Idaho snow piles up in January

TWIN FALLS - With nearly two-thirds of the snow-accumulation season over, virtually all of the mountain snowpacks across southern Idaho and western Wyoming are larger than average for this time of year.

That, coupled with a reservoir system 86 percent full, has all but guaranteed this year's cup will run over for farmers, hydroelectric generators and whitewater boaters.

"With the reservoirs almost full and the tremendous snowpacks, there will have to be a lot of water flowing this spring," said Phil Morrissey, Boise-based hydrologist with the federal snow survey of the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

"If the snowfall shut off completely for the next two months, we'd still be up around 70 to 75 percent of average," he said. "However, the chances of it being totally dry for the next two months are really remote. Even if we get only half of normal, we'd still wind up with a good snow year."

November, December and January are the biggest snow-producing months of the year, Morrissey said, adding that snowpacks typically peak around April 1.

The cornerstone of southern Idaho's water supply is the Snake River basin upstream of Palisades Reservoir, where snowpacks are 34 percent larger than the long-term average for this time of year.

"That basin has been high all year, and it's still creeping upwards," Morrissey said. Elsewhere Friday, snowpacks were:

- 22 percent larger than average in the Bruneau River drainage.
17 percent bigger in the Goose, Trapper and Salmon Falls creek basins.
15 percent larger in the Wood River drainage.
12 percent bigger in the Henrys-Fork basin.

7 percent larger in the Lost River drainage.

1 percent smaller than average in the Owyhee River basin.

Basins on the south side of the Snake River showed the biggest gains in January, Morrissey said, noting that snowpacks doubled in the Owyhee River drainage.

"It looks like the southern end of the state really picked up the increase in January," Morrissey said, adding that most of the increase came at the tail end of the middle of the month.

Farther north, snowpacks in the Panhandle are languishing below normal levels, Morrissey said.

Cold brings record lows to Twin Falls

TWIN FALLS - Uncompromisingly cold weather has rewritten the record books for the first two days of February with Friday's low fully 13 degrees colder than the previous record at the National Weather Service station near Kimberly.

Information provided by NWS Observer Bill Galkin sounds like a sequel to "Ice Station Zebra" - with the mercury plunging to 17 degrees below zero on Thursday and Friday's low tickling the mercury at 16 below. Previous records for those dates, set in 1985, were 9 and 3 degrees below zero, respectively.

Don't look for things to get much better today, because the NWS is predicting more brutally cold weather.

The entire month of January, by contrast, produced only one day with sub-zero temperatures at the local NWS observation station. A low of two degrees below zero was logged there on Jan. 22, Galkin said.

Overall, the average local temperature for the month of January was 30.2 degrees - some 3.3 degrees warmer than a typical January, Galkin said.

"We had only two temperature drops into the teens in the first three weeks of January," Galkin said. "All of the other lows were in the 20s and 30s - which is pretty warm for January."

"Most of the daytime temperatures were in the 30s and 40s," he said, noting the highest temperature was 50 degrees on Jan. 14.

Temperatures began to slide in the final nine days of the month, but the deep freeze, fortunately, hasn't been accompanied by much wind.

The chilling effect of wind makes cold temperatures seem much colder on bare skin, Galkin said. For instance, a 10 mph wind at 10 below zero has all the charm of 33 degrees below zero.

Cold-weather buffs of a certain age might remember Twin Falls' all-time record low of 30 degrees below zero - set on Jan. 19, 1922, Galkin said.

Other notable nadirs were 29 below zero on Christmas Day, 1924, and 24 below on Feb. 9, 1933, he said. The all-time local low for March was a relatively torrid 3 below zero, set on March 17, 1906.

Even polar bears have rough time in Midwest zoos

MINNEAPOLIS - Eyelashes froze together. A cup of boiling water tossed in the air turned into a puff of snow before hitting the ground.

Polar bears' feet froze and left bloody pawprints at the zoo.

And a banana froze hard enough to pound nails as the temperature plunged to 60 below zero in the little town of Tower.

The deadly Arctic cold front that has held the Plains, the Midwest and much of the South in its grip for at least a week showed no signs of letting up Friday, breaking temperature records that had stood for a century.

Throughout much of the nation, pipes froze, overworked heating systems broke down, car batteries quit and schools were closed. Tens of thousands of customers throughout the South lost electricity when ice-laden branches pulled down power lines.

School shots leave 3 dead

MOSES LAKE, Wash. - A 14-year-old boy with a high-powered rifle killed a teacher and two students and seriously wounded another student Friday in a junior high school classroom, police said.

The student was arrested shortly after he entered Frontier Junior High School on Friday afternoon, went to a classroom and began firing, police said.

"Numerous shots were fired, and one teacher and three students were shot," Sgt. Dennis Duke said in a statement.

A 13-year-old girl who was shot in the abdomen was flown to Harborview Medical Center in Seattle, where she underwent surgery Friday night, Harborview spokeswoman Pam Love said. The girl, who earlier underwent exploratory surgery at Samaritan Hospital in this Eastern Washington community about 150 miles east of Seattle, was not immediately identified.

Killed were Leona D. Cairns, 49, and students Arnold F. Fritz and Manuel Vela, both 14, Grant County Coroner Penny Sibley said.

A seventh grader who went to the school Friday night to receive counseling said he was in a health class room across the hallway from the shootings and heard five shots.

"It was very loud. It was very scary. I had no idea what was happening," the student, who would not give his name, told The Associated Press.

"When the shots rang out, the students fled through classroom windows and took refuge at a nearby church, the student said.

Movie dance great Kelly dies

LOS ANGELES - Gene Kelly, who splashed through puddles with athletic exuberance in "Singin' in the Rain" and kicked up his heels in "On the Town" and "Anchors Aweigh," died Friday. He was 83.

A former ditch digger whose choreography grew so influential even Madonna and Michael Jackson consulted him, Kelly died at his home of complications from strokes suffered over the last two years, publicist Warren Cowan said.

Unlike his older contemporary Fred Astaire, whose black-tie dance steps were elegant and measured, Kelly was a muscular, regular-guy showman whose joyful dancing captured the postwar American mood.

Boisily handsome and possessing Irish charm, he ran across the stage, jumped over furniture and out-mad-windmills with his arms, and usually did it in white socks, loafers, rolled-up short sleeves and khakis.

"He once told me dancing was a man's game, as much of a sport as baseball itself," Liz Minifield said. "And he made us believe that. He changed our minds and suddenly, all of America wanted to dance just like Gene Kelly."

His most enduring cinematic image was an exuberant, rain-drenched spin around a streetlight in 1952's "Singin' in

the Rain," widely considered the greatest American musical ever made.

Other memorable performances came in "For Me and My Gal" (his 1942 screen debut opposite Judy Garland), "Anchors Aweigh" in 1945, "On the Town" in 1949, and, in 1951, "An American in Paris," which won eight Oscars, including best picture.

Born in Pittsburgh in 1912, Eugene Curran Kelly started dancing as a child and worked briefly as a dance instructor, service station attendant and fish distributor. While studying at the University of Pittsburgh, he took part in campus musicals and entered talent contests in a dancing act with his brother Fred.

After graduating in 1933 and dropping out of law school, he danced with his brother in theaters and nightclubs and helped

out at his mother's dancing school.

Appearing in a revue in Pittsburgh, he was spotted by a dance director who brought him to Broadway, where he made his debut in the 1936 Cole Porter musical "Leave It to Me."

Then it was on to Hollywood.

After serving in the Navy's Photographic Section during World War II, Kelly reigned at MGM in the postwar era, when the studio was the pre-eminent producer of movie musicals.

Kelly gave a bravura performance in "An American in Paris." He created the

dances, climaxed by the 17-minute ballet with Leslie Caron to George Gershwin's music.

"I've always held that you shouldn't underestimate the intelligence of the movie audience," Kelly once said. "That's where Hollywood has made a

Idaho weather summary

Chill temperatures hung on across the Magic Valley Friday with readings well below zero in the morning and not far above zero in the afternoon.

Fog and smoke blocked the sun much of the morning.

Cloud cover hung on over the southwest and north sections of Idaho Friday but did little to ease extreme cold temperatures.

Precipitation was reported in the southwest but amounted only to trace amounts.

High temperatures around the state ranged from a few degrees above zero to the upper teens after another night of subzero readings.

Winds remained light across the entire state.

Cold locks Plains, Midwest in icy grip

Deadly Arctic cold settled across the Plains and the Midwest Friday, shattering temperature records like icicles and menacing the Eastern seaboard.

Freezing rain and sleet left an icy coating on southern states from Texas to the East Coast. The central Gulf Coast was pummeled by thunderstorms and the threat of tornadoes.

Snow fell from Oklahoma to the central Appalachians, reaching six inches or deeper in parts of Tennessee, Kentucky, West Virginia and Virginia. Eleven inches had fallen in Knoxville, Tenn., by noon.

Bands of heavy lake-effect snow produced up to six inches in parts of western New York in the morning.

Tens of thousands of customers in Louisiana, Arkansas and Mississippi lost electricity as ice-laden branches pulled down power lines. Schools closed and most state workers were told to stay home.

Southernmost Florida escaped the punishment as temperatures climbed to 80 degrees in Key West by midday. At the same hour, West Yellowstone, Mont., watched the mercury fall to 49 below zero, while Grand Marais, Minn., registered a wind-chill of minus 80.

The nation's low was set in Tower, Minn., where the 60-below reading also broke the all-time record for the entire state.

Record lows for the date were reached early Friday in Montana, South Dakota, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Colorado and Illinois.

Some measures of the Minnesota cold:

- In Tower, where the temperature dropped to a record low of minus 60, a frozen banana was used to pound nails and an soap bubbles froze instantly.
- People were warned about pierced ears and body parts because metal jewelry can freeze to the flesh.
- Small dog owners had to interrupt calls to nature to let their pets go back inside to warm up.
- When eggs were cracked on a sidewalk in St. Paul, the whites hardened in 45 seconds, the yolks in just over 3 minutes.

Train wreckage yields 'black box'

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. — A "black box" recorder that may provide clues to the lethal derailment of a 49-car freight train in the Cajon Pass was recovered by federal safety officials Friday as firefighters worked to extinguish still-smouldering fires in the wreckage.

But the hazardous chemicals that had fueled the flames and sent noxious fumes boiling into the air burned themselves out, reducing the blaze and allowing the California Highway Patrol to reopen nearby Interstate 15, the principal highway between Los Angeles and Las Vegas, early Friday afternoon.

Federal investigators hope to learn more about what caused Thursday's derailment of the Burlington Northern-Santa Fe train through analysis of data from the recorder, which was retrieved from the wreckage of the lead locomotive.

The device was found relatively intact, said Alan Pollock, a spokesman for the National Transportation Safety Board. But he said initial attempts to download the data into a computer brought to the crash site were unsuccessful.

The recorder, which stores information on the train's speed and its throttle and brake settings, was being flown to the NTSB's laboratory in Washington, where experts will endeavor to pick its electronic brain.

"We're not yet sure how good the readings are," Pollock said.

Data from the recorder could help explain why the train careened off its tracks along a curving stretch of the treacherous downhill grade that divides the San Gabriel and San Bernardino mountains, killing two of its three crew members.

The NTSB also was seeking copies of radio communications between the crew and the railroad's dispatch center, Pollock said. There are unconfirmed reports crew members radioed frantically that the train was accelerating out of control and they were preparing to jump from it.

The Upper Snake River reservoir system was 86 percent full on Friday, said Mike Beus, with the Bureau of Reclamation in Burley.

Reservoirs in the Upper Snake catch 4.16 billion acre-feet of water; one acre-foot is enough to cover one acre with one foot of water, or 325,850 gallons.

The biggest reservoir in the system, American Falls, was 86 percent full on Friday, while the second-largest, Palisades, was 97 percent full.

Jackson Lake Reservoir, the system's third-largest, was 80 percent full, Beus said. Lake Walcott Reservoir, near Rupert, was 41 percent full — only six inches below its normal winter level.

The film won the Academy Award as best picture of 1951, and Kelly was given a special award "in appreciation of his versatility as actor, singer, director and dancer, and especially for his brilliant achievements in the art of choreography on film."

As Astaire's star faded, Kelly's ascended. Even though their careers overlapped, the two danced together only twice: in 1946's "Ziegfeld Follies" and at the end of their dancing careers in a light-footed duet for 1976's "That's Entertainment Part II."

Kelly had more unusual dance partners in "Anchors Aweigh," sharing the screen with cartoon characters such as Tom and Jerry. The film, which also starred Frank Sinatra and Katharine Grayson, won him a 1945 Oscar nomination as best actor.

and Kelly's knees started to weaken. Kelly branched out to dramatic roles: His good-guy persona was so well established that some of the dramatic roles fizzled. His last movie role came in 1980's "Yankees."

In addition to influencing Jackson and Madonna, Kelly's work was imitated by Paula Abdul. Jackson said in a statement: "He is, and will always remain, an inspiration."

In 1940 Kelly married actress Betsy Blair, and they had a daughter, Kerry. The marriage ended in divorce in 1957. In 1960 he married his dance assistant, Jeanne Coyne, and they had a daughter, Bridget, and son, Timothy. Kelly raised the children after his wife's death in 1973.

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Louisiana town readies for presidential caucus

IOWA, La. (AP) — Just off Interstate 10 on the outskirts of Louisiana's Cajun country, a tall blue water tower emblazoned with the word Iowa gives visitors the first hint there's a town beyond the swamps.

Iowa — and that's pronounced EYE-uh-way around these parts — is a one stoplight town with a handful of local businesses lining main street. The 1,224 residents know one another by name, and folks still wave at the occasional stranger who passes through.

So when the locals read in the newspaper that their town was going to be the site of the nation's first 1996 Republican presidential caucuses most just thought it was a misprint.

"I was probably more surprised than anything," said Vicki Peshoff, a clerk at a local pharmacy. "I know I thought it was probably a big joke at first. Nothing ever goes on here."

It did start out as a joke.

In a job at the state of Iowa's former leadoff status, the Louisiana Republican party decided to kick off its first-in-the-nation caucuses in Iowa, La. — six days before Iowa state holds its Republican caucuses.

"It's almost kind of comical," said banker Joe Beards. "When I first heard of it, I thought there was a mistake."

But the contest is real. Voting will begin at 3 p.m. in this town, while caucuses will run statewide from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. at 42 other sites to pick 21 delegates to the GOP National Convention. Another nine Louisiana delegates will go to the winner of the presidential primary March 12.

Most of the Republican presidential field has bowed out of the running in Louisiana at the request of Iowa party leaders. Only commentator Pat Buchanan and Texas Sen. Phil Gramm are campaigning strongly for support.

In this staunchly Democratic

region, there are only 156 registered Republicans among the 1,400 voters in the town and nearby areas.

The upcoming event has the old-timers who gather around the post office to exchange the news asking, "What the hell is a caucus anyway?"

In recent days, leaders of the city — settled in the late 1800s by people from Iowa — have been trying to answer that. The local newspaper has been running articles explaining caucuses, too, and state GOP leaders have been in town giving impromptu civics lessons.

City hall plans a formal ribbon-cutting as the caucus kick offs with a Mardi Gras parade that had already been scheduled to start the Carnival season.

For a bit more local flavor, a sausage manufacturer in town is hosting a tailgate party — replete with traditional Louisiana sausages and boudin — across the street from the voting booth in city hall. That would be next to the life-sized elephant statue somebody's bringing into town.

City leaders prepared for the national spotlight by ordering all the town's trash cans repainted and police cars cleaned and shined.

For their part, merchants are printing up signs to welcome people to 1996's first presidential caucuses, hoping that any national hoopla will mean more money in their cash registers. At the same time, nobody's really counting on big crowds at the polls

or at the town celebration.

