Blue Lakes-Pole Line fix ahead

Summer project to speed traffic flow receives state's green light

TWIN FALLS — About 36,000 drivers daily brave the sometimes snarled, slow-moving traffic at the city's north end. And easing the crowded lanes can't wait for a major overhaul of the area's busiest intersection — where vehicles are delayed an average of 35.4 seconds in peak hours, a state engineer said.

The Idaho Transportation Department has agreed to pay \$534,000 for a short-term fix at the intersection of Pole Line Road and Blue Lakes Boulevard North, District Traffic Engineer George Oberle said.

Plans will be submitted for final approval at the end of the month, and construction is scheduled for this summer, City Engineer Gary Young said.

The state "put it on an incredibly fast track," he said.

At the existing right of way, crews will widen the west leg of Pole Line to Fillmore Street on the north side and to Target on the south, Young said. On the east leg, both sides of Pole Line will be widened to Elm Street North.

North of the intersection, the east side of Blue Lakes will be widened to the first Magic Valley Mall entrance, he said.

"You'll have to pack a lunch to cross the street," Young said.

The improvements will make the intersection only "modestly better," Oberle said.

But if the project is completed, the intersection's traffic flow won't worsen with

the area's business growth; Oberle projected that motorists will have only an average 26.5-second delay at Blue Lake and Pole Line in 2003.

"We haven't begun to see the traffic volume this intersection will have," Young said.

For northbound and eastbound traffic approaching the intersection, the state's design plans show two left-turn lanes, one dedicated through lane and one lane for through traffic or right-turns.

Westbound traffic will have two left-turn lanes, two through lanes and a right-

turn lane. The southbound configuration won't change substantially.

Only two corners currently have wide-radius right-turn lanes separated from the intersection by islands. When construction is complete, all four corners will have

Same-sex marriage ban sails past House committee

BOISE — Despite pleas from gay advocates and clergy members, a House committee Thursday approved a bill denying recognition to same-sex marriages from other states or countries.

Rep. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum, cast the lone dissenting vote.

No one testified for the bill, but sponsor House Speaker Mike Simpson, R-Blackfoot, told committee members they had to act or else allow same-sex marriages to become legally recognized in Idaho.

"Same-sex marriages violate the public policy of the state of Idaho," he said, which states that marriage is a contract between a man and a woman. "Our inaction is in fact an action."

But such a law would be costly to defend in court, Jaquet argued. She said it was uncertain what would happen with a lawsuit filed against Hawaii over the constitutionality of denying marriage rights to same-sex partners. A jury will hear the court case in July.

She also questioned the wisdom of rejecting other states' legal agreements.

"That disturbed me," she said. "So what's the next thing we're not going to honor?"

It wasn't an easy decision to vote the way she did, she said, but she had made up her mind before the hearing after consulting with her children.

Dallas Chase, a lesbian who had been married for more than 18 years, commended Jaquet on her vote. Even one vote against the bill meant something, she said.

Chase's marriage had been sealed in the LDS Temple. She told a mostly silent, crowded room how she watched over her husband, who was hospitalized with heart problems before he died.

After his death she turned to female companionship, something her family has requested her not to talk about. She also has no insurance benefits from her partner and would have no legal claim over her assets if she died.

"It's been a rude shock to me to find out I am a less person than I was," she said.

She asked the committee to reject the bill. "The message I receive from the state Legislature is that my life has no validity. I already went through this with my mother and now I need to

Governor plans flood address

BOISE — Gov. Phil Batt said Thursday that he plans a rare address to the Legislature next week to outline what the state should do to help Panhandle counties recover from flood damage estimated at \$100 million.

The governor has canceled plans for weekend appearances at Republican political events in northern Idaho to work on gathering damage assessments. He already has made three trips to flood-ravaged areas.

"Although we have a ballpark figure of the damage and a ballpark figure of the federal help available, we really have no idea yet," Batt said.

"We are seeing an example in which government works for a change, where it's not bogged down in procedure and actually does what it's designed to do," Batt said.

Right-wing ties put Buchanan aide on sideline

WASHINGTON — Pat Buchanan's campaign co-chairman, Larry Pratt, stepped aside Thursday after reports linked him to white supremacists and right-wing militia leaders.

Buchanan said he was certain the charges, which Pratt denied, are untrue.

Critics immediately used Buchanan's close ties to Pratt, director of Gun Owners of America, to revive questions about the candidate's own views on race and equality.

"If there's a group promoting white supremacy in America, my countrymen don't want anything to do with this," Buchanan said, campaigning in New Hampshire where he already faces ads aired by Kansas Sen. Bob Dole that call his views extreme.

Dole said Pratt "ought to be fired" rather than take a temporary leave of absence.

Added Rabbi Marvin Hier, dean of Los Angeles' Simon Wiesenthal Center: "A man who flirts and shares platforms with some of this country's worst racists should not be the co-chairman for a Republican candidate seeking the presidency of the United States."

Gun owners are a key constituency for Buchanan in the crucial New Hampshire primary next week, where he hopes to do well after his strong showing in the Iowa caucuses on Monday.

Pratt is one of four co-chairmen listed on Buchanan's letterhead. "He's an old friend of ours and he supports our campaign,"

Buchanan said earlier Thursday. Pratt said he suggested the leave of absence, telling Buchanan's sister and campaign manager, Bay Buchanan, he did not want to distract from Buchanan's campaign. He said he hopes to return eventually to a news conference. Pratt denied he holds any racist or anti-Semitic views, and called the reports linking him to hate groups a move to smear Buchanan, just as the conservative commentator is gaining momentum.

"I see this as a political effort, a tool to try to discredit the Pat Buchanan campaign," Pratt said.

He said he took part in at least one anti-government meeting in 1992 while looking into the incident at Ruby Ridge in northern Idaho, where federal agents killed the wife and son of white supremacist Randy Weaver, but didn't know racist groups were going to be there. He spoke only about gun rights, and made clear his opposition to other participants' racist views, he said.

Under new law, antennas may dot national parks

WASHINGTON — When President Clinton signed the Telecommunications Act of 1996 last week, he and Vice President Al Gore pulled out every stop to mark enactment of what the president ebulliently hailed as "revolutionary legislation that will bring the future to our doorstep."

At the Interior Department, officials were somewhat more subdued. They fear an obscure provision in the act may make it considerably easier for the communications industry to erect antennas and other unsightly gear within national

parks, wildlife refuges and other protected federal property.

Because the National Park Service and other federal land management agencies control so many mountain tops and high-elevation areas, the lands are often covered as antenna sites by cellular phone companies, broadcasters and other telecommunications providers. Currently, Park Service managers have broad discretion to reject overtures from such companies.

At Channel Islands National Park off the coast of California, for instance, park officials are regularly bombarded with requests to site communications gear for

beaming signals back to heavily populated areas on the mainland, where the topography makes it difficult to get thorough telecommunications coverage.

"It seems like we come one a week," said C. Mack Shaver, the park's superintendent, who has so far refused all requests except one from Ventura County to site emergency communications facilities for its fire and police departments. "The islands are within view of U.S. 101 and the whole Los Angeles complex, so people see them as an ideal platform to beam some kind of signal back to all those folks."

With the legislation's enactment, the

ability of Shaver and other federal land managers to stave off the erection of antennas, repeaters and other equipment in parks and on other public lands could be curtailed. The act directs the president to develop procedures under which federal agencies can make available government land for the placement of telecommunications services.

Further, the act presumes "that requests for the use of property, rights-of-way, and easements by duly authorized providers should be granted absent unavoidable direct conflict with the department or agency's mission."

Idaho weather summary

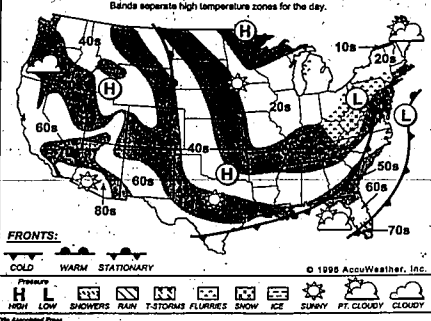

"go through it with you," she said. "If my life has no validity, then neither does yours and neither does my brothers' or my sisters'."

Clergy members also argued against the measure.

Rabbi Dan Fink said the bill limits justice in Idaho.

"The greatest tragedy that can befall any society is when its people of faith, when its religious leaders fail to speak out against the status quo that allows for oppression or, God forbid, even perpetuates it," he said. "I know as a Jew of laws that prohibited my grandparents and my great grandparents from marrying anybody they wanted to marry. They were called the Nuremberg

ATLANTA (AP)— More teen smokers are illegally buying their own cigarettes, usually from small stores whose clerks don't bother to ask for proof of age, the government reported Thursday.

The number who said they bought their own cigarettes — instead of getting them from others — rose from 58 percent in 1989 to 62 percent in 1993, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said.

Hawaii is the testing ground for same sex marriage, but if it legalizes them it will have to be by court action and not by the Legislature, said Rep. Terrance Tom, chairman of that state's House Judiciary Committee.

The current make-up of Hawaii's Legislature is against the idea, he said.

Tom's committee killed three bills that would have permitted same sex marriages or conferred legal benefits on domestic partners.

"The committee is likely to kill any similar Senate bill and may consider a constitutional amendment specifically prohibiting same sex marriages.

other racist groups with every fiber of my being," Pratt said.

In a "Playboy" article last year, Pratt was quoted as saying the right to bear arms "is something that comes first and foremost from the Scripture. What I see in Scripture is not that we have a right to keep and bear arms, but that we have a responsibility to do so."

After the Ruby Ridge incident, Pratt was invited to speak at "a seminal meeting" of militant white supremacists in Estes Park, Colo., said Mike Reynolds, an analyst for the Southern Poverty Law Center, which tracks militias.

The meeting was called by Pete Peters, leader of Christian Identity, which critics say supports violence

to promote white supremacy. Other speakers included former Ku Klux Klan leader and Aryan Nations official Louis Bream and Aryan Nations founder Richard Butler.

"What this meeting did was essentially lay down the foundation for this Christian patriot movement that includes the militias," Reynolds said.

Pratt said Thursday he attended the meeting to gather information from attendees who had been at Ruby Ridge. "I think there's been an effort to tar people who even say the word 'militia,'" he said.

Pratt also confirmed that his advocacy group contributed to CAUSE, a law firm headed by Kirk Lyons, an attorney who has defended

Old Man Winter brings shivers, snow, rain to most of nation

Snow fell in the upper Midwest and strong winds gusting over the Plains Thursday while a band of rain showers moved into the South.

Up to 3 inches of snow was reported across parts of the Dakotas as arctic air hovered over the region. Heavier snowfall, up to six inches in places, developed over western Minnesota and Iowa.

Blowing and drifting snow lowered visibility to less than 500 feet in western Minnesota around Marshall, Moorhead and Beardley. The wind chill was 46 degrees below zero in Crookston, Minn.

Strong winds swept throughout the Plains from eastern Montana to western Colorado and into the Midwest. Gusts of over 55 mph were reported in Omaha, Neb.; Manhattan, Kan.; and in the Rapid City, S.D., area.

Elsewhere, rain showers and thunderstorms moved into southern Texas and along the Gulf Coast into the Carolinas. Scattered snowfall was reported from the Ohio Valley to the southern Appalachians and along the coast through the Northeast. Predawn snow fell in Boston, Buffalo, N.Y., Pittsburgh and Minneapolis.

High pressure dominated the western states with fog and haze common in many of the larger basins and valleys. Fog alerts were in effect in some areas.

Today's weather fact

If you have ever watched a sunset, you may have seen a towering ray of light shooting up from the center of the sun while it is setting.

That phenomenon is called a "sun pillar." The pillar can be created only when there are flat ice crystals shaped like stop signs floating above the sun in the upper atmosphere.

When light rays from the sun hit the bottom of these flat crystals, the light is bounced down toward the ground. This bouncing action causes the ray of light that shoots above the sun. The sight of a pillar is often a sign of stormy weather ahead.

would give lawmakers his assessment of the damages, ask for an increase in his office's disaster fund and tell them what state accounts can be tapped to match federal aid money.

The day for his address had not been determined on Thursday. No governor in any official's memory has addressed the Legislature in a context other than the annual State of the State and budget speeches.

Wednesday night, Clearwater County Commission Chairman Jim Wilson told Clinton during the president's meeting with Batt, Idaho's congressional delegation and others that the government's financial help was needed right away. If it does not come quickly, he said, "I'm afraid I may have bankrupted our county" with the initial response to flooding in the Orofino area.

Clinton and White House Chief of Staff Leon Panetta urged state of-

officials to complete their damage assessments as quickly as possible so the administration can ask Congress to replenish its depleted disaster relief budgets.

The president also encouraged Batt to keep a federal law in mind that allows aid in an amount up to 15 percent of the total damages to be used in projects aimed at preventing similar disasters in the future.

Batt said Thursday that such plans were in the works. In fact, he said, "All our aid will be designed to mitigate any further trouble."

Meanwhile, flood waters continued to recede in northern Idaho and repairs continued on the area's damaged roads and highways. But the flooding may have done in some of the rail lines on the Palouse.

Mud slides, falling trees and water that swept soil from beneath

tracks caused extensive damage to main line and short line railroads in north-central Idaho, eastern Washington and Oregon.

The Palouse River-Blue Mountain Railroad estimates damage to its tracks at more than \$1.3 million. Palouse trucks operated by Burlington Northern also were extensively damaged.

More than 130 Idaho National Guard personnel remained deployed in the disaster areas, including 48 in St. Maries and 36 in Orofino, helping with such tasks as water purification and traffic control.

U.S. Highway 12, the area's main east-west corridor, was reopened with speed restrictions from Cottonwood Creek to Orofino Thursday after crews installed a temporary bridge over Cottonwood Creek using flattened railroad cars.

The bridge was washed out when Cottonwood Creek surged into the Clearwater River last week.

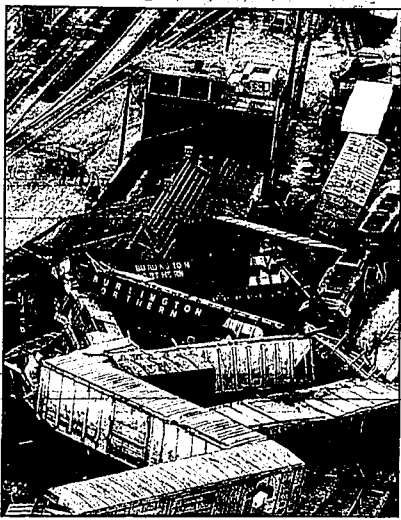

Lawmakers cash in on fact-finding travel

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dozens in Congress have found respite from the capital's cold, snowy winter in Las Vegas, Honolulu, Israel and the Bahamas — compliments of special interests.

