# Twin Falls area youth gang numbers in dispute

TWIN FALLS — A sheriff's detective has misled and needlessly frightened the public by proclaiming that 300 gang members visited last year's county fair, critics charged Thursday.

"I don't think the number of 300 is accurate," said Andres Rodriguez, regional manager of the Idaho Migrant Council. "I think it's a scam, and it blows the issue out of proportion."

About 20 people attended a public meeting at the Twin Falls County commissioners' office to try to define and crack down on what was agreed to be a nebulous problem — youth gangs.

A list prepared by Lt. Bob Gauthier of the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Department

names 34 individual gang "leaders." The overwhelming majority of the leaders have Hispanic and Asian surnames.

All together, those 34 were ostensibly accompanied at the fair by 378 additional gang "members," whose names are not on the tally sheet.

In speeches to school officials and service clubs, Gauthier has claimed that "more than 300" gangsters operate locally.

Gauthier insisted that he wasn't misleading people and his identification is merely an attempt to understand the presence of gangs locally. Four deputies talked up the gang members during the course of the six-day fair.

Gauthier said he didn't know whether gang members are committing more crimes than other criminals.

Gauthier said he defines a gang as two

of more people banded together who have committed a crime. Other signs included tattoos, slang, certain clothing, hand signs and associating with gang members.

Several people criticized his analysis as libelous, overly broad and seemingly racist. Criminal defense lawyer Lisa Barini-Garcia said her defendants often are picked on by law officers for dressing like or associating with gangs, she said.

"A lot of them have been singled out because of their manner of dress or the way their heads are shaved. It happens a lot more than you would think," Barini-Garcia said.

Twin Falls City Councilman Lance Clow pointed out that Hispanic and Asian surnames were prominent among the youths listed as gang leaders. Such names

# Aide stirs new suspicion

WASHINGTON — Billing records from Hillary Rodham Clinton's law firm mysteriously appeared on a table in the White House residence two years after investigators subpoenaed them, a longtime Clinton aide testified Thursday.

Carolyn Huber told the Senate Whitewater Committee she went to the book room in the residence every two or three days and that she unexpectedly found the billing records from Mrs. Clinton's law firm there early last August.

She said they were folded but in plain view, on a pile of books on the corner of a table where they hadn't been just days earlier.

"They appeared there," Huber testified, "I thought it had been left there for me to take down to put in the file — you know, to file in the filing that I do."

She said she was certain the records had not been there earlier. "I don't think I would have missed them," she said.

Huber testified the book room was mainly for the Clintons and their guests, but was accessible to herself and some other White House aides. The room is next door to Mrs. Clinton's office in the residences.

The billing records outline Mrs. Clinton's work in 1985-86 for Madison Guaranty, the failing savings and loan owned by her Whitewater real estate partners, James and Susan McDougal.

Separately, newly disclosed documents show that as part of a routine document disposal at her law firm, Mrs. Clinton in 1988 directed that four files from her work on Madison Guaranty be destroyed.

Three of the files dealt with Mrs. Clinton's work on the controversial Castle Grande land development that Senate investigators and federal regulators are now probing.

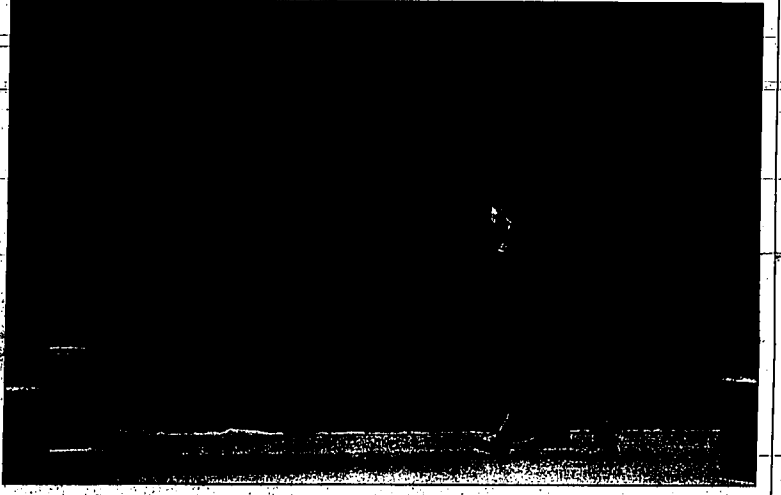
In written responses to regulators released Thursday, Mrs. Clinton said she did not initiate the destruction, but that she identified the documents after the Rose Law Firm in Little Rock issued a request for all lawyers to identify files they didn't need any longer.

One of the files which Mrs. Clinton marked for destruction was marked "Ward option," referring to a real estate document Mrs. Clinton worked on in regard to Castle Grande, a 1,050-acre tract which James McDougal and businessman Seth Ward bought with the S&L's money. Regulators claim the transaction was a sham transaction designed to circumvent state law.

In regard to Huber's Senate testimony, committee chairman Alfonse D'Amato, who has previously rejected calls to ask Mrs. Clinton to testify, said it may prompt him to submit written questions to the first lady.

It was the second time in two days that officials investigating Mrs. Clinton's dealings said the first lady would be asked to explain her actions.

# Snow snarls traffic, delights youth

TWIN FALLS — Snow brought out daredevil "hooky-bobbers" and shut down the southern approach to a new \$6.1-million roadway Thursday as a powerful storm landed in the Magic Valley.

An estimated 35 vehicles, two school buses and a few semi-trucks got stuck Thursday evening at the bottom of Clear Lake Grade north of Buhl, according to a Buhl highway official.

Authorities barricaded the road from Buhl to the Snake River. The new Clear Lake Grade road, which climbs to the north rim of the Snake River Canyon, remained open — at least as of 8:30 p.m.

Slick roads, snow and sliding vehicles were reported throughout the Magic Valley.

"Every road we've got is slick," said Harold Miller, superintendent of Buhl Highway District.

By 7 p.m. the Buhl Highway District had dumped seven loads of sand on the Twin Falls County stretch of the Buhl-to-

Wendell highway, Miller said.

By then, the road had been closed to traffic as vehicles stuck at the bottom struggled to climb out, Miller said. Some of the vehicles had slid off the road into a barrow pit, while others simply were spun their wheels, he said.

Snow tires and chains were absent on the stranded vehicles, Miller said. And motorists were failing to follow the sanders' path, he said.

The driver of a jackknifed semi-truck managed to drive up the canyon road after the snow stopped.

# Both sides try to avoid blame for derailing talks on budget

WASHINGTON — With a deal to balance the budget increasingly out of reach, political leaders on both sides focused Thursday on how to pull the plug on budget negotiations while avoiding blame for derailing the process.

Republicans in particular spoke as if the negotiations were an episode of the past and dismissed President Clinton's latest proposal, which was made public Thursday.

"This is nothing but a political document," complained Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan. "In my view, the president has already decided the talks are ended, and he's started to lay the groundwork with this document for 1996, for his reelection bid."

White House officials contended the two sides have agreed on more than \$600 billion in savings, and repeated their invitation for Republicans to sign off on that much, at least.

In addition, sources said the administration has made overtures on tax policy, including the GOP goal of reducing the capital gains levy and easing taxes on the sale of homes held for at least three years.

Yet the president seemed to be sending a mixed signal to the other side. He described a litany of deep policy differences dividing the two sides on Medicare, Medicaid, education and environmental regulation.

Then he added that a deal to balance the budget by 2002 remains in reach.

"My door is open," Clinton said.

Republicans, also reluctant to look like they are in the way of an agreement, sounded a similar refrain: "...if he'd like to negotiate again, I'm sure we will be glad to," said Senate Budget Committee Chairman Pete Domenici, R-N.M.

# Man admits removing body parts

TWIN FALLS — A homeless man has been hospitalized at a mental health clinic after telling police he cut off his testicles because they had been poisoned by drugs and alcohol.

The man, a drifter with a multi-state record of burglary and theft arrests, claimed ownership Wednesday night of the pair of testicles that was discovered beneath the Old Town Bridge on Saturday.

"It's a tragic situation that someone's mental condition could lead to this sort of behavior," said Sgt. Jim Munn of the Twin Falls Police Department. "I am happy that he is alive and well."

The man entered Canyonview Hospital and Counseling Centers after being driven by police to the emergency room at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, Munn said. At the emergency room, he required little more than a tetanus shot, Munn said.

The man called police Wednesday night from a gas station, fearing he was in trouble with the law and in risk of getting an infection, but the man required little more than a tetanus shot at the hospital, Munn said.

Police had searched for a body after a visitor to Rock Creek found the testicles. A pair of bloody boxer shorts, a rubber band, and purportedly a razor blade were also discovered, though police never recovered the tool used for the surgery.

The discovery led police to speculate anything from homicide to self-mutilation to a hoax. The testicles were taken Tuesday to a state forensic lab in Boise — now they will probably be destroyed, said police Lt. Dennis Chambers.

The man was under the influence of alcohol and drugs at the time of the incident, Munn said.

County documents reveal the man has a history of burglary and theft arrests in New York, Pennsylvania, California, Oregon and Nevada.

# Clinton to look ahead in speech

WASHINGTON (AP) — Deedlocked with Republicans over a balanced budget, President Clinton will confront a hostile Congress when he delivers his State of the Union address Tuesday.

His election-year message: All sides must face up to America's real problems of crime, education and the economy.

The speech will open Clinton's 1996 campaign and preview the themes he will throw against his Republican rival.

The budget battle will loom over Clinton's address, which comes just three days before the expiration of a temporary measure keeping much of the government open. However, presidential spokesman Mike McCurry said the budget won't be Clinton's primary focus.

"In a sense, he will make the budget fight seem puny by talking about the things that have a much more direct impact on the lives of Americans," McCurry said.

Everyone agrees it would be an exercise in futility for Clinton to ask the Republican Congress to approve a lengthy list of initiatives.

Still, he is expected to offer ideas dealing with the economy, education,

crime and the environment. He also is expected to renew his call for a campaign against teen pregnancy — a crusade he promised in last year's address — only to let fade away with his failed nomination of Dr. Henry Foster as surgeon general.

Last year, soon after taking control of Congress, the Republicans bogged Clinton's speech. The mood is sure to be worse this year after a year of hot tempers, angry battles and veto struggles.

One thing seems certain: Clinton's address won't be as long as last year's 81-minute marathon. Republicans happily ridiculed it as too long, and the White House doesn't want to give them another easy shot.

On the budget, the president will argue that Congress and the White House should put aside their disputes and look in a deal with what the administration claims are \$740 billion in agreed-upon savings.