Pam Willis, a gift shop owner, can't decide whether to go to the trouble of printing T-shirts to commemorate the event.

Still, she said, "I think it is great. I think it is good. We are hoping to be real busy."

The only worry is whether the Mardi Gras parade, which begins at 4:30 p.m., will block the entrance to city hall as people try to vote.

And the only certain outcome is that folks will have fun.

"They are enjoying it and they love to find an excuse to throw a party — the Mardi Gras parade, the ribbon cutting and the tailgate party," said Lillie Brady, head of the district's political action committee.

Poll: 1st lady not truthful, public says

NEW YORK (AP) — Half of Americans believe Hillary Rodham Clinton is hiding something from Whitewater investigators, according to an Associated Press poll.

Only 25 percent say she is telling the whole truth about Whitewater and related matters that led to her becoming the only first lady subpoenaed to testify before a grand jury. Nearly one-quarter of those polled after Mrs. Clinton's Jan. 26 appearance at the federal courthouse are undecided about her truthfulness.

Of the 52 percent who think Mrs. Clinton is hiding something, 47 percent say it's something very important for investigators to learn about, 27 percent rate it somewhat important, and a quarter think it's no big deal.

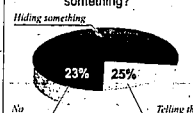
Past polls have developed a picture of public unease with the long-running investigation of the Clintons' Whitewater real estate venture and other dealings with the owner of a failed Arkansas savings and loan. A majority is convinced that the Clintons did something unethical but not necessarily illegal, and that Republicans are ganking the issue for political gain.

In the current sample of 1,017 adults, 43 percent expect a serious, long-term effect on President Clinton's future, while 47 percent do not. Forty percent say Mrs. Clinton's departure from the traditional role of first lady plays a big part in her legal troubles, and an additional 26 percent say it plays at least a small part.

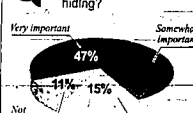

Lap Koon Chow, 36, was in critical but stable condition early today

with a bullet wound to the chest, said Detective Mark Patterson, a police spokesman.

Lap was shot Thursday night outside the hotel as he and another Hong Kong businessman were returning from showing the gems to a prospective client, police Capt. William Roe said.

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Clinton aide's leak reopens White House rift

WASHINGTON (AP) — Passes. Hey, Bob. Want a peek at our polls? Dick Morris' secret overture to Bob Dole's campaign angered his boss the president and threatened Friday to widen a rift in the Clinton camp.

Feeding his reputation as a loose cannon, Morris leaked internal poll results to a Dole adviser, arguing it would be in the Senate majority leader's political interest to cut a budget deal with President Clinton.

The clumsy political ploy opened Clinton's first-of-the-season campaign trip to New Hampshire on a sour note. And it exposed the raw nerve level of mistrust and contempt many presidential aides hold for the well-travelled consultant.

Several Clinton advisers privately speculated that the episode could curb the consultant's considerable influence.

"He was reprimanded and he will come bow-wowing out of the dog house one of these days," press secretary Mike McCurry said before Clinton began his two-day New Hampshire visit Friday.

The Washington Post, which first reported the memo, quoted an official with Dole's Republican presidential campaign as calling Morris' actions political blackmail.

Dole, campaigning Friday in South Carolina, said the affair showed that "these people play politics with everything in the White House."

"While we were talking to budget people, they were talking to their pollsters pretty obviously — people like Dick Morris," Dole said. "And I think President Clinton's got a big, big credibility gap in America."

In angry conversations, Clinton

berated Morris by telephone last week for sending the memo and polling data to the Dole campaign, according to aides, who said the gaffe was not expected to cost Morris his campaign job.

"The president expressed his displeasure," Morris said in a brief telephone interview from in Connecticut home Friday.

Morris' only saving grace: Clinton, who generally does not hold a grudge, believes Morris' intentions were honorable, aides said.

"His enthusiasm for the balanced budget overcame his good sense," said Harold Ickes, the White House's top political aide.

Morris sent the polling data and a memo to senior Dole adviser Paul Manafort Jan. 25, two days after Clinton's State of the Union address and as Dole was trying to recover from his poorly received prime-time response.

"Dole cannot win in either New Hampshire or Iowa UNLESS there is a budget deal," the memo read.

Dole's campaign said they rejected the information without showing it to Dole, who had convinced Republican lawmakers to keep open the federal government while bud-

get negotiations continue.

The poll data supported Morris' argument that Dole should go for a budget deal, even if other Republicans don't. In one scenario, 57 percent of those surveyed said they would be more likely to vote for Dole if he agreed to a deal and 21 percent said they would be less likely to vote for him.

The White House was forced to admit that Clinton authorized Morris to solicit the poll because the president was interested in how Dole's political standing could impact the budget talks.

But the White House denied that Clinton authorized the Dole leak.

This is not the first time Morris has operated outside the strict political operation established by Ickes and chief of staff Leon Panetta.

Last October, Gordon Black, a consultant to billionaire Ross Perot said Morris had called him offering help to get Perot's new political party on the ballot in California. Morris confirmed that he talked to

Black, but disagreed with the interpretation.

Again, the president gave Morris the benefit of the doubt because a Perot candidacy would probably be in Clinton's best interest.

Morris worked on Clinton's gubernatorial campaigns in Arkansas, but spent the last several years working for Republicans. He angered GOP officials by returning to Clinton's team in 1994.

During one angry moment in their Arkansas days, Clinton actually struck Morris. One aide said only half-jokingly Friday that it might help if Clinton "took another poke at him."

Lesbian mom loses custody to killer dad

PENSACOLA, Fla. — A killer who won custody of his 11-year-old daughter because his former wife is a lesbian said Friday he can give the girl a better home.

John A. Ward, who murdered his first wife, won custody of his daughter in August from a judge who wanted to give the girl a chance to live in "a non-lesbian world." The mother, Mary Ward, last week asked a state appeals court to return their daughter, Cassey, to her, contending that her sexual orientation is irrelevant.

"Her home life since we separated changed a lot and I feel I can give her a better environment," John Ward, 44, said on ABC's "Good Morning America." "I can give my baby a home, and I think she deserves that."

Mary Ward, 46, has refused interviews. She was represented on the program by Kathryn Kendall, legal director for the San Francisco-based National Center for Lesbian Rights.

Slain mailman's colleagues pay tribute

HARTFORD, Conn. — A procession of 117 blue-and-white postal trucks made its way through the streets on Friday, following the route of a mailman who was shot to death during his morning rounds.

One by one, the trucks pulled up to the spot where Robert Budusky was slain, and the postal workers — black ribbons pinned to their uniforms — dropped red, white and blue carnations into a mailbox hanging from a fence.

The tribute lasted more than an hour.

Budusky, a 35-year-old man who was engaged to be married, was delivering the mail on the route he had walked for five years in Hartford's violence-plagued North End when a man walked up behind him and shot him once in the head.

Police arrested Garfield Patterson, 26, shortly after the shooting. Patterson claimed he told him to do it, according to police.

Court rules against Clinton on strikers

WASHINGTON — President Clinton exceeded his authority when he barred federal contracts from going to companies that hire permanent replacement workers during strikes, a federal appeals court said Friday.

In throwing out Clinton's 1995 executive order, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit said the order conflicted with federal labor law, which guarantees the right to hire permanent replacements.

"It is...unconstitutional that the (National Labor Relations Act) preserves to employers the right to permanently replace economic strikers as an offset to the employees' right to strike," Judge Laurence Silberman wrote for the panel of three judges, all Republican appointees.

Pentagon signs deal for cargo planes

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon announced it will buy 80 new C-17 cargo planes from McDonnell Douglas Corp. in a single seven-year contract that will save the government almost \$1 billion.

Paul Kaminski, the undersecretary of defense for acquisition, said the multi-year contract is for \$16.6 billion.

The Pentagon decided last November that it would buy the 80 planes from McDonnell Douglas, but it left unsettled whether it would purchase them in a multi-year deal or negotiate a series of single-year contracts.

The main advantage to the multi-year contract, Kaminski told reporters, is that it saves on the aircraft's unit cost.

Military cancels surveillance plane plan

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon is cancelling a \$4.3 billion program to build hundreds of short-range unmanned reconnaissance planes for the Army, Navy and Marine Corps.

Defense Secretary William Perry said Friday the plane, known as the Hunter, had failed to meet the Pentagon's expectations for reliability. He said the main focus now would be on the Predator, a larger unmanned spy plane that already has flown in Bosnia.

The Pentagon originally had planned to buy 50 systems, which amounts to 400 planes plus supporting equipment.

So far the Pentagon has spent about \$600 million on the project, according to the General Accounting Office, the congressional auditing agency.

Clinton security chief heads for Asia

WASHINGTON — President Clinton's national security adviser is on route to South Korea and Japan for discussions on whether emergency food aid should be dispatched to North Korea, still suffering the effects of severe summer floods.

White House spokesman Mike McCurry said today that National Security Adviser Anthony Lake will review North Korea's food shortages and consider whether aid should be routed through United Nations agencies.

He noted that South Korea has expressed doubts about North Korea's needs, given its continued high level of spending on its armed forces.

Faulty Nixon stamp sells for \$16,675

NEW YORK — A misprinted, 32-cent Richard Nixon stamp, one of 160 known to have the former president's image split and inverted, was auctioned off Thursday for \$16,675.

Christie's auction house had estimated that the stamp would fetch between \$8,000 and \$10,000.

The unidentified buyer was an American who was not present but submitted bidding instructions in advance, said Colin Fraser, head of the stamp department at Christie's auction house.

The stamp came from a misprinted sheet bought in Virginia by a non-collector.

Woman leaps from building with child

PHOENIX — A woman took a little girl to the roof of a 22-story office building Friday and jumped with her to their deaths, police said.

It was not immediately known if the victims were related, or if the woman worked at the downtown building, 1 Arizona Center, which houses law and accounting firms. Police said the woman was in her 30s and the girl was 4 to 6.

Authorities were investigating how the woman got to the roof; workers said the elevator goes only to the 20th floor, and security clearance is needed to go any higher.

Man leaves trail of 3 dead wives

DETROIT (AP) — Like many mothers, Marie Wagner had reservations about the man her daughter was about to marry.

Mrs. Wagner got along with Lowell Edwin Amos just fine when they worked together at an auto plant in Anderson, Ind., and he was a brilliant guy in her opinion, but she also knew that Amos' first two wives died of unknown causes.

So when Mrs. Wagner got a call notifying her that her daughter, Roberta, had died of a cocaine overdose, she was suspicious. "No one has that much bad luck," she said.

Amos, 52, now stands charged with murder by poisoning in the Dec. 10, 1994, death of Roberta Amos, 37, and Indiana authorities have reopened the investigation into the deaths there of Amos' first two wives and his own mother in the 1970s and '80s.

Roberta Amos was found dead in an Athenium Hotel room in Detroit; the couple had been in town for a Christmas-party-for-Amos corporate consulting firm.

Amos told police that he and his wife had been using cocaine and that he fell asleep and awoke the next day to find her dead in the bathroom.

Before he called police, Amos summoned his business partner, Norbert Crabtree, to the room.

"She's cold as a mackerel," Crabtree quoted Amos as saying, according to court papers. Crabtree told investigators Amos gave him a black leather case that held such items as a syringe containing clear liquid, a sports jacket and a smelly hotel washcloth. Crabtree said he later gave the case back.

The Wayne County Medical Examiner ruled Mrs. Amos died by

cocaine poisoning, and he pronounced it a homicide. On Friday, Medical Examiner Dr. Sawait Kanlun testified Mrs. Amos had a "tremendous" amount of cocaine in her body — 15 times the amount typically seen in a cocaine overdose. Mrs. Wagner said her daughter didn't use drugs.

And prosecutors said in court papers that Mrs. Amos would not have simply fallen asleep or died quietly had she overdosed. Dr. Suzanne White, assistant professor of emergency medicine at Wayne State University, said symptoms of a typical cocaine overdose reaction include nervousness and hyperactivity.

"At a preliminary hearing that began Friday, witnesses were scheduled to testify that Mrs. Amos feared her husband of two years and was ready to leave him. Other records in the court file indicate Amos was seeing another woman."

Also, Crabtree told police he and Amos had suffered a \$225,000 loss during their first year of business.

Court records indicate Amos didn't benefit financially from Mrs. Amos' death. However, records show Roberta Amos and her mother had loaned Amos a total of \$45,000.

Amos' lawyer, Cornelius Pitts, refused to comment on the case.

Amos, who faces a mandatory sentence of life in prison if convicted, was picked up Nov. 5 in Las Vegas, where he moved after his wife's death. It took Detroit police 11 months to put the puzzle together.

"Obviously, she's a 37-year-old healthy female that had a completely unexpected death. Then, the following day we started getting calls from the other local agencies regarding the other wives and the mother, said homicide Sgt. Patrick Henahan, "and that's what made us delve into it."

He refused to discuss a motive.

Amos' first wife, Sandra Heard Amos, 36, died in 1979 in their Anderson home. Amos told police she fell and hit her head in the bathroom. A neighbor said she later found Amos burning her clothes in the fireplace.

The autopsy found Dalmace, a sleep-aid, and alcohol in her blood. But the cause of death was undetermined. Amos collected on a \$350,000 insurance policy.

A few months later, Amos married Carolyn Lawrence, who he had dated during his first marriage. She threw Amos out in 1987 after he refused to drop a large insurance policy on her, according to court papers.

He moved in with his mother, Mary Toles, who was found dead a few weeks later. Because she was 77, no autopsy was performed. Amos inherited \$1 million.

The day Amos' mother died, Carolyn Amos took her husband back. In 1989, she died at their home near Middletown, Ind. Amos told police he thought she was electrocuted with a hair dryer while standing at the bathroom sink.

An autopsy found traces of Valium and alcohol in her blood but no signs of electrocution. The cause of death was undetermined. Amos received \$800,000 in benefits.

Anderson Detective Michael Williams said investigators dusted off the Indiana case files after the Detroit death.

"When you have one situation, you don't have a track record. When you have two, you start looking," he said. "When you have three you get into a situation where you may have some kind of pattern."

Mrs. Wagner comes to Detroit from her home in Phoenix for every court appearance scheduled for her former son-in-law, who once ran for mayor of Anderson.

Because Amos apparently didn't benefit directly from her daughter's death, Mrs. Wagner said she is doubly confused:

"It makes me wonder how much did he have to hate her to do this, or did he just think he could get away with it here?"

Famed eccentric faces criminal charges, lawsuit

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — Even by Texas oil-man standards, Stanley Marsh 3 is a larger-than-life eccentric.

Self-proclaimed "United States Professional Fun Champion," a millionaire known to patch his suit with duct tape, and the mind behind the Cadillac Ranch, the Pop Art plot where 10 cars are partially buried, hoods down, like an automotive Stenchage.

But the strangest thing about him yet may be allegations that Marsh traps teen-agers into working on his ranch by catching the boys stealing the oil signs he puts up around the Amarillo. The signs feature subjects

like dinosaurs, Mona Lisa, Marilyn Monroe and, in at least one case, the words: "STEAL THIS SIGN."

The 58-year-old heir to an oil and gas fortune is charged with kidnapping and aggravated assault, accused of threatening 18-year-old Ben Whittenburg with a hammer and confining him in a chicken coop in 1994.

He is also being sued by Whittenburg's prominent family, accused of assault and invasion of privacy by taking pictures of the caged teen-ager and taunting him for months afterward.

"Until they started tangling, the weirdness has always been fun,"

says Marsh's lawyer, Charles Rittenberry. "The bottom line is, they both need to quit attacking or picking on whatever you want to call it."

