# Deadly virus spreads

**KINSHASA, Zaire** — Fearful that the deadly Ebola virus would spread beyond central Zaire, officials Thursday imposed more restrictions on travel and advised people to stay off the streets in the city where the outbreak began.

In Kikwit, a city of 600,000 about 370 miles east of the capital of Kinshasa, health and government officials closed schools and health clinics, canceled flights and advised people to stay at home. Work in the agriculturally important area stopped.

Dozens of people in the region have died so far. The number of deaths has been difficult to nail down because of conflicting reports and the uncertainty that Ebola was the cause of all deaths.

Health officials also were investigating a possible second outbreak of the virus in a hospital in the village of Musango, 60 miles from Kikwit. A nurse who had worked in the Kikwit hospital where the epidemic began died in the village.

The 350-bed hospital was nearly empty when health experts arrived Thursday to investigate.

To contain the virus, the hospital was cleared except for infected patients and hospital staff exposed to the virus, about 20 people total, said Doctors Without Borders spokeswoman Veerle Eygenraam.

Another 100 people in Kikwit were confined to their homes because they had been exposed to the virus, in most cases by a family member who had died, Eygenraam said.

"It is quite serious because it is a very infectious virus. But we have found out about it very early and in hospitals, and we have taken all the necessary measures to decrease transmission," Eygenraam said.

An Italian nun who worked at the Kikwit hospital, 48-year-old Daniela Ingelina Sorti, died Thursday, Eygenraam said. Two other members of the Poverelle order were in serious but stable condition at the hospital, and 12 nuns were continuing their work there, said a Poverelle nun in Kinshasa, Sister Mauricia.

"We will continue our work, despite the risks. We cannot abandon them now," she said, struggling to hold back tears.

A Doctors Without Borders team arrived in Kikwit on Thursday to try to contain the virus and determine whether it had spread beyond them and we're not sure where it has spread, especially in the villages," said Eygenraam.

Beside Musango, aid workers were concerned that the virus may have spread to two other villages.

# Suicidal terrorist threat high

**WASHINGTON** — Senior U.S. intelligence officials warned Thursday that the United States faces a greater risk of being targeted by international terrorists than ever before, largely because factions from the Middle East and elsewhere have recruited extremists who no longer seem to fear getting caught.

At a time when the Oklahoma City bombing has increased the awareness in the United States of the threat from domestic terrorism, intelligence officials said they fear the 1993 World Trade Center bombing may have convinced international terrorists that attacks against the United States can succeed if those involved are willing to face arrest.

Officials said the effectiveness of U.S. law enforcement once appeared to inhibit attacks aimed directly at the United States, but "suicidal" terrorists are no longer deterred by the likelihood of capture.

In addition, new, extremist terrorist organizations no longer seem to be held back by any political concerns that attacks against Americans inside the United States would go against their own interests. Many of these new groups are small ad hoc units that are extraordinarily difficult to infiltrate, officials said. Yet despite their small organizations, they are capable of using sophisticated chemical, biological or other weapons of mass destruction.

In a wide-ranging review of the global terrorist threat, intelligence officials noted that there have been 132 international terrorist incidents so far in 1995, up from 105 in 1994. The United States like Oklahoma City — up sharply from last year.

Increasingly, officials said they are concerned that new terrorist cells are able to draw on a wide range of financial resources from private financial networks in the Middle East that are supplementing the backing terrorists now receive from Iran and other nations.

Officials noted one wealthy Saudi, emigre living in the Sudan, Osama Bin Laden, has become a major backer for Islamic terrorist organizations in Egypt and the Middle East. Ladin, who has been stripped of his Saudi citizenship for his extremist activities, is said to be a student of anti-American, and represents the new breed of Islamic fundamentalist extremists who believe in targeting the United States.

# Bomb threat closes Salt Lake City federal offices

**SALT LAKE CITY** — For the second time in a week, a bomb threat forced the closure of the federal building in Salt Lake City Thursday.

James Whimpey of the General Services Administration, which oversees federal buildings, said FBI investigators told him of a letter that threatened that a bomb would go off Thursday at the Wallace F. Bennett Federal Building and at buildings in two other cities. As a result, doors to the Salt Lake building were locked and most of the 700 workers were told to go home. The building also was closed last Friday after a bomb threat to the structure was called into a private medical center in Ogden.

"It was a joint decision between law enforcement agencies and the tenants in the building that they would prefer to keep it closed today," Clair Green, spokeswoman for the General Services Administration in Denver, said Thursday.

Whimpey said a bomb threat team from Salt Lake City International Airport searched the building early Thursday and did not find anything. Officials had not decided whether to close the building on Friday.

The letter detailing the threat was signed "the Aryan Nation" and from claimed the group was responsible for the Oklahoma City bombing.

A copy obtained by the Deseret News states: "On May 11, 1995, there will be three bombs go off larger than Oklahoma City. We, the Aryan Nations, will take responsibility for Oklahoma City. Don't forget May 11, 1995, three bombs will be set off within the country. Salt Lake is one city. You must pay and respect the Aryan Nations."

Leaders of the Aryan Nations based in Hayden Lake, Idaho, say they had

nothing to do with a bomb threat.

"Terroristic threats are totally prohibited by Aryan Nations, and if any of our members ever issue such threats, they will not be members any more," said Tim Hushup, executive assistant to organization president Richard Butler. Butler characterized the letter as "Jewish propaganda" and blamed the Anti-Defamation League.

"They can stir up all the media by sending false faxes. That's the name of the game," said Butler, whose group's full name is the Church of Jesus Christ Christian Aryan Nation.

Anastasiya Steinberg, regional director of the Anti-Defamation League in San Francisco, called Butler's response "outrageous."

"He's a neo-Nazi and he's praised Hitler so it doesn't surprise me that he targets us as a scapegoat," she said. "We can assess that we are doing a good job when hate mongers are upset with us."

Copies of the bomb threat came in a single page, handwritten letter.

# 'Twitch' may warn of impending earthquake

**MAYSWORTH** — An earthquake may twitch before — numbers, researchers say.

And if that slight seismic signal can be detected, it might be possible to predict the big one before it happens. Government and Stanford University seismologists who analyzed and amplified the records of ground motion from each of 30 earthquakes said they found

evidence of a pattern of very faint, irregular motion that immediately precedes a quake.

"An earthquake doesn't start going rapidly from the very beginning," Gregorio Berzosa, a Stanford University geologist, said Thursday. "There is a weak or tentative stage."

The discovery of this prequake tentative stage means there may be an even earlier phase that signals the start of the earthquake process.

If such early signals exist, said Berzosa, there is the theoretical possibility of predicting earthquakes.

Berzosa and William Ellsworth of the U.S. Geological Survey report in the journal Science that the size and duration of the slow slip phase also may predict the magnitude of the eventual quake. James R. Rice, a Harvard University geophysicist, said the study by Berzosa and Berzosa keeps alive the promise of being able to predict earthquakes.

The fact that they see some systematic thing going on (before an earthquake) does hint that there is a preparation phase," said Rice. "It does give an optimism that there is something there to be discovered."

The research, he said, shows that an earthquake is not abrupt, but that "there are starts and stops before it breaks out." In their study, Berzosa and Ellsworth found cycles of slight and background motion just before the main earthquake.

### Idaho weather summary

Moist and unstable air persisted over Idaho Thursday. Rain showers fell in the eastern and central sections with scattered showers in the west and Panhandle. Heavy showers developed over the Magic Valley early in the afternoon.

Among the precipitation reports were: Reargue, 1.5 inch; Mullin, 4.3; Moscow, 4.2; Lowell, 3.4; Grandville, 2.7 and a trace at Coeur d'Alene.

At mid-afternoon, skies were mostly cloudy. Temperatures ranged from the high 40s to the high 50s across the southern sections of the state.

Afternoon winds were generally blowing at 10 to 20 mph from the southwest.

### Rain, thunderstorms spatter much of nation

Rain and thunderstorms zipped across the Northwest and into northern California on Thursday, and showers extended eastward across the northern Great Basin into the Intermountain region.

Severe morning thunderstorms hit northern Florida and across Texas, bringing high winds and hail as large as golf balls to some locations.

Strong winds of more than 40 mph developed across the northern deserts of California, with gusts up to 57 mph recorded at Sandburg and 69 mph at Mojave.

More rain was forecast for the already waterlogged Gulf Coast. A flash flood watch was issued for Thursday night for parts of Mississippi where hundreds of people forced out by the flooding were starting to return home.

The National Weather Service warned that 2 to 4 inches of rain were possible.

From Tuesday night to Wednesday morning in Mississippi, about 19 inches of rain fell on Picaquery, 16.5 inches in Hancock County and 15 inches in Harrison County.

Scattered showers were forecast across the Northwest and Great Lakes into the central Appalachians, while the Southwest was expected to remain dry and warm, with temperatures over 100 degrees in the lower deserts.

A cold front hung over central Washington and Oregon and across northern California. Another Canadian cold front was moving into northern North Dakota and Minnesota.

It was the first Ebola epidemic in 16 years. The virus starts with headaches and fever and leads to severe hemorrhagic fever within days for 80 percent of those infected.

There is no vaccine or treatment for the virus, which Ralph Remington, the assistant director for the World Health Organization in Geneva, called "one of the deadliest viruses we know."

Like the AIDS virus, Ebola is spread through body fluids, secretions, not casual contact. But those infected with Ebola become sick almost immediately and are unlikely or unable to pass it on unknowingly.

The CDC in Atlanta identified the virus after testing blood samples from victims in Zaire, said Philip A. Shott, a WHO spokesman.

Doctors Without Borders reported Thursday from Brussels, Belgium, that 170 people had died since hemorrhagic fever was reported in Kikwit a month ago, but later backed down from this figure.

In Kinshasa, Doctors Without Borders spokesman Evgene Gama said 20 deaths from Ebola were confirmed as of Tuesday and 10 others died from bloody diarrhea, which may have been caused by Ebola or the bacteria shigella.

The Zairian Secretary General for Health Longanga Benda confirmed 28 deaths from the Ebola virus since late March.

In Kikwit, Doctors Without Borders is helping the government launch an education program to prevent the spread of the disease.

It is believed the virus has been spread when people tending to sick victims have come in contact with blood and vomit.

People will be urged to avoid such contact and to observe good hygiene.

There have been three previous outbreaks, two of which originated in hospitals with very poor hygiene, WHO officials said.

## Ebola virus

At least 100 people in Zaire have died from a virus believed to be Ebola.

In 1976, 274 people died in an Ebola outbreak in Yambuku, Zaire. The virus is named for the Ebola River. Ebola is spread through body fluids and secretions, but not through casual contact.

At least 10 people in Mosango are infected. Three have died.

The 600,000 residents of Kikwit were placed under quarantine Tuesday.

**Ebola (Fiebrivus):** Ebola was considered the most deadly virus before the appearance of HIV, which causes AIDS.

**Incubation:** 5 to 10 days

**Symptoms:** Rash, Headache, Fever and chills, Abdominal pain, Diarrhea

**After symptoms develop:**

- 4 to 5 days - fever becomes severe
- 6 to 7 days - blood loss may follow, severe hemorrhaging occurs
- Death usually occurs around the ninth day.
- Ebola kills about 90 percent of those it infects and there is no treatment or vaccine.

# Scientist testifies about certain link of blood donor to Simpson

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A scientist intricately linked O.J. Simpson's DNA type Thursday to a blood spatch found near two bodies, concluding there was less than a one-in-170-million chance that any one other than Simpson left that genetic fingerprint.

Robin Cotton, the director of Cellmark Diagnostics, who spent three days leading jurors down an elaborate blood trail toward Simpson, also used complex calculations to closely link Simpson to four other drops of blood collected from the crime scene and his mansion.

But under cross-examination, she told defense lawyer Peter Neufeld the figures ignore possible tampering or contamination and do not say when or how the blood was deposited.

The most astronomical figures Cotton provided involved a pair of socks found near Simpson's bed. Cotton said one sock contained the DNA type of Simpson's slain ex-wife, Nicole Brown Simpson. Asked how many other whites shared that DNA type, Cotton said one in 9.7 billion.

Prosecutor George Clarke noted the figure was larger than the Earth's population, estimated at 5.5 billion, meaning that Ms. Simpson was literally the only person whose blood could be on that sock.

The results, while presenting a powerful courtroom show for jurors, didn't answer many questions already raised by Simpson's defense, including whether the blood samples were collected improperly and how Simpson's blood and that of the two murder victims arrived at the places where they were found.

Neufeld offered a hypothetical situation in which blood swatches were contaminated with other blood during police laboratory handling.

"So if the samples were subject to cross-contamination, those numbers wouldn't mean anything?" Neufeld asked Cotton.

"They mean what they mean," Cotton responded. "They don't mean anything else."

She acknowledged there is no test to determine the age of blood drops and none to detect tampering before samples arrive at her laboratory.

Neufeld later read a list of 25 scientists and asked Cotton if she knew each one. Clarke objected repeatedly, calling the names irrelevant. When Neufeld tried to introduce a letter the scientists had submitted to a journal, Clarke argued that the letter had been rejected.

Judge Lance Ito ordered the jurors out of the room and then slapped fines on both attorneys.

"Both counsel are sanctioned \$250. Get your checkbooks out," Ito snapped.

The fines were paid, the attorneys were re-called and the jurors were taken in and told to regard the exchange.

The statistics presented Thursday and already known to Simpson and his lawyers explained why they are waging a fierce battle to show that blood was either planted or samples were switched by police conspiring to frame Simpson.

# Affidavit: Bomb makings found at Nichols home

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — FBI agents found detonator cord, blasting caps and ground-up ammonium nitrate — the materials used in the federal building bomb — at Terry Nichols' house, according to an affidavit released Thursday.

Nichols, his hands and feet shackled, appeared before a federal magistrate to hear the charges against him. Asked if he had discussed the charges with his lawyer, Nichols responded, "Yes, your honor."

FBI agents found five 60-foot detonator cords with non-electric blasting caps, and a fuel meter, which federal bomb experts said "could be used to obtain the proper volume of diesel oil to ammonium nitrate for a bomb."

Several containers of ground ammonium nitrate also were found, which the affidavit said "can be used as one ingredient of a booster for a fertilizer-fuel oil bomb."

A preliminary hearing for Nichols was scheduled for May 18. Timothy McVeigh, the only other person to be charged in the worst terrorist bombing on U.S. soil, has already had his preliminary hearing.

