"We cannot continue to unjustly take assets from property owners unlucky enough to be caught up in civil forfeiture proceedings," Hyde said. "Nothing less than the sanctihere. The current situation is abusive, it's unjust, and it must be addressed."

The PLO leader Yasir Arafat signed a revolutionary peace agreement with Israel in 1993. Now, facing extremists among his owm people, hardening attitudes among Israelis and his own conflicts, the question is:


When PARADE talked in 1982 with Yasir Arafat, the leader of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO), he insisted:
"There will be no solution to this area, no settlement, no securib; by overlooking Palestiniant rights." But a member of the Palestine National Councll added: "Arafat is the first pragmaric Arab leader the West has confroined."

Todas: Anajar's credibiliyy as a leader, as sell os his pragmatiom is being tested. When he signed the Declanations of Principles with Israeli Prins Minister Yöthak Rabin in Washington, there was cause for celebration: The PLO'publicly renounced termorism and recognized Israel's right to exist. Israel, in turn, agreed to withdraw from territories in Gaza and Jericho, givting the PLO a chance at self-administration and pledging funher areas of self-government, including elections.
Since then, the agreement has seemed precarious. Terrorism by radical Palestinian groups has increased, and Israelis have becone skeptical about continued talks and concersions. AFafar, 100, hasbeen sharply criticited by his own people.

Israel and the PLO have pledged to reach agreement on a variety of issues by Juily 1 , yet the question remains: Can a man who encouraged terrorism around the world control the terror that threatens to derail his cause?

OGGING ALONG THE, BEACH IN Gaza, I was suddenly surrounded by a swarm of children. They shouted and threw stones at me; as they hadiat Israch soldiess during the insifada, or uprising. One hit my back. Another struck my neck. "You mustunderstand," an Arab friend explained later, "They've lost their target. Now they even throw stomes at each other in school,".

Soon afterward, I'spoke with Yasir Arafat in his office in a former beach club on the Gaza waterfiont. Here, the PLO chairman has set up a mint-govert-: ment, the Palestinian National Aurtiority, with limited self-rule in the Gaza Strip and the sleepy city of Jericho-a small beachicad to a future Palestinian stare that is to include the West Bank.
Arafat was wearing a khaki sweater and black-and-white Arab headdress, its crown folded to resemble the old map
of Palestine. He has a strong, virile presence, and there is a latent ferocity in the faice. But his 65 years lay upon him in the lined features, graying hair, thinning beand subpble and spreading paunch.
For millions, he is a hero-a wily freedom fighter who, like some other leaders of pational movements, chose terror as the lastresort of the poweriess. For millions of others, he is the enemy-an international teriorist responsible for the massacres of innocent men, women and childen that docurred under his clasimantship of the PLO: an American ambassador and aide riddled with bullets in Khartoum; 11 Israeli Olympians, murdered in. Munich; a crippled American Jew thrown from a boat off the Syinan coast. To'many, because of his past, Arafat inspires only moral outrage and distrust.

who resigned in protest after the Peace Prize was awarded to Armfat (with Isracli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin), maintaining that his "past is too trinted with violence, tertorism and bloodshed, and his future too unpredictable." ${ }^{\text {² }}$

Yet Isriel decided finally to deal with this man, and other nations were commitied to trusting him. Could he be counted on?

At this moment, the Palestinian leade was very angry-and very much alone. He had just received an urgent cill from Prime Minister Rabin. A double-suicide bombing by Islamic militants had killed 19 lsmelis-all but one were young sol-diers-and wounded 65 . Three months before, 21 civilians fand been blownup on a Tel Aviv bus. Isracl was in shock, and Rabin had retalinted.
"They did it again," snapped Arafat. "They closed our borders." He stared angrily at me: "Do you know what that means?"

I knew that in the Gazn Strip about 900,000 people aire squeezed into 90 square miles-while Gaza's remaining third is still occupied by Esracli settiers and the army units guarding them. Up to 50,000 workers would becut off from Ismeli jobs, with a $\$ 1$ million, daily loss. Extended closure would result in rotting produce and lost trade-increasing the loss to $\$ 2$ million:-And a million West Bank Palestinians would suffer simitiar damages.

