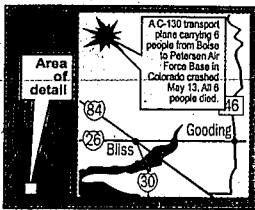

Hot engine, fire led to Bliss crash



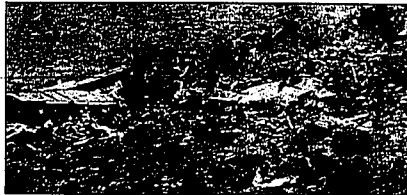
AC-130 transport plane carrying 8 people from Boise to Peterson Air Force Base in Colorado crashed May 13. All 8 people died.

BLISS - An overheated engine started the fire that caused an AC-130 transport plane to break up and crash the high-desert foothills of Gooding County, killing six Peterson Air Force Base reservists, investigators say. A report on the May 13 crash of the four-engine propeller plane was issued Wednesday by Air Force investigators. It found no fault

with the crew or its procedures during the flight.

The plane had flown from the Peterson base outside Colorado Springs, Colo., to Boise, where it dropped off 15 reservists from the 302nd Airlift Wing for firefighting training. Disaster struck on the return trip to Colorado Springs. The plane crashed about 3:15 p.m., nose-diving into a 50-foot cliff near Cliff Creek in the remote and unpaved

Sometimes farm workers escape poverty

BOISE - Looking at their offices, you could never guess the hours they spent as boys and young men toiling as migrant farm laborers in the fields of south-central Idaho.

Jesse Berain, a former legislator, heads the Office on Aging and works out of the state Capitol building. He travels around Idaho discussing issues affecting the elderly.

Across the street, Sam Byrd, coordinator of special populations for the Division of Vocational Education, talks passionately about transforming vocational education in Idaho. He recently helped swing a \$10 million to \$12 million grant for the state's School to Work initiative.

Despite their current jobs, they share a common past.

Both made the annual trek from southern states northward, following ripening crops.

Both spent much of their childhoods in labor camps throughout southern Idaho.

Both started working in the fields before they were 10. Migrant life has improved, but it must still be made better, they say. And now, both share a commitment to their people, to their fellow-Hispanics. They dream of a better future for the migrant farmworkers of America.

Orphaned

Berain became an orphan at 13. Exposed to a lifetime of pesticides and overwork, his parents died in their 40s, leaving him and his brothers and sisters. Berain, now 67, stayed with the migrant life during the 1930s and 1940s, driving a truck filled with workers and traveling with dozens of other cars and trucks in the migrant caravan from Texas to Idaho. If one car broke down, they could leave it and jump in with the others.

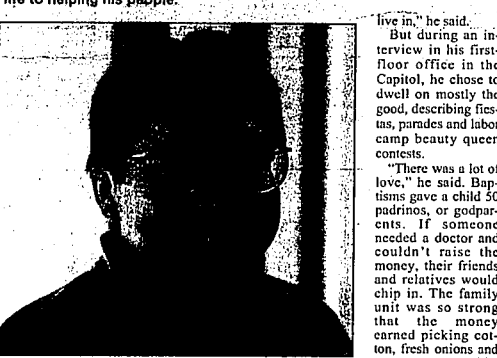
"It was almost like an insurance policy," he said.

Berain, work-hardened since age 6, acknowledges that migrant life has its downside. He has seen labor camp children playing in open septic tanks and witnessed poverty so great that parents couldn't buy food for their families.

He spent time growing up in what is now El Milagro, the Twin Falls labor camp, long before it was cleaned up and renovated by the Idaho Migrant Council.

And he has seen or lived in plenty of others.

"They ran all the way from fairly good to some that weren't fit for humans to live in," he said.

But during an interview in his first-floor office in the Capitol, he chose to dwell on mostly the good, describing fiestas, parades and labor camp beauty queen contests.

"There was a lot of love," he said. Baptisms gave a child 50 padrinos, or godparents. If someone needed a doctor and couldn't raise the money, their friends and relatives would chip in. The family unit was so strong that the money earned picking cotton, fresh onions and tomatoes went to the family for clothes or food.

"It was our way of contributing," he said. "It was a family unit going out to work ... That's a lot of times what Anglos don't understand."

Offender tries castration; court orders probation

SHOSHONE - Having tried everything else to escape the urge to expose himself to children, convicted sex offender Michael Piper opted for voluntary surgical castration.

He underwent the operation "hopefully to offer some sort of guarantee to society that I won't be a problem again," he told 5th District Judge Barry Wood last week.

The 33-year-old Piper had been convicted in 1992 of sexual abuse of a child for masturbating in front of two girls. This year, he violated his 10-year probation sentence by lurking near children, according to court records.

His condition spiraled into depression and marital strain. Piper told the judge he had already spent himself "into the poor house" with counseling, psychotherapy and female hormones.

Then, on July 3, a Keetchum urologist performed the surgery that changed his life entirely, according to the taped Aug. 14 hearing.

"First of all, there is absolutely no sexual desire whatsoever, it's completely obliterated," Piper testified. "By having my mind

free from the idea of sexual obsessions, it has allowed me to be a better person with everyone I interact with."

Experts say castration rarely cures exhibitionists, however, despite the removal of hormone-producing testicles.

The sexual offender's behavior is learned and has nothing to do with hormone levels, said psychologist Gary O. Horton, an executive board member of the American Association of the Treatment of Sexual Abusers.

Kerry Lindorfer, a treatment specialist at Sexual Abuse Now Ended in Boise, agreed that castration will not stop an exhibitionist's behavior. Lindorfer also is the Idaho

chapter president for the treatment association.

Horton said he has not heard of another voluntary castration case in Idaho in the 11 years he has practiced in the state.

There have been some U.S. cases where judges ordered castration for sex offenders, which were highly controversial calls, he added.

Belgium, Holland and Germany are among countries that castrate sex offenders instead of jailing them, Lindorfer said. "It's not an uncommon practice, and it's sometimes an option for offenders," he said.

Nuclear waste talks with Navy, DOE go on

BOISE - With pressure mounting for an agreement, Gov. Phil Batt said Thursday negotiations were continuing with the Navy and the U.S. Department of Energy on resumption of nuclear waste dumping in Idaho.

No settlement was reached during nine hours of what Batt called "very intense" talks in Minneapolis Wednesday with Adm. Bruce Demars, head of the Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program, and Energy De-

partment Undersecretary Thomas Grumbley. Lawyers for both sides continued the effort Thursday.

The governor said no additional high-level meetings were planned for now.

"I would not preclude that, but neither would I say it's a certainty," Batt said.

He has termed his last two meetings with Navy and Energy Department brass final attempts to win an enforceable deadline from the government for removing any new waste

shipped to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

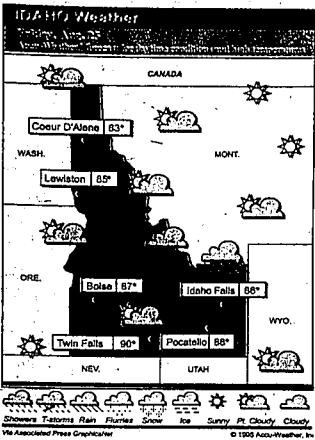
Batt said again Thursday that before the state agrees to lift its court challenge and accept additional shipments, he also must be convinced cleanup of existing waste at the INEL will continue and that jobs and economic opportunities will be protected at the Energy Department site.

"Those three principles are uppermost on our minds at the negotiations. We have not reached a solution which to me has been satisfacto-

ry," he said. "I very much would like to have this matter settled. ... We will continue to diligently pursue this matter until it reaches a resolution of some kind."

However, that resolution might be forced on the state when Congress votes next month on an appropriations bill with a provision authorizing the Navy to resume waste shipments to the INEL on Oct. 1. The Navy contends national security is at risk unless it is allowed to resume shipping spent nuclear reactor fuel.

Precipitation totals were generally light and in the Magic Valley the showers tapered off by midday. Skies were partly cloudy through the afternoon and early evening.

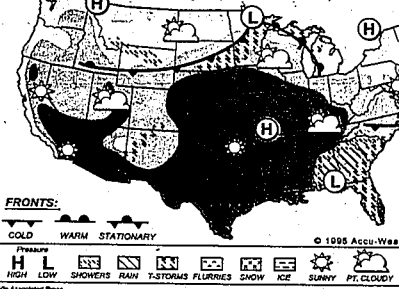
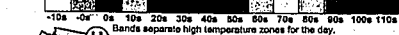
Rainfall reports included Lowell .02 inch, Rexburg .01 and Soda Springs .04.

But his stories are peppered with humor, as well, and anecdotes for people and places that have disappeared.

Stories, tunes, a father's lies

"Dad, what time is it?" Byrd would ask his father, over and over as they heeded beans. His father would tell him a discouragingly early hour, and Byrd would sigh. Time dragged, working in the fields.

But then, almost before he realized it, the sun coasted high overhead and it was time for lunch. The day was nearly finished.

Byrd soon caught on to his father's methods — fib about the time made the day go faster. For years, even after they stopped field work and his father was near death, he expected his father to lie to him whenever he asked the time.

The lies helped make life bearable. Looking back, Byrd remembers two other ways: listening to the radio and telling stories. Nearly everyone in the labor camp had a popular. He marks time by the radio

songs, news events of the day and which crop they were working on at the time.

"A particular song will come in, and I'll remember picking green beans," he said.

Now 41, he remembers waking up one morning in the Paul camp to the news that Robert Kennedy had been shot.

Stories and gossip riddled through the camp, keeping curiosity and humanity alive.

"Who stole who" was a big topic. Young men and women would run off together during the night, and soon here'd be shotgun wedding. Sometimes a couple would elope and not show up for work the next morning.

Before the sun rose workers would get their daily dose of titillating tales, a stronger jolt than black coffee.

'No Mexicans Allowed'

During particularly fierce fighting during the Korean War, Berain's fellow soldiers were dying all around him.

Berain vowed that if he made it home, he would devote his life to helping his people.

He made it home. He was Martin Luther King began leading fellow blacks, Berain had his own Civil Rights battle — against Twin Falls businesses that blatantly discriminated against Hispanics. Hotel, restaurant and bar owners hung signs saying, "No Mexicans Allowed."

Following King's lead of passive resistance, Berain went into the businesses anyway, usually with a contingent of supporters. They refused to leave until they were served. Eventually, the signs came down.

His whole life has been dedicated to others. He helped set up the first summer school at the Twin Falls camp, brought kids swimming, ran the labor camp store and gave food to families who couldn't pay.

When he lived in Twin Falls, a couple knocked on his door. Their baby had died in Blackfoot and they didn't know what to do, so they drove to him. He called the coroners

Tropical rains inundate Florida; storms rumble over West

Heavy rain drenched southern and eastern Florida Thursday as a result of a storm being followed across the Atlantic by two hurricanes.

More run-of-the-mill thunderstorms rumbled over the West.

The rain from Tropical Storm Jerry — which weakened into a tropical depression as it crossed Florida — totaled 2 to 12 inches. It was heaviest in coastal communities between Palm Beach and Miami.

Heavy rain was continuing in central and southern Florida. Tomatoes were sighted north of Tampa along Interstate 75. Coastal sections of the Carolinas and Georgia also got thunderstorms and 1 to 3 inches of rain.

Some heavy thunderstorms occurred in the Southwest and the Intermountain region, between the Rockies and the Sierra Nevada and the mountains of eastern Oregon and Washington. Pocatello, Idaho, reported heavy rainfall.

Other strong storms moved across the eastern Dakotas and

through central Minnesota and Wisconsin, producing heavy rain and some hail. Thunderstorms were also common in southern Texas.

A cold front extended from the Northeast across northern New Jersey, Pennsylvania, northern Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

Even when it was no longer a named storm, Jerry had sustained wind near 40 mph and gusts up to 50 mph in the Cape Canaveral area and its main produced flooding.

Hurricanes Iris and Humberto churned over the open Atlantic and posed no immediate threat to land. It was the first time there had been 11 named storms so early in the hurricane season.

The remnants of Jerry were expected to strengthen again to a tropical storm across the extreme northeastern Gulf of Mexico and then swing back over land with wind gusting to 50 mph and the threat of severe thunderstorms and tornadoes.

Dry, cool air over the Northwest threatened frost in the Klamath Basin of southern Oregon.

Arabs ready to help weaken Saddam

WASHINGTON — The governments of Jordan, Saudi Arabia, Egypt and Kuwait privately have assured the United States they are eager to exploit new cracks in the authority of Iraqi President Saddam Hussein.

However, they said imposing concrete measures such as new trade embargoes will take time, according to senior U.S. officials.

The Arab governments told a high-level U.S. delegation that visited the capitals of their countries last week they agree with Washington that Saddam's continued control of Iraq is a threat to their security and an impediment to the region's stability, the officials said.

They also expressed a readiness to begin more earnest exploration of new ways of weak-

ening Saddam's control in coming weeks and months, possibly appointing some U.S. officials to restrict Iraqi trade with Jordan outside of food or humanitarian items, the officials said.

But the governments did not say when they would begin to implement such measures, disappointing some U.S. officials, who said they had hoped the recent defection to Jordan of several senior Iraqis might galvanize the four nations to put in place tough new anti-Saddam measures right away.

A spokesman said the administration was "encouraged" that events are moving in the right direction — that (Jordanian officials) will move their domestic audience toward accepting more distance from Iraq. But each of the countries said the pressure would have to be incremental.

northwestern corner of Gooding County, about 12 miles north of Bliss.

All those aboard — the pilot, copilot, flight engineer, navigator and two loadmasters — were killed.

Brig. Gen. Walter T. Hatcher III, the commander of the 302nd Airlift Wing, said he was satisfied with the investigation.

The report by the U.S. Air Force Accident Investigation Board says the plane's No. 2 engine overheated and caused a turbine spacer — a ring-shaped object that separates one engine turbine wheel from another — to break apart.

The report does not say what caused the engine to overheat. But an aerospace engineer quoted in the

report speculates that faulty equipment might have made temperatures appear lower than they really were. If temperatures were judged to be too low, then more fuel would be pumped, causing temperatures to rise even higher.

When the turbine spacer broke apart, fragments severed pressurized fuel or hydraulic lines, or both. A fire broke out in the engine compartment, and the engine fell from the plane.

The left wing also tore off, and other parts of the plane — including the No. 1 and 4 engines, rudder and portions of the right wing — also broke apart.

The plane slammed nose first into the ground.

The report says crew members

commented about the No. 2 engine turbine inlet temperature when they were in the Paul camp. They did some testing and eventually determined that it was lower than the other three engines, but within flight manual limits.

Crew members also determined that fuel flow for the No. 2 engine was higher than the other engines, the report says.

Yet crew members did not notice signs, such as high oil temperatures, that the engine was overheating, the report states.

The report says there were no "improper maintenance practices" associated with the plane. And the report has not resulted in any new maintenance directives for C-130s, officials said.

More common is use of the drug Provera, which results in a "chemical castration" by increasing a man's levels of the hormone estrogen, Horton said.

It is not unheard of for a sexual offender to try to castrate himself, usually unsuccessfully, Lindorfer said. Offenders sometimes mutilate their genitals out of shame, he added.