Thursday's hearing was held in a makeshift courtroom, set up in a visitation room at the federal prison in El Reno, where both suspects are being held.

Wearing a dingy white T-shirt and rumpled olive pants, Nichols sat hunched over the defense table. He was escorted by his attorneys from Kansas, Steve Grader and David Phillips, but the two likely will be replaced by public defenders from Oklahoma.

Interim U.S. Attorney Patrick Ryan asked that Nichols be held until his preliminary hearing, which the defense did not contest.

The FBI affidavit from agent Henry C. Gibbons reveals that on April 15 and 16, days before the ammonium nitrate and fuel oil bomb exploded in Oklahoma City, Nichols purchased diesel fuel from Conoco service stations in Manhattan and Junction City, Kan.

The chief of the FBI explosives laboratory in Washington, James

T. Thurman, concluded that the bomb "would have been constructed over a period of time utilizing a large quantity of bomb paraphernalia," including fertilizer, fuel oil, boosters, detonators or blasting caps, detonation cord, fusing systems and containers, the affidavit said.

Construction of the bomb "would necessarily have involved the efforts of more than one person," Thurman advised.

The 10-page affidavit also confirmed many details about the investigation previously provided by witnesses and official sources. Wearing a bulletproof vest, Nichols was flown Wednesday from Wichita, Kan., where he had been held as a material witness, to prison outside Oklahoma City.

Also Thursday, the General Services Administration awarded contracts to demolish what's left of the federal building using explosives, and to haul away debris. The GSA said the building will be demolished within the next 10

days, depending on further structural checks, preparation and logistical and safety concerns.

Nichols and McVeigh both face the death penalty if convicted in the bombing. Specifically, both are charged with "the malicious damage and destruction" of federal property by means of explosives. Nichols is accused of directly participating in the bombing, as well as aiding and abetting the crime.

Nichols and McVeigh have a long association. After going through Army basic training together and serving in the same company, they ran a military surplus business, sometimes shared a house and traveled together.

They also share an extreme dislike for the federal government. Nichols has tried to renounce his citizenship.

Prosecutors have suggested the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building was deliberately bombed on the second anniversary of the fiery federal raid on the Branch Davidian compound in Waco,

Texas, that ended with the deaths of more than 70 cult members. Nichols and his brother, James, also face unrelated charges of making small explosives in Michigan several years ago. James Nichols was indicted on three counts of explosive charges Thursday by a federal grand jury in Detroit.

Nichols, a slight man with glasses, does not resemble the sketch of a muscular, square-jawed John Doe 2, a person seen with McVeigh in the Ryder office and downtown Oklahoma City.

However, the FBI is investigating whether Nichols' husky 12-year-old son, Josh, could be John Doe 2.

The boy is not believed to be involved with the bombing, but may have been with McVeigh when he rented the truck believed

to have carried the bomb. "Josh told ABC News his father taught him how to make bombs. Asked what they were for, Josh said, 'We just — in Kansas — we just were making them and throwing them. He showed me how to make some.'"

The boy and his mother, Lana Padilla, who is Nichols' ex-wife, were in Oklahoma City today. Padilla told the AP last week that she had been subpoenaed to testify before a grand jury in Oklahoma.

# House GOP ponders Medicare vouchers

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republicans looking for \$283 billion in savings from Medicare are considering converting it into a voucher program, with seniors getting more than \$5,000 a year to buy private insurance.

A list of options drafted by the House Budget Committee also suggests doubling the \$100 annual Medicare deductible and boosting monthly premiums for millions of beneficiaries.

The proposals would extend belt-tightening moves that Congress has taken to hold down payments to hospitals, physicians and other providers, and add many new economy measures.

Rep. Christopher Shays, R-Conn., who heads a health task force for the Budget Committee, was preparing to send committees with jurisdiction over Medicare the list of suggestions, including three different options to reform the \$175 billion insurance program.

Shays did not release details, but a draft document outlined three different "strategies" to overhaul Medicare.

Giving seniors incentives to enroll in health maintenance organizations and other less expensive forms of managed care.

The annual \$100 deductible for physician and outpatient services would be doubled over two years and indexed to inflation.

All beneficiaries' Part B premiums — now \$46.10 a month —

would increase by \$5 to \$6 a year. Beneficiaries would pay up to \$164 a month in premiums if their income exceeded \$70,000 for individuals and \$90,000 for couples.

Starting in 1999, new beneficiaries would be charged \$20 a month more in Part B premiums, chiefly for physicians' services, if they wanted to retain fee-for-service coverage and avoid managed care.

Eventually, Medicare would be converted to a voucher system, with the government making a set contribution to whatever plan the beneficiary chooses. Those who elected more expensive coverage would pay more out of pocket.

Going immediately with a universal Medicare voucher for private coverage. Beneficiaries would pay extra for some coverage and get "a rebate if the plan is less than the worth of the voucher."

The vouchers would be adjusted based on age, gender, location and disability status.

# Militias, neo-Nazis here and abroad build links

For two decades, German prosecutors say, Gary Lauck, a baby-faced, broad-shouldered man who sports a trim Hitler mustache, has plotted Germany's underground extremist scene with swastikas, Nazi flags, antisemitic tracts and how-to manuals for making explosives and firearms.

All of those products, like any Nazi symbol, are banned in Germany. Yet Lauck, 41, mass-produces his propaganda openly and legally in Lincoln, Neb.

Germany's frustrated domestic intelligence agency said it took years to persuade the FBI to help them track down Lauck. Finally, last month, the man dubbed the "Farm Helt Fuehrer" was nabbed in Denmark and now sits in an old red-brick jail in Roskilde, about 35 miles from Copenhagen, awaiting extradition to Germany.

The Oklahoma City bombing has focused attention on militias, groups of Americans who hold paramilitary training sessions and rail against the federal government.

Although the militias often see themselves as part of a distinctively American movement, U.S. and European investigators are also expressing concern about another, internationally connected wing of the far right — groups that participate in a worldwide neo-Nazi network that raises money, recruits members, disseminates propaganda and exchanges strategies and tactics.

So far, no evidence has been found that the Oklahoma bombers were connected to neo-Nazi groups, or had links abroad. But investigators say the American militia movement and the international neo-Nazi network overlap more than the militias' rhetoric suggests.

"The more you look at the militias, the more you see links to neo-Nazi and other far-right groups both here and abroad," said Joseph Melnichak, former police chief of Le Mars, Iowa,

and a long observer of the extremist scene. "The tendency in law enforcement has been to think of these groups as being ineffective because they don't have the numbers. But, these groups network intensively. They trade intelligence. And they are becoming more effective precisely because they are small."

Several neo-Nazi leaders say they have met with militia leaders, spoken at training meetings, and supplied propaganda materials to militias, often secretly. "Because some militias don't like to be open about their commitment to the white-power movement," said Wolfgang Droege, 45, director of the Heritage Front, which bills itself as Canada's largest racist group.

The transatlantic cooperation among several dozen small neo-Nazi groups is a relationship that gives the Americans a sense of self-importance and provides Europeans access to modern technology and a dependable source of propaganda materials.

But until recently, according to intelligence and police sources on both sides of the Atlantic, despite German pleas for a crackdown, U.S. authorities did not see international ties among far-right groups as a matter for high-priority action.

"There's a whole host of neo-Nazi networks that have been emerging over the past 18 months," said Stanley Bedington, a former senior analyst in the CIA's counterterrorism center. "Our intelligence resources have naturally been focused on the groups that give you the greatest heartburn — the Middle East, fundamentalist groups. The neo-Nazis' numbers are not great, but we ignore them at our own peril."

U.S. neo-Nazi groups have about 25,000 hardcore activists and about 200,000 supporters, according to the Center for Democratic Renewal, an organization that monitors far-right groups. In Germany, which has about one-third the population of the United States, authorities estimate the far right has 70,000 supporters.

German police and politicians complain about the reluctance of U.S. authorities to close down neo-Nazi propaganda mills, producers of Nazi computer games and creators of white supremacist music.

"Time and again we have talked to our American friends, but they tell us there is no way within the American legal system to stop the production," Eckart Werthebach, president of Germany's domestic intelligence agency, told German television. "It's somewhat unbelievable, especially as the Americans have reproached us for years for not fighting harder against right-wing activities."

"We're networking today just like leftist groups have for decades," Droege said.

The Heritage Front had about 700 members before it canceled all memberships in 1993 to sidestep a court order banning Droege from contact with the members.

The leadership of the Idaho militia has expanded white supremacist and antisemitic views, as has William Pierce, author of a 1979 novel about a war waged against the U.S. government by militia groups that has circulated widely among such groups here and abroad. Ku Klux Klan leaders have been videotaped leading training sessions in Germany. European and American white supremacists have teamed up to recruit soldiers at U.S. bases in Germany, according to intelligence sources.

# Senators aim to tighten child disability benefits

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators from both parties introduced a bill Thursday to tighten eligibility rules for children with behavior problems who seek federal disability benefits.

The senators' legislation would preserve cash benefits for children from low-income families under the Supplemental Security Income program for the elderly and disabled. SSI is the fastest-growing federal welfare program.

But, the bill also would hold parents more accountable for seeking treatment for their children's disability. It would crack down on adults who coach children to act up in school or deliberately fail tests to qualify for a maximum monthly federal check of \$458.

The House, responding to criticism that children with behavior problems and marginal disabilities were receiving SSI, voted in March to replace cash assistance with services in all but the most serious cases of childhood disability.

The Senate legislation, introduced by Democrats Kent Conrad of North Dakota and Bill Bradley of New Jersey, and Republicans James Jeffords of Vermont and John Chafee of Rhode Island, comes as the Senate

Finance Committee is scheduled to take up welfare reform later this month.

Jeffords said the Senate bill would "combat the current problem that children who are not severely disabled are drawing benefits." At the same time, he said, it would provide benefits to those truly in need and do more to help children move toward self-sufficiency.

The number of children who receive SSI has nearly tripled since the late 1980s, in part because a Supreme Court decision related eligibility rules. There were 837,000 children on the rolls at the end of last year, at a yearly cost to taxpayers of about \$4.7 billion.

SSI benefits in some parts of the country are so common they are known as "crazy checks," according to lawmakers, and there are no limits on the number of children in a family who can receive their own monthly check.

Some lawmakers claim parents are coaching their children to fake mental and behavioral problems when applying for SSI, and complain that there are no incentives for parents to seek treatment for their children once they qualify for assistance.

# Girl goes home after transplant

CLEVELAND (AP) — Someday, Christy Schwartz may tell her little sister how as a baby she saved Christy's life.

Christy, 5, went home from a hospital today, about a month after a transplant of cells from baby Angelina's umbilical cord, aimed at curing Christy's leukemia. Angelina was conceived to give her sister a chance at life.

Christy wore a surgical mask to prevent exposure to germs as she left Rainbow Babies' and Children's Hospital. She was wheeled out of the hospital elevator by her father, Dr. Randy Schwartz. Her mother, Jill, walked alongside.

"So far, so good. She's still very fragile," said Mrs. Schwartz. Doctors remain cautious about whether Christy has been cured, saying it will be years before they can be sure. Dr. Susan Shurm did say the transplant was "very successful," with the only complication so far — a skin-rash-related-to-the-transplant.

## Crew finds Civil War submarine

CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP) — Researchers said Thursday they found a Confederate submarine that went down off the South Carolina coast in 1864 after sinking a Union warship.

It was a discovery for which P.T. Barnum once offered \$100,000. Using metal detectors, archaeologists and divers found wreckage in January that they believed to be the CSS Hunley, researchers said. The object was about 40 feet long and six feet wide, "matching descriptions of the missing submarine."

"It's intact and covered with silt," said Dean Foster, a spokesman for the National Underwater and Marine Agency, a nonprofit foundation.

Divers dug down through 3 feet of silt and came up with what they said was one of the Hunley's observation towers.

The nine-member crew went down with the submarine Feb. 17, 1864, after destroying a Union blockade warship, the USS Housatonic. Foster said it was the first time a submarine sank a warship.

"I wish I had a nickel for every time somebody told me I was wasting my time and the sub wasn't out there," said Clive Cussler, an underwater adventurer and author who spent \$130,000 in a 15-year search for the Hunley.

Many people over the years have tried to find the Hunley, including P.T. Barnum, who once offered \$100,000 for its discovery.

Researchers said that for now they would reveal the shipwreck's exact location only to state officials.

"With the prices on Civil War artifacts, people would just go out and blow her up and sell the parts," Cussler said.

## Pilot killed when stealth fighter crashes

ZUNI, N.M. (AP) — An F-117A stealth fighter from Holloman Air Force Base crashed in a ball of flames, killing the pilot.

Holloman spokesman Bub Pepper said the aircraft was on a routine training mission when the crash happened about 10:25 p.m. Wednesday in the arid foothills of the Zuni Mountains, about five miles south of here.

The Gallup Independent quoted an unidentified witness as saying that he saw a fireball "like the sun coming up" at the time of the crash.

The body of the pilot was recovered from the wreckage today, Pepper said. His identity was withheld pending notification of relatives.

The \$46 million, single-pilot aircraft was assigned to the 49th Flight Wing at Holloman Air Force Base near Alamogordo. The crash site is on the Zuni Indian Reservation, more than 200 miles to the northwest of Holloman.

The cause of the crash was under investigation.

In August 1992, another of the stealth fighters crashed near the base. The pilot was able to eject and was seriously injured.

There have been at least three other known crashes of the once supersecret planes — one when Lockheed was testing the jet, and two fatal accidents in California and Nevada in 1986 and 1987.

## Fleiss' father pleads guilty

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Heidi Fleiss' pediatrician father pleaded guilty Thursday to helping launder hundreds of thousands of dollars for the Hollywood madam.

Under a plea bargain, 61-year-old Dr. Paul Fleiss could get up to 10 months in prison at sentencing Sept. 11.

Federal prosecutors alleged that over three years Fleiss helped hide his daughter's earnings from the exclusive call-girl ring, lied on loan applications and falsely claimed her as an employee in his medical practice.

Prosecutors said he posed as the buyer of a \$1.6 million home that his daughter had actually purchased. He pleaded guilty to conspiracy to defraud the Internal Revenue Service and bank fraud.

Ms. Fleiss, 29, awaits trial in the money-laundering case and will be sentenced on Friday for pandering. She could get up to eight years in prison. She was convicted in December after a sting in which she supplied prostitutes to officers posing as Japanese businessmen.

