TWIN FALLS — Pioneer Club owner Bill Peters poured a pint of beer for a bar patron Thursday and defended his local militia group in the wake of the Oklahoma City bombing.

"We're not against our country, we're not radicals," he said. "We don't wear uniforms and go hiking around the woods with machine guns. We're constitutionalists, you might say."

In fact, when asked point blank, Peters and other leaders of the United States Militia Association say they are not a militia. Why? Because militias are illegal in Idaho unless set up by the government.

But the association's literature talks of forming "fire teams" and "platoons." Members are expected to buy uniforms, arms and ammunition.

In the Pioneer Club's back room, where 20 to 50 United States Militia Association members meet several times monthly, an Urban Combat magazine lies open to a page about how to turn a .22-caliber rifle into an automatic weapon with a silencer, and advertises for a book on how to make a bomb.

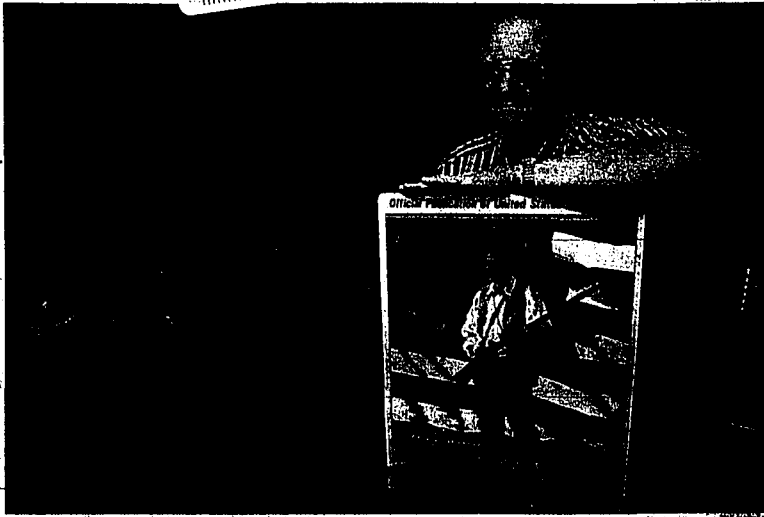
Idaho law prohibits people from associating "themselves together as a military company or organization." But no one is sure why the 67-year-old law exists, and there is no punishment for violating the law.

Authorities investigating last week's massive bombing of the Oklahoma City federal building have linked suspects to militia-style groups in Michigan.

Idaho officials say there is nothing illegal about allowing meetings for the free exchange of ideas, unless congregants plot to overthrow the government. So far, they've accepted USMA's word that it is a peaceful organization.

"We've not taken a look at this and who knows, maybe we will," said Bill von Tegen, director of governmental and public affairs for the Idaho Attorney General's Office.

Although seven distinct militia-style or-

ganizations have reportedly nested in Idaho, the state hasn't attempted to disband any of them under Idaho's Militia and Military Affairs Law. That law defines the state's National Guard forces.

Instead, officials say they won't act unless the state's relatively new Terrorist Control Act is violated.

If groups talk about making bombs and setting booby traps, or plot how to pass weapons through metal detectors without

Federal agents face escalating threats from militia

Months before the horrific Oklahoma City bombing, law enforcement agents across the Central and Western states had become the targets of an escalating series of threats and attacks by militants bound by a common hatred for government authority, records and interviews show.

Federal officials confirmed they have been alerted to at least a dozen confrontations since September 1994 between suspected members of various heavily armed militia groups and federal, state and local authorities.

Among the episodes were several armed standoffs during searches and attempted arrests. In Indiana two months ago, militia

members prevented authorities from enforcing a child custody order. And in rural Montana this month, members of one militia engaged in an armed standoff with a local law enforcement official when he tried to arrest a woman for a minor-vehicle violation.

In the most violent incident reported, a man with militia ties in Missouri sought for allegedly shooting a Missouri highway patrolman last September to avenge the arrest of a fellow anti-government activist.

After analyzing such seemingly unrelated incidents, federal authorities say they became concerned that they were facing a pattern of hostility against government employees and issued internal warnings about anti-government groups. Federal intelli-

gence reports warn that some local police belong to militia groups and that radio transmissions about possible raids by federal agents have been intercepted.

"We are concerned about the threats to law enforcement officers," said one top law enforcement official in Washington. "The threats that they have made are fairly new, within the past year. We take them very seriously. We have to."

The official, like a number of others, spoke on condition of anonymity, citing the sensitive nature of the Oklahoma bombing investigation.

In the wake of the Oklahoma bombing on April 19, authorities are exploring links between certain militia members and bombing-suspect Timothy J. McVeigh and

two brothers charged with conspiring to make explosive devices. Officials also say they have intensified their efforts to monitor confrontations with a militia movement now thought to number more than 100,000 people spread through several hundred groups in 30 states.

Worried about increased hostility and intimidation from anti-government radicals, some federal employees in rural areas have altered their work habits or even stopped performing essential parts of their jobs. After someone killed a gray wolf, wildlife investigators cut short their search of an Idaho ranch last month out of fear of an armed confrontation, according to records and interviews.

McVeigh held for trial in Oklahoma City bombing

OKLAHOMA CITY — Timothy McVeigh, incriminated by "an indelible trail of evidence," was ordered Thursday to stand trial in the Oklahoma bombing, while authorities put out an alert for his missing Arizona license plate in hopes it will lead them to the second suspect. Their fear: John Doe No. 2 may bomb again.

Federal magistrate Ronald Howland also ordered McVeigh held without bail. The decision came after four hours of testimony from special agent John Hershey in which he described accounts of several witnesses, including one man who saw McVeigh's yellow Mercury speeding away from a parking lot near the building with McVeigh and a second passenger.

Hershey said at the hearing his "prima-

ry responsibility is to find the other subject to prevent another bomb from going off."

The death toll in the nation's largest terror attack, meanwhile, passed a grim milestone: More than 100 bodies have now been found in the rubble of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building.

Another witness, a motel maid, told the FBI she saw the defendant driving a Ryder truck headed toward her in the direc-

tion of the building shortly before the blast. The truck was moving slowly enough that she thought the driver was going to stop and ask directions.

In his ruling, Rowland said: "The court finds an indelible trail of evidence that McVeigh was the driver of the truck that exploded in front of the Murrah Building."

Krieger case frustrates Cassia County officers

Cassia County Sheriff's Department Sgt. Dave Tracy has a four-inch thick file of information on the Regina Krieger murder. Cassette tapes, video tapes and two blankets thought to match the one missing from Regina's bedroom also litter the area around his desk.

BURLEY — Who killed Regina Krieger, and why? Those questions consume Cassia County Sheriff's Department Sgt. Dave Tracy and detectives investigating the disappearance and murder of the Burley Junior High School freshman.

Two months ago today, Regina's father Daniel Krieger discovered his daughter missing from her downstairs bedroom and saw a trail of spotty blood leading from the foot of her bed to a fence in the back yard.

The mystery of Regina's disappearance ended April 15 when her body was found on the east bank of the Snake River 16 miles upstream from Burley. She had been stabbed in the heart, and her throat was cut.

The mystery of Regina's death, with fewer leads and less hope, began the day her body was found. Was she killed in her bed? Was she alive for some time? Why was she killed?

"When her body turned up, it was a sad day for all of us because now we knew we had a murderer

loose and that our job was just beginning," said Tracy, who has lost two children of his own.

"I know what it feels like to lose a kid. I know what the family is feeling," he added.

"As a case, Regina's murder has been frustrating. A prime suspect still has not been singled out. Emotionally for investigators, the murder has been unsettling, Tracy said.

"It's an emotional roller coaster. You have days when you feel good, like you're on the right track. Then a call doesn't pan out and you hit rock bottom," Tracy said.

"We are living this case. We deal with the frustration of the family, thinking how can this happen in our homes ... in our neighborhood ... in our town, Burley," Tracy said.

Rain soaks Midwest as Plains shiver in record chill

Rain spread across the Midwest and Great Lakes on Thursday and cold air pushed across the central part of the nation, driving temperatures to record lows as far south as New Orleans.

A low pressure sliding eastward across Michigan produced areas of heavy rainfall across the Midwest and Great Lakes.

Twenty-four-hour rainfall amounts of 1 to 3 inches were reported in parts of Iowa, Wisconsin and northern Illinois. Chicago got just over 2 inches of rain, with almost 2.5 inches in some suburbs, and parts of Lower Michigan got almost an inch just during the morning.

By midafternoon, showers had begun moving into upstate New York and western New England.

Circulation west of the low pressure area drew cold air southward across the Plains and Mississippi Valley.

Record lows for the date included 30 at Concordia, Kan.; 31 at Wichita, Kan.; 46 at New Orleans; 26 at Kearney, Neb.; 25 at North Platte, Neb.; and 30 at Amarillo, Texas.

In the West, a new Pacific storm shifted showers and a few thundershowers into Oregon and northwestern California. Rainfall amounts were mostly less than a quarter of an inch, although Sand Flat, Calif., near the Shasta Dam, got about two-thirds of an inch.

Brisk wind blew across parts of the Southwest, with gusts to 46 mph at Mojave, Calif., and 47 mph through the Guadalupe Pass in western Texas.

Thursday's temperatures around the lower 48 states ranged from a morning low of zero at Burgess Junction, Wyo., to afternoon readings in the 80s in Florida at Jacksonville and Miami.

Reading abilities show decline

WASHINGTON (AP) — High school seniors are reading less, and it shows.

While math scores are on the rise, national reading scores have dropped.

Only about a third of seniors were rated proficient readers in test results released Thursday, a significant decrease from the same test two years earlier.

And fourth-graders and eighth-graders were even less likely than the seniors to qualify as "good enough" readers, although their scores held steady over two years.

The results are like "a whack on the head," said William T. Randall, chairman of the National Assessment Governing Board and Colorado education commissioner.

"This tells us what we already intuitively know," Randall said. "Our reading is slipping."

No specific explanation for seniors' score drop was offered, but members of the test's governing board said it's clear students don't do enough reading — at school or at home.

A survey accompanying the 1994 test found that, compared to seniors who took the 1992 test, students were less likely to read for fun on their own time, read more than 11 pages per day, or be asked at least once at school to discuss something they read.

Ten states showed significant declines in reading proficiency: Delaware, Louisiana, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Utah and Virginia.

No state showed significant improvement in average scores, although Arizona and Mississippi showed improvement among their highest scorers.

There was no listing for Idaho in the report, which included only participating states.

The decrease in National Assessment of Educational Progress scores comes just two months after Education Secretary Richard W. Riley declared U.S. education was "at long last, turning the corner."

Simpson witness flip-flops

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Jurors snapped to attention and picked up their notebooks Thursday when a police technician admitted she changed key testimony about her evidence collection methods in the O.J. Simpson murder case.

Andrea Mazzola collected most of the blood evidence that prosecutors hope to use to link Simpson to the murders of his ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson and her friend Ronald Goldman.

She acknowledged that when she first testified Aug. 23, 1994, she said she initiated every envelope in which she placed a blood swatch. But on the stand Thursday, she said she initiated none of them.

Mazzola's flip-flop provided the defense with its most powerful illustration so far of what it claims was a combination of evidence tampering and sloppiness that could render test results on the blood meaningless.

The defense case got an additional boost from Mezzola's admission she was also wrong about who initiated small paper folders, known as bindles, that were wrapped around the blood swatches and then placed inside coin envelopes.

"Back in August, I was under the assumption that I put my initials on the envelope and I was wrong," Mezzola said, referring to one specific blood sample, which bore the initials of her supervisor, Dennis Fung. The package showed no indication of her name.

She admitted that she testified at the August hearing, "I collected the stain. It was initiated by me."

The admissions came at the end of four days of often tedious testimony from Mazzola, who was excused late Thursday. The next witness isn't scheduled to take the stand until Monday because of a hearing today on an artist's courtroom sketches.

alarms going off, they might be challenged, officials said.

"I think a prosecutor would have to consider the entire constellation of facts," said Kootenai County Prosecutor Bill Douglas. He helped put three white supremacists in federal prison for 1987 bombings in his county.

Leaders of the United States Militia Association said their group trains in survivalist techniques and provides weapons training in some circles, but only for self-defense. Members don't bring their guns to meetings, they said.

"We are armed as citizens, but unarmed as an association," said Samuel Sherwood, leader of the Blackfoot-based militia group.

Inside the Twin Falls meeting room, an American flag hangs near the door. Fifty-gallon water barrels line the walls near a donated fax machine and old bar knick-knacks on dusty shelves.

Copies of magazine articles asking for a well-regulated and legal militia are strewn across podiums and long tables. Stacks of old U.S. Army manuals from surplus stores discuss battle tactics and land-mine placement.

Peters, 55, carries a copy of the U.S. Constitution and the Bill of Rights in the front pocket of his flared shirt. He admits his group sometimes attracts the occasional warmonger, but said he didn't know where the magazines and battle manuals came from.

"Someone must have just brought that stuff in, I don't know," Peters said.

The militia group helps channel the violent urges that a few members may have. Members send postcards to the state and federal government seeking to repeal gun controls and lobby to allow the cities and counties to set up militias under state guidelines, he said.

At his meetings they discuss pending legislation — and issues dealing with government's encroachment on ordinary people, he said. Most of his members are aging military veterans — some National Guardsmen are even members, he said.

"I can't help what other members bring to the meetings, but I can guide their thoughts," Peters said.

Peters said he's ready to defend himself if it ever comes down to civil war with the federal government, as some members predict. He says it is frustrating to lobby the government when it seems not to be listening.

"How do you protect the government with a minute, measurable amount of success, legally and lawfully?" he said. "There are a lot of angry and frustrated people out there."

"My last thought before I go to sleep at night and my first thought when I wake up in the morning is, who else can I talk to about this," Tracy said.

Solving Regina's murder is like piecing together a broken puzzle, Tracy said. While the puzzle is coming together, investigators are guessing at the picture it composes.

So far, the picture is not clear, he said.

"We've heard gangs. We've heard drugs. We've heard sexual assault. We haven't heard anything that makes sense," Tracy said.

Every morning, detectives meet and ponder possible scenarios of Regina's death. Most of the 400 other cases that cycle through the detectives' office monthly have tak-

en a back seat to the murder investigation, Tracy said.

"Everyone one of us is working on the case. We get calls every day," Tracy said.

"I don't think there's an officer in this department that has a higher priority than solving this case," Sheriff Billy Crystal said.

Public interest in Regina's death has resulted in a deluge of information for officers to sort through. At least six people have called claiming to have found a green and black blanket missing from Regina's bedroom.

Two of the blankets found on the banks of the Snake River lie wrapped up in plastic bags next to Tracy's desk in the corner of the detectives' office. Neither of them matches the missing bedding.

Next to the blankets is a box filled with audio and video tapes of conversations with people interviewed about Regina's death. Solving her murder hinges on cooperation and information from Regina's friends and family, Tracy said.

"There are people out there who know about this murder. Somebody out there has to point us in the right direction. The police can't solve crimes all by themselves," he said.

Some people thought by police to have information critical to the case are not willing to speak, said Tracy. Until now solid leads are developed, the case may go unsolved.

"There's not one of us who has slept good since this happened. Every one of us has a positive attitude. We're going to catch this guy," Tracy said.

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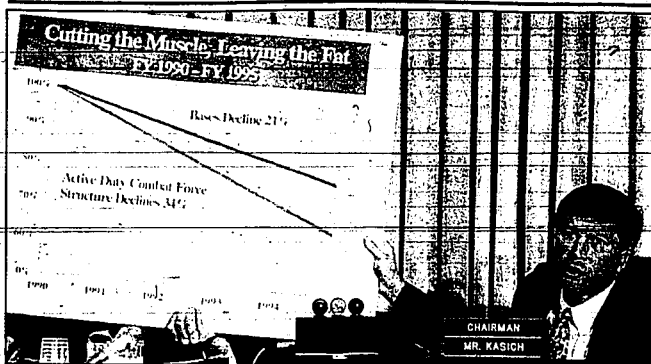

Republican senators back freeze on defense spending

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Republicans are prepared to increase this year's defense budget proposal but then freeze Pentagon spending at that level through the end of the century, a senior lawmaker said Thursday.

Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., chairman of the Senate Armed Services readiness subcommittee, said GOP members of the Senate Budget Committee are discussing a flat defense budget figure of \$272 billion through fiscal year 2001.

That is \$60.1 billion, or 3.8 percent, more than President Clinton has proposed for the same period. By not allowing for inflation, however, it would mean that defense spending would gradually decline in real terms.

To eliminate proposed Clinton cuts and allow for the effects of inflation, Congress would have to add more than \$100 billion more to the GOP proposal through 2001, based on government inflation estimates.

McCain said the Budget Committee, which plays a major role in setting the bottom-line spending levels for all the government departments, has not yet formally approved the \$272 billion figure. But he said, "they are floating the

hard freeze — without inflation."

For fiscal 1996, beginning next Oct. 1, the GOP proposal would add \$10.6 billion to the administration's \$261.4 billion defense budget. The annual increases would be larger in the following three years as, under the Clinton plan, defense spending would dip before rising at the turn of the century.

"I think it would give us a chance to sort out what our priorities and needs are," McCain said. "I obviously would like more but I think we would like to review it in the context of the whole budget reduction situation and in the context of what the (military) services can get by on."

The chiefs of the armed services, appearing before McCain's subcommittee Thursday, indicated their support for Clinton's defense budget but said readiness could slip if spending is cut further and if other programs are not addressed.

"It provides the minimum level of funding necessary to provide the nation a ready Marine Corps in 1996," said Gen. Carl E. Mundy Jr., commander of the Marine Corps.

Gen. Ronald Fogleman, the Air Force chief of staff, said his service "cannot reduce modernization further

and still sustain a credible combat capability for the next decade. Gen. Gordon Sullivan, the Army chief of staff, echoed the concern about spending on military modernization.

And Adm. Jeremy Boorda, the chief of naval operations, warned of "storm signals that in some individual areas we have stretched too far."

Across Capitol Hill, Defense Secretary William Perry told the House Budget Committee that current readiness is sound and that lawmakers should focus on whether the military has enough money in subsequent years to buy new weapons. The president's fiscal 1996 defense budget seeks \$39 billion for procurement, the lowest level since the beginning of the Korean War.

"The question of present readiness is a false issue. I believe you're wasting your time pursuing that," Perry said. "You should be concentrating your attention on whether this budget will sustain the high levels of readiness we have today."

Rep. John Kasich, R-Ohio, who chairs the House committee, has suggested about \$270 billion for defense. He said Thursday that spending on new weapons must increase.

Clinton seeks peace settlement

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton, trying to clear the way to a successful summit in Moscow, urged Russian President Boris Yeltsin Thursday to make the cease-fire he has declared in war-torn Chechnya permanent.

In a 30-minute telephone conversation, Clinton and Yeltsin surveyed their agenda and a slump in U.S.-Russian relations. "We have a lot at stake," a White House official observed.

There was no indication of a change of heart resulting from Clinton's talk with Yeltsin or an earlier 10-minute meeting he had with Russian Foreign Minister Andrei Kozyrev.