There's nothing funny about it, according to the lawsuit Whittenburg's father, lawyer George Whittenburg, filed in August. It seeks an unspecified amount in damages.

The suit claims that Marsh ropes teen-agers into working for him by catching the boys with stolen road signs. Whittenburg also claims that Marsh pressures the young men into swimming nude at his Tond Hall ranch, and the lawyer has told

authorities about one 15-year-old who says Marsh molested him.

"I think power corrupts and absolute power corrupts absolutely," Whittenburg says. "Having grown up with the money he had, no one has ever told him no."

Friends of Marsh, who as chairman of Marsh Media Inc. owns KVII-TV in Amarillo, say the lawsuit stems from a longstanding rivalry with the Whittenburgs, who used to own the Amarillo and Lubbock newspapers.

They say Whittenburg sued and pushed for indictments because his conservative family doesn't like the flamboyant Marsh — and vice versa.

Pope: Immigrants deserve care, jobs

VATICAN CITY — Immigrants deserve schooling, health care, housing and jobs, Pope John Paul II said Friday.
The pope was speaking to officials from the province of Rome, which includes dozens of small towns around the capital where many poor immigrants live and work.
Some of those towns have witnessed violence against immigrants, who mainly come from North Africa or Asia.
"It's without doubt the task of public administrators to promote the spirit of welcome toward these persons, above all toward he who is poor and defenseless, from whatever category or ethnic group," the pope said.

Military says rights group can mediate

JAKARTA, Indonesia — The military has agreed to let a humanitarian group negotiate for the release of 13 hostages held by separatist rebels in a remote jungle, the official Antara news agency said Friday.
Christian missionaries already have tried to negotiate freedom for the hostages, who include six Europeans, but gave up last week. The hostages were abducted Jan. 8 from a remote valley in Irian Jaya, the Indonesian half of New Guinea.
Armed forces commander Gen. Feisal Tanjung gave the National Council on Human Rights permission to negotiate with the rebels, Antara said. But he warned that "any delegation sent to meet the rebels could itself be held captive." The military has refused to talk directly to the rebels, who are demanding autonomy for Irian Jaya, a former Dutch colony ceded to Indonesia in 1963.

Persistent bird feeder sent to jail

LONDON — The pigeons of South Norwood are really going to have to eat like birds now that Jean Knowlson has gone to jail for feeding them.
The 68-year-old resident of the south London suburb was sent to prison for eight weeks Friday for violating a court order prohibiting her from laying out all-you-can-eat banquets for birds on her lawn.
Judge Alexander Butterfield ordered her imprisoned after hearing that she was scattering bread ankle-deep around her home, using up to 100 loaves a week. Local officials said her bird-feeding had been a problem since 1989.
The judge said there was no evidence of mental illness, but her conduct had been "anti-social, dangerous and wholly unjustifiable, however genuine and well-intentioned she may be."

Heavy snow blankets northern Japan

TOKYO — Heavy snow continued to blanket northern Japan on Friday, with winds from the north expected to bring another heavy snowfall overnight. Storms covered much of western and northern Japan with 16 to 30 inches of new snow by Friday afternoon, and some areas could get an equal amount by Saturday, government forecasters said.
Some areas have become impossible for trains, planes and cars to reach.
Temperatures on the normally temperate Kanto Plain, which surrounds Tokyo, were near freezing, but no snow from the most recent storms had fallen inside the capital as of Friday afternoon.
Railway officials said many trains in northern and western Japan were delayed, including the Shinkansen bullet trains, which were running about 30 minutes behind schedule because of deep snow.

Ukraine greets Primakov, expects pact

KIEV, Ukraine — Long deadlocked with Russia over the Black Sea Fleet, Ukrainian leaders hailed a visit by Moscow's new foreign minister as a possible turning point in the two countries' relations.
The officials said they were encouraged by Yevgeny Primakov's early attention to Russia's former Soviet neighbors.
Primakov, who visited Wednesday and Thursday to lay the groundwork for an April visit by President Boris Yeltsin, indicated final agreement on the division of the fleet is imminent.
Both Primakov and Ukrainian President Leonid Kuchma said their countries will step up negotiations about the fleet ahead of Yeltsin's visit.

Explosion in central China kills 95

BEIJING — Ten tons of illegally stored dynamite exploded in a village in central China, creating an inferno that killed at least 95 people, leveled 40 buildings and shattered windows for a mile around.
The blast, which occurred Wednesday morning, injured more than 400 people and left a 2½-acre crater full of rubble in the center of Jiqi. The village is outside the city of Shaoyang in the central province of Hunan, 944 miles southwest of Beijing.
Ten more bodies were found Friday, and officials feared the death toll could rise. Television reporters showed some workers carrying away the dead as others used bulldozers and other heavy equipment to clear the enormous crater.

America Online added to racism probe

MANNHEIM, Germany — Prosecutors hoping to ban neo-Nazi material from reaching Internet users in Germany have notified America Online Inc. that it may be charged with inciting racial hatred.
Last week, prosecutors served similar notice to another U.S.-based computer on-line service, CompuServe Inc. of Columbus, Ohio, and a German company, T-Online, for giving German subscribers access to the neo-Nazi writings of Ernst Zündel, a German living in Toronto.
Publishing or distributing neo-Nazi or Holocaust denial literature is illegal in Germany, but it is unclear how such laws can be enforced in the free-for-all atmosphere of cyberspace.

Russia gives way toward miners

MOSCOW (AP) — As striking coal miners stuck to their high-profile demands Friday, President Boris Yeltsin's government appeared to be giving way in an effort to end the politically damaging strike no matter what the cost.

More than a million miners refused to work for a second day in Russia and Ukraine, in walkouts extending from Ukraine's Donbass region north to the Russian Arctic and east to the Pacific coast.

The strike is the largest walkout since the Soviet Union collapsed in 1991.

Angry workers showed no inclination to soften their demands for hundreds of millions of dollars in back wages and other changes in the industry, still state-owned in both former Soviet republics.

Union leaders said about 450,000 Russian miners were on strike and 170 of the nation's 245 mines were shut down. Although coal is the only energy source in eastern Siberia, gas and oil are used widely elsewhere and the strike's immediate impact was political.

There was little movement toward compromise in Ukraine, but Russia's election-year pressures had government officials scrambling to pay out huge sums to defuse the strike.

After a meeting Friday, strike leader Ivan Mokhnachuk said Friday Deputy Prime Minister Vladimir Kadamukhin "agrees with all our demands" and promised to make final decisions early next week.

Mokhnachuk is deputy head of the Union of Coal Industry Workers, which represents nearly all of Russia's 580,000 miners.

Energy Minister Yuri Shafnankin told Parliament on Friday the government would pay the miners an additional \$84 million in overdue wages, making a total of \$210 million paid out in the past week.

In addition, he said, Yeltsin will soon sign a decree restructuring the industry, presumably granting the

miners tax privileges and sought-after guarantees ensuring prompt payment in the future.

Caving in to miners' demands is a high-stakes political gamble for

Yeltsin, who is expected to announce his candidacy soon for the June presidential election. He appears to be taking a cue from Communists, who did well in December parliamentary elec-

tions after promising to restore large state subsidies.

"After the miners get this money, everybody will say, 'Why don't we go on strike to get what we want,'" said Sergei Markov, an analyst for the Carnegie Foundation in Moscow.

"That means that right before the elections, we will see great disorder," he said. "It's very dangerous for Yeltsin."

The coal union is Russia's biggest and most powerful, and its support helped secure the Russian presidency for Yeltsin in 1991, weakening Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev.

But the government has since alienated workers by closing 36 mines, trimming subsidies and failing to pay wages on time. Shafnankin said another 140 mines are to be shut down by the year 2000.

In Ukraine, where all but 39 of 251 mines remained partially or fully closed by the strike, miners were having less success in gaining concessions.

While the government in Kiev pondered the issue of back wages, lawmakers voted three times to reject the Soviet-style subsidies sought by the estimated 800,000 striking miners.

"These strikes are serious, negatively affecting reforms in this country," said Vyacheslav Batvin, head of the Economics Ministry's department for economic reforms. "They're putting the brakes on reforms."

Russian miners make up to \$200 a month, while their Ukrainian counterparts take home between \$50 and \$75 monthly.

Ordinary Russians displayed little public sympathy for the striking mine-

workers, including thousands of teachers who held a three-day strike this week, are struggling.

The daily Moskovsky Komsomolets newspaper said the massive concession the government is poised to make "would only tighten the noose around the Russian economy's neck" by fueling inflation.

Rescuers search vaults of Sri Lanka bank

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — Workers began digging through the basement of Sri Lanka's bombed-out central bank Friday, searching for millions of dollars in its vaults and as many as seven more bodies.

It soon became clear how jittery the residents of Colombo remain after Wednesday's suicide bombing, which destroyed eight commercial buildings and is believed to be the work of Tamil separatists.

Thousands of people telephoned police stations and newspapers Friday morning after hearing explosions in the capital — only to discover the blasts were part of a military rehearsal for Sunday's national-day parade.

While soldiers were firing their field guns, rescuers inside the shattered buildings discovered three more bodies, one charred and limbless, raising the death toll to 76. Some 1,400 people were injured in the blast, most of them bank employees.

By dusk, soldiers, policemen and firefighters had finished searching through seven of the destroyed buildings, and only the basement of the Central Bank — the suicide bomber's target — remained.

The fiery explosion burst the street's water mains, leaving the bank basement full of water and shattered concrete. Rescuers pumped the water out Friday and hope to fortify

the shaky foundation enough to finish searching the basement this weekend.

Police believe at least seven people remain buried in the rubble of the eight-story bank. No survivors have been found since Wednesday.

About 1,000 people injured in the blast remained hospitalized on Friday, and nearly 100 were in critical condition.

Police say a rebel rammed a blue truck packed with up to 400 pounds of explosives into the bank. Thirty suspects have been arrested.

The suicide bomber died instantly but the government says two members of the suicide squad were captured and confessed to be Tamil Tigers.

Tamil rebels accuse the Sinhalese majority of discriminating against the Tamil minority, and are fighting for a separate homeland in the north and east.

More than 40,000 people have died in 12 years of civil war.

Terrorists have attacked Colombo in the past, but Wednesday's attack was one of the worst ever.

It was also the first on a purely commercial target.

The central bank's records were destroyed, so no one knows for sure how much money is in its vaults. But financial analysts predict that millions of dollars in Sri Lankan rupees are buried there.

UNESCO seeks money for opera

PARIS (AP) — UNESCO appealed for donations Friday to rebuild Venice's famed La Fenice opera house, gutted by fire earlier this week.

La Fenice, a fixture in the city of canals for 204 years, was burned to a shell Monday. The cause of the fire has not been determined.

"I call on individuals, organizations, governments and all who care about musical culture to contribute," said Federico Mayor, director-general of the U.N. Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

The loss of this artistic and historical monument touches us all, and we must do our part to help it rise from its ashes," Mayor said.

Venice is on UNESCO's World Heritage List of 469 cultural and natural sites of "outstanding universal value."

Rebuilding La Fenice's outer structure alone is expected to cost \$43 million, while total costs have ranged in the hundreds of billions of dollars.

State looks at decision for ex-AIDS consultant

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Department of Education's former AIDS education consultant was fired in 1992 because she "refused to accept the political realities of that very sensitive program," an attorney says.

Howard Humphrey, representing former state Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans, urged the Idaho Supreme Court on Friday to overturn 4th District Judge Deborah Bail's decision that Joy Hummer's firing violated public policy.

But Boise lawyer Bill Mauk argued that Bail's ruling was appropriate because Hummer was the victim of public and legislative attitudes toward AIDS, and she did nothing to warrant being fired.

"Joy Hummer could correctly be viewed as a courageous person," Mauk said. "Her position as an HIV coordinator was politically volatile."

Hummer was hired as a consultant on AIDS education in 1988. By 1990 she was embroiled in controversy when some educators and legislators objected to how she handled training of Mountain Home teachers and school administrators on the legal aspects of AIDS education.

But she was fired after sending a letter to 4th District Judge George Carey on Department of Education letterhead paper — without permission from her superiors — supporting former Boise State University basket-

ball player Kerry Stephen Thomas' bid for a sentence reduction.

Thomas had been convicted of statutory rape involving a young patient at a psychiatric facility where he worked. He also had consensual sex with several women after he knew he had tested positive for HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. But criminal charges related to those actions were dismissed as part of a plea agreement.

Hummer met Thomas during an AIDS education session in 1989 and hoped to persuade him to be a speaker on AIDS prevention. She wrote in her letter to Carey that she hoped Thomas "might be a Magic Johnson type of figure who could get through to young people who were engaged in high-risk behaviors and who had themselves been incarcerated," according to court records.

Carey referred to Hummer's letter in agreeing to change Thomas' sentence, and that prompted complaints to Evans that the letter gave the impression his department was using a convicted rapist as a role model.

She was fired in February 1992 and sued the following October. Bail ruled

in February 1994 that Hummer's firing was a violation of public policy. The judge wrote that there was "an overriding public policy interest in obtaining candid information for use in sentencing decisions."

And since Hummer had been subpoenaed for the Thomas case, Bail concluded that it was "unfair to allow an employee to be sandbagged by punishing them for doing what the law compels."

Hummer was awarded a total of almost \$57,000 in damages. But Humphrey said on Friday that the ramifications of the case "go far beyond the dollars involved."

He said the question for Evans was whether Hummer's employment rights should outweigh the need to maintain public support for the AIDS education program, and that the letter on the Department of Education's letterhead misled Carey into thinking it represented the agency's official opinion.

Even so, the letter might have been excused if it had been the first problem Evans had with Hummer, he said. "But she had repeatedly embarrassed the department before that. This was basically the last straw."

But Mauk said Hummer had not been informed it was against the department's policy to use its letterhead to write on Thomas' behalf. And if anyone was misled, that the letter represented the department's position, it was not Hummer's responsibility.

Man arrested after tense confrontation

COEUR D'ALENE — Fearing a violent reaction in a Coeur d'Alene Shopko store, police waited before arresting a Spirit Lake man wanted on two California warrants.

Officers finally arrested Cleve S. Sampson Jr., 30, at about 5:30 p.m. Thursday in a restaurant parking lot. He is being held in Kootenai County Jail as a fugitive from justice. Sampson faces two drug-related \$150,000 warrants from San Bernardino, Calif., police said.

Officers gathered at Shopko, but held off from arresting him inside because of his previous record and rumors he had a .45-caliber handgun with a laser sight.

Aerospace museum to see hall of fame

HILL AIR FORCE BASE, Utah — A new Utah Fliers Hall of Fame will be built at Hill Aerospace Museum; if fundraising is successful.

Marc Reynolds, a retired Air Force lieutenant general, said Tuesday that the Air Force Heritage Foundation of Utah plans a \$600,000 addition to the museum grounds that will include a 1,500-square-foot building for the hall of fame.

The Legislature and Gov. Mike Leavitt have recognized the museum as the home for the hall of fame, which will honor individuals who have distinguished themselves in military or civilian aviation.

Reynolds, a former commander of Hill Air Force Base, said the hall of fame already has inducted 11 aviation pioneers.

Court: County liable for medical bill

BOISE — A district judge correctly ruled that Payette County was responsible for the \$180,000 hospital bill for the treatment of an indigent man badly burned in a fire, the Idaho Court of Appeals says.

But Payette County taxpayers won't have to fork up the money. After years of political deadlock, a state fund designed to cover such cases finally got some money, and University of Utah Hospital, Salt Lake City, was paid for its treatment of Steve Cross. Since Cross had no money, Payette County conceded responsibility for his bills.

