# Schoolcraft suffered farm setback

## Investigators keep slaying motive secret



On Thursday, however, authorities could not confirm that either the loan denial or any child molestation might have led Walter Schoolcraft, 48, to kill Denise McCoy, her five children and himself on June 11.

**SHOSHONE** — A farm loan from a friend "fell through" for a suspected killer shortly before he and a neighboring family of five were discovered shot to death at their homes last week, *The Times-News* has learned.

Meanwhile, the grandfather of the slain children has reported that an investigator said "molestation" led to their

Schoolcraft mentioned the failed loan deal a couple of weeks ago, his business partner Jack Gray said Thursday.

Gray, a bar-owner and truck driver, owns the Lincoln County farm where Schoolcraft lived. Schoolcraft was found dead from a gunshot wound to the head in a pickup outside the dilapidated pink house there.

Gray purchased the 163-acre farm slightly more than five years ago from the federal Farmers' Home Administra-

tion, according to the Lincoln County assessor's office.

Gray farmed the land himself for three years, then let Schoolcraft sharecrop it last year. Gray decided to sell it, but stopped "pushing" the farm once Schoolcraft said he wanted it, and Gray didn't have other buyers lined up, he said.

Schoolcraft had tried to borrow money from a friend, but didn't seem particularly disappointed when the loan didn't come through, and he hadn't given up hope of finding funds, Gray said.

"Nothing bothered him. He's just a happy guy," Gray said. "He didn't have much and he didn't want much."

Schoolcraft was "dedicated" to farming despite his numerous other interests and wanted to spend the rest of his life farming, said Julius Pennington, a friend of 35 years.

Just before the shootings, Gray and Schoolcraft spent three full days together chopping hay. They talked while they

worked and ate a lunch of Schoolcraft's stew in the farmhouse on the Tuesday of the slaying, Gray left at 6:15 p.m. he said. "Schoolcraft" wasn't any different than he ever was," Gray said. The men were to work together the following day, June 12.

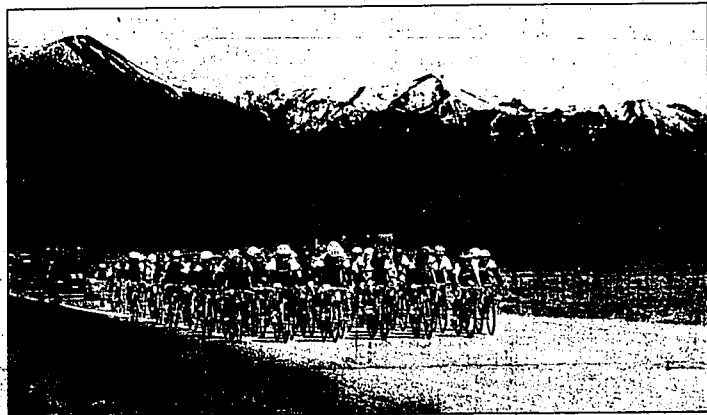
But the day after the shootings when investigators had finished searching Schoolcraft's home, several things seemed odd to Gray as he looked through the house.

Schoolcraft's bed to the wall was spread out as though he had slept or intended to sleep Tuesday night, Gray said Schoolcraft had no bed and put away the bedroll daily, he said. Gray said the time isn't known when Schoolcraft usually turned his head. Also, the house's padlock hung on the refrigerator where Schoolcraft habitually left it, though Schoolcraft always locked the door when he left, Gray said.

"He was big on locking stuff up," Gray

## Hood admits raping girl that he killed

**RUPERT** — The man who has confessed to killing Rupert teen-ager Wendy Reeves Thursday admitted under pressure from an attorney Thursday to raping her as well.

"You knocked that girl out and raped her. ... While she's out cold you raped her," said Monte Carlson, the lawyer defending Shannah Reeves, who is charged as an accessory to murder in Hunter's death.

Corey Hood, 21, of Rupert, hung his head and said, "Yes," in a barely audible voice, as Hunter's parents and other family members listened to his testimony.

He admitted that he had knocked Hunter, 17, unconscious with a jar full of coins and then raped her before

kill her. Minidoka County Prosecutor Gara Newman protested Carlson's questioning, but 5th District Magistrate Roy Holloway overruled her objection.

Hood testified in Magistrate Court Thursday against Reeves, 19, of Rupert, who is his cousin. Thursday's hearing was held to determine whether prosecutors have enough evidence to try Reeves in District Court.

Holloway said he would issue a written decision, perhaps by Monday. Holloway could order Reeves to stand trial, or he could dismiss the charge.

Holloway's decision apparently will hinge on whether Hood's story is enough to implicate Reeves. But Carlson said no physical evidence presented in court ties Reeves to the crime.

Newman argued that though Reeves said she saw blood in Hood's home the night of Hunter's death, she didn't notify authorities that night. That makes her an accessory, Newman alleges.

Hood initially had been charged with first-degree murder in Hunter's death. But Newman arranged a plea bargain in which the charge was reduced to voluntary manslaughter, in exchange for Hood's testimony against Reeves, her boyfriend Brian Mack and Matthew Myers. Hood pleaded guilty Monday to the reduced charges.

Hood, 19, and Reeves, 18, both of Rupert, also had been charged with first-degree murder.

## Domestic dispute leads to death

**BURLEY** — A 45-year-old mother of six died Wednesday night after a domestic dispute in her home at 927 Occidental Ave., according to Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal.

Maria E. Gonzales was pronounced dead at Cassia Regional Hospital at about 10:30 p.m. from a stab wound in the chest, Crystal said. It was the fourth homicide in the Mini-Cassia area since April 10, when Blake Morgan was shot in his Rupert home.

Jose A. Gonzales, 47, is being held in the Cassia County Jail on a charge of second-degree murder, Crystal said. Gonzales is the husband of the victim.

Crystal added that four of the couple's six children tried to intervene but weren't able to save their mother. The woman also had several stab wounds on her arms from a kitchen knife, he said.

Next-door neighbor Milt Esquibel said one of the children ran to his house and knocked on the door. When Esquibel

went outside Maria Gonzales was lying in her driveway in a large pool of blood, he said.

"But by the time I got to her the pulse was very weak, and blood was gushing out of her chest," he said.

Esquibel said he has been a friend and neighbor to the Gonzales family for about five years. Jose Gonzales, a farmworker, was always nice and friendly and good to his children, he said. But recently Gonzales seemed out of touch or troubled, Esquibel said.

Maria Gonzales was an avid gardener and enjoyed flowers, he said.

A train was blocking Overland Avenue and Oakley Avenue when emergency vehicles were trying to respond, Esquibel said. "It seemed like it took a long time for them to get here because of the train."

"All we have is our faith, and our communities have been torn up by so much misfortune in the last three months that we should all set aside a day for prayer," he said.

"It will get worse if we don't. This is really a shock."

The two oldest children are married and live in the Mini-Cassia area, and the younger children — two teens and two preteens — are now staying with them, Esquibel said.

## Secret Service, White House at odds on files

Miller said "I have no idea" where Anthony B. Marceca, a longtime White House aide, received lists of employees from past Republican administrations that he used beginning in late 1993 to obtain sensitive FBI files.

The White House has said the episode was an innocent bureaucratic bungle and that Marceca was using an apparently outdated Secret Service list to update persons for White House access. Given that explanation, Miller's testimony seemed to generate still more questions in the two-week-old controversy, including: If the Secret Service did not provide the list, where did it come from? White House press secretary Mike Mc-

Curry said of the testimony, "Frankly, that has left us even more confused."

Senate and House committees scheduled more hearings next week to find the source of the list.

As events unfolded on Capitol Hill, another inquiry into the files took an abrupt turn as the Clinton administration shifted position and announced that it will halt its own investigation immediately and seek an outside inquiry instead.

Attorney General Janet Reno announced she will ask a federal court panel to expand the authority of Whitewater Independent Counsel Kenneth W. Starr to investigate how the more than 400 FBI background reports that included person-

al medical and financial data were sought and obtained by the White House.

Republicans had sharply criticized the administration for investigating the matter itself, arguing that the inquiry would not be objective.

Reno said she recognized the potential for problems in the investigation, which she took by FBI general counsel Howard Shapiro was allowed to continue. The FBI is a branch of the Justice Department.

"I have concluded that it would constitute a conflict of interest for the Department of Justice itself to investigate a matter involving an interaction between the White House and the FBI," she said.

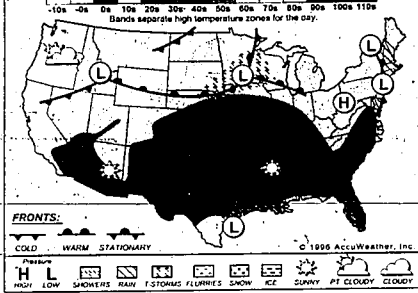

## West shivers as rain dampens Plains, Florida

Thunderstorms damped rain in Nebraska, Iowa and Florida on Thursday, while parts of the West shivered under record low temperatures.

Tropical storm Arthur was downgraded to a depression as it proved to be more of a nuisance than a hazard along the North Carolina coast.

By early Thursday morning, remnants of the storm had turned back toward the Atlantic Ocean.

The Lakes region enjoyed a break from this week's rain, but a new system expecting to bring storms this Friday evening was pushing its way toward the area.

A cold front extended from western Wisconsin to central Iowa and into eastern Colorado, where the front turned stationary into southern Wyoming and northern Utah.

Kalspell, Mont., set a record low Thursday, dropping to 31. This breaks the old record of 32 set in 1893.

## Today's weather fact

For many, hot weather is synonymous with outdoor fun; for others, hot weather kills.

Across the country 200 to 300 people will die this year from heat-related problems. On average, heat is responsible for more deaths than hurricanes, floods and tornadoes. Babies and the elderly tend to be most sensitive to the heat. The worst scenario occurs when the thermometer shows a lot of mercury joined with high humidity.

As the air becomes more humid the body cannot perspire as usual, which cuts the natural cooling factor. The body will continue to heat unless the environment changes.

# Soviets tested drugs on U.S. POWs in Korea

WASHINGTON (AP) — Several dozen American captives in the Korean War may have been used as "laboratory specimens" in military drug tests in North Korea and then executed, according to a former secret U.S. report made public Thursday.

The report dated April 27, 1992, said Air Force Intelligence officials first learned of the alleged program in September 1990 while debriefing an unidentified U.S. intelligence source on Soviet techniques on interrogating POWs.

"During the Korean War a Soviet

and Czech drug testing program used American and other United Nations POWs as laboratory specimens," the report said.

"At the conclusion of the testing program a number of American POWs were executed," the report said. "The individuals were executed to preclude public exposure of the information."

The report said the experimentation program's "primary objective was to develop methods of modifying human behavior and destroying psychological resistance."

Copies of the report were made public by Rep. Robert Dornan, R-Calif., at a House hearing that focused on other issues involving Korean War POWs and MIAs.

In a note attached to the report, Lt. Gen. James R. Clapper, Jr., then director of the Pentagon's Defense Intelligence Agency, wrote that his agency had extensively investigated the information provided by the unidentified source.

"Information uncovered by DIA indicates that up to several dozen unwilling participants in this pro-

gram may have been executed upon its conclusion in North Korea," Clapper wrote.

"The purpose of this program was to develop comprehensive interrogation techniques involving mental, psychological and drug-induced behavior modification," he continued.

The report did not say what kinds of drugs were used.

Clapper's note suggested that discovery of the experiments may not have been shared with Congress.

pre murder, but those charges have been reduced to accessory to murder. A first-degree murder charge against Mack in the death of Hood also was dropped after Corey Hood agreed to plead guilty to voluntary manslaughter in that death as well. Hood has not yet been formally charged with that crime.

Mae Hood, 75, grandmother to Corey Hood and Shannon Reeves, was killed in her home April 23. Wendy Hunter was killed May 16 at Hood's home. Both of the women's throats had been cut.

In his testimony Thursday, Hood said he picked Hunter up from her Heyburn home between 3 and 4 p.m. May 16. He said he killed her at 5 p.m.

"I went over and got her from her house. She came over, and we had sexual relations and then after I finished her," he said before he admitted to killing Hunter.

Hood said Reeves, Mack and Mines came to his house at 8 p.m. after he called Reeves, asking her for help. Hood said Mack and Mines helped him wrap Hunter's body in a sheet and put it in the trunk of Hood's girlfriend's car. The three also helped him clean the house and tear up the carpet

in his bedroom.

Hood's account of the episode on Thursday differed sharply from his first statement to police. Originally, Hood had told investigators that Mack had lured him to the house and had initiated a group murder of Hunter. Hood told police Mack had made him help cut Hunter's throat to frighten him out of talking about his grandmother's death.

Thursday, Hood testified that Mack dumped the body southeast of Rupert. The carpet and its padding were dumped nearby.

Mack returned to his home after 45 minutes. About 9:30 p.m., the four drove Mack's mother's red Ford Escort to the local Mr. Gas, where Hood bought beer. The Ford never left his house from the time the three friends arrived at 8 p.m. until they all left together to buy beer, Hood said.

Carlson picked holes in Hood's testimony.

- Carlson presented a receipt that showed Hood had bought the beer at 9:50 p.m. Carlson suggested that the time between 8 and 9:45 p.m. was not the time of the rip in carpet, wire down walls and other carpet in the house and dispose of a body.
- Although Hood claimed Reeves arrived at his house at 8

p.m., witnesses place Reeves at Brian Mack's home until 9 p.m.

- Brian Mack's mother testified she was using her red Escort until just before 9 p.m. Mack's sister testified that her brother, Mines and Reeves were at Mack's home until shortly after 9 p.m.
- Witnesses Vicki and Barbara Stanton testified that they met Mack and Reeves at the store between 9:30 p.m. and 9:45 p.m. at a Rupert grocery store.
- In other testimony, Rupert police Detective Terry Quinn said that Reeves, Mack and Mack's mother, Rolinda Mack, had told him two days after the Hunter's death that they had been to Corey Hood's home that night.
- They said they had heard news of Hunter's death, and Reeves said she thought it suspicious because she had seen blood in Hood's home.
- Reeves told Quinn that she, Mack and Mines had gone to Hood's house the night of Hunter's slaying, Quinn testified. The three looked through the house and found blood on Mack's bedroom walls and on sheets that hung as window curtains. No sheets were on the bed and Hood had a cut on his hand. They stayed long enough to look around the house and then

left.

Dewayne Prescott, an investigator for the state Department of Law Enforcement, testified that according to Reeves, Hood had explained the blood in the house and the cut on his hand with the story that three men jumped him earlier that night, Reeves told Prescott she saw a knife that appeared to have dried blood on it lying on a night stand beside Hood's bed. Prescott said he arrested her after the interview.

Det. Dan Kindig of the Minidoka County Sheriff's Department described the scene where Hunter's body was found. No effort was made to hide bloody clothes and carpet. Hunter's body was lying in tall sagebrush about 300 to 350 yards away from the other evidence.

As a result of Hood's plea bargain, he faces a maximum penalty of 20 years in prison and a \$30,000 fine. Each manslaughter charge carries a 15-year maximum penalty. Another three years could be tacked onto the sentence for probation violation in a 1995 rape conviction.

Hood has not been charged with raping Hunter.

Preliminary hearings for Mack and Mines are set for June 26.

