Farmworker's condition improves

Tellez has been kept unconscious in the hospital for two weeks. The post-hole digger severed both of his arms at the shoulder and crushed the bones in his left lower leg after his clothes became entangled in a power take-off shaft. His left leg was surgically amputated at the hospital and his right leg is also broken.

High-tech unit will get trial on icy bridges

TWIN FALLS—The Idaho Transportation Department wants to install ice-monitoring devices at the Snake River bridges following the Dec. 6 death of a woman whose car slid and crashed on the icy Hansen bridge.
The devices, which are used on interstate highway bridges in the Boise and Coeur d'Alene areas, monitor temperature and moisture levels in the air and on road surfaces, and alert highway workers when ice might be forming, according to a letter to *The Times-News* written by district highway engineer Larry Vanover.

As temperatures hovered near freezing one morning earlier this month, a state sand truck visited both Snake River bridges, but officials have reported that the driver did not leave any sand because ice hadn't formed on the wet bridges.
Within 90 minutes of the sand truck's visit, both bridges were glazed over. Vickie McClumonds, a 40-year-old Twin Falls mother who was commuting to Idaho State University in Pocatello, died in a head-on collision on the Hansen Bridge after her car slid out of control. At about the same time, five accidents on the icy Perrine Bridge snarled rush hour traffic into Twin Falls.

Vanover's letter said the state employee who decided not to sand the Hansen bridge before the fatal crash "used his best judgement based on years of experience."
Earlier, Vanover had said the department couldn't afford the sand and overtime it would take to sand all wet bridges in case they froze.
Tuesday, he wrote that "while every resource needs to be used reasonably, the safety of Idaho's motorists takes precedent over budget considerations. If more sand is required than budgeted or man hours needed to keep Idaho's roads safe, the transportation department has and will find the money in other budget areas to meet that need," he wrote.

Installation of the ice monitors will be proposed to the Idaho Transportation Board, Vanover wrote. They would be installed in other parts of the Magic Valley besides the bridges, he wrote.

Suspects in Reno bomb attempt held

RENO, Nev.—Two men were arrested on charges they planned a powerful bomb that fizzled outside an IRS building in Reno earlier this month.
Federal agents gave no motive for the attack in announcing the arrest of Ellis-Edward Hurst, 52, and Joseph Martin Enlie, 40, who work for Gardnerville.
Hurst was arrested late Wednesday and Enlie early Thursday, both in the Gardnerville area, 50 miles south of Reno. They appeared before a U.S. magistrate Thursday to be formally charged with attempted destruction of a government building and use of a destructive device. No bail was set. They each face up to 30 years in prison if convicted on both charges.
The bomb, contained in a 30-gallon plastic drum wired to a dolly, was found Dec. 18 in a parking lot by an IRS employee arriving for work early in the morning. About 60 government workers were evacuated from the building.
The fuse to the bomb had been lit, but it went out. Federal investigators have refused to confirm reports it was packed with ammonium nitrate and fuel oil, the same ingredients used in the April-19 Oklahoma City bombing.

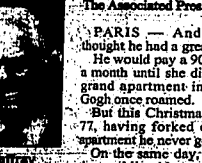

NEW YORK — Stocks ended mixed on Thursday, as computer-related shares dropped after a semiconductor maker warned of disappointing earnings.

The Dow Jones industrial average ended down 10.12 at 5,025.80.

Despite the loss in the blue-chip index, advancing issues had a slight 8.7 lead on decliners on the New York Stock Exchange. Volume exceeded Wednesday's pace but remained light at 288.48 million shares as of 4 p.m.

Broad market indexes were mostly lower, pressured by computer shares. The NYSE's composite index rose 0.22 to 328.35. But the Standard & Poor's 500 stock index fell 0.41 to 614.12. The Nasdaq composite index fell .591 to 1,042.22, and the American Stock Exchange's market value index fell 0.18 to 544.52.

Despite West One merger, community banking thrives

BOISE — The loss of Boise-based West One Bancorp does not spell the end of home-grown banking for Idaho.

In the wake of acquisitions and mergers like the one that closed Wednesday between West One Bancorp and U.S. Bancorp, a new crop of small, independent bankers is sizing up the market.

The fact West One is now a part of the largest commercial bank-holding company based in Portland opens up the Boise market to new players, experts say.

"It's a natural phenomenon of creating these big conglomerates with their headquarters 500 miles away," said James Bellessa, analyst with D.A. Davidson & Co., an investment research firm in Great Falls, Mont.

The public perceives them as impersonal. The local banker feels that he can provide loans, services, shake people's hands, look them in the eye and attract enough business to become profitable," Bellessa said.

U.S. Bancorp will operate West One state banks as separate subsidiaries until they are converted to U.S. Bank operations by the third quarter of 1996.

About 1,100 jobs are expected to be eliminated by midyear, including 500 in Boise.

Those interested in creating new banks say they want to capitalize on a perceived lack of service and flexibility at larger companies. Seven groups have applied for bank charters in Idaho, the state Department of Finance reports. There has been interest in opening several new banks in Boise, Twin Falls and Pocatello, senior bank examiner Kelly Robison said.

"Prior to all this interest, we chartered one bank in the '90s," Robison said.

"We've got more interest now than in all my 17 years with the department."

In the past decade, the state banks have shrunk from 22 to 15.

Nationally, the number of new banks is at a 15-year high, the American Bankers Association says. About 70 new banks have received charters this year.

Like the retail industry, the new banks believe they can survive through niche marketing or so-called banking theater.

A bank, for example, might cater specifically to wheat farmers or car dealerships, Bellessa said.

Micon says firm not financially troubled despite slowdown in Utah

LEHI, Utah — Micon officials say a slowdown of work at their new computer-chip manufacturing plant under construction in northeastern Utah does not mean the company is in hard financial times.

"We still plan to have the project completed in three to five years and hire between 3,000 and 5,000 people during that same time period," spokesman Kipp Bedard said.

He said the company is simply cutting back to a normal construction schedule because the project is so far ahead of schedule due to warm weather and dedicated contractors. Company officials no longer feel the need to pay premium labor prices.

"We're now at the point where we can step back and decide how we're going to finish spending this \$2.5 billion," Bedard said.

Jewish settlers resigned to reality

As Israeli troops leave West Bank, some choose to stay under Palestinian rule

PSAGOT, West Bank (AP) — For Jewish settlers in this remote outpost, the presence of armed Palestinians in the newly autonomous neighboring town of Ramallah is a nightmare come true.

But here, as in most other West Bank settlements, Israelis are coming to terms with the new reality and have chosen for now to go along with it rather than fight back.

"I am worried because I think terrorists will come back under the name of Palestinian police," said Aaron Gutman, shortly after Israeli troops pulled out of Ramallah on Wednesday and ceded control of the area to Palestinian police.

He noted that the nearest Arab house — now in autonomous territory — is only 200 yards from the hilltop Jewish settlement that houses 170 families.

About 1,200 Palestinian police will eventually be deployed in Ramallah, a town of 30,000 residents eight miles north of Jerusalem.

The Ramallah pullout completed a seven-week process in which Israel turned over six West Bank towns and more than 400 villages, giving PLO chief Yasser Arafat control of more than one-third of the West Bank and nearly all its 1 million Palestinian residents. The West Bank has 140,000 Jewish settlers.

The Gaza Strip and Jericho were turned over to the Palestinians in May 1994.

