## FBI drags foot - A7

WASHINGTON — A Senate subcommittee chairman rejected a Justice Department plea Thursday to postpone hearings on the deadly 1992 FBI siege at Ruby Ridge, Idaho. Justice officials feared hearings could thwart their criminal investigation of an alleged cover-up by top FBI officials. Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., chairman of the Judiciary Committee's

terrorism panel, said a telephone conversation with Attorney General Janet Reno on Thursday left him "convinced we can proceed on Sept. 6 without impeding what the Justice Department is doing." Specter said Reno "expressed reservations and wanted to know who we would call as witnesses." To alleviate Reno's concerns, Specter said initial hearings would

concentrate on early contacts between white separatist Randy Weaver and federal Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agents and on planning by U.S. marshals to arrest Weaver at his mountain cabin on firearms-related charges. It was not clear whether they also would cover an FBI sniper's killing of Weaver's wife, Vicki, and wounding of Weaver and a friend. Weaver family members would testify, Specter said. Reno had no comment on her talk

with Specter. A senior Justice official, demanding anonymity, said a compromise was possible along the lines suggested by Specter. The Justice Department opened a criminal investigation last Friday into whether five top FBI officials, including recently demoted Deputy FBI Director Larry Potts, covered up their approval of controversial "shoot-on-sight" orders given to FBI snipers. In Iowa, Senate Majority Leader

# Boy jailed after grandma tied up

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls teenager faces four adult criminal charges after his grandmother told police he choked her unconscious and robbed her house. Cody Douglas Strunk, 16, was arraigned Thursday on felony charges of second-degree kidnapping and robbery — violent crimes that automatically send a juvenile offender into the higher adult court. Two counts of grand theft are included in the charges. Strunk was being held in Twin Falls County Jail on \$5,000 bond and detention order, which means juvenile detention of-

officials will determine whether he can post bond from jail. Strunk is being held in the same cell block but separate from John Jones and Jessy Salas, two teen-agers charged as adults with escaping from the Snake River Juvenile Detention Center in June, said Sgt. Mark Stevens of the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Department. His grandmother, Carlene Humphreys, told police she was vacuuming her carpet on the evening of Aug. 7 when Strunk crept up and covered her nose and mouth with a pale blue bandanna soaked in alcohol, according to an affidavit written by Twin Falls Police Officer Mark Marvick. "I just need you to pass out," Strunk told

his grandmother, but Humphreys kept struggling, so Strunk choked her with his arm until she fainted, the affidavit said. Humphrey woke up lying on her stomach with her eyes blindfolded and her wrists and feet bound with black electrical tape, the affidavit said. "I'm not going to kill you grandma, I'm in over my head and have to do this," she heard Strunk tell her, according to the affidavit. Missing later were her wallet containing \$30, her television, two guns and her silver 1994 Ford Thunderbird, the affidavit said. Police arrested the boy in Utah, said Twin Falls County Prosecutor Richard Bevan.

# Grand jury indicts 3 over Whitewater

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Two of President Clinton's Whitewater business partners and Gov. Jim Guy Tucker were indicted by a special grand jury Thursday on fraud and conspiracy charges. James B. McDougal, his ex-wife, Susan H. McDougal, and Tucker were named in the 48-page indictment. In addition to the new charges, the same grand jury indicted Tucker in June on charges he lied about a loan and tried to avoid taxes. Adding to the significance of the latest charges is the fact that four of the counts against McDougal and his wife relate to a \$300,000 loan made to her in 1986 by for-

mer municipal Judge David Hale through his federally backed Capital Management Services Inc. Hale has said Clinton pressured him to make the loan. Clinton has called Hale's statement "a bunch of bull." A statement released along with the indictments by prosecutor Kenneth Starr made a point of saying the counts do not charge Clinton or Hillary Rodham Clinton with any criminal wrongdoing. The Clintons are not named anywhere in the 48-page document. In Washington, Mark D. Fabiani, special White House associate counsel to President Clinton, said, "The independent counsel said clearly that today's indictment

does not charge any wrongdoing by the president or first lady." "We continue to cooperate fully and hope the independent counsel will conclude his inquiry expeditiously," Fabiani added. Thursday's indictments deal with about \$3 million in loans from Madison Guaranty Savings and Loan and Hale's company, McDougal and his wife owned Madison. Tucker held interests in businesses that received loans from both companies. Some of the loans were made to others, including Stephen A. Smith, who was an aide to Clinton when Clinton was state attorney general in 1977-78, and in Clinton's first term as governor, 1979-80.

# Hurdles fill independent road to White House

WASHINGTON — Adding his name to an eclectic list of independent 1996 presidential prospects, Bill Bradley provided more credibility to the idea of running outside the two-party system even as he drew fresh attention to the giant obstacles. Bradley's refusal, Thursday, to rule out an independent run puts him in the company of Jesse Jackson, Ross Perot, former Connecticut Gov. Lowell Weicker and retired Gen. Colin Powell. And it puts the White House on notice of a potential challenge that, if it materialized, would almost certainly hurt President Clinton's re-election chances. "His appeal would principally be to liberal and moderately liberal voters," said Republican National Committee Chairman Haley Barbour.

Indirectly acknowledging as much, the White House all but ignored Bradley's remarks about a possible independent run. "We expect him to continue serving us as a leader in the Democratic Party," spokeswoman Ginny Terzano said. Other analysts said that Bradley, a Princeton University graduate who has represented New Jersey in the Senate since 1978, probably would run strongest in the Northeast — damaging Clinton in what is now his best region. Before entering poli-

# Fee divides downtown merchants

TWIN FALLS — Downtown's Business Improvement District just won its struggle with one Main Avenue storekeeper over his unpaid parking tickets. Now another mini-mutiny may be in the making. A 5th District magistrate earlier this month ordered Daniel Dane, owner of Little Wood Frontfitters, to pay the \$381 he had amassed in parking fines. Now Dane has joined 15 downtown neighbors in an effort to divorce themselves from the BID, which they say gives them poor returns for the membership assessments they pay. A petition circulated during the past several weeks by R.S. Garner of R.S. Garner Enterprises has gathered 16 signatures. At least 12 are from Garner's and Dane's neighbors on the 200 block of Main Avenue northwest of Shoshone Street. The document proclaims, "We the downtown merchants of the 200 block after careful consideration, have agreed that membership in the BID should be voluntary since we derive little or no benefit from your organization."

Dues paid to the BID are used "to keep downtown aesthetically beautiful," according to Jeanne Wilson, the district's executive director. The quarterly assessment, based on a business's nature and building size, helps support advertising, promotional events, planting and maintenance of trees and flowers, trash cleanup, snow removal, a business newsletter and BID personnel, she said. "But the BID's never done anything for us down here," Garner said. He argues that his block has fewer trees and promotional signs, worse sidewalks and less advertising exposure than merchants down the street. He said he feels his corner has been a target for neglect since he protested the BID at its inception. "A lot of money is spent on the BID, and it's not spent on this block," said Kevin Newbury, owner of Magic Valley Auto Parts, who also signed Garner's petition. Owner Charles Päckham of Bargain Side also said BID benefits "are not distributed proportionately." Päckham, whose signature appears among his neighbors', said he has seen no return for the money he pays in assessments. One signer from the 300 block of Main contends the BID does nothing for him, but Don Christian said he hasn't complained before because the assessment he paid was small. Christian, who owns Don's Service, has been charged only \$5.14 each quarter. But an ordinance to be considered by the City Council Monday would create a minimum quarterly assessment of \$15. "I can pay it, but it's just like a gift," Christian said. Please see FEE/A2

Of the BID's 205 members, 32 were assessed less than \$15 in last month's billing, according to City Finance Director Gary Evans.

"It's hurting us financially," Wilson said. "This (ordinance) makes them a little bit more responsible in being a part of the BID."

Wilson said she and the district's board members met recently with 200-block merchants to hear their requests for trash cans, benches and other improvements outside their front doors.

"These issues are going to be dealt with," she said. "The board is not unreasonable. But things will happen gradually." Wilson said she has worked hard to improve communications downtown and was

pleased that merchants brought their concerns to her.

"But Wilson said downtown businesses should address many of their complaints and requests — for sidewalk repairs or handicapped parking spots, for example — to the City Council. The BID will act as an advocate for merchants, "but it's their business," she said.

The district's primary aim is "to stand up and say, 'The best part of Twin Falls is right downtown,'" Wilson said. Advertising paid for by BID funds is meant to promote the area — not individual businesses — and has been successful, she said.

Dane and several of his neighbors say they like the idea of a business coalition similar to the BID but would prefer a much more localized one.

If the 200-block merchants spent their business improvement fees on their own block, "in five years, this would be the nicest block in Twin Falls," Newbury said.

"I'm all for that, 100 percent," Dane said. Very localized leadership in business improvement "would help dramatically," and his block has potential "leaders all around us," he said.

"We need some serious different thinking in how it's done — we need some people with new ideas," Dane said.

The Business Improvement District currently stretches at its farthest points from Fifth Street West to Fourth Street East and from Fourth Avenue North to Third Avenue South.

## Avalanche kills noted woman climber

LONDON (AP) — An avalanche near the summit of K-2, the world's second-highest mountain, apparently killed at least five climbers, including the first woman to scale Mount Everest alone.

Alison Hargreaves of Britain was among those caught in the avalanche Sunday on the 28,250-foot peak in Pakistan's Karakoram range. One climber has been found dead.

Hargreaves' husband, Jim Ballard, said Thursday he hadn't given up hope for his 33-year-old wife's survival, but he was grieving for the worst.

"We shouldn't be," Ballard said. "She was actually where she wanted to be. She had climbed the mountain. She was the first woman to climb Everest and K-2 without supplementary oxygen and she was on her way down. At least, inside, she would have had the happiness of reaching the summit."

Among the others feared dead were Rob Slater of Colorado and Jeff Lakes of Canada, said Nazir Sabir, an expedition organizer. He said one body had been found; that identities of the missing were not expected until a member of the party could reach the mountain top of Skardu, probably Saturday.

"There are very little details, only that one of the bodies was found near Camp 2 and buried. There was no name or anything," Sabir said.

Among the others feared dead were Rob Slater of Colorado and Jeff Lakes of Canada, said Nazir Sabir, an expedition organizer. He said one body had been found; that identities of the missing were not expected until a member of the party could reach the mountain top of Skardu, probably Saturday.

Bob Dale said, "I'd be willing to talk to the attorney general and to Senator Specter" about a possible delay. "Obviously, we're not trying to discredit anybody's investigation."

In a telephone interview from Portsmouth, N.H., where he was campaigning for the Republican presidential nomination, Specter said, "Phase one is not going to interfere with what Justice is doing."

"Even in phase two on the shooting incidents themselves, we can accommodate their concerns," Specter said. "And there is a link between the investigation over who authorized the new shooting rules for the FBI and phase three which is whether anybody later covered that up."

Acknowledging that some witnesses might demand immunity before testifying, Specter said, "We're not about to grant anybody any immunity under any circumstances at this stage."

In a blunt letter to Specter, Deputy Attorney General James

Gorelick had said September hearings "could seriously jeopardize any subsequent criminal prosecutions."

"We strongly urge postponing the hearing and the attendant preparation until the investigations are complete," she wrote. The letter, written last Friday, was released Thursday.

The incident began as U.S. marshals scouted Weaver's cabin on Aug. 21, 1992. Samuel Weaver, 14, and deputy U.S. Marshal William Degan were killed by gunfire.

The FBI sniper who killed Mrs. Weaver the next day said he was aiming at Weaver's friend, Kevin Harris, who was armed and retreating to the cabin, and did not see Mrs. Weaver standing behind the cabin door, holding an infant.

The snipers were told they "could and should" use deadly force on any armed adult male spotted in the area. Longstanding FBI policy requires in advance of lethal force to protect oneself or others from imminent harm.

Eugene Glenn, the FBI field commander, and Richard Rogers, the

FBI hostage rescue team chief, were principal figures in the shooting rules, but they have sworn Potts approved them. Potts denies that.

Gorelick wrote that public disclosure of documents "may prevent a subsequent prosecution" by revealing immunized testimony from Justice's internal inquiries, thereby putting potential witnesses.

Late Thursday, Specter wrote Gorelick, "We can avoid those risks. We will ... not compromise the integrity and confidentiality of your investigation."

Granting immunity to key witnesses "would likely damage irreparably our ability to prosecute any violations which the pending investigation might uncover," Gorelick wrote.

She cited the case of White House aide Oliver North, charged during the Iran-Contra scandal, in the prosecution had to be dropped when North's former boss, Robert McFarlane, said his trial testimony against North might have been influenced by hearing North's immunized testimony to Congress.

Perot has said he would prefer not to run but has left the door wide open to a second independent candidacy if, in his view, Congress does not move expeditiously on a long list of political and budget reforms. Powell has been coo, expressing some interest in the race and promising to be more definitive after his memoirs are published next month.

When it comes to possible independent candidacies, it is Powell's that generates the most support in early polls, although he still runs third in tests against Clinton and GOP front-runner Bob Dole.

In another sign of the interest in Powell, a group trying to draft him into the race filed papers Thursday with the Federal Election Commission.

For lifelong Democrats Jackson and Bradley, the base of support for an independent candidacy would likely come from the 30 percent of Democrats who would prefer Clinton to be their party's 1996 nominee.

But while such numbers — and Perot's 1992 showing — are powerful lures toward going the independent route, the organizational and financial obstacles are daunting.

For starters, it takes roughly 700,000 party-signatures to qualify for the ballot in 50 states and the

District of Columbia, requiring a national organization or huge expenditures to pay firms that collect signatures. For all his talk of the "volunteers" getting him on the ballot, for example, Perot dug deep into his own pockets to pay for the drive.

And without a personal fortune, Bradley would face the same contribution limits as Democrat and Republican candidates — but without the party apparatus and loyal voter base that helps raise so much money. Still, Bradley is no fund-raising slouch, collecting \$13 million for his 1990 campaign.

But Perot spent \$67 million running for president in 1992 — including outspending the Clinton and Evans campaigns on television time in the final month of the campaign.

"Can Bradley raise that type of money?" Goetz asked. "Probably not."

There is little doubt that Americans are intrigued with the idea of another independent presidential run — or the establishment of a new political party.

In the latest CBS-New York Times poll, for example, 55 percent said they wanted a new party. Yet one of the things independent voters complain about most is that nothing gets done in Washington. And the survey showed 61 percent believed a president elected outside

the system would have serious problems working with Congress.

"It's like going to your favorite restaurant," said GOP pollster Ed Goetz. "Everybody gets excited to hear the specials but nine out of 10 times you order one of the two meals that keep you coming back to the place."

Another Republican pollster, Bill McInturf, said Bradley's NBA background gave unconventional appeal. And the prospect that he could, even as an independent, be capable of winning New Jersey and New York "give him instant credibility."

But McInturf predicted Bradley's generally liberal voting record would put him out of favor with many independent voters. McInturf said it is his view that if anyone launches an independent run, at least one other independent will follow suit, "meaning a four- or five-way race that changes all assumptions about the electoral map."

**Researchers find 3rd Alzheimer's gene**

WASHINGTON — A mutation found only among some German-Russian immigrants has been identified as the third gene to cause inherited Alzheimer's disease.

Scientists say the discovery may speed development of drugs to combat the brain-destroying disorder.

Researchers isolated the gene by probing the chromosomes of a group known as Yorgo Germans, who have a high incidence of Alzheimer's before the age of 65. The mutated gene was found on chromosome 1 and linked directly to causing the brain disease.

Rudolph Tanzi of Massachusetts General Hospital, a principal collaborator in the research, said the new Alzheimer's gene makes a protein that is closely related to protein produced by an Alzheimer's gene his team found earlier on chromosome 14.

**FCC chief Hundt plans agency cutbacks**

WASHINGTON — The federal agency with the most control over how Americans get their telephone and television services would lose about 10 percent of its positions under a plan unveiled Thursday by the agency's chief.

Public safety and enforcement in "no way would be affected negatively by this plan," said Federal Communications Commission Chairman Reed Hundt.

Hundt's plan responds to the likelihood that Congress will freeze the commission's budget. The House has agreed to provide the FCC with \$185 million in fiscal year 1996, which begins Oct. 1. The Senate has not yet acted.

Under Hundt's plan, which is opposed by FCC Commissioner James Quello, the FCC would reduce its maximum work force — now authorized at 2,271 positions — to 2,050 positions during the next year.

**Packwood defenders attack lead accuser**

WASHINGTON — Several of Sen. Bob Packwood's defenders are speaking out for the first time to contradict the most visible woman of the 18 who have accused him of sexual misconduct.

The Packwood loyalists, in interviews with The Associated Press and statements the Oregon Republican's lawyers provided to the ethics committee, are focusing their criticism on Gena Hutton.

Hutton, 47, Eugene, Ore., took a high profile in urging the Senate to hold public hearings in the Packwood case, appearing at Capitol Hill news conferences and writing opinion pieces in Oregon newspapers.

In network television appearances this week, without naming Hutton, Packwood admitted he did kiss the 1980 campaign volunteer. But he said she never objected and must not have been offended because she remained with that campaign and even helped out again in 1986.

**Faulkner cleared to return to Citadel duty**

CHARLESTON, S.C. — The first woman cadet at The Citadel was cleared Thursday to return to 60-called-hell-week-at-the-military-college-after missing much of it battling illness.

Shannon Faulkner, sent to the infirmary Monday with apparent heat exhaustion, will return to her company after breakfast Friday to join the other cadets in rigorous training, said college spokesman Terry Leddom.

Ms. Faulkner, 20, underwent tests at a hospital Thursday and was later returned to the infirmary, where she will spend the night under orders from the school doctor. Details of the tests and her illness were not disclosed.

