Social Security inflation increase under heavy fire

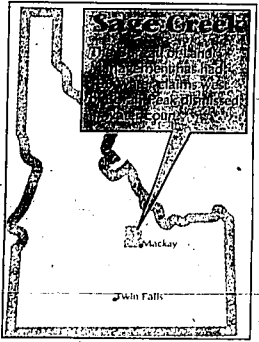

WASHINGTON — Today, millions of Americans learn how much their Social Security checks are going up. But future increases are in doubt — the annual inflation adjustment is under attack from powerful lawmakers. Those pushing for the change, including Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, House Speaker Newt Gingrich and Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., have termed it a technical readjustment to remove an upward bias in the Consumer Price Index. Opponents contend that politicians are latching onto the CPI adjustment as a backdoor way to cut Social Security and hike taxes, something that both Republi-

cans and Democrats have pledged not to do. Moynihan has called for benefit increases such as Social Security to be limited to 1 percentage point below the CPI rate. If Moynihan's position prevails in this year's budget debate, it could mean around \$7 less per month for the average Social Security recipient next year. That would mean the average monthly benefit check of \$702 would rise by \$11 instead of around \$18. The lure of Moynihan's proposal is that it holds out the prospect of huge savings — \$281 billion over seven years. That would be equal to one-third of the \$894 billion the Republicans need to achieve their goal of a balanced budget by 2002.

The small adjustment can lead to such big numbers because nearly 30 percent of all federal outlays are tied to changes in the Consumer Price Index. The biggest savings would come from adjusting payments to the 43 million Americans receiving Social Security. But the CPI is also used to adjust federal welfare and pension payments. In addition, the federal government would reap the added benefit of higher tax revenue. To eliminate "bracket creep" caused by inflation pushing taxpayers into higher income levels, the IRS adjusts its tax brackets and personal exemption levels in line with increases in the CPI. A 1 percentage

Gem water court fines Uncle Sam

TWIN FALLS — Uncle Sam didn't do his homework, so now he has to pay \$23,000 in attorney fees to a Mackay-area woman who fended off water claims by the Bureau of Land Management near her ranch, according to the Snake River water court.

Moreover, 196 of the BLM's water claims in the Sage Creek drainage have been dismissed with prejudice — and cannot be resurrected in the Snake River Basin Adjudication.

Lola Coates, whose ranch lies west of Mt. Bonah about 25 miles north of Mackay, claimed \$29,142 in attorney fees and \$9,076 in other expenses while fending off the BLM's surface water claims. Her ranch lies downhill from the federal rangelands where the disputed claims were made.

Coates wasn't awarded the full amount because the BLM did some investigation of its claims, according to SRBA Special Master Brigitte Bilyeu. The SRBA is a legal inventory of water rights across most of Idaho; Bilyeu is an assistant to the SRBA's presiding judge, Daniel Harburt.

Not everyone agreed with Bilyeu's decision — particularly Lee Leininger, a Washington-based Department of Justice attorney handling the BLM's claims in Idaho.

"We don't agree the sanctions are warranted," Leininger said Thursday, adding it's too early to say if Bilyeu's decision will be appealed.

Simply put, the BLM did not adequately investigate its surface water claims before pursuing them in court, Bilyeu wrote in a memorandum decision and order. Claimants "must reasonably determine the validity of a claim before asserting it," she wrote.

"At the time the BLM filed the claims at issue here, it had no information that anyone had ever seen surface water available for livestock consumption at these claim sites," she wrote. The BLM based its claims on aerial photos of the area, but did not follow up with an on-the-ground investigation, Bilyeu wrote.

"The federal government felt it was proper procedure to base a claim on an aerial photograph that showed a willow tree, and claim that a cow drank there in 1884," said Coates' son, Tom. The Coates' claim a water right with an 1885 pres-

Twin Falls police seek August rapist

TWIN FALLS — A homeless pre-teen girl told police she was bound, gagged and raped in August by a transient cook who lived in a neighboring tent in the back yard of a Twin Falls home.

Two months later, police have decided to seek the public's help in apprehending Danny Wolfe, 27, in connection with the rape.

Wolfe may be in the Magic Valley or in Jackpot, Nev., said Detective Chuck Dudley of the Twin Falls Police Department. Wolfe is described as 5 feet 6 inches tall, 130 pounds with black hair and brown eyes.

Wolfe and the girl's family were living in separate tents in a Twin Falls man's back yard on Aug. 10 when Wolfe invited her into his tent while her mother was away, according to an affidavit written by Dudley.

Wolfe, formerly a cook for the Royal Lounge, then put tape over her mouth, bound her arms together, tied her legs in a spread-eagle position and raped her, Dudley's affidavit said. Wolfe told her he would kill her family if she told anyone, the affidavit said.

An arrest warrant charging Wolfe with lewd conduct was issued several days after the crime, but police didn't alert the public earlier because Wolfe apparently fled Ida-

ho for a time after the rape, Dudley said. Also, Dudley was concerned that publicity might frighten the victim into silence.

"Why should I warn them if the guy is not in town?" Dudley asked. "There's no reason for me to release confidential information if there is no danger to the citizens of Twin Falls. That is why nothing was put out."

Dudley asked *The Times-News* to withhold information about the rape Thursday until Monday, when a photo of Wolfe will become available, and the public could be better informed about him in a single announcement.

Anyone who sees Wolfe should call the police department at 736-2200.

Adolescents neglected, private study concludes

WASHINGTON — Millions of the nation's 10- to 14-year-olds could become "lifelong casualties" of substance abuse, AIDS and other social ills unless society gives them more attention and support, a private report concludes.

But all is not lost, said the report Thursday by the Carnegie Council on Adolescent Development, a panel of 27 educators, scientists, U.S. senators and health and legal experts. It says there is much that families, schools, businesses and the media can do to smooth the transition from adolescence to adulthood.

The council's research found young adolescents engaging in behaviors once associated with middle- and late adolescence — drug and alcohol abuse, sexual activity, pregnancy and violence.

It said the nation is neglecting its 10- to 14-year-olds — an age when they most need attention — and laid the blame on so-

cial and economic changes, including the rise in single-parent and double-income families, declining parental involvement in schools and television viewing.

Among its solutions, the panel recommended making middle schools smaller so teachers and pupils can form stable, personal relationships that promote learning.

It also suggested that schools, community groups and employers adopt "family-friendly" policies, such as flexible work hours, after-school programs, and parent-support groups to help strengthen families.

The report found that: One-third of eighth-graders, usually 13-year-olds, reported using illegal drugs, including inhalants.

About 15 percent of eighth-graders said they had had more than five alcoholic drinks in a row within the past two weeks.

Eighth-graders perceived little or no risk to smoking or drinking, behaviors often characterized as precursors to illegal drug use.

Indiana law firm finds good fortune in 13s

INDIANAPOLIS — Superstitious sorts may fear this week's arrival of another Friday the 13th.

At Barnes & Thornburg, one of Indiana's biggest law firms, the partners revel in it.

The firm's telephone number is 638-1313, its offices are on the 13th floor, and a number of its attorneys have the number 1313 on their license plates, said former partner John Houghton.

Legend has it that the firm's predecessor, Barnes, Hickam, Pantzer & Boyd, was founded on Friday, Sept. 13, 1940, and rented out Suite 1313 of the former Merchants Bank Building.

"Most of us view 1313 as a lucky number here at Barnes and Thornburg," Houghton said. "We always say the fear stops at the door."

Visitors who pass through that door Friday will be greeted with a sign that reads "13 Is Our Lucky Number."

Some folklorists trace triakadekaphobia — or fear of the number 13 — to the number of people at the Last Supper — the 12 apostles and Jesus Christ. Christ was crucified the following day, on a Friday.

"Rather than triakadekaphobias, we are triakadekophilias," Houghton said.

Indeed, the firm seems to have been blessed with more good luck than bad since its inception 45 years ago.

The original firm's merger in 1981 with a South Bend firm created Barnes and Thornburg, making it the largest practice in the state at the time. Subsequent mergers have made it one of the two largest in the state, with 197 attorneys and offices in Indianapolis and five other cities including Washington.

GOP lawmaker punished in latest example of Gingrich's tight rein

WASHINGTON (AP) — The iron hand of the House Republican leadership was briefly visible this week in a statement explaining why a Wisconsin freshman was kicked off an important subcommittee.

He voted the wrong way. The statement, though quickly disavowed as "unauthorized," further highlighted the centralized power and strict discipline that are the hallmarks of this GOP-run Congress.

"It's a very top-down arrangement for imposing that agenda on committees," said congressional analyst Tom Mann of the Brookings Institution. "They've created a party-oriented agenda and a hierarchical arrangement for imposing that agenda on committees."

The producer, director and leading man is House Speaker Newt Gingrich, who is using threats, diplomacy and structural changes to work his and his party's will. He is more dominant than any other recent speaker.

House rules are changing in ways that always concentrate more power in Gingrich's office and disperse less through the rest of the institution. The most recent shake-up came when The New Yorker reported that Gingrich was contemplating eliminating committees altogether.

"That's not going to happen," said Gingrich spokesman Tony Blankley. "Newt has no plan or intention of discarding the committee system. The committees are going to continue as they have."

However, even he acknowledges that they have less influence now than they did under the Democrats,

rather than on seniority. Then he pushed the House to limit chairmen's tenure to six years.

The speaker also has packed key committees with freshmen, most of them avid reformers whom he helped elect. He even installed freshmen as chairmen of three subcommittees.

In addition, committees are now competing with some 20 task forces on numerous issues, including the environment, gun-owner rights, nuclear-site cleanup and the entertainment industry. Gingrich established the task forces and they report directly to him.

Barry Jackson, executive director of the House Republican Conference, has said the task forces help diffuse committee clout and serve as a way to get input from as many members as possible. "It's just arrogant to think any one committee has a monopoly on knowledge on how to address a problem," Jackson said.

The leadership's tentacles reach down to the GOP rank-and-file. Freshman Rep. Mark Neumann, R-Wis., learned that this week when he

was shuffled from the national security appropriations subcommittee to a less important military construction panel. "We have tried very hard to address Mr. Neumann's concerns, yet he has refused to support the national security bill ... The leadership has full knowledge of this decision and supports it," the Appropriations Committee said Wednesday in the explanation it later withdrew.

Members pledged at the outset "to work in support of the panel's business," the committee said.

Simpson could find himself outcast among glamour set

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Simpson's in his mission after 16 months in jail. O.J. Simpson may well find a place of freedom in exile, an outcast among the rich, the powerful and the glamorous who were once drawn to him.

murder suffered a huge setback when he canceled his live interview on NBC Wednesday night.

"It looks terrible. It's a PR nightmare," said public relations expert Michael Levine, who specializes in image enhancement.

Hollywood insiders say the sports commentator, pitcher and actor will have to struggle to resume regular work in the image-conscious entertainment industry.

International Creative Management, his talent agent for two decades, has dropped him. In an internal memo, ICM Chairman Jeff Berg said, "While the trial is over, we are not looking to profit from any of Mr. Simpson's activities related to this tragedy."

Simpson's first effort to try to repair his image fell flat, when cable

companies rebuffed the idea of a pay-per-view TV appearance. Then he backed out of the NBC interview, fearing he was being set up for a cross-examination.

In stark contrast to the support he has received in poorer, mostly black areas of the city, Simpson's acquittal hardly matters to people in the former football star's world. Many of these predominantly white, well-to-do people believe Simpson committed murder or, at least, beat his wife.

"So far since he has been released, I've received some 80 complaints from residents in the area," said Simpson neighbor David Horowitz, a TV consumer affairs reporter and Brentwood's honorary mayor. "I'm also getting concerns from business-

"These people don't want to have anything to do with O.J. They said they don't want to sit next to him in a restaurant. They don't want to see him walk down the street."

"The world out there knows that O.J. Simpson committed these two murders," actress Charlene Tilton told KCAL-TV. The former "Dallas" cast member participated in a ceremony remembering Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman after the verdict. "He was acquitted, but not vindicated, and I'm going to do whatever I can to boycott whatever he does."

In the posh beach community of Dana Point where Simpson once owned a townhouse, a mother and her daughter said Simpson should know not to move back there.

"We want him to know he's not welcome here," said 16-year-old Tracy Nebers.

Several members of Sherwood Country Club, where hockey star Wayne Gretzky is building a home, are lobbying to have Simpson's membership revoked, according to a person familiar with the talks who spoke on condition of anonymity.

ICM talent agent Jack Gliardi, who represented Simpson for 20 years, visited Simpson's home, the day he was released. But that agent is to be all the contact ICM, the talent agency for Julia Roberts and Michelle Pfeiffer, will have with Simpson. ICM has had no role, nor

does it plan to, in securing contracts that would exploit the death of the victims or of Mr. Simpson's incarceration or trial, the agency said in a statement.

Other talent agents have echoed that sentiment, although the William Morris Agency has signed deals with prosecutors Marcia Clark and Christopher Darden.

A few people say they are willing to welcome Simpson back with open arms. Before his arrest, Simpson occasionally dined at Patrick's Roadhouse, a trendy Santa Monica

diner with a celebrity clientele. "He used to come here all the time, and I would treat him just as I did before," said proprietor Bill Fischler, who sent Simpson banana cream pies in jail. "I would never allow a legal problem to come between us."

David Brokaw, a Hollywood public relations agent whose clients include Roseanne and Bill Cosby, said Simpson can begin resuscitating his career by first admitting he beat his wife and then raising money for battered women.

Cop corners Simpson lawyer

NEW YORK (AP) — Barry Scheck got in a jam all his own Thursday when a police officer spotted him making an illegal U-turn.

