# U.S., Iraq heading for new clash

## Baghdad may be target for Stealth craft

air missiles Thursday, but said they were aimed at an area near the southern "no-fly" zone where allied aircraft were not flying.

"We had nothing in the area. Clearly he released them only to make a statement," a military official said on condition of anonymity. "There were no radar tracks," indicating ground-based systems were not left on long enough to direct the missiles up an intended target. "It took a hard search to find them."

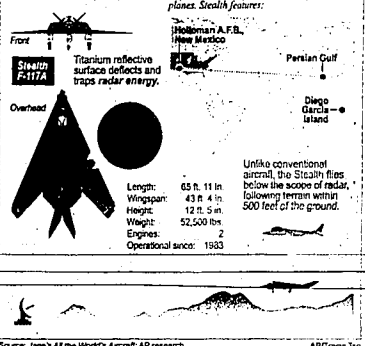
For days, Iraq has reported firing on U.S. and allied aircraft in the no-fly zones in the north and south. The only other confirmed attack came Wednesday, when Iraqi forces fired a missile at two F-16s in the northern no-fly zone. That missile missed its target.

The United States responded by sending four B-52 bombers and eight F-117 fighter planes to the region. The Pentagon also said a second aircraft carrier, the USS Enterprise, will move from the Adriatic Sea to join the USS Carl Vinson, already in the Persian Gulf.

Experts said any U.S. air assault on Iraq was likely to focus on Baghdad — the nation's capital and military nerve center.

"I would assume (targets) are going to be more strategic — political, military headquarters, or any site that we suspect or

# Students back arts at school rules hearing

## Non-certified teacher proposal receives heavy fire

TWIN FALLS — "It's crazy," said Jared Frost, shaking his head. The Twin Falls High School student was commenting on proposed State Board of Education rules to increase math, science, social studies and geography courses for graduation — at the expense of humanities, arts and health. His distaste for the proposal was shared by one student after another at a hearing Thursday attended by more than 150 people.

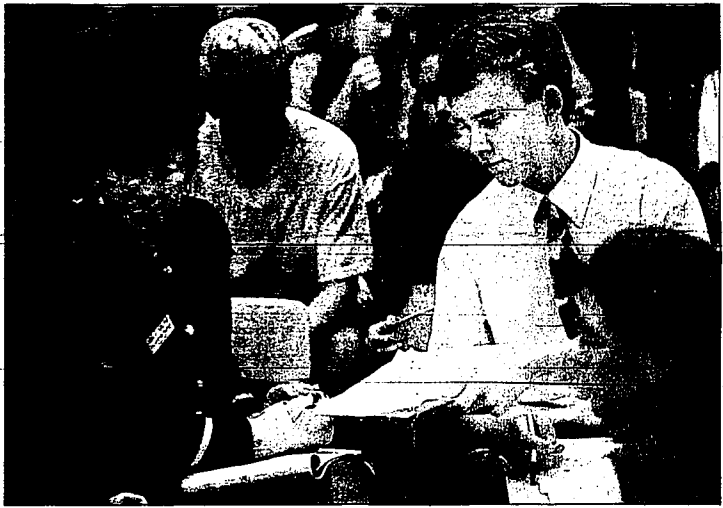
Frost said his five years in band could be considered a waste under the new rules. "It upsets me," he added. Though Frost didn't testify, several of his fellow students did, many waving handmade signs stating, "I support the arts," and making poignant pleas for elective courses.

State Superintendent Anne Fox and board member Curtis Easton of Twin Falls were part of the panel hearing comment — in a series of public hearings in Idaho — about a proposal to change the rules governing school districts.

Student Becky Lenzini said some students are not gifted in math and science, and forcing them to take more of those classes will drive them out of school.

"Frankly, I stink at math and science," she said. "If you take away our humanities, you take away what we are."

"Cutting humanities is going to put

Idaho students at a lower end of the spectrum," student Alicia Garcia said. Twin Falls drama teacher Howard Miller feared that if arts courses were

not required, they would not be funded — a concern repeated throughout the evening. With violence in the streets, the arts allow students to find "the human-

ness in themselves and each other," Miller said. "Humanities should, in every aspect,

## Report calls for teacher training reform

WASHINGTON — Too often, unqualified and ill-prepared teachers are recruited and dispatched to the classroom, according to a report that calls for higher standards and better training for America's teachers.

The report, issued Thursday by the National Commission on Teaching and America's Future, says the nation needs to change the way it attracts, trains and rewards good teachers.

It comes as the Education Department projects that rising enrollment will increase the public school teaching force from 2.5 million teachers in 1991 to 3.5 million by 2002.

While campaigning in California, President Clinton praised the report, saying the nation must recruit and retain good teachers, require high licensing and certification standards, reward the best teachers and dismiss the worst.

Clinton pledged to give states information on how to use federal funds to achieve high teaching standards, collect and share information about what is working, and issue reports to let parents know how well their states and commu-

## Lease a cow, get some cheese, no chores

### Firm handles 21 animals, fruit crops

Ted Foreman gave his sister a cow for Christmas last year — minus the manure. Foreman's sister never actually saw the cow, but she got a photo and regular updates from the animal herself saying the milking was going fine but the boy wasn't what was it last year. And after an couple of months, Jill Oberheim received six wheels of cheese from "her" cow, Franny.

"My brother is completely insane. Only he would give me something like this," said Ms. Oberheim, who lives in Ontario, Calif., and whose cow grazes in Caruth, Va. "It's so very different and so extraordinary, and it's also very good cheese."

The bounty of the land arrived via Rezz Mother Nature, a Cambridge, Mass., company that gives dry sliders a taste of the country and a lesson about manure but none of the backbreaking farm cleanup.

The company "leases" 21 types of animals, fruits, trees and crops from 15 states and Mexico, Peru and Colombia. Customers are guaranteed a share of the bounty, such as a jug of maple syrup, a wheel of cheese or a jar of honey. Foreman, a doctor in Pembroke, Mass.,

first gave a maple tree to his wife, then beehive leases to his in-laws. Next year, a lease for a sheep or a cherry tree may be under his Christmas tree.