But the county paid only the first \$10,000. Idaho's Catastrophic Health Care Cost Program was supposed to pay the rest, but there was no money in the fund at the time.

Payette County contended it didn't have to pay the balance, but District Judge Sergio Gutierrez rejected that ruling and sent matter back to the commission.

Potlatch residents pass plant levy

POTLATCH — Residents in the Potlatch School District have approved a three-year plant facility levy to remodel the high school.

The levy passed Thursday with 64 percent of the vote. "We're very excited. Some of the teachers were here and they're very excited too," clerk Janice Palmer said.

The levy will add \$177,000 a year to the current \$72,930 plant levy. The money will pay for enclosing classrooms, fire exits and air ducts, and rebuilding the parking lot.

Board mulls Ligertown demolition

POCATELLO (AP) — A Bannock County board hopes to decide in a week whether to order demolition of Ligertown Game Farm at Lava Hot Springs, the place where 19 African lions were shot to death in September after some of them escaped.

"After the incident, the ramshackle collection of pens and cages was condemned by the county. Ligertown operators Dotti Martin and Robert Fieber are trying to stop condemnation.

County engineer Terry Bailey contends the compound, a double-wide mobile home surrounded by animal cages, fails electrical, plumbing and structural codes.

Deputy State Fire Marshal Hal Call said the Ligertown compound is unsafe.

"This premise is in the worst state of dilapidation, disrepair, and filth that I have witnessed in some 40 years in the fire service," he wrote. "The total electrical wiring system appears to be done with total disregard for the electrical code or any safety considerations."

The board is deciding whether the couple has 90 days to bring Ligertown up to building codes or if it should be demolished.

Martin and Fieber, who have been living in McCammon since the incident, said their home is private property and county officials have no right to tell them how to live.

Ed Marugg, environmental health director for the Southeastern District Health Department, said Ligertown also poses a water pollution threat.

Water lines with hoses were scattered throughout the complex, he wrote.

"We did not see any backflow prevention devices on any of the lines. Because this property lies above the city of Lava, there is a real potential for a backflow event with the system set up in this manner," he said.

Martin contends that considering the slope of the land, contamination couldn't travel uphill.

Conservationists demand seat at review

Idaho conservationists say Gov. Phil Batt has banned them from a place at the table in Portland where the future of steelhead and salmon is being decided.

The Northwest Power Planning Council held a workshop on Thursday and Friday on anadromous fish management.

Batt invited five Idaho residents to take part in the "180-day fish review." In November, Congress directed the council to review in six months how Snake and Columbia River salmon management could be improved.

Batt invited no one to represent

Idaho anglers or conservationists, said Charles Ray of Idaho Rivers United on Thursday.

"Gov. Batt has shut us out of this review about the future of our fishing," Ray said. "He invited an irrigator, an electric utility manager and a former aluminum company consultant to help decide the future of Idaho fish."

"So I am in Portland asking Oregon, Washington and Montana to give Idaho fishermen the seat Phil Batt doesn't want us to have."

Batt invited Sheri Chapman of the Idaho Water Users Association, Raft River Rural Electric Co-op Manager Bud Tracy; Jim Goller, former Power Council member and consultant to

aluminum companies; and two state employees from the attorney general's office and Idaho Fish and Game Department, Ray said.

U.S. Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, was principal backer of the review. It was agreed on in November amid the battle over Oregon Sen. Mark Hatfield's push to cap money spent on salmon recovery.

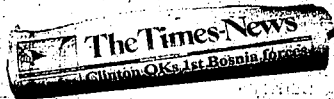
"Last October when we visited Washington, D.C., our delegation assured us Idaho fishermen and conservationists would have a seat at the review," said Mitch Sanchotena, executive coordinator of Idaho Steelhead and Salmon Unlimited. "We were misled."

Illegal alien faces trial in murder of Utah man

TWIN FALLS — Friday, a man was bound over for trial on charges that he helped bring about the murder of a Utah man in south Twin Falls.

Jesus Reyes-Jimenez, an illegal alien from Mexico, will answer to the felony charge of aiding and abetting two crimes — first-degree murder and attempted first-degree murder, said his attorney, Lisa Barini-Garcia.

His former neighbor, Oscar Jacob, 26, is charged with first-degree murder and attempted first-degree murder in the shooting death of Gustavo Quezada, 25, during a quarrel at the El Mirajero housing complex on Oct. 20.

During the confrontation, a man drew a handgun and fired at another man, but the gun misfired; he turned on Quezada and shot him after Quezada asked what was going on, according to witness testimony and police.

Marrow drive resumes today for Gooding resident Stover

TWIN FALLS — Another bone-marrow drive for ailing Gooding businessman Ed Stover is being held today from noon to 5 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church in Twin Falls.

The Twin Falls drive is being held to find a match for 48-year-old Stover, who needs a bone-marrow transplant, and to get more volunteers listed on the National Marrow Donor Program Registry to possibly help others.

Those who show up today will have a small blood sample drawn. Those samples are tissue typed, and the results are added to the national registry.

Tax committee chairman Antone may get tax job

BOISE — The state Tax Commission is seeking support for its plans to hiring the retiring veteran House tax committee chairman Steve Antone as a special assistant. Commission Chairman Mike Southcombe told the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee that the 74-year-old lawmaker's wealth of experience in tax matters over 14 terms would be a boon to the state's revenue-collecting program.

"With his 28 years of experience in the tax field, this is a unique opportunity to hire the right man for the right job," Southcombe said.

The commission asked the budget-writing panel to authorize \$50,000 for the job, which would essentially restore one of six positions the commission eliminated last year to comply with Gov. Phil Batt's budget-reduction order.

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Students help smoking peers

TWIN FALLS — Just a decade ago, Tara Williams and Kala Vitek's classmates were all pretty much the same.

Then they all got a dosage of independence and a load of peer pressure about the time they were in junior high, leading some classmates to start smoking cigarettes or using smokeless tobacco.

And, through the years, the two Twin Falls High School seniors have watched some of those classmates go from smoking to drinking alcohol, using drugs, committing crimes and having emotional problems.

"Smoking is a start to a lot of problems," said Williams, who is a Drug Awareness and Resistance Education role model along with Vitek. "It hurts you when you see your peers, kids you've been with, ending up that way."

To help elementary — and especially junior-high — students resist the temptation to use tobacco, Williams, Vitek and some other high school students have joined forces with area health-care providers in the Tobacco Free Idaho Coalition.

"I think we all feel like we can possibly make a difference with kids that age," Williams said. "Kids listen to kids more than they do adults."

Another thing the students plan to do is make sure smoking-cessation classes are available for teens who want to stop smoking.

And there is a need for that in the Magic and Wood River valleys, according to a 1993 survey of ninth through 12th graders:

- 13.3 percent of Idaho students had smoked more than 20 days in the preceding month.

- 27.3 percent of Idaho students had smoked one or more days in the preceding month. Nationally, 30.5 percent of students had smoked at least once in the preceding month, with the highest percentage — 38.8 — in West Virginia.

- 14.9 percent of Idaho students had used smokeless tobacco in the past month, compared with 11.5 percent of students nationwide. The highest usage nationwide was in Montana, with 24 percent.

Led by surgeon Dr. David McCluskey, the Twin Falls arm of the statewide coalition

Idaho smoking statistics

The national Centers-for-Disease-Control-and-Prevention released last week a report on tobacco use nationwide.

Here's some statistics about adults in Idaho and the United States:

- 19.8 percent — or 146,1000 Idahoans — were cigarette smokers in 1992 and 1993, compared to 22.9 percent of Americans. (The highest usage was in Nevada with 30.3 percent.)
- 20 percent of Idaho's white population smoked during those years, while 15.8 percent of the state's Hispanic population smoked.
- 3.8 percent of Idahoans used smokeless tobacco in 1992

and 1993, compared to 2.1 percent of Americans. (The highest usage was in West Virginia with 7.7 percent.)

- The deaths of 1,304 Idahoans in 1990 were related to smoking. The deaths of 418,690 Americans were related to smoking.

- An average of 11.3 years was lost for each death in Idaho, compared to 12.1 years nationwide.
- Direct medical costs related to smoking was \$84 million in Idaho and \$50 billion nationwide in 1990.

- Smoking is restricted in state-government work sites, restaurants and grocery stores; it isn't restricted in day-care centers or private work sites.

INEL to pile dirt on old reactors

IDAHO FALLS — The debris of two government reactors that blew up more than 30 years ago at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory will be left where it is, buried and covered with more dirt, federal and state officials say.

Rather than digging up the radioactive remains of the two destroyed reactors now buried at INEL, officials have agreed that covering the burial sites will prevent any further exposure to humans and the environment.

On Jan. 3, 1961, three men were working to restart an experimental low-power reactor at INEL after a 10-day shutdown. Despite problems with sticking control rods, engineers had decided to restart the

Stationary Low Power Reactor — known as SL-1.

No one is sure exactly what happened. But experts think one of the three, trying to pull up the central control rod manually, may have pulled it too far.

The resulting sudden nuclear reaction — though not a nuclear explosion — blew the top off the reactor. The blast killed the three men — one of them impaled and pinned to the ceiling.

The explosion also sent a cloud of radioactive iodine drifting over the Magic Valley in the days following the accident.

Meanwhile, the explosion confronted engineers with the problem of dismantling and disposing of 81,000 cubic feet of "grossly contaminated" debris — without exposing workers or the environment to harmful doses of radiation.

Officials called in an Army demolitions expert to remove the reactor operating room's floor, an 80-ton, steel-reinforced concrete slab 38 feet in diameter, supported on six 15-foot columns.

The concrete slab was the biggest piece of the reactor building, which eventually was dismantled and buried nearby. Shaped explosive charges were attached to the concrete slab after other equipment had been removed from the building. The explosion toppled the slab, which broke in the fall.

Moving such a large, bulky item 16 miles across INEL to the Barge Ground — now known as the Radioactive Waste Management Complex — would have been a monumental task even if it were not contaminated with highly radioactive fission

RICHFIELD — A 2-year-old boy died Thursday at a Salt Lake City hospital after he was apparently electrocuted while taking a bath at his home last week.

Larry Dean Holland, of Richfield, was comatose when Richfield ambulance workers drove him to a Twin Falls hospital on Jan. 26, said Lincoln County Sheriff Steve Southwick.

Holland was later taken by airplane to Primary Children's Medical Center in Salt Lake.

He died Thursday morning, said hospital spokeswoman Laura Winters.

Southwick said he was still trying to determine what caused the fatal accident Friday; Holland's parents have been too grief-stricken to elaborate, he said.

Tips to avoid electrocution

Parents are cautioned to stay alert for safety hazards in their homes that children could encounter.

- Keep electrical appliances as far as possible from tubs and sinks.
- After using curling irons or hair dryers, make sure to wrap them up and stow them in high cabinets away from children.

- Check appliances regularly for worn or frayed cords. Replace the cords whenever possible — merely repairing them by wrapping them with electrical tape is not the safest route.

- Have an electrician install special outlets that have "ground fault circuit interrupters" that are available at hardware stores. These plug-ins will automatically shut down when an electrical shock is detected.

- Plug outlets with plastic "protectors" — this can prevent children from sticking their fingers into the outlets.

kind donation for office expense and a vehicle of \$1,175 from Walton, Inc.

Amerision also contributed \$3,955 to Stop Special Rights and Paul Dearing, Burley, donated \$5,000.

Supporters of the anti-gay initiative have until July to produce 41,335 signatures to put the initiative on the general election ballot.

The drive suffered a setback in December when the Idaho Supreme Court ruled the short and long ballot title were misleading and invalidated all signatures gathered to that point.

Charter schools idea returns

BOISE — Charter schools, a perennial idea in the Idaho Legislature, have awakened a perennial debate: Could Idaho be blurring the lines between church and state?



On Friday, the charter-school proposal came up in the Senate and House education committees. It's an issue that has consistently made it through the House in the past, only to die in the Senate late in the session.

It's not only difficult to pass a charter-school-law—it would be difficult to set them up, said Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, chairman of the House Education Committee.

Governed by local school boards, charter schools would allow parents, teachers, or anyone else to get state money to set up their own schools, as long as they received permission from the state.

This could mean that students could attend schools that offered math, science and social studies classes organized around agricultural or technological themes. Students could break away from the day's schedule to work on an individual or group project. Or there could be no schedule at all.

It sounds great on the surface, said C. Stephen Rowley, lobbyist for the American Civil Liberties Union. His group advocates flexibility whenever possible.

But such schools and flexible rules could easily become tools of religious groups, he said.

"We're concerned about church-state separation," he said. "We want to expand liberty, but there has to be some oversight."

Such fears came to pass in two other states that allow charter schools. In Minnesota, a man started a charter school because God told him to, and the founder

Senators vote to end limit on underground mine work days

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Senate Republicans voted Friday to repeal a nearly century-old law restricting the work day for miners, contending the safety concerns that prompted the law no longer exist.

"The state of Idaho no longer needs to restrict the hours worked for the safety of the miners," Republican Sen. Gordon Crow of Coeur d'Alene said.

Crow and 19 others maintained that federal regulations targeted specifically at the mining industry more than achieve the goal of Idaho's 1906 law.

They said more and more miners are asking for the flexibility of going to a 10-hour or 12-hour, three- or four-day week.

But 10 lawmakers objected, several maintaining that the state law no matter how old is needed because of the attempts in Congress to dismantle federal worker safety and protection laws.

"The bill now goes to the House for final action."

agency the GOP has targeted. But former Bureau Director Rhea Graham described the budget cuts as a "Republican assault on science and technology."

"When you're actually in a mine shaft working, eight hours a day is enough," Democratic Sen. Lin Whitworth of Inkom said. "It can be extremely dangerous to extend the hours."

Under current law, surface miners are restricted to maximum 10-hour shifts and underground miners to eight-hour shifts that can be extended to 10 hours if a majority of workers in the mine approve.

Repeated attempts to contact officials of the United Steelworkers of America, which represents many of the Idaho Panhandle miners, were not successful.

But state AFL-CIO President Randy Ambuchl expressed the same safety concerns as Whitworth and said he was aware of workers at only one surface mine near Challis who actively support repealing the work limitation.

Officials tout deal with Russians

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — If Russian scientists in a partnership between Russian and American nuclear scientists in search of waste treatment solutions is off to an auspicious start.

According to custom, a person standing between two people with the same first name should be secret wish. On Thursday, an interpreter stood between Yevgeny Macheret of the U.S. Energy Department and Yevgeny Filipov of the Russian Department of Atomic Energy and made her wish.

The two nuclear scientists have

wishes of their own: that a joint effort to treat wastes will come to fruition.

Scientists from five Russian institutes have been in Idaho Falls for the past week exchanging ideas about treating mixed radioactive and hazardous wastes. The U.S. program for treating mixed wastes based at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, and INEL officials are considering pumping \$300,000 or more into Russian research that could be applied in Idaho and elsewhere around the country.

"It's a lot more cost-effective to work on the problems together than to build weapons and point them at each other," said Macheret, program manager in charge of mixed-waste treatment. Filipov directs the Russian agency's Institute of Radiochemical Technology.

Macheret is interested in Russian technologies including one that coats the inside of a waste melter to prevent corrosion and extend the machinery's life. The Russians are near breakthroughs in six treatment technologies that interest American officials.

Utah lawmaker wants tax measure back in committee

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A move to send a controversial cigarette tax bill back to committee was struck down by the Utah House on Friday after its sponsor urged lawmakers to let it be debated.

Rep. Peter Knudson, R-Brigham City, asked legislators to let the House Revenue and Taxation Committee rehear the bill, which would impose a 4.5-cent tax increase per pack of cigarettes. The tax now is 26¢ cents.

