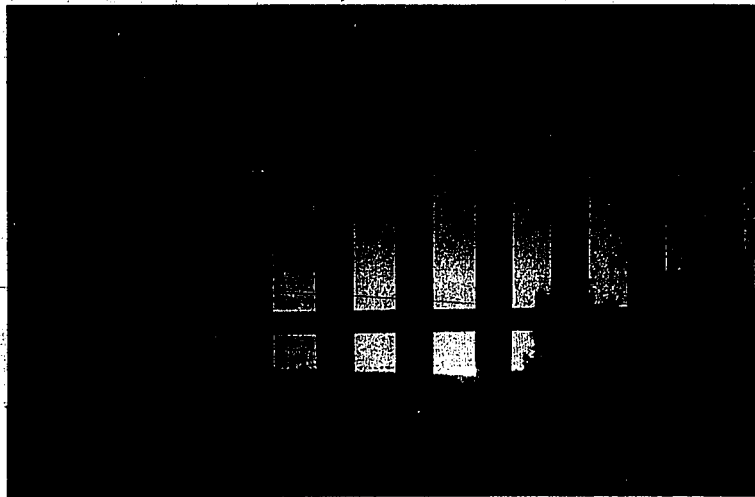

Senate approves missile defenses

WASHINGTON — The Republican-controlled Senate voted Thursday to build a nationwide network of antiballistic missile defenses over the next eight years, rejecting arguments by the Clinton administration and Democratic lawmakers that it would violate the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty and trigger a new arms race.

Voting 51-48, largely along party lines, the Senate defeated a move by Sen. Byron Dorgan, D-N.D., to eliminate \$300 million that the Armed Services Committee added to the Clinton administration's \$371 million request to continue planning for a

home-front defense against missile attack. Idaho's Republican senators, Larry Craig and Dirk Kempthorne, voted for the bill.

The extra money was included in the defense authorization bill for fiscal 1996 to speed development of a multiple-site missile defense system aimed at protecting American cities from an increasing number of countries that are gaining access to nuclear weapons. The committee said the system should be deployed by 2003.

Then the Senate rejected, 51-49, an effort by Sens. Carl M. Levin of Michigan, Sam Nunn of Georgia and other Democrats to drop provisions they regarded as violations of the 23-year-old ABM

Treaty, which limited anti-missile defenses by the United States and the then-Soviet Union to one site per country.

An effort was under way Thursday night by Nunn and Sen. William S. Cohen, R-Maine, to make it clear the Senate does not intend to abrogate the treaty in this legislation but wants the administration to negotiate changes to allow multistate defenses.

The Senate's action virtually assures Congress will approve money for the missile defense plan. The House has approved \$463 million for the project and, like the Senate, it rejected language stipulating that the program was not intended to abrogate

House gives states choice on abortions

WASHINGTON — Sharply divided on an emotional issue, the House told the 50 states Thursday night they may deny Medicaid funds for abortions to poor women who are victims of rape or incest.

The 215-206 vote was a fresh show of strength for the religious right in the GOP-controlled House. It came after anguished debate in which several women lawmakers angrily denounced the restriction.

"This bill sends rape victims a very clear message — you must have your rapist's baby," said Rep. Nita Lowey, D-N.Y. "It tells victims of incest, you must have your father's child."

Supporters said the issue was the rights of states — and of the unborn. "I'm certainly against violence against women," said Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill. "I'm also against violence against unborn children. What crime has the unborn child committed?"

The vote came as lawmakers worked in marathon session to complete action on a bill that cuts \$9.3 billion from social programs over the fiscal year and recasts the government in a more conservative image.

President Clinton, who has threatened a veto, attacked the measure during the day, saying its cuts would deny 180,000 youngsters a place in Head Start, and cut off job training, worker training and federal education assistance to hundreds of thousands of recipients.

House Speaker Newt Gingrich met with several GOP lawmakers, part of a coordinated effort by the leadership to persuade moderates and conservatives to look beyond provisions they oppose and vote for passage to further the party's overriding goal of a balanced budget.

On other contentious issues as the day gave way to evening, the House: Rejected, on a vote of 286-136, a bid to strip the Corporation for Public Broadcasting of its federal subsidy beginning in the 1998 fiscal year.

Erin belts Florida again, loses punch

PENSACOLA, Fla. — Hurricane Erin thrashed Florida a second time Thursday, ambushing thousands of terrified residents and tourists and causing widespread damage before losing its punch over Alabama.

Erin was downgraded to a tropical storm late Thursday after its sustained winds dropped to 60 mph, down from the 94 mph winds that blasted the Florida Panhandle, knocking out windows, damaging water lines and tossing boats like baseballs.

"We have trees down, we have transformers exploding on power poles," said John Teelin, a spokesman for Escambia County Emergency Management. "It's quite a show."

No injuries or deaths were immediately reported. Erin killed at least two people and left five missing at sea when it hit central Florida early Wednesday.

By late evening, Erin weakened further as it headed northwest, the National Hurricane Center said.

The storm brought rain and high winds to parts of Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi, downing some trees and power lines but causing no major damage, officials said.

Earlier in the day, the hurricane-force winds and driving rain peeled back roofs at shopping centers, restaurants and apartment buildings across several Panhandle counties. Hundreds of trees toppled and power lines went down faster than lightning bolts.

More than 700,000 Florida residents were without power, some for a second day. "The wind beat it so hard it bent the door almost in half," said Lori Sheld of Pensacola Beach, a barrier island town south of the city.

Gov. Lawton Chiles requested a federal emergency declaration from President Clinton to pave the way for disaster aid.

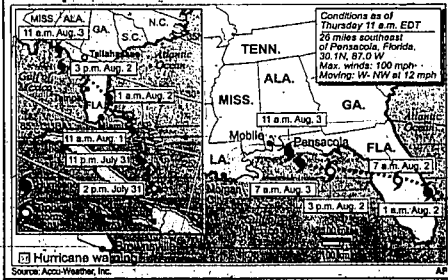
The Escambia County Sheriff's Department said 50 to 60 police cars would patrol the area overnight to guard against looting.

The center of the storm moved ashore at about 10 a.m. in Pensacola, which had not been hit directly by a hurricane since one in September 1926 killed 372 people in Florida and Alabama.

Wealthy pad retirement pay

WASHINGTON (AP) — A substantial share of today's Social Security payroll taxes is padding the comfortable retirement of America's affluent, advocates for Americans in their 20s and 30s said Thursday.

The Third Millennium organization analyzed Social Security data to make its case that retired Americans in the wealthiest neighborhoods receive significantly more in benefits than seniors in the poorest stretches of the country.

"Today's truck drivers and lab technicians pay payroll taxes that flow directly into the pockets of today's retirees," said Deryo Murdock, a co-founder of the group.

"These same workers no doubt would be started to learn that more of their money lands in homes along Park Avenue and Sunset Boulevard than on the humble streets where America's poor people live," Murdock said.

Social Security pays retirement and disability benefits based on a worker's earnings, so the highest-paid workers receive the greatest benefits. At the same time, Social Security redistributes wealth to prop up the lowest-paid Americans in retirement.

Under the current system, Social Security replaces 42 percent of the earnings of a worker with average wages, 27 percent of a high-wage worker's earnings, and 57 percent of a minimum-wage worker's earnings.

Countering the Third Millennium's arguments,

Social Security said most seniors are not wealthy and that two-thirds of all benefits go to families with incomes below \$30,000.

"Reasonable and responsible debate is welcome, but characterizing the elderly as affluent individuals needlessly collecting benefits at the expense of their children is irresponsible," said Social Security Commissioner Shirley Chater.

Although Social Security now takes in more in payroll taxes than it spends on benefits, government projections show that without changes, it will go broke in 2030 as the baby boom generation puts unprecedented demands on the system.

Third Millennium argues that the system can no longer afford to continue paying benefits regardless of income and must base payments on need.

Sen. Bob Kerrey, D-Nebr., agrees that an affordability test may be necessary, and said Thursday he could decide to include it in a series of Social Security reforms that he and Sen. Alan Simpson, R-Wyo., proposed earlier this year.

Kerrey, however, said the Third Millennium's claim that "Social Security lines pockets of America's wealthiest," is something of an exaggeration.

"We're not going to get this done if we try to divide people in some fashion or try to find an enemy in the whole process," Kerrey said. "The enemy in this whole deal ... is demographics, it's not wealthy Americans."

Chater said means testing would be a mistake.

More sexual misconduct claims against Packwood, panel says

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Ethics Committee said Thursday that it has received new allegations of sexual misconduct against Sen. Bob Packwood and was postponing the penalty phase of its deliberations.

"Two additional complainants have contacted the committee recently with allegations of sexual misconduct by Sen. Packwood," the committee announcement said.

"The committee will use the (August) recess period to pursue these new allegations, so that the record is complete."

The announcement was made just an hour after the committee began meeting in closed session. Chairman Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., had indicated the session was called to deliberate on possible penalties in the case of sexual and official misconduct by the Oregon Republican.

The committee said it now expects to conclude the case and release "the full public record" in early September.

Ironically, Republicans just Wednesday won a Senate vote against holding public hearings. The 52-48 vote upheld McConnell's position that the committee had all the evidence, testimony and documents it needed to decide the case without further delay.

Sources familiar with the investigation, speaking only on condition of anonymity, have said that McConnell recently expressed the desire to finish the entire case before the recess. The Senate is expected to adjourn next week until September.

No details were provided on the identities of the new complainants, why they had not come forward

earlier and what misconduct they were alleging.

The committee in May found "substantial credible evidence" that Packwood may have engaged in a pattern of sexual misconduct involving 17 women in 18 incidents from 1969-90.

The panel also found that Packwood, the chairman of the Finance Committee, may have engaged in improper conduct and/or violated federal law by intentionally altering his diaries when he learned they might be subpoenaed; and may have solicited job offers for his then-wife from people with legislative interests.

The committee already has agreed to release all relevant documents in the case, and appeared to be moving toward disclosure next week. Now, it will be at least a month before that step is taken.

the ABM Treaty.

Critics said the bill violated the treaty by calling for multiple sites and complained that the measure sought improperly to unilaterally reinterpret its provisions to ban defenses against short-range missiles. "This is a trashing of the ABM Treaty. ... It is a provocative move to commit ourselves now to deploy an illegal missile defense system," Levin said.

They also said a unilateral scrapping of the treaty would antagonize Russia and jeopardize its compliance with existing treaties. It would be a "gratuitous poke in the eye of the Russians," who would retaliate by retargeting their missiles back on

the United States, Nunn argued.

The administration has threatened a veto of the legislation, arguing that it would "put the U.S. on a path to abrogate the ABM Treaty," the words of Secretary of State Warren Christopher. Defense Secretary William J. Perry also said it could jeopardize Russian implementation of START I and START II treaties to reduce the nuclear arsenals of the U.S. and the former Soviet bloc.

The bill's supporters noted that it violates the treaty but acknowledged that it lays the groundwork for a broader treaty interpretation — negotiated or otherwise — that would allow deployment of multiple-site defenses when they are ready. The committee called for a

"comprehensive review of the continuing value and validity of the ABM Treaty," to be completed by the end of next year.

The bill "reenergizes" that an effective multiple-site defense of the United States is inconsistent with the treaty as things stand today," said Majority Leader Robert J. Dole, R-Kan.

Republicans argued that the main reason for the treaty "was the so-called policy of mutual assured destruction (MAD), which sought to deter nuclear aggression by leaving both sides vulnerable to retaliation — disappeared with the Soviet Union." "The MAD era is over, thank God," said Senate Majority Whip Trent Lott, R-Miss.

paralyzed on one side. He had pretty significant brain damage."

Police often find the drug in the pockets of motorists during routine traffic stops. Mental health officials notice most of their methamphetamine patients are between the ages of 14 and 25.

"That just seems to be the population," said Gene Zwaryk, drug counselor for Canyon View Hospital and Counseling Centers.

Unlike cocaine, methamphetamine can be produced locally in homes or other buildings. Remote rural areas such as central and south-central Idaho are prime spots for drug labs, where methamphetamine can be cooked in obscurity, but close to the highway for easy transport, Rollins said.

The ingredients — some of them

household chemicals — are getting harder to buy legally in the United States, he said. As a result, dealers are going to Mexico to cook the drug, then return across the border, he said.

Crank is bought in some bars and homes across the Magic Valley. If you know where to look, Rollins said. The price is between \$175 and \$250, even \$300, for eight ounces or an "eight ball," he said.

Hard-core users tend to do the drug non-stop for several days, then sleep for several days, mental health officials say. Open sores, rotting teeth, hair loss and dramatic weight loss are symptoms, as well as paranoia and anxiety, they said.

"I've seen some people do some crazy stuff," Rollins said.

And the drug sellers live in a very violent culture, Rollins said.

"It seems everybody has got a gun and everybody is willing to act in a violent nature," Rollins said.

"Dealers, users, you name it. It comes back to dollars and cents. That is a lot of money to them, and they are willing to do whatever it takes to protect their investment."

No contest on death penalty — OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — A lawyer for bombing suspect Timothy McVeigh said Thursday he won't try to persuade prosecutors not to seek the death penalty, claiming the decision has already been made.

Defense lawyer Stephen Jones contends the process is a sham because Attorney General Janet Reno and President Clinton promised the death penalty for those responsible only days after the bombing.

Bombing suspect arrives in U.S.

NEW YORK (AP) — A Palestinian was flown to the United States Thursday to be tried on charges he drove the bomb-laden van into the World Trade Center in the 1993 attempt to topple the world's second-tallest buildings.

Eyad Ismoil was part of the planning stages, execution, and particularly in the transportation of the bomb that killed six people and injured more than 1,000, U.S. Attorney Mary Jo White said.

