Idaho Supreme Court takes on prosecution decision in Minidoka murder cases

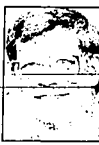

RUPERT — Tight-lipped so far about his reasons for taking over the prosecution of three murder cases in Minidoka County, state Attorney General Lance will have to justify his actions before the Idaho Supreme Court on Tuesday. The Supreme Court Tuesday set a 10 a.m. Tuesday hearing on

Minidoka County Prosecutor Gara Newman's petition, filed Wednesday, for a restraining order prohibiting the attorney general from taking over the three cases. Deputy Attorney General Bill von Tegen said argument probably will include specifics about why the attorney general wrested the prosecution of the three cases from Newman.

"We're preparing a response," he said. Von Tegen said ethics prohibit him from revealing specific concerns of the attorney general with the prosecution of Corey Hood, Jesus Diaz and Kody Butcher. "For us to engage in that discussion perhaps would get into the merits of the case. We can't do that," he said.

The Supreme Court's decision ultimately should resolve who will prosecute the Minidoka County cases. If the court issues the restraining order, the Minidoka County prosecutor will resume the case. If the court denies the order, the attorney general would take over the prosecution.

Arnie Pike, a range management specialist with the Bureau of Land Management, surveys the aftermath of the recently extinguished Richfield fire.

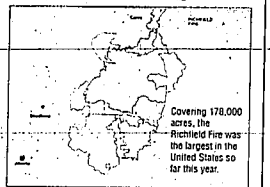
Up from the ashes

Work begins on Richfield Fire rehabilitation

SHOSHONE — The ashes are barely cool, but rehabilitation efforts already have begun on the 178,376-acre Richfield Fire — the largest wildfire in the nation so far this year. The fire was caused by a lightning strike on July 3 and, for all practical purposes, was out by Monday. Officials with the U.S. Bureau of Land Management predict it officially will be declared out sometime today.

Early indications are that the fire burned relatively "cool" and did not sterilize the soil, so much of the vegetation in its path survived. Some areas were lightly singed, while others remain entirely unscathed. Soil oozing spots are as black as coal. Overall, extensive reseeded efforts don't appear necessary. In general terms, the burned area is uninhabited desert "bounded to the west by U.S. Highway 93 from Shoshone to Carey, to the south by

Surgeon general's warning: Get fit!

WASHINGTON — Moderate exercise is as essential to a healthy life as good nutrition, seat belts and avoiding cigarettes, according to the first-ever surgeon general's report on physical fitness and health. "It sounds an urgent wake-up call about the risks of our couch potato culture," Vice President Al Gore said of the report.

"Hopefully, it won't take as long," said Acting Surgeon General Audrey Manley. The core message of the 280-page report is that disease can be prevented and mental health improved by regular, moderate exercise that anyone can do. To illustrate that point, Gore, his wife, Tipper, and Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala, all wearing walking shoes and casual clothes, strode from the west wing of the White House onto the closed-off section of Pennsylvania Avenue

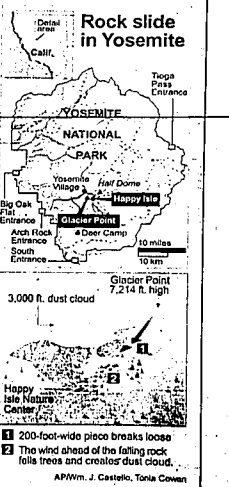
for a press event to announce the findings. "I'd like to say as politely as I possibly can: America, take a walk," said Gore.

Yosemite rock slide kills 1

YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK, Calif. — A massive granite slab broke loose from a cliff with a thunder-clap, causing a blast of wind that flattened trees and crushed a man to death at an ice cream stand. The rock slide Wednesday threw up a dust cloud hundreds of feet high, blotting out the sun.

Montebello, was crushed beneath a tree and killed, the National Park Service said. He was struck in an ice cream stand which also was crushed. Crews wearing surgical masks to avoid inhaling the dust used dogs and fiber optic equipment to search the rubble and make sure no one else was trapped. As many as 11 people were reported injured. The massive rock, 300 to 400 feet wide, broke loose from a ledge that jutted out over a 3,000-ft. high

Idaho weather summary

Sunny skies along with warm summer temperatures and lighter winds made Thursday a pleasant day for outside activities. The current weather pattern should continue through the weekend as high pressure strengthens over the West. Temperatures will rise slightly in that time, with afternoon readings in the 90s across southern Idaho but slightly lower at the higher elevations. Temperatures from around Idaho at 3 p.m. ranged from the mid-70s to the lower-90s. Most reports were in the mid-80s to near 90. Winds at mid-afternoon were variable in direction and in the 5 to 10 mph range. Exceptions were Mountain Home Air Force Base, where winds were northwest at 14 mph gusting to 22 mph. Idaho Falls and Lewiston reported winds were calm.

Weak Bertha heads toward South Carolina

A weakened Hurricane Bertha headed toward North Carolina's beaches on Thursday, with forecasters saying the center of the storm could strike the state's southern-most beaches after daybreak Friday. Winds dropped to 80 mph from 105 mph in the afternoon, but ran up to 8 inches and a storm surge of up to 10 feet were expected Friday morning. Other showers and thunderstorms passed over eastern North Carolina in the morning, but were not connected to Bertha. Bands of showers and thunderstorms resulting from Bertha moved across the northern coastline of Florida and the coast of Georgia. Winds gusted up to 40 mph in some locations. Unseasonably cool weather settled over the lower Great Lakes and the Northeast, breaking a series of records: The temperature in Youngstown, Ohio, dipped to 43 degrees, breaking the record of 44 set in 1978. In Pittsburgh, the mercury fell to 47, breaking the 1983 record of 50 degrees. Strong thunderstorms moved through southeastern South Dakota, southern Minnesota and northern Wisconsin on Thursday. Other showers and thunderstorms broke out in central and eastern Oklahoma, and western and northern Arkansas. Heavy rainfall caused flooding in and around Oklahoma City. By 9 a.m., the city had received 2.67 inches of rain, breaking the old record of 2.65 inches in 1906. Spencer, Okla., had the highest rain total with 6.08 inches and Minot, Okla., had 5.92 inches, the National Weather Service said. Across the west, scattered rain showers and thunderstorms fell across New Mexico and Arizona, as well as southern Nevada. Temperatures in the Lower 48 states ranged from an early-morning low of 33 in Meacham, Ore., to a mid-afternoon high of 100 at Palm Springs, Calif.

state Highway 24 from Shoshone to Minidoka, and to the east by the Kimama-Carey Road. Much of the area has burned in previous years, notably 1971, 1981 and 1992.
It's here, lonely country where waves of heat shimmer above old lava flows. Rock cairns, built by shepherds, dot the hillsides and a careless scrape of a boot can raise a sooty cloud of dust.
The Richfield Fire burned portions of four areas that could be designated as wilderness, as well as one cattle grazing allotment and about 10 sheep allotments. Burned areas are off-limits to grazing for at least two growing seasons, but some livestock may be allowed to walk through the ashes.

Representatives from the Idaho attorney general's office were in town Thursday to review the three cases they are preparing to prosecute despite the threat of an order from the state Supreme Court to stop them.
Scott James, chief of the attorney general's criminal law division, and two other state attorneys examined court documents in 5th District Court - files that Newman has refused to hand over.
Despite the lack of cooperation between the Minidoka County

prosecutor and the attorney general's office, James said he doesn't consider their relationship antagonistic.
"It's not a personal thing. It's strictly a business matter. I don't term it as bickering," he said.
James could not say how prosecution of Hood, Diaz and Butcher will change under the direction of the attorney general's office.
"We're simply talking over what she's done," James said.
In a plea agreement, Hood has pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter in the death of 17-year-old Wendy Hunter and has

agreed to plead guilty to voluntary manslaughter in the death of his 74-year-old grandmother Mae Hood. Newman recently asked 5th District Judge William Hurr to rescind the plea agreement. Her motion will be heard in August.
Next week will be a busy time for prosecutors in the three cases. A hearing in the Hood case is on the docket for Monday at 11 a.m. The preliminary hearing for Diaz and Butcher begins on Thursday.
"We're trying to get prepared," James said. "We believe we are putting it all together."

A pair of Shoshone-based BLM employees toured the east end of the burn Thursday, checking to see which areas will need aerial or ground-based reseeding. Arnie Pike, a rangeland management specialist, and Joe Russell, a wildlife biologist, also surveyed how previously reseeded areas fared during the fire.
Areas that were reseeded in the past contain a variety of diverse grasses which, in many cases, rebuffed the flames.
The goal of reseeding is to "reduce fire frequency and the size of (future) fires," Russell said. "Also, when an area burns, there's a real opportunity for weeds to come in and fill the void - and that's when we've got to fight them aggressively."

Western rangelands: cheatgrass. In all cases on Thursday's tour, the most heavily charred areas were ones where cheatgrass had been growing.
"Cheatgrass has really affected the fire cycle," Russell said, noting that it virtually guarantees another hotter fire in the future.
A highly opportunistic plant, cheatgrass usually is the first green grass on rangelands in the spring. Trouble is, it also is the first to wither and, when dry, the first to burn. After a fire, its seeds are scattered in the nutrient-rich ashes - and it well-positioned to supplant other vegetation when the next growing season rolls around.
To counter that, Pike and Russell can recommend burned areas be reseeded with a wide range of wheatgrass varieties, including thickspike, tall, Siberian and Jordan crested, Sainfoin, Lewis flax and Nevada bluegrass, also are candidates for reseeding.
Trouble is, the seeds can be expensive and some have a hard time growing - particularly when water is scarce, Vander Voet said.
More cheatgrass also is desirable in desert areas because it is essential for sage grouse - which are in sharp decline across southern Idaho. Pronghorn antelope and mule deer also rely on sagebrush for food and cover.
The Richfield Fire made life tough on an unlikely array of animals, ranging from spiders and horned toads to desert-dwelling elk.
The flames exposed many animal burrows, including cannonball-sized badger holes and petite white-tails. The badger exposed a dizzying maze of vole trails, plainly visible against the sooty backdrop.

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Administration offers school repair funds

Clinton wants to spend \$5 billion to patch schools

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton said Thursday he wants to spend \$5 billion to patch decaying schools across the nation.

It was the latest in a series of education initiatives he has announced this election year.

Clinton unveiled the four-year school construction program in a Rose Garden event. The program is designed to help school districts finance the cost of repairs and new construction.

The United States is trying to make progress in educating its young people, Clinton said, and "all this progress is at risk if our children are asked to learn in a landscape that is littered with peeling paint and broken glass."

The president said the schools he attended as a child were "fairly old" but were clean, well-maintained and treated with respect.

"They sent every student a clear message: You are important to us," Clinton said. "That was how my parents' generation kept faith with us, and that is how we must keep faith with our children."

The program, which needs congressional approval, comes just two weeks after a General Accounting Office report documented a need to fix roofs, plumbing and make other repairs in hundreds of school buildings nationwide.

Under Clinton's proposal, school districts could apply for federal subsidies to offset up to 50 percent of the cost of financing new construction or renovation, according to the official, who discussed details of the program on condition that he not be identified.

An estimated \$1.25 billion a year for these interest subsidies would be available for four consecutive years to jump-start repair and new building projects in the nation's 80,000 public schools, the official said.

But offering federal grants to bolster school repairs is not likely to be embraced by many Republicans in Congress who argue against top-down federal education spending, preferring local bond issues for school projects.

The administration is proposing to finance the program with proceeds from the federal government auctions of communications licenses, which so far have raised \$20 billion for the treasury.

"This is great news for America's children and their families," said Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun, D-Ill., who co-commissioned the GAO reports. "School construction needs have overwhelmed state and local governments."

Moseley-Braun said Clinton's plan would be a major step in forming a local-state-federal partnership to rebuild America's dilapidated schools without interfering with local control of education.

The administration hopes that over the four years, the \$5 billion in interest subsidies will spur \$10 billion to \$20 billion in projects at 5,000 to 10,000 schools across America, the Education Department official said.

Hampered by tight budgets, school districts nationwide currently spend between \$10 billion and \$11 billion a year on renovation and new construction, he said.

After passing the Education Infrastructure Act of 1994, Congress approved grants totaling \$100 million to build, repair and renovate school buildings, but the funds were eliminated last year in budget-balancing deals.

However, based on a nationwide survey of 10,000 schools last year, the GAO estimated it would cost

\$111 billion to repair or upgrade schools. The GAO, the investigative arm of Congress, said about one-third of these schools, serving about 14 million pupils, needed extensive repair or replacement of one or more buildings.

Last month, the GAO released another in a series of reports on school buildings that said 38 percent of schools in big cities, 30 percent in rural areas and 29 percent in the suburbs report at least one inadequate building.

"The GAO did a good job of showing how universal the problem is and how much more severe the need was in urban schools," said Michael Casserly, director of the Council of the Great City Schools, which represents the nation's 50 largest urban school systems.

Casserly said some lawmakers will attack the proposal, saying school building projects are the responsibility of local and state governments, not the federal government.

"Eventually, I think it will be passed," he said. "The problem is just too universal and it will encourage so many more construction projects. It's going to be very appealing in urban, rural and suburban districts."

HUD will make available an initial investment of up to \$100 million this year — \$50 million in grants and \$50 million in loan guarantees — to be used for land acquisition, infrastructure improvements or mortgage assistance. The department will work with private or nonprofit developers, church groups and builders.

Cisneros said up to a dozen communities will be chosen. Each will get \$5 million to \$10 million from HUD and have a minimum of 200 to 300 homes.

Republicans accuse Reno of negligence in new report

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans accused Attorney General Janet Reno of negligence in authorizing the FBI's assault on the Branch Davidians and said President Clinton should have accepted her offer to resign.

House Democrats quickly charged that the GOP lawmakers were playing politics in their preliminary report Thursday on the 1993 disaster near Waco, Texas, accusing them of waiting nearly a year to release their conclusions close to the November election and trying to curry favor with the gun lobby.

The report, based on 10 days of emotional hearings last summer, contains only the Republicans' views.

"In light of (Reno's) ultimate responsibility for the disastrous assault and its resulting deaths, the president should have accepted" her resignation at the time, Reps. Bill McCollum, R-Fla., and Bill Zeff, R-N.H., said in the report on the confrontation. The two were co-chairmen of a special committee that held the politically charged hearings.

Reno's decision to end the standoff by using tear gas was "brutal, wrong and highly irresponsible," said the report, which called her action "seriously negligent."

The April 19, 1993, assault ended a 51-day siege against the Davidians at their compound. Cult leader David Koresh and 80 of his followers died by fire or gunshot six hours after the FBI started filling the compound with tear gas through holes punched by a tank.

At last year's hearings, Reno defended her decision to use the gas to end the stalemate, saying the

FBI faced an impossible situation and that the dangers for those inside the compound were becoming worse — especially for children who were being sexually abused by Koresh. She added, though, that the fiery deaths of 25 children there "will be with me for the rest of my life."

Deputy Attorney General Jamie Gorelick, speaking to reporters Thursday at the Justice Department, noted the department had done its own report on Waco that was "quite, self-critical." Changes have been made in how such crises are handled, she added.

"I think you see the product of that ... in the way we handled the Freeman situation and in the way we are handling countless other challenges that we face on a daily basis," Gorelick said.

An 81-day FBI standoff with the anti-government Montana Freeman ended peacefully last month.

The Republican report also sharply criticized former Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen and former Deputy Secretary Roger Altman. It said they "acted highly irresponsibly and were derelict in their duties" in failing to meet with the director of the federal firearms agency about the Waco situation before the initial raid against the compound in February 1993.

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms is part of the Treasury Department.

CDC: Adult smoking rises in the U.S.

