# House OKs minimum-wage increase

WASHINGTON — Moderate Republicans joined with Democrats Thursday to win House approval of a 90-cents-per-hour increase in the minimum wage, after defeating a Republican effort to exempt small businesses from all minimum wage and overtime provisions of federal labor law.

It was a rare and hard-won triumph for both groups. For nearly two months they had resolutely sought to raise the wage for the first time in six years in the face of staunch opposition from most House GOP leaders and the dominant, conservative House Republicans, who said the move would cost jobs.

"The center of the Republican Party is back," Rep. Amo Houghton, R.N.Y., ex-

ulted after the vote.

Thursday's 281-to-144 vote passing the measure, which would raise the minimum wage to \$4.75 an hour from \$4.25 on July 1 and to \$5.15 a year later, marked the end of the first major partisan skirmish of this election year in the House.

The minimum wage faces an uncertain future in the Senate, which has been hung up for six weeks over Democratic

efforts to force a vote on the issue. Majority Whip Trent Lott (R-Miss.) said Thursday that Republicans have not yet decided what to do.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy (Mass.), leader of the Senate Democrats' effort, said if no deal is reached by the end of the Memorial Day recess on June 3 he will re-

# With employment high, no mad rush for jobs at Fred Meyer

TWIN FALLS — Plenty of would-be workers are applying to help staff the mega-store taking shape on the old Blue Lakes Mall site, but low unemployment in the Magic Valley has prevented a stampede.

Jobs at the Fred Meyer store under construction just haven't created the "mad rush" some other new employers have in the past, said Wayne Weiner of

the Job Service, which has been taking Fred Meyer applications since Monday.

Costco Wholesale, for example, opened in July 1993, after the Magic Valley experienced months of high unemployment that peaked at 7.7 percent. About 4,000 people applied for about 150 jobs, Job Service and Costco officials told *The Times-News*.

The valley's jobless rate last month was a near-record-low 4 percent. But Portland, Ore.-based Fred Meyer won't have any problem attracting

enough applicants to open its Twin Falls store, Weiner said.

On June 10, Fred Meyer will begin selecting about 300 full- and part-time employees. Human Resource Specialist Cindy Worwood said. This weekend, she'll begin advertising in Twin Falls for managers.

The company will import one or two dozen people for a core management team but hire the rest locally.

# Teens: Vending machines not major cigarette source

ATLANTA — A government survey found that only 2 percent of underage smokers get their cigarettes from vending machines, suggesting a ban on them would have little effect.

"What we need is a comprehensive approach that prevents access, reduces appeal and teaches kids the truth," said Michael Eriksen, director of the Office on Smoking and Health at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. "Anything short of that misses the boat."

The CDC survey of more than 1,000 smokers ages 13 to 17 showed they had little difficulty obtaining cigarettes. All states forbid the purchase of cigarettes by people under

18. The 1995 survey, released Thursday, showed 39 percent of youngsters usually bought their cigarettes at a store, 33 percent "borrowed" them, 4 percent stole them and 16 percent said they gave other people money to buy them.

President Clinton has proposed a ban on cigarette vending machines as a way to stop youngsters from smoking. Tom Lauria of the Tobacco Institute said the industry has started a program that instructs store clerks on how to check IDs and comply with state laws. The survey also showed that smoking continues to rise among high school students. The report said about 35 percent of high school students said they smoked cigarettes in 1995, compared with 31 percent in 1993 and 27 percent in 1991.

# Survey: Americans lack basic science knowledge

WASHINGTON — Less than half of American adults understand that the Earth orbits the sun yearly, according to a basic science survey. Despite flubbing such questions, there is enthusiasm for research — except in some fields such as genetic engineering and nuclear power that are viewed with suspicion.

Only about 25 percent of American adults got passing grades in a survey by the National Science Foundation of what people know about basic science and economics. Even fewer of those surveyed felt they were well-informed about the technical subjects.

The worst showing came when those surveyed were asked to define scientific terms. Only about 9 percent knew what a molecule was, and only 21 percent

could define DNA. But even more fundamental questions

In a test of environmental understanding, a third of Americans surveyed understood the effects of a thinning of the ozone layer, 14 percent could identify locations of ozone holes and only 5 percent could give a scientific explanation of acid rain.

Even money questions stumped most Americans. A 10-point quiz on economics showed that only 22 percent could correctly answer seven or more of the questions.

"Only 10 percent feel very well informed about science and technology, and studies show that only a small segment of the population has a strong grasp of basic scientific ideas," according to a report, released Thursday by the foundation.

The retail variety chain's new store will settle into a somewhat lower number of employees — about 240 — after its grand opening, said Rob Boley, Fred Meyer spokesman in Portland.

The percentage of workers employed full time will depend on shopping patterns in the store, he said.

The Twin Falls Fred Meyer is scheduled to open in late summer, Boley said. He wouldn't release the date, but said it should be before Labor Day.

That's later than Fred Meyer officials forecast in January, when they said they expected hiring to begin in March or April and the store to open by early summer.

The walls are up and the roof is on the new mega-store, and construction workers are paving, painting and flooring right now. Next week, crews will begin installing shelves and other fixtures, Boley said.

The 160,000 square-foot store will have grocery, bakery, pharmacy, apparel, shoe, jewelry, photo, electronics, toy, automotive, sporting goods, building material and home departments.

An outdoor sales section will offer gardening wares, and a playland will entertain kids while parents shop. Customers will sit to eat their purchases in the store's deli.

Each department will have its own distinctive decor and environment, Boley said. "We try to operate a lot of different specialty stores under one roof."

An additional 19,000 square feet will house tenants, including the Mandarin House restaurant, Third Dimension Salon and a Washington Mutual bank, he said. More than half of that space is still up for grabs.

Fred Meyer will open new stores in Meridian and a Portland suburb next month, Boley said.

### Mediator says it's time for FBI to inflict some pain on Freeman

CHICAGO — Colorado state Sen. Charles Duke, who sought unsuccessfully to mediate between the FBI and the Freeman group barricaded on a Montana ranch, says there is little hope of resolving the standoff through negotiations. He added that the government should cause some "pain" to the holdouts.

Outside Jordan, meanwhile, the FBI prepared Thursday to do just that, bringing in two portable generators as a possible prelude to cutting off the electricity at the fugitives' farm.

The move came a day after the latest effort at negotiating an end to the 60-day standoff failed.

There was no immediate sign of the armed Freeman who had been seen roaming the fields nearby on Tuesday and Wednesday.

U.S. Attorney Sherry Scheel Matteucci said no new negotiations with the Freeman were scheduled.

Duke, a respected figure in the so-called patriot movement, was the latest in a string of negotiators that included Montana state legislators and former Gen. Beret and Populist Party presidential candidate James "Bo" Gritz.

Duke, however, was the only one to succeed in bringing FBI negotiators to the table with the Freeman.

He spoke in a telephone interview after returning from Jordan, Mont., to a series of talks that began with promises last week and collapsed in failure Tuesday.

They broke down after the Freeman failed to deliver on promises to allow Duke and an FBI team interview all those on the ranch, and to release two young girls, Courtney, 10, and Jay-Lyn, 8, daughters of Gloria Ward, one of several women among about 20 people on the ranch. "I realized this is going nowhere," said Duke, who supports the contention that the federal government exceeds its constitutional powers. But now, he says, it is time for the FBI, which he lauded for its restraint, to use its powers to make the Freeman "feel some pain."

He compared the power structure of the anti-government group at the ranch to the feudal relationship between kings and barons in Medieval Europe. The Freeman are a "weak king/strong barons" combination, which does not bode well for resolution of the 60-day-old standoff, he said.

In Duke's feudal analogy, if the king is weak and the barons are all equally strong — or vice versa — there is stability: The king stays in

On a 10-part quiz testing scientific understanding, only 27 percent of the American adults surveyed could answer seven or more questions.

The national survey of 2,006 adults found that 72 percent believe science research is worthwhile. Only 13 percent took the opposite view.

Among college graduates, 90 percent thought the benefits of research outweighed the risks, while only 48 percent of those who did not complete high school felt that way.

The survey, however, found many Americans fearful of some aspects of science. Support for nuclear power was about evenly split, with 43 percent saying its benefits were greater than its risks, and 42 percent taking an opposite view.

sume efforts to add the wage proposal to every bill that comes to the floor.

Following the House vote, President Clinton called upon Senate Majority Leader Robert J. Dole (Kan.), the presumptive Republican presidential candidate, to bring the wage measure to a vote in the Senate before he leaves office in early June.

"That is the way to honor our values of work, family, opportunity and responsibility," Clinton said.

During the House debate, Democrats sought to paint Republicans as uncaring about the plight of low-wage Americans.

A majority of House Republicans opposed the minimum wage increase, which Rep. Martin Frost, D-Tex., head of his party's House campaign committee, called "a defining moment in this election."

House Majority Leader Richard K. Ramsey (Tex.) countered by charging that Democrats were pushing the minimum wage issue "just to appease labor unions in this election year." Organized labor has pledged a \$35 million campaign to bring Democrats back to power.

While public opinion polls show that a large majority of Americans favor raising the minimum wage, Republicans argued it would hurt workers by making them too expensive to hire. "The Democrat Party is to job creation what Dr. Keorikian is to health care. A job-killer cloaked in kindness," said House Majority Whip Tom DeLay, R-Tex.

# Backhoe arrives for heavy digging

MIAMI (AP) — Convinced that big chunks of a ValuJet plane are still buried in the Everglades muck, investigators are hoping heavy-duty dredging equipment will succeed where divers have failed.

At a staging area Thursday, workers began assembling a mobile, raised platform designed for use in a swamp. In a couple of days, they hope to bring a variety of heavy equipment to the muddy Everglades pit created by the impact of the DC-9.

"We do have some indication from radar that there may be some larger pieces down there," National Transportation Safety Board spokesman Pat Cariseo said Wednesday. "There may be an area of compacted metal there."

The construction equipment and about a dozen pieces of heavy machinery — each about half the size of a flatbed truck — arrived at a staging area Wednesday, a day after a dive into the muddy impact crater yielded little more than two pieces of fuselage no bigger than a table.

Only about 25 percent of the aircraft has been recovered and no single body has emerged intact. Investigators believe their best hope of finding the bulk of the wreckage is in the crater where the aircraft slammed into muck-covered Limestone May 11, killing all 110 people aboard.

Cariseo acknowledged that pieces of the plane could be damaged while being salvaged by the heavy equipment, but said workers would do their best to avoid that. "It's going to be a delicate operation, a delicate investigation," he said.

Dredging in the environmentally sensitive wetlands requires a permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Faculty Griffin, an agency spokeswoman, said the permit was expected today.

Recovery workers, meanwhile, resumed shoulder-to-shoulder searches of the swamp surrounding the main crater today, using rakes, gaff hooks and their hands to sort through the silt and sawgrass. At midday, the work was interrupted by the threat of lightning from a passing thunderstorm. Such threats are usually short-lived and the dreary work soon resumes.

Investigators would like to recover the missing cockpit voice recorder because it could reveal what the pilots knew and were trying to do before the plane crashed. But searchers said they had little hope of recovering the second of the so-called black boxes. The flight data recorder has been recovered.

None of the wreckage found Tuesday showed signs of soot or heat damage, Cariseo said. Investigators are trying to determine if a fire or explosion occurred near the front cargo hold of the aircraft where at least 119 oxygen generators were stored. The devices supply passengers' oxygen masks.

The pilots reported smoke in the cockpit and cabin before they lost contact with air traffic controllers, and some parts of the aircraft cockpit, oxygen canisters and front cabin that have been recovered show signs of soot or scorching.

In another development Wednesday, ValuJet said it has paid \$4.1 million in refunds to customers who were booked on canceled flights or were afraid to fly after the crash.

The Atlanta-based discount airline, which previously offered refunds only in special cases, changed its policy when delays and last-minute cancellations piled up.

### Possible explosion cause

Investigators think oxygen generators being transported on ValuJet Flight 592 may have played a role in the crash.

# U.S. restricts oxygen generators on airlines

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government Thursday banned passenger airlines from transporting oxygen generators like the ones suspected in the ValuJet crash in Florida.

The ban, effective at 4 a.m. MDT Friday, will be in force through the end of the year so investigators can review the safety of this equipment.

"The ban is a prudent step to ensure public safety while we review whether oxygen generators carried as cargo might pose an unacceptable safety risk to passenger airlines," said D. K. Sharma, head of the Transportation Department's Research and Special Programs Administration.

Sharma said the Federal Aviation Administration was advising airlines of the ban.

The ban covers shipment of chemical oxygen generators as cargo but not cylinders containing compressed

or chemical generators installed in planes for emergency use.

Current regulations allow airlines that are authorized to carry hazardous materials to carry the oxygen generators as cargo.

ValuJet was not authorized to carry them, but the airplane that crashed in the Florida Everglades on May 11 had 119 of the canisters in its cargo area.

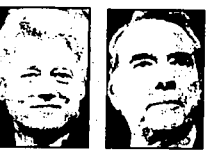
Under the new regulation, even airlines authorized to carry hazardous materials could not carry the oxygen generators, the official said.

The canisters, which contain a volatile mix of chemicals used to provide oxygen to passenger emergency masks, can create heat of up to 500 degrees when in use.

Canisters for in-flight oxygen service are not affected by the order, the official said.

# Clinton, Dole battle over abortion issue

MILWAUKEE (AP) — On a day of fiery political combat, President Clinton accused Sen. Bob Dole of trying to divide Americans by attacking him on the emotion-laden issue of abortion. "I am always a little skeptical when politicians piously proclaim their morality," Clinton declared Thursday.

Dole, the certain GOP presidential nominee, began the unusually sharp exchange of the first airwaves during Clinton's veto of a bill banning late-term abortions. In a speech in Philadelphia, Dole said Clinton's veto "pushed the limits of decency too far."

Firing back, Clinton angrily joined his finger in the air, accusing Dole of demanding to know what Dole would say to women with severely deformed fetuses who feel they have no choice but to undergo a so-called "partial-birth" abortion.

Clinton was in Milwaukee for talks with German Chancellor Helmut Kohl, but their joint news conference at midday was dominated by questions about domestic issues and election-year politics.

The two leaders later quenched their legendary appetites over lunch at Miss Katie's Diner. They feasted on barbecued chicken wings, short ribs, vegetable soup with meatballs, steak, lemon chicken, meatloaf, hash

browns, green beans and apple pie.

The meeting, brought Clinton's battleground political state two days after a visit by Dole. Republican Gov. Tommy Thompson, accompanying Clinton and Kohl, told reporters politics should be left behind for the day.

But when asked about Clinton's remark that Dole and Republicans were trying to divide the country, Thompson replied, "If you tell me that's what he said, he's dead wrong. If anybody has ever started class warfare in this country it has been the Democratic Party."

