# Bosnia air strike accord nears

WASHINGTON — The United States, France and Britain neared agreement Thursday on a plan for threatening Bosnia-Serbs with robust NATO air strikes to protect the Sarajevo and Gorazde "safe areas," the White House said.  
President Clinton and French President Jacques Chirac discussed the proposal in a telephone conversation late Thursday afternoon and voiced hope that a consensus can be announced at a meeting of allied representatives in London today, White House spokesman Mike McCurry told reporters.

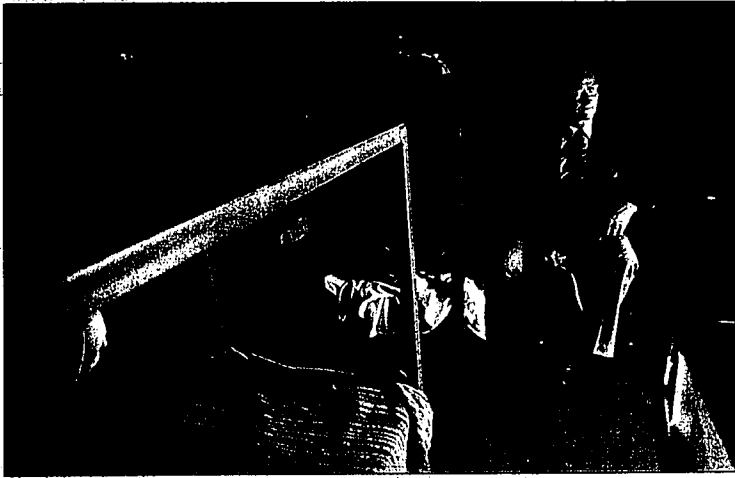

"Based on the Chirac call and reports from London we are hopeful that the meeting tomorrow in London will send a clear signal of the international community's resolve to halt Serb aggression and restore UNPROFOR's effectiveness and to re-establish conditions that can lead to a negotiated settlement," McCurry said. UNPROFOR is the acronym for the U.N. Protection Force in Bosnia.

McCurry said details remain to be worked out and consultations were continuing with the allied nations with forces on the ground in Bosnia.  
But he said the consensus proposal was centered on "proposals to maintain a more robust use of air power to protect Sarajevo" and the Bosnian enclave at Gorazde.  
"I'm confident in saying that we believe the British, the French and the United States will be prepared to present consensus views at the meeting tomorrow," McCurry said.  
He said the president reached Chirac in Rabat, Morocco, and that the two leaders spoke for about 15 minutes.

McCurry said that during the conversation, Clinton stressed that "the only peace Sarajevo has enjoyed" since the outbreak of hostilities was last year when NATO issued an ultimatum and threatened air strikes.  
He predicted that Russia was likely to have "strong views" on the proposal. "There's still work to do and conversations are continuing," McCurry said.  
Clinton spoke with Chirac as his top military and diplomatic officials were meeting with their counterparts in London.  
Defense Secretary William Perry said Thursday the major U.S. allies with peace-

# Tents provide space to confine more prisoners at Twin Falls jail

TWIN FALLS — Low-risk inmates will move out of tents next month when the Twin Falls County Criminal Justice Facility installs two modular housing units — at prisoners' expense.  
Plans show two 70-foot "trailers" — one housing 16 inmates and a double-width with 30 beds — enclosed by a new security fence. The project has a \$5,000 price tag for setup, and leasing the two units will cost \$2,000 per month, Sheriff Wayne Tousey said.  
Each trailer will be complete with a "day room" and bathroom facilities when GE Capital Modular Space of Boise finishes construction sometime in August, he said.  
Income generated by work-release inmates will cover the entire cost of the trailers, as well as the two National Guard tents installed last month as a "stopgap" measure to ease jail crowding, Tousey said.  
Inmates each pay the county \$12 per day or \$60 per week for the privilege of holding jobs outside the jail, he said.

Currently, 16 are participating in the work program.  
These work-release fees generate \$35,000 to \$40,000 each year and covered the entire \$13,410 it took to erect the tents, enclose them with a security fence and furnish them with 20 bunk beds, telephones, air conditioning, TVs, lighting and portable toilets, Tousey said.  
Tousey estimated it would have cost \$109,350 — \$45 per inmate per day — to send the county's overflow prisoners to other jails for the approximately three months they'll live in tents.  
The 6-year-old jail was built to hold 148. On Thursday, the facility housed

164 inmates — 129 in the jail and 35 more in the tents, Lt. Bill Thornquest said. An additional eight Twin Falls inmates were participating in programs or training in other locations Thursday.  
"Inmates get irate when they don't have breathing room," Thornquest said.  
In a jail taxed by a growing county crime rate and prisoner population, Thornquest hopes to switch soon from supervisor rounds made every 15 minutes to "direct supervision" — guards on duty in the same jail blocks all the time.  
"A lot can happen in 15 minutes," and having a guard on hand to hear their gripes would "keep those guys calmed down" when they're feeling crowded and unsatisfied, Thornquest said.  
But with the overflow in tents, the jail now has a few empty beds, Thornquest said. "We're not in too bad a shape right now," he said.  
Tousey was unable to predict how long the county will need the leased trailers to ease crowding, but said he has no plans yet to purchase the units.

# Police seek killer, put up reward

TWIN FALLS — More than two months after a Castleford boy was shot to death near the southern Twin Falls city limits, authorities have issued no arrest warrant for a killer.  
But third-hand statements from a jail inmate implicated Rodolfo Trevino III of Twin Falls, according to a police affidavit. Police have sought Trevino's automobile ever since witnesses reported seeing the victim brawl with the car's occupants just before the shooting.  
"New information is surfacing all the time," so law enforcement officials don't yet have a warrant out, Twin Falls County Prosecutor G. Richard Bevan said Thursday.  
Police are now offering a reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of Ryan Wiggins's killer, Bevan said. He declined to specify the amount of the reward.

# Regents reject racial policies

SAN FRANCISCO — Singing "We Shall Overcome," the Rev. Jesse Jackson and other demonstrators took over a University of California Board of Regents meeting room Thursday after the panel voted to end affirmative action hiring policies.  
The regents moved to another room to consider and ultimately approve a second proposal that would end race-based admissions at the nine-campus university system.  
The demonstrators pushed to the front of the room where the regents had been wrangling over affirmative action for 11 hours, linked arms and sang the civil rights protest anthem.  
Most regents left the room, but some stayed to sing with the demonstrators. Joining the group which included students, ministers and other protesters was Democratic Lt. Gov. Gray Davis, a regent and political enemy to Gov. Pete Wilson. The Republican governor has made ending affirmative action programs the centerpiece of his struggling presidential campaign.

# Waco raid ordered despite loss of surprise

WASHINGTON — A federal official who ordered the armed raid on a religious compound near Waco, Texas, said Thursday he did not know that sect leader David Koresh had been tipped that law enforcement agents were coming.  
"I was not aware we had lost the element of surprise when I made the decision to go forward," Phillip Choinacki, who headed the Houston office of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, testified at a hearing by two House subcommittees.  
A shootout that erupted when agents tried to serve a search warrant on Feb. 28, 1993, left four ATF agents and six residents of the Branch Davidian compound dead.  
Fifty-one days later, the FBI

knocked holes in the compound and injected tear gas. The complex caught fire and Koresh and 80 followers, including numerous children, died from flames and bullets.  
The testimony bolstered the contention by Republicans that ATF officials botched the raid through poor communication, insufficient intelligence-gathering and inadequate planning.  
Republicans also claimed that ATF officials invented allegations of drug manufacturing at the compound to lure the military to help plan the raid.  
President Clinton acknowledged that the government made mistakes but contrasted those mistakes to with "the depravity that took place inside that compound."  
Treasury Department officials said Choinacki was not testifying truth-

fully. The department, which over-see ATF, reached a similar conclusion in a 1993 report that stated he and the other agent in charge of the raid, Col. Gary Davis, had "a selective memory about critical facts."  
Choinacki and Sarabyan were fired from their supervisory jobs but were later reinstated to lesser positions.  
Later in the eight-day hearing, the committee will hear from Robert Rodriguez, an ATF agent who was inside the compound in an undercover role. In previous investigations, Rodriguez said that when he left the residence several hours before the raid, he told his superiors that Koresh had been tipped off about the raid.  
Choinacki testified that Rodriguez did not clearly state his concerns and that he didn't take the report seriously.

## Death in Waco

Only a few survived the devastating fire April 19th, 1993 that ended a 51-day standoff at the Branch Davidian compound outside Waco, Texas. Seventy-nine Davidians were killed, including 18 children and David Koresh, who claimed to be Jesus Christ.

### Sunday, Feb. 28

•About 100 Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agents move in on compound. A gun battle begins.  
•Four agents are killed and 15 wounded in the 45-minute battle.  
•Branch Davidian leader David Koresh, also known as Vernon Howell, later says he and others were wounded and his 2-year-old daughter killed.

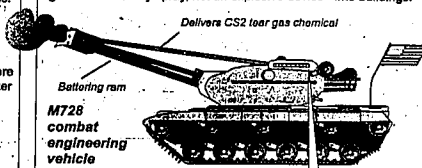

# Clinton denounces Koresh's 'depravity,' criticizes GOP

WASHINGTON — President Clinton on Thursday intensified the battle over the 1993 federal raid on the Branch Davidian sect, denouncing the "depravity" of slain leader David Koresh and accusing congressional Republicans of irresponsibly suggesting that federal officers "are some sort of armed bureaucracy acting on private grudges and hidden agendas."

Referring to Wednesday's testimony of a teen-ager who said she was forced to have sex with Koresh as a 10-year old, Clinton asserted that there is "no moral equivalency between the disgusting acts which took place inside that compound in Waco, and the efforts that law enforcement officer made to enforce the law and protect innocent people."

"This country needs to be able to make that distinction, and not to forget it," Clinton said, speaking at a

meeting with top federal law enforcement officials.

"We must not make war against police." His blunt speech a day after the teen-ager's testimony appeared to be an effort to tilt the public relations battle over the raid in the administration's direction, and to bore in again with a pro-police position of the kind that helped give him a month-long boost in the polls after the April 19 Oklahoma City bombing.

Clinton said that after the Oklahoma City bombing, some people wore T-shirts that depicted the activities of federal law enforcement, above the caption: "A society that makes war against its police better learn to make friends with criminals."

## New pact means more U.S. meat sales in South Korea

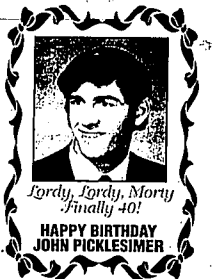
WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States averted a possible trade war with South Korea by settling a 17-month dispute over Korean barriers to American beef and pork exports.

U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor said Thursday the new deal could mean as much as \$240 million in increased sales immediately for American beef and pork producers and as much as \$1 billion in higher annual sales by the year 1999.

"The importance of this agreement to the tens of thousands of American workers in our beef and pork industries across all 50 states is manifest," Kantor said. He noted that South Korea already represents America's third largest market for beef and fourth largest market for all U.S. farm products.

took advantage of the newly created World Trade Organization to help resolve the issue, before announcing threatened sanctions.

"Our two governments have demonstrated a willingness to use the WTO, we can achieve a mutually acceptable result," Kantor said. ## Line-item veto, a major GOP priority, stalls in Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — The line-item veto, which Republicans promised to deliver to President Clinton as a potent tool for curbing wasteful spending, now seems unlikely to make it through Congress this year.

House hasn't even appointed a negotiating team. Participants say the measure has fallen victim to several forces. Some, without naming names, cite a desire by presidential candidates in Congress to prevent Clinton from using it to nurture a rightist image.

More than five months after the House approved one version of the bill and four months after the Senate adopted another, bargainers from the two chambers haven't begun working through the differences, and the power to kill individual items in spending and tax legislation.

**Shuttle crew pays tribute to Armstrong**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — A space shuttle crew dominated by Ohio natives paid tribute on their last full day in orbit to the man from their state who walked on the moon 26 years ago Thursday.

