Dierkes Lake stairs open vistas

TWIN FALLS — If placid Dierkes Lake is hot-weather paradise for sizzling swimmers, it's now equipped with golden stairs, as well.

But these steps aren't a glittering path to the clouds. They're sturdy and rough-hewn and built to take abuse. When finished, they'll carry sightseers to the top of the mesa that separates the pond from the Snake River.

Even so, in their rocky, dusty setting earlier this month, the broad stairways are the latest phase in recreational developments around the lake and will help hikers navigate crevices and boulders on the lake's east end, according to City Manager Tom Courtney.

The flights rise from lake level to a gully, and a final flight — still being constructed — will lift hikers to city property on the lake's north bluff.

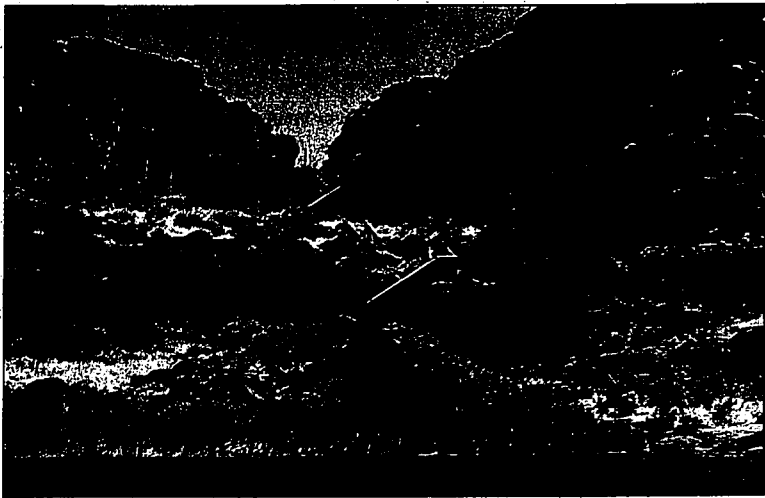
"It's such a pretty area — we want to make it as accessible as we can," he said.

The city intends to complete a looped trail system from the main parking lot at Dierkes Lake, east through the Hidden Lakes, across a creek at Dierkes' east end, up the newly constructed stairs, west on the rim above the north side of the lake and back to the parking lot.

Two points along the north edge will also need wooden stairs before the project is complete several years from now, Courtney said. Much of the trail, including the path to Hidden Lakes, will eventually be accessible by wheelchair, he said.

"This is going to be a really neat facility, a facility that generations will enjoy," Courtney said.

But such a project would have been impossible, he said, without a discounted land purchase from Ken Stutzman, who owns the 120 acres of Hidden Lake Es-

tates, a subdivision currently being developed on the canyon rim directly above Dierkes Lake and Hidden Lakes.

Twin Falls bought the eight-acre parcel, appraised at more than \$450,000, for \$25,000 this spring, Courtney said. "This

was a very generous gift to the city," he said.

The land forms a corridor between the lake's east end and Hidden Lake Estates.

Without the purchase, hikers would have lost access to the north side of Dierkes

Lakes and some stunning views of the canyon, said Chad Browning, superintendent of parks and recreation.

Stutzman is sharing the cost of the lower stairs and donated the boat dock that was

U.S. would lead Serb air war

WASHINGTON — If NATO carries out its threat of a major bombing campaign against Bosnian Serbs, American warplane pilots would be at the forefront of an operation bigger and riskier than any undertaken in Bosnia so far.

Until now, U.S. combat action in Bosnia has been limited to brief NATO air attacks on a small number of targets such as individual Serb tanks, so-called "pin pricks" that were constrained by the need to get advance U.N. political approval.

U.S. planes also have been flying as part of NATO's enforcement of a "no fly zone" over Bosnia. Air Force Capt. Scott O'Grady was shot down June 2 while flying an F-16 as part of this mission.

Now, if Gorazde or other safe havens come under Serb attack, the U.S. role would be much bigger, military officials said, putting the United States at higher peril to suffer its first battle casualties in Bosnia.

Although warplanes from Britain, France, the Netherlands and other NATO nations would participate, the operation would be predominantly American, because most of the available aircraft are American and because of the dominant U.S. presence in NATO's military command structure.

The United States already has dozens of warplanes at the ready, including Air Force F-16 fighters and F-15 ground-attack jets, and F-A-18 attack jets piloted by Navy and Marine Corps aviators. It also has specialized airplanes that can jam the signals of hostile air defense radars or destroy them with missiles.

On Capitol Hill Thursday, Secretary of Defense William Perry estimated the United States would provide half the aircraft of an intensified air campaign.

"They're talking about an air campaign which would be fairly massive," said Rep. Bill Young, a defense subcommittee chairman briefed by Perry.

William Dorch, a senior associate at the

Henry L. Stimson Center, a private research group, said he doubts that U.S. and NATO air strikes — without reinforced U.N. ground forces — will be enough to stop the Serbs in Gorazde.

"We like using air power because it's clean and neat," Dorch said. "The fact that it hasn't accomplished too much historically doesn't seem to dissuade us."

Dorch also noted the danger to fliers from highly mobile shoulder-fired anti-aircraft missiles. "That will be the biggest risk," he said.

A senior defense official described Thursday how the NATO air attacks, if ordered, would unfold in phases. The initial phase would start with bombing of Serb ground troops and air defenses in support of the Bosnian government forces around Gorazde. If that didn't stop the Serbs, the next NATO step would be an escalation against military targets such as airfields, supply routes and ammunition dumps.

A decision on either of these two steps

Wets remember 'forgotten war'

WASHINGTON — They came to remember.

Don Cripps, a paratrooper in Korea, wept as he spoke of his commanding officer, killed by a Chinese machine gunner.

Pat Conacher wore a homemade lapel pin featuring a picture of her late husband, who spent more than two years in a North Korean POW camp.

Francis Xavier Bones came in memory of his boyhood pal, George B. Kennedy, lost in action after 18.

They were among the thousands who paid tribute Thursday to the 1.5 million Americans who fought in the Korean War and watched as President Clinton dedicated a memorial in their honor on the 42nd anniversary of the armistice.

"They set a standard of courage that may be equalled but will never be surpassed in the annals of American combat," the president said. He thanked the veterans for putting "the free world on the road to victory in the Cold War. That is your enduring contribution, and all see people everywhere should recognize it today."

Clinton was joined by South

Korean President Kim Young-sam.

"We are dedicating this Korean War veterans memorial so that all succeeding generations will know how great the sacrifices and devotion of these veterans were and how precious freedom and peace are," Kim said through an interpreter.

After the ceremony — during which scores of people were treated for heat exhaustion — the National Park Service opened the memorial to the public. Visitors streamed past, touching the black granite wall and posing for pictures in front of the statues of 19 infantrymen. In the tradition of the nearby Vietnam Veterans Memorial, people left flowers, pictures and notes at the Korean war.

Earlier Thursday, Clinton laid a wreath in Arlington Cemetery at the Tomb of the Unknowns.

Under a blazing sun, veterans, their families and friends wandered through a tent city erected on the National Mall for the dedication. Many wore T-shirts emblazoned with the memorial's maxim: "Freedom Not Free."

One tent, called the "Memorial kiosk," housed computerized records of Korean War veterans.

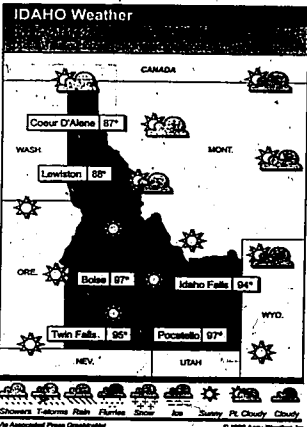

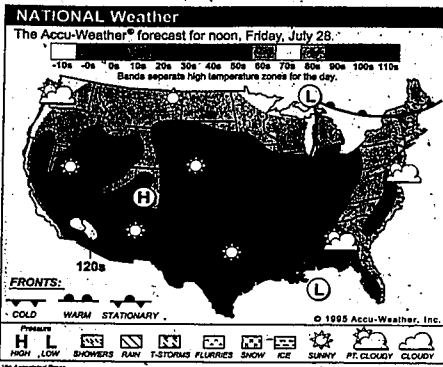

High, low record temperatures grip West

Record high and low temperatures gripped the West while heavy rain fell in the Midwest Thursday.

Record heat stretched from the desert Southwest across western Texas. Las Vegas only cooled to 86, tying the record set one year ago, while Elko, Nev., dipped to 35 degrees, breaking the record of 37 set in 1963. A few miles north, Wildhorse Reservoir froze in 28-degree weather.

A band of intense thunderstorms moved across the Plains and into Minnesota, producing small hail and wind gusting to 70 mph in the Dakotas.

Wind flipped a mobile home on a highway near Sioux Falls, S.D., and numerous trees were uprooted throughout the region.

Strong high pressure over the Southwest was bringing hot, dry weather to the deserts and into central California, the Great Basin and across the High Plains and central Texas.

Temperatures at lower elevations were expected to be near 100 degrees in many areas, and top 120 degrees in the desert.

Thunderstorms were forecast throughout the northern Plains into the western Great Lakes, with a greater likelihood of storms in the Midwest. Tornadoes, indeed, heavy rain and hail were possible in Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Missouri and Illinois.

Thunderstorms were likely along the East Coast from Maine to northern Florida, and across the Appalachians into the Ohio and Tennessee valleys.

A waterspout was sighted in Tampa Bay at Tampa, Fla., on Thursday. No damage was reported.

Today's weather fact

The fastest winds ever reported are those in large, violent tornadoes, where speeds can reach 300 miles per hour. Hurricane winds, by comparison, typically top out at 150 mph. Winds in tropical storms are less than 72 mph. The air swirling in toward the center of the tornado is where the fastest winds are clocked. Considering their power, it's a wonder more people aren't killed by flying debris when tornadoes strike.

Playful kittens call emergency help

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. — If 88-year-old Doretta Garrigus gets in trouble, maybe her cats can dial 911. They did Thursday.

At 4 a.m., 911 dispatchers got a call from Garrigus' apartment. But the caller did not say anything. The dispatcher heard only the continuing beeps of buttons being pushed on a touch-tone phone, said police spokesman Todd DeAngelis.

Because Garrigus' receiver remained off the hook, the dispatcher sent police to investigate.

When police knocked on Garrigus' door, "I came out in my nightgown. I didn't know what was going on," she said.

That is when Sgt. Fred Lloyd found some of Garrigus' five kittens and the mother cat, Mommy, still at the scene of their crime. They were lying on the phone, which Garrigus keeps by her kitchen table. The receiver lay on the floor.

Rocks painted Collision takes at least 1 life

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Forest Service has been giving Mother Nature a hand — painting rock faces newly exposed by construction or landslides along scenic highways to make them look older.

"I said it can't be true. Nobody is that stupid," said Rep. Jack Metcalf, R-Wash., who persuaded the agency to postpone some rock-painting plans on a highway through the Cascade Mountains.

Idaho State Police said the two-vehicle collision occurred about 9:15 p.m. at 1948 South and 1900 East in Jerome County. That location is about two miles south of Interstate 84.

Idaho State Police and Jerome County officers were at the scene late Thursday as investigation of the accident continued.

installed below the steps Thursday, Courtney said.

Though the developer's agreement with the city allows one nearby homeowner's boat to be docked at the site below Hidden Lakes Estates, the dock will also be open for public use, Courtney said.

A "really attractive" rail fence and wall will soon line the boundary between public and private land east of Dierkes Lake, Courtney said. The city will spend approximately \$8,500 this year on the fence and its share of the stairways, he said.

Enough money is budgeted in fiscal year 1995-96 to complete a road that will carry trail-maintenance machinery from the Dierkes parking lot to Hidden Lakes, Courtney said. Crews from the street department and the U.S. Army Reserve will resume work on the roadway this fall, he said.

And more improvements are in the works for the east end of the lake, Browning said.

The city's agreement with Stutzman preserves a strip of land for a quarter mile of public road connecting the subdivision entrance at the north end of 3400 East to the canyon rim at Dierkes Lake's east end, he said.

Evenually, Courtney and Browning hope to see an overlook at that point on the lake and a bicycle trail from the overlook to the existing park.

"It's part of the strategic plan to acquire and preserve easements and rights of way to various points along the rim and develop them as time and money are available," Courtney said.

Eventually, he said, the public will have access by trail systems to a huge area on the south edge of the canyon, from approximately Evel Kneivel's ramp to a spot west of Dierkes Lake.

Memorial organizers are still collecting information for the database from families of the 14,248 Americans who died in Korea, the 81,688 missing and the 389 POWs who have never been accounted for.

Crippes of Pensacola, Fla., had just gotten a printout of the record of his former commanding officer, Edward J. Moloney of King, Wash. He stared at the paper — cream-colored with red borders, bearing a name, rank, serial number, the inscription "killed in action" and a date.

"He took me to Korea with him," Crippes said, wiping away tears. "He was just a wonderful man."

Outside a "military chapel" tent, Bones held a similar piece of paper printed with the name George B. Kennedy, missing in action.

"I came down here for George," said Bones of Bradford, Pa. "We went to school together in southern Philadelphia. ... He was only 18 years old. He didn't have much of a life."

"I think it's a spectacular monument, and most fitting," said Paul Ramsey of Omaha, a Marine infantryman who was wounded in Korea. "I like that salute to the guys in the trenches. And I like the wall that shows how many people it takes to win a war."

His companion, Jim Mortensen of Vacaville, Calif., agreed. "They look exhausted and frightened, and that's how we were most of the time in Korea."

Pat Comacher, who drove from Cleveland to attend the dedication, recalled the day she and her husband, Kenneth, were reunited after he had spent 26 years as a POW. "I got off the boat in San Francisco, she said. "We started running toward each other and we ran into a picket fence."

Congress authorized the memorial in 1986, and President Reagan signed the measure into law. It took organizers six years to win approval from Washington's first and largest planning commissions for their controversial multi-statue design. The monument's cost, set originally at \$5 million, swelled to \$18 million.

On June 14, 1992, President Bush broke ground for the memorial on a 2.2-acre plot of former marshland at the foot of the Lincoln Memorial.

The Korean War Veterans Memorial features a column of 19 battle-clad, larger-than-life-size troops sloping across a triangular field toward a distant American flag. They are cast of stainless steel with a gray patina.

To their right is a black granite wall, into which a mural has been sandblasted. Based on real photographs of those who served, the mural is a montage of the support troops — drivers and medics, nurses and cooks — and the equipment they used.

