Welfare reform

Line-item veto passes

WASHINGTON — The Senate approved a line-item veto bill Thursday night giving presidents greater power to kill spending programs passed by Congress.

Republicans hailed the 69-29 vote as another victory in their multi-pronged effort to trim government as part of the "Contract With America" signed by GOP House candidates last fall.

The line-item veto rests on the idea that Congress needs outside discipline, in this case the president, to control its spending habits.

"You are going to see a much more fiscally disciplined Congress," said Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., who has been working 10 years to pass a law giving presidents more authority to disapprove congressional appropriations.

The bill now goes to a House-Senate conference to work out differences with a House version passed last month.

WASHINGTON — The House voted Thursday to yank the driving and occupational licenses of parents who scorn their child support obligations as Democrats and Republicans reached a rare agreement in their bitter fight over the GOP's welfare reform plan.

One by one, Republicans who voted against the amendment in committee took to the House floor to declare their support. "I've come along to your way of thinking on this," said one, Rep. Clay Shaw of Florida.

The measure passed, 426-5, after three days of emotional debate on the GOP's plan to reverse 60 years of social policies and replace the federal welfare system with block grants to the states.

"There is probably no greater scandal in American society today than ... the millions of children who are living in poverty because of the lack of responsibility and accountability by the men who caused those families," said Rep. Jim Moran, D-Va.

The Clinton administration says taking away licenses will raise \$2.5 billion in child support over 10 years.

At the White House, President Clinton applauded the vote, saying the provision "sends a clear signal: No parent in America has a right to walk away from the responsibility to raise their children."

In a series of voice votes, the House also approved GOP amendments that would increase funding for child care, require states to hold

Democrats said those changes merely tinkered with a bill that shrinks welfare spending by \$66 billion over five years. Much of the savings comes from denying cash, food stamps and health care to 2.2 million legal immigrants.

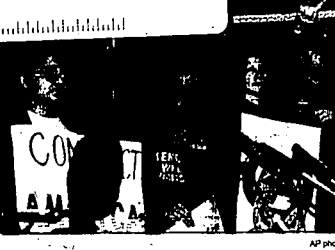
Rep. Corrine Brown, D-Fla., complained that the legislation does not create a single job and does nothing to help the poor make the transition from welfare to work.

"Haste makes waste," she declared. "Republicans are in a hurry to pay for the tax breaks for the rich at the expense of hungry children, the elderly and veterans. Once the sound bites are over the American people will realize that the 'Contract With America' is a Contract On Shame, shame, shame. Republican shame."

Votes were scheduled later on two Democratic alternatives: a liberal prescription from Rep. Patsy Mink of Hawaii and a centrist bill from Rep. Nathan Deal of Georgia.

Deal's plan requires parents on welfare to move immediately into a work, education or training program, and requires recipients to move into a job after two years. Teen-age mothers could receive cash, provided they live at home, stay in school and cooperate with child support enforcement.

Mink's plan provides recipients with the education, job training and child care to find and keep a job. There are no time limits on benefits.

Protests bring arrests

WASHINGTON — National Organization for Women President Patricia Ireland was led from the Capitol Rotunda in handcuffs Thursday after staging a protest against the Republican welfare bill being debated in the House chamber.

"Stop the war on women," Ireland shouted as police arrested her and the four other women gathered beneath the Capitol dome. They carried

hand-lettered posters decrying the GOP "Contract With America" and caricaturing House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., as a reptile.

An additional 35 to 40 protesters hooted and applauded the five women but remained behind police lines to avoid arrest.

The protest lasted less than five minutes as Capitol Police allowed the women to make brief statements before making the arrests.

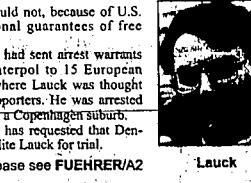

BONN, Germany — An American neo-Nazi dubbed the "Farm Belt Fuehrer" was under arrest Thursday in Denmark, while police in Germany seized weapons and propaganda in raids on 80 homes of his teenage supporters.

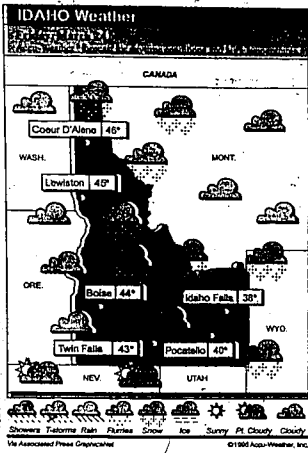
Lauck had thwarted German authorities for two decades while acting as the main supplier of hate literature to German fascists. The 41-year-old Lauck once claimed Jews were the "main belligerents" in World War II.

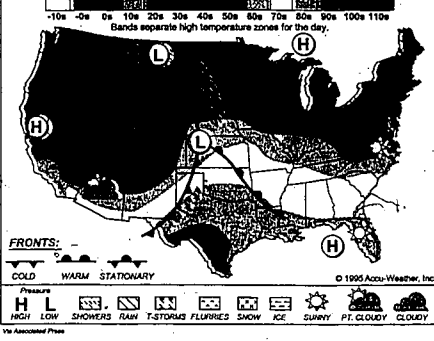

board's expenses are both ordinary and necessary. Any other complaints Silvers and his supporters might have with the project should not sway Burdick, Hempelman said Thursday.
Leon Smith, the E911 board's lawyer, said Thursday that the scope of the judicial ruling is limited to whether the board, in borrowing up to \$3.6 million for a consolidated E911 emergency dispatching system, is making an "ordinary and necessary" expense as allowed under the Idaho Constitution.
"The statute allowing E911 declares it as necessary," Smith said. The big question boils down to the use of the word "ordinary."
In 1990, more than 80 percent of the voters in the four counties ap-

proved a \$1 monthly fee to help pay for an E911 system. The counties decided to consolidate their efforts and have been collecting money since early 1991.
After years of political squabbling, an estimated \$1 million dispatch center was built and completed late last year southeast of Jerome. The dispatch center has some furniture in it but is otherwise empty.
The \$3.6 million loan would allow the counties to pay for the electronic, radio and other equipment to run the system.
Hempelman said the board will save itself about \$500,000 by financing through Searfirst Bank of Washington state instead of Key Bank of Idaho. The E911 board tentatively agreed to borrow money

through Key Bank, but decided to look for other proposals before agreeing to Searfirst's Wednesday night.
Hempelman said he expected Silvers to file a legal challenge.
Twin Falls city officials required the board to get judicial approval to keep the city involved as a participant in the regional system. E911 board members said last year that they didn't want to go to court for fear of a lengthy challenge.
Silvers said he is challenging the board because someone has to remind the counties that they cannot spend freely without the approval of voters. "If nobody shows up (to protest), the courts are stuck" and likely would approve the project for lack of an objection, he said.

German officials had been planning the operation against Lauck for months, but somehow he got wind of it.
On Monday, shortly before his arrest, Lauck called The Associated Press in Bonn to say he had been tipped that U.S. or German authorities were about to move against him.
Lauck said he had shut down the Lincoln operation and was going underground. "Lincoln is wiped out. We moved our files and everything so they wouldn't fall into enemy hands," he said.
A Danish supporter visited Lauck on Thursday at a jail in Roskilde, 92 miles west of Copenhagen.
"He is doing fine. We talked about what happened and he said (his arrest) came as no surprise," neo-Nazi leader Jonni Hansen told The Associated Press.
Still, he said others would take up where the American left off.
Lauck's U.S.-based organization "doesn't depend on Lauck. Others

will take over his job," Hansen said.
The warrants accuse Lauck of distributing illegal propaganda and Nazi symbols, incitement, encouraging racial hatred and belonging to a criminal group. He could be sent to jail for five years if tried and convicted.
The operation against Lauck, called "Atlantic II," was coordinated by German federal police and Hamburg law authorities, who have long had a warrant out for his arrest.
"This (propaganda) delivery route to Nazi sympathizers has been a thorn in our side for a long time and we had to get rid of it," said regional police spokesman Willi Fundermann.
Danish officials would not say why they waited until Thursday to announce Lauck's arrest, but it appeared they did not want to tip off his German followers.
Before dawn, about 800 German policemen swooped down on some 80 apartments across Germany, seizing starter pistols, ammunition for 9mm pistols and for

guns and racist propaganda.
There was a similar crackdown a few months ago, when police in Hanau confiscated a pipe bomb, a hand grenade, a starter pistol, a medical-style maze and reams of propaganda on raids against eight of Lauck's territorial units.
"We had been told they also had a bazooka, but we never found it," said Hauptmannmeister Detlev Ort.
But Ort said he didn't think the Hanau cell had actually planned any attacks.
Lauck headed the National Socialist Organization, the name Adolf Hitler gave to his party's branches.
Fluent in German, he has thousands of teen-age idolizers in Germany, which he has visited in the past. Young fascists who have met him brag about it to their friends.
Lauck says he began his organization in the early 1970s so ethnic Germans abroad would support the

Judge declares slaying mistrial

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) — A judge declared a second mistrial in the case of a teen-ager accused in the 1993 slaying of a British tourist at a highway rest area.
The jury deliberated seven hours Thursday before telling Circuit Judge F.E. Steinmeyer it was deadlocked on charges of first-degree murder, attempted murder and attempted armed robbery against John "Billy Joe" Crumitie, 18.
"I'm very sorry we are not able to reach a verdict," jury foreman John Grinzier told Steinmeyer.
Earlier in the day, Crumitie took the stand and denied he took part in the botched robbery in which Gary Colley, 34, was fatally shot and his longtime companion, Margaret Jagger, wounded.

Iraq permits visits to jailed Americans

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — For the first time, Iraq allowed Western diplomats Thursday to visit two Americans held in custody since they strayed across the border 10 days ago.
The Americans were arrested only yards from the Iraq-Kuwait border. They have been identified as David Daliberti, 41, and Bill Barlow, 39, both employees of American military contractors in Kuwait.
One source who insisted on anonymity confirmed the men are being held in Baghdad and are in good condition, but refused to give further details. Another source said they were visited by Western diplomats.
The fact that Iraq has begun to allow them visits suggests Saddam Hussein's government may be leaning toward charging them with illegal entry, a crime punishable by up to 20 years in prison, rather than releasing them.

At a news conference, Trade Minister Mohammed Mehdi Saleh hinted the men would be put on trial. Saleh said the government hasn't decided whether to do that, but noted: "We have laws in Iraq, as there are laws in the United States."
Iraqi officials have linked the fate of the men to the U.N. sanctions imposed after Iraq's 1990 invasion of Kuwait.
The sanctions, which bar Iraq from selling oil, have shattered the nation's economy, which before the 1991 Gulf War earned \$13 billion a year from oil exports.
Daliberti, of Jacksonville, Fla., and Barlow, of New Hampton, Iowa, were arrested March 13 after they crossed from Kuwait while trying to visit friends, according to U.N. officials responsible for monitoring the Iraq-Kuwait border.
"They are safe, they are well-treated," Saleh said at the news conference. He appeared to jink their fate to the U.N. sanctions.

Libyans accused in Pan Am bombing join FBI 'Most Wanted' list

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Libyan intelligence officers, charged in the bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 over Lockerbie, Scotland, were put on the FBI's Ten Most Wanted list Thursday.

In addition, a \$4 million reward was posted — the largest ever offered by the U.S. government.

"They've got to know that just because this crime happened in

1988, the United States, the FBI, the Department of Justice and the people of Scotland and England have not forgotten," Robert "Bear" Bryant, assistant FBI director for national security, told a news conference at FBI headquarters.

"We'll follow them to the ends of the world to bring them to court. We'll never quit on this case," Bryant said a variety of innova-

tive methods, in addition to the traditional wanted posters, would be used "to elicit the cooperation of the people of Libya and North Africa."

For the first time, the information was posted on the worldwide computer Internet. It also will be printed in Arabic on matchbook covers circulated in the region and sent into Libya by radio and facsimile machine. English and

Arabic posters showing a suitcase full of cash and the two will be circulated.

"We believe they are in Libya," Bryant said. He added that there are periodic reports that they travel outside that radical Arab nation, but he wouldn't say where.

Abdel Basset Ali Al-Megrahi and Lamen Khalifa Fhimah were charged here and in Scotland in

1991 with planting a suitcase bomb aboard the flight, killing all 259 passengers and crew and 11 people on the ground. There were 189 U.S. citizens among the dead.

The \$4 million reward — the maximum total for information leading to the capture and conviction of both men — includes \$2 million from the State Department and \$1 million apiece from the Air

Line Pilots Association and the Air Transport Association. Previously, there was just a generic \$1 million reward for information about the bombing.

The largest previous award was \$2 million claimed by an informant in last month's arrest of Ramzi Yousef in Pakistan on charges involving the World Trade Center bombing.

Study finds chemical that hardens like bone

WASHINGTON (AP) — A chemical compound that looks like asphalt but hardens into artificial bone within hours is streamlining the treatment of fractured limbs and offers new hope for aged, fragile bones.

The compound, now in experimental trials at 12 American hospitals, is used to hold splintered bones in place, to fill voids caused by osteoporosis and to replace some of the metal plates and screws that have been used to repair shattered hips, wrists and ankles.

"The material acts as an internal cement by holding the fragments together," said Dr. Jesse B. Jupiter, a hand surgeon at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. "It is really very dramatic."

A study to be published Friday in the journal Science found the compound is virtually identical to natural bone crystals. Once it is placed in the body, the material hardens within 10 minutes and reaches the compression strength of natural bone within 12 hours.

Within weeks, the study showed, the cement is replaced by real bone.

Because it so closely resembles bone, researchers said, the body does not reject the cement and react as it does to most foreign substances.

Clinical trials in several American hospitals and in Holland, where the compound is in regular use, show the material has allowed patients to discard casts early — or altogether — and to resume walking more quickly and with less pain.

Brent R. Constantz, co-author of the study and president of Norian Corp. of Cupertino, Calif., which developed the material, said orthopedic surgeons in Holland now use the cement to repair fractures of the wrist, hip, and leg and for total joint replacement. The cement also has been used to fill spinal voids caused by osteoporosis, a disorder that erodes natural bone.

His disclosures came in a series of telephone interviews with the AP this week from his house outside Moscow and in his new book, "Safe House," published this month.

"My hattle was with the CIA. It wasn't with the American people," Howard said in an interview. "I never gave information that could hurt America or Americans. I made some mistakes — not that they'll ever forgive me. But my anger, my hiding here, was directed at the CIA. Maybe now that CIA isn't so popular, some people will understand me."

Ex-CIA agent admits KGB role

But Edward Lee Howard says he didn't give info 'that could hurt' U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Edward Lee Howard, the fired CIA officer blamed for exposing Russians who spied for the United States, admits he cooperated with the KGB after he fled to Moscow but denies revealing any information "that could hurt America."

The 43-year-old former spy, still wanted here for espionage, asserted for the first time that before he was fired in 1983 the CIA intended him to work with a \$250 million technical eavesdropping project in Moscow — not with human agents.



Howard, in an interview with The Associated Press, also revealed that he was in the Soviet Union under KGB protection just three days after he used his CIA training to slip from round-the-clock FBI surveillance in New Mexico in September 1985. And he claimed that the KGB helped him visit the United States under an assumed name in 1986 and arranged for him to see U.S. government files about his case.

Howard argues he was set up as a suspected traitor by Vitaly Yurchenko, a KGB officer who defected to the United States in 1985 but returned to Russia three months later. He claims Yurchenko could only have known of him as a good candidate for recruitment because of his anger.

