Ripples spread in FBI records case

WASHINGTON — A probe of record tampering at FBI headquarters could force reopening of a disciplinary case against the bureau's No. 2 official, a man FBI Director Louis J. Freeh selected as his deputy even while criticizing his management of a deadly 1992 standoff in Idaho.

Already, another senior FBI official, E. Michael Kane, has been suspended after admitting to altering or destroying records related to whether Larry Potts, now Freeh's deputy, approved a controversial "shoot on sight" directive in the Idaho case, administration and congressional officials said Thursday.

The sources, who demanded anonymity, noted that destruction of records could lead to criminal charges.

The developments come as two House subcommittees prepare to open hearings next week on a deadly 1993 FBI standoff in Waco, Texas. That siege also was managed at headquarters by Larry Potts before he was promoted from assistant to deputy FBI director. As the FBI assailed the Branch Davidian cult's compound with tear gas, a

fire broke out and 81 people died.

The House subcommittees also plan to look into the Idaho case, which could give it more prominence.

Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, said the record-tampering allegations "prove beyond a doubt" that the Senate Judiciary Committee should conduct hearings on the Idaho case. The committee's chairman, Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, did not return calls Thursday inquiring whether he would agree to them.

"The American people and the people of Idaho must judge for themselves if any federal misconduct or civil rights violations occurred on Ruby Ridge. But they must have all the facts," Craig said.

Deputy Attorney General James Gorelick told a news conference Thursday that if the ongoing investigation by the Justice Department's internal watchdog unit alters the record of which FBI officials did what during the Idaho incident, it could reopen the disciplinary case against Potts. He was given a letter of censure for management oversight in the case — one of the lesser penalties Freeh proposed earlier this year.

Gorelick said she approved the letter of censure.

Kids, pets featured at Lincoln fair

SHOSHONE — Samantha German has handled market beef in the show ring since she was 8, but this year, she thought she'd take on a bigger challenge — a sleek, slim feline.

The Shoshone-12-year-old was among a handful of youngsters displaying their cats and dogs at the Lincoln County Fair Thursday.

When preparing to show cattle, German just "picks one out of the herd." But to be successful in cat competition, "you have to have a cat with a personality and definite gentleness," she said.

Before placidly enduring the judge's scrutiny, German's cat "Ultimate" spent

his free time at the fair devouring Doritos and nestling in for a snooze between a bug display and a woodworking exhibit.

"But seeing these dogs was pretty much a scare," German said, pointing to the ring where three children led — and pushed — pets through their paces.

Sandy Jauregui, 9, of Dietrich, struggled to keep her "special pet" in line and said that she and the German shepherd, "Shadow," were both new to the ring.

"It's hardest to keep him still," she said with a sigh.

Mandi Miller's miniature schnauzer "Alex" emerged from competition with two reserve champion ribbons for obedience and showmanship, but the Dietrich 10-year-old was more apprehensive about her Burmese cat's behavior.

"Kiki can change moods really quickly," Miller said. Moodiness wasn't a worry for Miller's third competition of the day, when her "house-bunny" was set to take the stage.

Graham Unger and his "Sugar" — a yellow lab and golden retriever mix — walked out of the ring Thursday as the grand champions. But Unger, 14, said he and Sugar are more used to mountain biking together near his Ketchum home, with side trips to chase squirrels.

"She keeps up real well, even downhill," he said.

The Lincoln County Fair continues today with the beef show this morning, horse games in the arena at 2 p.m., junior rodeo events at 7:30 p.m., and rodeo at 8 p.m.

Teen smoking may be classed as disease

WASHINGTON — The Food and Drug Administration wants to regulate teen smoking as a "pediatric disease" and is discussing ways to do it with the White House, officials said Thursday.

Talk of imminent action set off a furor in Congress. President Clinton called "pre-mature" the reports that the FDA had decided to designate nicotine an addictive drug subject to stringent controls. He did say he was awaiting formal agency recommendations on new steps to fight youth smoking.

"My concern is... the impact of cigarette smoking, particularly on our young people and the fact that cigarette smoking seems to be going up among our young people," Clinton said. "I think we ought to do more about that than is being done."

But no one would say how close the administration was to a decision.

Reaction from tobacco-state members of Congress was quick and fierce, especially to a report the FDA had decided to declare nicotine addictive.

"The FDA has lost its mind," said House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga. "If you want an example of big government interfering, it would be the FDA picking a brand new fight when we haven't won the far more serious fights about crack and cocaine and heroin."

The FDA plays no role in illegal drugs such as cocaine. On smoking, commissioner David Kessler said Thursday the agency has decided its focus "is to find ways to discourage children from starting (smoking) in the first place."

Plans under FDA consideration include everything from a ban on cigarette vending machines and stiffer package warnings to such advertising restrictions as banning cartoon characters such as "Joe Camel."

Husband finds 'wife' was no lady

BOUNTIFUL, Utah — A missing-person report filed by a husband anxious about his wife uncovered the shocking truth.

The "wife" was actually a man who is accused of taking the husband for up to \$40,000 during their 3½-year marriage.

Felix Uristo is in jail on \$20,000 bail on fraud charges, and Bruce Jensen is confused, embarrassed and broke. Jensen told police he didn't know his wife was a man until officers convinced him.

"I feel pretty stupid," said Jensen, 39.

The deception — reminiscent of the Broadway drama "M. Butterfly" — unraveled when Uristo, 34, was arrested in Las Vegas for using 33 credit cards that were fraudulently obtained in the names of Bruce and Lena Jensen and others. At the time, Uristo was traveling as a bearded man.

Prosecutor Bill McGuire said Jensen was "just incredibly naive."

"You've got a situation where a guy didn't have a normal marriage," he said. "The victim is just a really nice guy."

Jensen couldn't be reached for comment Thursday because he has moved out of Bountiful and is staying with relatives.

He told the newspaper that as soon as the case is over, he'll return to Wyoming and "crawl in a hole for a few years and not let anyone within rifle range."

Authorities said Uristo was able to pull off the deception because he looked like a woman and because Jensen never saw him naked.

The couple got married when Uristo told Jensen he was pregnant with twins after a single sexual encounter in 1991, McGuire said. The prosecutor said Jensen married Uristo out of a sense of responsibility, and the marriage was basically celibate.

Several months after the marriage, Uristo told him the twins were stillborn and also falsely claimed he had cancer.

Jensen is seeking an annulment, citing irreconcilable differences.

"It ripped me up pretty good," he said. "It trashes you out to believe everything a person says and find out they lied to you on basically 100 percent of it."

In April, Jensen filed a missing-person report with Bountiful police when he couldn't locate Uristo, who had said he was going to New York for experimental cancer treatments. Bountiful police investigated and discovered that Uristo had already been arrested in Las Vegas on credit card fraud.

...based on the report that I had in front of me... If a subsequent investigation suggests that the original report was wrong, we will revisit whatever conclusions were based upon the original report."

The government's 1992 standoff with white separatist Randy Weaver at Ruby Ridge, Idaho, began when federal marshals sought his property to see if he could be arrested. During the standoff, an FBI sniper shot and killed Weaver's unarmed wife, Vicki.

Kahoe, who was chief of the violent crime and major offenders section at headquarters during the standoff, conducted an internal inquiry into the shooting of Mrs. Weaver shortly after it ended.

His placement on administrative leave resulted from a Justice Department internal watchdog unit's investigation into allegations that the bureau covered up Potts' approval of the shooting directive. The alleged document tampering

occurred shortly after the standoff, one FBI official said.

Kahoe, now head of the FBI field office in Jacksonville, Fla., will remain on leave pending final decisions about his case, another FBI official said.

The Justice investigation was begun after the FBI's former Salt Lake City chief, Eugene Glenn, who served as field commander in the Idaho standoff, alleged in a letter that the bureau's own investigation of the incident was designed to protect Potts.

Begun in early May, the Justice investigation is far from finished, three officials said. But one Justice official said it already had generated "pretty serious concern, although that doesn't mean there is a final conclusion."

Late Wednesday, Frech promised "firm action" against any wrongdoing by FBI employees.

Frech ensured and suspended Kahoe for 15 days earlier this year for failing to adequately document

his report on the Vicki Weaver shooting and for neglect of duty in overseeing the rules of engagement.

The most severe discipline in the case — censure, a 15-day suspension without pay and transfer — was proposed for Glenn. He is contesting it.

Potts was given the lightest penalty, a letter of censure, and was promoted in May. Frech said he recommended Potts for censure and promotion at the same news conference last January.

Rep. Helen Chenoweth, R-Idaho, called Wednesday for Reno to fire Potts after reading a 542-page Justice Department report on an earlier investigation. It criticized the rules of engagement and the FBI's sloppy record-keeping.

"Mr. Potts has repeatedly insisted that he followed the proper guidelines in preparing those rules," Chenoweth wrote in a letter to Reno. "However, the FBI's own report investigating the Weaver matter contradicts Mr. Potts' claim."

Hot weather moves eastward as cool air prevails in West

The sizzle staked a claim in the East Thursday and continued to scorch the Midwest.

By early afternoon, the mercury had climbed above 100 at La Crosse, Wis.

Parts of Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri, Iowa and Illinois also filled with triple digits.

A cold front was heading into the northern Plains and marked a significant contrast in temperatures as well as a focal point for scattered thundershowers.

At noon, Lemmon, S.D., was 70 degrees, while Sioux Falls was 99. Behind the front, temperatures were chilly in some parts of the Great Basin Thursday morning, including Elko, Nev., with 35 degrees, and nearby Wildhorse Reservoir, with 28 degrees.

Ely, Nev., was at 35 degrees, breaking the 1965 record of 38 degrees. Klamath Falls, Ore., was at 36 degrees, breaking the record of 39 set in 1977.

Severe thunderstorms rolled across the eastern Dakotas, Minnesota and Wisconsin and into the upper peninsula of Michigan by early afternoon.

The storms produced high winds, gusting to 75 mph at Brainerd, Minn., and 70 miles-per-hour at Houghton, Mich. There was damage, mainly to trees and power lines, at several locations, and a possible tornado was reported between Ojema and White Earth, Minn., where a mobile home was overturned. In Deer River, a truck was reportedly blown down the street by high winds.

Heavy rain hit parts of Montana, where one to two inches fell in an hour in parts of Pondera and Teton counties.

The national weather forecast called for scattered thundershowers moving across the northern Plains into the western Great Lakes, with an occasional risk of severe weather. High pressure will build into the West, but temperatures will be pleasantly mild today.

Unseasonably hot conditions will persist over the central part of the country, with 90s and higher extending from the Desert Southwest into Texas and northward into the northern Plains and the Midwest.

Weather helps crews gain on blaze near Utah proving grounds

DUGWAY PROVING GROUND, Utah (AP) — Cooler temperatures and calm winds have helped firefighters gain the upper hand on a 6,500 acre fire seven miles northeast of Dugway.

Fire crews kept the fire from spreading Thursday and estimate it will be contained by 6 p.m. today and controlled by Saturday evening.

A tanker plane dumped retardant and two helicopters dropped water.

...hold that trust," Standlee said before Shaw's sentence was delivered.

The 90-minute sentencing hearing was clearly painful for Shaw, his parents, and his bride of three months. With his hands clasped behind him and his eyes damp with tears, Shaw said he's trying to be a better son, a better brother, and a better Christian.

"I'd just ask that you give me a chance to prove myself to you," Shaw told Eismann, promising he'd never be seen in court again.

His attorney, Mark Manweiler, also defended Shaw, painted the victim as a sexually active teenager who said she enjoyed intercourse with Shaw — although he questioned whether sex had occurred.

Prosecutors presented the victim as an "A" student and a talented athlete who dropped out of school after her encounter with Shaw.

But after hearing Manweiler and reviewing the letters, Eismann opted for imprisonment. With family members looking on, and his wife weeping, Shaw was handcuffed and led out of the room.

Outside the courtroom, Shaw's relatives consoled each other and defended him to the press. Friends questioned the media coverage the case has received in Boise. They wondered why the court has barred results of a lie-detector test that back Shaw's claims: Such tests are rarely, if ever, allowed as evidence

in Idaho trials.

Relatives portrayed Shaw as the victim — an innocent man who is telling the truth.

"It could happen to you, it could happen to anybody... You can't protect yourself from a liar," Tim's father, Joe Shaw of Twin Falls, said. "He's innocent, and there are people that know that, I believe."

Angry Clinton reluctantly approves base closure list



President Clinton denounced in Washington Thursday the military base closure list because, he said, it will affect too many jobs in California and Texas unfairly.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Founding his lectern, President Clinton denounced a base closing list Thursday for the damage it would do to California and Texas, but then approved the package with a promise to save jobs in those states.

With the White House scrambling to control the political fallout in two big electoral states, Clinton approved a list that closes 79 bases and realigns 26 others across the country. Unless Congress rejects the package — considered highly unlikely — it will become law by the end of summer.

In terms of numbers of jobs lost, the blow falls most heavily on California and Texas where two Air Force maintenance depots that Clinton originally wanted spared are to be closed down.

California, the biggest electoral prize in next year's presidential election, would lose McClellan Air Force Base in Sacramento. All told, almost half the jobs lost in this year's base closure round would come from California even though only 15 percent of the military is stationed there.

Texas would lose Kelly Air Force Base in San Antonio. Of the 18,000 employees at the base, 61 percent are Hispanic. Clinton said that "outlets virtually wipe out the Hispanic middle class" in the city.

"It will have a devastating impact," he said.

Because of the impact on local communities, and not for political reasons, Clinton said, he was working on a plan to convert some of the jobs at the California and Texas bases over to the private sector, where workers would continue to do Air Force work, under contract.

"Where is the politics? This is about economics," Clinton said at a Rose Garden appearance shortly before he approved the closure list. "This is about economics."

Clinton blasted the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission, which compiled the list, for failing to take into account the cumulative economic impact on certain regions hit particularly hard by base closings this year and in the three previous rounds in 1988, 1991 and 1993.

"Now you tell me that my concern over (California's) economic situation, when their unemployment rate is 8.5 percent, they have borne over 50 percent of the burden of the job finger-pointing, fist-pounding outburst."

"This is an outrage," he declared. The complaint was intended, at least in part, to show California and

Texas voters he was fighting for them, even as he moved toward accepting the list.

White House Chief of Staff Leon Panetta telephoned Sen. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., Thursday, reaching her in the Senate cloakroom, to say that Clinton's privatization plan would guarantee that 8,700 jobs would remain at the California depot for at least five years.

Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., meanwhile, said that Air Force Chief of Staff Ronald Fogleman told her Thursday that, at most, 3,000 to 5,000 jobs could be saved.

McClellan alone accounts for some 11,000 of the nearly 20,000 military and civilian jobs the state would lose under the base-closure plan. That is almost half of the 43,742 jobs that would be lost nationwide under the base closure plan. In addition, California would lose 22,898 "indirect" jobs, including private contractors who work on or near bases and employees of fast-food restaurants, dry cleaners and other service providers that rely on business from nearby bases.

Rose Grady, 47, a mechanic who works on F-15 wing repairs at McClellan, shut her eyes and paused

for a few seconds upon hearing the news. "I am weak-kneed. I am frightened. This is devastating," Grady, a 15-year employee, said. "I'll be 50 years old by the time the base closes and starting all over again."

Said Tom Gutman, 34, a sheet metal worker on fighter planes: "I've got a mortgage, a kid, a wife and, as of today, I'm looking for a job."

Other California bases on the closure list include the Long Beach Naval Shipyard and Oakland Army Base.

Texas would lose 13,381 military and civilian jobs and 19,476 indirect jobs, according to the commission.

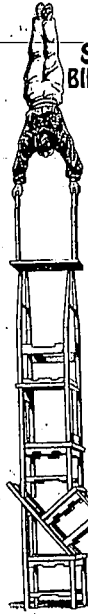
But these are not the only hard-hit regions. The Pacific island of Guam would lose 8 percent of its job force under the closure recommendations, by far the highest proportional job loss. Alabama would lose 6,372 military and civilian jobs.

The 79 bases to be closed and 26 to be realigned would save the government \$19.3 billion over 20 years. The commission says its plan saves \$323 million more than Clinton's initial base-closing plan.

Nationwide, this fourth round of base closures would result in a net loss of 43,742 military and civilian jobs at bases and 49,823 indirect jobs for a total loss of 93,565 jobs.

McClellan and Kelly would have remained open under Clinton's original proposed closure list. The com-

House OKs end to arts funding; Senate version trims by 50%

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republican leaders bowed to pressure from conservatives Thursday and agreed to try to phase out taxpayer-financed aid for the arts and humanities over the next two years.

The concession ended a minirevolt by five dozen of the House's newer, more conservative members and allowed the chamber to resume debating a \$12 billion measure financing federal land and cultural programs for the coming year.

The overall legislation, part of the GOP's campaign to eliminate federal deficits by 2002, would trim \$1.6 billion from this year's levels. It would kill about two dozen energy conservation programs, shrink the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and erase or trim many other programs.

But the day did not belong entirely to the conservatives, as they lost a fight in which they said they were defending property owners' rights. By a 256-168 vote, the House voted to allow trained volunteers to help the National Biological Survey gather

information on endangered animal and plant species. Such findings sometimes result in limits to private development of lands.

"I think it virtually saves the program," said moderate Rep. Wayne Gilchrest, R-Md., who sponsored the amendment.

Conservatives scored a win, however, when the House Republican leaders agreed to limit themselves to providing money for the National Endowment for the Arts and its sister agency, the National Endowment for the Humanities, only for the next two years. The House leaders also promised to seek separate legislation that would terminate both agencies after two years.

The ultimate fate of the endowments is unclear, however, because the Senate has yet to act on their financing.

The Senate-approved budget for next year envisions cutting the arts agencies by 50 percent next year, but not phasing them out.

Police chase semi-truck after driver ordered to take a break

SPOKANE (AP) — A Washington State Patrol car blocking an intersection was struck by a semi-truck in a chase, the patrol said Thursday.

The driver was arrested after the truck stopped on a dead-end street near patrol headquarters in Spokane. No injuries were reported.

Harold Rhodes, 29, of Moses Lake, was booked into the Spokane County Jail for investigation of eluding police officers, malicious mischief, resisting arrest and obstructing an officer.

The incident began shortly before 10 p.m. Wednesday.

The trucker, carrying a load of paper products, was cited at the Washington State Port of Entry from Idaho for failing to keep a current log book and staying on the road for more than 10 consecutive hours, the patrol said.

He was ordered to stay at the port of entry for an eight-hour break, but got back on the road and started driving westbound again on Interstate 90, the patrol said.







Chenoweth should keep her ideas earthbound

Rep. Helen Chenoweth, who normally wouldn't trust the federal government to organize a bake sale, says we ought to revive the mega-dollars Star Wars project.

Most likely, she's saying this because outrageous remarks are the only way a freshman congressman can get media attention. Since arriving in Washington six months ago, she has perfected the art.

