

### Ruling wounds anti-gay measure, but it still lives

The Colorado Supreme Court Tuesday dealt that state's mean-spirited anti-homosexual amendment its fourth consecutive legal setback, Alas, the blow may not be fatal. Amendment 2, adopted by Colorado voters in 1992, would prohibit local governments from outlawing discrimination against homosexuals anawould strike down ordinances already on the books in Denver Boulder and Aspent.

The discriminatory measure was challenged immediately after it passed, with 54 percent of the vote, and a lower court rightly blocked its enforcement.

The state Supreme Court held that because Amendment 2 singles out a class of people for denial of basic rights it violates the equal-protection clauses, of the Colorado and U.S. constitutions. The right to participate equally in the political process is clearly affected by Amend

ment 2,"the court wrote.

However, the matter is not dead yet.
Colorado's attorney general said she will appeal the ruling to the U.S. Supreme.
Court. But she doesn't have to, and Gov.

The long effort to implement this unfair law generated a costly nationwide boycott of Colorado's tourist business and a tarnished image for the state. If majorities vote "yes," Oregon and Idaho should not be surprised if these manifestly unjust proposals meet the same fate as Amendment 2 — with the same high political and fiscal costs.







### Nice folks don't talk about incontinence. many suffer from it

TWIN FALLS — Incontinence isn't likely to be a hot topic of discussion at the bridge club.

Nobody wants to talk about involuntary loss of urine, although it happens to more people than you might think:
"And of course it's nothing to feel embarnassed about," said Dr. George Miller, a Twin Eallsubstatician and gynecologists," But some-people have to have the subject brought up by the physician before they'll even acknowledge—that it happens."
Miller said people don't hesitate to discuss their gallbladder operations, but if they loose urine while coughing or sneezing, they're mortified.



"West's "possible diamond entry than it was to lead toward one's diamond honors by premature commitment to the club finesse. After winning his spade king.—South should lead his diamond king, attacking West's only possible entry. When West takes his ace and continues spades, South-duoks one-round- and wins the-continuation. Then it's safe totake the club finesse. If it wins, South has at least 10 winners. If it loses, South must make at least nine, whether or not East has a fourth spade.