Howard says Yurchenko may have intended to divert attention from "Aldrich Ames," the CIA officer unmasked last year as Moscow's most valuable spy, who exposed 10 Western agents in Moscow. In the mid-1980s, Howard had been blamed by U.S. officials for some of these losses.

But he thinks Yurchenko acted on his own rather than under orders, because he was punished upon his return.

Howard denies U.S. charges that he sold information to the Soviets before he fled America and says only FBI pressure on him to confess and fear that he would not be believed in court drove him into the arms of the KGB.

Senate committee approves limited regulatory reform

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate committee approved a scaled-back regulatory reform bill Thursday, requiring federal agencies to pay more attention to costs when issuing regulations. The measure is far less restrictive than a bill already approved by the House.

The legislation approved 15-0 by the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee would require that any federal rule costing the economy \$100 million undergo a formal cost-benefit and comparative risk review before being issued.

It also would allow Congress to block a regulation under some circumstances.

The measure is part of a series of bills aimed at reducing the flow of federal rules and standards from Washington and address growing complaints that businesses are being unfairly burdened by excessive, costly and unneeded regulations.

The legislation and a more sweeping version proposed by Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., still await action in the Judiciary Committee.

Last month, the House as part of the GOP's "Contract With America" agenda approved a wide-reaching bill requiring federal agencies to comply with complex cost-benefit and risk review procedures. Critics said the House-approved bill would spawn thousands of lawsuits and jeopardize needed health, safety and environmental regulations.

The compromise bill is far less sweeping and was embraced not only by Republicans, but Democrats who called it a common-sense approach to dealing with regulatory abuses.

Sen. John Glenn, D-Ohio, ranking member of the committee, said the legislation "provides tough medicine for our regulatory process" while assuring that businesses are not hamstrung by court challenges and repeated risk and cost-benefit reviews.

Witness: Gunman targeted him

WASHINGTON (AP) — A businessman with a haircut similar to President Clinton's testified the gunfire at the White House last October appeared to be directed at him and three companions.

"We said to one another, 'They're shooting at us,'" Dennis Basso said Thursday during the trial of Francisco Martin Duran, 26, a Colorado Springs, Colo., man accused of trying to kill the president Oct. 29.

Federal prosecutors trying to win a conviction on an assassination charge argue that Duran opened fire after mistaking Basso for Clinton. Defense attorneys have said Duran was firing randomly.

Basso, a gray-haired, 220-pound furrier, said he and the others were finishing a tour of the White House and were standing just outside when the shooting began. As leaves on trees shook and tufts of dirt popped up, he and the others crouched down.

Secret Service officers led them back inside. Investigators questioned the group next door in the Old Executive Office Building.

During cross-examination, defense attorney A.J. Kramer questioned Basso on exactly where he was standing at the time of the shooting.

Duran is being tried on 10 counts, which could put him behind bars for life.

Montana repeals anti-gay part of bill

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Overwhelmed by criticism, the Montana Senate today scrapped a provision in a sex-offender bill that would have required people convicted of homosexual acts to register with police.

The Senate on voice vote and without debate stripped the provision from the bill, only a day after the bill had passed the Senate. The House had not voted on it.

Gov. Marc Racicot said it fielded about 100 phone calls before noon from people critical of the gay-registration section in the bill.

Prosecutor Clark goes on attack, accuses Kaelin of hiding details

LOS ANGELES (AP) — In an aggressive attack on her own key witness' credibility, a prosecutor suggested Thursday that Brian "Kato" Kaelin is covering up for O.J. Simpson by hiding details of angry battles between the former football star and his ex-wife.

"There's nothing I tried to hide from you," the rattled witness said beseechingly to Deputy District Attorney Marcia Clark, trying to explain why he never told a grand jury last June that one of the fights led to a 911 call for police help.

"I knew if it was a 911 call there would be a report," Kaelin rambled. "I was in front of all these people..."

"So are you telling us now that you felt intimidated by the grand jury, Mr. Kaelin?" Clark snapped.

"I don't know if intimidated is the word, but I tried to remember everything that I could," Kaelin replied.

"Do you remember telling me, Mr. Kaelin, that you had thought that being in front of a grand jury would be intimidating, but it turned out to be just a bunch of old guys in fishing caps?" Clark asked, drawing snickers in the courtroom.

"Yes," replied the witness.

The court day ended with the witness under siege and ordered to return Monday. No testimony is scheduled today.

In sharp contrast to Clark's tone, defense attorney Robert Shapiro at one point asked Kaelin softly, "I take it this has been a very difficult time for you? ... A very emotional time for you because one of your dear friends had been murdered, is that true?"

"Yes," Kaelin said, his lips trembling and his eyes appearing to tear. "I've been honest in everything I remember, and I answered that way."

Kaelin has been a reluctant witness for prosecutors, who have tried to use his testimony to show jurors Simpson had time to kill his ex-wife Nicole

Brown Simpson and her friend Ronald Goldman late the evening of June 12, 1994.

Legal experts rated Kaelin's testimony a mixed bag. They said the witness, who ran his fingers through his mane of blond hair, sipped water and even applied lip balm, seemed to charm jurors.

Loyola University law professor Stanley Goldman suggested Clark erred by going after Kaelin when she already had what she needed to sketch the alleged timeline for murder.

Just before jurors were sent back to their hotel, Superior Court Judge Lance to told them to "completely disregard" Clark's final question of the day, in which she pounced on Kaelin about a former Simpson maid, Michelle Abdurrah.

"Do you also recall that Michelle was the one who opened the door to let the defendant into the room to beat Nicole in 1989?" Clark asked.

She was referring to the New Year's fight in which Ms. Simpson was found outside in sweatpants and a bra. Simpson pleaded no contest to spousal abuse.

There were vehement objections, a bench conference and then the judge's explanation to jurors that Kaelin "was not acquainted with anyone in this case in 1989."

Clark's mounting annoyance with the witness reached a crescendo in redirect questioning. She implied that he cooperated with the defense from the start and withheld information from the prosecution.

Kaelin, who lived in each of their guest houses at different times, said he witnessed two arguments between the Simpsons but insisted Simpson "never let on that he was upset about her dates."

Under questioning by Clark, however, he eventually acknowledged that one fight, on Oct. 25, 1993, was

over a picture of a former boyfriend that Ms. Simpson had in her home.

"And how angry was he that day, Mr. Kaelin?" Clark asked.

"Angry. He was yelling. The police came."

"Would you say he was very angry?"

"Angry enough for the police to come. Yes."

Kaelin also described a fight on Christmas Eve 1993.

At one point, Clark asked, "Did you say to the grand jury that O.J. called Nicole a bitch?"

"No," Kaelin said.

An aspiring actor with an amusingly goofy personality, Kaelin moved into Ms. Simpson's guest house after meeting her in Aspen, Colo., in 1992. He helped out with the Simpsons' two young children and sometimes paid Ms. Simpson a modest rent, he said.

But when she bought a condominium with no guest house, Kaelin testified, Simpson suggested it was "not right" for Kaelin to live there even though a guest bedroom on a separate level was available. He offered Kaelin free guest quarters at his Rockingham Avenue estate and Kaelin accepted, moving over in January 1994.

"She was upset," Kaelin said of Ms. Simpson.

"Did she feel you had betrayed her?" Clark asked.

"She felt I was manipulated. Those were her words," Kaelin said.

"She felt that the defendant was manipulating you?" Clark asked.

"(That) is what Nicole said," he replied.

Kaelin said his relationship with Ms. Simpson began to change.

"It wasn't, we were not talking as much. ... It was different. I always liked Nicole, but she wasn't talking as much so..." Kaelin said, trailing off.

Study finds no good way to track defaults in student loan program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nearly one-fifth of the schools receiving student loans under a pilot program promoted by President Clinton had high default rates in the past.

And the government lacks a good way to track them in the future, a study contends.

"There's an opportunity to manipulate the program," said Brian Fitzgerald, director of the Advisory Committee on Student Financial Assistance, asked by Congress to monitor the experimental direct lending program.

"It appears to be a loophole we can fix," Fitzgerald said. But, he said, the committee found no evidence the Education Department plans to do so.

In fact, the oversight group noted in a March 17 letter to two Republican senators, "There appears to be a widespread feeling on the part of (the Education Department) that default is, by definition, minimized under the (new program), and consequently, that there is less need for such a measure."

But Education Department officials insisted Thursday they are

creating a tracking method. "Default rates are a good indicator and we plan to use them," said the program director, Leo Kornfeld.

And, because his agency will have closer ties with colleges and trade schools under the direct student-loan program than under the old loan program, "We'll actually have many more early-alert signals than in the past," Kornfeld said.

Nevertheless, lawmakers who in recent years have worked to lower student-loan default rates called the report troubling.

"It's really discouraging to me," said Rep. Bart Gordon, D-Tenn.

"We need to know, much more clearly, what kind of control we're going to have over defaults," said Sen. Jim Jeffords, R-Vt., who plans hearings on the issue next week.

Clinton's proposal to switch from the old guaranteed-student loan program to direct student loans has become highly controversial in Congress this year.

The president says direct loans will cut red tape for both students and colleges, and eliminate a private and for-profit middleman. He

estimates the program will save millions.

But Republicans, and a handful of Democrats including Gordon, say direct lending will just create a big new federal bureaucracy. Clinton has overstated savings, the critics contend, by failing to estimate the Education Department's costs of going after, or writing off, future delinquent student loans.

Under the old loan program — which still exists — a private bank makes a loan to a student. A private agency guarantees the loan with an ultimate back-up from the government.

Under direct lending — now in the second year of a pilot program — the government gives money to colleges and trade schools, who administer the loans to students. Students also have a much more flexible payback schedule, based on their incomes.

Clinton contends the income-based repayment allows students to take lower-paying, public service jobs without defaulting. But the advisory committee said it also could allow unscrupulous schools to "mask" problems.

Gephardt says Democrats will offer own tax-cut plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrats will offer an alternative, smaller tax cut when the Republican "Contract With America" tax reductions come to the House floor, Minority Leader Dick Gephardt said Thursday.

Gephardt, D-Mo., told reporters the alternative would be offered despite sentiment among many Democrats that the country can't afford any tax cut without first shrinking the federal budget deficit.

"If members want to vote for no tax cut, they have every right in the world to do that," Gephardt said. "I respect that belief, but I believe that we can and should target some modest, limited affordable tax relief at the people who need it most."

Democrats on the Ways and Means Committee last week unani-

mously voted against the GOP tax cut, estimated to cost \$189 billion over five years. They offered no alternative, saying they favored reducing the budget deficit instead.

Republicans are offering a \$500-a-child tax credit to households earning up to \$200,000, a 50 percent cut in the capital-gains tax, phased-in repeal of the 1993 tax increase on better-off Social Security recipients, expanded individual Retirement Accounts and various other breaks.

President Clinton advocates a \$500-a-child credit that would be phased out for taxpayers with incomes between \$60,000 and \$75,000, expanded IRAs and a deduction for college tuition. His package costs \$63 billion over five years.

From Russia without love: Kozyrev-Christopher talks bog down

GENEVA (AP) — The U.S.-Russia "honeymoon" has come to an end, Foreign Minister Andrei Kozyrev declared Thursday after talks with Secretary of State Warren Christopher on increasingly rancorous disagreements over Chechnya and nuclear sales to Iran.

In a more encouraging vein, Kozyrev also said the two countries have a growing ability to resolve problems. The meeting ended "not in divorce," he told a news conference after the meeting of nearly four hours.

Christopher, too, portrayed the recently strained relationship as one in which U.S. and Russian leaders are determined to address differences "jointly and candidly."

But as the two men opened planning for a May meeting in Moscow between President Clinton and Russian President Boris Yeltsin, it was clear they had failed to move closer to resolving differences over Iran, Chechnya and NATO.

They announced formation of a working group to study nuclear proliferation issues, an apparent attempt to find a way to deal with U.S. opposition to Russia's plan to sell nuclear power plants to Iran.

The group is to complete its review in time for the May 10 meeting between Clinton and Yeltsin.

"I told the foreign minister know of our strong opposition to Russian nuclear cooperation with Iran," Christopher said. "I did furnish him some information we have about Iranian nuclear intentions."

But Kozyrev gave no indication Russia has backed away from its insistence that the Iranian program is peaceful and not geared to developing nuclear weapons.

"Our cooperation with Iran is fully in the purview of the non-proliferation treaty," he said,

speaking through an interpreter.

On Chechnya, where a new Russian military offensive is under way, Christopher said, "I'm very concerned about the escalation we've seen there in recent days. I underscored to him (Kozyrev) our belief that the fighting must end, that humanitarian relief must be able to get to the war's victims, and that a political settlement must be negotiated."

Kozyrev said merely, "There are a number of differences and nuances in our estimates of situations like, for instance, Iran, or let us say the evaluation of the situation in Chechnya."

"But what counts more is that once again we showed our ability to dis-

cuss all those matters not in a confrontational way," he said.

Christopher repeated his assertion of the previous day that Russia is "paying a very high price in world opinion for this adventure and I hope it ends as soon as possible."

On Wednesday, Christopher suggested that Chechnya could undermine Russia's goal of becoming a full member of the economic grouping of the world's seven leading industrial democracies.

The G-7 holds its annual summit in Halifax, Nova Scotia, in June, and Christopher said Russia's participation would be no different than it has been in previous years; Yeltsin will attend but not as a

member of the exclusive group.

Kozyrev said it would be "non-sensical" for the G-7 to discuss world debt without Russia.

On Bosnia, they said there were no sweeping new ideas exchanged on how to resolve the local conflict.

A senior administration official, speaking only on condition of anonymity, said Kozyrev suggested that the two countries ought to think about whether there were "small steps" they could take toward ending the savage fighting.

"We don't want to split the ranks" of the countries seeking a peaceful solution, said Kozyrev. "A lot of ideas are afloat," he said, but he was not specific.

Police name cult leader suspect in subway attack

TOKYO (AP) — Police found more dangerous chemicals Thursday at the headquarters of a secretive religious cult and reportedly wanted to question its missing leader on suspicion of planning the gas attack on Tokyo's subway.

It was the latest apparent link between the group, Aum Shinri Kyo or Sublime Truth, and Monday's attack, which killed 10 people and injured nearly 5,000.

Although suspicion had fallen almost immediately on the apocalyptic Buddhist sect, police used an unrelated kidnapping case as justification for nationwide raids Wednesday on the sect's facilities.

Those searches continued Thursday. At the group's rural headquarters, military poison-gas specialists used lift trucks to remove large piles of chemicals that experts said could be used to make sarin, the nerve gas used in the Tokyo attack.

Police also discovered equipment for synthesizing chemicals, Kyodo News Service reported.

Also Thursday, bottles of chemicals were found in a cult-owned car that crashed after a chase with police in western Japan. The driver was arrested and a military squad dispatched to neutralize the chemicals.

In a broadcast Thursday to followers in Russia, cult leader Shoko Asahara, who dropped out of sight after the attack, denied that police had found sarin ingredients.

The sect's lawyer said the chemicals were to be used to process semiconductors at a computer assembly plant the group runs.

Police would not comment on reports that they plan to question Asahara on suspicion of plotting mass murder. Asahara, a bearded, 40-year-old guru-like figure, had warned his followers the day before the subway attack to prepare for death.

