Brutal murderer may be paroled

Adoptive mother wants Sellers out of prison, hometown disagrees

HAZELTON — Cory Sellers was 17 when he bludgeoned an elderly woman who lived next door — a crime so brutal that the town fire chief said he "about fainted" at the sight of it.

"This morning, Sellers, 30, will get his third chance at parole from prison for murdering Faye Ostler, a divorced grandmother who lived on Social Security.

"Family members aren't happy about the parole hearings, nor the deal that was cut in court to allow Sellers a possible taste of freedom so soon.

gets a parole hearing, I get involved. Rather than remember (Ostler's) life, I get to remember her death."

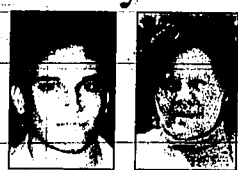
But Sellers said he feels remorseful — and plans never to come home if he is paroled from a medium-security prison in Boise by the Idaho Commission of Pardons and Parole.

"I've put everybody through enough, why punish them more?" Sellers said.

If paroled, he plans to live in Texas with his relatives and start work as a movie projector operator. Sellers was sentenced to an indefinite term of life in prison after pleading guilty to second-degree murder.

Brutal slaying

Sellers, in an interview with *The Times-News* this week, said he was drunk and stressed when he went over to Ostler's house and "made a pass at her" on May 24, 1984. When she rebuked him fiercely, Sellers

said, he killed her.

"It set off a spark in me and everything went haywire," Sellers said. All the arguments he had as a child with his mother, spurred by his father's former alcoholism, came to the fore, he said.

"I think I had seen my mom standing there again," he said. "I thought, here it goes again, and I just went off."

Officials arrived on a gruesome scene. Two feet from the door, Ostler lay on her carpet, her head bashed in with a baseball bat. Her body was swollen and smoldering from a pillow and paper towels that Sellers

stuffed between her legs and lit afire — an attempt to conceal the evidence.

Blood spots, about the size of a human head, stained the living room walls and both sides of a door. Other fires had been started on her bed and in her kitchen, according to court documents.

After the killing, Sellers fled through the streets. He blurted out his confession when he ran into the mayor, who was rushing to the fire, then again to a Jerome County sheriff's deputy at a nearby lumber pile.

Jeff Poole, the investigator whom Sellers confessed to that evening, said during an interview with *The Times-News* that he had known the boy for two years and never had any previous trouble with him.

He still can't get over the heinousness of the crime.

"There is a difference between shooting someone in the head with a BB gun and beating someone that badly with a baseball bat, then setting the body on fire," Poole said.

"I show you there was a lot of anger behind someone like the hell went on there, and to this day, I still don't know why he did that," Poole said.

Nursing home cancels juvenile service program

TWIN FALLS — Juvenile offenders will no longer call out bingo numbers or listen to stories of elderly residents at a local nursing home.

"The teens were there through a program designed to help them ease back into the community after doing time — but the program only lasted about a week, and a half. It ended Thursday, after news broke that one volunteer had choked his grandmother a year ago, causing her to pass out, then robbed her."

"It's just one of those things that got blown out of proportion," said Neil Ostle, administrator of the Twin Falls Care Center. The program was "such an innocent,

wonderful thing," he said.

The boy, 17-year-old Cody, was with the residents for just an hour and a half under constant supervision, Ostle said.

Cody and other teens were there to learn a new side of life, said Brent Reinker, Twin Falls County commissioner.

"He wasn't doing anything but calling bingo and participating," Reinker said.

Cody's grandmother, who is going to take him back to live with her, was upset that his character was questioned, said Paul Erick, director of the Snake River Youth Center.

"Volunteers from the Snake River Youth Center were supposed to voluntarily disclose their criminal pasts. But Cody did not. Please see JUVENILE, Page A2

Abrupt sound on jet's 'black box' deepens suspicions of bombing

EAST MORICHES, N.Y. — The cockpit voice recorder aboard TWA Flight 800 ends with an unidentified sound, only a fraction of a second long, government investigators said Thursday, deepening suspicions that a bomb sent the plane crashing into the Atlantic Ocean.

takeoff, the recording ended abruptly," Robert Francis, vice chairman of the National Transportation Safety Board, told a news conference. "All four CVR (cockpit voice recorder) channels recorded a brief, fraction-of-a-second sound just prior to the end of the tape."

Francis and other officials declined to offer possible explanations for such a sound. But other aviation experts, including one involved in the investigation of the 1988 bombing of a Pan American Airways flight over Scotland, noted that such an abrupt ending is consistent with planes struck by powerful bombs.

James Kallstrom, the chief FBI investigator, used his strongest language to date about the prospect of foul play.

- Be ready to have baggage opened and inspected.

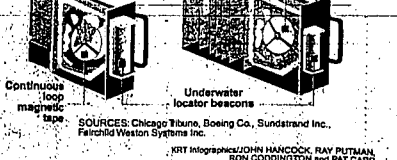
Inside the black box

TWO TYPES OF RECORDERS

Cockpit voice recorder: Automatically records noises, alarms and conversations in cockpit, over intercom, with control tower.

Digital flight data recorder: Steel tape records speed, altitude, pitch and roll, flap and slat positions for 25 hours or more.

ACROSS THE NATION

Rain sweeps from New England to Texas as West bakes

Powerful storms swamped the mid-Atlantic coast Thursday, and rain showers draped across the Eastern states from New England to southern Texas.

The season's first tropical depression, over the southwestern Caribbean, was upgraded to Tropical Storm Cesar. The Texas storms raked the central and eastern hill country overnight and into the morning, mopping trees and peeling away roofs in Marble Falls.

Storms lining up along coastal North Carolina and Virginia could produce damaging wind gusts and hail. In High Point, in northern North Carolina, some streets flooded after 3 inches of rain fell. The storms were gaining intensity as they moved ahead of a boundary stretching from the Ohio Valley to southwestern Texas.

Much of the Plains were cooled by Canadian air. At Hastings, Neb., the morning temperature dropped to 56 degrees, tying the record low set on the date in 1956.

Scorching heat prevailed across the West, with desert temperature readings climbing into the low 100s.

Strong thunderstorms were lining up over the Great Lakes region and extending southward into the Tennessee Valley. The storms produced strong wind gusts and hail across eastern Ohio and into western Pennsylvania.

Heavy rains were heading for Atlanta, although 90-degree heat prevailed at the Olympic stadium.

Thunderstorms were forecast across the Rockies in Wyoming, New Mexico, Utah, Nevada and Arizona, with unseasonable heat across the Pacific Northwest.

Tropical Storm Cesar dispatched parts of the Caribbean with a 4 to 6 inches of rain and wind gusts and flooding, the National Hurricane Center in Miami said.

A tropical depression becomes a tropical storm once its sustained winds reach 39 mph. Tropical storms become hurricanes at 74 mph.

Thursday's temperatures around the Lower 48 states ranged from morning lows in the 30s in Oregon and Wyoming to early afternoon readings of 100 in Arizona.

Congressional negotiators reach deal on health-care bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Key Congressional negotiators resolved a major sticking point Thursday that has blocked passage of a health insurance bill that would let people carry their policies from job to job regardless of pre-existing illnesses.

Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., and Rep. Bill Archer, R-Texas, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, agreed Thursday to a test of tax-free medical savings accounts that Kennedy had opposed.

The test would involve up to 750,000 policies for people in businesses with 50 or fewer employees and the self-employed. The pilot would last four years. Those who wanted could keep them after that, but no one else could get them unless Congress expanded the program, the lawmakers said.

do that, and care center workers did not tell residents that the young people talking with them were from the youth center, said Leslie Schroeder, director of activities for the care center.

Is there life on Mars?

WASHINGTON — Once upon a time, about 3.8 billion years ago, there was a hot, boiling planet that could have supported life.

Each had plenty of water, a rich atmosphere, steaming volcanoes and hot pools where organic chemicals could assemble, grow and reproduce.

On one of those planets — Earth — life took root. The other one — Mars — missed its chance and became the cold, dry, apparently lifeless planet of today.

However, scientists believe primitive forms of life may have gotten an early start on Mars and survived, perhaps for millions of years, before dying out.

Despite previous failures to find any trace of living organisms, some researchers cling to the hope that weird one-celled creatures may still reside in watery cracks beneath the icy Martian surface.

With experts working around the clock with the data in the recorders, which monitor multiple aspects of the plane's mechanical performance, Kallstrom said, "I suspect within 24 hours, within 48 hours, relatively soon, we'll have answers" on the crash's cause.

Plea bargain

Poole, now working as a detective for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department, said he agrees with family members of the victim that Sellers should have been prosecuted to the fullest extent of his original charge; first-degree murder — and beyond.

According to court records contained within Sellers' murder file at Jerome County Courthouse, then-county prosecutor Dennis Adamson was considering leveling additional charges of rape and arson against Sellers.

Not only had Sellers admitted starting the fires, but according to courthouse records, prosecutors

once thought Sellers sexually abused Ostlie.

"Evidence at the crime scene suggested sexual assault, but Poole said a plea bargain was struck before forensic tests on the sexual abuse evidence were completed.

But Sellers said he never raped Ostlie. He said during his sentencing, a forensic pathologist testified that there was no indication of rape. Adamson couldn't be reached for comment, and Sellers' attorney, Jim Meservy, said he didn't remember the sexual abuse allegations.

Sellers' mother, Nila, said she strongly believes that her adoptive son has paid his debt to society. He seemed an honest, decent teenager before the murder, she said, although angry and frustrated by family problems.

Cody Sellers had graduated from

Feds scour globe for suspects

Question still: Was Flight 800 crash terrorism?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Lebanese traveler in Athens. The accused bomber on trial in a Manhattan courtroom. An array of "usual suspects" who might have the motive and the skills to blow an airplane from the sky.

The fireball aboard TWA Flight 800 remains a mystery, even after Thursday's preliminary examination of the flight recorders. Depending on the forensic evidence, it could become a whodunit, and investigators are on the trail.

Federal detectives and analysts are following leads around the world to prepare for the possibility that the TWA jumbo jet was brought down on July 17 by sabotage. Armed with countless tips and suspicions, they are trying to narrow the prospects to a plausible few.

The FBI alone has interviewed more than 1,300 people in what it called Thursday a "worldwide investigation." Agents have questioned security guards and baggage handlers in New York and Athens, the airplane's last stops before the crash. The CIA directed station chiefs all over the globe to contact their best sources.

The most tantalizing possibility may be the followers of Ramzi Ahmed Yousef, a suspect in the 1993 World Trade Center bombing now on trial in U.S. District Court in Manhattan for a bomb placed aboard a Philippine Airlines 747.

A federal prosecutor told jurors that Yousef hid a time bomb on the airliner on Dec. 11, 1994, then got off at the plane's next stop. The small bomb, hid-

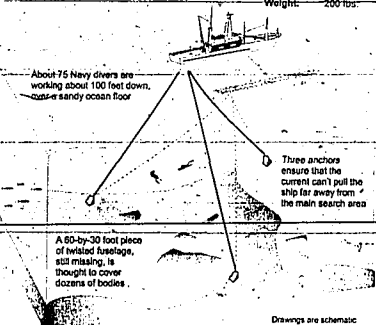

den beneath seat 26K, exploded on the next leg, killing a Japanese passenger. The pilot made an emergency landing.

"It was a trial run for a much larger and much more devastating operation," Assistant U.S. Attorney Michael Garcia told jurors. "The larger plan was code-named Bojingo, and it was a plan to blow a dozen U.S. jetliners out of the sky over a period of two days in January of 1995."

It remains unknown whether Yousef trained others to make the bombs and timing devices,

AP/T. Durand, W. J. Castello, A. Kranz, R. Toro before his 1995 arrest in Pakistan. Likewise, it is unclear whether Yousef could construct a device big enough to bring down a 350-ton aircraft.

Although circumstantial evidence suggests sabotage as the most likely cause of the TWA crash, nobody is saying where the early arrows point. Partly because the fireball could have resulted from mechanical failure, and partly because no one knows.

With federal investigators limiting their public statements, the

most prevalent outside speculation is focused on a variety of Islamic and Middle Eastern groups whose members have shown violence against the United States for religious or ideological reasons.

Islamic terrorists have proven their willingness and their ability to bomb commercial aircraft, unlike home-grown U.S. militias, for instance, which have demonstrated neither the capability nor the motive.

"There are not many groups that can do this kind of thing," said a respected international security specialist. If evidence of sabotage is uncovered, he said, his instinct would be to study carefully the many-tentacled Middle Eastern groups.

Such a theory led investigators to track the movements of a Lebanese man, identified as a financial supporter of the pro-Iranian Hezbollah militia, who was spotted in the Athens airport July 17, the same day the TWA 747 departed for New York.

A coincidence? The State Department believes it was Spokesman Nicholas Burns said the man arrived at Hellenikon International Airport's east terminal two hours after the TWA jet departed from the west terminal.

"We are confident that this particular individual had nothing to do with that particular flight, the TWA flight," Burns said.

"I think we need to know the how before we find out the who and the what," cautioned Vincent Cannistraro, a former CIA terrorism specialist who supervised the investigation of Pan Am Flight 103, which exploded in 1988 over Lockerbie, Scotland.

"You need to know how the plane came down, what technique was used; if it was a bomb or a missile," Cannistraro said.

FCC moves forward on digital television

WASHINGTON (AP) — Television got a boost into a new era that promises extra-sharp pictures and crystal clear sound when federal regulators accepted a proposal Thursday to give broadcasters extra channels they'll need for the digital service.