The Korean War started on June 25, 1950, when North Korea, backed by the Soviet Union, invaded South Korea. An international force led by the United States came to South Korea's aid, and Chinese troops eventually intervened on North Korea's side.

It was the first time an international force was gathered to fight under the U.N. flag and America's first military action to thwart the spread of communism. The armistice of July 27, 1953, ended the fighting, but no peace agreement has ever been signed.

Protest turns violent

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Police used tear gas to break up crowds Thursday as protesters angry over the alleged beating of a black man in police custody threw rocks and looted stores.

Thursday's violence broke out despite promises that the city will investigate whether the man was a victim of racism.

Sides mum on Gingrich probe

WASHINGTON — House Speaker Newt Gingrich answered ethical charges against him in a "very free-wheeling exchange" with the House ethics committee Thursday, but wouldn't share details of the meeting with the public.

Gingrich, who has previously labeled the accusations filed by various Democrats as "pathetic," flashed a Cheshire cat smile and mumbled "it will be an interesting day" as he entered the closed committee meeting.

Afterward, the normally chatty Georgia Republican said only, "I'm through for the day," and indicated a willingness to appear again "at the convenience" of the committee. The panel appears to have put a lid on the public comments of witnesses.

Gingrich was the 11th of 13 witnesses called by the committee. For all the publicity surrounding the dis-



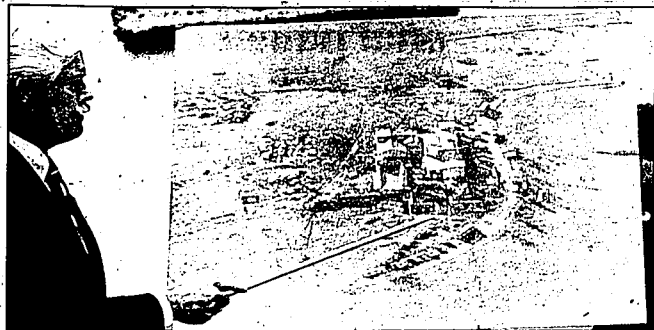

pute, the inquiry is still in an early stage. Calling in Gingrich and the other witnesses, even before the committee has voted on whether the charges merit an official investigation, is an attempt to break a deadlock between Democratic and Republican members. The probe is apparently focusing on the speaker's agreement to write two books for HarperCollins, a publishing company that is part of

Rupert Murdoch's media empire. The charges also involve a twisted college course that Gingrich taught until recently.

One of the books, "To Renew America," is now No. 1 on the New York Times' list of nonfiction best-sellers. The original deal called for Gingrich to receive a \$4.5 million advance for the book, but after a storm of controversy, he accepted a \$1 advance and the standard royalty.

His critics maintain that Gingrich's book contract still is improper because Murdoch's company could benefit from legislation now pending before Congress and subject to Gingrich's influence.

Reno, FBI defend tear gas use, say they didn't know of suicide

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Janet Reno defended her decision to use tear gas to end the siege at Waco Thursday, but she and top FBI officials said they wouldn't have gone ahead if they had thought David Koresh and his followers would commit suicide.

Jeffrey Jamar, a now-retired FBI agent who commanded the Waco operation, said surveillance tapes recorded the Branch Davidians talking about spreading fire and getting ready to start fires. But he added that the conversations were not understandable until later, after the tapes were enhanced.

"If we'd have heard 'spread the fuel,' we'd have stopped right there," Jamar said.

Reno said her decision, soon after she took office two years ago, was "the most difficult decision that I have ever made and one that I live with regularly. Nobody will ever

know what the right answer was."

While Reno was discussing the matter in her weekly briefing, two congressional subcommittees were grilling FBI officials about their roles in the siege.

With Reno's blessing, the FBI fired tear gas into the Davidian compound on the morning of April 19, 1993. A fire swept through the building during the gassing. Sect leader Koresh and 80 of his followers were found dead in the ashes, victims of what the government called a mass suicide.

"Had our crystal ball been working that day, there would not have been an insertion of gas into that compound," Dick Rogers, who headed the FBI's hostage rescue team at Waco, told the subcommittees.

The bureau officials also disputed a previous witness' suggestion that the gas, called CS, could have suffo-

cated children in the compound and may have caused or accelerated the fire.

But at least one member of the congressional panel seemed to accept Wednesday's testimony from George F. Uhlig, a chemistry professor at the College of Eastern Utah.

"Regardless of whether they died from the gas, they were suffocated by our actions, or incinerated," Rep. John Mica, R-Fla., said during Thursday's hearing.

Other Republicans on the subcommittees suggested the FBI became impatient as the standoff dragged on and decided to use gas even though Koresh indicated he might be ready to surrender.

Jamar and other FBI witnesses testified that they considered the surrender plan a ruse, since Koresh had reneged on earlier deals to come out.

Jamar said he first proposed the tear gas plan in late March.

Clinton signs compromise measure cutting funds for social programs

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton signed \$16.3 billion in social-program cuts Thursday in a compromise with Congress, even as the House debated new slashes in housing and environmental efforts that steeled the two sides back to a collision course.

Seven weeks after vetoing an earlier version as too harsh, Clinton put his pen to a bill trimming scores of ongoing education, job training and other programs. The bill also contains \$7.2 billion for California and other states that have been hit by recent natural disasters, anti-terrorism efforts and debt relief for Jordan.

Republicans launched the effort to make cuts in already-approved spending five months ago as a first step in their balanced-budget drive. But stalemate reined until lawmakers restored \$733 million for school reforms and other administration

priorities. Congress finally sent the president the bill last week.

"We agree we should balance the budget; we disagree on how," the president said as he signed the measure at the White House. "But this shows that we can work through those disagreements."

No sooner had he spoken, however, than the House took up a \$79.4 billion measure for the coming fiscal year that would shrink housing aid for the poor and elderly and slash the Environmental Protection Agency's budget by one-third.

The wide-ranging bill would also restrict enforcement of air and water pollution and food safety laws, kill Clinton's national service program, and reduce spending for NASA, veterans and dozens of other programs. Overall, it would spend \$11 billion less than this year and \$10.5 billion less than Clinton requested.

There was other spending action, too. House-Senate bargainers hoped to reach agreement on a compromise bill financing Congress itself.

Pigs hold promise for liver ailments

WASHINGTON (AP) — Researchers are ready to use genetically altered pig livers to prolong the lives of people critically ill from liver failure.

The Food and Drug Administration has given clearance for physicians at Duke University to treat liver-failure patients by routing their blood through livers from a strain of pigs developed to be compatible with the human immune system. "We're ready to start now, as soon as an appropriate patient is ready," said John Logan, of Nextran, a company formed to investigate the use of pig organs for human transplants.

Teachers' union issues wary report on states' standards

WASHINGTON (AP) — Forty-nine states are developing academic standards for their students, six years after the nation's governors first urged such reform, supporters said Thursday.

But the efforts may stall unless educators ease conservatives' suspicions of the process, said Albert Shanker of the American Federation of Teachers.

"The good news is that the movement to upgrade academic standards has taken hold all across the country," said Shanker, whose teachers union did the survey. "But it also needs more time."

The standards movement sprang up during a 1989 meeting of governors called by then-President Bush, after the "Nation at Risk" report found that schools failed to teach adequate math, science or English and graduated students who failed to learn.

"The kids say, 'Why work? I'm going to get promoted anyway,'" Shanker said. "And one of the reasons employers don't get grades is because they don't know what they mean."

Many business leaders support standards as a back-to-basics movement, as initially did some conservatives.

But many conservatives have since come to believe the federal government is pushing state or national standards to usurp local school boards' control. Conservatives also believe liberals have jumped at a chance to push their beliefs. In California, parents complained bitterly that a statewide assessment test to measure students' learning under new standards asked personal questions, sometimes about family beliefs.

Shanker contends state standards are needed to ensure American children learn as much as European and Asian

peers. It's not enough to encourage school districts to develop local standards, because an estimated 20 percent of children move, leaving teachers bewildered about their knowledge level, he said.

But conservatives say parents should decide what local schools teach children. "We simply think parents know what's best," said Bob Morrison of the Family Research Council in Washington.

They also believe the year-old Goals 2000 law supported by President Clinton, which provides money for state reform efforts including standards, is coercion by the federal government.

And they are pushing for elimination of a national board that would certify standards for states that voluntarily submit them.

Iowa is the only state that does not have, or is not developing, statewide standards, leaving that to school districts.

The AFT study found:

- Of the 49 states that have drawn up standards in math, English, social studies and science, only 13 have standards specific enough to give districts and teachers guidance to develop lessons or buy textbooks.

- Only 31 states have begun any type of assessment — such as tests — to measure whether students learned up to new standards.

- Only seven states require students to meet 10th, 11th or 12th grade standards to earn high school diplomas. Fourteen states require students to pass "minimum competency" tests — usually 8th or 9th grade material — to graduate.

- Only seven states examined what other nations teach to see if their standards measured up.

Congressional panel debates what qualifies as a flight delay

WASHINGTON (AP) — If one airliner is delayed by a thunderstorm, a second by an engine problem and the third by an air traffic control breakdown, how many should be counted as late?

That question perplexed the House Transportation aviation subcommittee Thursday as members pondered a Transportation Department plan to exempt mechanical problems from on-time reports.

Under current rules, all three of the airliners would be tardy if they arrived more than 15 minutes after their scheduled time. But that's only been the case since Jan. 1.

Before this year, delays caused by mechanical problems didn't count. And federal regulators are considering going back to that system.

Including mechanical delays in on-time reports gives consumers an accu-

rate accounting of airline performance, according to consumer activists and some industry officers.

"It's important to consumers to know if a company is not maintaining its planes, not upgrading older ones," said Rep. Robert Menendez, D-N.J.

But others argue that safety could be compromised if mechanics felt pressured to approve use of planes in order to keep on schedule.

Today's major airlines would never knowingly encourage workers to release an unsafe plane, said Rep. James L. Oberstar, D-Minn. "But we cannot assume that every airline will place the necessary priority on safety."

Transportation Secretary Federico Pena raised the possibility of restoring the mechanical-problem exemption following an aviation safety conference in January, where concerns were expressed that managers might press

mechanics to approve planes in order to avoid delays.

Robert W. Baker, executive vice president of American Airlines, argued in favor of counting mechanical delays in an airline's on-time performance so the information would have consumer credibility.

"The counter-argument that safety would be compromised by mechanics in their zeal to avoid reportable delays is wholly without merit and is insulting," he said.

Delta Vice President John Lauber agreed, saying that deterring the mechanical delays "impugns the integrity of our employees."

The on-time reports filed since Jan. 1, when mechanical delays were included, are the first since the system was begun in 1987 that accurately reflect true air carrier performance, Lauber said.

Myers pleads not guilty to DUI charge

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former White House press secretary Dee Dee Myers pleaded not guilty Thursday to a charge of driving under the influence of alcohol, but the charges could be dropped.

A Superior Court commissioner said she was eligible for a driver education diversion program, and if she successfully completes the program the charge could be dismissed.

Her attorney, Jay Dugan, said it was typical for people to qualify for such a program if they have no prior arrest, the blood alcohol level registered below intoxication and there are no accidents on their record.

Commissioner Morton Berg set a Sept. 21 hearing to determine if Myers has successfully completed the driver's education course.

'Suicide genes' fight cancer in animals

BAR HARBOR, Maine (AP) — Injections of viruses armed with "suicide genes" have eradicated brain tumors and colon cancer in lab animals, opening the way to an entirely new kind of cancer treatment, a researcher said Thursday.

Similar experiments have also corrected hemophilia in dogs, when the viruses were engineered to carry a gene to repair the blood-clotting defect, said Savio Woo, a biologist with the Howard Hughes Medical Institute and the Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"The results were unbelievable," Woo said. "The tumor just went away. Every animal responded." He described the work at a meeting of geneticists at the Jackson

Laboratory in Bar Harbor. Woo said he is "fremendously optimistic" about the new science of gene therapy. But he tempered his optimism with a reminder that enormous scientific obstacles remain to be overcome before the research leads to a safe, effective treatment.

"We need to be aware how technically challenging it is," he said. "There is also fundamental cell biology and immunology we need to learn."

In a new study, Woo clipped what he called a "suicide gene" from a herpes virus and injected it into tumors of mice with colon cancer. He also injected a virus carrying an immune-system stimulant to intensify the

effect of the suicide gene.

The tumor cells absorbed the suicide gene, making the cells susceptible to a drug called ganciclovir, which is used to treat herpes. When the mice were given ganciclovir, Woo saw "dramatic" death and regression in the tumors, he said.

Edward Birkenmeier, who is doing similar research on inherited diseases in mice at the Jackson Laboratory, said the future for gene therapy remains unclear.

"I think it's going to work, but it's not going to be that straightforward. Each disease is going to be different. ... Which diseases will be first, which will respond well, which may never respond well, isn't clear yet."

Emperor prays for atomic bomb victims

HROSHIMA, Japan — Before thousands of flag-waving spectators on the hottest day so far this year, Japan's emperor and empress prayed Thursday at a memorial for victims of the world's first atomic bombing. Emperor Akihito and Empress Michiko bowed three times toward an eternal flame that burns under a small arch near where the bomb was dropped, then laid flowers at a memorial bearing more than 186,000 names. About 140,000 people were killed immediately or died soon after the United States dropped the bomb on Hiroshima on Aug. 6, 1945, but the memorial also bears names of people who died since then from causes attributed to the bomb's radiation.

Study: Smoking parents up kids' ills

LONDON — Children whose parents smoke cigarettes get several respiratory infections, including tonsillitis, laryngitis and bronchitis, more than three times as often as other children, a Greek study says. The study, to be published Saturday in the medical journal *The Lancet*, says children between the ages of one and five exposed to their parents' smoke have an increased risk of several diseases. Researchers measured a nicotine byproduct, called cotinine, in 501 children, then interviewed parents to confirm that the presence of cotinine was a result of their smoking, wrote Dr. Chryssa G. Bakoula.

Rain raises health questions for hostages

SRINAGAR, India — Heavy rains flooded parts of the northern state of Kashmir Thursday, raising fears about the health of an American and four European hostages held by separatists, government officials said. Kashmiri rebels kidnapped the five tourists on July 4 and have threatened to kill them unless India frees 21 jailed militants. They reportedly are on the run to avoid Indian soldiers searching high mountains. The hostages, who may not have a change of clothes, are probably getting soaked during the day, the officials said on condition of anonymity. Nighttime temperatures in the region are around freezing.