"Apollo 11 astronaut Neil Armstrong was the first human to step on the moon, and we are demonstrating that NASA is continuing to explore through the space shuttle and, in the future, the space station program," said Discovery's commander, Terence "Tom" Henricks.

Four of Discovery's five crew members are from Ohio, home to more astronauts than any other state: Pilot Kevin Kregel is the outsider — he's from New York state, ranked No. 2 for astronaut births.

**Woman who told tale of past life dies**

DENVER — Virginia Mae Morrow, the housewife whose hypnosis-induced tale of a past life as a 19th century Irishwoman, Bridy Murphy, caused a sensation in the 1950s, has died at 70.

She died July 12 at her Arapahoe County home, family members said.

The hypnotist, a businessman named Morey Bernstein, wrote "The Search for Bridy Murphy," a book that became a million-copy best-seller and touched off bitter controversy over the claims of reincarnation.

Bernstein said Morrow's account was spun at a half-dozen hypnosis sessions in the early 1950s, when she was a housewife in Pueblo named Virginia Tighe.

The account, allegedly given in a thick Irish accent nothing like Morrow's normal accent, related that Bridy Murphy lived from 1798 to 1865, first in Cork, Ireland, later in Belfast. It said she married a man named Brian MacCarthy and gave details about places and events.

**Justice OKs bread merger after change**

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department approved the merger of the nation's largest and third largest makers of white bread after they agreed Thursday to sell off one brand to a competitor in each of five regional markets.

The maker of Wonder bread, Continental Baking Co., the nation's largest wholesale baker, is being bought by Interstate Bakeries Corp., the third largest wholesale baker and producer of such popular brands as Weber's, Sunbeam and Buttermilk.

The companies agreed to the regional divestitures in a settlement with the department's antitrust division. The government said the arrangement would prevent higher prices for white bread in Los Angeles, San Diego, Chicago, Milwaukee and central Illinois.

**Cambodia opens embassy after change**

WASHINGTON — With the raising of his country's red and blue flag, Ambassador Vro Huoth reopened Cambodia's embassy Thursday, 20 years after it was closed because of the Khmer Rouge takeover.

"This simple ceremony closes a tragic chapter in our nation's history and begins a new book in which we can inscribe a new role for our country in the world," Huoth said.

The two countries broke off ties after communist Khmer Rouge guerrillas occupied the Cambodian capital of Phnom Penh in April 1975. They ousted a military dictatorship installed in a U.S.-backed coup against Prince Norodom Sihanouk, ordered the capital evacuated and set about establishing the Khmers' infamous killing fields.

**Miss Virginia ordered to give up crown**

ROANOKE, Va. — Organizers of the Miss Virginia pageant took away the winner's title Thursday, two weeks after she was accused of embellishing her credentials.

Andrea Ballengee refused to resign, pageant spokesman Bud Oakley said. "We're taking her error over," he said, refusing to comment further on what prompted pageant officials to end her reign.

Miss Ballengee's most recent telephone number was disconnected and she could not be located for comment.

Miss Ballengee won the Miss Virginia Pageant on July 1. Within a week, officials from Virginia Tech and Tabb High School in Yorktown claimed she had listed on her pageant resume high honors she never received.

**Heidi Fleiss' sister decides not to testify**

LOS ANGELES — Heidi Fleiss' sister reneged on her promise to testify in the Hollywood madam's money laundering trial Thursday, angering prosecutors and prompting the judge to warn her she could go to jail.

Shana Fleiss, a 27-year-old recovering heroin addict, broke down on the stand Tuesday, then fired her lawyer. By Thursday, she returned with a new attorney and refused to testify at all.

"Her position is simple: She does not wish to testify," said Walter Urban, adding that his new client had had a profound change of heart.

Shana Fleiss, an unindicted co-conspirator, is a critical witness for the government and was granted immunity from prosecution when she outlined the money laundering allegations in a sworn statement in December.

**President to join rites in Hawaii**

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton will honor the 50th anniversary of the end of World War II at ceremonies in Honolulu Sept. 1-3, the White House announced Thursday.

And a spokesman made a point of saying "V-J Day."

It will be the final function in a string of observances over the past four years marking 50-year anniversaries associated with the war. The activities come at the end of a planned two-week presidential vacation in Wyoming and Hawaii.

The observation "marks the 50th anniversary of V-J Day, the end of the war in the Pacific and the end of World War II itself," said presidential spokesman Mike McCurry.

An earlier reluctance on the part of administration officials to use the phrase "V-J Day," standing for Victory over Japan, had been criticized by veterans groups and conservatives in Congress.

A State Department notification last winter referred to the ceremonies as "an end-of-the-Pacific War commemoration" even though the day marking the end of the war in Europe retained the name "V-E Day."

Officials at the time suggested privately that using V-J Day was offensive to many Japanese. However, the administration maintained all along that it had no formal policy on what to call the event.

Clinton participated in ceremonies marking V-E Day on May 8 at Arlington National Cemetery and the next day in Moscow.

McCurry said Clinton would attend a series of ceremonies and events designed to honor all veterans of World War II and will also remember the air, land and sea battles of the war in the Pacific Theater.

# Police fault aide in Foster's death

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two weeks to the day after Vincent Foster died, three police officers recounted to the Senate Whitewater Committee their frustrations with presidential aides' who kept them from searching his office, papers and briefcase.

Park Police Maj. Robert Hines told lawmakers Thursday that if his officers had been permitted to search the briefcase they would have immediately seen an anguished handwritten note in which Foster in his final days lamented his life in Washington.

White House counsel Bernard Nussbaum pulled into the briefcase two days after his deputy's death and declared it empty — but refused to let police, FBI agents and Justice Department lawyers see it, or any of Foster's office papers. Four days later, one of Nussbaum's aides spotted the pieces of the torn-up note in the bottom of the briefcase. Police were told the next day.

"Our oldest and blindest detective would have found the note," Hines quipped. Park Police Capt. Charles Hume is saying, "I agree with Hume," Hines told the hearing.

Still, under cross-examination by Democrats, the officers said that in hindsight the White House actions would not have affected their conclusion that the deputy White House counsel killed himself.

They said they regarded as trou-

blesome — but not criminal — the White House's refusal to give them immediate access to Foster's office and papers. They acknowledged that they had no legal authority to order the office sealed.

The three police investigators tes-

tified that White House officials didn't tell them that Foster's office had been searched by Nussbaum and two other White House aides the night of the death.

Park Police Officer Cheryl Braun said that "I had a brief conversation"

the night of Foster's death with White House official David Watkins in which "I asked Mr. Watkins to see that the office was secured."

"He said yes, he acknowledged my request," she added. Watkins says he doesn't recall the request.

Braun said Watkins did not mention that he had asked his deputy, Patsy Thomasson, to go in Foster's office a few minutes earlier. Thomasson was joined by Nussbaum and Hillary Rodham Clinton's chief of staff, Margaret Williams, in that search. The White House aides said they were looking for a suicide note and that they removed nothing from Foster's office.

On Thursday, senators also discussed how to resolve a dispute over numerous documents turned over to the committee by the White House and the Clintons' personal attorney with sections blacked out. Republicans want to know whether the sections have any relevance to Whitewater.

On Wednesday, D-Amato suggested he might go to court if the White House continued to deny access to the information.

But on Thursday, D-Amato said the committee had agreed to have its lawyers negotiate an agreement with the White House, which Democrats indicated would be willing to compromise.

# House urges tougher policy on China

WASHINGTON (AP) — Demanding a more assertive China policy, the House approved a bill Thursday that would require closer monitoring of China's behavior and beam U.S. radio broadcasts to the country.

The compromise measure, however, steers clear of the contentious issue of China's favorable trade status.

With many lawmakers wearing yellow ribbons in honor of American human rights activist Harry Wu, under arrest in China, the House approved the China policy bill 416-10.

The bill, which now goes to the Senate, requires the president to report every six months on diplomatic initiatives to move China on human rights, arms proliferation and other issues. It authorizes the establishment of Radio Free Asia to begin broadcasting to China within three months of the bill's enactment.

But the House turned down, 321-107, a motion to override President Clinton's decision to extend most-favored-nation status to China.

The bill, crafted by Rep. Douglas Bereuter, R-Neb., was an attempt to find middle ground between the Clinton administra-

tion, which opposes linking human rights to trade, and the many lawmakers who want strong action to condemn Chinese activities.

"The truth is none of us knows what to do to get China to change," said House Democratic leader Dick Gephardt of Missouri. "The administration praised the House action to uphold the president's decision to renew China's trade privileges and said it supported the thrust of the Bereuter bill."

"Overall, we are in agreement with the impatience that Congress is showing with China's activities in areas such as trade abuses, human rights abuses and proliferation," U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor told reporters.

U.S.-Chinese relations are at their lowest ebb since the 1989 Tiananmen Square crackdown — exacerbated by the detention of Wu, who has been in a leader's exposing conditions in China's prison labor camps. The Chinese-born activist was arrested June 19 when he entered China and accused of stealing state secrets.

There also has been tension over trade differences. China's reported arms sales to Iran and Pakistan and a private visit to the United States by Taiwan's president.

# Dem holdouts agree on spending cuts bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Months of tortuous debate on a \$16.2 billion spending cut bill approached an end Thursday when two Senate Democratic holdouts agreed to let the bill go forward.

"I believe a reasonable and principled position has triumphed," said Sen. Paul Wellstone of Minnesota, who, with Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun of Illinois, blocked final passage of the measure to cut spending that Congress previously approved.

Final details still needed to be worked out with Majority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., on when the two will be able to offer two amendments to restore funds to job training and low income housing assistance programs.

But it appeared that the rescissions package would finally become law after five months of work in Congress, the levying of President Clinton's first veto and a two-week standoff between the bill and the two Democrats.

The bill hardly makes a dent in the federal budget of some \$1.5 trillion, but Republicans see it as a symbolic first step in their drive to balance the budget by 2002. Lawmakers drawing up 1996 spending bills also needed the rescissions package to save off even deeper cuts in programs next year. The package also includes some \$7.2 billion in

extra spending for 1995 — \$6.6 billion in disaster relief for California and other states, \$290 million for counter-terrorism activities and Oklahoma City bombing relief and \$275 million in debt relief for Jordan.

Clinton on June 7 exercised his veto power for the first time to kill the original bill, which he said singled out education, health and social programs for too many of the cuts.

Three weeks later, after lengthy negotiations with the White House, the House passed a Clinton-approved version that restored some \$733 million to programs the original bill had cut, including \$220 million for school safety and anti-drug programs, \$225 for a safe drinking water program and \$60 million for the Goals 2000 education program.

The increases were offset mainly by new cuts to federal travel, administration budgets and housing money.

But Wellstone and Moseley-Braun, who insisted the several social programs were still being cut too deeply, thwarted expected Senate approval of the revised bill.

Dole accused the Democrats of settling the carefully crafted compromise and refused to give the two floor time to propose amendments.

After two weeks of negotiations, an angry Dole took to the Senate floor late Wednesday to say that Wellstone was still holding out. "I thought we had an agreement," he said. "I'm not going to bring it up again, this is it."

But Wellstone said Thursday that his concerns were satisfied when the White House said it would use administrative funding to restore \$5.5 million to a program that counsels the elderly on buying health insurance.

Wellstone and Moseley-Braun said they will give two hours to debate two amendments. They would restore \$332 million to education and job training programs and \$319 million to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance program, with the spending offset by deeper cuts to Pentagon administration and travel budgets.

Both amendments are expected to be defeated, allowing the bill to pass without change and be sent to Clinton for signing.

# Allies run out of options in Bosnia

WASHINGTON — As the situation grows worse in Bosnia, the West blusters and considers threats the Serbs have ignored in the past.

As options dwindle, the West may finally have to admit its helplessness.

In a statement displaying a cruel arrogance and a dose of harsh reality, Bosnian Serb spokesman Jovan Zambetica urged the international community to help draft a "realistic framework" for a negotiated settlement. It was a way of saying the Serbs feel in a position to demand more than the 49 percent of Bosnia the West has offered them in the past.