The lawyer said Asahara would be willing to answer police questions, but refused to disclose his whereabouts.

In sect publications, Asahara has warned the world will end as soon as 1997, but that up to 25 percent of the population will survive.

GENEVA (AP) — Former Italian Trade Minister Renato Ruggiero was named as the first head of the powerful new World Trade Organization on Thursday, ending months of bitter wrangling between the United States, Europe and Asia.

The acrimonious regional struggle has dampened hopes that the WTO — created to promote free trade and settle disputes — would usher in a new era of global trade harmony.

Queen hears boos in visiting Soweto

SOWETO, South Africa (AP) — A rain-soaked crowd cheered for President Nelson Mandela but shouted a few boos at Queen Elizabeth II at a memorial Thursday for black South Africans who died in World War I.

The stop at Avalon Cemetery in Soweto, southwest of Johannesburg, came on the fourth day of the queen's six-day tour of South Africa.

About 500 people cheered wildly when Mandela arrived. The crowd also waved to welcome the queen, but some booing broke out when she got out of her Land Rover without waving back.

Yeltsin orders crackdown on neo-fascists

MOSCOW (AP) — President Boris Yeltsin Thursday ordered tougher steps against neo-fascists, on the same day one of their most outspoken leaders was released from jail.

"Activities of political extremists ... look especially defiant on the eve of the 50th anniversary of the victory over Nazi Germany," Yeltsin said in the decree released by his press service.

Meanwhile, a Moscow district court freed hard-line activist Alexei Vedenkin on condition he doesn't leave the city.

Vedenkin, a member of the Russian National Unity movement, was arrested last month after saying in a nationally televised interview he would execute two reformist leaders if his party came to power.

He was charged with threatening murder, which is

punishable by six months in prison or a year of hard labor.

Alexander Zvyagintsev, a top aide to Russia's acting prosecutor-general, refused to comment on the court's action.

Russian laws are still largely unchanged from the Soviet era, and contain no reference to fascism and related extremist movements, giving the government little leverage to fight them.

Russian courts recently refused to punish the publishers of neo-fascist and anti-Semitic newspapers and books, openly sold throughout Russia.

In his decree, Yeltsin ordered law enforcement officials to step up their struggle against extremist and fascist groups. He also asked the Russian Academy of Sciences to come up with a legal definition of fascism.

Minister: Chechen stronghold falls

NAZRAN, Ingushetia (AP) — Russian troops on a renewed offensive in Chechnya seized control of Argun, a main rebel stronghold, Thursday, the government said.

Oleg Soskovets, the first deputy prime minister, told parliamentarians in Moscow that Argun had fallen Thursday afternoon. He said the town, nine miles east of the Chechen capital of Grozny, was captured relatively intact.

Soskovets, who was delivering a speech on Chechnya, broke the news after receiving a cable from the commander of Russian troops in Chechnya, Gen. Anatoly Kulikov, the Interfax news agency reported.

Russian ground forces launched a new offensive this week on the separatist southern republic, focusing

on Argun and Shali, the other major stronghold of fighters loyal to Chechen President Dzhokhar Dudayev.

On Wednesday, after encircling the fighters in Argun, the Russian military gave them an ultimatum to surrender their weapons or face destruction.

Russian warplanes blasted Chechen positions near Shali on Wednesday. Many residents have left for the mountains in the wake of the escalated attacks.

The new attack has drawn sharp criticism from abroad. U.S. Secretary of State Warren Christopher, who conferred Thursday with Russian Foreign Minister Andrei Kozyrev in Geneva, called the Russian offensive "foolhardy" and said the

Russians were "paying a very high price internationally."

Russia, which sent troops into Chechnya on Dec. 11 to crush its independence movement, has a strong incentive to wrap up the war in the next six weeks. President Clinton and other Western leaders visit Moscow on May 9 for events commemorating the Allies' victory in World War II.

Meanwhile, a delegation from the Organization For Security and Cooperation in Europe is visiting Chechnya and neighboring Ingushetia this week.

A State Department official with the group, Richard Norland, said Kulikov had promised a respite in the shelling of Argun and Shali when the delegation was in that area.

Morningside critics should show proof or keep quiet

The most tragic result of the recent flap over Morningside Elementary School is the message it sends to other schools:

Don't innovate. Don't excel. Don't do anything that makes you stand out from the pack. Be mediocre. Otherwise, somebody will find a way to punish you.

That's pretty much what happened to Morningside.

Led by Principal Dennis Sonius, Morningside has built a reputation for being as good a school as any in the state. It won a national "Blue Ribbon School" designation, and this year its students scored impressively on the standardized tests that are often used as a yardstick of school performance.

Sonius and his staff, along with Morningside's pupils and their parents, have a right to be proud of what they are achieving.

But Morningside's success was intolerable to a tiny band of local residents. This handful of people - its number is no more than a half-dozen - for years has pursued an ideological vendetta against Outcome-Based Education, the progressive teaching style adopted by the Twin Falls School District a few years ago.

As the district's OBE pioneers, Morningside and Sonius became the group's chief target. A successful OBE school? Impossible! Thus was born the allegation that Morningside's impressive scores were achieved fraudulently.

Unfortunately, the local anti-OBE group is politically well-connected. Its members have the ear of state Rep. Ron Black, who heads the House Education Committee, and of

the state's education superintendent, Anne Fox.

Despite a total lack of factual backing, Black and Fox pushed the issue into the public arena. Fox may even have broken the law by providing confidential testing information to one member of the local group.

The issue ultimately made its way to the agenda of the State Board of Education - no doubt a heavy moment for the anti-OBE coven.

The upshot of all this has been a month of turmoil at Morningside. Yet in all that time, no one has produced evidence to support the original allegation.

Sonius and the other folk at Morningside should not let the controversy discourage them. They should just keep up the good work.

Outcome-based education is probably neither as good as its supporters sometimes claim nor as bad as its critics contend. It seems to be contributing to Morningside's success, but it is unlikely to be the only factor.

OBE has been - and should continue to be - the subject of scrutiny and debate in local education. But this attack on Morningside is unfair and mean-spirited.

Helped by the irresponsible behavior of Black and Fox, the anti-OBE group has besmirched the reputations of good, caring educators.

Enough is enough. Fox and Black have both wised up and abandoned the issue. All that's left is the local anti-OBE gang.

If these people have any evidence of wrongdoing, let them produce it now. In short, they should put up or shut up.

Register lists 6 Idahoans for loan default

BOISE — U.S. Attorney Betty Richardson says six Idaho health professionals are on a list of 3,900 people published in the Federal Register for defaulting on student loans.

The six in Idaho are five chiropractors and one optometrist, she said Thursday, and owe a combined \$341,623 on student loans.

Richardson said the six who were included on the list are Cathy L. Butterfield, Bobby R. Buckles, George Gott, Larry A. Herem, Richard Murray and Kerry V. Young. Specifics weren't provided but Richardson said four reside in Boise, one in Burley and one in Idaho Falls.

She said the list of defaulters is published annually by the Department of Health and Human Services and includes debtors under the Health Education Assistance Loan program who have been referred to the Justice Department for litigation and enforcement of judgments.

Lockheed attorney's charges dropped

IDAHO FALLS — Prosecutors have dropped aggravated assault charges against the top local attorney with Lockheed Idaho Technologies Co., with the consent of a neighbor who testified the lawyer pulled a gun on him.

Sтивен D. Brumley, 53, head general counsel for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory contractor, was arrested Jan. 18 after James Szmalz, 35, an operator at the INEL's Idaho Chemical Processing Plant, told police Brumley threatened him with a pistol-grip shotgun at their apartment complex.

Szmalz testified at a preliminary hearing last month that he had knocked on Brumley's door to ask him to turn down loud music, and as he was walking away he turned around to see Brumley aiming a shotgun at him in his doorway.

Brumley admitted answering the door while holding the gun, but he denied aiming it at anyone. He said he got no answer when he called out asking who was banging on his door, and that he was fearful of rumors he had heard about his apartment being in a bad neighborhood.

Board questions teacher examination

BOISE — The Idaho Board of Education will consider a proposal to drop the National Teacher Examination as a certification requirement.

The test was developed in 1940 and Idaho has used it since 1985, but recent studies have raised questions about it.

State board members meeting at Boise State University, agreed to postpone action on the NTE until next month.

Meanwhile, Anne Fox, state superintendent of public instruction, will research the test and its use in other states. Fox urged the board not to move too quickly to discard the NTE.

"It could send the wrong message to Idaho residents who are demanding accountability from teachers and other employees on the public payroll," she said.

Officials discover more phone sex fraud

COEUR D'ALENE — The teen-ager in custody for making fraudulent phone sex calls in the Hayden Lake area could not have made a new batch of calls that appeared this month in the 772 prefix.

"There's no way he could have done it," said Deputy Kootenai County Prosecutor Barry Black.

On Friday, Patrick Lee Myers took his phone bill to the Kootenai County Sheriff's office to file a complaint for nearly \$1,000-worth of disputed charges.

The calls — charged during the evening and early morning hours of Feb. 12 and 13 — included several 900-numbers and connections to Great Britain.

Myers said he was told by GTE and AT&T that the calls were made from his phone and he would be held responsible for the bill.

Tribe will share lottery profits

The Coeur d'Alene Indian Tribe says it plans to share profits from its planned national lottery with states and other tribes that do not have their own lottery or gaming facilities.

In a telephone conference Thursday, tribal manager David J. Matheson said the tribe also will work with the states and federal government to name a commissioner to oversee a lottery operation that could generate hundreds of millions of dollars of annual revenue.

The position would "uphold and insure the public trust and confidence," Matheson said.

The tribe has announced plans to launch a national lottery by fall, with people using credit cards to play. Matheson said a building is under construction and the tribe is working on a management contract.

State officials in Connecticut oppose the lottery, but Idaho officials say as far as they are concerned, the proposed lottery would be legal. "We have played in every way within the laws of the playing field," Matheson said.

"Not very many economic opportunities have come to visit the Coeur d'Alene Tribe," Matheson said. "It is a legal, regulated opportunity for the Coeur d'Alene Tribe and many other entities to benefit from."

Matheson said it would be the Coeur d'Alenes' intention that Indian tribes use their revenue-sharing money for health and welfare, but he does not have strings attached.

"We do not have to do this," he said. "We are not required by any law on the books."

State senator fined for late funding report

BOISE (AP) — Freshman state Sen. Gordon Crow, R-Hayden, has been fined \$250 by the state for being four months late in reporting \$5,600 in campaign contributions.

Crow failed to report the contributions from an October fund-raiser with Gov. Phil Batt until four months later. Chief Deputy Secretary of State Ben Yursa said there was no evidence of financial impropriety.

"The secretary of state's office has been diligent and professional in the handling of this matter," Crow said Wednesday in a written statement. "I believe that they realize there was no intent on the part of the campaign to hide anything. It was simply a matter of carelessness on my part."

The problem stemmed from a Batt-Crow fund-raiser at the Hayden Lake County Club. It raised more than \$8,000, with expenses of \$5,600, leaving \$3,400 for the candidates to split.

Shooter not charged

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Police have declined to press charges against a Washington State University student who chased and caught a fraternity member at gunpoint after firing three shots.

Police considered charging Tait Swanson with violating a city ordinance against discharging a firearm, but declined after concluding his actions were reasonable and lawful.

High-tech aids Bighorn search

CROW AGENCY, Mont. (AP) — Researchers armed with new technology are at the Little Bighorn Battlefield this week, trying to determine what happened to the remains of 28 troopers killed in 1876.

The work is in the battlefields' Deep Ravine area, where the 7th Cavalry troopers are believed to have died in battle with Sioux and Cheyenne warriors, according to the National Park Service. An archaeological test conducted in 1984 failed to show the location of remains.

The research that began Monday is a combined effort of the Park Service, the U.S. Energy Department and MAC Technical Service Co. of Idaho Falls, said Gerard Baker, superintendent at Little Bighorn Battlefield National Monument.

Research instruments include a rapid geophysical surveyor. The Park

Service said the device developed at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory may help locate metallic items such as bullets, cartridge cases and buttons from uniforms. Such finds could yield clues to a gravesite.

Researchers also are using a radar imaging system to look for geological structures and subsoil layering that could indicate a gravesite.

The Energy Department has been involved in advancing the two types of technology.

Baker said the research, under way through Thursday, will not disturb battlefields soils or vegetation.

Historians know that burial parties, lacking tools to dig proper graves, barely covered the dead after the battle of the Little Bighorn, according to the Park Service.

When others returned a year later to improve the graves, the remains of

nearly all of the men were found, except for 28 believed to have died in Deep Ravine, the agency said. Some archaeologists have speculated that heavy rain washed sediment down the ravine, burying the bodies deeply.

Finding the remains could help piece together the puzzle of how the Battle of the Little Bighorn occurred, said Doug McChristian, a Park Service historian. Baker said results should be known by early April.

Even if the research indicates the high probability of a find, a major excavation is unlikely.

"The impacts of removing several feet of soil from Deep Ravine probably would be unacceptable from a resource preservation standpoint," Baker said. "If we locate anything, we may have to be satisfied that the new data indicates a burial ground but we may never know for sure."

Restaurant owner admits to trying to bomb his cafe

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A local businessman facing tens of thousands of dollars in debts faces an April 4 preliminary hearing on charges he tried to blow up his downtown restaurant.

Charles Schroeder, 47, made his initial court appearance on the attempted first-degree arson charge on Thursday, a day after he voluntarily surrendered to police.

Schroeder, accompanied by his attorney, turned himself in after search warrants had been issued for both his business, Charlie's, and his home.

"He ended up confessing to setting the stuff up," Idaho Falls Police Detective Ken Brown said. "Basically it was financial difficulties."

A conviction for attempted first-degree arson carries a maximum prison term of 12 years.

Authorities said the 70-gallon gasoline bomb had the potential of causing extensive damage to the restaurant and neighboring businesses. It was

apparently set up so that the triggering mechanism would be tripped about dusk Tuesday. The device was discovered about seven hours before that.

Bonneville County records show Schroeder had multiple state and federal tax liens against him, some for as much as \$33,000. He had paid only partial rent on the building for the past six months and owed more than \$2,000 in city utility bills, according to police reports.

Schroeder did not give authorities a reason for setting up the gasoline bomb.

Evidence began pointing toward Schroeder when authorities discovered his financial problems. Brown said, and began amassing evidence from their searches.

Among the items was an insurance policy covering some of the restaurant equipment and supplies, said Dane Watkins, who owns the building where Charlie's is located. Watkins insured the building itself.

House explosion remains mystery

TWIN FALLS — The last thing David Wilson remembers before his house exploded was getting off the couch after a nap and lighting a cigarette.

Then, the memories for the 41-year-old recovering burn victim get hazier. On Jan. 31, his one-story rented home blew up around him, shattering neighbors windows and throwing bits of the home into treetops.

"I remember being in a fireball," Wilson said. "I remember seeing daylight and I went out to the daylight."

"All I could see was the cupboards breathing in and out, like in slow motion. I could see them buckling. Then I went down. Stuff was falling on top of me, I'm not sure, though."

The cause of the blast remains a mystery. Idaho Fire Marshall Donald Bailey said that

a gas leak is probably to blame, but during his investigation he found no evidence of a such a leak.

State Farm Insurance, which is handling the insurance claim for the landlord, is checking the gas furnace and other equipment for possible leaks, he said.