Ismoil, 24, was captured by Jordanian authorities over the weekend. A September 1994 indictment charging him with conspiracy was unsealed.

He drove the yellow Ryder van containing the 1,200-pound high explosive calls with conspirators and fingerprints. Authorities would not say where they found his fingerprints.

"The message we wish to send is that no ocean is too wide, no distance too far, no time period too long and no effort too great to make those who kill or injure Americans immune from the U.S. justice system," Attorney

General Janet Reno said. After his arrival from Jordan, Ismoil was flown by helicopter from Stewart Air Force Base to Manhattan, set the 110-story twin towers and the Statue of Liberty.

"I pointed out to him the World Trade Center and told him it was still standing. He just smirked," said FBI agent Thomas Pickard, who accompanied the defendant.

Ismoil, wearing a prison-issue orange jumpsuit, pleaded innocent in federal court in Manhattan. No trial date was set. He faces life without parole if convicted.

The United States knew Ismoil was in Jordan for the past six months and had pushed for the signing of an extradition treaty, said James K. Kallstrom, head of New York's FBI office.

In Jerash, Jordan, the suspect's 27-year-old brother, Walid, said his

brother "loved everything American from cowboy movies to hamburgers" and doubted he tried to harm the United States.

Ismoil was born in Kuwait, where his father worked for an oil company. The family had fled to Kuwait from the West Bank town of Nablus following the 1967 Arab-Israeli war.

Ismoil went to school in Kuwait with alleged bombing mastermind Ramzi Yousef before entering the United States in 1989 to study engineering at Wichita State University, White said. He later moved to Dallas and may have worked briefly in New York City, Kallstrom said.

The FBI began hunting Ismoil after it learned of a Feb. 9, 1993, telephone call Yousef placed to him in Dallas from a pay phone outside the Jersey City, N.J., apartment where the bomb was being built.

The indictment said Ismoil bought an airline ticket in Dallas on Feb. 9 and flew to New York five days before the Feb. 26 bombing. The day of the bombing, he flew from Kennedy Airport to Amman, Jordan, while Yousef fled to Pakistan, it said.

Telephone records indicated Ismoil received numerous calls from conspirators in the bombing, White said, and later kept in constant contact with them at the Jersey City apartment.

The Jordanian justice minister said

that after police arrested Ismoil at the request of the United States, he told a Jordanian court that he was innocent and wanted to clear himself in the United States.

The U.S. government has offered rewards of up to \$2 million for information on fugitives in the case, using the Internet to advertise them. Among those sought is Abdul Rahman Yasin, who fled the United States immediately after the bombing, the government says.

Yousef was arrested in Pakistan in February and returned to New York for trial.

Four co-defendants in the bombing were convicted of federal charges on March 4, 1994: Mohammad Salameh, Nidal Ayyad, Mahmud Abouhalima and Ahmad Mohammad Ajaj. They are serving life sentences.

Scientists tout AIDS combination

WASHINGTON (AP) — The drugs AZT and 3TC used together appear to be the most effective combination yet found to combat the AIDS virus, researchers report.

Scientists at the Wellcome Research Laboratories in Kent, England, said that when AZT is taken with 3TC, the combination overcomes the problem of viral resistance, that reduces the effectiveness of either drug taken alone.

In 24-week-long tests on patients infected with the AIDS virus, the combination caused a drop in the amount of viral infection and a rise in the number of lymphocytes, called CD4 cells, that are the target of the virus.

CD4 cells protect the body from infection and it is their loss that causes AIDS patients to contract infection so easily.

"The combination of AZT and 3TC is the most efficacious pair of drugs tested to date with respect to the magnitude and duration of changes in CD4 cell number and viral load," researchers report this week in Science, the journal of the American Association for the

Advancement of Science. The study was co-authored by Brendan A. Larder, Sharon D. Kemp and P. Richard Harrigan of the Wellcome laboratories.

Both drugs act on the virus by stopping its reproduction, but a laboratory analysis of the combination found that 3TC prevented the AIDS virus from developing a resistance against AZT.

AZT, or zidovudine, is the most widely used anti-viral drug against HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. The drug 3TC has been in two clinical trials in Europe and two in the United States, but now is available only for experimental use.

Both drugs are manufactured by Glaxo-Wellcome Inc. of Research Triangle Park, N.C. The company and Wellcome laboratories are subsidiaries

of Glaxo-Wellcome PLC of England.

Though considered the primary drug for treating the AIDS virus, AZT is of only limited value by itself because HIV viruses eventually develop a resistance to the chemical action of the drug.

Researchers have been experimenting with AZT in combination with other anti-viral drugs, but none of the combinations has worked as well as AZT-3TC, the researchers said in Science.

The report said lab studies show the combination works because 3TC is able to prevent the virus from making the molecular changes that would allow strains of the virus to become resistant to AZT. This happens even though the virus quickly develops resistance to 3TC.

FBI checks ideas behind bomber

WASHINGTON (AP) — They may seem like just extreme ideas. But they could be leads.

The FBI has turned to professors for clues to the identity of the Unabomber. The bomber has killed three people and injured 23 since 1978, often targeting academic or industrial targets. There are plenty of ideas to analyze in his 35,000-word manifesto. Some see a scholar of 1960s-style radicalism, others an expert on the 19th-century Ludite uprising.

"Clearly, this is a person who is widely read and does have some specialized knowledge of certain bodies of academic work," said Keith Benson, executive secretary of the History of Science Society in Seattle.

Take the Unabomber's mention of a relatively obscure historian of crime and urbanization, Roger Lane of Pennsylvania's Havverford College.

Lane's theory that assembly line jobs and institutions, such as public schools created greater conformity in 19th century America was a small part of the 1968 Kerner Commission report after the Watts riots in Los Angeles. Since then, Lane has written scholarly books

that touched on the theory.

Trying to track where the Unabomber might have encountered such ideas, the FBI has asked 50 to 60 academics, including Lane and Benson, to examine his manuscript to see if they recognize the writing style, or ideas of a former student, colleague or hanger-on.

They are focusing on Chicago, Salt Lake City and the Berkeley, Calif., area, places they think the terrorist bomber may once have studied or lived.

Lane said he has told the FBI he can't think of anyone who might be the Unabomber, noting that he could have heard of Lane's theory "in a hundred different places." And Benson said he also has not come up with any solid leads.

The problem facing the FBI is that, except for specific footnotes like the one mentioning Lane, many of the

Unabomber's ideas fit into a wide philosophical tradition, academics say.

Hundreds of American college courses might touch on those ideas, leaving the FBI a long trail to follow.

The Unabomber's possible influences include the Ludites, who destroyed the weaving looms that were replacing their jobs in 19th century Britain. Or George Orwell's "1984." Or Marxist philosophers, Jean Jacques Rousseau or even current-day survivalists.

Benson believes the Unabomber might be a one-time 1960s radical who became disenchanted, saying, "His verbiage is just very much from that period."

Stanley Goldberg, a science historian who does consulting work for the Smithsonian Institution, believes the manuscript hints at contacts with the fringes of the environmental movement. The FBI has interviewed members of environmental groups. They say they reject violence against people.

The FBI also attended the History of Science Society's annual meeting last year and asked for past registration records.

But Benson and others say even the most strident anti-technology scholars usually believe science and technology have brought some benefits, such as lifesaving medical treatments.

"He takes these ideas very much farther than most," said Alex Roland, a Duke University professor who studies the history of technology. "His views are very extreme."

Only a few theorists, such as the late French social critic Jacques Ellul, have believed technology is destined to control mankind, the view held by the Unabomber. Roland said the FBI might look for college courses with reading lists that included Ellul.

Chernomir professor Edward Haley noted that the Unabomber's methods bear a striking resemblance to a 1907 Joseph Conrad novel, "The Secret Agent." The book's main character, an anarchist, wanted to bomb "pure mathematics" because he thought it was the root of many problems. Since that was impossible, the anarchist decided to blow up an observatory instead, said Haley, who teaches at Claremont McKenna College in Claremont, Calif.

Reich: Summer job cuts affect 1 million

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 1 million disadvantaged youths likely will spend their school vacation on city streets next year unless Congress revives a summer jobs program. Labor Secretary Robert Reich predicts.

The House voted Wednesday to eliminate the summer jobs program in 1996 by cutting its entire \$871,000 budget.

Reich noted Thursday that more than two disadvantaged youths had applied for each of the 615,000 jobs created under the program this year.

Reich said the jobs shortage will be especially acute for 14- and 15-year-olds who have the greatest difficulty finding private sector jobs and who make up nearly half of the youth served by the public sector program.

Wife of downed pilot urges new probe into 'friendly fire' deaths

WASHINGTON (AP) — Kaye Mounsey motioned to the oversized photograph of her husband's charred remains and their challenged lawmakers Thursday to investigate the "friendly fire" downing last year of two U.S. helicopters over Iraq.

The shutdown by two U.S. jets killed 26 people, including 15 Americans. A military investigation said no one is primarily responsible, but the Pentagon is re-examining the actions of Army and Air Force personnel involved in the April 14, 1994, incident.

"No one was determined guilty of serious dereliction of duty. No one who was in a key command position has been held responsible," Mounsey told the House National Security subcommittee on military personnel.

"If the outcome will prevent further tragedies, you must try as hard as you can to get to the bottom of this, regardless of whose toes you step on along the way," her husband, Army Warrant Officer Erik Mounsey, was one of the helicopter pilots.

The former head of the mission that enforced a no-fly zone over

rules and procedures in place that should have and would have prevented the tragedy had these rules and procedures been followed," Brig. Gen. Jeffrey Pilkington said.

The Black Hawk helicopters were carrying members of an international group that had been working with the Kurds in northern Iraq since the end of the 1991 Gulf War.

Two F-15 jet pilots mistook two U.S. helicopters for Iraqi helicopters in a no-fly zone established after the war and shot them down, killing 26 people.

Along with the 15 Americans, other passengers included five Kurds employed by the United States and military officers from

Britain, France and Turkey.

The subcommittee chairman, Rep. Bob Dornan, R-Calif., said he was concerned that justice had not been served in the shutdown investigation. But he said he was pleased by the announcement this week of the Pentagon review. More hearings and an independent investigation are possible.

Defense officials consider the criminal side of the case closed, but a Pentagon spokesman described a range of actions against those who may have contributed to the tragedy, including blocking promotion, reducing performance ratings, reassignment, forced retirement and revocation of awards.

The Pentagon review comes more than a month after the court-martial acquittal of Air Force Capt. Jim Wang, a senior director aboard an AWACS radar plane who was the only officer charged criminally in the case.

Seven officers, including the two F-15 pilots and three members of the crew of Wang's radar-monitoring plane, received letters of reprimand or admonishment. Also, a member of Wang's crew received an Article 15

Harvard warns doctor on UFO research

BOSTON (AP) — Harvard Medical School has decided not to censure a Pulitzer Prize-winning professor who studies people who say space aliens abducted them for sexual experiments.

However, psychiatrist Dr. John Mack received an unusual public warning from the dean not to let his enthusiasm for UFO research steer him from the path of professionalism.

The decision disclosed Thursday followed a one-year investigation that Mack's lawyer called a challenge to academic freedom.

"This is the type of thing that almost by its existence can be intimidating," Roderick MacLeish said.

Mack's fellow professors supported him for fear that they might be next in line for scrutiny, MacLeish said. All members of the faculty contacted by The Associated Press during the investigation refused to speak for the record.

The review began after Mack appeared on "Unsolved Mysteries" and other TV programs to promote his 1994 book "Abduction: Human Encounters With Aliens," about his patients, including a man who remembers an alien female extracting a sperm sample from him, a woman who says she gave birth to a human-alien hybrid and a man who says he had an alien wife in a parallel universe.

The faculty committee investigated whether Mack's work met professional standards and whether it could be considered research on human contacts, which requires special permission.

Medical school spokeswoman Keren McGinty declined to say how often such investigations are conducted. The school would not release the findings and McGinty refused to answer questions.

Mack, 65, was traveling Thursday and could not be contacted, an assistant said. In an interview last year, he said that he does not necessarily believe in space aliens but thinks that some unknown traumatic experience explains his patients' memories.

Senior citizens' bus crashes, killing 3

HUDSONVILLE, Mich. (AP) — A bus carrying senior citizens on a monthly outing collided head-on with a garbage truck Thursday, killing three and injuring 21.

The truck apparently swerved to avoid another car when it crashed into the bus on a rural road in Jamestown Township, about 10 miles southwest of Grand Rapids, Ottawa County Sheriff's Sgt. Rich VanBeek said.

The bus was owned by Luther Village, a Grand Rapids home for the elderly. The group was on the way to a restaurant as part of a monthly outing, said Stephen Kauffman, community director at the home.

Names of the victims were being withheld until relatives were notified. The injured were taken to hospitals in Grand Rapids. Police said at least four people were critically injured.

World Croatia calls talks a failure

ZAGREB, Croatia (AP) — Croatia called talks with rebel Serbs Thursday a failure and its top general said his troops were ready to attack.

Outmanned 2-to-1, the Serbs offered to talk for the first time about submitting to some degree of Croatian authority.

The Geneva talks had convened on a wide range of issues, proposals for further negotiations on a final political settlement, a delay in hostilities, opening of an oil pipeline to government-held territories and the resumption of transport links.

But the Croats, cocky after a series of battlefield advances, focused only on their main demand. They want the Serbs to accept Croatian government authority, something the rebels had refused to do since taking a third of the republic in their 1991 rebellion.

"They have not accepted proposals for a peaceful reintegration," said Croatian negotiator Ivic Pasalic. "The only progress is that talks took place."

Front lines were tense but quiet, with both sides readying for an attack. However, a resumption of talks still seemed possible after a last-minute Serb compromise.