The committee voted 7-5 last week to send the bill to the House floor for consideration. But Knudson argued that many committee members were unable to attend the hearing because of bizarre conditions that morning.

"Members have had an oppor-

tunity to fully discuss this bill," said Knudson. He received a \$200 campaign contribution from tobacco giant Phillip Morris.

Some lawmakers questioned Knudson's motives and said it seemed he actually was trying to get the bill killed in committee. His proposal was defeated 42-27.

Rep. Jordan Tainter, R-Provo, the bill's sponsor, pointed out that the committee voted only after hearing more than an hour of testimony.

Democratic Rep. Dave Jones of Salt Lake also said he had never heard of such action being taken because of adverse weather conditions in his eight years in the Legislature. "This is a fairly outrageous way to send a bill back to committee," he said.

Town in topless turmoil

NEWPORT, Wash. (AP) — Beachgoers reported in Russian laws involving nude dancing.

When news of the questions got around town, the owner of Pend Oreille Restaurant and Lounge said his business dropped 25 percent.

"No more questions," Jensen said. "This is really hurting us. You take 25 percent of not too much and you're hurting."

His Sunday after-church business dropped in half when a local newspaper reported that the City Council was rushing to pass a "dirty dancing law" as a result of his inquiry.

Jensen's liquor license was suspended for 48 days on Dec. 29 for four counts of allowing drinks to get drinking in looking for ways to make money during the suspension, the idea of strippers came up.

He called City Attorney Mark Hanley to ask what local ordinance was preventing strip-tease.

"I'll be in a 30- or 40-second phone conversation," Jensen said. "I forgot about it until I read the paper."

Hanley persuaded the City Council to pass an emergency ordinance on Dec. 29 regulating the non-existent strip clubs, and also to impose a three-month moratorium on permits for an "adult cabaret" industry.

"Even if Jensen doesn't plan to hire strippers, the City Council wants to be prepared to case someone else the idea," City Administrator Jack Henderson said.

Jensen said he supports the new law.

"It's a nice little town," he said. "They shouldn't have anything like that going on."

Avalanche buries ski patrolman

SOLITUDE, Utah (AP) — A ski patrolman was buried in a slide Friday while doing avalanche control work in a closed area in Big Cottonwood Canyon.

Jeff Brewer, 36, Salt Lake City, was on critical and unstable condition at the University of Utah Health Sciences Center late Friday afternoon, suffering from hypothermia, hospital officials said.

Brewer and three other ski patrolmen entered the Honeycomb area for avalanche control work.

One of the patrolmen threw an

explosive hand charge into an area to trigger a slide. "It broke further back than they ever thought it would, and it took (Brewer) with it," Allaire said. "Avalanche control is not an exact science."

After 16 minutes, the patrolmen were able to locate their companion via his beeper device, Allaire said. Ski patrolmen wear the devices for such emergencies.

Brewer was buried under 12 inches of snow for an hour and a half, Allaire said. He was revived by his companions and flown to the hospital by Airmed helicopter.

New Mexicans reflect on anniversary of Guadalupe treaty

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — Friday marked the 148th anniversary of a key event in Southwestern history — the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, which ended the Mexican-American War.

On Feb. 2, 1848, a peace envoy sent from Washington, D.C., to Mexico City sat down with three Mexican commissioners and signed the pact at La Villa de Guadalupe, the shrine dedicated to the Virgin of Guadalupe.

The U.S. lands acquired from Mexico include New Mexico, Texas, Arizona, Utah, Nevada, most of California, half of Colorado and parts of Wyoming, Oklahoma and Kansas.

At 947,570 square miles, the land — once comprising more than half of Mexico's total area — was more than 26,000 square miles larger than the Louisiana Purchase.

Historian Hubert Howe Bancroft called the concessions of the treaty "nothing better than bartered robbery."

"It's a great day of mourning," said Orlando Romero, director of the Palace of the Governors History Library. "It's a terrible day. Hispanics to this day have not recovered."

This year, New Mexicans are getting together to reflect on the treaty. Scheduled events include a three-day commemoration at the Onate Monument and Visitors Center in Alcalde, north of Espanola and a community gathering at Santa Fe's Guadalupe parish hall. Both events started Friday.

The events resulted from a movement that began in northern New Mexico last summer. For years, a loosely organized group of teachers, historians and land-grant activists has been urging governmental bodies throughout the area to commemorate the treaty.

To date, three groups have done so. In October, the Rio Arriba

County Commission unanimously approved a resolution marking Friday as Guadalupe Hidalgo Day in Rio Arriba County. In December, the Santa Fe County Commission and Espanola City Council did the same.

"It's an idea for folks to start redirecting their sights to our indigenous history," said activist Sandiego Juarez of Arroyo Seco, N.M., a member of La Herencia de los Nortenos Unidos, the group behind the idea. "It's not necessarily a joyful occasion, but it's a commemoration, to look back and try to understand what happened, and what effect does it have on us today."

The treaty, designed to guarantee citizenship and property rights to Mexican citizens from Texas to California, never really took effect, said Onate Center director Estevan Arellano.

"The American government started violating the intent of the treaty almost immediately, and it's been going downhill ever since," he said.

The treaty, which recognized land grants made by the Spanish and Mexican governments, failed to protect citizens from sometimes audacious speculators who grabbed thousands of acres in the years following 1848. By 1880, 1,000 claims for land grants had been filed by the surveyor general, but only 150 had been processed by the federal government.

As the grant became mired in legal limbo, grant holders' legal bills grew. In payment, portions of the grants, and sometimes entire grants themselves, fell into the hands of attorneys such as Thomas Catron and Stephen Elkins, who formed the core of the infamous Santa Fe Ring. The group's members soon acquired empires extending over millions of acres. After stashed in 1912, much of what remained of the common lands fell into the hands of the federal government.

encroachment on state funds was evidently on the minds of those who crafted this year's legislation.

Both Sen. Gary Schroeder, R-Moscow, and Rep. Fred Titman, R-Boise, made assurances Friday that the Legislature would take pains to keep space between church and state.

Secrets of catching big fish

RUPERT — Henry's Lake fishing guide Bill Schiess isn't shy when it comes to talking about his favorite place to fish.

Some fishing guides experience sudden memory loss if even asked about what they had for lunch, and they sure aren't going to tell you how they fish a certain water.

But with Schiess a good question about Henry's Lake can provide an unknowing fisherman with a wealth of angling knowledge.

Schiess schooled about 100 Mini-Cassia area fishermen Thursday night during a seminar at the Rupert Elks Club on the intricacies of fishing Henry's Lake and tying the flies that catch fish there.

One of the west's most prolific trout fisheries, Henry's Lake is located in the Island Park area near where the borders of Montana, Wyoming and Idaho touch.

The 17-year veteran guide and owner of B.S. Flies in Island Park, "where it does fly on occasion," said the key to catching big fish at Henry's Lake is finding the holes around the edges of the lake.

"The fishing will be a little slower around the outside of the lake but that's where the big fish are," he said. "If you fish out in the middle you will catch a lot but they will be smaller. At the edges and fish in 11 feet of water or less."

During the 1995 season Schiess and his clients landed 63 fish that were more than 30 inches long. Though many fishing days were lost in 1995 because of high winds, Schiess said later in the year there were several days when his clients landed more than 100 fish. On one phenomenal day last September, 187 fish were brought to hand by Schiess and his clients, he said.

Fishermen should know where they are on the lake and document hot spots, Schiess repeated several times during his two-hour seminar. When a good hole is located he recommends lining up the boat with two reference points on the same bank and then taking photographs.

He said Henry's Lake changes from year to year, but photographing and documenting are the best ways to pinpoint hot spots. He keeps a photo album of his hot spots in his boat so he always has a reference, and he claims he can return to within 10 feet of a certain spot by lining up such things as rock outcrops on nearby mountains with telephone poles. He also uses weed patches, chimneys on cabins and stumps for reference points.

Another tip is use a boat to get there, then anchor it and fish out of a float tube. Wind direction is another critical factor in finding success at Henry's Lake. Schiess said some years are dominated by certain wind patterns while in other years winds change from day to day. His advice is to use the wind to your advantage in finding ways to drift that will keep your boat or tube over the holes.

Another tip is to use sinking fly lines, float leaders and always fish within one foot of the bottom of the lake. "I want you to touch

weeds or fish on every cast," he said. "The big fish are in the weeds and that is why we fish the holes in the weed beds."

This year Schiess has given free seminars in New York and South Carolina and is on his way to Anchorage, Alaska soon. He promotes catch-and-release fishing and conservation at

his seminars.

"If you have never fly fished and gotten tangled up with a 6, 7, or 8 pound trout, you haven't lived yet," he said. "It's the best thing this life has to offer. Although some of my friends tell me it's only the second best thing. I say it's the best."

Wendell residents decry possible dairy

WENDELL — City officials oppose a proposed dairy in the city's impact area, questioning whether the dairy's grandfather status is legitimate.

The proposed dairy lies north of East Main Street extension, three-quarters of a mile from town, within the city's impact area. It has been operated as a dairy off and on for more than 40 years.

E. E. Gunning and his wife, Irene, bought the property from Ag America FCB of Spokane on March 2, 1995. The Gunnings say the dairy has "grandfather" status.

The city maintains that the dairy's

grandfather status goes with the owner, not the property, and thus cannot be transferred; and it has authorized its attorney Craig Hobbey to take whatever action necessary to prevent the dairy from operating.

Ag America's predecessor, Farm Credit Bank of Spokane, under a sheriff's sale resulting from its foreclosure on Dairy West Associates, Dairy West had ceased milking operations in 1986 when it sold its cows under a federal buyout program to reduce milk production, according to Gail Eichen of Farm Service Agency, formerly Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, in Gooding.

To improve the property's value before the sale, Farm Credit Bank established "grandfather" dairy status, according to Wayne Dennis of Farm Credit Service, an affiliate of Ag America, in Twin Falls. The grandfather status was granted as a confined animal feeding operation siting permit under a Gooding County ordinance, and approved by the Gooding County Planning and Zoning Commission on Oct. 23, 1993.

But Fifth District Judge J. William Hart declared that ordinance invalid on July 27, 1994, according to Judy Daubner, administrator of the Gooding County Planning and Zoning Commission. The replacement ordinance did not become

effective until Sept. 27, 1995.

Meanwhile, Wendell adopted a one-mile impact zone, assigning jurisdiction of it to Gooding County, on March 9, 1995; however, the county ordinance authorizing the city's impact zone didn't become effective until May 3.

Twin Falls attorney Harry DeHaan, representing the Gunnings and speaking at a recent City Council meeting, said that grandfather status of the property comes from its historical use.

Councilwoman Connie Bjorn said the county had asked the city to extend its impact area to protect the city's dairy districts, but "it never gets taken care of right."

ing teens stop smoking, coalition members also want to use the grant money to work with city officials to restrict vending machines, stop the sale of tobacco to minors and start other anti-tobacco measures.

The coalition also wants to reward smoke-free businesses — and students — with certificates and discounts.

But McClusky and coalition members learned Monday that any grant money the coalition gets may have to be spent battling the Idaho Legislature.

McClusky, Williams and senior Nurgul Mumun all testified Wednesday against a bill

that would prohibit local governments from passing tobacco-control measures more stringent than the state's.

The proposed bill also called for loosening restrictions on vending tobacco-vending machines, setting strict rules for siting operations on business that sell tobacco and allowing those under 18 to sell tobacco products.

"It was just nice to stand up there and speak for those of us who are parents," said Williams, who said many adults don't listen to students.

Said Mumun: "We do make a difference, and we do think differently than they think we do."

The bill returned to subcommittee Thursday. McClusky and student coalition members said

Friday they are prepared to fight its return just as they helped waylay its progress.

"If that bill goes through, that eliminates our ability to do any of this," with siting operations and vending machines, McClusky said.

"If you're interested in helping the coalition, members are holding a meeting Wednesday to discuss their plans to teachers, city council members and other community members."

Eventually, the coalition would like to expand its membership to students and community members throughout the eight-county region.

proselytized its students, according to the Minnesota Department of Education. In California, a district gave parents of charter-school students \$1,000 in tax credits which they used to buy religious literature, according to the California Department of Education.

In Idaho, one conservative Christian group — the Idaho Family Forum — supports the charter school concept. But its director, Dennis Mansfield, said such religious incidents won't be replicated.

"I don't see any charter school develop any theological training," he said. "The Idaho Constitution is too tightly regulated."

products.

"Getting up and packaging the debris for such a move would present an unusually high radiation hazard to workers. Instead engineers established a separate disposal site, about one-third of a mile northeast of the ill-fated reactor."

A bulldozer dragged the two halves of the contaminated operating room floor across open ground into a newly dug pit.

Smaller pieces were loaded on a 5-ton dump truck, driven to the disposal site and dumped into pits or trenches. Some objects were unloaded by a crane directly into the pits.

The accident debris, contaminated with highly radioactive fission products, was buried directly in the ground. Most of the radioactive material, however, has lost more than half its radioactivity in the time since the accident.

During the cleanup, an old sedan was pressed into service as a taxi between the reactor and a control point on the main road through INEL about a mile away. The car became so contaminated with radioactivity, that workers drove it into a low-level waste pit and buried it.

"It was not worth cleaning up," John Horan, a former director of Health and safety at INEL, said in a 1989 interview.

About \$4,500 cubic feet of contaminated dirt around the reactor building also was scraped up and buried in the special dump. About 92,820 cubic feet of "clean" dirt was spread in the scraped areas to cover any contamination missed.

Seven years before SL-1 blew up, a small experimental reactor was intentionally blown up for research purposes.

The explosion of the Boiling Water Reactor Experiment-1 scattered debris and radioactivity over about two acres. Much of the debris was buried in place and covered with about 6 inches of gravel to reduce radioactivity levels.

with additional dirt, starting in 1997.

In addition, the areas will be graded, and contoured to direct surface water away from the capped burial grounds. Periodic radiological surveys will be conducted, and the caps will be inspected and maintained. Access will be restricted, and land use would be limited to industrial applications for at least 100 years.

The project is part of ongoing environmental cleanup at INEL under the federal Environmental Protection Agency's Superfund program to identify and clean up the nation's most contaminated sites.

No Magic night in LA

Even Magic Johnson can't keep Bulls from cruising to 18th straight

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — The Magic vs. Michael show turned into just another Chicago shootaround.

Scottie Pippen had 30 points and Dennis Rodman a season-high 23 rebounds as the Bulls cruised to their 48th consecutive victory, 93-84 over the Los Angeles Lakers on Friday night.

Michael Jordan chipped in 17 points and Rodman's defense kept Magic Johnson from performing any miracles, rendering the much-anticipated matchup a mere sideshow.

The excitement surrounding the return of Johnson and Jordan's first appearance in the Forum since 1992 converged to turn celebrities and regular folk alike into starstruck fans. Actor Charlie Sheen spent much of the game snapping photographs from his courtside seat.

But the Bulls, who shot 56 percent, rang up a 20-point lead early in the third quarter and set a franchise record with their ninth consecutive road victory.

The reason for all the spectacle was supposed to be Johnson's matchup with Jordan, their first NBA meeting since Game 5 of the 1992 Finals at the Forum. But the two never guarded each other, and Johnson, whose 19 points and near triple-double in his debut brought back memories of his glory days with the Lakers, looked old and out of step most of the night.

He still finished with 15 points on 6-for-13 shooting, but he had just three assists and was frustrated all night by Rodman's physical play, which landed him on the floor several times.

But the Lakers, who shot 46 percent, needed more help than Johnson could have given them. A 13-point second quarter had them down by 13 points at halftime, and when the Bulls opened the third quarter with an 11-2 run, the score was 65-43 with 8:20 left in the period.