The West Bank withdrawals have been surprisingly smooth. Arafat's Islamic fundamentalist opposition, Hamas, which has bedeviled the peace process with a series of attacks on Israelis, has been mostly silent since an August bus bombing in Jerusalem.

Last summer, Jewish settlers and their right-wing allies tried to galvanize Israeli public opinion with protests ranging from confronting the army on West Bank hilltops to blocking Israel's highways.

But they appear far more timid since Yitzhak Rabin was killed Nov. 4 by a

Jewish extremist intent on stopping the peace process. Many Israelis blame right-wing rhetoric — Rabin was vilified by them as a traitor — for fostering a climate ripe for assassination.

"We have made a decision not to be vocally opposed to the decision of the government to implement (Palestinian autonomy)," said Yehuda Pinsky, a settler-leader from Beit-El, near Ramallah.

"It definitely has to do with the assassination of Rabin," added Pinsky. "The atmosphere in Israel at the present time is one in which we are expected to cooperate with the government."

Two-thirds of the West Bank —

including the 128 Jewish settlements, military bases and unpopulated lands — remain under Israeli control for now. But Israel-PLO peace agreements call for further troop pullbacks in the next two years.

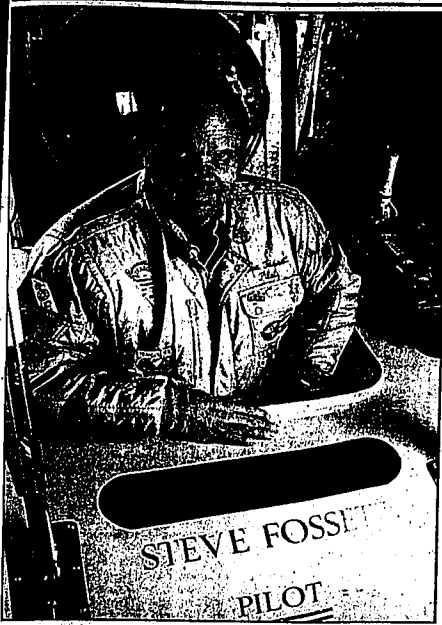
The existing agreements allow Jewish settlements in the West Bank and Gaza Strip to remain during five years of Palestinian self-rule ending in May 1999. Their future will be addressed in May during talks on a final Israeli-Palestinian peace accord.

Jewish settler leaders living near Ramallah said Wednesday they were worried about their safety despite bypass roads paved by Israel for set-

tlers to avoid Palestinian-run areas. Yehudit Shalom, an artist, wants financial help from the government so she can move to a new home in Israel. Others saw no problem.

"There will be no direct friction between Arabs and Jews," said Louis Greenbaum, a 40-year-old lawyer originally from Detroit.

Pinchas Wallerstein, who lives in Beit El, said it took his children four times as long to get to their Jerusalem school via the bypass road. But for the first time, they were driven in an armored bus with metal grates covering the front windshield for protection against stone-throwing.

Balloonists race around world

CHICAGO (AP) — They ride the wind miles above Earth, chasing fame and world records through thin air and arctic cold where a mistake or sudden storm could mean disaster.

And this winter, they're going for the biggest prize of all — American, British and Dutch teams are matching money and nerve in a competition to become the first to circle the globe in a balloon.

"This is the greatest unachieved goal in aviation," declares 51-year-old millionaire adventure Steve Fossett, who set the world distance mark of 5,435 miles this year when he flew a balloon across the Pacific.

This time, Fossett and his yellow Solo Challenger capsule face competition from a pair of well-financed three-man teams, reminiscent of the Hilton-backed Earthwinds effort that failed several times in recent years.

Richard Branson, the London-based founder of Virgin Airlines, plans a flight dubbed Global Challenger with Swedish, Balloon 'N' designer Per Lindstrand and Irish balloonist and skydiver Rory McCarthy.

Henk Brink, a 51-year-old Dutch pilot, will ride the jet streams with businessman Wouter Bakker and Dutch Air Force Col. Willem Hogenroth.

Fossett won't say how much he's spending, but Alan Noble of Cameron Balloons, a balloon designer, estimates \$250,000. Brink expects to spend \$4 million to \$5 million with help from corporate sponsors. Branson's expedition is expected to be even more expensive, but he's not releasing figures.

All three teams plan to launch within six to eight weeks, maybe sooner, depending on the weather. The three balloons won't necessarily be in the air at the same time.

Afex Sir Edmund Hillary climbed Mount Everest, journalists asked him why he did it, and he said, "Because the mountain is there." I have the same philosophy," Brink says.

Balloonists dreamed of circling the globe even before Jules Verne's "Around the World in Eighty Days" appeared in 1873. But neither hot air balloons nor gas balloons would go very far.

Frenchman Pilatre de Rozier, who made the first manned flight in 1783, tried to mix the hot air and gas varieties. He blew himself to bits while heating a hydrogen balloon as he tried to fly the English Channel.

Designer Don Cameron in the 1970s came up with a practical version of Rozier's idea. His design, which he named the Rozier balloon, uses propane burners to heat an air cell that occupies the lower portion of the balloon.

The heated air cell warms the gas in an adjacent helium cell that occupies the balloon's upper portion. The burners are generally needed only after sundown when the frigid air would cool

both the air and helium cells and cause a loss of altitude.

Winter is the best time to catch the jet streams, which gust up to 250 mph. But thunderstorms, which can tower up to 45,000 feet, can tear into the synthetic fabric of the balloons and their foil-like Mylar insulation blankets.

Branson and Brink may be able to fly over storms in their pressurized capsules, suspended from a far smaller balloon, reaches only 30,000 feet.

The nonstop trip is likely to take as much as three weeks, and weather is unpredictable that far ahead. "Ten-day forecasts are largely fiction," chortles Alan Noble of Cameron Balloons in Bristol, England.

Fossett has signed up a meteorologist from Omaha, Neb. When the weatherman says conditions are right, Fossett plans to lift off from the Stratobowl, an immense hollow near Rapid City, S.D.

His ground team will hold twice daily video conferences, involving Omaha, Bristol and Loyola University in Chicago, where project manager Timothy "Bo" Kemper is an assistant vice president.

Fossett will be e-mailed, via a computer-satellite link, a weather briefing as well as a political update — a racing balloon was shot down over Belarus in Eastern Europe early this year, killing the pilot.

The public can get updates through a site on the World Wide Web (<http://www.luo.edu/olo>).

The three-way competition could decide whether the high-tech approach of Branson and Brink is superior to Fossett's simpler way.

While Branson and Brink may find it easier to dodge thunderheads, crews squeezed into tiny, high-tech capsules have found it hard to sleep. High-tech systems can be noisy and crewmen report being kept awake with worry over how their comrades will make life-and-death decisions.

Fossett will have to contend with tougher weather problems. But the soft-spoken adventurer has proved he is tough. When his heater failed over Japan on his Pacific crossing, he spent three days huddled in his capsule in subzero weather.

"It wasn't so bad," he says. "There wasn't any wind in the capsule. And I had very warm clothing, the same clothing I wore when I was in the Iditarod dog sled race in Alaska."

The 1,168-mile, dogged race is a grueling test of toughness. Fossett has also roamed the oceans as a solo sailor, driven France's L'Espresso auto race and climbed mountains from Kilimanjaro in Kenya to the Vinson-Massif in Antarctica.

"The thing about Steve Fossett is that he has such experience," Noble says appreciatively. "He's a real modern-day adventurer."