Kohl looked amused at the news conference as Clinton fielded election-related questions.

Clinton defended his decision to sign a bill outlawing homosexual marriages in this country that has outraged the gay community.

"The legal impact of the bill is sim-

ply to make clear that states can deny recognition of gay marriages that occurred in other states. Clinton said. "And if that's all it does, then I will sign it."

"Name me another president who has been so pilloried for standing up for the fact that we shouldn't discriminate against any group of Americans, including gay Americans," Clinton said.

He charged that Republicans were trying to "pit one group of Americans against another by bringing the same-sex marriage bill to a vote.

Clinton also said Congress and the White House were not that far apart on terms of a welfare bill despite "all this election-year rhetoric and posturing and gnashing of teeth."

He said Republicans should enact a welfare bill patterned after Wisconsin's plan and endorsed by

Dole, before he leaves the Senate next month. He promised to sign it but warned Republicans, "don't pollute it with a lot of poison pills."

Clinton bristled at the suggestion he was adopting conservative positions on welfare, cutting the gay tax and his stand toward Cuba because of the presidential campaign.

After raising the subject of abortion in his speech, Dole refused to answer reporters' questions about it on his campaign plane. Expressing irritation, Dole said, "If war were declared tonight and I went on a talk show, the first question would be about abortion," he said.

But Nelson Warfield, Dole's press secretary, told reporters, "President Clinton is a man of low hypocrisy. As he knows, the bill he vetoed offers an exception for the life of the mother."

# Appeals court snuffs out tobacco suit

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A federal appeals court Thursday snuffed out a class-action lawsuit brought against the tobacco industry on behalf of millions of smokers.

The ruling is a major victory for the tobacco industry in its quest to avoid billions of dollars in damages.

A three-judge panel of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals agreed with industry arguments that a class-action suit would be too unwieldy.

Meanwhile, R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. secretly conceded 23 years ago that rival Philip Morris deliberately enhanced nicotine levels in Marlboro cigarettes, boosting sales, according to documents filed in a lawsuit.

Scientists at Reynolds said in secret 1973 studies that Marlboros contained considerably higher "free" nicotine levels than Reynolds' brands, thus providing a greater nicotine "kick."

The Reynolds studies were cited in documents in a Minnesota lawsuit, one of eight filed by states seeking to recover Medicaid costs spent treating sick smokers.

**Porn filming disrupts neighborhood**

LOS-ANGELES (AP)—Children were making noise at a birthday party when they heard strange sounds coming over the fence next door.

"Apparently they heard all the grunting and the groaning and the sexual explicit sounds and everything," said vice squad Sgt. Steve Merrin. "The parents figured out what was going on and they yanked the kids away from it so the kids didn't see it."

A month later, officers called to the same San Fernando Valley house looked past the bushes through the chain-link fence and saw what has become an all-too-familiar scene for some neighbors in these sleepy suburbs of Los Angeles.

Once known for its suburban sprawl, the aerospace industry, major Hollywood studios and major earthquakes, the valley named for a saint has become the porn capital of the nation.

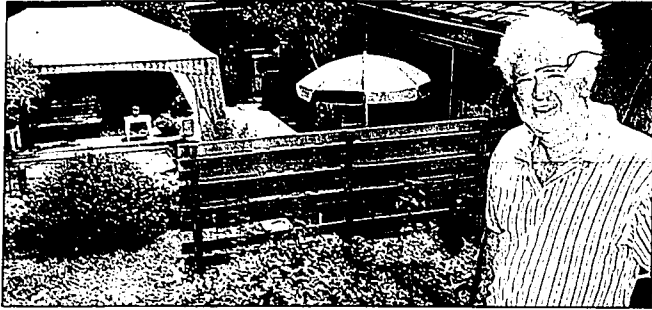
About 50 of the nation's 60 major makers of hard-core porn videos are located in the San Fernando Valley. The boom began in the early 1980s, with the advent of home video. Companies were drawn by the warm weather and the proximity to Hollywood.

Frank Zavala, a dentist who lives on the other side of the house where the sex was being filmed, said it didn't bother him to learn that such activities were taking place on shady Doloresa Street in Woodland Hills, 25 miles west of downtown Los Angeles.

"If they do it on private property and keep it quiet, that's their business," he said. "Is it morally right? I'll leave that to the priests and rabbis to decide."

months. But he has been able to bring only two cases for prosecution, including the arrests of the male and female actors at the Doloresa Street house last month.

"Well, you have to witness it," Merrin said. "You have to get

there, and they have to be filming." Filmmakers need only a permit to produce X-rated flicks at private homes.

Filming sex in public is illegal, but a backyard location is not necessarily considered public if it is out of sight.

"Are we really committing any kind of sin against society by shooting adult material in the back yards of other people's private homes?" said William Margold of

the Free Speech Coalition, the industry trade association.

Margold, who has worked in the adult industry for 25 years as a writer and actor, scoffed at the suggestion that neighbors commonly witness sex in the Valley.

"We pay for privacy. We pay to

be left alone. We pay to be out of sightlines, soundlines," he said. The industry may pay \$300 to \$1,000 a day to rent a home to film in, he said.

The Doloresa Street home was subtlet by two renters to a film crew last month.

**Survey: Consumers get bad info from regulators**

WASHINGTON (AP)—Consumers who turn to their state insurance regulators for help when shopping for health or automobile insurance may be getting bad information, a survey suggests.

A national study by the Center for Insurance Research indicated Thursday that state insurance regulators provided correct answers to basic questions about health insurance between 43 percent and 65 percent of the time.

For auto insurance, questions were answered correctly between 26 percent and 90 percent of the time, said the center, a Cambridge, Mass.-based group that represents consumers' interests.

Many state insurance regulators "are apparently dropping the ball either because of a lack of resources or because they do not make consumer services a priority," said Robert Schneider, an attorney for the Consumers Union office in Texas.

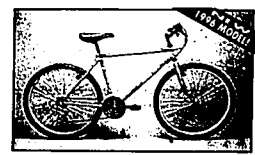

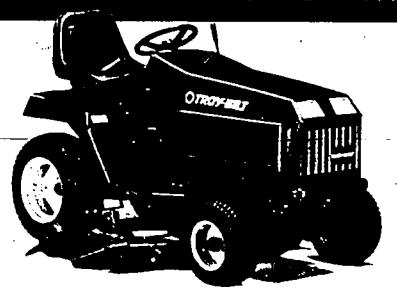

**Survivors blame overcrowding**

MIWANZA, Tanzania (AP) — The captain of an overcrowded ferry that sank in Lake Victoria said Thursday that he had no memory of the disaster that killed at least 549 people.

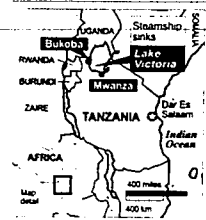
An official of the state company that owned and operated the ship called its capsizing "a complete mystery," but did not rule out allegations that the captain and crew members accepted bribes to overload the ferry.

Some of the 114 survivors said the overloaded ferry pitched from side to side before it turned over Tuesday, throwing passengers out of berths and onto wave-flooded decks.

It swiftly capsized in calm seas eight miles northwest of its destination, Mwanza.

Passengers trapped in an air pocket in the hull begged for help for hours.

"People were hammering on the



bulkheads," said Cleophas Magoge, a manager at the Tanzania Railway Corp., which owned the ship.

About 7 1/2 hours after the ship capsized, rescuers cut a hole in the hull with a torch. The air escaped, causing the ship to suddenly sink, Magoge said Wednesday.

Divers examined the ship

Thursday to determine how to retrieve the bodies of the hundreds of people, many of them students going home from boarding school, who went down with the ship in 90 feet of water.

The Tanzania Railway Corp. believed the 195-foot MV Bukoba was "light in terms of cargo but heavy on passengers," Rukia Shanti, its chief commercial officer, said today.

Overcrowding alone was not believed to have caused the accident, she said.

But she said the claims of bribery could not be discounted, nor could charges that many passengers had boarded without tickets.

"There must be a cause to the accident," Shanti said. "But it is a complete mystery."

The company will appoint a commission to investigate the accident, she said.

**Delay Bosnian vote, rights group urges**

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Conditions to hold free and fair elections across Bosnia by fall do not exist and the vote should be postponed, a leading human rights group said Thursday.

Holding a nationwide vote by mid-September, as foreseen in the Dayton peace accord, would cement the dominance of hard-liners who caused the war and seal Bosnia's division into ethnically based ministates, the International Helsinki Federation said.

But John Kornblum, the chief U.S. envoy for Bosnia, said Thursday that it was "very realistic" to hold elections by September.

"The Dayton agreement does not say we have to have a perfectly functioning democracy in place," Kornblum said in the Bosnian capital, Sarajevo. "In fact, the elections were the foundation for a functioning democracy."

He said the Bosnian government and other parties in Dayton had wanted swift elections, and he was confident that conditions for holding the vote "will in fact be achieved."

The human rights group offered its more negative assessment the same day Bosnian Croats and Muslims agreed to postpone local elections in the bitterly divided town of Mostar.

Colum Murphy, a spokesman for Carl Bildt, the representative overseeing civilian aspects of the peace agreement, said the Mostar voting now would take place sometime in June instead of May 31.

Mostar, 35 miles south of Sarajevo, was seriously damaged during a Muslim-Croat war for territories in central and southern Bosnia.

The Mostar announcement marked the first slippage in election timetables mandated by international accords, casting further questions over whether the Bosnia-wide elections can go ahead.

**North Korean pilot defects in MIG jet**

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — The North Korean pilot who flew his unarmed MIG-19 jet across the world's most heavily guarded border

Thursday threw his arms in the air and shouted "Hooray!" He was the first North Korean pilot to defect to South Korea since 1983.

Lee defected in the midst of an economic crisis in North Korea that threatens to degenerate into famine, according to the United Nations.

### Jerome voters shouldn't break up a winning team

Jerome County is blessed at the moment with an effective, energetic and well-balanced county commission. Voters in next week's GOP primary should avoid breaking up the team.

At a time when counties across Idaho are just beginning to think about experiments in alternate forms of organization, Jerome County has already plunged ahead and made a new arrangement work. Commissioner Roy Prescott draws a full-time salary for handling the county's day-to-day administration. Part-time Commissioners H.R. Weixel and John M. Toolson Jr. focus on political and policy-making duties.

The system seems to be working. So, though both part-timers face worthy challengers in Tuesday's primary, Jerome County voters would be wise to keep the incumbents.

Toolson, a retired Army officer and local business owner, is a sensible, assertive leader who makes a good counterweight to Prescott's enthusiasm.

He's also careful with a public dollar. He and his sister, state Rep. Maxine Bell, spearheaded legislation to reform Idaho's county indigent-health-care system. (Toolson says society has a responsibility to help the unfortunate, but he's less generous toward those who he thinks should be able to pay their own bills.)

When controversy arose over a decision to drug-test county employees, Toolson showed integrity by vol-

unteering to be tested, at his own expense.

Toolson's opponent, former planning and zoning administrator Glenn Elwell, has strengths as well. But since Toolson appears to be doing a good job, why change?

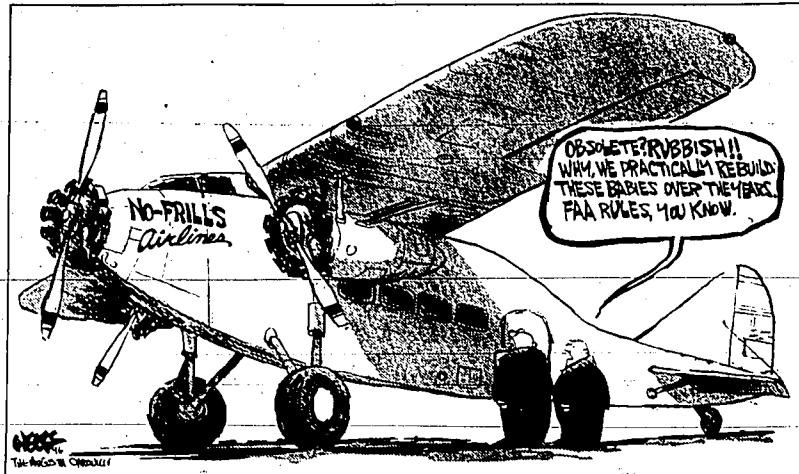
Much the same logic applies to the other race. Weixel, a free-lance writer and the wife of a minister, has been a commissioner only a few months, after being appointed to a vacancy by Gov. Phil Batt. But she is dynamic and popular, and her experience as a Defense Department budget officer is useful.

Weixel has two challengers, Mike Dahmer and V. Emmett Broliier. Though Dahmer probably lacks the experience and community standing for this job, Broliier's background as a business and civic leader makes him well-prepared for a commissioner's seat.

But again - why change?

(A disclaimer: Weixel has been a free-lance contributor to this newspaper for several years, and her recipe column and feature stories still appear regularly. But her informal association with the paper doesn't earn her any special favors. If she errs as commissioner, readers can be confident we'll say so.)

Jerome County is fortunate to have a surplus of qualified candidates in these two races. If voters want to make a change, they can do so without fear of disaster. In our view, however, the two incumbents are worth another go-round.



## Government regulation: You can't win

Here in Newt's America, we all know that government regulation is bad, bad, bad. If I had a nickel for every speech I've listened to by every public official talking about the evils of government regulation, I'd be richer than H. Ross.

We're hell-bent on downsizing government here in the Republican Revolution, where marketplace mysticism is the faith of the day. Deregulation, free-market fundamentalism, unleash capitalism, greed-is-good, cut taxes, cut spending, cut welfare and make the poor folks read Milton Friedman.

And then some plane in the deregulated airline industry crashes in the Everglades, and there's hell to pay because the Federal Aviation Administration didn't prevent the accident.

Listen to all those polls on Sunday morning indignantly demanding to know why the FAA didn't shut down ValuJet. Honey, if the FAA had, those same politicians would have been on television using it as a classic example of bad government regulation, interference in the free market, petty rules and burdensome bureaucracy killing the spirit of entrepreneurship. Here was this fresh, young company, taking on the giants of the industry, and the government shuts it down for not doing it some "over-crossing some." The FAA would have been cussed from hell to breakfast.

On what may be a different topic, I've got a nomination for Best Piece of Public Interest Reporting of 1996, and even though the year isn't half over, I bet this one wins a slew of prizes. It's Michael Hudson's piece in the May 20 issue of The Na-



tion called "Cashing in on Poverty." And which poverty pimps have been nailed this time? Which self-appointed spokesmen for the poor, welfare Cadillac drivers and double-dipping anti-poverty bureaucrats are we exposing now? Try Ford, Citibank, NationsBank, Bank of America, American Express, Western Union and Textron, for starters. You didn't really think that Wall Street would be left behind once they figured out there's money in poverty, did you?