"Now I give them to associates or basically anybody I want to butter up," he said.

Other products include coffee from Latin America; dates from Thermal, Calif.; wild rice and an invitation to the

harvest powwow from the Ojibwe Indian tribe in Cass Lake, Minn.; and chestnuts from Central Lake, Mich. (While cow renters receive cheese from their own animal, the other products are actually a portion of the whole harvest on the farm.)

"To say that all we do is sell foods or give you blankets is missing the point," said Robert MacArthur, a 71-year-old Harvard business graduate who founded the company in 1979. "We educate, we entertain, we amuse. Try to get that walking up and down the supermarket aisle."

Entertainment doesn't come cheap. A five-pound bag of wheat flour costs \$29.95, five pounds of unshelled pecans \$44.95.

Courtney Nelson of Omaha, Neb., received a maple tree lease from her daughter in California last year. "They sent us updates telling us how the tree was doing and the sap was running," Nelson said. "It was fun and we use the syrup on pancakes and waffles."

The idea for the company came from MacArthur's daughter, who suggested renting maple trees on the family farm in New York's Adirondacks.

"At that time it was impossible to get pure, natural foods, and I wanted to offer something where you could learn from what you eat," MacArthur said. Beehives came next, but requests outgrew the farm, so MacArthur made arrangements with other farms for more products.

## ACROSS THE NATION

### Persistent rain compounds cleanup following Fran

More rain along the Eastern Seaboard on Thursday compounded flooding problems for areas still trying to clean up from Hurricane Fran.

Strong storms also hit the Great Lakes, Plains and the Southwest.

Storms stretched from Massachusetts to South Carolina, the heaviest along the already saturated coast of North Carolina. Jacksonville, N.C., had the nation's highest rainfall total, 1.05 inches.

The Neuse River, which cuts across the eastern half of the state, was expected to crest 13 feet above its banks.

Floodwaters in Goldsboro, 50 miles east of Raleigh, had already engulfed a trailer park, risen at least a foot above doors of most homes and unearthed coffins at a cemetery.

Rain was expected to stay in the forecast for the region through at least Friday.

Elsewhere, storms continued across a strong cold front that is draped across the Great Lakes and central Plains. Showers stretch from northwestern Pennsylvania to southern Missouri and northern Arkansas.

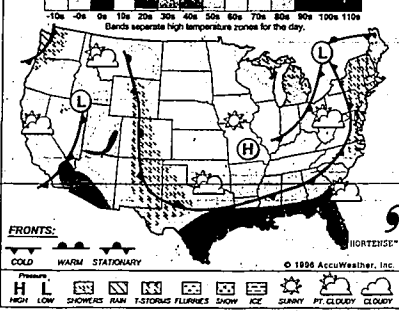
Severe thunderstorms across eastern Ohio produced wind gusts in excess of 60 mph and some dropped large hail.

Over the Southwest, thunderstorms were beginning to create some flooding, especially across dry areas that had been in eastern and southern New Mexico.

In the West, light rain was on the increase over southeastern Washington, southern Idaho and over the higher elevations of western Montana and central Wyoming. Light rain was also beginning to develop across northern California.

know might be a nascent weapons of mass destruction area," said retired Marine Lt. Gen. Bernard Trainor, co-author of a study of the Gulf conflict.

"I think we have to hit targets of greater value and that means, in part, hitting targets in Baghdad, and that raises the issue of collateral damage and civilian casualties," he said.

The bat-winged F-117s, which can carry two 2,000-pound laser-guided bombs, are expected to be the cutting edge of any American attack. They are not expected in the Gulf area until Friday morning.

Eight Stealths left Holloman Air Force Base, N.M. Thursday afternoon. They will be accompanied by 17 KC-135 and KC-10 aerial tankers on a 10,000-mile "march" to Kuwait.

The radar-evading fighters were to make a grueling, 17-hour overnight trek — with 15 refuelings — across the United States and the Atlantic Ocean en route to the Gulf.

Both the Stealths and the Navy jets will be part of a growing air

armada that could also include scores of American fighters, bombers and electronic jamming aircraft already in the area enforcing Operation Southern Watch, the allies' no-fly zone over southern Iraq.

When assembled it will be a formidable force, and, with the F-117s especially, will send a powerful signal to Iraq, observers said.

And the Stealth fighters' job — as it was in the case of the Gulf War — will likely be to help blind the once-opent Iraqi air defense system, which the United States will almost certainly have to challenge in any new series of air strikes.

It is a job that may not be easy. Even though Iraq's highly capable, French-designed "KARI" air defense system was ravaged by American air power during the Gulf War, some of it survived and much of it has been revitalized, experts and officials have said.

"I suspect they have probably done rather well" at rebuilding the system, said Trainor.

Kuwait agreed to let the United States base some of the

American jets on its territory, a move Iraq's Deputy Prime Minister Tariq Aziz called "a flagrant act of aggression against the people of Iraq and an act of war against the Iraqi state."

U.S. Defense Secretary William Perry, in Washington, called Aziz's comment "trash" and "totally unacceptable."

"U.S. military forces do not pose a threat to Iraq," he said.

But, noting that American forces moved into the area in force only after Iraq invaded Kuwait in 1990, Perry said: "If there is any challenge to those forces, we have the responsibility to protect them. The United States will take all necessary and appropriate actions."

Aziz, in a rambling commentary by the official Iraqi news agency, likened the recent turmoil to the period six years ago just before Iraq's invasion of Kuwait. He said Kuwait's rulers were in "evil collaboration with America in conspiring against Iraq's people."

He did not say if Iraq would take any military action to counter the Kuwaiti move.

## Bombing probes target Pentagon

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Two separate investigations into the June 25 terrorist bombing of U.S. troops in Saudi Arabia have reached sharply critical conclusions about missteps by the Pentagon.

A Senate Intelligence Committee probe released Thursday contradicts Defense Secretary William Perry's claims that "spotty and inconclusive" intelligence left the military unprepared for the truck bomb attack that killed 19 U.S. airmen.