Scheck, a member of O.J. Simpson's legal dream team, was driving with an expired license and improper registration, police said. He got the attention of a cop when he made an illegal U-turn dropping off a friend at his Manhattan

hotel, Scheck said. "I can't believe this is a story."

He won't contest the violations but "will investigate the license matter" to see if there is legal ground to fight it.

Scheck said his license expired during the Simpson case. He said the officer who gave him the ticket kept him sitting in his car for 55 minutes while he checked his paperwork.

Buchanan likely to stay Republican

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — Pat Buchanan said Thursday it was highly unlikely he would abandon the Republican Party for an independent presidential run but left that option open in the event the GOP nominates Colin Powell or another supporter of abortion rights.

In an interview, Buchanan sought to clarify remarks he made a day earlier in which he indicated he might go the independent route if he considered the GOP nominee unacceptable. He said he considered Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole and Texas Sen. Phil Gramm acceptable.

On Thursday, Buchanan suggested too much was being made of his remarks and that the final choice intention of supporting the Republican nominee and "would do nothing to re-elect Bill Clinton." Even if he is unsuccessful in his bid for the nomination, Buchanan said, he plans to campaign through the Republican convention next August in San Diego to make sure the platform reflects his opposition to abortion and affirmative action.

Buchanan said that given the GOP field, he had every confidence that the platform would be to his liking. As a result, he said, any talk of an independent run was "highly hypothetical."

Still, he declined to slam the door shut. Buchanan said he thought Powell's support of abortion rights, affirmative action and gun control would prevent him from winning the GOP nomination, should Powell decide to seek the presidency and run as a Republican. "But if Colin Powell got into the race and became the nominee and tried to make us a pro-abortion, pro-gun control, pro-affirmative action party, which certainly New Deal and Great Society programs, then there will be an explosion in San Diego and I would fight him with everything I had to keep our party a conservative and principled party. I think I would win that battle at the convention."

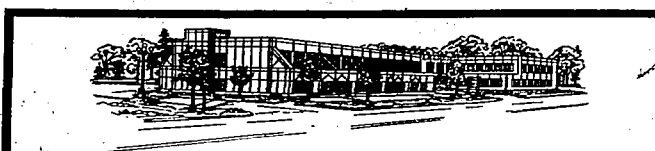
Christopher plans trip to Jordan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Warren Christopher will go to Jordan at the end of the month to try to set up a Middle East development bank, but will forgo any shuttle diplomacy on the stalled Israeli-Syrian peace talks.

Announcing Christopher's plans, State Department spokesman Nicholas Burns said he wanted to be back home to launch Bosnia

negotiations only a few days later. But Burns acknowledged the Israeli-Syrian talks were at an impasse despite day-to-day contact with the two sides.

Christopher will head the U.S. delegation to the economic conference in Amman, the Jordanian capital, Oct. 29-30, and then fly home for the Bosnia peace talks opening Oct. 31 at a U.S. site Burns said had not yet been chosen.

Interior: West will fail in land fight

LAS VEGAS (AP) — The battle cry of rural western land rights activists intent on wresting public lands from the federal government is falling on deaf ears.

The movement — frequently referred to as Sagebrush Rebellion II or county supremacy — has led to local resolutions and ordinances that seek to claim public land or at least allow for more local voice in how the land is managed.

But Interior Department Deputy Secretary John Garamendi says westerners will not succeed. "We're not in the business of negotiating the transfer of these state and federal lands based upon those resolutions," Garamendi said. "It's not our place to give it away, nor is it our place to stand by and let the individual county or state take that interest away from the American people."

The one-time cattle rancher from Calaveras County, Calif., has seen the public land movement sweep his home county. Calaveras County leaders adopted an ordinance in August that demands more local input in federal regulations.

Nye County, Nev., is considered a leader in the movement and is battling the U.S. government in federal court here over who has the right to manage about 10 million acres in Southern Nevada. Both sides still are waiting for a decision in the lawsuit.

The civil action was brought by the U.S. Justice Department after Nye County Commissioner Dick Carver bulldozed a portion of national forest land in July 1994. The event followed two 1993 resolutions claiming the right to manage public land and all roads within county borders.

Judge deals rancher defeat in grazing case

RENO, Nev. (AP) — A federal judge has rejected claims by Elko County rancher Cliff Gardner that the United States does not own public lands in Nevada and can't tell him where to graze his livestock.

Under "unambiguous Supreme Court precedent, there can be no reasonable doubt that the national forests ... are the property of the United States and rightfully managed by the Forest Service," U.S. District Judge David W. Hagen wrote in his decision.

The government filed a civil trespass action against Elko County rancher Cliff Gardner on June 21, claiming he had been grazing his cattle illegally in the Humboldt National Forest since May 1994.

Gardner contends that the United States neither owned the land nor had the authority to require permits for the land on which the cattle were grazing.

The court disagreed, ruling that "the Gardners have no valid argument that the United States does not own the land" and that "similarly without merit is the Gardners' assertion that the United States has no authority to retain public lands in its possession."

Gardner's attorney, Glade Hall of Reno, said he would appeal the decision to the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco.

He said that action would put the issues in the Justice Department's lawsuit against Nye County before the appeals court even before the Nye County case is decided by a federal judge in Las Vegas.

Gardner's claims are similar to those of Nye County's attorneys and the Nye County case was included in papers Hall submitted to the court in Reno.

The Justice Department sued Nye County March 8 over resolutions passed by the commission that challenge federal land management authority.

statement issued on Wednesday, claimed its position was upheld last week by U.S. District Judge David Hagen in Nevada when he ordered an Elko rancher to move his cattle over National Forest Service lands the rancher claimed were actually owned by the state.

Garamendi contends the owner or manager of public land is burdened with hidden costs, and if counties realized that, "I think it's a gift that they would not want."

Although Garamendi emphasized that the federal government was going to hold tight to its property title, he said it would part with "limited areas" of land.

Clark County land under the Bureau of Land Management fits that category, said Garamendi, who was appointed deputy secretary in August. In the past year, BLM land in Clark County has been swapped for prized pieces of property near Lake Tahoe and elsewhere.

Federal officials also have indicated that they are receptive to a land swap with Nye County.

Congressional leaders have directed the county to ask for land as compensation should Nevada get an interim nuclear waste storage site at the Nevada Test Site, County Manager William Offutt said. During testimony before a House subcommittee Monday, Nye County leaders asked for 1,200 acres for an industrial park and landfills.

Prosecutor's lot illustrates need to loosen up guidelines

In order to be Lincoln County's part-time prosecutor, Jennifer Brown Yewer had to be a county resident. So she rented an apartment in Shoshone, while her husband held down the homestead in Twin Falls.

Inquiring minds may wonder: Where did Yewer really live while serving Lincoln County? Did she secretly sneak away to Twin Falls to spend the night with hubby?

"My feelings are, it's none of anybody's business," she said recently.

Absolutely right. The more pertinent question is whether the state of Idaho really needed to break up the Yewer household, just so Lincoln County's miscreants could be prosecuted.

The residency requirement for prosecutors is a recurring problem for small counties. Only one lawyer, Brit Groom, lives in Lincoln County these days. Now that Yewer has resigned, Groom has been appointed to finish her term. Good thing he wanted the job.

Another problem for small counties (admittedly, a pleasant problem to have) is a shortage of criminals. There just isn't enough work for a

full-time prosecutor. Groom's plan is to drop by the courthouse each morning and evening, while commuting to his private practice in Twin Falls.

Idaho's small counties might be better-served by a system of district attorneys. State-appointed, they could serve wherever needed, regardless of county borders. Locking up crooks would be their full-time profession, not a sideline job.

Judges already work that way. Tiny Camas County can't generate nearly enough mayhem to keep a judge busy; so Magistrate John Varin of Fairfield has become a juvenile-justice specialist, serving the whole Magic Valley.

The move toward optional forms of county government also may provide a solution. If the Legislature approves a "home-rule" option for counties this winter, local voters might choose to discard their elected prosecutor's office in favor of a hired hand — perhaps one shared by two or more counties.

Under either of these options, a future prosecutor wouldn't have to keep a second home just to keep a job.

Earned Income Tax Credit is out of hand

The road to a \$5 trillion national debt is paved with good intentions.

Look at the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). Launched by Gerald Ford, lauded by Ronald Reagan, expanded by George Bush and Bill Clinton, it's based on welfare principles that even a Republican (or a professed New Democrat) can love. The only problem is that, like many other good ideas in Washington, it's gotten completely out of hand.

Currently, the EITC is the fastest-growing program in the federal budget. It will cost the Treasury \$24 billion this year, up from less than \$2 billion 10 years ago.

In their giant reconciliation bill — the final budget measure of the year — Republicans are trying to restrain this growth. Under the Senate version, EITC costs will rise to \$32 billion in 2002. In the budget language of Washington, that's a cut. In any other language it's an increase — although not so large as projected under the current law, which has costs rising to \$36 billion by 2002.

The EITC is a sort of negative income tax. If you fall into a certain earnings bracket, you don't pay the government; the government pays you.

The idea of the EITC is to put more money in the pockets of low-income working families. If you don't work, you don't qualify.

The EITC is not only the fastest-growing entitlement program, it's the broadest. In 1986 some 7 million families were covered by the EITC, and the average outlay by the government was \$281. This year 18 million families are covered at an average of \$1,265. In 1986 the maximum credit a taxpayer could receive was \$550; today, it's \$3,111.

In Mississippi, a whopping 39 percent of

families receive the EITC; in Texas, 26 percent; California, 22 percent.

The EITC was begun as a modest program to help offset the burden of payroll taxes on the poor and, through its unique structure, to encourage them to work more. But the philosophy soon became: "Hey, if a little bit is good, then more is better," says Bruce Bartlett, an economist who served in the Bush Treasury Department.

Today, the EITC is enjoyed by families making as much as \$26,672 a year, and that doesn't include outside income. Under the law that President Clinton promoted and signed two years ago, by 2002 families making \$34,612 will qualify for EITC benefits. The Senate wants to scale that figure back to \$30,200 — which seems pretty sensible for a government that already owes its creditors \$4.9 trillion.

At its core, the EITC is a massive income-transfer scheme. New IRS figures show that in 1993 the top 5 percent of American earners paid 47 percent of the federal income taxes, up from 37 percent in 1981. Meanwhile, the bottom 50 percent of earners — thanks in large measure to the EITC — paid 5 percent of the taxes.

The EITC, in other words, has created a veritable tax holiday for about half the families in America.

Many would say that's fair. But there's another question raised by the EITC: Does it really encourage work? There's doubt.

For 1996, families with two or more children will earn credits of 40 percent of their income until they reach earnings of \$8,910 annually. Then, they max out at a credit (in nearly all cases, a cash payment) of \$3,564. So far, so good. Clearly, there's a big incen-

tive to work, since a dollar paid on the job becomes \$1.40 in the pocket (minus modest payroll taxes).

If you earn between \$8,910 and \$11,630, you still receive the maximum credit. Then the disincentive begins — you start losing 21 cents of credits for every additional dollar you earn. When your income reaches \$28,533, your credits hit zero.

Again, this sounds fair. But the problem is that the EITC forces lower-income Americans to face marginal tax rates that are higher than those faced by the richest Americans.

As Bartlett wrote recently in a brief for the National Center for Policy Analysis: "Families with incomes between \$11,000 and \$26,000 are being taxed at the rate of 60 percent on each additional dollar earned. ... This total tax rate includes federal, state and local taxes plus the reduction in the EITC."

And these high marginal taxes definitely discourage work. A University of Wisconsin study found that "on balance the EITC reduces the total hours worked."

Is there a solution to the EITC conundrum? One answer is to remove the phase-out of benefits: Simply give all taxpayers an extra 40 percent credit for the first \$10,000 or so of income. But that would be hugely expensive. Another answer is to kill the EITC entirely. But that would be politically impossible.

The third course is to try to restrain a program gone bonkers. That's what the Republicans are doing. At the same time, however, they should admit that the EITC isn't quite so glorious as they once thought. Maybe luring people out of poverty is something that government just can't do.

Nobel Peace Prize sparks protests

OSLO, Norway (AP) — Even before the Nobel judges announce this year's peace laureate today, they evoked anger and applause from those anticipating the decision.

In East Timor, dissidents claim that Indonesian troops were cracking down out of fear that Catholic Bishop Carlos Filipe Ximenes Belo would win the prize for his pro-democracy efforts and embolden the movement.

In Turkey, some officials warned the committee not to honor Leyla Zana, a Kurdish politician jailed for speaking out for her people.

"There is often controversy about the prize," said awards committee secretary Geir Lundestad. "But that

it starts' before the prize is even announced just shows how much interest there is worldwide."

The winner, picked from 117 nominees this year, was to be announced in Oslo at 11 a.m. (3 a.m. MDT) today.

Aside from Belo and Zana, top prospects mentioned by the Norwegian media are former President Jimmy Carter, Mexican Bishop Samuel Ruiz, Russian human rights activist Sergei Kovalyov, Chinese dissident Wei Jingsheng and the parties Northern Ireland's peace efforts and the international aid group Doctors Without Borders.

But newspapers admit they're just

guessing. The committee, which has always guarded the secrecy of its selection, grew even more silent this year after a leak a year ago revealed winners PLO leader Yasser Arafat and Israeli leader Yitzhak Rabin ahead of time. The early reports left out the third winner, Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres.

"We are drowning in letters," said Lundestad. "Last week, 500,000 signatures were delivered supporting our candidate (Ruiz of Mexico). But that doesn't influence the committee."

