Mourners recall Gooding athlete



A memorial service was held Thursday for Gooding football player Clay Knaup at St. Edward's Catholic Church in Twin Falls.

Questions come to fore about crash fatal to 3

GOODING - As mourners Thursday remembered high school football player Clay Knaup, some braced for the inevitable questions about the crash that killed Knaup and two other Gooding teenagers.

What if Knaup had braked on the lonely country intersection just before midnight, as police say evidence suggested he failed to do? Apparently, Knaup ran a stop sign before his car struck another carload of teens Saturday night.

What if either driver had delayed just a few seconds? What if the second driver, Codi Stockham, hadn't paused to grab some compact discs as she drove her friends home to meet their curfew?

While church officials have reminded family and friends not to dwell on the unanswerable, others say a lesson remains to be learned - that everyone needs to be careful, no matter how familiar the roads are.

"It's one of those lessons we

all need," said Dowell Demaray, Gooding County coroner. "It's not just the kids. Adults run stop signs, too."

The crash also killed M i k e Wilkinson, 18, and Bobbi Jo Miller, 17. Test results showed that none of the three teens had consumed alcohol or drugs before they were killed in the accident, Demaray said.

Thursday, friends poured into St. Edward's Catholic Church in Twin Falls to mourn the loss of Knaup, whom they remembered for his jokes, his sports skill and his kindness.

"I loved him like a brother," said P. J. Leguineche, 16, of Gooding, following the funeral service.

"He was like a big teddy bear," said Rusty Gillette, whose son played football and

Crews push Elba fire lines

Weather change becomes big worry now for fire bosses

ELBA - Flames of smoke continued to billow over Mount Harrison Thursday afternoon as more than 120 firefighters worked to build a black line around the fire before tonight's expected cold front arrives.

The cold front is expected to hit the area around midnight, bringing with it the threat of dry lightning, little precipitation and winds ranging from 20 to 40 miles per hour.

"We've put everything we have into this in one last effort to get all around the fire before the storm arrives," said Ray Mitchell, a fire ecologist with the Bureau of Land Management in Burley. "This is really our last big chance to get a hold on this before the weather does."

The fire has burned through about 10,890 acres of mountain terrain since Monday when winds fanned a Cassia County burn project out of control. Fire officials estimate that 40 percent of the fire has been contained.

"The fire crews out here are hoping to have the entire fire contained by Sunday," said Carol Edwards, public information officer with the BLM. "Our biggest concern right now though are the summer homes, Pomerelle Ski area and the nearby 'campfires.'"

Fire officials estimate that if the fire does cross over the Connor

Creek ridge, these three areas could be in danger along with other parts of Howell Canyon.

Thursday afternoon to prevent flames from spreading up the sides should another fire occur.

"If one does start, this black line we've burned will help us control the fire because it will push the fire up higher where we can get to it better," said Tom Shepard, division supervisor for the Boise National Forest. "When it's down in the canyon, it takes three or four days for us to secure it and it burns quick."

More than 230 people, seven hand crews and 10 engines were on hand Thursday to get a jump-start on tonight's expected cold front. A similar weather pattern last Tuesday left crews with little time to prepare before the winds began carrying the

flames across several hundred acres of mountainside.

Repair crews from Raft River Electric Co. worked to restore power to the electronic sites and other power stations on Mount Harrison. Meanwhile, four firefighters from the Heyburn Fire Department stationed near the Pomerelle Ski area spent the day planning where to lay their hose lines if the fire does reach Howell Canyon.

If it does, Woody Anderson, owner of the Pomerelle Ski Resort, said he will run the ski lifts to prevent the lines from getting too hot in one area. He's also keeping his snowmaking machine hooked up and ready to go.

"We have all day Friday still to prepare, and I'm not nearly as worried as I was three days ago," Anderson said. "But we aren't out of the woods yet, so I'm going to remain cautiously optimistic."

As for the Labor Day weekend, forest officials are recommending that recreationists and hunters look elsewhere this year. Howell Canyon Road will remain closed to the top of Mount Harrison.

"Although the Elba Fire is not burning actively at this time at this end of the fire, we want to feel very confident that additional flareups will not occur in this area before we let people back up the hill," said Pete Peterson, Burley District ranger.

'Engineer of change' grabs Demo throttle

Party cheers Clinton candidacy

CHICAGO - To thunderous chants of "Four more years! Four more years!" President Clinton offered himself as the engineer of change and optimism for the next century.

"We are on the right track," he declared Thursday night, "but our work is not finished."
Riding high in the polls, fresh from a triumphant four-day train ride through the vote-rich Midwest, Clinton dismissed rival Bob Dole's offer to be a bridge to the past.

"With all due respect, we do not need to build a bridge to the past," he said, offering a veiled reference to Dole's 73 years. "We need to build a bridge to the future."
In a nostalgic twist on his 1992 anthem, "I believe in a place called Hope," Clinton queued the music and balloons with a single line: "My fellow Americans, I still believe in a place called Hope - and a place called America."

As thousands of exuberant delegates whooped, the loudspeakers burst to life

with the band Chicago's "Only the Beginning." With that, the fall campaign began.

Declaring that he reversed "the old politics of Washington," Clinton said his administration had made college more affordable, streets safer, water and lands less polluted, tax rates lower for middle-class Americans, jobs more plentiful and families more ready to cope with the new millennium.

He said he would not insult or criticize his rival, Bob Dole, yet he took swipes at his budget and tax-cutting plans.

Sex scandal sinks strategist

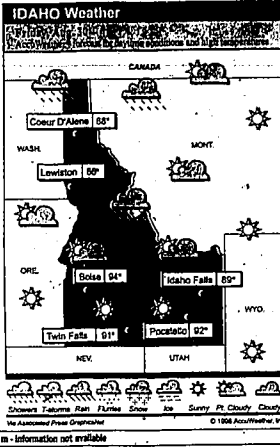
CHICAGO - President Clinton's chief political strategist and author of his "family values" agenda resigned in a sex scandal Thursday, souring Clinton's shining moment on the final night of the Democratic convention.

The embarrassing exit of Dick Morris tore a gaping hole in Clinton's election team on the eve of the fall campaign and threw the White House into a frenzy of damage control.
Morris fled home to Connecticut after publication of intimate details of an alleged yearlong affair with a 200-an-hour call girl, Sherry Rowlands, a "blond, blue-eyed, hard-bodied beauty" who was paid thousands of dollars for her story.

Morris supposedly invited her to listen in on telephone conversations with the president and showed her copies of convention speeches by Hillary Rodham Clinton and Vice President Al Gore.

ACROSS THE NATION

Storms across central Plains bring floods to Texas

Up to 5 inches of rain caused flooding Thursday in parts of Texas as storms stretched across the central Plains.

Four inches of rain overnight in Comanche County, Texas, swamped roads and at least one car. Five people abandoned the car and had to be rescued by firefighters. A deputy with a rope around his waist swam into a rain-swollen creek to pull one woman to safety.

"We haven't had anything else like that yet and hopefully we won't," Comanche County chief investigator Vernon Gaines said.

The Leon River, which begins 80 miles southwest of Fort Worth, was the first river to rise in the state in 13 months.

Rainfall in a 24-hour period ending Thursday morning totaled 3.5 inches at Childress, Texas; 3.2 inches at Lane, Okla.; 2.9 inches at San Angelo, Texas; and 2.7 inches at New Orleans.

Flash flood watches were issued for northern and west-central Texas and northwestern Louisiana.

Elsewhere, it was clear and calm in the West and hazy in the East. In the Southwest, scattered storms cropped up in southern California and southern Arizona.

Thursday's highest heat index was 111 at Thermal, Calif., and the lowest wind chill was 25 at Ely, Nev.

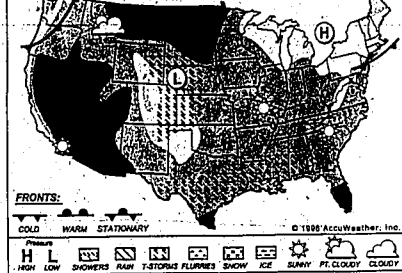
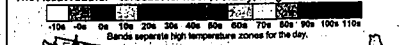

Idahoans consider Morris flap a non-issue at convention

CHICAGO (AP) — Idaho's Democratic delegates are looking askance at reports that the President's top political adviser tried to impress a call girl by letting her listen to his telephone conversations with the president.

Dick Morris resigned Thursday after a report from a supermarket tabloid linked him with Sherry Rowlands, a woman who lived in Washington's Virginia suburbs.

"I don't think it's a credible news source. I don't anything's been proven yet, and I think it's a non-issue," said Molly Lazebko from Boise.

Many of the state's 23 delegates appeared to share the same view, although state Rep. Mike Flanzer of Pocatello put it a little more tartly, noting Morris' past as a consultant for GOP candidates: "He did come from the Republicans. We're just sending him back. Then she softened a bit. "If it is true, I feel

really badly for him."

The party's newest national committee-woman, Doris Stimson from Boise, dismissed any talk of the sex scandal's significance, saying it has nothing to do with the campaign.

"The most important thing about a campaign is the two people we're electing, not this stuff about staff people," Stimson said. "It's a disservice to the American people when the press talks about this kind of thing."

interest rates skyrocketing.

Clinton said "We would not bet our money" on Dale's idea, he said. "And we certainly shouldn't be the country."

As he walked to the podium looming high above the boisterous crowd, a sea of blue and white "Clinton Gore" pennants waved in the convention hall.

Then he spoke the words they had been waiting all week to hear. With a grin, he said: "I don't know if I can find a fancy way to say this, but...I accept" the Democratic presidential nomination.

The speech, which Clinton road-tested on the 559-mile rail trip, was a highly thematic, mostly non-partisan outline of his vision for America in the next century including a lineup of new plans, making the argument that he is a can-do president with a fresh vision for a new optimism.

The new proposals include:

- A narrowly focused capital gains tax cut for homeowners, costing about \$1.4 billion.
- Tax credits and grants to generate jobs in areas heavily populated by welfare recipients. It is a \$3.4 billion response to Democratic protests over the welfare overhaul bill he signed.
- A \$1.75 billion literacy campaign designed to get children reading on their own by the end of third grade.
- A \$1.9 billion plan to help clean up polluted lands and waters.

As the news swept through the convention, Morris left a seven-paragraph resignation statement behind in Chicago. "While I served, I sought to avoid the limelight because I did not want to become the message," Morris wrote. "Now, I resign so I will not become the issue."

Clinton, who has had a stormy relationship with Morris for nearly two decades, said in a statement he was thankful for Morris' help in the campaign. "Dick Morris is my friend and he is a superb political strategist," the president said.

Republican Bob Dole, vacationing in California, said that without Morris, Clinton likely will "revert to the liberal Democrat he really is." Yet, spokesman Nelson Warfield said Dole felt "no euphoria" when he learned of Morris' position.

The story of the "White House Call Girl Scandal" was broken by the supermarket tabloid Star, the same publication that paid Jennifer Flowers in 1992 for details of her supposed affair with Clinton.

Phil Buntun, the Star's editor, said the tabloid paid Rowlands somewhat more than the \$12,000 she said she had been paid by Morris during a yearlong relationship.

Buntun said Rowlands came to the newspaper in mid-July offering to sell her story. She had been working for escort services for years, he said, and "she wanted to get out of the business." She is 42 but the story claimed she was 37 because "we were being a bit generous," Buntun said.

The Star quoted from alleged diary entries from Rowlands giving patting advance and the supposed relationship. The Star printed photos of Morris and Rowlands kissing and hugging, and another of them together in bathtubs.

Stimulus response: "I will not subject my wife, family or friends to the sadistic vitriol of yellow journalism." Morris, 48, lives in West Redding, Conn., with his wife, lawyer Eileen McGann — but only on weekends, the Star said. He spent weeknights at the Jefferson Hotel in Washington where he supposedly carried on the affair.

Rowlands told the Star that Morris had nicknamed Hillary Rodham Clinton "The Twister" for her knack of stirring up trouble. He called the president "The Monster" for his hot temper.

Star news editor Dick Belsky said, "We didn't approach this with any kind of political agenda. The idea of this guy talking to the president with this girl in bed was just a story we wanted to tell."

Brash and brilliant, Morris was the architect of Clinton's comeback from the Republican election landslide of 1994 largely on a theme of family values. He had many enemies at the White House because of his arrogance and influence over Clinton, and some senior advisers were not sorry to see him go.

One White House official, when asked whether Morris was resigning, smiled and said, "It's there, it's a God..."

Tipper Gore, wife of Vice President Al Gore, reacted with shock. "Whoa," she said. "Well, no comment."

Bill Curry, a White House political operative and Morris ally, said he was reluctant to accept the story but said it was "quite devastating for him (Morris) personally. My sympathy goes out to his family."

House Speaker Newt Gingrich's press secretary, Tony Blankley, said, "It's bad news for the president on his biggest day here, coming just two days after they were talking about family values."

And in a political sense, Blankley said,

"He's lost his Bonaparte immediately before the campaign begins."

At the convention, Arkansas delegate Dana David Deree said Morris' conduct should not call into question Clinton's character or leadership.

"What in the universe does his private life have to do with Bill Clinton running the country?" the Little Rock school teacher asked.

It had been Morris who persuaded Clinton to sign the Republican welfare bill and to embrace the GOP notion of balancing the budget, against the wishes of many Democrats.

Believing that the path to re-election was through the heartland of America, Morris focused Clinton on politically popular issues such as school uniforms and curfews for kids, a tough law-and-order approach and a stand against television violence.

Some Democrats and White House aides wondered privately whether the Clinton-Morris relationship — renewed in secret midnight phone calls two years ago — was really severed.

"I suspect the president will continue to talk to his friend, but he's not going to play any official or unofficial role in the campaign," said presidential spokesman Mike McCurry.

When the supposed affair started, Rowlands was a \$200-an-hour escort, according to the Star. Later she started a home and office cleaning service.

McCurry, the president's spokesman, said Morris was not asked to resign and added that he had no information "about the truth or veracity of the story."