The Federal Communications Commission's unanimous decision begins the painstaking process of allocating a chunk of the public airwaves for digital TV — the biggest innovation since color picture tubes in the 1950s.

The FCC proposed to match up each of 1,600 TV stations, which now use analog channels, with a digital channel. The FCC hopes to make a final decision by the end of the year and begin licensing digital stations in early 1997, said FCC Chairman Reed Hundt.

Until TV stations convert entirely to a digital format, they'll transmit programs on two channels — one in analog and one in digital or an even more defined digital format, called high definition. This way, existing TV sets,

which are capable of receiving only analog signals, won't be rendered immediately obsolete.

Today, TV uses channels 2 through 69. Under the FCC's proposal, TV would use channels 7 through 51 after a transition to digital is complete.

During the transition, the FCC proposed taking some of the spectrum now used exclusively by broadcasters and making it available for new non-broadcast uses.

The National Association of Broadcasters applauded the FCC for moving forward, but opposed this part of the plan. It "will provide less digital service and more interference to existing TV," the NAB said.

Dick Smith, chief of the FCC's office of engineering and technology, said less than one percent of broadcast TV homes would experience interference — which he described as "slight snow on screen" on their analog channels. If those same homes get their broadcast channels via cable TV, they won't see any difference, Smith added.

WASHINGTON (AP) — An FBI agent's notes from a 1993 investigation quote former presidential counsel Bernard Nussbaum as saying that Hillary Rodham Clinton knew and could vouch for ex-White House security chief Craig Livingston, a lawyer confirmed Thursday.

Republican House committee chairman William Clinger said the document "calls into question" the veracity of recent congressional testimony by Nussbaum.

He also accused the FBI of giving the White House a "heads up" about the information, discovered last week.

Clinger alleged that the FBI went last week to the home of the agent who wrote the March 1993 notes and said the "White house was unhappy and concerned about this particular interview."

Researchers prove spinal nerves can regrow

WASHINGTON — A laboratory rat experiment that proves severed spinal nerves can grow new connections in adult mammals means "suddenly we can be very hopeful" that a way will be found to restore function in human patients, scientists said Thursday.

Researchers at the Karolinska Institute in Sweden report they successfully grew new nerve connections across the gaps of severed spinal cords in laboratory rats and that the experiment restored some motion and sensation to the paralyzed hind legs of the animals.

Lars Olson, a Karolinska researcher and senior author of the study, said all 23 of the test animals regained some motion and that some of the animals recovered up to 20 percent of the function.

Senator: Park needs to watch money

CHEYENNE, Wyo. — The superintendent of Yellowstone National Park needs to make sure money is spent on keeping the park open rather than on unrelated items, according to U.S. Sen. Al Simpson.

Simpson, in an interview with Wyoming reporters, repeated earlier statements that he did not care for the idea that Yellowstone Superintendent Michael Finley might use park money to battle a proposed gold mine near the park.

Finley has said that at current budget levels, he may be forced to shorten Yellowstone's season next summer.

The Senate Appropriations Committee recently approved a \$74 million increase in the National Park Service budget.

5 women accepted as Citadel cadets

CHARLESTON, S.C. — The formerly all-male Citadel military school has accepted five women as cadets, at least one of whom is planning to attend in the fall even if she winds up being the only female.

Two of the women who were accepted have paid nonrefundable \$150 room deposits, but the father of one of them said his daughter hasn't made a final decision. The two others indicated they plan to attend school elsewhere.

Admiral appeals sexual misconduct case

WASHINGTON — The admiral in charge of the Navy's recruiting command has stepped down while he appeals a preliminary finding of sexual misconduct, the Navy said Thursday.

Rear Adm. Anthony J. Watson is accused of unbecoming conduct and making false statements in connection with a case involving the wife of a Navy recruiter. An admiral's mast, a Navy administrative proceeding, determined over the weekend that sufficient evidence existed to sustain the charges.

Watson, a nuclear submariner who has been regarded as one of the Navy's rising stars, is appealing the finding to more senior Navy officials, as is normally the case in such matters.

Navy launches satellite into orbit

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — A Navy communications satellite designed to relay military information to U.S. troops around the world rocketed into orbit Thursday.

It is the seventh in a series of 10 so-called ultrahigh frequency, or UHF, follow-on satellites being built for the Navy by Hughes Space and Communications Co. of El Segundo, Calif.

The unmanned Atlas rocket blasted off from Cape Canaveral Air Station at 6:42 a.m. MDT, 15 minutes late because of minor technical trouble. The satellite was placed in a temporary elliptical orbit; its final destination is a geostationary 22,300-mile-high orbit.

GOP group urges changes in platform

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bob Dole should insist that Republicans drop from their party platform support for an anti-abortion constitutional amendment, a group of "pro-choice" Republicans said Thursday.

Sen. Olympia Snowe of Maine said Dole, his party's certain presidential nominee, should instead support platform language similar to that adopted by Wyoming's Republican Party. That language urges continued debate but takes no position on legalized abortion.

Dole has voiced his support for proposed platform language that seeks tolerance of divergent views on abortion but also reaffirms Republican support of a human life amendment to the Constitution.

The amendment would have the effect of setting aside 23 years of Supreme Court decisions that state women have a constitutional right to end their pregnancies, and thus allow states to outlaw all or most abortions.

With the Supreme Court building as a backdrop, Snowe told reporters her party's current plank language "does not reflect the majority view of Republicans and certainly doesn't represent the views of a majority of Americans."

Sen. Jim Jeffords of Vermont said Republicans should not risk a divisive fight at its national convention in San Diego next month over a proposal he said has no chance of getting through the Congress.

This issue is dead. Now all we've got to do is convince the delegates to put it behind them," Jeffords said.

Rep. Tom Campbell of California agreed, stating, "We will prevent that language from ever becoming law."

Campbell noted that Dole has not ruled out selecting a pro-choice running mate and has chosen Rep. Susan Molinari, R-N.Y., who supports abortion rights, as the convention's keynote speaker.

"The platform of the Republican Party should not be an impediment for you to support

Bob Dole for president," Campbell said in a message to pro-choice Republicans nationwide.

Rep. Jim Greenwood of Pennsylvania, identifying himself as the father of two daughters, contended that party platforms are, in general, comparatively irrelevant documents. The GOP platform's language on abortion, if unchanged, will be even more irrelevant, he said, because "a majority of registered Republicans are pro-choice."

Man arrested on weapons charge by federal agents posing as militia

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Undercover officers posing as militia members lured a machine gun-toting man sought on a federal firearms warrant to a wooded area of northern Idaho, capturing him after a brief scuffle.

Paul James Cavanaugh Jr., 36, was arrested Wednesday near Athol by agents with the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, said deputy Marshal Roger Allen from Boise.

Cavanaugh also had been sought for questioning in the explosion of a pipe bomb April 29 that damaged an entrance to the Spokane City Hall.

But ATF Supervisory Agent Bob Harper of Spokane said Thursday that Cavanaugh is not a suspect in that bombing. No one was hurt in the blast, which occurred before business hours.

The City Hall blast was one of four in Spokane since April. Two pipe bombs exploded at a newspaper office and bank April 4, and the bank also was robbed.

On July 12, there was a pipe bombing at a Planned Parenthood clinic and another bank robbery.

On Wednesday, two undercover officers drove a pickup truck to the spot where Cavanaugh

thought he was to meet with members of a militia group, Harper said. Three other officers were hidden in the truck's camper shell.

When he was arrested, Cavanaugh was armed with an Uzi machine gun with extra ammunition magazines, a softball-sized homemade explosive device, two large Bowie knives and several martial arts throwing stars, Harper said at a press conference Thursday.

Federal agents had known for weeks that Cavanaugh was hiding in a woman's rural Idaho home, Harper said. He refused to elaborate on how agents initially contacted Cavanaugh to set up the meeting.

Agents avoided confronting Cavanaugh at the house where he was staying, hoping to avoid bloodshed or an extended standoff, Harper said.

Cavanaugh was held Thursday in the Latah County Jail in Moscow, Idaho. Authorities expect to transfer him to

Spokane within a week to face charges there.

Cavanaugh has expressed anti-government sentiments in the past, reportedly telling a state employee in Spokane that militia groups "have every right" to shoot government workers, The Spokesman-Review newspaper reported Thursday.

He was not a member of any known militia group, Harper said.

Federal authorities issued an arrest warrant for Cavanaugh on May 21, a day after he confronted officers searching his Eastern Washington cabin and then fled. The warrant charges him with possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. He had been convicted in 1989 of drug and weapons charges.

ATF agents and Lincoln County sheriff's deputies were searching Cavanaugh's wood-and-tarpaper cabin outside Davenport when Cavanaugh arrived in a pickup truck driven by a friend, authorities said.

Cavanaugh ordered the officers off his property and then told them he was armed, pulling back a coat to reveal what appeared to be a handgun, authorities said.

Bear mauls 4-H counselor

MOUNT LEMMON, Ariz. (AP) — A bear mauled a 16-year-old camp counselor early Thursday, biting her shoulder and thigh before being driven off and killed.

Anna Knochel's early morning mauling was the second bear attack on this mountain north of Tucson in a week.

Knochel, one of 14 counselors supervising 71 children on a 4-H Club outing was in a tent alone when the attack happened in a campground about 5:15 a.m., said sheriff's Sgt. Mike O'Connor.

Other counselors tried unsuccessfully to drive the bear off by beating on the tent and screaming. The animal finally fled after an adult camp staffer shot it twice.

Let's keep government from doing Mom, Dad's job

When it comes to sound and fury, there are few gales that blow louder and stronger these days than the parents' rights movements.

Fueled largely by conservatives and led by the Virginia-based Of the People, its centerpiece is a proposed amendment to every state constitution that would prohibit states from infringing upon parental rights to bring up their kids.

Similar legislation pending in Congress, the Parent Rights and Responsibilities Act, would make it illegal for schools or government agencies to teach sex education or to counsel children if they contradict the parents' wishes.

Closer to home, 25 states have passed laws or reinforced existing statutes to hold parents responsible for their children's behavior.

But with all due respect to the well-intentioned folks trying their level best to get the government to do right by families, maybe the answer doesn't lie in still more government.

It seems to us that our national parenting crisis can be traced more or less directly to the day when we decided that schools could adequately handle important chores that Mom and Dad were too busy to do.

Combine that with higher divorce rates, the decline of church and community as support systems, and the ascendancy of popular culture, and it's not hard to figure out why Junior went astray.

Americans who want to fix that by reasserting parental prerogatives have

their hearts in the right place, but their priorities are misplaced.

Rather than rushing to the school board to make sure that Johnny doesn't get a peak at "Catcher in the Rye" in the classroom, parents can do a more effective job by imparting values that will equip children to make the right decisions on their own.

Rather than going to court to stop sex education, Mom and Dad can teach kids at home what they should know.

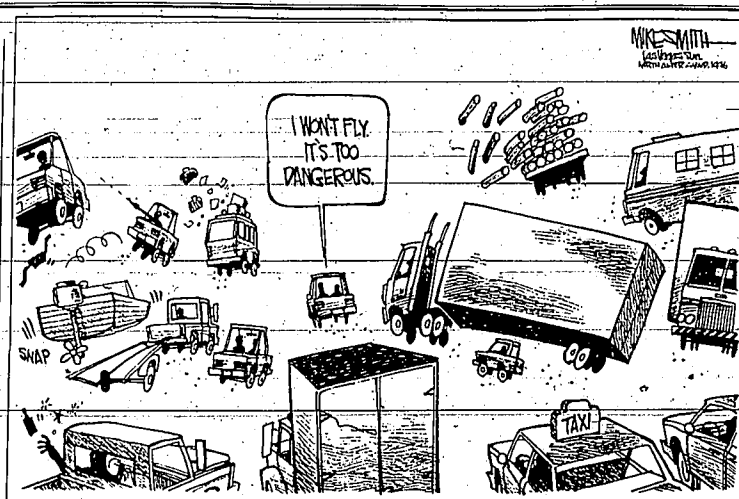
Rather than making adversaries of educators, parents can put teachers in a position to do their jobs more effectively.

A society that feels the need to legislate values needs to ask why. No teacher, coach, public servant, police officer or judge is in a position to do an effective job of teaching other people's kids right from wrong.

That's a parent's job, as difficult and frustrating - and sometimes overwhelming - as it may seem. Teachers can only supplement the important lessons that youngsters derive from family, church and neighborhoods.

One of the ironies of the parental rights movement is that it's being driven by people who are deeply suspicious of government, yet seek to put the government - in the form of bureaucrats and the courts - squarely in the middle of relations between families and schools.

Let's keep the government out of it. If Mom and Dad do their jobs, and communicate effectively with their children and their teachers, that's all the parenting help this society needs.



Capitalism won't work of markets aren't free

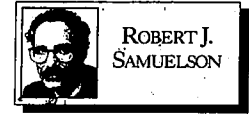
Henry Simson, the U.S. secretary of labor, once observed that a capitalist country going to war had "better let business make money out of the process or business won't work." America followed that advice and won the war.

Simson's insight still applies in its penultimate version: modern capitalism won't work if markets aren't left fairly free. America slides by that axiom and, as a result, is a powerful job machine. Europe doesn't - and is a puny job machine. The mystery is that so many economists can't understand this.