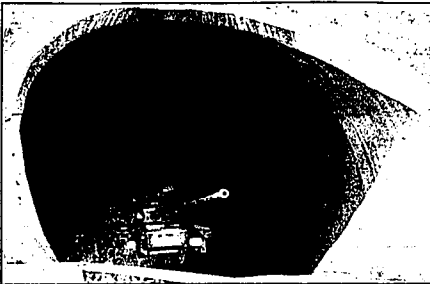
"The Serbs are amazed by the international community's capacity for self-deception," he said. "The international community is sick, and it needs help. We, the Serbs, intend to set us up."

Defense Secretary William Perry believes it is the Serbs who need some sobering and that a true taste of NATO air power might do it.

But the old hurdles to effective allied action remain.

There is no consensus. France wants Britain to join it in sending in more ground troops to reinforce the remaining safe areas. But the British are reluctant. The United States won't commit ground forces for anything other than evacuating the U.N. peacekeepers.

Renewed air strikes raise the likelihood of more hostage-taking by the

Serbs. Gen. John Shalikashvili, the top U.S. military officer, traveled to London with Perry for an allied strategy meeting. The general said air strikes must be punishing enough to be worth the risk.

To date, none of the allies have shown much inclination to join in the U.S. enthusiasm for air power.

Empty threats only make negotiations more difficult. How is the besieged Muslim government to read Perry's talk of major air strikes? Will it make them more willing to com-

Muslims would agree to accept less territory in a political settlement.

Encouraged by Western words, the Muslims resisted any talk of compromise, said Kenney. "The Muslims decided no, we have enough political support to supplement our military weapons. We were just going to go for a military victory."

Perry said that if the allies can't agree on a stepped-up air campaign, the only remaining alternative is withdrawal of the U.N. forces and lifting of the arms embargo.

That's the solution favored by a majority in Congress who believe the way for the United States to get out of the Balkan mess is to give the Bosnian government the means to defend itself.

"I don't see how the Muslims could win a long-term war against the Serbs unless they got an awful lot of outside help," said Kenney.

If that proves true and the help isn't forthcoming, Zambetica, the Bosnian Serb spokesman, may have the most accurate view of the answer to Bosnia: to Kosovo and Macedonia, drawing in Albania, Greece and Turkey.

The trouble with that solution is the question whether Serb ambitions stop there. The long-term concern of the administration and its allies is the potential that the conflict will then spread to Kosovo and Macedonia.

# U.N. official sees 'appalling' effect from war

GENEVA (AP) — The U.N. refugee agency jumped at an offer from Bosnian Serbs to get vitally needed relief supplies to Sarajevo, but Serbs turned back the quickly arranged convoy Thursday, an official said.

Undaunted, the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees will double the convoy to 20 trailer trucks and try again Friday, said spokesman Ron Redmond.

The on-again, off-again treatment was the latest obstacle in a series that has "virtually hamstringed" international relief efforts as more people are forced to flee and aid is blocked, according to Sadako Ogata, the head of the agency.

"The humanitarian consequences of the upsurge in violence have been appalling," Mrs. Ogata told a meeting of international agencies and donor countries Wednesday.

Mrs. Ogata and representatives of other relief organizations described their distress at being confronted with tens of thousands of new refugees from the fallen enclave of Srebrenica — many of whom have had to abandon

The likelihood that thousands of people also will be expelled from Zepa will further exacerbate the humanitarian crisis.

The fall of Srebrenica last week demonstrated "the dreadful nature of the conflict," Mrs. Ogata said. "On the one hand, more and more people are being terrorized, forced to flee their homes or brutally killed. On the other, access to humanitarian aid is being denied."

UNHCR was able to deliver only 30 percent of the needed supplies to Bosnia in June, the lowest amount in a year and a half, Mrs. Ogata said.

"I am particularly concerned about the stigmatization of Sarajevo," Mrs. Ogata said. "How long can the courageous population of this besieged city survive?"

She noted that the airlift to the Bosnian capital had been halted since April 8 because planes were being shot at.

February was the last month in which UNHCR was able to get in at least the minimum requirement of 6,600 tons. By June deliveries had dropped to about 800 tons. Figures for July are unavailable, but UNHCR spokesman Redmond described it as a drop in the bucket.

# China: Planned missile test is not directed at Taiwan

BEIJING (AP) — China insisted Thursday that its planned missile test near Taiwan is nothing more than a normal military exercise that poses no threat to the island province.

But Taiwan continued to suffer from a severe case of the jitters over the week-long test, beginning Friday, of a surface-to-surface missile in seas just north of the island.

Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Shen Guofang insisted repeatedly Thursday that the missile launch was nothing more than

a normal military exercise.

"In the past, China has scheduled such trial launches, as have foreign countries," he said. "It is all very normal."

However, in the past, China has not announced tests in such a public manner.

Normally, notification goes quietly through diplomatic channels. But this time, China announced it on the nationally televised evening news and on the front pages of major government-run newspapers.

# See 'Waterworld' in Russia — first

MOSCOW (AP) — Seen "Waterworld" yet?

The new Kevin Costner movie, zillions of dollars and untold angst in the making?

Probably not, since it won't be released until July 28.

Unless, that is, you live in Russia. For a small fistful of rubles you can buy a pirated video of what purports to be "Waterworld." In fact, what you get is a rough cut — an unfinished, working copy — of a movie that isn't even out yet.

The "Waterworld" video is a dramatic example of the greed and ingenuity of Russia's black market movie bootleggers, who now account for nearly 10 percent of Hollywood's losses from video piracy.

It comes in a plain box with a cheap label breathlessly billing "Vodni Mir" ("Waterworld") as one of 1995's "super hits" made on a "record budget of 175 million dollars!"

The quality is awful. The picture wiggles and jiggles, the soundtrack wobbles and warbles. A lone Russian translator does all the parts, droning along a split second behind the actors.

When the movie jerks into life after some white-on-black titles, Costner is sailing a large, lonely sea on some sort of weird trimaran. (Road Warriors gone wet?)

Time codes click by frenetically

along the bottom. Every now and then a black box with a message, presumably for the film editor, pops up in the middle of the screen. It's a bit like having the filmmakers think out loud while you are trying to watch the movie.

"A new balloon shot here?" the box inquires at one point.

"Let ski crash," it suggests a few minutes later.

People in the video business here say this Russian version was made from copies of gels of "Waterworld": smuggled out of a Hollywood studio. Unfortunately, the movie wasn't finished yet.

"It was edited in this country," said Christopher Abel-Smith, who runs a legitimate studio in Moscow, Varus Video. "Pairs of it are back-to-front," meaning the reels were out of order.

The "Waterworld" case is unusual — in fact the Motion Picture Association of America in Los Angeles estimates that film-to-tape transfers make up less than 5 percent of all pirated videos.

Most often pirate videos are simply copies of legitimate videos already in circulation abroad.

The pirated "Waterworld" video, which costs the equivalent of about \$4.50, has been on sale in Russia for about a month. A legitimate producer like Abel-Smith would have to wait at least a year to release a new film here.

## Filer School Board gets camera shy

### Members decide meetings won't be recorded

TWIN FALLS — Merl Schmoce was videotaping the Filer School Board meeting Tuesday night when board members asked him to shut off his camera.

Schmoce obeyed.

Moments before, board members had banned all electronic recording equipment from the meeting room, a move that could heighten tensions between the School Board and a handful of angry patrons.

For years, anger has bubbled up in board meetings as people accused board members of withholding pertinent information from them and improperly going into executive session. In June, a group tried and failed to recall board member Dale Coon.

But Filer Superintendent Bill Feusahrens

said Thursday the decision to ban recordings of meetings had nothing to do with tense relations with members of the public.

"The primary reason given was because tapes, audio and video, can be altered," he said. Board members "felt they would have to have a master copy to make sure people could tell that the event did or did not happen. ... It wasn't in retribution to anybody in the community."

Board members decided buying recording technology would be too expensive, he said, roughly \$600. The school district already has some equipment, but nothing suitable for taping board meetings, he said.

Schmoce said he had often videotaped parts of previous board meetings.

"It's just my way of keeping track of what goes on and who says what and what the demeanor of the man who said it is," he said.

Schmoce questions the legality of the recording ban. Feusahrens said the decision was based on the advice of an attorney who assured the board its move was legal.

Recording meetings isn't necessary, he said, because minutes are available at the district office and because a board publication is available at schools and convenience stores a day or two after the meetings.

The resolution gives board members the power to grant exceptions.

"People can come in, if someone is presenting an award, and videotape it," Feusahrens said. "They can make exceptions for special events."

If someone brings recording equipment into a board meeting, board members will ask them to leave, he said.

"Will they, considering the vitriolic mood of some of the meetings?"

"I hope so," he said. "If not, maybe we would call the local gendarmes. I hope they're considerate enough to not violate board policy."

Schmoce said he has started to research the issue and will fight it if possible.

"When I mentioned it to someone else, the first question they asked was what do they have to hide?" he said.

Board member Jim Wray said the policy isn't carved in stone.

"We voted Tuesday night to have it the way it is, but policy is always subject to change," he said. "If there's reason to change it, it can be changed."

"If they give me boys like this I'll take them any day," Dean said. "They've been great kids."

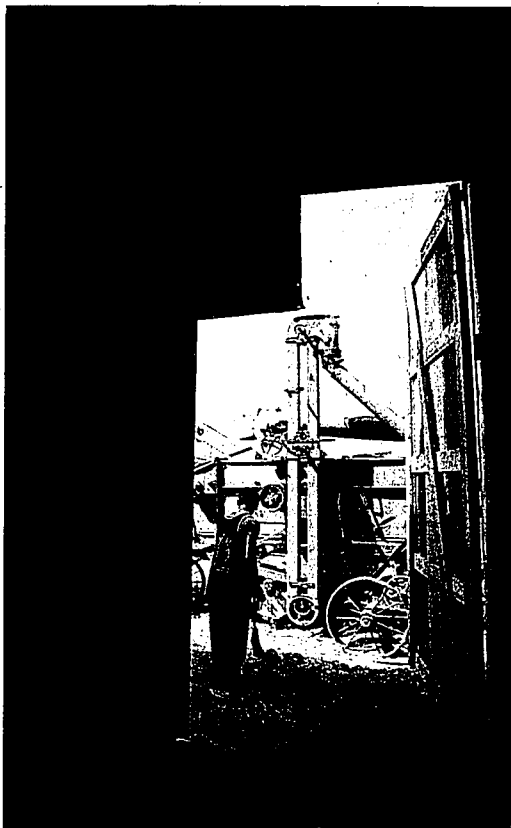

About 30 teens, both male and female, are working at five different projects in the county. RUPERT — Police say wild flowers growing on a lot in Rupert are opium poppies. A police report said 75-year-old Waldo Fletcher told police Wednesday that he had wild opium poppies growing on his property in west Rupert.

Warr said police are running chemical tests to double check that the poppy is of

Rupert Police Detective Terry Quinn said opium poppies grow wild in the area and that police removed some last year.

Warr said there was an outbreak of opium poppies along canal banks in Minidoka and Cassia counties two years ago.

## Gooding councilman defends housing zone rules

## Woman helps kids get jobs

GOODING — Kids from all across the Magic Valley are now employed, thanks to the efforts of Faye Coats, who has been helping kids with disabilities get jobs for more than four years, and the successful new Transition Project.

Coats works for the Idaho Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, a government program that provides training and stimulus in an effort to make Magic Valley kids more self-sufficient. The Transition Project is a section of Vocational Rehabilitation that deals exclusively with high school students.

Coats, who has been working in the Magic Valley since November, spent three years in Nampa and Caldwell before coming to the Twin Falls area. She has a masters degree in counseling

and three teen-age children of her own. "It can be a very satisfying job," she said.

Coats said she's most proud of helping a mildly mentally-retarded teen through a 9-month vocational school at BSU who is now successfully supporting himself.

Coats said each case she works with is individually examined to determine the appropriate method of support required. Case workers don't follow any pattern, rather relying on case-specific decisions about what it will take to make the teens employable and working from there.

"Employment. That's it. Our only goal is to find the significant employment," Coats said about the mission of the Transition Project. "Every action is taken with an eye toward making that person a self-sufficient and productive member of society."