Her lawyer, Val Vojdik, said Ms. Faulkner was feeling much better.

**EPA warns of herbicides in Midwest water**

WASHINGTON — During the peak growing season, concentrations of herbicides in Middle America's drinking water can soar much higher than federal standards, according to an environmental study released Thursday.

The chemical industry and local water system officials say this does not necessarily mean the water is unsafe to drink. But the Environmental Protection Agency said the study is cause for concern.

"EPA believes that consumers should check with local water utilities to make sure standards for toxic pollutants are being met," said Dr. Lynn R. Goldman, EPA assistant administrator for pesticides. "In areas where standards are not being met, we are concerned about risks to health, especially for children."

The research focused on two of the most common farm herbicides: atrazine and cyanazine, millions of pounds of which are used annually to control broadleaf weeds on corn and sorghum fields.

**Study: Early AZT may best fight AIDS**

BOSTON — AZT may improve AIDS patients' symptoms if they start taking the drug right after they are infected, according to a study published Thursday.

However, a second study of more than 1,600 volunteers infected with HIV found that treatment with AZT before the onset of full-blown AIDS does not fend off the disease.

During the last several years while the drug has been available, experts have debated just how useful it is and at what stage of the disease is the best to take it.

**Clinton may use vacation to blast GOP**

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — President Clinton's scenic vacation spot, with its snow-topped Teton Range and turquoise-filled streams, could soon become a political backdrop for a White House attack on Republican environmental policies.

Aides said Thursday Clinton plans to visit one of the area's national parks to commemorate National Park Day on Aug. 25. He is expected to continue criticism of Republican environmental measures, including limits on the Environmental Protection Agency.

It would be a rare break for business on a 17-day vacation that has been devoted to golf so far.

Clinton spent the bulk of his second day on vacation golfing. His partners Thursday were World Bank president James D. Wolfensohn and two club pros.

"He wants to indulge himself as much as possible before Chelsea arrives," spokeswoman Ginny Terzano said. After his teen-age daughter arrives today from an Alaska trip, Clinton plans to do some sightseeing and hiking — cutting into his golf game.

Hillary Rodham Clinton has kept a low profile since the Clintons arrived Tuesday. Aides say she is spending much of her time writing her weekly column and a book.

Western environmental interests are lobbying the White House for Clinton's attention during his visit to the Jackson Hole area, which is near Yellowstone National Park and Grand Teton National Park.

The National Park Service wants him at one of the parks to lobby against GOP budget cuts at the agency. The House voted in May to reduce park spending by 36 percent, which advocates said would have closed 200 parks. Responding to public outcry, the House scaled back the cut to 10 percent — with no reductions in park operations.

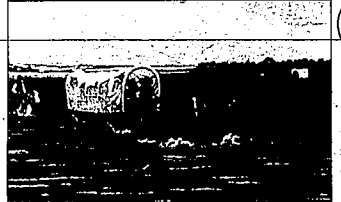

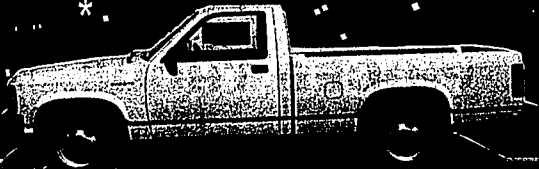

### Don't let Fuhrman flap cloud picture of real Idaho

Detective Mark Fuhrman was the Los Angeles Police Department's problem for years. Then he was Judge Lance Ito's problem. Now he's Idaho's problem.

Accounts in the national media, if you believe such things, depict Fuhrman as an all-purpose bigot. He hates blacks, hates Jews and has a prehistoric attitude about women. A real knuckle dragger.

That the LAPD kept him on board for so many years was a symptom of the department's chronic malaise. (Rodney King was another.) The foolishness of giving such a man a badge became apparent when the O.J. Simpson defense team unveiled its "Racist Cops Framed O.J." theory.

Fuhrman was a loaded gun aimed at the department's credibility, and the O.J. defense pulled the trigger. Tapes of Fuhrman saying rude things about Ito's police-captain wife nearly derailed the whole excruciating trial this week. The prosecution argued that Ito could not be impartial about Fuhrman — as though anyone with an ounce of sensitivity could be.

Blessedly, the long suffering Ito finally started acting like a judge. He hauled both sophisticated gangs of lawyers into his office and upbraided them for focusing on "unadulterated crap."

A bit late, your Honor, but amen anyway.

Until now, we have resisted mentioning the O.J. trial in this column.

After all, who cares what editors in Idaho think about a murder trial in California?

But now a noxious fragment of the drama is besmirching our favorite state. Having retired from the LAPD, Fuhrman has moved to Sandpoint. So, once again, northern Idaho is being characterized as a haven for white supremacists — much to the chagrin of Sandpoint residents.

Can't blame them for feeling that way. In fact, the negative image slopes over the whole state. Spend a layover in any hub airport east of the Rockies and tell your neighbor at the lunch counter that you're from Idaho. "Oh," he'll say, "Isn't that where they have all the neo-Nazis and militias?"

"Well, not ALL of them," you reply, smiling weakly. We Idahoans may not like the attention that Fuhrman has brought again to our state, but we can't do much about it. We can only remind outsiders that it's a free country and that Fuhrman and his pals didn't ask our permission to move in.

We also might point out some of our state's less publicized features: the streets where you can walk safely; the streams where you can catch healthy, edible fish; the friendly, little communities where people know one another by name; and the spectacular sunsets over the sagebrush.

How much do you want to bet, Judge Ito wishes he was here right now?



## Sacrificing others to pad the rich's pockets

The justification for enormous cuts in social spending, including Medicare, is, "We must balance the budget, we must balance the budget." The old, the young, women, the poor, veterans, the environment, education — all must be sacrificed so we can balance the budget.

As Gib Lewis used to say: "Whoa! Back up, members."

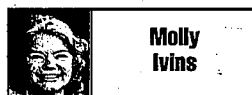
We're so busy counting up the losers under the Republican budget that nobody is looking at the winners. There are two sides to the ledger. True, one way to balance the budget is by cutting spending. Another way to balance the budget is by NOT cutting taxes, especially by not cutting taxes for the wealthiest Americans and corporations.

Let's just take a look at the numbers with the help of Citizen Action, which reports that the Republicans propose:

- Repeat of the corporate alternative minimum tax at a cost of \$22.1 billion over seven years.
- Increased corporate write-offs and deductions at a cost of \$47.8 billion over seven years. (Corporate profits are now at their highest level in 45 years.)
- Capital-gains tax breaks, indexed to inflation, at a cost of \$78.6 billion over seven years. Total: \$148.5 billion.

Now add that to billions in proposed tax cuts for families, again disproportionately benefiting the wealthy, for a total of \$245 billion in tax breaks under the Republican bill. According to the Treasury Department, 52 percent of the proposed Republican tax breaks will go to families making more than \$100,000 a year and another 31.6 percent to families making from \$50,000 to \$100,000. Less than 5 percent of the breaks will go to those making under \$30,000, 40 percent of American families.

That's a direct redistribution of income by the government. You can also add the additional defense spending — \$58 billion more over seven years.

than the Pentagon even asked for, much of it pure Republican pork.

Now look at your budget. Yes, Virginia, we are making deep cuts in many essential programs — not to balance the budget but to pay for tax cuts for wealthy individuals and corporations. This is dumb.

Let's assume that balancing the budget is an important national goal. (Actually, many economists say the national debt should be considered as a proportion of the gross domestic product, and that ours is well within what- ever ballpark they use for these things. Personally, whenever I contemplate the national debt, I feel like retiring to bed with an ice pack.)

And let's acknowledge that even the mildest recession in the next seven years (or in the case of the Clinton proposal, 10 years) would knock all projections into a cocked wood lock. And the Federal Reserve is doing its dead-level best to bring on a recession.

Even leaving aside the fact that we are discussing an illusory goal here, we need to look long and hard at what balancing the budget in this backwards fashion is going to do to our country.

The poor in this country have gotten poorer, the rich have gotten much richer, and the middle class is shrinking. Social mobility is disappearing. Income disparity — the gap between the rich and everybody else — is enormous and getting worse. The cost of this phenomenon comes in what sociologists call "social cohesion," which is a fancy term for what keeps the country from falling apart.

This is a 20-year trend; it holds constant

through all kinds of studies by all kinds of organizations using all kinds of paradigms. The decline of the middle class — those with after-tax incomes between \$24,000 and \$72,000 — was shown most recently in a study by Greg Duncan of Northwestern University and Timothy Smedley of Syracuse University, using the financial surveys of 5,000 households conducted every year since the late 1960s by the University of Michigan.

Duncan told The New York Times: "What's striking is how uniform this fall in upward mobility has been across all demographic groups in the labor market." But while it may be affecting all groups, it is actually affecting young people disproportionately. "Young men's chances of attaining a middle-class income by age 30 is dwindling. While 60 percent of those turning 30 before 1989 managed to do so, only 42 percent have succeeded since then," according to the Times story. That's a dramatic drop. Education, race, parents' income — nothing else mattered.

This is the terrible irony of the new political orthodoxy: We keep saying we have to balance the budget so we won't pass this dreadful debt to our children, but what we are doing is destroying our children's ability to get anywhere.

Barry Bosworth of the Brookings Institution is also quoted in the Times: "To the extent that the widening of distribution of income has occurred, it really is true among younger people rather than older, and younger people have borne the brunt of the changes."

In the 1960s, those with only a high school education could still get well-paying jobs. Not today. Either higher education or technological skills are needed. So the Republicans are cutting student loans and job-training programs. We're sacrificing young people so the rich can get even richer.

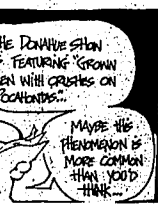

# Task force report shows pattern of FBI foot-dragging

WASHINGTON — Four months after the disastrous 1992 siege at Ruby Ridge ended, federal prosecutors in Idaho see an urgent document request to FBI headquarters in Washington.

A frustrated prosecutor was trying to build a murder case against the white separatists involved in the standoff and needed to review FBI records. But he ran into an unusual problem. The FBI refused to produce the materials, claiming at first that they contained "sensitive information" about the events that led to the shooting of Vicki Weaver at a remote Idaho cabin.

The prosecutor appealed, and that same day his boss, U.S. Attorney Maurice Ellsworth, called a high-ranking Justice Department official to complain about the lack of FBI cooperation.

What seemed at the time like a bureaucratic tug of war over paperwork now has taken on more significance as U.S. Attorney Eric Holder probes a possible high-level coverup of FBI actions in the Ruby Ridge incident. A special Justice Department task force report concluded last year that high-ranking FBI officials went to great lengths to keep documents from prosecutors trying Randy Weaver on charges of murdering a federal marshal.

Most of the bureau officials criticized by the task force for failing to produce documents, including former deputy director Larry Potts, have now been suspended, pending the outcome of Holder's investigation. The full text of the task force report has recently been leaked and has become available on the Internet.

The task force also found evidence that a number of documents sought by prosecutors may have been destroyed — not just the one document that the Justice Department has privately acknowledged, according to sources. One FBI official has been

suspended for destroying a record that could have shed light on the use of deadly force against the Weaver family. The task force cited missing faxes, notes from headquarters and drafts of the operations plan for the siege.

Holder is trying to determine whether a full-scale criminal investigation should be launched into possible obstruction of justice, perjury and other charges. In conducting the probe, he is likely to revisit the portion of the task force report that dealt with resistance to federal prosecutors, sources say.

Ultimately, the task force concluded that the FBI's refusal to turn over the materials impaired the prosecution of Randy Weaver for the slaying of the U.S. marshal in the standoff at the isolated cabin. Weaver was acquitted of murder charges, and this week, the Justice Department announced it will pay the Weaver family \$3.1 million in an attempt to help "heal the wounds" from the deaths of Weaver's wife, Vicki, and 14-year-old son, Sammy, who were shot during the August 1992 standoff.

Clearly, law enforcement sources say, government officials handling civil cases brought by the Weavers were concerned that settlement costs could escalate as evidence of government missteps became publicly known.

Some of that evidence already has been gathered by the task force, a group of Justice Department criminal lawyers, attorneys from Justice's Office of Professional Responsibility and FBI inspectors who were asked to review the controversy.

The task force found that records disappeared despite an early request by federal prosecutors "to preserve and produce" papers related to the shooting of Weaver's wife, who was killed by a sniper while holding her 10-month-old child.

"We were distressed by the persistent intransigence shown by FBI headquarters personnel," task force officials found.

"Indeed, to this day, the prosecutors are not confident that all pertinent materials located in FBI headquarters were shown to them."

Task force officials found evidence that some documents simply disappeared. "There were a number of instances in which an interviewee told us that he had prepared a document but no one could produce a copy of it," the report said. "We were told that there were multiple drafts of the operations plan, yet we were only able to locate one draft version."

Potential problems with the Ruby Ridge case began early, the report shows, with the selection of E. Michael Kahoe to head the bureau's administrative review of the incident. Kahoe, one of the FBI officials

recently suspended and accused of destroying a document, had been involved in the headquarters oversight of the standoff.

A critical question involved the FBI's approval of the rules of engagement for snipers at the scene. An FBI sniper said he shot Vicki Weaver while operating under "shoot-on-sight" instructions that he understood had been approved by FBI headquarters.

But senior FBI officials gave conflicting accounts about who had approved the rules, which later were deemed to be unconstitutional. Then-Assistant Director Potts denied approving the final rules, but his account was contradicted by two senior FBI officials who were involved in supervising the incident.

In the days immediately following the siege, prosecutors, facing many unanswered questions, wanted the FBI's documents to help prepare the murder indictment against Weaver and to avoid charges of a "government coverup" that were likely to surface in the trial.

The first documents conflict began about a month after the standoff when an assistant U.S. attorney requested an operations plan and was rejected by an FBI supervisor. The prosecutor threatened to get a court order to obtain the document. Eventually, U.S. attorneys agreed to a compromise: They could look at the document, but not copy it.

Federal prosecutors later learned about a shooting incident report that contained sworn statements of FBI hostage rescue team members who had been on the scene.

Prosecutors got the sworn statements but were "never given access to the entire" report, the task force found.

The shooting incident report included autopsy reports, crime scene photographs, diagrams and news clippings. But "notes of the investigators who conducted the interviews of (agents on the scene)

were not included as part of the report," the task force found. FBI officials argued they should not have to provide the entire report because they had never done so before for the discovery process.

The U.S. attorney's office learned of more documents and the debate intensified. The disputed documents included the shooting incident report, a memorandum by the shooting incident review group and the operations plan.

Kahoe headed the shooting incident review group, which found the actions at Ruby Ridge lawful and within FBI guidelines. His oversight role left some of his FBI colleagues at headquarters uncomfortable. "At the time, some of us in the bureau thought it (Kahoe's appointment) a little odd," said a former senior headquarters official, who asked not to be named.

He was potentially a subject of the review and here he was in a position to oversee the review.

The document dispute eventually prompted the Justice Department to arrange a meeting with two top FBI officials, Kahoe and Danny Coulson, who as deputy assistant director for the criminal division was Potts's top deputy.

Coulson also has been suspended. Kahoe and Coulson, who were involved in the standoff's early stages, argued that the prosecutor's indictment was too broad, and that if it were limited, there would not be a need to produce the documents. At the end of the meeting, the FBI again would agree only to allow federal prosecutors "to view, but not possess or produce" a number of the documents.

Kahoe then instructed a subordinate to send the shooting incident report to an FBI official so that it could be reviewed by prosecutors. However, that subordinate noted to task force investigators that she did not "recall seeing interview notes with the report."

# Radiation experiments top 16,000

WASHINGTON (AP) — Idaho was among 21 states in which human radiation experiments were conducted over a 20-year period beginning in the mid-1940s.

In a final tally, the Energy Department said Thursday there were two experiments conducted in Idaho. It did not give details of those experiments.

In all, the department said 16,000 men, women and children — nearly double the department's earlier estimate — were used in radiation experiments from World War II to the mid-1970s.

Though questions remain about the ethics of the experimentation, Energy Department officials said their inquiry has shown that most of the research with humans was for useful, even "heroic," medical purposes.

"Much of it was to go after breakthroughs on the medical front," Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary told a news conference. But, she added, "there is a dark side," too.

The department over the past 18 months has documented 435 experiments in which humans were used in radiation research conducted or sponsored by the Energy Department or its predecessors since the 1940s, she said.

It remains an open question whether the people used in the experiments gave their consent, and whether, in cases of volunteers, they knew the health risks.

Elynn Weiss, director of the department's Office of Human Radiation Experiments, said the available documents left unclear the extent of subject consent.

Department officials declined to discuss the ethics of individual experiments. They said that issue — and whether subjects or their families should be compensated — was up to a presidential advisory committee that is reviewing all human radiation experiments including those done by the Pentagon. The presidential panel is to make its recommendations in September.

Tara O'Toole, the assistant energy secretary for environmental safety and health, said that in her view, about 10 percent of the 435 confirmed

experiments "raise some troubling ethical questions." She cited three main concerns:

- Some of the subjects were children, mental patients or prison inmates.
- For example, at the University of Arkansas Medical Center in Little Rock in the early 1960s, mentally retarded children as young as 13 who were wards of the Arkansas Children's Colony were given small amounts of iodine-131 in a thyroid study.
- A similar University of Arkansas study in the 1950s used infants as young as nine months. A University of Washington study in 1954-58 used

mental patients at Northern State Hospital in Sedro-Woolley.

• Some people were given extremely high doses of radiation.

In experiments at Harvard Medical School in the early 1960s, for example, one patient received 650 rads of X-ray radiation over the whole body. To the established safety limit for whole-body exposure is the equivalent of 2 rads per year. The unidentified Harvard patient died 28 days later; death was attributed to the radiation.

