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# Law protects species, habitat too

WASHINGTON — In a blow to the timber industry and property-rights advocates, the Supreme Court ruled Thursday the government must protect threatened plants and animals by forbidding destruction of their habitat.

The 6-3 decision, one of the most significant environmental rulings by the court in decades, immediately brought calls for Congress to rewrite the 1973 Endangered Species Act and ease restrictions on landowners.

"The Supreme Court has just given those of us in Congress more incentive to change the act," declared Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore. He said the law should be rewritten "so that people count as much as bugs and birds and plants."

The court in the final day of its session upheld a longstanding interpretation — held over 20 years by both Democratic and Republican administrations — that the 1973 law prohibits not only direct harm to endangered species, but also to their natural surroundings.

The timber industry and groups of landowners had argued successfully before a federal appeals court last year that the government's interpretation was too broad. They maintained the law addresses only direct threats such as hunting or trapping of a species.

On Thursday, the Supreme Court disagreed and called the appeals court decision flawed.

Congress' intent in enacting the 1973 law was "to provide comprehensive protection" to endangered and threatened species, including protection against "indirect as well as purposeful actions," de-

clared Justice John Paul Stevens, writing for the court.

He continued that even on private property the protection of habitat so species are not killed or injured is a "reasonable interpretation" of the lawmakers' intent.

Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt called the decision a common-sense interpretation of the law as followed by both Democratic and Republican administrations since the 1970s in protecting rare species.

The decision was a major victory for environmentalists, who maintained that

## Ancient beaver flies from fossil bed

HAGERMAN — "Come on home, Mr. Beaver!" excited park rangers yelled as the fossilized remains of a prehistoric rodent became airborne Thursday.

The beaver — the first complete skeleton in the region — Fossil Beds National Monument collections — got a lift across the Snake River from a Bureau of Land Management helicopter crew.

While combing the 4,281 acres of the monument last August, paleontologists discovered the ribs, neck and tailbones of the beaver showing above ground, and they worked until fall to get the skeleton partially uncovered and chemically treated.

Paleontologist Chris Force said he had to screen dirt and bone chips around the site before tackling it with a trowel and shovel.

The bones remained "articulated" — complete, connected and in the same position as when the animal died in its aquatic environment, Force said. Monument scientists will use potassium argon to date the skeleton, which was deposited under the Shoestring Basalt lava flow.

The bones were probably exposed above ground during the winter of 1993-94, said Bob Willhite, chief ranger for the National Park Service. They had been buried for 3 million or 4 million years, he said.

Deposited in soft, sandy material, the beaver remains were endangered by any movement. Teeth and vertebrae fell out when scientists first tried to move the skeleton, using a car hood as a sled.

But leaving it at its home 200 feet above the river would expose it to the dangers of theft and vandalism, Willhite said.

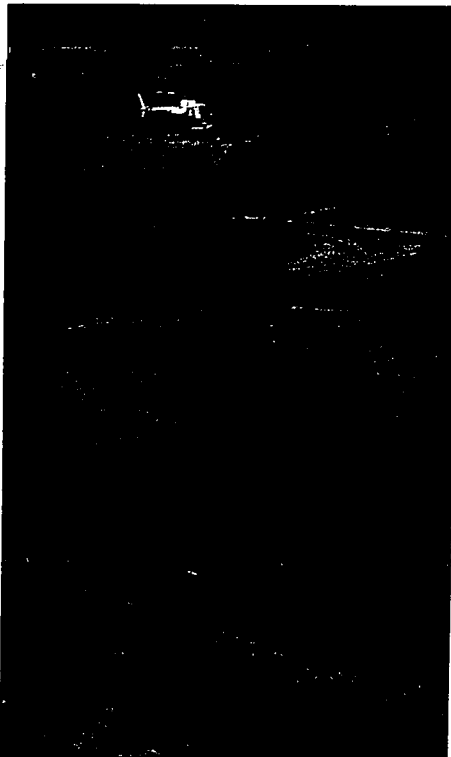
So Park Service rangers and students dug a foot under the fossil and enticed the bundle of dirt and bones in burlap and plaster — "just like a dog's legs for a broken leg," Willhite said. A wooden shipping frame and a cargo net surrounded the plaster jacket.

Attempts to move the 1,000-pound package with a gasoline-powered winch were disheartening, Willhite said. Six people working for half a day moved it only 30 feet toward the river's edge, where they had planned to load the fossil onto a boat.

Operation Beaver had to take flight.

Flight manager Larry Mabbutt called the operation a perfect training exercise for cargo pickup, and Willhite said he was pleased with the opportunity for interaction between the

## Ancient fossils may be ancestor of humans, apes

WASHINGTON — The earliest known common ancestor of apes and humans was a squirrel-sized monkey that lived 36 million years ago, according to an analysis of skull, jaw and teeth fossils found in an Egyptian desert.

Elywn Simons of Duke University said the fossils bear the distinctive teeth and skull shape of the small monkey that clearly "at the bottom of the human family tree, near the roots."

"This is the earliest animal known from the higher primates, the group that humans, apes and monkeys are in," Simons said Thursday.

The ancient and extinct animal known as Catopithecus was named by Simons and his colleagues. The fossils "unmistakably mark it as a higher primate" were found more recently.

A report on the discovery is to be published Friday in Science, journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Simons' claim of finding the oldest higher primate fossil is plausible but unprovable, said Bert Covert of the University of Colorado, Boulder.

"This is fantastic material, the best from early higher primates," said Covert. "The question is, is it really the oldest" from the evolutionary branch that includes humans.

Covert said that specimen found in China and Algeria are older, but are "extremely fragmentary" and their species classification is uncertain.

"Simons' material is between plausible and compelling" as the oldest higher primate fossil, said Covert. "The other material I would place between unlikely and plausible. We cannot resolve the issue right now."

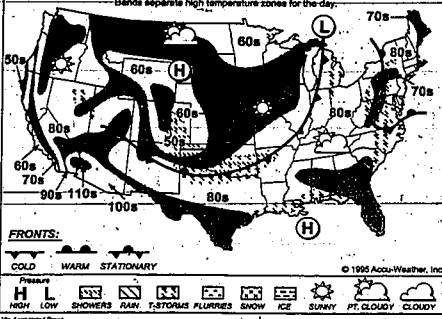

## Rain for the East Coast, sun for the West

Rain linged over the eastern half of the country Thursday as flooding rivers and streams continued to plague North Carolina and Virginia and thunderstorms walloped the Midwest.  
A storm in Savannah, Ga., blew windows out of buildings downtown before moving south into the Florida Panhandle.  
Extremely heavy rain fell in Oklahoma and Arkansas, with some flooding reported and more thunderstorms developing from Arkansas into Mississippi.  
Heavy rain hit southeastern Texas and south-central Louisiana as well.  
A line of severe thunderstorms stretched across Ohio, bringing heavy rain, large hail and damaging wind.  
In the West, mostly sunny skies prevailed from southern California into Washington, while thunderstorms were developing in the Four Corners region.  
It was a chilly morning in the Northeast, thanks to a cool pocket of Canadian air. The cold front that moved out of Canada earlier this week left behind cool air and mostly sunny skies from New York to Maine.  
The temperature at New York City's John F. Kennedy International Airport dropped to 55 degrees, breaking 1967's record low for the date of 55.  
Cool air spanned the High Plains as well, and highs across Nebraska and the Dakotas were only expected to rise into the mid to upper 60's.  
The Plains were likely to get rain, and scattered thunderstorms were expected from the Sierra Nevada into eastern Utah. Thunderstorms were expected from the eastern slope of the Rockies across central Texas and through the Gulf Coast, with locally heavy rain and high wind possible.  
Temperatures were expected to range from the upper 90s to low 100s in the valleys of California and the desert Southwest, and into the upper 70s in the Great Basin.  
As a high pressure system worked south across the Midwest from the High Plains, temperatures were likely to fall below normal across northern Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri today.

species protection would be impossible if their habitat on private land were destroyed or significantly altered. More than 90 percent of the 781 endangered or threatened species listed by the government in 1993 are found on privately owned land.  
The decision means that ranchers' private range next to salmon streams can be regulated by federal agencies. Loggers could be limited in cutting trees on private land to protect grizzly bears.  
"We cannot safeguard species if we destroy their homes," said Victor Sher, president of the Sierra Club Legal Defense Fund, which had filed a brief with the high court on behalf of 15 environmental organizations.  
At the heart of the dispute was an interpretation of the word "take" in the 1973 law, which defined it as "to harass, harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, trap, capture or collect."

Since 1975, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is implementing the law has defined "harm" to include "significant habitat modification" or destruction that leads to an injury of a protected species.  
The lawsuit filed on behalf of timber companies and a group of landowners in Oregon argued that the regulations went beyond the law and that protection should be limited — to only direct threats such as killing or trapping a species. The sides agreed habitat on federal land should be protected.  
With the high court rejecting their arguments, timber industry and property-rights advocates said they would turn to Congress to change the law.  
"It's time for Congress to take responsibility to stop the abuse of power," said Jennifer Deming, an attorney for the Pacific Legal Foundation, which represents groups of landowners.  
"The decision makes it clear that

the Endangered Species Act needs to be changed," said Mike Tracy, public affairs director for the Idaho Farm Bureau in Boise. "This provides Congress with the ammunition it needs to change it."  
James Geisinger, president of the Northwest Forest Association, a timber industry group, called the court decision "a ludicrous interpretation" that "we believe that Congress will remedy."  
In a dissenting opinion, Justice Antonin Scalia said the government overstepped the scope of the law. To extend protection to habitat "imposed unfairness to the point of financial ruin" to landowners, Scalia wrote.  
"He was joined in the dissent by Chief Justice William Rehnquist and Justice Clarence Thomas."  
Justice Sandra Day O'Connor sided with the majority and suggested that if the scope of protection were to be narrowed Congress is free "to revisit this issue."

BLM and Park Service rangers.  
"I was elated to see it not crush into the river or smash into any trees," said Force, who watched from another hill on the east side of the river.  
A buoy system and flotation devices had been attached to the skeleton's east end and an emergency safety patrol boat waited below.  
After a half-mile transit, Reid dropped the fossil into a waiting trailer, and rangers drove the beaver to its new home — a storage facility at the monument's visitor center in Hagerman.  
Because space limitations will slow down paleontologists' work, it may be several years before the skeleton is displayed publicly, Willhite said. Proposed construction at the monument may fall victim to federal budget cuts.  
"We have some concerns about our extremely limited (laboratory) space — that's why we're really

hoping for a new research and visitor center," Willhite said.  
Scientists will slowly remove the surrounding dirt and take the skeleton apart in late summer. They plan to compare the fossilized beaver's measurements to the bones of modern beavers to check for adaptations and changes in skeletal structure, Willhite said.  
"We find a lot of bits and pieces of beavers on the monument, and it's always been kind of assumed it's related closely to the modern beaver," Force said.  
The beaver has yet to earn a name — scientists don't know yet

hoping for a new research and visitor center," Willhite said.  
But it was definitely one or the other — unlike the well-known Hagerman "horse," which has a skull and jawbone of different sexes.  
"Whoever put it together was either playing a joke or didn't know better," Willhite said.  
Though only 300 fossil sites were recorded at the Hagerman monument when it was first staffed in 1991, over 600 sites are now known, Willhite said. Fossil sites are left unmarked to minimize vandalism risks, he said.  
The beds hold the prehistoric remains of more than 100 species.

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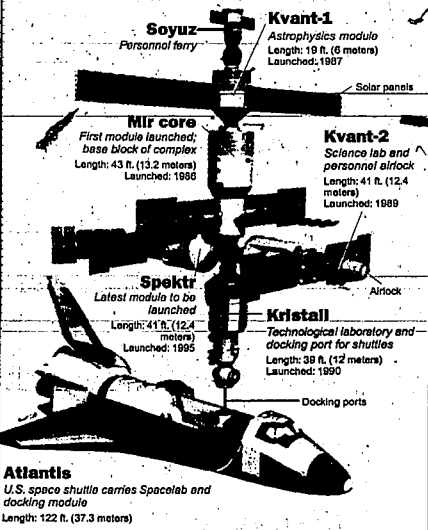
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# Atlantis-Mir docking provides international links

## Historic space docking

The Russian Mir Complex is a modular space station. "Mir" can be translated as "peace," "commune" or "world." The first module was launched in 1986. Soyuz and Progress ferry vehicles are routinely launched to Mir to deliver fresh crews and supplies.



SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Americans and Russians clasped hands, kissed and hugged after their two spacecraft linked high above Earth on Thursday and began a historic five-day voyage as a single ship.

It was a triumph for both spacefaring nations, bitter rivals in the past. The seven men and women aboard shuttle Atlantis were greeted with salt and bread, a Russian tradition, when they entered the space station Mir through a 25-foot-long pressurized docking tunnel. In turn, Atlantis commander Robert "Hoot" Gibson gave the three Mir men fresh oranges and grapefruit, chocolate, three carnations and three silk roses.

"I guess this really means the Cold War is over," President Clinton said with this reaction as he watched on television.

Together, Atlantis and Mir formed the largest spacecraft ever, an awesome half-million-pounds hurtling around Earth at 17,500 mph.

The rendezvous and docking were the first practice run for the construction of an international space station before the end of the century.

An American Apollo capsule and a Soviet Soyuz docked in July 1975 during a brief thaw in the Cold War — the only previous linking of spacecrafts of two nations. This time, there were twice as many people — 10 — and considerably more room, not to mention higher expectations.

Russian Vladimir Syromiatnikov, who designed the docking mechanisms for both missions, called it "V-Day, Victory Day, of space technology."

"It was perfect. It was really perfect," he said.

Gibson, who deftly guided Atlantis up to Mir, had the honor of cranking open the shuttle hatch and being the first one inside Mir. He shook hands with Mir commander Vladimir Dezhnev, who met him at the door.

The historic moment was captured by the space travelers on film. As the picture-taking wore on, one of the Russians on Mir shouted, "Let them leave their cameras behind, for heaven's sakes!"

The five Americans and two Russians who had gone aloft on Atlantis floated one by one into Mir. Dezhnev, NASA astronaut Norman Thigard and cosmonaut Gennady Strekalov vigorously waved them in; they had been waiting for this moment for nearly four months. Atlantis is their ride home.

"The first part of the adventure is over and we're waiting for the second part, which is the landing," Strekalov said.

TV viewers around the world watched live. But the video was delayed in much of Russia, except for the Far East, where news shows were on.

Vice President Al Gore and Prime Minister Viktor Chernomyrdin, conducting talks on economic and scientific cooperation, watched the proceedings on big TV screens at a Moscow

hotel. "This is a great metaphor for our work," Gore said.

Seven Atlantis-Mir dockings are planned over the next two years, leading to construction of an international space station beginning in 1997. The United States, Russia and 11 other countries have united in that effort.

"In the future, no one has enough money in their budget to do space exploration on their own," said NASA's space station director Wilbur Griffin.

The rendezvous and reunion began Thursday morning as Gibson slowly steered Atlantis from 270 feet, to 30 feet, and then right up to Mir at about an inch per second as the two craft sped 245 miles over central Asia. Gibson was right on the mark. The 12 hooks on Atlantis caught the 12 corresponding hooks on Mir.

"That sure couldn't have gone slicker," Gibson rejoined.

One mistake and the 100-ton shuttle could have crashed into the 13-ton Mir and breached the pressurized vessels, killing everyone.

On Tuesday, July 4, the shuttle crew will activate a release mechanism and separate from the space station. The shuttle will return to Earth on July 7.

The two Russian cosmonauts who went up on Atlantis — Anatoly Solovoyev and Nikolai Budarin — will stay behind on Mir.

For Thagard, Thursday was his 105th day on Mir and his 107th day in space. By the time Atlantis returns to Earth on July 7, Thagard will have spent 115 days in orbit, a U.S. record.

He was under extensive medical tests during the five days that the spacecraft are docked.

## Survey finds support for Medicare cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Most Americans support slowing the growth of Medicare to keep it from going bankrupt, but they are leery of replacing the government insurance plan with private vouchers, a survey indicated.

The poll released Thursday by the Kaiser Family Foundation indicated that less than half the public backs putting the brakes on Medicare if the goal is simply to balance the budget or free revenues for a tax cut.

"Just as in health reform, the American people are leery of sweeping change, and generally opt for more modest incremental reforms.

Medicare is no exception," said Drew E. Altman, president of the Kaiser foundation, which designed the poll with the Harvard School of Public Health. It was conducted by Louis Harris and Associates.

The foundation, based in Menlo Park, Calif., is a nonprofit, independent national health care philanthropy and is not associated with the Kaiser Permanente health plan or with Kaiser Industries.

Republicans and Democrats in Congress are battling over the future of Medicare. The GOP wants to save \$270 billion over seven years to keep Medicare's hospital fund sol-

vent and help balance the entire federal budget. President Clinton has proposed \$127 billion in Medicare savings.

