## Welfare revolution

President Clinton, Congress will bring biggest change in public assistance system in decades, but no one knows just what those changes will be

WASHINGTON — Imagine a new world of welfare. More young mothers who live with their parents, more women who delay having children, more families who share incomes and more fathers who provide support. But also: more abortions, more women who stay with boyfriends or relatives

who abuse them, more crowded living conditions. The Senate, overriding protests that overhauling welfare would run roughshod over the poor, completed congressional action Thursday on a Republican bill to end six decades of guaranteed cash assistance. By a vote of 78-21, the Senate sent the bill to President Clinton, who said Wednesday he will sign it after wavering

for weeks and having vetoed two previous welfare bills. "This legislation is the best chance we have today to provide hope for a future for those families and children in our society who are otherwise without hope," said Senate Budget Committee Chairman Pete Domenici, R-N.M. The vote followed hours of debate in Please see WELFARE, Page A2

## Sugar workers in limbo

Leaders talk in Utah; union representative reports some progress

TWIN FALLS — Amalgamated Sugar Co. and labor union representatives negotiated behind closed doors in Utah Thursday, while workers back home waited for word. "The only thing we were told (is that) it does not look good," said Steven Shinn, an Amalgamated employee at the Twin Falls plant, where union members this week joined Amalgamated workers at Paul, Nampa and Nappa, Ore., plants in rejecting the company's three-year contract offer.

Workers had only minimal contact with union representatives who had headed for Amalgamated's corporate office in Ogden, Utah, Wednesday. The company's spokesman and lead negotiator in Ogden didn't return The Times-News' repeated phone calls.

"Of course, there's a lot of nervousness out in the factory," Shinn said. Work at the plant continued Thursday under a temporary extension of the labor contract that expired at the end of July.

Union negotiators are "making a little progress" and agreed to work under the extended contract as long as things go well under federal mediation, Ken Wiesmore reported in a phone call from Ogden late Thursday. A mediator joined the parties Thursday, he said.

Wiesmore is local Interagency Council president for the American Federation of Grain Millers, which has 1,200 to 1,300 members at the four Amalgamated factories. The union this set no deadline for announcing a strike, he said.

The prospect of a potential work stoppage drew mixed reactions from growers of sugar beets, a crop that could spoil if the sugar plant isn't operating when harvest begins in early September.

"In a way, I'm kind of glad to see it," Paul farmer Jerry Gillette said. Though a functional plan is critical to him when harvest begins, Gillette said he thinks union members' requests are reasonable and is confident negotiators from both sides will work out their differences.

## Government seeks to reduce children's deaths from air bags

DETROIT — The federal government Thursday proposed new auto safety regulations encouraging the use of "smart air bag" systems that would protect young children from injuries from inflating air bags.

The proposed rules are meant to push automakers to install advanced sensing systems that can detect the presence of small children in the front passenger seat and deactivate the air bag or deploy it at a slower speed.

Air bags, which inflate at up to 200 mph, save an estimated 500 lives a year but also can cause severe injuries. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration said 22 children, including six infants, have been killed by air bags since 1992.

"This can't go on," Transportation Secretary Federico Pena said in Washington. "We can't save lives by risking the lives of our children."

NHTSA said automakers who do not install smart systems would have to place prominent warning labels inside their vehicles, alerting owners to the dangers of air bags to unbelted children or

infants in rear-facing child seats. About 35 million cars have been equipped with driver-side air bags and 15 million with passenger-side bags. By model year 1997, all cars must be equipped two front air bags and all light trucks the following year.

The proposed rules, which the agency can adopt after a 45-day public comment period, also would allow automakers to install cutoff switches to allow manual shut-off of the passenger-side air bag when a child is present.

Reaction to the new rules was mixed. Joan Claybrook, president of Public Citizen, a consumer advocacy group, and a former NHTSA chairwoman, said the use of smart systems is overdue but allowing an air bag cutoff switch is misguided.

"There will be cases where it will be turned off and not be put back on when needed," she said.

Robert Sanders, a Baltimore lawyer whose 7-year-old daughter was killed by an air bag in October, said the proposal is a step forward. But, he added, the warning label should also say that air bags can be dangerous even to children who are properly belted.

## Idaho's O'Brien sees gold

ATLANTA — The nightmare is over for Dan O'Brien. It ended right there on the Olympic Stadium track when he crossed the finish line in his final event, exhausted, his face contorted in pain.

He is, at last, an Olympic decathlon champion. The greatest athlete in the world. The Olympic gold medal everyone thought O'Brien would win four years ago finally was his Thursday night, and he celebrated by dropping to his knees and crying.

There were hugs all around — from competitors, from his adoptive father Jim O'Brien, and from Michael Johnson, who set a phenomenal world record in the 200 earlier in the evening.

O'Brien finished with an Olympic record 8,824 points, the sixth-highest score of all time. Germany's Frank Busemann, who had four personal bests and tied two others, took the silver at 8,706. Tomas Dvorak of the Czech Republic won the bronze medal, 8,664. "I turned back all the challenges and challengers today," O'Brien said. "I felt sure my courage to do whatever it took to win the gold."

The biggest day of O'Brien's life began in a downpour and took 13½ hours to complete.

Most of the doubt about who would win ended in the ninth event, after darkness fell, when O'Brien lined up for his final throw of the javelin. As soon as he let it loose, he knew it was a long one.

O'Brien had hardly shown any emotion throughout the day, but now he jumped. Please see O'BRIEN, Page A2

## MV hospital patients ring up bigger bills, study suggests

TWIN FALLS — When patients take the traditional wheelchair ride out of Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, in some cases they have stayed longer than patients at other large hospitals in Idaho.

But one physician says hospitalization stays should remain based on patient health, and not shortened merely to save money.

Based on 1994 Medicare information, charges at Magic Valley Regional were higher for some types of illnesses, compared to other Idaho hospitals with 100 beds or more, Chief Financial Officer Ken Fry told the hospital board's Finance Committee Thursday. That's partly because these patients were hospitalized longer.

On average, heart-failure patients stayed a little over seven days at the Twin Falls County-owned hospital and were charged at least \$8,000 per case, the highest of nine large Idaho hospitals. At six other hospitals, the average stay for similar heart cases was a little over five days, at St. Luke's Medical Center in

Boise, the average stay was just under five days.

Magic Valley Regional's charges for pneumonia, stroke and gastrointestinal hemorrhaging were also among the highest, and hospital stays among the longest, compared to the other hospitals.

Ironically, Magic Valley Regional's daily charges were among the lowest in Idaho.

Doctors have the largest influence over the length of a patient's stay, Fry said. But hospital departments may not be providing x-ray or laboratory reports to doctors as quickly as they should, and staff and doctors will look at the issue.

"It's a joint thing," Fry said. "We certainly don't want to pry any fingers. But their length of stay is a large impact. It is a factor that makes charges higher."

The information is two years old and only uses Medicare cases, said Dr. Paul Miles, who is conducting a hospital study on how to improve health in the Magic Valley. In those 1994 cases, lengthy stays may be due to lack of aftercare for older people, he said.

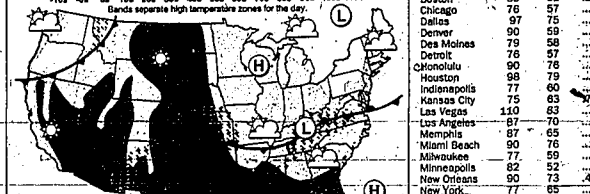

Rain soaks much of nation; West Virginia cleans up after floods

Heavy showers and thunderstorms pelted much of the eastern half of the nation Thursday, adding to widespread flooding problems from New Jersey to North Carolina. In West Virginia, Gov. Cecil DeLoach declared a state of emergency in nine counties, a day after up to 5 inches of rain flooded homes and caused mudslides, and drove several dozen residents from their homes. For many areas of the state, it was the fifth time they had been flooded this year. "We have a lot of mess. Everyone's trying to clean up," Mary Blackwell said as crews hosed mud off the streets of Phillip. "It's getting a little disgusting because you clean up from one flood and it's back again."

Some of the worst flooding in the world tends to be over the populated region of Asia and the Middle East. On Nov. 12, 1964, more than 5,000 people were killed from flooding in the southern region of Vietnam. In the United States, one of the worst floods occurred in Johnstown, Pa. It is estimated that 2,100 people died when heavy rains filled the Little Conemaugh River, breaching a dam and sending 40-foot walls of water into the town below.

House OKs health bill
WASHINGTON—Leaving gridlock behind, the Republican-controlled House overwhelmingly passed election-year legislation Thursday night to make health insurance more available to millions of Americans and provide new tax breaks for long-term care. The 421-2 vote belated months of controversy over the measure and set the stage for final Senate approval on Friday. President Clinton's signature is assured. "It means guaranteed health insurance for everyone who's in the system without regard to preconditions, so that we've relieved the largest single anxiety and worry of middle-class Americans," said Speaker New Gingrich. "If you change your job or lose your job, you will no longer risk losing your health insurance."

Illnesses strike at day-care
MUNCIE, Ind. — Carbon monoxide fumes sickened 57 people, mostly children, at a day-care center Thursday, authorities said. At least 15 were hospitalized. Police Sgt. James Peters said high levels of carbon monoxide were detected in the KinderCare day-care center but the source isn't immediately clear. The building had no natural gas service, he said. "The children had some symptoms that were serious enough that we thought they should go to the hospital, and they're there," said Heidi Naylor of KinderCare. "Everything is going smoothly. As far as we know, everything is fine." Nine adults and 48 children were taken to Ball Memorial Hospital in Muncie, complaining of drowsiness, nausea and vomiting, the hospital said. Three adults, including a woman about eight months pregnant, and 12 children were admitted, spokeswoman Vickie Miedler said. She said their conditions weren't life-threatening. A 13th child, a 1 1/2-year-old girl, was transferred to Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis but was expected to be released later today, a spokeswoman there said. Parents rushed to the Muncie hospital to be with their children.

which outraged Senate opponents — knowing in advance that their effort was futile — waged a furious and sometimes sarcastic battle targeting the White House as well as the Republican-designed legislation itself. As the vote began, 10 protesters shouting "Shame! Shame!" and blowing whistles from the visitors' gallery shocked senators into silence. About two dozen U.S. Capitol Police officers — prepared for the outburst in advance. As Clinton prepares to sign the bill, which gives states unprecedented authority to create their own systems, the question is what the result will be when the nation fundamentally changes a simple idea that grew out of its most complex and far-reaching. "I don't know what's going to happen and nobody else does either," said Mickey Kauf of Los Angeles, who studies welfare policy. Some are hopeful, others worried, as they make drastically different predictions about how states will use new power to write rules, set payments and decide who will and will not be entitled to government checks. At its core, the welfare bill ends the federal entitlement that guaranteed anyone who was eligible financial support. It sends the federal money to the states and allows them to decide how to spend it. There are restrictions. The most conspicuous is a time limit that says recipients cannot collect benefits for more than five years or to receive more than 10 months. That will make the world of welfare look much different in five years, said Rebecca Blank, a Northwestern University economist. She foresaw both good and bad — fewer illegitimate births but more abused mothers. "I personally think it's a very dangerous experiment," she said. "These are potentially rather grave risks." "In fact, children will perish as a consequence," said David Stoesz, professor of social work at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, Va. But that assumes most recipients will not be able to find work — a highly debated point. A study in northeastern Ohio found that most welfare recipients are qualified only for entry-level work and concluded there are nowhere near enough private jobs for them. "It's easy to say people should get off welfare and get jobs," said Laura Leach, an economist at Case Western University, who studied the Cleveland and Alcon job markets. But the jobs aren't there, she said. Lawrence Mead, professor of politics at New York University, disputed that. The problem is that welfare recipients do not have enough work experience and often are untrained employees who will not be able to keep a job, he said. "They know if they drop out they're just going to have to look for another job," he said. "We've got enough jobs." A healthy, growing economy can easily absorb these workers, many contend. In fact, the economy is showing signs of labor shortages. The big question is what the states do with their new power. Some fear they will end up being punitive when budgetary push comes to shove.

show severity of the illness, whether patients had to be readmitted later, or whether they were satisfied with the treatment outcome. Hospitalization shouldn't be regulated or just based on cost, Miles said. "If you just look at length of stay, and what that does is decrease up-front costs, but the total burden of health may go up," Miles said. "We aren't something you can legislate." Nationally, there has been controversy about hospitals releasing newborns and moms after one day because some often return with medical problems. The length of stay should be up to the patient and physician to decide, Miles said. "We don't want to be a position to tell doctors how long patients can stay," said Finance Committee Chairman Bruce Brown. Staff and committee members took exception to a July 21 article in The Times-News, which said

# Timing is everything for Dole

WASHINGTON (AP) — With several top campaign advisers urging him to rush out a tax-cutting economic plan before the Republican National Convention, Bob Dole picked up the phone to ask Clinton to Gov. Pete Wilson for his thoughts. Go slow, Wilson cautioned.

Then, there is the search for a running mate. Sen. Olympia Snowe of Maine favors a supporter of abortion rights and laments that there are no women on Dole's prospect list. Pat Buchanan, on the other hand, wants "if we get a pro-choice Rockefeller Republican as vice president, there will be no peace in the valley."

With the GOP convention less than two weeks away, it is crunch time for Dole. Given President Clinton's healthy lead, Dole's chances could well hinge on the handful of decisions he must make in the coming days and the speech he will deliver on his convention's closing night. As Dole weighs his options, there is no shortage of advice — much of it conflicting.

Within his campaign, for example, there is heated debate not only over the substance of the economic plan but also over when it should be released. Dole plunged into a series of meetings Thursday to work out the substantive details. The biggest question was whether he would anchor the plan on a new, across-the-board tax cut or on a repeal of the 1990 and 1993 federal tax increases.

There were advocates of both approaches within Dole's inner circle, and throughout the Republican Party, as Dole neared the end of a process that has exposed some odd fault lines in the GOP ranks. New Mexico Sen. Pete Domenici, for example, is a longtime deficit hawk who early on urged Dole to ask Clinton to wait until after the convention, arguing that the earlier the plan was released, the more primary campaign money Clinton could spend to attack it.

Wilson was among several GOP governors and senators who also urged Dole to wait, as did Republican National Committee Chairman Haley Barbour. Some of them suggested that next

The debate over when to release the plan was just as contentious.

Campaign manager Scott Reed and communications director John Buckley were among those pushing Dole to act early, and he has agreed to unveil the plan on Monday, in Chicago.

Media advisers Don Sipple and Mike Murphy had urged Dole to wait until after the convention, arguing that the earlier the plan was released, the more primary campaign money Clinton could spend to attack it.

Wilson was among several GOP governors and senators who also urged Dole to wait, as did Republican National Committee Chairman Haley Barbour. Some of them suggested that next

week's Republican platform debate — certain to focus on the divisive abortion issue — would steal some of the spotlight away from Dole's initiative. Other Republicans make the case that Dole should use the convention to present his broad vision — and follow up with specifics.

"People need to know the underlying principles first," said Jeb Bush, the son of the former president and a prominent Florida GOP activist. Buckley said such concerns were unfounded, particularly the objection that the economic plan would get overshadowed by other events.

"This is the core of the message that we will drive home every day throughout the general election," he said. "The idea that this will be a one-day story is a fallacy."

When it comes to the search for a running mate, the advice is equally diverse.

Those who have spoken to Dole of late sense a shift, from a candidate who several weeks ago was leaning toward a safe pick to a candidate looking to do something bold. But Dole himself has suggested he might fall short of finding "a 10," his early standard for a running mate.

Dole has built a list of nine prospects, adding three former Senate colleagues in recent days. One early candidate, Ohio Gov. George Voinovich, asked Thursday to be dropped from consideration, saying he wanted to concentrate on finishing his term and running for Senate in two years.

Of the eight remaining, only a few are considered by Dole aides to be serious candidates. These aides suggest another candidate or two might be added to the list — and they don't rule out the idea that Dole has a surprise in store.

And as Dole practices his nomination acceptance speech, it is unclear how acrimonious the GOP's quadrennial abortion platform debate will turn out. Both fervent abortion foes and abortion rights backers are calling around this week to assess if they would have the votes for a floor fight if they are unhappy with the abortion plank produced by the platform committee.

