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House OKs budget amendment

Measure gains approval only after Republicans ease restrictions on raising taxes

WASHINGTON — Determined to make "government do what Americans do," the House Thursday took the historic step of passing a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution but rejected a controversial proposal that would have made it more difficult for Congress to raise taxes.

The 300-132 vote, which crossed party lines, was met with shouts and applause in the chamber when the eyes topped the 290 needed to amend the Constitution.

"This was a bipartisan effort," House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., said. "It took a long time. But changing America is hard work. It's difficult. But a team came together and it worked for the country."

The amendment, at the heart of the GOP's "Contract With America," now goes to the Senate where it is expected to pass but without lengthy debate. It would then go to the states where three-fourths of the legisla-

tures must approve it before it takes effect.

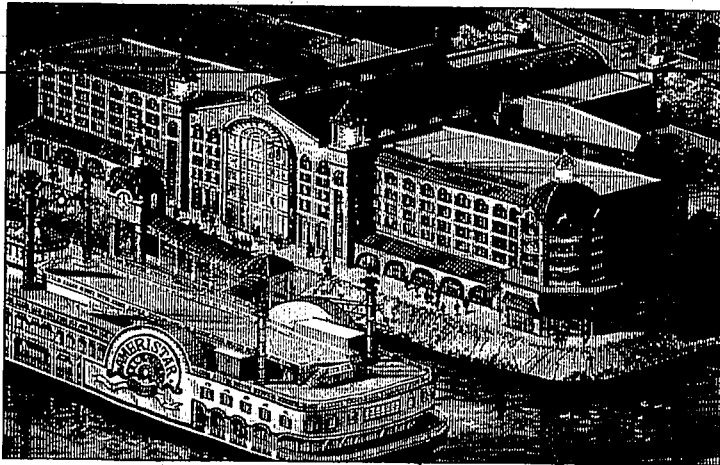
The amendment requires that the federal government by the year 2002 not spend more than it takes in — an even line on the financial ledger that Congress has not passed since 1969. The only exception to a balanced budget would be in time of war or "imminent and serious military threat." It also would prohibit Congress from increasing the limit on the federal debt without approval by three-fifths of both the House and Senate.

Among those voting against the measure,

however, was Rep. Melvin Watt, D-N.C., who warned that, if term limits — another of the GOP's "Contract With America" provisions is enacted — responsibility would be passed to a new set of lawmakers to make the hard choices of cutting programs. This Congress, he said, "won't have to dance to the music."

Earlier in the day, in a significant setback for conservatives, the House turned down a proposal that would require a "supermajority" of at least 60 percent in both houses of Congress to pass tax increases.

Casino firm wins in Iowa

JACKPOT — After a troubled stock-trading year, Ameristar Casinos Inc. Thursday was awarded a riverboat gaming license to construct a \$75 million resort along the Missouri River in Council Bluffs, Iowa.

The "riverboat" casino and resort should help boost the price of Ameristar stock — which has been increasing this month — even though the 1,400-employee resort's opening is probably a year away, Ameristar Chief Financial Officer Tom

Steinbauer said in a telephone interview from the Twin Falls office. "It's started to come back up at the beginning of the year," said Steinbauer, adding that Ameristar stock reached its peak at about 16 1/2 early last year and dropped \$12 to 4 1/2 at the end of 1994. Ameristar first offered its stock to the public in November 1993.

The company's stock finished Thursday at \$6 1/2, and 12,700 shares were traded, which is about average for Ameristar, said Craig Nelson, an investment broker with A.G. Edwards & Sons Inc. of Falls.

Ameristar owns Cactus Pates-Resort-Casino and Horseshoe Hotel & Casino in Jackpot, as well as a "riverboat" casino in Vicksburg, Miss.

Although casinos are considered a growth industry, stock in Ameristar and other small casino companies plummeted

Threat to president leads to charges

SALT LAKE CITY — Federal prosecutors Thursday filed a felony firearms charge against an Indiana fugitive who allegedly had attempted to mail a light-bulb bomb to President Clinton and a gun to convicted mass murderer Charles Manson.

The complaint alleging a "felon in possession of a firearm" charge was read to a shackled David Shane Shelby, 29, during a brief detention hearing in U.S. District Court.

Federal Magistrate Ronald Boyce ordered Shelby held without bail after prosecutors claimed Shelby was a flight risk and threat to public safety. In making his case for detaining Shelby, Assistant U.S. Attorney Paul

Warner noted 10 firearms and explosives material recovered from Shelby's rented truck on Wednesday, and two outstanding federal warrants from Indiana and Louisville — Shelby's hometown.

Shelby is being held in the Salt Lake County Jail. Warner said a grand jury is expected to meet next week to hear evidence on the firearms charge.

Study: Men, women use their brains differently

PHILADELPHIA — Brain researchers at the University of Pennsylvania have uncovered strong evidence of what everybody already knew.

In some important respects, men and women don't think alike. They literally use their brains differently.

A study of brain use patterns in 61 Philadelphia-area subjects reported in the current issue of Science found a biological basis for long-noted behavioral differences between the sexes — differences such as the fact that, for instance, men are far more prone to violence than women, or the fact that women tend to have a harder time with math.

Our findings do not answer the question of whether the differences are genetic or cultural in origin," said Ruben C. Gur, the

20 years of struggle ends for Raymond - the 'Gerber Boy'

NEW YORK — For all his 20 years, Raymond Dunn Jr. couldn't walk or talk — in fact, he could barely breathe. But Raymond could do one thing.

He could make people care. His mother and father dedicated their lives to him. Strangers offered their help and their love. And a big corporation gave him sustenance.

Raymond was known as the "Gerber Boy" because just for him, the company resumed production of a discontinued infant formula — the only food to which the profoundly retarded young man was not allergic.

He died last week in a hospital near his home in the Catskills, ending a life no less valued for all its troubles.

"He fought right up to the end. He wanted so much to stay with us," his mother, Carol Dunn, said Thursday.

"But he suffered all his life, especially at the end. He racked his little body, just trying to breathe."

When he died, the Duns still had a year's supply of a brownish liquid called MBF (for meat-based formula). Gerber stopped making it in 1985, but employee volunteers produced it again five years later after Raymond's doctors said he would die without it.

"Gerber says, 'Babies are our business,' but Raymond's their business, too," said Carol Dunn.

Raymond was born with a broken skull and a brain that had been deprived of oxygen; he was not supposed to live a year. His twisted, cramped body never grew beyond 38 pounds and four feet. He suffered up to two dozen seizures a day, and slept two or three hours a night.

His asthma made each breath a struggle; phlegm plugs repeatedly hospitalized him and threatened to

kill him. He moved only with help, saw only shadows. His expression ranged from a painful grimace to a slight smile. His only sounds were snorts, gurgles, wheezes and an occasional burp.

His biggest problem was his allergy to virtually all food, save MBF. By 1988 Mrs. Dunn had hunted down every can she could find and Gerber had exhausted its backlog. The mother begged Gerber to make more.

Finally, in 1990, the company agreed. Research division volunteers put their own projects on hold, hauled out old equipment and devoted several thousand square feet and several days of production time and space to Raymond's MBF. They even had to go to Washington to get USDA approval for the label.

The batch was meant to last two

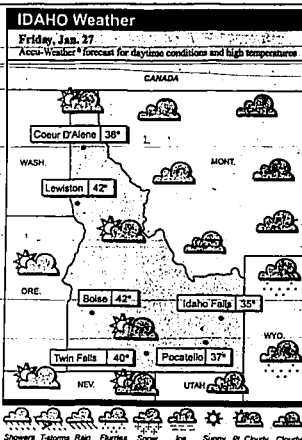

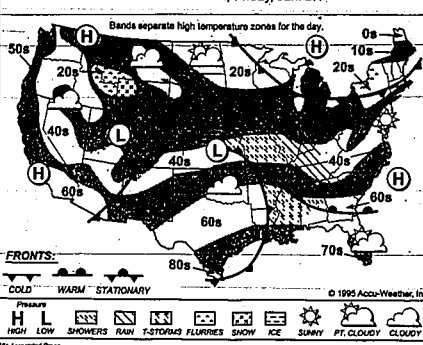
Idaho weather summary

following decisions concerning gambling in various states, Steinbauer said. Early in 1994, for example, the Missouri Supreme Court ruled slot machines illegal, but a November referendum showed voters opposed the decision, he said.

"The whole casino industry in the public sector has taken a beating," said Steinbauer, adding voters in Florida and Arkansas defeated a move to legalize gambling. "If new states don't legalize casinos, there's no growth."

Steinbauer said the company should have in May whether it will receive a riverboat gaming license for Lawrenceburg, Ind. Riverboat gambling will start in Indiana next year, he said.

The Iowa Racing and Gaming Commission also granted Harveys Casino Resorts of Lake Tahoe, Nev., a riverboat gaming license Thursday. Four other companies — including the Omaha Tribal Council — lost the chance to operate floating casinos in Iowa's largest market.

"The success in Council Bluffs is consistent with our objectives of obtaining prime locations in markets

with a significant population base and limited gaming licenses," said Ameristar President Craig H. Neilsen in a news release.

Ameristar's "riverboat" casino will have more than 900 slot machines and 37 table games, and the resort onshore will have two 160-room hotels and various dining and entertainment features, according to the news release. Construction should start next month, Steinbauer said.

Harveys' \$70 million "riverboat" project will have 888 slot machines and 44 gaming tables, as well as a hotel, convention center and sports complex, according to the Associated Press.

The two casinos also will compete with Bluffs Run greyhound track in Council Bluffs, which will have 1,200 slot machines, but Steinbauer said the three are close together and mostly likely will share some customers. There are 1.6 million people living within a 100-mile radius of Council-Bluffs-and-Omaha; Neb., across the river, he said.

"It should be more than enough to support the number of licenses," Steinbauer said.

Penn neuropsychologist who authored the report. "After all, culture shapes the brain just as the brain shapes culture. I can tell you which came first if you can tell me if the chicken came before the egg."

The evidence suggests that, on average, women are more inclined to exercise a portion of the lower brain that helps refine the way emotions are expressed, and are also more likely than men to flex the side of the brain associated with abstract thinking, verbal memory and flexible problem-solving.

Men, on the other hand, think like lizards. Also, they tend to be better at algebra and trig. But let Gur explain: "If you peel off the outer cortex you get to the part of the brain we share with reptiles and beasts of prey, the limbic system. It is made up of several structures, some older and more primitive than others. The most complex portion of the limbic system is the singular gyrus, which is thought to be involved in regulating emotion." The study concludes that women tend to use the singular gyrus more than men do.

Raymond, though, was not his diet but his care.

His mother and a platoon of helpers caressed him almost constantly. They fed him seven times daily and brushed his teeth after each feeding. They spent hours rolling him atop a big medicine ball in an attempt to strengthen his neck enough so he could hold his head up.

Raymond slept in his parents' bed, often between them. He received about a dozen different medications, some several times a day. His mother's calendar had no luncheon dates or hairdresser's appointments; it was devoted entirely to charting the times and dosages of one asthma remedy.

Raymond's death was as hard as his life. Starting Jan. 6, his fragile system slowly gave out. His temperature dropped to 84, then soared above

100. He couldn't keep down food or medicine, and was so congested he had to consume tanks of oxygen. His body swelled as fluids backed up inside.

On the evening of Jan. 17, with his parents and care givers gathered around his bed, Raymond died.

Now, his mother said, she will devote the energy she once put into his care to raise money to build the Raymond Dunn Rainbow House, a facility for "medically fragile, technology dependent children."

When their child was born the Duns were urged to institutionalize him. They were told that keeping him would burn them out, ruin their marriage. But the mother said they had no regrets: "I'm proud he was my son. I'm grateful God gave me that honor. I wouldn't have traded it."

BSU pitches for independent school

BOISE — Boise State University made a final pitch for a school of its own Thursday on the eve of a state Board of Education decision on how to meet the Boise area's growing demand for engineering education.

Boise State President Charles Ruch appeared before the board to again state his university's case for an independent engineering college. The board was scheduled to hear from Gov. Phil Batt early today, then from University of Idaho President Elisabeth Zinser before deciding what to do.

Such told board members creating a free-standing college rather than expanding University of Idaho offerings in Boise would be a better way to respond to the education demands posed most visibly by Micron Technology Inc.

2 dead in North Carolina shooting

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. — A law student opened fire near the University of North Carolina on Thursday, killing a student and a bicyclist and wounding at least two others as he peppered the street with rifle shots, police said.

The man began shooting randomly as he walked along a downtown street around 2 p.m., striking a police officer and a student who escaped unhurt when the bullet ricocheted off his keys.

The gunman was shot in the legs by police, then tackled by a bystander who was shot in the struggle. All three of the wounded were taken to the hospital; none suffered life-threatening injuries, authorities said.

"He looked right at me," Jason Howard, a doctoral candidate in microbiology, said. "I was scared."

Aides deny King affair claims

ATLANTA — Former Kentucky state Sen. Georgia Powers is lying about having an affair with Martin Luther King Jr., two close associates of the slain civil rights leader said Thursday.

"I hope God will forgive her," said the Rev. Hosea Williams, accusing Powers of seeking prestige and money.

Powers' new autobiography, "I Shared the Dream," claims that she and King had an affair for a year before he died in 1968. She says that King was in her room at the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tenn., the night before his assassination.

"I'm willing and ready to stake my life that Ms. Powers is telling a bald-faced lie," Williams said at a news conference.

Teens seek highs from Jimson weed

ATLANTA — Teen-agers seeking a new high are turning to a deadly plant whose first recorded use was by settlers of Jamestown more than 300 years ago.

At least two teens died last year after drinking a poisonous tea made from Jimson weed or eating its seeds, the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported Thursday. The toxic plant causes hallucinations as well as seizures, coma and death. Its popularity varies from year to year.

Jimson weed, also known as thorn apple or angel's trumpet, grows throughout North America and is particularly common in the central United States.

"It reaches a height of 5 feet and has white or violet trumpet-shaped flowers."

Clinton urges educators to back tax plan

WASHINGTON — President Clinton urged prominent educators Thursday to support his proposed broad new tax breaks designed to help parents put their kids through college or enroll them in training programs.

Clinton summoned a group of college and university presidents to the White House to outline his plan — part of his "middle-class bill of rights" — to let families claim a tax deduction for college tuition and make early withdrawals from Individual Retirement Accounts to finance higher education.

The tax breaks, which could reduce government revenues by \$21 billion over five years, are needed to encourage people to obtain the advanced training necessary to offset the steady erosion of wages for unskilled or semiskilled work, the president maintained.

Yet even as the president attempted to drum up support for his higher education initiative, some private economists expressed doubts that the proposals would really save Americans much money.

Although the tuition credit could reduce a family's annual tax bill by as much as \$2,800, analysts said the savings could be offset if colleges see it as an opportunity to raise tuition rates.

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Prosecutors accuse foes of deception, seek delay

LOS ANGELES — Reeling from the late disclosure of more than a dozen defense witnesses and the sudden illness of one of their colleagues, prosecutors in the O.J. Simpson murder case Thursday bitterly accused their opponents of deception and asked for a 30-day delay in the trial to regroup and research the latest developments.

Superior Court Judge Lance A. Ito took the request for a delay under advisement after noting that defense attorneys already have acknowledged they did not disclose the names of some witnesses whose identities and statements they have had for months. Prosecutors said they first learned of some of those witnesses when Simpson lawyer Johnnie L. Cochran Jr. stood before the jury and began his opening statement Wednesday.

State law requires that both sides in a criminal case exchange information about witnesses they intend to summon into court.

Although Ito did not seem inclined to grant the prosecution's request for a long delay, he cancelled Friday's court session and said he hoped to rule on the request for a postponement and other sanctions against the defense by the end of the day.

He ordered both sides to be back in court Monday.

In addition to the delay, prosecutors are asking Ito to instruct the jury to disregard some of Cochran's remarks and to force the defense to push the new witnesses to the end of their case. They also have made the unusual request of being given per-

Dornan held silent after remarks

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of the most combative House Republicans was without floor speaking privileges after charging that President Clinton gave "aid and comfort to the enemy" during the Vietnam War.

Rep. Robert Dornan refused to apologize for the remark — and his House floor speaking privileges were suspended for the day.