## St. Luke's moves ahead with plans

SUN VALLEY — A Boise hospital will continue plans to build a new hospital and take over health care in the Wood River Valley.

Strong profit and loss projections and community financial support have signaled the green light for officials of St. Luke's Regional Medical Center to proceed with negotiations to construct a new 30-bed hospital somewhere between Ketchum and Hailey.

"We believe, that subject to the transfer of assets (of the Wood River Medical Center) and negotiation of other Definitive Agreement issues, St. Luke's will be able to construct and operate a quality medical center to serve the residents of Blaine County," said Bill Bodnar, vice president of marketing for St. Luke's.

Bodnar's comments came after a Wednesday meeting of the Joint Planning Committee, which has met for the past five months to work out the details.

Now that St. Luke's has substantially completed the major portions of the feasibility studies, Bodnar said he thinks St. Luke's could operate a medical facility in a cost-effective manner for many years to come.

Critical to the continuation of the feasibility study was the assessment of the community's financial contributions.

Putting in \$8 million of their own money, St. Luke's anticipates the balance of the \$20.8 million price tag for the new hospital to come from two sources: assets of the current Wood River Medical Center and philanthropy.

The medical center's assets would contribute \$7.7 million over the next three years, leaving more than \$10 million to come from contributions.

As part of the fund-raising feasibility study, 98 residents were interviewed to define attitudes about health care in the valley and determine how much money might be raised in a countywide fund-raising campaign.

A capital campaign to help pay for a new hospital is estimated to raise at least \$6 million, up to \$12 million if fund-raisers can find at least five individuals who contribute at least seven thousand dollars.

Other significant conclusions from the interviews revealed residents have a positive view of the health care now provided by the Wood River Medical Center.

Interviewees strongly support the need for a new hospital to be built at one site.

The report also concluded that people interviewed were "almost unanimous" in their convictions that the new hospital should be taken out of the political arena through ownership by a private, not-for-profit hospital.

And while the report indicated a slight favoritism for locating the hospital south of Ketchum, few people predicted their philanthropic support on the site selection, spokeswoman Cindy Carrington said.

Bodnar said the process is at a point

## Judge rejects bid to limit jet boats in Hells Canyon

LEWISTON (AP) — A federal judge has sunk the Hells Canyon Preservation Council's bid to have limits imposed on jet-boating in the Snake River gorge this summer.

One day after the judge's decision, the U.S. Forest Service announced it would wait until Sept. 15 after the most popular season on the river — to begin limiting boaters in the Hells Canyon National Recreation Area.

The preservation council and a group of rafting outfitters filed suit in May to force the Forest Service to begin implementing its Snake River management plan. But U.S. District Judge Owen M. Panner of Oregon decided on Tuesday that the Forest Service would not have to set the plan in motion before the lawsuit is decided.

"We think it's a real travesty that they're going to be another summer with no plan on the river," said

Marnie Criley, the council's development director in Joseph, Ore. "There was really no excuse why they couldn't get the plan into effect."

But Panner said in his decision that changing to a new river management plan now would be difficult for everyone, especially the Forest Service.

The plan sets up a complicated allocation system that distributes the limited use of the river between private and commercial, motorized and non-motorized boats.

The number of private jet-boats on the river through Hells Canyon has not been limited in the past. The plan's most controversial element is a 24-day ban on jet-boating in the upper 21 miles of the canyon's wildest rapids.

The Hells Canyon Alliance, which intervened in the lawsuit on behalf of the Forest Service, agreed

with Panner's decision, said Sandra Mitchell, the Boise-based group's executive director.

The Forest Service put the river management plan on hold after receiving 31 appeals at the end of last year. The Hells Canyon Alliance does not want the plan implemented, Mitchell said, because it would drive most of the commercial powerboat operators in the canyon out of business.

The Forest Service statement on Wednesday said only portions of the management plan would be implemented in September, but did not specify which portions.

Further analysis is needed to address the impacts of the plan on commercial permit holders, access to private land and limiting aircraft to designated landing strips in the wild river corridor, Deputy Regional Forester Dick Ferraro said in a news release.

## Chenoweth vows to continue attempt to block ATF bonuses

Congressman Helen Chenoweth lost her attempt to block the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms from granting merit pay raises and bonuses to its employees in the coming fiscal year, but she vowed to keep fighting.

The freshman Republican from Idaho was not put off by Wednesday's 317-111 House vote against her proposed amendment to the \$23.2 billion measure financing the Treasury, the Postal Service and smaller agencies.

"My point is this bill has a long ways to go and there will be a lot of changes in it," Chenoweth said. "There is going to be a lot of pressure put to bear on the Senate."

In the meantime, Chenoweth said her proposed amendment succeeded in sending a message to "a seriously troubled agency," citing the 1993 raid by Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agents on the Branch Davidian compound near Waco, Texas.

Four agents and six Davidians died in the botched raid. That led to a 51-day siege, which ended when agents knocked a hole in the compound and put in tear gas. The complex caught fire and 81 Davidians

died from flames and bullets.

"The message was we are going to cut this agency and we are going to bring it out for full debate," Chenoweth said Wednesday. "We should not be throwing money into bonuses before we fix what is wrong."

Iowa Republican Jim Lightfoot, chairman of the House Appropriations Subcommittee of the Treasury, Postal Service and General Government, said Chenoweth's amendment was hurt by floor debate from California Republican Robert Dornan.

Lightfoot said he voted against the amendment because Dornan went too far by charging Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms celebrated the Waco tragedy. On the contrary, Lightfoot said, the agency's flaggers were flown at half staff as a memorial to the people who were killed.

"I think she had it going her way and quite frankly I think Mr. Dornan got a little strident and turned off people who would have voted for it," he said.

## Friend's friend buys Weaver cabin

NAPLES (AP) — The mountaintop cabin where Randy Weaver, his family and friend Kevin Harris holed up in an 11-day standoff with federal agents in 1992 has been sold.

The purchaser is Steve Schmidt, 29, of Nine Mile Falls, Wash., a lifelong friend of Harris.

Schmidt said he didn't have any immediate plans for the property, which includes 20 acres, a spring and scenic mountain vistas in northern Idaho.

"I pretty much did it as a favor, but Randy always has the option of buying it back," Schmidt said Wednesday.

"I'm not sure why Randy wanted to sell it; you would have to ask him. But Kevin told me about it and it sounded like a good deal. It's a nice spot."

Weaver, who now lives in Iowa, put out the word in January that he wanted to sell the place. Schmidt bought it in March for an undisclosed price.

The Ruby Ridge property is valued by the Boundary County assessor's office at \$21,500. The auditor's office said sale prices are not generally recorded when property titles are transferred.

Schmidt said he has some worries about tres-

passers, and doesn't want the site to become a tourist attraction.

"We don't want people going up there, but there are some signs people have been there," he said.

Three people died in the standoff at Ruby Ridge in August 1992.

Weaver's cabin had been under surveillance by law enforcement for 18 months because Weaver failed to show up for trial on a federal weapons charge.

U.S. marshals were prowling around the property, looking for the best way to arrest Weaver when they met up with Weaver, Harris and Weaver's 14-year-old son, Samuel.

A gun battle ensued. Samuel Weaver and deputy U.S. marshal William Degau of Quincy, Mass., died. Weaver, his wife, Vicki, their three daughters, and Harris took refuge in the cabin, but an FBI sharpshooter wounded Weaver and Harris and killed Mrs. Weaver the next day.

After their surrender, Weaver and Harris were charged with murder and conspiracy in the death of Degau. They were acquitted by a U.S. District Court jury in Boise.

## Budget cuts jeopardize migrant worker programs

NAMPA (AP) — Idaho administrators say legislation pending in Congress could mean the elimination or sharp cutbacks in job programs that have helped thousands of farm workers.

In the last year, the Job Training Partnership Act helped 392 farm workers get vocational or academic training and placed 116 trainees in long-term,

permanent jobs at an average of \$6.24 per hour, said Maria Salazar, director of employment and training for the Idaho Migrant Council.

Nationwide, the program helps about 45,000 farmworkers each year with vocational training and other services. In Idaho, program funds have been awarded to the Migrant Council for the last 10 years.

"If the program survives with a 25 percent cut, that means a loss of \$250,000 and a lot of migrants won't receive emergency help, nor will we be able to provide job training support in all the communities we serve," Salazar said.

For now, there appears to be enough funding to keep the Idaho program operating until June 1996, Salazar said.

## Fire chief: Railroad fails to disclose spills

POCATELLO (AP) — A top Fire Department official says Union Pacific Railroad fails to notify the city about all hazardous materials spills at the railroad's Pocatello yard.

Division Chief Glen Blackwell says there have been times when local firefighters find out about yard spills through anonymous tips from concerned railroad workers.

Blackwell is a Union Pacific spokesman but is not company policy.

"If there's an incident where he wasn't notified, we'd like to know about it," spokesman Ed Trandahl said Thursday.

While the railroad has its own hazardous material cleanup crews, Trandahl said Union Pacific's policy is to notify state emergency officials of all spills and they are to notify local firefighters.

"It's possible that some yard worker didn't tell management about a spill," he said. "We don't approve of that."

Blackwell's complaint came during a forum on transportation of hazardous material through Idaho and responses to emergencies, sponsored by the League of Women Voters.

The emergency manager for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, Clay Ogilvie, sug-

gested state and local officials work out a formal agreement with the railroad to resolve any hitches in the notification procedure.

Ogilvie said he spent three years doing just that at the INEL, so what were six disparate emergency response plans were finally unified into a comprehensive approach that includes extensive classes, drills and exercises for the hundreds of INEL workers assigned to respond to INEL spills.

But, again, Blackwell complained about the lack of requirement for the government to notify local officials when it is shipping nuclear material to the INEL.

Only 27 of those shipments have been made in the past two years since a federal court essentially halted the flow of radioactive waste into Idaho until the government could prove it could be contained safely.

"We're often not aware a shipment is coming by rail until we see the protesters," Blackwell said.

But a number of the officials taking part in the forum contended that the well-constructed canisters and strict regulations on transportation make the nuclear waste shipments among the least worrisome of all the hazardous materials moving through the state.

## Residents: Drawdowns ruin recreation

BOISE (AP) — Drawdowns at Dworshak Reservoir to help migrating salmon are damaging fish and other wildlife and practically destroying recreation on the northern Idaho waterway, witnesses told a federal judge Thursday.

"It isn't being managed for fishing, it's being managed for a toilet bowl flushing," Orofino chiropractor Dennis Harper told U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge.

Harper and other Orofino groups are seeking an immediate injunction from Lodge to block the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers from spilling large amounts of water from the reservoir. The water is required to meet the lower Snake River flow objectives for juvenile fall salmon.

But Orofino interests said drawdowns such as occurred last year and lowered the reservoir level to 110 feet below full have had a drastic impact on the area economy.

The Orofino Chamber of Commerce claims in the last three years, area businesses have lost \$1.5 million that would have been spent by summer recreationists. Chamber Director James Grunke estimated 130 jobs have been lost and the community of 2,800 loses \$75,000 per day for every foot the reservoir drops.

The drawdowns started Monday and have dropped the reservoir five feet.

## Pocatello man faces slay count

POCATELLO (AP) — A 23-year-old Pocatello man has been sent to district court to face a charge of first-degree murder in the New Year's Day stabbing death of a man who lived in his apartment building.

Magistrate Ron Hart sent Augustus Joseph Isak to district court Thursday after a preliminary hearing in which prosecutors played a videotape of an interview with the defendant. In it, Isak told a detective he killed Jack Herridge, 53, because he believed Herridge had given him AIDS.

Police said Isak was arrested the next day at a Pocatello hospital, where he was creating a disturbance.

The preliminary hearing originally was scheduled in February, but was postponed until Isak was declared mentally capable of assisting in his own defense. He was sent to a maximum security mental evaluation facility in Boise and returned to the Bannock County Jail last month.

## Jackpot winner has baby early

BOISE (AP) — Powerball jackpot winner Pam Hiatt has a new baby, a new job and — most important of all — a new baby.