The hospital fund, which now has a surplus of \$136 billion, will start declining next year and run out of money by 2002.

Republicans hope to spend this summer convincing the public the program is in crisis and needs the economy measures they will unveil in September. House Minority Leader Dick Gephardt, D-Mo., has accused the GOP of plotting "a massive mugging of Medicare."

## Disney forms new firm to distribute explicit film

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) — Somehow, the two seem an unlikely match: the Walt Disney Co. nameplate and the adults-only NC-17 rating.

So Disney's Miramax Films formed a separate company expressly for the purpose of distributing and marketing "Kids," an explicit account of teens, sex and drugs.

Miramax said the new unit, called Excalibur Films, will be funded and owned by Miramax principals Harvey and Bob Weinstein. "Kids" is set for release in New York July 21, with

additional cities added July 28.

"Kids" has not yet been rated by the Motion Picture Association of America, but it is expected to receive the NC-17 rating. One of the movie's characters specializes in having sex with 14-year-olds girls.

Excalibur will release the film uncut if it receives the NC-17 mark, said Eamonn Bowles, Excalibur's chief operating officer. Disney is contractually prohibited from releasing unrated films and refuses to let Miramax handle any NC-17 fare.

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# Nation White House shooter receives 40 years

WASHINGTON (AP) — Francisco Martin Duran, convicted of trying to kill President Clinton by firing a barrage of bullets at the White House, was sentenced Thursday to 40 years in prison.

U.S. District Judge Charles Richey rejected the government's request to lock up Duran for life, saying he thought the sentence would serve to punish the defendant and discourage others from similar acts.

"That is the rationale," Richey said. "I do this without any malice."

Duran, in a blue prison jumpsuit and orange shoes, told the court that he had wanted to die on Oct. 29, 1994, the day he fired more than two dozen bullets at the mansion. At the time of the shooting, Clinton was watching a football game on TV in the living quarters. No one was injured.

"My acts... were inexcusable and wrong," Duran said in an even voice before he was sentenced. "I'm sorry that I've not only ruined my life and my future but that of my wife and son."

"My son will be the lion's claw that pulls me from death. Your Honor, I wish no harm on anyone."

Under federal sentencing guidelines, Duran is not eligible for parole. He could reduce his sentence by as much as five years with time-off-for-good behavior, according to Monty Wilkinson, a spokesman for the U.S. attorney.

Richey also ordered Duran to pay \$3,200 for the damage his shooting caused to the White House and \$500 in penalties. Upon his release from prison, he will be placed on five years' supervised probation, the judge said.

After passing sentence, Richey assured Duran, "You are still a human being. I hope you will understand that the court considers you such."

Earlier, in response to questions from Richey, Duran said he plans to earn a college degree in small business management while he's in prison.

"Good," Richey said.

Duran, 26, an upholsterer from Colorado Springs, Colo., was found guilty last April of one count of attempted assassination, one count of damaging federal property, four counts of assaulting Secret Service officers and four firearms violations.

The jury rejected defense arguments that Duran was suffering from paranoid schizophrenia and thought he had been chosen to shoot and kill an evil "mist" that was enveloping the White House.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Eric Dubler, who had asked Richey to go beyond federal sentencing guidelines and send Duran to prison for life, said he was satisfied with the term.

"It's longer than I'll be alive," he said outside court.

A.J. Kramer, the federal public defender representing Duran, said he did not yet know whether they would appeal.

At trial, a psychiatrist testifying for the government said Duran had left Colorado Springs in a pickup truck last Sept. 30 after seeing a series of visions in which an alien being told him the mist had hung over the White House for 1,000 years.

Lawyers for the government ridiculed this contention and said Duran was pretending to be mentally ill to escape punishment. The jury found Duran was not criminally insane at the time of the shootings.

On Thursday, after Duran made his statement to the court, Dubler noted how rational and lucid he sounded, saying, "I guess he's been remarkably cured of paranoid schizophrenia."

Duran first fired at a tourist inside the White House gates who had a haircut like the president's. Duran was wrestled to the ground by a passerby on the sidewalk outside the White House.

### Officials find man housing hundreds of rats

DELTONA, Fla. (AP) — A lonely, elderly man was found living in squalor with hundreds of rats that he fed and turned to for companionship.

Angelo Russo, 79, was hospitalized for a mental evaluation after authorities discovered the filthy conditions. The rats were so domesticated that they just sat staring at the health officials and exterminators.

"I don't know what he had been feeding them, but these were nice big rats, fat and fluffy. They had very thick fur," said Paul Misulney, county assistant director of environmental health department.

### Nation Study finds brain abnormality in alcoholics

NEW YORK (AP) — A malfunctioning communication system within the brain might predispose some people to become alcoholics, a study says.

The work also suggests that medications that help this system work better might help nonviolent alcoholics stop drinking, but not violent ones, said researcher Dr. Jari Tiihonen.

He and colleagues at the University of Kuopio and Niuvanniemi Hospital in Kuopio, Finland, report their study in the July issue of the journal Nature Medicine.

Another alcohol expert said he believes the abnormality found in the study is a result of alcoholism rather than a sign of a predisposition to it, but he said the work is still significant.

The work focused on a brain system in which brain cells signal each other by releasing bursts of a chemical called dopamine. Once each burst has done its job, it is pulled back into the signaling brain cell by a structure called a transporter. The new work looked into a part of the brain called the striatum to record the density of these dopamine transporters.

Researchers scanned the brains of 19 habitually violent alcoholics whose alcoholism usually developed before age 25, and 10 nonviolent alcoholics, plus a comparison group of 19 nonalcoholics.

They found that the transporter density was markedly lower than normal in the nonviolent alcoholics. In the violent alcoholics, it was slightly higher than normal.

The reduced density in the nonviolent alcoholics was probably in place before the alcoholism began and it may be a sign that the dopamine system is not working normally, Tiihonen said.

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### Scientists may have discovered source of migraines

NEW YORK (AP) — Scientists say they might have located the source of migraine headaches, a finding that suggests a new target for drugs to stop the attacks that strike some 16 million or more Americans.

Brain scans of nine migraine patients, studied within six hours of the start of migraine attacks, showed persistent overactivity in a structure called the brainstem at the base of the brain, researchers report.

The scans revealed a possible migraine "generator" at the point where the brainstem joins the midbrain, said Dr. Hans Christoph Diener.

Attacks might result from the generator's losing normal control over brainstem centers that regulate perception of pain and the expanding and contracting of blood vessels, he said.

Overactivity in those centers might in turn lead to migraine symptoms, said Diener, chairman of the neurology department at the University of Essen in Germany.

The generator "continues firing even when the headache is gone," he said. That fits in with what many patients say, that even after the pain is gone they still feel tired and "they somehow know that the attack is not over," he said.

The work suggests looking for new anti-migraine drugs that not only relieve the pain but also suppress the generator to cut off migraine attacks at the root, he said in a telephone interview.

The brain scanning results might be the first direct look at this migraine generator in humans, Diener and colleagues report in the July issue of Nature Medicine.

### For full protection, state needs background-check law

Here's a quote to chill any Idaho parent: "States that don't fingerprint tend to be safe havens for those who don't want to disclose a past that could prevent them from getting into the profession."

Roger Hanshaw, consultant for teacher certification with the Idaho Department of Education, was talking about matching the fingerprints of prospective school employees against national criminal records. Idaho lacks a law requiring criminal-background checks — a deficiency that could put Idaho's children at risk.

Lots of Idaho school districts, including many in the Magic Valley, already check the criminal records of people they hire. But some don't.

What's worse is, without a state law mandating such checks, Idaho districts aren't allowed access to the FBI's computerized national records.

That means, if a convicted felon from Florida or Delaware applies to be a teacher, janitor or administrator in an Idaho school, the district might never discover the candidate has a criminal record.

The 1995 Legislature talked about passing a background-check law. But it

didn't get the job done. Lawmakers should make such a law a priority for 1996.

Meanwhile, school districts should be sure they are using whatever tools are available to them.

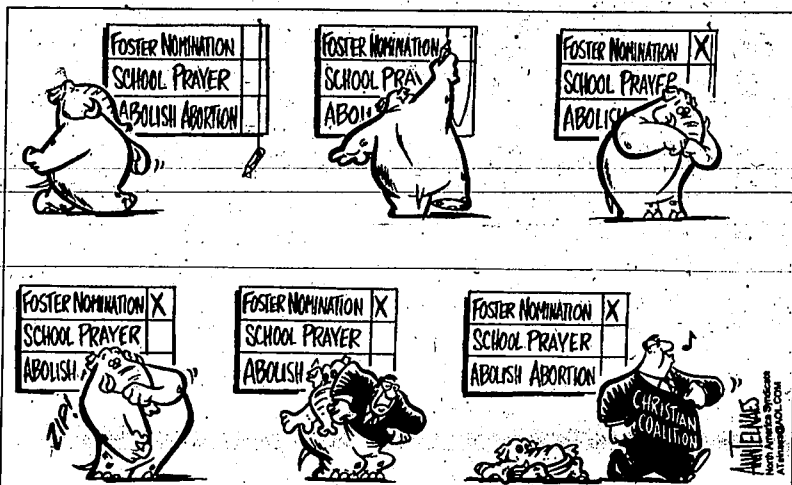
That goes for Gooding. Officials there have lobbied for a state law, and that's commendable. But in the meantime, they should start doing background checks on their own.

Last year, Gooding inadvertently hired a math teacher who had a recent drug conviction. Record checks already available to Idaho school officials might prevent a repeat of that mistake — or a worse one.

But districts also need to remember that checking criminal records isn't enough. Criminal records give (at most) only a partial picture of a person's character.

Many school districts — Gooding included — carefully check references of job applicants. Good for them. They should continue doing so, even after full-scale fingerprint checking becomes available.

As any employer knows, a few phone calls can turn up lots of useful information that never shows up in official files.



## Why students don't have the write stuff

Summertime, and the living is easy. Schools are empty, so the damage has stopped. During this seasonal respite from the education system's subtraction from national literacy, consider why America may be graduating from its high schools its first generation worse educated than the generation that came before.

Particularly, why is it common for high school graduates to be functionally illiterate, uncertain when reading, and incapable of writing, even a moderately complicated paragraph?

Heather Mac Donald knows one reason: More and more schools refuse, on the basis of various political and ethical and intellectual theories, to teach writing.

Her essay, "Why Johnny can't write," in the current issue of The Public Interest quarterly, is a hair-raising peek into what she calls "one overlooked corner of the academic madhouse."

Mac Donald, a contributing editor of the Manhattan Institute's City Journal, explains how the teaching of writing has been shaped by "an indigestible stew of 1960s liberationist zeal, 1970s deconstructionist nihilism, and 1980s multicultural proselytizing."

Indeed many teachers now consider the traditional idea of teaching to be intellectually suspect and morally offensive because it is tainted by the authoritarian idea that there are defensible standards and by the ingenuitarian idea that some people do things better than others.

At a 1966 conference organized by the Modern Language Association and the National Conference of Teachers of English, the "transmission model" of teaching composition was rejected in favor of the "growth model."

The idea of transmitting skills and standards was inherently threatening to the values

of that decade — spontaneity, authenticity, sincerity, equality and self-esteem.

Education in the new era of enlightenment was to be not a matter of putting things into students — least of all putting in anything that suggested a hierarchy of achievement — but of letting things out.

Nothing just interfere with the natural, undirected flowering of the student's personality. One interference would be a teacher cast as an authority figure rather than in the role of supportive, nurturing friend.

The "growth model" was, Mac Donald notes, impeccably liberationist: Who was to judge anyone else's "growth"? And that model "celebrated individualism and error as proof of authenticity."

This was convenient for evolving racial policies. In 1966 The City University of New York began the first academic affirmative action program. Open admissions would soon follow, as would the idea that it is cultural imperialism to deny full legitimacy to anything called "Black English."

Simultaneously came the idea that demands for literacy oppress the masses and condition them to accept the coercion of capitalism.

"Process" became more important than content in composition. Students would "build community" as they taught each other. A reactionary emphasis on the individual was replaced by a progressive emphasis on the collectivity.

But, says Mac Donald, there have been difficulties: "Students who have been sold in their writing class to let their deepest selves loose on the page and not worry about syntax,

logic or form have trouble adjusting to other classes."

Academic fads have followed hard upon one another, all supplying reasons why it is unnecessary — no, anti-social — to teach grammar and style.

The deconstructionists preached that language is of incoherently indeterminate meaning. The multiculturalists, who preach the centrality of identity politics in every endeavor, argue that the rules of language are permeated by the values of the dominant class that makes society's rules and also makes victims.

Mac Donald says, "The multiculturalist writing classroom is a workshop on racial and sexual oppression. Rather than studying possessive pronouns, students are learning how language silences women and blacks."

As student writing grows worse, Mac Donald notes, the academic jargon used to rationalize the decline grows more pompous. For example a professor explains that, "post-process" — post-cognitive theory — represents literacy as a ideological arena in composing as a cultural activity by which writers position and reposition themselves in relation to their own and others' subjectivities, discourses, practices and institutions."

Nowadays the mere mention of "remedial" comes to be considered insensitive about "diversity," and especially insulting and unfair to students from American "cultures" where "orality" is dominant. So at some colleges remedial courses are now called ESD courses — English as a Second Dialect.

The smugly self-absorbed professoriate that perpetuates all this academic malpractice is often tenured and always comfortable. The students on the receiving end are always cheated and often unemployable. It is summertime, and the nation is rightly uneasy about autumn.

## As 1996 election approaches, remember Dick Morris' name

I have no idea who will prevail in the already endless 1996 presidential wars. But I'm pretty certain who will be everybody's all-purpose villain.

His name is Dick Morris, aka Bill Clinton's Hidden Hand, Secret Guru and Svengali.

If you've never heard of Morris, join the club.

He's a 47-year-old, Manhattan-bred hustler who is the Holy Ghost of politics — operating everywhere, never seen. Where most consultants claw for publicity, Morris ducks that shows, is rarely photographed or interviewed. He's as invisible as a Maytag repairman.

The cinch is Morris will be the guy both 1996 parties love to hate.

White House aides resent his often secretive role on Clinton. Democrats in Congress distrust him. Republicans — many of whom paid him to run their campaigns — sneer at him as a hired gun with the morals of a Mafia hit man.

Who is this supposedly sinister force?

The only certainty is that he's a lone wolf who'll work for both sides. And he's Bill and Hillary Clinton's #1 number.

Even some Clinton loyalists compare Morris to Rasputin, the 19th-century Russian mystic and faith healer who led the czar's family to destruction.

"He's the Aldrich Ames of politics," fumed Republican consultant Paul Curcio, comparing Morris to the CIA traitor.

Sen. Trent Lott, R-Miss., recalls Morris being paid to give Republicans the lowdown on Clinton in 1992. He says Morris advised them to tag Clinton as "Slick Willie."

So much for loyalty.

Same Morris who calls Clinton — when taking his paycheck — "my political spouse."

The only certainty is that Dickie Morris is the savior Bill and Hillary call on when they're in big trouble. The additive pattern has gone on for almost 20 years.

He's the Clinton's emergency plumber.

"First in His Class," the excellent book on Clinton's Arkansas years, by David Marantz, portrays Morris as a stormy, mercurial Dr. Fix-it. He and Clinton would not endlessly over-poll. In one argument, Clinton punched Morris outside the governor's mansion.

Arkansas' comeback achieved, Clinton would fire Morris, spurn him like a hoodlum until the next crisis. "It's as if I were too dirty to touch without gloves," says Marantz.

No surprise then that the Clintons — most notably Hillary — called Morris for a desperate fix

after Newt Gingrich's revolution stunned Democrats. Suddenly the White House staff discovered Dick Morris had been shipping Bill's strategy in phone calls and faxes.

"I don't get it," said one White House staffer. "Sure, there's resentment when somebody new has access to the president," says Clinton spokesman Mike McCurry smoothly. "But people aren't at one another's throats. They work well together."

Maybe. But Democrats in Congress — meaning such as Dick Gephardt, David Bonior and Tom Daschle — are terrified that Clinton's invisible guru is steering the president's destiny.

What Morris is telling Clinton seems to be: (1) "Triangulate" — his word — "between the Democrat left and Republican right." (Meaning a return to the "New Democrat" image of '92.)

(2) "Blame everything against future attacks" (Thus Clinton's "Me Too" budget plan, cutting Medicare, that enraged many Democrats.)

(3) "Define yourself by taking on weak enemies." (Thus the Morris-inspired TV ads hammering gun zealots or Clinton's attacks on pro-lifers after Dr. Henry Foster's defeat.)

"Sure, presidents have always had advisers. But the best ones, whether Roosevelt, Truman or Kennedy, made sure they were perceived as the man in charge."

