# Idaho wolf didn't kill calf

## But agents take heat in probe of wolf killing

TWIN FALLS — A wolf shot dead in January near Salmon did not kill the calf that was also found dead nearby, according to an autopsy, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service officials announced Friday.

"The calf is believed to have been still-born or to have died of natural causes shortly after birth," said a news release from the agency's Portland office. Autopsies on both animals were conducted by the University of Oregon's School of Veterinary Medicine.

It is against federal law to kill any of the Canadian wolves recently transplanted to Idaho unless the animal is in the act of killing livestock. No one has admitted to killing the Salmon wolf.

The wolf's slaying is under investigation by Fish and Wildlife officers, three of whom have been accused of improper behavior by the Lemhi County sheriff. The trio was attempting to search for evidence this week in the privately owned field where the wolf was found dead.

# Future Gem neighbors support Fuhrman

COEUR D'ALENE — In this remote town of peaks and pines, where the police shoot stubborn moose from city streets and rescue hapless motorists from wild snows, the O.J. Simpson double murder trial seems incredibly distant — and yet, incredibly relevant.

Dozen of former Los Angeles police officers have settled here over the years. They will soon be joined by Mark Fuhrman, the beleaguered detective who took the stand Thursday.

Fuhrman faces a brutal grilling from Simpson's lawyers, who have blasted him as a racist rogue bent on framing the former football star by planting a bloody glove at his house.

As soon as it's over, Fuhrman plans to retire, seeking peace in these snow-draped mountains of the Idaho panhandle.

His future neighbors say they understand why.

For the most part, they say they left Los Angeles fed up with the knee-jerk hostility their uniforms provoked. The Simpson trial, they believe, has undercut officers' credibility still further. The defense has tried to portray the Los Angeles Police Department as a slipshod corps of bumbling

Now that lawyers have been allowed to poke through Fuhrman's personnel files and root through confidential department records, more "officers are going to say 'Why put up with it?'" former Los Angeles County Sheriff's Sgt. Jeffrey Thomas added. "Good officers are going to leave. They want to get out."

Those who have already gotten out refuse to gloat.

Instead, as they watched Simpson updates this week, some former Los Angeles cops found themselves identifying with the department they so glady left behind. Although most have adopted the local quirk of referring to Los Angeles as "down south," the officers still talk of the LAPD as "our department." And they bristled as though personally insulted when they caught snippets of the defense lawyers' assaults on LAPD detectives.

Kelly Wilhoit fairly boiled at insinuations that detectives at the murder scene should have called the coroner more quickly. "It takes time to gather all the evidence (before moving the bodies) and that's a fact," she said.

Her husband, George, like his wife a former LAPD veteran, was steamed that anyone would challenge the detective's decision.

## Widely used blood pressure drugs may increase risk of heart attacks

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Six million Americans who are taking a class of drugs to lower blood pressure may instead be increasing their risk of heart attacks by 60 percent, researchers reported Friday.

The drugs, called calcium channel blockers, are nifedipine, diltiazem and verapamil. They are sold under various brand names, including Adalat, Calan, Cardizem, Dilacor, Isonipin, Procardia and Verelan.

National guidelines recommend the use of beta blockers and diuretics to lower high blood pressure.

Calcium channel blockers also have been widely used to treat high blood pressure, but in recent years studies have shown they don't work very well and are not considered the best treatment.

However, many American cardiologists are still prescribing them for that purpose, said study author Dr. Bruce Psaty, an epidemiologist at the University of Washington in Seattle.

"We are very concerned about these results," he said. "We believe these findings are important from a public health point of view, I think it's important."

Previous studies have suggested that calcium channel blockers can be dangerous when given to patients immediately after a heart attack, or when they are given some time later to prevent a second heart attack.

This is the first suggestion that they are dangerous in the large group of outwardly healthy people who are trying to prevent heart attacks by lowering their blood pressure, Psaty said.

About 50 million Americans suffer from high blood pressure, greatly increasing their chances of a heart attack.

Half of those are being treated, and about 25 percent of the patients being treated are getting calcium

### Report on '60s study suggests margarine doubles hazard

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Men who ate six teaspoons of margarine per day had twice the heart disease risk of men who did not eat any margarine, a study has found.

The study failed to find any harmful effects from the consumption of butter, but researchers said that finding was probably due to the study's limitations.

