts grow in the kidney, sometimes to the size of eggs or larger. They can crowd out normal cells and make the kidney fail. The kidney can swell from the size of a fist to that of a football or larger.

Burglar shooting doesn't warrant prosecutor's time

The big question in criminal justice this week (aside from the ones about O.J. Simpson, of course) is whether gun dealer Floyd Hazen will face charges for plugging a fleeing burglar.

Here's our advice for prosecutors: Sit this one out. Hazen owns Blue Lake Sporting Goods and lives in the same building. Early Tuesday morning he surprised a burglar who was getting set to haul away a good share of the inventory. So Hazen put a bullet in the burglar's thigh.

That bullet poses a legal question for Twin Falls County Prosecutor G. Richard Bevan. A political one, too. The legal question is, did Hazen have a right to shoot? Bevan said Wednesday he didn't know the answer yet.

Idaho law says you can shoot somebody in order to "prevent an illegal attempt by force to take or injure property." That wording seems unclear in Hazen's case.

Fortunately, the political question is simpler to answer: Bevan would be nuts to charge Hazen. The case would become a circus for the national media and the gun lobby.

Besides, look at the facts. The wounded man is an illegal alien from

Juarez, Mexico. He arrived in Twin Falls just last week. Police aren't sure of his identity.

Apparently, this guy moved up here to take advantage of the juicy opportunities in the U.S. carry-out industry. Not a bad career move. But burglarizing a gun shop while the owner was on the premises was, shall we say, a judgment error.

Now the criminal-justice system is saddled with prosecuting this guy, paying his medical bills and, presumably, shipping him home.

Let's not delay his departure by making him the star witness in a case against Hazen.

Granted, criminal laws are supposed to protect everyone equally — rich, poor, citizen, alien — even suspected burglars. Folks aren't supposed to appoint themselves judge and executioner when they catch a perpetrator in the act.

Yeah, yeah. But does anyone want to see Floyd Hazen punished for thinning the predator population?

Heck, lots of folks probably wish he had aimed higher.

Unless further investigation turns up some mighty unexpected facts about the shooting, prosecutors should find some more pressing cases to work on.

Babbitt has done it again!

Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt is again bushing the resource-based industries that form the foundation of many Western states' economies. This time, his target is hardwood miners, whom he irrationally likens to the outlaws of old — except that Babbitt admits they haven't broken any laws. In conjuring up comparisons to the Old West, Babbitt has declared the mining industry guilty of, well ... obeying the law.

Still steamed by a federal court order to award the mining patents to American Bar Resources, Babbitt used the opportunity to grandstand at a carefully orchestrated patent-signing ceremony. Babbitt accused the mining industry of stealing taxpayer wealth — but then admitted the industry was merely following the law.

There are important details that Mr. Babbitt didn't mention. Babbitt took a very large risk when he laid out \$62 million in 1987 to purchase the rights to this property. Through careful exploration, technological innovation and a billion-dollar investment, Babbitt discovered a significant mineral deposit — it was the

current mining law that allowed Babbitt to undertake the financial risk, conduct extensive exploration, discover the minerals, develop the project and, ultimately, take ownership of the land.

Without incentives available under this law, Babbitt wouldn't have invested in such a risky project and the mineral deposit would have remained undiscovered and undeveloped. Taxpayers would benefit not a dime from the land because 1,500 mining jobs and more than 4,000 jobs in supporting activities wouldn't be created. The millions of tax dollars from these jobs, this increased economic activity and Babbitt's profits would never pour into federal and state coffers.

Babbitt and his anti-mining cohorts would have us believe there is \$10 billion worth of gold bars sitting there just waiting to be collected. Wrong. The claims only provide Babbitt the raw land that contains gold ore. For the gold ore to be worth anything at all, it must be mined and processed into a product. Babbitt will have to spend billions more to properly develop this site.

Babbitt's melodramatic denouncement may make for good theater, but it advances lousy public policy. By trying to lasso the industry and throw thousands of people out of work, Babbitt would cripple a major source of economic activity in the West. The real "heist" here is Babbitt's attempt to take high-wage jobs away from Americans who need them.

Geneva: Amending U.S. laws

On May 20, a trade panel in Geneva invalidated a law passed by the U.S. Congress as being in restraint of trade. The law was the ban on importing tuna into the United States that was caught by dolphin-killing purple seine nets. Dolphin swim above the schools of tuna and are caught and drowned when the nets are drawn up tight.

Under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, the Tribunal in Geneva composed of men we have never heard of in our lives may rule that any of our environmental, health and safety laws are contrary to the trade "agreement." The United States is bound in such a case to revoke that law. In case you, gentle reader, care not a speck about the intelligent cetaceans such as Flipper, be aware that our food-labeling laws are next on the list.

Also being eyed for Tribunal revocation are the fuel-efficiency laws. Some old geezers hired by whom and serving at whose pleasure can sit in Geneva and nullify your laws passed by the congressmen we elected.

In case you want to fight it or Congress wants to assert its constitutional mandate to regulate commerce, you and Congress are whistling in the wind. GATT, the Uruguay version, is soon to be voted on in Congress. It is a one-way transfer of the power of self-government. There is no mechanism in the agreement for protest, appeal, hearing by any states or individuals. Only businesses have that prerogative — international businesses the size of Nes-

tle or Rhone-Poulenc; others will not be heard.

As you think about next November's election, remember: Your congressmen may have to ask Geneva in advance — "Is this law agreeable with you?" Think of gun sales, of food additives, selling logs to Japan, of patents and of your right to buy medicines and vitamins of your own choosing. Only what Geneva allows.

Think of 1994 as the year our Constitution was amended in Geneva.

• Our teachers want us to support and help each other, and they help us during recess, lunch time and after school. They care!

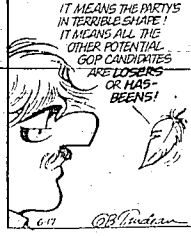
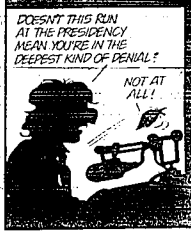
• If we don't master a concept, we will go to a special class or to another classroom in the same grade for extra help.

U.S. broke faith in drafting sanctions Russian says

MOSCOW (AP) — Russia's foreign minister angrily accused the United States Thursday of violating an agreement to consult with Moscow before proposing sanctions against North Korea.

"We are not going to support the sanctions being proposed without having consulted us," Andrei Kozyrev said in comments carried by the Interfax and ITAR-Tass news agencies.

The White House disputed Kozyrev's claim, saying the Clinton administration had discussed sanctions with President Yeltsin's government and continued to do so.

China stands with agreement

BEIJING (AP) — China said Thursday it stands by a three-decade-old agreement with North Korea that commits the Communist neighbors to defend each other against attack.

"A Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman, Shen Guofang, said China and North Korea were 'as close really as lips and teeth.'"

At a weekly briefing, Shen voiced China's opposition to the U.N. Security Council involving itself in the dispute over North Korea's refusal to allow full inspections of its nuclear facilities, despite treaty obligations.

Russian writer disappointed

MOSCOW (AP) — Alexander Solzhenitsyn, who is slowly traversing his homeland by train after 20 years in exile, expressed disappointment Thursday that most Russians haven't read his books.

"I thought that I was returning to a Russia which had read me, and it has turned out that Russia has not read me," he said at the end of a five-day stay in the Siberian city of Irkutsk, the ITAR-Tass news agency reported.

The Nobel laureate blamed it on the fact that he was the last of the writers exiled by the Soviet Union to be published in the country.

His novel "One Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich" was published in 1962, but it wasn't until the late 1980s that "The Gulag Archipelago" and virtually all his other works were allowed to be published by Soviet authorities.

In an opinion poll released Wednesday, 44 percent of those responding said they had never read any of Solzhenitsyn's books and 11 percent said they had but couldn't remember exactly what. Another 11 percent didn't know who he was.

Demonstrators want feminist author dead

DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP) — About 2,000 Muslim fundamentalists marched through Dhaka on Thursday demanding the execution of an author who has called for changes in Islamic laws to give women equal rights.

It was the latest threat against Taslima Nasreen, who went into hiding last week when a court ordered her arrest on charges of attempting "to hurt the religious feelings of Muslims."

Activists of the Islamic Constitution Movement chanted "Death to Taslima Nasreen" as they paraded through the streets.

The demonstrators also met with Interior Minister Abdul Matin Choudhury and demanded that Ms. Nasreen be sentenced to death.

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Former President Jimmy Carter said Thursday that North Korea's leaders are eager to resume talks with the United States on resolving suspicions about their nuclear program and improving relations.

At the end of the second day of his unofficial visit in the North, Carter said North Korean President Kim Il Sung had agreed not to expel U.N. inspectors during "good faith efforts" by both sides to settle the nuclear dispute.

There was no immediate comment from the Clinton administration.

Kim's promise did not address the refusal of North Korea to allow the U.N. experts to conduct unrestricted inspections, but Carter said he was encouraged by the Communist leader's attitude.

"I look on this commitment of President Kim Il Sung as being a very important and positive step toward the resolution of this crisis," Carter said in a telephone interview with Cable News Network.

Kim's hard-line regime has blocked full inspections of its nuclear program for 15 months, increasing fears in the region that it is building

atomic arms in violation of its obligations under the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty. The North Koreans insist their nuclear research is peaceful.

Tensions have risen as the United States, supported by South Korea and Japan, pushes for U.N. sanctions to pressure North Korea, and Kim's government vows that would be an act of war. More than 2 million soldiers are on alert on both sides of the border between the two Koreas.

But Carter's trip north appeared to calm war jitters in South Korea, where people seemed to regain their equilibrium after two days of rushing to buy up canned food and gas masks. Supermarkets reported lines were only half as long as on Wednesday, and stock prices rebounded after a two-day fall.

Carter, who met with Kim for three hours at a presidential palace on the outskirts of Pyongyang, said he had briefed the White House on the discussions. Another meeting was scheduled for Friday.

North Korea's official news agency, monitored in Tokyo, described Carter's talks with Kim as

amicable but did not discuss the substance.

Carter said that in addition to allowing the U.N. inspectors to remain, Kim pledged to maintain disputed material at the North's nuclear reactor and guarantee U.N. surveillance equipment would be kept in operation.

"When I arrived here, the North Koreans told me that they were going to expel the inspectors within two days, but they have reversed that point so long as good faith efforts are being made jointly between the United States and North Korea to resolve the entire nuclear problem," he said.

David Kyd, a spokesman for the International Atomic Energy Agency, the U.N. watchdog agency in Vienna, Austria, said the IAEA was not aware North Korea had asked the two nuclear inspectors to leave the main nuclear site.

"But if Mr. Carter headed that off, we welcome this, and it leaves the door open to diplomatic avenues," he said.

There was no indication of movement on the main sticking point — the refusal of North Korea to let inspectors examine fuel rods removed from

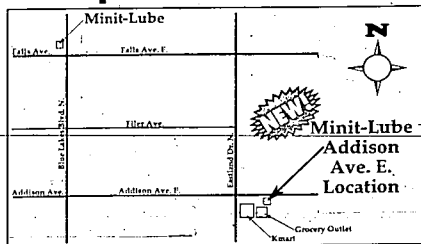

Underdog fights for presidency

REFORMA, Mexico (AP) — A siren wails across the concrete plaza of this oil workers' town as the candidate is escorted through the suffocating heat to the gazebo.

In a blue-and-white striped shirt open at the collar, Cuauhtemoc Cardenas peddles hope to a disappointingly small crowd in his quest for what has eluded every opposition politician for 65 years: Mexico's presidency.

No one has ever come closer. Yet his struggle may be even harder. In 1988, Cardenas' leftist coalition won more than 30 percent of the vote and held winner Carlos Salinas de Gortari to just over 50 percent. Many Mexicans believe Cardenas actually won and was cheated of the presidency.

But the fever of the 1988 quest seems lacking this year. His Democratic Revolution Party, which emerged from the 1988 coalition, is in trouble.

Money is short and the pro-government television stations are playing down his campaign. The \$100,000-a-minute price of prime-time television space has kept Cardenas' message off the air and unable to reach enough voters.

The Washington-based Christopher Whalen Group, a political consulting firm, recently quit his campaign, saying Cardenas was \$30,000 behind on payments.