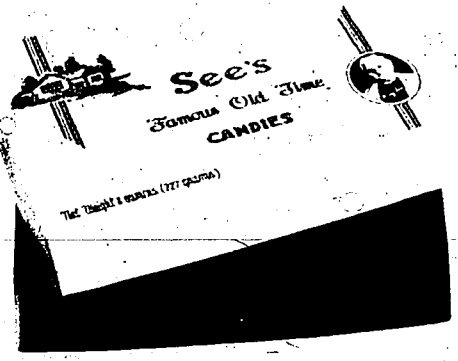

## Editorial

### Del Traveller represents best bet for city schools

Twin Falls voters — and children — are exceptionally lucky to have five well-qualified candidates competing for a single School Board seat.

Such a full field often indicates a school district in crisis. When educational deficiencies or emotional controversies torment a district, partisans from various factions line up for battle.

That's not the case in Twin Falls this year. The five candidates who are seeking to replace the retiring Steve Tolman are generally moderate, sensible people who want to serve their community.

And that befits the condition of the Twin Falls School District. Although things aren't perfect, this is a district where:

- Academic quality is good and rising.
- School construction plans and land acquisition policies are reasonable and in basic sync with the community's needs.
- The sports and extracurricular staff does not wag the academic dog.
- Labor relations are congenial, but the administration has not surrendered control to the teachers union.

An earnest effort is being made to solve troubled students with an alternative program.

As board chairman, Tolman deserves considerable credit for the district's health. To replace him, the district does not need a reformer bent on shaking things up. Fortunately, none of the five candidates has proclaimed such a mission.

In our view, the strongest of the five — Del-Traveller — but each candidate could bring something positive to the seat.

Here's a brief assessment:

**Lori Garmand** — An involved mother of two public-school students,

and as a former kindergarten teacher, Garmand would offer an insider's perspective on education.

**Ray Ware** — As a partner in a CPA firm, Ware offers financial expertise, management know-how and the business community's perspective.

**Jeanie Olsen** — With a background in farming, real estate and motherhood, she'd be a sensible, mainstream voice on the board.

**Ben Windsor** — A parent and a member of the high school's attendance appeals board, Windsor seems in tune with teen-age learners. He also promises to be an independent advocate for taxpayers.

**Del Traveller** — We have one concern about Windsor. Although he insists he has no links to the local activists who perennially assail outcome-based education, he does have their support, and he recently wrote a letter to the editor defending one of them. If his election gave that group a power base on the board, it could create destructive friction.

**Del Traveller** — In our view, he's clearly the strongest candidate. In his job as an Amalgamated Sugar manager and in 15 years as one of the LDS Church's top local officials, lead and decide — the same skills he'll need as a board member.

His Amalgamated job gives him an employer's and manager's viewpoint on educating tomorrow's workers. His seven children (two attending local schools, five already graduated) give him a parent's perspective. He's a moderate, sensible candidate who, in our view, would make an outstanding board member.

Although any of the other four probably would also be up to the job, Traveller has the credentials and the character to perform admirably.

## Election Tuesday

Voters in the Twin Falls School District's Zone 4 will choose from among five School Board candidates Tuesday: Lori Garmand, Jeanie Olsen, Del Traveller, Ray Ware and Ben Windsor are competing to replace retiring board member Steve Tolman. Zone 4 covers the northeast part of town.

In Zone 3, covering the northwest part of town, incumbent Vera Roman is running unopposed for reelection.

Wild rivers and wild fish are part of the history, culture and tradition of Idaho. Salmon and steelhead have survived predators, drought and the onslaught of human civilization. Unfortunately, these fish have not been able to cope with the construction of dams on the waterways through which they make their journey. In 1984, we saw the lowest returns of adult salmon ever. This spring, 1995, could be the last time that salmon head downstream in sufficient numbers to ensure their survival. Salmon and steelhead need help now.

Since the sockeyes were listed as endangered in 1991, the National Marine Fisheries Service has been drafting a recovery plan. This seriously flawed draft plan is now up for review.

The plan recommends continued unsuccessful barging of juvenile salmon around

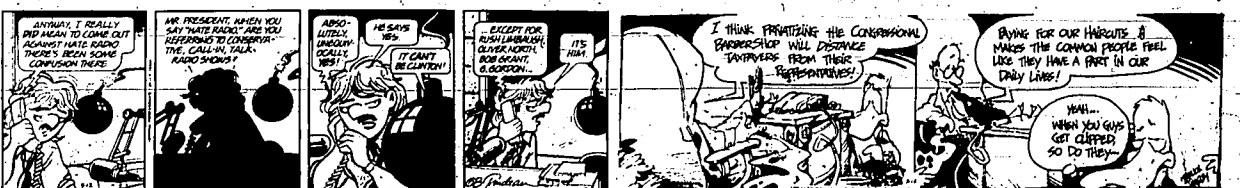
the reservoirs and dams, suggests four more years of needless research and ignores the deadly impact of the Lower Snake and Columbia dams on fish survival.

Some claim we must choose between people and fish. Is a mere dollar and some change per Idaho household per year that much of a sacrifice? That's all the hydropower benefit we gain from the Lower Snake dam system. It seems a small price to pay for the survival of a magnificent native species in our rivers.

# Delegates make Non-Proliferation Treaty permanent

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — A global conference decided Thursday to extend the Non-Proliferation Treaty indefinitely, laying the foundation for the nuclear world of the 21st century.

After 24 days of demands, debate and backroom compromise, the conference approved a U.S.-backed plan to make the 25-year-old pact permanent, perpetuating an international system in which only five nations can legitimately possess nuclear weapons.

The extension, which was agreed to without a vote, was announced by conference President Jayantha Dhanapala of Sri Lanka in a climactic session in the great domed hall of the U.N. General Assembly.

To placate non-weapons states that sought to pressure nuclear powers into moving more quickly on arms control, a non-binding list of disarmament goals was attached to the extension decision.

Those objectives, which include completion of a comprehensive nuclear test ban treaty by next year, are paired with a plan for annual meetings to review progress toward the goals.

Dhanapala described the package as "a fair

and equitable balance of interests."

But after the treaty was formally extended, a handful of delegates took to the floor to register — for the record — their unhappiness with the results.

"It provides a carte blanche to the nuclear powers," said Malaysia's Hasam bin Agam. "Indefinite extension justifies nuclear weapons, and might be interpreted as justifying nuclear weapon states for eternity."

American U.N. ambassador Madeleine K. Albright, meeting later with reporters, described the decision as a "sterling success," and said the United States "refused to be pushed into commitments on arms control and disarmament that we deemed were unsound and unrealistic."

Some disarmament advocates, like many Third Worlders, dismissed the extension scheme as meaningless because the goals are not binding. But others welcomed it as a step forward.

pleased that the treaty, which has largely held the line against the spread of man's deadliest weapons, was being protected.

The extension decision had been delayed by a day because 14 Arab states submitted a last-minute resolution demanding that Israel sign the Non-Proliferation Treaty "without delay" — and, consequently, dismantle its nuclear weapons program.

Israel has said only that it will consider signing the treaty two years after it wins peace agreements with all Middle Eastern states.

Arab and U.S. delegates worked out a compromise resolution, also adopted Thursday, that does not single out Israel. It calls on all states in the region that have not signed the treaty to do so.

The 1970 Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty had only a 25-year guaranteed term. It stipulated that in 1995, member states would have to decide how to extend it — for a fixed period or periods, or indefinitely.

In exchange, the five are supposed to work toward total nuclear disarmament, and the non-weapons states are guaranteed the right to obtain peaceful nuclear technology.

Three nations that have not signed the treaty — Israel, India and Pakistan — have developed nuclear weapons capability. And two signers — Iraq and North Korea — have tried to do so. But the non-proliferation pact otherwise is credited with having averted a nuclear fee-for-all.

Some non-weapons states came to the U.N. conference hoping to win binding commitments from the nuclear powers on total disarmament, possibly even a timetable for negotiating a treaty to abolish nuclear weapons.

Eleven Third World nations proposed extending the treaty only for successive 25-year periods, not indefinitely, so that non-weapons states would retain some leverage over the big powers.

But the United States, Russia, Britain and France gained the support of 107 nations, a comfortable majority, for an indefinite, unconditional extension.

None of the factions wanted to force a vote, however, believing a divisive ballot

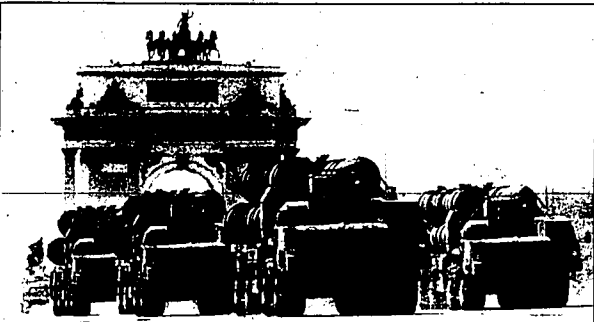
would shake international faith in the all-important treaty.

Instead, Dhanapala, the conference president, cobble together the three-part compromise package — indefinite extension, list of objectives and stronger review process. Non-weapons states had to be satisfied with the non-binding goals for the nuclear powers.

Besides, completion of the test ban treaty, whose objectives include rapid negotiation of a treaty to cut off production of nuclear bomb materials, and an effort to develop air-tight guarantees for non-weapons states that they will never be subject to nuclear attack by the major powers.

Some disarmament advocates hailed the simple fact that the Non-Proliferation Treaty would be made a permanent part of international law. Others saw the conference as a missed opportunity.

## Yeltsin allows help for savers

MOSCOW (AP) — A new law will compensate millions of Russians whose savings have been wiped out by inflation since the collapse of the Soviet Union.

President Boris Yeltsin was forced to sign the Communist-backed legislation Wednesday after vetoing it twice before. The government estimates the law could cost \$100 billion, twice Russia's total budget this year.

The law does not specify how to calculate the value of lost savings or include a mechanism for compensation. Still, Communists say it's an important sign of the government's commitment to cover the costs of economic reforms.

## Iran rounds up currency traders

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Black market currency trading virtually froze in the Iranian capital Thursday in the wake of a reported roundup of dozens of dealers.

The crackdown is aimed at helping pull the Iranian rial out of a nosedive in which it has lost more than a third of its value since April 30, when President Clinton announced a ban on all U.S. trade and investment with Iran.

The currency's plunge indicates a lack of faith in the government's ability to cope with severe economic problems, compounded by the U.S. trade embargo.

## Last ibis eggs unfertilized, leaving bird nearly extinct in Japan

TOKYO (AP) — The eggs laid last month by a created ibis on loan from China were found Thursday to be unfertilized, leaving the showy species on the brink of extinction in Japan, where it once lived in vast colonies.

The created ibis is noted for its red face, pink-tipped wings and gracefully curved beak. It was common throughout East Asia, but declined due to over-hunting

and human encroachment. The borrowed bird had mated with Japan's last male created ibis, Mitori, which died of either illness or old age late last month, about two weeks after the eggs were laid.

Koki Tanabe, an official of the Japanese-created ibis conservation program, said that after examining the speckled eggs, experts had "concluded that there was no chance they will hatch."

MOSCOW (AP) — The young lieutenant stood stiffly in a daze as he watched the blue skies of Victory Day and emptied Red Square, where grim-faced cadets were dismantling decorations and reviewing standards.

The parades and speeches were over, and so were a few hours of glory for a deeply troubled Russian army.

"I come home, and I can't think about the army when my wife speaks of money and food for the child," said the lieutenant. "There are other stories, but no happiness. There is a shortage of personnel."

He did not want to give his name, but such complaints are legion in the post-Communist Russian military, which is plagued by a shrinking budget and plummeting morale.

Fighting in the tiny breakaway region of Chechnya, where the military has been mired for five months in a war that was supposed to take only weeks, has deepened the gloom.

On Tuesday, it was a different story. No expense was spared to let the military shine in its first all-out show of might since the Soviet collapse. Thousands of World War II veterans marched across Red Square

as world leaders paid tribute to their role in defeating Nazi Germany 50 years ago. Tens of thousands of Muscovites lined the streets to cheer on the soldiers in a genuine outpouring of gratitude.

At a huge new memorial, tanks and rocket launchers rolled past cheering crowds. Military jets streaked the skies that suddenly had cleared, thanks to cloud-seeding outside Moscow.

In recent weeks, there have been other signs that the Kremlin wants to sow new seeds of confidence in its ailing military-industrial complex.

Plans to bolster forces in the Northern Caucasus soon to begin endorsement, even though it might violate European disarmament accords. Arms exports have been labeled a top priority.

President Boris Yeltsin signed bill

extending mandatory military service to two years, and requiring most university students to serve after graduation, plugging a loophole that has long angered the general.

Sounding tough in a parade-opening speech, Defense Minister Pavel Grachev emphasized the importance of military might in the ethnic, territorial and economic chaos of the post-Cold War era. "We must strengthen and qualitatively renew our armed forces," he said. "A high combat capability, vigilance and improvement constitute our military duty and obligation."

Marching sharply, the army displayed a sense of brotherhood and tradition that imbued today's soldiers with the spirit of World War II heroes, said Pavel Felgenauer, a defense and security analyst for the daily newspaper Segodnya.

Yet the show failed to draw great expressions of excitement from professional military men.

Felgenauer said "there might have been an certain improvement of moral climate around the army, but in principle, these festivities did not resolve the key questions, the crisis in the military," he added.

**Scientist says cult made gas**

**KAMIKUIISHIKI, Japan (AP)** — In a breakthrough for investigators, a cult scientist has reportedly admitted the sect made the type of nerve gas used in the deadly Tokyo subway attacks.

Masami Tsuchiya, arrested last month in a hidden underground room at the cult's headquarters near Mount Fuji, told police the sect made sarin gas last spring, the newspaper Yomiuri and other news reports said Thursday.

But he did not explain why the group made the gas, the reports said.

The reported admission was the first of its kind from a senior member of the Aum Shinri Kyo (Supreme Truth) cult.

Police investigating the March 20 attack that killed 12 people and sickened 5,500 have gathered enormous amounts of circumstantial evidence, but have had difficulty proving the group was directly involved in the attack.

Tsuchiya, a chemist, is suspected of having led the group's sarin production team. Cult publications describe him as the man in charge of the sect's extensive experiments with chemicals.

From the outset, the cult has been the primary suspect in the attack. More than 100 cult members and many of its leaders have been arrested, but none on charges directly related to the attack.