Dornan had got into trouble with his House colleagues Wednesday after ridiculing Clinton's State of the Union address.

"I didn't calculate this. It was a response to the president's speech," Dornan said Thursday. The words that offended Dornan's colleagues came during an open period for speeches Wednesday.

"Does Clinton think putting a Medal of Honor winner up there (in the House visitors' gallery) is not going to recall for most of us that he avoided the draft three times and put teen-agers in his place possibly to go to Vietnam?" blasted Dornan, who has been throwing similar verbal bombs at Clinton for two years.

He went on to say that Clinton "gave aid and comfort to the enemy" during the Vietnam War.

Deal could delay gun ban debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Rifle Association struck a deal with House Speaker Newt Gingrich that appears likely to postpone until spring a clash over repealing the new ban on assault-style firearms.

Word of the deal came Thursday as the White House warned anew that President Clinton would veto any measure that repealed the ban on 19 specific weapons and scores of similar firearms that was part of last year's \$30 billion crime bill.

The NRA had been demanding an early vote, and despite fierce lobbying by Gingrich, had lined up several House members to support its effort. Gingrich is on record sup-

porting the repeal, but did not want to hand Clinton a potent political issue so early in the new Republican Congress.

So Gingrich agreed Wednesday night to schedule hearings at which the NRA and other pro-gun groups could air their views, in exchange for a commitment from the NRA that it would hold off on demanding a repeal vote.

Tonya Metaksa, the NRA's chief lobbyist, quoted Gingrich as saying the hearings would "begin in February and would be used as a platform to argue that gun ownership is a constitutional right, not a duck-hunting right," a reference to Clinton's recent hunting foray.

She said Gingrich, R-Ga., also promised a free-standing vote on legislation to repeal the ban "near the end of the consideration of the Contract With America," the House GOP's 100-day agenda.

A senior House leadership aide, speaking on condition of anonymity, offered a consistent description of the agreement with one exception: "I don't think you'll see a vote by 100 days."

Told that, Metaksa said, "If we have hearings and the attention brought to the issue and the commitment of the leadership to a vote, I'm not going to haggle over whether the vote comes in 99 days or 101 days."

AIDS study aims to fight mutant viruses

WASHINGTON (AP) — The best tack to fight AIDS may be to seek ways to increase the sometimes lengthy latent period between infection and development of the actual disease rather than trying to eradicate the virus, a microbiologist contended Thursday.

John Coffin, a Tufts University

microbiologist, said recent studies have demonstrated the extraordinary rapidity at which the HIV virus turns over, with billions of virus-fighting T-cells killed and produced each day in a futile attempt to stop it.

Instead of searching for a drug to wipe out the original virus,

researchers should hunt for compounds to slow the development of the inevitable mutations, Coffin wrote in Friday's issue of the journal Science.

"The real disease caused by HIV occurs during the period when almost nothing seems to be happening," said Coffin.

Balanced-budget amendemnt raises many tough questions

House action on the balanced-budget constitutional amendment reflects a debate that will be repeated across the country. After the House, the Senate must approve the amendment by a two-thirds vote. Then, three-fourths of the state legislatures (38) must ratify it. Here are some questions and answers on the proposed 28th Amendment:

Q. Will the constitutional amendment finally lead to a balanced budget?

A. Not by itself. Constitutional amendments are not self-enforcing. Congress and the president must cut programs, raise taxes, or do both, to actually put the government's books in order. At best, a constitutional amendment provides a powerful moral incentive for lawmakers to act. At worst, it could lead to lawsuits that throw budget questions into the courts.

Q. What about the states? Are they expected to approve the amendment?

A. That's hard to tell. Many governors support it, provided Congress agrees not to pass laws that make the states pay for new programs. But ratification of the amendment will be up to state legislators. They may have second

thoughts if it looks as though aid to states will be cut too deeply. Expect a couple of dozen legislatures to ratify the amendment quickly, but the final few may prove tough.

Q. I've heard it will take \$1.2 trillion in cuts to balance the budget. That sounds like an awful lot of money.

A. It is. But keep in mind a couple of points. First, the "cuts" are really reductions in projected spending increases that would offset inflation and other factors. That doesn't make them any less real, but it does change your perspective. Second, there's a seven-year "grace period" for Congress to balance the books. Cuts or tax increases in any given year would be on the order of hundreds of billions of dollars.

Q. A hundred billion there, a hundred billion there — that's still a lot of money. Would you have to shut down the government for part of the year?

A. No, but you might have to shut down a lot of government programs permanently. The Concord Coalition, a nonpartisan anti-deficit group, has put together a blueprint for balancing the budget. It includes modest defense cuts; reductions in foreign aid; a freeze on domestic programs; reducing Social Security and

Medicare benefits for better-off elderly; raising the retirement age; hiking gasoline, alcohol and tobacco taxes; and limiting the interest deduction for home mortgages.

Q. Ouch! Is there any way to do this without raising taxes or touching Social Security?

A. Yes there is. It would mean 20-40 percent reduction in everything else the government does: building roads, seeking cures for cancer, maintaining national parks, inspecting meat processing plants, chasing dope smugglers...

Q. This really makes me mad. How did the politicians get us into this mess in the first place?

A. They listened to their constituents, who wanted a strong military, generous benefit programs, all sorts of local projects like roads and tunnels — and lower taxes all at the same time.

Q. OK, wise guy, now that I've heard about the pain, what's to be gained from slashing the deficit?

A. You'll be able to take pride in leaving your grandchildren an economically stronger nation. Less federal borrowing today means lower taxes in the future. It also reduces pressure on interest rates, so business can borrow money they need to expand.

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Treaty may allow suspect to go free

Martin Branson — international fugitive, confidence man and multi-millionaire crook — sits today in a prison cell in the tiny European nation of Liechtenstein, where it would seem at first glance that his luck has finally run out.

But the 1936 extradition treaty between Liechtenstein and the United States covers only violent crimes. It has no provision for white-collar crime, and so Branson may be freed again.

"Extradition will be a very difficult process. There will be a lot of problems for the U.S.," said Dr. Benedict Marxer, a judge in the Liechtenstein Court of Justice who is handling Branson's extradition case.

Prosecutors in Maryland want to bring Branson back to the United States to face charges of bilking \$10 million from doctors in a phony insurance scheme.

After more than three years of eluding Interpol and FBI agents, who unsuccessfully chased him through resorts in Mexico and the Cayman Islands, Branson was arrested last week as he crossed the Liechtenstein border in his car from Austria.

Branson, 49, is believed to have been the mastermind behind a Columbia, Md.-based boiler-room operation he started with his brother Leonard and father Norman that offered below-market premium malpractice rates to high-risk doctors.

Yellowstone readies for effects of wolf presence

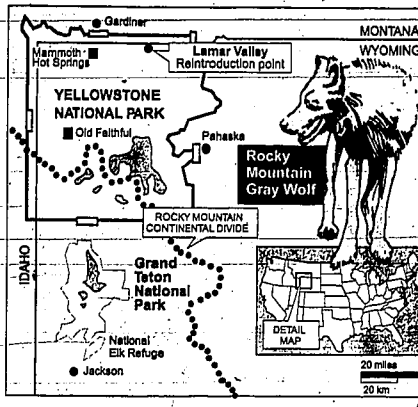
YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — When wolves arrived here, they made a loud splash in the waters of Yellowstone National Park. And anytime something that big falls in a pond, the ripples spread. Eventually, they touch everything.

In nature, science, culture, politics and law, the wolf will impress its presence on almost every aspect of Yellowstone. Perhaps the geysers alone will remain unmoved.

The legal wrangling is not over. The American Farm Bureau vows to fight on in court, and the wolf's future in Yellowstone is not yet assured. It is possible a judge could order the wolves rounded up and destroyed, even after they are released. But for now, the day belongs to the wolf and its friends.

"I don't think I have ever seen the people who work in this park so excited," said park research chief John Varley, a 22-year Yellowstone veteran and a man who has kept wolf posters on his wall for many years. "There's a general level of glee around here I'm not sure I've ever seen."

In a few weeks, the doors will open in the one-acre pens in the Lamar Valley and wolf packs will, for the first time since the Great Depression, run free in Yellowstone, spreading ripples



that cannot yet be measured.

Consider, for example, the tanager, a small migratory bird that eats decaying elk carcasses as it passes through the

park. When packs of wolves again roam Yellowstone, killing and feasting upon the vast elk herds, there will be more carcasses for tanagers.

If that translates into more or healthier tanagers, it could make their vivid lemon and scarlet plumage a more common sight in places as far away as the Costa Rican jungles where they winter.

More carcasses also mean more leavings for park residents like coyotes and ravens and magpies, explained Wayne Brewster, a National Park Service wolf specialist. Then he continued the list of beneficiaries: bugs, magpies, worms and the creatures that eat them.

And the ripples spread. Coyotes, Brewster explained, may scavenge a few handouts from wolf leavings but they should keep their nose in the wind. Cocky, bold and abundant, for now, if coyotes get lazy, they're likely to fill a wolf belly.

Wolves killing coyotes could spread ripples in surprising ways.

With lower coyote numbers in the park, "you're not going to have as many juvenile coyotes migrating out of Yellowstone," Brewster said. That might mean fewer coyotes around the lambing sheds near the park.

And since coyotes — in or out of the park — live mostly on mice, rabbits, voles and other small animals, those populations could see less pressure.

Babbitt backs reintroduction

WASHINGTON (AP) — Yellowstone National Park "needs the wolf" to restore the area's natural balance and reduce growing populations of elk and deer, Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt said Thursday.

"There is room in the West for wolves," Babbitt told the House Resources Committee during a hearing at which he defended the reintroduction of wolves into the park. Many of the lawmakers from states surrounding Yellowstone criticized the wolf program as expensive, an infringement on state's rights and a threat to ranchers.

Rep. Helen Chenoweth, R-Idaho, suggested a better way to cut elk herds would be to allow hunting at Yellowstone. She suggested hunting fees could be used to help pay for park maintenance.

Court upholds VMI plan to school women

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — A federal appeals court Thursday upheld the constitutionality of Virginia Military Institute's plan to set up a military-style program at a private women's college rather than admit women.

But the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said the proposed leadership program for women at Mary Baldwin College must be modified to make it acceptable as an alterna-

tive to admitting women to VMI.

VMI attorneys said the program is designed to achieve for young women the same goals the state-supported school in Lexington achieves for young men. But the Justice Department said the Mary Baldwin program is no match for VMI's military-style training.

The leadership program was proposed to satisfy a ruling that VMI must admit women or go private unless

the state offers training for elsewhere.

VMI and The Citadel in South Carolina are the only all-male state-supported military schools in the nation. At The Citadel, Shannon Faulkner is attending day classes while the school appeals a federal judge's order allowing her into the school's corps of cadets. The 4th Circuit Court is scheduled to hear arguments on that appeal Monday.

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Praise flows for 50 years of fluoride in city water

Fifty years ago this week, public health history was made in Grand Rapids, Mich.

On Jan. 25, 1945, Grand Rapids became the first city in the world to fluoridate its water. In doing so, it launched a program destined to become what dental professionals and others have called one of the most successful public health experiments ever.

"One of the most exciting experiences of my career was observing first-hand the benefits of fluoridation in the people of Grand Rapids," said Dr. David Scott, former director of the National Institute of Dental Research and one of the researchers. The study was sponsored by the Public Health Service, the University of Michigan and the city of Grand Rapids.

Results came early: After 11 years of what was a planned 15-year study of tooth decay among the city's 30,000 schoolchildren, scientists announced that the rate of cavities had plunged by 60 percent.

Subsequent studies have solidly confirmed fluoride's benefits.

From 1971 through the mid-1980s, three national surveys of children's oral health showed a continued decline in cavities attributed to the use of fluoride, according to the dental institute, which is part of the National Institutes of Health.

The most recent survey, taken in 1986-87, found that American children had 36 percent fewer cavities than they did at the beginning of the 1980s, a decline similar to one shown during the 1970s.

Today, half of the children entering first grade have never had a cavity thanks to fluoridation, according to the American Dental Association. Moreover, fluoride also can reduce cavities by 15 percent to 35 percent in adults, the ADA said.

More than 144 million Americans in about 10,500 communities drink

fluoridated water. Put another way, about 70 percent of U.S. cities with populations of more than 100,000 add the mineral to their water, according to the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. About 26 million Americans live in areas without central water systems, such as those who drink water from private wells.

Experts give several reasons why the number of cities participating isn't greater. These include costs and inertia on the part of some local governments — which run the water systems — to make the decision to fluoridate. Perhaps more significantly, there has been a lingering public unease in some quarters about adding anything to the community water supply.

The latter attitude has been fueled over the years by isolated anti-fluoridation drives, where opponents have attacked fluoridation as a Communist plot and a violation of civil liberties, or claimed that the substance promotes everything from cancer, birth defects and sickle cell anemia to heart disease and AIDS. Several studies in recent years have shown no evidence that fluoride poses any health risks.

Despite its critics, the practice has been endorsed by the American Dental Association, the American Medical Association, the World Health Organization, the American Cancer Institute, the CDC and the Public Health Service.

In recent years, fluoride also has been added to toothpaste and mouth rinse. Other sources include drinks made with fluoridated water, fluoride drops or tablets and topical application in the dentist's office.

Cairo station shootout kills 1, hurts 1

CAIRO, Egypt — Police and a suspected Islamic militant exchanged fire Thursday at a crowded train station in southern Egypt. The suspect was killed and a bystander was wounded.

Police officials said Ali Hassan el-Sherif started shooting as police tried to arrest him at the station in Sohag, a provincial capital 240 miles south of Cairo.

In almost daily shootouts, police and Islamic extremists have fought an increasingly violent battle for control in southern Egypt. Fifty-three people have been killed in January alone, compared with 236 in all of 1994.

Haiti appoints new justice minister

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — The government appointed a replacement Thursday for its justice minister, whose resignation raised questions about President Jean-Bertrand Aristide's commitment to democracy.

Ernst Malebranche quit on Tuesday, saying Aristide did not back him up against accusations that he supported the coup that toppled the president in 1991.

Malebranche's departure has fueled concern over whether Aristide will follow through on his promises of pluralism. Such promises persuaded the United States to send soldiers to Haiti in September to restore Aristide to power.

State radio reported that Malebranche, a former capital bar association president, would be replaced by Jean-Joseph Exume, a lawyer, law professor and former secretary of the capital bar association. Exume was legal counsel to the Foreign Ministry in Aristide's short-lived 1991 administration.

Malebranche had been under pressure since his appointment in November. The widespread demand for justice by victims of decades of dictatorship has been frustrated by a corrupt judicial system.

Many Aristide partisans, influenced by a populist philosophy that makes short shrift of procedure, have demanded the revocation of all judges. Malebranche refused to revoke judges whose terms in office are protected by the 1987 constitution.

Anguish marks Auschwitz anniversary

OSWIECIM, Poland (AP) — The voices were full of pain and prayer. There was anger and fear. The children who had lived through starvation, torture, medical experiments and the murder of their parents were grown up, grown old.

"As I walk to the gate, I have the same fear as I had 50 years ago," Elie Wiesel, the Nobel Peace prize winner, said Thursday.

Wiesel, the writer who first used the term Holocaust to describe the Nazi extermination of Jews, headed the U.S. delegation that came to remember the 50th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the gravesite of 1.5 million people.

Tensions between Poles and Jews over the commemorations continued. While some Jewish leaders joined President Lech Walesa's official ceremony to mark the anniversary, others, like Wiesel, snubbed it, saying the program didn't pay enough attention to Jews killed at the death camp.

Wiesel instead went to an observance on the site of the camp's gas chambers. There, gray-haired Jewish men marched through the gates of Birkenau, wearing prayer shawls like those the Nazi guards had stolen

from their fathers and grandfathers.

There was anguish in the voice of cantor Moshe Stern, singing the El Maleh Rachamin — "Oh, Merciful God" — the traditional prayer for the dead.

There was more anguish, for some, at the thought of what that mercy might mean.

"God, merciful God, do not have mercy on murderers of Jewish children," prayed Wiesel. "Do not have mercy on those who created this place. Do not forgive the people who murdered here."

Beside the tumbled concrete blocks of the crematoria, the gas chambers the Nazis had blown up to try to hide their murders, the prayers rang out — in Hebrew, Yiddish, Polish, English and German.