And the Pentagon was bracing for release next week of a presidential investigative team's report that a senior defense official said was "very critical" of Perry, the Pentagon, the U.S. Central Command and military commanders on the ground in Saudi Arabia.

Specifically, the presidential team's report is expected to conclude that officials did not respond adequately to clear indications that the Khobar Towers complex in Dhahran, where U.S. forces lived, was vulnerable to a terrorist bombing.

Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee, said Thursday that blaming the attack on bad intelligence is "preposterous."

"There was no intelligence failure," Specter said. "In fact, in the preceding year, there have been more than 100 intelligence reports on alerts of a general nature and very specific reports about the threat to the Khobar towers complex."

Specter cited several warnings that should have led to a swifter

response by the Pentagon, including a June 13 State Department intelligence report and a June 17 Military Intelligence Digest report outlining suspicious incidents at Khobar Towers. The latter report noted "a pattern apparent to officials to agree to certain security improvements, particularly relocating a perimeter fence to create a larger buffer zone around the apartments."

The 40-member team was headed by retired Army Gen. Wayne Downing, former head of U.S. special forces.

"It's bad," the official said of Downing's report.

nities are doing to promote excellence and demand accountability from their teachers.

"We should be lifting our teachers up, not bashing them and finding ways just to be critical," Clinton said.

It was a reference to Bob Dole's statement at the Republican National Convention that criticized teachers' unions. Dole has denounced the unions, saying he will disregard their political power if elected.

The report is the culmination of two years of work by 26 policymakers and educators, supported by the Rockefeller Foundation

and Carnegie Corp.

Among the report's findings:

- Only 590 of the nation's 1,200 education schools meet professional standards of accreditation.
- More than 12 percent of new teachers begin without any training at all, 14 percent enter without having fully met state standards.
- Fewer than 75 percent of all teachers have studied child development, learning and teaching methods and have degrees in their teaching subject areas.
- Many districts have cumbersome screening processes, untimely hiring decisions and obstacles to teacher mobility,

such as no licensing reciprocity among states, that prevent them from hiring the best candidates.

- For every four classroom teachers, there are nearly six other school employees in the United States compared with other countries where the teaching staff makes up 60 percent to 80 percent of public education employees.
- Only 12 states reported in 1991-92 that all their newly hired teachers were licensed.
- Connecticut, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Vermont and Wisconsin.

demanded that standards should be kept high for students, who should have lower the standards for teaching," she said.

Student Philip Valenta added, "A lawyer could be the best lawyer in the world and not a good teacher."

While the board had good intentions, he said, he believed the rule was meant to cut costs so districts would not have to pay teachers what they deserved.

"I don't believe you guys are paying attention to our rights and needs as students," Valenta said.

Jolene Ashcraft of Hazelton said she is a senior college student and wants to teach. During the years, she has had long hours on the road to Idaho State University in Pocatello.

"That's quite a sacrifice. If they want to teach, let them put forth a sacrifice and become certified," she said.

In the first two and half hours of testimony in the four-hour hearing, the only person who supported the rule changes was state Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly. He complimented the board for redoing rules at the direction of the Legislature.

Noh also said state lawmakers have been derelict for not

extending the school day and year.

"There's so much more to learn," he said.

Too many distractions take away from quality school time, such as low district announcements and pep assemblies, Noh said, bringing grimes to the faces of a few students.

While proponents claim the proposed rules would provide more local control, local union leaders say the opposite would occur in some cases. One proposal would require an alternative high school to be at a separate site or time from the regular high school, said Twin Falls Superintendent Terrell Donich, representing the Region IV Superintendents Association.

"This should be a local, not a state, decision," he said.

Former board member Keith Hinkley, who chaired the hearing, told the many students that the board would sign a paper if they attended the hearing for extra school credit.

That apparently offended some of the teen-agers.

"We came because we care about our education," Twin Falls senior Tiffany Andrews told the panel. "This is our future."

Commerce speaker Jeff Houck, a paragraph near the article's end should have read:

# Archaeologists retrieving explorer LaSalle's ship from Gulf of Mexico

ABOARD THE BELLE, Gulf of Mexico (AP) — To archaeologists excavating the wreck of one of the explorer LaSalle's ships, success is finding tiny things like blue glass beads or bronze pins.

But on a really terrific day, like one this week, the hand guard of an officer's rapier appears out of the mud that shrouds the ribs of the Belle, and an archaeologist can touch 310 years of history.

"You may be able to see the object in a museum, but you can't touch it," says Toni Carrell.

"Archaeology gives you the opportunity to actually touch an object and to make that contact that I think we all want, to make that connection with the past."

Carrell, a doctoral student from Scotland's St. Andrews University, is one of more than a dozen archaeologists excavating what is left of the wooden supply ship, which went down in a storm in 1686 while LaSalle and his men were trying to establish a colony in southeastern Texas, where they faced steamy, mosquito- and snake-infested swamps, hostile Indians and a shortage of provisions.

Sucked into the mud of Matagorda Bay about 150 miles southwest of Houston, the ship largely disappeared and is now being retrieved, piece by piece, in a \$4 million project of the Texas Historical Commission. Divers confirmed the find last summer by recovering a bronze cannon encrusted with mud, shellfish and stones.

It is considered the oldest French shipwreck discovered in the Western Hemisphere. The dig site is expected to last about six months.

The dig is surrounded by a steel, oblong cofferdam.

Engineers sunk its pilings into the seabed and pumped out the water, exposing the sea floor for the first time. It's the first use of such technology in such an open body of water.

"The cofferdam is letting us do careful digging that we simply couldn't do in zero visibility," says Barro Arnold, head of the team.

"We also can do it in one season." The two-masted, square-rigged Belle, 80 feet long and 19 feet wide, weighed 65 tons and carried 30 to 40 people. "We're still trying to find out which end of the boat is which," says assistant director J. "Coz" Cozzi.

Archaeologists believe about 20 percent of the ship is left, buried in 5 to 6 feet of mud. They hope to recover it along with containers

that were carried in the hold of the ship, pewter and ceramic items and maybe even some weapons.

Like The Belle, and like the Texas colony, Rene-Robert Cavelier Sieur de LaSalle came to a bad end.