ATLANTA (AP) — Smoking among American adults rose slightly in 1994 to 25.5 percent, despite the government's best efforts, and federal health authorities blame cheap cigarettes and nicotine's powerful hold.

As a result, the government acknowledged Thursday it won't meet its goal of reducing smoking to 15 percent of adults by the year 2000.

"We seem to be stuck at 25 percent," said Dr. Michael Eriksen, director of the Office on Smoking and Health at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

A national survey by the CDC found that the percentage of adults who smoke rose slightly in 1994 from 25 percent the year before.

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HUD announces plans to revitalize cities

WASHINGTON (AP) — Housing Secretary Henry Cisneros announced a multi-million-dollar affordable housing program Thursday designed to revitalize America's blighted neighborhoods.

Cisneros said he hopes to lure middle-income families and those living in public and rental housing by transforming neglected areas into desirable neighborhoods with attractive architecture, sidewalks, porches and yards.

"We're going to bring America's cities back" by rebuilding neighborhoods, Cisneros said at a news conference.

"There's no better way to encourage a multiclass, multiethnic, viable urban population in our cities than by creating this form of home-ownership opportunity," he added.

Whistleblower reward posted

WASHINGTON (AP) — Anti-smoking activists who attack politicians for accepting tobacco company money are offering a payment of their own: \$25,000 to any whistleblower who provides information that leads to criminal convictions of tobacco executives.

TRURO, Mass. (AP) — An artist on Cape Cod, Milton Wright has painted the Highland Light dozens of times over the decades, from different angles, in winter and summer.

But Thursday, he saw the lighthouse as never before.

In motion. After warning mariners away from the treacherous shoals since the days of Horner Melville, the 139-year-old white brick lighthouse that has become a symbol of Cape Cod in photographs, literature and art is being moved from its dangerously eroded bluff to keep it from toppling into the Atlantic.

"The move was almost imperceptible. You had to line up with something on the side and see the space getting bigger," said Wright, who watched as the 66-foot tower began its journey.

Speed aside, the lighthouse revealed about 40 feet Thursday — Wright and others who rallied to see the light save the event as momentous.

A crowd watched from behind a rope about 200 feet back as the tower was rolled, 5 feet at a time, along steel rails lubricated with soap. During breaks, spectators put on hard hats to get a close-up

look. Children sold lemonade.

"It's history being made and I'm glad that I was part of it," said Janet Dumas, who traveled half an hour from Dennis to watch. "To rebuild it would not be the same. It's something for our great grandchildren to appreciate."

When the first lighthouse was built there in 1797, it stood 570 feet from the edge of the cliffs, which soar above the beach. The existing 650-ton structure, also known as the Cape Cod Light, was built in 1857 on the same spot.

Today, it is only about 100 feet from the edge of the storm-battered bluffs.

The lighthouse, which is managed by the National Park Service and operated by the Coast Guard, is no longer needed to guide boats, but the beacon that once burned whale oil has become a beloved landmark.

Henry David Thoreau wrote that a man could stand at Highland Light "and put all America behind him." Edward Hopper painted it. Countless tourists snapped photos of it.

After big chunks of the cliff eroded during a blizzard in 1978 and spring storms in 1987, the Truro Historical Society began negotiating with the government to help save it.

Report cited suspicious activity at bomb site

WASHINGTON (AP) — Eight days before a bomb killed 19 Americans at a military housing complex in Saudi Arabia, a Pentagon intelligence report said a pattern of suspicious incidents there "warrants improved security efforts."

Pentagon officials insisted Thursday that this did not amount to a call for stepped up security but rather was a statement of support for improvements already under way at the eight-story Khobar Towers building destroyed in the June 25 attack.

"There was nothing new in this report," spokesman Kenneth Bacon said, referring to a June 17 classified report by the Defense Intelligence Agency that was distributed widely to senior officials at the Pentagon and to U.S. commanders. "It did not suggest that new actions be taken" on security, he said.

Defense Secretary William J. Perry and other top defense officials already were aware of the

heightened security threat in Saudi Arabia, although there had not been signs of organized terrorist groups targeting Americans there, Bacon said.

Bacon disputed a Washington Post report Thursday which said the DIA report had warned of security flaws at Khobar Towers and urged that additional measures be taken to safeguard the more than 2,000 Americans living in the complex.

"The report did not warn of security lapses or flaws at Khobar Towers," Bacon said. "It was not a security alert. It was a summary of protective steps that Saudi officials had taken in response to security observations" in recent months.

In response to the Post article, the Senate Armed Services Committee, whose members had questioned Perry and senior U.S. military officers at a contentious hearing on Tuesday, asked for a DIA briefing on the intelligence report.

President loses visa

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department stripped Colombian President Ernesto Samper of his U.S. visa on Thursday, accusing him of accepting campaign money from drug traffickers and of furthering their interests while in office.

Officials said additional visas of Colombians are expected to be revoked, including those of cabinet ministers.

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Air Force jet crashes in Florida

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) — An Air Force F-16 fighter plane crashed into a house Thursday, setting the home on fire and sending pieces of the jet flying through a neighborhood.

One child was missing and at least two adults were injured, authorities said. A man and a woman were pulled from the burning house by neighbors.

The pilot ejected about two miles from Pensacola Regional Airport and is in good condition, authorities said. The F-16's single engine failed about 20 miles north of Pensacola and the pilot tried to reach the Pensacola airport for an emergency landing, said Air Force spokeswoman Maj. Monica Aloisio.

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Trip home may be delayed

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Yearning for potato chips and the wind and the sun back on Earth, Shannon Lucid may have to hold out an extra six weeks.

NASA said that because of shuttle trouble, it may have to delay a flight to retrieve Lucid from the Russian space station Mir, where the American astronaut has been living since March. She may have to stay in orbit until mid-September.

"Obviously, like anybody, I was looking forward to being with my family and my friends again, but like I told them the other day, 10 years from now, you won't ever remember that we had to wait an extra few weeks before we saw each other," Lucid said Thursday.

NASA said Lucid has plenty of supplies on board for a longer stay. The 53-year-old biochemist said her daughters packed plenty of books for her to read just in case her trip home was postponed.

bypassed
by Dole**

NEW YORK (AP) — Criticized for bypassing the NAACP convention, Bob Dole accused the head of the civil rights organization Thursday of "trying to set me up" and said he'd look for more receptive audiences that "I can relate to."

Dole, interviewed by radio show host Don Imus, said he probably would have gotten a cool reception had he agreed to address the group's annual convention this week in Charlotte, N.C. And he called NAACP Chairman Lewis Mumme a "leading liberal Democrat" who was no friend of his.

Later, speaking to reporters alongside his plane in Washington, Dole strengthened his criticism of Mumme, saying, "The head of the NAACP is a very liberal Democrat and I think he was trying to set me up."

Although senior staff members were well aware of the NAACP invitation, Dole said he had not known about it, adding, "I don't know about a lot of invitations. The important thing is I have a flawless civil rights record."

Mumme responded from Charlotte: "I do not believe it is important whether Bob Dole thinks I'm his friend or not but rather what we can do to help our country. Our hope was that the former senator would make himself available to our membership here in Charlotte in order to hear his vision for America."

Mumme said a scheduling conflict prevented him from attending the convention, and his campaign had offered to send former Housing Secretary Jack Kemp to speak in his stead.

In his telephone interview with Imus, Dole said, "Let's face it, the leader of the NAACP, Mr. Mumme, is not known as a moderate Democrat or a non-partisan Democrat. He's one of the leading liberal Democrats."

In other comments on the Imus show, Dole said he has no problem with Clinton's vow to veto legislation to repeal the 1994 ban on assault weapons. He said he doubted such a measure would ever reach his desk in a Dole presidency. "Events have overtaken the assault weapons ban. We ought to move on to something that has meaning."

Said he knows that retired Gen. Colin Powell "has no interest in being on the ticket" as his running mate. Dole said Powell had told him he'd be able to "help in foreign policy and defense areas" and hopefully would speak at the Republican National Convention.

Campaign spokesman Nelson Warfield said Dole's comments were partly a reaction to criticism Mumme directed at Dole for not speaking to the group.

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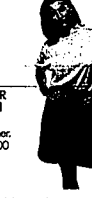
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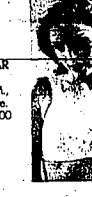
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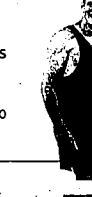
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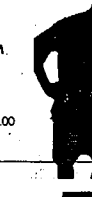

Do we really want to hand our schools to Uncle Sam?

Is there anything that President Clinton *doesn't* think the federal government should take over?

On Thursday, the president announced his desire to spend \$5 billion to patch up America's decaying schools. This four-year program would subsidize up to 50 percent of finance costs for building or repairing schools in America's communities.

It's a swell sentiment. But here's a different proposal for helping America's communities: Instead of funneling that \$5 billion through Washington, leave it in the communities in the first place, and let local people decide how to spend it.

America's communities already have the means of building and repairing schools. If you need evidence of that, look at Jerome. This week, Jerome school officials said they'll ask local voters for \$12.9 million to build a new middle school and to renovate other buildings.

We don't know whether this specific proposal is the right answer for Jerome. But school district leaders are approaching the issue correctly. They have identified a need, they have designed a solution, and they are setting about the task of persuading voters to support it. If they can build a community consensus for the project, it'll get done.

Over and over, Idaho voters have demonstrated that they are willing to pay higher local taxes when school leaders make a persuasive case.

Making that case might be a little easier if voters felt just burdened by federal taxes. It's just common sense. If the federal load were lighter, people would have more money to spend locally.

What Clinton wants to do runs precisely backward. It's a classic example of campaigning for office by promising federal favors, while hoping people will ignore the costs.

Cost is not the only problem with Clinton's idea. Federal money always comes with federal rules.

If local school districts accept a federal hand-out to build schools, they can expect a tall stack of federal mandates that will raise costs and force schools to fit the federal mold. Do Americans really want to hand Uncle Sam more control over local schools?

All things considered, school districts probably would be better off without this new federal help. Taxpayers certainly would be. Americans have been saying loudly that they want less federal meddling in their business, and less federal financing of their money.

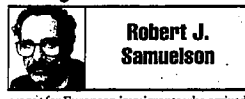
Imported poverty skews social indicators

As a nation, America is importing poverty that is the clearest consequence of the surge in immigration that began in the early 1970s. I do not say this to be alarmist or to advocate any type of immigration legislation. I say it merely to highlight an important truth that's usually overlooked in our discussions of other social issues, ranging from poverty to the lack of health insurance. We deceive ourselves by discussing these matters as if immigration has had little effect on them.

The silent assumption is that the population is static. If poverty hasn't declined, then something must be making it harder for people to escape poverty. If more people lack health insurance, then insurance must be much less available.

But the population isn't static. Many people at the bottom are immigrants, and because they arrive poor, they instantly aggravate all these problems. In any one year, new immigrants (about 300,000 of them legal and perhaps 300,000 illegal) don't have much effect. But the cumulative impact is significant. Between 1970 and 1994, immigrants rose from 4.8 percent to 8.7 percent of the population. And the new immigrants come from different countries than the old. In the 1950s, two thirds of a much smaller number came from Europe and Canada. By the 1980s, nearly half came from Mexico, other parts of Latin America and the Caribbean; almost 40 percent came from Asia.

It is not simply that many new immigrants are desperately poor. That's often been true. More important, many don't achieve the rapid income gains of some earlier immigrants. Wages of many European immigrants reached the levels of native-born Americans after 10 or 15 years. A new study by the Rand Corp., a research organization, shows that this is still true for European immigrants, but it applies to many Asian immigrants. In 1990

waged for European immigrants who arrived in the late 1970s were 10 percent above those of American-born workers, for Asians who arrived in the late 1970s, wages were 15 percent higher in 1990.

But the picture for Mexican and many other Hispanic immigrants is much different, reports Rand. Mexicans arriving in the late 1970s received wages half the level of natives; by 1990 their wages were still about half. Simply as a matter of arithmetic, all these poor workers worsen our poverty indicators.

From various reports, I have tried to estimate the impact. To do so, I used the classification "Hispanic" as a substitute for "immigrants," because most reports don't identify immigrants separately. Admittedly, this is crude. All Hispanics aren't immigrants, and all immigrants aren't Hispanic. Still, immigration has propelled the rise of the Hispanic population, and so the connection though less is real. Here's what the reports imply: Poverty: Perhaps a quarter to a half of the increase in poverty since the early 1970s reflects immigration. Between 1973 and 1994, the number of people with incomes below the government's official poverty line rose by 15 million. Of those, 6 million (or 40 percent) were Hispanic.

No health insurance: The impact is similar. Between 1987 and 1994, the number of Americans without health insurance rose by 8.7 million of these, 3.3 million (38 percent) were Hispanic. Economic inequality: Immigration has aggravated it. In 1994 nearly one in eight households among the poorest fifth of Amer-

icans was Hispanic. In 1974 the Hispanic share was only one in 20. And as the Rand study shows, average wages for immigrants have fallen compared with those of natives. Don't misunderstand me. Immigration didn't cause these problems. It simply made them worse. Nor can the ill effects easily be erased by legislation. Many poor immigrants arrive illegally. If we could halt that, we would already have done so. Indeed, some anti-immigration measures could backfire.

For example, one proposal now before Congress would allow states to deny schooling to children of illegal immigrants. That's unwise. Thousands of children (more than 300,000 in California) could be ejected. And because many might stay in the United States, they could ultimately end up poorer.

Finally, I'm not predicting a new permanent underclass. Just because people arrive poor does not mean their families stay poor forever. Later generations of Mexican-Americans do better than immigrants, reports a study by economist Stephen Trejo of the University of California, Santa Barbara. Among them, average wages for second- and third-generation Mexican-Americans rise to about 80 percent of those of whites.

America's powerful tides of assimilation may work as they have in the past or they may not. No one can say, because the surge in immigrants is too recent to permit sweeping conclusions. But here there is clearly one of the great challenges we now face.

My message is less about immigrants than about how we judge our condition. So many poor newcomers cannot be assimilated instantly or effortlessly. Immigration inevitably depresses indicators of American well-being. If we ignore that, we'll wrongly conclude that we're doing worse than we are.

Are scoping meetings for real?

Are we to take seriously the Air Force's incomplete and out-of-compliance pseudo-scoping meetings? Air Force Regulations 19-2, 10 August 1982, give precise instructions for conducting scoping hearings preliminary to writing any draft environmental impact statement. Since no Air Force actions so far seen in this "enhanced training range" effort clearly comply with regulations, pray tell: Were these recent "meetings" intended to take the place of scoping hearings? Or does the Air Force intend to comply in the near future by conducting regulation scoping hearings?

Col. Peck of Mountain Home Air Force Base told this paper, "We learned a lot last time."

Citizens of Idaho have the right, according to Air Force Regulations 19-2, to formal hearings in representative communities that will be affected by the proposed expansion. Each hearing to conform to following:

A. Citizen speakers scheduled by subject.
B. Recording of attendees with a list of all persons desiring to speak, to ensure an accurate transcript of the meeting plus mailing list for any desiring to receive a transcript afterwards.

C. and D. Hearing officer should open the hearing and explain the proposed action, alternatives and potential environmental consequences.

E. and F. Questions by attendees followed by statements of attendees.

Items A through F clearly imply a meeting where speakers can address everyone presents with questions and receive sensible answers. Since the Air Force's recent "open house" series bear no resemblance to the Air Force Regulations, it follows that no draft environmental impact statement can flow from them. They are at best zero in the procedure. Quoting from AF 19-2 again, "As soon as possible after a decision is made to prepare an environmental impact statement, and after the notice of intent is published, the public process called 'scoping' must be used to determine the scope of issues to be addressed."

When do you suppose we may expect to receive a schedule of scoping hearings?

Without scoping, the Air Force cannot lawfully proceed. And without scoping, the public has been deprived of its right under

the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 to get information and to name the corners the study must address.