Workers find unexploded shell from war

TOKYO — The Japanese military on Thursday removed an unexploded one-ton shell believed to have been dropped from a U.S. plane during World War II. Construction workers found the shell three yards below ground near a moat at Osaka castle, a tourist spot 255 miles west of Tokyo, Self-Defense Forces spokesman Susumu Shindo said. The 415-year-old castle remained open while bomb experts disarmed the shell, which had 330 pounds of explosives.

French subway bomb probe eyes Algerians

PARIS (AP) — Evidence increasingly points to Algerian militants as the ones behind a deadly subway blast in Paris, a prosecutor said Thursday, as investigators identified bits of what may have been the bomb.

Meanwhile, police responded to at least 41 bomb scares — all unfounded — and detained hundreds of people in a nationwide manhunt, two days after the bombing that took seven lives and injured more than 80.

The Louvre museum was evacuated for the second day in a row following a crank phone call, forcing 1,500 visitors onto the street. Another telephoned bomb threat briefly disrupted traffic at

Roissy Airport, and two Paris train stations — Lyon and Montparnasse — were evacuated after abandoned packages were reported. But most tourist areas and subways still bustled.

RTL radio, citing a police report, said a police assistant reported seeing two men he described as North African hurriedly leave a large bag inside the train one station before the bomb blast.

RTL said the police assistant heard one of the men say: "There's going to be a party tonight at Saint-Michel."

A lead investigator said he could not confirm the report, but told *The Associated Press* the evidence so far points to Muslim militants in Algeria.

"From all I hear and see, I think the fundamentalist lead is advancing more than the others," said prosecutor Francis Bantut. "It would be the Armed Islamic Group."

The extremist network has targeted officials, foreigners and other civilians in Algeria in its battle to topple the military-backed government in the former French colony and establish an Islamic state.

Paris maintains strong ties with the Algerian government, angering the militants. The Algerian newspaper *La Tribune* reported on July 17 that the Armed Islamic Group had threatened to carry out "bomb attacks in Paris to punish the French government," according to the *Le Monde* newspaper.

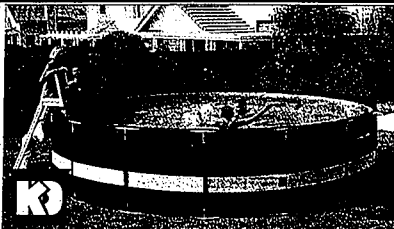

The 2nd time around, Filer board comes through

Along with monitoring the curriculum and making sure the bills get paid, a local school board also ought to set an example of moral behavior for the community's children. Board members in Filer did that beautifully this week, with a demonstration of how to act after making a mistake.

Last week, beset by a handful of cantankerous critics, the board voted to ban tape recording of its meetings by the public. The decision brought the board statewide publicity, including a couple of hard slams in newspaper editorials. (The message from this corner featured the words "indefensible," "petty" and "arrogant.")

By the time they gathered for a meeting Wednesday, the board members were feeling abused, and they said so. But instead of putting on a defense, they humbly admitted that the decision was a clunker. They promptly rescinded it.

Bravo for them. Their candid response sort of makes us regret all those omery comments in that earlier editorial. Filer is lucky to be served by board members (unpaid ones, we might add) who are so willing admit a mistake.

What's troubling, however, is that other Idaho school boards may be prone to similar missteps. The Filer board copied its rule from a handbook of model policies, published by a lawyer who specializes in advising

school boards. Lots of other districts have the same manual.

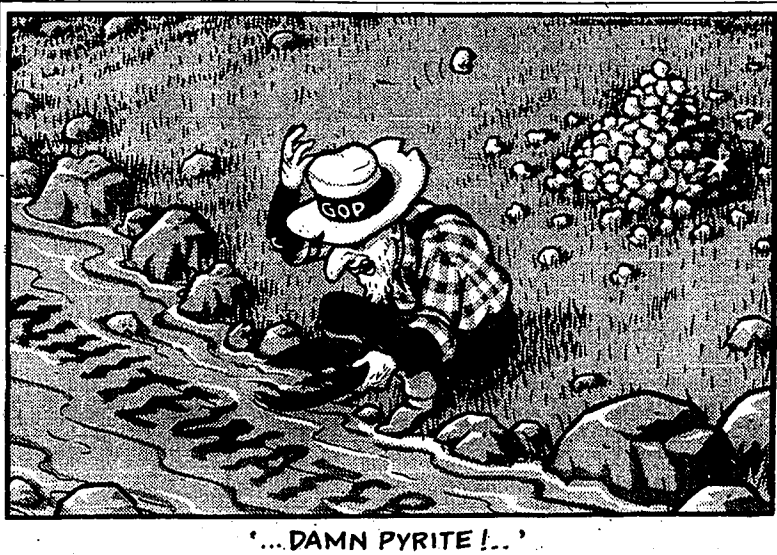
In practical terms, a ban on tape recordings may not seem like a big deal. But an important principle is involved. Citizens are supposed to have access to meetings where decisions are made about public institutions. That access includes the right to take notes and otherwise record the proceedings. Records kept by citizens can help keep public officials accountable.

The law is clearly against bans on taping. Monte Carlson, a lawyer representing this newspaper, told the Filer board that his research had uncovered many court rulings that supported a citizen's right to record public meetings. He found no cases supporting the opposite viewpoint.

In a roundabout way, the Filer board members actually performed a public service by passing the no-taping rule. All the unpleasant publicity they endured should remind officials elsewhere about the public's rights.

In general, public agencies should be careful anytime they contemplate rules that limit public access to information. They should be humbly respectful of the taxpayers' position as owner and boss.

Filer School Board members displayed that kind of respect this week, and they should be congratulated.



U.S. should avoid taking stand in Bosnia

One of the enduring arguments of the clique that is urging the United States into Bosnia is the assertion that American "leadership" is at stake. It is a bizarre concept. We get to go to war for a lost cause with the additional privilege of picking up the check.

In the great debates now underway in Congress over Bosnia, "leadership" is a word of which to beware. Those who use it generally want a "strong" president — one who would plunge us into disaster.

Americans should be clear about what is happening. With Congress pushing for abandoning the international arms embargo on Bosnia, which ultimately would end U.N. peacekeeping efforts, we are headed for a wider war.

As President Clinton warned, ending the embargo will "increase the chances of injecting American troops." Not only would it be necessary to send 25,000 American soldiers to help extricate U.N. troops, pressures would also rise on Clinton to supply arms to the beleaguered Bosnian Muslims, tempting the Russians to supply the Serbs. Result: a wider war, with far more weapons, and a threat that both Turkey and Greece might be drawn in.

No one should forget that World War I started in Sarajevo.

The concept of American leadership, of course, has a magic ring for most of us in the generations since World War II. We've been there. We know that American leadership was crucial in the rebuilding of Germany and Japan and in fending off the Soviet Union for nearly 50 years. We're proud of that and we have a right to be.

It is also worth noting that somewhere along the way an obsession developed with the idea



of American leadership. We could do it all. We could go anywhere and call the shots.

In Vietnam we learned, bitterly, that it wasn't that easy, that there were limits to American power. Perhaps it would be more accurate to say we should have learned. It is clear not everyone has.

Newt Gingrich, for example, the energetic speaker of the House and all-purpose expert on everything, has not.

In a recent speech he spoke of his concerns about American policy in Bosnia. Our policy, he said, should be to withdraw the U.N. peacekeepers and then say to the Serbs: "We insist on a general cease-fire, and we are telling you right now we reserve the right to hit every target in every part of the country simultaneously if you don't stand down ... We're going to break you, and we're going to do it in three days."

Then there is Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., a long-shot aspirant for the 1996 Republican presidential nomination. Lugar wants to send 100,000 NATO troops to Bosnia, perhaps a third of them American, with the objective of forcing the parties to the bargaining table.

Those who do remember Vietnam will recall that a major stated objective of American bombing was to force the communists to the bargaining table. Hah.

The basic questions, almost always avoided by those beating the drums for greater American involvement, are: (1) Exactly what

are American "vital interests" in Bosnia? and (2) Why, after four years of civil war, is it suddenly so important that we dive in?

We do know this. Clinton, and George Bush before him, have never believed that vital American national interests were at stake in Bosnia. Both have tried mightily to keep the United States out of war.

Clinton has always publicly advocated a tougher policy than Bush, but has seemed totally disingenuous. He apparently has wanted to be perceived as a strong leader, but has had no clear and consistent idea of where to go.

He has musked up his positions so many times that it is difficult to know exactly what he does intend. The danger for him, and us, is that we may be sucked into an unwanted war because he's weak, and can't resist pressures from those clamoring for more "leadership."

Right now, however, Clinton's persistent waffling is probably good. This country would have been a lot better off in Vietnam if Lyndon Johnson had thought less about posing as a strong leader, and more about waffling. Clintonesque waffling in Vietnam would have saved upwards of 58,000 American lives.

It is worth recalling, perhaps, that the greatest leader of all in legend was the Pied Piper of Hamelin. He led the children of Hamelin into a cave, and they were lost forever. It would be different in Bosnia. We would be led into a quagmire — and asked to pay for it.

Dozens of letters and think pieces in Fiddleman's name have been printed in newspapers in recent years, with no mention of his NRA affiliation.

The amusing part of the Fiddleman fiddle is how Blackman came to be exposed. One of his sideliners is defending the tobacco industry, and after he wrote a critical letter about a tobacco study to the Journal of the American Medical Association, the author of the study recognized his "turgid and convoluted style." A victory for English teachers everywhere.

Look, Dick, Look, Jane. See the Republicans defend their freebies. Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole and his troops are about to kill a bill that would bring gifts to members of Congress from lobbyists.

Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., is carrying the Republican alternative bill, which would allow members to continue to receive free meals, free entertainment and

free vacations. The McConnell bill would permit our solons to take free trips to the Virgin Islands or any other glamorous resort for themselves and their entire families. Tickets to the Super Bowl, dinner at pricey restaurants, expensive wines — you name it, they can still take it.

The good guys on this issue are Democratic Sens. Carl Levin (who has already managed to tighten the lobbyist registration law), Russ Feingold and Paul Wellstone and Republican Sens. William Cohen and John McCain.

We pay these guys \$133,600 a year. On that, they can afford their own damn baseball tickets and vacations in Hawaii. OPM is an old bit of political shorthand standing for Obvious Pay-Off, which SOS means Same Old Steeze.

The sleaze factor in the Republican Congress is out of control, which is not to say that the Democrats were ever squeaky-clean. But at least under the Democrats we never had lobbyists actually writing the laws.

The list of incidents in which lobbyists representing the nation's largest corporations and industries have dictated the wording of legislation, conducted official staff briefings, advised committee counsel during formal bill markups, drafted official committee reports on legislation and even sat in the seats reserved for members during committee hearings runs to pages. The Republicans are using lobbyists — almost all from big business — as staff members, which happens to be illegal.

I used to think that our system of campaign financing — most of it provided by political action committees for the special interests — was an open sewer. I never imagined that it could get worse, but the Republicans are setting new records for shameless greed.

or "Broke, need money, God bless." For those of you who are conned into falling for the con artist's game, we're sorry.

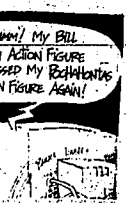
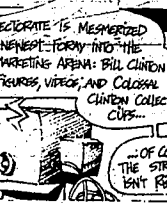
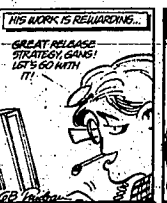

activist Wu**

BEIJING (AP) — The Chinese government claimed Thursday that an American human rights activist charged with spying has confessed to using false identities and documents to film news reports about Chinese prisons.

The government unleashed its propaganda broadside against Harry Wu, a naturalized American who immigrated from China after spending 19 years in prison camps, in a report by the official Xinhua news agency and a videotape of his

purported confession. The grainy black-and-white footage of "See the Lies of Wu Hongda," titled after Wu's Chinese name, provides one of the first glimpses of the activist since he was detained 6 1/2 weeks ago.

Wu, 58, sits in an armchair, his head bowed, hands nervously clasping and unfolding. In the small room, two police officers sit in front of him and two others flank him.

One of the officers asks Wu about two documentaries he made for the British Broadcasting Corp. last year on forced prison labor and the transplanting of organs from executed prisoners.

But while Xinhua claimed that Wu admitted he intentionally made errors editing and scripting the documentaries, the videotape shows him putting much of the blame on the BBC.

"Who edited the commentary?" the policeman asks.

"The BBC," Wu replies, his chin pressed against his chest. — The interrogator/asks if the report has "any foundation."

"I've said it's wrong," Wu says. In London, the BBC said it stood by the reports, adding the video was "clearly" made under duress.

Much of the confession — including Wu's acknowledgement that he lied about his identity and that hidden cameras were used — was made clear in the reports, which were shot in April 1994.

Neither the videotape nor the Xinhua report give any indication of how long Wu had been questioned before the confession, nor when or where the interrogation took place.

The 13-minute video, sold by an ostensibly private Chinese company to several Western news agencies for \$3,000, contains the interrogation interspersed with excerpts from the BBC documentaries.

The prison labor documentary showed leather jackets, children's clothes and other goods being sold outside a prison, and asserts the goods were made by prisoners — as are half northwestern China's exports. The Chinese government denies the charges, and said there was not even a prison near the market shown.

Wu purportedly agreed that those things were incorrect and blamed the BBC for introducing them into the report, as well as for reporting that footage of a cemetery showed prisoners' graves when the graves did not belong to prisoners.

Wu also admits in the video that he "deceived people" during a visit to a medical university. He and BBC producer Susan Roberts posed as married scholars from Tuscaloosa, Ala., looking into a kidney transplant for a sick uncle.

"None of the doctors told me the kidneys were from condemned prisoners," Wu says in the videotape. "All said they were from brain-dead patients."

**Tests secure army
might, China says**

BEIJING (AP) — After six days of missile tests that unnerved Taiwan, China said Thursday the firings proved that the military was capable of "defending the unity of China."

The tests were widely seen as a warning to Taiwan, whose leaders have been trying to break out of Beijing's diplomatic isolation.

The tests were slated to last until Friday but were called off without explanation two days early. Taiwanese newspapers said the missiles were expensive and China was afraid of scaring off Taiwanese businesses from investing in mainland China. Typhoon Faye was also approaching the splash site.

China said the People's Liberation Army tested six missiles and all hit their targets in the East China Sea, 90 miles north of Taiwan. But Taiwanese said a seventh missile was fired and missed, landing in China's coastal Fujian province.

Looking to get ahead

Program aims to keep Hispanic youths in school, beyond life in the fields

TWIN FALLS—Of course you want to finish high school. But what do you do if you're 17 and just married?