White House chief of staff Leon Panetta said, "These are allegations that are unconfirmed in a tabloid story. So let's sit back a little bit and see what develops."

wrestled with Knaup. "But he was a bull when he competed in athletic events."

According to officials, the teens probably didn't know what hit them.

Both cars were going the speed limit when they collided, about 50 miles per hour, said Idaho State Police Trooper Kip Wills.

There were no skid marks, and the cars were flung into a field. Damage was extensive, Wills said.

Knaup was thrown from his Jeep and killed instantly. Wilkinson and Miller, who were passengers in the other car, died in their vehicle. Wilkinson died seven hours later.

Though motorists can see the intersection from far away, a corn field at the southwest corner of the intersection — 1800 East and 1500 South — probably limited the vision of both drivers, Knaup and Stockham, as they approached the crossing, Wills said.

"In other words, these two wouldn't have been able to see each other," Wills said.

Before the accident, Knaup had dropped off a passenger at the passenger's home before heading north on 1800 East, Wills said. Wills was looking into the passenger's car when Knaup was returning to a party in Gobling County, but several parties said they hadn't seen Knaup there that night, Wills said.

Three other teen-agers are recovering from crash injuries. Stockham, 17, was released from St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise Thursday. Stockham's only surviving passenger, Devin Bonneau, 16, was in stable condition at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center in Twin Falls.

Knaup's brother, George, 15, a passenger in Knaup's car, remained in critical condition at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center.

As convention ends, duel of generations begins

CHICAGO — Now it really begins the last battle of the World War II generation against the vanguard of the baby boomers.

President Clinton stresses his youth, energy and social programs. Bob Dole promises experience, respectability and tax cuts.

Energized by a convention of rare Democratic unity, Clinton marches into the last nine weeks of the campaign with a sizable lead but no sure thing.

There is neither the air of certain victory that surrounded Ronald Reagan at convention time nor the cloud of gloom that hung over George Bush as each man sought a second term.

The Clinton White House is cautiously confident. The polls are favorable, and peace and prosperity are on his side.

The message from Clinton's train trip to the convention will echo through the campaign: we are on the right track to the 21st century.

Yet, the track to the White House is strewn with surprises that could trip up Clinton. Whitewater, perhaps, a foreign policy crisis, or, will Clinton be hurt by the sudden resignation of his top political adviser in an alleged sex scandal?

"The history about presidential politics is all about surprises," said Clinton's former media adviser, Mandy Grunwald. Others point out that candidates who are leading on Labor Day generally win on Election Day.

There is a strange pattern in Clinton's political life. Whenever tests drive use, attacking the president for a failure of moral leadership. The report was a big embarrassment for the White House.

But there are government reports for Clinton to quote, too, such as Thursday's announcement that the economy in the second quarter grew at the fastest rate in two years.

Ten million new jobs, Clinton boasts, and a budget deficit slashed by half. A record number of small business start-ups, a 15-year high in new home ownership.

Thursday night's acceptance speech was touted not as a mere political speech but as State of the Union II. The message was that

Clinton has a record to build on, not rest on.

His address was tailored to present him as the man with fresh ideas, a vision for the future. A president with a second-term agenda.

Trying to dull the allure of Dole's 15 percent tax cuts for all Americans, Clinton pulled a narrowly focused capital gains break for homeowners, suggesting that his plan was fiscally prudent while Dole's would bust the bank.

Hoping to dampen anger over the hard-edged welfare bill and ease fears of poor people going hungry, the president proposed a \$3.5-billion jobs program for high poverty areas and tax incentives for businesses that hire welfare recipients.

There was an initiative to clean up polluted lands and waters and a family-values proposal to teach children to read. It was supposed to be a picture of a can-do president. Underlying all of it is a generational theme.

Dole offers himself as a bridge back to "a time of tranquility, faith and confidence in action." He is 73, with a distinguished war record and a 35-year year history in Congress.

Clinton presents himself as the forward-leaning captain of "the first American campaign for the 21st century." He is 50, a member of the first wave of baby boomers, a leader with a four-year record from the White House.

Mindful of Americans' disgust with political mud-slinging, Clinton and Vice President Al Gore came to Chicago with a high-road approach.

Dole is a good and decent man with a courageous war record; he

respects his service but disagree with his ideas, Gore said in his convention speech.

In a gesture toward civility, Dole also made a point of telling his convention that Clinton was his adversary, not his enemy. And then he went on to question Clinton's character and competence.

Grunwald, a lieutenant from Clinton's 1992 race, says the president has his work cut out for him. "People have heard a lot of things from him in the last year that adds up to a clear choice for people compared to what Bob Dole is offering," Grunwald said. "It's not a crisp summary."

"I think he sharpened the message of his presidency," she said. "He's now got to sharpen the message of his campaign."

Fire season now worst since 1969

GRANTS PASS, Ore. (AP)—A battalion of Marines began packing their gear Thursday to join the firefighters stretched to the limit by the West's worst wildfire season in 27 years.

Wildfires across the country this year have surpassed 5 million acres, eclipsing the total of 1988, the year Yellowstone National Park burned. They are growing at the fastest rate since 1969, when 5.69 million acres burned, according to the National Interagency Fire Center in Boise.

The worst season on record was 1924, when 28.8 million acres burned.

An 80,000-acre range fire was contained 24 miles east of Thermopolis, Wyo., but 46 major fires covering 654,886 acres were still burning Thursday in Oregon, California, Idaho, Nevada, Montana, Washington and Utah.

Crews rotated back into action after much-needed rest boosted the number of firefighters around the country by more than 3,000 to 21,355. "And we're getting ready to boost it again," fire center spokesman Mike Brown said.

The 2nd Battalion of the 5th Marine Regiment at Camp Pendleton, Calif., was briefed Thursday and set to begin classroom training today.

The 530 Marines plan to fly to northeastern Oregon Saturday evening or Sunday morning to begin on-the-job training mopping up cold fire lines, said spokeswoman Lt. Minique Suttles.

"We're excited about going," Suttles said. "This is not uncommon for Marines at Camp Pendleton. In 1994 and 1988 we were asked to help with firefighting in Montana, Washington and Yellowstone."

Seventy fires sparked by a lightning storm Monday have burned through 243,000 acres in northern Nevada. Some have been contained while others had to be ignored for lack of people to send to them.

"Our resource rubber band is stretched just about as tight as it can go," said Nevada Division of Forestry spokesman Steve Frady.

In Oregon, Gov. John Kitzhaber toured facilities in Redmond where Oregon National Guard troops are training to join firefighters battling blazes on nearly 190,000 acres.

Firefighters were close to containing two new blazes in northern Utah — the 1,000-acre Wheatgrass Fire 80 miles north-east of Salt Lake City and the newly kindled 440-acre Marmion Trail Fire 20 miles northeast of the city.

The stubborn range fire that has burned 15,000 acres on the Colville Indian Reservation in Washington was 90 percent contained.

In Montana, firefighters contained the Coyote-Calf fire at 4,200 acres east of Big Timber and moved on to battling new lightning-sparked blazes.

Some seasonal crews will be breaking up as college students return to school, but they make up only 10 percent of the firefighting force, Brown said. As those crews break up, more military troops will be formed and people with firefighting experience can be activated from state and federal natural resources agencies.

"We do get through the season," Brown said. "There's not been one that we haven't."

Batt angrily questions National Guard policies

Gov. Phil Batt Thursday questioned why an off-duty Idaho National Guardsman was allowed to use a military rifle and tracer bullets that accidentally started a wildfire in the Boise foothills.

The Eighth Street Fire has blackened more than 14,000 acres and heavily damaged a \$700,000 home on Monday.

Batt wrote Maj. Gen. John Kane, commander of the Idaho National Guard, a terse letter seeking answers to a series of questions about policies on use of weapons and ammunition by off-duty personnel and the state's potential liability.

Batt wrote Kane said no policies were violated since Boise Police Capt. Sherz Fletcher is a member of the Idaho National Guard's marksmanship team, the only group authorized to have military weapons and ammunition off-duty. And if there is any liability for the actions of off-duty Guard personnel, Kane said, it probably would rest with the federal government.

"Whether or not the procedure should be modified, I don't know," Batt said after receiving the reply. "It appears rather incongruous to me that we should have a firing range with high-powered weapons in a situation where we could ignite a residential. I think we should review our procedures at the very least."

More than 370 firefighters were still on the lines of the Eighth Street Fire, and the blaze contained three existing homes and timberland in the Robbie Creek and Shafter Burne areas north of Boise.

Fletcher, an off-duty police firearms instructor, was shooting targets at the Boise Police Association's firing range just north of the city Monday afternoon when a .22-caliber tracer bullet — which ignites as it leaves the barrel — apparently missed its mark.

"While he was shooting, he smelled the smoke," Boise Fire Marshal Steve Mimms said. "He walked around the club house, out of the berm pit and then saw a small fire up in the dense, still within the confines of the range."

Mimms said it was unlikely Fletcher would face a criminal charge.

"It's a completely accidental fire," Mimms said. However, "We're exploring the possibility of bringing in an independent investigator because he is a city employee."

Wave of the future? Maybe, but don't bet the ranch

If you're like many people in the 1990s, you may feel anxiety because you're not yet "on-line." The Internet, we've all heard, is how people will communicate and do business in the future. If you want to be with it, you dare not be without it.

But more and more, those in the know are suggesting that the Internet's glorious future may contain more hype than hope.

Last week the Wall Street Journal devoted a full page to exploring problems on the 'net. A big one: traffic jams on the Information Superhighway. The exploding volume of material is clogging the system, and finding anything can be tiresome.

Another problem is economic. Lots of would-be electronic Rockefeller's have found profit margins on the 'net to be slim or negative.

And then there's the question of content. This is a subject close to newspaper people's hearts, so indulge us while we fume.

It seems everybody and his brother is claiming to provide "local news" these days. The latest is US West's regional phone company. This week it rolled out an on-line Yellow Pages service, which it trumpets as a source of local news and community information, serving more than 6,000 communities.

Oh, really. We took a little web surf on Thursday afternoon, checking what "local news" could be found via US West.

In Twin Falls, zip. In Boise, you can link from US West to three Boise TV stations. Channel 6, KIVI, does offer an on-line news summary, sort of. As of Thursday, the most recent update was four days old. One item was a rewrite of a Times-News story that our subscribers saw on Sunday.

On the other hand, you can find out that weekend anchorwoman Claudia Weathermon likes "summer sports," reading, watercolor, travel, and basically kicking back and relaxing!

Forgive us for tooting our own horn, but the truth about local news is that it requires a significant, sustained investment that few organizations besides daily newspapers are willing to make. Most radio news these days is "rip and read" - pulled directly from a wire-service printer or a newspaper page. On TV, happy talk often overwhelms substance.

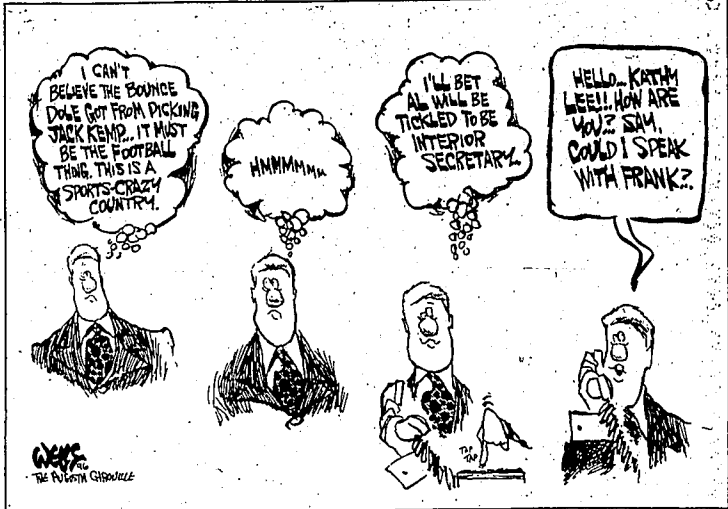
As for local news on the Internet, many American cities do have it - mostly because their hometown newspapers subsidize it. But reading the news on a computer screen remains far less convenient than traditional ink on paper.

That's one reason the Internet audience remains so limited. How limited? We don't have exact statistics, but we'll guess that the spectators at a typical Twin Falls High School football game outnumber the Magic Valley's Internet customers.

The Times-News has investigated Internet opportunities and is still exploring options. For now, we're happy to provide hundreds of local and national news stories, photos and other information seven days a week, on portable, recyclable pages that also can be used to housebreak puppies.

It's far too early to predict - as some skeptics do - that the Internet will be the CB radio of the 1990s. Services such as US West's new venture may yet become widely used and useful, if they can find ways to attract and pay for substantive content.

But always be cautious when you hear promoters trumpeting "the wave of the future."



Media have unfairly vilified Clinton

As someone who is seriously considering, for the first time in my life, simply not voting for president (I don't need a line that says, "None of the above" - I need a line that says, "It makes me vomit"), I am still finding severe consolation in the belated appearance of some intelligent defenders of President Bill Clinton.

I honestly do not know if I will vote for the man - in part because I don't think I need to; he's going to win anyway. But I remain chapped over four years of watching Clinton absorb more unmitigated garbage - both from right-wingers who wanted him to fall before the gip-go and from the media - than any human being short of Adolf Hitler should ever have to endure.

Garrison Kellor said in The Washington Post, "If Clinton had been president in 1863 and had gone to Gettysburg and given that speech, the press would have written, 'Clinton Seeks to Burnish Image at Cemetery Dedication: Hopes Talk Will Distract Public from Whitewater Rumors.'"

It's awfully hard to pick the lowest moment. Vince Foster's suicide - now, there was a con. An absolute stampede by paranoid conspiracy-mongers and would-be Woodward-and-Bernsteins to take a non-unusual tragedy - archetypal gifted perfectionist, unable to bear his failure to meet his own impossible standards, slides into depression and kills self - into whatever seamy tale would most damage Clinton (make that "the Clintons").