# Freeman refuse to enter pleas at arraignments

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) — A judge entered innocent pleas Thursday for five Freeman after tossing one of the anti-government extremists from his courtroom during yet another arrest interrupted by outbursts.

Dale Jacobi, 54, was moved to a holding cell next door, where he could watch the proceedings via closed-circuit television.

"I hope your wife is really proud of you, wearing that wedding dress," Jacobi told the black-robed federal magistrate, Richard Anderson, during one of several disruptions before the 51-count indictment was read.

Anderson entered pleas for Jacobi, brothers Ralph and Em-

matt Clark, Rodney Skurdal and Cheryl Petersen on federal charges of conspiracy, bank and mail fraud, firearms violations and threatening to kidnap and murder. Petersen and her husband, a quadriplegic who uses a wheelchair, "Everything went well."

Both Steve Southwick, Lincoln County sheriff, and county Prosecutor Brit Groom said they didn't know whether state investigators consider disappointment over the farm loan denial a possible motive for the killings, which so far are being treated as a case of murder-suicide.

Chief investigator Clark Rollins couldn't be reached for comment Thursday.

"I don't know, and I've given (motive) an awful lot of thought," Southwick said. Southwick said he has thought of "five or six" possibilities for the deaths, but wouldn't comment on them.

Molestation is the suspected motive, a family member says.

McCoy, father of Denise McCoy, said he learned about the motive during a discussion with Rollins. Vic McCoy said he didn't know the motive for certain and that investigators told him not to discuss the case until all the evidence is in.

Rollins recently discussed the case "for two hours" with Vic McCoy and his wife and "it was obvious that he knows the details," Vic

McCoy said.

"My wife and I have said that all along," Vic McCoy said, referring to child molestation. He said he didn't know what molestation specifically; "I don't know what happened to whom."

Denise McCoy's family was found dead at a house 3.5 miles away from Schoolcraft's. Denise McCoy, 33, and her children — Genevieve King, 12; Jordan King, 10; Chelsea King, 8; and Adrianna McCoy, 2 — died of rifle shots to the head.

Although Denise McCoy died in the home of her father, Dean Barry III, she inheritedly lived in a low-income Twin Falls apartment complex as she put herself through the College of Southern Idaho's nursing program. The father of her three older children has admitted owing a \$15,000 child-support debt to the state of Idaho.

Authorities say spent rifle casings in the Barry home and in Schoolcraft's pickup indicate Schoolcraft killed the family, then himself. But they continue to investigate all leads.

# Kaczynski case tough but winnable, lawyers say

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Theodore Kaczynski is innocent because he believed he was saving lives when he killed. Or he is insane.

Or the pressured FBI doctored its lab results. Or the jury pool has been poisoned by a torrent of official leaks.

These are samples of the defenses federal prosecutors will likely face when they put the 54-year-old former math professor on trial for four Unabomber attacks, according to some of the nation's leading defense experts.

All agree justice department officials have already made mistakes that could come back to haunt them in a Sacramento federal court.

"They have leaked to hemorrhage proportions, and they have raised to epic proportions the expectations of the jurors," says Harvard law professor and legal commentator Alan Dershowitz. "And by charging him essentially as the Unabomber, the prosecution has taken on a burden it doesn't have."

Throwing doubt on even one of the Unabomber attacks could undermine the jury's confidence in the rest of the case, Dershowitz said.

The torrent of leaks appears to show an almost airtight case proving Kaczynski is the man whose anti-technology bombing campaign killed three and injured 23 over 18 years.

In Kaczynski's Montana cabin, investigators found the original draft of the Unabomber manifesto. And the Unabomber's nine-digit secret code number. And a typewriter — that matches Unabomber letters.

They have a close DNA match on stamps licked by Kaczynski and the Unabomber. They say the letters each write share similar ideas and phrasing. And they found a partially completed bomb in a carefully crafted wooden case — the signature of the Unabomber.

But rather than shackling the defense, the leaks can help, says Georgetown University law professor and constitutional expert Paul Rothstein, who suggests defense attorneys demand the case be thrown out.

"It's making it impossible to get a fair trial," Rothstein says. "He's been tried and found guilty already."

The leaks are more incriminating than in the O.J. Simpson case, he maintains, because they are so specific. And, unlike the Simpson case when leaks came from police, attorneys, friends of the victims and the news media, the Kaczynski leaks have only one source — the government.

One of Simpson's defense attorneys says potential jurors should keep that in mind.

"What's leaking out is going to be very manipulative, and people need to be very aware of that," says Gerald Uelman, dean of Santa Clara University law school.

Kaczynski's lawyers must immediately hire expert witnesses and pick apart the government's apparent case, Uelman suggests. The DNA match, for example. Search documents say 3 percent of the population shares the characteristics of the saliva on the stamps.

"It's certainly relevant, but it still leaves 6 million people out there," Uelman says. "And finding a nail in a bomb and finding a nail in a coffee can in his cabin doesn't get you very far either."

Tony Serra, the radical San Francisco attorney whose story was thinly disguised in the James Woods movie "True Believer," says he'd be eager to take the case — and has a novel defense ready. Under the "imperfect self-defense" doctrine, a person who believes he was acting in defense of himself or others — even if that belief is unreasonable — may be convicted of lesser charges.

And that could be coupled with

the "necessity" defense, in which the defendant claims he broke the law to prevent a far greater harm — the man who speeds to get his pregnant wife to the hospital, for instance, Serra says.

"Taking the Unabomber's philosophy, he has a bona fide belief that the forces of business, capitalism and government have combined in a fashion that will ultimately destroy the fabric of our society," Serra says. "He kills to stop this great disaster that is impending for mankind."

Rothstein says he would lean toward the traditional insanity defense. "You would need a diagnosis of genuine mental illness," Rothstein says, a task that doesn't appear difficult in the case of Kaczynski, who was described as "pathologically shy" by the head of the math department at the University of California at Berkeley where he taught in the late 1960s.

"Then you would rely heavily on expert testimony and heavily on the aberrational weighing and balancing that he does in the manifesto," he says.

"Do you put Kaczynski on the stand? Maybe, Rothstein says, "if he appeared obviously nuts and not personally offensive. But if he seemed hostile and dangerous and had a superficial rationality to him, that would be the worst thing for Kaczynski."

California juries in particular seem sympathetic to defenses that cite external reasons for aberrant mental behavior, he adds.

Not in Sacramento, warns one of this area's top defense attorneys. Donald Heller, the former federal prosecutor who tried Manson-family member Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme for trying to assassinate President Ford in 1975.

Sacramento isn't San Francisco or Los Angeles, and the jury will come not only from this city but from the entire Eastern District of

California, 25 mostly rural counties stretching into the Sierra Nevada, Heller says. "You are going to get a really conservative circus" — there will be no cameras and no tapes. Jury selection will be done not by attorneys but by U.S. District Judge Garland Burrell, "who is very stern and absolutely in control of his courtroom," he says.

Several attorneys suggested the focus of the defense should not be a total acquittal, but rather saving Kaczynski from the death penalty. Can the defense win? The experts use the same words. "Hard," says Dershowitz. "Tough," says Rothstein. "Difficult," says Rubin.

But all agree — if O.J. Simpson can be acquitted, Kaczynski's guilt is far from a foregone conclusion.

## California Supreme Court softens 'three strikes' law

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The state's highest court ruled Thursday that California's "three strikes" law is not mandatory, saying judges are not required to send a repeat offender away for 25 years to life if they think the sentence is too harsh.

In a decision that could affect thousands of cases, the state Supreme Court unanimously ruled that the widely publicized 1994 sentencing law did not eliminate judges' authority to disregard a previous conviction "in the furtherance of justice."

The court said those already sentenced under it could seek new sentences.

Supporters have said the law as written required a sentence of 25 years to life in prison for anyone who has two previous convictions for violent or serious felonies and is convicted of any new felony.

The only exception would be when a prosecutor decided to bring a more lenient sentence was justified. But today's ruling interprets the law as giving judges the

same power as prosecutors.

That angered Mike Reynolds, who sponsored the petition that put the issue before voters after his daughter was murdered.

"We felt like it was pretty clear that we limited judges' power in this statute," Reynolds said.

Even before the ruling, Secretary of State Bill Jones, legislative sponsor of the law, and Assembly Speaker Curt Pringle said they would sponsor a new measure making it clear that only prosecutors should have the power to overrule three-strikes sentences.

However, that may prove difficult. Six of the court's seven justices said a law that tied judges' hands outright would violate the constitutional separation of powers. That means a law could be passed only by a state constitutional amendment approved by the voters.

Twenty states have some version of a "three strikes, you're out" law.

## Perot party splits convention in 2

DALLAS (AP) — Ross Perot's Reform Party will bracket its first national convention around the Republican National Convention this August, organizers said Thursday.

Part One of the Reform Party convention will be held in Long Beach, Calif., on Aug. 11 — one day before Republicans begin their San Diego convention. Part Two will come a week later on Aug. 18 in Valley Forge, Pa. The party had no details on how the split convention would be organized.

Organizers announced the convention dates as Texas officials certified Perot to once again be on the November ballot in his home state as an independent. This time, though, Perot's new party is promoting him as merely a stand-in for its no-voice-selected candidate — Perot-himself-has-not-said whether he will run.

Reform Party supporters have thrown themselves into a countrywide petition-gathering campaign to get either the party or their candidate on ballots for this year's presidential election. Texas is the 17th state where they have been successful in one form or other.

Texas Secretary of State Tony Garza said the necessary 61,540 valid signatures were contained among the approximately 160,000 signatures turned in on May 13.

## Sedative in spotlight

WASHINGTON (AP) — An illegal sedative nicknamed the "date rape" drug should be put in the same category as heroin, cocaine and LSD in the next three months, the Drug Enforcement Administration said Thursday.

The agency recommended that Rohypnol, connected to more than 2,400 criminal investigations nationwide, be declared a Schedule I drug, DEA spokesman Jim McGivney said.

The government will study the medical effects of the drug.

# ValuJet's future cloudy as airline tries to fly again

WASHINGTON (AP) — If ValuJet manages to return to the skies it will do so at first with just 15 planes, less than one-third the fleet it was using when Flight 592 plunged into the Everglades.

The consent order shutting down the low-price airline set that limit for a resumption of flights — and assessed the airline \$2 million — while disclosing a liability of maintenance slippage.

• A plane struck by lightning in July 1995 was used on at least nine more flights despite having only temporary repairs to a damaged control surface.

• Between June 5, 1995 and March 14, 1996 crews complained about problems with the weather radar on one plane 31 times without getting an effective repair.

• Repairs on one plane with a hole in the engine cover and another with hydraulic fluid inside a pressure gauge were improperly deferred.

• After a plane had problems with the landing gear in Boston a crew was told to ferry it to Washington with landing gear extended. During the flight the gear raised and lowered the gear several times. Maintenance workers in Washington then "noted" that the gear was working and returned the plane to service with no further action.

• Reports of such sloppy maintenance eventually led to ValuJet's voluntary shutdown on Monday.

• It can return to service after meeting a series of inspection and maintenance criteria set by the FAA and airline officials have expressed hope to get that done within a month.

• But the airline, which was using more than 50 planes at the time of the May 11 accident that killed 110 people, will initially be limited to 15 if it gets back into the skies, the consent order shows.

• Under the order, the airline

agreed to pay the FAA \$500,000 immediately and another \$1.5 million within 60 days to help defray the costs of the agency's intense inspection program for the airline.

The airline does not admit any guilt and the FAA agrees not to pursue any civil penalty against it "except for violations of regulations concerning hazardous materials."

While the National Transportation Safety Board has not reached any conclusion about the cause of the May 11 accident, investigators are leaning toward blaming a fire started by oxygen generators carried in the plane's cargo hold.

ValuJet is not authorized to carry such hazardous cargo, though the airline contends that a contractor which packed the small generators labeled them empty.

The FAA is also investigating a report that mechanics working for a subcontractor falsified paperwork to indicate the canisters had been properly sealed before being loaded into the cargo hold.

In a separate report issued Thursday, the Safety Board released details of a ValuJet incident in Nashville on Jan. 7 that may have resulted from equipment problems.

The flight from Atlanta experienced problems with its cabin air pressure. The crew corrected the

problem by changing two circuit breakers, according to the report, which presents findings but does not draw any conclusions.

To avoid rapid depressurization on landing, the crew decided to

reset the circuit breakers at touch-down, a task that briefly distracted the pilot. The report says the plane struck the runway while descending too rapidly. The flight lifted off again, went around, and made a safe emergency landing, the report said.

While maintenance problems have not become a factor in the crash investigation, they have drawn sharp focus to the airline in the weeks since the accident.

The FAA was already investigating the airline for maintenance problems starting in February, and intensified that effort after the accident. In the process, the agency also found problems in its own regulatory supervision of airlines like

ValuJet that contract most of their training and maintenance work to other companies.

On Tuesday the agency announced that Anthony Broderick, its top safety administrator, was being replaced and set a series of new standards for airlines to supervise contractors doing maintenance for them.

Aviation consultant David Stempler on Thursday called for an aviation summit to consider reorganizing the FAA itself.

"The American people question their safety in airplanes," Stempler said in a letter to Transportation Secretary Federico Pena.

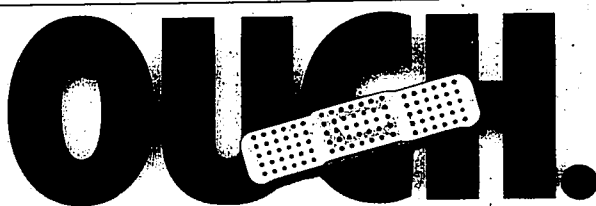

### Clinton announces community grants

WASHINGTON — President Clinton announced \$46 million in grants Thursday to help police forces in hundreds of communities combat domestic violence.

"This will work," the president said, citing the work of the police department in San Diego, where he said community policing cut the domestic homicide rate by 50 percent.

Clinton said the grants will give police forces rooted in the community with the experience of people who have been fighting domestic violence for a long time, Clinton said.

### Lawmaker considers FDA reforms

WASHINGTON — Agreement could be near on House legislation to streamline the federal review of drugs, but a major roadblock remains on reworking the approval process for food, a key Republican said Thursday.

Rep. James Greenwood of Pennsylvania, the point man on legislation to overhaul the Food and Drug Administration, said he hopes to offer compromise language next week on three bills-changing the review process for new medicines, foods and medical devices.

### Gay.GOP group loses court battle

AUSTIN, Texas — The Texas Supreme Court ruled that the state GOP does not have to provide exhibit space to a gay Republican group at the party's state convention.

The Republican-majority court Wednesday unanimously overturned a lower court ruling that ordered state Republicans to provide the Log Cabin Republicans of Texas a booth assignment at the convention and allow the group to buy ad space in the convention program.

Party officials had argued that political parties have the right to determine what can be exhibited at their conventions, and they didn't want the Log Cabin group because the group's goals conflict with the party platform, which opposes homosexuality.

### Crib death guidelines released by CDC

ATLANTA — For the first time, the government has issued investigation guidelines to help coroners and police distinguish between crib death and homicide in infants who die suddenly.