His performance May 12 in a crucial televised debate was bland at best.

In recent polls, Cardenas has been trailing far behind Ernesto Zedillo of the ruling Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI, and Diego Fernandez de Cevallos of the conservative National Action Party. Salinas' himself cannot run for reelection.

Zedillo's once stumbling campaign has gained momentum. The economist recently outlined a broad economic plan and on Wednesday proposed a war against poverty, appealing to the poor who make up much of Cardenas' support. Cardenas continually repeats his claim that the government is prepared to cheat again and has stacked the voting list.

"Friends of reform," Cardenas began here in a speech that would vary only slightly as his caravan wound through Chiapas, the impoverished southern state where armed rebellion erupted Jan. 1, claiming more than 145 lives.

"The cause of the rebellion is clear in the eyes of the nation," he said. "The misery, the expropriation of lands, the abandonment of towns" by the government, the corruption, the lack of democracy."

While the PRI trucks in supporters and often provides lunch to boot, Cardenas travels by commercial airliner and hires the hired hands with a caravan of cars on loan from backers.

It doesn't always go well. No major group has thrown support to him.

Subcomandante Marcos, the guerrilla leader, recently scolded Cardenas by accusing him of abandoning his party's leftist roots.

Yet as Cardenas' caravan threaded through the hills, construction workers and ranch hands waved. Homeless street vendors whooshed aloft to greet him.

He casts himself as the candidate of hope.

"My election brings a promise that you will not have six more years of the same thing," he tells audiences after speeches.

Crowds clap, shower him with confetti and necklaces of tropical flowers. His speeches, though uninspired, end with shouts of "Viva!"

In his way, he was born to campaign. As former PRI governor of his native Michoacan state, he is the only major candidate with experience on the stump.

Pope fears abortion, birth control rise with population summit

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II is waging one of the biggest battles of his 16-year papacy over a population summit, fearing it will spur abortion and birth control and threaten the traditional Roman Catholic family.

The pope has marshaled his cardinals behind him, lobbied world leaders and raised his voice in public, expressing dismay that the United Nations, an organization the Vatican has often looked to on social issues,

is the sponsor of the conference. At the heart of the pope's worry is that the International Conference on Population and Development — scheduled for Cairo, Egypt, Sept. 5-13 — will lead more women to turn to legalized abortion, spread the use of contraceptives and sanction alternative lifestyles.

John Paul is a resolute opponent of abortion — he has referred to abortion as a holocaust — as well as artificial

birth control and has shown increasing unease over lifestyles outside the traditional family, assailing proposals to allow homosexuals to marry and adopt children.

The pope's campaign has been building for months, putting him on a collision course with the White House and with liberal Roman Catholic and feminist groups.

At the last population conference, in 1984 in Mexico City, Vatican officials

worked with the Reagan administration in reaching a consensus that abortion in no way be promoted.

So when the draft document for the Cairo conference failed to rule out abortion, the Vatican took the unusual step of releasing a message from the pope upbraiding the secretary-general of the conference, Nafis Sadik.

But the Clinton administration is committed to reversing that policy. Clinton came away from talks with the

pope at the Vatican on June 2 admitting "genuine disagreements" existed that probably can't be bridged.

Clinton said he's against abortion as a means of birth control but that women should be allowed access to safe abortions. The Vatican is not standing still, crunting on support from Roman Catholic countries in Latin America and perhaps others in the Islamic world.

Union ranks Peavey, Noh as equals

As far as the state's leading teachers' union is concerned, Sen. Laird Noh of Kimberly and Sen. John Peavey of Carey had virtually equal voting records in the 1993 and 1994 legislative sessions.

Peavey, among the union's lowest-ranked Democrats in the Senate, voted with the Idaho Education Association 86 percent of the time. Noh, among the union's highest-ranked Republicans, voted with the IEA 88 percent of the time.

The IEA's biennial evaluation of voting records shows that the close relationship between the Legislature's Democratic minority and the union remained intact during the 52nd Legislature.

Democrats consistently supported the teachers' group's positions during the 1993 and 1994 sessions while the Republican

majority, on average, voted with teachers less than half the time.

The association, representing public school teachers throughout the state, uses the voting record on 11 specific issues in deciding which candidates it endorses and campaigns for. The key issues were state aid to public schools, public employee retirement improvements and repealing the property tax for schools so the state would be totally responsible for education financing.

In the Senate, the dozen Democrats with just enough votes to sustain a gubernatorial veto sided with the IEA more than 95 percent of the time on the 11 issues reviewed by the teachers' lobby while the 23 Republicans agreed with the teachers about 44 percent of the time.

The 20 House Democrats stood by the teachers just over 86 percent of the time while the 50 Republicans averaged under 47 percent.

Democrats have traditionally championed the IEA's push for increasing state aid allocations to public education, and the party has been rewarded with substantial cash backing at election time - cash that played a critical role in the sweeping victories Democrats posted in 1991.

The IEA vote assessment found seven of the dozen Senate Democrats voting with the teachers 100 percent of the time during the past two years. The lowest percentage was 86 percent, recorded by Peavey and Tim Tuckergal of Porthill.

In contrast, the highest score for a Senate Republican was 88 percent recorded by Noh, Gary Schroeder of Moscow and John Hansen of Idaho Falls, the chairman of the Education Committee.

Six Republicans had scores below 20 percent, the lowest at 3 percent for Finance Vice Chairman Mark Ricks of Rexburg.

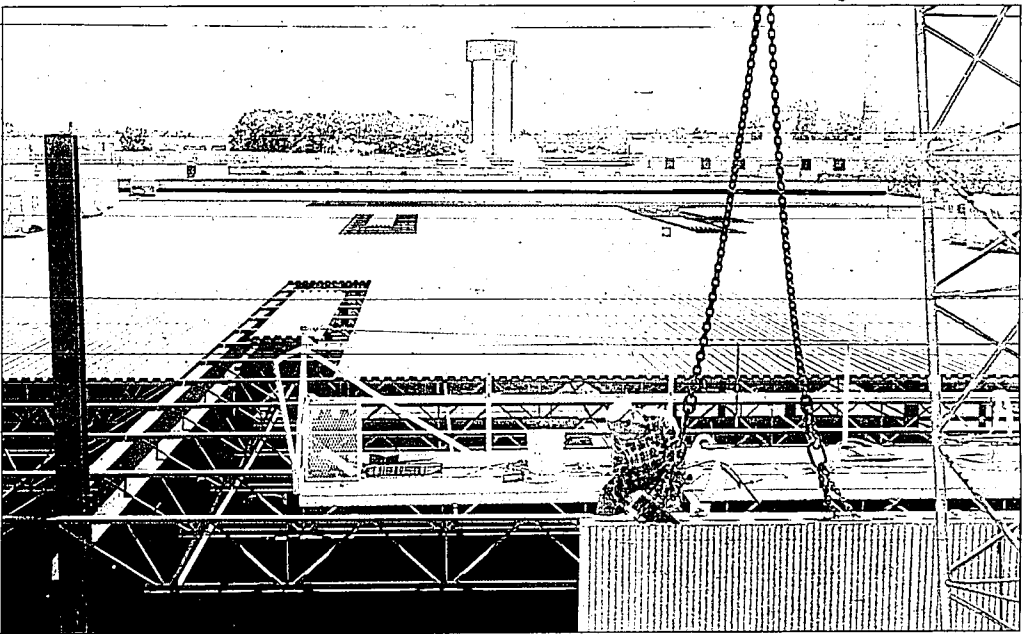
In the House, eight Democrats had per-

fect records, and the lowest Democratic record was 68 percent for Ken Robison of Boise.

Gayle Wilde of McCall was the lone Republican in the Statehouse to receive a perfect rating while five had records of less than 10 percent. House Resources and Conservation Chairman Jo Ann Wood of Rigby was the only lawmaker to receive a zero rating. Conservative freshman Lenore Barrett of Challis recorded a 4 percent record while fellow conservative freshman Sylvia McKeith had a record of 42 percent.

House Education Chairman Ron Black of Twin Falls, who has been criticized for abandoning the IEA in recent years, stood at 55 percent.

Republican leaders were in the mid-range. House Speaker Michael Simpson of Blackfoot was at 53 percent while Senate President Pro Tem Jerry Twigg of Blackfoot was at 45 percent.

Green Giant storage building on schedule

BUHL - Green Giant's construction of a new storage facility is right on schedule. In fact, Distribution Manager Liz Mandelkow expects the 80,000-square-foot building to be completed even before the company's Aug. 1 goal.

The new, \$2.2 million facility is expected change the way the Buhl plant operates.

"Prior to having space on site, the product canned here had to be labeled ahead of orders and pushed ahead to distribution centers, where orders would draw it out," Mandelkow said.

With added storage at the plant, Green Giant will only ship products directly to customers, she said.

"It's more cost effective," she said, "we won't have to force extra product upstream."

Doug Thorson, agriculture and quality assurance manager, said the new warehouse "is really to replace other storage that we had around off site, not to increase total storage."

Mandelkow said contractors will seal the roof of the new heated "dry warehouse" next week. And the single "roofing membrane" to cover the building incorporates "fairly new roofing technology" and gives the roof longer life, she said.

Built on the west side of the Green Giant property, the warehouse will change the traffic pattern around the plant.

"Now, instead of people coming off Clear Lakes Road on the west side, they will enter off Elm Street on the north side," Mandelkow said.

The general contractor, Karl Bohn Properties of Savage, Minn., will own the building. Green Giant will have a 10-year lease.

Wood River Center takes more facility reductions

SUN VALLEY - Another reduction in the work force at Wood River Medical Center will save the facility more than \$125,000 a year.

One administrative position has been eliminated, two other positions have been combined into one position and a full-time position has been halved.

These job losses have been instituted as a means to recoup losses after the hospital board declined last month to eliminate the position of chief administrator held by Al Stevenson.

Stevenson receives an annual salary \$124,000 a year plus benefits.

Medical Center spokeswoman Cindy

Carrington said her community relations position will be combined by July 15 with the director of volunteer services position.

This move would create an annual savings of \$27,500.

In addition, the associate administrator for support services has been eliminated for an annual savings of \$83,720.

And a full-time position in the Human Resources department will be sealed back to a half-time position for a savings of \$14,419.

After board members refused to accept Stevenson's suggestion to eliminate his administrative position, they directed him to take other measures to cut expenses.

At that time medical center board chairman Michael White said Stevenson's re-

Water agency increases application fees July 1

BOISE - The cost of filing an Idaho water right application is going up.

Effective July 1, the Idaho Department of Water Resources will raise existing fees and establish new rates for services that have long been free.

The increases were granted by the 1994 Idaho Legislature to help pay for rising paper costs, according to a news release from Water Resources. It is the department's first

general rate increase in 14 years and the first new fees since 1986, the release said.

The new fees for services that are currently free include:

- \$25 for assignment of a water right permit.
- \$20 for a stream channel alteration permit.
- \$25 for filing a protest or a request to intervene in a protested matter.
- \$10 for a recreational dredging permit.

In addition to brand-new fees, Water Resources is hiking its fees for many other services.

For instance, requests for more time to prove beneficial use of a water right will rise from \$10 to \$50 under the new fee schedule.

Applications to use less than one-fifth of a cubic foot of water per second or - store less than 20 acre feet - will cost \$50, instead of \$30. One cfs equals 449 gallons of water per minute, while an acre foot is enough water to cover one acre, 1 foot deep - about 325,850 gallons.

Applications to use amounts ranging from one-fifth of a cfs to 20 cfs - or store quantities

greater than 20 acre feet - will increase by \$55. Further, application expense to change the terms of a water right - such as point of diversion, place of use, nature of use - will be charged a flat fee of \$100. The fee has long been calculated by the amount of water involved.

Water right applications can require considerable time and expense to process. Associated costs include legal advertising, publication of public notices, records research and public hearings for protested water right applications.

Auditor hopefuls divided on anti-gay measure

Incumbent Democratic state Auditor J.D. Williams and Republican challenger Ralph Gines are drawing a distinct line between themselves over the proposed anti-gay-rights initiative.

Williams, who is seeking a second four-year term after being appointed auditor in 1989, has sided with most political and civic leaders in opposing the initiative of the Burley-based Idaho Citizens Alliance.