Then, there was the froo-froo over how Clinton was exploiting - yes, milking - Commerce Secretary Ron Brown's death for political mileage. I mean, all that



mourning stuff went on for a whole week. But to be politically motivated Right - the whole deal could have been cut down to three days if the folks in Bosnia had just been a little quicker about scraping whatever was left of Brown's body off the side of that mountain. It was definitely Clinton's fault.

Next came the stupendous scoop by the actual Bob Woodward about how Hillary had an imaginary conversation with Eleanor Roosevelt - revealed to an astonished world only months after the first lady wrote all about it in her widely syndicated newspaper column. Quel darling journalism.

Then, there is the Mother of All Scandals, that teeny tiny drop in the Old S&L Bucket, Whitewater. Gene Lyons, the Arkansas reporter who is no more gaga about Clinton than I am, has been fighting a valiant rear-guard action on White-water for years now. With commendable patience, using textbook methods of journalism, he has relentlessly exposed every nutty conspiracy theory, every exaggeration, every carelessness and every distortion by saying over and over again: "Here are the facts; this is what the record shows."

For an example of Lyons at his best, see the Aug. 8 issue of The New York Re-

view of Books, which debunks yet another Clinton-is-a-slazee booklet. (There's money in them that booklets.) This one sounds like the best Clinton booklet since ex-FBI agent Gary Aldrich so brilliantly demonstrated why no one should believe what's in an FBI file. And that, in turn, raises one of those rare Clinton screw-ups where the press did not get excited enough.

I don't have Lyons' patience. I watch the reporters go down to Arkansas, which they all assume is Dogpatch with L.J. Abner peering around at Moonbeam McSwine, from Washington, that stink-bastion of sea-green incorruptible politics. They remind me of the French cop in "Casablanca," who was shocked to find gambling in the back room. I think the word I want is "hypocrites."

Also entering the list of intelligent Clinton defenders is Taylor Branch, chiefly known as the superb biographer of Martin Luther King Jr. ("Parting the Waters"). His piece in the current issue of Esquire is written with the almost painful scrupulousity that marks all his work.

Soon to be out Martin Walker, the ridiculously smart correspondent for The Guardian of Britain, looks at Clinton's record from an international point of view, which you would never catch anyone in our provincial media corps doing.

So, if Clinton is all this much better than the American media have ever hinted, how come I'm such an unhappy camper? Read the welfare bill.

Lockheed not above law

Will Lockheed, a corporation with a \$2 billion annual profit, openly and repeatedly mock state laws? Do the laws that apply to the rest of us also apply to arrogant dispensers of corporate cash?

Twenty-two years ago, Idahoans determined to see who was paying politicians behind closed doors voted overwhelmingly to create the Sunshine Law. Now, before a campaign begins, a political committee must be created and name a treasurer and register with the state. The committee then must disclose the source of large political contributions. Large expenditures must also be made public.

Lockheed, the huge corporation running the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, obviously feels this essential law applies to everyone but them. After Lockheed flouted Idaho's Sunshine Law, Stop the Shipments/Yes on 3 filed a complaint with the state naming

three flagrant violations:

1. Lockheed openly hired ex-Gov. Cecil Andrus and ex-Sen. James McClure as consultants to help defeat the Stop the Shipments initiative at a cost of \$192,000. This enormous paycheck has never been reported to the state, nor has Lockheed registered as a political action group.

2. Since May, Lockheed has toured Idaho towns, promoting its desire to the press and public to see Stop the Shipments defeated. These were clearly campaign activities, but neither the tour nor the expenditures were reported.

3. Lockheed and a group of 10 corporations calling itself the "Committee for Ballot Integrity" hired some of Idaho's larger law firms to ask the Supreme Court to remove the Stop the Shipments/Yes on 3 initiative from the ballot. Not until Aug. 13, after Stop the Shipments complained to the Statehouse, did the so-called Coalition bother to register.

These are willful violations

and show callous disregard for both the law and the citizens of Idaho.

Lockheed has a huge financial stake in keeping shipments of nuclear waste coming into Idaho. They know once it arrives it will never leave. They will spend whatever it takes to keep these shipments coming, even though they put the health and safety of hundreds of thousands of Idahoans at risk and trample on our laws in the process.

On behalf of every Idaho citizen, Stop the Shipments/Yes on 3 filed an official complaint with the Secretary of State on Aug. 15, demanding that the Statehouse uphold the Sunshine Law. If a huge corporation is trying to buy our state, we have the right to know. We await an answer.

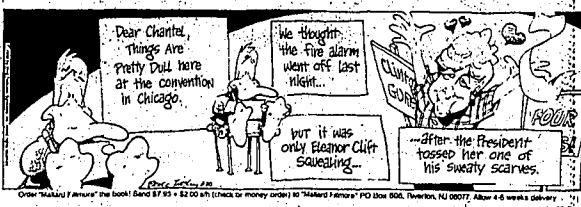

Former Playboy Playmate now struggles for ability to walk again

LONGVIEW, Wash. (AP) — Sometime in early 1997, Playboy magazine will showcase a 28-year-old, married mother of two who is paralyzed from the navel down.

Sharry Konopski of Castle Rock recently modeled in Portland for "Playmates Revisited," the magazine's retrospective of beauties from bygone editions. She graced the centerfold as Miss August 1987, long before an April 1, 1995, car wreck broke her back. The new pictorial will feature "very conservative" poses in an antique wheelchair and a bubble bath.

More important, Konopski expects to walk within the next few months, using leg braces. But she can't afford the \$5,000 price yet.

Health insurance didn't cover prosthetics, and her husband, Mark DeBolt, earns a modest income working for a Woodland cabinet company, so Sharry doesn't qualify for government aid.

The July photo shoot paid less than \$5,000, and she would have possessed for nothing, she said. Konopski is crusing for disabled people's access rights. "The reason I said I would do the shoot is to let the disabled community know you don't have to hide, you don't have to be a shut-in, you're just as valuable as someone who is able-bodied." She will be the second paraplegic to appear in Playboy, she said.

Konopski volunteers in St. John Medical Center's trauma education program, telling school groups to wear seat belts, wear bike helmets, and avoid riding with drunker drivers. "I'm going to prevent every one of these kids from having to live with the hell I deal with on a daily basis," she vowed.

A few businesses put out donation cans for her, but the money was stolen or never contributed. People wrongly assume Konopski is rich; the magazine paid \$15,000 for her 1987 appearance, she said. Playboy also recently contributed toward minor medical costs.

Eventually, Konopski hopes to finish her office administration degree at Lower Columbia College.

To avoid losing circulation in her legs, Konopski often shifts her weight on the air-filled wheelchair seat. She jokes about the distasteful aspects of losing lower body control. Sometimes she needs a hug other times "Huggies."

Four weeks ago she began weight training in the Weyerhaeuser Co. employee weight room, where she's building enough upper body strength to walk using canes. Trainer Steve Mansfield prods her to blast dozens of barbells curls with 15 pounds in each arm, while lying on an incline bench. Sounds easy, but try it some time. Stomach exercises have reeled in excess skin that once cascaded over her size 4 denim shorts due to muscle atrophy. By last Wednesday, the waistband had an inch of wiggle room.

Inspired by her resilience, fans have sent hundreds of flowers, cards and small cash donations via Paul O'Neill, president of her Madison, Wis.-based fan club. "I know her before the accident," he said. "She was feisty then, and she's feisty now."

Prospect of managing wolves makes Wyoming agency howl

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — The Wyoming Game and Fish Department someday will be asked to take over control of the wolves the federal government brought to Yellowstone National Park, but the agency says it would rather not have that responsibility.

It is, however, preparing a draft wolf management plan in anticipation of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service asking it to take responsibility for the animals once there are enough to remove them from the endangered species list.

Department Director John Baughman said he topped the federal government would provide some money to help pay for

wolf management.

"We do think we could do a pretty good job managing (wolves)," he said. "But not without resources and not without a united Wyoming position that supports that."

"We do think wolves are a legitimate part of the ecosystem and certainly they are here to stay now," he added.

The state Game and Fish Department receives no funding from the Legislature. Most of its revenue comes from hunters and anglers who buy licenses, and they should not be asked to shoulder the costs of managing wolves, said Reg Rothwell, supervisor of biological services.

Montana hiking area closed because of grizzly encounters

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — The Forest Service has closed a popular hiking area in the Lee Metcalf Wilderness Area because of five confrontations between grizzly bears and people in two weeks.

Two young grizzlies that are believed to be the culprits were captured Tuesday near the Big Sky Resort, but the Cedar Lake

area will remain closed until they are sure, Beaverhead-Deerlodge National Forest spokesman Jack de Colia said Wednesday.

The grizzlies took backpackers or fish on two occasions. Cedar Lake is in the Madison Range southeast of Ennis.

The two young suspects were trapped Tuesday by Kevin Frey,

grizzly bear management specialist with the Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks, after they wandered down a ski run and came near the resort's Huntley Lodge.

He said the bears were about 1 1/2 years old and probably have learned to associate food with people.

Alleged vandal lost thumb in golf cart theft

TWIN FALLS - A teenager who allegedly vandalized the Twin Falls Municipal Golf Course may have already paid a price - part of his thumb.

The 16-year-old Twin Falls male is in custody at the Snake River Juvenile Detention Center, said police Sgt. Mike Hottman. One teen-ager was arrested late Wednesday afternoon and the other Thursday morning.

One of the boys lost the thumb to the bottom of the fingernail on his right hand when he crashed a golf cart into a fence, Hottman said.

Police could have taken a print off the thumb, but the boy was identified after he sought help at the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center emergency room.

Golf course workers had discovered part of the thumb in one of the four carts taken from the course. The specific cart they broke into the shed and drove the carts around the greens, causing \$2,500 worth of damage discovered Wednesday morning.

The boys, whose names were not released because of their ages, face charges of burglary and malicious injury to property, both felonies.

Many places closed, some open on Labor Day

TWIN FALLS - Garbage dumps, banks, post offices and state-run liquor stores will be closed Monday, but the Magic Valley Mall will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Monday - which is Labor Day.

Law enforcement and fire protection agencies will be open, but most city, county, state and federal offices will be closed to honor America's working men and women.

Both the Hub Butte and Milner Butte landfills will be closed, as well as all garbage transfer stations in the Magic Valley. The Magic Valley swimming pool will be closed Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

Four air tanker drops, a helicopter and 74 fire fighters had mostly contained the blaze by 8 p.m. Wednesday, according to Wood River Fire and Rescue Chief Dan McKenna.

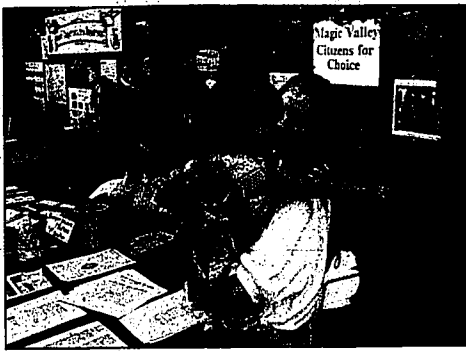

Separate booths and politics

Clash of opinions leads to 2 camps at the fair, kept apart by mutual consent

FILER - Teen-agers stopped by Tammy Carroll's booth as she distributed information about a woman's right to choose, and offered to pray for her because of her sins.

Wendy Williams bore the sight of an aborted fetus covered with blackness because she wanted passers-by to see the photo at her booth and understand the ugly truth of abortion.

Both women ran booths that were startlingly grim during the second day of the Twin Falls County Fair on Thursday. They seemed worlds away from the sunshine, the pulsing music of the midway and vendors hawking corn dogs, candy and ice cream.

Republicans may try to make room for both camps within their party, but consider this - the two women's booths were carefully placed in separate buildings.

"It's a real strong issue, and some people might get carried away if you're staring at each other (at each other) all day long," said Kim Carroll, director of Magic Valley Citizens for Choice. "We're not there to start a fight, and I think that would be too easy if we were in the same building."

"We're not here to argue," said

Fair attendance

Fair attendance on Wednesday, the first day of the Twin Falls County Fair, was 13,594. That's up from 11,492 on the first day last year, said Linda Gwyn, fair office manager.

The higher numbers have created larger ticket lines, so more ticket vendors may be added, she said.

Marilyn Scott, a volunteer with Magic Valley Right to Life, who said she requested separate buildings. The two camps were separated by the produce and flower building.

If the two parties can't get along at a fair, then how can they accept each other as members of the same party, as the Republicans sought to do during the national convention in San Diego?

"The pro-lifers will desert," predicted Jim Evans, pastor of the Heritage Alliance Church, who stopped by the pro-life booth to sign a petition urging Clinton to override President Bill Clinton's veto on a ban of partial-birth abortions.

"I think that if (Republicans) strive to broaden their base that way, they'll cut off their own nose," Evans said.

The pro-life booth offered T-shirts,

buttons and bumper stickers emblazoned with anti-abortion messages. "Every 3rd baby dies from choice," "Equal Rights for Unborn Women" and, in Spanish, "Pro-temple, pro-temple, pro-temple" (Pro-woman, pro-child, pro-life).

Williams, who volunteered to run the booth for a couple of hours, called the photo of the aborted fetus "disgusting."

But she was willing to put up with it to tell her side of the story.

"They are getting a lot of attention," she said. "That's not something (women) are shown when they're presented with their choice. They've not shown the results of their choice."

Two buildings over, Carroll wanted to tell the other side of the abortion debate.

Her booth displayed banners that read, "If you can't trust me with a choice, how can you trust me with a child?" and "A world of wounded children would make a world of difference."

"We're here to try to open some minds," she said.

"A lot of (pro-lifers) try to bring religion into it, and I've heard them try to bring homosexuality and heterosexuality into it. That's not the point at all. The whole idea is to have the legal right over her body."

Tracy, Minnick spar over nuclear waste issue

BOISE - A Senate bill that would open an interim storage site near Nevada's Yucca Mountain for high-level nuclear waste is apparently moot, if you listen to a spokesman for Sen. Larry Craig.

"Yucca Mountain already is accepting nuclear waste for storage," said Mike Tracy, campaign spokesman for Craig, who sponsored the legislation.