Over the years, some murders have been mistakenly classified as crib death, also known as Sudden Infant Death Syndrome.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention on Thursday released a standardized, six-page form for noting such things as the position of the infant's body, any suspected injuries and any evidence of drug use in the home.

### Family killed in plane crash

LOS ANGELES — G. David Schine — focus of the congressional hearings in the 1950s that led to the downfall of Sen. Joseph McCarthy — his wife and their son were killed Wednesday when their single-engine plane crashed moments after takeoff from Burbank airport, police said.

The plane, which may have suffered engine failure, apparently fell short while attempting an emergency landing on Interstate 5.

The disabled Beechcraft Sundowner emerged down toward the traffic-filled roadway, its wings dipping back and forth, then smashed into the ground just yards from the busy freeway, witnesses said.

### Settlement bans use of chain gangs

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — A year after Alabama became the first state in the nation to revive the use of chain gangs, state officials faced with a lawsuit have agreed to abandon the gangs permanently.

The practice of shackling five inmates together with leg irons while the work on roadside cleanup will never again be used in Alabama under an agreement reached by lawyers for inmates, state prison officials and Gov. Fob James.

## High Court overturns Land Board decision

**BOISE** — The Idaho Supreme Court unanimously overturned an Idaho Land Board decision Thursday, saying the board exceeded its authority by denying a state grazing lease to Halley conservationist Jon Marvel.

Marvel was the lone bidder at a January, 1994 auction for a 10-year grazing lease in Custer County. Cattle rancher Will Ingram wanted to renew his lease on the land, but refused to bid against Marvel at the auction.

In addition to reversing the Land Board's decision, the Supreme Court also overturned a lower-court decision by District Judge James May. The High Court remanded the case back for "action

consistent with this opinion."

The dispute reached the Supreme Court after May rejected Marvel's appeal of the Land Board decision to give the lease to Ingram. Because he didn't bid, Ingram was not a "qualified bidder" for the 640-acres of state-owned land, wrote Supreme Court Chief Justice Charles McDevitt.

"That's not the way Ingram's wife, Vangie, remembered the auction. We were told that we did not have to bid. They said our presence signified our participation in the auction," she said Thursday. Will Ingram was unavailable for comment.

The Idaho Watersheds Project, which Marvel leads, argued "that a party must actually place a bid at a conflict auction in order to be considered a qualified

applicant for a lease of state public lands."

"We agree," McDevitt wrote for the court.

State law holds that the Idaho Department of Lands shall "conduct an auction" and lease the land to the highest premium bid," McDevitt wrote. "The rationale behind the requirement of conducting an auction is to solicit competing bids."

The high court did not award attorney's fees to the Idaho Watersheds Project, which is seeking to keep cows out of tender streamside areas and protect spawning habitat for chinook salmon.

Attorneys on both sides said the high court's decision was narrowly framed on the fact that Ingram didn't bid. The decision did not address subsequent auctions

in which Marvel topped bids from other ranchers — but the ranchers got the leases anyway.

"It's a mildly hopeful decision, but not very," said Ketchum attorney Debra Kronenberg, who argued Marvel's case before the Supreme Court.

"There's not as much guidance as I'd like to have seen, but there is some guidance if you read between the lines — and that is that the board has to take the auctions seriously," Kronenberg said. "I think if the Land Board does not take its auctions seriously, the court will be inclined to overturn the decision."

The Land Board is composed of Idaho's highest elected officials: governor, attorney general, state controller, secretary of

### Counterfeit currency results in arrests

**BUHL** — Local and federal law enforcers arrested two Elmore County residents Thursday afternoon on charges of producing thousands of dollars in counterfeit currency.

The Buhl Police Department, aided by the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office and the U.S. Secret Service, arrested Steven Condon, 23, and his wife Staci Condon, 18, in front of a Buhl residence at about 4:15 p.m., said Buhl Police Officer Stephen Kiskis.

"They knew the gig was up as soon as we showed up," Kiskis said. Law enforcers confiscated about \$1,350 worth of counterfeit money at the residence, along with manufacturing equipment and tools. Agents have also recovered \$1,090 from various businesses throughout town.

The counterfeit currency is of poor quality, appearing to be black-and-white (photocopies) of \$20 and \$50 bills," Kiskis said.

Secret Service agents had been trying to gather leads on the case since May 1, and were summoned to the investigation shortly after the Buhl Police Department received information on the possible location of the counterfeit currency on Tuesday, he said.

Kiskis urged those who believe they have seen counterfeit currency to contact the Buhl Police Department, the U.S. Secret Service or their local law enforcement agency.

### Rape conviction overturned new charge aggravated battery

**BURLEY** — A man convicted nearly two years ago of raping a Burley woman had his conviction reduced to aggravated battery Thursday after his former sentence drastically reduced.

Fifth District Judge Roger Burdick sentenced Gilbert Chapa, 44, of Burley, to 10 to 15 years in prison for aggravated battery. A Cassia County jury convicted Chapa of rape in 1993. At that time Burdick sentenced him to 20 years to life in prison.

The Idaho Court of Appeals granted Chapa a new trial in August 1995, because the Cassia County jury had not been instructed correctly. However, Chapa waived his chance at a second trial in March of this year when he opted to plead guilty to the reduced charge. At that time, Burdick said he accepted the guilty plea to save the victim from having to testify again. Also, some witnesses could not be located, he said.

After he pleaded guilty to aggravated battery in March, Chapa had 45 days to find evidence that could prove his innocence.

## Residents upset at plea bargain

**RUPERT** — Minidoka County Commission Chairman John Rensberg has been spending a lot of time on the telephone.

He said more than 15 county residents called him in less than 24 hours Wednesday and Thursday to complain about Minidoka County's role in prosecuting a man who confessed in court Thursday to raping and killing 17-year-old Wendy Hunter of Rupert.

In a plea bargain, Corey Hood also has agreed to plead guilty to killing his grandmother, Mae Hood of Heyburn on April 23.

Rensberg said people are upset because County Prosecutor Cara Newman arranged a plea bargain with Hood, and county residents want him tried for murder.

The plea bargain would reduce charges against Hood to two counts of voluntary manslaughter. Each charge carries a maximum jail sentence of 15 years and \$15,000 in fines.

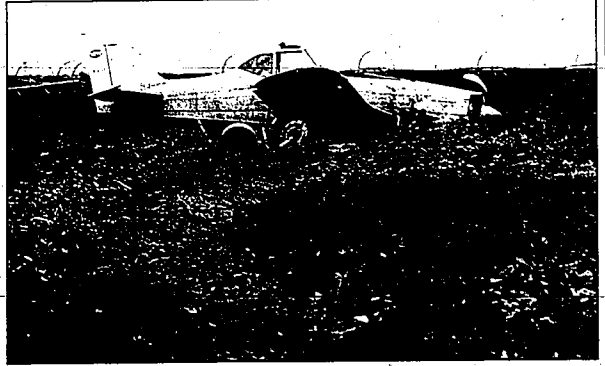
Also included in the deal, Newman has agreed not to charge Hood with rape as long as he gives truthful testimony against the co-defendants in the case, Shannah Reeves, Brian Mack and Matthew Mines.

During a court proceeding Thursday, Newman reiterated that if Hood is caught being untruthful while testifying against those co-defendants, the plea bargain is off. Hood has told at least three different stories about what happened on May 16 to investigators. May 16 is the day Wendy Hunter died.

"Everybody is wondering what is happening," Rensberg said. "When a person admits to committing another person's throat that sounds like a pretty damn serious crime to me."

## Craig, Minnick duel over gun control

**BOISE** — Democrat Walt Minnick and Republican Sen. Larry Craig squared off over guns Thursday, and Minnick accused Craig of lying about the challenger's stand on gun control.

"I started hunting when I was 12," Minnick said. "I am a strong supporter of the Second Amendment, and Larry, Craig knows it."

In a fund-raising letter sent last week over his signature, Craig said Minnick does "a campaign against the Second Amendment" and is "picking up a lot of money from many of the gun-control advocates who are looking for any way

they can to defeat me." "All charges are patently untrue," Minnick declared and then blasted Craig for his visible role in the National Rifle Association as one of its board

members and a vocal advocate of gun ownership at the same time he is not a sportsman.

"That dog doesn't hunt, and neither does Larry Craig," Minnick said.

A check of computerized files at the Fish and Game Department showed Craig purchased neither a hunting nor a fishing license in 1988, 1994, 1995 and 1996. But in 1987 and 1989, Craig purchased hunting and fishing licenses although he did not purchase any tags or stamps so his hunting opportunities were limited to grouse, jackrabbits and coyotes.

The same check showed that Minnick bought a combination hunting-fishing license this past March 21 but pur-

chased only fishing licenses in 1988, 1989, 1994 and 1995. He bought neither in 1987.

"Access to records for 1990 through 1993 was not immediately possible."

"For the senator, he feels that the Second Amendment rights, whether he utilizes that particular amendment or not, feels its pretty important to protect those rights," Craig spokesman Mike Tracy said. "I would think it's strange for someone who is a lifelong hunter to work to restrict those rights."

Tracy justified the attack on Minnick through the challenger's past support of the so-called Brady Bill that requires criminal background checks before a

# GOP delegates mull relatively moderate abortion language

NAMPA (AP) — Delegates to this week's Idaho Republican Party convention will consider the same relatively moderate anti-abortion platform plank adopted by delegates in 1994, despite a push for tougher language.

If something is working well, there's not a whole lot of point in fixing it," retiring state Sen. David Kerrick of Caldwell, chairman of the convention's platform committee, said Thursday.

That was the prevailing view of Kerrick's committee endorsed a number of changes to the state GOP platform that was passed by delegates two years ago, almost all involving minor points, semantics or updates to reflect changing circumstances.

The new platform will be adopted Saturday the first day of the three-day convention and likely the last day the document will be taken seriously.

But a few members of the platform subcommittee considered less than ideal and welfare issues urged a change in the section of the American Family plan dealing with abortion.

It states the party's opposition to "the Clinton administration's plan for use of taxpayers' dollars for abortions except to save the life of the mother."

It also reaffirms Republican "support for the sanctity of life and the rights of the unborn child. We do not support abortion based on sex selection, convenience or birth control. We

encourage adoption as an alternative to abortion. We recognize many strong and diverse views within our party membership."

Doyle Beckoff of Idaho Falls proposed language supporting a constitutional amendment to restrict abortion and appointment of anti-abortion judges. And Don Schanz of Idaho Falls added, "I think we ought to just scratch that last sentence."

"You'll get the party apart if you do that," said state Rep. Robbi King of Glenns Ferry, citing a 1992 GOP convention floor fight on the issue.

That debate came in the wake of Republicans' devastating 1990 election losses, which were blamed in large measure on the GOP-dominated Legislature's passage of a 1989 state abortion law. Most restrictive state abortion law. Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus vetoed the legislation.

The subcommittee chaired by state Sen. Gordon Crow of Hayden invited several groups to maintain the 1994 platform language on abortion after Helen Lowder of Boise and LeAnne Ainsworth of Shoshone, who said the party could not afford to impose a litmus test on the issue and must respect individual freedom.

The platform committee endorsed the recommendation without discussion.

Presumptive GOP presidential nominee Bob Dole has said he wants

to preserve existing language in the national platform supporting a constitutional amendment banning abortion, but wants to include a statement acknowledging that differences exist among Republicans on the issue.

On other issues, the platform committee endorsed Gov. Phil Batt's October 1995 agreement with the federal government that traded resumption of nuclear dumping at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory for promises that most waste at the site will be cleaned up by 2035. Proposed language calls the deal "the best possible alternative to contain and diminish any possible risks of nuclear contamination of Idaho's environment."

A group called Stop the Shipments is campaigning to put an initiative on the November ballot to overturn Batt's agreement.

Endorsed groundwater recharge, along with acquisition of new reservoir sites, as a method of helping Idaho restore water resources.

Deleted language specifically opposing reservoir drawdowns as a solution for restoring endangered salmon runs, but maintained a caution that the party's belief in Idaho's right to appropriate and manage water within its own borders without interference from the federal government.

# Chenoweth seeks advice from ethics committee

"I am deeply regretful for any violations that have occurred," Chenoweth wrote in her first statement on the potential ethics violation since it came to light earlier this week.

"I accept full responsibility for any errors and have taken steps to ensure they do not recur."

House rules prohibit using a congressional office for campaign matters.

Chenoweth stated in the letter that campaign matters and contribution solicitations were never part of any of the several such meetings she has recently held in her office. She said the sole purpose of the sessions was to find common

# INEL study finds potential risk, no imminent danger

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A new study indicates that leaky roofs and earthquakes at Idaho National Engineering Laboratory facilities could cause radiation dangers to workers or the environment because of the way some uranium is stored.

But there's no imminent accident risk, the study concluded, and it would take an unusual series of events to trigger a radiation accident.

As part of a nationwide Department of Energy study to learn the risks from storing highly enriched uranium, radiation scientists spent the last two weeks at INEL.

After studying INEL reports and visiting storage facilities, the review team found that local officials have caught most of the potential problems, team leader Pranab Guba said.

Of greatest concern was a deteriorating storage building at the Idaho Chemical Processing Plant. Its roof is leaking over a concrete cell that holds about 150 kilograms of uranium ash. If an earthquake cracked the cell and caused it to leak as well, the water could cause the uranium to react and release radiation.

After studying INEL reports and visiting storage facilities, the review team found that local officials have caught most of the potential problems, team leader Pranab Guba said.

# FBI agent cleared in Ruby Ridge probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of six suspended FBI agents was cleared by federal prosecutors conducting a criminal investigation of the agency's role in the deadly 1992 siege at Ruby Ridge, Idaho, and its aftermath.

U.S. Attorney Michael R. Siles of Philadelphia, who heads the investigation, advised the FBI that Anthony A. Betz is no longer considered either a target or a subject of the Ruby Ridge investigation, the FBI said Thursday.

The decision about Betz did not imply any conclusions about the other five agents, including former FBI Deputy Director Larry Potts, one senior official said, requesting anonymity. Resolution of their cases

is not imminent, this official said.

At the time of standoff with white separatist Randy Weaver, Betz was a unit chief in the criminal investigative division at FBI headquarters. Betz had been suspended along with three other high-ranking FBI officials last Aug. 11 when the criminal investigation was opened.

The probe focused initially on whether bureau officers had lied and destroyed documents to cover up the bureau's actions during the siege. The investigators also have reviewed the conduct of agents at the scene, where an FBI sniper killed Weaver's unarmed wife, Vicki. The sniper said he hit her accidentally while aiming at an

armed friend of Weaver's.

With approval from the Justice Department's Office of Professional Responsibility, an internal watchdog unit, the FBI lifted Betz' suspension and returned him to his post at that time, assistant chief of the FBI's Baltimore office.

Suspended with Betz and Potts, who supervised the siege from headquarters, were Danny O. Coulson, Potts' deputy during the siege, and Gale Richard Evans, the violent crimes unit chief at headquarters then.

At least one of those four had admitted destroying FBI documents about the Ruby Ridge siege and at least one other had admitted

knowing about such destruction, a Justice Department official said at the time of the suspensions. Potts made no such admission, the official said.

Suspended earlier was E. Michael Kahoe, who headed an early review team.

He was suspended for lack of control after he admitted destroying the bureau's after-action analysis of the standoff, Justice officials said.