When the 26-year-old Boise State University student was eight months pregnant when she won the \$87.6 million lottery prize June 3. Four weeks ago, she gave birth to a 7-and-a-half-pound boy.

"It's a lucky baby," Idaho Lottery spokesman Pat Reilly said. "It has a mom able to spend a lot of time with him. And Pam's very happy."

Hiatt could not be reached for comment Wednesday.

She gave birth to Nicholas four weeks prematurely, Reilly said, after entering the hospital under an assumed name to protect her privacy.

Hiatt, who is single, has not disclosed the father's name, but she has said he lives in Boise.

**Water use comes under fire**

WASHINGTON — The Clinton administration's failure to stem illegal uses of water from government irrigation projects is drawing increased criticism from river conservationists.

Four environmental groups told Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt on Wednesday it has been a year since his inspector general condemned the so-called practice of "water spreading," unauthorized use of water resources developed by the Bureau of Reclamation.

In addition to bilking taxpayers out of millions of dollars a year, the illegal water diversions drain water from troubled fish species, especially salmon in the Pacific Northwest, the environmentalists said.

"The Clinton administration is taking the same approach to water spreading that the Reagan administration did 10 years ago: ignore it and hope it goes away," they said in a letter to Babbitt.

"By backing off on water spreading, Reclamation will allow massive illegal water uses to continue at a time when Pacific Northwest salmon runs — and aquatic species throughout the West — are crashing," said the letter from American Rivers, Idaho-Rivers Unlimited, Natural Resources Defense Council and WaterWatch.

"The federal government has been aware of the problem for more than a decade, the conservationists said. Sometimes the water goes to lands unauthorized for irrigation. Other times legal recipients sell the water to others.

In a report last July, the Interior Department's inspector general estimated 429,000 acres feet of water was used annually on 24 bureau projects to irrigate as many as 154,000 unauthorized acres in eight Western states.

The loss of the water at the 24 projects cost taxpayers \$37 million to \$46 million over the past nine years, the inspector general said.

Half of the projects and about three-fourths of the water — about 300,000 acre feet — were in the Pacific Northwest. That 300,000 acre feet is enough to meet the needs of the cities of Seattle and Portland, Ore., combined for a year, the environmentalists said.

About 4,000 growers farm 230,000 acres of land in the Columbia Basin, using 950,000 acre feet of water annually.

The Bureau of Reclamation moved twice last year to address the problems outlined in the report, but backed off both times in the face of pressure from farm groups and politicians.

"On the anniversary of the IG's report and congressional oversight hearings, the government is no closer to recovering those lost funds or ending water spreading than it was a year ago," said Matt Bridges of Idaho Rivers United.

Interior Department spokesman John Wright said today the bureau has provided guidelines to its regional offices to address the problem.

"There are no formal regulations. The way the bureau planned to deal with this was on a case-by-case basis," Wright said.

Babbitt had not yet seen the letter and had no immediate comment, Wright said.

NRDC spokeswoman Karen Cameron said the inspector general's report included only the financial impact on taxpayers.

"The greater loss is of instream water values such as hydropower and fish habitat, worth tens of millions of dollars," she said.

Katherine Ransel of American Rivers said every salmon restoration plan in the Pacific Northwest, including the one advocated by the National Marine Fisheries Service, "calls for the end of illegal water use and its reallocation for salmon needs."

**Former Utah sheriff charged with trespass**

VERNAL, Utah (AP) — Former Uintah County Sheriff Lloyd Meacham has been charged with criminal trespass, a class-C misdemeanor.

He was accused of refusing to leave the office at the Battle Hollow Resort where he worked as a security guard until being fired last week.

Meacham was arrested about 2:30 p.m. Wednesday when he ignored requests to vacate the security office at the resort. County Attorney JoAnn Stringham told the Salt Lake City Tribune Meacham resigned as sheriff last year after pleading guilty to three class-B misdemeanors of falsifying or altering government records in reports he filed with the Forest Service for payment of patrols he never did while under contract with them.

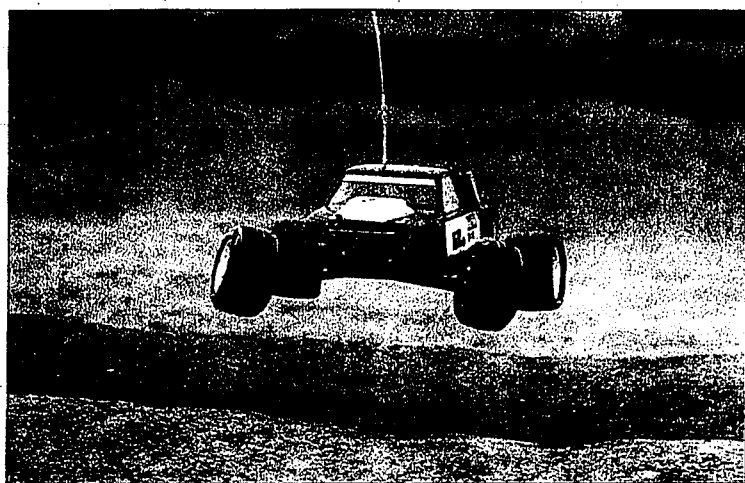

## Twin Falls artist captures 'watercolor realism'

TWIN FALLS — The world is a studio for painter Dianne Van Dlac.

She absorbs the character of where she is and captures it in the wrinkled skin and grizzled whiskers on the face of an old man. Colonial New England awakens as the blue brook winds its way over snow-covered ground to the little white church, in the woods.

The gently waving reflection of trees in icy cold, snowbanked water is vaguely familiar. It's a bit of the Wood River Valley. "I guess you could say I paint watercolor realism. ... It's not landscapes, I don't (paint) still lifes or nudes, I do the heads, the faces. I paint the character," she said.

Raised in Edmonds, Wash., near Seattle, Van Dlac creates most of her watercolors from inspiration she receives from the Northwest.

"I've done more (paintings) in the Northwest," she said. But she has traveled extensively and taken in all the sights, sounds and people she's met along the way.

While staying on the island of St. Lucia in the Caribbean, Van Dlac spent the first little while absorbing the sun, the culture and the atmosphere of the place. The plan was to take her paintings to the tour boats and sell them there, but she was caught up in "spending from 10 o'clock until four on the beach, then partying."

She managed to paint the "voodoo" ladies, the palm trees, "everything that was local" to put in a single show and sell all but one picture. She never made it to those tour boats.

For the most part, Van Dlac is a self-taught artist, having only two years of art classes from Western Washington State University behind her. She found herself a crossroads, working at an architecture firm and preparing for a third year of college, or painting. She quit her job.

"I made something like \$1,200 that first month and a half," she said. Right after that was a trip to Europe, after which she exhibited her first art show. "Since then, she's traveled to 21 countries in four trips, including South Africa and Hawaii."

The lifelike detail is a characteristic of Van Dlac's paintings. Her subjects have almost a Norman Rockwell quality, an effect she consciously tries to achieve thought "capturing the detail and essence of places and people."

To this end, she first takes several photographs or makes a detailed sketch of her subject. Then she studies each detail, elimi-

nating blurs and unwanted clutter. Finally, she uses a dry brush technique to paint, meaning her canvas is dry so the watercolors don't "loosen" or spread out with the water.

To achieve a more realistic representation, Van Dlac will take criticism on a piece from those who would know. She was working on a picture of some older model tractors and asked a farmer friend to look at the details to see if everything looked right.

"He said they looked great, but they'd only go backwards," she said. Amazed, she asked her friend how he knew that, and he told her that the "V" tread on the tires were

supposed to point toward the ground. Otherwise, they would roll the other way. She corrected the problem.

For the past several years, Van Dlac has focused on working from her home in Edmonds and taking her work to several shows each summer.

Van Dlac enjoys the opportunity art festivals bring. Not only is the exposure good, but she enjoys seeing some of the same people year after year, and she can get reactions from viewers about her work. "You get feedback from the people — what they like, what they want more of. The galleries just send you a check, no comment."

Absorbing the world around her motivates Van Dlac's "gypsy feet" to travel around the world.

"When you're painting, you're by yourself. So you're usually consumed, focused on the painting. So I have to take breaks, just so that I don't burn out," she said, wiggling in her seat.

Whether it be a quaking aspen in autumn colors or the art decor of Europe, Van Dlac lets her art take all where it can get. She's willing to branch out into new areas and paint what she's learning.

But at the same time, she's contented with how she brings the world to watercolor-life. "I'm happy with where my life is. I've done a lot of the things I wanted to do. ... The reputation now is there."

# Sheehy on new passages

The good news from journalist-Gail Sheehy is that you're going to get a second chance at being an adult. The bad news — the more sobering news, at least — is that you better plan for it now, or you just might screw it up, too.

### Book review

"It is a trend across the whole country," said Sheehy in her Seattle hotel suite, "and the message is this: Unless you repackage your skills and gain the education you need to make yourself marketable in your 'second adulthood,' you run the risk of becoming obsolete."

That message comes through loud and clear, and in a variety of ways, in Sheehy's 11th and newest book, "New Passages: Mapping Your Life Across Time" (Random House, \$25). It is a sequel, in a sense, to her landmark best-seller from 1976, "Passages," but it is also quite different because it recognizes that a true revolution has taken place in the past two decades. The earlier book posited a view of individual American lives developing in stages and passing through predictable crises — or "passages" — that would deliver us to the next stage in adulthood. Sheehy, who was in her mid-30s when she conducted the research, ended "Passages" with subjects approached 50 because "I found it impossible to imagine myself at that age."

It's amazing what life looks like now that Sheehy has reached 57. "New Passages" offers a profile of American life that could hardly have been imagined in the 1970s, including a chance at a "second adulthood" now opening up to men and women who pass through the often difficult period of "mid-life," usually in their early or mid-40s.

"There have been tremendous social and economic changes in the world in the last 20 years," said Sheehy, who began assembling demographic data, conducting national surveys and interviewing individuals and groups for the new book in 1989. She ticked off a number of reasons for the profoundly different social portrait contained in "New Passages":

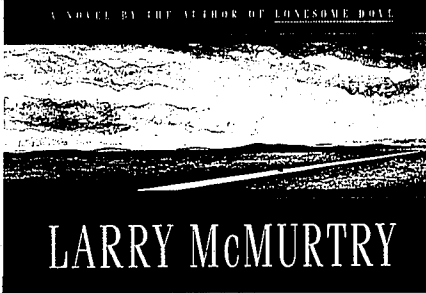
"First, there is the fact of equity in education — women are now gaining bachelor's and master's degrees in greater numbers than men," she said.

"Also, there is the reality and the necessity of having two-paycheck households. And there has been the delay in reproduction by many women, with the end of women's fertility increasingly being blurred."

She also noted that today's younger men have "become more comfortable with fatherhood," often passing their open, nurturing style along to men in their 40s and 50s who are starting new families with new wives. Meanwhile, the first wives of those "start-over dads" are blossoming in new-found educational, financial and emotional independence — and often choosing not to get locked into a second marriage.

Finally, she said, the last 20 years have seen global economic changes that have been reflected in American corporate life by restructurings and downsizings that "have stripped the security from many people's middle years — and will strip the security from later life as well, unless adequate preparation is made."

# Ludlum's 'Apocalypse Watch' misses

In Robert Ludlum's "Apocalypse Watch" (Bantam) American intelligence agent Harry Latham disappears while trying to infiltrate a neo-Nazi group known as the Brotherhood of the Watch at a secret base in the Austrian Alps.

His younger brother, consular operations agent Drew Latham, insists on being involved in the manhunt that follows.

It was Harry who pushed Drew to enter government service, a decision Drew has never regretted.

Harry escapes the neo-Nazis, returning with a comprehensive list of fascist support-

ers in France, England, the United States and Canada. But many of those named, including the U.S. vice president and speaker of the House, are fervently anti-Nazi. Some on the list are Jewish. Everyone on the list angrily denies involvement.