The huge job gap between the United States and Europe is, of course, well known. From 1979 to 1995, Western Europe created less than one job for every two new workers. 10.3 million jobs for 21.5 million added workers. Unemployment jumped from 5.2 percent to 11 percent. Meanwhile, the United States created 26 million jobs, absorbing 95 percent of new workers. The unemployment rate - though fluctuating over the business cycle - hasn't drifted up. It was 5.8 percent in 1979 and 5.6 percent in 1995.

What's new is the inability of many economic studies to explain the job gap. Factors once cited as U.S. advantages (flexible wages, greater competition, less generous social programs) are now deemed on closer inspection, not to matter. Case, these studies are hard to take seriously, because they seem determined to miss the larger picture. Which is this: America's economic culture favors growth; Europe's doesn't.

Job creation requires three things: (1) the economy must grow fast enough so that companies want more workers; (2) hiring must be profitable - if labor costs are too high, firms won't hire even if demand is strong; and (3) people must be willing to work. On all counts, the U.S. economy outperforms the European: Economic growth: Between 1979 and 1995, the U.S. economy grew at an annual average rate of 2.4 percent; the Euro-

pean Union's economy grew only 2.1 percent annually. (The EU includes most major Western European countries.) Labor costs: Europe's rise faster than America's despite higher unemployment. Between 1983 and 1993, compensation per worker (wages plus fringes) jumped 6.3 percent annually in the EU, the comparable U.S. increase was 4.2 percent. Work effort: Americans work harder, because the alternative - being supported by government - isn't attractive. Interestingly, initial U.S. and European unemployment benefits are similar: They typically replace about 50 percent to 70 percent of an average worker's wages. But after some joblessness, U.S. benefits dwindle while European countries continue to provide support.

Although Europe's economy isn't dead, excessive government - taxes regulations, market controls - hobbles overall growth. Markets don't match workers and jobs. To conclude otherwise (as some studies do) defies common sense. One book from the National Bureau of Economic Research in Cambridge says Europe's generous social policies don't foster high joblessness.

The trouble with these studies is that they try to explain too much from too little. To understand why, consider a sports analogy. Suppose basketball Team A has a tiny advantage over Team B in rebounds; it also has small advantages in steals and three-pointers. Separately, no single advantage seems decisive; together, they explain Team A wins championships. The same is true of Europe and America. All Europe's disadvantages feed each other. Higher labor costs (not fully offset by higher productivity) deter hiring.

Steep payroll taxes - needed to pay generous social benefits - do the same. European growth also suffers from a fixed exchange-rate system that forces most countries to follow German interest rates. Without that discipline, it's feared that inflation would accelerate. In turn, this fear stems from other features of Europe's system: stronger unions; more political determination of wages; less competition in product markets.

America's advantages are also reinforcing. U.S. corporations are consistently more profitable. In 1995, they earned an 18.3 percent return on assets compared with 13.8 percent for German firms. In the United States, venture capital is more available for start-up companies. Government regulation has been lifted from more critical industries, such as telecommunications. All the added product and profit opportunities encourage expansion. Flexible wages favor hiring.

With apologies to James Carville, "it's the system, stupid." America still embraces the market culture; its obsession with growth is striving for wealth (and tolerance of inequality); its acceptance of change. Europe is less enthralled and more inclined to reshape market culture through government.

The lesson is not that government is bad. It isn't. Government does much good, from environmental regulation to unemployment insurance. But too much government or misguided government can subvert economic growth.

What Europe teaches is that the corrosion is a slow, cumulative process. Europe's efforts to reverse it (by easing regulations and limiting social benefits) will be slow, precisely because no one policy does all the harm. In America, we ought to take heed. To work well, government needs to be used with restraint. To work well, capitalism needs to retain its central features including the freedoms to fail and to get rich.

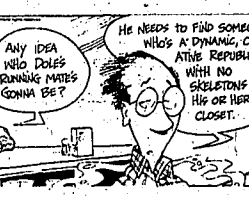

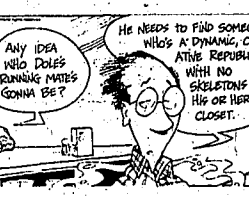
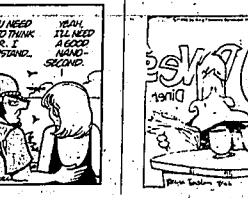

Russians reject oil legislation

MOSCOW (AP) — President Boris Yeltsin and the Communist-led parliament are battling over legal protections for Western oil companies who want to develop the country's vast reserves.

For Yeltsin, the proposed law means the ticket to billions of dollars in foreign investment. Communist lawmakers say it means selling Russia's measured natural resources to rapacious Western capitalists.

The bill would bring about a dozen laws into line with production-sharing legislation passed in December, providing Western companies with legal protections and tax guidelines.

Communist lawmaker Viktor Byukhin said Thursday that the production-sharing legislation could cause "serious damage to Russia's economic interests and national security."

The State Duma, the lower house of parliament, narrowly rejected it last week on the bill's first reading, holding up international oil deals worth billions of dollars and hindering Yeltsin's efforts to boost badly needed foreign investment.

The measure is expected to come up for another vote by fall. "Most of the production-sharing projects will be held up by this legislation," Peter Charov, executive director of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce in Moscow, said Thursday. "Until the legislation is in place, no one wants to go ahead."

Dolphins save swimmer's life

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Martin Richardson went for a swim among dolphins but found they were more than gentle playmates. They can be lifesavers.

Richardson, a Briton, was swimming in the Red Sea off Egypt's Sinai Peninsula when he was attacked by a shark. Companions aboard a diving boat heard him scream.

"Someone took a bite of my side," Richardson, a 29-year-old diver, said by telephone from Turkey. "I started panicking for a bit, then I took another chunk of my inner arm."

Richardson's companions then watched as three bottlenose dolphins encircled the wounded man, flapping their fins and tails and scattering off the shark.

"This defensive behavior of dolphins is common when mothers are protecting their calves from predators," said a statement by the Recanati Center for Maritime Studies at the University of Haifa in Israel.

The statement said the dolphins continued to circle for several minutes until Richardson's companions reached him.

Mexico to repay \$8 billion package

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexico said Thursday it will repay \$7 billion of its debt to the United States, slashing the amount still owed from last year's \$20 billion emergency package to \$3.5 billion.

The government's Treasury Secretary said the early payment was made possible due to success in selling bonds at lower interest rates and longer terms, indicating growing investor confidence in the country's economic recovery.

The agency said the shift will save Mexico's government about \$125 million a year, lower the average cost of the loans to 8.12 percent from 9.7 percent and extend the term to 7.9 years from 3.5 years.

Mexico said it will also repay \$1 billion to the International Monetary Fund.

Salvage company beats state to rights

California steamer sank in 1865

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A salvage company, not the state, holds the rights to the wreckage of the steamer Brother Jonathan which sank off northwestern California in 1865 with about 200 people and perhaps a \$50 million treasure, a federal appeals court has ruled.

Upholding a lower-court ruling, the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said the state had failed to prove that the entire wreck was abandoned while it lay on submerged state lands off Crescent City.

As a result, Deep Sea Research Inc., which located the wreck in 1993 after obtaining rights from the ship's insurers, can attempt to salvage its contents. Fletcher Alford, the company's lawyer, said it hopes to start work in the late summer or early fall, when the weather normally is most favorable.

The company can claim ownership on two grounds. After being declared abandoned property becomes the owner's, Alford said. He said the company has agreed to pay insurers a percentage of the value of the insured property.

Deputy Attorney General Linn Masoureddis said the state was disappointed by the ruling.

and would study its options. The state could appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The ship, carrying between 190 and 225 people, sank in July 1865 after hitting a submerged rock in rough weather. It was the worst maritime disaster in North Coast history.

There are no reliable records of the contents, only rumors — gold and artifacts worth between \$25 million and \$50 million today.

After Deep Sea Research used sonar and divers to locate the hulk, the state claimed ownership under the federal Abandoned Shipwrecks Act of 1987. That law applies to wrecks that are abandoned on a state's submerged lands, if the wreck is either embedded in the sea floor or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

During the state's appeal, the Brother Jonathan was declared eligible for the national register. But the appeals court said the declaration was not enough because the ship was not legally "abandoned."

The court cited a newspaper clipping provided by Deep Sea Research from the time of the sinking, listing companies that insured the ship's cargo. Those companies took title to at least part of the wreck by paying insurance claims, and ultimately transferred title to Deep Sea Research, the court said.

Zion Park fire declared contained

CEDAR CITY, Utah (AP) — Firefighters have declared a 6,700-acre fire burning in Zion National Park contained, and will continue to strengthen fire lines over the next several days.

According to a statement from fire information officer Dave Davies, the fire was surrounded either with hand-built lines or natural barriers such as cliffs and plateaus at the southern end of the blaze.

Containment of the fire —

burning in under-dry ponderosa pine, scrub oak and brush — was declared Wednesday evening. On Thursday, firefighters continued to mop up hot spots on the north end of the blaze with the assistance of helicopters, Davies said.

Crews expected to have the fire under control by either later this weekend or early next week. Most of the 247 firefighters battling the flames were to begin disbanding over the next several days.

Pesticide plant set to open next month south of Burley

BURLEY - A chemical plant southwest of town is expected to begin manufacturing a soil fumigant within the next month.

Some local potato growers and chemical-dealers support the plant, saying it would be an asset to the local economy.

The Oregon company OR-CAL Inc. will be selling the product.

Dean was brought to Burley by Sundance Resources Inc. of Phoenix, Ariz., to oversee plant construction.

Don Dean, who is overseeing construction of the plant, said Rainbow Farm Products Inc. is planning to host a public open house at the plant this fall.

Dean said in the past he has worked for Kerley at Kerley Industries Inc., which was purchased by a British company in late 1988.

Kerley also has been the primary stock holder of a troubled chemical plant in Tucson, Ariz., which is under court order to shut down by the end of 1997.

The plant was cited by the Environmental Protection Agency for two toxic chemical releases. And Arizona officials cite numerous environmental violations. Kerley said the releases were insignificant.

About 20 tanks have been installed for storage of raw chemicals and the finished product, Dean said. More than a dozen people have been hired locally to staff the plant, he said.

From a safety standpoint, mamm sodium itself isn't considered to be a highly toxic chemical. The three raw chemicals used to make it are more dangerous.

Methylamine and carbon bisulfide are flammable and caustic soda is corrosive.

Burley Fire Chief Phil Heiner said a chemical fire could be handled by local emergency personnel. In taking care of Please see PLANT, Page B3

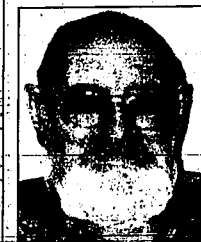

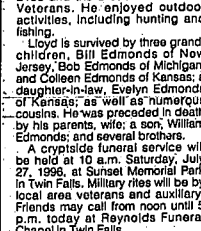

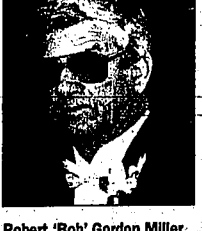

Fire workers exposed to radiation

POCATELLO (AP) - Five workers at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory have been contaminated with radiation, although health physicists doubt the exposures will exceed conservatively set health limits. Radiation safety workers testing the employees after they left a work area Monday detected they internally absorbed a still unknown isotope or isotopes. Contamination detected on the men's clothing was washed off. The men were exposed while erecting scaffolding in a room where other workers were cutting pipe to decommission the Chem Plant's old Waste Calciner Facility. During the next two weeks,

INEL experts will analyze urine and fecal samples from the five men to determine exactly how much exposure they received. INEL spokesman John Walsh said the workers handling the pipe wore protective clothing including respirators. Pipe cutters wore liquid dripping from one pipe and placed absorbed material under the drip. The five men were about 15 to 30 feet away. They wore protective clothing, but had no respirators, which regulations do not require for that task. The radiation exposure guideline at the INEL is 1,500 millirems per year, set by the contractor. The U.S. Department of

Energy's exposure guideline is 2,000 millirems per year. Idaho residents receive an average 380 millirems per year from natural and manmade non-INEL sources. About 25 percent to 30 percent of the U.S. population gets cancer from all causes, said Paul Ruiter, INEL supervisor of radiation dosimetry, said an annual 1,500 millirem exposure officially translates into an additional .075 percent chance of developing cancer in a person's lifetime. But whether the danger is actually that great is a point of debate, with many experts believing the official limits overestimate the risk.

Just don't call them bikers

SALMON (AP) - All roads led to Salmon this week, when more than 50 men, a few women, and a poodle named Duncan rode their motorcycles into town. They went through bugs, over winding mountain passes, and across hot prairies to rally for just two days before heading home again. "The idea was to give us a place to rally to," said Jack Robinson, head honcho of the 1,500-member Four-Stroke Singles National Owners Club. "We don't necessarily pick a tourist site. We want to see the scenery and meet the people. Our rally motto is 'drive in, hang out, go home.'" Robinson chose Salmon because it had only one stoplight. The motorcycle aficionados were on their way to the Salmon River Coffee Shop for breakfast

Wednesday looked like a gang of graying bikers. Bikers? No. They're motorcycle riders, they explained, who appreciate the simple things in life including single cylinder motorcycles simple enough for them to maintain. "Graying? Yes. The average age of the cyclists in Salmon was 53. A gang? No. The leather-clad group doesn't ride together. In fact, the only common bond is their machines. Loosely connected by their club membership and a quarterly newsletter published by Robinson, members rally each year at a different destination. "It's 3D you're part of where you're at," Robinson said. "In an RV you bring your environment with you. On a motorcycle, you're

part of the environment." And that's where the leather comes in handy. Raquel Huddleston, a petite truck driver from McPherson, Kan., wrecked near Jackson, Wyo., when she hit the pavement and broke her arm. She was 1,600 miles from home and 250 miles from Salmon. Her dog, Duncan, was unscathed and unharmed by the accident. Husbands were unscathed by it. He was riding ahead of Raquel and heard the accident through a transmitter attached to her helmet.