But just in case anyone (including Chenoweth) is taking this idea seriously, let's review two important facts about Star Wars:

1. It was incredibly expensive.
 2. It didn't work.
- Star Wars, for those who don't remember, was a pet project of ex-President Reagan. Its goal was to spread an umbrella of anti-missile technology across America. In theory, it would render Soviet ballistic missiles harmless by shooting them down or disabling them.

At Reagan's urging, Congress shoveled seas of money at this eye-in-the-sky idea.

We never actually managed to shoot down any missiles. Still, a decent argument can be made that Star Wars served a useful purpose. It demonstrated America's willingness to spend itself silly on whiz-bang technology that the Soviets couldn't match. Maybe that helped persuade the Soviets to bail out of the Cold War.

On the other hand, maybe Soviet Communism was simply predestined to collapse under its own enforced inefficiency.

Either way, the Evil Empire is gone, and there's not much sense in bringing back the gazillion-dollar dream that was supposed to protect us from it.

But Chenoweth has a different idea. (Actually, she didn't think it up — it's been rattling around for a while.) She suggests using Star Wars to protect us from ragtag, upstart countries that might buy second-hand Soviet nukes.

It's not a bad notion, especially if you figure Swaziland probably couldn't afford more than one or two missiles. Knocking out a couple of bargain-basement ICBMs is a lot easier than stopping the hundreds previously aimed at us by the Soviets.

But once again, remember those key facts about Star Wars:

1. It was incredibly expensive.
 2. It didn't work.
- Given unlimited money, it might work someday. Or it might not. Meanwhile, U.S. defense needs would be better served by arming and preparing for the kind of low-level, conventional dust-ups we keep stumbling into.

And Chenoweth's Idaho constituents would be better served if she kept her mind on more earthbound issues.

A process of electing delegates and developing issue recommendations began a year ago. A lot of sacrifices have been made by the delegates to present the top 60 issues to the Clinton administration and those who follow in the next decade.

The top vote-getters are independent contractor status reform, deduction of 100 percent for business-related meals and entertainment expenses, amendment of the Regulatory Flexibility Act, health care reform, realistic risk assessments on environmental legislation, reform of IRA's and pension plans, intellectual property protection, tort reform, tax reform and 50 others.

The national small-business delegation has elected eight regional implementation chairs. They will help to ensure that a substantial number of White House Conference on Small Business delegates stay involved and work together to secure enactment of the 60 recommendations.

Instead of the "gotcha" attitudes displayed by major government agencies, we've been promised by President Clinton and his staff that the field inspectors and representatives will begin a new working partnership with common sense. Their goal will be to produce results, not penalties for small businesses acting in good faith.

Recently, the Paperwork Reduction Act of 1995, signed by President Clinton, establishes a governmentwide paperwork reduction goal of 10 percent for 1996-97 and a 5 percent reduction goal for 1998-2001.

Americans must provide health care for deserving and undeserving alike

It's the silly season, when nothing much is happening and nobody cares anyhow, but Sen. Jesse Helms, the columnist's friend, has given me a firewell column before I set off on vacation.

Last week, Helms attacked federal spending on AIDS care on the grounds that victims get the disease due to "deliberate, disgusting, revolting conduct."

Even to those obsessed with vacation planning, the irony is crassly obvious: The North Carolina Republican is a staunch supporter of his state's tobacco industry. He wants more funding for heart disease and cancer.

Most people with AIDS engaged in risky conduct — sharing needles or having unprotected sex — and should know better and behaved more prudently.

So, did you jog this morning? Did you have fruit and bran or bacon and eggs? How much do you drink? Do you fasten your seat belt, obey the speed limit, wear a helmet on bike or motorcycle? Do you smoke?

Helms doesn't think smoking — by heterosexuals — is an "unnatural" act, but the mechanism is the same: Some choose to put their health at risk, and all — abstemious and profligate alike — end up paying the bills.

So what? Do we offer health care for "innocent" diabetics while denying care to diabetics who can't stick to a diet? What about boozers who need a new liver, or couch potatoes who need a coronary bypass?

Helms' comments were inspired by the Ryan White CARE Act of 1990, now up for reauthorization in Congress, which provides federal funds for AIDS prevention and care. The bill was named for a hemophiliac teenager infected with the AIDS virus by a blood transfusion — the classic "innocent" victim who didn't live long enough to engage in disgusting conduct of any sort.

The bill extending the Ryan White Act for another five years has passed a Senate committee, with annual funding cut 22 percent to \$650 million; Helms has kept it from a vote on the Senate floor.

Traditionally, Americans have been leery of making distinctions between the deserving and the undeserving sick. Few are so pure in health habits that they can afford to cast the first stone.

But the national patience with high-risk health behavior may be running out due to AIDS, "crack babies," anti-drunk driving campaigns and the very high cost of health care.

AIDS forces a moral question: Do we care for people because they need care or because we think we might get what they've got or because they're sympathetic victims, preferably children?

There's a strong argument for spending a lot of money on AIDS research and prevention. Unlike cancer or heart disease, AIDS is both preventable and curable. AIDS is a public health menace, spread from person to person; it is not merely a personal tragedy for those infected.

While research and prevention must be a federal priority in a nationwide epidemic, the argument for federally funding care and services for people with AIDS is weaker. People with AIDS don't have Ryan White Act to fund services specifically for them. On the other hand, they are not vilified, ostracized and stigmatized either.

AIDS should not be politically privileged say Republicans who lack Helms' gift for vivid homophobia. It should be treated as a disease, they say, not a social cause.

It would be nice if it were possible. No bashing of AIDS victims. No glorification of their. Just a strong, honest public health campaign focused at a major public health threat.

Scientist unaware of stars

One person's perspective and sense of proportion should occasionally be jolted back to a more germane working reality. This occurred twice in a single visit to Fermilab in Illinois several weeks ago. (Until eclipsed in a few years by European research, Fermilab is the world leader looking for and at very high energy particles fundamental to nature.)

We visitors from Filer walked up steps to Fermilab headquarters, a modern zigzag hovering over the flat Illinois prairie. Once inside its beautifully planted atrium, I pointed to the large pendulum slowly swinging back and forth in a short arc. As it did so, suspended as it was from a ceiling some seven stories in height, traces of its motion were left in circularly placed and smoothed sand within a circular box.

Examination of these traces in the sand show a rotation in the swing plane of the brass orb. Physicists have shown conclusively that the seeming change in direction is an illusion. The traditional egocentric and parochial view of Earth as the center of the universe is the source of this discordance of cause and effect. Contrary to appearances, the motion of the pendulum is not of this Earth.

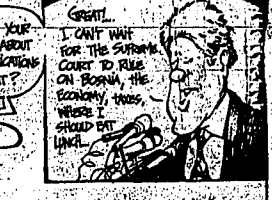

Discovery lifts satellite into orbit

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Space shuttle Discovery rocketed into orbit Thursday on a flight delayed by woodpeckers, and promptly released a \$330 million satellite to replace one destroyed in the Challenger disaster.

The crew freed the Tracking and Data Relay Satellite from its tilted table six hours into the flight. The shiny, gold-colored satellite drifted off as the shuttle slowly backed away.

"Discovery, excellent job. Happy faces," Mission Control told the crew.

An attached rocket motor fired and propelled the satellite from Discovery's 184-mile altitude toward a 22,300-mile-high orbit. There, it will join five other TDRS satellites and serve as a spare.

The TDRS network links ground controllers with Discovery as well as other orbiting craft, such as the Hubble Space Telescope.

Ohio Gov. George Voinovich wept and prayed as Discovery punched through two decks of clouds and sped out over the Atlantic Ocean. Four of the five crew members are from Ohio.

Voinovich said he couldn't help thinking of Judith Resnik, one of seven astronauts killed when Challenger exploded on Jan. 28, 1986.

"She was from Ohio, you know, and the TDRS they're carrying up will replace the one she was carrying up on Challenger," he said. "When you think of all the things that could go haywire, you don't take it for granted."

It took nine years to start the satellite production line back up and

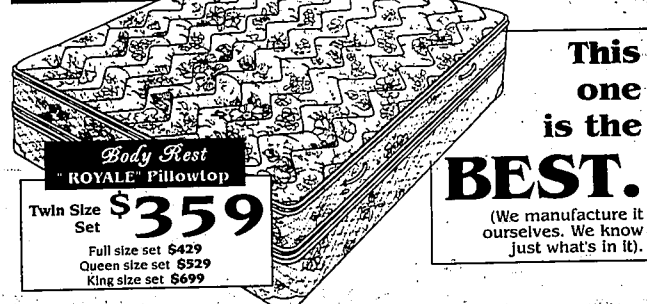

Snake reservoirs fill to capacity

BURLEY — Generous winter snows, coupled with heavy spring rains, relatively cool weather and modest irrigation demand, have combined to fill the Snake River reservoir system upstream of Milner Dam.

More than 4 million acre-feet of water was held in Upper Snake reservoirs earlier this week, according to information provided by the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation.

Upper Snake reservoirs were alarmingly low at the start of the water year, largely

because of heavy reliance on stored water by irrigators last year. Miserly mountain snowpacks triggered the run on reservoir water in the Upper Snake last year.

This year's low reservoir carry-over levels fueled early forecasts for water shortages.

However, all Upper Snake reservoirs — except American Falls and Henry's Lake — were at or over full capacity on Monday, the bureau announced.

American Falls, the largest in the system at 1.67-million acre-feet, was 98 percent full. Henry's Lake reservoir, which can

hold 90,010 acre-feet, also was 98 percent full; one acre-foot equals 325,850 gallons.

Palisades Reservoir, the second-largest reservoir in the Upper Snake at 1.2 million acre-feet, was 1 percent over capacity. Jackson Lake, the third-largest at 847,000 acre-feet, also was 1 percent over capacity.

The reservoir behind Milner Dam was 25 percent over capacity. Milner, at 30,000 acre-feet, is one of the smallest reservoirs in the Upper Snake system.

Water movement in the Upper Snake was heaviest downstream of Palisades reservoir, where 20,500 cubic feet of water per second

was flowing in the Snake River; one cfs equals 449 gallons per minute.

Downstream of American Falls, the Snake was carrying 13,868 cfs — and 11,638 cfs was flowing from Lake Walcott Reservoir, near Rupert.

The Lake Walcott releases were exceeded by downstream irrigation demands, which amounted to 11,774 cfs of water being removed from the river.

The flow deficit, coupled with another 1,500 cfs being released from Milner Dam, is reducing the excessive amount of water behind Milner.

Search for missing Sun Valley man goes on

RICHFIELD — Searchers continued to look for a Sun Valley businessman Thursday evening who has been missing since he went fly fishing along the Big Wood River Tuesday.

Bud Feltman, 56, is the owner of Sport Vision of Sun Valley, which manufactures sunglasses.

The multi-agency effort was launched Tuesday evening after Feltman failed to return home for a dinner engagement with his wife. His vehicle was found along the river at the headgates of the Richfield Canal.

Volunteers and law enforcement officials have combed the land and floated on rafts and kayaks through the deep, narrow, lava-gorge river looking for signs of Feltman.

Juvenile escapee charged, as adult in hearing of jailers

TWIN FALLS — A Kimberly boy who eluded police for six days after escaping from juvenile detention was charged as an adult Thursday in connection with the robbery and beating of two jailers.

Police said John Jones, 15, bludgeoned a jailer with a pillowcase containing a Bible and escaped with three other teenagers July 6 by ramming a stolen car through the security gates of the Snake River Juvenile Detention Center.

Jones was arrested Wednesday evening after someone spotted him in a crowd of youths on a street corner. Another escapee, Lindsay Mullins, 14, of Twin Falls, was recaptured with him.

Thursday, Jones was charged as an adult with robbery and two counts of battery of a jailer with intent to commit a felony. He could spend five years to life in prison.

Idaho law allows prosecutors to charge some juveniles as adults if their crimes are violent.

His former cellmate, Jessy Allen Salas, 15, of Jerome is also being charged as an adult — with robbery and battery of a jailer with the intent to commit a felony. Salas was captured the day after the escape.

Jones and Salas are credited by police with orchestrating the escape, which involved imprisoning two guards in separate rooms, inviting other inmates to join them and stealing a guard's car. One jailer's wallet containing \$140 also was stolen.

Mullins and Lee Seal, 17, of Twin Falls, will be charged as juveniles for their involvement in the escape.

Search and Rescue teams involved in 2 separate missions

TWIN FALLS — Two Search and Rescue teams were busy on separate missions at nightfall Thursday in the Snake River Canyon in Jerome and Twin Falls counties.

At Shoshone Falls, searchers were apparently searching below the concession stand at the falls overlook, according to emergency radio transmissions. A Twin Falls County sheriff's dispatcher refused to confirm that a search was under way, however.

Meanwhile, Jerome County searchers were busy west of the Perrine Bridge, where they were trying to recover a suspicious black truck that was reportedly dumped in the river. Additional information was not available.

Swimmers make progress along sockeye's path

RIGGINS — Moving much faster than they'd expected, members of the Sockeye Survival Swim are well beyond the halfway point of their 450-mile swim down the Salmon and Snake rivers.

After only 13 days on the water, the quartet of swimmers — including two Magic Valley men — spent Thursday night at Spring Bar, about 12 miles upstream from Riggins. The group began swimming July 1 on the Salmon River near Redfish Lake.

"We're making much better time than we'd expected. We've got 270 miles behind us and another 176 to go," said Gooding resident Gail Ater in a telephone interview Thursday. Ater and Roy Akins, of Jerome, are hoping to reach Lower Granite Dam on the Snake River in Washington by the end of the month.

The other swimmers are Jamie James and Paul Lundgren, both of Boise. At least one man is in the water when the group is on the move; the others follow in a pair of rafts.

The group is planning to relax for a couple of days at Spring Bar, Ater said, noting that a party in their honor is scheduled for Saturday.

The river is moving at five to seven miles an hour, Ater said, so racking up mileage has been far easier than anyone had anticipated.

"The Salmon River has been huge," Ater said, noting that it is flowing at about 30,000 cubic feet per second

at White Bird; one cfs equals 449 gallons per minute.

"So far, our longest day has been 30 miles, from East Fork to Challis, but it would be nothing to do 40 miles in a day," Ater said.

The water is moving so fast that oarsmen on the rafts must struggle to keep up with swimmers, he said.

"With the river as big as it is, a lot of the rocks and other problems are washed out," Ater said. "There are lots of standing waves and a few holes, but the river is so big we can miss most of the problems."

"This is the way a river should run in the spring and early summer," Ater said.

The swim is intended to call attention to the plight of endangered salmon to the Pacific Ocean. Salmon smolts — racing against time as they evolve into saltwater and a few holes, but the river is so big we can miss most of the problems.

The swimmers are planning to contrast the Salmon's fast-moving water with the relatively sluggish water of the Snake, which has been tamed by four dams in eastern Washington. Before the dams, the journey from Redfish Lake to the sea took days; now it is measured in weeks.

Redfish may open to kokanee fishing

STANLEY — Idaho anglers might be able to fish for kokanee salmon at Redfish Lake this summer.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game was waiting on Thursday for a decision from the National Marine Fisheries Service to allow anglers to catch and keep kokanee.

The problem is that Redfish Lake, near Stanley and at the headwaters of the Salmon River, also contains the endangered sockeye

salmon. The lake has been closed to fishing for the look-alike kokanee since 1992.

But preventing anglers from taking kokanee has backfired. Kokanee populations have doubled or maybe even tripled in recent years, and the fish are competing for food and living space with the sockeye.

So Fish and Game proposed to the federal agency in charge of salmon recovery to allow a two-week catch-and-keep kokanee fishery in Redfish Lake.

"The two weeks would be a positive demonstration of how salmon recovery and recreational fishing opportunities can go hand in hand when supported biologically," said Sharon Kiefer, Fish and Game's anadromous fishery coordinator.

Kiefer said an answer from federal officials could come on Friday, and a fishing season for kokanee could come as early as the week end.

The last two weeks in July are a crucial time for kokanee fishing in Idaho.

Batt tries to downplay economic effects of anti-nuke waste stance

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Unrelenting in his stand against allowing any resumption of nuclear waste shipments, Gov. Phil Batt Thursday tried to ease concerns of workers at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory about the Navy's renewed threats of economic retaliation.

In an electronic mail letter to the site's estimated 10,000 workers, Batt reiterated his commitment to maintaining the INEL's viability during the latest legal battle with the federal government over additional waste storage.

"I want to assure you that as I work through the legal process, the health of the INEL is a foremost consideration," Batt wrote. "And despite the pressure of leaders from the immediate area of INEL's economic impact to back down from his stand against further radioactive dumping, Batt said his stance — requiring an enforceable deadline for removing waste to a permanent dump in the foreseeable future — is backed by the vast majority of Idahoans.

The governor's action came in the wake of the Navy's latest threat to relocate its Naval Reactors Facility — and 1,000 employees — from the INEL if waste shipments remain banned. The state said the Navy had threatened earlier to suspend environmental cleanup at the

INEL because of Idaho's court challenge to resumed waste shipments.

The state claims the shipments cannot be made safely, and it questions the veracity of the Navy claim that the shipment ban was undermining national security.

But Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary told congressional panel this week that the Navy threat was essentially meaningless because it would cost too much and take too long to relocate the Naval Reactors Facility. Idaho Sen. Dirk Kempthorne put the price tag at \$1 billion, and the Energy Department official said relocation would take the better part of a decade.

The Navy claims it needs authority to immediately ship 24 loads of waste to Idaho. But it has lost two court bids to have the ban lifted in the U.S. District Court in Idaho and the other in the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco — and faces living with the two-year-old ban until this fall at the earliest when U.S. District Judge Edward Lodgekules on the state's claims.

The only way around it would be congressional intervention, and there were increasing signs that the Navy was ready to pursue that course — as it attempted two years ago when the ban was first imposed.

Congressional aides have reported indications that Adm. Bruce DeMars, head of the Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program, has begun soliciting support for an amendment of the defense appropriations bill that would require Idaho to accept the 24 additional shipments. That bill reportedly was expected to come to a vote in the Senate by month's end.

And as they did two years ago, Navy officials have begun issuing statements warning of major layoffs at their shipyards on both coasts if waste shipments to Idaho are not resumed.

Claims in 1993 that thousands would lose their jobs if shipments were banned were never borne out. Under an agreement, the Navy, which planned scores of waste shipments over the past two years, was allowed to make only 27.

But some officials fear the renewed layoff warnings are being used to create support for the legislation to bypass federal court rulings in the long-running waste controversy.

Local tax cap contributes to Middleton chief's layoff

MIDDLETON (AP) — Idaho's new 3-percent cap on increases in local property-tax financed budgets was a factor in the elimination of Middleton Fire Chief Ben Holt's position, a fire district commissioner says.