An exhibitionist needs extensive therapy to teach him how to manage his behavior, Horton said.

Wood sentenced Piper, now of Ketchum, to another eight years of supervised probation for the probation violation. Piper will be under virtually the same legal restrictions

as he was in January and February when, according to lie-detector interviews, he sought out children on six occasions with the purpose of exposing himself.

The probation may be shortened if Piper can prove castration cured him, the judge ruled.

Piper must also stay away from alcohol and drugs, and commit no more crimes. He must hold down a job, pay court costs, and pay for court-ordered psychotherapy, counseling and lie-detector tests whenever requested by his probation officer.

Lincoln County Prosecutor Jennifer Brown Yewer recommended the sentencing.

Except for immediate family,

Piper can have contact with "no human being on planet earth" under age 18, unless two other adults are present, Wood said.

"I hope that it does work for you," Wood said. But if Piper violates his probation again, "sunlight up and straight out, I will send you to the Idaho State Penitentiary."

"Good luck to you," Wood added.

For Flight 529 survivors, 9 minutes of eternity

CARROLLTON, Ga. (AP) — Awakened by a jolt, David McCorkell listened drowsily as the flight attendant assured the passengers of Flight 529 that although one engine had just gone out, the plane would be able to continue flying.

When she soon afterwards announced the plane was returning to Atlanta, the computer executive from Northfield, Minn., grumbled to himself, "Guess I won't get any work done today," and pondered the time needed to return, wait for repairs at a new plane, then continue on to Gulfport, Miss.

There were 26 passengers aboard Atlantic Southeast Airlines Flight 529, a commuter jet that lifted off from Atlanta on Monday at 12:28 p.m. Most were businesspeople on their way to meetings or presentations. There were also two Virginia lawmen going to pick up a captured fugitive, a couple of Air Force men headed to assignments, and some folks going to see relatives.

For them, the precise attention to time in air travel — the boards with times for check-in, departure, and arrival, the persistent glancing at watches by passengers, the easy updates on expected flying time coming over the intercom — was about to slam to a halt.

How much time elapses from the moment you look out your window, at pine trees rushing toward you at the instant you realize you are crashing?

How many seconds tick away between when the groaning, crunching of metal stops and you know you have to get out?

How long does it take to open a seat belt when you are buried under people and debris?

Once you are safely away from the flames, how long does it take to steel yourself to plunge back in to help others? As you watch the terrified look of a man's face trapped inside a cockpit as flames lick over him, how much time do you spend trying to free him?

For survivors of Flight 529, time seemed to drag.

Later, it would be determined that there were 9 1/2 minutes from the moment the left-engine propeller broke away to the crash of the Embraer 120 turboprop into a hayfield five miles from this city near the Alabama state line.

"There was a tremendous, huge bang. Then it was over," said Byron Gaskill, 57, an engineer from Munroe Falls, Ohio.

"I could see the propeller was gone. It apparently penetrated the wing somehow. The aircraft shuddered. But the pilot regained control quickly."

The plane righted, flight attendant Robin Fech returned from the cockpit to report that it would continue flying. Some passengers settled back into their seats, a few nervous-

ly eyed the remaining right engine, and a couple peppered the flight attendant with questions.

Several felt a dip. This time, Fech told them they were returning to Atlanta. She instructed them to assume the crash position — doubled over, hands braced against the seat ahead — as a precaution.

There was a sense of steadily losing altitude.

Alan Barrington, 35, a retail-chain personnel manager from Roswell, sneaked peeks out.

"I knew I wasn't in Atlanta. I did see a lot of trees. I just assumed he had found another airport to land at," he said.

"I kept believing the trees were going to end and I was going to see an airport."

homes in the community of Burwell, then through a line of tall pine trees, clipping their tops as the plane nosed toward an open field.

Passengers would describe a jarring thud, a loud skidding, rolling and sliding, a terrible groan of metal shearing and crunching.

Then, it stopped; the end of a breathtaking roller coaster ride, McCorkell said later.

As passengers in the wrecked cabin slowly realized what had happened, some became aware of a strong smell of fuel and the popping and cracking sounds of fire.

New acquaintances Airman Jason Aleshire, 18, of Waynesboro, Va., and Maj. Charles LeMay, 42, of Offutt Air Force Base in Nebraska ran through a gap in the wreckage, across the grass.

LeMay, a 22-year veteran on his way to a meteorology conference,

and Aleshire, a five-month rookie on his way to begin duty at Keesler Air Force Base in Biloxi, Miss., had chatted on the plane and now looked at each other and then back at the growing flames.

They raced back to begin pulling passengers out.

"It seemed like it took a long time, but I know it wasn't," LeMay said.

Inside, Gaskill found himself flattened under an inches-high ceiling of mangled metal.

He crawled away from his seat, fell backwards out of the opened plane, then patted out flames on another man's legs.

Scenes of heroism were played out across the field. Passengers ripped off their shirts to beat others' clothes. Some tackled those fleeing in flames, covering them and rolling them over.

From under a pile of people, luggage and seats torn from their runways, Barrington glimpsed daylight. He struggled to reach, then unsnap his seat belt.

"It probably took 15 seconds. For that eternity, I was sure that I would be trapped and burned," he said.

He was able to free himself and move toward an opening blocked by a wall of flame. He looked behind and saw no other way out.

He jumped, rolled and raised

himself, shouting back: "You've got to jump! You've got to go through the fire! There's no other way out!"

Others emerged, engulfed in flames. Some charged madly away, trying to escape the fire running up their arms and legs.

McCorkell had gotten out quickly and raced through fire that melted the bottoms of his shoes off. He stopped, slid, then turned around and made his way toward the front of the plane.

He saw glass breaking from the right side of the cockpit.

The plane's first officer, Matthew Warmerdam of Macon, handed him a hatchet through the broken glass, saying, "I don't have room to swing it."

McCorkell swung it against the reinforced glass, chipping bits away. He switched hands wearily. The opening grew and Warmerdam poked his head out to gulp air.

An explosion of flame sent McCorkell back.

Warmerdam, his pilot dying or already dead next to him, shouted: "You're not going to let me die, are you?" Then, "Tell my wife that I love her!"

McCorkell began swinging again, no idea for how long, before the hatchet top broke off. Just then, rescuers arrived with heavy axes. Firemen got a hose into the cockpit and pulled the first officer out.

Dazed passengers wandered across the field, clothes missing or burned to tatters. Charred flesh hung from some. Fech, the flight attendant, moved among them, one arm obviously broken, her face bloody.

Ambulances moved in and out from the field. Five people were dead or dying, seven were hospitalized in critical condition.

McCorkell watched the last rescues, then talked with fellow survivors.

He looked at his watch. He was surprised to see it was only 1:25.

"I did so many things, I had no idea what time it was," he said.

Government puts freeze on 'frozen' labels

WASHINGTON (AP) — If a packaged chicken is frozen solid, it's not "fresh" to the Agriculture Department has decided.

"But don't go calling it frozen, either: Such a bird probably will be labeled "hard chilled" under a new rule announced Thursday.

The rule is intended to clear up confusion in supermarket aisles by prohibiting frozen labels on frozen birds. It takes effect in a year.

Currently, poultry that has been chilled to as low as 0 degrees Fahrenheit — frozen stiff — can be sold as fresh. Poultry is sometimes frozen for long-distance transport, then thawed before it reaches store shelves.

Under the new rule, birds can be called fresh only if they have never been chilled below 26 degrees, the temperature at which chickens and turkeys begin to freeze. A fresh

chicken might have a dusting of ice crystals but won't be rock solid.

Shoppers who buy chicken labeled fresh don't realize it might be frozen or might have been frozen weeks earlier, the Agriculture Department said.

"This policy will ensure that consumers receive accurate information without imposing excessive costs on industry," said Deputy Secretary Richard Rominger.

The big Southern chicken producers opposed the change. The National Broiler Council issued a terse statement Thursday calling the new rules "misleading and unnecessary." "There's more to freshness than temperature, the group argued.

FBI chief tightens sniper rules

WASHINGTON (AP) — FBI Director Louis J. Freeh says bureau snipers will never again get a shooting order like the one they received during the deadly 1992 siege at the Idaho home of white separatist Randy Weaver.

"Hereafter, the only deadly force policy that will apply will be the standard deadly force policy, which follows the Supreme Court's ruling that deadly force can only be used when the danger and the necessity require action to prevent death or grievous bodily harm," Freeh said in an interview with The Associated Press.

"We'll only have one rule of engagement," he said. "I think that will be much less confusing and much less amenable to error."

Controversy over the siege has focused on the departure from that longstanding FBI shooting rule to one that Freeh said was widely viewed as a "shoot-on-sight" policy at Weaver's cabin on remote Ruby Ridge.

On Aug. 22, 1992, an FBI sniper killed Weaver's wife, Vicki, as she stood behind a door holding a baby. The sniper said he did not see her and was aiming at Randy Weaver's friend, Kevin Harris, who was armed

and retreating to the cabin. The snipers had been told they "sound and shout" use deadly force on any armed adult male in the open. Freeh, who left a federal judgeship to become FBI director in September 1993, decided earlier this year that the sniper believed he had complied with the longstanding rule, not the one devised for the Idaho situation.

Freeh primarily blamed Eugene Glenn, FBI field commander at the scene, and Richard Rogers, FBI hostage rescue team chief, for the faulty rule. But they have sworn that it was approved by then-Assistant FBI Director Larry Potts at headquarters. Potts denies that.

Neither field nor headquarters officials intended to write a "shoot-on-sight" rule, said Freeh, himself a former FBI agent and federal prosecutor. But except for the 11 snipers, he said, "Law enforcement personnel at the scene, including FBI agents, were not fully briefed and many thought the rule was a shoot-on-sight policy."

The longstanding rule required that an agent make two decisions before shooting: that life was endangered and that deadly force was necessary to remove the danger. In revising the rule, Freeh said, FBI officials intended to make only the danger judgment in advance, leaving the agents to decide when deadly force was necessary to avert harm.

From now on, Freeh said, "We are not going to use the deadly force rule to convey the danger. We'll do that separately in a threat advisory." During the interview, late Wednesday, Freeh admitted he misjudged how the public would react last January when he recommended Potts for promotion to the bureau's No. 2 job while simultaneously censuring him for poorly overseeing the shooting rule at Ruby Ridge.

"The perception outside the FBI was that it was not a serious censure, because at the same time I was talking about promoting him," Freeh said. "I should have been more sensitive to that perception."

Since demoted, Potts and four other managers at FBI headquarters have been suspended with pay. The Justice Department is conducting a criminal investigation into whether they covered up their approval of the revised rule.

Two of the five suspended FBI managers have admitted destroying FBI documents during internal Ruby Ridge investigations; a third has admitted knowing of their destruction, according to a senior Justice official, who spoke only on condition of anonymity. Potts' attorney has denied any misconduct on his part.

As Freeh awaits results of the Justice Department probe and Senate hearings next month, he said the allegations "go to the heart of what we do, the single most essential part of our mission, which is to fairly and properly develop all of the facts."

Noting that FBI officials are alleged to have "interfered with investigation, obstructed justice or made false statements," Freeh said,

"I can't think of a more serious charge to make against an FBI agent than one that goes to the honesty of his or her investigations. There's nothing more shocking."

FBI planned Waco-style assault at Weaver homesite

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI initially planned to use armored personnel carriers to destroy parts of Randy Weaver's compound and to insert tear gas into his cabin if the white separatist and his family refused to surrender.

Eight months later, a roughly similar plan was used by the FBI to try to end its long siege of the Branch Davidian complex at Waco, Texas. A fire broke out as tanks were inserting tear gas into the compound, and 81 bodies were found in the ashes.

The FBI's initial plan in August 1992 at Weaver's cabin on remote Ruby Ridge in Idaho said that if Weaver and his family did not surrender after two days of requests, "The armored personnel carriers will begin dismantling the outlying buildings," FBI said.

If that did not bring surrender, the plan said, "Tear gas will be deployed into the main house."

On Aug. 23, 1992, armored personnel carriers took down an outbuilding known as the birthing shed

and discovered the body of Weaver's son, Samuel, 14. Unbeknownst to federal agents, Samuel had been killed during a gunfight between family members and a U.S. marshals reconnaissance party two days earlier that triggered the siege. Deputy U.S. Marshal William Degan also was killed in that gunfire.

On Aug. 22, an FBI sniper killed Weaver's wife, Vicki, as she stood behind a door of the family's home. The sniper said he was aiming at

Weaver's friend, Kevin Harris, who was armed and running to the cabin, and did not see Mrs. Weaver.

After Samuel's body was discovered, federal agents revised their strategy and ultimately got Weaver to surrender on Aug. 31, 1992.

The initial FBI plan is quoted in a still-unreleased 500-page Justice Department report on the case. The report has been leaked to reporters and a copy was put on the Internet by Legal Times, a Washington newspaper.

Feds probe ties between lawmakers, casinos

PORT ALLEN, La. (AP) — Along Louisiana 415, amid the sugar cane fields of Cajun country, is Kraw Daddy's Casino and truck stop.

For some Louisiana political careers, the windowless, faded red casino and others like it could be the end of the road.

In the heat and haze of Port Allen, across the Mississippi River from the capital of Baton Rouge, trucks fill up at Kraw Daddy's pumps and people wile away the hours in the round-

the-clock, air-conditioned casino, playing video poker on padded black stools at 50 machines.

"I've seen people put \$2,000 in these things," said an employee who spoke on condition of anonymity. "We empty these machines every morning and we took \$17,000 out yesterday. We do pretty good."

In a state that makes it convenient to induce one's vices — and where one-third of the residents are living at the poverty line or below and

another third are working poor — the chance to win big at Kraw Daddy's and 108 other "truck-stop casinos" is enticing.

But the FBI alleges that the real winners are legislators who used their votes and their power to help truck-stop gambling thrive, in exchange for campaign contributions and hidden interests in the machines.

No charges have been filed in the yearlong corruption investigation, but FBI agents detail a conspiracy in

affidavits they filed to support subpoenas served on about a dozen legislators last week. The subpoenas demanded the lawmakers' campaign finance and personal business records.

"It's no big deal. They just want to look at some records. Anybody can see my records," said Rep. Raymond Lalande, a Democrat, gambling industry supporter and chairman of the House committee that handles gambling legislation.

Prep school teacher charged

FARMINGTON, N.H. (AP) — A teacher at the prestigious Phillips Academy who dressed in cowboy boots and spoke of the appeal "of the misfit" was charged with attempting to kidnap three children by trying to lure them into his car.

David Cobb, who has taught English at the famous Massachusetts prep for more than 25 years, was arrested early Wednesday after the children, ages 12 to 14, told police that a man tried to lure them into his car by offering them money.

Cobb, 59, entered no plea at a court hearing Wednesday. He was freed on \$100,000 bail and was due for another court appearance Sept. 1.

Two of the children said they were approached while walking together on Monday, the other in a second incident Tuesday.

Bacteria found more resistant to drugs

BOSTON (AP) — Scientists report a sharp increase in antibiotic-resistant strains of bacteria that cause pneumonia, meningitis and other diseases.