It won't help Bill Clinton if he's seen as Rasputin's tool.

**Gooding leads way in checks**  
Gooding School District has been in the lead in the state in efforts to do background checks on school employees. Recent articles have led people to believe the opposite. To think Gooding does not want proper background checks of employees is erroneous. We do considerable reference checks but do not yet require local fingerprinting.

For the past two years, our district has supported and campaigned for legislation at the state level through the following resolution which best describes our district's position:

"Whereas, the safety of our school children is of paramount concern for all school districts, and

"Whereas, mobility of our society is increasing, and

"Whereas, there is a greater concern for legal liability among school districts, and

"Whereas, hiring of certificated and non-certificated school staff with unknown criminal records including sex offenses is increasingly a concern of Idaho parents and school boards, and

"Whereas, at least seven of 11 western states do state and federal criminal records checks prior to issuing teaching certificates, and for other school personnel hiring, and

"Whereas, processing of records checks is most effectively done at the state level rather than individually by 112 Idaho school districts,

"Now, therefore be it resolved that the Idaho School Boards Association support legislation to require state and federal criminal records checks of certificated school employees as part of the certification or recertification process."

And be it further resolved that this legislation also implement a requirement and method to give federal and state criminal records checks for all non-certificated personnel employed in a public school at the time of employment or within one year if currently employed.

# White House hero tops Carnegie list

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Harry M. Rakosky Jr. hadn't even planned to visit the White House the day shots were fired.

He was just walking along Pennsylvania Avenue, "kind of day-dreaming," when he happened upon the frantic scene.

He heard bangs that sounded like firecrackers, then saw a crowd fleeing and a man with a gun slung over his shoulder.

"I told my feet to move," said Rakosky, a former security officer who used to guard embassies under construction. He grabbed the man from behind and landed on top of him, then restrained him until help arrived.

Rakosky, 34, of San Antonio, was one of 15 people to be commended by

the Pittsburgh organization, founded in 1904 by industrialist Andrew Carnegie to honor those who risk or lose their lives trying to save others. Heroes or their survivors receive \$2,500 and a medal.

No one was injured when Duran peppered the White House with 29 rounds. He said he was shooting at an evil "mist" hovering over the building. Authorities believe Duran was about to load a new magazine into his semi-automatic assault rifle when Rakosky grabbed him. Another man, Kenneth Davis of Hagerstown, Md., came soon after and grabbed Duran from below.

Rakosky, in Washington for a workplace violence seminar, first took cover

behind a concrete barrier when he heard the shots. When he saw Duran looking down at his gun, though, he decided to go after him.

"It was kind of funny," he said. "Half of me was saying, 'Stay where you are,' and another half was saying, 'Move!'"

Among the other winners, five saved or tried to save others from burning vehicles or homes, and six stepped in while people were about to drown. Another helped save a man from an attacking bull. Two others stepped in as people were being assaulted.

Three of the 15 died during rescue attempts.

Kolob Creek in Springdale, Utah.

Martin Z. Kaplan of Sarasota, Fla., who helped save Thomas Donlon and Burton Gilman from drowning in the Gulf of Mexico on March 26, 1994. The men, both 65, had become caught by a strong current.

Randall S. Neustaedter of Pilot Mound, Manitoba, who died after helping save 10-year-old Courtenay E.S. Funk from drowning in a lake.

John Louis Picone III of Slidell, La., who helped save 6-year-old Matthew R. Hereford from drowning on July 13, 1994. Matthew was a passenger in a car that went off a bridge into a lake.

Raymond M. Ast of Orlando, Fla., who saved Gordon W. Stockhill and Joyce C. Stockhill from a burning pickup truck.

## Boise man joins honorees for heroism in action

# Red, white & you

## All over the valley, it's a fabulous Fourth

TWIN FALLS — The Fourth of July weekend has long since ceased to be just a summertime holiday in the Magic Valley; it's become a complex industry.

A dozen different Magic and Wood River valley communities will be lighting the fuse on summer over the next five days with festivities that will be attended, by conservative estimate, by 80,000 people.

Here's the rundown:

#### Twin Falls

Dick Sterling, who's in charge of the physical plant at the College of Southern Idaho, figures 20,000 people showed up for the annual Independence Day pyrotechnics on the campus two years ago. He's not sure about last year.

"I watched it from my front yard," he said. The event has grown into Twin Falls' largest annual one-time gathering, thanks in large part to the now-departed University of Frozen Foods, which funded it for years.

UFF's successor, Lamb-Weston, is footing the \$10,000 tab this year and has hired a new contractor, Oregon-based Western Fireworks.

"I think people will be pleased with the show we have planned," said Jay Pomeroy, the company's operations manager. "There will be some things people there haven't seen before."

Western Fireworks plans to fire about 70 3- and 5-inch shells from its mortars over a 21-minute period, grouping fireworks with different explosive and color patterns in ways that are unusual, he said.

"It really takes some fairly complex choreography," Pomeroy said. "The show is all pre-programmed, but our on-site director has to coordinate things fairly closely to get the effects we want."

Unlike previous years, Twin Falls firefighters won't be touching off the rockets' red glare, Pomeroy said. The charges are pre-packed in the mortars that fire the shells.

"It's just a lot safer than having people bending over the mortars with a live charge," he said.

The best viewing spot? Anywhere within a two-mile radius of the CSI campus that's not obstructed by trees or buildings, Sterling suggests.

"A lot of people just find a grassy spot somewhere and spread a blanket," he said. If you're planning to drive to the CSI, keep in mind that the large parking lot on the northeast corner of the campus is off-limits — that's where the fireworks are, and organizers don't want spectators being hit by their fallout.

But there's ample parking on the southern and western sides of the campus, and you'll be closer to the party.

That's where the United Way of Magic Valley will be selling hamburgers, hot dogs, chips and drinks at its annual barbecue.

The first annual Twin Falls Hot Summer Nights will feature classic cars from throughout the West, showing off and cruising for three nights, starting tonight.

The biggest happening is a Saturday night cruise up North Blue, starting at the Wilson-Bates parking lot at 8 p.m. and ending at the Frosty Mug Drive-In, 151 Blue Lakes Blvd. That's the best time to see the 200 cars that are expected to participate, according to organizer Stacy Knutson. The best place is anywhere along North Blue.

In addition, there's a rod run leaving from the Lynwood Shopping Center parking lot, and "show 'n' shines" scheduled from 4 to 6 p.m. today at Schuck's, and Saturday from 10 a.m. to noon at Quality One, from 4 to 6 p.m. at the Audio Warehouse and from 6 to 8 p.m. at Wilson-Bates, co-sponsored by Wilson-Bates and McDonald's.

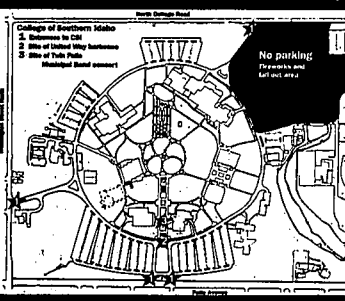

# Bruce knows Diddley: Bo to help open Willis's bar

HAILEY — Fireworks, celebrities, and nine nights of music: The Mint Bar and Restaurant, owned by movie star Bruce Willis, kicks off its week-end and half-long grand opening today.

Willis, the 40-year-old star of "Die Hard with a Vengeance" and the town's most famous real estate mogul, is throwing an impressive party, highlighted by a Saturday night performance by Willis and his rock group, The Accelerators; and by legendary guitarist Bo Diddley.

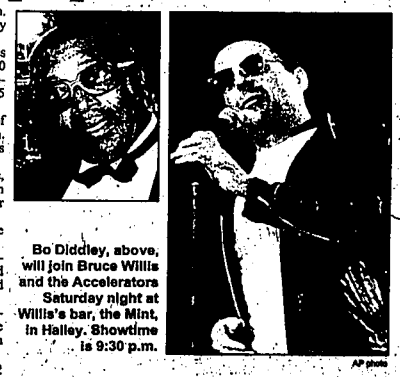

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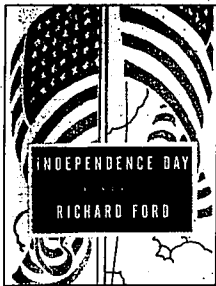

## Richard Ford waves literary flag



NEW YORK (AP) — The name of Richard Ford's new novel is "Independence Day." There's an American flag on the cover and the story is filled with references to the Declaration of Independence, Alexis de Tocqueville and, most of all, Ralph Waldo Emerson.

A longtime literary Deal Democrat, the 51-year-old Ford has not turned into a teary-eyed conservative in middle age, nor has he written a satire of people with those values.

Instead, he looks upon "Independence Day" as something both subtler and more direct. With a lack of irony Emerson might have appreciated, he is trying to say what it means to be an American, how we might define "independence" and what's the best way of attaining it.

"The novel is a meditation on independence in America is rugged individualism, which leads to isolation, which leads to a dried up life," Ford said during a recent interview.

"My notion is you have to be with other people and achieve independence, and that's the only way you can sufficiently free you from the entanglements of your past and allow you to make new relationships in the world. That seems to me an attainable goal."

Ford's new book is an act of flag-waving, but the flag is literary. Was an admitted lack of modesty, he was hoping to produce a fiction writer's most tangible act of patriotism: a Great American Novel.

At 451 pages, "Independence Day" is his longest, most ambitious book. It's the sequel to what has been Ford's most popular novel, "The Sportswriter," published to

much acclaim in 1986.

The narrator, Frank Bascombe, still lives in suburban Haddam, N.J., but he has drifted from sports writing to real estate. He not only sells homes, but rents out two houses in another neighborhood. He has two kids, and wishes the older one, a teen-age son, would get interested in Emerson.

In "The Sportswriter," his ex-wife was known only as "X" (Ford said he couldn't decide what to call her). Now, we learn her name is Amy and that she has remarried. Frank himself has a girlfriend, but, as with everything else in his life, that could change at any time.

Such Ford books as "Rock Springs" and "The Ultimate Good Luck" dealt almost exclusively with personal relationships. It didn't seem to matter what year those works took place, who was president or whether the characters voted

Democrat or Republican, if they bothered at all.

But the two Bascombe novels are more fitting for an author who studied writing under E.L. Doctorow. Through his narrator, Ford attempts not simply to follow one man's life, but to capture the mood of the country at a certain time in history — in the case of "Independence Day," a holiday weekend during the summer of 1988.

As the country looks indifferently upon an inevitable Bush-Dukakis presidential race, Bascombe (a Democrat) is trying to sell a house to a cranky couple from Vermont, Joe and Phyllis Markham.

The 1980s real-estate boom is still on and the Markhams don't care for what's in their price range. One rainy Sunday, riding in a car with his clients, Frank thinks about how choosing a home, the supposed culmination of the American Dream, may actually be an American nightmare.

"What we all want, of course," Frank observes, "is all our best options left open as long as possible; we want not to have taken obvious turns, but also not to have misread the correct turn the way some other boy-o would. As a unique strain of anxiety, it makes for a vicious three-way split that drives us all crazy as lab rats."

Frank, of course, scampers about the same cage. Even as he looks forward to his so-called "Permanent Period," he can't stop looking at his life in terms of how it might have turned out differently.

What he suffers from, Ford will tell you, is the mindset of a fiction writer.

## Author rethought theme in 'Rethinking America'

NEW YORK (AP) — Along the way to writing "Rethinking America," Hedrick Smith did some rethinking of his own.

A book originally intended as a look at where American business went wrong ended up focusing as much on people and education as on companies and technology.

An early lesson came during Smith's first visit to a Toyota assembly plant in Japan.

"I'm an American. I go in there looking for the chrome and the fancy robots," Smith said in an interview.

Instead, as he wrote, "There was nothing physically imposing about it — no dazzling modern technology."

"In fact, the Takaoka plant, an early Toyota flagship, was far less modern than the Mercedes plant at Sindelfingen (Germany) or the General Motors plant I had seen in Pontiac, Michigan. ... Its assembly lines were conspicuously not high-tech, and the Japanese considered that a virtue."

Toyota's advantage, he discovered, was in its attitude toward customers and especially workers: giving them major responsibility for solving problems, and listening to them and accepting their suggestions for making their jobs easier, such as substituting plastic grommets for screws, changing the height of the assembly line or designing shelves that feed parts to the line by gravity.

"I think I can't imagine a book with probably the basic American faith in technology. I got one hell of an education," Smith said. "Technology is fine but it only really works for you if you have the people to exploit it."

From that discovery flows a series of case studies, of the U.S. educational system as compared to those of Germany and Japan and of how some U.S. companies have been able to change and compete at world levels while others haven't.

While the broad subject area has been covered in many previous books and magazines, Smith keeps his focus on people and on concrete examples of what they're doing — and what's happening to them.

An example is what Smith calls "the midkids." The book is dedicated to one of them, Jason Fuller, a senior at Blue Springs High School in suburban Kansas City, Mo.

Fuller, like many of his peers, isn't headed for college. In Germany, such teenagers are steered into vocational apprenticeships that lead to good, high-paying jobs, and their Japanese counterparts are recruited by multinationals for jobs with big corporations, Smith writes.

Meanwhile, without significant guidance from family or school, Fuller drifts through fast-food and clerking jobs before joining the military in the hope that he can learn a career there.

"We've really failed that kid," Smith said.

But in both education and business, Smith finds success stories as well, examples in which people and organizations determined to change have been able to do so.

In education, he depicts an inner-city New York high school that graduates 90 percent of its students. Of those who graduate, 90 percent go to college, thanks to an intense one-on-one mentoring system and innovative ways of teaching and testing. He also describes former Wisconsin state school Superintendent Bert Grover's decade-long struggle to set up a system of youth apprenticeships for non-college-bound kids.

And in business, Smith tells how Motorola Inc. took on the Japanese and won — not only by holding on to its pager and cellular phone business in the United States, but in win-

ning a significant part of the Japanese market, too.

Along the way, Motorola had to upgrade its quality standards to what at first seemed like fantastically high levels; teach remedial English and other skills to half its staff at one plant; and enlist the U.S. government's help to overcome obstacles faced in this way by Japanese bureaucrats.

For its success, Smith credits Motorola's chief executive, Bob Galvin, and the corporate culture he fostered — the antithesis of another company and another determined CEO, GM and Roger Smith, that the book also profiles.

## Movie review

There seems to be more public interest these days in a movie about space exploration than there is in the space program itself.

Of course, the real program doesn't have Forrest Gump while "Apollo 13" does. Or, rather, the new film has Tom Hanks as the next best thing to Forrest, even though Hanks isn't especially Gump-like here.

In "Apollo 13," Hanks plays Jim Lovell, commander of the unlucky 13th moon mission. It isn't Lovell's fault when things go haywire, but it certainly is his problem.

It's also trouble for his mission-mates, Fred Haise (Bill Paxton) and Jack Swigert (Kevin Bacon), and for the guys at Mission Control.

In real life, you may recall, the astronauts made it back to Earth. But even though you know how things will turn out, director Ron Howard manages to maintain suspense throughout the movie without resorting to melodrama or becoming overly manipulative.

Based on "Lost Moon" (the nonfiction account of the near-tragedy, written by Lovell and Jeffrey Kluger), this film is mainly set in 1970 — a time which, like our own, has seen a sharp decline in public support for space exploration. But the public's interest is peaked when an oxygen tank explodes on the mission, placing the lives of the flight crew in jeopardy.

You might expect a movie about space exploration to celebrate true grit. But Howard surprises you by focusing as much on the bright stuff as on the right stuff.

The astronauts are heroes here, but they're not the only heroes. Those faceless Mission Control guys — with their slide rules and pocket protectors and pot bellies — are saluted for their level-headedness and, even more, for their good old American ingenuity.

Back Rogers meets Mr. Fixit as "Lost in Space" turns into "Saved in Space." For each new problem the astronauts face, the earthbound eggheads dream up an answer.

Not enough oxygen? Too much carbon dioxide? Power shortages? Hey, they have it covered.

Some of their solutions are hilariously low-tech: One glitch is corrected with the use of duct tape and a sock.

Working from a script by William Broyles Jr. (creator of TV's "China Beach") and Al Reinert (director of the superb Apollo documentary, "For All

Mankind"), Howard has fashioned a simple, straightforward docudrama that pretty much lets the story tell itself.

This director doesn't go in for the irony and complexity that made "The Right Stuff" a classic of skeptical patriotism. In fact, "Apollo 13" is the just sort of movie for the squares who didn't like "The Right Stuff" were probably hoping the 1983 film would be.

"Apollo 13" isn't about acting, although the ensemble cast (including Kathleen Quinlan as Lovell's steadfast wife) performs as an effective unit. And Hanks is a terrific choice for the leader who didn't can appear strong and military without slipping over into Sgt. Rock cominess.

Modest is as modest does. (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley.)

## Band wrapped up in horror, sci-fi

Rob Zombie is 30 now, a mark that could well be traumatic for somebody who runs around using that kind of surname.