But Gines, a former state legislator who won a three-way May primary race, says he will vote for the initiative if it makes it to the ballot.

During a campaign swing through central Idaho, Williams called Gines' very conservative, trying to paint him as a member of the GOP's right wing.

But Gines calls himself a constitutionalist, who believes in limited government and the right of Idaho voters to decide for themselves whether they want the anti-gay initiative on the books.

"I haven't said any more than that other than if it's on the ballot, I'll vote for it," said a lawyer and certified public accountant.

Promoted by backers as a move to preclude what they call "special rights" for homosexuals, the initiative would ban any state or local law prohibiting discrimination against homosexuals. Critics claim it would strip homosexuals of their basic constitutional rights.

As with most other officials from both political parties, Williams contends the initiative is unneeded and divisive.

"The Idaho Legislature is never going to grant special rights to homosexuals so why pass it and waste the money?" Williams said.

It will cost hundreds of thousands of dollars to defend the initiative in court, he said, and that money could be funneled into the public schools and the juvenile justice system.

But Gines believes that if a majority of Idahoans vote for the initiative, they will be willing to pay the court costs.

He argued that the initiative offers a safeguard by making sure the Legislature cannot protect homosexuals from discrimination, suggesting Williams has no way of knowing what lawmakers will do years from now.

The alliance must submit 32,000 registered voter signatures to the secretary of state by July 8 to qualify the initiative for the general election ballot.

River cleanup not necessary but beneficial, farmers say

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — A concerted cleanup along polluted stretches of the Bear River would soon clear the muddy water, specialists say. But those who could make the most difference have the least to gain.

A group of about 20 people, many of them farmers and ranchers, met with consultants and representatives from Bear River Resource Conservation and Development Wednesday to discuss an 18-month study of the Bear River.

Specialists with Ecosystems Research Institute collected pollution information from 40 sites along the river, and officials say they're ready to start a section-by-section cleanup.

A steering committee will attack the four dirtiest stretches of the Bear one at a time. The Spring Creek drainage area will be the first target, followed by the Cub River corridor in Utah and stretches of the Bear River from Amalgam to Cutler Reservoir and Richmond to Amalgam.

The committee decided to start the cleanup high in the system, said Ecosystems Research spokeswoman Nancy Mesner, to make cleaning the lower region easier.

The problem with the plan is that some farmers and ranchers along the river are big polluters, and reducing sediments and phosphorus in the river doesn't help their operations. If anything, it hurts them — phosphorus is something they add to their farmland anyway, so irrigating with water from the dirty Bear River is a bonus.

"What do we gain?" asked rancher Darrell Kunzler. When told by Mesner that "We gain a cleaner basin," Kunzler replied "So what? It's just going to get polluted again. Why clean it up if it's going to get polluted again at the bird refuge?"

Those who will benefit most from the project, Mesner said, are boaters, waterskiers, anglers and people who think being able to see the riverbed

is desirable. But she says irrigators will benefit, too, if she can convince Utah Power to release a constant flow from Oneida Dam.

The river's unpredictable flow has meant irrigators seldom know when they'll have sufficient water, and stirs up a lot of sediment, which Mesner said is the main pollutant in the river.

Another major pollutant, phosphorus, could be controlled by blocking waste from feedlots and human waste treatment systems from trickling into waterways. Mesner said keeping animals 200 feet away from water would provide enough grassy land to filter out pollutants, and waste treatment systems could be held to higher cleaning standards.

Funding is still a question, but committee members are hoping for federal and state aid. Mesner said enough money was available to start the project.

Judge rules disabled man can stand trial

CALDWELL (AP) — A mentally disabled man is competent to stand trial on a first-degree murder charge in the Canyon County shooting death of Tim Leary, a judge has ruled.

Don Daniel's trial is set for Monday. The 22-year-old is being held without bond in the Caldwell Jail.

Leary, 17, died from a shotgun wound to the chest Dec. 15 in Daniel's mobile home in Nampa. Daniel's competency hearing was to determine whether Daniel could assist in his defense.

Two psychologists, Clay Ward of Nampa and Craig Beaver of Boise, testified Daniel had a severe mental

disability and reads and spells on a third-grade level.

Ward testified Daniel does not understand the court system and the role of his defense attorney, and would not be able to help in his defense.

Both Ward and Beaver expressed concerns about whether Daniel understood his Miranda rights.

"He is not capable of understanding the concept of self-incrimination," Daniel's attorney said. "During this highly charged situation, I have real concerns about him fully understanding his rights at that moment," Beaver said.

Batt says no to university system

LEWISTON (AP) — Idaho gubernatorial candidate Phil Batt says he has no intention of changing operations at the state's universities unless they request it on their own.

Two weeks ago, the Wilder Republican said he is interested in looking at creating a single university system to save administrative costs, and raised the prospect of turning Lewis-Clark State College into the Lewiston branch of the University of Idaho.

In Wednesday newspaper ad, Nez Perce County's three Democratic legislative candidates blasted Batt called on their GOP foes to distance themselves from the idea, and added they fear the search for a successor to outgoing Lewis-Clark President Lee Vickers could be hurt.

"We do not need a 'Son of Stivers' as governor," state Sen. Bruce Sweeney, Rep. Paul Keeton and retired Lewiston doctor Dean Mahoney said in their ad. They were referring to former House Speaker Tom Stivers, R-Twin Falls, who

backed turning the Lewiston college into a branch of the Moscow school.

Thirteen years ago, during his first gubernatorial campaign, Batt said he would not vote to close Lewis-Clark.

"I think they are reaching for issues," said Sweeney's Republican opponent, attorney Wes Whitlie. "We are certainly concerned that LCSC keeps strong and my understanding is the initiative is a way of streamlining things and saving administrative expenses. ... I like the name Lewis-Clark State College."

In a prepared statement, Batt reiterated he simply wants to discuss a single system as a means of providing the best and most economical education. "I have no desire to nor do I think it's pertinent to the discussion to single out part of the system for scrutiny," Batt said. "I don't recommend any change of name unless requested by any of the institutions."

ISU dean dies of heart attack at 59

POCATELLO — V.P.T. "Harry" Charyulu, dean of the College of Engineering at Idaho State University, died Wednesday of cardiac arrest. He was 59.

Charyulu, a native of India, joined the Idaho State faculty as an engineering professor in 1968 and was named dean in 1983.

During his 25 years in Idaho, Charyulu emerged as a leading supporter of nuclear research at Idaho State and the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. He worked on a variety of INEL educational projects and did consulting work for the site's Argonne National Laboratory.

Gay, lesbian groups set up hotline

BOISE — Gay and lesbian groups have set up a telephone hotline for people to report hate-based crimes. They contend there has been an increasing number of such incidents in Idaho.

The groups Idaho for Human Dignity and Your Family, Friends and Neighbors held a Statehouse news conference Thursday to announce the Anti-Violence Project. A 24-hour telephone hotline will be set up for people to report anti-gay, bias-motivated violence or defamation.

"Any hate-motivated crime, if there's one, that's too many," said Mary Rohlfing, cochair for Idaho for Human Dignity. She said she and a companion were victims of a violence in the Stanley area while vacationing.

Hate crimes were reported last year in the Moscow area and this year at a Boise gay bar, she said.

Boise airport to double in size, parking

BOISE — Boise airline passengers soon will have a little more elbow room.

Boise Municipal Airport will double the size of its main concourse and add a second security gate and about 200 spaces for long- and short-term parking, airport director John Anderson said Wednesday.

The airport will begin working on the addition to concourse 18 in late September, with completion scheduled for late May or early June of next year. The \$5 million project will add five passenger gates, bringing the total to 11. The concourse will be extended about 400 feet to the southeast of the terminal.

Court rules on multiple citations

BOISE — Idaho law enforcement officers will be advised that if they issue a serious citation against a motorist, such as for drunken driving or vehicular homicide, they shouldn't also charge the motorist with a minor infraction for the same incident.

That's the result of an Idaho Supreme Court ruling Thursday throwing out the drunken driving conviction of a Lewiston woman. The court ruled unanimously that Elizabeth Anne Lynch couldn't be charged both with making an improper lane change and drunken driving because it was "one continuous and indivisible act."

An officer said he saw Lynch driving erratically late in 1991. He said he stopped the woman and cited her for DUI and a lane violation.

BSU settles with social-work professor

BOISE (AP) — Boise State University has reached an out-of-court settlement with a former social-work professor who said she faced a hostile working environment as a woman.

Officials would not disclose the terms of the settlement, nor the amount of money involved.

In the lawsuit, filed in April 1993 in 4th District Court, Phyllis Day said male faculty members created a "hostile working environment" for her because she is a woman. Day was coordinator of the master's degree program in social work from July to December 1991.

Service area war returns to courts

COEUR D'ALENE — The turf war between Kootenai Electric Cooperative and Washington Water Power Co. has found its way to court again.

Kootenai Electric filed a lawsuit against its competitor this week, claiming that the Spokane, Wash.-based utility is illegally supplying power to Prairie View Elementary School in Post Falls.

The local cooperative won a similar dispute against Washington Water Power in March over supplying power to Commerce Park, a 60-acre commercial development in Coeur d'Alene.

Governor pushes for geyser bill

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus is trying to breathe new life into a 4-year-old campaign to protect Yellowstone National Park's geysers even though it could limit the development of geothermal resources in eastern Idaho.

"The state of Idaho recognizes the need to ensure the protection of the unique geothermal features of Yellowstone National Park," Andrus wrote in a recent letter to Democratic congressman Pat Williams of Montana. "Any damage to them would be nothing less than a national tragedy."

Williams, who also has the backing of his home-state governor, Mark Racicot, is the sponsor of the Old Faithful Protection bill that prohibits development of geothermal resources within 20 miles of the park boundary. An area of Island Park known to have geothermal resources is also included until studies of the possible connections with Yellowstone geysers are completed.

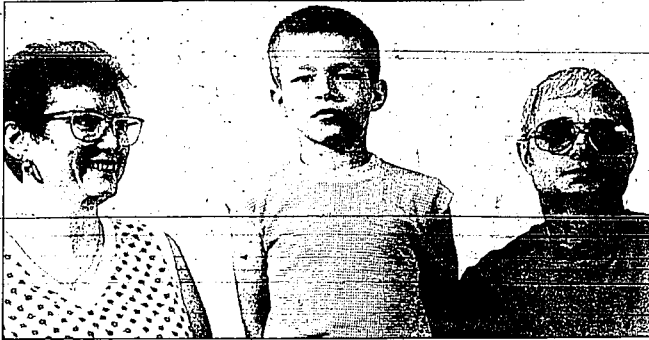
Concerns over private property rights and state water rights have prompted opposition from Republican Sens. Larry Craig of Idaho and Malcolm Wallop of Wyoming.

But Andrus wrote that a careful review of water rights in Idaho found no active rights held in geothermal resources near Yellowstone. He said a current moratorium on water development in eastern Idaho prevents any threat to the park's geysers in the near future.

"Given the constraints on development in Idaho ... and the present lack of interest in geothermal development in the area, this legislation appears to be in harmony with the existing constraints in state programs on resource development," Andrus wrote.

The bill apparently affects only the water right of the Church Universal and Triumphant at its Royal Teton Ranch north of Yellowstone. Church officials and the National Park Service are currently negotiating a land trade that would resolve the dispute.

Montana and Yellowstone National Park negotiated a compact in 1993 that quantified the park's reserved water right. Williams amended his bill to include the compact and a process by which the interior secretary can certify that a state-run program adequately protects the park's geysers.

Idaho couple weary of custody fight over their 3 grandchildren

GRAND ISLAND, Neb. (AP) — An Idaho couple has the backing of their own state's social workers but Glenna and Ed Hellickson have not been able to convince the state of Nebraska that they should gain custody of three grandchildren.

The Hellicksons have sought custody of their daughter's children since the Nebraska Department of Social Services took them from Katrina Zierke in Grand Island two years ago.

Glenna Hellickson said the children lived in an unhealthy atmosphere where their parents, who divorced last year, used drugs and were abusive.

The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare has recommended the Hellicksons care for all of the children. But Nebraska's Social Services Department has refused to give the couple custody of Kristal Zierke, 11; April Zierke, 9; and Kaleb Zierke, 2.