But Fire District Commissioner Dan Callahan and fellow commissioners Lynn Bennett and Hoyt Davis would not expand on the reasons behind Wednesday's decision to dis-

miss the veteran chief and name a volunteer to replace him. Commissioners said only that it was in the best interest of the district and the community. But the move prompted four volunteer members of the fire department to quit in support of Holt.

"We'd follow Ben Holt into the fires of hell," volunteer Scott Miller said. "This is political backstabbing." Holt also insisted the decision was personal, and Mayor Lee Sweigert said the chief had lost his efficiency

and no longer was in control of the department. Holt was not given the chance to stay on without pay.

"No one had talked to me at all," Holt said. "There was no forewarning. I wasn't even asked what was going on with the fire department or anything. It's all political."

Volunteer Russell Miller, who quit Wednesday, said problems arose for Holt because the commissioners want to run the fire department themselves.

"They want to rule it with an iron hand, and they're not qualified to do it," he said.

The commissioners named volunteer firefighter Tim Deck to serve as volunteer chief.

"It's going to be hard," Deck said. "We're pretty tightknit down there. This is like a major wound."

But Deck said Thursday that fire protection for the community is not in jeopardy. Besides Deck, there are still 10 firefighters and three officers on board.

Kempthorne starts ESA debate with call for state input

WASHINGTON — After resounding praise for the Endangered Species Act from the nation's science community Thursday, Western representatives and Clinton administration officials agreed during a Senate hearing that the law could be improved by turning over more authority to the states.

"The Subcommittee on Drinking Water, Fisheries and Wildlife, chaired by Idaho Republican Sen. Dirk Kempthorne, is gearing up to revamp the 20-year-old act in the fall. And during the hearing, the local official's recommendation became the theme.

"States should be 'full partners,'" according to John Harris, chairman of the "Western Governors' Association Staff Working Group." "We want to be part of the dialogue."

The state-rights types got a boost from Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt who said,

"For example, he said Montana's efforts in administering a conservation plan for the bull trout have improved its chances for survival while keeping it off the endangered species list. In the Pacific Northwest, preserving the northern spotted owl and some species of salmon have met with local opposition and remain on the list.

In general, the Interior Department reports

that 955 endangered species are listed nationwide with Idaho contributing 13 animals and two plants. Eight species have recovered, and 38 percent are improving.

The academic panel agreed the world is experiencing rapid species extinction, but the act is helping to slow the pace. The scientists — including Michael Clegg from the University of California, Jane Lubchenco from Oregon State University and Stuart Pimm from the University of Tennessee — testified that the act is based on sound science.

They called saving endangered species a moral issue, but said the ESA could be defended economically also because of the tourism and fisheries jobs it indirectly produces. Endangered species preservation has also led to discovery of medicines and cleaner drinking water.

But the act does have its critics. Lawmakers complain of the cost, and some

property owners wanting to develop their land have found their efforts thwarted.

Babbitt announced a plan, which became an executive order Wednesday, to exempt landowners with five acres or less from complying with the measure.

Citing conflicts with private property rights, the GOP in the House has cut the Interior Department's budget for new species listings and protection. Environmentalists criticize this move as a back-door method of gutting ESA.

A separate proposal still in the draft stage shows Republicans want to include a provision in the act that would compensate private property owners whose land serves as home for an endangered species. Also in that draft is language to define the taking of a species as direct harm to an endangered animal, not its habitat. That would undo recent historic Supreme Court decisions on ESA.

In the Senate, Kempthorne indicated dur-

ing the ESA hearing he also wishes to address concerns of private property owners. But the Idaho Republican said he will likely propose a different solution than the House.

"We must carefully balance the concerns of the wild species with that of the human species," said Kempthorne. But that does not include "legislating" through budget cuts, the senator's spokesman said.

Kempthorne and Sen. John Chafee, R-R.I., who chairs the full Environment and Public Works Committee, claim they want to preserve the act but prefer to give states more authority, provide incentives for landowners instead of punishment, and target their limited dollars to the most important species. Chafee added that he will seek more administrative changes to include alternatives to expensive court action.

This was the first of three Senate hearings planned for reviewing the act. Kempthorne expects to draft a bill in the fall.

Convicted drug trafficker gets new trial

RUPERT — A Rupert man, sentenced earlier this year to 10 to 30 years in prison on drug trafficking charges, will get a new trial — something his lawyer said should give people faith in the criminal justice system.

Felipe Cantu, 27, of Rupert was convicted by a jury in January. Fifth District Judge William Hart sentenced Cantu and fined him \$20,000. But Hart has recently decided that Cantu should be granted a new trial on grounds that his former lawyer did not adequately explain a plea agreement, which may have lessened his sentence.

A. Elizabeth Burr-Jones, the attorney who has convinced Hart to grant Cantu a new trial, said she feels justice has been served.

"I think it is always a gratifying when you can see someone who isn't popular and is in a weak position receive the kind of justice that

was afforded to him," she said.

"He is a Mexican who doesn't speak any English, charged with a drug crime in Minidoka County," Burr-Jones said.

Cantu was represented in January by Burley lawyer David Haley, who said he was placed in an "impossible" position when Minidoka County Prosecutor Gary Newman offered him a plea agreement.

Haley represented Cantu and Rosario Flores Reyes, who were charged with crimes that allegedly stemmed from the same situations. Newman offered to recommend a substantially lower prison sentence for the two if they agreed to testify against one another.

Burr-Jones argued that Haley could not disclose the benefits or drawbacks of the plea offer, since it would be pitting one of clients against the other.

"There isn't any question that it created a conflict situation," Haley said.

But Haley said he notified Hart of the problem it created and that neither Cantu or Reyes chose to participate in the plea agreement.

Newman could not be reached for comment Thursday. But in a court brief stating her opposition for a new trial, Newman wrote a conflict of interest would have occurred only if Cantu and Reyes had agreed to testify against each other.

"They were united in their defense and in their desire to testify for each other," Newman wrote.

Cantu was convicted of one count of a conspiracy to deliver marijuana, two counts of delivering cocaine and one count of delivering methamphetamine or "crack."

Burr-Jones cannot get a new trial, Burr-Jones said, because he took a different plea offer and did not go to trial. Reyes pleaded guilty to three counts of conspiracy to deliver and was sentenced to five to 10 years in prison, she said.

Police billing plan prompts queries

BURLEY — A new billing plan that would change the way small Cassia County cities pay for law enforcement raises questions about what cities will be able to afford in the future.

The county, the sheriff's department and the cities of Albion, Malta, Oakley and Declo plan to meet next week to discuss the implications of revised contracts and determine if changes can be made.

Albion Mayor Donald B. Danner said paying for the same law enforcement services under the new contract would be impossible. The city is paying \$2,500 a year for 11.5 hours of service a week. Under the new plan, Albion would pay \$13,750 a year.

"We would have to cut back the numbers of hours we received, which is something I want to avoid," Danner said. "I'm going there (to the meeting) hoping that we can work out some type of service based

on the need for law enforcement."

But Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said the restructuring's purpose isn't to burden small cities — which have populations of less than 1,000 people — but to come up with an updated billing system that makes sense.

"There may be some give and take on both sides," Crystal said.

"The need for a change" became apparent this year when Oakley asked to renegotiate its contract for the same amount of patrol hours for half the price, Crystal said.

According to Cassia County Administrator Tim Hurst, the new contract would add consistency to the billing system. Rates paid by cities average from \$4 an hour to \$18 an hour, he said.

Under the new contract, cities would pay \$23 an hour, which is \$15 of what Hurst calculated to be the cost of putting an officer on the street in a vehicle. Burley's law enforcement costs are calculated differently from the smaller cities and are based on the number of calls that

come in to the department, Hurst said.

"According to Crystal, the hourly charges are only for enforcement of city ordinances. The sheriff's department enforces and investigates crimes that fall under state laws like homicides and burglaries, he said. At this point the department doesn't intend to charge more for when cities need extra officers during a year to such as parades and other celebrations.

Cities started to contract with the sheriff's department in the early 1980s, when new regulations required a city to certify officers. Today it costs \$35,000 and \$40,000 street, Crystal said.

In 1994, Malta contracted five hours of service a week for \$2,400, Oakley 10 hours for \$5,000 and Declo 5 hours for \$4,800, Crystal said.

The meeting of the cities, county and sheriff's department is set for 10 a.m. Monday in the commissioner's office at the county courthouse.

Other aspects of the expedition haven't been so favorable, Ater said.

"It's been raining every day, and the weather has been marginal," he said.

High winds also have plagued the swimmers. Ater said one gust — estimated at 70 mph — "actually blew us upstream, and that was against a big current."

On Wednesday, the group noticed the river was heavily streaked with sediments. Ater said the dirt came from the Salmon's South Fork and suspects it came from mud slides in

areas blackened by fires last summer.

The swimmers have had no difficulty with the Salmon's big rapids, Ater said, but they are a little apprehensive about Slide Rapid — the Salmon's final whitewater spasm, about five miles upstream of the confluence with the Snake River.

"That rapid gets hungoung at these levels," Ater said, noting that many professional river guides balk at running it when flows exceed 25,000 cfs.

"We should be getting there sometime around Wednesday, and we're hoping the river will drop a bit by then," Ater said.

War brought husbands, romance for 'war brides'

BURLEY — Among the legacies of World War II that can be felt locally are three women who probably would have settled down in their own countries had they not met American GIs.

Burley residents Valerie Gierisch, Ida Frodsham and Florence Skaggs met their soldier husbands, who were stationed in their respective countries of Australia, England and New Zealand.

The three friends will tell about their experiences of display at the Cassia County Fair Grounds during the Minidoka-Cassia County Remembering World War II Commemorative Celebration today and tomorrow.

Gierisch, 71, met her husband, Haven, in Sydney in February of 1942. He repaired radios for the U.S. Army for 38 months, traveling throughout the islands of New Guinea and the Dutch East Indies. She kept herself from getting lonely during his absences by participating in weekend trips with a club for Australian fiances of U.S. soldiers.

Gierisch was still a fiance when she left for America in 1944. As such she was required to pay \$300 for her passage on an Army transport ship and another \$1,000 bond to pay for her return journey just in case things didn't work out. The journey lasted 21 days and the 500 brides and fiances on board were housed 30 to a cabin.

The couple were married in Burley Feb. 16, 1947, about three weeks after she arrived.

Frodsham, who has been married to her husband, Lee, for 53 years, was the first of hundreds of thousands of brides of American soldiers to come to this country from England during World War II.

She was working as a secretary for the British

Ministry of Supply and he was a professional baseball player in the British National Baseball Association leagues when they met in 1939. The league didn't last — it was disbanded the same year — but the romance did.

He returned to the U.S. and she joined the Army.

In 1942 the couple found a way for her to join him in the United States. They secured her passage on a British-American convoy using contacts in the U.S. Commerce Department. Most of her 100 fellow passengers on the voyage were Jewish refugees from Europe.

The ship next to Frodsham's was struck by a torpedo. But she made it safely to Salt Lake City to meet Lee's family, who lived in Burley. There they informed her he had been sent to Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., to attend the Provost Marshall School there.

Lee graduated and the couple were married in 1942.

Skaggs, a New Zealand native, remembers that her family was wary of her getting involved with a Yankee.

"My dad was in World War I in the air force and he advised me not to get involved with the Americans because they were sort of a hit-and-run sort of people," she recalled. "After he got to know Chuck, he thought he was all right."

But there were advantages to being close to a GI, regardless of what others thought. One was receiving presents of closely rationed items, including orange juice, candy bars and, best of all, nylon stockings.

Redfish Lake because the fish are moving into spawning areas and are easier for anglers to catch, said George McKovich, a Stanley businessman.

It also is a time when sockeye salmon would not be in the same area where kokanee anglers are fishing, and there would be less of a chance of sockeye being caught. Kiefer said some sockeye could be caught, but not enough to hurt salmon recovery efforts.

McKovich, who owns the Creek Side Lodge in Stanley, does not want to see the spawning kokanee just die and go to waste.

"They're excellent eating," he said Wednesday. "It's a pretty feisty fish. They dance on top of the water and are a lot of fun to fight."

Adult kokanee range in size from 9 to 10 inches. There could be as many as 90,000 in the lake, Fish and

Game estimates, but not all of them are adult size.

Fish and Game also would like to prevent as many of the adult kokanee as possible from spawning and producing young that eventually would take the food out of the mouths of baby sockeye. Traps have been set up to catch kokanee on Fish Hook Creek, a tributary of the lake, but the effort failed.

If the spawning of adult kokanee is not curtailed in the creek, it could mean another 100,000 baby kokanee migrating back into the lake next spring.

If the National Marine Fisheries Service allows a catch-and-keep fishing season for kokanee at Redfish Lake, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission would have to make an emergency change in fishing regulations to allow anglers to keep kokanee.

Idaho Suspect's confession denied

MOSCOW (AP) — If accused double killer Wenkai Li confessed to two Moscow slayings to his girlfriend, she did not tell those attending his preliminary hearing.

Xiaohua Pan acknowledged Wednesday she spoke on the phone with Wenkai Li the day Ning Li and his wife, Xiaihou Ge, were slain and several times afterward.

At least two of the long-distance calls lasted more than two hours, but Li or Ge were never mentioned, Pan said.

"He only told me he missed me very much and he loved me very much," Pan said through a Chinese interpreter.

Li, 25, is charged with two counts of first-degree murder in the deaths of the University of Idaho student and his wife.

Latah County Deputy Prosecutor Robin Eckmann and Public Defender Michael Hengen will present closing arguments Monday.

Pan, also 25, was in Maryland on Memorial Day, when police believe the killings took place. Court records allege Wenkai Li stabbed the two in their Moscow apartment after Ning Li made insulting comments about Pan.

An affidavit says Pan told police in Montgomery County, Md., that Wenkai Li notified her he killed Ning Li because of disparaging remarks being spread about her.

Pan said she did speak with Maryland authorities and even made connections to the written report of her interview.

"I think the report did not show what I wanted it to express," she testified.

At one point Wednesday, the hearing was halted so Pan could go to a Moscow residence to retrieve papers and a pair of eyeglasses she said Wenkai Li "shipped to her in Maryland."

Pan told Eckmann there was nothing else in the package.

Magistrate William Hamlett explained the weight of the package could be determined and if the contents she presented did not equal that weight, then there was something else in the box.

"If there was something else in the box, you could be in great trouble," he told her.

School districts express interest in BSU Canyon County center

NAMPA (AP) — Boise State University wants to unload its Canyon County center to help fund a future multi-building branch campus, and area school districts are looking at the facility.

The last Legislature allocated \$2 million to Boise State to renovate the Canyon County Center. Center Director Dennis Griffith said because the center won't be used much longer, the school wants to sell it to help pay for a planned new campus.

Officials from the Nampa, Caldwell, Vallivue, and Middleton school districts were invited to a recent planning meeting.

"Basically, we're putting out feelers," Griffith said. "An ideal purpose would be a vocational-technical campus for one or a consortium of area districts."

School officials say they're interested in looking at the center for a vocational-technical or alternative high school serving several districts.

"None of Canyon County's school districts have the space or wherewithal to run those kinds of schools, but collectively, and in a central location, we could," said Caldwell Superintendent Darrel Deide.

University officials are searching for the land to build a branch campus. Some people have suggested making the new campus part of a proposed northeast Nampa development involving an amusement park, movie studio, museum and hotels.

Boise State President Charles Ruch said earlier the school hopes to buy between 150 and 250 acres. Griffith said the first buildings could be ready in two years.

Ada County residents have chance to build a park they want

BOISE (AP) — Ada County residents searching for another place to play have a unique opportunity to design and build their own park.

The county has agreed to give up 85 acres of land on the northeast corner of Idaho 55 and Floating Feather Road. Its contribution, for the most part, ends there.

User groups able to shell out cash will have to take care of the rest: feasibility studies, design plans, construction and maintenance.

"This is a great chance for Ada County residents to build something they can truly call their own," County Parks and Waterways director Donna Griffin said.

Groups such as youth football and adult softball have expressed interest in helping to build and occupy the now undeveloped site.

The project could include the area's first real dog park.

"Depending on the funding, this park can be as extravagant or as simple as people want it to be," Griffin said.

The city of Eagle recently spent \$5,000 on surveying. One problem is there is very little water there. Despite the hurdles and hoops, the consensus is that this field of dreams could become reality.

"People in this area are passionate about their parks," Griffin said.

Eagle is willing to invest up to \$80,000, hoping to gain much-needed park space in its area.

"I think it'll become a reality simply because the demands are dictating this as an important priority," Eagle mayor Steve Guerber said.

Bombing conspiracy theories rip across U.S.

Conspiracy theories about the Oklahoma City bombing have been flooding the Internet, fax machines, talk radio and militia meetings around the country...

The departure point for these theories is the belief that the federal government is lying about key details of the blast, and the media are being duped if not willingly participating in a coverup.

Based for the most part on conjecture rather than fact, the theories have found a ready audience in the subculture of suspicion that gained its first wide exposure in the aftermath of the April 19 Oklahoma explosion.

Federal prosecutors contend that the terrorist act on American soil was useful a product of extremist culture. Prosecutors have said that suspects Timothy James McVeigh and Terry Lynn Nichols were so incensed by government overregulation and law-enforcement encroachments that they allegedly bombed the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building, killing 168 people.

Conspiracists have other explanations. They say that up to six bombs were planted at the site, not just one in a parking lot outside, as investigators have said.

Some theorize that the two men charged in the case are actually government-controlled "zombies" used to carry out ghastly plots, like the assassination in the 1962 movie "The Manchurian Candidate."

McVeigh's stoic expression in photographs taken after his arrest has been cited as proof that he was under government control. He has been described as a patsy and compared to Lee Harvey Oswald in some conspiracy theories.

Some theorists are circulating documents purported to be affidavits of two Justice Department officials who say they were members of a "Committee of 10" that planned the explosion. Neither the names of the conspirators nor their lawyers appear anywhere on the documents.

The range of opinion and sheer magnitude of material espousing alternate views on the bombing has made this "a major moment for conspiracism in this country," said Chip

Berlet, an analyst at Political Research Associates, a Cambridge, Mass., think tank that studies right-wing movements. "It is possible that the Oklahoma City bombing will eclipse the JFK assassination in conspiracy lore."

Their prime architects are a stew of self-styled experts, operatives, constitutionalists, gun advocates, states'-rights supporters, right-wing isolationists and white supremacists. They range from a former Ku Klux Klan

grand wizard to a former FBI agent who headed the Los Angeles office. Another claims she once stumbled on a covert operation in which CIA officials, including convicted spy Aldrich H. Ames, and a major-U.S. corporation were selling computer equipment to the KGB.

Citizen militias have been among the main disseminators of the theories, and a recent Anti-Defamation League report found that these groups now operate in at least 40 U.S. states, and have added about 600 new members.