But directors of the site say Tracy is wrong. "That's absolutely not true," said Erik Olds, Energy Department spokesman at

waste and spent reactor fuel, but it is not open yet.

"For a long time the site was accepting low-level waste shipments."

A landfill for low-level nuclear waste on the nearby Nevada Test Site - used for years to test nuclear weapons - is taking shipments of commingled debris from Ohio, Olds said. But no nuclear waste is going to Yucca Mountain, he said.

Craig's bill passed the Senate earlier this month, and will probably come before the House in September. President Bill Clinton is expected to veto it.

Tracy's statement appeared in a news

release that accused Democratic Senate

senators of fighting to keep nuclear waste in Idaho.

"There is nuclear waste going into Yucca Mountain," Tracy said. "Walt Minnick and President Clinton are stopping nuclear waste from leaving Idaho by opposing Sen. Craig's bill."

Minnick called Tracy's apparent error "abysmal."

"So I guess there's no need for Craig's bill," he said.

"That's the most fundamental, most egregiously factual errors to insist a waste site that isn't supposed to open for 20 years is already accepting nuclear waste."

Wildfire engulfs local ranch

CONNOR CREEK - After surviving the wildfire on their 700-acre ranch Tuesday, Clair and Judy Teeter can explain what it's like to live through an inferno.

"As the fire grew closer to their home, Judy Teeter said she was so scared and confused she couldn't even think."

"The roar of the flames was unbelievable," she said.

When fire officials asked them to gather their valuables and evacuate, she said she didn't know where to begin.

"I couldn't even think," she said.

Teeter and some family members giving assistance at their home, were evacuated Tuesday evening and moved to a green field east of the house.

The smoke was so dense she

couldn't tell if the fire was on the house or just behind it.

"It was so relieved when the fire boss walked up and said, 'Ma'am, your house is OK,'" she said. "They stopped the fire."

After the smoke cleared the damage was evident.

Flames had reached the edge of their garden, 150 feet from the house, and to the southeast the haystack was engulfed.

"The hardest part is looking at all the work we have done, and now all we have to rebuild," she said.

Teeter's three children, Darin, Terina, and Natalia had come home through the summer to help put up the hay, fix fence, and do many other jobs on the ranch, she said.

Now they will have to call their son in Carson City, Nev. to tell him the hay that he stacked is gone, she said.

Of the 700 acres, about 400 acres were burned and the haystack with approximately 100 tons of hay was destroyed, Clair Teeter said.

The fire also destroyed at least five miles of fence on the ranch.

Financial struggles associated with ranch life makes them wonder where help will come from. The Teeters have lived in Elba since they bought the ranch in 1989 from Lyle Durfee, and their family is determined to pick up the pieces, he said.

"Well, we have no choice but to put this behind us and go on. We'll get the fences built, prepare feed for the cattle, and be grateful we still have our home," he said.

"We would like to thank all the people who helped save our home, and everything else they did. We couldn't have done it without them."

commission staff proposed increase of \$3.21 to \$5.10 for the 45 mile calling radius in the Magic Valley with the \$5 rate for a 300-mile calling radius offered by cellular phone companies.

"I'm in favor of the local area calling for all the positive reasons you will hear today," Dahmer said. "I'm not in favor of the excessive pricing of the minimal service area proposed."

Dahmer charged that US West response times for price and availability requests for advanced communications technology take weeks or months, whereas other communications companies respond in hours or days.

Kent Just, executive director of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, supported the proposed toll-free calling area but said: "This has been a long time coming." He congratulated Jean Duffek, who with Lee Halper,

both of Jerome, circulated a petition that stimulated the formation of the proposed toll-free calling area.

Sarah Hoy of Twin Falls said she leaves her cellular phone at home because her children can call their grandparents in Jerome at lower cost than by regular telephone.

Rhona Aragon of Jerome, spoke in favor of the toll-free calling area. She said it's ridiculous to have to dial long distance for calls to Twin Falls and that those calls cost more than calls to her son in Arizona.

"We have become a society that develops retail trade centers," said Gerald Beck of the College of Southern Idaho, speaking for himself. "Being a resident of Twin Falls and enjoying that luxury of being (in) that retail center, I believe I have a responsibility to pick up part of that cost."

A number of people approved

the proposed plan citing the cost of having to make long distance calls for government, medical and school services.

Halper spoke in favor of telephone company competition, saying it increases services.

"If we implement (the toll-free calling area) and it blocks further competition then I'm not in favor of what I've worked for in the past year," Halper said.

Joia South, regulatory affairs manager of US West, said the plan would not eliminate competition.

Commissioner Marsha Smith told Halper that the present toll routes in the Magic Valley would become a local route, thus people wouldn't be able to use long distance companies in this area. But under the 1996, federal Telecommunications Act, there will be emerging competition in the local exchange market, she said.

Burley man will receive mental exam

BURLEY - A Burley man charged with second degree murder in connection with stabbing his wife will undergo further psychiatric examination and treatment to determine whether he is competent to stand trial.

In a hearing Thursday, 5th District Judge George Granata Jr. ordered Jose Angel Gonzales, 47, to be admitted to a secure mental health hospital for evaluation.

Marie Gonzales bled to death in front of her home on June 19. Jose Gonzales was found inside the house sitting on a bloody bed. He told police he thought he was stabbing a demon and not his wife.

Thursday, Gonzales pleaded innocent to second degree murder, which carries a sentence of 10 years to life in prison. Gonzales also pleaded innocent to the charge of using a knife to commit second degree murder. The charge carries a maximum sentence of 15 years in prison.

Public defender Kerry McMurray, who is Gonzales' lawyer, recommended Gonzales be evaluated in a mental health hospital for about 30 days. McMurray said he based his recommendation on a psychological evaluation by Dr. Dick Smith of Twin Falls.

Gonzales underwent a separate psychological evaluation in July. The specifics of the evaluations were not discussed.

Cassia County will pay for the hospital stay, because Gonzales is indigent, Granata said.

Cassia County Deputy Prosecutor Howard Smyser said he thinks it is important that Gonzales be evaluated further. Gonzales' mental health is an issue in the case, he said. The insanity defense no longer exists in Idaho, he said.

During Thursday's court proceedings, Gonzales, who was speaking through an interpreter, had difficulty understanding his constitutional rights. The language barrier isn't the problem, McMurray said.

Twice before the hearing McMurray said he discussed Gonzales' constitutional rights with him through an interpreter. Sometimes Gonzales indicated he understood, and at other times he said he didn't, McMurray said.

"It's the ideal or conceptual part that is difficult for him," McMurray said.

A status conference for the case has been set for Oct. 17.

Former Twin Falls resident charged

CHICAGO - A man accused in the grisly killings of an Arizona couple and their son formerly resided in Twin Falls, but had only a smoking citation on his record.

Robert Allen Poysan, 20, of Golden Valley, Ariz., was being held in Cook County Jail and will be returned to Arizona this week. According to Twin Falls County records, Poysan was cited in December 1992 for possessing tobacco as a minor. The case was dismissed.

Poysan and a companion, a 14-year-old girl from California, were found by police in an Evanston homeless shelter this last weekend. Authorities said the girl has not been charged in connection with the murders, but is a possible witness.

"This was a gruesome crime. One of the worst ever committed in this area," said Sgt. Randy McNally of the Mohave County sheriff's office in Kingman, Ariz.

"Police have reason to suspect Poysan knew the victims, that he may have been staying with them at the time of the murders," said Judy Schaanman, a spokeswoman for the Mohave County sheriff's office.

Schaanman added that a motive for the crime has not yet been determined.

The victims were identified as Roland M. Wear, 50; Leta B. Kagen, 37; and Kagen's son, Robert Thor DeJahnt, 15. Their bodies were found Aug. 15 in a mobile home in a remote section of Golden Valley, according to police.

Police said the two adults suffered fatal gunshot wounds and the teen-ager was stabbed to

death.

Also arrested in connection with the murders is Frank W. Anderson of Bakerfield, Calif. Police said it was the arrest of Anderson that led to tracking down Poysan.

Illinois authorities first became aware of the murder investigation with the arrest of Anderson near Marion, Ill., recently. State police said Anderson, 48, was arrested for possession of a stolen vehicle on Aug. 18. Reports indicate that the vehicle Anderson was driving belonged to one of the murder victims.

"We got lucky," said Illinois State Police Sgt. Ralph Stegall. "We got him during a routine car check after doing a run on the plate." A subsequent investigation revealed that Anderson and another person were being sought by Arizona police for the killings, Stegall said.

According to Lt. Linda Black of the Evanston Police Department, Anderson, who was returned to Arizona last week, allegedly admitted to the crimes and then tipped off police to Poysan's whereabouts.

"We started contacting local shelters as soon as we got the word," said Black.

Black said the 14-year-old girl, who is reported as a runaway from the Los Angeles County sheriff's office, has been placed in the custody of the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services and is being questioned. Investigators believe Anderson, Poysan and the runaway teen were together at the time of the murders.

Anderson and Poysan each have been charged with first-degree murder, according to the Mohave County sheriff's office.

Fish and Game director leaving to take job at Missouri agency

Embattled Idaho Department of Fish and Game director Jerry Conley has quit, and at least one of his bosses said the change will do the agency good.

Conley will return to his native Missouri after the Oct. 3-4 Idaho Fish and Game Commission meeting to head the highly respected Missouri Department of Conservation, ending a 16-year tenure with Idaho Fish and Game.

"I'm excited about the opportunity to work with the Missouri department in my home state, but I certainly have mixed emotions about leaving a job I've been totally immersed in for the past 16 years," Conley said in an electronic-mail message to Fish and Game personnel Wednesday afternoon.

"I have every confidence that the Idaho commission that the department will take this transition in stride and continue to lead the way in fish and wildlife management."

Conley, 55, is fishing in Washington state this week and

will be unavailable for comment until he returns on Tuesday. He was a finalist for director of Washington's state wildlife agency earlier this summer.

"The first reaction from an Idaho Fish and Game commissioner was positive. I think it's ultimately good for the department," said Jeff Siddoway, the Fish and Game commissioner from the Upper Snake River Valley. "Certainly, he didn't command the respect of the Legislature."

"As a new commissioner, I'm going to feel much more comfortable with a director that I was involved in hiring and that I feel is working for me, rather than one that was hired by a previous commission," he said. "We now have an opportunity to clean the slate and build a program with the vision for the 21st century."

Siddoway is one of four new commissioners appointed by Gov. Phil Batt, who occasionally has been critical of Conley's department. But on Thursday, the governor had nothing but kind words for the departing director.

"Jerry Conley has served this

state long and well in his capacity as director. I wish him well as he accepts this new challenge," Batt said in a statement issued by his office.

"The department can always be improved, and Mr. Conley has invited constructive criticism. I have found him to be cooperative with my desire for a coordinated state position on natural resource matters."

The governor also urged the Fish and Game commissioners to "make a careful and complete search" for Conley's successor. "The department faces the necessity of tightening its belt and the

new director must recognize this."

Conley is credited with leading the 509-person Fish and Game Department through remarkable growth. He also has been praised for the growth in wildlife management areas statewide and his efforts to promote hunting and fishing through the creation of free fishing and hunting days for children.

Conley is the only Fish and Game director in the nation who hosts a weekly call-in radio show. But he has been under fire for years from hunters who believe he does not listen to the concerns

of sportsmen while creating a bloated Boise bureaucracy that was not working for wildlife.

The heat has been turned up in recent months after it was learned the department did not receive \$3 million in expected revenue and had to cut 12.5 percent of its operating budget to stay out of the red this year.

But Fish and Game employees

will miss their leader, information specialist Ed Mitchell said.

"There's no doubt that he's been an extremely popular director with professionals here," Mitchell said. "He's always supported professional wildlife management to the highest degree. He's been excellent at taking care of the interests of department employees."

IDAHO IN BRIEF

Road repair threatens wild section of river

ST. MARIES — Efforts to repair a demolished road threaten a wild and scenic section of the St. Joe River.

St. Joe River Road has been closed since February by a landslide 13 miles east of Avery that buried the paved two-lane route in a 300-foot-wide swath of mud, rocks and trees. The closure has hurt business in tiny Avery and cost Plum Creek Timber Co. thousands of dollars by forcing logging trucks on long detours.

This fall, Shoshone County is planning to dump 55,000 cubic yards of fill material on the flood plain below the slide so a road can be routed around the debris. The fill — mostly large rocks — will take up half an acre on the flood plain, part of which is a wetland.

Commissioners ask sheriff to step down

CASCADE — Valley County commissioners have formally asked embattled Sheriff Lewis Pratt to resign and reinstate suspended Detective Tommy Rhea.

Commissioners said disarray and lack of control in the sheriff's office prompted this week's request. Pratt said he would take it under advisement.

Rhea defeated Pratt in the May 28 Republican primary election for sheriff and has no Democratic opposition in the November general election. So barring a successful write-in campaign, he will be elected Valley County sheriff. Pratt responded in Rhea on June 13 and asked the state to investigate him.

Continuing increase in refugees expected

BOISE — Idaho's capital city has a reputation as a great place to be a refugee — a soft landing site for newcomers starting over. But help is needed for that to continue.

"With qualifications, most say growth in the local refugee community should remain strong. "It's hard to predict because of government decisions and geopolitical forces that affect refugee flows, but I think in the next several years we will continue to see increasing numbers of refugees here," said Jan Reeves, director of the Mountain States Refugee Center. "We don't have the negative factors associated with some other places that have large concentrations of newcomers."

Woman bound over in Moscow shooting

MOSCOW — Former police dispatcher Barbara Flomer was bound over to 2nd District Court in a preliminary hearing into the Aug. 17 shooting of her husband's alleged lover.

She is scheduled to be arraigned on an attempted first-degree murder charge on Sept. 9. Husband Rick Flomer cited his Fifth Amendment rights against self-incrimination and refused to answer questions in court. The victim, 37-year-old Delaine Hawley, remains in serious condition at the Moscow hospital.

Court upholds judgment for fired official


BOISE — When Idaho's schools chief fired the woman who headed an AIDS education program because she supported a defendant in a rape case, it was a violation of public policy, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

The court Thursday unanimously ruled for Joy Himmer, former employee of the state Department of Education, fired by Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans in 1992.



