Postman, smoke alarm

JEROME — There is a hero in Jerome dressed like a mailman.

Kent Bartholomew, 40, recently heard a strange sound coming from the house at 305 East G St. on his mail route. He soon realized that a smoke detector was making the noise, so he knocked on the door, then ran to a neighbor's to call 911.

Firefighters arrived within minutes and entered the house, finding it full of smoke from food burning on the stove.

"Another five minutes and we would have had a real bad fire there. But because of what Kent did, there was only smoke damage," said Jerome Fire Chief Jim Auclair.

"I couldn't ask more from a mailman. He saved our home, and I want to give him a big hug and a kiss," said Jeannie

Education effort misses some goals

WASHINGTON — The 10-year campaign by the nation's governors to create and achieve ambitious new goals in education is showing only modest progress and facing a few discouraging academic setbacks at its halfway point, a new national report concludes.

Prepared by a bipartisan federal panel, the report assesses the work of schools in the five years since the governors established eight broad goals for improving American education by the year 2000. The report, released yesterday, projects the nation's schools will fall far short of reaching most of those goals unless their rate of progress improves substantially.

"These are tough goals, and there has been progress, but there's a long way to go," said Indiana Gov. Evan Bayh, chairman of the National Education Goals Panel.

At a summit on the nation's education problems in 1989, the governors agreed that by 2000: Children must be better prepared to begin school, the high school graduation rate should reach 90 percent; American students should be first in the world in math and science and show more success in other subjects; adult literacy and teacher education should improve; parent participation in schools should grow; and student drug use and school safety should hardly be the problems they are now.

While clear progress has been made toward some of those goals, the report draws a portrait of stagnation or backsliding on others.

High school graduation rates nationally are at the same level as 1990 — about 86 percent — and reading achievement among high school seniors has declined slightly. For fourth- and eighth-graders, reading scores have remained flat.

Schools also are reporting increases in drug use, particularly marijuana. More teachers apparently are being threatened by stu-

Showdown over shutdown nears as charges fly

WASHINGTON — With a potential federal default and government shutdown at stake, Congress toiled over a pair of budget bills Thursday and lurched ever closer to a jolting veto showdown with President Clinton.

A day after the House approved legislation that would provide staggered funds for government agencies through Dec. 1, the Senate adopted the measure by 50-46. Senators made only minor changes in the bill, and the House seemed likely to accept the legislation and ship it to the White House, perhaps on Friday.

Meanwhile, the House voted 227-194 for another bill extending federal borrowing authority through Dec. 12. The Senate worked on that measure into the evening of what was a marathon day.

Administration officials pledged that both bills would meet vetoes at the White House because of unacceptable provisions, even though the government's abilities to borrow and spend lapse next week.

"That declaration prompted furious rhetoric from both sides that almost overshadowed the day's legislative work."

White House spokesman Mike McCurry said that thanks to Republican intransigence, "default is increasingly likely." Bond prices drooped slightly. He added that "there are no chances at this point" to avoid federal agencies from having to halt some of their work next week.

Leon Panetta, the White House chief of staff, likened the Republican strategy to putting "a gun to the head of the president," adding, "That's a form of terrorism. We are not going to accept that."

Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin said he believed he had the authority to use money from some federal trust funds to keep the government functioning "for some period

still warned of the GOP borrowing extension legislation: "This legislation is not a debt ceiling increase, it is a shortcut to default."

The government is expected to hit its \$4.9 trillion debt ceiling next Wednesday, when a \$25 billion interest payment is due. The GOP is refusing to extend that authority for a long term unless Clinton agrees to its seven-year budget-balancing package. A default could send interest rates upward and financial markets plummeting, economists say.

Guarding against cyber-porn stirs controversy in Congress

WASHINGTON — Activists who want tougher restrictions on on-line pornography are making a last-ditch effort to empower cops to walk the cyber-beat.

Lawmakers are taking up the issue in Congress in conference committee negotiations over provisions of a huge telecommunications bill.

Two conflicting provisions are attached to House and Senate versions of the bill, and the activists are fighting for the approach of the Senate legislation, which was sponsored by Sens. James Exon, D-Neb., and Dan Coats, R-Ind.

The Senate version would criminalize "indecent" material on-line and establish stiff penalties for people and companies that transmit it. The proposal also calls for enforcement by the Federal Communications Commission.

The bill's House amendment, supported by Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., would expressly forbid regulation of content on the Internet, instead encouraging high-tech companies to come up with software that parents could use to block objectionable material from reaching their children.

On both sides of the fight are conservatives, who are split over how much power to give the government over the Internet. Letters to lawmakers from two coalitions

Locust's brain uses vision, math to dodge collisions, predators

LOS ANGELES — Locusts — and probably other creatures — use complex mathematics in their eyes and brains to sense that an approaching object is getting too close and that it's time to get out of the way, scientists say.

The finding might someday be used to build an artificial human retina that would send signals to help blind people avoid bumping into things, said Gilles Laurent, an assistant professor of neuroscience at the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena.

Such technology is probably a decade off, he said.

Laurent is part of a team of scientists who found a mathematical function that explains how a locust's brain processes the size and speed of a potential threat. Their study appears in Friday's issue of the journal Science.

"Detecting predators or detecting danger is a very general problem in nature and it concerns all animals, including us when we cross the street. We have to be able to detect that a car, for example, might hit us," Laurent said Wednesday. "The problem is to first recognize that an object is approaching, and the second is to react before it actually collides."

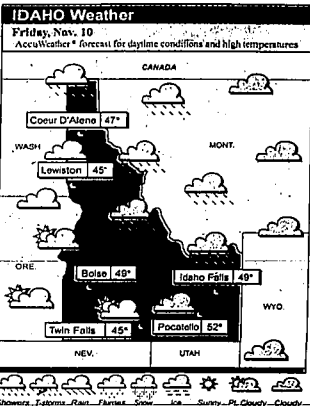
He explained that the retina at the back of the eye provides three pieces of critical information about an approaching object: the size of the image, the speed at which its edges are widening and how much the image is speeding up.

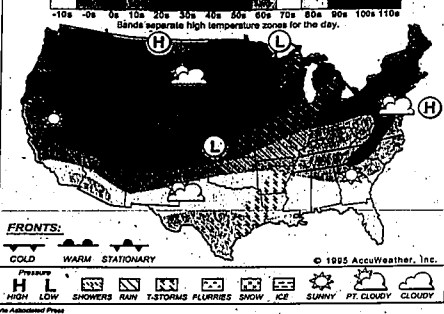

dent and say classroom disruptions are increasing.
The gap between white and minority students attending college and earning a degree is much the same as in 1990, the report states. The percentage of high school teachers with a degree in the primary subject they teach has declined slightly.
There is good news in the report, however. Math achievement scores among fourth- and eighth-graders nationally are rising, and more women are earning college degrees in math and science. More parents also are spending time reading to preschool children and the health of the nation's infants and preschool children is improving.
According to the report, the percentage of children born with one or more health risks has declined from 37 to 35 percent this decade. Educators increasingly believe a child's language development and general health in preschool years are central to classroom success.
Education Secretary Richard W. Riley said that although many goals progress report are disappointing, the improvements students are making in math and science are heartening because both are subjects in which educators have worked especially hard in recent years at setting higher academic standards.
"If we do the same job in other areas, I think the level of achievement overall will rise," he said.
But attempts to set stronger academic standards are igniting many political battles. The Clinton administration's prime attempt to nurture higher standards — a \$400 million grant program to schools called Goals 2000 — is under fire from Republican leaders in Congress worried about federal intrusion into education.
Some House leaders are trying to eliminate Goals 2000, and several states are refusing to accept Goals 2000 money.

provisions Republicans tucked into their bill, including abolition of the Commerce Department, and said they went too far in slashing spending and limiting the treasury's ability to maneuver through a borrowing crisis.
Republicans countered that the bills simply delivered downpayments on their plans to balance the budget by 2002 by trimming government and overhauling Medicare and a slew of other programs. They said a president serious about wanting to eliminate deficits, as Clinton has said he is, would sign them.
"If he's not willing to cooperate to pass a balanced budget, then the choice will be his," said Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan. "If the government shuts down, his fingerprints are going to be all over it."
House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., accused the administration of waging "a failed attempt to frighten the bond market." He said Clinton was playing "destructive political games at the expense of the American people and at the expense of our children."
But the verbal fencing between the administration and lawmakers masked gulfs that existed among Republicans themselves.
Fueled by its never, more con-

frontational members, the House included provisions in the bills eliminating Commerce, limiting lobbying by groups and firms that receive federal funds, narrowing death penalty appeals and taking other steps popular with conservatives. By a vote of 257-165, the House added language to the debt-limit bill making it harder for the government to sign new environmental, health and safety regulations on business.
The Senate, where moderate Republicans were expected to ally themselves with Democrats, was considered likely to erase much of that language.
But in an unexpected victory for conservatives, the Senate voted 49-47 to ease some of the lobbying limitations, rather than delete them entirely, reversing a 49-46 roll call earlier this evening.
The Senate also voted 52-44 to retain language increasing the monthly \$46 premium Medicare recipients pay for doctor's care by \$7 on Jan. 1. Democrats wanted to strip the language and allow a scheduled \$2.3 billion reduction in the monthly premium.
Still, firebrand House freshmen were so angry that the Senate might moderate the bills they threatened to vote against the debt-limit bill on

Election results, Powell's criticism give GOP jitters

WASHINGTON — First came elections that shattered the GOP's aura of invincibility, then Colin Powell's lecture about the dangers of conservatism without compassion. After a season of constant celebration, some Republicans have a sudden case of the jitters.

Analysis

The obvious symptoms are public anxiety over the Republican agenda, and nervousness within the GOP ranks about the influence of untested figures who deem themselves leaders of the party's ascendant conservative movement.

But there is considerable debate over a cure, between those who deny any jitters in the first place, those who believe the party is headed for deep trouble and those who come down somewhere in between.

The internal Republican ideological schisms at the center of this debate are hardly new, but have come into sharp focus in recent days because of the election results and Powell's decision not to run for president, two seemingly unrelated episodes that have set off an intriguing debate about the Republican message — and messengers.

On the morning after Tuesday's off-year balloting, there was clear concern among some Republicans that Democrats were finding some success in turning the tactical tables, using House Speaker Newt Gingrich as an election foil much as the GOP used President Clinton in 1994.

Virginia's Republican chairman attributed the GOP's failure to capture control of the state legislature at least in part to Democrats framing the election as a referendum on Gingrich and his agenda, and other Republicans predicted it would be a recurring tactic in 1996.

"It is clear they can use Gingrich to energize their coalition, which liberals and the like, as well as us him to raise money like we do

with Clinton," said Rusty Paul, the Georgia Republican chairman.

Gingrich conceded he is a "very polarizing figure" but warns his fellow Republicans they will pay a higher price next year if they fail to adopt his agenda. In his view, shared by many fellow Republicans, the shaky poll numbers will improve once voters become convinced Republicans are keeping their promises.

Still, while not retreating from any of their party's broad goals, some Republican moderates predicted the election results would strengthen their hand in budget negotiations.

Many of their concerns were echoed by Powell as he took himself out of presidential contention but threw himself into Republican Party affairs. He vowed to convince his new political family that it spent too much time worrying about a right-wing fringe and too little thinking and talking about schools and children.

"We have to concern ourselves about those who may be cut loose, and we have to be prepared to help

them," Powell said.

Gingrich and other conservative leaders would be quick to argue that they share Powell's concerns, but the retired general views them in a way that many Republicans feel is missing in their party's field of presidential candidates.

"His message of hope and reconciliation is one that is badly needed in America," said Jack Kemp, the former congressman and housing secretary who had urged Powell to run.

For promoting Powell, Kemp was widely criticized in conservative circles, especially by those who were pushing him to seek the presidency. In the view of these conservatives, Powell had no right to the Republican nomination because of his views on social issues, including support of abortion rights and affirmative action.

Powell said such criticism had no role in his decision. Still, Democrats rushed to label the GOP intolerant, one where "moderates need not apply," in the words of Connecticut Democratic Sen. Christopher Dodd.

Even some leading conservatives were clearly sensitive to the suggestion. Arizona Sen. John McCain, for example, denounced "certain presumptuous conservatives" for thinking they decided who belonged in the party — and who didn't.

These tensions are sure to bubble over repeatedly in the budget battles and presidential campaigning to come. They are in many ways an inevitable byproduct of GOP success — as it grows, the Republican Party faces many of the strains in its coalition that long have been the stuff of Democratic legend.

As it deals with them, Republican National Committee Chairman Haley Barbour warns that timidity isn't the answer. He sees no reason for jitters, but offers a warning.

"Do what we promised people last year we would do: to make government smaller, taxes lower, spending less, regulations fewer, to have genuine welfare reform that causes people to have to go to work," Barbour said in his view. "The greater risk for Republicans is to stop short."

Sex scandals rip through Navy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Stung by yet another embarrassing sex-related scandal, the Navy is ordering everyone in the service to pause for 24 hours of "preventive maintenance" against future breakdowns of discipline.

"It's time for the Navy to take a day and stand down and take a hard look at ourselves," Adm. Mike Boorda, the chief of naval operations, said Thursday. The day of introspection will be observed on a rotating basis by units worldwide, he said.

The purpose will be to think of ways to avoid discipline problems before they happen.

Boorda's announcement came after The Washington Post reported Thursday that a drunk Navy cook sexually assaulted a female sailor aboard a commercial jet and that the 20 or so other sailors on-the-flight chose not to intervene.

Boorda said he could not comment on the sexual assault case because it is under investigation by the

Naval Criminal Investigative Service. But in summoning several reporters to his headquarters office in the Pentagon, the admiral made no secret of the fact that the reported incident prompted him to act.

The Post report "troubled me," Boorda said, but added that his order for a daylong "stand down" for the Navy worldwide was in response to a string of embarrassing episodes recently that reflected poorly on the Navy. Among these, he said, was the Naval Academy's announcement this week that it is investigating 22 midshipmen for alleged marijuana and LSD use. On Oct. 15 two midshipmen were arrested at a hotel where LSD, a hallucinogen, allegedly was found.

And there have been these other recent incidents:

- A 22-year-old Navy seaman based in Okinawa is on trial there, along with two Marines, for the rape of a 12-year-old Japanese girl. The seaman, Marcus D. Gill, admitted in court Tuesday that he raped the girl after abducting her Sept. 4.

Simpson lawyer signs book deal

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Prosecutor Marcia Clark will be paid \$4.2 million by Penguin USA to write a book about the O.J. Simpson trial, sources close to the negotiations said Thursday.

Penguin topped offers from eight other publishers in a spirited bidding war that started Tuesday and concluded today, according to a news release issued by Penguin publishing subsidiary Viking.

The publisher described the deal as a multimillion-dollar offer but did not disclose the exact sales price.

Two people close to the negotiations, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the sale was for \$4.2 million.

Penguin purchased worldwide rights to Clark's unwritten book, the company said.

Judge cites Bible in gay ruling

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — A state judge, citing biblical stories of Sodom and Gomorrah as evidence that homosexuality is immoral, upheld the Boy Scouts' ban on gays.

Superior Court Judge Patrick J. McCann found that the Monmouth Council of the Boy Scouts did not violate the state discrimination laws when it expelled James Dale as an assistant scoutmaster in 1990 after learning he is gay.

The judge said the Boy Scouts is a

private organization and has a constitutional right to decide who can belong. The Scouts' gay ban has been challenged several times but always upheld.