The group has denied any involvement in the attack and claims the huge amounts of chemicals and sophisticated equipment police found at its facilities were used to produce agricultural chemicals and other daily necessities.

Police refused to comment on the reports Thursday. But they say they have found chemical traces indicating sarin was produced in a laboratory at the group's headquarters at Kamikuiishi.

In a related development, Australian officials said Thursday Aum Shinri Kyo apparently tested nerve gas on sheep at a ranch in remote western Australia.

West Australian Police Minister Bob Wise said police had found residues of chemicals used to make the gas in 24 dead sheep on the property near Leonora, in Western Australia's gold fields.

"I think it is quite clear that they were out there testing at least some gases — certainly testing sarin and possibly another," Wise said.

The sect bought the remote property in June 1993 and a group of sect members, including cult leader Shoko Asahara, traveled there in September 1993.

Asahara returned to Japan, and has been missing since the subway attack.

**U.S. to return Okinawa bases to Japanese**

**TOKYO (AP)** — The United States has agreed to return a military port and an airfield to Okinawa to local authorities, Japan's Defense Facilities Administration Agency said Thursday.

Okinawa was the scene of some of the bloodiest battles between U.S. forces and Japan's Imperial Army toward the end of World War II, and it was the last area returned to Japanese control after the war.

About 27,000 of the 40,000 U.S. troops in Japan are stationed on Okinawa.

Under the agreement by the U.S.-Japan Joint Committee, the United States will return a military port at Naha and Japan will set up a wharf at nearby Uraoe for exclusive U.S. military use.

U.S. paratrooper training is to be moved from Yonitan auxiliary airfield to Camp Hansen in Ginza.

Okinawa's state government is demanding a gradual but total removal of U.S. bases on Okinawa islands.

Since the end of the Cold War, the United States has returned 12 bases and facilities to Japanese authorities.

**Iraq caught trying to smuggle out oil**

**MANAMA, Bahrain (AP)** — Iraq is again trying to smuggle out oil by ship after a three-month lull apparently spurred by hopes for an easing of U.N. sanctions, the U.S. Navy said Thursday.

The Navy, which leads the international maritime blockade enforcing the 4-year-old sanctions, reported the first diversion since February of a ship suspected of sailing from Iraq with contraband oil.

Cmdr. T. McCreary, spokesman for U.S. Naval Forces Central Command in Bahrain, said the Honduran-flag Mai was stopped and boarded this week in the Persian Gulf as it sailed from Iraq. The interception by the guided-missile cruiser

USS Lake Champlain was conducted after "substantial evidence" that the Mai carried over 20,000 barrels of Iraqi oil, he said.

Contacts were under way with regional ports for a berthing place until the U.N. Sanctions Committee investigates the case, McCreary said.

Iraq's oil industry was severely damaged in the 1991 Gulf War and it was only last year that it resumed production. Since then, Iraq has attempted to smuggle oil out in small vessels and tugboats.

The U.S.-led intercept force has seized 13 ships, mostly carrying diesel fuel, since October.

## OBE flap draws in board candidate

**TWIN FALLS** — A Twin Falls School Board candidate who says he doesn't know much about outcome-based education has gained the support of some of Twin Falls' most vocal OBE critics.

Benny Windsor, one of five candidates running for the seat in Zone 4 vacated by School Board Chairman Steve Tolman, said he wasn't aware of support from Sue Looßli, Gerri McIntyre and Kathy Thomsen. He said he doesn't know Thomsen or Looßli.

But Looßli wrote a letter to *The Times-News* backing Windsor, and McIntyre and Thomsen confirmed in interviews with the newspaper that he was their candidate of

choice. All three have criticized the district for adopting OBE.

Windsor supports her philosophy, Thomsen said. She declined to elaborate. "He's an independent thinker," McIntyre said. "He is not a yes-man. He's going to represent the taxpayers."

Looßli said she supported Windsor for his objectivity, because he is fiscally conservative and would hold the district accountable for school reform.

Windsor said he would take support wherever he could get it.

"I'm fed up with labeling people, period," he said. "If a taxpayer wants to support me, I don't care if they're for or against an issue. I'll take it."

He said he supported the trio's right to criticize the district and wondered why

they hadn't received answers to some of their questions — namely, whether Morrisdale Elementary School kept low-performing students from taking standardized tests to artificially raise test results.

A state official and a Chamber of Commerce representative examined the school's records after hearing those concerns and found no wrongdoing.

Windsor said as board member, he would get to the heart of the issue.

In his written response to a questionnaire from the Twin Falls Education Association, Windsor pinpointed problems with three facets of the district's OBE plan: teaming, inclusion and cooperative learning.

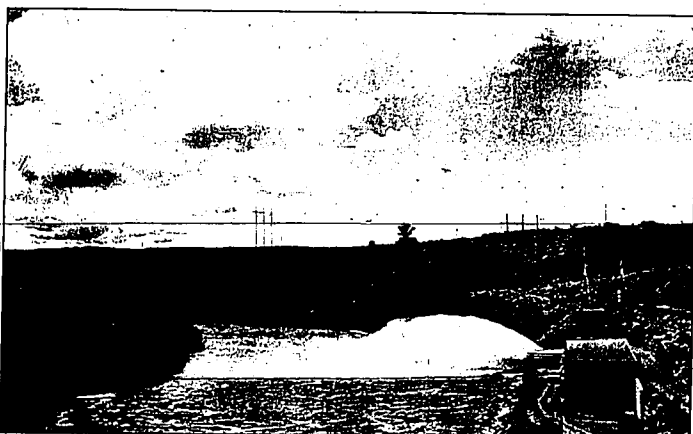

## Water, water everywhere

### Big Wood River on the rise after series of dry years

**HAILEY** — The Big Wood River is rising, but it's still comfortably below flood stage.

The river at Hailey stood at 3.14 feet on Thursday morning, up from 2.85 feet on Wednesday, said Larry Holt, of the National Weather Service in Boise. The flood warning level is 5 feet, while flood stage is 6 feet.

Thursday's flow was 1,371 cubic feet of water per second, one of six equally 449 gallons per minute.

"It's been going up pretty steadily," Holt said. The Big Wood River is expected

to rise to 3.2 feet today, and 3.3 feet on Saturday. By Sunday, cooler weather is expected to reduce snowmelt and drop the river back to 3.2 feet.

"Most rivers are in about the same situation," Holt said. The major exception was the Henrys Fork near Rexburg, which was above flood stage on Thursday.

"I'd almost forgotten what it feels like to have water again," said Dick Onedia, manager of the Shoshone-based Big Wood Canal Co.

After a depressing string of dry years, 1995 is shaping up as the best water year since 1983, he said. The most striking difference between this year and

1983 is that farmers aren't ordering as much water as they did a dozen years ago.

On Thursday, the canal company was releasing 2,000 cubic feet of water per second from Magic Reservoir, but only diverting 350 cfs into its canal about 6 miles downstream from the dam.

With all the rain that has fallen in recent days, "there's not much interest in irrigation these days," Onedia noted. The upshot is that the Big Wood River normally dry below the diversion canal — is running strong.

"Right now, what we've got isn't a danger," Onedia said. "The river is big enough to handle it."

## Gooding board sets schedule for new school

**GOODING** — Bids for construction of the new elementary-middle school in Gooding will be opened by School Board members on May 18.

And then actual construction will begin around the first week of July, district Superintendent Henry Kilmer said. "That's our goal."

According to a tentative schedule, the building should be enclosed by mid-November, he said, and completion of the 11-month project is expected to be in May or June of 1996.

"That gives us three months leeway (before school begins in 1996)," Kilmer said.

The 96,000-square-foot building will house about 850 students in grades kindergarten through eight and will cost about \$6.5 million, he said. A bond issue was passed last year for \$6 million, and the rest will come from the state and from interest on bond money.

This week, trustees approved Ron

Lampkey of Eagle as on-site construction manager. Kilmer said Lampkey just finished work on a new \$14 million school in Eagle and is well qualified for the Gooding project.

In other business at the Tuesday meeting: Dates for the 1995-96 school calendar were set. Registration week will be Aug. 14-18 and school will begin Aug. 22. For Christmas, school will be let out Dec. 22 and will begin again on Jan. 3. Spring break will be March 25 through 29, and the last day of school will be May 24.

Gooding schools are slated to receive \$40,000 from the state for drug and alcohol prevention programs, Kilmer said. Most of that money comes from cigarette tax, he said. Gooding board members plan to continue the Natural Helper program and may start after-school programs for remedial and enrichment classes.

"The purpose there is to get kids off the street and give them supervision when they're unsupervised after school," Kilmer said.

Trustees hired five new staff members. Former Minico teacher Tim Perrott will

teach science and will also be head football coach.

Idaho State University graduate student Tom Reagan will teach math.

Cora Caldwell, a media specialist at the Idaho School for the Deaf and the Blind in Gooding, will help coordinate media services and technology at the middle school library and, next year, at the new elementary-middle school.

Lynette France, a Bellevue teacher, and Nancy Spiroulas, a Meridian teacher, will teach language arts.

The board approved out-of-state travel for two students and voted to give each one \$250 to help with expenses.

Man Walker, who is the 1995 state champion in cabinetry competition, will go to Kansas City, Kan., this summer for national competition. This is Walker's second year as state champion and his second trip to the national contest.

Student Scott Rogers will go to a Future Farmers of America leadership conference in Washington, D.C., this summer.

## Health district ponders relocating

### Cassia Hospital move may bear higher cost

**TWIN FALLS** — The South Central District Health Department still may be able to put its Burley office in part of Cassia Memorial Hospital, but the district will have to pay more than an originally hoped.

The hospital was sold Monday to Howard Conrad of Burley's Conrad Ranches and Big Horn Mortgage Corp. The health district had expected to have based Western Health Care Corp. to buy the building. Western had agreed to let the district move into a part of the building currently occupied by doctors' offices.

Health District Director Cheryl Juntenum told health district board members Thursday that Conrad said he wants to negotiate a lease. With Burley office space going for between 80 cents and 70 cents a square foot, the 7,000-square-foot space would cost about \$54,600 a year at 65 cents a square foot.

Conrad told he was prepared to offer us a 10-year lease. Juntenum said during a special meeting to discuss plans for health district offices in Burley and Twin Falls. "With that, I think we're still in the business," she said.

Board members charged Juntenum, district attorney Mark Stubbs and anyone else Juntenum chooses to negotiate with Conrad. They also approved plans to renovate the building, which would cost about \$190,000, and told Juntenum to try to get a reduced lease price, if the district renovates the space, or have Conrad pay for the renovation.

Also Thursday, board members approved William V. McJung voted against the measure, saying later he thought the renovation price was too high, especially if the health district only gets a 10-year lease.

Also Thursday, board members agreed a plot of land the College of Southern Idaho gave the health district. Members agreed to go ahead with plans for a 20,800-square-foot building and parking lots, which preliminary estimates put at costing \$16.6 million.

Next, the district's architect will draw more specific plans, and the district will talk with Twin Falls County Commissioners about how much the county will contribute for the new building. With the commissioners' approval, the health district also will apply for a Community Development Block Grant to help pay for the project.

If the health district gets the grant, building construction could begin next spring at the earliest, with the district occupying the building by fall 1996.

In a separate case, Schoenauer was recently sentenced to six months boot camp, then prison or probation, after pleading guilty to possession of methamphetamine and assault on a narcotics agent.

# Batt urges FBI director to have his agents cooperate with local police

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Phil Batt, who has acknowledged public hostility toward the federal government but called the militia movement unprovoked, said on Thursday that he asked the director of the FBI to have his agents cooperate with local law enforcement authorities.

"I told him there were some tense feelings in Idaho," Batt said in recalling the brief meeting earlier this week in Washington with FBI Director Louis Freeh.

"I thought he should work through county sheriffs, as much as possible and be agreed," Batt said.

The governor also said he encouraged Freeh to make sure his agents avoid any actions that could be viewed as inflammatory by Idahoans.

Batt's brief visit followed his statements that militia activities were unnecessary and in some cases unwelcome. He made the remarks he made a week ago in northern Idaho, the site of the 1992 siege of white separatist Randy Weaver's remote cabin that left a federal marshal and Weaver's wife and son dead.

"I don't have any problem with anybody assembling in a peaceable fashion, but I condemn any group which meets for the purpose of inciting racial hatred or bigotry," the governor said.

"I am concerned that some of those groups may have a few members, at least, that focus on those items," he said.

# Zinser named to top job at Kentucky university

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — University of Idaho President Elisabeth Zinser, the first woman to head an Idaho university, was selected on Thursday as chancellor of the University of Kentucky's Lexington campus.

University President Charles Wehington said the appointment is subject to confirmation by the university board of trustees, which is expected to act at its June 13 meeting.

Zinser, 55, succeeds Robert Hemenway, who became chancellor at the University of Kansas in April. A Kentucky faculty member in the mid-1970s, Zinser was selected from among five finalists who visited the campus and talked with students, faculty and staff.

Zinser had been the target of a petition drive by some alumni who wanted her ousted for losing touch with the faculty.

Since the petition began circulating, however, letters of support have been sent to the state Board of Education from students, alumni, faculty and some of the state's political leaders.

"She has served the state with great distinction," Gov. Phil Batt said. "She's a very talented person. I'm sorry to see her leave."

to the critical issues the university has faced in the 1990s.

"I've been a lightning rod, I've been highlighted and spotlighted," she said. "But the fact that I'm a woman, the spotlight may be a little brighter and may be interpreted differently."

But she said that time and again when it may have appeared that the level of criticism was greater than it should be or she had been unfairly singled out, individuals have stepped forward to refocus any debate on the issue at hand.

"For some, my being a woman may cause them to feel even more resolve in speaking out if they think that my being a woman has something to do with something negative," Zinser said. "I'd like to be more progressive than we give it credit for."

She was also at the center of a still-smoldering debate over whether a separate engineering school should be built in Bojoe to replace what some saw as Idaho's out-dragging efforts to externalize engineering curriculum to the Boise area.

It was a battle she had one to this point and she believes was critical to maintaining the integrity not only of the University of Idaho but of the state's higher education system as a whole. With just 1 million people, Idaho has been forced to stray from a system that assigns specific educational responsibilities to each institution to avoid expensive duplication.