The Hellicksons have had custody of Cody Zierke, 8, and adopted him this month.

They say the custody battle has taken an economic and emotional toll. Attorney fees and travel expenses from their home in Aberdeen to Grand Island have cost them more than \$7,000 since their fight began.

But Ed Hellickson said "the money is immaterial compared to the kids."

"We're here on faith in God and what little savings we have left," Mrs. Hellickson said. "We're broke and the state is not."

Kristal lives with her father's parents near Aberdeen. April and Kaleb are in foster homes in Grand Island.

"It's not right. These kids should be with family," Mrs. Hellickson said. "Their plan is to place them in separate homes, not for them to be with each other."

Nebraska Social Services spokes-

woman Kathie Osterman said local courts will decide where the children are placed, using the state's recommendation along with those from therapists, county attorneys, teachers and others involved with the children.

"The department does have a very large say in what we would recommend to the court," she said. "Our concern is the best interest of the child. ... However, we don't make those decisions on our own."

The Hellicksons said they believe they were given custody of Cody because of problems he had with several foster families. He was twice admitted to Richard Young Hospital in Kearney for psychological problems.

Now Cody's second-grade report card shows all A's and B's; he has earned a certificate for perfect attendance. In the past year, the youth placed in six of seven junior wrestling tournaments in Idaho.

Court orders 4 teens, parents to pay for damages

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Four teen-agers and their families have been ordered to pay more than \$14,000 each for a May 29 rampage that caused more than \$250,000 damage to Cloverdale Elementary School.

Almost nine weeks of community

service and a year of house arrest for each of the youths were included in the sentences handed down Wednesday by Clark County Magistrate Mildred McClure.

Three 13-year-old boys and a 14-year-old boy pleaded guilty to arson and malicious injury to property. They

were accused of smashing computers and furniture and setting up to 25 fires during an eight-hour spree.

Juvenile hearings are closed to the public, but the written dispositions were released by McClure "due to the high impact of these cases on the community."

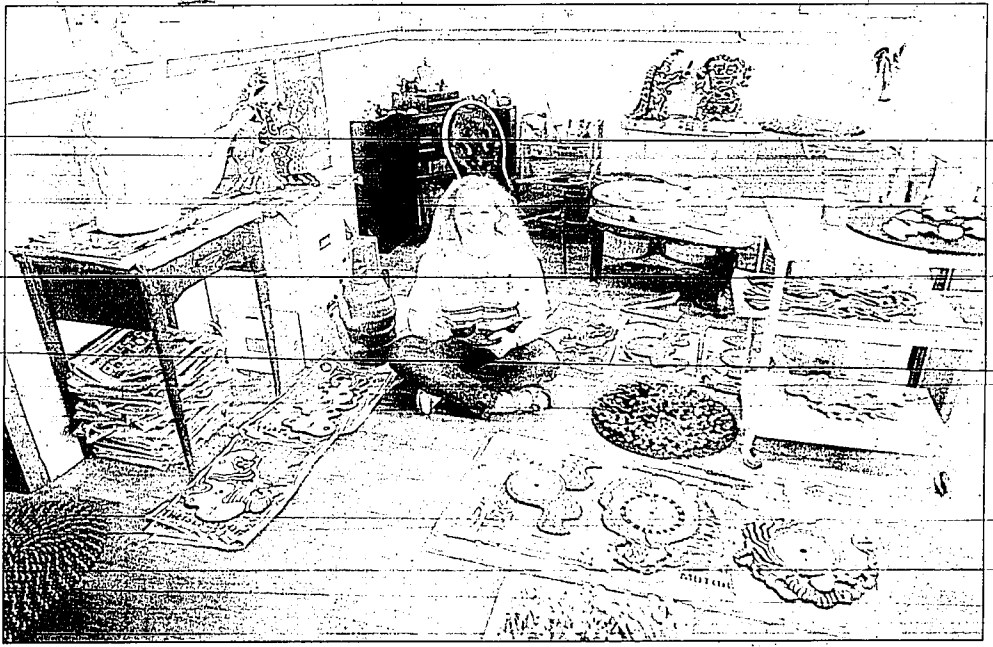

Murtaugh teapot artist draws on childhood, dreams for creative expressions

MURTAUGH — Artist Angela Neiwith's showroom resembles something out of Alice in Wonderland — except characters like the Mad Hatter, Queen of Hearts and White Rabbit would be in the form of teapots.

Since 1990, Neiwith's contribution to the art world has been her own interpretation and design of teapots. She has more than 100 of these "whimsical" creations on display in her Murtaugh home, which is also her showroom.

"Some people look at my work in complete confusion, and I'll have to tell them 'Well, what do you think it is?'" she said.

Some of her teapots have three spouts, some swirl with color and some even wear clothes and jewelry. Neiwith also makes "teapot scenes," like a wedding scene complete with a teapot bride, teapot bridesmaids and a teapot flower girl. But no matter how each one is designed, all have a distinct personality, she said.

"I don't like to think of my pots as being objects," she said. "I like to think of them as companions."

"Parts of it are very picturesque and fluid, parts are sweet and seductive, and the last part is very dramatic, passionate," he said.

Show set Wednesday

Each teapot is made by hand, she said. First, she "throws" the clay using a pottery wheel and then sculpts the more intricate pieces using slabs of clay. Then she hardens the pieces in a kiln and paints them.

A native of Eden, Neiwith said that many of her designs are images from her childhood or dreams that she records on a sketch pad. "I find my inspiration in everyday life," she said. "Ideas just pop into my head all the time."

Neiwith's first formal art education came in college at Boise State University. She

tried a double emphasis in painting and ceramics, but decided that a flat canvas didn't hold the excitement of clay.

"At school, I started out with acrylic paints," she said. "But then I got bored and cut the canvases into strange shapes. And then, after that, I glued pieces of pottery onto the canvases to give it texture."

Ceramics is more challenging than painting, she said, because the many hours of hard work can "blow up in your face" when pieces unexpectedly break. Neiwith said that she has had many pieces crack while they

were hardening in a kiln.

As soon as she discovers a broken piece, she said she "has to hammer it, throw it away and forget about it as quickly as possible" because a broken piece is very upsetting.

"It's really hard work if you are feeling depressed," she said. "I have to be in a good mood when I work, because I want my pots to be happy pots."

Neiwith said that she can "easily" spend eight to 10 hours painting a piece. The longest she has ever spent on a single teapot is two weeks, she said. The work is time consuming, but the long hours are needed to make the pots "come to life."

Neiwith sells her pieces out of her home and in galleries around southern Idaho. Small teapots sell for about \$15, while a larger teapot series can sell for as much as \$700. This business aspect of the art is the hardest, Neiwith said, because it means that she will have to part with her pots.

"I want to keep them all," she said, "because they are all so personal to me. I make teapots because they are something that everyone can relate to. They are familiar to everybody."

These days, Clark, himself, often takes to the road, singing his own songs. His voice has been likened to the crusty sound of Kris Kristofferson, and people say he looks like Nick Nolte. His songs, written and sung from the heart, include crowd-winning originals like "Homegrown Tomatoes," "The Last Gunfighter Ballad" and "Desperados Waiting for a Train."

Reviewers say he combines humor with his music.

"I guess some people think it's pretty funny," deadpanned Clark, in a phone interview from his Nashville home on Tuesday.

Homegrown in Texas, the singer/songwriter grew up on the blues and Mexican folk music. His lawyer father wanted him to be a doctor.

Throughout high school, Clark played guitar for fun. Eventually, the folk club scene in Houston won him over.

He's been kicking around the country music industry for more than 20 years, and he's currently preparing to record a new album.

Clark has a hard time labeling his music, because he says it reflects lots of different

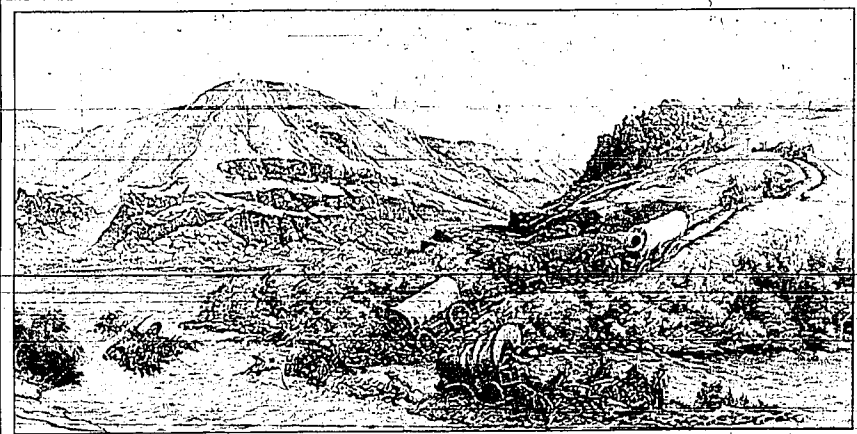

piece written in typical French conservatory style.

The composition has a "slow, flowery introduction" followed by the "fast, showy main part of the piece," Neiwirth said.

The second half of the program will begin with Bohuslav Martinu's first sonata for flute and piano, music of "rhythmic vitality and unusual harmonies," Neiwirth said.

"It's a very virtuosic piece - difficult and flashy for both performers," he added.

This piece appealed to Gilbert because it's a very refined composition. Neiwirth called it "one of the most important flute and piano pieces of the 20th century."

The concert will conclude with "Carmen Fantasy," variations on the main themes of an opera by Georges Bizet. According to Gilbert, most parts of the music are very flamboyant, and some are sensual and the entire piece is playful and technically flashy.

This program prepared by Gilbert and Neiwirth is the first major fundraiser for the Twin Falls Music Club Scholarship Foundation, Inc. as a newly-incorporated, non-profit foundation.

According to Rexine Glenn of the music club, all ticket sale money will go toward providing scholarships for young Magic Valley musicians.

A \$1,000 donation from the Greenville Neurosensory Foundation, Magic Valley Ear, Nose and Throat, will help pay the expenses of the concert.

The two musicians have played together for concerts, auditions and competitions since 1988.

"As a flutist, it's always hard to get an accompanist of the caliber of Mark," Gilbert said. "His rhythm is so strong; his musical interpretation is very mature and refined; his technique is formidable."

Neiwirth said of Gilbert, "He's a dream to play with - we hardly even have to rehearse. Technically, he's superb. Working with him is a great luxury for me."

Woodstock goes upscale: Tickets at \$135

Maybe Woodstock '94 will turn out to be a seminal event for another generation. Maybe it'll merely be a \$30 million failed attempt at recapturing the spirit of the '60s.

There's plenty of time for the critics and the pundits to debate the issue. For anyone considering attending the two-day festival in mid-August, the need is for details. And details are what the concert organizers released Monday in New York.

WHEN AND WHERE. Aug. 13 and 14 at the Upstate New York town of Saugerties (pop. 20,000). The actual site, with two giant stages, will be an 840-acre tract outside of town, big enough to accommodate thousands of campers among the expected crowd of 250,000.

MUSICAL ACTS. The entertainment will range from grunge bands of today, to alternative rockers, to supergroups to throwbacks from the original Woodstock. So far, here's who is signed, sealed and delivered: Aerosmith, Alice in Chains, Allman Brothers Band, Arrested Development, Johnny Cash, Jimmy Cliff's

All Star Reggae Jam (featuring Rita Marley and Shabba Ranks), Joe Cocker, the Cranberries, Crosby Stills and Nash, Cypress Hill, Bob Dylan, Melissa Etheridge, Peter Gabriel, Green Day, Metallica, the Neville Brothers, Nine Inch Nails, Porno for Pyros, Red Hot Chili Peppers, Rollins Band, Santana and Spin Doctors. Other artists and comedic performers will be added to the lineup later.

TICKETS. They aren't cheap. The first Woodstock in 1969 cost \$18 (for those who actually paid to get in). This time around, promoters are putting the concert in 250,000 tickets, which will sell for \$135 each, all available through Ticketmaster (800-775-0278).

Because of the traffic congestion at the original Woodstock, Woodstock '94 attendees are being encouraged to car-pool or, better yet, ride one of the chartered buses arriving from 18 cities. Only those chartered buses will be allowed onto the Woodstock grounds. Bus-ticket packages (\$135 plus bus fare) will go on sale Wednesday at 3 p.m. ET via Ticketmaster.