Milan Babic, one of the rebel Serb leaders, said his side was ready to talk about a Croat plan that would give some rebel Serb-held areas nearly full autonomy. It was the first time Serbs have agreed to discuss anything other than full independence from Croatia.

New talks would buy time. The Serbs might be hoping that if they tied up the Croats long enough in negotiations, the scales would tip in their favor on the battlefield, perhaps with the Yugoslav army coming in on their side.

There was no immediate Croatian response to the offer, made outside the Geneva talks. But U.S. Ambassador Peter Galbraith was upbeat.

Iraq, Kuwait meet to trace missing people

GENEVA (AP) — Senior officials from Kuwait and Iraq met under the auspices of the Red Cross Thursday in an effort to trace hundreds of Kuwaitis missing since the Iraqi invasion five years ago.

Ambassadors from the United States, Britain and France, which led the Allied coalition against Baghdad, also attended the meeting outside Geneva.

Kuwait accuses Iraq of holding about 800 prisoners from the occupation, most of them Kuwaitis. It turned over files on more than 600 of the alleged detainees to the international Red Cross. Iraq denies it is still holding the prisoners.

Red Cross officials would not give details on progress of the talks, which are expected to last two days.

Russia lofts satellite

MIRNY, Russia (AP) — Russia launched a satellite Thursday from the Plesetsk cosmodrome in northern Russia to study the earth's magnetic field.

The launch brings to 1,850 the number of launches from Plesetsk since the cosmodrome opened in 1966. The Interbol-1 satellite weighs 2,750 pounds and was built in Russia. Scientists from 12 other nations helped design its instruments.

The Russian news agency ITAR-Tass reported the satellite was sent into a high, elliptical orbit at 3:59 a.m. Moscow time, carried on a Molniya-M booster rocket.

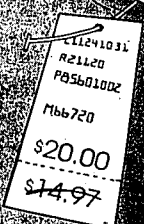

Crapo's measure gives House real spending reform

Congressman Michael Crapo probably beaming like a new papa this week after the House approved the "Lock Box," one of his personal pet projects. Taxpayers should be beaming too, because the Lock Box will help restore common sense to federal spending.

Grapo, R-Idaho, landed in the House in 1993 with a list of ambitions that only a certified policy wonk could love. His main theme was to untangle and reform the little understood rules that protected the status quo in Congress.

The Lock Box was one of several mini-crusades he tackled immediately. The situation, as Crapo found it, was this:

If a congressional committee cut an appropriation for Program X, the committee members could make a big show of saving money for the taxpayers. But the taxpayers didn't really get the money back. It stayed in the system. Later on, when a congressional conference committee sorted out all the pluses and minuses, that "cut" money could get spent on Program Y or Program Z.

In short, budgets got cut, but no money really got saved.

Crapo's idea is to put the cut dollars into an imaginary piggy bank—the Lock Box. There it will stay, dedicated to reducing the federal deficit, unless Congress specifically decides to reallocate it.

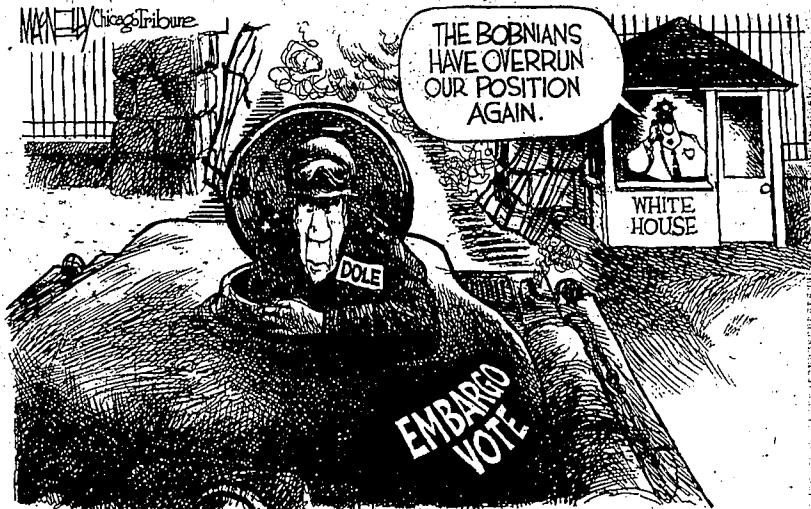
It's a swell idea. But back in 1993, the Democrats were in control of Congress, and Crapo's idea went nowhere...So did most of his other ideas, because he was a member of the minority Republican party.

It was only this year, after Newt Gingrich and his band of merry misers got into power, that Crapo started getting some traction. And this week the House passed the Lock Box, 373-53.

Funny thing about that vote, though. There aren't 373 Republicans in the House. A lot of those 373 votes came from Democrats.

Now, why do you suppose the Democrats would suddenly like Crapo's idea this year, after turning up their noses at it since 1993?

Maybe they just want to be on the winning side. Or maybe, after their disastrous showing in the 1994 election, they realize that voters are serious about reforming the Hill and balancing the budget.

I was very disappointed with the lack of response I received from my letter in the July 19 issue of The Times-News about trying to get toll-free telephone service throughout our Magic Valley.

Everyone I talked to very enthusiastically complimented me on my letter and are 100 percent in favor of going for it. But I only had one call from a fellow here in Jerome who offered to do any printing and copying we needed to have done.

This would be a big project. It would include the towns of Buhl, Castleford, Hagerman, Bliss, Gooding, Shoshone, Dietrich, Wendell, Jerome, Eden, Hazelton, Murtaugh, Kimberly, Hansen and Twin Falls. This would not include Filer unless its Mutual Telephone Co. was willing.

This would be very beneficial to all the merchants and businesses as well as individuals in the whole area.

In 1967, a group of us in Jerome County distributed petitions and sent more than 2,100 signatures to the Idaho Public Utilities Commission. They held several public meetings in Twin Falls and Jerome. We succeeded and did get the Metropac service that enabled us to call all 15 of the surrounding towns toll free. But in the years since, it has been changed several times until now we are only saving 1.5 cents to 2 cents a minute on Metropac calls.

The Boise area can call several towns, and in the Idaho Falls area, people can call every community in their county as well as all adjacent counties.

Here, Buhl, Castleford, Eden and Hazelton can't even call their own-county seat toll free.

I feel I have thrown out the first ball, and we need enough of you out there who are willing to pick it up and play the game to succeed.

Ridiculous Vehicles clog nation's parks, wild lands

In these hazy, crazy days of summer 1995, the 150th anniversary of the beginning of Henry David Thoreau's sojourn at Walden Pond, the news comes from Wyoming that they're widening the roads in Yellowstone National Park to better accommodate RVs - recreational vehicles.

A recent New York Times story reports that RVs now outnumber tents three to one in national park campsites.

Many travelers report even higher ratios. On a recent circuit of parks in the West, my wife and I were the only tent campers in most of the sites where we stayed. Before the asphalt reaches Old Faithful, and the last black-blacked mangle flees before the oncoming trailers, perhaps it's time we consider banning RVs from our national parks.

After all, these vehicles pose just as much of a direct threat to the parks as do the various mining and drilling proposals and suggested federal budget cuts that have generated so much smoke over the past 15 years. RVs pollute the air and tax waste disposal capacities. They generate noise and traffic that undermines the natural solace the parks are designed to preserve.

Nowadays, a latter day Thoreau, or John Muir, afoot under a full moon in one of our national parks, is far less likely to hear the coyote's sublime howl than the raucous clatter of RV generators and air-conditioners - and the parking of Sonys.

Today's RVs are a far cry from the spartan Travels-with-Charlie campers of a generation ago. The modern versions cost up to \$1 million, and are lumbering fiberglass behemoths replete with state-of-the-art kitchens, television sets and other amenities - often powered by noisy, smoke-belching generators. For day trippers, RV enthusiasts frequently tow cars behind their trailer rigs.

According to industry figures, there are now 9 million RVs on the road; 25 million Americans call themselves RV enthusiasts. Last year alone Americans spent \$10.3 billion purchasing 441,000 RVs, a 60 percent jump in sales over three years ago. Bringing even more smiles to the industry, RVs

tend to be most popular among older Americans - and baby boomers begin turning 50 this year.

The prevalence of our national parks will realize that the long-term interests of the greater number of American citizens - including the vast majority who do not own RVs - will be better served by getting these nasty gas-guzzlers out of our parks. If RVers want to visit the parks, fine - but let 'em drive their consciences of conspicuous consumption outside.

What, after all, is our mandate for the national parks? What do we want from them? Solace or consumerism? Roaring campfires or the ticking of microwave oven timers? Are these wilderness enclaves intended, as an early advocate argued, to preserve "rights and mysteries of nature that elevate mankind and bring it closer communion with omniscience?" Or, from here on-out, should we think of parks as just RV parking lots - albeit parking lots blessed with wonderfully scenic backdrops?

RVs are destroying the pleasures of visiting our last wild places - transforming them into scens of bloated consumerism. Incessant unplanned, unregulated development already has rendered much of North America a terminally bland landscape of strip malls, anonymous apartment complexes and fast-food rows. Before we turn over our national parks to that same culture, perhaps, at the least, we owe ourselves a national debate on the subject.

Thoreau went to Walden Pond "to live deliberately, to front only the essential facts of life," and when he left two years later, he had written the definitive American meditation on the regenerative powers of nature. Who would have guessed that the road away from Walden Pond would lead to Wal-Mart?

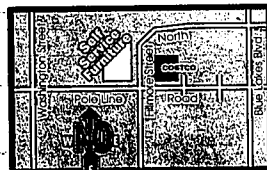

Service OKs South Hills timber sale

TWIN FALLS — Looking for lumber? The U.S. Forest Service is about to clear-cut and sell 63 acres of lodgepole pine trees from the Harrington Peak area atop the South Hills in the Sawtooth National Forest.

Twin Falls District Ranger Don Oman said the targeted area includes only dead or high-risk diseased trees.

Oman's order, signed last week and published Thursday, allows 45 days for anyone to appeal the timber sale and postpones "implementation of this decision" for another five business days.

But he said Thursday that sales of the 700,000 board-feet of lodgepole pines are planned to begin as early as Aug. 17. One board foot is 12 inches square and one inch

thick. The lumber could be bought in one of 14 sales later this month or in one of three sales scheduled for October.

"It's really a small-scale timber sale anyway," Oman said.

He said some timber sales take between 300 to 400 acres of trees from forested areas. The 63 acres of pines to be clear-cut from Harrington Peak could fill 140 logging trucks and build more than 30 typical 1,500-square-foot homes.

The lumber is going to be sold off in a series of sales to give smaller operators a better chance to buy the wood, Oman said.

He said this will be the first sale for the district in more than a year. Commercial timber sales are expected to rise next year to include 1.5 million board-feet of timber, he said. But in his Harrington Peak decision, Oman notes that no additional clear-cutting is planned "in this immediate area

in the foreseeable future," or for the next 10 years.

The state Department of Fish and Game still wonders how the clear-cut might affect the region's population of northern goshawks. Randy Smith, a regional wildlife biologist with the department in Jerome, said a goshawk nest was found near the proposed cutting site.

Smith's supervisor, Carl Nellis, wrote to the Forest Service three times in the past year to express his concerns about the sale.

"We saw few if any standing dead or dying trees within the cutting boundaries," Nellis wrote in a letter dated Aug. 30, 1994.

This May, Nellis wrote again to criticize the Forest Service for not knowing how northern goshawks would be affected by the clear-cutting.

Oman's decision Thursday reiterates his district's position that the goshawks, who

have a nest within a half-mile of the timber sale, probably will not be adversely affected. A road accessing the nest area will be closed, he said.

He also noted, however, that nesting areas for some birds find cover for deer will be reduced in the short-term future until the area is revegetated.

"This harvest should help create a more uniform distribution of different age stands for use by various wildlife species," Oman writes in his decision. "Natural changes in habitat will not be stopped with harvest, but the magnitude of these changes should be reduced."

Firefighters halt blaze before reaching towers

KIMAMA — Firefighters extinguished a 1,500-acre fire Thursday night on public land in Kimama before the blaze damaged communications towers atop Kimama Butte, said Pam Wallace, fire spokeswoman for the Bureau of Land Management.

Flames spread within 800 yards of the towers, but planes pumped the fire with retardant and a bulldozer dug a boundary around the blaze to prevent the flames from spreading, she said.

Twelve fire trucks and 60 firefighters worked through Wednesday night to contain the fire 14 miles northwest of Burley, then all Thursday to control it, she said. West End Rural Fire Department assisted.

Bureau says almost all Upper Snake reservoirs remain full

TWIN FALLS — The reservoirs of the upper Snake River remain virtually full, with only the American Falls Reservoir dropping significantly so far this summer.

Irrigation and other demands had reduced American Falls to 88 percent of capacity as of Monday, according to the Bureau of Reclamation. The total reservoir system was at 94 percent of capacity with 3.9 million acre-feet of water — the nine reservoirs upstream from Milner Dam in eastern Twin Falls County can hold 4.165 million acre-feet.

A year ago, the system held just 59 percent of its capacity in mid July. A snowy winter in the high country of Idaho and Wyoming replenished the reservoirs this year with spring run-off.

Air Force planes to get view of Magic Valley from above

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, CALIF. — Military planes that can reach speeds of about 2,000 miles per hour will be flying over the Magic Valley this month, according to a United States Air Force news release.

The planes, SR-71 Blackbirds, will fly an extensive schedule during August, the release says. SR-71 Blackbirds can fly at altitudes of 80,000 feet. The Air Force is recommissioning the planes — part of a \$30 million program.