The militias also have attracted countless other sympathizers who, coupled with a more conservative political climate throughout the country, have bolstered the militias' clout, according to specialists who track extremist movements.

A common theme is that Clinton or rogue factions within the government ordered the bombing to divert attention from embarrassing issues such as the Whitewater probe and the Branch Davidian siege in Waco, Texas.

Congress and ultimately stamp out right-wing groups.

A newsletter entitled "The Omega Chronicle," which is distributed on the right-wing American Patriot Fax Network to thousands of subscribers, contended last month that suspect McVeigh "bears a striking resemblance to an unidentified federal agent whose picture appeared ... in a recent issue of Soldier of Fortune magazine. If he is in fact this 'federal agent,' then a completely different element has been added to this tragedy."

Some conspiracists point an accusing finger overseas. They are convinced that the Japanese government undertook the bombing to retaliate against the United States for ordering the CIA to uncoil poisonous gas in the Tokyo subway. And political extremists Lyndon H. LaRouche has raised questions about whether the British may have somehow played a role in the blast.

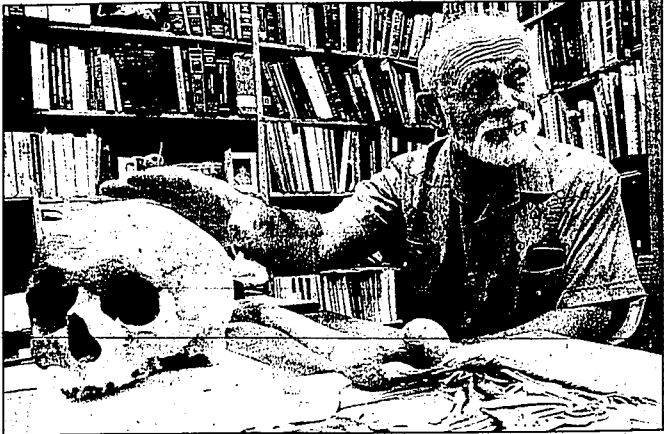
Some conspiracists who believe the U.S. government was behind the bombing say that they have received reports of a loud, humming sound that was heard in the weeks before the blast that may have summoned McVeigh and Nichols into action.

Conspiracy theories have a history in this country that dates back to the Salem witch trials of the early 1690s. In recent years, evidence of government coverups in controversies like Watergate and Iran-contra fueled suspicions that federal officials deliberately have withheld information from the public when it served their political interests.

A springboard for many of the Oklahoma City conspiracy theories is the contention that the federal government is engaged in a plot to destroy individual rights and liberties and hand over control of the country to the United Nations, which will oversee a "New World Order."

Some theorists believe that proof of a planned U.N. takeover can be found on the back of a 1993 Kix cereal box, which shows a map of the United States carved up into 11 regions. This, conspiracists say, is an illustration of the New World Order plot to reduce the country to departments after the conquest.

By staging violent acts, like the bombing, and creating villains, the government can justify suspending the Constitution, declaring martial law and seizing people's weapons, the theory goes.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Once again the mysteries of the grave surround James Starrs, this time to unearth the bones in the burial place of Jesse James to see if it is he who lies there.

Starrs feels a compulsion. Dig he must. And so he heads Saturday to Kearney, Mo., to lead a 15-member expedition in disintering what remains in an old grave in the Mount Olivet Cemetery.

Seeing what remains is a normal summer's exercise for Starrs, a lawyer and scientist who likes to demonstrate what archaeology, anthropology, pathology, geosurvey and spade work can tell about how history's notorious characters ended up dead.

It usually takes a court order to permit a disinterment and Starrs doesn't always get his way. He failed to win permission to dig up Lizzie Borden's parents, to see if they really gave them '40 and 41 ax whacks, respectively, as doggerel relates.

But six summers ago he hit pay dirt in Lake City, Colo., where he probed the common grave of five Colorado gold prospectors to see if they not only were done in but eaten up as well.

Starrs showed that they indeed, as legend insisted, had been the cannibalized victims of fellow prospector Alfred Packer, who in 1883 was convicted of having been their hatchetman.

"Guilty as sin," intoned the professor, "it is as plain as a pickstaff."

He said Packer must have been a ghoul of the first order. To eat the flesh of one man is to starve off starvation, he said. "But five is enjoyment."

Starrs is a professor of both law and forensic science at George Washington University here, a big-time bicyclist and a self-confessed eccentric.

He is a coauthor of "Scientific Evidence in Civil and Criminal Cases," a law textbook. He pades around in stockinged feet, commutes by bicycle and keeps boxes of bones in his office. "People send me bones," he explains, stroking a skull that arrived from Oregon.

Furniture stores pay in ad case

SPOKANE (AP) — An Oregon-based retailer has agreed to pay \$450,000 to settle a lawsuit over deceptive advertising and sales practices in Washington, the state attorney general announced today.

Smith's Home Furnishings of Wilsonville, Ore., was accused in a 1993 lawsuit of bait-and-switch sales tactics, deceptive credit terms and sales promotions in which prices were not significantly lower than regular prices.

The settlement filed today in Spokane County Superior Court is the largest ever in Washington state for a deceptive advertising campaign.

"This is a surprising case for consumers, in light of today's high-stakes-marketing-campaigns where stores are trying to lure shoppers in the door with a sense of urgency and the promise of big savings," Attorney General Christine Gregoire said.

An investigation of nearly 200 consumer complaints found that the company's newspaper advertisements violated several state laws, Gregoire said, including:

• Advertisements which claimed customers wouldn't have to pay down payments, payments or interest for one year failed to disclose they would be responsible for monthly accrued interest from the date of purchase.

• Advertisements of savings offers which made no reference to prices on which the savings were based.

Korean vets welcome memorial

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — They call it the forgotten war. But finally, after more than 40 years, the men and women who fought in Korea have reason to think they'll be remembered.

On July 27, on the 42nd anniversary of the armistice ending this brutal struggle, the veterans and their families will dedicate the Korean War Memorial on a quiet meadow in the shadow of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington.

Like the Korean War itself, the memorial is a bridge between the larger-than-life monuments of World War II and the stark, somber setting of the nearby Vietnam Memorial.

Nineteen stainless steel figures, rough-textured and dark, march in unmoving silence across the triangular field toward a towering American flag. They're framed by a low wall of polished black granite etched with more than 2,400 names of land, sea and air support troops that gaze ghostlike toward those who fought the war on foot.

Nearby rests a huge granite stone, inscribed with the words: "Our nation honors her sons and daughters who answered the call to defend a country they never knew and a people they never met. Korea, 1950-1953."

For the people who fought there, the memorial has become a symbol of their struggle, then and in the years that followed. "We've always called this the Hidden War, the Forgotten War," said Kenneth Taradach, of Delray Beach, Fla. "But after the memorial is up, we won't be forgotten for long."

Korea, though, was almost doomed to be ignored.

The war began in mid-1950, barely five years after the end of World War II, in a place few Americans could even find on a map.

The Japanese had controlled Korea through World War II, but when that war ended in 1945, the Soviet Union occupied the northern part of the country and the United States occupied the southern half. Korea quickly became the front line in the Cold War struggle between communism and democracy.

Tensions escalated steadily until eventually, on June 25, 1950, North Korean troops launched a full-scale invasion of the south.

The next day, the United Nations condemned the invasion and urged its members to do whatever necessary to restore peace. On June 27, President Harry S. Truman ordered U.S. air and naval forces to assist South Korea. And three days later, he sent in the first American ground troops.

In the states, though, there seemed to be no interest in this new war. Even the men and women being sent to Korea had little idea of where it was or why they were there.

"I didn't even realize I was going to war until we were waiting to ship out and I saw these boxes coming in with flags draped over them," Taradach said.

"I asked this guy what they were and he said, 'You're their replacement. They're the guys who were killed in Korea.' I was so naive. I had no idea."

But this new generation of GIs learned quickly. Al Rudy, a kid from Philadelphia who enlisted in the National Guard so he could avoid the draft and play football in college, was among the first troops sent to Korea.

again. He was captured in the Chinese rush across the Yalu River and spent the next 33 months in Chinese prisoner-of-war camps.

"On the night we were captured, the Chinese forced us to stand at attention for four hours in temperatures something like 50 below zero," he said. "I had no winter clothing — the quartermaster never caught up with my unit — and my feet were frozen."

The toes and heel of his left foot rotted from frostbite, and after a forced 100-mile march, Kappel pulled off his boot and cut away the damaged flesh.

He lost 90 pounds in 45 days. His liver, damaged in the shooting, hadn't fully healed. And he couldn't get used to the food.

"At first they gave us fodder, animal feed, and they'd soak this stuff — corn stalks and everything mixed up — and they'd boil it for hours," Kappel said. "Then they fed us millet, the yellow seeds in bird seed. They'd give us some seaweed and occasionally some soybeans, and if one of their hogs died, they'd give us that."

The prisoners were forced to work at gunpoint. Torture was routine.

"For punishment, they'd put you in this little box that folded up real small," Kappel said. "You'd sit down and hold your knees to your chest and they'd close it up around you and then they'd stand you on your head for a couple of hours."

"And in the winter, they'd put you in a deep hole and stake you there and then fill it with 3 feet of water and let it freeze over. Sometimes they'd put you in the hole and put boards over top and then bring in 55-gallon drums and pound on them for hours at a time."

Meanwhile, the communists and the United Nations fought for control of Korea, pushing forward and back in a series of brutal battles that claimed hundreds of thousands of lives. Heartbreak Ridge, Old Baldy, Pork Chop Hill, Mike Dallett of Fort Lauderdale, then an aerial artillery observer, flew 85 missions over Chinese lines in a low, slow airplane, directing the big American guns on the ground.

"We came under fire every day," Dallett said, "but I was too young to be scared."

Once, his pilot was hit in the calf with a 30-caliber slug. Dallett thought he would have to land the plane himself until the pilot recovered a bit.

The next day, Dallett was flying again. The war ended in 1953, and most Korean War vets wanted nothing more than to get on with their lives. No peace treaty was signed, and technically Korea remains at war. Nearly 2 million troops line the tense border, including 37,000 U.S. troops in the south.

"I never had any basic training or anything," said Rudy, now of Dania, Fla. "I got to Korea in the early part of September 1950, and they put me in the 2nd Infantry Division, and when MacArthur made the landing at Inchon, it opened a path for us and we fought our way up to Kunu-ri."

U.N. forces, led by Supreme Commander Gen. Douglas MacArthur, seemed unstoppable. In a matter of months, they pushed the North Koreans from the brink of certain triumph in the south all the way to the Yalu River, the border with Communist China.

MacArthur thought victory was certain. Everyone believed it, especially soldiers like Rudy, who hoped to be home by Christmas.

"Men on the evening of November 24, the Chinese came out in full force and overran us," Rudy said. "And then it was a whole new war."

In what had become the worst winter in Korea in 50 years, American troops and their allies felled back before hundreds of thousands of Chinese. Sleet and snow pelted them and temperatures plunged well below zero as the Americans struggled to hold rank.

But they had been outflanked. The Chinese took the high ground, and the Americans searched desperately for some way across the endless ridges of northern Korea.

Rudy and his unit made it back, with staggering losses.

"We were disorganized, frightened," he said. "I was lucky I made it. A third of our men didn't."

Tom Kappel, now retired in Hollywood, was one of them.

He had been wounded once already, shot in the belly on Sept. 2, 1950. But after spending 50 days recovering in Japan, he volunteered for the front

Kansas town aflutter over flag's arrival

EVANSVILLE, Ind. (AP) — What to do with a flag so big it might just bridge down if the wind caught it pulled right.

That's the quandary folks in Hutchinson, Kan., face as they debate the future of the "Great American Flag," a nearly 8-ton behemoth made by a company in Evansville 12 years ago.

The flag arrived in Hutchinson three weeks ago after the federal government

is finding little use for it — declared it surplus property.

Max Ayra, president of the Kansas Cosmosphere and Space Museum in Hutchinson, acquired the flag, thinking it might be a good idea to drap it along the inside of the museum's

rotunda. "Only problem was, the 406-foot-long, 210-foot-high banner didn't fit. Then it really hit us how big this thing was," he said.

Because of its unwieldy size, the flag has gotten little use — other than a couple of Flag Day appear-

ances on the Mall in Washington — since it was presented to President Reagan in 1983. Anchor Industries, which made the flag, manufactures canvas tents.

Suggestions on what to do with the flag have ranged from building a superstructure in which to display it up and selling it as table doilies.

Someone once suggested flying it from New York City's Verizon tower.

Narrows Bridge. But that idea was dashed by fears that it might topple the bridge when high winds caught it.

No one has ever figured out what the "wind load" of the flag would be if it were hung from a building or other structure, said Pete Mogavero, president of Anchor Industries.

"I think they're in for a very interesting engineering feat to find the means of supporting that thing vertically," he said.

Federal intrusion opens Western states gathering

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Westerners concerned about states' rights and federal rules on mining, grazing and timber cutting have only themselves to blame for the growth of big government, said New Mexico Lt. Gov. Walter Brantley.

He spoke Thursday morning during the opening session of the Western States Coalition, which is made up of state, county and local government officials as well as private citizens from 14 Western states.

"We believe it's time for states to

take their government back, we believe it's time people have a say in their government," Brantley said.

Government has moved from "being a service to being a dictator" because of policy decisions and bureaucratic regulations, he said.

The four-day conference, the fourth such meeting of the coalition, is focusing on topics such as the return of federal land to the states, county and states' rights movements, the federal Endangered Species Act and federal regulations on grazing, timber and minerals.

Help for whooping cough

BETHESDA, Md. (AP) — Three new whooping cough vaccines have been shown to be more effective and to have fewer side effects than current vaccines in large clinical trials conducted in Italy and Sweden.

Officials at the National Institutes of Health announced the findings today and told reporters that they will attempt to accelerate approval for use of the new vaccine in the United States.

Whooping cough is a very contagious respiratory disease that infects more than 50 million people worldwide and causes about 350,000 deaths annually. A vaccine against the disease, also called pertussis, is one of the routine childhood inoculations now used in the United States.

In the drug trials in Italy and Sweden, the three new vaccines were

found to protect more than 84 percent of vaccinated children and caused fewer side effects than the vaccine now used in the United States. The new vaccine uses only part of the pertussis bacteria to prompt the body to become immune. The vaccine now in use in the United States is a whole cell vaccine that uses the entire killed pertussis organism.

A whole cell vaccine also tested in Italy and Sweden had a protection rate of 66 percent to 48 percent.

Dr. Anthony S. Fauci, the director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases at NIH, said his agency is working closely with the Food and Drug Administration and with vaccine manufacturers to ensure that the new pertussis vaccines are available in the United States as soon as possible.

Tension rises over Packwood hearings

WASHINGTON (AP) — Partisan discord is intensifying over whether Sen. Bob Packwood should face a public hearing over misconduct charges, with the Senate Ethics Committee's GOP chairman and Democrats in return.

Asked about McConnell's remarks, Daschle said, "I don't think it's appropriate. They can look at me as much as they want. I don't think connecting the two does anybody any good, and it's unfortunate."

Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., said she hoped the committee could get back to the real issue, "whether the Senate can police itself on sexual harassment issues."

Boxer said she would try to attach her resolution to a pending bill. Asked whether a prime target was the regulatory reform bill now on the Senate floor — a top legislative priority of the Republican leadership — she responded, "You bet."

The panel has found "substantial credible evidence" that Packwood made unwanted sexual advances to 17 women in 18 instances from 1969 to 1990; altered his personal diaries when he learned the committee might subpoena them for the investigation; and tried to solicit a job for his wife from lobbyists and businessmen with legislative interests, while the couple was obtaining a divorce.

One of Chairman Mitch McConnell's threatened hearing targets, Senate Minority Leader Thomas Daschle, D-S.D., said Thursday, "It's an unnecessary politicization of the ethics process."

Senate sources described a tense, angry, closed meeting on Tuesday, when the committee began deliberations on hearings for Packwood, R-Ore., who chairs the Finance Committee. McConnell, R-Ky., today's committee meeting without a decision on hearings and without scheduling more deliberations.

McConnell, who had no immediate comment, said during Tuesday's meeting that he was upset that Sen. Richard Bryan of Nevada, the panel's top Democrat, had called publicly for open hearings on Packwood.

He then expressed displeasure that Sen. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., who is not on the committee, was attempting to introduce a resolution to force hearings if the committee did not approve them.

Sources said McConnell looked at Sen. Barbara Mikulski, D-Md., at the meeting and said, "I want you to tell her (Boxer) if she does that, we will amend the hearings on Daschle and Chappaquidick."

"It will work both ways," McConnell reportedly said. "I want you to tell her that right away." This was a reference to the 1969 drowning of a woman in a car driven by Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., and allegations that Daschle tried to eliminate a government charter inspection program at the request of

Lawmakers probe chemical arms disposal

WASHINGTON (AP) — Costs and safety risks associated with the Pentagon's incineration of chemical weapons prompted tough questions Thursday from House members.

"The cost is increasing dramatically, and the controversy is increasing dramatically," said Rep. Glen Browder, D-Ala., whose district includes the Anniston Army Depot, a planned incineration site.

Defense officials, including Assistant Army Secretary Gilbert F. Decker and Maj. Gen. Robert D. Orton, told a National Security subcommittee that the program was a top priority and the military was working to control costs.

"We think it's urgent to get on with the mission, so long as we don't mitigate security and public safety standards," Decker said.

The price tag on the Defense Department's plan to incinerate 29,000 metric tons of lethal chemical weapons has grown from \$1.7 billion in 1985 to at least \$11.9 billion.

Although \$2 billion has been spent, only two of nine planned incineration plants have been built, only one is operational, and only 2 percent of the chemical weapons stockpile has been eliminated.

"How did this program mushroom?" asked Rep. James T. Hansen, R-Utah, who represents Tooele, Utah, another incinerator site. He suggested the costs might force alternatives to incineration. "I don't know if the Army can afford this."

The military increased oversight of the program in December. Still, the lack of progress

and skyrocketing costs raised questions Thursday about whether the remaining incinerators should be built.

Rep. Stephen Buyer, R-Ind., asked why existing stockpiles couldn't be transported to the completed incineration sites to avoid building more at a cost of more than \$1 billion each.

But pressure from local and state officials who oppose moving the dangerous materials through their areas came into play in the hearing room.

Browder opposed moving more chemical weapons into his district, where the next incinerator is to be activated. Decker said the military was barred by law from transporting the materials across state lines.

Vietnam vets skeptical of move to normalization

WASHINGTON (AP) — Normalizing diplomatic relations with Vietnam was premature and is unlikely to help resolve the fates of missing POWs and MIAs, the president of the Vietnam Veterans of America said Thursday.

"Normalization was premature until we had the fullest possible accounting of the missing," James L. Brazee, Jr. told a news conference. "We didn't define and don't define the fullest possible accounting as increased cooperation,"

he said. "We want resolution."