It was the latest of several studies to point an accusing finger at margarine, which has long been touted as a safer alternative to butter. But not all studies have found margarine to be harmful, and researchers are scrambling to try to resolve what has become a murky issue.

There's one thing they agree

on: It's not time to give up on margarine and go back to butter.

The most recent findings were based on information gathered during from 1966-1969 in the Framingham Heart Study, a well-known, decades-long study of residents of the Boston suburb of Framingham.

The risks are probably much lower now because the margarine sticks sold in the 1960s had far higher levels of trans fatty acids than most of the tubs of soft margarine and low-fat spreads sold today, said one of the new study's authors, Dr. Matthew Gillman, an epidemiologist at Harvard Medical School.

channel blockers, Psaty said. That amounts to about 6 million Americans.

Dr. Paul Ridker, a cardiologist and epidemiologist at the Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, who wasn't involved in the study, said doctors continue to use calcium channel blockers in part because drug companies have "marketed them beyond what the data shows."

Another reason may be that many cardiologists are not familiar with the most recent research data on the drugs' effectiveness.

"There have been several studies saying these are hazardous for your health, but they're still being used," Ridker said.

Psaty studied 623 people who had had heart attacks and a control group of 2,032 who hadn't. When he determined the drugs they had been taking, he found that those on calcium channel blockers had a heart disease

risk 60 percent higher than those taking beta blockers or diuretics.

The study was funded by the National Institutes of Health.

Psaty said he prescribes calcium channel blockers for some patients who don't respond to beta blockers or diuretics. But calcium channel blockers shouldn't be used routinely, he said.

Dr. John T. Henderson, a senior vice president at the Pfizer pharmaceutical company in New York, said he didn't think all calcium channel blockers were likely to have the same risks. "These drugs aren't absolutely identical," he said. Pfizer makes Procardia.

Psaty said he looked at several different kinds of calcium channel blockers in his study and could find no difference in risk among them. Henderson said Psaty's study might not have been large enough to find differences.

## Dole seeks cut of 4 Cabinet departments

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hoping to bolster his conservative credentials for the 1996 presidential race, Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole proposed eliminating four Cabinet departments he said cost taxpayers \$70 billion a year and do more harm than good.

In urging an end to the departments of Education, Energy, Commerce and Housing and Urban Development, Dole said Friday that Republicans must be more drastic in their search for spending cuts to balance the budget and shift power from Washington.

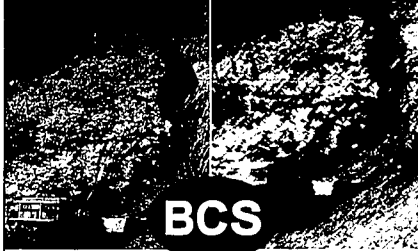
"And I think the best place to start is with four of the most ineffective, burdensome and meddlesome departments," Dole told the National Newspaper Association, an organization of community newspaper editors.

Dole said the four agencies, which have a combined 74,000 workers, "were supposed to be the answer to our challenges in education, poverty, energy and economic opportunity."

Instead, he said, "more than \$1 trillion later, they have caused more problems than they have solved. Today, these agencies are defined more by bottlenecks and bureaucracy, scandal and waste, than anything remotely connected with success."

Dole's proposal — which drew quick criticism from the Clinton administration and one of his GOP presidential rivals — came as a new poll showed him far and away the early favorite for the Republican nomination.

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## THE CHIROPRACTIC COLUMN

Not many U.S. doctors have heard about the Canadian back pain study, but they probably will soon — because chiropractors can't stop talking about it.

The study — done by a team of Canadian health economists commissioned and funded by the Ontario Ministry of Health — is based on an extensive review of international medical literature, as well as interviews with researchers, practitioners and patients.

Its conclusion: that the best clinical studies show spinal manipulation by chiropractors is more effective, safer and more cost-effective than other treatments for low-back pain.

The report's principal researcher, Brian Manga, says chiropractors could save hundreds of millions of dollars a year, but he doesn't stop there.

"Many medical therapies are of questionable validity or are clearly inadequate, some are 'unsafe,' or even cause complications," the report says.

Manga says he found "good empirical evidence patients are very satisfied" with chiropractors and "considerably less satisfied with physician management of low-back pain. Many pay out-of-pocket for chiropractor bills not covered by insurance; they wouldn't if it didn't help," he says.