That's the plight of Carlos Nunez, who will be a junior in Homedale High School this fall in northern Owyhee County. He's been married a month and is trying to decide whether to stay with his wife.

"If I stay married, I'll have to support her, so I'll probably get my (general equivalency diploma) and work," he said during a tour of the College of Southern Idaho campus Thursday. Staying married might ruin his chances of getting his diploma and the four-year education he dreams of, he says.

Nunez's visit to CSI with 36 other Hispanic high school students was organized by the Idaho Migrant Council as part of four-day tour of several colleges. They are enrolled in an eight-week program targeted at students in danger of dropping out of school and designed to retrain farm workers to cope with changing technology.

At first he seemed glad to about education. His farmworker parents never graduated from high school, but want him to do so, he said.

"My dad really encourages me to stay in school and to get as much education as I can," he said. "When he was my age, he didn't have the chance."

Although the numbers vary, Hispanic dropout rates range between 40 and 60 percent, according to state figures. Only one of Nunez's buddies has graduated.

"To tell the truth, almost all my friends have dropped out," he said. "That kind of surprises me. What's going to happen to them?"

He wants to help his family, he said.

"I want to make a difference to my whole family because they've been working in the fields," he said. "That's the only thing they know how to do."

An aunt who graduated from college is rooting for him. The Idaho Migrant Council would help with tuition, books, gas, food, child care and rent if he

Surplus funds means raises, bonuses for Twin Falls teachers, if approved

TWIN FALLS—Teachers in the Twin Falls School District will see a 4 percent salary hike next year, as well as a sizable bonus in August.

The items were part of a tentative contract settlement announced Thursday by the district and the Twin Falls Education Association.

If teachers ratify the contract on Aug. 24, they will agree to share in future budget surpluses and also to forego raises in subsequent years if the district sees a revenue shortfall.

Having teachers share in excess cash is nothing new. Asking them to help ease a possible deficit is.

"We're all a team now," said School

Board member Dave Sass. "We understand that sometimes there's money and sometimes there's not."

This year, there is money — an extra \$700,000. In August, 49 percent of that will be divided among the teachers, about \$600 to \$700 apiece. The remainder will go to administrators' salaries; cooks' and custodians' wages, furniture, and supplies. Superintendent Terrell Donicht said.

The money came from insurance premium refunds, increased state funding, lower costs and a better return on invested money, Donicht said.

A surplus has previously occurred only once in the past seven years. In that case, teachers received about \$100 each, Donicht said.

As part of the settlement package, newly

hired teachers will be able to transfer up to 20 years of experience to the district. Previously, they would receive salary and benefits equal to a teacher with seven years of experience.

That seems a major victory for the teacher's union, but union representatives were quick to point out the benefit to the district.

High school math teacher Tammy Redabaugh, who sat on the bargaining team, said the clause means the district will become more attractive to more experienced teachers.

Sass agreed.

"We've had some people say they wouldn't bother applying," he said. Donicht lauded the settlement.

"It's been a very positive experience," he said.

Fixed-price deal aims to help hospital, Blue Cross boost financial efficiency

TWIN FALLS—For the county hospital's Blue Cross patients — 10 to 15 percent of Magic Valley Regional Medical Center's customers — lower and controlled costs will be a guarantee.

Starting Tuesday, the hospital will accept a fixed price from Blue Cross of Idaho for every health-care procedure done for the insurance company's traditional-insurance policyholders.

The agreement means the hospital will be reimbursed the same price for every appendectomy, for example, no matter how much each operation costs the hospital to do, said Ken Deibert, the hospital's vice president for administration,

Thursday. That will help the hospital manage costs, he said.

Meanwhile, the insurance company will know how much it has to pay for each procedure and charge its policyholders accordingly, Deibert said.

"They will have stability in their premiums from Blue Cross and potential decreases in actual premiums," Deibert said. "What we have worked out in our contract is we are assuming risk as a health-care facility."

Blue Cross of Idaho, the state's largest health insurer, has fixed-price payment arrangements with 16 hospitals serving three-quarters of Idahoans, said company spokeswoman Tracy Andrus.

In the Magic Valley, Twin Falls Clinic

& Hospital has fixed-price agreements with Blue Cross for both traditional insurance and managed-care plans, while St. Bernard's Family Medical Center in Jerome has an agreement for managed care, Andrus said.

"By spreading the financial risk between hospitals and insurers through this type of payment arrangement, patients and policyholders benefit from lower health-care costs," Andrus said.

Magic Valley Regional Medical Center and a local doctor's group, Magic Valley Health Network, also are negotiating with Blue Cross for a contract to offer local employers managed-care plans for their employees. The hospital and network want to form a physician-hospital organization.

Disabled Heyburn student still struggles for access

HEYBURN—Yvette Gonzalez is like a lot of other 15-year-olds — she likes to play Nintendo, talk on the phone with her friends and watch football.

But she says the one difference between her and her peers — she uses a wheel chair — has been magnified by the Minidoka County School District's foot-dragging on compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, which passed July 26, 1990.

The act requires all programs, activities and services provided or operated by state and local governments, including schools, to provide full and equal access to people with disabilities, said Pam Howard of Heyburn. Howard is the chairwoman of the state advisory council for vocational rehabilitation, southeastern Idaho project coordinator for the Idaho Citizens' Network and a disabled activist.

Yvette's mother, Mary Gonzalez, said she has been talking to district officials about mak-

ing schools accessible since her daughter was a first-grader at Heyburn Elementary.

At Heyburn Elementary, she convinced school officials to install wheelchair ramps, but they didn't install automatic doors at when she complained the existing doors were too heavy for her daughter to open, she said.

When Yvette was at West Minico Junior High School, she was successful in having a bathroom remodeled so she could use it, Gonzalez said. But a friend had to get Yvette's lunch for her because she couldn't push her tray down the food aisle.

Wednesday Yvette and Gonzalez, Howard, Minidoka County School District Assistant Superintendent Robert Pavlock and school officials toured Minico High School, where Yvette will begin the tenth grade Aug. 23. Officials listened to Howard and the Gonzalez' requests for more access.

Pavlock said Thursday that the district will have wheelchair accessible bathrooms, telephones and drinking fountains, along with

INEL awaits DOE go-ahead

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Officials at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory are awaiting federal approval to begin operating a remnant of a controversial — and terminated — reactor project that scientists believe will be easing the site's radioactive waste problems.

The Energy Department is expected in the next several days to authorize INEL's Argonne National Laboratory-West to start using the electrorefiner, which was originally a component of the waste-reducing Integral Fast Reactor.

As they were with the reactor project itself, critics remain concerned that the electrorefiner could lead to a proliferation of weapons-grade nuclear material.

An independent National Academy of Science panel gave Argonne a limited endorsement earlier this month to proceed with the technology to see if it works and saves money.

The technology would break down spent nuclear fuel into its three components, something Argonne spokesman Dick Lindsay said will cut disposal costs because future rules are likely to require expensive safety certification for more than 100 different nuclear waste fuel types before disposal.

Hoping to spend less to produce more easily disposed of waste, researchers expect to apply what they learn from stabilizing their own fuel to other fuels in the federal storage inventory.

David Hoffman, director of the Nuclear Control Institute, and other critics claimed that technology could be converted to produce plutonium instead of burn it, creating a proliferation threat. They also claimed it was a waste of public money and would create more waste problems than it solved.

But the scientific panel's review said electrorefining is incapable of producing pure weapons-grade material, and Lindsay said any nation wanting to build nuclear weapons would find it easier to build a plant to chemically separate pure plutonium.

Gooding murderer loses appeal

BOISE — The Idaho Court of Appeals has unanimously rejected a bid to have the fixed life prison sentence reduced for one of two men convicted for the 1993 murder of a Gooding County couple.

The three-judge court ruled on Thursday that 5th District Judge J. William Hart did not abuse his discretion in sentencing Thomas Robert Petersen on two counts of second-degree murder for killing Ricky Lee Mangum and Connie Allen.

During a two-hour period on Sept. 14, 1993, Mangum and Allen were beaten with a tire iron and tied up, their throats were slashed and Allen was raped in the couple's home north of Gooding.

Petersen, 26, pleaded guilty to the slayings in February 1994 and agreed to testify against his co-defendant, Robert Tony Johnson Jr., in exchange for the prosecution's promise not to seek the death penalty.

Hart sentenced him to two life terms without the possibility of parole, but Petersen argued that the sentence was excessive under the circumstances of the case and his potential for rehabilitation.

Petersen and Johnson, who also got life in prison, blamed each other for the most violent acts and those that eventually led to the death of their victims. But Hart found that society could only be protected by keeping Petersen in custody for the rest of his life.

The appellate court said the not rule on whether the possibility of rehabilitation, the district court determined that Petersen could not successfully be rehabilitated. Judge Darrel Perry wrote for the Court of Appeals. "Therefore, the court noted that rehabilitation was secondary to the protection of society, deterrence and restitution in Petersen's case."

The appellate court ruled on whether it agreed with Hart, but considered only whether the sentences were "plainly excessive under any reasonable view of the facts."

Idaho forests fall short of timber goals

GRANGEVILLE (AP) — The meager flow of logs from northern Idaho's Clearwater and Nez Perce national forests may rise next year, but the timber industry has its doubts about the future.

Harvesting goals for the two forests will fall short of their respective targets at the end of the fiscal year on Sept. 30.

Industry spokesmen claim the current low price of timber makes it impossible for them to profit from some of the offered sales.

Clearwater forest officials said it was hoped 35 million board feet of timber could be harvested this year.

To date, 13.5 million board feet have been offered, said Dallas Emch of the Clearwater. With another 19 million in the process of being made available, that should bring the total for the year to about 26 million.

Last year, the Clearwater implemented an "Operation Pipeline" strategy to offer over a five-year span an

average volume of 40 to 50 million board feet. It offered 28 million in 1994.

There are reasons why the forest has not reached its goal, including consideration of endangered salmon and watersheds. But Clearwater officials add several sales have been offered with no bidders.

Thomas Shaffer of Clearwater Forest Industries at Kooiks said with low timber prices, many sales are out of the price range.

"It makes no sense buying it if you're going to lose money. Right now the lumber market is terrible, so you can't afford to go out and pay tremendous prices on stumpage," Shaffer said.

John Bennett of Shearer Lumber Products at Kooiks said prescribed methods of logging can make a timber sale too expensive, especially in a fire area where burnt trees are worth "maybe half of live ones."

"So you end up with a lot less value

He said the project will restore the forest to the condition it had in the 1800s and will be repeated elsewhere on the forest.

Decades of fire suppression created a forest thick with lodgepole pine and Douglas fir, instead of diverse ponderosas with their fire-resistant bark. That primed the timber for insect infestations and fires like last year's, which burned 190,000 acres on the Boise Forest.

The timber project is to be put up for bid this month, barring legal challenge on administrative appeal.

It will cover a 28-mile stretch, one-half to one mile wide, along the South Fork of the Payette River from the Pine Flats Campground to Grandjean.

Innovative sale will save ponderosas

BOISE (AP) — A timber harvest that would leave giant ponderosa pines standing and remove fire-prone trees aims to make the Boise National Forest healthier and safer.

Motorists along Idaho 21 east of Loveland are dismissing the difference from conventional logging, too, when the project begins by early next summer.

Instead of chopping down all the usable trees and leaving an ugly patch of stumps, loggers will cut smaller live trees and diseased or burned timber. They will leave big, healthy, bearing pines that give the route from Boise to Stanley its name: the Ponderosa Pine Scenic Byway.

"We hope to reduce the risk of killing wildfires like the Lowman fire that burned across Lowman and along the highway in 1993," says Longman District Ranger Walt Rogers.

WASHINGTON — Sen. Larry Craig is annoyed with federal land managers in Idaho — this time because they're publicly criticizing a pro-mining bill he supports.

But despite the cheering scene, Nunez admits he comes seriously close to becoming another dropout statistic.

With a GED, he would probably end up working and leave his dreams of college behind, he said.

"What pain would he expect? "I think it'd be a little bit better than minimum wage at least," he said. "Probably not as much as I'd like to earn."

Stories like Nunez's occur all too often, said Andy Rodriguez, director of the Idaho Migrant Council in Twin Falls.

"Kids are gunning about going to school and finishing," he said. "But if they make a mistake, if you want to call it that, get married young and start having children, then all those dreams they had about going to school start falling apart, it's not a tangible goal for them."

On the other end of the spectrum,

Michelle Gaxiola and Claudia Mesina are fed up with working in farm fields.

"Working in the fields is for donkeys, not for humans," Mesina said her parents told her. When she was 9, her parents forced her to hoe beets, pick potatoes and weed fields because she wanted to drop out of school as soon as she was 16.

"They said, 'You like this job?' I said no. They said, 'If you quit school, you'll end up working here all your life.'"

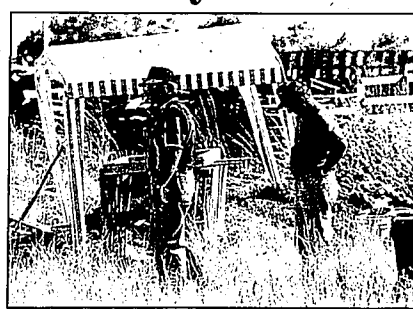
She graduated as an A and B student this spring. She plans to study bilingual education at Boise State University this fall.

Gaxiola also graduated this spring and is also interested in bilingual education. She isn't sure where she will start and when, but knows she wouldn't be satisfied with field work.

Police find 2nd body buried at Utah farm

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Detectives unearthed the remains of a second body from the sludge of a canal at a westside Salt Lake pig farm Thursday, and believe a prison informant will lead them to more bodies at other sites.



approached by the inmate several months ago, sources said. It took this long for the detective to confront him to cooperate with a multi-agency homicide task force that has been looking in to unsolved cases stretching back several years.

An initial dig turned up nothing. But sources said the inmate insisted they go deeper. On Wednesday,

after damming the canal at either end and bringing in a pump to keep water seepage down, the first bone was found.

Expert doubts chemicals killed fish at Heyburn

BURLEY — A water quality specialist doubts chemicals used to kill canal moss caused hundreds of fish to die in mid-June at the mouth of a drainage ditch that runs into the Snake River in Heyburn.

But finding culprits who may have dumped chemicals "We could be out there for days. I'm afraid we might have a dumping ground."

So far, investigators have recovered enough remains to account for two bodies, including skulls. Riet said the office is awaiting dental records for positive identification.

than blaming the kill on xylene, a moss-killing chemical used to clean out canals, Cizmach said. Water samples tested normal, which Cizmach predicted they would since it appeared the system already had flushed itself out by the time he made it to the site.