In announcing his move to normalize relations Tuesday, President Clinton said that Hanoi has taken important steps toward helping resolve the cases of many of the more than 2,200 Americans still listed as missing from the Vietnam War.

Although Clinton said the search should benefit from the new diplomatic ties, members of the veterans group expressed skepticism. "We sat back for over 20 years and let govern-

ment-to-government negotiations try to work and it didn't work," Brazee told a news conference.

"So we are becoming and have been directly involved in the resolution of this issue for over a year and a half," he said, "and we intend to continue until we have reached that fullest possible accounting of our POW/MIAs."

Brazee called on U.S. veterans to step forward to help resolve questions about POWs and MIAs through his group's Veterans Initiative.

Sides reach deal on key AIDS bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — A measure that would require AIDS testing of all newborn babies was temporarily set aside Thursday as a House committee voted unanimously to extend a program that helps those living with AIDS.

Rep. Tom A. Coburn, R-Okla., an obstetrician-gynecologist who sponsored the amendment calling for the testing, withdrew it after Democratic critics promised to work with him to reach an agreement before a final House vote on the overall bill, the Ryan White CARE Act.

The American Medical Association and the National Governors' Association oppose mandatory testing of newborns.

But Coburn said the testing was important, as recent studies have shown that giving the drug AZT promptly to babies born to AIDS-infected mothers can reduce their chances of getting AIDS.

After the House Commerce Committee meeting, Coburn said he had "no doubt" that mandatory testing of newborns would be part of the bill passed by the House. His provision would have required such testing for all babies whose mothers had not been tested.

Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., said he thought there was a "very strong basis for an agreement."

A Senate committee also has reauthorized the AIDS legislation, but the bill has not reached the Senate floor.


Some supporters believe that it will be blocked there, especially since Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., caused a brouhaha earlier this week by suggesting that AIDS funding be cut since the disease was caused by "deliberate, disgusting conduct."

On Thursday, Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., and Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., urged Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole of Kansas in a letter to schedule a vote on the act before the August recess.

In the House Commerce Committee, some lawmakers expressed reservations about Coburn's provision because it would bar Ryan White grant money to states that did not institute mandatory testing programs. Daschle said existing AIDS-related funding for those living with AIDS could hurt more than the new testing would help.

"I would like to give an incentive to the states to undertake a policy of requiring this testing, counseling and drug treatment, and if that incentive were not sufficient, then to look at actions that would require it to be done," Waxman said.

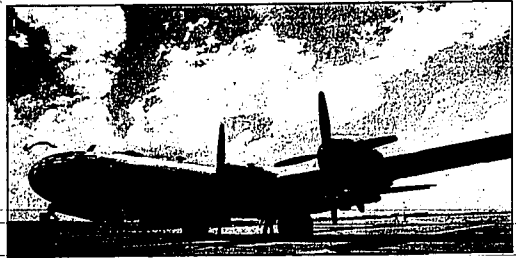

The last B-29 evokes deep emotions from the men who flew her

TWIN FALLS — The gentlemen who escort "Fifi" on her travels nowadays have gray hair, most of them, and they don't fit into their flight suits quite as well as they once did.

No matter. They're still smitten. "It's quite an airplane," said Blacky Blackburn, a veteran of 35 missions over Japan in Boeing B-29 Superfortress bombers. "It was the first pressurized airplane, and we could stay in the air 12, 13, 14 hours. We did it all the time."

For several weeks a year, Blackburn crouches on the cramped flight deck of the last flying B-29 in the world and tells her story. Tells how airplanes such as "Fifi" flew higher and faster than the Japanese fighters sent to destroy them. Tells how they came back, time and again, to win the war.

For if it can be said that there was a single aircraft that won World War II, it was the B-29. Fifty years ago, two Superfortresses virtually identical to "Fifi" dropped the atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki that changed history. "It's my understanding that the only difference between this airplane and the Enola Gay was some modification to the bomb bay," Blackburn said. "But you'd have to ask the Smithsonian."

The front 20 feet of the Enola Gay's fuselage sits in the National Air and Space Museum in Washington, D.C., this summer, the object of a scaled-down exhibition on the Hiroshima bombing. The display was almost shelved altogether over what the accompanying text would say.

"Fifi" faces no similar constraints. The Texas-based organization that restored her, the Confederate Air Force, takes her to dozens of air shows a year.

Salvaged from a California junkpile in 1971 and refurbished in 1991, she arrives with flags flying from her flight-deck windows.

"I enjoyed seeing that," said Bill Claiborn, 75, of Twin Falls. "I've been following this airplane for years," says Claiborn, a young Superfortress aircraft commander — not pilot,

Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport this week to see "Fifi" and the B-24 Liberator, "Diamond Lil," who accompanies her on her travels. Their reaction is instructive.

"I've been following this airplane for years," says Claiborn, a young Superfortress aircraft commander — not pilot,

please — a half century ago. "It's nice to see it here."

For the B-29 vets, "Fifi" is still a high-toned marvel of high-tech, more sophisticated than the more modern Metroliners that come and go down the tarmac, packed with modern avionics.

On display

The Confederate Air Force's B-24 and B-29 bombers will be on display as part of the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport open house on Saturday. Also on hand will be other, more modern fixed-wing aircraft, helicopters and homebuilt aircraft.

The open house is scheduled for 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The B-24 and B-29 will also be on display today and Sunday from 9:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Admission is \$5 to the tarmac; kids under 12 get in free. Tours of the B-29 flight deck are available for \$5 for adults, \$3 for children. Tours of the B-24 are given for \$3 for adults, \$1 for kids.

"I think it's because most of us trained in bombers that weren't pressurized," said Ken Wymire, 70, of Twin Falls, who flew 42 missions as the gunny officer for a squadron of B-29s during the Korean War. "And I flew 23 missions on a B-24 in Europe."

"It was like going from a Model-T to a Cadillac," said Bud Gardner, 69, of Jerome, a tail-gunner on a B-29 in the last weeks of World War II.

"It was a pleasure to fly," said Robert Lunney, 75, of Buhl, who like Claiborn was training to bomb Japan when the war ended.

Traveling at 330 mph at 36,000 feet, the four-engine, 67-ton Superfortress could outrun and outfly the souped-up "Tojo" and "Tony" fighters sent to shoot it down.

"The (Japanese) pilots learned to wait for the formations of B-29s and attack them from the front, trying to knock down the lead plane and co-lead plane of a formation," Blackburn explained.

Of course, the play itself doesn't leave much room for boredom.

Cory Bench, who is 22 and playing the part of Joseph, describes the music as "wonderful," beginning with "excitement" that morphs through the show.

"Joseph" was the second of three successful collaborations between composer Lloyd-Webber and lyricist Rice. The two Britons had essentially invented the rock opera when they produced on "Jesus Christ Superstar" in 1968.

Finally came "Evita," the story of Argentine politician Eva Peron, which became a long-running stage hit.

Lloyd-Webber went on to write hugely successful musicals ("Phantom of the Opera," "Sunset Boulevard") while Rice took his pen to movies and became an Oscar-winning lyricist ("Aladdin," "The Lion King").

"Joseph" is a musical account of the biblical son of Jacob, who was sold into slavery by his 12 brothers, and who rose to phenomenal

power by way of his dream interpretations.

The musical was a follow-up to the sometimes controversial "Superstar," an interpretation of Christ's last days on earth.

Steve Milton, who plays Jacob, said he does not think "Joseph" is offensive or sacrilegious.

"It really is a family show," he said.

With something for everyone.

"Joseph" provides a variety of music and dance, ranging from country-western to calypso to '50s and '60s to ballet to Charleston to just plain rock 'n' roll, Thomson said.

Being a rock opera, there is no dialogue, which gives the familiar story an unfamiliar twist.

"It's different because there are no speaking parts," said Trina Smith, the narrator. "It's easier, for me, to memorize music than to memorize lines."

And it just so happens that music is this cast's strong point.

"Boy, can they sing!" Thomson said.

There are a lot of them, too. Brendon Gorringer, co-director, said he is amazed that such a large cast can get into a theater so small.

"It gets grammared in here at times," he said.

Both Thompson and Gorringer said "Joseph" attracted a large audience.

"Close Every Door" and "Any Dream Will Do" are among the musical's better-known songs.

Thomson said the cast members leave "dramas" every night with a different song in their heads.

Both Smith and Bench said they love the brothers' songs, but are content with their own leading roles.

Smith said she particularly enjoys singing "The Prologue." Bench said he likes being Joseph because it is able to be funny and also to sing some of the more serious songs.

Waymire, who flew the first B-29 mission of the Korean War on June 28, 1950, recalls two piston-engined, Soviet-built Yak-9 fighters trying to catch up with the planes in his Russian.

"It wasn't much of a contest," he said. "Later in the war, Russian MIG jets from Siberia flew against the B-29, but our gunners got a few of them, too."

"Being heated and pressurized, it was like sitting in a chair in your living room," Gardner said. "But have you ever sat in a chair for 14 hours at a stretch?"

The flight deck and the rear of the B-29, which housed four members of the 10-man crew, are connected by a manhole-sized tube that runs over the bomb bay. Crew members learned to avoid the tube.

"If you were in there when the airplane lost pressure, you'd get sucked out of the tube fast," Waymire explained.

"If you wanted to send a orange or a Coca-Cola to somebody sitting the back, you put the plane in a climb and let it roll back there by itself," Lunney said.

And there was another problem for the crew on the flight deck. The toilet - a port-a-potty - was in the back. "There's something called a relief tube," Blackburn recalled. "It works fine for the first man to use it, but the next guy who comes along runs the risk that the liquid in it might be frozen."

All in all, it gets cold at 30,000 feet.

SUN VALLEY - They'll still take you there.

Sixty years after blues guitarist Roscoe "Pop" Staples moved to Chicago from the Mississippi Delta, his family gospel group is still together.

"We feel what we're doing," said Staples, now 79. "A song by The Staple Singers begins a long way before we perform it. It starts by talking about what we feel, what we know, is the truth. We don't look for a hit song; we look for a song that touches our hearts."

The Staples will perform Sunday at 6:30 p.m. at Trail Creek Cabin grounds, the third installment in the Sun Valley Music Festival series.

Daughters Mavis, Yvonne and Cleotha, all vocalists, have been with the group since they were kids, but fame came 20 years ago with "Respect Yourself" and "I'll Take You There."

The two songs were huge crossover hits, spending a total of 24 weeks on the Billboard pop

charts in 1971 and 1972. Actor Bruce Willis covered "Respect Yourself" in 1987 and turned it into a best-selling record. "I'll Take You" is now an oft-performed soul classic.

'Nell', 'IQ' among week's new video releases

New movies this week in Twin Falls video stores:
"Nell" (PG-13) — Jodie Foster often seems like our most feral actress. Her demonstrations of unbridled fury in "The Accused" and edgy courage in "The Silence of the Lambs" led to Oscar glory. And the intensity of each performance haunted us, making us shiver with admiration.
 And now Foster appears in a beautiful puzzle of a film, simply called "Nell."

It's her most technically feral role yet. Ironically, it's also her most serene. It won't give anyone shivers, and probably it will be greeted with fainter praise than "The Accused" and "Silence."
 It's a showcase role, and even when Nell's uninhibited nude scenes allow glimpses of a body-by-Foster that seems more Southern California than North Carolina, there's no denying the integrity of the actress' performance.

The movie is never as good as its star, but it's certainly good enough. The film is like the saintly doctor portrayed by Liam Neeson: it's solid, a little reserved and given to moments of surprising emotion.
 Ultimately, its assets outweigh its liabilities.

Besides, it's lovely to behold. The beauty of North Carolina is magnificent, without a hint of Southern Gothic, "Deliverance"-type danger.
 Even in its most intense moments, as when Nell is bullied by teen toughs in a scene that dangerously recalls "The Accused," the movie never seriously threatens us. "Nell" oozes human kindness, with Foster's forthright performance restraining it from the swampland of sappiness.

The film focuses on the "wild child" Nell and a doctor who's her teacher and possible savior (Neeson). Their loving, platonic relationship carries echoes of Pygmalion and

Galatan as well as Annie Sullivan and Helen Keller. And, as if all such relationships you wonder who is the teacher and who is the student.
 Jerry, as the good doctor is always called, is running away from his own emotions, embittered by a broken marriage and his disenchantment with the modern world. When he discovers "Nell alone and terrified, after the death of her secluded, suicidal mother, he finds someone worth saving."

He's a throwback to the kind of medic played by Lew Ayres in 1948's similarly bucolic "Johnny Belinda." He's friend and caretaker rather than technician and bill collector. It's a dream-eyed role, almost too good to be true, but Neeson gives credibility to each moment. (*Knight-Ridder Newspapers*) (Hastings, Blockbuster, Old Towne Video, Video West)

"I.Q." (G-13) — Whimsy can be dangerous. Let it into a movie, and it can send every idea and feeling except for the most fanciful running for cover.

Let it into a movie, starting a scene, stealie life. Walter Matthau or coy performed like Meg Ryan and Tim Robbins, and you are just begging for trouble.
 But as it turns out, director Fred Sehepisis more than up to the challenge. With "I.Q.," written by Andy Breckar (from his own story) and Michael Leeson, he takes the most whimsical of plot situations — Albert Einstein's matchmaking for his niece — and whips it up into a frothy but honestly witty and romantic entertainment. It's a perfect complement to the holiday season.

Of course, the real story here is a fairly old one, lifted in part from "Cino de Bergene." It seems that during his post-war Princeton days, Dr. Einstein (Matthau, wonderfully underplaying) has become worried

about the impending marriage of his niece Catherine Boyd (Ryan, never better or more appealing), a budding mathematician, to proper English psychology professor James Morlan (Stephen Fry).
 With a genius for an uncle, Catherine has never had any confidence in her own intellectual ability, and she has agreed to follow Morlan's advice to give up her own academic career and become a campus housewife.

The doctor wants someone for Catherine who loves her passionately enough to allow her to follow her career, and he finds him in Ed Walters (Robbins), an auto mechanic with a taste for sci-fi, who turns up on his front porch with a missing item of Catherine's.
 —As it turns out, Ed and Catherine had met when Morlan's sports car broke down near Ed's station, and Ed is convinced — and Catherine may dimly be aware — that they have actually fallen in love.

The actual pingpong that scoots back and forth underneath "I.Q." tries to answer whether Catherine and Ed's incipient love is the result of a random, accidental meeting or Einstein's manipulations.
 The doctor and a trio of cute scientist friends — played by Lou Jacobi, Gene Saks and Joseph Maher — keep invoking atomic theory and the collision and recombination of atoms to further the discussion. The "Cyrano" parallel is pushed when Einstein and his pals decide to pass off Ed as an uneducated genius with a cold-fusion theory that will make space travel easy. All backfires, of course, and before long even President Dwight D. Eisenhower (Keene Curtis) has taken an interest in the Jersey genius grease monkey. (*Orange County Register*) (Old Towne Video, Video West, Hastings, Blockbuster)

"Immortal Beloved" (PG-13) — After his death in 1827, at the age of 36, three letters were found among the

effects of composer Ludwig van Beethoven, addressed but never mailed to a woman identified only as "Immortal Beloved." For 167 years, the woman's identity has remained a mystery to historians and biographers, but it couldn't elude the deductive powers of writer-director Bernard Rose.
 Rose has turned his version of the mystery into such a convoluted mess, and made such a poor case for his theory, it isn't compelling as fictional drama, let alone biography.

It is too bad. Rose is obviously a talented director; the scenes within his scrambled context are vibrant with energy and demonstrate a genuine feel for the madness of Beethoven and the emotional impact of his music. He also got a smart, passionate performance from Gary Oldman, who portrays the deaf and ill-tempered genius over the last three decades of his life.
 But in choosing to tell the story in the style of a cheap whodunit, teasing us with clues and red herrings, and setting up the revelation as if it were the last act of a Sherlock Holmes tale, Rose defused the real power of his story. He kept Beethoven's secret lover such a secret, we gasp out of disbelief, not sweet surprise.
 Beethoven's letter — just one in the movie — is the lone piece of evidence leading his secretary, Anton Schindler (Jeroen Krabbe), to the hotel where the maestro's lover had apparently stayed, then to three different women in his life — the Countess Guicciardi (Valeria Golino), to whom Beethoven had proposed as a young man; the Countess Erdody (Isabella Rossellini), who rescued him from embarrassment at a court concert where his deafness was exposed, and his brother's widow Johanna (Johanna Ter Steege), whose child he had legally taken from her and nursed to become his hearing alter ego at the piano. 'Under Siege II': Throw 'Nine Months' seems to last that long

Movies playing in the Magic Valley this weekend. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and reviews are by the Los Angeles Times:

"Under Siege II: Dark Territory" — Steven Seagal, after directing "On Deadly Ground," lets Geoff Kempley call the shots in this sequel, a kind of "Under Siege" on a train. Eric Bogosian co-stars. R, for strong violence and language. (Mall Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Burley Theater)

"The Indian in the Cupboard" — This gentle and bewitching story about a magic cupboard that brings toy plastic figures to life both entertains and teaches its lessons with a welcome lack of pretension. Starring a delightful Hal Scardino, written-by "E.T.," Melissa Mathison and based on Muppet veteran Frank Oz. (PG, mild language and brief vivid images of violence and sexy dancing.) (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley)

"Andre" — Lassic with flippers, that's what Andre is. And his story, based on the true tale of the harbor seal that adopted a Rockport, Maine, family in 1962, combines the animal attractions of "Lassie" and "Flipper" in one frisky, slippery, ton-of-fun package. (PG, mild profanity, discreet violence.) (Jerome Cinema)

"Apollo 13" — What happened in 1970: three astronauts in a dying ship 200,000 miles from Earth need all kinds of help to get home. An engrossing true story on the whole impressively told by director Ron Howard but undercut by his storybook lack of frills in the material, which allows a sense of phinness to intrude on the proceedings. Tom Hanks is ace once again as the heroic commander Jim Lovell. (PG, for language and emotional intensity.) (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum, Ace Theatre of Wendell)

"Batman Forever" — Not a film for the ages, but acceptable for now even though over-14s may find themselves bored for a moment. In fact as superheroes Tommy Lee Jones and Jim Carrey go madly over the top. It's the film's quieter moments, with Val Kilmer as the Coped Crusader, Nicole Kidman as the woman in his life and Chris O'Donnell as the orphan, who becomes sidekick Robin, that help make this the most audience-friendly of the Batman trio. (PG-13, strong, stylized action.) (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Gooding Cinema, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

"Braveheart" — Mel Gibson directed and stars in this almost-three-hour epic about 13th century Scottish freedom fighter William Wallace. It's enjoyable for the first two hours or so as an medieval historical war epic, but it goes into battle overkill. (R, for medieval warfare.) (Twin Cinema)

"Casper" — Christina Ricci is charming in this rather charming kiddie featuring the goody-goody Casper and a lot of wisecracking special effects. Be prepared for the marketing blitz. (PG, for dialogue and thematic elements.) (Motor-Vu Drive-in)

"Congo" — Michael Crichton's suspenseful novel involving talking apes, diamond mines and Africa has been turned into a juicy adventure tale that generates as much tension as an America's Cup race on a calm day. There have been worse ideas around town but not many. (PG-13, jungle adventure terror and brief strong language.) (Twin Cinema)

"Die Hard with a Vengeance" — Bruce Willis once again stars as Officer John McClane in the third "Die Hard" installment. It's strictly crunch and kaboom, though a few of the set pieces are spectacular and Willis and Samuel L. Jackson get some rapport going. (R, for strong violence and pervasive strong language.) (Grand-Vu Drive-in)

"First Knight" — It took some time for director Jerry Zucker to follow up "Ghost," but here it is: Sean Connery plays King Arthur in this romantic Round Table fantasy-adventure, but it is through Richard Gere's eyes as Lancelot and his dangerous love for Lady Guinevere (Julia Ormond) that the tale unfolds. (PG-13, for some brutal medieval battles.) (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, The Movie House of Ketchum)

"Judge Dredd" — Sylvester Stallone is Dredd, a futuristic justice known for his brutal legal suits. (R, for strong, brutal medieval battles.) (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, The Movie House of Ketchum)

"Mighty Morphin Power Rangers: The Movie" — The popular TV series arrives on the big screen with plenty of visual razzle-dazzle, a ferociously funny villain, Ivan Ooze (Paul Freeman) and a refreshing lack of pretension. (Rated PG for action violence.) (Twin Cinema, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

"Pocahontas" — Disney's 33rd animated feature has much to recommend it, including a gorgeous look and a fearless, strong-minded Native American heroine. But in other respects, like its sense of humor and the quality of its songs, this story of the 17th century romance between John Smith and a chief's daughter tends to duplicate what its predecessors have done, only a little less adroitly and with a little less style. (G.) (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Gooding Cinema, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

"Species" — Pretty good "Boo!" movie about an intergalactic DNA mutant wreaking havoc in L.A., in the form of a beautiful blonde. Stars Ben Kingsley and Forest Whitaker. (R, for sci-fi violence, strong sexuality and some language.) (Twin Cinema, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

"The Indian in the Cupboard" — A world of wonder and adventure is created for a boy named Omri when he discovers that with the turn of a key, he can magically bring to life the three-inch-high toy Indian he placed in a toy cupboard. (PG)

"Nine Months," an innocuous heart-tugger about expectant yuppies, would be even blander if it weren't for the recent vehicular activities of its star, Hugh Grant. It's really too bad Grant's Sunset slip wasn't written into the script. And it might as well have been, considering the way this coy comedy plays the protagonist's penit-urges for laughs.