Last Oct. 24, a sixth agent, George Michael "Mike" Baird, was suspended. The allegations against Baird stemmed from his work as an inspector's aide on a team that conducted an internal investigation of the incident in 1993-94.

# Counties want more say in how money is spent

LEWISTON (AP) — County leaders say they want more discretion in how they spend state funds dealing with juvenile problems.

Final sessions of the Idaho Association of Counties, which were highlighted by a report from Michael Johnson, director of the Department of Juvenile Justice, Johnson said he wanted to avoid the "big brother" attitude of government.

But he said state funding for juvenile problems must be used exclusively for crime prevention programs and probation, not for detention costs. Detention expense must be borne by counties, Johnson said.

In 1995, the Legislature approved the transfer of some parts of the juvenile corrections system to counties.

A block grant system was set up. Grants would cover prevention programs like scouting for juvenile offenders, community council creating a "school within a school" for troubled kids.

Dan Chadwick, association executive director, said counties are concerned about having their hands tied by the state over what's best for their communities, prevention or detention for juvenile crimes.

Elaine Vincenti, director of Latah County Youth Services, said new laws have extended penalties for juveniles. Maximum sentences for felonies have gone from 90 days to 180 days and misdemeanors from 30 days to 90 days.

"When you make a law more punitive, you need to expect detention costs to rise," Vincenti said. "Our detention costs soared last year."

Johnson said there is always a temptation to use the money for detention but counties need to concentrate more on prevention.

Chadwick warned that if counties cannot foot the bill for heavier juvenile sentences, judges may begin to turn detention cases over to the state anyway.

# Environmentalists win partial victory

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The U.S. Forest Service has rejected most of an environmental appeal challenging an experimental logging program in the Targhee National Forest, but has upheld enough of it to delay the logging.

Targhee officials had planned to start logging Douglas fir in Camas Creek on the south slope of the Centennial Mountains this summer.

The rationale for the suppression of natural fires during the past century has allowed the fires to crowd out species, which are among the first species to thrive after fires.

Environmental groups protested that the program was just a timber sale disguised as ecosystem management and appealed several legal

issues to the agency's regional office in Utah.

The response, issued Wednesday, backed Targhee officials on all but one issue — the use of mechanical loggers and tractors in an area that

previously was designated for helicopter logging to prevent disturbance of unstable soils.

Targhee officials decided to use the machines because of the high cost of transporting logs by helicopters.

But the regional office agreed with environmentalists that the decision was made without adequate analysis

of the potential for soil erosion and water quality damage.

Targhee planners must produce a new analysis that shows the likely effects.

That was enough to give some of the appellants hope.

"Basically this starts the process all over again," said Marv Hoyt of the Greater Yellowstone Coalition.

The ruling could delay the logging by up to a year, and new evidence turned up by the analysis could give opponents former standing to challenge the wisdom of logging in a relatively pristine area, said Kim

Davitt, a resource specialist with Montana-based American Wildlands.

Other appellants included the Alliance for the Wild Rockies, Native Ecosystems Council and Northern Rockies Preservation Project.

Efforts to reach Targhee officials who have followed the appeal were unsuccessful Thursday.

In the rest of the appeal, the regional office agreed with local foresters that the Targhee is not a significant contributor to downstream sedimentation in Camas Creek and that planners adequately researched the cumulative effect of the experimental logging with other planned timber sales.

departments, Oster said.

"We could feasibly leave at least the majority of those six (proposed police cuts) on the force," he said. "That doesn't mean we will."

Moore said if all the positions were kept, "I've just wouldn't have money for other

emergency services."

If Jerome cuts two fire department employees, it will lose full-time coverage and its rating as a full-time fire department, which would cost taxpayers money, Oster said.

"You can't cut yourself so far that you jeopardize yourself," Oster said.

However, if the initiative doesn't pass this November, the city may be able to re-hire some of the employees that had their positions cut, Moore said.

"It's really difficult for the City Council and the administration because we don't know if it's going to pass or if the Supreme Court is going to find it unconstitutional," he said.

If the initiative does pass, Oster said, "I can envision that the state will do something."

If the One Percent went through, as it is written, next spring, they will make adjustments and add other means of support for the state," he said.

# Authorities may dig up toddler's remains

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Authorities may dig up the remains of a toddler found in the Arizona desert in 1990 to positively identify her as the daughter of a Las Vegas couple who died in a plane crash.

Prosecutors say they would decide within a few days whether to exhume the body of Francine Meegan from a cemetery in Prescott, Ariz.

Deputy District Attorney John Lukens said the remains could be necessary to match DNA and for other toxicological tests needed for the trial of Francine's father, James Meegan.

"I will probably ask to move back the trial," Lukens said of the July 8 trial date set for Meegan. "The identity will be established. But we may have to exhume the body if necessary."

Lukens said DNA tests performed on the blood taken from the body when it was found buried in a desert wash in October 1990 has degraded and that further specialized tests were being done on it to positively identify the baby as Francine Meegan.

The toddler's mother, Lillian Meegan, has already given police a statement saying she watched as her husband set fire to their daughter in the desert ravine.

Lillian Meegan appeared in court Thursday, where she refused to sign a new plea bargain agreement requested by prosecutors in the case.

"Lukens said an agreement mistakenly filed does not specify that Lillian Meegan has to testify against her husband. But he said it

makes no difference, as prosecutors will call her as a witness if necessary.

Lillian Meegan is scheduled to be sentenced July 9 on her plea to first-degree child abuse, but that sentencing is expected to be postponed until after her husband's trial.

Under the plea bargain agreement, Meegan will not argue for jail time for Lillian Meegan, who faces up to 20 years in prison on the charge.

Authorities believe the burned body of the baby found in the desert is that of Francine. The death came months after the infant was sold to a California couple for \$30,000, then taken back when the Meegans failed to obtain more money for her.

Cowboys rounding up horses in the desert thought they had found a doll when they came across the infant lying on her back, mouth agape, arms outstretched. Her skin was blackened and blistered after she was doused with gasoline and set on fire.

Prosecutors said she died after being shaken in a fit of anger then was put in a suitcase and driven to Arizona where she was set on fire in a desert ravine off Interstate 17 between Phoenix and Flagstaff.

Prosecutors said the couple moved from their neighborhood shortly after the killing, and no one ever noticed the child was missing. It wasn't until police were tipped in February by the former-boyfriend of Lillian Meegan's sister that an investigation was launched.

handgun is sold and on Minnick's statement in an October newspaper report that he supported "some sensible controls" on guns.

Minnick concedes support for the criminal background checks, but he maintained he has consistently said he favors no new gun control legislation and in fact opposed the assault weapons ban that he pointed out was initially supported by Craig.

But Tracy countered that while Craig voted for the crime bill in 1993 that included the assault weapons ban, he publicly supported the gun-control provisions to be deleted when differences with the House version were resolved. "When they were not deleted, Tracy said, Craig voted against the compromise version the next summer.

As for Minnick's campaign

being financed by gun-control advocates, Tracy said that statement was justified by a \$5,000 contribution Minnick received last month from the National Education Association, which has supported the Brady Bill as well as the assault weapons ban. Tracy claimed a list of other Minnick contributors who back gun control but did not provide it. Minnick has raised over \$600,000 so far.

"As far as we're concerned, the NEA contribution alone justifies the statement," Tracy said. "We just don't know how many others there are but I'm sure they will surface."

### System fails in holding absent dads accountable

The father of three of the children who were murdered in Lincoln County earlier this month admits he owes Idaho's welfare system \$15,000 in back child support.

And if you think that amount of debt is unusual among absent fathers, then you haven't talked with the people who run Idaho's beleaguered child-support enforcement system.

Five-figure tabs aren't uncommon, and neither are deadbeat dads who haven't paid a dime of support in years.

Nationally, our system of holding fathers accountable is a travesty. Of the 10 million absent dads, more than half don't pay any child support at all, according to a Knight-Ridder Newspapers report.

That's a major reason why 47 percent of families living in poverty in this land are headed by single mothers, according to the Census Bureau.

President Clinton, with his unerring sense of what sells politically, has jumped into this issue with both feet. He's going to require mothers to provide the names of their children's fathers before they can get welfare benefits.

Wow. Sounds suspiciously like the 1980 Republican Party Platform.

Despite his pledge four years ago to end welfare "as we know it," the president has done little about deadbeat dads. What progress has been made has come at the state level.

Consider how the system breaks down:

- Only 20 to 30 percent of fathers are even identified out of 1 million births to unmarried moms, according to the U.S. Commission on Interstate Child Support.

- The custodial parent can easily get a child-support order from the

court, and yet two-fifths of mothers don't even think that step.

- When he is ordered to pay, Dad often makes payments for a while, then either falls behind or stops paying — often because of a dispute over how Mom is spending the money.

- If and when the system finally catches up with him and starts withholding wages or seizing bank accounts, the offending parent often simply crosses state lines and skips from job to job. That's a big reason why only \$1 in \$10 from interstate child support is ever collected.

We need a sea change on this issue, and there's some evidence that it's coming.

The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, for example, will soon start genetic testing of newborns to determine paternity. And beginning July 1, some of legal roadblocks that absent fathers use to keep from paying in Idaho will be removed, and their driver's and fishing licenses can be confiscated until they make amends.

The courts could help by making divorce a less adversarial procedure, and giving non-custodial fathers a bigger say in decisions about how children are raised. The mediation process, now under way in Idaho and elsewhere, is a big step in that direction.

But in the long run, the true need is for states and local governments to devote enough resources to deal with this problem, and to streamline the process for making out-of-state fathers pay what they owe.

After all, the average deadbeat dad had a household income of \$32,102 in 1990, according to Knight-Ridder. Four-fifths of them were working.

This isn't a question of money. It's a question of will.

Armed gangs lie in wait for unsuspecting truckers or motorists like you and me on the highways, farmers are murdered as they work in their farms, pensioners are killed in their homes, women are raped (one every 83 seconds) or gang-raped, and police on or off duty are constantly being attacked and murdered (many hundreds in 1995). A sad and sorry state of affairs indeed. Nobody feels safe anywhere at any time.

In consequence, many people are leaving the country they love and, of course, taking their skills with them. Immigration rose 22 percent in January 1996, compared with a year ago. Yet we are told by President Mandela that nobody need feel threatened as long as the African National Congress is in power and that if we leave we are betraying the country.

Every standard is falling and we fear South Africa is fast becoming just another Third World, one-party state. Is this what the world wanted?

**U.S. demands new leadership at U.N.**

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The U.S. threat to veto a second term for Secretary-General Boutros-Ghali set the stage Thursday for a bruising fight for the top U.N. job at a time when the organization faces its gravest internal crisis.

In Washington, State Department spokesman Nicholas Burns said President Clinton had decided "new leadership is needed in the United Nations" and that the United States would oppose any second term.

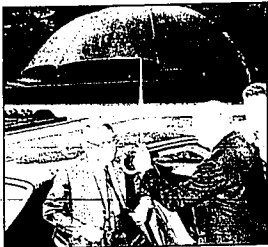
White House spokesman Mike McCurry said the United States would use its Security Council veto if necessary to block his re-election.

The 73-year-old Egyptian diplomat has plenty of supporters at the United Nations, notably France, Russia, China and countries of Africa, Latin America and Asia.

Many of them resent U.S. influence over the United Nations at a time when Washington has withheld paying its \$1 billion back dues to demand reform.

Virtually every other U.N. member blames the U.S. failure to pay its bills for the deep crisis in confidence plaguing the bankrupt organization, following what some perceive as failed missions in Somalia, Rwanda and the former Yugoslavia.

But if Washington sticks to its position, Boutros-Ghali cannot prevail. The 185-member General Assembly appoints the secretary-general upon the recommendation of the 15-member Security Council.

As one of the five permanent council members, the United States can block a candidate. Other permanent members are France, Russia, China and Britain.

Although France could veto an American choice, diplomats and others familiar with the United Nations expect the U.S. threat to set off

behind-the-scenes negotiations to find a compromise candidate to avoid a leadership deadlock.

In Paris, French Foreign Ministry spokesman Jacques Rummelhardt said France had "respect and esteem for Mr. Boutros-Ghali and for the work he has done since 1991 in difficult situations."

But he stopped short of openly endorsing him for a second term. France has been Boutros-Ghali's strongest supporter on the council.

"I don't believe Boutros-Ghali can feel confident he can force Washington to back down once it has made this decision," said Jeff Laurenti, an analyst at the U.N. Association of the United States, a private group that promotes support for the organization.

Laurenti suggested that Boutros-Ghali may feel it is worth running "to show the breadth of international support for him, even if it is a candidacy which is unsuccessful."

Burns said the United States wants a secretary-general "capable of reforming the U.N. bureaucracy, increasing its cost-effectiveness, reducing the budget and streamlining the organization."

The United States has also been at odds with Boutros-Ghali over peacekeeping policies in Somalia and Bosnia. Boutros-Ghali, a brilliant intellectual with a sometimes prickly personality and independent views, has often clashed with U.S. Ambassador Madeleine Albright.

**Indonesian police break up protest**

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — Thousands of opposition party activists fought Thursday with troops in Jakarta, angered by the army's attempt to provoke an internal revolt against their party leader.

The bloody clash injured 73, the opposition said. Soldiers swung clubs at rock-throwing demonstra-

tors in a confrontation over the army's backing of dissidents within the Indonesian Democratic Party who want to oust popular party leader Megawati Sukarnoputri.

Shouting anti-military slogans, 5,000 Megawati loyalists marched 2 1/2 miles through the main streets of Jakarta before police barricades stopped them.

**U.N. monitors destroy Iraqi plant**

UNITED NATIONS — U.N. weapons monitors have destroyed a huge Iraqi weapons plant used to manufacture botulism, anthrax and other germ warfare agents, the United Nations said Thursday.

A U.N. video of the destruction showed workers dynamiting buildings, smashing equipment with trucks and spraying water on chemicals. The destruction began last month and ended Thursday.

"It is a dangerous site because it is specially designed for the production of biological weapons," Rolf Ekeus, the chief weapons monitor, told U.N. television.

Monitors said Iraq cooperated in the plant's destruction, and the video showed inspectors watching as Iraqi workers smashed equipment.

**Parisians attack Big Mac plans in city**

PARIS — Crying cultural and culinary heresy, Parisians launched a food fight Thursday to keep McDonald's from opening a restaurant in a building where Picasso bought his paints.

McDonald's franchisees are already all over the French capital, even on the Champs-Elysees. Now opponents are drawing a line in the cobblestones and declaring the city's historic Montparnasse district off-limits.

"Is it really necessary to add another fast-food outlet here?" asked Patrick Morenaud, who organized Thursday's protest.

Now McDonald's wants to put a restaurant in a 150-year-old building on leafy Vavin-Brea Square in what is known as Old Montparnasse — a neighborhood better known for sidewalk cafes and traditional French restaurants with lace curtains.

**Court orders Marine to pay \$574,000**

TOKYO — A U.S. Marine must pay \$574,000 compensation to the family of three pedestrians killed by her car, with another Marine at the wheel, a court on Okinawa ordered Thursday.

Judge Wataru Nemoto found car owner Alicia L. McDonald guilty in absentia of contributing to the Jan. 7 deaths of a woman and her two daughters 18 miles north of Naha, the capital of Okinawa.

