Coast rocks in 100-mph wind

SAN FRANCISCO — Wind gusting over 100 mph made skyacrapers creak and groun, mearly blew a truck off the Bay Bridge and knecked our power Tuesday to more than 1.5 million people along the West Coast.

West Coast.
At least four people were killed by fälling trees.
"This is a get-your-candles-ready kind-of-storm," said Bob-Salmon, public works-director in Aberdeen, Wash.
Schools closed as a precaution in parts of Oregon and Washington.
In Oregon, the wind reached 102 mph at Cape Blanco, and waves crashed 20 feet high against the jetty at Port Orford. Seas-of 24 feet were forecast off Washington.

"We're scared spitleis," said Castaways Motel manager Linda Berte as she watched the ocean in Port Orford. "It was terrifying. It was the most horrifying sight! I've ever seen."

The San Fruncisco-Oakland Bay Bridge was closed to furneror uniters after the winder caused a truck to jackknife, leaving it teetering on the edge.

"The guardrail saved me," said driver Rod McAlavey. "I was looking dut over into the water."



But Gooding residents drinking their raily?morning coffee at Steve's Quick Stop set the pace for the day.

They followed two of the drive's workers—who had stopped at Steve's to ask for directions — and the drive started early at Wer Memorial Hall in' Gooding' Little more than five hours later, a steady stream of more than 200 people — including chums whom Stover hadn't seen since their high-school days — had donated their blood.

WASHINGTON - The Senate Tuest day rejected a proposed constitutional amendment that would have allowed Congress to pass legislation barring physical desectations of the American

It was the second time this year that the Senate rejected a constitutional sumendment approved by the House.

The vote was 63-36 in favor of the amendment, three short of the two-thirds needed to propose an amendment for ratification by the states. Last June, the House approved 312-120 an amendment allowing state legislatures as well as Congress to enact flag-protection laws.

The flag amendment would have overturned Supreme. Court rulings in 1989 and 1990 that struck down-flag descention laws as unconstitutional violations of individual, rights to free speech — rulings that were decreed by amendment proponents as an insult to the flag and defended by opponents as an affirmation of the Bill of Rights.



Several defense winnesses, children and adults, told the jury that they were at the church during some times in question and that no sexual abuse occurred. The only adult to testify against the Robersons was a convicted sex offender who'd been given a reduced charge for testifying against the the Roberson and other adults.

After more than six hours of deliberation, with a weekend in between, the jurors returned the verdict.

The jury's decision brings to a close what has become the most high-profile of the Wenatchee child-sex-abuse cases.

The Robersons are among 32 people arrested in the past year and a half for allegedly abusing their own and other children in Chelan and Douglas counties, separated by the Columbia River. Early in the investigation, children told of a number of incest cases. Over time, their allegations outlined three-loosely-organized-sex-rings, includings, one—at the Robersons, church.

In Chelan County, prosecutors have charged adults primarily with abusing their own children or children in their care. In Douglas County, the charges were based on allegations that involved ritual abuse during religious services in front of groups of adults and children.

Only-four adults; including the Robersons, have been charged with sexually abusing children at the East Wenatchee Petnecostal Church of God House of Prayer. All four have been cleared.

In August, a Douglas County jury acquitted Honnah Sims, a Sunday school teacher at the church, Prosecutors recently dropped all charges against a church-bus driver.

In Chelan County, five people have been convicted at trial for sexual abuse, and 15 have pleaded guilty to some charges. Only one person has been convicted based on the sex-ring allegations. Sex-abuse charges against four others have been dismissed. One case is pending.

Throughout the trial, defense attorneys maintained the Robersons were largeted by Wenatchee Police Detective Robert Perez, who has led the investigation in Wenatchee and Chelan County. Perez is the foster father of two of the girls who've said they were sexually abused by the Robersons. The girls have implicated many of hose arrested during Perez's investigation.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some 30,000 Americans with Lou Gehrig's disease will soon be able to take the world's first drug to treat — but not cure — the fatal neuromuscular disease.

Riluzole helps patients live about three extria months, although it does not appear to ease their symptoms.



The only wailable job!—could find was fast food and it pays me a whopping \$4.25 an hour without a highe of getting a raise for six monthal! was scheduled for five hours this week withou promise of more than that next week. I can't go back to school to learn another trade because we can't afford it. Financial aid from the government won't help because my husband 'makes too much money."

Advice for smart consumer: Shake your Christmas tree

(The measuring tape is to measure the tree accurately. The old work gloves are to handle the tree if need be. It can get pretty sappy. That's hard to get off your hands. The old blanket is to put-on your-vehicle roof or floor to protect it.)

OK, you're ready. Now take this information with you as well.

Make sure the tree you're considering is relatively fresh. To judge that, place a small branch between your thumb and forefinger. Move it back and forth: The needles shouldnot only remain on the branch, they, should feel soft.

Next, shake the tree gently (if it's not too heavy), bringing the trunk down soundly on the ground. If tonsof needles fall off, it's not fresh. When you finally pick your tree, load it on your vehicle so the bottom faces the front of your vehicle.

That's the best way for the wind to hit it. Loading it the other way will

just push out the branches, perhaps causing them to break or shed lots of needles.

If you get the tree home but don't plan to put ji up right away, get a gallon bucket, fill it with water, and place it adjacent to a wall where you can lean the tree. Before you insert the tree trunk into the bucket, cut about a k - to M -inch slice off the bottom to allow the tree to drink the water.

If you're ready to put up the tree in your home, get the floor ready first. Fur down a monporous material cyinyl sheeting, or something similar, should do), then any fancy pad over it that you wish.

into the stand and immediately pour water into it.

Test whether the tree is stable.

You may have to adjust it several __times. If it still doesn't stand by itself, consider using a light-gauge steel wire to the it to a wall.

Keep_track of the tree's water—constantly, especially in the first five days. A thirsty tree can drink as much as two gallons of water a day during that time.