Crews fight Western blazes from Oregon to the Rockies

Firefighters on Thursday battled several wildfires from Oregon to the Rockies, where a 4,000-acre blaze in rugged canyon country tore through a forest close to a natural gas field in northwest Colorado.

Lightning was blamed for most of the fires burning in Colorado, Nevada, Oregon and Utah.

Fire crews in Colorado hoped cooler temperatures and higher humidity would provide the break they had been looking for since hot, windy weather earlier in the week whipped up the fire about 20 miles north of Fruita. Lightning might have started the Hatcher fire, first noticed Tuesday, a U.S. Bureau of Land Management spokesman said.

About 280 firefighters were battling the blaze, which was only about 5 percent contained Thursday afternoon.

"We're using air tankers, making drops on hot parts of the fire. It's a very dangerous situation," said David Lehmann, a spokesman for the interagency team working on the fire.

Firefighters on Wednesday shut down a natural gas field near Fruita that the fire threatened. The Garfield area field has about 20 active wells.

"With them being shut down, there wouldn't be any chance of an explosion," said Bill Nelson of the Rocky Mountain Fire Incident team.

In Utah, crews were dousing hot spots on the 6,700-acre Wildcat Fire near Zion National Park. The fire was given for containment Wednesday evening, and crews hoped to bring it under

control by early next week. Lightning-sparked fires kept crews busy across northern Nevada. Crews were battling 14 fires, ranging from a few acres to thousands of acres.

The most active fire was about 50 miles north of Winnemucca, south of the Oregon line. The Flat Creek fire, which scorched about 2,500 acres, was about 75 percent contained.

To the southwest, the Sod House fire, which had charred 2,000 to 3,000 acres, and the 6,000-acre Rock Hill fire, southwest of Winnemucca, were both contained Thursday.

Also contained Thursday was an 800-acre fire north of Battle Mountain.

"We've been kinda busy," said Mike Whalen, spokesman for the teams fighting the fires.

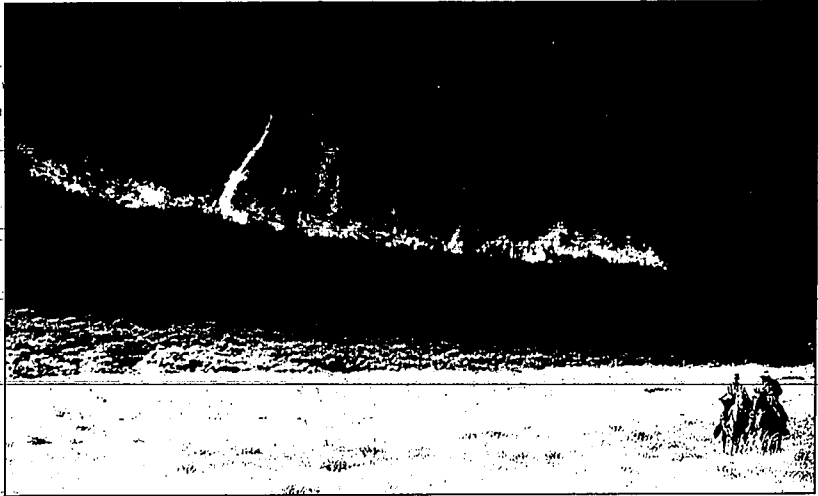
No structures were lost, although Whalen said the Rock Hill fire threatened some homes and a couple of mines.

Lightning also set off a wildfire near McDermitt, Ore. In southeastern Oregon, firefighters burned 1,000 acres from 800 acres overnight.

A 250-acre fire near Simmons Gulch, 30 miles west of Vale, was about 80 percent contained.

In western Colorado, a 1,400-acre fire 30 miles south of Rangely was about 80 percent contained. About 140 firefighters were on the lines of the Twin Butte fire.

In southwest Colorado, a 3,600-acre fire burning on the San Juan National Forest 22 miles north of Dolores was 75 percent contained. Cooler, humid weather allowed crews to make more headway on the Disappointment

fire. Full containment was predicted for Friday.

No projection for containment was given for the 970-acre Telephone fire, which erupted Tuesday in the rugged backcountry of the Grand Mesa-Uncompahgre National Forest, about 35 miles southwest of Montrose.

The Jordan and Mooshead fires burned on Bureau of Land

Management acreage in northwestern Colorado, said Lynn Barclay, public information officer for the Craig Interagency Fire Dispatch Center.

The Jordan fire, 11 miles north-

west of Meeker, burned about 50 acres. The Mooshead fire, about 10 miles south of the Dinosaur National Monument, burned through 200 acres of pinon and juniper.

Investigator urges land use groups to mobilize

FARMINGTON, N.M. (AP) — Ranchers, miners and loggers must unite to counter violence and other extreme tactics used by environmental activists, a Seattle-based investigator said Thursday.

Barry Clausen, speaking at a New Mexico Farm Bureau meeting here, said some environmentalist groups actively use violent means — ranging from tree spiking to pipe bombs — for political gain.

He identified Earth First! as the No. 1 "eco-terrorist" group, saying he obtained firsthand knowledge of sabotage efforts against land use operations by infiltrating the group in 1990.

He said that while he was an "undercover" member, he learned of instances in which barbed wire was strung across knowledge trails in national forests, cattle were shot in Utah and a power line was snipped in

California. He said he also became aware of Earth First! efforts to sabotage a logging company's helicopter.

Leslie Hemstreet, co-editor of the Earth First! Journal in Eugene, Ore., disputed Clausen's allegation that the group advocates violence.

"I don't acknowledge individual members may perform acts known as 'monkey-wrenching' to disrupt a forest construction site," he said. "But the insistent members would take no violent action against another human."

"Earth First! does monkey-wrenching," Hemstreet said in a telephone interview. "We sabotage what is destroying the earth, like putting sand in a bulldozer's oil. We would never harm a human life or any other life."

Clausen, author of "Walking on the Edge," also accused mainstream environmental groups of

sometimes channeling money from public sources such as federal grants to radical causes, knowingly or not.

Asked for her response, Hemstreet said, "In reality, we're poor as dirt and no one is channeling any funds toward us."

Clausen said Thursday's talk would be his last public appearance "for a long time" because he wants to devote efforts to "following the money trail" that he contends links mainstream and radical environmentalists.

He also said he would continue to try to get a congressional investigation into eco-terrorism as a national security threat.

Clausen said environmentalists groups also have widely distributed "propaganda" such as newsletters and other mailings to claim a public relations advantage over ranchers and other public land use groups.

"Your industry has to get word

out to the people in Chicago, to New York and to Washington, D.C.," said Clausen, a former private investigator who identifies himself as an intelligence analyst. "We have to get it out to the senators and the congressmen. Until you do that, I really don't believe that you're going to see much of a change."

He also warned ranchers of a publicity threat from militia groups, saying the public won't understand ranchers who also are militia members because many militia groups advocate violence against federal agencies.

"I will not support any terrorism act," Clausen said. "They (militia groups) are doing nothing but trying to discredit the people who are trying to help you."

Clausen said he believes in protecting the environment and that "there are some good guys out there." He said he contributes to certain environmental causes, but declined to name them.

Feds to propose adding steelhead to endangered list

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt said Thursday the federal government will recommend next week that several West Coast steelhead runs be protected under the Endangered Species Act.

Babbitt did not disclose which runs would be listed or what level of protection would be recommended. National Marine Fisheries Service spokesman Brian Gorman said protection would be denied for some runs.

Gorman refused to release details pending a news conference Tuesday.

Babbitt mentioned the steelhead protection proposals during a meeting with environmental and business leaders to discuss Willamette River water quality.

Gorman said the fisheries service studied 15 runs stretching from the Canadian border to Southern California. Calling the outcome a compromise, Gorman said some runs would be listed, others denied and others deferred.

"It's not rocket science that those dams are responsible for the human-caused mortality of these fish," he said. "When it comes to having a plan to save these fish, the administration is really a miserable failure in our opinion."

Babbitt praised efforts to protect the fish, calling it an example of success triumphing over bureaucracy.

Steelhead "don't read highway maps, they don't read development maps," Babbitt said. "All of a sudden it's us who have got to come together... and see if we can find ways to live in harmony with this landscape."

Species Act, the announcement is followed by a year of reviews by various agencies.

Federal protection of the steelhead could have repercussions all along the West Coast for the logging and fishing industries. Still, said Mitch Santolucena of the conservation group Idaho Steelhead

'Awesome' swells from tropical storms lure surfers

SANTA CRUZ, Calif. — Massive waves from a South Pacific storm continued to pound Santa Cruz shores on Thursday, sending surfers for their boards, forcing lifeguards to beach lifelines and harbor officials to keep boats in port.

"This is an epic swell," said Tom Blalock, chief state parks lifeguard for the Santa Cruz district. "We've never seen waves like this before. It's almost too powerful. I have not seen a summer swell anywhere near this size."

Onlookers lined the bluffs to watch daredevil surfers challenge the dangerous waves that had claimed two commercial fishing boats and a sailboat the day before.

"Awesome!" exclaimed Thelma Ackley, 68, of Los Altos, as she watched the waves and the spectacular waves with her sisters from the cliffs at Lighthouse Point. "Look at the height of those! I've never seen waves like that before. It's almost too powerful. I have not seen a summer swell anywhere near this size."

While the waves thrilled surfers, they worried lifeguards and boating officials at the Santa Cruz Small Craft Harbor. Such surf typically

breaks during the winter, often accompanied by chilly storms. But this week's waves, which are expected to subside today, arrived during peak tourist season in balmy, sunny weather, generated by a storm last week off Tahiti.

"It's about as good as it gets in the summer," said Mark Gion, 35, a Santa Cruz surfboard maker, as he headed back out to ride the eight-to-12-foot waves at Steamer Lane near Lighthouse Point. "This is very rare."

State park rangers tripled their lifeguard staff and told beachgoers to stay out of the water at Twin Lakes State Beach near the harbor, the most heavily used beach in the county. Santa Cruz lifeguards, who rescued more than two dozen people

Wednesday, confined swimmers to the calmer waters west of the wharf.

"Everybody on the coast has been on a heavy precautionary measure," Blalock said. "The ocean's doing strange stuff that we're not used to."

Few problems were reported Thursday. State park lifeguards plucked four surfers from the sea west of Lighthouse Point after an observer reported he was having trouble getting back to shore, said Capt. Matt McCaslin, of the Santa Cruz Fire Department.

None was injured. And a girl was taken to the hospital for observation after slipping and hitting her head on the rocky jetty at Twin Lakes, Blalock said.

all local residents share the feelings you expressed."

Chisholm told other outspoken conservationist who calls the Hagerman Valley home, welcomed the idea of a paleontological research center — but urged Park Service officials to leave the visitors' center in downtown Hagerman.

The Hagerman Fossil Beds are not a scenic attraction. Yellowstone National Park's Grand Canyon National Park,

Chisholm said, and "their value does not lie in being viewed."

"In fact, this area is far more valuable in its current form as a quiet home for local residents and as a recreation area than as a tourist trap," Chisholm wrote.

More visitors needn't necessarily lead to a diminished quality of life for Hagerman-area residents, the management plan maintains.

Local residents could win

some improvements "rather than passively allowing negative impacts on the local quality of life," the plan said.

Zoning codes could be strengthened and other decisions could be made to steer growth into appropriate areas, Park Service planners wrote.

Moreover, "methods of paying for improvements could be devised that would minimize or eliminate costs to current local residents," the management plan said.

Prosecutor drops complaint against judge

REXBURG — Special Prosecutor Dan Hawley has dropped his attempt to disqualify the Fremont County magistrate from the child sexual abuse case against retired REXBURG state judge LaVer Withers. Hawley said that since initially seeking the ouster of Magistrate Keith Walker he has decided he would be happy with Walker presiding in the initial stages of the case, and he said the family of the alleged victim wanted the case to remain with Walker, who had previously represented it at least one legal matter. Withers is accused of fondling a 13-year-old girl in 1994. It is the only charge brought so far from the more than 100 female patients who have claimed the doctor sexually abused them during his 32 years in practice.

Agreement could resume construction

EAGLE — A construction moratorium in one of Idaho's fastest-growing cities could end by mid-September with this week's signing of an agreement to expand sewer treatment. The deal reached Wednesday will end the four-month moratorium, although the local sewer district will have to find a new way to treat all the city's sewage in five years. "It's a very restrictive agreement, but, right now, it's the only thing we've got going," Eagle Sewer District Administrator Lynne Sedlack said. "If we're going to avoid lawsuits by developers and contractors, we need to get the ball rolling."

Dispute surfaces over waste discharge

MOSCOW — The Lewiston supplier of the foaming agent released into Paradise Creek by well drillers last week says the city of Moscow is to blame since its contract permitted waste discharge into the creek. "In the contract with the city they gave us permission to pump it into the storm sewer, into that waterway," Gerald Adcock of Adcock Air Drilling Services said Wednesday. "You make the assumption you won't be in violation because the city gave you the permission to do it." When subcontractor BJ Drilling of Spokane, Wash., hit an unexpected water table while drilling a city well last week, excess water was pumped into a storm drainage that runs into Paradise Creek. A toxic drilling fluid, water and sediment are believed to have caused a substantial fish kill in the creek.