"Men who do those criminal and immoral acts cannot be held out as role models," McCann wrote in the Nov. 3 ruling released Wednesday.

Dale's lawyer Evan Wolfson said Thursday it was "shocking to read such harsh anti-gay language coming from a judge in writing."

Wolfson said he may appeal.

McCann did not immediately return a call for comment.

In his legal analysis, McCann cited the Bible:

"Sodomy is derived from the name of the biblical city, Sodom, which, with the nearby city of Gomorrah, was destroyed by fire and brimstone rained down by the Lord because of the sexual depravity (active homosexuality) of their male inhabitants," he wrote.

Cartoonist retires Calvin and Hobbes

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Calvin and Hobbes, the terrible tiger and his sidekick tiger, will be retired from the funny pages Dec. 31.

In a letter to newspaper editors Thursday, cartoonist Bill Watterson said the decision to end the strip was not a recent or easy decision.

"I believe I've done what I can do within the constraints of daily deadlines and small panels," Watterson, 38, said in the letter.

"I am eager to work at a more thoughtful pace, with fewer artistic compromises."

"Calvin and Hobbes" hit the comic pages in 1986 and entertained millions with the antics a 6-year-old boy with an overactive imagination and a not-so-stuffed tiger.

In the past nine years, the pair launched countless snowball ambushes, journeyed through space, tormented a baby sitter and ran afoul

of Calvin's patient parents.

"Calvin and Hobbes" is distributed internationally to nearly 2,400 newspapers including *The Times-News*.

More than 23 million copies of books based on the cartoon are in print. All 13 collections were million-dollar sellers in their first year.

In his letter, Watterson said he had not decided on what he will do next.

With Powell out, Jackson may run

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two-time presidential candidate Jesse Jackson said Thursday he's thinking anew about running in 1996 now that retired Gen. Colin Powell has ruled out a potential White House bid.

Less than 24 hours after Powell announced he would not run, Jackson said at a news conference that he has met with his advisers over the past few days to "assess the landscape."

"I still have the fire in my belly and clear vision in my head about what a president ought to do to make the nation better," said the founder of the National Rainbow Coalition and presidential candidate of 1984 and 1988.

"I have a plan to revitalize our economy to make us more fiscally responsible, to change our priorities, to make us more human," he said. Jackson said it was premature to say when he would reach a decision.

Giap discounts Tonkin incident

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — When former Defense Secretary Robert McNamara met the enemy's leading strategist Thursday, he raised a question he'd saved for 30 years: What really happened in the Tonkin Gulf on Aug. 4, 1964?

"Absolutely nothing," replied retired Gen. Vo Nguyen Giap.

Both sides agree that North Vietnam attacked a U.S. Navy ship in the gulf on Aug. 2 as it cruised close to shore.

But it was an alleged second attack two days later that led to the first U.S. bombing raid on the North and propelled America deep into war.

Many U.S. historians have long believed the Johnson administration fabricated the second attack to win congressional support for widening the war. But for McNamara, Giap's word was the clincher.

"It's a pretty damned good source," he said after the meeting.

As defense secretary from 1961-68 under Presidents Kennedy and Johnson, McNamara was one of the leading proponents of U.S. support for South Vietnam against the Communist North. But he left office convinced the war was doomed to failure, he says, revealing his change of heart in memoirs published this year.

The 85-year-old Giap, wearing his olive green uniform with four gold stars on his shoulder, greeted him with an understatement: "I heard about you long ago."

McNamara laughed. "I heard about YOU long ago," he rejoined.

Then they talked for more than

an hour, with McNamara frequently leaning forward and jabbing his finger for emphasis as he talked about the lessons of history.

McNamara, 79, emerged from the meeting describing it as extraordinary and saying he was struck by the lack of hostility.

McNamara came to Hanoi for the first time to ask the Vietnamese to take part in a "conference of top Vietnam War decision-makers. The New York-based Council on Foreign Relations, which is organizing the gathering, says it would be an opportunity to share archival materials and correct the historical record.

"You lost ... 3,200,000 people," McNamara told Giap. "We lost 58,000." He said the conference would help "ensure that our nations and other nations learn how to avoid such conflicts in the future."

He elaborated to reporters afterward: "The major questions are: Could we have avoided a tragedy — a tragedy for them and a tragedy for us — or could we have minimized it?"

Giap and Vietnamese officials have said they will give the conference serious consideration.

McNamara wasted little time in raising a question that clearly nagged him for decades.

"To this day I don't know what

happened on Aug. 2 and Aug. 4, 1964, in the Tonkin Gulf," he said to Giap. "I think we may have made two serious misjudgments. ... Did what we thought was an attack on Aug. 4, 1964, the so-called second attack — did it occur?"

Giap replied, "On the fourth of August, there was absolutely nothing."

Reporters were ushered from the room soon after, but McNamara later quoted Giap as saying he believed U.S. surveillance ships were trying to provoke an attack so President Johnson would have an excuse to step up U.S. involvement.

McNamara, speaking later to reporters, disputed that interpretation: "That point that Giap made is absolutely without foundation."

Johnson quickly won congressional approval of the "Tonkin Gulf Resolution" authorizing him to "take all necessary measures" to repel attacks on U.S. forces.

The first U.S. combat troops landed in South Vietnam seven months later.

McNamara said the administration believed the second attack had taken place and that it had to respond forcefully.

McNamara and the rest of the delegation from the Council on Foreign Relations also met Thursday with Deputy Premier Phan Van Khai and Deputy Vice President Nguyen Thi Binh, former foreign minister in South Vietnam's pro-Communist "provisional revolutionary government" during the war.

Perry: Russia may play role in Bosnia plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Russia could play a role in NATO planning for Bosnia peacekeeping as a way of resolving differences over political control of the operation, Defense Secretary William Perry said Thursday.

He said, however, Russia cannot have equal status with NATO's 16 member nations over the international force that will go to Bosnia once a peace agreement is signed among the warring factions.

"That's not in the cards," Perry told reporters on his plane returning from Brussels, Belgium, where he and Russian Defense Minister Pavel Grachev agreed on a way for Russian troops to be part of the NATO force.

The North Atlantic Council, NATO's policy-

making body, must make the ultimate decisions in the Bosnian operation, he said, and "we're not willing to back off from that position."

But he added: "We are willing to discuss and try to work out a way for the Russians to participate" in the planning, Russia also could have an "advising and consulting role" as the operation continues, he said.

"The Russians have a legitimate need to participate in the planning," Perry said, but the North Atlantic Council must make the "ultimate decision."

He said a Russian military role in Bosnia is important to the future U.S.-Russia and U.S.-NATO relationship.

"If we get this wrong, it not only has an adverse

effect on Bosnia, but it affects our ability to deal effectively with European security problems for years to come," he said.

Even with the face-saving agreement Wednesday allowing Russia to avoid the appearance of having its troops under direct NATO command, the issue of political control needs to be resolved before Moscow's participation is assured.

Russia would like to have a seat on the North Atlantic Council, which operates by consensus, Perry said. He said that won't happen because it would give Russia veto power over NATO decisions.

Russia earlier pushed for a U.N. or broader international role in the peace-enforcement operation.

Noted conservative McManus dead at 68

BOWIE, Md. (AP) — Charles A. McManus Jr., an early leader among conservative Republicans and a former president of Americans for Constitutional Action, died Wednesday after a stroke. He was 68.

McManus retired in 1991 after more than 35 years in public affairs,

serving in three Republican administrations. He also served in the Departments of Agriculture, Energy and Interior.

He also had been a political consultant, and an organizer and finance officer for the Republican National Committee.

High-altitude air samples provide new clues about ozone depletion

WASHINGTON (AP) — Something happens to the sun's energy when it hits the upper atmosphere.
A significant amount is diverted and not just because of hair spray and Freon.
Air samples brought back from higher altitudes than ever before show new aspects of this process, says biochemist Mark Thiemeis. Scientists will have to change the assumption that only manmade gases and light are responsible for depletion of

ozone, he says.
Ozone is the barrier that shields Earth from deadly doses of the sun's ultraviolet radiation.
Current theories about ozone depletion are not incorrect, said Thiemeis, who designed the study reported in Friday's issue of Science.
"They are correct based on everything that was known," said Thiemeis, a professor of chemistry and biochemistry at the University

of California at San Diego. "But until this gets calculated you don't know for sure what the impact of this chemistry will be."
How the new findings might affect the life cycle of ozone or other chemical processes in the atmosphere isn't known, Thiemeis said. Neither is it known how the process is governed by location or time of year.
Scientists believe that decreases in ozone over the Antarctic and Northern Hemisphere in a four- to six-week period beginning in

late September are due to atomic chlorine and chlorine oxide in the atmosphere. Those compounds result from chlorofluorocarbons, gases used in aerosol spray cans, Styrofoam containers and air-conditioning systems.
Ozone absorbs ultraviolet light, coupling the energy of the sun to the atmosphere.
"In a general sense, the climate of the planet is in large part dictated by this absorption process," Thiemeis said in an interview.
"There is a process going on in the upper


atmosphere not known before, a significant amount of energy doing chemistry that otherwise you didn't account for," he said. "We need a good tally where that energy goes."
The findings result from a series of small rocket launches in 1992 from White Sands, N.M., in which an instrument brought back samples of frozen air from an altitude of 27 miles — halfway through the stratosphere and into the next higher region, the mesosphere.





Powell hesitation based on honest doubt, not politics

So much for the pundits who said Colin Powell was toying with us. So much for the wearily wise assumption that Powell's indecision was just a publicity ploy—a way to keep the public asking, "Will he run?" while the candidate secretly knew he would.

Turns out he didn't have a secret. Turns out Powell's long indecision was based on honest doubt. Turns out Powell lacked, in his words, the passion to run for president.

His choice may be incomprehensible to the political pros, but our whom-limitless-ambition-is-as-natural-as-the-air they breathe. But it's a reminder that, in a nation where every child theoretically can grow-up-to be president, not every child wants to. Modesty is not a sin.

But Powell's announcement carries a cautionary note for America and for the Republican Party.

Surely a big factor in Powell's choice was the knowledge that the GOP's radical wing would carve him to ribbons. He was a centrist part of what the hard-liners call the "mushy middle." It was not that he had no ideals, but only that his ideals included compromise and moderation, taboos for the fire-breathing right.

Though polls showed Powell to be a potential powerhouse in a general election, he first would have to survive the GOP primaries. The likeli-

hood that he could not is a source of despair for the many Americans who consider themselves middle-of-the-roaders. By definition, these people are the mainstream. Yet, in practice, political parties are driven by the ax-grinders.

This is how the Democratic Party self-destructed, and the Republicans may be heading down the same path. When factions control a party, the leadership-qualities of presidential candidates take a backseat to whether they mouth the right answers to litmus-test questions. The left demands obedience on Medicare; gay rights and affirmative action; on the right, it's abortion, gun control and school prayer.

Is it any wonder that the unifying characteristic of all candidates is a willingness to sacrifice everything to get the job? Powell wasn't willing. Who can blame him?

The one encouraging word in Powell's announcement was his intention to serve America outside elective politics.

The presidency is a bully pulpit, but it is not the only pulpit. William Bennett, like Powell, opted out of what Bennett calls the "malaria swamp" of presidential politics, has instead made himself America's unofficial Secretary of Virtue.

Maybe Powell can become Secretary of Common Sense. We could use one.

Waste storage top of the line

As I've been reading the letters to the editor about spent nuclear fuel shipments to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory in the various *Magie Valley* papers, I've noticed a common misperception among some of our readers—that spent fuel is being "dumped" at the INEL. In fact, spent nuclear fuel is stored in the most modern spent-fuel storage facility that the Department of Energy complex, a facility that meets all current seismic standards and is equipped with sophisticated leak-detection and water-filtration systems. The nation's taxpayers have invested hundreds of millions of dollars in this facility and in the INEL's highly trained, experienced work force. It would be irresponsible not to utilize the facility and our employees' expertise to safely handle and store this fuel until a permanent repository or another interim storage facility becomes available.

I do understand your readers' safety concerns, and the department is committed to pushing ahead with an aggressive waste treatment and disposal strategy at the INEL. The agreement with the state of Idaho means we will remove all spent fuel and other wastes now stored at the site of our enforcement schedule. The agreement also accelerated federal spending on waste treatment operations at the INEL by about \$250 million over spending targets for the next five years. Given the current budget climate in Congress, we were looking at a reduction of similar proportion prior to the signing of this agreement.

I'd also remind your readers that the DOE has met or beaten every deadline to date in the 1992 cleanup agreement we signed with the state of Idaho and the Environmental Protection Agency. We've also met or beaten every deadline in the court-ordered agreement reached with former Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus and the Navy that regulated spent-fuel shipments prior to the completion of an environmental impact statement earlier this year.

Our employees drink every day from the Snake River aquifer directly below the INEL, and they handle and work with spent fuel on a regular basis. The protection of our employees, all Idahoans and the environment is our top priority at the INEL, and we will continue to carry out the agreement with the state of Idaho safely, efficiently and effectively.

Idahoans should have a say

To Gov. Batt: I am writing to you because I strongly object to the nuclear waste shipments you have allowed into the state of Idaho. I am horrified for personal reasons at the possibility of an accident either shipping or storing the nuclear waste so close (only 50 air miles) from where my husband and I have decided to spend our lives together. We are now building our first and only home and plan to raise our family here. Those Idahoans above all other options because of the protected wilderness areas; the lack of city smog, crime and overpopulation; because it was removed from the growing dangers of civilization.

There are two very significant reasons why allowing shipments into Idaho does not make sense:

First, nuclear waste needs to be stored as safely as possible. Not for 40 years or 100 years but for thousands of years. As humans, that time span is hard to imagine, but it means that geologically, the storage place must be secure (i.e., not subject to volcanic activity or earthquake) and far from water which could be contaminated if an earthquake did occur. The facility where the nuclear shipments are cur-

rently being stored is not only in a fault zone (there are three major faults in the area), it is very near the recently declared National Monument Craters of the Moon, and it is located over the Snake River Aquifer which provides drinking water for at least 200,000 people in southern Idaho. Could a worse place have been selected?

Second, agriculture is one of Idaho's major industries, and it is dependent on the safety of the water in the Snake River Aquifer. Given the danger of the current nuclear-waste storage facility, can you afford to put our agriculture and our state's livelihood at such risk? Those are very high stakes.

Third, nuclear waste should be stored as close to the point of origin as possible. The people who benefit directly from its production must also take responsibility, and pay the price, for its siting. Moving nuclear waste increases the likelihood of a transportation accident.

Government exists to protect the people and to act in our best interests. You are not protecting us, you are endangering us. Stop accepting shipments immediately!

This should not be a decision you are allowed to make. We should vote on it ourselves.

Blaine addresses domestic violence

HAILEY — In the 72 hours after someone — usually a man — is arrested on domestic-violence charges, many things can happen. Sweet-talking his way back into his victim's life so she won't prosecute is one of them.

That's why Blaine County, where reports of domestic violence are increasing dramatically, now has an automatic contact rule against any alleged abuser who bonds out of jail, said Blaine County Sheriff Walt Fleming.

"We'll have 72 hours that that person can't have any contact with the victim," Fleming said, so police officers and advocates can help the woman decide what to do. On Thursday, about 50 people — including advocates, police officers, prosecutors and government employees — attended a domestic-violence workshop in Hailey. Most attendees were from Blaine County,

with a smattering of representatives from Minidoka, Twin Falls, Gooding and Ada counties.

Workshop speakers talked of the cycle of abuse, its effect on the community and ways to help victims.