The driver, Cpl. Lori A. Padilla, 20, of Houston was sentenced June 10 to two years in prison for reckless driving.

She had lost control of the car, which ran up on a sidewalk. The accident accelerated local opposition to the U.S. base on Okinawa, following the rape of a schoolgirl in September by three U.S. servicemen.

**Mad cows take over European summit**

FLORENCE, Italy — Britain's mad cows have stampeded into the European summit, despite efforts to cut them off at the pass with a plan for lifting the worldwide ban on British beef.

Leaders wanted to resolve the issue before the summit opens Friday and — as European Commission President Jacques Santer put it — "re-establish calm in our institutions that have been dangerously perturbed by the mad cow crisis."

That was not possible, however. Instead, foreign ministers decided this week to toss the problem to the presidents and prime ministers. The European Commission, the EU's executive body, drafted a plan Wednesday for a step-by-step handling of both disease control and the ban.

EU leaders hope they can reach an agreement based on that plan and then move on to other issues of importance such as employment, a single currency, reform of EU institutions and trade. Whether that will happen is uncertain.

## Rediscover the art of picnicking in Magic Valley

**TWIN FALLS** — It's get ambience, natural — not canned music — fresh breezes on your face. It offers only your favorite foods.

Why hot-foot it down to the fast-food place when you can lift a (champagne) glass of root beer to your sweetie sitting across the blanket from you?

Why, indeed, says Eric ("I'll provide everything—even the corkscrew") Ertsevsold, who runs The Metropolitan Bakery and Cafe in Twin Falls.

It's a shame that people seem to be too busy to stop and enjoy a nice meal, let alone in the fresh air, he says.

"It's so neat when a guy calls up and wants to surprise his wife."

Ertsevsold offers these suggestions to spice up your culinary day-dreaming:

"The No. 1 thing is to put lots of thought into a picnic right from the beginning," he said. "A sturdy picnic basket, place mats, a soft blanket. I prefer disposable utensils and plates so you don't have to lug dirty plates back; you don't want to think about the mess later."

"The food should be special, he said."

"I try to make everything with a little flair," Ertsevsold said. "I do a croissant sandwich with black bean spread on one side, sun-dried tomatoes on the other, some smoked turkey, Roma tomatoes and crisp lettuce."

Add a rasta pasta salad of red, green and gold pasta, Italian vinaigrette, lots of black olives, tomatoes and Parmesan cheese. Round out the meal with whole fresh fruit and lots of beverages, Ertsevsold said.

Bring along lots of bottled water, juices and wine if you like. And remember a sweet ending.

### Prime spots



□ **Niagara Springs**, located 11 miles south of Wendell in the Snake River Canyon. Part of Malad Gorge State Park, this sylvan glade includes grass, trees and bubbling water.

□ **Balanced Rock Park**, five miles west of Castleford in Salmon Falls Creek Canyon, which boasts new picnic tables, rest rooms and fresh water.

□ **Lake Walcott Park**, northeast of Rupert of the Snake River, an underappreciated haven of trees, grass and waterfall.

□ **Rock Creek Park**, west of Twin Falls.

□ **Murtaugh Lake Park**, southeast of Murtaugh, which features docks and a fishing wharf, covered picnic tables, volleyball areas, rest rooms and 84 restrooms and bubbling water.

□ **Emerald Lake**, a man-made impoundment located off Interstate 84 east of Burley, surrounded by grass, trees and picnic tables.

□ **Centennial/Waterfront Park**, located in the Snake River Canyon north of Twin Falls, has new picnic tables, rest rooms and drinking fountain.

### A catered affair

Borrow a basket from The Metropolitan Bakery and Cafe in downtown Twin Falls, and a meal for two can range anywhere from \$16 to \$36.

"It depends on the menu," Ertsevsold said. He can either pack your favorites, or surprise you, he said.

The nearby Uptown Bistro asks for a \$20 deposit on their picnic baskets. Co-owner Linda Myrland said, Lunch will run about \$6.20 per person, and a dinner with a hot entree starts at \$6.20 — "Up to whatever you want to pay," she said.

Both restaurants would like at least 24 hours notice, but the more time you give him, the more time and care he is able to put into your basket, Ertsevsold said.

Idaho Guide Service offers float trips, canoe or raft trips with lunch, starting at \$40 per person.

Do-it-yourself with supplies from Zurchers, a Twin Falls party supply store, runs from about \$10 to \$15, plus another \$6 for champagne glasses, but you get enough supplies for four or five outings.

"Brownies are a big favorite around here."

Chief Linda Myrland, co-owner of the Uptown Bistro in Twin Falls, likes to add elegance to her get-away feast. "I put our nice dishes into the basket for you," she said.

She packs picnic lunches or dinners with anything from croissant sandwiches to blackened prime rib.

"With the nice silver and cloth napkins, it's not a bit messy," she explained.

Myrland will pack your basket or hers

and have it ready when you zoom by the back door on your way to your romantic rendezvous.

And where will your mid-day break take you?

If you haven't taken the rest of the afternoon off at a brand-new place, they're usually quiet, too.

Or try the Sun Valley Inn. There's a grassy area surrounding a duck pond.

"Idaho Guide Service serves picnic lunches on its canoe and rafting trips, owner Olin Gardner said.

"The most spectacular spot is called Pair of Dice," he said. "It's on a rock above Class VI rapids."

But what if you want to do everything yourself?

"There's nothing better than somebody taking the time to pack your favorites," Ertsevsold said.

Starting from a ground up, Zurcher's, a Twin Falls party supply store, offers plastic-backed tablecloths that make fine sit-upons when they're turned flannel-side up.

Add sturdy, dinner-sized disposable plates, cups and napkins in the new watermelon design, a more formal floral pattern or a traditional red-and-white gingham for \$10 to \$15.

Add a touch of romance with plastic champagne glasses, Zurcher's sales clerk Camille Stralberg suggested. Six sturdy, dinner-sized disposable fluted or diamond-cut champagne glasses with stems that come off for easier packing.

# Putting fun back in family vacations

**TWIN FALLS** — This notion of a family vacation has become a bit, well, threadbare. Does it have to involve once again loading 2.3 kids into a station wagon and heading for points tourists? Or must it mean a plane-and-hotel package tour of Walt Disney World, souvenirs not included?

Or might it, perhaps, involve something new? Christine Loomis, the travel editor of Family Life magazine, thinks so. In "Family Adventures" (Fodor's Travel Publications, \$16), she's sifted through two dozen unusual kinds of vacations, ranging from cattle drives to dogsledging, and devised lots of ways to spend your kids' time and your money on them.

"Adventure travel does have an element of risk that other vacations do not," said Loomis, who stopped by the KOA campground north of here this week as part of a nationwide book tour sponsored by a recreational vehicle company. "That doesn't mean families should stay home. It means they should be prepared."

You could prepare yourself for a week in a covered wagon bouncing across the tall-grass prairie, or a day of panning for gold in the Black Hills. Roughly one-fourth of these excursions are within a two-day drive in south-central Idaho.

And some are much closer than that. At the Cottonwood Ranch, a 2,000-acre spread in

## Book review

O'Neil Basin southwest of Jackpot, you can go on a four-day, 50-mile horse drive in the spring (for \$995) or punch cows in the summer (for \$95 a day).

Or Wilderness River Outfitters of Salmon, River Odysseys West of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho Affluot of Grangeville and Hughes River Expeditions of Cambridge all specialize in family float tours of the Middle Fork of the Salmon River, ranging from \$600 to \$1,000.

Or the Wallowa Llamas Co. of Halfway, Ore., will take you on a three-day pack trip through Hells Canyon for \$285.

Many of family vacations that Loomis describes are pricey, but many can be done more cheaply than by the outfitters, guides and ranches she cites. For example, a float trip down the Snake River south of Jackson, "Wyoo," doesn't have to cost you \$300.

But the book is full of intriguing vacation ideas.

Like the Grand Sand Dunes National Monument in southern Colorado, home of breathtaking 700-foot-high piles-of-sand-the-biggest in the world. It'll cost you \$8 a night to park your RV, even less to camp out.

That's an experience that your fourth visit to "Pirates of the Caribbean" probably can't match.

# 'Roadside Idaho' offers guide to the Big Spud

**TWIN FALLS** — Travel guides to Idaho are proliferating faster than Suburbans in Blaine County these days, but Betty Derig's "Roadside History of Idaho" (Mountain Press Publishing Co., \$18) is a different breed.

It's part history and part Baedeker, in the style of Cort Conley's definitive "Idaho for the Curious," but with something for both natives and visitors.

"Most of these places have an interesting story, a skeleton in the closet, or perhaps a clue to understanding the past," she writes.

The book, as Derig acknowledges, owes much to Merle Wells, the retired Idaho state historian who is a walking volume of Idaho oral history.

"This roadside history delves beyond the obvious to relate every

day stories that give special identity to Idaho," she says.

Or, more accurately, all four Idahos. The book is divided into regions, described by major high-majors and not by artificial boundaries. Her description of southeastern Idaho, for example, includes the Cache Valley — most of which lies in Utah, but which is also the site of Franklin, Idaho's oldest settlement and the spiritual heart of the state's Mormon Crescent.

Derig covers the Magic and Wood River valleys as a slice central Idaho, a distinction that's not often made. As she meanders along south-central Idaho's state and federal highways, Derig unearths some fascinating tidbits, like this business about Charles Walgamott, who might have made Shoshone Falls more famous than it is — and himself much richer.

"He and his partner decided to run stagecoach tours from the town of Shoshone to the falls," she writes. "Touring groups came to Shoshone on the new Union Pacific Railroad, then completed the journey by stage over the roughest road any mortal ever traveled." Once at the falls, they were ferried to the south side hotel, which then consisted of two tents. When the crowds numbered 30 or 40 people, Walgamott and his partner Joseph Sullaway were hard-pressed to furnish enough beds. They solved the problem by buying hammocks.

"In 'Six Decades Back,' Walgamott writes, 'My partner was a good storyteller, and every night before bed-

time he would tell stories of rattlesnakes crawling into people's beds. A few stories of this kind eventually created a demand for hammocks."

Sullaway also contrived to eliminate the possible loss of the bed pillows they furnished: He tied the corner of each pillow to the frame of the cot with a piece of string. Walgamott says, "I asked him why, and he said, 'In case some tourist gets one in his ear we can get the pillow back.'"

Derig has lived in Weiser all her life, and her small-town view of the world gives her a fresh take on Idaho ruritania.

"Several saloons, stores, eating places, a stage line to Hailley and a post office thrived in Galena despite almost unbelievable winter snows," she writes. "The road across the summit — was narrow, steep and treacherous. Model? Farts went up in reverse."

That's a detail only an Idahoan could appreciate.

# Vince Gill rises to please all his fans with 'High Lonesome Sound'

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Picture a cartoon version of Vince Gill with steam coming out of his ears. All it takes is the wrong question.

It's only the first question, and already there's a few seconds of awkward silence on the other end of the telephone line. It seems that even the repeated nicest of questions can get miffed. All it takes is a question like this: Is there a chance the multi-platinum country star might flop with his new "High Lonesome Sound" CD? Finally he speaks, sounding "barely" interested: "Ahhhhhh, I don't know."

**Nashville notes**

made soundtracks like "A Little More Love" and "Given More Time."

"High Lonesome Sound" is Gill's stab at satisfying both his fans and critics who say he restrains his zany talents too much in order to fit narrow radio formats. It breaks down roughly half-and-half between what

worked before and new territory.

"People were having a tendency to think there was a lot of sameness in my records," Gill said.

The smooth title cut "High Lonesome Sound," featuring the harmony singing of Alison Krauss, already has been a No. 12 hit.

"It's not like the whole album is wacked," Gill said. "It's just in spots."

Pressed just a little, the lanky

Oklahoman admits that the new "wacked" songs are the ones that excite him as a musician. "Down to New Orleans" and "Tell Me Lover" are wacked grooves that show off his guitar playing.

"Those were the most fun because I love really deep-rooted funky music," Gill said. "I like Little Feat. I like Steely Dan. I like Sonny Landreth. I like New Orleans. I like all that stuff. I just wanted to record

some of it and play some of it."

Gill admits that the slow-percolating "Tell Me Lover" is based on Landreth's "Congo Square" on the Louisiana's second album "South of 1-10."

"Congo Square" is a record of his that I love," he said. "That's a record where they're talking about dancing with snakes and voodoo and all that stuff. And mine's kind of borrowing from that groove a lit-

tle bit, but a little more — I don't know — the lyrics are a little more watered down."

Landreth works in Nashville often, but he never knew of Gill's admiration or met the singer until recently. He called Gill "a musician's musician."

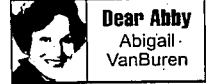
"What I really look forward to as much as anything is, I hope we can actually collaborate sometime. I'd love to work with him."

Charming and gently spooky, it holds our interest via its human scale and the pleasure it takes in being true to its origins. (PG, for action/adventure violence and some mild language.) "The Rock" — An action movie about a nasty hostage situation on Alcatraz that believes that bigger and louder is better. # 'Aphrodite' flows onto video store shelves

New videos in Twin Falls stores this weekend:

"Richard III" (R) — In the past few decades, theater audiences have been offered everything from sci-fi "Hamlet," to "Othello" with a jazz score. There has been a gangland "Macbeth," and a minimalist "Midsummer Night's Dream" with a stark white-stage, trapezes and topless fairies. Movie versions of the plays have tended to stick closer to the periods in which they were set. Mel Gibson's version of "Hamlet" and director Kenneth Branagh's "Henry V" spring to mind.

Taking Shakespeare's work away from its original context can invite charges of pretentiousness. Sometimes though, a little creativity with the bard can really work. That's certainly the case with Sir Ian McKellan and Richard Loncraine who successfully have adapted "Richard III," Shakespeare's timeless tale of power, intrigue and seduction, to 1930s Britain and the interwar period between world wars when fascist leaders were on the march.

McKellan stars as Richard, the profoundly evil and Machiavellian Duke of Gloucester who will do anything to overthrow his brother the king and seize the throne for himself.

McKellan's Richard is a pencil-mustached master of disinformation and murder, loosely modeled on various 1930s fascist leaders especially Britain's Sir Oswald Mosley, who once brooded and shirked through terrorized London's East End.

While director Loncraine sticks firmly to Shakespeare's original lines, he uses to his advantage interior decor and period costuming. Richard's coronation, for instance, is done in grand fascist style with neo-Nazi flags and an auditorium of uniformed followers. Other scenes are set in Brighton's Regency Palace with its glittering chandeliers and palm trees wallpaper. (*Associated Press*) (*Blockbuster, Video West, Hastings*)

"Mighty Aphrodite" (R) — With its titular nod to the Olympian goddess of love, this movie opens in the middle of a classically shaped amphitheater where a chorus, robed and masked in the style of Greek tragedy, is giving a typically overunited recitation of what sounds like ancient verse.

Suddenly they go from mourning the predicament of Bedlam's inmates to doing psychiatric jokes, Jewish-humor style.

If that sounds like Mel Brooks comedy, oh that it were. In fact, this is Woody Allen's latest, a sloppy and only intermittently broad farce that reaches for gags with the smooth, self-confidence of someone going down for the third time.