But a separate study found that patients suffering from pneumonia that was resistant to penicillin were no more likely to die than those with strains that responded to treatment with the drug.

Both studies, the first in Atlanta and the second in Barcelona, Spain, were reported in Thursday's edition of The New England Journal of Medicine.

"We need novel antibacterial agents urgently," Alexander Tomasz, of Rockefeller University in New York wrote in

an accompanying editorial in the journal.

The Atlanta researchers blamed the rise in resistance to "excessive and inappropriate" use of antibiotics. Drug-resistant strains of bacteria emerge when a few bacteria survive exposure through mutation, then reproduce and pass on their resistance.

The Atlanta study of 431 patients suffering from diseases caused by streptococcus pneumoniae was conducted from January through October 1993 by researchers from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Twenty-five percent of the patients had infections resistant to penicillin. Among white patients younger than 6, 41 percent of cases were resistant to penicillin.

Official: Serb stranglehold led to U.S. diplomats' deaths

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Serbian stranglehold on Sarajevo contributed to the deaths of three American diplomats on the Mount Igman road, Bosnia's foreign minister said Thursday.

The Serbs have blocked access to the Bosnian capital since they threatened in April to shoot down all entering and departing airplanes if Robert Frasure, one of the American diplomats, attempted to move from the airport into the city. Foreign Minister Muhamed Sacirbey said: Frasure, the chief U.S. negotiator for the Balkans, was forced to yield and to fly to Croatia.

On Saturday, Frasure, Joseph Kruzel and S. Nelson Drew died when a French vehicle carry-

ing the American mediators on the narrow road moved to a rain-soaked shoulder to make way for a convoy and plunged into a ravine.

State Department officials said later the Mount Igman road was the only secure route to Sarajevo, where American negotiators were to hold meetings with Bosnian President Alija Izetbegovic.

At a news conference Thursday, Sacirbey, who is related by marriage to Kruzel, said the road was known as "the most deadly three kilometers in the world."

trucks and other vehicles, killing an average of one person a day, Sacirbey said. Many of the victims are "unsung heroes," Bosnians bringing food into the besieged city, he said.

"All the other options had been allowed to be cut off by the Serbs," he said. "The Serbs have been allowed to keep the stranglehold on the city."

And last Saturday, Sacirbey said, "the American diplomats were victims of a blockade."

Still, he said, "it would be too much of a cheap shot" to say the Serbs are responsible for the accident.

Ironically, the leader of the Bosnian Serbs, Radovan Karadzic, this week offered safe passage to American mediators due to return to the Balkans in pursuit of a negotiated settlement in Bosnia. A State Department spokesman, David Johnson, said Tuesday, "We would be pleased to explore other routes that would be safer."

At the news conference, Sacirbey pledged the Bosnian government's cooperation in the peace effort. He said a "window of opportunity" for a settlement would be closed in a month or two, and he urged the United States and other would-be peacemakers to put pressure on Bosnian Serbs to agree to peace talks.

Life magazine cover star

Ace photog Eisenstaedt dies at 96

OAK BLUFFS, Mass. (AP) — Alfred Eisenstaedt, the Life magazine photographer who took the famous V.I. Day picture of a sailor kissing a woman in Times Square, has died at 96.

The New York City resident died late Wednesday at a Martha's Vineyard inn where he was vacationing, said a friend, William Marks.

Eisenstaedt was working for Life when he took the famous picture Aug. 14, 1945, the day Japan surrendered to end World War II.

Expressing the unbounded joy and relief that Americans felt at the end of the war, the sailor holds the nurse in a half dip as one of her feet lifts slightly off the ground.

The photo became a Life cover, and the picture itself remains a defining moment in photojournalism.

"When people don't know me anymore they will remember that picture," Eisenstaedt said years later.

The nurse was identified by Life in 1980 as Edith Shain, but many laid claim to being the sailor. Just a few weeks ago, former New York City police detective Carl Muscarello, now a South Florida retiree, came forward to say he was the sailor. Mrs. Shain, now 77, agreed, but Life had no comment on the report.

Millions of Life readers came to know the great personalities of the century through Eisenstaedt's eyes. His photographed Hitler, Einstein, Churchill, the Kennedys, Marilyn Monroe, Frank Lloyd Wright, Norman Rockwell, Ernest Hemingway, and hundreds more. He photographed President Clinton and his family in 1993.

"Eisenstaedt was not the great stylist or artist, but he was one of the classic photojournalists. His were very direct, simple, powerful images. He just celebrated life," said Bill Kuykendall, director of the photojournalism department at the University of Missouri.

Eisenstaedt was born in 1898 in the city of Dirschau, Germany, which is now in Poland. He began shooting pictures at age 12 when his uncle gave him a camera. "I began clicking madly everything in sight," he recalled.

After serving in World War I, in which he suffered shrapnel injuries, Eisenstaedt went to work as a salesman in Berlin to help out his family, whose department store business had run into hard times.

But his true interest lay in art and he studied paintings in the Berlin museums. When he learned how to make enlargements in the late 1920s, he took up photography seriously.

Three days after quitting as a salesman, he began several years of freelance work for The Associated Press by heading to Stockholm to photograph writer Thomas Mann at the Nobel Prize ceremonies. His photographs for a couple of German picture magazines and for the news service established his reputation both as a photographer and as a journalist.

When Henry Luce, founder of the Time empire, decided to start a picture magazine, Eisenstaedt was extended an offer and he came to the United States in 1935. While working on the prototype of what would become Life, Luce said, his faith the magazine would succeed was confirmed when he saw Eisenstaedt's photographs of a sharecropper family in the South.

Eisenstaedt was one of the four original staff photographers at Life and eventually photographed more than 85 Life covers and, by his estimate, 1 million pictures in all.

He won numerous awards for his work, and he was given a gold camera, No. 1,000,001 manufactured by Leica. Eisenstaedt used all types of cameras but was best known for his work with Leica, one of the easily handled 35 mm cameras that, along with the appearance of the picture magazines, ignited the explosion of modern photojournalism in the 1930s.

He oversaw production of 13 books on his work, including "Eisenstaedt: Remembrances," published in 1990.

Idaho schools should invest in a simple phone call

Would you have your tooth filled by a graduate of Bob's School of Dentistry?

Of course not. But too many Idaho schools hire employees, some to highly paid jobs, with credentials that are almost as questionable.

Take the case of Ted Carpenter, hired this summer as president of the fledgling, privately owned Idaho Falls Institute of Arts and Technology. He landed the \$50,000-a-year job with the help of a Ph.D. from the University of Berkley.

No, not that Berkley. The University of Berkley is a diploma mill with a post office box in Southfield, Mich.

It has no residency requirements, time restrictions or entrance tests. Students develop their own curriculum and pick their own degrees. They automatically earn 20 credits for "examining their life in detail" and filling out the "lifetime education/experiential assessment portfolio."

After completing the final "commensurate ability project," which may take the form of a traditional dissertation, a poem or a community service project, students round out their degree programs by critiquing their life, work and final project.

The board would have discovered that had it invested a phone call, but sadly, it's not alone. Earlier this year, Superintendent of Public Instruction Anne Fox hired Bill Stanley to run the Idaho Department of Education's architectural design division. Although his resume suggested otherwise, it turned out that Stanley had never built a single school.

Nor did he have a degree from George Washington University, as he claimed, or taught at Northwest Nazarene College or been an instructor at the National War College. Stanley was soon gone, but plenty

of administrators have managed to hang around long enough to do real damage to the school districts that hired them.

Eugene Emahiser, fired by the Shoshone School Board in 1993 after a string of complaints from teachers and parents, had worked in 14 school districts during the 15 years before he came to Shoshone.

That fact was conveniently omitted from his glowing resume, on the basis of which the Shoshone trustees hired him.

It's not that hard nowadays to cover up a rocky employment record with a little artifice, a resume-writing manual, some puffy letters of reference and enough gumption.

And if you still need help, there are plenty of diploma mills listed in the classified ads of USA Today and other national publications that will — for a fee — help the process along.

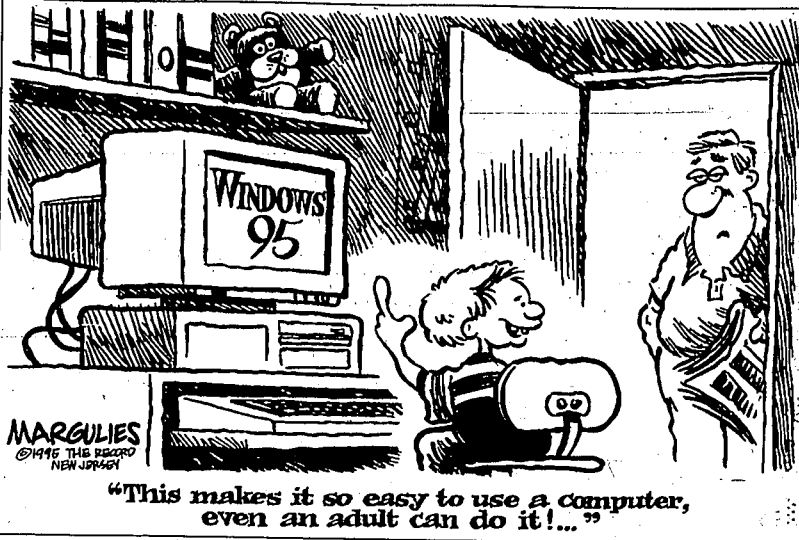
Most private-sector employers, who realize how much a bad employee can cost them, do their homework before they make a job offer. But school administrators are recruited, by in large, by boards made up of amateurs who haven't a clue how to hire someone.

To those folks, a job candidate's innovative ideas and his firm handshake often dissuade them from checking the claims on his resume.

That ends up costing the taxpayers money — in some cases, big money. For the fact of the matter is that the messy business of hiring and firing is probably the most important part of a school trustee's job.

Carpenter was reassigned this week by the Idaho Falls Institute of Arts and Technology's board as director of administration, a somewhat lower paying job.

That's a travesty. He should have been fired.



Republicans need to run it up the middle

Football fans in Washington remind me of some conservatives. Following the Super Bowl glory years of the '80s and early '90s, the local football team is in the third year of a rebuilding program — but some fair weather "fans" have already given up.

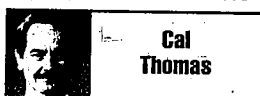
In Republican politics, the situation is reversed.

Having won the congressional "play-offs" last November, unleashing an euphoria even greater than during the Reagan years, many conservative "fans" are giving up before next year's "super bowl."

They believe, after only eight months of GOP control of the House and Senate for the first time in four decades, that because things are not moving along as quickly as they would like, it is time to trash the two-party system and throw the long ball in the direction of an independent or unknown.

This would be a disaster most liberal politicians and their soul mates in the big media would love to see happen. It is why they are fueling the discontent and covering the airwaves and the front pages with stories about retiring New Jersey Democratic Sen. Bill Bradley and the political health noncandidate, retired Gen. Colin Powell.

The New York Times' Michael Wines warns ominously that Bradley's decision not to run has nothing to do with the fact that he barely squeaked through in 1990 with 50 percent of the vote against Christine Todd Whitman (who won 47 percent and three years later became New Jersey's governor), and that he probably wouldn't win if he ran again. No, Wines warns, Bradley's retirement is an indication that



the Democratic Party is "sick" and that Republicans have been infected by the Democrats' virus.

The only way to disprove that point is to elect a Republican President next year while the GOP maintains control of Congress. Then, if things don't improve, one might reasonably consider alternatives to the two-party system.

The Washington Post's E.J. Dionne says that Sen. Bob Dole should ignore his tie with Sen. Phil Gramm in last weekend's Iowa "straw poll" and "listen to Bill Bradley."

Dionne claims that the "core worries of the electorate in 1995 are essentially the same as they were in 1992, and they are not rooted in ideology." What are they rooted in then?

Ideology — visionary theorizing, a systematic body of concepts about human life or culture — is behind all ideas, and ideas fuel government policies. To say that ideology doesn't matter is to say elections don't matter and, in fact, that nothing matters. This is nihilism taken to the extreme.

It is also the force behind the media-driven boomlet for Powell. The press and inside-the-Beltway crowd are fascinated by Powell, precisely because they don't know what he believes. They are thrilled not only with the un-

known noncandidate, but the possibility of a candidate who is ideologically vacuous.

Powell is admired because of his image, the perfect partner to Bill Clinton, who also appears to believe in nothing. But politics should be about substance. It is the lack of substance that produces cynicism.

The polltakers love to play this game in August when Washington politicians are on vacation. They create hypothetical tickets — Powell and Bradley, Powell and others — but they don't tell us how such a ticket could win 270 electoral votes.

Is this an ingenious plot to derail the Republican revolution at a time when the conservative team has the ball on the one-foot line with the chance to score the winning touchdown?

The opponents — aided by consultants, polltakers and media wizards — want the Republicans to forfeit the game, which they believe should belong to Democrats and liberals.

It took four decades to blout our wonderful system of governance of this image, more than one or two years to streamline it into one more responsive to the people.

Republicans need to forget the noise from the sidelines, seize the ideological ball and run it up the middle for the decisive score.

If they can't, their chances of getting back in the game any time soon will be virtually eliminated, and liberals will have won another one — without scoring a point.

Poor harvest deals latest blow to struggling Russian farmers

KRIVITSY, Russia (AP) — The Lenin's Path collective farm has kept its name, but lost its way.

On the gently rolling farmland about 30 miles southeast of Moscow, its dwindling work force is still harvesting grain, milking cows and digging potatoes.

But production is down. There are chronic shortages of money. Market pressures are stripping away from the farmers' Soviet-era sense of security.

And this year, to add to their problems, farmers suffered a drought that could result in Russia's worst grain harvest in three decades.

million tons, Moscow imported 3.3 million to 4.4 million tons. Government grain reserves are believed low, but experts say the state has cash to buy grain if necessary — even at current high world prices.

At the Lenin's Path farm, where the grain harvest dropped by 25 percent this year, people don't worry about starving. But they fear deepening poverty.

Lenin's Path, which has 6,348 acres under cultivation, remains almost totally dependent on the state to buy its products. Virtually all of its 1,980 tons of grain this year, for example, will be sold to a nearby state processing plant.

But the state is paying less these days, farm workers say, while the cost of fuel, transportation, pesticides and equipment are up.

"They keep telling us things will be better, but they don't. And they won't!" shouted Valentina Koltsova, 46, as she chipped away at a mountain of oats with a shovel, feeding it into a noisy sorting machine.

Grain harvests have real and symbolic importance in Russia, where Soviet leaders trumpeted crop figures as a measure of the nation's vigor.

The drought this year has only worsened the sense of stagnation, even despair, in Russian farming. And with parliamentary elections in December, farmers' problems also pose a political challenge for the government.

"The entire old system broke down, and the new one hasn't arrived yet," said Tatyana Korkina, chairman of the farm's trade union committee. "There's no stability. We're much poorer. We can't keep up with the prices around us."

The vast majority of Russian farmland is still farmed collectively, although private farming has been more efficient and, according to Abdulsabirov, accounts for at least 35 percent of produce.