Arafat nursed his rage, staring at his desk. Finally, Nabil Shaath, his senior peace negotiator, broke the silence. "Now the peace talks are stalled," he said. "Just when we were close to a mnjor breakthrough." He noted that at the last meeting with-Rabin, they had discussed the relense of 1700 of the 6000 Palestinian prisoners held by Israel, plus the creation of a "safe corridor" from Gazn to Jéricho and a freeze on Israeli settement-building in the West Bank.
"Have you understood?" Arafat asked. "They're bombing Israel to destrioy us. "Iran is funding this. Also, the Gulf states and people in the U.S. are sending moncy to Jihad and Hamns." He returaed to the Israelis. "With their army, they couldn't stop our people from throw-

to another day. "You can see why the president is so upset," he said.
"Upset? Upset? I'm furious!" roared Arafat, slamming the table, his eyes red with anger, this thick, purple lips moving wordlessly. His entire life had come to this desperate moment He was fighting. to retain his leadership-in effect, his life. -Today,-there-are-about-6-millionPalestinians. Close to 5 million live in Gaza, the West Bank, Israel and Jordan. The rest are scattered around the world. mostly in Syria, Lebanon, Egypt and the U.S. For many of these people, Arafat's image brings visions of former homes, orange groves, wheat-ficlds-and memories of lost ones fallen in their national struggle. But his failure to deliver on these dreams has brought disenchantment with him as well.

Beneath the mock military garb and Arab headdress, Arafat remains hidden, equating seerecy with survival. His women, however, do somewhat lift the veil. His wife, Suha Tawil, a Christianbom feminist (now conyerted to Islam) who is 31 and half his age, said he is "gracious, gallant, and very amusing." She added: "But he's also a Leo and hus to control everything. You live in his shadow." It isn't a bed of roses. At the close of a 16 hour day, he sends for her at 3 a.m. or $4 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$., to join him at one of several safe houses -their few private moments to be enjoyed within a cordon of security guards. Their first child is due next month.

Umm Nasser, 70, and one of five women in Arafat's life before Suha, said Abu Ammar (his nom de guerre) was :a very good man, gentle and sensitive." She added,

Jerusalem is fiercely present in his dream of the Palestinion homeland. This was evident a few days later when, on the outskirs of Gaza, he laid a comerstone for a Palestine Labor Union headquarters. $\qquad$
Arafat arived in his bullet-proof Cit. dillac, flanked by wailing sirens and a militmy escort. The crowd, frecly mingling in an empty field. lined up to shake his hand. From there, he took his place under a flag-decked canopy, fucing 300 seated spectators. Scores of others watched from nearby buildings.
His speech opened routinely enough, calling upon Palestinian laborers to join hands in building a new nation. But then he told them to keep building until they got to Jenisalem. His voice rising, he said, "All of us are willing to be maritys along the way, until our flag flies over Jerusalem, the capital of Palestine! Let no one think they can scare us with weapons, for we have mightier weap-ons--the weapon of faith, the weapon of martyrdom, the weapon of Jihad!"

It was, some would say, a discourse for a larger audience. Arafat was telling his enemies-the Islamic Jihad and Hamas-that he wanted credit for any eventual release of their prisoners. He also was helping Palestinions, wherever they might be, to keep alive theirdream of retum. And he was speaking to those battle-worn comrades who had deserted him after the Oslo and Cairo accords, insisting thath he hand betrayed the revolution and waiting now to see how -he would setule scores with the Immelis.

Yer the PLO leader appeared unaware of what effect his words would have in Israel, where Jihad and Hamas bombs had killed 67 and injured 239 in the past year, and where Jihad means "holy war" to Isrueli ears.
"Arafat doesn't realize that in this world you cannot have secret talks, then declare something else in public." observed Dr. Eyad Sarraj, a psychintrist who directs Gaza's community mentalheath program. "You cannot talk about pence, theristir up violence in any way."