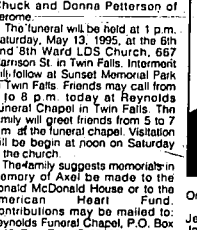

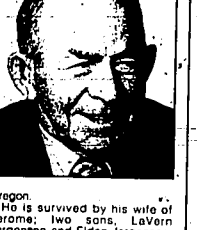

# Ex-students remain true to old school

South West alumni take one final tour

BURLEY - Forty-eight years after they started their school days together, Leon Tilley and Sally Brooks-Allred were once again sitting side-by-side in South West Elementary School Thursday.

Their course for the day was nostalgia, as alumni of the 75-year-old school took one final tour through the halls of South West. The school is being closed in favor of a new elementary school scheduled to open next fall.

Former teachers and administrators joined more than 200 visitors to the school Thursday during an open house commemorating South West Elementary's history. Old classroom photos, including pictures of the premiere first grade class from 1920, lined the walls of the school.

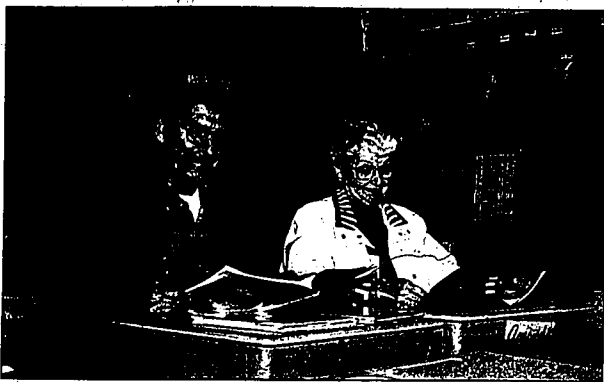
Peering around the classroom where Ella Mae Olberholz taught him in first grade, Tilley said: "As far as the blackboard and things, everything looks pretty much the same."

Tilley, who attended grades one through six at South West from 1937 to 1943, now has a granddaughter in the school.

Brooks-Allred said she remembers going outside - rain or shine - during recess.

"There used to be a big ditch that ran around the back and all the girls used to build playhouses and all the boys would run through them," she said.

Back then, the school had 12 classrooms, two for each grade,

Brooks-Allred recalled.

"Despite the addition of new classrooms, an auditorium, and other changes, Brooks-Allred said it's hard to let the school go.

"It breaks my heart," she said.

Im Coltrin attended South West from 1926 to 1931. He became principal of the school in 1953 during his 41-year career as an educator in Cassia County.

For him, the walls of South West

can still tell plenty of stories.

"Losing this school is like an old friend that won't be there anymore," Coltrin said.

Built for \$60,000 in 1920, South West Elementary School endured disaster before it opened its doors. A fire gutted the east wing of the school just weeks before it was scheduled to open on September 7.

"Bucket brigades worked hours to extinguish the blaze, which started

between the ceiling and roof of the school during construction.

"It always kind of brings a tear to your eye," former principal Gary Masoner said about closing South West Elementary. "But it needs to be done for progress."

Tilley said the school would not be forgotten.

"It's a landmark. No matter what they build here, it's going to be old South West," he said.

students who are in danger of losing credit for a semester.

# Expanding Rupert draws farmers' ire

RUPERT - The Minidoka County commissioners continue to wrestle with the problems of setting up the area of impact for Rupert.

Last week a group of farmers met with the commissioners to protest becoming a part of the Rupert area. Rupert Mayor Dwinelle Allred, city Attorney Rick Bullar and the Rupert zoning committee chairman told the group the impact area was only for planning.

When the commissioners met Monday, Lee Sunderland, a dairyman protesting inclusion in the area, appeared before the commissioners to again tell them he does not want to be a part of the impact area.

Sunderland told the commissioners he feels that inclusion in the area would have a financial impact on his dairy. At the present time he has a livestock containment permit for 500 head of livestock. He added he would be reluctant to improve his operation if his place, located on 200 South, is put into the area of impact.

Now the commissioners must decide how to set up this area before a final vote on May 22.

In other business, the commissioners heard a report from Bill McClung, county representative to the South Central

District Health Department. McClung brought with him a proposed budget for next year which would require the county to come up with an additional \$3,000.

Commissioner Bert Stevenson asked how much the county is paying for an office for the Health District services now. The answer was about \$4,000 a year, and all three commissioners agreed this was sufficient for the services given to area residents. Services include immunizations, family planning and flu shots for the elderly.

Darlene Friesen told the commissioners that more than 500 residents of the county applied for financial help through the state. Circuit Breaker program.

Persons over 65 with low income, former Prisoners of War, disabled persons certified by Social Security or the Veteran Administration, widows, widowers and blind or motherless or fatherless children under 18 years of age may apply for the program.

The Circuit Breaker program pays a portion of the taxes of those who qualify. The state of Idaho reimburses the counties for the full amount of the taxes that are part of this program. The amount that can be covered ranges from a minimum of \$100 to a maximum of about \$800.

## Batt jobs pad pensions for some

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Phil Batt has provided seven former Republican legislators with the prospect of bigger retirement checks.

The lawmakers, who took high-paying posts in Batt's Administration, are almost guaranteed to have their retirement benefits as much as quadrupled under a state employment rule Batt has campaigned to eliminate.

As a state senator in the mid-1980s, Batt sponsored legislation to eliminate that benefit. And in his State of the State address in January, the new governor asked lawmakers again to eliminate it.

But since taking office, Batt has appointed seven people who would benefit from the rule.

Under the Public Employee Retirement System of Idaho, lawmakers are eligible for retirement benefits even though they are part-time workers.

For instance, a 10-year legislative veteran would receive about \$200 a month after retiring based on a legislative salary of \$12,000 a year.

If that same lawmaker takes a \$50,000-a-year state job and holds it at least 12 months, their pension is computed as if the person had spent nearly 14 years working at the higher salary level. At age 65, the lawmaker can expect to draw a monthly check of more than \$1,100.

In the State of the State address, Batt proposed taking lawmakers and appointees out of the Public Employee Retirement System and establishing individual retirement accounts for them. But he stands by his appointments.

"He's not going to disregard qualified people because he disagrees with the state retirement system," Batt spokeswoman Amy Kleiner said. "I think the way you want to go about it would be to fix the state retirement system and keep the qualified people."

Republicans did not invent the system and they are not the first to take advantage of it. The state's Democratic governors often appointed former legislators to top posts in their administration.

"It's very difficult for taxpayers to understand how high-level government officials can write their own pension plans and have it not be generous," said Pete Seep, spokesman for the Washington, D.C.-based National Taxpayers Union. "It's almost a given if you're allowed to write your own pension plan, it's going to be favorable to you."

But the prospect of a fatter pension was little incentive to take the jobs, the lawmakers say. "You don't serve in the Legislature for money or retirement benefits," said former state Sen. Roger Madson of Boise, named director of the Department of Employment. "Certainly, it was something that didn't come up on my computer screen."

Former Sen. Rachel Gilbert of Boise, who was named to the Idaho Industrial Commission, said she provided for her retirement long before taking the

appointment, although she expects to accept the pension checks.

"It would be foolish to turn down something that a person has earned, but that was never a consideration in anything I've ever done for the people of Idaho," she said.

Former state Rep. Jesse Bernin of Boise, who now heads the Idaho Office on Aging, is 66 and draws a pension as a retired federal employee. He said he took the state job to help Batt.

"By the time I get out of here, I'm going to be past 70," Bernin said. "You don't make a four-year commitment at age almost 67 thinking in terms of money."

The other former lawmakers who benefit from the PERSI rule are Pam Ahrens, named to head the Department of Administration; Dennis Hansen, appointed to a six-year term on the Idaho Public Utilities Commission; Mary Harlung, named as a special assistant in Batt's office; and Michael Johnson, named director of the new state Department of Corrections.

Former state Sen. Rod Beck of Boise is the only Batt appointee who would not benefit from the rule. Batt selected Beck last month as executive director of the Idaho Housing Agency. But the quasi-governmental agency is not covered by the state pension plan, and Beck's six years in the Senate do not count toward his IHA pension plan.

## Orofino residents blast water release

LEWISTON (AP) — A state Division of Environmental Quality hearing on water releases from Dworshak Reservoir became a preview of next week's National Marine Fisheries Service hearing on its salmon recovery plan.

A number of Orofino residents, led by state Sen. Margaret McLaughlin, argued at Wednesday's hearing that releasing water from behind Dworshak Dam to speed young steelhead and salmon in their migration to the sea comes at the expense of the local economy.

"I feel sort of like a broken record, but I am here to say what is being done to Dworshak is wrong," McLaughlin said.

Alex Irby, resource manager for Konkolville Lumber Co., said on behalf of the Dworshak Log Haulers Association that log hauling runs around when the reservoir drops to provide water for fish. He said that violates one of the promises Congress made in building the dam along the Clearwater River's North Fork.

James Grunke, the Orofino Chamber of Commerce's executive director, said spills from Dworshak threaten the reservoir's kokanee by sucking them out through the spillway, and threaten fish downstream by exposing them to concentrations of dissolved gas that exceed state water quality standards.

"We haven't put out this amount of water in a long time," said Wayne Waggoner of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Biologists for cars have asked the Corps to release more water in the spring. But the Corps and Bonneville Power Administration have balked, citing the drought and the need to store water for winter power generation.

The flow at Bonners Ferry doubled from 7,500 cubic feet per second in late April to 15,000 cfs on May 1.

## Montana dam will let river flow for sturgeon

The amount of water in the Kootenai River flowing past Bonners Ferry should more than double soon to help save endangered white sturgeon.

More water is being released from Montana's Libby Dam to prompt the ancient fish to spawn. They have not reproduced in 20 years since the dam bottled up flows.

## Californian picked to head Bonner schools

SANDPOINT (AP) — Californian Max Harrell has been hired as the new Bonner County school superintendent, ending a six-month search.

The School Board on Tuesday voted to employ the 52-year-old assistant-superintendent of the Dos Palos Oro Loma Joint Unified School District in Central California.

Harrell replaces acting Superintendent Leonard Parenteau, who took over after embattled Superintendent Gary Barton resigned in October.

Several teachers accused Barton of calling them at home and making threats over stalled salary negotiations.

Harrell said his long-term goals include building more classrooms. "The district is growing, and it looks like the schools are pretty much at capacity in terms of space for students," he said.

## Aspiring rockers can jam with Aerosmith

In millions of American homes, air guitarists flail away on imaginary instruments, pretending to play along with a favorite rock 'n' roll band on the audio system.

Now, an interactive entertainment system has been designed to plug that daydream into a multi-media computer.

Branching off New Bedford, Mass.-based Ahead Inc., the system uses a Virtual Guitar to play Virtual Music games with CD-quality sound and interactive video footage of rock superstars.

The Virtual Guitar comes with cables that plug into a 486 or better PC with 16-bit sound card and requires 10MB of HD space to run. The guitar's control panel has buttons for adjusting volume and for moving the cursor on the computer screen during game play. Nearly the same size and weight as a real guitar, it's surprisingly light for plastic. But it is a toy, six strings, for instance, actually are just a single guitar string looped back on itself across the control-sounding board.

The \$100 guitar hits stores in October, packaged with "Welcome to West Feedback," a CD-ROM game with six interactive songs. But it's this long-headed jam-with-Aerosmith game, "Quest for Fame," first in a Virtual Music "featured artists" series, that the developer expects to be the "killer app" for Virtual Guitar.

In "Quest for Fame," you play an aspiring rocker, hoping to be discovered by Aerosmith. You begin by practicing in your bedroom, and move on when you're proficient. In the course of 11 interactive scenes, you test yourself with a garage band, play your first gig at Roadkill Grille, go on to meet Aerosmith's Tom Hamilton and Joey Kramer at the club. Do well and you may jam with Brad Whitford and Steven Tyler at Snoozy's



Steven Tyler of Aerosmith performs at Woodstock in August 1994, but he can be your jam partner with the Virtual Guitar. The computer plays the correct notes and chords for you. You use the pick provided with the guitar to strum any string to mimic the beat of basic rhythm guitar and certain single-note lead parts. "Quest for Fame" fun? It's one step above air guitar.

## All work is all play for video game testers

Step back, amateur game-players, here come the professionals. They are the test-team members of the Quality Assurance department of MicroProse Software in Hunt Valley, Maryland. These 27 men and women spend their days playing video games on company time. But they don't merely play the games, their expertise lies in "breaking" the games — outsmarting the computer programs they're playing against.

Their work has contributed to the development of some of the industry's most popular games: "Sid Meier's Colonization," "X-Com," and "X-Com II: Terror from the Deep." "Transfer Tycoon" and "Pacific Air War Gold" is name just a few.

Although the game testers' main objective is to "break" the game — to find bugs that, once activated, cause the game program to crash — other responsibilities range from critiquing the story line and verifying historical accuracy to approving of color schemes and graphics. They make sure the games are fun and match the designers' intentions.

The length of the process varies, but most test projects take an average of 10 weeks to complete.

A typical testing method for Jim Hendry of Baltimore is to approach the game in as many different ways as possible. "You check to see if you can do the things you're supposed to be able to do, and then check to see if you can do things that you're not supposed to be able to do. You do things that programmers never anticipated and see what happens," he says, citing such examples as killing all your allies in a war game, and flying backward or through solid objects in a flying game.

At 28, Hendry is one of the oldest game-testers at MicroProse, a company co-founded 12 years ago by owner Sid Meier, who is 41 — only 11 years beyond the average age of the 160 employees at the Hunt Valley office. There are two smaller offices in England and Japan. Hendry has been part of the Quality Assurance team for two years. "It's a good job to hang on to for a while," he says. "We'll spend 40 hours a week in here and then come in on weekends just for the fun of it."

In hiring testers, 22-year-old leader Jeff Dinger, 30th, has been with MicroProse for two years, says the company looks for people who are "good at working in groups, good at improvising. People with really good problem-solving skills are those that are doing really quite well here."

He adds, "We look for people that know their way around a process, is near the end when the process is helpful when tracking down a bug."

Mike Richardson, 23, who came to MicroProse in February, mostly has tested military games, but says he hopes to work on some high-simulation games his undergraduate degree is in aeronautics design. He says many of the testers have specific areas of expertise that enable them to test games more thoroughly.

Both Richardson and Hendry say the hardest part of the testing process is near the end when the project is no longer fresh. "It's hard especially after somebody's been on it for two, three, four, five months. There are problems that you've gotten so used to seeing that after a while you don't even see them anymore," Hendry says.

Breaking a game takes months of intense and rigorous work, according to Dave Ginsburg, 28, the Quality Assurance department manager. He says the testers prepare 10- to 15-page reports on their approach to a game before they can begin testing. They often spend more than 1,000 hours evaluating a single game.