Despite a new law limiting gifts to lawmakers, fact-finding travel is still allowed although it must be reported more quickly. In most cases, the travel is paid for by organizations seeking a sympathetic hearing on Capitol Hill.

For freshman Rep. Jon Christensen, R-Neb., the destinations were speaking engagements in Las Vegas, Houston and Orlando, Fla. Total estimated value of the travel: \$2,580. In Houston, Christensen was joined by Reps. Steny Hoyer, D-Md., and Calvin Dooley, D-Calif., to address the National Association of Home Builders. At least two congressional aides also attended the convention in late January.

"From a special interest point of view, it is very helpful to have a lawmaker come and speak before your group," said Ellen Miller, director of the nonpartisan Center for Responsive Politics. "It's another way of gaining access, and therefore influence, over a lawmaker."

Rep. Maxine Waters, D-Calif., spoke at conferences of the National Newspaper Publishers Association in Honolulu. The two trips cost an estimated \$2,760.

Dentists in three Southern states invited freshman Rep. Charles Norwood, R-Ga., himself a dentist, to speak to their meetings. Norwood traveled to Orlando Jan. 12-14, to Nashville Jan. 19, and to Dallas Jan. 26-28, at a total cost of just over \$2,000.

Rep. George Miller, senior Democrat on the House Resources Committee, went to Phoenix Jan. 14 to speak to the National Indian Gaming Association and to tour two tribal casinos. Expenses for Miller and

an aide totaled \$1,411. Miller's panel has jurisdiction over regulation of Indian gambling.

And Rep. Joe Barton, R-Texas, took his wife Janet along on a Feb. 2-4 trip to Scottsdale, Ariz., to address the National Association of Pharmaceutical Manufacturers: Reimbursement for the trip ran \$2,100.

The Senate's No. 2 GOP leader, Trent Lott of Mississippi, headed for colder climates. He and his wife spent Feb. 2-6 in Aspen, Colo., where he spoke to a meeting sponsored by Domino's Pizza. The cost was \$3,257, but, heading the new gift restrictions, they picked up their own tab for skiing.

By far the most popular destination was Israel, where 28 House and Senate staff members traveled last month — including aides to a large chunk of the New York delegation. The trips, sponsored by the Jewish Community Relations Council of New York, the American Jewish Education Foundation, Project Interchange and the Arab American Institute, cost from \$2,200 to \$2,900 per person.

Report: AIDS shows large effect on blacks

ATLANTA (AP) — AIDS is exacting a growing toll on blacks. The virus is now responsible for a third of all deaths among black men ages 25 to 44, the CDC said Thursday.

AIDS also accounts for about a fifth of the deaths among black women in the same age range — a higher proportion than among young white men, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said.

The CDC report is the latest to demonstrate changes in the epidemic since the first cases were reported 15 years ago among gay white men.

"This is an epidemic that is affecting every segment of society," said Cornelius Baker of the National Association of People with AIDS.

AIDS is now like other sexually transmitted diseases, which tend to strike minorities harder than whites, said Dr. John Ward, the CDC's chief of AIDS surveillance. He pointed to the link between sex and drugs as another reason for the growth of AIDS among blacks.

At least 41,930 people died of AIDS in 1994, up 9 percent from 38,500 the previous year. About three-

quarters of the victims were 25 to 44, and AIDS remains the leading killer for that age group, the CDC said.

In 1994, AIDS caused 32 percent of deaths among black men ages 25 to 44, up from 28 percent the year before, and 20 percent among young white men, about the same as in 1993, according to the CDC.

AIDS caused 22 percent of deaths among black women of the same age group in 1994 and 17 percent in 1993, compared with 6 percent among young white women in 1994 and 5 percent the year before.

The death rate from AIDS for young black men in 1994 was 177.9 per 100,000, almost four times greater than the rate for their white counterparts, 47.2. The rate for black men rose 13 percent from the previous year, while the rate for white men remained about the same, the CDC said.

The toll among women is growing. The rate for young black women, 51.2, rose 28 percent from the 1993 rate of 40.1. The rate for young white women jumped 30 percent, from 4.4 in 1993 to 5.7 in 1994.

Suspects in bomb hoax held in California

POCATELLO — Two men implicated in a Bannock County Courthouse bombing hoax last April are jailed in Sacramento, Calif. while a federal judge considers their sentences on an unrelated bank card fraud scheme.

Pocatello Police Capt. Kirk Nelson said the judge was ready Tuesday to sentence former Pocatello resident Terry Ewing, 21, and Michael Kim, 20, of California, on the bank card crime when he discovered federal marshals were waiting to serve Idaho warrants on the two men.

Ewing and Kim each face one count of being principals to false reporting of explosives in connection with the Pocatello bombing incident.

Police also are seeking Jonathan Lolley, 18, of Boise, to serve a warrant on him in connection with the same incident, in which road blocks were placed behind a Ten Commandments monument on the Bannock County Courthouse's front lawn.

High school boy dies after collapsing

ABERDEEN — Aberdeen High School students and faculty are trying to make sense of the death of a student who collapsed in a school hallway.

Keith Miller, 16, fainted and struck his head on a wall between classes Wednesday, Principal Grant Hansen said.

Dave Burnett, a science teacher, said that Miller suffered a cut on his head. He ran and told a secretary to call 911. Another science teacher, Tommy Dean, administered CPR. An ambulance took Miller to Harms Memorial Hospital in American Falls, where he died.

"They do not know the cause of death," Hansen said.

Judge: Sentence recommendation light

COEUR D'ALENE — A federal judge says he was shocked at the sentencing recommendations for the man who planned the theft of 500 pounds of mining explosives last July.

U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge sentenced Kent Johnson, 31, of Coeur d'Alene, to 30 months in prison on a federal offense of possessing stolen explosives.

Because of the potential destructive power of the stolen explosives, Lodge said he was surprised that the government's sentencing recommendation for Johnson was as low as it was.

With credit for time served Johnson could be released in less than four years.

Police identify Missouri man in death

COEUR D'ALENE — A man found dead near Garwood has been identified by the Kootenai County Sheriff's Department.

The body of Daniel J. Bonin, 33, of Kansas City, Mo., was discovered Monday near a power line road near Ramsey and Ohio Match roads. Investigators suspect foul play.

An autopsy conducted Tuesday afternoon in Spokane, Wash., did not reveal the precise cause of death, although lab tests are pending.

As of Wednesday afternoon, there were no suspects in the case.

Neighbors fret over Micron water plan

OREM, Utah — Engineering studies show that Micron Technology's plan to pump water from three wells for its Utah County computer chip manufacturing plant will have minimal or no effect on local landowners.

Attorneys and civil engineers hired by Micron, including former state engineer Dee Hansen, made the report to state officials during a hearing Wednesday.

It will be up to state engineer Robert Morgan whether the Boise, Idaho-based company will be granted permission to trade water rights it bought near Goshen for the right to drill wells in Lehi.

One of those speaking out against the permit was Edith Clinger, who feared her farm's dwindling water supply would only worsen if the new plant 12 miles to the north is allowed to tap into underground aquifers.

Micron wants to pump 2,400 gallons a minute from its wells for chip production and culinary uses. That makes about 3.4 million gallons a day for around-the-clock operation.

Overcrowding kept killing suspect free

SALT LAKE CITY — Mario Peraza-Armenta, wanted in the fatal freeway onramp shooting of a 39-year-old woman, should have been in jail at the time of the incident, authorities say.

However, a maze of aliases and overcrowding at the Salt Lake County Jail kept him free.

Court records show Peraza-Armenta was booked into the jail under four different names before the Feb. 3 shooting. In each case, officers released him within days because of a federal court order prohibiting overcrowding.

"He knew the system well enough to not carry identification on him. When he was stopped or arrested, he'd just give officers a different name and birthdate. That way, he'd never be linked to any outstanding warrants. No one could see the whole picture," Salt Lake police detective Chuck Oliver said.

Sources: Grand jury probe nears an end

BOISE (AP) — A federal grand jury is apparently close to wrapping up an investigation into alleged violations of federal environmental and criminal laws at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, sources say.

The inquiry, which began last summer, reportedly involves allegations that test samples indicating the existence of environmental problems at the eastern Idaho installation were dumped off the site by employees and taken in a nearby landfill, according to sources.

They indicated the incident occurred more than a year ago.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Marc Haws refused to comment or even acknowledge the existence of any grand jury inquiry.

"Unfortunately this is one of those situations where as much as we'd like to be helpful to the press, we just can't comment," Haws said. "I can't even confirm the existence of an investigation."

But Deputy State Attorney General Kathleen Trever and INEL Oversight Program Director Bob Ferguson hinted at the investigation earlier this week during appearances before the legislative committees responsible for INEL.

And some INEL skeptics maintained the questions under grand jury review reinforce the need for a strong state program monitoring the impact of activities at the Energy Department facility on Idaho's environment and public health.

In listing all the agencies his oversight teams deal with, Ferguson ticked off more than a dozen for the committees before ending with the criminal division of the U.S. Attorney's Office.

And Trever acknowledged under questioning from Sen. John Hansen, R-Idaho Falls, that the state had been providing information — to U.S. Attorney Betty Richardson on enforcement of environmental and criminal laws at INEL.

"There are pending both federal and state enforcement actions," Trever said, that preclude her from discussing specifics. She said the state enforcement action should come in March.

But she assured the lawmakers that "when we take enforcement actions, we're not going to do so at a risk to the public health."

When disclosure is necessary, Trever said, it will be made "even if that may jeopardize criminal actions. We're going to protect public health first."

The bottom line here is that the Attorney General, and I think I can speak for the governor as well, are committed to making sure that the Department of Energy and its contractors comply with both federal and state laws," she said. "We're going to do everything in our power to make sure they do so."

County government bill hits snag in Senate

BOISE (AP) — Legislation implementing the 1994 constitutional amendment authorizing alternatives to Idaho's traditional three-commissioner form of county government hit a major snag Thursday.

Republican Sen. Clyde Boatright of Rathdrum found himself in the middle of the debate over whether advocates of changing the form of government need the signatures of 10 percent or 20 percent of a county's voters to initiate the process.

The legislation mandating a 20 percent level was overwhelmingly approved by the House. But it only cleared the Senate Local Government Committee on the condition that the full Senate consider cutting the signature level to 10 percent.

Supporters contended that it should be as easy as possible for citizens to take advantage of the new constitutional amendment. Critics warned that such a low requirement as 10 percent could permit a small bloc of people to take control of county affairs.

The campaign to lower the required percentage required adoption of three separate amendments. Boatright initially sided with 10-percent supporters so the first of the three was approved on an 18-16 unrecorded vote. But 10 minutes later, he changed sides to kill adoption of the second amendment on a 17-17 unrecorded vote.

"I listened to the debate, and after the second time I felt the original was right," Boatright said.

The two votes left the bill with irreconcilable provisions so that legislators had no choice but to send it back to the local government committees.

"There's going to have to be some confereing and negotiating among committee members," Republican Floor Leader David Kerrick of Caldwell said.

The bill was the product of a special legislative task force that worked through last summer and fall. It would allow elected county executives, appointed county managers and larger commissions as alternatives to the century-old three-commissioner form. It also would allow multiple counties to combine some executive offices like treasurer.

The authorizing constitutional amendment was approved by nearly a two-to-one margin.

Floods may have used project money

BOISE - North Idaho floods may mean six Magic Valley counties won't get funding this year for a project that would have helped them make zoning decisions to protect groundwater quality.

Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome, said the emergency funds for the northern part of the state and tight money elsewhere have made it tough to find the \$150,000 for the first year of a two-year project.

"We're not dead yet, but we're limping," she said. "Those counties may just have to be glad they're not flooded and leave it at that."

The money would have helped create a computer database that counties could scan to determine which spots along the Snake River Plain Aquifer are vulnerable to contamination. But the Magic Valley was competing with Boise, which won \$300,000 in state money for its own water quality study. The Magic Valley has also received funding for other projects, which may have hurt

its chances this year.

The data base would have superimposed four geological layers on top of each other - canals and streams, ground water depth, soil depth and land use. Before making zoning decisions, commissioners could research the way run-off from dairy manure piles penetrate the soil, and where it ends up.

A dairy, for example, could be prohibited from operating in an area of thin soil with easy penetration to the aquifer, said Paul Castellini, a manager with the Idaho

Department of Water Resources who was working on a partnership with the University of Idaho and Twin Falls, Gooding, Lincoln, Jerome, Minidoka and Cassia counties.

The money also would have helped to compile data on what kinds of chemicals have been used or stored in the area, and how much local septic systems contribute to pollution problems.

"We've been using chemicals for years, and we don't know if they've migrated -

Garbage company chief in court in California

MARTINEZ, Calif. - The chief executive of a garbage company is in court after a financial audit found he may have paid family-owned companies for services they never supplied.

The central Contra Costa Sanitary District sued Orinda-Moraga Dispose-All Chief Executive Doug Lomow last week charging breach of contract and asking that the company be put in receivership. The sanitary district wants to recoup \$528,000 in unpaid franchise and legal fees it claims Lomow's company owes.

Lomow - who also faces financial difficulties in Cassia County in connection with a never-opened trash dump he dug near Burley - owns garbage for the Sanitary District, doing business as Orinda-Moraga Dispose-All.

The district took the legal steps after a financial investigation found Dispose-All may not have received services Lomow paid for with companies he or his family owned. In addition, an employee said in court records that he had never heard of some of the companies Lomow paid.

Lawmakers ponder changes to environmental audit law

BOISE - Key lawmakers this week considered possible changes in the state's 74-month-old environmental audit law amid warnings that it could become a shield for federal violations of the nuclear waste deal with Gov. Phil Batt.

"We're going to change it," Senate Resources and Environment Chairman Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, said flatly.

Kathleen Trever, the deputy attorney general, told Noh's committee and the House Environmental Affairs Committee it appeared the environmental auditing law

was written in such a way that the federal government and its contractors could apply it to their activities under the nuclear waste agreement.