Jose Ramos Horta, the exile leader of occupied East Timor, tried anyway. In radio broadcast Thursday, he said, "The Nobel Peace Prize to the Timorese church would certainly contribute decisively to a solution."

The six Nobel prizes are awarded in Oslo and Stockholm, Sweden, on Dec. 10, the anniversary of the death of Alfred Nobel, the Swede who invented dynamite and endowed the prize in his 1895 will.

Police save fugitive from crocodile attack

PERTH, Australia (AP) — Police saved a fleeing prisoner from a 13-foot crocodile that was about to attack him in a remote Outback river.

Raymond Rankin, 36, was trying to escape from two officers when he ran into the Ord River in Australia's far

northwest, police said Thursday. Sgt. Cliff Austin said the crocodile slid into the river from the opposite bank and swam towards Rankin as he waded across. The policemen shouted warnings at Rankin and shot at the crocodile, which went under.

Another earthquake shakes Mexico City

MEXICO CITY (AP) — A second earthquake, in four days rattled Mexico City Thursday, causing skyscrapers to sway and people to rush out of their offices in panic.

The shaking began at 10:55 a.m. MDT and lasted only a few seconds. A preliminary reading at the National Seismological Institute said the quake measured 6.1 and the epicenter was near the border between Michoacan and Colima states on Mexico's Pacific coast.

The quake was the 26th and strongest aftershock of a 7.6-magnitude quake on Monday that killed at least 54 people and was centered 300 miles west of Mexico City just off Colima's coast.

The town hardest hit on Monday was Manzanillo, 25 miles southeast of the center of today's quake. Thursday's tremor collapsed the roof of a movie theater damaged in Monday's quake and knocked down a wall at the bus station, the government's Notimex news agency reported.

There were no immediate reports of deaths from the new quake, but Notimex quoted local officials as saying five workmen were hurt in Manzanillo when they jumped from scaffolding.

A 1985 earthquake in Mexico that killed more than 6,000 people has made many nerves raw when the ground starts rolling.

"This is the second time this week, and I'm not taking any chances," said Armando Alyuso, an office worker in a high-rise building along Mexico City's main boulevard, Paseo de la Reforma.

Fellow office worker Lilibet Gomez said, "I'm scared whenever it shakes," as she ran down the stairwell from the seventh floor of the building.

Other office workers who stayed inside the building were too nervous to move and hugged each other for support.

Trading continued on the stock exchange, unlike Monday, when it stopped operating for about 40 minutes.

Iraq bashes U.N. arms inspector

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — Iraq's vice president Thursday accused the chief U.N. weapons inspector of lying when he said Iraq misled the world about the size of its weapons programs.

Iraq also condemned the United States for saying the presidential referendum that Iraq will hold Sunday is a sham because Saddam Hussein is the only candidate on the ballot.

Posters and pictures of Saddam have been put up on buildings across central Baghdad encouraging Iraqis to vote for the 58-year-old leader and give him seven more years in power. One poster says, "Life is meaningless without the leader."

At the United Nations on Wednesday, Rolf Ekeus, the chief U.N. weapons inspector, said Iraq tested toxins on animals and misled U.N. monitors about the size of its weapons programs.

"Iraq's efforts to conceal its biological weapons program, its chemical missile warhead flight tests and work on the development of a missile for the delivery of a nuclear device led it to provide incorrect information concerning certain of its missile activities," Ekeus said in a report.

The United Nations imposed economic sanctions on Iraq after its 1990 invasion of Kuwait. U.N. Security Council members have repeatedly said they will not consider easing the sanctions until Iraq fully cooperates with the weapons monitors.

James P. Rubin, a spokesman for the U.S. State at the United Nations, said the report shows Iraq's "vast deception effort" and how difficult it will be to prove it has complied with U.N. Security Council resolutions.

Iraqi Vice President Taha Muhiaddin Maarouf on Thursday denied the charges at a ceremony at Martyr's Monument in Baghdad. The ceremony honored about 20 children Iraq says were killed when their nearby school was destroyed by missiles during the 1980-1988 Iraq-Iraq war.

"Dozens of elementary school children marched in a parade around the monument, singing songs and chanting 'We are prepared to sacrifice our souls and selves for our leader, President Saddam Hussein.'"

Smoke, ashes burst from Japan volcano

TOKYO (AP) — Sputtering awake with spiraling plumes of white smoke and smoking ash, a volcano in south-eastern Japan ended 257 years of dormancy Thursday.

Smoke began billowing from Mount Hoshio, 560 miles southwest of Tokyo, early Thursday, residents said.

"No one ever imagined the mountain would ever really blow," local official Mikio Hongo said in a telephone interview.

A loud whoosh was heard emanating from the 5,084-foot mountain late Wednesday evening, Hongo said. Ash began descending over nearby pastures and homes a few hours later.

Experts are monitoring the sudden burst of steam and ash to see if it is a possible precursor to an eruption. The area has been sealed off.

The last eruption was in 1738.

German, 2 Russians face delay in space

MOSCOW (AP) — Two Russians and a German astronaut aboard the Mir space station might get an extra 39 days in space — but they haven't heard about it yet.

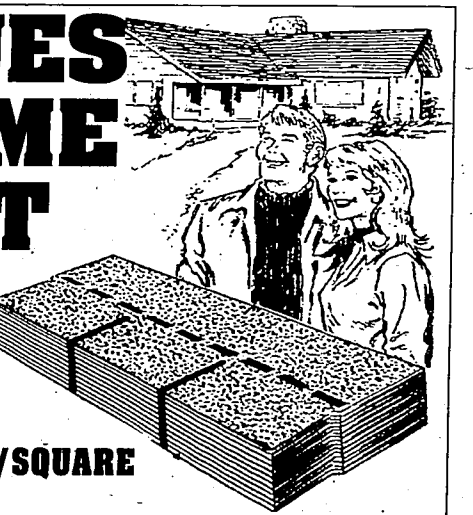
The proposal to give more time in space to Thomas Reiter of the European Space Agency and Russian cosmonauts Yuri Gidzenko and Alexander Avdeyev has been sent to the German Space Agency, said Yuri Tregulakov, a Russian mission control spokesman.

"The original agreement was for a 130-day mission. But since the space ferry that brought them can stay 180 days in orbit, it was decided to make full use of the time and extend the mission," he said today.

Number of states with U.S. nuclear weapons nearly cut in half

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. nuclear weapons are now positioned in 16 states — nine fewer than just three years ago when major cutbacks in the arsenal began, according to private nuclear specialists who have tracked the weapons for a decade.

North Dakota has replaced South Carolina as the state with the most nuclear warheads, and Louisiana's Barksdale Air Force Base is now the single largest U.S. nuclear arms site, a report by Robert Norris

and William Arkin said. The nine states that have become nuclear weapon-free since 1992 are Alaska, Arkansas, Florida, Hawaii, Kansas, Maine, Michigan, New Jersey and New York, they said.

The Pentagon as a matter of policy refuses to discuss locations of nuclear weapons. The report by Norris and Arkin will be published in the coming issue of The Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists. Norris

said it is based on publicly available documents. The two have written numerous authoritative books on nuclear weapons.

In all about 7,000 nuclear warheads are stationed on U.S. territory, plus about 480 at land-based sites in Europe, Arkin and Norris estimated. Also, about 1,500 additional warheads are aboard submarines at sea, they said.

At the peak in the 1980s, there were roughly 24,000 U.S. nuclear warheads

around the world. Now there are about 9,000, and by the turn of the century the total will be about half that if strategic arms reductions treaties are implemented.

In 1992, the Bush administration removed all the American nuclear weapons from South Korea; now the only overseas sites are air bases in Germany, Britain, Turkey, Italy, Greece, the Netherlands and Belgium, Norris and Arkin said.

South Carolina has seen a drop in the number of nuclear warheads on its soil since 1992 because of the retirement of many ballistic missile submarines that were based at Charleston, Norris said in an interview.

Louisiana has seen a slight increase from 910 warheads three years ago to 1,010 now because of its central role in storing nuclear gravity bombs and cruise missiles to arm the several dozen B-52H bombers at Barksdale, Norris said.

2 migrant labor contractors fined

BURLEY - Two migrant labor contractors have been fined by the federal Department of Labor for poor labor standards, according to a departmental news release.

Selen Olivares, a recruiter of migrant workers in Rupert, received \$5,750 fine for housing violations related to crowding, lack of shelter against the elements, holes in the floors, people sleeping on mattresses on the floors, poor water supply and no laundry facilities, or first aid, the release said.

Pedro Silvaz, a contractor for migrants in Burley, received \$4,700 fine for violations including not disclosing work conditions and failing to provide workers with wage statements, safe vehicles and full insurance, the release said.

Olivares could not be reached for comment, and Silvaz had an unpublished telephone number in Burley.

The contractors can request a hearing within a month to challenge the fines under the federal Migrant Seasonal Agricultural Worker Protection Act, the release said.

Twin Falls Airport sees extra security measures

TWIN FALLS - Airline managers are reminding passengers of extra security measures in place at the Twin Falls Airport.

In response to security alerts from the Federal Aviation Administration in the past two months, airlines require all passengers over 18 to carry photo identification, said Lance Horejs, passenger service manager for Horizon Air in Twin Falls.

Some airlines will check each person's identification, he said.

All pieces of luggage - including checked bags - are subject to searches at the discretion of security workers, Horejs said.

Passengers should pack their own bags and keep an eye on their luggage at all times, and they should not accept items from strangers to carry onto an airplane, he said.

Because of terminal construction, parking at the airport is inconvenient, Horejs said.

Except for drop-off, parking is several hundred feet from the terminal, so be prepared to walk.

Passengers who haven't bought tickets should be at the airport 45 minutes before their flight. Those with tickets should be there at least 30 minutes before the flight.

Minico High students can drink water

RUPERT - The ball water order at Minico High School was lifted Thursday after water samples showed the school's old well is bacteria free, an official said.

Officials hope a new well drilled this week will also test negative for coliform bacteria and have electricity and plumbing hooked up to the newly by Marmby, Assistant Superintendent of Health Services said.

Drinking fountains will be back on at the school today, supplied by water from the old well, Goodworth said. Water from the old well will be used until the new well is ready, an official said.

Water from the old well will be tested daily for coliform, said Meryl Eighert, an environmental health specialist for the South Central Health Division.

Students have been drinking bottled water since a tank supplied by the Idaho Army National Guard since Oct. 2 because of a coliform contamination.

Coliform is a family of bacteria found in the intestines of warm blooded animals. Its presence in water indicates that more dangerous bacteria may be present, Eighert said.

Coliform showed up in a routine water sample from the school's well on Sept. 21, according to Alton Johnson, district maintenance supervisor. Eighert implemented a boil water order at the school and drinking fountains were turned off after a second sample tested positive Sept. 25.

Eden eyes recycled asphalt

TWIN FALLS - Twin Falls County's "dire need" for affordable housing was the battle cry for a would-be subdivision developer and a group of realtors. But neighbors of the proposed development argued that 45 houses with wells and septic systems would jeopardize their water and their way of life.

At 11:30 p.m. Thursday, the Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission was still hearing public comment on a "planned unit development" two miles west and two miles south of the Old Towne Bridge.

And they had a roomful of people still waiting to speak.

Duane South of Reno, Nev., wants to turn 63.66 acres of farmland into "South Meadows Estates," with modular single-family homes with ponds, streams and paths.

The land has never been profitable for farming and can't be improved without turning to a non-agricultural use, South told the commission.

But eight people submitted letters opposing the development, and 25 signed a petition which argued that South's plans are "designed for pure profit" and incompatible with the surrounding agricultural land.

South's development would funnel too much traffic onto Highway 74, argued neighbor Delbert Milan.

The county's real housing need is for

homes with larger acreages, area resident Katy Gies said.

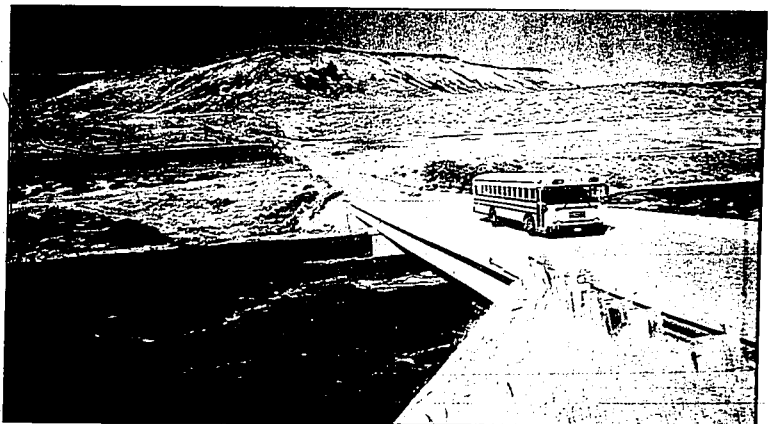
Faced with another tough decision - and packed hearing - Thursday night, the planning commission turned a conflict over dust and noise back to the parties involved.

If they can't work it out, "we may have to make some decisions for them," said planning commissioner Jim Lanting.

Neighbors of Michael Thompson's hay-cubing business south of Hollister said they have been "living through hell" - a hell blanketed by hay dust and plagued by noise.

Thompson said he would look at changing his operation to reduce complaints.

Bliss Bridge shows wear from landslide, high water

BLISS - 1995's wet weather and high water in the Snake River have accelerated erosion around the south end of the Bliss Bridge and widened a crack in the bridge's west side, according to an engineer.