Big hitch, big party

Thousands help Ketchum celebrate annual Wagon Days

KETCHUM — Organizers are making room for a crowd for this weekend's Wagon Days celebration.

About 20,000 people are expected in town for antique fairs, an arts-and-crafts festival, a car auction, flapjack breakfast, the Wagon Days Arts and Crafts Fair and lots of country music.

But the centerpiece of the celebration is Saturday's Big Hitch Parade, scheduled for 1 p.m. and featuring the huge ore wagons that used to haul galena ore from surrounding mines to smelters in Ketchum.

This year's grand marshals are the Farnham sisters, whose family migrated to the Wood River Valley from Colorado during the silver rush of the 1880s.

The Farnham family is used to parades in Ketchum. Back in the 1920s and '30s, Ella and Petra's father participated in the Fourth of July parade down Main Street.

Other participants this year will include the Wells Fargo Stagecoach and a two-seat Amish carriage owned by Tom and Ruby Webb that will serve as KMVT-TV's entry.

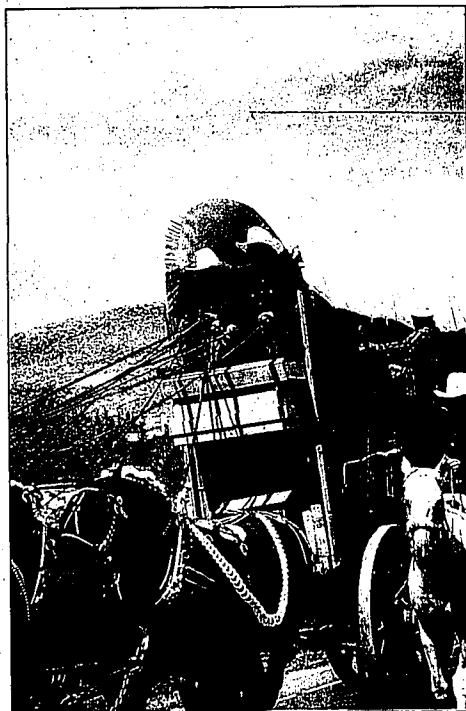
"My wife and I traveled to Minnesota in 1930 and the Amish people made this thing by hand, especially for us," Webb said. The Webbs will ride in the carriage, drawn by two registered quarter-horses.

An unusual entry this year will be brown Swiss oxen — Josh and Jack. They were raised by bottle and weigh 2,400 pounds each.

Another first will be a horse-drawn hearse sponsored by The Wood River Chapel.

Eclectic country star Morris keeps changing

SUN VALLEY — The man likes to change his mind — the man being country singer-songwriter Gary Morris.

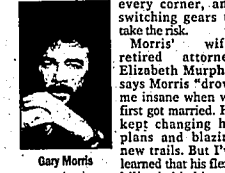
It's kept him flexible and leading a charmed life: His recording "Wind Beneath My Wings" was a Country Music Association Record of the Year in 1984; he's had five Billboard No. 1 hits since.

In town for the Danny Thompson Memorial Golf Tournament this week, Morris took time out to pass on some words of wisdom before he flew off to sing at the Democratic National Convention in Chicago.

"People make their careers who are," he said. "I've always wanted to try everything. When I was in college I was a pretty good athlete and my coach said if you just pick one sport, you could

every corner, and switching gears to take the risk.

Morris' wife, retired attorney Elizabeth Murphy, says Morris "drove me insane when we first got married. He kept changing his plans and blazing new trails. But I've learned that his flexibility is his biggest asset."

Morris makes no bones about going with the flow.

"I always loved to sing, but I loved to bow-hunt, fish and play football too."

Morris never figured he'd have a musical career. He was 19 when he bought his first record — "Unchained Melody," by the Righteous Brothers. "I started singing along with the record,

but it was my twin sister who went to college on a music scholarship."

Then one summer, Morris, who grew up in Texas, went to Colorado with two college buddies to "chase girls and drink beer, but instead we got a job in a showroom where there was continuous family entertainment. We got caught up in it and walked up on stage with our short haircuts and white sidealls, feeling compelled to sing "Rocky Mountain High."

The other guys eventually went in another direction — an architect and a dentist — but Morris started making music history. As a recording artist, he is in his 15th year with career sales of more than 5 million records. For Warner, Bros., Capitol and MCA, he has recorded 12 solo albums.

Morris says he's written so many songs in the back of his bus that he's lost

'Executive Orders': More powerful Clancy fiction

An airborne plague unleashed on America. A dead Congress. A president riddled by self-doubt. The Second Persian Gulf War.

Tom Clancy, the longtime Top Gun of the military thriller, has taken a major step toward becoming something even better: A top-notch novelist for anyone who loves a powerful story.

"Executive Orders" (Putnam, \$27.95), Clancy's sequel to "Debt of Honor," contains much of the shoot-'em-up stuff and incredible plot twists that readers have come to expect from his novels. What sets this book apart is that for the first time, Clancy has gotten inside Jack Ryan's head, finally letting us see the real person beyond the super-action hero, the guy who once stole a Soviet submarine almost all by himself.

Here's fair warning: If you plan to read "Debt of Honor" before "Executive Orders," then stop right here. There's no way to describe Clancy's newest novel without ruining the end of Honor.

Ryan becomes president as Debt of Honor closes after a 747 jetliner slams into the Capitol during a joint session of Congress. The greatest disaster ever to strike American government happens



after a suicidal Japanese pilot manages to slip past Washington's air defenses by telling air traffic controllers he's on a charter flight to Orlando.

Ryan, who has just been appointed vice president, is in a tunnel near the Capitol when the plane crashes, and the resulting explosion kills the president, the Cabinet, the Supreme Court and most of Congress.

Suddenly, about all that's left of the U.S. government leadership is Jack Ryan.

The ultimate behind-the-scenes assistant, Ryan's never been elect-

ed to anything. He stumbles through his first days as commander-in-chief, and soon the press media and some world leaders start to think that the new American president is a weak, indecisive man.

Is Ryan up to the job? Even he's not sure. "I don't know what to do," he says to an aide, but himself. "Where's the manual, the training course for the job?"

The most dastardly of the villains is the Ayatollah Daryeel of Iran. With the covert help of China and India, Daryeel orders the murder of the Iraqi president and annexes Iraq, spreads the deadly African Ebola virus across America, and brazenly invades Saudi Arabia.

There's more. Daryeel sends terrorists to kidnap the First Lady, Ryan's youngest daughter. The Russian leader even messages a sneak attack would be launched inside the innermost offices of the White House as part of a complex plot to create a new superpower called the United States Republic.

Clancy creates an especially frightening scenario with the Ebola epidemic. Daryeel's agents spread the disease by flying to cities across America armed with shaving cream canisters containing the virus,

which literally eats away the internal organs of its victims. Orlando plays a part, as one of Daryeel's faithful comes to Central Florida and plans the virus at a convention.

Ryan must react to all of this and deal with the usual Washington backstabbing while trying to elect a new Congress, pick a Cabinet and reorganize the Supreme Court.

Ryan gets angry, but his politically savvy chief of staff reminds him that presidents can't afford to lose their tempers. Ryan is shaken by the attempt to kidnap his child, but again he knows he can't lose his cool.

Although it's quite long — nearly 500 pages — Executive Orders unfolds at a taut pace to a climactic desert battle in the Middle East. As Ryan wrestles with every act of evil thrown at him, a confidant — and then vengeful — president emerges.

Clancy returns to his most familiar subject of war in bringing Executive Orders to its conclusion. The novel's only battle is as intense — and technically precise — as any in his earlier novels. But what makes this novel is Jack Ryan. It's nice to meet him after all these years.

Oops: Warner leaves out novelist's epilogue

This hasn't been the best of summers for Carl Hiaasen, the most acclaimed novelist to come out of South Florida since John D. MacDonald invented the place 30 years ago.

First, there were critical slams and sparse audiences for his most hyped film of his novel "Strip Tease."

Then Warner Books printed 530,000 paperbackbacks of his latest crowd-pleaser, "Stormy Weather," and left out the epilogue.

Yep. The last four pages. Many of these copies have been sold over the past month,

and hardly anyone has complained that this well-received comic novel about a sniper hurricane hitting Florida was lacking a certain something, according to the publisher, a large book chain and the author.

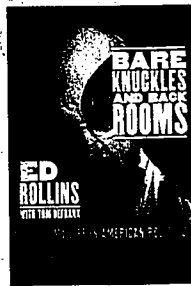
But as Hiaasen pointed out in a phone interview from his Florida Keys home, "It's unrealistic to expect people to complain. How could they complain if they didn't know the epilogue was supposed to be there in the first place?"

A spokeswoman for Warner, Martha Otis, said the publisher notified booksellers about the error. However, there was no effort to let the public know. For

a time, Hiaasen was frustrated enough to contemplate running an ad containing the epilogue, but couldn't figure out where.

Now the writer sounds much less sad than angry. "You should have seen me a month ago, when I first learned about it. To say I was distressed would be an understatement."

The mistake occurred, Otis said, "because the typesetter was setting sample pages that did not include the epilogue. When production proceeded to the freelance proofreading process, the mistake wasn't caught because they weren't proofing from something that had the epilogue."



Rollins pulls no punches

The hot new political book is Ed Rollins' "Bare Knuckles and Back Rooms" (Broadway, \$27.50). The maverick Republican consultant is known for brutal frankness and mean wit.

But the big buzz is over remarks he made after Christie Whitman trounced New Jersey Gov. Jim Florio in 1993. Rollins said black Democrats had been persuaded to stay home from the polls with the help of "walking around money" spread by the Whitman camp to black churches. Days later, Rollins said he lied. In the book, he hedges. Here's some of what he says about:

Christie Whitman When her husband, John, panicked moments before Whitman's crucial debate with Florio, "I worried that this idiotic distraction might unnerve the candidate. But Christie's one cool lady, and once the debate started she really rose to the occasion, despite her bankers husband."

Ross Perot "He suffers from a small man's complex, which includes an enormous need for ego gratification. This partially explains his tendency to spin tall tales, all of which place him squarely at the center of a paranoid and delusional universe."

Arianna Huffington "Even though Arianna was going to appear only in the background with the kids" during a commercial for her husband Michael's California campaign for the U.S. Senate, "you'd have thought she was Elizabeth Taylor filming 'Cleopatra.' She had multiple changes of clothes, her own makeup artist, plus the usual entourage of cooks, nannies, and her own masseuse."

'Mary Reilly,'
'Dogs 2' reach video shelves

New videos in Twin Falls stores this week:

□ "Mary Reilly" (R) — This is a horrid coughed-up hairball of a movie, a macabre indulgence in wretched gloom and repressed sadomasochism. And for all the republican-virtues of the story, it somehow manages to be as dull and leaden as cold unsalted oatmeal.

This is the strange case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde, as told from the point of view of a timid chambermaid, Mary Reilly (Julia Roberts). The movie opens in a nameless, fog-shrouded British city in the 1890s, with Roberts scrubbing the sidewalk.

Julia Roberts as an Irish washer-

woman? Oh Julia, Julia, Julia, you've gone and gotten yourself in trouble again, and that brouge you apparently picked up in a box of Lucky Charms isn't going to save you, either. Mary's employer, Dr. Jekyll (John Malkovich, in yet another slimy, toad-in-aspic role), approaches and asks her to explain the weird harrigan-like scars on her neck and arms, but she declines.

It's a wonder Jekyll can see the scars. It's a wonder anybody can see anything. It's always dark and dank in this movie, as if it were lit by a flashlight and shot through a lousy cheesecloth. There are three colors on the screen: light gray, dark gray and black — oh, and red, but that's only when somebody gets ripped, or they visit the slaughterhouse to collect organs for secret poisons.

(*Knight-Ridder Newspapers*) (*Hastings Video West, Blockbuster*) □ "All Dogs Go to Heaven 2" (PG-13) — This is OK as an animated musical fantasy for children, but it's likely to be a bit of a yawn for their parents.

In the 1989 original, the murt, Charlie Barkin, was dispatched to heaven after he was rubbed out by Carface, his bulldog partner in a Louisiana nightclub, which led to a trip back to earth for revenge.

(*Knight-Ridder Newspapers*) (*Blockbuster, Hastings, Video West*) □ "Mulholland Falls" (R) — It's not "Chinatown," Jake, but "Mulholland Falls" has a brutal period of its own. A Los Angeles-based period thriller strong on amorality and corruption, not to mention sex and violence, "Mulholland Falls" combines a vivid sense of place with a visceral directorial style that fuses controlled fury onto everything it touches.

After only two features, this aesthetic of brutality is becoming a trademark of New Zealand director Lee Tamahori. "Once Were Warriors," his intense debut film (made after considerable commercial work), was all crude energy and little decay. Not surprisingly, "Mulholland" has none of the elegance and sophistication of the Robert Towne/Roman Polanski classic, but Tamahori has his own unrelenting ways of holding an audience's attention.

For one thing, the director has imposed his sledgehammer technique and pulp sensibility on his players. Stars Nick Nolte, Melanie Griffith, Chazz Palminteri and John Malkovich, plus key supporting actors Jennifer Connelly, Andrew McCarthy and Treat Williams, form an ensemble in sync with the film's neo-noir sensibility. Shakespeare Fest performs 'Twelfth Night'

KETCHUM — If Shakespeare ever wrote a screwball comedy, it's got to be "Twelfth Night." "It's the last comedy that Shakespeare wrote that's really light, much more so than works like "The Tempest," said Charles Fee, director of the Idaho Shakespeare Festival's production that will move to a tent on the grounds of the Tyrolean Lodge for a three-day run next week. "The later works are darker, full of more complicated characters."

