Large majorities of all types of Americans favor limiting members of Congress to a total of 12 years in office, including 66 percent of those who identify themselves as registered voters.

The Associated Press poll on poli-tics was conducted Oct. 7-11 among a random sample of 1,005 adulis in the contiguous 48 states. Interieu-ing was done by telephone by ICR Survey Research Group of Media, Pa., part of AUS Consultant Cos.

The results were weighted to rep-resent the population by key demo-graphics such as age, sex, region and education.

Midwest leads in affordable housing

WASHINGTON — The Midwest had the most affordable housing in the second quarter, although rising mortgage rates trimmed Americans' ability to buy homes throughout much of the nation.

The Midwest had -18 of the -25 most affordable markets, including Kokomo, Ind., the most affordable of all, according to the Housing Opportunity Index published Tuesday by the National Association of Home Builders.

"Once again, a Midwestern area tops the list of affordable places to live, which is not surprising given the relative abundance of

The index, based on a survey of 500,000 rales of new and existing homes in 186-metropolitan areas, also showed the South with an abundance of affordable housing.

The least affordable markets were in the Northeast and West, particularly California, Indeed, 17 of the least affordable markets were in California, including San Francisco the least affordable of all, the survey found. San Francisco has ranked last in the index since the Home Builders began the surveys in the first quarter of 1991.

Kokomo posted a 92.6 score on the April-June index. The most affordable markets in other regions were the Vineland-MillVille-Bridgeton, N.J., area of the Northeast with a 90.8; Brazoria, Texas, in the South, 89.9, and Salem, Ore., in the West, 78.0.







Mariners' money situation has team asking for a new stadium

SEATTLE (AP) — The Seattle Mariners are losing money fast and won't dig much deeper into their prockets unless a new baseball stadium is built soon, the team's chairman said Tuesday.

John Ellis, part-owner and chief-representuality of the Mariners' ownership group, told a King County task force the Mariners lost nearly \$17 million in 1993 and expect to lose more than \$20 million in the strike-shortened 1994 season.

He said by the end of 1995, the Japanese-led owners will have absorbed more than \$50 million in losses since taking over the team in \$14.100?

losses since taking over the tearn in mid-1992.

He said one of the main reasons for the red ink is the Kingdome. Now closed for roof repairs, the 19-year-old facility isn't made for baseball and can't generate enough revenue to compete with other ball-parks, he said.

Ellis issued a dire warning: If construction on a new stadium doesn't start by 1996, when the Mariners' lease with the county-owned 'kingdome expires, major league basell in Seattle could be history.

"I would think that by that time, our investors would say. 'You know-that's enough.' We can't continue to pour money in with no prospect of even coming into the black,' Ellis told a news conference after his presentation to the county's Executive Task Force on Stadium Alternatives.

"For us to make a long-term commitment before the coxpiration of

mitment before the expiration of this lease, we would have to have assurance that the stadium had been financed and hopefully construction had started. It would take more than

a promise to try."

The task force is considering whether to recommend Kingdome renovations, an open-air stadium or a stadium with a retractable roof.

Co-chairwoman Shelly Yapp said the task force expects to present its recommendations to county Executive Gary Locke by January. Ellis said the ownership group prefers, a stadium, with a retractable roof, grass field, 45,000 to 47,000 club seats. 70 to 70 luxury suites and 3,000 to 4,000 club seats. 

After 76 years, **Boone House** moves to new neighborhood



TWIN FALLS -- The Boone House is once again on

"I couldn't hardly-believe they would-tear down a house on the National Register of Historie Phees," said-contractor-Jr.C. Anderson, who saved the 76-year-old home from the wrecking ball last March. He agreed to take the old stone house from the Magic Valley Mall and move it to Anderson-Lame-near-the Twin Falls-San Valley Regional Airport. After renovations are completed. Anderson intends to live in the house.

The much-publicized house-moving "party," down Blue Lakes Boulevard, cost Anderson \$50,000.
"I didn't think it would cost that much to move, it," said Anderson, who contracted with Western State Moving of Nampa to roll the house on a-series of dollies towed behind a tractor-trailer truck.

The Boone House was bullt in 1918 at 1311 Doie. Line Road, Owners Orin and Juliet Boone sold the house to Price Development, which developed the mall, in 1985 on the condition that they be allowed to live in it until their deaths. Mall management, with plans to construct stores on the lot, had been trying for two years since the Boones' deaths to give the house away to any-one willing to move "her the house away to any-one willing to move "her a work of the house areas of a "Andersont," who "owns "J:C." Anderson "Co." owned five acres-of-land in a subdivision he developed in 1928. The house-now-sits on that acreage, 2.5 miles south of the East Five Points intersection, on Ander-son Lane.

"It's pretty much all set down now," said Anderson of his new home, "Now I have to remodel it, but I haven't been able to work on it for two months." So far, Anderson has put in a full basement with 9-foot ceilings.

"It's a pretty unique house, in real good shape," he id. "It's mostly lava rock, but the corners are white

brick."
Inside, much of the home's wallpaper is original, A lava-rock fireplace is the focal point of the entry. Anderson plans to restore all of this, and to re-install the hopping-gus-furnace.

The lixing room has double doors leading onto a-front porch. Behind the living room is an old-fashioned kitchen with white oak eahinets. There is also a small bedroom and bath on the entry level.



The Krahn home was well known for education as well. Until a school was-built-on-hard donated by Herman, classes were held in the large living room. Children walked for miles to attend summer school there, and the teacher always boarded at the Krahn, home beforg and after the school was built. Gwendolyn, bontinued the tradition of hard work and fun while ruising their four children there.