This winter, the Twin Falls Highway District will have to repair Shoestring Road's span over the river, but neither the erosion nor the crack threaten the safety of the structure, said Marilyn

Broek of Flamingo Engineers in Twin Falls.

"It is a real good bridge," she said. "At this point, there's not a danger to the public," said Dave Burgess, road foreman for the highway district.

A landslide in 1993 dumped a load of dirt into the river and shifted the flows to the south side, Broek said. She said she has been monitoring erosion around the south end of the Bliss Bridge for quite a while and is still using a "wait and see" philosophy.

This spring, the crack in the bridge

grew to 15 feet long, Broek said. At the top, the crack is about an inch wide.

Broek receives federal funds to inspect bridges in Twin Falls County that are not on state or federal highways.

At the highway district's meeting next Friday, she will recommend several measures that could reverse the "serious erosion" before it endangers the road itself, she said.

The Bliss Bridge connects the farms of Bell Rapids in Twin Falls County to the town of Bliss.

Last year, the organization assisted in the

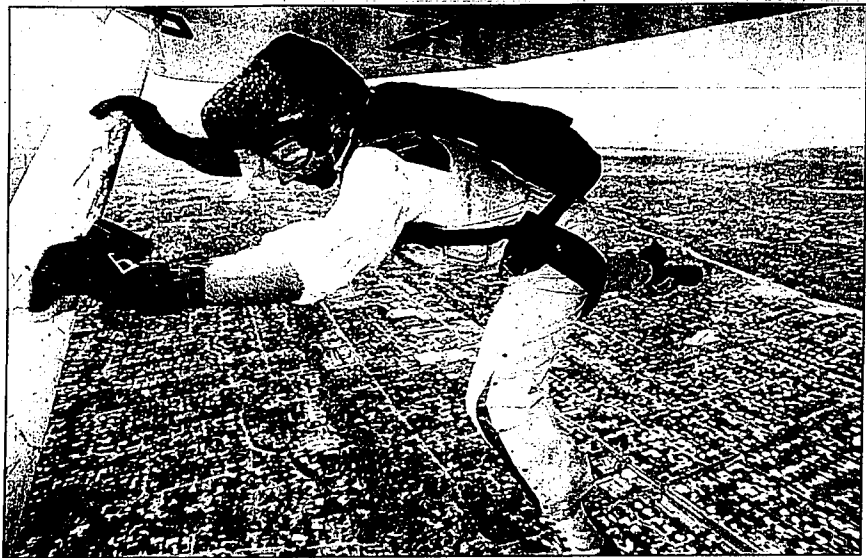
care of 720 youths in the various programs.

Forest reopens timber sale areas

GRANGEVILLE (AP) — The Nez Perce National Forest has reopened roads to the public around two timber sales near Dixie, but protesters vow to continue their opposition to logging in the Cove-Mallard area.

The Forest Service ordered the area of the timber sales closed in June for public safety and to prevent interference with timber workers. But Red River Ranger Ed Wood said Wednesday that the road closures were not directed toward any particular group.

"I didn't hear one complaint from the general public other than the Cove-Mallard activists," Wood said. Environmentalists in the Cove-Mallard Coalition have waged a

high-profile civil disobedience campaign for three years against road building and logging in the Cove-Mallard area. They contend the Forest Service is violating federal environmental laws by allowing development in a crucial roadless habitat for wildlife.

Wood said Wednesday that they began work on the Cove-Mallard only after nearly a decade of legal debate, which finally determined that the timber-sales-violated no-environmental laws.

Wood said timber sales scheduled in the area. The Grouse Creek sale was logged last year and the Noble sale is about one-third completed, Wood said. It is scheduled to be completed by October 1996 and will yield 8.6

million board feet of timber. The Noble sale will yield 6 million board feet of timber and is scheduled to be completed by January 1998. Contractors are building 13 miles of road into the sale, all but four of which have been completed.

Wood said timber sales were ordered only after activists began interfering with contractors working in the forest, prompting concerns about public safety.

"Until that time anybody was free to go out and look at what we were doing," he said. "People weren't endangering themselves and that pattern can very easily continue as long as people show some sense and don't interfere. We're not afraid of people watching us."

South Fork salvage sale prompts protest

BOISE (AP) — Fish advocates are outraged by the U.S. Forest Service's decision to allow salvage logging on the site of Idaho's 1994 Thunderbolt fire, an important spawning area for the endangered Snake River chinook salmon.

The Payette and Boise national forests have announced their decision to allow logging of 3,237 acres of the 27,000-acre Thunderbolt fire

northeast of Cascade, which burned on the slopes leading to the South Fork of the Salmon River.

Boise forest spokesman Frank Carroll confirmed the "Alternative D" chosen offered up the largest amount of timber.

But he added the sale will take up a small portion of the burned area, yet provide money to stabilize slopes in many other areas to pro-

tect fish habitat, he said. "You have to have the money to keep the hillsides out of the river."

"Is there any stream that is top sensitive for logging? Are we so desperate for logs that we have to go into one of the most important chinook recovery streams in Idaho?"

"Then we're a little too desperate," said David Bayles, Pacific Rivers Council senior program director.

2-year deadline in aid draws fire at hearing

POCATELLO (AP) — A few of the proposed changes by Gov. Phil Batt's Welfare Reform Council will not rather than help recipients' chances of rebuilding their lives, said participants at a Pocatello hearing.

The council has 42 ideas to tighten financial and personal responsibility requirements for welfare recipients.

The most heated exchanges concerned limiting welfare recipients to two years of cash assistance.

Mothers, counselors and other

professionals said two years simply is not enough time for most people to rebound.

"Some of the most successful students come in at a very low educational level. I'm concerned two years will not be enough time for them to become gainfully employed," said Margaret Jacobs, a teacher who helps those mothers become self-sufficient.

"Vocational programs take two years, and you have to have at least two years to get family wage-earning jobs," counselor Julie Burns said.

Montana governor to officials: Open government key to trust

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Gov. Marc Racicot has urged state personnel officers and lawyers to provide as much information to the public as they can without violating the privacy of government employees.

Openness is the key to improving public trust in their government, he told those attending the annual Equal Employment Opportunity Conference on Thursday.

"We have a craving to want to restore confidence in government, and we are willing to do anything

possible to set people's minds at ease that we're doing the best that we can," Racicot said.

"The more open we can be, the better off we will be," he advised in opening a discussion of handling requests for information from state personnel records.

The consensus was that decisions on disclosing details of most employee matters must be made on a case-by-case basis, depending partly on the type of information being sought and the stature of the employee involved.

2 Mini-Cassia felons take on appeals court

HAILEY — Two Mini-Cassia area felons — one a convicted rapist and the other imprisoned on a conviction of drunken driving that resulted in a serious injury accident — took their cases to the Idaho Court of Appeals Thursday.

Paul Joseph Pugsley, of Heyburn, was convicted in 1994 of three charges of lewd and lascivious conduct with a pre-teen girl. He also was convicted of one count of rape of a teenage girl in another trial the same year. Pugsley was sentenced to life in prison on the lewd conduct charges.

Pugsley, represented by Burley lawyer James Annett, has appealed on several grounds. According to a case synopsis provided by the Appeals Court, Pugsley claims his right to effective counsel was violated, that he was punished twice for the same offense, and that improper evidence was admitted during each of his trials. He also claims that his sentences were excessive and amounted to cruel and unusual punishment.

Arcadio Rodriguez, in his early 60s, also appealed his conviction. Rodriguez was sentenced in 1994 to one to five years in prison in connection with a drunken driving accident in which a Kimberly family was seriously injured.

Rodriguez was represented by Rupert attorney Dave Pena, who appealed Rodriguez's conviction on grounds that he was subjected to a blood alcohol level test that violated his constitutional protection against unreasonable searches and seizures.

Rodriguez was hospitalized after the accident and doesn't remember consenting to a blood alcohol test, Pena said.

Rodriguez's argument is based on an Idaho Supreme Court ruling that determined officials cannot search a home without a warrant, Pena said, relying only on the basis that evidence may be destroyed by the time officials obtained a warrant.

In Rodriguez's case, officials were after traces of alcohol that could have been in his system. Any evidence would have disappeared after a period of time.

Pena extended the home to the body, arguing that the U.S. Supreme Court has determined that the body is even more sacred than the home.

In the Cassia County case, Rodriguez entered a conditional, guilty plea, reserving the right to appeal the court's denial of his request to not allow the blood alcohol level test as evidence.

Appeals Court Justices heard oral arguments in the two cases in Hailey Thursday. They may issue their rulings at any time, Pena said.

Declo residents to see an electricity rate hike

DECLO — Residents will notice a 4 percent increase in their next electrical bill.

Council members voted unanimously to pass on a 4 percent rate increase from Bonneville Power Administration to city residents. The federal agency raised its rates about 4 percent effective Oct. 1.

"Financially, we don't have any alternative," City Clerk Nelda Matthews told the council.

For the past year, council members have been working to show that the city's water system is self-supporting and not being subsidized by other utility funds. That was part of the deal when the city passed a \$200,000 bond issue to help pay for the city's new water system project.

If the electrical system is to pay for

itself as well, increases have to be passed on to the customers instead of being absorbed by the city's budget Mayor Jay Darrington and the other council members agreed.

Matthews said that a 4 percent rate increase on a \$125 power bill, would be a \$5 increase.

The City Council approved sending a notice out with the next billing, detailing the new rate hike and the reason behind it.

Showdown likely when Education Board meets

The state Board of Education is headed for a showdown next week over control of engineering education in Boise.

Board member Tom Dillon of Caldwell is circulating a plan that would be drafting a consultant's recommendation to create a Boise State University engineering program independent of the University of Idaho. Dillon intends to press for a vote when the board meets next Thursday in Twin Falls.

Dillon's plan is specific to engineering, but proponents say a Boise State-run engineering program also would break the rivalry between the roles and missions assigned to the state's universities in 1983.

"We know that every day that goes by, a system that is going to be outdated is getting more firmly entrenched," Dillon said Wednesday.

While some officials think that will make higher education more responsive to regional needs in Idaho, others fear it sets the stage for an expansion that a small state with limited means and wide-spread anti-



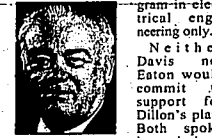

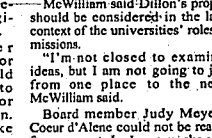

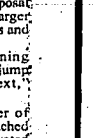

tax sentiment cannot afford.

Meanwhile, businesses that support leaving the Boise engineering program under the University of Idaho umbrella are lobbying board members heavily. Students attending University of Idaho engineering classes in Boise also are circulating petitions to keep the program as it is.

Student and faculty representatives have secured a spot on the board agenda to make their case.

The board received a report last month from consulting Aims Engineers that advocated, among other things, a free-standing Boise State engineering program to better serve the needs of students and high-tech companies in the Treasure Valley. The board had decided in

January, by a 5-3 vote, to expand the Boise program under the University of Idaho's jurisdiction over objections of Micron Technology Inc., which has spearheaded the campaign for a Boise State-run school.

Dillon was convinced at least four of his colleagues on the eight-member board to reverse that decision. He can count on the support of Jerry Hess of Nampa and State Schools Superintendent Anne Fox.

Ultimately, common sense dictates that Boise State University will have its own engineering program, Hess said Wednesday. "The longer we drag it out, the more difficult it is, the more costly it is and the less responsive to the con-

ditions of Idaho."

Hess joined the board after its January engineering vote. He replaced former Micron Technology chairman Joe Parkinson of Boise, who voted with Dillon and Fox in favor of a Boise State-run program. Hess is a member of the Micron board of directors.

Harold Davis of Idaho Falls, who also joined the state board after engineering vote, and board President Curtis Eaton of Twin Falls said they were studying Dillon's proposal and considering the consultant's recommendations carefully.

Gov. Phil Batt, who had tried to stay out of the dispute, has given his support to a Boise State-run pro-

gram in electrical engineering only.

Neither Davis nor Eaton would commit to support for Dillon's plan. Both spoke instead about the progress made over the summer in the University of Idaho-Boise State cooperative program.

"I don't see any point in going in and doing major surgery on this system," Davis said.

"At one time at the beginning of the year some elements of commerce and industry were being very vocal about engineering needing to be at Boise State," Eaton said. "And frankly, we haven't heard that comment from industry lately."

Roy Mosman of Moscow and Carole McWilliam of Pocatello said they would vote against Dillon's plan.

"I haven't seen any evidence that would justify reopening this thing," Mosman said.

McWilliam said Dillon's proposal should be considered in the larger context of the universities' roles and missions.

"I'm not closed to examining ideas, but I am not going to jump from one place to the next," McWilliam said.

Board member Judy Meyer of Coeur d'Alene could not be reached for comment. In January, she voted in favor of maintaining University of Idaho control.

Meanwhile, the University of Idaho's engineering dean questioned the urgency of Dillon's proposal and warned that its adoption could cause the cooperative program to unravel before a transfer could be completed.

Lawmakers' Endangered Species Act proposals prompt criticism

BOISE (AP) — Sen. Dirk Kempthorne's legislation to revamp the Endangered Species Act could cause the extinction of Idaho's salmon runs or its grizzly bears, a conservation group warns.

Sen. Republican Rep. Helen Chenoweth said she is pushing amendments to the act which would enforce the things the Idaho Endangered Species Coalition fears.

The coalition also reported Thursday that requests to hold official Idaho public hearings into Kempthorne's measure were rejected, said conducted one in Boise and plans another in Pocatello.

The 22-year-old bill was a little too strict and we made some errors, but the basic concept of the Endangered Species Act is something we should be following and what we should carry into the future," said Murphy Nelson, an expert in restoration who was instrumental in the creation of the Snake River Birds of Prey National Preserve in Boise.