The first European to track the Mississippi River to the Gulf, LaSalle led a handful of survivors inland from the failed colony in 1687, hoping to find the Mississippi. Instead, he was murdered by his own people.

Historians call the expedition a turning point in the history of the Americas since the French effort to "colonize" the area led the Spanish, who already were in the Southwest, to expand east into what became Texas.

## GOP senators worry about paying for plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican senators told Attorney General Janet Reno Thursday they endorse the goals of President Clinton's new \$1.1 billion anti-terrorism proposal but are concerned about how to pay for it.

The full Senate, meanwhile, rejected a proposal to authorize a \$21 million study of whether tiny chemical markers, called taggants, should be put in black and smokeless powders, which are commonly used in making bombs. The vote was 57-42.

The GOP-led Congress has repeatedly blocked such a study of taggants, which are opposed by the National Rifle Association on grounds that they would make gunpowder unstable.

## FDA approves small, cheap defibrillator

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a move cardiologists hope will make devices for treating cardiac arrest as common as first-aid kits, the Food and Drug Administration has approved the smallest and cheapest machines that can shock a heart into beating again.

Experts say a third of the 300,000 Americans who die of cardiac arrest every year might be saved if emergency workers had delivered an electrical shock to restart the heart during the critical first minutes.

Paramedics carry defibrillators to do that, but the machines are so bulky, complicated and expensive that most police officers and firefighters carry them only as easily as they carry fire extinguishers or first-aid kits.

The Food and Drug Administration on Wednesday approved the first in a new wave of such units, HeartStream Inc.'s ForeRunner.

About the size of a book, it weighs just 4 pounds, half the weight of the smallest unit now available. It will cost between \$3,000 and \$4,000, somewhat cheaper than the \$5,000 to \$7,500 price tags common for most defibrillators.

And unlike older competitors, ForeRunner has a computer screen that automatically analyzes and displays the patient's heart rhythm so emergency workers can see how well the person is responding to the shocks.

ForeRunner "has some very definite advantages," said Dr. Roger White of the Mayo Clinic, who led a campaign to put defibrillators in the police cars in the clinic's hometown of Rochester, Minn.

# Dole, Clinton clash over TV ads, teachers' unions

Campaigners Bob Dole and President Clinton used schools as political backdrops Thursday, with Dole saying his rival "hasn't had an idea in four years" and Clinton accusing the Republican candidate of bashing teachers and finding ways to be critical.

Dole's rhetoric was especially vitriolic. In a Kentucky college rally, he said the Democrats are engaging in character assassination on television — "millions and millions and millions and millions and millions and millions of negative ads — of dollars of negative ads."

Clinton took his rival to task for criticizing teachers' unions — and for suggesting the president is their puppet.

"We should be lifting our teachers up, not bashing them and finding ways to be critical," Clinton told Californians. "We have to do our part, each and every one of us, if we're going to have the best schools in the world."

Meantime, negotiators for Clinton and Dole met in Washington to discuss the number and format of TV debates — and whether Ross Perot should be invited.

The Democrats want the Reform Party candidate in, out of the belief he would draw anti-Clinton votes from Dole, while

the Republicans are wary of Perot, on the same assumption.

With Dole trailing Clinton in polls, the debates could be crucial for the GOP candidate.

"President Clinton is a very smooth talker," Dole said in a campaign speech. "I'll be facing him in debates one of these days. I think if I show up, I win because he's supposed to be so good, so

good at these things."

The first debate is tentatively scheduled for Sept. 25 by the non-partisan Commission on Presidential Debates, which told the Perot camp that it would not immediately recommend whether Perot should be included.

Perot's running mate, economist Pat Choate, demanded a slot. He said the commission was

"nothing but a front group for the Democratic and Republican parties," and asked: "What are these guys afraid of?"

A fresh volley of polls found Clinton holding solid leads in New York, Michigan, Louisiana and Iowa while offering Dole one lone bright star — Texas.

The Texas sampling said Dole had increased his lead there to 11

points — 49 percent for Dole, 38 percent for Clinton and 5 percent for Perot. But the New York poll put the president a solid 25 points ahead.

Clinton's California visit was his 27th to that crucial state. Dole packed Kentucky, Ohio and Michigan, important battleground states, into a busy two-day swing.

Standing between a pair of red brick pillars of the campus of Georgetown College in Kentucky, Dole tried a new strategy, accusing his opposition of conducting a campaign of fear and lies.

"Oh they'll deny it. They get up at their convention and say Bob Dole's a decent man. But then comes the ax," Dole said. "And it comes every day, it comes about every hour on your TV set — millions and millions and millions and millions and millions and millions of negative ads — of dollars of negative ads."

The GOP candidate said Clinton "hasn't had an idea in four years."

"The last idea he had was to nationalize health care, remember that?," Dole said, in a spirited

speech. "The last idea he had was to raise your taxes \$265 billion. The last idea he had was to block the balanced budget amendment to the Constitution."

Even while Dole was bashing Clinton, his GOP running mate Jack Kemp insisted the Republican ticket hasn't attacked the president's character because it wants to wage an issues campaign that's about more than "just pulling down someone else."

"It is out of respect for American democracy that we are not running against someone as much as we are running for something," Kemp told employees of a candy-cane factory in Albany, Ga.

Vice President Al Gore stumped traditionally Republican territory, New Hampshire and Maine.

Also working the school circuit, he told students at the New Hampshire Community Technical College that Clinton's proposed tax credits for continuing education would "effectively make community college free for virtually every American."

## Contributions to coalition down

WASHINGTON (AP) — After five years of explosive growth, contributions to the Christian Coalition declined last year for the first time, tax records show.

The bad financial news comes as the conservative religious group gathers here for its annual meeting, a session also dogged by a government lawsuit and an investigation by federal prosecutors.

The conservative religious group reported donations of \$18.7 million in 1995 — a decline of nearly 12 percent from the previous year, when supporters gave \$21.2 million.