• Aborted fetuses were used in some cases.

In 1947, for example, two Massachusetts hospitals and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology collaborated on an experiment in which nine pregnant women were injected with small amounts of iodine-131 before undergoing scheduled therapeutic abortions. The thyroids of the fetuses were measured for radioactivity. The study showed that radioiodine could be given therapeutically until the fourth month of pregnancy without the fetus absorbing any.

The Atomic Energy Commission, a predecessor to the Energy Department, either approved or gave financial support to each experiment.

Mrs. O'Toole said many of the experiments addressed important, even pioneering, research that has had lasting benefit for the American public. Many, for example, dealt with early efforts to diagnose and treat thyroid problems in children. Others focused on important issues in heart disease and the diagnosis of cancers.

"It's really quite heroic," Ms. O'Toole said of some of the work.

Some experiments, however, had no direct therapeutic applications. From 1962 to 1966, for example, the Atomic Energy Commission used humans in studying reliable ways to measure levels of cesium-137, a product of fallout from nuclear testing. The test subjects were two members of a special committee appointed by the Division of Biology and Medicine of the Atomic Energy Commission.

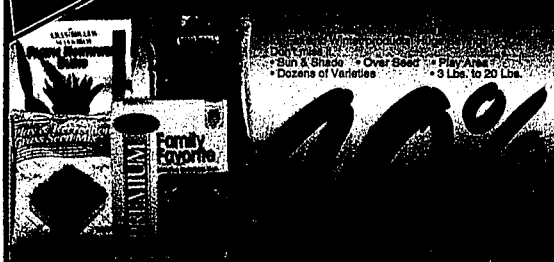

# Havin' a good old time

## Old Time Fiddlers promote 'the love of music'

TWIN FALLS — These old-timers do more than just fiddle around.

The Old Time Fiddlers, a statewide organization, has been playing "good old time country fiddling" since 1961, according to Archie Turner of Twin Falls. Turner, who has played the fiddle for 65 years and has been involved with the Old Time Fiddlers since 1965, said the organization's main goal is to promote the love of music.

"These minstrel's music may be old, but there's nothing old-fashioned about it," Turner said. Lively songs, perfect for hand clapping and toe tapping, make up each concert.

"We want to preserve and play old time music so that people everywhere can listen and enjoy it," he said.

In addition to playing special events, the group performs for retirement and nursing homes, said Idaho Association of Old Time Fiddlers president Fran Widener. The group plays for donation only, and all musicians are strictly volunteer, she said.

"The group just want to help out with entertaining and boosting people's morale," she said. Idaho was the first state in the country to organize a group of old time fiddlers, Turner said. Founder Marnie Shaw organized the group 34 years ago when Robert Smylie, the former Idaho governor, asked Shaw to form a group to play at a celebration for the 100-year anniversary of Ida-

ho's organization as a territory. The 45 members of the group's Twin Falls chapter have played throughout the Magic Valley, as well as in Sun Valley and Bellevue, he said. Some organizations even schedule the fiddlers more than a year in advance.

The fiddlers' popularity is not just a passing fad, Widener said. Music will always be well-liked among people, and that's why the fiddlers draw crowds, she said.

"Music appeals to people of all ages," Widener said. "I've seen little kids at some of our shows just dancing spontaneously. The music does that to them."

Toe-tapping tunes are also a reason why so many people, from so many age groups, enjoy playing with the Old Time Fiddlers, she said. Retirees play right alongside adolescent children, because everyone playing loves the same thing — fast-paced fiddlin' tunes.

"We are held together because of the love of music," Widener said. "That's all."

Anyone who plays, or doesn't play, a stringed instrument can join the jamboree, Turner said. All a person has to have is an interest in music to be a part of this non-profit organization.

Members have a choice of either playing with the group or becoming auxiliary members, Turner said. And those who can't play but want to learn will always find a willing teacher, he said.

"Either way, everybody does his or her fair share of participating and 'feels like they belong,'" he said.

regularly every month for a potluck, a short meeting and a two-hour jam session, when all members pull out their fiddles and let their music do the talking.

Anyone interested in joining the group need only come to a meet-

ing or contact one of the members, Turner said.

"It's not unusual for strangers to appear at meetings with their fiddles, ready to play.

Performing familiar old-time tunes is a way for people to get

back to their roots, Widener said. "This kind of music is part of our international culture," she said, adding that old-time fiddlers play in the United States, Canada and Great Britain. "It's a part of our way of life."

## Boone brings evergreen act to Jackpot

JACKPOT — Forty years of hits — count 'em.

Forty years ago this month, Pat Boone was signed to a record contract. This year, Boone, now 61, launched his "Forty Years of Hits" tour. So far, he's been to Australia, Scotland, Wales and England, where he filmed a BBC-TV special.

"I think I'll have about an hour at Cactus Pecos," he said in a telephone interview on Tuesday. "That means I'll be able to sing as many as 20 of the hits."

That's only about a third of the total package.

Boone has sold more than 45 million records, with hits such as "Love Letters to the Sand," "Don't Forget Me" and "Ain't That a Shame." He's also starred in 15 movies, including "State Fair," "Bernadine" and "Mardi Gras." And, beginning with his celebrated "Twixt Twelve and Twenty," he's written 18 books.

It all started in Nashville, Tenn., where Boone (a descendant of Daniel) grew up. His dad was a building contractor, and his mother was a registered nurse and self-taught ukulele player.

"Mama taught my brother and me to play ukulele, and we started singing at family gatherings," Boone recalled.

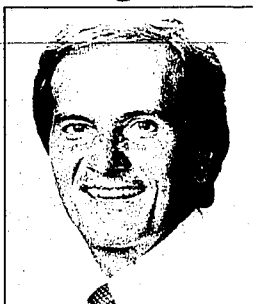
From there, young Boone performed in school concerts and at a movie theater outside Nashville.

"I was 12 or 13, and my mother would take me to the movie theater to audition for their Saturday stage show and talent contest," Boone said. "It was the worst audition in the world, little kids throwing popcorn and running down the aisles — and I was trying to sing 'Paper Moon.'"

Still, Boone managed to take several first prizes (banana splits at the drugstore next door) and to catch the attention of the moms who came to pick up their children.

"The women started asking me to sing at their ladies' clubs," Boone said. "I was too bashful to ask for anything, but I usually got a meal."

With a local piano teacher serving as his accompanist, Boone was soon entering hometown TV and radio talent contests.

Then, an audition for the "Ted Mack Amateur Hour" got him a stint on that show, and, later, on "Arthur Godfrey Talent Scouts."

Before long, Randy Wood of Dot Records had signed Boone to a contract. Boone married his high school sweetheart, Shirley Foley (daughter of the late recording artist Red Foley). In 1958, he graduated magna cum laude from Columbia University in New York. He was a speech and English major.

Today, the Boones live in the same Beverly Hills home they bought 35 years ago.

"People address mail to Pat Boone, Beverly Hills, Calif., and I get it," Boone said. "I've lived here so long, everyone knows where I am."

Pat and Shirley Boone have four daughters (Debby's the recording artist) and 15 grandchildren. Boone's parents are still living, too.

"I just left Mama and Daddy in Nashville," Boone said. "He's 89, and she's 86, and they're still living in the same house."

Boone attributes his still-youthful appearance to good genes ("my parents don't look over 75"), an active and athletic

lifestyle, healthy eating and a positive spiritual life.

The well-chronicled spiritual life has taken Boone into the world of Christian TV and music — and even to the Holy Land.

In fact, he's been to Israel so many times that the Israeli Tourism Department has given him the title of Christian ambassador to Israel. In November, he will lead another tour there, for the Christian Broadcasting Network. He said he hopes to organize a pop concert this trip.

Boone has also served as co-chairman of the National Day of Prayer and national chairman of the Easter Seal Society for the blind.

But this week, he's busy preparing for his live shows.

"The interaction with the audience is the only reason I am doing these days," Boone said. "I give people a chance to call out songs at each show."

Those who have lost their old records are also given the chance to purchase Boone's pop and gospel recordings at his shows. And Boone has recently compiled a 20-song video, also for sale.

"ABC had saved film from my live shows, so we were able to do the video," Boone said.

Most of this is about memories — "April Love" and white buck shoes — and Boone believes memories are extremely important.

"I have had people (at my shows) tell me, almost tearfully, that they have gone back to youthful days and recaptured feelings they thought were gone forever," Boone said. "Music has that magic quality, and, when you have the original guy singing his songs the way he did back then ..."

For 40 years — count 'em.

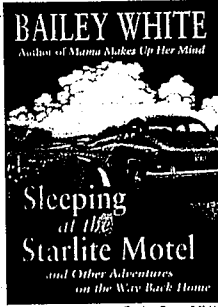

# 'Sleeping' is true southern comfort

In July in her south Georgia hometown, "there's no color but green," writes Bailey White. "Anything that doesn't move sprouts a blanket of moss, and after every rain a green mist hangs in the air." And so after several weeks of feeling like she is being "smothered by verdure," White, a first-grade teacher and a commentator on National Public Radio, catches a train headed north, where vegetation does not take over houses and is more "like a well-trained pet." She stays away several weeks, but in mid-August she heads back south, glad to lie in her own bed again.

The weariness of travel seeps out of my bones, and as I fall asleep all the green things press against the screen. Welcome home, they say.

Sleeping at the Starlite Motel: and Other Adventures on the Way Back Home" (Addison-Wesley, \$20), a follow-up to White 1993 best-seller "Mama Makes Up Her Mind," is as welcoming as one's own pillow. It reminds us that while going away is good, coming home can be just as fine, the exhilaration of leaving in the morning is tempered by the comfort of being able "to call every old lady's cat by name."

Not that White gets all misty-eyed when writing about small-town goings-

haired dog with a skin problem rubbing himself up against the furniture." Similarly, not all the eccentrics who inhabit these pages are as endearing as Mrs. Helgert, who "thinks because she was the Rose Queen in 1931 she has a lifelong right to pick roses in the municipal rose beds." There is, for example, the old woman with the dragon's head cane who accuses White at a wedding reception: "I believe I know your grandmother... A dreadful woman."

Obviously, White knows irony when she sees it, and consequently her essays have a clarity and grace untempered by sentimentality.

This collection, however, is less cohesive than "Mama Makes Up Her Mind," mostly because Mama — White's mother, with whom she lived — died last year. Mama, who raised night crawlers in the kitchen and once taught a taxidermist how to make pickles, gave White some of her best stories. Happily for readers, White has other memorable kindred, a number of whom figure in these tales.

A whole coterie of aunts includes two who are "old native Floridians who remembered when downtown Fort Lauderdale was a tomato farm," another who believes plumbing catamitams are

related to social status, another who puts her Civil War ancestors to practical use and yet another "whose preferred method of dealing with roaches was to creep in the kitchen in the dark of night, suddenly switch on the light, and then fly into a wild stamping dance as the frantic roaches fled for their lives."

As for cousin Mandon, he's hell-bent on reuniting the family's eight Chippendale chairs. Meanwhile, cousin Lilly knows the true story behind the midnight disappearance of Miss Grantly's historic house, "except the kitchen, a 1910 addition."

White has an equally observant eye when it comes to places, and how some can catch in our hearts like benign fishhooks and never let go. Georgia's Cumberland Island offers winter mist and a wild pony; a natural spring in North Florida has crystal-clear waters and unimaginable depth; a roadside product stand features a flashing sign announcing seasonal fruits and appropriate Bible verses.

And then there's the Starlite Motel of the title essay, existing on some sort of magical realist plane of seeping breezes and whimsical dreams. "What a fine piece of peachy. And as White's Aunt Eleanor will tell you, whimsy has its place — as long as you don't go painting red toenails on the ball-and-claw feet of an 18th-century Chippendale chair."

# Garber's 'Vertical Run': Suspense on the 45th floor

Joseph R. Garber's relentless thriller "Vertical Run" (Bantam Books, \$21.95) takes the second word of its title quite literally, providing all the breathless pace and heart-pounding action one could wish while lounging poolside. It also offers one added lure for readers lazing in the sun — the suggestion that going back to work may be hazardous to your health.

Garber's hero, Dave Elliot, is the sort of dedicated executive who rises at 5:45 a.m. to get an early start on the job. His set routine has him jogging along Sunton Place, arriving at his 45th floor Manhattan office at 7 a.m. After a brushing shower, conservatively dressed in a lightweight tan suit and feeling like a million, he steps into the office to find his normally genial boss inexplicably pointing a gun at him, finger tightening on the trigger. He dodges that bullet only to have an even fiercer encounter in the company's reception area with a complete stranger named Ransome.

Once again he escapes, but he's still 45 floors away from safety. Trusted friends and associates turn against him. His own family sides with Ransome. And as the building continues to fill with code-named hard cases wielding cutting-edge weaponry, poor Dave discovers firsthand what everybody who has seen the film "Die Hard" knows full well: Trying to exit a skyscraper under those conditions can be quite a daunting task.

Fortunately, our hero is as difficult to dispatch as well, the hero of "Die Hard." As the bodies of the bad guys (or are they good guys?) pile up, so do questions about what's going on here. Why is Dave Elliot at the top of everybody's hit list? How is he able to dispose of so many of his enemies so efficiently? Has he gone mad, as Ransome suggests? Is Ransome really working for a government agency?

Elliot can't make heads or tails of his living nightmare and neither can we, which is as it should be. Confusion is the stuff suspense novels are made of, especially those sub-categorized as "paranoids," of which this is a prime example.

Garber, a business analyst and columnist for Forbes, uses a writing style that can best be described as economic. His prose is lean. His cast is minimal — protagonist, antagonist and nominal love interest, along with an assortment of secondary characters

who are lucky to get more than a line or two of dialogue. But one is left with an impression of efficiency rather than inadequacy.

Elliot, in fact, has more time center stage than Shakespeare gave Hamlet. But, unlike the melancholy Dane, he isn't allowed the luxury of inclining directly to the audience. Maybe Garber wanted to keep some of Elliot's thoughts a mystery. Whatever the reason, the novel is not told in the first person. We get Elliot's history from short, well-placed, punchy flashbacks. But how is the reader to know what the omnipresent hero is mulling over, since he's alone throughout much of the book? In trying to solve this problem, Garber makes what I think is his only false step. He provides Elliot with an alter ego who converses with him in italics, tossing out cautionary advice and sage advice: "After encountering his enemies by stratagem is as much to be praised as who overcomes them by force. Machiavelli said that." In some instances, though, the alter ego is stating the obvious: "If you try to show anyone the proof of what happened this morning, they'll just look at you Dave, they'll shake it, it's all in his mind."

Happily, not even a know-it-all, Machiavelli-quoting inner voice can slow the pace of this engrossing novel. From the moment poor old Dave begins his run until the epilogue that gives his story a surprising 180-degree twist, this is a piece of suspense fiction that's designed to be devoured in one or two sittings. If you're taking it to the beach, use plenty of sun block.

## Sponge soaks up listeners

### Band's debut release 'Rotting Pinata' shows range of style

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Winnie can identify with one of his own songs even more now that his Detroit-based band Sponge is moving into modern-rock heavy rotation.

"The song is 'Pennywhells,' from the band's debut LP 'Rotting Pinata.' The tune is about dealing with the pressure to succeed, or 'feeding the monster,' as Winnie, who doesn't use his last name, Dombrowski, puts it.

"This band being out on the road the way it is, it's almost like a monster," he says. "And it gets bigger ... and you have to feed the monster. So in order to feed the monster, you've got to continue to play dates.

"To me, that's almost not the first and foremost thing that I'm about. I'm more about writing songs. I find myself in a position right now of continuing to play, even though I don't necessarily feel like going out and doing gigs. I continue just in order to get the places we need to go."

He wishes he could back off the relentless pace of struggling to get an audience, but knows for now that that's impossible. "How can you begin to slow down when you've gotten started?" he said. "I actually did about two weeks ago. I said, 'I've had enough, man,' and we canceled about a week of dates. ... I just disappeared."

The record is inching toward gold, and its two singles, "Plowed" and "Molly," have gotten plenty of MTV play. But Sponge isn't your usual alternative band; the album is a melange of styles ranging from the bouncy pop of "Molly" and "Plowed" to the moody darkness of "Pennywhells" and "Giants."

"We don't want to be consistent in style," Winnie, 32, said. "I don't know if you've been pigeonholed — don't need to be understood."

Winnie is a colorful front man with his mod clothes, funky vintage shoes (which he collects), and short-cropped hair. He's stylish like David Byrne, charismatic like fellow Detroit native Iggy Pop, with a voice somewhere in between.

His writing is fairly observational.

"I have no desire to be so autobiographical or taken so autobiographically," Winnie said. "You run the risk, I think, of being so autobiographical you look like you might be pretty wrapped up in yourself, and I don't want that."

The relationship described in "Giants" becomes so mundane that the two lovers fail to notice each other until it's too late. "Both of them notice but neither of them want to 'fess up,'" he said. "It's just like, 'Let's keep this thing just going on for the sake of going on — let's just kid ourselves.'"

The title track came out of Winnie's belief in dying with dignity; it was partly inspired by the controversy of assisted suicide. "It's kind of a squeamish thing to talk about," he said. "Maybe

it's a squeamish thing for Americans to consider when we want to try to give people everything in life, the best type of life that you can have. Why consider death? Let's prolong life, but a lot of times, you're prolonging death."

Winnie attributes the band's early success to being at the right place at the right time.

"Timing has been everything with this group," he said. "We're around at a good time; we released our record at a good time."

And he thinks video won't be a make or break issue for Sponge. "We seemed to have become something more subtle," he said, "and I kind of like that. At the same time, I make no mistake about the impact of a great video."

## Students write software that lets them jam with others via PC

CHICAGO — Canton Becker and Matt Moller don't have any gold albums to their credit. They have never headlined a concert and don't even perform their music outside their respective college apartments.