Kempthorne's proposal would take into account the act's effects on people with a financial stake in the species habitat.

Since human use of the habitat is the main cause for extinction, it would essentially erase all defenses for endangered species now provided by law, said Boise biologist Katherine Strickler. It removes the National Marine Fisheries Service from management of species, such as the endangered Snake River chippewack and sockeye salmon.

Kempthorne's bill also precludes help for "disruptive" population segments, the coalition said. "It virtually eliminates protection for Idaho salmon and steelhead," Strickler said. "As long as the salmon populations in Alaska are doing fine in, there will be no need

to protect Idaho salmon."

The measure redefines "taking" of an endangered species so that only intentional killing or injury would be banned, she said.

Since hydropower developments are obviously not intended to destroy salmon and steelhead, although they do, and clearcutting in the greater Yellowstone ecosystem is not intended to destroy grizzly habitat, although it does, those actions would be allowed," Strickler said.

Coalition members said they asked for hearings in Idaho, but were denied. So they held a Sept. 21 Boise meeting which attracted about 200 people, most in support of maintaining a strong act.

They plan a Pocatello meeting sometime in November. Meanwhile, Chenoweth said Thursday she was amending an Endangered Species Act reform bill in the House Resources Committee to bolster private property rights.

"We need to reach a point that landowners aren't threatened with losing the use of their land when an endangered critter dies to make its home die," she said.

Switching channels

Stay tuned to the changes on the TV dial

TWIN FALLS — In Denver, a television station that was switching its network affiliation set up a telephone help line to assist befuddled viewers.

There are no plans to do the same in this, the 195th-largest TV market in the country, but stay tuned.

For the wild scramble by the four commercial TV networks for stations to broadcast their programming has reached even southern Idaho.

Stations in Twin Falls and Idaho Falls have announced plans to switch their network allegiances, and more will probably follow.

"It's a different world for television these days," said George Brown, program director of Twin Falls' KMVT-TV, a longtime CBS affiliate. "Stations are changing networks all over the country, and I'm sure, they're confusing viewers in the process."

"There's just so much more programming now," said Dick McMahon, who manages Twin Falls' KKVI-TV, which will drop its ABC affiliation and air Fox Broadcasting programming exclusively starting in January. "Local stations have a lot more choices."

For those stations, locked into agreements with ABC, CBS, Fox or NBC to get the programming they needed, choices have traditionally been few and far between. But four developments in the past decade have turned the TV industry upside down:

- The rise of whole new industry in selling syndicated programs, initially remains of popular network shows such as "M-A-S-H" and "Cheers," and eventually original productions, such as "Star Trek: The Next Generation" and "Baywatch." It's now possible for a station to buy enough programming to fill its broadcast schedule.

- The rapid growth of cable TV technology, through satellites and fiber-optics, and the proliferation of companies to supply programming to fill all those channels for all those hours. In 1975, the average cable system in America offered 12 channels; now it's more than 40 — and rising fast.

- Changes in ownership of dozens of large-market stations, followed by wholesale changes in network affiliations. For example, CBS bought the Salt Lake City NBC affiliate, KUTV-TV last year, forcing its own longtime local affiliate, KSL-TV, to find a new network. It chose NBC.

- The dramatic growth, in just six years, of Fox Broadcasting into a fledgling major network, which broadcasts popular programs such as "Melrose Place," "Beverly Hills 90210" and "The Simpsons," really entered the big time last year when it outbid CBS for rights to broadcast the NFL football game. Two weeks into the current television season, it's already the third-ranked network, ahead of CBS.

All of that means that local stations, long the loyal subjects of the networks, have suddenly found themselves in a new market.

"We were being courted by ABC and NBC, and that was a nice position to be in," said Rickie Brady, general manager of Idaho Falls' KIFI-TV, which is ending its 35-year association with NBC to become an ABC affiliate.

That switch helped prompt KKV1's move to Fox, since KKV1's sister station in Pocatello, KPVI-TV, is the current ABC affiliate in eastern Idaho. Sunbelt Communications, the company that owns

- Twin Falls' KKVI-TV, Channel 6 on local cable and Channel 25 on the air, will drop its ABC programming in January and become strictly a Fox Broadcasting affiliate.
- Idaho Falls' KIFI-TV, Channel 8, which for more than a decade has broadcast NBC programming to Cassia and Blaine counties, will become an ABC affiliate soon. But it's already another NBC affiliate on cable subscribers' dishes in the eastern Magic Valley, Salt Lake City's KSL-TV.
- Pocatello's KIVI-TV, which is rebroadcast on Channel 88 in Twin Falls and is available on a part-time basis to Continental Communications subscribers, is likely to become the source of ABC programming for most cable customers in the Magic Valley in January.

KKVI and KPVI, is now negotiating with NBC for a possible affiliation agreement in Pocatello, according to Sunbelt Broadcasting's Neary Neuhardt. "It's really no secret," Neuhardt said. "I hope we'll have an announcement soon."

Having as many affiliates as possible is critical to networks because the number of viewers they reach determines how much they can charge advertisers that buy time on their programs. Broadcasting popular shows is vital to local stations for the same reason.

That's one reason why more than three dozen stations nationwide have changed allegiances in the past two years — particularly to Fox.

"Part of CBS' ratings problem has been the fact that when some of its VHF stations (Channels 2 through 13) left, they were replaced to UHF stations (channel 14 on up)," Brown said. "That's confusing for viewers."

Compared with the rest of the country, the Twin Falls TV market has been a model of stability. KMVT, a CBS affiliate for most of its nearly 40-year history, continues to dominate broadcast viewership in Twin Falls, Cassia, Jerome and Lincoln counties, pulling an 8 rating and a 31 share in the Nielsen ratings last May.

That meant that 8 percent of the available TV households were tuned into KMVT, involving 31 percent of the audience.

KITF, the Twin Falls NBC affiliate, had a 3 rating and a 11 share, and KKVI, which broadcast ABC and Fox programming, had a 2 rating and a 9 share.

But that's just what's available from the local market. Cable, with its multitude of choices and burgeoning number

 of subscribers, scrambles the equation, and the satellite dish industry — which is just coming into its own — is the wild card.
 "We're going to have to make some decisions in the next few months about what to do with our station lineup," said Vince Thompson, general manager of Continental Cablevision, which has nearly 16,000 subscribers in Twin Falls, Jerome, Gooding and Cassia counties.
 "My guess is that one channel will go to KIVI (the Nampa ABC affiliate), and I'm reluctant to drop

KTRV (another Nampa station that broadcasts Fox programming), which is one of the highest-rated independent stations in the country," he said.
 And thanks to Continental's ongoing re-fit and upgrade of its equipment, Thompson may have as many as five new channels available next year.
 "There are a lot of options," he said.
 "Until now, there just hasn't been enough hours in the day for stations like ours to broadcast the programming that's available," said McMahon, who's shopping

for syndicated shows to fill in the hours around Fox's prime-time schedule.
 "We're showing Ricki Lake, which is one of the highest-rated talk shows, at 12:05 (a.m.) just because we don't have any other time to show it. Does anyone (in this market) watch TV at 12:05?"
 If not, it's not for lack of opportunity. If you're an insomniac, you don't like Ricki Lake, you have cable and satellite dish — approximately 200 alternatives — that hour.

Years of smoking end with agonizing death

DEAR ABBY: I'm writing in response to "Call it in Georgia," the woman who is now paying the price for being a smoker. She now breathes with the help of a respirator.

When I read her sad letter, I cried. My mother also tried to quit smoking. She tried hypnosis three times at \$60 a pop. Her resolve lasted only 45 minutes after each session.

For as long as I can remember, my two brothers and I pleaded with Mom to quit — not only for her health but ours as well. My brother, Brent, had constant earaches, and I had constant throat problems due to her smoking.

I was afraid I would lose not only my mother, but my best friend. Although I hunted her about her smoking for years, I failed. She was diagnosed with lung cancer on Sept. 7, 1993. After two weeks of testing, cancer was found all through her body.

Even though she was on oxygen at the hospital and could barely breathe without it, she was sent home with only "pump" treatments. As soon as she finished her treatments, she'd ask someone to light a cigarette for her. She was furious with me because I refused. She could no longer sit up in a chair without support, yet I continued to argue with her about smoking.

Everyone said, "Give it up, Tara. Let her do what she wants — let her be happy." They say that she was dying. How could she be dying? She was only 49 years old. I was her youngest — her 16-year-old daughter. Besides, the doctor told us she had six months to two years — not 37 days! She stopped smoking when she died of cancer on Oct. 11, 1993.

Two years ago, I was crying out to my mother and to God! Now I'm crying out to every smoker. Mother started smoking when she was 16, but she never intended to smoke her entire life. Many teens have the same idea. They think they'll smoke "for now" — then quit without a problem. My mother's death is proof that it's not that easy. If teen smokers could have seen what my mother went through, they wouldn't even start.

I think Mother's history should be included in health education classes offered to students. Also, in order to pass the class, students should have to spend at least one week with a dying cancer patient and his or her family.

It's a living hell. Once they saw that smoking eventually makes one incapable of moving, breathing and living, they would feel the heartbreak that I felt.

Another thing I don't understand is my father. He was there every day, watching Mother die. He has now remarried — and would you believe to a smoker! She's not allowed to smoke in our house, so she smokes outdoors. I may not be breathing her toxic fumes, but my father is. I thought he'd have known better after seeing one wife die from cancer. Dad has a bad heart condi-

tion, and breathing in smoke is bad for him. I love Dad with all my heart, and can't bear the thought of losing him — especially to second-hand smoke.

Abby, your column reaches millions. I hope my letter will make a difference. If it prevents just one person from smoking, it will be well worth it. You may use my name.

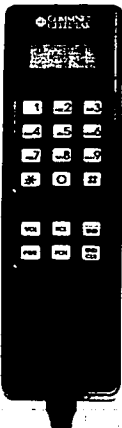

'Scarlet' deserves letter grade of F

"The Scarlet Letter" is filled with delusions.

Director Roland Joffe and screenwriter Douglas Day Stewart think they are molding the work of art that Nathaniel Hawthorne would have created had he not been hampered by censorship.

Film review

Demi Moore gives the impression that she's not satisfied with playing one of American literature's most famous heroines but aims to sculpt a modern role model. Everything in the screenplay seems calculated to canonize Demi Moore rather than her character of Hester Prynne.

The movie tackles some very justifiable targets in the hypocrisy and tyranny of rigid, small-minded people. And, oh, it is pretty. It almost resembles a photo layout from a 17th-century National Geographic. But dramatically it's wooden and hollow.

Both Joffe's direction and Stewart's screenplay are ludicrously heavy-handed. They felt they could improve on Hawthorne by including American Indian warfare, witchcraft trials and quickly shot scalplings. They linger over scenes of "sexual awakening" — which means literary purists best prepare themselves for sequences of nudity and masturbation.

As everyone who survived high school English knows, "The Scarlet Letter" is the story of Hester, a woman of both passion and compassion. She must wear a scarlet "A" to symbolize the act of adultery that resulted in the birth of a child out of wedlock. By its end, the book reveals what was suspected for many chapters — her lover was the tormented Rev. Arthur Dimmesdale. The novel's tragic denouement is followed by a relatively upbeat prologue.

The new movie relates the story in a purely chronological format. From the beginning, we watch the handsome clergyman and the beautiful Hester (whose absent husband is reported dead) make meaningful eye contact, fantasize about one another and finally consummate their attraction. Their love scene is handled with solemn absurdity.

The movie has little suspense or psychological probing. Everyone speaks in halting tones and seems to move in slow motion. The best performance comes from Gary Oldman, vulnerable and appealing as the remorseful Dimmesdale, whose progressive views are sometimes too much for New England Puritans.

But this unfortunate scribbling of "The Scarlet Letter" also will be

remembered for one of Robert Duvall's few truly embarrassing performances. As Hester's crazed husband, who inevitably shows up at the most inconvenient time for the clandestine lovers, he virtually parodies

the memorable loonies he played so impressively in "Apocalypse Now" and "The Great Santini."

Ultimately, "The Scarlet Letter" is a prodigious Hollywood waste. (Twin Cinema)

Film presents 'Strange Days' indeed

Like such well-known targets of conservative invective as "Natural Born Killers" and "True Romance," "Strange Days" is an action picture with a serious side.

And it'll make some folks cringe: not just Bob Dole's cine-phobic crusaders but also some genuine movie buffs — people who actually take the trouble to watch a film before condemning it.

What some moviegoers may find so unsettling about the new movie is that it hits below the level of consciousness.

Watching parts of "Strange Days," a person could start to lose control.

And that's just the sort of thing that makes some folks feel lost and panicked — even angry.

This audacious new production explores a topic that many film makers instinctively realize is full of potential — virtual reality. In that sense, the movie's like "Johnny Mnemonic," "Virtuosity" and parts of "Disclosure."

But "Strange Days" gets it right: This futuristic thrill ride of a film uses the double-edged promise of a kinky new technology to bring us into the lives of its characters.

The focus is Lenny Nero (Ralph Fiennes), a former cop who now calls himself "the Santa Claus of the subconscious."

He deals in illegal disks — known as "clips" — on which are recorded particularly sexy, lurid or violent fragments of actual people's lives.

When you play a clip, you temporarily experience the illusion of being that person doing whatever he (or she) was doing while being recorded: having sex, murdering, being murdered, whatever.

"This is not like TV only better," Lenny explains, promoting this potent "playback" technology to a client. "This is life — a piece of somebody's life."