Serbs, fearing plan for Sarajevo, leave city

VOGOSCA, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — At 49 Igmanski Mars St., two Serb neighbors sobbed Thursday as they watched their husbands load up the truck with a family's treasures: a freezer, a water heater, two beat-up sofas and sacks of potatoes.

"We don't know where we're going, but we're going," said one of the men, as he heaved a rolled, musty carpet into the covered truck. "We can't stay here. Who can guarantee the safety of my kids?"

Hundreds, maybe thousands, of Sarajevo Serbs are packing up to leave before the Bosnian capital is reunited under Bosnia's peace plan and handed over to Muslim-Croat rule. Estimates of the number of Serbs in those areas of Sarajevo range from 70,000 to as high as 150,000.

Their leaders predict there will be a mass exodus of tens of thousands if the plan is not altered in their favor.

There are no firm figures on how many will leave, but individual Serbs indicate they expect at least 75 percent to go. Most of those who stay will be widows and the elderly, while many men feel they must leave or face charges as war criminals.

Adm. Leighton Smith, commander of the NATO force policing the peace deal, says his 60,000 soldiers will protect all Bosnians — Muslims, Serbs and Croats — and has urged the Serbs to stay put.

"My great hope is we can convince the people of Sarajevo — all of the people of Sarajevo — that our purpose is peace," Smith told Associated Press Television on Wednesday. "There's no reason for them (Serbs) to leave. I hope ... they'll stay right where they are."

But the Serbs are reluctant to leave him and have asked for an extension of the deadline to hand over the areas.

After 44 months of brutal war that in the end saw NATO air power used

against Serb forces. Serbs fear the alliance will not shield them from retribution at the hands of their Muslim and Croat foes.

"NATO can't protect us," said the man loading the carpet into the truck on Igmanski Mars St. "They'll hold the front lines, but the Muslims will slip through, cut our throats and then leave. We'll leave. We'll set up tents under the trees. We'll arrange our sofas in the open air. We'll sleep in the snow," he said.

Another neighbor, dressed in combat fatigues and peering through cracked spectacles as he helped heave a sofa out of the house, said he would not trust NATO. "Last month they were bombing us. Why should they now protect us?" he asked.

Both men and their wives insisted they could not give their names — another sign of the fear they feel now that the life they have known for 3 1/2 years is coming to an end.

The two women stood by and wept, explaining this was the second time they were fleeing since war erupted in April 1992. As fighting flared, they made their way from the Sarajevo suburb of Pofalici over Mount Zuc to Serb-held Vogosca. The lucky ones brought belongings by road and set up housekeeping in derelict Muslim homes at No. 49.

All the neighbors also declined to give their names, saying they might be branded as war criminals if identified in the media.

U.S. colonel raises ruckus with comments

TUZLA, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — The American commander of NATO forces in northeastern Bosnia said he was "very disappointed" to read a report that a U.S. colonel accused Croats of being racists who "kill people for the color of their skins."

The Wall Street Journal reported the comments Wednesday in a story describing the movement of U.S. troops into Serb territory in Bosnia.

While briefing troops before a planned reconnaissance in northern Bosnia, Army Col. Gregory Fontenot reportedly turned to two black soldiers in his brigade and said: "It'll be interesting to hear what you two see, because the Croats are racist ... They kill people for the color of their skins."

The story was written from Orasje, a pocket of land in northern Bosnia held by Bosnian Croats but cut off from the rest of Bosnia by the Serb-held Posavina Corridor. Fontenot is to command U.S. combat troops in the corridor.

The Journal also quoted Fontenot as questioning whether a year would be enough to make a real difference in Bosnia and saying: "They think I don't trust them

and they're right," the Journal quoted him as saying of the local factions. "These are people who kill women and children and attack their neighbors. They're offended by me? Hell, I'm offended that I had to come here because of all their fighting."

When asked to comment on the report, Maj. Gen. William L. Nash, the American commander of NATO forces in northeastern Bosnia, told a press briefing in Tuzla on Wednesday:

"I'm very disappointed in what I heard and I'm looking into it. Nash had no further comment Thursday."

The New York Times quoted a senior Clinton administration official as saying that the reported statements "were very serious remarks of serious concern. Clearly if they are accurately reported, they represent bad judgment, extremely bad judgment."

The Journal story described how Fontenot, a highly regarded combat veteran who commands the 1st Brigade of the 1st Armored Division, was reading his troops for a possibly hostile environment. Fontenot's troops will eventually occupy the U.S. sector from the Save River south to Tuzla.

Most Serbs around Sarajevo are taking their belongings to other Serb-held areas and returning to their bare homes to see how the Muslim-Croat

takeover of the city plays out. The family leaving Thursday said they had no fixed destination but were leaving for good.

Defense official will visit troops in Bosnia

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary William Perry leaves New Year's Day for a whirlwind tour of military operations in the Balkans, including the main U.S. Army base in Tuzla and NATO headquarters in Sarajevo.

The Pentagon released details Thursday of Perry's trip, which he had announced without elaboration last week.

Perry will be the first high-level U.S. official to visit the area since the deployment of 20,000 American troops began on Dec. 16. President Clinton has said he is eager to visit the troops, too, but Perry advised him to wait until at least late January in order to avoid disrupting the already slow deployment.

Perry is to leave Washington on New Year's Day and stop first at Aviano, Italy, the major base from which U.S. and NATO aircraft are enforcing a no-fly zone over Bosnia. He also will stop at Vicenza, Italy, home of U.S. Army paratroopers, a contingent of which was the first U.S. combat force to arrive in Bosnia.

Gen. John Shalikshvili, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, is to accompany Perry.

The two are to travel to southern Hungary on Jan. 2 to see U.S. troops operating an airfield at Tazsar, and then to nearby Kaposvar, a forward



staging area for U.S. ground troops heading to Bosnia from bases in Germany.

On Jan. 3, Perry and Shalikshvili will travel to Sarajevo and Tuzla, U.S. Army Adm.

Leighton Smith, the commander of NATO forces in Bosnia, is based at Sarajevo. Tuzla is the hub of U.S. peace enforcement activities in northern Bosnia.

While in Sarajevo, Perry is to meet with Bosnian government officials.

On Jan. 4, Perry is to fly to Kiev, Ukraine, for discussions with government officials as well as a special three-way meeting with the Ukrainian and Russian defense ministers.

Perry and his Ukrainian and Russian counterparts are to participate in the blowing up of an intercontinental ballistic missile silo at Pervomaysk, Ukraine. The destruction is in accordance with the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty.

Perry is to fly to Muscat, Oman, on the Persian Gulf, on Jan. 5 for meetings with government officials.

Officer cleared of charges

RUPERT — Cpl. Tim Dudley of the Minidoka County Sheriff's Office is back on patrol after being cleared of any charges following a November shooting.

Dudley was placed on administrative leave shortly after he shot Glen Dory Roberts, 27, in the hand after the man tried to run him over with his car.

Following an external investigation conducted by the Criminal Investigation Bureau of the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, Minidoka County prosecutors declined to press charges against Dudley.

"Looking at the whole situation, it appeared Cpl. Dudley acted reasonably under the circumstances," deputy prosecutor Clayne Zollinger said.

According to police reports filed after the incident, Dudley was responding to a high speed pursuit involving Roberts and Cassia County deputies.

Dudley blocked off a narrow bridge with his car as the chase turned into Minidoka County. Roberts slowed, then rammed Dudley's car in an apparent attempt to break through the road block.