# Nixon advised Dole to choose 'heavyweight' for running mate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard Nixon, who enjoyed playing political prophet, told Bob Dole in 1993 to look for his running mate among "heavyweights" Carroll Campbell and Tommy Thompson, both currently on Dole's list, a new book says.

When Nixon, who died in 1994, made his suggestion, Campbell was the governor of South Carolina. Thompson was and is governor of Wisconsin. Both are on Dole's growing list of possible vice presidential nominees.

A third possibility suggested by Nixon was Lamar Alexander, who lost the presidential delegate hunt to Dole early in the primary season.

Monica Crowley, a Nixon aide in his last years, recounts his conversations with her in a book, "Nixon Off the Record," published by Random House. A long excerpt,

which has Nixon's esteem for President Clinton rising, was published by the New Yorker.

Dole visited the former president in his New Jersey office on Aug. 25, 1993, to talk about his strategy and, Crowley says, Nixon exulted afterward: "There is no one but Dole."

She quotes him saying: "Dole can be tough, but he can also be a warm, funny guy. That could come across more. We had that problem. You can't be something that you're not... He's got to let his human side come through so that the people like him enough to vote for him as well as respect him."

Nixon viewed California Gov. Pete Wilson and retired Gen. Colin Powell as potential threats to Dole's nomination, but predicted accurately: "Dole could not be defeated in 1996 for the nomination should he decide to run."

# FCC sets rules for opening local phone to competition

WASHINGTON (AP) — Marking another major step in the telecommunications revolution, federal regulators Thursday completed an overhaul of the local telephone business intended to give Americans more choices and lower prices.

The Federal Communications Commission voted, 4-0, to approve rules opening the \$100 billion local business to long-distance and cable TV companies and other potential competitors.

Customers in New York, Texas and California could begin to see multiple choices for residential local phone service by the end of the year, state regulators and telephone companies say.

But "for the average consumer the world will not look different tomorrow" because it is up to the states to authorize new competitors, said Gina Keeney, the FCC's top telephone regulator and chief of the common carrier bureau.

The FCC action implements the centerpiece of a law passed six months ago to overhaul telecommunications laws that have been in place for 62 years.

About a dozen states have or are in the process of allowing new entrants to the local phone business, now dominated by the

nation's seven regional Bell companies.

The FCC's rules will set a national policy to guide states into the new era of competition. But they also will provide state regulators with leeway to make decisions that would best serve local customers.

"I think we have sufficient flexibility, and that will be good for telephone customers," said Pat Wood, chairman of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. "If you were a competing company and had to learn 50 different sets of rules, customers won't see competition coming in soon."

Most regulators and telephone executives say it will take at least five years for most Americans to have multiple choices for local, residential telephone service. Others think it will occur sooner.

FCC Commissioner Susan Ness said, "The ultimate winners will be the American consumers. But she added, "competition will take time to emerge. It won't come easy."

"The FCC seems to be headed in the right pro-competitive direction," said Bradley Sisman, the Consumer Federation of America's telecommunications policy director.

# Jury acquits 2 bankers on 2 counts

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — In a political victory for President Clinton, a federal jury on Thursday acquitted two Arkansas bankers of misapplying bank funds and conspiracy to obstruct his political career. The jury deadlocked on seven other counts and the judge declared a mistrial on them.

After six days of deliberation, the jury acquitted Harry Branscum Jr. and Robert M. Hill on four counts, handing Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr the first defeat of his Whitewater investigation.

Starr's office has the option of retrying the defendants on the seven deadlocked counts.

The not-guilty verdict included a conspiracy count in which the defendants were accused of conspiring to conceal \$12.5 million in cash withdrawals by Clinton's 1990 gubernatorial campaign. Prosecutors had contended that presidential aide Bruce Lindsey was part of that conspiracy and had named him an unindicted co-conspirator.

Clinton's political team hoped the verdict would dampen Whitewater as an election-year issue.

"It takes one more issue off the table for Republicans who think this is an important matter," campaign spokesman Joe Lockhart said.

The courtroom was silent as jurors deliberated in deliberating since last Thursday. U.S. District Judge C. Thomas Eisele read a note saying: "We, the jury, have reached a verdict on some counts of the indictment and find no need to impose on the other counts."

He then asked the jury, "Are you hopelessly deadlocked?" on the other counts, and the eight men and four women all said "yes."

# Source: Jet's cargo door shows no sign of bomb

**EAST MORICHES, N.Y. (AP)** — Tests found no bomb residue on a piece of the front cargo door from TWA Flight 800, dealing a setback to investigators looking for proof that an explosive brought down the jetliner, a source said Thursday.

The source, who is close to the investigation and spoke on condition of anonymity, said the door also did not appear to have the scars usually left by a bomb.

In a preliminary inspection of the door, "nothing ... jumps out at us, nothing that looks like it is going to get us closer" to proving what destroyed the plane, the source said.

Investigators want to find and test the other two-thirds of the cargo door, the source said. Less than 2 percent of the aircraft has been recovered, FBI Director Louis Freeh said in Washington.

Meanwhile, searchers looking for bodies and wreckage were hampered for a second straight day by choppy seas and heavy rain. The weather drove scuba divers from the water in the morning.

The bodies of 184 victims had been recovered over the last two weeks, leaving 46 unaccounted for.

Investigators who think a bomb brought Flight 800 down have theorized that the blast occurred in the front cargo hold, which the source said carried passengers' baggage. If so, the search for a potential bomber could be narrowed to those with access to the bags.

Investigators also speculate that a bomb could have been placed in the nose wheel, or in a food cart in the front upper section of the plane, the source said.

Bombs placed in luggage stored in the front cargo hold are thought to have destroyed a French airliner over the Sahara in 1989 and Pan Am Flight 103 over Scotland in 1988. Investigators are studying both cases for similarities to Flight 800, which exploded and plunged into the Atlantic about 10 miles off Long Island.

In field tests, some pieces of debris had shown traces of suspicious chemicals. But as of Thursday, the source said, none of those readings had been confirmed by tests with more sophisticated equipment in Washington.

Investigators have still not discounted two other possible causes for the July 17 crash that killed all 230 people aboard: a missile, or some kind of catastrophic mechanical problem.

ATLANTA (AP) — FBI forensic specialists Thursday pored over a mountain of material taken from Richard Jewell's home — from videotapes to a rug — looking for clues tying the security guard to the Olympic bombing.

The FBI, which shipped most of the items to its Washington laboratory, maintained public silence on the progress of the investigation. But a senior federal official advised patience.

"I doubt we'll have any quick answers, because we have to examine in the lab what was taken out of the apartment," said the Washington official, speaking on condition of anonymity. "That will take some time."

A new slice of intriguing background on Jewell emerged Thursday, an account that he once claimed to own an anarchist-style manual. Such manuals often include bomb-making instructions.

FBI Director Louis Freeh said, meanwhile, "a number of suspects" are being looked at. Jewell, 33, the former deputy sheriff portrayed as a hero after Saturday's explosion at Centennial Olympic Park, has denied responsibility for the attack. He remained secluded in the Atlanta apartment he shares with his mother.

"It don't think that this investigation should be conducted under world spotlight, if you will, like this," said the suspect's lawyer, Watson Bryant.

The pipe bomb, hidden in an olive-drab knapsack, exploded in a hail of nails that killed one woman and injured 111 other people at an open-air concert outside the park's AT&T pavilion.

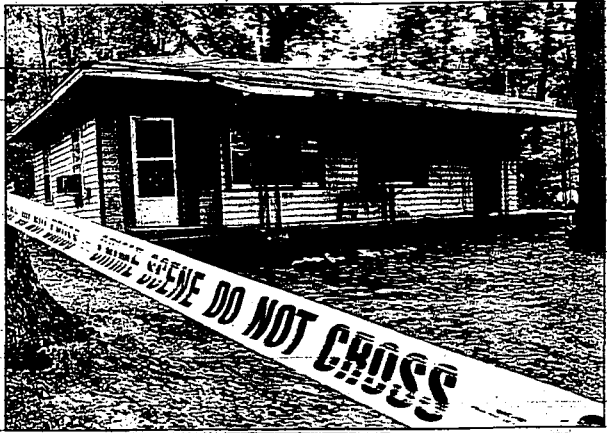
Jewell, a pavilion guard, had alerted police to the suspicious, unattended knapsack and helped move people away from the spot. But it exploded before the evacuation was completed.

By Tuesday, however, Jewell was being described by federal officials as a prime suspect in the case. They apparently believed he fit a common-profile-for-a-one-bomber — a former police officer, wind-up clocks or other elements of a timed explosive device.

Washington sources said it was a law enforcement officer who reported that Jewell once said he possessed an automatic handgun. It could not be determined whether such a gun was found among Jewell's belongings. These sources said, however, that previous reports Jewell had

# Doctors probe antifreeze tainting in Haiti medicine

ATLANTA (AP) — An ingredient in antifreeze was found in two brands of anti-fever syrup that have killed at least 64 children in Haiti in the past nine months, the U.S. government said Thursday.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said imported glycerin used to make local brands of the syrup was tainted with diethylene glycol, a poisonous substance used in industrial solvents and antifreeze.

"It really is tragic because parents were giving their children medicine for signs and symptoms of fever, and what they were giving was a poison," said Dr. Kate O'Brien, a CDC epidemiologist.

Doctors are still trying to find out where the manufacturers of the syrup obtained the contaminated glycerin, but O'Brien said it probably did not come from the United States.

The children had taken Africel or Valodon syrup, which were banned by Haiti's Ministry of Health a month ago. Most of the victims were under 5.

Since November, at least 64 of 85 children who were sickened by the tainted medicine have died. Nine children survived after intensive care and analysis in the United States.

# Ancient tools found in Siberia

WASHINGTON (AP) — A gracefully tapered stone spear point, similar to those thought to have been invented by Americans about 12,000 years ago, has been found in Siberia, raising new questions about how and when ancient humans developed such weapons.

The first fluted projectile point ever found west of the Bering Strait was identified in a collection of stone tools unearthed near the Siberian city of Magadan, according to Maureen King, a University of Washington archaeologist.

There is uncertainty about the age, said King. But the discovery suggests the possibility that fluted points — flaked so as to make a tapered point with sharp edges and a flat base — were first made in Asia and then brought across the Bering Strait.

"If this site dates to 12,000 years before the present, then we might look at this as a fluting that predates that of the new world," she said. "But if it predates that time, then we may look at the possibility of this technology moving to the west."

King said there now is not enough known to challenge the belief that the fluted spear point was invented by ancient Americans living near Clovis, N.M., 11,000 to 12,000 years ago. Only more discoveries in Siberia might settle the issue, she said.

A report on the discovery by King and by S. B. Slobodov of Magadan is to be published Friday in the journal Science.

"It is an interesting find," said C. Vance Haynes, a University of Arizona expert on ancient Americans. "But by itself, it is inadequate to address the larger picture."

He said the point could have been an isolated "accident" by some Asian weapons maker, or it could have been made in America and traded across the Bering Strait.

# Negotiators want to include explosives study in terror bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Reviving an anti-terrorism proposal pushed by President Clinton, key White House and congressional negotiators said Thursday they may include a study on placing chemical markers in explosives in their new package.

FBI Director Louis Freeh, meanwhile, said Americans are under increasing attack by terrorists and proposed new wiretapping authority would not greatly expand government's powers.

"The country and the American people have been experiencing an increasing war against them by terrorists and terrorist-supported activities," Freeh told a Senate Intelligence Committee hearing. "Americans are clearly under attack and we are the prime targets for this kind of terrorism."

After a meeting between a bipartisan lawmakers' task force and administration officials, participants said they would seek agreement on a proposal for studying the case for placing the tiny chemical markers, called taggants, in explosives.

That idea was rejected by the negotiators on Wednesday. If agreement isn't reached soon on a new taggants study and provisions to protect privacy related to wiretapping, participants said the rest of the new package could be scuttled. It includes an expansion of wiretapping authority and longer-term measures to tighten airport security, such as joint activities by the FBI and the Federal Aviation Administration.

# Discovered fossil suggests that evolution had perfected flight early

Early birds didn't have to settle for worms, a remarkably preserved fossil from Spain shows.

Birds appear to have been so common by 125 million years ago — 50 million years before the dinosaurs became extinct — that they could maneuver on the wing about as well as their descendants do today.

To life, the now-extinct Spanish bird could have flitted between branches or alighted on a lofty perch as effortlessly as a sparrow, said Luis Chiappe, one of seven paleontologists who described the fossil in Thursday's issue of the journal Nature.

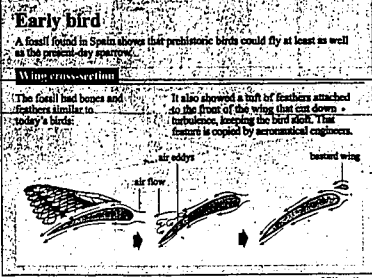
Found squashed between two slabs of rock in a limestone quarry, the finch-sized fossil suggests that evolution had perfected flight long after birds arose. Flight allowed birds to exploit a wide variety of foods and inhabit many different environments.

"This is the first bird in which we find both the modern design in bones and the modern design in feathers," said Chiappe, a paleontologist at the American Museum of Natural History in New York City.

The fossil even has a design innovation so crucial to flight that 115 million years later, jumbo jets use it. A tuft of feathers attached to the front of its wing allowed the ancient bird to fly smoothly without losing lift and, thus, tumbling to the ground. That tiny tuft is known as the alula, or the bastard wing.

Aeronautical engineers use a similar device to keep airplanes from crashing when they land. The leading-edge flaps on an airplane, which passengers can often see inching forward on the wings just before landing, keep the plane from losing lift as it slows down.

Paleontologists are amazed at the preservation of the fossil, which

is splayed out on the two rock slabs. The remains include the bones of the bird's body and wings, with most of the feathers intact.

"Feathers are extremely rare in the fossil record," Chiappe said. "The preservation of this specimen is so spectacular it has not only all the feathers in place, or most of them, but also the contents of its last meal."

The bird holds the fossilized remains of tiny shrimp-like crustaceans in its belly. It may have hunted the creatures by wading in the shallows of the way plover and similar shorebirds do today, Chiappe said.

The bird probably lived on the shores of a lake lined with lush vegetation and inhabited by ancient crocodiles, insects, frogs and dinosaurs. It would have been the occasional prey of some of those creatures, but its flying ability would have made it elusive, Chiappe said.

He and his colleagues have given the fossil bird the Latin name Eoalulavis hoyasi, which translates loosely as "early bird with alula feathers." The bird was found at the Las Hoyas fossil site, a limestone quarry in central Spain.

"This specimen I think is more important than anything else that has come to light within the last three or four years

regarding this issue of the origin of flight in birds," said John Ostrom of Yale University in New Haven, Conn.

Eoalulavis belongs to an extinct bird group known as the Enantiornithes. The group died out at about the same time the dinosaurs went extinct. Modern birds are descended from another group, the Neornithes, that first appears in the fossil record about 80 million years ago.

The oldest known bird, Archaeopteryx, is about 30 million years older than Eoalulavis. It probably flew poorly, nursing desperately to get off the ground and crash-landing at the end of its flights.

"It was quite sloppy the way it flew," Chiappe said. "But 30 million years later, evolution had solved enough aerodynamic problems to give Eoalulavis the gift of flight."

"In less than 30 million years the wing and the structure of the shoulder and the structure of the feathers got completely modified into the modern design," Chiappe said. In addition to Chiappe, the Nature paper's authors include Jose Sanz, Bernardino Perez-Moreno, Angela Buscalioni, Jose Moratalla, Francisco Ortega and Francisco Poyato-Ariza, all of the Autonomous University of Madrid.

# Close encounter: 1st times scientist meets Rotarians

Physicist delivers 1st of many planned talks to non-scientists

WASHINGTON — The whole talk, many agreed, was a little bit awkward. And the opening jokes fell pretty flat. But National Science Foundation director Neal Lane, a quantum physicist who has admitted to being "intimidated" by the prospect of speaking publicly to non-scientists, kept a 3-month-old promise last week and delivered one of the most difficult experiments in his career: He gave a speech to the Arlington (Va.) Rotary Club.

The talk, delivered to a room half filled with middle-aged men who listened politely over sandwiches and salads, broke no news. Lane touted the benefits of the laser, invented 45 years ago. And in a verbal re-enactment of his morning ablutions, he went on (too long, some opined) about the joys of hot running water and high-tech razors, all evidence of modern technology.