As "Strange Days" begins, we're in Los Angeles and it's the tail-end of 1999. But even if the action did not take place on the last two days of the millennium, this film would have an air of summation.

What gets Lenny's attention — and sets the plot in motion — is a prostitute who turns up dead. This

particular hooker used to do "wire work" for him — that is, recording her experiences for Lenny to sell as clips.

Just before she died, the hooker told Lenny that she was in some kind of trouble. She also said that Faith (Juliette Lewis), his old girlfriend, was in the same kind of jam.

And because Lenny still loves Faith, he suddenly finds his life at serious risk.

As that plot description may suggest, this is one unusual action picture.

It's a lot of other things too — murder mystery, sci-fi thriller, tale of redemption, political statement, love story.

The director is Kathryn Bigelow, maybe the only female filmmaker to have surfaced in recent years who has demonstrated a consistent interest in action movies.

"Near Dark" — her lyrically offbeat vampire flick of 1987 — had been (until now) the strongest of her films, which also include "Point Break" (1991) and "Blue Steel" (1990).

Bigelow's knack for fast-paced action, her skill at evoking a threatening atmosphere and her affinity with damaged people all

come together in the daringly kinetic new film, which takes off from a script by Jay Cocks ("The Age of Innocence") and James Cameron — Bigelow's ex-husband and the director of "Aliens," the Terminator films and (Dolby-favorite) "True Lies."

In "Strange Days," Bigelow presents the virtual-reality scenes boldly, from the point of

view of the person whose life is featured on the clip. Watching these scenes, you may feel as if your head has become a movie camera.

And the director's forcefully fluid camerawork helps to extend the compelling motion of the action scenes to the other scenes too. (Twin Cinema, Magic Lantern Cinema of Keetchum)

Fall TV season is off, but it's stumbling

HOLLYWOOD — Last season's race among the crop of new network series came up with a couple of clear winners right out of the gate: NBC's "Friends" and "ER."

But this season's new entries are moving at a much slower clip, with no obvious winners so far.

With the release Tuesday of ratings for the third week of the official prime-time season, analysts said nearly all of the 42 new network series have failed to make much of a mark,

with the few shows that are doing well having the benefit of a potent lead-in from established hits.

Only a few of the sitcoms that have fashioned themselves after "Friends" are generating significant audiences, and many new dramas, including "Central Park West" and "The Monroes," are being left in the dust.

"It's still a little early, but there are not any programs that seem to be hitting a breakthrough stride like when "ER" and "Friends" broke through the clutter," said Bill Crossdale, from Western International Media.

Ever jaded, Fiorentino steals the show

After seeing "Showgirls" and "Basic Instinct" and "Silver" and "Jade," I feel like screenwriter Joe Eszterhas' therapist.

"Jade" is another one of Eszterhas' I'm-dating-a-woman-who-might-be-a-murderer-movies and what the character is a character is a stripper/whore, a novelist/whore, an editor/whore or, as in "Jade," a psychologist/whore, his obsessions are so clear and so Sigma Chi: He hates strong women and he punishes them by divesting them of all their clothes (in this case, coming on the phone) and making them look foolish.

What is most interesting about "Jade" is the

extent to which Linda Fiorentino resists this treatment. Oh, she's nude all right, but it is not possible to make this intelligent, flinty actress look foolish. Fiorentino brings so much to the party that she makes her character — a clinical psychologist who may or may not be "Jade" — a mystery woman who has sex with powerful men who later croak — much more interesting than she's meant to be.

She throws off the balance of the movie, which has Eszterhas' trademark crude dialog and lecherous subtext and is supposed to be about the romantic rivalry of two men who love Fiorentino. One man, played by Chazz

Palminieri, is a lawyer who knows too much, and the other, played by David Caruso, is the cop investigating Jade. They're both good actors, but you resent them for taking the screen away from Fiorentino.

Save your resentment for the script, with a finale that is nonsensical even by movie standards. Along the way, there's lots of tedious one-upmanship between the men and a lengthy chase scene that somehow finds its way into a Chinatown parade. And if you're remembering that that's exactly what happened in the "What's Up, Doc?" bit that made fun of this kind of chase scene, you have a better memory than anyone who worked on "Jade." (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

Same old, same old playing at the theater

Capsule reviews

Movies playing in south-central Idaho theaters this weekend. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and reviews are by Knight-Ridder Newspapers and the Los Angeles Times.

"A Walk In The Clouds" — "Like Water for Chocolate's" Alfonso Arau's American debut is a major miscalculation, a way over-the-top romantic fable, "magic realism"-style, set in 1945. Disillusioned returning GI Keanu Reeves comes to the rescue of the pregnant but unmarried daughter (Spanish actress Aitana Sanchez-Gijon) of a poor girl, a top-notch American Napa Valley wine-making family who live in a veritable Shangri-La, where life seems one long fiesta, interrupted by the temper tantrums of the daughter's father (Giancarlo Giannini). With Anthony Quinn as the family's wise old patriarch. (PG-13, for moments of sensuality and war action.) (Motor-Vu Drive-in)

"Assassins" — Richard Donner directs Sylvester Stallone as a top-notch hit man who discovers that he himself is the target of a hit. Antonio Banderas and Julianne Moore co-star in this suspense thriller. (R.) (Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, The Movie House of Ketchum)

"The Big Green" — You know the story. Dweeb kids form team. There are villains. There is love. Take your kids anyway; it's worth a giggle or two. Rated M, bathroom humor. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Ace Theatre of Wendell, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

"Dangerous Minds" — The true story of an ex-Marine who turns to teaching troubled youth is transformed into meaningless piffle in this superficial, unrealistic production. Michelle Pfeiffer as the teacher does as good a job as the material allows, but it's a waste of time (language.) (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Ace Theatre of Wendell)

"Devil In A Blue Dress" — Based on Walter Mosley's novel, this is about a private investigator played by Denzel Washington, who gets caught up in web of murder, blackmail and scandalous politicians. Washington's characterization is lazy and disappointing, and the film is plodding in spots. Matter: A sequel no doubt is coming. (Sun Valley Opera House)

"Hackers" — A vaguely punky cybercaper that zooms down the fast lane of the information highway, all about a gang of rebellious high school laptopers pitted against an evil uber-hacker. Actually, the plot is incidental (and dumb). Director Iain Softley is far better at evoking the rock-and-roll energy of teen-agers crashing an electronic world party. The Mod Squad meets "The Net." PG-13 (profanity, sexual situations, violence) (Motor-Vu Drive-in)

"How To Make An American Quilt" — Though its cast (including Winona Ryder, Ellen Burstyn, Lois Smith, Jean Simmons and Kate Nelligan) is impressive and the novel it was adapted from was well reviewed, this is a promising-sounding story of women's perspectives on romantic relationships ends up more ordinary than its elements would lead you to believe. (PG-13, for a scene of drug use, some sensuality and nudity.) (Twin Cinema)

"Last Of The Dogmen" — Though it lacks so much as a single

original aspect, this story of an ornery bounty hunter (Tom Berenger) and a feisty anthropology professor (Barbara Hershey) who head into the wilderness of Montana to search for the owners of a mysterious Cherokee arrow benefits from the respect with which it treats its Western material. (PG, adventure violence and mild language.) (Twin Cinema)

"Pocahontas" — Disney's 33rd animated feature has much to recommend it, including a gorgeous look and a fearless, strong-minded Native American heroine. But in other respects it tends to duplicate what its predecessors have done, with a little less style. (G) (Burley Theater, Jerome Cinema)

"Seven" — A serial killer is on the loose and he's preaching against society's ills by targeting people who represent the seven deadly sins. Brad Pitt and Morgan Freeman — a head and a deep thinker — are cops who team up to stop the insanity. Maybe. The film is scary and creepy enough to make you gasp aloud. Really. Rated R; profanity and gruesome murders. (Mall Cinema, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

"Steal Big, Steal Little" — Identical twin brothers, both played by Andy Garcia, feud over money and land in this long, complicated, but not very interesting story. Rated PG-13. (Century Cinema of Burley)

"To Wong Foo, Thanks For Everything, Julie Newmar" — The amusing tale of seeing stars like Wesley Snipes, Patrick Swayze and John Leguizamo flouncing around in dresses does not match the tedium generated by a drag-queens-on-the-road plot. (PG-13, subject matter involving drug use, a brief scene of spousal abuse, and some language.) (Twin Cinema, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

"The Usual Suspects" — Five top-drawer criminals are thrown together in a prison holding tank and what results, in the hands of director Bryan Singer and screenwriter Christopher McQuarrie, is a fatalistic tale of power, betrayal, crime and punishment. Don't expect to follow the plot completely, just be prepared to hang on for a virtuosic ride. Gabriel Byrne, Chazz Palminteri and Kevin Spacey head a fine cast. (R, violence and a substantial amount of strong language.) (Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

Filter can plug in to the future

Not only did Richard Patrick and Brian Liesegang make ample use of computers while recording Filter's debut, but they even advocate it in the album's liner notes, writing that technology "in the hands of creative, intelligent individuals is a tool for art, not a hindrance."

At first glance, then, the album's title, "Short Bus," might seem a computer reference along the lines of "data bus" or "expansion bus." (A bus, for those out of the digital loop, is a combination of software, hardware and wiring inside a computer that helps shuttle the data between devices). But as it turns out, the phrase actually has fairly low-tech origins.

"Short bus" is not a reference to any kind of electronics," says Liesegang, the band's chief programmer, over the phone from a tour stop in Dallas. "It was slang when we were kids for someone who was different or weird, because the short bus was the bus that took the handicapped or otherwise maladjusted or different kids to school."

"It became a derogatory word, and I guess we wanted to claim it back. We'd rather hang out with someone that would be on the short bus than your average, homogenous frat-boy type."

Not that Liesegang and his band mates were themselves short bus denizens. "We all have our ailments, psychological or otherwise, but no," he says. "Actually, I think our bass player, Frank (Cavanaugh), rode the short bus, but that was 'cause his mom drove it."

Being misfits by nature, neither Liesegang nor Patrick ever expected "Short Bus" to sell, much less end up with a modern rock hit — the dark, catchy "Hey Man, Nice

Shot" — and a secure spot in the Billboard Hot 100.

"We're lucky to exist in the post- Nirvana era, where you can make the kind of record you want," Liesegang says. "It can be hard, and it can be honest and loud and abrasive, and you can play with different textures and still get played on the radio. You know, five years ago, this stuff wouldn't have been possible."

"Rich and I were doing this stuff way back then, and our influences back then were bands that never sold more than 10,000 records," he adds. "We never saw, really, how we could make a living at it, but it was something we wanted to do. Luckily, the climate has changed."

Indeed it has. How else to explain the impact of "Nice Shot," an unblinking and unromanticized look at what drives a man to suicide? "It's not encouragement of suicide, I mean, the song was inspired by many things, one of which being the public suicide of R. Budd Dwyer," says Liesegang, referring to the Pennsylvania state treasurer who, facing charges over an alleged kickback scheme, put a bullet in his brain during a 1987 news conference.

As Liesegang sees it, the song is "more of an examination and a celebration of the guts that that guy had in the face of adversity. It's trying to get inside that mindset, and understand it."

Bruce, Rams dump Falcons

ST. LOUIS — Isaac Bruce and Jerry Rice. Two of a kind?

"He's just as good as Rice, that's for sure," teammate Todd Kinchen said after Bruce caught 10 passes for 191 yards and two touchdowns Thursday night in the St. Louis Rams' 21-19 victory over the Atlanta Falcons. "If not better."

Bruce wouldn't let special teams mistakes and turnovers stop the Rams, one of the NFL's biggest surprises in their first season in St. Louis. It was Bruce's third 100-yard receiving day in four games and he set up one of his scores by running 51 yards on a lateral from Kinchen on a fake punt.

"The obviously had a fairly substantial game," coach Rich Brooks said. A sellout crowd of 59,700 watched what could be the final NFL game at Busch Stadium. A news conference is scheduled for Friday to announce whether the \$260 million Trans World Dome will be ready for the Rams-49ers game Oct. 22, but it's likely the Rams (5-1) will have one more game at Busch, where they're 3-0.

They also exceeded their victory total from their final season in Anaheim, Calif. "We're 5-1 and we're rolling," defensive tackle D'Marco Farr said.

Nobody's rolling like Bruce, who has caught six touchdown passes in his first year as a starter. In the last two games, he has totaled 372 yards receiving. "I think they're afraid of me running by them, and they give up everything underneath," Bruce said. "I just take what they give me and if they try to come up, I'll go by them."

Against the Falcons, he often took advantage of rookie cornerback Ron Davis. Davis slumped in his locker stall, still in his uniform about a half-hour after the game. "We had a young guy on him," Jones said. "Ronnie's learning."

Bruce's best catch may have been on the lateral. Kinchen's throw skipped off the artificial turf and right into Bruce's hands. "Isaac has great hands, so it was nothing to worry about," Kinchen said.

The Rams have been successful on the lateral the last two games, but special teams, a big plus in their 4-0 start, nearly did them in

this time. Kevin Ross returned a blocked field goal attempt 83 yards for a score in the second quarter and the Mets' offense had a wobbly Sean Landry punt 67 yards for a score in the third quarter.

The Rams also had a fumble and an interception. After committing no turnovers the first four games, they've had four the last two games. This time it made the game much closer than it should have been since the Rams outgained Atlanta in yards 451-192.

"The good news is, last year that cost this team games," Brooks said. "This year, we overcame it."

Tony Zdenek's second field goal of the game, from 45 yards with 1:58 to go, cut the gap to 21-19. But the Rams ran out the final 6:36.