"It is wrong for us to defer this because of disagreements that are not necessary to resolve in order to have a balanced budget or a modest tax cut," Clinton said Thursday, a day after Republicans called off budget talks with the White House.

Republicans portray Clinton as the barrier to a budget deal and hope to make that the focus of the November election. "We'll take it to the voters rather than make a bad budget deal," said Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, the front-runner for the GOP presidential nomination.

Clinton solicited speech ideas from political scientists at White House dinners. Other suggestions were invited from a cross section of Americans — from radio humorist Garrison Keillor to Boston University president John Silber — and their ideas were compiled in a green book for Clinton. "The principal theme is, 'Look, setting aside all this bickering, we've got some big challenges facing us as America goes into the 21st century,'" McCurry said.

Clinton's focus away from the titanic budget struggle is, of course, dictated by political reality.

If there were a budget agreement, it would be the centerpiece of his speech and he would celebrate it as a historic achievement. Lacking accord, the president does not want to dwell on failure in an address regarded as the opening shot of his re-election campaign.

The speech will present "a lot of the ground on which the election is fought," presidential adviser George Stephanopoulos said.

Translation: Clinton will stake out big differences with Republicans on Medicare and Medicaid, the environment and education.

With low inflation and low unemployment, Clinton will be able to boast about the economy and declare it sound.

After running on a pledge of creating 8 million new jobs in his first term, the president is well ahead of schedule, with 7.5 million new jobs in the economy since he took office in January 1993.

Foreign policy also will be important in Clinton's address. He can point to progress in Northern Ireland, the Middle East and Haiti.

# Forbes promises balanced budget measure

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — Republican presidential candidate Steve Forbes, who once said a balanced-budget amendment was an idea "fraught with danger," promised Thursday to propose just such a constitutional amendment if elected.

Campaigning in New Hampshire, the multimillionaire publisher also shifted his tone on the subject of federal spending to more closely track the shrink-the-government theme of his rivals for the GOP nomination.

Forbes faced a fresh round of critical attention—from two

Republican hopefuls who must get past him to have a clear shot at front-runner Bob Dole, Texas Sen. Phil Gramm and commentator Pat Buchanan.

And the Dole campaign called Forbes' embrace of a balanced budget amendment after opposing the idea for two decades "an amazing feat of political gymnastics."

Buchanan, campaigning in Louisiana, said the flat tax plan espoused by Forbes was a boon to the rich because it would not tax capital gains and other investment income. Buchanan said that was unfair to blue-collar workers, and predicted President Clinton would raise the fairness issue to re-election if Republicans embraced the Forbes approach.

"Frankly, Steve Forbes' flat tax will cost us the election," Buchanan said. Gramm, campaigning in New Hampshire, promoted a similar theme, saying his proposed 16-per-

cent flat tax was fairer because it would preserve the mortgage interest deduction and tax capital gains.

"There's no way we can defend a system which taxes people on income from their labor but exempts income from their investments," Gramm said.

Defending his plan, Forbes urged voters worried about losing their mortgage interest deduction to consider the lower interest rates he predicted would accompany the economic growth created by a flat tax.

"Please go beyond what they say you will lose," Forbes told a Rotary Club breakfast.

# Shuttle astronauts take bit of time off

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — With the hard work behind them, space shuttle Endeavour's astronauts were given a half-day off Thursday.

Japanese crew members were to pack their gear and check their equipment for the flight home. The shuttle is scheduled to return to Earth in a rare nighttime landing Saturday after a nine-day flight in which the astronauts made two spacewalks, scooped up a Japanese satellite and released and retrieved a NASA satellite.

# Nursing home changes prompt recommendations from panel

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress should require nursing homes to keep registered nurses on duty 24 hours a day to decrease the numbers of patient deaths and hospital admissions, the Institute of Medicine recommended Thursday.

An institute report on improving U.S. nursing care found trends toward shorter hospital stays and a preference for home-based or community-based long-term care. Both practices have resulted in more nursing home residents suffering from increasingly acute illnesses, the report said.

The committee recommends that Congress require by the year 2000 a 24-hour presence of registered nurse coverage in nursing facilities as an enhancement of the current eight-hour requirement," the report said.

It said a goal of increased staffing

would be to produce higher rates of patient survival and fewer hospitalizations.

The 16-member panel of health care experts, nurses, physicians and researchers also recommended that hospitals employ more registered nurses with advanced training and evaluate the competency of nursing assistants.

As hospitals reorganize their staffing mix, continuing education in hospitals, and schools, should focus more on providing better management tools to nurses," chairwoman Carolyn K. Davis, a health care advisor at Ernst and Young, said in a statement issued with the report.

"There also is a need to develop a more systematic monitoring of the quality of care in hospitals. The enormity of changes in hospitals and the speed of these changes

mean we must ask a lot more questions and collect more data to monitor the quality of care."

The call to have registered nurses at nursing homes around the clock was the report's most controversial proposal.

Panel member James F. Blumstein dissented from the recommendation on the ground that the committee failed adequately to evaluate its cost effectiveness.

"The committee deliberated hard on this issue, and some committee members are hesitant to impose additional costs on the facilities," the report noted.

It recommended that Medicare and Medicaid reimbursements be adjusted to offset the costs of increasing registered nursing staff and said states could waive the requirement for nursing homes that couldn't afford it.

# Kidnapped Texas girl found slain

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Less than a week after Amber Hagerman was dragged screaming off her bicycle in the middle of the afternoon by a man in a pickup, her body was found floating face-down in a creek, her throat cut.

The gruesome discovery Thursday hit hard in the neighborhood where the 9-year-old Girl Scout was kidnapped Saturday.

Balloons and ribbons hanging from homes and cars in Amber's favorite color, pink, blew in a cold, stiff wind.

"It's just so overwhelming to think that somebody could do something like that to a small child," said Archie Price, 71, who lives down the street from the home of Amber's grandparents, where the girl had been playing before her disappearance. "I hope whoever has done it is caught quickly."

The body was found late Wednesday by a man walking his dog outside an apartment complex. The area was about eight miles from the middle-class neighborhood where a witness saw a man

drag Amber as she fought and screamed.

Investigators said they have not determined whether the body was dumped at the site or farther upstream in a creek fed by strong thunderstorms.

"We are all a little numb," police spokesman Dee Anderson said. "We certainly didn't want this outcome. I'm not going to say we are shocked or amazed, but we are really disappointed."

He would not confirm published reports that the body was nude.

# Charge: Parents raped children

LOWELL, Mass. (AP) — A couple were arrested on charges they injected their four sons with drugs and repeatedly raped them over a six-month period.

"These people are monsters. They are absolute monsters," Detective Lt. William Taylor said. "I can't imagine what else you could do to these kids that could be worse."

The couple, ages 39 and 33, were arrested Wednesday and held without bail on charges including rape of a child and distribution of cocaine and marijuana to a youngster. The boys range in age from 9 to 12.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — So much for "Yes, Yes, Yes!" Lisa Marie Presley-Jackson has dumped Michael Jackson, saying they've been separated for more than a month and there's no hope of saving their marriage.

In Los Angeles Superior Court Thursday, Elvis' only child filed for dissolution of marriage, citing the only reason she is legally obligated to — irreconcilable differences.

"Michael Jackson and Lisa Marie Presley have mutually agreed to go their separate ways. However they remain good friends," said Jackson's publicist, Lee Solters.

Marriages, with the possible exception of Jerry Lee Lewis and his teen-age cousin, don't get much weirder than this.

Tabloids went wild when the 27-year-old mother of two hitched up with Jackson, a 37-year-old bachelor with some pesky image problems, in a secret ceremony in the Dominican Republic in May 1994.

The snickering began immediately. The wedding — where both bride and groom wore black — was a

sham, the tabloids said. Presley, a Scientologist, must have married the reclusive singer for the money or to give him credibility after the child molestation fiasco.

Her attorney, John P. Coale, wouldn't say Thursday whether they had a prenuptial agreement, but as sole heir to Elvis' \$100 million estate, she's hardly wanting for cash.

"There are no disputes as to property or anything else," Coale said by phone from his office in Washington, D.C. "It's going to be a very simple and clean divorce and they're going to remain friends."

The petition, filed in the state that spawned no-fault divorce, said their community property has yet to be determined. It also asks that Jackson pay legal fees and that her name be restored to Lisa Marie Presley.

In the 3-page divorce filing, Presley listed their date of separation as Dec. 10, 1995 — four days after Jackson's on-stage collapse during rehearsals for a television special in New York.

Presley put up appearances, visiting him in the hospital, where doctors blamed his collapse on severe diarrhea from a viral infection that left him dehydrated with a dangerously high heart rate. Posing for the cameras.

**'Dean of the Green' Fats dead at — ???**

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Minnesota Fats, the pool shark who blundered his way out of smoky barrooms to become the most famous player ever to pick up a cue stick, died Thursday.

Fats died of congestive heart failure, said his wife, Theresa Bell Wanderone, who already has his epitaph ready: "Best everybody living on Earth. Now St. Peter, rick 'em up."

Varying accounts listed Fats as anywhere from 82 to 95 years old, but as he boasted in a 1988 interview, "No one on this Earth knows how old I am."

Born Rudolf Wanderone Jr., he was known as New York Fats early in his career. Jackie Gleason's character in the 1961 Paul Newman movie "The Hustler" based on Wanderone, was called Minnesota Fats. So Wanderone started calling himself Minnesota Fats, and his fame and fortune began to rise.

"He probably did more for the sport of pool than any other human being alive," said pool wizard Fast Eddie Parker.

"It was Fats' personality more than his skill at the table that made him famous.

"Fats could shoot pool with either hand and was known for wearing \$100 bills in the handkerchief pocket of his suits.

"He was, shall we say, the Don Rickles of pool," Parker said. "He made a lot of money with pool because of his skills, but he was really an entertainer. He could talk you out of a game rather than shoot you out of a game."

Fats' career was interwoven with that of Willie Mosconi, who died in 1993. Mosconi was the technical adviser on the set of "The Hustler," and the duo pined off in a series of matches on ABC's "Wide World of Sports" in the 1970s.

Mosconi regularly beat Fats, but Fats usually won the battle of wit

and charisma. He became a household name in a sport that needed one badly, said Conrad Burkman, publisher of National Billiard News.

"You could go into a restaurant the night after Mosconi and Fats had a match on television. Mosconi would have beat his brains in and all everyone would say is, 'Wow, I saw Minnesota Fats on TV last night,'" Burkman said.

He also was nicknamed "Fatty," "triple smart," "dean of the green," "the sultan of stroke" and the "bank shot bandit."