Dudley fired one shot from his 9-mm handgun. The bullet penetrated the windshield of the car Roberts was driving and hit him in the hand moments before the cars collided.

Roberts fled the scene but was later tracked down by a police dog.

He was booked on charges of driving while his license was suspended, driving under the influence and eluding an officer by Cassia County deputies.

Minidoka County is pursuing one charge of aggravated assault on a police officer, Zollinger said, a felony punishable by up to 20 years in prison.

The shooting was the first involving an officer in Sheriff Paul Fries' tenure, the sheriff said.

In an earlier interview, Fries said he supported Dudley's use of force. Dudley was placed on paid administrative leave for two days following the shooting.

Man shot, killed following robbery

LEWISTON (AP) — Two men sought after a bank robbery Thursday led officers on a chase that ended when one man was shot and killed, police said.

The second man, who was not injured, but was booked into the Idaho County Jail, Lewiston police Lt. Tom Lee said.

One man armed with a shotgun and another carrying a semiautomatic handgun held up First Federal Savings and Loan on Thursday afternoon and made off with an undisclosed amount of cash, Lee said.

A patrol officer spotted a car matching the description of the robbers' vehicle and gave chase, Lee said. The car pulled

over at one point but then took off at high speed as officers approached on foot.

The car led officers from the Lewiston Police Department, the Nez Perce County Sheriff's Department and the Idaho State Patrol on a chase on U.S. 95 that ended in the Idaho County town of Ferdinand, about 40 miles southeast of Lewiston, Lee said.

The car pulled over and one of the two men fired a shot at officers, Lee said. One of the officers returned fire, killing the man.

No one else was injured. Lee refused to identify the officer who fired the fatal shot. The dead man was not immediately identified.

Snowmobile operators angry over Yellowstone shutdown

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — What was supposed to be a peak business time has turned into economic disaster for snowmobile operators, lodges and others who depend on winter travel to Yellowstone National Park.

Bob Coe, owner of Pahaska Teepee Resort west of Cody, joined others in his bitterness and frustration over the federal government's failure to accept a state offer to fund park operations during the federal shutdown.

Coe accused the Clinton administration of refusing to negotiate a way to keep the park open in a deliberate attempt to hurt businesses like his.

"They have a hidden motive, to weaken or destroy winter business in Yellowstone," Coe said. "My own government is targeting me."

Coe said business is down 85 percent and he has had to take out a bank loan to keep

open. Some snowmobile enthusiasts instead turned to cross-country skiing in the national forest areas outside the park, he said.

Al Elvena, president of the Jackson Hole Snowmobile Outfitter and Guides Association, echoed Coe's comments about the desire of the federal government to curb winter business in Yellowstone.

"We have to blame Clinton. He's the only one that can allow us to reopen," he said. "He makes the final decision."

Elvena noted that the winter snowmobiling season already had been cut from 105 days to 80.

"They believe the park is overused, but we totally disagree," he said.

Elvena said his own business, National Park Adventure outfitters in Jackson, lost half of its booking. He said he caters to foreign tourists interested in seeing Yellowstone in winter and who do not want a substitute snowmobile expedition.

Police round up teen-age 'Latino gang' members after shooting

CALDWELL (AP) — Five teen-aged boys told police they opened fire on four Caldwell houses because they had nothing better to do.
'They were just out driving around and started shooting out windows,' Police Lt. Allan Laird said.
'Basically, they all wanted something to do.'
Police believe the Meridian and Nampa teen-agers randomly picked houses. People were home in all four, but no one was injured.
Two of the four families say it was not the first time they were targeted in drive-by shootings.
About five hours after the shooting spree began, police arrested four teen-agers from Nampa and one from Meridian.
The five, ages 14 to 17, were arrested while riding in a car owned by one boy's parents.
Authorities would not release the suspects' names because they are juveniles. They will not be charged as adults.
'We did not, nor do we intend to, charge anyone for attempted murder as we have in the past with drive-by shootings,' Laird said.
'There was no intent (to kill) that we could prove.'
The two suspected shooters, ages 17 and 16, were being held in juvenile detention, while the other three were released to their parents, Laird said.
A .22-caliber handgun, thought to be used in the shootings, was recovered.
'They admitted they were in a gang: The Latino Crips,' Laird said.
'But none of them are Hispanic. They are white.'
Laird said four of the suspects are Vallivue High School students and a fifth has not been attending school.
Estrella Rodriguez's home was hit by one bullet while three of her sons were home. Their house was riddled with bullets in another drive-by shooting about two months ago.
A shot hit Teresa Barrietta's front window pane, about one foot from where the mother of four was sitting. Last summer, several gunmen sprayed bullets at her home, she said.
Brad Anselmo's 17-year-old son and Anselmo's infant granddaughter were home when a bullet sliced through a front window at eye-level.
Pete Stadther's home was the last target. A bullet shattered two windows in Stadther's van before piercing a window screen in his sons' bedroom. His teen-aged sons, 15-year-old Michael and 16-year-old Alan, were not in their room at the time.
Both Stadther boys also attend Vallivue High School. They describe the Latino Crips as "wannabe gangsters" who are white teen-agers pretending to be in a Hispanic gang.

Walt Snyder and Claude Spinoza were researching the Permian geologic period, when coal-bearing plants first appeared. Vladimir, a paleontologist led them on a field trip. Dina served as a translator.
Davydov is one of the few experts in the world when it comes to fusulinids: amoeba-like organisms the size of rice grains, important in dating the Permian period.
'The three scientists hatched a successful plan to win a grant to support their research.
They are now evaluating their data in the Permian Research Institute, a collection of offices in

the Boise State geosciences building.
The three developed a boundary that distinguishes the Permian from the earlier Carboniferous period — at 270 million to 280 million years ago.
It is important for petroleum geologists, because it will help them know how far down to drill for oil in Carboniferous rock.
The trio plans to present their findings at an International Union of Geology meeting in Beijing next August.
'The people here are very kind, very helpful,' Vladimir said. 'In Russia, many people are very nervous, very stressed, because life is very hard.'
'Davydov hopes to continue research in Boise for two more years.
He admits to homesickness, and the couple misses daughter Inna, 21, a medical student in St. Petersburg.

Association praises ruling

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The Intermountain Forest Industry Association is heralding a Montana judge's decision to allow salvage logging of fire-damaged trees in the Kootenai National Forest.
Scott Diamond, the association's wildlife biologist, said it was the third salvage logging decision in favor of timber harvest since the new salvage timber law took effect last year.
'This is a perfect example of how strong grizzly bear protection and salvage logging can work together,' Diamond said.
'There is no question that the judge felt the Kootenai Forest did its homework on the grizzly.'
Environmentalists say they probably will appeal.
The Forest Service plans to sell 150 million board feet of timber that was damaged in northwestern Montana during the summer of 1994.