However, the official, Coit S. Blacker of the National Security Council staff, suggested the two leaders may find a way in Moscow May 10-11 to narrow their differences over the projected expansion of NATO.

Clinton called Yeltsin's order halting fighting in Chechnya until May 12 a welcome first step, but said it had not allayed his deep concern about the situation in the breakaway republic.

"The tone was positive," Blacker said of the conversation. "It was an important opportunity for President Clinton and President Yeltsin to compare notes."

Initially, the Clinton administration voiced support for Russia in its effort to stop a Chechen secession that might have touched off widespread splintering of the country. But the massive military assault alarmed and concerned the administration.

Russia's brutal response to the uprising in the Caucasus "clearly caused Clinton to reject Yeltsin's invitation to go to Moscow on May 9 to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Allied victory over Nazi Germany and to hold summit talks with him.

The cease-fire order, signed Wednesday, was followed Thursday in Moscow by a warning from Defense Minister Pavel Grachev of heavy retaliation if Chechen rebels attacked Russian troops during the unilateral truce.

Differences over Russia's plan to provide Iran with nuclear technology and over a projected eastward expansion of NATO despite Russia's objections also threatened to mar the summit.

On another subject, the administration hopes an agreement worked out at the summit to restrict Russian arms sales to Iran, State Department spokesman Nicholas Burns said.

DEA director reports increase in heroin use

WASHINGTON (AP) — Heroin use appears to be increasing in many parts of the country, with some crack users switching to heroin for its price and availability, the nation's top anti-drug official reported Thursday.

"Heroin of high purity continues to be a major story in many areas of the country with use in the Northeast and South having stabilized at a high level or with increasing use," said Lee P. Brown, director of the White House Office on National Drug Control Policy.

Brown's quarterly report on national trends in drug abuse also said that heroin is attracting younger users and that cocaine and marijuana are readily available across the country.

While older users still dominate the heroin market, researchers in New York, Colorado, New Jersey, Connecticut, California and Georgia interviewed by Brown's office said that younger users are increasing.

Police in New York, Seattle and

Washington reported similar trends, but treatment providers said the average heroin user they see remains essentially the same: over 30 years old and male.

"Street sales of heroin are reported as brisk, with areas like Connecticut reporting as many as seven or eight sellers on a single street corner," according to the report.

The \$10 to \$20 bag is the favored unit of distribution. New York and Delaware reported lower-price units, \$3 to \$5 per bag, while Los Angeles reported bags selling for \$20 to \$40.

"In Atlanta and other areas where heroin is becoming increasingly popular, crack and cocaine dealers are changing their product lines completely — getting out of cocaine and into heroin," the report said. It said some crack users in the Northeast are switching to snorting heroin because it is cheaper, more plentiful and carries less of a stigma than crack.

Militia leaders have distanced themselves from the men linked to the bombing and say that they never espouse breaking the law. But their statements leave unclear under what circumstances they see fit to put their weaponry to use.

"If the government is going to come out here and take away our families and our land and our guns, then they'll have to come here and find out what would happen," said John Trochmann, a prominent national leader from the Militia of Montana.

Although there is no evidence to directly link past confrontations to the Oklahoma tragedy, watchdog groups agree that the anger, frustrations and hostilities may well have been harbingers for the deadly explosion that has rocked the nation's psyche.

"This is a very scary phenomenon," said Brian Levin, a Southern California hate-crime specialist with the Southern Poverty Law Center. "There's a heavy-duty glorification of violence and of terrorist tactics in these groups."

Experts say the militia movement has spread like a prairie fire in the last two years, fueled in large part by outrage over the government's handling of the fiery 1993 standoff with the Branch Davidian sect in Waco, Texas, that killed more than 80.

Although restrained by laws governing police surveillance and infiltration, authorities have begun tracking incidents involving paramilitary groups closely in recent months. Officials are disseminating state-by-state information to hundreds of federal field offices, sources said.

Federal officials believe some militias are monitoring them as well, tapping in to radio frequencies to track conversations among agents of the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms and to alert members to potential raids, according to federal authorities.

Some militias may also be aided by law enforcement officers, federal officials fear. In early April, federal authorities in Texas confirmed that local law enforcement officers themselves were involved with militia groups, according to law enforcement sources.

In Salmon, Idaho last month, three U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service agents sought to serve a federal search warrant at a ranch where someone had killed a federally protected Canadian gray wolf.

When the agents refused to leave the ranch at the request of the local sheriff and a rancher, the pair sped off. The agents then asked the rancher's brother-in-law where the men were going, and he replied, "probably to get the militia," recalled special agent Paul Weyland.

Fearing a gun battle, Weyland said he and two fellow agents left the scene, and they have yet to return to finish executing the warrant.

Sheriff Brett Barsalou says that he actually left the scene to call the governor and a congressman about the incident, to which he later testified at a Washington hearing.

"At the time, the agents didn't perceive the way the populace of Central Idaho viewed them," the sheriff said. "The perception is that the people had had enough of the federal government as a whole."

And in central California, federal law enforcement sources say militia members and supporters include local police and sheriffs and county supervisors.

A series of confrontations in the months before the Oklahoma bombing have been reviewed by federal investigators officials as part of an effort to gauge the ongoing threat of violence. In the sniping incident last September, a man with ties to white supremacist and paramilitary groups is suspected of shooting a Missouri state trooper as he sat watching television in his living room.

Missouri authorities say they believe cooper Bobby Harper was shot by Witt Spring, Ark., resident Timothy Coombs, 35, simply because Harper was among the officers who had arrested an associate of the suspect on charges of carrying a concealed weapon and evading arrest.

Authorities believe Coombs, who remains at large, received sniper training from a militia organization, said Missouri Highway Patrol Investigator Miles Parks. Coombs, he added, is believed to be in hiding with colleagues in the militia movement.

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — The pace of work in the ruins of the federal building accelerated Thursday, as crews burrowed through the remains of a day-care center toward a Social Security office thought to hold many victims.

The pile of rubble in front of the Alfred P. Murrah building has been reduced from three stories to one. Officials considered releasing two search-and-rescue teams from out of town without calling in replacements.

"It seems to be going faster the lower we go," said Fire Chief Gary Marrs.

The effort has passed a dubious milestone: More people have been found dead than are believed missing in the blast of a terrorist bomb April 19.

The death toll reached 110, including 15 children, while the official count of the missing stood at 97, including five children.

Those who live and work downtown were beginning to inch toward normal. Some businesses around the blast site have reopened — some with plywood instead of windows.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency began setting up a service center where individuals and businesses can apply for recovery grants and loans. The center, in an old department store building, was expected to open by 9 a.m. Saturday, said Buddy Young, FEMA regional director.

A total of 312 buildings had at least minor damage in the blast. Of them, 25 have structural damage and 10 collapsed, said Public Works

Director Paul Brum.

In "the pit" at the center of the federal building, workers picked through pulverized concrete and twisted steel, carrying debris away by hand. They were in what used to be the second and third floors, Hansen said, and trying to reach an area where the Social Security office is believed to be.

America's Kids day care center was on the second floor and the Social Security office was on the first.

Work speeded up for a variety of reasons, Hansen said.

Wet or windy weather, which made life miserable for workers and threatened to dislodge tottering debris, gave way to sunny skies Thursday. And after days of work to shore up shaky buildings with 4-by-4

timbers and steel beams, the patch-work protective structures were largely in place so workers could concentrate on hauling debris.

"We still have a lot of small debris to work through. This could very well last throughout the weekend," said Fire Department spokesman Jon Hansen.

The effort was expected to last another week, said Ray Blakeney, a spokesman for the state Medical Examiner's Office.

About 200 workers were on the job, half from the city Fire Department and half in out-of-town crews of about 50 members each that were organized by FEMA. Six such teams are in town; officials were considering sending two of them home without calling in replacement teams, Hansen said.

1 week later, count of missing remains difficult

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — The figure from the medical examiner's office seemed so precise: 97 people missing in the federal building bloodbath.

But this is a number that changes, and changes again.

It was 300 the day of the bombing and 150 over the weekend. By Tuesday, local officials raised their estimate from 100 to 137. But on Thursday, it was lowered to 97, with no large increase in the number of confirmed dead.

The shifting estimates, said the medical examiner's chief of operations, Ray Blakeney, are the result of shifting reports — calls from people notifying his office of someone located safely or, less frequently now, of someone just reported missing.

"In some early instances, we had six or seven reports on the same person," Blakeney said. "But through constant checking, we've winnowed that down."

Three people — two women and a 4½-year-old girl — were not added to the missing list until a full week after the bombing.

The only relative who could have reported their absence was hospitalized in a psychiatric ward, traumatized by the horror she felt when she went to look for her sister, daughter and granddaughter, said Dave Demuth, a medical examiner's assistant.

More than 500 people worked in the nine-story Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building, where a Social Security office, a day care center and a credit union were located.

No one knows for certain how many others may have been taking a morning stroll, running errands or arriving to do business there when the bomb exploded at 9:02 a.m. April 19.

Blakeney said his office expects to identify all of the dead; but Demuth worried that some of the missing may never be found.

"I just think with the nature of the explosion ... anyone standing in close proximity may not be there," Demuth said.

ing in a 24-hour operation, sometimes going out to knock on doors to track the missing.

Some have been found in hospitals, shelters or friends' homes. "A lot of times people just leave the area (afterward). They're confused," she said.

Within hours of escaping the devastated building, HUD employees began a non-stop "phone tree" that gave them a good estimate of how many people in their office had not escaped.

"It was a pretty close office," said

Jack Flynn, a HUD spokesman in Washington. Of 124 workers, 89 have been accounted for, 13 have been confirmed dead and 22 are still missing.

Still, there are those who cling to the remote hope that some among the missing could be alive.

"In my heart I hold out hope, but in my head I know that it would be almost impossible," said Jennifer Boles. Her husband, James Boles, worked in the veterinary services division of the Department of Agriculture.

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Children caught in bombing, parents deal with the pain

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — This is the pain of the children of the bombing.

Five-year-old Christopher Nguyen lies semiconscious in his hospital bed. His ribs are bruised and burned, covered with ointment. His eyes are scratched and badly swollen.

Machines are pumping morphine for the pain, antibiotics for infections and food for nourishment through tubes invading his 44-pound body. His legs and arms are strapped to the bed so he cannot thrash around or scratch himself.

He alternately cries and yawns. "Open your eyes and look," his mother, Phuong, pleads. "Your Power Ranger toys are here."

He has two constant companions: the pain, and his mother. The pain makes him cry again. His mother holds his little hand, rubs his belly and wipes his face. He seems to know that his favorite person is by his side.

"It's OK. It's OK," she says softly. "Mom will scratch for you. Is that better?"

He does not answer.

A week ago, Christopher survived the terrorist bombing at the federal building. Twenty years ago, his father, Thu Nguyen, 40, survived the end of the Vietnam War. An officer in the U.S.-backed South Vietnamese regime, he fled the country on April 30, 1975, the day Saigon fell to the North Vietnamese.

He met his wife in the United States, and it was here that they had their children, Christopher and his brothers Steve, 14, and John, 11.

In Vietnam, Nguyen said, where two million civilians died in a war without front lines, where terrorism and bombs were weapons, casualties were expected. But the terrorist bombing came so unexpectedly, so suddenly, and struck children far removed from any war.

"It's just heartbreaking that someone could do that to children," said Nguyen. "I can't even stand the children getting a little bleeding in the hand."

Jack Lowrey, a spokesman for Children's Hospital, said Christopher

is in fair condition with multiple bruises of the brain, severe cuts of his head and some possible bruises of his heart and lungs.

Four other children injured in the bombing remain hospitalized in Children's Hospital, two in critical condition, one serious and another fair. Fourteen children are among those listed as dead so far; most had been in the building's day care center.

More than two dozen stuffed animals and balloons sent from churches and civic groups around the country surround Christopher. A banner hung across his wall proclaims: "Christopher, Hope You Are Feeling Much Better."

Christopher had been attending the day care center for about a year and a half. As he always did, his father hugged him when he dropped him off the day of the bombing. Christopher promised to be a good boy. Dad promised a treat when he picked him up, perhaps pizza.

Nguyen believes his son's habit of playing with water saved his life. When the 4,800-pound bomb went off, the boy was in the bathroom on the second floor of the day care center, playing in a sink or fountain,

Nguyen said. "That's why he wasn't blown away by the blast," he said.

Nguyen heard the news of the explosion from a colleague as he came out of a meeting at York International Corp. in Norman, where he is a design drafter. Fear gripped him as a colleague drove him the 25 miles to Oklahoma City.

His wife, who worked downtown, arrived at the federal building about 10 minutes after the explosion.

"There she found Christopher," Nguyen recalled. "He was the third one brought out by the firemen."

The father found Christopher at the hospital about noon.

"No word can describe this very joy," the realization that Christopher was alive, he said. "We couldn't recognize him. There was not much we could do except pray and wait." Christopher hasn't spoken since he was hurt. "His favorite person at home is Mom," said Nguyen. "I think I heard him say Mommy yesterday and I hope what I hear is true."

Experts say teach kids to talk about tragedy

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — In Mrs. Hairston's third-grade class at Grover Cleveland Elementary, the children stood and bowed their heads for Wednesday's moment of silence.

Then, they sat down cross-legged in a circle, held hands and shared their perceptions of the bombing.

In Mrs. Parker's first-grade class, the students showed a handmade book that included a story printed on triple-lined children's writing paper: "There were babys in their. Why would they want to do that. It is not cool."

In Mrs. Barker's third-grade classroom, the 8-year-olds scooted around the floor, fingerpainting a sign to hang out their window thanking rescue workers.

Jessie Elaine "Jett" Turner showed the card she made. "I hope you find some alive people in there," it said.

She recounted how she had waited anxiously for hours one week ago, worrying about her parents. Dad is a federal epidemiologist, Mom a Postal Service employee and neither worked in the bombed building. But until a few months ago, they used the building's day-care center for her 2-year-old brother, Sean.

Her blue eyes blinked quickly and her voice quivered. "I'm afraid the

men are going to escape and try to bomb some more government people," she confided.

The worst terrorist bombing in U.S. history struck a blow to the innocence of the children of Oklahoma City.

It seems nearly everyone, at Cleveland Elementary was impacted in some way,

either by the death of a next-door neighbor, a missing relative, or a close call for a parent who was nearby.

"They haven't been hardened to life like some of us," said Cleveland Elementary principal Marilyn Davis, who called a schoolwide assembly the morning after the bombing.

In helping children cope with trauma, mental health experts advise that, in addition to reassuring them, it's important to encourage them to talk about the event, to express their feelings, to ask questions and do things that enable them to feel they are helping.

So ever since last Wednesday,

there have been discussion and drawing sessions, poetry and journal-writing exercises, and projects making cards for workers and the injured. An army of mental-health counselors also has provided services.

Schools use a variety of activities. Making the rounds is a song called

"Come Up Strong!" written by teacher D.W. Williams, three ninth-graders at Classen School of Advanced Studies and her son, a second-grader at Sequoyah Elementary.

At Mayfield Middle School, proceeds from the sale of Earth Day T-shirts will go to the family of a seventh-grader whose mother was killed.

And at Western Heights High School, where two coaches lost

fathers-in-law in the office building, some of the students have been volunteering at Feed The Children and other charities. Staff and students are collecting money and goods to donate to the relief effort.

In Mrs. Hairston's third-grade class Wednesday, the discussion

focused on the investigation. "Some people think that either bad guys got blown up inside the bomb," said Allison.

In the book put together by Mrs. Parker's first-grade class, Anthony's drawing showed a view from the top of the building, with sets of legs sticking out below.

Several children sketched vividly colored scenes of broken glass, smoke and wreckage, with words such as "BOOM!" and "Help!" And Faith drew a rescue scene depicting a firefighter cradling a baby in his arms, echoing the pictured featured on the front of newspapers and magazines everywhere.

Talking about her drawing, Faith said, "I feel very, very, very sad."

Do we need more laws to stop terrorism?

One of the wisest maxims of students of court decisions is that "hard cases make bad law," meaning that particularly troublesome cases with unique circumstances seldom provide reliable or useful precedents for more ordinary cases.

Similarly, crises seldom offer the most deliberative atmosphere in which to write new legislation purportedly designed to avert future crises. Time and psychological distance are often needed before a legislative response to a crisis is desirable — if indeed new laws are appropriate.

In the wake of the bombing of the federal building in Oklahoma City, some legislators plan to put "anti-terrorist" legislation previously offered by the Clinton administration on a legislative fast track. And the president has offered some ideas for new powers to be granted to the FBI and other federal law-enforcement agencies to investigate potentially dangerous citizens' groups.

The bill already proposed would create the new federal crime of international terrorist activity within the United States and allow the government to use classified information to speed up the deportation of suspected members of terrorist groups without revealing that information in full to the accused terrorists or their attorneys.

The proposal would allow the president to designate certain foreign organizations as terrorist groups and prohibit U.S. citizens from donating to them — unless they get a "license" allowing the government continuous access to all their books and records. (We'll, ahem, let pass that recent White House reception for Sinn Fein spokesman Gerry Adams, surely the moral equivalent of the Oklahoma bombers.) It would extend the RICO (Racketeer-Influenced Corrupt Organizations) Act and money-laundering laws to cover designated terrorist groups.

has also talked, without translating his ideas into specific legislation or executive orders, about creating a new counter-terrorism center within the federal government and altering current guidelines to give the FBI more leeway to investigate and infiltrate suspect groups before they commit crimes or acts of violence. He has talked about giving federal agencies more access to hotel and motel registers and credit-card records to track suspected terrorists, along with more power to monitor telephones.

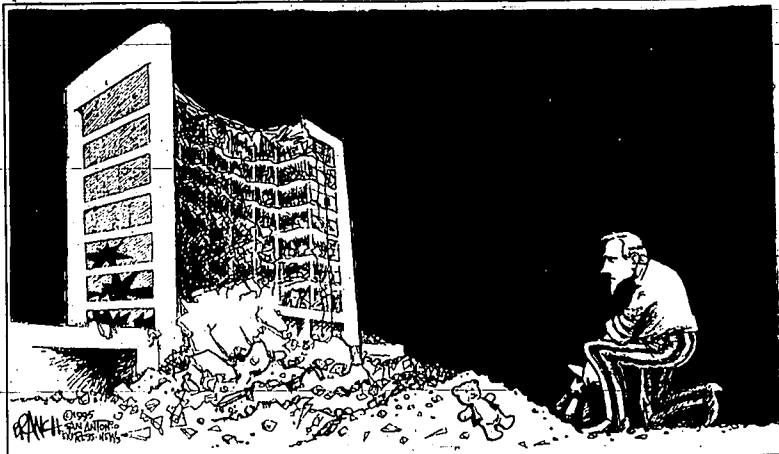
Many of these proposals are troubling. The FBI and other federal agencies abused such powers on a massive basis during the Vietnam War and during other periods of the "Cold War" — creating massive files on groups and individuals who had broken no laws and sometimes sending provocateurs into organizations to urge violent activities to create a pretext for a crackdown. That's why, after extensive investigations, the current guidelines were put in place in the early 1970s.