He would bet on just about anything, especially eating contests. At one time he weighed 245 pounds, but he was down to about 175 in recent years. He suffered a heart attack in 1992.

**No indictments in deaths over hubcaps**

DALLAS (AP) — A man who killed two teen-agers with a barrage of rifle fire because a fancy hubcap had been stolen will not face trial on murder charges, a grand jury decided.

Relatives of Billy Wayne Cummings, 15, and Jeremy Lawrence, 16, decried the grand jury's decision Wednesday not to indict Shedrick Babbs, 23. Babbs' lawyers said he thought the youths

planned to steal his custom car wheels and acted within the law in trying to protect himself and his property.

Prosecutors, who had sought murder charges, said Babbs fired at least 32 rounds, continuing to shoot even though no one in the car was offering any resistance. A third youth was wounded in the incident.

The stolen hubcap was found in the car, police said.

## Editorial

### CSI's contribution to valley deserves local support

A cynic, according to Oscar Wilde, is a person who knows the price of everything and the value of nothing. Taxpayers in Jerome and Twin Falls counties—mustn't become cynical about the College of Southern Idaho.

The news lately has been full of CSI's price — specifically, the unfairness of how the college gets paid for. We residents of Twin Falls and Jerome counties pay local property taxes for our college, while the home counties of other Idaho colleges don't.

North Idaho College is the only other higher-ed facility receiving property taxes from its home county. The reason is that CSI and NIC are "community colleges" — theoretically different from state colleges and universities.

Unfair? You bet. That's why some people in Jerome County are agitating to pull their county out of CSI's taxing district. And it's why Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, is pushing to replace the local taxes with state money.

But while all this is going on, we need to remember not only the cost of a community college, but also its value.

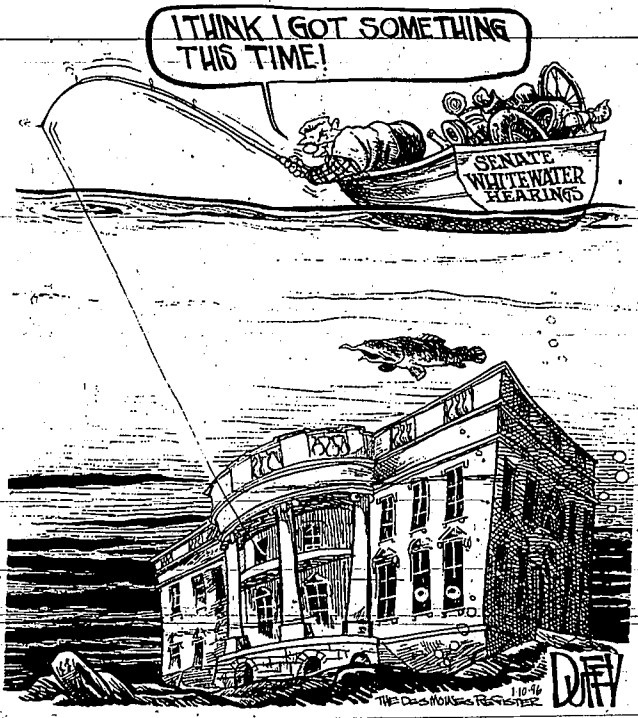
CSI is this valley's premier cultural and intellectual institution. Its educational opportunities let local residents expand their horizons without leaving home. It provides top-flight athletic spectacles as well as mind-broadening musical and dramatic events. CSI's fine little museum has just been

supplemented with a state-of-the-art planetarium.

Certainly, Jerome County residents would like to lower their taxes. So would people in Twin Falls County and Kootenai County. But without state money to take up the slack, we'd only be hurting ourselves.

Jerome County's "tax rebels" are basically right about the system's unfairness, but they should be patient. CSI's taxing set-up has been unfair since the college was launched a quarter-century ago. Fixing that long-standing problem may take time.

Meanwhile, let's remember — and cherish — the college's value to all the communities it serves.



## Why are we preoccupied with failure?

In 1930 in America average life expectancy at birth was 58 years for men, 61 for women. By 1990 it was 71 and 79 respectively. Until the 1930s the average manufacturing worker toiled nearly 50 hours a week with few rights or benefits. In 1996 about 80 percent of all workers have employer-paid health insurance.

In 1940 most Americans were renters, most households had neither a refrigerator nor central heating, 30 percent lacked inside running water, coal fueled most furnaces and stoves, wood was the second most-used fuel. More than a fifth of Americans lived on farms, less than a third of which had electric lights and only a tenth had flush toilets.

In 1940 one in 20 Americans had a college degree; 50 years later, one in five did.

In 1945 most households did not have a telephone. In 1994 (when the typical new home was 40 percent larger than its 1970 counterpart), 81 percent of households had VCRs, 37 percent had personal computers.

As late as 1948 retirement was no certainty; about half the men over 65 worked. In 1995, after decades of supposed "deindustrialization," industrial production was 40 percent higher than in 1980, 90 percent higher than in 1970, 350 percent higher than in 1950.

In 1964 there were fewer than 100 black elected officials nationwide; by the early 1990s there were about 7,000.

Between 1929 and 1933 output declined almost 25 percent. In the worst postwar recessions (1973-75 and 1981-82) output declined just 4.9 and 3 percent respectively.

In 1976 the average supermarket offered 9,000 products; 15 years later it offered 30,000. We are richer, freer, healthier and work at less exhausting jobs than ever before.

So why during this epoch of unprecedented achievement has America become preoccupied with perceived failure? That question is subtly

answered in Robert Samuelson's new book, "The Good Life and Its Discontents: The American Dream in the Age of Entitlement, 1945-1995." Samuelson, the Newsweek and Washington Post columnist, should have Secret Service protection because if anything happens to him, we are sunk.

He says postwar progress bred an entitlement mentality which in turn bred disappointment that the nation was not living up to unattainable promises. The belief was that we were entitled to whatever is possible; that a rapid, uninterrupted and painless increase in prosperity is possible, and that such prosperity would benefit most social ills. Samuelson says this "almost dream-like concept of progress" was accompanied by a decline in the sense of responsibility.

Samuelson believes that the mobilization of society for the Second World War blurred the distinction between governmental and private responsibilities. The postwar agenda of ideological "problem-solving" politics eased the distinction between problems that can be solved and conditions that must be endured. For example, in 1970 the man who had been Lyndon Johnson's chief economic adviser said recessions are "fundamentally preventable, like airplane crashes and unlike hurricanes."

Thus did economics, once the "dismal science" that explained costs and limits, become the "cheery science," encouraging the delusion that proper politics is (like another postwar chimera, "the science of management") merely a matter of experts' techniques. Such "pragmatism" became embittering: "All problems were considered solv-

able, so enduring problems must be explained in terms of someone's incompetence or wickedness."

As Samuelson says, "Good was no longer good enough." As Lyndon Johnson said, it had to be a Great Society. And why not, John Kennedy having said, "Man holds in his hands the power to abolish all forms of human poverty." The illusion that government is the source of economic growth and is responsible for the "fruit" allocation of wealth encouraged a sensibility demanding the ultimate entitlements — to security and peace of mind. The premise was that social conflict and personal discontent arise from material scarcities.

But economics, far from being a "hard" science, like physics, has more accurately been called a "science of single instances" — hardly a science. The hubris of economists professing competence to control America's complex modern economy, combined with democracy's disposition to spend avidly and tax reluctantly, produced inflations that only recessions could quell.

"Compassionate" postwar capitalism featured giant corporations happily serving as welfare states, promising job security and other benefits, and not attending to competitiveness until jobs had to be shed by the tens of thousands. "Compassionate" government, encouraging the expression of personal desires as group grievances, generated public distrust by becoming a fountain of synthetic, and meaningless, "rights," such as the right to "educational equality." Education and health care were, Samuelson notes, more "equal" when there was a lot less of each.

If the electorate can be inoculated with Samuelson's thesis — that "we need to curb our casual use of government" and "either we reconstitute our expectations, or we condemn ourselves to perpetual disappointment" — his book can elevate this year's political argument.

**The Sportsman's Heritage Defense Fund** was founded not only to protect and preserve a cultural tradition but to ensure Idaho's wildlife is managed properly by officials who have the knowledge to do so. In the case of Idaho's black bears, the Idaho Fish and Game Department, in conjunction with concerned sportsmen and women, have done remarkably well. So well, in fact, that black bear populations in this state are nationally recognized. At this point, bear with me while I state some true facts, which, by the way, can be backed with data open to public scrutiny.

Fact: The black bear and mountain lion are at the top of the food chain in their realm. They have few predators which prey on them, save one — human predators. If harvest of these species is halted, problems such as overpopulation, maulings and even human deaths eventually occur, i.e., California's halting of all mountain lion hunting — two deaths last year alone, i.e., Colorado's black bear initiative — one year later, they (the taxpayers) have had to apportion more than \$100,000 for nuisance bear control for 1996.

Fact: Hound hunting and baiting are two of the most selective methods of hunting. In the case of the cougar, the use of hounds is the only viable method. A method, I might add, also used by biologists, even those opposed to sportsmen. These methods actually give the hunter or photographer an extended period by which to scrutinize the animal.

Fact: Political wildlife management has failed in every instance. Biological wildlife management does work. The Idaho Fish and Game can be very proud of its accomplishments.

To the non-hunting persons reading this, I ask you but one question: Is it doubtful that you would vote on any initiative without first having researched it thoroughly; correct? Please do not vote on this one before doing the same.

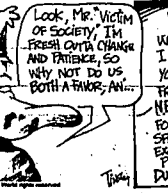
I have no solution for any of our crime, but if we don't get a grip on life around here soon, it will be too late.

# 1st Balkan fatality is heart attack victim

**TASZAR, Hungary (AP)** — A 39-year-old U.S. Army sergeant assigned to help get American troops and equipment into Bosnia died Thursday of an apparent heart attack.

He was the first American fatality in the Bosnia peace enforcement mission that began last month.

The Pentagon and army officials in Europe identified the victim as Clement E. Southall Jr., a member of the 191st Ordnance Battalion.

Emergency workers were called to his barracks late Wednesday night and tried to resuscitate him, according to a brief statement from U.S. Army spokesman Lt. Col. Ron Williams. Southall was taken by ambulance 10 minutes later to the hospital, where he was pronounced dead early today, Williams said.

Maj. Drew Miller, a spokesman at the U.S. European command in Stuttgart, Germany, said Southall died of an apparent heart attack.

Southall was a wheeled vehicle operator with the 23rd Ordnance Company, based in Miesau, Germany. His hometown was not released.