Coalition spokesman Mike Russell said the decline meant little because 1995 was a non-election year that gave the group's state affiliates a chance to con-

centrate on their own local fund raising. Those dollars don't show up on the national organization's reports, he said.

"We're on track for a \$24 million budget this year," Russell said. The actual figure won't be disclosed to the Internal Revenue Service until next July.

The coalition claims some 1.7 million members nationwide.

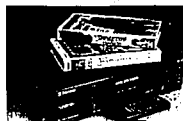

### Parents, take responsibility for your kids' medications

If the bookkeeper at your neighborhood pharmacy were assigned to pass out pills, you'd probably find yourself another drugstore.

So why do we require teachers and school secretaries to do the same?

In Pocatello last year, a busy second-grade teacher gave the wrong prescription medicine to a student.

Excusable? Certainly not. Inevitable? Almost certainly.

If you drop by any school office in south-central Idaho around lunchtime, you'll see kids lining up to take prescription drugs that their parents have sent from home.

Some of those medicines, used in the wrong combination or given at the wrong time or in the wrong dosage, can be lethal.

The folks who are handing them out, usually clerical employees or administrators, typically have no expertise in medicine. They're educators, not pharmacists, and they're neither trained nor hired for their ability to handle potent, complex medications.

It's just one more example of a chore that parents delegate to the schools that the schools aren't equipped to handle.

In some cases, children have to take prescription medicine during school hours. Ritalin, anti-seizure medications, antibiotics to ward off asthma. But out of a student body of several hundred students, ailments that require those drugs rarely afflict more than a handful of kids.

The problems arise because Mom and Dad send Johnny's antibiotic to school in an unmarked envelope, expecting the school to make sure that he takes it.

The vast majority of prescription drugs can be given at long enough intervals so that a student can take a pill before he leaves for school and another after he comes home. Doctors can often adjust the dosages accordingly.

That's the case even with insulin, which diabetics require on a rigid schedule.

Asking school employees to dispense medicine rightly makes schools nervous and their lawyers nervous.

There have been dozens of lawsuits nationwide arising from medication errors at school. But the alternative would be to take the schools completely out of the pharmacy business, and allow students to carry and use prescription drugs at will at school, without supervision.

Few educators or parents are anxious to see that happen. So the sensible option is for parents to reduce the number of drugs that schools are asked to dispense.

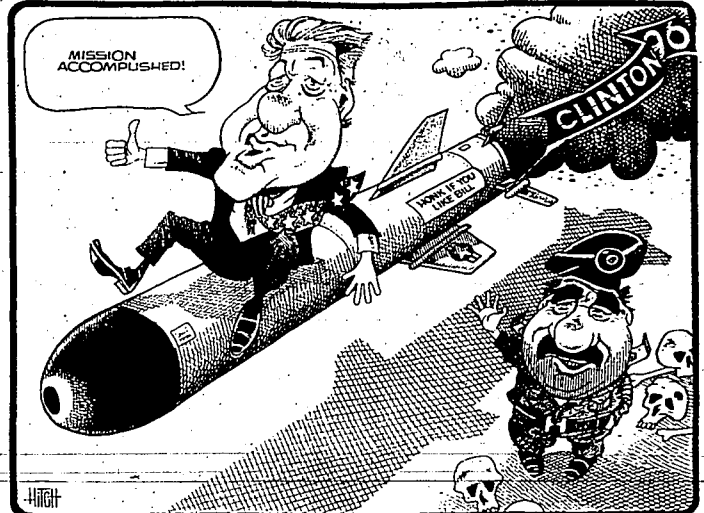
If you're a parent, don't send prescription drugs to school with your child unless it's under a doctor's order, and then take the pills and the necessary paperwork to the school office yourself.

Make sure that the medicine is in the bottle that it came in, or ask your pharmacist for a second, labeled bottle.

As a rule, keep over-the-counter drugs at home. If your child is too sick to go to school without packing cold tablets and nasal spray, then he probably should be kept home.

And if your child requires an inhaler, make sure you have sent the school a note giving permission for him or her to use it.

School administrators live in fear that a mistake with medicine could cost them a lawsuit. Worse than that, it could cost your child's life.



### Average taxpayer hit hard by 'soft money'

Under the law in effect since 1974, individuals can give no more than \$1,000 to a presidential campaign and corporate political action committees can give only \$5,000. This year, Bob Dole and President Clinton will receive \$74 million each for the general election campaign and \$12 million for the convention, all from the pool of funds that we taxpayers provided via our Internal Revenue Service forms to keep the presidential elections honest.

In the meantime, both parties expect to raise another \$300 million before the election from corporations and rich individuals, all of it flowing softly and sweetly in unlimited amounts directly to the political parties themselves. In theory, "soft money" is not to go into presidential campaigns but is rather to be spent on voter registration, get-out-the-vote campaigns and television advertising that does not directly promote a presidential candidate. Shur.

From January to June of this year, both parties had already exceeded all previous soft-money records, with the real campaign yet to come. Naturally, both parties officially deplore this highly unfortunate situation, but as they say in many other words, "the other guy is doing it, too" — which is what we used to say during the nuclear arms race.

You recall that in June of last year Clinton and House Speaker Newt Gingrich shook hands on an agreement to create a bipartisan commission to reform campaign financing. Nothing ever came of it. A genuinely bipartisan effort at campaign finance reform (Republican freshman Rep. Linda Smith of Washington fought like a Trojan) was killed in Congress.

The corporate special interests are all over the loopholes like a duck on a June bug. Tax-deductible corporate donations to both conventions provided about \$25 million per party, in addition to the \$12 million in taxpayers' donations. The New York Times reports a dandy wrinkle stemming from a Supreme Court decision two months ago: Big donors can give to "independent committees" as long as their activities are not coordinated with those of presidential campaigns. Has your recall that it was an "independent committee" that produced the Willie Horton ad against Michael Dukakis in 1988, completely independent of the Bush campaign, of course.