"We're totally puzzled," added Kyle McBride, division manager for Intermountain Gas Co. The gas company conducted its own investigation, and found no leaks in the furnace or water heater, nor damage to the safety valves.

A survey of the underground gas lines in the neighborhood also revealed no leaks, McBride said. The levels of odorant in the gas were normal, which means a gas leak should have been detectable by smell before the blast, McBride said.

After an investigation involving Bailey and Twin Falls fire and police departments, Bailey said he has ruled out foul play. Tests

for the possibility of a flammable liquid in Wilson's bedroom came back negative several weeks ago, Bailey said.

"In other words, no one poured gasoline in there and lit it," Bailey said. "We ruled out the presence of any kind of acceleration."

Wilson, a sheet-metal installer, is recovering in his ex-wife's Filer home after the explosion burned 44 percent of his torso, arms and feet. The former Twin Falls firefighter described with some amazement his swift recovery through physical therapy in Twin Falls.

When the house exploded, a neighbor saw Wilson stumble in the yard, get to his feet and fall again, Wilson said. He spent many days in a coma, losing weight, until his release from the University of Utah Burn Center in late February.

"My legs were as big as my arms," he said. Over time, he improved with physical

therapy. "One day they were lowering me into a bathtub, two days later I was taking a shower."

Wilson wears a tight, stretchy long-sleeved shirt and gloves designed for burn victims to prevent the damaged portions of his skin from scarring. He must wear the upper-body suit for the next several months, until the skin is less sensitive, he said.

"It itches and burns," Wilson said. "To wear it is really uncomfortable, and they say you have to wear it 23 hours every day."

Meanwhile, Wilson is becoming more limber through daily exercises, and has visited the people who helped him through his recovery — friends, firefighters, physical therapists.

The help people gave has changed his life and attitudes, he said.

"I want to thank everyone who helped me," he said. "Everybody was so nice. It really did something for me."

Boys avoid expulsions with tale of fishing trip

FILER — Two seventh-grade boys avoided a one-year expulsion when they told the Filer School Board Tuesday night they had pocket knives with them on a school bus because they were fishing the day before.

They had been suspended for two days after a bus driver caught them with the knives on the way to school. One of the boys brought the knives to the bus stop to return to the other boy, said Superintendent Bill Feusahrens.

The only problem was, they realized they couldn't carry the knives onto the school bus. They debated hiding them in the bushes, but ended up taking them on board.

School Board members agreed to allow the kids back in school.

"Now if it had been guns, it would have been a different story," Feusahrens said, citing the federal Guns Free School Act of 1994. "If the kids had brandished the weapons or threatened another kid with a weapon, it would have been a completely different scenario."

Feusahrens said no students have been expelled from the Filer School District for bringing weapons to school in the two years he has been superintendent.

Hospital board gives OK to new Quorum contract

TWIN FALLS — The county hospital board approved a contract between Magic Valley Regional Medical Center and its chosen management company Thursday.

But Quorum Health Resources' days are numbered as the medical center tries to form a physician-hospital organization and hire Quorum-paid administrators to continue running the hospital. The hospital's month-to-month contract with Quorum starts April 1 and calls for paying the management company \$2,000 a month for financial services.

"It's been a long, arduous task, and it's obvious that we're not going to be able to work together in the future," Dick Boyd, chairman of the board's management-selection committee, said at a special board meeting Thursday night.

Board members agreed on the contract after a 2 1/2-hour presentation from consultants about a proposed physician-hospital organization. They then went into executive session to discuss how much they will pay Quorum for administrative services, a figure which will not be made public.

Consultants for the hospital board and the physicians group, Magic Valley Health Network, advised board members and doctors to work on getting a physician-hospital organization in place in 90 days. The preliminary design places three members from

each organization on the physician-hospital-organization board.

Until a physician-hospital organization can be formed, board members have been asked to continue giving income guarantees to 13 primary-care physicians who are network members. Those proposed guarantees are not to exceed \$220,000 from January through June.

The foundation of managed care is primary care, with primary-care doctors working on disease prevention and dispersing patients to specialists as needed. That means Physicians Center family physicians and pediatricians are being sought by other hospitals with offers of double what they now make, said Twin Falls cardiologist Dr. Wayne Wright, chairman of the network's board.

Primary-care physicians are key to keeping and getting more Magic Valley patients once the proposed physician-hospital organization offers managed-care plans to businesses-for-employees-Wright-said.

Earlier Thursday at a finance committee meeting, committee members approved extending the network's contract for physicians at the Shoup Avenue West center, formerly Magic Valley Family Physicians and the Pediatric Center, along with additional money for network board member and pediatrician Dr. Paul Miles' consulting services. That recommendation will be reviewed by the full board at its 7 p.m. meeting Wednesday.

Jerome may get Job Service office

TWIN FALLS — The number of Idaho Department of Employment offices in the Magic Valley has gone from five in the 1980s to two, but the department's new director may change that.

Employment Director Roger Madsen said Wednesday he is looking into opening a Job Service office in Jerome, to be staffed by six or seven employees from the Twin Falls office.

Having a Jerome office will help advance the careers of people in the Twin Falls office, Madsen said. About 10 people from the Twin Falls office are interested in working in Jerome, he said.

Leasing a 4,000-square-foot office in Jerome for about \$30,000 a year would increase customer service for Jerome, Gooding and Lincoln counties, he said between privately talking with 25 employees at the Twin Falls office. Madsen, appointed by Gov. Phil Batt after the November election, is visiting the state's 24 offices and will be at the Mini-Cassia office in two weeks.

Meanwhile, Madsen said, he is considering different options for the Twin Falls office, which people have told him is not at a good location or structurally sound.

Two acres of land on North College Road off North Blue Lakes Boulevard

were purchased for a new 14,000-square-foot building.

But, if a Jerome office is opened, a new Twin Falls office would only need 10,000 square feet on one acre, Madsen said. That would save about \$56,000 a year in lease payments for a new Twin Falls office, he said, and the other acre could be sold.

Renovating the current Twin Falls office and selling both acres also is being considered, said Madsen, a former Republican state legislator from Boise.

Madsen said opening a Jerome office and having a new Twin Falls office will actually save the department money instead of costing more. In the five weeks after taking his new position early January, Madsen cut 25 positions to escape a projected \$1.3 million deficit; 82 percent of those cuts were positions in the Boise central office, he said.

Four southeastern counties also may get offices, Madsen said. Residents in all four of those counties have further to drive for a Job Service office than those in Jerome, Gooding and Lincoln counties, he said.

The department has lost more than one-third of its employees since 1990, Madsen said, but continues to help more people. About 31,000 people are placed in jobs annually, and the department has

Drought talk washed away as flooding becomes concern

BOISE — This month's heavy precipitation that reached record levels in some areas of Idaho turned Thursday's final meeting of the state Water Supply Committee from talk of drought to concern over flooding.

Almost all public reservoirs are expected to fill, and the supply of water is now expected to be average or above virtually everywhere.

Mary Mellem of the National Weather Service said the Wood River Valley communities of Ketchum, Hailey and Bellevue are of most concern because of the heavy snowpack and the dramatic growth in the narrow valley over the past dozen years since the last significant spring runoff.

"It will, of course, depend on how the spring progresses," Mellem told her colleagues on the committee.

Snow accumulation was still heavy in the lower elevations so that the wrong combination of temperatures and other weather conditions could result in a heavy runoff that could force the Big Wood River by its banks. Mellem said all the new construction in the valley has made the poten-

tial damage from such a flood unclear.

She also predicted some routine flooding in low-lying pastures and meadows in the Henry's Fork and Teton River basins of eastern Idaho because of the extremely heavy snowpack there.

It was the first time flooding has been a topic for the committee that was formed in the late 1980s after drought began to grip the state.

The experts were confident water supplies would be adequate over nearly all of the state earlier this winter. Then, an extremely wet March more than offset a drier than usual February.

"Because February was so dry, this made March a real critical month for us," Peter Palmer of the Natural Resource Conservation Service said. "It really sealed the water supply. Things look encouraging for next spring."

Only the Bear River Basin in southeastern Idaho and the Panhandle are forecast to have below-average water supplies.

And if a wet spring holds off the short for early irrigation, agricultural water shortages could be averted in the notoriously dry Oakley and Salmon Falls areas of the Magic Valley.

well together. "I was very, very pleased with the flow between the governor and the Legislature," Mansfield said. He also heaped praise on the House Education Committee.

"I think that particularly Chairman Ron Black (R-Twin Falls) has emerged as the education leader of the state of Idaho. I think he went light years past (Senate Education Committee Chairman) John Hansen and (state Schools Superintendent) Anne Fox," Mansfield added.

Black got criticism from back home during the session, however, after he said - without proof - that a local elementary's high test scores were "questionable."

The Legislature's "dual enrollment" legislation gets raves from nearly everybody. Dual enrollment allows home-schooled children or private school students to participate in some public school activities, if they choose.

Instead of forcing parents to choose between public, private, and home schools, parents have greater options.

Mansfield says lawmakers have opened the floodgates of choice.

Many conservatives, including Mansfield, hope there'll be even more educational choices in 1996. Merit pay, tuition tax credits, vouchers, and an end to mandatory collective bargaining with unions are all likely to be considered.

And the Idaho Citizens Alliance in recent months has hinted it may sponsor a statewide ballot measure dealing with choice in education.

Wednesday, ICA chairman Kelly Walton said his organization is considering four or five possible ballot measures for 1996, but he declined to say what topics are on the table.

The ICA will narrow that list down during the next two months, Walton says, but he predicts as many as three initiatives could be launched by the Burley-based group.

Walton gives the Legislature a "B minus" for 1995. He praises their fiscal accomplishments, but says they "totally doped the ball" on some very crucial fundamental items.

"Gov. Batt and many of the legislative leaders have focused totally on very important fiscal matters to the disregard of many traditional values and

issues that need attention," Walton added.

The ICA spearheaded an unsuccessful anti-gay rights ballot campaign last November.

Anti-tax activist and 1994 gubernatorial candidate Ron Rankin said earlier this year that lawmakers deserve an "incomplete" for their work on cutting taxes.

Walton, Rankin, and a host of other grassroots political activists also screamed loudly when House Speaker Mike Simpson, R-Blackfoot, attempted to place substantial limitations on the right of citizens to pass laws via the initiative process.

Simpson's House Joint Resolution 10 was rejected after the Idaho Conservation League, the National Rifle Association, and a broad coalition of other groups opposed it.

"I was delighted to see that it did not make it," Walton said Wednesday, suggesting it was the first step towards eliminating initiatives in Idaho. "I believe Simpson would like to eliminate all initiatives, which in essence would be a major power grab for him and the rest of the Legislature," Walton added.

Judge finds county's lease with IHC illegal

BURLEY - Cassia County commissioners broke the law when they didn't let county residents vote on whether to help fund a new hospital and when they relinquished control of taxpayers' money, a judge has ruled.

In an opinion issued last week, 5th District Judge Roger Burdick declared unconstitutional a 1993 lease between commissioners and Utah-based Intermountain Health Care, but upheld all other dealings brought into question that date back to 1960.

A county hospital building or its equipment may be leased only when approved by a majority vote of county residents, Burdick wrote.

The judge outlined the commissioners' records and found that dealings with IHC were recorded in meeting minutes only five times over a two-year period.

"The citizens of Cassia County were prevented from acting in their own best interest, because they were not apprised of the transactions between the County and IHC," Burdick wrote.

Former Commissioner J. Weldon Beck, who has served as a commissioner since Cassia Memorial Hospital was built in 1960, said Burdick's decision didn't mean "dust" to him and said that he only was doing the job voters elected him to do.

"If you had to put every decision up to a vote, what do you need a commissioner for," Beck said.

In the 1993 lease, the county placed tax money beyond its control, Burdick wrote, by agreeing to give \$100,000 each year to IHC for equipment and by leasing all county-

owned property at Cassia Memorial Hospital for \$1 a year.

"No other county (in Idaho) allows a private company to generate whatever profit it wishes from the county's hospital building, grounds and equipment with no control being exercised by the county... except for the underlying lease agreement," Burdick wrote.

In the agreement, IHC would reap all of the benefits, according to Burdick, and the county wouldn't receive a return on its investment. It amounts to nothing more than a donation, he said, taking into account that IHC has made more than \$1 million a year since 1991.

"This practice of appropriating \$100,000 or more per year is a blatant violation of the constitution," Burdick wrote.

IHC attorney Charles Homer disagreed.

"We've never termed anything the county has done a donation. We've felt the county has received more than adequate benefits for what the county may have provided to IHC," Homer said Wednesday.

IHC wouldn't have stayed in Cassia County without the county's support, he said.

According to Homer, Cassia Memorial has been a nonprofit hospital, and IHC has a policy to re-invest as much of its profit as it can back into the community.

"Having had an excess of funds is one of the major reasons they've been able to go out and build a multi-million dollar hospital," he said.

Homer cited a hospital, medical services and an ambulance service operated at a loss to IHC as some benefits reaped by county taxpayers.

"IHC has benefited from the relationship, too. Nobody is denying that," he said.

Ruling raises concerns on ambulance service

BURLEY - Cassia County may be looking for a new way to pay for an ambulance service since a lease between the county and Utah-based Intermountain Health Care, has been ruled illegal.

The county also will have to decide what to do with equipment included in that lease and with a fund set up to maintain that equipment.

Burley attorney Donald Chisholm and Burley businessman Truman Bradley filed a lawsuit last fall against former Cassia County Commissioners J. Weldon Beck, Norman Dayley, Commissioner John Adams and Intermountain Health Care. Chisholm and Bradley charged that the county and IHC have been misusing county funds.

In a ruling on that lawsuit last week, 5th District Judge Roger Burdick declared unconstitutional a 1993 lease between the county and Intermountain Health Care.

Former Commissioner J. Weldon Beck said the county agreed in that lease to give IHC \$100,000 a year to buy equipment as it saw fit in exchange for running the ambulance service.

"It'll take more than \$100,000 to run an ambulance. I think that's peanuts," Beck said.

But Burdick ruled that the county can't give IHC \$100,000 a year to buy equipment.

The equipment problem can be worked out, Commissioner Paul Christensen said. The county either must lease the equipment for what its worth rather than the \$1 a year it has been charging, or it must sell it in a public auction, he said.

"IHC could drop the ambulance service, because they are providing for it at no charge," Christensen said.

The commission will open negotiations for ambulance service to the public so that constituents can have a say in how their money is spent, he said.

But before the commission can take action, attorneys must decide if they will pursue the case, Christensen said.

Chisholm said he wants Burdick to clarify his ruling on the hospital plant fund. The lease required IHC to pay cash in the plant fund to ensure that the county's property is maintained, Chisholm said.

But IHC attorney Charles Homer says that the plant fund has belonged to IHC, which can do anything it wants with the money.

Burdick ruled that the plant fund—\$1.7 million as of last fall—belongs to IHC until the lease expires in June. At that time money in the plant fund will go to the county.

Conflicting testimony by commis-

sioners and hospital staff and of the county's failure to keep track of how IHC was spending taxpayers money make it difficult to determine how money in the plant fund was used, Chisholm said.

Court testimony showed IHC and the county don't know who owns what equipment, Burdick wrote.

But neither party claims the company has records that show it owns most of the equipment.

Testimony revealed that the county had never examined IHC's financial records, and neither the county nor IHC produced records during trial as to how they had handled transactions, Chisholm said.