Southall was working at Tazsar in southern Hungary, where U.S. forces have adapted an air field to receive troops and equipment heading from Germany to Bosnia and Croatia.

Southall is survived by his wife Lynne and daughters Heather and Sarah.

# Yeltsin: Most hostages set free

**KEMSI-YURT, Russia (AP)** — Boris Yeltsin declared a bitter victory Thursday over Chechen rebels.

They were wiped out by Russian troops and most of their hostages survived an assault that turned a tiny village into a wasteland of cinders and corpses sprawled in snowy ditches.

His account, which attempted to put a humiliating and politically costly episode in the best possible light, could not be independently confirmed. Other government and military officials said fewer hostages lived through the barrage and some rebels survived.

Photographers allowed into Pervomayskaya after the four-day assault found bloodied bodies lying in makeshift bunkers alongside rows of rifles and stacks of ammunition boxes. Those images may bolster Yeltsin's image for taking a tough line against well-armed rebels — or may increase the perception that the country is on the brink of chaos and the Chechen war is a mistake.

There was no immediate reaction from rebel forces to Yeltsin's remarks and it was not clear if they had reached rebel sympathizers who were holding a Turkish ferry hostage and threatening to kill the Russians aboard.

Trying to explain why a huge Russian force took so long to defeat a band of no more than 20 rebels, Yeltsin claimed the village masked a giant underground rebel base with concrete gun emplacements. The claim about Pervomayskaya, a remote hamlet of simple brick houses, seemed highly unlikely.

Chechen separatists humiliated Russia last week when they slipped

Interfax news agency reported that the bodies of 153 rebels were found in and around Pervomayskaya and 28 gunmen were taken prisoner.

A hostage who escaped on Thursday told the ITAR-Tass news agency that he had been forced to bury killed rebels. "There were a lot of them," Ali Aliyev said.

Russian authorities have given widely different and often contradictory estimates of the number of gunmen and hostages involved, and senior military officials claimed several times earlier this week that the rebels had murdered most of the hostages.

Shortly before Yeltsin made his claims, Russian authorities said 42 hostages had been freed. Prime Minister Viktor Chernomyrdin had implied the remaining hostages were dead.

"In the village of Pervomayskaya, as of Wednesday night, there are no more hostages," the ITAR-Tass news agency reported Chernomyrdin as saying. He gave no details.

Gen. Mikhail Barsukov, head of the Federal Security Service, said 3,000 people Chechen gunmen seized Jan. 9 in the nearby city of Pervomayskaya, despite the huge government bombardment, although he added that rebels may have buried some bodies.

He said he did not know whether the rebel band's leader, Dudayev's son-in-law, Salim-Raduyev, was killed.

The hostages were among up to 3,000 people Chechen gunmen seized Jan. 9 in the nearby city of Kizlyar, to dramatize their demand for a Russian troop withdrawal from their republic.

### 10 die in arson at immigrant home

**LUEBECK, Germany** — A fire believed set by arsonists raced through an immigrant home before dawn Thursday, killing at least 10 people and injuring 55.

Police blamed neo-Nazis for what would be Germany's deadliest anti-foreigner attack since World War II.

Three children were among those killed by the fire that broke out at 3:40 a.m. in a four-story apartment building that houses Africans, Lebanese, Syrians and Poles in the center of Luebeck, a North German port.

Police detained three men on suspicion of murder and arson. Police sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the three suspects were right-wing extremists, one of them a skinhead — a neo-Nazi with a trademark shaved head.

### Saudi agents bust drug smuggling ring

**JIDDAH, Saudi Arabia** — Anti-narcotics agents in the kingdom have busted a drug smuggling ring with 53 pounds of heroin worth \$64 million, the Arab News daily reported Thursday.

The English-language newspaper did not identify the ring members or say how many were involved in the smuggling operation, but said those arrested were not Saudis. They were trying to smuggle the drugs in a ship.

Saudi Arabia mandates beheading by sword for drug trafficking. At least 192 convicts were beheaded last year, most of them Asians and Africans found guilty of drug offenses.

### Estonia leads Baltics in '95 crime rate

**RIGA, Latvia** — Estonia has the highest crime rate of the three Baltic states and its police force has the lowest rate for solving crimes in 1995, the Baltic News Service said Thursday.

Estonia's crime rate was 265 crimes per 10,000 residents, compared with 164 in Lithuania and 155 in Latvia, according to statistics released by the Latvian Interior Ministry.

Criminals seemed to have the best chances of escaping prosecution in Estonia, with only 28 percent of reported crimes solved compared to 41 percent in Lithuania and 35 percent in Latvia, the news agency said.

The number of murders and crimes causing severe injuries declined in all three countries compared to 1994.

### Report: Explosion kills at least 14

**HONG KONG** — At least 14 people died in an explosion caused when workers unloading explosives used candles to light their way, the official China News Service said Thursday.

More than 30 people were injured and roads and buildings were damaged in the blast Sunday night in Yunyang county in the western Chinese province of Sichuan, the agency said.

The workers were unloading a ton of explosives, 5,000 detonators and more than 1,500 feet of fuse from a truck, the report said.

### New fighting reported in Ethiopia

**MOGADISHU, Somalia** — Recent clashes between the Ethiopian army and the rebel Ogaden National Liberation Front have claimed the lives of at least 140 government soldiers, a rebel spokesman said Thursday.

Speaking in Mogadishu, Mohamed Ahmed Nur said the fighting has taken place in recent weeks in four communities in the Ogaden, a vast desert area in eastern Ethiopia bordering Somalia.

Many of the Ogaden's inhabitants are ethnic Somalis. Somalia and Ethiopia fought over the area in 1977 in a war won by Ethiopia with help from the Soviet Union and Cuba. The vast amount of weapons collected by both sides contributed to continuing instability in the region.

Nur said the Ethiopian government had arrested hundreds of supporters of the liberation front, including clan elders and students.

past the border into the neighboring Russian republic of Dagestan, seizing hostages to press their demand that Moscow pull its troops out of Chechnya.

After a five-day standoff in Pervomayskaya near Chechnya's border, Russian troops stormed the village on Monday, unleashing their tanks, artillery and helicopter gunships on the gunmen surrounded there.

On Thursday, Yeltsin said his forces had killed the gunmen and would now go after rebel leaders who have resorted to taking hostages and attacking Russian towns in their fight for independence from Russia.

"We have taught (rebel) leader Dzhokhar Dudayev a sound lesson, and now it is necessary to deliver strikes on Dudayev's strongholds ... to put an end to terrorism on Russian soil," Yeltsin said.

Saying they had given up hope of saving more hostages, the Russians stepped up their bombardment of Pervomayskaya on Wednesday, seemingly intent on destroying it. Russian jets, tanks and artillery pounded the village with hundreds of shells and rockets for hour after hour.

But Yeltsin said 82 of the hostages had been rescued by Thursday afternoon, and that 18 hostages were still missing but "must be presumed alive."

Yeltsin said 26 Russian troops and all of the rebels were killed "unless some are hiding underground." The

### Russians asked not to panic over \$100 bill

**MOSCOW (AP)** — Facing panic in Russia about the new \$100 bill, the U.S. government is trying to persuade Russians that the new greenbacks are as good as the old — and that the old bills are as good as new.

Russians who don't trust banks and worry about the unstable ruble prize the \$100 bill for providing a medium of financial safety.

There is more U.S. cash in Russia than any other country except the United States, and Russians have become increasingly anxious about the new bill, which is to be introduced in the next few months.

Washington is funding a telephone hot line in Russia, blanketing banks with posters and dispatching representatives to reassure Russians — again — that the new bill will not prompt more counterfeiting or invalidate the old dollars.

### Rwandans flee ethnic fighting

**BUJUMBURA, Burundi (AP)** — About 15,000 Rwandans, who had fled to Burundi as ethnic slaughter erupted in their homeland, streamed out of a refugee camp Thursday to escape an outbreak of the same Hutu-Tutsi bloodshed in northern Burundi.

About 10,000 of them had crossed into Tanzania by nightfall, said Hitoosi Misa of the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees.

Tanzania has not decided whether to allow the Rwandans to stay. Because Tanzania already has more than 500,000 Rwandan refugees, it closed its border to more early last year.

# Scientists: Huge earthquake rocked Northwest in 1700

SAN JOSE, Calif. — In a remarkable piece of detective work, Japanese researchers think they have snapped a mug shot of the tsunami earthquake that struck the Pacific Northwest and the northern coast of California.

Date: Jan. 26, 1700.  
Time: About 9 p.m.  
Size: A whopping magnitude 9 — which would release 1,000 times more energy than the 1989 Loma Prieta spasm — that ruptured the entire Cascadia subduction zone, which extends more than 700 miles from central Vancouver Island in British Columbia to Cape Mendocino in California.

The evidence: Dusty historical accounts of a tidal wave that washed over the shores of Japan on that date. Through process of elim-

ination, a team led by geophysicist Kenji Satake of the Geological Survey of Japan concluded that the wave could only have been produced by a truly monstrous quake from the Pacific Northwest.

The study, published in January's issue of the journal Nature, is the latest in a number of threads of evidence — from Indian stories to the remains of drowned tree stumps — that indicate a giant earthquake struck the coast some three centuries ago, triggering tidal waves up to 60 feet high.

Although the Cascadia subduction zone has been quiet since the first white settlers arrived, some scientists think it is storing energy and could cut loose any time. Although large earthquakes occur every 500 years, on average, their timing is so erratic that there is no telling when the next one will arrive. And this time, with 7 million

people and their buildings strung along the coast, the stakes are much higher.

Scientists began to recognize the threat only a decade ago, when they realized that the Cascadia is the same kind of structure that produced the two biggest earthquakes on record — the 1960 Chilean quake and the 1964 Good Friday quake in Alaska.

In all of these areas, a plate of the Earth's crust beneath the ocean bottom dives beneath the continent and occasionally becomes stuck, accumulating strain. When the two plates finally slip past each other in an earthquake, the ocean bottom springs up, thrusting the water above it into a tidal wave. At the same time, the coastline abruptly sinks.

Geologists have dug up traces of just such a disaster: By dating the remains of drowned trees and other vegetation, they've estab-

lished that the last earthquake on the Cascadia took place around the year 1700. But they couldn't tell whether they were seeing the effects of one giant quake or several smaller ones of magnitude 7 or 8.

Digging through historical records in Japan, Satake and his team found that a tsunami, or tidal wave, up to nine feet tall damaged 20 houses in Miyako, flooded rice paddies in Otsuchi and swept into a storehouse at Tanabe on January 27 or 28, 1700.