And what do the special interests get in return for these enormous donations? The Center for Responsive Politics offers us a few instructive hints. One of the matters that Congress is due to resolve before this session is over involves a House provision that prohibits defense contractors from billing the government for costs associated with mergers. Lockheed and Martin Marietta, which merged last year, have already submitted \$85 million in bills for their corporate matrimony. Lockheed Martin's PACs have already contributed \$92,350 to federal campaigns this cycle, 73 percent of it to Republicans. All told, defense contractors

have given \$5.3 billion through PACs, 70 percent to Republicans — all this according to the Project on Government Oversight.

The Small Business Job Protection Act signed by Clinton is packed with special tax breaks for any number of not-so-small businesses. According to the center, it is worth millions of dollars to auto manufacturers and dealers, the securities and investment industry, and Archer-Daniels-Midland.

For those who would like to find out precisely how they are being ripped off by this insane system of campaign financing, there is a dandy new Web page called "Follow the Money" run by the Center for Responsive Politics at <http://www.crp.org>. It enables you to follow political money state by state, and even candidate by candidate and industry by industry. "Follow the Money" also fills you in on the various kinds of reform debates and grabs news and tells you how you can get involved in the fight to change this massive corruption.

Make no mistake: The special interests that give so generously to political campaigns are not making a foolish investment. They are rewarded with hundreds of millions in special tax breaks and competitive advantages. And you know who winds up paying the tab for that. Whenever a company buys a sweet deal through campaign contributions, the rest of us get stuck with that much more of the tab for keeping the country running and paying for necessary government programs.

You may never have given a nickel to a political campaign in your life, but believe me, they are costing you a fortune.

faraway land do with our flag. We can, however, say something about what happens here at home in hope that it will help open a few eyes.

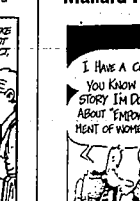

# Allegations against bishop investigated

Bonneville County officials are investigating an allegation that a Mormon Church official tried to discourage a girl from testifying that she was sexually abused by her father.

No charge has been filed, and Ucon-area Bishop Dean Andrus denies the allegation. For two years, Andrus has served as the lay leader of the Holy Ward of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints near Idaho Falls.

"I absolutely am not" guilty, Andrus said. "This is not accurate."

Andrus declined to answer further questions as he prepared to meet with Bonneville County sheriff's investigators Wednesday. Detective Glen Fickman interviewed the girl and his family Tuesday.

Deputies may submit their report to the Bonneville County

prosecutor's office this week.

"I just have to wait and see what the report shows," Chief Criminal Deputy Prosecutor Jon Shindlring said.

But Special Prosecutor Dan Hawley, whose handling of the case led to Withers' agreement to plead guilty to a single battery charge, said Andrus may have violated Idaho's anti-witness intimidation law. That statute carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison.

"It was serious misconduct," Hawley said.

Withers began serving a 30-day jail sentence on Thursday at the Madison County Jail.

After more than a year of denying allegations that he sexually abused female patients, Withers pleaded guilty on Monday to a single count of battery. The charge referred to numerous victims in Bingham and Madison counties from 1965 through 1995, when

Withers retired under pressure from the state Board of Medicine.

Hawley had charged him with a series of felony counts before agreeing to accept a guilty plea to the misdemeanor.

Under the terms of Magistrate Keith Walker's ruling, Withers will serve 30 days in jail and two months on probation and pay \$15,500 in fines in lieu of a suspended four-month jail term.

Throughout the case, some victims have alleged that Mormon Church officials ignored their pleas for help or actually discouraged them from pursuing charges against Withers.

Hawley said he learned of the allegation against Andrus last week. His client said the church official expressed concern that her testimony would cause harm to Withers. The session occurred Aug. 11 at Andrus' church offices, he said.

Hawley informed Madison

County Prosecutor Sid Brown, who in turn alerted Bonneville County officials who had jurisdiction in the case.

"To the extent there is a church problem here, it is local," Hawley said. Leaders at Mormon Church headquarters in Salt Lake City offered to meet with the family to remedy any problems caused by the bishop, he said.

"They have been 100-percent supportive of this investigation," Hawley said.

Meanwhile, five of the women who accused Withers of molesting them filed a class-action lawsuit against him. The suit, filed Wednesday in Blackfoot, seeks at least \$25,000 for each woman named in the suit to cover "mental anguish and emotional harm."

Hawley, a Boise lawyer and former assistant U.S. attorney and state legislator, is representing the women.

# Voters reject sheriff who challenged Brady gun law

SAFFORD, Ariz. (AP) — He gained a national following for challenging the Brady gun control law, but Sheriff Richard Mack forgot to watch his back at home.

Graham County voters rejected Mack in Tuesday's primary, favoring one of his former deputies, Officer Frank Hughes of the Thatcher police, with nearly 70 percent of the 4,500 votes cast.

Mack, who contended Congress couldn't require his office to conduct background checks on would-be purchasers of guns, had become a popular speaker on the militia circuit around the country. He often appeared on national news programs and has written books on the necessity of the constitutional right to bear arms.

A federal court had agreed with Mack's states' rights argument that the Brady law was unconstitutional,

but an appeals court overturned that ruling and a similar one in Montana. The U.S. Supreme Court is to hear the issue this fall.

Hughes' campaign stressed that because of the anti-Brady law campaign the past two years, Mack spent more time on the road than he did fighting crime at home.

Mack retaliated with a newspaper advertisement listing all the time he had worked in his office since 1993 and offering a \$5,000 reward to anyone who could provide evidence to the contrary.

"He never cared about any of us," said Billie Horner, whose granddaughter was slain two years ago in a crime that remains unsolved. "He just wanted his pretty face on TV all the time. Obviously, the people were fed up with it."

Mack did not immediately return calls Wednesday.

# Ensign: Nuke bill would harm GOP

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Rep. John Ensign has warned House leaders that Nevada Republicans will pay dearly if a bill is passed targeting the state for the interim storage of nuclear waste.

Ensign said passage of the bill would cost him his seat in Congress, and would also cost the GOP the state's other House seat. And he said it would eliminate any chance of Republican presidential candidate Bob Dole winning Nevada in November.

"We're in front of the train on the tracks, and said if you bring up the nuke bill, you are going to lose two House seats," Ensign, R-Nev., said at a meeting of the House leadership.