The RICO act has already been widely abused and has hardly ever been employed against a genuine racketeer. Money-laundering statutes needlessly invade the privacy of many perfectly innocent citizens.

Furthermore, there is no guarantee — perhaps not even a strong likelihood — that such intrusive measures would prevent something like the Oklahoma City bombing. Would credit-card checks have caught a Timothy McVeigh in advance? If the bombing was the work of a "renegade" faction, would even close infiltration and surveillance have discovered the plot?

The federal government has the power now to infiltrate and investigate groups if there is a "reasonable indication" they seek to accomplish their goals through violence or criminal acts. We should think long and hard before granting it any more than that.

Forget blame — improve political climate

Listening to citizen militia leaders around the nation these days does remind one of Pontius Pilate. Lot of washing of hands going on.

Enough of blame. What can we do to make this political climate better, less hateful? President Clinton urges us to speak out against the haters. Rush Limbaugh immediately claimed this would have a chilling effect on conservatives.

The old chilling effect is a familiar phenomenon to all us veterans of past First Amendment battles. Note the reaction of our true civil libertarians: Morris Dees of the Southern Poverty Law Center (whose office has been bombed by right-wingers already), the American Civil Liberties Union and others.

Immediate defense of freedom of speech and immediate skepticism about proposed new powers for the Fbies and other law enforcement agencies to go after our native fascists. Makes me proud to be a liberal.

But just because I will defend to the death your right to say it doesn't mean I can't also point out that what you are saying is vicious nonsense.

One reason we all need to be skeptical about new powers for law enforcement — easier wiretapping laws, more infiltration, etc. — is because of past experience.

In particular, the FBI's history of infiltration of the Ku Klux Klan is blotted with case after case of FBI informants who also turned out to be agents provocateurs, people who actually incited violence. This has led to some horrible entrapment cases.

Everyone says, "Well, it's no longer J. Edgar Hoover's FBI." The post-Hoover FBI didn't show much concern for civil liberties at Mount Carmel. It did, however, have the courage and the good sense to write an honest and self-critical report about its mistakes

with the Branch Davidians, unlike the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

We can also speak out against the citizen militias. In my home state of Texas, we have two of them: the Texas Constitutional Militia (an excess of irony there) and the Lone Star Militia. Just what does these folks think the utility is in arming themselves and their families and playing war games in the woods? To what end? The batty videotapes that these folks share and send around the country are exercises in pure paranoia.

We can also demand that our politicians quit blaming and pointing fingers and start concentrating on how to make this country better. We can have plenty of disagreements over how to reform welfare, for example, without anyone accusing President Clinton of treason.

I think it would also help if we quit cheering when politicians lie to us. It does encourage them. For example, when one of them claims, as Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole did in his presidential announcement speech, "We can cut taxes and balance the budget," try to restrain yourself. Just because it sounds good doesn't mean it's true.

I also think we need to go back to the basics of political reform. One terrible irony of the much ballyhooed "Republican Revolution" is that it has actually aggravated our central political problem: the influence of moneyed special interests.

The omnipresence of corporate lobbyists

was sickening enough when the Democrats ran Congress, who knew it could get worse? Under the Republicans, we find lobbyists for major polluters actually writing environmental legislation and corporate lobbyists literally writing their own exemptions into tax legislation.

We must change the way campaigns are financed. The way it is now, politicians get elected owing every organized special interest imaginable and owing nothing to average citizens.

One result of government of corporate special interests, by corporate special interests and for corporate special interests is that a whole huge class of citizens is getting shortchanged. And an awful lot of them are angry white guys.

Conversation with a cab driver in Kansas City:

"They, I was down there in Texas back in the early '80s. Worked the oilfields in Midland-Odessa. When the crash came, they kept me on for a while. We had 700 guys with our company, and they was down to 150 before they fired me. I went down there after the freight company I was workin' for in K.C. went bust — deregulation just killed us. A lot of companies went under with deregulation."

"After Texas, I moved back up here and got a job hauling freight. Long hauls. But that went under too, so now I'm drivin' a cab. Yeah, I been kicked around by this economy pretty good."

"You see that building going up on that hill? I'll say they're mansions. They start at \$400,000. Imagine that."

Waste lagoons more offensive

I am writing to respond to some of the letters about the H&H Dairy of Hank Hagfliger. The smell of manure silage, haylage and other feed products is not a bothersome odor to me; however, the smell of wastewater being flushed down alleyways to remove the waste of several thousand cows and calves, which water is pumped into approximately 17 acres of waste lagoons and used over and over, causes a nauseating odor that I personally would liken to open sewer gases. The waste lagoons are located to the most eastern part of the dairy's property.

The proximity of a person's residence to the commodity shed, the 17 acres of waste lagoons and the corals determines how much odor, noise, dust and flies that one must endure. In the evenings, winds are usually calmer and cooler and the cooler breeze carries the odor from the waste lagoons to the west and north, affecting some residents in this area.

The 17 acres of waste lagoons are located approximately 17 feet from some neighboring property lines. Due to that location, they have caused many problems over the past few years, including blowing dirt, blowing foam and liquid. If the planning and zoning regulations were effective, when the waste lagoons were constructed, the waste lagoons would have been constructed 175 feet from neighboring property lines. This would have given us a buffer

zone which would have solved some of the problems we have experienced.

Let's leave ourselves some room for human error, future modification and Mother Nature when we construct waste lagoons. I hope that the county commissioners and planning and zoning will set some regulations that will protect everyone's right to do business and to live in harmony. South Africans march on 1st year of democracy

PRETORIA, South Africa (AP) — A massive march by Zulu nationalists demanding regional autonomy marked Thursday's celebration of South Africa's first anniversary of freedom from apartheid.

Four people were killed and four were wounded in separate incidents at Umlazi in KwaZulu-Natal province, police said. One of the shootings took place from a train carrying mariners home, and a police car also came under fire from a train. The identity of the victims was not immediately known.

The shootings followed a march by 20,000 supporters of the Inkatha Freedom Party, who carried traditional shields, clubs and whips through the streets of Durban, the troubled province's biggest city. Minor vandalism in parked cars was reported.

The marchers were protesting the government's failure to submit Inkatha's demands for autonomy for KwaZulu-Natal province to international mediation.

The violence — small by the standards of years past — contrasted with a sunny, carnival mood throughout the rest of South Africa that was a measure of the dramatic change that has swept the nation since Nelson Mandela was elected president.

Most South Africans stayed at home or took advantage of the long holiday weekend to travel. In Pretoria, where Mandela gave a speech, 18-year-old white student Gideon Gurschl said that a new spirit of friendship and hope had replaced tension and uncertainty.

"There's still hatred, but it's going

to equality, from a history of oppression to a future of freedom, it is 27 April 1994," a beaming Mandela told the crowd.

One year ago, South Africa was reeling from a white extremist bombing campaign and bracing for the next outbreak of black-on-black political violence, even as voters streamed to the polls.

In the year since, white rightists have been subdued and some have even embraced the new government. An uneasy truce has also been struck between Mandela's African National Congress and its main black rival, the Zulu nationalist Inkatha Freedom Party.

Among Mandela's achievements is an ambitious program to improve the lives of the impoverished black majority. His government has offered free school lunches for children, checkups for pregnant mothers, and has brought electricity and running water to hundreds of homes.

But perhaps the greatest change is the new spirit of reconciliation.

"Last year, there was a great change," said Sweto school teacher Gertrude Jiane. "Each and every body accepts each other now. We are no more afraid."

Mary Tseletsele, a kitchen worker carrying her 4-year-old daughter on her shoulders, said her black township near Pretoria had been without electricity until the new government launched the utility project.

"I'm waiting for them to build houses, as many as possible," he said. "But it will take a long time, because this country is big and the people are many."

Gas pipeline explodes in Russia; points to an aging energy system

MOSCOW (AP) — A major gas pipeline blew up in a remote wooded region in the Russian far north on Thursday, belching a huge pillar of flames skyward in the latest breakdown in Russia's delaying oil and gas network.

No injuries were reported in the explosion, which scorched an estimated 12 acres of thick forest in the same Komi republic where a massive oil spill from leaking pipes occurred last year.

A Japan Air Lines pilot and his passengers spotted the huge fireball as they passed over the area en route to Tokyo from Frankfurt, Germany. "It was as if the sun was climbing upward," one passenger said.

Russian officials, who in the past have tried to cover up such accidents, downplayed the blast.

A spokesman for Gazprom, the state gas monopoly, rejected the pilot's description of a fireball five miles high and said it reached no more than 60 feet.

But an employee for Severgazprom, the Gazprom unit that operates the



pipeline, described a big explosion. "Everything shook," Lyudmila Nikitseva, a duty officer at Severgazprom, told The Associated Press by telephone. "Then we saw a great fire against the dark sky. It was terrible."

Windows shook in Ukhita, 10 miles north of the blast, and frightened residents rushed into the streets when they heard the explosion shortly after 2 a.m.

Akira Yamakawa, the JAL pilot, diverted the 747-400 airliner away from the fireball.

"I saw a red burning cloud below at one moment and then it became black. That was repeated again and again," he said. "We didn't know what was happening. We felt very uneasy."

The explosion left a crater 16 feet deep and 50 feet wide, Russian television said.

The accident refocused attention on the problems of the aging former Soviet energy complex. Severgazprom said the pipeline was 15 years old and may have been unable to withstand the gas flow pressure.

"The whole infrastructure of pipelines in Russia is very old and bad," said Eduard Gimatullin, who works for the environmental group Greenpeace in Moscow. "Nobody paid much attention to them in Soviet times. Now they just don't have the money or equipment to maintain them properly."

Murder-euthanasia case dismissed

ALKMAAR, Netherlands (AP) — A court refused to punish a Dutch doctor who killed a severely deformed newborn in a decision bound to stretch the limits of the Netherlands' liberal euthanasia policy.

The District Court in this northern city said that despite the evidence, Dr. Henk Prins acted to spare the 3-day-old girl from what he said was unbearable, incurable pain.

"The court has come to the decision not to declare the defendant punishable and to discharge him from prosecution,"

the three-judge panel said Wednesday.

Rianne Quirine Kunst was born in 1993, suffering from hydrocephaly, spina bifida and leg deformities. Prins testified that the baby girl screamed whenever she was touched and that no medical treatment could have kept her alive more than a few overwhelming painful months.

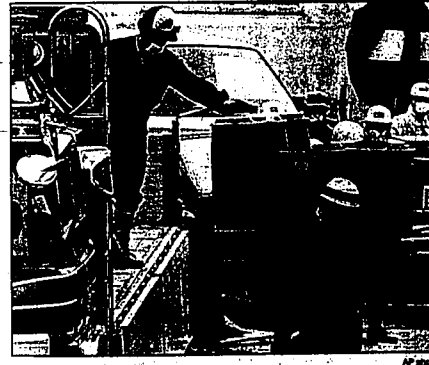
After consulting with several specialists who supported his diagnosis and getting the approval of her parents, he injected her with a sleep-inducing drug and a muscle paralyz-

er that stopped her breathing. Rianne died in her mother's arms 15 minutes later, Prins said.

"The verdict gave me hope ... I am very relieved," Prins said at a press conference.

"I feel the court has done me justice, and the verdict is a positive step for doctors," the 49-year-old gynecologist said.

Euthanasia is illegal in the Netherlands and punishable by up to 12 years in prison, but has widespread public support.

Police raid cult site; leader eludes them

KAMIKUIISHIKI, Japan (AP) — Hundreds of police swarmed over a cult commune Thursday, hoping to find a trap door that would lead them to the guru of the sect, which is suspected in the lethal gas attack on Tokyo's subways.

Shoko Asahara, self-proclaimed messiah and founder of the Aum Shinri Kyo (Supreme Truth) cult, has been in hiding since the March 20 attack killed 12 commuters and sickened 5,500.

The investigation into the subway gassing took a surprise turn Wednesday, when police captured two of the doomsday cult's main scientists — a chemist and a biologist — in a secret basement beneath a cult dormitory.

As police resumed their search Thursday, they hoped to find Asahara in a similar hiding place in one of the commune's dozens or so main buildings. But police, aided by a wheeled device that checks for hollow ground, turned up nothing and they began leaving at sunset, planning to try again Friday.

Leaders of the cult have repeatedly denied any connection with the attack. But daily raids at the cult's commune in Kamikuiishiki, the foot of Mount Fuji, have turned up tons of chemicals that could have

been used to make sarin, the nerve gas released on the subways.

A trap door in a basement floor led police on Wednesday to the underground hideout of Masami Tsuchiya, the man in charge of the cult's extensive experiments with chemicals and its research into sarin, and Seiichi Endo, a former viral and genetics researcher.

A villager who lives near the commune, Seiichi Takeuchi, said he had seen cult members digging underground shelters "all over the place."

The commune has been searched daily by police and has been under constant surveillance by anti-Aum villagers since the attack.

More than 100 Aum followers and most of its top leaders have been arrested since the subway killings.

All have been taken into custody on unrelated charges, however, and police hope the two scientists arrested Wednesday will provide them with a direct link between the cult and the killings. But Japanese media reported Thursday that Tsuchiya would not answer police questions related to the cult.

With most of the cult leaders in custody, the focus of attention has moved to Asahara.

Florida, Illinois scientists receive Japan Prize

TOKYO (AP) — Two American scientists who developed light-emitting diodes and biological ways of eliminating insect pests received the 1995 Japan Prize Thursday in ceremonies attended by the emperor.

Nick Holonyak Jr., 66, a professor at the University of Illinois, and Edward Fred Knippling, 85, professor emeritus at Florida State University, each received \$588,000.

Holonyak won the prize for inventing the first practical light-emitting diode in the early 1960s and for his later work on semiconductor lasers.

LEDs are a type of semiconductor now widely used in electronic displays, while semiconductor lasers are used for such things as compact disc players.

Knippling was honored for having developed the use of sterile insects to fight insect pests.

He attained great success in eradicating the screw worm fly, a serious and sometimes fatal pest of livestock in the southwestern United States.

The Japan Prize, often referred to as Japan's Nobel Prize, was created in 1983 with the endorsement of Japan's Cabinet.

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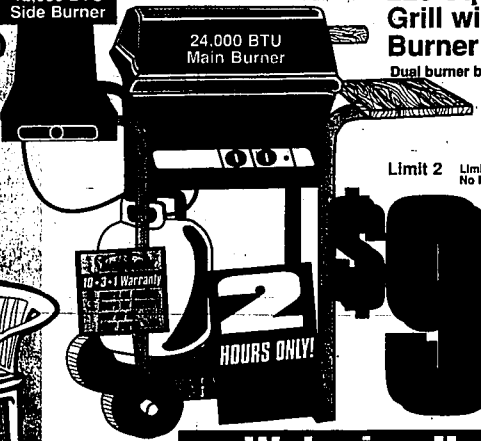
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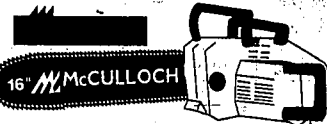

Fire-starting coroner cleared of negligence

BOISE - The Idaho Court of Appeals agrees with a district judge that negligence was not proven against former Twin Falls County Coroner Calvin Edwards in a 1990 range fire south of Twin Falls.

The fire burned several thousand acres and destroyed fences. Western Stockgrowers Association filed a lawsuit against Edwards and his wife, Kagla, alleging that he negligently caused the fire.

Edwards acknowledged that he or his vehicle might have started the fire, but denied that negligence was involved.

In a unanimous decision released Thursday, the Court of Appeals upheld District Judge Roger Burdick's ruling against the case. After the association presented its witnesses, Burdick granted Edwards' motion for a directed verdict.

In an opinion written by Judge Darrell Perry, the Court of Appeals agreed with Burdick that although Edwards admitted he started the fire, there was no proof that he was negligent.

Edwards' cross-appeal, asking attorney fees, also was rejected.

State schools receive grants from US West for technology

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Redfish will soon get red fish

STANLEY - Scientists will try to put the red fish back in Redfish Lake this spring, but it won't be easy.

Even if they perfect their technique, local officials aren't thrilled with plans to kill off existing kokanee to make way for sockeye.

The lake, a favorite of campers at the headwaters of the Salmon River near Stanley, is the historic home of the Snake River's only run of sockeye salmon, now nearly extinct.

Idaho Fish and Game plans to stock it with 100,000 wild sockeye fry raised in captivity. Next spring, when they are about four inches long, most of the sockeye are expected to migrate to the ocean.

The fish are protected by the Endangered Species Act and the National Marine Fisheries Service is the federal agency charged with their recovery.

Before releasing the fish, scientists have to prepare the lake. That means fertilizing the lake so it will grow more plankton to feed young sockeye, and weeding out competition from other fish. Fish and Game fisheries chief Steve Huffaker told Custer County commissioners.

It is risky. If the lake's food base collapses, it will take years to revegetate the lake, said biologists.

Kokanee will be trapped before the small fry move into the lake.

Custer County commissioners were skeptical of the need for trapping.

"Let's go back to years ago when the lake was full of sockeye and kokanee and trout and trash fish," said Chairman Cliff Hansen. "How come there's not enough food in the lake to support these fish now?"

Biologists said with few sockeye around and little pressure from anglers, kokanee have flourished. Food reserves have dwindled without the decayed carcasses of sockeye adults to provide fertilizer.

Before eight hydroelectric dams on the Columbia and Snake rivers blocked their 900-mile passage to and from the Pacific Ocean, thousands of sockeye spawned each year, then died.

Their bodies, carrying rich nutrients from the ocean, rotted in the lake, providing fertilizer for the underwater vegetation and other life that would feed the next generation.

After hatching, sockeye live and grow in the lake one or two years before swimming to

the ocean. There they stay, feeding in the Pacific one to three years before returning to their birthplace.

Some sockeye, called residual or resident sockeye, stay at the lake. Scientists believe an abundance of good food in the lake is why.

Some scientists believe kokanee could be the salvation of the sockeye because they are genetically similar. The theory is that kokanee could somehow be transformed into sea-run fish.

Most scientists scoff at the idea, but Fish and Game is looking at it. Still, the department is putting its money on safer bets.

No one seemed to want kokanee killed. Stanley businessmen and Fish and Game want anglers to catch the bigger kokanee already living in the lake.

Commissioners want the fish moved to Yellow Belly Lake in the Stanley Basin. Fish and Game will keep the trapped fish until someone makes a decision.

Custer County officials say the problem is dams.

"Why are we spending so much money on this up here when the problem is downstream with the dams?" Hansen asked. "It doesn't make any sense."

Murtaugh could have new school in 18 months

MURTAUGH - The community's new high school building could be built within 18 months - about half the time it took voters in the school district to agree to pay for it.

Murtaugh voters narrowly approved a \$1.85 million bond issue proposal Tuesday. It includes tearing down the old high school building, and closing a city street, to build a 29,000-square-foot facility to house the district's 170 students, grades six through 12.

"Construction will probably start next spring," Murtaugh Superintendent Mike Chesley said Thursday.

The board plans to ask the city of Murtaugh to vacate a half-block section of Fifth Street, which bisects school district property, Chesley said.

main wing of the proposed building could be built from the corner of Fourth and Boyd, over the school's tennis courts and Fifth Street, to the end of the football field, he said.