"We do not believe in collective guilt. Only the guilty were guilty," said Wiesel, who spent part of his childhood at Auschwitz.

Originally set up for Poles who resisted the Nazis, Auschwitz-Birkenau killed up to 8,000 people a day in four gas chambers and crematoria before Soviet soldiers stormed the camp on Jan. 27, 1945.

The president of Germany, Roman Herzog, stood silently, pain etching his face, as one Jewish survivor told him that he does not forgive the Germans for what they did, but believes in cooperating with the new generation.

Herzog answered: "I am of the same opinion."

Japan wary at taking foreign aid for quake

TOKYO (AP) — In the nine days since a devastating quake hit Japan's sixth-largest city, offers of help have poured in from around the world.

Do you need some German engineers? Chinese seismologists? A crack Israeli rescue team? Greek trauma surgeons?

To most of the offers, the government hasn't actually said no. It just hasn't said yes.

As of Thursday, the Foreign Ministry said Japan had only accepted offers of assistance from 15 countries. Fifty-seven countries and numerous groups, like the United Nations, have offered aid.

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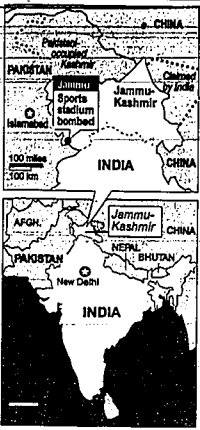

Blast at Kashmir parade kills 7

JAMMU, India (AP) — Three powerful bombs ripped through a celebration at a sports stadium in Kashmir Thursday as the state governor addressed the crowd. Seven people were killed and 47 injured.

The explosions in Jammu, winter capital of Jammu-Kashmir state, took place as Governor K.V. Krishna Rao finished a welcome address and a military parade was about to begin. The first bomb exploded about 60 feet from the reviewing stand where Rao was standing.

Police said Rao was not hurt. No one claimed responsible for the blasts, but Rao blamed the intelligence agencies of Pakistan, India's archenemy.

More than 11,000 people have been killed in five years of fighting between separatist guerrillas and Indian troops in Kashmir, India's only Muslim-majority state. The separatists complain of discrimination by the government of mostly-Hindu India.

Pakistan freezes drug dealers' assets

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — In a new assault on seven of its richest heroin traffickers, Pakistan has frozen \$70 million of their assets, an anti-narcotics official said Thursday.

Last week, the government unveiled a sweeping new narcotics law that permits a drug dealer's assets to be confiscated and imposes the death penalty for trafficking in even small amounts of drugs.

Two of the seven are in Pakistani jails and the others are at large. Four of them also are wanted by the United States on drug-related charges, said Saleem Tariq Lone, a member of a U.S.-funded anti-narcotics task force.

"After the courts are satisfied that the assets are drug assets, they will be forfeited," Lone said. "It will be a big breakthrough."

CAIRO, Egypt — Police and a suspected Islamic militant exchanged fire Thursday at a crowded train station in southern Egypt. The suspect was killed and a bystander was wounded.

Police officials said Ali Hassan el-Sherif started shooting as police tried to arrest him at the station in Sohag, a provincial capital 240 miles south of Cairo.

In almost daily shootouts, police and Islamic extremists have fought an increasingly violent battle for control in southern Egypt. Fifty-three people have been killed in January alone, compared with 236 in all of 1994.

Haiti appoints new justice minister

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — The government appointed a replacement Thursday for its justice minister, whose resignation raised questions about President Jean-Bertrand Aristide's commitment to democracy.

Ernest Malebranche quit on Tuesday, saying Aristide did not back him up against accusations that he supported the coup that toppled the president in 1991.

Malebranche's departure has fueled concern over whether Aristide will follow through on his promises of pluralism. Such promises persuaded the United States to send soldiers to Haiti in September to restore Aristide to power.

State radio reported that Malebranche, a former capital bar association president, would be replaced by Jean-Joseph Exume, a lawyer, law professor and former secretary of the capital bar association. Exume was legal counsel to the Foreign Ministry in Aristide's short-lived 1991 administration.

Malebranche had been under pressure since his appointment in November. The widespread demand for justice by victims of decades of dictatorship has been frustrated by a corrupt judicial system.

Many Aristide partisans, influenced by a populist philosophy that makes short shrift of procedure, have demanded the revocation of all judges. Malebranche refused to revoke judges whose terms in office are protected by the 1987 constitution.

Anguish marks Auschwitz anniversary

OSWIECIM, Poland (AP) — The voices were full of pain and prayer. There was anger and fear. The children who had lived through starvation, torture, medical experiments and the murder of their parents were grown-up, grown-olds.

"As I walk to the gate, I have the same fear as I had 50 years ago," Elie Wiesel, the Nobel Peace prize winner, said Thursday.

Wiesel, the writer who first used the term Holocaust to describe the Nazi extermination of Jews, headed the U.S. delegation that came to remember the 50th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the gravesite of 1.5 million people.

Tensions between Poles and Jews over the commemorations continued. While some Jewish leaders joined President Lech Walesa's official ceremony to mark the anniversary, others, like Wiesel, snubbed it, saying the program didn't pay enough attention to Jews killed at the death camp.

Wiesel instead went to an observance on the site of the camp's gas chambers. There, gray-haired Jewish men marched through the gates of Birkenau, wearing prayer shawls like those the Nazi guards had stolen

from their fathers and grandfathers.

There was anguish in the voice of cantor Moshe Stern, singing the El Maleh Rachamin — "Oh, Merciful God" — the traditional prayer for the dead.

There was more anguish, for some, at the thought of what that mercy might mean.

"God, merciful God, do not have mercy on murderers of Jewish children," prayed Wiesel. "Do not have mercy on those who created this place. Do not forgive the people who murdered here."

Beside the tumbled concrete blocks of the crematoria, the gas chambers the Nazis had blown up to try to hide their murders, the prayers rang out — in Hebrew, Yiddish, Polish, English and German.

"We do not believe in collective guilt. Only the guilty were guilty," said Wiesel, who spent part of his childhood at Auschwitz.

Originally set up for Poles who resisted the Nazis, Auschwitz-Birkenau killed up to 8,000 people a day in four gas chambers and crematoria before Soviet soldiers stormed the camp on Jan. 27, 1945.

The president of Germany, Roman Herzog, stood silently, pain etching his face, as one Jewish survivor told him that he does not forgive the Germans for what they did, but believes in cooperating with the new generation.

Herzog answered: "I am of the same opinion."

Japan wary at taking foreign aid for quake

TOKYO (AP) — In the nine days since a devastating quake hit Japan's sixth-largest city, offers of help have poured in from around the world.

Do you need some German engineers? Chinese seismologists? A crack Israeli rescue team? Greek trauma surgeons?

To most of the offers, the government hasn't actually said no. It just hasn't said yes.

As of Thursday, the Foreign Ministry said Japan had only accepted offers of assistance from 15 countries. Fifty-seven countries and numerous groups, like the United Nations, have offered aid.

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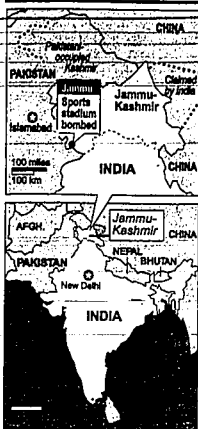

Cassia County moves into future with school proposal

If you're looking for the future of public education in southern Idaho, look no farther than the Cassia County School District's proposal to turn Burley High School into a regional technical center.

It's part of a \$21.9 million bond issue proposal that will go before the county's voters in March. If it passes, the district will build new high schools in Burley and Declo and turn the current 40-year-old high school building into a center for teaching health occupations, construction technology, business occupations and electronics.

The plan recognizes that in order to prepare students for the 21st century, schools must greatly expand their vocational-technical offerings. That's where the jobs are going to be.

Unfortunately, technical education is a hard sell.

A Twin Falls School District plan to build a new high school, including a center for technology instruction, was voted down 2-1 four years ago. Ironically, isn't it, that those are the very skills that will be at a premium if Micron Technology Inc. comes to town?

Ours is a society that's headed for a post-industrial future, in which people who can manage information and adapt to change will draw the biggest paychecks.

But as it stands, American public schools spend \$8 on academic instruction for every \$1 they spend on technical education, according to federal Department of Education. On the high school level, spending for college-track instruction exceeds vocational training by five to one.

That's despite the fact that the fastest-growing occupations in this country don't necessarily require a college degree.

Even here in south-central Idaho, where agriculture and agriculture-related

vice jobs still predominate, technical skills are in great demand.

Rick Parker, director of the College of Southern Idaho's agriculture department, made that point when he described a piece of hardware recently installed by Simplot in its plants.

The machine sorts damaged potatoes, and its operator takes the place of 170 people who used to be paid \$10 an hour to do the same job by hand.

The hard reality is that technology is dividing America's next-generation work force into haves and have-nots. In the future, individual success will have less to do with the quantity of education than with the adequacy of skills relevant to a changing economy.

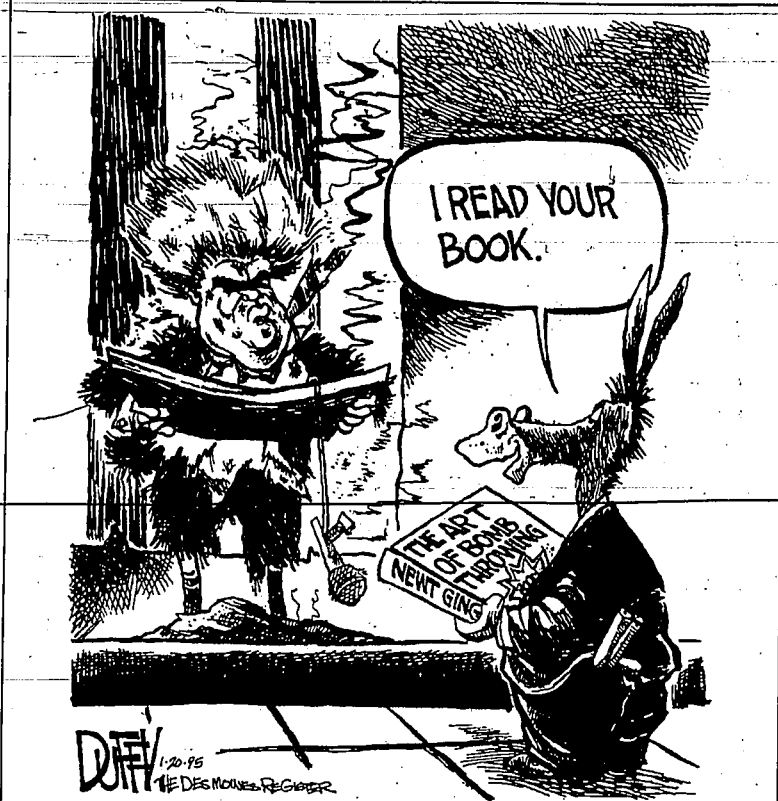
Magic Valley schools aren't doing a good enough job of teaching those skills, a fact that Cassia County School District leaders recognize in their proposal.

It's time that the rest-of-the-valley followed their example.

Whether or not Micron settles in south-central Idaho, the new high school and junior high that are inevitable in Twin Falls' future should include a technical education component, staffed and equipped to teach students to succeed in an economy that will have little use for yesterday's skills.

For smaller schools, there's the option of multi-district partnerships to share enhanced vocational facilities or for attracting private-sector funding to develop technology education. That's exactly what four Murtough High School students did last year, earning a \$10,000 grant from First Interstate Bank for a CD-ROM-generated study of the geology of the Snake River Canyon.

High-tech is expensive, but it's pennies on the dollar against the cost of business as usual in the classroom.



Alzheimer's afflicts even those who 'use it'

There have been lots of articles recently about our aging brains. Experts offer advice on how to keep the mind sharp, but I resent their notion of "use it or lose it." They make it seem we are to blame for mental decay. Sadly, many use and still lose.

Some of the smartest, most active people I've known suffer from Alzheimer's disease. In her 60s, my secretary of many years gave up her beloved typewriter and entered the computer age. In her free time, she audited literature classes, went for walks and sold her art at craft fairs. Yet she descended quickly into dementia and today lies in bed unknown and almost unrecognizable.

In spite of decades of rigorous intellectual exercise, two California Institute of Technology professors are afflicted with Alzheimer's. Many of us know friends and relatives who did everything possible to stay mentally agile, and yet (to alter Hamlet's words) memory no longer holds a seat in their distracted globes.

To lose our memories is to lose ourselves—all those experiences and relationships that make us who we are. Alzheimer's is a thief who grows bolder as the months pass. At first, he pilfers petty names. Names. The right word. Then, slyly, he starts to steal more. The way home. How to do familiar tasks. Ultimately, he plunders identity and, turning from robber to abductor, snatches from the family one of its own.

President Reagan showed courage when he revealed his Alzheimer's. But he errs by calling it "the journey that will lead me into the sunset of my life." His words make it sound like a pleasant twilight stroll. In truth, it's a terrifying plunge into the void of midnight.

Lately, my mother has become confused and can't recall certain things. Does she have Alzheimer's? I'm not sure. Our family can't bear to attach that label to her. But we do know she's beginning to drink from Lethe, that slow and silent stream in Hades.

My mother still remembers that she can't remember. But what will it be like if she forgets that she forgets? What happens when memory is no longer the warder of the brain and even the consciousness of loss vanishes?

For Christmas, I went to my sister's in Montana, as did my mother, Carole, and my father, Joy. The house teemed with kids, cats, goats, geese, parrots, peacocks, rabbits and nine dogs. Although my sister and her husband are used to the tumult, my parents and I were a bit rattled. There were moments when my mother looked lost and dazed. If my father left the room, she immediately asked, "Where is Joy?" She repeated this inquiry so often that eventually it ceased to be a question about my father's whereabouts and became an inquiry into the nature of happiness.

My mother was a high school English teacher who loved her students and her subject. Although she retired some years ago, she continued to study. She belonged to a play-reading group, took French lessons and, at 75, learned how to drive. Now, she is close to 80, and the activity has failed to hold back the darkness.

Mothers and daughters create ways to be close even when apart. My mother and I used

to memorize the same poems. One of the last lyrics we learned by heart was Robert Frost's "The Oven Bird," which ends, "The question that he frames in all but words is what to make of a diminished thing." I never thought the diminished thing would be my mother's memory.

On Christmas afternoon, I sat outside with my mother in the last of the sun. We talk for a while. I recite the first line of "The Oven Bird." My mother seems puzzled. I finish the sonnet. "That's beautiful," she says. "Who wrote it?" "Frost," I tell her. "Yes," she says, "that's why it's getting so cold." Words shift their places and meanings, almost as in a poem, but with a deep sadness running through the lines.

When I return from the holidays, I have terrible dreams. In one, I grab my mother by her thin shoulders and shake her violently, trying to make her head snap into its old orbit. "I know the poems are in there," I shout at her. "I'll force them out."

In the morning, I'm miserable. I want to forget the nightmare, but I can't. I call my mother for reassurance. She recognizes me instantly and there's so much love in the touch of her voice. I frame the question every child needs to ask: "Mama," I say, "you won't ever forget me, will you?"

"Never," she answers, "never." And I believe her because I have to.

Promises to Micron premature

Micron Inc. closed its doors at its \$1.5 billion facility today, just five years after its opening. Micron offi-

cials said the action results from new technology and more competition in China and Japan. Japan, once again, showed us it is on top of the electronics field.

Micron, five years ago, was considered the best investment in the county. Now the devastation is widespread in towns like Twin Falls where, after three years, unexpected layoffs of 2,000 workers had already given the Magic Valley one of the highest unemployment and welfare rates in the country.

An area that three years ago had some of the highest property values now has some of the lowest. Property taxes continue to rise to help fund the growing crime problem and to cover the shortfall from Micron's three-year delinquent tax bill, now in Chapter 11.

The Environmental Protection Agency announced the county will be responsible for all cleanup of chemical and storage ponds. The cost could exceed \$5 million. The good news is the City Council members are offering unprecedented tax, land and water incentives to companies relocating to the Magic Valley to help the unemployed, now exceeding 15,000 in Twin Falls.