Fish and Game sets conditions for the sale of fall hunting tags

BOISE — The Idaho Fish and Game Department has announced that unilled, uncontrolled hunt tags for deer, elk, and antelope will be sold on a first-come, first-served basis beginning at 9 a.m. on Aug. 15 at Fish and Game headquarters and its regional offices.

Early arrival is recommended; hunters frequently line up outside the buildings hoping to get one of the tags. Hunters are encouraged to bring their controlled hunt application, tag fees, and hunting license with them.

U.S. House passes longtime Crapo measure by wide margin

WASHINGTON — The U.S. House of Representatives has approved Idaho Rep. Michael Crapo's "Lock Box," which requires that spending cuts to appropriations bills go to deficit reduction unless they are specifically reallocated.

The House on Wednesday voted 373-53 for the amendment to its labor-human services-education appropriations bill for fiscal year 1996. The amendment would apply to all appropriations bills.

"Those who are interested in our budget process and protecting the fiscal stability of our budget system are all standing up tonight watching the vote on this floor," the Idaho Republican said.

Under current procedures, when Congress adopts spending cuts, the money usually is allocated by the conference committee rather than used to reduce the deficit.

Crapo first proposed the Lock Box in 1993 in a stand-alone bill. A bi-parisan version was introduced in 1994 and again in March.

Officials find remains of man whose truck went into river

MOUNTAIN HOME — Investigators have found the skeletal remains of an Idaho Falls man whose pickup plunged into the Middle Fork of the Boise River one month ago.

Robert Lang, a self-employed contractor, was identified by comparing dental records Thursday, said Chief Deputy Nick Schilz of the Elmore County Sheriff's Department.

Hikers strolling near the wooded east bank of the river discovered his remains Wednesday afternoon, Schilz said. High water had receded recently, leaving the remains on the banks near Arrowrock Dam, he said.

Authorities are still investigating why Lang's Ford pickup plunged over an embankment on July 8 four miles upstream from where his remains were found, Schilz said. Anyone with information should call the sheriff's department at 587-2121.

FAIRFIELD — Volunteers are slowly building a 40-by-72 log cabin along Soldier Creek that someday will be a home to 10 children with temporarily destitute, dysfunctional or abusive parents.

That way, Christian Children's Ranch — which has four such homes on an Eagle ranch and houses 50 children — won't have to turn away 15 children a week as it does now.

"We want to make room for as many as we can," said ranch director Claude Shubert. "We're able to work with families and hopefully put families back together."

"Most of them are in better situations after they left the home than they were before."

Shubert was in Twin Falls on Thursday, speaking to a community-minded organization whose Meridian chapter helped out once before the Kiwanis Club.

About 2 1/2 years ago, the Kiwanis Club in Meridian took over the building of a house on the ranch's Eagle property as a service project. Other clubs in the area donated materials.

"They wanted to do something for the kids in the community," Shubert said.

Kids such as Mandy and Christine, whose prosthi-

tute mother left them alone at their Garden City home for two weeks.

The girls were eating their last can of dog food when they were found and brought to the ranch for 2 1/2 years; they were reunited with their mother after she got out of drug rehabilitation.

Or Natalie and Nathan, who were sexually abused by their father. Their father is in prison for 40 years, and the children have been adopted. Shubert and his wife, Judy, still visit with and hope to get back 8-year-old Natalie, who weighed just 12 pounds at 9 1/2 months when the Shuberts started caring for her.

The ranch also gets children from Twin Falls, Jerome, Shoshone and other Magic Valley areas. Shubert told the Kiwanians before showing poster-sized pictures of children and telling

their stories.

"There might be situations right down the street from you that might really surprise you if you knew what was going on," he said.

The Twin Falls club is committed to helping the ranch, but the board hasn't decided yet how much financial support they will give, said President Neil Harpster.

Late candidate wins panel's nod for Senate seat

Gov. Batt can choose Sandy, Tews or Raymond to replace McRoberts

BUHL — District 22 Republican precinct committee made Hagerman farmer and Idaho Republican Party vice chairman John Sandy their top pick Thursday to serve in the state Senate.

Gerald Tews, a Filer rancher and longtime party activist, finished second in the balloting. Twin Falls auto dealer Roy Raymond, who had backing from the United States Militia Association, finished third.

Idaho Gov. Phil Batt will choose either Sandy, Tews, or Raymond to replace Joyce McRoberts, who resigned last month to take a job with the state Department of Health and Welfare.

Meeting at the Clear Lake Country Club near Buhl, GOP party leaders heard speeches by the half-dozen candidates before voting.

Sandy, 47, stressed his ties to the district and his lengthy service on behalf of the Republican Party. He also stressed the importance of small government, saying "the best government is the government closest to the people."

Tews, 65, said he'd like to see criminals and welfare recipients earn their keep. He questioned why criminals sit in air-condi-

tioned jails being fed and entertained while average Idahoans work. As for people on welfare, "Let's not give it all to them — make them get out and sweat like the rest of us."

Raymond, 54, described himself as a "charitable, compassionate, assertive and purposeful man." He called education "a privilege, not a right." He also denounced the Conference of the States, saying that "if this conference is held, we could lose a lot of our freedoms."

The conference — cancelled for this year — was proposed by GOP Utah Gov. Mike Leavitt, and would have been attended by representatives of all 50 states. It was overwhelmingly endorsed by Idaho's Legislature, and ostensibly it would bolster states' rights. But militia leaders have argued the conference is an attempt to throw out the U.S. Constitution.

An Idaho militia leader, Bill Tuttle of Twin Falls, was on hand Thursday to question the candidates. Afterwards, he said he was pleased with Raymond's responses.

"I like the sound of him," Tuttle added.

Thursday's vote was a setback for state Rep. Doug Jones, Twin Falls GOP Chairman Gary Grindstaff and Filer farmer Rex Reed — who had also sought the job.

Ex-sheriff's deputy sues Jerome County

JEROME — A sheriff's deputy is suing the county and his former bosses in federal court, claiming they fired him for reporting alleged wrongdoing within the Jerome County Sheriff's Department.

Information that Wayne Childers gave the FBI last year eventually led to a misdemeanor charge against Sheriff George Silver III, whom jurors found innocent in June of any crime for using a jail inmate to fix the sheriff's son's car.

Childers asserts his civil rights and rights to due process were violated when he was placed on administrative leave on Oct. 27, then later demoted, then fired, according to his complaint for a civil suit in U.S. District Court.

He is claiming more than \$50,000 for mental anguish and lost wages, the amount to be determined by jurors after trial. The lawsuit names sheriff Silver, undersheriff Bill Reid and Jerome County's defendants.

Childers filed suit several months ago after the county failed to respond within the limit of 90 days to Childers' tort claim, an employment legal notice against the government, said Jim Jones, former Idaho Attorney General and lawyer for Childers.

Lawyers will probably interview witnesses, including the sheriff and Reid, in Jerome sometime soon, Jones said. No hearing dates have yet been set for the trial, he said.

Childers also claims he was denied his right to have his lawyer present during a Nov. 1 hearing before his demotion, the complaint said. Silver later suspended him without pay for 80 hours, and warned him he would be watched as an employee, the complaint said.

But Jerome County Commissioners rescinded Childers' suspension and determined the disciplinary action unjustified, the complaint said. Childers left the sheriff's department on sick leave and never returned, citing ill will from his superiors, the complaint said.

Silver fired him on March 20, the complaint said. County commissioners upheld the termination.

David Sasser, hired by the county to represent them, declined to comment.

Judge dismisses case accusing AIDS victim of not telling partner

FARGO, N.D. (AP) — A judge Thursday threw out a complaint against a woman who was the first person accused under a North Dakota law requiring AIDS victims to warn partners if they are infected.

Cynthia Potete, a 40-year-old, AIDS activist who has lectured to some 20,000 children about how to avoid getting infected — was accused after a man who allegedly saw the couple having sex reported her to authorities.

But at a hearing on whether prosecutors had enough evidence to charge her, the witness said police misunderstood him and in fact he never saw them having sex.

East Central Judge Cynthia Rothe-Seeger dismissed the case.

"Based upon the testimony that we heard today, there didn't seem to be a lot of choice for the judge to make," prosecutor Brett Schasky said. "We can't control what the witnesses say."

Potete says she was so drunk that she can't remember whether she had sex with her former boss, Tim Martin, during a weekend of binge drinking in April.

Martin, who had boasted about having sex with Potete to the investigator, testified "that was just bragging."

Martin said he was drunk when the investigator interviewed him in a jail cell. He had been arrested for drunken driving. Martin did not willingly come forward and had to be subpoenaed to appear.

Before the hearing began, he apologized to Potete.

"I don't want to be here," he said. "They forced me in here."

Joe Johnson, Potete's lawyer, said he was pleased the complaint was dismissed.

"I think justice was served," he said.

Prosecutors had said Potete "intentionally, knowingly or recklessly engaged in sexual intercourse." She could have gotten 20 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

"They can't give me 20 years," said Potete, a recovering alcoholic and a former prostitute and intravenous drug user. "I don't have it to give."

Prosecutors don't know if Martin has the AIDS virus and

didn't have to prove that in court.

Potete said she ran into Martin in a bar April 30. She said one drink led to two, and the next thing she remembers is waking up naked in the back of Martin's pickup truck.

"If it had happened, I didn't consent to it. I don't know that I didn't tell him," about having AIDS, Potete said. "I tell everybody."

It was rape if Martin took advantage of her when she was drunk, said Robert Halfhill, a spokesman for AID-UP, an AIDS protest group, and Gay Liberation Front of Minnesota.

"If she feels like she's been raped, just like anyone else, she should report that," said prosecutor Mark Boening.

Potete said she has no plans to file rape charges.

Potete learned she had the AIDS virus after being admitted to a treatment program in 1987. She developed full-blown AIDS five years later.

Since 1993, she has taken part in an award-winning education project called Positive Voices, telling schoolchildren how to avoid AIDS.

Boise's push for more minority workers needs work

BOISE (AP) — More women are finding jobs in public service in Idaho, but racial minorities still are underrepresented in what remains a government top-heavy with white men.

Only one-third of Boise City employees are women, mostly because of the large numbers of male police officers and firefighters.

Of the 1,205 people who work for the city, 45 were racial minorities last year. That is 3.7 percent, a decline from the 4.4 percent the year before.

Sixteen Hispanics work for Boise, 1.25 percent of the city work force,

compared with 2.7 percent of the city population.

Critics say government needs to work harder to find minorities. Otherwise, all-hires will continue to come from job tips passed by white males to their white male friends.

"It's never been good for Hispanics to get into government," Idaho Migrant Council employment director Maria Salazar said. "There's never been an interest from the leadership. It's not enough to just mail out job listings. We would like them to work with us."

City and county officials say they

are trying to diversify the work force, but it is not easy.

Last year, Boise set goals for increasing women and minorities in 13 job types. Of those, three goals were met.

Boise targets Boise State University women's military programs for firefighter recruiting. It also mails job opening information to racial minority groups. There has been some success.

Connie Coulter was hired last year as Boise's first female firefighter. The city appointed Susan Mimura as city attorney on June 27, making her the only minority department manager.

Immigration raid finds 64 Thai workers allegedly held for years

EL MONTE, Calif. (AP) — Blanca Garcia said the whirring of sewing machines should have tipped her off to the sweatshop she passed unknowingly at least once a week.

"You could hear the drrr, drrr," Garcia, a nearby resident, said Thursday outside the small apartment complex. "But I thought maybe a woman was just finishing some work. I never suspected this."

State and federal agents raided the sweatshop early Wednesday and found 64 Thai immigrants, eight of whom were arrested. Some of the remaining people said they were held in indentured servitude for years to work off immigration costs as garment makers.

Two other people were arrested later. The 10 suspects face a myriad of charges ranging from violation of state minimum-wage regulations to federal smuggling laws.

"I think it's terrible that they would do something like that. It's just terrible," said Emma Ansan, who lives in a neighborhood of well-kept, small homes.

The 56 workers were detained by the Immigration and Naturalization Service in Los Angeles. It was not immediately clear whether they were all illegal immigrants.

Barbed wire was inconspicuously woven into the spiked security fence around the modern two-story, seven-unit complex in this suburb just east of Los Angeles. All seven apartments were used for the sweatshop.

More than \$750,000 in cash and a large amount of gold jewelry and gold bars were found in a safe at the sweatshop, investigators said.

State investigators said workers stitched together garment parts that were probably completed at an associated shop in Los Angeles last week.

Agents said the workers told them they were forced to work day and night for \$1.60 an hour to repay the cost of being transported from Thailand.

But several said they were not allowed to leave the complex even after their debts were repaid, said state Labor Commissioner Victoria Bradshaw. One woman told investigators she had worked at the site for

seven years, leaving only once for a New Year's Eve party.

The workers might be owed more than \$2 million in extra wages, Bradshaw said.

It's hard to imagine living like that," she said. "They basically worked from 7 in the morning until midnight every day. They slept on mats on the floor and were forced to buy food from their captors."

State and local officials have stepped up investigations of illegal garment makers in recent years.

Illicit operations like the one exposed in El Monte hurt legitimate apparel makers who are fast becoming an important part of California's economy, Bradshaw said.

Investigators learned of the factory through informants, some of whom had escaped from the complex, officials said.

Jose Reynosa, owner of the apartments that rented for \$950 each, said he had not been suspicious.

"They were always friendly to me," he said. "They paid their rent on time."

Court rejects death row inmate's appeal

BOISE (AP) — Because he didn't take advantage of the opportunity when it was first presented, death row inmate Gerald Ross Pizzuto Jr. has no right now to have a special attorney appointed to pursue a claim of ineffective assistance of counsel, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

The court on Thursday unanimously granted the state's motion to dismiss an appeal from Pizzuto to overturn his conviction and death sentence for two Idaho County killings.