Take every rip-off artist milking an anti-poverty program you ever heard of, add 'em all up and multiply by 10, and you won't come close to the sum that Wall Street is squeezing out of the poorest people in America. Hudson estimates \$200 billion to \$300 billion a year.

"No Credit? No Problem!" "Rent-to-own, only \$8.95 a week and you too can have the stereo of your dreams."

"No need to check cashed, but don't have a bank account? Come right in!"

Consumer financing - loans available at rates from 30 percent to 300 percent. Pawnshop chains like Cash America (325 outlets) with loan rates at 200 percent. "What an unholy collection of ruthless, vicious souls. The down-scale consumer-financing operations and pawnshops turn out to have corporate owners on Wall Street. In 1993, three-fifths of the Ford Motor Co.'s earnings came from its financial services holdings, and we're not talking just about the Ford Motor Credit Corp. Ever heard of Associates Corporation of

North America? First Family Financial Services?

"Storefront merchants who prey on the poor have always been around," Hudson writes. "But big companies are fueling the 'corporatization' and expansion of the poverty industry by pouring in growth capital and providing the sheen of brand-name respectability to transactions that Wall Street once viewed with distaste. They're using sophisticated marketing to lure in consumers."

Anyone who's ever lived at or near the poverty line knows that, as Mehiabell the Cat said, life is just one damn kitten after another. If the car breaks down, you can't pay the landlord. If the kid gets sick, they'll cut off your electricity. The phone company won't cut you any slack no matter how long you've been paying its bills on time, and the tax man can put you in jail. And there's not a bank in town that will loan you enough to get through the end of the month.

Who else can you go to except the friendly, smiling folks at Rip-Off Finance? Hudson's got some case histories that will make you weep - or vomit. But he's got some solutions as well. Tougher consumer laws and regulation is bad and is driving development banks, credit unions, branch banks in poor neighborhoods to make fair-rate loans.

Oh, I forgot. Here in Newt's America, we can't talk about regulation anymore, can we? Sorry, the government mustn't interfere with the sacred free market. Government regulation is bad and is driving businesses into bankruptcy (check those profit levels). If we could just get rid of government regulation, we'd all live happily ever after (300 percent interest rates).

### Beef industry not always wasteful

Darren Belin expressed his opinion that the beef industry consumes too many natural resources. He used some conversion numbers that, taken one at a time, may be true but in his letter are used with false logic and don't represent the true relationship of cattle and water.

His implication that "we are forced to refrain from filling swimming pools, washing cars and watering lawns... because cows use too much water" is ludicrous! On rangelands, the plants will evaporate the water into the atmosphere even if not utilized by cattle. Thus, unless water is over-abundant and runs off the watershed, cattle do not affect water availability to urban areas.

It takes about the same amount of water to grow forage for cattle as it does for lawns. Turf-obsessive homeowners use excessive water, use fossil fuel to cut the grass, then compost it or haul it to a landfill where microbial action produces greenhouse gases such as methane. Is this your idea of being environmentally friendly? A cow may drink from 20 to 30 gallons of water a day, often of poor quality such as in a pond or thermal stream that is not available for culinary use.

The feed conversion values he uses are slightly inflated and taken out of context. Beef producers could not afford to operate the way he implies. Most of the cattle in the Western states spend most of their lives eating grass or high fiber farm by-products or crop residue. The ruminant animal with its four-compartment stomach and microbial population is very efficient at using this sustainable, low-input feed that chickens can use little of and humans would starve to death on.

Federal lands, for the most part, are not being overgrazed. Deer and elk numbers have increased from the 1990s to the mid-1980s. The reasons some populations have crashed during the hard winters of the

1990s are (1) people have built houses in winter-range areas, and (2) the populations became too large and ate themselves out of the remaining habitat.

I agree with Darren that society shouldn't support waste of resources. I suggest he use drought-tolerant grass in his lawn and not over-irrigate, cut his grass with a scythe or manually propelled rotary mower blade, feed his cut grass to some calves that produce an edible high-quality protein human food, and support public swimming pools instead of private pools.

### Batt announces \$3.3 million for projects

**BOISE** - The city of Wendell is getting a state grant of \$500,000 for water system improvements.

Gov. Phil Batt announced the grant Thursday afternoon, part of \$3.3 million sent out by the state to help finance 13 projects.

The state earlier awarded \$4.2 million in grants through the Department of Commerce. The money comes from the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development. The Economic Advisory Council approved grant applications in March and sent recommendations to the governor.

The Wendell grant was the largest awarded Thursday. Other grants include:

- Fairfield, \$64,950, fire station improvements.
- Jerome County, \$116,916, emergency medical station.
- Rupert, \$50,000, additions to Senior center.

### Postal customers can now use credit cards for purchases

**TWIN FALLS** - Postal customers in Jerome, Ketchum, Rupert and Twin Falls now can use those magical words - "charge it."

In these post offices, customers can use major credit cards for most postal purchases such as stamps and Priority Mail. Payment by credit card is not accepted for trust accounts, bulk mailings, meter settings, money orders, passport fees and COD mail.

Debit cards are accepted for all services at retail counters except passport applications.

The credit and debit card program is being phased in at larger post offices across the country. By the end of 1997, customers will be able to use plastic at all post offices nationwide.

**JEROME** - Police Chief Jim Dahl said Tuesday that he has ruled out any connection between the Aug. 9 murder of 44-year-old Wilma Mobley of Jerome and two recent murders in Minidoka County.

The Hood-75, of Heyburn, was murdered April 23, and Wendy Hunter, 17, of Rupert, was murdered May 16. Both died from similar knife wounds, and investigators think the murders are connected.

The Mobley murder remains unsolved.

Four Rupert youths have been arrested in connection with the murders of Hood and Hunter. One teen, Brian Mack, 19, has been charged with first-degree murder in both deaths. Matthew Mines, 18, and Corey Hood, 21, are charged with the first degree murder of Wendy Hunter. Shannah Reeves, 19, is charged with being an accessory to Hunter's murder.

All trails and most roads are closed, said Ed Cannady, adding that even hikers are barred from being on closed trails.

High flows have altered the riverbed in some places and areas that usually are dry are now flowing with water.

# Residents alarmed; police step up patrols

**RUPERT** - People are scared. Inundated with calls from an apprehensive community, the Rupert Police announced Thursday it will step up patrols and surveillance activities because of three recent murders.

Most of the calls have been from elderly people who live alone. City Councilman Joel Rogers said.

"They are nervous about what has happened and what is being reported in the newspaper has gotten them more upset," Rogers said. "My personal feeling is that these aren't random murders and I'm confident in our police force. We are trying to respond to the needs of the citizens and that's why the press release went out today."

The murder of Wendy Hunter, 17, of Rupert, last Friday was the third murder in Minidoka County since April 10, when Blake Morgan was shot to death in his Rupert home at 207 Maple Street. Mae Hood, 75, of Heyburn, was murdered April 23.

Harold Catmull, chairman of the Minidoka County Senior Service Board, said seniors are concerned. A newsletter is going out to area senior citizens providing a list of recommendations on ways to lead a safer life and avoid becoming victims of crimes, he said.

Some of those recommendations include keeping a dog as a pet, locking doors and windows, not keeping large amounts of cash on hand, having Social Security checks deposited directly, and several other tips on how to avoid fraud.

"Contrary to what some people may believe, violent crimes occur least often among senior citizens with the exception of purse snatching," Catmull said. "I don't know if there are any of us who are hysterical about all of this, but we are concerned."

and we are being more careful. We know there are still dangerous people on the loose in our town."

Residents are encouraged to report any suspicious circumstances, or uncommon neighborhood activities and more policemen will be on the streets during evening and weekend hours, Rupert Police Chief Kendall Warr said in a news release.

"The City Police Department is encouraging residents to inform and rely upon local law enforcement in the investigations of any suspicious or unusual activities," according to the news release. "The department will attempt to promptly respond to all calls with available department and police reserve officers."

A gag order issued by 5th District Court judges Wednesday prohibits the police department from discussing specifics in the murder investigations of Hunter and Hood with the media. Investigators believe the crimes are linked.

County Prosecutor Gara Newman has not released any information linking Morgan's murder investigation to the others. A total of six people are being held in connection with the three murders.

Police will be available to answer questions regarding safety concerns, neighborhood watch, periodic patrols, or other matters involving the continued safety of city residents, according to the release. Police officers can be contacted at 434-2330, 436-9651, or for emergencies call 911.

Minidoka County Sheriff Paul Fries said he would like to be able to put more deputies on patrol also, but his department's resources are already spread thin.

"We would love to have more people out, but we could have twice as many deputies and still not be able to cover our entire county," Fries said.

# Letterhead threatens ICA tax status

**BOISE** - A letter written by Idaho Citizen Alliance founder Kelly Walton endorsing the primary opponent of Republican state Sen. John Anderson of Boise may have jeopardized the alliance's tax-exempt status.

But Walton, who signed the letter under the alliance letterhead, called the apparent violation of the Internal Revenue Code an honest mistake. He said the endorsement of Mark Stahl was intended to come from the alliance's political action committee, or PAC.

Attorney General Alan Lance said his office is looking into the legality of the letter under Idaho tax laws, and a spokesman for the Internal Revenue Service's Los Angeles office, which handles Idaho's tax exempt organizations, said the letter appears to violate the prohibition against partisan political activity by such organizations.

The alliance's political action committee just before midday Thursday finally filed the financial disclosure statement that was due by Tuesday evening because it had expanded its activities from issue campaigns to not only the Anderson-Stahl race but three other legislative races.

Under the federal tax exemption held by the alliance, it can engage in some activity on legislation or issues but is expressly prohibited from involvement in partisan political candidate campaigns.

Without the exemption, donations to the alliance would not be tax deductible. In the letter addressed to signers of the 1994 anti-gag initiative petition, Walton said he was giving Stahl his full endorsement over Anderson, who was appointed to the seat by Gov. Phil Batt when Rod

# Parents will have say in sports activities

**TWIN FALLS** - The Twin Falls School Board Thursday voted to establish a forum for parents to decide appropriate behavior for high school baseball coaches, parents and fans.

The decision follows complaints from a group of parents who claimed Twin Falls High School baseball coach Dan Creek was abusive to players.

School district officials released a report to the Twin Falls School Board Thursday saying they investigated the complaints, but found no specific improvements by Creek.

"Officials recommended the high school address the complaints because many parents didn't directly approach the school or coaches before taking their troubles to the School Board."

Though the school district encourages parental involvement, "a lot of this can happen before it gets to the board," said Kevin Farnsworth, director of personnel for the district before a packed audience Thursday night at the school administrative office.

The School Board agreed with their recommendation and remanded the decision-making to the high school.

Farnsworth, reacting from the report, noted problems with profanity on the

# Volunteer helps rural residents protect wells

**TWIN FALLS** - Charlie Lenkner has been drinking well water at his home south of Twin Falls for the past 23 years - but he's never been too sure what's in the water.

Like many rural residents, Lenkner has a few cows and other trappings of country life. There's a old manure pile not far from his well and his septic tank is "a" far away, either.

Lenkner, a veterinarian easing into retirement, also uses canal water to irrigate a few acres of pasture. The water sinks into the ground, presumably taking manure and farm chemicals with it.

He has often wondered, but has never known, whether he's fouling his own well.

"I want to know what's going on with my water," he said. "My energy to find out is bottled up and waiting."

Lenkner's questions are starting to get answers from Rebecca Benge, a Twin Falls-based Americorps volunteer who offers free "homestead assessments." The Americorps pro-

gram, created by President Clinton, is similar to America's VISTA program.

Benge, a cheery woman with a down-home manner, offers commonsense tips to minimize groundwater pollution, then tests tap water for nitrates. Another common test, for fecal coliform bacteria, costs \$11 - and Benge handles all the arrangements.

Her mission is to help people from fouling their own well.

"This is America, so you can't control what's going on with your neighbor's property, but you can control what's going on with your own property," she during a Thursday visit to Lenkner's home.

Benge arrived with a water-quality test kit and a description of nearby soils. She also brought easy-to-follow

# Batt talks with medical expert, judge to make Paradis decision

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Phil Batt on Thursday talked with one of the state's medical experts and the judge who ordered Donald Manuel Paradis executed as he continued piecing together the facts surrounding Paradis' claim that he has been condemned for a murder he did not commit.

He declined to say what he asked 1st District Judge Gary Haman about, but spokeswoman Amy Kleiner said the governor went over key medical testimony with Spokane pathologist George Lindholm, who was a major factor in swaying a majority of the parole board behind clemency.

The governor also met with three of the five members on the Commission on Pardons and Parole, which voted 3-2 last Friday to recommend that Paradis' death sentence be commuted to life in prison without parole for the 1980 murder of Kimberly Ann Palmer.

And Batt, the first governor faced with a clemency recommendation, indicated he was no longer sure he could reach a decision by the end of the week.

"I don't want to act until I'm satisfied," the governor said. "As soon as I can get all the information I can gather and have time for reflection, I will make a decision."

He meets with the other two parole board members Friday morning in what appears will be the final interviews before he begins to evaluate the case.

"I have not, at this point, made a decision," the governor said. Telephone calls to the governor's office from the public fell on Thursday after totalling more than 100 a day earlier. The staff said it fielded just over 50 with clemency supporters slightly outnumbering opponents. Wednesday's calls were about evenly divided, and the several dozen during the early part of the week ran against clemency.

Batt said he tried to speak with U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge, whose April 1 rejection of Paradis' eleventh-hour appeal triggered the clemency petition. But Lodge declined to discuss the case because it is under his jurisdiction until the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals refuses to return it to him for further action.

In his decision last month, Lodge said that if there is new evidence showing Paradis' innocence, as the former motorcycle gang member claims, the executive clemency proceeding is the place for it to be considered.

Prosecutors, who made their pitch for the governor to reject clemency on Tuesday, maintain everything

Paradis is raising now has been reviewed in one way or another during his 1991 trial and the subsequent string of appellate reviews over the past 15 years.

But Paradis, 47, whose attorneys urged the governor on Wednesday to commute the death sentence, claims the key medical and forensic evidence was not properly brought forward at his trial because of an incompetent defense attorney. It was that evidence that convinced the commission majority that Palmer was not killed near Post Falls as prosecutors argued.

Paradis claims Palmer, 19, was actually killed at his rented Spokane house while he was gone and that his only crime was helping to dump the body in a rural area near Post Falls so he would not have to explain it to police. Thomas Henry Gibson, 44, who is also on Death Row for the Palmer murder, and four others have backed up that story. Gibson went so far as to say he might have fatally struck Palmer in Spokane.

Parole commission member Del Ray Holm of Roberts, one of the three commissioners favoring clemency, and the two clemency opponents, Russell Newcomb and Jay Nielsen, both of Twin Falls, talked individually with the governor late Thursday.