Ligertown owners liable for cleanup

BOCATELLO — Bannock County spent \$44,400 to clean up the condemned Ligertown Farm in April and plans to assess that amount on the property owners' tax bill. A hearing will be scheduled to allow Dotti Martin and Robert Fieber to accept or protest the assessment. "It won't go on their taxes until after the hearing," said Terry Bailey, planning director. Fieber and Martin were convicted on 11 misdemeanor counts of cruelty to animals, creating a public nuisance and zoning violations at the compound near Lava Hot Springs.

Convicted wife killer seeks leniency

COEUR D'ALENE — Convicted wife killer Danny Ray Aeschliman, whose treatment during his first year behind bars prompted the state to begin rethinking policies for handling overcrowding, is again seeking leniency from his lengthy sentence. Aeschliman, 44, claims his court-appointed attorney was "disinterested and unenthusiastic" about his case and convinced to end his trial by entering a conditional plea so "the judge would go easier." He has asked 1st District Judge James Judd to vacate both his conviction and life prison sentence with no possibility of parole for the first 18 years. Judd has set Aug. 14 to consider the petition.

Conservationists allege salvage sale fraud

BOISE — Plenty of trees cut in Idaho salvage timber sales may appear to be green and healthy, yet they are dead from bark beetle attacks, the U.S. Forest Service contends. But the Idaho Sporting Congress charges the agency is illegally allowing loggers to cut viable "money trees" on the Boise and Payette national forests. "The Forest Service has come up with a new type of tree — green, dead trees," said Ron Mitchell of the Sporting Congress on Thursday. "They are cutting dead trees because they died after the chainsaws got to them."

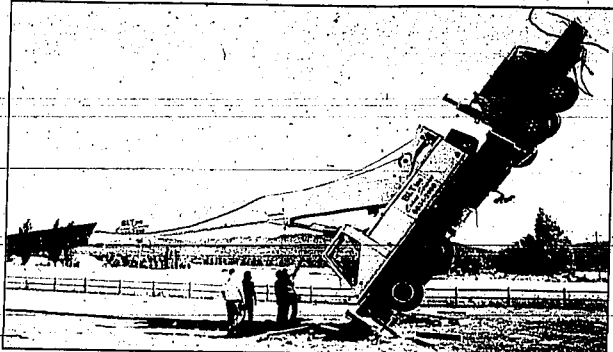
Williams calls educational plan critical

BOISE (AP) — Democratic congressional challenger Dan Williams endorsed a multibillion-dollar education initiative on Thursday that he called critical to maintaining good-paying jobs that keep America's standard of living high. "If we don't do this, I'm just afraid we're going to compete for a bunch of low-wage jobs around the world," Williams said in outlining his Education Empowerment agenda. At the plan's core are tuition tax credits and tax-free deductions from Individual Retirement Accounts to finance college, vocational and other skills training and on-site child care to make new educational opportunities more widely accessible. Williams wants to protect the existing federal student loan program from any financial reductions and believes federal education programs should be expanded for nontraditional older students and those needing skills training for new jobs or careers. He said existing distance learning and computer-linkup programs would play a major role in meeting education needs.

To pay for the program, Williams wants to plug a loophole that permits foreign trusts to evade U.S. taxes and end Puerto Rican tax breaks, primarily for pharmaceutical companies. He said that would generate \$20 billion in new cash over seven years. "There is nothing more important than we can do in creating new partnerships together than to ensure we have the most skilled, best educated work force in the world," he said. "We need to make sure we're giving our people the same chance to succeed that other nations are."

Williams, who faces freshman Republican Helen Chenoweth in November, did not discuss details of the planks in his agenda, acknowledging that there were a number of proposals in all the areas under review. He was confident some acceptable plan could be engineered. And he did not mention President Clinton's proposed financial incentives for education.

Transportation workers investigated

BOISE (AP) — Three Idaho Department of Transportation employees are under investigation for allegedly using state tax machines to campaign against proposed restrictions on bear hunting. Among them is Barry Gwin of Meridian, a regional coordinator with the Sportsman Heritage Defense Fund. The group is working to defeat a ballot initiative to curb bear hunting practices, including the use of hounds or bait. Earlier this week, three tax machines at various state Transportation Department offices in Boise were used to send four anti-bear initiative letters to The Idaho Sportsman's editorial page. They were signed by Gwin, a

staff engineer who works at the Transportation Department state headquarters, and two others. A fourth letter, faxed from the Transportation Department's district office, was signed by a Meridian man who is not a Transportation Department employee. It is not clear whether letters were faxed during working hours. Only one letter was sent before 7 a.m., when some Transportation shifts begin. Another was sent during the noon hour. Since the letters were faxed to a local phone number, the state is not out any money. But using state equipment for private business violates Transportation Department policy as well as

state personnel rules. Transportation spokesman Jeff Stratten said the offense is viewed as a serious matter.

EPA finds high, but not excessive, gas level

FRESTON (AP) — Federal testing has found excessive levels of gasoline concentration in soil near a Preston gasoline station, but officials indicated they remained well below levels that could pose a serious health hazard. Results from the Environmental Protection Agency tests, presented to the Preston Gasoline Task Force this week, showed a concentration of the chemicals in excess of 111,000 parts per billion just north and east of the V-1 Oil station. Other test borings found concentrations in excess of 10,000 parts per billion.

Doug Supernaw brings worldly country act to Jerome County Fair

JEROME — Country singer/songwriter Doug Supernaw has survived a broken neck, a car accident, a divorce, a record label change, the theft of his equipment and hospitalization for a serious illness. He sings about real life, from the heart.

Supernaw, who'll kick off the Jerome County Fair Tuesday night with two shows, has told reporters he's in a state of "petrified adolescence." Before a crowd of 65,000 at the Houston Livestock and Rodeo Show, he made his entrance descending on a guy wire from the roof of the Astrodome. During a Canadian show, he took a frontal swan dive into a mud pit in the crowd.

All the while, he never missed a note.

Supernaw made his Top 40 debut with "Honky Tonkin' Fool," a classic country song, with straight-ahead vocals played off a talk-show style. Then came two across-the-board hits: "Reno," which Supernaw wrote with the Texas band The Judds, and "I Don't Call Him Daddy," a heart-wrenching look at the relationship of a father and son separated by divorce and distance.

His "What'll You Do About Me," a darkly offbeat song about a rejected suitor, shot quickly into the Top 20.

Supernaw has been nominated for seven major awards, including the Academy of Country Music's New Male Vocalist of the Year in 1994.

Once an oil-rig worker, he started making his mark in Nashville

as a staff writer for a Music City publishing company. But he soon headed back to his native Texas to put together a country dance band.

He refers to himself as a "sophisticated redneck." His father is Oklahoma-based research scientist for Texaco and a classical music buff. His mother is an Illinois coal miner's daughter and lifelong country music fan.

Supernaw developed a love for golf on the home front, eventually winning a golf scholarship to the University of St. Thomas (Houston) and a tryout for the pro tour (he missed the final cut by one stroke).

He spent his college years writing songs and ended up leaving school to play with a band called The Occasions, along the South Atlantic coast.

Before long, he had landed a job promoting acts ranging from Willie Nelson to Reba McEntire, from Tom Jones to the Beastie Boys.

Today, he often plays benefit concerts for causes he believes in.

Chamber concerts start Sun Valley Symphony's summer season

SUN VALLEY — Ludwig von Beethoven was just about the hottest thing going in the early 1800s, but he thought Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart was the cat's pajamas.

Beethoven liked Mozart. "Magic Flute" so much that he wrote two variations on the melodies, both for cello and piano. That's what concertgoers will hear on Sunday at River Run Lodge in the first of three chamber music concerts to kick off the Sun Valley Symphony's 22th season, led by Alexander Nenashe.

The symphony season itself starts on Aug. 3, with a program of music by Mozart, Johann Strauss and Felix Mendelssohn.

In Sunday's first chamber concert, Beethoven's "Piano Trio in B-flat Major, Opus 11" will the "Magic Flute" variations, and Felix Mendelssohn's "Piano Trio in D Minor, Opus 49" winds up the one-hour program.

"This piano trio was written while Mendelssohn was enjoying monumental popularity. Maybe it was the giddiness of fame and popularity, or perhaps it, was just time, but Mendelssohn made this work much lighter and fun than his previous pieces, leading critics to brand his style as "diletto."

Pianos will shine in Tuesday's chamber offerings of Mozart and "Cesar" Franck. Mozart's "Piano Quartet in G Minor" was more complex and difficult than anything previously offered to the concert-going public, and Mozart's publisher told him to forget the other two they were going to publish if they were anything like the "Allegro."

For a history of musical history, Mozart went to another publisher and the "Andante" and "Rondo" were released to the public. These three pieces were a

shock to audiences who expected chamber music to be sociable and superficial, since they definitely were neither of those things.

Johannes Sebastian Bach's "Brandenburg Concerto No. 6 in B-flat Major" begins chamber concert No. 3 on Thursday. This three-movement piece is arranged for two violas and one cello by Edward Laut.

Peter Tchaikovsky sets the summer vacation mood with this offering of "Sextet in D Minor, Opus 70," "Souvenir de Florence." He loved Florence, and wrote the "Sextet" while on holiday there.

"I wrote it with the greatest enthusiasm and pleasure, without the smallest effort," Tchaikovsky wrote in a letter. He felt that "Sovvenir de Florence" reflected the happy times he spent in the city and regarded the piece as a landmark in his career.

The Edgar M. Bronfman chamber music series, named for the Segarm's heir who is a patron of the symphony, as well as the whole Sun Valley Summer Please see SYMPHONY, Page C2

Twin Falls artist shuns realism in paintings

TWIN FALLS — Artist and art teacher Carmen VanZante happened upon her brand of art by accident.

A friend of VanZante's asked for help in figuring out a type of watercolor she was reading about in a book, and they experimented together.

"It didn't work out the way the book said it should," explained VanZante, who will be showing her work in the annual Art in the Park Festival this weekend in City Park. "But that's where I got my inspiration. It worked out for me."

The best way to describe VanZante's art is semi-abstract. She'll spill colored ink onto the paper and let it dry. A picture will emerge, which she enhances using pastel pencils, watercolors, or whatever other tool "I need to get the job done."

"This sounds really spacy, but this is what I tell people," she said. "The picture tells me what to do. I'm really good at following directions."

A lot of experimentation has gone into VanZante's art work, from the types of paper she uses to the type and texture of ink.

Mostly it's rice paper and sometimes watercolor paper because of the effect she gets with it. She says other kinds of paper simply doesn't give her the results she needs.

Sometimes, she makes her own ink.

"There are all kinds of ink, but I like the carbon ink because it's not dangerous to my health," she explained. The black ink is the only carbon ink, whereas the colored ink contains ingredients which can kill if it's improperly used.

VanZante prides herself on using her head and never having had an accident when using these potentially harmful substances in her studio. She is trying to pass that on to her students.

"The first thing I do (for new students) is give a three-hour lecture on the 'thou-shalt-nots' and

'thou-shalts,' on how to be careful with this stuff. I'm a real stickler about safety," VanZante said. VanZante prefers to teach students who already have a background in the basics of art, so that they can begin painting an original work out of the head or the heart. She stays away from what she calls "reproductionism."

"I used to do realism-type

painting, or what I call formula painting... (and) there are rules you don't break," VanZante said. "I found it very boring."

VanZante wants her students — and herself — to keep exploring different areas of art. She believes that the artist who doesn't change his work or doesn't explore any farther, has lost the vision and adventure of art.

Art festival set

The annual Art in the Park Festival will be held today, Saturday and Sunday in City Park. Hours are from 2 p.m. until 8 p.m. today, from 10 a.m. to 8 a.m. on Saturday, and from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Sunday.

And adventuring is what VanZante loves. She says that when she's working on a project, she'll pull out the full palette of colors, and then turn on some music... loud.

"I've always been into music," she explained. "It's almost as important as art."

The music is to help her block out the world and create a mood for the piece of work. The music may range anywhere from classical to heavy metal, although she loves to listen to "teen-age" music.

"But no country-western, no blues, and no jazz," VanZante said. It's a personal thing.

VanZante's personal life isn't totally consumed by her artwork, although it does creep into other areas.

For nearly 18 years she's worked for Leslie R. Jones Inc., a Twin Falls custom farming business. There are quite a few of her pieces hanging in the office, and her employers have been some of her greatest supporters.

"They've used me for wedding gifts and birthdays," she explained.

Although VanZante, a mostly self-taught artist, has been working on art for 20 years, it wasn't until four years ago, after her husband's death, that she cleared out her front room and made a studio and teaching area in her home.

"I'm thinking seriously of submitting my work to various galleries," she said. She's creating a portfolio of her work, including having slides made of her work. "Just to see if anyone bites."

Most of VanZante's artistic exposure has been in shows around the state, including Boise, Shoshone, Jerome, Burley, Buhl and Twin Falls.

□ "Georgia" (R) — This movie will leave a lump in your throat. This fierce, juicy peach of an independent film, so nuanced and uncompromised, is honest in a way that Hollywood can't seem to allow.

The tale of two singing sisters finally bursts with palpable, pulpy real life. It's crafted by a writer with a feel for family ripplers (Barbara Turner) and performed by actors cast for their ability, not looks or box-office sex appeal (Jennifer

Jason Leigh, who is Turner's daughter, and Mare Winningham).