Cedric Ceballos led the Lakers with 23 points and Elden Carter had 16. Nick Van Exel, averaging more than 15 points, was held to just nine.

The Bulls, now 41-3, were coming off a 20-point win at Sacramento the previ-

Player after player posted rounds in the 60s and when the last golfer had changed out of his soaked shoes and pants splattered with mud to the knees, Jeff Magger's 8-under-par 136 was a stroke better than Steve Jones, Davis Love III and Loren Roberts after 36 holes.

Phil Mickelson, looking for his third straight victory on the tour, was two behind at 138 along with Tom Watson, Nick Faldo, Jay Hans, Joe Ozaki, Jim McGovern and first-round co-leader John Elliott.

There is no telling how low the scores would have been if the greens soaked by two days of rain earlier in the week had not been so marked up by the 360 pros and amateurs teeing over them.

"This is playing very, very easy," Magger said after shooting a 68 at Pebble Beach. "The course is perfect for shooting good scores. If the greens were a little better we'd see some real low scores."

Another 13 players were at 5-under-par 139 and with 24 players within three shots of the lead, Saturday's shakedown day should be exciting. "It should be interesting tomorrow," Jones, who won here in 1988, said after shooting a 68 at Spyglass in which he started with a 20-foot birdie on the first hole and a 15-foot eagle on the second, hitting the green on the par-5 with a 3-wood.

Love moved into contention with a 66 at Poppy Hills. He was even par after seven holes, then birdied seven of the last 11 holes, including all three par-5s.

Dixie athlete faces assault charge after Treasure Valley game

ST. GEORGE, Utah — A Dixie College basketball player is to appear in an Ontario, Ore., court Tuesday to face a misdemeanor assault charge related to a Jan. 26 post-game scuffle at Treasure Valley Community College.

Dixie freshman forward Kris Jex, 6' Spanish-Fork, is accused of punching a 52-year-old man who he believed had pushed him from behind during a game. Ontario Police Capt. Mike Kee said the

hallyway incident is still under investigation, but there is evidence some Treasure Valley fans intimidated the Dixie players with racial slurs. Some Dixie players are black and others Polynesian.

As the Rebels were leaving the gymnasium, members of the Treasure Valley baseball team allegedly confronted them in a hallway, blocking their way to the bus, eyewitnesses said.

Jex, 18, who is white, didn't look at the Treasure Valley fan before swinging, according to a Dixie College news release. He

told authorities he was acting on reflex. The victim, Larry Rowbury, is a father of a Treasure Valley baseball player and was reportedly trying to break up the scuffle by pushing the athletes apart. The blow knocked him to the concrete floor, and he is still recovering from a head injury in nearby Boise where he was flown the night he was punched.

Rowbury reportedly bled profusely at the scene because of anti-clotting medication he was taking for an upcoming liver transplant.

Jex was charged with fourth-degree misdemeanor assault and is tentatively scheduled to appear in Malheur County Court on Tuesday. Jex will be suspended from playing pending the outcome of the case, according to Dixie officials.

"No matter the circumstances, we cannot condone any degree of violence," college President Robert Huddleston said in the statement. "It is our policy to apply appropriate disciplinary measures if a student or athlete violates our college code of conduct."

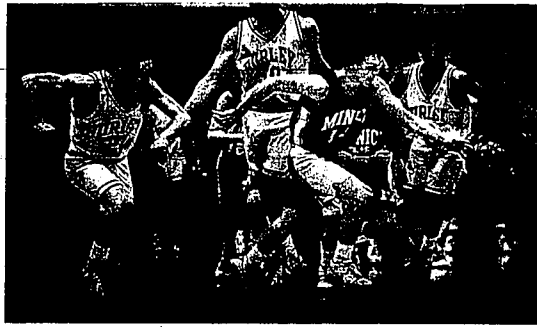
led by Gillette, Minico's bench outscored Burley's 28-11. The 11-point difference equalled the final gap between the two clubs.

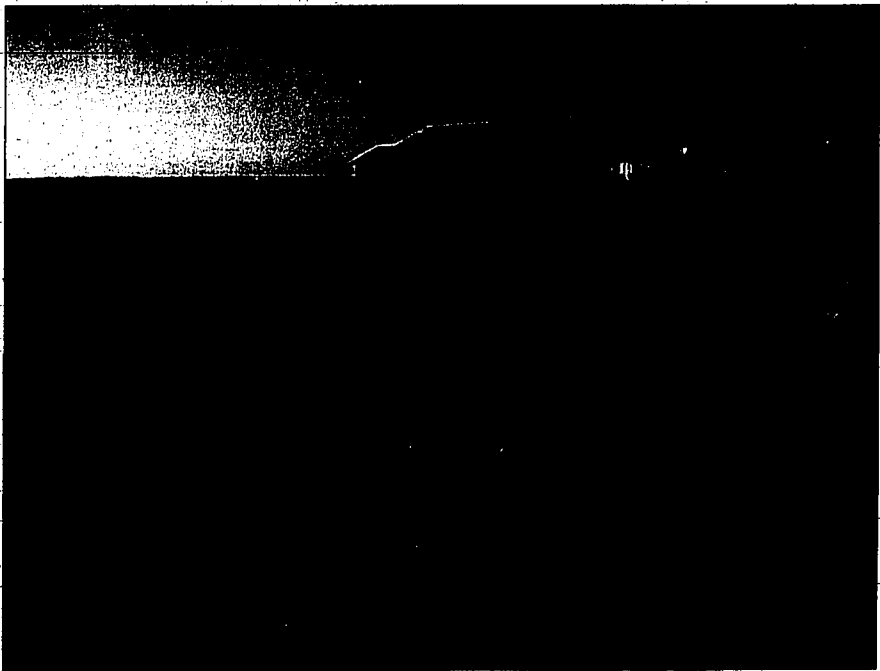

"What you do is not who you are. When you confuse the two, there is always the potential for losing your worth, your purpose, your self. Totally invested in work, you rely on it for more than it can give. Once it is gone, your self is a shell. Resilient pastors move back and forth between doing what is good for self and what is required at work."

Growing from the ground

Mennonite farmers build a new church west of Filer

FILER — Nestled in the rich farmlands west of Filer, a simple and beautiful church is being constructed as a place of worship for a growing Mennonite congregation.

With the Buhl Mennonite Church, located about three miles west of Buhl, filled to capacity, members decided it would be better to build a church near Filer instead of expanding the Buhl building. The Filer church would serve people living in the eastern part of the Magic Valley, they reasoned.

Some 200 members presently attend the Buhl church. About half are expected to attend the Filer church when it is completed this spring.

Ministers at the Buhl Mennonite Church are Harold Eck, Kent Wiebe, Les Isaac and Wayne Amoth. Amoth and one of the other ministers will serve the new Filer church.

The Filer church — Valley View Mennonite Church — is being built on donated land. Young men, most of them farmers, come almost every day to donate their time and the carpentry skills that they learned from their fathers and grandfathers. They work quietly and with a sense of reverence.

Amoth said the membership growth must have come "because God is at work."

He added, "We're not a fast-growing group, but we are growing and we appreciate it. We're not looking for numbers, but quality of living and commitment to Christ."

The Buhl and Valley View Mennonite churches are

affiliated with the Church of God in Christ Mennonites, while the 82-year-old Filer Mennonite Church, which has an average attendance of 75, is affiliated with the Old Mennonite Conference.

The new Valley View building will seat about 200 people. An attached hall will be used for dinners, social events and monthly women's meetings.

Amoth said visitors will be welcome at all services. The women in this church train the girls in sewing and other homemaking skills. They make quilts and sew dresses, men's shirts and baby clothing to give to needy families. A storage room for supplies is being built in the new church.

A large alcove near the church entrance will be used as a bookstore. An upstairs balcony will seat about 50 people. Three Sunday school classrooms will adjoin the seating area.

When worshipping, these Mennonite women sit on one side of the sanctuary and men sit on the other side. Two nursery rooms are being built at the back of the Valley View sanctuary, one for use by the mothers and one for use by the fathers.

The worshippers sing without the accompaniment of musical instruments.

The children go to Deep Creek Mennonite School, a parochial school located on the Buhl church site. They attend school until they complete the eighth grade. After eighth grade, as Amoth put it, "the children are expected to learn how to make a good living by working with their parents."

If young people choose to go into a profession that requires higher education, they prepare for that profession — with the consent of the church.

Young people are expected to marry within the church membership. If a young man or woman "falls in love" with someone outside the faith, he or she must "win that person to the Lord" or lose church membership status. Some basic beliefs of Church of God in Christ Mennonites: "Moral purity in the young people and chastity in every conscience provide for lasting marriages and solid homes — places of peace and contentment. True contentment eliminates the desire to pursue selfish pleasure, higher education, fame, riches and power. Christ's church is known by the way it believes and practices all the teachings of the Bible. The Biblical Church does not add to or take away from these teachings, but holds them even in the face of opposition, ridicule and death — refer to John 14:15. Self, lust, worldly pleasures and fashions are counted as sin upon which the judgments of God are pending. Power, honor, fame and riches are not pursued. Strife, force and war have no place in the Church of God."

The women dress modestly, usually in floral print dresses they made themselves. A black velvet covering is worn on their heads (1 Corinthians 11:3-16). The men wear beards "because the Lord created them that way."

The ministers are chosen "by the Lord and the people of the church." They do not attend seminary or other higher education facilities.

Amoth and his wife Letha also operate a mini-storage business near Buhl.

Evangelicals back Endangered Species Act, launch campaign

WASHINGTON — Pointing to the Bible and the story of Noah's ark, a group of evangelical environmentalists is launching a \$1 million education and advertising campaign Wednesday in support of the Endangered Species Act.

"People in their arrogance are destroying God's creation, yet Congress and special interests are trying to sink the Noah's ark of our day — the Endangered Species Act," said Calvin DeWitt, co-founder of the Evangelical Environmental Network, a zoologist at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and president of the Christian Environmental Council.

"Few legislative issues ought to be as clear for Christians as this one. Christian faith teaches respect for the works of God and the Endangered Species Act offers real and fair protection for all of his creation." Leaders of Baptist, Methodist and Evangelical Lutheran churches among others joined in kicking off the campaign at a news conference with a 120-pound cougar named "Maverick" on

loan from the zoo in Columbus, Ohio. Evangelical Christians interpret the Bible literally as God's word and are more conservative than some main-line Christian denominations. The conservative Christian Coalition has been a strong backer of the Republican agenda in Congress and the GOP "Contract with America," which includes a plank intended to help protect private property rights against environmental regulation.

"There's a difference between being theologically conservative and socially conservative," said Clyde D. Taylor, a former U.S. ambassador to Paraguay in the Reagan administration whose father of the same name, founded the National Association of Evangelicals.

"The religious right are our sisters and brothers ... Our plan to them is to go back and reread the scriptures," said Ron Sider of Wynnewood, Pa., president of Evangelicals for Social Action. "We're here to say if they think a majority of evangelicals want the Endangered Species Act gutted, they are wrong." The Evangelical Environmental Network's radio and television ads will begin running soon

in 18 states yet to be determined.

"In the book of Genesis, Noah builds an ark and saves all living species from destruction," one 60-second radio ad begins. "Well, today, God's creatures are threatened by our own great flood — of pollution or habitat destruction. And that's why America has built an ark — the Endangered Species Act ..."

In addition to the ads, the group is sending 30,000 "Creation Care" packets to churches across the country and creating a network of "Noah Congregations" that sign up for activities to preserve nature. Sider said members of the group were coming forward "as ambassadors of the Creator."

The group met with Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt earlier Wednesday and had a private meeting, scheduled late in the day with House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga.

"These evangelical leaders ... are reminding us all that those religious values are at the very core of the 1973 Endangered Species Act," Babbitt said. "Unfortunately, extremists in the new Congress, driven by an extinction lobby of special interests, are trying to suffocate this act."

Church destruction racially motivated

BOLIGEE, Ala. — To Charlie Means and the other 40 members of the Mount Zion Baptist Church, there is no more heart-breaking sight than the crumbling brick shell, blackened with smoke, in a clearing in these lonesome woods.

The 106-year-old church burned to the ground on Dec. 22, apparently the work of arsonists, and that is painful enough. But on the night of Jan. 11, two other black churches in this isolated community of west Alabama also were destroyed by fire, and residents here, black and white, can no longer deny that race was the motivation.

"You hurt so bad when you see something like this," said Means, 31, a truckdriver who has been a deacon in the church since he was 11, wiping his eyes as he looked at the ruins. "We had the best of times in this church."

The destruction of the three churches in Greene County, long recognized as one of the poorest counties in America, follows a series of attacks on black churches both in adjoining Sumter County and in nearby Tennessee. It raises anew the disturbing specter of a time when the civil rights movement was at its most heated, and black churches in Alabama and elsewhere in the South were targeted and burned.

And, even as Boligee church members hope investigators will find that the attacks were not racially motivated, they cannot ignore the fact that no white churches were harmed in this deeply religious area, where black sharecroppers and white plantation

owners once lived side by side. "We don't know who did this, or why they did it, but whoever could do this against God's house is mean-spirited and evil," said Spiver W. Gordon, 36, a leader with the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), who lives in the area.

The timing of the latest attacks, Jan. 11, is particularly suspicious, occurring the same day local newspapers reported that two young white men had been sentenced to serve six months in jail and pay \$50,000 in restitution for their part in a drunken February 1994 rampage at three black churches in Sumter County. A juvenile involved in the case died of an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound before he could be sentenced.

Visitors to this remote part of Alabama, near the Mississippi line, often comment on the unchanged landscape and, in some cases, on the seemingly unchanged attitudes about race relations. It is not uncommon to hear whites here referring to the blacks as "colored people," even while protesting that everyone gets along fine and there is no visible tension between the races.

In Greene County — which is 85 percent black and where the 1990 per capita income was \$6,300, far lower than many other Alabama counties — the public schools have virtually no white students, said District Attorney Lanaker.

Combined with the recent Tennessee case, the destruction of the west Alabama churches creates an alarming picture of violence against what has long been the center of life of the local black communities.

Olympic evangelism plan stirs controversy

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP)

Religious leaders are trying to make sure diversity is a key element of a plan to meet the spiritual needs of athletes participating in Olympic sailing events in Savannah this summer.

"It's a time to honor and respect diversity of all faith traditions," said the Rev. Audrey Vincent, who leads the Unitarian Universalist Church in Savannah.

Some clerics said they were uneasy about the taken-by-Chris Fuller, organizer of the inter-

faith religious support team for Olympic sailors, who also plans to lead a Baptist evangelism effort in Savannah during the Summer Games.

Rabbi Arnold Belzer, head of Congregation Mickve Israel, said Fuller's roles are at odds.

"If anybody can do both jobs, it's Chris, (but) both jobs are absolutely, positively antithetical to each other," said Belzer, who is not involved in Olympic planning.

Fuller said members of his Baptist

group won't try to convert anyone in the Olympic village. But he has agreed to let the Rev. Thurmond Tillman, head of First African Baptist Church, take the lead in devising a religious service plan for the athletes.

The interfaith support group so far includes two Roman Catholic priests, a rabbi and several chaplains.

Fuller has been working as a volunteer with the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games, but AGO officials said Fuller does not offi-

cially represent them. Reed Draper, deputy director of Savannah's Olympic village, said no religious program is definite for the 443 sailors who will begin moving into the village in early July.

Imam Masjid F. Ali, who represents several hundred followers of Islam in Savannah, said he was disappointed that his faith had not been included so far.

Fuller said not everyone can be included in planning, but he remains receptive to help.

Catholics, Protestants just paying the bills

Maybe Catholics aren't such skinflints after all.