Nor are their songs well-known, not even among their classmates at Northwestern University. Yet Becker and Moller, who became fast friends after meeting last year in a music technology class, may someday be hailed as the Lennon and McCartney of cyberspace.

To date, they have jammed with musicians in England, France, Canada and Norway — all without leaving Evanston, Ill. — thanks to their magnan opus, a copyrighted software program.

It allows players all over the world to interact for the first time using personal computer technology. Although the program works only with electronic instruments that can be patched into a computer and have signals that can be transmitted over the Internet.

Nor is the system available to the public just yet. Becker and Moller say they hope to distribute their software free of charge and are exploring the possibility of marketing the network worldwide.

The "Distributed Real-Time Groove Network" (or "Dragon"), which went on-line two months ago, is the first collaboration between Becker, 22, a graduate science major who graduated last month, and Moller, 24, a cognitive student in music technology.

True to their majors, Becker's artistic vision gave birth to the Dragon, and Moller's computer wizardry helped make it a reality.

The duo began their quest for virtual

harmony last year, when they met in "Computer Sound Processing," a class taught by Northwestern professor Gary Kendall, director of the music technology program at the Northwestern School of Music.

Becker was working on a program that, as he put it, "would algorithmically create and compose dance music." Moller heard about it and recognized the potential of crossing-over to the Internet.

"We thought about it a bit and spent a couple months of my life trying to design the software to make it work," Moller said.

Through the Internet, they found a long-distance collaborator in Willy Hanshall, a founder of the British pop group London Beat, which has had two No. 1 singles in the U.S. ("I've Been Thinking About You" and "Come Back").

The pair sent a copy of the software to Hanshall, who helped recruit other players worldwide. The trial run, organized by Hanshall and Moller, came this spring.

"Matt walked into my office and said, 'I've just had one of the greatest musical experiences of my life. Kendall reached out to me and I've just been jamming with musicians on other continents. It was stunning.'"

It was also an Internet "first," according to Kendall. "They deserve every bit of credit for this," he said. "It's their vision and their work."

The artists who use the Dragon see it as more mystical than technical.

# 'Pocahontas,' 'Apollo 13' still on

**"Apollo 13"** — It happened in 1970: three astronauts in a dying ship 200,000 miles from Earth need all kinds of help to get home. An engrossing true story on the whole impressively told by director Ron Howard but undercut by the filmmakers' lack of trust in the material, which allows a sense of cynicism to intrude on the proceedings. Streep is especially luminous as a careworn Midwestern farm wife who has a four-day affair, but Eastwood's hunky photographer remains too much of a wish fulfillment cartoon of masculinity. **"Something to Talk About"** — The first-rate creative team of "Thelma & Louise" screenwriter Callie Khouri and director Lasse Hallstrom have attracted a fine cast including Rita Roberts, Robert Duvall and Dennis Quaid to this seriocomic story of a troubled marriage in Southern horse country. The film has a pleasantly off-center feeling and great character moments, but its plot tends toward the schematic. (R, for brief strong language.) # 'Baby-Sitters' delivers sweetness

If it seems like overkill to add a movie to the pile of "Baby-Sitters Club" merchandise (the books, the posters, the kits, the videos, the games, etc.), then you've probably never understood the popularity of "Little House on the Prairie," "Nancy Drew" or even "The Brady Bunch."

## Movie review

Little girls have an insatiable appetite for sweet stories that seem to carry on forever. And the big-screen version of "The Baby-Sitters Club" won't disappoint the preteen legions who have poured millions of dollars into this franchise since its birth in 1986.

The movie might even soften a few cynical hearts among those who consider themselves too tough to fall for such saccharine goodness.

Director Melanie Mayron (who played Melissa on TV's "thirtysomething") keeps a light touch here, delicately laying out the story as a fairy tale of childhood innocence.

These sitters don't try to be hip. In fact, they revel in their uniqueness, as if the movie were a period piece, a sort of Victorian morality play set in the age of political correctness.

The seven girls who populate this idyllic suburb of the movie are a model of diversity worthy of a White House Cabinet. The film tries to parcel out time equally to all the girls, but it ends up giving short shrift to the youngest two, who just happen to be the only experienced movie actors of the group.

Zelda Harris ("Crooklyn") plays Jessi, a ballerina, and Stacey Lynn Ramsower ("Tank Girl"), "The Quick and the Dead" is Mallory, a carrot-topped novelist.

They're the only sitters who don't get to have problems. Artistic Claudia (Tribia Joe) might fail her summer science course and get kicked out of the Club. Sensitive Mary Anne (Rachael Leigh Cook) might lose her boyfriend Logan (Austin O'Brien) to one of the town's bobby-soxer vikings. Environmentalist Dawn (Larisa Oleynik) has to soothe irritable neighbor Mrs. Haberman (Ellen Burstyn). Beautiful Stacy (Bra Blair) might lose her older boyfriend if he finds out she's only 13. And group leader Kristy (Schuyler Fisk) has to lie to everyone because her estranged father (Mayron's "thirtysomething" cohort Peter Horton) told her that he's back in town.

What brings the girls together is the summer camp they've set up to earn money. With too many running story lines, Mayron loses the focus on the camp, which seems to exist without much effort from the girls. But part of the convenience of fantasy is being able to suspend disbelief so we can buy the premise that seven preteens — with no parental supervision — could put together such a model of efficiency with no advice, financial help or enormous preparation time.

As the summer rolls on, the movie gives way to Kristy and her dad, and the imploring trust she places in this free-spirited waster (her stepfather, of course, is a millionaire) actually manages to be compelling even if it is familiar.

In the end, friendship makes everything work out fine. What could be wrong with that? (*Twin Cinema 9, Jerome Cinema 4*)

## Kempthorne backs Batt on waste

**BUHL** — U.S. Sen. Dirk Kempthorne says Idaho Gov. Phil Batt is right to negotiate with the federal government on nuclear waste. But Democratic businessman Walter Minnick — weighing a 1996 run against U.S. Senator Larry Craig — says the governor is flirting with disaster by holding closed-door negotiations with the feds.

In the Magic Valley and statewide Thursday, Republicans were praising Batt's efforts to cut a deal with the feds. Democrats, however, were denouncing compromise with Washington, D.C. on nuclear waste.

Batt and Attorney General Al Lance met

with federal officials in Chicago this week to seek assurances that Idaho won't be a permanent waste site, that waste already in Idaho will be cleaned up, and that jobs at Idaho National Engineering Laboratory near Idaho Falls won't be cut. Those talks are scheduled to resume next Wednesday in Salt Lake City.

Batt has warned that, absent a deal, Congress will pass legislation sending the waste to Idaho, ignoring Gem State objections.

Kempthorne, in Buhl Thursday for a Rotary Club luncheon, said Batt is letting Washington, D.C. know Idaho's unhappiness with the nation's nuclear

waste policy. "The federal government knows that they have a problem on their hands with Idaho," Kempthorne said.

At the same time, the governor is working to make sure that the waste that is already in Idaho eventually leaves.

Standing on the railroad tracks to block incoming waste might deter the feds. But where do you stand to get the government to take back the waste that is already here? Kempthorne asked.

Negotiations can win guarantees that another waste storage facility opens June 1998, Kempthorne added. But he conceded that Idaho has received "empty promises" from the government in the past regarding nuclear waste.

The government promised repeatedly in

### Fall victim now charged with helping out theft

Crawford was transferred from Magic Valley Regional Medical Center on Aug. 3 to another facility, according to Linda Jones, the nursing supervisor and patient care coordinator.

One month later, a cast-wearing Ivie helped William Kingsland rob a Twin Falls man of his stereo by unplugging it from the speakers, according to an affidavit written by Detective Dennis Biehart of the Twin Falls Police Department.

### Jerome police continue search for 84-year-old woman's killer

**JEROME** — Police were continuing their search Thursday for the killer of 84-year-old Wilma Moble, who was found beaten and strangled in her Jerome trailer last week.

Investigators don't yet have a prime suspect, but they are following up leads and ruling out some of them, said Lt. Dean Larson of the Jerome Police Department.

The search is narrowing, "but by the same token, you get one thing done, and you have something else to look into," Larson said.

No signs of forced entry were obvious when Moble was found slain in her mobile home last Thursday at Majestic Meadows trailer park in south Jerome. Anyone with information should contact the Jerome Police Department at 324-4328.

## Congressional races begin to take shape

### Foot doctor aims to give Crapo boot

**TWIN FALLS** — Branding Idaho's congressional delegation "wimpy and deceptive" on nuclear-waste issues, Twin Falls Republican Peter Rickards plans to launch his long-shot congressional campaign today on the steps of the Statehouse in Boise.

But so far, few if any prominent Republicans are lining up to help the Magic Valley foot doctor unseat incumbent 2nd District Congressman Michael Crapo in the 1996 GOP primary.

"A Republican once told me, 'There are a lot of people behind you. Way, way, way, way behind you where they can't be seen,'" Rickards said Thursday.

But Rickards — an anti-nuclear waste, pro-choice, term-limits challenger — says he can beat Crapo.

"I feel on Election Day, behind closed doors, people will feel good about checking my name on the ballot," Rickards predicted Thursday.

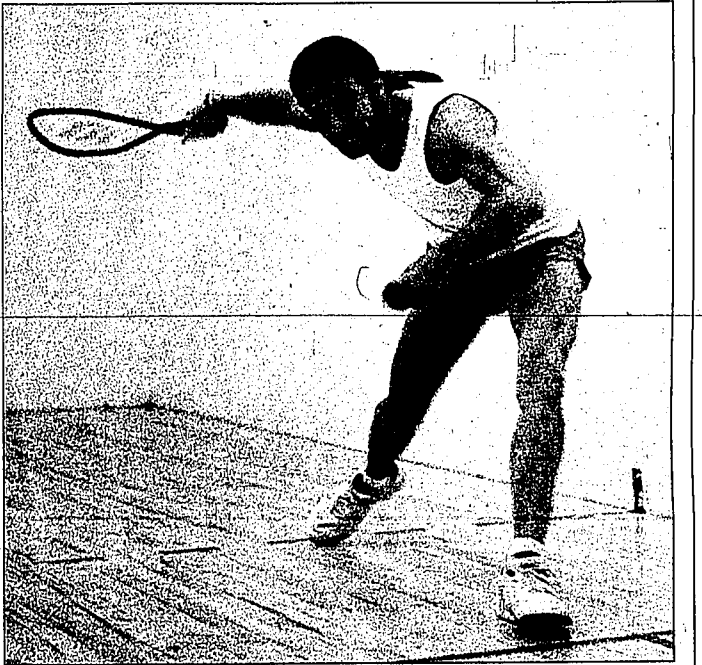
He hopes to create a coalition of Ross Perot backers, abortion-rights supporters, and Idahoans who are edgy about storing nuclear waste over the Snake River aquifer at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

He's also promising to voluntarily comply with the term-limits law Idaho voters passed in November of 1994. Similar term-limit laws have been declared unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court.

In an age when politicians spend hundreds of thousands, even millions, of dollars to win, Rickards is vowing to spend less than \$5,000. "I'm running a very low-key campaign," Rickards added.

The last person who ran a low-key campaign against Crapo, Democrat Penny Fletcher, was trounced, failing to carry a single Idaho county. Rickards hopes to avoid a similar fate by traveling to county fairs around the district in search of votes and meeting a lot of voters face-to-face.

His Boise announcement gives him a chance to "thun-

dr. Peter Rickards, an avid racquetball player, plans to take a swing at politics.

He'll use the media" and reach the population center of the district.

"There are a lot of voters in Boise who do not want more waste transported by their houses," Rickards said. Friday's campaign kickoff is "the best chance to let (Boise residents) know that someone is going to be on their side."

Rickards is married and has two sons. A graduate of Ohio

State University, he has lived in Twin Falls since 1988. An outspoken critic of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, he has frequently criticized GOP politicians for not standing up to Lockheed Corp. and the pro-nuclear lobby.

Crapo is on vacation and could not be reached for comment Thursday.

## To run or not to run against Craig? That's Minnick's question

**TWIN FALLS** — Former TJ International Chief Executive Officer Walter Minnick says he'll decide by the end of September whether to run for the U.S. Senate in 1996.

Thursday, Minnick was in Twin Falls, meeting with area Democratic leaders and sizing up Craig's support in the Magic Valley, Twin Falls attorney — and former state Democratic Party chairman — Lloyd Walker says he gave Minnick "enthusiastic encouragement."

"Idaho likes directness, and Idaho likes independence and I think Walter Minnick has both," Walker said.

Minnick also got encouragement from Twin Falls County Democratic Party Chairman Jenne Meyer.

"He's well-educated and he comes across different than most politicians. He's kind of straightforward — he doesn't hem and haw," Meyer said.

Minnick has a B.A. from Whitman College, and a law degree and MBA from Harvard University. A Walla Walla, Wash. native, Minnick has lived in Idaho for more than 20 years.

He has never held public office. And in the 1990s, the fact that he isn't a Washington insider could be a plus, supporters insist.

Idaho hasn't sent a Democrat to the Senate since Frank Church was re-elected in 1974. Minnick admits that electing a Democrat in 1996 won't be easy.

"It's clearly uphill, but not impossible," he told The Times-News Thursday. Even Democratic polls show Craig with a substantial base of support: 43 percent of

voters already plan to vote for the Republican — and most of the rest would consider voting for Craig in 1996.

If Minnick runs, he'll portray himself as a fiscal conservative, and he'll paint Craig as an extremist on social issues.

"Sen. Craig is quite a bit more extreme on a number of issues than the average Idahoan," Minnick said. Craig lacks a "strong personal following" and his views are "at, on edge, one end of the political spectrum in Idaho," according to Minnick.

While Craig has held federal and state offices since the 1970s, Minnick is little-known in the Gem State. He enjoys 11 percent name recognition, according to one poll.

## Homeless students may get less help

**TWIN FALLS** — Dawn Boyd has found homeless students camping in the canyon, living in cars with their parents and staying temporarily in drug houses.

For three years, she has helped them find housing, school supplies and clothes with money from a federal grant.

"We didn't buy a whole whole lot, but enough so they'd have decent clothes to go to school with," she said. "We helped a lot of kids. We helped in the hundreds."

But Boyd, a homeless advocate with the Twin Falls School District, may have worked her way out of a job. Homeless students have a place to stay — Valley House, a shelter which holds about 50 people, opened in January.

"That's the way the grant was supposed to work," said Doreen Thomsberry, director of federal programs for the school district. They may not renew their grant this year because district employees have succeeded in establishing a strong refer-

ral network for the homeless.

"Our goal was to help youngsters and families find resources so they can stay in school," he said. "In a sense we diminished a need for our services because when homeless people come to town or are identified there's a good network of people who can find services for them."

But Randy Hansen, director of Valley House, said he hates to see Boyd's position cut. Nine children in the shelter were counting on her to help them register, he said.

"They'd be crazy to get rid of Dawn and her position," he said. "She's been a help to us."

Part of the success of Valley House is because we have a broad spectrum of support from different agencies across different boundaries. If we were to lose all those agencies, we would lose all that support."

Boyd is grateful that students no longer have to sleep on the street. But they still need other things that the shelter can't provide, such as backpacks, calculators and paper, she said.

As homeless advocate, she conducted an annual drive to collect such items.

There are still supplies left from last year, but when they run out, they won't be replenished.

There's still enough money left over from last year to fund the program this year, Thomsberry said. The district will continue to search for homeless children even after the money runs out. And if necessary, the district will turn to other agencies for supplies.

"If we don't get the funding, we'll have to rely on the goodwill of individuals and businesses in the community," he said.

Hansen said that might not be easy. "I know that all agencies right now are tapped," he said. "To spread some burden somewhere else I know would be a challenge to everyone."

Grant money was never intended to be long-term, said Anita Brunner, former state supervisor of the Stuart B. McKinney grant, which provided the annual \$10,000.

"The idea is it's supposed to be used money and the district is supposed to see it's a good idea and pick it up," she said. "It sounds like it started the little bit it was supposed to."

## Local bank account handles medical costs for hurt boy

**KIMBERLY** — The parents of a Kimberly boy seriously injured last month have opened a medical expense savings account at DL Evans Bank in Twin Falls.

After three brain operations and several weeks in a Boise rehabilitation hospital, Zachariah Vitale, 13, came home Tuesday, according to his mother, Shauna Vitale.

The boy fell from the back of a pickup truck north of Claiborne's Corner on July 16, his mother said. He broke his left leg and left shoulder, and his brain was lacerated and shifted two centimeters in his skull, she said.

"He was with some bigger kids. He was also threatened if he didn't ride in the back, he would get hurt," the boy's mother said. "Make sure you know your kids' friends are. We just moved here a few months ago, so we don't know a lot of the kids."

After the accident, Zachariah was in a coma for 10 days and in intensive care for 12 days. He will be home-schooled this year before returning to Kimberly Middle School.

"He has about a year before he is out of the danger zone. He has a lot of therapy left until he can be semi-independent," his mother said. "His medical bills are going to be astronomical. Any donations are greatly appreciated. We appreciate all your thoughts and prayers."

Larry said he wouldn't leave here until the middle of September or first week of October, so that will give us some

time to get the budget wrapped up," Oster said.

"Since Larry came, there have been a lot of productive projects done and to get a replacement is obviously a costly procedure, because we now need to advertise, interview and select someone," the mayor said.

"Our government has changed in the last 10 to 15 years. We need a professionally trained person who can advise the council and

manage things," he said.

Jerome council president Elza Hall said: "Larry is a good man. He's done a lot since he came, but I think we all knew he wouldn't stay when we hired him."

The mayor said the city would begin immediately to advertise the position that has a salary range of \$35,000 to \$45,000 per year.

