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# Tax relief plan helps big boys

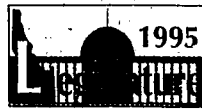

BOISE — The Idaho House of Representatives overwhelmingly passed a tax relief plan Thursday that gives \$15,000 to the Magic Valley Mall — and 40 bucks to the average homeowner.

The plan, endorsed by Republican Gov. Phil Batt, was ridiculed by some Twin Falls legislators, including Republican state Rep. Mark Stubbs.

Stubbs



Denouncing the "dime-a-day tax cut," Stubbs asked why legislators should funnel relief to shopping malls — and bypass widows, the elderly and those who need it most.

But by a 57-12 margin, representatives approved the \$40 million tax relief proposal — which sends state funds to offset part of the schools' maintenance and operations budget.

Legislators argued that House Bill 156 would fulfill Batt's campaign promises on tax relief and head off future property tax relief initiatives like those proposed by Coeur d'Alene activist Ron Rankin.

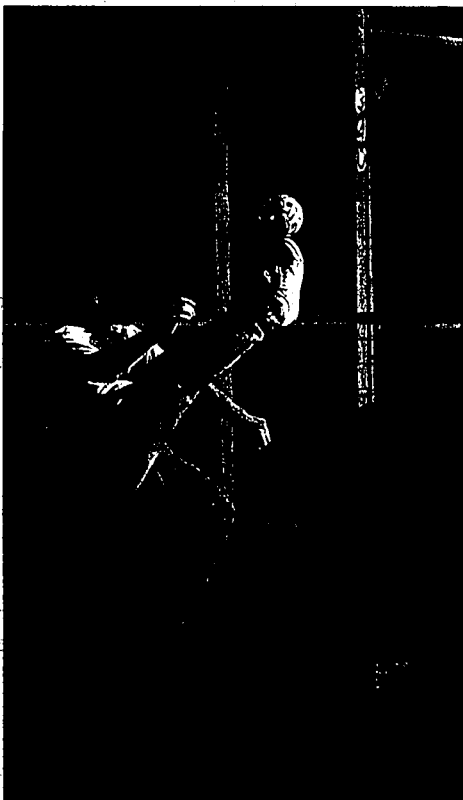
They also suggested lawmakers might spend the \$40 million if it isn't set aside early on for tax relief.

"We'll spend all the dollars we can get," state Rep. Golden Linford, R-Rexburg, warned. "This is one way to get a handle on our spending and also indicate to our constituents that we're serious about giving them property tax relief."

While a host of other tax relief proposals are circulating under the Statehouse dome, HB 156 was the first one to reach the floor for a vote. Supporters warned wary lawmakers that a "no" vote on this bill

# Snow piles high in Idaho mountains

TWIN FALLS — The winter snow season is nearly two-thirds over, and mountain snowpacks in central Idaho are the biggest they've been in a decade, a federal snow watcher said Thursday.

November, December and January are typically the heaviest months for snowfall and, unlike recent winters, this one has been an above-average snow year.

"It's pretty encouraging," said Phil Morrissey, hydrologist with the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

"January precipitation was above average, and the fast storm that came through a few days ago really hit in the central mountains."

Relatively warm temperatures have produced some snow melt at lower elevations, Morrissey said, "and some of the streams are starting to come up."

"It's OK to see it melt in basins where there are reservoirs to catch it, but generally we like to see it stay up in the basins in

the form of snow," Morrissey said. A Bureau of Reclamation official in Burley said the Snake River reservoir system upstream of Burley was 47 percent full on Thursday. The American Falls Reservoir was 63 percent full, and Jackson Lake was 46 percent full, said Mark Croghan, hydraulic engineer for the bureau.

Fallades Reservoir, however, was only 22 percent full on Thursday, Croghan reported.

With a few exceptions, snowpacks in central and eastern Idaho are larger than the 30-year average for this time of year.

Around the state, Feb. 1 snowpacks measured:

- 23 percent larger than average in the Wood River basin.
- 7 percent above average in the Salmon Falls Creek basin.
- 7 percent smaller than average in the Trapper and Goose creek basins.
- 21 percent larger in the Lost River basin.

# Musical mind recipients should use it or lose it

WASHINGTON — Some people are born with a magical sense of music, but without early training the gift may be lost, according to a scientist who studies the shape and size of the brain in the musically talented.

Fewness of the brains of 30 classically trained musicians show that those who have perfect pitch — the ability to identify isolated musical notes they hear — have a greatly enlarged structure on the left side of the brain.

The researcher, Dr. Gottfried Schlaug of Beth Israel Hospital in Boston, said Thursday that musicians in the study who lacked perfect pitch had a brain much like that of people who can't play a note.

But even the gifted had to start early to use what nature gave them.

"There is evidence that those with perfect pitch were exposed to music before the age of 7," said Schlaug. "If you get ex-

posed to music after the age of 10, the likelihood of developing perfect pitch is extremely low."

Perfect pitch may originate from the left-sided enlargement of a brain structure called the planum temporale. Both the left and right hemispheres of the brain have this structure, said Schlaug, but only the left side planum temporale was enlarged in the musicians who had perfect pitch.

Brain experts said the finding is important because it is the first to specifically and systematically relate a structure of the brain to an artistic talent.

"The value of this work is that it demonstrates a novel pattern of brain structure that has not been reported previously," said Robert Zatorre, a neuroscientist at the Montreal Neurological Institute of McGill University in Canada. "It raises more questions than it answers and now we need to try to find the meaning."

The study is to be published today in the journal Science.

# GOP may compromise on contract details

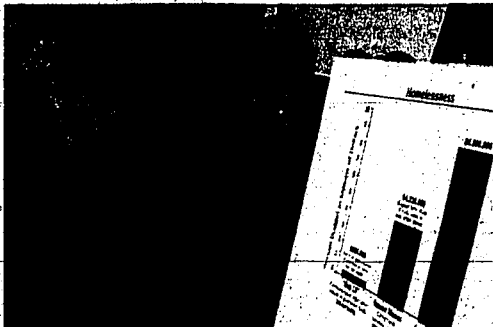
WASHINGTON — In command just shy of a month, House Republicans are showing a willingness to compromise on the details of their "Contract With America."

They're facing tough struggles on taxes, spending, welfare and term limits as they race against a self-imposed 100-day deadline. "We're clearly on schedule," Speaker Newt Gingrich said Thursday as GOP aides outlined a schedule of long days and late nights for March and early April when the final measures reach the House floor.

Rep. Richard Gephardt, the Democratic leader, countered that the voters ultimately will reject the GOP program's main elements. "It does not address the central challenges our country faces ... the standard of living for the American people," he said.

The precise pledge made in the "contract" is to hold votes on the House floor before 100 days on bills covering 10 areas. It's likely to be Labor Day or later before final House-Senate compromises are worked out on the more contentious items and the bills are sent to President Clinton.

Whatever the future, the Republican reign that began Jan. 4 has been extraordinarily busy by congressional standards. "I've got to say we're moving a whole lot faster than the other major event in the

country, the O.J. Simpson trial," Rep. Porter Goss, R-Fla., declared as the House began its work day Thursday.

Congress customarily waits until mid-February to get down to business. Yet by Thursday — Day 30 — the House had already cleared some measures, and was

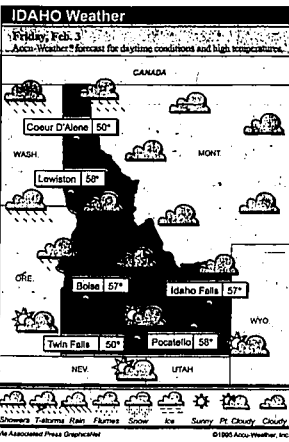
WASHINGTON — Leaders of the American Association of Retired Persons aren't sure what House Speaker Newt Gingrich has in mind with his call for rethinking Medicare "from the ground up."

What they've heard worries them. "The speaker's proposal left me fully depressed," said Abe Asofsky, 82, of Coconut Creek, Fla., a member of the AARP's national legislative council. "He wants to 'scuttle Medicare' with some weasel words — restructuring."

Other AARP officials are more circumspect, but they, too, express anxiety. William L. Lukhard, 69, chairman of the 41-member council that helps shape policy for the 33-million member AARP.

Medicare is the shoe that hasn't dropped in the newly empowered Republican majority's agenda for change in Washington.

Clear skies and sunshine in the Magic Valley were tempered by brisk winds but it was a generally enjoyable mid-winter day.

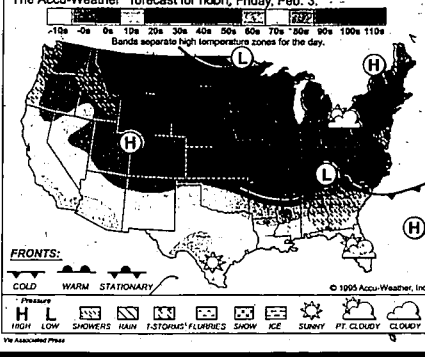
Winds were light and variable except from the Magic Valley to the Pocatello area where winds were west at 15 to 25 mph.

amendment to the Constitution. Also approved, with a majority of Democrats in favor, was a measure to limit Congress' ability to impose regulations on state and local governments without paying for them.

"It's an amazing thing that the Contract With America," the provisions of it, have passed by such overwhelming bipartisan support," said Rep. Mike Parker of Mississippi, one of the most conservative Democrats.

Several crime bills await floor action beginning next week, to be followed by a measure to make changes in defense policy. Committees are at work on other measures.

That's not to say there haven't been problems. The balanced-budget amendment vote was delayed a week to work out political problems, and a controversy over reopening a ban on certain assault-style weapons slowed progress on the crime measures. The drive to identify spending cuts has sparked friction between committees involved, and Republicans conceded the most vituperative clash occurred

when one GOP lawmaker moved too quickly to challenge comments made by a Democrat criticizing Gingrich's book contract.

"We knew we'd make a few mistakes," concedes Rep. John Boehner of Ohio, chairman of the party caucus.

Republican leaders view the balanced-budget amendment as a key milestone. "It lays a strong foundation," said Boehner. The measure was watered down with the GOP leadership's blessing to hold support from moderate Republicans and conservative Democrats. It then passed, 300-132, 12 more than the two-thirds needed.

That issue demonstrated the GOP leadership's determination to compromise where necessary to make sure "contract" items are cleared for Senate action.

Freshmen Republicans grumbled because they felt Gingrich hadn't pushed hard enough to approve the balanced-budget amendment as it was written in the "Contract With America." In the end, all but two of them voted for the measure.

## Clinton to ask 90-cent minimum wage boost

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton will ask Congress for a 90-cent increase in the minimum wage — to \$5.15 an hour — over a two-year period, congressional sources said Thursday.

Details are to be revealed today by the White House. But congressional sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Clinton will propose a 45-cent increase to the current \$4.25 per hour minimum wage upon enactment and another 45-cent increase the following year.

In his State of the Union address, Clinton said an increase was necessary but avoided specifying when what he would recommend. The

last increase, 45 cents an hour, was in 1991.

Without confirming the 90-cent-an-hour figure, White House spokesman Ginny Terzano said, "The president thinks that an increase in the minimum wage will be good for our workers and they need more to live on than \$4.25 an hour."

However, chances of Congress passing a minimum wage increase are considered poor because of opposition from Republican leaders.

House Majority Leader, Dick Armey of Texas, in fact, has said he'd like to do away with the minimum wage altogether.

would be viewed by constituents as a "no" vote on all property tax relief proposals.

Stubbs, who has his own tax relief proposal, figured he could speak for property tax relief — and still vote "no" emphatically.

Magic Valley legislators said HB 156 was unstopable because it was the governor's blessing — and was the bill with the most momentum.

"It was the only game in town," state Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome, said.

If HB 156 gets Senate approval, it will mean about \$1 in tax relief for every \$1,000 of valuation. But it will also mean higher income taxes — Stubbs predicted up to \$8 million of the \$40 million package will end up being sent to "Uncle Bill" Clinton in Washington, D.C. Lower state property taxes would mean higher federal and state income taxes.

Stubbs wanted to give Idahoans a sales tax rebate. That relief, Stubbs said, would have been free of federal taxes.

But legislators weren't swayed.

State Rep. Ron Black said he doubted other plans could succeed.

"It realistically (HB 156) is probably the only one that has a chance of getting through," he added.

And Bell said lawmakers decided to go with a sure thing.

"This bill's a bird in the hand," Bell said. "Mark's bill was still in the bush."

## New carriers to honor Reagan, Truman

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a tribute to two former presidents, President Clinton approved the naming of two nuclear-powered aircraft carriers after Ronald Reagan and Harry S. Truman.

"Once again, the names Truman and Reagan will lend themselves in pursuit of our national security in an effort to secure the peace they won during the Cold War," Clinton said Thursday.

Clinton said Truman, who led the nation out of World War II, laid the foundation for 40 years of peace and stability during the Cold War. And he said Reagan was "unsurpassed in his boundless patriotism and love for the

armed forces, and someone who still inspires us with his courage and grace."

The USS, the Navy has 12 aircraft carriers.

Two Nimitz-class carriers are under construction at Newport News, Va. One is the USS John C. Stennis, while the second will bear Truman's name.

The USS Harry S. Truman is to be commissioned in 1998.

Construction will begin later this year at Newport News on the carrier that will bear the name of USS Ronald Reagan. Also of the Nimitz class, it is a \$4.5 billion price-tag and is to be commissioned in 2002.

## Carbon monoxide kills guest in hotel

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — A hotel maid found one guest dead and another unconscious Thursday, apparently from carbon monoxide poisoning. A guest in another room was hospitalized.

The dead man was identified as Ronald L. Blank, 51, of Holland, Pa., who had been in the area for a week participating in Baseball Heaven, a fantasy baseball camp.

A faulty water heater and an emergency generator have been identified as possible sources of the deadly odorless gas at the Embassy Suites Hotel near Tampa International Airport.

Police Lt. Robert Huntington said a hotel maid who entered a room on the third floor found the dead man and the unconscious man, who was hospitalized in critical condition.

23 percent above average in the Brunson and Jarbridge river basins.

18 percent larger in the Payette River basin.

12 percent above average in the Boise River basin.

39 percent larger than average in the Henrys Fork basin.

46 percent above average for the Owyhee River basin.

Snowpacks in the Snake River basin upstream of Palisades Reservoir are three percent smaller than the long-term average for this time of year, Morrisey said. Many farmers in the Magic Valley rely on Palisades Reservoir for irrigation water.

Though it's in Idaho, Palisades Reservoir requires water from

Wyoming to fill. Trouble is, western Wyoming hasn't been pounded by wet winter storms as heavily as Idaho.

The area around Jackson, Wyo. has gotten a lot of rain recently, and streamflows above Palisades Reservoir have gone up in the past few days, Croghan said. Stream flows have increased by 200 to 300 cubic feet per second, he said; one cfs equals 449 gallons per minute.

Two more months remain in the snow-accumulation season. Snowpack usually peaks around April 1 in the West.

"It's a little early to tell if all the reservoirs will fill," Croghan said. "We're pretty sure if they will fill, but we don't know if they'll fill at the right time."

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# Jury hears tape of irate Simpson

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An enraged O.J. Simpson stormed around his ex-wife's home, ranting and cursing, as a frantic Nicole Brown Simpson pleaded with a 911 operator for help in a 1993 recording played for the jury Thursday.

"He's O.J. Simpson. I think you know his record... He's... going nuts," Ms. Simpson told the operator in the now-famous tape, introduced by prosecutors in the murder case in an effort to show that her slaying was the culmination of years of abuse from a jealous, obsessive Simpson.

three letters, photos of her bruised body, her will, newspaper stories about the beating and other items — when they drilled open the box in December, six months after Ms. Simpson and her friend Ronald Goldman were stabbed to death.

"It appears to us what Nicole Brown was doing was leaving a trail for us of what happened in 1989," Deputy District Attorney Christopher Darden said.

Simpson pleaded no contest to wife beating in the incident and was placed on probation.

The jurors, who had said during jury selection that they all had heard at least portions of the tape, gazed at the ceiling or closed their eyes to concentrate as the now-dead woman's voice became more and more hysterical. Some of the jurors took notes. Simpson was impassive and appeared to be reading a transcript of the call as it was played.

"My ex-husband has just broken into my house and he's ranting and raving outside in the front yard... He's crazy," Ms. Simpson is heard telling a 911 operator in a phone call the night of Oct. 25, 1993.

Earlier, jurors were shown items from the safe-deposit box in which Ms. Simpson documented a New Year's 1989 beating through photos, newspaper clippings and letters from Simpson that asked, "How I got so crazy?"

Prosecutors turned their attention to the safe-deposit box after completing questioning of former policeman Ronald Shipp, who fought off defense attempts to portray him as a liar and a starstruck wannabe friend who lusted after Ms. Simpson.

Under a second day of cross-examination, Shipp said he once had a serious drinking problem and acknowledged he was treated by a psychiatrist and left the police department because he was "burned out."

But he stood by his account that the day after the June 12 murders, Simpson confided in him that he had had dreams of killing his ex-wife. He also insisted that the former football star had regarded him as a friend.

Before he left the stand, Shipp said he saw Simpson throughout the week after his ex-wife's slaying and didn't detect any signs of grief.

"Did he ever express any sadness or sense of loss because Nicole was gone?" Darden asked.

"I didn't see it because of Nicole, no," Shipp replied.

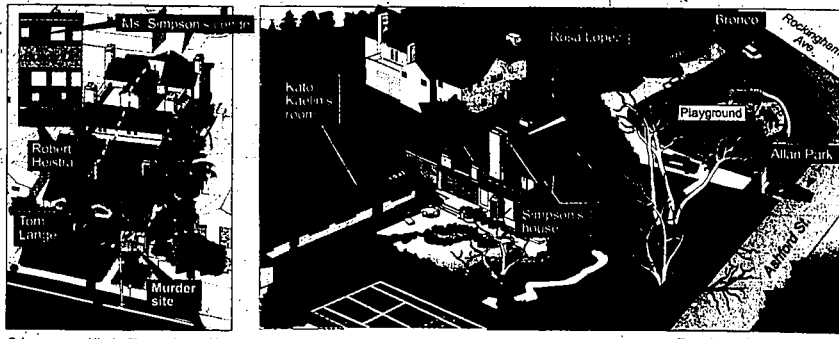
During a break in questioning, Shipp mouthed to Simpson across the room: "Tell the truth." Simpson appeared not to notice. Judge Lance Ito sternly cautioned jurors to disregard any such remarks.

"Let me start by expressing to you how wrong I was for hurting you," Simpson wrote to his then-wife.

"There is no excusable excuse for what I did..."

"As we drove home New Year's night I felt great about everything and have never been more in love with you. Thinking and trying to realize how I got so crazy?" Simpson wrote.

- 10:15 p.m. Neighbor Pablo Fenjves hears a dog's "plaintive wail."
- 10:25 p.m. Limousine driver Allan Park arrives at Simpson's home to take him to the airport.
- 10:40 p.m. In the guest house, Kaelin hears a thump. Park buzzes intercom, receives no response. He rings periodically for the next 10 minutes.
- 10:50 p.m. Another neighbor sees Ms. Simpson's Akita, with bloody paws, on the sidewalk near her house.
- 10:56 p.m. Park sees a black male cross the driveway and enter house. About 15 seconds later, he buzzes, and someone believed to be Simpson answers and says he'll be out shortly.
- 11:01 p.m. Simpson comes out of the house and meets driver. They load Simpson's bags, then leave for the airport.