The waves were typical of tsunamis that start somewhere far away, the scientists wrote.

And it would take a big earthquake to set waves that tall traveling as far as Japan. But there were no reports of earthquakes at that time in South America, Alaska or in the Kamchatka region of Russia; the Pacific Northwest is the only possibility.

Using a computer model, they traced the path of the waves back across the Pacific and determined that the earthquake must have occurred close to 9 p.m. on Jan. 26.

That's an extraordinary degree of precision. The timing dovetails with stories told by the Yurok, Wiyot, Checco and Pomo tribes along the coast, said Gary Carver, a paleoseismologist at Humboldt State University.

Carver and his wife, Deborah, have collected a dozen Indian stories that describe a huge earthquake and tidal wave that struck long ago. Half of them specifically say it struck at night; none mention any other time of day. "These stories tell us specific places where these tsunamis inundated coastal villages," Carver said. When researchers dig around the mapped locations of those villages, "we find the deposits from tsunamis there."

## Utah eyes law against striking officials

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A Utah Senate committee Thursday endorsed a bill that would make it a felony to assault a local official.

Sen. David L. Watson, R-St. George, jokingly referred to his legislation as the "whack-a-mayor" bill. Senate Bill 59, formally titled "Protecting Public Officials," was unanimously endorsed by the Senate Judiciary Committee and now goes to the full Senate for debate.

"The only people who oppose this are the ones who want to punch out

their mayors," he said. Which, he acknowledged, could be a significant constituency — hence the reason for the legislation.

The current assault-on-a-public-official statute, passed in 1983, provides for an enhanced felony penalty for misdemeanor simple assault only in cases where the victim is a statewide elected official like the governor, attorney general or lawmakers and their families.

It also doesn't specify that the assault must arise from some official

action, making it possible that someone could be charged under the enhanced statute for "punching out the governor's kid on the school-ground," Watson said.

His bill would narrow the circumstances under which a felony could be filed, requiring the victim to be acting within the scope of his or her official duties.

Watson said he drafted the legislation after the 65-year-old woman mayor of Virgin, Utah, was assaulted by David Dewitt, 45.

## Navy jets collide over Nevada desert, killing 1

FALLON, Nev. (AP) — Two Navy fighter jets collided over the northern Nevada desert, killing one pilot. The other pilot bailed out and survived with minor injuries, the Navy said Thursday.

The FA-18 Hornet jets collided Wednesday evening in the rugged and remote Desotoya Mountains during a training mission, Navy said.

Lt. Kevin Duggan was found alive a few hours after the crash, Petty Officer Michael Frazer said. The body of Lt. Comdr. William Braker was found by searchers shortly before midnight, Frazer said.

Both pilots were assigned to Strike Fighter

Squadron 22, based at Lemoore Naval Air Station in California.


Duggan ejected before the crash, said Ann McMillin, a Navy spokeswoman. He used a beacon and flares packed in his survival gear to attract rescuers, then wrapped his parachute around him for warmth in the light snow and waited for help, McMillin said. Duggan was taken to the Navy's clinic in Fallon, where he was listed in satisfactory condition with minor injuries.

Braker is survived by a wife and 5-month-old daughter, Frazer said. The cause of the collision was under investigation.







### United Way raises \$5,000 more than '94

The project will be postponed if temperatures remain above freezing. Crystal Springs Lake is a popular fishing spot in Niagara Springs State Park, south of Wendell; entry fees for motor vehicles will remain in effect during the drawdown.

Once the lake is drained and re-filled, it will be stocked with fish from the Clear Springs Food Co.—The park's staff predicts the cleaning and re-stocking effort will produce better fishing later this year.

### Idaho PUC to evaluate requests for toll-free calling

**BOISE** — The Public Utilities Commission isn't ready to evaluate Magic Valley residents' request for extended toll-free calling, but the commission officially took up the case this week.

The PUC, which regulates the state's various utilities monopolies, issued a notice of the petition signed by more than 13,000 residents of Jerome, Twin Falls, Lincoln and Gooding counties requesting that all phone calls within the Magic Valley be toll-free.

Jean Duffek and Lee Halper of Jerome delivered the stack of petitions to the Boise office in September. The PUC won't schedule hearings or commence an investigation of the case until it decides on statewide criteria for extended local calling "within the next few weeks," the notice said.

Meanwhile, Duffek has collected about 25 letters from people who think that towns around Twin Falls comprise a community of interest. She said she'll pass the letters on to the PUC later.

### House panel introduces bill to grant one-liquor license

**BOISE** — Though there was some skepticism, the House State Affairs Committee has introduced legislation that essentially grants a new liquor license to just one company.

Rep. Robbi King, R-Glenns Ferry, got the committee to introduce her bill to allow a liquor license to any winery that operates a golf course.

"I have the only winery that operates a full-scale golf course," she said. She said later she was referring to the Carmel Winery operation at Glenns Ferry.

Liquor licenses are at a premium in Idaho because they are granted only in incorporated areas on the basis of population. But the Legislature has granted a number of exemptions over the years, including golf courses.

King said her legislation would get around the law forbidding wineries from having liquor licenses.

### CSI English professor returns home after crash

**TWIN FALLS** — After three weeks in a Boise hospital, College of Southern Idaho English professor Bill Studebaker finally has returned home.

Studebaker was badly injured in a Christmas Eve car crash, breaking his back, pelvis, most of his ribs and several internal organs. Doctors attached a metal plate to the front of his pelvis and inserted a large screw in his left hip.

He'll be taking it easy at home for the next couple of months, allowing his bones and internal organs to heal. He is getting around in a wheelchair and uses crutches to get in and out of chairs.

Studebaker's wife, Judy, also was injured in the accident. She's had reconstructive surgery and her jaw is wired shut for the time being. She may still have more reconstructive surgery.

## Legislature faces education dilemmas

### Idaho teachers wary of liability after reading students' journal entries

**BOISE** — Paula Tillquist no longer reads her students' journal entries.

The Jerome Middle School English teacher will assign them, but only thumbs through them to check for dates.

"She's worried," she said, about being held liable for students who kill themselves after passing on suicide messages in their writing. In August, the Idaho Supreme Court decided that a Meridian teacher who neglected to detect suicide messages in a student's daily journal was liable for the death.

The ruling criticized by the Idaho Education Association and the American Civil Liberties Union, as well as the Meridian School District, which plans to appeal in federal court.

The IEA has written a proposed law that



would exempt teachers from being held responsible for suicide messages they don't pick up on, said IEA President Monica Beaudoin.

"This is such a shock," she said. "I don't think educators would believe that this kind of thing can happen."

She knows of teachers who won't assign journal entries, or who restrict them to specific topics.

That's the case in Jerome, where most English teachers want to avoid the whole

possibility of litigation and so do away with free writing or journal entries.

"It's too bad because it cuts out a form of communication between the teachers and their students," Tillquist said. "A lot of us feel journal writing is very valuable, but teachers are nervous about that."

Tillquist has only had to refer a student to counseling once.

That was a student who had written a detailed suicide plan as part of a creative writing assignment, and who had no intention of carrying the plan out.

"He was one of the most creative writers we had," Tillquist said. "We called his parents and referred him to a counselor and he was humiliated."

In the state Supreme Court case, parents of a Meridian student sued the teacher and the district after their son killed himself. The teacher was negligent, the parents charged, because she didn't catch the suicide warning

and get the boy help. The Supreme Court agreed that the teacher and district were liable, and sent the case back to district court to determine the extent of liability.

C. Stephen Rowley, the legislative liaison for the Americans Civil Liberties Union, said the case raises serious constitutional questions for him.

"Why is a teacher more liable than a clergyman?" he asked. "Why is a teacher more liable than a psychiatrist or therapist? ... There's all kinds of problems with this."

Still, teachers acknowledge they would be at fault if they kept silent after receiving distress signals from their students.

Teachers and districts do respond to such signals and should be held responsible for "obvious" cries for help, said Wally Hedrick, chairman of the Meridian School board.

"The question is: 'What's obvious?'" he said.

## New Gem legislation would mandate kindergarten

**BOISE** — House Education Chairman Ron Black says he gets a lot of calls and letters from people whose children just miss the deadline for starting kindergarten.

"There's a lot of frustration out there," the Twin Falls Republican told the rest of the House Education Committee on Thursday. "We have moved the kindergarten starting date repeatedly."

Idaho law allows children to start kindergarten if they have turned age 5 by Sept. 1. Attendance is not mandatory, but the

Department of Education said every district has a program although some are just a few days per week.

A bill introduced in the Senate on Wednesday would make kindergartens compulsory and require children to attend.

At Black's request, the committee introduced a bill allowing parents of children close to the Sept. 1 cutoff to ask the school district to test their child to see if he or she is ready for kindergarten.

Parents would have to pay the \$25 for the test.

Black's bill requires the test to be

requested at least 45 days before the start of the school year.

Only children who turn age 5 in September–October–November and December of that school year would be considered, Black said.

He acknowledged that even with the change, not all parents will be satisfied with the cutoff date.

"No matter where you put it, some kid will be just missed," he said.

The committee also introduced a proposal from Rep. Elaine Hofman, D-Pocatello, to create an Idaho coordinator for the Missing

Children Clearing House. She said only Idaho, Utah and West Virginia don't have a worker to field telephone calls and collect and disseminate information about missing children.

"Idaho is a haven for those who want to hide children," she said.

Some committee members, however, seemed reluctant because Hofman said it would take \$50,000 to fund the position.

She acknowledged it might be hard to get the cash this year because state finances are tight.

But, she said, "It's a matter of what you decide is important."

## Immigrants keep Border Patrol busy

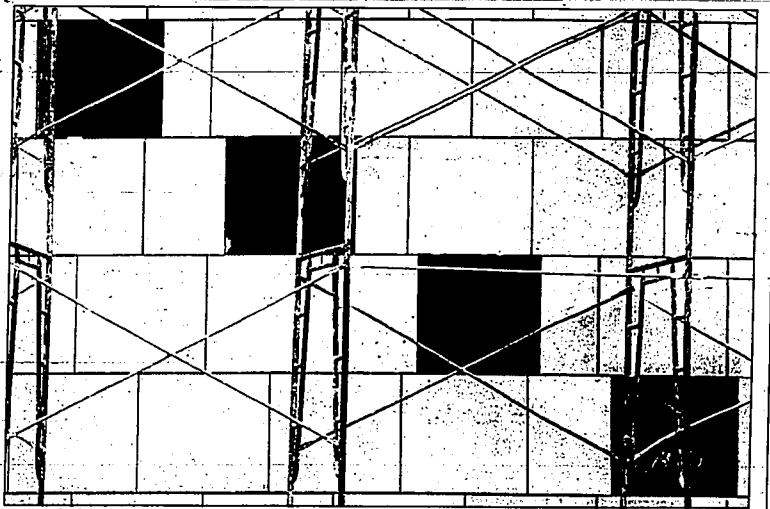
**WASHINGTON** — Border problems in Idaho often revolve around the influx of Canadian products, but federal officials say problems continue to grow in Twin Falls with illegal immigration from the nation's neighbor to the south.