Shorly after this, I joined Arafat for a late-night supper. When I arrived, the waiting hall was packed with bankers and investors from all over the world. The Arab boycott was fading, the Midenst gates were open, and everybody, it seemed, wanted a piece of the pie. We miet finially at 1330 a.m. Süpper had been set on the conference table in his office: soup, vegetables, cheese, pita bread, fruit-Arafat doesn't smoke, and he avoids meat; coffee and alcohol. He takes lukewarm tea with honey, believing heat desiroys vitamins. Five aides sat with us. As my host, Arafat
rose to serve me some vegetable soup. Then he passed some poppy-seed rolls. "From Jerusalem," he announced. I noticed that the skin on his ams was tuming white from loss of pigment. Oddly, it made his small hands appear to belong to someone else.
Our talk began where it had left off. What could he do about stopping the terrorists from blowing tup all chances for peace? "We're making progress," he said.

In secret talks, both sides had agreed that Palestinian elections had to be held as soon as possible, prior to expanding self-rule on the West Bank. To achieve this and save the peace process, Isracl would redeploy security forces from six major urban areas. Arafat, in turn, would seek an agreement with Hamas and Islamic Jihad to hold off their atncks, would begin military trinls against extremists and conduct arms roundups. Further, Arafat and Rabin would anticipofe next year's negotiations on the "permanent status" of such critical issues as, settlements, borders, Palestinian statehood, seemity mad, eventualify, Jerusalem.
I showed Arafat a photo: a handsome youth of 23 who had participated in a recent suicide attack in Israel. He touched the face with one finger. "They distort our religion to do this, tempting these young boys into killing themselves," he said sadly.
Did Arufar foresee a day when Jewish and Arab children would play together without inherited seeds of hatred?
"I have always wanted a unified state of separate nationalities, as in Switzerland," he said. An aidé removed a silver menorah from a cupboard and placed it before us. Then Amfat pointed to a large picuure on the wall. It showed the Dome of the Rock in Jerusalem, Islam's third holiest sice. He drew a figure of the threc great religions of the Holy Land in their historical order-the Jewish menorah rising into the Christian Cross which in tum led to the crescent of Islam. "This is the emblem of our Fatah movement in the PLO," he explained. "You sec how the religions should coexist?"
Between Palestinians ind Jews, he said, he saiw a special affinity. The Jews were very intelligent. They were the elite. But so were his people. "And we have the same ancestor in Abraham," he said, referring to the belief of Ambic descent from Abraham's first son, Ishmael, whom be had by HagarEgyptian handmaid of his wife, Sarah.

I recalled that after the birth of Isanc. Abrahan's frist legitimate soa, Ishmac! and his mother were driven into the desert wildemess. So Arafar's ancestors began as refugees.
"Nol" he replied, amused. "Abraham was also a refugee, driven out of Ur into Canain and Egypt. We both began thut way. But for us, it's. not over yet." If

ONE COLD MINNESOTA morning in Murch 1994, Ilayon agumey outside an operating room waiting for the surgery that would remove one of my two healthy kidncys and put it into my friend Michael's body. This aperation was totally unnecessary for me. I am $n$ living donor, a volunteer. But for Michael, the operation was crucial-it might save his life.

There are about 40,000 people like Michnel on various waiting lists in the U.S. at any time. Eight people die each day because the organt they $\overline{\text { needod--be it }}$ a heart. liver. Jung. kidney, or body tissue such as borre marrow-doesp't arrive in time.

I was amazed at miy lack of fear as I waited for the operation. Maybe I was relaxed because fort two yerns I'd had a strong feeling that I would be Michael's donor.
I had known Michael for many years. He'd always been a close friend and had
helped me through some tough times. I Knew that he had diabetes and that the disease was destroying his kidneys.