### The defense

- 9:40 p.m. (approx.) Simpson and Kaelin return from McDonald's. Kaelin returns to his room to eat; Simpson returns to his own quarters.
- 10 p.m. On a curbside near Nicole Simpson's house, neighbor Tom Lange sees a woman fitting Nicole Simpson's description with a man. Down the street, he sees a Hispanic man with his fist clenched.
- 10:05 p.m. Simpson goes outside and calls girlfriend Paula Barbieri from a cellular phone in his Bronco.

# Defense attorney grills prosecution witness

Excerpts of testimony by former Los Angeles police officer Ronald Shipp Thursday in the O.J. Simpson trial.

In following segment, Shipp is being cross-examined by defense attorney Carl Douglas about efforts to re-enter the LAPD after quitting the force.

DOUGLAS: OK. Isn't it true, sir, that when you acting career floundered, you re-applied to work again with the police department, even though you had been so burned out, as you say?

SHIPP: Yes, I did. OK, what happened was when things — I started a security business. Things didn't work out. OK? Things didn't work out.

DOUGLAS: Answer this: Is it true, even though you were so burned out with the police department, that you re-applied?

SHIPP: Yes, I did re-apply.

DOUGLAS: When was that?

SHIPP: Probably about a year afterwards.

DOUGLAS: Are you sure it was that long?

SHIPP: I can't remember. You have the dates.

DOUGLAS: Sure I do. Wasn't it more like four months?

SHIPP: No, it wasn't four months that I recall.

DOUGLAS: And isn't it true that even though you wanted to be again a member of the police department, they didn't accept you? Correct?

SHIPP: This is true.

DOUGLAS: And isn't it true that they didn't accept you because of a substance abuse problem that you had?

SHIPP: No, not at all. It's not true.

DOUGLAS: Why were you told that you weren't accepted?

SHIPP: Because when I — during my — during the time when I had the alcohol problem, I took stress leave and I was told by the city attorney's office that it would be — I'd be a very high risk to come back to the LAPD.

DOUGLAS: So they thought you'd be unfit as an officer?

SHIPP: Because of — yeah, for the stress.

(In this segment, Douglas is cross-examining Shipp about occasional visits to O.J. Simpson's home while still in the LAPD.)

DOUGLAS: Now let's talk about your career as a police officer. You testified that there were occasions when you would come by and speak with Mr. Simpson, true?

SHIPP: Yes, there were.

DOUGLAS: And you would come by his home while working for the Los Angeles Police Department.

SHIPP: Yes, I did.

DOUGLAS: And you'd come by in uniform.

SHIPP: Yes, I was.

DOUGLAS: In marked cars?

SHIPP: Marked cars?

DOUGLAS: Correct.

SHIPP: Oh, marked — black and whites — Yes, I'm sorry — That's correct.

DOUGLAS: And you would come by and basically show off your friendship to a Hall of Famer, true?

SHIPP: What I would do, I mean — yeah, that's true.

DOUGLAS: And you would try to impress your friends on the force that you knew O.J. Simpson and could come by his house, true?

SHIPP: Get autographs, pictures.

DOUGLAS: And you would often take your partners into Mr. Simpson's house to show off his Heisman Trophy that is displayed there, wouldn't you?

SHIPP: Sure, Yes, I did.

DOUGLAS: And you'd also take him to his magnificent trophy room and show off all of those championship footballs that he had on display.

SHIPP: I did.

DOUGLAS: And you would also show off the Walter Camp trophies and the other trophies that were prominently displayed in his trophy room, wouldn't you?

SHIPP: All the trophies, everything he had.

DOUGLAS: And in fact, you would even go back and you went back last year to have Mr. Simpson sign footballs for some friends of yours, true?

SHIPP: Yes, I did.

DOUGLAS: You said that there may have been as many as 40 different officers that, on one time or another, you brought to Mr. Simpson's home, correct?

SHIPP: Over a five-year period, correct.

DOUGLAS: How many times did you bring Mark Fuhrman by?

SHIPP: Mark Fuhrman, never.

DOUGLAS: It was well known at the West Los Angeles Division, when you were there —

PROSECUTOR CHRISTOPHER DARDEN: Objection, form of a question.

JUDGE LANCE ITO: Well, let's hear the question.

DOUGLAS: Thank you. Because you brought so many police officers by Mr. Simpson's home to show off Mr. Simpson and his trophies, etc., it was well known, wasn't it, at West Los Angeles that O.J. Simpson lived within the jurisdiction of that division?

SHIPP: Very much.

Actually, it's the title of a song from "Cinderella," and Clark's mistake prompted several calls to local TV stations.

Clark is the mother of two children, ages 5 and 2.

# Would changes rein in or cripple regulators?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Picture this: Government regulators conclude soft bedding may cause babies to suffocate, but they can't issue a warning.

First, they must gauge that health threat against other risks — such as the odds someone might be killed in a plane crash.

Or the Environmental Protection Agency wants to curb indoor tobacco smoke, but the tobacco industry first must be allowed to sit on a review panel that can scuttle the regulation.

These are the kinds of requirements and restrictions federal regulators complained Thursday, that they would face under legislation now steamrolling through Congress as part of the Republicans' "Contract With America."

The heated debate on Capitol Hill is over the government's art of risk assessment and cost benefit. It is over determining how far government should go to protect public health and at what cost. And it is over the growing cries of America's business community that it is being pounded by costly and cumbersome rules from Washington.

"We got the message last November — stop wasting taxpayers' money," Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole of Kansas declared as Senate Republicans introduced their version Thursday of legislation to impose requirements for closer cost-benefit reviews and allow Congress to kill any new legislation that is too

costly. Dole said federal regulations cost the American economy \$500 billion a year.

But the attack on federal regulators is strongest in the House, where the Republican leadership is seeking to rein in the bureaucrats in a bill entitled the "Job Creation and Wage Enhancement Act of 1995."

It requires agencies to go through nearly two dozen procedural steps when issuing regulations and health and safety edicts; forces them to take a closer look at the relationship of risks and regulatory costs; and would open the process more for industry by requiring that companies that are subject to a regulation be allowed on review panels.

The reviewers would become

"toothless lapdogs stacked with corporate insiders and industry lobbyists," complained Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., at a hearing by a Commerce subcommittee Thursday.

"But many lawmakers say what they view as a trend toward more intrusive regulation must be reversed.

"What we're trying to do is add a little dose of reality," argued freshman Rep. Brian Bilbray, R-Calif., who maintained that business is fed up with costly regulations from hostile bureaucrats.

The White House sent regulators before the subcommittee in an attempt to dramatize the broad and sweeping impact the proposed House bill, which is expected to be

pushed through committee next week, would have on government and the public.

While intended to streamline regulations and make them less onerous, it would do the opposite and make regulating more costly to both government and industry, said Sally Katzen of the White House Office of Management and Budget. "It is an administrative nightmare," she said.

Representatives of the EPA and Food and Drug Administration and other regulatory agencies said it would keep them from setting needed health and safety standards, prevent them from keeping unsafe products and foods off the market and lead to endless litigation.

Industry could tie us up and con-

sumer activists could tie us up if they don't think we're going far enough," said Eric Rubel, general counsel for the Consumer Products Safety Commission.

He noted that the CPSC this week issued a warning that soft bedding may be causing the death of as many as 1,800 infants a year with the deaths falsely attributed to infant death syndrome. While the agency issued its findings after a review by two independent outside experts, he said such a warning would have been delayed a year or more had the restrictions being considered by Congress been in effect.

They argued the bill would also hinder attempts to ease regulations. For example, they said, an EPA pro-

posal to loosen the requirements for handling PCBs as a change that could save industry billions of dollars — likely would be delayed, as would requests to the FDA for approval of new drugs or medical devices.

The regulators said the government also would be hindered in protecting the blood supply, keeping tainted meat or poultry off the market, cleaning up contamination at federal nuclear weapons sites, finding a storage site for highly radioactive nuclear fuel, and protecting people in the workplace from unsafe conditions.

No one could provide estimates on the costs of the proposed new risk assessment requirements. The EPA, however, estimated it would take 1,000 agency employees to "do nothing but bureaucratic analysis."

Other witnesses said additional peer review hearings could cost \$100,000 apiece. It would spawn "armies of lawyers who will make a fortune filing lawsuits ... and legions of bureaucrats needed to generate the mountains of paperwork necessary to comply with the (new) requirements," said Markey.

Bilbray saw it differently. "The private sector is not the enemy," he told the representatives of the FDA, EPA, OMB, CPSC and Energy Department. "Its your credibility that doesn't exist anymore. The public is saying government is out there not to do something for me. They're doing something to me."

## Weapons investigators probe noted animal-welfare advocates

LOS ANGELES (AP) — For nearly 40 years, Mercy Crusade Inc. has earned accolades as a tireless advocate of animals.

New, however, reports that it stockpiled more than \$100,000 worth of weapons, including rifles and assault pistols restricted under federal gun control laws, have raised serious questions.

Records show that group members bought or ordered at least 34 guns in the past year, including several rifles such as the AR-15, a cousin of the military M-16.

The federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms is holding 12 Hecker & Koch SP89 pistols seized from the group's leader last year, and agents are investigating why an animal welfare group would need such powerful weapons, the Los Angeles Times has reported. The guns were among the 34 ordered in the past year.

The 9mm semiautomatics are on the federal list of banned assault weapons, but it is not illegal to own one manufactured before the ban.

"They're the Rolls-Royces of handguns," said Kim

Ratcliffe, administrative manager of Gun Heaven, a Los Angeles weapons shop. "It's hard to understand why they have so many guns," said Madeline Bernstein, executive director of the Los Angeles Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

State and federal officials both have launched investigations into the organization's activities; no charges have been filed.

Mercy Crusade's leader is James McCourt, an associate professor of economics at the University of La Verne. McCourt has said he bought the guns for the group's 12 humane officers, unpaid and unregulated volunteers who wear uniforms and badges and have powers of investigation and arrest in animal abuse cases.

A little-known 80-year-old state law allows animal welfare groups to appoint such officers with a judge's approval. McCourt, who also teaches at Pepperdine University, has told the Times the guns were needed for his officers for training, protection during investigations, and to gain respect from other law enforcement agencies.

## Pena looks to boost efficiency at Transportation Department

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Transportation Department would be cut from 10 to three divisions, reducing spending and staff, under a reorganization plan announced Thursday by Transportation Secretary Federico Pena.

The changes, which must be approved by Congress, are expected to save hundreds of millions of dollars by eliminating duplication among various agencies, according to department officials.

"This department is not ready for the next century in its current structure," Pena said.

Many legal and accounting operations are duplicated among the current 10 administrations, he said, and the department's field offices need to be consolidated.

Pena said a detailed plan will be sent to Congress in March and he hoped to restructure the department into what are essentially land, sea and air components starting Oct. 1. Included in the reorganization is a

Valley Authority. A congressional hearing on that proposal is expected within two weeks.

The Federal Aviation Administration, minus air traffic control, would be the focus of a new Aviation Administration. It would also take over the duties of the current Office of Commercial Space Transportation and some aviation activities now handled by the secretary's office, Pena said.

Previously announced proposals to remove the nation's air traffic control system from the department and set it up as a semi-independent component would be handled by the Postal Service and Tennessee

would be responsible for aircraft and airline safety and certification, airports and civil aviation security.

The Coast Guard would be the second component of the new structure. The responsibilities of the Coast Guard include maritime law enforcement, maritime safety, marine environmental protection, and some national security functions.

Most other department agencies would be consolidated into an Intermodal Transportation Administration.

That division would take over the functions of the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Railroad Administration, Federal Transit Administration, National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, Research and Special Programs Administration functions covering pipeline safety and transport of hazardous materials, and the Maritime Administration.

## Report: Millions move into, out of poverty annually

WASHINGTON (AP) — Millions of Americans move into and out of poverty each year, according to a new Census Bureau report that also found a base group of chronically poor.

Relatively small changes in the total number of people living in poverty from year to year mask the fact that millions change poverty status annually, according to the study. "Dynamics of Economic

Well-Being," released Thursday.

The income analysis found that 18.8 million people who were poor in 1990 remained poor in 1991. But 5.1 million people moved out of poverty between the two years and 6.2 million became poor.

The Census Bureau does not study the causes of people moving into or out of poverty, said analyst Martina Shea, but her report did note that 1990 and 1991 were

years that the economy was in recession.

Looking at 1990, the report found the median duration of poverty was 4 months. Being poor lasted longer for blacks, 5.8 months, compared with 3.9 for whites. People who had not finished high school were poor for 5.3 months; those with a disability, 4.9 months; and rural residents, 4.7 months.

## POW/MIA stamp set

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Postal Service will issue a new stamp honoring American veterans who were prisoners of war and those still missing in action.

Postmaster General Marvin Runyon announced the new 32-cent stamp Thursday and said it will be issued on Memorial Day, May 29. The design of the stamp has not been completed, postal officials said.

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## South Dakota senator softens tone of questionnaire for NPR

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Larry Pressler, yielding to protests about invasion of privacy, said Thursday he is dropping questions about the ethnic and professional backgrounds of National Public Radio employees from a review of the public broadcasting industry.

"If that's going to get into the way of getting the big budgetary figures, then let it go," said the chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee, which controls the federal purse strings of public broadcasting.

Pressler, R-S.D., was seeking

information on the ethnic background, gender and previous employment of NPR employees as well as information on political contributions made by all people affiliated with the public broadcasting industry. These queries accounted for 10 of 170 questions in the review, said Pressler, who wants to end federal support for all public broadcasting, which this year is \$285 million.

"We'll withdraw those 10 if we can't get the other 160," he said, adding: "I think it's just very important that we get to the big questions."

NPR President Delano Lewis called Pressler's decision a "step in the right direction," but said that if the remaining questions violate the First Amendment rights of NPR or the privacy rights of its employees "we will not respond."

Questionnaires also were sent to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, which is the clearinghouse for federal funds for public broadcasting, and the Public Broadcasting Service, which distributes television shows like "Sesame Street" to hundreds of stations.

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# American dream: Do we receive less with success?

**EVESHAM TOWNSHIP, N.J.** — With two cars and a tidy home, Bruno Trenkler is a fairly average guy with a typical lament about the American standard of living.

"Never before have I earned so much money, and never has it seemed to cover so little," says the 37-year-old engineer, who lives with his wife and three children in this well-manicured Philadelphia suburb.

It's a familiar lullaby: Workers toiling harder for less. Paychecks never quite large enough to cover health care, schooling, housing, clothing. Living standards slipping inexorably backward.

But for Trenkler and the majority of Americans, there's one piece of good news about this heartening assessment: It's not really true. In fact, the average household is significantly better off than it was, say, 20 years ago — and not just because more wives are working outside the home.

Many Americans could be forgiven for thinking otherwise. As they peer out at a world of corporate downsizing, unpredictable layoffs, quailing foreign competition and rising health costs, they naturally come to the belief that their generation is losing ground.

For Americans of most income levels, however, the gains of the past two decades are thin soup only in comparison to the huge leap of the 25 years after World War II. Thanks to gradual but significant earnings gains and a steady acceleration of technological advances over the last 20 years, the typical American has not only held onto the earlier gains, but has acquired more buying power and is surrounded by a material environment that is more comfortable.

Trenkler's case illustrates the point when he is compared to David Thomas, 49, who held roughly the same job at the same defense plant 20 years ago.

Even after adjusting for inflation, Trenkler's

\$60,000 salary outdoes the \$16,500 Smith was paid.

And although Trenkler feels like anything but a king, his 2,100-square-foot home is spacious next to the 1,400-square-foot, single-story ranch house Smith could afford 20 years ago.

Trenkler's cars are not new — but they are safer, cleaner and carry more convenience features than Smith's.

And while Trenkler pays about \$300 a year toward his health insurance (Smith's were fully company-paid), the care his family gets is substantially better, thanks to the medical advances of the past two decades. One sign: Trenkler's children's life expectancy is four years longer than it would have been two decades ago.

All this flies in the face of today's political credo.

President Clinton built his 1992 campaign around an assertion that average Americans have been falling behind since 1973 — a view that he

repeated around the country in countless times in their effort to build political backing for more active federal policies.

"Middle-class people are bringing home a smaller paycheck to pay more for health care and housing and education," Clinton declared in 1991 as he formally launched his candidacy.

For people at the lower range of the middle class, Clinton is indisputably right. The fast-changing economy of the 1990s has opened a growing gap between the nation's poorer and better-off citizens.

And for Americans of all incomes, their collective sense of security has been shaken by years of social and economic change. The erosion of the faith in the institutions of schools, government, and other institutions, the rising concern about crime. All these are part of it.

So, too, is the effect of a turbulent new economy in which the pace of capitalism's destruction has quickened along with the rate of its creativity. Many higher-paying, lower-skilled jobs have disappeared, and formerly reliable middle-level positions have been thrown in

began in 1973 after a tremendous spurt during the glory days of America's postwar economic dominance.

The cause is still debated: Experts have blamed the 1973 Arab oil boycott, inept corporate management, ham-handed government, the declining quality of education and a petering out of the benefits of World War II-era inventions.

The size of the slowdown is a matter of hot dispute. One group of analysts has seized on median family income, which painted a grim picture of the past 20 years.

Measured in inflation-adjusted 1993 dollars, median family income reached nearly \$37,000 in 1973 and has bumped along slightly above or below that since, resting in 1993 at almost exactly its 1973 level.

But that statistic misses the reduction in family size since the mid-1960s. Discretionary income — what's left after taxes and the necessities of life — is up by nearly 50 percent on a per-capita basis.

Median family income also misses non-cash income, which has grown substantially in the form of health insurance, pensions and other fringe benefits. Although some benefit packages have recently been pared back, most remain more generous than they were two decades ago — with such goodies as additional vacation days and paid maternity leave. Fringes are worth 42 percent of wages, says Federal Reserve economist Cox, compared to 29 percent in 1970.

Much of the increase in health care benefits merely compensates for inflation. But some reflects real advances in medicine.

Americans "are getting access to some very different care than they had 20 years ago," says University of Maryland economist Martin N. Baily. "What would people do if they were

given a choice of taking care at the current price, or paying less and getting 20-year-old technology? I'm pretty sure they would accept (today's) terms."

Many economists believe the widely quoted median family income figures also are overly grim because they do not account for such factors as the growth of female-headed families, people who live alone and households with no two members related by blood or marriage.

One way to purge those factors is by looking at after-tax income per person, a widely considered the economist's best measure of living standards. Frank Levy, an urban studies professor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, says that by that measure, the average American had 46 percent more after-tax income in 1990 than in 1970, even after adjusting for inflation.

Economic expansion is no longer the "great rising tide" of which President Kennedy spoke, Levy says. Yet even with two oil shocks, a dizzy inflationary spurt and three recessions, he concludes that "the proportion of high-income families grew faster than the proportion of low-income families, suggesting that more people gained than lost over two decades."

That the growth of average incomes slowed sharply after 1973 is beyond dispute. Looking a decade or two into the future, some economists expect that slowdown to turn into an actual decline.

More cautious economists, and they are numerous, maintain that the nation is not far enough along into the economic cycle to make any judgment with confidence.

And those at the optimistic end of the spectrum argue that productivity is about to bust out of 20 years of stagnation, powering economic growth and personal earnings for years. Companies, having cast off surplus workers and put the computer to work, are poised for brisk advances.