County alone, where stores and shops are closing daily. City officials were quoted as saying, "We shouldn't have put all our eggs in one basket." I say it's a little too late here in Micron Falls, Idaho.

Although this is fiction, it is one of many possibilities of failure not considered by our city or our business community. And if you think it's not possible, ask someone from Detroit. I'm really not against Micron, I'm just for Idaho. See you at the employment office.

Plan would allow checks on licensees

BOISE — Fish and Game officers want to have the ability to check with the state Tax Commission if someone applies for a resident hunting or fishing license and the officer has doubts whether the person has legal residence in the state.

But the measure faces a rocky road in the House Revenue and Taxation Committee.

A proposal was approved for introduction Thursday, but several members argued and voted against it.

Lobbyist Russ Westerberg said members of the Conservation Officers Association feel a lot of nonresidents illegally claim Idaho residence when they get license. Nonresident licenses cost much more than resident permits.

"It is not uncommon for nonresidents to use false names and addresses to get a resident license," he said.

Dillon approved for education board

BOISE — The state Senate has unanimously confirmed the newest member of the state Board of Education.

Retired Caldwell physician Thomas Dillon, who has been a member of the school boards in both American Falls and Caldwell, won confirmation only hours before the board opened a crucial two-day meeting on Thursday.

It is expected to decide whether Boise State University or the University of Idaho will control expanded engineering education in Boise.

Senate OKs bill reversing court decision

BOISE — Legislation overturning a state Supreme Court decision that has resulted in the dismissal of scores of drunken driving cases has been approved by the state Senate.

The bill, unanimously forwarded to the House on Thursday, restores the ability of police to charge motorists with both drunken driving and traffic infractions like failure to carry proof of insurance or illegal lane changes.

1st woman judge tries for federal job

BOISE — Fourth District Judge Deborah Bahl, who 12 years ago became Idaho's first female district judge, confirmed Thursday that she has applied for appointment as an Idaho federal judge.

The White House has been fielding applications for the position, which has been vacant for about two years.

Lewiston attorney John Tait was recommended by Rep. Larry LaRocco and nominated by President Clinton, but couldn't win support from Idaho's Republican senators and never went through confirmation hearings.

Late last year, Tait withdrew and the White House announced it would take applications from Idaho.

Pocatello puts school bond issue to vote

POCATELLO — Pocatello and Chubbuck voters will vote May 16 on whether to build two new senior high schools.

Pocatello School Board members voted unanimously Wednesday night to support the recommendation of a citizens committee to build the two schools at a cost of \$38.5 million.

"I really feel it meets the needs of the community, and I feel stronger with this decision given the broad cross-section of the community that served on this committee," board member Glenn McMin said.

Thomas to preside over BYU moot court

PROVO — Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas will preside over the annual J. Reuben Clark Moot Court Competition at Brigham Young University on Feb. 3.

Thomas will direct the proceedings of a five-member panel of legal experts, who will hear arguments by two teams of BYU law students in an appeal of a fictional case, the school announced Thursday.

School budgeting may return to regionalism

BOISE (AP) — Republican Gov. Phil Batt indicated Thursday he won't fight a legislative decision to reclaim the right to decide how much money each university receives in state aid this year.

And Batt speculated that ending state Board of Education control over division of the more than \$160 million a year to the schools could result if lawmakers decide whether the University of Idaho or Boise State University should control expanded engineering education in southwestern Idaho.

"If they get involved heavily in this, they open the door to going back to the way things were, and I'm not opposed



to that," Batt said. "But I don't see that happening. This is probably an ad hoc situation that won't affect the way they do business."

The board currently doles out the legislative allocation based on a formula that recognizes the impact of enrollment increases and other variations among Idaho, Boise State, Idaho State University and Lewis-Clark State College.

Years ago, however, it was the Legislature that made the decision on the amount each school would receive in a heated atmosphere of regionalism.

Batt maintained there were justifications for both approaches. Lawmakers still dole out cash for public works on a project-by-project basis that is often overwhelmed by regionalism. And the tightfisted budget Batt has proposed has lawmakers wondering where the money is going to come from to underwrite their special interests.

Batt made his comments as the board began what many hope will be the final debate on whether the University of

Idaho or Boise State University will control expanded engineering education in southwestern Idaho.

African Technology Inc. has put the pressure on the state to ignore an independent consultant's evaluation that Idaho should continue to control the engineering program in Boise. The company offered the board \$6 million if it sets up an independent engineering program run by Boise State.

At least one board member has called that a bribe, but some southwestern Idaho lawmakers feel that gift would be hard to turn down, especially in an atmosphere of conservative budgeting to free up cash for tax relief.

House panel kills bill to change polling times

BOISE (AP) — Idaho voters are used to the ballot box being open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. on election day, and Rep. John Tippets wants to keep it that way.

The House State Affairs Committee on Thursday voted 11-8 against a bill the Senate had passed unanimously that would have allowed changes in the hours the polls must be open.

A decision to hold a bill indefinitely usually kills it.

"We've retained our people that the polls will be open between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.," Tippets said. "If we change, some of them won't be able to vote."

The Bennington Republican said the state has been making a big effort to

encourage people to vote. "This is a giant step backwards," he said.

Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, sponsored a bill to allow cities under 10,000 to set their own voting hours. The measure also would have allowed small communities to close the polls once every registered voter had cast a ballot.

But opponents noted that under Idaho's new voting laws, people can register the day of the election, which means there's no way of knowing when everyone who wants to vote has done so. Sponsors argued that if people want to vote, it's their responsibility to learn when the polls are open.

Car-inspection bill dies in House committee

BOISE (AP) — People who live outside Ada County but work in the county will not have to have their vehicles inspected for emissions.

The House Transportation Committee on Thursday killed a bill sponsored by Rep. Ken Robinson, D-Boise, which he said would help Boise's air pollution problem. The only committee member supporting the bill was Rep. Rod Fomero, R-Boise.

Boise is under warning from the federal government to cut carbon monoxide pollution from

vehicles or the state could lose hundreds of millions of dollars in federal highway funds.

Most Ada County residents must have their vehicles inspected yearly and adjusted if they put out excessive emissions.

County Commissioner Roger Simmons said the county can't order residents of incorporated communities to take part in the inspections, but every city in the county except Kuna voluntarily complies.

"This program has improved air quality in Ada County," Simmons said.



Have you checked the price of mailing inserts lately?

The 1995 Postal increase took effect January 1, 1995. Third and fourth class mail rates increased 14.3% for every level of saturation and entry destination point. Mailing will pay anywhere from 12¢ to

26.6¢ per piece of third-class mail up to 3.4 ounces. Compare this with insert costs in *The Times-News* as low as 2.8 cents per piece for a single sheet flyer to 4.2 cents per piece for an 8 page tabloid.

Ad Mail: Jewel or Junk?

First Impressions are important

The answer is as varied as the number of people on your mailing list, since no two households receive the same mail every day. Chances are your message is competing for attention with bills, magazines, solicitations, letters from grandma and many other pieces of mail on any given day.

That's stiff competition, especially since most consumers have a built-in bias against any unsolicited sales pitch - what they often refer to as "junk mail." The bias is demonstrated most simply in the regular sorting of a day's mail. Research shows that consumers put bills and personal letters into one pile and magazines into another. Next, they decide what to do with the unsolicited mail, just by examining its appearance. Ad mail that doesn't sufficiently intrigue or satisfy any of the following criteria goes right into the trash without being opened and read:

- Relevance to personal interests
- Recognized as the type of mail recipient usually reads
- Quality of physical appearance of the piece
- Manner in which recipient is addressed, including spelling of name, if personalized
- Identity of the mailer (known vs. unknown organization)

Direct mail has little immediacy in consumers' shopping habits, as demonstrated by a decline in as mail readership. As the following table shows, the identity of the mailer is an important factor in the decision to read or not to read third-class advertising mail immediately.

Return to sender ... PLEASE!

Consumers don't like advertising mail, so they don't respond to much of it. Shared mailers with a detached label card have the worst consumer response of all direct mail types. The USPS study showed consumers responding positively by placing an order, to only 6 percent of these in 1991. Another 73 percent of the shared mail ads were not acted upon by the consumers, and other fell into the "maybe" category (presumably set aside). If the definition of "junk mail" is a good offer mailed to the wrong person, then these numbers indicate that nearly three-quarters of shared mail advertisements are just that - JUNK.

Forty-three percent of households wish they would receive less ad mail, particularly those who receive the most, as shown in the table below.

The newspaper marketplace

Consumers look to newspapers when they're in the market for products and services, whether they're looking for a car, a new coat, a mutual fund or a roast beef. For example, a recent study showed that 67 percent of food shoppers recall newspaper ads while only 26 percent recall direct mail ads. That's because readers like the newspaper's selection, comparative price information, coupons and the chance to read and re-read interesting items.

Grocery circulars and other advertisements delivered via mail usually do not contain related editorial matter, and do not necessarily arrive on the "best shopping day" or in the same package. Unlike newspapers, direct mail is not deliverable on Sundays, when people typically have the most time to read. In fact, much of it is set aside for "later reading," in which many times never happens.

So put your vacation postcards in the mail. But put your advertisements where they will be seen, read, clipped and acted upon - in *The Times-News*.

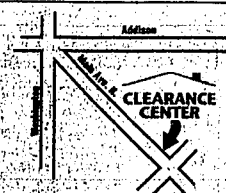

Staffer's troubles hound Anne Fox around Statehouse

State Schools Superintendent Anne C. Fox played hooky Wednesday. She blew off a 9 a.m. appointment with the statewide School Reform Committee whose members had traveled to Boise from the Magic Valley and other far corners of the state. Also snubbed was the House Education Committee.

Later, at 1:30 p.m., she stood up Senate Education Committee Chairman John Hansen, and failed to meet with an out-of-state education leader.

She sent aides in her place, who reported that Fox was out of the office, at home, sick.

False. Fox confirmed Wednesday evening that she had spent the morning and part of the afternoon working in her office, but wasn't feeling well. The rest of the day was spent with an attorney — preparing for a lawsuit against St. Vincent de Paul, a Coeur d'Alene Catholic charity that she wrote a grant request for when she was in the private sector.

The snub wasn't ignored by House Education Committee Chairman Ron Black, R-Twin Falls. "I'm disappointed," Black conceded Thursday.

Fox has been in semi-seclusion for much of this week, since news surfaced that her chief deputy and long-time friend, Terry L. Haws, had quietly settled a drunken-driving charge on Jan. 11, pleading guilty to inattentive driving.

Earlier this month, Fox had to defend Haws against charges that his doctorate from the now-defunct University of Beverly Hills amounted to a mail-order degree. And now she's being asked about Haws' plea bargain, a deal she purportedly didn't discover until early this week.

Fox doesn't appear to be taking it well. At her few public appearances, such as the State Land Board meeting Thursday, she has had to dodge television crews that await her.

The superintendent has had little to say about Haws. Asked Wednesday evening whether she plans to continue his employment, Fox answered "no comment."

Her spokespeople are similarly tight-lipped. Asked if Haws will be still employed next week, when he returns from a Washington, D.C., education conference, a top Fox aide said, "Your guess is as good as mine."

Fox's only comment on Haws' problem has been to call his two-day jail sentence, one year probationary period, and \$351.50 fine a "personal matter."

But it's a personal matter that involves her deeply. Fox has been friends with Haws since she was his teacher at Gonzaga University. Haws was her campaign manager in 1994.

Fox rewarded her longtime friend and supporter with her department's No. 2 job — and a salary topping \$60,000. She allowed him to join her in taking the oath of office before Chief Justice Charles McDevitt and Gov. Phil Batt — the only deputy in the state to receive such an honor.

And earlier this month, Fox was spotted holding hands with her No. 2 man at Batt inauguration activities. They have each other's pictures on their new cherry-wood furniture: Fox and Haws at a wedding, Haws and Fox at another festive social event, plus tiny professional portraits, mounted in the same frame. Fox, for her part, maintains that theirs is simply a professional relationship.

That relationship, however, may make it tough to send Haws packing — no matter how much he damages her politically.

Meanwhile, state Rep. Gayle Ann Wilde, R-McCall, is so frustrated by Fox and the department that she's thinking about asking Batt to intervene.

Batt's keeping as far away from the brouhaha as possible. Will he consider intervention? Says Batt press secretary Amy Kleiner: "There's no way he'll do that."

Teacher gets 10 years in sex case

GOODING — The former Wendell physics teacher convicted in August of having sex with two former students has been sentenced to 10 years in prison.

David Dean Bowen, 38, won't be eligible for parole for seven years, said Gooding County Prosecutor Philip A. Brown.

Bowen had requested probation for 180 days.

The parents of one of the statutory-rape victims testified against Bowen at the sentencing, saying their daughter's dreams had been shattered and that she had gone from being an honor student to getting Cs or lower, according to Brown.

Another victim denied making advances toward Bowen.

Bowen's wife, Connie Bowen, had originally been charged with intimidating one of the victims during her husband's preliminary hearing. The charges were later dropped.

Jim Smith, director of teaching-certification revocation, said Bowen has two weeks to decide whether to appeal the revocation of his license. Bowen resigned in December 1993 from Wendell Junior-Senior High School.

Bowen was originally charged with sexual battery of a 17-year-old Wendell female student after the girl's father had caught the two in a motel room. The girl confessed to having sex with Bowen before she turned 18.

The second girl, a student while Bowen taught at Jerome High School, was 16 when Bowen had sex with her in the summer of 1992.

Chamber shooting investigation stalls

TWIN FALLS — With few clues so far, police say their chances of nabbing the person who shot five bullets into the Chamber of Commerce last week are "slim and none."

"There have been no witnesses that have come forward with information, we just have very little to go on right now," said Officer Steve Benkula of the Twin Falls Police Department.

This week, tests revealed no fingerprints on a note left at a television station the morning of the shooting last Monday, Benkula said. The unsigned, computer-generated note hinted that the shooting was intended as a message against Micron Technology Inc.

Micron, a Boise-based computer chip plant, is looking for a place to build a

\$1.3 billion factory. Some people aren't welcoming the possibility of the plant locating near Twin Falls, fearing the growth it would bring. The chamber of commerce has publically supported bringing Micron to the area.

Though clues are scarce, police haven't given up their investigation of the shooting, in which five rounds crashed through the office window of chamber executive vice-president Kent Just.

A surveillance camera located outside of a bank next door to the chamber office may provide clues, Benkula said. Video footage taken the night of the shooting shows several cars coming and going, he said.

Police will try to expose the nighttime footage to more light so they can see the cars better, Benkula said.

Fake bomb shakes up insurance office

JEROME — A man, apparently distraught over a rejected insurance claim, ignited a fake explosive on a secretary's desk Thursday at the Jerome County Farm Bureau Insurance Co.

"I've been in this business a long time, but this is the first time I've had anybody get this mad," said a shaken secretary, Carolyn Hansen, who didn't know the bomb was a dud.

Police arrested a local tree-trimmer and handyman named Ross Barry Bateman, said Jerome Police Chief James Dahl.

Hansen was sitting at her desk Thursday morning, chatting with insurance agent Carol Cole, when a disheveled man wearing a hat and tattered clothing came into the office with a jar tucked under his arm.

Hansen recognized him: He had been to the office last week demanding the company pay for repairs on his parked truck that had been damaged in a hit-and-run accident.

"He said, 'Ma'am, I believe you owe me \$300,'" Cole said.

"I tried to explain that there was no money because there was no coverage," Hansen said, fighting back tears.

The man, who has just one arm, placed on Hansen's desk a quart-sized jar containing "green fluid"; then he flicked a cigarette lighter, lit a fuse dangling out of the jar's lid and left, Cole said.

As the spark climbed toward the fluid, Cole tried tossing her coffee onto the burning fuse.

"It didn't work," Cole said. She went to the back room, returned with her coffee

free mug filled with water and successfully doused the fuse.

"There was about this much left," Cole said of the fuse, making about an inch of space with her fingers. Cole set the jar outside the front door.

Police and firefighters arrived and cleared the building of smoke.

Tests showed the jar contained tap water and green food dye, and the fuse was a black powder fuse, Dahl said. Bateman will probably be charged today

with aggravated assault, a felony, Dahl said.

"It was just a stupid thing that he did," Dahl said. "If he had made one of those ladies have a heart attack, he could have been up for homicide."