# Oklahoma country stars respond to bombing

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Garth Brooks talked to Reba McEntire about a detail he'd heard about the aftermath of the bombing in Oklahoma City.

"A friend was talking about kids that had parents in there... just came home from school and nobody knew what was going on," Brooks said. A stunned McEntire took a deep breath.

Kenzie Dunn of Brooks & Dunn shook his head.

Hurling various items from Yakon, Cloche and Tulsa, Okla., the three stars gathered in a Nashville television studio the day after the bombing to offer their support with a broadcast to their home state. There already was talk of a benefit concert, but all three stars looked too dazed and emotional to offer much more than moral support, for the moment.

But they will all help, publicly or privately. Singer-songwriter Kevin Welch, a native of Midwest City, Okla., was the first country star to announce a benefit concert.

"This is the one thing that we're united to do," Welch said. "There's going to be a need for just some cold hard cash for these folks."

Welch, Mary Chapin Carpenter, Lucinda Williams, Alejandro Escovedo and The Red Dirt Rangers are confirmed for the May 28 show at the Oklahoma City Civic Center Music Hall. Others will show up, some of them big stars.

## Nashville notes

Proceeds from the \$15 and \$20 tickets will go to the bombing victims' families, through the Oklahoma City Mayor's Disaster Relief Fund.

"Everyone assumed that the triumvirate of Reba, Garth and Vince would do some kind of show," Welch said. "I can understand how they might lay back and, in their own fashion, define how they're going to answer the call."

Vince Gill has a prior commitment for the May 28 show, Welch said, adding that Gill has talked to Okla. Gov. Frank Keating.

A short list of country music singers from Oklahoma includes platinum acts such as The Tractors and Joe Diffie, and newcomers like Bryan White, Wade Hayes and Brett James. Toby Keith, of "Should've Been a Cowboy" fame, still lives in Oklahoma City.

Keith reacted to the tragedy by immediately leaving Nashville for home, where he helped get supplies to the rescue workers.

"I was working with Feed The Children, and they're closer (to the bomb area) than the mass media," Keith said. "It's a lot more vicious looking, more vicious looking than it looks on TV."

Diffie, from Velma, Okla., was

raising awareness and cash out here on the road."

There were a few close calls to family members of country stars, all of whom expect to be touched in some way.

"The blast blew the chairs off the porch of Garth Brooks' parents, who live about 15 miles away. The grandfather of newcomer Bryan White canceled an appointment that would have placed him at the courthouse when the bombing occurred."

"That's something that will really make the hair stand up on the back of your neck," White said, adding he would welcome a benefit. "This is my best way, singing or doing some kind of show."

All of the performers are conscious of the line they're walking between being supportive and grabbing publicity on the back of a tragedy.

# McEntire, McGraw earn top country awards

UNIVERSAL CITY, Calif. (AP) — Country queen Reba McEntire won her first entertainer of the year trophy at the Academy of Country Music Awards on Wednesday and accepted it on behalf of "fellow Okies who have endured" the bombing.

"I want to dedicate this to all those who were left behind," McEntire said.

The Oklahoma bombing weighed heavy on artists, many of them natives of Oklahoma: "Oklahoma, I love you. We're proud of you. Keep it up," said Garth Brooks, who hails from the Oklahoma City suburb of Yukon.

Brooks won the video award for "The Red Strokes," and was given the Jim Reeves Memorial Award for furthering the cause of country music internationally.

McEntire earlier won the female vocalist trophy, her seventh Academy of Country Music Award since 1985. But the entertainer award had eluded her.

"That girl has worked her butt off, and no one stops to say thanks. So I'm very happy for her," Brooks said.

"I just kept working, trying to get it," she said minutes before the winner was announced.

Newcomer Tim McGraw, took top album for "Not a Moment Too Soon."

"This is totally unexpected," said a stunned McGraw, who won over Garth Brooks, Vince Gill, Alan Jackson and Mary Chapin Carpenter.

He also received new male artist honors.

Alan Jackson, who went into the show with seven nominations, walked away with a single trophy, the top male vocalist award. Gill, who had five nominations, left empty handed.

John Michael Montgomery's "I Swear" was picked song and single record of the year.

"Are you sure you got the right guy? I really wasn't expecting to win this," Montgomery said after winning the top single trophy. He was last year's best new artist winner.

The Mavericks won awards for top vocal group and new group or duo: "Well now, this is too much," said Mavericks member Robert Reynolds, husband of Trisha Yearwood. "From the Mavericks to the fans, we love you very much."

Brooks & Dunn expressed surprise at winning their fourth consecutive top duo award: "You never know when the train is going to stop," said Ronnie Dunn.

**'Juan de Marco'** — Marlon Brando plays a psychiatrist who enters into the fantasy of a patient, played by Johnny Depp, who thinks he's Don Juan. Both actors are fun to watch but the film is like a cut-rate "Equis." It romanticizes the boy's delusions by making normalcy seem

**'Dumb and Dumber'** — Jim Carrey and Jeff Daniels star as a pair of low-wattage buddies. The film abounds in potty jokes and gross-out gags, but the real joke is that grown men are actually doing this stuff. (PG-13, for off-color humor.) (Twin Cinema)

**'French Kiss'** — Kevin Kline's sly parody of a sly Frenchman is the best reason to see this pleasantly ironic Lawrence Kasdan-Adam Brooks romantic comedy co-starring the overbearingly cute Meg Ryan. Branagh's "Frankenstein" has a nice look to it and Roger Pratt's cinematography is sumptuous. (The Associated Press) (Blackbuster, Hastings, Video West)

New movies in Twin Falls video stores this week:

**'The War'** (PG-13) — It is 1970 in Mississippi, a perplexing time for the nation, and an even more troubling time in the rural South. This is the setting for "The War."

Filled with principles and well-intentioned values about family and friendship, racial justice, loyalty, forgiveness and love, "The War" offers a warm examination of growing up poor and white amid hatred and bigotry.

This is not a seamless movie, however. Its flaws are very apparent, from non-heeding cultural accuracy (dialogue is filled with "white" and "nigger" slang) to bad pacing to over-the-top, acting to a predictable climax.

Vietnam vet Stephen Simmons (Keanu Reeves) is a victim of post-traumatic stress syndrome who returns home to resume life with his family, forced to live in a shack after their house was condemned.

Relations with wife Luis (Mare Winemingham) are strained. But there is a special closeness with daughter Lida (Lexi Randall) and especially son Stu (Wood).

Despite the war and all its emotional horrors, Stephen holds on to faith in humanity. He tries to impart the idea of loving one's neighbor to his children, and teaches them the importance of forgiveness.

The story unfolds during one summer when Lida, Stu and their interracial group of pals build a dream house on an ancient oak. The defense of their fortress against the Lupinicks ultimately leads to a war. (Associated Press) (Hastings, Video West, Blackbuster)

**'Mary Shelley's Frankenstein'** (R) — The story of Frankenstein, one of the most imaginative and enduring gothic tales, with all the elements for good theatrics: a frightening creature, an obsessed scientist, romance, morbidity, life, death, revenge and redemption. In the 1931 film classic, Boris Karloff made the monster a being who didn't know his own strength, but could

appreciate beauty and childhood innocence. In this title, despite numerous flaws, the movie really works. Frankenstein has remained the prototype for the creature.

In Kenneth Branagh's "Mary Shelley's Frankenstein," Robert De Niro breathes intelligence and compassion into the creature, making him far more deep and complex. His performance shows a master at work: De Niro actually becomes the monster, clinging somewhere between life and purgatory.

His performance is a standout in Branagh's sprawling and literate work, which, unfortunately, tends to go way over the top.

What emerges is a stylish romp, drowned in a sea of excess. The movie purports to be based on the 1818 gothic tale written by Mary Shelley, but it really is based on a dark and stormy night while she and her lover, the poet Percy Bysshe Shelley, visited Lord Byron. They were each to create ghost stories. Mary's evolved from a nightmare after listening to the two men discuss science and reanimation.

Branagh, who directed from a screenplay by Steph Lady and Frank Darabont, opens the story on the ice floes of the Arctic Sea. The year is 1794, and Captain Walton (Aidan Quinn), who is stranded on the ice with his ship and crew, is determined to reach the North Pole.

From the chilling mist comes Victor Frankenstein (Branagh), a morally tortured man who is pursuing his murderous creation.

Branagh is an actor's director, allowing his cast to dig into themselves to pull out their performances, and he gets top-notch results. De Niro has what could be a throwaway line at the end of the movie when he points to Victor and says, "He was my father." But his delivery is incredible, filled with the sting of a thousand hurts and love only a son would know. Tom Hulce (so excellent as Mozart in "Amadeus") returns to a costume drama

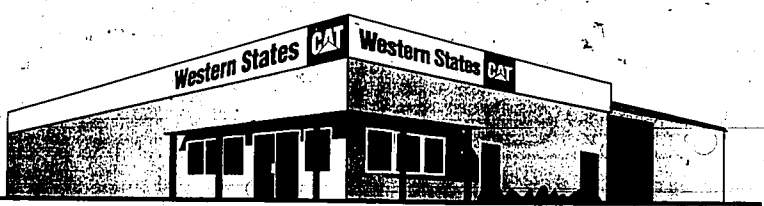

# 'Tide' is awash with nonstop action

"Crimson Tide" is a whale of a movie, an intense and a heart-stopping adventure played out against the unnerving threat of nuclear annihilation. It's a chilling winner made even more so by powerful and exceptional performances from Denzel Washington and Gene Hackman as a chief executive officer and his captain whose personal and professional battles create a tension it would require a missile to defuse.

cigars, classical music and his frisky Jack Russell terrier, who's allowed to urinate on the walkways of the sub.

The two officers bring different philosophies of war. For Ramsey, the enemy is clear and you play to win. For Hunter, the enemy is harder to grasp, because, he says, "In the nuclear world, the true enemy is war itself."

These philosophies clash when the sub is ordered to launch its nuclear missiles against the rebel base before the rebels fire the ICBMs they now control. Complicating matters is a rogue sub in the same area as the Alabama and a message that comes in — and is interrupted — just as the enemy sub fires on the Alabama.

With a fragmented message, Hunter wants to play it by the book: Find out what the message says before firing the missiles, because it might be an order to abort.

Ramsey, however, is combat-ready and primed for aggression. Follow the original orders, even if it means the start of a global nuclear war.

Caught in the middle are the other officers and crew members, who must either follow newcomer Hunter's lead under military regulations, or stick with their captain, who has been relieved of duty.

If this sounds anything like "The Caine Mutiny," forget it. Ramsey is no straw-berry-counting Queeg; he's far from loony. What's scary, though,

is how someone in the military can cling to a rigid chain of command and not worry about the consequences.

You can pretty much figure out what's going to happen, but no matter. The drama is tight, the dialogue crisp.

Dariusz Wolski's cinematography is superb, from the torrents of rain before the Alabama gets under way to the almost suffocating interiors. Wolski creates an endless grace with the sub's initial dive. And when Ramsey stands at the bridge inhaling the beauty of the ebbing landscape and endless sea and says before going below, "This is the best part," you understand.

Make sure you see this movie at a theater equipped with Dolby Stereo, because the sound is terrific. Planes taking off and landing on an aircraft carrier almost bring the same realistic effect as Sony IMAX.

"Crimson Tide" offers an excellent ensemble cast in support, including George Dzundza as the chief of boat who sticks by Hunter; Viggo Mortensen, Hunter's pal who must make a moral choice in the end; Lili Brannato, Jr., the young star of Robert De Niro's excellent "A Bronx Tale," who plays the radio, whiz kid; and James Gandolfini, as the bothead supply officer, (Mall Cinema, Century Cinema of Butte)

# 'Englishman' a wise choice for Grant

Talent isn't really so rare among movie stars, but judgment certainly is.

Having demonstrated the former in "Four Weddings and a Funeral," Hugh Grant has gone on to show a lot of the latter by choosing to appear in an understated little comedy, with a very big title, "The Englishman Who Went Up a Hill but Came Down a Mountain."

Grant plays the title role, one of a pair of English map makers who travel the British countryside on a mission during the First World War. What they are up to is technical and routine.

Or rather, it is until they get to the little Welsh village of Ffynnon Garw. The town's inhabitants are phenomenally proud of the local mountain, which they consider to be the "first" in Wales. That is, it's the first mountain that invaders historically have encountered, the mountain that defeat-

ed those enemies, the mountain that has, in a sense, helped Wales to remain Welsh.

Naturally, the villagers are upset when their landmark is found to be not quite high enough officially to merit mountain status. So they decide to build it up — a bucket of dirt at a time — while scheming to hold the cartographers in town long enough for a proper remeasuring.

To the outsiders, of course, the locals seem to be making a mountain out of a molehill — or, at least, out of a hill. But when a community doesn't have a major sports franchise, local pride can take weird forms.

Much of the film's quirky humor comes from the discrepancy between the insignificance of the issue at hand and the vast importance that the villagers attach to it. Preferring wry

humor to belly laughs, Welsh writer-director Christopher Monger tells a modest shaggy-dog story that he has said is based on a family legend.

In the world of movies, this one is more of a hill than a mountain, but it's a hill of sustained wit. "The Englishman" possesses a storybook atmosphere and an off-center appeal reminiscent of Bill Forsyth's "Gregory's Girl" and "Comfort and Joy" (although Monger is not as accomplished as the Scottish filmmaker).

If "The Englishman" is too offbeat to become a giant hit, Grant is still shrewd to appear in it. His role allows him to develop the most entertaining aspects of his emerging movie persona.

As in "Four Weddings," the actor is very funny in a rather passive way. Playing Reginald, the unassuming young cartographer, he tends to stammer and smile nervously while everyone else tries to influence him about one thing or another. (Twin Nine)

# Backbeat

## Morphine sinks to low-down sound

John Coltrane's sonic sensibilities led him higher and higher into the shrill registers of the soprano sax and flute.

The opposite is at work for the power-rock trio Morphine, whose third album, "Yes," conveys their descent into music's guttural, subterranean netherworld, sans guitar but heavy on bone-jarring bass lines.

"We're just bartone people," said saxman Mark Sandman, whose husky vocals and two-string slide bass substitute for guitar in the band, which also features Dana Colley on baritone saxophone and Billy Conway on drums.

In Sandman's old band, Treat Her Right, he played guitar but stuck pretty much to the bottom two strings, playing it like a bass. When he plays piano, he bangs around the baritone end of the keyboard.