But Lane's presentation was historic in its own way. His was the first of what he hopes will be many such Chautauquas between publicly funded scientists and citizens who, every April 15, pay those scientists' bills, some \$3.3 billion worth if NSF gets its way in 1997.

By speaking to the Rotarians, Lane added his clout to a new growth industry colloquially known as "public communication of science." Put plainly, he confirmed that scientists — a traditionally autonomous, uncommunicative and some would say

arrogant lot — are feeding increasing pressure to justify the vast amount of federal support that must flow their way almost automatically.

"I believe that the new definition of leadership for the community must include a civic persona," Lane said in an article in the May/June issue of American Scientist. "Only by informing the public of science's promise, Lane wrote, "can we be assured that science is appreciated as a national investment and is able to disburse its work."

Like Buddhist monks in America, science suppliers until recently were very rare. Scientists enjoyed a sort of "Researcher system of patronage," said Mary Woolley, president of Research America, an Alexandria, Va.-based organization that promotes basic biomedical research. "There was no management or second-guessing of what you were up to," Woolley said.

Today, scientists still are very highly on animal surveys of the most trusted professions, Woolley said, but "the public would prefer to be a plumber or even the boss." That's where public communication comes in. "In one approach, Research America is engaged in a massive re-education campaign to teach scientists how to change their personas and assume a properly appreciative posture.

In the old days, Woolley said, "when scientists talked to someone they met on an airplane or at a cocktail party and somebody said, 'What do you do?' they'd say, 'Well, it's pretty complicated. You wouldn't understand.' 'Oops. Kiss that grant goodbye!'"

"The right answer really is, 'I work for you,'" Woolley said, quoting the words she hopes her scientists will use. From there, she said, scientists should be able to explain what they do in simple, clear, understandable terms.

# Aide signs bill into law without governor knowing

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — An aide to Gov. Fob James signed a tax break for oil companies into law without James' knowledge, causing something of an embarrassment for the administration.

At a news conference Tuesday afternoon, James said he had not seen the bill and had not decided whether to sign it. But on Wednesday, reporters learned that the law was already on the books when the governor spoke.

The signed bill had been

delivered to the secretary of state's office and officially recorded as law nearly six hours before the news conference.

Bill Gray, the governor's legal adviser, said he used his power of attorney to sign the governor's name. Gray said the governor's staff wasn't supposed to deliver the bill to the secretary of state's office until he had time to discuss it with James, who was away from the office that morning.

"It was one of those speed

\*mistakes, where someone from our office transmitted them over there and it shouldn't have been," Gray said.

Gray said he had reviewed the bill with other aides to the governor, and they had no problems with it. "We have a pretty good idea of what the governor is going to do," Gray said.

# President still has regrets over Foster's death

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three years after Vince Foster's suicide, President Clinton says he still regrets missing signs of depression from his old friend and White House aide. "I didn't handle it well," he said.

In an interview published Thursday in the Washington Post, the president recalled the last time he saw Foster — standing in the Rose Garden during the announcement of Louis Freeh's selection as FBI director. Foster killed himself hours later.

Clinton said he had called Foster the night before. "That was Monday. I told him I was busy on Tuesday and asked to meet him on Wednesday. He said, 'Sure,' and sounded very calm," Clinton said. "I don't know whether at that time he had already decided to kill himself. And I don't know whether I could have helped."

He said Foster's former law partner of first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton, was embittered by criticism he had received from the press. "In retrospect, I didn't handle it well," the president said in the interview conducted by United Press Syndicate. "I told him the attacks should not worry him so, but he must have been taking them more seriously than I knew."

Clinton, who turns 50 Aug. 19, said the biggest accomplishment of his half-century on earth "was convincing Hillary Rodham to marry me."

# National panel rejects Idaho plan to kill cranes

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Members of the Idaho Fish and Game Commission will decide later this month whether to go ahead with plans to let hunters kill crop-eating sandhill cranes in eastern Idaho, under restrictions laid down by an interstate council of migratory bird managers.

Sandhill cranes have been damaging crops, so the Fish and Game Department decided to allow conservation officers and Animal Damage Control workers kill up to 20 cranes this fall.

But the Pacific Flyway Council of game managers from 11 Western states, said it would

allow the kill only if public hunters can do it.

Idaho previously has asked for "kill permits" for its officers rather than hunting licenses for the public. The council has refused because Idaho wasn't using the public hunt it was entitled to.

This year, Idaho asked for hunting permits but only for wildlife officers so they could target problem birds rather than letting hunters kill birds randomly.

The latest decision, issued Sunday in Kansas City, means the council won't stand for anything but a public hunt.

"We've tried everything to

answer the farmers' concerns," said Jeff Siddoway, Fish and Game commissioner. "Now we're to the point where I think we'll probably make the decision to go ahead with the sportsman's hunt."

That means the department would have to issue permits by month's end, and monitor the hunt closely to make sure no endangered whooping cranes are killed.

A few birds from an unsuccessful attempt to establish a whooping crane population in the region still return to Idaho. In recent years, only two whoopers

have been spotted in eastern Idaho, waterfowl manager Gary Will said.

Opponents are considering legal action to block a crane hunt, in part because the commission acted last month without public notice.

The commission rejected a proposal last year, and Siddoway said commissioners believed opponents might be less upset if the program were carried out by government officers rather than hunters. But he hoped the hunt would be open to sportsmen next year, following more public hearings.

## Agent 007 stopped for speeding

WALLACE (AP) — Give James Bond a speeding ticket?

The notion may have been unthinkable for north Idaho cops, even though Bond — better known as Pierce Brosnan — says he's been pulled over four times since the shooting of his latest film began here.

In true Bond style, it appears he got off without a ticket.

"They got me good but treated me well," Brosnan told reporters at a press conference this week.

But which officers nabbed Brosnan remains a mystery. Most local cops won't admit to letting the star off easy.

"I know of some occasions that (it looked like) he was exceeding

the speed limit," Shoshone County Lt. Spike Angle said. "But, I had no radar where it was." Besides, "it would be hard to hold back," Angle joked. "That car's sweet."

Brosnan has been in Idaho for the past four months to shoot "Dante's Peak," a \$95 million movie about the destruction of a Pacific Northwest town by a sudden volcanic eruption.

During his stay, Brosnan has been spotted zooming around in the same BMW Z3 convertible used in his 007 flick, "GoldenEye."

Angle said he stopped Brosnan for driving without license plates but let him go after he produced the proper paperwork.

Still, Angle insisted he would have

ticketed Brosnan. "If he's breaking the law, you bet. I told him that."

Other law enforcement officials also deny giving the star special treatment.

An Idaho State Police dispatcher said one officer had pulled over Brosnan, but the dispatcher was unsure which one or why.

Angle thought Kellogg police had stopped Brosnan for speeding. But the chief said no way.

Post Falls police heard that Coeur d'Alene officers had caught the star. But "if any of our officers have stopped him, it hasn't gotten around the office — and those things usually get around the office," Coeur d'Alene police Capt. Ken Timmons said.

## Pension estimate lowered

LEWISTON (AP) — A conservative taxpayers' group has cut in half its estimate of U.S. Sen. Larry Craig's pension to almost \$500,000 after his campaign disputed its nearly 2-year-old estimate.

The Idaho Republican's re-election campaign objected to the National Taxpayers' Union's \$1.89 million estimate.

The questions came in the "wake" of Democratic challenger Walt Minnick's television ad charging Craig with voting to raise his salary to \$33,000 a year and pension to almost \$2 million five years ago.

National Taxpayers' Union spokesman Pete Sepp said it assumed Craig is enrolled in the Civil Service Retirement System instead of the Federal Employee Retirement System when it released its original estimate in 1994.

That is because the Civil Service Retirement System is more generous and which retirement program congressmen use enrolled in is not public record, he said.

Seven years ago, the union asked lawmakers what retirement plan they are enrolled in and assumed they were part of the Civil Service Retirement System if they did not respond, he said.

Craig exercised his option to shift into the federal employee system in 1987.

## Commission works for range balance

BOISE (AP) — Livestock industry representative Margaret Soulen says people need to realize that there are benefits to allowing ranchers to use public range lands.

Livestock producers also need to develop an understanding of the needs of recreational users of those same lands, Soulen says.

She's chair of the Idaho Rangeland Resource Commission, which has as its basic goal working for balanced and sustainable use of public range.

"I see this commission as a way to bring all of the players together, help educate them so they can make informed decisions and foster a spirit of cooperation which will be beneficial not only to the rangeland users but to the land itself," Soulen said.

Soulen, Weiser, represents

Idaho woolgrowers. Other members on the commission are Dick Bass, Murphy, K. Lynn Bennett, Bliss, Bud Purdy, Picabo and Blah Fisher, Rexburg.

The Legislature in 1994 authorized a commission to be funded by an assessment on those using public range.

Those assessments are expected to bring in \$317,770.

"There is a refund provision in our funding so that if someone really, really doesn't want to pay the assessment, he can ask for a refund.

Hopefully, this won't happen often," she said.

Soulen said the commission will take an active role in advocating wise range use planning as Idaho grows.

"We are going to have more and more people sharing less land in the future," she said.

"We have a responsibility to make sure the land stays not only economically viable for livestock producers but also to protect its scenic and recreational assets. We have to respect all uses."

The commission isn't allowed to lobby or take political stands.

Once funding starts to arrive, the commission hopes to hire an executive director to start early next year and handle day-to-day activities.

Soulen said once a survey is taken, the commission will focus on education, using mass media, school programs and within the livestock industry.

"The long-term economic health of Idaho's livestock industry will depend heavily upon the support of policies which balance economic and environmental concerns," she said.

## More Utah ski lifts to be built

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Three Salt Lake County ski resorts have been given permission to build additional chairlifts without having to conduct further environmental analyses.

Wasatch-Cache National Forest supervisor Bernie Weingardt approved the construction of three high-speed quad chairlifts at Snowbird, Solitude and Brighton on land owned by the U.S. Forest Service.

Weingardt, who said the decision came after much debate, issued "categorical exclusions" to allow the lifts to be built.

The limited exclusions are granted based on past studies so resorts do not need to go through the full environmental review process.

### Typhoon kills 14 in Taiwan, moves to China

TAIPEI, Taiwan (AP) — Typhoon Herb roared into China with 87-mph winds Thursday, leaving in its wake at least 14 people dead, more than 200 injured and thousands of homes flooded in Taiwan.

Nine people were killed in mudslides and rockslides Wednesday, and five more died in traffic accidents, police and state-funded radio said. More than 200 people were injured by falling objects and collapsing roofs, police said.

Twenty-three people were reported missing, including a 14-year-old boy whose home near Taipei was washed away and an 8-year-old boy swept away by pounding surf on Taiwan's east coast.

The typhoon Thursday moved across the Taiwan Strait, which separates the island from China. It hit Pingtan in southeast China's Fujian province with sustained winds of 87 mph, down from 121 mph on Wednesday.

China's official Xinhua News Agency said sea walls were breached in about 1,000 places along coastal Fujian. The Chinese Navy, another government-run agency, reported five people were killed and five missing in coastal Zhejiang province.

Power was knocked out in some areas, and two miles of dikes along Lake Qiantang were broken, it said.

The report quoted Vice Gov. Liu Xirong of Zhejiang as saying that more than 300,000 people were evacuated in Wenzhou and Taizhou cities.

China's Central Television reported that waves kicked up by the typhoon knocked down part of a 200-yard breakwater in the Min River between Fuzhou and Changde.

## Widows of Srebrenica won't forget cause

TUZLA, Bosnia-Herzegovina — In July 1995, Fatima Huseinovic was virtually the Bosnian equivalent of India's untouchables — the lowest of the low. She was hungry and huddled, huddling out in a squalid tent city of wailing women and shrieking children.

A year later, Huseinovic takes meetings with royalty and ambassadors. She gets letters of support from President and Hillary Rodham Clinton and from Margaret Thatcher. Bosnian politicians regularly come knocking at her door seeking support in advance of the September elections.

Huseinovic, 49, is president of Women of Srebrenica, a group representing the more than 20,000 Muslim women who lost husbands, sons and fathers in the massacres at the Bosnian "safe haven" last summer. Trying to ensure that their cause is not forgotten, they are enjoying surprising success with a combination of cajoling, mild violence, and a knack for tweaking the guilty conscience of officials.

In January, about 1,500 of them wielded rocks and bricks to force their way into the International Red Cross. Tuza, headquarters in protest of delays in obtaining information about the 8,000 missing men.

This month, Queen Noor of Jordan and Swane Hunt, the socialite U.S. ambassador to Austria, joined the Srebrenica women here to mark the first anniversary of the massacres. Taking a cue from the famous AIDS quilt, thousands of the Srebrenica women embroidered pillowcases with the names of their missing men and displayed them for the television cameras.

The meeting yielded a \$5 million pledge in U.S. aid, plus \$2.5 million from the European Union. Hunt also announced a fund-raising appeal with a star-studded board of directors that included Sophia Loren and Tipper Gore.

Only a handful of men were permitted to attend. Organizers of the event went so far as to refuse requests from male Bosnian politicians to speak.

"It was fine for them to sit and watch. We wanted them to see our power and courage," Huseinovic said in an interview the next day. "They know that elections are coming and they want to use us for their own purposes. They won't succeed.

We've had enough of being manipulated."

If the women sound tough, it is because of the treachery that lies behind their personal tragedies. They were betrayed first by the United Nations, which failed to protect its own purported "safe haven." New evidence suggests that NATO refrained from using air strikes to deter the Serbs because of a hostage-release deal made earlier in the summer.

The refugees also suspect their own government. The Bosnian Muslim army commander in Srebrenica, Nasir Oric, was conveniently out of the city when it was stormed — giving credence to the widespread

belief that the government had secretly traded away Srebrenica for other territory.

"These Srebrenica refugees have been treated as pawns at every stage of the game," said Randolph Ryan, a spokesman for the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees in Tuza. "Now, the government is afraid of these people because they know they are potentially a powerful political force."

Tuzla has the largest concentration of Srebrenica refugees, about 30,000 and predominantly female.

Most of them originally come from rural villages near Srebrenica — not the city itself — and they wear peasant cloth-

ing, shawls and wide trousers that make them conspicuous outsiders.

Their isolation is compounded by their precarious living conditions — either in refugee centers or partially destroyed weekend houses on the outskirts of town.

They live on monthly distributions of rice, flour, oil, beans and sugar.

Few have jobs, or any marketable skills that would conceivably allow them to work in an urban setting.

Huseinovic is rather atypical. She worked in Srebrenica's department store before the war and dresses Western style — albeit usually the same print blouse and skirt, since she has few changes of clothes.

Women of Srebrenica was founded in May 1992, the first month of the war, as a group of volunteers to help tend the war-wounded.

Huseinovic was its president after she became a refugee, she started it up anew in Tuza.

Her immaculate office is adorned with cheerful handmade rugs and wall hangings — the handiwork of refugee women.

A mother and daughter were sitting pensively in a corner gazing out the window, and Huseinovic commented bitterly: "That little girl. She is only 10. Whenever she sees a bird, she says to her mother, 'Look, it is Daddy. He's come back as a bird to visit us.'"

"We need answers," Huseinovic continued, sliding straight into her pitch. "They have to look to find survivors if there are any. If there aren't, they should tell us about the dead, dig up all the bodies and identify them so that we can get on with our lives."

### Convicted Filipino maid returns to warm welcome

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Jubilant Filipinos greeted a 47-year-old maid who returned home Thursday after being freed from a death sentence for murdering her employer in the United Arab Emirates.

Sarah Balabagan — who said she killed the man because he tried to rape her — became a symbol in the Philippines of the abuses women migrant workers suffer at the hands of foreign employers.

An international outcry led to her sentence being reduced to one year, and she was released from jail Wednesday, three months early.

Dozens of reporters mobbed the teen-ager when she arrived Thursday at Manila's international airport, escorted by the Philippine ambassador to the United Arab Emirates. Hundreds of well-wishers cheered her.

A visibly tired Balabagan declined to take questions at a brief news conference, saying only that she thanked God and those who helped win her release.

Balabagan had originally been sentenced to seven years for the 1994 killing of her 85-year-old employer, but was then sentenced to death in a retrial.

An outcry in the Philippines followed, and President Fidel Ramos sent three Cabinet mem-

bers to the United Arab Emirates to intervene on her behalf.