Those hot opting for mass transit may have a harder time buying a ticket. On June 26, after the bus and air packages have been sold, the remaining tickets will go on sale. To encourage car-pooling, those tickets, also \$135, will be sold only in blocks of four, with one parking pass.

Ticket-buyers will receive their tickets by overnight delivery, along with a packet containing information such as event schedules and accommodations.

SECURITY/ACCOMMODATIONS. At Woodstock '94, who expected half a million people? There were woeful shortages of food, bathrooms and medical supplies. This time, organizers are better prepared.

Thanks to New York's "mass-gathering" act, enacted after the '69 concert and better known these days as the Woodstock Law, there will be 3,000 portable toilets, 850 food stands, several hundred medical personnel and security types aplenty.

There also is a ban on alcohol and drugs, although concert organizers concede that enforcing that rule will be tough.

Sedaka writes to classical melodies

Neil Sedaka found a few good tunes to work with on his upcoming Polygram release "Classically Sedaka."

"I picked the best collaborators — Chopin, Tchaikovsky — they're extraordinary," Sedaka commented during a recent phone interview from Branson, Mo., where he was on tour.

Sedaka's last Polygram record, "Timeless," went platinum in the United Kingdom a few years back, so the label asked him to put together a follow-up.

Sedaka's initial impulse was to record a collection of evergreen standards from the likes of the Gershwins and Cole Porter. "Then I thought, 'Why are they going to buy me if Torame and Sinatra are doing that?' So I sat down with my wife and said 'What can I do that no one else will do? That would be sing and play classical music,' he says.

So Sedaka — best known for his pop hits "Breaking Up is Hard to Do" and "Laughter in the Rain" — took classical melodies from the likes of Chopin, Tchaikovsky, Rachmaninoff and Puccini, and penned romantic lyrics to them.

"I'm just over the moon about the results," he says of the album. "It's like 'Phantom of the Opera' meets Pavarotti." "Classically Sedaka," due out abroad in January 1995 and stateside soon thereafter, offers the artist singing in a classical, operative style.

"I think people will be surprised," Sedaka says. "It's my best achievement so far on record."

The selections on "Classically Sedaka" are myriad. One is called "The Keeper of My Heart," based on a Rachmaninoff rhapsody. There is also "Neverending Serenade," set to Chopin's "Nocturne in A Flat." Another is written to Debussy's "Clair de Lune." Still another is based on an aria from the Puccini opera "Turandot."

Sedaka says he did not feel at all intimidated adding lyrics to these centuries-old staples. One reason may be because he was classically trained at the Julliard School in the early 1950s. "I was prepared both emotionally and musically," he says. "I've been writing lyrics for many years, and I just felt very inspired."

Most of these new lyrics, in fact, were written while on a recent tour of Southeast Asia.

"I wrote on little scraps of paper," Sedaka explains. "I'd be in restaurants and I would pick up a napkin and the lyrics would just flow out of me and I'd start writing. My wife was afraid to throw anything out."

One of the original creators of the "New York City" sound of the '50s and author of more than 1,000 songs, Sedaka's artistry has evolved over the years.

His career spans four decades and includes such hits as "Calendar Girl," "Where the Boys Are" (recorded by Connie Francis), "Breaking Up is Hard to Do," "Laughter in the Rain" and the 1975 Grammy Award-winning "Love Will Keep Us Together," recorded by the Captain and Tennille.

Sedaka says, "It was a perfect pop record in 1975 and '76." "I'm very proud of that song." During the 1970s, Sedaka recorded for Elton John's "Rocket Records" label, which also distributed works by Kiki Dee, Brenda Russell and Cliff Richard. "Elton and I met in England while I was living there," Sedaka recalls. "I had had a couple of hits with 10cc. Elton came to my flat in London and said they thought he released in the United States. He went on the radio as 'El the DJ' and would play cuts from my album. I had the most expensive PR man in the world."

Sedaka's No. 1 smash "Bad Blood" topped the charts in the mid-'70s.

He now regularly performs with major orchestras and impresses classical music fans with piano concertos along with his own compositions during live performances.

On record, in life, Raitt maintains growth

PHILADELPHIA — Maturity — and marriage — have prompted Bonnie Raitt to closely examine both the external and internal parts of her life, a journey that inevitably has tingled her art as well.

It's an evolution that has given deeper meaning to many of the songs on her latest record, "Longing in Their Hearts."

"I think there are some issues about your own ability to trust and let go and your own ability to forgive and accept yourself and the other person in your life that you probably have to come to terms with as you get older anyway," the forty-something singer-songwriter-guitarist says.

"You realize that you've been playing house with people, or maybe not being as real or as serious about them, because you were waiting for the quote, 'real thing' to come along. And then you find yourself in your 30s and you have to ask yourself, 'If this isn't the real thing I'm in, why haven't I let myself be in the position to find the real thing?'"

Raitt calls her marriage to actor Michael O'Keefe three years ago empowering, a chance to blend the values of O'Keefe's Catholic upbringing and her own Quaker philosophies.

"He comes from a family where people did get married and I came from a generation of women and men who, for the first time in history, didn't find it necessary to get married. So 20 years on in my adult life, I thought it was such a novel and very romantic and very deep step to take, she said in a phone interview.

"For me, marriage was making a commitment to get more serious about the things that were stopping

me from getting close — holding out for what I really deserve and what I really want and not looking at love through some colored glasses of basically being in love with love."

Maturity carries into Raitt's attitude about her career as well. Taking home a total of seven Grammy Awards (four in 1989 for the No. 1 album "Nick of Time" and her duet "In the Mood" on John Lee Hooker's album, "The Healer," three in 1991 for "Luck of the Draw") didn't faze her after 23 years in music, though she still can't find herself quickly awestruck.

"I've always been luckier than I expected to be, and to be in the stratosphere of the top 10 for these last few years is a wonderful, yet somewhat unreal position," she said. "When the lights go down and I go out on stage, it isn't really any different than it was in the beginning. The people are out there because they chose to come see you in concert, and that is a great gift."

"Longing in Their Hearts," Raitt's third record with producer Don Was, is loaded with members of Raitt's impressive roster of friends — David Crosby, who sings on "Circle Dance"; Richard Thompson, who plays on "Dimming of the Day," a song he also wrote; The Band's Levon Helm, who sings on the title track; and Bennett Fenchel, one of Tom Petty's Heartbreakers, who plays on "Circle Dance."

"As we get ready to go in the studio, I've already got in my mind who I would like to have on the song and then; when we actually do record it, it's pretty apparent," she said. "I'm basically just picturing which person

would really perfectly fit on each song. That's how I've picked them all along."

Even though Raitt's life is going smoothly now — her marriage is happy, she kicked an alcohol problem several years ago — songs that hint at sorrow, at love gone sour, at a certain weariness of spirit, still attract her.

"I'm moved to sing about stuff where there's pain and there's regret and anger and doubt and confusion," she said. "These songs are all about real things that I'm going through, but that doesn't mean I'm melancholy all the time."

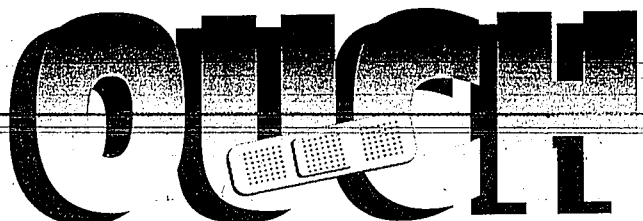
"I'm not a pop singer. I try to go a lot deeper than certain subjects, so that's automatically going to get you into darker waters."

She does hit some what she calls "playful" moments on this record. The first single, for instance, "Love Sneakin' Up On You," is insinuating and buoyant, almost akin to "Something to Talk About." And "Feeling of Falling" longs to go back to the headiness of the early parts of a relationship, that feeling of losing control.

"Longing in Their Hearts" is pretty equally split between Raitt's own songs and those written by other people. For her, choosing a song is "an intuitive process."

"I listen to so many hundreds of songs that when I get one that's even in the ballpark, they stand out like the sun hitting a jewel in the middle of a sand dune," she said. "It's like 'Feeling of Falling' — why you're attracted to somebody."

"These songs that I end up putting on my records, from the first album on, (are) just instinctively the right song. I just have a very deep emotional connection to them." The only pressure on her, Raitt said, comes from within.

'Speed' provides thrills, but leaves story behind

WASHINGTON — If a movie titled "Speed" doesn't rush into your veins, spiking your eyeballs and spinning them back into your head, then what good is it?

Movie review

It doesn't matter much that "Speed" is another buddy-anti-buddy movie, this time pitting Keanu Reeves as Los Angeles SWAT cop Jack Traven against Dennis Hopper as mad bomber Howard Payne; or that most of its big set pieces — or even its basic premise — are pilfered from earlier movies. Summer action movies are expected to be derivative and formulaic. They're also expected to be brainless, substanceless and noisy, and "Speed" hits its marks on all three of these counts, too. At one point, Howard instructs Jack: "Do not attempt to grow a brain." And the filmmakers follow his advice to the letter.

What a movie like this has to be, though, is fast — fast enough to drive every thought from your head, make you dig your fingers into the seat in front of you and hang on for dear life. A name-tag-like "Speed" — only ups the ante. And when Jack's police car zooms over the top of a hill, soaring in from the top of the frame, you buckle your seat belt and settle in for a good ride.

Unfortunately, you needn't have bothered. Undoubtedly, the picture now will again supply that edge-of-the-seat sensation; yet, by action-adventure standards, "Speed" is leaden and strangely poky. It never seems to shift into overdrive and let fly.

Nor does cinematographer-turned-director Jan de Bont waste time elaborating on even

the most basic details of his characters' lives. In terms of story, "Speed" is just one thing after another.

In the main event, Howard rigs a city bus with a bomb set to go off when the vehicle's speed dips below 50 mph.

And because Jack had fouled up another of Howard's ransom schemes earlier in the week he's the one Howard singles out to

prevent the disaster — if he can.

Undoubtedly, what the filmmakers were aiming for here was a kind of streamlined musicality, for the narrative to be as ripped and snappy as a new action-hero body. Some directors make a career out of paring character and subplot to the bone. But in de Bont's case this trait comes across as a sign of ineptitude rather than a stylistic choice.

What the dude does, mostly, is talk on the phone — to his partner (Jeff Daniels), his superior (Joe Morgan) or his nutty adversary. But even Hopper, who's spent his career driving on the wrong side of the road, seems to keep it between the lines. Every now and then we hear his mad cackle but in this case he's literally just phoning it in, and in his overalls he looks about as threatening as the Maytag repair man.

The only performer to stand out is Sandra Bullock as Annie, who's pressed into service as an emergency bus driver. If it weren't for the smart-funny twist she gives to her lines, the air on that bus would have been stifling. Her main function is to represent Jack's potential squeeze, but wiser cracking behind the wheel, she emerges as a slightly softer version of the Linda Hamilton-Sigourney Weaver heroines: capable, independent, but still irresistibly vulnerable.

The real sex object here, though, is Reeves, who with his brush-cut and pumped-up physique is barely recognizable as the loose, cager-puppy actor from his earlier films. As Jack, he reads every line as if he really, really cared, and though he's undeniably hunky and electric, he's so earnest that he has no electricity, no life. The picture positions Reeves as a hip new action hero, but if he doesn't get some craziness in his soul, he could wind up as the poster boy for the Young Republicans.