"I've always been fascinated with those frequencies since I was a little kid," Sandman said in a telephone interview from Los Angeles during a concert tour. "Before my voice changed, I played trombone, which is a baritone instrument. Those are the frequencies that move us. Even the drums are tuned to that range."

The result is a brooding, desolately infectious style, a sultry, steamy, earthy music that would sound at home simmering out of a subway grate from some place far below ground.

It's insomniac music, a soundtrack for urban night owls and latter-day beatniks. One of the dozen tracks, "The Jury," is a spoken-word performance by Sandman over Colley's jazzy sax that could have been lifted straight from a 1950s poetry reading.

His voice and playing owe a lot to some of rock's darker legends — Jim Morrison, Leonard Cohen, Nick Cave, with the occasional Tom Waits-like growl thrown in.

Sandman's sparse, often carnal lyrics mix perfectly with the sensual feel of the music: "I know it drives you crazy when I pretend you don't exist, when I'd like to lean in close and run my hands against your lips," he murmurs sardonically in "Whisper."

The music is hushed and Spartan at times, brimming with manic glee at others. On the opening track, "Money White," Colley's saxophone works like a frenzied gophorn; on "Super Sex" he plays baritone and tenor sax at the same time; in a jazz saxophonist's role, he plays jazz for three horns simultaneously.

The band came together as something of a jark in 1990, after Treat Her Right broke up. Sandman and Colley, veterans of the alternative music scene around Boston and Cambridge, Mass., were hanging out toying with bass and sax.

Instruments and musicians clicked, and they decided to try a gig or two as

a guitar-less trio with drummer Jerome Dupree (since replaced by Conway), Sandman's bandmate from Treat Her Right.

"It wasn't any reaction against the guitar because that's still my No. 1 instrument. I still love the guitar," Sandman said. "But we wanted to keep it as a three-piece band, and Dana covers so much ground with his sax that it didn't feel like anything was missing."

Booked for a low-key first gig in Boston, the trio cast about for a band name. Partial to Myrphesus, Greek god of dreams, and liking the sedative sound of it, they went on stage as Morphine.

"We were completely prepared to be laughed off the stage," Sandman said. "It was a sound we liked, and it resonated for us. But we figured we'd do one show and call it an interesting experiment. That first show we had only 20 people show up, but it was a diverse crowd and we got a good reaction. They accepted it as music."

Early on, the band played mostly cover bars and loft parties for informal, nonjudgmental crowds that wouldn't try, convict and dismiss Morphine as simply a trio that had

misplaced its guitars.

"We pretty much avoided the rock bar circuit," Sandman said. "It seemed a little artificial for this band. We didn't want to be judged, we didn't want to have people paying money and expecting it to be good. We wanted the freedom to be just the band playing in the corner. That gave us a lot of room to work on our sound."

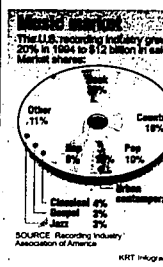
Their 1992 indie debut album, "Good," was reassigned by Rykodisc. The label also put out "yes" and Morphine's second album, "Cure for Pain," which sold 300,000 copies with minimal promotion.

A heavy touring schedule and decent college radio airplay made Morphine the underground success story of 1994. The new album has strong early sales and earned critical praise all around.

The band also gained exposure through the 1994 arthouse movie "Spanking the Monkey," which used five Morphine songs from "Cure for Pain" on its soundtrack.

That stirred Sandman's interest in writing music specifically for movies; Morphine's spare, evocative style seems ideal fit for the new wave of moody film noir.

Then my mother died, and I fell even deeper into depression. Luckily, I realized that I couldn't be a good mother to my children without help, and I sought counseling.

Two years ago, my doctor and counselor diagnosed my problem as clinical depression and prescribed

mentality. Haws knows it, Jerry knows it. They can always get some guys out because they never adjust at the plate. Nothing more than cur's balls," Walker said.

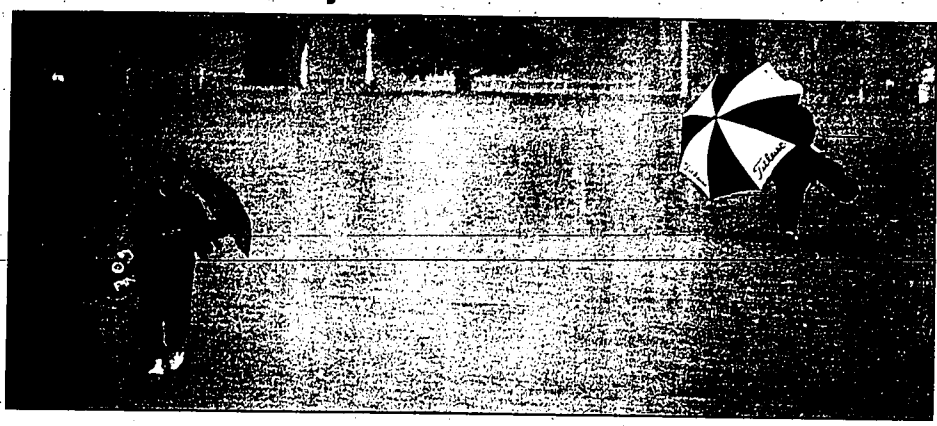
The return of the timely base hit plus the pitching of Brandon Duckworth and Rob Vael shoved CSI past Dixie in Thursday morning's semifinals.

# Minico boys, Bruin girls take golf titles

**BURLEY** — Minico's Kody Buerkle set the pace and the Spartan boys' golf team followed his tracks to the Region III title Thursday.

Pitching was the key, said Buerkle, who went on to birdie three holes on the back nine.

"I've been practicing all week and it really helped me today," he said.

The regional match was played on a wet course, allowing golfers to play aggressively and shoot for the pin. Sporadic downpours dampened the morning session, but the skies gave way to spots of sun in the afternoon.

Twin Falls, the defending girls' state champions, move on to Lewiston with big expectations, Stover said.

"The girls fully expect to win the state tournament. We know, though, that it's going to be tough to repeat," Stover said.

# Shirt swap costs Bulls \$30,000

**DEERFIELD, Ill.** — Michael Jordan simply wanted to prove he was still No. 23, the greatest basketball player on the planet, and didn't care that he had to break NBA rules to do it.

Or he was superstitious. Or he was playing mind games with the Orlando Magic. Or he was playing money games with the adoring masses who had been buying new No. 45 Chicago Bulls jerseys by the millions. Or he wanted to wear a number that had been retired into the United Center rafters.

Or ...

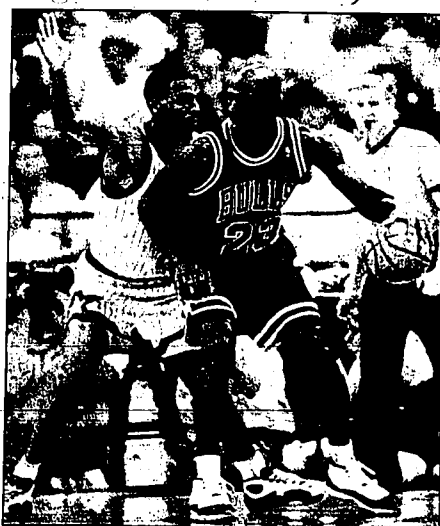
"He just told me he feels more comfortable in it, and anything that Michael feels comfortable with is fine with me," Bulls vice president Jerry Krause said Thursday, the day after the world's most famous athlete found yet another way to grab attention — by switching his uniform number from 45 to 23.

For the fourth consecutive day, Jordan wasn't talking to the media, leaving reporters and a public full of inquiring minds wondering exactly why he made the switch before Wednesday's 104-94 playoff victory over the Orlando Magic.

The NBA on Thursday fined the Bulls \$25,000 for failing to report the change before the game, then said it would not be allowed to make the change this season. The league also fined Jordan \$5,000 for wearing white sneakers with black trim instead of the black shoes his teammates wore.

"We can't have a situation where a player can decide every night what number he wants to wear," NBA deputy commissioner Russ Granik said. "Our policy is that you have to apply to the league when you want to change your number and that applies equally to every player in the league."

Jordan had planned to wear 23 — the number he made famous before retiring in October 1993 — again tonight when the Bulls play host to the Magic in Game 3. It's expected that he will go back to wearing his black shoes.

# New baseball lawyer, same song and dance

**NEW YORK** — The new lawyer for baseball owners compared players to pipe fitters and produce salesmen Thursday as he tried to convince an appeals court panel to overturn the injunction issued against the team.

The three judges of the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, who last month rejected the owners' attempt to stay the injunction, didn't say when they will issue their decision, but it probably will be within a month.

They asked Douglas Leslie, a University of Virginia law professor hired by the owners, about two dozen questions but directed just one at the lawyer for the National Labor Relations Board and none to the lawyer for the players.

At the April 4 hearing on the stay request, Chief Judge Jon Newman and Judges Ralph Winter and J. Daniel Mahoney were so harsh in their questioning of lawyer Frank Casey the owners decided to replace him.

Leslie, sporting a red bow-tie, compared free agents seeking offers from different teams to a supermarket worker who asks "the produce department to compete with the department that runs the cashiers."

Newman didn't think much of Leslie's argument comparing baseball to other industries. "I don't believe plumbers are reserved to anybody, nor are produce salesmen," he said.

In about two dozen questions to Leslie, Newman and Winter remained dubious of the owners' position, but Mahoney didn't speak during the session, which lasted just under an hour.





# New Zealand poised to grab Cup

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Get a baggage tag ready for the America's Cup.

If skipper Dennis Conner can't secure up some vodka of his own against Black Magic 1, the oldest trophy in international sports will be swept away to New Zealand.

The swift Black Magic 1 carried Team New Zealand within one race of lifting the America's Cup off archival Conner by all but burying the mermaid boat Young America at sea on Thursday. The margin was 3 minutes, 37 seconds, giving Black Magic 1 a 4-0 lead.

This is the worst beating a challenger has given a U.S. defender in 144 years. If this were a traditional best-of-7 finals, the Cup would be in Kiwi hands. But it was changed three years ago to a best-of-9. Race five is scheduled for Saturday. "It's unbelievable how easy it's been, really," Kiwi tactician Murray James said. The closest margin has been 1:51.

Conner needs to win the five remaining races, a virtually impossible task against what appears to be a perfect boat and a well-tuned crew that has lost only once on the water in 42 races.

A four-time America's Cup winner, Conner also is the only U.S. skipper to lose the Cup. Now he's in danger of letting it go twice in 12 years.

In 1983, he lost it to Australia II in Newport, R.I., ending the New York Yacht Club's 132-year winning streak. Conner had a 3-1 lead, then lost five last three races.

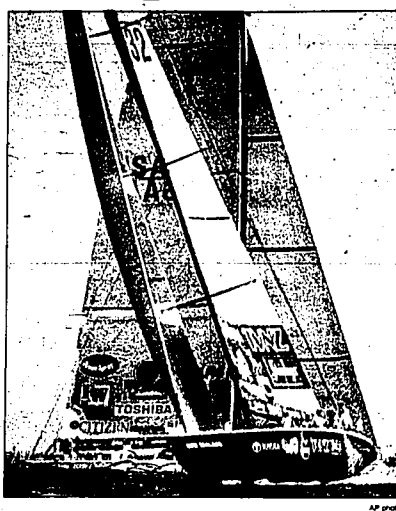
This loss would come in Conner's home waters, where he learned to sail more than 40 years ago.

Conner beat Kiwi crews in the challenger semifinals in 1987 and in the bizarre finals in 1988, and insulted them both times.

Black Magic 1, skippered by match racing star Russell Coutts, has led at all 24 marks in the finals. The Kiwis haven't been much match racing, though, because of Black Magic 1's astonishing speed.

"We obviously have a very fast boat and things are looking good for us," Coutts said. "As we sail one way away from seeing it up and we have to be careful. If we can get the next race off them, that would be great. That's all we are here for."

Thursday's race around San Diego

18.55-mile course was in typical San Diego conditions: shifty wind of 5-10 knots and seas of 2-4 feet.

There was hope for Young America, but only for about 25 minutes. Co-helmman Paul Cayard won the aggressive prestart maneuvers and led the starting line just as the gun went off, with a seven-second lead and more speed than Black Magic 1.

Young America got the right side of the course, and with it starboard tack right-of-way.

It led by about two lengths the first time the 75-foot yachts converged, then by one length the second time they came together.

But there was more wind pressure

on the left side, and Black Magic was well ahead at the third crossing, 25 minutes in.

"What now?" Cayard asked Conner and tactician Tom Whidden. Young America then took the left side of the course, but it didn't help as Black Magic 1 led by 1:09 at the first mark. The previous biggest lead for Black Magic 1 at the first buoy was 39 seconds in race two.

Black Magic 1 piled it on during the next two legs, extending the lead to 2:49 at the halfway point. The biggest lead was 3:48 at the windward fifth mark.

If the Kiwis prevail, as appears certain, the next America's Cup will be in Auckland, the City of Sails, in

# Olympic disaster teams prepare for the worst

BERRYVILLE, Va. (AP) — It's Sunday, July 28, 1996, and the Olympics are in full swing. After handling a traffic accident that blocked Interstate 265 and a major water main break downtown, official Atlanta is feeling pretty good about itself.

Then a Georgia Power substation explodes, knocking out electricity to the southern half of the city, including both Olympic stadiums. As authorities scramble to deal with that disaster, a series of tornadoes touch down in north Atlanta.

That was the scenario confronting some 125 Atlanta-area and Olympic officials Thursday as they worked through the simulated final session of a four-day federal crisis management program designed to prepare them for the worst once the Games begin.

"Our exercises are kind of devilish in a way," said John W. McKay, director of the training division of the Federal Emergency Management Agency. "We don't let them win."

"If they think they've got it fixed, we'll break something else and throw it at them, which is very similar to actual disaster scenarios," McKay said, trying to respond to them.

The simulated multi-disaster drill, and the three days of work-

shops that preceded it, were conducted at FEMA's Mount Weather conference and training center in the picturesque Shenandoah Valley about 70 miles west of Washington.

FEMA has been offering similar crisis management training to cities since 1983. Officials from Oklahoma City "Olympic through the program last year and credited it for helping them handle the aftermath of the April 19 terrorist attack on the federal building."

To prepare the Atlanta and Olympic officials, the course was specifically tailored to match conditions and situations expected in Atlanta next summer, right down to using the same number of computer terminals and programs in use in Atlanta and Fulton County emergency management offices.