Pizzuto was convicted of murder, robbery and theft in 1986 in the deaths of Berta and Delbert Herndon the year before at a remote Idaho County cabin.

At the heart of the appeal, argued before the Supreme Court in February, was a 1984 law requiring defendants in capital cases to raise all legal arguments reasonably known to them within 42 days of

sentencing. Sponsors contended it would prevent death row inmates from endless appeals, each raising a new issue.

In 1985, the Idaho Supreme Court upheld the law.

Attorneys arguing before the Supreme Court in February, on behalf of Pizzuto and Mark Henry Lankford, another death row inmate, said it wasn't clear until 1988 that they couldn't later raise the issue of ineffective assistance of counsel.

"What do we do with those people who were caught in the middle?" asked Andrew Parnes, Lankford's attorney.

The court noted that after Pizzuto was convicted and sentenced, the defendant asked for an independent "consulting attorney" to review his case to prepare a claim that his lawyers didn't do a good job.

The court noted that Judge

George Reinhardt III denied the request but suggested that if there was any question about the effectiveness of his trial lawyers, his trial attorneys should withdraw from the case and have other lawyers appointed.

"Pizzuto now uses this as a basis for asserting that he could not reasonably have raised these claims in his first petition," the court said.

The court said the record clearly shows that at the time of the hearing on his first petition for post-conviction relief, the slayer's lawyers were aware that there could be a claim of ineffective assistance.

The Supreme Court ruled there is nothing to authorize an exception to the law and permit another petition for post-conviction relief, "which raises claims that were known by the petitioner at the time of a prior petition, but were voluntarily not pursued at that time."

Assisted suicide law unconstitutional

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — A law that would have been the first in the world to allow doctors to prescribe lethal doses of medication for dying patients was ruled unconstitutional Thursday by a federal judge.

"With state-sanctioned and physician-assisted death at issue, some 'good results' cannot outweigh other lives lost due to unconstitutional errors and abuses," U.S. District Judge Michael Hogan wrote.

The measure was approved by voters in November 1994 but was blocked by a court challenge Dec. 7, the day before it was to have become law.

Drive-by suspect to be tried as adult

RUPERT — One of three teenagers who will face aggravated assault charges in connection with a drive-by shooting in Heyburn this week is at large and will be tried as an adult, the Minidoka County prosecutor said Thursday.

Police think Steve Rendon of Burley was driving the white 1980 Oldsmobile Cutlass from which shots were fired at 17-year-old Robert Ruiz's car Tuesday night, said Minidoka County Prosecutor Gara Newman.

Rendon turns 18 today, Newman said.

A warrant for his arrest was issued Thursday.

Police think Rendon got out of the white Oldsmobile and another juvenile male got in before it was stopped by Cassia County sheriff's deputies at the 1600 block of Hiland Avenue in Burley.

Two 17-year-old males being held at the Mini-Cassia Juvenile Justice Center in Rupert also will be charged with aggravated assault, but as minors.

One fired at Ruiz's car as it was traveling west on 400 South near the corner of Q Street in Heyburn.

Another got out of the Oldsmobile, approached Ruiz's car and brandished a gun while Ruiz waited for a stoplight to change at the intersection of 400 South and Highway 27.

One of them also faces concealed weapon, drunken driving and driving-without-privileges charges in Cassia County.

Anyone who was in the car at the time of the shooting and was aware that it would take place can be charged with aggravated assault, Newman said.

Two females also got in the car between the time of the shooting and the time it was stopped in Burley, Newman said.

The females were released after police determined they had nothing to do with the shooting.

The male who got in the Oldsmobile after the shooting is being held on unrelated charges, Newman said.

Ruiz told police that some of the occupants of the Oldsmobile had tried to engage him in a fight earlier Tuesday night, Newman said.

Clown reaches new heights in Minidoka

RUPERT — Minidoka County Fair organizers wanted something different this year — they found it in Richard Renner, a still-walking, unicycle-riding former Kansas farm boy turned "Vodvill Klown."

The 38-year-old veteran of county and state fairs from New Jersey to Idaho — "California has a pretty good assortment of variety artists of its own, and most of them are in the legislature" — said he found the Minidoka County Fair to be different even without him.

"People around here break out in applause in stages of my show where I've never had that happen before. They have a strong appreciation for entertainment," Renner said.

He said the fair is unusual in that organizers forego frills like carnival rides and instead focus on entertainment that has something to do with the area.

"They had cowboy poetry out there (Wednesday) night and it was just one of the neatest things. It reflected the people's values and everyone could relate to it. That just what a county fair is supposed to do, reflect the values of the people," he said.

Renner says that making others laugh is what makes him happy.

The stage show he performed at the fairgrounds Tuesday and Wednesday nights has evolved over the 13 years since he graduated from the University of Kansas with a degree in drama.

The silent clown character he uses on stage is influenced by film comedian Buster Keaton, he said.

In the show, he communicates with the audience only through gestures, looks, a kazoo and an occasional scream. The act involves unicycling, juggling, battles with props and a lot of pratfalls, he said.

Renner's other specialty is still-walking. Wearing four-foot stilts, which bring his total height to 10 feet, he has been walking around the fairgrounds every afternoon since Tuesday

He's on the Missouri Arts Commission and the Kansas Arts Council, and has studied at Mared Marceau's — a widely known French mime — first U.S. pantomime school.

Despite his success, Renner is humble about his chosen vocation.

"My whole career is based upon useless skills for fun and profit," he said.

Kempthorne hears views on Endangered Species Act

of farmers, business, and nonprofit organization executives, testified that species of national concern should be subsidized by everyone, not just the individual land owner.

The panel listed a number of other options for reform including congressional loans to land owners for providing a habitat, and government funding to match local donations. But all agreed that while most landowners are dedicated to conserving these species, they reject the heavy burdens placed upon them.

An executive for a Coeur d'Alene mining company said ESA's tight restrictions led to a temporary injunction on his mine because of fear it would endanger a nearby salmon tributary — which proved to be false.

"The Grouse Creek Mine is a state-of-the-art facility," said Michael White of Hecla Mining Co. "It has been constructed not only to meet, but to exceed, existing environmental requirements."

While Kempthorne acknowledged problems with the act, he rejected some radical moves such as making compliance with its provisions voluntary. He said that while property owners may have good intentions, a voluntary program would not be effective. He did say transfer of regulatory authority to states would greatly relieve many fears people have that the government is trying to run their lives.

Thursday's hearing was the final in a series on Capitol Hill. The last field hearing on reforming the Endangered Species Act will take place in Casper, Wyo., during the Senate's August recess. Kempthorne said he plans to introduce his reform bill shortly after the break.

WASHINGTON — A spokesman for an Idaho irrigators' organization Thursday told Sen. Dirk Kempthorne and a Senate panel that there should be a way to help endangered species without simultaneously hurting people.

Sheri L. Chapman, the executive director of the Idaho Water Users Association, told Kempthorne that Idaho water users would be willing to comply with the Endangered Species Act provided the government "protects our property rights."

Efforts to save threatened salmon stocks could cost Idaho's Snake River basin 427,000 acre feet of water by 1998, he said. He said this would put the river's reservoirs, which funnel water to the 1.5 million acres of irrigated land, at a dangerously low level.

Kempthorne said the ESA is not working for farmers, loggers and ordinary citizens. The Idaho Republican chairs the Drinking Water, Fisheries and Wildlife Subcommittee, which plans to revamp the ESA this fall.

Kempthorne suggested incentives to encourage land owners and companies to become hosts for endangered species without losing the use of their land.

But a spokeswoman for a wildlife conservation organization said while incentives are beneficial, people misinterpret the Endangered Species Act. "Land owners think if an endangered species is found on their property all production stops," said Heather Weiner, a lawyer for The Defenders of Wildlife. "Less than 1 percent of companies have had to be stopped because of endangered species."

Additionally, Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt has proposed exempting small property owners from the ESA.

Jérome, Rupert and Burley may take on the ranch as a division project, said division incoming Lt. Gov. Bob Amouroux, who asked Shubert to speak at all the clubs.

The non-profit ranch has 390 acres five miles north of Fairfield off Soldier Mountain Road called the "Burdy Youth Ranch." Interfaith Christian Camp uses about 45 acres of the donated horse-and-cattle ranch.

The ranch's Fairfield cabin already is licensed as a children's home by the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, and a couple who worked about five years on the Eagle ranch will be the cabin's "parents," Shubert said.

So far this year, a group from Tillamook, Ore., and a group of 35 from

Bloomington, Ind., helped work on the Fairfield cabin. With the cabin's flooring nearly complete and the logs waiting, Shubert said the cabin will need trusses and a metal roof by the end of September in preparation for winter.

Shubert said the ranch costs about \$220,000 a year to run, which comes from donations and proceeds from livestock sales. When they build another cabin — there is room for two more on the Fairfield ranch — they pay as they go.

"We're looking for someone who wants to get involved with the next board or the next appliance," said Shubert, adding that the Fairfield cabin could be filled in a week. "We build it as fast as materials and funds are available."

The poll conducted by the Mellman Group on June 28-30 found that 43 percent of the 500 likely voters questioned statewide would vote to re-elect Craig.

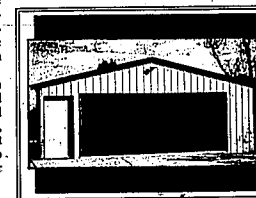
Only 12 percent said they would vote to replace the senator, who served five terms in the House before winning the race to succeed retiring GOP Sen. James McClure in 1990.

HANSEN — There's a new sport in town, and it's just a mess.

Speedball, or arena ball, is a "high-adrenaline" version of paintball, according to Jack Pruett, owner of Paintball Ink, a paintball arena located on Idaho Highway 50 northwest of here. Speedball is like a small battle, consisting of three- to five-man teams that use special guns to shoot small pellets of paint at their opponents.

The speedball players begin the game by facing away from each other and counting backward from three. When the count reaches "one," the players turn and shoot. The paint pellets are about .68 caliber, Pruett said, and they sting when they hit. Most players don't mind, though, because they're concentrating on the game, he said.

There's not much time to think about anything other than aiming and shooting, since a typical speedball game lasts about three minutes, although the maximum time allotted is 10 minutes, Pruett said.

"Basically, this is a real fast and intense sport much like an old-fashioned shootout," he said.

Speedball differs from paintball, a sport whose popularity has burgeoned in the past few years, in that it's a game of speed, not strategy.

New technology, such as "semi-automatic" guns that players can operate with one hand and which shoot up to 200 rounds of paint in three minutes, began to take the place of "pump" guns, which require two hands and have a slower rate of fire. This technology spared the growth of speedball, Pruett said.

"Speedball really tests your reflex ability because it moves so quickly," he said. "You really don't have time to think."

Dave Smith was one of the first Magic Valley residents to play speedball in Pruett's new outdoor arena at Paintball Ink. Smith, of Jerome, has played paintball regularly since last year with his two sons, but recently has become interested in speedball's "fast and furious" pace.

"It's quite an adrenaline rush because you have to fire as fast as you can, keep an eye on everybody who can be shooting at you, and hope you have time to get them before they get you," Smith said. "You have to be your strategist."

Speedball's messy mayhem has caught on throughout the area, with many tournaments taking place to test players' skills and speed, Pruett said. Not even the Magic Valley is left untouched; with Pruett planning an Aug. 26

tournament at the Paintball Ink arena. Speedball teams from Pocatello, the Wood River Valley and Boise will take part, he said.

But while the tournaments give the game more recognition, their intensity limits the number of people willing to participate, he said, especially if they haven't played much before.

"A lot of the local players are scared away because tournament play is so fast and so different," Pruett said. To compensate for this, Pruett has designated four divisions of play in his tournament so that those with every ability level can participate.

But with the faster pace of speedball come increased dangers, Pruett said. Since the guns can shoot paint pellets at speeds up to 300 feet per second, the risk of being injured is very real, he said.

"It only takes a second to lose an eye," Pruett said, adding that speedball tyles require players to wear special goggles made specifically for paintball and speedball play. Motor-

cycle goggles, ski goggles and other safety goggles are ineffective, and Pruett warns against substituting these types of eye protection for paintball goggles simply because they don't offer enough protection, he said.

Players also wear headgear that protects the ears and face, although the danger of a serious injury to those areas is less immediate, he said.

Safety is enforced on every level of play, from beginners to professionals, mainly because most insurance companies require eye and face protection for players, he said.

The amount of safety equipment needed is minimal, however, and the price of full protection is anywhere from \$35 to \$65, Pruett said. Players can rent safety equipment, but most choose to just buy their own goggles and face protection, he said.

A top-of-the-line semi-automatic gun can cost up to \$600, while a pair of rented coveralls to protect players' clothing from paint is

only \$4. Most players at Paintball Ink pay around \$30 to rent a gun, buy paintballs and rent the arena to "blaze some paint," Pruett said.

Under new conductor, Sun Valley Symphony shifts gears

SUN VALLEY — It's a symphony made up of musicians from all over the map, playing at a new address and directed by a new conductor. And 48 hours before opening night, Alasdair Neale, was struggling just to get over jet-lag.

"We'll rehearse for a few hours (Friday) and a few hours Saturday — whatever it takes," said Neale, who succeeds Carl Eberl at the podium of the Sun Valley Summer Symphony, which has 10 summer players, playing at Ketchum. "Fortunately, our repertory is such that every musician will be familiar with it."

This will be the 11th summer of free outdoor symphony concerts in Sun Valley, featuring world-class musicians. The orchestra will play 12 concerts through Aug. 26.