"(Commissioners) didn't exercise any controls over the financing of IHC. They let IHC charge whatever it wanted to," he said.

Burdick ordered that the county and IHC take an inventory of hospital equipment and determine who owns what.

IHC is in the process of making a list, Homer said.

RUPERT - Three teens were arrested Wednesday in connection with a February outbreak of vandalism.

Police charged two boys with 23 counts of malicious injury to property in Rupert. A third boy was arrested on three counts.

They face up to 30 days detention for each count, Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Clayne Zollinger said.

The amount of damages is still being assessed, Zollinger said. Each graffiti incident costs between \$50 to \$200 to clean up, he said, depending on the surface that was spray painted.

Rupert Officer Bret Wray arrested the juveniles - aged 14, 15 and 16 - on a tip from a confidential source. The boys, all from Rupert, were believed to go by the tagging signs of "Soldier Boy" and "Payaso," according to a police report. They allegedly identified with a gang called the Brown Pride Locos, or "BPL," the report said.

Police officials say they think the

three juveniles arrested Wednesday are also responsible for graffiti in Accutia.

The boys were placed in juvenile detention Wednesday. The boy charged with three counts was released to his family Thursday following a detention hearing. The other two will remain locked-up until the court is convinced they do not pose a threat to the community, Minidoka Magistrate Judge Larry Duff ruled.

Rupert police have arrested nine juveniles suspected of vandalism in the past four months. Police Chief Kendall Warr said.

In response to the recent arrests, Warr said he expects Rupert's graffiti problem will subside temporarily.

"But as far as putting a stop to it, I doubt that," he said.

The Rupert City Council is considering an ordinance aimed at penalizing the parents of juvenile graffiti offenders. The city is also preparing to file civil suits on behalf of an ad hoc citizens' graffiti committee against juveniles convicted of graffiti charges and their parents, according to city attorney Rick Bollar.

totally nominated for Oscars — included a half dozen foreign-language films and actors who appeared in them.

Hollywood icons didn't fare so well. "Ben-Hur" said Tom Trusky, director of its Hemingway Western Studies Center at Boise State University and specialist in Idaho films, "and Cecil B. DeMille was a pimp."

Westerns looked poorly, too. "Dances With Wolves," "Shane" and "High Noon" stayed in the saddle, but "Stagecoach," "The Wild Bunch" and "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" bit the dust.

"Ben-Gay is a better film (than Ben-Hur)," said Tom Trusky, director of its Hemingway Western Studies Center at Boise State University and specialist in Idaho films, "and Cecil B. DeMille was a pimp."

Shoo! John Wayne didn't even get no respect. His Rooster Cogburn character may have won an Oscar for "True Grit" in 1969, but he finished fourth for that year in the T-N poll, behind Dustin Hoffman, Jon Voight — and Jonathan Winters.

Movies playing in the Magic Valley this weekend:

'Tall Tale: The Unbelievable Adventures of Pecos Bill' (G) — If a good children's film is supposed to open the eyes of its young audience, then the somewhat misleadingly titled "Tall Tale: The Unbelievable Adventures of Pecos Bill" is mighty good. It's not made with any special feeling for childhood, the script is fairly hackneyed, and there are too many shots of amber waves of grain. But the film at least captures the mythic spaciousness of tall tales. It's a Disney kidfest reimagined with a poet's eye. (*Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley*)

'Major Payne' (PG-13) — Sometimes all a comedy needs to work is a funny guy and a wacky idea and, luckily, "Major Payne" has one of each. Comedian Damon Wayans stars as the title character, an almost psychotically on-the-second thought "drop that 'almusts' — battle-hardened Marine who gets mustered out of the service when, as his commander tells him, "There's no one left for you to kill." The only job open for him is as director of a tiny ROTC program at a prep school. (*Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley*)

'Death and the Maiden' (R) — The accused, his accuser and his accuser's husband. Three people — two at war, one looking on in profound confusion — spending one long night together in an isolated bluff-top cottage along the South American coast. You can't set up a political drama much simpler than that, but the themes of Chilean playwright Ariel Dorfman's three-character "Death and the Maiden," and director Roman Polanski's filmed adaptation of it, are anything but simple. (*Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum*)

'The Brady Bunch Movie' (PG-13) — Sure, as "The Brady Bunch" was, that's how happening "The Brady Bunch Movie" is: This story of the single dad with three sons who marries the single mom with three daughters deconstructs the sitcom while satirizing it. Betty Thomas directs the film, which stars Shelley Long and Gary Cole awash in harvest gold and avocado green polyester. (*Motor-Vu Drive-In, Ace Theatre of Wendell, Liberty Theater of Hailey*)

'Candyman: Farewell to the Flesh' (R) — Inane, gory sequel to the provocative 1992 original. The man with the lethal meat hook stalks New Orleans. (*Twin Cinema*)

'Dumb and Dumber' (PG-13) — The rubber-faced Jim Carrey and partner Jeff Daniels are underdogs in pursuit of a beautiful gal. The duo run through a repertoire of sex jokes, potty jokes, dead parakeet jokes — basically the stuff you'd expect to hear in a grade school boys' room. (*Gooding Cinema*)

'Forrest Gump' (PG-13) — The title character — a guileless, slow-thinking Alabamian played by Tom Hanks — shares his autobiography with a succession of folks waiting for their buses. His life strangely dovetails with key moments in modern American politics and pop culture: From the Watergate break-in to Elvis' pelvis-shaking debut on "Ed Sullivan," Forrest Gump was there. Although this is an enjoyable and, at times, emotionally charged picture with wonderfully funny episodes, there's a hollowness there, too. Like

sizzle, this movie's got it, enough style for a dozen movies and, truth be told, enough story for five. But whether director Quentin Tarantino's vastly entertaining film about L.A. hoods and their himeas has character development enough for one picture is up for grabs. John Travolta and especially Samuel L. Jackson are superlative in this movie that also stars Bruce Willis, Harvey Keitel and Ving Rhames. Be warned: It's a movie in which guys crack jokes while cracking open heads. (*Twin Cinema*)

'Richie Rich' (PG) — Junior variation of the old Hollywood mes-

sage that money means misery — sent out by people who have plenty of it. Macaulay Culkin seems more comfortable as the billionaire boy who feels isolated by his fame and wealth — perhaps because it touches on feelings in his own life. Richie has to outfit villains and rescue his parents. (*Burley Theater*)

'The Shawshank Redemption' (R) — A sincere and vibrantly acted consideration of two lifers (Morgan Freeman and Tim Robbins) and the way one of them discovers a liberation that eluded him beyond the prison walls. (*Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum*)

'Dolores Claiborne': King's worst nightmare

"Dolores Claiborne" has all the elements of a story told around a crackling campfire on a windy night, preferably accompanied by distant animal growls.

Those elements are familiar in the most delicious way: A secluded island locale off the coast of Maine... Cruel husbands... More wives... Unsolved murders... Keep roasting the marshmallows and wiggins and tell us more.

Expanded from Stephen King's novel, which was written as an internal monologue, the story is nothing if not flaud. And it's found its perfect screen translator in director Taylor Hackford ("An Officer and a Gentleman," "White Nights"), whose flair for melodrama suits the material perfectly. The result is a terrifically enjoyable yarn, well-crafted and superbly acted.

Kathy Bates, who won an Oscar for King's "Misery," provides the film's grimly shining centerpiece. As Dolores Claiborne, she has lots of reasons to feel despondent. The affable local postman, delivering the mail as always at high noon, discovered her in extremely compromising circumstances. The island's richest and most arrogant citizen, Vera Donovan (Judy Parfitt) is dead, having fallen down the staircase from her wheelchair. Standing over her is her longtime housekeeper Dolores, tasting a heavy narcotic rolling pin.

This is hardly the first crisis in Dolores' life. Eighteen years earlier, she was accused of murdering her abusive, alcoholic and thoroughly despicable husband Joe (David Strathairn, in a volatile change of pace from his recent wimp roles). She was never convicted, but she's still the town freak, a label she wears with cranky pride.

However, two people still think Dolores really murdered the worthless Joe. Det. John Mucky (Christopher Plummer) always sneers at her and makes sarcastic remarks about dead husbands. And, most significantly, her daughter Selena (Jennifer Jason Leigh), now a successful author and magazine writer in New York, has estranged from her mother since her father's death and delivers daring

glances at every opportunity.

The film becomes less a traditional whodunit than an emotional tug-of-war between mother and daughter. Everything is resolved, perhaps too patly, and the film litters for 10 minutes too long. But the movie never fails to be completely compelling, and many of the verbal exchanges are superb. With "Pulp Fiction," "Outbreak" and "Dolores Claiborne," could there actually be a rebirth of witty, non-gimmicky screen dialogue?

Bates' role is less flamboyant than her "Misery" mania, but she delivers a stronger, more resonant performance. She's expressive in her determined periods of silence, and her sharp, sarcastic comebacks completely win the audience. She may or may not be a murderer, but she makes us laugh.

Most impressive of all is her transition from browbeaten yet vaguely hopeful housewife (revealed in the flashback) to a defiant suspect not about to turn the other cheek. It's a dynamic performance, one with a quiet but short fuse.

Leigh at first appears to be doing a slow-tempo variation of her roles in "The Hudsucker Proxy" and "Mrs. Parker and the Vicious Circle." But her performance deepens admirably as we learn more about Selena's own personal trauma — her woman carry heavy emotional baggage. Dolores' is just more colorful than Selena's.

Plummer is the epitome of superciliousness as the detective who never lets loose of a suspicion. Parfitt is stingingly superb as the town patrician whose theory about female survival in a man's world is echoed by both Dolores and Selena. "Talk Radio" Eric Bogosian has a couple of smarmy scenes as Selena's less-than-professional boss. Strathairn's performance reveals a catalogue of intimidating facial expressions.

"Dolores Claiborne" is more concerned with plot twists than psychological undercurrents. It simply wants to tell a good story and should leave you a very contented moviegoer. (*Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley*)

**'New Age,'
'Angels'
reach stores**

New videos in Twin Falls-area stores this week:

"The New Age" (R) — Peter and Katherine Winler lead enviable lives. Both have high-paying jobs, a luxury house, fancy cars, stylish friends. So how did they end up months later nearly homeless and verging on suicide?

The Winlers' downwardly inmobile fate is examined in "The New Age." The movie was written and directed by Michael Tolkin, whose novel and screenplay "The Player" provided a trenchant view of the Hollywood rat race.

The descent begins with Peter's impulsive resignation from his \$300,000-a-year advertising job. At the same time, Katherine's design company has gone sour. So they throw a lavish party to celebrate their unemployment. One of the guests offers to find Peter a high-paying job at one of the studios. He declines, insisting he must do his own thing.

Angered by Peter's womanizing, Katherine embarks on her own fling, and husband and wife take on new bedpartners in the same house. Unable to afford a divorce, they decide to earn the money by opening an overpriced clothing boutique. It fails, and their desperation grows.

Their values undermined, Peter and Katherine seek salvation in New Age nostrums. This proves useless, and their financial and spiritual bankruptcy deepens.

Peter Weller and Judy Davis apply their extraordinary talents to bringing the couple to life. They manage some telling moments, but they are shackled to characters so wrongheaded that they don't deserve a shred of sympathy. (Associated Press) (Video West)

"The Specialist" (R) — With "The Specialist," Sylvester Stallone tries a literally explosive thriller only to have the entire project blow up in his face. As seen most recently in "Blown Away," mad bombers have always stood ready to set the timer and bail out desperate screenwriters in need of a convenient villain. "The Specialist" ignores the associations created by long precedent and turns into something different — a mad bomb.

It does not seem to have occurred to screenwriter Alexander Sarno that framing a movie around a hero who blows up his enemies — along with whatever car, boat or building they happen to be occupying — from a safe distance is hardly going to strike anyone as a profile in courage. In movies — as in the nightly news — bombing is indelibly linked to especially heinous terrorism.

Stallone's sleepwalk through the role of Ray Quick could be counted a form of terrorism against innocent viewers. Certainly, moviegoers who buy tickets for the pathetic shambles that is "The Specialist" will at least claim to be the victim of extortion.

Sharon Stone, dramatically overexposed in more than one way, slink around aimlessly, and James Woods does a psycho hit man as if he thinks his work in Oliver Stone's "Salvador" was too understated. (Orange County Register) (Hastings, Video West, Blockbuster)

"Angels in the Outfield" (PG) — Movies can be like tires. Overinflated them, as they can go flat real fast.

That's what happens to "Angels in the Outfield," a remake of a modest B-picture from the '50s. A battery of modern visual effects and a sentimental view of baseball fandom have been harnessed to a self-consciously inspirational ending and pumped into the framework of a whimsical fantasy that simply can't contain it.

What does work is the simple slapstick that younger kids enjoy and which would have served as a better measure for what turned out to be the movie's distended scale. After Roger (Joseph Gordon-Levitt), an 11-year-old foster child, is told by his estranged and widowed biker father that they have about as much chance of getting back together as the last-place California Angels (yes, it's art imitating life) have of winning the pennant, the young Anaheim resident and ardent Angels fan prays for divine intervention in the standings.

Lo and behold, while attending a game the next day, Roger sees a couple of winged figures swoop down from the heavens and scoop up an outfielder, carrying him the extra yardage to make a run-saving catch.

When Roger asks his buddy J.P. (Milton Davis Jr.) who he thinks the interlopers were, he gets only a strange look.

Soon enough, the mystery is made clear: Al the Angel (Christopher Lloyd) materializes next to him and says he and a team of heavenly angels are responding to Roger's prayer.

Not only does Roger work through his personal problems to a conveniently neat solution, but Knox and a veteran sore-armed pitcher, Mel Clark (Tony Danza), also succeed in their quests for inner peace. (Knight-Ridder Newspapers) (Blockbuster, Video West, Hastings)

Tesla creates name for itself Madonna on top with 'Take a Bow'

What's in a name? That kind of depends on the name. Take, for example, hard rock band Tesla, and their new album, "Bust a Nut."

As guitarist Frank Hannon explains, Tesla is named in honor of Nikola Tesla, the Croatian electrician and inventor whose discoveries included the first process for generating alternating current. Not that Hannon or his band mates knew this when they chose the name.

It was manager Cliff Burnstein who came up with the idea. "He came to us with it when we were still planning our first record, writing songs and stuff like that," Hannon recalls. "We definitely wanted to think of a name for the band, and when that came up, at first we were going, 'Tesla? What is that?' We'd all been sitting around thinking of names like 'Rock Monster' or something."

Hannon laughs. "So we're sitting around, going, 'Tesla? What is it?' Then he explained the whole story, and he showed us a book that Margaret Cheney had written, 'Man Out of Time,' and we were just blown away by some of the pictures. I mean, he's standing there with millions of volts circling around the air around him and stuff. It's a pretty amazing book."

Part of what the band liked about Nikola Tesla was the renegade quality of his genius. "It's because he was an underdog. He was like the mad scientist at that time, and everybody just wrote him off as some weirdo freak. His first major accomplishment was harnessing Niagara Falls and putting in the first hydroelectric generator system, and he actually lit up Manhattan with alter-

nating current. But you go there, and it's Edison who gets all the memorials and stuff."

Given the choice for justice implicit in the band's name, what high moral purpose lies behind "Bust a Nut"? Well, ummm ... none, actually. In fact, Hannon seems almost embarrassed to admit that he'd suggested the title.