"I guess it could be," says the front man of the hard rock band White Zombie, who once went by the surname Cummings. "But nothing really seems any different."

"Every single thing my parents said I would outgrow, since I was 10 years old, I haven't. Nothing seems like it ever changed in my life."

Just eyeballing Zombie and his bandmates is a good look-see at arrested development in the flesh. With his skull-and-crossbones patched headdress, tattoos, long hair, beard and shades, Zombie fashions himself a cross between Mad Max and Captain Hook. The rest of the band, in their denim, leathers and goatees, look like a '90s band of buccaners.

The whole crew is willingly and gleefully immersed in an adolescent world of horror movies, comic books and cheesy science fiction. It's plastered across White Zombie's latest, his violent, sci-fi, slashers — the latter filled with horror film posters and a gestalt drawn from "The Texas Chainsaw Massacre."

The group even tried to get Christopher Lee, the second-strut horror star, to recite some lines for its new album, the Top 10 "Astro-Creep: 2000 Songs of Love, Destruction and Other Synthetic Delusions of the Electric Head."

Simply put, if Boris Karloff and Bela Lugosi formed a band, and Wes Craven produced their albums, it would be White Zombie.

early age I can't ever remember not being into it," says Zombie, who was once a production assistant on "Pee-wee's Playhouse." His North Hollywood loft apartment is filled with pinball machines, horror film posters and giant model robots. His new prize possession: a life-size statue of the "Creature From the Black Lagoon," which he bought for \$2,000 from a Hollywood shop.

"My family went to Tijuana when I was like in kindergarten, and I remember seeing one of those in front of a store there," says the Massachusetts-raised progeny of an upholsterer and a saleswoman. ## Officials locate drowning victim's body in reservoir Panel opts for natural rim look

FAIRFIELD - Searchers Thursday found the body of a Richfield boy who drowned in the Magic Reservoir when high waves Wednesday swamped a boat carrying him and five other people.

Glade Swainston, 15, grabbed the leg of a fellow boat passenger who was starting to swim to shore, but he let go, saying "I am just hindering you," Camas County Sheriff Harold Lee reported.

"That was the last they saw of him," Lee said.

Swainston, Tony Jennings, his three children, and 16-year-old Brandon Jordan, all of Richfield, had gone fishing Wednesday in the 14-foot wood-and-fiber-

glass motorboat when strong gusts created two-foot waves.

The three children, who were wearing life jackets, were pulled to safety after the boat sank, Lee said. Jennings and Jordan swam to safety, but Swainston couldn't swim, he said. The older passengers were not wearing life jackets, he said.

"Everyone was having a hard time staying afloat," Lee said.

Wednesday evening, divers from Blaine County Search and Rescue searched the murky, choppy waters for Swainston, but were forced quit at sundown because they "could no longer see," Lee said.

Crews resumed their search early Thursday morning. First, Camas County Search and Rescue workers had dogs sniffing to pick up a human scent out on the

water. They marked spots on the water with buoys.

Then Blaine County divers and six divers from the Cassia County Search and Rescue took turns groping underwater for Swainston's body, Lee said.

Camas County Coroner John Glick flew his private plane over the lake in an unsuccessful attempt to get a better view of the submerged boat. A fisherman who lives near the lake joined the rescue effort with his pontoon boat on both days of searching, Lee said.

A Cassia County diver found Swainston's body close to the bottom of the lake at about 12:30 p.m., he said.

"We haven't recovered the boat yet," Lee said. "We will probably do that sometime within the next day."

TWIN FALLS - Landscaping near canyons should be as natural-looking as possible, the county's canyon advisory committee suggested Wednesday evening.

To accomplish that, new residential and commercial development would be set back from any canyon rim by a 25-foot "natural landscaping" area, if county commissioners follow the recommendation.

In a 5-3 decision, the landscape setback was added to a proposed land-use plan that committee members will review for two weeks before approving a final draft on July 12.

Eric Mikese, chairman of the county's planning and zoning commission, suggested the 25-foot setback in hopes of keeping "gleaming metal" objects, like satellite dishes, out of sight from anyone inside the canyon.

The proposal would not eliminate decks closer than 25 feet to the canyon, but it would require rocks or indigenous vegetation around such decks.

Dissenting committee members said a narrower strip of natural vegetation would be easier to control and avoid the definition of "natural landscape" unclear.

Mel Quale argued that letting elected officials, "rather than an arbitrary line in the sand," set the rules would keep decision-making in tune with the "changing mood of the community."

But David Mead called such an approach "totally vague" - like letting officials change the speed limit daily. "In the long run around here, we're going to want the integrity of the canyon rim for both safety and aesthetics," Mead said.

The advisory committee also voted to add three other recommendations to its study:

- A signed, notarized waiver of liability accompany any request for a variance to building setback requirements. The waiver would be transferred to any subsequent property owner with the land deed.

- State and federal land management agencies should involve the community in all land-use planning decisions and include county commissioners in all planning for rim land.

- The canyon rim plan should be reviewed every six months by the planning commission and the county commissioners.

A three-hour public hearing on the committee's canyon rim recommendations is scheduled for 5:30 p.m., Aug. 9, in the county annex building. Copies of the document will be available from County Commissioner Dennis Maughan after July 12.

## Around the valley

### Buhl voters approve supplemental school levy

BUHL - Voters easily approved a \$350,000 supplemental levy Thursday for the maintenance and operations of the Buhl School District.

Totals released Thursday night had counted 225 ballots (57.7 percent) in favor of the supplemental levy and 165 ballots (42.3 percent) in opposition. The levy needed a simple majority to pass.

"We're very happy and very pleased and want to thank the community for its support," Schools Superintendent Rick Hill said.

The school district needed the extra money for school renovations, extra workers, textbooks and reserves because the district had based its budget on over-estimated state funding figures. With the levy, taxpayers who own property assessed at \$50,000 will see an increase of about \$5.90 per month.

### Starting Saturday, drivers can renew licenses via mail

TWIN FALLS - Beginning Saturday, drivers statewide will be able to renew their licenses by mail.

The state will mail renewal forms to eligible holders of standard licenses 60 days before expiration. The form must be returned to the local sheriff's office with \$21.50. Renewal stickers will be mailed to drivers to affix on their licenses.

Failure to receive the renewal form is not an excuse for late renewal, officials say. Drivers may still renew licenses in person at the county courthouse. Anyone seeking substantial changes in a driver's license will need to visit the county courthouse.

### Utilities commission approves rate reduction for natural gas

TWIN FALLS - The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has approved an overall 4.2 percent reduction in Intermountain Gas Co. rates, effective Saturday.

Residential customers who use gas for both space and water heating will see an 8.2 percent rate decrease, which will cut about \$41 from a typical annual bill. A customer who uses gas for space heat only will see a decrease of about 2.2 percent or \$8.90 for the next year.

Intermountain's commercial customers will receive a 3.9 percent rate decrease. Industrial transportation rates, which dropped more than 7 percent a year ago, will increase 3.2 percent to reflect the end of a temporary credit included in gas transportation prices during the past year.

### Doctor earns appointment to panel on pardons, parole

BOISE - A former president of the Idaho Medical Association, Dr. Russell Newcomb of Twin Falls, is the newest member of the Commission of Pardons and Parole.

The state Board of Correction appointed Newcomb, a retired surgeon and businessman, to fill a vacancy on the five-person board.

Newcomb served in both House and Senate. As a state legislator, he sponsored or supported on AIDS, Medicaid and recycling. The term will run until 1999.

### Boise man dies after car veers off I-84 near Mtn. Home

MOUNTAIN HOME - A Boise man was killed Tuesday evening when his car veered off Interstate 84, according to an Idaho State Police dispatcher.

Javier Lequerica, 42, was thrown through the sun roof of his car about nine miles west of Mountain Home, the dispatcher said. Apparently Lequerica fell asleep while driving west at 4:15 p.m. and his car rolled off the interstate, the dispatcher said.

## New laws for drivers will go into effect on Saturday

TWIN FALLS - Any driver who has young passengers - not just the children's parents - is responsible for making sure those children are properly restrained.

And anyone under 18 found guilty of possession of marijuana will have driving privileges suspended for up to a year, along with possibly being fined up to \$1,000, being jailed 90 days in juvenile detention or both.

Those are two of the new laws Idaho drivers will be subject to beginning Saturday. The Idaho Legislature also passed the following laws which go into effect Saturday.

- A child who is under the age of 4 and who weighs less than 40 pounds must be in a safety seat.

- On a second offense, anyone under 18 found guilty of possession of marijuana will have driving privileges suspended for up to two years. Offenders also could be fined up to \$1,000 and have a 90-day juvenile-detention sentence or both, as well as

face a possible substance-abuse evaluation or treatment requirement.

- The fees for all class A, B, C and D drivers' licenses will increase by \$1. For example, the fee for a class D license, the regular driver's license, will be \$20.50.

- A mop-ed with an engine 50 cubic centimeters or smaller does not have to have a motorcycle endorsement, registration or plate, but anyone driving one on a public road must have a valid driver's license.
- Four-wheel all-terrain vehicles that operate on public roads must be registered as passenger vehicles and have corresponding plates and insurance. The operator must have a valid driver's license but does not need a motorcycle endorsement.

- Two- and three-wheel motorcycles and mop-eds with engines larger than 50 cc operated on public roads must be registered as motorcycles and have corresponding plates. Operators must have motorcycle endorsements on their driver's licenses.

The Magic Valley Mall will be open for business from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday but only noon to 5 p.m. Tuesday.

Banks will close only on Tuesday, and most grocery stores will not alter their hours of business for the holiday.

Idaho's 46 liquor stores operated by the Idaho State Liquor Dispensary will be open normal hours Friday, Saturday and Monday - normal work days for store crews.

In Twin Falls, the dispensary-operated liquor store at 11456 Filer Avenue will also be open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Tuesday, but all other stores will be closed.

Most authorized private outlets will be open normal hours Tuesday, including Cook's in Gooding, Simerley's in Wendell, Valley Service in Hazelton, William's Market in Filer, Cosentino's in Hollister, R&B Grocery in Buhl and Person's in Kimberly.

## Cassia County celebrates opening of new hospital

BURLEY - Intermountain Health Care's top officials gathered in Burley Thursday to dedicate the new \$16 million Cassia Regional Medical Center, marking a new era of health care in Cassia County.

The new hospital was made possible through a unique partnership among a community board, a nonprofit corporation and local government, according to Scott S. Parker, president of Utah-based IHC.

Intermountain Health Care owns the new medical center, which means Cassia County will no longer be in charge of its own hospital. The county had provided health care at Cassia Memorial Hospital since 1960.

"So many more hospitals are being closed in the U.S. than being opened," Parker said, pointing out Burley's atypical situation.

He said Cassia County had been looking to form a hospital partnership for two decades, and its cooperative effort with the hospital's board of trustees and IHC has been successful.

Yet the partnership ended amid controversy. A recent lawsuit has barred the county from making additional \$100,000 contributions to IHC each year to help run the hospital, and the county has been prohibited from leasing county-owned equipment for less than market value. The county had been leasing equipment to IHC for \$1 a year.

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# Major grain processors targeted in antitrust investigation

CHICAGO (AP) — Federal authorities have targeted some of the nation's largest grain processors in an antitrust investigation of the food and feed additives industries.

Archer Daniels Midland Co. and A.E. Staley Manufacturing Co., have been served with subpoenas to produce documents or other information concerning the pricing and operation of their high fructose corn syrup businesses, the companies said.

Staley's parent company, London-based Tate & Lyle PLC, announced the Staley subpoena today. ADM, the world's largest grain processor, said on Wednesday that its records were being sought. Both companies are based in Decatur.

Cargill Inc., another large grain processor, said it has been told it will soon be part of the Justice Department probe, spokesman Allen Holbert said. The company planned to cooper-

ate, he said.

Archer Daniels said Wednesday it received a search warrant and subpoenas for documents and testimony before a federal grand jury sitting in Chicago.

The request for information concerned its marketing of a sweetener and other food and feed additives made from corn, the company said.

ADM said the investigation involved high fructose corn syrup, a sweetener used in a variety of foods from soft drinks to chewing gum; citric acid, a sour flavoring; and lysine, an amino acid used as livestock feed supplement. All three ingredients can be made from corn.

Cargill, Washington Justice Department spokeswoman Gina Talmona confirmed the antitrust division investigating possible anticompetitive practices in the food and feed additive industries. "The investigation is interna-

tional in scope," Talmona said. She would not confirm the names of any companies involved.

Archer Daniels of Decatur is the world's largest processor of agricultural commodities and the biggest producer of high-fructose corn syrup, with about 33 percent of the market, according to stock analyst Richard Elam of Kemper Securities Inc., in Chicago. It had net income of \$484 million last year on sales of \$11.4 billion.

In 1991, a federal judge in Des Moines, Iowa, dismissed an antitrust case against ADM for a second time after finding no evidence of price-fixing by makers of corn sweeteners.

Cargill of Minnetonka, Minn., the nation's largest privately held company, is involved mainly in purchasing, processing, transporting and trading grain and other agricultural commodities.

# Orange County ponders unsure future

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) — Orange County's overwhelming rejection of a sales-tax increase to lift it out of bankruptcy means more uncertainty, more belt-tightening and possibly even state intervention for this bastion of conservative thinking.

There is talk of cutting more at schools, releasing prisoners early and selling the airport, but no clear recovery plan for a county still reeling from a \$1.7 billion loss in December from bad investments by the county treasurer.

State Treasurer Matt Fong said government agencies across the state already are paying more to borrow because of the fiasco.

And if the county misses a looming payment this summer on \$800 million in bond debt, he said, it may be time for the governor to send in a state

trustee with broad powers to reorganize the county government.

About a third of the county's 1.1 million registered voters cast ballots Tuesday, his chance to make good on election. More than 61 percent voted no.

Critics of the proposed sales-tax increase such as housewife Carole Walters said county leaders were seeking a quick fix instead of using the double whammy to make government work like a business.

"We elect people and they just go out to lunch and to cocktail parties," she said. "And we want to tell them the party is over."

Martin Bergeson, a member of Orange County's Board of Supervisors, said the county's schools, cities and local agencies now must sit

down with county leaders and work out a plan to solve the problem.

"This is a time for cooling off and for us to start proposing rash plans would be ill-advised," she said.

In this conservative county of 2.6 million known as the birthplace of Richard Nixon and the home of Disneyland, there are numerous plans for more cutbacks.

Even before the vote, the county had eliminated 2,000 jobs, about 800 of them during layoffs, and sliced nearly \$200 million from the \$463 million budget.

Sheriff Brad Gates said further cutbacks will be hard to make. Some prisoners already are being released early because of cuts, he said, "and we're at a point now where we're close to closing jails."

# Dog walks out of lake week after 800-foot fall

CRATER LAKE, Ore. (AP) — A dog named Bear apparently tumbled 800 feet down a precipitous, snow-covered slope to the shore of Crater Lake without injury, and then hiked back to civilization a week later.

"Anything is possible with animals," said Crater Lake National park dispatcher Jack Ramsden.

Bear's owner, Frank Miller, and Grand Jeannet Papadopoulos visited the park high in the Cascade Range of southern Oregon on June 19.

Papadopoulos left the 5-year-old black chow off its leash — a viola-

tion of park rules — to let it frolic in the snow, and Bear disappeared, apparently over the edge.

Two rangers rappelled over the side but found no sign of Bear, other than a small blanket.

"They looked about two hours before they gave up," said Ramsden. "The impression was it probably had external injuries and wouldn't survive very long if it was even alive."

Rangers gave Miller a ticket for letting his dog off the leash.

On Monday, Miller gave up hope and threw Bear's toys in the trash.

The same day, Bear showed up at the park's Rim Village tourist area begging for food. The dog had apparently made its way 18 miles around the shore of the lake at the bottom of the crater to the only trail back up to the rim.

"Whether he found chipmunks and squirrels to eat along the way, we don't know," said Ramsden.

Miller picked up his dog Tuesday to take him to their new home in Ellensburg, Wash.

"Frank was just absolutely amazed and moved," Papadopoulos said.

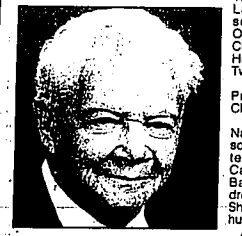

**Lack of communication leads to chief's dismissal**

HEYBURN — Mayor Glen Loveland says he recommended the firing of former Police Chief Earl Andrew because of a lack of communication between Andrew and his officers had prompted all four of them to consider leaving the department.

But the officers were satisfied after Wednesday night's City Council meeting.

The council voted unanimously to fire Andrew, to promote Mike Green to police chief with a \$200 monthly raise and to give the remaining three officers raises of \$100 per month, Loveland said.