'Nation's worst zoo' offers a last time to Walk In the Wild

SPOKANE (AP) — The Walk In the Wild zoo, long considered one of the nation's worst, will close its doors for good Saturday.
Many of its animals will be relocated next summer to a new zoo planned at the Silverwood Theme Park north of Coeur d'Alene.
In 1989, Parade Magazine listed Walk in the Wild one of the nation's 10 worst zoos. In 1992, elk and a bear escaped, intruders stole snakes and a monkey, and construction crews broke a natural gas line.
The paper company recently gave a \$100,000 donation to the zoo so it could pay off all its debts by the end of the year. The debts piled up because Walk in the Wild was not making enough money to feed animals and pay staff.
Already, the zoo's reptiles have been given away. But the bears, cats, elk and other large animals will remain in the Spokane Valley location, under the care of a few staffers.
Groundbreaking for the Cedar Mountain Zoo near Athol, Idaho, is scheduled next June, with a projected opening in the spring of 1997, said Frances Drake, director of the zoological society.
But first the society must raise \$2 million for the first phase of construction.
Officials hope to avoid the disasters of the past, when animals often escaped or were injured.
Hebner recalled looking out his office window one day and noticing that a 2,000-pound bison named Buff had escaped his pen.
'There is this child who is probably 18 months, maybe two years, nuzzling it on the nose,' Hebner said. 'Buff walked away and the little kid walked away, and I screamed at the keepers.'

The end came when the Inland Empire Paper Co. decided it no longer wanted to be the zoo's landlord. The paper company had given the zoological society free use of 80 acres of land along the Spokane River for the past 23 years.
The paper company recently gave a \$100,000 donation to the zoo so it could pay off all its debts by the end of the year. The debts piled up because Walk in the Wild was not making enough money to feed animals and pay staff.

Mother, child killed in crossing collision

POCATELLO (AP) — A mother and child were killed at a Pocatello railroad crossing Thursday when the vehicle while on train passed, then pulled her car into the path of a second train coming from the opposite direction.
Police said the car was struck broadside and the mother and one child died. Another boy survived.
Trevor Bybee, 10, was listed in serious but stable condition at Bannock Regional Medical Center.
Bannock County Coroner Jim Allen said the victims were Julie Ann Bybee, 42, and her son Tyler, 5. She was the wife of Pocatello dentist Dr. Larry Bybee.

The accident occurred about 11:30 a.m. at a railroad crossing at the east end of the Union Pacific Railroad yard in Pocatello. The crossing is known as the Cheyenne Avenue crossing and has flashing red lights but no barrier.
Lloyd Martin, who was a few cars back waiting at the crossing, said, 'It's just a signal. That's the worst crossing in the county. They should put an overpass over that.
'Oh, God, it was terrible. It smashed it terribly,' he said.
Witnesses said the car was struck broadside and carried about 60 feet along the tracks. A man with a cellu-

lar phone reported the crash.
Another witness, Brigham Hopkins, who lives nearby, was eating when he looked out the window and saw the car hit by the train. 'She did a 360-degree turn,' he said.
The car was nearly folded in half and came to a stop just a few feet from the Portneuf River. The crossing was closed temporarily.
The train's crew was devastated by the collision, said Chris Arvas, Operation Lifesaver Coordinator for Union Pacific.
'There are other victims besides those in the car,' Arvas said, referring to the crew. 'This is very, very sad.'

Aggies' kicker, defense wreck Michigan hopes in Alamo Bowl

SAN ANTONIO — Kyle Bryant kicked five field goals and Texas A&M's "Wrecking Crew" defense was stifling Thursday night, sending the No. 19 Aggies to a 22-20 victory over No. 14 Michigan in the Alamo Bowl.

Playing without injured star running back Leland McElroy, A&M (9-3) generated enough offense behind a trio of freshmen running backs to set up Bryant and then relied on its blitzing defense to protect its lead.

Michigan (9-4) had a three-game winning streak in bowl games snapped, while A&M coach R.C. Slocum improved his bowl record to 2-4 and ended a three-game losing skid in the postseason.

Bryant kicked field goals of 27, 49, 47, 31 and 37 yards. A&M also scored on a 9-yard run by Eric Bernard in the first quarter.

Bernard, who finished with 50 yards on 15 carries, combined with Sirr Parker (21 carries for 56 yards) and D'Andre Hardeman (six carries for 41 yards) to help power the offense as quarterback Corey Pullig finished 12-of-22 passing for 136 yards without an interception.

A&M repeatedly sent blitzers crashing into Michigan's backfield, containing running back Tim Blakabutuka and frustrating Griese, who opened the second half 1-of-10 passing, including nine straight incompletions.

Facing second-and-7 at the Michigan 25 late in the third quarter, Griese was twice sacked-on-blitzes, forcing the Wolverines into a fourth-and-30 from their own 2.

After Michigan's punt from the end zone, A&M took over at the Wolverines' 34 and four plays later went up 16-10 on a 47-yard field goal by Bryant with 5:34 left in the third quarter.

Ex-Cowboy weathers emotional return

DALLAS — Charlie Waters came home this week.

Back to Dallas, where he'd been one of the most popular players on some of the greatest Cowboy teams. Back to Texas, where he'd buried his oldest son just a few weeks ago.

The emotions came on in a flood as Waters, Oregon's defensive coordinator, flew into town with the rest of the Ducks' coaching staff. "Just landing at Love Field, just

flying over the city," he said. "Cody wanted so dearly to come to the Cotton Bowl. He was going to go to school at the University of Texas. He was born here. He loved it here. He was Texas through and through."

Cody Waters died in his sleep Dec. 3 at the family's home in Eugene, just 13 days short of his 18th birthday. An autopsy failed to reveal the cause of

death. "It's a medical mystery," Lane County deputy medical examiner Frank Ratti said.

By everyone's account, Cody was as perfect as a son could get. Tall, strong, ruggedly handsome like his father, he was an all-league selection in soccer and as a punter and kicker in football at Marist High School.

Sun Bowl to feature shifty defense vs. balanced offense

EL PASO, Texas — How can the Washington Huskies' defense beat you?

Let Iowa-coach Hayden Fry, coach the ways.

"They caused the offense to jump offides 22 times — we counted them up in the film this year — with their shifting, moving defense," Fry said. "The offense gets real antsy, so we've worked real hard on retaining our poise."

The slippery D. is something Fry frankly

admits concerned him as he prepared to bring his team, which struggled to finish at 7-4, into a Sun Bowl showdown Friday with No. 20 Washington (7-3-1), the Pac-10 co-champion.

"The Washington defense comes in allowing an average of 147 yards rushing and 235 yards passing," Fry repeatedly said the real problem is keeping up with the different looks the Huskies give a quarterback.

"It's a very, very difficult preparation for

our offense," he said.

To hear Washington's Jim Lambright tell it, Iowa's offense — which averages 191 yards rushing and 225 yards passing — doesn't make anything easy on its opponents, either. "We love to play teams where we can zero in (on one aspect)... We can't do that here," Lambright said.

Both coaches said the way the two units match up will be a key to the game, the Huskies' first bowl since completing a two-year probation.

It will be the third time the two have met in the postseason. Washington won the first

two bowl showdowns, blanking the Hawkeyes 28-0 in the 1982 Rose Bowl and beating them 46-34 in the 1991 Rose Bowl.

The defensive duel became a particular focus when Lambright announced that two of his stars, All-America free safety Lawyer Milloy and defensive tackle David Richie, will sit out because of injuries.

The loss of Milloy, the team's leading tackler and Richie, led Lambright to facetiously suggest that Fry should pound the ball up the middle since there would be a tunnel there.

Party seekers hit Jackpot

It may be a quiet Sunday except for south of border

JACKPOT — Much of the Magic Valley will ring in the new year Sunday night like an abstemious monk.

But not in Jackpot. "It's our biggest weekend of the year," said Kathleen Boyd, publicist for Cactus Petes Resort Casino. "We'll be running buses from Twin Falls; and we'll also have buses to two or three hotels in Twin, that we're using for overflow."