County Commissioner Len Harlig said he has been frustrated with the rise of Blaine County's domestic violence for a number of years.

"After what I've heard today, I'm not just frustrated, I'm angry," a solemn Harlig added. "I'd like to see looking into ways that we can control the abusers."

In 1993, 58 protection orders were issued in Blaine County, and 100 people received them in 1994. Meanwhile, advocates for Survivors of Domestic Violence had 469 contacts with domestic-violence victims in 1993; that number more than tripled in 1994.

There were more than 250 domestic-violence calls just in the southern part of the county — from Hailey to the county line —

last year, Fleming said. Domestic-violence cases are the second most frequent call to the Hailey Police Department, and they're the third most frequent call in Keetchikan, he said.

New Blaine County Prosecuting Attorney Doug Werth said he is hiring a victim-witness coordinator to replace one who left a few months ago. The office also is going to make sure cases are thoroughly investigated so they can be prosecuted without victim testimony, he said.

"My office is going to be very aggressive in the area of domestic violence prosecution," Werth said. "One of the main focuses of the office is going to be in helping victims through the whole court process."

On the state level, Attorney General Alan G. Lance's Domestic Violence Task Force has recommended several changes that will be part of Lance's legislative packet next year, said William von Tagen, the attorney general's director of governmental and public affairs.

Among the recommendations is to

define a physical attack on a pregnant woman as aggravated battery, von Tagen said. The task force's final report will be ready Dec. 5.

One area the state and local communities need to work on is helping witnesses of domestic-violence scenes, said Sue Manley-Smith, crime victim advocate for the Post Falls Police Department.

"One of my biggest concerns is that the children are not protected enough," Manley-Smith said.

Laws also don't protect people against emotional abuse, which is frustrating for police officers, she said. But officers can provide women who they suspect have been emotionally abused with information about groups in their areas like Advocates for Survivors of Domestic Violence, Manley-Smith said.

"It doesn't take a broken bone to have domestic violence in the house," she said. "Just because you can't arrest a person doesn't mean you can't assist."

Illegal alien faces child abuse charges in court

TWIN FALLS — An illegal alien appeared in court Thursday on child injury charges after police and social workers found his children badly bruised in his Twin Falls home.

Joel Caleb Nava, 19, is charged with a felony and misdemeanor injury to a child, according to court documents. Police say that earlier this month, Nava hit his 1-year-old son and did nothing as a 3-year-old daughter was beaten, sometimes on her leg with a belt, according to an affidavit written by Detective Chuck Dudley of the Twin Falls Police Department.

Nava failed to seek immediate medical treatment for another 3-year-old daughter whom police found covered with bruises, the affidavit said. A doctor who examined the girl found bruises on her face and forehead, a scratch near her right eye, a bruise on her lower lip, and bruises on her elbow and buttocks, the affidavit said.

Nava said the girl fell on steps on Nov. 5, the affidavit said. Nava shrugged his shoulders when police asked him why he allowed an alleged batterer to visit his 1-year-old son off the couch and drop him on the floor recently, the affidavit said.

Twin Falls arraigns Nevada man on felony rape charges

Reid Mathew Anderson was being held Thursday evening in the Twin Falls County Jail on \$50,000 bond on the felony charge of rape. He was appointed a public defender, according to court minutes.

A Twin Falls woman told police Anderson raped her in her bedroom after she invited him and some other people to a party at her home, according to a police affidavit. Anderson had tried to talk her into having sex with him and she refused, the affidavit said.

Last weekend, a teen-age girl told police young man raped her at another party.

Fire Chief Orr promises court battle with Sheriff Jax

GOODING — His budget problems may have sunk below the horizon, but now a new legal storm is threatening to pass over Gooding County Sheriff Jim Jax.

Wendell Fire Chief Charles "Red" Orr has officially declared his intent to sue Gooding County and Jax's department for \$100,000 after a sheriff's deputy arrested him at the scene of an accident and forced him to spend a night in jail, according to his Nov. 3 tort claim.

Gooding County Prosecutor Phil Brown dropped misdemeanor criminal charges against Orr, characterizing the incident as "a brewing confrontation" between Orr and Deputy Curt Kaneaster. Orr claims he unintentionally pushed Kaneaster backward during a Dec. 18 accident, causing him to tumble beneath a potato truck that had fallen over onto the victim's car.

Meanwhile, former Gooding County Jail administrator Bob Morgado is entering to sue Jax personally for \$50,000, claiming Jax defamed his character and slandered him in a Sept. 26 Times-News article by partly blaming him for the department's budget woes. Morgado said his attorney sent Jax a letter of his intent this week.

Morgado said Thursday he wouldn't pursue a tort claim he filed several months ago against Jax. He said Jax forced him to perform three jobs while only paying him as the part-time jail administrator. The tort claim will languish in the county files because "I will not take one penny from the county," Morgado said.

Elko County casinos show 13 percent gain in September

JACKPOT — Strong wins in Elko County helped produce a statewide gain of 5.2 percent for Nevada casinos in September.

The State Gaming Control Board reported Thursday that the percentage gain, down from 12.5 percent in August, was based on a win of \$650.5 million.

"All areas of the state except Laughlin showed gains — although Las Vegas Strip resorts which accounted for \$206.6 million of the total were only up 0.7 percent compared with the same month a year earlier.

Clubs in Elko County won \$19.4 million for a 13-percent gain. "Elko is just going like gangbusters," Westergard said.

County officials meet halfway

His Jerome counterpart, Mayor Gerald Oatler, said, "At this moment in history, we are in charge of our destiny. What happened here today we hope will continue on for generations to come."

As a strong wind blew, officials and spectators climbed from the bridge's sidewalk over a concrete barrier onto the roadway for another round of handshaking and backslapping.

Representatives from both counties exchanged comprehensive plans that describe past, present and future details about Jerome and Twin Falls counties and cities.

"This step we're taking today is narrowing the chasm that has separated us for a long time, and we're making that chasm shallower. We're going to do all we can to make this thing work," said Jerome County Commission chairman Roy Prescott.

Dennis Maughan, Twin Falls county commissioner cited a proposed regional airport that was never built and the long-delayed effort to enhance 911 emergency communications as examples in which the two communities had staged "years of disagreements."

"We can't afford two armies anymore. We have the (Highway 93) beautification project and wildlife protection that involves both of us. These are going on right now and will be a good test to see if what we're doing here today will work," said Howard Allen, Twin Falls city councilman.

In all, about 75 city, county, state and education officials took part in the handshake.



Lawyer places welfare system woes on unresponsive Idaho lawmakers

WENDELL — The state has created a welfare bureaucracy that subsidizes irresponsible parents, a local lawyer told District 21 legislators Wednesday.

By law, Health and Welfare is supposed to do all it can to rebuild a broken family, Robert Bartlett told Clint Stennett, D-Ketchum, Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum and Tim Ridinger, R-Shoshone, at a town meeting on welfare reform.

But when a child is removed from a home, Bartlett said, he or she ends up in limbo for up to four years while Health and Welfare tries to reform parents who may be drug or alcohol ridden, unemployed, children-beating, child-molesting people, he said.

"Why are you trying to put that poor child back with these rats?" Bartlett said. "I just scream at Health and Welfare, and they say, 'Well, this is the law Mr. Bartlett, there is nothing we can do.' Well then change the law," he said.

He recommended that when the situation is so bad that the child should be removed from the home, the parents have 90 days "to get their act together — if they don't, you begin termination proceedings." The deputy attorney general in this district won't do that for a year and a half, he said.

"If you want to save money, maybe that would be a way to do it, because you wouldn't be putting the kids in foster homes for so long," he said. "We wouldn't spend so much money on the social work."

On-line schools seek acceptance by accreditors

TWIN FALLS — OK, so you're an on-line junkie, and you decide to join an on-line school. Yet don your lucky surfers' hat, remove yourself from your public high school, pay a few hundred dollars a month and log on to your computer every morning to meet your teacher and classmates in cyberspace.

Then what? Will you learn just as much as in public school? Is the teaching competent? Will the credits transfer if you choose to return to public schools? Will colleges or the military accept an on-line degree?

"For now, the answer to some of those questions is 'maybe.' For the last two, the answer is probably 'not yet.'"

Jerome High School Principal Carroll Matthews said his school doesn't accept

any credit transfers from non-accredited schools.

And directors of private regional accrediting agencies — those who measure the competency of public and private schools — have not yet extended accreditation to on-line schools or on-line classes offered by long-distance education corporations.

"Our credibility is on the line every time we give accreditation to an institution," said Vicente Ferrandino, executive director of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, a branch of one of the most powerful accrediting agencies in the country. "We need to feel comfortable that we can assure the public that indeed they are quality programs."

His agency's parent organization, the International Council of School Accreditation, is the only accrediting organization recognized by the U.S. Department of Education. It reviews most

private and public schools, including the Twin Falls School District and the College of Southern Idaho.

Next week, regional and national directors of the International Council of School Accreditation, which accredits 26,000 schools nationwide, will convene in Washington D.C. They will examine distance-learning courses of all types — mail, correspondence, satellite courses and on-line courses — and decide whether to accredit them. Regional associations will decide in December. The national association will decide in January.

Ferrandino said he wants a greater comfort level with on-line schools and the assurance that his association will be able to monitor the school's quality.

David Steadman, executive director of the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges based in Boise, said questions have to be answered, but attitudes from

regional directors and public school officials might be holding up the accrediting process.

"They don't want to accredit anything that's not a four walls," he said. "They want it to have four walls and a teacher who is certified, the state walls and the teacher aren't the only ways to guarantee achievement."

He said he has gotten a handful of calls from people interested in setting up on-line schools. It's impossible to know, he said, how many similar schools have started or are being planned.

In an e-mail, both Steadman and Ferrandino agreed that technology will revolutionize educational offerings. "It has a lot of promise, I think," Steadman said. "It has a lot of promise for home schoolers. It has a lot of promise for students who need to make up credits. We don't see in the long run it replacing public schools."

Petition valid; Elko continues investigation

ELKO — Petitions calling for a grand jury investigation of government-officials to determine if any laws have been broken in the management of public lands here have been validated by Clerk Karen Dredge.

Of the 3,625 signatures contained in the petition, 2,718 were ruled valid, Dredge said. Backers needed 2,515 signatures to call the grand jury.

The petition calls for a probe at all levels of government to evaluate the management of public lands in Elko County, which comprise about 73 percent of the county's total acreage.

The investigation would include looking into reports of threats against U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management personnel, as well as claims federal agencies have overstepped their authority in forcing livestock off the land.

Elko District Judge Thomas Stringfield said on Wednesday he would schedule a meeting with Elko County Commissioners within a week to discuss financing for the grand jury. He estimated it would cost at least \$50,000 to finance the body for one year, the Elko Daily Free Press reported.

Selecting the members of the grand jury will probably take two months, he said.

Stringfield said that setting the boundaries of the investigation would be his job as senior district judge. He said he would give jurors broad authority to investigate the management of public lands, but was reluctant to establish a grand jury system for general criminal indictments.

Elko District Attorney Gary Woodbury has recommended a grand jury be used to issue criminal indictments as a way to save the county money. Justices of the peace currently hold preliminary hearings to determine if enough evidence exists to bind suspects over to district court.

Stringfield said grand jurors would investigate the local criminal justice system and decide for themselves whether the general indictments system should be established.

On Thursday, it was reported that outgoing Washoe District Judge Jerry Whitehead, who is retiring, rather than face federal criminal charges, may be asked to assist in the Elko County investigation.

Stringfield said he was considering asking Whitehead to advise the grand jury, the Reno Gazette-Journal reported.

Whitehead was the subject of a yearlong federal investigation that was launched after the Nevada Supreme Court blocked disciplinary proceedings against him.

In an agreement reached this summer with the U.S. Attorney's Office in Whitehead agreed to retire in January. In return, prosecutors said they would not pursue unspecified charges against him.

Project leader says student rocket launch successful

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — A rocket built by students from four Utah universities finally did what it was supposed to do Wednesday.

The 13-foot rocket lifted off Tuesday from the Hill Air Force Base Test Range about 25 miles west of the main installation of Dugway Proving Ground.

The first two attempts, on the same day in January, didn't work because the ignition systems failed. A third launch in March was spoiled by an oxygen leak. The rocket climbed to only 350 feet before it crashed and burned.

Rocky Flats cleanup 'vision' calls for nuke material removal by 2015

GOLDEN, Colo. (AP) — A draft "vision" describing cleanup plans at the former Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant calls for removal of most stored plutonium and other nuclear materials by 2015.

Under the draft "vision" document, the Rocky Flats site work force will be reduced from its current level of more than 5,000 to less than 500, and the annual operating cost will be less than \$60 million, down from \$600 million today.

The draft document was released Thursday by the Department of Energy, the state of Colorado and the Environmental Protection Agency.

Most buildings, except those needed to store plutonium and other wastes, will be demolished or buried, the plan said.

Parts of it were released earlier, including plans to raze some buildings and bury others and for plutonium storage. The document is subject to revision during work sessions between now and January.

The document outlines plans for land and soil cleanup, ground water and surface water cleanup and management of contaminated soil, water and other materials.

The only buildings that may remain will have been converted to low industrial activity operated and supported by others."

By 2015, not only will stored plutonium have been removed from the Rocky Flats site, but no department-operated buildings will remain there. The site now has more than 425 buildings.

Convicted murderer eligible for passes from halfway house

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — Convicted murderer Frances Schreuder, 57, will be eligible for 12-hour passes and eventually weekend passes, a job and schooling outside the Ogden halfway house that became her home last week.

That includes 24-hour passes up to two a weekend — without sponsors. However, spot checks still are made, Daines said.

Schreuder was placed in the Parkview Community Corrections Center after getting hired there as a cook. Prison officials consider her a success story and model inmate.

She'll also be expected to do community service in facilities such as nursing homes, homeless shelters or battered women's shelters.

She earned prison trusty status and a college degree after her 1983 conviction for the murder of Franklin Bradshaw. Schreuder prodded her teenage son Marc into shooting her multimillionaire father in 1978.

She has to be with a responsible parent at all times. She's not out alone," said Elaine Daines, Parkview supervisor.

Schreuder, 57, has declined requests for interviews from the Standard-Examiner and two Salt Lake television stations. But in a letter to the Ogden newspaper, she attempted to clarify a story published last week in which she said that Corrections spokesman said she was allowed no visitors and had no outside privileges at Parkview.

Approval of a sponsor is a process that can take weeks as backgrounds are checked.

BOISE (AP) — Despite a federal mandate, a lawsuit and the best efforts of the state and tribe, the Nez Perce can muster only one family willing to become foster parents to Indian children.

summer with the state agreeing to mend its ways. New rules include keeping track of Indian foster-care placements and adoptions on a soon-to-be-installed information system, said Roseanne Hardin, administrator of Health and Welfare's Division of Family and Community Services.

Nez Perce are struggling to keep families in the foster system and make sure they have the money and support needed to raise children in their own culture.

Hardin said most Indian children placed into foster care by the state likely are placed in non-Indian homes. Nationally, an estimated 125,000 Indian children are in foster care.

Liz Bybee, a Nez Perce foster parent, understands why three other Nez Perce families are bailing out of the program. She wanted counseling for herself and two foster children in her care who suffered from fetal-alcohol effects. But she got little help, she said.

In Idaho, only the Shoshone Paiute Tribes have more than a handful of foster families they can rely on. Nearly all tribes have some difficulty placing older children or special-needs children with developmental or behavioral problems.