# Officials say gold mine trailings pond not overflowing

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The snowpack and rain are snarling efforts to expand a mine-waste pond at the Hecla Grouse Creek gold mine upstream from the Salmon River, but officials reject rumors it is overflowing.

The mine is hopeful 100 people laid off during the project will be back on the job in July.

A large snowpack in the mountains coupled with a cold, wet spring has muddied the site, making it hard for crews to lay the plastic liner for the tailings pond.

Concerns the waste pond is filling too fast means some runoff is being diverted around the tailings pond and washed through special filters before being sent downstream into Jordan Creek, a tributary to the Salmon.

But mine officials insist rumors the tailings impoundment with mercury- and cyanide-laden water is overflowing are completely unfounded. The U.S. Forest Service and state Division of Environmental Quality agree.

"The tailings pond is not being discharged," said Dan Anderson, the mine's environmental coordinator.

Environmental Quality's Chris Meehan says the filter system is being used because the water is

coming off the mountain faster than crews expected, but there is no environmental disaster looming.

"We're not concerned they're going to have a catastrophic failure, but things haven't developed the way they've wanted," he said. "They've got too much water up there."

Yanklee Fork District Ranger Greg Johnson said the snowpack above the mine is about 140 percent of normal.

In April, Hecla announced plans to shut down the mine and lay off about half its crew of 200 to slow the flow of waste rock and water into the tailings pond while it was being expanded.

Custer County Commissioner Ted Strickler said the layoffs have not hit the Challis economy hard, but some workers are looking to move on. Hecla drastically overestimated the amount of gold at the mine, and will not guarantee it will stay open beyond this year. Grouse Creek, which began operating in 1994, was expected to have a 10-year life.

Hecla spokesperson Vicki Velkamp said she is not aware of any morale problems at the mine.

"My sense from the people I've talked to down there is that some of the people are enjoying their time off because they know they'll be coming back," she said.



# Oregon anti-gay-rights activist receives blows at court, polls

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — "It's not been my best week," Lon Mabon says.

That seemed to be a bit of an understatement by the head of the Oregon Citizens Alliance after twin blows from the U.S. Supreme Court and Republican voters.

As volunteers took down posters and cleaned out Mabon's campaign office in Brooks on Wednesday, the leader of Oregon's anti-gay-rights movement said he makes no apologies for his embarrassingly bad showing in Tuesday's U.S. Senate primary.

"We put the moral issues on the front burner of political discussion during this Senate race," he said. That may be, but the crushing defeat Mabon received at the hands of Gordon Smith — coupled with the Supreme Court's decision that could scuttle Mabon's latest anti-gay-rights initiative — raised questions about the continued political survival of Mabon's Oregon Citizens Alliance.

In fact, Mabon said Wednesday that because of the Supreme Court's ruling, the OCA might drop signature-collecting efforts for its latest anti-gay-rights measure.

Still, Mabon said he remains confident that the OCA will win a spot on the ballot for another initiative — one to ban most late-term abortions.

Portland pollster Tim Hibbits said Wednesday he thinks it would be premature for anyone to pronounce the OCA dead at this point. "But I don't think they can keep going through what they have been going through and continue to be a major factor in Oregon politics," Hibbits said.

The week started off badly for the OCA Monday when the state's highest court threw out Colorado's anti-gay-rights law and cast doubt on a similar measure that the OCA was hoping to put on Oregon's November ballot.

Then, in Tuesday's GOP primary, Mabon drew only 8 percent of the vote to 79 percent for Smith. Those developments came in the wake of reports that the OCA has been suffering from membership declines and money problems. The group counts 2,500 households as members, down from 3,500 households a few years ago.


Mabon insisted that the OCA will be around for years to come to

press its fight against the "radical homosexual agenda."

"We will continue to be 82nd Airborne to the gay family movement," Mabon said. "They are the ones who got dropped behind enemy lines and take all of the casualties."

A leading gay-rights activist, Julie Davis, said that while the OCA has suffered some tough blows this week, gays and lesbians aren't writing off Mabon and his group.

"He's a tough guy," said Davis, who is executive director of Basic Rights of Oregon. "He's not going to go away. He is committed to his moral convictions. That's what drives him to continue, to try to promote these ideas."





# Craig's forest bill may fail

WASHINGTON - With the legislative calendar running down and Democratic opposition still strong, a GOP bill purportedly aimed at preventing forest fires through logging may go down in flames this year.

The latest setback came Wednesday when scheduling problems forced the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee to cancel debate on the bill. This becomes the fourth postponement.

Also Wednesday, a Democratic staffer who has participated in negotiations with Republicans for weeks declared "there is not a lot of consensus."

Thursday, protesters in Boise picketed the campaign headquarters of the sponsor Sen. Larry Craig, claiming his bill will cause long-term damage to the nation's forests, according to the Associated Press.

But Bryan Wilkes, spokesman for Craig, R-Idaho, said the senator believes an agreement can be reached this year and that the president will sign it. Craig said in an interview earlier this month

that he would introduce it again next year if it fails.

"We can't say for sure that we'll get a solid bipartisan bill, but Sen. Craig has compromised and will continue to compromise," Wilkes said. "We wouldn't be negotiating if we didn't think we could get results."

The bill would require federal land managers to label regions with large areas of dead or sick trees as "emergent" or "high risk" for fires and expedite logging there to clear out fuel for wildfires. Critics say the forest health crisis is exaggerated and the expedited procedures would curtail some environmental review and public appeal.

No one is saying exactly what the sticking points are in the discussions now, but Democrats have said they want included in the bill repeal of the salvage timber rider that allows logging of healthy old growth trees, a ban

on logging in all roadless areas, and removal of the so-called 318 sales that put up for sale areas previously off-limits due to environmental concerns.

Participating in discussions include staffers for Democratic Sens. Max Baucus of Montana, Patty Murray of Washington, Tom Daschle of South Dakota, Bill Bradley of New Jersey and Patrick Leahy of Vermont.

After weeks of delay, Republicans had decided to proceed with committee debate on the bill without Democrats on board, but they were preempted by their own leadership.

The bill will not have its day, at least not Wednesday as planned, because the Senate leadership scheduled a full day of votes on the 1997 budget bills and has cancelled several committee meetings.

June 12 is the next available day for the bill to be considered, but then other committees, the full Senate and the House side must take it up. Congress plans to adjourn in early October and the lawmakers plan several breaks including all of August when members will go home to campaign.

# Twin Falls County vehicle accidents decline in 1995

TWIN FALLS - The number of accidents in Twin Falls County decreased by 312 between 1994 and 1995, according to a new state report. Twin Falls County also had the lowest accident rate of all counties with populations more than 50,000.

The report, released by the Office of Highway Safety of the Idaho Transportation Department, also showed that travel on Idaho highways increased faster than the number of fatalities last year.

The state recorded 262 highway fatalities in 1995, the report said Thursday, up 8.7 percent from the 1992-94 average. During the same period, vehicle travel went up 9.6 percent.

Put a different way, the report

said Idaho had 3.3 traffic fatalities per 100 million annual vehicle miles traveled in 1995 and 10 years later the rate had fallen to 2.1. Both rates were higher than the national average.

The report did not reflect the fact that starting in May, the Idaho Transportation Board authorized increases in speed limits on many highways. Insurance company lobbyists claim that will increase accident and fatality rates.

Other findings from the report: Five out of every six fatal accidents occurred on rural highways. The report noted that's because most rural highways have higher speed limits than city streets.

"Crashes at higher impact speeds have a greater probability of resulting in a fatality," the report said. Idaho had 814,005 licensed

drivers in 1995, up less than 1 percent, but had 1,210,406 registered vehicles, up 2.8 percent from the year before.

Traffic accidents cost \$395.5 million last year, including \$131 million at \$500,000 per accident for the 262 fatalities.

Ada County had more than one-fourth of the state's traffic accidents last year, 4,513 out of 21,135, but only 26 fatal accidents.

Among the state's cities over 2,000 population, Post Falls had the state's highest accident rate per 1,000 population, 12.7, followed by Garden City, 12.1 and Coeur d'Alene, 11.1. Bonners Ferry had the lowest rate, zero accidents in 1995. Ammon had a rate of 0.5 and Emmett and Weiser both had rates of 1.3 accidents per 1,000 population.

# Feds ink deal with counties group

BRECKENRIDGE, Colo. (AP) - An agreement signed by the heads of two federal agencies and the National Association of Counties is intended to foster more cooperation in the management of public lands.

The goal is to strengthen the collaborative efforts of our agencies and local governments in planning and policy making for public lands," said Mike Dombek, acting director of the U.S. Bureau

of Land Management. Dombek and U.S. Forest Service chief Jack Ward Thomas signed the agreement with the National Association of Counties on Thursday.

The memorandum of understanding calls on the three organizations to explore possible joint training, education programs, cooperation in land-use planning and managing access to public lands. Thomas said the agreement

builds on past cooperative work with the counties' association.

The relationship between the federal agencies and some local governments with public land in their borders has been tense in recent years because of disputes over federal regulations seen as harmful to the local economy. Adherents of the so-called "county movement" argue the U.S. Constitution gives them the right to manage the land as they see fit.

Continued from B1 on fact sheets covering a variety of "typical" scenarios - including storage of manure, sludge, pesticides, fertilizers and petroleum products. Other worksheets help homeowners assess and improve the condition of their septic systems and drinking water wells.

"We can tailor this for just about any rural homeowner," she said, "and it runs the gamut for people

who have just about everything." Information about a particular home's drinking-water system is strictly confidential, Bengé said, adding that completed worksheets stay with the homeowner.

For his part, Lenaker said he welcomes "the chance to gain information without any penalty." At Bengé's request, he dug out the driller's report for his 240-foot-deep well. The log details depths at which

the drill encountered different soils, which is useful when evaluating risks to underground drinking water supplies. Records of septic system maintenance and the results of previous water-quality tests also provide useful information.

Safe drinking water is too important for people to take for granted, Bengé said, "but the majority of people don't even realize there could be a problem."

Some of Bengé's suggestions are easy to accomplish. For starters, she recommends running water for a couple of minutes before taking a drink in the morning - to flush out water that's been standing in the pipes. She also recommends removing the aerator - or screen - on kitchen and bathroom faucets every month or so, then cleaning the screens by soaking them in bleach for a few minutes.

Other suggestions involve more work. In many cases, older wells have ineffective seals and the wells themselves are located in pits that are vulnerable to contamination.

"Ideally, you should have your water tested once a year," Bengé said. "It only costs \$11, and it's important for the health of older people and young children in your home."

School officials also warned coaches never to allow a player to leave a bus unless it's an emergency, the report said.

Board members Vera Redman and David Sass said they were upset to learn that profanity was common in sports.

"I think it is a poor excuse to say (profanity) goes with sports," Redman said.

Sass added that parents and fans should be held accountable for their language.

"It's hard for the coach to abide by such a rule when the crowd's reaction is often from parents and fans," Sass said.

One of the parents who complained about Creek, Arlene Hansen, said she wouldn't have approached the School Board if her complaints "hadn't been taken seri-

ously" by high school officials. After the meeting, Twin Falls High School Principal Carl Snow said during an interview with The Times-News that Creek and other coaches were given a first-time warning, and no disciplinary action was taken against them.

Creek, who attended the meeting with Spow, said he was glad to have the complaints resolved. "Everybody has their own opinion, and they must have it for a reason," Creek said. "I am sorry it has all happened."

But he disputed the idea that foul language on the field was pervasive. "I can't recall a whole lot of profanity," he said.

Walton specifically cited the incumbent's support of the 4-cent-a-gallon gasoline tax increase in March and claimed Anderson's opposition to the revised anti-gay-rights initiative being circulated now shows he supports teaching in schools that homosexuality is normal and healthy.

"Mr. Anderson clearly needs a retirement party," the letter says. "Mark Stahl deserves your vote!"

Anderson has complained that the letter runs counter to his response to the alliance candidate survey in which he opposed teaching that homosexuality is healthy and normal.

Walton said the endorsement was made under the auspices of the Idaho Citizens Alliance PAC and it was an error that the PAC was left off the letterhead.

"It was an honest mistake," he said. "We have no reason to hide the fact that we are endorsing through our PAC."

The alliance as well as other tax-exempt organizations have skirted the prohibition against involvement in candidate races with their surveys of candidate stands on the issues important to them.

# Mini-Cassia gun interest rises

RUPERT - Local gun dealers say that more people have been considering buying guns for self protection within the past couple weeks.

The sales are being attributed to the fear that has spread because of three recent murders in Rupert and Heyburn.

"They are buying handguns, because they are nervous," said John Cox, owner of the Rupert Trading Post.

Gun sales at Cox's store have risen by 50 percent within the last two weeks, he estimates. Typically, he sells about 25 handguns a week, he said. Lately he has been selling between 40 to 50.

The murder of Wendy Hunter, 17, of Rupert, last Friday was the third murder in Minidoka County since April 10, when Blake Morgan

was shot to death in his Rupert home at 207 Maple Street. Mae Hood, 75, of Heyburn, was murdered April 23. Six people are in custody in connection with the three murders.

Women tend to opt for the .22-caliber semi-automatic handgun, and some folks are buying shotguns for self-defense, he said. For customers who are nervous about buying a gun, Cox suggests pepper spray. He is almost sold out.

"The attitude of these people that are coming in, they are not panicked. They are just concerned. They are very disgusted by the murders in this little town," Cox said.

Not all gun dealers in the Mini-Cassia area say they have seen an increase in sales. The Reloading Center in Burley and Tom's Marina and some pawn shops report that it's been business as usual.

More people have been pricing handguns at Pawn & Consignment on state Highway 24 near Rupert within the past week, clerk Jed Dansie said. They haven't sold many, but a handful of people each day have been coming in and looking, he said.

Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said people who want to buy a gun for self-defense should first decide whether or not they actually could shoot someone. Otherwise, their intentions could backfire, he said.

"If they feel like they have the courage or determination to shoot somebody, then that's not a bad idea," Crystal said.

But if a person buys a gun with the intent to use it around and only scare off an attacker, chances are the assailant will wrestle it away from them and use it against them, he said.

**County may file lien on former game farm**

LAVA HOT SPRINGS (AP) — Grass is growing across a pastoral hilltop, where the dilapidated Ligertown game farm once stood, while Bannock County may file a lien against its owners.

"From the standpoint of the community and county, it's a vast improvement," County Commissioner Tom Katsilometes said.

Lava residents last fall were under siege as 19 African lions were shot following an escape from Ligertown. One was shot near the elementary school.

Last month, county crews bulldozed and burned a mobile home surrounded by a complex of cages for lions, tigers and wolf hybrids that stood on about two acres. The cleanup took several days. Tons of debris were hauled to the county landfill,

and grass was planted. Still, a few chicken wings, which Ligertown operators fed to their animals, are scattered on part of the property.