"It could be next December or January before we get it filled," he said.

# Idaho courts uphold murder sentences

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Court of Appeals decided unanimously on Thursday to uphold Jeremy Blaine Harris' prison term for the second-degree murder of 13-year-old Brendy Thueson in Minidoka County.

Harris, who was 16 at the time, initially was charged with first-degree murder for shooting Thueson to death on July 31, 1993, while stealing alcohol and other belongings from her family's home. But he pleaded guilty to second-degree murder in exchange for prosecutors' agreement to recommend a 10- to 20-year prison sentence.

Fifth District Judge Roger Burdick, however, imposed a 15- to 25-year sentence, and Harris argued on appeal that the judge's decision "undermined the basis of the agreement and tainted the voluntariness of his guilty plea."

But the Court of Appeals found that Harris signed a plea agreement that clearly said the judge was "not bound or obligated to follow the State's recommendation

and that additional conditions or penalties may be imposed."

Harris could have faced up to second-degree murder, and the appellate court rejected arguments that his sentence was unreasonably harsh.

Citing a juvenile record that began when he was 8 years old and a history of using alcohol starting at age 6 or 7 and drugs starting at 10, the court said the sentence was justified.

"In the course of a burglary he shot and killed a thirteen-year-old girl who had been his friend, demonstrating that he is capable of killing when under the influence of drugs or alcohol and thereby pre-

sents a significant danger to society," Judge Karen Lansing wrote.

The Idaho Supreme Court has upheld a sentence of 10 years to life in prison for the teen-ager who pleaded guilty to second-degree murder for the 1991 slaying of Danny Disney of Idaho Falls.

Seven th District Judge Marvin Smith did not abuse his discretion in sentencing Michael C. Book, the five-member Supreme Court ruled unanimously on Thursday.

"The court took into account Book's age, his childhood, substance abuse, and current lifestyle of searching for instant gratification," Justice Linda Copple Trout

Book initially pleaded guilty to first-degree murder for the slaying of Disney, who was found shot in the head.

But Smith allowed him to withdraw his plea and plead guilty to second-degree murder instead after Disney's wife, Jeannie, pleaded guilty to second-degree murder for her role in the killing.

Prosecutors said Book agreed to kill Disney for \$15,000 after Mrs. Disney initially asked him to provide her with cocaine that she planned to put in Disney's food to induce a heart attack. Both Book and Mrs. Disney were at the scene when Disney was killed June 23, 1991, but both denied responsibility.

On appeal, Book argued that his sentence should be lighter than Mrs. Disney's because he claimed she actually pulled the trigger. However, Trout wrote that "a disparity in sentences between co-defendants does not constitute excessiveness of sentence as to any particular defendant."

# Prosecutors file motions in Lewiston slayings

LEWISTON (AP) — An affidavit from a woman who claims to have been raped by Ronald and Luella Bingham has been filed by the defense in the Kenneth Arrasmith first-degree murder case.

A stack of motions were filed by Tuesday's deadline imposed by 2nd District Judge Ida Leggett.

Arrasmith, 44, is accused of shooting the Bingham on May 17 at a Lewiston auto repair shop.

Both were being investigated for allegedly sexually molesting Arrasmith's teen-age daughter.

Terri Baker of Black Hawk, S.D., said in an affidavit filed by Arrasmith's attorney, Roy Mosman, that she was 17 and employed in her grandfather's auto repair shop when she met the Bingham 20 years ago.

Baker said the Bingham formed a friendship with her before they took her to Luella Bingham's mother's home and raped her in June 1975.

Baker said she told her mother about 10 days later, but did not notify the police because her mother said it would end a longstanding relationship between Baker's grandparents and Luella Bingham's family.

Nez Perce County Prosecutor Dew G. Rosen asked in her motion that a jury be selected from elsewhere in the state due to media coverage of Arrasmith.

She also requested no testimony be allowed about the character or alleged acts of the Bingham.

The trial is scheduled to begin Monday.

The defense is asking the court to suppress testimony by witness Robert Warnock about the identity of the assailant, and by Clarkston Police Sgt. Ronald Roberts over Arrasmith's statements and behavior when he went to the Clarkston Police Department after the killings.

The motion claims Warnock never provided police with a physical description of the shooter, he was unable to positively identify Arrasmith in the courtroom, and when shown a photo lineup was only able to say that Arrasmith "had a resemblance" to the picture he picked.

Mosman charges six days passed between the time Warnock first was questioned and the time he was shown the photographs; pictures of Arrasmith were in the newspapers and on television during that interval.

Robert's statements should be suppressed because he did not advise Arrasmith of his rights before talking about the Bingham and Arrasmith's daughter, or the slayings, a motion said.

Robert's department was investigating the Bingham before the shootings.

He also had heard rumors Ronald Bingham offered a pound of methamphetamine for Arrasmith's death, the motion said.

Finally, Mosman requested the charges be dismissed based on the evidence.

LEWISTON (AP) — Idaho's Division of Environmental Quality has paid about \$120,000 to two consultants who worked with the agency's administrator in the private sector.

Administrator Wally Cory opted not to bid the strategic planning work. State law requires agencies to produce strategic plans by Sept. 1.

An agency spokeswoman said Cory believed "the mandate was an opportunity to organize the agency in an efficient and cost-effective way as a new comer to the agency."

But the disclosure raised the eyebrows of Gov. Phil Batt.

"I'm not familiar with it," Batt said on Thursday. "I'll take a look at it."

Cory worked for Montgomery Watson Consulting Engineers of California between 1992 and the end of last year, according to his resume. J. Dan Davis has been at the same firm since 1993 and Frederick Schroeder has served in administrative posts there.

"From what (Cory) has been told, there were not many consultants in this area who could match their combination of strategic planning experience, public utilities expertise, engineering and high-level business backgrounds," agency spokeswoman Shirley Mix said on Wednesday.

Cory was assured by other Idaho officials he was not required to go through a public-bidding process, she said.

Mix cited a state law that allows state and local governments to select engineering, architectural and land surveying services, on the basis of qualifications and demonstrated competence.

It also allows government agencies to negotiate agreements at fair and reasonable prices.

Both Davis and Schroeder are engineers. Davis was paid \$119,800 by the division for his work, according to state records, and Schroeder got about \$43,000 of that total through a subcontract with Davis.

Davis has not consulted on strategic planning for state agencies previously, but was general manager of the Long Beach Water Department and a supervising civil engineer for the Los Angeles Flood Control District.

Schroeder recently worked for universities and the California Department of Transportation.

"The funds are high, but it's amazing what it costs even small industries for a small environmental problem," said Rep. Jack Barraclough, R-Idaho Falls.

"I think this is well worth the money," said Barraclough, who serves on the Joint Legislative Task Force on Environmental Common Sense. It reviewed Davis' draft strategy.

"Wally has been very pleased with the work of the consultants and believes the strategic plan document to be outstanding," Mix said. "The process worked very well at division, and the taxpayers will benefit as a result."

**Declo man charged with kicking his daughter, assaulting baby sitter**

BURLEY — A Declo man convicted of a felony in the 1993 bathtub drowning of his infant son has been arrested on charges that he kicked his 5-year-old daughter, Amanda, and inappropriately touched the girl's baby sitter.

Troy Don Tinney, 27, has been charged with three counts of battery and a probation violation, according to court records.

New charges against Tinney were reported by his baby sitter, according to an affidavit. The woman told investigators that in June she saw Tinney grab his daughter by the arm, pull her off

the ground, take a couple of steps and kick her in the buttocks causing her feet to fly out from underneath her, the affidavit said.

The baby sitter told detectives that earlier this month Tinney had rubbed her breast and squeezed her buttocks, the affidavit said.

Tinney has pleaded innocent in Magistrate Court, according to court minutes. His attorney, Kerry McMurray, said he had no comment while the case is pending.

The U.S. Border Patrol has placed a hold on Tinney, a Canadian citizen, which means he faces deportation to Canada.

Tinney has been on probation for about one year after success-

fully serving 180 days at the Community Work Center in Twin Falls in connection with his son's drowning.

Tinney's sentence of 18 months to five years in prison was suspended to four years of probation after his 180-day review before 5th District Judge George Granata Jr. last year, according to a probation order.

Tinney pleaded guilty in February 1994 to the charge of felony injury to a child. He had left his 14-month-old son, Ethan, unattended in a bathtub full of water. According to Cassia County Sheriff Department reports at that time, deputies had found the bathtub within three inches of being full.

the 1970s and '80s to remove plutonium-contaminated waste buried at INEL. None of that waste has been moved out of the site.

Kempthorne isn't the only member of Idaho's congressional delegation praising Batt's negotiations with the feds.

"He has the support of the delegation, and we will all continue working together to assure that the INEL remains safe and that Idaho doesn't become a permanent waste repository," U.S. Sen. Larry Craig said in a written statement.

U.S. Rep. Mike Crapo said he hopes a compromise can be reached that guarantees "a strong INEL, the permanent repository for spent nuclear fuel."

Minnick, in Twin Falls to gauge support for a possible Senate bid, told *The Times-News* that "the only good agreement for Idaho is no agreement," adding, "We should not be turning this state into what will turn out to be a permanent nuclear waste dump."

"I think what's happening right now is a disaster of the first order," Minnick said of Batt's negotiations. Warning that more waste could constitute "a calamity for the people of Idaho," Minnick said the Snake River Plain is "the last place on the continent that ought to be a nuclear waste dump."

Idaho State Democratic Party Chairman Bill Mauk, in Boise Thursday, also denounced Batt's deal-making.

"Idaho has nothing to gain by these negotiations and everything to lose," Mauk said. "We shouldn't be trying to expedite the process of getting the shipments delivered, but trying to find ways to block the waste from ever crossing our borders."

Mauk also questioned why the Idaho congressional delegation isn't doing more to keep waste out of the Gem State.

"Where is our congressional delegation? Mauk asked, claiming Idaho's GOP congressmen have been "totally ineffective in stopping these shipments."

# Nation Bradley may seek Oval Office

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Casting himself as a champion of the disaffected, Democrat Bill Bradley said Thursday his decision to retire from the U.S. Senate could lead to an independent bid for the presidency in 1996.

He also said he had spoken with Gen. Colin Powell, the former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff who is considered a possible presidential contender. Bradley would not give specifics of their conversation.

"I have not ruled out an independent route," the New Jersey Democratic senator told reporters. "My objective is to get the political process to focus on the lives of people who are now disconnected from it."

He repeated that he would not challenge President Clinton in the Democratic primary, and said he still considers himself a Democrat.

"I don't know in 1996 what will be the best way to participate in the presidential election process," Bradley said.

Bradley said a phone call to Powell was among about 120 calls he made Wednesday, which also included unsuccessful attempts to reach 1992 independent presidential candidate H. Ross Perot and Lowell Weicker, a former Republican and former independent governor of Connecticut.

"I called Mr. Powell, General Powell, to let him know what I was doing," Bradley said, declining to elaborate.

On Wednesday, Bradley criticized Republicans and Democrats alike as he told a gathering of about 50 friends that although it was time to retire from the Senate, he didn't plan to retire from public life.

His decision not to seek re-election also leaves a wide-open race for the seat Bradley nearly lost in 1990 to Christie Whitman, then a relatively unknown Republican and now governor. It also increases the likelihood Democrats will not recapture control of the Senate next year.

The former Rhodes scholar, Princeton University and New York Knicks basketball star had been mentioned as a contender during each of the last two presidential elections, with supporters calling him "thinker in a man's molders" who could attract voters from both parties.

# Pentagon keeps an eye on Iraq

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon, saying it is worried but not alarmed by military movements inside Iraq, said Thursday U.S. forces in the Middle East and at home are taking new steps to prepare for a potential U.S. military response.

An unspecified number of troops in the United States assigned to units that would be the vanguard of a sudden U.S. deployment to the Persian Gulf are being told to stay aware of developments, said a senior military official who discussed the latest U.S. planning on condition he not be identified.

"We're not putting forces on alert," the official stressed. Instead, some forces are simply being told they would be on the leading edge of any deployment to the Gulf area and should be "thinking about" their readiness, he said.

The official said he could not immediately estimate how many forces are involved. The United States has about 20,000 troops in the Persian Gulf region, including 2,000 Marines training with Jordanian troops.

Responding to earlier U.S. warnings to Iraq, the Iraqi army newspaper Al-Qadisiya called U.S. leaders "riffraff" and dismissed their warnings as "hollow threats."

In another new move, the Pentagon is shifting shiploads of military equipment kept permanently afloat in the Indian Ocean and elsewhere close to the Persian Gulf, the official said. He declined to be more specific about where the ships were going.

The ships have enough tanks, ammunition and other equipment and supplies to sustain a Marine Expeditionary Force of about 17,000 men plus an Army combat brigade between 2,500 and 5,000 soldiers, the official said.

In a third new step, the Navy has decided that the aircraft carrier USS Abraham Lincoln, which had been scheduled to leave the Persian Gulf today, will stay longer to await the arrival of its replacement, the USS Independence. This will eliminate the gap in carrier presence that otherwise would have occurred.

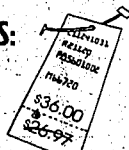

# Batt reports progress in waste talks

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Phil Batt said Thursday that substantial progress was made during his seven-hour meeting with top federal officials on concessions he wants in return for the resumption of radioactive dumping in Idaho.

But the governor refused to be specific beyond saying ground was gained on his three key points: a reasonable, enforceable schedule for clean-up of waste to be removed from Idaho, continued cleanup of existing waste and protection for economic and employment opportunities at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

"I cannot expand further except to say we are proceeding as rapidly as possible," the governor said.

And while he seemed somewhat optimistic about finalizing some kind of deal at next Wednesday's meeting in Salt Lake City, Batt said there were no guarantees.

"There's always a possibility there will be no agreement at all," he said. "We will not accept empty promises."

Wednesday's meeting at a downtown Chicago law firm with Energy Department Undersecretary Thomas Grumbley and Adm. Bruce DeMars, head of the Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program, was billed as a last ditch attempt to cut a deal that would head off an almost certain congressional mandate that shipments of naval waste resume Oct. 1 for a year.

But Batt said that at the end of those talks both sides believed some resolution was possible and another meeting warranted.

As he has indicated before, Batt indicated there remained serious problems with meeting his demand for a way to enforce any deadline for ultimate waste removal if the government — as it repeatedly has in the past — fails to meet it.

The governor, however, defended the efforts of the state's Republican congressional delegation toward federal authorization of a temporary dump in Nevada where any new waste dumped at INEL could eventually be moved. And he blasted state Democratic Chairman Bill Mauk for trying to

make political points "during these delicate negotiations."

Shortly after Wednesday's meeting ended, Mauk issued a statement blasting the GOP governor's negotiating effort. He specifically criticized their secretiveness even though former Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus held similar secret talks while he was fighting to halt waste shipments to INEL.

Mauk claimed the governor walked into the talks with no support from the state's GOP congressional delegation that "likes to talk about states' rights but when push comes to shove has folded like a house of cards."

"Even the White House, I've been told, is acting constructively during this period," Batt shot back.

"Mr. Mauk should do the same."  
The talks, which began at a lower level two months ago, were prompted by rising congressional support to override a two-year-old federal court order barring any new shipments until a ruling on the state's claim that the Energy Department has yet to prove they can be made safely.

# Man charged with baby's death

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A 22-month-old girl died Thursday after being severely beaten, and authorities have lodged a first-degree murder charge against the boyfriend of the child's mother.

Doctors at Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center said Nichole Hoover had suffered multiple broken ribs, a brain hemorrhaging and extensive bruising.

Douglas C. Carlson, 26, of Rigby, who was free pending sentencing on felony drug charge, was taken into custody about 90 minutes before the child was declared dead and then immediately charged with murder.

Detective Ken Brown said Carlson had cooperated with police and given them a statement.

Police said Carlson was baby-sitting Nichole for his girlfriend, Evelyn Hoover, while she took her 3-year-old daughter to a preschool appointment. Evelyn Hoover had separated from her husband, Jon, four months

ago, officials said. Carlson was also separated from his wife, Tammy.

When Evelyn Hoover returned, Carlson told her Nichole was asleep, according to Hoover's estranged husband.

"She went in to wake her up, and she wouldn't wake up," Jon Hoover said. "She was very, very lovable, very small and fragile."

Doctors told Hoover that Nichole had been repeatedly abused over the past two weeks.

Hoover said he noticed his daughter

was walking with a limp and complaining of being in pain and unable to sleep when she stayed with him over the weekend in Pocatello.

"She was crying," he said. "She wouldn't let go of me. ... I didn't know what was going on."

Carlson's sister, Suzanne, refused to believe her brother was capable of beating a child so brutally.

"I know my brother is a very good father to his own child and a good uncle to my kids," she said. "I just can't believe that baby's gone. I don't believe my brother did it. ... My brother would never hurt her. He's not guilty of this."

According to a police report, Carlson said Nichole had a blood disease that caused her to bruise easily and develop sores, and Evelyn Hoover said her daughter had been diagnosed with a blood condition only last week.

Jon Hoover said his estranged wife told him the same thing.

# Measure worries environmentalists

BOISE (AP) — Idaho environmentalists warn legislation signed by President Clinton ushers loggers into precious areas like French Creek north of McCall.

The Forest Service proposes salvage logging of 3,272 acres in the French Creek valley, mostly by helicopter. Much of the area was burned by 1994's Corral and Blackwell fires.

The agency estimates it could sell 17.3 million board-foot of timber, worth more than \$5 million. Environmentalists claim the figures are exaggerated because they are based on unreliable aerial analysis. But the new legislation removes sal-

vage timber sales from legal challenge.