"I could sit along the highway in Idaho and catch illegal immigrants all day long, but we don't have the agents for that," said Emil Orsak, the border control chief for the Havre, Mont., sector of the Immigration and Naturalization Service that covers Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Utah and Colorado.

Orsak reports that from fiscal 1994 to fiscal 1995, the patrol's apprehensions rose about 11 percent, which he says reflects the problem.

While no one knows how many illegal immigrants live or work in the inland West, Orsak said he believes his agents catch only a small percent. In his sector, records show 1,365 illegal aliens and their U.S. smugglers were caught in 1994, with 1,298 deportable aliens. Those figures rose to 1,517 apprehended in 1995, with 1,456 deportable aliens.

The most illegal aliens were apprehended in the Twin Falls area, where they were attracted by agricultural jobs, Orsak said. Three agents are stationed permanently in Twin Falls, and with backup, make 1,000 apprehensions last year — the most in the sector.

The rest of the 30-member force in the sector are stationed in eight Montana cities and towns including Harve, Billings, Shelby, Malta, Sweetgrass, Saint Marie, Plentywood and Seeley. They averaged 50 to 100 apprehensions each last year.

For the areas without Border Patrol agents permanently stationed, such as Wyoming and northern Idaho, agents are sent for special operations where they, for example, check on workers at food-processing plants.

The majority of the apprehensions are made at local jails where aliens are held on suspicion of other violations such as drunken driving. When local officials suspect someone has unlawfully entered the country, Border Patrol is called.

While Orsak said he needs more agents in the sector to handle the increasing problem, he participates in a program to put more agents on the Mexican border by sending two or three agents a month south for up to 30 days at a time.

## Minidoka ready to vote on water district

## Jerome adopts ordinance establishing impact area

**JEROME** — The City Council adopted an ordinance Tuesday evening, establishing the geographic boundaries for a proposed area of impact.

The impact area now goes to the county for consideration.

The 34-square-mile area extends north of Interstate-84, two miles east and two miles west of Jerome, to approximately two miles north of Jerome. The southern portion envelops the Interstate 84-U.S. Highway 93 interchange, about 24 miles east and west,

and 1 1/2 miles north of the junction.

The southern boundary is the middle of the Snake River. A small strip along the north side of the interstate connects the southern half with that portion surrounding the city limits.

Jerome City Administrator Jeff Bishop said the need for the impact zone was to ensure the council had a say in any development outside Jerome's city limits.

"If a company proposed a business outside our city limits, and we feel we may have an adverse impact on our water quality, for example, the city will have jurisdiction to act if that business is within the impact zone," Bishop said.

The area along the interstate to the interchange, and south to the Snake River is being included because Jerome officials believe much of that area will eventually be developed.

Also according to Bishop, the city cannot annex land unless it is within the area of impact.

In other business, the council:

- Created a drug free work place. All paid county employees will be tested for drug use, Mayor Gerald Oster said.

# Justice McDevitt: Judges need raise

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Legislature got something different this year when Supreme Court Chief Justice Charles McDevitt made his annual State of the Judiciary address.

Usually, the state's top judicial officer presents a report on the court system's accomplishments over the past year and its advances.

But on Thursday McDevitt went beyond the usual to forcefully urge lawmakers to give judges more support — like the first pay raise in three years.

"Our judges perform," he said. "They will continue to perform, but I submit they deserve your support."

House Republican Caucus Chairman John Tippetts of Bennington called it McDevitt's best address.

The chief justice deplored the way Idaho judges are being treated. He said constitutionalists or common law groups have swooped into two "warrant" for the arrest of judges.

In some areas, he said people have gone through the neighborhoods where judges live, passing out flyers with the names of the judges, their wives and children.

"They urge people to go make him do something different, to make him obey the law as they see it," McDevitt said. "Judges are being treated in a fashion that I don't feel is appropriate."

He indicated it was time for judges to get raises. Their last general raise was in 1993, he said, and the Idaho judiciary has now sunk to the second lowest-paid among the 16 western states. Only Montana pays less.

And legislative action this winter would not raise pay until July.

McDevitt said the two highest-paid professors at the University of Idaho get at least \$12,000 more than the highest-paid judge, and their jobs are not full-time.



House Appropriations Chairman Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, estimated it could cost \$2 million to give judges a pay raise this year.

As of Jan. 1, McDevitt, who gets top pay in the judicial system, received \$80,683 per year. Other Supreme Court justices get \$79,183. Court of Appeals judges are paid \$1,000 less. District judges get \$74,215 and lawyer magistrates are paid up to \$66,794.

As a district judge did the day before, McDevitt expressed optimism that the far-reaching Snake River Basin water rights adjudication will be successfully completed.

The court system has come in for its share of criticism because the adjudication, which started in 1987, might not be finished before

2007.

McDevitt said he has developed a good working relationship with Idaho's new water chief, Karl Drcher.

"I think we have had too much nay-saying. I believe the Snake River Basin adjudication can, will and must be decided, and must be decided near term," he said.

Now that basic issues are out of the way, he said, no later than the end of next year, decrees will come from the adjudication on 1,000 cases settled before special masters and on 11,900 uncontested claims in test areas. Out of 15,000 claims in those basins, he said, there will be less than 2,500 to go through full adjudication.

"The Snake River Basin adjudication is working," he said.

# 2 inches of snow closes Cassia County schools

BURLEY — The Cassia County School District closed its schools Wednesday after a winter storm and high winds pelted the Mini-Cassia area.

Superintendent Everett Howard said though the storm only yielded about two inches of snow over most of the county, district officials determined that the storm was severe enough to jeopardize the safety of the students.

"Safety is our number one concern, and on Wednesday morning at 6 a.m. visibility was zero in several parts of the district," said Howard. "The wind chill factor was atrocious, and that also concerns us

because if a bus gets stuck or in an accident in that kind of weather it can threaten a lot of students."

Howard explained that district Transportation Supervisor Leon Robinson, gets up at 3 a.m. on stormy days and checks problem areas along bus routes throughout the county. A determination on whether to close schools is made at 6 a.m. based on visibility, snow drifts, wind chill and other variables.

Once the decision is made, calls go out to two local radio stations, one television station and a district-wide telephone call down system for notification. He added that district employees also go to the schools and inform anyone who shows up that school is closed.

"I worked in McCall for ten years,

and I only closed the schools once for snow and once for ice there. I don't think we jumped the gun on this one," he said. "My primary concern is always for the safety of the children."

Howard added that students won't have to make up for the missed day. He said if there are two or three more days when school is closed because of weather the district would then schedule additional days in May.

Robinson said about 3,000 students in Cassia County ride the bus to school. The district has approximately 5,350 students. The district's busses log about 700,000 miles per year collectively.

When he takes his 3 a.m. rides, Robinson said he looks for long,

deep snow drifts and areas with low visibility. He can tell where he needs to go to look for drifts and check for bad areas by the way the wind is blowing, he said.

"A school bus can buck through some drifts but if there are too many we don't run," he said.

"But sometimes we make our decision by 6 a.m. and then by 7 a.m. all of a sudden everything has changed."

Neighboring Minidoka County School District did not close schools on Wednesday, according to a district official.

names for the board, according to Minidoka County Clerk Duane Smith.

Neibaur said the need for water districts and well monitoring sprang out of a "call" for water from A&B Irrigation District in 1994. He explained that when irrigator or irrigation company "calls" for water, the company is in effect stating that its supply has depleted and another irrigator who obtained water rights later in time must relinquish those rights in favor of the caller.

A spokesman for A&B Irrigation was not available for comment Thursday.

"When A&B called for water in 1994, it put a lot of pressure on all of us," Neibaur said. "We don't want to put anyone out of business but we need to manage our water better."

He added that the state's requirement to monitor groundwater pumps will effect municipal wells, wells used for manufacturing purposes and virtually everyone who pumps

groundwater except for domestic wells.

He said watching the groundwater level drop nearly 30 feet in the past 45 years concerns him because it costs more to lift the water back to the surface for irrigation. But in relation to the amount of groundwater the aquifer actually contains, he said nobody really knows how deep it is.

"I think we will have serious problems if the aquifer keeps dropping,"

he said. "We need to continue to look at ways to recharge it."

Historically, seepage from flood irrigation on the Eastern Snake River Plain raised the level of the aquifer. But the development of efficient pumps has led irrigators to favor sprinklers fed by deep wells over flood irrigation, resulting in less aquifer recharge. The aquifer has been dropping back toward historic levels since the 1950s.

(You can't help but wonder how he would have reacted had the baby been a girl.)


But his revelation may have come too late, for the intolerant, prissy Rebecca has become fed up with him for missing another of her medical appointments and has moved out. Now Samuel must convince her that he's a changed man and win her back before her water breaks. Should he fail, the film will end without the farcical race to the delivery room pioneered by the Ricardos.

When Rebecca goes into premature labor and is hospitalized, Samuel rushes to her bedside to beg her forgiveness. "I was a disgrace," he apologizes. "You had every right to walk out on me." It could almost

be dialogue from "The Tonight Show."

Alongside these casual American actors, Grant's comic overreactions — the mugging, the stuttering, the flustering exclaims — are too broad, vaudevillian. 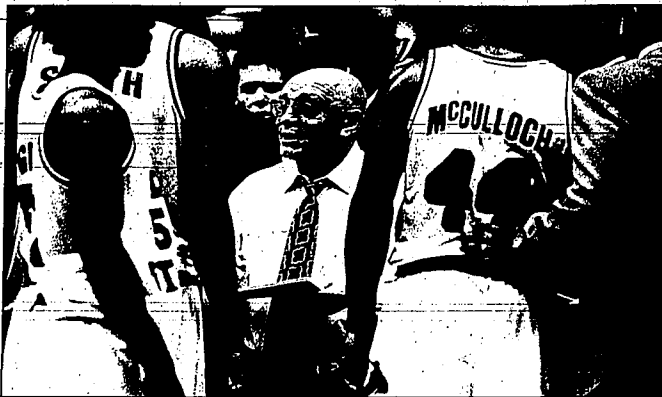


# Success, trouble for another Tarkanian team

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — Success on the court, trouble off it. Those elements have been constants in the coaching career of Jerry Tarkanian, and his first year at Fresno State has been no exception. The coach with the best winning percentage in college basketball history, Tarkanian has turned around a team that has had just two winning seasons in the past decade. Now, the Bulldogs are battling for the Western Athletic Conference lead after knocking off ranked teams New Mexico and Utah. They're threatening to reach the NCAA tournament for the first time since 1984. And this city has gone wild over Tarkanian, who graduated from Fresno State in 1955 after playing for the Bulldogs for two seasons.