"More important than a visual improvement, it's a mental improvement for people living in the area," Katsilometes said.

If former Ligertown operators Robert Fieber and Dotti Martin fail to pay for the cleanup, the county will file a lien on the property, Katsilometes said.

"It could be a valuable piece of property some day," he said.

Fieber and Martin are living near McCammon. They have appealed their conviction on 11 misdemeanors including animal cruelty and zoning violations.

The couple served 11 days in jail after being sentenced last month and are on probation for 7 1/2 years.

**Batt urges Clinton to OK waivers for welfare change**

BOISE (AP) — If President Clinton is serious about welfare reform, he should approve waivers requested by Idaho and other states to allow different ways of handling welfare, Gov. Phil Batt says.

In a letter to the president, released Thursday, Batt said the Governor's Welfare Reform Advisory Council recommended 44 changes. Only eight were addressed by the Idaho Legislature. Of the remainder, all but 12 require action by the federal government.

"As a result, my administration is actively working on drafting over 60 waivers," Batt told the president.

He said in the last presidential campaign, Clinton promised to "end welfare as we know it," but has vetoed welfare reform legislation.

Batt said in an appearance before the National Governors'

Association, the president promised to sign waivers within 30 days, yet several governors have had their waivers rejected or significantly altered.

The governor said he was pleased to learn President Clinton supported Gov. Tommy Thompson's efforts to reform welfare in Wisconsin.

"Despite your actions, I implore you to end welfare as we know it by approving waivers aimed at true reform, such as Governor Thompson's and mine," the governor said.

"The wisdom of what is best for Idaho does not reside within the Beltway, it resides in Idaho," Batt said.

PROVO, Utah (AP) — Bail hearings for two Orem men accused of administering a fatal dose of heroin to a 17-year-old girl have been rescheduled to next month.

Monte White and Benjamin Jensen, both 19, are charged with first-degree murder and drug distribution charges, and are being

held in the Utah County Jail on a \$250,000 bond.

The men appeared Wednesday before 4th District Court Judge Lynn W. Davis.

White and Jensen have admitted administering three heroin injections to Natalie Farrer, but denied intent to harm her.

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — Two International Olympic Committee members toured Snowbasin and pronounced the proposed land swap there a good idea, but they didn't talk to any of the residents organizing to oppose the land trade.

Bonnie Cookson of Save Our Snowbasin, made up of Ogden Valley and Ogden Canyon residents, said she would have liked the opportunity to speak with the IOC officials. "The Olympic committee will be here for two weeks (in 2002) and then they'll leave," Cookson said. "We live here. This is our home. We don't get to have any input."

"I love the deer, the moose, the porcupines and the wildflowers," Cookson said. "I hate to see it destroyed."

**Allegations fly following double murder**

LEWISTON (AP) — The son of a couple gunned down at a Lewiston auto repair shop has filed a wrongful death lawsuit against convicted double murderer Ken Arrasmith.

Arrasmith, convicted in the deaths of Ronald and Luella Bingham, calls 17-year-old Joshua Bingham's claim "ludicrous."

"Anybody can sue anybody for anything," he said from the state prison near Boise, where he is serving a life sentence. He shot the Clarkston, Wash., couple, claiming they had sexually abused his teen-aged daughter.

Arrasmith also reiterated his intention to file a civil lawsuit against sheriff's offices in Asotin County, Wash., and Nez Perce County, Idaho, as well as Nez Perce County Prosecutor Denise Rosen.

He said Asotin County did not protect his daughter and sending him out to investigate her rape. He also is considering a suit against Rilla Smith, mother of Luella Bingham, whom he accused of allowing Cynthia Arrasmith's molestation.

The wrongful death suit was filed in 1st

District Court by Coeur d'Alene attorney Harvey Richman on behalf of Joshua Bingham.

It said he has suffered from the loss of his parents and asks for compensation exceeding \$10,000, doubling the award pursuant to Idaho law, and punitive damages.

"It's pathetic when a husband and wife team can rape and torture," Arrasmith said, "and then the family can sue for wrongful death."

Arrasmith said he has tried to get a transfer to the prison at Orofino, but was told he has "too much sympathetic support in that area."

**TWIN FALLS** — It's that time of year again, when the city turns up the fun for Western Days.

About 20,000 people are expected to take part in events in and around City Park on May 31, June 2, and this being an election year, a fair number of them will be in the parade.

"We had more than 100 entries signed up as of (Thursday) morning," said Sharon Bryant, one of the organizers of the 14th annual Western Days celebration. "This year, it looks like it's going to include a lot of floats, too. In past years, we've had a lot of commercial entries."

The parade will start at noon on Saturday, June 1, on the campus of the College of Southern Idaho, travel east on Falls Avenue to Blue Lakes Boulevard North, south of Blue Lakes to Shoshone Street, and south on Shoshone to Fifth Avenue West.

The entertainment highlight is the Sunday afternoon jamboree at the City Park bandshell, this year featuring The Girls, a new country-bluegrass band from Fresno, Calif., made of sisters and their mom.

Linda Schoepf, vice-chairman and jamboree chairman for Western Days, is very excited about this group. "They look and sound like a lot of fun... Their costumes and stage show is very festive and entertaining," she said.

Back in 1980, "Mom" Marcia started her three daughters Christel, teen 8, and twins Carol and Kim, then 7, singing in talent shows and contests. They often played first and second not only in their age groups but also in the adult categories.

The Girls have unique vocal harmonies, which

makes their country music very fresh. Their "sound" got the group a commercial for the Country Music Hall of Fame, shown on the USA Showtime, HBO and Cinemax channels.

Marcia isn't just a stage mom, she's part of the vocals and plays bass guitar. Christel plays fiddle and mandolin, Carol performs with the banjo and dobro, while Kim is lead and rhythm guitar. All the girls contribute vocally as well.

The Girls travel around the country to fairs, rodeos, promotions — anywhere a family-oriented variety show is needed.

## Sun Valley Center suspends its summer music festival

**KETCHUM** — If you see any big-name musicians here this summer, they'll either be on their way to The Mint or to a condo.

The Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities has canceled its 1996 Sun Valley Music Festival — "postponed" is the official word — because it can't find a place to hold the concerts.

"The Sun Valley Company will no longer make their properties available to us," said Kerry Samudio, assistant to Executive Director Julie Gallagher. "They want to fire them up for conven-

tions and for use by their guests." That means that the company's Trail Creek Cabin, where entertainers ranging from Kathy Mattea to Jimmy Cliff have performed in recent summers, won't echo with the sound of music this year.

"We're looking for two to four acres of land that can be planted with grass and water has access to electricity," Samudio said Wednesday. "With an additional two to four acres for parking that's compatible for zoning within city limits or within Blaine County."

The center will need to find them soon. Samudio said. Big-name acts require nine to 12 months lead time. "There's certainly more competition now

in this area for entertainment since The Mint (Bruce Willis' bar and restaurant in Hailey) opened (last July)," Samudio said. "But the problem for us is a venue."

The festival — typically three or four events in July and August — included the only large concerts held in the Wood River Valley, attracting up to 2,500 to Trail Creek Cabin and as many as 3,500 to the Wood River High School football field.

"But our attendance was down a little last summer," Samudio said.

Samudio said the center hopes a new site for the festival might also be big enough to accommodate the Sun Valley Arts and Crafts Festival, the Sun Valley Wine Action

and the Annual Children's Festival, all events that in the past have used Sun Valley Company properties.

"The venue could also be available to other local non-profit groups for fund-raising activities, programs and events," Gallagher wrote to Sun Valley Center patrons in a recent memo.

Samudio said the center's management has looked at several potential sites, but hasn't found one yet.

"We hope we will soon," she said. The center, which sponsors a wide range of educational and visual and performing arts events, is funded by subscriptions from private donors.

# Royal Lipizzaner Stallions to perform Fossil

FILER — See the white stallions. While you still can.

"This breed has suffered greatly during the civil war in Yugoslavia," said Marti Van Hoose, spokeswoman for Entertainment Specialist Ltd. Inc., a Florida company that will bring the Royal Lipizzaner Stallions to the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds next Thursday night. "Some 118 are feared lost, and a large number of Lipizzaner deaths seriously threatens the future of the breed."

The Lipizzans, bred for four centuries in Austria and its former imperial domains, have been in harm's way before. It took a cavalry rescue — literally — by American forces to save 200 mares and foals from the middle of a battle between the Soviets and the Germans in the final

days of World War II. "Hundreds of valuable horses, including the already rare Lipizzans, have been killed in the conflict between Serbians, Croats and Muslims," Van Hoose said. "The famed Lipizzaner Favori Trompeta XXI will be killed in Lipik, Croatia, early in 1992 and was buried in a mass grave with 13 other Lipizzans. Some of them were stabbed and others shot."

That's because the former Yu-

goslavian Republic of Croatia — and especially the area around the eastern city of Vukovar, which was destroyed early in the fighting between the Serbs and Croats — was horse country. The Austrians, who dominated Croatia for 400 years before World War I, set up horse farms in northern Italy and throughout Croatia, and the white stallions — originally bred as cavalry mounts — thrived there.

But no more. "The large number of Lipizzaner deaths seriously threatens the future of the breed, as lack of stud variety may produce inbreeding and the eventual demise of the breed," Van Hoose said.

That's because the Lipizzaners are a select group of horses — no more than a few thousand worldwide. With such a small gene pool, breeding is already problematic.

"This merciless ethnic war has no regard for the Lipizzans and

contempt for the ravage that it imposes," Van Hoose said. "Horses whose blood lines can be traced for over four centuries are forever lost to the world."

The two dozen Lipizzans in the Royal Lipizzan Stallion Show are thriving, though. Bred in America from stock imported from Austria, they trained in classical dressage.

Dressage is the art of perfecting a horse's natural gait — the perfect walk, the precise trot, the even canter. The horse and rider must work together as one unit, creating an enjoyable exercise.

"One can never, through violence, cause the horse to perfect the manner in which it expresses its skill," said Col. Alois Podhajsky, who directed Vienna's Spanish Riding School before and during World War II. "But only by delicate coaxing and subtle demanding, between much praise and little punishment."

Although food will be available all day from park vendors, a fish dinner will be served from 4 to 8 p.m. that includes fried or broiled trout and catfish with all the trimmings. Prices are \$5 for adults and \$3 for children under age 12.

"This is probably the biggest Fossil Days ever," Prince said.

# Writing is no mystery to Mary Higgins Clark

A pair of dines. Snake eyes. That's the term suspense author Mary Higgins Clark uses when an author tops both the hardcover and paperback bestseller lists.

And Clark pulled it off this month, thanks to "Moonlight Becomes You" (the hardcover) and "Let Me Call You Sweetheart" (the paperback). Clark has become a reliable brand name for her readers — on the jacket of "Moonlight Becomes You," the name of the author is trumped in type three times as large as the book's title.

"People just enjoy the stories," Clark said, explaining a string of bestsellers that goes back to "Where Are the Children?" in 1975.

Clark writes about nice people; people you'd like to know. They have interesting jobs, they take you to places you'd like to visit.

"But most of all, I think it's the storytelling. Isaac Bashevis Singer said all writers should first think of themselves as storytellers. You want to make it fun to turn the pages."

In "Moonlight Becomes You" (Simon & Schuster, \$24), Clark's "place you'd like to visit" is none other than Newport, R.I.

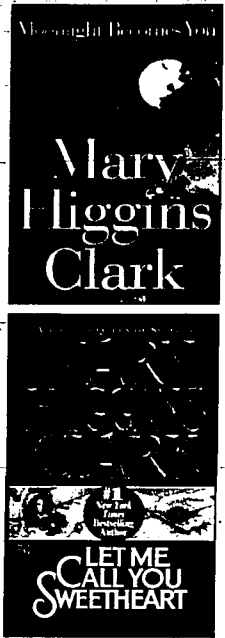
The novel's heroine is photographer Maggie Holloway, who runs into her long-lost stepmother Nuala at a party, and accepts an invitation to visit Nuala in her Newport home. But when she arrives, Nuala has been savagely murdered.

Fretty soon, Holloway becomes enmeshed in a series of mysterious goings-on at a luxurious mansion-turned-retirement home. There's a shifty cast of characters that includes a crooked lawyer, a nosy nurse, an incompetent doctor and an eccentric obsessed with funeral rituals.

"I think Newport is a wonderful setting for a book," Clark said. "I always try to pick a setting that people will want to read about, and Newport has all those wonderful mansions. And if one of those mansions was an upscale residence (for the elderly), and something was going wrong..."

Clark said she had visited Newport before, because her sons-in-law have a place there. When she decided to set a book there, she said, she drove around "with a special eye" and did some research on Newport's past.

Clark was born and raised in New

York. After high school, she worked at an advertising agency for three years, then became a stewardess for Pan Am in 1949. A year later she quit flying and got married, and began writing short stories.

Her first, "Stowaway," was based on her flights to Czechoslovakia just before the Iron Curtain descended, and revolved around a stewardess who discovered a member of the Czech underground hiding on the plane.

Her husband, Warren Clark, died in 1964, and Clark turned her attention to writing for radio. Her first book, a biography of George Washington, was a commercial failure. But once she discovered the suspense genre, Clark took up what appears to be permanent residence on the best-seller lists.

But when Seals and Coley decided to part company, Seals chose to return to his country roots.

He was raised at an oil camp near a one-red-light town in Texas. His father played guitar with Ernest Tubb and Marty Robbins. His uncle wrote Ray Price's "Crazy Arms," and a cousin wrote Ronnie Milosip's "Lost in the Fifties" and George Jones' "Who's Gonna Fill Their Shoes."

By the time he was 4, Seals was playing in the family band.

Seals moved to Nashville in 1981, where he recorded his first country album. He topped the charts with "Everything That Glitters," "You Still Move Me," "Boo" and "Let the Good Times Roll." **TWIN FALLS** — Reggae returns to the Turf Club Tuesday night with a performance by the group that best embodies the Jamaican equivalent of roots rock. Culture is probably the least slick of the big-name reggae acts, Rastafarian to its core. It even began life, back in 1977, as the African Disciples.

"Their musical message and harmonic range are the hallmarks of the group," the trio's official biography reads. "They are the embodiment of the Rastafarian values of love, community and justice, both in their music and in their performances."

Ras Tafari was the given name of the late Ethiopian emperor Haile Selassie, whom Rastafarians revere in a religion that exalts harmony and respect for nature.

But it's also a faith of the have-nots, and was born in the grim slums of West Kingston and in the impoverished Jamaican countryside, where the members of Culture grew up. Their music is fiery and political.

"They are still politically militant, spiritually righteous and musically untouchable," their biography says. They're also a light-year or two away from the crossover commercialism of the late Bob Marley and Jimmy Cliff.