The 170,000-acre French Creek roadless area is among several areas that have been under consideration in the past for protection as wilderness. "Decades of work have suddenly dissolved underneath us because of the rescission bill," Craig Gehrke of the Wilderness Society said. "I don't think we have a chance in hell of stopping those salvage sales."

The salvage rider was passed after the timber industry and members of the new Republican Congress argued environmentalists were using appeals to slow down salvage sales

until the decaying timber no longer was usable for lumber.

"There's no doubt in our minds that without the rescission bill, there would have been as much appealing and delay as possible," said Ron Hamilton, resource branch chief for the Payette National Forest. "The bill could accelerate the sale."

"I don't believe we're changing the roadless character of the area, even though we are removing some trees," Hamilton said.

The Forest Service has for many years proposed timber sales in French Creek. But they were halted for over a decade until the area was essentially reopened to logging last year.

# Boise drug trial hits snag

BOISE (AP) — Without use of a confession, Ada County prosecutors could face a tough trial Dec. 11 to convict a Boise couple accused of intending to make methamphetamine.

The evidence includes a bottle of Pepsi and a child's chemistry kit.

And now it looks like prosecutors might not be able to rely on a confession allegedly made after the June 29 bust.

On Wednesday, Kathy Diane Ferguson, 46, and David George Ferguson Sr., 45, pleaded innocent to the drug charge. Their trial was set for Dec. 11.

# Psychiatrist to view woman facing charge

Video stores highlight movies for children

Tale Tale: The Unbelievable Adventure of Pecos Bill (PG) - If a good children's film is supposed to open the eyes of its viewers, this is a Disney production that does just that.

Most of the poetry comes from the cinematographer, Janusz Kaminski, who shot "Schindler's List." Along with director Jeremiah Chechik and production designer Eugenio Zanetti, Kaminski brings out the rich colorations in the turn-of-the-century Old West.

Twelve-year-old Daniel Hackett (Neil Patrick Harris) has a special bond with his father Jones (Stephen Lang), who can't understand why his son isn't enamored with the farm life.

Helped by three tall-tale heroes, Pecos Bill (Patrick Swayze), John Henry (Roger Aaron Brown) and Paul Bunyan (Oliver Platt), Daniel goes up against the baron and his minions.

"Heavyweights" (PG) - Firm, round and fully packed, the bus to Camp Hope - the combination paradise/purgatory of "Heavyweights" - feigns a rift to McDonald's, barely resisting the allure of a chicken salad and a rights dangerously close to a few doughnuts before getting back on the straight and narrow.

What is it in "Heavyweights," the first feature from director Steven Brill (who wrote the two "Mighty Ducks" movies), it's the idea that a bunch of good-natured, overweight preadolescents might get together for a summer of fun and commiseration - and then be subjected to an obsessive health guru who wants to make their vacation his infomercial.

The kids have a weight problem, not a neurological disorder, but Brill can't resist garnishing his film with profanity that have a circus-freak quality: Gerry (Aaron Schwartz), for instance, picks up a field in the film's opening moments that he appears to have both aplastic anemia and Epstein-Barr syndrome.

**Former generals launch political movement to combat Yeltsin**

MOSCOW (AP) — Top generals and military officials, including many who plotted against Mikhail Gorbachev and led the armed resistance to Boris Yeltsin, announced a movement Thursday to back anti-Yeltsin parliamentary candidates.

The All-Russian Officers' Assembly has not decided if it will field candidates of its own. But with two generals already in the race for the Dec. 17 elections, the military is emerging as an influential factor in the vote, appealing to Russians eager for law and order and a return

the Communist Party, the Communists' Agrarian allies, ultra-nationalist Vladimir Zhirinovskiy, and a new bloc led by Lt. Gen. Alexander Lebed.

Lebed gained great popularity after putting down a rebellion in the Trans-Dniester region of Moldova. "The army is an instrument of politics, so it should take part in the fate of our country," said Gen. Valentin Varennikov, chairman of the newly founded assembly.

Varennikov was deputy defense minister and commander of Soviet ground forces in August 1991, when several top Soviet leaders tried to oust Gorbachev and stop

reforms. After the putsch failed, Varennikov spent 14 months in jail.

Other leaders of the movement are ex-Soviet Defense Minister Dmitry Yazov, one of the main coup plotters, and Col. Viktor Alksnis, who backed the bloody Soviet crackdown in the Baltics in 1991.

Col. Stanislav Terekhov, whose Officer's Union helped lead the armed resistance to Yeltsin in October 1993 at the Russian White House, also supports the new coalition.

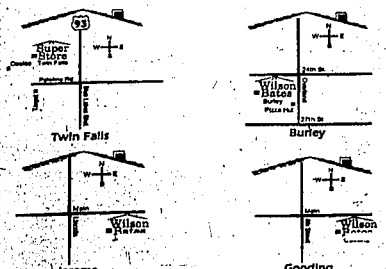

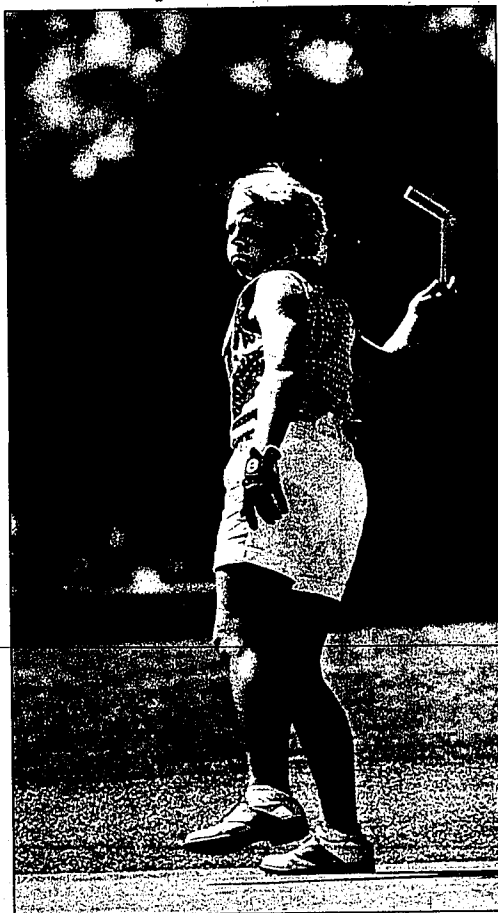

## BSU assistant to carry on Dye style

### Longtime Bronco basketball coach retires; Jensen steps up to top position

BOISE — Bobby Dye retired on Thursday after 12 years as Boise State University's head basketball coach. Rod Jensen, an assistant to Dye for all 12 years, was named to succeed him.

Dye did not attend the news conference where Boise State athletic director Gene Bleyemier announced the retirement. Sports information director Max Corbet said Dye was at home but would not take any calls or answer questions until Friday to ensure the spotlight stayed on Jensen.

Bleyemier said no specific incident led to Dye's decision to step down now, and that retirement was something the coach had been talking about for several years.

Jensen said he would call players Thursday night to tell them about Dye's retirement, and that assistant coaches George Barrios and Ernie Wheeler — who Bleyemier said also were considered as Dye's successor — would be staying on with the Broncos.

Jensen, who helped develop the relentless defense that was the hallmark of Dye's Boise State teams, said he expected few changes.

"I think our style will be a lot alike. We might be a little more up-tempo if there is any change at all," he said. "We will push the ball up the floor a little harder."

Dye, 58, was the winningest basketball coach in Boise State and Big-Sky Conference history.

He retired with a record of 373-221 overall in 21 years as a head coach, including 213-133 for Boise State and 101-78 in Big Sky play.

He led the Broncos to three Big Sky tournament championships in 1988, 1993 and 1994, two regular-season league titles in 1988 and 1989, and three NCAA tournament appearances in 1988, 1993 and 1994. Boise State also made three NCAA postseason tournament trips under Dye in 1987, 1989 and 1991, and one NIT preseason appearance in 1991.

field. He also was head coach for seven seasons at Cal State-Fullerton, where he led the 1977-78 team to the final eight of the NCAA tournament.

Previously, Dye was head coach at Santa Monica Junior College, an assistant at Cerritos Junior College and head coach at Saint John Bosco High School in California.

Jensen, 41, a 1975 graduate of the University of the Redlands in California, came to Boise State with Dye as an assistant in 1983.

He began his coaching career as an assistant at Redlands, became an assistant at Rubideaux High School in Riverside, Calif., and then head coach at Cajon High School in San Bernardino, Calif.

Jensen returned to Redlands as an assistant in 1980 and was an assistant at Penn State during the 1982-83 season before becoming a Boise State assistant and helping Dye lead the Broncos through their NCAA tournament years.

"To get a chance to take your own team there is a dream come true," he said. "I'm really, really excited and look forward to good things in the future."

Bleyemier said Boise State would propose a \$63,000 base salary for Jensen, who will have a one-year contract as required by the state Board of Education for first-year coaches.

## Sacramento needs changes to join Big Sky Conference

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — The Sacramento State football program will have to dramatically increase its scholarships to compete in the Big Sky Conference, according to a league committee evaluating the school for membership.

The Big Sky delegation is touring Sacramento State and California State University at Northridge this week and expects to decide soon whether to offer membership to the two big-market schools.

"Things look very promising," said Mark Drummond, president of Eastern Washington University and also conference chairman.

The Big Sky, which competes in Division I-A in most sports and Division I-AA in football, requires its members to offer 63 football scholarships.

Sacramento State currently provides 20 scholarships. School officials say it will cost about \$300,000 to offer the 63 schol-

arships, and they will likely propose a gradual phase-in period for the higher number, Athletic Director Lee McElroy said.

"We're on a fast track," McElroy said. "We're very positive."

Sacramento State is a commuter school whose sports teams draw few fans and little attention. But school officials hope that affiliating with an established conference will benefit the sports programs.

Students earlier this year voted to assess themselves higher fees to provide \$2 million in stable funding for sports.

The Big Sky Conference includes mostly small-market teams: Montana, Montana State, Idaho State, Eastern Washington, Weber State and Northern Arizona. Idaho and Boise State are leaving the conference next year, but Portland State is joining.

The Big Sky rejected Sacramento State's bid to join in 1992, because of inadequate facilities and funding.

## Boycott this and all other Tyson fight plans

BLOXI, Miss. — Saturday's Mike Tyson-Peter McNeeley fight is projected to be the biggest selling pay-per-view event in history. Despite a hefty \$49.95 charge, orders have been pouring into cable operators all over the country.

For those who have been too busy watching the O.J. Simpson trial to have noticed, the fight will be Tyson's first since his arrest and subsequent conviction on rape charges in 1991.

Boxing fans can hardly wait. But I won't be plunking down 50 bucks to watch Tyson. Not now. Not ever. I won't argue the point that Tyson is a great talent and that he will energize the heavy weight division like no other fighter could.

Still, I can't stomach putting money, via my pay-per-view fee, into the pockets of this particular convicted rapist.

A few weeks ago, Sports Illustrated put Tyson on its cover with a story that asked "Should we root for Mike Tyson?" The story didn't really answer the

question, although it did note that even the man who prosecuted Tyson said he had no ill feelings toward the fallen star. Tyson had paid his debt to society, he said, and should be permitted to resume a normal life, which in Tyson's case, means making millions of dollars for beating up people.

Well, I didn't need Sports Illustrated to tell me how I should feel when it comes to Tyson. Granted, Tyson was punished for his crime. But ask anyone in the judicial system why offenders are sent to prison and they will tell you there are two reasons: The first is punishment. The second is rehabilitation. Since most offenders will someday leave prison, it is imperative that the prisoner have a change of heart so that he no longer represents a danger to society.

While I doubt that Tyson will rape again, he has shown no remorse for his actions. On the contrary, in the days since he was released from prison, Tyson

has on more than one occasion treated questions about his convictions as if they were a joke.

Punished, yet unrepentant, Tyson exudes an attitude that trivializes violence against women, a crime that has become an epidemic in American society.

In a sense, Tyson has indeed become a repeat offender. An Indiana jury ruled that he raped Desiree Washington once in that Indianapolis hotel room. Figuratively, he rapes again each time he jokes about his crime.

To say the least, Tyson is not one of the great thinkers of our time. But ignorance is a poor excuse for monstrous behavior, especially when his actions and attitudes are closely watched by millions of kids. What is the message that Tyson is sending to those kids by his conduct? Tyson had a chance to send a powerful, positive message to his admiring fans. Instead, he sent the subtle message that, hey, boys will be boys. No big deal.

Tyson, meanwhile, is a bigger star than ever before. He'll make more money.

# Pinch homer lifts Royals past O's

BALTIMORE (AP) — Once he figured out where to go, Gregg Olson showed the Baltimore Orioles that his right elbow is doing just fine.

Olson threw 2 1-3 innings of scoreless relief and pinch-hitter Gary Gaetti led off the 10th inning with a home run, giving the Kansas City Royals a 3-2 victory Thursday.

Olson spent five full seasons with the Orioles before they released him after the 1993 season, convinced his ailing right elbow had rendered him ineffective. The right-hander played briefly with Atlanta last year and had a brief tryout with Baltimore during spring training before opting to sign with Cleveland.

The Royals signed him on July 24. Olson returned to Baltimore on Thursday for the first time in two years. This time, though, he wore a gray road uniform.

"I almost walked into the wrong clubhouse and I almost walked into the wrong bullpen," he said. "It really wouldn't have crushed me if I didn't throw today — it was just nice coming back."

On Tuesday in Oakland, Olson registered his first save since 1994, then topped that Thursday with his first victory since being traded to the Yankees as an Oriole on June 22, 1992.

"It was just weird facing these guys," Olson said. "Facing (Chris) Hojjes and Brady (Anderson) — guys I played with for five years. I saw them about a thousand times each, and I step on the hill and there they are."

Olson short-circuited a Baltimore rally in the seventh, then held the Orioles scoreless through the ninth. That set up Gaetti's game-winner.

Batting for Mike Tucker, Gaetti hit a 2-1 pitch from Jesse Orosco (2-3) into the left-field seats for his 26th homer, sending the Orioles to their 14th loss in 18 games.

Jeff Montgomery worked the 10th for his 21st save.

Baltimore gave up two early unearned runs after Bobby Bonilla dropped a fly ball, stranded 11 runners and went 0-for-11 with runners in scoring position.

Bonilla had three hits for Baltimore, which fell nine games under .500 for the first time since June 24, Mike Mussina, bidding for his 14th victory, gave up two unearned runs in eight innings. He allowed six hits, no walks and struck out three.

"He can't pitch any better than he did today," Orioles manager Phil Reagans said.

"We're not playing very well. We're stuck in a pretty bad slide, and when it's my turn I just try to do the best I can," Mussina said.

Making only his second start and eighth appearance of his career, McAndrew (1-2) allowed two runs on seven hits struck out four and walked one.

# Coleman gives Seattle offense needed punch

MINNEAPOLIS — One inning provided a glimpse of how different and perhaps how much better this Seattle Mariner team can be.

A five-run eighth inning gave the Mariners a 6-1 comeback victory over Minnesota. Wednesday night's win was a dramatic turnaround from a 7-6 loss Tuesday when the Twins rallied with a five-run ninth.

Reliever Bobby Ayala, who gave up Kirby Puckett's three-run, game-winning homer Tuesday, picked up his 19th save Wednesday night with a two-inning, 19-pitch effort.

That was Ayala's personal redemption, but newly acquired Vince Coleman gave this team a rebirth.

Coleman is the long-needed elixir of excitement, a player who changes the Mariner offense so effectively that opponents must change as well.

The eighth inning was a splendid example of how and why.

Coleman opened the inning taking three straight balls from starter Frank Tompa. He then struck out two Mariners through seven and had a 4-1 lead. Coleman then took two strikes before lining a single to center.

"We need a guy like that who does so much when he's on base. He just comes out and scores on Reggie Sanders," said Ken Griffey Jr., who batted second behind Coleman.

Newly summoned reliever Scott Watkins was so distracted that not only did Coleman steal, but Griffey walked on four pitches. Watkins was pulled.

The next batter, Edgar Martinez faced reliever Pat Mahomes. "All the pitches to me were fastballs. All (six) of them," said Martinez, who launched a two-run double, scoring both speedy runners easily.

"It's an advantage for any team to have a guy like him (Coleman)," he said. "He'll steal. He's smart. He's a veteran player. He's a great addition."

What Coleman had started, continued as Jay Buhner walked. Then with one out, Doug Strange hit a two-run triple over center fielder Rich Becker for a 5-1 lead.

"He's (Coleman) going to help the first two hitters once he gets on base," Strange said. "By the time I get up, he either has scored or is on third."

Tino Martinez, who missed two games with strep throat, hit a pinch-hit single to right, scoring Strange. Weak and tired, Martinez had slept on the trainer's room table for the first six innings. "I had no idea how they (Twins) got their first three runs. I just got drenched to see if they needed me to pitch hit."

He walked down the tunnel just in time to see the Coleman effect.

"He starts the whole thing," Tino said. "I used to hate playing against him just for that reason."

Twins Manager Tom Kelly used six pitchers in a span of 11 hitters over the eighth and ninth. None was particularly effective.

Coleman, who was traded from Kansas City for a minor-league player to be named later, said what he does "filters down the lineup."

"When I'm on base, the pitcher has a hard time concentrating on me, then he has to face Ken Griffey up there. That's a lot of pressure," Coleman said. "Then it just filters down to Edgar, Tino, (Mike) Blowers, (Jay) Buhner."

Coleman said he was relieved to end up in Seattle. Not only are the Mariners committed to the wild-card race, but he loves the lineup.

"I've been on World Series teams and other good teams," he said, "but I've never been on a more dangerous team. I wish I had been here from the beginning. I'd have 100 runs scored by now because these guys are tremendous hitters."

"It's like a kid again, just happy to be on base. And I feel that once I'm on first, I don't have a fight to get to second."

