Scientists at NASA's Goddard Space
Flight Center say they have the first conclusive evidence that the Earth's protective
ozone layer is being eroded by man-made
chemical products, and not by natural events
like volcanic cruptions.

Data gathered by the National Aeronautics
and Space Administration's Upper Atmosphere Research Satellite, they said, have
found ozone-destreying chlorine-in-the
stratosphere over attactica along with fluotrine. It is a coincidence, the scientists said at
a news briefing Monday, that can be explained only by the breakdown of chlorofluorocarbons
the chief suspect in ozone destruction which contains both elements.

"We don't see any alternative," said Dr. Mark Schoeberl, project scientist at Goddard's Laboratory for Atmospheres. "The data continu that chlorolluorocarbons are the major source of chloring in the stratosphere and are the cause of the ozone loss we are seeing in the stratosphere." "This is mailed," said his deputy, Dr. Anne Douglass. "There is no other possibility." John W. Passacantando, executive director for Ozone Action, a Washington-based environmental group, welcomed the Goddard indings and urged accelerated international action to stop the manufacture and use of CFCs and to replace them with products less-damaging to the ozone layer.

Chlorofluorocarbons are compounds invented in the 1930s as a safer alternative to the ammonia then less that the same seen used in refrigerants. They have been used since as refrigerants, propelants in spray caus, and as cleaning agents.

Ozone is a three-atom form of oxygen. Formed naturally in the upper atmosphere, it acts as a barrier to harmful ultraviolet radiation from the sun.

When scientists noticed in the 1970s that the ozone layer seemed to be thinning each-spring over the Antarctic, they began to suspect it was being broken down in a seasonal chemical reaction with chlorine faster than it could be replaced by nature. could be replaced by nature







VICENTE GUERRERO, Mexico — Masked Indian peasants, some in brown rebel fatigues. felled trees across highways and barrieraded towns and villages Monday in southern Chiapas state, where guerrillas have threatened to renew an insurgency following a disputed election.

The peasant action coincided with an announcement by the rebel leader that thousands of Indian rebel troops had left their mountain stronghold and moved into 38 towns across the southern state. He did not say whether an offensive was planned.

The rebel lender, who goes by the nom de guerre of Subcomandante Marcos, announced the troop movement at a jungle news conference Moikfay; days after he declared-an-H-month-old-truce with the government null and void.

Israeli officials meet secretly with Syria

Israeli officials meet-secretly-with-SyriaJERUSALEM — Israeli army officers met secretly with Syrian officials in Washington this month and told them Israel was ready to withdraw from most of the Golan Heights, opposition leader Benjamin Netanyahu said Monday.

The Israelis also laid out the conditions under which they were prepared to pull all Israeli troops out of the Golan Heights, which Israel captured in the 1967 Mideast war, Netanyahu said.

"This is a policy that is the first step in withdrawing from all of the Golan and removing the Israeli tank force that effectively blocks a Syrian attack," Netanyahu told reporters after a meeting of the Knesset's Foreign Affairs and Defense Committee.



The articles, "The U.S. at War," have brought back many memeries but none so vivid as "Destroyers engage in battles, help with Philippine victory," carried in the Dec. Sedition.



While this 's ar good riden in some cases, workers about to retire should be extremely cautious before choosing in financial planners and other experts say. There are a number of serious principal sources for those who make the wrong choice.

In concept, the strategy is simple, but only a detailed financial analysis can determine how well it will work in a given set of circumstances, warner and other experts said.