Angelo Fuster, an aide to Atlanta Mayor Bill Campbell, said the simulation was so real that in the midst of the disaster drill, "citizens were calling to complain or ask for pictures of the mayor, and our council members were calling to demand how come we're spending so much money."

Contributing to the realism of the drill were "Olympic news breaks" that were broadcast into each room where the Atlanta officials were dealing with their simulated crises.

## Injured boxer in danger of dying

LAS VEGAS — Injured boxer Jimmy Garcia's condition worsened Thursday, and his doctor said he was in danger of a potentially fatal ailment.

Doctors who had been optimistic about Garcia's chances for recovery said the Colombian boxer was unresponsive overnight and his condition became unstable Thursday.

"It's possible he won't make it through this," said Dr. Albert Capanna, the neurosurgeon who operated on Garcia after he was injured Saturday night in a WBC super featherweight title fight against Gabriel Ruelas.

## Agassi cruises at German Open

HAMBURG, Germany — Andre Agassi breezed into the quarterfinals of the German Open with an easy victory Thursday. Pete Sampras had a much tougher time.

Sampras, No. 2 in the rankings, battled for three hard sets to win 6-2, 3-6, 6-2 against Daniel Vacek; a Czech ranked No. 53 and a "lucky loser" from the qualifying round who made it into the main draw.

"It wasn't pretty. I could have made it a lot easier on myself but he's got a huge serve," Sampras said.

The \$1.7 million clay-court tournament is a major warmup for the French Open, which starts May 29. If Agassi needs a proper gauge of the clay court game he should get in the quarterfinals when he plays Sergi Bruguera of Spain, the French Open winner two years in a row.

Serving for the match, Sabatini squandered five match points and then a 3-0 lead to fall to Helena Sukova in the third-round Thursday of the women's Italian Open.

"But then I kind of leveled out" and finished with a 65, also at Cottonwood Valley.

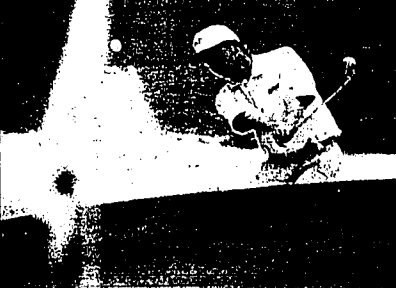

## Sanctions could accelerate rise in Japanese car prices

**Newday**

This might be the time to buy that Lexus you've been dreaming about. The trade sanctions proposed Wednesday by the Clinton administration could make Japanese luxury cars and minivans more expensive a few months from now maybe a lot more expensive.

For now, though, there are more questions than answers about the impact of proposed new tariffs, including whether they'll ever be imposed.

Questions include the definition of a luxury car. Walter Huizenga, president of the American International Automobile Dealers Association, thinks it will be deemed anything over \$32,000 — the cutoff point for the current luxury car tax. That would cover most Lexus, Infiniti and Acura models, imported minivans, including the Toyota Previa and Honda Odyssey, also are expected to be affected.

Also unclear was how large the tariffs would be, although numbers up to 100 percent have been mentioned seriously.

If so — and even if, as expected, they are based on values at the port, not at the retail level — a 100 percent tariff on a Lexus LS 400 could raise its price from \$52,300 to more than \$100,000, Huizenga said.

Huizenga had similarly dire predictions for his member dealerships and their employees, while the Big Three's major trade group welcomed the action. Shares of Ford, Chrysler and General Motors posted sharp gains Wednesday.

Unknown also is how much of any tariff would be passed along to consumers. The car makers and their dealers could cut much of the increase by reducing profits. Experts note, however, that the profits of Japanese car makers already are being squeezed by a weakening car market and the rise of the yen against the dollar.

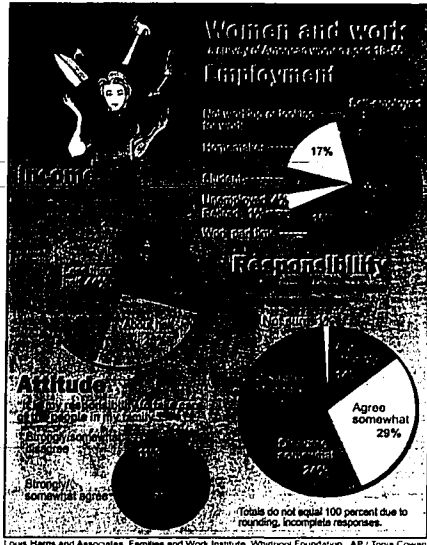
"I love my life," she said. "I just wish I could spend more time with my family."

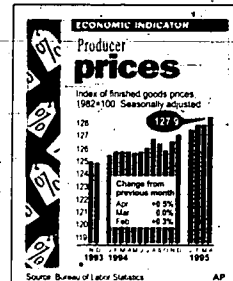

## Wholesale prices take April hike

**WASHINGTON** — Wholesale prices, driven higher by energy costs, jumped in April by the largest amount in five months.

Financial markets took the bad inflation news in stride as a second report showed the economy continuing to slow.

The Commerce Department reported retail sales fell 0.4 percent, the third decline in three months. Auto sales led the plunge, suffering its largest drop of 5.8 percent in more than two years.

While a 0.5 percent gain in wholesale prices — highest since November — would normally trigger inflation worries, most economists invoked the figure was an aberration and that the wide-spread economic slowdown would dampen any price pressures.

"We are achieving a soft landing," said Cynthia Latta, senior economist at DRI-McGraw Hill Inc. in Lexington Mass. "We are not looking at a sick economy, just a slowing economy."

Analysts predicted the federal Reserve, which doubled a key short-term interest rate last year in an effort to slow the economy to a more sustainable pace, will keep interest rates unchanged when it next meets on May 21.

But while spreading signs of economic weakness had prompted some talk that the Fed might even cut rates, analysts said any increases in the Fed and the Consumer Price Index, which comes out Friday, would be too high for a few months to allow the Fed to cut rates.

# 'Naomi & Wynona' provides tough love on Mother's Day

Naomi Judd didn't intend to write a book or produce a film about her life.

Yet, when her now-former manager obtained her unwitting signature on the contract, she knew she and her elder daughter, Wynona, had two options. One choice would be to announce to the world they had been deep and back out of the deal.

But that, she says, wouldn't be "the Judd way."

So she wrote the book and made the film, titled "Naomi & Wynona: Love Can Build a Bridge," which airs on NBC beginning Mother's Day, Sunday, May 14. The conclusion airs Monday, May 15.

"The Judd way" is certainly the theme of both the book and movie. And that way is usually the tough way.

Her ebullience and tenacity characterize both women, who spent eight years as a singing duo on the top of the country music heap.

"Naomi retired in 1991 after losing the lead in her vocal part. Now in chemical remission from the illness, Naomi is now her convalescent writing the book."

"I did it myself in longhand, sitting at home in my big-but-jammies for two-and-a-half

years, panic attacks and all, and got really out there."

The book, written by Rama Stegwer and sharing its title with the film, recounts the sad and sordid events that gave Naomi a flinty determination to overcome every trial.

At the age of 17, Naomi became pregnant and had to marry a boyfriend she didn't love, even as her brother Brian, who had been her best friend, was dying of Hodgkin's disease.

The jealousy poisons the men in Naomi's life in tones less harsh than the book, but the outlines remain: the drinking, cheating husband; the abusive boyfriend; the father who came home drunk the night he learned she was pregnant. It also glosses over the process of grooming and marketing the country music duo.

But no punches are pulled in the portrayal of relations among the mother and her two daughters. (Abbie, the younger, is now an actress.) Naomi's attempts to discipline wayward Wynona come to a stopping and name-calling, "is a real-life rag-to-riches story about real women, real people who empowered themselves, Naomi says.

Naomi says, "Fort and Wynona, Davis, as Naomi and Wynona, give convincing performances. Not only is the physical resemblance strong, but

Davis has a throaty delivery that approximates Wynona's "Cross between Elvis Presley and Patsy Cline."

"I was born with this voice," Davis says. "This is the one that I got. I have a very big foot, and I'm always trying to put it in a little Cline." Oh, sorry, that's not going to work for you. And here was one of those times when my foot just fit."

Fort and Davis have meticulously few lip-sync problems, though most of the vocals are the work of the real Judds, who recorded six songs for the film, including their first hit, "Mama He's Crazy," and the title song.

Naomi, who drew the assignment of shepherding the production for the family, recalls that on the set, "I [was] not only flashing back and remembering [all these events], but I [was] also aware that there are 150 people around me, and that they're making a silent miserie on my life!"

"Naomi & Wynona" is authorized but not sanctioned, a roller-coaster ride most viewers will want to see the end, though the closing "Forever" concert sequence is too long, either for fans (who will want to see the real Judds) or the

One event not covered in the movie is the birth of Wynona's sibling, brother, Elijah. His birth, coincidentally, occurred just hours after the re-creation of Wynona's own birth for the film.

Asked about public reaction to Wynona's sibling membership, Naomi responds with typical candor. "When she came home and told me she was pregnant, the first thing I thought was, 'This isn't what I wanted for her.' I wanted her to get married in a white gown, you know, to her soul mate, and play one of our songs at the wedding."

"Of course, it was *deja vu* for me, because I got pregnant the first time I had sex, too. And had to tell my mom."

"But the second emotion that hit me was, 'Get ready. You are going to be judged by all of America.'"

"Wynona messed up. She messed up big time. She knew it, and she's already admitting the moral consequences of it."

But then, Naomi says, "we all stood up and went into prayer." And she said, "We acknowledge and recognize this child as part of our family this instant. We love this child from this moment on."

How like Naomi to hang onto joy in the face of disappointment.

Q: Isn't it true that Michael Jackson has just about run out of movie offers, marking the end of his abortive big-screen career? — G.S.



Jackson

A: Jackson may not be the hottest male movie personality around these days, but you don't count him out. All sorts of offers come his way. The Hollywood grapevine has it that a remake of Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet" is in the works with Jackson being sought for the lead. Sounds unlikely, but that's the talk. Some of the movie crowd is wondering, however, which of the title roles would be his.

Q: Jerry Lewis was starting in the Broadway revival of "Damn Yankees," but isn't he in the genuine twilight of his career? — A.R.

A: Well, you could have fooled me. Yes, Lewis is up there in age, at 69. And yes, his medical history — plagued with a serious heart problem — is not to be envied. But he's confounding skeptics these days by pursuing a tough theater schedule with energy and real bite.

Jerry tells me he'll take to the road in "Yankees" following the Broadway run — and some road he is. He'll appear in major cities across the United States, in London and in Paris (the French are still gaga over Lewis). He'll take time off for the next Labor Day Muscular Dystrophy Telethon and for a Hollywood movie.

Q: Is Fran Drescher really a weight freak? A story said that she gains every time she gains a pound. With her TV career in high gear, can't she be comfortable in including herself? — R.R.

A: Drescher is nothing but levelheaded about

maintaining her figure. The 37-year-old star of TV's "The Nanny" stands 5 feet 5 inches and weighs a svelte 122 pounds. She's trying to keep to that weight because of the tight clothes her TV character wears. But Fran's hardly the obsessive diet-workout fanatic. Her exercise patterns are nothing special — isometrics and ballet stretches for the most part — and she admits food is a personal "big issue."

Drescher, married to Peter Marc Jacobson for 17 years, is secure enough to take weight gains in stride. She got close to 150 pounds at one point and allows that she'll probably get back up there again. That's why Fran, ever practical and ever flexible, keeps three wardrobes at home — small, medium and large — to accommodate her shifts in weight.

Q: Even though the novel, "The Bridges of Madison County," is a huge best seller, lots of people hated it. Did Meryl Streep love the book, or did she agree to do the movie because there are so few roles for women of her age? — E.L.

A: Streep didn't like the

Q: Is it true that Sean Penn, after a period of domesticity, is back to his former hard-drinking, womanizing ways? — B.H.

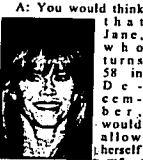

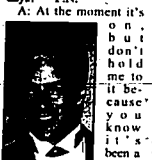

It appears the producers have not formulated any long-range plans with Ms. Zimmer. At least none which either party is willing to talk about at this point. The lovely actress was all smiles when asked if she planned on coming back to "Guiding Light" on a permanent basis. She replied

that she has always loved playing Reva but wouldn't go beyond that. Reading-between-the-lines, it looks like Kim Zimmer could come back to "Guiding Light" if the offer was too good to refuse. She did say that her husband and three kids have taken to the California lifestyle and it would be difficult to turn them away if she were to return to New York City where the show is taped.

Ironically, Zimmer and Watros worked together in the wonderful off-Broadway play "Four Dogs and a Bone," which took a bold and caustic look at Hollywood filmmaking. Both loved doing the play and are happy to be working together again on "Guiding Light." And Robert Newman was obviously happy to have his favorite leading lady back, even if it might be for just a brief interval. This trio, whose storyline is reminiscent of Noel-Coward's "Blithe Spirit," should spark the soap and please its faithful fans.

Kim Zimmer lights up a room with her easygoing charm and that down-to-earth quality of hers. She is also a first-rate actress. And if "Guiding Light" can enlist her estimable services for longer than is currently planned, the show and its fans will be well-served.

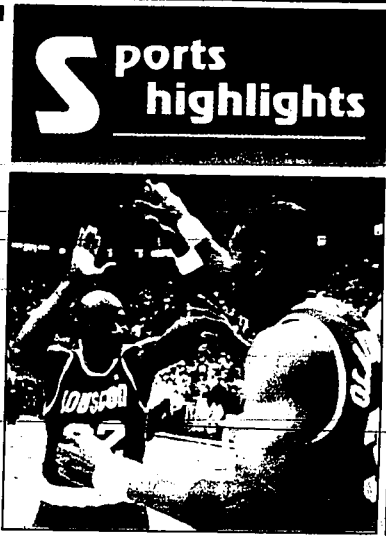

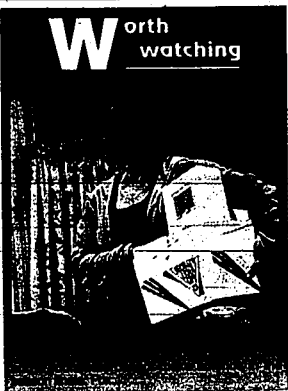

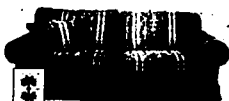
