TWIN FALLS - Idaho's anti-gay-rights movement has collisted the help of an anti-Mormon filmmaker to promote to election-finance reports.

The Idaho Citizens Alliance—has_broadenst-and-distributed-hundreds of anti-gay video-tapes from Jeremiah Films, a California-based fundamental-ist Christian organization that also makes "documentaries" about the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Sains.

The church denounces the Mormon films, which charge that homosexuals have infiltrated the church's Salt Lake City leadership.

Those films, "The God Makers," "The Mormon Dilemma," and "Joseph Smith and the "Temple of Doom" have been denounced as "wil," lie-filled—propaganda by LDS-Church of ficials.

Last year, Jeremiah Films re-leased an anti-gay program-entied—Guy-Kights—Special-Rights:



NEW YORK (AP) — Support for Democratic candidates has risen a bit from historically low levels, with women significantly more likely to back Democrats, an Associated Press poll indicates.

The poll; taken Oct. 28 through Wednesday; found 45 percent would vote Democratic and 38 percent Republican. This 7-point advantage among registered voters is an improvement over a statistically insignificant 1-point edge for the Democrats in a poll three weeks earlier.

The latest poll of 1,006 adults; including 782 registered voters, was taken by ICR Survey Research Group

of Media, Pa., part of AUS Consultants. Results have a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3 percentage points overall, 4 points for voters.

In a reflection of cynicism about the major political parties, the poll found that 42 percent of all adults think it wouldn't matter much which party controls Congress.

Amiong registered voters, the number is almost as high, 38 percent, compared with 30 percent wanting the Republicians to win the House and Senate and another 30 percent preferring continued Democratic control of Congress.

Nurses adapt to health-care reforms

WIN FALLS - The 18 beds in Magic Valley Region

TWIN FALLS - The 18 beds in Mague Valley Kegional Médical Center's pediatrics department have been relatively empty for a while: Last fiscal year, the department had an average census of about 34 paleites a day. That doesn't mean, however, that pediatric or any other medical conten purpes have let their level of care - or the amount of work they do - slip: Instead, they're finding different ways to offer patients their services. "We're taking care of more and more things in the patients home," said pediatrics nurse Susan Bridley, who started making pediatric home visits this year. "Anything that works better for the medical professions, health-ene reformhas hit nursing, a profession that continually changes anyway.

"We can adapt, and I think we're getting our own personality through this crisis," said Claudeen Buettner, director of nursing and human services at the College of Southern Idaho in Twin Falls. "Nursing care has to be fiscally responsible and responsible to the institution and family."

At the medical center, administrators have been reor-At the medical center, administrators have been reorganizing the staff in an effort to keep costs down – the main gold of health-care efform: So-far, 36, people-have taken early retirement, changed jobs or been laid off, saving more than SI million in salaries; more staffing changes may be on the way.

"It's frightening for some people." Bradley said of the changes, which may include more layoffs. "You just have to work with it and see what happens." A registered nurse for 27 years – including the past 15 at the medical center – Bradley said she has seen nursing of full critect. At first she spent time looking at the "whole patient," then as technology advanced, Bradley and other nurses became skilled at monitoring finachines, she said.

But in the past three years, professional nurses have returned to evaluating and assessing the needs of patients, she said.

That circle – and fewer patients – means changes for the medical center's staff of registered nurses, licensed practical nurses and nurse's aides.

Nursing staff members work as teams, with registered nurses in the lead-to-delegate care.

More registered nurses may be used in outpatient services.