Movie review

"I am completely sexually frustrated," howls Samuel (Grant), a reluctant father-to-be whose pregnant girlfriend, Rebecca (Julianne Moore), won't sleep with him for fear the fetus might see what's going on and get scared. While Samuel throws up his hands and rolls his eyes, the audience makes up its own punch line.

Chris Columbus wrote, directed and produced this rapid sex comedy — his first project since the delightful "Mrs. Doubtfire." Like the film, "Nine Months" teaches the joys of fatherhood — a lesson the boyish Samuel resists until he sees his baby's sonogram and discovers that it is a boy. Suddenly, he realizes that there's nothing in a family and the values to go with it. (You can't help but wonder how he would have reacted had the baby been a girl.)

But his revelation may come too late, for the intolerant, prissy Rebecca has become fed up with his hand-holding and his medical appointments and has moved out. Now Samuel must convince her that he's a changed man and win her back before her water breaks. Should he fail, the film will end without the farcical race to the delivery room pioneered by the Ricardos.

When Rebecca goes into premature labor and is hospitalized, Samuel rushes to her bedside to beg her forgiveness. "You had every right to walk out on me." It could almost be dialogue from "The Tonight Show."

In addition to their gestational travails, the expectant parents are harassed by an onerous auto dealer (Tom Arnold) and his pregnant wife (Joan Cusack), the overbearing and indulgent parents of three ill-behaved scamps. And then there's Rebecca's obstetrician (Robin Williams), a recent Russian emigre whose apologetic propensities ("Let's go take a look at your Volvo") provide the movie's funniest moments. Williams steals the show as the nervous delivery man, and Jeff Goldblum is also appealing as the

hero's earnest best friend. Alongside these casual American actors, Grant's comic overreactions — the mugging, the stuttering, the fluttering eyelids — are too broadly vaudevillian. He's got more time than Benny Hill.

Moore and Cusack are the film's liberal apologists; paying lip service to capable single mothers and the right to choose. Otherwise, this adaptation of the French "Neuf Mois" bottle-feeds us the same

Grant hits talk-show circuit

Sweet home Alabama with a touch of L.A.

Terrell: He's got 1 name, and he's an angry Southern gentleman



Country singer Terrell hails from Albertville, Ala., but moved to Los Angeles to start his singing career. His travels play a major role on his new album, 'Angry Southern Gentleman.'

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Terrell, a rocker who transplanted himself from Alabama to Los Angeles to try and make it as a musician, has never gotten the South out of his system. The album "Angry Southern Gentleman" is the result of Terrell's career move. It is an uneasy package of good ole boy bluster and intellectual guile.

The album paints a bluesy landscape where "a good, good man" might rob a liquor store to finance a fresh start, and fancy himself Satan incarnate.

"Hey mama," Terrell screams in a self-parodying drawl in the song "Redneck Gigolo," "How 'bout cyou!"

The Albertville, Ala., native is quick to deny any attention to make a grand statement about the South.

But peek inside the "Angry Southern Gentleman" packaging and you'll discover the lyrics carefully written out, numbered line by line like Bible verses.

"That's just my pretentiousness," Terrell says. "I'm just a frustrated novelist and that's just my own personal thing and it really doesn't mean anything."

From the title song: "Angry Southern gentleman left his Southern dirt.

Brushed it from his auburn hair and, his Sunday shirt. Left behind his Bible and the wrought iron gate. Left behind the sugar bowl and his Southern hate."

Allen Terrell honed down his name to one word as he struggled for over a decade to gain the attention of music executives in Nashville and Los Angeles.

By 1990, he seemed at the brink of stardom.

He was one of the first signees to Irving Azoff's Giant Records and shared a manager, with Sting, Miles Copeland.

The Giant record "On the Wings of Dirty Angels" got a little critical attention but bombed. But that was only one of Terrell's problems.

He also lost \$80,000 worth of equipment to thieves in Dallas. Then his main booster at Giant was dying from AIDS, and his best friend and musical partner was hooked on heroin and his band subsequently split.

His personal life was just as much a sham-

bles — his fiancée broke up with him and kicked him out of her home.

Giant and Copeland were gone as quickly as they had signed on, and Terrell now records for Pointblank Records.

"Just as fate will deal you a lot of good, hands, and all of the sudden you're on the cover of Rolling Stone and you don't know why," Terrell said.

You know it can take you down really just as fast.

Although Terrell hasn't been a cover story in Rolling Stone, he says, "I'm only assuming 'cause I've been in the antithesis of that."

But Terrell kept on writing, depending on "the kindness of women" to get him by and living with various friends, sleeping on the sofas in their living rooms.

He wrote about the confusion he had concerning his own nature. Such well-detailed character studies as "Dreamed I Was the Devil," "New Hope" and "Redneck Gigolo" resulted, as did more overly personal fare like "Angry Southern Gentleman" and "Come Down to Me."

Terrell strays from the Southern theme in the word-dizzy "Toystore," which imagines famous people as children and pairs them with likely toys. In the song, Adolf Hitler bypasses toy soldiers for perfect Barbie and Ken dolls.

Rodin favors Play-Doh, and Dali has an ant farm.

"I saw Houdini playing Twister with Ayn Rand and Frank Lloyd Wright," the song continues.

Cybergolf: Even better than the real thing

NEW YORK (AP) — The only place most golfers are ever going to hit 300-yard drives straight down the middle is in their dreams — unless they "grip it and rip it" in cyberspace.

Anyone with a quick mouse finger can become the next John Daly in a computer golf simulation game. And better still, you never have to stand around waiting for hackers ahead to hurry up.

Golf was among the first games to be digitized, but its true look, feel and sounds couldn't be had without a tee time until "Links" came along.

Not far behind was "Links386 Pro," which drastically enhanced graphics quality, revealing detail down to distinct blades of grass.

Its latest upgrade, "Links386 CD" (Access Software, \$49.95) improves on the already impressive package with video fly-overs of every hole and enhanced digital sound effects, including the comic caddy voice of Bobcat Goldthwaite.

The only thing missing is the smell of fresh grass.

The game is played on actual famous courses, which are laboriously photographed and surveyed to ensure accuracy in every regard.

Tee it up at Torrey Pines and you'll see picturesque La Jolla, Calif., down the coast. Take a whack at Harbour Town and finish in the shadow of the Hilton Head.

Games people play

S.C., course's landmark candy-striped lighthouse.

"Links386 CD" comes with Harbour Town and Canada's Banff Springs. Add-on courses, such as England's The Belfry, are sold separately, most listing for \$29.95. The sacred Pebble Beach Golf Links justifiably goes for \$10 more.

Access also has released its first superdifficult fantasy course, Devil's Island, designed to humble smug cyberpros who thought they'd mastered the game. Beware the shipwrecked Spanish galleon guarding the green at No. 5, matey.

You select the gender and shirt color of the on-screen animated golfer who represents you. Select your clubs, the tees you'll play from, prevailing wind conditions and the slickness of the greens.

A computer caddy helps you make proper club selections, although like most caddies, it can't be relied on 100 percent of the time. Once on the tee, you aim your shot with a mouse pointer, then swing away.

To hit, there is a swing-meter arc that approximates the real-thing by requiring players to first press and hold the mouse button to begin the backswing, to release it at the proper height to start the down-

swing, then quickly press again as it descends to strike the ball flush at the bottom.

Snap it too early and the ball hooks viciously, too late and you've got a slice. Time it just right at the bottom and the ball sails away.

Virtually any shot in real golf is possible. And the potential for superhuman shots is there, if you want to risk it. Drives stretching beyond the magical 300-yard mark become commonplace once you get the hang of it.

The game sounds put you right on the links. There are bird calls and rude croaking frogs that pipe up just when you start your swing. The whistling sound of the club shaft and the thwack of impact confirm solid shots.

Watch out for water hazards: The sight of your ball splashing down and the dreaded plop-gurgle sound it makes are sickening.

A commentary option makes it sound like you're in a pro tournament. Sink a birdie putt and the crowd goes wild. Hit it into the woods and hear yourself ask innocently, "Did I hit a tree?"

Complete statistics are recorded from every round. Especially brilliant shots can be saved for replay. The game is popular these days among national tournaments pitting players' best scores against each other in recorded games registered via modem.

And the downer tunes are balanced with spry numbers such as "Perfect Fit" and "Raincheck," the lovely epics "Ancient Highway" and "In the Afternoon."

Van Morrison, "Days Like This" (Polydor) — Van Morrison George Ivan Morrison is having a damn fine day.

With "Days Like This" Van the Manic Depressive balances his joyous, spiritual side and his bouts of doubt and melancholy to come up with his most satisfying album since his nostalgic trio, "Avalon Sunset," "Enlightenment" and "Hymns to the Silence."

With been, Morrison banged out the jagged, overlong "Too Long in Exile" and last year's double-live set, "A Night in San Francisco," as well as produced his own tribute album, "No

Prima Donna." All three suffered from Morrison's eclectic mix, meandering from brilliance to competence to chaff.

Not so "Days Like This," a solid, steady stream of a dozen songs unified by a bluesy ensemble band without all the heavy-weight blues guests Morrison has featured on other recent albums.

Some of the titles read like a head-shrinker's checklist for an afternoon suicide group: "Russian Roulette," "Melancholia," "Underlying Depres-

sion." Nowhere in these songs, though, does Morrison lapse into his trademark raving and raging; this time around, he's only mildly melancholy.

HAMBURG, Germany — Monica Seles wants a stiffer sentence for the obsessed fan who stabbed her in the back two years ago.

The lawyer for the tennis star has appealed the suspended sentence given to Guenter Parche, court officials said Thursday.

In his trial in October 1993 and retrial last April, Parche was convicted of causing grievous bodily harm and given a suspended two-year sentence both times.

If the appeal is upheld, there could be another trial. No decision is expected for months.

Gerhard Strate, Seles' lawyer, said Parche should have been tried and convicted on attempted manslaughter charges, which carry a harsher sentence.

The prosecution also appealed after the retrial, arguing Parche should serve at least some time in prison. That appeal has been dropped.

Seahawks press for dome help

SEATTLE — The Seattle Seahawks have threatened to terminate their lease after this season if the Kingdome doesn't get a \$150 million share of any stadium-improvement-money approved by voters.

Breaking the lease could be the first step in moving the National Football League team out of Seattle, although a memo from the Seahawks to King County Executive Gary Locke did not specifically mention moving.

King County voters likely will be asked later this year to raise their sales-tax rate to pay for a new baseball stadium.

The Seahawks have asked before that improvements to the Kingdome be part of any stadium package.

And they have maintained they have the right to break their lease because the Kingdome is no longer a "first-class facility."

But the new memo delivered to Locke over the weekend raises the stakes for the county.

For the first time, it sets a deadline and a dollar amount to keep the lease in effect.

Locke went to Seahawks headquarters Wednesday to discuss the memo, accompanied by County Council budget chairman Peter von Reichbauer.

Locke also asked the County Council on Wednesday to place a 0.1 percent sales-tax increase on the Sept. 19 ballot.

He has said revenue from the tax would pay for the county's share of a new, open-air baseball stadium, its \$65 million debt from repairing the Kingdome roof and for other Kingdome renovations, as previously requested by the Seahawks.

Locke has been trying to win the Seahawks' support for the tax measure.

In its memo, the football team said it would "waive our objections to the present sales-tax proposal" if King County agrees to provide \$150 million for Kingdome renovations, over and above the money already spent on Kingdome repairs and any money to be spent for seismic improvements.

The renovations would be made as directed by the Seahawks, the memo said.

If voters agree to raise the sales tax, but the county hasn't agreed to the Kingdome improvements by Feb. 1, the memo said, "It is expressly understood that the Seahawks may terminate their existing agreement..."

The county has insisted the lease, with 11 years left, remains valid. The Seahawks' memo did not say what the team's position would be if voters turned down the sales-tax increase.

The Seahawks began talking about Kingdome improvements last fall, when a company they were investigating the cost of a new baseball stadium.

The Seahawks presented a proposal for improvements estimated to cost as much as \$120 million.

A Seahawks move became more plausible recently when the Los Angeles Raiders signed a letter of intent to return to Oakland, leaving the nation's No. 2 television market without a professional football franchise. Earlier this year, the Los Angeles Rams moved to St. Louis.

Deaths raise concerns at Stampede

CALGARY, Alberta (AP) — The deaths of three horses at the Calgary Stampede have raised concerns about animals competing in rodeo and other contests testing their physical limits.

"You can't have events where you're pushing animals in arduous conditions, against the clock, for large sums of money and not expect cruelty to take place," says Michael O'Sullivan, executive director of the Humane Society of Canada.

His "just keep 'em out" plea was greeted with a leg in the backbarrel competition at the Stampede on Wednesday, another was put down after a crash in a chuckwagon race and a third was killed after banging its head on a metal gate following a race.

"These were freak accidents," said Brian Ratcliffe, a spokesman for the 10-day fair.

Two horses were put to death earlier this year after an accident in a chuckwagon race at the Ponoka Stampede in rural Alberta.

Not all of Oakland wants Raiders' return

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — While the NFL has delayed a vote on the Raiders' return to Oakland and the San Francisco 49ers say they won't try to block the move, a small citizens group could pose the first organized opposition.

A group calling itself Taxpayers for a Vote on Raiders Deal said Thursday it is concerned about the 16-year agreement between Oakland officials and the Raiders and may call for a public referendum on the deal.

Efforts toward such a referendum helped derail

the possibility of a return by the Raiders from Los Angeles to Oakland in 1990.

The deal, which promises \$85 million in improvements at the Oakland Coliseum and a \$31.9 million loan to the Raiders for relocation and operating expenses, was approved unanimously Tuesday by the Alameda County Board of Supervisors and the Oakland City Council.

The deal also offers the Raiders up to an additional \$10 million for the construction of a new team training facility in the Oakland area.

The NFL had been scheduled to vote on the move Friday in Chicago, but delayed the meeting until July 21 to give its financial committee more time to examine the agreement.

The location of the July 21 meeting has not been determined.

League officials have said the move must be approved by a three-fourths vote, meaning the Raiders will need approval from 23 of the 30 clubs, but team owner Al Davis said last week "a vote isn't necessary."

Ex-Ram cornerback wants out of jail

SANTA ANA, Calif. — Darryl Henley's attorney asked a judge Thursday to release the former Rams cornerback on bail so he may resume his football career.

U.S. District Judge Gary Taylor did not immediately rule on the request.

Henley, 28, has been in jail since his conviction on cocaine trafficking charges last March. He is seeking a new trial, claiming that racism and juror misconduct affected the outcome of the first.

Juliette Robinson-Slaton, his lawyer, told Taylor that, if Henley is freed on bail, he could resume his career. However, she said that, to her knowledge, Henley has not been contacted by any NFL teams about playing for them.

Top Bengal draft pick still unsigned

CINCINNATI — The Cincinnati Bengals have changed their playbook to fit Ki-Jana Carter. They're counting on the productive running back to lead the team's long-awaited turnaround.

First, they have to sign him. Carter, the top pick in this year's draft, is unsigned with only three days left before the Bengals open training camp. The Bengals created a stir April by trading up to get Carter — the second time in two years that they got the top pick overall.

Last year, it took the Bengals only 11 days to sign defensive lineman Dan Wilkinson. General manager Mike Brown made a major concession and agreed to two voidable years in Wilkinson's six-year, \$14.4 million contract.

Dolphins, Sanders ink 2-year pact

MIAMI — Wide receiver Ricky Sanders, the nine-year pro who played for Atlanta last season, signed a two-year deal with the Miami Dolphins Thursday.

Terms of the contract were not disclosed. "I think we have an opportunity to make it to the Super Bowl and win the Super Bowl," Sanders said. "That's why I'm here."

Sanders joins Randal Hill and former Washington teammate Gary Clark as free agent wide outs signed by the Dolphins since last season. Irving Fryar and O.J. McDuffie remain Miami's top receivers.

Colts to Emtman: New deal or be cut

ANDERSON, Ind. — The Indianapolis Colts gave defensive lineman Steve Emtman an ultimatum — renegotiate or be released.