Estimates of this year's grain harvest vary. First Deputy Agriculture Minister Magomedtagir Abdulsabirov said it could drop as low as 73.7 million tons — the poorest since 1965, which saw 72.9 million tons.

Russia might have to import grain, he said, though not "enormous" amounts.

Last year, with a tepid harvest of 89.4

Farm leaders oppose moves to allow the free sale of farmland because they say peasants would be thrown off the land by speculators. Noting that many countries subsidize farming, they urge more state support for collectives.

Government economists, however, say the state cannot afford to subsidize the huge, inefficient collectives without printing more money and unleashing new rounds of inflation.

"We are storing 10 times less (grain) than six or seven years ago," Lenin's Path chairman Nikolai Chernyakov said.

His agronomists blame the drought for this year's shortfall, but note that production has declined throughout recent years. Milk production, they said, has dropped from 3.9 gallons per cow to 2.9 gallons because the animals are not fed as much.

Salaries have dropped too. The average pay, says Korkina, is 270,000 rubles a month per family — about \$60.

Some people are leaving: Lenin's Path now has 485 people, compared with 630 a few years ago.

And many of those remaining work second jobs. Tractor drivers commute to Moscow construction sites. Korkina is hoping her son, now away at college, will return to the farm, but notes, "Kids don't want to work for this kind of money."

Farm workers' private plots remain a key to survival.

"I'd like to return to how we lived back then," said the worker Koltsova, reminiscing about Soviet days, when goods were scarce but more affordable.

"We could buy food, furniture, clothes, everything. Now I can barely buy bread and milk."

Thousands spent began returning to the camps at Bukavu and Uvira, and started rebuilding the huts of plastic sheeting and sticks that had been destroyed or torn down, said Fernando Del Mundo, a U.N. spokesman in Geneva.

There was no formal agreement ending the evictions, but U.N. officials in Goma said they were optimistic one would be reached when the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees, Sadako Ogata, meets with Zairian government officials in Kinshasa next week.

Zaire stops forced expulsions of refugees

—GOMA, Zaire (AP) — Zairian troops stopped forcing refugees from Rwanda and Burundi to go back to their turbulent homelands Thursday. Reassured, thousands emerged from hiding and returned to their refugee camp homes of sticks and plastic sheeting.

It was unclear what motivated Zaire to stop the evictions or how long the suspension would last. But the halt and return of the refugees who had bolted from the camps this week with scant food or water, eased fears of a new humanitarian crisis.

The evictions began abruptly Saturday, when Zairian soldiers entered the sprawling camps in eastern Zaire and forced residents at gun-

point to board buses or cross the borders on foot. Some refugee huts were set afire, and there were unconfirmed reports of rape and theft by the soldiers.

By Thursday, more than 13,000 people had been driven home. But some 173,000 fled into the countryside to escape the soldiers carrying out the expulsion order. Aid officials feared new outbreaks of disease and starvation like the one that killed 50,000 people when 1.2 million Rwandan refugees fled to Goma last year.

After hearing that the expulsions had stopped, aid workers went with loudspeakers into the hills to coax the refugees back.

No easy way to salvage shaky U.S.-China ties

confound American expectations of reform.

BEIJING — When Harry Wu crossed into bleak northwestern China two months ago, the human rights activist stepped into the political landscape of deteriorating Sino-U.S. relations.

Wu's arrest at the border on June 19 put a human face on the troubled bilateral relationship and deep-seated ideological differences between the two nations.

A Chinese court Thursday morning sentenced Wu to 15 years in prison for spying. Hours later, he was expelled from the country, according to the government-run Xinhua news agency.

His expulsion could mitigate the damage to Sino-American relations — described by Xinhua on Wednesday as at their "lowest ebb" since 1979. But domestic political battles in both capitals are likely to block any further improvement.

An American undersecretary of state, Peter Tarnoff, travels to Beijing today to try to arrest the slide in relations. Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Chen Jian said China hopes the visit will be a "concrete step forward."

Sino-U.S. ties began faltering after China's military crushed pro-democracy demonstrations in 1989. While much of the Communist world moved toward democracy in the next few years, China continued to suppress dissent, jail activists and

Against the backdrop of mutual distrust, arguments flared over human rights, trade and arms control.

In May, relations worsened further when the White House allowed the president of Taiwan, the island China regards as a renegade province, to attend a college reunion in the United States.

The White House decision, made over Chinese objections, unleashed bitter official denunciations of the United States for trying to contain China's aspirations as a regional power.

As China sees it, Washington has blocked its entry to the World Trade Organization, carped about sales of arms and nuclear technology while carrying on its own lucrative arms trade and encouraged anti-Beijing activists in Tibet, Taiwan and China.

To hard-liners in the Chinese leadership, Harry Wu was part of the U.S. plot because his U.S. passport identified him as "Peter H. Wu," a name he rarely used. Chinese officials called it an illegal alias.

Any short-term improvement rested on how Chinese authorities handled Wu's jail term and expulsion. The United States pressed for him to be expelled on humanitarian grounds.

The quick expulsion may allow first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton to attend the U.N. women's conference in Beijing this September, something China's leaders are believed to want.

Analysis

In the long run, however, both nations are governed by leaders who place domestic concerns ahead of foreign policy.

President Clinton faces an uphill battle for re-election in November 1996 after his Democrats lost control of Congress in January. His China policy will be constrained by pro-human rights Democrats whose support he needs and pro-Taiwan Republican challengers he must defeat.

At the same time, China's leaders are waiting to succeed the frail 91-year-old Deng Xiaoping. He has kept rival party factions in check and guided China's economic reforms for the past 17 years, but he is too ill to take part in policy making.

Neither Communist Party chief Jiang Zemin nor Premier Li Peng are believed to have sufficient support within the party and government to take bold positions. They need to woo the powerful military and security forces, where suspicion of the United States and its intentions are strongest.

Women's conference attendees greeted with chaos, confusion

BEIJING (AP) — "Equality, development and peace" is the slogan of the U.N. World Conference on Women, but hosts and guests alike are picking a fourth word to describe the impending event: chaotic.

Housing is not ready. No one has schedules. Small groups of women are wandering around the airport, looking in vain for their greeting parties.

The first women delegates to the official conference and the companion Non-Governmental Organizations Forum are arriving to find Beijing still in the final throes of difficult preparations.

"We had a letter promising they would take us from the airport but when we came yesterday we waited three hours," said Alicia de Lucio, member of a delegation of 40 Argentine women. Worse yet, the group learned its living quarters won't be ready for days.

If the visitors are confused, the hosts are nervous.

"Chaotic" is the word most residents of Beijing use to sum up their expectations for the conferences, and they aren't thinking of mixed-up hotel reservations.

Officials and ordinary Chinese alike have been warned to expect traffic

chaos, social chaos and just plain disruptive behavior by the estimated 35,000-40,000 foreign women.

A widely circulated rumor recited by many in Beijing as fact holds that the foreign delegates to the meeting of activist organizations, which opens Wednesday, plan to march in the nude. The Chinese are not sure why, but many say with confidence that such marches occur at all U.N. conferences.

Many also believe that most of the activist women are lesbians or prostitutes, both groups looked down upon in Chinese society.

So widespread are these rumors that some observers suspect authorities started them to discredit the women and undermine the impact of any protests they might stage against China's human rights record, one-child limit or nuclear testing.

Similarly, China is believed to have insisted the activists' meeting be held in Hualuoru, 90 minutes from downtown Beijing, so that few Chinese would be exposed to the women's debates, handouts and other trappings of democracy.

The government-controlled media have reported nothing about the issues the women plan to discuss. The focus is on China's logistical preparations

and on admonishing Chinese to counterbalance the expected foreign chaos.

"Greet the Women's Conference With Fine Order," instructs a long red banner with Chinese characters hung beside a street sweeper.

As it does whenever important foreigners visit, China has adopted a two-pronged strategy: put on a welcoming face while tightening security.

Crews have begun to decorate sidewalks with 1 million pots of zinnias, cockscomb and coleus. They've draped lanterns with colorful silk flags bearing the conference logo and refurbished hundreds of public toilets.

Soldiers are clipping and weeding roadsides and carting away litter. Street committees are instructing Beijing residents to take the laundry in from their balconies and keep apartment hallways free of clutter — just in case women delegates come to visit.

Meanwhile, police have arrested or sent out of Beijing most local dissidents, lest they try to lobby the women. They also have expelled disabled beggars and thousands of migrant workers from the countryside.

They are creating a wall of security around the women's hotels and meeting places to keep out non-participants, including reporters.

OSLO, Norway (AP) — A father who smacked his 4-year-old daughter on the bottom ended up feeling a sting in his own back pocket when police ordered him to pay a \$470 fine.

Norway's strict child protection laws bar corporal punishment, even in the privacy of a family's home. Violations are punishable by fines.

Ove Brudevoll, police spokesman

in the town of Kristiansund, said the 30-year-old father, whose name was not released, admitted spanking his daughter in May because she disobeyed him at home.

"It caused a small bruise, which is how it came to the attention of the police, and was investigated," Brudevoll said in a telephone interview Thursday. He would not say who notified the police.

He said the spanking did not require medical attention.

Quayle frets over GOP's handicap

SUN VALLEY — Former Vice President Dan Quayle says he'll "work hard to make sure Bill Clinton goes back to Arkansas in November of 1996."

But he's warning fellow Republicans not to underestimate the current White House occupant.

"As an incumbent, (Clinton) has a distinct advantage," the former vice president said Thursday. "He's going to be harder to beat than a lot of my Republican friends think he is."

Quayle made his comments while golfing with former White House Chief of Staff John Sununu at the Sun Valley Golf Course.

Wearing green and purple plaid shorts, a tan baseball cap, and a blue jacket, Quayle played 18 holes — preparation for today's Danny Thompson Memorial Golf Tournament.

Earlier this year, Quayle said he wouldn't be a candidate for the presidency in 1996. Thursday, he said he's still comfortable with that decision.

"I see no reason for me to go back and reconsider my decision at this point. (But) I've had a lot of friends and supporters from around the country who encouraged me to reconsider," Quayle added.

As vice president, Quayle was ridiculed by late-night comedians and hounded by the press. And sometimes, he said, he felt like former Vice President John Nance Garner, who said the job isn't worth a bucket of warm spit.

"At times, that was a charitable definition of the office," Quayle said. This is Quayle's first trip to Sun Valley since 1987, when he was still a little-known Indian senator. But the Hoosier says he's fond of the Wood River Valley.

"People like it in the summer here. They like it in the wintertime. Why leave?" he said.

Quayle, his brother-in-law Tom Worthcott, Sununu, and Mission Hills County Club General Manager Nancy Aaronson hit the course early Thursday, despite chilly weather and light rain.

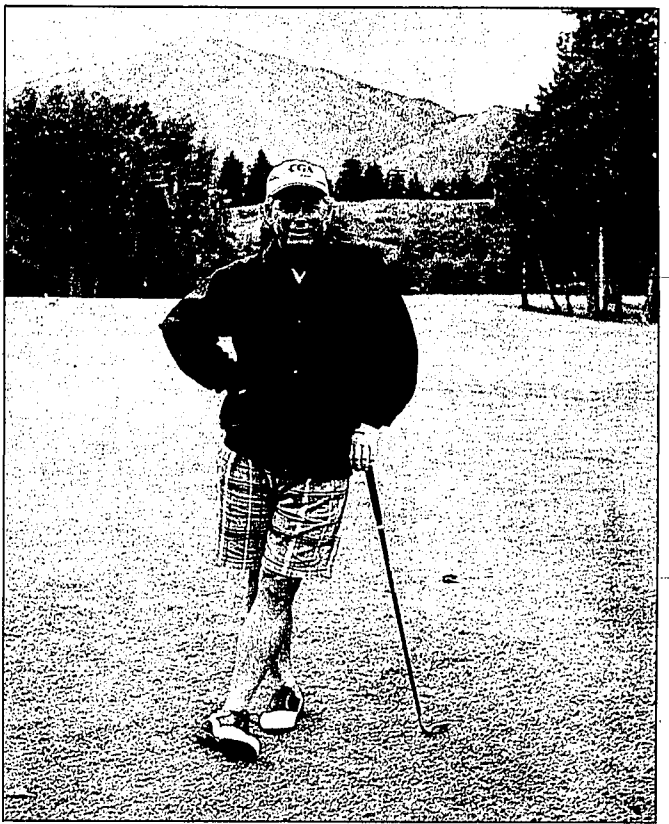
They played slowly, admiring the scenery and the million dollar homes that overlook the course.

The former vice president offered golfing tips to Sununu and demonstrated golf strokes for Worthcott. But Sununu struggled to keep up with the veep.

Does the weather hurt Sununu's play? "Everything hurts me," he said gruffly, then smiled.

At the fourth hole, Quayle paused to ask about a former senator's colleague. "How's country who encouraged me to reconsider," Quayle said.

Princess Mine cleanup tackled

FAIRFIELD — Hazardous waste specialists entered the processing mill at the Princess Blue Ribbon mine Thursday, checking for toxic or explosive gases in the first step of what is expected to be a \$500,000 reclamation effort.

Clad in rubber suits and breathing from tanks the compressed air, three employees of S.I. McStey Inc. of Boise took the first step toward cleaning up the mess on federal land in Camas County. Nothing ominous was detected in the drab mill building, but the probe was cut short when one of the breathing devices failed.

S.I. McStey is under contract to the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, but American taxpayers will wind up footing the bill, said Tim Fuller, environmental protection specialist with the BLM in Shoshone.

The first phase of the clean-up entails sorting out the chemicals inside metal barrels, then storing them in sturdy metal barrels; the barrels will be left at the mill because there isn't enough budget money to remove them, Fuller said Thursday.

The barrels will be hauled away for

disposal in the next fiscal year if enough money is available, he said.

By far the biggest aspect of the cleanup job will be extensive soil stabilization and revegetation. Large swaths of coarse, granitic soil are sliding away near the mill; steep banks have eroded and a 20-foot-deep gully has gouged the slope like a ragged wound.

The dirt work could begin in the next fiscal year if budget money is available, Fuller said.

The mill, located on an arid hillside about 13 miles northeast of Fairfield, went belly-up after a poorly located tailings pond burst in 1990. For days, a torrent of chocolate-colored muck flowed into Beaver Creek, then Willow Creek, then Camas Creek before entering Magic Reservoir.

A tangle of lawsuits followed and the mill operator, Precious Metals Technology Inc., abandoned the site in 1991. Its president, Phil Cash, lives in the Yukon province of Canada, Fuller said.

The Princess Blue ribbon mine was established 80 years ago, but it passed through a succession of owners, Fuller said. It sat idle for decades until rising gold prices and advancements in cyanide-leaching technology prompted

Windows 95 meets tame rush in valley

TWIN FALLS — The man who supervises the computer system at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center didn't rush out to buy Windows 95 for the hospital's computers on Thursday.

But that doesn't mean he hasn't bought a copy for his own.

"We're not going to risk it here until the bugs are out," said Dave Garets, the hospital's chief information officer. "But I'm looking forward to trying it at home."