It's no secret among researchers that Catholics put substantially less in collection plates than Protestants. What has remained a mystery, however, is why the descendants of immigrants who sacrificed to build magnificent churches and schools are giving less and less in inflation-adjusted dollars as their incomes rise.

Now, new research indicates Protestants and Catholics may be more alike in their giving than the numbers indicate: Both are just trying to pay the bills at their local church.

And much of the difference in giving may be explained by the fact that it's cheaper to run a Catholic church, according to the Champan, Ill.-based research organization empty tomb Inc. Larger Catholic parishes offering multiple services on Sunday are more cost-efficient, and unmarried Catholic clergy are paid significantly lower salaries.

Instead of looking only at Catholics as lagging stewards, all Christian churches need to examine whether they are teaching their members to share their wealth with the needy as opposed to merely giving enough to keep the lights on, researchers are now concluding.

"What appears to be the situation for both Catholics and Protestants is it appears that the church in the United States has not had a positive agenda for the increasing affluence since World War II," said Sylvia Ronvall, executive director of empty tomb Inc. "People are paying the bill at the church the same way they are paying any other bill in their life."

Several studies in recent years have shown that Catholics, despite having higher incomes

than many Protestant groups, do not rate up as much in Sunday collections.

In a 1993 national survey of 625 congregations in five denominations, the average contribution per household reported by congregations ranged from \$386 for Catholics to \$1,605 for Assemblies of God members. Baptist households gave an average of \$1,154 and Presbyterians were next with \$1,085, followed by Lutherans at \$746.

In probing deeper into the differences, researchers Michael J. Donohue of the Minneapolis-based Search Institute, Patrick McNamara of the University of New Mexico, Charles Zech of Villanova University and Dean Hoge of Catholic University of America found little evidence for some popular theories.

For example, researchers found no indication that the lower giving was tied to dissatisfaction with church policies on issues such as birth control, nor was the larger parish size of Catholic churches found to be a significant factor.

There are no exact figures for Catholic giving, but empty tomb used a midrange estimate of about \$5.5 billion for 1991. If Catholics were to compensate their clergy at Protestant levels, maintain the Protestant average of a 347-to-1 parishioner to clergy ratio and offer only one worship service per building, it would have cost an additional estimated \$5.9 billion to \$8.8 billion, empty tomb estimated.

The Ronvall has been tracking for years a steady increase among Protestants in the percentage of income given to the church.

In the latest edition of their annual report on "The State of Church Giving," they report church giving has decreased in the 29 Protestant denominations they studied from 3.14 percent in 1968 to 2.52 percent in 1993.

Christian Coalition courts Catholics

The Christian Coalition, televangelist Pat Robertson's political organization, has launched a new group to attract Catholics to its political agenda in anticipation of this year's presidential election.

The Catholic Alliance is expected to unite the Christian Coalition's primarily evangelical Protestant members with conservative Catholics on issues ranging from opposing abortion to school choice to limiting the role of government.

Nationally, Catholics make up 16 percent of the Christian Coalition's reported 1.5 million-member membership, Catholics say. With the new group, they hope to boost Catholic membership to 30 percent.

"We're trying to encourage like-minded Catholics to join the Christian Coalition," said Maureen Roselli, executive director of the Catholic Alliance and a former official with National Right to Life. "We're all American citizens who have concern for the direction this country is taking. We want to promote a pro-family, pro-life agenda."

The Catholic Alliance was formed last fall with a budget of \$1.3 million. In December it had its first regional meeting in Boston.

Historically, Catholics and evangelical Protestants have had a rocky relationship, fueled by theological differences and by suspicions on both sides that each group was trying to proselytize the other.

In 1994, prominent Catholics, including Cardinal John O'Connor of New York, and prominent evangelicals, such as Pat Robertson, signed a document called "Evangelicals and Catholics Together" that attempted to find common theological ground between the two groups. The document caused a stir in religious circles; critics, especially evangelicals, said that key doctrinal differences were glossed over in the name of unity on social issues such as abortion.

Steve Hollem, a Catholic who is chairman of the Tarrant County (Texas) Republican Party and who

considers himself a friend of the Christian Coalition, said he will consider joining.

"Most conservative Catholics have a great deal of common values shared with the Christian Coalition in the sense of family values, moral and ethical values, abortion, where the homosexual agenda is going in the political arena," he said. "So there's a lot of things I think are very common."

Meanwhile, 2,000 predominantly liberal Catholic organizations and individuals have signed a petition opposing the Catholic Alliance and calling it a "front for a right-wing agenda." Liberal Catholics accuse the Christian Coalition of supporting a legislative agenda that undermines the poor, minorities and immigrants and supporting positions in opposition to Catholic teaching, such as the death penalty and big defense spending.

"It's not really a Catholic group," said John Girardi of Plano, Texas, who signed the protest statement. "I think the thing is being formed with the purpose of trying to solicit the support of people of the Catholic tradition to join churches of other traditions."

The group may not be embraced by the U.S. Catholic hierarchy, either.

In preparation for this year's presidential race, the nation's Roman Catholic bishops are distributing a statement on political responsibility that declared, "Our moral framework does not easily fit the categories of right or left, Republican or Democrat."

In addition to opposing abortion rights, the bishops' statement supports the earned income tax credit for the working poor, some affirmative action programs, arms control, foreign aid, the United Nations, universal access to health care and a generous immigration policy — issues that in many cases the Christian Coalition either takes no position on or opposes.

Churches send missionaries to cyberspace

URBANA, Ill. (AP) — When the Rev. Paul Swartz came to St. Matthew Lutheran Church seven years ago, the church bulletin was produced with typewriters and mimeograph machines.

Now his congregation's happenings are available around the globe on the World Wide Web, the booming portion of the Internet that lets users see pictures, read-text and hear recordings.

"We've got to be able to reach people where they are, not where we think they ought to be," Swartz says. "I see the church recapturing an earlier sense of what we're here for, a larger sense of community."

For St. Matthew Lutheran and a growing number of churches, community outreach now includes missions to cyberspace. The church's presence on the Internet is not only a way to bring in new, technology-

savvy members, but also to allow congregation members easy access to a church community without leaving home.

The move is particularly visible in the twin cities of Urbana and Champaign, home to the University of Illinois, the National Center for Supercomputing Applications, a community computer network called PrairieNet and thousands of on-line computerfiles. More than a dozen

churches or religious organizations in the community of about 100,000 have Web pages, and more are jumping on the Internet as the weeks go by.

"This is never going to replace all the other things churches will do, but as long as it's around, we can use it as another tool to reach out," said Ryan Neavill, who administers the Web site for the First United Methodist Church in Champaign.

Continued from C5 shopping. Some retailers were upbeat, too. "It's a great move that will really impact the trust a consumer can have in Internet shopping," said Chris McCann, vice president of 1-800-FLOWERS, which already gets at least \$2.5 million in revenue annually through on-line orders. "It's probably safer than giving your card to a waiter in a restaurant."

Internet commerce totaled about \$350 million last year, according to Forrester Research, a market-research firm. Its proponents are convinced that it will become a multi-billion-dollar business as millions of American sit at home, call up electronic catalogues on their screens and place orders on-line for goods to be delivered by mail or courier service.

Skeptics wonder if large numbers of Americans really want to shop that way. But on both sides, people agree that to find out, the industry has to come up with a way to allay fears of credit card fraud. "The major obstacle to shopping on the Internet has been eliminated," said Jan Jeon, a senior analyst of Money and Technology Strategies at Forrester. But he also cautioned, "I don't think you're going to see massive retail purchases overnight. There is the whole shopping experience that has to be transferred on-line."

Before the agreement, Visa and MasterCard had been working separately on rival security standards. Visa was allied with Microsoft Corp., MasterCard with International Business Machines Corp. and Netscape Communications. Now they all have come together to create the Secure Electronic Transactions, or SET, standard for shopping on the World Wide Web, the graphics-rich portion of the Internet.

The software will use encryption techniques developed by the industry's leader, RSA Data Security Inc. As described by the two credit card companies, consumers will be able to make purchases by installing the SET software in their computers. To make a purchase, the shopper fills out a form on the computer screen directing it to be paid using a credit card. The software sends an "encrypted envelope" that contains the order and payment data to the merchant.

The merchant is able to read only the data that pertains to the order, such as the type of product and the customer's address for shipping. The financial data, which includes scrambled versions of the customer's account number and the product's price, are sent electronically to the consumer's bank.

The bank verifies the consumer's card and the purchase amount, and if everything is in order, sends back an approval code to the merchant. "This is more secure than the system that we have today," said Craig Mundie, senior vice president of the Consumer Systems Division for Microsoft. "There is no residue in this environment as in the physical action of a store," he said, referring to such things as carbon copies of credit card receipts. "There are elements of this that are more secure than the paper system used today."

Apple struggles with compatibility problems

Twelve years ago, watching the 1984 Super Bowl, Americans were transfixed by a TV commercial for a computer with the unlikely name Macintosh.

It featured a young woman in a track suit running toward the front of a huge auditorium packed with thousands of people who were listening to an Orwellian speech by Big Brother, clearly meant to be Big Blue, IBM Corp. She hurled a hammer into the screen, making Big Brother's Big Blue disappear in a cloud of smoke and shattered screens.

That Apple Computer commercial never ran again. Yet those 30 seconds changed forever the way the world gets its information, its education and its entertainment. The revolution that Apple set into motion with the Macintosh can be seen everywhere, from the young hands of children clutching a computer mouse while learning their ABCs to the latest displays on the Internet's World Wide Web.

All depend upon the "point and click" system of computer mouse and on-screen icons — introduced by Macintosh that day 12 years ago — that made computers as accessible to ordinary people as to the most adept technophiles.

Now, however, it appears that Apple, the Cupertino, Calif.-based company that builds Macintoshes for the rest of us, can no longer save the rest of itself. After taking huge losses over the just-completed Christmas season, the company is the focus of strong pressure to be bought or purchased by Sun Microsystems Inc., a Mountain View, Calif.-based company well known for its own innovations. Sources close to the scene say buyout talks continue even as the two companies decline to comment.

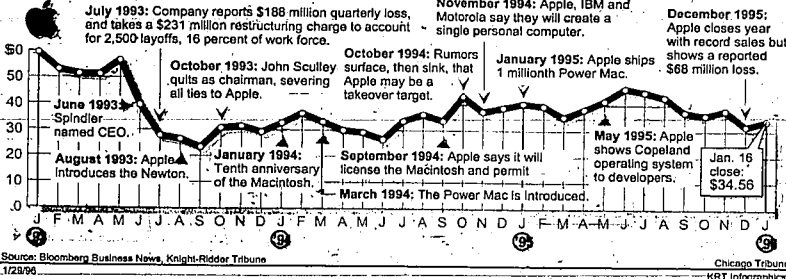
At the heart of Apple's business woes are a string of marketing mistakes that have been widely discussed in recent days. Apple, founded in a two-car garage in Santa Clara, Calif., in 1976 by two Steves — Steven Jobs and Stephen Wozniak — has, in fact, been on the losing end of the now critical marketing battle almost since the day of that revolutionary Super Bowl commercial.

The conflict has pitted Apple against IBM, and the myriad IBM clone makers. On a personal level, a debate of cultish proportions still rages between devoted Mac owners and PC owners.

Apple's Mac has created millions of intensely loyal customers. It even changed the nation's vocabulary, giving new meaning to words like mouse and icon and bit. Even Macintosh, which once meant a type of raincoat or a partic-

Apple gets to the core of its problems

National Semiconductor chief leaves amid reports he's heading to Apple

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — National Semiconductor Corp.'s chief resigned Friday amid reports that struggling Apple Computer Inc. had ousted its own leader and hired the National Semiconductor man in his place.

National did not confirm its chairman and chief executive officer, Gil Amelio, was going to lead Apple and there was no immediate word from Apple.

Amelio, who had been an Apple director,

was chosen by other directors Wednesday to replace Apple chief executive Michael Spindler, according to reports Friday in the San Francisco Chronicle, San Jose Mercury News and The Wall Street Journal.

The Mercury News also reported that Amelio will become chairman of Apple, replacing A.C. "Mike" Markkula, whose association with the firm began when he raised capital for the company's founders nearly 20 years ago.

No longer. The competition has caught up in quality, and Apple can't compete on price. When it tries — as it did during the Christmas sales season — it loses money.

Now, Apple is drowning in a sea of red ink and engulfed in a firestorm of speculation about its future.

Millions of loyal customers are anxiously watching, awaiting news of the fate of a company and a computer. For people such as Jennifer Dees, publisher of Digital Chicago magazine — which was named MacChicago until last month — it's a religion. "I think that long-time Mac users who are devoted to their machines as a way of life are getting very upset about this," said Dees. "They have been very satisfied with this platform, if not with the

company that owns it, for a long time." But nobody is getting much satisfaction right now. Apple's shareholder meeting Tuesday in Cupertino ended with Chairman Mike Markkula cryptically saying that Apple would not comment on speculation that Sun Microsystems has offered \$4 billion for the company "until the time is right."

Meanwhile, the human cost is high. Hoping to cope with its losses, Apple fired more than 1,300 people last week. Experts on the company such as Tim Bajarin, president of Creative Strategies Research International, warn that more job losses may be ahead.

"Even though I am optimistic about the future of Apple," said Bajarin before Tuesday's meeting, "I sense that a very major change is in the cards for just about anybody with an interest in their machines."

Macs may be computers for "the rest of us." But in creative fields like graphic arts, film-making, advertising, desktop publishing and home pages on the Internet, they have become the trusted tool.

Mac users have tended to be concentrated among the cultural and artistic elite. For example:

- 63 percent of all multimedia applications development is done on Macintosh, according to Datagroup, an arm of the Gartner Group of computer industry analysts.

- Apple says it has a 47 percent share of the entire U.S. commercial publishing market.

- Macs account for 76.2 percent of the color-prepress market, according to a 1995 study by Griffin Dix Research Associates.

ular 'apple' now means something else to millions, becoming a household word and a global icon hasn't been enough. Apple just had the most successful Christmas season — in terms of sales — in its history. Yet it lost \$69 million on the quarter.

Every year, in fact, Apple sells more personal computers than any other company in America.

Yet all the other computer makers are selling cheaper machines that work together, but not with the Mac.

Apple once cherished such exclusivity. Indeed, it gave the Mac a cachet that enabled the company to sell its computers for hundreds of dollars more than anyone else could charge. Mac devotees would willingly pay the price.

Down New York 31 on profit-taking
NEW YORK — Stock prices Friday took a breather from this week's record-breaking performance. The Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 31.07 points to 5733.99 amid renewed worries about inflation and sharp declines on the bond market.

Traders said market sentiment remained upbeat, with much of the decline concentrated around blue-chip cyclical, which led the Dow to its string of five consecutive record highs and a surge past the 5400 milestone.

Despite the Dow's retreat, the NASDAQ composite index touched a record high, rising 2.69 points to 1072.15 amid firmness among semiconductor stocks.

For the week, the Dow rose 102 points, or 1.9 percent. Before Friday's sell-off, the

Dow had been up as much as 2.5 percent this week. Broader indices were weaker. The New York Stock Exchange composite index closed down 1.14 at 340.09 and the S&P 500 index lost 2.61 points to 635.85.

BOISE — The Idaho Housing Agency has \$10 million in low-interest mortgages still available to fund approximately 144 homes for Idaho's first-time home buyers.

Home buyers can choose from several loan options and interest rates on 30-year loans offered by the agency. Interest rates on the new mortgage funds range from 6.03 to 6.81 percent and represent some of the most attractive mortgage interest rates in the state. During its 1995 fiscal year, the Idaho

Housing Agency committed \$172.9 million in low-interest mortgage loan funds for Idaho's low-to-moderate-income home buyers.