The Colts, trying to maneuver under the salary cap, said Thursday they can't afford his contract for this season. Bill Tobin, the team's director of football operations, called the decision the "toughest I've made since joining the Colts."

Emtman, the No. 1 pick in the 1992 NFL draft, has been beset by injuries since joining the team from the University of Washington. Tobin said the Colts will give Emtman an unconditional release Friday if no deal is struck. "Currently he is totally healthy, he is ready to play football," Tobin said. "But we still have a pattern here of injury and we're asking him to assume some risk that they (Emtman and agent Mary Demoff) haven't been willing to risk."

Emtman costs \$3 million toward the salary cap this year, under the four-year deal he signed in 1992. The rules of the salary cap say the 31 highest paid players on each team must stay under \$37.6 million for 1995.

Elway, team deny reports of career end

DENVER (AP) — John Elway says he may need an artificial knee someday. The Denver Broncos quarterback also said reports of the end of his career are greatly exaggerated.

Elway dismissed those stories, including one on ESPN on Tuesday, that doctors had advised him he shouldn't play this season and that his wife wanted him to retire. "This is the first I've heard of this," Elway said Wednesday. "I heard it driving here."

"That's the same thing (ESPN) said my second year in the league. It's nothing new."

Elway, who will start his 13th season in the NFL, has led the Broncos to three Super Bowl appearances.

He said he suspects the latest story about his left knee originated at a clinic in Vail run by Dr. Richard Steadman, who performed arthroscopic surgery on Elway's knee this winter.

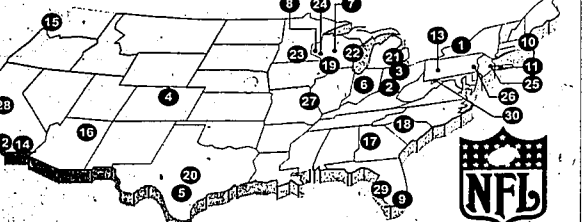
After a subsequent knee operation on Brian Bilal, quarterback Jim Kelly, Steadman reportedly told Kelly that, "Your worst knee is better than John Elway's best knee."

In any case, Elway, 35, acknowledged that some day he might need an artificial knee. He originally injured the knee in high school, when he underwent the first of the five operations he has had on it. Three of the operations have been during his NFL career.

He also denied reports that his family wants him to retire. "As a matter of fact, I asked my daughter (Jessica) the other day how much longer she wanted me to play and she said she never wanted me to quit," he said.

The Devil you say! NHL champs not moving after all

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — The New Jersey Devils will be staying right where they are for at least one year.

However, the Stanley Cup champions need to secure a \$25 million loan by mid-September or the tentative agreement to keep them in New Jersey for the next 12 years could fall apart after one year, sources told The Associated Press.

After months of heated negotiations and threats of a move to Nashville, Tenn., the Devils and their landlord announced on Thursday the team will play in Meadowlands Arena next season and have the framework of a deal to keep them there through 2007.

The Devils are staying "NHL commissioner Gary Bettman, a major player late in the talks, said during a news conference.

Nashville Mayor Phil Bredesen said he was disappointed the Devils decided to stay in New Jersey, but that the city's offer stands for any NHL or NBA team. He said his office has been getting calls from interested franchises.

"We want an NHL or NBA team in Nashville and I think when our arena opens next year, we'll have a team," the mayor said.

For the Devils to stay the next 12 years, they must obtain their loan before Sept. 15, the deadline the team and the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority set for formalizing their agreement.

In addition, a clause in the agreement would prevent the sports authority from bringing baseball or other new pro sports to northern New Jersey before 2002, sources close to the talks said. And the Devils want to establish management bonus programs for NSEA executives, the source said.

Devils owner John McMullen has lost about \$28 million since buying the franchise and moving it from Colorado to New Jersey in 1982. He wants to use the loan to pay off debt arising from the original move, but

Lenders are hesitant to extend credit because of the team's financial status, the source said. Under the tentative agreement, the sports authority has guaranteed to commit a minimum of \$12 million to renovate the arena,

adding 14 new luxury suites and 2,000 club seats and raising other revenues for the team through added outside advertising around the arena. Money also will be raised by allowing a corporate sponsor to rename the arena

where the Devils and New Jersey Nets play. The team would also benefit from slight increases in its percentage of concessions, parking and suites revenue. The team would also have \$1.6 million in debt for-

given, the source said. The changes have the potential of increasing the Devils' annual revenue by \$15 million by the 1996-97 season, \$3 million of which the sports authority has guaranteed, the source said.

McMullen is hoping to use the \$3 million annual guarantee as collateral for his \$25 million loan, according to the source. McMullen asked the authority to help him secure the loan, even suggesting it co-sign it, the source said. However, that is forbidden by law.

"He (McMullen) from day one has taken the hit, personally and financially," said Devils general manager Lou Lamoriello, who refused to comment on the loan contingency.

"He went through every loan year and no one helped him, not one dime. He sustained all of this. In past years no one wanted us. Now people want us. There's not any greed involved, but we're just trying to get back a little. He's never going to get whole," Lamoriello said.

Lamoriello played down the condition that would keep other pro teams out of the area. The one team particularly affected would be the New York Yankees, who repeatedly have been rumored to be considering a move to New Jersey.

The source said the clause would only bar other sports teams to 2002, which coincidentally is the year the Yankees' lease with the City of New York expires.

Lamoriello said the Devils would not object if the Nets left the arena and the sports authority brought in a new NBA team, or the Jets left and another NFL team replaced them. But he said a baseball team would increase the battle for advertising dollars and the Devils can't afford that.

"So basically if they decided to do that, then basically they are making a choice between us and them and that's fine," Lamoriello said. "We'd be free to leave."

Paralympic Games challenge attitudes

ATLANTA (AP) — The Paralympic Games, an Olympic-style event for physically disabled athletes that is struggling to find an audience, unveiled a brash advertising campaign Thursday that asks: "What's Your Excuse?"

The campaign seeks to build awareness for the Games and to dispel the notion that people with disabilities should be pitied.

One print ad, featuring an amputee long jumper, says: "Al Mead Has One Leg — He Uses it to Kick Butt."

Fast-paced television ads showing the athletes in action who say, "There are no hopeless bodies, only hopeless hearts. What's your excuse?"

"These ads were not created to make you cry. They were created to make you dance," said Atlanta advertising executive Joey Reiman, who developed the campaign.

The 1996 Paralympics will be held at Atlanta next summer, 12 days after the Olympic Games. Some of the events will be held at Olympic venues.

The organizers of the Paralympics have confronted fundraising difficulties and widespread ignorance about their Games. Concern has been expressed that

the sheer volume and television exposure of the Olympics may leave little appetite for the Paralympics.

Marc Hamburger, a Coca-Cola Co. marketing executive on loan to the Atlanta Paralympic Organizing

Committee, said the Paralympic Games can be a huge success if they are sold right.

"The market is definitely there," Hamburger said. "The key to success is reaching people with a relevant, intrusive, meaningful message."

The Paralympics is a great product — people need to know more about it.

The ads will run initially in the Southeast as public service spots. Organizers are hoping that by early 1995 the ads will have created enough interest — and financing — to go national with paid spots.

APOC president Andy Fleming acknowledged the challenge of spreading the word with tight resources. The committee is about halfway toward its goal of raising \$100 million.

"We'll need to be more creative in spending our scarce resources on this campaign," Fleming said.

The ad campaign is an example. Reiman created the ads at no charge.

Tie earns Mexico chance to move ahead in Cup

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay (AP) — Mexico moved into good position to qualify for the second round of the America Cup by playing Uruguay to a 1-1 tie Thursday.

Luis Garcia of Mexico opened the scoring in the 67th minute and Marcelo Saralegui tied it in the 79th.

Eight teams from the 12-nation South American championships advance to the second round. Mexico (1-1) completed first-round play and is poised to join Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay and Uruguay in the quarterfinals.

There were two other games Thursday night — Peru vs. Ecuador and Brazil vs. Colombia, both in Riviera. It would take an unusual combination of events from those games and Friday's for Mexico to be shut out from the next round.

The United States (1-1) has beaten Chile and lost to Bolivia and is still alive. It can advance by beating Argentina on Friday night, and could move on with a tie or possibly even a loss.

The United States and Mexico were invited to the South American tournament. In the last America Cup in 1993, the United States failed to make the second round.

Uruguay (2-0-1) completed the round in first place with seven points in Group A.

The tournament is divided into three groups of four teams. The first two teams from each group advance, along with the two best third-place teams.

Thursday's Uruguay-Mexico game was to have been played Wednesday, but heavy rain, thunder and lightning brought a postponement.

This time there was a light rain and the Uruguayans had the ball most of the time. However, their shots at the goal either went wide or were caught by Mexican goalie Jorge Campos.

The Mexicans surprised Uruguay in the 67th when a weak shot by Garcia slipped past goalie Fernando Alvez. Ten minutes later Saralegui tied it with a long shot.

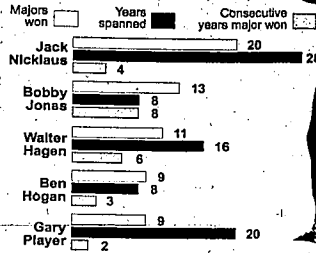

Low scores mark Senior event opening

DEARBORN, Mich. (AP) — Jerry McGee, Bob Charles and Bob Zimmerman shot 4-under-par 68s in the Senior Players Championship on Thursday, a day that saw almost half of the 78-man field shoot par or better in the opening round.

Dave Stockton, who has won this event two of the last three years, predicted low scoring at the year's final senior major and he was one of seven players one stroke off the lead.

The 6,876-yard TPC of Michigan... a Jack-Nicklaus-designed course, is regarded as one of the toughest courses the seniors play all year.

Joining Stockton, who had a triple-bogey, at 69 were Kermit Zarley, J.C. Snead, Tom Wargo, Raymond Floyd, Dave Eichelberg and Jay Sigel, who stood six under after 13 holes before three consecutive bogeys.

Rocky Thompson, Lee Trevino, Deane Beman, Jimmy Powell, Tom Weiskopf, Walt Zembriski and 1993 Senior Players champion Jim Colbert were two strokes off the pace in the \$1.5 million tournament.

Like Sigel, McGee had been alone in the lead at six under after his third straight birdie on the par-3 15th.

However, he three-putted 16 from 40 feet and bogeyed 18 after his tee shot found a water hazard, dropping him into a tie for the lead.

"With the way my game has been, I'd have gladly taken a 68 before I teed off," McGee said. "You're not usually looking to go buy people drinks when you finish a round 5-5-5, but I'd take more 68s on this course."

John Paul Cain gave me a tip on

the range and that had a lot to do with the way I hit my irons. I moved my hands up, but it didn't help my driver. I was all over the golf course off the tee. I may have to go to church to find help for that club."

Charles wasn't pleased with the way he put the ball in play, but he was excited about his work on the greens. He nailed six birdie putts during the day, four on the backside.

"My ball-striking wasn't particularly good, but I made every putt I looked at," Charles said. "I've been struggling with my putting over the last month and I don't like that. I've enjoyed a lot of success with the putter over the years and my standards are pretty high. I made a slight modification to my stroke and it helped."

Zimmerman used a different route to his 68, chipping in three times. He birdied 12 and 15 in that fashion, while saving par on No. 4.

"It was one of those days," smiled Zimmerman, who's won only \$36,812 in 11 starts this year. "I'd say this is the first time this year that I've had any chip-ins at all. It's nice to get them all in one round at a time like this."

Stockton, who scored a six-stroke Senior Players victory over Jim Albus last year, is relieved to be only one shot back after the way his opening round went.

He stood five under following a birdie on 10, but met with disaster on the par-4 11th.

He deposited his tee shot in the creek which meanders through the 410-yard hole, tried unsuccessfully to hack the ball out of the hazard instead of taking a one-stroke penalty and a drop and ended up with the triple-bogey.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (AP) — Robin Freeman, who worked as a club pro for five years because he wasn't ready for the PGA Tour, shot a 6-under-par 65 Thursday to take a share of the first-round lead in the Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic.

Dudley Hart and Richard Zokol also turned in 65s on the River Course of Kingsmill Golf Club, one shot better than Kirk Triplett, Jim Carter and former UCLA teammates Scott McCarron and Duffy Waldorf. Scott Hoch was one of three golfers at 67 and there was a group of 14 who had 68s on the 6,797-yard layout.

Freeman, the only two-time medalist at the PGA Tour Qualifying School, said two contending performances this year have his confidence soaring.

"I'm taking myself a lot less seriously, and it's resulting in lower scores," Freeman said.

At the Byron Nelson Classic in May, he was tied for the lead with nine holes to play before faltering. A month later, he was in the lead with two holes remaining in the Kemper Open before being overtaken by Lee Janzen.

"Every time you get there in position to win, it's a big confidence builder," he said. "The guys who win all the time aren't comfortable any place but the top. A lot of guys are uncomfortable there. I'm trying to get myself in position where I feel very comfortable playing for the win."

Zokol, who lost his tour card and has only played in five PGA Tour events this year, finished sixth last week in a tournament in his native Canada.

"I had the lead in this tournament the year Fuzzy won," he said, referring to Fuzzy Zoeller's victory in 1986. "I like the golf course, but I'm not sure you can run the table for four days because of the greens."

Hart had no trouble with the greens, which were soft in the morning but became bumpy as they baked in the 90-plus temperatures. Hart needed just 23 putts, and rolled in birdies from 20 feet twice on 5 and 6.

"I've had spurts where I've putted really well," he said. "But I haven't been as disciplined as I should."

Riley leads Scottish Open; noted amateur still in hunt

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland (AP) — Wayne Riley shot a 3-under-par 69 to take a share of the lead of the \$1.04 million Scottish Open, while 19-year-old amateur Tiger Woods kept in contention with four successive birdies.

Riley's 9-under 135 total ties him with overnight leader Colin Montgomerie, who shot a 71. The pair is one stroke ahead of Katsuyoshi Tomori, who had the day's best round of 66.

Masters champion Ben Crenshaw and Seve Ballesteros were the top players not to make the cut.

Crenshaw followed his first-round 77 with a 74, and Ballesteros had his worst European PGA result in 20 years. He opened with an 81 and then shot a second-round 80 for a halfway total of 161. It was the fourth successive cut he has missed. Ballesteros' total was his highest on the European tour since he shot 79-84 in the 1975 PGA championship at Sandwich, England.

"I just don't feel good," the 38-year-old Spaniard said. "After my first round there was not much motivation. I'm trying to find something for the better, but it looks like I am going backwards."

"My back is not great, but nothing is right. I don't have any explanation — I wish I had. But my swing feels awful."

Riley missed a chance to take the lead outright when he hit into a creek at the 512-yard 18th hole and made par after taking a penalty drop.

Woods birdied the 11th through 14th holes to finish with 71 for a 4-under total of 140, in a six-way tie for seventh.

The U.S. amateur champion had seven single putts in a row from the 11th to the 17th.

"It was a bit scratchy today," Woods said. "But I did quite well and got it to go where I wanted it. It was one of those days when you've just got to hang in there and get some putts. I got four birdies in a row and I made some great par putts."

"I like playing the links, you get to be very creative. It's a whole new game for me."

Northern Ireland's David Feherty won a double-sized bottle of champagne for a hole-in-one at the 179-yard sixth on his way to a 68 to put him at 139, even with former world No. 1 Nick Faldo and Paul Lawrie, who both shot 69.

Montgomerie lost his overnight two-stroke lead to Ian Woosnam when he had a double-bogey 6 at the 408-yard No. 6 and then was lucky to escape with only a bogey 6 on the next hole. "I hit my second shot into a prickly bush and had only about a minute left to find it when a spectator went in," he said. "I was bleeding, but he got to it and I was able to take a penalty drop there rather than go back."

China wants better ties with U.S.

— BEIJING (AP) — China wants the United States to repair relations damaged after the White House allowed a visit by the president of rival Taiwan, a government spokesman said Thursday — without giving any hints as to how.

China has repeatedly called on the United States to take "concrete actions" to repair the damage done by the Clinton administration's May 22 decision. But Chinese leaders won't publicly identify what they want Washington to do.

The New York Times, citing an unnamed Foreign Ministry official, reported that China wants President Clinton to reaffirm that Beijing is China's "sole government," that Taiwan is a part of China and that President Lee Teng-hui would not be welcome in the future.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Shen Guofang refused to confirm the report, nor would he say whether such a statement from Clinton would satisfy Beijing.

When asked if China had raised

concrete demands with the administration, Shen would only say that the United States initially refused to permit Lee's visit to attend a college reunion "because that does not conform with U.S. interests and would also adversely affect Sino-U.S. relations."

"Now that they have already said that they should be very clear about what they should do," Shen added.

The White House issued Lee a visa after the Republican-controlled Congress threatened to pass a binding resolution authorizing the trip. The decision to admit Lee worsened relations already won by disputes over human rights, arms sales and trade.

Ties further deteriorated in the last three weeks when U.S. human rights activist Harry Wu was detained entering China and charged with spying.

Administration officials have called for Wu's release and members of Congress have called for punishing China.

China's Foreign Ministry has tried to control the fallout by calling Wu's case a criminal matter with no connection to Sino-U.S. ties.

"The Chinese executive branch cannot interfere in investigations conducted by China's judiciary; and foreign administrative agencies shouldn't interfere as well," Shen said today.

Besides the Taiwan dispute, Chinese leaders are prepared for a long struggle with the United States over the Wu issue and have circulated a document to military and provincial officials warning them of that possibility, the Hong Kong newspaper Eastern Express reported.

China and the United States have signed three agreements, the first in 1972, in which Washington recognized Beijing as China's official government and downgraded relations with Taiwan.

The Los Angeles Times reported today that China has warned a Boeing Co. executive the United States' friendly overtures toward

Taiwan could threaten U.S. commercial ties with the Chinese. Much is at stake for Boeing: the paper said China's aerospace market is expected to buy \$100 billion worth of airplanes by 2015.

Chinese officials have denied politics played any role in its recent State Department dealings with the United States, including Wednesday's announcement of a \$1 billion auto manufacturing contract awarded to Mercedes-Benz of Germany over Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp. Ron Woodard, president of Boeing Commercial Airplane Co., was warned by Chinese officials during a trip to China that U.S. commercial interests are threatened by the Taiwanese president's visit, the Los Angeles paper reported, citing unidentified sources in Washington and in Beijing.

For at least a month, Clinton and State Department officials have tried to mollify Beijing by reiterating that the administration backs a "one China" policy.

Bull kills Illinois man in Pamplona

PAMPLONA, Spain (AP) — A 22-year-old American died after being gored in Pamplona's famed bull run Thursday.

It was the first death in 15 years. Matthew Peter Tasso died at Navarra Hospital shortly after one of six fighting bulls gored him during the frenetic 825-yard sprint down cobble streets from the corral to the bullring.