Four tries and they still cannot get it right. I'm curious just what was it that Col. Peck learned "last time"?

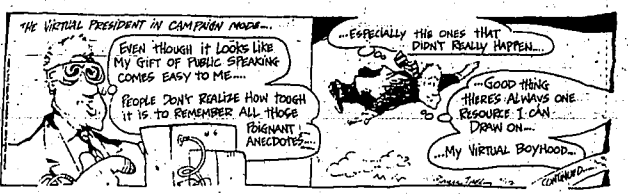

Moscow bus explosion wounds 5

MOSCOW (AP) — A bomb hidden in a bag of vegetables ripped open a bus in downtown Moscow Thursday, the capital's second transit blast in a month.

Five people were injured. There was no claim of responsibility for the bombing, which Russia's new security chief, Alexander Lebed, called "mindless terrorism." Special police units were deployed on the Moscow subway, scene of a bombing last month, after Thursday's blast. The bomb, equipped with a timing device, was placed on the bus

13 minutes before it exploded at about 9 a.m. Moscow time, Russian television said. The bus was approaching Pushkin Square, about half a mile from the Kremlin, and it had just passed the buildings housing the lower and upper houses of parliament. A passenger on the No. 12 bus spotted the bag and handed it to the driver. It exploded as he was opening the bag, eyewitnesses and police said.

"Thank God the driver's section in the trolley bus is separated from the passengers. That is why nobody except the driver was seri-

ously hurt," said police spokesman Alexander Cherednikov.

The blast tore off the roof and turned the front of the vehicle into a twisted tangle of blackened metal.

A Volkswagen minivan also was damaged, and the windows of a disco were shattered. The bus driver, 38-year-old Alexander Kokrev, was badly burned, and four passengers sustained minor injuries, news reports said.

Russian media said the device was relatively small and contained less than half a pound of TNT.

Physicians try new AIDS cure designed for newly infected men

VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — In a pioneering attempt to cure AIDS, doctors are giving a powerful combination of drugs to newly infected men to see if they can permanently wipe out all traces of the virus.

The idea is to hit HIV fast and hard before it becomes deeply established in the body. No one knows if it will work, but the doctors believe they may have an answer next fall when they stop giving medicines to their patients. "We are treading in an area where no one has tread before," Dr. Martin Markowitz of the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center in New York City said Thursday.

Drug cocktails made up of two older AIDS medicines plus a new class called protease inhibitors are the hottest innovations in AIDS therapy. Many experiments are under way, and several preliminary reports have been presented here at the 11th International Conference on AIDS.

The combinations can eliminate

all measurable traces of HIV in the blood, even when given to people who have been infected for several years. Many, however, doubt this approach will kill every last trace of the virus, especially if it has burrowed into the brain and other parts of the body that are hard to reach with drugs.

Still, doctors believe they have the best chance of a cure — the permanent, complete eradication of the virus from the body — if they start treatment very early in the infection. If that works, they might also be able to clear out the virus in some people with long-term infections, especially as new drugs become available.

Dr. David Ho, another Diamond researcher, said that within two weeks, the three-drug approach kills all virus in the blood stream

as well as infected cells that are producing new copies of the virus. But the virus lingers in disease-fighting T cells and macrophages. He estimated that it would take one to three years for all of the infected cells in these so-called viral compartments to die off.

At that point, theoretically, the infection is cured — assuming it is not hidden somewhere else, such as the brain. Testing that is the goal of the new experiment, being conducted on nine volunteers.

"No patient has been cured," Ho said, "but we want to find out if it is possible or not to have each of the viral compartments burn out." People frequently don't learn they are infected until many years after infection, when a blood test shows they are producing antibodies to HIV.

Vietnam says it needs more U.S. assistance

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — The United States should provide more humanitarian aid to alleviate problems left over from the Vietnam War, Vietnam said Thursday.

"The cooperation has not been commensurate with U.S. capabilities, Vietnam's needs or the interests of both sides," Foreign Ministry spokesman Tran Quang Hoan said at a news conference.

However, Hoan gave an upbeat summary of developments in relations with Washington. It was one year ago Friday that U.S. President Clinton announced he was establishing diplomatic relations with Vietnam. "We have no reason to feel disappointed with ... relations, especially if this is viewed against the background of a long period of hostility," he said. Hoan made the appeal for more aid while discussing suffering caused by the war, but did not mention a specific amount. Vietnamese officials often point out that new generations still feel the war's sting in the form of birth defects blamed on U.S. herbicides, injuries from old ordnance and environmental damage.

Meanwhile, Hoan pledged that his government will keep working with U.S. investigators to account for Americans missing from the war. "Vietnam will continue cooperating with the United States until the fullest possible account of the MIAs is achieved ...," he said.


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Crusty politician tries to force delivery to projects

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Forget 30-minute or a half.

A person living in San Francisco's housing projects could starve waiting to get a pizza delivered.

Plagued by robberies and even murder, pizza shops and other delivery businesses stay out of the projects. Willie Kennedy, a 72-year-old former city supervisor who lives in San Francisco's tough Bayview-Hunter's Point district, calls it racism.

"This neighborhood has been ostracized. They think every African-American is a criminal," Kennedy said.

Before she retired in May, Kennedy pushed through an ordinance that requires delivery to all neighborhoods.

But the Board of Supervisors has already softened the measure, which carries no fines. The amendment allows delivery people to refuse to go to certain homes if they have a "good faith" belief that doing so would be "an unreasonable risk of harm."

In Kennedy's absence, it passed unanimously. Kennedy's fight started in March when her grandson, William Fobbs, called two shops, Domino's and Mr. Pizzaman, to order pizza for his kids. Both refused delivery to his Bayview-Hunter's Point address.

"And he doesn't even live in the projects," Kennedy said.

Pizza shop owners don't deny they are reluctant to deliver to what they see as high-crime areas.

The Domino's chain calls them red zones and uses maps with certain streets marked off-limits in red ink. Other areas are marked with yellow. There, drivers will honk their horns for curbside delivery only. Other chains, like Pizza Hut and Little Caesar, have similar policies.

"There are certain parts out there where the bad guys outnumber the good guys — and that worries us," said David Wilcox, owner of the Domino's that refused delivery to Fobbs.

Carlos Irias took a job at the Domino's about

four months ago. On one daytime delivery, he was held in a choke hold while a robber took his wallet and nearly \$150.

"Sure, I'm scared. But what can I do?" Irias said. "You have to work, you know?"

And it's not just robberies. Wilcox said his workers' compensation insurance rates doubled after one of his drivers was killed during a robbery in 1994.

Perot: Voters want him to run

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ignoring his sour poll ratings, Ross Perot said Thursday he's running for president again because "the American people want me to do this."

Former Colorado Gov. Richard Lamm was disappointed but said he would not drop his bid to be the nominee of Perot's Reform Party.

Perot made clear he would accept nomination of the Reform Party he has spent millions to build. "If anybody should do it, I should do it," he said. "I will do it and I'm in a unique position to do it."

Lamm, who announced his bid for the Reform Party nomination Tuesday, wasn't the only presidential hopeful disap-

pointed by Perot's maneuvering. "I would hope he wouldn't run," said Republican candidate Bob Dole, who views a Perot candidacy as a serious obstacle to cur-

ting into President Clinton's big summer lead. "I would hope it would be a two-man race," said Dole.

Republican National Committee Chairman Haley Barbour says more blunt in describing GOP worries about another Perot run. "A vote for Perot is a vote for

Bill Clinton," Barbour said. "Bill Clinton's best hope of getting re-elected is to slip in the back door of the White House with 43 percent of the vote like he did the last time."

The response at the White House was more muted. For now, anyway, Clinton advisers believe the president benefits from a three-way race involving Perot on the grounds it would splinter the anti-Clinton vote.

But White House spokesman Mike McCurry said it was "not very useful for us to speculate" because it was unclear whether Perot or Lamm would be the Reform Party candidate.

Woman dies in collision with train

BANCROFT (AP) — Caribou County authorities are investigating the circumstances surrounding the death of a 19-year-old woman whose car was hit by a train at a crossing in southeastern Idaho.

Archer of Bancroft died instantly when the Union Pacific Railroad train hit her car Wednesday as it pulled on to the tracks. Her year-old son was strapped in a car seat and was not injured.

The baby was released to his grandparents.

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Yellowstone faces \$80,000 budget shortfall

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — Facing a budget shortfall and some unexpected expenses, Yellowstone National Park officials are considering cutbacks.

Flood insurance in Livingston, Mont., has pushed an existing \$50,000 deficit to \$80,000, Superintendent Mike Finley said.

Although less than a half percent of the park's \$19 million budget, Finley said the red ink, coming with less than three months left in the budget year, could mean layoffs, cancelling some contracts or even shortening the park season.

"When most of your budget is personnel, the only way to make up money is by laying people off, closing facilities and cutting services," he said.

Finley's budget-cutting proposals have drawn a firestorm of criticism from some politicians who have accused him of using scare tactics in an effort to boost the park's budget.

U.S. Rep. Barbara Cubin, R-Wyo., recently asked for and received the services of a House Resources Committee staffer, who traveled to Yellowstone this week to audit the park's finances.

In the past 10 years, Yellowstone's base funding has grown only 4 percent when adjusted for inflation, park budget officer Don Striker said. He said in that same period, visitor numbers have increased 39 percent.

Finley said the park also is supporting new programs and activities that demand more attention and money — preparation of an environmental impact statement on bison management and research on handling the increase in non-native lake trout.

Richfield power outage caused by pole repair

RICHFIELD — Richfield will be without electricity for up to four hours today as Idaho Power Co. crews replace a transmission pole burned in a recent fire.

The power outage will begin at 10 a.m. today and will last from two to four hours, Claudette Stevenson of Idaho Power said. The outage will affect Richfield as well as the area six miles north of Richfield, two miles east of the town and four miles west of the town, she said.

Work will affect the power lines that feed into the company's Lincoln Substation.

Party for new airport terminal set for July 27

TWIN FALLS — Joslin Field, Magic Valley Regional Airport, will dedicate the new terminal opened this year with an Airport Appreciation Day from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on July 27.

Military, warbird, experimental, home-built, skydiving and radio-controlled airplanes, along with medical and security helicopters, will be on display. Hot dogs, hamburgers and soft drinks will be served, and people can buy airplane rides around town.

Crews resurface Idaho 75 between Stanley, Galena

STANLEY — Crews will begin Monday resurfacing about 15 miles of Idaho 75 between Galena Summit and Stanley, the Idaho Transportation Department announced.

Old pavement will be pulled up, freshened with new oil, replaced and covered with new pavement on almost 10 miles of cracked and rough Idaho 75 from the Salmon River to the Custer County line, and another five miles from Redfish Lake Creek Bridge to Valley Creek.

The two lanes will be narrowed to one, and flaggers will guide traffic. The \$1.26 million project should be completed by October.

Grant will help Idaho's Vietnam-era veterans

TWIN FALLS — Idaho has received a \$242,096 grant to help Vietnam-era veterans, recently discharged veterans and veterans with service-connected disabilities find and keep jobs.

State insurance fund will issue dividends in January

BOISE — The Idaho State Insurance Fund announced Thursday that it anticipates issuing dividends totaling about \$50 million to its eligible worker's compensation insurance policy holders in January 1997.

Dividends will range from 0 to about 60 percent, depending on the policy holder's premium size and loss ratio, Fund Manager Drew Forney said.

The dividend will be calculated on the premium paid and losses incurred for each eligible policy holder insured with the Fund for at least six months between July 1994 and June 1995, he said. The exact amount of the dividend will be announced in December.

The State Insurance Fund is Idaho's largest provider of worker's compensation insurance and has been self-supporting since its creation in 1917 by the Idaho Legislature.

Lion fears increase despite study results



Rising mountain lion populations in southern Idaho aren't threatening deer numbers, a study says.

BURLEY — With mountain lion populations rising in southern Idaho, area residents fear mule deer herds may not survive — despite the findings of a recent Idaho State University study.

That was a common sentiment expressed Wednesday evening at the Cassia County Public Lands meeting. More than 35 ranchers, land officials and concerned residents gathered to hear the results of a 10-year study on mountain lions in the Albion and Black Pine Mountains.

"While we compliment your research efforts, we have a real problem here," Elba rancher Stan Lloyd said. "The deer herds are being decimated, and we want to see this balance we keep hearing about."

John Landre, a research professor at ISU said the mountain lion population is increasing at a higher rate than the deer population, but as long as the overall deer population remains relatively young, it shouldn't pose a problem in relation to overall deer numbers.

"I don't see any signs of the young not being able to survive and multiply at a sustainable rate, but we've just begun research on the deer in terms of how much of a threat mountain lions are to them," Landre said.

In an effort to restore deer populations, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game has issued only 200 doe permits this year for the Unit 55 area between Oakley and Malin and Burley and Utah, which is 50 fewer permits than what was issued in 1993.

"Some people are critical of us issuing doe tags when the numbers are so low right now, but my response is that other people have asked us to maintain some hunting and we feel that biologically, this area can sustain a small harvest of does," Fish and Game wildlife biologist Randy Smith said.

Since reducing the number of permits by almost 75 percent three years ago, Smith said, the deer population has increased only slightly.

"The numbers still aren't where we'd like them to be today, but they'll return," he said.

In the past few years, Fish and Game has issued 100 doe permits.

Jury clears dance hall owner in shooting incident

TWIN FALLS — A jury cleared Rupert dance hall owner Albino Ortega of aggravated assault charges Thursday at the Twin Falls County Courthouse.

A 12-person jury deliberated for about two hours before setting Ortega free of two counts of aggravated assault stemming from a March 1995 shooting incident outside of his Fiesta Mexicana dance hall.

"Some cases are close, some are not," Ortega's attorney Keith Roark said in the defense's closing argument. "This one falls into the latter category."

Both Ortega and his brother, Efrain Ortega — whose own aggravated assault case was declared a mistrial Tuesday due to an error by Minidoka County Prosecuting Attorney Gara Newman — took the stand as defense witnesses Thursday.

Albino Ortega testified that the incident started when a tow-truck crew tried to remove a band's bus that was parked slightly over an imaginary line dividing the parking lot shared by the Fiesta Mexicana and the adjacent King's variety store.

Randy Timmons, who was helping his father, Gene Timmons with the towing duties, got into an argument with Ortega over the bus.

"He started yelling at me and spitting on my face," Ortega testified.

Ortega admitted telling Timmons, "If you put a tire of your tow truck in my parking lot, I'll shoot it," before Rupert Police Sgt. Lou Jones broke up the argument.

A few minutes later, Ortega said he handed a gun to Efrain Ortega — who was supposed to patrol the parking lot for gangs or other trouble.

Albino Ortega said he was walking

toward the dance hall when he heard Efrain Ortega accidentally fire the pistol.

Gene and Randy Timmons were sitting in their tow truck about 100 to 150 feet away from the Ortegas in the parking lot when the shot went off.

Thursday, the defense focused on several discrepancies in testimony from state witnesses Gene and Randy Timmons, including the following:

- Gene Timmons testified that only one man was initially standing behind the truck before the shot was fired, while Randy Timmons said the two brothers were pacing around and were standing next to each other before the shot was fired.

- The two described the alleged struggle for the gun between the Ortegas very differently.

"If this incident happened, why is it that two men watching the same incident saw very different things?" Roark asked.

Randy Timmons testified in April of 1995 that Albino Ortega reached into his coat and pulled out a gun before pointing it at them. He testified Thursday that he never saw Ortega pull a gun from his coat.

- Randy Timmons testified in 1995 that he didn't get on the floor when he saw Ortega pointing a gun at him, but said Thursday he knelt on the floor of the truck during the incident.