"I didn't expect to find something, because there were fish swimming by the time I'd got there," he said.

Heyburn residents found the dead fish — including carp, suckers, chubs and bass — July 14 in the drainage ditch.

Two canals drain into the ditch. But fish and vegetation were fine upstream of the kill and closer to where xylene had been dumped into the canal, Cizmach said. Meanwhile, vegetation near the mouth of the drainage ditch is dead or dying, he said.

Cizmach said he hopes fish tissue samples collected from the dead fish will turn up more evidence of what killed them. Test results are not in yet, he said.

Investigators have said that many things could be responsible for killing the fish, including xylene, pesticide runoff from fields and hazardous chemicals dumped into the ditch.

HMOs find open territory in Idaho

BOISE (AP) — A small percentage of Idahoans receive their medical care through health-maintenance organizations, but that is bound to change, marketers forecast.

Statewide, perhaps 3 percent of the population has that coverage. By comparison, the rate in California is as high as 90 percent, by some estimates.

Nationally, the organizations have become popular with employers who want to hold down rising health-care costs.

Members get their health care through a network of medical professionals and hospitals. Usually, those who want to see a doctor outside the network cannot do it, unless they want to pay for the visit themselves.

So far, the Boise Valley has only one health-maintenance organization, and only a fraction of residents belongs to it.

"I love it," said Mali Garner, a member and a service representative for Blue Cross of Idaho.

Garner pays \$10 for a doctor visit, period. There is no deductible and no co-payment, as there is with traditional coverage.

Janet Lizaso does not share Garner's view. "I'm unhappy with it," said Lizaso, a programming clerk at Idaho Public Television. Lizaso is canceling her coverage for several reasons, including high premiums.

Lizaso's doctor is not in her network. She wants to keep seeing him, but cannot under the rules.

The two women have coverage through a Blue Cross of Idaho plan called Idaho-Preferred Healthcare.

Blue Cross soon will have competition. At least two other companies plan to offer in the valley.

One is Primary Health Inc., a Boise company with plans to market an HMO in 1996.

QualMed Washington Health Plan, which now covers about 9,000 people in northern Idaho, plans to enter the Boise market Sept. 1.

The area looks good for several reasons. QualMed's development director Jim Alton said.

As larger markets like Seattle become saturated with HMOs, companies are looking to stake out relatively uncharted territory, he said.

People who live in the Boise area have characteristics that make them good customers, Alton said. It has an educated, white-collar work force.

Studies show people are less likely to smoke, drink and eat to excess if they want to school longer. That, in turn, makes them less prone to some diseases.

Lizaso said she is prepared to declare bankruptcy and have bad credit for a while if an unexpected medical tragedy visits her house.

That kind of talk frustrates Blue Cross spokeswoman Tracy Andrus.

"Every person who elects to do that raises the cost of insurance premiums for those who take care of their own health-insurance needs," Andrus said.

Professor suspended after porn probe

CHENEY, Wash. — The thousands of child pornography pictures found stored in the campus computer of an Eastern Washington University professor were for research, his wife says.

Peggy-Lynn Boggs said her husband, Russell, a geology professor, gathered the photographs for her.

Mrs. Boggs, an English graduate student, said she was comparing the work of two erotic writers, D.H. Lawrence and Milan Kundera. Both write about children and sex, she said, and she needed to see photographs of child pornography to "identify with the characters."

University officials learned of the pictures in early June but didn't suspend Boggs until Wednesday, the day after a judge in Spokane ordered that two search warrants detailing the case be made public.

Boggs, 42, is being investigated by police for possessing photographs of minors engaged in sexually explicit conduct, but has not been charged with any crime.

Boggs and his wife accused the university of blowing the case out of proportion to try to dump him from the faculty.

Firm, EPA reach pact on coolant

BOISE — A Post Falls company and the Environmental Protection Agency have reached an agreement on the regulation of a hydrocarbon-based coolant that the government alleged was a fire hazard.

OZ Technology Inc. sued the EPA in U.S. District Court in Boise earlier this month, alleging that the agency violated its own rules and regulations by essentially banning the company's HC-12a refrigeration coolant.

The coolant, which is OZ Technology's primary product, is a substitute for freon-type, CFC-based coolants that will be phased out starting in 1996.

The company markets and distributes HC-12a for use in commercial air conditioning, ice skating rinks, cold storage warehouses, vending machines, household freezers and refrigerators and motor vehicle air conditioning systems.

But an EPA issued an order limiting and discouraging use of the coolant effective July 13. The agency said the product was a fire hazard, but OZ Technology challenged that analysis.

Victim's family sues over selling drink

BOISE — The family of a woman who died after an April 14 car accident has sued a Boise restaurant for selling a drink to the other driver.

Audrey Ann Patrick, 36, allegedly bought a drink at The Dutch Goose in Boise before getting into her car and colliding with Sharon Brinkley. Brinkley's car, Patrick was charged with vehicular manslaughter and was scheduled to appear today before Ada County Magistrate Thomas Morden.

On Tuesday, Hodges' husband, Joe, and three children — Joe Hodges Jr., Jamie Hodges and Natalie Huff — filed suit against The Dutch Goose and its owners. The Hodges' attorney, Kurt Holzer, refused to say why Patrick was not named in the personal-injury lawsuit.

Thomas Moroney III, one of the restaurant's owners, said The Dutch Goose denies the allegations in the lawsuit but declined further comment.

A Cache County sheriff's dispatcher said there were no reports of injury or damage.

The epicenter of the quake, which was recorded at 11:04 a.m., was located two miles west of Wellsville, Nava said.

Eastern city may get nuclear arms project

AIKEN, S.C. (AP) — Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary is giving strong hints that the Savannah River Site will land a major nuclear weapons project that could bring thousands of jobs to the facility.

O'Leary, during her two-day visit to the Aiken area this week, boosted

sprits at the beleaguered nuclear weapons complex, where hundreds of employees have been laid off this year as the Energy Department adjusts to the post-Cold War era.

"The experience is here," she told workers Wednesday. "The community support is here."

O'Leary pressed to say whether her visit could be a signal that the site has been selected for the tritium gas project, O'Leary said. "Yes, I think you might read a signal in that."

Savannah River currently reprocesses and recycles tritium for the military.

The nation's supply is expected to run out in 15 years because of natural decay.

South Carolina and the Nevada Test Site are the main contenders for the new tritium project, which would produce the gas for the next 40 years.

"I'm bound and determined ... that we get the cost right," said O'Leary, who is waiting for results

of a financial analysis. "And we better be certain about the technology. I want to make sure it works."

The options are a linear accelerator, a new, still untested technology that reportedly offers a cleaner processing system, or a new production reactor. O'Leary wouldn't say

whether she had decided on a particular option.

The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory had at one time been considered for the new production reactor, but public opposition to nuclear weapons

work in eastern Idaho was strong. "The project could mean as many as 2,000 new jobs."

O'Leary assured workers at the sprawling nuclear weapons complex on the South Carolina-Georgia border that they would continue to have a role in the future of the department, which is now focusing on handling nuclear waste and cleaning up contamination from previous years.

Different jobs will be available in the future, O'Leary said, and current employees should feel exhilarated by the prospects.

"These are good jobs we have," she said.

"What's more important than global security and environmental cleanup?"

Senate committee backs judge for federal post

The Senate Judiciary Committee has unanimously approved the nomination of Idaho 6th District Judge Lynn Winnmill as Idaho's next federal judge.

Winnmill's confirmation now goes to the full Senate for a final vote.

Judiciary Committee confirmation hearing last week and urged the panel to act quickly on the nomination.

"The Judiciary Committee's unanimous vote shows what high regard other senators have for Judge Winnmill," Craig said after Thursday's action. "He has passed all stages of his confirmation with flying colors, and now the next and final step will be confirmation by the full Senate. I think that will happen soon and without any problems."

Craig and Kempthorne have asked Majority Leader Bob Dole for full Senate action as soon as possible, and no later than the August recess.

Barry White is back — and his voice still speaks volumes

There's no mistaking the sound of Barry White.

Whether it's coming from a concert stage or a home stereo, the velvety depths of his voice are unlike anything you've heard in popular music. Even over the telephone, there's something truly profound about that basso rumble.

Consequently, a lot of people assume that he owes his success to the weight and power of that voice. But it's not quite that simple. Because if you listen to his best work — anything from the classics "Can't Get Enough of Your Love, Babe" and "You're the First, the Last, My Everything" to the recent "Practice What You Preach" from his "The Icon Is Love" album — you'll find that the secret behind his sound isn't the voice, but the way he uses it.

"Yeah, absolutely," he rumbles in agreement. "That's why the strings have always been there, to soften



that voice. The trick is to give variety to that voice. The right lyrics for that voice to speak or to sing.

White

White perfected that sound in 1973, and the world responded almost immediately. Between his own recordings and those he produced for both Love Unlimited (a female trio) and the Love Unlimited Orchestra, White generated \$16 million in sales that year. And that was just the beginning.

Some of that success he credits to having the right sound at the right time. "In almost every business, timing is a key element in business," he says. "No matter what you come with, what idea you have — is the time right?"

Uris' 'Redemption' a mere shadow of 'Trinity' Display artwork at Jerome Fair

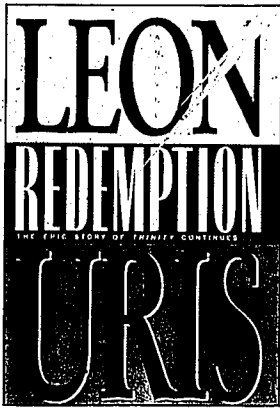
At the conclusion of "Trinity," Leon Uris' sweet and meaty tale of Ireland and the generations leading up to the Easter Uprising of 1916, the author writes: "In Ireland there is no future — only the past happening over and over again."

With "Redemption" (Harper-Collins, \$25) his sequel to "Trinity," Uris has taken himself literally. Not only does he repeat many of the scenes from "Trinity" and summarize its events endlessly, but he also reworks the overriding theme of strained familial relationships and frustrated nationalism, with much less resonance and weight than in the earlier volume. The title of the 827-page tome describes its only new dimension — mostly the redemption of characters from "Trinity," some of whom died in that book but are fleshed-out in this new book and made stronger and more admirable with supplemental background.

Moving back and forth across years and decades, Uris uses the English occupation of Ireland as the backdrop for an early-20th-century awakening of the collective Irish psyche.

His storytelling, supported by his historical accuracy, works well, despite the predictability of the characters and the tremendous amount of evidence that tie them all together. The author obviously identifies with and is fascinated by the "shannachie," Irish storytellers of old, who passed down Gaelic lore and history in a mystical manner.

A storyteller character provided much of the strength of "Trinity," mainly in the form of the first-person narrator Seamus O'Neill; life-long

confidant of Conor Larkin. In "Trinity," the "shannachie"-like hero worship lavished on Conor (resistant to women, beloved by men, and divinely transcendent) worked like a long shadow of Jameson's on a cold night in Kinsale. With "Redemption," the memory of Conor in an anonymous third-person narrative becomes ghostly and somewhat silly. The small, three-part "interlude" in which Seamus O'Neill reappears as first-person narrator is just more

recapping and glorifying of the original work, adding repetitious style to repetitious content.

This regurgitation is prevalent throughout the volume, and even the new character of Rory Larkin, Conor's nephew, is simply Conor incarnate, with his brawling fitness, his military instincts (despite his poetic soul), and his perfect sexual prowess. He even captures two of the three stalwart female hearts won by Conor himself.

Rory's restlessness drives him out of New Zealand and onto the battlefield on behalf of England. A big part of the novel is set in Cairo and in the blood-soaked hills of Gallipoli during World War I, scene of a military disaster that has been largely blamed by historians on a young Winston Churchill. Churchill appears regularly in the book, as did his father, Lord Randolph, in "Trinity."

Uris also uses other historical figures (such as Yeats, Parnell and Gladstone) as he did with his novels from the 1980s, where David Ben-Gurion and Moshe Dayan played alongside his fictional characters (Ben-Gurion makes a cameo appearance in "Redemption").

The author plainly loves Ireland and has a firm grasp of Irish history and the Irish mind-set, as well as the many layers of pride, ignorance, fear and lost culture that pervade the island.

Uris' work is commendable for chronicling budding Irish nationalism, traditional Orange Unionism, and the emergence of the galloping and emotional Sinn Fein party, moving in where the Irish Party failed in its parliamentary attempts at bringing about home rule.

But in "Redemption," Uris' prose has fallen from "Trinity's" driving, delicate interweaving of a substantial and classic tale to a dry, choppy and repetitive rehashing. Fresh material comes too late — more than halfway through the book.

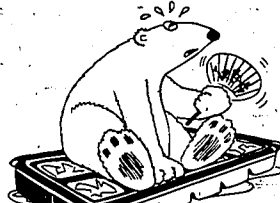

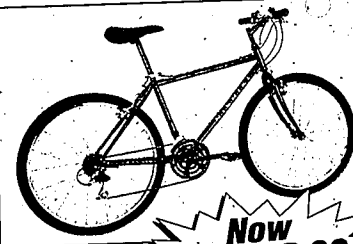

Boyz II Men approach legendary status

If a symbolic baton has been passed from vintage Motown to the new company, it's wrapped in the smooth, rich harmonies of Boyz II Men.

Motown founder Berry Gordy Jr. said as much at the dedication ceremonies of the renovated Motown Historical Museum in Detroit and "The Motown Sound" exhibit at Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn. In his comments, Gordy specifically thanked current Motown chief Jheri Bussby for Boyz II Men, calling them a group "that could have been as much a part of the original Motown as it is the current company."

There's no question that Boyz II Men is the hottest and most durable group to come out of the Motown stable since the Commodores during the '70s. Since debuting in 1991, the Philadelphia quartet has sold more than 17 million copies of its three albums. The latest, "II," has sold eight million and is still in the Billboard Top 10, 44 weeks after its release.

The group has also been a hit machine, from its debut single "Motownphilly" — appropriately enough about the musical common ground between Detroit and Philadelphia — to its latest hit, "Water Runs Dry." Boyz II Men shares the record, with Whitney

Houston, for the longest run at No. 1 in Billboard. Its "I'll Make Love to You" logged 14 weeks in the top spot. The way the four Boyz see it, however, such prodigious success

is to be expected from anyone working under the Motown banner. "Just being on the label, you are carrying something of that tradition on," says Shawn Stockman, 22.

"The old slogan was that Motown was 'The Sound of Young America.' As young Americans on the Motown label, we're trying to carry on that tradition."