The Greek chorus stick gets repeated over and over and over again, while characters get twisted this way and that to bring out whatever laughs might be in the offing.

It's not that "Mighty Aphrodite" is never funny; quite a few one-liners are, and the movie features a funny performance by the up-and-coming Mira Sorvino. But considering the damn-the-torpedoes excess of the movie, there should have been a lot more yuks and a lot fewer dead spots. (*Orange County Register*) (*Hastings, Video West, Blockbuster*)

"Heat" — What's old has been made fine and new in "Heat." Writer-director Michael Mann and a superlative cast have taken a classic heist movie rife with familiar genre elements and turned it into a sleek, accomplished piece of work, meticulously controlled and completely involving. The dark end of the street doesn't get much more inviting than this.

Though Mann is best known for directing "The Last of the Mohicans" and executive producing TV's "Miami Vice," moviegoers with a fondness for crime stories will remember "Heat," his polished 1991 feature debut starring James Caan and Al Pacino, who once again Tuesday Weld as the woman in his life.

With its poetically heightened dialogue and fascination with the mechanics of crime, "Heat" is a satisfying new venture into that same territory. No one sees as much epic existential heroism in the romantic fatalism of hard men and the women who try to love them as Mann does. Sometimes he even sees too much, and "Heat" (which at 2 hours and 45 minutes wouldn't be harmed by a trim) does overreach at times. Yet its narrative pull, as unremitting as a rip tide, creates more than enough tension to compensate.

The story of the battle of wills between master criminal Neil McCauley (Robert De Niro) and LAPD detective Lt. Vincent Hanna (Al Pacino). "Heat" is an intensely masculine film, bent on mythologizing the lonely, driven men on both sides of the law.

It shows to be as disciplined and directed as war movies. (*Associated Press*) (*Times-News*) (*Blockbuster, Hastings, Video West*)

## Hootie hides secret of success

Not one knows why 'Cracked Rear View' does so well

This is the central mystery of our pop music: Why Hootie and the Blowfish?

If anyone really knew, of course, there'd be a lot more Hooties on the horizon. Atlantic Records head Val Azzoli gave it a shot recently, ascribing the band's appeal as being based on "positive song-driven music in a world of angst-rock."

Azzoli's clearly a big fan, humming music to the positive tune of almost \$100 million, which is how much the band has brought to Atlantic in selling an unbelievable 13 million copies of "Cracked Rear View."

Two years after its release, Hootie and the Blowfish's major-label debut is still selling 200,000 copies a month. At that rate it's likely to pass Boston's 20-year-old record to become the top-selling debut of all time, even with competition from the Hootie and the Blowfish's "Fairweather Johnson." That album, not incidentally, was snatched up by 411,000 fans during its first week out.

In truth, neither Azzoli nor Atlantic — nor the band, come to think of it — had any idea of the potential booty in Hootie. Then the following happened and made all the difference.

In October 1994, video network VH-1 was getting rid of its hip-hop and trying to overcome its reputation as MTV's ugly older sister. VH-1 was the very end of the MTV Experience when it decided to "reposition" through an image makeover

aimed at luring young viewers with as little alienation of its older core audience as possible. Once the province of "veteran" acts, VH-1 became home to up-and-coming acts that stayed safely away from the edge. And who better fit that category than Hootie and the Blowfish, a seemingly new band with a decidedly older sound rooted in familiar classic-rock and country.

rock forms — strum without the Drang. Actually, the Hooties had been together almost a decade, and had released three independent albums before Atlantic noticed they were selling pretty well in the South.

— In February 1995, David Letterman, hardly known for musical kinks for some reason, anointed Hootie and the Blowfish as his "favorite band" and booked them almost as frequently as he did diet clown Richard Simmons. Maybe it had nothing to do with music: Anyone who has seen Letterman grind a sound gag into the ground a la "Uma? Oprah! Oprah! Uma!" could believe he championed Hootie strictly for the joy of speaking the name on television.

The "runaway train" factor of popular culture took over from

there. That's when something catches the public fancy (through word of mouth or constant hype) and its momentum builds to the explosive point where questions of art, creativity and achievement suddenly become secondary to possession and personal experience. That's when non-traditional consumers feel the need to buy, say, an album by four nondescript rock-and-roller: from South Carolina.

"Cracked Rear View" reached the top of the Billboard charts in May 1995, 10 months past its release.

Then it passed the million mark and then the millions started multiplying.

But is it a fluke or a phenomenon? Critics look at the songs and suggest a slick betrayal of pop craft. It's not that they don't like four-minute pop songs. It's just they prefer them from obstinately obscure bands such as the Posies, XTC or, more recently, the Cardigans. For instance, the June issue of Musician features Hootie on the cover — and what sounds like an editor's apology. Ben Robert Doerschuck notes that the choice "precipitated more discussion than any other cover story I've approved here."

Critics, it should be noted, had nothing to do with the success of Hootie and the Blowfish.

It's easy for them to slam the unbearable lightness of being Hootie — the music is often a bit sluggish, mostly medium-tempo, mellow folk-rock of no particular distinction. At worst, it's harmless.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — John Daly, who missed this tournament last year because of headaches and was watched from his home off the 16th fairway, shot a 7-under-par 64 Thursday to share the first-round of the St. Jude Classic.

John Cook, Nike Tour player Patrick Lee and rookie Mike Swartz are also at 64 and holding a one-stroke lead over four others.

# Track stars run string of victories

ATLANTA (AP) — Halfway home, Michael Johnson and Glenroy Gilbert embarked on the second part of their ambitious Olympic double Friday at the U.S. track and field trials.

Torrence, winner of the 100 meters, begins chasing a berth in the 200, a race she won at the 1992 Olympics.

Johnson's task is more complicated. He won the 400 Wednesday night, stretching his victory streak at the distance to 53 finals with the third fastest time ever, 53.44 seconds, just short of Butch Reynolds' world record 43.29. Now he goes in the 200, an unusual combination never achieved by a man in the Olympics.

Johnson overcame a mistake at the start of the 400 when he didn't blast off as quickly as he had planned. What if the same thing happens in the 200? "I don't get out in the 200, the race is over."

Johnson has won 20 straight 200 finals. He has not lost at the distance in an outdoor final since July 6, 1994, when he finished fourth. The eventual target for Johnson is an unprecedented Olympic double in the 200 and 400.

Johnson has been given the job of defending her Olympic gold in the 200. "It's very difficult after my 100. There's relief that the 100 is over. It takes a couple of days to work yourself back up for the 200."

Torrence also has run the 400 but doesn't see that happening anymore. "I got myself in big trouble running the 400 the weeks before the games in 1992," she said. "I felt the effect at the games. It takes more time to get back from the 400. I have to be a fulltime sprinter."

# Unions play down impact of limits on lawsuits

The NFL, NBA and NHL praised a U.S. Supreme Court decision Thursday that limits antitrust suits by players' unions, but union officials downplayed the significance of the ruling.

The court said unionized workers can't file antitrust suits against employers who impose salaries after a bargaining impasse.

The ruling upheld a decision by a federal appeals court to throw out a \$30.3 million damage award to NFL players, who sued

after the league mandated \$1,000 salaries for rookies on developmental squads in 1989.

"This decision will ensure that salaries and other employment terms for NFL players are determined at the collective bargaining table, rather than through antitrust litigation, which is counterproductive and wasteful for all concerned," NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue said.

Gene Upshaw, executive director of the NFL Players Association, said the decision "will not have any significant impact on

active NFL players."

Howard Upshaw said the ruling could convince players to give up their union status after the current NFL contract runs out between 2000 and 2002. NFL players did just that in 1989 so they could challenge free agency restrictions in the courts.

"When the CBA (collective bargaining agreement) expires, the players will not hesitate to end our status as a union if it becomes necessary to protect their free agency rights," Upshaw said. "The NBA players' union took a similar

stand. Ron Klemmer, the group's assistant general counsel, said the Supreme Court ruling won't have an immediate impact on NBA players because they recently ratified a contract that extends to 2001.

But he said the ruling will "strengthen the resolve of the players" when their next contract is negotiated because the union won't have the option of filing an antitrust suit if the league tries to impose terms following an impasse.

"If that happened, we would have to consider decertification," Klemmer said.

# Sitting Bull: Jackson stays with champion Chicago

DEERFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Phil Jackson has signed a one-year and one more year-and-one-year only.

Jackson on Thursday signed a contract to coach the 1996-97 season for the Chicago Bulls, the team he guided to the best record in NBA history this past season.

"It's exactly what I wanted," he said at a news conference from the team's suburban training center. "I've always said there's a certain amount of time a coach has. Long term is something that right now I don't want to discuss because one year is about what I have to give."

Jackson, in fact, thought the season just ended would be his last. But that was before the league-record 72 regular-season victories. That was before a fourth championship in six years, capped by a six-game triumph over Seattle in the NBA Finals. That was before he was named the league's coach of the year.

"I thought it was going to be the farewell tour this year because it was my seventh year," said Jackson, a proponent of Zen philosophy who thinks life cycles last seven years. "But this team came

together in such a way that it was impossible to walk away.

"I don't plan to leave. I have no plans. But I will say this: My kids are graduating (from high school in 1997) and that is something that is a timetable for me. That's as honest as I can be."

Financial terms were not disclosed, but Jackson reportedly will be paid at least \$2.5 million, making him the league's third-highest paid coach next season. Miami's Pat Riley and New Jersey's John Calipari will make \$3 million; both also act as their teams' general managers. "It's great for Phil and it's great for Chicago," center Bill Wennington said. "I'm very relieved. I love playing for Phil. He makes the game fun and he knows how to get the most out of his players."

Added guard Ron Harper: "He's a very good coach and a very good friend."

Jackson and Bulls owner Jerry Reinsdorf had been elusive in recent weeks, leading to speculation the coach might not come back next season. During the NBA Finals, Jackson said he would take

a year off rather than "accept an unsatisfactory offer." And as recently as Thursday morning, Reinsdorf said he wasn't sure what would happen.

But Jackson said Thursday the two had "agreed to agree." Last month, Reinsdorf said the deal was struck after a short meeting Wednesday night. "We met last Wednesday night, talked for 45 minutes and left," Reinsdorf said. "I acknowledged that new big-money contracts like Calipari's "changed the parameters" in his negotiations.

Jackson, 50, has the NBA's best regular-season winning percentage ever at .721 (414-160) and the best playoff mark at .723 (81-31). This year's championship follows titles in 1991, 1992 and 1993. Jackson's base salary was a middle-of-the-pack \$866,000 this season. Earlier in negotiations, the Bulls reportedly had offered him about \$1.65 million for next season — but he wanted closer to Calipari's \$3 million.

# Injury bumps Muster from Wimbledon

HALLE, Germany (AP) — Thomas Muster, angered earlier this week at being seeded only No. 7 for Wimbledon when he was the second-ranked player in the world, vowed to prove he could play on grass as well as clay.

Those plans were wrecked Thursday when Muster aggravated a thigh injury and pulled out of the All-England grass-court cham-

pionships which begin Monday. The Austrian announced his Wimbledon withdrawal after hobbling through a 4-6, 6-2, 6-1 loss to Brett Steven of New Zealand at the Gary Weber grass-court tournament. Muster had worked hard to prepare himself on grass for Wimbledon, where he had never won a match in four previous appearances.

# Trostel presses Moses in diving

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — If Angie Trostel can keep her overzealous parents in check, she might just earn a trip to the Atlanta Olympics.

Trostel was second after the 3-meter semifinals Thursday at the U.S. diving trials, barely nine points behind Melissa Moser, who was first with 525.39 points.

Defending Olympic champion Mark Lenzi showed the effects of a 20-month retirement, finishing fifth in the men's 3-meter preliminaries with a 433.56 total. Scott Donie, the 1992 Olympic silver medalist on the 10-meter board, took the lead from Dean

Panaro after the third of six optional dives. Donie, who was fourth on the springboard at the '92 trials, was first with 475.38 points. "For me, this is the hardest part," Donie said. "I sort of come out in the finals, but there's a long way to go."

Panaro stunned the crowd at the Indiana University Natatorium on his opening dive, a forward 3 1/2 somersault with a 3.1 degree of difficulty, that earned four marks of 9.5 and two 9.0s from the seven judges. Panaro tied for the rest 1 1/2 panned on my head as usual," he said. "I may not be

one of the favorites in your eyes or the eyes of the diving world, but Scott was the kind of pace car and I just followed him up."

Lenzi, the local favorite from Bloomington who returned to diving in April 1995, also trails 1988 Olympian Mark Bradshaw and Kevin McMahon of Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

SEATTLE (AP) — Not even midway through the season, the Seattle Mariners have been hit with a string of injuries, leaving several key players on the disabled list.

The most recent casualty is center fielder Ken Griffey Jr., who broke a bone in his right hand during Wednesday's 9-2 loss against Toronto. An awkward swing, while fouling out in the third inning, resulted in the break.

"That's a shame," Toronto manager Cito Gaston said. "He's the kind of guy that you enjoy watching play, even if he beats your butt out."

Griffey had surgery Thursday and the team said he would miss about a month but similar injuries to other players this season have kept them to miss as much as 10 weeks.

Griffey is expected to miss the July 9 All-Star game in Philadelphia.

But it really isn't a serious injury, it's really common in baseball," team physician Dr. Mitch Storey said.

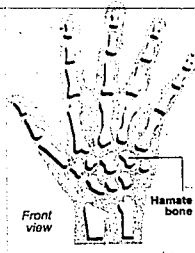



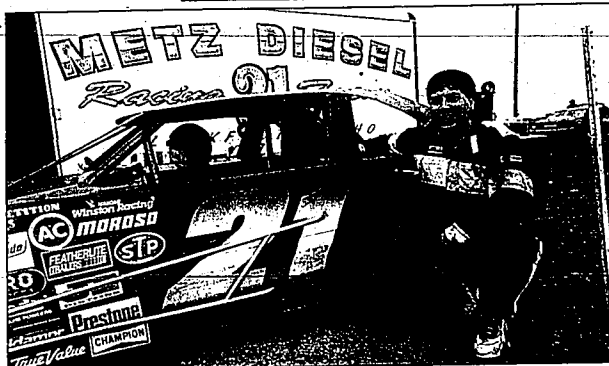

## Falling corporate profits chip away at Idaho finances

**BOISE** — The ailing computer chip economy, highlighted by the 74 percent drop in corporate profits posted this month by Micron Technology Inc., has wiped out the million-dollar-plus surplus in state corporate tax receipts.  
But the Batt administration's chief economist said on Thursday that strong personal income and sales tax collections should offset the corporate tax plunge so that the state will end the budget year this month in the black.

1. But with income and sales tax receipts accounting for 82 percent of all general tax collections, that impact could be muted.  
"As the current cash surplus was building, Ferguson had warned that weakening

receipts were \$8.1 million over the benchmark.  
Corporate tax payments in May, however, totaled just \$1.6 million compared to the target of about \$14 million, turning the cash surplus in that category into a shortfall of about \$4 million.