- In April of 1995, Gene Timmons reported that Efrain Ortega initially pointed the gun at the truck and Albino Ortega fired the gun. This week, his testimony said just the opposite.

- In the 1995 hearing, Gene Timmons said he watched the brothers from his rear-view mirror. However, in his testimony this week, he said he watched the incident from a side mirror.

"Every time that Gene Timmons

Twin Falls County program strikes at domestic violence

TWIN FALLS — Fearing the court system and police officers, battered women often don't tell officials what is happening to them, and the abuse continues.

Twin Falls County is working to change that.

Volunteers Against Violence, the county sheriff's office and the county prosecuting attorney's office all have victim-witness coordinators now.

They and others are working together to assist women and children. Public-service announcements showing that families can be helped will soon be produced.

Those are some reasons why a Twin Falls County program called OASIS — which stands for Officers, Advocates, Shelters, Intervention and Services — received almost a third of Idaho's \$387,446 STOP Violence Against Women allotment.

And the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement wants to keep giving grant money to programs such as OASIS and hopes similar collaborative efforts will grow and spread statewide, said Steve Raschke, the department's grants-management supervisor.

"It will be more difficult for a batterer to hide anywhere in Idaho. That's what we hope to do with these grants," Raschke said. "We're not fools — we don't think \$300,000 is going to stop domestic violence."

On Thursday, domestic-violence victims and a wide range of people who work with them met to start a task force, part of the OASIS plan to halt violence against women. The group also wants to expand outside of Twin

A couple of people talked of the May 1995 shooting death of 22-year-old Nicole Palmer of Buhl. The man suspected in the shooting was the son of her 6-year-old daughter, 39-year-old Ricardo Barboza of Castleford, apparently shot himself and was found a day later.

"We have a problem here, folks, in Twin Falls County. Violence is still. It does exist," said Freddy Keeton, Twin Falls County's grant administrator.

In the three and a half years Twin Falls County Prosecutor Richard Bevan has been in office, there have been six homicides in the county. Three were domestic-violence cases.

Bevan said part of his frustration in dealing with domestic violence is that his office handles just 20 percent of the county's cases. Misdemeanors are handled by city prosecutors who have private practices, said Bevan, noting that none were at Thursday's meeting.

The third time people get a domestic-violence conviction in a 15-year period, however, they face a felony conviction, he said.

Margaux remembered in ceremony

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — With curious inline skaters, fishermen and tourists looking on, a small group of friends held a memorial service for Margaux Hemingway in a service held at the end of Santa Monica Pier.

"We're here to honor the memory of a beautiful young woman, whose smile was so infectious you had to compare it to sunshine," said the Rev. Bill Minson, a longtime Hemingway friend and founder of an Internet-based church called Tudy Cyberchurch Ministries.

About 15 people, many clutching bouquets of flowers, attended the memorial, which featured a string quartet from South Central Los Angeles playing Bach and a soloist singing the gospel standard "Blessed Assurance."

Onlookers, including barbequed men fishing from the pier, kneepad-wearing skaters and a group of Italian tourists, joined the ceremony, asking attendees for programs, and a brief bio on Hemingway and Minson.

Mourner Natalie Alexander seemed pleased with the tribute. A friend who called herself Hemingway's "cosmic gypsy soul sister," she said she felt the model-actress was in a better place.

"I think Margaux is off doing higher work," Alexander said. "She's on another plane, a higher plane, and I feel her very strongly. I feel her peace."

Hemingway, 41, was found dead July 1 in her beach apartment far from the famed pier. Her body was cremated and services were held Saturday in her hometown of Ketchikan, Idaho.

Minson, a former Hollywood talent agent, said he decided to hold another memorial to counter media speculation that

Hemingway may have committed suicide. He said he chose to have it at Santa Monica Pier because it was

one of Hemingway's favorite places. An autopsy conducted the day after her body was found did not

indicate a cause of death and toxicological testing was ordered.

The Los Angeles County coroner's office is awaiting those results.

"These reports have broken the hearts, I'm sure, of a lot of people here," said Minson, who used a folded handkerchief to wipe away tears during the hour-long service.

"Like a lot of us, Margaux had her problems in life, but like few of us she fought them head on, defeated them and went on with her life," he said.

The service had just begun when actor Robert Guillaume, a Hemingway acquaintance, collapsed and vomited several feet behind the mourners and was quickly surrounded by news photographers.

While a soloist sang "Ave Maria," paramedics treated the star of the TV series "Bonanza" for a deep cut above his left eye. He was taken by ambulance to Saint John's Hospital and Health Center. The hospital referred calls to Guillaume's manager, Alan David.

David said Guillaume received stitches for the cut and was to be moved later Thursday to Cedars-Sinai Medical Center for overnight observation by his personal physician.

"He seems to be feeling good," David said. "I spoke to his wife and I could hear him yelling at me in French. He said he must be fine."

Harbor patrol officers said the actor became dizzy and fainted after earlier tripping over a nail in the wooden pier and falling and hitting his head.

Guillaume also told them he had been feeling ill.

Minson assured the crowd that Guillaume was all right.

Forester decries 'degraded' land in Northwest

BOZEMAN, Mont. (AP) — Much of the public land in the upper Columbia River drainage has been heavily degraded, and the damage intensified as the distance from wilderness areas increases, Northern Regional Forester Hal Salwasser contends.

"Areas with the best ecological integrity tend to be associated with wilderness and roadless lands," Salwasser said.

Most damage has been caused by fire suppression, road building, logging and mining, based on preliminary findings of the environmental analysis of the 144 million-acre region that stretches from western Montana through Idaho to the east slopes of the Cascade Mountains in Washington and Oregon.

Speaking at Montana State University, Salwasser said about 60 percent of native grasses and old growth forests are now gone

and more and more of the land is covered by younger, smaller, less fire-resistant trees that increase the danger of major blazes by 2 1/2 times historic levels.

In laying the groundwork for so-called ecosystem management, Salwasser said, foresters contemplating timber harvests must ask not only how much wood is growing every year and how much can be cut, but how the harvest will affect water, wildlife and other resources.

The study has identified seven alternative management schemes along with their costs and pluses and minuses including reductions in grazing and timber harvests. A preferred management approach will be selected after consultation with various public and private groups and political interests.

Salwasser predicted that politics "is still going to play a role in the final decision expected next year."

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Idaho Falls leaders spar over jet ski oversight

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho Falls leaders may have to take a stand on so-called "jet skis" on their local waters.

Earlier this year, Mayor Linda Milam declined to appoint a person to a county task force created among other things, consider the mini-boats.

But a recent attorney general's opinion makes it clear the state believes towns have to manage their own waters for waters within city limits.

"The city cannot regulate within the county, and the county cannot regulate within the city," states the July 8 opinion issued by Deputy Attorney General William von Tegen.

"That goes against everything we've always been given to understand," Milam said Wednesday.

"We've always understood that the county controls the waters." The county task force disbanded this spring after the Bonneville County commissioners decided to hold off until a state task force made its own recommendations on the new personal watercraft law passed by the legislature.

It allows counties to ban the jet skis on specific waterways. Critics say they are noisy and dangerous.

The issue started to heat up this month when Milam wrote the commissioners inquiring when the

county task force would be reconvened.

She explained residents were irritated by the little boats, and suggested the county slap a speed limit on city limits.

Not their problem, the commissioners said, and turned to the attorney general's office.

The county expects to reconvene the task force later this summer following the state recommendations, which should come in early August.

State, others come up with river basin funds

BOISE (AP) — Money from a state lawsuit against a trucking company which dumped fertilizer into the Little Salmon River is helping pay for projects to improve salmon and steelhead habitat there.

Gov. Phil Batt on Thursday approved the use of about \$24,000 of mitigation funds from his office budget for the Little Salmon River Basin north of New Meadows.

"This agreement is an excellent public-private partnership," Batt said. "Not only will the state agencies work with the federal counterparts, but most of the work will be done on private land by Trout Unlimited and Idaho Fish and Game volunteers."

The state used Southern Idaho Refrigerated Transport after its tractor-trailer carrying red-fertilizer slid off-U.S.-95 into the Little Salmon in December 1987.

The chemical wiped out all the fish down to stream's confluence with the Main Salmon River.

A federal judge awarded \$39,000 to the state for cleanup and restitution.

The local Soil Conservation Districts and the Ted Treadwell Chapter of Trout Unlimited will be able to spend the \$24,000 for six projects.

The state Soil Conservation Commission, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and local landowners came up with funding for a grand total of more than \$45,000.

The projects focus on riparian habitat within private timber and ranching property in the basin.

"This is a good way to spend these funds in a manner that will assist the state's salmon, steelhead and bull trout, as well as quality-impaired listed streams," Batt said.

The activities include building fence lines, stabilizing streambanks, planting vegetation and installing cover troughs.

The projects are Boise Cascade Corp.'s Mud Creek, Circle C Ranch, Arvon Wilson Rapid River, Ranch C Ranch, Dean Dryden Ranch Little Salmon River, and Doug Boggon Ranch Squaw Creek.

Strip search suit goes to trial

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A woman's claims that she was sexually abused by a police officer at the Davis County Jail and then held in a cell with male prisoners while only partially clothed will go to trial.

U.S. District Court Judge Tena Campbell set on Oct. 7 trial date for Kristine Chatwin's complaint against the county and Centerville police officers Paul Child and Doug Campbell.

Campbell refused to dismiss the three from the suit in a June 28 ruling, although she did release Centerville City from liability. Davis County has argued it is protected by governmental immunity.

Child and Iverson have said they did not request the strip search and were not involved in the case after arriving at the jail.

Chatwin was a passenger in a car stopped by the officers in Centerville shortly before 9 p.m. on April 23, 1993.

When open containers of alcohol were discovered, she and the other occupants were handcuffed and taken to the jail.

On their way, Chatwin, then 25, was strip-searched, while another female passenger wearing bulidier clothing was not. Chatwin claims that without explanation police refused to return all her clothing to her, forcing her to wear only a transparent top that revealed her bra.

She was then placed in a holding cell with roughly 20 male detainees who made lewd and suggestive remarks, which she says police made no attempt to stop. She claims police required her to state her name, address and phone number in the presence of the men who were harassing her and refused to provide a prison issue shirt or any

other covering for more than two hours, despite repeated requests.

Chatwin says she was held in the cell until 1:30 a.m. even though she had posted bail and a ride had been waiting for her since 10 p.m.

She says in the lawsuit that she was cold, afraid for her safety and that the cell was inadequately supervised.

The treatment has "caused extreme fear, embarrassment, mental and emotional distress and chronic depression," the suit said.

Utah carnival worker shot in stomach

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — A 30-year-old carnival worker was in critical condition Thursday afternoon at Salt Lake hospital after she was shot in the stomach with a shotgun.

Idaho State Police officers near Downey, Idaho, arrested a 31-year-old Idaho man who is suspected of shooting Theresa Campbell. The car in which the man allegedly fled broke down south of Downey and he was on foot when arrested Monday.

The suspect was identified as Brian Oher, most recently of Chubbuck. He also was described by officials as a carnival worker.

The woman was shot just before 4 a.m. Thursday while in a parking lot at Willow Park, where members of a small carnival were camping. Logan police Lt. Craig Anderson said carnival workers reporting hearing loud voices, then the gunshot.

Campbell was airlifted to LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City.

Oher has a police record in Chubbuck, where he was picked up June 26.

Police puzzled by torture

REXBURG (AP) — An investigation into a robbery and torture session is at a standstill, said Madison County Sheriff Greg Moffat.

On June 9, 10 migrant Stevco Farm workers were tortured and \$2,200 in cash was stolen from their home near Sugar City.

"We have exhausted most of our leads," he said. "We are kind of stymied, as much as I hate to say it."

Moffat said he believes the robbers knew the victims.

"My guess is that it was local people and I think they are still around here," he said.

One of the victims escaped through a window and walked about three miles to Green Canyon Hot Springs to call authorities.

Moffat said the case is hard to solve because there is no pattern to follow.

"I kind of wish it would happen again. It would give us more evidence and the more evidence we can collect the better," Moffat said.

Although Newman's failure to disclose vital information to Roark resulted in a mistrial in Efraim Ortega's case earlier this week, the charges against him can still be filed.

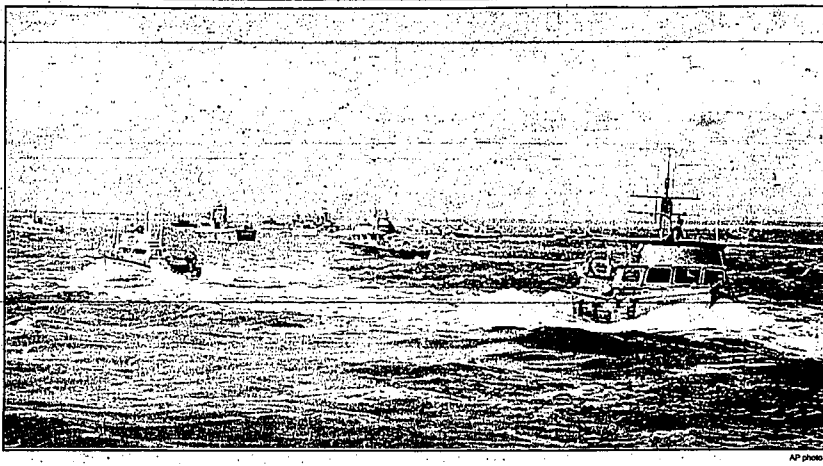

Bristol Bay fishery holds frustration

NAKNEK, Alaska (AP) — Ten minutes into a 12-hour opening to snap up Bristol Bay red salmon, some 400 boats are jockeying for position in a high-seas game of chicken. In the middle of the frenzy, two boats sit dead calm in the water, paralyzed by the driftnet of one hopelessly tangled in the prodder of the other.

The skipper of the F.V. New Joe Barry, Andrew Salmeri, jumps out of his seat, calling to the skipper of the F.V. Gladnik for running over his laid-out net. The Gladnik skipper denies he's to blame and ignores Salmeri's demands that he replace the damaged net.

As the minutes and the salmon slip past, Salmeri finally orders his crew to cut the net. He's losing a good 40 feet — about \$700 worth — and must fish the rest of the opening with a shorter net.

"This is how I have to earn a living," he yells in frustration.

"If Salmeri's lucky, he says, he won't be earning his living this way much longer.

A third-generation Bristol Bay salmon fisherman, Salmeri is trying to start a business in the area with two longtime fishermen to provide fishing services.

He also has a pizza chain in the Seattle area, where he lives. The lure of money, strong enough to keep him in the business for 22 years, just isn't there anymore, he said.

"The money is out there on the land. It's not on the water," he says. "From a business standpoint, this business makes no sense."

Every year, Alaska's single-most valuable salmon fishery lures fishermen from all over to fill their coffers and make their fortunes in a frenzied six-week-long scramble for fish. But many, like Salmeri, think Bristol Bay's golden days are fading. Despite healthy salmon runs in recent years, the fishery is

control. In 1988, prices peaked at \$2.10 a pound, but have been tumbling ever since.

Processors blame huge runs and foreign salmon farms for glutting the market. Others, including Salmeri, believe that Japan, which is the overwhelming buyer of Bristol Bay reds, wields enough

relative. Salmeri earned almost twice as much last year.

In the back of the boat, his crew handles the physical demands, "picking" out fish caught by their gills as they reel in the net. At the front of the boat, Salmeri must evade both the real and the intangible pitfalls, from Dead Man Sands, which can strand a boat once the tides roll out, to the invisible boundary called "the line" — over which no one may legally fish.

That pressure to catch more fish often tempts boats to cross the line to intercept the salmon first. It's the same pressure that pushes fishermen to forego sleep to catch every minute of fishing time allowed by state-determined openings.