The trio is probably best known for its 1977 song, "Two Sevens Clash," written by the group's founder

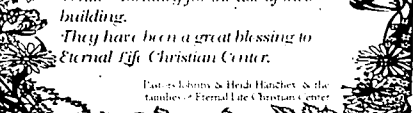

# Stay home with Bond ... James Bond, in 'Goldeneye'

New videos in Twin Falls stores this week:

"Goldeneye" (PG-13) — Men can no longer carry on as they used to. But no one seems to have decried James Bond. In "Goldeneye," an entertaining collision of old values and new, the latest Bond (Pierce Brosnan) is still a dashing rascal in a tuxedo, defending queen and country from megalomaniacal psychotics, but never too busy for a little lady-killing.

Oh, this movie pretends to tackle the politics. M. Bond imperious (and at MIA, is now a woman (Judi Dench), who takes a withering view of Bond's sexual shenanigans. But she's seen as a humorless, cobwebby bean-counter, rather than the new spirit of liberation.

There's another politically correct moment when Miss Moneybags (an old character played by new actress Samantha Bond) playfully informs 007 that his flirtatious comments are grounds for sexual harassment.

"What's the penalty?" he asks.

"You'll have to act on all your innuendoes," she says.

In other words, Carry on Bond, old boy. Do it for the Empire.

At the most basic, crowd-pleasing level, "Goldeneye" (Bond producer-for-life Albert Broccoli's 17th) does the trick. Naturally, the world's in big trouble again. Russian military brags and a mysterious mastermind want to destroy the London financial market with state-of-the-art electromagnetic satellite zappers.

Bond, whose mission takes him to Russia and Cuba, needs to identify the saboteurs and, as usual, fight his way out of a plethora of tricky, breathtaking situations.

Nowadays, you can almost program an exciting action movie (see "Batman Forever," "Die Hard With a Vengeance" and "Under Siege 2: Dark Territory" for further details). And as these kind of spectacles go, Bond pictures are among the easiest to reprise. "Goldeneye," written by Michael France, Jeffrey Gaine and Bruce Feirstein, leaves few clichés unturned. (The Washington Post) (Hastings, Video West, Blockbuster)

"Casino" (R) — They are the unholy trinity, worshiped and feared in Las Vegas of the go-go 70s; they are the

pashas of paradise. They are former bookie Ace Rothstein, former hustler Ginger McKenna and former hitman Nicky Santoro. For them, Vegas is an Eden where there are no shadowy pasts, only sunny futures. "Casino" is the dizzying, high-rolling lowdown on their eventual expulsion from paradise.

Ace (Robert De Niro) manages the Tangiers Hotel and Casino, redeems Ginger (Sharon Stone) from her fate as slut queen of the slots and sees hood thug Nicky (Joe Pesci) flex his mob muscle until it strangles the Strip.

In Martin Scorsese's parable of faith and betrayal, their story is hypnotic as a roulette wheel, plush as an ultrasuede-upholstered lounge and emotionally distant as a coup.

This is because the conflicts are related in voice-over and, for the audience, too often the effect is one of being lectured instead of being shown. For the actors, excellent performances are annotated — and interrupted — by themselves as narrators.

In the new film, the director, one of Hollywood's most imaginative, layers a narrative lasagna with plot, commentary and nonstop pop musical selections that are, effectively, commentary on the commentary. At three hours, it's a mouthful. (Knight-Ridder, Newsweek) (Blockbuster, Video West, Hastings)

"Les Misérables" (R) — French filmmaker Claude Lelouch's "Les Mis" is neither a remake of Victor Hugo's novel nor an adaptation of the popular musical, but a turgid three-hour epic that parallels the 19th-century tale. Now set in France between 1900 and 1950, this tedious but beautifully staged costume melodrama follows the exploits of Henri Fortin (weathered Jean-Paul Belmondo), a boxer-turned-mover whose big heart and heavy build earn him the nickname Jean Valjean.

After Lelouch traces the character's early history and that of his unjustly imprisoned father (also played by Belmondo) in an hour-long flashback, the writer-director finally gets to the heart of his story. In this two-hour section, Fortin comes to the aid of the Zimans, a Jewish family trying to escape the Nazis by fleeing to Normandy. When they are turned in by collaborators, Fortin hides their daughter, Sakome (played by Lelouch's daughter

ter Sakome), in a convent and later helps them make it to the Swiss border. During the ride, the Zimans pass the

time by reading "Les Misérables" to the grateful Fortin. "There are only two or three stories in the world, and we must

all live them over and over," observes Zimm; neither the first nor the last character to go so. It's almost as if Lelouch were making excuses for helping himself to another artist's work. But another oft-rehearsed phrase — "These are miserable times" — better expresses the feeling one has while sitting through this earnest extravaganza.

Though Lelouch has added many complications to Hugo's original, he still hasn't enough to fill three hours, so he's created more subplots, added more flashbacks, done more cutaways and spliced in more clips from older film versions of the tale. If it were shorter, we wouldn't know what misery really feels like. (Knight-Ridder News Service) (Blockbuster)

"Nick of Time" (R) — Maybe Christopher Walken and Roma Maffia — the sinister duo in John Badham's ridiculous "Nick of Time" — had just come from a "Chapter Two." "Only When I Laugh" double bill. How else to explain their fierce desire to assassinate Marsha Mason?

Mason, you see, plays a liberal California governor. Walken and Maffia are a couple of badge-wielding goons who pluck unsuspecting accountant Johnny Depp from Los Angeles' Union Station and hand him a revolver and an ultimatum: Assassinate Governor Grant within 90 minutes or we'll kill your daughter.

If the governor isn't lying in a pool of her own blood by 1:30, Lynn is a goner. If nothing else, Badham ("Snakeout," "Point of No Return") keeps this promise. **"Flipper"** — Modest update of the '60s TV series is guaranteed to engage younger viewers when the dolphin's around; watery environmental message, kids, don't get dumping toxic waste on the ocean floor) may at this point remind everyone of "Free Willy," but there's just enough of interest here to keep parents' brains from being reduced to protoplasm while the affable pup enjoys his aquatic antics. (PG, for some mild language and menacing action.) (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Ace Theater of Wendell, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

## 'Mission' shatters 1st-day record with \$3.4 million

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Mission: Impossible" earned \$3.4 million in its debut, shattering the first-day record set by "Jurassic Park," according to industry estimates.

The motion picture remake of the 1960s TV spy series was previewed Tuesday in more than 1,500 theaters nationwide. The movie, starring Tom Cruise, opened Wednesday. "It should be a tremendous week for the picture," said John Krier of Exhibitor Relations Co., which compiles box office figures for the motion picture industry. "Jurassic Park" earned \$3.1 million in its 1993 debut and went on to become one of the highest grossing films of all time.

### "Mission: Impossible"

— Based on the long-running CBS television series that debuted in 1966, the story centers around a highly trained and specialized group of intelligence agents who rely on split-second timing and sophisticated gadgetry to avert terrorist actions against the United States. Tom Cruise stars as Ethan Hunt, with Jan Reno, Ving Rhames and Emmanuelle Beart as his operatives. Jon Voight is Jim ("Good morning, Mr.") Phelps and Henry Czerny plays a menacing CIA director. (Rated PG-13) (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Ace Theater of Wendell, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

**"Mulholland Falls"** — Nick Nolte, Chaz Palminteri, Michael Madsen and Christopher Penn team up for a crime drama set in Los Angeles in 1954. The action centers around the "Hat Squad," an elite anti-crime unit headed up by LAPD detective Nolte. This late-1988 production escaped that route, though a couple of the songs turned up as part of Disney's popular "Sing-along" series. Seven years after it was withdrawn from theatrical release, the full-length version is making its big-screen reappearance today. The studio has created several hundred 35mm prints, spiffed up with a new Dolby Digital soundtrack. Inspired by — rather than based on — Dickens' "Oliver Twist," Disney's "Oliver & Company" is a jaunty, fast-paced musical cartoon that owes more to Disney's own "Lady and the Tramp" than it does to the stage musical. "Oliver!" (Rated G, (Shoshone Showhouse))

**"The Pallbearer"** — David Schwimmer (from television's "Friends") and Gwyneth "Seven" Paltrow team up for a romantic

comedy about a young architect who is asked to be a pallbearer at a high school friend's funeral, only to discover that he never knew the deceased. He does, however, wind up getting together with the dead man's girlfriend. (Rated PG-13) (Ski Time 4 Cinema of Ketchum)

**"Primal Fear"** — A man with multiple personalities is tried for the murder of an archbishop in this courtroom drama set in Chicago. Starring Richard Gere as a Johnny Cochran-style defense attorney and Laura ("Congo") Linney as a Marcia Clark-style prosecutor. (Grand-Vu Drive-in)

**"The Queen"** — Jean-Claude Van Damme stars as New York City pickpocket Christopher Dubois, who attempts to elude police by taking a death-defying leap onto a departing freighter and winds up in the Far East. There he learns of the gangster, the most prestigious fight in the world, and begins his quest for the gold — literally. (Twin Cinema)

**"Spy Hard"** — Leslie Nielsen stars as Richard Steele, aka Agent WD-40, in this spoof of the action genre. Featured players include Nicolette ("Noises Off") Sheridan as Agent 3.14 and Andy Griffith as the villainous Doc Martins. (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Sun Valley Opera House)

**"The Substitute"** — Tom Berenger plays a mercenary who goes undercover as a substitute teacher after his girlfriend is attacked by a gang of students. Ultimately, he discovers a citywide drug ring. (Grand-Vu Drive-in)

**"Toy Story"** — This movie sheds light on the burning "toys coming to life" issue. The film is not a documentary but, rather, an amazing dramatization that reveals in scrupulous detail precisely how members of the toy community have for years carried off their remarkable deception. Helping to compensate for the new technology's lack of humanity is the music by Randy Newman, whose bouncy ditty, "You've Got a Friend in Me," is one of the movie's true high-lights. # Backbeat

## Fugees' 2nd effort scores big

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — The price of success is evident in Lauryn Hill's voice.

Scratchy from overuse, it sounds far from the honey-toned instrument that makes the Fugees' remake of Roberta Flack's "Killing Me Softly" such a pleasure. Hill apologizes over the telephone for her hoarse-

ness. She's only hours from a scheduled concert, the first in a brutal stretch that includes six nights in a row on stage and 10 in the next 11. She insists she'll be ready: "Focus," she said.

The hard work is paying off. Their sophomore effort has made the Fugees this year's critical favorite in the rap world for its dizzying lyrical and musical breadth.

"The Score" is an audacious concept album "ghetto theater" about settling a score, that the band compares to the Who's "Tommy."

It's also the spring's most stunning commercial success, leaving Hill and partners Wyclef Jean and Praskeel Michel rubbing elbows at the top of the charts with Alanis Morissette and the Beatles.

"I'm surprised at the speed with which it took off," she said. "We thought we'd have underground success and that it would take a minute (for people) to realize what it was."

The Fugees — the name is short for "refugees," a nod to Jean and Michel's Haitian heritage — have been tagged as positive rappers in a scene littered with gangster style heroes.

The truth is more complicated. The Fugees want to present a more rounded view of life to their young fans. The music is not far from the street: one song depicts a fight between an Asian shopkeeper and black patrons with the expected brutal language.

Hill, an actress in "Sister Act II" and an Ivy Leaguer at Columbia University when she used to have free time, said there's nothing wrong with expressions of anger in music.

But she resents the false image portrayed by many gangster rappers.

"It became popular to be stupid, to be violent, to be unintelligent and that's bad," she said. "When people stop being who they are naturally and start pretending to be something negative or not real, that's what's wack."

Young fans are getting a one-dimensional picture that's like reading the first few chapters of Malcolm X's autobiography and not ignoring his evolution, she said.

Hill grew up in South Orange, N.J., a school chum of Michel's. Jean is Michel's cousin. Both men grew up with strong ties to the church and its musical traditions. The trio, known at the time as Tranzlator Cwew, began performing together in high school.

Although they attracted some attention for the single "Nappy Head" on their 1993 debut, the album wasn't particularly deep and is looked upon now as a

learning experience. Hill constantly was asked when she would ditch her friends and go solo — which annoyed Jean and Michel enough so they wanted to step up and prove themselves this time.

With Hill only aged 15 when she started recording the first album, she said the band turned

over too much control to a production company they have since abandoned.

"I had very little creative input in the first album," she said.

"I was just happy to be on the record ... What that first album did for us was to give us the exposure and the education. We

were smart enough to pay very close attention to how to perform, how to self-promote and just how to make music."

The Fugees are fans of veteran artists such as Bob Marley, Stevie Wonder and Flack. Yet the 1980s sounds they grew up with also seep in; Hill even cited Duran Duran.

## Baseball owners propose fewer taxes

NEW YORK — Baseball owners made another new proposal to players Thursday, offering to eliminate a luxury tax in the final year of the next labor deal and dropping their tax rate from 40 percent to 39.5 percent.

In the first negotiating session since April 29, owners offered both a five- and six-year contract. In the six-year proposal, the tax would cover the 1998, 1999 and 2000 seasons. In a five-year deal, the tax would be in 1997, 1998 and 1999.

In the union's last proposal, made during an informal meeting between the sides, players suggested a tax in the middle two years of a six-year deal.



Because the labor talks haven't progressed much in the past two months, owners also postponed their quarterly meetings, which had been scheduled for June 4-6 in Philadelphia. The ruling executive council probably will meet in Philadelphia on June 5.

Players and owners still are apart on the tax rate and threshold. While players want a 30 percent tax on the amount of payrolls above \$64 million, owners are proposing a 39.5 percent tax that would start in 1998 on the amount above \$46 million, which would affect many more teams. The threshold would rise 7 percent per year.

Owners also moved on revenue sharing. The previous proposal, made March 21, called for revenue sharing to reach a 100 percent level in 1998. Management negotiator Randy Levine, according to one person familiar with the talks, told the union on Thursday that owners were willing to wait longer for revenue sharing to reach its full level.

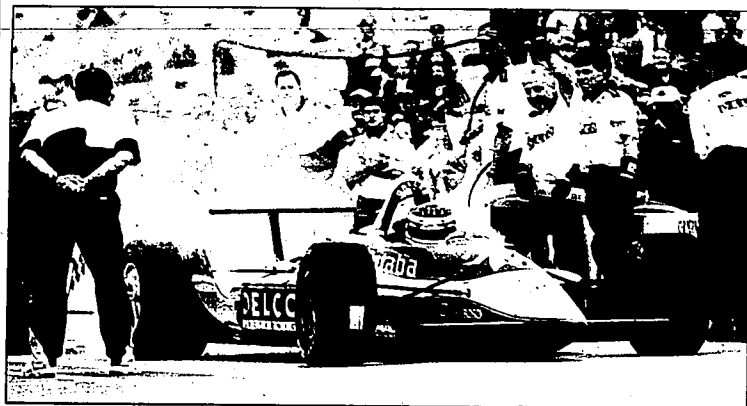
Teams are concerned with the disparity in payrolls between large- and small-market teams and want to use the luxury tax to force large-market payrolls closer to the average. Small-market teams hope revenue sharing will enable them to compete better with their larger rivals. Players are concerned that a luxury tax

would decrease the amount of money spent on player salaries. They also are concerned that revenue sharing will divert money from large-market clubs, who would spend it on players, to small-market clubs, who would spend it to meet other operating expenses.