The population of the town goes from 1,000 to 3,000 or 4,000 on this weekend, said Marcus Prater, marketing communications manager for Ameristar-Casinos, which runs Jackpot's largest casino.

Across the state line, Idaho's seldom-on-Sunday liquor laws, combined with non-sensate drunken driving enforcement and the decline of two-fisted boozing in general, figure to transform this New Year's Eve into the quietest in recent memory.

"We're not going to open the bar," said Randy Dill, general manager of the Canyon Springs Inn in Twin Falls. "We don't normally do that on a Sunday night anyway, and this won't be an exception."

Diamondfield Jack's, the restaurant at the Canyon Springs Inn, will serve beer and wine to diners.

"New Year's Eve used to be called 'innate night,'" Dill said. "The food business is bigger now."

But south of the border, New Year's Eve reveling is an institution.

"We invite our regular customers down this weekend, and many of them come every year," Prater said. "There's something about New Year's Eve in a casino and a champagne toast at midnight."

As of Thursday afternoon, Cactus Petes had sold enough tickets to fill four buses from Twin Falls and five from Boise, with 45 passengers per bus. Prater said Ameristar would add more buses as needed; selling tickets at the company's Twin Falls office today and Saturday and on Sunday until 8 p.m. "The fact that you can't buy a drink of hard liquor on Sunday in much of southern Idaho has something to do with it, he said.

"I'm sure being able to enjoy your favorite beverage is part of the appeal."

And it's not lost on many celebrants that the Idaho State Police will be out in force Sunday night.

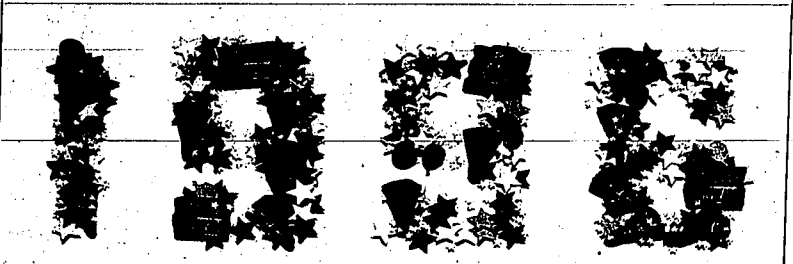

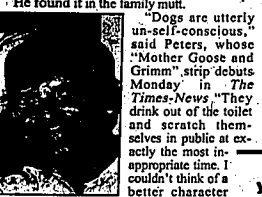

Freeze on Skis takes plunge Monday

TWIN FALLS — At last: a Freeze on Skis worthy of its longhorns. The forecast temperature for New Year's Day is the high 20s, a marked contrast with the last two occasions when the Magic Valley Jaycees held their annual cold-weather, colder-water skiing marathon.

Two years ago it rained; last New Year's Day, it was 38 degrees. It hasn't been since 1991, when the temperature was in the teens and the wind in the 20s, that it was actually too cold to go into the water.

No matter. Come blizzard or 50 degrees, three dozen intrepid water-skiers and kneeboarders will be dockside at Shoshone Falls in the Snake River Canyon at noon Monday for the ninth renewal of the event.

It's raised \$42,000 for various good causes since the Jaycees organized the Freeze in 1986. This year the money will go to Camp Rainbow Gold, an Idaho summer camp for kids with cancer, and to the West End Search and Rescue.

The participants sign up sponsors, who pledge various amounts. Pinetree Sports of Burley supplies the boats and the wet-and-dry suits.

The public is invited to watch, and there will be vendors selling coffee and other hot drinks. But stay out of the hot tub. That's for the skiers.

Joe Ely, master showman, reflects

Songwriter's latest release contains mostly reflective songs

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — When it comes to empty, Joe Ely said, no one does it better than his native West Texas.

His sometime collaborator Burch Hancock estimated that you can see 50 miles in any direction on those brown plains. Stand on a mesa top, Hancock said, and you can see for 100 miles.

It is odd, then, that this immense nothingness inspires Ely so.

"For some reason, the emptiness of it just gives me ideas," he said. "I guess there is nothing to get in the way. ... You can go for hundreds of miles between cities. There is a kind of majesty about it, like being on an ocean. All you have in-between is a tornado or two or a thunderstorm. Those take on huge importance."

While most songwriters prefer to peek out their compositions on a piano or a guitar, Ely does his best work on the road. He will click on the tape recorder, head but in any direction toward those endless horizons and drum his ideas onto the steering wheel.

"Old pickups work pretty good," he said.

This landscape accounts in part for his latest release, "Letter to Loredo," a series of stories collected somewhere between the badlands and the corner bar. There is a Wild West, South-of-the-Border quality about the album, with evocative runs of the flamenco guitarist Teyo. But Ely allows the present day to intrude on his tales, too.

"I tried to keep the songs in the modern day," he said. "The addition of Teyo to the album sounds like it could have been from 100 years ago. But then you get to

the last verse of "Ranches and Rivers" and you find that the baby, she's asleep in the car seat. I like that."

The question, though, is if Ely's fans will like "Letter to Loredo." Until now, Ely has been admired more for his raucous live performances than his introspective songs, no matter how artfully

they've been done.

The energy and musicianship of the Joe Ely Band was first noticed in a big way in the late 1970s by the Clash, when that band was about the biggest in the world. The two bands toured Europe and the United States together in shows still remembered fondly by Ely.

His band, used to Amarillo

"Where you'd have to worry about getting hit-by-a-beer bottle" found itself playing before huge crowds of the Clash's buzz-cut, boozey fans. "Suddenly we were playing in the biggest cities in the world before complete lunatics, truckloads of them."

"Musically, I have gone a long way since then," he said. "Perfor-

mance-wise, I look at it really as just the other day. ... It kicked our energy level up. By the time we had toured around for a year or so, we had a whole different energy level."

How is Ely reconciling the contemplative strummer of "Letter to Loredo" with the consummate honky-tonk rocker of renown? Simple.

He plays the down-tempo new songs in the first half of his shows these days and returns to the older, faster, harder songs of the past in the second.

Teyo's flamenco guitar dominates the slower half and Jesse Taylor's electric guitar drives the other half. Ely's traditional show-stoppers, such as "Musta Notta Gotta Lotta," "Cook Rinkin' Loretta" and "Roadhog" still rule at the end of an evening in which he also has managed to introduce his audiences to his more lyrically sensitive songs.

It is a dual nature that suggests nothing as much as the turn Bruce Springsteen took starting in the mid-1980s. Probably not coincidentally, Springsteen sings behind Ely on the best two cuts of "Letter to Loredo": "All Just to Get to You" and "I'm a Thousand Miles From Home."

Both songs have that kind of restrained but insistent beat that Springsteen has employed so often since "Born in the U.S.A.," Springsteen first offered to sing backup for Ely when Ely appeared at a Springsteen-sponsored benefit in New York City two years ago. In what Ely said was a particular compliment, Springsteen told him he had been listening to the Joe Ely Band since before its Clash-fueled breakthrough.

"I have always admired his song writing," Ely said. "He is a great rock 'n' roll singer, but it is his songwriting that has impressed me more than anything. He tells a good story. He can use the dynamics of words to leave out the right things and make your imagination fill in the blanks."

Eagles fly high again in '95 tour

The Eagles carried their hot streak into 1995, scoring the most lucrative American concert tour of the year.