## Government study: Soft bedding may contribute to infant deaths

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Parents should not put sleeping babies on top of fluffy bedding, the government said Wednesday, concluding that such crib arrangements may contribute to as many as 1,800 inexplicable infant deaths a year.

A study by the Consumer Product Safety Commission found that up to 30 percent of the 6,000 babies who died of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) had been sleeping on top of soft materials, such as comforters and pillows.

Researchers believe it is likely that the bedding covers the children's mouths and noses and that they die from carbon dioxide poisoning as a result of breathing the trapped air they have exhaled.

As a precaution, parents and others should rest sleeping infants on firm, flat surfaces; put healthy babies to sleep on their backs or sides and avoid the use of soft, fluffy materials underneath the infant, the commission said.

Any softness should come from the babies, said Ann Brown, the commission's chairman.

"Many parents are buying soft, fluffy infant products for cribs," she said at a news conference.

"Such products are beautiful,

but parents must remember (to) never put fluffy products under a baby.

Officials cautioned that the two-year study in no way establishes a link between SIDS and the use of fluffy bed clothes, but that it underscores advice the medical community has offered for the past several years.

SIDS is the sudden, unexplainable death of babies younger than age 1.

The American Academy of Pediatrics, which endorsed the commission's report and its recommendations, changed its policy to recommend the "tummy up" position in 1992.

Conventional medical wisdom since the 1930s had been that babies should be put to sleep on their stomachs.

Last June, the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, the SIDS Alliance and other professionals launched a nationwide campaign to advise parents to put infants to

sleep on their backs or sides.

"Certainly the study reinforces the importance of not having soft things under the infant," said Marian Willinger, director of SIDS research at the institute. "It doesn't do them any good. It may do some harm."

Phipps Cohe, spokeswoman for the SIDS Alliance, a national nonprofit organization that supports families' education and research, noted that some babies may need to sleep on their stomachs for medical reasons.

"There are a lot of things that came into play here," she said.

"But essentially, the recommendation that parents should never put soft, fluffy materials under a healthy baby is a solid recommendation."

Willinger said it was too early to say whether the turnaround in policy has affected SIDS rates in the United States.

But officials are encouraged by news from around the world.

Great Britain reported in December that SIDS cases had decreased by more than half since 1991, when it began urging parents to put infants to sleep on their backs.

Sleep position studies in New Zealand, Australia and Norway also have shown that SIDS rates can be cut by up to 50 percent.

## 6 bald eagles found poisoned

**MADISON, Wis. (AP)** — Six bald eagles died in southern Wisconsin last month from what appears to be accidental poisoning, an wildlife official said.

Meanwhile, federal officials increased a reward to \$25,000 Wednesday for information leading to the arrests of those who deliberately poisoned 17 eagles since 1993 in the far northwest part of the state.

A muskrat carcass poisoned with the pesticide carbofuran was found near where the dead birds were discovered, said Lucinda Schroeder, a special agent for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The investigation involves the largest single incident of eagle killings since the service started investigating such deaths under the Endangered Species Act, Schroeder said.

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## Woman burned in motel bathroom testifies after months of silence

**DENVER (AP)** — A woman so badly burned she couldn't speak for months testified against the man she says doused her with gasoline and set her on fire.

Brenda Walcott, 31, suffered burns on most of her body in June after a man took her into a motel bathroom, threw gas on her and flicked a lighter to ignite it.

"I was like, 'POOF!' I was up in flames!" Walcott testified Wednesday. "I was in shock. I tried to get out of the bathroom."

Alvin James Taylor, 29, is on trial on attempted murder, assault and arson charges. Walcott pointed Taylor out in court as her attacker.

Walcott, who is badly disfigured, said Taylor muttered, "I'll teach you

to take my stuff," before taking out the lighter.

"I was in the bathroom no longer than a minute or two — long enough for him to close the door, throw the gasoline on me and light me up," Walcott said.

Prosecutor Bill Buckley said Taylor tried to kill Walcott, a drug addict, because he thought she stole money and crack cocaine from him.

**Phil says spring's nearly sprung**

PUNXSUTAWNEY, Pa. (AP) — Break out the gardening gloves and fire up the charcoal grill: Spring is almost here.

At least according to Punxsutawney Phil. The chubby groundhog, possibly the world's most famous forecaster, failed to see his shadow as he was hauled from a man-made burrow Thursday, indicating — legend says — that winter is almost over.

A crowd of about 7,000 cheered loudly as the announcement was made under overcast, chilly skies.

"I was right, I was right!" exulted John Stoffan, a salesman from Mahanoy City, who said he had forecast Phil's prediction. He planned to "get an early tan," but conceded he might wait a week or two before oiling up.

"It is the 10th or 11th time since 1887 that the groundhog — whose forecasts are actually determined in advance by members of the Punxsutawney Groundhog Club — has predicted an early spring, depending on whose count you

believe. The last time was in 1990.

The National Weather Service near Pittsburgh also forecast above-normal temperatures for the next few weeks, in keeping with the relatively mild trend this winter.

"We haven't had winter yet. Spring feels like it's already here," said meteorologist Bob Reed.

The Groundhog Day tradition is based on a German superstition that an animal casting its shadow Feb. 2 is an indication of bad weather to come.

**Clinton tabs Tennessee doctor as surgeon general**

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton Thursday nominated Henry Foster Jr. to replace fired surgeon general Joycelyn Elders, putting him in charge of a national battle against teen-age pregnancy.

In an Oval Office address, Clinton ordered Foster to "help America attack the epidemic of teen pregnancies and unmarried pregnancies." He said the surgeon general is "the public face of our public health service."

Foster promised to emphasize prenatal care, and deal with the issue of teen-age pregnancy. "There is nothing more stifling than a compromised beginning," he said.

Clinton promised no new money for a teen-age pregnancy campaign, saying he hoped private enterprises would help out. Aides say few new initiatives are involved in the campaign, but Clinton hopes to increase the visibility of the issue.

Administration officials predicted that Foster, a Nashville doctor with Arkansas ties, would be less controversial than Elders, who was fired in December after saying school children should be taught about masturbation.

He picked up quick support from the American Medical Association, Planned Parenthood and Republican Senator Bill Frist of Tennessee.

But at least one conservative critic said Foster and Elders are philosophically similar, even if Foster is less provocative. "The president is making another mistake. And it's my hope that the Senate will not," said Gary Bauer, president of Family Research Council, a conservative think tank and lobbying group. He called Foster "Elders-lite."

Elders called Foster a friend and gave her blessing in an interview from Little Rock, Ark. She offered him this advice: "I would just say make sure that he does what he feels needs to be done."

Foster, an obstetrician-gynecologist in Nashville, Tenn., drew Clinton's attention by working to reduce teen-age pregnancy in Nashville housing developments. He is a former dean and acting president of Meharry Medical College in Nashville, one of four historically black medical schools in the United States.

Foster, 61, founded Meharry's "I Have a Future" program, aimed at delaying sexual activity among teenagers by building their self-esteem, developing job skills and teaching sexual responsibility, self-control and how to deal with conflicts in relationships.

The 8-year-old program, operating out of two Nashville housing projects, also offers comprehensive health services, emphasizing primary health care, physical exams, screening for sexually transmitted diseases, pregnancy tests and distribution of contraceptives.

**Panel urges revised assessment of nuclear arms' role in defense**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States needs to create a new public consensus on nuclear weapons, especially the basic question of whether in the 21st century the nation would be better off without them, a nonpartisan panel concludes.

The panel, headed by retired Army Gen. Andrew Goodpaster, said in a report released Thursday that the Clinton administration's 1994 reassessment of American nuclear arms policy was incomplete and sidestepped the toughest questions.

"It is time for a broader debate on the long-term role of nuclear weapons in U.S. defense policy," the report said.

At the heart of the matter, the

panel said, was the question of whether in the aftermath of the Cold War it makes sense to drop the United States' traditional reliance on nuclear weapons and seek to gradually eliminate them worldwide.

"This possibility merits close analysis of a far-reaching type not provided by" the Clinton administration's nuclear study, the panel's report said.

The administration, after 10 months of deliberation, concluded in its Nuclear Posture Review last fall that the country could slightly reduce its nuclear arsenal beyond what already had been planned. But it reaffirmed nuclear weapons as a vital feature of American national security policy and said they served

as a hedge against a potential return to authoritarian rule in Russia.

"The results fall well short of the fundamental review of nuclear needs originally envisioned" when the assessment was launched by President Clinton's first defense secretary, Les Aspin, in 1993, the panel's report said.

Barry Blechman, a member of the Goodpaster panel, said in an interview Thursday that the panel understood the administration's justification for sticking to the traditional reliance on nuclear weapons.

The view in the Pentagon, he said, was "we can't be challenging orthodox views" on nuclear policy while agreed arms reductions are still to be implemented in the former Soviet Union.

**Watchdog group seeks book-deal probe**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Common Cause urged the House ethics committee Thursday to retain an outside ethics adviser to examine Speaker New Gingrich's book deal, and recommend whether the arrangement should be approved or rejected.

"Citing a 'highly charged atmosphere,'" Fred Wertheimer, president of the congressional watchdog group, suggested that the adviser would be "the best assurance" that the panel would not get political pressure.

Gingrich previously said he would submit the book deal to the commit-

tee but has consistently opposed any outside investigator to be named.

Wertheimer's suggestion, in a letter to committee Chairman Nancy Johnson, R-Conn., was different than demands from House Democrats for an outside counsel.

A counsel would actually conduct an investigation for the committee and recommend whether ethics rules were violated.

The adviser would not attempt to determine whether standards of conduct were broken, but whether the book deal falls within House ethics guidelines.

A House rule provides that book

royalties are exempt from a ban on congressional honoraria and a limit on outside earned income — which cannot exceed 15 percent of a member's salary.

But the royalties must be received from established publishers under usual and customary contract terms.

Gingrich's agents initially negotiated a \$4.5 million advance with HarperCollins, a company owned by media magnate Rupert Murdoch. After the arrangement was substantially criticized, Gingrich changed the deal to accept a \$1 advance, plus royalties based on book sales.

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# Studies indicate salmon shrinking, as well as salmon runs

SEATTLE (AP) — The fishing industry has been concerned about the size of salmon runs for years.

Now it is worrying about the size of salmon. In the past decade or so, the average size of salmon returning to five Washington hatcheries shrank by 11 percent to 27 percent. In the run with the sharpest declines, average fish weight dropped from more than 6 pounds to less than 4½.

There is strong evidence that salmon sizes have been decreasing for decades across the rim of the North Pacific Ocean — from

waters off California, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia through the Gulf of Alaska to seas off Russia and Japan.

The newest evidence comes from unpublished research by state Department of Fish and Wildlife biologist Steve Phelps, who found shrinkage in all of the six Washington hatchery coho runs he studied.

The average salmon from Washington's Puyallup Hatchery weighed 27 percent less in 1991 than in 1980, Phelps said. Fish size in other hatchery runs dropped by 25 percent, 24 percent, 19 percent, 11 percent and 1 percent.

The number of eggs per female salmon also declined because smaller fish carry fewer eggs. Over a 30-year period, the mean egg production per female dropped from roughly 2,500 to 1,500 at the state's Puyallup and George Adams hatcheries, Phelps said.

Another recent study found shrinkage in 45 out of 47 salmon runs harvested in commercial-fisheries from California to Japan. That study was released late last year by Brian Bigler, biologist for Seattle-based Wards Cove Packing Co., and biologist John Helle of the National Marine Fisheries

Service's Juneau, Alaska, laboratory.

The study found weight declines varying from 40 percent in British Columbia pink salmon to barely detectable losses in some sockeye.

Bigler called it "very compelling, comprehensive evidence" that booming hatchery and wild production is straining the capacity of the North Pacific.

He contends the ocean is being overgrazed.

"The amount of salmon-sustaining resource in the North Pacific Ocean is being strained," Bigler said in an interview with

the Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

Though causes are debated, biologists tend to blame human action, mainly fishing techniques that skim off the big fish and overgrazing of the ocean by billions of hatchery fish.

"It's going to be a real controversial issue," said Katherine Myers, a biologist at the University of Washington's Fisheries Research Institute.

Perhaps the gravest long-term concern about salmon-shrinkage is that it appears to reduce both survival to adulthood and production of offspring.

## Handcuffed man steals patrol car

MOAB, Utah (AP) — A 19-year-old Colorado man pulled a Houdini act on two Utah Highway Patrol troopers, stealing their patrol car while he was handcuffed and strapped into the front passenger seat.

The troopers jumped in Tibis Kneipp's old car, but weren't able to keep up. Other officers caught Kneipp after he abandoned the patrol car.

Kneipp, from New Castle, Colo., was pulled over by two patrolmen in one car just after 4 p.m. Tuesday on suspicion he had stolen \$17 worth of gas from a Sinclair station at Crescent Junction, Utah, on Interstate 70, said Sgt. Doug Hall.

The trooper arrested and secured Kneipp in the front seat, then stepped outside the car to discuss the case, Hall said.

"The kid was 19, skinny and flexible and able to get his hands from behind his back," Hall said. "He got his legs through his hands, got the handcuffs in front, slid in front and dropped it in drive and left."

"He must have been double-jointed in the wrists," said Gary Whitney of the Utah Highway Patrol. "He managed to get through a system that usually works."

The troopers had a hand-held radio and alerted authorities that Kneipp was westbound on I-70 in the patrol car, Hall said.

The patrolmen "then followed but were not able to maintain any speed in the violator's car," Hall said.

Emery County Sheriff Lamar Guyman, on I-70 in his personal car, saw the patrol car turn north onto a dirt road at the Floy interchange.

A short time later, an Emery County deputy sheriff spotted the patrol car hidden behind a berm and Kneipp high-tailing it across the desert, Hall said.

## Former student files rape suit against counselor

SPOKANE (AP) — A former Davenport High School student whose testimony helped send a counselor to prison for sexual misconduct filed a \$2.4 million claim against the district, alleging he raped her.

Should the district, 35 miles west of Spokane, reject the claim, a lawsuit will be filed in U.S. District Court, attorney Dick Eymann said.

The claim was filed Wednesday by former student Heather Giles, now of Seattle, and her parents, John and Carol Giles of Davenport. Davenport Superintendent Dave Iverson said the claim had been turned over to an insurance carrier and district officials would have no comment.

The rape allegation did not surface during the case against former counselor and coach Charles Jungblom. He is serving a five-year federal prison term after pleading guilty to one count of sexual exploitation of a child.

Federal prosecutors said Wednesday they did not learn of the rape accusation until after Jungblom entered his plea. Eymann said the young woman did not discuss the rape accusations earlier because she was intimidated by Jungblom.

Jungblom is serving his sentence in an Arizona prison and was not available for comment.

The attorney who represented him in the criminal case, John T. Rodgers, said Jungblom would deny the allegations.

## Fotomat inventor dies

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — Preston Fleet, who founded Fotomat photo-developing and invented Omnimax film projection, has died. He was 60.

Fleet died of cancer Tuesday at a hospital near his central California home.





Fleet also was an aviator, an expert on theater organs, and author of a book, "Hue and Cry, Unraveling the Shakespeare Myth," contending that Shakespeare did not write the works attributed to him.

### Entire valley should share costs of supporting CSI

What if you could attend the University of Nevada at Reno or the Utah State or the University of Wyoming, or the University of Washington — and pay the same fees as residents of those states?

You'd call it a good deal. The taxpayers of those state would call their legislators.

But something much like that happens every day in the Magic Valley. The College of Southern Idaho and its state-of-the-art interactive technology are fast becoming the higher-education option of choice for working residents of Cassia, Gooding and Blaine counties.

What's wrong with that? Nothing, except that taxpayers of those three counties don't pay property taxes to support CSI.

The taxpayers of Twin Falls and Jerome counties do. In effect they subsidize the operations of CSI's satellite centers in Gooding, Hailley and Burley.

We think that's wrong, and we think it's time the state Legislature revisited the issue of who pays the bills for community colleges.

At CSI, it's a much bigger bill than it used to be.

Since the microwave system went on line in the Cassia County center in 1989, enrollment there has risen from 785 students to 1,775.

At the Blaine County center, it has gone from 162 to 227 in five years, and in Gooding County's Northside Center, from 184 to 223.

In 1989, CSI was educating 1,131 students in its three satellite centers; now the load is 1,907 — and growing by an average of 13 percent a year.

There's no differential in tuition and fees at CSI. A student in Burley pays the same as a student from Twin Falls, no matter how much it costs to educate him.

In addition to the student's tuition, the student's home county also gets a

bill from CSI — \$500 a year for a full-time student, or \$50 per credit hour for a part-time one. That's not enough to support the needs of a fast-growing college.

When CSI's two-county taxing district was created 30 years ago, it was possible for other Magic Valley counties to make the argument that the school was the "College of Twin Falls and Jerome counties." That's just not the case anymore.

More Cassia and Blaine county students are enrolled at CSI than at Idaho State University, Boise State University and the University of Idaho combined, according to a report by ISU's Center for Business and Research Services. In Gooding County, the figure is three-to-one.

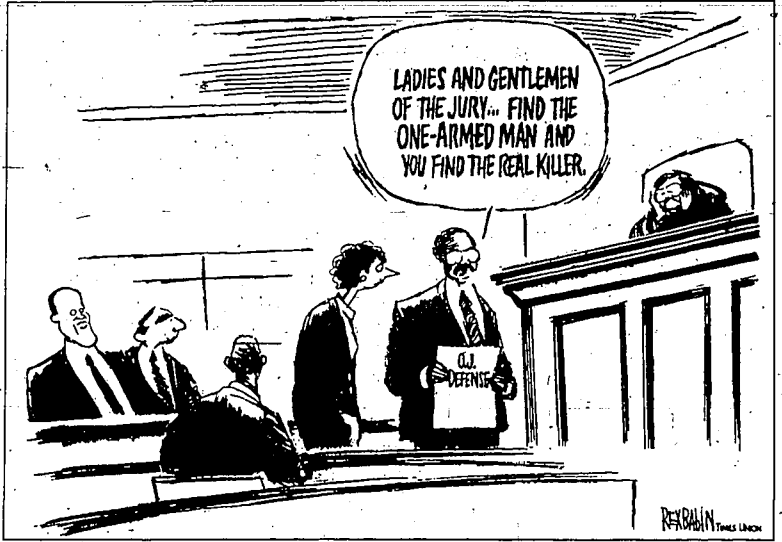
In effect, the residents of Twin Falls and Jerome counties are helping pay to set up a system allowing the rest of the Magic Valley to get an education without having to live in Twin Falls or Jerome counties.

CSI is rapidly becoming south-central Idaho's portal to higher education. Within a decade, it will likely be possible to get an array of four-year degrees using CSI's high-tech facilities — without having to leave Burley, Hailley or Gooding.

That's going to require more money, and a better financial foundation than the fee-per-student system that exists now.

Perhaps it's time to consider eliminating junior college taxing districts and funding the schools through the state — just as the universities are funded. Or perhaps students from out of town should be charged something close to the actual cost of their education.

Or maybe it's time for six of the eight Magic Valley counties to join the other two in paying CSI property taxes to educate their kids in the 21st century.

The animals in question are being used as scapegoats. Last year, you ignored public sentiment and proceeded to trap and butcher foxes, coyotes, skunks and feral cats. Their remains were sent to a Boise laboratory to determine whether or not any of them had been guilty of dining on pheasant. The answer was no. ### Will Sen. Craig respond?