Trever did much of the litigation during the court confrontation that led up to the Oct. 16 deal between Batt and the federal government.

The environmental auditing law, approved over the protests of conservationists, prohibits imposing penalties against environmental violators if they voluntarily uncover the violation, report it to the state and repair the damage. The law also pre-

Mini-Cassia counties consider drug screens

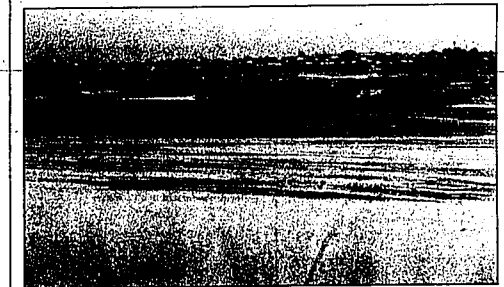
RUPERT - A drug-free workplace is safe, more productive, and companies that don't test employees for drugs will attract employees with problems, according to a local occupational health professional.

In a presentation to the Minidoka County Commission this week, Debbie Bauscher, occupational health coordinator for Minidoka Memorial Hospital (MMH), said drug use, including the use of alcohol, can detract from an employee's performance on the job.

The commissioners are presently considering implementing a drug-testing policy for county employees. Bauscher said the drug-free workplace concept is well known and catch on in rural areas.

Before the county can implement the concept, it must adopt a policy determining when and on what grounds employees are to be tested, she said. Most companies opt for pre-employment testing, but policies can also include probable cause or accident clauses.

After a policy is set, they begin an education process and inform employees

about the policy and that they will be held accountable if they are caught working under the influence," she said. "Most companies don't want to lose valuable employees if they have a problem, so they make sure rehabilitative help is available."

Managers are also trained to be able to spot employees who are under the influence of drugs or alcohol, she said. The urine testing service available at MMH can determine if any substances are present by analyzing how drugs metabolize in the body, she said.

"We have statistics showing that, once a

person becomes addicted to a drug, he or she becomes less efficient in the workplace," she said. "Because of the drugs, they take away from the company because they are stealing your time. They come to work hung over and are thinking about their next fix rather than what they are being paid to do."

During a commission meeting in January, two county officials supported drug-testing policies. Detention Center director Don Garner said it would help in the hiring process, and Sheriff Paul Fries agreed. Commission chairman John Rensberg also supported the concept.

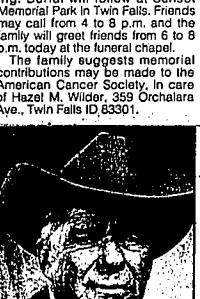

Plan to finance food assurance through fees draws criticism

BOISE (AP) — Legislative budget writers Thursday objected to Gov. Phil Batt's plan to finance food retailer inspections with licensing fees, prompting the governor to challenge lawmakers to repeal the inspection law if they do not want to finance it.



The Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee voted 12-7 to strip spending authority from the Division of Health's 1997 budget for over \$500,000 that the \$55 annual fee would generate once the Board of Health and Welfare imposes it by regulation.

The majority argued that there was no need to authorize spending fees because the Legislature must approve any fee before it can be imposed and that will not occur until next winter.

But while they argued that the authority to spend the money could be granted at the same time the fee is approved, it was clear over two days of debate that many of the budget writers were simply opposed to imposing a fee of any kind.

"A lot of our little mom and pop stores will die if we keep adding another fee," one committee member said. "We have fees for a lot of different things, fees for service," the governor said. "There are numerous examples where the protection of the public is financed by a fee."

But if lawmakers will not impose

the fee he proposed on the 10,000 food retailers around the state — and they have previously rejected using the \$1 million he set aside last year in general tax receipts to pay for the program — "they should repeal the act that requires the inspections."

The state currently spends about \$150,000 in general tax money on the inspections while the local health districts pick up another \$500,000 with property tax receipts. But officials say that is not enough to conduct the kind of effective annual inspection of every food retailer.

Idaho is one of just three states that does not charge for food inspections, and administration analyst Gary Fell acknowledged that no fee structure had ever satisfied all segments of the industry. A single fee as Batt proposes angers small operators because they pay the same as large ones and a tiered fee is fought by the large operators because they have to pay more.

But Rep. Ken Robison, D-Boise, contended the internal problems are something the administration should work out so the fee is generally acceptable to the industry.

"There is public interest and public concern about the quality of the food," he said. "We need to put the health and safety of the people of Idaho first."

In other action, the committee:

- Voted overwhelming to head off an administration attempt to open up the state's \$3 million sheltered workshop programs to more than the 11 existing disabled association of Community — Rehabilitation Programs. That organization has managed to shut out competitors from the lucrative programs that provide employment for about 500 disabled people despite indications that what amounts to a monopoly violates federal procurement laws.
- Cut \$1 million from the state's share of the 1997 Medicaid budget because the caseload is stabilizing and past projected increases appear high.

Abandoned, in a surprise move, Batt's proposal to divert \$1 million from the Water Pollution Control Account to finance state air quality operations; choosing instead to continue paying for that program with general tax receipts. Batt has increased the pressure on that fund, which is designated for local sewer projects, because of tight general tax revenues. But lawmakers believe the fund's balance should be protected in light of the flood damage to local sewer and water systems in northern Idaho.

Slashed \$240,000 from the Community and Family Services Division budget that had been financing regional substance abuse coordinators and declined to replace \$126,000 in disappearing federal money with state cash to retain the substance-abuse education program in the state prison system.

Program will deal with waste debate

BOISE — Idaho Public Television will wade into the debate over nuclear waste storage with an interview program at 5:30 p.m. Sunday.

The program comes on the heels of a two-day legislative hearing earlier this week. The hearing focused on the agreement between Gov. Phil Batt and federal officials to store nuclear waste in Idaho until 2035.

But some legislators and members of the public complain the hearings presented only one side of the issue — because speakers were limited to state administrators and officials at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, according to a prepared statement from Idaho Public Television.

Program host Joan Cartan-Hansen will speak with state Sen. Clint Stennett, D-Ketchum, who pushed for the hearings to be open for public testimony. The program's other guest will be Kathleen Trevor, an assistant state attorney general who worked on Batt's agreement with the federal government.

Consent no longer part of drug test bill

BOISE — A proposal in the Idaho Legislature that would allow schools to test kids for drugs without parental permission has been changed. Parental permission is no longer an issue, said the bill's author, Rep. Jim Kempton, R-Albion.

A companion bill, sponsored by the Idaho Police Chiefs Association, would impose a penalty for being under the influence of controlled substances in public places. It also sets up a system to prosecute juveniles under the influence.

If both bills become law, Kempton's bill would require trained counselors or administrators to notify law enforcement if they feel that a student was under the influence of a drug. Law enforcement could then turn a drug test.

And Kempton said, law enforcement agencies have never needed parental permission to arrest juveniles. The House Education Committee on Thursday approved the measure. The full House will vote on it within the next two weeks.

Bellevue donates to flood victims

BOISE — Rep. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum, is circulating letters from the city of Bellevue, which is donating \$750 to flood-stricken areas in North Idaho. "We in Bellevue would like to issue a challenge to every city in the state, south of the affected counties, to match our donation," Mayor Dennis Wright wrote to Gov. Phil Batt on Thursday. "Those of us who live in the southern portion are deeply concerned about the catastrophic conditions that area presently faces."

The water quality and history section of the management plan will be revised to include Minidoka and Cassia counties, Muffley said.

The study of groundwater use currently being conducted by the commission prompted an invitation to the two counties, vice chairman Fred Brossy said.

"We really felt the groundwater studies needed to be more inclusive than just the three counties on the north side," Brossy said.

The Middle Snake Regional Water Commission evolved from

the Water Resource Management Plan initiated in 1989. Goals of the commission include working on a regional water-use plan, educating the public and studying economic and environmental impacts of local governments' water-resource actions.

Recently, the commission opposed plans to build a dam at Auger Falls.

Both Minidoka and Cassia counties approved their membership to the commission with fanfare.

"The biggest benefit to the county is we speak as a unified voice with other counties in the region (on

water issues)," said Minidoka commissioner John "Bert" Stevenson, who will serve on the commission's executive committee.

A commissioner from each county serves on the executive board. Lyle Woodbury will sit in for Cassia County.

Don Stapleman, a Minidoka County farmer and former director of the Minidoka Irrigation District Board, has been appointed to represent the county on the planning commission.

The remaining Minidoka seat, and both Cassia positions, are yet to be filled.

rejected the district's request to lock Lomow out. McGrath also denied a request that the company be put under receivership.

The judge did let stand a temporary restraining order preventing Lomow from writing checks of more than \$10,000 per week to affiliates unless he had a court order. Lomow also has been ordered not to conceal or destroy records or sell or transfer assets to others.

The sanitary district had wanted the receiver to help preserve records and prevent payments to the questionable affiliates. They also worried Lomow might leave the area.

Lomow will run the garbage company until its contract expires Feb. 29. After that, Browning-Ferris Industries will take over.

The suit claims Lomow in 1995

sent \$215,000 to 11 Idaho companies, including Lincoln Customer Machine Shop, Bay Pacific Truck Parts, Fleet Electric and Proffert Service, all listed at a post office box in Boise.

But an employee at a Mail and Parcel Drop here told the Center-Cross Times that no businesses by those names were located there.

The mail box was opened by C.E. Doland and terminated on Dec. 13. Doland is registered agent for six of Lomow's 11 affiliated companies in Boise, according to the audit.

Dispose-All attorneys say \$372,000 of the \$587,000 the sanitary district claims went to undisclosed affiliates actually went to a Georgia leasing company that Lomow owns.

"There is no doubt ... there were payments made to affiliated compa-

nies," Lomow's attorney, Richard Norris, said. "In our view, those payments were not unlawful. We're going to defend it vigorously and I think we're going to win it."

Meanwhile, Dispose-All Magic Valley Trust remains mired in Federal Bankruptcy Court in Boise. Lomow wants to open his dump on Burley Butte so he can begin paying off creditors whom he owes a total of \$1.5 million.

Susan Duncan, who lives only a few miles east of Dispose-All's landfill in Cassia County, said Lomow's California troubles confirm her suspicions that allowing the landfill to open would not be in the county's best interest, Duncan said.

"We would really be setting the county up, knowing this, if we allowed it to even come in," she said.

cludes public disclosure of such incidents.

"We may be asking for clarification of the Environmental Audit Act to make sure government remains open," Trevor told the two panels, which wrapped up hearings on the waste deal and state oversight of activities at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory on Wednesday night.

The legislation cleared the House unanimously last winter and saw only modest opposition in the Senate. It reflects the governor's stated policy of trying to work with industry to protect the environment rather than confronting it with enforcement of environmental laws.

Supporters also pointed out that

the government does not have the manpower for blanket enforcement so that the voluntary approach could ultimately result in greater compliance by offering industry an incentive.

Critics warned that the secrecy surrounding the scheme left it wide open for abuse.

Trevor suggested that because the key to federal compliance with all the deadlines in the 40-year nuclear waste deal is enforcement by the courts, the environmental audit law could create serious problems if the Energy Department, Navy or their civilian contractors choose to invoke it.

Batt's deal trades resumption of radioactive dumping at INEL for promises that most nuclear waste will be removed over the next four

decades. It also incorporates previous agreements under which the government must clean up so-called mixed and low-level waste that has been buried at the site over the past half century.

"If there's anything that would make that agreement unenforceable, I'll do everything I can to correct it, because if that agreement is unenforceable we're right back where we started," said Senate Health and Welfare Chairman Grant Ipen, R-Boise, whose committee would handle any corrective legislation.

Critics warn the deal is so rife with loopholes that the federal government will end up treating it the way it has the string of broken promises on nuclear waste management over the past generation.

Buhl residents draw support for another bond issue proposal

BUHL — About 50 local residents and parents favor another bond issue to raise money to build a new high school.

Voters in the Buhl School District rejected a \$2.5 million bond issue in October. Two other proposals were turned down in 1993 and 1994 as well. The group met earlier this week to discuss problems including overcrowding and mounting repair and maintenance costs of the school district's facilities. The amount of the bond issue would depend on what is included in the proposal.

Options discussed included adding wings to the existing facilities — a wing added to the high school could accommodate seventh and eighth grades plus

a common food service area, and a wing added to the elementary school could house a new library, more classrooms and a computer room.

Also discussed was the cost of building a new school compared to the cost of remodeling the middle school, how long the remodeling would accommodate the needs, and the problem of asbestos encountered in remodeling. The cost of moving the middle school to the old high school would have to be considered if a new high school is built.

Superintendent Rick Hill used figures from the bond issue that failed last October to estimate the amount needed to make improvements to existing facilities or build a new school. But the figures would vary now, because building costs are up and interest rates are down.

Hill also said that any building proposal must include future needs and allowances for emergencies and contingencies.

Local residents Michael Harland and Jerry Van Elderen were chosen to co-chair the group.

Greg Brown suggested sorting out short term projects that could be handled by override levies, compared to long-term projects that would have to be handled by a bond issue.

Bruce Brown, also a local resident, reminded the group that the school district has been in of indebtedness for a few years and approaching the community for a new debt would be an uphill battle no matter how good the proposal may be.

The group will meet again at 3 p.m. Feb. 25 at a place to be announced later.

Hailey OKs permit to alter river

HAILEY — The City Council, after much discussion, approved a permit to alter the Big Wood River to protect a building lot from flooding, but with a lot of conditions.

Whitney Griffin applied for a stream alteration permit for a lot in Della View Subdivision. The owner has a lot of money invested in the property and wants to protect it from flooding. The application includes 10 bank bars and enough rock to rip-rap the entire bank.

The application was approved despite a negative recommendation from the Hailey Planning and Zoning Commission. The Army Corps of Engineers has approved the stream alteration permit.

"If a permit is granted, the city is not making any representation that the property will not be flooded," Mayor Steve Kearns said at the council meeting earlier this week.

Mike Fisher, a hydrological engineer hired by Griffin, presented his findings on the stream alteration project.

"If the private property owners walk away from this," he said, "the city may

have to do some bank stabilization itself." Kearns was concerned about the effect of the stream alteration on the Riverside Sewage Treatment Plant just east of the project.

This project will in no way ensure that the Riverside plant will be protected from flooding," Fisher replied. "Containment berms around the treatment plant or landscape berms may be applicable to the Riverside plant."