Manga, reached by phone at the University of Ottawa, where he is a professor, says he is a little embarrassed "at having become chiropractors' champion."

"I don't know where they got the study — I did not talk to a single chiropractor or person working with them, and they did not know the study was being done," he says.

He knows his report may benefit chiropractors. But it seems so positive one can't help but wonder: does he have some personal interest in giving chiropractors a boost?

"My interest is serving the public interest," he responds. "It's not personal, and not family related. If anything, I have many (medical) doctors in my family."

He simply believes his findings. "The outcome is over-powering," he says.

When asked why, it is this, true, medical doctors don't seem to know it. Manga says, "I think doctors do know chiropractors are better and more effective 'for back pain.' Their belief (chiropractors) also treat other kinds of problems."

# Mondale joins air raid observance

TOKYO (AP) — Fifty years after U.S. firebombs incinerated much of Tokyo and killed 100,000 people, Walter Mondale became the first U.S. ambassador to show American sorrow by attending a memorial service for the victims.

"It's a good time for us to be here. Whatever our differences in the war, there's no joy in hurting people or in losing lives or bloodshed," Mondale said at Friday's commemoration of the deadliest conventional bombing raid of World War II.

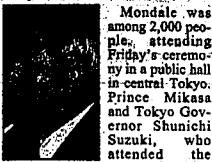
"I wanted to come here to say how sorry we are for how people had to suffer," Mondale said. Just after midnight on March 10, 1945, 334 U.S. bombers, the first of many sorties, started dropping napalm and incendiary explosives. The bombing runs were part of an intensifying effort by the United States to end a war that began with the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941.

Within hours, entire sections of Tokyo were engulfed in flames. When the burning stopped, 16 square miles — one-fifth of the Japanese capital — was destroyed. The flames destroyed so much that no accurate death toll was ever compiled. Estimates run from 83,000 to 197,000, but 100,000 is the most frequently used figure.

The only worse attack was the U.S. atomic bombing of Hiroshima, which is estimated to have killed 140,000 people.

Mondale praised the distance the former enemies have come since those days of intense hatred and bitter combat. "For 50 years now, the United States and Japan have been working together building the peace, building a strong relationship, and because of that the world is much safer and much more hopeful," he said.

"For all the tragedy," Mondale said, "I think we've learned our lesson and we're doing better."



Mondale was among 2,000 people, attending Friday's ceremony in a public hall in central Tokyo. Prince Mikasa and Tokyo Governor Shunichi Suzuki, who attended the memorial, also led 600 participants in burning incense and paying homage to the victims in religious services at the Tokyo Memorial Hall in Sumida, one of the tightest-hit residential areas.

Until the war ended in 1945, March 10 was celebrated in Japan as Army Day, a symbol of the Japanese imperialistic muscle. The day is now known as Peace Day.

Meanwhile, Japan's defense chief said Friday he would be willing to attend a memorial service in September for victims of the Japanese surprise attack on U.S. naval forces at Pearl Harbor, if he is invited.

Commemorations marking the 50th anniversary of the war have sparked bitter controversy on both sides of the Pacific. Japanese press reports have said Japan was quietly asking U.S. officials not to send invitations to U.S. commemorations because it would be awkward to decline or accept them.

A U.S. plan for a stamp depicting an atomic mushroom cloud over Hiroshima was withdrawn after Japan protested, and objections from Japanese conservatives kept Emperor Akihito from visiting the Pearl Harbor area of Hawaii. The Smithsonian Institution in Washington also repeatedly altered its plans for an exhibit on the atomic bombings of Japan after American veterans' groups protested that they were too sympathetic to Japan.

## Bomb, rifle fire kill 10 at Muslim mosque

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — A bomb on a motorbike exploded Friday outside a packed Muslim mosque and gunmen shot at people running to aid the wounded.

At least 10 people died, seven of them children, in the latest terrorist assault to rock this tormented city. The attack came two days after two American consulate employees were gunned down in Pakistan's largest city, where more than 400 people have died in sectarian violence this year.

There was no evidence linking Friday's attack to the killing of the two Americans. However, both were horrific examples of the surging violence that has convulsed Karachi and threatens to undermine Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto's government.