Windows 95, Microsoft Corp.'s \$89.95 shrink-wrapped, next-generation personal computer operating system, opened amid a stampede of hype worldwide on Thursday. But the rush was more muted in the Magic Valley, where there's not yet a computer in every basement.

"I've installed a couple (Windows 95) today," said Ruben Miller, owner of Compusource in Twin Falls. "Interest has been pretty steady."

Bob Burwell, who runs The Computer Depot in downtown Twin Falls, and Dave Wilks, who manages Software Etc. in the Magic Valley Mall, both said Windows 95 was moving in their stores on Thursday, although Wilks referred further questions to Software Etc.'s corporate office in Texas.

Windows 95, easily the most famous computer product ever produced, thanks to the marketing clout of Microsoft and its founder, Bill Gates, is designed to supplant Gates' current software, which runs out of 10 PCs in the world.

Although the release of Windows 95 has been delayed repeatedly, anticipation has built all summer for what's being touted as software for the masses — easy to use and packing enough memory to accommodate the increasing demands of ever-more-sophisticated programs.

"For the casual user, it's going to be a real boon," Garets said. "It's ideal for running CD-ROM programs, and you won't get those annoying little messages that say 'No more memory.'"

For more sophisticated computer operators — and the so-called multi-application users — the jury is still out on Windows 95. First-generation Microsoft issues in the past have been plagued by various glitches.

"I noticed a few things just doing the installations I did today," Miller said. "Nothing that would really

Chenoweth makes few waves at Idaho AFL-CIO meeting

BOISE (AP) — Conservative Rep. Helen Chenoweth had a somewhat muted meeting with union members in Boise Thursday evening.

It was the first time the freshman representative has agreed to meet with state union leaders, and she admitted she wasn't as familiar with organized labor as she was with logging and mining.

But she said she wanted to work with union people in solving problems.

"I want to work with you and understand your problems," she said.

Hours earlier, Randy Ambuehl, president of the Idaho AFL-CIO, said Idaho's working people are being hurt by the Republicans' budget-cutting efforts and GOP congressmen Mike Crapo and Chenoweth are part of it.

"We need to tell our congresspeople to stop balancing the budget and stop giving tax breaks to the wealthy, on the backs of working people," he told a news conference.

"They are singing the direct national Democratic Party line," said Chenoweth press secretary Chris

Bersher. "Helen Chenoweth was during the campaign and remains now 100 percent behind the working people of Idaho."

As part of a \$1 million national campaign against 20 Republicans, ads started running in Idaho this week attacking Chenoweth for her recent votes in Congress. Ambuehl said organized labor spent about \$9,500 for 85 Idaho commercials which will continue through Labor Day.

During the campaign, Ambuehl said Chenoweth said repeatedly that she was for good jobs for working people. "We don't believe she has been living up to what she said," he said.

Later, in the meeting with Chenoweth, he brought up some of the same issues but didn't get outright opposition from the Republican.

Ambuehl said he wanted Chenoweth to know that organized labor wasn't made up of big union bosses but of working people with families. "We wanted you to know that we aren't some big monster in the distance," he said.

Chenoweth was questioned about this privatizing the U.S. Postal Service, cuts in funding for worker protection and safety programs, cuts in Medicaid and repeal of the Davis Bacon Act.

In most cases she didn't outright oppose the union stance, but said she wanted to work with them. She said she hasn't made up her mind yet on privatizing the Postal Service.

"The big problem now is big government. What you want and what I want is efficiency at all levels," she said.

Retired Amalgamated Sugar Co. worker Karen Griggs asked Chenoweth to sign a "contract with senior citizens," much as she supported the Republicans' "Contract With America," protecting the interests of senior citizens.

Griggs said retired people can't afford to pay several thousand dollars more per year for medical coverage.

Chenoweth said she would either sign the "contract" with seniors or return it to them with an explanation why she couldn't support it.

Nevada may be named in land lawsuit

LAS VEGAS (AP) — The state of Nevada has attempted to steer clear of the land rights lawsuit between Nye County and the U.S. Justice Department, but it appears that stance may have to change.

The federal government has filed a motion asking the state to be named as a co-defendant in the lawsuit.

But Nevada state officials have said they don't agree with the defendant — Nye County. The rural Nevada county filed resolutions declaring control over 10 million acres of federal land, and the federal government is seeking to nullify those resolutions.

The two sides argued their cases before U.S. District Judge Lloyd George here last month, who then asked them to file supplemental briefs explaining the state's role in the lawsuit.

The Justice Department filed a motion in response to George's order.

Although the state has kept its distance from the dispute, Gov. Bob Miller has said he thinks it would be costly for the state to take over management of federal lands.

A Nevada law from the 1970s declares the 48 million acres of federal land in Nevada as state-owned, but it has never been enforced. The county supremacy movement, called the Sagebrush Rebellion, is basing their defense in part on that piece of legislation.

John W. Howard is an attorney with the Los Angeles-based Individual Rights Foundation and is representing Nye County. He said his organization offered its legal expertise to the attorney general's office should Nevada be named as a defendant, but attorney General Frankie Sue Del Papa refused the assistance Tuesday.

"It seems to me somebody might want to consider impeachment if (Del Papa) goes against the will of the state," Howard said.

A Nevada law approved, it could place the state in a perplexing position, said Senior Deputy Attorney General Wayne Howle. The state could be named as a defendant, although its arguments could echo those of the plaintiffs.

A response from George isn't expected for a couple of weeks.

Hospital pact means vets can get catheters

BOISE (AP) — When Navy veteran Terry Noble had a cardiac catheterization in May, he traveled to the Mayo Clinic in Lake City without his wife nearby.

He had to leave Idaho because Boise's Veterans Administration Medical Center did not perform cardiac "caths" here, and it does not pay for loved ones to travel with patients.

The administration and St. Luke's Regional Medical Center are changing that. Cardiac cath is now being done on vets at St. Luke's in a new laboratory paid for by the administration and the hospital.

The venture also will save taxpayers \$240,000 every year to send about 100 veteran patients out of state.

The procedure entails inserting a catheter tube in a vein or artery to obtain images of blood vessels and the heart.

It was down there three weeks. You're about your family," said Noble, 50.

St. Luke's also can study heart valves, perform cardiac biopsies and angioplasty, using a balloon to removed blockages in blood vessels.

Under the agreement, the administration and St. Luke's each paid half of the \$1.2-million equipment cost.

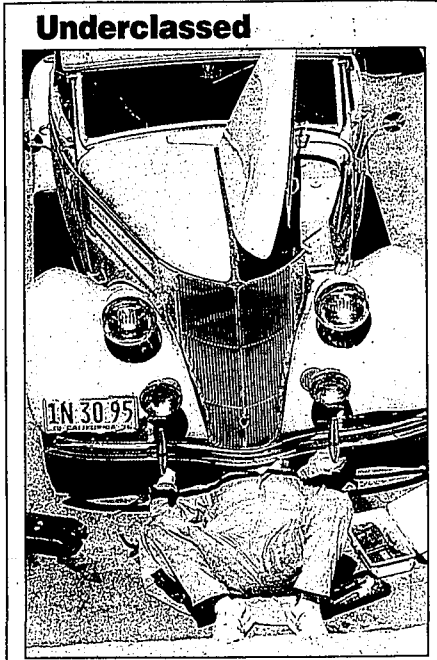
U of I vice president's son breaks back in fall

County official files for bankruptcy for 2nd time

KELLOGG (AP) — The woman who collects and invests Shoshone County taxpayers' money has declared bankruptcy for the second time, facing more than \$86,000 in debt.

Federal court documents showed the debt of County Treasurer Tamara House includes more than \$6,100 in state and federal income taxes. She earns \$29,000 a year.

"There's some things you have to do," said House, former president of the Idaho Association of County Treasurers. "This has been a personal embarrassment for me."

House, 43, blames the bankruptcy on her ex-husband, Lane, who she says didn't pay financial support promised when they divorced two years ago.

But Lane House, a gold miner at Winnemucca, Nev., said he made no promises to pay support and his ex-wife still owes him \$8,000 from the sale of their home. Court documents put the figure at \$6,291.

The real problem, House said, was that his ex-wife insisted on buying expensive clothing and sports equipment for the children and herself.

"It was because of her stature in the community," House said. "She never knew when to quit buying."

The couple declared bankruptcy in 1984, facing nearly \$98,000 in debts when Lane House, a miner, lost his job.

In May, a judge ordered \$505 per month deducted from Tamara House's earnings to pay creditors. Her house was sold, cutting \$45,000 from the debt.

The treasurer said her financial

problems have nothing to do with her ability to handle public money. "When I make a decision at home, sometimes you don't always think of all of the ramifications," she said. "When I'm dealing with the county, I protect the taxpayers."

The county's independent auditor said the county has no serious problems. "Overall, they're in good shape," said Jo Elen.

House was elected last year with 65 percent of the vote. She's been the Shoshone County treasurer for 14 years and before that was deputy auditor for six years.

Oil, gas groups contribute heavily to Idaho politicians

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Oil and gas political action committees have given more than \$212,000 to members of the Idaho congressional delegation — even though the fossil fuel industry has little presence in the state.

Project Vote Smart, a nonpartisan political watchdog organization, said that was enough to make the oil and gas industry the top spending political action group in Idaho politics.

An aide to Sen. Larry Craig says the numbers aren't little.

"They have a natural interest in what goes on in Idaho, even though it's tangential," said Greg Casey, Craig chief of staff.

Beyond oil and gas, the Project Vote Smart study found Idaho's delegation raising a relatively small amount of money for campaigns.

Craig, Sen. Dirk Kempthorne and Rep. Mike Crapo each raised more money from special interest groups than from individuals.

PACs generally contribute more money to incumbents than to challengers. Critics of the system say the industry and special-interest money gives incumbents an unfair advantage.

The largest donations went to Craig, who served five terms in the House and won a Senate seat in 1990. He got about \$900,000 from special interest groups, including \$111,758 from the oil and gas industry and \$67,650 from mining.

The two industries together made about 10 percent of Craig's contributions. "That's 10 percent of his money," Casey said. "Big deal."

To Boise businessman and prospec-

tive political opponent Walt Minnick, the numbers aren't a small deal. Minnick is considering a Senate run in 1996, and wonders whether he can raise enough money to compete with Craig.

"He's a very good friend of big oil and big mining," said Minnick, former chairman of TJ International, a Boise wood products firm. "It would be surprising if he weren't (big contributors) ... But that doesn't necessarily mean he's representing Idaho."

Craig is member of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, which handles mining and energy policy issues.

Kempthorne received about \$74,000 from oil and gas political action committees. He won the Senate seat in 1992.

Kempthorne spokesman Mark Snyder declined comment on the survey.

Crapo relied heavily on special interest groups to finance his second campaign after he won the House seat in 1992.

Crapo said he tries to take a broad-based approach to fund-raising, but it was easier for him to raise money from political action committees in 1994. Idaho Republicans poured their money into other races, such as governor, because Crapo faced only token opposition.

Crapo's \$511,000 for 1993-94 is about average for a congressional campaign.

Craig and Kempthorne's Senate spending wasn't much by national standards.

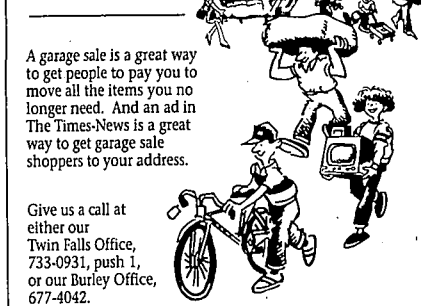

Softball brawl causes 3 suspensions

BURLEY — Three men involved in a ballpark brawl in Burley in July have been suspended from the Mini-Cassia Men's Softball League, and a fourth is charged with aggravated battery.

Phillip Raymond Gerhardt Jr., 26, pleaded not guilty Thursday in 5th District Court in Cassia County to aggravated battery charges in connection with wielding a knife during the fight, which started over an illegal player in the Mini-Cassia Men's Softball League.

Gerhardt faces a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine.

The fight, at Freedom Park on July 18, began when a league official said a player on Castro Trucking and Auto Wrex Plus's team was not on the roster — and therefore illegal. Castro Trucking was playing Bud Light.

League board member Christoval Mascorro Ramirez, 28, of Heyburn, who pointed out the player discrepancy, was involved in the fight and was suspended two years from the league, said league chairman Rodney Fairchild.

Castro Trucking's assistant coach Raymond Chapa will be suspended for one year and player Jess Santiago Gonzales Jr., 27, of Burley, will be suspended for two years, Fairchild said.

Gonzales also has been charged with battery in 5th District Magistrate court.

Gonzales, Chapa and Ramirez have filed league appeals, Fairchild said.

A league grievance board decided the trio's penalties, he said.

Gerhardt is not a league player, he was a spectator at the game who jumped into the fight wielding a knife at Ramirez and player Clyde Dwight Jr., 19, of Hazelton, who had tried to break up the fight, according to initial Cassia County Sheriff Department reports.

Precious Metals to begin building its processing mill in 1987.

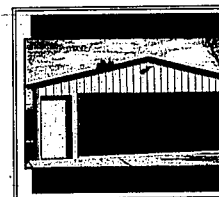
Crushed ore was dumped into five 1,000-gallon vats containing a weak cyanide solution that lifted — or "leached" — gold and silver from the ore. A series of mechanical, chemical and electrical processes were used to extract the metals from the solution.

Though Precious Metals is defunct, Interior Department lawyers are still hunting for "potentially responsible parties" who can be pursued in court, Fuller said.

"We're looking for ways to deal with this without leaving the American taxpayer holding the bag," Fuller said. The mine's operators posted only \$9,000 in BLM reclamation bonds, he said; no state bonds were posted.

Now that the mine and mill are out of business, the area is a ramshackle scene of neglect and abandonment. A collapsing shed holds a jumble of mechanical parts, while old motors, pumps, screens and a conveyor belt rust away in the sun; several blue oil drums lie on a hillside below one of the tailings ponds.

Over the years, the Princess Blue Ribbon mine produced roughly \$6.5 million worth of gold and silver for its operators — who paid nothing for it under terms of America's 123-year-old Hardrock Mining Law.

Large ranchers would gain most from GOP bill

BOISE (AP) — Small, family ranches are in danger of being squeezed out by the Clinton administration, Republican Sens. Larry Craig and Pete Domenici spell out in their grazing legislation.

But an analysis of federal grazing permits in Idaho shows the biggest threat is held by a few: 14 percent of the ranches in the state have rights to 70 percent of the grazing property leased from the Bureau of Land Management.

"The large operations stand to gain the most from Domenici's bill, because they will survive," said Karl Hess Jr., of the Cato Institute, a conservative think tank. "The smaller ranches are simply going to disappear."

The administration's regulations went into effect Monday, after Republicans were unable to head them off before the congressional recess. They set goals to protect the rangeland and give recreationists and other users a louder voice.

The Craig-Domenici legislation would repeal the administration's regulations. The Idaho and New Mexico lawmakers want to decree grazing the primary use of public rangelands. Ranchers who do not graze their allotments for two years in a row would risk losing their permits.