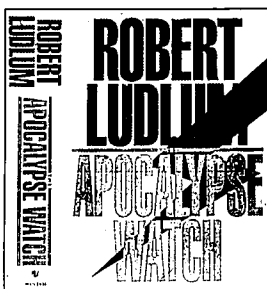
Did the Nazis intentionally leak bogus information to create a scenario similar to the McCarthyism of the 1950s?

Harry says no, but the evidence strongly suggests otherwise. Harry's physical and mental conditions are far from good, and his intelligence colleagues are concerned. So is his brother. Finally allowed to meet

with Harry in Paris, Drew is devastated when Nazi assassins kill Harry in a crowded restaurant. The killers don't survive, but that's small consolation.

Then Drew comes up with a brilliant scheme: He will take his brother's place in order to find out what really happened to Harry. Accordingly, word is leaked that it was Drew who was killed.

"Apocalypse Watch" is selling well around the country, and I can't help but wonder why. It's about 250 pages longer than it has any reason to be. Hero Drew Latham's characterization is dismal, with a lot of 1950s-style tough guy talk and hollow bragadoos. As much as I like Ludlum, this book is a major disappointment.

# Ellison's 2nd novel to be published posthumously

### 'There's a lot to be done.'

WASHINGTON — Ralph Ellison's second novel, probably the most anticipated as well as the most delayed novel in modern literary history, is finally on its way to publication. "I think it's going to be published. I hope it will be," the writer's widow, Fanny, said Thursday.

Ellison started the book almost immediately after "Invisible Man" was published in 1952, and worked on it until his death from pancreatic cancer last year. The untitled novel, much of which is set in Washington during the '50s, was often announced as nearing completion but never quite made it.

The swift rise of "Invisible Man," which is considered by many to be

the single best postwar American novel, may have made Ellison reluctant to publish more fiction. A key incident in the novel — the assassination of a political figure — turned chillingly real with the slayings of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., Malcolm X and the Kennedys, temporarily paralyzing the novelist. Then a house fire destroyed the manuscript, forcing a fresh start.

John F. Callahan, a professor of English at Lewis and Clark College in Oregon, has received a fellowship from the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington to organize the work into its final form. "There's a lot to be done," Callahan said Thursday. "The manuscript is in so many different forms — numerous computer disks from two computers, as well as typewritten and notes and jottings. Ellison said that for him, craft was an aspect of morality. My task is to be exceedingly careful and respectful of his craft."

By the end of his fellowship next spring, Callahan hopes to have a

unified narrative to present to Fanny Ellison. She will make the final decisions, including whether to call it a finished or an unfinished novel. The scholar, whose commission was first reported in the Chronicle of Higher Education, said it was too early to give a publication date. For at least 30 years, the book has been under contract to Random House.

The novel, parts of which were issued as short stories during the '60s and early '70s, tells of a black preacher — with Rev. Hickman, also known as "God's Trombone," who employs a light-skinned boy to rise out of a coffin during a revival. The boy disappears, passes for white and turns into a racist senator from a northern state. Hickman and his followers track

Sen. Suhrader to Washington, hoping to save him from an assassination attempt.

The book's form, Ellison said, was "a realism extended beyond realism... This is a crazy book and I won't pretend to understand what it's about."

The published stories were presented "as letters, fuzzy musings, tirades, sermons, or lies," the scholar Robert G. O'Meally wrote in an essay on Ellison in 1993. Their combined effect, he added, is to force the reader "to confront questions that Ellison says issue from the heart of America's condition as a nation still unformed. Where, what, who am I? What is illusion, what is real? What is black, what is white, what is American?"

# Baker memoirs out in paperback

"Growing Up," by Russell Baker (Plume) — Russell Baker's Pulitzer prize-winning autobiography has lost none of its appeal in the 13 years that have elapsed since its original publication. Baker's youth was dominated by a succession of memorable women: his paternal grandmother, the imperious matriarch of a flyspeck town in West Virginia; his widowed mother, struggling for independence during the depths of the Depression; his unapologetic, independent fiancée. This evocative recollection of maturing amid crises reveals the truth of Proust's dictum that any writer's life can be seen as a preparation for his vocation.

"The New Field Guide to the U.S. Economy: A Compact and Irreverent Guide to Economic Life in America" (The New Press) — This collection of numbers and graphs is both more interesting and more disturbing than it sounds. By 1989, the richest 10 percent of the U.S. population had expanded their share of the net wealth to 68 percent; in 1992 white women made 70 cents for every dollar their male counterparts earned (up from 58

cents in 1967), while black women made 89 cents for each dollar black males made. Nine months of prenatal care for a pregnant woman may cost taxpayers \$600 vs. up to \$2,500 for one day of care for a premature baby.

"Extra Innings: A Memoir," by Doris Grumbach (Norton) — In "Coming Into the End Zone," novelist Doris Grumbach recorded her thoughts on turning 70; five years later, she reconsiders her conclusions. Grumbach blends these reflections with journal entries from a year spent on a secluded cove in central Maine.

# Chubby Checker twists into Jackpot

**JACKPOT** - Chubby got the "Checker" in 1958, when Dick Clark's wife likened him to a young Fat Domino.

It took. In 1960 and 1962, the singer saw his recording of "The Twist" become the only record in pop music history to become in two different years by the same artist. Today, the tune is billed as one of the all-time Top 40 jukebox singles.

Checker's real name is Ernest Evans. He hails from Philadelphia, and he's currently touring 300 days a year. He started out in the mid 1950s, doing impressions of rock 'n roll stars for the customers at the poultry market in South Philadelphia. In the evenings, he sang on street corners.

When he recorded "The Twist," his fame spread from "American Bandstand" to European royalty to the White House.

In 1961, The Associated Press had to issue a public apology for reporting that Jacqueline Kennedy had slipped out of Palm Beach, Fla., one night to "The Twist!" at a Fort Lauderdale nightclub.

More recently, Checker recorded a new version of "The Twist" with The Fat Boys. It hit Top 20 in the United States and Number One in Europe. He's also sung at the Superbowl and appeared on MTV's "Video Music Awards."

Checker, now 53, does lots of commercials, everything from Nabisco to Hershey to Hyundai to Tropicana.

What's bigger than a football field, filled with five rings of animals and red all over?

The Carson and Barnes big top, of course.

This five-ring circus, the largest of its kind on the road, will perform across from the Petro-2 truck stop at the junction of U.S. Highway 93 and Interstate 84 on Tuesday, and at the Minidoka County Fairgrounds in Rupert on Wednesday.

With shows at 2 and 8 p.m., the circus's performers and animals promise to thrill and entertain audiences of all ages, according to Noel Neuroth, the circus's press agent.

The two scheduled performances aren't the only time people can witness the circus magic, however. The public is invited to witness a bit of circus history as the 50-man tent crew and three elephants raise the big top at 9 a.m. on the morning of each circus performance. Admission is free, and there will be 100 animals on display.

Other attractions will include a snake show and pony ride, both of which will be open one hour before each show.

"Audiences will definitely see a performance that is unique to our circus," Neuroth said. Carson and Barnes is the only five-ring circus in operation, she said, and boasts

the biggest big top in the world and more elephants than any other circus.

In addition, Carson and Barnes is the only production that owns and trains Freisian stallions, a breed nearly destroyed by Adolf Hitler's troops during World War II, she said.

The big top, which is 396 feet long and holds 2,700 people, features five rings filled with aerial, acrobatic, juggling and animal acts. Bareback riders, trapeze artists and

a 40-person aerial ballet will highlight the show.

Every act centers around the theme, "Treasures of the Orient," and the production is "just outrageous," Neuroth said. Not only are the performers' costumes Oriental, but a special group called The Dragon Troupe will perform traditional Chinese acts like plate-spinning and various acrobatics, she said.

# McEntire delivers country with class

Reba McEntire, dressed in the fur coat and pillbox hat she wears in her Fancy video, is sitting inside. The car stops, she steps out, the song begins.

Before she's done belting Bobbie Gentry's story of a poor girl's rise to aristocracy, she's tossed the hat and let down her fire-red hair and emerged in an evening gown you know isn't off-the-mack.

Welcome to Reba's world, where uptown glitter mingles with down-home sawdust. Her elaborate performance Saturday night at Starplex, with 19,000 fans in the house, remains proof that no other country artist can touch her when it comes to sheer entertainment savvy.

Oklahoma meets Vegas? True, 14 costume changes, two video screens, 70 dancers and an assortment of risers and set decorations are pretty indulgent for music that prides itself on simplicity. But McEntire has been doing this long enough to know that almost anything can work if it's done professionally.

After 20 years in the business, at least half of that time spent on the road singing in front of crowds, she's keenly aware of her strengths and limitations. So she surrounds herself with competent musicians. But she can act, and most of her songs have that mindrama structure — a story, characters, emotional conflict and resolution.

Her versatile voice, filled with more shades than a kaleidoscope, can be enough to communicate a song's message.

# Backbeat

## Chris Whitley thrives on contradiction

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Chris Whitley thrives on contradiction. His new album, "Din of Ecstasy," is a series of emotionally raw songs muffled up and beat up with sculpted, distorted electric guitar.

Even the paradox of its title fits with Whitley's disdain for the usual. "It's like 'excruciating and beautiful.' They make total sense — not just make sense, but they just feel right," he said.

He thinks "Din" is more vulnerable than his debut, the mostly acoustic "Living With the Law," despite its electric emphasis. He can't understand why vulnerability is generally associated with acoustic music. "I like playing vulnerable music loud and confrontational music very quietly," he said. "It's the same with lyrics and music — if the chords are beautiful, I want to make the lyrics more like realism and not romanticism."

"Living With the Law," garnered rave reviews. But looking back on it, he labels it with one of his favorite terms — "precious." Being called a "singer-songwriter" falls into that category, too.

"It's self-important," he said. "You can play something in a way that it gets corny. I combat that in myself all the time. I feel like I write romantically, which is always melodrama on a certain level."

Whitley is willing to point out his limitations and shortcomings. "I feel like I write words clumsily and write songs in a dumb, uneducated way," he said. "I've played a long time and I've thought about it, but I feel really limited as a writer and as a musician."

His gaunt face is dominated by huge green eyes; ask him a question and he glances up, almost startled, like a deer in the headlights. His hands are never still; he deftly rolls cigarettes and smokes them, rakes

his hands through his fine hair (tinted a pale reddish burgundy), and toys with matches and a lighter. He alternates between sips of a double espresso and club soda, and speaks in fits and starts.

He's a self-absorbed live performer, too-busy yanking chords out of an ancient, recalcitrant Dobro or a more cooperative electric guitar to chat with the audience. Often, he forgets it's even there; when he looks up, his eyes are somewhere else.

The music hits him like a physical blow; he arches his back, doubles over, and wraps his lanky frame about his guitar as if to dissolve into it. He has a strong, liquidy voice, leaping octaves and crooning in the style of Chris Issak.

Critics have been less charitable to Whitley since he went electric.

"The songs are probably not as accessible as the first record, so people don't get that immediately," Whitley, 34, said prior to the last of three Philadelphia shows at the Khyber Pass club. "I didn't want to make an intellectual rock record. I hope it has a visceral level, a physical side, to it."

Much of the feel of "Din" is couched in the trembling passion of Whitley's delivery. His lyrics are laced with a desperate sexuality; his songs throb with yearning. In "Know," the tension is almost unbearable as he pleads to his lover, "come around round midnight, child, I'll know you in the dark."

His marriage of 12 years failed, and his 7-year-old daughter, Tricie, lives in Belgium with her mother. The experience left Whitley seriously doubting marriage. "It's unhappy if you're stuck together? And if you're married and have children, it's even worse," he said.

Whitley calls many of his songs "male and female." He cites "Can't Get Off," which twitches and squirms with frustration, as an example. "When I think about it lyrically, it feels like a guy being a guy, but being really stupidly vulnerable," he said. "It almost seems like the lyrics are like the masculine and the music is like the feminine, in terms of feel."

"Narcotic Prayer" is "about expecting something from a relationship, on any level, that it can't give you, or can only get it yourself, and it's the most lonely thing you finally come upon at some point. I've done it so many times in different relationships, and I do it now."