THE COWBOY WAY (PG-13). Woody Harrelson is the only reason to see this story of two scrappy Westerners (Kiefer Sutherland plays his dour buddy) trying to solve a mystery in evil New York City; but he is not reason enough. Likeable as he is, Harrelson's star presence can't rescue a canonic story and uninspired direction. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

THE CROW (R). The only reason for a grown person to see this hyper-violent doom-and-gloom comic strip adaptation is for the late Brandon Lee's charismatic presence. As the murdered rock guitarist who comes back to life for vengeance, Lee has a kinetic power. His balletic rampages are like waking night-

mares. Otherwise, this film will probably be a bit with tortured male adolescents. (Twin Cinema)

THE FLINTSTONES (PG). Lively but ultimately wearying, this remake of the popular TV show is a live-action cartoon in every sense of the words. Much creativity has gone into the visuals, but so little into the words that even those who find the result gaudy and amusing will want to change the channel. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

MAJOR LEAGUE II (PG). The inevitable sequel to the 1989 baseball hit is a so-so clubber comedy with a few funny moments, most from Bob Uecker as the play-by-play announcer of the laggard but pennant-bound Cleveland Indians. Charlie Sheen, Dennis Haysbert, Tom Berenger and others recap their roles from the first film. (Grand-Vu)

MAVERICK (PG). High-priced crowd-pleaser that reaches for Feel Good and settles for Feel OK. Mel Gibson stars as Maverick,

the spinless, jaunty gambler first seen in the ABC TV series, and he's exhaustingly sporty, coming with the effects of her problem drinking. Though both actors work hard and do affecting jobs, the film's overall artificiality detracts from the honesty of their performances. (Twin Cinema)

NAKED GUN 3: THE FINAL INSULT (PG-13). The third in the "Naked Gun" series is not as funny as the first two but it's still chock-filled with good gags. Leslie Nielsen's Lt. Frank Drebin is retired but not for long. (Motor-Vu)

RENAISSANCE MAN (PG-13). Danny DeVito shows more feeling and understated grace than he has in years in this movie about a teacher in an Army post but it's such a shamelessly sentimental job that his good work seems isolated in the suds. It's a compost of "Dead Poets Society" and many other similarly themed movies. (Twin Cinema)

WHEN A MAN LOVES A WOMAN (R).

Philippine censors ban another film

MANILA — They're at it again. When we last left the Philippine movie censors, they were under siege for demanding cuts in "Schindler's List," the Academy Award-winning Holocaust film by Steven Spielberg. Then came an uproar over "The Piano," winner of three Oscars, which the censors effectively banned as "immoral."

Both decisions were eventually overturned amid seething criticism, but the Movie and Television Review and Classification Board, as the censors' institution is officially known, has remained undeterred.

Now it has banned "Belle Epoque," the Spanish production that won this year's Oscar for Best Foreign Language Film.

The decision has enraged moviegoers anew, offended the Spanish Embassy here and created a potentially embarrassing distraction for an upcoming visit to Spain by President Fidel Ramos.

Philippine censors are not alone. Other censorship boards in Southeast Asia have also stirred controversy lately by imposing cuts or bans on movies that they deemed not only sexually, but sometimes politically, incorrect.

In Indonesia, the world's largest predominantly Muslim country, censors banned "Schindler's List" this month after nearly two months of deliberations, citing what they considered excessive violence and nudity. But even before the film arrived in Indonesia for review by the censorship board, the Jakarta-based Committee for World Muslim Solidarity denounced it "stigmatizing" as "nothing but Zionist propaganda."

In Malaysia, a controversy over "Schindler's List" embroiled top government officials and eventually ended in an impasse that kept the picture from being screened.

In the Philippines, Asia's only Roman Catholic country, movie buffs got their most recent rude shock last week when the board rejected "Belle Epoque" as "unfit for public viewing."

The film is about a young Spanish soldier in 1931 who leaves the army, moves in with an old painter and becomes the lover of his four beautiful daughters.

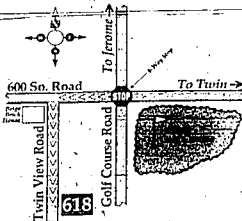

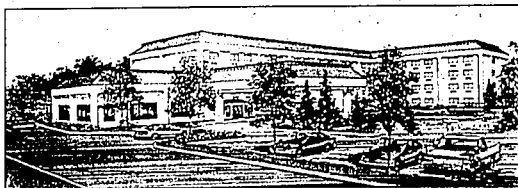

Clutches of cult film hold Arnold

Actress finds few roles after starring in 'Henry: Portrait of a Serial Killer'

HOLLYWOOD — In a dozen years as a newspaper reporter, I have asked for only two autographs. One of them was from my childhood idol, pool player Steve Mizner.

The other was from Becky. You know — Becky, the ex-topless dancer in the cult classic "Henry: Portrait of a Serial Killer." I first saw "Henry" four years ago as a Sunday matinee. During this inauspicious film, based on the lives of self-professed serial killers Henry Lee Lucas and Otis Toole, the not-so-dynamic duo kills 15 people.

In the dark-souled spirit of "Taxi Driver" and "Reservoir Dogs," the movie takes a sinister, unabashed look at violence in America, featuring a disturbing home invasion scene and others in which Henry — the epitome of the urban bogymen — snaps necks, welds a screwdriver and decapitates a dead victim with a kitchen knife.

When it was over, I needed instant therapy. I wanted to grab people by the collar as they fled to their cars and plead: "My God! How can we let people do this to one another?"

The movie's grip on me eventually wore off. Then came the recent day at Hampton's in Hollywood. That's when I saw her. She set down my french fries and asked innocently if I wanted another Coke.

It was the same blond hair, that same petite frame and those sky-blue eyes. No, it couldn't be. Becky was my waitress! I swallowed hard and asked the question that scores of "Henry" cult followers have asked before me: "Ahem. You're Becky, aren't you?"

She smiled sweetly and nodded her head. But when I reached a few favorite lines from the film, Tracy Arnold looked at me and said, "Oh, you never remember dialogue. That scares me!"

Then Arnold told her own scary story: how she'd been taken hostage by a movie.

Nine years ago, then barely 22, the stage actress went "from Shakespeare to shock" — landing her first film role in the low-budget "Henry," filmed in Chicago in just four weeks for \$100,000.

Paid \$2,000 along with two other first-time film actors, Arnold played Otis' innocent kid sister who misguidedly falls in love with the brooding Henry and later falls to pieces as the movie's pitiful last victim.

Arnold thought she had scored big-time with her first movie role. After all, she knew a lot about the real Henry Lee Lucas. Some of his supposed Texas victims were

friends of her family. And Lucas — now on Death Row — spent time in jail near her hometown of Georgetown, Texas.

"Henry," filmed in 1985, was shelved for five years after receiving an X rating for violence. But the film rose from the dead after critic Roger Ebert gave it a rave review at the 1990 Telluride (Colo.) Film Festival.

Since then, "Henry" has inspired a following of zealous fans. For co-stars Michael Rooker, who played Henry, and Tom Towles — who portrayed Otis — the movie's unlikely success translated into steady work: Rooker's resume includes roles in "JFK," "Sea of Love," and "Mississippi Burning," while Towles has scored regular film and television work.

But for Arnold, the film's success has spelled only frustration. And the public recognition she attributes to "my own little 15 minutes of fame."

By the time "Henry" hit the midnight market in 1990, Arnold had moved from Chicago to Hollywood to begin waitressing. She landed a few minor roles, including commercials for both McDonald's and Wendy's. Soon, though, the work disappeared. And the Becky sightings began.

The sightings actually started before the film was commercially released — among Hollywood insiders with access to bootleg copies of "Henry."

"The first time I was recognized, this guy just stared at me like I was a ghost," Arnold said. "When he finally approached me, I said, 'How did you find me? How did you get a copy of the film?' He just gave me a wicked little smile and said, 'Oh, it's around.'"

Pearl Jam faces war against Ticketmaster

Can one of rock's biggest bands bring down the entertainment industry's most powerful ticket service? That's the issue now that the Seattle group Pearl Jam has declared war against Ticketmaster, the giant computerized agency that sells tickets in 130 North American cities.

Pearl Jam would like to see lower service charges for concert tickets and a greater degree of competition in the market. Ticketmaster, meanwhile, hopes to preserve its highly profitable dominance as a ticket seller.

The band's mission is noble, but it has chosen a tough battle to win.

Pearl Jam sent a memo last month to the U.S. Justice Department, the antitrust division. In it, the band claimed it was forced to cancel a summer concert tour after Ticketmaster lobbied promoters not to cooperate with Pearl Jam's requests for lower ticket prices and more reasonable service charges.

Earlier, the band announced it had canceled its summer tour because of

the emotional impact of the April suicide of its good friend, Kurt Cobain.

To some, the band's claim rings hollow: When you're the hottest band in the world, as Pearl Jam is now, everybody wants to book your shows.

Pearl Jam asked promoters to hold tickets to \$18, quite low for a superstar level band, and service charges to no more than 10 percent of the ticket price — \$1.80, in other words.

That could severely reduce Ticketmaster's profits and create a precedent for other bands to do the same.

Ticketmaster supporters point out that ticket buyers are simply paying for the service of convenience. No service charge is applied to tickets purchased at the box office. The alternative, they say, is a distribution system that doesn't provide all buyers equal access to tickets.

But in Pearl Jam's memo, the band claimed that Ticketmaster's "secretive contracts allowed it to exert control over the distribution of tickets to concerts."

Arrested Development goes easy

Arrested Development. "Zingalamaduni." (Chrysalis): It is called the sophomore line, and it just hit Arrested Development like an 18-wheeler with Snokey in hot pursuit.

Not that the band's second studio album — the group's follow-up to the much-heralded "3 Years, 5 Months and 2 Days in the Life of..." — is without merit. Its charms are fewer and less obvious.

Maybe that was to be expected. "3 Years" was a revelation, a siren song of uplift that seemed to owe as much to Alabama as to African simultaneously Southern, soulful and African rhythms. It seemed to pulse with a wisdom older than rivers.

By contrast, "Zingalamaduni" (an African term meaning a "beehive of culture," the band says) is too often content to just lie there. Burdened by the weight of good words and grand intentions, it never quite takes flight. It doesn't help that the orchestrations are sparser than what we've become used to from A.D.; the music pulses along under the power of an eclectic collection of chants, samples, keyboards, flutes and African drums that mesh without urgency but never quite draw you in.

The band's third album, "The Love Train," is less than sterling. Moments, the band is something special.

Where others dutifully conform to, or fight against, the new McCarthyism of political correctness, Arrested Development goes a more ambitious route. It embraces what might be called "spiritual" correctness — meaning that this band is life-affirming, injustice-bating.

Among the best tracks on the disc: "Ache'n for Acres," a smart and catchy missive on the need for blacks to own property, and "Africa's Inside Me," celebrating the influence of the continent with a fast rap, a jazzy melody and a soulful, bluesy groove. Both are good, but neither is quite enough.

Which is a shame. Arrested

Development wants to save the world through pride, brotherhood and love, and you certainly can't argue with that. "Zingalamaduni" has ten in spades. But if it's good music you're looking for, you'd better wait for the remixes.

Collective Soul, "Hints, Allegations and Things Left Unsaid" (Atlantic): Could this Georgia band's debut CD be the beginning of pop guru?

Hint: Check out the crunchy guitar riffs on this collection of melodic rock, which is picking up steam in both rock and pop circles.

But that's not the sole reason to like Collective Soul's first outing. Most of these songs are so infectious, you'll be playing air guitar and doing the head-bobbing thing after only one listen. The first single, "Shine," has that hummable guitar riff and slow-groove beat. "Scream" is a frivolous slice of frenetic pop; and the bluesy ballad "Sister Don't Cry" boasts a soulful vocal delivery from lead singer Ed Roland.

Then, out of nowhere it comes, comes "Pretty Donna," a lushly orchestrated, strings-laden instrumental. You won't see this one coming, and nothing else on the CD even approximates it — but it works. Cool. Not to mention the added bonus of hearing a fairly straightforward rock group — there's not much more to this outfit than guitars, bass, drums and vocals — come up with a left-field surprise.

Mother Station, "Brand New Bag" (EastWest): Susan Marshall's voice is the closest to Janis Joplin's in this world. It makes an immediate impact but it's just one of the pleasures of Mother Station's hard-hitting debut. The Memphis-based five-piece band specializes in gut-level, blues and soul-based rock of the sort that anchored the pop charts in the late 1960s and early '70s. Cliches abound — and Marshall sometimes strains too hard but they are saved by their very authenticity and guitarist Edwin Sponcer's songcraft.

"Heart Without a Home," a near-closure of Joplin's "Turtle Blues,"

impresses with slyer bombast. "What's on Your Mind" seduces with its shuffling beat, acoustic slide guitar and harmonica.