Years bring success, new maturity to Bon Jovi

Jon Bon Jovi and Van Halen's Sammy Hagar were chatting backstage before a concert at London's Wembley Stadium. Hagar complained that his throat hurt.

Bon Jovi was empathetic. But not entirely sympathetic. "He's not entirely sympathetic," Bon Jovi, 33, says, by phone as Van Halen takes the stage. "I told him 'Mine is hurting, too. Now get your ass out there and sing.'"

The advice may seem a little heavy for Bon Jovi to offer Hagar — who is, after all, a decade and a half his senior and was making albums while Bon Jovi was sweeping floors at his cousin's New York recording studio. But at this juncture, the New Jersey rocker enjoys a formidable stature himself.

It has been 11 years since "Runaway" appeared on a New York radio station compilation album and became the New Jersey rocker's first hit. Since then, a combination of catchy, anthemic tunes and videogenic good looks have made Bon Jovi — the group that bears his surname — a constant on radio, MTV and concert stages, selling almost 60 million records in the interim.

Its newly released album, "These Days," comes on the heels of last year's "Crossroads," a greatest hits set that sold more than 12 million copies worldwide and launched its biggest single to date, "Always."

The new album is off to a strong start: While Bon Jovi was headlining three sold-out Wembley dates before almost 200,000 fans, "These Days" debuted at No. 1 on the British charts,

knocking off Michael Jackson's well-hyped "HIStory."

In the United States, the album debuted in the Top 10 of the Billboard album chart.

"I honestly will tell you that my life is wonderful," says Bon Jovi, who was born John Bongiovi in Sayreville, N.J. And that's not only because he sells records by the crate.

He has a family: wife Dorothea, his high school sweetheart, a karate champion, and their two young children, Stephanie and Jesse James. They live in a spacious home down the road from Bruce Springsteen in Rumson, N.J. He drives a sleek black Mercedes S500, and the band travels by private jet.

So life is good, but "These Days" doesn't revel in Bon Jovi's riches. Instead it's an album of serious thoughts and hard questions, songs that

run deeper than the shopping malls and backstage love affairs that populated the group's mega-selling '80s albums.

"My overview of the world around me has changed from when I was 20 years old doing my first record ... to being 33 and doing this record. I have more to say," explains Bon Jovi, who brings his band — guitarist Richie Sambora, drummer Tico Torres, keyboardist Dave Bryan and bassist Hugh McDonald — to Pine Knob on Aug. 26.

Sambora, Bon Jovi's songwriting partner — and the new husband of "Melrose Place" star Heather Locklear — says that taking eight months to write the songs for "These Days" allowed them to tap into those emotions.



Mad Max sprouts fins

Costner's pricey 'Waterworld' may redeem his hero image

In its splashiest moments, "Waterworld" is as viscerally exciting as "Terminator 2." At other times, it merely flounders in picturesque settings.

At times "Waterworld" has the simplicity of mythical legend. Other segments have the confusion of a chaotic Hollywood production.

But the sink-or-swim conclusion is: "Waterworld" delivers as an action-adventure flick. It's jump-into-the-swimming-pool-and-cool-off summer entertainment.

Movie review

It's not the classic that those involved in the arduous production probably hoped for; it lacks the unified vision of a Steven Spielberg or even a James Cameron. But it's watchable, and it holds your interest even if you're not sure where it's going.

Whether it was worth all the effort is now a moot point, but "Waterworld," with a record-breaking budget reportedly between \$175 million and \$200 million, is worth the price of a ticket.

The plot is linear, although the movie's high-voltage explosiveness tends to confuse things. In the distant future, the polar ice caps have melted, submerging the planet in water. Artifacts from sunken cities are the main objects of bartering, and the environment leaves everyone in an extremely cranky mood. Urine is recycled as drinking water, and human beings, dead or at least almost dead, are subject to recycling as well.

If the seas are savage, the humans are no less so. Marauding pirates called the Smokers (just where did they get all those cigarettes?) are led by the comically depraved Deacon (Dennis Hopper, often with pirate patch over one eye). Wickedly advancing toward the atolls on jet skis, they plunder every floating city, sometimes just for the fun of it.

Initially, the good guy (played, as almost everyone must know by now, by Kevin Costner) seems virtuous only by comparison. Our first glance of him is shockingly unimpressive — he purifies and then drinks his own urine. Clearly, Costner's Mariner has learned to make the best of a bad situation, but he's none too happy about it. He's also a mutant, part human and part fish, with gills behind his ears and webbed feet. Whatever other qualities he possesses, he's one terrific swimmer.

When sentenced to be recycled by suspicious atoll-dwellers, he's saved

by Helen (Jeanne Tripplehorn), a strong-minded woman who believes in the myth of Dryland. Her adopted 10-year-old daughter Enola (Tina Majorino) is being sought by the Smokers because the girl's tattooed back may point out the secret route to the rumored green acres. The Mariner grudgingly gives Helen and Enola sanctuary on his trimaran, a weather-beaten but deliciously colorful mode of transportation.

The highly publicized tug-of-war between star/co-producer Costner and director Kevin Reynolds shows in the film's change of tone. The first half is mythical, albeit sometimes self-consciously so; the second half is a more traditional Kevin-Saves-The-World (or what's left of it) adventure.

But the action scenes are often fantastic, the sets are awesome, and there's enough intriguing gadgetry to please even the staunchest gizmo fanatics. The movie looks like it cost \$100 million (which, considering the final price tag, may not be praise).

Costner redeems himself, mythical hero-wise, from the crushing disappointments of last summer's "Wyatt Earp" and 1991's "Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves." Even in the Mariner's grumpiest moments, he has more charisma than sad-eyed Sheriff Earp. And Costner swings from the Mariner's most more dashingly than he swashbuckled through Sherwood Forest, (*Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Ace Theatre*)

Forget 'The Net': Even Bullock can't make it good

If "Demolition Man" was the movie that got the buzz going on Sandra Bullock, "Speed" was her first blockbuster, and "White House Wedding" was the first time she carried a film, that would make "The Net" Bullock's first completely forgettable motion picture since she became a star. By all rights, this one should vanish from her official celebrity bio even before its video.

Movie review

As cyber-whiz Angela Bennett, Bullock is a lonely gal who works at home and spends her nights munching on computer-ordered pizza by the glow of a virtual fireplace.

Angela's quiet existence changes suddenly when she comes into possession of a computer disk that is, of course, loaded with ultra-hush-hush data. As a result, she becomes a fugitive, electronically stripped of her identity by the evil geniuses who are plotting to destroy her and, not incidentally, our entire American way of life.

In theory, this "Pelican Brief" meets-Johnny Mnemonic premise is certainly intriguing enough — particularly the notion of a person's identity being erased or altered simply by tampering with computer files. The problem is that producer-turned-

director Irwin Winkler ("Night and the City," "Caddy by Suspicion") simply has no idea what he's doing.

I take that back. He knows what a producer ought to know: how to latch onto a hot topic and a hot star.

Winkler also appears to have picked up enough from the directors he has worked with to give his film a certain second-hand slickness. It's possible that The Net could haul in a respectable box-office total, although that would be very depressing.

This would-be director's idea of building suspense is to have people tampering with computer or type furiously on their keyboards. (They also talk to

their keyboards a lot, in hushed, urgent tones.) Is the dialogue by screenwriters John Brancato and Michael Ferris really as flat and phony as it seems? Or does it just sound that way because the characters are so insubstantial that they're really virtual characters? We're offered a lot of information

about Angela, for example. But it adds up to so little in terms of actual personality that the movie oddly seems both over- and underwritten.

And speaking of Angela's personality: When are filmmakers going to realize that just because Sandra Bullock isn't blond, that doesn't mean she isn't sexy? There really ought to be something other than losers and nerds for this appealing actress to play.

Jeremy Northam is cast as an attractive Brit who picks up Angela in Mexico. And comedian Dennis Miller pops up as her former shrink, although his smart-aleck persona is used far more crudely here than it was in last year's made-for-cable space movie, Disclosure.

Diane Baker plays Angela's mother, a victim of Alzheimer's disease to whom our heroine desperately turns when she can't find anyone else to verify her identity. The poor woman can't even remember her own daughter's name, which, in this unusual circumstance, may be something of a blessing in disguise.

I'm putting this movie out of my mind as fast as I possibly can. (Mail Cinema, Century City of Burley, Ace Theatre of Wendell)

Video action that never slows down

"After Burner" — A faithful adaptation of the coin-op arcade game, After Burner for 32X is as fast and fun as it gets. The mission is straightforward: Wipe out two communication bases deep in enemy territory with your heavily armed fighter jet.

Flight controls are smooth and intuitive — a necessity considering it requires both sharp shooting and fancy flying to knock down enemy jets and dodge what seems like a never-ending hail of flak.

Ammunition is replenished at various points throughout the game, but its supply is limited, adding to the realism by requiring players carefully to choose targets, rather than just unleash missile after missile.

Anyone who has played a combat flight simulator knows how critical speed can be.

After Burner is plenty fast. Scenery races by below and enemy formations scream by as missile plumes obscure targets ahead.

With so much action going on at once, most games would slow down, but After Burner takes it in stride. In fact, it moves and looks better than some of the games for the \$400 Sega Saturn, which brings up this question: Why can't they all be this good?

"Donkey Kong Land" — Sometimes even the best ideas can turn out bad. So it is with the Game Boy version of the groundbreaking Donkey Kong Country. Despite its potential, Donkey Kong Land ends up crumbling under its own weight.

Donkey Kong Country — for those who have been living in a cave — amazed Super Nintendo owners with incredible graphics that beat some of the 32-bit games just now hitting the shelves.

And it was a hoot to play. The elements of its big brother remain intact in Donkey Kong Land, and, to a certain degree, that is its downfall. Play remains enjoyable, but is actually hindered by the graphic detailing stuffed into the banana-yellow cartridge.

Game Boy is not Super Nintendo. Even under the best conditions, Game Boy's tiny, black-and-white, liquid crystal display can be tough on the eyes. Yet the designers of Donkey Kong Land tried to recreate the richness of Donkey Kong Country's scenes on a screen that frankly cannot cut it.

What results is a screen full of black and gray blobs that are nearly impossible to track. Even with the Super Game Boy adapter, it's tough to figure out what's going on.

Designers would have done better to simplify the graphics, making them more like plain old Donkey Kong, one of the all-time greatest Game Boy games.

Instead, Donkey Kong Land is too much of a good thing and ends up bad.

"Full Throttle" — As a rule, adventure games bore the shorts off me. More often than not, players assume the role of some prince or fairy or someone and wander through tired variations of the same old enchanted lands in search of some damsel in distress.

With the exception of the damsel, Full Throttle tosses out all that junk and sets players loose in a world that is really real. The hero, Ben, is more of an antihero, a scruffy biker with one bad set of wheels.

Of course, Ben subscribes to his own moral code. So when his gang is framed for the murder of a doddering motorcycle manufacturer, Ben hits the road as much to get things right as to save his own hide.

Along the way, he falls for a motorcycle mechanic with almost as much attitude as he has. A good part of the game is spent in search of Maureen, who turns out to have more of a "one" attitude to Ben's predicament than she lets on.

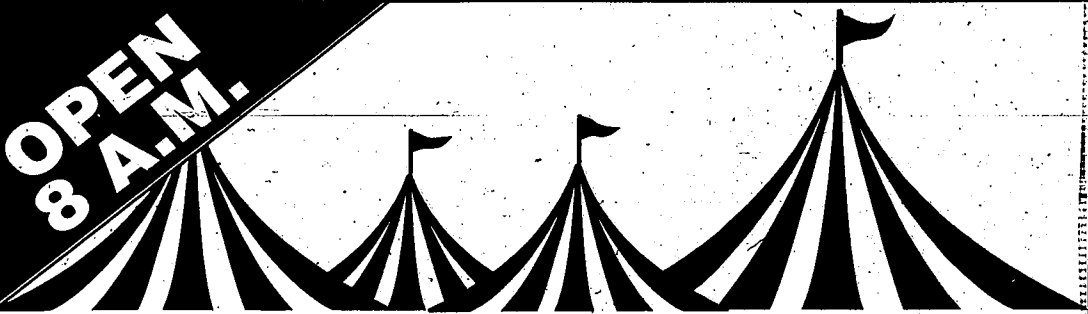
With beautiful scenery, hilarious dialogue and a soundtrack peppered with real biker bands, Full Throttle is in its own class among adventure games.

Even the interface exudes aloof toughness, allowing players to kick or punch answers out of uncooperative bartenders or trailer-dwelling junkyard artists.

But rats and jackboots are never enough to navigate life's unpredictable road. Players find themselves confronted with an array of puzzles and challenges — from swiping gas to talking a reluctant trucker into breaking a roadblock — that make the game constant fun.

Powered with a world of seedy locales, Full Throttle is a winner.

SHOSHONE — Momentum blew as fickle and faintly as the summer breeze across the sweltering Shoshone baseball field Thursday during the second round of the Region C Legion baseball A-division tournament.

Lewis decries lack of track interest

DENVER — Carl Lewis came to town Thursday and, like Al Oerter earlier in the week, criticized track and field for not doing enough to attract fans in this country.

Lewis, who will compete in the long jump Saturday in the U.S. Olympic Festival, said the sport must market its athletes and make them more familiar to average sports fans.

"If we built the sport with 10 or 12 names, we could have a marquee matchup of every meet," Lewis said during a news conference.

"The public does not even know who they're going to see (at meets)."

"The fundamental problem is people don't go to see performances. You know who they go to see? People. People go to see who they want to see. As soon as track and field realizes that, they'll be better off."

The eight-time Olympic gold medalist said track and field's popularity reached new heights in 1991 and '92 — after the world championships in Japan and leading to the Barcelona Olympics — but since then has waned. He said the sport "needs a change in direction."

Asked whether he wants the job, Lewis hesitated for a moment, then said, "I would take the leadership role but they would have to completely change the structure."

Earlier in the week, Oerter said track and field is "in the tank" in the United States.

Lewis, who is working solely on his long jump for the rest of the year, is competing in his third Olympic Festival but hasn't taken part in one since 1986. He said he came this year in part because of the timing — as the world championships are next month in Sweden.

Lewis, 34, said he still thinks he can run the 100-meter dash in under 10 seconds but that a world record in the long jump is his primary goal.

"I feel a 30-foot long jump is attainable," he said.

The festival track meet begins Friday and will include triple jumpers Mike Conley and Al Joyner, decathletes Dave Johnson and Dan O'Brien — although neither is competing in the decathlon — and 400-meter sprinter Quincy Watts.