Like the relationship between the hooker and drunk in "Leaving Las Vegas," the going-on-between-fetid wannabe grunge-punk Sadie and cool folk-rock superstar Georgia aren't always easy to watch. You may want to turn away, but you won't be able to. It's worth every raw, painful minute.

Georgia (Winningham) is the serene, zoned-off idol of adoring fans on the stadium circuit. Between tours, she deters herself with husband Jake (Ted Levine) and their kids in the old farmhouse where she

and Sadie grew up.

Georgia is everything her younger sister Sadie (Leigh) strains to be — gifted, successful, revered. She can't help commenting on Sadie's meager talent. Yet she's always there, holding the net for her sibling's periodic free-falls off the fast track.

What a pleasure to watch a daring young artist in a role tailor-made for her talent. As the sister with marginal talent but maximum drive, Leigh is like a burning taper with a raw, exposed nerve for a wick. (Dallas Morning News) (Hustings, Video West, Blockbuster)

□ "Two Bits" (PG-13) — Those who lived through the long blues song that was the Great Depression can't forget it — the sidewalk soup kitchens, shantytowns and hollow-eyed men at the door.

"Two Bits" tries to bring back that feeling of quiet desperation; bleak streets and dead ponds befogged by sharing the same leaky boat.



'Yellow Dog': The getting of wisdom

Book review

Bill Clinton is a big Walter Mosley fan. Most likely the elements of Mosley's work the president enjoys are the same ones that have earned the writer a wide acclaim and a growing audience: an engaging prose style, a deft eye and ear for an era and the wonderfully appealing personality he's created in Easy Rawlins.

Compared to the hurdles Rawlins must leap, a task such as balancing the federal budget doesn't seem pretty straightforward. Easy (short for Ezekiel) is a black man in America in the tense years leading up to the civil rights movement. That same devil in a Blue Dress, began with Easy just out of the service after World War II. It was made last year into a fine movie with an even finer Denzel Washington.

As "A Little Yellow Dog" opens, it's 1963. Easy is doing something unusual and something usual — he's working a real job supervising a junior high school custodial staff. He also thrashing around on a desk with Mrs. Idabelle Turner, a teacher. Some things change; some don't. You can see where Easy gets his nickname.

A dead man turns up on the school's property the same day, and the teacher vanishes. Easy is stuck with Pharoah, Idabelle's extremely nasty dog. And he's a suspect in the killing. So he must again hit the streets he was happy to leave, looking for answers in places a junior high school custodian staff has also thrashing around on a desk with Mrs. Idabelle Turner, a teacher. Some things change; some don't. You can see where Easy gets his nickname.

does not trust anyone white, and with good reason. After being led through the bowels of a subterranean jail, a not-so-subtle intimidation by police, Easy ruminates:

"Just thirty or so men living in cages underground. Like livestock waiting for some further shame to be laid on them. Like sharecroppers or slaves living in stinks on the edge of a plantation.

"There was evil in that room, and on that plantation, too. Because, as I knew too well, if you're punished long enough, you become guilty of all charges brought against you."

Mosley captures the period's hope and hopelessness so well, putting the story through black Los Angeles, a city that had drawn many dreaming of better lives. In the 1950s, the trim and friendly old neighborhoods and smoky jazz bars, rendered lovingly by Mosley, had been havens from poverty and lynchings back home in Texas or elsewhere.

By 1963, though, things are in decline, old haunts shuttered. Kids are starting to snuff glue on the school grounds. Intolerance keeps permeating the new west. But John F. Kennedy is in office, and change is in the air. Will things get better or worse? The blues aren't so blue.

Mosley offers a shocking symbol of the shifting climate — Raymond "Mouse" Alexander has gone legit.

Mouse, who's killed more men than anybody can count, now works as one of Easy's janitors. His transformation from gun-wielding lunatic to law-abiding citizen is surprising and a little hard to believe, but Mosley gives him good reasons for turning over a new leaf. If Mouse can be reformed, Mosley seems to say, then so perhaps can humanity.

"A Little Yellow Dog" has murder, intrigue, sex, a fine historical perspective and a dash of wisdom — exactly what we've come to expect from Walter Mosley.

Best of the best: Lit's must-read volumes

What titles would you consider classics?

"Camus and Copote," "Froust and Price," "Finchert and Fitzgerald," "Silent Spring" and "Charlotte's Web," "The Sound and the Fury" and "The Meaning of Relativity," "Anna Karenina" and "Mein Kampf."

If you had to pick the books that helped shape and define the past century or so — or the books that everyone should read before they die — what would you come up with?

An intriguing question, spurred on by a slim volume called "Books of the Century" (Oxford University Press, \$14.95), published in conjunction with an exhibit at the New York Public Library celebrating its 200th anniversary. The library asked its librarians to list books that had a "significant influence, consequence or resonance" during the period 1895 to 1995. More than 3,100 titles were submitted; from them, organizers settled on 159.

Two of the most frequently nominated books, editor Elizabeth Defendorf notes in her introduction, were Upton Sinclair's landmark expose of the meatpacking industry, "The Jungle," and Sigmund Freud's classic "The Interpretation of Dreams."

Others have been grouped into imaginative classifications including "Protest & Progress" (W.E.B. Du Bois' "The Souls of Black Folk," John Steinbeck's "The Grapes of Wrath," Lincoln Steffens' "The Autobiography of Lincoln Steffens"), "Popular Culture & Mass Entertainment" (Bram Stoker's "Dracula," Nathaniel West's "The Day of the Locust," Stephen King's "Carrie"), and "Landmarks of Modern Literature" (Marcel

Proust's "Remembrance of Things Past," Franz Kafka's "The Metamorphosis," Virginia Woolf's "To the Lighthouse").

You could quarrel all day about what isn't included. But it's hard to deny that most of the books you readily think of as modern classics are here: James Joyce's "Ulysses," Anne Frank's "The Diary of a Young Girl," Harper Lee's "To Kill a Mockingbird," Jean-Paul Sartre's "Being and Nothingness," John Kenneth Galbraith's "The Affluent Society."

There are surprises, too. Who'd have thought to include Dile Carnegie's "How to Win Friends and Influence People," for example, or Ina S. Rombauer's "The Joy of Cooking," Emily Post's "Etiquette," Benjamin Spock's "The Common Sense Book of Baby and Child Care"? No doubt about it, however; they've all been influential — as have such children's classics as Margaret Wise Brown's "Goodnight, Moon" and Beatrix Potter's "The Tale of Peter Rabbit."

Among the poets represented are Elizabeth Bishop, T.S. Eliot and William Butler Yeats. Playwrights, too, show up: Anton Chekhov, Luigi Pirandello and Samuel Beckett among them.

And if you haven't read enough titles so far, here are more that "Books of the Century" notes: Ralph Ellison's "Invisible Man," Elizabeth Kubler-Ross' "Death and Dying," Winston Churchill's "The Gathering Storm," E.M. Forster's "A Passage to India," Thomas Mann's "The Magic Mountain," Helen Keller's "The Story of My Life," John Dos Passos' "U.S.A.," Simone de Beauvoir's "The Second Sex," Thorstein Veblen's "The Theory of the Leisure Class."

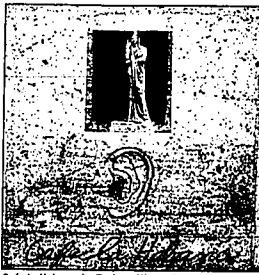

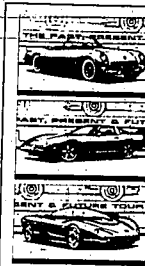
DEAR ELADNE: The piece was titled "A Fable of Immortality," by Henry Van Dyke. Not only have I

Hayden - on the spot

Folk-punk singing sensation Hayden would rather you not know about the major record label bidding war that broke out for his talents. The 25-year-old artist from Toronto, labeled the spiritual son of Tom Waits and Neil Young, also would prefer you didn't know that it resulted in a reported \$1 million-dollar deal that afforded him maximum creative freedom. He's afraid of a media backlash before he's had time to even enjoy the cash.

The result of this frenzy is "Everything I Long For," released by a new Geffen Records division called Outpost.

Q. Your songs tend to be about simple things, like taking a rose to a woman and having all the petals blow off, or calling in sick to work so you can spend the day with your lover. Where do you find inspiration?
A. It's a simple guy. I don't do it on purpose. It's just things that happen to me or things that I think about. And often they are like little things that some people look over in life but every little thing is kind of important. It's always been someone who, if something weird, rasing happens to me, I usually talk about it. Whereas with some people, that would be the furthest thing they would do to think about in their songs.

Q. What was it like being in the middle of a major-label bidding war?
A. Um, the truth is, it's really hard for... It's not such a good idea for me to talk about that whole thing. There's a problem with you, you know if there's much written about what went on. It's always been a fear of mine that people will say "We've heard about how many of these labels wanted Hayden, and they will get my CD and expect it to be loveable. And if it's not the best thing they've ever heard, they are going to say it sucks... I know when I hear that an artist got a lot of attention, I'd be the first one to say "not interested" because everyone likes to discover their own thing."

Q. You had tried to get a deal a year before and no one was interested. What happened during that year?
A. I changed my sound. I started wearing cords and fancy '50s shirts and people came flocking to see me. It's amazing what clothes will do.

Q. Why do you use only your first name? You pulling a Cher or a Madonna?
A. I entered a radio station contest and only brands were allowed to enter. So because I was just a solo person, I wrote Hayden on the entry form because it didn't sound like a solo artist. They would not really know. Then I got on the CD and they had to use that name and I started getting shows based on the song getting played on the radio... I never really would have intentionally named myself something. That's sort of a weird thing. I would understand when people hear my name that they might say that's kind of goofy. But it honestly happened there.

Manic Panic attack: Hair today, green tomorrow

NEW YORK (AP) — Forget those subtle shades of flaxen blond, copper red, and warm chestnut that Linda Evangelista would have you believe are all the rage in hair coloring...
"Truly hip hair this summer is asserting itself in shades more commonly associated with artificial candy and kitsch '70s poster art."

The hair dye du jour? It's called Manic Panic and it comes in shades of "atomic turquoise," "cotton candy," "shocking blue," and "electric sunshine." (Black light optional.)

Dennis Rodman, Manic Panic's unofficial poster child, has strutted in locks of apple green and shocking red (the "rock it red" perhaps), and since has graduated to more elaborate rainbows and even a red AIDS ribbon against a white background.

But Rodman is barely alone. Manic Panic has graced the heads of Green Day's Billy Joe Armstrong, Porno for Pyros and Lollapalooza founder Perry Farrell, Weiland of the Stone Temple Pilots and Mike D of the Beastie Boys. Cyndi Lauper was an early Manic Panic, and models Rachel Williams and Jenny Shimizu and actresses Nicole Slye and Lori Petty also have been spotted. The ever-whimsical designer Todd Oldham has gone green himself.

It's inevitable that Cher, a woman hardly known for cosmetic restraint, has taken to the

Manic Panic bottle, too. But celebrated heads aren't the

only ones... turning heads. From New York City's Soho to Los Angeles' Melrose Avenue and points in between, the daring and probably non-corporately employed have taken Manic Panic's pigments to heart.

At only \$8 a bottle and with an array of 32 shades available, dyeing possibilities abound. Some of the more creative are creating bilveles of white hair on top with

brightly colored ends. "Deep, rich purple reds, I think, will be the big colors this year," says Victoria Gentry, an image consultant on the road with the Lollapalooza tour. (An image consultant at Lollapalooza? Who knew?)

"Hair color is rather limited," says Manic Panic's co-owner Tish Bellomo. "It's anywhere between black and blond, and that's pretty boring."

Manic Panic has its roots, so to speak, in punk. Way back in the mid-1970s, Bellomo and her partner, sister, Snooky, were singing backup for Blondie when the band was just another unsigned group playing CBGBs.

It was a time so devoid of hair coloring alternatives that lead-singer Debbie Harry was using mere food coloring on her bleached-out tresses. Like good entrepreneurs, the Bellomos sensed a need and stepped in to fill the void by importing Manic Panic from England. They since have gone on to

become something of the Mary Quarts of New York's East Village. Their motto? "Live fast and dye your hair."

"In the olden days of punk rock," Snooky Bellomo says, "it was kind of a shock value thing, but now I think it's more just a cosmetic thing."

So just what's it like to walk down the street with a mane of, say, cotton candy pink?

"Everyone loves pink," says Lisa Cullen, a hairstylist and colorist at John DeLuca's in Soho who sports a pale pink hue that indeed looks remarkably like spun-sugar. "It's kind of like doll hair. Kids look at me like some sort of magic little dolly goddess." "Little kids freak out and point and stare and think you're, like, a cartoon character," says Conn Brattain, a spokesman at Todd Oldham who has turquoise hair. "I get lots of people who just give you weird, dirty looks. Then I get people who come up to me and tell me it's incredibly beautiful. They are glad somebody does it and it's happy looking."

But, dapper beware, Brattain also recounts true Manic Panic pain: "The shocking part was putting the blue color on my hair, rinsing it off under sink and then looking up and there was blue hair! And you're like, 'Oh my God! I can't leave the house like this!'"

U.S. baseball tea pounds Japan, sets home-run record

ATLANTA (AP) — Capsules of Thursday's events at the Summer Olympics:

BASEBALL

In the same stadium where Hank Aaron became baseball's home-run king, the U.S. team set a new standard for Olympic homers in a 15-5 rout of Japan. The young Americans, join Cuba as the only unbeaten teams in the tournament.