Spokane voters approve pet spay-neuter initiative

SPOKANE (AP) — Residents want the city to pay for spaying and neutering dogs and cats.

And every tribe points to limited funds to provide services to foster families.

Under an initiative passed Tuesday, the city must make available for desexing house pets \$7.5 million to \$9.75 million general fund next year.

"It always gets down to the dollar. We can usually find someone with a big heart, but they need counseling and training to meet the needs of that child."

The initiative was approved with 20,716 votes in favor to 16,744 against, or 55 percent to 45 percent, the auditor's office said today. Some absentee ballots still must be counted.

Oman transfer sees light—again

OAKLEY — Ranchers of the Wild Rose Grazing Association say they don't know who has initiated a petition circulating in Cassia County advocating the transfer of a Forest Service ranger—again.

William LeVere, Sawtooth National Forest's new supervisor in Twin Falls, said Thursday problems won't go away even if Twin Falls District Ranger Don Oman no longer manages the Goose Creek allotment, grazed by the Oakley-based Wild Rose association.

The petition calls for Oman's transfer or asks that the Cassia County portion of the Twin Falls District be annexed into the Burley Ranger District. The petition states that signers are concerned about the "intolerance by, and senseless approach with which Oman has and does deal with the Wild Rose Cattle Association permittees."

It is not the first time cattlemen have tried to get Oman transferred. Friction over permit violations between Oman and the Wild Rose association led the Forest Service in November 1989 to promise the Idaho Cattle Association that it would move Oman within a year.

After news of the agreement hit the media, the Forest Service backed down from its promise. Oman has not been moved.

Last year, Oman reduced the association's grazing time by 15 percent on the basis of 1993 grazing permit violations on the Goose Creek Allotment. The ranchers had allowed their cows to remain in pastures beyond the removal date, run cows in restricted areas and failed to maintain

Forest Service pipelines and troughs, Oman said. After an appeal, then Sawtooth National Forest Supervisor Jack Bills upheld Oman's violation findings but suspended the penalty on one condition—that the ranchers have no more serious violations until the end of the 1997 grazing season.

In October, Oman reinstated the penalties on Wild Rose members who he says had again violated terms of their grazing permits on the Goose Creek Allotment. The ranchers agreed to have cattle out of certain areas by certain dates, but failed to do so, Oman said.

The association's grazing time on the allotment will be reduced by 15 percent, or four weeks—14 days each in the spring and fall—during the 1996 and 1997 growing seasons, the letter says.

"A lot of issues and problems that people perceive are not just Don Oman and won't go away with Don Oman," LeVere said.

Managing the land requires cooperation between forest officials and ranchers, he said. Communication between the two needs to be improved in Cassia County, he said.

LeVere said if the petition lands on his desk, he would look at it with a national perspective. Oman manages the forest for 250 million people across the country, he said. LeVere said he expects all rangers to enforce the terms of grazing permits.

The petition also claims that Oman has handled other issues on the district unfairly. The example used was closure of the Ibox Peak area in the southeast area of the South Hills during hunting season.

But Idaho Department of Fish and Game asked that the area be closed to motorized vehicles in response to requests from hunters, said Carl

Nellis, regional Fish and Game supervisor in Jerome. Nellis said in October hunters had asked for increased opportunities to hunt in areas with fewer hunters and improved chances of taking a large buck.

Bruce Bedke, Wild Rose member and Goose Creek rancher, said Thursday he signed the petition but didn't know who had instigated it.

"I feel like Don hasn't been fair with us. It's just a basic financial survival technique on my part," Bedke said.

The reduction means he will have 28 fewer days to graze his cattle on public land and will have to feed 200 head of cattle some other way for those 28 days.

"The petition is one way of fighting back. I feel like the guy hasn't been fair in any respect," Bedke said.

Oakley rancher Mike Poulton, an association member, also said he didn't know who started the petition or how many signatures have been gathered.

Oman said the effort to remove him doesn't come as a surprise.

"I'm just doing my job. We faced a situation where there were repeated violations of their grazing permits," Oman said.

For the most part, the allotment's permit holders have helped better the range land and improve the stream banks, Oman said. He has gained satisfaction from seeing it improve during his nine years as ranger, and that is one reason he is sticking out the controversy, he said.

Oman said he thinks he has been lenient, giving ranchers time to change management practices and improve the land.

Investigators blame cigarette in Oakley fire

OAKLEY — A cigarette that had probably been smoldering since early in the morning caused a near fatal house fire, investigators concluded.

Cassia County Fire Inspector Dick Randlekiv said the discarded butt nearly burned out on an old couch, but flared into a house-engulfing blaze after a door was opened, giving the fire oxygen.

The fire torched the rented home where Carl Edward Matthews Covington, 54, lived. Covington was found unconscious in his bathroom by a volunteer Oakley fireman. Firefighters fought the fire for three hours; it destroyed most of the historic log cabin.

Randlekiv said the house provided plenty of fuel for the fire, once it began.

"There was a couch and chair in that living room that were made of foam. When foam burns, it burns like gasoline," Randlekiv said.

The heat inside the living room, where the fire originated, reached 1,500 degrees, he said.

"That room was like a kiln. Everything that was metal in that room is gone," Randlekiv said.

Alcohol may have been a factor in a Covington's inability to escape the fire, according to a Cassia County Sheriff's Office report.

Covington was flown to the University of Utah Hospital's burn center in Salt Lake City after Oakley firefighters—Troy Greenwell and Joe Stringham—pulled him from the bathroom inside his burning house.

Covington's son-in-law, Jim Willyard, told police he and Covington shared a bottle of tequila that evening.

At University Hospital, Covington's blood alcohol content tested at .27. The legal intoxication level is .10.

"We believe he got up, went to the bathroom before going to bed, and passed out," Sgt. Dave Tracy of the Cassia County Sheriff's Office said. "That's what saved his life."

On his fourth trip into the inferno, Greenwell found Covington unconscious, lying on the floor in the bathroom. Greenwell was going to give up the search after the ceiling began collapsing during his third venture into the burning house, but went back in after he heard a wheezing moan from Covington.

"There was a man trapped inside a burning building, that's all I thought about," Greenwell, a former Twin Falls and U.S. Air Force firefighter, said.

Bartlett said he was sorry for the pathetic family situations, but not sorry enough to have to spend money to put their lives back together because most of that money is wasted.

That is a legislative thing, Bartlett told the delegation. If you talk to judges they will say there is nothing they can do.

Debbie Low said she and her husband, Del, spent two years trying to take in a boy on a guardianship program when his 88-year-old adoptive grandfather could no longer care for him, but Health and Welfare kept the youth in foster homes until the

Low finally got him.

"In that (the state) paid foster care—shifting him around, shifting him around, which was ridiculous. We were willing to take him for nothing."

Ridinger, who also serves as mayor of Shoshone, said these examples illustrate what happens when the problems are managed by the federal and state government.

"If we let local government handle them, there will be efficiencies there," he said. "We all have some responsibility for this. Some of this we should take care of in our own communities through our churches and other civic organizations instead of relying on the state and federal government."

No bids on timber; activists rejoice

BOISE — A controversial auction of timber burned in the 1994 Thunderbolt Fire drew no bidders Thursday in what environmentalists called a victory and the industry a setback for the sensitive South Fork of the Salmon River.

"It's a shame this sale didn't sell," said Cathy Barbouletis, deputy supervisor for the Boise National Forest. "It was built as a win-win project, with the industry winning for the economy, win for the environment."

But the proposed helicopter sale of 13 million board feet of timber was being challenged in court by environmentalists, using the criticism of the project by three federal agencies to support the contention it should be blocked. The Environmental Protection Agency classified the sale some 25 miles east of Cascade as "environmentally unacceptable," and Will Spelto, regional director of the National Marine Fisheries Service, maintained logging the area defied common sense.

Scientists optimistic about technology

IDAHO FALLS — Scientists J.D. Atkinson and Russell Grizo are optimistic about transforming much of the nuclear weapon waste stockpiled in Idaho into a safe, easily disposable form.

In an Idaho Falls warehouse Wednesday, the men explained technology they say could hasten removal of waste from the Idaho National Laboratory to permanent disposal in salt beds at the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in New Mexico.

The Science Applications International Corp. technology uses a plasma arc torch to generate a sort of man-made lightning inside a furnace.

Locals question Dworshak proposal

OROFINO — A proposal to limit drawdowns of Dworshak Reservoir to 60 feet below full each summer during dry years would not do much good, community leaders told the Idaho Water Resource Board.

The plan would quickly be translated by state and federal officials into levels to which the water behind Dworshak Dam can be lowered every year. Orofino Chamber of Commerce Executive Director James Grunke said Wednesday, "I believe we need to force their hand instead of compromising it and rolling over." Dr. Dennis Harper, an Orofino physician, agreed during a public hearing on the proposed state water plan for the North Fork Clearwater River Basin.

Li admits he killed fellow UI students

MOSCOW — Former University of Idaho graduate student Wenkai Li has pleaded guilty to counts of first- and second-degree murder for the Memorial Day stabbing deaths of two fellow Chinese students in Moscow.

"I admit I killed these two people," Li tearfully told 2nd District Judge John Bengtson on Wednesday. "I just feel sorry I hurt so many people." The admission came after days of plea negotiations between prosecution and defense attorneys who spent Monday and Tuesday selecting a jury for Li's trial on two counts of first-degree murder.

Li, 25, was accused of stabbing University of Idaho doctoral student Ning Li 28 times and his wife, Xia Ge, 10 times. Their bodies were found in the 4 inside sleeping bags discarded along a Wyoming road. Authorities arrested Wenkai Li the next day in Laramie, Wyo.

Lawsuit surprises environmentalists

SANDPOINT — Environmentalists say they were a little surprised when the federal government last week joined a lawsuit against the state Transportation Department and a contractor.

They say usually, it's an environmental group suing the government to protect the environment. The Justice Department announced last week it was filing suit under the Clean Water Act against the transportation department, claiming a \$7 million U.S. Highway 93 construction project north and west of Sandpoint destroyed a watershed and polluted Sand Creek with sediment. The legal action was filed on behalf of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Batt not popular with Energy folks

Gov. Phil Batt's pro-Idaho image, well preserved following his controversial nuclear waste deal with the Department of Energy, got another major boost Thursday from Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary.

Batt was cited as the source of news most unfavorable to the department during the month of July in a \$40,000 monitoring project O'Leary ran to track and rank the reporters covering Energy Department issues and their sources.

His spotlighting in the report by a private ratings service was during the time his negotiations were beginning to heat up with the Energy Department, the Navy and possibly most notably the Justice Department over a

deal for resumption of nuclear dumping at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. The deal was finally consummated on Oct. 16 after months of wrangling that Batt admitted was extremely frustrating. Administration officials have said that most aggravating situations where those where the principle negotiators appeared to be in agreement only to have Justice Department attorneys undermine that understanding and force the talks back to square one.

U of I faculty wants role in engineering transfer

MOSCOW (AP) — Faculty of the University of Idaho want the state Board of Education to include faculty and students on a steering committee to transfer the engineering education program at Boise from Idaho to Boise State University.

The 11 faculty-Council Wednesday unanimously passed the resolution. It also approved a resolution stating it will provide input and expects participation in the statewide role in a commission debate the board's going through.

The engineering transfer steering committee is made of Idaho interim president Thomas Bell, Boise State President Charles Ruch and Rayburn Barton, executive director for the Board of Education. It's developing a plan to transfer three undergraduate engineering programs at Boise to Boise State's administration.

The board meeting to consider the transfer is next week, and faculty and students in Moscow and Boise are wary since few specifics have surfaced.

They say the process is too sensitive, and issues such as promotion and tenure-of-faculty, relocation and accreditation need their input. "I would like to see us focus on the process," said the sponsor of the motion, Donald Blacketter, associate professor of mechanical engineering. "I think we need to take a stand on how we think students need to be treated and the concerns of faculty in Boise."

When the steering committee was formed, engineering Dean Richard Jacobson was named as an information point person for press, faculty and student questions about the transfer. The festival has said complaints about noise, traffic and crowds from people who live around Memorial Field — the main concert venue — are forcing the move.

The city also voted earlier this year to evict the festival from Memorial Field on Lake Pend Oreille after the 1997 series because of the same complaints.

Festival seeks mediator to resolve tiff

SANDPOINT (AP) — The organizers of the Festival at Sandpoint, criticized for plans to move some of the summer concerts to the Coeur d'Alene-area, have hired a psychologist to try to restore harmony in the community.

Max Bromberg, a professional mediator and psychologist, met Wednesday with about 20 people, many unhappy with the festival's recent announcement that it was considering moving half the music series to Kootenai County.

The final agreement trades 1,133 more loads of waste being dumped at INEL for promises that it most other waste be removed from Idaho by 2035. Democrats helped deflect criticism of the deal from Idaho's overwhelmingly anti-waste electorate by claiming that the Batt had no choice but to cut the best deal he could — even if it is inadequate — because the GOP congressional delegation, led by Sen. Larry Craig, did nothing to keep Congress from mandating the state take more waste.

Now the news coverage analysis paid for by O'Leary in an apparent search for relief from unflattering press names Batt to what some have identified as the Energy Department's Public Enemy No. 1. And it left the governor's staff a little

surprised. "He's not very vitriolic," spokeswoman Amy Kleiner said. "He doesn't throw a lot of spears. ... But the negotiations were tough, and we did force them into a lot of concessions."

Fifth on that list is Beatrice Brailsford, the outspoken Snake River Alliance leader who has been among the nuclear waste deal's harshest critics. "I'm doing my job," Brailsford said. "From the DOE's perspective, the truth hurts."

And U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge was also among the department's top 25 unfavorable sources, after siding with the state in its bid to delay unilateral resumption of waste shipments to INEL until after environmental questions were adjudicated.

TWIN FALLS — Young Jana Meyer pretty much set the tone of her future professional career during her talent presentation in the Miss Idaho contest back in the early '70s.

That's when she ripped off her formal gown to reveal a cute little western number underneath.

"The general audience likes to be entertained," Raze said. "You hear so much barbershop and it starts sounding the same."

Off stage, Raze, 49, has been married for 25 years to a woman who's "as witty as me." They have a son and a daughter, both in college. The kids are funny, too.

"They have the same curse," said Raze, with a chuckle.

In his spare time, Raze runs marathons. In other words, he's usually in perpetual motion.

During his barbershop act, Raze interrupts the other members of the quartet so often that they like to tell him, "That's why some animals eat their young."

Not really.

Fab Four is back with a vengeance

The band that once sang "You Never Give Me Your Money" will soon be rolling in it.

With this month's three-part ABC-TV documentary and the upcoming release of three compact disc packages of archival material, the Beatles will be everywhere. The hype machine is cranking overtime.

"They've really created a plan where everywhere you go, everything you look at and everything you listen to is Beatles, Beatles, Beatles," said Toni Lee, spokeswoman for Grey Entertainment, the advertising agency, putting it together.

Beyond the six-hour, three-night TV special starting Nov. 19 on ABC, at-

tention is focusing on the release of two "new" songs in which the three surviving Beatles lend vocals and added instrumentation and arrangements to two unreleased John Lennon songs.

On Nov. 20, Capitol Records will release the first of them, "Free as a Bird," as part of a double CD.

Buses decorated as yellow submarines will roam city streets. ABC-TV is calling itself A-Beatles-C. Theaters will show ads before movies. Even people who call Ticketmaster will hear Beatles songs when they're put on hold.

Beatlemania revisited is expected to be very lucrative for Paul McCartney, George Harrison, Ringo Starr and Yoko Ono.