During construction of the first wing, Chesley said, students would continue to use the old school building, which parallels Fourth Street.

When the main wing is complete, he said, the students would be moved into the finished section, and the old building - built sometime around 1917 - would be demolished and replaced by a second wing for the administration.

Chesley says the project could be completed sometime in the fall of 1996.

Bond elections in 1992 and 1993 failed. A consolidation effort in 1994 also failed. In a third bond election in 1994, the bond issue's approval rate climbed to 60 percent - still short of the two-thirds required for passage.

At Tuesday's election, with voter turnout was the lowest of the last three elections, the final tally came to rest six votes over what was needed to approve the plan.

"I still can't believe it passed," Chesley said. The reason the bond issue passed this time around is most likely financial, he said.

This bond issue proposal was less expensive than any of the three previous plans, he said. Though similar to the \$2.3 million plan rejected by voters last July, the School Board was able to trim more than \$400,000 off the cost of the plan by cutting a new gymnasium from the proposal.

But the biggest incentive to pass the bond issue was the School Board's promise to eliminate a \$76,000 annual levy, which will offset nearly half of the district's \$157,000 annual bond obligation.

Home sees 3rd lawsuit charging harassment

TWIN FALLS - A third former employee of Mountain View Care Center in Kimberly is alleging she was illegally fired by the former administrator after complaining of sexual harassment.

In a lawsuit, Terri Greene of Twin Falls County alleges she completed in March 1993 about being sexually harassed by then Administrator James Mariot Cox, who was employed at the Kimberly nursing home about nine months. Cox related by yelling at and criticizing Greene and arbitrarily changing her routine the suit says.

On May 24, 1993, Greene submitted her two-week resignation notice because she couldn't take such retaliatory treatment any longer," the lawsuit says. On May 26, however, Cox advised Greene, who also had seen Cox harass other female employees, the lawsuit says.

Cox, nursing home owners Mountain View Associates and nursing home management company Diversified Health Services are among defendants named in the lawsuit filed this week in 5th District Court. The nursing home itself was not named as a defendant in Greene's lawsuit. Greene said the nursing home has "resolved their differences," the lawsuit says.

The lawsuit says the defendants knew or should have known Cox sexually harassed female workers, and they negligently entrusted Cox with a management position.

Cox was hired in February 1993 to help clean up operations at Mountain View. During a period of about a year, said plaintiffs had found dozens of problems with the way the nursing home was operated; morphine had been found missing from a cabinet, and the care center's director and nursing director had been fired.

But Cox was reemployed as the nursing home's administrator in October 1993, according to the first lawsuit.

The first case was filed in September by Lois Stuart of Twin Falls, who filed suit verbally and physically harassed her sexually shortly after he was hired. Stuart described Cox's behavior to an Idaho Human Rights Commission investigator looking into Greene's claim, and Stuart was fired in October 1993 for alleged misconduct, according to the lawsuit.

In March, Rebecca Born of Twin Falls filed a lawsuit alleging she was sexually harassed by Cox while working at the nursing home. She also had been sexually harassed by a co-worker. The co-worker was suspended and then fired, Born's lawsuit says.

Final dates have not been set for Stuart's or Born's cases.

Mark Flynn, Diversified Health Services attorney, said Thursday he has not seen a copy of Greene's lawsuit. Assuming there was a violation in Mountain View Care Center, he said, he would file a lawsuit on her behalf. "Greene's attorney, Monte B. Carlson of Crabtree & Carlson in Twin Falls, said Thursday he does not want to comment yet on his client's case.

Greene's lawsuit mentions no specific dollar amount. It does seek "actual damages" for lost wages and benefits; compensation for emotional distress; and punitive damages as the amount of damages. "I can sue and sue my boss. The lawsuit also asks for the right to seek "punitive damages."

City still working on road decision

TWIN FALLS - The city won't decide what to do to improve traffic at the north end of town until after casino mogul Cras Nielsen's own traffic engineer has a chance to study the area.

The next meeting on the matter will be held May 17.

Kathleen Kruger, an engineer with the Denver firm of Kruger and Assoc., told the City Council Thursday that she had been hired by Nielsen to figure out how different traffic patterns would affect his plans for land he owns south of the Perrine Bridge.

He plans a hotel, restaurants and stores. Kruger said she studied Twin Falls traffic for the last year when Nielsen had bought about 200 acres there in Twin Falls in 1991.

Recent and projected developments are straining the city's existing road system that shuttles motorists along Blue Lakes Boulevard and Pole Line Road.

The city has suggested turning Blue Lakes Boulevard north of Pole Line into a one-way, northbound route. Southbound traffic would use a new road west of Blue Lakes.

Other options include median barriers, roundabouts, and other traffic control measures. (AP) (Times-News)

Teen escapees charged in Forest Service death

WEISER (AP) — Two teenage boys who walked away from juvenile custody in Mountain Home were charged Thursday with murdering a Forest Service employee in western Idaho's Payette National Forest.

But a U.S. Justice Department spokesman said it did not appear the Oregon man's slaying was a case of anti-government violence.

David Jack Wheeler, 49, of Baker City, Ore., was shot to death Wednesday while working one of the Mann Creek Guard Station about 15 miles north of Weiser.

Weiser District Ranger John Baglien said Wheeler was an engineer on temporary assignment inspecting bridges in the Idaho Forest. He was sitting in a green Forest Service vehicle and wearing chest-

waders and a Forest Service shirt with a gold name-tag when he was killed.

Ronald Stiner, 16, and Eric S. Brown, who turns 18 on Friday, were held without bond Thursday after appearing before Washington County Magistrate Gregory Culet on adult charges of first-degree murder and possession of stolen property. A preliminary hearing was scheduled May 8.

Stiner and Brown were arrested on escape charges Wednesday in Weiser, where Washington County Sheriff Mike Wadley said they were spotted walking after their vehicle apparently became stuck.

Elmore County Sheriff Rick

Layher said Brown and Stiner escaped Wednesday morning from a "non-secure" detention trailer in Mountain Home, about 100 miles southeast of the murder scene. The

trailer is used as temporary housing for juveniles awaiting transfer to a secure detention facility. The teens allegedly stole a pickup

truck near Mountain Home and drove to the Weiser area, Layher said.

Baglien said police found Wheeler's wallet in their possession, and after an hour of interrogation they led officials to the murder scene.

The sheriff said no gun had been recovered and he would not speculate on a motive. But Justice Department spokesman John Russell said it did not appear to be an anti-government crime.

"The motive is believed to be attempted robbery," Russell said from his Washington, D.C., office. "We see it as a local crime and not a crime against the government."

Still, he said FBI agents and

Forest Service officers were helping Washington County with the investigation.

Baglien said Wheeler apparently had either just finished inspecting a bridge that was installed last year or was preparing to inspect it when the teen-agers arrived.

Wheeler had lived in Baker City for more than five years and usually worked in Oregon's Willowa-Whitman National Forest. He is survived by his wife, Kristi; a 12-year-old daughter, Melissa; and a 10-year-old son, Jace.

"Dave was a champion for barrier-free access for recreational and administrative facilities across the forest," Willowa-Whitman supervisor Bob Richmond said. "He strived to be a mentor and counselor to co-workers."

Panel mulls protection of privacy

BOISE (AP) — When state Sen. Sue Reents, D-Boise, served on the Idaho Judicial Council, she says the panel often received allegations of wrongdoing against judges that were unfounded.

She and other members of the Legislative Oversight Committee worried Thursday how to deal with allegations against state employees and agencies that might later prove unfounded.

The bipartisan committee supervises the Office of Performance Evaluations, set up to increase efficiency and effectiveness of state government.

Administrator Nancy Van Maren said she's been fielding tips about possible problems and allegations involving state agencies.

"There are five allegations sitting on my desk that I need to look into and probably three of them are going to go somewhere," she said. Two others appear to be completely unfounded, she said.

Committee members asked what she does with unsigned allegations.

"I take everything seriously," Van Maren said. "If an allegation appears to involve breaking the law, it's immediately referred to the proper authorities."

Cochairman Rep. Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley, said that's the proper approach.

"Our job is to judge efficiency and effectiveness, not whether a law has been broken," Newcomb said.

Committee members agreed once Van Maren has made a preliminary evaluation and closed the file on an allegation or complaint, that fact should be public information.

Endangered species moratorium won't stop bull trout protection

WASHINGTON (AP) — A moratorium on new listings under the Endangered Species Act won't keep the Forest Service from taking steps to protect the bull trout on national forests, Chief Jack Ward Thomas says.

"I think we need to move ahead with something," Thomas told a Senate panel Wednesday. He said his experience with the northern spotted owl convinced him that delaying aid for troubled species is a mistake.

Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, suggested the listings ban, in effect until Sept. 30, might give the Forest Service a reprieve from pressures to assign protection strategies for the fish.

"Given that the reason for the new strategy was to avoid a listing and that we now have a moratorium on listings, wouldn't it be prudent to cancel the bull trout strategy as unnecessary?" Craig asked.

"It might be prudent in the political sense," Thomas said.

"Whether it would be prudent in the biological sense is another question."

Tentative strategies to protect "inland" fish species in the Pacific Northwest and Northern Rocky Mountains, including bull trout and

Western cutthroat trout, are based on concerns raised by biologists at the Fish and Wildlife Service as well as at the Forest Service, Thomas said.

Fish and Wildlife last year ruled that protection of the bull trout under the Endangered Species Act was warranted, but "precluded" because higher priority species were on the waiting list.

Since then the agency has moved the bull trout up near the top of the priority list. It is expected to propose this summer that the fish be declared a threatened or endangered species.

The moratorium on new listings was recently signed into law by President Clinton as part of a supplemental appropriation bill. It does not prohibit proposed listings, which generally precede actual listings by about a year.

Aside from the Endangered Species Act, Thomas said the National Forest Management Act requires that the Forest Service act on the bull trout from going extinct.

"When the Fish and Wildlife Service tells me I have a species for which listing is warranted but precluded, I think we need to do something," Thomas said.

"Delaying response to situations that are leading inexorably to listing, and I think in the bull trout case we've already been told it is warranted, we would be well advised to avoid that listing if we can," he said.

Assistant Interior Secretary George Frampton Jr. defended the Forest Service efforts during the hearing Wednesday before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources subcommittee on forests and public lands.

"It is an example of early coordination, which is what we're trying to do to head off listings," said Frampton, who oversees the National Park Service and the Fish and Wildlife Service. The Forest Service is part of the Department of Agriculture.

Frampton said the Fish and Wildlife Service had delayed action on a listing proposal until June or July, "based largely — and it's no secret — on the hope that state and other programs would be put in place to avoid listing."

"If you can design up-front ways to have long-term stewardship and management programs, then the Fish and Wildlife Service can back off and go away and you can avoid listings," he said.

Felony charge dropped in death of store clerk

POCATELLO (AP) — A charge of being a principal to first-degree murder has been dropped against a Pocatello woman in connection with the April 15 shooting death of a convenience store clerk.

Instead, Kimberly Lynn Reese, 24, pleaded innocent on Thursday to two misdemeanor counts of resisting and obstructing officers. She faces up to one year in prison and a \$1,000 fine on each count if convicted.

Reese had been accused of aiding and abetting David Bosquez, 22, in the slaying of Brett Gilbert, 19. He was found shot to death in a walk-in cooler at a Maverik Country Store in Pocatello.

Bosquez shot himself to death in his car three days later after fleeing from police and driving off the road.

Bannock County Prosecutor Mark Hiedeman said he dropped the felony charge because Bosquez had threatened police before he was killed.

"I don't think she really had a choice at times," Hiedeman said. Reese originally told police she knew nothing about the murder, then admitted hours before Bosquez's death she went to the convenience store with him but did not know he intended to kill Gilbert.

She originally told police Bosquez had gotten rid of the murder weapon, a .22-caliber handgun, but later admitted she hid the gun in her house.

Bannock County Magistrate Lynn Brower accepted Reese's plea Thursday and scheduled a pretrial conference on May 18.

Task force ponders Unabomber clues

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The federal Unabomber task force, buoyed by the addition of new agents with increasing confidence they will catch their man, pored over old and new clues in the 17-year-old case Thursday.

The San Francisco FBI has temporarily reassigned 100 agents to the effort, and FBI Director Louis Freeh has agreed to send 50 agents from around the country on a long-term basis.

Meanwhile, KCBS-TV in Los Angeles reported that the FBI was searching former member James William Kilgore as a possible suspect in the case.

Kilgore was a bomb maker for the SLA, the group responsible for kidnapping Patty Hearst. He went underground in 1975 and was never caught.

Also, investigators of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms were still trying to determine what explosives were used in the device that killed Sacramento timber industry lobbyist Gilbert Murray on Monday.

"From what we can see, it seems the most powerful yet" in the string of 16 bombings since 1978, said Robert C. Barnett, head of ATF in San Francisco.

He said the bomb was encased in a hand-assembled wooden box similar to the bomb that killed New Jersey advertising executive Thomas Mosser in December.

All told, the Unabomber has killed three people and injured 23.

Four of the Unabomb incidents originated or occurred in Utah. The first case was on the University of Utah campus on Oct. 8, 1981. The next year, a bomb was mailed from Brigham Young University to a professor at Vanderbilt University in Nashville, where a secretary was injured while trying to open it.

In 1985, a bomb was mailed from Salt Lake City to the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. A secretary was injured there as well.

On Feb. 20, 1987, a computer-store employee in Salt Lake City was injured while picking up a package near a computer store. In this attack, witnesses saw a suspect in what police believe is the only sighting of the bomber.

FBI agents were visiting machine shops in the San Francisco area Thursday to investigate the possibility that the Unabomber used the facilities to fashion parts of his bombs, according to a task force member, who spoke on the condition of anonymity.

The Postal Inspection Service is trying to pin down where the bomb and four letters mailed with it on April 20 originated. All were apparently sent from Oakland.

That processing center handles 10 million pieces of mail a day from all over the east San Francisco Bay area.

"We're talking to employees to see if any remember the package," said Julianna Neen of the Postal Service.

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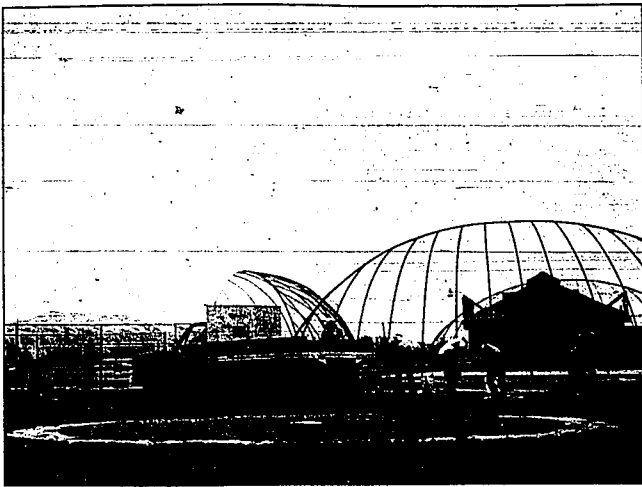

City works to improve ballfields

BURLEY — Little leaguers and softball players can look forward to playing ball this year without balls bouncing into their faces.

Burley's eight fields at Freedom Park have been leveled and in some cases resurfaced. They had been in bad shape for many seasons. The Parks Department expects the fields to be open in time for season openers for Mini-Cassia softball teams and 1,000 local little league players next week.

The city has gotten a lot of complaints for closing the ball fields since work began in March. City Councilman Curtis Mendenhall said. But people don't realize what the city has been up to, he said.

"The fields were in terrible condition," Mendenhall said.

If the city hadn't closed them, crews wouldn't have been able to finish, he said.

Though a nice baseball complex had been built, the fields weren't prepared properly, Mendenhall said.

City crews have replaced dirt paths

ways with one-third sand and two-thirds rockless topsoil. Until now dirt pathways on grass created berms, or mounds, in the infield, causing balls to bounce unpredictably.

"It'll be a much nicer playing field. It should make for a better game," parks director Dennis Peterson said.

Bald spots in the infields have been filled in with sod, and pumice rock is being tested on the infields of both a softball and baseball field, he said.

The city may use it on other infields in the future if it proves to be a likeable playing surface, Peterson said.

Panel eyes the future for Burley airport

BURLEY — The land-locked Burley airport doesn't have room to grow, and a resident's committee is determining whether or not something needs to be done about it.

Minidoka County Commissioner John Remsberg, a committee member, said a public hearing will be set to see if people want a new general aviation airport or not, as soon as the committee finishes its study.

The study includes a socio-economic analysis of the area and a forecast of aviation activity.

The airport doesn't have enough room for longer runways, with the city encroaching from the west, Remsberg said. And the runways are short as it is, he said.

A new airport would need to fall under county jurisdiction since there's no room for inside the city's, he said.

While Minidoka and Cassia counties agreed to work together on an airport study, they haven't agreed to build one, he said.

The complete study, which should take about a year, is funded 90 percent by a grant from the Federal Aviation Administration, 5 percent by the state and 5 percent by Minidoka and Cassia counties.

A new airport is several years down the road, Remsberg said.

Taxes loom as concern in finding space for court

BURLEY — Options for a new judicial building in Cassia County were considered by regular folks who had taxes in mind, one taxpayer says.

County resident Susan Duncan, with other community members, helped draw up a recommendation that county commissioners build a new judicial building downtown and remodel the courthouse for county offices. The estimated price tag is \$6.9 million.

"A lot of us asked a lot of questions. We as taxpayers hated paying taxes, too. But we went in with an open mind," Duncan said.

The judicial committee was

made up of about half county residents and half government officials.

"A lot of us wonder and worry how we are going to get that money. We all saw how the school bond went. I think that people feel taxed to death," Duncan said.

But the committee found that the courthouse isn't built to accommodate security and space requirements needed to make it a safe and efficient government building, she said.

"No one wants to consider raising taxes, Duncan said, noting that some grant money is available. The committee came up with two alternatives to paying for a new judicial building. Each is between \$1 million and \$2 million cheaper but

would create other problems.

Moving all government offices to the Cassia Memorial Hospital building, to be sold May 8, would cost an estimated \$5.4 million. And it would leave the courthouse building empty and useless, according to the committee's report.

Moving county government to the hospital building on Park Avenue south of Burley High School would stress the residential neighborhood. The roads are not designed to handle the heavy traffic volume, the report said.

Other negatives include eliminating other uses for the hospital building. It would separate the courthouse from the sheriff's department, adding inconvenience

for taxpayers trying to maneuver their way through the system. It is essential that all county government offices be centrally located downtown, the committee said.

Remodeling the hospital building to house only the judicial system and leaving other government offices in a remodeled courthouse also is an option. Remaining hospital space could be rented to private offices. The estimated cost is \$4.7 million.

In addition to traffic and zoning problems, a major drawback would be the security complications and cost in transporting prisoners between the jail and the courts. Again, county government would no longer be centrally located, the committee said.

Salmon residents think they spotted wolf nearby

SALMON (AP) — Residents of this central Idaho mountain area think they've spotted one of the wolves released in the state in January.