The characters in "Twelfth Night" may be simple, but the plot is anything but. The story of shipwrecked twins tossed up on a foreign shore, it's full of false identities, red herrings and one woman ardently wooing another

The Idaho Shakespeare Festival will present William Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night," on Thursday, Friday, Sept. 6, and Saturday, Sept. 7, in a tent outside Ketchum's Tyrolean Lodge. Show time is 6:30 p.m. Matinees are also scheduled for Thursday and Friday, Sept. 6, at 11:30 a.m. Tickets, which are \$35 for adults and \$10 for students, are available by calling the Tyrolean Lodge at 725-5335. Matinee tickets are \$5.

(who's dressed as a man).

"The plot is very similar to 'Much Ado About Nothing,' but they're very different plays," Fee said.

"Twelfth Night," one of three Shakespeare comedies that the ISF is doing this summer, runs relatively obscure, but it's attracted great actors over the years to the role of Malvolio, a priggish manservant.

"(Laurence) Olivier and (Ralph) Richardson did Malvolio

over the years, but this is really a play that doesn't lend itself to stars," Fee said. "It's an ensemble comedy in the truest sense."

The ill-starred twins, Sebastian and Viola, are separated after the shipwreck, and each believes the other to be dead.

Viola dons male attire and gets a job as a page for the Duke of Orsino, who's enamored of a noblewoman named Olivia, who wants nothing to do with the duke.

But Olivia falls head over heels in love with Viola, disguised as Cesario, and pursues her ardently. Another admirer of Olivia, Sir Andrew Aguecheek, grows jealous and challenges Viola to a duel.

Ten-long-lost Sebastian shows up just in time, is mistaken to Viola, and defeats Sir Andrew in the duel. Olivia, thinking Sebastian is Viola, falls in love with him and they are secretly married.

When her deception is revealed, Viola appears to be in

serious trouble until the Duke declares his love for her.

"Twelfth Night" only works when you have six or seven strong actors," Fee said. "It doesn't work at all when one actor overwhelms the others."

Five of the actors in this production are Actors Equity members and veterans of ISF productions, including Steve Tague as Malvolio, Joe Conley Golden as Sebastian, Kathleen Tague as Viola.

"Taking 'Twelfth Night,' or any play on the road is a nightmare logistically," Fee said. "But we look at it as a reward. It's a reward for a summer of hard work. We get to visit a great place, stay in hotel rooms and perform for a new audience."

The production is underwritten by Ketchum hotelier Henry Taylor. "He basically pays for all of the costs of taking the play to Ketchum," Fee said. "There's no way we could do it without him."

Bellevue celebrates its unique heritage Labor Day

BELLEVUE — Joanne Branan isn't sure how many Labor Days that Bellevue has invited a few friends over. She's kind of lost track.

"(Local historian) Robert McKercher used to know, but I'm not sure," said Branan, a Bellevue grocer who's helping organize this year's event. "Seventy-five years? A long time anyway."

The end-of-summer party in this town of 1,800 is more low-keyed than nearby Ketchum's Wagon Days, but it still draws a crowd.

"We expect about 1,000, but we prepare enough food for about 1,500," Branan said.

It all starts Monday at 11:30 a.m. with a "shootout" on Main Street, followed by a parade at noon to City Park. There the Idaho Old-Time Fiddlers will start playing at noon, highlighting an afternoon of live entertainment, food, crafts and games.

"We'll take (craft or food) booths right up until (the festi-

val) opens," Branan said.

Bellevue's place in Idaho history is unique. Organized in the 1880s as Gate City, because of its location at the mouth of the Wood River Valley, it boomed as a smelting center and shipment point after nearby Minnie Moore Mine opened.

Bellevue was originally called Biddyville, but after its chance to become the seat of Logan County in 1890, the Legislature changed the name to something more suitable.

The town served as county seat from 1890 to 1895, which Logan County was merged into the new Blaine County. The territorial government granted Bellevue a charter, and it's now the only chartered city in Idaho.

(PG, for some violence, language and brief partial nudity.) (*Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema*)

□ "The Hunchback of Notre Dame" — Disney's 34th full-length animated film, which boasts spectacular if schizophrenic animation, isn't offensive because it has so little to do with Hugo's 1831 novel; the 1939 Charles Laughton classic, best-known of nine earlier screen adaptations, took a few liberties itself. But what has been left out makes it not only mediocre but cruel. (G) (*Motor-Vu Drive-In*)

□ "Independence Day" — Mean, marauding aliens hit planet Earth planning to take no prisoners. Spectacular special effects are joined to a cardboard story, line that exactly reproduces the fatuous sensibility of the 1950s. (PG-13, for sci-fi destruction and violence.) (*Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Ace Theater of Wendell*)

□ "The Island of Dr. Moreau" — The newest version of H.G. Wells' 1896 novel is a disaster, a travesty that at least allows Marlon Brando a great comic portrayal of the mad scientist Moreau, who thinks if you cross animals and humans you eradicate evil. David Thewlis is game as the young Englishman, but the rest of the cast needs all the compassion it can get. (PG-13, for sci-fi violence, horror and gore involving mutant creatures.) (*Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Ski Time 4 Cinemas of Ketchum*)

□ "Chain Reaction" — A government cover-up provides the backdrop for this action thriller featuring Keanu Reeves as a streetwise lab technician who, together with a beautiful young scientist (Rachel Weisz) goes on the lam after being framed for murder. The action turns on the character of their boss (Morgan Freeman), who also finds himself wronged when he learns of the government's insidious reasons for the frame-up. (*Liberty Theater of Hailey*)

□ "Courage Under Fire" — Intelligent, involving and serious, this Edward Zwick-directed film of the search for the truth about a Gulf War battle is as honestly emotional as Hollywood allows itself to get. Though they do not appear together, stars Meg Ryan and Dennis Quaid investigate the film. (R, for war violence and language.) (*Twin Cinema, Ace Theater of Wendell*)

□ "The Crow: City of Angels" — Vincent Perez assumes the big bad powers, returning from the dead to setting out to destroy the bad guys (including rocker Iggy Pop) who populate a surreal city of evil. (R, for strong violence, drug content, language and sexuality.) (*Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Ski Time 4 Cinemas of Ketchum*)

□ "The Fan" — One of the more feeble and misguided pictures in recent memory. An ear-shattering soundtrack and mad-up-up visuals cannot make up for the pinhead plot. Robert De Niro's performance as a psychopath is wearisomely derivative of some of his earlier work. With Wesley Snipes. (R, for

erations. Vedder and Pearl Jam adjust attitude

AlternA-rock has been in an unhealthy state for some time. It isn't just the crush of shallow, sound-alike bands swamping the airwaves, there's also something sick about the absurdly self-flagellating attitude many alternA-acts assume. It's one thing, after all, to decry the selfish arrogance of the rock star excess, quite another to avoid even the appearance of having fun in the name of artistic integrity.

A lot of people blame Pearl Jam for this. For one thing, Pearl Jam is the band most sound-alikes sound like. (Would Seven Mary Three even exist were it not for Pearl Jam's "Ten"?)

But there's also Pearl Jam's ultra-purist public image to consider. Although the band's devotion to principles — such as its refusal to make videos or make fans pay unreasonably high Ticketmaster service charges — is admirable enough, it has also taken the notion of being made miserable by success to ridiculous extremes. When singer Eddie Vedder complained to Rolling Stone magazine a few years ago that hearing fans sing "Black" bothered him because it took away from the personal nature of the song, he set a new standard for rock star self-righteousness. Fortunately, Pearl Jam puts all that behind it with "No Code"

(Epic 67500), its long-awaited fourth album. Not only has the band jettisoned the grunge-rock vocabulary it made famous, but it also seems to have outgrown the obnoxious alibi of alterna-rock's "poor pitiful me" pose. "Present Tense" sums up the band's new attitude nicely. While a guitar, its sound is dark and chewy as treacle, sketches a nasty, minor-key progression. Vedder tackles the self-pity issue head on. "You can spend your time alone/Redigesting past regrets,"

he sings. "Or you can come to terms and realize/You're the only one who can forgive yourself."

"Makes much more sense to live in the present tense," he concludes. Is he living in the present tense is clear from the album's first song, a paean to impermanence called "Sometimes."

In place of the punkish aggression that powered much of "Vitalogy," the band's last album, "Sometimes" relies on space and understatement, as Mike

McCready and Stone Gossard bread lean, interlocking guitar lines over the warm growl of Jeff Ament's doublebass and Jack Irons' gently churning drums.

It's a wonderful performance, in part because the music ebbs and recedes right along with the lyric, turning the song into a single wave of emotion, but mostly because the bandmembers are so in sync with one another that it's hard to notice what the others are doing. It's truly selfless playing, and as such, seems an ideal choice to set the tone for "No Code."

How so? Because in listening to the album, it becomes clear that instead of spending time on the road since "Vitalogy" came out, the members of Pearl Jam spent their time playing together — not just woodshedding, but listening to each other. Perhaps that's why "No Code" conveys such a strong sense of musical community; as a listener, it's easy to imagine yourself inside the circle of musicians shown on the album's inside cover photo.

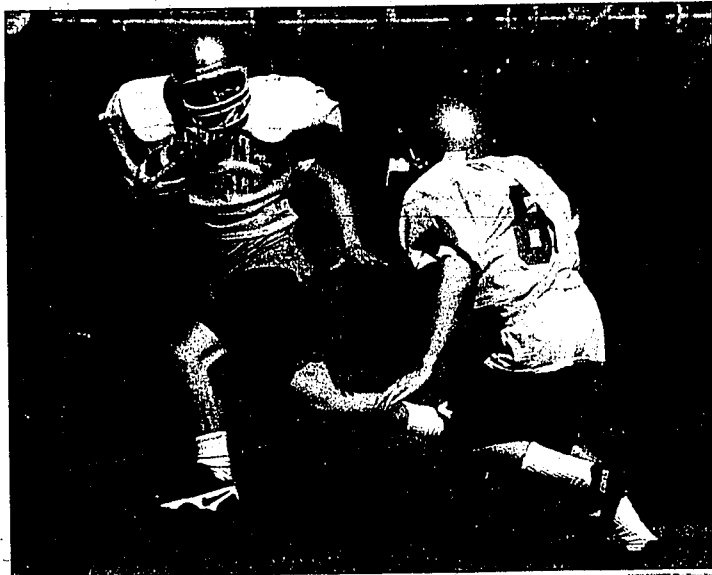

TF-Minico rivalry near an end?

TWIN FALLS — Call it the rivalry that wouldn't die.

At least not yet, anyway. Tonight's Twin Falls-Minico football duel is the renewal of the annual clash between the two largest schools in the Magic Valley and is going to be the end of a losing streak, one way or the other.

The Bruins are trying to snap a seven-game losing streak that stretches back to last year's Minico matchup. And the Spartans, after consecutive one-point losses, have dropped eight straight to Twin Falls.

The Spartans haven't beaten Twin Falls since 1986 (27-13). The teams didn't meet in 1989. Since 1988, Twin Falls holds a 26-7 series advantage.

If not for those last two close calls, this game might be losing a lot of its luster. After all, Twin Falls and Minico don't compete for playoff spots with the Spartans in Division II. And now that Burley has rejoined the A-1 ranks, the Bobcats certainly draw more of the "rivalry" tag for Minico than does Twin Falls.

Add to that the Bruins' recent dominance — 12 in the last 13 — and the ingredients for the end of a once-heated rivalry are in place. This was once, after all, a series in which two straight victories were a rarity. From 1970 until 1982, the Bruins strung together consecutive Minico wins only twice.

But the Spartans played Twin within 13-12 two years ago and only a final-quarter fumble allowed the Bruins to escape 21-20 last year.

Other developments may conspire down the road to deplete the livelihood of this rivalry, however.

Class A-1 schools in the Magic Valley are quickly becoming islands apart in terms of state scheduling. The growth of the Boise Valley and eastern Idaho have caused the number of large schools in those areas to soar in recent years, making justification for road games in the Magic Valley more difficult. Why drive from, say, Meridian to Twin Falls when there are plenty of A-1 schools (eight others) within a 200-mile radius?

Investors propose minor league team to Utah city government

LOGAN, Utah (AP) - Doug Foxley made a pitch that the Logan City Council might not be able to resist: he'd like to bring a minor league baseball team to town. The council can arrange financing for a ballpark.

Slump frustrates Yankees' owner

SEATTLE (AP) - The New York Yankees showed their frustration in a brawl with the Seattle Mariners. Owner George Steinbrenner showed his frustration with a verbal attack on pitcher Kenny Rogers.

"The mystery to me is this guy Rogers," Steinbrenner told the New York Post on Wednesday, a day after Rogers blew a four-run lead in a 7-4 loss.

"I'm not inside his head, so I don't understand what's going on with him. But he has not been what I figured he'd be for us when we signed him. I know what he and his agent represented to us last winter and I just haven't seen it. There's got to be a problem somewhere."

The Yankees, routed 10-2 Wednesday night, left for California with a four-game losing streak and a 5-9 mark in their last 14 games. Their lead over Baltimore, at 12 games on July 29, was down to just four.

"I will be honest; I don't know," Steinbrenner responded to The New York Times when asked if he thought the team could still win it all.

"We'll find out in September. I've got to believe because I helped get most of these guys. I have to have confidence in them and their ability to prevail."

Mariners reliever Tim Davis touched off the brawl Wednesday night, knocking down Paul O'Neill with the first pitch of the eighth inning.

"It's an emotional game and right now we're on edge. It doesn't take much to set us off," manager Joe Torre said. "We just can't get it going. It's a tough time for us now."

The 17-minute brawl had a lot of wrestling and a few punches thrown, including one by Seattle catcher John Marzano that missed connecting on O'Neill. The Yankees outfielder and Darryl Strawberry were ejected along with Marzano, Bobby Ayala and Chris Bosio of the Mariners.

"I think the Yankees looked a little frustrated to me," said Mariners manager Lou Piniella, who the Yankees said dislikes O'Neill going back to their dugout together with the Cincinnati Reds. "But I would hate to use the term bad blood."

In the bottom of the eighth, Yankees reliever Jeff Nelson was thrown out for hitting Joey Cora in the elbow with the first pitch in the inning.

Dwight Gooden, who pitched a no-hitter against Seattle at Yankee Stadium on May 14, didn't help the Yankees at all Wednesday night by throwing 122 pitches, and only 57 of them were strikes.