BASKETBALL (WOMEN)

The U.S. women's basketball team rolled to its third straight impressive victory of the Summer Games on Thursday, a 107-47 thumping of Zaire. Russia handed Italy its first loss, 75-70; South Korea upset Ukraine 72-57; Australia defeated Cuba 75-63; and Brazil routed Japan 100-80.

BEACH VOLLEYBALL (MEN)

Americans Karch Kiraly and Kent Steffes advanced with a 15-5 victory over Germany's Jorg Ahmann and Axel Hager. On Friday, the Americans will meet Smith Smith and Carl Henkel of the United States, who defeated Francisco Alvarez and Juan Miguel Rosell 15-13 of Cuba.

BEACH VOLLEYBALL (WOMEN)

Two of the three U.S. women's pairs lost, and one was eliminated. Gail Castro and Deb Richardson fell 15-11 to Japan's Sachiko Fujita and Yukiko Takahashi, their second loss in two days.

BOXING

Welterweight Fernando Vargas of the United States lost a controversial decision to Romania's Mani Simon. Vargas stood in disbelief as Simon was declared a winner 8-7 in a fight that saw Vargas get no points in the second round.

Andrea Collinelli of Italy beat France's Philippe Ermenault for the gold in men's individual pursuit in 4 minutes, 20.893 seconds. Americans Bill Clay and Connie Paraskevich-Young, a five-time Olympian, lost in second-round repechage sprints.

EQUESTRIAN

New Zealanders Blyth Tait and Sally Clark were 1-2 after the individual endurance phase of the three-day event, with U.S. rider Kieran Clarke and teammate David O'Connor fifth.

FENCING

A first-round 4-5 loss to Poland knocked the U.S. women's foil team out of medal contention and the Americans finished next-to-last, winning only four of the final 11 points. The U.S. men's foil team fared no better. Like the women, they finished 10th in an 11-team Olympic field.

FIELD HOCKEY

The U.S. women's team protested its 2-1 defeat to Argentina because of a dispute over the time remaining when the Americans had their final scoring chance.

JUDO

Germany's Udo Quallnals won the men's under-143 pound class and France's Marie-Claire Restoux took the under-114-pound club medal.

Johnson, Godina on double pursuit

ATLANTA (AP) — Michael Johnson isn't the only American beginning a rare Olympic double on Friday. John Godina, performing an unusual marriage of shot put to discus, tries to become the first man to win both in the Olympics since L. Clarence "Bud" Houser in 1924.

"I don't know why so few people have done it," said Godina, the first U.S. male athlete to even qualify in both events since Houser.

Grinning, he added: "It must be a little harder than I think."

Godina competes in the shot put on Friday, while Johnson begins his bid to make Olympic history in the 400 meters as track and field competition begins. The 400 finals are Monday, while the 200 meters, pushed back to accommodate Johnson, start July 31.

Godina once made joking reference to not requesting a schedule change, a la Johnson, but the schedule actually is a good fit for his bid.

The shot put Friday is his better event, and throwing the 16-pound ball requires a let-it-hang-out approach that will make it easier to overcome any first-time Olympic jitters.

"The shot put is pure power, you just turn it loose," he said. "You have to be a lot more hype

Cuba hands U.S. team 1st loss

ATLANTA (AP) — Bryan Ivie's spike attempt hit the net out-of-bounds marker on match point in the fifth-set tiebreaker and the U.S. men's Olympic volleyball team lost to rival Cuba on Thursday night.

The high-flying Cubans (3-0) came on after being routed in the first set to win 4-15, 15-9, 14-16, 15-8; 18-16 and remain the only unbeaten team in Pool A. Team USA (2-1) hadn't lost a set in its first two matches.

It was a rematch of the 1992 Bronze-medal contest, which was won by the United States.

The fifth set used rally scoring, in which a point is scored on every serve. The Americans held off one match point by the Cubans and Ivie was serving for the win at 16-15, but Osvaldo Hernandez spiked the ball for the 11th tie in the set.

Passing league is summer rite of passage

EDEN — The sounds of summer usually include the splash of pool water, the crack of the bar and the laugh of children enjoying vacation from school.
But once or twice a week, Magic Valley high school football teams can be seen — and heard — working on their aerial attacks. It’s known simply as passing league, and it works a lot like summer league basketball, third-year Kimberly Coach Kirby Bright said.
“You want to get a head start,” said Bright last Tuesday night as a handful of his Bulldogs along with players from Twin Falls, Filer, Wendell and Valley converged on the Viking field for another

session. “You want to see which kids will be dependable and responsible and do the job in that position.”

“We practice both offense and defense. The score isn’t really what’s important. You put in your basic pass offense and defense so you don’t have to spend a lot of time on it during two-a-days.”

Practice for fall high school sports starts officially Aug. 19, and most area teams play their first games Aug. 29 or Aug. 30.

Passing league games most closely resemble touch football. The guidelines include:
• Sporting the ball on the 40-yard line.
• Eight plays on offense, regardless of the outcome of each play. So feebly, a team could score eight touchdowns per possession.

Student becomes teacher

Teen-ager Bennett grabs gold from 800-meter legend Evans

ATLANTA — Brooke Bennett stood where Janet Evans did eight years ago — an American teen on a gold medal podium.
Bennett had just won the 800-meter freestyle, the race Evans dominated for a decade. Yet the 16-year-old knows one gold medal isn’t enough to replace a legend.
“Even 20 years down the road, every-

body’s going to remember Janet,” Bennett said Thursday night. “I think Janet’s always going to be the queen of distance swimming.”
Evans, who finished a poor sixth, now has four Olympic gold medals, three world records and no more races.
“I’m 24 and an ex-swimmer,” she proclaimed, following through on her plans to retire after the Atlanta Games. “Ten years is a long career for a distance swimmer. I leave with a smile on my face.”
Alexander Popov confirmed his supremacy as the world’s greatest sprinter. He beat Gary Hall Jr. of Phoenix in the 50 freestyle, giving him gold medals in the 50 and 100 freestyles in consecutive Olympics.
And Hungary had a big night as Krisztina

Egerszegi won her third straight Olympic 200 backstroke, and Attila Czeine pulled an upset in the 200 individual medley.
Egerszegi became the first swimmer in Olympic history to win five individual gold medals. She won a gold in 1988 and was triple gold winner at Barcelona.
The United States won its 10th swimming gold of the games when the women’s 800 freestyle team made it 5-for-5 for the country in relays in the final race of the night. America can sweep the relays by winning the men’s 400 medley on Friday, the final night of competition.

Evans took Seoul by storm as a 17-year-old at the 1988 Summer Games. She won the 400 and 800 freestyles and 400 IM. In 1992, she repeated in the 800 but finished second in the 400 freestyle, her first loss in that event in six years.

TWIN FALLS — As American swimmers chase the gold in Atlanta, Idaho’s best will make some waves of their own, starting today at the Snake-River Championships.
The Twin Falls Community Swimming Pool will host swimmers from Boise, Pocatello, Blackfoot and other surrounding areas today, Saturday and Sunday.
Swimmers ranging from ages 7 to 23 will compete for individual and team titles.
Twin Falls Head Coach John Twiss will lead 35 swimmers into battle with three specific goals guiding their strokes.
“We always have the same three goals. The first is personal improvement meaning we want to be the best

team,” says Twiss. “Then we work on team spirit and finally sportsmanship to help us reach new levels of excellence.”
“As swimming touches new heights, Twiss feels Twin Falls is becoming a springboard for the sport.
“Swimming is on the move in Twin Falls. There is fundraising going on to cover the pool and if that happens, I think swimming will explode here,” says Twiss.

Dreams of Olympic glory and the noble pursuit of a gold medal also sparks an interest in potential swimmers.
“I’ve coached for ten years and every time the Olympics comes around, in the fall, our team numbers always grow,” says Twiss.
The United States dominates the water because parents provide a special perspective and support.
“It’s funny because these other countries in the Olympics have huge training centers where they send their swimmers,” explains Twiss. “But U.S. swimmers are homegrown and it’s the parents who make it happen.”
Twiss says the case is no different in Twin Falls where parents and volunteers are responsible for the resurgence of swimming.
The one setback challenging Twiss is the heavy emphasis on traditional team sports in the high schools.

“It’s disappointing because there is peer pressure for kids to play basketball and football. Plus swimming is a difficult sport,” says Twiss.
However, the sacrifices swimming requires leads to rewards even greater than medals and world records.
“There are just aillions of benefits. First and foremost, swimming is a life-preserving sport,” explains Twiss. “It teaches kids how to manage their time and the value of self-discipline.”
Twin Falls will be able to put all the hours of practice to work as they test their strokes against some of Idaho’s finest swimmers.
“There is a broad spectrum of competition from novice to college. There are even kids competing who have been to the ‘A’ Nationals,” says Twiss.

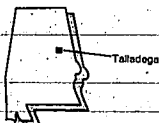

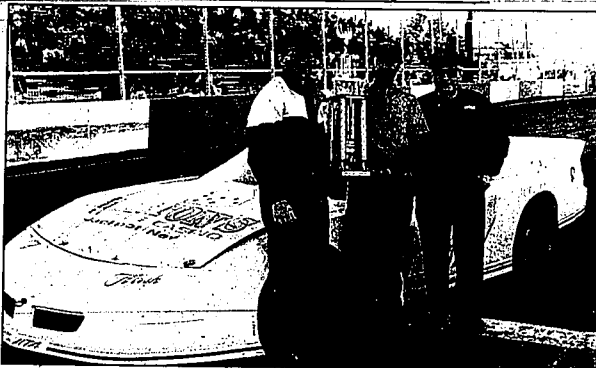

Hold that tie: Use common sense to dress for interviews

Casual dress at work may be in, but the job candidate who showed up for an interview at Hewlett-Packard Co. wearing cut-off jeans with ragged edges and a sheer tank top went too far.

"Needless to say, she didn't get the job," said Elaine Yamani, a staffing representative at H-P, who interviewed the woman for an engineering position. "I wasn't really expecting someone to be dressed like she was. She even surprised me by other engineers."

The rush to casual dress at Silicon Valley companies has gone far from simple for a lot of employees. Even more confused are career managers and consultants, who know that common sense dictates they pull out their suits, yet conversation reveals engineers running around in shorts and sandals and executives dressed in khakis.

Career counselors, corporate hiring managers and fashion consultants agree that determining what to wear to a job interview is no simple task. You must take into consideration such variables as the position you're applying for, the culture of the company, even your own physical appearance and personality.

And no matter whether you decide to wear a striped or solid tie or a navy dress or gray suit to the interview, there's one piece of hokey-but-true advice that applies to all job applicants:

"Make sure you wear a smile," Penner said.

Executives balancing career with family

Companies willing to accommodate men, women who want active personal life

Though federal and state anti-discrimination laws protect job candidates from answering questions about family responsibilities before the actual employment offer, an executive recruiter finds that executives who are in their 30s are not reluctant to bring up the subject themselves.

"Until recently, many professionals avoided talking about their families during a job interview, fearing it would weaken their position when compared with other candidates," said Lynn K. Cherney, partner of Cherney & Associates, an executive search firm headquartered in Brookfield.

But today, Cherney is stating upfront that they expect to balance their careers with a meaningful personal life.

The trend includes women and men. And that's why companies are more willing to consider flexible work schedules in order to retain qualified employees.

Even in the face of downsizing and mergers, Cherney says "companies would be shortsighted" to ignore this real need of future executives.

And of all present employees, "What the doctor ordered. In reply to a recent column I wrote

about the growing need nationwide for family physicians, a doctor wrote about her efforts to promote the idea of family medicine reaches the high school and college students who are thinking about going to medical school, the physician wrote. "Family medicine is a great specialty."

"She adds: 'We're seeing more interest in family medicine among some medical students, but it's not even close to the attention where it should be. Your column gave me hope for the future.'"

—Don't be negative. A sense of injustice, of unfairness, is the most common cause of workplace negativity, "a contagious disease that cripples employee morale and bleeds profits," says Dr. Sheila Ruth, a professor at Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville.

Ruth, who specializes in managing negative behavior in the workplace, reports that at some work sites, "you can feel the negativity crackling in the walls."

The results often are an increase in employee mistakes, accidents, absenteeism, theft, high turnover, low morale and angry customers — not a pretty picture.

Though a negative workplace is management's problem, there are some things employees can do to combat its toxic effects, according to Ruth:

1. Decide if you want to continue working there.

2. Keep away from employees who constantly complain.

3. Don't let the negativity become a part of your personality.

4. Don't feed the rumor mill.

5. Resist the temptation to let the negativity spill over to your private life.

And be proactive in encouraging your company to clean up some of the toxic aspects of work that pollute the air at the office or plant.

—Fighting back. A recently "hired-off, outsourced and downsized" worker who has been unsuccessfully job hunting for a year, believes he lost his job and can't find a new one because of age discrimination — even

though he is "only 48 years young."

The job seeker carefully reviews corporate annual reports and notices that when it comes to boards of directors, age discrimination seems to be skewed in the opposite direction: From their pictures, he says, directors appear to be over 50 years of age.

He also thinks it's time for the job-slashing directors to get a taste of his own medicine.

That's why he suggests these changes, to be instituted by shareholders with voting stock:

1. Hire new directors who are younger and less experienced.

2. Clarify the board openings as "entry-level" positions.

3. Hire new directors at lower pay than the high fees some now get for their services.

4. "Take it or leave it and go elsewhere," which is what employees and job seekers are told.