The day's highlights included a 300 game in bowling, the second in festival history.

"Coming out here, the goal was not to embarrass myself," Hurtt said. "It's just fantastic to have something like this happen in a big competition. I just got comfortable and everything clicked."

MOSCOW — Jevon Green, the prize recruit on last season's University of Idaho basketball team, may be headed to state prison.

Green was arrested and briefly jailed last weekend in Moscow for numerous alleged violations of his probation for a grand theft conviction in Latah County.

He was released on \$5,000 bond and is due back in court on Monday.

In April, 2nd District Judge John Bengtson fined Green, placed him on five years probation and warned Green that any violation of his probation could result in immediate imposition of a prison sentence of up to 14 years for grand theft.

According to court documents, Green allegedly violated his probation by throwing a telephone and answering machine out of a back in court on Monday, moving without permission, leaving the state without permission and stealing or possessing several cases of beer.

PORTRUSH, Northern Ireland (AP) — Brian Barnes rolled in a 90-foot birdie putt at the final hole for a 5-under 67 Thursday and a one-stroke lead in the British Seniors Open.

American Bob Murphy and Ireland's Michael Murphy were tied for second at 68, one shot ahead of John Jacobs and Larry Laoretti, two other Americans.

Barnes, who bogeyed the first hole, birdied five of the final seven holes at the Royal Portrush course, including putts from eight, 15, 15 and 30 feet.

"I put like that, nobody will beat me," Barnes said. "But this sort of hole is few and far between. I can't remember when I holed a putt as long as the one at the last."

Bob Murphy, who has collected \$808,000 and won three times this year on the U.S. Seniors Tour, stroked in a 30-foot putt for an eagle 3 at the second.

He missed the green at the seventh for a bogey, but birdied the ninth, 10th and 15th.

Birdies at four of the first six holes helped Laoretti, while Jacobs birdied five of the first 13 holes before bogeying the 14th.

Arnold Palmer, who started with two birdies, was disappointed to finish with only a 1-under 71.

"I'm not happy with that at all because I played better than the score," said Palmer, who had a bogey 5 at the 18th where he needed three to get down from the edge of the green.

Black swings past 11-man logjam to grab 1st-round lead at Ideon

SUTTON, Mass. (AP) — Ronnie Black survived a nasty hook, then used a stroke of luck to break an 11-way tie and take a one-shot lead after Thursday's first round of the Ideon Classic.

A 30-foot birdie putt on his 17th hole gave him a 6-under-par 65 on a windless day in which, he said, "I didn't make any mistakes from inside 200 yards."

Black, whose last victory came in 1984, pulled several tee shots but was sharp on the greens. He admitted that the tiebreaking putt involved more than skill.

"I blind-hogged it right in the hole. Even a blind hog finds an acorn," he said.

Told that the phrase usually involves a squirrel rather than a hog, he answered, "I grew up in New Mexico. We don't have any squirrels."

He's felt right at home on the 7,110-yard Pleasant Valley Country Club course. He shot an opening-round 65 last year, one stroke off the lead, but finished tied for 39th.

He didn't practice on the course before this week's \$1 million tournament but said, "I've played it so many times under tournament conditions I know what club to use from where."

Tied at 66 were Gene Sauers, Jim Carter, Ken Green, George Burns, Jim McGovern, Mark Wurtz, P.J. Horgan III, Fred Funk, Scott McCarron and Joey Rasset.

Although no comprehensive records were available, a tour official said it was unlikely there has ever been an 11-way tie for

the lead after any round. Seventy-seven golfers were within five strokes of the lead as 78 players, more than half the 156-man field, broke par.

Black's only top 20 finish this year was a ninth-place tie. He tied for 63rd two weeks ago in the Anheuser-Busch Classic, then took some time off.

"I was hoping to feel a little cooler air on my face," said Carter, who missed the cut in the Desert Hills Open in Madison, Miss., "but it's not so bad that you need to have an ice towel on your head."

On Thursday, the air was hot

and heavy, but tolerable as temperatures hovered in the high 80s. Warmer weather is expected for the weekend.

"The weather was so benign today that I don't think it's in real nice shape," Black said. "If it stays hot, the ball goes farther and all these par-5s will be reachable."

Burns won the tournament in 1985 and Sauers in 1986. Defending champion Kenny Perry shot a 70, 1993 winner Paul Azinger 71 and 1992 winner Brad Faxon 74.

Peter Jacobson, the tour's No. 4 money winner, shot a 70. Only five of the top 25 on the earnings list completed.

British Open winner John Daly, who withdrew after last year's first round here, skipped the event.

Black, who started at the 10th hole, looked like a weekend duffer when he holed his first birdie on the 10th. Then he looked like a seasoned pro when he recovered for pars each time.

His first birdie didn't come until his sixth hole, but that started a run of six birdies in 12 holes.

A six-stroke putt after he hooked his first shot on his 15th hole "was the big momentum saver." He followed that with a 12-foot birdie putt on his 16th hole, tying him for the lead. He went ahead on the next hole, a 455-foot, par-4 with a dogleg to the right.

"I've shot a lot of good scores," Black said. "I just haven't been able to put four good rounds together."

Time off the links aids Cockerill at Friendly's

AGAWAM, Mass. (AP) — Kay Cockerill, who says doing golf commentary on television improved her game, shot a 6-under-par 66 Thursday to lead Kris Tschetter by a stroke after one round of the LPGA Friendly's Classic.

Cockerill, who joined the tour in 1987 but has never finished better than third, tied her previous best round.

"I just felt like ... I had a lucky charm on my shoulders," Cockerill said.

"Even with a couple bad shots I hit, I had another shot. I had a decent hole."

Tied for third at 68 were Maggie Will, Jane Crafter, Sherrin Smeyers, Michelle Estill and Barb Thomas.

Michelle McGann, a double LPGA winner this season, had a double bogey on the fifth hole and finished with a 74.

Cockerill also shot a 66 in 1991 at the Corning Classic. A two-time U.S. Women's Amateur champion, she failed even to make the cut in the five LPGA tournaments she entered this season.

Frustrated with her game, Cockerill has been working for The Golf Channel and NBC. She said commenting has given her some rest and also made her a calmer, more patient player.

"It's given me a feeling that there's something else I can do if

the golf doesn't come back," she said. "Ideally, I'd like to do both well."

After playing the back nine, Cockerill made a 25-foot putt for a birdie on No. 1 and cranked out birdies on the next two holes.

Tschetter, who won her only LPGA tournament in 1992 at the Northgate Computer Classic, closed her round with a 20-foot birdie putt at the ninth.

"I was really in position all day. I hit a lot of fairways and greens ... and just had a lot of chances," she said.

She was playing with clubs she received only eight days earlier, because her last set was stolen on an airplane while she returned from the U.S. Women's Open.

"It's just kind of one of those little bumps in the road that you have to get used to," she said.

She originally intended to skip the Friendly's Classic.

"I wasn't even going to play this week. I just heard it was a great course, so I did," she said.

Moira Dunn, who had a 75, made a hole-in-one at No. 14 that crosses from Connecticut into Massachusetts. The Crestview Country Club straddles the border. The tournament, which was added to the LPGA tour this season, is sponsored by the \$500,000 purse attracted a field of 144 players.

Golf course bans those in buff from its rough

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — There will be no nudity on the ninth hole, no bare bodies in the bushes.

The management at the Painted Dunes Desert Golf Course says it won't tolerate any shenanigans, be it nudity or any other violation of course policy, at a tournament Friday featuring dancers and waitresses from an adult night club.

"We don't condone any wrongful activities out there and if they do, we'll ask them to leave," said Steve Willy, head pro at the city-owned course.

John Spencer, the manager of the Body Rock Cafe, which is sponsoring the tournament, declined to comment on the event when contacted by The Associated Press.

"But a club spokesman has maintained he has no intention of allowing anyone to be asked to flirt and 'make the guys feel special.'"

"There's no going to be girls taking their clothes off, prostitution or sexual favors for money. That is not the goal of this tournament," said Sedrick Walker, the club's manager of operations, told the El Paso Times.

Still, the event is conjuring up

images of an unrelated tournament sponsored by a different organization at the course in 1993.

During that event, according to golfers who participated, some women stripped naked or struck provocative poses over the golf cup while players were putting. Others purportedly made lewd propositions.

Golfers who viewed the Thursday heat to play at the course Thursday said they wouldn't want to see something like that happen again.

"It's not the place for it," said Victor Mendez, who frequently plays the course. "You don't come out here for that."

Mendez and others said they don't really mind if the women come out, even in skimpy outfits, as long as they keep their clothes on.

The tournament, which had an entry fee of \$100 per person, has sold out. Thirty-six four-person teams are scheduled to compete.

"If it's harmless, it's all right," said another golfer, Juan Santiago, who likes the course's family atmosphere. "It's not nice to bring naked ladies out here."

Hornets center Parish denies charges of beating his ex-wife

BOSTON (AP) — Court records reportedly show that former Boston Celtics star Robert Parish five years ago denied an allegation by his ex-wife that he beat her.

The allegations of abuse by Nancy Saad initially were raised in a 1990 civil suit she filed against him and resurfaced in an article in this week's Sports Illustrated.

Saad told Sports Illustrated that Parish physically abused her throughout their 10-year relationship, and specifically mentioned an attack that she alleged occurred at a Los Angeles hotel on June 2, 1987. She said Parish on that day grabbed her by the throat, punched her and threw her to the floor, causing a "closed head injury" that forced her to be hospitalized for a week at a Santa Monica hospital.

Saad made virtually the same allegations in the civil suit in Middlesex County Superior Court. The Boston Globe reported Thursday. The case was transferred to U.S. District Court and resolved in the couple's divorce settlement, the records of which are sealed, the newspaper said.

Parish, now with the Charlotte Hornets, has refused to comment on the Sports Illustrated story. But in his 1990 court response, he denied ever hitting his wife, adding that if the allegations were

true, he did it in self-defense.

"In further answering, the defendant (Parish) says that if the defendant struck the plaintiff (Saad) as alleged in the complaint, the defendant did so in self-defense," the court document said.

"In further answering, the defendant says that the person who caused the alleged damages to the plaintiff was not a person for whose conduct the defendant was responsible and who has not been made as a defendant in this case."

Although Parish would not comment this week, his divorce lawyer was not reluctant to dispute Saad's charges in Sports Illustrated.

"She's a volatile, unstable woman. I wouldn't believe a thing she said," said Monroe Inker, who represented Parish in the 1990 divorce from Saad.

During the divorce, "she made a ton of allegations and she didn't try to prove one of them in court. She never offered any evidence to support those claims, and I have never seen any evidence to support them," Inker told the Boston Globe.

Saad also told Sports Illustrated that Parish pushed her down a flight of stairs when she was eight months pregnant in 1981, and kicked her out of a car and made her walk for miles in the dark with their infant son in 1982.

Speed is the question at Michigan International

BROOKLYN, Mich. (AP) — How fast is too fast? The question was raised when the Michigan International Speedway was repaved. Hopefully, it's a question that won't be answered at this weekend's Marlboro 500.

When track owner Roger Penske decided to have the 2-mile, high-banked Michigan oval repaved over the winter, it brought fear to the hearts of Indy-car officials, who fully expected the open-wheel cars to turn speeds above 240 mph on the smooth-out track.

Mario Andretti, now retired from Indy-car racing, set the world qualifying mark of 234.275 mph on the then-bumpy and treacherous Michigan track in 1993. Last year's pole went to Nigel Mansell at 233.738 after the Briton had practiced at speeds faster than the record on the weather-beaten surface.

The repaving forced the sport's regulators to act in the interest of safety to keep the cars from making another big speed jump. The rules makers did that by making mechanical changes that slowed the cars down a bit.

Indy-car engineers estimate the changes will cut at least 70 horsepower from the more than 750 normally produced by the Indy cars on the Michigan track.

Michael Andretti, Mario's son, and a two-time Marlboro 500 winner turned speeds of up to 226.5 mph over the new surface while completing about 540 miles of testing last month.

"It's going to be very different," Michael Andretti said. "It's going to be a bit like NASCAR because it's going to be a drafting race. Guys are going to be getting in a row and probably not be able to pull away."

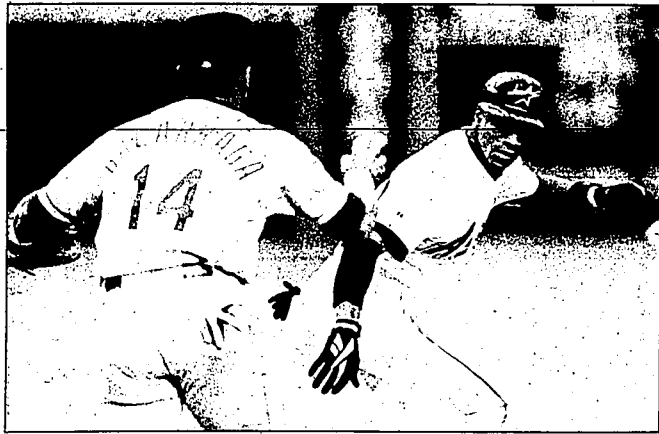
Paul Tracy, Andretti's Newman-Haas Racing teammate, said, "It's hard to say what will happen. I think aerodynamics won't be as much of a key because they're going to slow the cars down a bit with the boost."

"With it being smooth, I don't think it will be as much of a factor as when it was bumpy. If it didn't repave the track and it didn't lower the off, it would be a problem."

The 500-mile race at Michigan has always been a tough one for the drivers because of the "G" forces in the corners of the banked track and the bumps that made visibility difficult at 220 mph.

"The track is real smooth," Andretti said. "It's pretty much like glass, especially compared to what it used to be working."

The changes appear to be working.

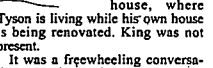

Industry keeps an eye on 'Waterworld'

Wave of mega-movies likely to ebb following Costner's \$200 million film, analysts say

The elderly herbalist walked along the edge of Kawaihae Harbor on the Big Island of Hawaii sprinkling salt on the ground in a ritual handed down by his great-great-grandmother.

Henry "Papa" Atwater motioned with a bamboo stick asking the gods to chase away the evil spirits and grant peace, love and harmony to the cast and crew assembled that summer day in 1994 to begin filming "Waterworld."

By the time principal filming had ended nine arduous months later, "Waterworld" would become part of Hollywood's

not only earning the unenviable distinction of being the most expensive movie ever made, but sending shock waves through a mighty studio, leaving concerns about its impact on the environment, tearing apart friendships and subjecting one of Hollywood's superstars, Kevin Costner, to torrents of negative publicity.