Lance tries to reform The Firm

BOISE — When Idaho Attorney General Alan Lance sings the praises of "unification," he's not referring to a new-age religious movement — or the restoration of a unified Germany.

Lance's unification involves legal services in the Gem State. Currently, Lance oversees a host of deputy attorneys general from his Statehouse office. But other state legal counselors — \$6 million worth — roam free of Lance's office or control.

The Republican attorney general hopes to change that. "Idaho's one of the few states that does not have unified legal services," Lance noted in an interview with *The Times-News* earlier this month.

Currently, the state contracts with outside law firms, running up multi-million-dollar tabs in the process. And these outside legal contracts are proliferating — the cost has soared 324 percent since 1988.

In addition, many agencies have their own private legal deputies, who are technically hired by the attorney general, but serve far from Lance's office, and actually do little if any work for him. Past attorneys general have made their approval of agency deputies a mere formality. Lance sees flaws in that approach.

"Individual department heads might like to have a bevy of lawyers that follow them around," Lance says, but his plan allows for greater flexibility — and cost effectiveness.

Lance says the plan has backing from former Democratic Attorney General Larry EchoHawk and former Republican Attorney General Jim Jones — a Jerome County native.

Jones predicts unification could save the state \$3 million — including money that would otherwise benefit private law firms. Lance also has an ally in Gov. Phil Batt.

"I certainly support the concept — in fact I voted for it at least a couple of times" as a legislator, Batt said.

Batt claims Jones' savings estimate may be "a little optimistic," but adds: "I'm convinced (Lance) can do it in a fashion that can save us a lot of money."

The Lance plan would lead to a massive reorganization of his own office. And instead of making each agency attorney master several areas of law, Lance suggests having civil litigation, contract, administrative law, bankruptcy and criminal divisions within his department.

Then, when an agency head needs a contract drafted, they can get a state-employed contract expert to do the job, Lance says.

In addition, unification would even out the work load. In 1995, a natural resources expert may have far larger workloads, than the typical agency deputy attorney general.

Lance's plan would allow the attorney general to assign attorneys where they're most needed, he says.

"We need to have the flexibility to require attorneys to help out during critical periods. That flexibility is presently denied in the absence of unified legal services," he added.

So far, Lance's plan is receiving general-

ly positive reviews at the Statehouse. Twin Falls State Rep. Mark Stubbs, himself an attorney, says the proposal has merit.

Under the present system, each agency negotiates its own deputy's salary. So salaries vary wildly for attorneys with similar backgrounds, experience, and work loads. Unification would equalize salaries, Stubbs said.

The new system would also allow for unified evaluations — and for better review of state legal work.

Most importantly, it would empower the state's top lawyer. "He's the boss. He's ultimately responsible for everything those deputy attorneys general do, and they should have accountability to him," Stubbs added.

But others, such as Rep. Doug Jones, R-Filer, and Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, want to scrutinize unification proposals carefully before taking a

"Conceptually, I think it's a really good idea," Jones said. But he wants to be sure the governor and the Legislature have independent counsel to protect the constitutional separation of powers.

Jones and Noh both say there may be isolated circumstances where outside counsel can get the job done better — and, cheaper. And some specialized areas of the law may require outside help.

Noh also wants to be certain that unification doesn't disturb the power balance that presently exists. "We'll need to look at them to make sure we're not getting over-centralization of power in one place," Noh added.

But Lance says unification has an "excellent chance of passage" in 1995, and predicts lawmakers will embrace his vision for "good, efficient, and effective legal representation and management."

CSI seeks \$5.65 million

BOISE — College of Southern Idaho President Gerald Meyerhoeffer appeared before a key legislative committee Thursday, and asked it to approve a \$5.65 million CSI budget for fiscal year 1996.

Fighting a flu virus, Meyerhoeffer gave a 30-minute presentation — complete with charts, graphics and 14 pages of numbers — that impressed many members of the Joint Finance and Appropriations Committee.



Meyerhoeffer's request is slightly higher than the \$5.4-million budget Gov. Phil Batt has recommended. Meyerhoeffer wants extra money: \$122,000 for computerize CSI's library-circulation system; \$80,000 to buy computers for the Academic Development Center; and \$43,000 in high-tech equipment for engineering students.

But Meyerhoeffer isn't grumbling about Batt's number. Noting the budget-cutting sentiments in Boise, Meyerhoeffer said "It's a better budget recommendation than most."

"I think the governor believes in what community colleges do, would be my assessment," Meyerhoeffer said after the hearing. In addition, lawmakers "recognize the kind of growth we've had" in the Magic Valley.

Batt's community college budget represents a significant increase. Please see CSI/B2

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Residents suggest renting out jail space

JEROME — Jerome County residents, citing overcrowding at the new Twin Falls jail, made a case for building a larger-than-needed jail and renting out the excess beds to other counties and the state.

At a town meeting Monday evening, several residents spoke against a smaller facility because it would soon be inadequate.

County Commissioner Jerry Ridley said taxpayers in Jerome County pay about \$450,000 annually to support a 38-bed facility. He compared this figure with Cassia County's taxpayer cost of zero to support a 160-bed facility.

Cassia County leases about half of its beds to other counties at \$125 per day.

Magistrate Judge Thomas Borreson, who conducted the meeting, said another juvenile facility spent \$9,500 last month to house four juveniles at the Snake River Juvenile Detention Facility.

Making money from excess jail space sounded like a good idea to most of the 127 people at the meeting. But Dave Bennett, criminal justice consultant hired by the county, cautioned residents about making

decisions on the facility size before the justice policy is refined.

"Jerome County cannot build enough beds to lower the crime rate," he said. "There is no correlation between prison capacity and crime levels. We must first focus on efficiently managing our jail population."

Before we talk about population numbers."

Fifth District Judge Barry Wood agreed. He said that some overcrowding problems could be alleviated by scheduling court dates to reduce pre-trial holding time.

He also said he favors sentences involving "intermediate sanctions" in place of some or all of the offenders' jail time.

Bennett said that the scope of the new jail project will be determined after the current justice system is running as efficiently as possible.

Ridley, Borreson, Bennett and Wood served on a panel along with

Judge Jack Varin and Jim Spalding, director of the Idaho Department of Corrections — all supported the need for a new facility.

"When our facilities reach capacity, we violate court orders. We are forced to open temporary facilities with inadequate security or release prisoners early," Spalding said.

The Snake River Juvenile Detention Facility, which serves several counties, has only 12 beds, Judge Varin said. The number of juvenile offenders constantly exceeds twelve and alternatives are necessary.

"Currently, we have as well as youth in motels here in Jerome," Varin said. "On top of that, several times each week the 'least risk' offenders are released because of overcrowding. These are people that would be kept in the facility if there was room."

Sheriff George Silver said that the county spends about \$34,000 each month on juvenile justice.

Jim Cobble, superintendent of Jerome schools, said he is frustrated by the level of juvenile crime in the area. If more money were spent in the classrooms, perhaps costs for juvenile justice would decrease, he said.

TWIN FALLS — A woman and her passenger were seriously injured Wednesday morning when their car crashed into a semi-truck on U.S. Highway 93.

Twin Falls County Sheriff Deputy Anthony Barnhart declined to release the names of the two women, saying their injuries were so severe that he didn't want to name them without first notifying the families.

Nor would Barnhart release the name of the truck driver, who was not injured.

According to an accident report by Barnhart, an 18-year-old Twin Falls woman, who was southbound on U.S. 93, tried to pass a semi-truck that was turning left, and collided with it, the report said.

Her 47-year-old passenger also was injured, the report said.

The truck was driven by an 18-year-old Buhl man, the report said. The accident occurred at 8:16 a.m.

Picabo residents win Cattlemen's award

NASHVILLE — Bud and Ruth Purdy of Picabo

have won the Environmental Stewardship Award from the National Cattlemen's Association.

The national award, presented Wednesday night, recognizes cattlemen whose efforts benefit the environment and the productivity and profitability of their ranch.

The Purdys specialize in water conservation and water quality. They have installed more than 30 pipeline systems stretching for more than 20 miles and use low-pressure irrigation sprinkler systems to conserve energy.

The couple also has fenced off 40 percent of the stream bank along Silver Creek, which runs through their ranch, to protect fish and wildlife habitat.

They signed an agreement this month with The Nature Conservancy guaranteeing the ranch will never be developed and the blue-ribbon trout stream will be protected.

The panel of judges included representatives from The Nature Conservancy, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Friends recall maverick writer

Fisher's wrong-headed genius

TWIN FALLS — Fortified at a Gooding County roadside, Vardis Fisher was fond of coming to call on Drich Bowler at unusual hours.

"Didn't matter if it was the middle of the night," Bowler told a College of Southern Idaho audience Thursday. "He always had an opinion, and he'd show up and start fighting about it."

"Because I was a liberal guess he saw me as a natural antagonist," said Bowler, who owns the Snake River Pottery in Bliss. "So whenever we'd get together, we'd fight."

Some of Fisher's friends — and, yes, Bowler counted himself as one — and the novelist's biographer got together to talk about the legacy of a writer they portrayed as a tough, ornery visionary who was one of the truest voices of the real West.

It was the first installment in a four-lecture series marking the centennial of Fisher's birth, part of the CSI Honors Program's annual Snake River Symposium.

Before Fisher's self-inflicted death in 1968, folklorist Louie Attebery said, his friend laid the

philosophical basis for later writers who would develop the hard, clear-eyed school of Western writing that dominates regional literature today.

"Fisher believed very strongly that the West was a better place than the literary East he so despised and wor-

thy of its own literature," said Attebery, a professor of English at Albion College of Idaho.

It's a literature that, like Fisher's temperament, has all the subtlety of a rock slide.

"Fisher was a fearless archconservative, and to my mind, a prophet without honor in his own country," said Robert Bailey Sr., retired publisher of the Buhl Herald.

Fisher had come to the Magic Valley in 1940, but his roots were in the dusty, hardscrabble hills of Eastern Idaho, where he was born the son of second-generation Mormon pioneers.

Before he moved to a homestead

outside Hagerman, Fisher's literary reputation and risen and fallen, based on a series of novels written about growing up in the Snake River Canyon east of Idaho Falls.

"If you ask how Fisher stands in literature, the answer is that he stands pretty tall," Attebery said.

Fisher, his friends said, was the genuine article. He even took Bowler and another pal to task when they were helping him pour concrete because they weren't working as hard as Fisher.

"You know, the first time my wife and I went to his house, he shook her hand, looked her in the eye, and said, 'You have no malice in your soul,'" Attebery said. "I thought it was odd at the time, but of course he was right. It was very much like Vardis to be able to make that kind of judgment about people."

Fisher was an atheist, a Mormon-baiter and a scourge of politicians, but at heart a sentimentalist, Attebery said.

"The fact of the matter is that there is more literature about the West and more Westerners are writing than ever before," he said. "And I think, in part, we owe that to Fisher."

sents a 10 percent increase over this year's budget.

CSI officials estimate enrollment this fall will rise to 2,874 full-time students — 77 students more than in 1994. And they say much of that 10 percent increase will go to provide services to a fast-growing student population. Currently, 12 percent of all adults in the Magic Valley take credit or non-credit courses from CSI.

Meyerhoffer said plans are proceeding for a satellite hookup between the Twin Falls campus and Idaho State University in Pocatello. Three new staff positions are also planned: two new science professionals and one English instructor

will likely be hired, Meyerhoffer added.

House Education Committee Chairman Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, said it's too early to tell if CSI will get its full budget request. But he praised Bart's budget, saying "The governor was really very generous to community colleges" — especially relative to state colleges and universities.

While CSI enjoys double-digit increases, schools such as Boise State University will see their operations budget rise by 2 percent, Black added.

State Sen. Joyce McRoberts, R-Twin Falls, praised Meyerhoffer's presentation and said he's highly respected by JFAC members. But

she predicted his request for extra funding is likely to fail.

Lawmakers are holding the line on spending McRoberts noted. "We're trying to save money for property-tax relief," she explained.

Clerk fired for selling alcohol to minors

Commissioners discuss common solutions to juvenile justice woes

BURLEY — One convenience store clerk has been fired and at least two others have been suspended for selling alcohol to minors.

At the request of Cassia County Prosecuting Attorney Stephen Bywater, the sheriff's department conducted an investigation and citations were issued to clerks in four stores, Lt. Alan Smith said.

He confirmed that clerks were fired at United Oil, Quik Pik, Get It N'Go and Circle K stores.

United Oil reported that it has fired its clerk. Get It N'Go and Quik Pik management couldn't be reached for comment Thursday. Circle K suspended two clerks without pay, and they will be fired if convicted, said manager Rhonda Andrews.

"She called the sting operation entrapment."

"I don't think it's right to use a minor. That's entrapment. The law is the law," Andrews said.

The sheriff's department sent a minor to buy alcohol on Jan. 6 and Jan. 19, and her clerks weren't cited until Jan. 23, Andrews said. The minors should be cited as well as clerks, she added.

Usually, Andrews said, officers return into the store immediately after the alcohol is sold.

"The girls still don't know what incident it was. They didn't know they had committed a crime," Andrews said.

During weeks before the sting operation, officers had been pulling customers over across from the store to check identification. She said that is a better way to solve the problem.

Since the citations, Andrews has hung a sign in her store that reads, "Even if you're 103, we need to see your I.D."

RUPERT — County commissioners from Minidoka and Cassia counties got together this week to discuss problems, to which they hope to find common answers.

Minidoka County Magistrate Judge Larry Duff told commissioners that more of the services provided for juvenile offenders may be turned over to the counties. Services such as individual or family therapy, the Idaho Youth Ranch and Youth Services Center, substance abuse and sex offender treatment groups are now provided by Health and Welfare, or are contracted by it to provide the services.

Services provided in the county include:

- Diversion for young, first-time offenders.
- Juvenile petition for more serious offenses or repeat offenders.
- Admit or deny hearing, reading of rights and the juvenile's opportunity to admit or deny allegations.

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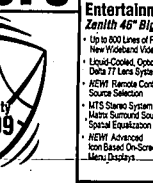
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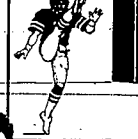

Faith in doctor was bad choice for patient

DEAR ABBY: Thank you for furthering the education of your readers regarding the necessity of breast self-examinations.

I am 37 years old, with no history of breast cancer.

Upon feeling a lump in my breast a year and a half ago, I went to my OB/GYN doctor. She felt the lump and said, "Don't worry. It's nothing."

I trusted her judgment and ignored the lump for eight months, until I started to feel a dull pain in that area. I went to my family doctor who said, "It's probably nothing, but I'm ordering a mammogram just to be safe."

The mammogram showed a definite growth, which unfortunately turned out to be cancer.

Since then, I have undergone chemotherapy and have just started radiation therapy. I have learned that many other women have not been given mammograms, or otherwise had their

lumps examined via needle aspiration.

Abby, please let your readers know that sometimes they have to take their health needs into their own hands, and ask — no, demand — mammograms when a lump is discovered. A misdiagnosis can easily mean the difference between life and death.

Now, I regret relying on my first doctor's diagnosis. Sometimes when a doctor says, "Don't worry — it's nothing," we are so relieved, we forget that doctors are human and make mistakes. Mine did — and time will tell if her misdiagnosis has meant the difference between life and death for me.

DEAR LEARNED: Thank you for sharing your experience in order to help other women. Your case clearly illustrates the importance of a second opinion. Patients should never hesitate to confirm a diagnosis, especially one where high risks are involved. Please write again.

Meanwhile, you are in my prayers.

DEAR ABBY: My daughter, "Sarah," is a part of a circle of friends — male and female — who have remained close friends all through school and even after college.

"John," a very handsome member of the group, became engaged to a woman who had not been a part of the original group.

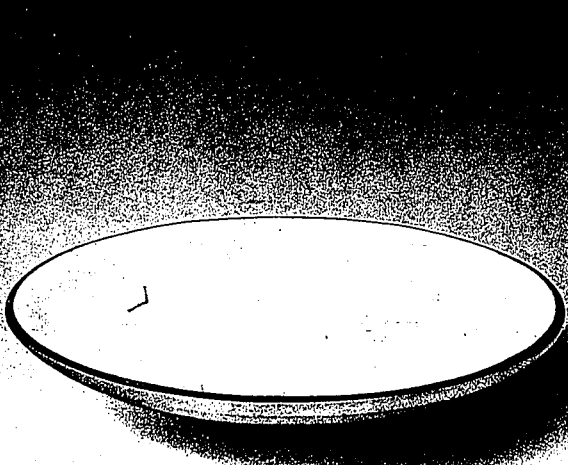

Reds' tryout camp becomes field of dreams

PLANT CITY, Fla. (AP) — The hopefuls and the could-have-beens showed up Thursday at a Cincinnati Reds tryout camp with dreams of joining the replacement players who may play in place of striking big-leaguers.