Forbes magazine predicted the three surviving ex-Beatles and the estate of the late John Lennon would earn \$130 million this year, ranking them third on the list of best-paid entertainers. That's astounding money for a group that broke up 25 years ago and only in the next few months will release its first "new" music since then.

While the Beatles dolls and Beatles wigs of the 1960s pioneered rock 'n' roll merchandising, its former members lately hadn't taken much of an interest in keeping the band alive in the marketplace.

The amount of Beatles CDs and memorabilia has dwarfed those of such artists as Elvis Presley and the Rolling Stones. There are only two "greatest Please see BEATLES/C2

hits" packages, known as the "red" and "blue" albums for their covers, and even those occasionally are discreetly taken off the market.

Experts suggest that's part accident, part design. The former Beatles still have trouble agreeing on business matters and make a lot of money even in "quiet" years where there is little Beatle activity. Forbes estimates about \$12 million a year for all of them.

"They simply don't overexpose and oversaturate," said Stephen Dessau, president of Track Marketing Partners, a music marketing firm. "They make millions of dollars year in and year out on the catalog but they don't bastardize the product."

Of course, this only whets the appetites of devoted fans when there are new products to sell. And there will be plenty.

Home videos of the Beatles documentary, with about four hours of material not used on ABC-TV, will be for sale next year. Capitol Records will put all of the anthology

CDs into a boxed set that will be on the market for Christmas 1996.

Late last month, the Beatles' management firm reached an exclusive merchandising deal with Sony Signatures, a company that has developed products for Barbra Streisand, Bruce Springsteen, Janet Jackson and others.

Dell Furano, president of Sony Signatures, is betting that the schoolchildren who toed Beatle lunch boxes to school in the 1960s will pay up to \$500 for framed lithographs of Beatles album covers to hang in their offices.

The company soon will be churning out Beatle ties, Beatle watches, Beatle clocks, Beatle greeting cards, Beatle plates and Beatle posters.

Framed wall hangings, of such items as posters advertising Beatle tours and never-before-seen photographs, are expected to be popular. He expects to generate \$200 million in retail sales by the end of 1997.

"We're finding a lot of kids, children of the Baby Boomers, who want to buy presents for their parents and vice versa," Furano said.

Oates' Quentin P. a madman for the ages

Literature hasn't had many characters like Quentin P. Made this twisted usually have been reserved for real life, when John Wayne Gacy and Jeffrey Dahmer helped define the ordinary-looking serial killer without a conscience.

"Zombie" (Dutton, \$20.95) her 25th novel, Joyce Carol Oates gives us Quentin P. from the inside out. We learn how Quentin sees things and how the world affects him; then we learn what he is capable of doing.

Symbolically, we never learn his last name. This is just one stylistic device Oates uses—to transport us into Quentin's world. There, things are filtered through Quentin's sick mind. Oates allows Quentin to tell his own story all the way through.

In "Zombie," Oates' literary ride through the haunted house of the American psyche takes its scariest plunge yet. The novel's title refers to Quentin P.'s career goal—to create a human zombie who obeys him, gives him unending sexual satisfaction and worships him. The novel's loose plot involves Quentin's relentless stalking of victims and inevitably futile

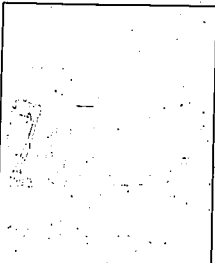
attempts to turn his prey into the zombie of his dreams. The book is part stream of consciousness, part childish diary. Quentin even draws little pictures throughout—a souvenir of a murder, the ice pick and dental tool he uses to try to perform lobotomies.

When Quentin's mind is opened for us it spits its foul contents in a jumble. The boring details of Quentin's day—what he eats, what he watches on TV—are presented alongside gruesome details of his crimes.

And most of Quentin's life is boring. He is not a diabolical mastermind but a sick loser who might inspire pity if he were not so dangerous. There is no traditional building of tension and suspense—just a hodgepodge of Quentin-speak, the somewhat juvenile, obscenity-littered language Oates invents for her protagonist.

Here's how Quentin describes an encounter with his father, who drops by his apartment the morning after one of Quentin's sprees and comes dangerously close to finding a stashed book.

"Staring at my hands which were trembling just slightly, as if the building was vibrating from beneath, I did

wonder, Could I struggle Dad? But he would resist, he would put up a struggle, and he is strong, and in a struggle we would be so close. I was staring at my hands as if I had never seen them before, like learning my name is QP, & that is who I am, & there is nobody else for me to be, the fingers were stubby like a kid's & the knuckles scamped & the nails with queer milky, half-moons uneven & broken &

edged with grime. How many times I had scrubbed my hands with the gray soap from Ace & cleaned under the nails with a knifeblade & yet it had all come back."

Oates wisely declines the temptation to delve into why Quentin turned out this way. The focus always is on how he does what he does and how his upper middle-class family protects him.

Although Quentin does his share of bungling, he is good at covering his tracks. He has an uncontrollable inner and sexual appetite driving him, but he can be the incredibly level-headed and organized when it comes to getting out of a scrape.

His finest hour in this respect is when he is surprised at home by police looking for one of his victims. When Quentin realizes that he needs a search warrant, he stalls them while he rids the premises of evidence. As he goes about, blandly cataloging his actions—expressing minor irritation at the officers for showing up before he needs a warrant—a reader gets a sinking feeling Quentin will get away with it.

Oates' unorthodox style is horrifyingly effective. Before the end of this slim book, the reader has the sense of being taken by surprise and dragged into this sick scenario much as Quentin's victims are.

Hillerman takes to Asia in tale of 1 man's journey

First and last, Tony Hillerman is a storyteller. In between, he's something of an expert on the Southwestern tribes of American Indians, and a connoisseur of fascinating ethnic mysteries.

But because he's a storyteller above all, he can deviate from his successful Southwestern-mystery series to write another kind of story, and still captivate readers.

His latest book, "Finding Moon" (HarperCollins, \$24), is the story of Moon Mathis, the managing editor of a small Colorado newspaper, who journeys to southeast Asia to find the missing child of his dead brother. Circumstances force the reluctant Moon to do things he does not believe he is capable of.

Moon's quest takes him to California, Manila, and finally, Vietnam in 1975, just after American troops have pulled out. It's a story Hillerman, an imposing, silver-haired, plump-nosed grandpa of a man, has wanted to write for 40 years.

Though his Jim Chee and Joe Leaphorn mysteries, often set on the Navajo reservation, has brought him wild success—he's sold "maybe close to 20 million books," he says—this story has haunted him for a long time. It all began when Hillerman, as a young journalist, read accounts of occupying troops

pulling out of various African countries after World War II, leaving behind incredible chaos and destruction, he says.

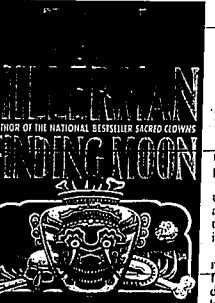
Fascinated by these stories, he tried to write about it at the time as "Part B of a Pilgrim's Progress—where an ordinary fellow is put into a place where civility has ceased to exist."

But Hillerman says the story just wouldn't come together for him. It wasn't until a few years ago, when he visited the Philippines and got a sense of the place that he was able to begin telling that story in an updated setting.

"They say you lose something like 18 billion brain cells a day—so I figured I'd better get it written," he says, laughing.

There's a passage in the book that Hillerman is particularly proud of. Moon is taking a nighttime walk along Manila Bay:

"He smelled fish, oil, flowers, salty ocean air, decayed fruit, a strange animal aroma. The perfume of the tropics, he guessed. Strange, exciting country. He should have

been enjoying it. ... The sidewalk now was illuminated by the yellow glare of a streetlight. It showed him a shallow flow of dark water running down the concrete toward him. "Water?" "Moon stopped, stared, sucked in his breath, and jumped to one side.

JACKPOT — The golden years are not over for William Lee. First, William Lee Golden performed on his grandfather's radio show. Then he was a member of the Grammy-award-winning, multi-platinum Oak Ridge Boys quartet. Now, he's gone solo.

Golden grew up in Alabama, on a farm without running water or electricity. His sister taught him to play guitar, and he sang gospel music with his family. He got his big break with the Oak Ridge Boys when they were singing gospel. Eventually, the group broadened its scope into country music. The Oaks' song, "Thank God for Kids," became a classic — and Golden was lead singer on the cut.

In 1986, Golden recorded a solo album on MCA Records. Soon, he left the Oak Ridge Boys and released two solo singles on the Mercury-Polygram label. Those two songs, "Keep Looking Up" and "Louisiana Red Dirt Highway," are frequently seen on video on Country Music Television.

Today, Golden, 56, often tours with his sons (The Golden) and opens for acts like Tammy Wynette, Waylon Jennings and Travis Tritt. On the personal front, Golden spent years searching for inner peace. (The Rolling Stones' "Satisfaction" didn't come along until a year later.)

"Don't Let Me Be Misunderstood," "We Gotta Get

Outta This Place," "It's My Life," "See See Rider" and "San Francisco Nights" followed over the next three years, all with Burdon's hard-edged R&B vocals that influenced contemporaries such as Jeff Beck and Eric Clapton and later performers such as Jimmy Page and Robert Plant.

After The Animals broke up in 1968, Burdon moved to Southern California, where he discovered a funk club band called Night Shift. In 1970, it became Burdon's backup band, War, and released "Spill the Wine," which became a top 10 hit that summer. Eric Burdon and War made two albums together.

Burdon left War in 1971, and performed mostly solo until The Animals reunited in 1983 for an album and a tour. Since 1990, Burdon has toured at various times with ex-Doors guitarist Robby Krieger and keyboardist Brian Auger.

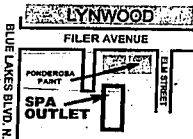

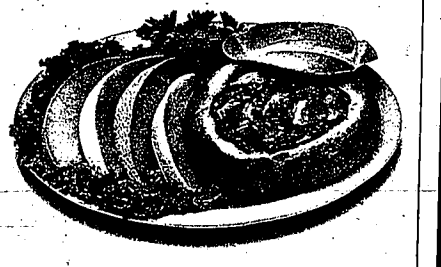

'Bad Boys,' 'Gordy' reach local video shelves

"Bad Boys" (R) — In movie mania, two funny people do not always add up to twice the fun. But, in "Bad Boys," Will Smith & Martin Lawrence are a comically duo who can do no wrong. Smith and Lawrence carry Smith and Wessons as a pair of Miami cops shielding a witness (Tea Leoni) from the bad guys trying to rub her out. From the opening scene, these two Miami cops establish a loose, wisecracking rhythm that keeps you for a good time.

Lawrence's character is an extension of the sweet, foul-mouthed persona he projected in last year's stand-up movie, "You So Crazy." An awkward smoothie, he tries to be cool but he isn't, and the space between cool and uncool is where his humor lives.

It's rather that Hughes and director Les Mayfield have undertaken to not just remake but update "Miracle," which means making it cruder and more vulgar to match the tenor of modern times and Hughes' fatuous sensibility. Although attracted to the original's innocence, they eventually lost faith and ended up tampering with its purity in small but ruinous ways.

The basic outline of "Miracle" remains thankfully unchanged, although this version is a sluggish 18 minutes longer than its predecessor. It is the day of New York City's big Thanksgiving parade, here sponsored by the C.F. Cole Department Store, a landmark on Manhattan's 34th Street. But Dorey Walker (Elizabeth Perkins), the store's director of special projects, is more frazzled than happy.

It seems the store's Santa, the parade's piece de resistance, is too incensed to do his festive duty. In desperation Dorey turns to a nearby old gent (Attenborough), who happens to look just like Mr. Claus and says that yes, he's had a bit of experience in that line.

The old gent is a big success in the parade, ditto later in the week with the customers at Cole's, where he astonishes everyone by directing shoppers to whatever store has the best prices, even if it's the dead store Express (Gimbles in the original) just across the street.

He seems too good to be true, and in fact Dorey soon uncovers a glitch. The man not only says his name is Kris Kringle, he claims with total sincerity to be the true Santa Claus, the one with the reindeer, the elves, the whole nine yards.

Of course rationalist Dorey finds this hard to believe, as does her 6-year-old daughter Susan (Mara Wilson), who has been trained to be as skeptical as her mom. "I've known for a long time," Susan says in somber tones, "that he's not real." So Kris's task is not only to persuade the world to have faith but to bring the spirit of the holiday back to one particular family as well. Green Day: Concerts are energetic, not dangerous

One of the questions we music critics are most often asked (along with "You mean they actually pay you to do that?") is "Will my kid be safe seeing a Green Day concert?" It's an understandable concern. Green Day fans, after all, tend to be young and energetic, with a large chunk of the audience still in junior high. Moreover, Green Day shows tend to feature a lot of moshing, which to most parents looks distressingly like a bunch of strangers tossing their kid around like last week's laundry.

So is it safe?

"Of course!" answers the band's drummer, Tre Cool. As he points out, during a phone interview, Green Day shows are actually quite safe.

"You have your share of idiots, definitely, that are going to want to

not hurt people, but be a little bit rougher than they should be," he allows. But "As long as your kid has a good head on his shoulders," everything should be fine, Cool says.

Still, he understands why parents worry. "I'm a parent," he says. "I would worry about my kid going to a concert as well. It's the same. People just don't want to let their kids out of their sight."

"It's kind of a strange thing, a concert," he adds. "A bunch of kids get together, and a lot of people dance-around. But I think we've found a better use for these arenas than sports; if you ask me. And if people worry about their kids coming to our shows, then enroll them in football or whatever." He laughs. "Let's not talk about safety."

As Green Day has come to see things, the real worry at rock con-

certs has less to do with the actively moshing fans than with the same-time over-officious security guards.

So one of the first things the group did while planning its current tour was arrange for sensible security.

"We have a really good security team," he says. "We definitely haven't had any problems with security this whole tour. We make sure the security guards treat the kids with respect. Because you just can't take it personally. Their job is to sit there and get looged on and, when kids get thrown over, to catch them and land them safely on the ground and send them on their way."

"We have a guy down there in the security-pit-who's-with-us," he adds. "Basically, he's not down there to make sure the kids don't do anything stupid; he's down there to make sure the security guards don't do anything stupid."

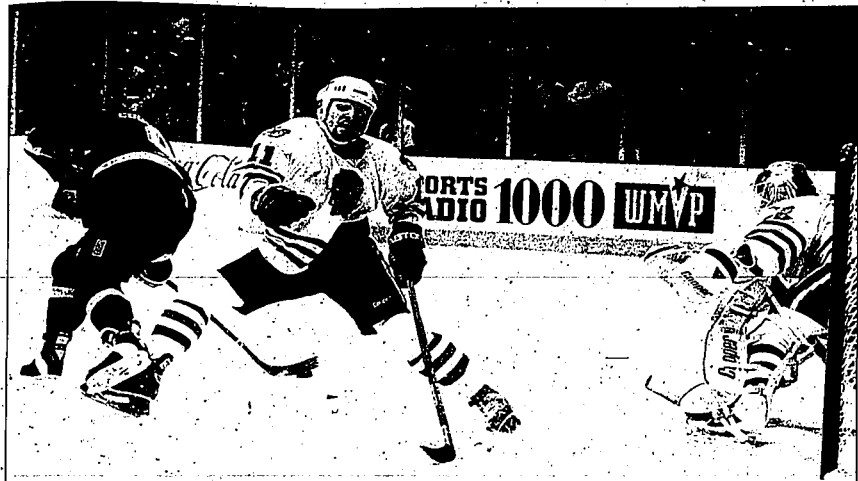

Griz not taking Eagles lightly

You might think Montana coach Don Read would relax a bit when considering this weekend's opponent on the road, leading to the Big Sky Conference championship.