As Salmeri scans his net for tell-tale splashes where fish are getting caught, a voice comes over the private radio channel that he shares with a clique of fishermen. Where are the fish cops? No one has seen them, and that makes the group very nervous. A boat setting its net illegally means less fish for those who stay behind the line, but it can mean a difference of thousands of dollars.

Salmeri is both critical and grateful for enforcement that keeps fishermen from crossing the boundary. A citation can cost a fisherman \$3,000 but at the same time, fishermen need that restraint. "We'd go way over the line if we could," he said. "It's our mentality. Take today and forget about tomorrow."

Andrew Salmeri, 3rd generation fisherman

plagued by poor prices that drive fishermen to catch more and more fish just to keep pace. The business doesn't add up anymore, Salmeri said.

"There's no rhyme or reason," he said. "It's rolling the dice. It's pulling on a slot machine to see if the bars are going to come up."

Now 42, Salmeri thought his first experience fishing with his father, Joe, would be his last.

"I thought it was a nightmare," he said. "The boat was leaning like crazy. We had no food, no matches to light the stove. ... I swore on my grandfather's grave I'd never come back."

But the money was hard to ignore. He eventually invested in a \$54,000, 32-foot boat and a \$4,300 Bristol Bay fishing permit.

"In the 1980s, prices started to climb, and the cost of technology and permits spiraled out of con-

control to depress the prices. And several fishermen are pressing a lawsuit accusing Bristol Bay processors of price-fixing.

Each year Salmeri returns home in late July, swearing off fishing along with the food that he's munched out on — Spam, Pop-Tarts, pudding cups. But each year, he returns to Johnson Hill, the fishing grounds for salmon bound for the Naknek and Kvichak rivers. Salmeri calls it the Bank of America.

By July 3, Salmeri had caught only half the 140,000 pounds of salmon he's hoping to net before going home on July 19. At 60 cents a pound from his processor, Inlet Salmon, that would amount to \$84,000 before paying his three crew members — his brother-in-law, Jim Selby from Monterey, a longtime crew member, The Vuhoang from San Jose; and Salmeri's 16-year-old son, Joseph, who swears he's not going to fish for life.

To many, \$84,000 in six weeks may seem like a fortune. But it's

Game has maintained a hunting period for mountain lions between Sept. 15 through March 31. This year, the department increased the season by another month and raised the female quota to help reduce the population.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game issues a collecting permit to Laundre each year that allows him to trap, collar and monitor mountain lions in southern Idaho.

Findings of the study are then given to the department to help manage local populations.

The study, which focuses primarily on the population, activity, predation and conservation dynamics of mountain lions, is expected to continue through the year 2000 with more emphasis on deer population research.

"We're hoping to put collars on them next to understand

their movement patterns in relation to mountain lions," Laundre said.

So far, Laundre's study has shown that there are more young mountain lions in southern Idaho than adults, most deer killed by mountain lions are younger than three-years-old and most of the deer are killed in "edges," or areas between deep forest and open land.

Most of the research is conducted in those areas when tracks are easier to locate.

Hounds are sent out to find the cougars and chase them into traps where they can be tranquilized.

Researchers then climb into the trees and slip a rope around the animals to lower them to the ground.

Once the mountain lions are captured, their sex, age and body measurements are determined, their ears are marked and radio

collars are placed on them to track their whereabouts. Once the tranquilizer wears off, they are released.

Laundre said mountain lions are a highly visible and rarely seen during daylight hours. However, sightings have become more frequent in the past few years.

"It's a problem that's only going to get worse if something isn't done about it," said Jim Chabrun, a rancher from Albion. "We've had cougars only 200 yards from our home, and last year we even lost three or four calves."

While mountain lions can be legally shot if they pose a threat to humans or livestock, Lloyd said he fears more legal action will need to be taken to help reduce the problem of mountain lions entering the valley.

"What's going to happen after this study?" Lloyd said. "Somebody is going to mandate

something, and I'd hate to see the 'Urch syndrome' come to Idaho where we have red fences everywhere with no access when we all want the same thing here, and which is keep our lands open and safe."

Idaho controller touts former congressman for top state job

LEWISTON (AP) — Facing the potential of a second straight disastrous showing at the polls this fall, Idaho's only statewide elected Democrat is doing some speculating about the 1998 campaign for governor.

Controller J.D. Williams says he has not ruled out making that race himself, although he seems to be leaning toward a re-election bid if he stays in politics. He got just 35 percent of the vote in an ill-fated run for Congress four years ago but was the lone Democrat to survive the 1994 debacle, winning a new four-year term as controller by less than 3,300 votes.

But Williams is touting former Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings to lead the party in two years — a suggestion Stallings has shrugged off in the past. "I think the strongest Democratic candidate right now is Richard Stallings," Williams said. At the state Democratic convention three weeks ago, "he was the one who was talked about the most."

Stallings, who served four terms in Congress before suffering a landslide defeat for the U.S. Senate at the hands of Republican Dirk Kempthorne in 1992, has been discussed as a candidate to succeed retiring Pocatello Mayor Peter Angstadt.

The former national nuclear waste negotiator only smiles and shakes his head at the suggestion, saying he enjoys his job as executive director of the Pocatello Neighborhood Housing Service. His response was much the same about running for governor after Williams mentioned in an

Wednesday during a stop in Lewiston. "I'm very happy with what I'm doing," Stallings said. "It's not been foremost in my mind."

But with the retirement of fourth-term Gov. Cecil Andrus in 1994 when the party suffered its worst defeat at the polls in two generations, Democrats have seen no strong leader step forward to fill the void and breathe new life into the party whose moderate and liberal wings remain at odds.

There has also been some speculation that Walt Minnick, who is challenging Republican Sen. Larry Craig, could be using the long-shot Senate campaign as a tune-up for a race for governor in two years.

Republican Gov. Phil Batt has taken some steps to mute speculation that he will not seek re-election — most notably his appointment of Farm Bureau Board Member Pat Takasugi as agriculture director in what could well have been a peace offering to a very important agricultural constituency after bending it to require worker's compensation coverage for farm hands.

And should Batt decide he has had enough after four years, the GOP has potentially strong state of candidates led by Congressman Michael Crapo and possibly even including former Commerce Director Jim Hawkins.

Waste deal prompts pressure on key Gem elected Democrat

LEWISTON (AP) — Idaho's only statewide elected Democrat is feeling the pressures from his party's internal disagreement over Republican Gov. Phil Batt's nuclear waste deal.

Controller J.D. Williams acknowledged he has yet to read the Oct. 16 agreement that is now the subject of a voter referendum in November. But he said he believes the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is a very poor place for storing nuclear waste.

"Williams' problem is his party's official 1996 platform position against the deal on the one hand and the deal's endorsement on the other by Cecil Andrus, one of Idaho's most popular and respected Democrats."

A major concern cutting across

the debate is that a major incident at INEL could contaminate the Snake River from Blackfoot to Lewiston.

Williams said he believes Governor Batt shares that view," he said

during a swing through Lewiston Wednesday. "The deal is doing his agreement adequately protect the state and could the state get a better deal. I don't know the answer to that."

With the state's court appeals running out and Congress ready to shove more radioactive waste on

Idaho, Batt cut a deal in which he agreed to let the government dump another 1,133 waste shipments at INEL over four decades in return for a court-enforced deadline for cleanup and removal of nearly all waste by 2035.

Critics who forced the fall vote on voiding the deal contend it is so riddled with loopholes that it makes Idaho the nation's de facto nuclear waste dump. They claim that voiding the agreement will stop additional waste shipments although none have been able to explain how that is possible under a series of federal court rulings that prohibit states from interfering.

Batt and his allies maintain that without the deal, Idaho is open to substantially more dumping than the agreement allows.

In wake of hiring freeze, Micron shifts employees to production line

BOISE (AP) — Micron Technology Inc. is shifting about 200 administrative personnel to the semiconductor assembly line.

"Since we suspended hiring, we need to make sure our critical manufacturing needs are met," Micron spokesman Julie Nash said Wednesday.

Since a hiring freeze went into effect June 1, employees have been shifted from nonessential administrative functions into the fabrication unit. They will not face pay cuts in pay because of the move to manufacturing, Nash said.

The employees are not entry-level clerks but come from varying administrative positions, including engineering, depending on what each department can spare, she said.

At least in the short term, Micron has no plans to begin laying off large numbers of workers, Nash said. Micron employs about 7,000 people and has about \$2.9 billion in annual sales.

The hiring freeze was a result of plummeting prices in the past 10 months for dynamic random access memory chips, or DRAMs.

The price of the chips, which allow computers and other electronic devices to store data for quick retrieval, has dropped about 70 percent since September. The lower prices for the chips, Micron's main product, caused the company to halt construction on its \$2.5 billion plant in Lodi, Utah.

The company also is looking to falling prices by cutting the salaries of 15 company officers and asked the U.S. Department of Commerce to look into chip dumping by Hyundai Electronic Industries Co. and LG Semicon.

Investigators from the Kootenai County sheriff's department said the allegations involve two Canfield Middle School girls, 13 or 14 years old, who worked as free-time aides in Mather's classroom.

TWIN FALLS — Remember when Elvis got drafted and sent overseas? Bobby-soxers across America waved a tearful good-bye to the King.

Back in 1958, it was the biggest, baddest thing that had ever happened to rock 'n' roll. So Broadway and Hollywood immortalized the event and made us laugh at ourselves with the production of "Bye Bye Birdie" in the '60s.

In the story, Conrad Birdie, the Elvis clone, gets his marching orders. The world could have come to an end with fewer vibrations. Oh, the wailing! The tears! And that was just his luckless agent, Albert Peterson.

Conrad's got to lay some golden eggs to pay Albert's bills and tide him over till the golden goose returns from overseas. Time for a plan.

Albert dreams up The Kiss. One Last Kiss. Some lucky fan will win Conrad's last stateside smooch, and Conrad will smack her right on The Ed Sullivan Show, in front of millions of viewers. What a concept!

Follow this tale of be-bopping poodle skirts and ponytails July next week at the Junior Musical Playhouse Company presents Charles Strouse's and Lee Adams' "Bye Bye Birdie." The fast-moving plot and lively songs and dances will keep your foot tapping through both acts.

"These kids have really bloomed in this production," Director Mary Ann Stanger said. "They really are around that stage. This is Stanger's first time directing "Birdie," which was performed here a decade ago, according to JUMP Company's president, Mark Koffler. "Mary Anne wanted to direct the first time, but she came down with twins."

"Birdie" has been a staple of American musical theater since Strouse and Adams brought their Elvis spoof to Broadway in 1960. The play made a star of Dick Van Dyke, who portrayed Albert, and the 1963 movie gave the world Ann-Margret, who played the object of Conrad's kiss.

If you have to ask ... How to take the mystery out of browsing for art.

KETCHUM — Think that's a pretty picture? How can you tell?

Most people, after all, have had no training in art history, color or perspective, let alone sculpture or other genres. They feel ill-equipped to buy anything beyond an appealing landscape, for, say, \$9.99.

Nonsense, says the art director at the Herrett Center for the Arts and Sciences on the campus of the College of Southern Idaho. "It's not about the price in buying art. It's about the feeling is ... (to) look for things that I like," he said. Green prefers buying an original work, possibly from an art student or an emerging artist.

"People should just buy what they like ... But most people won't buy art until all their bills are paid," he said.

"People will spend \$3,000 on a snowmobile that sits behind the garage 51 weeks out of the year, but they won't spend \$500 on something that makes them feel good every single day," said Larry Larson, who owns Larson Arts in downtown Twin Falls.

"Our first question is 'Do you like it? Will it make you smile?'" Larson asked. "The best step is actually getting out there and shopping for artwork can be daunting for most people."

Larson says he has seen dozens of people start out with a nice poster with general appeal, then get a limited-edition print, and finally build up the courage to buy an original piece they love from an artist.

Green advises going to art fairs and meeting the artist can be lots of fun and a great way to find some original work. Gal-

eries are another source for discovering something you might like.

"Many people feel pressure to buy a piece of artwork when they walk into a gallery, that's not the only reason why galleries are in business."

"Don't feel intimidated by art galleries," said Burt Reed, owner of Anne Reed Gallery in Ketchum. "We serve two primary roles. One is as advocates of art and artwork, and also as a source of information and education."

Reed sees many people who come into her gallery who never buy a single piece,

but who are interested in developing a personal taste for, or simply enjoying, art.

Reed says that she likes to go to the other galleries in Ketchum and Sun Valley to look, although she's not in a position to buy anything. She finds the visual exercise stimulating.

"Everyone's tastes change, and we develop an eye for different works and colors," she said. "But the only way to know what your own tastes are is to get up and window shop."

"I encourage people to ask questions. You can become self-educated just by looking around and asking questions,"

Reed said. Many people who visit an art gallery don't think they know enough even to ask questions, he said, — and some are afraid to like a piece because someone might criticize them.

"They think there's some magic book that says 'This is good, this is not.' It's all just someone's opinion. ... At least (you'll have) gotten some kind of reaction," he said.

But for many south-central Idaho residents, art is still a distant subject.

"They haven't given themselves a 'certificate' to enjoy art," Larson said.

Summer is a good time to visit galleries if you're looking and not buying. Through July, Larson's store will display the top 20 watercolor paintings from a contest held in Boise earlier this year.

"The first Ketchum-Sun Valley gallery walk this summer will be tonight, and it's a good chance for first-time shoppers to look without feeling pressure to buy."

"But there are a lot of people," Reed said. "Sometimes it's more of a seeing-people walk."

Hannebaum weaves tales of more interesting Magic Valley

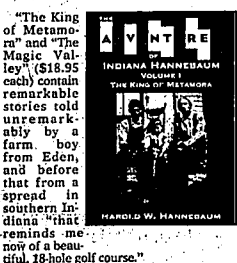

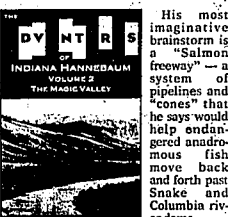

"It's a history of living in Idaho back when life here had an edge. Hannebaum recalls what it was like to get lost in a lava tube, to toss your 10-gallon hat into the air and plug it with your .22 rifle, or to break a horse by half-drowning it in a Wilson Lake.

Summer heats up with book mysteries

• **"From Potter's Field,"** by Patricia Cornwell (Berkley, \$6.99): When an unidentified young woman is murdered in Central Park on Christmas Eve, the hunt begins anew for the elusive and sadistic Temple Gault, a serial killer who made his first appearance in Cornwell's 1993 "Cruel and Unusual." Gault has become the nemesis of both Kay Scarpetta and the FBI, for whom she is now a consulting pathologist. Scarpetta's search for Gault takes her from the secret recesses of the FBI's files to the bowels of the New York subway system, but her forensic expertise is hardly called on; the book's primarily a tense chase tale with Scarpetta playing the Linda Hamilton role as some sort of action-adventure heroine.

• **"To Play the Fool,"** by Laurie R. King (Bantam, \$5.50): Sometimes a monk, sometimes a mime, he calls himself Brother Erasmus, speaking only in quotes from Shakespeare and the Bible as he ministers to San Francisco's homeless. Is he a true Holy Fool? And could he possibly be a murderer? These are among the puzzles police detective Kate Martinelli and her partner, Al Hawkins, face after the death and cremation of a homeless man in Golden Gate Park. In her second Martinelli mystery, King combines a thoughtful complexity of

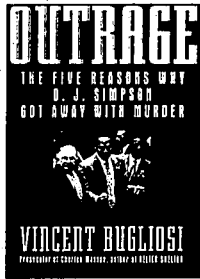
crime and character with graceful writing.