"The one officer who was going to leave ... it appears this morning that he is going to stay," he said Thursday.

think that the proof that we are not petty is that we are not publishing a lot of things that would not help Chief Andrew or any of us. The city of Heyburn, the council, does not fire anybody without good reason," Kay said.

Andrew could not be reached for comment Thursday.

This is the second time the council has fired a police chief under Loveland's leadership as mayor. In 1992, Robert Vasquez was fired — also without a public explanation — after serving as chief for 18 years.

Although the officers did not issue an ultimatum, Loveland said they indicated they would leave unless "something was done to improve things within the city."

The council, which had been tight-lipped about the reasons for Andrew's dismissal, released more details after citizens demanded it at last night's meeting. But to at least one of those residents, Daniel Hofstetter, those specifics came too late.

Green began his career in law enforcement in Burley in 1981 and has served in the Heyburn department since 1988. Before Wednesday night's meeting, Green said he had planned to leave the force and open his own business. As chief, however, he will try to set a new tone within the department.

"I'm one for communication," he said. "I'm trying to patch the holes in the ship before it sinks." Green said he plans to hold interdepartmental meetings to discuss training and to form a vision for the department.

With the \$200 raise, Green's salary will be \$2,100 per month — \$50 less than what Andrew earned.

Green's promotion leaves a vacancy within the department that he said expects to fill within a week. There are currently four police officers in Heyburn, including Green.

Loveland said the new officer's hiring may be partially funded by Cops Fast, a federal program designed to help small cities increase their police forces. The grant program funds part of an officer's salary for the first three years of work.

Hofstetter asked for one. "I would like some reassurance that our city council is not petty," he said.

Councilwoman Flossie Kay refused to provide specifics. "I

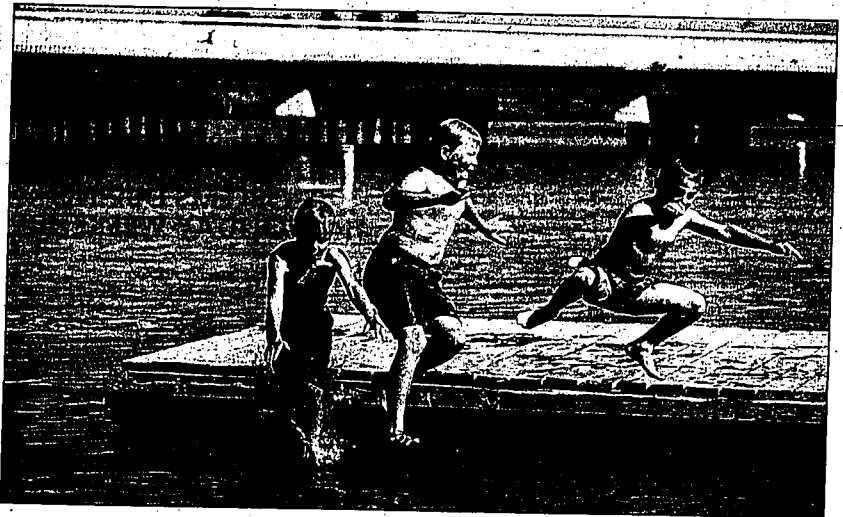

**GOP lawmakers see ruling as push for reform**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court ruling upholding the Endangered Species Act's protection of wildlife-habitat on private lands builds more momentum for efforts to relax the law in Congress, Republican critics said Thursday.

"Today's decision will serve as a rallying cry for Endangered Species Act reform from communities across the country that have been hurt by the current law," said Sen. Slade Gorton, R-Wash.

"The need to reform the law is more urgent than ever," said the chairman of a Senate subcommittee with jurisdiction over the Fish and Wildlife Service's budget.

Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., added, "This makes it imperative that Congress amend the Endangered Species Act so that people count as much as bugs and birds and plants."

And Sen. Dirk Kempthorne, R-Idaho, chairman of the Drinking Water, Fisheries and Wildlife subcommittee responsible for Endangered Species Act legislation in the Senate, said Congress must "restore balance to the act and make

sure the law protects private property rights."

Gorton, Packwood and Kempthorne are among the lawmakers pushing reform proposals. They say the government should have the option of deciding against saving a species in cases where protecting the population is too costly.

The high court ruled 6-3 that the federal government had reasonably interpreted the act to prohibit destruction of habitat of threatened and endangered species on private property.

Environmentalists hailed it as a historic ruling critical to saving hundreds of fish and wildlife species from extinction. But they worried about the political fallout in Congress.

"The same interests who sought to dismantle the law in court are still seeking to dismantle it in Congress," said Roger Schlickstein, a defender of the act, said it will be difficult to stop the Republican crusade against the Endangered

Species Act and other conservation laws.

"I think they upheld the law as they should, but my fear is they are going to use this as an excuse to dismantle the law here in Congress," Murray said. "We are ruling by anecdote as it is. This will only add to that fear."

Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt said the Supreme Court was affirming "the common sense interpretation of the law followed by the Ford, Carter, Reagan, Bush and Clinton administrations."

Babbitt said the ruling reinforces the National Academy of Sciences' recent conclusion "the most serious threat to most endangered species in the United States today is habitat destruction."

"And habitat conservation is the best single means to counter extinction," Babbitt said.

At the same time, the secretary said the Clinton administration would "continue to aggressively pursue a variety of reforms to make the act less onerous on private landowners."

Rep. Don Young, R-Alaska,

chairman of the House Resources Committee, said Republicans are drafting plans to reform the act focusing more on incentives than regulations.

"If we don't provide incentives for private land owners to provide habitat for these species, our goal of protecting them will fail miserably," Young said.

Kempthorne agreed that incentives are needed "so property owners cooperate in species and habitat recovery, instead of destroying them — fearful they will lose the use of their land because it's home to an endangered species."

Rep. Linda Smith, R-Wash., a member of a House task force on endangered species, said private timber growers cannot harvest a tree two miles from a northern spotted owl nest during non-nesting season "without being in criminal violation of the Endangered Species Act."

"Our priorities are way out of whack," added Rep. Wes Cooley, R-Ore. "Congress has to take action to fix the ESA to protect the people, and we will."

The county also must find someone else to run an ambulance service — since IHC won't receive the \$100,000 — and sell \$119,000 worth of county-owned equipment.

That didn't dampen the enthusiasm shown by guests at Thursday's dedication.

Marguerite Sandmann said she wishes she could tinker with the new equipment. "I think it will enhance patient care," she said, considering the hospital's new technology.

Sandy Sandmann knew Cassia Memorial's nooks and crannies well, and said he's glad a new hospital was built. "I know what problems they would have had remodeling," Cassia Memorial, he said.

Those remodeling costs were estimated at \$8 million.

# Feds may end cleanup over INEL

BOISE (AP) — The federal government has threatened to suspend nuclear waste cleanup if Idaho persists in challenging its decision that even more waste can be safely dumped at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, state attorneys told federal appellate judges on Thursday.

Because of that threat, the state's brief to the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals declared, the government's appeal to address the safety concerns and health threats posed by existing hazards at INEL is in doubt.

The Navy has asked the appellate court to rule by Friday evening on its request to immediately resume dumping waste at INEL, claiming that if at least a dozen shipments are not made immediately national security will be jeopardized.

It made arrangements with railroads on Wednesday — before the state even had a chance to respond — to have a special train ready to leave Newport News, Va., Friday evening with six waste shipments on board. And federal lawyers said a favorable decision before the weekend would put six more shipments from Puget Sound Naval Shipyard on the rails by July 15.

On May 19, U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge, who took control of the long-running legal battle after the death this spring of U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan, ordered the shipment ban remain in effect until he decides in September whether the environmental study of waste management operations at INEL met the requirements Ryan laid out two years ago.

The Navy Lodge has no legal authority to keep the ban in place without forcing the state to show it has a chance of proving that the environmental study fails to adequately assess health and safety problems at INEL and therefore cannot be used to justify another 1,950 shipments — 165 tons — of high-level radioactive waste being dumped in eastern Idaho.

Lodge-rejected Navy contentions that he acted without authority and maintained the state deserved a reasonable time in which to put together its challenge of the 100,000-page document used by the government to warrant more dumping. The state contends that document and the environmental study fails to adequately consider the safety and health hazards posed by the 261 tons of nuclear

waste already stored at INEL.

Although the government is under a federal court order to clean up waste problems at INEL, Donald Macdonald of the Energy Department's Idaho operations office advised an aide to Gov. Phil Batt on May 17 of 16 cleanup projects that would be held up if the court battle continues.

"All of the above projects, as analyzed in the EIS, have activities that are to occur in 1995 and 1996 that can get proceed if in litigation," the memorandum from Macdonald said. At the top of the list was treatment of highly radioactive liquid waste that is specifically covered in the 1993 order signed by Ryan because it "poses a significant threat to human health and the environment."

## Activists worry about effects of state highway

LEWISTON (AP) — Environmentalists and residents along U.S. Highway 12 on the Middle Fork of the Clearwater River may file suit to prevent the road's easement from shifting to the Idaho Department of Transportation.

If the U.S. Forest Service gives up management of the right-of-way, there will be less public

input in the future and the appeals process would not be subject to National Environmental Policy Act review, said Larry McLeod of the Idaho Conservation League.

"Now we have that right," he said, adding the league will decide whether to go to court within two weeks.

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## Slowdown may force state to cut, Batt says

BOISE (AP) — Republican Gov. Phil Batt, whose tightristed approach to government finances forced lawmakers into tough spending decisions last winter, is now warning that the general tax budget taking effect Saturday may have to be cut.

"The 1996 Legislature, along with the governor, might have to make some mid-course corrections to stay within their budget," Batt wrote in his most recent column distributed to Idaho's weekly newspapers.

It was the first time the governor has raised the prospect of cuts in the 1996-1997 budget he convinced lawmakers to hold at just 6

percent growth. That compared to an increase of nearly 16 percent in the spending year that ends this week and over 7 percent the year before that.

Batt told the state's business leaders three weeks ago that his economists expected revenues for the current budget year to fall short of the 10.3 percent increase policy makers had banked on, and several days later

the Board of Examiners authorized the diversion of cash from construction of a \$33 million prison expansion to cover the shortage. Administration economists now believe the cash shortage could approach \$10 million as tax receipts grow by about 9.5 percent. But while Batt had been acknowledging the slowdown in economic activity, he had not previously questioned the anticipated 7.5 percent growth in revenues for the coming fiscal year.

"That slowdown is translating into fewer tax dollars, which will cause some hand wringing as we move into a new fiscal year," Batt said, "and that means we might

have to slow the growth of Idaho government."

He specifically cited problems in agriculture, which accounts for over a third of the state's gross product.

"It doesn't take long to figure the impact that will have on tax collections," he said. "That means hard decisions will have to be made concerning where those reductions are made. In most cases, there won't be real cuts. There will just be reductions in the percentage increase."

He reiterated his apparently unyielding opposition to raising any taxes to keep the state budget in balance.

## Idaho rescuers remember bomb victims

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — One of the latest people to be helped by the search and rescue unit of Bonner County, Idaho, wasn't caught in the mountains or trapped by a raging river.

He was orphaned by the federal building bombing.

The Idaho unit has adopted Jonnmichael Rigney as the focus of its fund-raising effort. The 11-year-old son of Trudy Jean Rigney now lives in Broken Arrow with his grandmother, Carol Rigney, who has legal guardianship. Meanwhile, the University of

Oklahoma has awarded a posthumous bachelor of arts degree to Ms. Rigney, who was a student at the university. She died while working at the Oklahoma Water Resources Board, which was in a building across from the federal building bombing site. Jonnmichael satisfied all the criteria needed to receive help from the rescue unit. Even though he lives in Oklahoma, all that counted was that his mother was killed in the bombing.

The rescue members then challenged Idaho's state search and rescue commander, Brent Lewis, to challenge other rescue units at a

national meet in Montana to adopt a victim or family member of a victim.

The units took the challenge to help Jonnmichael and funds were directed to the Jonnmichael Rigney Guardianship Account through the geography department at the university.

Cynthia Sterling, assistant to the chairman at the Oklahoma University geography department, said she is not sure how much of the \$46,576 in the fund has come from search-and-rescue teams. She said money also is being gathered by those connected to the Oklahoma Water Resources Board.

The smoky haze across Idaho skies Thursday came from forest fires raging in Canada.

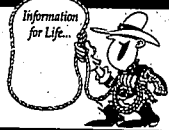

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# Idaho Timber executive warns Clinton

LEWISTON (AP) — Shearer Lumber Products' president is warning President Clinton that federal policy may force the closure of his Elk City sawmill in five years and erase 100 jobs.

Clinton, who vetoed a budget reduction bill that would have exempted timber salvage sales from appeals, should consider the company's dilemma when he encounters forest legislation. Richard Bennett said in a Monday letter to the chief executive.

He said the Nez Perce National Forest surrounding the mill sold about 1 million board feet of sawtimber last year while many times that amount died and began to rot.

"While hundreds of timber workers in our local communities stand in the unemployment line, the Nez Perce National Forest and National Marine Fisheries Service tell us that due to Endangered Species Act consultations and a mountain of federal litigation, we shouldn't expect any significant improvements in timber sale outputs for at least five years," wrote the president of the Coeur d'Alene-based Intermountain Forest Industry Association.

"Mr. President, the sawmill that I run cannot survive on those types of promises, nor can many others in our region of the country."

"The choice is simple: Let dead timber rot on the stump while loggers and mill workers collect unemployment checks, or protect our forests from the next round of catastrophic fires while we keep our working, middle-class jobs at home."

Bennett on Wednesday predicted the sawmill will be on the auction block in five years unless the Forest Service returns to selling timber on a regular basis.

Shearer Lumber also would be forced to clear-cut its private lands against its wishes in the final year, he said.

Bennett said the mill laid off 55 workers two years when it cut back to one shift.

Up to 40 loggers also lost their jobs, he said.

Richard Artley, Nez Perce planning team leader, said the forest sold 13 million board feet in the last fiscal year, including 1 million in sawlogs.

That was a result of required consultations with the National Marine Fisheries Service over endangered chinook salmon habitat, he said.

# Utility restores service to area of Montpelier

MONTPELIER (AP) — Service has been restored to customers whose natural gas was cut off when a pipeline ruptured and exploded early Wednesday in a rural area of Bear Lake County.

The blast left about 1,000 southeastern Idaho customers of Intermountain Gas Co. without natural gas service for almost 24 hours.

No one was injured when the 22-inch pipeline burst about 1 a.m. Wednesday near Dingle, six miles southeast of Montpelier. Northwest Pipeline Corp., based in Salt Lake City, said service was restored to Intermountain Gas customers at midnight Thursday.

Northwest Pipeline installed temporary equipment north of the damaged pipeline section, the company said. Intermountain Gas employees continued working on Thursday to relight pilot lights in Montpelier, which Northwest Pipeline said was expected to take until Friday morning to complete.

Work also was under way on repairs to approximately 350 feet of damaged pipeline. Crews were expected to work through the weekend to complete the repairs and perform tests before returning service to the regular pipeline.

Northwest Pipeline said results of an investigation into the cause of the explosion was not expected for several days.

The pipeline is part of the 3,900-mile system used to transport natural gas from the San Juan Basin in New Mexico to the Canadian border at Sumas, Wash., but only the service in the immediate area was disrupted.


# Boise officer stops runaway train in town

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
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

## Wartime slave laborers recall suffering, failed revolt

**HANAOKA, Japan (AP)** — There was the only revolt by Chinese forced into labor in Japan during World War II.

Some of the 850 slave laborers in this northern mining town attacked a construction company office the night of June 30, 1945 — 50 years ago Friday — intending to seize weapons and flee northward.

But weakened by hunger and 12-hour days, they were quickly overpowered. About 100 were killed; others suffered excruciating punishment.

Fifty years after the doomed revolt, 11 Chinese forced into labor in Hanaoka are seeking compensation. They filed the first lawsuit of its kind this week against the company that worked them, today a construction giant, Kajima Corp. Court hearings are to begin later this year.

Meng Fanwu, now 74, is among the workers who is suing. He arrived Aug. 8, 1944 in Hanaoka, near where Kajima was contracted to reroute a river. "The Japanese never treated us as human beings," said Meng, still bitter.

The slave laborers of Hanaoka were among nearly 39,000 Chinese systematically abducted by the Japanese military to work at mines, construction sites and factories from April 1943 until the end of World War II.

Like Kajima, most of the 135 Japanese companies that used foreign slaves still exist and some of them are now blue-chip corporations. Wartime documents show the government told Kajima in 1944 to "squeeze (the laborers) like a wet towel until nothing drips."

They worked 12-hour days on a bite-sized flour dumpling filled with

apple pulp and a piece of boiled rhubarb stem and lived in compartments so low they couldn't stand up.

Nearly half the Kajima workers about 420 — eventually died

of hunger or beatings. Unable to bear the conditions, a group of slaves revolted the night of June 30. But they were swiftly overpowered.