Lou Mulla, city building inspector, said the city did not have the authority to require the private lots to require a channel for flood relief.

Kearns is concerned about possible flooding.

"We may not have any authority after this first step to control future steps," he said.

Terry Blau of the Idaho Department of Water Resources said he is concerned about the river's ability to carry the high flows through that section of the river.

"Stabilizing this bank will prevent the river from eroding eastward," he said. He suggested that the city and county request a remapping of the river in the Deerfield area.

"What is being proposed is standard

practice up and down the river," City Engineer Mike Chouteau said. "The location, in terms of building a house, is very marginal at best."

After 2 1/2 hours of discussion, the council approved the stream alteration permit with conditions including:

• The work must be done when the river is at low water.

• The project must be built to the specifications of the city of Hailey, Federal Emergency Management Agency, Army Corps of Engineers, and Department of Water Resources and Army Corps of Engineers.

• The work must be approved in conjunction with adjacent landowners.

• The project must include preservation of existing vegetation, revegetation or placement of fish or wildlife enhancement features.

• Before issuance of a building permit, the city must be provided with grading and drainage plans.

• The city does not guarantee that the issuance of this permit will prevent any flooding.

In other city business, the council appointed two new Hailey Planning and Zoning commissioners — Jonathan Stoke and Becky Keefer.

Officials give up fight on indigent care

RUPERT — After nearly four months of wrangling, Minidoka County and Minidoka Memorial Hospital officials have given up on trying to negotiate a contract outlining how indigent medical bills will be paid.

What the county and the hospital have been haggling over is how much the county will reimburse the hospital on a yearly basis for indigent care. Over the course of the debate, the commissioners have accused the hospital of not investigating (in many cases) to determine whether or not people who say they are indigent actually are.

The commissioners have also argued that people who don't live in Minidoka County have gotten medical bills paid to the hospital with

county funds.

Randy Nolom, hospital administrator, said the impasse is a step back, but the hospital will probably try to negotiate a similar contract next year.

"It appears we are going back to the old way of the hospital submitting claims and the county paying on a fee-for-service basis," he said. "It's a step back in my opinion. The contract benefited both sides because it saved time and there was no appeals process."

Before the contract was written, the hospital would submit indigent claims to the commission and the commissioners would decide whether to pay for them or not. On many of the denied claims, the hospital would appeal the decision. Records show the hospital won about half of the appeals.

The contract set an amount for the county to pay each year and, once the hospital used that amount up, it would absorb any additional costs. The hos-

pital gave up its right to appeal under the contract.

Because Minidoka Memorial Hospital is a public facility, it can't refuse service to anyone, regardless of ability to pay.

A misunderstanding with the contract involves how the yearly amount paid by the county was figured. At one time, the commissioners thought the amount should be figured based on the previous year. Although the language was not actually in the contract, the commissioners used the notion to figure last year's payment at \$208,000.

In a previous interview, Holom said the hospital would have settled for about \$185,000 last year. This year, to adjust for the misunderstanding, the negotiations started much lower, the county offered about \$113,000 this year, but hospital officials needed closer to \$150,000, Holom said.

and if so how much they've migrated," said Bob Muffley, chairman of the six-county Middle Snake Regional Water Resource Commission. "We don't want to stop any development, but we do want to protect the groundwater resource."

Results of the study could change the way dairies, farms and counties

do business, he said. Counties could either restrict cities and farms from opening in certain areas or allow such operation only under certain conditions. They could also run sewer systems to places of high septic concentrations.

The aquifer is still clean, he said. The life of the project is to keep it that way.

Bell said that federal grants are

still possible. But if the money isn't available this year, it could be next year.

Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, had followed plans for the project.

"It's a great concept," he said.

"There's some perception that the Magic Valley has done quite well in recent years for mid-Snake projects. This year, maybe it's someone else's turn."

Batt's critics overlook facts of agreement with DOE

A dozen times in the past seven years, this newspaper has editorially warned the federal Energy Department - often in scathing terms - about the cost of unkept promises at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The Energy Department, we argued, had a credibility problem on the issue of radioactive waste storage at INEL. We've often said that the DOE had to make demonstrable progress toward cleaning up the poison on the sprawling eastern Idaho nuclear reserve, and toward assuring Idahoans who live downhill from the site that their water supplies would be safe.

Finally, it seems to us, there's some clear evidence that these things are happening.

Most of that is because of Gov. Phil Batt's much-reviled agreement with the federal government.

Among other things, Batt's deal set down clear ground rules for waste cleanup - and clear consequences for the failure to do so. For the first time on this issue, Idaho holds what amounts to an enforceable contract with the DOE and Lockheed-Martin Idaho Technologies, the primary contractor at the site.

Sixty percent of what the INEL is going to be doing for the next 40 years is spelled out in the agreement, DOE's INEL manager pointed out in a visit to Twin Falls this week.

The deal requires the DOE to finance cleanup and removal of most stored waste at INEL by 2035, John Wileynski said. And it speeds up the timetable - by decades - for much of the environmental cleanup already planned at the site.

That's a whole lot more than either of Batt's Democratic predecessors, Cecil Andrus and John Evans, were

able to get from the DOE. And that's a point that the increasingly partisan critics of the deal are missing - and missing on purpose, in our judgment.

Two weeks ago, Democratic U.S. Senate candidate Walt Minnick came to the Magic Valley to denounce the agreement as a sellout, repeating the party line espoused by Democratic state Sen. Clint Stennett of Ketchum and other foes of the deal.

Minnick told the Twin Falls Rotary Club that the Snake River Plain Aquifer was in danger of contamination and that everyone who lived "down-gradient" from the site was at risk from radioactivity.

He knows better. There is no evidence of radioactive contamination of water outside the boundaries of INEL.

Nor is DOE about to rebury plutonium in meaningful quantities, another half-truth that Batt's critics are fond of repeating.

But good science makes better politics. There is, after all, a sizeable constituency for mistrust of the federal government in Idaho, and the DOE and Lockheed, with its engineers and scientists and workers from out of state, make inviting bogymen.

So does Sen. Larry Craig, reviled as the villain of this agreement because he failed to stop it in Congress. Minnick and his fellow Democrats see this as a wedge issue in Idaho, and they may be right, if Idaho voters are susceptible to scare tactics.

Minnick's remarks are disappointing in this regard. This is going to be a very long election year unless the debate on waste storage at INEL is leavened by the facts.

And the salient fact is this: Now there's a blueprint for solving this problem and a timetable for getting it done.

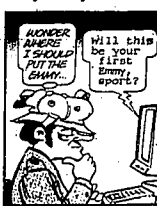
Legislature needs power in deal

The Cats of Curry

Sculptor draws inspiration from stray felines

FILER — Marilyn Stevens has dozens of cats.

All except two of them are porcelain. Stevens is in the process of launching a new home-based business, Curry Cats Collectibles. Each day, a few more kittens join her porcelain family of felines. The cats are "hand built" from Marjon porcelain and are inspired by Stevens' life at Curry, between Filer and Twin Falls.

Stevens was born in Bull, but she and her parents lived in the Curry area for years. Last summer, after her parents had both died, Stevens moved to Twin Falls. "I miss them," she said of her mom and dad. "I wanted to do something related to them."

That's how the Curry Cats were born. The Stevens family always had cats. They also fed lots of extra cats in their neighborhood.

"In rural areas, people didn't have certain breeds of cats," Stevens said. "The cats around my home were just the cats from Curry."

Stevens recalled one year when 150 cats were said to be residing in the Curry area, named for a railroad crossing on U.S. Highway 30.

"We fed them in the winter," Stevens said. "I remember my father going to the grocery store and getting big bags of cat food. It was like feeding wild birds."

Eventually, Stevens moved away from the Magic Valley, to attend school at Albion College of Idaho, Idaho State University and the University of Minnesota, where she earned master's degrees in English literature and education. She has a minor in art.

She spent a year teaching in India and seven years teaching in Japan. While she was teaching overseas, she also studied Oriental art.

Stevens returned to the Magic Valley as an instructor and coordinator in the College of Southern Idaho's English-as-second-language program. She remained on staff for five years.

By last summer, she was ready for a change. Stevens quit her job and decided to sculpt cats full time. She's also teaching piano and art to her grand-niece, and she hopes to add more young students soon.

She hopes to sell her porcelain cats in lots of shops, both inside and outside Idaho. Currently, she has pieces at the Castle Gallery & Frame Shoppe in Twin Falls.

Stevens estimates that she spends

about five hours on each piece. She has priced the cats between \$15 and \$50, in an attempt to keep the cost affordable for children. No two pieces are alike, though some are members of groupings. All are signed.

The cats are shaped by hand and then high-fired in a kiln. Some are unglazed. Others are stained. The largest piece is 18 inches tall, but most are much smaller. With the Marjon porcelain, Stevens is able to create a broad palette.

"This kind of porcelain can be translucent if it is thin enough," she explained. The kittens are done in natural colors. Stevens prefers pastels or muted shades. Some of the cats are tumbling, playful. Others are stretching, lazy.

Often, Stevens looks at her own cats — Figaro ("Figgy") and Richard ("he's the shy one") for inspiration. Other times, she studies catty reference books.

Last week, she completed the first in a series of children's books to sell with her cat collectibles. Volume 1 in "The Curry Cats Series" is titled "Natasha." The second volume will be about Stevens' father's cat, Sam.

Each book is hand painted, using Oriental ink and watercolor and a method called "Sumi."

Jazz sneaks in to the heart of country

CASTLEFORD — This isn't exactly bossa nova territory.

After all, down Main Street from Castleford High School, Garth Brooks is exploring the "Beaches of Cheyenne" through the Philco radio of a Ford pickup.

And yet the inimitable beat of jazz fused with samba filters out of the green frame building that houses Dennis Heidel's band classroom.

Count Basie, Benny Goodman, Antonio Carlos Jobim — sinewy music, yet sensuous and ambitious. Played by hep cats and sophisticated ladies who've never seen the sunny side of Basin Street or the shady side of 18.

All that jazz in a place where more people are inclined to associate the word with Karl Malone than with Duke Ellington.

"These kids pick-up jazz pretty early," said Heidel, a bearded trumpet player who runs the Castleford schools music programs from first grade through last. "But we give them some exposure to it."

Castleford School (enrollment 309, about one-third of them in high school) is the home of the Castleford Jazz Band, perhaps the biggest jazz sound from the smallest school in Idaho.

The group consists of six- to eight musicians, depending upon whom is playing basketball on any given afternoon.

"The kids learn to adjust for whoever's missing," Heidel said. "They have to."

Chuck Smith, a senior drummer, wouldn't have it any other way. "I didn't know anything about jazz before I got into band," he said. "Now I really like it."

Smith is doing his best Gene Krupa imitation on this particular afternoon, preparing for this weekend's Jazz and Blues Summit at the College of Southern Idaho in Twin Falls.

And he's not alone.

"This may be the biggest jazz festival of its kind in the world," says Lynn Skinner, a professor of music at the University of Idaho and director of the Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival held annually on the Moscow campus. "We'll have 14,000 kids, most of them high school students, on campus that week-

end, and most of them are from the Northwest and from Idaho."

"I grew up in the smallest town you can imagine, and I played jazz," said Skinner, who hails from Bear Lake County in eastern Idaho. "I learned it from records."

Skinner credits jazz's niche in Idaho schools to nature — young musicians are curious — and to nurture. Few Idaho high schools, after all, are without some kind of jazz band these days.

"When I started teaching school back in 1962, nobody had a jazz band," he said. "So I started one. The kids picked it right up."

"Musically, jazz has so many similarities with country and rock these days," said Heidel, who plays in a half dozen groups of various kinds. "Jazz influences are everywhere (in Idaho)."

Even if jazz itself isn't.

"The kids aren't hearing swing at home," Skinner said. "When I began came to Moscow for a concert in 1984, he told me, 'Doc, kids in this country aren't listening to our music anymore.' That's one reason we started the festival."

Still, jazz — which has a knowledgeable and fiercely loyal fan base in academe and in the urban centers where it grew up — has managed to thrive on the margins of other music.

"Nat King Cole is a good example," Skinner explained. "Everybody knows him for his wonderful vocals, but he was also one of the top two or three jazz pianists in the world in his prime."

But jazz, by its very nature, demands an extra measure of virtuosity. Jazz musicians improvise, and take great pride in doing so like no one else.

"Improvisation takes skill and practice, but it's not unusual in music in

general," Heidel said. "Most musicians don't play exactly what's written on the page."

Jenny Coelho, a Castleford High sophomore trumpet player, has just started to improvise.

"Not too much yet," she said. "But I'm working on it."

For Heidel's students, a bigger obstacle is often finding an instrument of their own to play. So far, he said, the school has managed to scrounge and borrow instruments for students through the sixth grade, but the young musicians drop band after that if their parents can't afford to buy instruments.

"It's a struggle sometimes, but we've always managed to find enough kids for a jazz band (the music students play in other school bands as well)," Heidel said.

'Doonesbury' celebrates 25 years

"The only thing worse than being in it would be not to be in it," Henry Kissinger once said.

For legions of politicians, public figures and standbys of the corporate establishment — even those who've rebuked cartoonist Garry Trudeau as "vile" (U.S. Rep. Dick Schultz) and "the slime of the Earth" (Jeb Bush, son of former President George Bush) — that assessment of the enduringly brilliant "Doonesbury" likely holds true.

And for those of us who've grown up with Mike, Mark, Boopsie, Zerk, Tony and Duke, "Doonesbury" has served as both mirror and prophet.

High praise for a mere comic strip? Absolutely. For "Doonesbury" since 1970, when Trudeau was just out of Yale, has never been a mere comic strip. Part political satire, part sociological treatise, it has redefined the art of cartooning: often changing the way we do business in Washington, occurring by accident in the course of history ... and always making us think, even as we dissolve in laughter.

"Flashbacks: Twenty-Five Years of Doonesbury" (Andrews & McMeel, \$18.95), celebrates a milestone in the Pulitzer Prize-winning cartoonist's irresistibly irrelevant work. And it is a gem.

From the early strips set at the gang's common-law residence in Middlebury, Trudeau moves through the early days of feminism, the fall of Saigon, the Watergate scandal, the Iranian hostage crisis, the AIDS era, the gulf

war, corporate down-sizing, the O.J. Simpson trial and the heyday of Newt Gingrich and Rush Limbaugh.