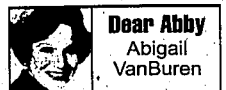

Citizen Zhirinovsky: Be afraid

Russian ultra-nationalist Vladimir Zhirinovsky is an equal opportunity offender. Recently, he referred to Vice President Gore as a "Jew" (he is not), intending it as an insult. During a visit to New Delhi in March, he created a huge stir by saying that India should be restored to its pre-independence form, including the nations of Pakistan and Bangladesh. He offered vodka to a top Indian minister who is forbidden by religious law from drinking in public.

Taping an interview with a freelance writer for Playboy magazine, Zhirinovsky urged the journalist and his 25-year-old female interpreter to have sex with him and his two young male bodyguards. Just a few weeks ago during a televised talk show, he hurled a glass of orange juice in the face of a regional Russian governor, who said he had heard Zhirinovsky had syphilis.

The indignation — over perhaps the incitation — of world leaders is to dismiss Zhirinovsky as a clown. Given the volatility of post-communist Russia, the clown might well have the last laugh.

In the hit summer movie "Crimson Tide," the untested progenitor of a nuclear crisis is a Zhirinovsky-like character rattling sabres on the steppes. Detractors love to call him "Vladimir Adolfovich," for Hitler-like behavior.

This summer also brings two new biographies: "Zhirinovsky: Russia's Fascism and the Making of a Dictator," by the husband-wife writing team of Vladimir Solovyov and Elena Klepikova (Columbia Addison-Wesley, \$26), and "Zhirinovsky," by Vladimir Kartsev (Columbia University Press, \$25), former director of Moscow's Mir Press publishing house, where Zhirinovsky toiled as a legal adviser for seven years.

Zhirinovsky started political observers when he finished third

behind Boris N. Yeltsin in the 1991 presidential election in Russia, receiving about 8 percent of the vote. As Russia stumbled from its suppower perch, Zhirinovsky's blatant appeals to right-wing extremists — and hardline nationalists struck a nerve in the proud Russian soul.

In the 1993 legislative elections, Zhirinovsky won 24 percent of the popular vote, and his perversely named Liberal Democratic Party became, along with the revitalized Communist Party, a powerful voting bloc in the parliament.

He still leads the largest opposition faction in the lower house of the legislature, but Zhirinovsky's pronouncements have gotten so extreme that his power has ebbed slightly.

Mired in misadventure in the breakaway republic of Chechnya, Russian soldiers — once among his most ardent admirers — said Zhirinovsky's oft-expressed expansionist desires to reclaim former republics contributed to the fiasco.

Recently-repatriated nationalist author Alexander Solzhenitsyn tells him "a caricature of a Russian patriot." Yet legislative elections are scheduled for December, followed by a presidential vote in June 1996, and Zhirinovsky will have to be reckoned with.

Solovyov and Klepikova, authors of the 1992 Yeltsin biography, take Zhirinovsky seriously because he appeals to the Russian ideal of "rodina," or motherland. "Zhirinovsky is the last poet of the Russian empire; his patriotic slogans combine pathos, nostalgia, pain, hurt and the desire to obtain immediate revenge for national humiliation," they write.

Russia acquiring new territory so that its soldiers "can wash their boots in the Indian Ocean." The Liberal Democratic Party's unsubtle logo is an eagle flying over a map of Russia that includes Alaska and Finland.

His outrageous and spite statements have made Russians laugh and "chamed the chauvinists." "He peddles hope to people who have lost everything," Solovyov and Klepikova say.

Perhaps one way to neutralize Zhirinovsky, they suggest, would be for Yeltsin to give him a post in his administration. "The most dangerous thing," they write, "would be to leave such a person politically unemployed, left to his own devices. It leaves him no other course but to seek revenge, to fight for the highest office in the land."

Kartsev bills his book as an "insider's account" of Zhirinovsky, and backs this up by informing us — during a discussion of Zhirinovsky's rumored Jewishness — that the politician is not circumcised.

As with his fellow bio-analysts, Kartsev theorizes that the ultra-nationalist is attempting to overcompensate for some perceived personal inadequacy, whether sexual or professional. At Mir's office parties, the person who portrayed Zhirinovsky always sang a well-known Soviet song, "This fine line of which is 'Choose me! Choose me, the bird of tomorrow's happiness.'" He likens Zhirinovsky to Madonna as a press-courting opportunist.

Yet Kartsev's first-person psychological profile is often repetitious, self-indulgent and unfocused. As Russians hunger for law and economic order, Kartsev concludes that corruption benefits a so-called strongman. The continuing chaos, or "bespredel," is why Zhirinovsky, "with his coarse manners and bizarre ideas, is able to win the votes of millions."

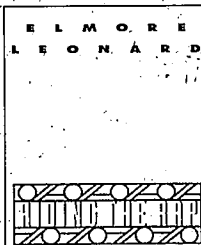

'Riding the Rap': Where crime novel should have gone

Rule: Odds favor bookmakers. Exception: Harry Amro.

By attempting to collect an old debt, this Miami Beach bookie ends up a hostage. His life and life's savings are on the line. His only shot at being rescued is a long one named Raylan Givens.



Book review

Raylan is a modern-day U.S. marshal in a Stetson and cowboy boots. An armed anachronism, he once gave a bad guy 24 hours to get out of town — and shot him when he didn't. But that's an old story.

Raylan and Harry have a common interest: Her name is Joyce Patton. Joyce dumped Harry for Raylan at the end of that old story. Now she is having second thoughts. The fact that Raylan shot a man is morally troubling to the former topless dancer.

Joyce also harbors concern bordering on affection for Harry. He telephones daily. So when two days pass without a call, Joyce becomes frantic. She's so frantic she asks Raylan

to investigate in his spare time.

"He might've said, 'What if I don't want to find him? But he didn't,' and there was a silence. He was getting used to silences talking to her."

Leonard rounds up a familiar lineup for his latest crime novel. Fans will recall 1993's "Fronto," in which Raylan rescued Harry from a mob hit in Italy and collected Joyce as a reward. "Riding the Rap" (Delacorte Press, \$22.95) is a sequel.

Back in South Florida, Harry is semi-retired and enjoying his favorite

sports — drinking to excess and expounding about Ezra Pound to types who mistake the poet for a boxer. "Ez was a very dear friend of mine."

His troubles begin at a bar where he mixes alcohol with a fetching female psychic who has tarot cards up her sleeve. The psychic offers to tell Harry's fortune, but she's really trying to seal his fate.

Under hypnosis, Harry reveals that he skimmed millions of dollars as a bookie for the mob. For a fee, the psychic shares his secrets with a former bounty hunter by the name of Bobby Deogracias, aka Bobby the Gardner.

Harry had hired Bobby to collect an old debt. Bobby, it turns out, is banking on a bigger score. Next thing Harry knows, he is blindfolded and listening to Bobby talk about an appendage that is painfully vulnerable to prying snips.

Will Raylan save Harry, shoot Bobby or run off with the psychic? Only the psychic knows for sure, and she doesn't give away the ending.

Sequels typically get bad rap for good reasons. Those reasons do not apply to "Riding the Rap." It is fresh, fast and funny.

Hard-boiled Ferrigno finds it harder to make fantasy overtake reality

When writer Robert Ferrigno came to work as an Orange County, Calif., reporter in the early 1980s, he said he discovered a land so closely matching his own "internal landscape" that it would forever be his home.

Though he left the area four years ago for Seattle and has traded newspaper reporting for writing books, he still calls Orange County home, and he's still writing books that are set here.

The self-described writer of "romantic thrillers" recently completed his third book set in Orange County, "Dead Man's Dance" (Ferrigno, \$23.95, 384 pages), and already is embarked on a fourth, "Dead Silent," for which movie rights sold last week for a cool six-figure sum.

"For whatever reason, this is my internal landscape. For whatever reason, this is what I call home," said Ferrigno, 47, during a recent book signing. "Even though I left, emotionally and internally, this is where I am."

Fox 2000, a newly formed film division of Twentieth Century Fox, agreed to pay him six figures for the rights to make a movie out of Ferrigno's next book after seeing just 40 pages of it and hearing a verbal plot summary of the rest. If the movie is made, Ferrigno will get paid at least \$1 million.

"I was in bed when I got the news, which is good. I didn't fall down,"

Ferrigno said. "I can't wait to go back and finish."

"I'm kind of used to this kind of more exciting pressure," added Ferrigno, who sold his first book, "Horse Latitudes," when it was only half finished. "It makes it more exciting."

In "Horse Latitudes" and Ferrigno's second book, "Cheshire Moon," his tough-guy characters all spring from the newness and overactive ambition that he says make up the essence of Orange County.

The fast-growing county resembles an ongoing urban renewal project, he said, where the old constantly is being demolished to make way for new freeways, new strip malls and an ever-spreading wave of housing tracts.

"I try to show what Orange County really is," the Florida native said. "I see it as a cauldron of ambition, all races, all groups, all kinds of people. ... It's all here. You got varieties of types in one spot."

"I always say all my success comes from writing for newspapers," Ferrigno said. "You learn to write for readers and learn that readers count. You learn how to be visual, and how to be concise. ... I do that with my books."

He described his Orange County beat primarily as writing about "new money" society. These are the people

who made wealth themselves, often starting with nothing, Ferrigno said. They are people who rose up by working two jobs and going to night school or who started a business out of the back seat of their cars.

"These are people who dream large. But in my vision, their dreams turn on them," Ferrigno said. "I draw from those people."

Orange County is a place, he added, where "everything was new and fresh and a little scary." Sometimes, ambition takes over, he said.

In Ferrigno's "Cheshire Moon," his chief bad guy, Emory Roy Liston, is a killer who studies world literature, world history and world religion in adult-education classes.

"Dead Man's Dance" features a handsome hit man named Rick who kills to earn money to finance his dream: a full-service beauty spa with everything from aroma therapy to seaweed body wraps.

Rick, who also works as a hair stylist, keeps his styling shears in a leather shoulder holster.

One of Ferrigno's heroines is a deputy district attorney named Tina Chavez, whom Ferrigno loosely patterned after an Orange County officer who once ran with the gangs.

"Like many real heroes, Tina Chavez had reached a crossroads in life where she chose between good and bad."

"A lot of my bad guys are confused for good guys and my good guys are confused for bad guys," Ferrigno said. "Even if you make the right decision (in life), you still carry the potential to be that bad person."

For too long, the arts have ignored pigs. Whales and horses have had their day in the sun, but where is the great American porker novel, the porcine symphony, the all-pig production of "Hamlet"? And if you talk to me about "Charlotte's Web," either the spider is the star of that show.



Babe, the pig, just isn't satisfied with his life. He yearns to be a sheepdog. So he moves to a farm, learns to herd sheep and finds wacky adventures on the way — oh, and this pig talks.

Now, finally, comes "Babe," the improbably enchanting fable about a pig who longs to be a sheepdog. I can't imagine anybody who wouldn't love this movie, and if they're out there, I don't want to meet them.

Babe is a determined little guy who moves to a quaint English farm with the Hoggetts. The affable Babe isn't so good at picking his friends, and he soon falls in with a renegade duck who's planning a coup at the Hoggett house. Meanwhile, some mad scientist can teach Babe to herd sheep, a skill that makes him useful and, thus, hot a potential pork chop.

Are you getting the idea that "Babe" is odder than the average children's movie? And I haven't even told you that the animals can talk with each other, or that the movie has a pronounced vegetarian bent. There's a you-can-be-whatever-you-want-to-be message, but, more importantly,

"Babe" is filled with love, and respect for all living things. The movie is never preachy. After it's over, you realize how much is going on in "Babe," but its pleasures have more to do with seeing animals (and realistic animal puppets) do astonishing things. One morning, Babe, in his sweet, little-boy voice, asks a rooster, "Sorry, sir, but it's nearly dawn, and I was wondering if you would mind crowing just a few minutes early today. No? Oh, OK." Then he toddles off to his next adventure, and you find yourself wishing the world did reverse around this adorable little pig. (*Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley*)

Fossil Beds monument sets weekend walks

HAGERMAN — Two events for people interested in the Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument are planned for this weekend.

A ranger from the Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument will lead a walk Saturday to help people learn how certain plants and animals have adapted to the desert and appreciate these adaptations for survival.

A walk along a primitive route that provides similar conditions and scenery experienced by emigrants as they traveled through this area will take place Sunday. The hike is three miles long and includes a steep grade similar to those wagons once climbed. Those attending should wear long pants.

Both events require participants to meet at 9 a.m. at the National Park Service Visitor Center, located across from Hagerman High School on Highway 30. People should be prepared for variable weather and

But it is wide-mouthed, sensual Sedgwick, looking alarmingly like her movie sis Roberts, who steals the show. The only member of the family who doesn't shrink back from reality, she tosses Khouri's zingers like silver darts.

Maybe now we'll see more of this strong, gifted actress.

With this friendly bit of fluff, Roberts begins her slingshot return from a shipwrecked marriage and two tepid films. The box-office failure last year of "Love Trouble" and "Ready-to-Wear" pulled her off the Hollywood Reporter's A-plus bankability list. "Something to Talk About" should provide a shiny piton for the climb back up. (*Twin Cinema*)

Scouts, look out: Stern leads pack in 'Bushwacked'

Movies playing in the Magic Valley this week. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and reviews are by the Los Angeles Times.