Children accounted for seven of the dead and half of the 28 wounded in the thundering explosion outside the main entrance of the Hussaini Jamia Mosque in east Karachi. The children were playing while hundreds of worshippers crammed the mosque during afternoon prayers on the Muslim sabbath.

Mohammed Ali, his tan clothes smeared with blood, said he picked up four dead or badly wounded children and put them in cars. One young boy was decapitated by the blast, he said.

As people rushed to rescue the wounded, the terrorists opened fire with automatic rifles, according to Ali and other witnesses. Gunshots echoed through the normally peaceful working-class neighborhood well after the blast.

The victims were rushed to Jinnah Hospital, where the scene in the emer-

gency room was pure pandemonium. Dozens of relatives, friends and spectators surrounded doctors frantically working to save the wounded. At least 15 onlookers peered in as doctors tried to staunch flow of blood from the chest of a man named Farhan.

Women wailed and collapsed with grief in the hot, stuffy room. A young boy, bleeding from the head and leg, screamed in agony as he was lifted from a wooden bench and placed on a gurney.

Hundreds of flies quickly descended on another blood-soaked gurney after a dead child was covered and taken away.

The hallway was so packed that stretcher-bearers had to push their way down the corridor when they brought in fresh wounded. Amid the crying and shouting several shoving matches erupted.

Outside, dozens of paramilitary troops with automatic rifles simply stood and watched as people poured into the emergency rooms.

The deadly bomb weighed about four pounds and was placed on a motorbike outside the mosque, said Moemenudin, who goes by one name, of the police bomb disposal unit. The blast damaged or destroyed three cars and two motorbikes.

No one took responsibility for the attack on the Shiite Muslim mosque, which was believed linked to the sectarian violence involving militant Sunni and Shiite Muslims. Many neighborhood residents blamed the Sunni group, Sipah-e-Sahaba, or Guardians of the Friends of the Prophet.

## Arafat cites Israel in violent acts

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip (AP) — PLO Chairman Yasser Arafat pledged Friday to disarm suspected terrorists and to try promptly, but he accused Israel of helping set up their organizations in the first place.

"Don't forget, these kinds of groups have been established by the help of the Israeli government before my arrival," Arafat said after accepting an appeal from Secretary of State Warren Christopher for tougher anti-

## terrorist measures.

"You know that, and you can ask the Israeli officials." The charge was dismissed as "nonsense" by Oded Ben-Ami, spokesman for Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin.

Christopher's call on Arafat at his Mediterranean headquarters produced what U.S. officials hoped will be pre-emptive arrests and confiscation of weapons from militants in the area administered by the fledgling Palestinian Authority.

## Meningitis kills more than 500

NIAMEY, Niger (AP) — A meningitis outbreak has killed 529 people in this west-central African country, and thousands more are ill with the disease, the health minister said Friday.

Doctors from the French branch of Doctors Without Borders were expected to arrive next weekend to help fight the epidemic, which has affected about 5,000 people, Health Minister Kalla Hankourou said.

He said the official figures of dead and ill could rise dramatically as reports come in from hospitals far from the capital, Niamey. In Niamey's main hospital, about five people a day are dying, most of them infants.

Meningitis, fatal if not treated promptly, is an acute inflammation of the membranes of the brain or spinal cord resulting from infection with a bacteria or virus. It can be transmitted by sneezing, kissing or sharing food or beverages.

## Tibetans march for independence

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — About 500 Tibetan refugees began walking from their northern India headquarters to New Delhi Friday, hoping to step up pressure on China for Tibet's independence.

The planned 440-mile march reflected growing impatience by a younger generation of Tibetans with the Dalai Lama, Tibet's spiritual leader, whose offer to compromise on complete independence has failed to win comparable concessions from Beijing. China took over the country in

1951, claiming it historically was a Chinese province.

Despite differences, the Dalai Lama was among 7,000 people who turned out to see the marchers off from Dharamsala, the Himalayan mountain city that is the seat of his government-in-exile, Tibetan officials said. The march, expected to take 18 days, commemorates the 36th anniversary of an uprising in Lhasa, Tibet's capital, that was crushed by the Chinese army, forcing the Dalai Lama into exile, along with 120,000 other Tibetans.

Meanwhile, at Immanuel Lutheran School in Twin Falls, students celebrated their week by dressing up for Summer Day, School Colors Day, Dress Up Day, Hat Day and Clash Day.