"We were sitting around for a couple of days after the record was about 90 percent done, and we were

trying to think of something clever," he says, over the phone from his home in California. "We had already done the Tesla thing, with the first album, 'Mechanical Resonance,' and everything just sounded too serious. I was just kind of joking around and said, 'Why don't we just call it 'Bust a Nut?'

You know, just a joke, really. Next thing I know, the guys in the band are saying, 'Man, that's a great album title!'"

Releases from Simple Minds, Weezer

"Simple Minds, 'Good News From the Next World' (Virgin).

Simple Minds essentially had skipped the 1990s, figuring their synth-drenched epicurean in the age of grunge. The break wasn't long enough.

Although this Scottish band is down to the duo of Jim Kerr and Charlie Burrell, it makes music big enough for a cathedral. Songs are crowded with synthesizers and guitars, and Kerr booms out lyrics of sin, romance and redemption to keep up the pace.

Going for the grandeur is a risky strategy. When it works, the style can produce an anthem like this band's best known song from a decade ago, "Don't You Forget About Me."

When it doesn't, it's just so much bombast.

There's no economy of scale in Simple Minds' lyrics. Kerr's songs are melodramas acted out in apocalyptic settings, never a simple slice of life about a relationship, friendship or even a bad hair day. And by trying to mean everything, often they mean nothing.

One typical passage: "My heart is like a hunter's in the silent moon, my nerves feel electrified," Kerr sings. "Meet me on the staircase by a dark-

ened room, light me like a naked flame. The voice of Mother Nature states all things must pass."

"Yikes! Calm down, Jim! What exactly are you singing about?"

And that's from "She's a River," by far the best song on an album that clocks in at more than 48 minutes yet has only nine cuts. It's the only song in which the music truly soars.

Weezer, "Weezer" (DGC). Part Beatles-inspired genius, part camp, Weezer is the perfect anecdote to the Eddie Vedders of today's sour rock scene.

That said, Weezer is in danger of becoming to Green Day what the Stone Temple Pilots are to Pearl Jam. The staccato power chord rhythms that dominate this band's debut squarely puts them in the category of happy punk.

However, while Green Day excels in creating a complex cadence that fuels its songs, Weezer has an uncanny sense of melody and Tontastic songwriting skills. It's just too bad that producer and former Cats' frontman Ric Ocasek didn't recognize this.

Too many times, like on "My Name is Jonas" and "Surf Wax America," the melody is lost in the mix. Brian Bell's lead guitar also is often buried behind the rhythmic charge.

When Bell is allowed to shine, this band does as well. "Buddy Holly"

clocks in at 2:40, but it may be the most infectious rock song on the radio this year. It defies you not to dance.

Vocalist and songwriter Rivers Cuomo's sense of melody shines through on "The World Has Turned and Left Me Here" with its Cure-like feel and on "Say It Ain't So," which has a hint of Squeeze-style pop in it.

David Geffen let the cat out of the bag on Weezer when his record company released "Rarities — Vol. 1" last year and this band stole the show from the Counting Crows, Hole and others on the compilation with its song, "Jamic."

That Weezer doesn't take itself very seriously only adds to its charm. Mike Tyler Moore, Kiss and other 1970s icons make their way onto this disc, adding to the twentysomething fun.

Ocasek doesn't do Weezer any favors, but the band's ingenuity overcomes his heavy-handedness.

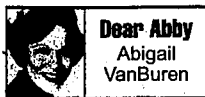
Divorcing mom struggles to go on Annual doll, bear show planned Saturday

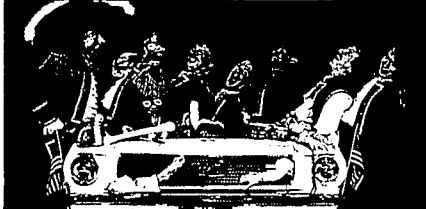



ACL agony

Tom ligament can sideline any athlete

TWIN FALLS — Jessica Durham may never play basketball on Friday the 13th again.

On that date two months ago, the 16-year-old Twin Falls High School junior reached for the ball in a game.

Her shoe stopped. Her knee didn't.

"I got up and walked off the floor with help," Jessica said. "I didn't think it was anything. But it (the knee) was very loose."

After holding off for two weeks, she finally went to a doctor. The diagnosis was not good.

Jessica had a torn anterior cruciate ligament — the worst of all knee injuries.

"Fortunately, we have things to treat it with now," said Dr. William May, a local orthopedic surgeon.

The anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) is the stabilizing ligament deep within the knee. It can tear when the knee is extended.

"It's more common in twisting, cutting sports," said Dr. David Murray, a surgeon at Twin Falls Orthopedic Associates.

Two weeks after hearing the news, Jessica underwent reconstructive knee surgery, and one month later, she is beginning rehabilitation.

Walking down stairs is difficult and frustration is continual for Jessica. She wears a brace every day except during rehab, where one of her exercises is pedaling a bicycle. She can't bend her knee completely so she has to sit on a chair behind the bike.

But Jessica has set her goals on returning to the high school court next year for her senior year of basketball.

"I don't think I will be able to tear the same knee," she said. "But maybe I won't play on the 13th."

While Jessica's injury came from a severe jolt, the ACL can tear in a trivial situation.

"When you walk or twist or turn, it can give way," said Dr. Tim Floyd, an orthopedic surgeon at Wood River Medical Center.

But that is the exception, not the rule, May said. "To get an ACL injury it usually takes a pretty good force. It's probably more common in less-conditioned athletes."

Surgery is the only way to repair the ACL, but some people can resume normal activity without an ACL.

"One person will do great with very little symptoms. The next person can't walk down the stairs," Floyd said.

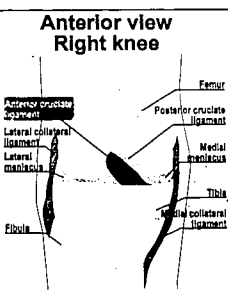

Hamstrings and quadriceps strength is important.

"People don't work hamstrings enough," said Mark Reed, a physical therapist at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center Physical Therapy. "It's not a well-known power muscle of the leg."

And the hamstrings — a major muscle group in the back of the leg — are often ignored, according to Dean Mayes, a physical therapist at Southern Idaho Therapy Services.

"It looks cosmetically better to strengthen the quadriceps. The quads keep you standing up. If they're weak, you'll notice it. The hamstrings you don't notice."

Mayes said that ACL injuries are going to happen, but people are more apt to have problems if they have weak quadriceps and hamstrings.

"It's not always easy to know if you've torn your ACL."

"You might hear an audible pop. There will be immediate swelling," said Reed. "The knee feels unstable when walking and people don't want to put weight on it."

Only a doctor can tell for sure, and chances are it could be a less serious injury.

"Not everybody who injures their knee has an ACL tear," May said.

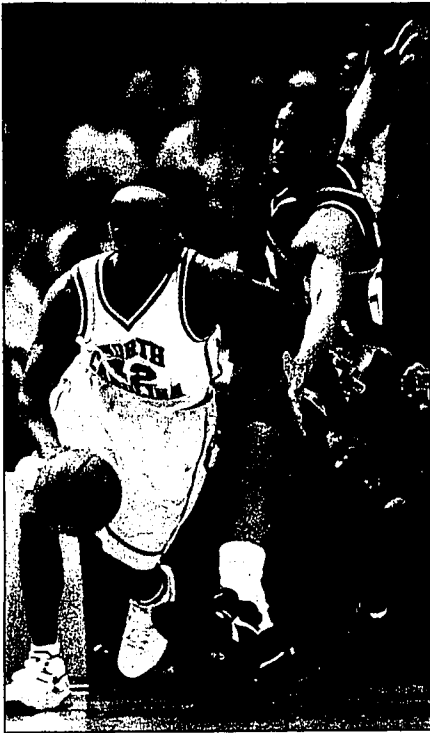

Wallace takes N. Carolina to finals

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—North Carolina rode Rashed Wallace's 20-point second-half performance to a 74-64 victory over Georgetown on Thursday night and a berth in the Southeast Regional final.

The second-seeded Tar Heels (27-5) will play the winner of Thursday night's Kentucky-Arizona State game on Sunday with that winner advancing to the Final Four in Seattle.

Wallace, who was limited to 46 minutes in the first two games of the tournament by a sprained left ankle, finished with 22 points, but North Carolina was able to withstand an impressive second half by Georgetown freshman Allen Iverson, who scored all but three of his 24 points after halftime.

North Carolina, which was last in the round of eight two years ago when it won the national championship, could never put away the sixth-seeded Hoyas (21-10), who dug themselves a hole with poor shooting. No one was worse than Iverson, who missed all six of his shots.

Wallace scored most of his points down low or on rebounds. His rebound dunk of a missed by 3-pointer by Donald Williams gave the Tar Heels a 67-58 lead with 3:38 left and the Hoyas were as close as eight points only one more time.

Williams finished with 20 points, 13 in the first half, for North Carolina, while Jerry Stackhouse had 12.

Othella Harrington added 18 points for Georgetown, all but four in the first half, while Jerome Williams had 16.

The Hoyas last reached a regional final in 1989 when they lost to Duke.

The coaching matchup was between close friends Dean Smith of North Carolina and John Thompson of Georgetown. It was their first in an NCAA tournament since the 1982 national championship game when the Tar Heels prevailed on Michael Jordan's jumper with 17 seconds to play.

North Carolina had the lead to 23-7 with 11:07 left in the first half as the Hoyas were in the midst of missing 12 straight shots and 18 of 19. Georgetown wasn't just missing from the outside. It was also missing layups and followed and North Carolina also blocked six shots, three by Wallace.

Meanwhile, the Tar Heels made four 3-pointers in his many possessions as they opened the big early lead. Dante Coltrina hit the first two and Donald Williams and Pearce Landry added one each.

The closest Georgetown, which shot 10-for-37 (27 percent), was able to get the rest of the half was seven points, the last time at 30-23 with 1:40 left. The Tar Heels, who shot 42 percent (13-for-31) led 35-26 at halftime.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala.—Kentucky put on another dazzling display in the NCAA tournament, cruising to its third straight postseason rout Thursday night with a 97-73 destruction of Arizona State in the Southeast Regional semifinal.

The Wildcats (28-4), who have won 11 in a row overall and their three tourney games by an average margin of nearly 31 points, are a team with no apparent weaknesses.

Led by Tony Delk's 26 points, Kentucky beat Arizona State (24-9) in every phase of the game to set up a much-anticipated showdown with second-seeded North Carolina in the regional final Saturday.

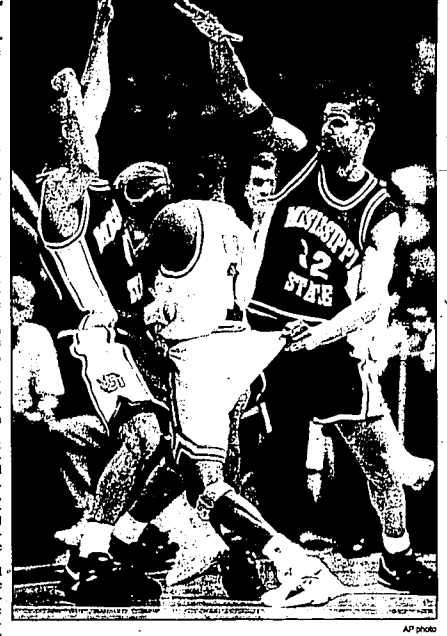
The Wildcats displayed their trademark touch from the outside, swishing 3-pointers from all over the court. They rocked the rim with several thunderous dunks. They were relentless at the defensive end, sagging on Arizona State star Mario Bennett every time he touched the ball.

And finally, their deep bench led the Sun Devils huffing and puffing, with barely the strength to meet their legs.

Kentucky led from start to finish and pulled away with a 12-0 run to start the second half, building a 54-36 lead. Actually, the spurt began on the final shot of the first half, when Kentucky's Delk hit a 3-point shot at the buzzer, answering Jeremy Veal's 3-pointer a few seconds earlier.

Rhodes never looked back, trotting off to the locker room after his arching shot swished the net. Neither did Kentucky, which ruined Arizona State's first try to the round of 16 since 1975.

Kentucky, seeking its sixth national title but first since 1978, opened the tourney with 113-87 rout of Mount St. Mary's and an 82-60 victory over Tulane. The Wildcats will get their first test of the postseason Saturday, meeting a North Carolina team earning a spot in the regional finals with a 74-64 win over Georgetown Thursday.

On Saturday, the Huskies will face UCLA for a trip to the Final Four. The Bruins routed Mississippi State 86-67 in the earlier West semifinal.

Connecticut never trailed. The Huskies built a 19-point lead with 12:20 left in the game, and the Terps only got the margin under double digits once after that.

Every time Maryland threatened to get back in the game, the Huskies responded with a quick jumper or layup. Most of the time it was Marshall who provided the response, celebrating his buckets by chest-

bumping his teammates and raising his fists in exaltation.

The Huskies opened the game with a 7-1 run and twice built leads of 14 points in the first half as Smith was limited by foul trouble and Marshall scored 16 points. Smith was held to 6 points in the first half, and he sat out the final 5:05 after picking up his third foul.

Trailing 49-41 at halftime, Maryland pulled within 55-49, but Marshall had 9 points, including his third 3-pointer, as the Huskies went on a 15-2 run to build their biggest lead at 70-51.

Though dueling bands and bubbly mascots gave the game an unmistakable college flavor, it had NBA style. Both teams pushed the ball up the court, and the physical play underneath had professional intensity.

Smith punctuated that intensity when he blocked Brian Fair's shot eight minutes into the game, swatting the ball 20 feet. But Smith tumbled over Marshall's back as he came down from the block, and slammed the floor on his back. He needed several minutes to recover.

Late in the first half, Marshall became the victim of the physical play when a cut near his right eye sent a stream of blood running down his nose and mouth and sidelined him for about three minutes.

Arkansas faces rival in Midwest semifinal

Having survived two close games in the NCAA tournament, defending champion Arkansas now faces a team it beat by only one point during the regular season — and a bitter rival.

On deck for the Razorbacks (29-6) Friday night in the Midwest Regional semifinals at Kansas City, Mo., is Memphis (24-9), whom they defeated 88-87 at Fayetteville on Feb. 9.

Arkansas opened defense of its title with a 79-78 victory over Texas Southern, then followed with a 96-94 overtime triumph over Syracuse.

Arkansas coach Nolan Richardson said his team's rivalry with Memphis is more a matter of players than fans.

Richardson has recruited in the Memphis area since he was coaching at Tulsa. He continued the practice at Arkansas, and three of his players are from Memphis — Corey Beck, Dwight Stewart and Elmer Martin.

"Any time you have three players on your team from that city, it makes it a rivalry," Richardson said. "I don't think it would be such a big rivalry if we didn't have as many players from Memphis. You have more of a rivalry among the players than among the fans right now."

In Friday's other Midwest regional semifinal, it's top-seeded Kansas (25-5) against Virginia (24-8).

The East Regional semifinals also will be played Friday night, with top-seeded Wake Forest (26-5) against Oklahoma State (25-9) and Tulsa (24-7) against Massachusetts (28-4) at East Rutherford, N.J.

Richardson's team was defeated about two important factors for the game against Memphis — Arkansas' lack of defensive rebounding and Corliss Williamson's foul troubles.

"We have to be much more aggressive and try to get off to a good beginning of the game playing that way," he said. "Usually when we are playing with aggressive board work, we won't have too much of a problem."