Reggie Jefferson, a former Reds first baseman now with the Seattle Mariners, left his winter home in Tallahassee, Fla., to come to the Reds' camp — as a chauffeur for his brother.

"I usually get the fever right about the time the Super Bowl rolls around," Jefferson said. "Unfortunately, it's a different feeling this year. It's my brother's turn."

Jefferson and his brother, Shon, 21, drove 3½ hours Wednesday night to be at Plant City Stadium in time for the tryout camp, which runs through Sunday.

Shon Jefferson was one of about 175 players between the ages of 18 and 40 who arrived at 9 a.m. to find the complex's five fields draped in

frost due to unseasonable Florida temperatures in the mid-30s.

Reds scouting director Julian Mock is supervising the camp, along with scouts and minor-league coaches and managers. Mock said any players that may be signed are likely to start at the lowest levels of the minors.

"It's a dream for these guys," Mock said. "There's definitely more stars in their eyes this year."

Major League Baseball plans to open spring training Feb. 16 with replacement squads primarily composed of journeyman minor leaguers and former major leaguers.

"We've been running this camp for more than 20 years, but it's just getting a lot more attention this year," Mock said. "We usually sign one or two guys every year and start them in Class A ball."

Most players showed up in full uniform, any-

thing ranging from minor-league garb to the beer leagues.

A handful, however, showed up wearing blue jeans and sneakers. None was turned away.

"We're prepared to stay here all day and night if we have to," Mock said. "No matter how long it takes, we will do it."

Patrick Murphy, from Cincinnati, was among those who showed up. The pitcher was released by the Houston Astros' organization after the 1993 season. He has since played recreational baseball, graduated from the University of Cincinnati and worked as a special education teacher at Sycamore High School in suburban Cincinnati.

Murphy, who considers himself a power pitcher, still recalls the Astros' letter that informed him of his release.

"I got the old, 'There comes a time in life when...' letter. I didn't even finish reading it," he said.

Channel brings more golf to couch potatoes

If Mark Twain considered golf "a good walk spoiled," what would he have thought of the Golf Channel? It could have killed him, although he'd have been 159 years old.

Yet, here it is, the brainchild of golfing legend Arnold Palmer and Joseph E. Gibbs, a cable TV and cellular phone entrepreneur from Birmingham, Ala. A premium cable station also available via satellite, the Golf Channel began operation last week, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Nothing but golf.

"Back in '91, we saw the capacity opening up — 150 to 300 channels," said Gibbs, president of the Golf Channel. "Now, the question was: What do people want that they aren't getting already?"

Gibbs commissioned the Gallup poll people to find out, and the answer came back: more golf.

"We're just trying to satisfy that demand," he said.

With headquarters in Orlando, Fla., the Golf Channel will build its schedule around weekly tournaments from one of a number of sources, including the Nike tour, various foreign tours, the PGA and select PGA Tour events currently untelevised anywhere else.

Some seniors tournaments could also be in the Golf Channel's future, but rights to those currently are held by ESPN.

"The entire spectrum of golf on TV now is basically tournaments," Gibbs said. "Well, that's not all there is to golf. There's etiquette, instruction, a whole golf culture out there."

A typical day of the Golf Channel will be instruction and news in the early morning, a European tour event in late morning, a show called "Golf Talk" or features at midday, a domestic tournament in the afternoon, followed by more instruction, profiles, "Golf Center" news, then replay the whole works over again.

On non-tournament days early in the week, the Golf Channel will show highlights of great tournaments of the past.

"We have a phrase we've coined," Gibbs said. "We're not just the Golf Channel. We're golf's channel."

"If we're not part of the fabric of the sports, we'll fail," said network executive vice president Gary Stevenson, a former PGA Tour caddy.

So, don't expect any wise-cracking announcers or silly golf skits. This is golf for the serious golfer.

"Golf is not just a sport. It's a lifestyle," Stevenson said. "People view it very seriously. Of course, we need to laugh, and, yes, we need to laugh at ourselves sometimes — but not if it hurts the game of golf."

"Remember," Gibbs said, "the whole idea comes from Arnold Palmer."

OUT TAKES: If the NFL felt the same way about Fox owner Rupert

Murdoch as golf world does, the network would still be televising "Gumbo" on Sunday afternoons.

"The last thing golf needs is to have Rupert Murdoch in any position of power," Jerry Tarde writes in the February issue of Golf Digest. "... And the mere mention of his name in connection with golf brings back memories of Mussolini in the Holy City."

Fox's involvement in Greg Norman's proposed World Tour apparently is only after the fact, but it still has golf's inner circle worried.

In the same issue of the maga-

zine, former U.S. Golf Association executive director Frank Hannigan writes: "I can't think of Murdoch without recalling his citation by a former Murdoch employee — the late Dennis Potter, a brilliant English playwright and critic who was on the staff of The London Times when it was taken over by Murdoch."

Rookie All-Star gets to top of the NBA Hill

NEW YORK (AP) — Detroit's Grant Hill has done something that no player in NBA history has done — become the first rookie to lead the fan balloting for the All-Star Game.

In final balloting released today, the NBA said that Hill, the third rookie chosen in last year's draft, had received 1,289,585 votes. The previous best showings among rookies were third-place finishes by Magic Johnson in 1980 and Isiah Thomas in 1982.

Joining Hill, a forward, in the Eastern Conference starting lineup will be forward Scottie Pippen of Chicago, center Shaquille O'Neal of Orlando and guards Anfernee Hardaway of Orlando and Reggie Miller of Indiana.

Voted to the starting lineup for the Western Conference team were forwards Charles Barkley of Phoenix and Shawn Kemp of Seattle, center Hakeem Olajuwon of Houston and guards Latrell Sprewell of Golden State and Dan Majerle of Phoenix.

The game will be played Feb. 12 in the America West Arena at Phoenix. The East leads the series 28-16, including a 127-118 victory last year at Minneapolis, where Pippen was the most valuable player after collecting a game-high 29 points and grabbing 11 rebounds.

In leading the balloting, Hill edged O'Neal by 26,134 votes. The Magic center, the league's leading scorer, received 1,263,451 votes, making the All-Star team for a third consecutive year.

New York's Patrick Ewing was a distant second among East centers with 728,331 votes.

Pippen, now a five-time All-Star including four in a row, was the East's No. 2 forward in the balloting with 1,134,525 votes. Charlotte's Larry Johnson was third with 698,331.

Among the East guards, Hardaway will be appearing in his first All-Star game and Miller, his second, his first since 1990. Hardaway received 999,327 votes and Miller got 908,493, with Cleveland's injured Mark Price third with 854,771. Miller is the first Pacers player ever to start in an NBA All-Star game.

In the West, Olajuwon, selected to the All-Star team for the 10th time in 11 years, was the leading vote-getter with 1,263,451. San Antonio's David Robinson was the runner-up at center with 1,046,364 votes — also the second-highest total in the conference.

Barkley, the 1991 All-Star MVP, will be making his ninth appearance in the game. He led the West forwards with 1,046,105 votes. Kemp, who will be playing in his third All-Star game, was a close second among the West forwards with 1,027,451 votes.

Third was Dallas' Jamal Mashburn with 742,815 votes.

Majerle, who does not start for Phoenix, led the West guards with 868,115 votes. This will be his third All-Star game. He and Barkley will be the second group of teammates to start in an All-Star game on their home court in three years. Utah's Karl Malone and John Stockton started at Salt Lake City in 1993.

Sprewell, in his second All-Star game, was second among the West guards with 861,223 votes, edging his Golden State teammate Tim Hardaway (853,784) for the starting spot.

Orlando's Brian Hill will coach the East team and Phoenix's Paul Westphal or Utah's Jerry Sloan will coach the West.

The head coaches in each conference will vote for the remaining seven members on each team. The reserves will be announced Tuesday.

It's hard to be perfect in NCAA

No team has gone unbeaten in a college basketball season since Indiana in 1976. In the intervening two decades, only three schools have managed to avoid losing during the regular season.

It's a task considered impossible in this day of made-for-TV matchups and super conferences. With six weeks left until March Madness comes along, only Connecticut has a chance to finish unbeaten.

And the second-ranked Huskies (15-0) start a rough road toward that end on Saturday with a game against Kansas (14-2).

"This is a terrific, jermic start because the kids have maximized themselves in what they have done," Connecticut coach Jim Calhoun said Thursday. "I couldn't be more happy with a group of kids. I don't know if any team has played together as well as they have."

Even after a schedule which includes wins over Duke, Georgetown, Syracuse, Villanova and Illinois, the real test begins Saturday in Kansas City, Mo.

"To win the Big East is an incredibly tough chore, and there are still 10 games left," Calhoun said. "This is a good reference point. You have to beat somebody of Kansas' caliber if you want to get where you want to if you do make the NCAA tournament."

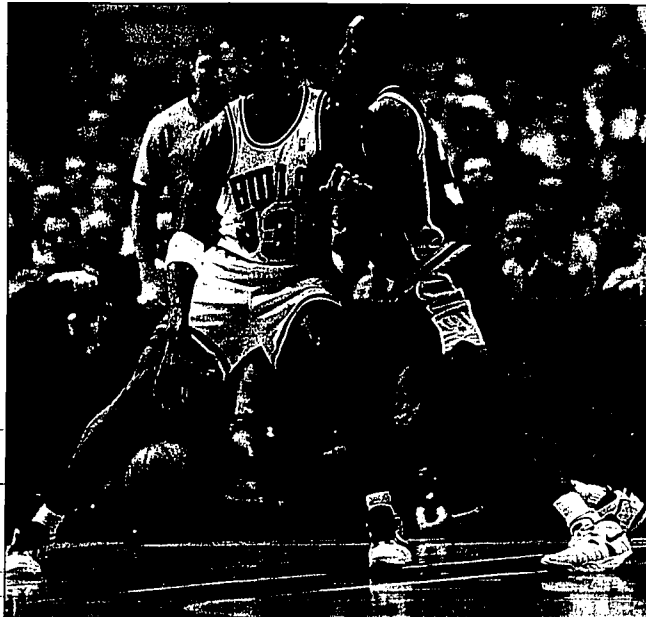
Calhoun's realism about how tough the Huskies' schedule is answers any questions about the team being affected by the possible distraction of trying to go undefeated.

"It would be a distraction at 0-15," he said. "We try to win every game, and I don't really subscribe to the theory about losing one now for later. Frankly, in our league and with our schedule, that will take care of itself anyway."

The last team to go unbeaten in the regular season was UNLV, which went 34-0 in 1990-91 as it tried to defend its national championship before losing to Duke in the semifinals. Before that, there was Larry Bird's Indiana State team, 33-0 when it lost to Michigan State in the national championship game; and Alcorn State, which was 28-0 when it lost in the NIT. Both went that far in 1978-79.

Over the past five years, except for UNLV's repeat run, this has been the time of the season when the last of the unbeaten tasted defeat.

Last season, UCLA lost on Jan. 30 at 14-0. In 1992-93, Virginia was 11-0 when it lost on Jan. 20.

League fines, suspends Pippen for his chair-throwing incident

CHICAGO (AP) — Scottie Pippen, the disgruntled star of the Chicago Bulls, drew a one-game suspension and \$6,000 fine from the league Thursday for his chair-throwing tantrum earlier in the week.

As a result of the suspension, Pippen will miss Thursday night's game at Orlando and the \$26,000 salary he makes per game.

Pippen was disciplined for an angry outburst during the second quarter of the Bulls' game against San Antonio on Tuesday night. Slapped with a technical by referee Joe Crawford after he complained about the lack of a three-second call against the Spurs, Pippen then became irate over the technical and was ejected.

Before leaving the court, he threw a chair.

"When you throw a chair onto the middle of the floor, that's very serious," said NBA vice president-operations Rod Thorn, who determined the penalties. "They were in the process of putting stuff on the floor (for a timeout promotion.) There were little kids nearby."

Thorn said Pippen also failed

to leave the court in a timely manner after being tossed. The ejection carries an additional \$1,000 fine.

Pippen, who refused comment Tuesday and avoided reporters Wednesday, was not immediately available for comment Thursday, a day on which he was voted an All-Star starter by fans.

He has struggled to handle the leadership role he assumed after Michael Jordan's retirement in October 1993, feuding openly with team manager.

Since Nov. 12, Pippen has picked up 12 technical fouls and been ejected twice; he's accused Bulls general manager Jerry Krause of being a "liar," asked

to be traded and described his relationship with Krause as "beyond hate."

Unhappy with a contract that pays him less than several players on the team, he's also criticized management for letting forward Horace Grant leave as a free agent and not doing enough to bring in good players to make the Bulls a contender.

The Bulls have struggled and were 20-20 before Thursday night's game. They've beaten many of the good teams in the league and lost to some of the lesser ones.

Pippen, regarded by many as the best all-around player in the game, has led the team in nearly every statistical category.

But his problems and stormy episodes go back to last season when he refused to enter Game 3 of the Eastern Conference semifinals against the Knicks when a play was called for Toni Kukoc and not Pippen in the final 1.8 seconds. Kukoc then hit a game-winning shot.

Last season, Pippen was arrested for having a handgun in his vehicle. He also has accused Chicago fans of booing only black players.

Magic Valley Arts Council keeps wheels of culture turning

TWIN FALLS — "Magic Valley Arts Council, may I help you?"

Fran Frost and Karen Fothergill answer the phone like that all day long. It rings a lot.

Ever since the local arts council was reorganized eight years ago, it's been playing catch-up to keep pace with community growth.

"There is a lot of opportunity (in the arts) for a community this size," said Fothergill, who, with Frost, is part-time co-coordinator of the Magic Valley Arts Council. "As the city grows, the arts groups grow."

With two staff members, an active board of directors and new offices in the Justamere Inn behind the courthouse, the Magic Valley Arts Council has come of age.

It all began in 1979, when the council was first incorporated. Off and on through the years, area arts organizations attempted to use the council to enhance their cooperative efforts. But the council didn't start looking like a permanent

fixture until 1988. By then, local arts supporters Marty Mead and Shawna Fuller had put together a council board, with Al Frost as president. Gary Babel, Donna Brize, RoseMarie Doerr and Homer Pringle signed up to serve.

They asked for a grant from the Idaho Commission on the Arts and received \$3,300 in "general operating support."

The council was a go.

Today, it's involved in everything from arts advocacy to arts in education to sponsoring projects such as the Foreign Film Festival, the Hispanic Heritage Festival and KIDS 'ART in the Park. The group also coordinates visual arts displays at the Twin Falls airport and at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, and it publishes a newsletter called Artscape and an artists' directory. It has a telephone information "Art-line" (733-1000, Ext. ARTS), and it works with a summer intern to address the needs of the literary arts.

On May 9, 1994, the Twin Falls City Council designated the Magic Valley Arts Council as the official local arts agency in Twin Falls.

Cooperating arts groups include the CSI drama and music departments and Herrett Museum, Dilettantes, JUMP Co.,

Travis hits the road once again

It had been so long since Randy Travis had been on stage, the man who virtually invented the New Traditionalist movement in country wondered if he'd ever be on one again.

"It did cross my mind when we decided to tour again," Travis says in his honeyed drawl over the phone from Nashville, Tenn. "I didn't know if anybody out there wanted to come — or if I can even do this again."

A two-year break came after eight years of hard work and constant touring that made him the biggest,

Nashville notes

and one of the first, names in "new country." He also became the benchmark for new-country radio formats, whose oldies go back only as far as Travis' first 1986 album, ignoring any previous country history, including such pioneers as Merle Travis (who gave the former Randy Bruce Traywick his name).

Travis defined the first half of his career with a pair of greatest-hits albums in 1992 — in the kind of simultaneous release previously tried only by Guns N' Roses and Bruce Springsteen.