Hess said the measure could hurt small operations because it would discourage activities other than livestock. Potentially lucrative

uses, such as raising wildlife for hunting, would be made more difficult, he said.

"Under Domenici's bill, all a rancher can do is make cows," Hess said. "Given that it's hard to make money raising cows, the bill's a recipe for small operations to go out of business."

Craig said his legislation does not make grazing the exclusive use of federal rangelands. Ranchers can apply for extensions to take land out of grazing for a time. He said the important thing is to block the administration.

"I've always been an advocate of the small rancher, and, in crafting the Rangeland Management Act, my goal was to make it so the small rancher wasn't so encumbered by

regulations that he or she would ultimately be put out of business," Craig said.

But the trend is toward larger ranches.

A 1992 General Accounting Office report found 16 percent of BLM permit holders nationwide have 76 percent of the grazing rights. They are measured in animal unit months — the amount a cow and calf eat in a month.

"What we found is that there's a small number of people that control a large number of AUMs," report author Brent Hutchison said.

"The more AUMs you have, the more impact any kind of legislation will have on you." The trend comes as ranching costs outpace beef prices. The small ranches often will sell

to larger operations to avoid bankruptcy, Idaho Cattle Association vice president Bob Sears said.

"Small ranchers could not afford to stay in business," Sears said. "They were fortunate to have Simplot and others there to buy them out."

"The ability to take your cattle onto public lands during the summer is as critical for the owner of one cow as it is for the owner of 10,000."

Sears' group is fighting Clinton's gambit. The number of Idaho cattle operations has fallen by half since 1965, from 25,000 to 12,500, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reports. Idaho cattle, however, have increased by 180,000 to 1.78 million in that time.

Detective Fuhrman goes from star witness to pariah

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A summer ago, Mark Fuhrman was basking in the spotlight of the O.J. Simpson case.

Prosecutors made the detective their star witness. Women around the country wanted his phone number.

This summer, the just-retired Fuhrman doesn't seem to have a friend.

Simpson's lawyers have cast him as a lying, racist thug, using Fuhrman's own tape recorded words to a North Carolina screenwriter to support their frame-up theory.

The Los Angeles Police Commission is investigating him. Police Chief Willie Williams says the Fuhrman matter is demoralizing his department.

Under a cloud of perjury accusations, he has hired a defense attorney who says Fuhrman may invoke his Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination if called back to the stand.

And what of the prosecutors who made Fuhrman a star? There is the greatest dilemma of all, according to legal experts. They are stuck with Fuhrman's testimony — or are they?

"If the tapes are as they have been portrayed ... the prosecution can't rehabilitate him," says University of Southern California law professor Erwin Chemerinsky. "What the prosecution then has to do is distance themselves from him so that his taint doesn't affect their case."

The Fuhrman tapes, in which the detective spews racial slurs and advocates police brutality, were recently uncovered by the defense in a bonanza for Simpson's case.

Laura Hart McKinny recorded them over a 10-year period in which she was interviewing police officers for a documentary on the Los Angeles force.

The defense wants to use the tapes to discredit Fuhrman, the detective who testified that he found the bloody glove on Simpson's property.

It was at a preliminary hearing in July 1994 that Fuhrman mesmerized the nation with his tale of scaling the wall to the estate and discovering the glove on a leaf-strewn path behind the guest house.

"My heart started pounding and I realized what I had probably found," Fuhrman said. Authorities contend the dark, reddish leather glove is the mate of the left-handed glove found near the slashed bodies of Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman outside Ms. Simpson's condominium.

The tall, handsome detective whose personnel file was filled with praise for his appearance but also troubling reports of instability was flooded with romantic overtures. Flowers arrived at the courthouse for him. A tabloid dubbed him "the luckiest new star of the Los Angeles Police Department."

Those glory days were short-lived. Reports of racism and misogyny surfaced in the media, and the defense quickly targeted Fuhrman as a central figure

in their conspiracy theory. Lawyers contended he planted the glove — and possibly other evidence — out of hatred for interracial couples and a desire to play a starring role in the Simpson case.

Now there is talk of a possible perjury indictment.

District Attorney Gil Garcetti, arriving at the courthouse Thursday, refused to discuss Fuhrman, saying the prosecution's position on the detective will become clear in court. Garcetti said a five- to 10-day rebuttal can be expected from prosecutors after the tapes are played and the defense rests.

Judge Lance Ito has yet to decide whether jurors will hear any of the tapes. But experts believe that, at a minimum, he will allow portions related to Fuhrman's use of the word "nigger." Fuhrman had denied under oath that he used the slur in the past 10 years.

After the existence of the tapes became public, an investigator working for Fuhrman said the detective had "a mental block" about the conversations and was trying to impress McKinny by sounding "macho." One of Fuhrman's lawyers said the officer was "talking trash," inventing outrageous scenarios to keep the screenwriter interested.

"I can't believe that the jury is going to have anything but total disgust for Mark Fuhrman," says Loyola Law School Professor Stanley Goldman.

He says prosecutors would be well-advised to denounce Fuhrman themselves and argue that the evidence he found is not essential to convict Simpson.

"At a minimum," says Southwestern University law professor Myra Raeder, "the prosecution has to be aware that the glove may simply drop out as evidence" in the minds of jurors.

Prosecutor Marcia Clark has already conceded that Fuhrman used racial epithets on the tapes and said she wasn't trying to paint Fuhrman as a hero. But her argument is that the detective never had the opportunity to plant evidence.

Prosecutors claim Simpson carried the glove back from the killing scene and dropped it in haste. The defense has suggested that it was Fuhrman who carried the glove from the crime scene to Simpson's estate.

Jurors remain unaware of the potentially explosive Fuhrman evidence. The judge canceled Thursday's session to take care of personal business. He was also believed to be listening to the tapes as he decides whether to let the jury hear them.

Fuhrman remained at his Sandpoint, Idaho, home but is expected to be subpoenaed soon to return to the stand.

Fired officer wants to replace former boss

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A former captain who was fired from the Kootenai County Sheriff's Department has announced he will challenge Sheriff Pierce Clegg's bid for a third term next year.

Thomas H. Dickson's announcement comes three months after he filed suit in U.S. District Court against the sheriff's department and county commissioners over his firing.

Dickson, 60, of Cataldo, contends Clegg is a poor manager who is at the root of low morale among officers. But the head of the Kootenai County Deputy Sheriff's Association said deputies have a good working relationship with Clegg, who fired Dickson in March 1994.

Clegg would not discuss why he fired Dickson, but confirmed he plans to run for re-election in 1996. Both he and Dickson are Republicans.

On Tuesday, Dickson cited a countywide employee survey conducted by the auditor's office in June as a sign that Clegg is ineffective.

"The morale at the sheriff's department continues to be extremely low due to low wages, no training, over management ..." one sheriff's department employee said in the survey.

But Sgt. Dan Soumas, president of the deputies association, said Clegg is well-liked.

"I met with every patrol deputy, except three, on Sunday afternoon and there was an overwhelming support for the sheriff," Soumas said.

WSU keeps ban on overnight dorm visitors

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Washington State University will remain the only state school that does not allow overnight guests in dormitories, Vice Provost Gus Kravvas decided.

Kravvas, the university official who oversees student affairs, went against the recommendations of a special faculty task force that earlier this year recommended allowing visitors to stay in dorms for up to three nights.

"I'm not looking for unanimity anywhere, but there was enough difference of opinion in this regard" to leave the policy unchanged, Kravvas said.

Woman, child killed; 6 hurt by careening car

KETTLE FALLS, Wash. (AP) — A woman and her daughter fishing from a bridge were killed and three other people hospitalized when a Jeep failed to make a curve and slid along a bridge guard rail, the Washington State Patrol said.

The driver was arrested for investigation of vehicular homicide. Nancy Gillespie, 43, of Kettle Falls, and her 15-year-old daughter Jennifer Gillespie were pronounced dead at the scene shortly after the accident at 9:30 p.m. Tuesday.

Gillespie's 12-year-old son John suffered skull and pelvic fractures and was transported to Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane. Relatives requested that his condition not be released, spokesman Tom Sofio said today.

Matthew Garrison, 15, suffered injuries to a leg and hand and cuts to his neck, and David Eberhart, 18, received minor injuries. Both were treated and released from Mount Carmel Hospital in Colville, nursing supervisor Annabelle Finley said today.

The accident occurred when the Gillespies and others were fishing off a bridge about half a mile south of Kettle Falls, located about 70 miles northwest of Spokane.

The driver of the Jeep, David Davis, 38, failed to make a curve in the road and struck the bridge's guard rail, following the rail along the bridge, Washington State Patrol troopers said. The vehicle struck the Gillespies, then traveled about 40 feet, hitting Garrison and Eberhart, who were on bicycles. The Jeep then went over an embankment and hit a tree.

Davis, of Kettle Falls, was booked into the Stevens County Jail for investigation of two counts of vehicular homicide and one count of vehicular assault.

Country stars McBride, McGraw bring acts to Filer

FILER — McBride and McGraw. Sounds like a law firm, doesn't it?

Actually, neither Martina McBride nor Tim McGraw ever wanted to do anything but sing.

And that's exactly what they will do, on Labor Day weekend at the Twin Falls County Fair & Rodeo.

McBride, who hails from tiny Sharon, Kan. (population 200), sings songs like "My Baby Loves Me," "The Time Has Come," "Cheap Whiskey," "That's Me" and "Independence Day" (the Country Music Association Music Video of the Year for 1994).

"Independence Day" — the troubling story of a woman who is trapped in an abusive relationship and declaring her liberation — allowed McBride the opportunity to dedicate some time during tours to speak to young women in schools about domestic violence.

Growing up on a farm, McBride started out singing in her family's band. Seven years ago, she married John McBride, production manager for country music superstar Garth Brooks. To be near her husband on the road, she took a job selling T-shirts on the Garth Brooks tour.

"I've performed a lot, so I had the natural sense of what to do to entertain," she told reporters at the time. "I feel real at home on stage."

Eventually, she built her own show.

McBride is 29 now. She has followed her debut album, "The Time Has Come," with a second album, "The Way That I Am." She just completed her third album, "Wild Angels," with the first single, "Safe in the Arms of Love," making a strong debut on radio.

McBride has also recorded a song with Reba McEntire.

Trisha Yearwood and Linda Davis, entitled "On My Own." And she's recorded a track for a new project, "Amazing Grace — A Country Salute to Gospel."

The McBrides live in Nashville, Tenn., with their baby, Delaney Katharine, born last December. Delaney has gotten lots of press lately, especially since Mom added a baby bus/nursery on wheels to her touring entourage.

Dad goes along, too, as sound engineer.

Tim McGraw is currently basking in lots of metal — country, not heavy.

His "Not a Moment Too Soon" collection has gone triple-platinum, with the title cut on the album locked into No. 1 for two weeks solid. And speaking of solid, McGraw is the only country act of his generation to have two solid Gold Singles — "Indian Outlaw" and "Don't Take the Girl" — from one album.

At age 27, he's the youngest headliner in the history of the Twin Falls Fair.

Six years ago — May 9, 1989 (the day his idol Keith Whitley died of an alcohol overdose), to be exact — McGraw arrived in Nashville with empty pockets, filled only with country music dreams.

His mother, Betty Trimble, was a Florida teen-ager who had a summer romance with New York Mets baseball star



Tug McGraw. After Tim McGraw was born, in 1967 in Delhi, La., his father went on to World Series pitching fame, creating the Mets' "You gotta believe!" rallying cry of 1973. Trimble married farmer/trucker Horace Smith and settled in small town Start, La.

The Smiths eventually divorced, and McGraw's mother told him who his real father is.

He was 11.

"She just felt like it was the right time to tell me," McGraw told reporters. "I have nothing but respect for her, the way she handled her situation. We grew up on food stamps and welfare and stuff like that, on and off, until I was probably 13 or 14 years old. And she never asked Tug for a penny."

Father and son began seeing each other fairly regularly after the boy turned 18. When he turned 22, Tim McGraw dropped out of Northeast Louisiana University to try his luck on (country) Music Row.

He didn't even have a car. He rode in on a Greyhound bus.

"The way I sound is the way I am," he has said. "We lived in a converted hay barn for a year, so I am about as country as you can get."

McGraw's rural upbringing influenced his tunes, like "Give It to Me Strait," "It Doesn't Get Any Countryer Than This" and "Down on the Farm" (eight weeks on the Billboard chart).

Successful tours with country stars like Joe Diffie, Sawyer Brown and Wynonna polished up McGraw's live performances.

McGraw, who's single, still lives in Nashville. But now he has a car.

It's a GMC pickup with dual chrome exhausts, sunroof and all the other trimmings.

He calls it his "Cowboy Cadillac."

Northern Rockies Folk Festival returns to roots

Even the kids should have a little something to do. On Saturday, the Rainbow Theatre will host children's programming and activities. There will be a puppet performance, folk dancing

demonstrations, and a festive drumming.

The folk festival's theme, "The Past, Present, and Future of Blaine County," is in conjunction with the centennial celebration of the county. Santaria, Mardi Gras or "Candyman: Farewell to the Flesh." Given the choice, we'll take animal sacrifice and a hangerover.

But for fans of the original "Candyman" and there must be some, or they wouldn't have made a sequel - prepare for the same amount of incongruity and gore, but prepare to make certain reality adjustments. There's the locale, for one thing. Although the original was set in the Cabrini housing project in Chicago - because that's where Candyman's ashes were buried - we are now in New Orleans, where his grave will be discovered late in the film (you can't worry about these things, just go with the flow).

When it opens, the Crescent City is on the verge of Lent - which adds faux spiritual overtones to an overwrought, pedestrian story and schoolteacher Annie Tarrant (Maurice Post lookalike Kelly Rowan) is being sucked into the Candyman myth: Say his name five times in the mirror and he'll appear, hook-handed and bloodthirsty. Well, her father did and died, and now her brother (William O'Leary) has been implicated in a rash of gruesome evictions. In order to assure her young students that Candyman doesn't exist, she repeats his name five times in a schoolroom mirror. Uh oh. (Newsday) (Hastings, Old Towne Video, Blockbuster, Video West)

"Tom & Viv" (R) - Ostensibly a film about the disastrous marriage of poet T.S. Eliot and his first wife, Vivien Haigh-Wood Eliot, this is really about one of the worst cases of menstrual distress in the annals of Anglo-American literature.

The reductively sketchy and only fitfully compelling scenario for "Tom & Viv," written by Michael Hastings and Adrian Hodges from Hastings' play and directed in a picturesque but choppy fashion by Brian Gilbert, is narrated portentously from the quasi-reliable perspective of Viv's brother, Maurice (Tim Dutton).

In the "Oh, if we had only known!" tradition of guilt-ridden memoirs, it implies that poor Viv (enacted with manic zeal by Miranda Richardson) could have had a much nicer life - if only a doctor had properly diagnosed her premenstrual syndrome, and administered a few extra hormones.

And if only her Anglophile hubby, Eliot (portrayed by Willem Dafoe as if he had an umbrella up his nose, instead of on his arm) wasn't such a social-climbing snuffed snit.