Chris Miller completed 27 of 38 passes for 328 yards for St. Louis and Jerome Bettis had his best day of the season with 88 yards on 19 carries.

Jeff George was 16 for 30 for 160 yards for Atlanta (4-2). "He didn't have his best game, obviously," coach June Jones said. "It looked like the ball was getting away from him."

The Rams dominated the first half, outgaining Atlanta 292 yards to 109, but an 83-yard return on a blocked field goal attempt by Ross kept the Falcons in striking distance at 21-10.

TFCA managed only one more point on a Ra'chana Glatz ace.

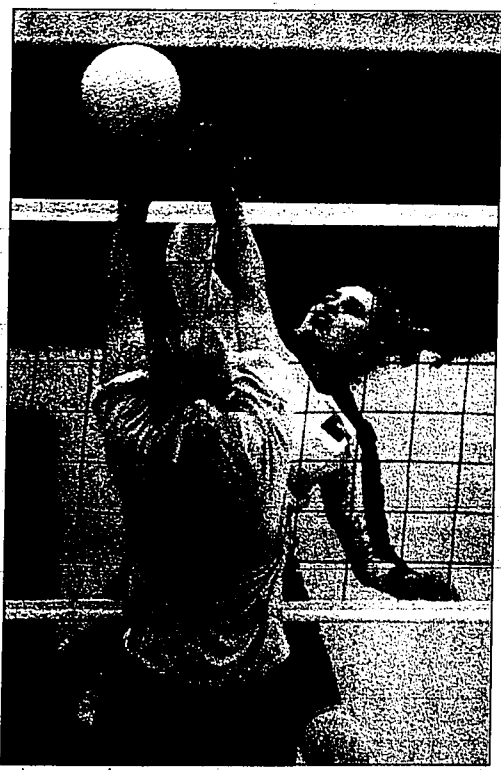
Caldwell finished out the game with two kills. Then she picked up where she left off in game two, putting down a kill for the first sidout.

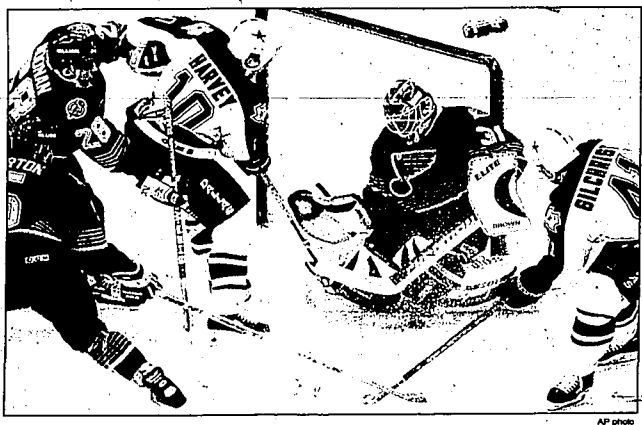

CLEVELAND (AP) — This is the type of matchup that can become an October memory, the kind of moment that can make a single baseball game seem so special.

Randy Johnson vs. the Cleveland Indians. The most intimidating, dominant pitcher the sport has seen in years going against the most fearsome, fearless lineup in the game today. Facing each other on Friday the 13th, with the fate of a whole season at stake.

Hershiser did his part Wednesday night, pitching the Indians past the Mariners 5-2 to tie the best-of-7 series.

Now, it's Johnson turn, again. He saved Seattle's season when he beat California in a one-game playoff for the AL West title on Oct. 2. Four days later, he helped the Mariners stave off elimination by beating New York in the opening round of the AL playoffs.

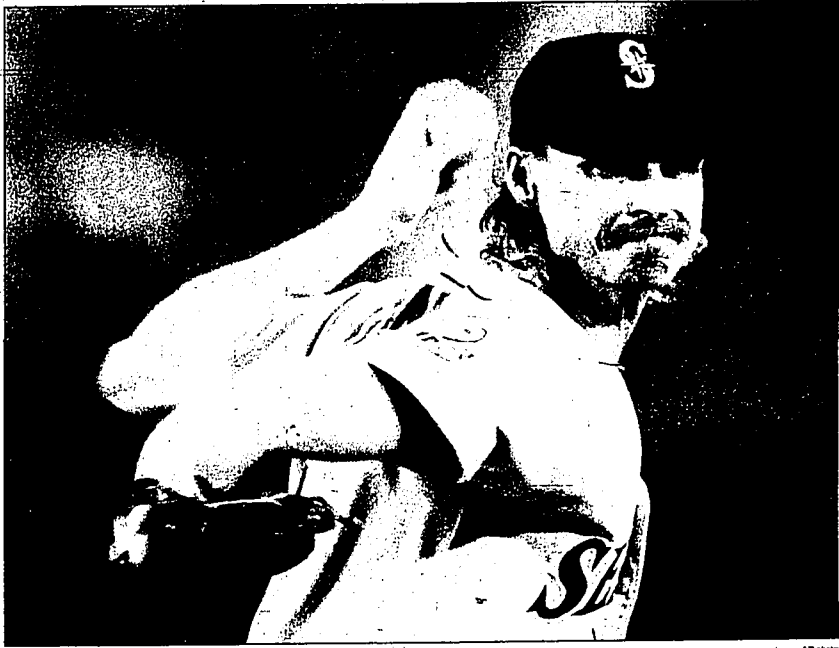
Then, the 6-foot-10 Johnson moved up even further in stature, as if it seemed possible. Just 48 hours after throwing 116 pitches, he pitched three innings in relief and wound up the winner as the Mariners beat the Yankees last Sunday in the decisive Game 5.

"I'm not really going to know what to do pitching with these extra days' rest," he said. "But, I think the rest will do me some good."

Johnson certainly has earned it. He went 18-2 in the regular season — the game against the Angels counts in those stats — and came within one victory of becoming the first AL pitcher since Hal Newhouser in 1945 to lead the league in wins, strikeouts and ERA.

Overall, the Mariners are 28-3 in games Johnson starts. He beat the Indians the only time he saw them, striking out 13 and walking none in a complete-game eight-inning effort at Jacobs Field on July 7. He's 8-3 lifetime against them despite a 4.20 ERA.

"Randy knows that every time he pitches against us he hit him pretty good," said Carlos Baerga, a career .324 hitter against Johnson. "It will be a big game for us and I think that it's going to be the game for us to win the series," he said.

Albert Belle, who homered 50 times this season for the Indians, has hit three career home runs off Johnson. He's also struck out 13 times in 36 at-bats, and is a .250 lifetime hitter against the Seattle ace.

"Albert Belle is a power hitter and I'm a power pitcher," Johnson said. "I've always challenged everybody with my fastball."

"I realize that batters time your fastball, and I will pitch him accordingly," he said. "I don't anticipate staying with a steady diet of fastballs. I'll have to throw some off-speed stuff."

In fact, it's those breaking balls, not necessarily his near-100 mph fastballs, that Johnson

wants people to focus on. "I'd kind of like to start being known as a pitcher," he said.

"Over the last couple of games, I have had to pitch. I haven't had the overpowering fastball to my standards."

"I think the nicest comment came from Greg Maddux when he said that I've turned into more of a pitcher," he said.

"I take a lot of pride in getting batters out now by thinking as a pitcher and not a guy who just goes out there and throws 97 mph and tries to overpower everybody."

Whatever, his reputation seems to be growing daily, especially as he and the Mariners

keep winning in their first year of postseason play.

"I'm starting to hear stories in the locker room, like yesterday when Joey Coon went to pick up his dry cleaning and there was no charge," he said Wednesday. "I had one of my cars delivered today. It was repaired and I didn't want to drive it in the rain. I had it shipped over on the back of a flatbed truck."

Mascot sued for grabbing fan in game

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) — "Burnie," the Miami Heat mascot, convicted of aggravated assault for dragging a woman onto the court during a preseason game last year, now faces a \$1 million lawsuit stemming from the incident.

A woman filed a civil suit Thursday in U.S. District Court in San Juan against the team and Wes Lockard, the man inside the Burnie costume. The suit follows last year's preseason game between the Heat and the Atlanta Hawks during which Yvonne Gil-Rebollo alleged Lockard dragged her from her seat and onto the court against her will.

Gil-Rebollo filed criminal charges, and Lockard was convicted of aggravated assault in local courts and fined \$300. Lockard apologized publicly to Gil-Rebollo, wife of local Supreme Court Justice Francisco Rebollo and sister of U.S. District Attorney Guillermo Gil, and claimed his actions were "in-jest."

David Efron, the lawyer representing Gil-Rebollo, said the lawsuit was the civil side of the case.

"This is not a case about a Hispanic woman being abused or harassed by a man. This case is about every fan's right to go see a game without being harassed by a clown or by anybody," Efron said. "This woman, an outstanding member of society, was humiliated in front of the community."

Jones will fight NFL decision

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Jerry Jones says the NFL is out to get him and he's not about to let the league harass his Dallas Cowboys. The "Cowboys" rebellious owner, was furious Thursday over the league's ruling that he restructure Deion Sanders' \$35 million contract.

"This is not about Deion, what this is about is sticking it to the Cowboys," Jones said. "They're trying to intimidate the Cowboys, they're trying to be a bully. It's so transparent that the NFL is being selective."

Last month, Jones vowed to fight a \$300 million lawsuit filed by the NFL in an effort to stop him from signing any more licensing deals without league approval. Jones defied the league by agreeing to separate deals with Nike, Inc., Pepsi and American Express.

Jones plans to fight the NFL's objection to Sanders' contract as soon as he finds out from the league what's specifically wrong with it.

"The NFL has chosen to change the salary cap rules in mid-stream," Jones said.

"The first time we step out and use the system for a high profile free agent, the NFL objects to it. It's blatant subjectivity."

The league has conditionally approved Sanders' seven-year deal but said it violates the spirit of the \$37.1 million-per-team cap, according to a source at Henderson, the NFL's director of labor relations. Jones disagrees.

"I've lost a lot of faith in the NFL because of this," Jones said. "We will fight it. This gives me a lot of resolve. This is very disturbing."

Technically, Sanders will make the NFL base salary of \$178,000 for the first three years, but his pay will average \$5.5 million per year including his nearly \$13 million signing bonus.

"Sanders' contract is structured to avoid counting under the salary cap a very large portion of the compensation which Deion is to receive for his services during the early years of his contract," Henderson said.

"In this respect, Deion's contract stands apart from every other in the league. In our view, the contract as currently structured involves salary cap circumvention."

The decision was opposed by the NFL Players Association, which said the league has "no basis for challenging the contract in any way," according to Dick Berthelsen, the union's general counsel.

"The league has already approved contracts for other players who have used the same techniques, including Andre Rison and Eric Allen," he added. "I don't know if this will be settled before the season is over. This one is a real mystery."

Deal surprises boxer Whitaker

NEW YORK (AP) — Pernell Whitaker, seldom caught off guard in the ring, was surprised Thursday at a news conference.

Boxing-TV deals are based on potential earnings. HBO-TVKO had a 10-fight deal with Riddick Bowe that could have earned him over \$100 million. The deal, how-

ever, ended with the second fight in the package when Bowe lost a rematch to Evander Holyfield in 1993.

What could make the Whitaker deal more valuable is the quality of some of his possible opponents, according to Abraham. ATLANTA (AP) — When Rebecca Stafford's July Visa statement showed a \$2,122 charge for Olympic tickets, she cheerfully emptied the family vacation savings account to pay the bill.

Months later, Stafford is not getting any tickets, and she really missed her money.

"For them to have my money all this time — it's ridiculous," said the Whippermere, Fla., woman. "I just want out of this deal."

Long after sports fans sent in their payments for an Olympic ticket lottery, Games organizers are hanging on to people's money, hoping that those who couldn't get the tickets they really wanted will buy leftovers or souvenirs.

The advance payments are in the bank, earning \$3 million in interest so far for the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games.

NAU coach Steve Axman says that gives his squad a chance, but he fears Dave Dickenson, the Big Sky's top passer. With Dickenson taking the snap, Montana is averaging 42.8 ypg in the air.

"We're playing against one of college football's truly great passing offenses. I don't think you're going to stop Dave Dickenson and the Grizzly offense," Axman says.

"They don't think he can play this week, if even for a long time," coach Pokry Allen says.

Weber coach Dave Arslanian was sympathetic to a point. "I'm sure they're not happy with the way they are playing," he allows. "But that makes them a dangerous opponent this week.... Our games with Boise State are some of the best we've had in a long time. Last year, BSU went 24-17 in Boise.

Idaho also was going through changes, hoping to shake a dismal start. Coach Chris Torrey has decided to give senior Eric Hines, who had lost his starting job earlier this season to sophomore Brian Brennan, another shot at quarterback against EWU.

ISU officials deny deal with players for guilty plea

POCATELLO (AP) — Idaho State University officials say they made no promises to football players that if they pleaded guilty to misdemeanors they would be allowed to remain on the team.

Athletic Director Kelly Wilk and Jan Anderson, dean of students, made that statement at a meeting over disciplinary action against three black players.

They were kicked off the football team after pleading guilty to misdemeanor battery. Each claims they thought they would be allowed to continue on the team if they pleaded guilty, and even Coach Brian McNeeley said he had that understanding.

"I assumed that with misdemeanor charges they would be on the team," McNeeley said, after the Wednesday night forum, organized by the Black Student Alliance.

Wilk said there was no such promise.

Anderson, who made a recommendation to President Richard Bowen, who took the final action, said university officials never promised anything to the players'

anatomy of the coach.

"I just really cautioned them about not making any assumptions about anything," said Anderson.