• **"Miami Purity,"** by Vicki Hendricks (Vintage, \$10): In Hendricks' noir novel of desire, greed and murder, stripper Sherri Parlay takes a job at a dry-cleaners, Miami Purity, and immediately falls hard for the manager, handsome lunk Payne Mahoney. Trouble is, Payne's mother, middle-aged lush Brenda, owns Miami Purity and keeps her son on a tight leash. If you know the plot of James M. Cain's "The Postman Always Rings Twice," you can pretty much predict where the story's going. Still, the role reversal-sals-makes-for-an-interesting-spin, and Hendricks can write hard-boiled with the best of them.

• **"Black Out,"** by John Lawton (Penguin, \$11.95): London in 1944 provides a memorable atmosphere for murder and intrigue in John Lawton's blending of police procedural with spy thriller. Detective Sgt. Frederick Troy, son of a titled Russian emigre, investigates the gruesome murder of an unidentified man at an East End bomb site. The victim turns out to be a refugee scientist that British intelligence was protecting in hopes of learning Germany's atomic rocketry secrets. Lawton's pretzel of a plot loses some of its credibility in a Grand Guignol plotline of kidnapping that skips ahead to 1948 Berlin, but he has a sure sense of wartime London.

Bugliosi on O.J.: The D.A. fouled up

After watching the entire televised O.J. Simpson murder trial, I didn't believe there was anything else to know about it. Then along comes Vincent Bugliosi, former Los Angeles County deputy district attorney, prosecutor of Charles Manson and author of "Helter Skelter" and other non-fiction books about the world of crime and courtroom drama. Who could he be to say that would be more compelling than the real thing? Someone once said that experience is not contained in the ruins of the palace of our illusions: In "Outrage" (W.W. Norton, \$25), Bugliosi not only shatters our illusions about the Simpson case, but defines and clarifies the experience of the trial. With anger evident on every page, he throws back the shabby curtain of the "trial of the century" and acts as a guide to the minds of the D.A.'s office, to the minds of the cops and the prosecutors. Through the eyes of the quintessential prosecutor who lost only one of 105 cases he tried as a deputy district attorney, we are

expresses anger and astonishment at the actions of most of the major players in the case. Bugliosi says that the reasons he believes caused the verdict: an atmosphere engendering the belief that Simpson was going to get off having the trial in downtown Los Angeles instead of Santa Monica; Judge Lance Ito's rulings and behavior; prosecutor incompetence, including weak summations by Christopher Darden and Marcia Clark.

He points out that a major cause of the acquittal was Simpson's astonishing popularity, that the general belief he might get off despite the convincing evidence of his guilt, was a self-fulfilling prophecy. This notion, galvanized by the media, changed everyone's perception of the case. Bugliosi says that there never was any reason to believe that he would get off — that, based on the facts, the evidence against him was conclusive from the outset. What happened? Part of this media-created legend held that Simpson was being represented by a Dream Team of lawyers. But Robert Shapiro had never taken a criminal case to trial and Howard Weitzman, Simpson's

first lawyer, allowed him to be interviewed by the police — something no criminal lawyer should ever do. As for F. Lee Bailey, his career was on a downhill slide since losing the Patty Hearst case. And Bugliosi says Johnnie Cochran's reputation was as a civil rather than criminal lawyer.

In one of the more interesting things to come to light in "Outrage," Bugliosi tells of how he tangled with Garretti over the D.A.'s reasons for trying the case downtown — one of the most important factors in losing the case. Garretti said he was "stuck downtown," and when challenged by Bugliosi on this, said he was "under the impression" he was stuck. As for the other reasons Garretti gave for not trying the case in Santa Monica (too few seats in the courtroom, ongoing earthquake repairs, little space for the media, poor security, not a large enough jury pool), Bugliosi convincingly makes a case that Garretti's reasons were at best wrong and at worst "deliberately false."

Novels have become the movies of our period (movies themselves have become Marvel Comics). Top Hemingway scholars to gather in Sun Valley

SUN VALLEY — It's official: Ernest Hemingway's "Idaho period" is the stuff of academic curiosity.

Literary scholars and Hemingway enthusiasts from all over the world will converge on the Sun Valley Resort July 20-26 for the 1996 International Conference of the Hemingway Society, hosted by the University of Idaho.

This is a big deal among scholars of the Nobel Prize-winning novelist, who killed himself in his Ketchum home in 1961. These by-invitation-only, biannual affairs have been held in Spain, Italy and Austria in the past, but never in the American West.

"Hemingway spent many years in the Ketchum-Sun Valley area beginning in the 1930s, and wrote a significant part of several books there," said Alice Koskela, a U of I. "It's being recognized as an important part of his life and work."

The theme is the conference is "Hemingway and the Natural World," and will focus on Hemingway's presentation of the environment in his literary works and his views on Indians and nature.

On July 24, a panel discussion will explore "Hemingway's Wild Idaho," looking at the issues and changes relating to the state natural world. Panelists will include state Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, the chairman of the Senate Resources and Environment Committee; Maurice Hornocker of Bellevue, director of the Hornocker Wildlife Research Institute; Guy Bonnivier of Ketchum, director of Nature Conservancy's Idaho's operations,

and Bud Purdy of Pinedo, a rancher and friend of Hemingway's.

Another highlight of the conference will be "Hemingway in Idaho," a special exhibit of photographs and facsimile letters and manuscripts from the author's Idaho years. The exhibit, assembled by the U of I, Hemingway Review editor Susan Besegal and John F. Kennedy Library, will debut at the Ketchum-Sun Valley Historical Society Museum before touring the state.

Hemingway arrived in Sun Valley in 1937, one of many celebrities invited by the Union Pacific Railroad to sample their new Sun Valley Resort, and spent much of the next five years here, completing "For Whom the Bell Tolls" in a room at the Sun Valley Lodge.

After World War II, during which he worked as a correspondent for Collier's magazine, Hemingway spent most of his time traveling in Europe and Africa or at his estate in Cuba. But with the coming of Fidel Castro's revolution, Hemingway and his fourth wife, Mary, moved back to Ketchum in 1958.

He died there, of a self-inflicted gunshot wound, on July 2, 1961, and was buried in the Ketchum Cemetery.

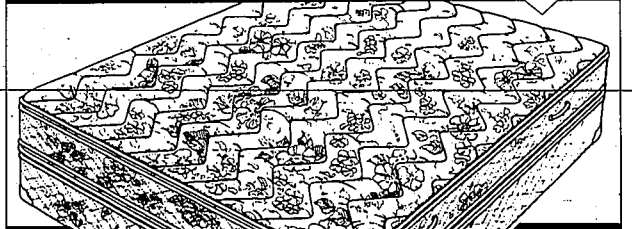

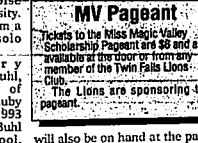

'Twelve Monkeys,' 'Nixon' top new videos

'Twelve Monkeys' (R) — Between the past and the future, sanity and madness, and dreams of reality lies the mystery of this Terry Gilliam film.

The year is 2035 and humankind subsists in a desolate wasteland following the eradication of 99 percent of the world's population, a holocaust that makes the planet's surface uninhabitable, and mankind's destiny uncertain.

In order to preserve their fate in this grave new world, survivors must rely on travel as their only hope. Desperately hoping that the rest of the world will reappear, they reclaim and rebuild the future, a group of scientists living beneath once-populous Philadelphia secure a volunteer to embark on an experimental trip back to the year 1996. There, they hope he can help mankind's desperate efforts to unravel this apocalyptic nightmare before it completely erases humanity from the planet.

'Bruce Willis is Cole, the reluctant volunteer who may or may not be the ideal candidate to complete this dangerous assignment. However, he possesses a significant trait that supersedes the scientists' doubts — his obsession with a haunting image from his childhood, a memory whose meaning cannot be understood even though it replays itself endlessly in his mind.

Screenwriters David and Janet Peoples drew their inspiration from French filmmaker Chris Marker's 'The Runaway,' but the film evokes Gilliam's 'Time Bandits' and 'Brazil.'

With an Oscar nomination for his role as Jeffrey Geines, the unstable son of a renowned scientist who alerts the world to the message, Cole brings (Gearing, Blockbuster, Video West)

'Nixon' (R) — It's a dark and stormy night.

Murky clouds cling to the evil house as rain cuts zigzags all around. Only this house doesn't have seven gables or Vincent Price. It's the White House.

Oliver Stone begins his three-hour peen to Richard Nixon. He's a gutsy, gutsy movie. The impulse is to laugh until you real-

ize that this much-despised president is no lust and No should his life be treated as high camp.

Whether Stone's filmic intro was intentionally funny is not an issue, though. But what does raise early questions in 'Nixon' is the filmmaker's loose handling of history and his interpretation of the man himself.

Stone's Nixon is a paranoid boozier; a bitter, evil man who seeks power at any cost and whose jealousy of the Kennedy clan puts him over the top. He also is a four-mouthed bigot and a liar.

All that said, Stone wants us to embrace him as a fallen hero. His treatment of Nixon is almost reverential. Yes, he's a bad guy, but look at all the wonderful things he was able to accomplish — ending the war in Vietnam, opening China. Poor Dick, Stone seems to say, he can't help his troubles, and he's a good guy. He suffered a pious mother and a rigid father and there was little love. We must take pity and try to understand him.

Who else ever wanted was love. But nobody in this movie loves Nixon, except his daughter Julie.

Even wife Pat hates him. And Joan Allen gives an Academy Award-worthy performance as the long-suffering first lady.

As Nixon, Anthony Hopkins puts in an outstanding performance. He remains hunched, sweaty and brooding. But he captures Nixon's nervous twitch and otherwise paints an extraordinary portrait of the president. (Associated Press) (Video West, Blockbuster, Hastings)

'The Juror' — Remember a turkey of a movie last year called 'Trial by Jury'?

It was all about a single working mother serving as a juror on the murder trial of a mob boss and being menaced by one his underlings, who threatens to harm her if she doesn't persuade the panel to acquit. The movie starred William Hurt and Joanne Whalley-Kilmer.

Now, the brain trust in Hollywood has yet another version called 'The Juror.' This time, Demi Moore plays the civic-minded mom and Alec Baldwin is the psychopath who torments her. Is it any better than the first? Only by the thinnest of hairs.

At the heart of both movies is the notion that a single mother

Roth groused in turn that the boys didn't approve of his then-but-becoming solo career, which has since busted.

So it's back to Van Halen. Hagar — who had been with the band for 11 years (as was Roth) — left the hard rock group because of "creative differences." Roth, Van Halen's original singer from "Van Halen" (1978) to "1984" (1983), is in the studio now with his old mates, collaborating on new tracks for a greatest hits collection due in the fall — but he's not officially back

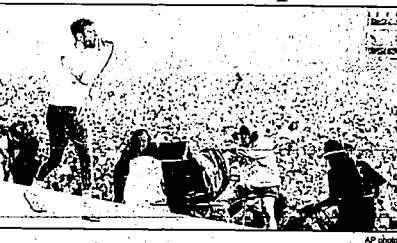
NEW YORK (AP) — Sophomore

Been there, say the Spin Doctors. Done that.

The New York-based band scored a smash 1991 debut album, "Pocket Full of Kryptonite," which sold 6 million copies and spawned the radio-friendly pop hits "Two Princes" and "Little Miss Can't Be Wrong." MTV embraced them. They made the cover of Rolling Stone.

"We went through this whole thing when our band first came out: Everybody's writing this is a really cool, fresh band with a fresh sound — really hip and cool," recalls drummer Aaron Comess.

"Then the thing blew up, and by the time you sell 6 million records,

you're not so cool anymore."

Which led to their 1994 follow-up, "Turn It Upside Down." The band, trying to avoid pigeonholing, released a jazz-funk single, "Cleopatra's Cat."

The critics were not kind. Internal problems abounded. The guitarist quit.

Which is how people wound up saying the Doctors' new album,

"You've Got to Believe in Something," is a make-or-break record — barely three years after "Kryptonite" ended its lengthy run on the charts.

"Don't you think that says more about the industry itself than about us?" wonders lead singer Chris Barron, pointing out that the "unsuccessful" "Turn It Upside Down" sold nearly 2 million copies

worldwide.

"The industry's weird these days," he continues. "There's not a helluva lot of loyalty going around these days."

Maybe. But there is a lot of pressure — although the Spin Doctors say they feel no urgency to match past sales figures with this pivotal album.

"We've talked about the irony of the whole thing, that when we were on the top of the world, we were backstage practically breaking up with our old guitar player," Barron says ruefully.

After guitarist Eric Schenkman quit the band following a 1995 gig in San Francisco, "from all our weird appearances, everybody thought we were gonna go down," Barron says.

"Meanwhile, we were having the time of our lives: drinking beers, smoking funny cigarettes, writing tunes like 'She Used to Be Mine.'"

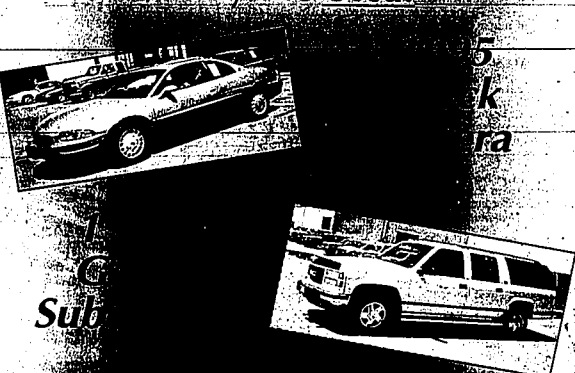

The summons had yet to be served on Wednesday and remained sealed. Investigators from the Kootenai County sheriff's department said the allegations involve two Canfield Middle School girls, 13 or 14 years old, who worked as free-time aides in Mather's classroom.

NBA, Union sign labor pact, open free agent market

The NBA and the players' union finally made labor peace Thursday, signing a collective bargaining agreement that opened the richest free-agent market in league history.

By agreement, offers worth tens of millions of dollars already were on the table.

The six-year labor deal, which extends through the 2000-2001 season, was signed at a New York law office just a few minutes before 3 p.m. EDT, when a 10-day moratorium on signings, trades and negotiations was to expire.

Minutes later, agents and general managers were on the phones, making business legally for the first time since June 30.

Among the players who can now negotiate with any club they choose are Michael Jordan, Shaquille O'Neal, Reggie Miller,



Juan Howard, Dennis Rodman and Gary Payton.

The Los Angeles Lakers and Charlotte Hornets didn't wait long. The Lakers sent Vlade Divac to Charlotte for the rights to high school phenom Kobe Bryant, the 13th pick in last month's draft.

By trading Divac's \$8.5 million salary for the next two years, the Lakers freed money for a lucrative offer in hopes of luring O'Neal

from Orlando.

In another expected move, Milwaukee acquired center Andrew Lang from Minnesota for a first-round draft pick.

Aaron Goodwin, the agent for Payton, said he had received five offers — from New

York, Miami, Seattle, Milwaukee and Charlotte — of a seven-year contract. Goodwin said he expects Payton to sign for no less than \$70 million.

“The only team we talked seriously with was Seattle. We'll meet with them again tomorrow and I think it can get done on their terms,” Goodwin said.

Before the free agent frenzy began, lawyers from the league and the union reviewed about 300 pages of documents Thursday before signing them to end a year-long drama that included two lockouts, two ratification votes, two moratoriums and several 11-hour compromises.

“The process has been a difficult one,” said Jeffrey Mishkin, the NBA's chief legal officer. “But I think we now have an agreement that will provide a constructive framework for the long-term relationship be-

tween the NBA and its players.”

“We're very happy with the deal,” said Jeffrey Kessler, the lead negotiator for the union. “It's fair to the players, makes the players' association much stronger and should lead to a resolution of the union's... The expiration of the moratorium ended a 10 1/2-day period in which teams were forbidden from talking to their own free agents and the players' agents.”

David Falk, who represents Jordan, Dikembe Mutombo, Howard and Kenny Anderson, among others, closed the door to his Washington office and went to work. His secretary said he planned to stay there well into the night.