Last year, the reunited supergroup wound up in third place on Pollstar magazine's list of top-grossing concert tours. This year, with the Rolling Stones, Pink Floyd, and guitarist Glenn Frey's tummy troubles—all out of the band's way — the Eagles will soar to first place, with total domestic ticket sales of \$63.3 million.

Pollstar, the concert industry's leading trade magazine, will publish its annual lineup of box-office winners next week.

The Eagles' tally is still far short of the record-breaking revenues garnered in 1984 by the Stones and Floyd, whose \$100-million-plus stadium treks headed up the concert industry's all-time biggest year.

1995 was the sort of year when the Grateful Dead — a long-time touring force until Jerry Garcia's August death — could land in fourth place with only 45 shows. Filling out the top five were soulsters Boyz II Men, alterna-rocker R.E.M. and the Jimmy Page-Robert Plant reunion.

With the year's death of stadium extravaganza — and the resulting lower overall revenues — local promoters say they like to look at '95 as a transition time.

"I would call it a down year," said Rick Franks, president of Cellular Door Productions. "Bands that in the previous 12 months were hardly known have become large national headliners — Hootie & the Blowfish, Live, the Cranberries. These are the new hot tickets."

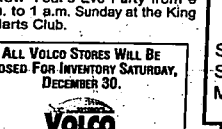

Arts Council committee offers help and inspiration to writers

TWIN FALLS - Three years ago, Bonnie Dodge became a freelance writer. It's a lonely profession, she discovered, so she set out to remedy that.

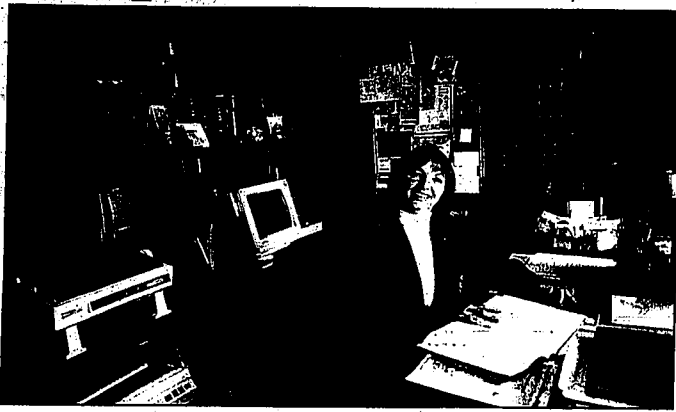
In August, Dodge joined with a handful of other writers to found the Literary Arts Council of the Magic Valley Arts Council. The group received some funding through grants

and already organized several monthly meetings and workshops. This is the group that brought author Clay Morgan to the Twin Falls Public Library in the fall. Dodge is a typical member of the 10-member literary arts committee. When she launched her writing career, she had to do it all alone. She felt the need to network with other writers. She had come a long way by herself.

After graduating from Twin Falls High School, Dodge studied English at the College of Southern Idaho. She decided to go to work in the banking industry. She stayed put for 16 years. She was earning good money, she said, and was looking toward great opportunities for advancement. But she wanted to write.

Dodge is 45 now, with a son in college. Her husband, who works at Latham Motors, has agreed to foot the family bills so his wife can write full-time.

Each day, Dodge writes from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. She has set up a home office, decorated with teddy bears set alongside a computer and answering machine. Two days a week, she heads back to CSI, where she's taking creative writing courses through Idaho State University.

The first year on her new job, Dodge became a published writer—but not a paid one. The second year, she placed second in a tourism writing contest sponsored by the state of Idaho. Then in 1995, Dodge's short story about a girl in the Idaho woods was accepted by Sun Valley magazine.

"It's inspired Dodge to write more, she said. She wants to research the history of

the Featherhollow area, north of Fairfield, where her family has a cabin. And she's working on having her Twin Falls home listed in Idaho's historic register.

"My grandfather came here from North Dakota in 1910 and homesteaded," Dodge said. "I'm really interested in history."

She's also got a novel "sort of brewing," as well as a collection of essays. For the time being, though, she's sharing her new work with the members of the Literary Arts Council, which includes a teacher, a high school student and several individuals who work in the newspaper industry.

Dodge is a member of the Idaho Writers League and is working with

Literary Arts chairman Pat Marcantonio to form a state writers/readers group through the Idaho Commission on the Arts.

The Literary Arts Committee has some big plans on the local level, too. Group members have organized a lending library of books for writers, housed at the Magic Valley Arts Council office. And they are hoping to bring another well-known writer to the Magic Valley soon. Eventually, Dodge is hoping the group can print a directory of writers and publish a newsletter.

"We are not in competition with other writing groups," Dodge explained. "Our purpose is to connect everyone—Idaho writers, romance writers, everyone."

Wiesel's 'Rivers' follows a survivor

"Memory is for us our only hope," Elie Wiesel told the audience at the University of Connecticut in October, at the opening of a research center on the Nuremberg war crimes trials. Wiesel has devoted his life to acting as a witness to this memory. He was, in fact, the first to use the Biblical term "holocaust" — "burnt offering" — to describe what happened to the Jews of Nazi-occupied Europe between 1939 and 1945.

His 1954 memoir "Night," originally written in Yiddish, describes his experiences in Auschwitz and Buchenwald. His novels contain scraps of autobiography. He has written more than 30 books, including commentaries on Hasidic masters as well as novels and works of nonfiction plumbing the philosophical questions of modern history. And now he has tied all of these strands together in "All Rivers Run to the Sea" (Knopf, \$30), apparently the first of a two-volume autobiography; it ends with his marriage, at the age of 40, in 1969.

There is much more here than the Holocaust. There is childhood before and during the war in the town of Sighet, which, due to the vicissitudes of central European politics, was sometimes in Romania, sometimes in Hungary. There is life in a resettlement camp in France after liberation; the man knew the Talmud and the Law by heart, and they could study it page by page, using the director's memory, as they wheeled wheelbarrows of sand or concrete. Members of a cellblock would trade a dozen bread rations for a pair of phylacteries (leather cases holding the scriptures) that they would secretly pass from one to another in order to perform the ritual prayer required by the Law.

effect, the autobiography of a saint. And sainthood is not necessarily an attractive quality. The book is confessional but lacks a certain warmth. What better way to close out one century than to harken back to another? What better antidote to the numbing coziness of urban America in the late 20th century than the comforting earnestness of rural England in the early 19th?

And who better to guide us through the depths and shoals of living than the woman who made a literary career observing the manners and morals of life?

Jane Austen is back. Jane Austen is hot. People magazine just named her one of the 25 most intriguing people of the year — "a hot Hollywood property 178 years after her death." If you've never read any of her six novels, don't despair. You can watch the movie, or the television mini-series, or connect with her on the World Wide Web's Jane Austen home page.

"I think people are tired of sensationalism, and we want people who behave admirably and with some respect," says Albemarle writer Ruth Moose, who is starting a Charlotte, N.C., chapter of the Jane Austen Society of North America.

'The Diamonds' perform forever

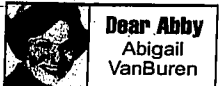

JACKPOT — It's been 38 years since a clean-cut bunch of Canadians released an instant million-selling hit called "Little Darlin'". A lot of "Words of Love," after a 1957 hit by The Diamonds, have flowed ever since.