The family of her employer, Almas Mohammed al-Baloushi, eventually agreed to drop its demand for her extradition

and settle for \$41,000 in restitution "blood money." Her sentence was reduced to a year in jail and 100 lashes.

During her nine months in jail, Balabagan received light lashes and paid the fine with the help of international contributors.

A French group, the Save Sarah Balabagan Movement, contributed \$38,500 for her future education. A Filipino-Chinese entrepreneur also helped raise money.

Balabagan, a Muslim from the southern Philippine city of Cotabato, confessed to stabbing Baloushi at his home in Al-Ain, but she said he tried to rape her at knife-point.

During the trial, physicians testified there had been a rape attempt, but the court ruled there was no evidence of rape. Court documents showed she stabbed him 34 times.

### Embryo destruction program begins

LONDON (AP) — Scientists began destroying 3,300 abandoned human embryos Thursday despite protests from anti-abortion groups and fertility clinics, fully unthawing the frozen embryos before incinerating them.

The dot-sized embryos, disposed of under a 1990 law limiting storage of in vitro fertilized eggs to five years, were destroyed within minutes of being moved from freezing nitrogen into a saline solution.

Official Solicitor Peter Harris rejected a last-minute appeal by an anti-abortion group. Life Campaigns, a group who can act as a court-appointed guardian, said he could represent only "a natural person — a life in being."

The government's Human Fertilization Embryology Authority said the embryos being destroyed total to 900 couples who have lost touch with the clinics and cannot be traced. The couples included foreigners who came to Britain, which pioneered the test-tube technique, for infertility treatment.

The embryos were produced as spares in case in vitro fertilization

failed, or for use later if a couple wanted more children.

Clinics regularly destroy frozen embryos in small numbers at the request of donor couples. The larger destructions are expected to last two days, marks the end of the five-year deadline by which clinics must destroy the embryos if couples cannot be reached.

Storage can be extended for another five years at the request of a donor couple request.

#### Weather conditions Increase risk of blight

**TWIN FALLS** - University of Idaho potato specialists say recent weather conditions have dramatically increased the risk of a potato late blight infection in the Magic Valley.

When left unchecked, the disease can devastate a potato crop within eight days. As a result, the university is urging growers to scout fields carefully for late blight.

The disease first appears on the leaves of potatoes and resembles water-soaked spots. The spots rapidly enlarge into pale green to brown lesions. Infected foliage becomes brown, shrivels and then dies.

Growers should scout for late blight on leaf and stem samples to the university's Twin Falls Research and Extension center on the College of Southern Idaho campus.

Growers can also call (208) 735-2628 to make arrangements for sample identification.

## To subdivide or not to subdivide? Critics warily watch building activity at Sawtooth National Recreation Area

**STANLEY** - What may be a subdivision is being developed on private land within the Sawtooth National Recreation Area, despite SNRA regulations that prohibit subdividing land.

A new road, with culvert and fill, has been built through a meadow about five miles northwest of Stanley. Bob Piva of Challis owns the land.

Survey stakes labeled "Lot 4," "Lot 10" and "Lot 5 south" are in place along the road. According to the Cassia County recorder's office, however, no subdivision plat has been recorded.

Anderson Creek bisects the 160-acre parcel, which has excellent views of the Sawtooth Range. The property is located a short distance from the east side of Highway 21, across from the entrance road to Stanley Lake.

Subdividing the parcel would violate private property regulations of the SNRA, which were designed to halt property subdivision when the SNRA was created. Regulations allow a residence, dude ranch, or agricultural operation on the property; the property can be divided only if the owner can show the division will not impair the values of the SNRA.

"It is important to understand that Mr. Piva is not required to obtain approval for the project. However, he is required to comply with the private property regulations," said Steve Riniella, an assistant ranger in charge of the SNRA lands program.

Piva has declined comment, saying he first needs to speak to his attorney.

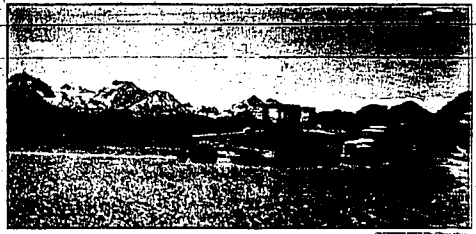
The Forest Service can condemn projects that do not comply with private property regulations. The condemnation process allows the Forest Service to take title to the land, but the property owner must be compensated.

Cities and other government entities often use condemnation to obtain land for highways, parks, and other public projects.

There is no appeal of the condemnation procedure in the SNRA. But property owners may contest the fair market value.

### Willis pumps more money into initiative

## New for fall: Twin Falls gets its own ABC station

**TWIN FALLS** - There's about to be a fifth local television station on your dial. KSAW-TV, the Twin Falls-based affiliate of Network's KIVI, will go on the air Aug. 26 on broadcast channel 68 and cable channel 3 in the Magic Valley.

Actually, there will be few visible changes beyond the call letters and the commercials. KSAW, an ABC affiliate, has been rebroadcast on channel 68 for almost a decade in south-central Idaho and has been a fixture of Continental Cablevision's lineup for years.

"You'll be seeing local commercials instead of the commercials from Boise," said Rick McMahon, a sales representative for KSAW. "We're planning local weather reports, and hopefully, broadcasting some community events."

But McMahon said KSAW has no immediate plans for a local newscast. "That would be quite a ways down the road," he said.

KSAW can also be seen on Sun Valley Cable-Vision channel 8 in the Wood

River Valley and on channels 68 and 134 on Teton Wireless Cable. Cable subscribers in Buhl will receive KSAW on channel 34.

Many Mini-Cassia TV viewers get their ABC programming via Idaho Falls station KIVI.

KIVI general manager Larry Chase couldn't be reached for comment Thursday, but he said in January that his station would be aggressive about competing for advertising and viewers in the Magic Valley.

That was shortly after KIVI became the only source of ABC programming between Baker, Ore., and Twin Falls. KXFF, a Twin Falls station that had carried ABC shows since 1983, switched its affiliation to Fox seven months ago.

McMahon was the manager and founder of KXFF, but the station's owner, Sunbelt Communications of Las Vegas, replaced him in April.

Last month, KIVI hired McMahon and Kim Obenchain, who sold advertising for KXFF for three years, for KSAW's sales staff.

## Local NBC affiliate may link to Mini-Cassia area next week

**TWIN FALLS** - The more than 6,000 TCI Cablevision subscribers in Buhl, Rupert and Paul may be only about week away from having an Idaho NBC station on their TV dials.

But for the 7,000 households in Cassia and Minidoka counties without cable service, it will be a longer wait.

The microwave transmitter that will link Twin Falls NBC affiliate KXTFT-LP with Mini-Cassia cable subscribers should be installed and operational by the end of next week, said Jim Boyd, sales manager for KXTFT.

"That's what we've been promised," Boyd said Thursday. "We'll see if it happens."

But the Federal Communications Commission has yet to grant Boise's KTVB permission to build a KXTFT translator in

the Buhl area. KTVB is KXTFT's parent station, and its translator would allow Cassia and Minidoka county viewers to receive a strong broadcast NBC signal.

"It's been three months since we submitted our application, and we were told it would take up to six months to get approval," Boyd said.

A translator functions as a remote TV station, rebroadcasting signals that originate at a distant location.

Cable customers in the Mini-Cassia area have been receiving NBC programming via Salt Lake City station KSL for the past seven months, but for households without cable, NBC programming has been spotty since Idaho Falls station KXFF switched its affiliation to ABC in January.

Some viewers in Minidoka and Cassia counties can receive a broadcast signal from KPVI, a Pocatello NBC affiliate.

Jury awards couple \$145 million in damages against State Farm

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A jury has awarded \$145 million in punitive damages and \$2.6 million in compensatory damages to a couple who accused State Farm Mutual Automobile Insurance Co. of fraud and widespread cheating.

The couple, Curtis and Inez Price Campbell of Lewiston, Utah, were not in the courtroom when the verdict was returned late Wednesday.

Michael Hagg, State Farm vice president and counsel, said the company "will aggressively pursue its legal options to have the verdict set aside. These include seeking a new trial on appeal."

The couple sued in 1989, claiming State Farm failed to proper Campbell's interests after he was sued for a fatal 1981 car accident in Cache County.

Campbell was driving through Sardine Canyon near Logan when he was hit by a truck, narrowly missing an oncoming car driven by Todd Ospital, 19, who then swerved and hit a van. The driver, Robert Sliuser, 26, was critically injured and Ospital was killed.

The jury's award will be shared with Ospital's parents and with Sliuser, who lost partial use of his right hand.

The Campbell's attorney, Roger Christensen, said the jury's award was "truly gratifying" for the award.

"It's exactly what we had hoped to achieve," he said. "It makes the years the Campbells have maintained the lawsuit worthwhile."

Throughout two months of testimony, Campbell and his attorneys accused State Farm of routinely burying its policyholders nationwide and depriving claimants of fair payments.

After the accident, Sliuser and Ospital's parents sued Campbell, but offered to settle for his \$20,000 insurance policy limit. State Farm refused to settle and took the case to trial in Logan. Campbell denied he was at fault but was assessed \$253,000 in damages. Campbell and his wife then sued State Farm for paying their home and assets at risk instead of settling the lawsuit. Last November, a Salt Lake City jury found State Farm had acted unreasonably. The new jury heard the couple's claims of fraud and intentional infliction of emotional distress and requests for damages.

Utah wild fire forces evacuation of campers, cabins, summer homes

WANSHIP, Utah (AP) — A fast-moving wild fire raged through timbered dry scrubland Thursday afternoon, forcing evacuation of 800 people from a high desert canyon before flames brought the flames to a halt.

The fire, burning three miles west of this mountain community near Silver Creek, had topped 100 acres and was moving fast from the edge of the mountain. A small canyon, within first reported at 12:45 p.m. said Summit County sheriff's dispatcher Dana Shaw.

Evacuation orders went out at 1 p.m. as the fire reached 150 acres, and firefighters moved quickly to contain it. Firefighters used water trucks and pumps to fight the fire.

By 4:45 p.m., crews completed fire containment lines around the blazes, and though flames

came within a mile of cabins, none were burned.

"The danger appears to be over," Shaw said, but added authorities were not immediately allowing evacuees to return. They won't be allowed back until the fire is completely out.

The girls remained at area church buildings, Shaw said.

Sheriff's Lt. Louis Stevens said that about 80 people in the Pine Meadows Ranch development in Tollgate Canyon, just south of the fire, were not being allowed to return to their cabins Thursday night for fear high winds would kick up the flames. The ranch has about 200 summer homes.

"We came up here to get away from the stress," said Colleen Sorenson of Salt Lake, who was spending the week at a family cabin with her three sisters. The foursome hadn't decided where they would spend the night.

Sorenson said there hadn't been a wildfire in the area in the past five years.

Crews and equipment from Wanship, about 25 miles east of Salt Lake City, and neighboring Park City and Coalville were joined by state and Interagency Fire Center personnel in attacking the blaze. About 60 firefighters battled the flames, aided by fire-retardant bearing air tankers.

Control of the fire was expected by late Thursday night.

Near the Pine Meadow Ranch development, about two-dozen residents who fled the flames stood near the canyon exit watching the smoke in the distance and air tankers circling overhead.

"We're not too close to the fire, but flames can move fast, so you worry about it," said Bill Groot, 47, of Sandy, who is putting the finishing touches on a cabin in the area.

Judges' trip to Idaho costs pretty penny

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A annual trip by dozens of judges and other court officials to southern Idaho's Sun Valley resort is costing Utah taxpayers more than \$200,000 a year, a newspaper reports.

In a copyright story published Thursday, the Deseret News said its inquiry showed: the same meetings could be accommodated at less than half the current \$1.5 million cost of the Sun Valley resort.

The trek to the resort 323 miles to the north began as early as 1981 when the Utah State Bar invited the judiciary to attend its annual meetings at Sun Valley.

Meeting, judges' and court administrators defend the trip, saying they not only take care of routine business while there but also present workshops to bar members and interact with them, socially.

Critics say the goals of camaraderie and feedback can be met

once a year, at half the Sun Valley expense, during the bar's semi-annual meeting in St. George.

State Sen. Howard Stephenson, who is also director of the Utah Taxpayers Association, says the trip can only reinforce "a growing mood among legislators that the judicial branch is becoming greedy when it comes to spending taxpayer dollars."

This annual junket to Sun Valley is a symbol of that greediness, Stephenson said.

Stephenson said revelations about the Sun Valley trip came at a time when the judiciary is seeking pay raises and new judgeships.

"If the judicial branch expects the continued support through appropriations of the necessary spending, they'd better make sure the discretionary spending is kept within reasonable boundaries," he said. "I

don't think this annual junket to Sun Valley is reasonable."

"Supreme Court Chief Justice Michael D. Zimmerman says the trip is a vital exercise in collegiality."

"It's clearly a judgment call. We could have meetings in Salt Lake, but it wouldn't fulfill any of the functions we're interested in because you wouldn't have lawyers there," he said.

# Commissioners hire prosecutor for murder cases

**RUPERT** - Minidoka County Commissioners agreed Thursday to hire a special prosecutor to help in three murder cases, but it won't pay him.

Former Minidoka County Prosecutor John Bradley will help Gara Newman in the cases against accused killers Corey Hood, Jesus Diaz and Kody Butcher, if the Idaho Supreme Court allows the county prosecutor to proceed in the cases.

A decision from the Supreme Court on who will prosecute the cases - Newman or the Idaho attorney general's office - is still pending. Pena argued last month on Newman's behalf before the Supreme Court last month, opposing Attorney General Alan Lance's attempt to take over the Minidoka County cases.

Since Newman invited him into the fray in June, Pena has been a leader in the county prosecutor's battle against the attorney general's office.

But Pena was not under contract with the county at that time, or later when he represented Newman before the Supreme

Court. The commissioners had filed a petition in support of Lance's intervention.

County commissioners since last week have toyed with the idea of not paying Pena for his time.

Chairman John Remsburg said the commissioners will decide whether to pay Pena when they receive a bill.

A bill from Pena has not been delivered yet, Newman said.

"I don't even know if he'll submit a bill," Commissioner John "Bert" Stevenson said.

Pena's status as special prosecutor was not discussed Thursday in a department, budget meeting between Newman and the commissioners. The commissioners approved Newman's request to hire Bradley at \$100 an hour.

In an agreement that may speed up a Supreme Court decision, the commissioners told Newman they would not appeal Burdick's decision. Burdick ruled against the commissioners last week, preventing Lance's office from keeping up on the case.

Newman said the Supreme Court may have been waiting for the appeal issue to be sorted out before issuing a decision.

the next 40 years in return for a court-ordered timetable for cleanup and removal of waste by 2035. The government had planned to dump 1,940 more shipments in Idaho before the agreement was signed.

But critics claim it is so riddled with loopholes that the government will be able to renege on cleanup and removal requirements while using Idaho as the nation's de facto radioactive dump.

Beal warns that voiding the deal will only mean more waste being dumped in the state with no guarantees - or cash - for cleanup and eventual removal.

From April through the end of June, Stop the Shipments raised \$63,000. In addition to the cash from Willis, who has been outspoken against the Bann deal, Thomas Hornel contributed \$10,000 and Rampa and Jay Hornal gave \$5,000.

Teresa Heinz, the widow of Pennsylvania Republican Sen. John Heinz who married Democratic Sen. John Kerry of Massachusetts, contributed \$5,000. It is not her first involvement in Idaho public policy disputes. Officials in the Democratic administration of former Gov. Cecil Andrus blamed Heinz, who has a home in the Sun Valley area, with helping torpedo their training

range expansion plan for Mountain Home Air Force Base. The campaign also received \$5,000 contributions from both the Western Spouses Center of Portland and Paul Brainerd of Seattle.

But the campaign closed out June with \$13,400 in unpaid bills and only \$4,600 in the bank. In addition to paying \$34,500 to Kimball Position Management in California for signatures, Stop the Shipments shelled out another \$30,000 for four paid staff members and consultant Norma Douglas, who led the effort along with former state Sen. John Peavey. It also spent over \$11,000 on newspaper advertising.

## Board sees Mindoka school repairs

**RUPERT** - Fresh coats of paint, air conditioning, new carpets and sturdier lockers are just a few of the improvements awaiting Minidoka County students when they return to class Aug. 26.