Always, Trudeau's wit is finely honed. Always, he's disconcertingly on-target about our society's greed, hypocrisy and corruption.

And if the strips themselves aren't enough to hook you, "Flashbacks" includes personal asides from Trudeau ("the human comedy is all-inclusive ... we're all in the same leaky boat together"), notes on various newspapers' cancellations and decisions to move the strip from the comics to the editorial pages, and comments about "Doonesbury" from both adoring andirate public figures.

The list are especially fun to read. For example:

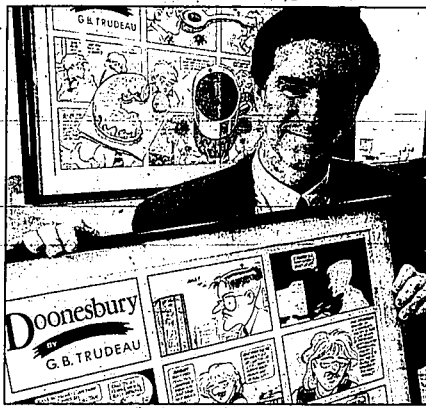
"There are only three major vehicles to keep us informed as to what's going on in Washington: the electronic media, the print media, and 'Doonesbury' — not necessarily in that order." — former President Gerald Ford.

"He's as funny as a tumor." — Frank Sinatra

"'Doonesbury' has made me a folk hero." — former Interior Secretary James Watt.

"It is well-known that Garry Trudeau has a personal vendetta against me." — former Vice President Dan Quayle.

"I consider 'Doonesbury' to be one of my key political advisors." — former California governor and presidential hopeful Jerry Brown.

'Caesar's Women' crammed with detail

WASHINGTON — Colleen McCullough sweeps into the Madison Hotel, a hefty, imposing figure clad in an orange silk smock, black pants, and a self-satisfied air.

On her arm is a tall, darkly handsome man — her husband of 12 years, Ric Robinson, whose ancestry, she says, includes Samson natives, one of the mutineers from the Bounty, Isaac Newton, and two English marines.

The Australian-born McCullough, now 58, met Robinson, 45, when she hired him to paint her house on the remote South Pacific outpost of Norfolk Island in 1962. She was the world-renowned author of "The Thorn Birds" — independent, rich and never-married. In fact, she says, "marriage was the last thing on my agenda." He was doing odd jobs to support his family while waiting for a year's until the palm trees he had planted produced saleable seeds.

"Then his wife packed up and left him and took the kids with her," explains McCullough, picking up the narrative over a hearty lunch of chicken barley soup and meat loaf. "And he began to drink because he didn't miss his wife, but he did miss his kids."

"He was an employee — wasn't anything more than that to me. But I liked him, and I'm very protective of my staff. So I was very worried about him. So I began to feed him."

The romance blossomed. Their marriage has prospered. And the publicity-shy Robinson recently served as the model for the portrait of Julius Caesar that adorns McCullough's latest historical novel, "Caesar's Women," the fourth in the six-book "Masters of Rome" series.

"Yeah, he's drop-dead gorgeous,"

McCullough says, Hollywood images notwithstanding, "anybody in real life knows that a fat girl never marries anybody but a drop-dead gorgeous bloke. And that's the truth."

Well, maybe not the whole truth. But it doesn't seem worth the energy to argue with McCullough, a woman supremely unafflicted by self-doubt.

"In Australia, I'm an icon," McCullough declares. "Isn't that a marvelous word? I mean, 'I'm not saying I'm an icon, they say I'm an icon.'"

Is that because of the stupendous success of "The Thorn Birds," the epic saga of the love-tormented priest that has been translated into more than 20 languages, sold untold millions of copies, and become one of the most successful TV mini-series of all time?

Not at all, says McCullough, as if there were rules about such things. "You don't become an icon because of anything except yourself. I'm always there. And I'm always shooting my mouth off."

'Angry' label irks Morissette

Q: Your album is doing incredibly well now, and your career is on the upswing. But as always seems the case, there's also been a backlash. Does it bother you to read such negative reviews or profiles?

A: I think I've been pretty resilient toward it, for the last eight or nine months. What I try to keep in mind is that there are going to be a lot of articles that are going to be misrepresentative of what I'm about as a person and as a writer. I hit the proverbial wall of being overly frustrated a couple of weeks ago, when I just saw yet another article that I felt just did not get it. At all.

Q: Didn't get it in what sense?
A: It got it in (it) saw me as the ever-depressed, ever-angry Alanis Morissette, who is "the poster girl for rage" (the) "allego-girl who was the Debbie Gibson of Canada in her youth." It's so one-dimensional, and so selling me short.

Q: It's funny enough, because I had a similar discussion with someone the other day who found it hard to believe that anyone could go from writing dance pop to writing a record like "You Oughta Know." I said, "Well, weren't you a different person at 15 than you were at 21?"
A: You're not allowed to evolve, and you're not allowed to change. Especially if it's a drastic one.

When I was younger and started doing music, I was immersed in the mid-1980s, when music was more for its sense of entertainment. I wasn't writing to communicate anything, and I was definitely not ready on the self-esteem level to indulge myself and all my personal turmoil.

I wasn't prepared to be unadulterated; I saw music as a way to perform

and entertain people. Make them smile, and take them away from reality.

New album nearly as good as 1st

Gen Blossoms, "Congratulations I'm Sorry" (A&M) — The general assumption was the Gin Blossoms' second album couldn't be half as good as their 1992 debut, "New Market Experience."

Soon after they'd recorded "Experience," the Tempe, Ariz., band fired Doug Hopkins, the songwriter who penned the soon-to-be hits "Hey Jealousy" and "Found Out About You." Hopkins, who had a history of alcohol problems, committed suicide in 1993. Without him, the skeptics said, the Gin Blossoms were just one more jangly R.E.M. clone.

But "Congratulations I'm Sorry" defies the odds: The album is every bit as memorable as the quintet's multiplatinum debut.

The Blossoms don't blaze any new trails on these guitar-based tunes (which were written by all five band members). And the group's influences remain transparent: The guitars are "As Long as It Takes" and "Perfectly Still" are pure Peter Dinklage, while other songs fly in the shadow of the Byrds.

Yet the band's rootsy rock songs boast such remarkable hooks and melodies, who cares how original they aren't? Whether they're strolling through a country ditty about getting wasted ("Memphis Time") or charging through a hard-rocker about wasting time ("My Car")...the Blossoms turn everything into classic AM-radio pop.

What sets "Congratulations" apart from a thousand other tuneful guitar-pop albums is the band's ability to sound melancholy without ever seeming whiny. Robin Wilson's quavering tenor practically cries out "hey, hey, hey," and his bandmates' harmonies are as fragile as glass. But between the group's prickly guitars and its taunt, Ramones-like rhythms, the Gin Blossoms never confuse winsome with wimpy.

Category: Sports. Players: One-to-eight. Recommended ages: 6 and up. How the game works: You're the Orlando Magic's Penny Hardaway with six seconds on the clock. You steal the ball from Derek Harper, pass it to teammate Nick Anderson, who drives to the three-point line and nails a shot at the buzzer for a one-point victory over the Knicks. That's what can happen when you play the most realistic-looking basketball video game yet created. You and up to

seven others can play at a time by picking players from all 29 NBA teams, but there may be some missing, such as Shaq, Michael Jordan and others because of their own NBA basketball video game contracts. (The Christmas version will have all the players.) But no matter: You may not get all the players, but you get a great game, like in the arcade hit "NBA Jam." Shooting, dunking, layups, 3-pointers are easy to do, but hard to defend.

Good points, bad points: State-of-the-art 3-D graphics create lifelike movement and show faces of real players, but more importantly, you play like one,

using true abilities of NBA professionals during play. Features include playing combinations in which up to 8 people can play at once, using multiplay controllers; enjoy the game's "smart" defensive and offensive players who execute specialty moves, such as rebound dunking, fade-away shooting and alley-oop dunking, that no other game offers. It's not as detailed as EA's "NBA Basketball '96," but it makes up for the few features it does not have in pure NBA action.

Tips: When dribbling the ball down the court, try not to look into the crowd. The background can blend into the action and you might lose sight of the ball. The verdict: "Hey, man, I love this game!"

Woodson becomes top-paid safety

IRVING, Texas — The Dallas Cowboys paid care of their top off-season priority Thursday by making Darren Woodson the highest paid safety in NFL history.

Working against a 3 p.m. free agency deadline, the Cowboys and Woodson worked out a six-year deal worth \$18 million with a \$5.4 million signing bonus.

To find the money, Dallas restructured the contracts of numerous players, including Kevin Smith and Erik Williams. Team vice president Stephen Jones adamantly refused to give a more detailed list, saying only, "There were several ... some small, some big."

"We know what he's meant to be the three Super Bowls we've won and we know what he means to be the three Super Bowls we've won," Jones said. "There was no way possible that we weren't going to do whatever it took to get Darren Woodson."

Cards hire Joe Greene as assistant

TEMPE, Ariz. — Hall of Famer "Mean" Joe Greene was hired Thursday as the Arizona Cardinals' defensive line coach. Greene, 49, was defensive line coach of the Miami Dolphins for the past four seasons. He served in the same capacity for the Pittsburgh Steelers from 1987-91.

Greene was a 10-time All Pro defensive tackle in his 13-year playing career and was the heart of Pittsburgh's "Steel Curtain" defense that led the Steelers to four Super Bowl wins. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1987.

Greene is the seventh assistant coach to be hired by new Cardinals head coach Jim Tobin. He joins offensive coordinator Jim Fassel, defensive coordinator Dave McGinnis, wide receivers coach Vic Rapp, offensive line coach Carl Mauck, running backs coach Jim Skipper, and tight ends and quality control coach George "Geep" Christy.

Falcons move to keep guard, QB

ATLANTA — The Atlanta Falcons made Bob Whitfield the highest-paid offensive lineman in the NFL Thursday and took steps to ensure the return of quarterback Jeff George.

Whitfield signed a five-year contract reported to be worth about \$15.5 million — an average of \$3.1 million a year — after a final negotiating session at the Falcons complex in suburban Suwanee.

Whitfield, the eighth overall pick in the 1992 draft from Stanford, has started every game for Atlanta the past three years and moved into the critical left tackle position when Matt Ryan retired after the '94 season. Still only 24, he is considered one of the top young offensive linemen in the NFL.

With Whitfield's signing, however, the team decided to forfeit the franchise-player option and named George a "transitional player." That gives the Falcons an opportunity to match any competing offer as long as they pay an average of the top 10 salaries at the position or give George a 20 percent raise, whichever is greater. George set an Atlanta record by throwing for 4,143 yards last season.

Nets lose guard for at least a month

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — New Jersey Nets shooting guard Kendall Gill is scheduled to have surgery on Friday to repair an unstable fracture in his left hand and he will be sidelined at least a month.

Dr. Charles Melone Jr., a New York City-based hand and wrist specialist examined Gill at the hospital and determined he would have to get a pin in the metacarpal of Gill's left index finger to stabilize the fracture.

Gill, who was acquired last month in the major deal that sent Kenney Anderson to the Charlotte Hornets, broke the bone midway through the first quarter of Wednesday night's game against Indiana trying to steal a ball from Pacers' guard Reggie Miller. "His elbow came right down on my hand," said Gill, who was averaging 17.5 points with New Jersey.

Baseball players seek arbitration win

NEW YORK — Baseball players increased their arbitration record to 4-0 when Jeff Fassero beat Montreal on Thursday and was awarded a \$2.8 million salary.

Arbitrator Robert Croo decided against the Expos' offer of \$2 million to Fassero, who had a \$1.5 million salary last season. Fassero went 13-14 with a 4.3 ERA in 30 starts in 1995.

Two more cases were heard Thursday. Atlanta Braves pitcher Steve Avery asked arbitrator Milton Einhorn for a raise from \$4 million to \$4.2 million. The Braves are attempting to cut him 10 percent to \$3.6 million.

Avery slumped to 7-13 last season with a 4.67 ERA last season. He won his only postseason start, beating the Cleveland Indians in Game 4 of the World Series.

Fassero's catcher Ivan Rodriguez asked arbitrator Dave Conception — not the former pitcher — for a raise from \$2,675,000 to \$4.95 million. Texas offered Rodriguez, who hit .303 last season with 12 homers and 67 RBIs.

Knicks lose Oakley for up to 6 weeks

NEW YORK — Knicks forward Charles Oakley broke his right thumb in Wednesday night's loss at Charlotte, an injury that will sideline him for approximately six weeks.

Oakley underwent surgery Thursday at Beth Israel Hospital in New York and the team termed it successful.

The Knicks' second-leading rebounder apparently broke the thumb when he fouled Robert Parish in the third quarter of a 120-100 loss. He left the game immediately and did not return.

The loss of Oakley comes less than a week after backup power forward Charles Smith was traded to San Antonio along with small forward Monty Williams for forward J.R. Reid and center Brad Lohaus.

Boxer: AIDS comment 'misinterpreted'

ALBANY, N.Y. — Floyd Patterson, quoted a day earlier as saying he had just heard of AIDS, said Thursday his comments were misinterpreted.

Patterson, the former heavyweight champion who is now the New York State Athletic Commission chairman, had earlier announced that New York would be testing boxers for the AIDS virus in response to boxer Tommy Morrison's positive HIV test.

"I was asked the state waited until now to institute testing, Patterson said: 'AIDS just came out. I go back to the '50s. I fought for 23 years. There was no AIDS. I just heard of AIDS a few weeks ago....'"

In a statement issued Thursday, Patterson said he knew first-hand the agony of AIDS since his brother died of AIDS complications almost a decade ago.

"I regret that some of my comments were misinterpreted," he said. "The issue of AIDS in the boxing ring has been brought to the forefront by recent events. I've been associated with boxing for almost my entire life, but AIDS is a relatively recent phenomenon that is being addressed in all facets of our daily lives and boxing is no exception."

"The question of AIDS was never an issue when I was boxing," said Patterson, 61, a two-time champion in the 1950s.

Ferrari unveils new car, low ambitions

MARANDELLO, Italy — Ferrari unveiled its new Formula One-car Thursday, downplaying chances of quickly ending a long title drought despite the addition of two-time driver's champion Michael Schumacher.

The F310 model — painted the team's traditional bright red, powered by a 3,000-c.c., 10-cylinder engine and featuring all-new sleek aerodynamics — was shown to reporters at the team headquarters near Modena.