The Idaho Conservation League wants to know what Sen. Larry Craig plans to do about managing livestock grazing on public land. In late December, he warned Interior Secretary Babbitt against pursuing range reform. Sen. Craig threatened to stop funding to implement new grazing regulations.

In response, Secretary Babbitt left grazing fee increases to Congress and delayed new regulations for six months. That leaves the ball in Craig's court.

Two years ago, Secretary Babbitt came west to begin discussing range reform. Many taxpayer dollars have been spent to hold meetings, write new regulations and analyze the environmental and economic effects of the new rules. That money and time will be wasted unless Sen. Craig acts quickly to address the problems pointed out by the Interior Department and public. If he does not, we face gridlock on this issue through lawsuits and appeals.

Grazing is a legitimate use of public lands where it does not cause negative impacts on outdoor recreation, water quality, fish and wildlife and biological diversity. To improve the condition of our public land, the ICL has advocated several changes in range management:

- Set scientifically sound, measurable, enforceable standards and guidelines.
- Federal land managers should be held accountable for attaining identified goals for the land and meeting standards for each grazing allotment.
- When ranchers exceed pre-determined use levels without moving cattle, they should face consequences to deter future overgrazing.

- The public should be involved in grazing allotment decision-making.
- Some rangelands, like some timberlands, should be identified as off limits for grazing because of their fragility or recreational or historical values.

- Grazing fees must pay for administering the grazing program.

Secretary Babbitt's plan, stymied by Sen. Craig, meets some of these goals but hardly threatens livestock grazing. After 20 years, Babbitt's plan would cut public land livestock forage by just 3 percent.

Now is the time for Sen. Craig to tell Idahoans how he proposes to take care of watersheds, riparian areas, species diversity, range health, subsidies and recreation use on public lands. The ICL wants to be part of that effort.

### Church, school work together

Recently, The Times-News ran an article regarding the Magic Valley Alternative High School and its present resting place at the First Presbyterian Church. I would like to clarify the situation to correct any inaccurate impressions.

The relationship between MVAHS and the church is strong. Our second-hand "Scotch Shop" gives away clothing to the students and their children. Ten MVAHS students received up to \$100 worth of

Christmas gifts, including vouchers for gas and food. The church aids in sponsoring a MVAHS graduate in college. This year, we will again solicit students to apply for our church-sponsored scholarships. I and one other church member eagerly serve on the advisory board of MVAHS. Just recently, church members and I met with school officials to explore how we can further help students reach their goals.

Over the past five years, the church has increasingly made its facilities available to the school far greater than its initial occupation of our dining room, kitchen and three classrooms. Monday through Friday, students, teachers, counselors and administrators occupy all three of our buildings, rendering education and services in our dining room, kitchen, stage area, gym and eight classrooms. School materials are stored in a number of closets. Upon arrangements, school-related functions are allowed to use our library, Fireside Lounge and sanctuary.

Contrary to the lead sentence in the Jan. 21 article, MVAHS is not in danger of being "forced to move out" of our facilities. However, given the fact that the school has grown more than 10 times in enrollment since its inception and now has been operating five years, it is clear that the MVAHS is far beyond just a pilot project but rather it is and will be a necessary component in the ongoing educational program of the Magic Valley area.

## Receding waters pose new threat

TIEL, Netherlands (AP) — Flooded rivers subsided Thursday but a new enemy gnawed at the weakened, ancient structures that keep much of this country dry: swift currents that threatened to gouge the dikes.

The latest problem is not high water, but the speed with which river levels are dropping in the southeastern Netherlands.

"It's a real danger," regional Dike-master Jan Boer told reporters. "When the waters decline, when the pressure disappears, there's a chance dikes will begin to float and shift. The whole dike can be torn open."

Evacuated areas in the Gelderland and Limburg provinces remained off-limits to the public Thursday. Mayor Ed d'Hondt of Nijmegen, the largest city in the region, said the area's 250,000 residents who fled would not be able to return to their homes until at least Saturday.

With tens of thousands of homes empty, police are increasingly concerned about looting. A few instances have already been reported.

The level of the Waal River continued to sink, but officials cautioned that the crisis was not over until 300 miles of dikes were out of danger.

The Dutch are bearing the brunt of last week's storms and flooding across northwestern Europe that was caused by a combination of heavy Alpine snows, early melting and heavy rains. At least 29 people have died as a result.

For the second day, Queen Beatrix, 57, toured the stricken areas, chatting with soldiers who shored up a crumbling section of dike along the Waal River in the town of Ochten.

Officials were closely monitoring the level of the Rhine River at the Dutch town of Lobith, near where it flows into the Waal. That point is considered a yardstick of water levels.

The Waal was expected to drop 16 inches on Friday, 28 inches on Saturday and 17 inches on Sunday.

The water level in Lobith usually ranges between 39.6 and 42.9 feet above an arbitrary national standard — the Normal Amsterdam Level.

On Thursday, it stood at 54.1 feet — more than 11 feet

above the town's normal high. Earlier this week, water levels hit a record 55 feet.

Emergency workers in Ochten watched warily over a half-mile of weak and sodden dike repaired Thursday morning after an all-night operation involving soldiers, divers and 30 boats.

"We still do not have a guarantee that the dike will hold," said Mayor Henric Jan Zomerdijk. "As long as the water keeps up its high level, we have a critical situation."

Another thousand dump trucks loaded with sand arrived Thursday to reinforce the dike that looms 33 feet high on the edge of Tiel, a town of 33,000.

The last of Tiel's residents evacuated Thursday under threat of fines and jail if they stayed. Many left reluctantly.

"Fear of the water just doesn't help around here," said Johannes Serbee, who lived through the floods of 1926 and 1953.

## Cuban refugees return to base with hopes of entrance to U.S.

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — Still hopeful of entering the United States, 500 Cuban refugees were forcibly returned Thursday to the homeland they fled last summer.

One man carried an American flag high above his head as he boarded a charter flight from Panama City to the U.S. Naval Base at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. Others smiled and waved at reporters or flashed the "V" for victory sign.

The refugees were more upbeat than the first group flown to Guantanamo on Wednesday. More and more, the refugees are becoming convinced their stay at the base on Cuba's eastern tip will be temporary.

"We are a problem that will not go away," psychiatrist Rodolfo Quintero Arcencibia, 45, said Wednesday, the eve of his forced return to Guantanamo.

"They cannot keep us behind barbed wire forever, they cannot shoot us and they cannot turn us over to Fidel Castro," he said.

Since September, nearly 8,500 Cubans who fled their country on rickety rafts and inner tubes have stayed at camps on the banks of the Panama Canal surrounded by concertina wire. They were transferred from Guantanamo Bay because of overcrowding there.

Panama only agreed to allow the Cubans to stay until March 6, so the United States began flying them back to its military base in Cuba on Wednesday.

Many returnees say conditions are poor at Guantanamo, which is American soil and held 20,402 Cubans on Tuesday. But Marine Gen. Raymond Ayres said facilities have improved substantially since September.

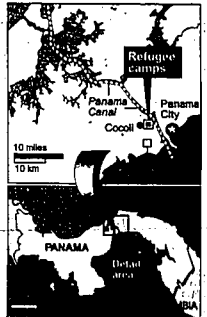

floors have been built, each with space for 16 to 23 people. An additional 1,400 tents will go up by April, he said.

"My planning is that we will do this indefinitely," Ayres said.

But back in Panama, refugees say they believe the situation will be temporary.

"The truth is that we accept this because we know that, sooner or later, we will be accepted in the United States or in other countries," Quintero said. "That's what's keeping our hopes high."

"I think the policies of the United States will change within six months," said Noel Soto Barro, a 29-year-old refrigerator repairman, on the eve of his return Thursday.

After thousands of Cubans fled to Miami in August, President Clinton abandoned the longstanding U.S. policy of accepting almost all Cuban refugees and declared illegal Cuban immigrants persona non grata.

Previously they were turned over to friends, relatives or support groups.

## Bomb kills husband, wife in southern Lebanon

MARJAYOUN, Lebanon (AP) — A roadside, remote-controlled bomb exploded in south Lebanon on Thursday as a vehicle drove by, killing a civilian man and his wife.

No one immediately claimed responsibility for the attack, which bore the hallmarks of guerrillas fighting Israeli forces in south Lebanon. It was not known if the couple had been targeted.

The bomb went off near the Christian town of Jezzine at 1:15 p.m. as Camille Helou and his wife drove by in a white Mercedes-Benz sedan, security sources said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Jezzine and its surroundings are controlled by the South Lebanon Army, a 2,500-member militia armed and paid by Israel to help 1,200 Israeli troops patrol its

enclave in south Lebanon.

Another civilian was wounded in Israeli retaliatory shelling in the village of Majdal Salim facing the central sector of the enclave, the sources said.

Elsewhere in south Lebanon, Iranian-backed guerrillas fired missiles at Israeli helicopter-gunships but missed, the security sources said.

## Carter, others among Nobel nominees

OSLO, Norway (AP) — Former President Jimmy Carter and Chinese dissident Wei Jingsheng are among the nominees for this year's Nobel Peace Prize, Norwegian media said Thursday.

They and several others, including a Russian human rights campaigner and an imprisoned Kurdish politician, have been reported among the many nominations received by the Nobel Peace Prize committee.

The Nobel committee does not reveal the names, only the number of nominations. It said it would have a final count next week, after receiving all submissions.

According to Norwegian media, members of the Danish parliament dominated Wei Jingsheng for his pro-democracy efforts in China. He is in jail in China.

Carter was nominated for helping defuse a nuclear crisis in North Korea and mediating before the U.S. military intervention in Haiti last year.

According to the Oslo newspaper Verdens Gang, Russian President Boris Yeltsin's human rights advisor, Sergei Kovalyov, was nominated for his outspoken criticism of the Russian assault on the separatist republic of Chechnya.

Leyla Zana, serving a 15-year sentence in Turkey on charges of aiding a Kurdish guerrilla organization, was nominated by a group of Norwegian lawmakers, the paper said. She was a member of Turkey's parliament representing a pro-Kurdish party until she was arrested in March and her party banned.

**Japan opens wallets**

**TOKYO (AP)** — Japanese, usually reluctant to help strangers, have given hundreds of millions of dollars to those left homeless by the devastating Kobe earthquake.

Japan's Red Cross Society said Thursday it has received \$300 million dollars in donations, far more than in any of its previous relief campaigns. It estimated more than 90 percent of the money came from Japanese.

Local officials, meanwhile, increased their estimates of the damage from the 7.2 magnitude quake and said it is likely to exceed \$100 billion.

Nearly 250,000 people lost their homes in the Jan. 17 quake, which killed 5,104 people, with six still listed as missing.

The national government, criticized for what many consider insufficient efforts to help quake victims, said Thursday it would spend almost \$150 million to build 30,000 temporary housing units.

The first four prefab houses have been completed and families moved in Thursday.

"It was wonderful. It was too good for me," Kimiko Ishibitsu, 70, said of her new two-room home on hard-hit Awaji Island.

Many people will have to spend two to three more months in shelters such as tents and converted school gymnasiums before housing is available, said Runko Kadonaga of the government of Hyogo prefecture, which includes Kobe.

"We are very concerned whether volunteers can continue their activities for that long," she said. "We can't estimate how many volunteers are working in the quake-stricken areas. It might be 50,000 or 100,000."

In normal times, Japanese are reluctant to help people who aren't family, friends or close neighbors. They also may be reluctant to accept gifts for fear of becoming obligated to the giver.

But the quake in Kobe, a city of 1.4 million people 270 miles west of Tokyo, has brought out charitable impulses throughout the nation.

**Tablets hold key to Alexander's grave**

**SIWA, Egypt (AP)** — Sheltered by pink and white cliffs at a lonely oasis, the body of Alexander the Great has apparently rested here for more than two millennia, entombed in a crumbling heap seen only by village farmers.

It hardly looks fit for a king.

An hour's drive from the Libyan border, the supposed tomb sits atop a desolate hill amid a timeless sea of sand. Below are date palms and olive trees, scrubby grass and white cinder-block huts that house families who till fields fed by Siwa's oasis.

A Greek archaeological team excavating here says they've found the answer to the riddle of what happened to the ancient world's greatest conqueror after he died at age 33.

Alexander's tomb is in Siwa, they say, where the famous oracle of Amun told him he was divine; where the superstitious conqueror sent gifts from his victories, and where he supposedly gave orders that he be buried.

"We are sure," Liana Souvaltzi, head of the team, told reporters Thursday.

"We have a unique monument. There is no such monument in all of Egypt, not even Greece. It is royalty, it is really Macedonian."

Alexander died in Babylon in central Iraq in 323 B.C.

Contemporary accounts say a funeral procession set out with his body in a magnificent funeral cart. It was met in Palestine by Ptolemy, his successor and lieutenant in Egypt.

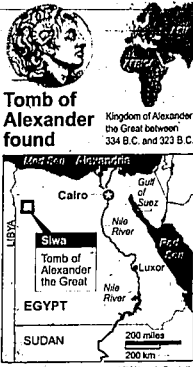
One version has it that the body was interred in Alexandria, the Mediterranean port that Alexander founded. But the team that has been digging in Siwa since 1989 says it was in this oasis in the Western Desert.

"I never in my life believed that Alexander was buried in Alexandria," the 47-year-old Souvaltzi said, standing near the two-tomb site.

"He wanted to be buried in Siwa. Here we have the proof."

The team has found carved oak leaves worn in the crowns of Macedonian kings and an engraved eight-pointed star — Alexander's own symbol.

But Souvaltzi said the key finds are three broken limestone tablets written in Greek, which were

unearthed in front of the tomb's gate at a depth of about 3 yards.

One was written by Ptolemy. A smaller tablet was commissioned by the Roman emperor Trajan, who visited the site centuries later, and another fragment is of unknown date and authorship.

The tablet of Ptolemy says he brought to Siwa his master's body, "which was so light." That suggests the corpse was mummified — a process that extracts 50 percent of the body's weight.

Finding the tablets last week amazed even Souvaltzi. "At that moment I was shocked. I was not able to laugh or to cry. I was looking at myself as another person," she said.

"I am really dizzy, still dizzy. We have written proof from the past."

The archaeological team began digging out a tunnel they believe leads to the burial chamber. Seeping water has forced the team to temporarily stop digging, but they expect to resume after the Muslim holy month of Ramadan, which began Wednesday.

"Of course we'll find the body," Souvaltzi said. "In what condition we'll find the body after so many thousands of years, I cannot say."

Two tombs stand about 50 yards apart. The larger, more ornate chamber — about 50 yards long and 10 yards wide — was meant as a decoy. The other tomb — about

20 yards long and 10 yards wide — had two rooms built of large stones about 10 yards high.

One of the tomb fragments describes Siwa as a city of 500,000. Today it is a town of 10,000 that is abuzz with word of the find.

"People are talking about it, but I haven't been there," said Idrif Abdel-Rahim, a farmer. "It's a great thing — history, more than 2,000 years of history."

Another man, standing near him at a garage in the town square, smiled and said, "Everyone wants to come see Alexander."

Alexander led his armies out of Greece in 334 B.C., winning battle after battle to create a realm that

stretched across Asia Minor. When he died, he had spread Greek culture through much of the known world.

**Vietnam calls for economic diversity**

**HANOI, Vietnam** — Marking the 65th anniversary of the Communist Party's founding, Vietnam's senior leader called Thursday for involving non-communists and expatriate Vietnamese in the country's economic development drive.

The Communist Party must also cleanse its ranks of corrupt officials who threaten to shake popular faith in the party, Secretary-General Do Muoi told about 600 people gathered to celebrate the party's founding on Feb. 3, 1930 in Hong Kong.

The Communists came to power in North Vietnam in 1954 as the Vietnam Workers' Party, after Communist-led troops won independence from the French. The party extended its control to South Vietnam in 1975.

**Judge refuses to impose death sentence**

**MANILA, Philippines** — Citing his Christian beliefs, a judge refused to follow the law and sentence two men to death for raping and murdering a 7-year-old girl.

Now the girl's family is outraged, congressmen want him fired, and Communist rebels are threatening to kill him.

On Tuesday, Judge Lorenzo Veneracion of the Manila Regional Trial Court found Ernesto Cordero and Henry Lagarto guilty of raping, torturing and murdering Angel Alquiza last August.

Under a January 1994 law, the death penalty is mandatory in rape cases in which the victim is slain. Veneracion, however, sentenced Cordero and Lagarto to life in prison.

**Actor Donald Pleasence dies at 75**

**LONDON** — He was the malodorous tramp in Harold Pinter's "The Caretaker," the fiendish doctor in the "Halloween" slasher movies, the villain Blofeld who battled James Bond.

Donald Pleasence, who made memorable a wide variety of odd, sinister characters, died Thursday at the age of 75.

His agent Tess Sutherland said Pleasence, who had a heart valve operation in December, died at home in the southern French town of St. Paul de Vençe.

Pleasence began his dramatic life on the stage, later building a solid screen career with nearly 100 film roles and dozens of television productions.

**South Africa proposes right to strike**

**JOHANNESBURG, South Africa** — The government of President Nelson Mandela proposed legalizing strikes Thursday — but only after workers and their bosses have tried to settle their differences at the bargaining table.

The bill, drafted by labor law experts in a spirit of openness praised by union and business leaders, is an effort to carry forward reforms in South Africa.

But it could also curb increasingly violent labor unrest because it allows walkouts only when arbitration fails. To that end it sets up a government-funded commission to mediate all disputes — in the private as well as the public sector.

## Council open about closed-door talks

### MICRON

TWIN FALLS — When they meet behind closed doors this morning, city councilmen probably will decide what they will and will not sacrifice in a regional effort to recruit Micron Technology Inc.

But any talk of changing the region's proposal — or outright withdrawing it — is premature, says the city's economic development director, Dave McAlindin.

"We don't call that shot," McAlindin said. "They do. We're just going to wait

until we hear from them and see if we have that opportunity."

Boise-based Micron proposes to build a \$1.3 billion computer-chip factory, employing 3,500 people. The computer giant has pared the list of potential sites down from about 300 to 13. The Magic Valley's competitors include Boise, Nampa and Coeur d'Alene, as well as sites scattered across the

Northwest and Midwest.

Twin Falls city leaders are backing a potential factory site near the Hansen Bridge in an unincorporated section of Twin Falls County. A site just north of the city at Jerome County's Crossroads Ranch development also is on Micron's short-list.

A final decision is expected within a month.

"Throughout this process we have been working on Micron's timeline," McAlindin said. "We'll have to just wait for the phone to ring and see if Micron calls."

Councilmen told *The Times-News* in

separate interviews Thursday that they are concerned about the costs to taxpayers for improvements to the local infrastructure. They also said that if Micron is serious about expanding in the Magic Valley, then the city will need to be serious about negotiating with the company to hammer out a deal that local residents can live with.

### Program aims to fill spot left open by illegal aliens

TWIN FALLS — The U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service has started a pilot program called "Operation Jobs," which will help employers fill the jobs vacated by the arrest of illegal aliens by using local community employment agencies, according to a news release.

If they desire, employers can be provided with a source of lawful workers from a pool of agencies, including local social service agencies, welfare programs, refugee placement organizations and state employment commissions.

Employers are required to verify that all of their workers are legal. Anyone who knowingly hires illegal workers can be fined.

### Tax credit helps ease burden of developmental disabilities

BOISE — The 1994 state Legislature passed a law allowing an Idaho income tax credit for individuals and families with members who have developmental disabilities.