Williamson was on the bench with five fouls Sunday by the end of regulation play in the narrow overtime victory over Syracuse.

Richardson said, "You don't want your guy that... you want to get the ball to fouling out."

The Kansas-Virginia game could hinge on the play of the teams' big men — the Jayhawks' 7-foot-2 Greg Ostertag and the Cavaliers' 6-8 Junior Burroughs.

Ostertag is the all-time leading shot-blocker in Big Eight Conference history with 256. His intimidating presence in the middle is a major reason the Jayhawks are third nationally in field goal percentage allowed, 37.8.

"He changes things in there, he's so big — just the amount of space he opens up in the paint," Virginia coach Jeff Jones said. "When you throw in another 6-10 (Scott Pollard) and another 6-11 guy (Raef LaFrentz) in there, there's even less space."

Burroughs, Virginia's fifth all-time leading scorer and No. 2 rebounder, has averaged 26 points and 10 rebounds in the past six games. He scored 28 points in a 60-54 overtime win over Miami of Ohio in the second round.

"In the second half against Miami, he took over the game," Kansas coach Roy Williams said.

Oklahoma State is well respected because of its conditioning. Its foot center Bryant Reeves for its game against Wake Forest. Reeves, the Cowboys' leading scorer, injured his left arm during a first-round victory over Drexel last Thursday, then bruised his left elbow during practice this week.

Rizzotti matches high as UConn thrashes Alabama in East

STORRS, Conn.— Jen Rizzotti matched her season high with 24 points and Connecticut used a 20-0 run in the first half on route to a 87-56 thrashing of Alabama on Thursday night in an NCAA tournament East Regional semifinal.

The undefeated Huskies (32-0), the top seed in the East Region, will play in the final Saturday against the winner of Thursday's second semifinal game between second-seeded Louisiana Tech and third-seeded Virginia.

The game was close for about five minutes before Connecticut held fourth-seeded Alabama (22-9) scoreless for more than seven minutes while building a 35-18 lead.

The Crimson Tide, which turned the ball over six times during that stretch, ended the drought with Carla Koonce's jumper, but were held scoreless for the last four minutes of the half as UConn went ahead 51-25.

Arkansas State athletic director Brad Hovious said that Catalina, who has two years remaining on a three-year contract, had been "reassigned to duties other than basketball" within the athletic department.

"I do feel that a change in the direction of the basketball program is needed at this time," Hovious said.

In 11 seasons, Catalina, 44, was 188-139, but his latest Arkansas State team was only 8-20 overall and 3-15 in the Sun Belt Conference. Arkansas State played in the NIT in 1987, 1988, 1989 and 1991, compiling records of 21-13, 21-14, 20-10 and 23-9 in those seasons.

Labor board delays action

NEW YORK — The likelihood of an end to the baseball strike before opening day diminished Thursday when the National Labor Relations Board delayed possible court action until next week.

Management's negotiating committee, meeting at Rosemont, Ill., said it won't be making any major changes to its proposal when talks do resume, leaving only a remote possibility for an agreement that would avert the use of replacement players when the season starts April 2.

The NLRB's five-member board met in Washington and was expected to give Fred Feinstein, the agency's general counsel, permission to seek a preliminary injunction that would restore salary arbitration, free-agent bidding and anti-collusion rules. Players say they would end the strike if an injunction is granted.

But mediator W.J. Usery, who is attempting to schedule a bargaining session

for this weekend, telephoned NLRB chairman William Gould on Wednesday night and asked for the delay, according to a source familiar with the board's deliberations. Gould didn't acknowledge the telephone call during a news conference.

Mariners release stadium idea

SEATTLE — The Seattle Mariners released sketches Wednesday of their dream stadium — a baseball-only showcase with a grass field, nearly 46,000 seats and a retractable roof.

The sketches, commissioned by the Mariners from the Kansas City architectural firm HOK, offer a concept for the stadium, not a definite plan, the American League team says.

The drawings were released at a news conference by John Ellis, club chairman and chief executive officer.

The price tag? About \$278 million, including \$35 million for the roof, according to a county-appointed task force.

The Mariners' lease at the Kingdome ends next year. Without a new stadium, team officials say, the club will be sold or moved.

Seles said she's not ready to join a U.S. Fed Cup team that will include retired pro Navratilova in its first-round match April 22-23 against Austria at Turnberry Isle near Miami.

New Fed Cup captain Billie Jean King rejected the exclusive Seles by telephone before announcing the team.

"I talked to Monica last night," King said Thursday. "She doesn't know if she'll ever play tennis again. One of her dreams is to play Fed Cup and to be in the Olympics,

and she still loves tennis very much.

"She is practicing off and on. If she becomes more stable in her feelings about playing, I think she'll be back. I think deep down she probably does want to play again."

Big Sky hands Abegglen honor

BOISE — Ron Abegglen, who led Weber State to the Big Sky Conference's first NCAA tournament victory in 13 years last week, has been named men's basketball coach of the year by the league.

Pan Am officials take Canadian rower's gold

MAR DEL PLATA, Argentina (AP) — Canadian rower Silken Laumann was stripped of one Pan Am Games gold medal Thursday and allowed to keep the other after testing positive for a stimulant that was in a cold medicine.

Mario Vasquez Rana, president of the Pan American Sports Organization, said the executive committee voted to withdraw the gold medal for the quadruple sculls, but would recommend Laumann receive the minimum sanctions from FISA, the International rowing federation.

That could mean merely a warning.

Marnie McBean, Diane O'Grady and Wendy Wiebe joined Laumann and easily won the quadruple sculls final. The gold medal will now go to Cuba and the U.S. team moves up from bronze to silver.

Laumann will be allowed to keep her single sculls gold, won Saturday, because she did not test positive for speeded-up after that race.

After checking with doctors in Argentina and her hometown of Victoria, Laumann, an Olympic bronze medalist, used Benadryl, which contains pseudoephedrine, to treat a cold. She also suffers from asthma.

Benadryl is not detectable in the system after more than a few hours, and Vasquez Rana said that is why the tablet she took Saturday night caused her to have a positive test after the team event Sunday.

Vasquez Rana said two Canadian physicians were involved in prescribing Benadryl "and they made the mis-

take. We want to be human, but we have to follow the rules that we have. We hope the doctors will be sanctioned and the rower will not be sanctioned.

"A mistake has to be paid for."

The U.S. boxing team believes quite a few mistakes have been made by ringside judges. So coach Tom Mustin wasn't going to waste his time worrying whether heavyweight Lamon Brewster could win a decision over Cuba's famed Felix Savon.

"The Cubans are running the whole tournament anyway," Mustin said.

That could have been expected four years ago in Havana, but it also seems that way at this Pan Am boxing competition, where the Cuban presence is felt throughout the Once Unidos athletic club.

The best team in amateur boxing also has the most influence in amateur boxing — and U.S. team members believe they are paying the price.

"Why are we even here?" Brewster asked earlier this week after seeing teammate Carlos Navarro lose a close decision to Cuba's Juan Despaigne. "If we can't knock them out, we can't win."

That proved not totally true when light heavyweight Antonio Tarver won an 11-10 decision on Tuesday against Diosvany Vega of Cuba.

But even that decision briefly was held up while the Cuban delegation protested that a few more seconds should be added to the ringside clock to give their fighter a chance to tally another blow to even things up.





Untangling the Web

LOS ANGELES — Terra Goodnight, a student at UCLA, learned about the World Wide Web a year ago and decided she would add a bit of herself to it.

Now, people who have computers and modems can see that Goodnight is a basketball fan, likes to debate the strengths and foibles of Generation X and is charging through her first serious class in programming.

They get updates on her life by reading Goodnight's Web page, a document she posted on the World Wide Web portion of the Internet, the global network of computer networks.

The rapidly developing Web attracts thousands of people every week. It is a simpler way to present and find ideas on the Internet using electronic documents called Web sites or home pages. It represents a major step in allowing individuals to express themselves on a global stage in a way that only big corporations spending millions of dollars could before.

"I can see it going a million different ways, mostly bringing people together from distant points," Goodnight said. "Commercially, it will really change the ways businesses work."

Journalists at Time Warner Inc. use the Web to give readers more power over stories and illustrations their magazines provide. NASA created a Web site specifically for the March 2 shuttle trip and 150,000 people logged in for updates, video and audio clips during the 15-day mission.

A distinguishing feature called "hypertext" lets people jump around Web pages by clicking on highlighted words. For instance, in Time Warner's Web site, a person reading a Time magazine article on O.J. Simpson may click on the words "Nicole Brown Simpson" and be switched to a People magazine feature about her.

"You turn this information into liquid you can surf through," said James Kinsella, managing editor of Pathfinder Inc., the Time Warner subsidiary that puts the firm's magazines, books and eventually video and movie clips onto the Web.

Like the broader Internet, the Web was originally created by scientists for scientists, but later attracted all kinds of computer users.

"It is great to see the creativity that people put into it," said Tim Berners-Lee, who invented the Web in 1989 while working at CERN, the European Particle Physics Laboratory.

But, like the broader Internet, it has a way to go before reaching its full potential or satisfying the hopes of the first people to use it.

Getting connected to the World Wide Web requires fast modems, more computer memory and navigation software, which is often provided by a company that sells Internet access.

Producing documents for the Web is becoming simple. In just the past month, Microsoft Corp. and Novell Inc.'s Word Perfect unit began providing free upgrades to their word processing programs that will automatically turn a document into one with hypertext for use on the Web.

In the beginning...

GENEVA — Like many achievements in high technology, there was little at the creation of the World Wide Web six years ago to indicate the effect it would someday have on the way people use information.

A computer scientist at CERN, the European Particle Physics Laboratory, in 1989 proposed a better way for physicists around the world to collaborate on research.

The idea was to create "networked hypertext," or documents that could be joined in a simple way to others through the Internet, the worldwide network of computer networks.

"When I found myself working with a project in which most of the team members were in other labs in different countries, I felt that what we needed was a common knowledge base," said

Tim Berners-Lee, the computer scientist who created the Web.

Documents on the Web contain highlighted words or phrases that, when clicked on with a pointing device, reach for another document, perhaps in a computer that is on another continent.

"Before the World Wide Web was invented, using the Internet was a complicated and time-consuming business that only academics could contemplate," said Robert Cailliau, who worked with Berners-Lee at the outset of the Web's development.

The Web became active in 1990 but usage remained confined to the high-energy physics community until 1993. At that time, students at the University of Illinois designed new software called Mosaic for browsing, retrieving and interpreting documents on the Web.

"It was the first that was made easy to use also the first to have images... so Mosaic really helped the Web take off."

Several companies have since commercialized the program. During the past year, Internet access providers have rushed to provide Mosaic-like browsers to their subscribers.

Berners-Lee recently moved to the United States to work at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where refinements to the Web are being made. A chief aim is to ensure the system remains globally compatible and free for all.

Utility company gives \$725,000 to customers

BOISE — Pacific Power & Light Co. is complementing the process of rebating \$725,000 to its former Idaho customers in keeping with an Idaho Public Utilities Commission condition approving Washington Water Power's purchase of its Sandpoint-area electric service territory.

PP&L began issuing rebate checks last week. Each residential customer of record at the end of 1994 should receive \$83.60 minus any amount owed to PP&L.

In last fall's approval of the sale of the 9,600-customer, the commission directed PP&L to credit to its residential and farm customers a termination payment the utility received from the Bonneville Power Administration since Sandpoint-area customers would no longer participate in the BPA exchange credit program.

The exchange credit was created by the 1980 Northwest Power Act to share some of the benefits of the federal hydropower system with customers of investor-owned utilities.

Fred Meyer recalls English muffins after pin scare

PORTLAND — Fred Meyer Inc. Tuesday voluntarily recalled all English muffins made at its Clackamas bakery since Sunday because of fears that small pins may have gotten in to the product.

An inspection of the machine that slices the muffins revealed a few of the metal pins that push the muffins through the packaging line were broken.

More than 170,000 muffins were being recalled in Oregon, Washington and Montana.

The muffins carry the labels Fred Meyer English Muffins, Country Oven English Muffins and F.G. Meyer Diced 12 Pre-split Muffins. All of the recalled packages were pulled from the store shelves Tuesday morning.

There have been no reports of pins being found in Fred Meyer muffins, but the company was recalling the item as a precautionary measure.

Idaho mining company adds Andrus to board of directors

COEUR D'ALENE — If shareholders approve at the May 9 annual meeting, former Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus will join the board of directors of Coeur d'Alene Mines Corp. He was nominated for the board Tuesday.

"Governor Andrus brings to the Coeur board of directors not only a wealth of experience as a public servant, but he also played a key role in the economic revitalization of Idaho," said a statement from Dennis E. Wheeler, chairman and chief executive of Coeur d'Alene Mines.

Andrus served an unprecedented 14 years as governor of Idaho before stepping down in January. He serves on the board of directors of Albertson's, Inc., and NuWest Industries Inc., and is a member of the Gallatin Group, a Boise consulting company.

Newspaper advertising marks highest revenue in 8 years

WASHINGTON — America's newspapers recorded their highest advertising revenue in eight years in 1994, at nearly \$34.2 billion, the Newspaper Association of America reported Wednesday.

The figure was up 7.25 percent from the previous year.

The association, based in Reston, Va., represents more than 1,500 newspapers in the United States and Canada. It said newspaper advertising expenditures totaled \$10 billion in the last quarter of the year, an 8.1 percent increase over the same quarter of 1993.

Stepping out on the Web without a safety net

SAN FRANCISCO — Art librarian Susan Jurist began using the World Wide Web because she wanted to show her art to friends on the East Coast.

"I could e-mail them text, but I couldn't send them pictures," she said. "I put up a home page so I could tell them 'Go here and see all the neat stuff I'm doing.'"

The experience she gained from the project led her to help her employer, the Art and Architecture Library of the University of San Diego, create a Web site. It features detailed maps and a floor plan, information about staff and hours and even art exhibits by students.

For example, by clicking on the name Belinda DeLeo, a user is whisked to the pictures and text of her haunting Master of Fine Arts Show, held last spring.

To create the library's Web site, Jurist used a computer

scanner to turn pictures of the school and maps of the library into digital files.

She then added code known as HTML for creating the links, or hypertext, that join one element to another. It isn't complicated but can be time-consuming in a long document.

Word Perfect and Microsoft recently began giving away add-on software to their word processing programs that automatically executes HTML code.

Many businesses are hiring experts to create a Web page rather than risk something that looks amateurish and face the barbs of Internet sophisticates.

For instance, Hearts of Space, a record label and producer of a college and public-radio show, hired consultant Eric Theise, president of Liberty Hill Cyberworks in San Francisco.

More than 900 people a day now visit the Hearts of Space page. Once there, they can view the playlists of

every Hearts of Space program for the last three years and click to see songs that played.

Click on a song by an artist who records with Hearts of Space and the band's latest CD cover pops up on the screen, complete with a link to his release sheet. Theise is working on adding sound clips.

Having a Web site up allows Hearts of Space to reach its primary audience of college students, plus European customers who have never heard the show.

"There's a real desire for this kind of music in Europe, but it's hard to get information on it. With the Web, someone in Germany see everything in the catalog," Theise said.

Wiper inventor wins millions, says he's still broke

QUEENSTOWN, Md. — Robert W. Kearns reads his Bible daily. The Eighth Commandment, in particular, has consumed him for nearly two decades: Thou shalt not steal.