Since then, he has tried his hand at movie roles, where his honest-aw-shucks approach was as well-received in Hollywood as it was in Nashville. His first new album since the greatest-hits records came in a soundtrack for a TV film, "Wind in the Wire."

There were more movie roles. Among them, "Touched by an Angel," a TV film broadcast on Christmas Day; a cameo in "Maverick," a two-night miniseries based on the James Michener novel "Texas"; and a third film, "Frank and Jesse," that was shot with theatrical release in mind, but which may end up having its premiere on HBO.

JACKPOT — Kathie Baillie, fresh off the road from a recent concert tour, is ready to do a phone interview about her upcoming gig at Cactus Petes. But first she has to find her 6-year-old daughter's hermit crab.

Baillie, of Baillie and the Boys, runs a family operation — at home and on the road. She and the other half of her act, husband Michael Bonagura, met on a blind date and started working together in 1973. They were married in 1977.

Magichords, Magic Valley Choral, Magic Valley Community Concerts, Magic Valley Symphony, Magic Valley Little Theater, Idaho Writers League, Sun Valley Center for the Arts, Arts on Tour, Art Guild of Magic Valley, Twin Falls Music Club, Larson Arts and Top Hat Tappers, among others.

Structurally speaking, the council is accountable to the Boise-based ICA at state level and to the Washington, D.C.-based National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) at national level. Arts for Idaho is the lobbying agency.

The ICA receives half of its money from the NEA and then passes funds along to local councils. Each year, the pie is cut into more pieces, explained Ruth Turner, current president of the Magic Valley Arts Council. For 1995, the Magic Valley council received only \$2,922. The rest of its funding must be raised through local membership fees and a developmental campaign.

"We are always thinking about how we can make the business community understand the arts are an economic engine for bringing people in and are good for the economy," Turner said.

Then there is the problem of NEA funding. For years, the NEA has been engulfed in controversy.

"Unfortunately, the things the NEA

has funded that are objectionable are what you hear about," Turner said, "even though over 100,000 people, only 40 have been controversial."

There is some speculation that the new Republican Congress might ax the group altogether. So the Magic Valley Arts Council, along with other groups across the state, has been gathering pro-arts signatures on petitions to send to Idaho representatives.

Because the council doesn't have funding from corporations, the money the ICA receives from the NEA is critical to bringing concerts and artists to the community, council members say.

ICA Executive Director Margot Knight agreed.

"We had fewer than seven arts councils in Idaho in the middle '80s," she said. "Now we have more than 40 — and federal money means access to the arts, particularly in a rural state like Idaho." Knight characterized the Magic Valley Arts Council

as an "excellent working board."

Council members plan to continue working just as hard in the future.

To further promote arts in the Magic Valley, Turner envisions a larger council office building, with classrooms and art displays. Maybe an amphitheater someday, and a community arts center.

The group is already involved in the development of Old Town and in planning the first-ever Festival of the Falls, a city-wide arts festival.

Frequently, Frost and Emmerich add new pages to their council scrapbook. When they do, they sometimes stop and read thank-you notes they have received — like the ones sent in by elementary school students after an Elements performance of the Landis Theater of Magic.

"It was the best ever in the whole world."

"Thank you for performing. It was rad."

"I wish I could do the magic that they did."

New generations. New dreams for the arts.

But the co-coordinators of the Magic Valley Arts Council never have much time to stop and ponder their thank-you notes. Usually, it's just a few minutes until the phone rings again.

a Taiwanese airline, Jia-Chien can't wait to get out of her father's house. The youngest, 20-year-old Jia-Ning (Yu-Wen Wang), is so caught up in her boy-craziness that she barely seems to notice the others.

Though the father and his daughters share the same house, their paths seldom cross except on Sunday, when Chu whips up a feast for their weekly family gathering. But as Chu brings out one miraculous dish after another, the daughters nip-tick and make faces about the food. They also use this moment to make what they refer to as their "little announcements," the first of which is Jia-Chien's bombshell that she is moving into an apartment of her own.

Though the story line is complicated, Lee maintains a poised, directional hand. The lives of all the characters here are in a state of profound flux. Jia-Jen has developed a secret crush on her school's new volleyball coach, and Jia-Ning has scooped up a girlfriend's discarded bag. At the same time, Jia-Chien discovers that she is the leading candidate for a promotion that would take her to the firm's

Amsterdam office, a situation made even more perplexing by her attraction to a charming associate from America.

Providing a background for these romantic upheavals are old Chu and his love affair with food. Other films

"Tampopo," "Babette's Feast,"

"Like Water for Chocolate" — have

used food as a sensual metaphor, and "Eat Drink Man Woman" follows gloriously in that tradition, stimulating your mind, your emotions and your gastric juices all at once. For Chu, food is a means of expression, not only of his creativity but also of the feelings of love and affection that he can't otherwise articulate. Food is his way of reaching out, of connecting.

As the relationships evolve and deepen, there seems to be a surprise around every corner — for both the characters and the audience. But what is most surprising, perhaps, is how involved we become with these people. As satisfying as food can be,

the fullness we feel at the end here is far richer and more complex than that offered by the most extravagant meal. "Eat Drink Man Woman" is a delicacy but also something more — something like food for the heart.

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'Killing Zoe' reaches video shelves

"Killing Zoe" (R). Seuzzy, bloody-and-cholesterol-nihilistic "Killing Zoe" is the latest in boba brutality: Written and directed by Roger Avary, the film is a virulent fandango that depicts crime as a form of haute decadence — as if it were what fashion models do on their days off.

Set in the bowels of Paris among a demimonde of hipster toughs, this fashionably empty movie plays like a distillation of marijuana smoke and Peckinpah movies. Its hero is a safecracker named Zed (Eric Stoltz) who arrives in the City of Light looking jet-lagged and unwashed, which, as it turns out, is pretty much how he always looks.

Where Zed has come from we never know, but in the cab on the way to his hotel his driver fixes him up with a "wife for the night." As a rule, Zed avoids regular girls, preferring instead the "honesty and sincerity" of prostitutes. But as Zoe (Julie Delpy) quickly informs him, she is not really a whore but an art student trying to make a little money on the side.

Whichever the case, Zed and the ethereal, gum-smacking Zoe quickly get down to business, and for some reason — maybe it was the glow of F.W. Murnau's "Nosferatu" from the TV set — the sex is almost good enough for the pair to begin picking out china patterns.

The romance is short-lived; though, when the love nest is disrupted the next morning by Eric (Jean-Hugues Anglade), Zed's misogynistic partner in crime, who promptly tosses the bare-broomed Zoe into the hall.

The title here is somewhat misleading, given that the only

Twin Falls vet writes 'Becoming Your Dog's Best Friend'

TWIN FALLS — Marty Becker wants you to get along with your dog.

Sound, pretty simple? You might be surprised.

"Three out of four dogs that are adopted from animal shelters are eventually removed from the home because of behavioral problems," said Becker, a 40-year-old Twin Falls veterinarian whose new book, "Becoming Your Dog's Best Friend," was released in Twin Falls this month. "And most of those dogs end up right back in the pound and are killed."

The reason, Becker says, is lack of knowledge.

"There are a few simple techniques for training a dog that will eliminate most of the problems," he said. "If dog owners would learn them, it would eliminate the biggest threat to dogs. Most of the infectious diseases that affect dogs are well under control; most dogs die because they lose their homes."

Becker, who has written other animal-care books and is much in demand as a speaker at veterinary conventions, covers everything from housebreaking to making the decision about when it's time to have an old dog euthanized. But the most important step comes when it's time to choose the animal, he said.

"The characteristics of different breeds vary a lot," he said. "If you get a dalmatian, for example, you need to know that you're going to spend a lot on veterinary bills. If you get a cocker spaniel, you should know that they're aggressive."

A big part of that decision, he added, is where you live.

"Many people in this part of the country want a big dog, but not every big dog is appropriate for where you live," he said. "Some dogs need to run, but that's not to say you can't live in town and have a healthy golden retriever."

Becker said one of the purposes of the book was to get current and prospective dog owners to ask questions and to get their dogs trained.

"There is all kinds of information available if you know where to ask," he said. "Animal shelters, veterinarians. CSI even offers classes on dog training."

Another purpose of the book is to get dog owners to look beyond the characteristics they initially find appealing, he said.

"People will go look at a litter of puppies and pick the one that runs up to them or the one that hangs back," Becker said. "What you're

really looking for is the golden mean."

"Purebred dogs are more likely to have predictable physical problems than crossbreeds," he said. "That doesn't mean a crossbreed is better, but it does mean you should be prepared for that fact."

They should also be ready for the cost, Becker added.

"A healthy dog is going to cost you, as an average, about \$300 a year," he said.

Most of the reasons that dogs get their walking papers, Becker said, are easily preventable. An animal can be quickly trained to urinate and defecate outside, or not to chew on clothing, books and housewares.

"The worst part is when people give up dogs because their situation changes," he said. "Say they move into a bigger house and they don't want their new furnishings chewed up, so the dog goes back to the animal shelter."

As a veterinarian, Becker said he'd prefer to see more dog owners who knew something about dogs before they get one. As an animal lover, he'd like to see more selective dog ownership.

"Getting a dog is making a commitment to the life and well-being of the animal," he said. "That's something you need to think about."

A new Dr. Seuss pulled out of the hat

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'Murder in the First': Hard time

WASHINGTON — "Murder in the First" is a painfully predictable, earnestly acted indictment of the American justice system of the late '30s. Though based on a true story, this grueling drama is peopled by characters that have been fictionalized into big-house clichés.

There's an unjustly imprisoned youth (Kevin Bacon), an unspeakably sadistic warden (Gary Oldman), an idealistic public defender (Christian Slater) and even a crusty old judge (F. Lee Ermy).

Based on newspaper articles, newsreel footage and court files, the film opens with a jaunty Movietone report from Alcatraz, where prison guards have foiled an

escape attempt. The purported leader, Henry Young (Bacon), is thrown bleeding and naked into an unheated stone dungeon without a window, toilet, sink or bed. Seawater seeps into the moldy, coffinlike room, where he remains for more than three years.

The warden allows Henry to leave his solitary cell for only one half-hour of exercise per year. And in a particularly harrowing scene, he taunts and tortures Henry with a sharp and gleaming straight razor.

With only spiders and rats for company, Henry becomes increasingly withdrawn and is virtually insane when removed from his cell. Within hours, Henry murders the man he believes responsible for his ordeal.

Two hundred inmates and several guards witness the murder, and the catatonic Henry seems destined for the gas chamber. Then his case falls into the hands of James Staphill (Slater). A composite of the two real-life lawyers who represented Henry, James turns against his fiancée, his firm and his own family to save his client and expose the horrors of Alcatraz. The friendship that develops between the privileged Harvard graduate and the scarred, crippled prisoner comes as a relief, but ultimately it is more pathetic than uplifting.

The real Henry Young was a bank robber, who nonetheless

was in no way deserving of the cruel and unusual punishment that was meted out to him.

The film's fictional Henry is more sympathetic: An orphan, he stole \$5 from a grocery to feed his little sister.

Because the store also housed the post office, the crime was tried in a federal court and poor Henry was sent to Alcatraz.

Director Marc Rocco, whose first film was 1992's "Where the Day Takes You," tries to enliven the jailhouse scenes with artsy photographic gimmickry that detracts from the performances of Slater and Bacon.

The two leads are acting their little tails off; it's not their fault they are playing men so impossibly good that Albert Schweitzer suffers by comparison.

"Murder in the First" is rated R for nudity, profanity, sexual situations and violence. (Mall Cinema)

The Sundance Festival: Blockbusters threaten independent tradition

PARK CITY, Utah (AP) — Twenty-years-after revolutionizing the Hollywood studio system, the blockbuster mentality is causing widespread upheaval in the independent film world.

A recent string of unparalleled independent hits — "The Piano," "The Crying Game," "Four Weddings and a Funeral" and "Pulp Fiction" — has rewritten the box-office rules for art-house films.

Once considered a good bet with \$1 million in potential ticket sales, smaller films are now being left in the cold at this mountain resort town. The president of a leading independent company was even fired earlier this month because his critically acclaimed releases weren't raking in enough millions.

The usually hectic dealmaking at this week's Sundance Film Festival, the nation's top showcase for the best movies made without studio money, has been oddly quiet. Six titles (including "Hoop Dreams" and "Clerks") were bought for theatrical distribution at last year's Sundance festival. Halfway through the 1995 gathering, no deals had been consummated and only three movies were attracting even mild buy-out interest.

Strangely enough, the timidity has been sparked by the runaway successes of other independent films: Since a handful of these nonstudio movies grossed more than \$50 million in domestic theaters, the box-office threshold for independent films has changed.

Independent films never were supposed to be blockbusters. Now they are.

"The budgets are higher, the (marketing costs) are higher and the pressure to perform is higher," says Raul Julia, whose Gramercy Pictures released 1994's "Four Weddings and a Funeral." "We are in the same hit-driven business that the studios are."

Tom DiCillo, the director of the Sundance comedy "Living in Oblivion," says the popularity of Quentin Tarantino's "Pulp Fiction" has ruined the market for offbeat

independent filmmakers such as Jim Jarmusch ("Stranger Than Paradise").

"You have with Quentin Tarantino a wildly popular art film," DiCillo says. "That's now the comparison: an art director who can have a commercial smash."

Spiegelberg's "Pulp," which made \$260 million in U.S. theaters after its 1975 release, taught the Hollywood studios that a single film could yield as much profit as the rest of the year's entire slate. Soon thereafter, the studios committed huge sums to commercially calculated, audience-pleasing fare. In the independent market a few years ago, a movie that made \$10 million was called a smash. These days, that same film might be called break-even.

Says Geoffrey Gilmore, the Sundance festival's programming director: "It's the miniblockbuster kind of thing, where it seems very clearly the distributor is not happy with a \$1 million or \$2 million gross anymore."

"Public Access," a small drama that won Sundance's top prize two years ago and has limited audience appeal, still has not been released.

Another perfect Sundance example is the English drama "Priest," due to be released by Miramax Films in April. The forceful movie by director Antonia Bird, one of the best-received at the festival, follows a Catholic priest struggling with his faith, his sexuality and his Liverpool congregation.

The target of a spirited bidding war at last year's Toronto film festival, "Priest" was acquired by Miramax for more than \$2.5 million — a staggering sum for such a relatively small film. Factoring marketing costs, "Priest" must now make about \$10 million to yield a penny of profits.