The meeting was attended by House Speaker Newt Gingrich and a dozen other top House Republicans, including party secretary Rep. Barbara Vucanovich, R-Nev.

Ensign said the nuclear waste issue outranks even crime in Nevada.

"In a close race, anything can tip the balance, and this may be a close race," said Ensign, who is being challenged by Democratic state Sen. Bob Coffin of Las Vegas.

With less than three weeks until adjournment, Gingrich is weighing whether to bring the interim storage

bill to the House floor. The bill would designate the Nevada Test Site for interim storage while work continues on a proposed permanent facility at Yucca Mountain, 100 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

The waste would come from the nation's nuclear power plants.

Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., agreed with Ensign's assessment.

# Mother of burned baby gets 18 years

LAS VEGAS (AP) — The mother of a toddler whose burned body was found in the Arizona desert was sentenced to 18 years in prison Thursday for her role in concealing her death.

Lizian Meegan was taken away in handcuffs after Judge Sally Locher rejected a call for probation so that Meegan could care for her other five children.

Mrs. Meegan's husband, James, faces a possible death sentence in the death of 10-month-old Francine Meegan, whose body was found by cowboys near Prescott in 1990 but never identified until earlier this year.

"Ultimately, you and James will be the only ones who really know what happened to Francine on that fateful night," Locher said in imposing the sentence.

Mrs. Meegan had pleaded guilty to child abuse and faced a maximum of 20 years in prison.

Prosecutors had originally agreed not to prosecute Meegan if she testified truthfully at her husband's murder trial, but she ended up being uncooperative on the witness stand. Her husband was nonetheless convicted last month of first-degree murder. A hearing on the penalty is set to begin Monday.

"She has an undying devotion to her husband," defense attorney Paul Wommner said. "He had testified truthfully so that Mrs. Meegan could care for the couple's five surviving children."

Testimony in his trial showed that the toddler was shaken to death in 1990 and then taken to the desert near burned. The body was discovered a week later, but it was not until recently, after police received a tip, that it was identified as Francine.

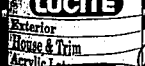

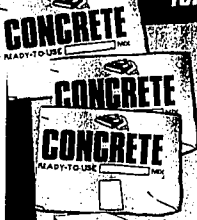

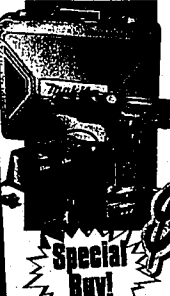

### Diaz, Butcher plead innocent to murder

**RUPERT** - Two men suspected in the April 10 shooting death of Blake Morgan entered pleas of innocence to first-degree murder charges Thursday.

Dressed in orange jail suits, with their hands and feet bound by chains, Kody Shane Butcher, 20, and Jesus Flores Diaz, 38, entered their pleas in Minidoka County's 5th District Court.

Based on testimony from another inmate, prosecutors say Butcher pulled the trigger of a Norinco 9 mm handgun three times, killing Morgan while he slept on a couch in his home. Diaz is accused of aiding and abetting the crime. Attorneys for both men demanded a speedy trial, asking Judge William Hart to set a trial date soon.

A speedy trial must be scheduled within six months of charges being filed. In the case against Butcher and Diaz, Hart would put the deadline for a trial in mid-October.

### CSI offers welding course, seminar for teachers

**TWIN FALLS** - Today at the College of Southern Idaho, a Cleveland, Ohio, welding company will demonstrate the latest in welding technology to Idaho welding teachers.

About 30 teachers are expected to attend a seminar featuring live welding demonstrations and discussions about safety, new products, steel and robotics welding and environmental concerns, according to a news release from Lincoln Electric Co.

The seminar is free and will run from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Welding Technology Department at CSI. Welding demonstrations will be conducted at 10:45 a.m. and 1:30 p.m.

### Vehicular manslaughter charge leveled at Burley man

**BURLEY** - Instead of two counts of aggravated driving under the influence, Major Layton Adair faces a single charge of vehicular manslaughter. The amended charge was filed Wednesday after blood tests showed no alcohol in Adair's system when he ran a stop sign on 400 South, killing Dianna Kay Funk.

Funk was thrown from her car when it was struck by Adair's vehicle. She died from her injuries. Two passengers in the car driven by Adair also were injured. Cassia County sheriff's Deputy Robert Nay said in an affidavit that he saw open cans of beer in the car driven by Adair after the accident.

Adair, 22, of Burley will appear in a preliminary hearing at 3 p.m. Wednesday.

### Group urges Batt to save steelhead from extinction

**BOISE** - A prominent Idaho fishing group is urging Gov. Phil Batt and other elected officials to present a plan to save the state's steelhead from extinction.

"Our fishing is at risk," said Mitch Sanchotena, of Idaho Steelhead and Salmon United. "These magnificent and valuable fish have to be restored, and we're calling on Idaho's elected officials to show leadership on this issue." Steelhead fishing is estimated to support 100 jobs and \$30 million in economic benefits in Idaho every year, Sanchotena said in a prepared statement.

Despite their importance to Idaho's economy, steelhead numbers have been declining in recent years. Many observers fear the ongoing trout boom will come under the authority of the federal Endangered Species Act.

### Ruling on Corey Hood's plea bargain still pending

**RUPERT** - A ruling on whether or not Minidoka County prosecutors can break their plea agreement with confessed killer Corey Hood is still pending.

Fifth District Judge William Hart received final legal briefs on the issue from Hood's attorney, Mark Manweiler, and special prosecutor John Brady Wednesday.

Hart allows the motion to be heard, an evidentiary hearing - likely in December. Inaction said at Wednesday's court hearing, prosecutors will attempt to prove that Hood lied about his involvement in the slayings of his 74-year-old grandmother, Mae Hood, and 17-year-old Wendy Hunter.

Prosecutors consider that a breach of their plea agreement with Hood. In the agreement, Hood pleaded guilty to two counts of voluntary manslaughter in exchange for truthful testimony against three others initially charged in the killings.

The three subsequently were released after Hood testified in court that he killed both women.