Wednesday was Family Day, when kids' families spent part of the day at school. There was also a food drive for a local food bank, student/faculty games, a talent show, a spring carnival and a special worship service and open house.

With an impish grin and two quick pat-a-cake strokes, he sent an important — and unfinished — project on a one-way journey up the information superhighway. But was Jon trying to tell me something? I don't know. Still, I'm beginning to have serious doubts about any "circle of life" in which he and I have to share a word processor.

I grew up in a family of athletes. My father was a star in high school and college, and my brothers were similarly athletically oriented. Since I was the youngest — and tallest — male in the family, I always felt that I was expected to continue in the tradition. And I did — sort of. I played basketball and football through my sophomore year of high school, and I enjoyed it. But I also enjoyed other things, including drama. Then came my junior year, when the school production of "Fiddler on the Roof" was going to run right smack dab through the middle of basketball season. There was no way I could be in both, and so I had to make a choice.

I still remember the long walk home the day I decided to attend auditions for the musical instead of basketball tryouts. Over and over, I practiced the speech I had prepared to explain my decision to my father. But when I told him that I had been cast as the rabbi's son and that meant I wouldn't be playing basketball that year, he just smiled at me — proudly.

"We've had lots of basketball players in this family," he said. "But we've never had an actor! I think it's about time we had one. Not you!"

We still don't have an actor in the family. I changed directions — again — halfway through my college career. But this time I did so confidently, knowing that personal growth occasionally makes such adjustments necessary — even welcome — in the rectangle of life. If you're in the circle.

## College ward leaders aim to make the grade

TWIN FALLS — When the LDS college kids outgrow their building, church leaders did their homework.

The result: On Feb. 19, the Twin Falls College Ward became the Twin Falls College 1st Ward and the Twin Falls College 2nd Ward.

Numbers are increasing, local leaders say, partly because of population increases. The college wards are open to any singles, ages 19 to 30, in the community, regardless of whether or not they are attending college. Married couples who are college students are also members of the college wards.

And the College of Southern Idaho is picking up new students every semester.

"There are ceilings on student enrollment at both Brigham Young University and Rice," now, said Twin Falls West Stake President Grant Starley. "The church (here) is encouraging young people to go to CSI."

Located across the street from the CSI campus, the LDS Institute of Religion building is being used as the meeting place for both new college wards.

There are currently 250 members in the two wards, up from 80 in 1988 and 90 in 1991. The location of students' residences determines which college ward meetings they attend.

Sunday sacrament meetings for college students are similar to those held at other wards, explained outgoing Bishop Tom Tucker, who's been heading up the work at the Twin Falls College Ward for the past four years.

Generally, there is more emphasis on missionary work, because many college-age Mormons are either going on or returning from missions.

On Sunday nights, there are fireside gatherings featuring guest speakers from the community. Monday nights are mostly social, with a short lesson followed by volleyball or flag football. In the summer, when lots of students are home from colleges and universities outside Twin Falls, there are golf and tennis tournaments and water skiing outings. In between, there are dances.

"It's a high-energy age group," Tucker said.

Max Leavitt, religion teacher/institute director, acts as the LDS liaison to the CSI campus. He's in charge of college religion classes at the Institute of Religion (similar to the seminary program for high school students). He also works with the LDS fraternities, sororities and student associations at CSI.

College ward bishops are responsible for counseling troubled students.

"I probably spent 10 or 20 hours a week in one-on-one counseling," Tucker said, "and my two

counselors were doing some, too." Problems too difficult to handle in house are referred to the LDS Social Services or to professional counselors in the community.

"The bulk of the (college ward) bishop's time is spent counseling youth," explained Twin Falls Stake President Monte Carlson, who was involved in the leadership of the Twin Falls College Ward when it was first organized in 1971.

In the newly divided group, the Twin Falls College 1st Ward is part of the Twin Falls West Stake, and the Twin Falls College 2nd Ward is part of the Twin Falls Stake.

Leaders of the Twin Falls College 1st Ward are Paul Burnett, bishop; Kevin Guthrie, first counselor; and Eric Dahl, second counselor. Leaders of the Twin Falls College 2nd Ward are Bob McMillen, bishop; Gary Walker, first counselor; and Jim Hughes, second counselor.