Gooden allowed eight runs, including three homers for the first time in his career, on nine hits and six walks. In a 13-pitch sequence in the fourth, he walked Alex Rodriguez, Ken Griffey Jr. and Edgar Martinez.

"I was totally out of sync," he admitted.

Steinbrenner said he wouldn't interfere with Torre.

"Every time I do, the papers rip me apart," Steinbrenner told the Post. "Joe Torre's team. He gets the glory and he has to take the heat. I haven't talked to him. I'm sure he's concerned, too."

Woods holds his own in pro debut

MILWAUKEE (AP) - Tiger Woods turned in a workmanlike 4-under-par 67 in his first round as a professional golfer in the Greater Milwaukee Open on Thursday.

Woods had an eagle and three birdies against one bogey and was five strokes behind leader Nolan Henke.

"I thought I got off to a really good start," Woods said. "I think it was a perfect start. Sixty-seven, I think that's a good number. I'm right in the tournament."

Amid intense media coverage that chronicled his every move and a throng of fans that gawked and gasped with every shot, Woods had two birdies and an eagle in his first six holes.

He matched par from No. 7 through No. 16. His first bogey as a pro came on the 381-yard, par-4 17th.

Woods, who announced he was turning pro on Tuesday, said the hoopla through the week wore him down. "I expected it to be crazy, but I didn't expect it to be as draining as it was," said

Nike unleashes advertising blitz based on newest star

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - Look out, world. Nike is unleashing its advertising armada on golf's newest starling.

The publicity push planned this weekend for Tiger Woods is remarkable even by Nike standards. Michael Jordan and Bo Jackson never got this kind of attention.

Nike is canceling all of its previously scheduled television ads through Monday night and replacing them with its first Woods ads.

It will be Tiger during college football, Tiger during major league baseball, Tiger during U.S. Open tennis, Tiger

during SportsCenter and, of course, Tiger on Monday Night Football.

"Tiger Woods is to go what Michael Jordan was to basketball for Nike," said Shelly Hale Young, senior analyst for Hambrecht & Quist, an investment bank in San Francisco. "It's going to put them on the map."

The blitz began Thursday when Nike purchased three full pages in the nation's largest daily newspaper, the Wall Street Journal, for \$342,000. The newspaper goes to the homes and offices of 1.8 million subscribers, a good share of them golfers.

He said he wasn't nervous, just relieved, when he finally teed off

as a pro. "I said, 'Hey, finally I get to play golf.' Dealing with everything over the last few days has been awfully hard," Woods said. "I'm back in my element again."

Just before he teed off, Woods was signing autographs.

Woods ailed the gallery with some tremendous tee shots, but he showed frustration over missed puts, especially after a 5-footer for birdie. Hipped the cup on par-4 12th. He walked off the green muttering under his breath.

Henke's 9-under-par round on the 6,739-yard Brown Deer Park Golf Course was the lowest in the three years the Greater Milwaukee Open has been played on the public course. But Henke realized his spectacular 62 was an afterthought on the day when Woods made the most heralded debut by an amateur golfer since Jack Nicklaus 35 years ago.

Henke said he didn't mind it one bit. "I've played with him and he's a great talent," Henke said. "All Tiger's going to do is get bigger and go higher."

Agassi crushed - but just for a set and a half

NEW YORK (AP) - For a set and a half, Olympic bronze medalist Leander Paes lunged and lobbed, volleying and slugging shots to perfection in a masterful show against golf medalist Andre Agassi.

Then they played the rest of the match. Agassi cranked up his game. Pies returned to earth, and suddenly the Indian's 6-3, 4-0 lead turned to dust Thursday as Agassi won seven straight games and 18 of the next 19 to reach the third round of the U.S. Open.

"He was playing the final out-of-this-world tennis," Agassi said after he carved his 3-6, 6-4, 6-1, 6-0 comeback out of a most desperate situation — five break points against him while serving the fifth game of the second set.

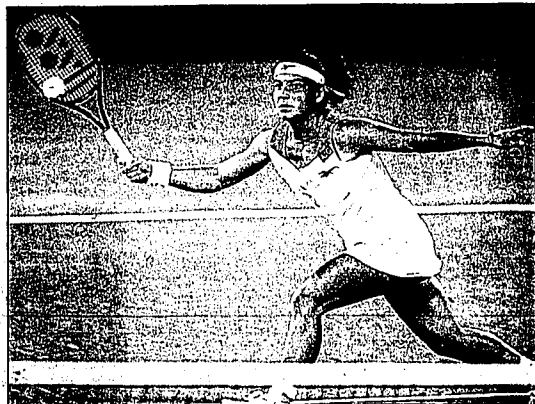
"It was impossible, really, for anyone to play much better than he was playing. He was hitting screaming, on-the-full-run passing shots by me."

Agassi said he did everything he could in the first set, and didn't "donate" his serve.

"I just couldn't quite break him because of the shots he was coming up with," Agassi said. "When he closed out that first set, his confidence rose, he went for first shots and came up with spectacular ones. Really, I was just dodging bullets at that point. I had to elevate my game, hit bigger, take more chances."

The fifth game of the third set packed all the drama anyone could want, and the last of Paes' brilliant shots. Paes launched one lob from the back fence that landed squarely on the baseline well beyond the stunned Agassi. Paes drilled a running forehand like Pete Sampras. He darted to his left for a backhand volley as if he were Boris Becker, but didn't quit. He started to find the range he'd been missing, and fought off the fifth break point with a forehand that Paes stretched to reach and volleyed wide. Agassi dropped a winning volley on the next point, then ended that longest of games after seven deuces with a service winner down the middle.

Paes, showing his sportsmanship in a match that reflected mutual respect, applauded with his racket and congratulated Agassi on that game-winning serve. Though neither knew it at that moment, the match was effectively over right there.

Agassi won his sixth straight game to close out the set, punctuating it with a highlight-film kind of play when Paes led 3-0 on serve. Caught in the corner at the baseline when Paes deftly dropped a half-volley just over the net, Agassi scrambled diagonally across the court to scoop it up. Paes volleyed that ball back the other way, and Agassi reversed field from off the court, caught up to the ball and whipped a backhand pass while running backward.

Agassi roared to the crowd, pumped his fists in triumph, and Paes knew he could do no more against the 1994 Open champion and 1995 runner-up.

No such drama accompanied No. 3 Thomas Muster's 6-3, 6-2, 6-4 victory over Dirk Dier of

Germany, nor No. 13 Thomas Enqvist's 6-3, 6-2, 6-3 romp over Guillaume Raoux of France.

The night's final two matches ended with seeded players being ousted.

Jeff Tarango beat No. 10 Marcelo Rios of Chile 6-4, 4-6, 7-6 (7-5), 6-2, then Alex O'Brien eliminated No. 11 MaliVai Washington 6-3, 6-4, 5-7, 3-6, 6-3.

Defending women's champ and No. 1 seed Steffi Graf also won easily, 6-2, 6-1 against Austrian Karin Kschwendt, as did No. 3 Arantxa Sanchez Vicario in a 6-2, 6-2 victory over Nicole Arendt.

No. 7 Jana Novotna had a harder time beating Florencia Labat of Argentina 6-2, 4-6, 6-2. No. 14 Barbara Paulus of Austria edged Elena Wagner of Germany 7-5, 7-6 (7-5).

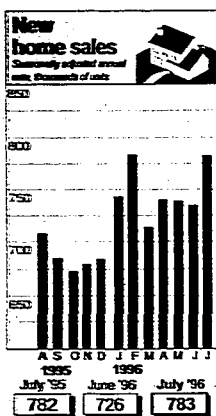

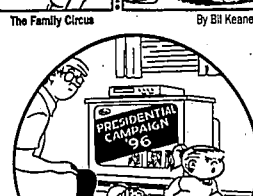

Minimum-wage law has perk for pensions

When President Clinton signed a bill to raise the minimum wage 50 cents an hour, most Americans focus on what it would mean to the nation's lowest-paid, low-skilled workers. What received far less attention is that the bill contains what many experts consider the biggest pension reform in at least a decade — benefiting the lower-class, middle-class and super-wealthy alike.

"There's something for everyone," said retirement expert Bruce J. Tenkin. "This affects everyone."

In general, the bill will help all workers by making it easier for companies to adopt or maintain 401(k) retirement plans. It erases minimum-vesting rules, creates less-onerous retirement plans and corrects a decade-old oversight by extending 401(k)s to tax-exempt organizations and state and local governments.

The bill also addresses the back end of the retirement account: withdrawals. Notably, prudent middle- and upper-class savers soon might be able to shave their taxes by waiving excess taxes, postponing mandatory withdrawals until after age 70½, and simplifying how you measure the bite on annuities.

Of course, there are some black linkings to this silver cloud. The bill eliminates a common retirement plan for people in small businesses, kills a tax credit for middle-class taxpayers to average out big withdrawals, and could cost the unwary more tax.

Don't be surprised if some of the changes sound familiar. Despite widespread backing by workers, business and pension experts, two presidents vetoed them — Bush twice and Clinton once — after Congress tacked them onto controversial budget bills. This time, though, Congress attached them to the wage bill — and many industry experts are now applauding.

"How could this happen? My god, rationality has broken out on Capitol Hill," joked Martha Fridy-Finterson, a benefits attorney for KPMG Peat Marwick in Washington.

Here's a look at some of the details, how they could affect you — and what you need to do to play them to your advantage.

• **What changes:** If you do too good a job squirreling away money into your retirement plans, Uncle Sam lops off 15 percent if you withdraw more than \$155,000 from government-approved retirement plans. That excess tax will be suspended for three years, a period determined by budgetary logic only a politician could understand.

• **Who should care:** There is no excess tax in 1997, 1998 and 1999.

• **Who should care:** The window could benefit people planning to withdraw a hefty chunk in one shot (say, to pay off a mortgage or buy a franchise) they want to run in semi-retirement, whose plans hold at least \$1 million, or whose balances could swell enough to eventually trigger excess distributions.

• **Planning issues:** Don't wait through the window hastily. "There's a lot of emotion with excess taxes," Tenkin said. "This will cause a lot of chaos, because people will say, 'Now's your chance to buy that condo or that citrus grove in Hawaii!'"

While many people can save money, many experts predict the waiver actually will generate taxes by pulling savings from tax-protected accounts and subjecting them to income taxes on the withdrawals and the future earnings.

Crunch some numbers, factoring in income taxes and how much your money could grow if left untouched. Another factor that might push you through the window: retirement plans that are bulging when you die face a 15 percent excise tax anyway.

• **What changes:** Many taxpayers have eased the tax bite on retirement withdrawals by electing to treat the money as if it were spread over five years, rather than all in one year. That option has been repealed. (People who hit age 50 by Jan. 1, 1986, can still qualify for 10-year averaging.)

• **Who should care:** Five-year averaging is dead after 1995.

• **Who should care:** This is arguably the biggest loss for the middle class in this legislation. Although upper-class savers already stuck in the top tax brackets will yawn, savers who would bound into a top tax bracket by tapping an account can save substantially.

• **Planning issues:** Assess whether you truly need or want to pull out the money in big chunks. You might save by taking out money only as you need it and leaving the rest to grow tax-deferred. You also might consider annuitizing the account so you'll receive steady annual payments to flatten out your withdrawals.

• **What changes:** A Salary Reduction Simplified Employee Pension Plan, or SARSEP, is the first retirement plan many companies with 25 or fewer workers adopt. Under the new rules, you can't establish a SARSEP after 1996. Existing plans can continue, however. (Simplified Employee Pensions, or SEP-IRAs, are not affected.)

Instead, companies will be able to choose from two new "SAFE" plans: short for Savings Incentive Match Plan. One is an IRA, the other a 401(k). Both are designed to be easy and inexpensive for companies with less than 100 workers to use.

• **Who should care:** You must open a SARSEP by Dec. 31.

• **Who should care:** Anyone whose small company has yet to adopt a retirement plan.

• **Planning issues:** As a business owner, you have four months to decide whether a SARSEP fits your company. As an employee, you could lobby your boss to consider a SARSEP, the upcoming SIMPLE plan or even a regular 401(k). Each has its pros and cons (employer and employee might differ on those judgments).

Investors should cruise the Web — but with caution

If you're not connected to the Web, here's another reason to join the online world. Starting in mid-September, the National Association of Securities Dealers will make it possible for investors to file stock-fraud complaints electronically through the regulatory organization's site on the World Wide Web <http://www.nasdr.com>.

And sometimes — though it's not clear when — the Web site will contain information on brokers and securities firms that have violated securities regulations, says Mary Shapiro, president of the NASD's regulatory unit. That information can be ordered now through the NASD's hotline at 800-289-9999, but an answer can take days.

The NASD has taken some well-deserved steps recently for allowing securities firms to gauge small investors in the Nasdaq stock market. Establishing the web site is just one of the ways the association has tried to polish its image and improve services to investors. Another was hiring Shapiro, who was highly regarded as a champion of small investors when she was a com-

misioner of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

I explored the new web site and found it pretty useful. There's advice on how to avoid being cheated, information on the dispute-arbitration process, addresses of the NASD district offices, as well as information on state securities regulators. (If you're calling, you can order most of this information through the hotline.)

One of the most illuminating pages was an archive of NASD press releases going back to early this year, many of them dealing with stock-fraud investigations. Usually these just go to reporters and, unfortunately, many never get much attention from the press. There are so many frauds that few newspapers can report them all.

The releases, and the complete list of disciplinary actions on the "Notices to Members" page, offer quite a view of the kinds of scams perpetrated against small investors. They range from the typical "churning" case, where a broker pumps up his commissions by churning his customer to make frequent and ill-conceived trades, to more elaborate market manipulation schemes.

Networks heat up pro football television war as season begins

NBC, looking for continuity to combat Emmy-winning "Fox NFL Sunday" with a new hour pregame format, likely found it by moving Cris Collinsworth in-studio to succeed a boring Joe Montana for this season's pro football television war.