Federal officials aren't so sure. From the way the animal is acting, it could be a dog-wolf hybrid. In any event, the wolves released earlier this year carry collars with radio transmitters and none of the animals have been monitored in the Lemhi Valley.

Gwenn McAfee is one of several people who reported they spotted a black wolf Wednesday about 15 miles east of Salmon.

McAfee said it was about 30 yards from her, standing by an irrigation ditch, and it didn't bat an eye when she drove by.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife biologist Ted Koch said the wolf McAfee spotted probably isn't one of the 15 released in January. Those wolves have ranged from Cascade to Elk City to Lolo, Mont. One was shot Jan. 29 on a ranch 30 miles south of Salmon.

"The odds of it being a radio-collared wolf are

very low," he said.

As far as Koch knows, pilots didn't locate any of the radio-collared wolves near the Lemhi Valley in a tracking flight on Wednesday. B11, a black female, was located Monday near the Continental Divide above Gibbonsville, 50 miles of mountainous terrain from Salmon.

Wild wolves have been spotted by residents in the area over the last few years. The black wolf could have been one of those, said Koch.

Koch said if folks keep seeing the animal in the area, it is probably a crossbred wolf-dog pet that somebody dumped off.

It common for wild wolves to pass through an area from time to time, he said, but it is unusual for them to stay in one area for a prolonged time.

On Wednesday, Koch was afraid B11 had killed a calf on a ranch near Salmon, where Quinton Snook lost a large calf Saturday night. But by Thursday, Koch had ruled out B11.

In addition, the district will receive about \$51,000 in property tax-relief funds each year from the state — which, when combined with savings from the elimination of the levy, will offset \$127,000 of the cost of the bond issue each year.

The district's total tax increase after the bond issue — minus the levy and after the state tax relief — amounts to just \$30,000 each year over the 20-year life of the bond issue, Chesley said.

That means the bond issue would cost property owners \$3.08 per \$1,000 of assessed value, but with the other reductions the effective increase in property taxes would be about 60 cents per \$1,000, Chesley said.

Cenarrusa denies any links with militia group

Idaho Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa says he was deceived into lending his name and office to the militia movement.

"I'm not supporting the militia, because I don't know anything about them," he said. Meanwhile, Boise attorney Dan Williams on Wednesday called on U.S. Rep. Helen Chenoweth, R-Idaho, to renounce the Blackfoot-based national director of the U.S. Militia Association in the wake of the Oklahoma City bombing.

Last April, Cenarrusa appeared at a Coeur d'Alene conference organized by the Concerned Citizens of Idaho, a northern Idaho anti-government group with militia ties. He also spoke

to the U.S. Militia Association leaders at a Statehouse meeting in February. Cenarrusa said he agreed to attend the April 1994 Coeur d'Alene conference because he thought it was a gathering of county officials. But the Portland-based Coalition for Human Dignity said at least one organizer there had known racist ties and Cenarrusa's presence gave the gathering legitimacy.

"I think I was used by not letting me know what that was about,"

Cenarrusa said Wednesday.

He said he agreed to speak to the February meeting at the Statehouse because he thought fellow Republican Gov. Butch Otter and Attorney General Alan Lance also were going to speak about the role of government. Otter and Lance did not attend. State Schools Superintendent Anne Fox filled in.

At the end of his speech on the role of the public servant, Cenarrusa shared his concerns that any militia other than the National Guard might be illegal.

A story quoting Cenarrusa appears along with his picture in the February edition of Aide-de-Camp, the U.S. Militia Association's newsletter. Cenarrusa also is quoted in a story in the March edition.

The secretary said he did not know that a story and picture of him ran in the February newsletter. He said the photo, an old one, was used without his permission and that he was misquoted.

"If he feels he's been insulted by us, we want to apologize. We certainly didn't mean to cause him any problems," U.S. Militia Association member Wendy Dalton said. "We thought the picture was public domain because it was printed before and it was in the printing company's archive."

Cenarrusa said he also was misquoted in a March newsletter article in which he is said to have told militia leaders, "We need to figure out a way to call you out as the militia and get you recognized."

Dalton said she and 10 members resent him saying something like that. "The reason we remember it is because we were pleasantly surprised that he would say that," she said.

The U.S. Militia Association denounced the Oklahoma bombing. They stressed their organization is not a military group but intended to protect individual rights through changing laws.

Cenarrusa said while he believes the organization is a good group of people, he is unsure of their motives. Still, he said he would accept an invitation to speak again before the U.S. Militia Association if "good government" is the topic.

Williams, a Democrat who may challenge Chenoweth for re-election next year, said "U.S. Militia

Association director Samuel Sherwood told a March 2 militia meeting, "Go up and look legislators in the face because some day you may be forced to blow it off."

Sherwood earlier confirmed the substance of that remark, but later denied it.

"Elected officials need to make it clear that they oppose paramilitary extremists and the climate of violence they promote," Williams said. Chenoweth said she condemns any group that advocates violence.

"However, I will not condemn any group or individual purely on the basis of guilt by association," she said. "I am thoroughly disgusted by the attempts of various opportunistic individuals to capitalize on this event to further a political agenda."

Town aims to bar guns at council meetings

TROY (AP) — Residents packing heat may have to check their piece at the door to attend Troy City Council meetings. Mayor Marie Vogel is worried about the potential danger that comes with allowing concealed weapons in City Hall or at public facilities such as the library.

This week, Vogel and council members asked City Attorney William Herrington to draft an ordinance. Herrington said he isn't aware that any other Idaho community has such an ordinance.

Thor Holder, a candidate for Troy mayor, wore a handgun tucked into the back of his pants to the April 10 City Council meeting. He doesn't see a need for the restriction.

"Overall, certainly the present city government can enact laws they deem necessary," Holder said. "Whether they will be chal-

lenged or if they are correct or not will be determined in the future."

Holder estimated that 40 percent of the people of Troy have permits for concealed weapons. "Personally, I don't think (an ordinance) is a necessary step but being the law-abiding citizen that I am, I would go along with that."

Vogel said she's aware some people often have toted guns into council chambers. She said the ordinance would be for the protection of people attending meetings, as well as officials.

Latah County Sheriff Joe Overstreet said if everyone who has been issued a concealed weapons permit in the five years the law has been in effect still lives in the county, that would be about one out of every five county residents. He said his office issues about 500 permits yearly.

Crawford daughter speaks out on domestic violence

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — As Christine Crawford signed copies of her latest book, "No Safe Place," police reported to a domestic violence report more than two miles away.

Officers questioned a young woman about an alleged assault and later arrested a male suspect. "Across town, professionals, clergy and citizens gathered to hear the daughter of actress Joan Crawford present a workshop titled "Overcoming Family Violence."

"If home is not a safe place, no place on earth is safe," said the author and lecturer who now lives in northern Idaho.

In 1977, Crawford wrote her journal that became "Mommie Dearest."

"It was a line of demarcation in my life," she said. "For the first time people had something they could relate to; we had the beginning of a language (about family abuse)."

Crawford said society understands the positive influences of family, but has not recognized the

problems that occur when a family goes amiss.

Family violence is increasing because young people are not trained to be parents and have few good role models, she said.

She said the term "domestic violence" is inappropriate because domestic means town or suite, making the problem sound less urgent.

Crawford said her new book helps people understand the correlation between childhood experiences and adult problems. She said it is almost the opposite of repressed memory therapy because it is specific and doesn't require a therapist.

After writing the book about her abusive mother, Crawford suffered a stroke that left her partially paralyzed, unable to speak or walk.

She went into isolation for almost five years, but recovered completely and pledged to use her life to help other abuse victims.

After hunting for a quiet place throughout the Northwest, she finally found a spot in Tensed for a bed and breakfast.

Bomb threat halts Micron work

BOISE (AP) — A false bomb threat brought to a halt Micron Technology's manufacturing complex in Boise.

At 9:08 a.m., Wednesday, a man told a 911 dispatcher that a bomb would explode at the electronics plant within 2½ hours.

By 11 a.m., between 1,000 and 2,000 construction workers, office staff and production employees had been evacuated from three buildings, Micron spokeswoman Julie Nash said.

By noon, authorities confirmed it was a false alarm and employees headed back to work.

Police later arrested Kirk R. Dukes, 27, of Meridian. Dukes is charged with a felony count of making a false report of explosives in a public or private place. If convicted, he could serve up to five years in prison.

In the week following the Oklahoma bombing, local authorities have received six bomb threats, Ada County Sheriff's Capt. Roy Holloway said.

Zinser points to board on halting dean search

LEWISTON (AP) — University of Idaho President Elisabeth Zinser says a state Board of Education member advised her to cancel the search for a new law school dean and leave the decision to her successor.

"You were angry enough as to say you would fight us publicly if something did not happen," Zinser wrote in an April 13 memo to Roy Mosman of Moscow and distributed to all board members.

She said Mosman, a lawyer, also indicated he was disappointed that a close colleague did not make the short list for dean.

But Zinser said she rejected Mosman's advice to put the search aside while she is a candidate for jobs

elsewhere, including president at West Virginia University and chancellor at the University of Kentucky.

"Certainly I cannot cancel the search to leave it to my successor because I remain the president of the UI," she wrote in a memo obtained by the Lewiston Tribune.

She is a candidate for chancellor/president positions at other institu-

tions, but decisions are not made. While I am exploring leadership opportunities at other universities, I remain committed to doing my job for UI until such time as I depart the presidency here.

She said cancelling the search would make her school even more vulnerable to political pressures, such as Micron Technology Inc.'s unsuccessful bid to win approval for an engineering school at Boise State.

However, Mosman said he never suggested Zinser cancel the search for a dean. He said he advised Zinser she should start another search if changes raised by an unsuccessful applicant for the position are true. Boise lawyer Neal Newhouse alleged

the search was fatally flawed.

Mosman said the State Bar Commission subsequently assured the Board of Education it saw nothing wrong with the search. But he said he was troubled about Newhouse and former Board of Education member Karl Shurtliff failing to even get phone calls from the committee searching for a law school dean.

Shurtliff is the close colleague Zinser mentioned in her memo. Newhouse, a former visiting professor at Idaho, was named by the Board of Education to chair justice and the law school dean at Yale, Mosman said, and Shurtliff is a former legislator and former U.S. attorney for Idaho.

Judge won't approve summary judgment for monument lawsuit

BOISE (AP) — A federal judge in Boise recommended against summary judgment against ten who filed a federal lawsuit objecting to the Ten Commandments monument on the Bannock County Courthouse lawn.

U.S. Magistrate Judge Larry Boyle Wednesday afternoon signed a 28-page report recommending denial of both sides' efforts to win the case without a trial. The recommendation goes to U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge, who will make the final decision, but the recommendations usually are accepted.

Boyle said proceedings claiming violation of the Establishment Clause of the U.S. Constitution are "delicate and fact-sensitive" and thus granting summary judgment is inappropriate before those facts are determined. He also recommended denial of the county's effort to dismiss the complaint.

Bannock County Commissioner J.O. Cotant said he wasn't surprised by the preliminary report.

He said commissioners are confident they'll win in court and they won't back off despite a recent bomb threat to the monument.

"Right's right, and wrong's wrong. We're not going to be intimidated,"

Cotant said. "We're going for the gold."

An apparent bomb was placed on the monument earlier this month, and an anonymous caller warned officials it was there. A squad of experts from Mountain Home Air Force Base removed and disabled the device.

Police have been investigating, but officials haven't said whether it was a real bomb or just a device rigged to look like one.

Three men, Andrew J. Albanese, Larry Fuller and Stephen W. Wells, filed a civil rights lawsuit in 1993, asking removal of the Ten Commandments monument. They alleged it violated the U.S. Constitution's requirement that church and state be kept separate.

Albanese is described in court records as an agnostic who used to "frequently pass in front of the Bannock County Courthouse" but now "avoids the site." He did not join the motion seeking summary judgment.

Fuller is a "non-Christian" who drives by the courthouse daily and the monument "disturbs me greatly and causes me significant emotional distress," court records said.

Wells is an atheist who said his four children live only a few blocks from

the courthouse, and was concerned that the monument sends a message to his children that they are criminals because as atheists, they do not abide by the Ten Commandments, the court file said.

County officials refuse to remove the monument, which was donated to the county in 1987 by the Eagles fraternal organization. Similar monuments are in place at courthouses across Idaho.

In response to complaints, Bannock County erected a sign of about the same height with a 1786 quote from Thomas Jefferson about religious freedom. And a third sign in the area says the display was not intended to endorse any particular system or religious belief.

Boyle said in his report there is "a serious factual question" whether there was sufficient evidence that Fuller and Wells have departed from their usual route to avoid observing the monument, or have stopped using a public facility, the courthouse, because of it.

"In the court's view, these cases require a complete factual record before making a final decision on such significant factual and legal issues," the judge said.

Corps OKs release

LEWISTON (AP) — The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has increased the release from Dvorshak Dam again to help flush young salmon to the ocean.

The release from the Clearwater River reservoir on Wednesday jumped as the Corps complied with a nearly week-old request from state, tribal and federal fisheries agencies.

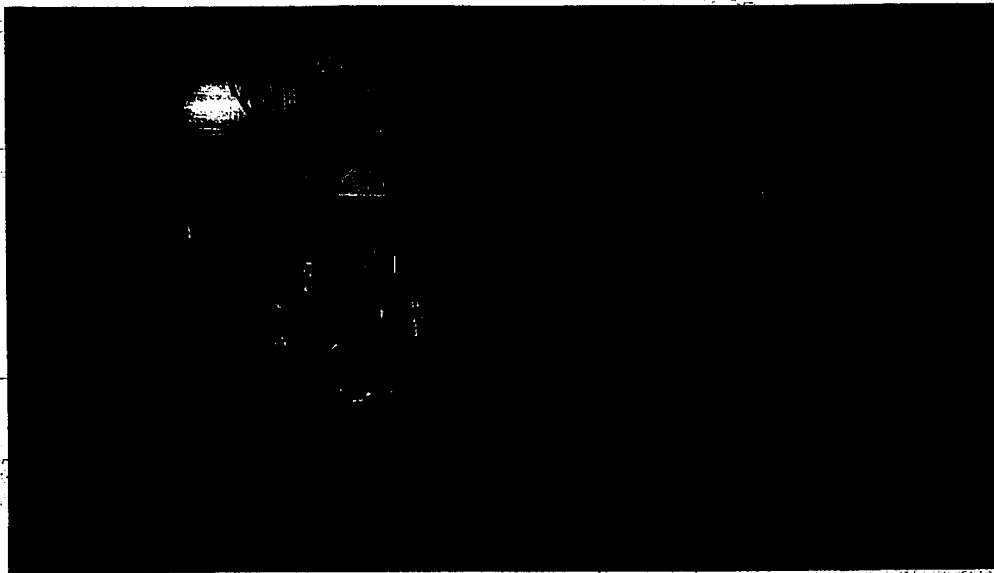

TWIN FALLS — Big band ballroom dancing has always evoked fond memories of the 1940s, but lots of '90s couples are still "in the mood."

"We've been dancing since we were in high school," said Darlene Moore, whose husband, Tom, is president of the Magic Steppers Dance Club. "We've danced together all of our married life — 44 years."

Today's dances are not quite so elaborate. The Magic Steppers plan semi-formal evenings. Men are requested to wear jackets and ties. Women generally wear cock-

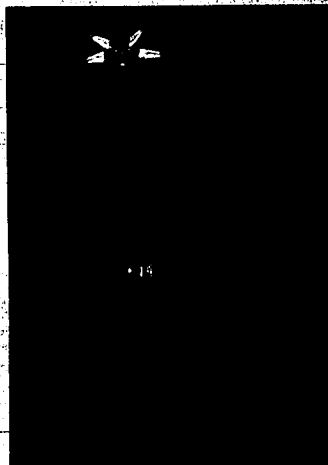

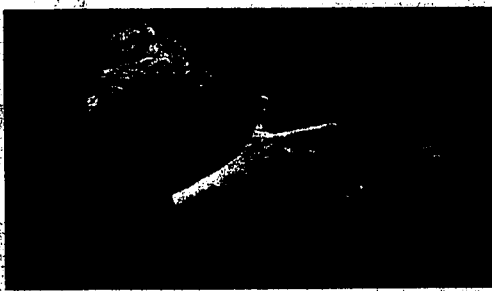
TWIN FALLS — After 25 years of making music at the College of Southern Idaho, instructor Larry Curtis is passing the clarinet.

"It's time to do other things," said Curtis, 63, who will conduct his CSI Swing Band in its final concert on Sunday. "I may give private lessons, but I'm planning to perform and travel more."

Curtis came to CSI in 1970, fresh from 10 years of teaching high school music. During those early days of his career, he directed his California marching bands all the way to the Rose Bowl Parade. He had come to love music growing up in Pasadena, where a fifth-grade music teacher first awakened his interest in tune.

"I played in Navy bands, too," Curtis recalled. "I played for the king and queen of Greece and for (President) Eisenhower."

Eventually, Curtis studied music at Pasadena City College, San Diego State College, the University of Redlands and the University of Washington. He now holds bachelor and masters degrees in the subject, along with what he terms an A.B.D. (all but dissertation) toward a doctorate.

"spare time," he conducted several Dietzinger shows and a number of Music Club musicals and operas. He was chair of the CSI Music Department for 17 years, and he's performed 23 recitals on clarinet and saxophone.

Pow wow to bring culture of Great Basin to CSI

TWIN FALLS — A century ago, dancing was a way of life — and an act of faith — for the Shoshoni, Bannock and Paiute Indian nations that inhabited what are now the Magic and Wood River valleys and northeastern Nevada.

Dances heralded hunting, travel, the change of seasons — in fact, all the rites of passage for a people whose dependence on the land was absolute.

The College of Southern Idaho's Golden Eagle Native American Society hopes to

recreate that ritual annually, starting Sunday.

"Last year our club hosted an Indian dance exhibition, and this year we decided to make it a full-blown pow wow," said Shane Ridley-Stevens, a CSI student who is coordinating the First Annual CSI Pow Wow. "There are pow wows beginning in March at Idaho State University and several Utah colleges, and many of the dancers travel the circuit all summer."

The purpose of the pow wow is to educate other communities about Native American culture, Ridley-Stevens said. "We expect about 150 dancers," he said.

"That's a good beginning for us."

Dancing is a major part of contemporary Native American pow wows held each summer at Fort Hall in eastern Idaho; at Elko, Nev., and on the Duck Valley Indian Reservation astride the Idaho-Nevada border. But it's relatively unknown in the territory in between, and Ridley-Stevens hopes to change that.

"There are different kinds of dances, and the dancers compete for prize money," he said. "We've been able to get some financial support from some local businesses, and we hope that will grow in the years to come."

Historically, pow wows in the Great Basin were annual gatherings by members of the same or related Native American nations. Because the land was dry and the climate harsh, individual communities stayed small — and the pow wows offered the Shoshonis, Bannocks and Paiutes a chance to get together and renew ties with members of their expanded families.