Spencer spins a neat lyrical twist on "Somebody Else Will," a rocker that is the flip side of the Rolling Stones' "If You Can't Rock Me (Somebody Will)." On this version, the singer is a woman reuniting her jilted girlfriend. "If he won't love you, somebody else will."

At a time when female-fronted groups seem polarized between the sparseness of Juliana Hatfield and the slick urban-tease of Salt-n-Pepa, Mother Station is an appealingly earthy alternative.

Javelin Boot, "For Those About to Pop" (No Dub/Travdy): Javelin Boot is something of an anomaly. This trio has a pure pop sound yet probably will be cast as "alternative"; it is from Austin, Texas, yet sounds nothing like the rousy acts most closely identified with that hotbed of great music.

"For Those About to Pop" blurs the line between commercial and alternative, it would sound as at home coming from the AM band as a college station.

From the first jangling notes of "Lana Knows," the album's opener, it is clear that these guys have studied their guitar pop. R.E.M., the Smiths and the Beatles all get a nod in a sound that should immediately be familiar to just about anyone with a radio yet isn't so derivative that it sounds like a knock-off. Javelin Boot is carving out its own niche, while giving a tip of the hat to the masters.

In a season of grunge and industrial music, "For Those About to Pop" is a piece of pop refreshment, with 12 original songs full of hooks and harmonies, played by three people who have made music together for 15 years and seamlessly fit together.

Guitarist Dan O'Neill, bassist Blake Patterson and drummer David Miller have made a fine album, one that sounds like it's coming from a car radio on a sunny summer day, if only radio would play it.

Aerosmith offers computer music

NEW YORK (AP) — In a first for both the computer and music industries, Geffen Records plans to distribute a new song by Aerosmith through a computer on-line system.

The song, "Head First," will be available to CompuServe subscribers for a limited time beginning June 27.

The heat and humidity of summer means it's the season for indoor (read: air conditioned) activities, and overheated kids often turn first to video games. And just in time, a new crop of Nintendo-format games has recently hit the market.

Remember the two types — Nintendo and Super Nintendo — are rarely interchangeable. NES games may be played on the original 8-bit system; SNES games are for the Super Nintendo system.

• **Zoda's Revenge: Star Troopers II** (NES 8-bit, Nintendo; recommended ages: 8 and up). Adventurer Mike Jones is off on a new time-and-space mission: He must save seven mystic Tetrads while facing the Evil Zoda forces. More than a dozen stages in eight settings. An excellent game for fans of the original Nintendo system.

• **Rocko's Modern Life** (SNES, Viacom; recommended ages: 8 and up). Based on the hit Nickelodeon TV animated series Rocko's Modern Life. Players must help Rocko follow his pal Spunky from treacherous tree-houses to dingy basements to wild washing machines in Laundryland. Suburban animation for a video game.

• **Knights of the Round** (SNES,

Capcom USA; recommended ages: 8 and up). Legend has it the man who pulls the sword Excalibur from the stone is destined to be king, but even the power of the sword can not release Britain from darkness. Players take on the role of Arthur, Sir Lancelot or Percival and begin a quest for the holy grail, fought battle with evil knights, petty tyrants and sinister sorcerers out to stop you. One or two players must complete seven stages. Best sword-fighting game for the SNES system.

• **Choplifter III** (SNES, Extreme; recommended ages: 8 and up). More than 100 hostages are being held in the Amazon. To rescue them, players fly helicopters over water, desert, jungle and through burning cities in four missions against planes, tanks, gunships and anti-aircraft artillery. Very realistic graphics and sound effects.

• **Super Battle Tank 2** (SNES, Absolute; recommended ages: 13 and up). This sequel to Super Battle Tank put players in a M1A2 tank in desert fighting against enemy tanks and helicopters; you can even call in Patriot missiles and F-15 airstrikes. Better graphics and speed than the original, but it's still tough to drive this tank.

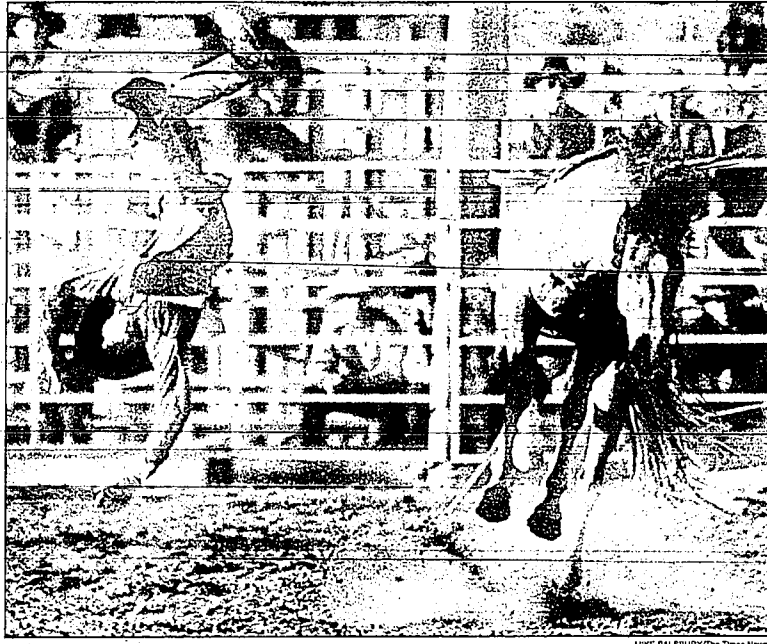

By virtue of the draw, CSI cowboys have tonight off. Davis, competing in four events for UNLV, is the only area man on the day sheet, his event the second go in calf roping.

Old pros Watson, Nicklaus top Open leader board

OAKMONT, Pa. — Golf... it's not the game that Jack built, although he has been around so long it might seem that way.

On a sweltering Thursday here at Oakmont Country Club, Jack Nicklaus set out, club in hand, searching for another bit of golf history.

Nicklaus is a four-time winner of the U.S. Open, which no one has won more often.

Could there be a fifth?

Hey, anything's possible at the U.S. Open, where in the first round, nine golfers beat par, 132 didn't, 18 were still on the course when play was suspended because of lightning in the area, and the 54-year-old Nicklaus shot 69 and stood only one shot off the first-round lead.

In fact, had it not been for the magic of another revised rule, 44-year-old Tom Watson, Nicklaus would have had the day just about to himself.

Watson shot 68, putting himself a

stroke ahead of Nicklaus, three-time champion Hale Irvin, Ernie Els of South Africa and Frank Nobilo of New Zealand.

Among them, Watson, Nicklaus and Irvin have eight U.S. Open titles.

The Open is familiar ground for Watson, who has played it 22 other times. He won in 1982 at Pebble Beach and could have won in 1983 at Oakmont and again in 1987 at the Olympic in San Francisco, but finished second both times.

— Watson's round featured four birdies, a bogey at No. 8 when his 3-iron shot sailed over the green into the back bunker, and three dramatic saves for par that made his day.

The most special was Watson's par on 12. His drive lodged against a sprinkler head in the fairway, 250 yards from the green. He pushed his second shot into the right rough, knocked a sand wedge short of the green, then picked a sand wedge to 6 feet and rolled in the putt for par.

When he had said Wednesday that '95 percent of the field didn't have a chance, Watson declined to identify in which percentage he belonged.

He changed his mind Thursday, saying that he's in the 5 percent that can win it.

If Nicklaus can do it, then Watson can do it, he said.

"There's no reason why not," Watson added.

But Nicklaus' effort had surprise going for it. Who could have seen it coming? Certainly not Nicklaus, who was as stunned as anybody.

"I am not surprised," Nicklaus said. "I suppose I am amazed."

"My wife told me this morning, 'You are 22! You are 22!' I said, 'I accept it.'"

Soccer's big show kicks off, with promoters looking beyond '94

CHICAGO — The World Cup is here. Will Americans care enough to make soccer a significant part of their professional sporting landscape?

The soccer community begins finding out today, when defending champion Germany meets Bolivia in the opening game of the first World Cup held in the United States.

Spectators are everywhere in this nation where baseball, basketball, hockey and, of course, American football are solidly entrenched. The organizers of the monthlong World Cup insist there is room for what the rest of the world calls football — soccer — and plan a 12-team premier league to begin play next April.

The spark to ignite interest in soccer must come from the World Cup.

World Cup USA 94



Alan Rothenberg, the chairman of the organizing committee, is confident that from Friday's sellout at Soldier Field through the final July 17 at the Rose Bowl, Americans will become fans of the world's game.

"The World Cup can provide tremendous impetus for soccer in the United States," Rothenberg said. "We're planning on having the most successful World Cup ever, and for it to have a great positive effect on soccer in this country. We think FIFA for the confidence is has placed in us in the United States."

FIFA, the world governing body for soccer, will make more than

\$200 million from the 52-game tournament. World Cup USA 1994 could see profits in the \$20 million range, much of which will be channeled back into the sport through the U.S. Soccer Federation.

A vast majority of the games are sold out, with 97.3 percent of all tickets sold. That's 3.55 million tickets, far more than the previous record of 2.51 million sold in Italy four years ago.

Early estimates spoke of nearly \$4 billion being added to economies of the nine host sites by World Cup fans, be they Americans or foreigners. Those numbers apparently were misguided.

Hotel bookings aren't approaching predictions in any of the host cities. And while sales on World Cup merchandise are strong, fewer than

His 69 was a little hard to accept, though.

Nicklaus, who won the Open in 1962, 1967, 1972 and 1980, hasn't finished better than 33rd in the last seven Opens. He hasn't won a regular tour event since the 1986 Masters, hasn't made the cut in the six tournaments he has played on the regular tour since 1984. Thursday had not shot a round under 70.

"I have just played poorly," Nicklaus said. "It is hard to concentrate when you are hitting where I have been hitting."

"Anytime I have been able to find my golf ball, I have been able to concentrate and I found my golf ball today."

At No. 18, Nicklaus found it at the bottom of the hole after rolling in a 40-foot putt on a green with so many undulations they serve as speed bumps.

The gallery cheered as his ball disappeared at the end of his long journey and Nicklaus closed his eyes, raised his arms, then covered his head with his hands.

Explaining his strategy on the putt, he said, "All I was trying to do was figure out some way to get it close enough to make a second putt and the ball went in."

It was not the only time the ball acted unpredictably.

Fred Couples, who is four shots back, 72, eagled the 315-yard No. 17 when he drove the green. Then on No. 18, he three-putted from 12 feet for a bogey.

Arnold Palmer, 64, playing in his last U.S. Open, shot 77, four strokes better than 28-year-old John Daly.

Daly, who has never played in the U.S. Open before, eagled No. 10.

There were seven eagles, but for a lot of people, there were times when the ball just wouldn't go in.

Els rimmed an 8-footer at 18 that would have given him the lead, but a 34-year-old South African wasn't too worried about what the missed putt meant.

Olajuwon heats up, but Rockets provide minimal support in loss

NEW YORK (AP) — For the first time in the NBA Finals, Hakeem Olajuwon played like the league's most valuable player.

He hit his smooth turnaround from the baseline. He caught a pass and, in almost the same split-second, rolled to the basket for an easy layup. He scored 14 points in the fourth quarter.

But the Houston Rockets still lost 91-82 Wednesday night, tying the series 2-2, because his teammates were no match for Patrick Ewing's partners on the New York Knicks.

Olajuwon, who won the MVP award for the first time, has outplayed his opposing center offensively throughout the best-of-7 series that resumes Friday night. He said he's not worried about the lack of support.

"The series is 2-2 so we are in excellent position," Olajuwon said Thursday. "We know what we're supposed to do, what we plan to do. So I'm comfortable knowing that we're capable of doing what we plan."

"We wouldn't have got here if we didn't have guys step up," Houston coach Rudy Tomjanovich said. "That's been the trademark of this

team. You can't just zero in on one guy."

Some of Olajuwon's teammates played well in Houston's two wins — Otis Thorpe in Game 1 and Sam Cassell in Game 3 — although the consistency of the support Ewing has gotten from Derek Harper, John Starks and Charles Oakley has been greater.

Until Wednesday, New York's relentless defense bottled up Olajuwon.

But on Wednesday, he broke out. He made 14 of 20 shots and scored 32 points, the most by anybody in the series. That same night, Ewing missed 20 shots for the second straight game and scored 16 points. For the series, Olajuwon has averaged 26.5 points per game, Ewing 18.3.