"Bushwacked" — Daniel Stern plays a sloppy, kid-hating guy who's accused of a crime he didn't commit. So what he does is hide out with a bunch of 10-year-old Scouts on their first camping trip. (PG-13, for crude dialogue.) (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Burley Theater)

"Apollo 13" — It happened in 1970: three astronauts in a dying ship 200,000 miles from Earth need all kinds of help to get home. An engrossing true story on the whole impressive tale by director Ron Howard but undercut by the filmmakers' lack of trust in the material, which allows a sense of phoniness to intrude on the proceedings. Tom Hanks is ace once again as the heroic commander Jim Lovell. (PG, for language and some smoking.) (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

"Batman Forever" — Not a film for the ages, but acceptable, even though over-14s may find themselves begging for a little modulation as supervillains Tommy Lee Wallace and the Gotham Trio (PG-13, strong stylized action.) (Grand-Vu Drive-in)

"Braveheart" — Mel Gibson directed and stars in this almost-three-hour epic about 13th century Scottish freedom fighter William Wallace. It's enjoyable for the first two hours or so as a medieval hiss-the-British Westerner, but it goes into battle overkill. (R, for medieval warfare.) (Shoshone Showhouse)

"Clueless" — Starring the much-publicized Alicia Silverstone as an over-empowered Beverly Hills teen who decides to transform a clueless fellow student, this wacky funny farce from writer-director Amy Heckerling ("Fast Times at Ridgemont High") turns out, like its heroine, to have more to it than anyone could have anticipated. Heckerling's dead-on dialogue, Silverstone's ditto

performance and a plot inspired by Jane Austen's "Emma" lead to a surprising amount of pleasure. (PG-13, sex-related dialogue and some teen use of alcohol and drugs.) (Jerome Cinema, The Movie House of Ketchum)

"First Knight" — Sean Connery as the king and Julie Ormond as his Guinevere do fine in Jerry Zucker's version of the Arthurian legend, but Richard Gere is too relentlessly contemporary an actor to be convincing as King Lot. Overall an acceptable Camelot romance that suffers from its inability to compel belief. (PG-13, for some brutal medieval battles.) (Twin Cinema)

"Free Willy 2: The Adventure Home" — This sequel is as OK as the original; tolerable for adults, occasionally inspiring, perhaps, for children. Willy once again bonds with Jesse, fights off slicks, recovers lost harmonicas. (PG for language.) (Twin Cinema, Ace Theatre of Wendell)

"The Indian in the Cupboard" — This gentle and lengthy story about a magic cupboard that brings toy plastic figures to life both entertains and teaches its lessons with a welcome lack of pretension. Starring a delightful Hal Scardino, written by "E.T."s Melissa Mathison and directed by Muppet veteran Tim Hodge. (PG, mild language and brief vivid images of violence and sexy dancing.) (Gooding Cinema, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

"The Net" — Sandra Bullock stars as a computer dweeb who falls afoul of an elaborate scheme to hijack the information superhighway, and soon sinister elements are trying to take her permanently off-line. Bullock's appeal remains unquestionable, but this technophobic wallow might be more persuasive if it didn't play out so

leadenly and wasn't riddled with plot holes, contrivances and utter implausibility. (PG-13, for violence, some sexuality and brief strong language.) (Mall Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum, Ace Theatre of Wendell)

"Nine Months" — Hackneyed and predictable, films like this pose a greater threat to Hugh Grant's career than the vice squad. Both he and Julianne Moore are wasted in this forgettable comedy about a woman who wants a child and a boyfriend who isn't too sure. Guess who wins out in the end. (PG-13, language and sexual innuendo.) (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley)

"Operation Dumbo Drop" — Solid family film an adventure-comedy set in Vietnam in 1968, of all places, and detailing the transporting of an elephant more than 200 dangerous miles. Inspired by an actual incident, amazingly, and enlivened by strong portrayals by Danny Glover, Ray Liotta, Denis Leary, Doug E. Doug and Corin Nemec. (R, for war action and language.) Isaak's breakup inspires new release

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Inside Chris Isaak's latest CD cover, he poses a letter to the ex-girlfriend who inspired the recording.

"Do you sleep with somebody else now? How is that? I tell myself not to think about that stuff but I do," part of it goes. "Hope you mourn an appropriate amount of time. At least 5 or 6 hours, I hope."

The handwritten missive matches the adjacent, moody black-and-white photograph of the retro-rock singer-songwriter.

"I thought it gave people a way in on the record, gave them a way of knowing where I was coming from when I was writing this thing," Isaak said of his fifth album, "Forever Blue" (Reprise).

After his girlfriend walked out on Oct. 26, 1993, "not that I'm counting," a depressed and dazed Isaak sat in his living room in San Francisco's foggy Sunset District, writing the songs that chronicle the tortured breakup of a three-year relationship.

"When you first break up, there's a lot of confusion, a lot of anger, you ask yourself 'what happened?'" he said. "I remember sitting around and feeling like my legs were heavy. I was drinking a malted milkshake with every meal and I still lost 20 pounds. I was so nervous and wrecked, I'd just work it off."

The album — which weaves vintage rock 'n' roll with country and '60s surf influences — opens up with a wrathful, thumping number, "Baby Did A Bad Bad Thing." Others follow, like the pleading "Don't Leave Me On My Own" and the almost panic-stricken "There She Goes."

From the looks of the 38-year-old singer — crystal blue eyes that rival Paul Newman's and short chestnut hair swept away from a well-chiseled face (even the nose, target of his many college boxing bouts, is only slightly

— it's hard to imagine that Isaak was the dumper. At a recent concert at the House of Blues on L.A.'s Sunset Strip, female fans were swooning over the singer, clad in a shimmering blue suit. He

says he's not dating anyone seriously (although he's been seeing hands with Paula Abdul, and Madonna is said to be an ardent admirer).

Sitting poolside at a Studio City

hotel, Isaak admits his thoughts are still with his ex-girlfriend.

"I'm not in the middle of it, but I still think about her," he said.

"Looking back, I think it's amazing. We must have really loved each other. I think it's amazing that two people who have so many things that were totally out of whack with one another could hang together even that long.

"It was night and day," he explained. "We were always on different schedules. I'd want to pick up my guitar and play ballads at night, she'd pick up the channel changer. I'd say let's go for a run, and she'd say 'yeah' and hop on my back."

While Isaak's not the first to air relationship problems in public (Phil Collins, for one, wrote several songs about his painful divorce), some might wonder why he would throw his bruised heart into the spotlight.

"Am I supposed to be embarrassed because I say what I feel? I'm not," he said.

Besides, he said, those listening to the album will ponder their own relationships, not his.

"It's not like a window. It's more like a mirror," he said. "People are not looking into me, they're looking at themselves."

Isaak recorded his first album, "Silverone," in 1985. But it was the haunting ballad "Wicked Game" from his 1989 album "Heart-Shaped World" and the accompanying black-and-white video showing Isaak with a topless coquette on a beach that propelled him to stardom. Director David Lynch featured the song on the soundtrack of his 1990 film "Wild at Heart."

Another Hollywood director and Isaak fan, James L. Brooks, cast the singer in cameos in "Married to the Mob" and "The Silence of the Lambs." Last year, he had a lead role in Bernardo Bertolucci's "Little Buddha."

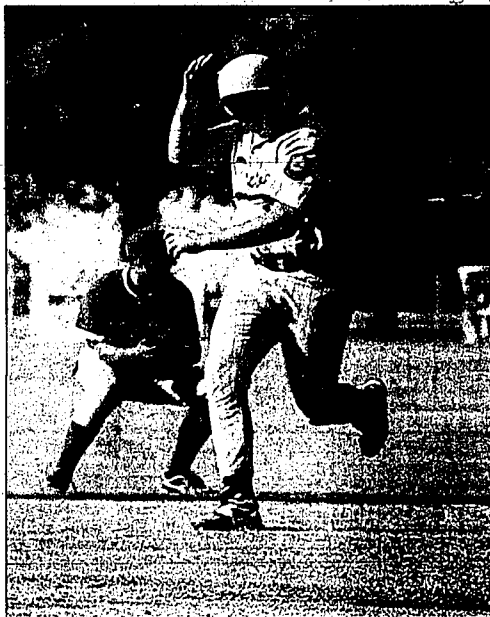

Panel OKs measure to kill special status for baseball

WASHINGTON — A proposal to strip major league baseball of its exemption from antitrust laws — a benefit for owners since 1922 — won narrow approval by a Senate panel Thursday.

With the sport's longest strike still fresh in lawmakers' minds, the Senate Judiciary Committee voted 9-8 for the bill to revise baseball's unique status. The vote sends the issue toward what would be its first consideration by a full house of Congress.

Prospects for passage were unclear. Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, the committee chairman and the measure's chief author, "hopes the bill will move quickly" to a vote, said spokeswoman Jeanne Lopatto. Others on Capitol Hill noted the emo-

tional issue defies party lines.

Without an antitrust exemption, baseball would have to operate more like a normal business, vulnerable to federal lawsuits over rules the owners impose unilaterally, such as free agency, salary arbitration and baseball's player draft. As it is, the players have felt their only recourse to such actions is to strike.

The bill would not affect franchise relocation rules or the minor leagues.

Leaders of the owners and players reacted predictably to the vote.

"The legislation would only open the floodgates for more litigation in the sport and could negatively impact the accessibility of the game to major and minor league cities," said acting commissioner Bud Selig.

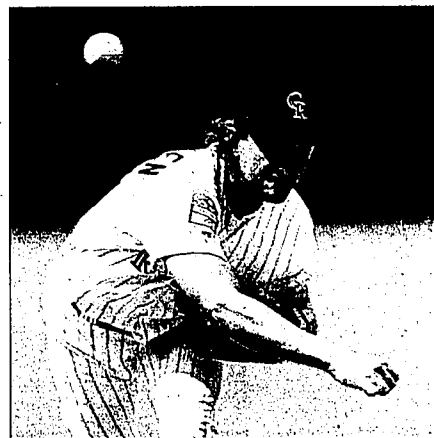

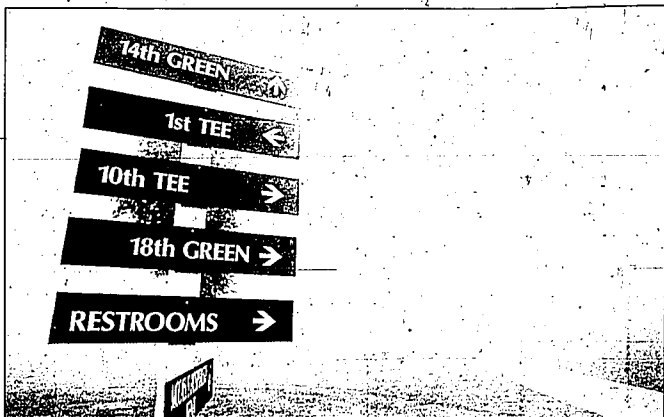

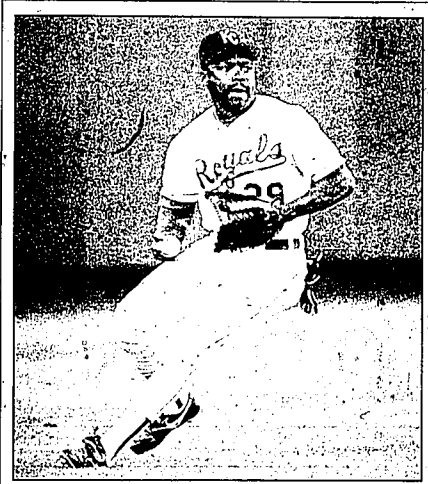

Royals' Coleman turns model citizen

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Long before Jack McDowell ever flipped his middle finger at a crowd or Chii Davis slapped a vine, baseball's No. 1 villain was Vince Coleman, the firecracker man.

Surprisingly, Coleman has become one of the game's best ambassadors. He was denounced far and wide in 1993 when he carelessly tossed a firecracker from a car outside Dodger Stadium, injuring three people. Hounded from all sides, he fled the tumult of the New York Mets for the quiet of Kansas City, hoping to re-start his career in a new league.

Ever since, Vince Coleman has been a model citizen. There hasn't been one whiff of controversy. Fans who were wary when he first signed are perfectly comfortable with his explanation of the firecracker incident — that it was just one of those dumb, careless acts people are sometimes guilty of, and something he'll forever regret.

"Now, I'm just having fun playing baseball again," he said. To young players, the former Mer and St. Louis Cardinal is a teacher. Center fielder Tom Gooden, win, who locks neck to the former NL stolen base king, leads the AL in stolen bases.

To fans, he's a friendly and familiar figure who talks and jokes

and signs autographs. As a switch-hitting leadoff hitter and left fielder, the 33-year-old veteran is quite possibly the Royals' most valuable player.

"I'm having a great time," said Coleman. "It's great being with a good team with a lot of young guys to share your experiences with. I wanted to prove to myself and to everybody else that, hey, I can still play."

"When my ability tells me I can't play, then I'll shut it down. But I refuse to let economics drive me out of baseball when I know I'm only 33 years old and can play 'til I'm 40."

DAVIE, Fla. (AP) — Former Steelers tight end Eric Green says the Pittsburgh media are biased against black athletes.

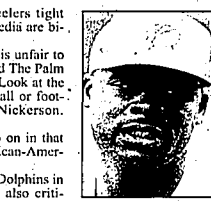

Green, who signed with the Miami Dolphins in March as an unrestricted free agent, also criticized Steelers quarterback Neil O'Donnell and director of football operations Tom Donahoe.

Green said O'Donnell panicked on the Steelers' final play of last season's AFC Championship game against San Diego, and he said Donahoe isn't qualified for his job.

As for the Pittsburgh media, Green said an injured black player received much more criticism

than an injured white player. "You have a guy like Mario Lemieux, who hasn't played in a couple years," Green said. "He's been great over the period of years he had been playing. But I think if it was an African-American there still getting paid and not performing and not being able to play, I think it would have been a big issue. But since it's Mario Lemieux, it's not."

Lemieux missed last season because of recurring back trouble, and in 1993 he fought a battle with Hodgkins disease.