Musically, Whitley's songs are slippery. He likes odd chords and syncopated rhythms. He describes some songs as lazily shuffling along, but having a tension that pushes them forward, a "lilt," as he calls it. He says it comes from playing solo on the street. "I just am rhythmic more than anything," he said. "I emulated stuff on guitar; I became quite rhythmic just pragmatically."

Another undercurrent in his writing is addiction; he kicked an alcohol problem as his marriage was breaking up. He admits to still drinking occasionally, but his attitude has changed. "I guess I either scared myself, or I think I got more bored with what I was wasting more than anything," he said. "I just like what I'm doing now in my life. I feel like it's more possible now. The dangers are really vivid to me now."

To wit, Metal Head, is a first-person combat game with a lot of nice features and amazing sequences that, when taken together, just don't seem to add up the way they should.

The story is your generic tale of the future. World leaders build an army of bipedal armored tanks to keep peace. But a few of the so-called "Metal Heads" fall into the wrong hands and terrorists use them to lay waste around the world.

So players armed with their own Metal Head must fight their way through mechanized armies of bad guys to wipe out the headquarters of the terrorists. Along the way, players pick up more powerful weapons and play on a well-designed screen to show what lies ahead.

Controls are smooth and the soundtrack includes digitized voices to give mission commands.

Despite all this, Metal Head got cold fast. It seemed almost as if it was pushed onto the market. In my humble opinion, that has been the problem with many of the 32X games I have played. So far, only three 32X games have really turned me on: Doom, Virtua Racing Deluxe and Star Wars Arcade.

Most of the rest are like Metal Head, cool at first glance, but not so much after a few hours in front of the tube. Too bad.

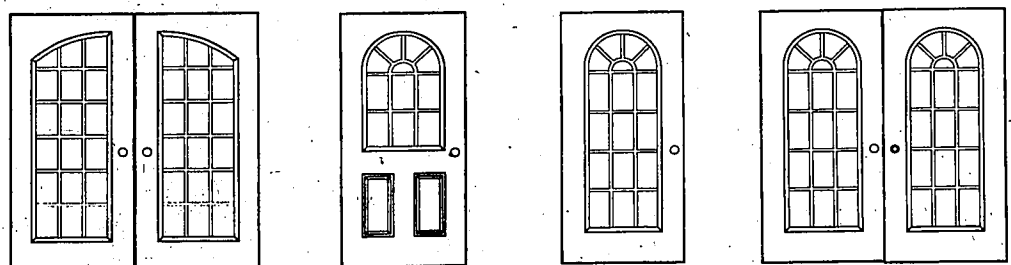

# Merchant's solo work disappoints; Hornsby hits with 'Hot House'

Natalie Merchant, "Tigerlily" (Elektra) — Natalie Merchant's first album without the other 9,999 Monicans is a work of drudgery, pretentious and boring. It gets off to an interesting enough start, with "San Andreas Fault" juxtaposing California's star-machine image and precarious physical reality, but bogs down in a morass of moralizing and

somnambulant tempos. What a disappointment, because Merchant showed on Monicans' albums such as "In My Tribe" and "Our Time in Eden" that she is capable of much more.

Bon Jovi, "These Days," (Mercury) — Still going strong in its second decade, Bon Jovi strikes softly with album No. 7. If you

liked the earlier ones, you'll like the oversized, anthemic choruses of "Hey God" and "Something for the Pain" — but the new hooks don't bite with the vigor of "You Give Love a Bad Name" or "Bad Medicine". And if Bon Jovi's overworked drama and reliance on clichés rankled you in the past, well, that's here, too. "These Days" includes too many Bon Jovi ballads, their cloying nature outranked only by Bryan Adams'. "These Days" finds Bon Jovi flexing its

Teflon muscles. Critics may not get it, but the little girls understand: This is Barry Manilow with rock guitars.

Bruce Hornsby, "Hot House," (RCA) — Pianist, arranger and composer Bruce Hornsby has a knack for smart lyrics about unusual themes over quirky blends of styles. "Hot House" — which features a heady list of guests, including Pat Metheny, Chaka Khan, Jerry Garcia and Bela Fleck — is intelligent pop that comes close to being too

clever, too elaborate for its own good.

Even the otherwise delightful "White Wheelie Limousine" — about a groom with a wandering eye — rushes by loaded with detail. Fleck's rattled solo, soul-style vocal background, big band horns. But then, there are many rewarding moments made more so by the unlikely setting. "The Changes," an "us against them" tale between jazz musicians and philistines, includes a sly quote of John Coltrane's classic "Naima."

# NFL gives Raiders thumbs-up for move to Oakland

CHICAGO (AP) — As far as commissioner Paul Tagliabue is concerned, the Raiders have always belonged in Oakland, not Los Angeles.

So he has recommended that NFL owners approve the move back to where they were one of the league's most successful and feared teams.

According to several sources, Tagliabue faxed all 30 owners a memo Wednesday night supporting the Raiders' move back to the Bay Area, which they left after the 1981 season for Southern California. The owners will vote Friday on the move, announced last month by Al Davis after he chose Oakland's offer over a proposed new stadium in Los Angeles.

"The Raiders have themselves concluded their prospects for a successful operation are considerably better in Oakland, their originally franchised territory, than in Los Angeles," wrote Tagliabue, who as an NFL lawyer in the early '80s was heavily involved in the lawsuit aimed at keeping the Raiders in Oakland.

"They moved by court order over league objection. We had said at the time they were well supported in Oakland."

Still, the meeting is likely to be long.

For one thing, Davis needs approval from 23 of the 30 teams; for another, the move

would leave the league without a team in the NFL's second-largest market following the move of the Rams to St. Louis in May.

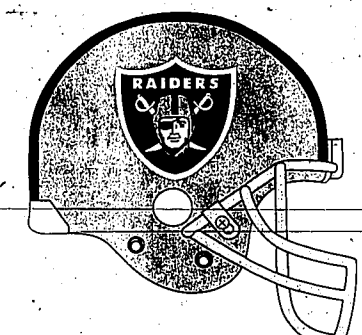
Tagliabue says he hopes to have a franchise there — now or expansion — by 1998, after the current television contracts expire.

There also is the question of money.

The Rams agreed to pay the NFL \$29 million after long negotiations in which the owners first turned down the move and only changed their position after threats of lawsuits. Some owners, notably Edward DeBartolo Jr. of San Francisco, continue to want Davis to pay a tariff for moving.

But Tagliabue and other owners note that the cases of the Rams and Raiders are different because the league never wanted them to move. Davis had to win an antitrust suit to make the move official.

"The Raiders developed Oakland as an asset. Oakland didn't develop the Raiders," one club official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Thursday. "So don't think they should have to pay to go back there."



Others note that the success of DeBartolo's 49ers since the Raiders' move — a record five Super Bowl victories since 1981 — makes it unlikely they will lose support when the Raiders return. During the Raiders' halcyon days in the '70s, the

Niners' were a struggling team; the Raiders a power.

During the offseason, Tagliabue said he would make every effort to ensure that Los Angeles would have at least one team this season and was instrumental in a move to have a stadium built at Hollywood Park that would also be used bi-annually for the Super Bowl.

However, after protracted negotiations, Davis turned down the Hollywood Park proposal in favor of a move back to Oakland. There has been promised \$85 million in improvements, including 118 new luxury boxes and an increase in seating capacity from 53,000 to 65,000 for the start of the 1996 season.

In Wednesday's memo, Tagliabue noted, "Raiders operations in Los Angeles have left much to be desired and the Coliseum has not been a satisfactory stadium. Visiting teams have been troubled by stadium conditions; few Raider home

games are sold out, and there are frequent television blackouts."

Those blackouts could be a positive factor in leaving Los Angeles.

While television officials say publicly they're not happy about having no team in that big a market, they are much more optimistic privately. The absence of a team in Los Angeles will allow Fox and NBC to televise doubleheaders of their choice with a heavy emphasis on the most attractive teams — the Cowboys, 49ers, Dolphins and ... yes ... the Raiders.

There is also an intangible. Some ex-Raiders contend that the move to Los Angeles was one reason they've gone from the top of the league to slightly above average. Their last eight seasons in Los Angeles they were 70-58 with just three playoff appearances and lost 51-31 in Buffalo in their only AFC title game appearance — in 1991.

"I don't think they ever had the home-field advantage in L.A.," says Gene Upshaw, the Hall of Fame guard and president of the NFL Players Association. "I played one year there after 14 in Oakland and the difference was obvious. In Oakland, you had a real crowd factor in your favor. In the Coliseum, you didn't."

Tagliabue apparently agrees.

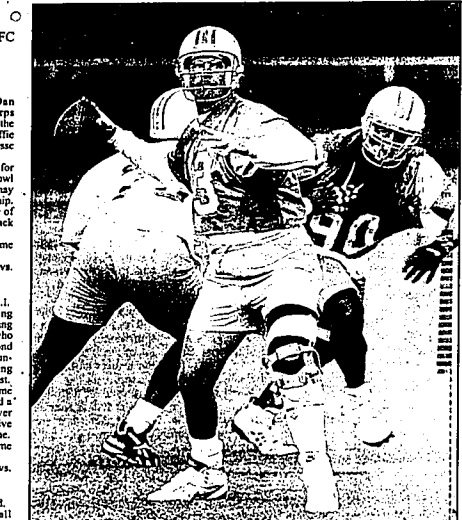

OSLO, Norway (AP) — With Linford Christie, Dennis Mitchell and red-hot Canadians Donovan Bailey and Bruny Surin all set to face off Friday in the 100 meters at the Bislett Games track meet, spectators could get a preview of the World Championships.

Christie, the Olympic and world champion, is tied for fourth this year at 10.05 seconds with American Tim Harden, who also will race at Bislett's famed wooden stadium in central Oslo.

Two others in the top six this year, Bowen (10.06) of the United States and Donovan Powell of Jamaica (10.07), have entered the featured 100-meter race.

Christie says off-track problems his mother died in June and a contractual dispute with the British Athletic Federation wasn't settled until early this month — has not affected his preparations for the World Championships starting in Goteborg, Sweden, early August.

"It's not really," he said. "I've come too far. I've worked too hard. And I didn't get to be Olympic and world champion by being weak. I'm a lot stronger than they think I am. You know, when the going gets tough, the tough gets going and that's me."

## \$240 million is limit for Seattle

SEATTLE (AP) — A key King County Council committee has set the Seattle Mariners the county won't spend more than \$240.8 million on a new baseball stadium.

After voting to impose the spending cap, the council's Budget Committee on Wednesday sent the ordinance setting up a Sept. 19 primary vote on the stadium to the full council.

The proposal would ask county voters to raise the sales tax from 8.2 percent to 8.3 percent to build a retractable-roof stadium for the Mariners, pay the \$70 million bid for last year's Kingdome roof repairs, and make \$100 million of Kingdome improvements the Seahawks football team has sought.

The tax increase would cost the county about \$9 per year. The 13-member council plans to vote on the proposal Friday. Mariners executives told the budget committee that putting a cap on county spending now jeopardizes the possibility of

building a first-class ballpark. Team vice president Paul Isaki said he would try hard to get council members to change their minds by Friday.

Under an agreement reached by County Executive Gary Locke and the Mariners earlier this week, the county and the team had agreed to negotiate a cap later, after selecting the new stadium site, designing it, and finding out how much environmental mitigation the project is likely to cost.

"We think attempting to place a specific limit now is premature and it's unrealistic ... If you attempt to go beyond the promise of a cap at this time, we will reassess our entire understanding," Mariners president John Ellis told the panel.

But committee chairman Peter von Reichbauer said the council needs specific numbers to send to the voters. "The cap is critical to the success of the measure," von Reichbauer said. "Without a cap (the proposal) made this an open blank check."

## Next time, Knight tirade would bring suspension

OVERLAND PARK, Kan. (AP) — Outbursts like the tirade Indiana coach Bobby Knight leveled at a news conference moderated during the NCAA tournament this year more than likely will result in game suspensions in the future, the NCAA Basketball Committee said Thursday.

Indiana was fined a record \$30,000 by the NCAA after Knight's explosive-filled outburst, but he was not suspended.