The school district spent more than \$225,000 during the 1995-96 school year for improvements on all 10 schools in the district for the upcoming school year.

Most improvements were completed this summer - just in time for the first day of school.

"We're hoping 99 percent of this will be done by the time students return later this month," said Assistant Superintendent Bob Pavlock. "We've definitely got a lot done this year, and I think the kids will be pleased."

Pavlock toured eight of the 10 schools Thursday with Minidoka County School Board members.

The five-hour tour was designed to give the board a look at the improvements - and to decide what needs to be done in the next year.

"We want to be real careful what we do so we don't have to re-do anything later," said Superintendent Nick Hallett. "What we need to do now is look at the big picture and decide what improvements will help us the most."

Hallett said the age of some buildings, coupled with overcrowding problems, has made the task of maintaining the schools a difficult one for the district.

"We have too many kids in some of the schools and the buildings they're in are real old, and that catches up to you," Hallett said. "But we will get there."

They'll operate out of an office at 834 Falls Avenue.

KSAW - and KIVI - are owned by Sawtooth Communications, long a fixture in the Twin Falls market.

Besides KSAW, KMVT and KXII, Twin Falls other TV stations are KIVI, an affiliate of Boise NBC station KIVB, and KIFT, the translator station for Idaho Public Television in the Magic Valley.

value. Typically, each party in a contention will hire an appraiser to determine a value. If the values differ, a court will resolve the difference.

There is no time limit on condemnation. LTV purchased on the SNRA can be defended at any time, if they are out of compliance with regulations.

Sizmark Village just south of the Sessions store on Highway 75 was condemned in 1992 based on the subdivision regulation.

The Forest Service has spent \$5 million to acquire property since the SNRA's inception, Rinella said, through outright purchase, condemnation, and the purchase of scenic easements.

Piva has come before the Forest Service with two proposals for the parcel. At least one proposal included 16 lots. Both were denied because they did not comply with regulations.

Reaction from Stanley residents was mixed. "The Forest Service has no business saying anything unless their checkbook is on the table," said Larry McCoy, a retired Stanley real estate broker.

McCoy said he is a friend of Piva's, but he said he had not discussed this development with him for more than a year. Piva is trying to establish fair market value for the property through the sale of at least one lot.

"I think the existing guidelines have worked to the public's advantage in protecting against unexamined development," said Erasmo Paolo, manager of a local rafting business. "But I wouldn't want to criticize Mr. Piva's development unless we know what it is."

"I would like the Forest Service to condemn the property. I don't think anybody really wants to see the valley changed, whatever their beliefs in property rights," said Jim Rice.

"Mostly what I hear around town is 'The guy owns the land and he should be able to do what he wants with it,'" Jim Reese said. "These lots would sell like hotcakes."

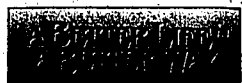

# Critics say Senate bill on nuclear waste is hasty

LAS VEGAS (AP) — An effort by the Senate to send unprecedented amounts of nuclear waste cross-country to Nevada falls to give momentum along the affected rail and train corridors to prepare for the dangers their residents could face, critics say.

The measure approved Wednesday on a 63-37 vote would allow for waste from nuclear power plants to travel through 43 states to a facility — yet to be built — about 100 miles northwest of Las Vegas. The bill failed to get the necessary votes to override an expected veto by President Clinton.

Backers of the proposal argue that the nation's nuclear power plants desperately need to relocate their used reactor fuel and that transportation of the waste would pose little threat to public safety.

Opponents argue that hospitals and emergency workers who would have to respond to an accident during transport — many of them volunteer firefighters — are ill-equipped to handle nuclear spills. The bill would require the Nevada Test Site to start accepting waste on Nov. 30, 1999, which critics say is too soon.

"If eventually we are going to move some of the fuel ... it should not be a hurry," said Larry Olson, an activist with the Washington, D.C.-based Nuclear Information and Resource Service. "It's going to take a lot of preparation. The whole premise of the bill is wrong."

Under the plan, plants would send waste to an interim storage facility at the test site, with the assumption that nearby Yucca Mountain would eventually be found suitable as a permanent repository. State officials have opposed proposals to build

either interim or permanent waste dumps in Nevada.

"There's likely going to be more waste moved in any one year of a 30-year shipping campaign than all shipments to date," said Robert B. Loux, executive director of Nevada's Agency for Nuclear Projects, which was created by the state legislature to oversee federal, high-level nuclear waste activities.

Loux was referring to estimates that it will take 30 years to move the current stockpiled waste. "If people are concerned a little bit about the quantity of hazardous materials out there on highways and railroads, certainly that has to be heightened," he said.

According to a study released by the Loux's agency, four accidents involving commercial spent fuel shipments and two involving research shipments have been recorded since 1971. None involved a breach of integrity.

Loux and others note, however, that those trips have been short and infrequent.

Sen. Larry Craig, a sponsor of the bill, argues there is no need to worry about transportation accidents and says there has been enough discussion and research. "It is important to realize that scientists and engineers at Yucca Mountain have conducted the most thorough and comprehensive geological survey ever undertaken," said Craig. "After \$5-billion expenditures, scientists have found no reason why the site would not be suitable for a permanent waste repository."

Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary sent a letter to Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle arguing that

Yucca Mountain has not been found to be a suitable permanent site, and thus it is premature to send waste to Nevada until that happens.

"It would require a significant investment to begin building an interim storage facility at what may prove to be the wrong site," she said. "Congress is unlikely to fully fund both interim storage and work on the permanent repository solution thereby further jeopardizing the characterization activities at Yucca Mountain."

Nevada's two senators led opposition to the bill, which now faces House scrutiny. Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., questioned the safety of moving waste through hundreds of communities.

"There is simply no compelling need to rush into centralized storage," Reid said. Loux and Olson argue that the

Energy Department, utility companies and local emergency agencies are unprepared for cross-country shipments.

"They note that while rail is the preferred method of transport for nuclear waste, many power plants lack reliable access and roadways that could handle heavy trucks. In addition, the costs to carry the material have not yet been designed and tested. There are about 32,500 metric

tons of uranium at 74 civilian reactor sites, which are expected to generate 85,000 tons more during the next 30 years. Utilities have been waiting for the Energy Department to prepare a permanent repository and complain they are running out of on-site storage space.

## Feds must move on levee repair

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Northern Idaho is recovering from last spring's disastrous floods, but a federal official warns it is doubtful funding will arrive quickly enough to repair levees before the next rainy season.

Local disaster officials said that work must begin by Sept. 1. "It looks to me like everything would have to go like clockwork for this to even be possible," said Al Ames, Idaho representative for the Economic Development Association.

That agency is responsible for releasing \$18 million in supplemental flood relief. Fed by rains and huge snowpack, the Panhandle rivers inundated towns in Kootenai, Benewah and Clearwater counties.

U.S. Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, has invited several top officials to a Friday briefing to discuss expediting release of the flood money.

"We are becoming gravely concerned that much of the levee work will not be completed by or even begin — before the threat of renewed flooding returns," he wrote Tuesday in a letter to Cabinet members.

"Progress to date appears to have been painfully slow." On May 21, more than a month after President Clinton signed the appropriations bill for flood relief, Craig learned the Economic Development Association was not aware of the supplemental funds.

Ames said his agency planned a Thursday meeting to discuss the levee issue.

"I expect the outcome will be that several projects will be sent to the (Army) Corps," Ames said. But that agency's evaluation is expected to take three weeks. Then, Economic Development must identify funds and secure a contractor.

Donald Waller, Lewiston, was arrested last September by Valley County Deputy Scott Denning. The deputy's arrest report said he stopped Waller for speeding, smelled alcohol and marijuana, and a search of the vehicle turned up a hand-rolled marijuana cigarette under a car seat and marijuana in a cooler in the trunk.

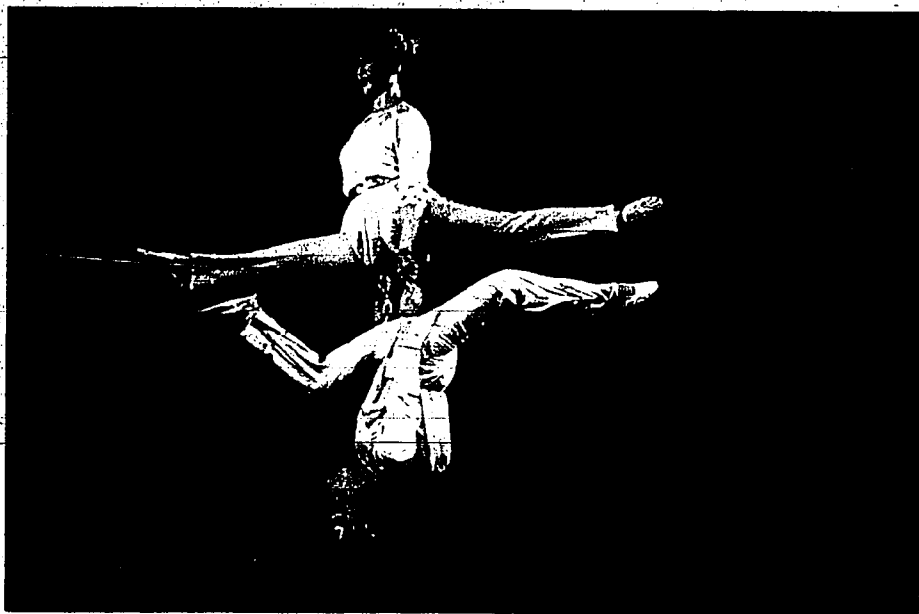

Are superstars worth their pay?

LOS ANGELES — Many things defy logic in Hollywood. Many things defy gravity. But few do both so effectively as salaries of A-list movie stars.

The sky is the limit when it comes to salaries for A-list movie stars, even if the movies do nothing

Bros. makes a deal with Arnold Schwarzenegger to pay him \$20 million plus a percentage of the film's gross revenues plus a huge take in merchandising fees for about eight weeks of work playing Mr. Freeze in the upcoming 'Batman and Robin.' Even for a supporting role,

Schwarzenegger is also getting close to \$5 million on an advance on the merchandising fees that could total another \$10 million, according to studio and industry officials.

It doesn't seem to matter, the fix is in. "Sure, I think movies are too expensive, sure, star salaries are too high, but we live in a very competitive atmosphere, and you have to stay competitive," says Robert Daly, co-chairman of Warner Bros. The Schwarzenegger deal, he says, is just business as usual. "This is not another phase. The Arnold deal is a very good deal for us; it's less than what he usually makes."

"Sprintcase" paid Moore \$12.5 million, more than any female star had received. So far, it has taken in only \$30.2 million. Only about half of that goes back to the studio. You do the math.

"The Cable Guy" put \$20 million in Carrey's bank account, as well as giving him more than 15 percent of the film's adjusted gross receipts. It definitively raised the salary benchmark, but the movie has made only \$57 million so far, according to Exhibitor Relations, a firm that tracks film receipts.

So what happens? This month Warner Bros. releases a new record from the Black Crowes, a band that is taking the influences of others and making their own.

The gorgeous "Better When You're Not Alone" shows a musical growth that is undeniably the Crowes' own sound. Chris Robinson stretches lyrically as well, with a sense of simplicity and self-awareness he has rarely shown since "She Talks To Angels."

Not only that, but both sport soundtracks filled with campy rock 'n' roll cool. But if the music of "Pulp Fiction" was resolutely, absolutely American — from horns to funk to Kool & the Gang to the surf-crazed guitar of Dick Dale — the soundtrack to "Trainspotting" is, appropriately, more diverse and more British.

Sonic scrapbook. Q Frente, (Mammoth/Atlantic). Melbourne, Australia's Frente apparently took much of the criticism of its first album to heart.

Propelled onto the charts by a pillow-soft remake of New Order's beat-heavy "Bizarre Love Triangle," the group was knocked for being all cotton-candy sweetness with absolute musical minimalism. The fact that lead singer Angie Hart barely sounded as if she were out of puberty didn't help.

Now, with a new bass player and a new production team featuring Dave Allen (The Cure) and Cameron McVey (Massive Attack, Neneh Cherry), the band has taken a darker turn in its music.

"Sit On My Hands" sports a whisper of trip-hop, and the nine-minute album closer, "Calmly Kill Me," is light-years beyond the froth of "Bizarre Love Triangle" or "Labour of Love" from the first album.

While the artistic growth is admirable, some problems remain. Hart's vocals can still grow tiresome, and the songs, for all the change in direction, aren't necessarily all that intriguing. This is especially true when compared with other groups, such as Everything But the Girl, working in a similar vein.

Q Cher, "It's a Man's World" (Reprise). What could Cher possibly have been thinking? The woman who brought us camp classics such as "Halfbreed" and "Gypsies, Tramps and Thieves" now wants to be taken seriously as a singer? And especially after the commercials? Oh, well. Whatever.

First off, there's the problem with the title, "It's a Man's World." Hey, everybody knows it's Cher's world; the rest of us just live in it.

Then there's the material. Don Henley's "Not Enough Love In The World?" Doesn't she mean me? Eric Kaz's "I'm Blowin' Away," which has already been definitively covered by Bonnie Raitt and Linda Ronstadt?

Blow out the candles and hang onto your medieval sconces when Cher bellows out the chorus — hell hath no fury like Cher scorned.

Working with six producers

(who overlap on the 11 songs and get in each other's way). Cher seldom rises above the city-synth-pop arrangements. When she does, on Patty Larkin's "Angels Running," she sounds like Toni Braxton barking through a megaphone. Similarly, the rest of the album sounds more overblown than a pair of collagen-injected lips.

If Cher wanted to make a statement by choosing James Brown's classic for the title track (which closes the album), she should have given a listen to Concrete Blonde's version of "Walking In London." Like Johnny Napolitano, that now-defunct band's lead singer, Cher possesses a dusky voice that can penetrate to the dark center of a good song. But while Concrete Blonde mined a bluesy groove to underline the irony of the song being sung by a woman, Cher comes off as just trying to be groovy.

To her credit, Cher is a competent singer and a seemingly smart and funny person who doesn't take it all too seriously. The trouble is, for someone whose pop instincts once made the beat go on, you can now hardly detect a pulse.

Q Jazz Jamaica, "Skaraben" (Hannibal/Ryko). Here's an unusual cocktail: Jamaican musicians playing jazz above ska and reggae rhythms.

Sound odd? It is, but in a pleasant way. Some of what's inside "Skaraben" is a bit reminiscent of the Dirty Dozen Brass Band (now just the Dirty Dozen), a mirth-filled outfit that takes bebop and even modal numbers and renders them New Orleans-style. Likewise, the eight-piece Jazz Jamaica, led by bassist Gary Crosby, keeps its rhythmic integrity while offering some smoothly soaring ensembles and nice solo passages.

Every tune is enjoyable in its own way, and there's a nice variety of approach and tempo. The title tune (a Jamaican take on the Duke Ellington classic "Caravan") is a delightful rump, and a number called "Ramblin'" turns out to be a pulsating call-and-response thing that will prompt more than a few listeners to get up and dance.

Musicianship is fine throughout, with some of the biggies on the Jamaican music scene present. The horn ensemble is razor-

sharp, and look out especially for solo contributions from trombonist Bino Rodriguez, trumpeter Eddie "Ten-Ten" Thornton and guitarist Alan Weekes.

This disc won't be everyone's cup of tea. But if you think you've heard everything — then heard it again — you're in for a refreshing surprise.

Q Miles Davis, "Live Around The World" (Warner Bros.). Miles Davis' last decade — from his return to the stage in June 1981 to his death in September 1991 — often played like an unworthy coda for an extraordinary musical career.

Physically frail and musically spent, Davis came back as the one true jazz superstar and lived it to the hilt. His concerts were more spectacle than musical events. His clothes, his demeanor, his mystique were often more intriguing than his dated variations on electric funk-rock-jazz fusion.

To emphasize matters, Davis, who for most of his career surrounded himself with brilliant, creative musicians from whom he drew inspiration and material, chose for his final run players who were, for the most part, little more than able journey-men.

The results are in evidence in "Live Around the World," a collection of 11 songs recorded between 1988 and 1991. The music is solid rather than inspiring.

There are many tight grooves, nice mood passages but few compelling, fresh ideas and no great surprises.

Davis' muted lyricism and heart-breaking tone — at once tough and vulnerable — are still there, however.