"So we ran and ran," Meng recounted. He crossed the river and fled into the forest. Gunshots echoed. The local militia moved in, and villagers hurried to help soldiers chase down the slaves.

Villager Tsuneo Yachita, then 5, recalls neighbors threatening ragged, emaciated men with bamboo spears as he huddled in a pigpen.

Hands bound behind them, the Chinese were dragged to the local meeting hall. Meng said they were made to kneel for three days without food or water. Dozens were tortured.

Some of the survivors, including Meng, were put back to work until U.S. forces arrived more than two months after Japan's Aug. 15 surrender. By the time they were freed, Meng recalled, he and surviving workmates were walking skeletons.

After the war, several Kajima employees were brought to trial for atrocities against the forced laborers. In 1948, several were sentenced to either life in prison or death, but none served more than seven years, and none was executed. In 1957,

then-company president Morinosuke Kajima became a Cabinet minister. Like Japan itself, which is still reluctant to confront its wartime past, Kajima has shied away from modern-day atonement.

It has refused to pay compensation — fearing, like the government, that such a move would open the way for a flood of claims. Its apologies have

been framed in terms that tend to infuriate wartime victims.

"We are sorry about what hap-

pened," said Kajima spokesman Yutaka Iwamoto. "But we were only one of the 135 companies."

### Historian: Opinion weighted against fat

**LONDON (AP)** — Thin was in and fat was out as far back as the Middle Ages, a medical historian says.

John Galvalas, a 14th century Byzantine fleet commander, was spurred by his fiancée because he was too fat, according to a letter to be published Saturday in *The Lancet*, a medical journal.

The letter is written by John Lascaris, a historian who suspects the pitiful tale of the lovesick nobleman — recorded in the memoirs of a Medieval monk — may be the earliest published account of a doctor treating obesity.

According to the text, Apocaeus, the governor of Constantinople, promised Galvalas his daughter in marriage. But the future bride was repulsed by Galvalas's obesity, prompting him to pay "a large fee" to an Italian diet doctor.

### Russia signals interest in talks over Chechnya

**GROZNY, Russia (AP)** — Prime Minister Viktor Chernomyrdin has offered to take part in peace talks between Chechen and Russian officials, negotiators said Thursday.

The offer of such high-level participation suggests a new commitment from the Russian leadership to end the 6-month-old war in the breakaway republic.

In Moscow, President Boris Yeltsin told his Security Council that the peace talks "have shown the correctness of the steps taken to settle the conflict in Chechnya."

Chernomyrdin, who has been less hawkish on the war than many Kremlin officials, played a key role in ending the recent hostage crisis involving Chechen gunmen in the southern Russian city of Budyonnovsk.

When negotiations recessed Thursday, there was no word on whether the talks would move to Moscow or continue in Grozny, the devastated Chechen capital.

### China keeps secret location of dissident

**BEIJING (AP)** — China refused Thursday to disclose the whereabouts or condition of a detained Chinese-born American human rights activist and ignored U.S. diplomats' requests to visit him.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Chen Jian refused at a routine briefing to answer questions about Harry Wu, who was detained June 19, and the investigation against him.

## No Idaho policy for student drug tests

BOISE - School districts considering implementing drug testing of athletes will be on their own, because the Idaho High School Activities Association has no plans for a statewide policy, the director said. The Idaho High School Activities Association will steer clear of the controversy opened by this week's U.S. Supreme Court's ruling that administering drug tests to high school athletes is constitutional, di-

rector Bill Young said.

"We do not get into the training rules issue because it is so diverse around the state," Young said. "I look at (drug testing) the same as having state-wide training rules."

"This will strictly be a district-by-district decision," Young said.

On Monday, the justices ruled 6-3 in fa-

vor of the Vernonia, Ore., school district, which in 1991 implemented a random drug testing policy for high school athletes. The ruling has some school officials talking, but many say it won't bring drug testing to local schools anytime soon.

"We really haven't discussed that at this point," Cassia County School District Assistant Superintendent Jerry Doggett said. "But

it certainly will be now."

Twin Falls High School athletic director Bill Jones said he thinks random testing goes too far.

"As a district, we have not talked about drug testing," Jones said.

"It's an accusation, like you're saying everybody is suspicious," he said. "I prefer the approach that 'we trust you. These are our rules and we expect you to follow them.'"

In Twin Falls, the rules are that any athlete caught drinking or using tobacco or ille-

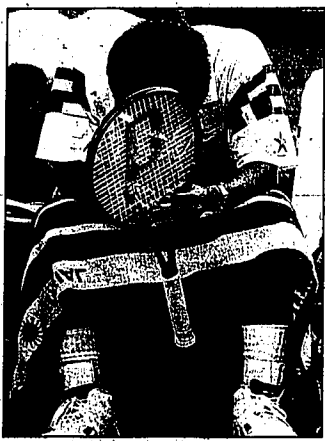

## Baseball owners plan talk today on contract impasse

NEW YORK — The baseball owners negotiating committee, which hopes to resume bargaining with the players' association next month, will hold a telephone conference call today.

Colorado Rockies chairman Jerry McMorris, one of three owners who will be on the bargaining team, said the negotiating committee probably will meet at the All-Star game, then resume talks.

"I think slowly but surely we're going to get our ducks in a row," McMorris said Thursday.

Joining McMorris on the bargaining team will be Boston Red Sox chief executive officer John Harrington and Kansas City Royals CEO David Glass. McMorris and Harrington have been involved in bargaining since last September. Glass has been on the larger negotiating committee but not the small group.

"He's agreed to take the time and to be helpful," McMorris said.

Since owners joined the talks last fall, about six have been at most bargaining ses-

sions. Acting commissioner Bud Selig last week decided on the three-man group.

"Sometimes it's easier to do it with smaller meetings," McMorris said. "It's been indicated to me that we have the responsibility and the authority to get to a meaningful deal if it's possible to make one."

Players and owners haven't had a formal bargaining session since March 30, the day before U.S. District Judge Sonia Sotomayor issued a preliminary injunction that forced owners to adhere to the terms of the deal that expired on Dec. 31 in 1994. Players then ended their strike after 232 days.

Because of an attendance decrease of at least 20 percent, owners figure to lose at least \$300 million this year. Payrolls are about the same as 1994.

"There's no question the industry is in far worse shape than it was on Aug. 12," McMorris said, referring to the date the strike began.

McMorris said talks will resume "definitely in July." Owners still are trying to formulate their proposal.

He said he took no solace that the NBA was now experiencing labor turmoil.

Continued from D1 cal drugs during the season (as defined by the state athletics association) is automatically suspended for the duration of that sport's season.

For instance, a football player caught in violation of the policy during the first week of practice will be suspended for the football season. But he could return for basketball season.

In Twin Falls last year, a student was picked up in September for possessing weed, but was still eligible to play football because the season did not start until November, Jones said.

"I'm opposed to making it more complicated," Jones said. "I think kids should be given a second chance." Costs for drug testing, priced at around \$240 for Olympic-caliber athletes, could blunt the verdict by the Supreme Court.

In the Monday ruling, Justice Antonin Scalia wrote that addressing "a 'role model' effect of athletes' drug use" is more important than personal privacy concerns.

Brook Crysler, who plays soccer and baseball at Minico High School, said student-athletes who use drugs are compromising their role both as a team member and representative of the school.

"I don't think students have a right to do drugs," said Crysler. "But if people do, I don't think the school has the right to test for drugs." Crysler said he would refuse a drug test administered by the school district, but would comply if approached by coaches.

Strawberry was held hitless by four teen-age pitchers Thursday as the Yankees beat the Blue Jays 8-4. He is 3-for-12 in four games since launching his comeback after a 60-day suspension for cocaine use.

### Union assistant pleads guilty to charge

WASHINGTON — A research assistant for a football players' labor union pleaded guilty Thursday to embezzling more than \$51,000 through a bank account listed under the union's acronym.

John Walker Jr., 31, processed application fees from sports agents applying for accreditation from the National Football League Players Association. Many of the fees were submitted through checks made payable to the NFLPA.

Walker set up a bank account last September using that acronym but apparently registered the Negro Family Legion Protection Alliance and submitted the players' union checks into the account.

FBI agents discovered that Walker deposited 99 checks, worth \$51,000, intended for the union.

He also had \$11,000 worth of stolen union checks in his apartment, U.S. Attorney Eric Holder said in a statement.

### Minor violation found at Louisville

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — An internal investigation into the University of Louisville basketball program uncovered one minor violation, athletics director Bill Olsen said Thursday.

Olsen told the school's Athletic Association Board that no evidence was found to corroborate more serious allegations supposedly made against the program by a former volunteer strength coach, Jimmy Thompson.

Olsen said the probe did find that strength and conditioning coach Wiley Brown played in one pickup basketball game with three Louisville players this week. Coaches are forbidden to observe or engage with their players in pickup games before formal practice begins Oct. 15. The rule is designed to keep coaches from turning off-season pickup games into practices.

MUNICH, Germany — Mats Hallberg of Sweden and Raymond Burns of Northern Ireland tied the course record with 7-under-par 65's Thursday and shared the first-round lead at the \$1 million BMW Open golf tournament.

Mark James of England and Jarmo Sandelin of Sweden shot 68s, with Mark McBurney of Zimbabwe and Andrew Sherborne of England carding 69s over the par-72, 6,940-yard St. Eugene course.

German star Bernhard Langer, who never has won the BMW Open, opened with a 73.

Orders must be postmarked by Friday to be included in the lottery to determine who gets seats to the events for which orders have outstripped the supply of tickets.

About one-third of the sessions for the Games are, in Olympic parlance, "oversubscribed." Technically they are not sold out — there is still a chance to get the tickets by entering the lottery.

After Friday, though, no more orders will be accepted for the over-booked sessions. In plain language, they'll be sold out.

Judd, 17, of Burley will perform in the power tumbling and double mini-tramp competition this weekend in Denver.

Competing in the junior elite class, Judd has qualified for the finals at the national championships three years in a row.

"I think he has a very good chance. This could be his year," Rainbow Gymnastics coach Ann Grigsby said.

Judd has been competing in power tumbling for seven years.

Eleven-year-old Lydia Strunk of Wendell began bouncing trampoline three months ago, but she already owns three gold medals from the Idaho First Security Games.

"I think nationally, she'll be right there too," Grigsby said.

Casey Tindall, 12, tumbles in the 13-14-year-old age group. Tindall, of Twin Falls, is a strong, consistent performer in all the tumbling events, Grigsby said.

Power tumbling is performed on an elevated spring

runway. Athletes sprint down the runway before leaping into a series of somersaults, twists and spins.

The sport was an exhibition event in the 1992 Summer Olympics.

Double mini-tramp, a relatively new sport, requires competitors to perform acrobatics off a pair of small trampolines set at different levels.

Competition trampolines requires athletes to perform 10 different skills, from flips to twists and floating layouts.

Both Tindall and Strunk are scheduled to perform in the power tumbling, double mini-tramp and trampoline events.

"They both have a very good chance at the finals," Grigsby said. "I'm expecting very big things from them."

Judd, Strunk and Tindall qualified for the national championships by winning regional qualifier events.

Nine other Rainbow Gymnastics tumblers will compete at the national championships by invitation in a novice tournament.

Also competing at the national championships from Rainbow Gymnastics are: Katie Oviatt, Tiffany Anderson, Crystal Olson, Anna Strunk, Megan Scheek, Staci McCray, Teri Bell, Tiffany Bell and Chayla Neibuhr.

BETHESDA, Md. (AP) — The only thing better than playing golf with Arnold Palmer is playing better than Arnold Palmer.

"That left him 2-over, but birdies on Nos. 16 and 17 got him back to par."

"I'm pleased that I hit the ball solidly, but I'm not pleased with the score," Palmer said. "To be pleased, I'd have to be at the top of the leaderboard."

That distinction belonged to Ringer, a regular on the Senior Series, and Snead, who sank a 25-foot birdie putt on No. 17 to move into a tie for the lead.

"I missed one fairway and didn't miss a green. I can't do much better than that," said Snead, who had previously broken 70 only once in 16 rounds at the Senior Open.

His only bogey came on No. 6, when he three-putted from 15 feet.

Bob Murphy, a three-time winner on the Senior Tour this year, was tied with Tom Weiskopf and four others at 69.

Raymond Floyd, Tommy Aaron and Isao Aoki were among several golfers who shot 70s on the damp, 6,945-yard Congressional Country Club course.

Jack Nicklaus had a 71, and Hale Irwin, Palmer and defending champion Simon Hobday were in a group at par. Lee Trevino and Gary Player had 73s.

Ringer got an indication it might be his day when he hit a 5-wood to the center of the green on No. 2 and sank a 53-foot birdie putt.

"That helped me get started because yesterday with the King, I double bogeyed it," Ringer said.

The White Sox won their seventh straight, while the Brewers lost their seventh in a row.

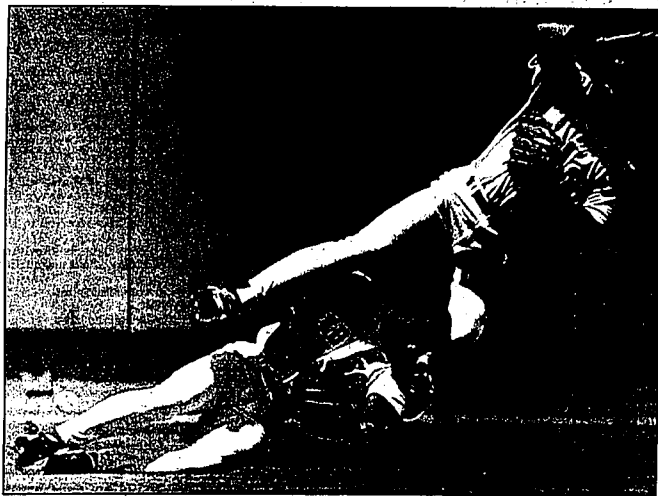

# Early-season slump grounds Oriole

BALTIMORE (AP) — Chris Hoiles' customary early-season slump has become a lengthy, agonizing struggle of which there is seemingly no escape.

Hoiles and his new three-year contract have found their way to the Baltimore Orioles' bench. He was batting .176 through Wednesday, 91 points below his career mark and 134 points off the .310 average he had two seasons ago.

His hitting drought was understandable in May, given that the fifth-year catcher has a lifetime average of .242 over the first month of the season. But Hoiles' had only one multi-hit game since May 27 and only four hits over the past two weeks.

"When things are going like they are, it's hard not to think about it. You think about on the field, off the field, when you eat, everywhere you go," he said.

Lately he's had the chance to ponder his slump on the bench, as manager Phil Regan opted this week to use rookie Greg Zaun against right-handed pitchers.

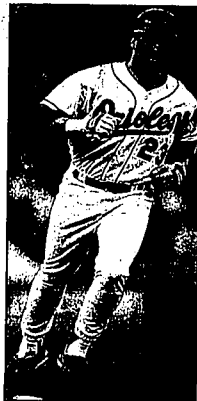
Last year, Hoiles batted sixth behind guys like Rafael Palmeiro, Cal Ripken and Harold Baines. Now he's usually seventh, when he's an 0-for-4 performance isn't as harmful.

"When you're struggling and not getting hits and not driving in guys, they move you down in the order," Hoiles said. "I don't want to stumble out of the starting game. At this point, though, he concedes that his problems at the plate are more serious than usual.

"It's definitely been a struggle all year," he said. "You've just got to tell yourself that things are going to come around. You can't beat yourself over the head or go crazy every time you make an out."

That's the advice Hoiles got from Ripken, who has experienced more than a slump or two during his career.

"Everybody looks at his offense like that's the only part of his game," pitcher Mike Mussina said.

"But he's got to call the game, worry about how the pitchers are doing, relay signs from the dugout and all this other stuff. Luckily, he hasn't had any problems doing that," the pitcher said.

"I'd be lying if I said it was simple to separate the hitting from the catching," Hoiles said. "You go through a period where you're struggling mentally and physically. It's not fun to change things, but nothing's working for you. You can't help but take it out to the field with you."

# Woman faces charge of trying to extort money from Strawberry

NEW YORK (AP) — A California woman has been arrested for allegedly threatening to reveal embarrassing information about Darryl Strawberry if the outfielder didn't pay her \$300,000, a law enforcement source said Thursday.

The 50-year-old woman, who identified herself as Judith Lee, was arrested Tuesday at the Manhattan office of lawyer Bill Goodstein, who is Strawberry's agent, and charged with extortion, Joe Valiquette, spokesman for the FBI's New York office confirmed.

Papers filed in U.S. District Court, detailing the charges do not mention Strawberry by name. But the source, who spoke on condition of anonymity,

confirmed that he was the target of the alleged extortion.