Cellar-swalling Eastern Washington (7-6 overall, 1-5 in league play) has lost six of its past seven games, along with its starting quarterback and leading receiver. EWU's defense is the Big Sky's worst, yielding nearly 442 yards a game.

Conference-leading Montana (7-2-4) comes to Cheney Saturday boasting a top-ranked offense that churns out more than 510 yards and 40 points an outing, led by the Big Sky's best quarterback, Dave Dickenson.

It would be easy for the Grizzlies to take the Eagles lightly, but Read will have none of that.

"Eastern Washington's record is deceiving," he insists. "Last week against Boise (State)... they moved the ball up and down the field. They certainly have the ability to move the football."

Indeed, the Eagles got three touchdown passes from Harry Leons, playing in place of injured starting quarterback Brian Patrick, en route to a 63-44 loss to the Broncos. But EWU lost more than the game: Jesse Hardt, who had three catches for 55 yards, saw his 27-game streak of getting at least one reception snapped by a career-ending knee injury.

Still, Read declares that "Eastern is playing well now, and we expect them to be a very, very tough opponent."

Still, Eagles-coach-Mike-Kramer knows it would take a near-miracle for EWU to overcome a Grizzlies' squad led by Dickenson, leading the Big Sky with 3,474 yards and 31 touchdowns passing this year.

"Montana is a class football team with a class coach and led by a class quarterback. Their offensive production is legion. It's so well-storied and documented you almost take it for granted," Kramer says.

Read acknowledges the praise, but only to a point.

"We feel good about where we are right now, at least in terms of where we are (in the standings)," he says. "(But) we know we have our work cut out for us."

The teams have left on our schedule, in terms of Eastern Washington and Montana State.

BSU (6-3, 3-2) hosts MSU (5-4, 2-3) in a critical game. The Broncos seek to sustain hopes for a share of the Big Sky crown, should Montana slip, and a berth to the Division I-AA playoffs. The Bobcats also entertain postseason dreams, and finishing with a winning season.

BSU, on a four-game winning streak, has the league's second-best rushing offense, rolling up nearly 183 ground yards a game. A fourth-ranked passing attack generates another 240 yards for the Broncos, who are scoring nearly 35 points, an out-

Allen has told his players that any hopes for returning to the playoffs this year after last season's second-place finish nationally depend on beating the Bobcats.

MSU coach Cliff Hysell, noting the Broncos have scored 49 and 63 points in their past two games, is happy his squad is coming off a bye week.

"That couldn't have come at a better time for us. We needed a chance to heal some injuries," he says.

MSU lost to EWU 28-10 the last time it played, Oct. 28 in Bozeman. A bright spot for the Bobcats, however, is a defense that allowed just one touchdown in each of its last three games.

NAU (7-3, 4-2) travels to Weber State (5-4, 3-2), with both teams needing wins to stay within shouting distance of Montana.

The Lumberjacks will be without Jeff Lewis, second only to Dickenson in touchdown passes thrown (22). Lewis fractured his left throwing shoulder in a 17-14 setback to Idaho last week.

"It's a tremendous loss," NAU coach Steve Axman admits. "It's going to hurt."

Backup quarterback Scott Partridge will be taking the snaps for "Jacks, who still hope to earn postseason play."

"One of our goals was to get to the NCAA playoffs. If we win on Saturday, we'll be 8-3 and I think that will give us a good chance," Axman says.

Weber, meantime, seems to be doing fine with Roger Cook at quarterback. Cook, who replaced injured Bryan Martin, will be making his third start Saturday.

In two starts this year, Cook passed for 526 yards and three touchdowns. Weber coach Dave Arslanian hopes NAU's new quarterback doesn't make the transition as well.

"They are much improved overall with a lot of speed and quickness on both sides of the ball," he says. "With a new quarterback, it's hard to say how they will change... from what they've been doing, so that presents a bit of a problem for us."

Idaho (4-4, 3-3) and Idaho State (5-4, 2-4) both step outside the conference this week. The Vandals travel to Northern Iowa (6-3), while the Bengals find themselves at North Texas (1-8).

Sanders talks with old mates

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Deion Sanders talked to some of his former San Francisco 49ers teammates on Thursday. But Jerry Rice can go ahead and turn off his cellular phone. Deion won't be dialing him.

"Things have been icy between the Dallas defensive back and the San Francisco wide receiver since last year's Super Bowl when Rice got mad at Sanders and came after other 49ers for breaking a mid-week curfew."

Then Rice launched an anti-Sanders diatribe earlier this season, saying Sanders was taking credit for winning the Super Bowl.

"They met on the field Sunday in Texas Stadium with Sanders expected to be covering Rice, the NFL's all-time leading yardage receiver."

"I have nothing personal against Jerry," Sanders said. "He's one of the greatest receivers to play the game. But I never said I won a Super Bowl by myself... it has been funny to see him upset and cursing. He's a good dude. He just said some things that didn't come out right."

Sanders, who defected to Dallas for a \$35 million package that included a \$13 million signing bonus, said he talked to San Francisco defensive backs Eric Davis and Tim McDonald on Thursday, warning them he might be on offense.

"I have no personal battles against the 49ers," he said. "They are just going through denial right now saying they don't miss Deion and don't miss Ricky Waters and don't miss Ray Rhodes."

Sanders promised no Andre Rison incident on Sunday. Last year Sanders and Rison, who was a wide receiver for Atlanta, settled a grievance on the field with their fists when the 49ers played the Falcons.

Sanders said his tight left hamstring was healing to the point where he might be able to also play offense.

Sick of wandering NFL teams? Fans would own this new league

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Saying the NFL is doomed by the frenzy for sweet-stadium-deals that send teams scurrying from city to city, the founder of the defunct USFL has put together a new league that will make fans the owners.

"Do you think a Cleveland team majority owned by 70,000 Clevelanders would have voted to move to Baltimore?" Dave Dixon said. "That 100,000 Houstonians would move to Nashville?"

Within the next 10 days, Dixon plans to announce the formation of the FanOwnership Football League. He will unveil the plans in either Cleveland, which just lost the Browns to Baltimore, or Houston, which is expected to lose the Oilers to Nashville.

The New Orleans art dealer and businessman envisions a league that will offer cheaper tickets, a longer season, and above all, stability.

Dixon was the founder of the United States Football League and a driving force behind the building of the Louisiana Superdome. He also helped New Orleans obtain an NFL expansion franchise: the Saints, in 1967. But he has never been averse to offering the NFL a bit of competition.

"In its present structure, the NFL cannot survive," Dixon said. "The poor mayor of Cleveland goes to the last NFL owners meeting in Dallas, and they wouldn't even let him speak. You can't treat the public this way. These guys are committing suicide."

Why is the public upset? Dixon describes a scenario of wheeling, dealing and greed: Owners pit city against city to extract sweetheart deals or new stadiums. Dallas' Cowboys owner Jerry Jones uses an antitrust loophole for marketing deals that will produce money to sign stars

like Deion Sanders. Other owners respond by asking taxpayers for more money-for-government-backed facilities.

Eight founding owners have committed to put up a one-time fee of \$5 million, plus \$2 million for first-year operating funds. The owner will retain 30 percent of the team's stock, 70 percent will be sold to fans with no single person able to own more than one percent.

The league would have 12 to 16 franchises, all in major cities, and play a 24-game, fall-winter schedule with no preseason games.

Although the September-March season would overlap the NFL schedule, there would be no direct conflict in games.

The league will target only major cities, with New York, Washington, Philadelphia, Atlanta, Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit and Houston among them.

Rams' stadium still not quite ready

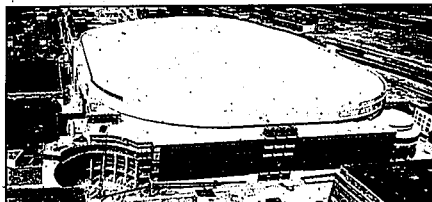
ST. LOUIS (AP) — Even with an extra three weeks, there's so much to do to get the \$280 million Trans World Dome ready for Sunday that the St. Louis Rams won't be able to practice there.

"I've been told it might interfere with some of the work men watching us rather than working," coach Rich Brooks said. "I don't understand that one."

Brooks, who'll have to settle for a brief walkthrough on Saturday, might if he spent some time at the dome.

On Thursday, three days before the Rams play Carolina, workers were crawling all over the place.

Inside, the artificial turf field looked ready with a giant Rams helmet at the 50-yard line, but the goalposts were getting coats of

paint and one base hadn't been padded yet.

The 66,000-seat dome had been scheduled to open Oct. 22-for the

San Francisco 49ers game, but the Rams had to play a fourth game at Busch Stadium because it was far from ready.

No, Montana not coming back to Pack

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — Sorry, Packers fans, Mike Holmgren's comments about trying to get Joe Montana to come out of retirement and help out his injury-depleted squad were all in jest.

During his weekly media briefing Wednesday, the Green Bay coach said he tried but failed to tempt the 39-year-old Montana into making a comeback during a telephone call to the retired quarterback's home south of San Francisco.

"I said, 'Before you say no, listen to my proposition,'" Holmgren re-

counted. "He said he hadn't touched a football in a while and he likes what he's doing."

Montana, who retired in San Francisco on April 18 with a year remaining on his contract with the Kansas City Chiefs, has been relaxing with his family and doing studio work for NBC-TV.

Packers spokesman Jeff Blum said Holmgren and Montana, who are good friends, talk frequently and Holmgren's efforts were indeed "in jest." Holmgren was quarterbacks coach with the 49ers before coming

to Green Bay in 1992.

The Packers are "a little bit of a desperate strait at quarterback," Holmgren said.

Starter Brett Favre left last Sunday's loss to Minnesota with a severely sprained left ankle and top backup Ty Detmer was lost for the season with torn ligaments in his right thumb.

The Packers signed journeyman Bob Gagliano, who may start against Chicago on Sunday if Favre can't go, and also signed Mike McCoy to the practice squad.

Lawyers seek mistrial in King's fraud case

NEW YORK (AP) — Don King's defense lawyer asked for a mistrial Thursday, saying prosecutors called the boxing promoter a liar at his insurance fraud trial but that didn't stop prosecutors from continuing to attack King's credibility.

"His testimony from the start did not make sense in many, many areas," Assistant U.S. Attorney Paul Conroy told the jury after a federal judge in Manhattan put off a decision on lawyer Peter Fleming's mistrial request.

Judge Lawrence M. McKenna did warn prosecutors, though, that they seemed to be pushing the boundaries of fair play when they started closing arguments a day earlier by saying King's testimony "was a lie."

"I don't think the way to object to the other side's characterization is to say that it is not true in front of the jury," McKenna said.

Fleming told the judge that prior appeals court rulings established that a mistrial is warranted

when prosecutors call a witness a liar. Gardphe countered that there are conflicting rulings on the subject.

In his closing argument Thursday, Fleming said prosecutors were sloppy and desperate to try to prove that King cheated Lloyd's of London out of \$350,000 for a 1991 cancelled fight by submitting a fake contract.

Fleming spent three hours detailing "an enormously complicated case" that rests on a narrow definition of confusing words in insurance documents and contracts between King and his boxers.

"This criminal case, whatever aura of suspicion may have been painted, whatever shadows may have been thrown at you, this criminal case was not proved, not close to being proved," Fleming said.

"As each of you know, not-proved means not guilty," he said, introducing a slogan and a theme that he raised repeatedly as he took jurors on a tour of many of the 19 witnesses and 300 exhibits.

GMs won't attend major leagues' winter meetings

NEW YORK (AP) — For the third straight year, major league general managers won't attend the winter meetings in December. They will attend the owners' meetings in Los Angeles from Jan. 16-18.

A memo sent to teams Wednesday by Bill Murray, the executive director of baseball operations in the commissioner's office, told general managers and other major league front office personnel not to attend the winter meetings with the minor leagues in Los Angeles. Those sessions are scheduled for Los Angeles during the first week of December.

Owners previously had scheduled a meeting for the middle of the following once. Those sessions will take on the look of the winter meetings.

"It could be usual trade discussions," Murray said Thursday. Acting commissioner Bud Selig has felt agents ganged up on teams when the winter meetings were held in December, attempting to run up salaries by creating the atmosphere of an auction.

By pushing the meetings back a month, some owners think many players already will have signed, preventing a run-up in prices.

He also reminded them repeatedly that King faces "consequences" if they convict him of nine counts of wire fraud that each carry a maximum of 5 years and a \$250,000 fine.

He reminded jurors that the key prosecution witness, Joseph Maffia, was a disgruntled ex-King employee who made a cursio-ledge, phone call to King shortly after he began talking to prosecutors.

"Was it chilling?" he asked jurors-of the conversation that was played in the courtroom.

He said Maffia lied to the jury.

"In the end, you will find that the case comes down to a matter of shades of gray."

He called Julio Cesar Chavez the "335 million man," underlining how much the current WBC super lightweight champion has made while working for King.

It was the cancellation of a 1991 bout between Chavez and Harold Brenner that led to the filing of charges against King last year.

Heat jump to early lead in Atlantic Division

MIAMI (AP) — The Miami Heat say they're winning because of rebounding, defense and Pat Riley.

The new Heat coach has brought success to a faltering franchise more quickly than anyone — including Riley — anticipated. For the first time in the Heat's eight-year history, they're alone in first place in the Atlantic Division. They're also 2-0 for the first time after beating two-time defending champion Houston 89-82 Wednesday.

"We're just two games into the season," forward Billy Owens said. "We have 80 to go. We'll keep quiet about how good we might be."

It's clear, however, that Miami is no longer the pushover that went 32-50 last season. Just ask the previously unbeaten Rockets, who lost to the Heat for the first time since 1989.

"We let up. We didn't respect this club," Houston guard Sam Cassell acknowledged.

Miami has won while adjusting to the addition of center Alonzo Mourning, acquired in a six-player trade on the eve of the season. The Heat are quick to give their new coach credit for the surprising start.

"You don't really know what coaching is until you experience something like this," forward Keith Askins said. "It's a pleasure to play under him."

Askins and guard Bimbo Coles have been with the Heat since 1990, and Riley is their fourth coach.

"Coach Riley has brought confidence to this team," Coles said. "Last year we lost a lot of close games. Now we're in real good condition and real poised."

Less than a week into the season, Riley appears to be building the sort of aggressive, tough-minded, defensive-oriented team that he had with the New York Knicks.

Miami held an opposing team below 83 points just twice all of last season. They've already done it twice under Riley. Houston shot 39 percent, Cleveland 38 percent.

Riley fortified his defense with the addition of the 6-foot-10 Mourning, the best shot-blocker to play for Miami.

"If somebody goes back-door on us, we know Zo is back there," Askins said. "He's going to swat it away. We are already seeing that. It allows us to deny the ball a lot more and take more chances in pressuring the ball. These were things we were not able to do before."

Miami has also pounded the boards, out-rebounding its first two opponents by a combined 101-

68. With Mourning in the lineup, power forward Kevin Willis is no longer playing out of position at center, and he leads the team with 27 rebounds.

"We have to play a real aggressive game and a rebounding game until we get in sync offensively," Riley said.

The Heat have missed Glen Rice, their leading scorer each of the past four seasons. He went to Charlotte in the Mourning trade. The offense will eventually rely more around Mourning, but he has hit just 7 of 22 shots so far.