A \$100 credit may be claimed for each household member with a developmental disability. Each taxpayer filing the return may claim a \$100 credit, for himself, if he has a developmental disability and is not already claimed on someone else's tax return. A maximum credit of \$300 is allowed.

The credit is claimed on Line 64 of Idaho Form 40. In addition, the taxpayer claiming the credit must fill out an Idaho Supplemental Schedule, Form 39, Part 1, Section E, which asks for information on the persons being claimed.

State Tax Commissioner Anne Barker said it's important to note that single taxpayers who have a developmental disability may claim the credit on their own behalf.

## Twin Falls student struggles with cancer, dreams of basketball

TWIN FALLS — Dozens of students greet Sean Miller, a thin boy in baggy clothes and a baseball cap, as he walks through O'Leary Junior High School's halls.

"Hey, Sean," they say. "Welcome back."

Sean, an eighth-grader, returned to school this week after a two-month absence caused by cancer.

In 1993, as a seventh-grader he was eager to join the school basketball team. But he started throwing up and his legs and arms started aching.

His parents, after bringing him to several doctors, found out he had a rare kind of cancer: rhabdo myo sarcoma, which kills 75 percent of people who get it within five years.

"For him, it was a relief to find out what it was," said his mother, Julie Miller. "When they finally diagnosed it, for us it was devastating. We kept thinking it was something viral, a flu thing."

"He was real sick," she added. "He'd gotten down to 89 pounds." In one month, he lost 20 pounds.

Because of the tumor, Sean has to eat cream and other high-fat foods to keep his weight up. The whole family now shares his eating habits, his mother said, laughing.

"We sacrifice, our figures for Sean," she said.

Sean said he misses playing sports. He

started shooting basketballs in second grade and went through physical therapy last fall so he could join the school basketball team. His older brother, a high school senior, plays on the varsity team. Basketball has always been a bond between the two.

But before he could try out for the team, he had a relapse — doctors found a tumor in his kidney.

Since the first diagnosis, his school

attendance has been spotty. He didn't go at all in seventh grade and only three months this year. Now he'll limit his schooling to morning classes one day and afternoon classes the next.

"I got really tired," he said.

Sean is very sick, said his pediatrician, Dr. Bart Adrian. Any improvement after a bone-marrow transplant last fall halted after the new tumor was discovered. There's no way to remove this tumor, Adrian said.

"When Sean first got sick and we were talking about chemotherapy, they were talking about his playing organized basketball," Adrian said. "I think they were surprised by how much chemotherapy becomes your whole life. It takes all your

time, all your energy, all your resources."

Sean studied at home between treatments at the Pediatric Center in Twin Falls and at a hospital in Salt Lake City.

Julie Miller, a teacher, worked with her son when he was well enough to study. She picked up his homework from school and coordinated his studies with the rest of his class.

Curtis Asay, Sean's government teacher, said he's not worried about Sean keeping up.

"He's so smart. He'll be the first one done with this paper," Asay said, about a paper he'd just assigned. "He knows everything. When I ask a question, the kids know Sean is going to answer it."

Asay said he saw Sean fall playing basketball not long ago and slowly get up. He worries that the boy will take on too much, and that school will be too stressful.

"But that's the way he is," Asay said. "Go for the gold. I think it's good for him to get out and see his friends."

Sean said not much changed during his absence. "Everyone still talks to me like they always did," he said.

Classmate J.D. Covington said it's exciting to see him back in school. Covington sent Sean several cards when he was in Salt Lake City.

Sean's illness has brought the reality of cancer a little closer to this classmate.

"I'm afraid to get cancer," Covington said. "I don't want to die of cancer."

## Financing benefits from fewer students

TWIN FALLS — School administrators rest easy for the rest of this school year — there's enough money to pay the bills.

Schools were facing a potential \$10 million shortfall in education funding, and a nearly 75 percent cut in spending on students. That would have created a crisis for small school districts, Kimberly School District Superintendent John Garner said.

But figures released Thursday show that 2,300 students fewer than expected are attending school in Idaho. And that means money earmarked for this school year will be spread over a smaller area, only a \$4 million shortfall.

The shortfall will "definitely have an affect, but it's something we can accommodate as opposed what we were worried about," Kimberly School Board member Jim Wright said.

His district will have enough money now

for teachers' salaries and more money for supplies and maintenance. Big-ticket items, like building up the reserve account and enhancing technology will take a hit, he said.

An accountant instructed the district to raise its reserve funds by 5 percent to cover crises like a major mechanical failure or a furnace breakdown. If they lost a bus and a furnace at the same time, they might not be able to pay for it, Wright said.

"Sometimes there are unanticipated expenses that we need to cover," he said.

Twin Falls School District Superintendent Terrell Donich said the new numbers paint a much more optimistic picture for the rest of this school year.

"We had projected losing, based on the original figures we had, about \$400,000 or \$500,000," he said. "Now, it would be \$100,000 or \$200,000 at the most."

More likely, he said, it'll only be \$30,000. Spread throughout the district, that won't be a hardship, he said.

"Unless some catastrophe occurs between now and the end of the school year we'll be okay," he added.

Wright said every bit added or taken away matters to his district, because most of their money is tied up in teachers' and administrators' salaries, giving the district less control over spending.

He suggested that the state step in and grant a supplemental \$4 million to the schools.

But Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, said that's unlikely. The only way it could be done is as an emergency measure, he said.

"Much of the shortfall was the result of an error in calculating teachers' salaries. The state granted a salary increase for each educational credit a teacher had, and miscalculated the amount of additional training a teacher may have gotten, he said.

Wright said that error shouldn't come out of the districts' pocket. "It wasn't our fault that they miscalculated. I don't think we should be the ones to pick up the slack."

## Brady Law stops 25 gun sales a week

TWIN FALLS — For the past year, the state's enforcement of the federal Brady Law seems to have kept handguns out of the hands of some felons.

Last year, an average of 25 people were kept from buying handguns each week in Idaho, altogether, 1,078 people were refused handguns at licensed gun dealerships, according to statistics from the Idaho Bureau of Criminal Identification.

But local gun dealers say the law, which became effective Feb. 28, 1994, has some problems.

The law requires licensed gun dealers to telephone the Idaho Bureau of Criminal Identification toll free and have state officials perform criminal background checks when someone wants to buy a handgun.

Some police say they haven't seen any decrease in the number of crimes committed with handguns.

"I have seen no evidence that it works," said Sgt. Bill McDaniel of the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Department. "It just deters criminals from going to licensed gun dealers. That doesn't stop them from buying guns on the streets or from a private person."

"We need more prisons and tougher actions by the courts," McDaniel added.

As of Sunday, 32,176 background checks were made since the law became effective, said Lonnie Gray, criminal records section supervisor, Idaho Bureau of Criminal Identification.

State officials tell dealers to refuse handgun sales to anyone who has:

- One or more felony convictions.
  - An pending arrest warrant for a felony or a misdemeanor.
  - A civil-protection order pending.
- There is no five-day waiting period in Idaho, Gray said, although the federal law allows states to take that long for the background checks.

State officials conducted 29,964 background checks in 1994 and ended up telling

## Accident victim better a day later

HOLLISTER — A Nevada woman was recovering from injuries Thursday after a two-car accident Wednesday which killed her mother but spared her two toddlers.

Glenis Robledo, 27, of Jackpot, is improving, having been upgraded to serious condition from critical at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, a nursing supervisor said Thursday morning.

Thursday afternoon, Robledo, whose pelvis was fractured in the crash, was taken, by ambulance to the University of Utah hospital, said Cpl. Jerry Kurz of the Idaho State Police.

Joann Spolin, 53, of Jackpot, was killed instantly after being thrown through the windshield of Robledo's car on U.S. Highway 93 in Hollister. Neither the mother nor daughter was wearing seat belts, except for Robledo's children, Patricia, 1, and Ryan, 2, who were in child restraint seats, Kurz said.

"The children were just fine, they were both right there waving to the ambulance (taking Robledo to Utah) with uncles, aunts and relatives," Kurz said.

The driver of the other car, Thomas C. Stacey, 42, of Las Vegas, Nev., said Robledo made an abrupt left turn in front of him, and he crashed into her, Kurz said.

Stacey and his 16-year-old son, David, were only slightly hurt. His 17-year-old son, Seville, recalled 34 feet upon impact with Robledo's small Spectra. Spolin's body was found 43 feet from where the cars had hit each other, Kurz said.

# Buhl Natural Helpers plan health seminar

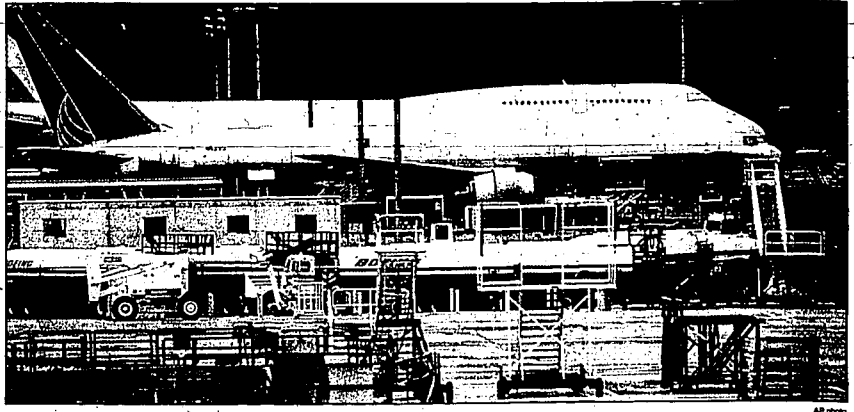
Last spring, the Natural Helpers surveyed the students to find out their concerns. The areas of most concern were for drug and alcohol use by students and the students' lack of discipline and respect. These issues are among the topics that will be covered in the seminar.

Other topics include tobacco use, accidents, date rape, eating disorders, steroids use, juvenile justice, and possibly a presentation on AIDS. The presenters will be health professionals from the Magic Valley region.

The seminar will be structured so that students and their parents will be able to attend all sessions.

The board also heard a report by Blake Walsh on district special education. The district is now using a team of special education teachers in each building to evaluate children that have been made a focus of concern, he explained. A district focus for special education is the smooth progress of children with special needs from one level to another, and eventually into the work force. Walsh explained that the district is attempting to "normalize" children with special needs by including them in regular classrooms. This special education model is controversial, Walsh said.

In other business, the school board met February 20 for a special board meeting to choose a structural analysis contractor. The board also approved a survey that will be mailed to district patrons later this month. The results of the survey will be used to prepare the next school bond levy. The survey was written by a group of volunteers.

# Soft market prompts Boeing cuts

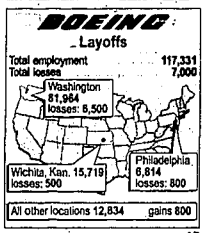
**SEATTLE** — The Boeing Co. will cut 7,000 jobs this year as it trims production from 19.5 planes per month to 16.5 by December. Most of the job cuts will be in Washington state.

That's the bottom line for the company's plan to cope with a continuing soft commercial aircraft market that prompted four airlines to cancel or delay orders in the past week.

"These job reductions are higher than we anticipated just a few weeks ago," Frank Shrontz, Boeing chairman and chief executive officer, acknowledged Thursday.

About 6,500 jobs will be cut in Washington state as Boeing trims production on the 737 and 767 aircraft. Most of the work on those models is done at Boeing's Renton (737) and Everett (767) plants.

Boeing is also trimming 500 jobs in Wichita, Kan., where parts for the jetliners are made, and 800 jobs at the Helicopters division in Philadelphia. About 800 jobs will be



Washington already had been notified, and the notices are continuing, a spokesman said.

The cuts mean Boeing will likely never again employ more than 100,000 workers in this area as it did in the 1980s. Boeing's statewide employment dropped to 87,106 on Jan. 1, down from more than 106,000 at the beginning of 1990.

Engineers and technical workers, many of whom are members of the Seattle Professional Engineering Employees Association, the second-largest unit affiliated with the company, may take a greater hit than in the previous three years of layoffs.

Fewer engineers are needed for the 777 now that it is in production, and staffing for new 737 programs already is in place.

"No department will be bullet-proof," a company source said.

Boeing said that 1995 production by model will be revised this way:

- 737: Now at 8.5 per month, to be reduced to 7 in November.
- 747: Remains at 2 until the second

half of 1996, when it increases to 3.

• 757: Remains at 4 per month. • 767: Now at 3 per month, to be increased to 4 in April, and then decreased to 3.5 in December. Boeing has not announced a production rate for the new 777 that is being prepared for delivery in May to United Airlines.

The company expects to deliver 230 airplanes this year, down from 270 in 1993.

The production decisions were forged in a Renton, Wash., conference room Wednesday by top leaders of Boeing Commercial Airplane Group, led by President Ron Woodard. Others in the group include Alan Mulally, senior vice president of engineering and new product development; Richard Albrecht, executive vice president for sales and marketing; Robert Dryden, executive vice president, airplane products; Tom Schick, senior vice president, airplane support, and Fred Howard, senior vice president, business resources.

# Idaho delegation calls for leadership from O'Leary

Idaho's U.S. senators and its senior congressman want Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary to lead the way toward a solution to the nation's nuclear waste problem leaning less heavily on Idaho.

Republican Sens. Larry Craig and Dirk Kempthorne and Congressman Michael Cripps met for about an hour on Thursday with Assistant Energy Secretary Thomas Grumbleby for what Craig called "a very blunt and direct" discussion.

The lawmakers later said they made it clear Idaho rejects the Energy Department's tentative decision to consolidate all government waste at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, the Savannah River Site in South Carolina and Washington's Hanford Nuclear Reservation.

A final decision on making that scheme the government's preferred for nuclear waste disposal options will not be made until spring, but a department spokesman said O'Leary was all but certain to do it.

"During the course of this meeting, it became painfully clear that the United States has no long-term solution for nuclear waste," Kempthorne said. "And we made it painfully clear to the Department of Energy that the state of Idaho is not going to be that solution."

GOP Gov. Phil Batt said on Wednesday that during a visit to Washington, D.C., early this week he made it clear to federal officials that "we have a groundswell, in fact an intolerable situation in Idaho where we will not idly sit by and let a lot of this nuclear waste come in without protest."

**SEATTLE (AP)** — A new Boeing 777 jetliner on a test flight made a safe emergency landing Thursday after suddenly losing altitude. Four injuries were reported.

had no immediate comment. There was no immediate word how many people were on the plane.

Two Boeing employees, a flight engineer and a flight analyst, were in stable condition at Harborview Medical Center.

commercial gun dealers they cannot sell handguns to about 3.6 percent of the applicants, according to agency statistics.

Out of 553 potential handgun buyers so far in 1995, the weekly average is 17 refusals, agency statistics showed.

Twin Falls gun dealers said they've refused to sell handguns to several people since the law went into effect. Some people were refused because of flaws in the criminal-background check, and later were able to buy handguns, they said.

"That has happened twice or three times," said Jack Clough, owner of Rick's Pawn Shop. For the first four months of the law, gun sales at his shop dropped 65 percent, he said. Many people mistakenly thought they would have to fill out a handgun form with personal information that the state would keep track of, he said.

Rupert, the owner of Hunt's Hunting Supplies and Gun Repair, said he has refused three people in the past year — and two of them contested the refusal with the state and were reinstated.

"One person was arrested on a (drunken-driving charge) three years ago, and was charged but wasn't convicted," Hunt said. "With the other person, it turned out to be a case of mistaken identity. There was some criminal out there with the same name."

On Sept. 13, the Brady Law was changed to exempt background checks of potential handgun buyers who pawned their own guns at pawn shops and were later unable to repurchase them because of outstanding warrants for their arrest.

Since the exemption, the telephone calls went down about 13 percent, Gray said.

to see what the company can offer Twin Falls, as well as that the city can afford to offer the company.

"The time has come to get our oars in the water and see where we're going to go,"

**Councilman Lance Clow**: "I look at this as being a courtship. Somebody called up and said they wanted a date — 260 responded."

Now that Micron has winnowed the list to 13, the company is asking more questions of its suitors to find out who it wants to marry.

He also thinks the city should be cautious and professional in taking its stance on Micron. "When we say 'No' to them, we may be saying 'No' to any potential 500-employee, 1,000-job company."

**Councilman Tom Condie**: "How can we get tax dollars from Micron coming in, and at the same time, giving the advantages of some of the programs that encourage that kind of business to locate here."

Those tasks might seem incompatible.

**Vice Mayor Art Frantz**: He agrees that the city should find out what Micron is willing to do to help the region's infrastructure adapt to the growth the company would foster.

"I don't think any entitlement we can give them ... I don't think that's going to influence them one iota."

The city might want to reposition or move the proposed site inside the city limits. "That would be a tremendous benefit to the city in

terms of tax revenues."

**Councilman Jeff Gooding**: The city's fiscal analysis should show people that the costs will be high to improve local roads, schools and other services, regardless of Micron's decision.

"I'm getting the message that, 'Yes, we understand, but no, we don't want to pay for it.'"

The city needs to proceed as if Micron is serious about locating in the Magic Valley until the company says otherwise.

**Mayor Gale Kleinkopf**: The council could make no decision until it makes the company's final list of three or four sites, or the council could try to renegotiate its proposal to make it a better business deal for the city.

Any deal must address the city's fiscal analysis, which shows heavy costs for city residents even if Micron doesn't get any tax incentives from the city.

"I think it's time that we get serious about it."

**Councilman Chris Talkington**: The major points he sees to be reconciled are wages, jobs, taxes, schools and growth.

He opposes tax-increment financing or annexations to help Micron move in because neither will help alleviate the problems of providing city services without severely taxing residents.

"It's time for us to get face-to-face with Micron and say, 'What are your considerations?'"

## Cassia schools plan for major revisions

**BURLEY** — A regional center for technical training will be housed in the Burley High School if voters approve Cassia County School District's \$21.9 million bond proposal in March.

The center would cost \$900,000 of the bond money, according to district plans, and would pay for a new automotive shop and remodeling on other technical programs, including College of Southern Idaho classes, also could be housed in the nearly 40-year-old building.

Other funds would be used to build a high school in Burley and one in Declo and to upgrade the Oakley and Raft River senior highs. The \$21.9 million would be repaid over 20 years at an estimated 6.65 interest rate, according to the school district.

Technical programs offered at the regional center would be automotive service, construction, electronics, welding and manufacturing, and health occupations. Future curricula may include culinary arts, tourism, travel and graphic arts.

"We're looking for something that will enhance educational offerings for young people," Superintendent Everett Howard said.

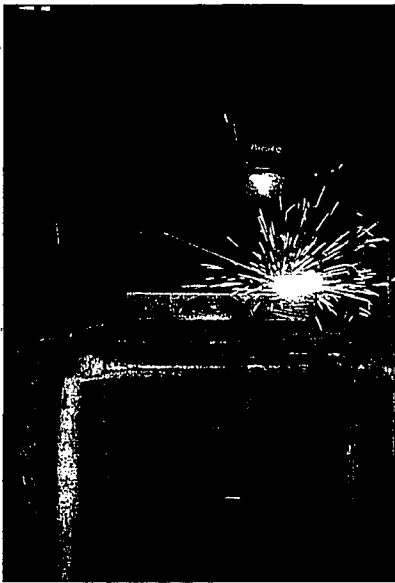
Funding for equipment is something the district will deal with if the bond issue passes, Howard said. The district would look toward grants and donations for funds, he said.