Windows, depicted in wall paintings of ancient Egyptians, are as old as homes. Even prehistoric peoples made holes in the roofs of their hust to provide ventilation und light.

Indeed, their word yidnaw is derived from one of these functions, from the Old Norse word, vinduage, made up of vind meaning wind and anga signifying eye. Ave arrly peoples devised from fifter holmes, such as through elay pipes, windows became prominent in-the-walls-of-homes-instead-of-fronfs. Animal skins, shells and scales of large fish were used as window coverings.

In ancient Greece, skylights were employed, often covered with mica sheets or thin slabs of translucent marble: Ancient-Rome was the, first eivilization to have glass windows. It discovered the technology of mixing sand and other component materials and heating the mixture so it could be pressed and east into small pieces that were formed into panes.



Remove balky fasteners with oil

Few things are more frustrating to a do-it-yourselfer than a bolt or screw that can't be loosened or a nail that can't be pulled.

Fortunately, most balky fasteners can be removed by children in the pulled.

Here's a randown: If a nut or bolt is cortroded or "flozen" in place, the best first step is to saturate it with penetrating oil and wait for the oil to step in and help loosen it. Slotted Screws can be extremely dif-ficult to remove and the heads can be easily damaged, which makes removal even more difficult. If a stuck screw is sected in metal, use penetrating-oil-to-help lossen it before attempting to turn it out with a screwdriver.

Whether the screw is in wood or metal, make sure the screwdriver is the right size for the slot. If the driver is too large or small, the screw slot can be damaged.





Stock up on tools this fall for winter emergencies

Do-it-yourselfers who have fresh memories of last

Do-it-yourselfers who have fresh memories of last year's bitter winter will want to take extra steps this fall to avoid some of the home-maintenance problems it caused.
Fall is the time to stock up on materials and tools that are often impossible to find when weather emergencies occur. These fluchted de-icing compounds, tee chippers and snow shovels. Keep in mind that a hisky steel shovel works much better for clearing up icy snow than a flimiser aluminum or plastic shovel. But it's best have both types of shovels on hand. Most de-icing compounds must be stored in a dry place or they will absorb moisture and become lumpy. One of the best storege places I've found for a bug or two of de-icing compound is the trunk of a car.

Rock-salt de-icers (sodium chloride) are usually the cheapest, but must be used with care since they

can damage vegetation and corrode metat. Carciumchloride de-icers have little effect on vegetation but
can cause rusting if they come in contact with metal.

Homeowners who have large driveways or long
sidewalks should consider a snow blower. Some
home centers offer snow blowers at sale prices in
early fall, but they can become difficult to find, during the snow season and prices are generally higher.

A snow blower that can quickly clear up 10 inches
or more of snow can be bought for-less than \$400.

Those who already own snow blowers should take
the machines out of storage sometime in October to
make sure they are working.

To check a snow blower, fill the tank with fresh
gasoline, start the engine, and let the snow blower
idle for awhile, Give-the machine a dry run on a driveway or sidewalk to make sure the snow impeller
and other parts work.

If the snow blower is hard to start, install a new
sparkplug and try again. If you continue to have

problems starting it, you might want to take the machine to a shop for a tuneup. A snow blower that is hard to start in fair weather will be even more balky during cold, wet weather. Start and run the snow blower at least once a month during the winter even if there is no snow. This helps prevent gumming of the carburetor and helps keep the machine in quick-start condition.

We're talking about slipcovers—removable, fitted cloth to keep upholstery clean, extend its life and create a different look in a room.

"There are two reasons to have slip-covers," said Claude Paquet of Claude Paquet said. "The American style is tailored. The furniture looks upholstered but is slipcovered." Slipcovers have become so popular that at the High Point, N.C., furniture market last April, manufacturers showed upholstery with a slipcover look—casual, wrinkly—in fabric and leather.

Having slipcovers unade can be expensive. "It's about the same cost as upholstery, because there's so much labor involved," Paquet said.

When you order slipcovers, an upholsterer usually comes to your home to fit, pia and cut the fabric. The cut picces are gathered with a lifege safety pin and taken to the workroom to be sewn. The upholsterer returns to your home with the finished cover and flist of the furniture.



Beware of low contracting bids for home-improvement-projects

Evaluating bids is one of the trickiest parts of dealing with home-improvement contractors, and one in which a mistake can be costly.

Consider the case of a Philadelphia reader who recently wrote that he had received a low bid of \$3,800 and a high bid of 99,900 for some masonry-work con-his home.

"I'm arg loss as to why to cheate, the reader wrote, "Why is there such a range in prices?"

Large variances in bids aren't unusual-according to Bruce Hahn, president of the American Homeowners Foundation, a nonprofit decational and research group in Arlingtón, Va. For a domier project at his sown house, Hahn, and the said, he received bids of \$11,000, \$15,000, \$25,000 and \$55,000.

'A very low bid is tempting, but is usually cause for suspeicin, "add Hahn." I don't think it should be rejected-unt-of hand-but-cheek, unto it further. Thad one low bid where a gay just wanted to keep his crew busy.

Some low bids are legitimate. For instance, a contractor who has low overhead, may be able-to-submit a lower bid. But some experts say these unusually low bids could also be a sign that the contractor to cover employee injuries or property damage, or uses poor-quality materials.

In his case, Hahn said, he rejected the low bid because the bidder "was exertify a low-end guy" who wasn't weell-established as a contractor. He also rejected the high bid.

Hahn said he accepted the \$15,000 bid and ended up "reasonably-saits—fied" with the work done.