The 33-year-old Strawberry was signed last week by the New York Yankees after coming off a 60-day drug-related suspension. He technically still is under house arrest after pleading guilty to income tax evasion.

According to the papers, the woman called Goodstein's office and threatened to divulge embarrassing information about one of his clients unless she got \$300,000.

She told Goodstein she was "Judith Lee," but Valiquette said authorities were not sure of her identity.

According to the complaint, the woman first called on June 22 and

threatened to reveal "embarrassing information regarding the client's" a tabloid television program if she did not receive the money. "She further stated that if the client did not cooperate, it would be the end of him," said the complaint, which referred to the suspect as "Jane Doe n/k/a Judith Lee." She said that if he didn't agree to pay, she would tell a story that would "blow (his employer) away."

The court papers did not specify how the alleged information she threatened to disclose.

Goodstein called authorities and an FBI agent was present when the lawyer called the California number the woman had given him a day earlier.

# Knicks turn up heat on Miami, claiming illegal talks with Riley

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Knicks filed tampering charges against the Miami Heat on Thursday for comments by club executives on their interest in hiring Pat Riley.

Riley resigned as coach of the Knicks on June 15, with one year left on his contract after four seasons.

Team president Dave Checketts said the Knicks filed charges with NBA commissioner David Stern after reading newspaper quotes from Heat owner Micky Arison and Dave Wohl, the team's executive vice president.

"This may be the most blatant example of tampering I have seen in 12 years in the NBA," Checketts said. "Whether there were behind-the-scenes discussions or not, the Heat's public statements, on their own, constitute tampering."

Heat and league officials were not immediately

available for comment. Riley has been in Greece, vacationing and holding clinics in conjunction with the European Championships. Riley is joining the Knicks for breach of contract.

The maximum fine under NBA bylaws for tampering is \$1 million. Checketts would not comment on pursuing another recourse to a fine.

"We're way past that," he said. "I'm not going to comment on what we will do if we're asked for compensation."

However, Checketts refused to rule out the possibility of Riley coaching the Heat next season.

"It would not be safe to say that," he said.

Checketts said the first example of tampering came from Wohl, who said June 15, "Pat is the priority and everything else is on hold."

In a conference call Thursday, Checketts said Arison's comments were stronger.

# Evert likes life away from game

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — A visit to Wimbledon is easier now for Chris Evert.

She no longer feels the pressure of performing. Her biggest concern is for her husband and two young sons.

"When you have a child, that's when reality hits," Evert said Thursday. "I'm just like any ordinary mom now. I feel like part of the human race."

The 41-year-old Evert, who will be inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame on July 16, won three of her 18 Grand Slam titles at Wimbledon. She also was beaten in the semifinals or finals 14 times.

"A lot of losses," said Evert, who played from the baseline and thus fared better on hard courts and clay. "Wimbledon was so much of a challenge for me because of my game," she said. "I had to learn to move on grass and be flexible with my strokes."

"I didn't like to win easy. Because it was a challenge, it meant more when I won a match at Wimbledon than any other major tournament."

But Evert, who retired in 1989, is now content to watch from the sidelines as a commentator for NBC-TV. She and former Olympic skier Andy Mill have two children — Alexander, 3, and Nicholas, 1.

"I didn't feel joy in tennis 24 hours a day. Now I feel joy in life 24 hours a day with three wonderful little boys," she said with a laugh.

"I remember times I lost when I was so depressed, I didn't want to leave my room for three days. Then you think of having a child, and your priorities are a lot different."

"In tennis you're dealing with a career, ego and pride. I felt a lot more pressure. I feel like a weight's been lifted since I retired."

Evert, who won 157 singles titles, will be the sole inductee this year at the Hall of Fame in Newport, R.I.

"It forces me to reflect and reminisce about my career," she said. "Anybody who knows me knows I'd give life in the past. It'll be a luxury to be emotional and to conjure up all of those memories."

# Wimbledon swelters; more top seeds fall

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Andre Agassi's crushing returns, faster than any serves he's seen so far, are the hottest shots in one of the hottest Wimbledons in history.

Tar roads melted and trains stalled in the heat wave around the country, and the temperature soared to 102 degrees Thursday on Centre Court by the time Agassi and Patrick McEnroe bowed in greeting to the Royal Box.

On Court 14, the heat and the blazing serves of a 6-foot-8 newcomer from Belgium, Dick Norman, already had ground down former two-time champion Stefan Edberg, 6-3, 6-4, 6-4 — the first of four seeded men to fall on the day.

"He's like a giant," exclaimed a stunned Edberg, at 29 a mere shadow of the player who won six Grand Slam titles. "You felt like David and Goliath out there."

Jim Courier, a finalist two years ago and now seeded No. 11, was sweating halfway through his 6-4, 6-4, 6-3 loss to Cedric Pioline. No. 3 Boris Becker was beginning a four-set victory over Jan Apell. Jeff Tarango was on his way to knocking out No. 15 Andrei Medvedev in four, and Petr Korda was just warming up for a 6-4, 6-4, 6-4 upset of No. 5 Michael Chang.

Serves were flying fast everywhere. Marc Goellner smacked 31 aces but still lost 4-6, 5-7, 6-3, 7-5, 6-4 to unseeded Mats Wilander, playing Wimbledon for the first time since 1989, and rallying from two sets down for only the third time in his career.

But the man with the antidote for even the hardest serves was Agassi, one of only seven seeded men left in the tournament, the fewest number to advance to the third round at Wimbledon in the Open era in a year when there were 16 seeds.

McEnroe the Younger may not be the biggest serving threat, but the way Agassi wound up and pulverized returns it seemed as if he were being fed balls in slow motion.

On the first point in a 6-1, 6-1, 6-3 rout, Agassi drilled a backhand return with such force that McEnroe didn't have time to move for it. It was a shot that set the tone for the match and showed why Agassi has such a good chance of regaining the title he won in 1992. The softer new balls may not hurt the big servers, but they do wonders for a big returner like Agassi, who slugged 11 winners on returns while breaking McEnroe's next five services in an 11-game streak.

"I'm seeing the ball really quick, and I'm picking it up quick," said Agassi, who also yielded only 11 points on his serve the whole match. "I'm very confident. Every time I swing at the ball, I'm feeling like I'm going to make it."

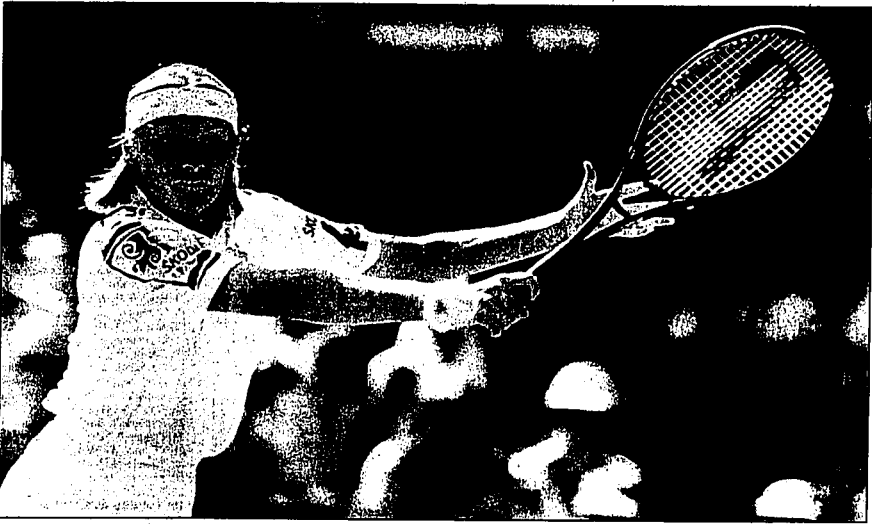
The British tabloids didn't care as much about Agassi's tennis as they did about his love life with actress Brooke Shields, who sat at court-side with a ring on her finger that matched one Agassi wore.

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Tim Henman, disqualified from Wimbledon for throwing a ball into the head of ball girl Caroline Hall, handed her a bunch of flowers Thursday and apologized with a kiss.

The 20-year-old Briton became the first player to be disqualified from the tournament in the Open era Wednesday when he accidentally hit the 16-year-old girl during a doubles match.

The indiscretion also cost Henman \$3,000 in fines and \$100 for unorthodox make-up conduct and \$2,000 for defaulting the match — by the All England Club.

Henman slammed the ball into the side of Hall's head.

In tears, she received ice-pack treatment on court while Wimbledon officials automatically disqualified Henman and his doubles partner, Jeremy Bates.

The first-round match was awarded to Henrik Holm of Sweden and Jeff Tarango of the United States, who pulled a 7-5 set at Connolly Jr. of Detroit said this week.

Fourth-seeded Jana Novotna swept 6-2, 6-2 past 34-year-old British player Jo Durie, who left Court One to a standing ovation after her final Wimbledon singles match.

In other women's matches, No. 7 Lindsay Davenport overpowered Argentina's Florencia Labat, 6-1, 6-1; No. 6 Kimiko Date edged Meike Babel 7-5, 7-6 (7-4); No. 10 Natasha Zvereva rallied for a 6-7 (7-5), 6-1, 6-4, win over Lindsay Lee; and Yonjo Kamio of Japan ousted No. 16 Helena Sukova 4-6, 6-4.

OH NO, NOT YOU AGAIN: A day after they figured in the longest women's match ever played in a Grand Slam tournament, Chanda Rubin and Patricia Hy-Boulais were on opposite sides of the net again, in doubles.

Thursday's doubles match was a lot shorter. Rubin teamed with Linda Harvey-Wild to beat Hy-Boulais and Australia's Catherine Barclay 6-4, 6-2 in only one hour to reach the second round. That was less than half the time it took Rubin and Hy-Boulais to play the third set in singles.

# Foreman forfeits final title, promoter says

LAS VEGAS (AP) — George Foreman has given up the last of his heavyweight titles after he accepted a mandate by the IBF that he fight a rematch with Germany's Axel Schulz, promoter Bob Arum said.

Foreman, the oldest heavyweight champion in history, will fight only once more, probably against Michael Moorer either late this year or early next year, Arum said.

Arum had faced a July 3 deadline from the IBF to get an agreement on a rematch with Schulz, who lost a disputed decision April 22 in Las Vegas to the 47-year-old Foreman.

IBF president Bob Lee said Foreman had yet to notify his organization about his action. He said the IBF would fill its vacant title by a fight between No. 1 contender Frans Botha of South Africa and Schulz, who was moved up to No. 2 in the latest ratings. Foreman, who could not immediately be reached for comment, won both the IBF and WBA versions of the heavyweight title last November when he knocked out Moorer in the 10th round of their title fight.

The WBA earlier stripped Foreman of its title because he did not defend against the top contender at the time, Tony Tucker.

# Whites propel drop in graduation rates

**KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP)** — For the first time since Prop 48 established stricter academic standards for freshmen athletes, graduation rates declined in men's basketball.

The graduation rate for Division I basketball players who entered college in 1988 was 42 percent, a drop from 46 percent for the previous class, an NCAA study shows.

The steepest decline was among white players, whose graduation rate fell from 57 percent for the 1987 class to 50 percent for the 1988 group. The rate for black players fell from 39 percent in 1987 to 37 percent in 1988.

"It's fascinating, but it's fascinating in a negative kind of way," said Dr. James Frank, commissioner of the predominantly black Southwestern Athletic Conference.

Under Prop 48, which went into effect in 1988, freshmen athletes had to meet minimum academic standards to play in their first year.

The first two classes affected by Prop 48 showed slightly improved graduation rates for almost all groups of athletes.

The upward trend continued in the latest study for female athletes and Division I-A football players. But the sharp decline among male basketball players may be cause for concern, especially because the dip occurred when strict academic requirements were supposed to have the opposite effect.

"We won't know what it means until we can study more data and see if there is a trend. But I think people are going to be concerned when they see this," said Marian Washington, Kansas women's basketball coach and a board member of the Black Coaches Association.

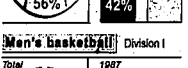

Division I graduation rates of student-athletes by year of entry:

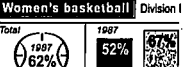
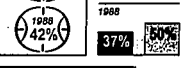

"When I heard (NBA commissioner David Stern) say Antonio McDyess, I was as happy as if he had called my name," Stackhouse said, breaking into a big grin.

Was Wallace just as happy? "Oh, yes," Wallace said.

They had escaped the clutches of the perennially hapless Clippers, but it was here that the two former North Carolina teammates' fates diverged. Stackhouse had his wish fulfilled when the Sixers selected him with the No. 3 pick. Wallace, a Philadelphia native, went next to Washington, but that one draft slot looked large.

Wallace said he wasn't disappointed, but he didn't hide it well on his way across the stage. The glint that had graced the eyes of Smith, McDyess and Stackhouse before him was not to be found. He was the player picked from his former conference. Worst of all, he would not get to play in his hometown. "I'm happy. I'm close enough."

That 24-hour drive south on I-95, however, makes a big difference. Wallace is suddenly thrown to a team with two young and promising forwards — Juwan Howard and Chris Webber — and faces the prospect of playing center. At 6-10 and a skinny 225, Wallace will have his hands full against established NBA centers.

"That's a tough situation," Smart said of Wallace landing with the Bullets. "With Juwan Howard and Chris Webber, they'll probably be playing Rasheed at center, and I didn't expect that."

"I think Rasheed's a great player and I know he's going to be a great NBA player, but a lot depends on the minutes he gets to play."

Wallace admitted the Bullets had snuck up on him. He said he saw only one or two of their games last season and didn't know exactly where he would fit in the rotation.

"We'll see some games at first," Wallace said. "We've got a lot of young guys, but down the line, we're going to be fierce."

After Wallace, the draft was full of surprises. The Clippers didn't hang onto McDyess long, trading the Alabama sophomore to the Denver Nuggets, along with Randy Woods, in return for Rodney Rogers and the rights to Denver's 15th pick, Brent Barry. McDyess said the Clippers told him shortly after he was selected

ed that he would be traded, but he did to proceed with his interviews as if he were a Clipper.

"I was surprised when they picked me," McDyess said, "and I was surprised when they traded me."

Portland followed by trading the rights to Shawn Respert, picked the No. 8, to Milwaukee for No. 11 pick: Gary Trent and a 1996 first-round draft pick. Both players were equally befuddled. "I knew something was up when I didn't get anyone from Milwaukee on the phone," Trent said. "I had the quickest career Portland ever recorded," Respert said.

Barry's ascension to No. 15 was a mild surprise, but the player who jumped from oblivion into the first round was Theo Ratliff, a 6-9 power forward from Wyoming who went to Detroit with the 18th pick.

As expected, the top five picks were underclassmen, and two are 19-year-olds — Smith and Chicago high schooler Kevin Garnett, who went fifth to Minnesota. In all, a record 10 underclassmen were selected in the first round.

It was a thoroughly odd draft. Players slid up and down from their projected spots as if aided by Crisco. Consider that Duke center Cherokee Parks had worked out for nine teams. The team that picked him at No. 12, the Dallas Mavericks, was not among them.

Toronto shocked its new fans, and not so pleasantly, by picking Arizona point guard Damon Stoudamire with the seventh pick. The crowd of 21,269 — an NBA Draft record — responded with more than a few boos. Stoudamire was not projected as a Top 10 pick.

Very likely, nothing was as awkward as the moment when Stackhouse was chosen by the Sixers and Wallace was not. The one upside for both is that they will be close geographically. They will play in the same division and face each other often.

# Few surprises in NBA draft

**TORONTO (AP)** — Little Damon Stoudamire turned out to be a player in demand. In demand by everyone except Toronto Raptors fans, that is. Ed O'Bannon slipped and landed in New Jersey. Cherokee Parks slipped, too, but was much luckier.

The NBA draft produced few big surprises Wednesday night, with most teams successfully addressing their needs.

The dearth of point guards allowed Stoudamire, a 5-foot-10 player from Arizona originally projected as a late lottery pick, to springboard into the seventh slot, snatched by the expansion Raptors over the objections of their fans, who booed the choice.

Toronto general manager Isiah Thomas said he purposely kept his strong interest in Stoudamire under wraps. Trading guard B.J. Armstrong, taken in the expansion draft, is a "high possibility," said Thomas, who reportedly will send the former Bull to Golden State in a multi-player deal.

"Stoudamire was at the top of our list for the last two or three months," Thomas said.

Portland wanted hometown product Stoudamire, too, but couldn't move up enough to get him. The Blazers ended up sending their rights to eighth pick Shawn Respert to Milwaukee for the rights to Gary Trent and a 1996 first-round.

Toronto's fans wanted UCLA's Ed O'Bannon, a smooth small forward, but concerns about a surgically repaired knee sent him slipping to the ninth spot and the Nets, a troubled team in need of a good shooter. O'Bannon was a much wiser choice for New Jersey than the one it made last year, when the Nets used their top pick to select center Yinka Dare, who played only three minutes, as a rookie.