The Regional Education Technical Center would be open to juniors and seniors in the district's four high schools. The center also would be open to students throughout the Magic Valley, but schools would need to pay their tuition, Howard said.

Students would be able to earn college credit at the center through the College of Southern Idaho, and have enough credits built up to earn a two-year college degree in one and a half years, Howard said.

Ag instructor Gaylen Smyer, who is the district's vocational program director, said a technical center is needed to provide more space, smaller classes and up-to-date equipment.

"We're getting by and doing well, but I think we can produce a more capable product were we

right in line," he said, noting that students are the school's product. Out-dated welders, six to share among 20 students, still work, Smyer said, but they are not what a graduate will encounter in the work force.

"It's not helping a student become confident with what he or she might find in industry," he said.

Smyer sees the center as a way to keep students excited about learning. Only students meeting prerequisites will be allowed to enroll in the courses, he said. Prerequisites would include math courses, necessary for students to design projects, Smyer said.

In welding classes, students design things like cattle guards,

cattle feeders or vehicle trailers, he said, and noted that students have won national awards for their work.

Students could choose to come for specialized training and, what started as a program to prepare for a job after high school, could lead a student to a four year degree, Smyer said.

"As you build more knowledge and skill, there are more options available to you," he said, noting that career counseling also would be available to students so they know what types of jobs are waiting for them.

"We're hoping they can reach their potential. We don't want their education to be the limiting factor," he said.

## Man faces attempted murder charge

**BURLEY** — A Hazelton man, who police say shot a man out of jealousy Sunday evening, was arraigned in Cassia County Thursday on charges of attempted murder.

Kerry Moncur, 27, has been charged with trying to kill Jonathan Dale Reed, 24, of Hansen, according to the criminal complaint filed against him. Reed was not critically injured, investigators said earlier this week.

Moncur's preliminary hearing in Fifth District Magistrate Court has been set for Feb. 16, when it will be decided whether enough evidence exists to try him for a felony in district court.

Investigators say Moncur shot

Reed twice in the lower left rib cage with a .44-caliber Magnum, because he believed Reed was seeing his wife, according to court records.

Moncur also has been charged with a felony in Twin Falls County for eluding a police officer. Moncur led police on a chase from Magic Mountain down Rock Creek Road and was arrested in Murtaugh; officials said.

Officers found several handguns and rifles in Moncur's truck when he was arrested, according to a Cassia County sheriff's report, including a loaded .44-caliber Magnum and a loaded Colt .45-caliber revolver. Officers discovered another firearm that had been thrown from Moncur's truck, the report said.

When officers asked Moncur

which gun he had used to shoot Reed, Moncur said it wasn't a rifle but that he had just grabbed something, according to the report. When asked, Moncur told police he didn't know why he had shot Reed or if his actions had something to do with his wife, the report said.

Moncur had been watching Reed and Magic Mountain Ski Resort owner Marty Jacobs repair a trailer used to haul trash down from the ski resort, the report said, and shot Reed after had Jacobs left.

Before Jacobs had left, he had asked Moncur if he needed help, the report said. Moncur told Jacobs he was looking for someone driving a pick-up similar to Reed's, and that the person was supposed to be snowmobiling in the area, the report said.

## Jury awards damages to Knievel

**SPOKANE, Wash. (AP)** — Jurors awarded retired daredevil Evel Knievel about \$51,000 Thursday in his lawsuit against a hotel that gave another man a key to Knievel's room.

Knievel's civil suit alleged that Clarence "Cip" Paulsen III beat the stuntman severely when Paulsen entered the room and saw a former girlfriend in Knievel's bed.

Paulsen testified that there was no fight. Knievel sued the Ridpath Hotel over the 1989 incident.

Spokane County Superior Court jurors awarded Knievel \$72,500, but reduced the sum by 30 percent on grounds that Knievel and Paulsen, an acquaintance, were partly at fault. The jury deliberated three days after six days of testimony.

Knievel was away on a business trip and was not in court to hear the award, said his attorney, George Diana. "We were pleased to prevail. I felt the verdict certainly was not as much as we had hoped for, but nobody knows what a jury will do."

# Boy, 10, suspended for carrying weapons

A Bonner County fifth-grader was suspended from school this week and could be expelled after teachers found two knives, a pellet gun and a loaded .22-caliber pistol in his backpack.

"Apparently he was taking the weapons out to show his buddies and someone saw them," Sandpoint Police Detective Andy Anderson said. "The boy said he was consoled by his friends into bringing them to school so they could look at them."

Meanwhile, two Rigby Junior High School students were expelled for a year after bringing a gun to school and a third student at the eastern Idaho school faces possible expulsion in a separate incident.

Parents said the boy would have a hearing before the school board and could be expelled for a minimum of one year. In November, a 13-year-old Sandpoint Middle School student was expelled for 18 months after bringing two pistols to school.

In Rigby, a 14-year-old and a 15-year-old boy were found in possession of an unloaded .32-caliber derringer Jan. 12. The two had hunted together earlier, and one student was returning the gun to his friend, Superintendent Elwood Wilson said. A derringer is a small, short-barreled pistol.

The boys were charged with possession of a gun on school grounds and released to their parents, Police Chief Larry Anderson said.

Twelve days later, a 15-year-old boy was found with a loaded .38-caliber pistol in his gym bag in his locker at the junior high. Neither Wilson nor Anderson knew why the student brought the gun to school.

The student was charged with possession of a loaded firearm on school grounds and taken to the St. Anthony Youth Service Center, Anderson said.

The Jefferson School Board expelled the first two students for a year and has yet to set a date for the third student's hearing.

# Legislators reject pay-raise change

## Pay-raise amendment roll call

BOISE (AP) — Despite the efforts of Rep. Jim Stoicheff, Idaho legislators still won't have to go on record as voting themselves a pay hike.

The House voted 38-29 Thursday for a proposed constitutional amendment to require a vote before members can accept pay raises. The vote was 38-29, nine votes short of the required two-thirds majority, so the resolution died.

The Sandpoint Democrat wanted to ask voters to amend the Idaho Constitution so in the future, if lawmakers wanted higher pay, they had to go on record as voting for it.

The current process is just the opposite. A citizen commission recommends changes in legislative pay and expenses at the start of new legislative terms. If the Legislature does nothing, they remain in effect for at least the next two years.

This year's increase was 7 percent — \$360 on top of the legislative

base pay of \$12,000 per year or about \$80,000 for all lawmakers.

Only by a positive vote of both chambers can lawmakers reject or lower the recommended changes, but that's happened twice in the past. But in 1979, 1991 and again

this year, the House voted to reject the increase and the Senate bottled up the resolution in committee, leaving the increase intact.

Stoicheff said that even if the House voted 66-0 to reject the raise, a few people in the Senate could



block the action and allow the higher pay to remain.

He said that process allows lawmakers to "run around and hide" without having to make a recorded vote on their own raises.

"I think it's dead wrong and sneaky," he said. "It shows a lack of political courage when we hide behind the (deadline for action)," he said.

But Rep. Dave Bivens, R-Boise, who served in the Idaho Senate in the 1970s, said the current process works well. "I saw what happened before," he said. "We should reject this proposal and follow along with the process we have now."

# Deaf community rallies to keep council alive

BOISE (AP) — Leaders of Idaho's deaf community pressed legislative budget writers on Thursday to overrule Republican Gov. Phil Batt and keep the Council for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing in business.

In a poignant presentation, Bill Andrew told the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee through the interpreter of his sign language that the council and its \$96,000 budget meet the new governor's criteria

for efficiency and cost-effectiveness.

"We challenge any other agency to meet the services provided by this council with its staffing and operating budget," said Andrew, the council's co-chairman and president of the Idaho Association for the Deaf.

But Batt administration budget architect Dean Van Engelen said he eliminated the cash because he continues to question the legitimacy of those kinds of expenditures. He conceded, however,

that the governor's 1996 budget is inconsistent because it failed to also delete the controversial \$69,000 in state tax money for the Epilepsy League.

"I didn't know enough about what it was," Van Engelen said. "We probably really should have zeroed that one out."

The money for the Epilepsy League to augment services for people with that condition has repeatedly been challenged by lawmakers. But it has survived by narrow margins as the

only direct state support to an otherwise private nonprofit organization.

The council's annual budget, Andrew said, amounts to less than a dime a year from every Idaho resident. And considering that one of every four Idahoans has a hearing impairment, he maintained the agency benefits not only the thousands of people it serves directly, but the tens of thousands who come into contact with them.

### Batt names Geddes to replace Hansen

BOISE — Robert Geddes Jr. of Soda Springs, the son of state Rep. Robert Geddes of Preston, has been named to fill the vacancy left by Sen. Dennis Hansen's appointment to the Idaho Public Utilities Commission.

Geddes Jr., 39, is an environmental engineer for Monsanto Co. The Republican succeeds Hansen, who was a Monsanto accountant in Soda Springs before GOP Gov. Phil Batt named him to the Public Utilities Commission.

Geddes Jr. and his wife, Tamara, have five children. He will be sworn in Monday to represent Senate District 32, which includes Bannock, Bear Lake, Caribou, Franklin and Oneida counties.

### Illegal aliens found working at plant

IDAHO FALLS — Seventeen illegal aliens were deported to Mexico after being discovered working in a southern Idaho food processing plant.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service refused to identify the plant or its location. But Jim Bennett, the agency's assistant director of investigations in Helena, Mont., said the company cooperated and was not cited for any violations of federal law.

The illegal workers were discovered Monday during a routine inspection of the plant's work authorization records for the past six months. Bennett said the company was unaware the aliens used counterfeit documents to get jobs.

### Man gets prison term for sex offense

LEWISTON — Second District Judge Ronald Schilling has sentenced Patrick Oar to five to 15 years in prison for two counts of sexual battery of a minor.

Schilling said Wednesday that he would caution the parole board to "keep a skeptical eye" on whether Oar is ready to return to society after his minimum five-year term.

Oar, 37, was found guilty in December of luring two teen-age girls to a Lewiston motel room with promises of lucrative modeling jobs. At the motel, he gave them liquor and directed them in performing sexually suggestive acts.

### Neville appointed to new judge position

BOISE — Ada County Magistrate Thomas Neville has been appointed to fill a new judgeship in the 4th Judicial District.

Republican Gov. Phil Batt chose Neville Thursday from among three candidates nominated by the Idaho Judicial Council. The other finalists were Assistant U.S. Attorney Marc Haws and Ada County Magistrate John Dutcher.

Neville, 48, has been a magistrate in Boise since 1987 — the first 4½ years handling both civil and criminal cases and the last 3½ only civil cases, specializing in family law.

His successor on the magistrate bench will be picked by the Ada County Magistrate Commission.

### Anne Frank exhibit to open at museum

BOISE — Anne Frank remains an enduring voice.

A story of a young Jewish girl hiding from Nazis puts a face on blurred textbook images of Jews and other Europeans who died during Hitler's reign of terror.

Idaho school children will learn more about her and the Holocaust when they visit the Idaho Anne Frank Exhibit, on display at the Idaho State Historical Museum Feb. 9 through March 7.

The Anne Frank Exhibit delves into history with 600 photographs and documents, Holocaust sculptures and a scale model of the cramped Amsterdam attic where the Frank family and others hid until they were discovered in a 1944 Nazi raid.

## Ysursa seeks nomination petition change

BOISE (AP) — After a controversy in last year's election over signatures on nominating petitions, the secretary of state's office wants to eliminate the requirement.

The House State Affairs Committee on Thursday approved introduction of a proposal from Chief Deputy Secretary of State Ben Ysursa, who said of signatures on nominating petitions: "Frankly, we think they are worthless."

Current state law requires legislative candidates to get the names of 50 registered voters on nominating petitions and pay a \$15 filing fee. It takes 1,000 signatures for statewide and federal candidates, with filing fees ranging from \$150 to \$300. A state law says if a candidate turns in more than 20 percent of the required number of signatures, there is no need to have county clerks verify the names as those of registered voters.

During the 1994 election, Republicans challenged petitions filed by some candidates, including Ron Rankin, the Coeur d'Alene tax activist who was an independent candidate for governor.

After county clerks went back and verified Rankin's signatures the challenge was dropped. An Ada County legislative candidate was disqualified after it was discovered that some of the names on her petition were not those of registered voters and she didn't have 50 valid signatures.

Rep. Tom Dorr, R-Post Falls, said requiring signatures serves a useful purpose. "If you can't get those signatures, you're never going to win," he said.

Ysursa ran into more opposition on a section of the bill that would double the filing fees. Some committee members said that would help eliminate people who were not legitimate candidates; but others said lawmakers shouldn't try to keep people off the ballot by making it more expensive to file.

## Utah drops game to Houston on road

**HOUSTON** — Utah lost its chance to tie the NBA record of 16 straight road victories Thursday night when Hakeem Olajuwon scored 41 points and Houston hit seven 3-pointers in the fourth quarter of a 121-101 victory over the Jazz.

Utah, which hadn't lost on the road since Nov. 19 at Golden State, also had its 14-game overall winning streak ended. The 1971-72 Los Angeles Lakers set the record of 16 straight road victories from Nov. 6, 1971 to Jan. 7, 1972.

In a rematch of last year's Western Conference finals, the Rockets led 75-71 after the third quarter, then broke the game open with a string of five 3-point baskets, two each by Robert Horry and Sam Cassell and one by Mario Elie.

Cassell, battling with Kenny Smith for the starting point guard job, was 4-for-4 from 3-point range — all in the fourth quarter — and finished with 16 points.

Houston outscored Utah 46-30 in the final 12 minutes. Maxwell added 12 points, Otis Thorpe 11 and Horry 10 for the Rockets. Karl Malone led the Jazz with 26 points, Antoine Carr added 18, John Stockton 17 and David Benoit 16.

After falling behind 41-35 with 5:50 left in the second quarter — Houston's biggest deficit of the game — the Rockets had a 15-0 run for a 50-41 lead with 1:54 to go.

Carr ended Utah's scoring slump with two

straight baskets, but the Rockets still held a 54-47 halftime lead.

Stockton, who had 16 assists in Wednesday's 129-88 victory over Denver to surpass Magic Johnson's record of 9,721, had just five assists against the Rockets.

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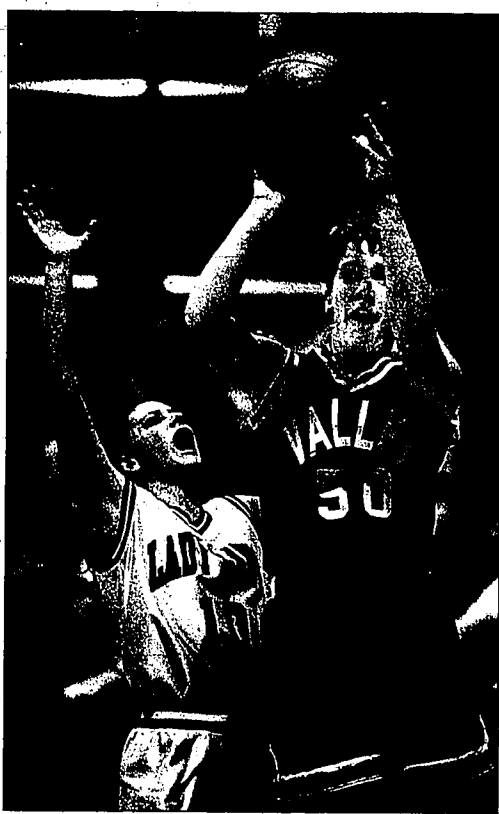

## Clinton sends 'strong' message on strike

**WASHINGTON** — Seeing only slight progress toward settling the baseball strike, the White House sent players and owners another strong message Thursday: Speed it up.

Moments after talks began, mediator W.J. Utery was summoned from the negotiating table to the Cabinet Room.

When he returned from meeting with Labor Secretary Robert Reich and other administration officials, Utery did not say whether he had spoken broadly to President Clinton. But he made it altogether clear Clinton wanted more action, and soon.

“He emphasized in extremely strong language that the president expects this to be resolved,” union head Donald Fehr said.

Clinton has set a Monday deadline for making substantial progress. He has threatened to ask that Utery propose terms of a settlement.

Asked whether there was any progress on the baseball talks, Clinton crossed his fingers and said, “We're in it. That's all I can say. Not up. Not down. We're in it.”

Boston Red Sox chairman John Harrington, when asked how much deadline pressure the parties were feeling, said “heavy, heavy.”

Harrington, management's chief negotiator, said Utery did not say whom he spoke to or

what about. But those at the meeting between players and owners said there clearly was pressure from the president and his aides.

“Obviously they're not happy,” Kansas City pitcher David Cone said.

White House press secretary Mike McCurry said he expects talks to intensify.

Exactly two weeks from the start of spring training, the sides met for about four hours. The discussion, however, was all about side issues such as international play, not the main economic sticking points.

Fehr said players hoped to make a counter-proposal Friday or Saturday to the plan that owners presented Wednesday. Owners' dropped their call for a salary cap, but included a tax on big payrolls that players say is too high.

Under the owners' plan, the Detroit Tigers, whose \$55.8 million payroll in 1994 was the most in the majors, would've had to pay about \$20 million in taxes. Under the players' latest plan, the Tigers would've paid about \$200,000.

“They have clearly suggested that this is not their final offer. That's good,” Fehr said.

And, the fact that they were talking about a similar structure — no matter the difference in numbers — was seen by some as encouraging.

## Raiders fire Shell, want Super Bowl

**EL SEGUNDO, Calif.** — Saying he wants to win the Super Bowl and needs a new coach to do so, Los Angeles Raiders owner Al Davis fired coach Art Shell on Thursday and replaced him with Mike White.

Shell, a member of the Raiders organization for 27 years and the Pro Football Hall of Fame, had been the coach since 1989, becoming the first black head coach in pro football's modern era.

Shell's dismissal was anticipated when the Raiders failed to make the playoffs after being dubbed preseason favorites to win the AFC. They finished 9-7, a 19-9 loss to Kansas City on Dec. 24 ending their playoff hopes.

“We want to win the Super Bowl,” said Davis, whose team was the last AFC team to accomplish the feat in 1984. “I felt if we were going to get there, we would have to change the environment. I offered this job to no one else.”

“I've known about Mike White for 40 years. I watched him grow, become an assistant coach. His history, his records, are tremendously unique. I think he comes extremely qualified, he has a vibrant personality.”

Davis wouldn't divulge terms of White's contract, saying only, “It's not for one year and not for five.”

Davis said he told Shell of the change Wednesday night.

“We spent an hour, two hours, reminiscing,” Davis said. “He was one of the great contributors we have ever had. Art is a part of my life. He's going to do well, he's going to be OK.”

Shell spoke briefly before leaving Raider headquarters more than an hour before the news conference.

“I'm going to look for another job,” he said. “I want to stay in coaching.”

It's been reported Shell might hook up with the Miami Dolphins as offensive line coach.

White takes over a team that has managed to win only two playoff games since its third and most recent Super Bowl victory.

“This is a challenge, believe me,” he said. “I've prepared for this all my life. I think if I have a skill, it's administratively. I intend to inventory the past.”

“I've been in these kind of job situations before. It's obvious that Al Davis expects and demands success. We feel equal for that task. The most important thing is I feel prepared. I'm very grateful for this opportunity.”