Indeed, "Waterworld" would have such an impact on Universal Pictures' financial operations that many in the movie industry suspected it played a part in the decision by Matsushita Electric Industrial Corp., the studio's Japanese owner, to sell most of its holdings in MCA/Universal in June. That sale led to radical changes in the top echelons of MCA.

Sources say the total cost of "Waterworld," which opens Thursday, has soared past \$200 million, including marketing and advertising more than twice its original budget. Neither Universal, Costner nor others involved in the production would discuss the costs.

The number is significant, because the average studio movie now costs \$34.3 million. But studios still roll the dice on big-budget productions like Arnold Schwarzenegger's 1994 action-thriller, "True Lies," which cost \$120 million and brought in \$350 million worldwide. Still, that pales by comparison to Universal's "Waterworld" gamble.

Why did "Waterworld" cost so much? The filmmakers have blamed the tricky nature of shooting at sea — where sun, wind and ocean swells affect camera angles and lighting — for going over budget on their 166-day shooting schedule.

But critics involved in the production say costs escalated dramatically because of poor planning and outlays that proved to be penny-wise and pound-foolish. For example, sources said, there were days when extras were asked to show up at

flooded by melting polar icecaps. Costner plays a mysterious gilled human named the Mariner who searches for dry land, battling the savage Smokers, led by Dennis Hopper, and hooking up with Jeannette Tripplehorn and young Tim Matheson.

Some who have had a sneak peek laud the computer-generated special effects and underdog screeners, comparing the movie to a Jules Verne yarn with the contemporary appeal of Indiana Jones. Others have been more critical, mocking its story line as

"Planet of the Apes on water."

Early reviews have been mixed. The early predictions are that it probably will draw young men, but its dark mood may turn off women and older audiences. It seems a long shot to break even; it would have to make at least \$400 million worldwide, which has been done by only a handful of films, including "E.T." and "Jurassic Park."

Regardless of its ultimate box-office performance, the sheer impact of making the movie has taken a toll on the studio — and

on the industry. "Waterworld" has created inflationary pressures on the business, say several agents and studio executives, who have a hand in determining the ultimate cost of a movie. "Studios are significantly more resistant to funding the mega-blockbuster movie now," said one agent.

That doesn't necessarily mean studios will shy away from big-budget productions. They will always bankroll movies with a

Good orders suggest economy still sluggish

WASHINGTON — Factory orders for expensive, long-lasting goods fell in June for the fourth time in five months, providing fresh evidence the economy is still sluggish.

But the government also said Thursday there was a large decline in claims for jobless benefits last week, blurring the picture a bit. On the eve of the government's most comprehensive assessment of the economy, there were other signs of weakness — including a drop in consumer confidence and a slower pace of mortgage applications. The Commerce Department said durable-goods orders slipped 0.1 percent last month after surging 2.6 percent in May.

Analysts, who had predicted a modest rise for June, said the Federal Reserve interest rate may feel more inclined to cut short-term rates again.

Stocks rally, with indexes hitting highs, on earnings

NEW YORK — Stocks advanced broadly Thursday, with some indexes hitting record levels, as corporate earnings reports continued to come in strong and stock economic data pushed interest rates lower. The Dow Jones industrial average briefly hit 4,741.56 before settling back toward the end of the day, closing up 25.71 at 4,732.77, just 5 points shy of the all-time closing high made on July 17.

By the time principal filming had ended nine arduous months later, "Waterworld" would become part of Hollywood's not only earning the unenviable distinction of being the most expensive movie ever made, but sending shock waves through a mighty studio, leaving concerns about its impact on the environment, tearing apart friendships and subjecting one of Hollywood's superstars, Kevin Costner, to torrents of negative publicity.

Inefficiency, vagaries of nature led to escalating cost

Why did "Waterworld" cost so much? The filmmakers have blamed the tricky nature of shooting at sea — where sun, wind and ocean swells affect camera angles and lighting — for going over budget on their 166-day shooting schedule.

But critics involved in the production say costs escalated dramatically because of poor planning and outlays that proved to be penny-wise and pound-foolish. For example, sources said, there were days when extras were asked to show up at

6 a.m. but waited until late-afternoon for their scenes. Even as the cameras were rolling on the second act, they say, the writers and the star were scrambling to reshape the third.

Indeed, just the costs of building sets, procuring a fleet of boats, staging explosions, as well as housing and feeding a crew that on some days ballooned to 600, reached \$100 million, "Waterworld" sources said.

Production sources said about \$40 million was spent on "over-the-line" talent — expenditures for stars Kevin Costner, Dennis Hopper and Jeannette Tripplehorn; director

Kevin Reynolds; producers Costner, Chuck Gordon and John Davis and five screenwriters.

Costner is said to have been paid \$17.5 million. Reynolds' fee was reportedly \$4 million. And the cost of the original screenplay and the numerous rewrites totaled about \$7 million, a production source said.

Added to that \$40 million, the cost of post-production has climbed to about \$30 million, sources say, including \$13 million for special effects that had been budgeted at \$3 million.

In late April, Reynolds, weary of the long

shoot in which Costner had ordered rewrites and directed scenes, handed in his director's cut and quit — creating a major fissure in their longtime friendship.

Since then, Costner has called the shots. And those shots have come at a price. To enhance special effects, additional footage was ordered in recent weeks, including sharks off Southern California's Catalina Island in an attempt to add realism to scenes using fake sharks that had done poorly with preview audiences. "Waterworld" began filming June 27, 1994.

built-audience, such as the "Batman" franchise, or ones based on the works of authors such as Michael Crichton.

"It sounds simplistic," said David Colden, an entertainment attorney, who represents several top directors and screenwriters. "But I think now, more than ever, no one is going to do another \$100 million-plus movie — unless the material is bankable." Unfortunately, determining what is bankable has never been an exact science.

Some agents and studio executives have even gone so far as to draw comparisons between the latest happenings at Universal and the demise of United Artists — a direct fallout of its 1980 box-office disaster, "Heaven's Gate."

They point to the recent shakeout of top brass at Universal after Mattel sold its majority stake in MCA/Universal to Seagram's Edgar Bronfman Jr.

While one picture could not force the sale of a studio, some believe the movie's out-of-control costs served as a signal to Matsushita that it didn't really know the business.

Levy Wasserman, the chairman and founder of MCA, recently was elevated to a figurehead position as chairman emeritus; Sid Sheinberg, Wasserman's right hand, has become an independent producer on the Universal, and Pollock, fortigerly,

head of the studio, has been made vice chairman but as yet has no staff. Production executives at rival studios say "Waterworld" has made them think before jumping into a big-budget project.

Before green-lighting a movie that costs \$100 million going in, they say, the star would have to have a track record.

For example, Warner Bros. is considering producing "Crusade," a pet project of the studio's action star Schwarzenegger.

The estimated \$90-million to \$95-million price tag could be even higher because the movie require building a set resembling medieval Jerusalem. Warner's has asked Peter MacGregor Scott, who produced "Batman Returns," to check out locations with an eye toward cutting the budget by about \$15 million, sources said.

What made "Waterworld" such a risk for Universal was that Costner, Schwarzenegger, and Rip Torn are not known to his audience as an actor star, but rather as a romantic leading man.

Another project that bears watching, industry sources say, is 20th Century Fox's remake of the 1968 sci-fi classic "The Andromeda Strain." "That could be a runaway if we're not careful," one Fox source said. "Everyone, after what they've seen [with 'Waterworld'], is afraid of any big movie that has the chance of getting out of control."

PARDON OUR APPEARANCE: Retailers spend \$8 billion annually to renovate or refurbish stores, finds Paul Koenigsberg, a consultant with Deloitte & Touche. But the expense can be worth it, he writes in Retail Insights, the firm's newsletter. Some stores increase sales and gross margins 35 percent as a result. Some renovations are routine maintenance, but others are made to improve a store's competitiveness. Other renovations are undertaken as part of a retailer's overall restructuring of its merchandising strategy.

VISIT OUR BOOTH: Companies that set up booths at trade shows may find it a worthwhile investment, Penn State researchers say. Professors at the university's College of Business Administration studied the sales results of Restek Corp., which makes products used in separating chemicals. The researchers found customers who visited Restek's booth at a 1993 trade show in Atlanta were bigger buyers of new Restek products over the next four months than customers who didn't visit the booth or attend the show. Srinath Gopalakrishna, an assistant professor of marketing, said the results suggested the trade show "performed an effective, presales role in the later stages of the selling process."

ATHLETE'S FOOT: Americans love their sneakers so much they seem to be replacing those worn-out pairs less frequently. That's not good news to the athletic footwear industry, which says consumers purchased 1.3 percent fewer pairs last year than in 1993. But not all footwear sales stumbled. The Sporting Goods Manufacturers Association says hiking, hunting and fishing footwear makers enjoyed a 50 percent rise in business in 1994, with sales exceeding \$1 billion.

HELPING WHERE YOU CAN: A manager may not be able to save employees' jobs, but how about protecting their mental well-being? It is possible, says management psychologist Harry Levinson. Amid corporate restructurings, employees need honesty, Levinson says, suggesting that managers tell subordinates "about efforts you've made to protect them and let them know what the limits of your efforts are." Levinson, writing in his bi-monthly The Levinson Letter, suggests managers help workers maintain their skills and self-esteem through training and different assignments. Compiled from wire reports

Planned merger may change shape of labor

WASHINGTON — The nation's three largest labor unions invited other labor groups Thursday to join them in their planned merger, a move that could change the shape of the American labor movement.

The merger of the United Auto Workers, United Steelworkers and International Association of Machinists would create a union with nearly 2 million members and an initial strike fund of more than \$1 billion.

The combination is to be completed by the year 2000. In the meantime, the leaders of the three unions pledged Thursday to begin pooling their resources both politically and at the bargaining table wherever possible.

The merger agreement represents a major shift to end a Western European style of union organization, in which workers band together in broad industrial categories such as metalworkers, transportation workers or government employees, and away from the fragmented structure that has dominated the U.S. labor movement.

The new, combined union would represent workers in the auto, aerospace, metals, mining, transportation, chemicals, utilities, electronics and consumer goods industries and should bring the union the same economies of scale achieved by most of the companies with which it bargains.

UAW President Stephen P. Yokich summed up the merger's benefits in a single word: "Strength."

George Koumpias, president of the IAM, said the merger will give workers "the numbers to fight back."

Koumpias called it a merger of "the most progressive and militant" labor unions in North America.

Yokich invited other unions to join the merged group. "Any other union that thinks this is a good idea for the American work force is more than

welcome to come sit down and talk with us," he said. Logical candidates include the United Mine Workers, which has close ties with the steelworkers union, and possibly even the newly merged Union of Needletrades, Industrial and Textile Employees, or Unite, which represents many manufacturing workers.

U.S. President George Bush said the merger was driven, in part, by the Republican control of Congress. "We're facing a very reactionary legislature out there and they're opposing labor with all the vigor they can muster," Becker said.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff
"The golden rule is that there is no golden rule."
—George Bernard Shaw

One of the important rules in bridge is to avoid deceiving your partner. For example, as an aid to partner, it is conventional for third hand to follow suit with the lower of two touching honors. However, there is no rule for aiding declarer, nor against deceiving him. Here's how a deceptive move might work against declarer's slam.

North's bid of four clubs confirmed excellent support, a good opening and first-round club control. After a cue-bidding series, South couldn't resist bidding slam after North promised both minor-suit aces.

With no lead-directing double after either of North's minor-suit cue-bids, West led his fourth-best spade. After dummy plays low, what card should East play? Customarily, he should win the King—lower of two touching honors. However, if he does in today's layout, he gives South his slam. Since it is unlikely West would underlead an ace against this slam, South will take a ruffing finesse against East's spade ace. This will allow him to discard a club later on dummy's remaining high spade.

The setting is perfect for a deceptive play by East. Instead of winning a mundane spade king, he should play his ace at trick one. And when East calmly returns a low spade, South is sure to ruff. After rejecting the ruffing finesse, regardless of which minor-suit finesse South takes, the slam goes one down.

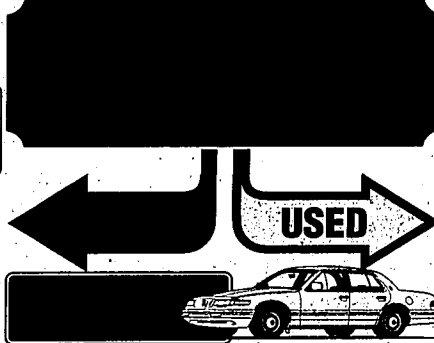

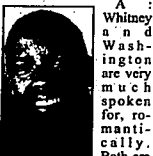

Also, this is not a time for negativity. We who work in soaps shouldn't complain about these changes which affect us all. In our show, the day began when our head writer Doug Marland died. He was able to juggle all the plots in a logical way, and we miss him. However, our current writers are doing a wonderful job, and I feel we're heading in the right direction."

In addition to her daytime gig, Martha has her first album — titled "Martha Byrne" — coming out. She performs some of the songs she has sung on "As the World Turns" as well as some new ones. She's quite pleased with the album and is happy to announce that as of August 1, fans can order it via direct phone sales (1-800-MMBYRNE).

Martha loves singing but she also loves acting, and she intends to continue doing both.

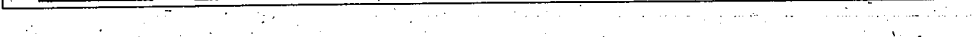

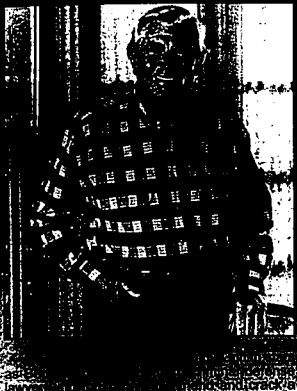

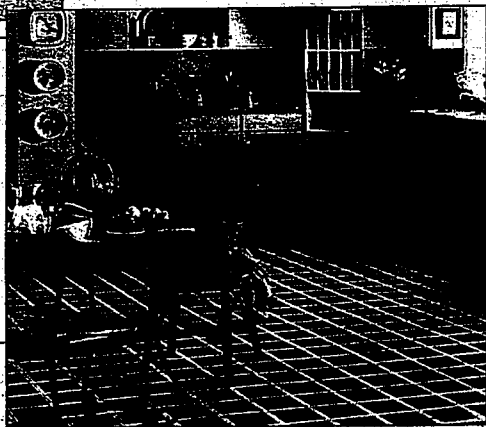