Check "Mr. Pastorius" or "Hannibal," a piece called from his last performance. And in Cyndi Lauper's "Time After Time," played like a lament, at a funeral pace, Davis gives a lesson in playing like a saint.

Throughout, his band is proficient but unremarkable. The exception happens in "Human Nature" (yes, the Michael Jackson hit), in which Davis is erratic but the group cooks, especially saxophonist Kenny Garrett, by far the best musician in this lot.

Ultimately, "Live Around the World" plays like a fair snapshot of the waning days of a once-great artist.

'Matilda': The dark side of kids

"You smart, you're dumb. You big, you're little. You're right, you're wrong." Danny DeVito says, summing up "Matilda" as a tale on parench/child relations.

Played by the grave, matter-of-fact Mara Wilson ("Mrs. Doubtfire"), Matilda is a bright girl whose rotten parents (DeVito and R. R. a F e r i n a ) don't care about her. But, with the help of books, Matilda gets back at them and at Mrs. Trunchbull, the sweaty, gin-blossomed shotputter who presides over Matilda's school in the same way that Idi Amin presided over Uganda.

Based on a children's story by Roald Dahl ("James and the Giant Peach"), "Matilda" ably captures his peculiar mix of sentiment and horror. Dahl's sensibility is closer to Stephen King than Dr. Seuss, and parents may be surprised by the movie's darkness, particularly in the school scenes ("You're too small," Trunchbull barks at a second grader, just before grabbing her by the pigtail and tussling her 100 yards.

DeVito, who also directed, fills "Matilda" with wildly exaggerated scenes that are a little scary, a little bit funny and a lot like the way kids tell stories. It's also suffused with sadness (Matilda is, after all, a neglected child) and with the hope that a smart, imaginative person can figure out how to make her life better.

Dahl's book is slight, so "Matilda" runs out of story after about 45 minutes. And it would be easier to relate to Matilda if she didn't have magical powers — they're a metaphor for the special qualities we all have, but how many of us can list telekinetics as one of our qualities?

In the end, with its messages about self-sufficiency and about responding to familial rejection by creating another family more to your liking, "Matilda" may be one of those children's movies that is really for wonderful adults.

It's not where you come from that is important, Matilda learns. It's where you are going.

# Colbert: The last of Golden Age's superstars

A memorial service will be held for Claudette Colbert Saturday at her Barbados home, shown above. The Parisian-born star died Tuesday, surrounded by friends at this home after a Oscar-winning career as a Hollywood actress.

Back in the days when movie stars made more than one film every year or two, Claudette Colbert, who died Tuesday at the age of 50 on Sept. 25, was one of the few who made more than one film each year, as in 1933 and 1935. She was turning out two or three movies a year that we still remember.

She won her only best-actress Academy Award earlier in her career in her first year, 1934, for her role in Frank Capra's "It Happened One Night." That same year, 1934, she was a wonderful playmate of the Nile in Cecil B. DeMille's "Cleopatra," as well as the heroine of the first season of Fannie Hurst's durable soap opera, "Imitation of Life."

But the richest period was still to come. Once she started working with John Ford, Mitchell Leisen, Billy Wilder, Charles Brackett and Preston Sturges, she turned out classic after classic.

Her husband's golden year, 1935, she played Henry Fonda's poorer wife in Ford's "Drums Along the Mohawk," James Stewart's bossy in W.S. Van Dyke's "It's a Wonderful World," and Elizabeth Taylor's mother in her father in George Cukor's "Zaza."

The classic movie that might have turned things around for Joseph L. Mankiewicz's "All About Eve" (1950), went to Bette Davis, who turned it into her comeback vehicle. Colbert had to bow out when she was

injured during the making of "Three Came Home," landing in the hospital with a ruptured disc. "I cried for two years over that," she told interviewer Harry Haun. "Joe's idea originally was that Anne Baxter as a young girl looked very much

# Pacino's 'City Hall,' 'Homeward Bound 2' reach video store shelves

New videos in Twin Falls stores this week:

**"City Hall" (R)** — In the opening moments of Harold Becker's "City Hall," we are introduced to a handful of people about to converge at an intersection in Brooklyn, where a stray bullet from a sudden shootout between a cop and a drug dealer will leave a 6-year-old black child dead.

The incident, which brings into question police procedure and aims a finger at a possible rogue cop, will be more than a public relations nightmare for the city. It will be the proverbial thread that unravels the fabric of government, links politicians and the courts with organized crime and takes us to another intersection where idealism will get mugged by cynicism.

Sounded vaguely familiar? The screenplay, by Ken Lipper, once a deputy mayor for former New York Mayor Ed Koch, and old pro Paul Schrader, Nicholas Pileggi and Ed Goldman, has more than a passing resemblance to Tom Wolfe's "The Bonfire of the Vanities." The two stories dissect different organs of the body politic, but, besides their New York settings, they share a simple, irresistible dramatic device: a chance event involving minorities that sets off a devastating chain reaction.

"City Hall" is told from the point of view of Kevin Callahan (John Casack), an idealistic, prematurely arrogant bureaucrat who, while trying to help his boss deal with the shooting crisis, becomes caught up in something miles over his head. Al Pacino is the dynamic Mayor John Pappas; a man whose fiery passions are tempered by cool pragmatism, Danny Aiello is the slickly creepy political boss with mob connections, and Richard Fonda shows up in a role that must have been excoriated in the editing room, as a wide-eyed defense attorney. (Knight-Ridder Newspapers) (Video West, Blockbuster, Hastings)

"Homeward Bound 2" (G) — Giving voice to a dog's inner life is probably a noble pursuit, so it's inspiring to hear Michael J. Fox straining against his tether to do so in "Homeward Bound II: Lost in San Francisco" — even if the film exhibits a bit too much physical evidence of a dog's inner life to suit me, or to suggest that you eat before seeing it.

Not that I'm suggesting, of course, anything of the kind. With dialogue that would have been rejected by "America's Funniest Home Videos," a comic device that was worn out well before seeing it, "Homeward Bound II" is the kind of movie that gives "family film" a bad name. Children may giggle (especially at the pee and vomit scenes) but none of them will be old enough to attend without a tortured adult. So this is not a victimless movie.

# David Ball rolls in country niche

In his current country single, David Ball laments, "I'm just a square in her circle of friends." Ball also has been kind of a square peg in Nashville, Tenn., circles as well, until his "Thinkin' Problem" got him attention in 1994.

"Yeah, I guess I always have been," Ball, 40, says over the phone from Philadelphia.

But the veteran of honky-tonks has found a good fit on his current tour, opening for a similar maverick in country music, Dwight Yoakam.

"He's got a lot of songs he's written that I think I could have written on a good day," Ball, whose new album is "Mirror Ball," says of his label-mate Yoakam. "I like a lot of his stuff. That song he wrote with Roger Miller, 'I Only Hurts Me When I Cry,' gets to me. He puts out some classic country stuff."

Ball's own writing isn't so bad either. Like a lot of country writers, his tunes often provide a scenario and a twist. But rather than using a broad, double-meaning lyric, his wordplay is more subtle while retaining heartfelt intent.

The tag line for a standout breakup song on "Mirror Ball" says: "I've made it through a lot of winters. But I'll never make it through this fall."

Ball's love for music — and lyric emphasis — came via an unusual road, by playing upright bass in a folk group in the '70s in Spartanburg, S.C., where he grew up.

"He had been influenced up to then by pop hits on the radio. 'I remember one of the first records I bought was a Ricky Nelson thing. I got hit a little bit with Elvis and Jerry Lee Lewis. It wasn't so much country then."

# Teen-ager LeAnn Rimes' album debuts at top spot

A 13-year-old from Garland, Texas, lassoed the music world Thursday.

LeAnn Rimes, country music's newest singing sensation, saw her first major-label album, "Blue," debut at No. 1 on Billboard's country chart. And even more surprising, it enters the pop album chart at No. 4 after selling a whopping 124,000 copies its first week in stores.

That could make "Blue" the biggest debut by a new country artist ever. Billboard reports that it's definitely the biggest since May 1991, when SoundScan began monitoring record sales.

Billy Ray Cyrus' first album, 1992's "Some Gave All," sold 90,000 copies in its first week. Even Wynonna, who made her name with mom Naomi in the Judds, sold a mere 121,000 copies of her self-titled solo debut in week one that year.

"It's really cool, I still can't believe it's happening," Rimes said Thursday from a tour stop in Kansas City. "I can't get over this. I never expected it. They kept telling me, 'It's going to do this' and 'It's going to do that,' but I never thought it actually would."

All this from the youngest female artist to hit the country charts since Tanya Tucker and Marie Osmond more than 20 years ago.

"There's nothing typical about this 13-year-old," says Wade Jensen, country chart manager for Billboard magazine. "... A combination of factors led up to this: the novelty of an artist able to perform vocally that way at such a young age, and the first single on this

But in the '60s, he points out, country was part of the whole Top 40 mix. "We'd hear everything, and that included a lot of Roger Miller."

# TAFKAP 2 release last record 4 Warner Bros.

Is anybody waiting for the new album by The Artist Formerly Known as Prince (TAFKAP)?

Probably not, though "Chaos and Disorder" (Warner Bros.) is the kind of guitar-driven work that many fans have been clamoring for. But this appropriately titled album carries too much contractual baggage, and feels like what it is: a 20th and final album that closes out the artist's 18-year relationship with Warner Bros.

In recent years, that relationship became particularly fractious as Prince changed his name to an unpronounceable symbol (and was thereafter referred to either as Prince or TAFKAP) and stopped performing Prince-era material in concert. It was a two-way disassociation. Warner Bros. dropped TAFKAP's Paisley Park label when it proved hits. Last year's "Gold Experience" album hasn't itself experienced gold (sales of 500,000 copies), and the soundtrack for Spike Lee's "Grid 5," a mix of mostly old recordings, has yet to break the 100,000 plateau.

In the CD booklet for "Chaos and Disorder," TAFKAP writes: "originally intended 4 private use only, this compilation serves as the last original material recorded by TAFKAP 4 warner brothers records — may u live 2 see the dawn." What's apparent is that some of the tracks here barely lived 2 see the day, while others have been cannibalized from assorted TAFKAP side projects. "Zannalee," for instance, is a fairly straightforward blues recorded in 1993 for the "Glam Slam Ulysses" musical and, like "The Same December," a rocky anthem to brotherhood, previously existed only as a video

shown before TAFKAP's 1995 concert.

"The Same December" is one of the more interesting tracks, blessed with a monster hook and a catchy chorus, as well as TAFKAP's familiar Utopian take on race relations ("We all came from the same December" and in the end that's where we'll go so let's go"). But after kicking off with full-throttle, big-band rock energy, the song shifts into a bluesy grind, its ambitions betrayed by a lack of focus. That's a problem that undermines other tracks, as well.

The title track features a raw

voiced TAFKAP riding an appropriately rolling arrangement that seems equal parts Booker T. & the MG's and Lenny Kravitz (the Kravitz association also applies to the brisk but predictable "I Like It There"). The soft-spoken ballads "Into the Light" and "I Will" are both slight, lacking the emotional commitment of the artist's best work. On "Right the Wrong," TAFKAP surfaces with an odd Midwestern accent to address injustices on reservations elsewhere, but the track meanders all over the place and, with its brass-fueled insistence, sounds like an off-kilter Up With People number.

For most of the album, TAFKAP's guitar is at the forefront, reminding us of how good he can be. It is absent on one of two Minneapolis funk outings, "Dig U Better Dead," where terse rhythms and a groove with disco than Descartes, unfortunately. Resistant to corporate control and creative interference ("I don't need you to tell me ..."), the singer pouts that "whether I am right or wrong/I sing the song/the best I can." The album is lost as the song wanders all over the map and goes on for far too long.

"Chaos and Disorder" ends with a pitiful 30-second kiss-off to Warner Bros. "Had it" clearly aims at providing an emotional bookend to Prince's 1978 debut, "For You," and while it catalogues hopes and disappointments in sensual-sexual terms, it's quite clear that creative freedom is what the writer has on his mind.

# Women musicians deal with Morissette shadow

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Alanis Morissette, Alanis Morissette, Alanis Morissette.

There. Most women rock artists who emerged in the months after "You Oughta Know" already expect to hear that name mentioned in connection with their careers, so it's best to get it out of the way early.

Morissette has become such a phenomenon in one year that her legacy represents both an opportunity and burden for many singers. Tracy Bonham and Patti Rothberg are two cases in point.

On the one hand, the music industry's follow-the-leader devotion to trends means it's a good time to be a young female songwriter, particularly one who writes bluntly about life experiences.

Yet, it also can be difficult for such a writer to establish her own identity and fight through the suspicion that she's taken cues from Morissette, even with marked differences in style and outlook.

If there's one thing that unites Bonham particularly angry, it's being lumped in with a supposed movement of "angry young females."

"It's so ignorant and shallow," she recently told Billboard. "It's an ongoing thing, and I constantly have to defend myself. People would think that I'm angry just because they hear me scream. They obviously didn't listen well. People just don't know how to handle it if a woman uses swears and brains."

Bonham, a 28-year-old classically trained violinist who made her name on the Boston music scene, bears little resemblance to a certain former Canadian teen singer turned professional songwriter.

Actually, she does slyly take a peek to task on her debut album, but it's Courtney Love and not Morissette. Bonham, who's not

retained to the former lead singer's drummer, she described "Aston" as a song about a performer who tries to make a name for herself.

In her sophomore song "Mother Mother," she compares a child's quest to measure momentum to making it in the big city, before the main-loudly person: "I'm banging, I'm dirty, I'm losing my mind. Everything's fine."

The similarities to Morissette? Yes, she says she sees them.

"New York City (album) inspired Rothberg, 23, was the closest link by the woman with her own manager. Her debut album, "Between the 11 and the 12" refers to the subway lines near where she lives.

Rothberg's music is more folk-pop than Bonham's. With the charm of her best-known songs, such as "Iris," she has a soft clarity ("we are all a little something"), it's really a kind song, always.

Any Morissette comparisons may come from the blunt snarl of "This Rock Mix," in which she roars in revenge. "I could say that you were saying dig

but that's not inside to the fence," she says.

Rothberg was halfway through recording her album when she first saw the video to Morissette's "You Oughta Know."

"I was like, 'Wow. Who's this girl? I was totally supportive of it,'" she recalled.

Little did she know how much she'd hear Morissette's name every time she started talking to people about her own music. Her favorite interview stopper: How are you any different than Alanis?

"Well, OK, I'm not," she said. "I can't like a cheap imitation. It's not like we're manufactured."

Sometimes it seems that way. Many mainstream radio stations have responded to Morissette's success by opening slots for women who occasionally direct music, and don't think people who make records haven't noticed. "The record industry is full of lemmings," said Marc Dark, music director of the alternative rock station WQXR in Manhattan, N.Y.

Certainly there's a proliferation of product with similar themes. Watch your back, man.

# Slow, steady progress key to Blues Traveler success

Despite "Four," an album that has sold 4 million, Blues Traveler remains somewhat perplexed when the things the band touches turn to gold. Or platinum. Or more.

Including the H.O.R.D.E. festival.

After being written off as a poor man's imitation of Lollapalooza, the festival finds itself in 1996 having more commercial success than its forerunner. And with performers that include McShell Nucleo, it's arguably more musically adventurous than the Soundgarden/Rancid/Metallica act anchoring Lollapalooza.

So naturally, Blues Traveler is looking to get out of it. Too much work.

Hey, this was just a scam so they could party outside in the summer with their friends. Who knows it would take off?

"It's such a massive amount of work to get done every year that we're really thinking about getting out of that end of it," said guitarist Chaz Kinchla, relaxing backstage at the H.O.R.D.E. stop in Austin, Texas, a few hours before going onstage.

The idea was to get enough bands in one spot to justify a festival. Neither Blues Traveler nor any of its cohorts — Fish, the Spin Doctors, Bela Fleck — were big enough to pull off anything like that on their own.

"We wanted to get together and put on a show that would allow us to play outdoors during the summer instead of these (dive) little clubs," Kinchla said.

It worked. Unfortunately, success is sometimes much more complicated and time-consuming than failure.

"If you do a bad job, you usually find yourself pretty bored pretty quickly. Life is not boring, and that's good. But (success) demands that you examine your priorities. Being promoters isn't necessarily why we got into this," Kinchla said. "Obviously, we're

real happy the way it has worked out, but it may be time to pass the torch."