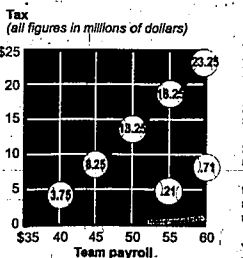
White joined the Raiders as an assistant in 1990 to work with quarterback Jay Schroeder. He was re-assigned to coach the offensive line in 1993.

# Love leads in wet AT&T

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Davis Love III shot a 7-under-par 65 over a soggy course Thursday and led a one-stroke lead after one round of the \$1.4 million AT&T National Pro-Am.

Love, paired with race car driver Danny Sullivan, played the Poppy Hills course and bridged four par-5s. Nick Faldo, who also played Poppy Hills, was in second place at 66.

Peter Jacobson, who played Spyglass Hill, and Kawon Goater, who played the Pebble Beach course, were tied for third at 67.

Twenty-six straight days of rain in January resulted in slow play times over the three courses, with Love needing six hours to complete his round.

The "hit, clean and place" rule was in place, allowing players to touch their ball on the fairways and

in the rough at Spyglass Hill and Poppy Hills and on the fairways at Pebble Beach.

All three courses were closed earlier this week with the hope that three days of sunshine would render them reasonably dry for the first round. The 180 pros and 180 amateurs were forced to find other practice courses.

Kenny Perry, who finished with a 68 on Spyglass Hill, said he was surprised the scores weren't lower because of the rule.

"Being able to put your hand on the ball will help everybody's score," he said. "There's a ton of water out there."

Roberts, who shot 68, said the course started to dry out because of a warm, gusty wind.

"They (the greens) weren't fast,"

Roberts said. "If they are bumpy and they are slow, you can still control the ball pretty well."

Faldo, who rejoined the PGA Tour full-time this season, was on the leaderboard and in contention for the first time this year. He finished 25th at Tucson and 34th at Phoenix in earlier Tour events.

"It was good," Faldo said. Johnny Miller, the defending champion, played the Poppy Hills course in a foursome with his three sons, John Jr., Andy and Scott. Miller shot a 73. PGA money leader Phil Mickelson, who played with his father, shot 74.

In the Pro-Am division, pro Loren Roberts and partner Robert Gibson, an oil company executive from Fort Worth, Texas, were the leaders at 11-under 61.

# Murray mellowos but still pleases crowd

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) — A year after he was shunned for his on-green antics, actor Bill Murray was back at Pebble Beach and on his best behavior.

Murray repeatedly told the crowd: "We're all about golf," in the first round of the AT&T National Pro-Am on Thursday, which also was Groundhog Day, appropriately enough.

Murray looked conservative in a tie, sweater vest and hat bearing the tournament's logo as he took to the greens of Poppy Hills with pro partner Scott Simpson. Also in his foursome was Mark Grace of the Chicago Cubs and pro Jeff Sluman.

As Murray walked to the first hole, he was hounded by fans asking for autographs. One woman held her baby in front of him.

"If the infant is rampaged we're all going to feel bad tomorrow," he told the mass surrounding him.

It was a much different story at the event last year, when Murray was criticized by then-PGA commissioner Deane Beman and by Ben Cramer. Simpson said the comedian "crossed the line."

After Murray and Simpson missed the cut in the third round, Murray wielded a baseball bat to hit a ball into Carmel Bay on the 18th hole, and declared he made his "final putt" at the AT&T.

By the end of the 12-month, Beman resigned and Tim Finchem took over. Finchem appealed to Murray in two letters, apparently convincing the star of such movies as "Caddyshack" and "Stripes" to return for his fourth year.

Murray was subdued on Thursday. He wore a dark jacket, a few jokes. When one of the marshals admonished the crowd

with "Please sit your cameras," Murray added, "if they drop they can be broken."

And when the gallery failed to provide a rousing reception for Grace, Murray chided: "Oh, come on, he's one of the Chicago Cubs. Let's hear it!"

On the first hole, Murray was caught in the trees and he asked Simpson where he should hit the ball. "Anywhere on the course," Simpson said, momentarily stealing the spotlight.

Many of Thursday's spectators clearly came to see only Murray, although George Bush, Dan Quayle, and Clint Eastwood were in the stands ahead of Murray's foursome.

A group of four men wore Mur-

ray masks, explaining they were the "Murray Brothers" of Sacramento. Another duo dressed as the hapless Carl character in Caddyshack, accessorized with a stuffed puppy.

As usual, Murray toyed with the fans. He grabbed a man out of the crowd wearing a sweatshirt reading "John Muir Chiropractic" and got an adjustment on the fourth hole.

The loudest response from the gallery came when Murray birdied the sixth hole and gleefully tossed his ball into the crowd.

Murray admitted he didn't feel well, perhaps explaining his mellow demeanor. But one woman in the gallery speculated out-loud: "They put a muzzie on him, that's for sure."

# Maxfli manufacturing may be grounded

It's the ball preferred by Greg Norman, Fred Couples and Jack Nicklaus. An advertisement for the Maxfli H-T Balata says, "Now the rest of the world can play with the best in the world."

The rest of the world may have to do without for awhile.

The only manufacturing plant where Maxfli makes the H-T Balata is located in Kobe, Japan, and it was knocked out of production because of the Jan. 17 earthquake that killed more than 5,100 and caused \$100 billion of damage.

No Maxfli employees were killed

in the quake, even though many lost their homes. But the plant, along with much of the rest of the city, remains closed because of earthquake damage.

Also, the damage doesn't appear to be as bad as company officials first thought, said Tom Bryant, president of Dunlop's Maxfli Golf Division.

But as the golf season is arriving in most parts of the country, and having just announced Tom Watson as the latest PGA Tour player to switch to the H-T Balata, Maxfli is having to stop shipments to dealers across the country.

"We have enough inventory to

take care of the tour needs during his 'shutdown period, but we may have some shortages of the product for our customers the next few months," Bryant said from Maxfli's headquarters in Greenville, S.C.

Maxfli has begun sending letters to pro shops and merchandisers around the country that they will not be getting another shipment of H-T Balatas until production resumes, likely in two to three months.

Jack Lane, vice president of operations for Oklahoma City-based retail chain International Golf Discount, said a Maxfli manager at the PGA Merchandise Show last week indicated it could be longer.

# Davis Cup may be short on fans

MIAMI — Tennis is coming off what can be considered its most dramatic Grand Slam ever from an American standpoint.

Pete Sampras shed his "unemotional" label, weeping uncontrollably on court for an ill coach Andre Agassi won the Australian Open on his first try after a rare No. 1 vs. No. 2 final. Four American men reached the semifinals.

Yet chances are good St. Petersburg's 5,500-seat Bayfront Center Arena, where the United States plays France in the Davis Cup, will have as many as 1,000 empty seats when the first-round match begins Friday.

"We thought the place would be sold out," said Bob Driskill, chairman of the U.S. Tennis Association Davis Cup committee.

Related elements: stubbornness on the part of Davis Cup promoters and the USTA; a plain lack of common sense; and a degree of snootiness, too.

The cheapest seats cost \$90 for the three-day session. That's \$30 per day to see two matches Friday, one Saturday and two Sunday. Single-day seats went on sale Jan. 15 — for \$35 and up.

If you're trying to bring tennis to the masses, as the game's caretakers have declared their mission, that's too much money. If the Lipton, that's not much for \$10, the Davis Cup ought to sell them at a comparable price.

The argument of promoter Steve Cline is that the Davis Cup "is not an everyday tennis event that's taking place here. It's international."

Pro tennis is international, no matter the format. What the USTA and Cline are missing is that they have a golden opportunity — showing off tennis in a team atmosphere. Americans — even

Pro tennis is international, no matter the format. What the USTA and Cline are missing is that they have a golden opportunity — showing off tennis in a team atmosphere. Americans — even

those who don't know tennis — understand them.

Americans understand revenge (France defeated the U.S. in the 1991 final, their last meeting). They understand a rejuvenated Jim Courier, who popularized wearing baseball caps on court. They understand flag-waving and foot-stomping, encouraged at the Davis Cup. They understand winners (the Davis Cup doubles team of Richey Reneberg and Jared Palmer won the Australian Open title). And U.S. tennis — with five players ranked in the top 15 — is at a high point.

Davis Cup is billing itself as a cavalry when tennis is trying to be a hot dog. Tennis is still perceived as a country-club sport. Cline argues that 460 tickets are being given free to kids from the Nick Bollettieri Tennis Academy and area USTA youth programs.

That's fine. But it would make more sense to give an equal number of tickets to kids who have never been to a country club or never seen Courier and 100-mph serves up close.

As promoter, Cline sets ticket prices: The USTA oversees the pricing. If promoters are having trouble making money or breaking even, the USTA should pitch in.

The USTA spends millions on recreational leagues and junior programs. It's starting a \$227 million project to expand the U.S. Open site in New York.

But this weekend, the USTA has the chance to bring the highest level of its sport to the most common denominator — the American Sports Shop. And it's not happening.

# Epic events throw Milrose games into spotlight

NEW YORK (AP) — An epic battle between long jumpers Jackie Joyner-Kersey and Helge Drecshler and a rare U.S. appearance by pole vault world record-holder Sergei Bubka help launch an important era for track and field at the 88th Millrose Games Friday night.

The Madison Square Garden meet is the first of the five-meet Millrose Indoor Track and Field Series. USA Track & Field created the circuit to provide prime time television coverage for the sport and head-to-head competition among its top performers.

The other meets on the circuit are the Reno Air Games Feb. 10 at Reno, Nev., the Key Corp Track and Field Classic at Cleveland Feb. 17, the Mobil Invitational at Fairfax, Va. Feb. 25 and

the USA-Mobil Indoor Championships at Atlanta March 3-4. The Fairfax meet and the national championships will be shown live (on NBC), the others a day late. Each meet will air for 60 minutes except for the national championships, to be shown for two hours March 4.

To live up the series, USA Track & Field signed 31 top athletes — Americans and resident foreigners.

One was Joyner-Kersey, voted the No. 1 women's track and field athlete in the world last year and No. 1 in the world in the women's long jump.

The first is if the 60-meter hurdles, where Joyner-Kersey, the U.S. record-holder, will meet defending champion and meet record-holder Michelle Freeman of Jamaica.

Less than an hour later, Joyner-Kersey, the U.S. indoor and outdoor record-holder in the long jump, will face her long-time rival, Drecshler, the world indoor record-holder, 1992 Olympic champion and two-time world champion from Germany.

Drecshler thrives on the competition against Joyner-Kersey.

"When she's in the competition, I have so much more motivation to bring a good result," Drecshler said. "When she is not there, then I have nobody to push me."

Long jumper Bubka is confident of atoning for that off-Breadway disaster.

"It is difficult to say I will break the world record again," said the Ukrainian, who has smashed the world record a total of 35 times indoors and outdoors, and is the only vaulter ever to clear 20 feet.

KETCHUM — A pair of latecomers, tourists wearing Benetton and bemusement, slide through the front door.

The third and final round of the 13th Wood-River Poetry Slam has begun, and the visitors gope at the throng of locals — heavy on flannel and denim — that surrounds them in the Main Street BookCafe.

Across the way, the nextStage Theater is disgorging yuppie playgoers, and down the road a raucous band of revelers is hanging around the telephone pole between the bank and Slavey's, trading lies.

Outside, Saturday night unfolds as it must in a ski town in High January. Inside, souls are bared.

Jo Ellen Collins, a 58-year-old librarian and former teacher, winds up her ode to a faceless waitress in a nameless greasy spoon somewhere in the Southwest — a woman who trades in stale cigarette smoke and bad coffee, but who nurtures other dreams.

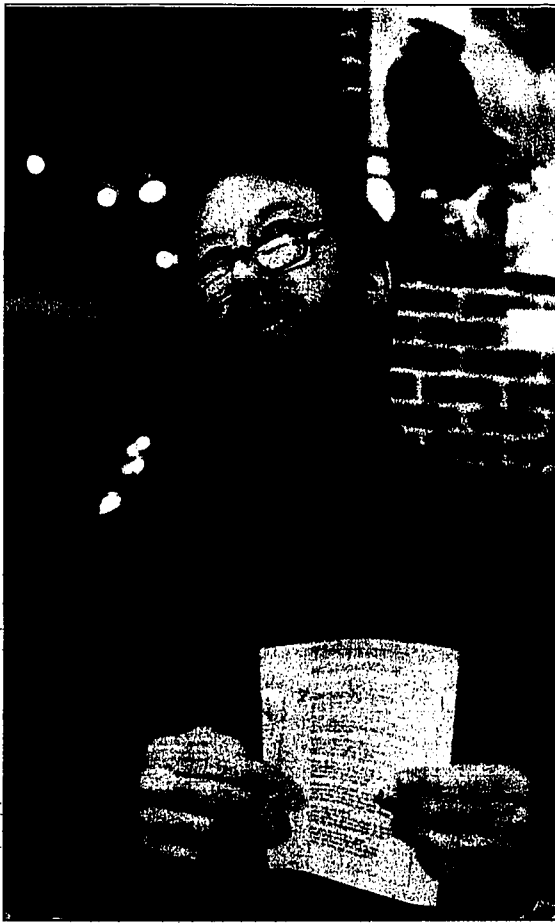
Bitzy's kitchen is spotless, as Collins describes it. It is redolent of Good Housekeeping and lemon and sea air.

Collins takes a seat, and the crowd murmurs its approval.

## Stillman's 'Barcelona': Skirmish of the sexes

### 'Barcelona'

What Stillman's droll and appealing romantic comedy "Barcelona" is set in Spain in the early 1980s, a period the film potently identifies as "the last decade of the Cold War."

But emotionally, it's a film that feels very close to the first decade of the Cold War — the 1950s, when America was first enjoying its new military-industrial influence over Europe and Hollywood was turning out bright, touristy comedies like "Three Coins in the Fountain," "Roman Holiday" and "Funny Face," in which innocent Americans abroad discovered the charms of the Old World.

Stillman's two main characters are representatives of that military-industrial alliance. Ted Boynton (Taylor or Nichols) is a reserved, prudish young man who runs the Barcelona office of a Chicago manufacturing concern. He's just recovering from a

failed romance (finding solace in his eccentric readings of the Bible) when his Cousin Fred (Chris Eigeman) arrives from out of the blue. Fred, who wears a naval officer's uniform and (eventually) a washbuckler's patch over one eye, has come to Barcelona as the "advance man" for the arrival of the

Navy's Sixth Fleet, an event sure to cause some upheaval in the tense anti-American, anti-NATO climate of the peak Reagan years.

Fred and Ted do encounter some anti-Yankee sentiment among the natives, but mostly they seem to meet amazingly beautiful, gracious women — many of them hostesses at the local trade center. Ted falls for the blond, disco-loving Montserrat (Tushka Bergen), Fred for the dark, pouty Maria (Mira Sorvino). These dreamy romances seem to be heading toward marriage when the Americans discover that their new Spanish friends are, in fact, already living with long-term boyfriends whom they have no intention of giving up. They do things differently here, as Fred and Ted discover to their horror, confusion and secret excitement.

It's that note of thrillingly outraged Puritanism that most accounts for the '50s feel of "Barcelona," as well as for much of the charm of Stillman's work. But here and in "Metropolitan," his witty 1990 debut fea-

ture about preppie mating rituals, he skillfully registers a sense of standing on the sexual brink, of repression confronted with abandon. These are potent feelings, and Stillman communicates them with wit and sympathy.

Despite the calculated dryness of Stillman's line readings, he's a seducing romantic at heart, and there are moments in "Barcelona" as grand and expansive as a classical Hollywood love story: a shot of the unformed hostesses flying in formation on their motor scooters down Barcelona's main drag; Ted's voyeuristic peep at Montserrat as she practices a flamenco dance with three of her friends.

Still, these are images of regimented groups, not of individual characters, and the suspicion persists that Stillman is more intrigued by Woman than by women. His is a romanticism that will probably appeal more to men, if only because women will have trouble recognizing themselves through all the gauzy haze.

Lougans; half-guitar with a twist. Collins beams: She has just won 20 bucks.

The tourists, looking confused, edge toward the door. "Private party?" the man says to a bystander in a ponytail.

"No way," he says. "Poetry."  
"Poetry?" the visitor says.  
"It's a slam, man."

On the occasional Saturday night since the summer of 1993, good poets and bad rhymer enjoy listening to both have trooped to the hybrid bookstore and coffee house on Ketchum's main drag.

The writers are teachers and accountants and computer operators and guys who operate ski lifts, some published, some not, some talented, some awful.

No matter. Just having the brass to stand and deliver imparts a certain status.

"It takes some getting used to," said Collins, who spends her days in Ketchum's Community Library (transcribing oral history tapes). "But it's also quite fun."

"When we first started this, I didn't know if we'd get anybody," said Erika Mitchell, the BookCafe's organizer of special events and book signing. "But it's just sort of built each time."

"It's a pretty rollicking place when those poets get going," said Jon Maksik, the headmaster at Ketchum-Sun Valley Community School and a past judge of the event. "Some of the poetry was good and some was not so good, but the crowd seemed to enjoy it."

Slams, which arose in the espresso joints and fern bars of Chicago and other big cities, are the direct descendants of poetry readings of the beatnik area, when Allen Ginsberg and William Burroughs were apt to drop by and relieve themselves of beat verse.

Big-city coffeehouses or the '50s and early '60s were tough rooms, and poets came to cherish the hollow rattle of appreciative hands-rapping on tables.

When espresso houses and yuppie bars made a comeback in the mid-'80s, public poetry soon followed.

"Slams are common in the major cities, but I guess it's unusual to find

them in a place like Ketchum," Mitchell said. "We've gotten a lot of inquiries from big-city media about them."

And the crowds have grown too. At the last slam a week ago Saturday, the BookCafe was full an hour before the scheduled start.

For two hours, poets talk about love, loss, heroism, villainy, fools and geniuses.  
"It can't get my teeth on edge," said Sally Brock, program director at the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities and a former judge. "I'm not sure a crowded room is the best place for poetry."

Maybe not, but it doesn't appear to be intimidating the Wood River Valley's poets.

"The night I was a judge there was a fifth-grade girl there," Maksik said.

"I saw people read their poems when I had no idea even wrote," Brock said.

Collins entered twice, winning a second-place award the first time, and the top prize the next time. The second time, she finished ahead of one of her former students, David Niedrich.

"He was a very sharp student," she said. "And he's a very good poet."

An inscription in front says, "From the Young People of Cyclone Union Church." Abby, I have tried for years to find a community called Cyclone, but have been unsuccessful.

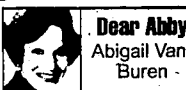

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# Sundance awards break the mold

**PARK CITY, Utah** — In a departure from tradition, the Sundance Film Festival gave its top awards not to well-meaning, distant works, but rather to two films that delight festival audiences because of a good chance of repeating that success in the real world.

"The Brothers McMullen," written, directed, co-produced and starring 26-year-old Edward Burns, won the dramatic half of the Grand Jury Prize on Saturday night. Taking documentary honors was "Crumb," director Terry Zwigoff's extraordinary examination of the life and art of underground cartoonist R. Crumb.

A reality-based romantic comedy about the tangled lives of three Irish Catholic brothers living on Long Island, N.Y., "McMullen's" offhanded charm and engaging naturalism survived the rigors of shooting over a long period.

"We made a no-budget feature over the course of eight months shooting on weekends because we had something to say, and at a couple of points we didn't think we'd get to finish this film, we thought no one would see it," said an emotional Burns, who made sure to thank his mother, "who made me watch 'Annie Hall.'" Blown up by 7 mm and costing a reported \$28,000, "McMullen" earned another reward: It will be one of the first films distributed by 20th Century Fox's new Searchlight division.