Coleman also scored the club's first run in the third. He reached on a fielder's choice, his speed beating the double play. "Edgar, Edgar, Edgar," Tino's double brought him home.

"What you're going to see with him here is a much better on-base percentage for us," Manager Lou Piniella said.

# Unmitigated gall gets Braves through in the clutch

ATLANTA — Chipper Jones has a simple answer for the Atlanta Braves constant late-inning heroics: Basic Training.

"When you're in the minors with this team, you'd get back to your apartment after the game and turn on the Braves game, catch the last few innings," said Jones, the rookie No. 3 hitter. "You'd see somebody like Ron Gant or Terry Pendleton do this and it was like, 'Hey, this is what we're supposed to do.'"

Simple as that. Be a Brave and show no fear. Step up to the plate in the final at-bat and win the game. The Braves have done it a major league leading 21 times this season, including Sunday against Colorado and again Monday against the Marlins. That's nearly a third of Atlanta's 64 wins.

The unearned part is that the Braves are second to last in the majors in hitting at .247, ahead of only St. Louis. So how is it that a team that doesn't produce on a regular basis is so good in the clutch? Haven't these guys ever heard of nerves? Failure? How about reality? These are the types of situations that have made mortals of the likes of Darryl Strawberry and Wade Boggs.

None of that effects this team because the Braves have more of one thing than any team in baseball. Pitching? Sure, but that's too basic. Their starting rotation puts them in position to win a lot of games this way. The opponent has been held to less than four runs in 18 of the 21 dramatic wins. But Greg Maddux and Co. aren't swinging the sticks at the end.

This team has unparalleled gall. Chutzpah. Arrogance. Whatever you want to call it. Just realize that Jones' demeanor captures the essence of it. Listen a while and it screams out the way high school kids clamor for attention.

"When you've played this game as long as we have, you've seen every situation so many times that you don't worry about failing," Jones said.

Have you seen Dave Justice follow the Marlins with a two-run homer Monday in the bottom of the eighth, that statement might slip by unnoticed. Little more than baseball jargon.

But Jones is 23 and looks like a tall version of one of the babyboos. You feel like asking him for ID to make sure the Braves haven't violated any child labor laws.

Jones, a rookie who didn't play at all in 1994 because of knee injury, can walk the walk and talk the talk. So can most of the Braves' young players, backing up what Jones was saying about that basic training for Bravedom.

Jones, fellow rookie reserve Mike Mordecai, second-year catcher Javier Lopez and outfielder Ryan Klesko, who is in only his second season of playing regularly, have combined for nine of the last at-bat winners.

# Els hopes to hold early lead this time

CASTLE ROCK, Colo. (AP) — Still reeling from his final-round flamboyant in the PGA championship last week, Ernie Els seemed determined to build a lead even he couldn't squander.

But Greg Norman wouldn't let him get away, whittling Els' lead to 3 points with a dramatic eagle on the last hole.

Els earned nine birdies, including four in a row, in a nearly flawless performance that carried him to the first-round lead Thursday in the International.

Els scored 17 points under the modified Stableford scoring system used in this unusual event. Among the early finishers, it gave him a 6-point lead — which would have been the largest first-round advantage in the tournament's 10-year history.

The Shark, however, was lurking just offshore. Playing in one of the day's final groups, Norman hit a 7-iron from 185 yards on the par-4 18th hole that bounced once and disappeared into the cup. The eagle was worth 5 points and vaulted Norman to 14 points.

Els might have needed his bigger advantage. He blew a three-stroke lead in the PGA on Sunday.

"He also was the leader midway through the final round of last year's International before taking a double bogey at No. 10, succumbing to winner Steve Lowery's closing charge.

Asked if there was such a thing as a safe lead in this tournament, Els ducked the question. "I don't even want to think about that," he said. "I just want to keep playing solid and keep making birdies."

Norman, the PGA Tour's leading money-winner, said he "just hit a perfect shot and Tony (caddy Tony Navarro) called it in the air — going along great. That shot just put the icing on the cake, made my day that much sweeter."

Grouped at plus-11 were Tom Kite, Davis Love III and Craig Stadler. At 10 were David Dowell, Bob Tway and Lee Janzen. Defending champion Lowery struggled to a minus-1.

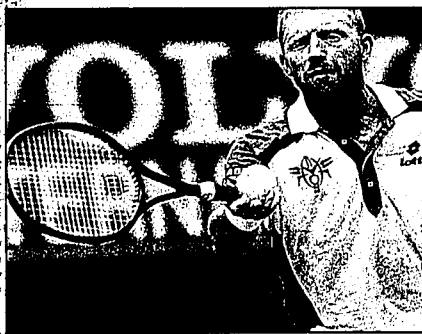
Tway and Janzen also benefited from eagles, worth 5 points under a scoring system that awards a player 2 points for birdie, zero for par, minus-1 for bogey and minus-3 for double bogey or worse. Scores are cumulative through all four rounds.

Play was suspended for 32 minutes at mid-afternoon because of lightning.

Els, whose round equated to an 8-under-par 64, started on the 10th hole and birdied Nos. 11 through 14. He birdied the par-5 17th, hitting his second shot into a greenside bunker but blasting to 3 feet and making the putt, and duplicated that feat at the par-5 first, blasting to 2 feet.

After two more birdies at the fourth and seventh holes, he nearly holied an eagle putt on the par-5 eighth to get to plus-18. He slipped back to 17 with a bogey at No. 9 after missing the green.

"I got off to a nice start, and I gave myself a lot of chances," said the 25-year-old native of South Africa, who won last year's U.S. Open and this year's Byron Nelson Classic. "The greens were perfect this morning. The greens are solid and keep making birdies we've played on all year, I think."

# Another contender falls while Seles takes day off

TORONTO (AP) — As Monica Seles took a day off Thursday, her task at the Canadian Open, already eased by the first-round loss of No. 1 Steffi Graf, became even less demanding when No. 3 Arantxa Sanchez Vicario was upset by Helena Sukova, 7-5, 6-4.

Sanchez Vicario, the tournament's defending champion who played both singles and doubles matches the night before, was unable to make the quick night-day turnaround that Seles handled easily a day earlier.

"Sukova said the timing should have been no big deal for Sanchez Vicario. 'She's used to that,' Sukova said. 'She's played so many tournaments.'"

"I finished late, but it was not that," Sanchez Vicario said. "I didn't play well enough to win the match. I made too many errors. When you don't play well, it's difficult to win."

"It was not such a big surprise to me," Sukova said. "I knew I was capable of beating her. I finally played better than I played before."

A year ago, Sanchez Vicario used a victory in the Canadian Open as the springboard to the U.S. Open crown. Now her elimination seemed to simplify Seles' road to the final. Gabriela Sabatini, a 6-1, 6-0 winner over Yona Komic on Thursday, is the highest remaining seed in Seles' half of the draw at No. 6.

Later, No. 4 Jana Novotna advanced to the quarterfinals with a 6-3, 6-4 victory over No. 15 Judith Wiesner.

The victory moved Novotna past \$5 million in career winnings, the 25th player to reach that plateau in women's tennis. She next plays No. 8 Iva Majoli, a 6-0, 6-2 winner over No. 10 Amy Frazier.



# Court says no to Joe

## Newspaper can sell posters of ex-49er star

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Joe Montana was turned down by the state Supreme Court on Thursday in his challenge to a newspaper's right to sell posters showing him in the Super Bowl.

The court left intact an appellate ruling that said the San Francisco Chronicle had a right to use the football star's photo without his permission, both because the event was newsworthy and because the newspaper was advertising the quality of its coverage.

"A newspaper has a constitutional right to promote itself by reproducing its news stories," the 6th District Court of Appeal in San Jose ruled May 3. The ruling became binding on trial courts statewide when the state's high court denied review of the case.

Only Chief Justice Malcolm Lucas voted for a hearing on Montana's appeal, with four votes needed for review by the seven-member court.

Montana's lawyers were unable to file comment, their offices said. They could ask the U.S. Supreme Court to review the case.

Judith Alexander, a lawyer for the Mercury News, said the ruling was important for newspapers.

"Newspapers need to be able to promote themselves by illustrating their quality and content," she said. "The Mercury News regularly does posters as a form of promotion."

# Bengals lose Carter in falling to Lions

PONTIAC, Mich. (AP) - The Cincinnati Bengals lost prized rookie Ki-Jana Carter on his first possession and lost the game soon after.

Scott Mitchell guided the Lions to scores the first three times they had the ball and undefeated Detroit rolled to a 20-13 exhibition victory Thursday night.

Carter, who sustained a left Achilles tendon strain during training camp, made his NFL debut against the Lions (3-0). But the No. 1 draft pick out of Penn State was tackled high by Robert Porcher on his third carry and went down with a twisted left knee.

Carter, who had zero yards on three rushes, was on the sidelines in street clothes during the second half. An announcement in the press box indicated Carter would be back for the final exhibition when the Bengals (1-2) play host to the New York Jets next Friday night.

Mitchell threw a 20-yard touchdown pass to Johnnie Morton in the first quarter and a 13-yard scoring pass to Herman Moore in the second.

Mitchell, who missed the second half of the 1994 season with a broken thumb, completed 13 of 20 passes for 208 yards. Moore made five

catches for 106 yards. Jeff Blake, quarterbacking the entire first half, guided the Bengals 48 yards in 11 plays as they took a 3-0 lead on Doug Pelfrey's 43-yard field goal. Blake connected on 13 of 16 passes for 110 yards before giving way to David Klingler.

The Lions tied it 3-3 on Jason Hanson's 45-yard field goal. Two plays later, Eric Bienenmy, subbing for Carter, lost a fumble on the Bengals 13.

Mitchell found Morton open behind Adrian Hardy for the TD and a 10-3 lead with 3:28 left in the first quarter.

On the Lions' next possession, Mitchell hit on 6 of 8 passes for 72 yards in a 24-yard, 11-play scoring drive. On the touchdown, cornerback Roger Jones bit on Mitchell's pump fake, leaving Moore wide open in the end zone for a 17-3 lead.

**Eagles 31, Patriots 7**  
PHILADELPHIA - A good night for Boston College football turned into a bad night for Boston's top football team.

Kevin Martin returned a punt 83 yards for a touchdown, seven other former BC Eagles lifted Philadelphia's

Eagles to a 31-7 victory over the New England Patriots Thursday night in NFL exhibition football.

Mike Mamula, the former BC star whom the Eagles took with the seventh pick in the draft, and Bill Romanowski, BC class of 1987, keyed a Philadelphia defense that scored a touchdown on a fumble recovery and limited the Patriots to one touch-down.

Randall Cunningham, who played into the third quarter, was named offensive running the Eagles' new "West Coast" offense, despite completing only seven of 20 passes for 104 yards and a touch-down.

Drew Bledsoe left the game after New England's first series, but returned and played over the fourth quarter, finishing 16-for-32 for 161 yards and a touch-down.

Each team moved down the field quickly on a touchdown drive in the first half. The difference in the half was that the Eagles (3-0) also returned a punt for a touchdown and added a 36-yard field goal by Gary Anderson.

# 49ers' No. 1 pick latest teammate to fall to injury

The rest of the NFL may be catching up with San Francisco - or it will if the 49ers keep getting hurt.

For the second straight day, the Super Bowl champions had a key player get hurt, this time first-round draft choice J.J. Stokes, who broke a bone in his right hand during practice in Rocklin, Calif. He's expected to miss up to six weeks.

That followed Wednesday's practice in which fullback William Floyd sprained ligaments in his right knee. Floyd is expected to miss three weeks, including the regular-season opener in New Orleans.

Stokes, UCLA's all-time leading receiver, was expected to see a lot of duty as the third wide receiver behind Jerry Rice and John Taylor.

### NFL camps

Coach George Seifert said Stokes broke the fourth metacarpal bone in his hand in a non-contact drill when he lost his balance running a pass route, but his hand behind him and hit the ground.

Stokes led Rocklin to consult with a hand specialist in the San Francisco Bay area. Seifert said Dr. Gordon Brody determined the injured hand would be placed in a cast for at least four weeks and that he could resume playing in five or six weeks. That timetable would allow Stokes to return for either the fourth or fifth game of the season.

Center Burt Oates (ankle) and guard Derrick Desse (elbow) return

to duty for Saturday night's exhibition against Carolina but tackle Harris Barton (calf bruise) and Steve Wallace (knee) remain sidelined.

### Browns-Falcons

Andre Rison took on his old team, the Atlanta Falcons, as he prepared to fly to Atlanta for an exhibition with his new team, the Cleveland Browns.

Asked to list his biggest accomplishment in Atlanta, Rison said: "I was making it out of there. People were throwing knives at me for no reason. The only way I could shield myself in a positive way was to turn my head, walk away and go to a better situation."

The Falcons let Rison go, never making him a contract offer and he signed a five-year, \$17 million deal with the Browns. "It's a lot different here than it was in Atlanta. Down there, we didn't

know if we could win and some of us didn't want to win," he said.

### Cowboys

Coach Barry Switzer drew cheers after telling his team to take the rest of the day off.

Switzer cut the only practice session of the day 30 minutes short Wednesday. The players, already excited to have completed their first two-day practices Tuesday, raised their arms and cheered after Switzer called the team to the middle of the practice field and excused them. "We have been working pretty darn hard," defensive coordinator Dave Campo said. "Every once in a while it's probably good to throw these guys a bone."

### Cardinals

After being warned about contaminated water, coach Buddy Ryan made a

decision to break camp a day early.

The Cardinals were scheduled for an afternoon walk-through, one more night in the Northern Arizona University dormitories, and a practice Friday morning. Instead, Ryan held a team meeting and sent the players and staff from the training camp in Flagstaff to team headquarters in Tempe.

Flagstaff utilities director Ron Doba said residents began complaining early Thursday about discolored household water.

An initial investigation could not determine the cause, and he said flushing out hydrants failed to clear the lines.

"The university, where the Cardinals train each year to escape the heat of the low desert, is on the same water system. "We felt like we've accomplished everything, so let's go down the hill and start working down there," team scouting director Keith Kidd said.

# Ex-Cowboy great rides herd on Ducks

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) - Oregon head football coach Mike Bellotti was trying to make a joke.

The new defensive coordinator, he said, had taken to the team "like a duck to water."

Partially bald mans notwithstanding, former NFL all-pro Charlie Waters was a big hit with the players since he took over Oregon's "Gang Green" defense last spring.

"I can't imagine playing for anybody else," linebacker Rich Ruhl said. "He's just a great guy. I just like how he's so straightforward with people. He doesn't beat around the bush."

Less than a year ago, Waters was feeling the heat in the last of his seven seasons as a Denver Broncos assistant. He was defensive coordinator, and the Broncos finished last in the NFL in total defense and passing defense en route to a 7-9 season.

Waters knew he would be looking for work. The only question was whether he'd try to stay in coaching.

"A couple of Charlie's friends in the pro game had suggested that he look at college football, just as another avenue, that because of his temperament and personality, he might enjoy the college football deal," Bellotti said.

"It's refreshing," he said as the Ducks began their fall training camp. "The enthusiasm is genuine. I'm not saying the NFL is not that way, but everybody, from the non-scholarship guys to the stars, they all have the same type of enthusiasm and that's really healthy."

"It's contagious. It's fun. They listen. They're open-minded about stuff."

Seven starters and several key reserves are back from the defense that anchored the Ducks' surprising Rose Bowl team last year. But they were without a coach after last season.

Head coach Rich Brooks took defensive coordinator Nick Allotti with him to the NFL's St. Louis Rams. Bellotti moved up from offensive coordinator and his top priority was finding someone to run the defense.

Waters heard about the opening and contacted Bellotti.

"He turned down some other jobs outside of football to take this job at half the pay to stay in football and to continue to enhance his reputation as a coach," Bellotti

said. "A great deal of our success is predicated on our defense."

"I'm not a defensive coach. I think I understand defense, but I'm not going to go out and coach it. I need somebody who can continue to bring me years and years plus enhance and be creative with it."

Bellotti knew about Waters' credentials as a player: five Super Bowls, two Super Bowl championships, three Pro Bowls, three all-pro selections. He still holds the NFL playoff record for interceptions with nine and is third in interceptions in his regular career.

But hiring Waters wasn't automatic, Bellotti said. A check of credentials and references convinced him that Waters was more than just a great former player.

And after a few days, the players decided they liked him, defensive end Troy Bailey said.

"If they had to bring anybody in, I'm glad it's him," Bailey said. "He's done so well for himself in the NFL. Just by seeing old high-line film, it's real exciting to be able to play for a guy like that. And then there's his quiet fire. You look in his eyes and you know he's ready to go."

Waters admits he's far from the stereotypical screaming, berating college coach. "I know what it's like to be a player," he said. "I'm serious. I expect a lot out of them, but I'm going to treat them like a friend, treat them with respect and try to get them to touch on their potential."

"You don't always have to browbeat them to do that. I don't believe in that. There's a time and place to be tough with them and I will. But I feel comfortable with the kids. They're fun."

The only thing he misses about the NFL is the ability to concentrate on football all the time. He's learning how to deal with off-the-field demands, such as recruiting and fund raising.

Waters said he was pleasantly surprised by the talent level at Oregon. Some of the players are already NFL caliber, he said. Mosty though, he likes the Gang Green attitude.

"Collectively, they play great because they play so well together," Waters said. "They mesh as much as that's the epitome of a team."

# Saints won't face rape charge of nude dancer

At least six New Orleans Saints players had sex with a dancer who claimed she was raped at their Wisconsin training camp dormitory, but there is not enough evidence to pursue rape charges, prosecutors said Thursday.

La Crosse County assistant district attorney Ron Kind closed his investigation into the alleged assault, saying the woman and her story were not credible.