"Schumacher said he and the team have only modest goals for this season. 'I think that we could aim to win a couple of races in 1996, and try to finish as many as possible,'" the German said. "We need to be realistic and not dream."

Grapplers converge on Jerome

JEROME — The Jerome Tiger wrestling team made its first appearance in the Cross State Wrestling Tournament Saturday in Jerome, but they could play spoiler to Buhl's quest for the crown.

According to Jerome co-coach Tim Matthews, Buhl should have enough strength and balance in their line-up to be considered the favorites. "Ironically, some of Buhl's best wrestlers could match up with some of Jerome's best," if the Jerome-Buhl pairings occur before the finals, valuable advancement points will be won or lost.

At 112 pounds, Jerome sophomore Justin Madden (son of co-coach Leon Madden), sports the team's best record at 19-0. In the dual meet with Buhl, Madden pinned Anthony Bartlett, last year's state runner-up at 103 pounds. Earlier in the year, Madden decided Jordan McKinley of Sugar-Salem, who was ranked number one in the state at the time.

At 130 pounds, John Bullock of Jerome will have his hands full with defending state champion Nate Nichill. Nichill won the January dual match, but needed over-time to defeat Bullock.

Seniors Levi Capps of Jerome and Nick Weaver of Buhl, battled to a two point win by Weaver in the dual match at 152 pounds.

Ty Matthews, son of co-coach Tim Matthews, has faced a long line of tough, senior competition at 160 pounds. Of his eight losses, most have been to older, ranked wrestlers, including Buhl's Dan Bartlett.

"If we had everyone healthy, and if we could get a few of the close matches we lost in Buhl to go our way, we could challenge for the title," coach Matthews said. Junior Wes Jones is out due to an infection; and senior Monte Weeks has a shoulder injury.

Matthews said several of the teams have shown quite a bit of improvement over the past couple years. "Mountain Home has a new coach who has really turned their program around," Matthews

said. "Twin Falls has a new coach, and we barely beat them. Wood River has a number tough wrestlers, and South Fremont is always tough."

Marchbroda returns home as coach of Baltimore franchise

BALTIMORE (AP) — Art Modell got the coach he wanted, and Ted Marchbroda got the job he coveted.

Marchbroda signed a three-year contract Thursday to become coach of Modell's NFL franchise in Baltimore. The new coach is something of an old friend to the city — Marchbroda was coach of the Baltimore Colts from 1975 to 1979, the final glory days of a franchise that left town in 1984.

"I could think of any better scenario," Marchbroda said. "It was a great feeling when we made the turn onto 33rd Street and I saw the lights and the front of Memorial Stadium."

Marchbroda spent many a memorable Sunday afternoon in the stadium that will house the team formerly known as the Cleveland Browns for the next two years. Marchbroda won three AFC East titles with Baltimore, at one point winning 29 of 33 regular-season games.

"I'm glad to be back in Baltimore. It's a new tradition starting, but we certainly want to continue the tradi-

tion of winning football teams here," he said. Modell is co-owner of the franchise that Marchbroda is the man who can bring the franchise back from the Browns.

"He's an accomplished coach, and it didn't hurt any that he is very popular in this part of the country," Modell said.

"I interviewed no one else, and I feel very fortunate to get him. Even if he didn't get as far as he did, I thought it was a great performance by the Colts last year."

Marchbroda, whose 73 wins is tied with Don Shula as the most in Colts history, returns to Baltimore after compiling a 30-34 record over four seasons with Indianapolis.

"I interviewed no one else, and I feel very fortunate to get him. Even if he didn't get as far as he did, I thought it was a great performance by the Colts last year."

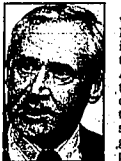
Colts give offensive chief top job

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The Indianapolis Colts didn't have to look far for a new coach.

On the same day Ted Marchbroda was hired by the relocated NFL team in Baltimore, Lindy Infante, his former offensive coordinator, was hired as coach of the Colts.

It's the second NFL coaching job for Infante, who was a Green Bay four-time starter and the league's coach of the year in 1989.

"I got back into this business about a year ago with the idea I had something to give to the game," Infante said at a news conference Thursday afternoon. "I don't get back in the idea that if I could come in here and do something that might contribute to this organization's success, somebody might take notice and then maybe somewhere down the road I might get another opportunity."

"In my wildest dreams, I did not expect it to be here, or this quick. Again, I'm flattered, I'm honored, I'm ready to go to work and get as busy as I possibly can to help this organization in any way I can to have the success we've experienced this year continue."

Infante's appointment after one year as offensive coordinator had been expected since last week, when Marchbroda was fired after refusing a one-year contract extension.

Bill Tobin, the team's director of football operations, said he never

planned to interview anyone else. When this head coaching vacancy opened up, he was the only one that came to mind and the only person I talked to about the opening," he said.

NFL players win round in salary cap war

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — A federal judge issued a temporary restraining order Thursday that set the NFL salary cap for 1996 at \$40.8 million, about \$2.1 million higher than the owners wanted. U.S. District Judge David S. Doty sided with the NFL Players Association in setting the cap on the eve of the free agent signing period, which was to begin Friday.

However, both sides may agree to delay free agent signings until the issue is resolved in a conference call with Doty on Feb. 22. A decision on the delay was expected Friday morning.

At issue are ticket, local television and radio revenues generated by the Jacksonville Jaguars and Carolina Panthers, who joined the league last season.

The owners say the cap should follow the recommendation of an independent auditor, who reviewed the expansion revenues to arrive at a figure of about \$38.7 million, said NFL spokesman Greg Aiello.

The NFLPA believes the higher figure is a more accurate reflection of revenue projections for the upcoming season.

"We think it's clear as a bell," said attorney Gregory Kessler, who represented the players Thursday.

In its first year in 1994, the salary cap was set at \$34.6 million per team. That increased to \$37.1 million last season.

The owners gave preliminary approval to a three-year extension of the league's collective bargaining agreement with the players, stretching the deal through 2002. That extension does not include expanded revenue-sharing deals, which would have included portions of contracts such as the ones Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones signed last season with Pepsi and Nike.

The owners voted against the expanded revenue-sharing provision last week.

Morrison: 'I thought I was bulletproof, and I'm not'

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Tommy Morrison's voice quivered and his face flushed. Never did he think this could happen to him.

"I honestly believed I had a better chance of winning the lottery than contracting this disease," he said. "I've never been so wrong in my life."

On Thursday, a second test confirmed that he did, indeed, have the virus that causes AIDS. "I'm here to tell you I thought that I was bulletproof, and I was not," he said.

"He described a life of promiscuous sex and how he was ignorant about the way AIDS is transmitted. He also said, however, he believes he could have contracted the virus through bloody bouts in the ring."

"I don't know how I got it and it's really not important," he said at the news conference.

Morrison entered the news conference composed and confident, the same air he took into the ring. But his face reddened and his voice

cracked as he spoke of an uncertain future and expressed concern for his family and for women with whom he had relations.

"I hope I can serve as a warning that living this lifestyle can only lead to one thing," he said. "And that's misery."

The 27-year-old from Jay, Okla., learned he

tested positive for HIV just before Saturday's scheduled Las Vegas fight against Arthur "Weather" Weathers. Morrison said he had no symptoms and had received no notice from previous sex partners to indicate he might have the disease.

He spent the past week calling former sparring partners and sexual partners, encouraging them to take an HIV test. So far, none of them, including his girlfriend, have turned up positive, he said. "My prayers go out to them, their families and that somehow everything will be OK," Morrison said.

The announcement of Morrison's positive test Monday prompted boxing officials nationwide to call for mandatory HIV testing. But the national Centers for Disease Control have received no reports of HIV transmission through athletics; spokeswoman Michele Bonds said.

But anytime bodily fluids are exchanged there is a risk of transmission, she said. CDC

studies of the NFL show the risk in that sport is extremely low.

"While boxers are more likely to be bloodied during competition, it would take quantity and duration" of exposure to the virus for possible transmission, she said.

As far as requiring AIDS testing for boxers, the CDC encourages any precautions and education that could help reduce the risk. Ms. Bonds said. "We feel the risk is low, but we need to make that risk even lower," she said.

Morrison said he endorsed mandatory HIV testing. "They'd be crazy not to," he said.

Morrison was suspended from worldwide boxing after the positive HIV test in Las Vegas. He pronounced his boxing career over Thursday and said he plans to pursue AIDS awareness activities.

"I will have scored my biggest knockout ever" if by speaking out, he prevents another person from contracting the disease, he said.

Earnhardt, Irvins set pace

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Two things were proved in Thursday's Gatorade Twin 125-mile qualifying races for the Daytona 500: Dale Earnhardt is still the man to beat and Ernie Irvin is all the way back.

Those two, already the front-row starters in Sunday's race by virtue of qualifying laps in time trials, proved their earlier performances were no flukes. Earnhardt held off two-time defending Daytona 500 winner Sterling Marlin to win the first race and Irvin continued his incredible comeback from near-fatal injuries by leading every lap of his race.

"That's pretty impressive, even to myself," Earnhardt said after his seventh straight trip to Victory Lane in the prelude to the biggest race he has never won.

The seven-time Winston Cup champion has led the Daytona 500 many times and finished second on three occasions, including two of the last three years.

"That's just one step toward that Daytona 500 win, and that's what we're working for," he said. "I've got high expectations. This could be our year."

Irvin, seriously injured in a crash at Michigan International Speedway on Aug. 20, 1994, began his comeback with three Winston Cup races late last season. He finished in the top 10 twice.

His narrow victory over Ken Schrader on Thursday was Irvin's second in the qualifying races and his first win of any kind since taking a road race at Sonoma, Calif., in May 1994.

"The day I got hurt, we were racing Earnhardt for the championship," Irvin said. "There's nothing more that I'd like than to be racing Earnhardt for the championship again. That's when (the comeback) is going to be complete."

"I'm real fortunate that none of my skills left, all my memories of racing never left," he added. "I don't know if that's because the doctor did such a good job, but that's what has enabled me to come back. Basically, all I had to do was be physically able to do it."

The first race was pretty much a single file event as Marlin passing Earnhardt on the first lap and leading until lap 30. That's when Earnhardt, with some drafting help from former Daytona winner Dale Jarrett and Terry Labonte, moved into the lead to stay.

Three laps into the end, Marlin tried to make a high move coming

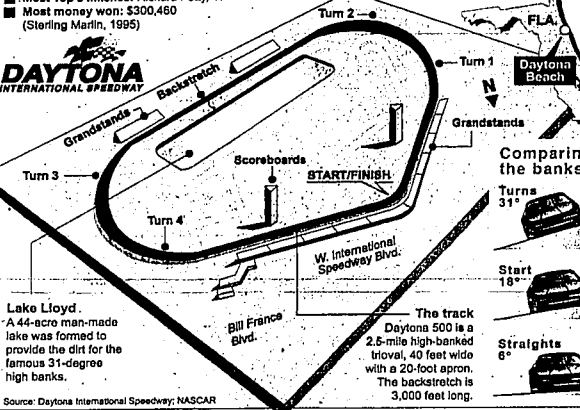

off the fourth turn, but Earnhardt stayed in front of him as Jarrett and Labonte went low and wedged between the two leaders.

Marlin, who won the other qualifying race in 1995, got back to second place on the last lap, but finished 0.16-seconds, about three car-lengths behind Earnhardt's Chevrolet Monte Carlo. The winner averaged 143.039 mph.

That race was slowed by rain showers that caused brief caution periods and a multi-car crash on lap 44 when Bobby Hillin Jr. and Brett Bodine came together coming off lap two. Before it was over, Bodine nudged the sliding

car of Bobby Labonte, who flipped over and skidded down the backstretch on his roof. He was not injured.

The second race was also mostly single-file and run without incident. Irvin stayed at the front of an eight-car lead pack all the way.

Lawyer: Accused snowball thrower out in cold

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Attending a New York Giants game in December has turned Jeffrey Lange's life upside down, his lawyer says.

"It's miserable," Robert Ballard Jr. said of the past seven weeks of Lange's life. "He's lost his job. He can't find another one. Nobody wants to get into this fracas."

Lange, of Redding, was one of thousands of fans involved in a sometimes vicious snowball melee that almost caused the Giants to forfeit a game to the San Diego Chargers on Dec. 23.

Lange, 26, attended a hearing on an improper behavior charge at East Rutherford Municipal Court Wednesday. Ballard asked for an adjournment until March 13. Judge George O. Savino granted Ballard's request.

Fifteen people were arrested and 175 people were ejected from Giants Stadium for throwing snow during the barrage of snowballs that left 15 people injured. The Chargers equipment manager was knocked unconscious by a flying snowball.

An Associated Press photograph showed Lange throwing a snowball at the gameball. The photo was published in numerous newspapers.

Sierra Nevada, Spain (AP) — The first dilemma of the World Alpine Skiing Championships arrived Thursday in the form of a heavy snowfall that reminded memories of a snow-swepted championships three years ago in Japan.

But as of Thursday afternoon, the Great One, who is in the final year of his contract, was still with the Los Angeles Kings.

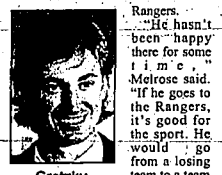

The Rangers hoped to extend their home-ice unbeaten streak to 24, tying a 25-year-old club record.

The Rangers aren't the only team in pursuit of Gretzky. The Chicago Blackhawks, St. Louis Blues and Toronto Maple Leafs are all reportedly running to acquire the NHL's all-time leading scorer.

The Rangers, however, hold obvious attraction for Gretzky. He would be teaming up with Mark Messier, Kevin Lowe and Adam Graves, all old pals from his days in Edmonton, where he led the Oilers to four Stanley Cups.

Barry Melrose, who coached Gretzky for three seasons with the Kings and now serves as an analyst for ESPN, thinks a trade is certain and that the chances are 80 percent that Gretzky will wind up with the

When Gretzky was traded from Edmonton to LA in the summer of 1988 in a deal that stunned the hockey world; he inspired the Kings to a higher level of play. By 1993, Gretzky had led the team to the Stanley Cup Finals for the first time in their history.

Since then, though, not many good things have happened to the Kings — both on and off the ice. Owner Bruce McNall's financial problems, a change in management, injuries and bad player decisions have all contributed to making the Kings a mediocre team.