The union was adamantly against having the luxury tax in the deal's final year. Since baseball contracts often remain in effect for years after their expiration — the sides continue to operate under the contract that expired in December 1993 — players were fearful a tax would continue indefinitely.

Levine declined to comment on the talks. "The meeting today was similar to the meetings we've had over the past month," union head Donald Fehr said.

"If you don't do a few laps, the tire pressures don't really come up to where they should be, so the car feels different."

Luyendyk's top speed Thursday was 228.300 mph, almost 11 mph slower than his best lap in practice two weeks ago.

The only drivers who failed to get onto the track were Johnny Parsons, whose car had a transmission problem, and alternates Tyce Carlson and Billy Boat. Carlson chose not to run. Boat, who suffered a

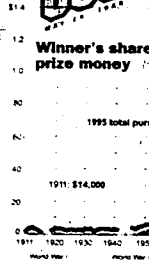

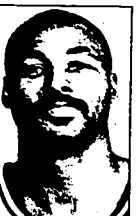

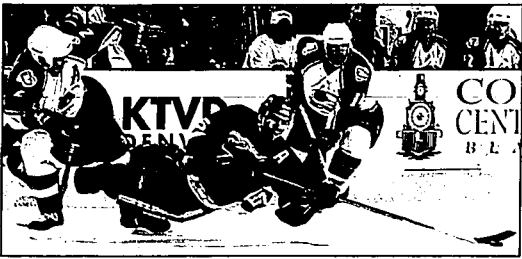

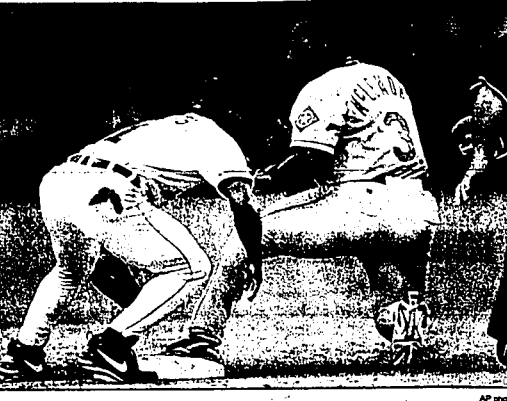

CLEVELAND — A delay in signing an agreement with the National Football League to return professional football to the city will not slow the city's plans to build a stadium, a city official said.

# Benz straightens out at Corning

CORNING, N.Y. (AP) — With the U.S. Women's Open starting next week, there is no better time than now for Amy Benz to get her game in order.

Benz went on a birdie binge over her final nine holes en route to a 6-under-par 66 Thursday and a one-stroke lead over three others in the first round of the \$600,000 Corning Classic.

Benz, currently an alternate for the Open, would receive an automatic exemption with a victory at Corning. She has earned almost \$1.4 million during her 13-year career but has never won a tournament.

"I had a rough year last year," Benz said. "These last few weeks have been very encouraging. I feel like I'm getting back on my game. I have some extra motivation for this week."

Liselotte Neumann, who also started on No. 10 tee, caught Benz with a birdie on No. 6 but made bogey on No. 9 after pushing her approach into a sand trap. She was tied with Val Skinner and Rosie Jones at 67.

Nine players, including Danielle Ammaccapane and Vicki Goetze, were at 68. Defending champion Alison Nicholas was in a group at 70. Hall of Famer Patty Sheehan was with 15 others at 71.

When ten players were within three shots of the lead, and 45 of the 144 players broke par. The winner will receive \$90,000.

It marked the first round in the 60s this season for Benz, who underwent surgery for tendinitis in September. She spent four months recovering from the injury and did not play. She finished in a tie for 18th two weeks ago at the McDonald's Open.

Benz made four consecutive birdies on the front and made another birdie on her final hole after sticking a pitching wedge four feet from the cup. She had six birdies and one bogey on the front.

"It was two different rounds," Benz said. "I kept telling myself to hang in there and be patient. I got to those scoring holes, and it paid off."

The conditions along the hilly 6,062-yard layout at Corning Country Club were ideal for low scores in the morning before heavy winds kicked up in the afternoon.

Skinner and Jones both put together solid rounds and finished with 67s. Skinner was at five under after knocking a 2-iron within four feet on the par-5 12th. She followed with a bogey on 13.

Jones made a late charge with three birdies over the final four holes. Her approaches on 15, 17, 18 each were within 10 feet, and she had just one bogey during her round.

"I really didn't put that well," Skinner said. "There was 62 written all over that course, but I couldn't make it happen. The good news is that I had that chance."

# Williamson has last laugh tied at top

POTOMAC, Md. (AP) — Jay Williamson, whose inept play in this event last year prompted laughter from the gallery, birdied his last four holes Thursday to tie Scott McCarron and Billy Andrade for the first-round lead at the Kemper Open.

Finishing on the front nine before a sparse crowd in the next-to-last group of the day, Williamson snuk punts of 5, 6, 12 and 6 feet for a 6-under-par 66, easily his best round of the year.

"I tell you, there's been a lot of dark days in recent months," said Williamson, who has missed the cut in five of his last eight tournaments.

"Today was going so well I told my caddy, 'I wonder if they'll let me keep playing here.' It was nice, quiet, peaceful. There weren't a whole lot of people harassing me."

That was in stark contrast from last year, when Williamson shot a 78 and 82 and went home on Saturday.

"I was walking down the back nine and people were laughing at me," said Williamson, who had to go back to qualifying school at the end of last year to keep his tour card. "They flashed my score up. People were saying, 'I can do better than that.' I thought about it when I got here on Monday."

Six players — Brad Fabel, Brad Faxon, Mike Sullivan, Mark O'Meara, Chris Smith and Bob

Gilder — were one shot off the lead on a beautiful, sunny day when the fairways were soft and the greens slow at the TPC at Avenel course.

For Andrade and McCarron, the 17th hole provided the day's excitement. Andrade, who won this tournament five years ago and at the Buick Classic the week after and hasn't won since, held a three-

stroke lead at 7-under when he took up at the 195-yard par-3.

"I was pumped up. I was making a bunch of birdies in a row, and the wind was up a little bit more than I thought," Andrade said. "I just hit it a little too good."

Andrade's 7-iron tee shot went beyond the green and onto the back slope of a sand trap. He got a

bogey, and followed with another one followed at 18, where a photographer forced him to back off just as he was about to putt for par.

"I'm trying to learn to not let those things affect me," said Andrade, who said he flashed back to a similar incident when he was near the lead at the Greater Greensboro Open last month. "I hit the putt the way I wanted to; it just didn't go in. I'm not going to blame (him). Hey, we're big guys out here. I understand the guy's trying to do his job, and I'd like to see him know his job a little better."

McCarron, who won his first tour event in March and needs another victory here to qualify automatically for the U.S. Open, also lofted a wayward tee shot at the 17th. But after landing in the water, he holed a 113-yard shot with a pitching wedge to save par.

Otherwise, it was solid iron play that lifted McCarron onto the leader board. His longest putt on the day was 12 feet.

"All day long it seemed like my iron were working," McCarron said. "I was seeing shots going right at the pin all day."

Lee Janzen, the defending champion at the \$1.5 million tournament, shot a 1-over-par 72, bogeying the 18th after six consecutive birdies at the hole over the last two years. Nick Price withdrew before the round began with a virus.

# Magic mulls ways to fix offense against Bulls

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — This is not the way the Eastern Conference Finals are supposed to be going for the Orlando Magic. Certainly not with Shaquille O'Neal averaging more than 31 points and Anfernee Hardaway contributing 28 per game against the Chicago Bulls.

With that kind of production from the young all-star tandem, the defending conference champions expected to be soaring now instead of facing the prospect of being swept out of the playoffs for the third straight year.

"In my mind, the series should be 1-1," O'Neal said Thursday.

"But it doesn't matter what I think. We're down 0-2. We've just got to come out next time and play like we can."

That won't be easy, considering the Bulls won a NBA-record 72 games during the regular season, have beaten Orlando five consecutive times and have every reason to be confident they can keep the string of success alive.

The Magic will play Games 3 and 4 this weekend without injured forward Horace Grant (hyperextended left elbow) and could be in even deeper trouble if his replacement, Jon



Koncak (sore left knee), can't play, either.

Then, there's the matter of Dennis Scott and Nick Anderson, who are healthy, but haven't been playing well. They're a combined 7-for-30 from the field, including 2-for-17 from behind the 3-point line.

The Bulls have shut them down by single-covering O'Neal and Hardaway most of the time, limiting the number of open shots that Scott and Anderson are accustomed to because most teams try to double Orlando's stars in the low post.

The solution is not as simple as vowing to get Scott, who made a

league record 257 3-pointers this season, and Anderson more involved against the Bulls.

Coach Brian Hill can't shift the focal point of the offense away from O'Neal and Hardaway, so the Magic's perimeter shooters have to do a better job of creating opportunities for themselves.

"We can try as much as we want, but we've got to get Dennis and Nick to move, come off screens and do other things to get involved in the offense," Hardaway said. "The Bulls are not going to just let them stand and shoot jump shots. They know that."

The highest scoring team in the playoffs during the first two rounds at 105 points per game, the Magic have been held to 83 and 88 in losses to the Bulls. Chicago won Game 1 by 38 and overcame an 18-point deficit to take a 2-0 lead in the best-of-7 series that continues Saturday at Orlando Arena.

"We didn't play well defensively in Game 1, but we made adjustments and came back and did a much better job in the next game," Hill said. "Our biggest problem has been on the offensive end ... that's what's got to improve."

Chicago's offense is functioning well enough that eight players, led by Michael Jordan, Scottie Pippen and Dennis Rodman, are averaging at least 7.0 points per game in the series. Orlando only has two, O'Neal and Hardaway.

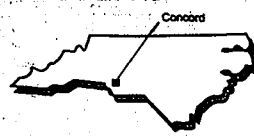

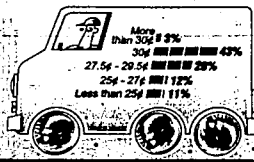

TJ International sales fall short of '95 goals

BOISE — Sales for Boise-based TJ International Inc. in 1995 did not meet expectations but the market for engineered wood products will improve this year, officials told the annual stockholders meeting.

"We made some good progress on a number of key initiatives, had the foundation and cleaned up some key areas," said Thomas Denig, president and chief executive officer, on Wednesday.

TJ dropped prices 8 percent to reflect lower lumber costs last year, but the company said prices now are on the rise and housing starts are stronger than last year.

To re-focus on the core business of engineered wood products, the company divested its Twin Falls Norco wood window business last year, which cost \$36 million.

Albertson's reported earnings up 13% over a year earlier

BOISE — Albertson's Inc., the nation's fourth largest grocery and drug retailer, reported record first-quarter earnings of \$112.4 million Thursday, an increase of 13.2 percent over the year-earlier level.

The company said total sales were also a record \$3.3 billion, up 8.4 percent from the February-April period in 1995, comparable store sales were up 2.5 percent. Per share earnings totaled 45 cents, up six cents from a year ago.

NEW YORK — As the stock market has kept climbing to record highs this spring, it has impressed many analysts with its resilience in the face of rising interest rates.

But while the upturn in rates hasn't hurt the market as a whole, it has inflicted quite a bit of damage on several industry groups ranging from housing to electric utilities.

Whenever people seek to explain the great bull market for stocks over the past 15 years, a lot of credit always goes to a long-term decline in interest rates that has reduced the comparative allure of interest-bearing investments.

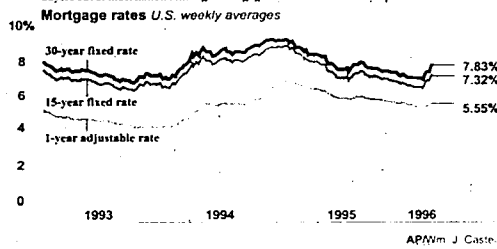
At the start of the 1980s, you could buy bank certificates of deposit yielding 13 percent to 14 percent. In today's marketplace, 6 percent looks generous.

So in periods like the past few months, when rates move up even temporarily, many analysts start to worry that stocks are due for a setback. While this risk can't be completely dismissed, however, analysts say it simply isn't true that stocks are always hostage to what's happening in the credit markets.

After looking at market history back to 1940, Herb Johnson, an analyst at First Albany Corp. in Albany, N.Y., reported, "63 percent of the time that interest rates are rising, stock prices are also rising. It's

only in the later stages of a rise in interest rates that stock owners need to become worried."

If you look past short-term swings in the markets, many analysts agree, what matters most to the stock market is the underlying trend of economic growth and corporate profits.

At the same time, though, interest rates have played a big part lately in determining stock investors' choice of industry groups.

From the beginning of the year through early May, the three worst performing groups among 96 tracked by Dow Jones & Co. were home construction, down almost 12 percent; savings and loans, down more than 11 percent; and electric utilities, down more than 10 percent.

As different as those industries may be in other respects, their stocks are all notoriously sensitive to interest rate changes.

Micron slows hiring as chip market lags

"This is a more conservative approach to hiring so we can focus on more critical areas," spokeswoman Julie Nash said Wednesday. "We've decided at this point to be conservative in our hiring. We haven't completely stopped, but we have slowed down."

The market price for a 4-megabit chip of DRAM — which allows computers and other electronic devices to store data for quick retrieval — has dropped 70 percent in the past five months.

The company has also asked employees for help in cutting costs to combat losses caused by the falling prices. Measures range from production suggestions to decreasing company travel and cutting postal costs.

Nash said Micron is not considering layoffs.

The company slashed its work force nearly in half in the mid-1980s. But Micron has been able to cut costs

instead of jobs in dealing with recent fluctuations in the market.

"Micron has always been very quick to adjust to a changing market," Nash said. "It's a way to avoid layoffs."

Micron Technology has 6,800 employees, which is a 26 percent increase from the same time last year.

It is not the only DRAM producer cutting costs. This isn't hitting Micron alone," said Victor de Dios, who follows the DRAM market for de Dios and Associates in Newark, Calif. "We are hearing the beginning of hiring freezes."

Contract prices for 4 megabits of DRAM are being sold between \$6 and \$7, or about \$1 below the estimated price, said Ron Bohm of Dataquest, a market-research firm that covers the technology industry in San Jose, Calif. The current spot market price is hovering around \$4.

About a year ago, when the market was healthy, contract prices were around \$13 and the spot price peaked at \$20 because the demand was so intense.