Nickerson, now playing for the Tampa Bay

Buccaners, was told of Green's comments and said, "There's definitely some truth to that. I'll leave it at that."

Green said his complaints about racial bias concerned only the media. Pittsburgh fans are great, he said.

Regarding Donahoe, Green said, "I don't think he's qualified for that position. ... His background is as a high school coach. I think that's a gift job for Tom Donahoe."

Concerning O'Donnell, whose fourth-down pass to Barry Foster at the end of the San Diego loss was incomplete, Green said, "This is the most crucial play probably in all our careers. You're throwing it to a guy you don't throw it to 20 times a year. I don't think that was a very smart thing. He panicked."

Donahoe responded, "To take shots at me is one thing. You always have to consider the source. You shouldn't be taking shots at a teammate."

The Dolphins play the Steelers on Sept. 18.

Don't expect to hear nice things about NCAA at 'Bama hangout

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP) — The true scope of Alabama's NCAA sanctions cannot be felt until you walk into The Houndstooth, a campus pub named for a cap worn by Bear Bryant.

The walls are adorned with snapshots from Alabama's storied football past. There's even a photo of unpopular former coach Bill Curry. It hangs upside down.

That storied past now bears a blemish — three years' probation imposed Wednesday by the NCAA that includes a postseason ban this season, scholarship reductions and the forfeiture of 14 games in which an ineligible athlete played.

"The NCAA was going to make an example of us because football is so big here," said Allison Jones, a student who joined many others in a group commiseration on the campus' main strip Wednesday night.

Bars and restaurants were filled with students who were outraged that three of the years at Alabama will be marred by probation.

"It stinks," said Jim Walton, a student. "These (players) had nothing to do with it. It's not fair."

The top officials in Alabama's athletic department were equally outraged. University president Roger Sayers, in lock-jawed defiance of the NCAA, vowed to appeal the "inappropriate and excessive" penalties.

The NCAA ruled that Alabama had exhibited "a distressing failure of institutional control."

The NCAA cited thousands of dollars in improper loans obtained by former player Gene Jelks and the mishandling of eligibility questions regarding former star defensive back Antonio Langham.

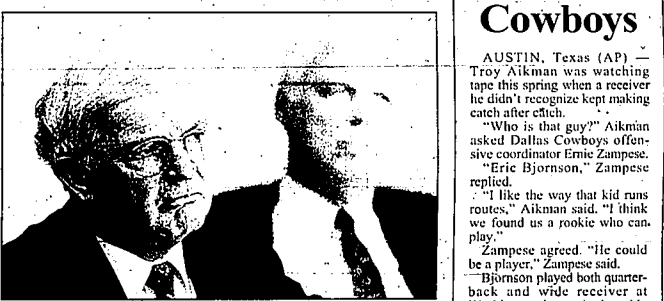
The sanctions call for the loss of four scholarships for 1995-96, which Alabama already has given up voluntarily, plus four more for 1996-97. In addition, Alabama will only be able to sign 12 new recruits in 1996-97 and 16 in 1997-98, instead of up to 25 each year.

Given the remaining eligibility of the Tide's current players, Alabama is looking at a net loss of 30 scholarships during the probation.

Most troubling to the NCAA was "unethical conduct" by faculty athletics adviser Tom Jones in the Langham case. NCAA executive chairman of the infractions committee.

First, the school waited 11 months to alert the NCAA that Langham had signed with an agent to leave school early for the NFL. Then, a letter from Jones to the NCAA explaining Langham's situation was "replete with inaccurate and misleading information," Swank said.

Drug ban looms as track championships set to start

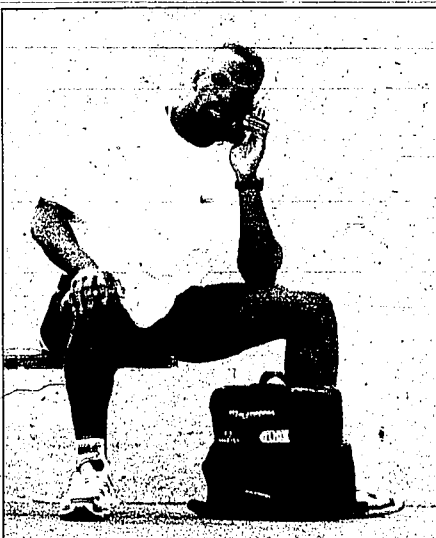
GÖTEBORG, Sweden (AP) — The World Track and Field Championships begin Friday with mixed emotions — a gala opening ceremony with Swedish King Carl Gustaf, the huge individual expectations surrounding one of the sport's showpiece events and the possibility of a world record-holder being stripped of his mark.

In addition, the meet record of more than 2,000 athletes will know they will face a four-year ban if they are caught cheating with drugs, rather than a proposed two-year suspension.

The three-hour opening ceremony, with the theme of "Waves of Friendship," will precede by a day the start of competition, and be broadcast live worldwide. In newly renovated Ullevi Stadium, with a capacity of 45,000, there will be speeches by King Carl Gustaf, International Amateur Athletic Federation president Primo Nebiolo and Swedish officials, plus performances by the Göteborg Symphony Orchestra, Ace of Base, a choir of 3,000 singers and 800 dancers.

When the athletes begin competition Saturday with preliminaries and qualifying in a total of 11 events and finals in the women's marathon and shot put, the focus will be on Gwen Torrence's bid for four golds — in the women's 100 and 200 meters plus both relays — Michael Johnson's attempt for an unprecedented sweep of the men's 200 and 400, France's Marie-Jose-Perec's shot for a double in the women's 400 and 800, and Sergei Bubka's try for a fifth consecutive pole vault title.

There also will be the duels between Jackie Joyner-Kersey and Germany's Heike Drechsler in the women's long jump and heptathlon,

Aging thinclads among athletes set to compete

GÖTEBORG, Sweden (AP) — For some of the sport's biggest stars, the World Championships could be a case of going, going, gone.

The thirtysomething crowd of Carl Lewis, Linford Christie, Sergei Bubka, Melene Ottey and Jackie Joyner-Kersey have been mostly permanent fixtures since the World Championships started in 1983.

Christie, now a grandfather, already has announced his retirement after the championships, which begin Friday.

Others have shown the burden of age and lost their halo of invincibility. Two years before the next championships in Athens might be too big a gap to bridge.

Lewis, 34, the most successful athlete ever at the world championships with eight gold medals and 10 overall in four editions, is limping towards Göteborg on a sore left hamstring in one of his worst seasons.

"He intends to compete but we'll take it one event at a time," U.S. coach Harry Groves said. He is considered an outsider in the long jump event behind Cuban Ivan Pedroso and Mike Powell.

"There was a clear interference," Jacomini said.

He added that the Italian federation would not put the mark up for ratification.

While the IAAF still was studying the evidence, Pedroso was bracing for the worst. "I am prepared for the record to be removed although I would be very disappointed," he said. "I've heard about the difficulties involved but I try not to think about them and they will not disturb my concentration at this event."

If the mark is disapproved, it will not reduce Pedroso's confidence.

He said his goal is to break 29-6/8 and then possibly 30 feet. "I'm convinced I can do it," he said.

Meanwhile, the IAAF did make a decision Thursday — maintaining the four-year ban on first-time drug offenders.

Such track powerhouses as the United States, Russia and Germany had supported reducing the penalty to two years, but were overcome by a group of nations including Britain, Finland and Spain. The vote was 137-49.

Donor helped Mantle, others

DALLAS (AP) — The liver donor for Mickey Mantle also donated organs to five other transplant patients and had saved a man from drowning shortly before dying of an aneurysm.

An official involved in Mantle's June 8 transplant confirmed the Texas donor's identity after The Dallas Morning News researched his name, the newspaper said in a story printed Thursday.

But the donor was not identified to Mantle or other recipients after the donor's family requested anonymity, according to the newspaper.

Although the Hall of Famer's surgery at Baylor University Medical Center was the most high-profile of the transplants, other recipients included an East Texas farm manager and an Arkansas resort operator.

More organs from the water skier and former lifeguard went to a truck driver and two other people, whose identities were not made public.

Mantle needed the transplant because his own liver was badly damaged by hard drinking, hepatitis and cancer. He now is suffering from cancer in his right lung.

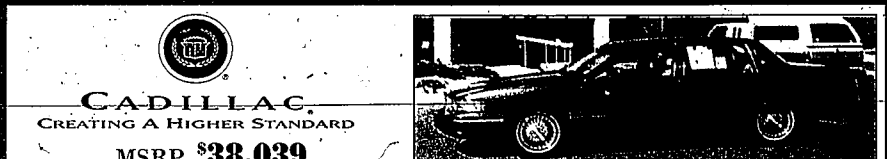

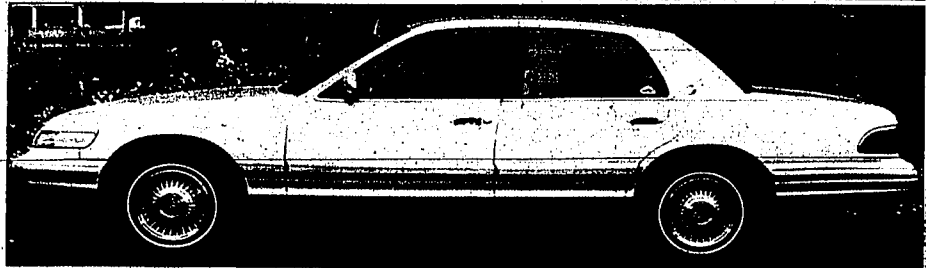

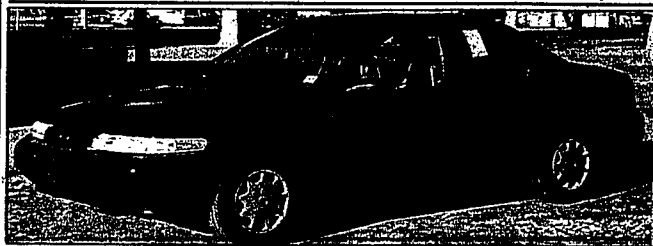

Disney won't dictate content

No, 'NYPD Blue' like won't be arrested by Walt Disney Co. when it takes control of ABC.

Nor is the No. 1 network en route to being reborn as the Disney Channel II.

"We're not looking to dominate or even be the majority player on the ABC prime-time schedule," Disney chairman Michael D. Eisner said during a news conference Monday to announce his company's acquisition of Capital Cities-ABC Inc.

"We want ABC to pick the best shows and the best people that will get the biggest audiences for the advertisers," said Eisner, a former ABC entertainment president.

Today's diversified Disney is hardly a snow-white programmer. While its Touchstone Television arm has produced the family-friendly "Home Improvement," it was also responsible for last season's raunchy "Unhappily Ever After" on the new WB network.

And on the big screen, it's not just "Pocahontas" and other animated money-makers. Two Disney subsidiaries — Hollywood Pictures and Miramax — respectively have bankrolled thoroughly adult movies such as "Color of Night," which barely dodged an NC-17 rating, and the profane, blood-soaked, Oscar-nominated "Pulp Fiction."

Disney, like any other entertainment conglomerate, is interested in maximizing profits rather than dictating program content. New York-based ad buyer Paul Schulman said Monday.

"The show's the thing," Schulman said. "They're not going to go in and tell ABC they can't run 'NYPD Blue,' because that's not what Disney is all about."

Brandis charts way on 'seaQuest DSV'

Locked in mortal combat with Superman for two years, "seaQuest DSV" is sailing into open waters this fall.

The NBC action adventure is being re-deployed from a berth alongside ABC's "Lois & Clark: The New Adventures of Superman" on Sundays to an assignment as the alternative to Wednesday sitcoms.

Created under the aegis of Steven Spielberg, "seaQuest" is the saga of a mammoth submarine, equipped for both scientific and military use, under the jurisdiction of an international government in the near future. After a shaky first season, the production was moved to a salt-water set in Orlando, Fla., and the plots made a sea change from speculative science fiction to outright fantasy. Some would say the series went off course.

"It's a tough call," says co-star Jonathan Brandis, who plays the sub's youthful computer whiz, Lucas Wolenczak.

"I think that we went a little off the deep end with the sci-fi stuff last year. I would have liked to have seen a little more of a fact-based show, and if we were to include science fiction, you know, you can include that with a little bit of a sci-fi twist on it."

"For television, for what the show is, I

think action-adventure is good, because it's not an 'N.Y.P.D. Blue,' not a very serious, realistic drama.

As for the decision to take the show in Orlando, Brandis is enthusiastic, though for him it meant moving 3,000 miles from home at the age of 18.

"I think it made the show look better, and we were able to use facilities we didn't have before," he says. "So it was beneficial."

By the end of the season, the show's star, Roy Scheider, was asking for relief, and late-season guest star Michael Ironside ("ER") becomes captain for most of the coming season.

Rumors flew, too, about Brandis' imminent departure, but the young actor dispels those with a laugh.

"I was always planning on coming back. And I really kind of have to, 'cause we were the only ones that, um, are really surviving on the show, you know — me and Peter DeLuise." DeLuise plays child-like Dagwood on the show.

When last seen, Lucas and Dagwood were adrift in a life raft, the only crew members not abducted from international waters by an extraterrestrial alien ship.

Most of the characters will survive the alien experience, though Rosalind Allen (Dr. Wendy Allen) and Marco Sanchez (Sensor Chief Miguel Ortiz) have been trimmed from the ensemble cast.

Q: I adore Christine Lahti. Will I be seeing her on the big screen anymo-

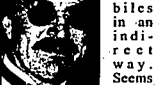
soon? She doesn't work enough to suit my fancy. — T.F.

Imagine what they would have done for Curtis in the '50s, when his career was booming!

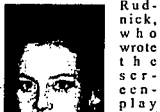