Re-formed by tenor Bob Duncan in 1982, The Diamonds took on Nashville and the contemporary country music scene, hitting the country charts in 1982. The group's "Diamonds are Forever" album features popular music in a country-pop framework. It sent The Diamonds to "New Country" on the Nashville TV Network and to "Nashville Now". Duncan, who's a Baptist minister of music, was once a member of The Four Preps and had sung on "The Lawrence Welk Show" when he inherited The Diamonds in 1982 after John Felten was killed in a plane crash. "Theirs was a very different sound. The Diamonds, who first got together in Toronto in 1953, had been a classic pre-rock four-part harmony quartet, first organized by Dave Somerville. Over the next eight years, the group had 15 singles on the Billboard charts, from "Why Do Fools Fall in Love" through "The Stroll". The other three original members left in the meantime, and in 1962, Somerville departed too, leaving The Diamonds in the hands of Felten and Evan Fisher. Duncan joined in 1978. The current bass, Gary Cech, is a classically trained cellist and was once a member of The Young Americans. He's been with the Disney organization and on the staff of the "Today" show and "Entertainment Tonight". Jerry Siggins, who's performed at Disneyland and Walt Disney World, spent five summers at the Pink Garter Theater in Jackson, Wyo. He has guest-starred on "The Love Boat," "The Tonight Show" and "Tony Orlando and Dawn". Baritone Gary Owens studied music at California State University (Long Beach), but earned his master's degree in business administration at the University of Southern California. He's performed with Johnny Mann's "Stand Up and Cheer."

Sting gets a kick out of surviving so far in his life

NEW YORK (AP) — Midlife is no crisis for Sting.

At 44, the song-writing pop star, actor, father of five, human rights and environmental crusader wouldn't change a thing.

"This is the high point of my life, getting here," he says. "It's lasting this long, surviving the stings and arrows of outrageous fortune, to be alive, to be reasonably sane and healthy, and happy when everything I've gone through could have ended up entirely, entirely different."

Slouching into a soft black leather sofa in a Manhattan high-rise, Sting's heavy eyelids betray his jet lag. He just popped over from England, where he's finishing up studio work for his next record, "Mercury Falling."

"A lot of late nights," he says with a sigh, fixing the upturned collar of his ash-gray woolen jacket, adjusting his rumpled gray shirt, smoothing his multihued gray tie. "New York has a way of waking you up, though."

Fatigued or not, the former school teacher once known merely as Gordon Sumner is attentive and articulate, genuinely interested and completely at ease.

"I don't feel like Greta Garbo," he smirks when asked about the costs of superstardom. "I can't really tell you that being famous is all that unpleasant. I don't live a particularly cocooned or sheltered life. I don't have bodyguards. I'm not afraid to go walking in the street."

When Sting isn't off performing or making a movie, most days at home in his English country estate are much like the next.

"I don't sleep late. I get up and have breakfast with the children. I do yoga for an hour and 50 minutes," he says.

"Then I'll walk around my garden. Think about music, think about ideas. And then I have lunch and start work in the afternoons in the studio."

"Sometimes the work goes very easily. Other times it doesn't flow at all. Then I come out, watch the news on television, have a glass of wine, dinner, then go back in the studio."

Sounds kind of serious. What about fun?

'Merkin Ball' rolls past critics

Pearl Jam, "Merkin Ball" (Epic) — Those critics who derided the collaboration between Neil Young and Pearl Jam as just another rockstar mutual-admiration-society should hear the two songs of "Merkin Ball." Recorded at the same time as the material on Young's "Mirror Ball," the single features Eddie Vedder, rather than Young, on vocals.

Both pieces make the case for another summit between these two powers. "I Got It," the single, is a delightful midskey, but the track that recalls such "Ten"-era Pearl Jam hits as "Alive," and finds Young matching Vedder's world-weariness with broad and often mournful guitar declarations. "Long Road" is more of a stretch: Built around Young's pump organ and Jack Irons' tribal drums, it's the soundtrack to an epic journey, closer in spirit to U2's "The Joshua Tree" than anything either Young or Pearl Jam has attempted recently. Eric Vedder feeds off the fever of the rhythm track, and delivers a masterfully restrained performance that's happily tangled in the guitar parts. Young supplies shadowy, almost transparent answering vocals, and helps guide the band to the peak of two or three mountains and into the valleys between, never losing sight of the destination.

"Cypress Hill," "Cypress Hill III (Temples of Boom)" (Ruffhouse/Columbia) — B-Reck's Sen Dog and their smoked-out crew are at it again on Cypress Hill's third release, puffin' blunts on the hypnotic "Spark Another Owl" and busting caps on "Boom Biddy Bye Bye." Production-wise, DJ Muggs drops the beats at a mid-tempo pace and throws in numerous wacked-out loops. Other kickin' tracks include the trippy "Illusions" and "Funk Freakers." The boys also let Ice Cube have it with both barrels on "No Rest For the Wicked."

"I play a lot of chess," he says. "I play every day, with musicians in my band or anybody who plays."

It might sound kind of modest for a pop icon, but it's been a long time since he caught fire in the late 1970s as lead singer of the Police, a long time since he went solo, a long time since he felt he had to prove anything.

"I write music first and foremost to amuse myself, always have," he says. "After I amuse myself I have to amuse my family, my wife, my children and my band. Then I have to engage the record company and eventually down through to an audience, you know, which I suppose goes into the millions then. But initially it's just there to amuse me."

Making a technological leap to amuse himself further, the multiple Grammy winner allowed a team of multimedia computer gear heads from Starwave Corp. to poke around his house for months on end, exposing him as never seen before in an interactive CD-ROM.

"When they came to me with this idea, I didn't know what a CD-ROM was," he says of the newly released tribute, "Sting: All This Time."

Going beyond similar rock star computer packages, Sting reveals private personal stories about his life and career, takes visitors into his home studio for unplugged jam sessions and discusses his innermost feelings.

"I think I went too far. They were really in my life, that whole year, asking the most intrusive questions," he says.

"I went along with it. Your guard comes down, you lose the mask and you reveal more of yourself than perhaps you normally would if you don't normally drop the mask very much."

It's an interesting peek at a complex artist, his music, his acting, his 12-year-old Springer Spaniel William — as well as the tale of his rise from a bleak impoverished childhood to riches so great he never missed the millions a now-impoverished accountant once embezzled.

Still, Sting is quick to insist his head isn't completely in the clouds.

"I quite enjoy balancing the artistic side of my work with the commercial side," he says. "I like selling a lot of records. But I've been lucky in that I've never had to tailor my music to satisfy that market demand."

rowing moment when the cast faced a "white-out" — an interval where everything in front of you and in back of you is completely blank for a while. It can't be determined whether you are going straight or sideways or off a cliff, for that matter. Everything comes to an absolute halt. You have to "wait" until the white shade disappears and you're able to see again. Michael said it was easily the highlight of the location shoot and he'll never forget it.

As for Young and Restless, "Dan and Chris' storyline is in full force and Michael says he has to marvel at the way the writers and chief honcho Bill Bell kept coming up with new plot twists and are really into Danny and Chris and keep writing that they hope the adorable couple gets together on a permanent basis. But then "he wouldn't be a soap opera if things went along without upheaval."

Michael's musical career, which was going great, has been put on hold for the time being. "I've had to realize that there's only so much you can do. For instance, I haven't taken a vacation for some time. I decided I would use my time off to enjoy life in the company of friends and family. But I would probably do another TV movie if the part is a good one."

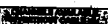