Economist Michael Ferguson, however, would not go so far as to say that the overall cash surplus in tax revenues will be sufficient to avoid tapping the \$32 million budget reserve fund for emergency expenses from February's flooding in northern Idaho or cover over \$9 million in revenues promised public schools last year.

conditions in the high-technology sector could put downward pressure on corporate tax collections.  
Last summer when it became clear the state's economic expansion would not be as robust as earlier projected, Gov. Phil Batt imposed a 2 percent across-the-board budget cut to avoid any major disruptions in programs or services if the more optimistic revenue target was not met. That amounted to \$26 million.

The overall effect would be to reduce total cash surplus to under \$10 million with only June revenues left to balance the state's books. But both sales tax and income tax collections, the key indicators of underlying economic strength and consumer confidence, appeared on target or ahead in May although the final reconciliation for the month will not be completed for another week to 10 days.

Batt spokeswoman Amy Kleiner said the governor sees Micron's impact on the state economy as cyclical. "During the boom times, they provided a large surplus to the state," she said. "When they're having a hard time, we'll just have to adjust."  
Idaho's economy appears to have weathered the lay-off shocks of 1995 and has rebounded stronger than expected sales, said Kelly Matthews, chief economist for First Security Corp.

## Imports, exports hit record levels

But trade deficit widens to \$8.63 billion

**WASHINGTON** — The highest oil prices since the Persian Gulf War helped widen the U.S. trade deficit as imports and exports climbed to record levels.  
The Commerce Department reported Thursday that the deficit in goods and services rose 7.7 percent in April to \$8.63 billion, after a March imbalance of \$8.01 billion.  
The Clinton administration, under heavy fire from Republican critics for an ever-widening trade deficit, played down the April increase in imports and stressed instead the growth in exports. It offers proof, spokesmen said, that President Clinton's emphasis on market-opening trade deals is paying off.

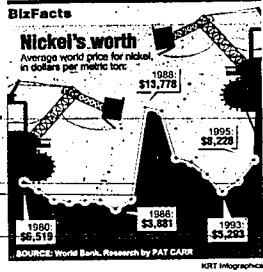

Kantor noted that the April deficit was 20 percent lower than the same month in 1995. Private economists, however, were not as impressed. They said that while there was a narrowing of the deficit from horrendous levels in early 1995, the improvements have stalled out in recent months.

"We are now stuck in a range of monthly deficits of between \$8 billion and \$9 billion," he said. "We have been since last fall," said Lawrence Chimere, chief economist at the Economic Strategy Institute in Washington. "Analysts who

had been counting on additional declines in the deficit to spur U.S. economic growth this year are being disappointed."  
So far this year, the trade deficit is running at an annual rate of \$98.9 billion, only a slight improvement from the seven-year high of \$105.06 billion in 1995.

However, two other reports Thursday did show strength in the economy. The Labor Department said new claims for unemployment benefits fell by 4,000 last week to 357,000, the first decline in four weeks.  
And a survey of business conditions done by the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia showed that economic activity rose significantly in June, with the lag between when goods are produced and when they can be delivered rising sharply.

## Greenspan to serve 4 more years

**WASHINGTON** — Alan Greenspan, an inflation fighter credited with helping the nation achieve moderate economic growth, was overwhelmingly confirmed by the Senate Thursday to a third term as head of the nation's central bank.

The 517-vote extends the 70-year-old Republican's tenure as Federal Reserve by four years until 2000. Confirmation came despite sharp criticism from a handful of Democrats, led by Tom Harkin of Iowa, who said Greenspan's policies have held the economy too tightly in check.

That contented Greenspan, who said that global competition is keeping a lid on both prices and wages and that the Fed could safely allow faster economic expansion without risking inflation.

"This effort to always pull the economy down to fight this bogeyman of inflation ... has made it very difficult for families to do well," said Sen. Paul Wellstone, D-Minn.

But Republicans and most Democrats voted for him. Banking Committee Chairman Alfonse D'Amato, R-N.Y., said Greenspan "has kept a steady hand at the tiller instead of taking the politically expedient course of saying 'Let's pump up the money supply.'"

Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., called him "a national treasure" and Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., said "letting his nomination would be a tragic mistake."

"Voting 'no' were Sens. Kent Conrad, D-N.D.; Byron Dorgan, D-N.D.; Russell Feingold, D-Wisc.; Bob Kerrey, D-Nebr.; Harry Reid, D-Nev.; Harkin and Wellstone; Sens. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark.; and Rod Grams, R-Minn., did not vote.

The Senate also jettisoned, 57-41, the nomination of White House budget director Alice Rivlin to serve as vice chairman of the seven-member Fed board.

It confirmed, 95-0, U.S. economist Laurence Meyer to fill a vacancy.

# New members won't affect Fed much

**WASHINGTON** — Alice Rivlin and Laurence Meyer, newcomers to the Federal Reserve Board, are unlikely to make any waves in monetary policy since their views are seen as mainstream. The financial community's general perception of the new vice chairman Rivlin and governor Meyer. These Fed nominees, as well as Chairman Alan Greenspan, were approved by the Senate Thursday and within days are expected to move into the offices at the Fed's marbled and pillared Eccles building in Washington. "I honestly don't think" they'll make big waves at the Fed, said David Jones, chief economist at Aulay & Lauson. "They'll fit in extremely well to the Fed policy making process."

In that vein, Jones said he did not think they'll vote for a tightening at the July Fed policy meeting. Although they might do so later this year.

Unlike former Vice Chairman

Alan Blinder, whose views often contrasted with general Fed thinking, for instance in his push for upholding employment, Rivlin and Meyer are seen as more moderate. On members, while the new board members like all central bankers are keen to ensure price increases stay under control, they have not spoken out as strongly against inflation as have some very hawkish Fed district bank presidents.

"They may tilt slightly to the dovish side of center in the sense that they will emphasize growth somewhat more than perhaps the more hawkish members of the FOMC would and perhaps price stability slightly less," Jones said. "But they are very much in the policy mainstream."

Jones named the two candidates are "both highly respected in their fields of expertise. Alice Rivlin particularly in budget policy and Laurence Meyer in terms of his

forecasting prowess." Rivlin has worked as White House budget director and before that deputy budget director, and she is known to strongly advocate bringing the federal budget deficit down. At one stage, she also headed the Congressional Budget Office and was commended for her non-partisan judgement.

In her Senate Banking Committee confirmation hearing last March, she said the U.S. economic picture looked good, with inflation "under control" and growth "strengthening to" its trend rate. Meyer and his St. Louis firm Laurence H. Meyer and Associates, have tended to be more cautious about expecting a surge in growth this year than many Wall Street firms.

Although Meyer has had to sell his firm to join the Fed, the firm's June U.S. Economic Outlook newsletter written by economists who were also there when he was in charge — says the case for a second-half growth slowdown "is a good one."

Moreover, the firm notes, "We expect the Fed to 'see through' the temporarily faster growth and inflation, and not raise rates in the immediate future." Meyer is less well known than Rivlin — who has had a high profile in her work for the administration. Rivlin's role was reflected in the 41 most important votes in her nomination, while Meyer received no "nay" votes.

Those who know Meyer well ring his praises, particularly in the forecasting arena. David Reister, chief economist at Nomura Securities International, said: "He's very good at sorting through the data and detecting signals from noise. One of the strengths of his firm has been a willingness to listen to and pay a lot of attention to anecdotes. He's a lot like I hear Greenspan is."

Overall, the two newcomers are expected to slip easily into their new roles and the Fed Board, to its relief, will be back to its full quota of seven members for the first time since April 31, 1995.

## E-mail still goes off-line

AOL has a way to go before providing the kind of reliability in e-mail that customers expect — and typically get — when making a local phone call.

A routine software update — feeding instructions to machines that tell selected messages how to get where they're going — went awry, apparently due to human error, David W. Garrison, Netcom's chairman and chief executive, said Wednesday. The result was that Netcom customers found themselves unable to connect to or use the service.

# Church insurers feel heat of recent rash of arsons in South

Patrick Moreland won't call himself blessed, but his company has been lucky.

Few of the more than 30 predominantly black churches that have been destroyed by arson in the South in the past 18 months are insured by Church Mutual Insurance Co. of Merrill, Wis., the largest in the market.

Every time arson at a church or other house of worship shows up on the television news, "one of our underwriters comes in to see if we insure it," said Moreland, a Church Mutual vice president. "So far, we've been fortunate."

Divine intervention is not involved here — Moreland said most of the 67,000 houses of worship insured by Church Mutual are in the Midwest, not the South. Church Mutual is the largest of about six companies that insure churches.

They've got churches and other houses of worship is not a new problem. Church Mutual,

which insures properties in every state except Hawaii, Alaska and the seven New England states, paid 80 arson claims over the last 17 months, Moreland said. Fourteen of those claims exceeded \$100,000.

"We could knock on wood," he said. "The largest claim was just in 1994, a \$800,000" filed by a church in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. That church is not on the list of suspected arsons — being investigated by a Department of A. I. C. O. H. Tobacco and Firearms.

"The largest property claim our company ever paid was on a Kentucky church about five or six years ago, for \$8 million," Moreland said. "A \$1 million claim is not uncommon for the industry."

State Farm Cos. insures just over 27,000 church properties, taking in \$45 million in premium in 1995, said spokeswoman Mary Boone.

"We've got churches insured in every state," she said. "We have no real concentration in any one state" and none have reported arson recently.

Despite the media glare, data from the Boston-based National Fire Protection Association show religious arson decreasing since 1989, from 470 (\$14.5 million in losses reported to fire departments) to 320 (\$11 million) in 1994, the most recent year compiled. The exception was a 1991 spike to 510 (\$22.1 million). The arson data make no distinction among racial, religious or profit status, said Rita Fahney, an NFPA analyst.

"One of the things that make churches so easy is they are empty for so much of time," said Rick Gilman, executive director of the Insurance Committee for Arson Control, an industry group in New York. "A lot are also old structures. It doesn't take a lot of gas to set these things on fire."

While church arsons make up less than 1 percent of structural arsons reported each year, insurers are becoming more active in meeting with their religious insureds to improve lighting and even landscaping — pruning trees and bushes to eliminate hiding places for arsonists, he said.

"In other arsons, churches are rarely burned for profit, and insurers usually pay claims promptly."

### Imega stock plummets 10 points

### U.S. dollar strengthens against yen

**NEW YORK** — The dollar rose Thursday after an influential Japanese finance official surprised the market by saying he doesn't believe Japan's strengthening economy justifies a rise in interest rates and a higher yen.

The dollar also got help from remarks by Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin at a speech in Washington. Japanese investors, traders said. Rubin repeated his longstanding position that the United States wants a strong dollar, and Tietmeyer's remarks suggested the market may have further room to weaken against the dollar.

"Today we had several comments to support the dollar," said Kouke Hama, head of foreign exchange trading at the Industrial Bank of Japan's New York branch. "Demand for the dollar is very good."

As of 4 p.m. in New York, the dollar traded at 108.20 yen, up from 107.85 Wednesday. The dollar also traded at 1.5240 marks, up from 1.5210 Wednesday. The British pound cost \$1.5380, down from \$1.5435.

### Blue chips steady; technology slides

**NEW YORK** — Technology shares slid again as worries about computer-industry profits intensified Thursday. Blue-chip issues fared better, but stocks continued to flounder amid the persistent worries about inflation and interest rates.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 11.08 points to close at 5,659.43 after giving back an early gain of 31 points and recovering from an afternoon slide of 15.

Broad measures of blue chips and other large companies also finished near their opening levels, but the Nasdaq market fell sharply as investors continued to lock in profits from this spring's powerful rally in technology and more speculative shares.

Trading was mostly quiet and indecisive again, although volume picked up considerably as traders positioned themselves for Friday's expirations of options contracts to buy and sell stocks and bonds and securities at specific prices.

Despite a strong start, the markets retreated slightly when the Philadelphia branch of the Federal Reserve reported that manufacturing activity has continued to accelerate this month in the mid-Atlantic region.

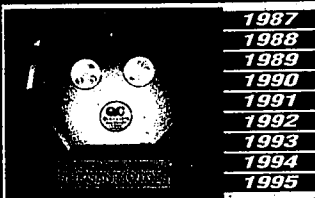

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE

With all hands exposed, today's no-trump game will always make. At the table, the game will probably make about 90 percent of the time.

If South can see all four hands, he will surely notice the block in the heart suit. All South has to do is refuse to win East's heart queen. He then has time to try the diamonds and all his losses are two hearts and a diamond.

At the table, most Easts would take the heart ace to trick one and return to the queen. South now has nothing to lose by refusing to win. If East can lead another heart, the most South can lose are three hearts and a diamond. If East cannot lead another heart, South wins the shift and scores an easy overtrick.

What happens at about 10 percent of the tables? East will play his heart queen at trick one instead of his ace. This changes the situation dramatically. Can South afford to refuse to win his king? Fearing the ace to be with West, South takes his king and a razzle-dazzle defense beats him. When he crosses to dummy to take the diamond finesse, West refuses to win the queen with his king. On the second diamond lead, East jettisons his heart ace and the game is defeated. When West gets his diamond king, he has to jettison his heart ace and the overtrick. South suffers one down.

# Viewers may feel deja vu in 'new' broadcast TV season

Forget all the summer-time hoopah unleashed by the networks. The 1996-97 season looks like business as usual.

Hit-heavy NBC looks to establish yet another night of "Must See TV" by moving its megahit "3rd Rock From the Sun" to "Sun" days (can't you just see the promos now?), preceding the marginal hit "Boston Common," which garnered some measure of success during its trial run last season primarily because it wasn't "The Single Guy," which keeps its hammock between "Friends" and "Seinfeld" next season.

Among the new shows at the peace-keeping networks, the much-maligned Brooke Shields is being touted as the next Mary Tyler Moore for her role in "Suddenly Susan," a sitcom that inherits the berth between "Seinfeld" and "ER."

Shields plays a senior editor at a busy publishing house who abruptly becomes single again after ending a long-standing relationship with her live-in boyfriend. Her co-stars are solid gold: Elizabeth Ashley ("Evening Shade"), Nancy Marchand ("Lou Grant") and Philip Casnoff ("Sinatra," "Sisters"), niff ("Sinatra," "Sisters").

And to cynics who pawah former model Shields as a sitcom star, NBC has two words: Candice Bergen.

Among the other new shows offered by the No. 1-rated network, stand-up comic Tom Rhodes plays a hunky and unconventional teacher in "Mr. Rhodes," which co-stars two alumni (survivors?) of last season's "Dweebs," Farrah Fawcett and the subtle nebbish himself, Stephen Tobolowsky.

Rubbing salt into the wound of "3rd Rock," which NBC picked up after ABC declined it, the network has picked up "The Jeff Foxworthy

Show," obviously under the impression that the problem with Foxworthy's ratings at ABC had to do with time slot (it was paired with a Marie Osmond sitcom).

Ron Eldard, who garnered big-time fan appeal with women in his portrayal of a volatile paramedic on "ER," gets his own sitcom, "Men Behaving Badly," with Rob Schneider (the copier guy from "Saturday Night Live"), Mel Harris from ABC's "bitsytomthing" co-stars in a new comedy, "Something So Right" - with Jerry Burns, who played the jerk on "Dear John."

ABC is reeling from loss to the extent that the biggest news seems to be swirling around what former NBC wunderkind Jamie MacDonald (the executive who reportedly shepherded "Friends" to fruition) will jump ship to the Disney-owned cable network, which is suffering from grave credibility problems

related to potential Mouse-mandated plot lines in its sitcoms.