"I'm still learning the system," Mourning said.

"There are a lot of times I feel like I'm rushing myself out there. This is a strange feeling. I've never felt like this before as far as struggling. It's just going to take time."

Despite his sub-par offensive play, Mourning dominated the final 90 seconds against Houston, forcing a turnover, blocking a shot, grabbing a rebound and hitting two free throws. He also shut out Hakeem Olajuwon in the fourth quarter.

The addition of an All-Star center has made the Heat a much better team, Rockets coach Rudy Tomjanovich said.

"There's no comparison at all," he said. "They have to be feeling really good about the big moves Miami ended an 11-game losing streak against Houston. Last season, the Heat started 1-7; they'll try for 3-0 Friday against the New Jersey Nets."

"This is a sign of things changing," Askins said. "We've got something good happening here, and it's going to get better."

Reality sets in for Auburn coach as team starts racking up losses

AUBURN, Ala. (AP) — Terry Bowden burst onto the scene with a name and a few jobs, small college coaching and not much else. He was young, only 37, full of fire and bubbling with a bouncy Southern twang, ready to conquer the football world.

And he did for a while. Auburn won 20 straight games while on probation. They gobbled up interceptions and zig-zagged into the end zone like little Pac-Men for a miraculous comeback victory over LSU. They did the near-impossible at Florida Field, beating Steve Spurrier and the Gators in the ear-ringing madhouse called "The Swamp."

Bowden said that made Auburn the best team in the country, and, at least at that point in 1994, his claim had a number of supporters.

But this fall, with a young, shaky defense, it's become apparent that hype and luck and looks can be deceiving. Auburn is 6-3 this season, 6-4 since the magical winning streak ended.

The man who was touted by some as a savvy motivator and miracle-worker is now being questioned. Fans have complained about his off-the-field game, which sometimes excludes tailback Stephen Davis who had hopes for a Heisman-type year. Columnists have suggested that Bowden has spread himself too thin, juggling endorsement deals, television, commenting, even some musical ventures.

"It's going to make me a great coach," Bowden said. "I've become

a much better coach because I have studied it and learned more things this year than I've learned in a long time."

Not even Bowden could expect 20-game winning streaks to keep

coming. His father, Florida State coach Bobby Bowden, has coached for decades and never won that many in a row. Terry came along and did right off the bat, in his first 20 games as a major college coach.

"There's only so long you can depend on a 20-game winning streak," Bowden said. "Those will all come and go."

But no one expected Auburn, at this juncture, to need a win over Georgia or Alabama to even qualify for a bowl bid.

"I think maybe what was different this year from last year is that we knew we had a chance to be able to go to a bowl, to win the SEC championship, to compete for the national championship," quarterback Patrick Brumfield said. "Maybe we were looking down the road too much. I don't know if that was the case."

Then there's Bowden's offensive style. He came to Auburn from Salem and Samford with a reputation as an information offensive coach. These first two seasons, he made use of Davis, a bruising tailback in the Auburn tradition of Bo Jackson, and similarly tough James Bostic. Davis led the SEC in rushing last season.

But it was a clean start that Bowden wanted to take the offense somewhere else. His father, after all, was running the "fast break" at Florida State, lining up in the shotgun and drilling the ball downfield with dizzying success. Spurrier was winning SEC championships with his four-wideout, no-holds-barred "Fun-Gun" offense at Florida.

Are Cavaliers, Hokies glamorous enough for spot in college bowl?

College football fans in Virginia could be in for a major disappointment when bowl bids are handed out.

On Saturday, No. 14 Virginia and No. 21 Virginia Tech probably will elicit a tie for their conference titles.

Those conferences are the Atlantic Coast and Big East, which send their champions to the Fiesta-Orange-Sugar bowl alliance.

Neither league has a tiebreaker procedure, but since Virginia and Virginia Tech both beat their likely co-champions, it seems logical that they would get the bowl alliance bids in the case of a tie.

In this case, don't expect logic to prevail. The Cavaliers (7-3) and Hokies (7-2) could get shut out of an \$8 million alliance payday because they're not glamorous enough.

Virginia can grab a least a tie for the ACC title by beating Maryland on Saturday. But No. 6 Florida State (7-1) would probably get the ACC's bowl alliance berth if it ties for the league championship, even though the Seminoles were beaten by the Cats.

But the Seminoles would have a better overall record than the Cavs. More significantly, Florida State is a high-profile team with a large name.

ional following, which translates to better television ratings and more fans attending the game.

Virginia Tech is in a similar situation.

If the Hokies beat Temple on Saturday, a BCS bowl bid would have the former but not the latter, so the Eagles would need special permission from the NCAA to play in the postseason.

In all likelihood, the issue won't come up. BCS bowl bid Temple last week and still might play Miami, Syracuse and Rutgers.

HUSKER POWER: If Nebraska wins its final three games, it will become the first school to win consecutive national titles and perfect records since Bud Wilkinson's Oklahoma Sooners in 1956-56.

Penn State was the last major school to go undefeated and untied in consecutive seasons (1968-69), but the Nittany Lion didn't win the national championship until his Toledo had three straight perfect seasons from 1969-71, but never finished in the Top 10.

Olympic Committee awards grants

The U.S. Olympic Committee awarded \$1.12 million in grassroots sports grants Thursday, its latest effort to counter criticism that it spends too much on medal winners and too little on development.

The grants will pay for projects ranging from finding sailing coaches in Boy Scout troops to special training for the nation's best wheelchair archers and development of women's sports programs. They were part of a \$1.28 million package that increased program funding by 53.6 percent.

The USOC also approved \$316,981 for programs in luge, skiing, weightlifting, water polo and wrestling, with much of that money going to national team and other elite-athlete projects.

The payments, announced by Alpha Alexander, head of the USOC's competitive grants subcommittee and a director of the national

YWCA, pushed the total grants under the program to \$3.67 million in the current four-year budget, which runs through next year. Competitive grants are awarded annually.

"This is part of the normal process," said Dick Schultz, the USOC's executive director. "It's strictly seed money to help start developmental grants."

Competitive grants are awarded on the merit of individual projects and are separate from other funding earmarked for community organizations by the USOC.

They had been the focus of a recent series of articles in the Atlanta Journal and Constitution, which said the USOC was ignoring its federal mandate to develop sports at the grassroots level. Instead, the newspaper report said, the committee was targeting its \$415 million quadrennial budget on 1,200-1,400 elite athletes most likely to win medals and world championships.

Since the articles appeared in ear-

ly October, the USOC has waged a campaign to show it was interested in both winning medals and developing the next generation of American athletes.

Led by Schultz and president LeRoy Walker, the committee has appeared before a Senate committee considering revisions of the 1978 Amateur Sports Act, which gives the USOC ultimate power over Olympic sports in the United States.

It also has churned out reams of facts and figures to show that its budget contains a larger percentage of dollars intended for entry-level and developmental sports programs than the one-fifth of one percent cited by the Journal-Constitution articles.

For example, the committee last week released results of a budget review that showed national governing bodies of Olympic sports spent 16.3 percent, or about \$35 million, of their budgets on developmental programs.

Advertisers flee Cleveland Browns

CLEVELAND (AP) — More advertisers fled the Baltimore-based Cleveland Browns, and one company attacked the team Thursday in a 22-count radio commercial.

With your recent shocking announcement, you have made it clear that you no longer want 'our' team to be a part of 'our' community," an advertising cooperative of 257 McDonald's restaurants said in the 60-second commercial.

The ad played on 55 stations across northeastern Ohio began as an open letter to Art Modell, the team owner who announced Monday that the Browns would move to Baltimore in 1996.

Because the team is abandoning Cleveland, "We no longer wish to support your team," the advertisement said.

Gary Gottfried, marketing director for the Browns, did not respond to phone messages seeking comment on the abandonment by McDonald's, based in Oak Brook, Ill., a pizza company, a drugstore chain and others.

The Ohio Lottery has canceled \$365,000 in stadium and broadcast advertising, and the regional public transit system yanked \$50,000 in ads. In addition, the 28 area outlets

of Louisville, Ky.,-based Papa John's Pizza canceled Brown-related radio ads, and the Twinsburg-based Revco drugstore chain pulled its advertising.

Jonice Andrews, assistant professor of marketing at Case Western Reserve University, said the team's advertising typically is regional and pulling ads would not affect the team's image in Baltimore.

"As far as I can tell, it's going to be basically a clean slate in Baltimore," Bruno said. "There's no (Browns) heritage there. I don't see a lot of baggage — positive or negative — will transfer."

let "God sort it out." His sights, he said, are on Tyson.

If Lewis doesn't get to fight Bruno, he is in line for a possible bout against Bowe.

WBC reaffirms Bruno-Tyson matchup

CHIANG MAI, Thailand (AP) — The World Boxing Council Thursday reaffirmed its decision to have world heavyweight champion Frank Bruno fight Mike Tyson in March.

Twenty-eight members of the council's ruling board voted to go ahead with the Bruno-Tyson bout. Three British delegates abstained from voting.

The WBC decision does not clear all hurdles to the fight. Former champion Lennox Lewis is seeking an injunction to prevent the council from replacing him with Tyson.

A lucrative purse awaits any challenger who steps into the ring with Tyson. Lewis would be a step closer to such a fight if he could fight Bruno first.

"The date is still to be confirmed, but March 16 is the one we are looking at. I'm highly delighted justice was seen to be done," Bruno's promoter, Frank Warren, said after the voting.

But Lewis' manager, Frank Maloney, said the WBC was making up rules to suit itself and "making a person bigger than an organization, and that person is Mike Tyson."

"We are still in court in New Jersey. We are

still pursuing the legal fight because I am right," said Pansos Eliades, Lewis' financial backer.

The fact that Bruno and Lewis are British led to the objection by the British delegation.

Speaking before the committee's vote, Bruno said he was ready to match Tyson's strength in the ring.

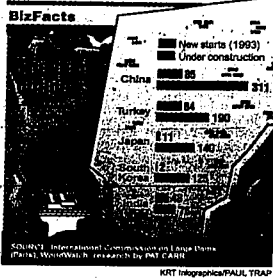
"I've done all my obligations. I'm a law-abiding citizen. I'm entitled to fight whoever I want to fight," he asserted.

Trying to resolve the wrangle was the most pressing issue facing the WBC's 32nd annual convention. During the five-day meeting, the WBC is also looking into improving boxing safety.

He had seemed almost certain the 33-year-old Bruno would defend his WBC title against Tyson on March 16 at Las Vegas. But then came Lewis' legal battle.

Last Friday, the High Court in London rejected Lewis' initial bid for an injunction. Now the Lewis case has sought a similar injunction in an American court.

In an interview, Bruno said he wasn't going to get personally involved in the wrangle, but rather

Prices drop, keeping inflation fears low

Mortgage rate decline spurs rise in home prices

WASHINGTON — The fifth straight decline in energy costs helped push wholesale prices lower in October, and another report suggested modest economic growth.

Some analysts said the combination was just what the Federal Reserve ordered.

The Labor Department reported Thursday its Producer Price Index fell 0.1 percent, the third drop in five months. Although the decline was led by energy prices, it was broad-based.

In the second report, the department said the number of new claims for jobless benefits shot up by 9,000 last week to the highest level since the summer.

New applications for unemployment insurance totaled a seasonally adjusted 375,000, highest since they totaled 416,000 during the week ended July 15.

Analysts said the current level reflects sluggish job growth, and the lack of inflationary pressures gives Fed policy-makers the latitude to lower interest rates to stimulate the economy if needed.

Some believe the Fed could act at its meeting next week, although others believe it will wait for the resolution of the federal

budget impasse and more economic data later this year.

Many believe the central bank has achieved its objective of a soft landing — slow economic growth without inflation.

Besides falling finished wholesale goods

year earlier, when the median was \$111,400.

Thirty-year, fixed-rate mortgages averaged 7.7 percent in July through September, down from 8.6 percent a year earlier, according to the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp.

Mortgage rates have fallen steadily this year, from a high of 9.25 percent in November 1994. This week, they dropped to 7.37 percent, the lowest since February 1994.

The government's Consumer Price Index will be released next Wednesday. Consumer prices crept up a barely perceptible 0.1 percent in September and for the first nine months of 1995, were rising at a modest 2.8 percent annual rate.

Over the year so far, wholesale prices were doing even better. They were up at an annual rate of just 1.4 percent, compared with a 1.7 percent advance in 1994.

Although wholesale prices rose 0.3 percent in September, the increase was driven by a 1 percent jump in food prices, the result of a summer drought that wilted vegetable harvests. Wholesale prices fell 0.1 percent in August.

The department said food prices held steady in October as vegetable costs fell 19.1 percent, retreating from their 38.6 percent spike a month earlier.

Energy prices dropped 0.9 percent, even more than the 0.5 percent decline month-over. Energy costs have fallen each month since rising 0.6 percent in May.

Heating oil costs fell 11.1 percent, the steepest drop since 12.1 percent last January. Gasoline prices were down 2.7 percent and natural gas was down 0.6 percent. Electricity costs, however, rose 0.5 percent.

Listen, buy music with MCI's 800 number

WASHINGTON — Long-distance company MCI entered the \$12 billion music retailing business Wednesday with an 800 number that lets people sample and buy their favorite recordings.

MCI needed to make only a minimal investment to provide the service because it uses many of the resources — transmission, billing, and customer-service systems — already in place, said MCI marketing director Angel Dumlup.

The number is 1-800-MCI-NOV.

Callers can choose from among 5,000 CDs and cassettes. To help them decide, they can listen to some 20,000 15- to 20-second music clips. Selections fall into 14 formats, including rock, country, pop, jazz, and children's.

FTC reportedly seeks more data in Time Warner deal

WASHINGTON — The major players in Time Warner's planned takeover of Turner Broadcasting System expect to be asked to submit more detailed information about the \$7.5 billion deal to federal regulators.

Attorneys close to the companies said Thursday they expect the Federal Trade Commission to seek more information this week from Time Warner, Turner and Tele-Communications Inc.

Infighting flares over bids for First Interstate bank

LOS ANGELES — First Interstate Chairman William E.B. Start, with deadpan understatement, recalled his encounter earlier this week with a group of Boston money managers as "a relatively hostile meeting."

"They all walked in and slammed their note pads down and said,

"Why aren't you doing this deal?"' Start said.

The deal they wanted was the \$10 billion-plus hostile offer that Wells Fargo & Co., one of Wall Street's favorite banks — had made three weeks ago. The deal they vehemently didn't want was the one that First Interstate accepted on Monday from its much smaller "white knight," Minneapolis-based First Bank System Inc.

And the managers' opinions count because they all control large investments in First Interstate and will influence a coming shareholder vote on the merger.

The flare-up in the Boston conference room is part of the extraordinary behind-the-scenes infighting going on as the takeover struggle between Wells Fargo and First Interstate — once cordial rivals, much like their home cities of San Francisco and Los Angeles — has exploded into bitter corporate warfare that is rare in the staid world of banking.

It's a struggle that not only involves two of California's biggest companies but some of the nation's most powerful financiers, including America's second-richest man, Warren E. Buffett, who holds shares in both First Bank and Wells Fargo.

And it's a fight that has an unusual public face as First Interstate has appealed to civic pride and the welfare of its employees in touting the proposed First Bank marriage. In a well-orchestrated demonstration Wednesday in the shadow of First Interstate's downtown Los Angeles headquarters, some 1,000 supporters — mainly bank employees — heard Mayor Richard Riordan and other politicians give their blessing to the deal.