Not that Blues Traveler has any intention of not being on H.O.R.D.E. next year or the one after that. After years of struggling in New York City, the success that its bluesy rock has brought with "Four" and hit songs such as "Hook" and "Runaround" remains sweet.

A new double live album, "Live From the Fall," has re-emphasized the band's prowess as a live jamming, touring unit. It's a different attitude in a rock world where many performers complain bitterly about the toll of touring.

"One of the great things about H.O.R.D.E. is the lineup is constantly rotating. There are always new bands to see," Kinchla said.

"It's your own little world out there in these venues, and I've got a limited time that goes everywhere."

The success has also taken the tour all over the United States, after starting as an East Coast phenomenon.

"I've always enjoyed Lollapalooza myself, and I wouldn't compare us to them in any way. But I'm real pleased we've been able to get the interesting lineups we have over the past couple of years," Kinchla said. "I really love the way H.O.R.D.E. has grown, to be on equal footing with Lollapalooza."

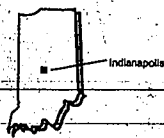

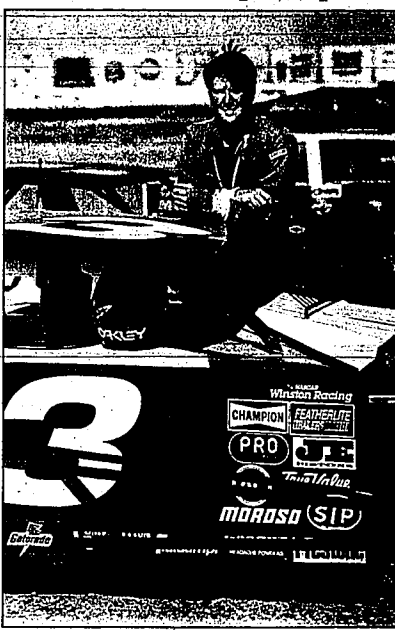
He drove a pair of Plymouths to those two championships.

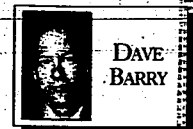

# Bidders seek Las Vegas history

## Sands Hotel-Casino auctions off memories

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Buyers eager to own a piece of Las Vegas history took a number Tuesday and began bidding on items ranging from coin buckets to craps tables at the shuttered Sands Hotel-Casino.

"I really said," said Shirley Scott, a longtime Las Vegas art and watch-and-jewelry collector who watched entertainment giants perform at the resort in another era.

"It's sad, but it's progress," said Sands owner Sheldon Adelson, who slipped quietly into the back of the hotel's ballroom to watch the start of the auction.

Adelson plans to build a \$1.5 billion, 6,000-room Venetian-themed resort on the site when the 44-year-old Sands is demolished later this year. The 720-room hotel closed June 30.

Two San Francisco auction companies — Butterfield & Butterfield, and Rabbin Brothers — are selling off thousands of pieces of gaming equipment, furniture and memorabilia Thursday and Wednesday.

Scott was on hand to bid on some slot and video poker machines for her casino, the Alamo Club, in tiny Fitch, Nev., northeast of Las Vegas. She was also on hand to relive some special memories.

"We used to come and see the Rat

Pack perform in the 1960s," she recalled, talking softly in the back of the dimly lit ballroom as photos of auction items flashed on giant screens in the room.

"They were awesome," she said of Rat Packers Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin, Sammy Davis Jr., Jay Byrd and Peter Lawford. "I don't want to see the place come down, but I suppose everything has to go."

"A piece of Las Vegas history is going, going, gone," said Michael Hackman, a Rabbin representative. One Sands blackjack dealer hoped to buy the table where he worked for 40 years, Hackman said.

The thousands of items — ranging from cases of hotel shampoo, to chandeliers from the famous Copa Room, to the resort's marquee — are expected to bring \$2 million to \$3 million, Hackman said.

Celebrities such as Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme, who performed at the resort, have checked out the property for items of interest.

"We've gotten calls from managers, agents and galleries of stars, asking about whether certain memorabilia is available," said Pat Walsh, a spokesman for the auctioneers.

"Steve and Eydie have called," he

added. "They took a nostalgic stroll through the casino while we were doing the inventory, apparently for a while."

Ahmed Elchik, general counsel for Rabbin, watched potential buyers fill the ballroom where a long list of stars have performed.

"Where are people here who just want a piece of Las Vegas, a piece of the Rat Pack era," Elchik said. "They want something that's reminiscent of a bygone era."

Not so for everyone. Bill McCallahan was on hand to bid on coin-wrapping machines and Lee Williams wanted to pick up some equipment for a restaurant he is opening.

Tuesday's sale included casino equipment, with hotel furnishings and memorabilia scheduled for sale Wednesday.

Representatives of casinos, including some from as far away as Monte Carlo and South Africa, looked at the gaming equipment. Smaller hotels and motels were interested in the furnishings. Scott watched the screen for the items she wanted, and accounted the 1950s, when her husband, Harry, did memory work at the Sands. Frontier and Desert Inn — then owned by the late investment Howard Hughes. "These were special memories," she sighed. "What fun times we had."

# Many in 20s can't find suitable work despite job-creation stats

WASHINGTON — Rhonda McGee hung up the phone with a frustrated sigh.

"That was my number 40 in two months," she said. "And still no job." McGee, age 24, has spent the past several months sending out resumes and sending newspapers for job openings in professional sales. A former international-business major, she dropped out of Howard University here after 2,172 years to focus on making enough money to raise her son.

Now McGee is one of nearly 1.25 million young adults between the ages of 20 and 24 who can't find work — at a time when the government says job creation is booming and many employees complain they can't find enough workers.

"For the kids coming out of school who know they should be in the work force — who have every right to be in the work force — and they're sending a loud and clear message about self-worth," said Keith Johnson, project director for the Michigan Job Corp placement program in Detroit.

Job opportunities in computer programming, Internet services and engineering are bursting at the seams, employers and labor-market analysts say. But many young people don't have the technical skills or experience to fill those jobs.

The rest of the jobs going begging are at the bottom rung of the service industry at fast food and janitorial businesses. And many people in their 20s, especially those

who have attended college, feel these jobs beneath them.

The employment picture is especially bleak for racial minorities. America's 2.5 million black citizens between 20 and 24 faced an unemployment rate of 19 percent for the second quarter of this year — more than twice the 7.9 percent figure for out-of-work whites. Just over 11 percent of Hispanics in the same age range were unemployed. The total unemployment rate was 5.4 percent.

Even minorities with a college degree face a higher rate of unemployment than white graduates, a fact they often chalk up to discrimination and stereotypes.

"For minorities, whether they're doing good or bad in school, a recruiter is going to prefer a white person to an African-American, to a Hispanic," said Raul Santa, program manager for Recruit America, a Dallas-based organization that provides free training in interviewing, resume writing and computer literacy for job seekers. "If they take people with the same, same qualifications, and one is white and one black, they will take the white person every time. We help them out of that rut."

Minorities also contend with a greater incidence of childhood poverty and inadequate resources — both at school and home, said Shirley McBay, president of the Quality Education for Minorities Network, a non-profit student outreach program. For many, this is accompanied by a lack of connections, opportunities, information and self-esteem, she said.

Regardless of race, many cash-strapped young adults — with their resumes listing prior work experience — contend that the reality of the job market is not nearly as flush as the government suggests.

One recent college graduate, who asked not to be identified, said his unsuccessful job search in financial consulting has been frustrating and embarrassing. Now months into his application process, he has plastered the walls of his bedroom with more than 40 response letters. Each begins: "We regret to inform you..."

Marlen Villatoro, a 21-year-old living in Oceanside, Calif., said she also experienced a dry spell in her employment search.

"They'd look at my young face and say, 'No, no job,'" Villatoro said. "They would quickly add, 'This job needs 10 years of experience,' and I hadn't even asked for an application yet."

That's exactly the point, the bureaucrats argue: many of the job openings require highly skilled workers in technological fields, for which liberal-arts college graduates are not necessarily qualified.

"I wouldn't hire someone out of college even if they have computer training, because it's not cost-effective for me," said Tom Zarek, general manager at the Computer Clinic Center in Washington. "Since the computer industry is the hottest market right now, everybody takes a training course and thinks they know the field, but in reality they don't. Only take people with experience or who are willing to spend six months in training."

# Security for the living: How you can make sure your living will works

DENVER (AP) — Living wills and their companion legal instrument — the power of attorney — have been widely recommended in recent years as a standard part of any estate plan.

In theory, they can go a long way toward relieving the psychological and emotional stress, and the financial burden, during a terminally ill patient's last days.

Yet a recent medical study has questioned the effectiveness of these documents.

A living will is a written document in which people express what life-sustaining care they want in the event of terminal illness or permanent unconsciousness.

Nearly every state has passed a living will statute in some form, and the federal Patient Self-Determination Act of 1990 directs hospitals to inform patients that they have the right to refuse life-saving treatment if they are near death.

The health-care-directive power of attorney — also known as the health-care proxy — authorizes a family member, typically a family member or a close friend, to make competent health-care decisions for someone who is unable to do so because of terminal illness. The agent often looks to the living will for guidance.

Not only can these legal instruments provide guidance for family members at a difficult emotional time, they can be financially important, too. Huge medical bills, not all of them covered by insurance, can be run up during the last days of a patient's life, perhaps needlessly, if

the patient desires not to have life artificially extended.

Thirty-one percent of patients who die in a hospital spend all or most of their family savings, according to a study by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation of Princeton, N.J.

The study, conducted by the nation's largest philanthropy devoted exclusively to health and health care, found that the vast majority of wishes expressed in living wills were not carried out by doctors.

Among the various reasons: poor communication, misplacement of the will, administrative delays in converting the will to a doctor's order, the reluctance of the family to carry out the patient's wishes, and, most problematically, interpretation of the living will's language by doctors and the family.

"The problem with living will statutes and the language of living wills themselves is in defining what terminally ill means in medical and legal terms," said Greg Parish, an academic assistant at the College for Financial Planning, a division of the National Endowment for Financial Education.

"With medical technology changing all the time, what once was certain death may no longer be certain death," he said.

"What's described in the living will may no longer be what one is looking at in the hospital?" Under these circumstances, Parish said, doctors are reluctant to carry out the perceived — but often vague — wishes in a living

will that might result in a lawsuit.

Parish doesn't believe the presence of a health-care proxy agent necessarily remedies the situation. For one thing, the agent may be reluctant to make a life-and-death decision for a close relative. Parish also believes a living will could complicate the issue for the agent because interpreting the will's language may put the agent in the same legal jeopardy as a doctor or hospital.

Parish recommends several ways to improve the effectiveness of these documents:

- Talk with an estate planning adviser and examine the laws of your state regarding living wills, health-care proxies and do-not-resuscitate documents. Sometimes, the statutes covering these areas conflict.
- Involve relatives so that they understand the wishes of the patient. Even if one person is designated as an agent under a health-care proxy, the involvement of others will lessen potential friction and misunderstanding.
- Be insistent that the doctor and the hospital understand the kind of care desired. Be sure the doctor has a copy of the living will and that the directives of the will have been converted to a doctor's order.
- Avoid a combination of living will and health-care proxy. If the living will is clear enough to stand on its own, an agent isn't needed," Parish said. "If it isn't clear enough, I wouldn't want my decisions as an agent measured against the standards of the living will."

Contact lens wearers due cash settlement

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—Bausch & Lomb has agreed to pay contact lens wearers as much as \$68 million in cash and products to settle claims it cheated them.

The Rochester, N.Y., manufacturer was accused in a 1994 class-action lawsuit of packaging one type of lens under four different names at widely varying prices, leading customers who paid more to think they were getting more.

As many as 15 million buyers of the company's disposable lenses could receive payments ranging from a few dollars to as much as \$100 each, depending on how many lenses they bought, a plaintiff's lawyer said.

"I think this settlement reflects a vindication of the right of consumers to know what they are getting when they buy a product," said Frederic L. Ellis.

While admitting no wrongdoing, Bausch & Lomb agreed to pay customers as much as \$34 million in cash and free products including contact lenses, sunglasses and skin-care items.

U.S. District Judge U.W. Clemon granted preliminary approval Wednesday and scheduled a 26 hearing to determine the fairness of the pact.

In a statement, Bausch & Lomb said it agreed to the deal "in order to focus on moving the company forward" and avoid a drawn-out legal battle.

Ellis said Bausch & Lomb sold its SeeSequence 2 lens under different names, including Medalist, Optima FW and Criterion Ultra FW. Retail prices ranged from \$4 per lens to \$25 a lens and were based on how often the lenses were supposed to be replaced, he said.

Under the settlement, anyone who bought a Medalist, Optima or Criterion lens from 1990 through April would be eligible for refunds ranging from \$2.68 in cash and coupons per lens to \$10.66 per lens.

Bausch & Lomb has since discontinued the Criterion and is selling the SeeSequence 2 and Medalist with the Optima FW name added to the label.

Advertisements will begin appearing in newspapers nationwide on Friday announcing the settlement. The deadline for claims is Feb. 1, 1997.

Stocks continue recovery from July

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market continued to erase July's tumbles on Thursday, rallying broadly as an improving inflation outlook sent long-term interest rates to the lowest level since May.

The Dow Jones industrial average jumped 63.84 points to 5,594.75, giving it a three-day gain of more than 160 points. Earlier in the session, the Dow broke above 5,600 for the first time since last month's sharp dip, and sent the blue-chip average tumbling below 5,200.

But more notable than the Dow's latest exploit was that Thursday's gains were spread across the market, demonstrating some renewed confidence among investors, analysts said.

Rockwell sheds divisions to Boeing

SEAL BEACH, Calif. (AP)—Rockwell International Corp. agreed Thursday to sell most of its aerospace and defense businesses to Boeing Co. in a \$3 billion-plus deal, the latest fallout from the end of the Cold War.

The sale is the latest example of weapons and space specialists getting bigger or getting out of the business.

Boeing, the world's top jetliner maker, commits itself to staying in space and defense.

And Rockwell, once known for B-1 bombers and space shuttles, completes a change to a high-tech conglomerate, a maker of computer systems, factory robots, auto parts, with 43 percent of its sales overseas.

"It is an important day because it launches the new Rockwell," Rockwell Chairman Donald R. Beall told a New York news conference.

He described how efforts to diversify began in the 1980s before the demise of East-West hostilities, when government contracts constituted two-thirds of Rockwell's business but its leaders saw an end to the space shuttle and B-1 programs.

Phil Condit, Boeing's chief executive, said the purchase "accelerates us on our way to achieving our 20-year vision, which calls for Boeing to be a fully integrated aerospace company." He said there is little overlap in operations and minimal layoffs are expected.

Rockwell's aerospace and defense operations employ 21,000 workers, 12,000 of them in Southern California. Boeing will fund its purchase by issuing \$860 million in stock and assuming \$2.2 billion in Rockwell debt.

That in turn will clear Rockwell's balance sheet for it to pursue takeovers, buy back stock and grow its remaining businesses internally, Beall said.

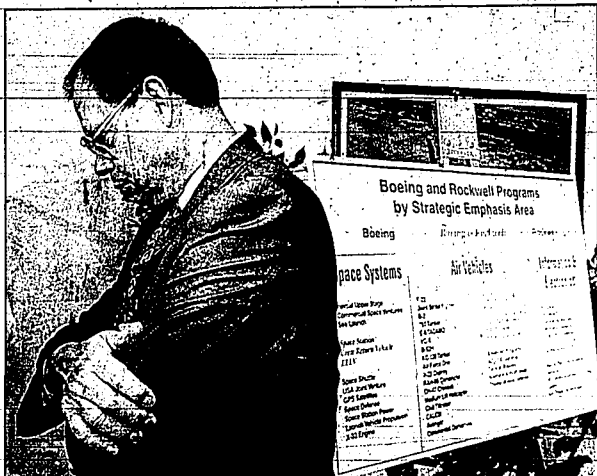

Pre-summer spurt propels U.S. economy

WASHINGTON (AP)—The nation's economy raced ahead at its fastest rate in two years as summer neared, but other reports suggest the pace is slowing and will not need higher interest rates to prevent inflation.

Wall Street rallied on the deceleration news, which reassured investors that the Federal Reserve will not feel constrained to tighten monetary policy this month to keep the economy from overheating.