"Crumb" came into the festival with enough honors, including an appearance at the New York Film Festival and a deal with Sony Classics, that people kept telling Zwigoff, who'd put nine years into this remarkably candid and provocative documentary, that he had little chance of winning at Sundance.

But not only did "Crumb" capture the Grand Jury Prize, sponsored by Mercedes-Benz, it also won the cinematography award for documentaries for Marjorie Alberti.

"I don't get a Mercedes with this, do I?" Zwigoff asked. "I'll take a used one."

The dramatic competition's other well-received film, "Living in Oblivion," won the Waldo Salt Screenwriting Award for Tom DiCillo and his dead-on and deft look at the worst day any independent director ever had.

"This film secretly started as the drunken giggle, something written in two days," said a disbelieving DiCillo, whose picture went to Sony Classics.

The audience award for dramatic films, voted by the festival-goers, was the evening's biggest surprise. It went to Kayo Hata's elegant "Picture Bride," the story of a Japanese woman who emigrates to Hawaii to marry a man she knows only through his photograph.

The documentary audience award was split between a pair of strong films that had completely different sensibilities. Douglas Keeve's "Unzipped," acquired by Fine Line

during the festival, is a cinematically look at fashion designer Isaac Mizrahi. It is as consistently amusing as its subject, the kind of giggle monologist who can watch "Nanook of the North" and decide he wants to design nothing but fur pants.

"Ballot Measure 9" on the other hand, is a passionate and exceptionally well-made piece of advocacy filmmaking. Directed by Heather MacDonald and concentrating on Oregon's 1992 anti-gay ballot initiative, it exposes both the horrific nature of homophobia and the heartening way grassroots organizing made a critical difference in defeating the measure.

Aside from "Crumb," the only film to win two awards was Rebecca Miller's dramatic debut, "Anna" — the story of two little girls who have trouble separating fantasy from reality. was, and he definitely was. But the best parts of the movie come from Industrial Light and Magic, the California special-effects house. Its artisans turned the chicken droppings of Michael DeLuca's script into Chicken a la King, providing the picture's only reason to exist.

The opening is tantalizingly promising. Insurance investigator John Trent (Neill), his face and body covered with inked black crosses, is confined in an asylum run by veteran villain John Glover. ## Smooth: Babyface is one hot ticket

When he was a kid, Babyface was always falling in love. "I always had a heart that was easy to break," he says.

Babyface — now touring with Brandy and Boyz II Men — was raised in Indianapolis, the second youngest of six brothers. His father died when he was in the eighth grade and his mother supported the family the rest of the way alone.

Back then, Babyface would write love letters to whomever he was desperately fond of that week. And he wrote more about being in love than love-making. Love, to him, was what love used to be in music and in movies. It wasn't about a bump and a grind or about how many ways he could tell you he was going to make love to you. Love, to Babyface, was an ideal; a romantic notion that he put into his music.

"It was music some critics said would never last... that would only appeal to certain listeners. Guess again. Babyface has released three successful albums — the second, 1989's "Tender Love," won the Soul Train Music Award for album of the year — and he's thriving by writing such love songs for himself and for others. Maybe the music world isn't as off-kilter as some of us thought.

"It's all very natural," he said, during a two-hour interview. "To know me personally, I don't think people would say, 'He's so emotional' or 'He's very touching.' It's not like I sit around like I'm a poet and say beautiful things all the time. But when I sit down to write a song, that's when it comes out."

Babyface, who writes songs in furious bursts, may be the hottest songwriter of his era — today's Lionel Richie or John Lennon.

In 1994 alone, "I'll Make Love to You" — which Babyface wrote and produced for Boyz II Men — set atop Billboard's pop chart for more than three months, breaking the 11-week record set by Elvis Presley's "Heartbreak Hotel."

This came about a year and a half after Boyz II Men's huge success with "End of the Road," which Babyface wrote with then-collaborator L.A. Reid along with Darryl Simmons.

And to begin 1995, a song he wrote for Madonna — "Take a Bow" — has earned him his 32nd top-10 single as a songwriter.

"I guess," he says, "that I've been pretty lucky."

And we guess that really does. Kenny Edmonds really does have a baby face. He's 36 now, yet with three Grammy awards and four other Grammy nominations behind him, Edmonds is still known more by his nickname than his legal one.

He always looked much younger than he was. Even as a teen, running around with the cover bands his mother let him hang out with (remember, Babyface didn't have to work); and later with Manchild — a little-known group that included Darryl Simmons; and even during his days with the mildly successful R&B band the Deele, Edmonds always had this tender, pubescent look about him.

"The first person to call me Babyface was Bootsy Collins," Babyface says. "We were working in the studio in 1984 and I walked in and

wrote for others continued to do well. In the late '80s, Babyface and L.A. Reid, along with Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis, became the hottest R&B production teams around.

"Whenever any kind of teams breaks up, people are always looking at it and saying they can't make it without each other," Babyface says. "It was important for me to have success separately and to know it could happen and that I could stand on my own two feet."

"I'll Make Love to You" is up for a Grammy this year.

So, for Babyface, everything seemed to be going his way.

Then came the tour thing. It started when he got a call from a promoter who told him Boyz II Men was interested in going on the road with him. What was initially just a five-show minitour grew by the day. About a week before his Dec. 27 kickoff, Babyface was nervous about it. "I just hope I have a voice when it's over."

His show is full of talks with the audience. A highlight during "I Give Good Love" is when he brings a woman from the audience onstage and offers to pay her rent, giving her five \$100 bills. He later sits behind a piano and plays and sings some of the hits he's written for others — like TLC's "Bin Laden," Baby, Baby," and Toni Braxton's Grammy-winning "Breathe Again."

As much fun as this tour may be, Babyface is looking forward to getting home: He's got work to do with Toni Braxton, Whitney Houston, After 7 and a few groups you haven't heard of. Yet.

The source of his lyrics is the same as it's always been — the same as when he wrote love letters to preadolescents in pigtails. He just talks to people, listens to people. He writes about relationships, about people dealing with people.

"Love is ageless," he says, "and the feelings are the same as they are as well. A lot of the things I've written were things I felt when I was a kid. The feelings are pretty universal."

"You only live once," he said. "You gotta enjoy it. You don't feel it till tomorrow morning."

It called moshing — a brutal, body-banging activity very remotely resembling dancing — and crowd-surfing, where people climb on top of the crowd and are passed, hand to hand, over people's heads. In smaller clubs, the surfers may jump up on the stage, turn around and dive back into the crowd.

Moshing isn't new — it originated as slam-dancing in the punk-rock '70s — but in recent years it has become a staple of rock concerts, spreading from hard-core and industrial rock to alternative, ska and pop-rock as well.

Hundreds of fans sprained their knees and ankles moshing in the mud at Woodstock last August, but the risk isn't

just of a bloody nose or a broken collarbone. In two reported episodes in the past seven months — one in New York City, one in London — two young men died when they dove off the stage and hit their heads, suffering major brain injuries. Two other young men broke their necks and were paralyzed from the shoulders down when they were dropped by the crowd.

In the mosh pit on the floor of Long Island's Nassau Coliseum during the Nine Inch Nails concert, 2,000 fans holding general admission tickets — which means no seats at all — played human bumper cars. From the upper mezzanine, the fans looked like a rolling, rumbling sea or a giant, porous trampoline for the surfers, who rolled and lolled along a rippling surface, limp as rag dolls, flipped and flopped by hundreds of hands.

A pair of legs would kick up and disappear into the surging mob. A head would emerge, then dunk. Where'd he get off, there he is, up for air again, peeing forward, passing over the metal barricades that hold the crowd back from the stage — oops! — and into the arms of security guards.

## Basketball bumps Seattle band from BSU pavilion

BOISE (AP) — Seattle rock band Pearl Jam has apparently been elbowed out of a concert at the Boise State University Pavilion by the men's basketball team.

"But between the time they first called and when they called back, Amy Grant signed a contract for Feb. 9," Spencer said. The team is the Pavilion's primary tenant during the season, and its pol-

icy is to not make the team practice elsewhere two days in a row.

"Basketball was the reason the building was built," said Spencer, "so we don't want to kick them out, especially before the Idaho game."

Spencer said he offered Pearl Jam the agents Feb. 7.

"They were supposed to get back to me," he said, "but I haven't heard 'boo' from them."

Spencer said it was his impression the band wanted Boise as a warm-up to break in new drummer Jack Irons prior to its Asian tour.

But Spencer thinks Boise will get another shot when Pearl Jam tours the United States this spring.

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# At 77, Diller may be speeding up

**JACKPOT** — Phyllis Diller has no plans to slow down. She's having too much fun.

Cut to Wednesday, Feb. 1. At home in Los Angeles, Diller has sandwiched a phone interview into her tip-top schedule. She attended a dinner party last night and is headed to a cocktail party tonight. Tomorrow, she leaves for a gig in Phoenix, then rushes back to California to tape two episodes of "The Bold and the Beautiful" (she plays a makeover artist on the TV soap). After that, it's off to Jackpot and two shows a night at Cactus Petes.

Known for her outrageous laugh and stand-up comedy routines, Diller has long been an entertainer in demand.

Now 77, she has starred on TV, in movies and on stage and has headlined in six countries as a professional comic.

Born in Lima, Ohio (she's going back for her 60th high school class reunion this summer), she hit it big in San Francisco. She recently accompanied her to George Bush's 50th wedding anniversary party at the Grand Ole Opry, where Diller performed.

The grandmother of four lives in a 22-room, English-style home in Brentwood Park. It's a 90-year-old house sitting on an acre of carefully-tended lawns. Diller calls it her fairyland.

Then the comedy starts. "The place used to be haunted," she says, "but the ghosts haven't been back since the night I tried on

all my wigs." In truth, Diller has one of the largest and most expensive off-stage wardrobes in the world. Also off stage, she likes to cook and read.

Once enrolled at Chicago's Sherwood Music Conservatory, she eventually racked up 20 years of study in classical piano and performed with 100 symphonies between 1972 and 1982 ("Don't have time for that anymore").

She also wrote four best-selling books for Doubleday, including "Phyllis Diller's Housekeeping Hints" and "The Joys of Aging and How to Avoid Them" ("all out of print forever").

Along the way, Diller received an honorary doctorate and a USO Liberty Bell Award for her work with the armed forces. She's also received the Cancer Institute Humanitarian Award and has been inducted into the Ohio Women's Hall of Fame.

Diller still writes most of her own comedy material, editing her words so tightly that she can deliver as many as 12 punchlines a minute. She strictly avoids off-color jokes and situations, even in today's permissive atmosphere.

Diller describes her live show as "one hour of laughs, pure fun."

# 'Danger' in video stores

**"Clear and Present Danger"** (PG-13). Based on the Tom Clancy best seller, this movie brings back Harrison Ford as Jack Ryan.

This time around, he's promoted from analyst to deputy director when Alan James Greer (James Earl Jones) is diagnosed with pancreatic cancer.

While investigating the death of a friend of the president, Ryan discovers the dead man was a money launderer for drug lord Ernesto Escobedo (Miguel Sandoval), and soon is thrust into the "war on drugs."

Only problem: Who are the enemies? In true Clancy style, enemies are both within and without. In this case, the bad guys go all the way up to the White House and back, and pepper the Colombian jungles.

Straddling the middle is a former intelligence officer for Fidel Castro, Felix Cortez (Joaquin de Almeida), who has his own agenda regarding the balance of drug power.

As Ryan delves into his own investigation, the CIA's deputy director of operations, Robert Ritter (Henry Czerny), and National Security Adviser James Cutter (Harris Yulin) launch the president's secret, covert action in Colombia to eradicate drug labs, warehouses and the drug lords themselves.

Heading the attack is a dedicated CIA operative named Mr. Clark (Willem Dafoe), who commands the high-tech raids from his hotel room equipped with computer, transmitters and cellular phones.

Ryan is set up as the fall guy for the smarmy Ritter and the self-righteous president (Donald Moffat).

On the action scale, "Clear and Present Danger" rates an eight. There's no high-tech silliness, but some nicely choreographed destruction.

A sniper attack in Bogota on a car caravan carrying Ryan and other government officials is superb and will have you on the edge of your seat. (Associated Press) (Video West, Blockbuster).

"It Could Happen to You" (PG). No it couldn't. Not for as long as you live, not ever, and that's the glory of the thing.

This daydreamy comic fable from writer-director Andrew Bergman presents the world not as it is but as we wish it could be — a place where good things happen to decent people.

Its hero is New York City cop Charlie (Nicolas Cage), a sweet-natured regular guy who, while on a lunch break one-day, comes up short on the tip for his cup of coffee.

**How could South have improved his chance?** He must put first things first. Regardless of what may happen in the other suits, South must take the heart finesse sooner or later. So he should take this finesse at trick two. When it wins, other options become available.

When West covers the heart queen, dummy wins and South discards his low heart on dummy's club king. South ruffs a club, cashes his heart jack and leads a trump to dummy's ace, refusing the finesse. After ruffing dummy's low heart, South exits with a trump and the defense is finished. Regardless of who wins the king, South enjoys either a ruff and sluff or a free finesse and the slam is scored.

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Q: Susan Sarandon has been quoted as saying she took the role of Marmee in the new screen version of the classic "Little Women" — even though it is a supporting role — as a gesture to her young daughter. Isn't this just to cover up that Sarandon's not getting any big roles now that she's "over the hill"? — L.C.

A: Not so. It's true that Susan Sarandon now 48, made a career switch by playing a minor and somewhat saccharine role in "Little Women," but, as you noted, she did it for her daughter Eva, 9. Susan is officially billed in the number 11 spot in this picture, but she still continues to receive an impressive share of scripts to read. Her starring role in "The Client" was well received, and you can see a more familiar, super-charged Sarandon in "Safe Passage" with Sam Shepard.

Q: We rented a tape of Gary Cooper's Oscar-winning performance in the 1952 movie classic "High Noon." Was this film written expressly for Coop? — F.B.

A: As is the case with many great films, it turns out that the acclaimed star was by no means the initial choice. With "High Noon," Cooper was offered the role of the marshal only after Marlon Brando, Montgomery Clift and Charlton Heston had turned it down for one reason or another.

Q: In her new book, Joan Collins shares her personal secrets for keeping fit and happy. Is she really all that qualified to write on those subjects? — H.R.

A: Joan certainly be-

lives she is. Her new book is titled "Health, Youth And Happiness: My Secrets" (Dove Books/Putnam, \$22.95). It is characteristically tart and outspoken — Joan hates to be bored.

did the producers achieve this weird mix? — K.N.

A: Much of the credit goes to Ken Adam, the production designer. One of his earlier movies, "Barry Lyndon" (1975), earned an Oscar for Best Set Design for its authentic 18th century designs.

As for that slightly skewed quality, Adam is also responsible for the look of "Addams Family Values," which certainly reflected a family with madness on its mind.

Q: I know Claudette Colbert demanded that cameramen photograph only the left side of her

face because she honestly felt the right profile was unflattering. Anyone on today's entertainment scene who exerts this kind of clout with the camera? — D.C.

A: My photographer Julio Iglesias has a similar hang-up and that he tries to insist he's photographed from the right only. The reason, I hear, is that the singer has a bald spot on the left side of his head. "Julio's a good guy," the paparazzo told me, "and I feel his request isn't really vanity, just professionalism, so we try to honor it."

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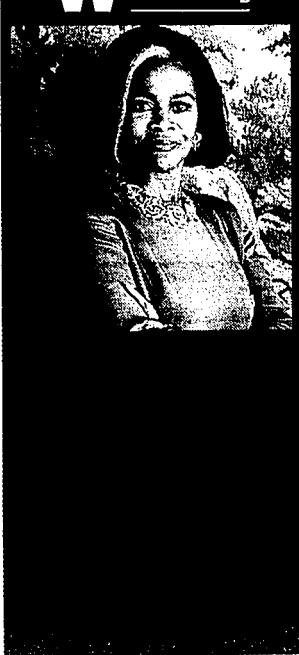

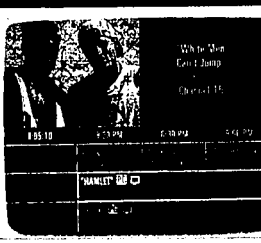

### South of the border

Llamas have been very useful animals to the Indians of South America for years and years.

The Indians of Peru and Bolivia made great use of them as beasts of burden.

They also used llamas for their:

- meat for food
- hides for sandals
- tallow for candles
- wool for blankets and clothes
- braided hairs for rope
- dried droppings for fuel



For hundreds of years, llamas have been beasts of burden in the mountains of the Andes. Most of the llamas in the United States are imported from Bolivia, Peru and Chile.

### Llamas to the U.S.A.



While you might not play a serious game of golf with a llama as a caddy, they are popular attractions at Talamore, a golf course in Southern Pines, N.C. Llama caddies always work in pairs and are led by a handler.

Llamas are becoming popular livestock here. There are about 75,000 in this country and Canada. Livestock are farm animals such as cows, horses and sheep.

At one time llamas were brought to this country by the rich, who used them as living lawn mowers on their estates. Folks today have found that llamas have many other uses.

### The camelids are back



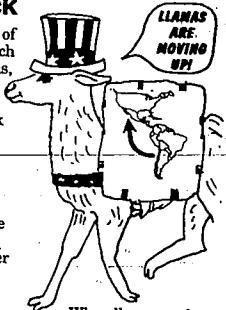
A llama is a member of the camelid family, which includes camels, vicuñas, guanacos and alpacas.

Their very earliest roots can be traced back to ... guess where? The United States! As early as 40 million years ago, they roamed the plains

here. At that time, continents were connected. About 3 million years ago, the camelids migrated to other continents, but later became extinct here.



• Camelids are grazers, eating all kinds of grasses. Their stomachs have three sections. (However, camels will eat lots of different things when they're really hungry.)



• When llamas and other camelids walk, two legs on the same side move forward at the same time. This makes riding one very rocky.

3. Bake in a preheated, 350-degree oven for 30 minutes. Serves 6.

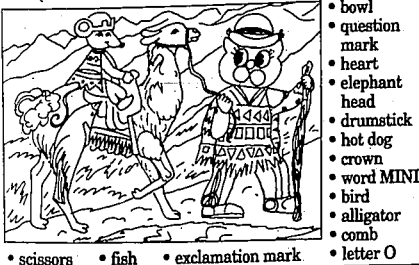

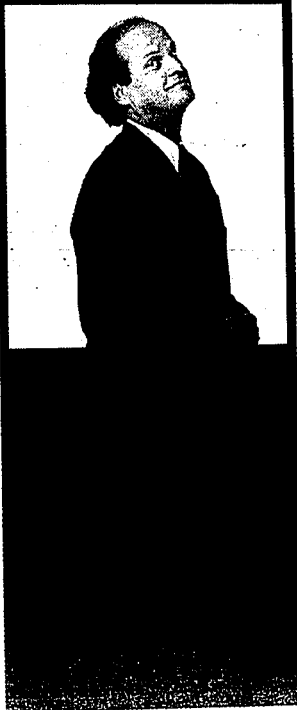

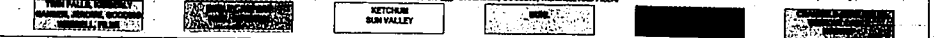