Falk is a key player in the biggest rumored deal, a three-way trade that would send Charles Barkley to Houston, Sam Cassell and Robert Horry to Denver and Mutombo to Phoenix.

DEARBORN, Mich. (AP) — Bob Charles just missed being where he was one week ago.

Golf's best-known left-hander shot a Sunday-par 67 Thursday in the Senior Players Championship, tied with Lee Trevino, one shot behind Tom Weiskopf.

Charles was the first-round leader in last week's major senior tournament, the U.S. Senior Open.

"I dropped out of a tie with Weiskopf when he bogeyed the par-5 17th after putting his 100-yard approach shot in a take."

"I struck the ball well and putted solidly. My only discretion was on 17, where I really didn't pay attention to the way the wind shifted when I was ready to hit," said Charles, who had an opening for last week for a three-stroke lead.

"The conditions were a lot like last week, when I had the first-round lead at the Senior Open. We went out early, ahead of the field. The greens were softer, they were holding and they were better surfaces to put on."

Charles credited two colleagues for his improved play on the greens: Dave Stockton who provided the inspiration with his impressive Senior Open win last week and Lee Trevino, who provided some advice.

"Last week, it was wonderful to see a tradesman at work on the greens like Dave," said Charles, who finished seventh last week. "I made a little adjustment in my putting. It came from a tip that Lee Trevino gave me maybe three weeks ago."

"He made an observation and I thought about it on the practice green. Most of my career, I've been an arm and shoulder putter, and he didn't think that the way I was moving my shoulders in my backswing was like he'd seen me do it years ago."

Officer testifies Irvin's prints on plates

DALLAS (AP) — Although three people were charged with the night of March 4, the fingerprints of only one person besides police officers could be identified on drug paraphernalia found in their motel room, an officer testified Thursday.

"That would be Michael Irvin," Irving criminalistics officer Kelly Morrow told the jury under questioning by prosecutor Aaron Wylie.

Irvin is charged with second-degree felony cocaine possession, which carries a punishment ranging from probation to 20 years in prison.

Despite indications that topless dancer Michael Smith would be called to the stand, the day ended without her highly anticipated testimony. Smith is a friend of the two women charged with Irvin and the girlfriend of Johnnie Hernandez, a

former Dallas police officer who was arrested June 27 on a charge of trying to hire a hitman to kill Irvin.

Hernandez's attorney, John Read, said he stopped by the courthouse Thursday "to see her testimony." As he stood talking in a corridor, Irvin defense attorney Kevin Clancy told Read he wanted to speak Smith with a subpoena.

Asked why Smith would be subpoenaed again, Read shrugged and said, "Double coverage. I guess."

The discussion of whether and where Irvin's fingerprints appeared and whether police properly handled the evidence took up most of the sixth day of testimony in the trial.

Morrow said Irvin's left thumb print was found on the face of a salad plate found on an end table in the motel room, while prints from his left

pinkie and left middle finger were found on the bottom of the plate.

Irvin's right ring fingerprint was found on the bottom of the dinner plate recovered by police from under a love seat in the room, Morrow testified.

But neither Irvin's prints nor those of former Cowboy Alfredo Roberts or topless dancers Angela Beck or Jasmine Nabungay was identified on other items recovered by police, including a glass vial, some cigarette rolling papers, plastic baggies and some razor blades, Morrow said.

Some prints on those items were too indistinguishable to match, he said.

Under questioning by Wylie, Morrow agreed that Irvin's prints could not be ruled out as being on the items.

But defense lawyer Royce West suggested Morrow could not reach any meaningful conclusion from the absence of comparable fingerprints on the baggie containing what police say was an 8.9-gram chunk of rock cocaine.

Beck and Nabungay also were charged with drug possession. Roberts was not.

There were no surprise visitors in the courtroom Thursday, despite speculation Cowboys running back Emmitt Smith or former Irvin teammate Ken Norton would be dropping by.

Irvin sat impassively through the testimony in an olive suit and alligator shoes, bowing his head during prosecutors' questioning and watching more closely when his lawyers spoke.

VALENCE, France (AP) — The shortest man in the field, 5-foot-2 Colombian Chepe Gonzalez, won the 11th stage of the Tour de France on Thursday.

Gonzalez attacked from the back of an eighteen break in the final stretch of the 122-mile stage in his first Tour de France.

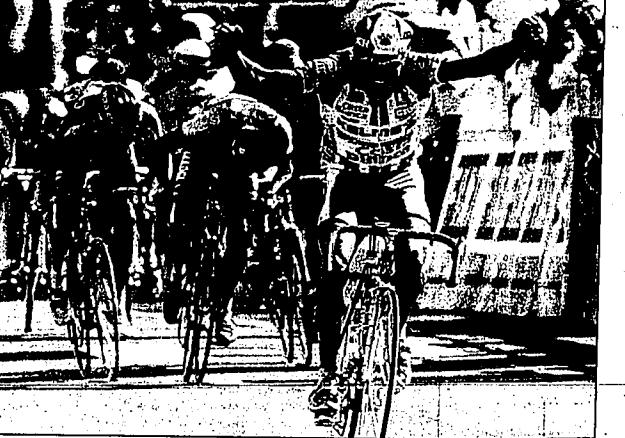
With the cyclists coming off their only rest day, Riis kept the lead he had held since Sunday.

Defending champ moves up in Swiss Open

GSTAAD, Switzerland (AP) — Top-seeded Yevgeny Kafelnikov of Russia easily defeated Karim Alami on Thursday to move into the quarterfinals of the Swiss Open.

The French Open champion took only 57 minutes to overcome the Moroccan 6-3, 6-3, and set his sights on moving to the top of the rankings before the year is out.

"I could become the No. 1," the 22-year-old Russian said of the perch now held by Pete Sampras.

"Sampras and Andre Agassi aren't doing so well this year. It's easier to get to the top of the rankings than to stay there."

Alberto Berasategui took another step toward winning his fourth tournament in as many weeks, downing his fellow Spaniard, No. 8 seeded Carlos Moya 7-5, 6-2.

Moya, one of only two players to have beaten Austrian Thomas Muster in 36 matches over the past year, was the fifth-seeded player to be eliminated from the tournament.

Sixth-seeded Alberto Costa of Spain also advanced to the quarterfinals, beating Argentine's Hernan Gumy 6-3, 4-6, 6-4.

Italian Renzo Furlan reached his fourth quarterfinal of the year on the ATP Tour, defeating Germany's Oliver Gross 6-0, 5-7, 6-2.

In a battle between former Swiss Open champions, Sergi Bruguera beat fellow Spaniard Emilio Sanchez 6-2, 6-3 in just over an hour.

Spain's Francisco Claver, who upset Wimbledon runner-up Mali Vai Washington in first-round play, advanced to the quarterfinals by making quick work of wild card Alexandro Stambini of Switzerland 6-4, 6-2.

Bohdan Ulihrach of the Czech Republic topped France's Cedric Pioline, seeded fifth, 7-6 (7-5), 6-3.

Costa and Kafelnikov are the only two seeded players remaining in the tournament.

Edberg reaches quarterfinals in his final Swedish Open

BASTAD, Sweden (AP) — Top-seeded Stefan Edberg beat qualifier Lars Jonsson 6-2, 6-7 (2-7), 6-3 Thursday to reach the quarterfinals of the Swedish Open.

Edberg, making his last start in Sweden's premier clay court tournament being played for the 49th time, will face training part-

nier Thomas Johansson on Friday. Johansson defeated qualifier Thomas Nydahl in another all-Swedish match 7-5, 6-0.

Johansson, 21, the newest Swedish sensation, advanced to the 32nd on the ATP singles list after a surprising round-of-16 berth at Wimbledon.

He has only played two ATP quarterfinals in his career.

"When I reached my first quarterfinal in Bolzano (Italy) three years ago I had practiced a lot with Mats Wilander, who also was my idol," Johansson recalled.

Wilander, another former world No. 1 from Sweden, withdrew for

the Swedish Open because of injury.

In their second-round matches, fifth-seeded Andrei Medvedev of Ukraine beat Magnus Norman of Sweden 6-4, 6-4 and Galo Blanco of Spain knocked off Swedish wild-card entry Patrik Fredriksson 4-6, 6-3, 6-4.

Journalists bash Atlanta as games near

ATLANTA (AP) — Let the Games begin — but not just yet.

There are still a few, or, kinks to work out as far as the press is concerned.

The world's view of Atlanta will be shaped largely by the thousands of journalists credentialled to cover the Games, and let's just say the initial impression of many who have already arrived isn't favorable.

For starters, some reporters were forced to tentacle to stay in a homeless shelter because accommodations weren't ready, and telephone service had not been installed in many work areas of the Main Press Center.

"This is the worst I've ever experienced," said Johann Bures, communications director for the Deutsche Presse Agentur in Germany who has been coming to the Olympics since 1980. "Even Moscow and Sarajevo were better with the organization of their communications."

Tim Franklin, associate managing editor of sports for the Chicago Tribune, concurred that the press center wasn't ready, "and that's putting it mildly."

"We've got people we're spending \$200 a night on to be here," he said, "so it would be nice if they could actually work from the MPC."

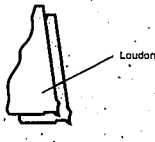

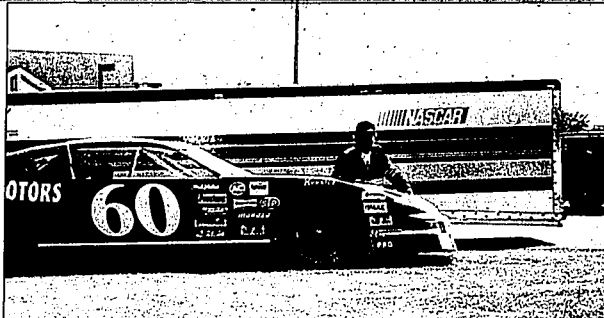

Tune in, turn on, get on the World Wide Web

NEW YORK — A new company rolled out a low-cost device to browse the Internet's World Wide Web, blasting in front of computer industry veterans who have talked about the idea for months but not delivered.

WebTV Networks Inc., a Silicon Valley startup firm, demonstrated its device publicly for the first time Wednesday and announced two powerful partners: Sony Electronics Inc. and Philips Consumer Electronics Co. will start selling devices based on the technology in September.

Nearly a dozen companies, including large ones like Oracle Corp. and IBM have talked about low-cost Internet access devices in recent months.

WebTV Networks kept quiet, working with Sony and Philips for months and building their trust by adhering to design deadlines.

"We're late to get to retailers. They've already made a lot of their fall plans," said Ed Volvinsky, senior vice president and general manager of sales and marketing at Philips. "This could be the hottest thing for Christmas."

Indeed, if the product becomes available in just a few hundred dollars as expected, it could open up the Internet to a huge number of people who have been put off by the high cost of personal computers and the difficulty of installing software and signing up an Internet access company.

WebTV's machine uses a phone line and universal remote control to navigate the worldwide computer network. Logging on is as simple as pushing a green button marked "Web" on the remote. A wireless keyboard is optional.

Through clever programming, the company has overcome a major hurdle by making Web pages look good on a TV screen, which portrays images with less resolution than most computer monitors.

"At a high level, they look pretty good. As you dig down, there are some limitations you have to deal with," said David Coursey, editor of Coursey.Com, a technology industry newsletter in Redwood City, Calif.

The most important limit is that the machine's operating and browsing software are different from the Netscape and Microsoft programs that now influence the Web.

Shipper says he didn't misuse Idaho labeling

IDAHO FALLS — One of Idaho's largest potato shippers says he can prove he is innocent of the equivalent of murder in his industry — a missing the "Grown in Idaho" label.

Blaine Larsen of Hamer says he has videotaped evidence and sworn statements to prove that a New York company he subcontracted warehouse space to was the one responsible for packing midwestern potatoes in bags bearing the Idaho trademark.

And the Idaho Potato Commission's attorney agreed that Larsen can expect to be cleared of the charge at a hearing next month.

"Mislabeling is a serious charge," Larsen's attorney, Winston Beard, said. "It's like charging someone with murder."

The commission charged both Larsen and Hamco Farms of Long Island last November with mislabeling non-Idaho potatoes as Idaho grown during operations at a packing shed in Georgia. The private-label potatoes were being sold in outlets of the Potato grocery store chain headquartered in Florida.

As part of the settlement, Hamco also agreed to cooperate with the Commission in its complaint against Larsen. Because of the investigation, Kerr refused further comment.

Beard said Larsen severed his relationship with Hamco in January but the videotaped evidence he had originally sent to the grocery chain at its request did not resurface until a month later when the chain sent it to the Potato Commission.

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Down time: Balanced mutual funds lose some of their zip

NEW YORK (AP) — After years of enjoying the benefits of simultaneous bull markets in stocks and bonds, the conservative category of mutual funds known as balanced funds has lost some of its zip so far in 1996.

In the first six months of the year, an index of balanced funds, calculated by Lipper Analytical Services Inc., posted a gain of 4.50 percent.

It was barely half the 8 percent-plus returns achieved over the same stretch by several classes of funds that concentrate on the stock market — and less than one-third of the 14.21 percent rise in small-stock growth funds.

Balanced funds' showing may not look too bad to the casual observer, considering that they are supposed to be steadier and slow-moving than the more adventurous types of stock funds.

But it represents a big dropoff from 1995, when they chalked up a return in the neighborhood of 25 percent, and some other big doubles.

The big problem for balanced funds has been bonds, which have slumped in price this year as interest rates rose.

The typical balanced fund portfolio is divided about half and half between stocks and bonds. In a portfolio split 50-50 that way, if your stocks are up about 10 percent and your bonds are down 2 percent, that's going to work out to a net gain of about 4 percent,

which is exactly what has happened.

Secondly, many — though not all — balanced funds keep the stock portions of their portfolios concentrated in big-name blue chips. Thus, they typically had little exposure to the boom in small stocks that erupted this spring.

Whatever disappointed balanced-fund investors may be feeling these days, however, some observers look at the group's slowdown as a healthy reality check.

In their view, extraordinary years like 1995 for what is normally a very steady type of investment can create unrealistic expectations that may lead to trouble when they inevitably aren't fulfilled.

Furthermore, a tougher environment like the current one helps focus attention on individual balanced funds and the differences in the way they operate, which can be important to investors as they pursue their long-term goals.

"Despite these vehicles' reputation as fairly static investments, it would be a mistake for investors to forget that balanced funds are asset allocators," notes Bill Rocco, analyst at Morningstar Mutual Funds in Chicago. "Their stock and bond stakes do vary significantly."

One balanced fund like the Kemper Total Return Fund, which may find almost two-thirds of the portfolio in stocks and only a little more than one-third in bonds. By contrast, the Vanguard-Waltesse Income Fund recently had 60 per-

cent of its assets in bonds and just 37 percent in stocks.

Balanced funds can also differ markedly in how they choose stock investments. While some stick to blue chips, others may favor more aggressive, perhaps holding some small growth stocks from the domestic market and a few overseas stocks as well.

Furthermore, some balanced funds stay "fully invested" in stocks and bonds, while others mix in short-term money market investments, "Cash is also quite important to these funds," Rocco says. "Cash is also quite important to these funds."

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Once for amateurs, Olympics now attract more professionals

It was 1992 in Barcelona, Spain, and the world got the opportunity to view the remarkable basketball talent of Michael Jordan, Magic Johnson, and Larry Bird.

It wasn't the beginning of U.S. professional athletes participating in the Summer Olympics, but it was the crown jewel.

The U.S. basketball team easily captured the gold medal, outscoring its opposition by an average of 34 points a game, thanks to Jordan's spectacular dunks, Johnson's no-look passes and Bird's deft three-point shooting.

"Certainly winning the gold medal with professional athletes made basketball more of a worldwide game and spectator sport," says Craig Miller, media relations director of USA Basketball.