Parks, a 6-10 center from Duke, had been discussed as a Top 7 pick,

but was still available when Dallas' turn came at No. 12. Parks' disappointment at not being taken earlier was eased by the prospect of playing with Jason Kidd and Jamal Mashburn on one of the league's up-and-coming teams.

"I think I'll fit well in their system," said Parks, who will eventually shift to power forward. "They're a young team and if they keep everybody around, they can go a long way."

It made sense when the Clippers, who had the second pick, took Alabama's Antonio McDyess over Jerry Stackhouse, who had quietly made it known he didn't want to play for the NBA's worst team. It made less sense when the Clippers traded forward Randy Woods and the rights to McDyess to the Nuggets in exchange for forward Rodney Rogers and the rights to No. 15 Brent Barry.

The trade appeared to be a better

deal for Denver, which can pair the powerful McDyess with center Dikembe Mutombo to form a formidable front line.

Boston wanted to improve its defense, so the Celtics used the 14th pick to take Providence forward Eric Williams, whom new coach M.L. Carr called "the best defender in the draft."

And the league's lowest-scoring team, Cleveland, took steps to pump up its offense, choosing Bob Sura, Florida State's all-time leading scorer. Sura averaged 17.9 points with the Seminoles, but Cavaliers coach Mike Fratello thinks he's capable of producing more.

"We evaluated him on his performance in a very tough conference," Fratello said.

"What he accomplished did not come against weak sisters out there. These numbers came against big-time programs."

One surprise was Chicago's selection of Alabama forward Jason Caffey, a player overshadowed by teammate McDyess, at No. 20. A helpful-minded rebounder, he filled the void at power forward created when Horace Grant left the Bulls.

"It's obvious to anybody watching Chicago basketball that right now what they're missing is a guy who doesn't care about scoring and wants to step up and do a lot of rebounding," Caffey said.

While most teams filled holes, Sacramento took what it already had plenty of — power forwards. The Kings made Arkansas' Cortis Williamson the 13th player taken overall, even though they already have two good players — 1994 draftees Brian Grant and Michael Smith — at this position.

"If you see a quality player, you don't worry about duplicating yourself," coach Gary St. Jean said. "You can't be too deep."

# Warriors nab 6-5 high school senior

**LIBERAL, Kan. (AP)** — The Big Eight's loss could be the NBA's gain.

Martin Lewis, a 6-foot-5 forward, was the 20th player taken in Wednesday night's NBA draft by the Golden State Warriors.

Lewis's mother, Odessa Lewis, said Thursday that her son, who had signed a letter of intent to play next season at Oklahoma State, had not spoken with the Warriors and did not yet have an agent.

If Lewis does not sign a professional contract or sign with an agent, he has 30 days to withdraw his name from the NBA and regain his college eligibility. But his mother said she would rather see him turn pro.

"I'm very much interested in him going (to the NBA) and I'm his mother," she said. She was taking

calls for her son and said he did not want to talk.

Odessa Lewis said she did not plan to speak with Oklahoma State coach Eddie Sutton, a former coach at College of Southern Idaho.

"I don't plan to have any dealings with Eddie Sutton," she said.

"I'm the one that has the say-so over Martin, not my coaches," Sutton was out of the country, but Oklahoma State assistant sports information director Mike Strauss said the Cowboys' assistant coaches were shocked that Lewis had made himself eligible for the draft.

"We didn't know anything about his plans," Strauss said. "No one here knew that he had done that."

"I almost fell out of my chair when I heard his name called. When I called one of our assistants Sean Sutton — he said he had fallen out of his chair."

"It was a huge surprise to us. We're going to find out his intentions and go from there."

Odessa Lewis said that declaring for the draft was her son's decision.

"I don't push my kids," she said. "This wasn't my idea."

She said her son now is getting into college basketball, but didn't get — in his year at Seward County Community College. Lewis averaged 22.6 points and 8.2 rebounds last season in leading SeJCA to the second round of the NJCAA tournament.

Lewis played as a freshman at Butler County Community College and was chosen All-Jayhawk Conference, averaging 18 points and 7.3 rebounds.

"I'm surprised," Dale Reed, his coach at Seward, said.

"Obviously somebody out there is aware of him," he had nothing more than casual conversations with Martin. I told him I've been talking to the coaching staff at Oklahoma State, and that he might want to get hold of them. He's said nothing to me."

# Kings return Webb to Hawks for forward Corbin

**SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)** — The Sacramento Kings traded unhappy point guard Spud Webb to the Atlanta Hawks for forward Tyrone Corbin on Thursday.

The 5-foot-7 Webb is one of the NBA's shortest players, and has been a big contributor to the Kings the past four seasons. Last season, he averaged 11.6 points per game and led the NBA in free

throw percentage at .934.

But he had been upset by the Kings' selection of guard Bobby Hurley as the No. 1 draft choice in 1993, and lost his starting job to Hurley before an auto accident ended the rookie's first season.

Corbin, a 10-year NBA veteran, averaged 6.2 points per game last season. He joins a Kings' team already deep in mid-sized forwards. "He is a

very good defender with a strong offensive game, including a good medium range jump shot," Kings' vice president Geoff Pietre said of Corbin.

Webb, 31, became expendable when the Kings' took point guard Tys Edney of NCAA champion UCLA in the second round of the NBA draft Thursday. Webb is returning to the team he played the first six seasons of his NBA career.

## Tax reform talks spotlights money funds

NEW YORK (AP) — Talk of radical changes in the nation's tax system has prompted some investors to take a new look at tax-free money market mutual funds.

While the debate over tax reform rages, these funds present themselves as a safe — although not very rewarding — place to wait out the storm.

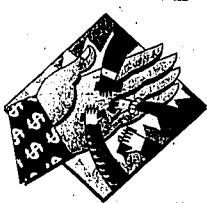
Several proposals have surfaced in Washington lately to rebuild the American tax code from the foundation up, possibly eliminating income taxes on all forms of financial investment.

None of these ideas is expected to come up for a serious vote before 1997 at the earliest, and even over the long term they are considered long-shot propositions.

Still, the discussion has unsettled the market for municipal securities issued by state and local government entities. In a flat-tax world, municipal bonds would stand to lose a prime advantage.

While interest paid on Treasury and corporate bonds is subject to income taxes, munis are exempt from federal income tax in some cases state and local taxes as well.

If a system is adopted that excludes all bonds (and money market securities, and stocks, for that

(matter) from income taxation, munis' main selling point would be neutralized.

That prospect has tended to push down prices and raise yields of long-term muni bond investments, including muni bond funds, over the last couple of months, limiting their participation in a broad upturn in bond prices and downward move in bond yields.

But short-term money funds that invest in municipal securities have been put in a considerably different position.

To be sure, the muni money markets would stand to lose their tax advantage as well. However, since

tax reform isn't going to happen for some time to come, it will have no impact on the securities now owned by tax-free money funds, whose portfolios have an average maturity of about 40 days as reported by the newsletter IBC's Money Fund Report.

If you're looking for a source of tax-sheltered income that is pretty much immune for now to the possibility of sweeping tax reform, muni money funds fill the bill.

Sad to report, however, the markets seem to have adjusted already to the tax-free money market's new attraction. Yields on muni money funds have fallen sharply in the last few weeks.

As of mid-June, IBC listed the average tax-free money fund's yield at 2.92 percent down from its full percentage point from where it stood just five weeks earlier.

By contrast, yields on long-term muni bond funds remain slightly above 5 percent, at last word from Morningstar Mutual Funds in Chicago.

Analysts cite a variety of forces pushing and pulling on yields throughout the municipal market. But the effect of recent swings has been to adjust relative yields to take into account all the tax-reform talk.

It has also reduced tax-free money funds' appeal by competition with their taxable counterparts in the money fund arena. Taxable money funds' yields still stand in the neighborhood of 5.5 percent.

So even if your combined federal and state marginal tax bracket is, say, 40 percent, you get a better after-tax payoff — about 3.3 percent — right now in taxable money funds than you do in tax-free money funds.

The relationships among yields in the various sectors of the bond and money markets are constantly shifting. Assuming that you were making plans for tax-exempt fund investing based on the most recent conditions, you'd be faced with a series of trade-offs.

Looking, above all, for tax-exempt income not directly exposed to the vagaries of political debate about the best system to opt for in the long run, conceding yield in return for peace of mind.

Looking to maximize tax-exempt income, and willing to gamble that radical tax reform won't happen? Consider tax-exempt bond funds, recognizing that you probably will have to brave quite a bit of volatility in the months ahead, before the question of what to do with the U.S. tax system is resolved.

## In debt to the mob? Sign on dotted line

SAN JOSE, Calif. — John Galbreath, like many people with good credit, gets scads of unsolicited, "pre-approved" credit card applications in the mail that he regards as a nuisance. But he doesn't just toss them.

He fills out the applications with absurd information, like saying he's 118 years old and owes money to the mob, and mails them back. Most of the letters leave him alone after that. But he was shocked last month when he got a card from MBNA.

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"I guess, if I were a crook, I could steal money pretty easily," says Galbreath, a former IBM engineer.

"Actually, there's not much of a human element involved in the approval process at all," says Robert McKinley, president of RAM Research, Group in Maryland, a firm specializing in credit card research. "This may all have been handled by a computer. It reminds me of the '80s when we had reports of credit cards being issued to dogs and 9-year-olds."

Galbreath may have had his fun, but he'd better make sure the bank card issuers don't get the last laugh, says another expert.

"If I had a little worried about the other applications he sent back with wrongful information," says Ruth Susswein, executive director of Bankcard Holders of America in Salem, Va. "He'd better get a copy of his credit report. He may not know he's being shown as having been rejected for credit now. This kind of thing can backfire, even though it sounds like harmless fun."

In its defense, the bank says Galbreath got a card because there's actually a credit report for a "John C. Reath" that lists Galbreath's address.

"A real live person looked at his application, not a computer," said MBNA spokesman Peter Cahome. "Even though he hadn't given complete information on the form, they found a credit report showing a good credit history. If there's a lesson to be learned, I think it's that you shouldn't fool around with applications. Be sure you're not giving false information on an application."

## House panel clears bank deregulation bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — After a grueling debate, the House Banking Committee approved a broad deregulation bill Thursday that would exempt many banks from a major fair-lending law and permit banks to buy insurance companies.

The Consumers Union called the bill a "hodgepodge of consumer law rollbacks." Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin said the latest version of the bill was "strongly objectionable" and said he would recommend that President Clinton veto the measure.

Joe Pigg, a staff member for Rep. Doug Bereuter, R-Neb., the bill's main author, accused

Rubin of making an "alarmist overstatement" about the bill's impact and said it wasn't anti-consumer. Bereuter has said the bill aims to trim a thicker of regulations which emerged in the 1970s and 1980s that may not be relevant today.

The panel voted 27-23 to send the bill to the House floor. The vote concluded four contentious days of work on more than 90 amendments, which kept the committee working until midnight twice this week.

Rep. Jim Leach, R-Iowa, the House Banking Committee chairman, issued a statement saying the bill's prospects were uncertain on the House floor, chiefly due to its insurance provisions.

In a surprise twist, the panel approved an amendment Wednesday to let banks affiliate with insurance companies, subject to state law. That would dramatically expand banks' reach in the financial services business, especially if Congress also approves a separate bill to let banks combine with Wall Street firms.

This amendment ruled a potent opponent that has killed previous bank reform bills: the insurance lobby.

The Independent Insurance Agents of America said it will fight the measure because independent insurance agents would be placed at a "severe competitive disadvantage."

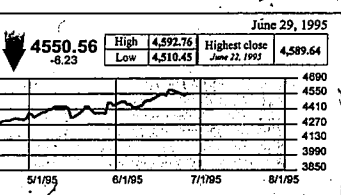
## Bonds plunge on sales data; stocks survive

NEW YORK (AP) — A report that new-home sales surged in May derailed investors' hopes for an interest-rate cut and sent bonds sharply lower on Thursday, but stocks survived relatively unscathed.

The Dow Jones industrial average ended 6.23 points lower at 4,550.56, having recovered nearly all of a 34-point drop posted earlier in the day.

Stocks buckled as the bond market plunged, with the 30-year Treasury down nearly 2 points late in the day, or \$20 for each \$1,000 invested.

Its yield, which rises when prices fall, climbed to 6.64 percent from 6.51 percent on Wednesday.

"It was hard," said Kossek. "If you engage in anything that symbolizes that your family is equal to or more important than your work it will affect how people view you."

Kossek talked to university officials and her boss, who agreed to make up the loss in pay for that year in future wage increases.

A Conference Board study released in early June showed that 83 percent of 129 companies surveyed offered part-time schedules. But only 12 percent of employees chose to accept that option.

Sixty percent of the surveyed companies offered the option of telecommuting, or working at home via computer-telephone linkup with the office. Only 6 percent of employees had ever worked from home.

The Conference Board survey, which also examined companies that have well-established work-family policies. Other studies have shown even lower usage.

In a 1993 survey, the Boston consulting group Work-Family Directions Inc. found less than 2 percent of employer use flexible scheduling options such as telecommuting, job-sharing and part-time work.

Kathie Lingle, work and family consultant with Watson Wyatt Worldwide, said that in her experience the average usage of all such programs, including child-care and referral services, is between 3 percent and 5 percent of a company's work force.

Part of the problem, she and others said, is many managers still value time spent in the work place above other measures of productivity.

ceived as "fluff" while 34-percent feel they are perceived as inequitable.

"It's not enough to offer a program, a company must create a climate in which an employee won't be jeoparded for using it," said Ellen Galinsky, co-chair of the Families and Work Institute.

The cost-cutting and layoffs that many companies have gone through this decade have made employees feel even less able to take advantage of the benefits, consultants said.

"People are afraid to ask for anything," said Kossek, who in March completed a study of work-family programs. "If you look like you are not career-oriented, you can lose your job."

From the point of view of the manager, "when you've gone through downsizing, it's hard to think in terms of flexibility," said Lynne Mischley, family issues specialist at The Dow Chemical Co.

Mara Schaberg, an account consultant with International Business Machines Corp. in Lansing, Mich., said she cut her hours to allow more family time. Now Schaberg said she fears she'll be among the first to go in the event of new job layoffs at IBM.

"I decided if that happened it would be OK," Schaberg said. "We're a two-income family."

Others, however, don't necessarily feel they have that option. At AT&T Corp., which has gone through numerous layoffs and restructurings, only 0.8 percent of the 2.5 million U.S. employees take family leave each year, and 0.1 percent share jobs.

Telecommuting, however, is built into the new business strategy, and 19 percent of managers now work off-site. "Family care is new in corporate America and its reputation is still not solid," said Bruce Sinslow, an AT&T spokesman. "Furthermore, taking advantage of family programs brands you as different and business doesn't embrace people who do things differently."

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# ABC takes long and winding road to land rights to 'Beatles Anthology'

NEW YORK — Like most bosses at major corporations, Capital Cities/ABC President and CEO Robert A. Iger has an expensive, expansive office with lots of paneled cabinetry. Unlike most CEOs, Iger has one cabinet in which is hidden a much smaller cabinet: a roll-top box containing every official CD release by the Beatles.

Iger keeps a set of Beatles CDs in his office because that's how often he listens to them. And their presence there, in easy reach, reveals a lot about why Iger, rather than anyone else in the international TV community, managed to land world-premiere TV rights for the five-hour Beatles special, titled "The Beatles Anthology."

"Anthology," which ABC will present in November, not only features vintage music, film and video of the group, and fresh interviews with surviving members and producer George Martin, but also will unveil, for the first time, two unreleased songs by John Lennon for which Paul McCartney, George Harrison and Ringo Starr have over-dubbed performances onto the late Lennon's demo tapes.

Neil Aspinall, who runs the Beatles-founded Apple Corp., said by

telephone last week that the idea of collaborating on new music came from the Beatles themselves. But, he added, it was Iger, who had been pursuing the project for two years in his previous job as president of ABC's Network Group, who first suggested the new Beatles music be given its world premiere during the ABC telecast.

"That impacted the price," Iger said droily last week, noting later that the exclusivity of the songs "Free as a Bird" and "Real Love" make the show that much more exciting.

"We believe in this," he said simply. "This is significant. This is big. This is an event."

So, again, how come Iger ended up with it? Aspinall has the answer.

"He understood what it was and what we were doing, and the complications of it," Aspinall said. "He was

"They're part of our own personal history," Iger said. "In many respects, they probably had more to do with shaping our notion of pop culture — yours and mine, personally, as well as an entire generation — than anyone or anything else I could possibly think of. "Now, if you were to tell the Bob Iger of 1964 that, at some point, that was going to happen to him, he either would have been terribly excited, or he would have completely scoffed at it and said, that'll never happen."

But it has. Like the song says, there's nothing you can do that can't be done. All you need is love.