Among the new ABC offerings: Michael J. Fox in "Spin City," in a role obviously inspired by his bit in "The American President"; "Townies," an ensemble "Friends"-like "Wish-please-to-emphasize-that" comedy starring Molly Ringwald; the least likely to succeed candidate, "Dangerous Minds," an adaptation of the 1995 movie, with Annie Potts; and a small-screen version of "Clueless."

CBS, which many say should stand for Can't Buy Success - is trying to recover from last season's disastrous "shoo! shoo!" schedule designed to dump the series. New entertainment chief Les Moonves is welcoming back the old-gaming by keeping its family-friendly fare such as "Dr. Quinn, Medicine Woman" and "Touché by an Angel" (Angel moves to Sunday).

Q: Is Elizabeth Berkley really dancing in a private men's strip club in Los Angeles? - JK.

A: In "Showgirls," the 23-year-old Berkley, still single and living with her parents, portrayed a stripper-lap dancer who makes it big as a Las Vegas dancer.

Sure, she took her lumps from the critics for her acting. Nonetheless, her career is off and running. She'll soon be seen as the new love of Goldie Hawn's ex-husband in the comedy "The First Wives Club."

In addition, Elizabeth is turning up at all the right Hollywood charities. One of my spies caught up with her at a recent AIDS Project benefit, which featured a fashion show. Berkley, dressed in a revealing and stylish halter, was one of the runway models. Most impressive was the mound of highly styled hair piled on top of her head.

Q: A movie reporter on TV hinted that Sean Connery, Gene Hackman and Nicolas Cage, the starring trio in the Alcatraz adventure movie "The Rock," all share a prob-

lem. What was he referring to? - D.C.

A: My guess is that all three actors are plagued with baldness or receding hairlines. When each appears in a film, it means a variety of wigs, hairpieces and extensions. Sometimes, they have to paint over the bald spots.

It's good thing these stars are major actors, because this head dressing takes time and is expensive, not to be wasted on minor players.

Q: Is there a new man in the life of Esther Williams? Is he much younger than she is? - B.E.

A: Esther turns 73 on Aug. 8. The former swimming star of the '40s and '50s remains the athletic-looking and stylish figure we remember from such flicks as 1953's "Dangerous When Wet."

For several years now, Williams has been the sponsor of a line of swimwear modeled after the spectacular suits she wore onscreen during her MGM days.

For a time she met Fernando Lamas, her co-star in "Dangerous," she had been married twice. She remained Mrs.

Lamas until his death in 1982. Since then, she's concentrated on her swimwear business.

My Chicago lookout caught up with her in a Chicago suburb, where she was promoting her line of suits at a fancy department store. She was accompanied by her husband of one and a half years, Edward Bell, who is president of her swimwear company.

Bell is younger than Williams, by how much, though, I am not sure. They have been together for some time, proving that love and romance defy age.

Q: What's this about Susan Sarandon separating from her husband after having a fight with him while they were filming a movie? - S.D.

A: Sarandon, who turns 50 in October, realized the hard way that working with a live-in partner can put a strain on a relationship.

Since meeting actor-director-writer Tim Robbins on the set of 1988's "Ball Dupham," Susan and Tim, now 37, have added two children of their own, two boys, 3 and 6, to Susan's daughter from her relationship

with director-screenwriter Francis Amara.

Susan and Tim, of course, collaborated on "Dead Man Walking." She was the co-star, opposite Sean Penn. Robbins directed and wrote the script. Sarandon recounts that during the intense drama, she and Robbins shared many heated arguments.

He had six horrible days. But they do remain very much together, although Susan admits that she isn't eager to work with Robbins again anytime soon.

Q: Does Bob Saget have a troubled family history? - C.V.

A: Bob, the host of TV's long-running "America's Funniest Home Videos," and a former stand-up comic, comes from a family that's coped with more than its share of misfortune. Bob's parents lost two daughters, one to scleroderma, an incurable illness, the other to a brain aneurysm.

Bob's parents were grief-stricken but made do, recalls Saget, by falling back on their sense of humor.

We'll get more details when the ABC TV movie "For Hope" gets an airing in the future. Saget, 40, directed the flick, and it's more than just a disease-of-the-month vehicle. It promises to be intensely autobiographical, with Bob being depicted by Henry Czerny.

Saget says his parents "are thrilled" that their tragic story is being told, although he admits that

he was "scared a little" about it all.

Q: Didn't Pamela Anderson Lee have problems with her father? Was it his drinking? - O.O.

A: Pamela says the story of her father's drinking problem is an old one. Perhaps, but it's interesting.

The 28-year-old "Baywatch" star was born July 1, 1967, to teenage parents, Barry and Carol, on Vancouver Island in Canada. Mom was a waitress; dad ran Barry's Furnace Service. There wasn't much money. Lee recalls that her father had a drinking problem and occasionally turned abusive. She says she once punched him on the chin "hard, and then ran for my life." Her father's problem is now under control.

Q: Do you know anything about a new woman in Robert De Niro's life? - I.W.

A: All I can tell you about the secretive De Niro is that he does seem to have a new love. The actor, who turns 53 on Aug. 17, attended comedian Don Rickles' 70th birthday party in May in Hollywood.

De Niro-Rickles friendship seems strange until you realize that the two became buddies while filming "Casino."

Anyway, a beautiful young woman named Grace Hightower, a former flight attendant, accompanied De Niro to the party. What caused eyebrows to climb was his description of her as his "fiancee."

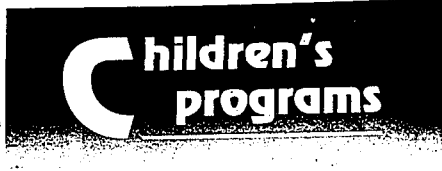

## Gaskill changes role of Warner on 'AMC'

Brian Gaskill leads two lives: By day, he plays the charming, often disarming, testosterone-charged teenager, Bobby Warner of "All My Children." In his evenings, he's part of New York's off-off-Broadway scene, the milieu—considered—by many theater critics to be the most exciting

and creative theatrical force in the city.

Gaskill co-founded The Rorschach Group with several other actors from college. Asked what prompted him to start a company of his own, he said, "It's the need to have more than one outlet, as well as more control over what you do. In this business, there are so many layers between what you might want to do and what, eventually, gets done. With your own company—while there are still a lot of considerations you have to deal with that limit some of your control—you are closer to the decision-making. I find it all exciting and a real challenge. Right now, I'm involved with a theater company. Someday, I hope I can have my own production company for television and film."

Gaskill's theatrical company encourages new playwrights. "We need to get more people interested in writing for the theater," he says. "So what we're doing is concentrating on putting on plays that have not been produced before, or have had a limited previous run. For example, our first play, "Triple X Love Act"—which I spelled out as X X X Love Act—had been produced in San Francisco where it became a popular cult attraction. But it hadn't been published in New York. Also brought in the author and worked with him. So, what we even-

tually put on could pretty much be considered as "new."

Brian didn't act in the first play, playing the Rorschach Group part on, but did have a role in the second production. There was, however, no role for him in the third. "It's not easy staying out of it—when you've been an actor for years, but I found the whole no-acting process to be a real revelation. Take auditions: Actors endure a lot of anxiety and nervousness when they audition, and they tend to see the person on the other side of the desk as the enemy. But when I started to sit behind that desk, I realized these people have their own expectations; they want you to be brilliant so they can make the great exciting discovery of our time. They want you to succeed."

Brian Gaskill has succeeded in making Bobby Warner a sometimes provocative, but always interesting character.

"I feel I've been lucky in what I've been written for me," says Gaskill, "and they've planned a lot more excitement for him for the summer. His life is going to take a dramatic turn now that everyone is learning he fathered Kelsey's baby. He's fallen in love with Anita, and wants to marry her. But now... well, we'll have to see what happens."

# Disabled actors, roles fade from TV screen

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Disability is a fact of life for 49 million Americans. For television, apparently, it was just another trend.

A decade ago, TV series welcomed actors with handicaps in roles that sometimes highlighted their condition or, better yet, presented them as simply part of the gang. Now, say disabled performers and observers, television's portrait of American life is strangely devoid of those with physical difficulties — and the industry has become less willing to hire the handicapped.

"There was an abundance of roles in the '80s, there was an awareness," says Myrian Campos of the MediaAccess Office, a Washington, D.C., group that advocates for disabled performers.

In the 1990s, such parts have become scarce and so has attention to the issue, says Campos. David McSwain, a brawny, blond actor, knows how professionally costly a handicap can be: He was working steadily until a 1991 motorcycle accident forced the amputation of his lower right leg.

He recovered within a year, but "his career didn't.

"If I was an able-bodied actor with the credits I have now, I would probably be going on auditions two to three times a week," said McSwain. "With the situation as it is, I'm lucky to get an audition every two to three weeks," he said.

Few current TV series make room for the handicapped. The casting of wheelchair user actress Wendy Becker Kennedy in the recent sitcom "The Louie Show" is a rarity, not the rule.

When a series depicts a handicapped character, it often fakes the disability, says crippled Dr. Kerry Weaver in "ER." Is played by non-disabled

actress Laura Innes. But was it really so good in the old days? Yes, to an extent.

When police detective Cagney (Sharon Gless) fell in love with a handicapped man on the 1980s series "Cagney & Lacey," actor and double-amputee James Stacy played the part.

An actress with cerebral palsy, Geri Jewell, was on "The Facts of Life." Chris Templeton, with a pronounced post-polio limp, was featured on "The Young and the Restless."

And actors with a range of disabilities were routinely shown on "Highway to Heaven," "Dallas" and "Knots Landing."

Often the roles were guest shots or supporting parts, but they seemed to indicate momentum for performers.

"I really thought that by the time the '90s came, the mainstreaming of performers with disabilities would be the main thrust," said Casey Stengel, an actor and paraplegic.

The optimum scenario might be one in which a character's disability was simply a detail, not a dramatic device, and in which the hiring of disabled performers was routine.

But television has fallen on short.

While indifference fuels the problem, it is rooted in changing economics, special effects advances and Hollywood's limited attention span.

Stengel, committee chairman for the union-affiliated Performers with Disabilities, was drawn to Hollywood in the 1980s because of the open climate he perceived.

"The opportunities he found then, including a role on 'General Hospital,' have dissolved. 'People who cast the disabled say 'I did it, I did my part.' It was the thing to do for a while," said Stengel.

Tougher economic times are a key factor, say Campos and others. Producers and networks are less willing to take time for social consciousness in a more competitive environment.

"The perception is it's just more trouble and more time and therefore more money," said "Cagney and Lacey" producer Barney Rosenzweig. "It isn't much of any of those things."

Diane English, who produced "The Louie Show," found Becker's hiring career only advantages.

"She would make suggestions and keep us honest about some comment the character would make," English said.

Technology offers producers another excuse to use a non-handicapped actor. With today's special effects, non-disabled Gary Sinise can convincingly play a legless Vietnam veteran in "Forrest Gump."

Campos and others find the practice too readily accepted and, too little questioned.

"I want it to get as offensive to society to put an able-bodied person in a wheelchair as to put a Caucasian person in blackface," Campos said.

There is more at issue than one industry and one category of workers.

The disabled, who at 49 million represent roughly one in five Americans, face an equally bleak employment picture outside Hollywood, said Paul Deane, president of the Dole Foundation created by former Sen. Bob Dole to assist handicapped workers.


"There is no single group, including young blacks, that has a higher exclusionary rate than persons with disabilities," said Deane.

"In this environment, he said, television's treatment of the handicapped takes on increased importance — and steps are being taken to awaken Hollywood.

Performers With Disabilities is compiling a national directory featuring disabled actors and plans information sessions with writers and directors.

The Media Access Office holds sessions to help educate the industry, trains and refers actors, is working to count the number of disabled performers, and bestows annual awards on progressive producers.

"I don't say that you have to hire a person with a disability," said Campos. "But you darn well better give us the opportunity."

# All of a sudden, mummies star on television

Are you a slave to Egyptology?

Can't get enough of the Incas?

Or should we say: Do you love your mummies? Are you into wrap?

Because Sunday night, you're going to feel like you died, went to heaven and came back again.

Two cable networks—TBS and A&E—are going head to head with specials just made for Indiana Jones wannabes.

"Mummy Hunters," a two-hour TBS theme show, is the latest from the "National Geographic Explorer" series and, considering the topic, the fresher of the two mummy programs.

One of its four segments, "Mystery of the Inca Mummy," is the real find here. Part adventure, part mystery, it focuses on the recent, much publicized discovery of the "Amputo Maiden," a young Inca girl sacrificed to the gods 500 years ago and found last September or virtually frozen in time on the Peruvian mountaintop where she died.

Here's a poignant and sometimes disturbing story (re-nacted for dramatic effect, with mixed results). She is considered the best-preserved pre-Columbian body ever found, with body, hair, internal organs and even some soft tissue intact.

Only 12 to 14 years of age, the Maiden of Amputo, the Ice Maiden or Juanita as she has been called, climbed a nearly 21,000-foot mountain in sandals and, it is believed, proudly gave her life—killed by a crushing blow to the skull—the privilege of being an emissary to the gods.

Viewers go along for the post-discovery climb as well as to Arequipa,

Peru, where scientists painstakingly separated her garments from her mummified body.

"Only the beautiful, the unblemished and the innocent could aspire to such a fate," we are told.

Some viewers, however, may find themselves torn between the excitement of discovery and the feeling that the dead should be left undisturbed.

Less interesting, even slightly laughable, is the "Pet Wrap" portion of "Mummy Hunters" in which animal lovers pay phenomenal prices to keep their beloved pets preserved for eternity. (Don't ask.)

Also featured is "Mr. Mummy" with Dr. Robert Brier, an Egyptologist with mummifying skills, and "Ice Tombs of Siberia," which peeks into the tombs of the ancient Pazyryk people.

For those looking for a master's degree in mummies, try A&E's two-part, four-hour special, "Mummies" (which begins Sunday night and concludes Monday).

Frank Langella narrates this glossy, sprawling look at ancient Egypt and its people; their culture, their treasures, and, most of all, their obsession with immortality.

"Mummies" is a real museum tour replete with expert commentary, high-tech graphics and even some unpleasantly realistic re-creations (brains being removed from the skulls of the dead) during mummification.

It begins with "The Pyramids," where kings, 4,000 years ago resisted the notion that you can't take it with you, thus were rounding themselves in death with most everything they had in life.

Various theories about the construction of the pyramids, the last of the

seven ancient wonders of the world, are discussed with experts, who conclude that the geometric tombs were in fact built by ancient construction workers, not slaves.

From the pyramids, the show moves on to "The Sphinx," which is considered a conduit—like mummification—between the living and the dead.

Monday night's segment moves on to the so-

called carvings known as "The Hieroglyphs" and wraps up — where else? — in "King Tutankhamen's Tomb."

By the end of "Mummies," some audience members may feel like the walking dead.

But not a fast blur. On the other hand, you may be tempted to re-take that high school history test on the period.

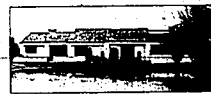

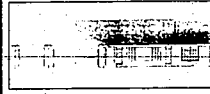