The committee said it had become concerned because one other head coach and two assistant coaches were reprimanded by the committee during the tournament.

"The committee strongly believes that a major factor in the unprecedented popularity of the Division I Men's Basketball Championship is the wholesome environment in which the tournament is played," said Bob Frederick, athletic director at Kansas and chairman of the committee.

"Consequently, the committee wants to ensure that student-athletes, coaches, administrators, alumni and fans conduct themselves in a manner that is consistent with the operating principles of the association."

The National Association of Basketball Coaches supported the theory of suspending coaches for misconduct, Frederick said.

Knight was irate after an apparent misunderstanding about whether he would appear at the standard post-game news conference following the loss to Missouri.

Someone had told moderator Rance Pugnare that Knight would not appear, but Knight did show up after two of his players had answered questions.

"Who in the hell told you I wasn't going to be here? I'd like to know," Knight yelled before launching into the obscenity-laden tirade.

The fine came in the form of the NCAA withholding revenue that Indiana was due to receive from the tournament. University officials said the fine was excessive but did not appeal it.

## Accusations put Viks under fire

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The Minnesota Vikings already were trying to downplay an array of off-field problems when Felicia Moon accused her husband of beating and choking her this week.

The allegations against quarterback Warren Moon, who was accused of sexual harassment earlier this year, stunned the Vikings. Officials said Thursday they would do whatever they could to help the Moons, but they also were scrambling to defuse another public relations disaster just days before training camp opens.

"It obviously comes as a big shock and a major disappointment that something like this would happen," president Roger Gooden said before a Vikings charity golf tournament. "We're prepared to help Warren and Felicia and the family, and hopefully help them get back on track."

Considered a leading candidate to challenge Dallas and San Francisco in the NFC this season, Minnesota has been beset by controversy almost since the 1994 season ended.

Three weeks after the Vikings were upset by Chicago in a first-round playoff game, allegations of sexual harassment surfaced against head coach Dennis Green and assistant Richard Solomon.

A similar accusation was made against Moon this summer by a former Vikings cheerleader. The entire organization has vehemently denied each claim.

Dissatisfaction also has surfaced in the front office, where numerous employees have been fired or have left in recent years. The latest was longtime ticket manager Harry Randolph, who has said he was fired this month. The team says it was resigned to his departure.

Critics say Green and Headrick, one of several co-owners of the team, have created a cold-working environment that pays too much attention to the bottom line and too little to employee needs.

"My thoughts right now are with Warren and his family," said Green, who hoped to talk to his quarterback later in the day. "But football starts Sunday. We've just got to talk football when we get to training camp. That's all we're going to talk about."

Mrs. Moon told police Tuesday her husband slapped her and choked her nearly to the point of unconsciousness before she was able to escape and drive away from their suburban Houston home.

All-Pro linebacker Jack Del Rio first learned of Mrs. Moon's accusations when he arrived for the golf outing.

"That's unfortunate," Del Rio said. "I hope they're both alright. I know they have a great family."

But Del Rio and teammate Randall McDaniel, an All-Pro guard, said that neither Moon's troubles nor any of

the other off-field problems should affect the team this fall.

"Once I go down to camp it's all about football," McDaniel said. "That other stuff is between them and the people they have to deal with."

Mrs. Moon, a past board member of a women's center that operates a shelter for victims of domestic violence, declined to press charges. But prosecutors are considering whether to charge Moon with misdemeanor assault, which carries a maximum penalty of one year in jail and a \$4,000 fine.

Moon, who has been married to his teen-age sweetheart for 14 years, has not talked publicly about the dispute. His only reaction came in a prepared statement in which he called the argument "very unfortunate" and said he and his wife wanted to work things out.

Moon played 10 years with the Houston Oilers before being traded to Minnesota last year. He has been known publicly throughout his career as a sterling role model and a dedicated husband and father.

That image was tarnished in May when former Vikings cheerleader Michelle Eaves accused him of sexual harassment. Moon denied the allegations and said Eaves was attempting to defame him to make money. They reached an undisclosed out-of-court settlement.

## Tax woes follow Snider, McCovey

NEW YORK (AP) — The Duke came back to Brooklyn, not in glory but in grief.

Baseball's memorabilia market, symbol of a sport mired in money, snared two of its all-time heroes Thursday when Hall of Famers Duke Snider and Willie McCovey pleaded guilty to tax evasion.

"I got caught. I'm very sorry about it. I hope to get a second chance from a lot of my fans," Snider said outside the federal courthouse. "We have choices to make in our lives and I chose to make the wrong choice."

Snider and McCovey joined an expanding lineup of convicted tax cheats in a sport already weighed down by drug problems and lingering resentment from a strike that wiped out the World Series.

Their convictions were the government's latest blow in a crackdown on unreported income from baseball card shows, publicity events, autograph signings and memorabilia shows that became million-dollar businesses in the 1980s.

Snider and McCovey admitted they did not report income from memorabilia shows.

It was especially poignant that Snider's public embarrassment came in Brooklyn, where in the 1950s he was the local favorite in the streetcorner debate over which center fielder was the best in New York.

The crowd outside the courthouse included an old man wearing a worn blue Brooklyn Dodgers cap. Snider, 68, of Fallbrook, Calif., pleaded guilty to conspiracy to commit tax fraud. Appearing before U.S. District Judge Edward R. Korman, he admitted not reporting \$100,000 in cash from card shows and memorabilia appearances from

1984-93. He faces up to six months in prison and a fine of \$250,000 or twice the loss to the government.

His lawyer, Michael Premisler, said he doubted Snider would have to go to jail. No sentencing date was set.

McCovey, leaning on a cane following recent knee surgery, appeared first before Korman. The judge asked if his mind was clear despite high blood pressure and medicine taken for knee and back pain.

"Yes, it is," said McCovey, 57, of Kentfield, Calif.

He faces up to seven months in prison and a \$250,000 fine under the plea bargain.

Both pleas stemmed in part from three days of signing autographs at a 1989 memorabilia show in Atlantic City, N.J. McCovey admitted receiving \$33,000 in cash from the show while Snider said he received \$10,000 and conspired with promoters of the show to hide it from the Internal Revenue Service.

Outside court, Snider said he planned to continue going to the autograph shows.

He said the show promoters told him he did not have to report the income to the IRS, but, "I went to high school. I'm no dummy. I

know the IRS tax laws."

In 1990, Pete Rose, baseball's all-time hit leader, served five months in prison and paid a \$50,000 fine after pleading guilty to failing to report \$354,968 from gambling, autograph signings and memorabilia shows during a four-year period.

Earlier this year, outfielder Darryl Strawberry pleaded guilty to failing to pay between \$75,000 and \$120,000 in taxes between 1986 and 1990. Strawberry was given six months home confinement and ordered to pay \$350,000 in back taxes and penalties.

Snider was the star center fielder on the famed Brooklyn Dodgers teams of the 1950s. With Mickey Mantle of the Yankees and Willie Mays of the Giants, he completed a triumvirate of slugging outfielders that symbolized New York's glory days in baseball.

Snider was a consistent run producer for Brooklyn's Boys of Summer, a team that won pennants in six of nine years beginning with his rookie season. His best year was 1954, when he batted .341 with 40 home runs and 130 RBIs. He had 40 or more homers five straight years beginning in 1953.

McCovey, who played mostly for the San Francisco Giants, retired after the 1980 season, finishing with 521 homers, 10th on the all-time list.

Snider was elected to baseball's Hall of Fame in 1980. McCovey joined him in Cooperstown in 1986.

**A:** I've heard that too but doubt its credibility. My guess is that it started because Hugh, 34, has played gay men in the movie "Maurice" (1987), a Merchant-Ivory production, and "Our Sons" ('91), a made-for-TV film starring Julie Andrews and Ann-Margret.

**A:** I don't think so. Yes, Rod is past the big 30 mark and has a 15-year-old daughter who, he says, wears his old performing costumes. But Rod remains loyal to his current wife, model Rachel Hunter, who is about 25 years his junior.

He's made love to many models, he says, but none more beautiful than his wife. To the twice-

married Rod, that passes for maturity. He recommends that men, in general, "find themselves a 25-year-old wife."

**Q:** Obituaries of Lana Turner invariably point out that she made many B movies, to the extent that she emerged as a veritable "Queen of the Bs." I thought she was a more serious actress. — B.D.

**A:** That estimate is unfair to Lana, the durable glamour star who died last month at the age of 75, and it's hard to tell how such a label was ever tugged to her.

True, her film appearances inevitably began with a few bit parts in big movies, but they were followed by stardom, then superstardom. Even her last movies, though unintentionally funny at times, were made with important co-stars and could hardly be called B's. Despite his on-screen, muscular persona, Sly is a talkative and rather sophisticated man off screen. He says he used to like modern art, but he now prefers classic and romantic paintings.

**Q:** I've heard that John Gielgud, the noted British actor who's been called the finest Hamlet of this century, is such a stickler for tradition and formality that fellow actors are afraid to approach him. Is he really so difficult to deal with? — T.G.

**A:** Anyone who ever saw Gielgud, 91, in the movie "Arthur" must realize that he has a very humorous side to his nature. On the set of "First Knight," the cast (including Sean Connery, Richard Gere and Julia Ormond) didn't know how to address the actor, who was knighted in 1953.

After feeble attempts to address him as "Sir John,"

"Sir Gielgud," even "Your Eminence," the legendary performer just laughed and said, "Why doesn't everyone just relax and call me John?"

**Q:** Is Richard Gere really giving it all up to become a Buddhist priest? — D.F.

**A:** For many years now,

Gere has been a follower of the Dharma Lama, the spiritual and temperate leader of Tibet, still in exile in India. The actor regularly makes retreats to India to refresh himself spiritually. Gere continues to pursue his movie career and his dedication to the Dharma Lama simultaneously.

My Hollywood spies report that Gere will portray a lawyer in the upcoming "Primal Fear." He is also considering a starring role in "The Hundredth Monkey," which is about a whale.

**Q:** Debbie Gibson always seems to have all ways projected a wholesome, cheerleader-like image. Is she really like that? — C.W.

**A:** When Debbie was only 17, graduating from Calhoun High School in Merrick, Long Island, her recording of "Foolish Beat" was the number one song in the country. Her debut album, "Out of the Blue," sold a huge

2 million copies. Now 24, Gibson has refined her bubble-gum pop style, while remaining your basic, Long Island girl-next-door. She is pretty conservative in her personal habits: No pierced body parts, no tattoos, no drugs, no alcohol. She claims she hasn't slept with her soap opera-actor boyfriend in the three months of their courtship.

She has also been nominated for the gold statuette an additional five times for such performances as the recent "Woman on the Run: The Lawrence Bembek Story."

"With all her well-deserved awards, she is proud of her work on behalf of animals. She is very active in a number of animal rights organizations and has marched and picketed for animal causes — she has even convinced her fellow cast members on "Days" to not wear fur. The actress recalls making a startling discovery when she was working on the TV movie "Winning" which was filmed at a hospital. Part of the research at the hospital involved animals. When she learned that they had removed the animals' vocal chords so they wouldn't scream when experiments were being done on them, she immediately voiced her opposition to the barbaric practice.

In addition to her animal rights activities and her acting career, Peggy conducts intensive classes for actors. Not one to rest on her laurels or Emmys, every chance she gets Peggy McCay still works to perfect her craft.

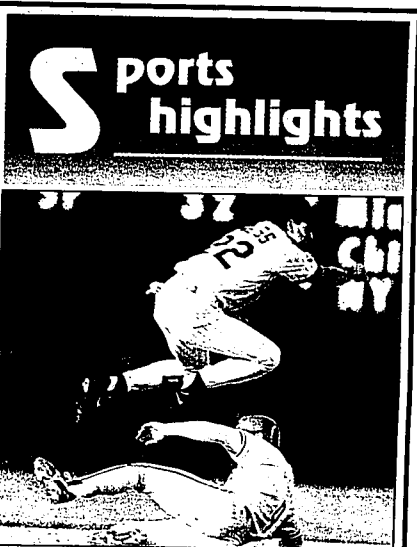