Whereas for years, foreign countries sent their

highly skilled "amateurs" to compete in the Olympics, the United States now sends its best pros to the Games in most sports.

The early Games of unheralded athletes have won, in most instances, been replaced with well-known millionaires with plenty of commercial appeal.

"It's now on more of a level playing field," Miller says. "For years, foreign countries sent their best athletes regardless of amateur or professional status."

However, it's still the decision on each sport's governing committee to allow pro athletes to participate in a particular sport.

Boxing and baseball are the only two Summer Olympic sports where professionals are banned.

Emmitt Smith, superstar running back for the world champion Dallas Cowboys, recently made

a pitch to have American football in the Olympics, but that's extremely unlikely in the foreseeable future.

While the NBA's elite players can showcase their skills in the world's most-viewed event, the U.S. baseball team, for instance, still must rely on the best of its collegiate athletes.

"A vote is due in September and, at which time I feel that U.S. professional baseball players will be allowed to participate in the next Summer Olympics (Sydney, Australia, in the year 2000)," says George Doig, media relations director of the U.S. Baseball Federation.

U.S. pros began to scratch the Olympic playing surface as recently as 1980 when three soccer players were named to the men's team, but that was the year America boycotted the Games in Moscow.

In 1988, U.S. tennis

pros Ken Flach and Robert Seguso won the gold medal in men's doubles at the Games in Seoul, South Korea. Also, that year, Zina Garrison of the United States took the bronze in women's singles.

Four years later, at age 16, Jennifer Capriati, who had been playing on the pro circuit since 1990, defeated Ger-

many's Steffi Graf. While the U.S. men's basketball team should breeze through its competition at this year's Summer Games in Atlanta to be televised by NBC Sports, tennis should provide plenty of drama among its pros from various countries.

Andre Agassi and Pete Sampras headline the U.S. men's team, while Monica Seles, who was ineligible for the '92 Games, leads the U.S. women, along with Lindsay Davenport and Gigi Fernandez.

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Q: Some obituaries of Ella Fitzgerald hinted at a feud between Ella and Billie Holiday. Were they really rivals? —C.J.

A: Any friction between the two legendary singers was highly exaggerated. Their styles and looks were wildly dissimilar. A while back, when Ella was singing, Billie showed up in the audience. Her voice was gone then, and her body was dissipated with drugs.

Holiday veined up to the stage to embrace Fitzgerald, saying, "Ella, you're the greatest."

"No, Billie, you're still the greatest," replied Ella, tears streaming down both their faces. Holiday had to be escorted back to her table following the unexpected outburst.

Q: We hear that Lorenzo Lamas got notched by his wife fired from his TV series "Renegade" but saw to it that she didn't get further acting jobs in Hollywood. Is this guy really that vindictive? —R.R.

A: No, and he's not that influential either. His third wife (he just married his fourth) and former "Renegade" co-star is 30-year-old leggy Kathleen Kinmont (whose mother is former actress Abby Dalton). Kathleen claims that their marital differences began during the production of "Renegade" and that Lorenzo was looking for an excuse to have her depart the cast.

But since leaving "Renegade," Kinmont has successfully regrouped, with no interference from her ex. She recently finished back-to-back roles in

two upcoming flicks — "That Thing You Do!" and "Corporate Ladder" — and is currently co-starring in a third, *A Stranger in the House*.

Q: We hear that the ending of "Striptease" was rishot at the last minute, because Demi Moore wasn't pleased. Does she really have that kind of power? —S.K.

A: Demi, who turns 34 in November, remains at the top of the list of Hollywood's hottest female stars. She has the power to command some \$12 million to star in "Striptease," but she doesn't have that much power.

My spies say that the film's studio was very concerned about test audience reactions to the original ending: Shooting finished late last year. The finale had a slyly Congressman (Burt Reynolds), armed with a knife, trying to force himself sexually on Moore's character, a plucky single mom who turns to stripping to support her daughter.

Audiences didn't buy it. So the cast was assembled for additional shooting just before the release date.

Q: Do you expect Bob Barker to step down any-

time soon as he's of the "The Price is Right"? Who could possibly take his place? —B.L.

A: The question of who should succeed Barker is academic. Even though he's 72, Barker recently signed a contract that will keep him in place on the tube through the middle of 1997. Barker recently started his 25th year as host of "Price." He figures that it has given away some \$125 million over the course of 4,500 episodes. Bob has garnered 10 Emmys.

Barker remains as enthusiastic about the game show as ever. Look for a one-hour special this fall that highlights the program's most unforgettable moments.

Q: Whatever became of Kelly LeBrock of "Wild Science"? Wasn't she married to Steven Seagal? —O.S.

A: LeBrock and Seagal (her second husband) formed one of Hollywood's most notorious couples in the late '80s. They met in Japan before he was a big movie star. But, alas, the marriage didn't take. LeBrock, 35, divorced him and won a hefty financial settlement. That permitted her to drop out of the Hollywood

scene, which she never liked.

British-born LeBrock lives in a rural community in northern California with her three children, a boy and two girls, 7, 5 and 9. To keep busy, she's currently promoting a line of homeopathic medicine for children, "to build up their immune systems."

Kelly, who started modeling at 16, still looks great and has kept herself in terrific shape by consuming natural foods, of course.

Q: Billy Zane looks terrific in the new "Phantom" movie. Doesn't he have a gorgeous sister who is also an actress? —G.S.

A: Yes, he does. Billy, 30, and his sister, Lisa, 31, are native Chicagoans. Lisa is best known as a TV actress with stints on "Profit" and "ER." Billy, on the other hand, has an impressive list of movies to his credit: "Orlando," "Only You," "Tomestone" and "Dead Calm."

I met the Zanes not long ago at an awards function. Billy was enthused not only about "The Phantom" — which may prove a career breakthrough — but his next flick, "This World, Then the Fire-works."

Christopher makes AIDS his cause

June 21st is both the longest day of the year in this hemisphere, and also the Day of Compassion when the world stops to remember the victims of AIDS and reaffirm its commitment to eradicating the disease. But then comes June 22nd when days start to get shorter, and the world's aware-

ness of AIDS starts to fade until the next media event. Meanwhile, other voices demand less focus on AIDS and more on other diseases.

Thom Christopher, the distinguished actor who plays Carlo Heston on the "One Life to Live," has been active in the fight against AIDS for years, working largely with the organization, Broadway Cares/Equity Fights AIDS, and for him, every day is a day of compassion as well as a day of action.

"AIDS," Christopher says, "is the plague of our time. And to make it part of a disease competition is unrealistic. This is still the only disease that carries social connotations with it. No other disease does, nor does any other disease carry with it the stigma of legislation requiring privacy." "Where you can't even talk about it, when what's sorely needed is more communication, more awareness, more knowledge, and more understanding.

"...And, please, I don't want to hear the nonsense that one particular social group is responsible. That's not true. It never was," says Christopher. "Today, it's become an international pandemic. The numbers are growing around the world. And if responsibility has to be fixed, then blame societal ignorance and societal refusal to deal with it by keeping it in the numbers." The entertainment community, however, has been especially active in

keeping AIDS in the open, and Thom cited some recent examples. "On the matter we have the Tony winner, 'Rent,' with many of the cast members HIV-positive. There's also the film, 'Jeffrey,' with Patrick Stewart--And, of course, daytime compassion is doing a wonderful job in keeping the public aware of HIV and AIDS."

But does all this exposure in the entertainment media run the risk of eventually trivializing the situation?


"No," Thom said. "I don't believe you can trivialize it by making people aware of it. To the contrary: I think what you do is take it out of the dark, hidden places and put it where we can see it for what it is: a terrible plague."

Thom Christopher believes that while we're still a long way away from a cure, "if anything can come out of the present situation with HIV and AIDS, I hope it will help make people more sensitive to the magnitude and sanctity of life, and to the gift of living. I hope it makes us more aware of our responsibility to make life good for those around us. I hope people will learn from this the elegance of compassion and our human obligations to our brothers and sisters."



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Networks face summer blahs

If you've been looking forward to summer, odds are you don't work for one of the major television networks. For them, Labor Day can't come soon enough.

Almost as soon as the May ratings sweeps ended — and certainly after the Chicago Bulls finished off the Seattle SuperSonics in the National Basketball Association playoffs June 16 — the networks began their annual summertime ratings swoon, a malaise that's gotten progressively worse over the years.

Before the week of July holiday, which traditionally causes viewing levels to plummet, the four major networks this year have experienced historic low as people tune out, repeats in favor of cable and other alternatives.

Last week, ABC, CBS and NBC combined for their weakest rating ever — other than the week following political conventions or the Fourth of July. That erased the previous all-time low established just the week before.

Both weeks, the Big Three networks' aggregate rating fell by at least 8 percent compared to the corresponding period a year ago, to a mere 44 percent share of the available audience. With Fox included, that figure only rises to slightly more than half of available viewers, and totals are worse among the younger viewers most sought by advertisers.

Since 1989, in fact, viewing of the four major broadcast services in summer has declined by 20 percent (compared to 15 percent over a year-round basis). Even hits like "ER," "Friends" and "Grace Under Fire" have fallen to record-low ratings in recent weeks. Cable, meanwhile, has become increasingly aggressive about offering original programming in the summer, when the networks as a result, ba-

lic cable services combined to account 35 percent of the audience the last two weeks, and cable networks ranging from kid-oriented Nickelodeon to older-skewing Arts & Entertainment and CNBC have experienced ratings growth.

Some of cable's gains can be attributed to sheer volume. The number of cable channels has proliferated as new niche services spring up, and the percentage of homes with cable has grown to 68 percent of all TV households.

Bob Sieber, head of research for the Turner cable networks, points to a steady ascent of cable viewing that simply expands during the summer months. "The trends are remarkably similar to what we've seen throughout the year," he said, citing double-digit percentage increases for cable during the season that ended in May as well.

Network programmers remain concerned about poor summer ratings, but — after once seeing year-round original programming as the answer — now say the cost of using first-run shows to stem the tide may outweigh the relative benefits.

Officials have generally come to agree it doesn't make financial sense to load up new programs when viewing levels are traditionally their lowest. In addition, the networks don't usually see a profit even on hit shows until television a second time, so there is an economic incentive behind a period of repeats.

Despite experimentation with launching programs during the sum-

mer, the networks also haven't had any real success in that regard since CBS introduced "Northern Exposure" in July 1990. The most recent casualty is Fox's "L.A. Firefighters," which will end a low-rated summer run next week and then get a face lift before returning in the fall.

You don't have to do a lot of original programming to succeed during the summer," said Preston Beckman, NBC senior vice president of program planning and scheduling.

Popular shows still do reasonably well in reruns, he noted, though much of it has to do with the genre. Comedies repeat better than dramas, and newsless to produce — can stay fresh by mixing repeat segments with original stories, as demonstrated by "20/20's" interview with the Menendez brothers last Friday.

For that reason, NBC is already planning to air four hours of "Date Line NBC" next summer, adding to the three editions scheduled for fall. By contrast, prime-time soaps fare poorly in reruns, one reason Fox will preempt "Melrose Place" with a second movie this summer beginning July 15. Feature films have proven a consistent ratings draw, even in their second and third runs.

The networks are airing some original programs, but most amount to leftover episodes of canceled shows that didn't attract many viewers before the weather warmed up.

Airing those programs


allows the networks to "burn off" their investment in shows like "Central Park West," "American Gothic," "The Faculty" and "Mad About You."

Rather than invest in summer programming, the networks say they're better served by putting resources into ordering more episodes of "ER" and "Friends." That would decrease repeats from September through May, though it doesn't address the glut of reruns during the summer.

Downside to these diminished viewing levels, observers say, is that it can erode the habit of watching network television. "We program for 52 weeks in cable," Sieber said, in contrast to the "Gone fishing" sign the networks seem to have posted during the summer.

Beyond that, viewers don't see on-air advertising the networks are running to promote their new fall lineups, leading to more marketing costs as the networks must increasingly turn to buying time on outside media — including cable channels — to get the word out.

Front-running NBC has a major advantage in promoting its shows this summer because the network will air the Olympic Games, which begin July 19 and promise to increase network viewing dramatically. The last Summer Olympics in 1992 commanded 34 percent of the prime-time audience, and NBC has elaborate plans to capitalize on that showcase.

The History Channel repeats past successfully

NEW YORK — Dan Davids could have been speaking figuratively when he said one day last week, "The History Channel is on fire." At the moment, though, he was being quite literal. The History Channel was on fire. Smoke was billowing into its offices, forcing Davids, the network's general manager, and everyone else in the building to spill out onto East 45th Street.

The New York City Fire Department quickly showed up and ended the scare. Davids, assured that the History Channel was not yet history, could now continue on to lunch to discuss why his fledgling network is arguably cable industry's hottest property.

Since its launch in January 1995, the History Channel has been both marvel and vindication, especially for any history teacher who has ever witnessed a student's eyes glaze over.

The network devotes 24 hours of programming a day to the presentation of history's subject-matter figures. If that sounds like a sure way to bring a quick end to The Age of Television, nothing could be further from the truth.

In a mere 18 months, the History Channel has built an audience of more than 20 million subscribers, easily making it one of the fastest growing cable networks in the last 10 years.

That's the History Channel's history. Its future looks rosy still. In Myers Report's annual survey of the cable industry this year, cable operators said they were more likely to add the History Channel than any other service, including the Sci-Fi Channel, Turner Classic Movies, ESPN2 and scores of other networks available at any given moment.

Clearly, history sells on television, a notion that Davids and other executives with the Arts and Entertainment Networks suspected might be true in the summer of 1992 when they first considered beginning a new channel. The company's existing network, A&E, with its combination of documentaries and sophisticated dramas, was already a cable success, reaching 65 million American households and hauling in numerous cable industry awards. Now, the company — jointly owned by the Walt Disney Co.'s ABC unit, General Electric Co.'s NBC, and the Hearst Co. — wanted to try to duplicate its success with a second network. But what would the theme be?

"We looked at a host of different concepts," said Davids, an executive with A&E since its beginnings in 1984. "Not to bore you, but they ran to and fro everything from the Mystery Channel to a golf and tennis channel to a nautical channel."

At the end, though, Davids and his colleagues opted to stick with what they knew best. The A&E network had run a number of documentaries that had attracted wide audiences, including "Civil War Journal," "Real West" and "Dinosaur."

Why not create a whole network with 24 hours of historical documentaries, biographies of historical figures and movies with historical content?

Surveys commissioned by A&E supported the hunch. Half of those polled said they were more interested in history than they had been five years earlier. Two-thirds complained that television was doing too little to promote history, which had not always been the case. In the '50s and '60s, the networks often devoted

But in the frenetic '80s and '90s, the mania for only the newest and latest information squeezed out the networks' willingness to look backward.

A&E executives were convinced the networks were missing an opportunity in a creative way and the popularity of Ken Burns' Civil War series in 1990 gave them even more confidence.

"It said to us as programmers that you can examine any topic in history in a creative way and make it exciting and dramatic," said Abbe Raven, senior vice president of programming for the History Channel. "It fostered our belief that we could make any subject, even if there aren't moving pictures. It means that the topics we can cover are endless." Liftoff for the new network was at 7 p.m. Jan.

1, 1995, with the first showing from the original series, "Automobiles," narrated by Edward Herrmann. (The first program: "The Corvette.")

Today, Raven says, original productions make up 40 percent of the programming. The rest are existing documentaries, movies and mini-series (including, recently, a presentation of the original "Roots").

World War II has been featured so much that at times the History Channel seemed in danger of becoming the "all Hitler, all the time" network. But the channel takes pains to span time, with shows on the ancient Egyptians to the Crusades through the Civil War, two world wars and Vietnam. Viewers tend to like conflict in every epoch, Raven says.