NBC adds Ryder Cup, PGA Seniors until '06

NEW YORK (AP) — Now that NBC has closed the books on this century, it can concentrate on the next millennium.

The Ryder Cup has become one of the most compelling events in golf since Europe had its breakthrough victory in 1985.

Don't wait for breakthrough to file your taxes

NEW YORK — There are even more chances than usual for procrastinating on doing your income tax return this year.
After all, with the budget standoff between President Clinton and Congress, it still isn't known for certain whether legislation might be passed that would change some of the rules that apply for 1995 — on capital gains, for instance.
As excuses go, this one has a lot to recommend it. It's timely, it's topical, it even shows off your knowledge of current events.

Most taxpayers will gain little by waiting for the air to clear.
Standard & Poor's newsletter
gains taxes on investments that are held for more than a year, as part of the sweeping budget legislation that has led to a month-long impasse between Clinton's Democratic administration and the Republican-controlled Congress.
Many people, including mutual fund investors as well as investors in individual stocks and bonds, have sizable capital gains to report for 1995 as a result of the bull market on Wall Street.

Even if it is, the chances now look slim that lower capital gains rate would be made retroactive to 1995.
"I think it's highly unlikely," says Marc Britton, director of personal financial planning at the accounting firm of KPMG Peat Marwick.
In the event that some change is made affecting any of the rules for 1995, people who have already filed will be able to prepare an amended return, using IRS Form 1040X.
In the meantime, there is a strong incentive to file as early as possible if you have a refund coming.
The longer you wait, the longer you give Uncle Sam free use of money that belongs to you, and that you might otherwise put to work by investing or using to pay down debts.
There may also be some urgency to file, S&P points out, if you have a balance due to the IRS on which you may be charged penalties and interest.
For most taxpayers, this worry arises if the amount paid during 1995 via withhold-

ing and estimated taxes is less than 90 percent of the year's total tax bill, and also less than 100 percent of the tax you paid in 1994 (110 percent if your income is more than \$150,000).
If you don't have either a big refund or a sizable balance due to contend with, and decide for any reason that you don't want to file by mid-April, you can get an automatic four-month extension of the filing deadline simply by sending in the appropriate document, Form 4868.
This process requires that you make a good estimate of your taxes, and pay what you expect to owe by the mid-April deadline if you want to avoid possible interest and penalty charges.
As S&P notes, it can have a variety of benefits as well.
"Having a complex return done during the off-peak period reduces advisory fees," the advisory firm points out, "and extensions give you time to gather cost-basis information on investments, which can be a problem, particularly with securities and mutual fund shares held a long time."

CHICAGO — The average rate on 30-year fixed-rate mortgages this week fell just below 7.0 percent, a key psychological barrier, but the decline is not likely to lead to significantly faster refinancing in the near term, housing economists said.
The Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. Thursday reported that the average 30-year fixed mortgage rate slipped to 6.94 percent from 7.02 percent the previous week. It was the lowest rate since Oct. 29, 1993.
But "I don't know if (.06 percentage point) will make that big a difference," said Robert Davis, chief economist with America's Community Bankers.
"Homeowners are still a little low-key," he says. "The 6.75 percent this year assuming the Federal Reserve cuts short-term interest rates another 1/2 point, he said."

Rocks block way to bus in caved tunnel

TOKYO — Anguished relatives fought back tears Thursday after being told they must wait even longer for workers to reach 20 people trapped for more than five days inside a crushed mountain tunnel.

Workers could see a bus flattened to 3 feet high, but large tectonic rocks were hampering efforts to reach it.

"I'm so disgusted I have nothing to say," Toyomitsu Murakami, 44, told the Kyodo News Service while waiting for word of his 17-year-old-daughter, Asami. "I want to bring her out of that dark, cold place."

There was almost no hope of finding survivors in the freezing cold. The bus, with 19 people inside, was flattened when a rock the size of a 20-story building peeled off the mountainside Saturday and smashed through the tunnel roof. A car also was trapped.

Rocket explodes in failed satellite launch

BEIJING — The explosion of another Chinese rocket — which destroyed a television satellite and caused an unconfirmed number of casualties — raised new questions today about the reliability of China's commercial satellite launch program.

Hong Kong radio said four people were killed and dozens injured in the explosion early today, but Zhang Lihui, a spokeswoman for the government aerospace agency, said there were no deaths.

The newly developed Long March 3B rocket carrying the Intelsat Inc. satellite veered toward the ground and exploded moments after liftoff at 3:01 a.m. (12:01 p.m. MST Wednesday), television footage showed.

The force of the blast blew away roofs and knocked out windows and doors at a military base near the Xichang Launch Center in remote southwestern Sichuan province, a military official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Bread prices go up 40% in Georgia

TBILISI, Georgia — The government ordered a 40 percent increase in the price of bread Thursday, putting further pressure on the former Soviet republic's hard-pressed people.

The price of a 2.2-pound loaf of bread rose from 24 cents to 34 cents. The average monthly wage in Georgia is \$7.60.

The price increase is aimed at raising enough money for the government to be able to buy more grain once foreign assistance ends.

Georgia produces only about 7 percent of its annual consumption of grain, and Western humanitarian aid is likely to end soon, said Anzor Burdzhanadze, head of the state-run Bread Production Corporation.

Police disarm bomb in London

LONDON — Police deactivated a bomb in London's theater district Thursday hours after the Irish Republican Army appeared to reject demands for a new cease-fire.

No one claimed responsibility for the small bomb found near Shaftesbury Avenue, famous for its theaters and restaurants, but Scotland Yard said two coded telephone warnings "bore all the hallmarks" of the IRA.

Just after 12:30 p.m. Thursday, barricades went up after police received seven coded warnings. Some people were evacuated, others told to stay inside.

Police sealed off Piccadilly Circus, Trafalgar Square, the bustling shopping district along Oxford Street and half a dozen subway stations, but reopened them about three hours after the warnings.

Peres' foe skeptical of peace plan

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — The upcoming election will give Israelis their clearest choice in decades about the future of the Jewish state.

Prime Minister Shimon Peres promises a mighty push for a comprehensive peace to end a century of Arab-Israeli conflict. Although he is vague on the details, many believe this to mean Palestinian independence and a return of the Golan Heights to Syria.

Benjamin Netanyahu, the right-wing challenger, taps the skepticism that many Israelis have about whether the Arabs are ready to bury the hatchet and accept Israel's permanent presence in the Holy Land.

He considers Yasser Arafat a terrorist, not a peacemaker, and says he will never meet with him face-to-face. He vows to prevent further expansion of the Palestinian autonomous zones in the Gaza Strip and West Bank. He rejects withdrawal from the Golan.

"I don't much believe in a 'New Middle East,'" Netanyahu said, quoting the title of Peres' future 1993 book predicting a tangle in which soldiers give way to software engineers.

"We don't see a computer for every Arab peasant in the region," the Likud Party leader said this week as he and Peres announced that the elections would be held early, probably in late May.

Hanan Ashrawi, a former Arafat

spokeswoman elected last month to the new Palestinian self-rule council, warned that Netanyahu's attitude could wipe out the achievements of

the peace process. "It will sign the death certificate for peace," she told *The Associated Press*. For now, Peres leads his conservative rival by up to 20 percent in the polls — a result of a wave of sympathy following the Nov. 4 assassination of Yitzhak Rabin by a right-wing religious extremist.

But the election is far from over.

The urban Peres, 72, has a poor track record, having lost three elections and tied one. Four years ago the Labor Party dumped him for Rabin, a gruff, popular former army chief, and won its first election in almost two decades. When Rabin was assassinated, the party turned to Peres as the natural choice.

Peres' Achilles' heel is terrorism by Islamic militants who have vowed to wreck the peace process. A resumption of their deadly suicide bombings, on hold since the summer, could erase his advantage.

Launching his campaign this week, Peres urged Israelis to give him a mandate to "end the state of war in the entire region."

Rabin and Peres signed a 1993 deal with the PLO establishing autonomy in the West Bank and Gaza. That led to a peace treaty with Jordan, establishment of ties with several moderate Arab states and a freezing of the Arab economic boycott of Israel.

Yeltsin announces bid for re-election

YEKATERINBURG, Russia (AP) — He was hoarse, at times seeming incoherent. His audience was unenthusiastic.

It was an inauspicious start to Boris Yeltsin's quest for a second term as he made his grand announcement Thursday that he would run in the June 16 presidential election.

Defiant and defensive in his hour-long speech, Yeltsin insisted only he could guarantee democracy and stability in Russia.

Although Yeltsin has largely lost the support of the reformist forces that were his core constituency five years ago, he hopes to become a compromise candidate rallying them and moderates against Communists and ultranationalists. But some observers believe his popularity is too low and that he will split the

reformist vote.

"I must bring to a successful finish the work I gave myself completely to," the weary-looking president told supporters in his hometown of Yekaterinburg. "I am convinced that I can lead this country across the troubles, anxiety and uncertainty."

In contrast, the resurgent Communist Party held a near-euphoric convention Thursday in Moscow to unanimously nominate its leader, Gennady Zyuganov, to run against Yeltsin. Zyuganov is the front-runner in early polls.

The Communists were optimistic, calling for unity against Yeltsin by

opposition parties on the left and right.

The Communist Party and its allies are believed to have the support of a solid 30 percent of voters. They need 50 percent plus one vote for a first-round victory; otherwise the top two finishers meet in a runoff.

Along with ultranationalist Vladimir Zhirinovskiy, other leading candidates in the crowded race include reformist Grigory Yavlinsky and retired Gen. Alexander Lebed, who appeals to nationalists.

Wading into crowds before his reelection speech, the 65-year-old Yeltsin showed flashes of the energy and populist touch that five years ago made him Russia's first democratically elected president. He asked people about their problems and got a few hugs.

As in 1991, Yeltsin is campaigning

against the Communists, reminding his audience of the long lines and shortages of Soviet days, and the stifling of free speech.

But Russians are less receptive to that message now, worried more about the post-Soviet hardships of lost savings, unpaid wages, the huge gap between rich and poor, and the costly war in Chechnya.

Still, Yeltsin has made a career of political comebacks and opponents said Thursday that they could not count him out.

Yeltsin has been distancing himself from his more unpopular reforms and promising many hard-hit sectors that he will pay state debts in full, at once. Although economists say that could break the budget, Yeltsin promised more such spending Thursday: to hospitals, subway systems and others who complain of short funding.

"Please settle an argument," writes a reader. "My partner claims I misplayed my spade suit, and I maintain I made a percent-age play."

Here is the hand that caused the commotion.
South ruffed the second club and knocked out the trump ace. East forced South with another club and South started the spades, rejecting the possibility of finding both diamond honors with West (double finesse).

He started with a low spade toward dummy's jack, but West didn't bite. (Had West hopped up with his king, South could have finessed against East's queen to make the game.) East took dummy's spade jack, returned the suit and South lost two spades, a club and the trump ace for one down.
North claimed South should have led the first spade to his eight, losing to West's king. Later, he could finesse against East's queen to make the game.
North's line of play is better than the one South chose, but it wasn't the best play. South's best play was to cross to dummy's diamond ace after ruffing the second club. After ruffing dummy's last club, he leads another diamond, dummy's king and ruffs dummy's last diamond. Now, he leads a trump and East is enthralled. Whatever East leads, South is left with only one spade loser and South has his 11 tricks.

Network offers 12 TV movies this week; seven on Sunday

A dozen TV movies will premiere this week—seven of them on Sunday night alone—but there's still no need to learn to program the VCR.

Topics include a teen with bulimia, revenge of the rateslakes, a stalker, a misled doctor, multiple murders, multiple tornadoes and the multimillionaires of late night.

More about that shortly. The reason for the onslaught is "sweeps"—the TV industry term for a four-week viewing period after which viewership is tabulated and the rates advertisers pay for local air time are set accordingly. There are four sweeps periods a year—in November, February, May and July—during which networks make their schedules as attractive as possible in hopes of luring extra viewers to help those local stations.

According to Jack Loftus of Nielsen Media Research, the company that tabulates TV viewership statistics, a movie night can benefit a network and its affiliates both on the individual night and for days or weeks afterward.

"(The movie) brings people to the network. And when they're at the network, they get exposure to the promos for other regular series programs. So anything that attracts a high audience, that same audience gets exposure not just to the program and to a commercial, but it also gets exposure to the network promotions."

CBS tries the scheme Wednesday, Feb. 21, with "The Good Doctor: The Paul Fleiss Story," starring Michael Gross. The film tells the story of "Hollywood madam" Heidi Fleiss' father, who was tried on a money laundering charge in con-

nection with her case. Gross was initially reluctant, but the script, which raises questions about a parent's role, won him over.

"There's a real, human story behind every tabloid headline, it's what that simple. This is what I found fascinating—the human story behind the headlines."

As for any ratings grab, Gross is pragmatic, saying, "I think the fact that the Fleiss name is on anything can't hurt."

A bankable actor, Gross has his own concerns about sweeps: "I'm fortunate I'm not up against myself, because I have two other films airing this month." ("Hijacked: Flight 285" aired Feb. 4 on ABC, while Ed McBain's "37th Precinct: Ice" airs Sunday, Feb. 18, on NBC).

"My biggest fear was that I would somehow wind up being up against myself on one of these nights. That would have

been strange indeed," Gross admits.

Gross has no other made-for-TV competition movies to worry about on Wednesday, but Sunday is another matter.

On ABC, Mel Harris and Valerie Bertinelli star in "A Case for Life." They play sisters whose differing views on abortion drive them apart. The script gives both sides equal time, but Eric Lauenville's directing leaves the characters strangely dry-eyed.

Lifetime's "Closer and Closer," another women's story, stars Kim Delaney ("NYPD Blue") as a wheelchair-using author who is stalked by a serial killer copying the '87-11 precinct." NBC's "47th Precinct" stars Joe Pignolano and Dale Midkiff as detectives investigating three murders committed with the same gun. Gross plays their superior, Lt. Byrnes.

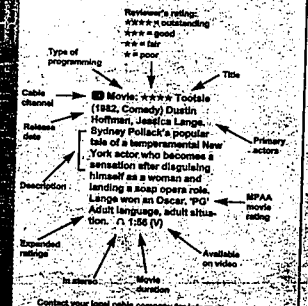

Q: Is Dennis Hopper, that actor who plays so many crazies in movies and in television ads, getting married again? — T.C.