Others among the 250 people attending said it appeared that Idaho State acted more harshly toward the three players because they are black.

The players and two former players were charged with statutory rape after 14 and 15-year-old girls reported they had sex with players. Later the charges were reduced to misdemeanor battery.

Brian Bethel, Thomas Washington and the Johnson said they were led to believe if they admitted misdemeanors they'd return to the football field.

McNeeley said he wanted to reinstate the players and assumed the three would be allowed to return, once felony charges were dropped.

Prosecutor Mark Hiedemann said the state's case that the wrong guys discovered they contracted sexually transmitted diseases after having sex with the football players and others, and authorities reported it to police.

FCC frees AT&T from rate caps; some protection provided

WASHINGTON — AT&T, like its long-distance rivals, soon will be able to charge what it wants.

Federal regulators agreed Thursday to lift rules controlling the rates the telephone giant charges its 80 million residential customers.

Low-income customers and those who make few long-distance calls would be protected.

The Federal Communications Commission, citing a more competitive long-distance market, voted 5-0 to lift price regulations on AT&T. The change takes effect 30 days after the FCC makes the written order public.

AT&T competitor MCI and the Consumer Federation of America oppose the change. "They didn't

need to throw out all the rules and the tools to protect long-distance telephone consumers," the consumer group's legislative counsel, Bradley Sillman, said in an interview. "Residential customers could end up with higher rates or they may not see lower rates."

The FCC and AT&T disagree. They say the action would let AT&T set more competitively, which eventually should lower residential rates and speed new services to the public.

"What we're saying today is watch TV to look for the discount plan. The FCC is letting competition set the price," said FCC Chairman Reed Hundt, in an interview.

AT&T controls 56.6 percent of the long-distance market. Approximately 60 percent of AT&T cus-

tomers are not on a discounted calling plan, the FCC said.

"If you make less than 10 bucks a month of long-distance calls or less than one hour of calls, you can stick with AT&T because the FCC is guaranteeing that you won't have unfair prices," Hundt said.

To protect the most vulnerable customers — those who generally are not enrolled in a discounted calling plan, where there is robust competition among the long-distance companies for customers — AT&T would be forced to provide:

- A 15 percent discount to low-income residential customers for three years.
- A guaranteed rate for low-volume residential customers, starting at \$3 a month for the first 20 minutes in the first year offered.

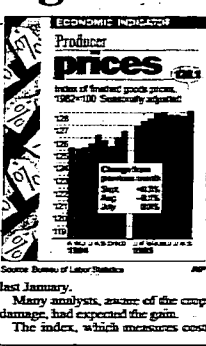

WASHINGTON — The summer drought that withered crops contributed to a 0.3 percent increase in wholesale prices in September, the first advance in four months and the largest in nearly a year.

Still, analysts attributed the big boost to transitory factors and predicted inflation will remain muted.

"Food prices reacted to the summer's hot weather, but that probably is a temporary jump," said economist Lynn Reaser of First Interstate Bancorp in Los Angeles. "Inflation is not totally dominated, but it is certainly subdued."

The Labor Department said Thursday the seasonally adjusted jump in its Producer Price Index was the first since a 0.2 percent advance in May and the steepest since wholesale prices shot up 0.5 percent



pressures before they reach the consumer level, had fallen 0.1 percent in August and 0.2 percent in June. It was unchanged in July. The changes mean that wholesale prices are rising at an annual rate of just 1.7 percent so far this year, which would be the same increase as last year.

The lack of any serious inflation pressures, together with strong earnings reports, boosted stock prices. Bond prices also were up.

Further evidence of restrained inflation is expected Friday, when the government releases its Consumer Price Index for September. Many analysts believe consumer prices rose 0.5 percent.

The Labor Department also reported Thursday that 348,000 laid-off workers filed first-time claims for jobless benefits last week, up 6,000 from a week earlier and the second straight advance.

Dow follows technical stocks up

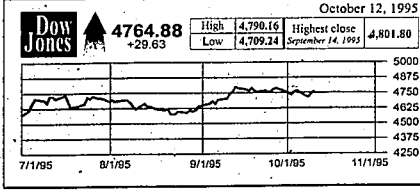

NEW YORK — The Dow Jones Industrial Average closed up 29.63 at 4764.88 Thursday, following technology stocks higher as investors continued to chase shares in the sector.

The technology-heavy NASDAQ index finished up 14 at 1015, its highest for the day, as software and semiconductor shares gained during the day.

The Dow closed at its intraday high as well, supported by strength on the bond and futures markets.

Alan Ackerman, senior vice president of Fabenstock & Co., said the market continues to follow a path of "restless rotation" as investors search for new themes while buying



technology stocks on dips.

"The market is still having a case of the jitters, but the momentum seems to be up for now," he said. Speculative technology issues

garnered the most attention, with International Rectifier jumping 2% to 44%, while Applied Materials rose 3% to 98%.

Among software producers,

Oracle rose 1 1/32 to 39 26/32, and Adobe added 3/4 to reach 50 1/4.

Silicon Graphics was marked up 1 to 33 1/2.

"At the last sell-off we're seeing some bottom fishing," said Richard Meyer, head of over-the-counter market trading for Ladenburg, Thalmann & Co.

Broader indices were higher, with the New York Stock Exchange composite index closing up 1.86 at 312.37, and the S&P index ahead 3.64 at 583.10.

Among Dow components, General Motors rose 1/4 to 46 1/2, with AT&T rising 1 to 63 1/4 and Sears up 1/4 to 36 1/2.

Automaker Ford jumped 1% to 31 1/2 after raising its dividend, and Chrysler added 1/4 to 54 1/2.

Wood products firm reports record profits

BOISE (AP) — After languishing in red ink for nearly four years, Boise Cascade Corp. on Thursday reported its third straight profitable quarter and announced new earnings hit a record this summer.

The Idaho-based wood products manufacturer said net income in the third quarter totaled \$118.5 million, or \$1.85 per share of common stock, fully diluted.

That compared to nearly \$32 million in losses during the July-September quarter of 1994. "Assuming modest growth in the U.S. and European economies in the months ahead, we anticipate that market conditions for each of our business

segments will remain favorable and that the company's overall performance will continue to be strong," Chairman George Harad said in a statement.

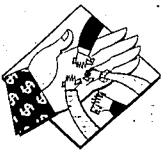
Sales totaled more than \$1.3 billion during the quarter, up 2.3 percent from a year ago.

Harad said continued strength in the paper sector pushed operating income from that segment to \$164 million during the third quarter compared to less than \$3 million a year ago. Solid demand for housing bolstered revenue from the building products segment, he said, while sales growth and improvements in margins fueled higher returns from the office products segment.

Issue for mutual fund investors: Manager mergers

NEW YORK (AP) — The recent wave of merger announcements in corporate America is nothing novel to many mutual fund investors.

Over the past year, the comparatively young fund industry has witnessed no less than nine mergers and acquisitions involving fund-management firms.

Among the most celebrated deals, Mellon Bank has joined forces with both Dreyfus Corp. and the Boston Co.; Zurich Insurance Group with Kemper Corp.; Franklin Resources Inc. with the firm managing the Templeton funds, and Van Kampen Merritt with American Capital Asset Management.

The trend is expected to continue for some time to come.

"In the investment companies

industry, it appears 1995 will surpass 1994 as the record year for M&A activity, both in number and dollar volume of deals," says David Brown at the accounting firm of KPMG Peat Marwick.

"It is fund management companies, not the funds themselves, that participate directly in these mergers. Each mutual fund operates as a separate entity owned by its shareholders, tied to the advisory firm by a management agreement.

But mergers between managers can lead to subsequent moves, subject to shareholder approval, to merge or otherwise realign some of the funds involved. Beyond that, they can produce many kinds of changes that are important for investors to watch for.

"As an investor or fiduciary, you must re-examine your manager if it

is undergoing a change in ownership or organizational structure," says Tim Egan at the investment consulting firm Stratford Advisory Group in Chicago.

"When a firm has responsibility to manage your assets, you want to ensure that you are in the care of dedicated, motivated and focused professionals," Egan writes in a recent report on the merger trend.

"As you check news accounts, reports from the management firms and any other sources for information about a merger, Stratford suggests asking these questions: 'What are the reasons or motives behind the deal?'

'Will the way your fund manager operates, of its philosophy and objectives, change?'

'Will the same individuals or team still manage and advise the fund you own?'

incentives to excel — or is the old group of hungry entrepreneurs perhaps settling to a more bureaucratic groove.

"A start on answering questions like that last one can come from examining what motivated the merger in the first place.

"A deal may not trouble you at all if it looks as though the parties involved authentically want to increase their competitive muscle to keep growing. For example, they may want to form a full product line to compete for employer-sponsored 401(k) retirement savings business, which represents a huge and still fast-growing market.

"If you are not happy with the way things are going, there are plenty of competitors eager for your business. One advantage of most mutual fund investments is the relative ease of exit they offer if you decide you want to move your money elsewhere.

"Each (merger) transaction must be reviewed and evaluated diligently," Egan concludes.

South couldn't afford to guard against a club attack. More important was the matter of managing two diamond finesses. To get these, South must hope for a 3-2 club break and play the suit carefully. First, he should cash the king and queen and then lead his 10 to dummy's ace. A losing diamond finesse comes next, but South has a second entry in dummy's club suit. He uses this for a second diamond finesse, good enough to score an elusive sixth winner.

Lisa Hartman Black 'Dazzles' CBS

When Lisa Hartman Black decides to take on a project, it's because she is impressed with the role.

"People ask me a lot, 'What are you looking for (in a project)? What do you want to do?' ... Black says, "It's really about the woman. I read the script and if I like that woman and feel something for her, that's what it's about."

Black's track record of performances proves her method of selection works. It was her impression of photographer Jazz Kilkullen that made her decide to do "Dazzle," the finest notch on her belt of strong performances.

"I've done such serious contest matter in the past few years, and this came and I saw 'Dazzle' and I said, 'Dazzle!'" and my agent said, "Yeah, you play a Jazz in 'Dazzle'." Black comments, "I said, 'I don't know about that.' Then I read it and I just loved it. I thought it was just great fun.

Premiering Sunday, Oct. 15, on CBS, and concluding Tuesday, Oct. 17, "Dazzle" stars Black as Jazz, a photographer and the daughter of actress Sylvie, and "yes she's a professional woman," Black says. "She works and takes care of herself and is her own person."

As the owner of some of the last undeveloped land in California, Mike is lousy by developers to sell. But, he is determined to keep his ranch. And when tragedy strikes, Jazz takes over his struggle to keep the land.

Big her struggle isn't only against the developers. Her greedy half-

sisters, Fernanda (Lisa Elbacher) and Valerie (Kim Johnston Ulrich), and their mother Lydie (Dixie Carter) want to sell the ranch.

Despite a career and fighting for the family ranch, Jazz still manages to find love, twice.

First, there is Gabe (Jeffrey Meek), the famous and captivating journalist Jazz encounters while she is on assignment in France. Then there is Casey (Bruce Greenwood), the ruggedly handsome ranch foreman.

"He is Mr. Right, and she just doesn't see it," Black says. "She goes through a relationship with this man, is she and then she finds out Casey is really the Rock of Gibraltar, and that's where she belongs."

Black really enjoys the process of discovering what type of person her character really is.

"Soon as I agree to do a script, I have a woman script, I have a woman acting coach I've worked with for years, and she and I dig into the script and ... we just

wear it out," Black explains. "Actually, I enjoy that process ... because you really dig into it and you find little things about the people. It's character study and it's interesting, it really is."

"I'm a strong believer that the more you know — and the more you know the material — that gives you the freedom to improvise and go off and do other little things with the material. You know who you are and you're routed and you're solid."

And Black's preparation pays off in "Dazzle." She delivers a powerful and riveting performance.

She is surrounded by a talented cast of well-known actors. Unfortunately, some of their characters are not well-developed.

Robertson, Carter and Evans, who all have given powerful performances before, manage to give good performances in "Dazzle," despite having characters with little or no person-

ality. Black says the audience especially should enjoy the breathtaking scenery in the movie.

"It's a beautifully shot," Black comments. "You see some beautiful properties and our cinematographer is so creative. It's pleasing to the eye."

The film also gave Black, a horse lover, the opportunity to work with horses.

"It was great," she says. "I went to my husband — he has a deal with this hat company, and I said, 'I want a hat like yours, but I want it a light color.' So he ordered me a hat and I just felt like such a big shot in my hat."

Black's love for horses is almost as great as her love for acting, which is clearly evident in her work.

"I feel very lucky to be doing what I do for a living," she says. "I love what I do. Every time I do a movie I learn so many things and that to me is the greatest reward."

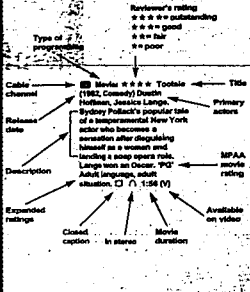

Following one really frightening moment, Goldberg changed her mind about buying Trachtenberg a new plane. **Q: Isn't Carroll O'Connor so depressed about the death of his son that he's turning down all future acting offers, including a pitch to play Archie Bunker on the tube? — D.C.**

A: There's absolutely no question that O'Connor was considerably depressed by the loss of his adopted son, Hugh, earlier this year to a drug overdose. But the passage of time is helping.

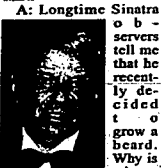

Q: Is Candice Bergen really quitting “Murphy Brown” for various personal reasons? What's going on? — H.L.

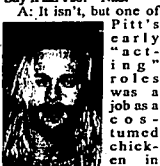