Ornate and colorful costumes were always part of the pow wow tradition, Ridley-Stevens said, although the dances themselves had very practical origins. The

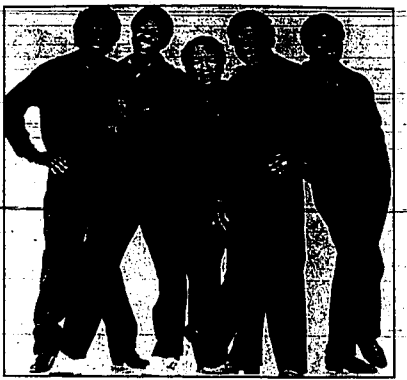

Next week, the Spinners will bring the "class act" to the Jackpot stage.

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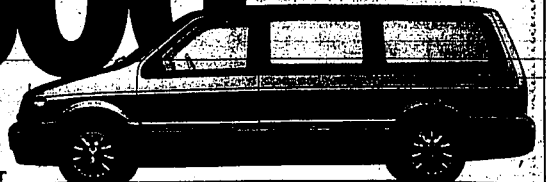

Disney digs houses animation division

LOS ANGELES (AP) — For months last year, commuters gazed in wonderment at a strange-looking structure rising in the San Fernando Valley adjacent to the Ventura Freeway. What was it? A dirigible hangar? A shed for testing rocket motors? A mammoth bowling alley?
The building took shape, with its square windows looking out on the freeway, a wide strip of metal stretching across the top (its occupants call it the Mohawk), and a four-story dunce's cap in the front.
Finally, in late 1994 came the tip-off: Huge letters emblazoned across the side proclaimed: A N I M A T I O N.
Sited across Riverside Drive from the Walt Disney Studio, this is the new Animation Building, which opened rather quietly earlier this year and cost about \$50 million. The vertical-striped "Mohawk" on top is supposed to symbolize a strip of film. The cone in front, now painted pale blue with stars and a crescent moon, represents the Sorcerer's hat that Mickey Mouse borrowed in "Fantasia."
The building is replete with symbolism. The rooftop facing the main studio features a series of low domes, the same shape as the top of movie stages. Inside and out, the design by Robert A.M. Stern reflects the streamline, luxury-lined, moderne style of the 1930s, the period when Disney began to flourish.
"Our company is a company of whimsy and fun," says Disney chairman Michael Eisner in his office atop the Team Disney Building which houses the company bigshots.
"This building (Team Disney) is a serious, important building... But instead of having it look like a bank, we have our dwarfs on the roof, metaphorically holding up the roof, which 'Snow White' did in its day, not metaphorically but specifically...
"If you have to build buildings for your business, you might as well build good buildings, with people who have talent... They just have to be made with bricks and mortar and stand for closer to eternity than a film."

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'Pocahontas:' U.S. through a rosy lens

KING WILLIAM, Va. (AP) — It could pass for another Disney animated fairy tale: dashing, blond English colonist meets willowy, raven-haired Indian princess and they fall in love.

So what's wrong with this picture?

Walt Disney Co.'s "Pocahontas," due in theaters this summer, does not square with historical fact. Unlike the make-believe stars of Disney's classic cartoon features, Pocahontas and John Smith actually lived.

Reel world

Pocahontas had not yet reached her teens when Smith — in his early 30s at the time — arrived in the New World. Pocahontas, a chief's daughter, spared the settler from death at the hands of her angry tribe and taught him about Powhatan Indian culture. He, in turn, schooled her in English.

But the two were never an item. The animated Pocahontas will not be the innocent 11-year-old who saved Smith's life. Instead, she will be a slender, tawny-skinned enchantress in a form-fitting buckskin sheath.

"It's a beautiful story, if it didn't carry the name of 'Pocahontas,'" Shirley Custalow McGowan, an American Indian known to her tribe as Little Dove, said of the contrived romance.

"Because of her high cheekbones, Disney artists modeled their Pocahontas character after McGowan. During a visit in August to Disney's California studios, she discovered that both Pocahontas and Smith will be in their 20s in the movie. When she asked why, Disney officials explained that a romance would make more money," she said.

"They really have it accurate about the heart and soul of our people, but they're not doing a film about the Powhatan Indians they're doing a film about Pocahontas," she said.

The life of the real Pocahontas was not as glamorous as her cartoon namesake.

She was born in 1595 near Jamestown. According to a 1612 account written by William Strachey, the British first secretary of the Virginia colony, she married a chief from her tribe when she was about 14.

In 1613, when fighting broke out between the Powhatan tribe and white settlers, Pocahontas was lured aboard an English ship and temporarily held captive. During that time, she converted to Christianity and fell in love with Englishman John Rolfe.

In 1614, they married and two years later, Rolfe sailed with her to England. There she met King James I and the British acclaimed her as an American princess. But before she could return to America, she fell ill with smallpox and died at age 21.

Somewhere along the way, the original story line faded.

Disney tried to ensure the film's accuracy: Its executives met with Virginia Indians and even visited Jamestown. Disney animator and director Mike Gabriel said in 1993 that the movie could be entertaining without departing from historical accuracy.

Rapper hits No. 1, despite prison sentence

LOS ANGELES — Tupac Shakur appears in the video for his current hit song, "Dear Mama," only in a secondary role — glimpsed by his mother in old photographs and vintage video clips.

The photogenic rapper and actor, who records under the name 2Pac, was not available to appear live in the video because he's in prison — serving up to 4½ years for sexual abuse at Clinton Correctional Facility in Dannemora, N.Y.

But Shakur's incarceration hasn't hindered the success of his third solo album, "Me Against the World," which has been No. 1 on Billboard magazine's weekly sales chart since Interscope Records released the collection three weeks ago.

Boosted by the success of "Dear Mama," which is No. 7 this week on the Billboard singles chart, "Me Against the World" has sold almost 500,000 copies.

Shakur, 23, and Interscope seem to have made the most of a unique situation, launching the album with a marketing program that was in part shaped by Shakur from prison.

The rapper has granted only one jailhouse interview, telling *Vibe* magazine that his "thug life" was finished after several scrapes with the law and a brush with death last Nov. 30, when he was shot five times while being robbed outside a Manhattan recording studio.

Shakur, who co-starred with Janet Jackson in the 1993 film "Poetic Justice," told *Vibe* that the interview would be his last.

"If I get killed, I want people to get every drop," he said. "I want them to have the real story."

The magazine hit newstands early last month, as the "Dear Mama" single and video were starting to get airplay.

"Dear Mama," a paean to Shakur's mother, is "a rare expression of love in the rap world," according to one reviewer, "displaying a sensitivity that outsiders would deny."

But Tom Whalley, the Interscope executive who signed Shakur to the label in 1990, said the choice of "Dear Mama" as the album's first single was not made with the intention of presenting the imprisoned rapper in a more positive light.

and touched the victim without her consent.

"Keep Ya Head Up" was a departure from many of his songs at the time, which were more along the lines of the themes commonly found in gangsta rap — drug use, violence and misogyny.

"Me Against the World" also includes some incendiary tracks, but they blend together with "Dear Mama" and other surprisingly sensitive songs to provide a portrait of a man's troubled environment.

The video for "Dear Mama," directed by Lionel Martin, features the rapper's mother, Afeni Shakur, a former member of the Black Panther Party who was in prison during part of her pregnancy with Tupac. Actors play out scenes from Shakur's life, including his shooting last fall.

"There was talk of visiting him in jail and sensationalizing all that's happened to him but that's not what I wanted to do at all," Whalley said. "I wanted to really play to the emotion of the song and what the song is really about."

While awaiting his Feb. 7 sentencing, Shakur met in jail with Whalley and Martin to discuss the concept for the video, and to give his go-ahead. Actress Jada Pinkett, who will direct the video for the album's next single, "Can U Get Away," also is expected to make a jailhouse visit.

"It slows down the process," Whalley said of the unique situation of not having the artist available to fully participate in the promotion of his album, "but he's still able to influence what goes on with his record."

Dylan goes non-electric on MTV

Bob Dylan, "MTV Unplugged" (Columbia). The man who set the pop world on its ear and outraged his devoted fans when he went electric at the 1965 Newport Folk Festival has come full circle 30 years later. And what a pleasure his return is.

Bob Dylan's singing — nasal voice, mangled, almost perverse enunciation, a tendency to whine at the most peculiar moments — is still an acquired taste. But on "MTV Unplugged," not only are the lyrics comprehensible, Dylan's intentions are, too.

Dylan, the musician, seems to deal with his own myth by ignoring it. The result is a rare open, direct, accessible performance. The words are exposed, the playing is gritty and streetwise, the singing purposeful. He claims "All Along the Watchtower" from Jimi Hendrix, singing his one-act morality play with a sense of urgency. Similarly, he takes back "Knockin' on Heaven's Door" from Guns 'N' Roses, singing the refrain in a gentle, mocking, fey tone, a counterpoint.

perhaps, to Axl Rose's war-cry approach.

He recharges "Like a Rolling Stone" with a nuanced performance that moves from accusation to empathy and back, sometimes within a line as he now hisses the words, now openly pleads like a preacher. Dylan also revisits "The Times They Are A-Changin'" without a hint of condescension or nostalgia.

But these songs are decades old, and not all have aged well. The anti-war anthem "John Brown" sounds a tad too earnest, too sure of its moralizing, locking the shadings of pain, confusion and irony that still make "With God on Our Side" a moving experience.

It is impossible to recreate the impact an artist had when he burst through the conventions of his day: The context has changed, the innocence is long lost. But Dylan's "MTV Unplugged" comes surprisingly close.

Adam Ant, "Wonderful" (Capitol)

"Wonderful" may be the name of Adam Ant's comeback CD, but that's what comes to mind on hearing it. Try "inept."

Ant rode to fame in 1982 with his pirate costumes, bare chest and cotton-candy tunes like "Goody Two Shoes" and "Strip."

But louzy songs eroded his following by mid-decade, and even less appealing ones make this comeback all the more painful.

To Ant's credit, he ditches the synthesizers of the past for a more organic approach of bass, drums and guitars. The music is lightweight pop, and if any of the hooks registered, it would be passable entertainment.

But Ant drones on endlessly in "Very Long Ride," sings of sex with the insight of a preteen discovering Playboy in "Beautiful Dream" and loses all sense of melody in "1969 Again."

We welcomed Ant's peers Duran Duran back a couple of years ago because of some catchy tunes. Duran Duran just paid us back with the execrable "Thank You." Don't make the same mistake with Ant.

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Past, present intersect in CD by cowboy poet Mitchell

Waddie Mitchell opened the telephone conversation with a weather report: "We got 6 inches of snow here overnight," said the cowboy poet from his home in Elko County, Nev.

It was not at all surprising that Mitchell would be so attuned to the land. Until about four years ago, when he went on the road full time as a poet, Mitchell spent all of his life on ranches. He even dropped out of high school to cowboy, and that was the life he lived for 26 years.

And, despite any sideways glances he might have gotten during a month of performing at the Rainbow Room, smock-dab in the middle of New York City, he under-

stands that this is a rural nation. "Probably less than 50 percent of Americans today don't relate to the rural lifestyle," he said.

That doesn't mean that half of us have grown up on farms and ranches, but it means that we're connected enough to have witnessed a sunset on a relative's farm or spent enough time in the country to recognize the scent of alfalfa.

That's what cowboy poetry is about, Mitchell said. It's about the universal human experience, as he puts it. He has witnessed it in storytellers' gatherings, where

Chinese tales and Irish tales bear striking similarities. He witnessed it at the 11th annual Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Elko last month, which welcomed the Russian poet Yevgeny Yevushenko and some Native American poets. A capacity crowd of 12,000 was on hand.

"The genre has taken another step," Mitchell said, describing how he sat enthralled as Yevushenko read in Russian and wailed while a translator read his words in English.

"He is one of the greatest living poets in the world today," Mitchell said.

The Native American poets, Mitchell said, reminded him that "the past is important to our everyday lives. You can hear their songs in their rhythms. You can hear the earth

movements — from buffalo running to the sounds of a babbling brook.

The intersection of the past and the present is very much alive in "The Bard and the Balladeer: Live From Cowtown," a CD that Mitchell and his friend, singer Don Edwards, came-up-with-for-the Warner Western label.

The opening cut of the package, "Communitin'/Ridin'," sums-up-its-spirit. Mitchell said he wrote "Communitin'" then called Edwards to read it to him. Edwards

remembered, "Ridin'," a poem by Badger Clark that had been set to music.

The two meshed perfectly for a charming contrast of lifestyles.

Mitchell and Edwards have teamed up for several years, presenting poetry and song. The album just happened.

"We had no idea that it was going to be an album," Mitchell said. "The reason we taped that show (at the William Edington Scott Theatre in Fort Worth, Texas) was to listen to it and consider doing an album." The entertainers—and the audience meshed so well that the tape became an album.

Mitchell said his audiences are changing, becoming more diverse.

His travels are taking him into urban areas more and more.

Pair of 'new' Hendrix disks ready for release

Jimi Hendrix's last two album projects are being resurrected this spring on separate labels, 25 years after he worked on them.

"Band of Gypsies" (Capitol), the only live Hendrix album to be released during his lifetime, is being issued for the first time domestically on compact disc without any of the additional tracks, details or liner notes that have accompanied many other classic-rock CD reissues.

A more ambitious project attempts to piece together what would have been Hendrix's final studio album.

Most of the cuts, on the new "Voodoo Soup" (MCA) have been released in other forms, particularly on the posthumous "Cry of Love" and "Rainbow Bridge" albums.

But the new album attempts to approximate what Hendrix was trying to accomplish on the double album that he kept calling "The First Rays of the New Rising Sun."

Not only would it be a sequel to his last studio epic, "Electric Ladyland," but it would point in a new direction.

"The First Rays of the New Rising Sun" is my new life," Hendrix told Melody Maker in early January 1969. "Everybody has something to give of themselves, and it's not just money."

He told the BBC: "The Americans are looking for a leader in their music. First Rays of the New Rising Sun" will be about what we have seen. If you give deeper thoughts in your music, then the masses will buy them."

If the original "Band of Gypsies" record had the sheen of a contractual obligation, so does Capitol's reissue. While another famous rock concert, the Who's "Live at Leeds," has been reissued with twice as much material and copious liner notes, "Band of Gypsies," because of a contractual obligation, comes in the same stark packaging as the original issue in June 1970.

Still, the album is noteworthy if for just one cut: what many consider one of the greatest rock guitar masterpieces ever, "Machine Gun." Dedicated sardonically to soldiers in the U.S. cities — "and oh, yes, Vietnam" — the rage of the times bubbles up in his intense solo.

Although there is room on a CD for twice as many as the six tracks from the first album, there's not an extra note on the reissue. That's despite the fact that three more tracks from the concert — albeit in poor quality — surfaced on the 1986 sequel "Band of Gypsies 2," along with three tracks that didn't include the Band of Gypsies.

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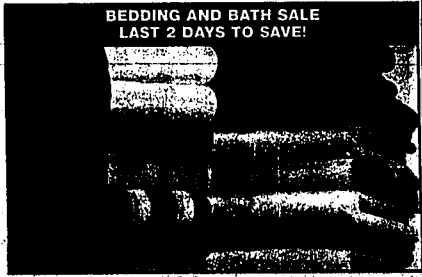

"Kiss of Death" — One of the most compelling of modern film noirs, Richard Price's story of an outsider presumed to break the criminal code and turn against his own kind is expertly directed by Babes Schroeder. The acting is effective across the board, with special credit to "NYPD Blue's" David Caruso, Samuel L. Jackson as a wary cop and Nicolas Cage as an athletic crown prince of crime. "Major Payne" — Although too familiar and predictable for adults, this Damon Wayans movie is fine for youngsters and allows Wayans to shine as the most zealous Marine imaginable, who winds up commanding a unit of junior ROTC misfits. "Man of the House" — Chevy Chase couldn't be better as a fearless Seattle federal prosecutor facing the trial of his life as he tries to win the approval of his lover's feisty, jealous 11-year-old son (Jonathan Taylor Thomas). (PG, for mild thematic material.) (Motor-Vu Drive-in, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

'Destiny' takes 'Pulp Fiction' turn

With a title of "Destiny Turns on the Radio," you don't expect an ordinary movie.

And with "Pulp Fiction"/pop culture maestro Quentin Tarantino playing a mythical character named Johnny Destiny, you don't even expect a "Twin" format flick. What you get is a film that's calculated to be offbeat in the same obvious way that some Hollywood movies are prepackaged to be mainstream.

This is the first feature of director Jack Baran, but it has definite Tarantino-ish touches. It's set rooted in '50s pop culture as Tarantino's pulp flicks are mined in the '70s. But Baran is telling a simple, mythical story, and he shouldn't give his audience too much time to think about it. "Destiny" is fun but forgettable.

Julian Goddard (Dylan McDermott), a bank robber who's escaped from a Nevada prison, heads

for Las Vegas to reclaim his girlfriend Lucille (Nancy Travis) and the loot that he thinks his partner Thoreau (James LeGros) has.

Of course, nothing is easy. Lucille, for example, has a new boyfriend, a lowlife casino manager named Puerto (James Belushi). As for Thoreau, he says the money was stolen under mysterious circumstances.

Appearing at important intervals is Johnny Destiny, who smiles knowingly but noncommittally at each crisis. He engineers the plot's non-too-convincing excursions into fantasy.

"Destiny Turns on the Radio" is nothing if not picturesque. Much of the action takes place at the oneshiny Marilyn Motel, where each room is named after one of Monroe's movies. Julian naturally checks into "The Misfits" room.

All the cast members seem to be

enjoying themselves. McDermott performs with the polish of a future star, while Travis makes the mercurial Lucille a likable and strong presence. LeGros has lazy-boy charm, while Belushi has tough-guy edginess.

Tarantino has proved he knows how to write dialogue, but he still doesn't know how to deliver it. Fortunately, the role basically requires a pair of mischievous eyes and a unique face that seems half clown and half shaman — a bill Tarantino easily fills.

"Destiny Turns on the Radio" is a shaggy-dog tale that should have been a short story. But it has isolated, enjoyable moments. (Twin Cinema)

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Gump happens; 'Hoop Dreams' arrives on video too

New movies in Twin Falls video stores this week

" Forrest Gump " (PG-13) — One of the most original movies in years. "Forrest Gump" is blessed with magic.

Based on a novel by Winston Groom, "Forrest Gump" tells of a sweet-natured, slow-witted man (beautifully played by Tom Hanks) whose gift for running, combined with pure luck, turns him into a football star, a Vietnam war hero, a captain of the shrimp industry and, finally, the most devoted partner a woman could want.

Forrest's story is also America's story; maybe that's why it won the Academy Award for best picture. The magnificent oak matures as the country matures, and his life touches political, racial integration, political assassinations, the chaos of the '60s and a tragic, unsuspected virus that obviously represents AIDS.

"Forrest Gump's" magical list of assets includes the splendid Hanks performance, stunning visual effects by Industrial Light & Magic and, above all, compassionate direction by Robert Zemeckis. For once, the technically talented Zemeckis (the "Back to the Future" guy, who framed Roger Rabbit) has made a film with an emotional passion equal to its high-tech prowess.

It is, essentially, a movie in which people behave lovingly to one another, yet it gracefully glides away from sappiness. But the film slyly reveals its wry sense of humor.