Start demanded politicians on the stump, and First Bank Chairman John F. "Jack" Grundhofer has been cross-examining the country trying to persuade unsentimental investment managers that they aren't being shortchanged just so that Start and his fellow First Interstate executives can hang onto their well-paying jobs.

The two executives plan to make many more such visits in the weeks ahead.

At the same time Wells Fargo, while publicly holding its fire, is privately trying to sow discontent among the same small group of professionals who represent the institutions that hold the bulk of First Interstate's stock.

Unless Wells Fargo gives up the fight — and insiders say it will state its intentions within a week — the battle promises to drag on through the winter.

Bank mergers move at a slower schedule than most corporate advances because they require the approval of federal regulators as well as shareholders. First Interstate says the transaction

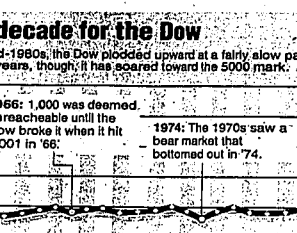
Some airlines, including Continental, American and USAir, have reduced flights and others have slowed the rate of growth, he said. "I'm not saying to sell everything just because more cash than normal. My guess is that we're not going to get a breakdown or crash, but a long-term gradual erosion."

In September, during a 4½-hour meeting to explore a possible alliance, Start said Hazen told him: "You're our primary — maybe our only — strategic alternative."

Start's solicitude for his biggest shareholder underlines the role that big investors will play in the struggle over First Interstate. More than 80 percent of the company's shares are held by only 50 institutions, including investment firms such as KKR, mutual funds and state employee retirement funds. In political terms, the institutions are like states with big electoral votes where the presidential candidates focus most of their campaign efforts. Most of the pop shareholders, like the Idaho presidential primary, will largely be ignored.

The administration's efforts to improve the economy and lower the federal deficit have helped "make home ownership the American dream, a reality for millions of hard working people," Tyson said.

Peso goes south: Plunge could hit Americans' pocketbook

The plunge of the Mexican peso against the U.S. dollar worries investors and labor unions, but could prove a boon to American consumers and some manufacturers.

The Mexican currency dropped Wednesday to a record low of 7.8 pesos to the dollar, or 12.8 cents each. It strengthened Thursday to close at 7.6 pesos.

Here are the answers to some commonly asked questions about the peso's decline.

Q. So the peso dropped against the dollar. Why should I care?

A. Because the Mexican currency's plunge could affect your pocketbook, for better and for worse. Mexican-grown produce such as tomatoes, peppers and chiles should become cheaper at your supermarket, with lower transportation costs in Mexico making it easier to get those foods to California markets, said Carsten Baumann, an economic analyst with First Interstate Bank in Los Angeles. Meat, chicken

and dried fruit, other products that both Mexico and California produce, could also become less expensive.

This will benefit the consumer but hurt California producers of those foods. A protracted peso crisis could force some state businesses to shrink or fold, thus depriving California of those tax revenues. The weak peso could also stall the importation of California produce and California-made computers and other equipment, hurting those businesses as well.

Rising prices of Mexican goods, thanks to that country's runaway inflation rate, have moderated the effect of the declining peso, and the North American Free Trade Agreement has opened up Mexican markets in the past year that weren't available before, said Kevin Herglitz, spokesman for the California Department of Food and Agriculture.

Q. Why are U.S. labor unions worried?

A. Economists say a cheaper peso could induce more companies to relocate south of the border to take advantage of lower-cost

workers. "You're going to see more and more production get to multinational that can operate on both sides of the border," said Greg Woodhead, an economist with the AFL-CIO's task force on trade in Washington, D.C.

If the peso continues to fall, an economic crisis in Mexico could send more people over the border to look for work in California, which could also push wages down.

Q. What caused the peso to drop?

A. The direct cause was a bigger-than-expected increase in interest rates. The yield on short-term Mexican treasury notes, known as cetes, rose more than 10 percentage points Tuesday, to 54.24 percent. Instead of pleasing investors and leading to more investment in Mexico, the increase fueled fears of even higher inflation that could hurt Mexican consumers and debt-riddled Mexican companies, which would have to use more of their revenues to pay off loans.

Inflation is already running at an annual rate of more than 50 percent, meaning

prices are doubling every 18 months or so. **Q. Is now a good time to plan a Mexican vacation?**

A. It could be. "A decline in the peso makes it a better value for Americans traveling in Mexico," said Shawn Flaherty, spokeswoman for the Travel Industry Association of America in Washington, D.C. Food, hotels and souvenirs may be cheaper than when you last visited, although inflation could narrow the gap.

Tourism from Mexico is likely to suffer, however. About 11 million Mexicans visited the United States in 1994, spending \$5.5 billion, the U.S. Travel and Tourism Administration estimates. More than 30 percent of those visitors — and dollars — came to California. The administration already expected a 15 percent decline this year because of peso drops, but it says it now likely to be hurt even more, Flaherty said.

Q. Is the weak peso affecting U.S. securities markets?

A. Apparently not. The Dow Jones Industrial Average, a measure of blue-chip U.S. stocks, was up about 50 points Wednesday and up another 11 points Thursday. Yields on 30-year Treasury bonds dropped as investors anticipated the Federal Reserve Board will cut interest rates soon.

Q. I think some of my mutual funds might be invested in Mexican companies. Is that a problem?

A. It could be a big problem. Some mutual funds invested heavily in Mexico after the government devalued the peso in December and after the currency hit a previous low in March of 7.75 pesos to the dollar. First Interstate's Baumann said. These funds were looking for bargains and enjoyed some hefty profits as the Mexican stock market, known as the bolsa, rose nearly 50 percent in the past eight months.

But investors are worried that the peso crisis and rising interest rates will hurt Mexican companies' profits and their ability to repay debt.

An experienced player blew today's game and I've been sworn to keep his name a secret. West's favorite lead gave South visions of overtricks, so he decided to play East for a fish. In the process, he managed to hook himself. Greedily, South inserted dummy's club 10, fully expecting East to cover. Had East done so, South would have found clubs 3-2 and trumps 2-2. With the actual black-suit distribution, South would have limped home with only 10 winners.

Unfortunately for South, East refused to cover dummy's club 10 and South was left with a splitting headache. He had to draw all of West's trumps to keep West from ruffing the club king. And when the clubs split 4-1, South could do so to win nine tricks.

The game is on ice if South doesn't offer East the hook. Instead, he wins the first club with his king and draws trumps. Next, he clubs to dummy's 4. And when the distribution and South wins an easy 10 tricks after a ruffing club finesse against East.

Note that South still makes an overtrick if clubs had been 3-2. In essence, South staked an extra 30 points for a second overtrick. Bets such as these are never worth it.

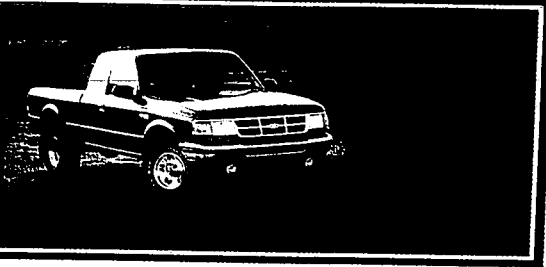

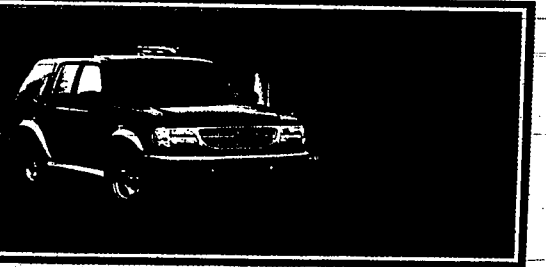

Q: How did such a little-known actress as Julianne Moore land such an important role in the new movie "Assassins"?
—B.

A: Moore is no Julianne came lately. She has made her mark in a number of movies; notably in last summer's hit comedy "Nine Months," in which Moore played Hugh Grant's unexpected pregnant girlfriend.

Her stragant part was in Robert Altman's "Short Cuts" (1993). In it she plays a woman confessing her infidelity.

Julianne, the daughter of a military judge, has a keen sense of humor, a quality she'll need, since she's just gone through the ordeal of her eight-year marriage. Although her romantic life is now on hold, her professional life is in high gear.

Q: When will the Anne Revere novel "Memnoch the Devil" be transformed into a movie? We're waiting...—E.C.

A: It will be a long, long wait. Since every major studio in Hollywood has turned it down. Apparently, the tale of Memnoch, the fifth story of "The Vampire Chronicles," spans several centuries and is just too difficult to structure as a two-hour movie.

However, I have good news for you. First, the four-hour audio version is now available from Random House for \$23.50. Second, the sequel to "Intertwined: A Vampire" is now in the works.

Q: I've heard that Hollywood celebrities would rather fly to New York and appear on David Letterman's show than stay home and chat with Leno on his. Why is this?
—U.G.

A: You have it backwards. Hollywood Leno, 45, and he's invited everyone. The celebs are delighted to be beating Letterman, 48, for late-night ratings and claim they would rather appear on Leno's show because he's "nicer."

Also, tapes at 5 p.m., he is able to all the top dinner parties, which makes for good relations with Hollywood

stars and VIPs. Leno is unlike Johnny Carson, who avoided the parties and sent his producer in-stead.

Q: So many stars are making exercise tapes these days. Do they do it for additional recognition or mainly for the money?
—F.L.

A: My guess is for both. Supermodel Claudia Schiffer and singer-talk show host Carnie Wilson are their own video sons. Schiffer's tape is aimed at the skinnies, while plumber Wilson's is targeted for the Richard Simmons followers, known in the trade as the "deconditioned crowd."

It's likely that Wilson will outsell Schiffer, if the diminishing success of the other recent supermodel workout tapes are any indication. Since Cindy Crawford's tapes debuted successfully in the early '90s, others, including that of Elle Macpherson, did not perform up to expectations.

Schiffer is said to have paid \$1 million for her permission. Wilson probably worked out a similar deal.

Q: I heard that Audrey Hepburn and Humphrey Bogart were having an affair during the filming of the original "Sabrina." Is there any truth to this?
—E.S.

A: A timely question, given the release of the updated version of the 1954 film, which has Hepburn playing a chauffeur's daughter who falls

for playboy William Holden. In the original Billy Wilder film, Bogart was cast as the playboy's more earnest brother.

Bogart was unhappy during the making of "Sabrina," according to a new book, "Bogart: In Search of My Father," written by Bogart's son, Stephen (Dutton, \$24.95). That's because Hepburn and Holden would often flub their lines, resulting in repeated retakes of scenes. Bogart felt that one reason was fatigue. Hepburn and Holden were having an affair, staying up late at night for their not-so-secret trysts. Holden was married at the time.

The great love of Bogart's life was Lauren Bacall, his wife of 12 years and Stephen's mother. Bogey was not a Hepburn, much less her lover.

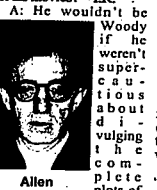
Q: What gives with Ivana Trump? Is she really going to marry her rich boyfriend or isn't she?
—L.F.

A: After her family—her three children by Donald Trump; Donald Jr., 17, Ivanka, 14, and Eric, 10—Ivana is most preoccupied with her growing business empire. There's a clothing and jewelry line merchandised on TV, speaking engagements and books to worry about. Ivana, 50, is one rich businesswoman (estimated to have a net worth in the \$35 million range) and she has a lot on her mind.

With that much at stake, Ivana is wary of getting legally hitched again without a detailed prenuptial agreement. Her boyfriend, 51-year-old Italian construction executive, Riccardo Mazzucchelli, is said to be less enthusiastic about a prenup. "In any event," a formal wedding is appar-

ently not scheduled for the near future, but the romance continues nonetheless.

Q: Woody Allen is said to be a very eccentric director. Does he still impose odd stipulations on the shooting and showing of his movies?—L.R.



A: He wouldn't be Woody if he weren't super-cautious about divulging his eclectic plots of his films in progress to the press and, for that matter, even to his own actors. Media writers and critics asked for synopses and production notes in connection with his latest film, "Mighty Aphrodite"; film companies usually make such information available to the press. They quickly were advised, "All appropriate information will be distributed at the screening and not before." Apparently, Allen's passion for the total secrecy carries on even after the film is ready for release.

Q: I have heard that singer Eddie Fisher has performed at a number of charity events and is in fine form. Can all of his devoted fans look forward to a renewed recording career in the near future?
—B.N.

A: You and scores of other Eddie Fisher fans are in luck. He's returning in Las Vegas for his upcoming recording session with the London Philharmonic. Fisher will be performing songs by Johnny Mercer, Irving Berlin and Richard Rodgers, among others.

Daughter Tricia Leigh Fisher (Connie Stevens is her mom) will sing with him for his 1953 hit, "Oh! My Papa."

Q: There are rumors that Cindy Crawford's voice had to be dubbed in "Fair Game," her first movie. Didn't the same thing happen to another model turned actress?—C.A.

A: There are two others that I can think of: Andie MacDowell using Glenn Close's voice in her first film "Greystone: The Legend of Tarzan, Lord of the Apes." And, years ago, the famed model Suzy Parker had voice problems in her first film, "Kiss Them for Me," co-starring Cary Grant.

By the way, Crawford's agent has denied that her voice was dubbed in "Fair Game."

Q: Is it really true that Sting has settled down into boring domesticity with his current wife?—R.R.

A: I'm not sure how "boring" it all is, but Sting is definitely the stay-at-home husband these days, with current wife, Trudie Styler, and their children.

Home is an English country estate that includes a studio where Sting, 44, will record his next album. To give you an idea of how grand it is, Sting tells me that the studio has "beams on the ceiling and shelve-lined with books."

I caught up with Sting and Styler at the recent Toronto Film Festival. They were promoting their latest movie, "The

Grotesque," described as a devilish mystery in which Sting plays a nutty butler. Styler is a producer of the film.

Of course, she's expecting a child this Christmas. Sting's domestic life does appear to be settled these days, and he seems to like it that way.

Q: What's up with Molly Ringwald? Is she still heavily made-up, with her lips and red hair accentuated, or has she toned things down as she's maturated?—D.F.

A: The 27-year-old Molly has matured, but her look is essentially the same—red hair and full, red lips—although toned down enough to allow her natural freckles to shine through. Molly had let her hair go from red to her natural brunette, but later decided to go back to red, the color she adopted at the tender age of 14.

Ringwald made a big splash in such mid-'80s films as "Sixteen Candles" and "Pretty in Pink." Molly even made the cover of Time magazine in May 1986, hailed as a teenage sensation.

She subsequently surprised everyone by selling her Hollywood home and moving to Paris. She returned to co-star in the TV movie version of Stephen King's "The Stand," in her latest movie, "Malicious." Ringwald plays a wealthy heiress of a clothing store. Molly is, in short, a maturing actress of style.

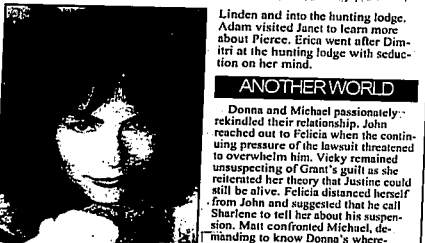

"My mom is my role model. She believes you can accomplish anything you really want by hard work and determination. This philosophy has rubbed off on me and has guided me in everything I've done."

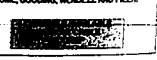
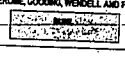
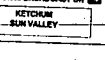
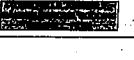