By early afternoon Thursday, the Dow Jones industrial average was up more than 60 points. The broader stock market and bond prices also posted strong gains.

The gross domestic product, the broadest measure of the nation's economic health, shot up at an annual rate of 4.2 percent from April through June, the Commerce Department reported. It was the steepest since a 4.9 percent rate during the second quarter of 1994.

President Clinton welcomed the report. He called it "good news for America and more evidence that our economy continues to surge ahead and our economic strategy is working. This robust growth... is touching the lives of all our people with 10 million new jobs, low unemployment and inflation in check."

But Christina Martin, a spokeswoman for Republican Bob Dole's presidential campaign, said Clinton's "self-adoration... is a slap in the face of the American taxpayer." She said Clinton is "relying on the first

recovery since World War II to leave the American worker behind."

Other reports issued Thursday suggested the economy may have peaked with the second-quarter result.

The National Association of Purchasing Management reported U.S. manufacturing growth slowed unexpectedly in July, and the overall economy moderated after expanding strongly in June.

The association said its index, based on a survey of purchasing executives at more than 300 industrial companies, fell to 50.2 percent in July from 54.3 percent in June. Economists had been expecting a rise to 55 percent.

At the same time, the Commerce Department said that while construction spending rose 12 percent in June, the advance was limited to nonresidential building.

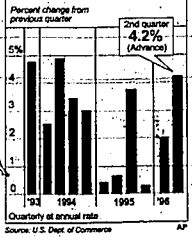
Outlays fell for residential and government projects—together, 70 percent of total spending—down 0.2 percent and 0.5 percent, respectively.

Jerry Jasnowski, an economist and president of the National Association of Manufacturers, likened the GDP report to "a train heading downhill."

"The 4.2 percent increase... overstates the true speed of economic expansion," he contended. "The estimate is based primarily on April-May data, when demand was unusually strong. By comparison, preliminary data for June was much weaker, suggesting that second quarter GDP will be revised downward."

Gross domestic product

The GDP measures all the goods and services produced by workers and capital located in the United States, regardless of ownership.



Airlines begin cutting fares sharply in the off-peak fall season

NEW YORK (AP)—Major airlines have begun slashing fares as much as 40 percent for the early fall travel season, a move that may have more to do with seasonal changes than recent air disasters.

In fact, while some in the industry had worried that air travel might suffer following the recent TWA and ValuJet crashes, that hasn't been the case. Most carriers reported at least three-quarters of their seats filled, typical for the summer months, and advance bookings holding steady.

The passenger load usually drops to

between 60 percent and 65 percent in the fall, and an expert fare watcher says it's not unusual for carriers to drop their prices for the lull just after Labor Day.

"Everyone goes back to school, summer travel comes to an end," said Tom Parsons, editor of the monthly magazine Best Fares in Arlington, Texas.

"I don't think really it has anything to do with the TWA incident," he said. "It was on the drawing boards."

Parsons predicted that fares would continue to drop through the rest of the year

as the airlines embark on another possible fare war.

American Airlines led the way in the latest round of fare cuts by announcing last week's reductions on several international flights starting next month, along with an extension of its fare sale on domestic flights.

Several other airlines—including TWA, United Airlines, Delta, Virgin Atlantic Airways and Lufthansa—have matched American's cuts.

Among the special fares: A 30 percent drop on a midweek flight from New York

to San Juan, to \$260, a 25 percent cut from Miami to Paris, to \$518.

American's discounts ranged from 15 percent to 30 percent off the lowest excursion fare for international tickets purchased through July 25, and 10 percent to 20 percent savings for tickets purchased by Monday.

Discounts on the domestic tickets range from 35 percent to 40 percent off normal peak excursion fares.

Tickets also must be purchased by Monday and travel completed by Jan. 15.

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE

The play of today's game gets routine. After the defense gets two club winners, and an ace is at large, there is getting left with a simple trump finesse. How simple is it?

After ruffing the third club, South leads his heart off to dummy's jack to take the obvious trump finesse. What happens if it leads one of dummy's high trumps?  
East covers to bring good news, but when East discards on the second trump, the news is not good. Now South must lose a trump trick as well as the diamond ace, and the game goes one down.

Had dummy held only one entry, it would be correct to start trumps by leading the 10 pr queen. If East has K-x, dummy must retain the lead. However, since dummy has another quick entry in hearts, it's prudent to start with a low trump from dummy. When East's singleton king appears, South wins and cashes his trump jack. Then he starts the diamond suit. If West wins and leads a troublesome fourth club, South ruffs with his small trump and then starts hearts to draw West's remaining trumps. Finding a singleton king with East is an admitted long shot. However, since the safety play costs nothing and the possible reward is great, why not eliminate the risk?

**ANSWER: ANSWER: Four spades.** No second choice. The singleton king is happy to raise game.

# Drama 'High Incident' out to lasso this summer's audience

"High Incident" is back. Described in press releases as an "arresting and often humorous police drama" (see sidebar), the midweek series is back on the NBC lineup, airing Thursdays. "Incident" was among a trio of dramas that appeared on the Monday schedule to replace "Monday Night Football" last January. The end of football season always leaves NBC a bit bereft on Monday, and in 1995 the network adopted an audition program for the night. Leading off were "Second Step," a serialized family drama with more appeal in women and children than the traditionally male-dominated "ER," and "MAD" (completing the evening

was a refuge from the TV "hospital wars," "Murder One." "Incidentally Halbi" contains some serial was battered and very nearly succumbed in its fall month against NBC's Thursday juggernaut "ER." "The whole thing about Steven is this," Haid says. "He is absolutely collaborative. He is unshakingly enthusiastic about every single thing we are doing. He has been very involved in this. Our relationship — has evolved from sort of employer-employee, on a certain level, to a partnership, really, we're friends." "So we decided to do a little film about people's backyards, what happens out there in the back while they're out of the frame." "The suburbs are no longer a bastion of K-

Mart-shopping white people who eat too much," Haid says. "Everybody gets to live in America now, and this (series) is about everybody living in America." According to Haid, "all of television is constantly rehashing people — someone finds somewhat vaguely familiar from the '80s. Well, we thought we'd just kind of get new people and give 'em a whack." Among them is the son of a former Marlboro man, who came to Haid's attention while he was working at a Southern California coffee shop where the director likes to have breakfast. Indeed, most of the faces on "High Incident" are fresh ones. The biggest star in the cast is David Keith, best known for his supporting role in 1982's "An Officer and a Gentleman."

## Darlene Dahl sympathizes with Anita character

Darlene Dahl, who plays Anita Santos on "All My Children," says that while she can feel some sympathy for her character because of all the pain she's been experiencing this summer. "For me — as an actor — it's been wonderful. I've been getting a lot of emotional stuff to work with. "When I first started,"

Darlene says, "there really wasn't that much for me to work with. For an actor, that can be a little frustrating. But now that they're really writing amazing stuff for me, it's a challenge. And I love it. "And," Dahl added, "it's easy for me. I guess because, I'm emotionally available." Which means, exactly?

"Which means," Darlene said, "that unlike people who are more in control of their emotions, I'm able to open up in front of the camera pretty quickly."

In other words, when the script calls for anything from angst on through the emotional gamut...

"I can have it ready to go when the cameras roll."

Actors who share this dramatic gift with Darlene say it's a mixed blessing; while it's great to be able to react to what a script calls for quickly, it can often take some time to shed the emotion after the scene ends.

"That's not a problem for me," Darlene said. "I give what I have to give before the camera. I don't take it home with me."

Darlene Dahl's emotional repertoire has been getting a great workout these days because Anita Santos' heart has been raked over the coals as if it were the centerpiece of the Pine Valley Fourth of July barbecue. She had fallen for Bobby Warner (Brian Casella) and even though she knows it would hurt her family —

Papa Hector Santos doesn't like Bobby — she would have married him. But now that she's discovered he's the father of Kelsey Jefferson's (L.C. Warner) baby, everything changed.

As Darlene says, "Anita is in a great deal of pain. She feels she's been open with Bobby and she's hurt that he, obviously, hasn't been as honest as he could have been."

One of the questions young acting hopefuls ask is, how important is training? Why not just let one's raw talent loose on the set and allow things to happen spontaneously?

"You can do that, of course," says Darlene.

"But I wouldn't recommend it. It's like a pianist who may have been born with a wonderful gift to play the piano without ever taking lessons. But that's all he'll ever be able to do. Unless he studies and practices, he'll never grow as an artist."

"Training for an actor is like that: Your body is your instrument, and unless you learn how to use your voice properly, and how to move, and how to find your strengths as an actor, you'll never know how far you could take your natural talent."

As for those who worry that training would cut their spontaneity, Darlene says, "That can happen only if you allow it to."

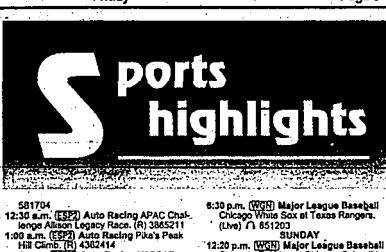

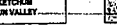

# Deep Space Nine's Avery Brook lives in a wide world of wonder

**HOLLYWOOD** — "I am a human being filled with wonder," proclaims Avery Brooks, best known to Trekkers around the world as the intelligent, compassionate Capt. Benjamin Sisko on the syndicated series "Star Trek: Deep Space Nine."

The series, set on a remote space station in the mid- to late-24th century, blasts off into its fifth season this fall. The original "Star Trek" series celebrates its 30th anniversary on Sept. 8.

"My imagination is fertile," Brooks adds. "My mind races all the time. It is fueled by curiosity and wonder about the world. It doesn't matter where I am."

That curiosity and wonder have propelled Brooks, 45, to one of the most eclectic careers of any actor working in TV today.

He holds the distinction of being the first black man to earn a master of fine arts degree in acting and directing at New Jersey's Rutgers University. He's been a tenured professor of theater at Rutgers' Mason Gross School of the Arts for the past 14 years.

Since 1982, he's toured the country in "Phillip Hayes Dean's play," "Paul Robeson," receiving rave reviews for his portrayal of the famed actor-singer-political activist. And he has sung with such jazz artists as Jon Hendricks and Butch Morris.

Brooks, who starred as the mysterious "enforcer," Hawk, on "Spenser: For Hire" and "A Man Called Hawk," also has been the artistic director of the National Black Arts Festival for the past three years, a prestigious biennial event celebrating African and African American culture. On Monday, Brooks hosts a one-hour

TBS special, "The Ark of the Spirit," which highlights the music, dance and theater presentations of this year's festival, which took place from June 28 to July 6 in Atlanta and which included excerpts from the acclaimed play "Havng Our Say" along with a tribute to Louis Armstrong.

During a lunch break, the intense, eloquent Brooks sat down on an empty "Deep Space Nine" sound stage at Paramount to talk about "Star Trek," his passions and the National Black Arts Festival. He never removed his sunglasses during the 30-minute interview.

"Q: It is difficult with your theatrical background to do a TV series, which is shot in bits and pieces and out of sequence?"

A: There are lots of obstacles. But it is also interesting because I think in circles anyway. It wouldn't be so bad if it didn't take 14 or 15 hours to do. That is concentration. That's discipline. I want to work and do the best that I can. Sometimes that works and sometimes it doesn't.

Q: You seem to be very passionate about your career.

A: If life is synonymous with passion, then yes. My life, my work, my career, it's all one thing. Gordon Parks said you must make a choice of weapons. Choosing a weapon, what does that mean? The combination of fire, iron and steel and gunpowder in the hands

of someone who is not interested in life is a dangerous thing and therefore a weapon, something to fear. A'p'w in someone's hand who is interested in growing and feeding their family if not the nation, in that person's hand, that has to do with life.

My mind is a tool given by God. My voice. All of these things. How do I use it? I must be involved in a conversation with people who are

interested in life saving, life giving. I am not interested anymore talking to people who are not going to talk about that. I will go on and use these things I have been given.

That is a tool. It is a choice. A way to talk about the world. Why? I am compelled by history — by my own, my people's, my nation, my world, our world — to say these things.

My primary responsibility for some time now is making sure that my children can grow. That's it. I have already done the most profound thing I will ever do or participate in and that is being a part of bringing life into the world. That's it.

Q: Tell me about the National Black Arts Festival.

A: I have been artistic director since 1993. I said (when I started), "I wish what we are going to do during my tenure here: We will examine the past. We will try to find some order for the present and then we will make some map — we will try to chart the future or learn to navigate

again." It is not a theme but a focus. We can never exhaust the history in linear fashion, especially in eight disciplines in 10 days.

Q: How many people participated?

A: I'd say we are talking about 1,500 artists. On the Saturday morning we opened the outdoor component of the festival, there were drummers from all over the world, from 18 countries, including North America natives.

The festival began in 1988. There is not another festival in this century that has lasted this long that seriously considers the presence of African people in the world.

That's odd. I am not talking about showcases and concerts; I am talking about a discussion of culture, which includes everything — the mental, physical, spiritual health of a culture.

We say (it is) the National Black Arts Festival, but you cannot talk about African people without talking about the world. There is a relationship between you and I. What happens to me affects what happens to you and vice versa. It is an American festival.

Q: What are your feelings about the upcoming 30th anniversary of "Star Trek"?

A: I am not a Trekkie (but) I am not trying to belittle it or diminish it or even. What we know is the enormous impact in the world of this thing. That's the people speaking.

# Tragedies tell viewers to just stay at home

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Television's message has left us heartbroken and alarmed. And maybe all the more disposed to watch TV.

A jetliner explodes in flight, killing all 230 aboard.

A pipe bomb rocks the Summer Olympics, leaving one dead and 112 injured.

These grim events continue to absorb us as we follow their aftermath through TV's continuing coverage.

Meanwhile, without even saying it, TV diverts our attention away from our homes. Just experiencing the world as it really is not only more comfortable, convenient and affordable, it's also a heckuva lot easier.

"I just don't feel safe flying," I've heard people say. "I've heard it said since I was 8. Flight 800 went down two weeks ago, you've heard it said by somebody else."

The same goes for this case. "With all the psychosis coming around, I just wouldn't want to be down there at the Olympics."

In the aftermath of last Saturday's bombing, there was lots of determined talk by those who actually were on the scene. They wanted to go forward with the events, to uphold the Olympic spirit, to reassure the great fans they gathered in Atlanta to be part of it.

One undated Olympic-goer spoke of "taking a stand."

But those of us at home found only renewed indecision to keep our attention to keep our minds. We'll be in TV, thank you, out of fear's way.

The late John Chancellor became a TV newsmen when the medium was just beginning to stir. Ever since then, he's had TV's attention. And now it's TV we're ignoring soci-

ety. He warned of the isolation that TV and upstart comms, the personal computer, can impose on their users.

"We don't have so many shared human experiences anymore," Chancellor said in an interview shortly before he retired those years ago. Then he added, "I hope that I'm not just hopelessly nostalgic."

Along with the truth of what he said, maybe there was a tinge of good-old-days sentiment. But since the yearnings were reflected by Olympic planners in creating the Centennial Olympic Park, it has been quaintly described as the Olympics' commons, its village green.

When the park was reopened three days after Saturday's carnage, security personnel had been doubled and visitors were subjected to random searches.

What were we, sitting at home watching TV, to make of all that?

One thing we could do was to be a chilling sort of reassurance. After all, television is very good at reassuring its audience. It even has a way of validating our very decision to watch it, and keep watching, no matter what's on (maybe that's why some people call it TV a drug).

In the past two weeks, we viewers have been newly reassured by TV. The unspoken message from the medium itself: We were smart to stay put and watch the world from a distance.

Why risk going to the Olympics — that is, RE-ALLY join the throngs in Atlanta — when NBC professionals are there to bring it to us?

Meanwhile, why trouble ourselves to take an airline flight when we can cruise the Internet and visit Web "sites" without ever leaving our desk? ("Where do you want to



go today?" Microsoft asks us in its ads.) Why ask for trouble? Let's hide out in our homes, communing with one another through airwaves and wires. Let's trash them on TV, then watch them out in some America Online "chat room."

"Safety in numbers" is an outmoded concept, we may well have concluded after the latest assaults on those who dared to come together. These days, it's "safety in isolation."

So let's play it safe. Turn on our TVs, log on to our PCs. Get connected and pretend we're part of something.