In rural Greenwood, Ala., Forrest's loyal mother (Sally Field) must take extreme measures to keep her low-IQ son enrolled in school. When Forrest enters the Army, he is considered the ideal soldier simply because he excels at following explicit instructions. And his life touches those of many famous people, almost all of whom meet with misfortune.

The movie's most talked-about scenes (at least before its release) superimpose Hanks into newscast footage of Presidents Kennedy, Johnson and Nixon as well as John Lennon. Only occasionally seeming like a gimmick, these moments work more believably and with more subtlety than the film's most sophisticated scenes that nearly overwhelmed Woody Allen's "Zelig."

But you won't leave the theater focused on those techniques; what comes through is a mood of benevolence, an unusual (and welcome) twist for a special effects-laden film.

"Forrest Gump" is that rarity, a film that is as subtle as anything else it is to see for the first time. (*Knight-Ridder Newspapers*) (Video West, Blockbuster, Hastings)

"Blue Sky" (PG-13) — Maybe there have been too many paperbacks on co-dependency, too many trailer park couples on "Oprah," too many explosive celebrity spliffs in "In"y — either way, the film Tony Richardson's "Blue Sky" has nothing new to say about the psychopathology of star-crossed couples, though Tommy Lee Jones and Jessica Lange, in her Oscar-winning role, generate a lot of sparks.

Loosely based on the childhood memories of Amy bar Rama Linn Stagner, the '60s-set family drama explores the relationship between an unstable bombshell, Carly (Lange), and her reliable husband, Hank (Jones). Of course, their two daughters (Amy Locane and Anna Klump) are damaged by the fallout.

When the film opens, Hank, a military scientist specializing in nuclear radiation, is stationed at a parasitic Hawaiian base, but is then re-assigned to a dreary stateside post. Carly, whose scandalous behavior provoked the reassignment, is devastated at the sight of her shabby new quarters in an Alabama backwater. But with Hank there to cradle her, Carly's depression lifts and it's party time.

The girls, especially the older one, have long known that their mother, a classic manic-depressive, needs help, but Hank believes he's all the help she needs. Besides, with psychiatric intervention Carly might get well, and then she wouldn't need her "daddy" anymore. The girls might have a mother instead of a military camp; that lands Hank in the psych ward. Carly, who was tricked into signing the papers, resolves not only to get Daddy out of the hospital, but to alert the media to the dangers of nuclear testing.

Change is never easy. That's why we'd rather watch fictional characters go through it than do it ourselves. But Hank and Carly don't undergo the most minimal metamorphosis. Instead, they trap off into another story, leaving a military camp; that lands Hank in the psych ward. Good-bye, Salome. Hello, Silkwood. (*Washington*) (Hastings Video, Blockbuster) **"Hoop Dreams" (PG-13)** — The remarkable "Hoop Dreams" proves that even at its best, Hollywood can't match the drama of everyday life.

This rich and insightful documentary, which traces five years in the lives of two Chicago inner-city kids, is more compelling than anything a pack of scriptwriters could ever concoct.

Filmmakers Steve James, Frederick Marx and Peter Gilbert originally set out in 1986 to make a simple half-hour documentary about Chicago's street basketball culture. But after they found two young men with exceptional talent, the project took on mammoth proportions.

As "Hoop Dreams" opens, William Gates and Arthur Agee are ninth-graders with NBA hopes. Owing only to their athletic ability, both are admitted to the prestigious (and private) St. Joseph High School, where basketball is taken so seriously the school sends out scouts to comb public courts for freshman recruits.

Officially entering the ninth grade, William and Arthur read at the fourth-grade level. They must spend three hours a day getting to and from the school, which is mostly white. But the chance to train under coach Gene Fingatore, who discovered and developed former Detroit Pistons star Isiah Thomas, is too great a lure for the boys — and their families.

Because as "Hoop Dreams" shows us, it's not just William and Arthur who are dazzled by the prospect of a professional basketball career. Their parents and siblings, eager to put their own dashed dreams and poverty behind, plant huge expectations on William and Arthur's slim shoulders,

adding to the pressure the boys already face.

William's older brother Curtis, a former basketball prodigy himself, constantly criticizes William's game as a way of working through his own squandered potential. The 20-year marriage of Arthur's parents, Sheila and "Bo," seems to unravel overnight, but the filmmakers later capture a scene between Arthur and Bo on a basketball court that tells us all we need to know about the people's problems. Arthur's high school friend, Shannon, seems intent on hurting Arthur from his studies and into less productive activities.

At the boys grow older, their stories take surprising twists that continually stack the odds against them

"Hoop Dreams," which runs nearly three hours but feels more like 90 minutes, is primarily about the pressures faced by young athletes angling for professional careers. But the movie's reach is so broad, the documentary ultimately plays as a rich slice of urban American life. It's an amazing piece of work. (*Knight-Ridder Newspapers*) (Blockbuster, Hastings, Video West)

"Radioland Murders" (PG) — It came from the fertile mind of George Lucas, who wrote the original story and acted as executive producer. At 50, he couldn't remember much about the great days and nights of network radio, but he affectionately deals with them.

"Radioland Murders" happens in one long evening in 1939 at radio station WBN in Chicago. The station president, Ned Beatty, presents a

“I think it's a statement by the fans that it's going to take some time,” said Mary Santelman, her Twins earrings dangling in the brisk breeze outside the Metrodome.

The crowd in Atlanta was announced at 26,120, although the actual attendance for the game between the Braves and San Francisco seemed to be around 16,000. Last season, the Braves drew about 44,000 for their second home game.

“The few that are here are enjoying the game,” said David Justice, who hit the winning home run for Atlanta. “Those who are away are missing some good baseball.”

A Braves fan sitting alone in an upper-deck section in center field placed signs in a dozen seats around him that said “Striking Fan.”

But in between the political bungle and tactical mistakes, America3 left its mark on the sail, male-centered world of yacht racing.

“They went from being considered a joke to being a team that Dennis Conner and his crew could get drunk over beating,” America3 team boss Bill Koch said Thursday.

“They were no longer viewed as the girls, but those SOB's on Mighty Mary (their boat).”

From the beginning, America3 was a fascination. An all-women crew racing men? It was an audacious plan that stirred up the clamish sailing world, recalling other inter-gender matches, such

as Billie Jean King's tennis victory over Bobby Riggs.

And there were highlights right off the bat for this mix of Olympic sailors and women with no boating experience. One former crew member was even taken from the TV show “American Gladiators.”

Sailing in the boat gave Koch the 1992 Cup. America3 bumped off Conner in the very first race in January.

The team quickly stalled, however, and it wasn't until the fourth round, with the team at 3-13, that America3's new boat — christened Mighty Mary after Koch's mother — was ready to race.

While Mighty Mary was perhaps the speediest of the defender boats, America3 continued to slump.

Heading into the semifinals with a 5-15 record, Koch replaced America3 tactician J.J. Iler with Cup veteran Dave Dellenbaugh, thereby transforming it into the women-and-one-man crew.

Jordan prepares for playoff series

Garbage time is over for Michael Jordan. The Chicago Bulls' regular season "garbage" begins Friday night when the Bulls visit the Charlotte Hornets in the opener of their best-of-5 playoff series.

Jordan led the Bulls to three straight titles before leaving basketball to pursue a baseball career. He returned to the NBA in March and led Chicago to a 13-4 record down the stretch, an impressive run that has made the Bulls the title favorite even though they probably won't have the home-court advantage in any series.

"I wouldn't have come back if I didn't think we were capable of winning," Jordan said.

Three other superstars — David Robinson, Shaquille O'Neal and Charles Barkley — also lead their teams into the playoffs Friday night. Unlike Jordan and the Bulls, however, their teams will start the postseason at home.

Robinson's San Antonio Spurs, who had the NBA's best record (62-20), play the Denver Nuggets, who won Seattle in the first round last year when the SuperSonics had the league's best record.

O'Neal's Orlando Magic meet the Boston Celtics, who have the worst record of any playoff team. And Barkley's Phoenix Suns, who lost their favorite status after Dan-

ny Manning's season-ending knee injury on Feb. 6, face the Portland Trail Blazers.

The playoffs started Thursday night with four games — Cleveland at New York, Atlanta at Indiana, Houston at Utah, and the Los Angeles Lakers at Seattle.

The Spurs, who feature a potent punch underneath with Robinson and rebounding leader Dennis Rodman, intend to stay with their power game.

"I've got to attack the basket," said Robinson, whose 27.6 scoring average was third in the league behind O'Neal and Houston's Hakeem Olajuwon.

"You're going to get a foul or you're going to get two points most of the time. As long as I'm going at the hole and dunking, it's going to be to our advantage."

Rodman, who returned to the lineup two weeks ago after missing 14 games with a separated shoulder, has been working his way back into top form.

"Dennis is trying to get the feel for what we're trying to do," Robinson said. "He's been great at practice."

Orlando's 57-25 record was best in the East, but the Magic slumped at the end of the season. They were 4-7 in April, including seven straight road losses.

"Defense is what causes us problems," O'Neal said. "If we don't come down and stop some people, we're in for some long nights."

Teen pleads guilty in death of Michael Jordan's father

LUMBERTON, N.C. (AP) — A

teen-ager pleaded guilty Thursday in the murder of Michael Jordan's father and agreed to testify against another man, almost two years after the killing helped push Jordan into retiring from basketball.

Larry Martin Demery, 19, faces a minimum of life in prison on the first-degree murder charge. He told Judge Gregory Weeks he understood he also could face the death penalty.

Sentencing will be delayed until after the trial of Daniel Green, 20, who is also charged in the July 23, 1993, killing of James Jordan. That trial has not been scheduled.

Jordan, 56, was shot as he napped in his car on the shoulder of an highway south of town, while taking a break on a trip from Wilmington to Charlotte. His body was later found in a South Carolina swamp.

Demery originally pleaded innocent, but told police in August 1993 he helped dispose of Jordan's body.

Green maintained his innocence during a telephone interview with Durham TV station WTVD after Thursday's hearing.

"He told me not to tell the police anything and I didn't tell police anything to incriminate him," Green said. "I feel stupid as hell, to be honest with you."

Michael Jordan, in Charlotte for the NBA playoffs against the Charlotte Hornets, said "Nope, none at all," when asked if he had any reaction.

He walked through a crowd of reporters, refused to answer questions, hopped into a car with a friend and drove off.

James Jordan died just a month after watching his son lead the Chicago Bulls to a third NBA title. Michael Jordan said his decision to retire had been in the making before his father's murder, "but I think what it made me realize is how short life is."

Knicks overpower Cavs, 103-79

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Knicks tormented the Cleveland Cavaliers' walk-the-ball defensive strategy Thursday night, running away with the opener of their NBA playoff series.

The Cavs, who scored the fewest points and gave up the fewest in the NBA's last 40 years, stayed in the game for one period before the Knicks took control with 15-0 and 18-2 spurts on the way to a 103-79 victory. Cleveland missed 26 of 37 shots in the second and third periods when New York turned the game into a rout.

Patrick Ewing scored 21 points,

Charles Oakley 19, Derek Harper 16 and Charles Smith 14 for the Knicks, whose 95.1 points allowed per game in the regular season was a distant second in the NBA to Cleveland's defensive average of 89.8.

But the Cavs' biggest concern has to be at the offensive end, where they managed an average of just 90.5 points.

Reserves Danny Ferry and Tony Campbell were the only Cleveland players in double figures with 20 and 13 points, respectively. Mark Price, slowed by an inflamed tendon in his left foot, finished with six

points on 1-for-6 shooting. Game 2 will be played Saturday at Madison Square Garden before the best-of-5 series moves to Cleveland on Monday night.

The Cavs, who trailed by as many as 16 points in the second quarter, closed to 51-45 in the third period before Harper scored nine points during the 18-2 burst that made it 69-47 with 2:45 left. Harper finished with 11 points in the quarter.

New York took control in the second quarter with the 15-0 run, which extended a 1-point lead to 42-26. Cleveland didn't score a point for

6:20; missing eight consecutive shots during the scoring drought. Two Three-pointers by Ferry helped the Cavs, who were 5-for-18 in the period, close to a 47-38 deficit at halftime.

After the Knicks scored the game's first six points, Cleveland rallied to tie the score 24-24 on Ferry's 3-pointer with 47 seconds left in the opening quarter. But Oakley's 3-pointer at the buzzer gave New York a 27-24 edge.

Tony Campbell's jumper closed the Cavs within one before Smith's consecutive baskets started the Knicks' 15-0 burst.

Pacers step past Hawks

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The Atlanta Hawks lost their offense at the right time for the Indiana Pacers.

Indiana trailed 60-50 with 8:30 remaining in the third quarter, but the Hawks went more than six minutes

without a field goal and the Pacers went on to a 90-83 victory Thursday night in the opening game of their Eastern Conference playoff series.

"We went a little too much 1-on-1," Atlanta coach Lenny Wilkens said of the dry spell when the Pacers outscored his team 16-2. "We didn't execute offensively. That means, when you don't execute offensively, it puts the pressure on your defense."

The Hawks were 11-for-34 from the field in the second half and had 11 turnovers over the final two quarters when they scored only 35 points.

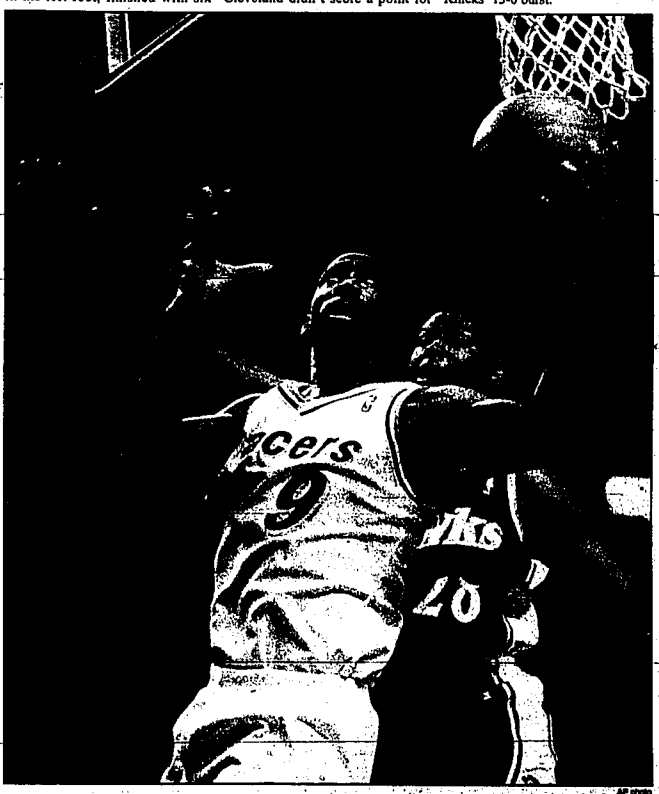

3 share lead after 1st-round play

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Dottie Mochrie, Colleen Walker and Kris Tschetter shot 6-under-par 66s Thursday to take the first-round lead in the \$1.2 million Sprint Championship.

Sixty-two golfers from the field of 144 broke par Thursday, the first day of competitive golf at the new course that's part of the LPGA's national headquarters.

Mochrie, Walker and Tschetter share a one-stroke lead over Dawn Coe-Jones and Marta Figueras-Dotti, both of whom posted 5-under 67s.

Seven players were two strokes behind the leaders, while 16 were three strokes behind at 69.

Tschetter posted a bogeyless, six-birdie round despite hitting just six fairways.

"That's hard to do," she said. Tschetter also made it to the top despite making the turn at 1-under. She shot a back-nine 31, powered by three straight birdies on Nos. 15-17.

"I didn't hit my driver well, but I did hit my irons real well," she said. "I usually make a lot of birdies but have a lot of bogeys, too. So today was fun. When you don't have any bogeys, it's a lot easier."

Mochrie and Walker both had seven-birdie, one-bogey rounds, which was a tonic to both players who are

coming back from injuries. Mochrie, who took six weeks off earlier this year to rest an injured rotator cuff, said she was still recovering.

"I'm obviously very playable, but I'd like it to be better," she said. Mochrie used strong iron play to claim her share of the lead. Only two of her seven birdies came on putts longer than 15 feet, and one of those — from 25 feet — came after a 4-iron from a fairway bunker.

"That one ought to get me on an ESPN highlight," she said. Mochrie also credited an early tee time, which helped her avoid gusting afternoon winds.

Walker, who had off-season surgery to remove a cyst from her left knee, still cannot squat down to read putts, but didn't let that hurt her performance.

The 1989 Vireo Trophy winner rolled in two birdie putts from 20 feet, two more from 15 and another from 10.

"If you are driving the ball well, this course gives you a lot of opportunities to get the ball close on the greens," she said. "If you can hit it within 20 feet, you have a realistic chance to make a birdie because the greens are so good."

The winner of the 72-hole event will earn \$180,000.

"I made a couple of good putts to start with," Rintoul said. "On the second hole I had a very difficult putt. It was only 15 feet but it was up and over and down. It was very quick going toward the hole."

"It was just like it was perfect. I went, 'Oh wow, this is pretty fun.'" Rintoul played early in the day and then watched as others tried to beat his score. He had six birdies and no bogeys and a par-saving putt on No. 10 kept his momentum going.

Peter Jacobsen, the tour's leading money winner, led a group of four one-shot back at 67. He was joined by hometown favorite Billy Ray Brown, Wayne Levi and Jim Furyk.

"The last month, I've been plagued by bad putting," he said. "But today I got started with a couple of good putts and I just stayed with it for the whole round."

Rintoul added another birdie on No. 6, hitting a sand wedge within 8 feet of the cup and sinking the putt. But he kept his round going on No. 10 with a 10-foot par putt out of a bunker.

Beginning on the par 3 No. 14, Rintoul birdied three of the next four holes to secure his first day lead. He hit a 5-iron within 2 feet and birdied No. 14. He two-putted from 20 feet for his birdie on No. 15.

"Last night, I was on the putting

green pretty late and I just was trying to free things up a little bit, walk behind the ball, see the line, walk in, take no practice strokes and just put it," Rintoul said. "I wanted to put like you would if you're out there on the putting green with your buddies."

Jacobsen's round featured a 30-foot putt for an eagle on the par-5 No. 15. "I really stepped on a drive and hit a 3-wood right on the middle of the green and made about a 30-footer for eagle," Jacobsen said.

Jacobsen went to 4-under quickly, starting his round on the back side. He chipped in from 20 feet on No. 11, three-putted for a bogey on the next hole and then had birdie putts of 15 and 8 feet, leading to his eagle.

Jacobsen has won two tournaments this year and has finished second twice and third once.

U of I alum's return upsets Saints officials

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Doug Nussmeier, the New Orleans Saints' third-string quarterback, will be in town for the team's minicamp this weekend and Saints officials aren't happy about it.

Nussmeier, a fourth-round pick in last year's draft after an outstanding career at the University of Idaho, dropped out of the European-based World League of American Football, unhappy with the limited playing time he had with the Rhein Fire in Germany.

"He only took 14 snaps in the first two games and didn't play in the third," player personnel director Bill Kuharich said on Thursday. "I recommended that he stay, the coaches left it up to him and he decided he'd come back and work here."