That's what he believes automakers worldwide have done to him — stolen his design for intermittent windshield wipers and made hundreds of millions of dollars.

On Monday, the Supreme Court ruled Kearns can collect about \$21 million from Chrysler in a patent infringement lawsuit.

But Kearns, who filed similar lawsuits against other car makers and won a \$10.2 million settlement from Ford, said he's still going to be \$1 million in the hole even with the award.

He expects the court to give his former attorneys about \$11 million and says he's spent about \$11 million in legal expenses since he first invented intermittent wipers in 1963.

Kearns lives in a cluttered 1859 two-story farmhouse he bought 18 months ago with part of the Ford settlement. The house sits on 16 acres along a peaceful cove on the Wye River.

Boxes of court documents litter every corner of his house. In the upstairs hallway are oversized working models of his patents.

"It's three parts and a motor. Each part does about three things. It's elegant!" Kearns said, beaming.

A bare Christmas tree stretches to the ceiling in the living room, its dry needles

In Kearns' messy bedroom, a partially deflated air mattress is surrounded by packing boxes that hold his clothes. His violin is there, but he hasn't had time to play.

"I don't really want to live this way," he said, as he picked his way around stacks of papers on the floor.

"My mother was very meticulous. But you don't understand what it's like to be in litigation."

The lawsuits have consumed him. His wife left him. He was once committed to a psychiatric hospital.

Still, Kearns is contemplating whether to

continue lawsuits against foreign automakers. A court dismissed his suit against General Motors.

Kearns began representing himself during the Chrysler case after several disgruntled attorneys with his lawyers' names and other things.

For the most part, he's learned the legal craft on the job.

"How much do you think you'd know about the law if you had paid \$11 million in fees?" he asked.

Pointing to his Bible in his bedroom, Kearns credited his Catholic faith and six children for keeping him going.

He doesn't work on Sundays, and every Thursday he makes the 3½-hour drive to Emmitsburg where a woman says she sees a vision of the Virgin Mary. He says he's just upholding the commandment that prohibits stealing.

"I'd have to be an idiot not to know that I haven't been helped," he said, tearing coming to his eyes. "I'm just the guy on the firing line."

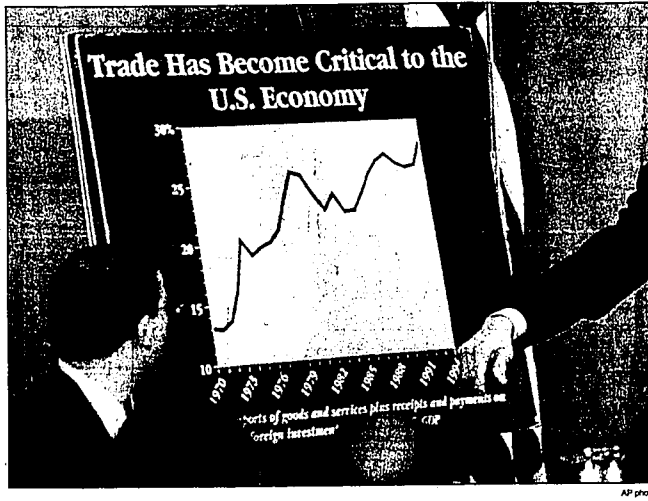

Trade official defends Clinton policies; more Japan talks set

WASHINGTON (AP) — The administration's top trade official insisted Thursday that the plunging value of the dollar and the country's soaring trade deficits were not an indictment of President Clinton's policies.

U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor said the administration's strategy of aggressively fighting to open markets around the world would prove successful. He announced another round in that effort would occur Monday with the resumption of contentious auto talks with Japan.

Kantor used a speech to the National Press Club to mount a broad-based defense of Clinton's trade strategy at a time when economic developments have given critics plenty of ammunition. The trade deficit hit an all-time high in January and the dollar continued to plunge on global currency markets.

"This president has been the most successful in American history in trade," Kantor said, listing 74 trade agreements reached in the first 26 months of the administration.

The dollar touched a record low against the Japanese yen in New York trading Thursday.

Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan said the dollar's stability would continue to be a concern as long as the United States ran large trade and budget deficits, according to participants at a private luncheon meeting Greenspan

had with Democratic senators.

One of the senators, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said Greenspan indicated his belief that the dollar had declined more than it should have in recent weeks and was due to rebound soon.

Kantor, in announcing the new round of auto talks scheduled to start in Tokyo on Monday, refused to comment on published reports that the U.S. side will move up a Sept. 30 deadline for reaching agreement on replacement parts. The aim, according to the reports, would be to increase pressure on Japan to reach a deal on free possible trade negotiations.

But he did say the United States would be pushing for market opening in the automotive area "as soon as possible" and wants results in three areas — autos, parts purchased by automakers and replacement auto parts.

Autos and auto parts account for more than half of America's deficit with Japan, which last year hit a record \$65.7 billion. But negotiators remain deadlocked despite 18 months of on-again, off-again talks.

Kantor called the trade deficit, which last year hit an all-time high of \$166.3 billion, "vastly overstated" in relationship to the overall size of the U.S. economy, and he defended the North American Free Trade Agreement as a "rousing success."

While he conceded the sharp devaluation of the peso would mean that for a period the United States will run trade deficits rather than

surpluses with Mexico, he said the increased Mexican sales in this country would help bolster the Mexican economy during a difficult time.

"Without the confidence NAFTA created, we'd have a much worse situation than we have today" in Mexico, Kantor said.

But administration critics were unswayed. Presidential candidate Patrick Buchanan asserted that the peso weakness was continuing to drag down the dollar and said January's trade statistics proved that Mexico had begun to flood the American market with cheap products at the expense of American workers.

"NAFTA has proven to be a complete disaster for the United States. We are likely to have a \$15 billion trade deficit with Mexico this year," Buchanan said during a campaign stop in South Carolina.

Buchanan pointed to reports that Mexican farmers and other imports are up sharply as despite Mexican producers seek to ship their produce to the United States to offset sagging sales at home.

"Tomato farmers are being of losing 40 percent of their winter market because Mexicans are dumping their product in this country," Buchanan said.

On Capitol Hill, House Banking oversight subcommittee Chairman Spencer Bacchus, R-Ala., complained about administration delays in supplying requested documents on U.S. economic aid to Mexico.

Retirement ruins Saturdays

NEW YORK — It seems like a neat fit in so many ways, demographically, economically, politically, and in terms of just plain common sense:

Many thousands of retirees want to contribute to society. Millions need the contributions these folks can make. The need for these contributions will grow as government seeks to cut expenditures on social programs.

That brings us to the point: Why not offer these good folks a small reward for their contributions, in the form of a modest tax credit for each hour of high priority volunteerism?

While that's under consideration, maybe insurers should consider a health insurance discount for a predetermined amount of volunteerism. It makes sense: Volunteering, it is claimed, improves physical and emotional health.

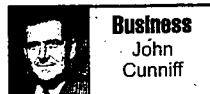
These are among ideas that emerged from a March 17 meeting of the National Retiree Volunteer Coalition in Minneapolis, which brought together some of the best brains in corporate retiree and volunteer activities.

The beauty of having volunteers ready and eager to fill any void, says Donna Anderson, NRVIC president, is that they are there for the asking, but perhaps overlooked as a national resource.

"We see our proposals as a national wake-up call to the American spirit," she says, stressing that "there is no need to create a new bureaucracy while conceivably quadrupling or quintupling the number of volunteers."

The recommendations will be adopted at the White House Conference on Aging during the first week in May.

While she offers as a prototype



her 16-year-old nonprofit organization — it embraces 69 programs under sponsorship of 54 corporations — several other groups are also organized and ready, including the Service Corps of Retired Executives (SCORE) and the International Executive Service Corps.

All seem to arise from at least two motivations: skills' needs for the know-how and society's need have developed over the years, and a similar desire, even need, of retirees to contribute what they know.

That, in fact, is how NRVIC began, growing out of a Junior League project to develop corporate volunteerism that coincided with a search by Honeywell Inc. for a way to handle growing requests for help from nonprofit organizations.

The answer, of course, was to utilize the services of retirees, and the idea spread. While NRVIC now operates in 31 cities in 16 states, it still has a strong imprint of its hometown — Minneapolis, where Honeywell is based.

As the idea spreads on its merits to more companies, it receives an added thrust from demographics. With about 31 million people age 65 or older, there are more of them than teen-agers. We haven't seen anything yet.

By the year 2050, says Sanders Korenman, head of the Center for Population Analysis at the University of Minnesota, the total will explode to 79 million. The baby boom, as experienced, leads inevitably to the first senior boom.

And to problems and opportunities.

Discussions at the March 17 meeting resulted in agreement that "the 'all-time high' of retirement" is an obsolete experiment in social engineering, especially as life expectancy rises — and it has, by 28 years since 1900.

Retirement today, they declared, is NOT a natural part of the human life cycle, a notion reinforced by Dr. Lydin Bronte, author of "The Longevity Factor," who told them a second middle age begins at about age 50.

Second middle age is largely unstructured in comparison with the formal work life that preceded it, and it is into this void that organizations such as NRVIC are moving. Just in time to help.

Anderson says the shifting of the status of more responsibility for social programs inevitably will put increased workload pressures on community agencies, especially the quarter-million nonprofits involved in special works.

Part from state-city funding and contributions, the lifeblood of such agencies is volunteers. But municipalities have budget problems, and volunteer hours have been slow to grow. There is evidence they are even shrinking.

In contrast, says Anderson, a 1993 NRVIC study showed that 12,000 corporate volunteers contributed 1.7 million hours during the year, a 6 percent increase since 1989.

Let the problems and desires of corporate retirees be the nation's opportunity, says Anderson, who cites the immortal words for an unknown wag: "Retirement ruins Saturdays."

MCI, PBS announce joint venture

WASHINGTON (AP) — A joint venture between the Public Broadcasting Service and MCI Communications should bring computer users spinoffs from public television shows, with a way for children to chat with TV characters by e-mail.

MCI and MCI Communications Thursday announced their plan to make PBS programming and related products available on CD-ROM, through the Internet and through on-line computer services, including the new PBS Online that begins this year.

MCI, which will provide the delivery system, has committed at least \$15 million to the venture over the first five years, said MCI Chairman Bert C. Roberts Jr.

Access to some new services may be free, while in other cases a fee will be charged. The services are expected to help market a wide range of products related to PBS shows and provide additional information to viewers.

The joint venture also will devel-

op new programming for PBS stations.

"We expect to share revenues from this," said PBS President Ervin S. Duggan said. "In a venture that has not been fully worked out, we cannot tell you what the formula will be."

The new venture won't generate operating funds for public TV stations and won't make up for reductions in federal funding being considered by Congress, Duggan said.

"We don't see this in any way replacing our commitment to free, nonprofit, accessible broadcasting," he said.

MCI and PBS expect to begin announcing the first of the new services in June, and details are still being worked out.

But they gave examples of things they expect to offer by computer: supplementary information, such as the bibliography from a documentary or recipes from a cooking show; interactive games and lessons for children, using public TV characters; the sale of products related to

PBS shows, from mugs to CD-ROMs; and teaching aids, such as instructions for duplicating a science experiment as seen on TV.

Eventually, as technology improves, viewers should be able to order the latest episode of a PBS show to view on their computers, whenever they want, the companies said.

Because PBS doesn't own the licensing rights to many of its existing shows, such as "Sesame Street," it's unclear which will be incorporated into the new services.

But Duggan said PBS hopes to persuade producers and TV personalities from current public TV shows to join the effort. PBS will obtain rights to incorporate its new shows into the services, Duggan said.

PBS is a nonprofit corporation owned by the nation's public TV stations, which buys programming for the stations. MCI, a long-standing telephone and communications corporation based in Washington, has annual revenue of more than \$13.3 billion.



THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff

"Customs are made for customary circumstances and customary characters."

—John Stuart Mill

Although it is customary practice to lead a low card in partnership when you hold K-x or K-x-x, sometimes it pays to break with custom. Today's deal provides an excellent example.

How should West defend against South's sacrifice of five clubs at duplicate bridge? If West makes the normal lead of the spade try, the sacrifice pays off. East wins the ace and his best return is a club. West wins his ace and leads a heart and the defenders establish a heart trick before the diamonds are started. This nets the defenders one trick in each suit—a 300-point penalty in exchange for their 420-point game. Not a good score.

It's another story if West makes the inspired lead of the spade king at trick one. When it holds, he remains on lead to lead through dummy at trick two. His obvious heart shift goes to dummy's 10 and East's jack and East returns a club to West's ace. A second heart is led through dummy and the defenders establish two heart winners before East's diamond ace is gone. This time the penalty is 500 points instead of 300. This defense earns an excellent score and provides a just reward against troublesome opponents.

In general, one should choose a normal opening lead. When most of the enemy's high cards are known to be in dummy (as in today's case), it's best to lead to try to keep the lead for a crucial shift at trick two.

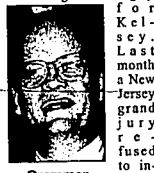
Q: Does Eddie Murphy still live in that wild, Egyptian-style house he bought from Cher a few years ago for something like \$3 million? — P.W.

A: Things are looking for

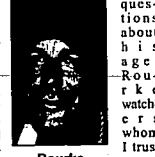

evades questions about his age. Rourke watches films with whom I trust him at somewhere between 38 and 45.

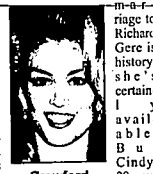

She said I was perfect for the

role of Marielle, which pleased me very much."

Fans of "Days of Our Lives" will recall Billie's entrance three years ago as a funky ex-porn star. Since then Lisa has become one of the soap's most popular characters, and her chemistry with Robert Kelker-Kelly has kept the home screens sizzling.

"Remember when I started to work with Robert. I told him that we were going to score with the viewers because I felt this built-in chemistry between us. People saw it almost immediately and Bo and Billie took off in the storyline. I used to watch "Days of Our Lives" when I was in high school and for years after that. Bo Brady was played by Peter Reckell at the time and I had the biggest crush on him. Little did I envision then that I would be on the soap and my character would become involved with Bo Brady."

Lisa will be leaving "Days" in August when her contract expires. She feels it's time to move on and see what else is out there.

"I love playing Billie and I will be forever grateful to "Days" for giving me the opportunity to expand my acting skills. It's been a great experience, but I don't want to limit myself. I want to play different roles, a manic depressive or a total bitch."

In the meantime, "Vanished" affords Lisa's daytime fans the opportunity to see her in an entirely different role, one far removed from Billie Reed.

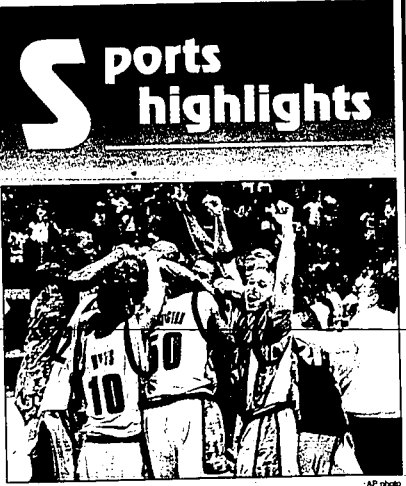

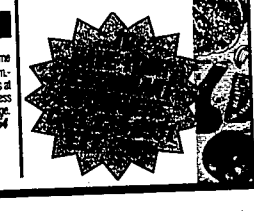