Kind said the players' accounts of what happened were consistent, but the woman gave differing statements as to how many people she had consensual sex with. Witnesses also gave inconsistent accounts, he said.

"I believe that the credibility of the woman who reported the assaults would be insufficient to convince a jury beyond a reasonable doubt that the sexual contact she had with numerous players was not consensual," Kind said.

The woman, a 38-year-old nude dancer at Buns & Roses, a downtown Minneapolis club, said she met some players after their first exhibition game Aug. 6 and was invited to a party at the dormitory at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse, where the Saints hold training camp.

She said she agreed to have sex with one player, but then was raped, sodomized and forced to have oral sex with different players.

An investigative summary released by the district attorney's office said more than 30 players were interviewed, 10 to 11 of whom admitted

hearing, seeing or being involved in the incident. Of those, at least four admitted having consensual sex with the woman, Kind said.

Saints executive vice president Jim Miller, in a prepared statement, said the club found that team rules were broken and that penalties would be imposed. The Saints refused to identify the players or the penalties.

The woman is represented by Minneapolis lawyer Lori Peterson, who recently settled a sexual harassment case against the Minnesota Vikings and quarterback Warren Moon.

A civil suit is planned, she said. "If the criminal system doesn't have the courage to challenge the ballplayers, we are confident a jury in civil court will recognize the boys will be boys' mentality at work here and properly punish predators who take advantage of victims," she said in a prepared statement.

"We think we've got a dynamic civil case," Peterson said in an interview, claiming the investigative reports showed the players "repeatedly lied and tried to hide the evidence."

"Our client said the same thing throughout," she said.

The woman, who has not been identified, told the Star Tribune of Minneapolis in an interview published Thursday that she thought her profession would make it hard for authorities to believe her story.

Crying and shaking during the interview, she told the newspaper, "If I'm guilty of bad judgment - and I don't believe I was - does it mean the sentence is rape and police believe? I don't think the police believe what happened to me. You know, they always come down on you, this backlash of 'What were you doing there in the first place?'"

She gave the newspaper reports from St. Francis Medical Center in La Crosse, describing marks which doctors and nurses said could indicate that she was held against her will.

The records also showed that she "was extremely tender and sore" during and after vaginal examinations and did not appear intoxicated, the newspaper said. A nurse reported that

stains on the back of the woman's shirt and said she was continually crying, the record showed.

Officials admitted that after they learned she was a nude dancer, they asked her if she was a prostitute. Kind said her job as a dancer did not influence the investigation, however.

"No one admitted to exchanging money during the incident or that the woman had asked for money," Kind said.

At least two other women attended the party at which the alleged rapes took place, according to the New Orleans Times-Picayune.

Cori Papiemik, 21, said she briefly attended the get-together in the dormitory. As she was leaving, she said she heard a woman banging on a window. She was "yelling at these guys to let her out," said Papiemik, who said she notified a man at the front door of the dormitory and minutes later hailed a passing police car.

The other woman, who was identified only as Papiemik's aunt, said the woman "was not crying. ... She was not going. I got raped."

# China conducts 2nd nuclear test of year, sets off new wave of criticism

**BELING (AP)** — Defying international criticism, China detonated its fourth underground nuclear test in 14 months Thursday in a drive to modernize its strategic defenses.

China's Foreign Ministry insisted the test was not a threat to any other nation, but criticism immediately poured in from Asian and European governments. Japan renewed a threat to cut financial aid.

In Washington, the White House said it "deeply regrets" the nuclear test and urged China "to join in a global moratorium as we work to complete and sign" a Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty by next year.

"It will be harder to get a test ban agreement if such tests continue," said Ginny Terzano, a spokeswoman for President Clinton.

In Geneva, countries negotiating the test ban treaty reacted strongly.

The test "is all the more disconcerting coming as it does at a time when the negotiations... are clearly entering their final phase," Thomas

Russell of Ireland told the 38-nation Conference on Disarmament.

"It poisons the atmosphere" for the talks, said Australia's ambas-

sador, Richard Starr. "It undermines the confidence of non-nuclear states in the intentions of the nuclear states."

The conference, which aims to curb or eliminate the world's deadliest weapons, is trying to finish the test ban treaty by 1996.

China responded by saying it has a small nuclear arsenal, has historically conducted fewer tests than other nuclear powers and has pledged not to be first to use a nuclear weapon.

But this was unlikely to reassure China's neighbors, already rattled by its growing military assertiveness.

In recent months, China has test-launched an intercontinental ballistic missile and expanded its presence in the Spratly Islands, a contested South China Sea archipelago.

It also is conducting a second round of missile tests in the sea north of Taiwan, hoping to squelch growing pro-independence sentiment on the island. China regards the island as a renegade province.

Fears that Western countries might come to Taiwan's aid in a military conflict with the mainland are one factor in China's determination to upgrade its arsenal.

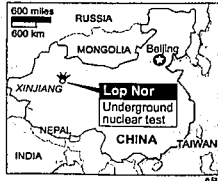
The official Xinhua News Agency announced Thursday's nuclear test in a two-sentence dispatch, but gave no information about the size or location of the explosion.

Seismologists said it occurred at China's remote desert testing site of Lop Nor, 1,500 miles west of Beijing. Estimates of the bomb's size ranged from 20 to 200 kilotons.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Chen Jian said China supports efforts to put a worldwide comprehensive test ban treaty in place in 1996, and will stop tests then.

"China stands for the complete prohibition and thorough destruction of nuclear weapons," Chen said. "Its possession of a small number of nuclear weapons is solely for the purpose of self-defense and poses no threat to any other country."

Western military analysts expect China to detonate three more tests before the end of 1996, as part of a program to create lighter, more powerful warheads. They estimate China's nuclear



arsenal at 450 warheads.

Chen urged the world's other declared nuclear powers — Britain, France, Russia and the United States — to join in pledging not to be the first to use nuclear weapons.

Those four nations have observed a nuclear test moratorium since 1992, but France announced in June that it will conduct seven to eight tests in the South Pacific in coming months. The announcement has brought a deluge of protests, especially in Asia.

## Trash can bomb leaves 16 people injured in Paris

**PARIS (AP)** — A bomb packed with nails and bolts exploded in a garbage can near the Arc de Triomphe Thursday, injuring at least 16 people.

Officials said the bomb was similar to one that killed seven people in a Paris subway three weeks ago, heightening fears that Paris had been targeted for a new wave of bombings at the height of the tourist season.

Three people were believed to be seriously hurt in this afternoon's blast at the busy tourist site, which was immediately blocked off by more than 100 police officers.

News reports said two people were detained near the blast site and questioned, but there were no further details.

The subway bombing — France's worst terrorist attack in nearly a decade — was blamed on Muslim extremists from the former French colony of Algeria.

Thursday's bomb consisted of a butane canister packed with nails and bolts, much like the one in the July 25 subway blast, said a fire department spokesman on condition of anonymity.

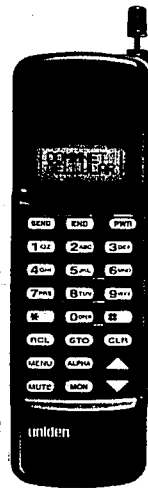

# Oil imports help widen trade deficit

WASHINGTON — America's trade deficit widened to \$11.4 billion in June, the second-worst showing on record.

Weakness in U.S. exports and another rise in the nation's foreign oil bill offset falling demand for imported cars.

Through the first six months of this year, the Commerce Department reported Thursday, the trade deficit in merchandise alone is running at an annual rate of \$188 billion.

The previous all-time high of \$166 billion was set last year.

The Clinton administration insisted that the deficit would soon start shrinking, but some economists warned that the dollar's recent rise could make it even harder to cure America's chronic trade problem.

The Commerce Department said the monthly deficit in goods and

services was 2.4 percent higher than a revised May imbalance of \$11.04 billion. It was the largest trade gap since a record deficit of \$11.42 billion set in April.

The new report caught economists by surprise. They had been expecting the deficit to narrow as a slowing U.S. economy cut into demand for foreign products.

Imports, which had hit an all-time high in May, did backtrack slightly, dropping by 0.6 percent.

# Overseas smokers inhaling U.S. cigarettes

NEW YORK — Backed into a corner at home by a mix of negative public opinion and rising restrictions, U.S. cigarette companies are increasingly looking to overseas markets.

Through their strategy is working. Cigarette exports have jumped nearly 275 percent over the last decade and about 35 percent over the last four years, U.S. companies

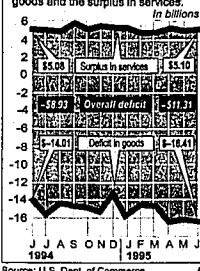
sent more than 220 billion cigarettes to markets ranging from Belgium to Hong Kong last year. During the first six months of this year, cigarette exports totaled \$2.3 billion, up from \$1.9 billion for the same period in 1994.

The dollar value of manufactured tobacco products, including cigarettes, cigars and chewing tobacco, shipped overseas by U.S. firms was \$5.4 billion last year, up from \$5 billion in 1990.

Exports of U.S. tobacco leaf, meanwhile, rose steadily for five years to reach a high of 575 million pounds in 1992 before tumbling to 433 million pounds last year on worldwide oversupply and price fluctuations. "There's no doubt that, with domestic constraints and a shrinking domestic market, companies are becoming more and more reliant on exports," said David Smith, a tobacco specialist at North Carolina State University in Raleigh.

The firm announced Wednesday that its board of directors and shareholders had signed a letter of intent to sell the stock to Yamagata Enterprises, a Nevada corporation owned by Yamagata. The

closing date is expected to be Aug. 31. The price was not disclosed.

Morris Travel is privately held by 18 shareholders, including president and chief executive officer Mark Slack.

Slack said Wednesday that the deal will result in no changes to the 25-year-old, 400-employee agency created by June Morris in 1970. Morris also started Morris Air in 1984 and spun off the two companies into separate corporations in 1985.

# Group wants Windows in pact

WASHINGTON — A computer industry group is trying to have a computer-neutral version of Microsoft Corp.'s Windows software included in an antitrust settlement with the Justice Department.

Microsoft filed court papers Thursday opposing the request.

The Computer and Communications Industry Association argues Windows NT should be added to the 1994 consent decree that is intended to make it easier for PC makers to compete with Microsoft's Windows 3.11.

For operating systems other than Microsoft's Windows 3.11 or Windows 95, Windows NT could emerge as a dominant operating system for networked computers, the group says.

## Picking an expert in financial planning pays off

**COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo.** — So you're looking for financial help, but you're confused by the assortment of letters strung after the name of every "expert."

How do you decipher the professional initials — CFP, CPA, PFS, CLU, ChFC, RFP, RIA, CFA, CFS, MFS and MBA — without a scorecard?

"Confusing isn't it," said Craig Carnick, a certified financial planner, or CFP. "Everybody is a financial authority and everybody has some initials for their name to prove it."

Financial planning is an arena with no state or federal regulation, so it's easy to add a "professional" tag without proving one's credentials, said Carnick, with Willard & Carnick here.

In fact, there are an estimated 17,000 financial advisory firms nationwide and only 46 inspectors on the staff of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

"That means the vast majority are never insured," said author John Lawrence Allen in his book "Investor Beware! How to Protect Your Money from Wall Street's Dirty Tricks."

To ensure a degree of professionalism and expertise, author Suzie Orman recommends starting with nothing less than a certified financial planner because "this designation is highly desirable."

"This indicates two years of study, extensive tests and a minimum of 30 hours of continuing education each year to keep up to date," Orman said in her retirement advice book "You've Earned It, Don't Lose It."

The testing and education is overseen by the 10-year-old Certified Financial Planner

## Some tips for finding adviser for you

Here are some questions that experts recommend asking prospective financial planners and advisers during the interview process.

• How are you paid? Will you fully disclose in advance all commission and fees you will receive from me for any products you sell me? This tells you whether your adviser is a fee-only adviser, commissioned-based salesperson or combination of both.

• Where do you get your financial advice? You want to know what resources the adviser relies upon — professional publications, industry contacts, institutional research. A good planner should have access to better financial information than you.

• Are you registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as an investment adviser? If no, experts say to look for another planner.

If yes, ask for a copy of the planner's ADV-1 and study it.

• Are you connected with anyone selling financial products or do you get referral fees from product sales organizations? If yes, consider any possible conflicts of interest.

• Have you ever been fired by a client? If so, why? Don't be afraid to ask for details.

• Do you offer a 100 percent money-back guarantee if I'm not completely satisfied with your strategy plan? Planners should be willing to stand behind their work, experts say.

• Do you or your company have malpractice insurance? There's no sense suing for malpractice if the company has no insurance or assets.

• Have you ever been disciplined by any regulatory body, government agency or industry organization or convicted of any crime?

• Can you give me the names of five clients and three personal references?

In addition, the candidate must complete courses in a financial planning curriculum at a college or university.

Then, the CFP board administers a two-day, 10-hour exam to assess each candidate's expertise in financial planning, including tax planning, employee benefits, retirement planning, estate planning, invest-

ment management and insurance.

Certified financial planners also have a code of ethics to follow. And each CFP must take continuing education courses every two years to stay current and stay certified.

More than 30,000 people nationwide are licensed to use the CFP designation, Carnick, Orman and other planners say

it's important to distinguish between financial "advising" and financial "product sales."

"It comes down to a debate over commissioned salespeople vs. advisers who work on a set fee and sell only their impartial advice."

"Product sales representatives earn their living selling products," Carnick said. "To expect a sales representative with XYZ Insurance or ABC Securities to even consider, much less recommend a competitor's product is most unlikely."

Carnick said the issue comes down to one of trust and recognizing the environment you're in: advice or sales.

"If you want to buy something, see a person who makes a living selling," he said. "If you want advice, see a person who makes a living advising."

Fee-based counseling is the most reliable, said James Shambo, a certified public accountant, or CPA, with Spanden, Shambo & Anderson in Colorado Springs.

Shambo also is a personal financial specialist, or PFS. Of the 350,000 members of the American Institute of CPAs, 7,000 are in the financial planning division and just 1,200 of those hold the PFS designation. It signifies advanced education and training in financial planning and continuing education.

"Fee-only advisers are the way to go if a client is looking for objective advice," Shambo said. "With a fee-only adviser, the process is focused on determining what your goals are and the development of strategy to achieve those goals. It may include financial products, but not necessarily."

"However, the end result with a commissioned adviser is the sale of product because that's how they get compensated."

# ABC special takes look at American 'herstory'

ABC celebrates the 75th anniversary of the 19th Amendment's passage with a road trip to landmarks commemorating important American women.

Lynn Sherr ("20/20") is host and co-writer of "Susan B. Anthony Slept Here," a one-hour special airing on ABC Saturday, Aug. 26 - 75 years to the day after American women won the right to vote.

"One of our points is that you learn so much more when you actually visit a site where someone was, rather than just read about them," Sherr says. "For instance, when you go to Rochester, to the Susan B. Anthony House, you really do feel the presence of that extraordinary woman. That's the kind of thing that we are trying to alert people to."

Notable contemporary American women join Sherr as hosts of each segment.

"As you obviously are aware, all the women we are featuring (in profiles) are dead," Sherr explains. "We wanted to make the point that, while these women were ... role models for today, there are living women who carry on this tradition whom we should also recognize, who are the embodiment of what these other women stood for."

Among the highlights include first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton presenting the section on Anthony and her struggles to win equal rights for women, especially the right to vote. Clinton also talks about her personal heroine, Eleanor Roosevelt, saying her "courage in the face of enormous hostility has been a constant source of inspiration to me."

Also, Olympic gold medalist Donna de Varona, professor Babe Didrickson Zaharias, is considered by many to have been one of the greatest athletes ever.

# Hollywood's classic monsters come back to life

The haunting, methodical sound of a clock striking midnight. Forboding fog-shrouded castle towers.

The chilling cry of a wolf echoing through a misty swamp.

That was just part of the shadowy and creepy world of Universal Pictures' journey into the realm of horror.

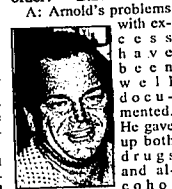

"He (Riley) has a deep secret, which has brought him to his present living arrangement," Fitzpatrick said in our recent interview. "He is neither a villain, nor is he a hero. He walks a fine line between the two areas, trying to remain as human as possible. But, he might snap at any moment. The life he chose finds him tightening his reign on his sanity. All of us have inner battles with our demons, but Pierce Riley probably has more than most."

Jim says he found it easy to portray the inner conflict and the explosive nature of Riley, who is very creative — he writes, paints and sculpts. Jim does all those things, too.

Born in Omaha, Nebraska, Jim grew up in Seminole, Florida, where he recalls playing football almost every day of his life. His father brought him to the Pee-Wee Football League, and from that time on Jim has been a football player. In fact, even though he loved performing in high school and college plays, his aim was to become a professional football player ... and he did. He was signed and released from the Chicago Bears; spent a short time with the Baltimore Colts; played with the Tie Cats in Canada; and was with the Tampa Bay Bandits until the United States Football League folded.

Jim also holds the distinction of being the first Tarzan at the Busch Gardens theme park in Florida. He would walk around in a leotard with a chimpanzee as part of the show. It was a great way, he says, to get a perfect tan and get paid for it.

He has also appeared in a number of movies and plays but he never connected with a role as he has with Pierce Riley on "All My Children."

"Riley is carrying a huge amount of emotional baggage, and he was on a collision course with his beliefs after serving a stint in the Army in El Salvador. This gives him an air of mystery and intensity. This sense of mystery is always mentioned in the letters I get from viewers. They want to know more about Riley, of course, but they are fascinated by him as he is. He has now fallen head over heels for Janet, and that will force him to make some changes. Before Janet came into his life, he was the complete loner and naturalist, living by his own rules and not having to share his life with anyone."