Three years ago, I had run into Michnel in the lobby of the Greenwich Village building where we both lived. "Do you know anyone with a spare kidney?" he joked. He explained that his kjdreys were beginning to fail rapidly and that dialysis was, at best, a temporary solution: The death rate for diabetios on dialysis was very high. Michael, then only 45, cleariy was very scared.
"Well." I blupted out, "if you can't find another kidney, you can have one of mine.". Over the next two years, Michnel was unable to find a donor. Being an adoplee whose adoptive family had died, it wasnot possible to.get an organ from a family meriber: Although I had decided to move to Los Angeles, 1 kept asking him to start the acceptance process with me. "I don't want you to die," I insisted. Finally, we started the compatibility testr. With maich
ing A-pösitive blood types, Michael knew hat if my kidDeys were working and there was nothing else wrong with me, I would be approved.
On Jan. 18. I flew to the University of Minnesota Hospital and Clinic in Minneapolis for Then begain the difficult part the wait
On Jan. 28. 1 began the drive to Los Angeles. Michael and I hugzeti I Pold him not to worry, we would meet again in Minneapolis, I carried a card in my wallet with the transplant center's 800 mum ber and Michael's name, just in case. After all. I didn't want anyone else getting my kidneys now! Finally, at a truck stop in Tennessec. I got the okay by phone from the transplant ceimer. I began to cry and called Michacl. We would meet in a month to share what must be one of the most dramasic interactions between two friends.
A few nights before the operation, I haid in bed and thougtit about what I was about
to do. What would life be like with one kidocy? What if something happened to if? Might I die on the operating table? It was too late to back out, and my thinking really never reached that poim, bett it would be okay with me if, suddenly, a cadaver kidney appeared, and I was off the hook. I calmed myself down with the assurance that no one had ever died from lochney failure after donating, so if I did have to live the rest of my life on dialysis, it was fate. Then I said a prayer and went io sleep.
'Back in Minmespolis, on Feb. 28, I urderwent final pre-op tests. Michael and I talked and joked. The bond between us was strong. "With one female kidncy," I teased, "you'll have tousethe ladies' room from now on."
Isaw Micharel asi whs wheeled past his stretcher on the way to the O.R "Good liche" Tcallid out. Then, in what seemed liike seconds but was acturally about four and a half hours, it was over. The f pext day, they had me get up and walk. Walk? You people are crizy," I said. But I did; and once Hind wifl fig: in motion I didn't stop. I walked chael's room. What I saw in his eyes cannot be put into words. I'vo pever felt such love from anopthorperson.
IWas released six days after suingery, but Michael had to stay gind reguilate the anti-rejection medications. It was difficule to leave him. He slowly bent over, gave me a kiss, and said, "Thank you, Joani. I love you."-

Place the orange slices around the center, overlapping the endive. Carefully fan the chicken in the center. Drizale about $3 / 4$ cup of sauce. or more if desired, over the chicken. Drizzie any extra orange juice on the endive. Sprinkle the cucumber around the vegetnbles and the scallions over the chicken. Sprinkle all over with fresh mint. I brought into prominence a theory about the UN being spread by some members of militia groups. They apparently believe the United Nations is part of a "New World Order" that plans to take over the U.S. and--using UN troops--deprive American citizens of their rights and freedoms.
"Such fears are unfounded and utterly farfetched," says Gillian Sorensen, the UN undersecretary in charge of this year's 50 th ant niversary celebration. The UN is an organization of 185 member
 states working for peace, justice, development and opportunity," she adds. "To think it is taking over governments is a complete fantasy."
The United Nations-founded 50 years ago tomorrow-has no standing army. Its troops are offered by mertber countries for temporary serv ice, such as during the Gulf War, In addition, as one of the five permanent members of the Security Council, the United States has veto power over any action by UN peacekeeping troopssurely an obstacle to any "New Worid Order."
Incidentally, the UN also has no taxing ability. All funds come from member states, and it curculimen rently is in financial crisis. (The biggest deadbeat? The U.S., which: Sonemberr owes more than $\$ 1$ bilion.)