A: It's true. Hopper is about to tie the knot again. Dennis recently announced his engagement to Victoria Duffy, his beautiful companion for many years. The ceremony, she says, will take place in an unspecified location sometime in March, about two months prior to Hopper's 60th birthday.

Why not, figures Hopper. His career is going great guns. He recently returned from Ireland where he co-starred in the upcoming film "Space Truckers." And, he soon departs for Morocco to co-star in an updated version of "Samson and Delilah."

Q: Can you tell us something about Alicia Witt, the firenized, sultry Zoey on "Cybill"? — C.W.

A: Alicia is a young actress to keep an eye on. Yes, she does play the taciturn Zoey on Cybill. She also portrays a murderous adolescent in a new film, "Fun."

There's a method to her role choices. When she first came to Hollywood at 17 (she's now 20), the Worcester, Mass., actress landed a job playing piano in swanky hotel. With her pale, smooth complexion and flowing red hair, Alicia was repeatedly told that she looked like a young woman from another century.

"It annoyed me to death," she says. To counteract this physical typecasting, she decided to pursue acting roles that

play ed against her angelic appearance—sullen, nasty teenage brat types. So far, it's working and Alicia is getting lots of work — even nonbratty roles like the

she plays in "Mr. Holland's Opus," with Richard Dreyfuss.

Q: Has Sean Penn put on a lot of weight? — C.W.

A: Penn's performance as a convicted murderer befriended by a nun (played by Susan Sarandon) in "Dead Man Walking" is drawing his most favorable critical reviews in years. In it, the 35-year-old actor-director was lean and mean.

But Penn's next acting project is "The Belles of Hell." He stars as the late Irish poet Brendan Behan, who was a notoriously heavy drinker and quite poorly. To play the part of Behan, Penn tells me he's had to lose weight for the first portion of the flick, then gain weight — about 40 pounds — for the latter part. That explains the extra poundage.

Q: What's ahead for Candice Bergen, now that she's a widow and her TV series is on its last legs? — M.E.

A: Some have speculated that since the death last November of her husband, 63-year-old French film director Louis Malle, Bergen is planning on giving up acting and showbiz in general.

No question that Malle's long illness took an emotional toll on Candice, 49, reportedly dropped some 20 pounds. Also, no question that it's a time for regrouping, something

Bergen plans to do by spending lots more time with her 10-year-old daughter, Chloe.

"Murphy Brown" is in its eighth, and probably final, season. The show was a source of relief for Candice in troubled times, and she has bittersweet feelings about its end. I have no doubt that she'll continue in movies and on TV, but for now, it's time for family and friends.

Q: Is it true that Pavarotti sings in hotel suites when on the road? — W.W.

A: Yes, the peripatetic tenor practices wherever he goes, to keep his pipes in perfect pitch. A British opera buff, just in from London to Joe Allen, the well-known Manhattan restaurant, tells of an encounter with Pavarotti: A guest at London's posh Savoy Hotel complained of the noise coming from an adjacent room. When he rang reception requesting that the neighbor "turn down his telly," the man-

ager replied, "That's no TV, sir, that's Mr. Pavarotti practicing."

Q: Is Robert De Niro, the hardened thief-murderer in "Heat," involved with a young actress who is also in the film? — D.R.

A: The Hollywood grapevine has it—that 27-year-old actress Ashley Judd — related to the country's leading young Judds — and De Niro took

up with each other when "Heat" was filming in Los Angeles. One report had it that Ashley keeps an apartment in New York just to be near De Niro. Judd denies the rumor.

For one thing, there's the age difference: De Niro turns 53 this year; three years younger than his veteran "Heat" co-star, Al Pacino. For another, Ashley tells me that she has fallen head over heels for Matthew McConaughey. Judd's co-star in her new flick, "A Time to Kill."

Ashley says she's even decided to give marriage serious thought. As for her "Heat" co-stars, she refers to them as "Mr. De Niro" and "Mr. Pacino." I doubt that 27-year-olds refer to their significant others as "Mr."

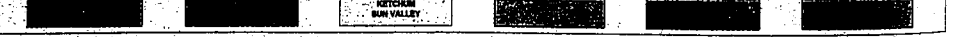

'Law & Order' DA learned about injustice early in life

NEW YORK — The event that taught Steven Hill a profound lesson about justice, or more precisely injustice, centers on a cruel eighth-grade mathematics teacher. Decades later, the memoir still rankled. "If I had her in front of me I ... He mimed a strung-up and throttling motion with his hands.

"Every Friday, she would give a math test," Hill recalled. "And every Friday I would fail." And every Monday, as the teacher returned the tests, she read the grades — out loud. "Week after week. Month after month. I was lousy in math and one broken-hearted, eighth-grade student in Horace Mann Junior High in Seattle, Washington."

Unable to tolerate the humiliation any further, Hill was determined to pass at least one test.

"I took the lousy textbook home and studied those lousy equations until three in the morning. The next day I took the test. And this time, I did OK.

"Monday she comes in and reads the grades. When she gets to my name, she stops and glares. 'Steven! B!' I went up, got my test and as I returned to my seat, I felt her eye-snaring — yes, that's the word, snaring — at me. 'Steven!' I looked up at her. 'I know very well that you stole the test and you took it home, and your parents did the work and gave you the answers!'"

"It wasn't true! She accused me of something I didn't do, and I wept in front of the whole class. That day I learned something about the nature of injustice."

The experience has been a constant reference point for Hill in the role of Manhattan District Attorney Adam Schiff in the series "Law & Order." He is very much a "method" actor, digging into his own experience to help define the character.

The son of a furniture-store owner, Hill is known

early age that he was headed toward a career in theater. After graduating from the University of Washington "with a degree in general studies," he said, he went to Chicago to "get my sea legs by working theater."

In 1947 Hill joined the Actors Studio as a member of its first class, which included Marlon Brando, Montgomery Clift and Julie Harris. To this day, he looks back on the experience fondly.

He especially remembers the words of writer-director Elia Kazan: "His phrase, 'Acting is an act of will,' still stays with me. By that he meant tenacity and persistence, no matter what."

"In any generation of actors, regardless of school or training, there are very few geniuses," Hill continued. "As everyone knows, it's five percent talent, ninety-five percent sweat."

"John Barrymore could have been a genius, but he frittered away his talent because he refused to sweat. John Gielgud, on the other hand, wasn't a genius at all, but sque-o-e-zed out his talent to the last drop. Some work with Olivier, who worked like a dog."

He paused. "I don't think I ever worked as hard as I should have. Julie Harris did. Nobody worked harder than Julie Harris. And I have a big suspicion about Marlon Brando. He was a marvelous natural talent in those early years. But I'm now beginning to think he put a lot more sweat into his work than we all realized. It was dark, secretive and private, but in his own personal way he was sweating."

Among the current crop, he cited Robert Duvall as one of the best. "I'm also very impressed with a lot of the acting by guest stars on

'Law & Order.' I don't know who some of them are or where they come from, but their performances are gems."

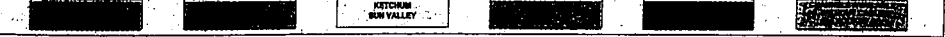

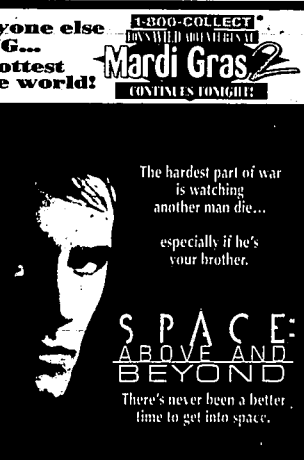

NBC thumps ABC, CBS takes second

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC, with the finale of the "Gulliver's Travels" in fourth place, put seven shows in the Top 10 and Nielsen won the prime-time Nielsen ratings crown, but lowly CBS edged ABC for second place.

Despite the dominance of Gulliver and NBC's Thursday night lineup, CBS landed "60 Minutes" at No. 8, its "Thorn Birds" miniseries at No. 9, "Walker, Texas Ranger" tied for 10th, and family hit "Touched by an Angel," at No. 14.

"Home Improvement," at No. 6, was ABC's only Top 10 show.

For the week of Feb. 5-11, NBC led with an overwhelming 12.9 rating, and a 21 percent average share of the prime-time audience; both CBS and ABC had a 16 share, but CBS placed with a 10.1 rating and ABC's 10.0.

NBC's weekly rating was eight-tenths of a ratings point better than its season-to-date average; CBS' was a half-point better, and ABC was 1.1 points off its seasonal average.

The Fox Broadcasting Co., airing just 15 hours of prime time programming, earned an 8.4 rating, 13 share.

The performance of Hollywood's two, low-rated "emerging" networks was on a par with their season-to-date ratings. The WB network earned a 2.6 rating, 4 share on five hours' programming, and UPN a 3.2 rating, 5 share on four.

One ratings point equals 959,000 households, or 1 percent of the nation's estimated 95.9 million TV sets in the Nielsen Media Research universe. Share is the percentage of sets tuned in during a given time period.

Among the evening newcasts, ABC's "World News Tonight" was No. 1

for the 179th week in the past 180, averaging a 9.8 rating, 18 share; NBC's "Nightly News" averaged an 8.8 rating, 17 share; and CBS' "Evening News" had an 8.3 rating, 16 share.

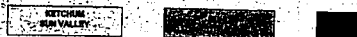

Will love for 'Friends' fade?

OK. Now our "Friends" have really gone and done it. You must have seen them last week.

In the episode called "The One Where Ross and Rachel... You Know..."

If you were watching, then you know by now that "You know" means, well, you know, that had set.

In the breathlessly articulated case of "Friends" characters Ross and Rachel, it happened on a bearskin rug on a planetarium floor.

So now the question is: Have you had enough?

Are you ready to take a break from NBC's ubiquitous urban comedy hit "Friends" and its stars, Jennifer Aniston, Courteney Cox, Lisa Kudrow, Matt LeBlanc, Matthew Perry and David Schwimmer? Or is too much never enough?

The episode may have been the deal-breaker for a lot of us because—as everybody knows—nothing ruins a perfectly good friendship as quickly as sex.

That's especially true when it comes to TV shows. And it may be particularly true for "Friends," which has a deceptively delicate balance of talent and personalities that are so profoundly affected by last week's big event.

You can't really blame NBC of the cast for getting carried away with themselves.

Popularity is the name of the game in television. The absolute goal. The more people that like you, the better. That doesn't mean, though, that they can't get sick of you.

That, too, is the nature of television. Viewers gorge themselves on their favorite shows, their favorite stars (some of whom are available five nights a week in syndication), get their fill, and move on, which leads to situations in which, for example, ABC's "Home Improvement" takes a ratings hit in prime time because the program is so popular in syndication.

The "Friends" phenomenon, of course, is the special case of the moment.

What started as an unpremeditated program a year ago grew into a charming, unpre-

tenious, well-written comedy that has become a national epidemic.

If simultaneously cover stories in national magazines are the measure of success, it would appear that no show has ever been as big as "Friends."

A "Friends" backlash, however, has been building for several weeks. At least in the media. It started with the stars' Diet Coke promotional campaign and crescendoed, and so we would have thought, with a special, star-studded, hourlong episode on Super Bowl Sunday.

Many believed the hour proved conclusively that "Friends" is a half-hour show and had pushed its luck. But with such guest stars as Brooke Shields, Julia Roberts (who is or was dating Matthew Perry) and Jean Claude Van Damme, the hour set a ratings record for the show and an entertainment hour for the year, watched by some 66.2 million viewers.

Oscar's omissions are as surprising as its nominations

Omissions accomplished. Although the Highlands historical epic "Braveheart" led the pack Tuesday with 10 Oscar nominations, including best picture and best director for Mel Gibson, not-one member of its bekked cast received acting recognition.

Although "Dead Man Walking" and "Leaving Las Vegas" received nominations in the key actor, actress and director categories, neither was honored with a best picture nod. "Sense and Sensibility," which scored seven nominations including best picture, actress for Emma Thompson and supporting actress for Kate Winslet, failed to nab one for the man who put it all together, Taiwanese director Ang Lee.

Tuesday's announcement, held at the Beverly Hills headquarters of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, was full of surprises — as much for what was neglected by the 5,043 academy members as for what they acknowledged.

Competing for best picture at the 68th annual Academy Awards, to be held in Los Angeles on March 25, were the bloody battlefield drama "Braveheart" and the Jane Austen romantic comedy "Sense and Sensibility." They are joined by the space drama "Apollo 13" (nine nominations); the Australian talking-pig film "Babe" (seven nominations), and the Italian story of a lovestruck mail carrier, "The Postman."

"The Postman's" five nominations — including one for its star, Massimo Troisi, who dies at age 41 hours after completing the movie — were among the stunners of the day, and stood as testament to Miramax Films' aggressive Academy campaign. The Disney-owned art-film distributor, who the films claimed a total of 11 nominations

(down from a record 22 last year), showered the industry with ads and hype for the Italian-language picture.

In the acting categories, Nicolas Cage, recipient of a Golden Globe for his suicidal drunk in "Leaving Las Vegas," will be competing for actor honors against Richard Dreyfuss for "Mr. Holland's Opus," Anthony Hopkins for "Nixon," Sean Penn for "Dead Man Walking" and Troisi for "Postman." Peter Finch was the last recipient of a posthumous actor nomination — for 1976's "Network."

Thompson, also nominated for her adaptation of Austen's 1911 novel, scored a best-actress nod for her portrait of older sister Elinor Dashwood in "Sense and Sensibility." Alphabeticians take note: Thompson's acting competition is all S's — Susan Sarandon as the consoling nun in "Dead Man Walking," Elizabeth Shue as a tough streetwalker in "Leaving Las Vegas," Sharon Stone as a mob moll

who marries Robert De Niro in "Casino," and Meryl Streep as the Italian farmwife who has a fling with Clint Eastwood in "The Bridges of Madison County."

For performing as a supporting actor, James Cromwell, the lovable

sheep farmer in "Babe," is up against Ed Harris as the grounded astronaut of "Apollo 13." Brad Pitt's loony animal-rights activist in "12 Monkeys," Tim Roth's despicable dandy in "Rob Roy" and Kevin Spacey's stoolie in "The Usual Suspects."

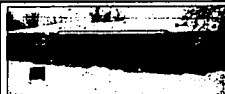