Witnesses said Tasso stumbled or was knocked down early in the run and as he tried to get up, the 1,100-pound bull hooked him in the side and drove his horn through his liver and into the main artery leading from his heart.

Injuries are frequent in the bull runs, held each morning during the eight-day San Fermin festival in honor of Pamplona's patron saint. There is tremendous jostling among the nearly 1,000 people who crowd the narrow streets and runners often trip or are knocked over.

But Tasso's death is the first since 1980, when two Spaniards were gored. There have been 12 fatal gores since 1924.

Pamplona has been hosting the San Fermin festival since 1591, but the bull runs became world famous as a result of Ernest Hemingway's 1926

novel "The Sun Also Rises." Thousands of foreign visitors swell the streets of Pamplona during the festival, which also includes bullfights and all-night parties. The festival ends Friday.

At least 27 people have been injured in this year's bull runs, including five Americans.

Tasso was from the Chicago suburb of Glen Ellyn. He had been traveling with a friend for about a month following his graduation from the University of Illinois with a degree in electrical engineering, his father, Thomas, said Thursday. He was to have begun a job this fall with Motorola Inc.

"When the opportunity arose (to run with the bulls), they worked it into their plans," Thomas Tasso said. The elder Tasso said he spoke briefly with his son's friend, James Quinn, earlier today. Quinn declined to speak to reporters.

"They got separated during the event," Thomas Tasso said. "The friend wasn't a witness to it."

Pamplona Mayor Javier Chourruat said fans at Thursday's bullfight would be asked to observe a minute of silence in remembrance of Tasso. The bull which gored Tasso was scheduled to fight later in the day.

Rabbi ruling draws furor from government officials

JERUSALEM (AP) — The rabbis who issued a religious ruling urging soldiers to disobey orders to withdraw from the West Bank were widely condemned Thursday, and President Ezer Weizman accused them of promoting civil war.

"What do they want, two peoples? One getting instructions from rabbis and the other living democratically?" Foreign Minister Shimon Peres asked angrily.

A banner headline in the Yediot Ahronot daily newspaper read: "Danger of Civil War," followed by a half-page photograph showing soldiers dragging Jewish settlers off a West Bank highway they had blocked to protest the planned army pullback.

Despite the outpouring of criticism, former Chief Rabbi Avraham Shapira stood by the ruling, which instructs soldiers to disobey orders to withdraw from army bases in the West Bank as part of an emerging "Israel-PLO accord."

"Heaven forbid," Shapira said when asked by Israel radio if he

would consider withdrawing the directive.

Shapira and his influential Rabbinical Association were condemned Thursday by politicians from left and right, as well as fellow rabbis, who accused them of driving a wedge between secular and religious Israelis.

The 1,500-member Rabbinical Association is close to the Jewish settlement movement and the National Religious Party, that represents religious Israelis. It also represents most of the ultra-Orthodox Jews who serve in the army; most members of that fervently devout sect do not.

In their ruling, the rabbis said withdrawing from army camps in the West Bank violates a directive in the Torah — the first five books of the Old Testament — for Jews to "populate the land of Israel."

Weizman urged the rabbis to reverse their ruling, saying: "I fear that the religious ruling will bring about a rift in the nation and lead to civil war."

Sony OKs singer's request

LONDON (AP) — Rock singer George Michael won his freedom from Sony Thursday, settling a long legal battle.

Sony Music Entertainment announced the agreement but would not disclose details, including whether any payments were made.

Michael lost a lawsuit last summer to break his \$12 million multi-album contract with Sony. Michael argued during the 74-day court hearing that Sony refused to back his change in direction, including whether any payments were made. Michael said he wouldn't record any more albums for Sony.

contract was a violation of free trade in the European Union. They had said it could keep Michael working for Sony another 15 years or until he supplies six more albums.

Later Thursday, Thom EMI PLC announced Michael had signed with its Virgin music unit. Terms of the contract, which covers worldwide rights outside North America, were not disclosed.

Richard Leahy, Michael's music publisher, said the singer would record for David Geffen's new Dreamworks label in the United States and Canada. Leahy said there will be a new George Michael album out within a year.

Death toll from Korea mall collapse could reach 650

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — The death toll from the collapse of a shopping mall two weeks ago could top 650, officials said Thursday, conceding that twice as many people are missing and believed buried as had been reported.

The announcement immediately raised charges that the delay in announcing the higher figure was an official attempt to hide the extent of

human losses in one of South Korea's worst peacetime disasters.

The June 29 collapse of the Sampoong Department Store was but the latest in a series of major accidents in the past year, and President Kim Young-sam's government has been under intense fire for not pushing hard to improve safety standards and root out corruption.

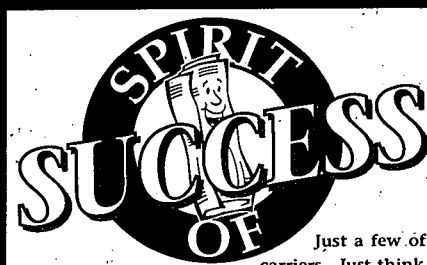
The confirmed death toll from the store collapse rose today to 260.

The number of those missing stood at 197 Wednesday. But this morning, city officials hiked the number to 410, adding names from a separate list kept by the office of Secho ward, where the store is located.

City officials said the longer list had not been used before because of police

concerns that it could contain fraudulent reports by those seeking to file claims against the city and the store.

Charges that the list was incomplete were first raised Sunday, when a 21-year-old man was pulled out alive after nearly 10 days. Choi Myung-suk had not been among the list of the missing kept by the city, but was on the Secho ward list.

Serbs deport thousands of Muslims

TUZLA, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Forced from their homes by Serb troops, exhausted by deportation aboard laboring, steaming buses, Muslims purged from the onetime "safe area" of Srebrenica faced a new horror Thursday: meager food, little water and no shelter in a jammed refugee camp.

While the new Serb masters of Srebrenica rounded up men and boys for interrogation, 8,000 Muslims, many bearing tales of beatings and forced separations from their fathers and husbands, poured into Tuzla, where relief workers could offer them only 1,000 loaves of bread and 5,000 quarts of water.

The human waste is likely to overwhelm U.N. aid workers for days to come. The Serbs who overrun Srebrenica Tuesday said the area was cleared of its approximately 40,000 Muslim residents by Thursday night.

The deportations are one of the largest recent incidents of the "ethnic cleansing" that has been one of the darkest elements of the three-year-old war.

The U.N.'s peacekeeping mission has been able to do little to blunt the war's savagery, and the fall of Srebrenica was the latest in a series of embarrassing events that have undermined the mission's weakness.

In Washington, President Clinton warned that unless the integrity of the mission in Bosnia can be restored, "obviously its days will be numbered." He offered no specifics.

U.N. spokesman Alexander Ivancko said at least two people — a woman and a child — died aboard the more than 100 U.N.-bused and trucks laboring over the 50 miles of mountainous roads between Srebrenica and Tuzla.

The fate of thousands of Srebrenica residents remained unknown. Serb fighters were pulling men and boys off the transports to take them to unknown locations. The Serbs said



ins were to be spared from attack. But the Serbs took it with near impunity in a six-day drive, defying airstrikes by NATO planes and resistance by a small contingent of Dutch peacekeepers.

The Serbs took 48 Dutch soldiers hostage, holding them as insurance that the United Nations will not interfere with their plans.

As the Serbs swept into Srebrenica, up to 40,000 people took refuge in the village of Potocari, near the main Dutch peacekeepers' compound in the area. On Wednesday, the rebels and their commander, Gen. Ratko Mladic, took Potocari and began deporting the terrified Muslim civilians.

Mladic told Bosnia's Serb TV late Thursday that "the evacuation of all those who wanted to leave Srebrenica is over." Ivancko, the U.N. spokesman, said only about 400 refugees remained in Potocari Thursday night.

The fate of thousands of men was in question. Some males of fighting age were reported by arriving refugees and U.N. officials to have fled into woods and hills west of Srebrenica. Thousands more were taken away by the Serbs to unknown destinations, said U.N. spokesman Ivancko.

Meanwhile, the Serbs apparently prepared for an attack on the next vulnerable "safe area" in eastern Bosnia, Zepa. The 79 Ukrainian peacekeepers in Zepa were fired on by Serbs, and one was wounded by shrapnel, said U.N. spokesman Lt. Col. Gary Coward.

French soldiers, part of the Rapid Reaction Force deployed last month to back U.N. peacekeepers in the former Yugoslavia, exercise near Tomislavgrad, Bosnia Thursday. France said it is ready to join in a 'firm and limited military action' to protect safe havens in war-torn Bosnia.

They would be questioned about involvement in war crimes, but there were fears they would be forced into labor on the frontlines or tortured.

Tuzla already had absorbed thousands of people who had fled the first Serb assault on Srebrenica in 1993. On Thursday, those earlier refugees swarmed the airfield to see if loved ones were among the new wave, but they were separated from the new arrivals by barbed wire.

The United Nations could not erect enough tents for all the arrivals. Some 10,000 blankets were handed out, but they were barely managing to distribute food and water," said Alekma Lisinski, a spokeswoman for the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees.

"This is a humanitarian disaster."

The fall of Srebrenica also was a disaster for the U.N.'s military mission. Srebrenica was one of six U.N.-designated "safe areas" in which civil-

Italy premier sets new goals

ROME (AP) — Premier Lamberto Dini won a vote of confidence in the legislature Thursday on key pension reforms and set equal access to the media as his government's next goal.

Dini, a former central bank official who heads a Cabinet of independents, said he would offer his government's resignation when Parliament approved the broadcasting law.

Dini has a mandate to shore up Italy's shaky public finances and has made the overhaul of the country's costly retirement system a major goal.

In a procedural move to cut short debate on the pension plan, he asked the Chamber of Deputies for a vote of confidence in his government. As expected he won easily, with 284 votes in favor, 147 against and 148 abstentions. He needed 216 votes to win.

Kremlin: Yeltsin working from hospital; will resume schedule

MOSCOW (AP) — An "optimistic" Boris Yeltsin was working from his hospital room, still unable to walk and planning to resume his normal schedule next week, the Kremlin said Thursday.

The message of business-as-usual, despite the president's heart trouble, was underscored by the announcement that Yeltsin will probably name Viktor Chernomyrdin, who was going ahead with a trip to Siberia on Thursday night.

Yeltsin spoke to Chernomyrdin by telephone Thursday evening and was briefed on the trip, peace talks in breakthroughs in Chechnya and other topics, news agencies reported.

The 64-year-old president was rushed to the Central Clinical Hospital on Tuesday after suffering chest pains. Symptoms described by the Kremlin indicate he probably has a form of heart disease called unstable angina, in which narrowing of arteries diminishes the blood supply to the heart.

Aides say Yeltsin is expected to remain in the hospital until Monday. Parliament speaker Iosif Kobzon said Yeltsin plans to meet on Tuesday with leaders of the lower house of

parliament, the Interfax news agency reported.

Presidential spokesman Sergei Medvedev said Yeltsin was signing documents and maintaining "regular links with his aides and top state officials." He said Yeltsin was in good condition and had a good appetite.

"Boris Yeltsin feels optimistic and asked his aides not to change his work schedule for next week," he said.

"According to Yeltsin's doctors, their patient slept well during the night and got up as usual at 7 a.m." Doctors have made no public comment themselves on the president's condition. That and a long history of hushing up the illnesses of Kremlin leaders have left some Russians skeptical of the government's account.

"In this country of instability, there is a general disbelief of official information," Alexander Minkin wrote in the daily Moskovsky

Komsomolets.

"People are nervous and have many questions. If he has recuperated so quickly, then why hasn't even a single TV journalist been able to see the president after his heart trouble — at least for the sake of the nation's peace of mind?"

Chernomyrdin, who would replace Yeltsin if the president were unable to serve, was to leave for Yakutsk, in eastern Siberia, for a working visit lasting until Saturday, reports said.

Yeltsin's illness and plunging popularity have cast doubts on whether he will seek re-election when his five-year term expires in June.

"If the ... heart disease doesn't have consequences for Yeltsin as president, that doesn't mean it won't in the case of Yeltsin as a contestant in the 1996 presidential race," the weekly Obshchaya Gazeta said.

"One doesn't have to be a doctor to remember how vigorous Boris Nikolayevich looked four years ago and, comparing this unforgettable image with today's reality, to imagine what kind of leader we might see on television sometime in the year 2000."

Psychiatric ward releases man who shot Gorbachev

MOSCOW (AP) — A man who tried to assassinate Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev in Red Square in 1990 has been released after nearly five years in a psychiatric ward, but says he doesn't regret his attack.

If he had it to do over again, "I would do just what I did," Alexander Shimonov was quoted Thursday as telling the Komsomolskaya Pravda newspaper.

Shimonov said he tried to shoot Gorbachev because he held him responsible for killing civilians in uprisings in the Soviet republics of Georgia and Azerbaijan in 1989 and 1990.

The 43-year-old St. Petersburg man also had sent a letter to the Politburo in 1990 demanding a nationwide referendum on free elections and moving toward a market economy. The government didn't respond, Shimonov said. On Nov. 7, 1990, he fired a saved-off shotgun about 80 yards from Gorbachev during a heavily guarded Revolution Day parade on Red Square. He was immediately seized and arrested.

After spending a month in Lefortovo, the city's main prison, he was transferred to a psychiatric hospital, where he remained until June 7.

Man charged with wartime murders

LONDON (AP) — The 84-year-old man accused in Britain's first Nazi war crimes case denies killing four Jews in German-occupied Belarus, his attorney said Thursday.

"Nazi hunters at the Simon Wiesenthal Center said they were certain of his guilt. Szymon Serafimowicz, a retired builder and carpenter, was not asked to enter a plea at a brief court appearance Thursday. Outside the court, attorney Nicholas Bowers said Serafimowicz was innocent and would mount "a full and vigorous defense."

"He is now determined to have these matters brought to clear his name and then to live out the remainder of his years in peace," Bowers said.

The frail, white-haired Serafimowicz was freed on bail and instructed to appear again at a brief court appearance Thursday.

Efraim Zeroff of the Wiesenthal Center in Jerusalem said Serafimowicz was police commander in the Mir district of Belarus in 1941 and 1942 and "was actively involved in the persecution and murder of thousands of Jews."

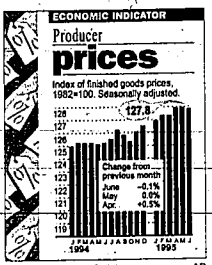

Mutual fund managers find winning formula in choosing right technology stocks

How did they do it?
How did some fund managers achieve big gains when so many of their colleagues were just squeaking by? Did they have a special formula for picking winning stocks? And, if so, what was it?

Curious, I took my questions to three fund managers who have been top performers in three different mutual-fund arenas: small companies, mid-cap companies and capital appreciation. All three managers outran their competitors and turned in unusually large gains during the first half of this year.

The common thread I found, was that the managers did three things right. They bet on the right investment sector — in this case technology, which has been booming. They made big bets on technology companies in general. And they picked tech stocks that, for one reason or another, were on their way up.

Two of the three managers also had one other advantage. They ran very small funds, which meant that a few good stock picks could have a major impact on their funds' performance. Indeed, finding managers of small funds with strong stock-picking abilities could be a rewarding task for fund investors.

Today, after a long shakeout, there are only four or five companies in each sector. "It will be a lot easier to find the winners through this decade," Elijah said. Better yet, Elijah said, the business of technology companies is being spurred by education, home entertainment and corporate needs, with heavy demand from customers overseas.

"These stocks are up for fundamental reasons," said Elijah. "It's not hot air." Elijah said he recently attended several high-tech investment conferences where he was told that business is "very robust."

times the number of shares). Lipper Analytical Services Inc., which tracks mutual fund performance, defines a mid-cap company as one with a market cap of between \$800 million and \$2.5 billion.
Barker said that her fund, too, "was heavily weighted in technology," at one point more than 60 percent. In addition, Barker said, she and her colleagues were able to do some rewarding stock-picking.

One of those investments was in Madge NV, a Netherlands computer firm whose shares leaped from \$9.88 in December to \$32.75 in May. Madge stock got the market's attention last March when it made a deal with Cisco Systems Inc. to promote each other's network communications products.

Another big winner for Wasatch, Barker said, was Express Scripts Inc., a Missouri company that provides pharmacy services to health maintenance organizations. Barker said her fund took advantage of a sudden drop in the share price to about \$25 last April to buy a big block of stock — and then watched as it went back up to \$37.25.

Wasatch Mid-Cap, being a top performing fund has been a financial boner. The assets of the small fund rocketed from \$2.8 million on March 31 to \$35 million on June 30. But the attention was also a bit scary. "Being number one is a hard act to follow," Barker said. "We hope we can keep it."

Swel also linked his fund's strong performance to high-tech investments. "Clearly," he said, "the chief reason there has been a big and correct bet on technology — part semiconductor companies and part semiconductor capital equipment companies." Overall, he said, the fund had 65 percent of its money in technology. Among the big bets that paid off, he said, was an investment in Laramie Corp., whose rose 38 percent in the first half of the year.

Swel's \$7 million fund also held shares in Intel Corp., which rose 98 percent. And better yet, the fund held Intel warrants for a time, during which the warrants rose 101 percent. He said he wished he'd bought them sooner.

Swel said whether he was concerned that technology stocks will fizzle. He said no. Although these stocks could pull back temporarily, he said, the trend is up. "I look at the landscape and see so many growth drivers for the industry," Swel said. Among them: personal computers are growing ever more powerful; demand is growing steadily for cellular telephones, telecommunications equipment and even personal pagers. "These stocks will be higher six months and 12 months from now," Swel predicted.

A lot of fund managers and investors, it seems, are betting the same way. And that's usually a warning sign. But if there is a red flag out there, it's not getting a lot of attention right now.

Tweed, with whom he has been involved since the early '80s. The couple live in Beverly Hills with their two children.

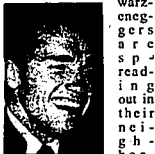

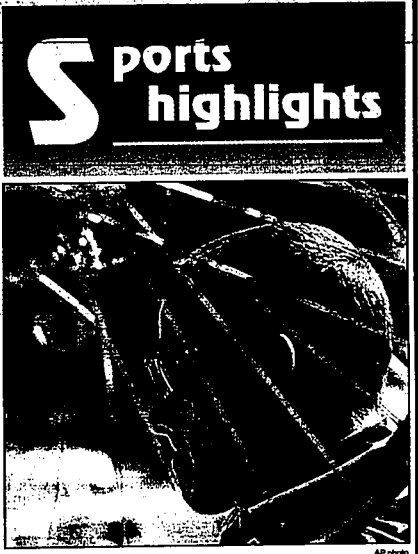

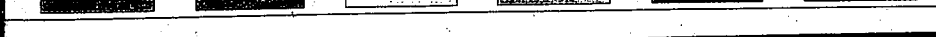