TJ International reports loss
BOISE — TJ International Inc. lost \$29.9 million last year after taking a one-time charge of \$36.2 million to get rid of its unprofitable window businesses.

"Our loss in 1995 was unacceptable," Chief Executive Officer Tom Denig said in a statement Thursday. But he said with the removal of the window segment, "we are now entirely focused on the engineered lumber business." Denig has been chief executive of the Boise-based company for just over a year. He replaced Walt Minnick, who quit in De-

ember, 1994, after a dispute with the board of directors.

TJ International's 1995 sales from its engineered lumber operations were \$485 million, down 2 percent from the year before. Earnings from engineered lumber were \$9.7 million, down from \$16.3 million in 1994.





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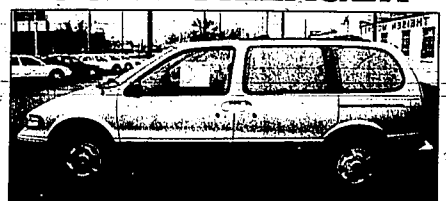
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Q: Didn't Elizabeth Berkley's incredible performance in "Showgirls" short-circuit what otherwise would have been a promising screen career?

A-R: Until "Showgirls," Berkley, 23, was relatively little-known actress with a network TV series, "Saved by the Bell," under her belt. In the curious world of Hollywood, a starring role in a big-time movie tick — we recently critically panned "Showgirls" — can jump-start a career.

That appears to be the case in Elizabeth's situation: She's just been cast as the young love interest of a middle-aged Hollywood producer in "The First Wives Club." This big-studio project puts her in the heady company of co-stars Diane Keaton, Goldie Hawn and Bette Midler. As Mickey is learning, getting noticed in Hollywood is just about everything.

Q: I haven't heard much about the private life of Andy Garcia. Is he as mysterious and where is he from? — H

A: Garcia, 39, is considered one of Hollywood's A-list younger actors. He was born in Havana, Cuba, and immigrated with his family to Miami when he was 5 years old.

Andy is now regarded as the first big-time Cuban actor in Hollywood since the late Cesar Romero. He turned in credible performances in the third "Godfather" movie (1990) and opposite Meg Ryan in "When

a Man Loves a Woman" (1994).

He has worked hard to keep his private life private. Garcia's wife of 15 years, Maria, is also from Cuba. The couple has three daughters, all of whom accompanied their parents to the Toronto Film Festival to push his latest films, "Steal Big, Steal Little" and "Things to Do in Denver When You're Dead."

Garcia is hard at work preparing his future project, "The Lost City," which has been described as a Cuban "Casablanca."

Q: After Dean Martin's funeral, many news items mentioned he was buried in a formal evening suit. Do you know whether Hollywood funeral directors routinely suggest tuxedos? — L.E.

A: Funeral directors have nothing to do with the choice of a burial outfit. Some funeral directors say that their clients often choose a tuxedo, but they were most reluctant to offer specific names. However, I do know that Bela Lugosi, who died in 1956, left instructions that he was to be buried in formal clothes, including his

trademark cape.

Q: How did Phyllis McGuire of the McGuire Sisters wind up as her unflattering portrayal as a mobster's moll in that "Sugartime" TV movie? Is she suing? — R.V.

A: Phyllis McGuire, who turns 65 this month, has been living in Las Vegas for many years. Her one-time romance with slain mobster Sam Giancana was the subject of HBO's "Sugartime."

Phyllis completely dissociates herself from the TV movie, calling it "fiction rather than fact." The material involved, she adds, has been covered already in more than 30 books and movies. Phyllis is planning her own book "to set the record straight."

In the meantime, she keeps active by playing to audiences around the country with her two older sisters, Dorothy and Christine. I spotted Phyllis recently at a Society of Singers benefit in Hollywood, and she looks terrific.

Q: Please provide some info about John Leguizamo, who costarred in the wonderful film "To Wong Foo,

Thanks for Everything, Julie Newmar" in drag. Is he straight, and does he have a steady girlfriend? — G.S.

A: Leguizamo, 31, grew up in Queens, N.Y., but hails originally from Bogota, Colombia. He has been called "the Charles Dickens of the Latino experience in urban America." His experience in New York theater, plus a one-man show, more than prepared him for the hilarious role as diva wannabe Chi Chi Rodriguez in "To Wong Foo."

Leguizamo got married in 1994 to his longtime girlfriend, Yelba. The union, he admits, is a volatile one — "both beautiful and painful. Her fights are bigger and crazier than they used to be." But, the actor adds, he's in it for the long haul, "for eternity."

Q: I hear that Linda Hamilton has a baby, but there's no mention of a husband. Can you explain this? — T.F.

A: Hamilton, 39, has had her share of professional and personal setbacks. Her physician father was killed in an accident when she was very young. Her marriage in the late '80s to actor

Bruce Abbott didn't work out. She also maintains she was tipped off by a former agent.

"The Terminator" movies set things right, professionally and romantically. The high-concept action flicks were directed by James Cameron, 41, who entered Linda's personal life as well. The two have been significant others for some time and have a daughter named Josephine.

My Hollywood spies reported the pair at a local restaurant recently. They report that Hamilton was showing off a large engagement ring. I'll have to keep you posted as to how it all turns out.

Q: David Carradine of the "Kung Fu" TV series seems like a genuine eccentric off camera who has a host of marital troubles. Is this impression correct? — T.R.

A: You're not too far off the mark. The 59-year-old David, son of the late actor, John Carradine, has been a determined individualist for years.

In 1972, he starred in an early Martin Scorsese film titled "Boxcar Bertha." Carradine's co-star was Barbara Hershey. The two fell in love, and she became his first wife. That marriage went bust, as did a second.

Carradine's third marriage was to his current wife and one-time manager, Gail. The union has lasted eight years but now seems to be on the rocks. He has filed for formal separation. While Carradine works in Toronto on "Kung Fu," his estranged wife re-

mains in California.

Q: It's true that Dorothy Lamour, the one-time screen song queen, is set to join other divas (like Carol Channing in "Hello, Dolly!") and Julie Andrews in "Victor/Victoria" in a Broadway comeback? — M.L.

A: Forget those reports. Dottie is firmly retired and, at age 81, undoubtedly plans to stay that way. However, she is billed as a consultant on a sequel to the success of "and" songs in a new Broadway revue, "Singing on a Star," dedicated to the lyrics of Johnny Burke. It's probably that association which generated those erroneous stories about a possible Lamour comeback.

FATE'S -- FICKLE HAND

If he hadn't injured his hand in 1971, Frank Sinatra would have starred on the big screen as "Dirty Harry," and the film would have been titled "Dead Right."

Ol' Blue Eyes, now 80, would have uttered those now legendary words, "Ask yourself, do I feel lucky?" instead of Clint Eastwood, 65, who really got lucky when Sinatra withdrew from the film.

We'll never know whether he would have been convincing enough as "Dirty Harry." Callahan, the San Francisco cop, to span the four sequels, "Magnum Force," "The Enforcer," "Sudden Impact" and "The Death Pool," which launched Eastwood to the super stardom he still enjoys 25 years later.

These days, however, the WB Television Network is certain that the time is right for another go at a sexy prime-time soap. And with Aaron Spelling serving as executive producer, they've come up with "Savannah."

Set in the deep South, the hour-long weekly drama airs on Sunday evenings and serves as an alternative to the network TV movies. "Savannah" is very well produced and the characters are richly textured.

The plot centers around three young women who grew up together. There's Reese Burton, the wealthy girl who had all the privileges and is about to be married to the perfect guy (or so it seems). Reese is played by Shannon Sturges, and so far she has been the catalyst to get things going. (The show's opening episode aired Jan. 21. The regular run begins on Sunday, Feb. 4.)

More interesting is the show's bad girl Peyton Richards, who managed to disrupt everyone's lives in the premiere — it came to light that she has been having an affair with Reese's hus-

band-to-be. Jamie Luner's portrayal of Peyton has a nice quality and manages to convey an elegance tinged with vulnerability.

The third member of the group is career girl Lane MacKenzie, who returns to New York City for her friend's wedding and finds that she has been the victim of a scam perpetrated by the busy bridegroom. Robyn Lively portrays Lane with conviction. She strikes a nice balance between the other two female leads.

In soaps, the characters are as important as the plotting. For viewers to return week after week, they have to connect with a certain character often with more than one. "Savannah" has many characters on which to focus. One particular favorite so far is Lane MacKenzie. In the opener, Lane managed to rekindle an old flame with her high school boyfriend (played by David Gail), and their scenes together displayed a chemistry that was most appealing.

Daytime soap fans might do themselves a favor and take a look at "Savannah."

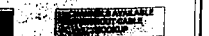

Danson stars in TV version of 'Gulliver's Travels' on NBC

Don't bother pulling out a copy of Jonathan Swift's 1726 satirical novel until after the final credits roll on NBC's four-hour adaptation of "Gulliver's Travels." Trying to match Swift's bitter commentary with the mini-series might drive fastidious scholars to a mental asylum.

And - literary scholars are hereby forewarned - that's exactly what's been done to poor ship's surgeon Lemuel Gulliver. Why, of course this man must be mad, returning after an eight-year journey to his wife and a son he's never seen and a ranting about adventures in lands where the people are 6 inches tall, or 60 feet tall; where intellectuals live on a floating island; or where horses are the masters and humans are detestable, grotesque creatures.

Whereas Swift conjured images of fantastic places and people, this \$28 million production (Sunday and Monday nights) may be able to make them seem real. But "Gulliver's Travels" without Swift's overriding loathing of humankind - what are these Johns thinking?

Ted Danson also had questions after he was cast as the wayfaring Gulliver. He had no doubts about the ability of the filmmakers. However, the two-time Emmy winner worried about how an American, without affecting an accent, could pull off this English character.

"It was a month into shooting," Danson said, "before I said, 'Yes, they were right to cast me, and this is exactly the right thing for me to do.'"

The epic tale starts quickly and furiously, with Gulliver's troubled mind being tossed between bits and pieces. In the opening minutes his thoughts switch often - and seamlessly - from England to Lilliput, where the warring little people press him into service against the Big Enders. The exceptional quality of

the 400 computer-assisted special effects are immediately obvious, but that's not the intent, said Danson. "Kenworthy, an executive director with Robert Hamt Jr. and Brian Henson.

"What we didn't want to do is watch this that be constantly saying, 'Wow, that's an amazing effect.'" Kenworthy said. "What we want instead is to use the special effect to make the impossible look ordinary."

Director Charles Sturridge also utilizes a stellar cast, whom he told last April at the start of the four-month European shoot. "You are his special effects."

Not even Jim Henson Productions can create an equal to the talents of Peter O'Toole, Mary Steenburgen, Sir John Gielgud, Alan Sharif, Alfred Woodard, Ned Beatty, Edward Woodward, James Fox and Kristin Scott Thomas. (In addition, director Sturridge's wife, Phoebe Nicholls, portrays the Empress of Lilliput, and his son, Thomas Sturridge, plays Gulliver's son, Tom.)

Danson said, "It was a little scary to watch everyone act, especially Peter O'Toole; the guy is absolutely remarkable. The one comfort I had, watching him work and being intimidated, was realizing that when it came time for him to be on screen, he would be 6 inches tall. I felt that would give me the needed edge, about a 10-to-1 ratio."

Computers and actors blend with greatest effect during the first two hours, in the retelling of Gulliver's most familiar adventures. Danson said, "They

mixed typical blue screen - where they take a picture of a real castle and later on put a picture of me and put the two together -

(with models and tricks of perspective... They keep you off balance so you really end up accepting the images as real."

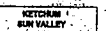

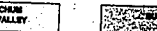

CBS chooses producer Kline as executive VP

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS News chose one of its top producers Monday to oversee its troubled "60 Minutes" and "48 Hours" news magazines.

Jonathan Klein, executive producer of the "Before Your Eyes" documentary specials, was named executive vice president of CBS News. He will report to CBS News President Andrew Heyward, who was himself appointed Jan. 8.

"It's a little scary, and it's definitely a huge challenge," Klein said. Although "60 Minutes," under executive producer Don Hewitt, is TV's highest-rated news magazine and CBS' biggest money-maker, its ratings have slipped since CBS lost its lead-in, the National Football League games.

NBC plans to challenge it with a Sunday edition of "Dateline NBC."

If "60 Minutes" finishes the season at its current, 11th-place rank for the season so far, it would be the first time in 19 seasons that the show failed to make the Top 10. "48 Hours" ranks 7th for the season.

Klein joined CBS News in 1982 as a writer on the overnight show "Nightwatch" and became its producer in 1984. In 1988, he became a producer at "48 Hours," winning an Emmy Award in 1989.

"60 Minutes" underwent a critical drubbing in November after the CBS brass killed an interview with former Brown & Williamson Tobacco Corp. executive Jeffrey Wigand, an industry whistle-blower.

CBS, negotiating its \$5.4 billion takeover by Westinghouse, headed its

lawyers' warnings that CBS could be sued for inducing Wigand to breach his confidentiality agreement with his former employer.

Although the piece was shelved, the "CBS Evening News" aired excerpts from it on Friday after The Wall Street Journal published portions of a sealed deposition Wigand had given in a Mississippi lawsuit.

CBS also announced the appointment of Ted Savaglio to a new position, in charge of CBS News recruitment. Savaglio, a 22-year CBS News staffer, most recently was vice president for prime time and executive producer of "CBS This Morning" before that.

NBC scores super ratings week

LOS ANGELES (AP) — By a football field, the ratings winner is NBC.

The Super Bowl drew television's biggest-ever audience for one program, allowing NBC to dominate its competitors with the best network rating in a non-Olympic week since 1991.

NBC also posted its biggest non-Olympic lead over a second-place finisher in 16 years, attracting nearly double ABC's audience.

With nine of the top 10 programs for Jan. 22-28, NBC scored an 18.2 average rating and 29 share, according to Nielsen Media Research figures Tuesday. NBC's season-to-date average, by comparison, is 12.0.

The Super Bowl, the kickoff and the post-game show held the top three spots, while a post-Superbowl "Friends" special was the week's top-rated entertainment program at No. 4.

Sunday's Dallas Cowboys 27-17 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers was watched by an estimated total audience of 138,488,000, the most people ever to watch a single TV program, NBC said.

Only the ABC news magazine "PrimeTime Live" managed to break NBC's monopoly on the top 10. CBS' best performer was "Chicago Hope" at No. 14, while Fox's "The X-Files" was the network leader in

15 share, followed by third-place CBS' 8.7 rating and 14 share.

Fox Broadcasting Co., which programs 15 of the 22 prime-time hours, posted a 6.1 rating and 9 share. Emerging networks UPN and the WB earned, respectively, a 4.1 rating, 6 share, and a 2.4 rating, 4 share.

A single ratings point equals 959,000 households, or 1 percent of the nation's 95.9 million TV homes estimated by Nielsen. Share is a given show or network's percentage of sets tuned in during a given period.

In the nightly newscast competition, top dog "ABC World News

Tonight" earned a 10.0 rating and 18 share. "NBC Nightly News" had a 9.3 rating and 17 share, followed by "CBS Evening News" with an 8.3 rating and 15 share.

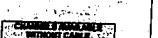

TV Land, a 24-hour, basic cable "classic TV" spinoff of Nick at Nite, will debut in late April. "Nick at Nite's" TV Land is assembling the best line-up of shows from virtually every genre from the past 40 years," Rich Crand, president of TV Land and Nick at Nite, said Wednesday.

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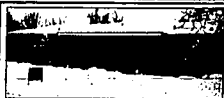
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