"I thought I had good shots," said Ewing, who has outrebounded Olajuwon in the series. "I just missed

them. Some of them I faded too much on."

Olajuwon seems to finally be on target. After hitting just two of 11 shots in the fourth quarters of the first three games, he kept the Rockets in Game 4. He scored 14 of their 21 points in the final period on a variety of shots.

Each of his first three baskets of the quarter — a 15-foot jumper, a layup and a dunk off an alley-oop pass — put Houston ahead. A five-foot hook tied the game 72-72. Then Ewing's short jumper gave New York the lead for good.

Harper, the Knicks' top scorer the last two games, said they don't plan to change the way they're covering Olajuwon just because he burned them once.

"We've had pretty good success and great players are going to come through," Harper said. "You have to guard against really, really overreacting to him scoring so many points against you."

"Our game plan coming into the series was to contain his supporting cast as well as we could, not necessarily to stop him because he's virtually unstoppable."

Bowl deals expected by Monday

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — With talk of an NCAA football playoff dying out again, bowls are secretly battling to become players in a second postseason alliance with the major conferences.

Invitations by as many as five bowls will be extended to the Atlantic Coast Big East, Big 12 and the Southeastern conferences on Monday, officials said this week.

The current two-tiered, three-year bowl agreement will end after the Jan. 1, 1995 games.

Talks on a new deal among the bowls, major conferences and television networks began last month in Atlanta.

Unlike the initial bowl coalition formed three years ago, a new arrangement is expected to be narrower in scope — three games instead of six — and involve much larger payouts.

A new deal is badly needed says John Crawford, president of the Cotton Bowl Athletic Association, but is being approached slowly.

"There is stronger competition this time around," Crawford said. "We have had little to no discussion among ourselves (since Atlanta)."

"In some cases it has gotten to the critical mode. It's pretty severe when our bowl has been around for 58 years and you can wake up the next morning and it can be done. That's pretty important. We are pulling out all the stops."

A source said as many as six or seven bowls may bid to host three games in the new alliance. Games probably would be played on New Year's Eve, New Year's Day and Jan. 2. In addition to teams from the four conferences, two wild-card entries would round out the coalition.

The original first tier of the coalition involved the Cotton, Orange and Sugar bowls. In addition to those three, others expected to bid for the top games this time around include the Fiesta, Alamogordo and Gator bowls, the source said.

The Rose Bowl has a deal with the PAC-10 and Big Ten conferences through the year 2000 and is out of the bowl coalition mix.

Panel will discuss Harding

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Tonya Harding won't be there to defend herself when a U.S. Figure Skating Association panel meets later this month to discipline her for her involvement in the attack on rival Nancy Kerrigan.

No attorney will show up to represent her, either.

Among other things, the panel will consider stripping Harding of her national title and banning her from the association for life.

Harding's attorney, Bob Weaver, sent a letter to former U.S. Olympic Committee president William Hybl, who heads the panel, outlining why she believes no action should be taken against her. Weaver wouldn't reveal the contents of the letter, but noted that Harding resigned from the association as part of her plea bargain.

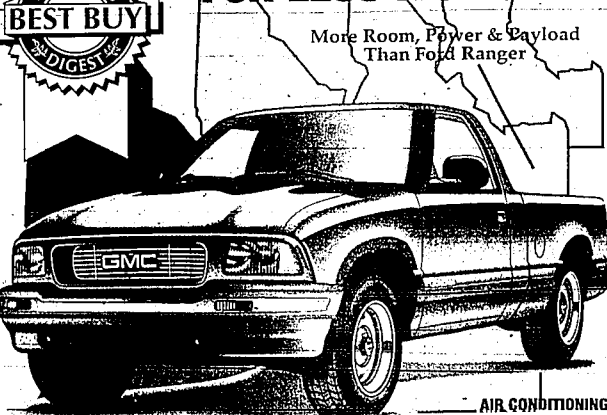

Builders cut back on single-family homes

WASHINGTON—Builders, seeing home sales slowed by higher mortgage rates, cut back construction of single-family houses in May for the second straight month.

Many analysts said higher rates will curb activity for the remainder of the year, although they predict single-family housing starts in 1994 will total more than the previous year.

"The single-family sector is the bulk of the industry and we're starting to see it taper off," said economist David Lereah of the Mortgage Bankers Association.

"We're seeing a general drift down in single-family starts," agreed economist Stan Dookins of the National Association of Home Builders. "Interest rates are moderating a little now, which certainly will keep the decline from being overwhelming, but

we will see a continued decrease."

The Commerce Department said Thursday that housing starts rose 2.6 percent in May, to a seasonally adjusted 1.51 million annual rate. Increases in the South and West offset declines in the Northeast and Midwest.

But the growth was entirely in construction of apartment buildings.

Single-family starts, which represent 80 percent of housing construction and are most affected by mortgage rate changes, slipped 0.5 percent, to a 1.20 million annual rate. They had fallen 5 percent in April, to 1.21 million.

And although multi-family starts jumped 16.7 percent, to a 308,000 annual rate, many analysts said the increase was unsustainable and predicted construction would decline in June.

Despite the drop in the single-family sector, housing starts for the first five months of 1994 were 2.1 percent higher

than a year earlier. For all of 1993, starts totaled 1.29 million, nearly 2.6 percent less than they will climb to nearly 1.40 million this year.

The Labor Department also reported Thursday the number of Americans filing first-time claims for unemployment benefits fell by 11,000 last week to a seasonally adjusted 348,000, lowest in nearly two months.

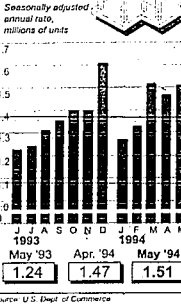
The decline was expected by most economists, who say the job market is improving although at a slower rate than earlier in the year.

The reports were the latest signs of a slowing economy after four interest rate increases engineered by the Federal Reserve to head off any inflationary pressures.

Many analysts believe the three-year-old housing recovery peaked in December, when starts jumped to a 1.61 million annual rate, highest since January 1989.

Bel Atlantic plans metro video services

WASHINGTON—Bell Atlantic Corp. said federal regulators for permission to provide video services in its metropolitan areas, giving consumers for the first time a choice between local cable or phone companies.

The plan, which was filed Thursday, must be approved by the Federal Communications Commission before Bell Atlantic can begin building the networks to offer consumers broadcast channels, cable programs, shopping services and movies on demand. It also plans to offer a variety of interactive services through which customers can

electronically send and receive information about health care or education using their TV sets.

Bell Atlantic plans to provide service to some areas as early as 1995, depending on how quickly the FCC acts, said spokeswoman Sharon Fioravanti.

The areas covered by the plan are: Baltimore; northern New Jersey; Philadelphia-Delaware Valley; Pittsburgh; Hampton Roads, Va.; and Washington, D.C. The company plans to build facilities in each of these areas at the same time, but could not specify which communities in those areas would be the first to receive service.

Universal Studios celebrates summer

The summer season is practically here. And right along with barbecues, bikinis and beach blanket bingo comes the annual tidal wave of summer entertainment.

Bicoastal co-hosts Liza Hartman Black and Jay Busam will lead viewers through a fast-paced smorgasbord of what the summer has to offer, broadcasting from Universal Studios Hollywood and Universal Studios Florida, respectively. Comic Paula Poundstone will act as a roving reporter.

Hartman Black describes the upcoming event from Nashville, Tenn., where her husband, country music superstar Clint Black, is finishing work on his new album.

"It's basically to give everyone a look at what's coming up in the summer as far as concerts and movies, and just highlights of the summer's entertainment," Hartman Black states. "From what I gather, it's just gonna be like one big summer party... What's going on, and what's out there to go and do with the family."

"And from what I understand, it's Universal Studios Hollywood's 30th anniversary, so you're gonna see some of the attractions there."

Throughout the 30 years, Universal Studios Hollywood has been host to more than 80 million guests on the famed Universal lot, where some of history's greatest motion pictures and television shows were produced and continue to be filmed.

CBS predicts further success with fall lineup

The Washington Post

CBS, which finished first in primetime for the third season in a row last month, announced a fall 1994-95 primetime schedule Tuesday that includes 5½ hours of new programming — three half-hour comedies and four one-hour dramas. Among the shows not returning next September will be familiar fare like "Evening Shade," "In the Heat of the Night" (due to return to the ABC as the occasional movie), "Traps" and "Tom," Tom Arnold's most recent comedy attempt.

Industry sages are already predicting a victory next season for ABC, whose schedule will include the World Series, the Super Bowl and the Academy Awards.

ABC is also looking forward to the return of "Grace Under Fire," the highest-rated new comedy last season; "NYPD Blue," the top-rated new drama; the mid-season hit "These Friends of Mine" (coming back as "Ellen"); and the No. 1 series among all networks in 1993-94, "Home Improvement."

Tuesday, CBS Entertainment president Peter Tortorici wouldn't hazard

a guess about next season but his predecessor, Jeff Sagansky, a major architect of the new schedule, flatly predicted a fourth straight primetime crown for CBS.

Tortorici announced that a fourth, still-untitled newsmagazine will get a summertime tryout. As it stands, the three networks will each have three magazine shows on next season.

He also said "Christy" and "Burke's Law" remain in production for mid-season returns, joining two newcomers, a sitcom about Manhattan bicycle messengers, "Double Rush," and a courtroom drama, "The Wright Verdicts," starring Tom Conti as a hotshot prosecutor.

The network is particularly high on two new shows, Monday night's "The Boys Are Back" — which produced the highest test audience numbers for any CBS sitcom ever — and a Thursday night medical drama, "Chicago Hope," which is stacked against NBC's new hospital drama, "ER."

Only the NFL football-less Sunday and the Tuesday night lineups are untouched in September. Thursday, with two new dramas, gets a major face lift.

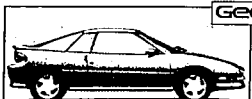

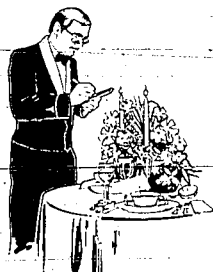

Jake and Paulina are drugged, taken to the wilderness and left to perish. When they regain consciousness, they are still attired in fancy finery but they are completely perplexed as to what has happened. The one thing they do know is they have to survive while searching for a way back to civilization.

The producers of "Another World" knew these sequences taking place in the great outdoors had to be done on location — even though it meant added expense, not to mention the physical strain on stars Evans and Eplin. The location set hard upon was off Lake Mohonk in the Catskill Mountains in upstate New York. It was ideal because it had cliffs, a large lake, forest-like areas and plenty of rough terrain.

We witnessed the recent location shoot and, unlike some where very little happens, the action

called for life-and-death situations which had Jake and Paulina running for their lives from whomever was tracking them. They were shot at, dangled from a bridge and, finally, in a spectacular stunt executed by stunt doubles, leapt from a 50-foot-plus cliff into the lake.

"Even though we had stunt doubles for the dangerous jump into the lake, I would have done it if they allowed me," Eplin said, and he was serious. "In fact, on the first day of shooting, they had Judi and me go down a rockslide and we both scraped ourselves pretty good on that. Then we spent a good deal of time in the water, and even though we got suits on we both were freezing. I got laryngitis (traces of it still remained as the actor spoke) and Judi got her legs scratched up."

See what we actors do for our art? Eplin joked.

Evans had to dangle from a bridge and, like Eplin, she chafed and pretty sore. "We're working very hard but we're also thrilled to be doing this location shoot because the authenticity of the locale makes it easier to play the chase scenes, in a studio set up to look like outdoors, you don't get the adrenalin flow you get from a real surroundings like this. I think the fans are going to enjoy the scenes we shoot."

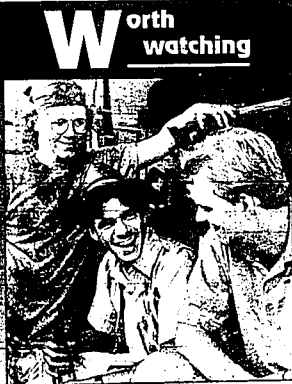

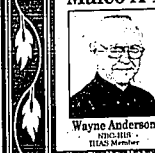