Nussmeier had split time with former Tennessee quarterback Andy Kelly as backup to Gino Torretta on the Düsseldorf-based Fire.

Nussmeier threw nine passes in three games for the Fire, completing four of 27 yards. He had one interception and no touchdowns.

The Saints hoped Nussmeier would gain playing experience in the World League. The league was supposed to provide equal playing time for any NFL quarterbacks agreeing to play in its 10-game spring season.

"I would have liked to see him stay and improve his skills in live work and in the drills and practice," Kuharich said. "Who knows what would have happened in the next seven games. Look at Ralph Dawkins."

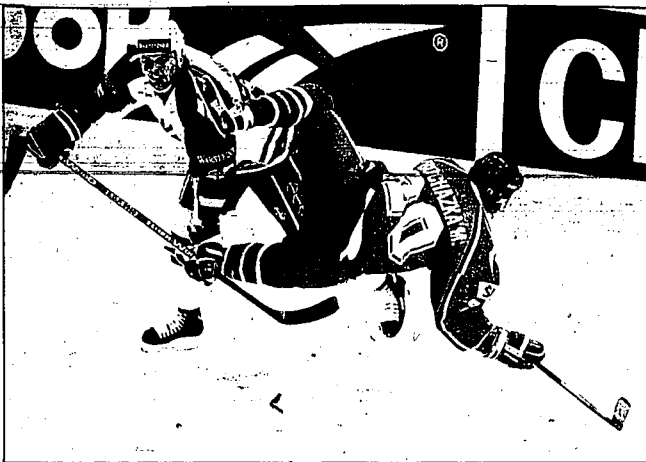
Dawkins, another Saints player in the World League, leads the league in rushing.

U.S. goes for a medal on ice

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — The United States has not won a medal in the World Hockey Championships since NHL players made their debut in 1977.

Not even with stars like Brett Hull, Pat LaFontaine, Brian Leitch, Jeremy Roenick or Mike Richter.

Now a poorly prepared team manned by minor leaguers, collegians and two European-based players is off to a 3-0 start in pool B and brimming with confidence.

The Americans, who didn't play a single warmup game and only worked out twice on the large European ice sheet before the tournament, held off the Czech Republic 4-2 Thursday to clinch a quarterfinal berth in the championships.

"Our goal was to get to the medal round," said U.S. coach Jeff Sauer. "It's tremendous for our standpoint."

Brett Hauer, who played for the Swedish Elite League team AIK Stockholm this season, Jon Morris, Paul Stanton and Tim Berglund scored for Team USA.

"It was an excellent, excellent victory for us," Sauer said. "I don't think anyone that came to the arena today felt we had a chance to win."

"The only guys that felt we could win were our 20 players."

At Gavle, Andrew McKim scored three goals as Canada beat Germany 5-2 in pool A.

Thomas Brandl had both goals for Germany as it lost its third consecutive match. The victory gave Canada a 2-1 record at the 12-nation tournament.

In the U.S. victory, Pat Jablonski, the Toronto Maple Leafs' third-string goalie, had another outstanding game for the Americans.

"He was the player of the game. He really played extremely well," Sauer said.

But Jablonski's shutout bid was spoiled late in the third period when Pat Neaton took a tripping penalty at 12:34 and Roman Horak tapped in the puck from closer range just nine seconds into the power play.

Antonin Stavjara connected with one timer at 16:53 to make it 3-2, moments after the Americans had killed off yet another penalty.

Foreman plans fight rematch

NEW YORK (AP) — George Foreman's next bout likely will be a rematch with Axel Schulz in Germany in September.

Bob Arum, the promoter for the heavyweight champion, said Thursday such a fight could mean a \$25 million to \$30 million payday for Foreman.

The 46-year-old champion earned \$10 million in his disputed majority decision over Schulz in Las Vegas last Saturday. Foreman, his eye swollen shut, barely leapt at the German in retaining his IBF title.

"Fighting Schulz in Germany, the gate would be over \$20 million at the Olympic stadium in Munich," Arum said of the 80,000-seat proposed site. "It would probably be September 9th or 16th and will definitely be on pay-per-view."

Foreman is to be honored as the fighter of the year at the annual Boxing Writers Association of America dinner Friday, and Arum plans on meeting with the champion before the weekend in New York.

University presidents vote to move conference office

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — Six university presidents and the new commissioner have decided to move the Big Sky Conference offices from Boise to Ogden, a newspaper reported.

The presidents of the six schools that will remain in the conference after Boise State and the University of Idaho pull out in 1996 decided Wednesday that Ogden is the best home for the league, the Standard-Examiner reported Thursday afternoon.

The presidents talked in a telephone conference with new commissioner Doug Fullerton, who will officially begin the job in June.

"This has mostly been Doug gathering information and then sharing it with the presidents," said Paul Thompson, Weber State University president. The presidents talked with Fullerton for about one-half hour before deciding on Ogden, he said.

Boise State's move to the Big West Conference next year made it illogical to keep the league headquarters in Boise.

The new location of the league office came down to three choices: Ogden, Spokane, Wash., and Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.

"When Doug visited here, he was really impressed with the response of the community leaders," Thompson said.

The easy access to the Salt Lake International Airport from Ogden and direct flights to almost all of the Big Sky's cities were also important factors. Cost of rental space was also an issue.

A date for the league's move has not been set.

Scott Parkinson, president of The Chamber Ogden/Weber, said he and his colleagues spent long hours persuading Fullerton that Ogden should be the home to the Big Sky Conference.

"It's not the typical economical development deal, but we've worked pretty hard on it," Parkinson said. "It is an issue, I think, of bringing a pretty prestigious office to Ogden. It's kind of a notch in Ogden's belt."

"Other schools are saying this should not work to the advantage of Weber State," Thompson said. "We have to be very careful that there isn't any favoritism."

Fullerton, former Montana State University athletic director, was named to replace current commissioner Ron Stephenson, who is retiring in June.

The Big Sky Conference has been in existence since 1963. Expansion is likely with the departure of Boise State and Idaho, Portland State, Southern Utah and Sacramento State have been mentioned as possible candidates.

Tyson returns to boxing ring as commentator

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Mike Tyson returns to the boxing scene Saturday, while plans continue for a possible August return to the ring for his first fight in more than four years.

Tyson will make his first appearance at a boxing show since his release from prison when he serves as a television commentator Saturday for a fight card in Landover, Md.

His appearance comes as promoter Don King works to tie up details of a proposed Aug. 19 fight against Boston's Peter McNeeley at the MGM Grand hotel-casino in Las Vegas.

"He's a warrior and he wants to get back in the ring as soon as he can," Dennis Finfrock, the MGM's vice president of special events, said of Tyson.

Finfrock declined to confirm the Aug. 19 date, saying the hotel had dates in either August or October for Tyson to fight the first of six bouts he signed for earlier with the resort.

He also declined to confirm McNeeley as a possible opponent, saying he was one of several names mentioned as Tyson's first opponent. King, however, reportedly has been negotiating a Tyson-McNeeley fight on that date with pay-per-view and foreign television representatives.

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Fans remember glory days at the Babe's 100th birthday

HEMPSTEAD, N.Y. (AP) — By an accident of age, Hall of Famer Bob Feller and Robin Roberts never had to pitch against Babe Ruth. It was, both agreed on Thursday, their good fortune that things worked out that way.

Feller, Roberts and Harmon Killebrew talked baseball and the Babe at the opening session of the 1994 University's celebration of Ruth's 100th birthday. And they agreed that the Babe was one of a kind, a savior of the game in its darkest days.

"Babe made a lot of people forget the Black Sox scandal," Feller said. "What are they gonna do this year?"

Baseball's current problems played only a small part in the dialogue as Feller, Roberts and Killebrew preferred to talk about the game's glory days, a time when Ruth planted the seeds of its popularity.

Ruth retired the year before Feller reached the majors. They did cross paths, though, just two months before his death in 1948. Ruth made one last appearance at Yankee Stadium. He stood leaning on a bat in a photo that won the Pulitzer Prize.

"That was my bat," Feller said. "He came up the runway and he was very thin, emaciated. Our first baseman, Eddie Robinson, grabbed a bat and handed it to him and he leaned on it. His voice was almost gone but he said, 'It feels good.'"

"Robinson said, 'It should. It's your model.'"

What was Feller, a pitcher, doing with a Babe Ruth bat? "I used it to bump," he said.

Roberts and Feller agreed on how they would pitch to Ruth. "I'd do anything to keep it away from the meat of his bat," Feller said. "Sliders belt high and in on him. You'd never want to get the ball out and away from him."

Feller figured only two things could happen if you made a mistake with Ruth. "He might hit it out of the park or he might hit it back through the box."

Roberts recalled talking about Ruth with Cy Perkins, a coach with Philadelphia who had played with the Babe. "He told me stories about what an explosive guy Babe was," Roberts said. "He told me everytime Ruth hit a homer, he'd

come back to the dugout and say, 'Can the Babe hit 'em?'"

Roberts said Ruth's homers could fool a pitcher. "They just kept going up," he said. "They just took off and went where they couldn't catch them."

The only time Roberts ever met Ruth was in spring training of 1948 when the pitcher was just a rookie with the Phillies. "Babe came walking by, talking to a sports writer," he said. "I was warming up. My mom was a big fan of his so I got a ball and got him to sign it."

"I still have the ball. Eat your hearts out."

Killebrew had a couple of years when he made runs at Ruth's record of 60 homers in a season. In 1961, when Roger Maris broke the record with 61, Killebrew hit 46, tied with Jim Gentile for third in the American League.

He recalled talking with Maris after the season. "He said to me, 'I wish I'd never hit 61.' They loved Babe so much, nobody wanted to see the record broken."

"Joe Dugan said, 'You had to understand Babe. He wasn't human.' But maybe Tommy Henrich said it best. He said Judge Landis cleaned up the game and Babe Ruth glorified it."

Feller chuckled at the trouble or any other team, to give him a chance at managing. "Babe called everybody, 'Kid.' He didn't know half the players' names," he said. "If he was making out the lineup, there'd be nine 'Kids,' in it."

"One of the problems," Roberts said, "is that just because we play the game, we think we can end up in the executive end of it. It doesn't always work that way."

Ralph Kiner, unable to attend the celebration because of his broadcasting schedule, sent a video. "People wonder what he'd hit today," Kiner said.

"I think he'd hit about 20 homers. You might say, 'Is that all?' but you'd have to remember, he'd be 100 years old."

Top jobs may be in computers, health care

If a certain new lifestyle magazine is right, the glamour jobs of the future will bear such cryptic titles as "Internet surfer," "interactive advertising executive," and "cyberdetective." Whatever that is.

The most endangered jobs of the next decade, on the other hand, possess such simple, humdrum titles as "secretary" and "cashier." Jobs categories judged to lack bright futures — according to P.O.V. magazine — include bank teller, telephone operator, factory worker, government bureaucrat, and (alas) newspaper reporter.

It would seem from this selection that the future will be made from bytes and digits instead of paper, metal, and cash.

But take heart. Depending on those that you read, there still may be a few human-to-human jobs in the new millennium.

P.O.V. also predicts a bright future for such familiar jobs as nurse practitioner, physical therapist and (for those awkward moments when nursing and therapy fail) mortician. And there are other job lists — and other

points of view — out there.

Carol Kleiman, a business columnist for the Chicago Tribune and author of "The 100 Best Jobs for the 1990s and Beyond" (Berkley, \$5.50), predicts that 90 percent of the new jobs in the next decade will be service-related, not manufacturing, and 30 of the 100 categories listed in her book involve health care.

This doesn't mean you'll need to be a brain surgeon to get a job; on the contrary, many of the most abundant service- and health-service-related jobs will be at the bottom rungs of the job

LIGHT READING: The idea of reading a corporate annual report may put many people to sleep. A lot of numbers, maybe a few pictures of products like snack foods, or workers in hard hats. But some annual reports may prompt readers to do a little wistful daydreaming. Like Daimler Benz's report, complete with pictures of sleek luxury cars. Or Tiffany's 1994 report — the inside-front-and-back-overs feature pictures of glittering diamonds, gleaming silver and lustrous pearls. Neither report lists prices, but the Tiffany report does tell shareholders how they can get the jeweler's catalogs.

ENDANGERED CRACKERS: Barnum's Animal Crackers, familiar to consumers because of their red and yellow boxes with circus motifs, are undergoing a temporary transformation. Nabisco Biscuits Co., which makes the cookies, says its turning the generic monkeys, lions and tigers into representations of endangered species through mid-August. The new crackers, in shapes such as the black rhinoceros, blue whale and Chinese alligator, will come in boxes with jungle scenes. The company said it's trying to build awareness about endangered species.

SWIING IN: Time clocks, a symbol of the Industrial Age that require employees to punch in and punch out, may be headed for extinction. Entrepreneur magazine says computers can keep track of workers' comings and goings using card readers that credit cards can be "swiped" through electronic terminals. The computers, including some run by independent payroll processing companies, can adjust employees' pay according to the hours they work.

HIKE: Americans bought fewer pairs of athletic shoes in 1994, and paid less for them, according to the Athletic Footwear Association. The trade group said sneaker sales — including running, tennis and basketball shoes — were down 3.2 percent last year, with the average price of a pair dropping to \$31.19 from \$31.52. Steeper competition among manufacturers and retailers was behind the price slide. But the AFA found that hiking, hunting and fishing boots grew in popularity, with sales rising more than 50 percent.

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


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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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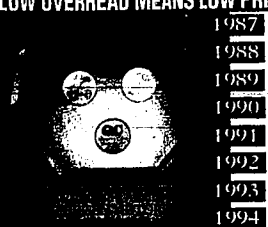
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CBS: Where 'Buffalo Girls' roam

Calamity Jane and Annie Oakley would be delighted that CBS has hired some "big guns" to tell their story.

Academy Award winner Anjelica Huston, two-time Grammy honoree Reba McEntire and Golden Globe winner Melanie Griffith headline a starry cast in "Buffalo Girls," a four-hour adaptation of Larry McMurtry's novel premiering Sunday and Monday, April 30-May 1.

The story revolves around "Calamity" Jane Canary (Huston) and her close friend, brothel owner Dora Du Fran (Griffith). Both women are involved in frustrating romances - Dora with a dashing cowboy named Blue (Gabriel Byrne), "Calam" with Wild Bill Hickok (Sam Elliott).

McEntire co-stars as sharpshooter Oakley, in a cast that also includes Olanark winner Jack Palance, Peter Coyote, Russell Means and Floyd Red Crow Westerman.

The stunning Huston, who has proven she can move effortlessly from poignant drama ("The Witches") to comedy ("The Dead") to high camp (both "Addams Family" movies), says she found fertile acting ground in her complex role.

"There are many myths about Calamity Jane," she says. "In fact, there's evidence to support that there were seven 'Calamity Janes' living in the West at one time.

"Calamity Jane (may have) earned her reputation, her name, for having been a 'buffalo girl.' These were mostly Indian women who hung around army camps and 'serviced' the soldiers for General Cook's army. There's evidence to support that she was one of three women who went on the road with

Cook's army and later became a scout for Custer."

A somewhat more romantic story, the actress says, is that a general whom Cannery rescued on the battlefield bestowed her memorable nickname.

"It's part of what makes her really interesting to play," Huston says, "because there's no solid evidence supporting that she had a baby (or not)."

The baby issue is one major area in which the TV movie veers away from the novel, says producer Suzanne de Passe, something of a self. "McMurtry expert herself," she produced "Lonesome Dove" (for which Huston received an Emmy nomination), "Return to Lonesome Dove," "Lonesome Dove: The Series" and the upcoming "Dove" sequel, "Streets of Laredo."

"We made several changes," writes Larry McMurtry's knowledge and permission," she says. "There were cer-

tain dramatic events that he treated in the novel as a figment of Calamity's imagination, i.e., her daughter Janey. And in our miniseries, Janey exists."

Viewers who know Calamity Jane primarily from the Doris Day musical film of that title may be in for a shock. They won't find Huston warbling that once she had a secret love.

"She was a serious alcoholic," the actress says. "She died of inflammation of the bowels from drinking too much rot-gut. She swore heavily. ... She was, in essence, fearless. And carved out a life for herself in a situation and at a time when it was virtually impossible for a woman to survive in such conditions.

"So, I think, yes, she may have been a tragic figure ultimately, but she lived the way she wanted to live. She was obviously tremendously brave," Huston says.

De Passe says "Buffalo Girls" stumbled in its early development be-

cause Huston, the overwhelming favorite to play Calamity, was not available.

"There was an angel on our shoulder for the project," the producer says, "and given how the schedule changed and things got pushed back, she became available. And I think we have, in Anjelica, the person who was born to play this role and it was written for her without her knowing it."

Born to play Calamity or not, preparing for the rough-and-tumble role was something of a humbling experience, Huston adds good-naturedly.

"Well, I went out with the wranglers - I think the first day I was mule-driving out at this ranch somewhere near here," she recalls drily, "and humiliated myself in front of seven wranglers, attempting to bull-whip. So it became evident I needed a little professional help."

"I mean, it's balletic. It's very nice. And it's a useful weapon."

My Hollywood spies spotted the couple at a local restaurant recently, celebrating Burt's new movie project: an independently financed western in which Burt will star and direct. His name has come up for other movie parts — maybe not as a sex symbol, but work is work!

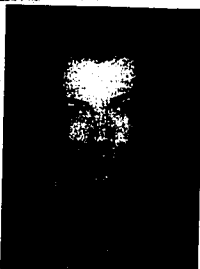

of his easygoing manner. He describes himself as a Midwestern kind of guy who makes the best of things. He also feels his stable home life, with his wife and two sons — 9-year-old Jake and 11-year-old Peter — gives him a solid base.

As for the current resurgence of popularity of "Guiding Light" — currently in its 43rd year on TV (it premiered on radio in 1937) — ver Dorn attributes it to the current cast of wonderful newcomers interwoven with the show's veterans, like himself. He also feels the writers have been very adept in revisiting old storylines as jumping-off points.

As for Ross Marler's appeal, ver Dorn laughed and said he thinks it has a great deal to do with the fabulous women Ross has lost. "I'm one of those actors who likes to do supporting roles, and I have no objections when my storyline is of the back-burner variety. When you are on a show for as long as I have been, you go through cycles when you're in the thick of the plot or at the edges."

These days Ross Marler is prominently involved in the storyline, and perhaps Jerry ver Dorn will finally win the Emmy he so richly deserves.

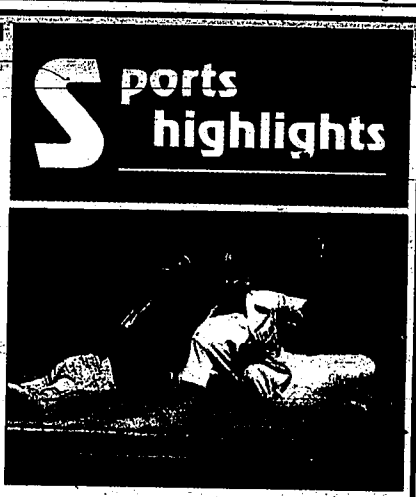

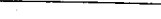