Unfortunately for Viv, the British medical profession didn't have a clue about dealing with "female problems" back in 1914, when she met and charmed "Tom" Eliot, then a young American student at Oxford.
The doctors were still clueless in 1927, when Viv was committed under the insane "Lunacy Act" to a sanatorium, after she pulled a few too many nutty but harmless pranks. (Seattle Times) (Blockbuster, Video West)

'Gump & Co.:' Is life still a box of chocolates?

In a blink, the world's most profitable and popular idiot is back. Forrest Gump.

You know him, you love Tom Hanks as him, and you rented the movie over the weekend — although you saw it twice in the theater last year. And you probably bought Winston Groom's book of the same name and then the spin-off, "Gumpisms: The Wit and Wisdom of Forrest Gump."

We have bought it all.

Now comes Groom with "Gump & Co." (Pocket Books, \$22). The book is the speedy sequel or "extension" to his "Forrest Gump," which has sold about 2 million copies (Japan ate it up). The 1994 movie has grossed more than \$670 million worldwide.

"Take my word for it — don't never let nobody make a movie of your life's story. Whether they get it right or wrong, it don't matter," says Forrest of "Gump & Co." "Problem is, people be comin up to you all the time, askin questions, pokin TV cameras in your face... tellin you what a fine feller you are. Hal!"

Hal Groom says he had to mention the movie in this sequel. The writer has Forrest meeting Hanks in Elaine's, Manhattan's place-to-be-seen. Forrest even sees the movie and thinks of Tom was "pretty good."

How could the writer resist?

"This ain't just some movie. This is a phenomenon," says Groom, chatting by phone from his home in Alabama. He's a day away from leaving for a six-week book tour. "HUSH FORREST, SIT, SIT," he says to his old English Sheep dog in the background.

Groom, 52, dispenses with The Movie reference

on Page 1, then "Gump & Co." hauls off where the book left off. Forrest is still sweeping floors at a strip joint run by Wanda in New Orleans. He's poor, broke and stupid and destined to become the "extension" in another round of current events. Jenny is alive and still married to a salesman named Donald. In the book, Forrest did not get the girl

in the end. He got a stripper.

Jenny is one of Groom's favorite characters. He had plans for her in his sequel. Then, the author saw the movie. Jenny was killed off. "I didn't want to lose her." But you don't mess with Hollywood's Forrest Gump any more than you mess with Hollywood's Rhett Butler, Groom says.

So, he killed off Jenny. In the sequel, her spirit occasionally appears — like a sexy Jimmy Cricket telling Forrest to do the right thing. It's the writer's concession and arguably one of the book's faults.

"People might say this is just pandering to the movie. All right, it is," Groom says. "I don't think it's shameless pandering."

Groom had "another 15 years of history to play with." Trolling for events and people he could pair

with Gump, he asked Esquire to send him the magazine's Dubious Achievement Awards. Friends and strangers suggested inserting Forrest into the O.J. Simpson case or the Oklahoma City bombings. Forrest Situations waiting to happen? The author didn't think so.

Instead, the updated Forrest Gump becomes an encyclopedia salesman with a conscience, the accidental inventor of New Coke, a successful pig farmer, and an aging running back for the New Orleans Saints. Forrest also finds himself at the wheel of the Exxon-Valdez and the rest, as they say, is a news story.

It wouldn't be Gump if there weren't famous cameos: Forrest working for Jim Bakker, then Ollie North. Forrest and buddy Lt. Dan kidnapping Saddam during the Persian Gulf war. Forrest working for a couple of characters named Ivan Boesky and Mike Mulligan, who are jailed for insider trading. Forrest running into a guy named Bill at some place called Whitewater.

Forrest being Forrest.

"The message is you don't have to be rich or famous or even smart to be dignified," Groom says. "This person here is a sort of a hero."

True to Groom's vision, the man with the IQ of 75 spends the new book in and out of jail, where Forrest is visited and scolded by his son, Little Forrest. Father & Son wind up making millions in the oyster business.

The End.

"I'm putting this to rest," says Groom. "No more Forrest for a long time."

'Memnoch' loses Lestat's usual snappy bite

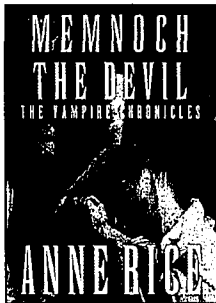
Ordinarily, the vampire Lestat lives in New Orleans. In "Memnoch The Devil" (Alfred A. Knopf, \$25), Lestat heads for more ethereal quarters. First he goes to Heaven. Then he goes to Hell, with a pit stop in purgatory. He argues with the devil and he walks with God. He does the complete Holy Land tour with luxury accommodations and guides who know the turf.

Reading this novel is like flicking back and forth between the creature feature and the 700 Club.

Lestat, an undead telepathic bisexual blood-sucking zombie with a heart of gold, has appeared in four Anne Rice novels that have come to be known as the "Vampire Chronicles." In them, he is portrayed as the thinking man's vampire. When he isn't jonesing for hemoglobin, he's ruminating about the nature of good and evil.

In this, the fifth and likely final book of the Chronicles, Lestat goes on an interview with the devil.

As the novel begins, Lestat is hunting for dinner. He always selects victims who are evil; when he's on the

sueer takes on the image of an ordinary man and politely introduces himself as the devil — Memnoch to his friends. He says he has been searching for an assistant and wonders if Lestat would be interested in the position; yes, the job is hell, but the perks are terrific.

Although he hasn't exactly been sitting around circling want ads, Lestat is intrigued enough to agree to an all-expenses paid introductory tour of heaven, hell and purgatory. Memnoch introduces Lestat to God, sends him back in time so he can view the crucifixion and explains his version of how the enmity between himself and God evolved.

And wouldn't you know it: Turns out the devil isn't such a bad sort after all. He really has been taking up for mankind all along and doesn't deserve all the bad press he gets. As for God — well, sure, he's got his good points, but in the end he's just a bull-headed CEO, surrounded by yes-men, out of touch with the little people.

Lestat, who would do well to remember that the devil can quote

scripture, listens all too credulously to his Dantesque tour guide.

Rice has always used existing religions and mythologies as a backdrop for her vampire tales, working Egyptian gods and Christian saints into her scenarios about how vampires fit into the netherworld hierarchy. But she usually keeps enough earthly intrigue in her tale to avoid sounding like a Joseph Campbell lecture.

There is certainly enough gore in Memnoch to satisfy a Joe Bob Briggs B-movie buff, with two exploding eyeballs, three fried vampires, beheading fu, burn-in-hell fu and one dead baby. But Lestat spends the bulk of this novel in a passive role, largely mute as the devil shows him around the 'hood.

As always with Rice, her heroic monster confronts ancient questions — why does evil exist, why must we suffer, what happens when we die?

But her proportions are so epic that her dark hero gets lost among them. If Rice really is retiring her flagship zombie, as she implies at the end of this novel, it's puzzling she might play out his last scene as Satan's sidekick.

"Beyond Rangoon," is, however, just that sort of film.

Set in 1988, this intelligent action picture tells the compelling story of Laura Bowman (Patricia Arquette), an American doctor on vacation in Burma.

Laura's sister arranged the trip to help her recover from a personal tragedy. The physician is haunted by the horrific memory of arriving home one day to find her husband and young son murdered.

she may not even hear him. The story really gets going after Laura's passport is stolen. She's stranded in Burma just as civil unrest is whipping up and the brutal government is cracking down.

Perhaps the last tourist in this powder keg of a country, our heroine rather recklessly accepts the offer of a kindly old "unofficial" native guide to have a private tour while waiting to get home.

But almost before Laura knows what has happened, her guide is shot. And with the wounded man in tow, she finds herself on the run from government troops.

After that, it's one narrow escape after another: Bullets, bombs and even a rapist stand between Laura and safety.

What's remarkable about the action scenes in this part of the film is how resolutely straightforward they are. The body count is (by "Die Hard" standards) rather low, the explosions aren't a thousand times more explosive than real ones, and the music doesn't

pump up the volume, either. Yet precisely because the violence is kept on a human scale, it's more affecting than it is in most movies. You're with Laura every perilous step of the way as she runs barefoot through the Burmese jungle.

Working from a streamlined script by Alex Lasker and Bill Rubenstein (who also co-produced), director John Boorman ("Hope and Glory," "The Emerald Forest") doesn't use any gimmicks: The story is mainly fiction yet it speeds along with the urgency of truth.

Boorman stages the action with an economy of motion, and his splendid visual compositions make the most of the beauty of the Burmese countryside.

Each scene brings a change of lighting that's like a new, vivid film. Especially striking and poignant are the nighttime scenes. In fact, the government's disgraceful abuses seem all the more terrible amid all this loveliness.

A nonprofessional actor named U Aung Ko gives a graceful performance as Laura's elderly native

guide, Frances McDormand ("Short Cuts") is solid as her sister, and Spalding Gray ("Swimming to Cambodia") is oddly amusing as the American tour guide. Adelle Lutz makes a brief appearance as Aung San Suu Kyi, a Burmese pacifist dissident who inspires Laura. (The real-life leader won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1991.)

Whatever else it may be, "Beyond Rangoon" is the story of Laura's journey. And helping us to make the trip with her is Patricia Arquette, the actress with the generous charisma from "True Romance" (1993).

Arquette is completely credible as Laura, a physician-turned-action-heroine. With her hypnotic eyes and solid frame, she looks as if she'd be able to survive a blood-chilling chase through a strife-torn land.

And Arquette also guides us through the small, subtle stages of Laura's interior journey. The young doctor travels from an imperfect sort of detachment to a perfect — or, at least, a far more functional — one. (Twin Cinema)

Antonio Banderas: Action hero or zero in 'Desperado'?

'Desperado:' Better come to your senses

A lowbrow shoot-'em-up flick with hipster pretensions, "Desperado" is a particularly repulsive example of how showering Hollywood cash on a newfound independent director doesn't necessarily improve his work.

Writer-director Robert Rodriguez scores with critics with his extremely low-budget 1992 film "El Mariachi," which told the story of a lowly, no-named mariachi singer mistaken for a gangster. Columbia Pictures hired Rodriguez to do a polished remake, and though he claims to have written a new chapter in the Mariachi story, the studio essentially got its wish.

Just like its predecessor, "Desperado" features a misunderstood loner battling a wealthy drug lord, and taking shelter in the arms of a beautiful woman with murky ties to his sinister enemy. It was even filmed in the same Mexican border town. Rodriguez plagiarizes himself in every aspect but one: the humor and intelligence critics found in "El Mariachi" has vanished from this hysterically overblown sequel.

Antonio Banderas makes his action film debut as the Mariachi, who sets out to avenge the death of his girlfriend by hunting down the man responsible for the murder, a Mexican drug kingpin named Bucho (Joaquin de Almeida). To do so, Mariachi has to blast his way through all of Bucho's henchmen, which he does with grim relish. The moments when the Mariachi plays for strength and forgiveness are unintentional camp.

"Desperado" doesn't let anything annoying like plot, characterization or dialogue get in the way of its primary aim, which is depicting the

cannon-wielding Mariachi moping down bad guys in obscenely graphic detail. Oh, and having sex with a pin-up girl. It's a dream movie for adolescent males.

There's a crude sexual rhythm to the gunfight scenes. There's a gore-gamic scene in which the Mariachi's obliterating a bar full of sleazebags is mere foreplay to his pinning a creep to the street and blasting the guy's head to smithereens with his hot pistol. As blood spurts everywhere, a cheese-cakey senorita (Salma Hayek) the Mariachi saves from the baddie's bullet drops herself over him. This kind of thing would be outrageous if it weren't so transparently stupid.

Throughout the movie, the Mariachi is set upon by legions of machine-gun-toting Mariachi who can't seem to hit him even in a tiny bar. Yet though he's a guitar player by trade, not a trained marksman, the Mariachi can't seem to miss. In the final shootout, with the Mariachi facing a courtyard full of armed thugs, he comes by his cheap thrills honestly. "Desperado" is artless, stylized junk — but hey, great low-down soundtrack by Los Lobos. (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema)

Quentin Tarantino gives his imprimatur of sadistic cool to "Desperado" by showing up for a cameo (he gets brain splattered on his face and his head blown off, so presumably he enjoys himself). But don't be fooled: Though regrettably hyperviolent, Tarantino's "Pulp Fiction" had wit to burn, not to mention unforgettable characters and the year's best screenplay. "The Babysitters Club" — Based on the hugely popular book series by Ann M. Martin, this is a beguiling evocation of a crucial summer for seven lovely young girls on the cusp of their future. The film makes two notable theatrical feature debuts: that of young actress Schuyler Fisk and that of its director, "thirtysomething" alumna Melanie Mayron. Among the key adults are Peter Horton, Ellen Barkin, Brooke Adams and Bruce Davison. (PG, for brief mild language.) (Twin Cinema, Magic Lantern Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley)

"Dangerous Minds" — The true story of an ex-Marine who turns to teaching troubled youth is transformed into meaningless piffle in this superficial, unrealistic production. New singer Morissette won't mince her words

"Do I stress you out?" These are the first words Alanis Morissette sings on her extraordinary debut, "Jagged Little Pill," and she doesn't wait around long for an answer. You could say she doesn't care: The song, "All I Really Want," is her account of the psychological after-shocks of constant bickering between lovers, and as it describes the charged emotional environment, her blaring, broken voice strives to agitate.

"There's no jumping before the gunshot has gone off." "Slap me with a splintered ruler." "And it would knock me to the floor if I wasn't there already." "If only I could hunt the hunter."

Anger. Frustration. Violence, both verbal and physical. All in a day's work for Alanis Morissette, 21, the Canadian-born singer and songwriter who's among the hottest rock acts this summer.

Morissette doesn't mince words. Her music, a strident distillation of old-fashioned singer-songwriter confession, is full of anguish — but it's anguish with a purpose, communicated with serious lung power. Her acidic songs vent rancor, right wrongs, expose narrow-minded thinking, and rail against all types of controlling forces, from parents to priests.

And yet, remarkably, these songs are never just complaint sessions. They turn on effortless, deceptively addictive melodies. They overflow with something often missing from popular music: a sense of personal investment. They elevate age-old rock 'n' roll rebellion to a slightly more intellectual plane, utilizing a language that bounces between raw vitriol and the detached jargon of the therapy movement.

Here is a new approach to generational angst, and it's striking quite a chord: After only seven weeks, "Jagged Little Pill" is at No. 7 on Billboard's 200 albums chart. It is still climbing.

"I write as a release, not a revenge," she said recently, in a telephone interview from a tour stop in Portland, Ore. "Some of the things I'm singing about, I have to release them in order for me to continue on and not be cynical and upset all the time."

Courtney Love would probably say the same thing. But Morissette, like the blues-conscious songwriter Jennifer Trynin and Helium's celestial-sounding Mary Timony and a few other emerging female artists, isn't just going for simple catharsis: She wants art, too. She's fueling her music with stress and giving voice to long-held feelings of rage — against duplicitous men and patriarchal society. Morissette substitutes nuanced whispers and dizzying intricate leaps for Love's screams, and allows her voice to reflect a wider range of emotions. She's not afraid to be sensual or raunchy or downright enraged.