While Montana failed to speak out on major issues, Collinsworth shows no hesitation diving into the league's drug problems, Michael Irvin's five-game suspension with Super Bowl champion Dallas, Jimmy Johnson's move from Fox to replace Miami coaching legend Don Shula, and the rift between New England coach Bill Parcells and team owner Bob Kraft.

"The big difference between Montana and

me is he's a nice guy," cracks Collinsworth, a three-time Pro Bowl receiver with the Cincinnati Bengals. "We have a fighting spirit going at NBC and Fox already told Mike Ditka not to worry about hurting my feelings. I don't want contrived commentary."

When NBC kicks off its AFC slate Sept. 1 with the Patriots and Dolphins (among other regions), it will be out to erase Fox's 54 percent pregame Nielsen bulge (5.4 to 3.5) and Collinsworth can be expected to zero in on the Parcells-Johnson collision and the league's drug issue.

How outspoken can he be? Observe:

"It's embarrassing that year after year, the Players Association is indifferent while fans watch a few million-dollar players blow their dough on drugs.

Put to vote, the players would opt for strong standards. But the Players Association protects a handful who hide behind the weakest link. The second favorite a player tests positive, the penalty should be Boom, you're done for the year."

Collinsworth knows Irvin is another head-line example of the continuing problem - and it goes way beyond how his suspension by Commissioner Paul Tagliabue leaves the Cowboys suddenly vulnerable. "I'm not into whether Irvin's a good or bad guy, but the league has to do something and the Players Association ought to be there for leadership."

Collinsworth, who returns to Home Box Office's weekly "Inside the NFL," expects Johnson to light a fire

under Miami quarterback Dan Marino and build toward the success he enjoyed with the Cowboys. "He got rid of the Dolphins' three best defensive players - Bryan Cox, Marco Coleman and Troy Vincent - plus tight end Eric Green. The Dolphins are third in the AFC East in talent behind Buffalo and Indianapolis."

As for the Patriots' Parcells-Kraft flak, Collinsworth sees a silver lining. "I don't think it's a good idea for a coach to handle personnel moves because he has to coach guys that he may have given a healthy paycheck. When you pull money away from a player, it gets personal. Both responsibilities are too big for one man. Parcells would differ with me, but I think the Patriots are better off now."

Q: Is Michael J. Fox returning to a TV series because the big-time movie offers have dried up? — P.L.

A: There's no doubt that in the '80s, with TV's hit "Family Ties" coming along with the hugely successful "Back to the Future" movies, Canadian-born Fox, now 35, was one of the world's biggest box-office draws.

But Michael was unhappy with the way his career was going. He's taken a quieter path in the '90s, making fewer and more daring movie choices. As for his upcoming TV series, ABC's "Spin City," we'll get to see Michael play New York City's deputy mayor.

Q: Fox says, "I had forgotten much. I loved doing situation comedy."

Q: Has Fran Drescher gotten over the trauma of being raped? — L.C.

A: There's only one person who can answer that question, of course, and she's speaking out in "Enter Whitney" her recent autobiography. As "The Nanny" star writes: "The answer (is) yes, but not for a long, long time, and some scars just never go away."

the coming season with the addition of three new actresses, one of whom is black, and a male Hispanic. Pamela remains the show's mainstay and top-billed personality.

The June birth of son Brandon meant that Lee, 28, had to watch her diet and work out regularly. She also claims that she didn't gain all that much extra weight during the pregnancy. In any case, Pamela has worked hard to get back into "Baywatch" shape.

My Hollywood spies who see her about town say she looks terrific. What a relief for Lee's hordes of male fans and the "Baywatch" producers.

Q: Does Richard Gere let his fabulously good looks go when he's not making a movie? Does this have something to do with his spiritualism? — M.O.

A: My Chicago spies ran across Gere when he showed up with Tibet's exiled spiritual leader, the Dalai Lama, at a benefit fund-raising appearance. The handsome 47-year-old actor's hair was obviously untouched; his mane was mostly gray. He also sported a slightly unkempt, grayish beard.

One Chicago scribe characterized his appearance as "scruffy."

Q: What will Brooke Shields be doing on her new TV series this fall? — R.F.

A: Even as I write, Brooke's new show, "Suddenly Susan," is undergoing last-minute changes. Her sitcom is being pitched by NBC as a "can't miss." An earlier version of "Suddenly Susan" costarred Elizabeth Ashley as a tear-up-the-scenery novelist. Brooke played a book editor with a commitment-dodging boyfriend, occasionally performing slapstick humor to spice things up.

The latest, toned-down "Suddenly Susan" version has Shields playing a magazine editor in San Francisco, a "warm, approachable character."

Q: Given his personal problems and poor choices of roles, hasn't Chevy Chase had it as a big movie star? — R.R.

A: Chase has had substance abuse problems. And there were such movie duds in the early '80s as "Oh, Heavenly Dog!" and "Under the Rainbow." In addition, there was his notoriously dismal attempt at a TV talk show in 1993.

Chevy's biggest Hollywood successes, ironically, were roles as a bumbling, middle-class father in the "National Lampoon's Vacation" series.

Chase, who turns 43 in October, is going on vacation again. His latest big-screen outing is "National Lampoon's Las Vegas Vacation," being filmed at the Mirage Hotel in Las Vegas. Chevy is hoping that "Vegas Vacation" will be successful enough to chase away his career blues.

Q: What's become of teen icon Molly Ringwald? Has she given up acting? — T.E.

A: Let's not write off Molly's career just yet — she's only 28. The Sacramento, Calif.-born actress retired from the Hollywood scene after starring in the series of "brat pack" movies of the mid-'80s ("16 Candles," "The Breakfast Club," "Pretty in Pink"). The pouty redhead moved to Paris, where she spent two years studying and living with a French writer.

Among her more recent credits are Stephen King's television miniseries "The Stand" (1994) and the big-screen film "Malicious" (1995).

Things are looking better for Molly these days. This fall we'll see her co-star in an ABC sitcom, "Towies," about three Massachusetts women who live in the town where they grew up.

Q: I hear that Joe DiMaggio's autographs are tough to come by these days. The legendary Yankee Clipper

knows they're worth about \$350 each to collectors, so he doesn't dispense them easily. Does he ever just sign for a fan? — T.G.

A: Recently, an older man met the famous ball player at a party and reminded him that, as a youth living near Yankee Stadium, he was rudely rebuffed by Joe when the pen he laid offered for signing began to leak.

"I never did get your autograph," the man said. DiMaggio, 81, quickly whipped out a pen, grinned and rectified the situation these many years later.

Q: Is Priscilla Presley still furious with daughter Lisa for marrying Michael Jackson? Are the two speaking? — G.S.

A: Priscilla, Elvis' 51-year-old ex, prefers not to discuss her daughter's marriage to Jackson. Lisa Marie Presley eloped with Jackson in May 1994, and the marriage lasted only 20 months before founding early this year, just before Presley's 26th birthday.

The Hollywood rumor mill had her brother Priscilla doing her best through out to break it up, though she won't comment — she won't even mention Jackson's name to interviewers.

Priscilla lives with 41-year-old Italian screenwriter Marco Garibaldi, her lover of 12 years, and the father of their 9-year-old son, Navarone. Priscilla says she feels very close to Lisa Marie and her two children (7-year-old Danielle and 3-year-old Benjamin).

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle never used a "soap opera" device with his Sherlock Holmes novels (he wrote them in serialized format). He also used another method familiar to soap fans: character resurrection. Doyle had killed off Holmes when he tired of him. But he was forced to bring him back to life when his readers demanded more Holmes stories. (Doyle understood what

soap scribbles know so well: nothing is improbable once a writer invents a way to do it.

For fans of Anthony Herrera, and of James Stebenbeck, the dashing if dastardly character he created on "As the World Turns," good news is that the improbable return of the apparently dead Stebenbeck turns out to be possible after all. Barring last minute changes, Herrera is scheduled to reprise Stebenbeck for two appearances on September 17 and 18. However, how the "dead" Stebenbeck returns is, as this is being written, embargoed. (That means as much as I'd love to tell all, it was sealed too.)

But as Herrera says, "The writers have come up with a very clever way to bring me back." And so they have.

The multi-talented Herrera (the acts, writes, produces, directs, etc.) says he's had two especially exciting things happen since he last saw Stebenbeck in Okalade. "One was to form my own touring company, Bell Mare," he said. "The other was to live in South Africa. I was in Johannesburg during the election of Nelson Mandela where I performed the play I wrote with Will Osborne called 'Smoke and Mirrors.' It was a great success over there. I understand that humor, essentially, is universal. But I didn't know it would work as well as it did."

Herrera noted, "You can't avoid being aware of the political climate at work in the country. As a matter of fact, I hadn't had to think so much about political philosophy since my college days at the University of Mississippi — Old Miss. Anyway, it was a wonderful experience, and I look forward to going back at some point. I've been living here, but once I returned to New York, I realized that I'm on the island — Manhattan — that's been the plan." Herrera credits friends for

helping him get his first tour with "Smoke and Mirrors" on the road.

"After I wrote the play, I took it to my show producer and showed it to my Major performers who is honored in the play through a character called Harrington, whom we never see, but who is talked about as a great film director. With his help, and with the help of my Sigma Chi fraternity brothers, I booked a tour of the play, knowing nothing at that time about being on the road with the theater. Through family friends, I met Michael Parker, who had been a theater major at Old Miss. He was my first stage manager. He went on to do film and has now become my production manager."

"So far, I've toured with three productions: 'Smoke and Mirrors,' 'Love Letters' with cabaret Elaine Prince or Elizabeth Hubbard, and 'The Wide Net,' which is a film I wrote and directed for American Playhouse in 1986, and for which I cast a young, almost unknown actress named Kym Sedgwick. Out to 10 years later, and everyone knows Kym Sedgwick. In any event, whenever I tour, whether it's with one of the plays or with the film, the first question I've always been asked by the audience is if I'm going back to 'As the World Turns.'"

Now, the question has to be, will he return on a regular basis, and, how will the soap make it happen?

"I don't know if it will happen," Herrera said. "But I'm sure if that's the plan, they'll find a way to do it."

HOLLYWOOD — Parents should be happy to learn that not all the new fall kids' series are "Power Ranger" clones. In fact, there actually are some educational series in the offing: the PBS quiz series "Where in Time Is Carmen Sandiego?" Clinton drops a line to former CBS News' Saturday anchor

CHICAGO - Two proud fathers found themselves chatting the other day about the thrill of unexpectedly conceiving daughters after adoption had seemed the only option.

One of them was CBS newsmann Bob Schieffer, who had just ended 20 years of anchoring the "CBS Evening News" Saturday edition. The other was President Clinton, who phoned Schieffer from Washington within minutes after he tearfully said goodbye to viewers.

Schieffer, an Austin native who began his TV career at the then WBARTV in Fort Worth, took the president's surprise call in the CBS Democratic convention skybox at the United Center. Yes, it made his day.

"It just thrilled me to death," he said Sunday morning after interviewing the president's chief of staff, Leon Panetta, on "Face the Nation." "It doesn't have a thing to do with him being a Democrat or a Republican. I got a little note from George Bush one time. And I thought, 'Well, isn't that neat? I don't care how long you've been around this stuff, having the president ask how you're doing is really fun.'"

Clinton began by saying he "had watched me for a long time and I've always done a fair job, or something like that," Schieffer said.

Their conversation then turned considerably more personal after Schieffer noted that his daughter, Susan, was born nine months after the riot-torn August 1968 Democratic National Convention in Chicago.

"So it wasn't all figuring in the streets," Schieffer joked.

He developed the story further by telling Clinton that "my wife Pat and I, before we had left Fort Worth to come up here to Chicago, had gone to an adoption agency. And he said, 'Well, you know,

that's the oddest thing. The same thing happened to Hillary and me. We thought we weren't going to have any kids. And Hillary went down and talked to the adoption people. And nine months later, along came Chelsea."

"What was most about it was that for a while, it was just two guys talking about their daughters," Schieffer said. "He (the president) was telling me about how Chelsea is going on the train with him, and how much fun it was going to be. I really got a kick out of it."

Schieffer, 59, decided he needed Saturdays off after two decades of flying from Washington to New York to anchor the "Evening News." He'd leave home by 10 a.m. and would return 12 hours later. In bad weather he'd have to take a train that wouldn't make it back to Washington until 1 a.m. His wife broke on the air Saturday night when he spoke of his "time wife" telling him with a straight face that she "really didn't mind staying home on Saturdays waiting for me to come home."

He'll still be occupied anchoring "Face the Nation" and covering Congress for CBS. And at national political conventions, Schieffer has become a fixture as a floor reporter, even when there's next to nothing to do. At the 1988 Democratic convention in Atlanta, he set a new standard for marking time by standing frozen in place behind Republican Gephardt and his wife while Clinton delivered his soon-to-be-infamous, charged speech to voters. Schieffer's assignment was to interview Gephardt, who wouldn't talk to him until after Clinton finally finished.

The Democratic gathering in Chicago is Schieffer's 15th time anchor; he compares it to an actor who has a substance habit or a high school production.

"It's the people's wish that whoever they choose," Schieffer said. "It's also our problem if it puts people to sleep. But it's still fun for me. It

there's not a big story, you'll just lose a bit of my BSing with a lot of people. This is not a place where it's hard to get people to be on TV."

Schieffer said he hopes to use some of his new-found free time this fall to attend Texas Rangers post-season games. His brother, the president of the team, and they try to talk every day. In that case, who has the better job?

"He does," brother Bob

immediately said, laughing broadly. "No question about it, especially when they're winning."

Schieffer said he once dreamed of becoming a major-league baseball player. Instead he settled for being a starting center on the Texas Christian University freshman team before an injury ended his career.

Talking to presidents is a nice consolation prize.

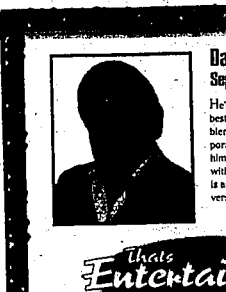

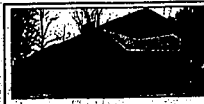