Young and McCulloch. Tarkanian had warned his players to stay out of trouble on New Year's Eve, and several players said the coach has talked at length about life off the court. "He doesn't lecture about the game of basketball," McCulloch said, "he lectures about life." Bakke added that Tarkanian has talked from the first day of practice about how thankful the players

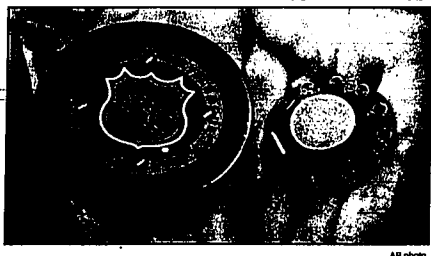

## Baltimore sues over Browns

ATLANTA (AP) — NFL owners agreed Thursday to vote in three weeks on the Browns' move. That's not quick enough for Baltimore, which is suing the league, seeking at least \$36 million in damages. "The Browns belong to Baltimore," said Jim Moag, chairman of the Maryland Stadium Authority. "And we couldn't be prouder to have them there." Moag said the lawsuit, filed in U.S. District Court in Baltimore, was a "preemptive strike" that was necessary when owners failed to vote on the issue after three days of meetings at an airport hotel in Atlanta. "The league has bent over backwards to allow (Cleveland) Mayor Michael White to present his case, once again the owners have failed to vote on the matter," Moag said. "Sitting there while the suit was curious considering it came about an hour after NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue announced the owners would convene again on Feb. 9, most likely in Dallas, to vote on the issue."

## NHL, Fox hope SuperPuck makes its mark on game

BOSTON (AP) — Ever since 1875, when some students in Toronto decided that ice hockey would be better if they sliced the sides off the ball, the puck has stayed pretty much the same. But convinced that the sport's growth was being stunted because the puck is too hard to see on television, the NHL and the Fox network on Thursday unveiled an electronically enhanced puck they hope will end the sport's long-running cold war with TV viewers. "This is a sport that has a small fan base on television compared to the other major sports," Boston Bruins general manager Harry Sinden said after watching a demonstration at the FleetCenter, where the SuperPuck will debut in Saturday's NHL All-

Star game. "For us to keep up, if we're going to have to pay these players, we're going to have to get more money out of television." And the secret to that, the league is betting, is "FoxTrax," a tracking system like something James Bond might pick up in Q branch if he were assigned to tail Wayne Gretzky. On the ice, the new puck is indistinguishable from a regular one, the same size and within one one-hundredth of a gram of an official six-ounce puck. Held in your hand, the only clue is the 12 dots — infrared emitters — around the perimeter and four on each side. But when shot from a special camera, the SuperPuck is seen on television with a fidgety halo that follows it around like a little brother.

With the click of a mouse in the "Puck Truck" outside, the halo turned white — any shape or color can be used — and it gave a spotlighting effect that was much less distracting. "With computer graphics, it can look like anything from Roger Rabbit to Gumbly," Fox vice president Jerry Gepner said. The least offensive innovation, at least among those assembled, was the electronic comet tail that trails a slapshot. While a red streak follows the puck's path, a box appears in the lower right corner of the screen giving the speed of the shot. And so, while video games race to make their graphics more like the real thing, the NHL and Fox have turned hockey into something out of Sega.

## Gretzky center of attention as All-Star Game nears

BOSTON (AP) — Wayne Gretzky has been the center of attention at many NHL All-Star games. He will be again Saturday night — in more ways than one. The Los Angeles Kings' star, who usually faces a media circus at these games, is expected to get more than the usual attention because of his current dealings with his team's management. Gretzky will be a free agent after this season and right now, he's not happy to be a King. He probably won't be wearing a Kings' uniform after this season, unless management meets his demands to acquire another quality scorer and

defenseman to make the team more competitive. "Otherwise, Gretzky has said, he wants to be traded so he can realize his dream of winning another Stanley Cup before he retires. He has four, all with the Edmonton Oilers before he was traded to Los Angeles in 1988. Earlier, Gretzky had given the Kings a "deadline" to get his situation straightened out by the All-Star game. The Kings' management is working under its own schedule. "Teams are seemingly lining up for Gretzky, the most prominently mentioned the St. Louis Blues, Toronto Maple Leafs and New York

Rangers. Not that the Kings are anxious to deal hockey's all-time leading scorer and most prominent player. Always the classiest of athletes, Gretzky has uncharacteristically gone public this time to emphasize his point. He said during an interview on a national sports cable network that he wouldn't mind playing with the Blues because of Brett Hull. Gretzky and Hull are close friends. Hull would like nothing better. "Who wouldn't want to have the opportunity to play with Gretzky?" Hull, who in fact played with the Great One at the All-Star

game in Philadelphia in 1992. For now, Hull will just have to content to play with Gretzky on the Western Conference All-Star team against the Eastern Conference at the FleetCenter. Gretzky will start at center and Hull will play right wing. Vancouver's Pavel Bure had been voted by the fans to be the starting left wing for the Western Conference, but was sidelined for the season with an injury. He will be replaced by Anaheim's Paul Kariya. Chicago's Chris Chelios and Detroit's Paul Coffey will start on defense for the West, with the Blackhawks' Ed Belfour in goal.

Browns owner Art Modell needs approval from 23 of the 30 owners to move his team but there are serious doubts a negative vote would be successful in bringing the team to Maryland." "This suit shows we stand united and resolute with Mr. Modell."

Stocks rise on strong earnings, but sentiment is weak

NEW YORK (AP) — Investors rewarded strong profit reports by driving major stock indexes higher on Thursday, but many individual stocks stumbled on mounting concern about the economy.

The New York Stock Exchange Broad indexes finished mostly higher. The NYSE's composite index rose 0.86 to 3261.15, the Standard & Poor's 500-stock index rose 1.87 to 608.24 and the Nasdaq composite index rose 8.94 to 1,007.24.

Gains in just a few shares pushed the Dow index higher. IBM surged 8% to 96% after the computer giant said fourth-quarter earnings were \$3.09 per share after special charges, up from \$2.06 last year, on a 10-percent increase in revenues.

Micron chief leaves after 15-month stint

BOISE (AP) — Steve Appleton, the 35-year-old wunderkind who rose from production line worker to chairman of Micron Technology Inc. in less than a dozen years, resigned from the semiconductor company on Thursday.

In a terse one-page statement, the Boise-based company said Appleton had resigned as chairman, chief executive officer, president and a director of Micron "for personal reasons," effective immediately.

Micron said Tyler Lowrey, vice chairman of the board and chief technical officer, was elected chairman and chief executive officer Thursday.

The company said Appleton would continue to serve in a consulting capacity for about nine months. He also resigned as a director of Micron Electronics Inc., a subsidiary of Micron Technology.

Appleton, a protégé of Micron founder and former chairman Joe Parkinson, joined Micron in February 1983 and worked in various manufacturing and management positions until April 1988, when he was named director of manufacturing.

Lowrey, 42, joined Micron in July 1984 as a senior-process engineer. He became a process research and development/device group manager in March 1986 and was promoted to vice president of process research and development and assistant technical officer in September 1986.

Now this young star gets to experience something entirely new: a normal teenage-life.

Norwood (who had a role in the sitcom "Then") stars in her first lead role as a young teen-ager coping with the everyday pressures of growing up in the '90s in "Moesha," a new UPN sitcom premiering Tuesday, Jan. 23.

"I've never really experienced some of the things Moesha will experience because I haven't grown up in schools and stuff like that," Norwood explains. "I haven't been able to be late for class and go to my locker and go out for cheerleading, because I've been in the singing industry. But I know I would have experienced that if I wasn't a singer. (The

show) brings me back to what it would be like if I wasn't one."

This new series is told through the eyes of Moesha Mitchell, an intelligent teen-ager with a positive attitude and sharp wit, which sometimes gets her in trouble.

"She is so positive," Norwood says. "She isn't like the other girls in school. She wants to be a writer. Her focus is on school and growing up with her family and hanging with her friends, being there when her friends need her."

Until recently it was just Moesha, her father, Frank (William Allen Young), and her little brother, Myles (Marcus T. Paulk). She is forced to cope with another female in the house, her new stepmother, Dee (Sheryl Lee Ralph).

"At first it's kind of hard for (Moesha) to accept the fact that some lady whom her father married—that's the way she thinks of her—is coming into their lives and ironing her father's clothes and cooking breakfast," Norwood says.

But, gradually Moesha

and Dee form a trusting relationship, giving Moesha someone she can talk to when the chips are down.

"And if she can't tell Dee something, she can always tell her best friend Kim or Andell, the person who works in The Den (the local hangout)," Norwood says.

Kim (Countess Vaughn) is Moesha's longtime friend who is a perfect example of someone who is "boy-crazy." She is not shy at all about telling a boy just how good he looks.

Andell (Yvette Wilson) is the owner of the teens' hangout, The Den, who is always willing to give good advice to Moesha when she needs it.

Moesha's other good friend is Hakem (Lamont Bentley), her next-door neighbor and lifelong friend. He seems to be there whenever Moesha needs him, and whenever it is mealtime in the Mitchell home.

Moesha knows if she can't talk to somebody about her problems, she can always confide in her trusted diary. Through this technique, viewers are able to hear her

thoughts as she sorts out her problems.

Moesha deals with the common problems teen-agers face: relationships, friends, school and pimples. But she proves it is possible to make it through the teen years without too many scars.

"(There's) an episode where Moesha's friend gets the spotlight and she's jealous of her," Norwood says. "In another episode, she helps her other best friend, Hakem, get a job. And her sweet 16 party's coming up and her dad says she can't date (at 16), and he's worried that his daughter's going to have sex."

"I think this show is reality. The things we talk about are real life. There are positive issues that people really need to look at."

Norwood says her music will be taking a back seat while she focuses on her show.

"But I am going to start another album in March. By that time the show should be done and waiting to see whether it gets picked up. If (the show) comes back, I'm going to be right on the TV show."