And she craves direct contact: Morissette turned down the chance to replace Sinead O'Connor on the Lollapalooza Tour because she felt at this point, "it was wrong to detach myself" from the audience.

For a new artist, particularly a woman, this openness is a risky thing. While the alternative rock world welcomes female artists, in the larger pop world the stereotypes — tramp, high-minded singer-songwriter, dance-pop diva — still prevail at the top of the charts.

"I'm positive about this," said Barb Hagenah, the only returning starter. "We have a lot of new people from different places."

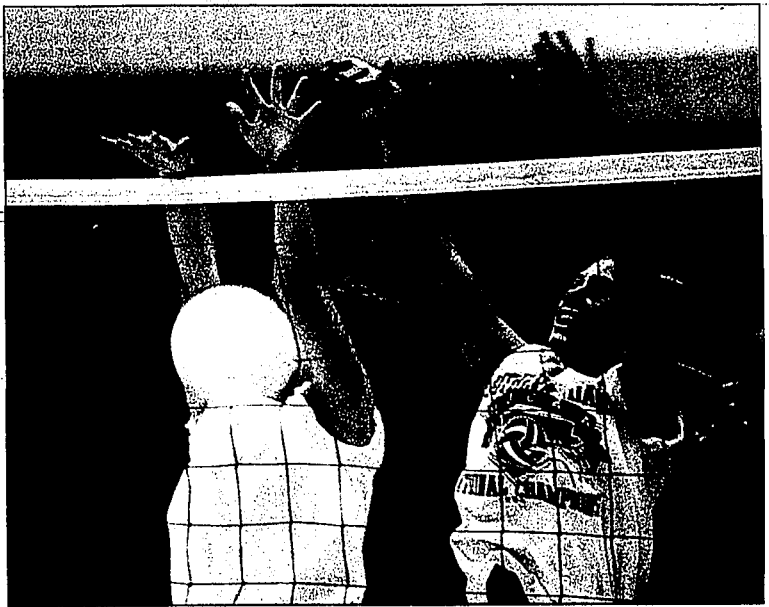

"Sara swings down on it pretty well and Thompson serves very well," Federico said.

It is hard for the players to adjust to the new system, Westburg said, but she thinks the team has the talent to do well.

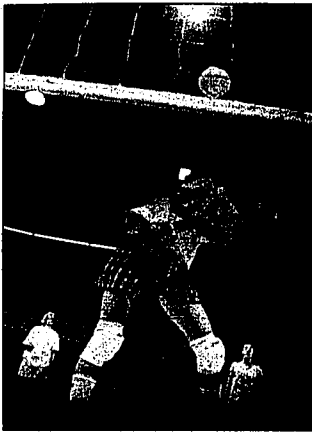
"(Robinson) has always been really sharp on the floor," said Matthews, who has coached the senior at both the junior high and high school level.

After winning a combined total of three games in the previous two years, the Spartans say they are on their way to building a new tradition of volleyball at Minico.

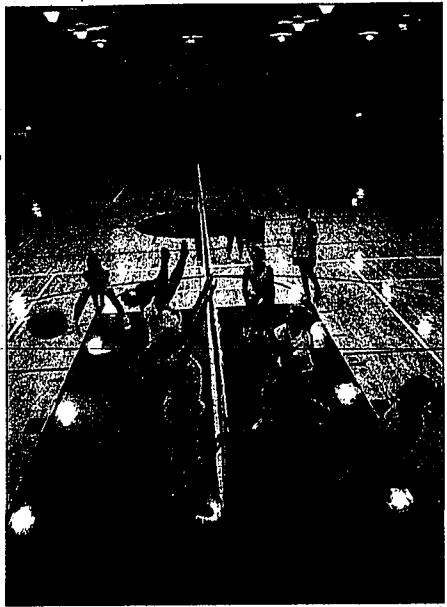
"I'm really looking forward to this year," Coach Kelly Fossecoco said. "The girls are all solid athletes."

Windows sales manic - for how long?

NEW YORK (AP) — Captivated by common zeal and the most intensive product promotion ever, computer users nationwide began buying Microsoft Corp.'s Windows 95 Thursday and ushered in a new era in personal computing. From pizza giveaways to computer gear costume balls, computer stores beckoned buyers to purchase the most widely awaited software innovation in years, an advance that will improve the performance of millions of PCs that run on systems designed by the leading software manufacturer.

But beneath the hype and initial sales bursts, the first-day success of Microsoft's enormous marketing campaign remained unclear this morning. At some stores it was business as usual. On Wall Street, investors sold off Microsoft's stock, anticipating a lull after today's enthusiasm wanes. By late morning shares were off 51.87% to \$96 on the Nasdaq Stock Market. Rival software makers Apple and IBM downplayed the debut, pointing out their products already do what Windows 95 does. And in Washington, Attorney General Janet Reno put a damper on the party mood by saying her anti-monopoly investigators still are scrutinizing Microsoft's sales practices.

early today demonstrated how it was difficult to draw conclusions about the initial sales success. At CompUSA, about 150 people lured by newspaper ads and free pizza lined up to watch the shrink-wrap be ripped from a pile of several hundred copies of the program. A dozen TV crews and at least that many Microsoft employees watched. The crowd jammed checkout lines for 30 minutes. But at Datavision, a comparably-sized superstore one block away, about two dozen people bought copies. At 20 minutes past midnight, the store was empty. "That's what food and a little party gets," Albert Lintato, a Datavision manager, said of CompUSA's tactics. "We had a spurt and that was it."

spend hundreds of dollars. He organized a similar boycott of major league baseball earlier this year. In his view, the baseball strike and Windows 95 are a striking similarity. "We're basically being held captive by people who are putting the interests of financial gains up against what's best for the consumer," Bunker said. Charles Forsythe, a Dallas-based software consultant, said Windows 95 isn't as good as Microsoft would like the world to think.

"It's a crucial hour really," said Forsythe, an OS/2 user who saw test versions of Windows 95 before its debut. He said Windows 95 is not as user-friendly as promised and is just plain clumsy for advanced users like him. Forsythe also expressed irritation over the control Microsoft exerts over the personal computer market. Its software runs 80 percent of PCs worldwide. "It's pretty clear that Microsoft wants to run the world," Forsythe said. IBM and Apple have said only that their sys-

tems already do what Windows 95 does. But on the Internet, users of the Macintosh and OS/2 systems were heatedly arguing with Windows 95 advocates over the finer points of 32 bit multitasking, graphics capabilities, and the like. "Stop blaming (Microsoft) for everything from devil-worship to monopoly, and start trying to find the real reason for (Microsoft) dominance — better business," one Windows 95 advocate wrote. "Better" business? No, just sneaker, more underhanded," an OS/2 fan responded. "Not better" at all.

a choice between survivor or spousal benefits — whichever is higher. Some older couples choose to live together rather than get married so they can protect their assets in the event of a catastrophic illness. Medicaid rules say you have to spend down your assets to a certain level in order to qualify for benefits. If two partners are not married, they only have to exhaust the property of the person requiring long-term care and his share of any jointly owned property. Home ownership is another impor-

tant consideration for older couples. People who are over 55 have a one-time capital gains tax exclusion of up to \$125,000 on the profit from the sale of a home. What happens if two people in their late 50s plan to get married and both own homes? If they have never taken an exclusion, they can sell the homes before they tie the knot and each receive a \$125,000 exclusion. If they wait until after the marriage, they'll be entitled to only one exclusion. If a homeowner marries someone who already has taken the exclusion, the homeowner forfeits his or

her right to take one. When it comes to taxes, married couples often pay more to the Internal Revenue Service than unmarried couples who live together. And married couples pay more taxes on Social Security benefits than couples who live together. Consider this: If single taxpayers earn between \$25,000 and \$34,000 a year, then 50 percent of their Social Security benefits are subject to tax. If married taxpayers who file jointly file between \$32,000 and \$44,000, 50 percent of their Social Security benefits are subject to tax. People with higher incomes must pay tax on a bigger share of their Social Security benefits. That means unmarried couples can earn up to \$68,000 and still be taxed on 50 percent of their Social Security benefits, compared with \$44,000 for married couples. Couples who are remarrying also need to discuss how they intend to manage their finances. "They may have gone through more than half a lifetime handling money in a certain way," Diamond says. "The wife may like to give a lot of gifts to her kids. It can cause friction. That's why most second marriage spouses don't comingle funds."

Airlines quietly shrink discounts for seniors

The shrinking airline industry has quietly shrunk one of its best deals for senior citizens. In the past month, most major airlines have eliminated a book of coupons that allowed people over 62 to fly eight domestic trips for \$1,012 — or \$126.50 a flight. They have retained the four coupon book, which costs \$596 — or \$149 a trip. "See what I mean? You can't win," said Neda Pastore, a retired school teacher and bookkeeper who lives in Hollywood, Fla. "Let us not lose sight of the fact that the senior citizen of today makes a contribution years ago. Pastore said. "In their retirement years, they should be able to relax and enjoy themselves." The elimination of the eight-coupon book apparently was triggered by Northwest, which took the step July 15. American, Delta and other airlines have all followed in the past 10 days. Northwest spokesman Jim

Faulkner said the four-coupon book was far more popular than the eight coupon book. "There were not enough people using the eight-coupon book to justify continuing the program," Faulkner said. "We are cutting our efforts into promoting the value of the four-coupon book." American spokeswoman Patricia San Pedro said the eight-coupon book accounted for only 10 percent of coupon book sales. Pat Loftus, a 42-year-old Miami Lakes resident who tried to buy a coupon book this week for his father, said the books were eliminated quickly and quietly. "This is an 18 percent increase," Loftus said. "We're just announcing it ahead of time, so I could have bought one first." The coupons allow passengers over 62 to fly within the United States or Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico and Canada, with reservations made and advance seat reservations available. They are valid for one year after purchase.

Boise firm launches test of recycling plan

BOISE (AP) — A gap in Boise's recycling efforts will be filled when businesses begin tossing their paper in bright green containers instead of sending it to the dump. Browning-Ferris Industries is launching a six-month test of recycling cardboard, magazines, junk mail and office paper from smaller businesses like retail outlets, restaurants and offices. "A lot of them (employers) have lived in places where they've recycled paper before," said Sharon Vander Tilly, BFI recycling manager. "They're amazed that they can't here." The Poulet Rouge will check it out. The eatery and other businesses in the building fill two Dumpsters to the point they are overflowing with paper by mid-week, said employee Pete Sausman. "A lot of that could be reduced," he said. "Recycling would be the answer."

Big businesses like Micron Technology ship their large volumes of recyclables to Western Recycling, to which BFI also will sell its paper waste. About 100 businesses have said they are interested in recycling, but because it is the right thing to do, Vander Tilly said. And, like homeowners who recycle, they will be eligible for a price break on their trash bills. Typical businesses pay \$66 a month for service, for a three-cubic-yard Dumpster emptied twice a week. If recycling enables such a business to cut back to weekly collection, it would pay \$53. If the company can round up 400 business recyclers, it could divert about 400 tons per month from the landfill, Bradley estimated. That is the amount of 100 garbage-truck loads a month.

Windows dampens other technology stocks as Dow Jones drops slightly

NEW YORK (AP) — Investors played the party possum Thursday as Microsoft Corp. celebrated the introduction of its Windows 95 computer operating system. Shares of the software company and other technology issues fell, adding to traditional summer slackness that left the stock market mixed. Analysts said uncertainty over the success of the most heavily hyped software in history led investors to take profits following a technology sector price run-up most of the year. The Dow Jones industrial average fell 4.23 points to 4,580.62. Declining issues and advances were about even on the New York Stock Exchange. Big Board volume totaled 299.18

million shares as of 4 p.m., up from 291.39 million in the previous session. The NYSE's composite index rose 0.34 to 291.25. The Standard & Poor's 500-stock index rose 0.32 to 557.46. The technology rich Nasdaq composite index fell 7.26 to 1,020.93 while at the American Stock Exchange, the market value index gained 0.11 to 528.92. Computerized buy and sell programs added to the market's volatility a day of low volume, said A.I.G. Goldman, vice president of A.G. Edwards & Sons Inc. in St. Louis. Several indexes, including the Dow Jones, moved between positive and negative territory all day.

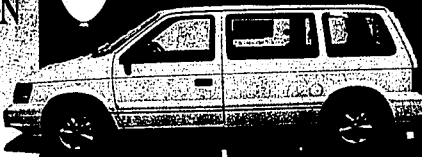

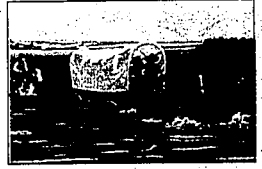

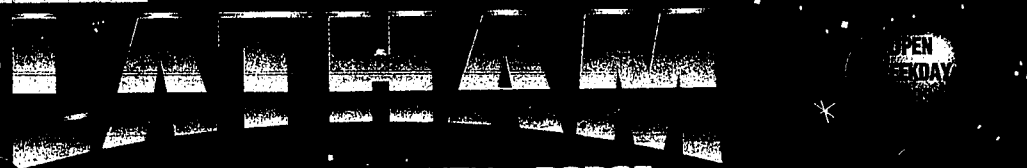

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

"Dead if I do and dead if I
don't," lamented today's South. "If
I draw the trumps, the clubs don't
behave. And if I don't draw
trumps, West ruffs an honor."

South took his diamond ace
and tried a direct assault. He ran
all five trump winners, hoping for
a helpful club discard. East dis-
carded a spade and a diamond;
then late took charge. When clubs
didn't break 3-3 and the 10 didn't
drop, South couldn't recover and
the game went one down.

A much better plan costs next
to nothing and guards against bad
luck in clubs. After winning his di-
amond ace, South should cash
only his queen and jack of trumps
and the ace and queen of clubs. If
the club 10 drops, South draws the
last trump and overtakes his club
jack in dummy. When the 10
doesn't drop, South cashes his
club jack which, fortunately, West
cannot ruff. Finally, South leads a
third trump to dummy's king and
one of his losers goes on dummy's
club king.

Does the winning line involve
some risk? Yes. Had West been
able to ruff a club honor, the de-
fense would have scored an extra
undertrick. However, since the
game was unmakeable against this
distribution, an extra undertrick
was a small price to pay for the
extra chance at the rubber bonus.

Revivals are in full bloom during this time of year, but Fox has decided to put a stop to that and plant some new seeds of its own.

"Beverly Hills, 90210" delivers its premiere Wednesday, Sept. 13. Friday, Sept. 15, "Strange Loop," starring D.B. Sweeney, makes its debut.

Who shot Mr. Burns? That burning question is answered in the premiere of "The Simpsons" Sunday, Sept. 17. Fox is running a contest in conjunction with this episode. Grand prize winners who solve the mystery can have their likenesses animated to appear with the Simpsons. "Married... With Children" also is slated to begin a new season on Sunday.

"The X-Files" waits until Friday, Sept. 22, for its season premiere. Fox's other new drama, "Space: Above and Beyond," begins Sunday, Sept. 24.