Yet another 'Highlander' materializes

"Highlander: The Final Dimension" — Christopher Lambert returns as the superpower of the title, with New York City his destination in this installment of the supernatural adventure series. Mario Van Peebles plays his nemesis, the vicious Kane, who has disguised himself as a magician to use his megapowers to kill Highlander once and for all. Andy Morahan directs. (Twin Cinema)

"Disclosure" — Adapted from Michael Crichton's novel about sexual harassment in the workplace, this exceptional potboiler offers few surprises, not in Barry Levinson's direction nor in the acting of Demi Moore and Michael Douglas as predatory female boss and vulnerable male employee. (R, for a very strong sex scene, sexual dialogue and other strong language). (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley)

"Dumb and Dumber" — Jim Carrey and Jeff Daniels star as a pair of low-voltage buddies. The film abounds in potty jokes and gross-out gags, but the real joke is that grown men are actually doing this stuff. (PG-13, for off-color humor. Times guidelines: lots of bathroom humor scenes.) (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Gooding Cinema, Liberty Theatre of Halley)

"Par From Home: The Adventures of a Yellow Dog" — Despite the singular subtitle billing for the dog, it's his young master who actually pulls off most of the derring-do in this backwoods survival saga; think Timmy with a load of merd badges. It's beautifully photographed, but kids weaned on talking animals may find the realism a little slow, and even parents more appreciative of the grit might wish the promised adventure had been just slightly pumped up. (PG, for perious adventure.) (Twin Cinema)

"Higher Learning" — With more on its mind than any other year's worth of standard films, John Singleton's latest work is set on a mythical college campus and deals with racism, date rape, sexual experimentation, and neo-Nazis among other topics. Presenting problems is not the same as dramatizing them effectively, something "Boyz n the Hood's" Singleton has not quite accomplished here. (R, scenes of violence and sexuality, and for strong language.) (Twin Cinema)

"Houseguest" — Rowdy, amiable fish-out-of-water comedy starring Sinbad as an inner-city black man on the lam who lands in an upper-middle-class white suburban household. With Phil Hartman, Jeffrey Jones, Kim Greist. (PG, for language, double entendre and some comic violence.) (Twin Cinema)

"H.Q." — This overly contrived romantic comedy has one good idea: to cast Walter Matthau as Albert Einstein. But the outlandish and often appallingly underhanded contortions he and some genius pals go through to play cupid to Einstein's pretty niece (Meg Ryan) and a likable auto mechanic (Tim Robbins) are frequently uninspired and unfunny. (PG, for some mild language.) (Century Cinema of Burley)

"Rudyard Kipling's The Jungle Book" — Hollywood's third pass on the adventures of Mowgli (Jason Scott Lee) is an old-fashioned family entertainment filtered through more recent action flicks — gunplay and fireballs — and vehicular peril abound. Director-writer Stephen Sommers uses scores of animal "performers," stunning locations and special effects to create an opulent adventure yarn. (PG, for action scenes and some mild language.) (Twin Cinema, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum, Ace Theatre of Wendell)

"Legends of the Fall" — Having much in common with the version of Edna Ferber's "Giant" than the Jim Harrison novella it is nominally

adapted from, this is highly romanticized, old-fashioned sentimental filmmaking of a large white house, a few awful. Starring Brad Pitt in a glamorous star turn as one of three brothers in love with the same woman, well played by Julia Ormond, this lumbering epic makes an easy target, but director Edward Zwick has infused it with so much glossy watchability it is difficult to pull the trigger. (R, for violence and some sexuality and language.) (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

"The Lion King" — The sidetracked show in this animated extravaganza from Disney. A worthy successor to "Beauty and the Beast" and "Aladdin," but without as much magic. (G, on-screen death of Lion King's father and final violent battle may disturb little ones.) (Burley Theatre)

"Little Women" — Director Gillian Armstrong brings to vibrant life Louisa May Alcott's 1868 classic novel of female solidarity in a handsome production that combines immediacy and accessibility with an impeccable sense of period. A wonderful, superbly acted entertainment, perfect for the holidays, featuring an ensemble cast headed by Winona Ryder, Gabriel Byrne, and Susan Sarandon. (PG, for two uses of mild language.) (Twin Cinema, Ace Theatre of Wendell)

"Neil" — A young woman (Jodie Foster) is found in a remote North Carolina cabin, speaking her own language and a total mystery to a pair of doctors with competing philosophies (Liam Neeson and Natasha Richardson) who try to figure out what is to be done with her. The creators of this hokey film have a similar difficulty trying to figure out what to do with Foster's remarkable performance, the only valid thing on screen. (PG-13, for nudity.) (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Liberty Theatre of Halley)

"Stargate" — Kurt Russell and James Spader star in this slinky, cheesy-but-fairly-enjoyable sci-fi actioner about a time portal to a faraway galaxy that colonized ancient Egypt. Jaye Davidson steals the show as a fey, hemaphroditic sun god Ra. (PG-13, for sex-fil action violence.) (Jerome Cinema)

"Street Fighter" — Action screenwriter Stephen E. de Souza's directorial debut verges on incoherent. In this movie based on a video game — a sure sign of a withered imagination — Jean-Claude Van Damme stars as the leader of a rainbow-coalition insurrection against the "dangerous and unpredictable warlord" Bison (Raul Julia, in his last theatrical release). Willfully written, broadly acted and slapped together with a decided lack of technical proficiency. (PG-13, for violence and riotous martial arts action.) (Jerome Cinema)

"The Swan Princess" — Determined old-fashioned in its visual design, Richard Rich's animated musical retelling of the German fairy tale about a princess turned into a swan has its charm. Featuring the voices of Jack Palance, Howard McGillin, Andy Duncan, John Cleese and Steven Wright. (G.) (Twin Cinema)

"Tales from the Crypt Presents Demon Knight" — Based on the screenplay alone, this is strictly a direct-to-video affair; with "Tales From the Crypt" tickled to the title, the budget expands to accommodate state-of-the-art special effects — most of them featuring dismemberment, of course. Billy Zane, William Sadler and Jada Pinkett star in this uninviting yarn about a charismatic devil battling a guy-over-a-mystic-key that will allow demons to overrun the planet. (R, for gore, horror violence, sexuality and language.) (Twin Cinema, Gooding Cinema)

'My So-Called Life' fights for survival

LOS ANGELES — Bess Armstrong, who plays the mom in the ABC series "My So-Called Life," watched last summer's premiere with her nieces. They were spellbound.

"When it was over, the 11-year-olds got up and moved out into the moonlight and turned and said, 'What's Jordan Catalano's real name?'" Armstrong recalled over drinks after another day of "Life," saving attempts. "I knew right there what the real power of the show was."

She was joking about the show's appeal, kind of.

Yes, kids across the country have connected with Jordan — "Life's" resident brooding hunk, whose real name, by the way, is Jared Leto — and are also seeing themselves in Angela, Rayanne, Rickie, Brian, Sharon and Danielle.

Almost a million girls between 12 and 17 — 10 percent of the show's viewers — watch weekly. Add the

nearly 400,000 teen boys who tune in, and it's the 34th most-popular TV series (out of 114) with that age group, a respectable showing.

But Armstrong knows there's more to "Life" than teen-age concerns, and she's frustrated that the show's grown-up appeal. Among network TV's crucial "demographic" — ages 18 to 49 — "Life" has been a flop, ranking 109th. Its overall ranking is 103rd.

Because of that relatively tiny adult audience, Thursday night's episode is the last of the season, maybe the last ever. The irony is that these days, on most networks, under most circumstances, there wouldn't be any maybe about it.

But because it's been hailed by critics and revered by the Internet's I-have-no-life-but-Life squad, and because ABC as the top-rated network has some breathing room, the show is putting up a fight for survival that hasn't been seen on TV in years.

At this month's West Coast gath-

ering of TV critics to preview new shows, ABC Entertainment president Ted Hartung was caught so off-guard by a deluge of questions about the future of "My So-Called Life" that he scheduled an impromptu interview session with its stars and producers.

"Hearing about how it's a show for teen-agers, probably the most frustrated people up here are me and Tom (Irwin, the actor who plays her husband)," Armstrong said during the session. "Because we know that we're playing two of the most interesting and dented and tightly wrapped, leaking, middle-aged people on TV. We're playing very real people."

Armstrong is among those who blames the 8 p.m. time slot (7 p.m. Central time) and tough Thursday-night competition from NBC ("Mad About You" and "Friends") for "Life's" rough going.

"I know that anyone of our generation who has found the show has become passionate about it," Armstrong said later that day. "The

difficulty is when the show comes on. I'm putting children to bed. And I know that most people are, or they're returning phone messages or they're getting home from work."

Hartung agrees but isn't sure he can do anything about it. The same overall success that allowed ABC to stick with a low-rated series for 19 weeks also means that later time slots are scarce.

The hit "NYPD Blue" and three newsmagazines occupy 10 p.m. slots, and Steven Bochco's new "Murder One" is in the pipeline for fall. It's no easier at 9, with such successful sitcoms as "Home Improvement" and "Roseanne" in the way. And Saturdays, Sundays and Mondays are taken up with movies during most of those hours.

Of course, there are a few limited possibilities. But ABC would have to move "Life" into a slot occupied by a more successful program — a la CBS' risky shift of "Chicago Hope" into "Northern Exposure's" 10 p.m. Monday time period.

Crash Test Dummies have a bang-up year

For the record, Crash Test Dummies' leader Brad Roberts answers questions with more than a "Mmm Mmm Mmm Mmm."

But one query he can't answer is how the Dummies, whose 1991 debut album, "The Ghosts That Haunt Me," qualify for a Best New Artist nomination for this year's Grammy Awards.

"Maybe new to the Top 100 would be a more accurate description of the category," says Roberts, 31. Green Day, another nominee in the category, also has previous records to its credit; Grammy organizers have not explained why these bands are eligible.

"We're new to Americans, not so new to Canadians, I guess," says Roberts, whose Winnipeg-based quintet was also nominated for two other Grammys. "People

expect us to be insulted, but I don't mind at all. It's just an industry event; one takes all these things with a grain of salt."

"To be totally honest — and I know I sound like I'm being coy — I really don't expect to win; we're up against stiff competition in all of the categories."

Win or not, the Grammy nominations cap an exceptional year for the Dummies thanks to the smash "Mmm Mmm Mmm Mmm XTC," a sprightly remake of XTC's "The Ballad of Peter Pumpkinhead" for the "Dumb and Dumber" soundtrack and sales of 1.5 million copies of its second album, "God Shuffled His Feet."

Now the group is setting its sights on its third effort, though Roberts — who doesn't write much while on tour — says he doesn't yet have an idea of which direction they'll go.

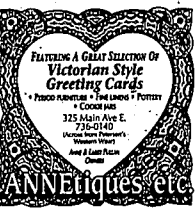
PASADENA, Calif. — Was there a power failure in Pasadena Saturday night?

All of which was a surprise because, when the tour started last May, the band appeared intent on demonstrating that it was indeed back in business after its sometimes bitter 14-year

break. Then, the playing was spirited and the music optimistic.

On Saturday, however, the band, appeared a bit weary with the old tunes. Things didn't catch fire until the second half when the quintet focused in key moments on post-Eagles material, notably Henley's.

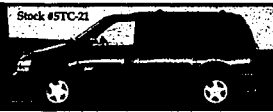

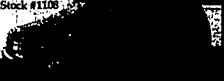

Alternative rockers help bring back vinyl

On its new album, the rock band Pearl Jam urges its fans to "spin the black circle."

It may sound like a satanic ritual, but singer Eddie Vedder is actually celebrating something most parents of Pearl Jam fans can relate to. Remember records?

Vinyl records, which all but disappeared in the lightning-fast transition to compact discs in the late 1980s, are suddenly hip again.

Records never truly went away, particularly in the rap and dance music communities where turntables are a tool of a disc jockey's art. But a resurgence in vinyl has been led by alternative rockers, whose very name betrays a desire for something different.

Vedder sings lovingly, on the song "Spin the Black Circle," of the simple act of pulling a record from its sleeve. The rock band Venera Salt also celebrates records with the song "Victoria" on its debut album.

Pearl Jam made vinyl copies of its new album available in November two weeks before the compact disc went on sale. Approximately 65,000 of the 2.7-million copies of "Vitalogy" sold so far were on record, according to Soundscan.

"We want all of our records to be

available on vinyl," Pearl Jam bass player Jeff Ament recently told Billboard. "Years ago, when the record companies decided that they were going to go with the CD format and phase out vinyl, there were a lot of people that listened to records that were unfairly taken out of the loop. I was one of those people."

The gimmick of releasing albums on vinyl before compact disc, which precedes Pearl Jam, now threatens to become a full-blown trend: New albums by Siouxsie and the Banshees and the band Cake will be among the vinyl-first new releases this year, according to Ken Barnes, managing editor of Ice, an industry newsletter.

The blip in popularity is borne out by statistics. Record companies shipped out 900,000 copies of vinyl albums during the first six months of 1994, compared to 500,000 for the same period a year earlier, according to the Recording Industry Association of America.

Vinyl junkies say the often intricate album artwork that was an important part of the record-buying experience lost its impact on a tiny CD case. Some record store owners prefer displaying albums.

Many turntable owners also insist the sound quality of records is better than CDs.

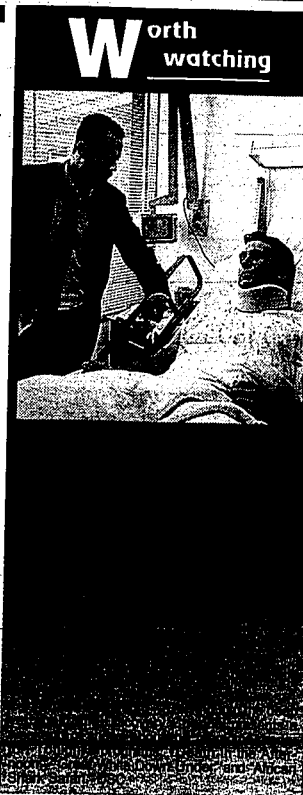

CBS reaps reports on 'Killing Fields'

CBS gets away with murder most weeks.

It is the only network with two series — "Murder, She Wrote" and "Diagnosis Murder" — using the venerable M-word as both a selling point and escape device. Angela Lansbury and Dick Van Dyke go hand in hand with dead bodies. For many, they are two of life's little pleasures.

The network's "In the Killing Fields of America" is made of much sterner stuff. Here is the toughest

of sells — a three-hour documentary that basks a mirror to the real-life war we are waging against ourselves. Ironically, the first hour compares against the season-ending — and quite possibly last — episode of ABC's acclaimed but low-rated "My So-Called Life."

Network documentaries have been on death row since the '90s onslaught of one newsmagazine series after another. "Killing Fields," airing under the historically resonant "CBS Reports" banner, is a story of execution fronted by

warheroes Mike Wallace. Dan Rather and Ed Bradley. Each contributes three pieces "in the names of the victims" first and foremost.

Produced by the veteran husband-and-wife team of Holly and Paul Fine, "Killing Fields" is a straight, sober and incisive look at America's most vicious urban war zones. A suggestion to social studies teachers: Tape these proceedings and show if them to your students during the rest of the school year. The lessons to be learned in "Killing Fields" are far

more instructive than anything to be gained by glorifying on O.J. Simpson's televised murder trial.

Wallace, a reporting marvel who, God willing, will turn 77 on May 9, is the most effective at communicating the seeming inevitability of it all.

"This is America at the end of the 20th century? People shooting each other? — What happened?" he asks a 22-year-old former drug dealer who has been paralyzed since being shot 13 times.

"People gave up," Wallace is told.

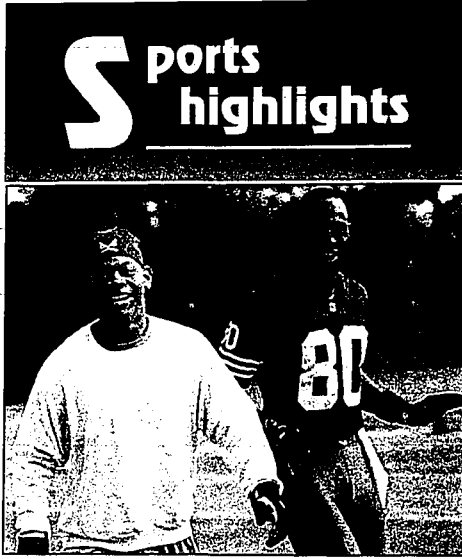

The Squirrel Family Tree



Red squirrels are the loudest and busiest of all tree squirrels.

Tree squirrels

are active all year around. However, they will stay snug in their nests for several days if the weather is really bad.



Gray squirrels can also be black or even white. They are known to be shy, but grow bolder when they get used to people.

Ground squirrels

hibernate in cold weather. Most live in underground colonies. They are able to carry food in cheek pouches that expand when stuffed.



Chipmunks have stripes on their faces, backs and sides. Their underground burrows have different "rooms" — one for sleeping, one for storage and one as a bathroom.



Prairie dogs get their name from their doglike bark. At one time, their colonies, or towns, went on for miles under the prairies of our country. Today there are not as many prairie dogs as there used to be.



Fox squirrels are bigger than gray squirrels. They can be gray, black or even reddish in color.



Flying squirrels are the smallest tree squirrels. Extra skin stretched between their front and back legs enables them to glide as far as 50 feet! While most tree squirrels live alone, flying squirrels live in colonies.

Many tree squirrels are easy to watch because they have become used to living in our neighborhoods along with us!

Marmots are the largest of the squirrel family. Woodchucks, or groundhogs, are a type of marmot.

There is an old story about groundhogs. It says that if they see their shadow when they come out of their burrows in early February, we will have six more weeks of winter.

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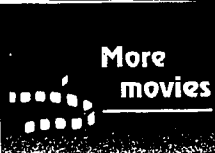

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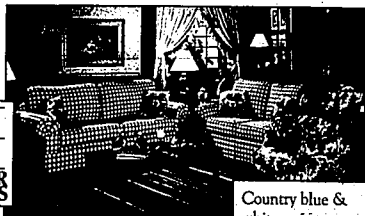


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