# Maher to host talk show on ABC

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — "Politically incorrect" is jumping next year from cable's Comedy Central to ABC, where it will follow "Nightline" and add to the late-night competition with Jay Leno and David Letterman.

"Politically Incorrect" hosted by comedian Bill Maher, will begin airing on ABC in January 1997, the network announced Thursday.

"Nightline" already performs well against the first half-hour of NBC's "Tonight Show" with Leno and CBS' "Late Show" with Letterman. Pairing it with "Politically Incorrect" could make ABC a full challenger.

But first, the network has to gain clearances for the show from ABC affiliates and stations, which currently air local programming and could choose to show "Politically Incorrect" at a later hour.

The talk show will remain on Comedy Central through this year, then move from New York to Los Angeles. It will be taped each weekday for its late-night broadcast.

Maher brings together unlikely combinations of guests to discuss issues of the day. One typically atypical panel included actor Tom Arnold, GOP political operative Russ Hodge, Norcisco owner Victor Kizam and Lisa Siwa of Guardian An-

gels fame.  
ABC programming head Ted Harbert said Thursday the show will be a "perfect combination" with "Nightline," the news program hosted by Ted Koppel.

Then she landed the understudy gig in the wonderful off-Broadway show "Four Dogs and a Bone" — un-

derstudying none other than Kim Zimmer. She eventually got to play the other female lead and the two actresses worked very well together.

"It just goes to show you how strange show business can be. A year later, I'm in "Guiding Light" playing opposite Kim once again. Before landing the part of Annie, I auditioned like mad. I was sent out for anything and everything. In fact, I auditioned for two other roles on "Guiding Light" and lost both of them. But then Annie came along and I joined the soap."

Cynthia can't say enough good things about co-star Robert Newman, who plays Josh. She points out that he has a genuine respect for women and a good moral and religious background. "People respect you if you come prepared, knowing your lines and showing up on time. "Guiding Light" is made up of a bunch of top professionals and I feel lucky to be part of the group. And being in a New York-based soap allows me to pursue theater jobs, too. I don't want to ever stray too far from the theatre."

# 'A Current Affair' won't return next fall

NEW YORK (AP)—In the parlance of tabloid TV, here is a story you may find shocking: "A Current Affair," the granddaddy of syndicated news magazines, is finished after September.

Despite improved ratings in a less tawdry format, "Affair" won't be returning for the 1996-97 season, Twentieth Television, the show's distributor, announced Wednesday. "A Current Affair" has had a wonderful nine-year run and has been a tremendous asset to Twentieth Television," said Rick Jacobson, the company's president. "The show is as good as it's ever been right now."

However, "Affair," the nation's first syndicated tabloid show and long the ratings leader, had in recent years slipped to the No. 2 slot behind the shows it inspired: "Hard Copy" and current front-runner "Inside Edition."

In a highly competitive syndication marketplace, the show's continued presence in certain key cities was in doubt. "It wasn't economically feasible to program under those circumstances," Jacobson said.

Launched nationally on Fox-owned stations in June 1987, the show was re-launched in September as "The New A Current Affair" with former "Dateline NBC" correspondent John Scott anchoring. Thus far this season its audience has grown from 3.24 million to 3.91 million house-

holds. But the show remains in third place.

John Tomlin and Bob Young, with the show at its inception, returned last spring as co-executive producers to determine its re-introduction. Pledging to "take out the sleaze," they said they would no longer pay for interviews and announced a new emphasis on investigative stories.

The team has a development deal with Twentieth Television that will extend beyond "Affair's" demise.

"We look forward to working with them on additional projects for network, cable and syndication," Jacobson said.

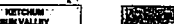

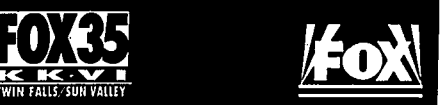

# Look for 'Roseanne' next season - maybe as a single mom

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) - Roseanne may be back next season with her hit show - and without co-star John Goodman, the network hinted Thursday.

Roseanne is "excited" about the kinds of stories she could do portraying a single parent if Goodman leaves "Roseanne," said ABC programming chief Ted Harbert.

"We want the show back" and are in negotiations with producer Carsey-Werner Co. that could be concluded next week, Harbert said. It would be the show's ninth season. Roseanne and the sitcom's other actors have said for months that the eighth would be their last.

Goodman has indicated that he wants to pursue films. A decision has yet to be made about how Goodman's character would be written out of the series, Harbert said.

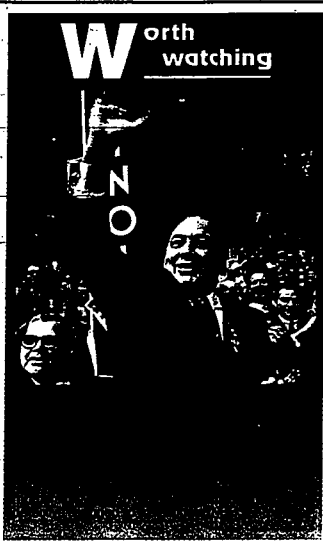
Also Thursday, Harbert predicted a resurgence to family shows after a disappointing rush toward "Friends"-like programs.

Speaking to the Television Critics Association, Harbert said the attempt to attract the advertiser-coveted 18-to-49 audience contributed to a dip in broadcast viewing levels this season.

"Samesen kills," he said of the number of local-like shows cast in the mold of NBC's "Friends," about young singles. That emphasis also ends up excluding children-and-older-viewers, Harbert said.

"We do have the desire to pursue the family audience," he said, although he said ABC won't ignore the prime young adult demographic.

If family shows are the plan, the network has gained a big gun in its own backyard. ABC's upcoming programs is a Saturday night movie from Disney, which is putting big re-



sources into the project, Harbert said.

He also said that if "Murder One" survives its first season of disappointing ratings, ABC may consider the unusual move of airing it regularly as a midseason-show rather than with a traditional fall start.

The one-ace legal serial that was bounced from Thursday to Monday by NBC powerhouse "ER" failed to perform well in its first Monday night outing against CBS' "Chicago Hope" and a TV movie starring Tui Spelling of "Beverly Hills, 90210" fame.

Harbert stopped short of committing to airing all 23 episodes of the "Murder One," but said, "It would be a pretty tough thing for the network not to let (viewers) know how it ends."

# 'Seinfeld' back for 8th season

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — NBC and the star of its highest rated comedy, Jerry Seinfeld, confirmed Monday that they are passing up a chance to quit while they're on top. "Seinfeld" is returning for an eighth season.

Don't-be-say-he-intended to leave audiences wanting more, Seinfeld was asked during the announcement at a Television Critics Association meeting. "Right, and they want more," the comedian replied.

Critics lamented a slip in quality last year but the show regained its creative footing and is a linchpin of NBC's powerful Thursday night schedule that includes the drama "ER."

TV Guide reported last week that "Seinfeld" was being renewed, but the network would not comment until Monday, when NBC Entertainment President Warren Littlefield announced schedule changes for the current season.

The action-adventure "JAG" will shift from Saturday to 8 p.m. EST Wednesday starting March 13. The comedy "Brotherly Love," starring the three Lawrence brothers, will return March 4 for a seven-week stint in the 8:30 p.m. EST Monday slot.

The sitcom's performance will determine whether it is renewed, Littlefield said.

Among the contenders for "JAG's" Saturday night spot: "Malibu Shores," a new drama about rival rich-and-working class high schools from producer Aaron Spelling ("Beverly Hills, 90210"). It's set for a spring debut.

Littlefield suggested time slot changes could be in store at some point for "The Single Guy" and "Crawling in the City," and sitcoms launched this season on Thursday to take advantage of NBC's high viewership. If the series show,

enough strength, they would be expected to help anchor another night and clear the launching pad for new shows.

The increasingly racy nature of early evening sitcoms prompted several questions.

Littlefield admitted that NBC had received some complaints about a recent episode of "Mad About You," which included the comic efforts of young marrieds Paul and Jamie (Paul Reiser, Helen Hunt) to conceive a baby.

"We stepped over the line," Littlefield said, and the network and producers will work more closely to try to avoid future excesses.

There also will be less "body-part humor" on the new comedy "3rd Rock from the Sun," the executive said, but added: "I'm not gonna say it turns into 'The Waltons' half-hour."

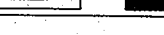

# Diceman goeth, Anderson cometh

NEW YORK (AP) — "Bless This House," starring Andrew (formerly "Dice") Clay and Cathy Moriarty, has been canceled, replaced by "The Louie Show," starring comedian-Louie-Anderson. CBS announced Wednesday.

"Bless This House," the fifth CBS series to be canceled this season, will air for the last time on Wednesday, Jan. 17, and "The Louie Show" will premiere on Jan. 31, the eve of the February ratings sweep. Moriarty and Clay played a 1990s-style

"Honeymooners"-on the sitcom, a working-class couple trying to improve their lives.

It was the first series venture for Moriarty ("Kagney The Bull," "Spadfish") and Clay, a comedian whose career nosedived in the '80s after critics denounced his material as racist, sexist and homophobic.

In "The Louie Show," the portly Anderson plays a psychotherapist in Duluth, Minn., whose "unfairly honest" gets him into difficult and often hilarious professional and personal situations.

# Turner plans sports show

NEW YORK (AP) — Ted Turner is considering starting a 24-hour sports news network in a move that would put him in the same arena as cable powerhouse ESPN, the trade publication Advertising Age reported Monday.

The sports news and information service is seen as a way to leverage Turner's cable News Network news brand much the way he has with the recent start of the financial news channel CNN, the report said.

It said news channels on health and entertainment also are being discussed.

Calls to Atlanta-based Turner Broadcasting System Inc. for comment were not immediately returned.

The report said Turner is expected to present his case for the sports news network to the Turner Broadcasting board in mid-February.

It said senior Turner executives have conducted extensive research on the subject and feel there is room for yet another entry in the market for sports TV.

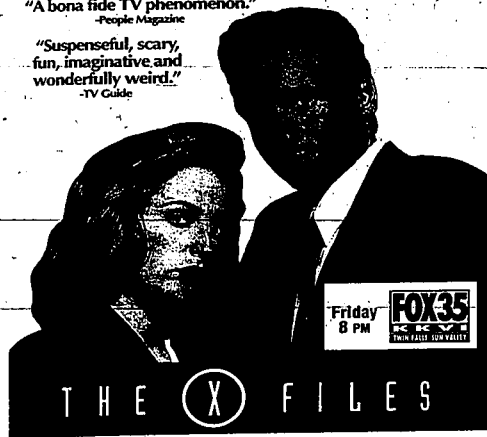