5. "Vote against pay raises for the company's higher dividends for shareholders," he concludes.

Another result: a sense of satisfaction for employees who are downsized and new levels of high earnings by their corporations and unparalleled high compensation for their boards of directors and top executives.

—Coach's Tip. Revenge may taste sweet, but when you leave a job, no matter how tempting it may be to do so, leave behind no burning bridges.

increase in employee mistakes, accidents, absenteeism, theft, high turnover, low morale and angry customers — not a pretty picture.

Though a negative workplace is management's problem, there are some things employees can do to combat its toxic effects, according to Ruth:

1. Decide if you want to continue working there.

2. Keep away from employees who constantly complain.

3. Don't let the negativity become a part of your personality.

4. Don't feed the rumor mill.

5. Resist the temptation to let the negativity spill over to your private life.

And be proactive in encouraging your company to clean up some of the toxic aspects of work that pollute the air at the office or plant.

The job seeker carefully reviews corporate annual reports and notices that when it comes to boards of directors, age discrimination seems to be skewed in the opposite direction: From their pictures, he says, directors appear to be over 50 years of age.

He also thinks it's time for the job-slashing directors to get a taste of his own medicine.

That's why he suggests these changes, to be instituted by shareholders with voting stock:

1. Hire new directors who are younger and less experienced.

2. Clarify the board openings as "entry-level" positions.

I pursued in a field of study I was interested in college and back one year ago. I found a few financial aid sources. Then it asked more detailed questions, promising to send a brochure "outlining its services."

That's a sure sign that there was more available for a price. Some of the software on the market could be just as valuable.

CollegeEdge Personal Edition (\$499) is the best of a bunch of titles I reviewed, but it's impossible to find in stores. You can order it by calling (415) 778-6262.

Average rate for 30-year mortgages drops to 8.19 percent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thirty-year fixed rate mortgages averaged 8.19 percent this week, down from 8.23 percent last week, the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. said in a national survey.

It was the lowest since June 3, when rates averaged 8.14 percent.

Rates rose to 8.42 percent during the week ended July 11, highest since they averaged

8.62 percent in early March 1995.

On one-year adjustable rate mortgages, lenders were asking an average initial rate of 6.0 percent, up from 5.97 percent last week.

Fifteen-year mortgages, a popular option for those refinancing mortgages, averaged 7.71 percent this week, down from 7.76 percent a week earlier.

The rates do not include add-on fees known as points.

Q: Isn't Meredith MacRae heartbroken to learn that her new husband was caught with a series of notorious Hollywood hookers? — M.R.

Q: What's Meryl Streep up to these days? I get the feeling her career has hit the skids now that she's doing a television movie of the week, quite a comedown for a two-time Oscar winner. — M.G.

A: It's true that Streep, 47, is set to appear in a movie of the week titled "First Do No Harm," scheduled to air on ABC next season. It's described as a docudrama, with Meryl playing the mother of a boy with severe epilepsy. This fact, combined with the actress's narration of an 11-minute orientation movie being shown at the American Museum of Natural History in conjunction with its new exhibit featuring two new dinosaur halls, has given rise to rumors of career problems.

Streep's narration of the museum's film was a generous gesture on her part, for which she was paid either scale or received an honorarium.

Nevertheless, parts for middle-aged actresses,

even great ones like Streep, are hard to come by, a fact that she readily acknowledges.

Q: We hear that Bruce Willis, of all people, is a die-hard Republican who harbors a personal dislike of President Clinton. Since Hollywood usually votes Democrat, can that be true? — G.S.

A: Bruce, 41, has accumulated a great deal of wealth, thanks to his hit "Die Hard" flicks and myriad business investments including a stake in the Planet Hollywood restaurant chain. His wife, Demi Moore, is also no slouch in the money-making department. Perhaps that's why he has a keen appreciation of Republican tax-cutting proposals. He favors the flat-tax idea floated by Steve Forbes in the Republican primary.

A: Leigh, coming in her latest tour de force as a woman in a telephone operator-turned-kidnapper in Robert Altman's "Kansas City," is seeking broader roles. Though she is a past master at playing troubled women, Leigh confides as she would love to do comedy! And I think she'd be really great. She's an actress — not a weirdo.

Dahl finds emotion in character a plus

Darlene Dahl, who plays Anita Santos on "All My Children," says that while she can feel some sympathy for her character because of all the pain she's been experiencing the summer "For me — as an actor — it's been wonderful. I've been getting a lot of emotional stuff to work with.

"When I first started," Darlene says, "there really wasn't that much for me to work with. For an actor, that can be a little frustrating. But now that they're really writing amazing stuff for me, it's a challenge. And I love it." "And," Dahl added, "it's easy for me to guess, because, I'm emotionally available."

Which means, exactly? "Which means," Darlene said, "that unlike people who are more in control of their emotions, I'm able to open up in front of the camera pretty quickly."

In other words, when the script calls for anything from angst on through the emotional gamut...

"I can have it ready to go when the cameras roll."

Actors who share this dramatic gift with Darlene say it's a mixed blessing; while it's great to be able to react to what a script calls for quickly, it can also make some time to shed the emotion after the scene ends.

"That's not a problem for me," Darlene said. "I give what I have to give before the camera. I don't take it home with me."

Darlene Dahl's emotional repertoire has been getting a great workout these days because Anita Santos' heart has been raked over the coals as if it were the centerpiece of the Pine Valley Fourth of July barbecue. She had fallen for Bobby Warner (Brian

Gaskill). And even though she knows it would hurt her family — Papa Hector Santos doesn't like Bobby — she would have married him. But now that she's discovered he's the father of Kelsey Jefferson's (T.C. Warner) baby, everything changed.

As Darlene says, "Anita is in a great deal of pain. She feels she's been open with Bobby and she's hurt that he, obviously, hasn't been as honest as he could have been."

One of the questions young acting hopefuls ask is, how important is training? Why not just let one's raw talent loose on the set and allow things to happen spontaneously?

"You can do that, of course," says Darlene. "But I wouldn't recommend it. It's like a pianist who may have been born with a wonderful gift to play the piano without ever taking lessons. But that's all he'll ever be able to do. Unless he studies and practices, he'll never grow as an artist."

"Training for an actor is like that: Your body is your instrument, and unless you learn how to use your voice properly, and how to move, and how to find your strengths as an actor, you'll never know how far you could take your natural talent."

Elizabeth Vargas: Getting along on 'Good Morning America'

NEW YORK (AP) — Since joining ABC's "Good Morning America" two months ago, Elizabeth Vargas has dutifully recited headlines on the half-hour.

She also has interviewed the new prime minister of Israel and profited Tony Award-winning choreographer or Savion Glover.

She has even been bitten by a toucan.

On the arm, but more importantly, on live TV, where you have to keep going and keep the explosives to yourself.

Ironically, Vargas was plucked in hair's way from that animal segment during a few days' subbing for Charlie Gibson and sharing the anchor couch with Gibson's co-host, Joan Lunden.

At least, that's the gist from the gossip mill as barked up by the press — that, once on board as "GMA's" news anchor, Vargas will swiftly unseat 20-year fixture Lunden.

Published speculation got an early launch last spring in the National Enquirer, then, courtesy of Newsweek, received a boost in June from ABC News President Rone Arledge's tentative forecast that Vargas "could very well turn out" to be Lunden's heir apparent.

Then, a couple of weeks ago, TV Guide took the matter over the top with an article headlined

"Snowdown at Sun-
In sum, it would be no surprise if that toucan's attack reminded Vargas of the pecking inflicted by her journalistic colleagues. Meanwhile, she in-

sists the press' doomed-Joan scenario is for the birds.

"I was hired to do one job, that's it," she says of what must be "No guarantees, no promises."

If (ABC bosses) have bigger things in store for me, that would be great.

But it's not going to happen for a while. And she repeatedly underscores another point.

"Nobody has been more gracious and warmer in welcoming me to the 'GMA' family than Joan."

(Meanwhile, Lunden is about to re-up for "more than two years," according to an ABC News source.)

The attention lavished on Vargas is partly explained by press hopes for a re-entrenchment of L'Affaire Norville.

It was in 1989 that NBC's "Today" cast Deborah Norville as what was meant to be news anchor, but turned out to be host — and homeworker.

Crowded out, long-time anchor Jane Pauley left "Today" not long afterwards, taking a chunk of its audience with her.

There is one, and apparently only one, parallel at "GMA" now.

As with "Today" seven years ago, "GMA" has fallen behind its rival in the ratings.

This may help explain the signing of Vargas to replace vet-

eran correspondent Truett Dean, who, though he is neither the best nor as young as the 33-year-old brunette who succeeded him.

It may also explain Vargas' expanded duties.

These include live interviews, packaged reports and substitute anchoring.

She also will travel to the Republican National Convention next month, where she'll report.

"GMA's" souped-up effort to be No. 1 again may also explain the sprawling, multitermed new set unveiled May 28 — the same day as Vargas.

But no press accounts have documented any of the unrest at "GMA" that once rocked "Today."

Notes Vargas, "The whole TV Guide piece was hung on one anonymous quote from a network that I had just turned down and that had tried very hard to keep me."

That network is NBC, of course, where Vargas, among other assignments, was correspondent for "Date-line NBC" and substitute co-anchor and news anchor for "Today."

She had gone to NBC in 1993, after four years as a reporter and anchor at Chicago's WBBM.

"NBC took a big gamble on me and let me go straight from

being local news to being a magazine reporter," she acknowledges.

"I could have stayed and been very, very happy."

Instead, she's very happy at ABC. Even after that initial onslaught of phone calls from reporters wanting

to know "Are you and Joan getting along?" Even waking up at 4:30 a.m.


"You know, mornings are really a pretty part of the day," Vargas says gamely, then adds this warning: "Just don't call me after 9 p.m."

Elsewhere in television...

"DRIVING" MISS DAISY: If you want to skip the Olympics, watch the showing of a gold-medal film when "Driving Miss Daisy," starring Morgan Freeman, Jessica Tandy and Dan Aykroyd, airs at 8 p.m. EDT Thursday on CBS.

In a perky day-glo world that worships the Best Actress Oscar, Tandy plays Daisy Werthan, an eccentric, fiercely independent 72-year-old Southern Jewish matron, and

forgets the part when she stalks Colburn, her stalwart, gently stubborn black chauffeur. The film also won the Academy Award for Best Picture of 1989 and Alfred Ury, who wrote the script based on his Pulitzer Prize-winning play, won for Best Screenplay.

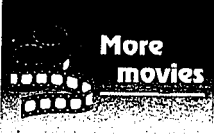

Shields 'suddenly' TV star following 'Friends' show

PASADENA, Calif. — Unexpectedly, here's Brooke Shields, looking like a TV star.

It's true, her first series, NBC's "Suddenly Susan," is being completely reworked — usually a sign that a show is in deep trouble. But her performance in the now-scratched pilot included some impressive physical comedy that's winning favorable reviews. So when she appeared before critics in Pasadena the other day at the 1996 Summer Press Tour, no one was laughing at the model-turned-actress ("Pretty Baby," "The Blue-Lagoon" and Broadway's "Grease"). They were laughing with her. It all started with the "Friends" special that followed this year's Super Bowl.

Shields, who guest-starred as a somewhat clueless stalker in a star-inden episode, so impressed TV executives that she ended up with her own show and a coveted slot on NBC's powerhouse Thursday night.

"The morning after the 'Friends' episode, I think a lot of us in Hollywood were looking and saying, 'Wow, this is a woman who is really willing to take risks,'" said Gary Dentig, executive producer of "Suddenly Susan" with Steven Peterman (both formerly of "Murphy Brown").

"She is really an untapped resource," said Peterman. "She's got such expectations and high visibility but a price. There's a lot of pressure when you're wedged between operated 'Seinfeld'-and-ER."

That's why NBC canned the original pi-

lot and supporting cast members (including Elizabeth Ashley).

The basic premise of "Suddenly Susan," nevertheless, remains the same.

It's about a woman who's suddenly single after the end of a long relationship. Out on her own, she's learning about herself and how to be herself.

"She's like many women, I believe, her age," said Shields, 31, a stunning but surprisingly accessible figure. "I think she's equated herself in relation to the people that she's been with, whether it's been through her parents or through relationships."

"You can diffuse a lot of your life by just spending it with different relationships," said the actress. "A lot of time can be passed."

The key, said Shields — for her character and herself — is not taking too much to heart, not taking anything too seriously. That's why she loves the prattles of the job and finds the physical comedy liberating.

"I think self-deprecation is one of the most important parts of this, of Susan, of the show," she said. "I think it's really healthy if we can all just laugh at ourselves. And I'm the first one to do it because, because I can."

She hadn't really been looking for work as a sitcom star.

"I actually thought that if I got into television that it would be more along the lines of 'dramas,'" said Shields. "She appeared in a number of made-for-TV movies. "It never factored into my life, the thought of having my own-situation comedy."

"Friends," though. Which prompts the following question: Will Shields' real-life fiancé, tennis star Andre Agassi, suddenly appear on "Suddenly Susan"? Though it might be tempting, and might even seem like a natural, don't hold your breath. "We've been pretty good about keeping our realms pretty separate," said Shields. "And I think we'll keep it that way."

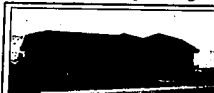

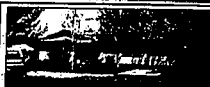

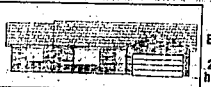