Now the future looks little brighter than the present.

Huge mutual fund denies pressure to oust manager

BOSTON — Fidelity Investments Thursday vigorously denied there had been any pressure on Magellan fund manager Jeff Vinik to step aside, despite controversy over his fund's recent performance and a pending lawsuit against him, the company and the fund.

But some professional Fidelity watchers doubted whether the giant mutual fund company was telling the whole story. Others accepted Fidelity's line, arguing that Vinik, whose decisions affect the nest egg of millions of American investors, had probably tried all of the negative publicity and decided to start a firm of his own, where he could probably make more money while laboring in relative tranquility far from the hostile glare of constant public scrutiny.

"There was absolutely no pressure on him," Fidelity said. Fidelity spokesman woman Robyn Tice. "Everybody has been extremely supportive of him, and we're sorry to see him go. He's done an excellent job for shareholders, and this was entirely his own decision."

But Jack Bowser, publisher of Fidelity Monitor, a California-based newsletter, said, "he had to be under a lot of pres-

No basic changes, ValuJet says

ATLANTA — ValuJet President Lewis H. Jordan told shareholders at the company's annual meeting Thursday that the investigation of the ValuJet crash outside Miami so far has failed to uncover any change that would alter the fundamental operating strategy of the airline, including the widespread use of outside contractors to perform essential services.

Also, Jordan said later at a news conference, the company has agreed to work with federal safety officials to improve the quality of the oversight of ValuJet contractors.

And Jordan said the airline had, at least for the moment, stopped doing business with SaberTech, the Miami maintenance contractor involved in the shipment of oxygen generators suspected as a possible cause of the crash.

A ValuJet DC-9 crashed May 11 in the Florida Everglades just outside of Miami killing all 110 aboard.

Since then, the airline has been forced to cut its flight schedule in half as part of an intense inspection program by federal safety officials.

Jordan said Thursday that it was unclear how long the airline could continue to avoid layoffs during the flight cutbacks. ValuJet has 1,800 employees, but puts its work force at approximately 4,000 when employees of contractors working for the airline are included.

So far, Jordan said, no one has been laid off.

Investigators from the National Transportation Safety Board have uncovered evidence that a shipment of the oxygen generators aboard the ValuJet airliner may have overheated in flight and caused a fire or explosion of other material in the cargo hold, causing the crash. The generators, which are used to provide emergency oxygen on certain types of aircraft, were delivered to ValuJet by SaberTech for disposal. The generators belonged to ValuJet.

Holding up two hazardous warning signs for the television cameras, Jordan said if the generators had been correctly tagged with the hazardous warnings, "we would not have accepted the cargo."

Jordan said the airline has suspended ties with the Miami contractor because of the dispute over the handling of the hazardous cargo. "It is very clear that SaberTech and we have taken a very different position on a matter of great importance to this investigation," Jordan said.

Smith shareholders OK merger, recapitalization

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Smith's Food & Drug Centers completed the purchase of the 28-store Supermarkets Inc. of Phoenix on Thursday after shareholders approved the merger and a hefty new borrowing.

The vote by shareholders, announced at the grocery chain's annual meeting, culminated a tumultuous eight months for one of the two top players in the Salt Lake, Phoenix, Albuquerque and Las Vegas grocery markets.

Smith's filed with several potential buyers early in the year, but ended up striking an agreement with Yucaipa Companies, a Los Angeles-based investment company that controlled Smith's in Arizona and continues to control Ralph's, the largest grocery chain in Southern California.

The recapitalization meant Smith's took on a whopping \$1.38 billion in debt.

Down 15 on weak bonds

The Dow fluctuated in a narrow trading range this morning, down by as much as 21 points and up by 17 points at 5795 at one stage, recovering mainly to a weaker bond market. But the Dow remained in negative territory for the rest of the day and fell as much as 49 points to 5728 — shy of the NYSE triggering program trading curbs.

The benchmark 30-year bond yield rose from 10.23 to 10.15, and its yield rose to 6.855 percent.

But a big jump in the shares of Dow component Philip Morris Inc. (NYSE:MO) late in the afternoon trimmed the blue-chip index's losses.

Just as men's fashions have changed, the business community's comfort level with women has improved and allowed for more flexibility, personality and expression," said Brenda Smith, partner in the accounting firm of Baird, Kurtz and Dobson.

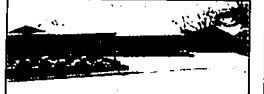

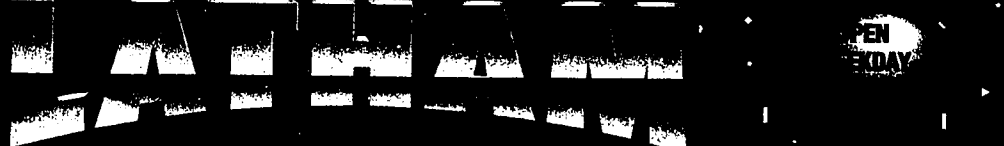

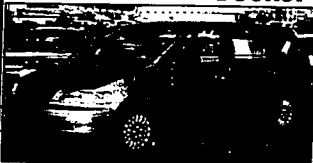

# Gala Memorial Day concert requires months of planning

You're throwing a gala outdoor party for 300,000 of your closest friends and... to your horror... Marsha Stewart is booked solid. Where do you turn for advice?

Try Jerry Colbert, who returns for his seventh consecutive year as executive producer of the "National Memorial Day Concert," which PBS carries live in most areas on Sunday, May 26.

"We're not only live, we're outside," Colbert explains. "When you add the two together, it makes it a little dicey."

That's why planning for each year's Memorial Day Concert begins as early as the previous October, when the theme and the concept are firmed up (this year's concert commemorates disabled veterans as well as contributions from men and women on the home front).

Next, the production

team begins to exchange ideas for film clips and dramatic readings that would be appropriate to the theme.

By December, the team draws up the equivalent of a football team's play chart, indicating the basic flow of the show, along with specific musical numbers and dramatic pieces, as well as the stars who might be appropriate to perform them.

A big step, of course, is booking and confirming the talent, which can cause some modifications in the program as well.

"It's really a new form that we've created for live television," Colbert says. "I mean, there isn't much live TV where you also have a film component, then after off in live drama. Then you have music playing and stars that are fitting into the various themes. It all works together, but it's a lot of work."

One of the most frightening aspects of the project is that, after months

of planning, there is only a single complete run-through the night before the actual concert takes place.

"I used to make documentaries (where), at every stage, you were looking at it, working it as a real craftsman," Colbert says. "With this (show), it all happens conceptually. You plan each thing and boom! You see it!"

Hosted by Ossie Davis and accompanied by Erich Kunzel and the National Symphony Orchestra, this year's concert opens with Kenny Rogers performing three songs, followed by a memorial to the sacrifices of all American veterans, offered by Colin Powell.

The focus then shifts to sacrifices made on home soil, as gospel artist CeCe Winans performs songs that evoke the melancholy mood of leave-taking.

Next, actress Christine Baranski ("Cybill") introduces a special segment utilizing archival footage and still photographs showing women toiling in

the wartime factories, followed by her spirited rendition of "Rosie the Riveter."

The contributions and sacrifices of Americans on the home front have long been undervalued, Colbert says.

"One of the things we found out in our research is that 70,000 people died on the home front in industrial accidents during World War II," he says. "The inexperience and the three shifts and the forced-march kind of atmosphere that they were in (contributed to these accidents). That's more people than we lost in Vietnam or Korea."

In addition to sweating through grueling hours at the factories, many American women also had to cope with separation from their loved ones. That sacrifice is commemorated by Burt Reynolds and Kelly McGillis, who read excerpts from the correspondence of one wartime couple, who exchanged more than 400 letters.

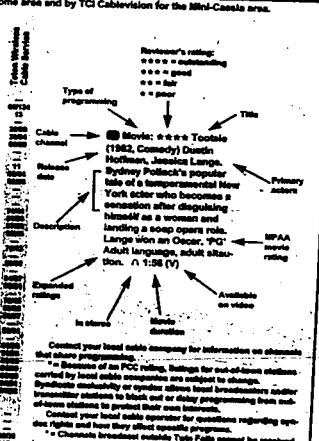

She came through fine, they got married and the two children they already have together - daughter Dylan Frances, 5, and son Hopper, 2 - are delighted.

"Dead Man Walking" performance have jump-started his career. So things are looking good for the actor, father and, now, husband.

**Q:** Does Raquel Welch really believe that at her age she's still Hollywood's hottest sex symbol? -H.B.

**A:** Raquel's a realist. Born Raquel Tejada in Chicago, she'll turn 56 on Sept. 5. This is the way she puts it:

"Honey, no more G-strings. The talented performer has for years been cannily diversifying her career - stage, cabaret, TV (most recently a villainess on "Central Park West"), exercise videos and books.

While AIDS is still a major threat, the public seems less concerned than they should be; it's as if people are shell shocked by the constant bombardment of headlines about the newest viral outbreak wherever it's spread by mice, monkeys, or as a consequence of shared needles or unprotected sex.

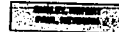

# Lifetime takes a close look at sexual harassment in the workplace

In October 1991, national television coverage of Anita Hill's challenge to the nomination of Clarence Thomas to the U.S. Supreme Court exposed sexual harassment as the dirty secret of the work place. But just a few months earlier, a much less heralded but far-reaching legal decision involving sexual harassment was handed down by a federal court in California.

And now, the landmark case which established the "reasonable woman" standard instead of "reasonable person" to determine whether an employed woman is being sexually harassed gets its day (or rather, its night) on the tube. "Hostile Advances: The Kerry Ellison Story," premieres at 9 p.m. ET Monday (May 27) on Lifetime.

The moving and well-researched docudrama stars Renée Sofer ("General Hospital") as the beleaguered Ellison and Victor Garber as Jack Gilcrest, her relentless harasser. The program is followed by "Final Take," an hour-long, taped discussion of sexual harassment, moderated by ABC's Renee Pouisant.

Lifetime's excellent dissection of sexual harassment illuminates the harmful effects of being stalked, intimidated and threatened. Ellison isn't a brave crusader with a point to

prove; she's a serious business professional who simply wants to do her job and be left alone.

In 1986, Ellison filed a complaint against Gilcrest with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC). It was rejected; after all, Gilcrest never touched her and a "reasonable person" would not find his actions harassment. She then bravely hired a private lawyer, filed an appeal, won her case in January 1991 in the 9th District U.S. Court of Appeals in San Francisco and established a new standard.

"We adopt the perspective of a 'reasonable woman' primarily because we believe that a sex blind 'reasonable person' standard tends to be male-biased and systematically ignores the experiences of women," the court ruled.

Ellison settled out of court, but filing charges ultimately cost the Internal Revenue Service agent in San Mateo, Calif., her job and the friendship of her colleagues at work. Ellison now works for the U.S. Forestry Department in Washington, D.C.

Unfortunately, Elli-

son's experiences aren't unique. An estimated 40 to 65 percent of employed women report they have been sexually harassed at work. And, since 1991, sexual harassment cases filed with the EEOC have increased 135 percent to 15,000 in 1995. Though the "reasonable woman" standard is the rule only in California (attempts to incorporate it into the Illinois Human Rights Act were defeated) its effect is felt nationwide.

Despite the highly publicized allegations of sexual harassment at the Mitsubishi Motor Manufacturing of America plant in Normal, Ill., Chicago attorney George F. Galland, who represents 29 women in the case filed with the EEOC, thinks light shed on sexual harassment is beneficial.


"In general, things are getting better for women because sexual harassment is getting more expensive for companies, which wasn't true 10 years ago," Galland said. "Most companies have gone out of their way to make sure it won't be tolerated despite the incredible exceptions scattered all over the place."

But raising the issue of sexual harassment has its consequences, as Ellison learned. "The most striking thing we see is how much courage it takes for women to come forward," said Anne Ladky, executive director of Women Employed, a nonprofit advocacy and training group. "In a recent study we did of 80 women who had filed complaints, we found, despite the fact that many of them had experienced further harassment or retaliation after filing complaints, the women urge other women to stand up and do something."

And under the "reasonable woman" standard, female employees have a better chance of being heard. "The reasonable woman standard has its greatest use in the so-called gray area," said Donna Milgram, executive director of the Institute for Women in Trades, Technology and Science.

"Men might say you have to expect this on a job, but a reasonable woman says 'No, I don't have to put up with sexual harassment.'"

That's what Kerry Ellison did. And she's a "reasonable woman."

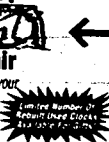

And FBI Agents Fox Mulder and Dana Scully will seek it on a new night next fall. Fox is boldly shifting "The X-Files" to Sunday nights, the key move in the network's 1996 fall schedule, announced Tuesday.

The switch means that "Married ... With Children," a fixture on Sunday nights for a decade, is heading to a new night. Al Bundy & Co. now will be lewdly bodacious at 9 p.m. Saturdays.

Fox's fall schedule features five new series, including three sitcoms and two dramas. Of the new series, the most anticipated is "Millennium." This new voyage into the weird from "X-Files" creator Chris Carter will move into the old "X" spot at 9 p.m. Fridays.

Series that got the Fox pink slip and won't be returning include "Partners," "Profit," "Strange Luck," "The Show," "Local Heroes," "Kindred: The Embraced," "The Crew" and "Space: Above and Beyond."

The most significant loss for those who enjoy inventive, risk-taking TV is "Profit," the darkly humorous and compelling portrait of a scheming corporate executive. That came out after just four episodes this spring.

"Space: Above and

Beyond," the futuristic, action-paced stories of a band of Marine fighter pilots in outer space, is another tough cancellation.

The biggest surprise renewal went to "Sliders," a low-rated adventure series about a quartet of time travelers.

By moving "The X-Files" to the prominent 9 p.m. Sunday night slot, Fox is proclaiming confidence in the increasing mass appeal of the stylish, cutting-edge franchise of the paranormal and the paranoid. What began three years ago as a cult favorite has blossomed into a legitimate hit.

Bravo, Agents Mulder and Scully.

A brief description of Fox's new shows: "Party Girl," Newcomer Christine Taylor stars in this sitcom version of last year's independent film about a Holly Go-lightly for the '90s caught up in the good times social swirl of New York City.

"Lush Life," Lori Potty ("Tank Girl," "A League of Their Own") and Karyn Parsons ("The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air") play childhood friends who are grown up and living in New York City.

"Millennium," in this new slice of surreal from "X-Files" producer Carter, Lance Henriksen ("Alien," "The Terminator") plays a brilliant former FBI agent who specialized in the apprehension of homicidal psychopaths by en-

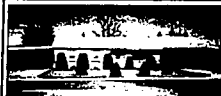

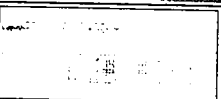