If Hart denies any more proceedings on the motion to set aside the plea agreement, Hood will be sentenced to a maximum of 39 years on the two counts of voluntary manslaughter.

# 'Get the Waste Out' launches effort

## New group says anti-nuclear initiative will hamper waste removal

**TWIN FALLS** - A group calling itself "Get the Waste Out" launched a statewide effort Thursday to oppose Proposition 3.

The ballot measure, which would rescind Gov. Phil Batt's nuclear waste agreement with the federal government, threatens cleanup and removal of more than 40 years of nuclear waste stored at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, the group said in a news release.

Twin Falls attorney Mark Stubbs, a state Republican representative, said he got involved with the group "to inform



Rep. Mark Stubbs and John Peavey, the public of the benefits of the governor's agreement and the risks in defeating it.

Stubbs, long a critic of INEL, said he joined the group out of concern for the

quality of water in the Snake River Plain Aquifer. He has seen a change in attitudes at INEL, and the agreement brings to a close the long-running waste issue, he said. And it will help get some wastes now sitting above the aquifer out of Idaho, he said.

John Peavey, spokesman for the "Stop the Shipments - Yes on 3" campaign, said in a news release that "Get the Waste Out" is "nothing more than an attempt by large corporations to rent southeastern Idaho as a nuclear waste dump."

"They describe themselves as a 'grassroots organization,'" Peavey said, "but there is nothing grassroots about an organization that includes the president

of Hecla Mining, a front man for Union Pacific Railroad and attorneys tied into the INEL payroll.

The group's campaign director is Trent Clark, who works for Monsanto - one of the companies that, along with Lockheed Martin Idaho Technologies, FMC, Morrison Knudsen and Union Pacific Railroad, tried to get the Idaho Supreme Court to remove Proposition 3 from the ballot.

The court refused. The chairman of the Get the Waste Out executive board is Peter Johnson of McCall, a former head of the Bonneville Power Administration - a part of the

## Jerome schools eye former bird farm for new facilities

**JEROME** - The Jerome School District wants to buy a former bird farm for new facilities.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game owns a 30-acre parcel at roughly 100 South, 100 East on Tiger Drive. Formerly used for breeding game birds, the land now sits idle, and the state is offering it for sale for \$51,000.

At this week's School Board meeting, Superintendent Jim Cobble read letters from state officials offering the land, which Cobble hopes the district can buy and hold for future construction.

"Jerome will continue to grow," Cobble said. "Someday, we will need a school on the south side of town."

Before the purchase can take place, the sale must be advertised and the state must hold public hearings.

Here's a wrap-up of other Jerome school news:

• Enrollment is up again. Sixty-five more students enrolled this year than last year. Jerome's schools have grown about 2 percent a year for the past several years, according to Business Manager Mike Gibson.

• After last week's defeat of a bond issue for school construction, Jerome can't hold another election for at least six months. Cobble suggested the defeat was part of a general backlash against taxes.

• Chris Gibson, special services and

migrant education director, reported that Jerome schools had 900 computers on its network this year. Jerome acquired 47 used computers for free from Boise State University, after BSU upgraded its own computers.

The older computers, 1986 and 1987 models, are slower than new ones but still work. Children in the early grades are using them.

• Parents at Jefferson Elementary School were able to register their children by phone for the first time this year. Principal Dale Layne reported registration for returning students already listed in the computer took five minutes. Parents of new students had to come to the office to present birth certificates and immunization records.

• Sandra Thomas, the district curriculum director, reported that 140 teachers are taking computer technology classes from the College of Southern Idaho and/or from Northwestern Nazarene College the fall semester.

• Thomas also reported on a new program called Teen Issues. Community volunteers, school board members, parents and other interested people attend Thursday-evening training sessions at the high school. Volunteers are taught how to approach subjects such as tobacco with students. The volunteers then go into classrooms to help students with these problems.

• Carroll Matthews, principal of the high school, reported on new discipline

## GOP women lend strong voices in Magic Valley

**TWIN FALLS** - They put up campaign signs, give politicians a place to sleep for the night and arrange radio shows.

Republican women - credited by many with being the single most influential factor in a successful Republican campaign - will meet in Twin Falls today and Saturday for their biennial convention.

This year, their role is especially important as the Republicans target women voters, said Andrew Arulanandam, executive director of the state Republican Party. "They are our strongest volunteer branch," he said. "In addition to that, they're one of the most active auxiliaries statewide and nationwide."

The group - the Idaho Federation of Republican Women - is telling women why they should vote Republican, said president Patt Anne Lodge. She pointed out President Clinton's votes on legislation including the \$500-per-child tax credit and increased funding for the Violence Against Women laws, and his two vetoes of welfare reform legislation before signing the third version to reach his desk.

"These issues directly affect women," she said.

She may draw in some women with the information, but state Democratic spokeswoman Rynia called it "dirty politics." Clinton vetoed the bills because they contained deep cuts in some areas that were unacceptable, he said. "So to sit there and say the president vetoed those bills because of an anti-woman streak is totally fallacious," he said.

## Planes under Iraqi attack were from Idaho air base

**WASHINGTON** - The Air Force confirmed Thursday that two F-16 fighter planes hit by Iraqi forces in Iraq's northern no-fly zone on Wednesday are from 398th Fighter Squadron based at Mountain Home Air Force Base.

Military officials in the United States and at the Air Force base in Incirlik, Turkey, where the squadron is based have not yet released the names of the two pilots involved.

The planes were not hit and neither pilot was hurt in the incident, in which an Iraqi anti-aircraft missile was fired at the two patrolling planes.

Two F-16 attack planes, also from Mountain Home, tried but failed to find the radar site that directed the missile fired at the American planes.

Those planes were from the 391st Fighter Squadron.

## Sewer service plan for rural Wendell stirs controversy

**WENDELL** - A proposed sewer trunk line to service the west side of town prompted debate at this week's City Council meeting.

A number of residents have asked for sewer service on the west side of town, according to City Superintendent Paul Isaacson.

"There are 65 homes on the west side of town on septic systems right now, Isaacson said at Wednesday's council meeting. "There's probably another 80 homes that could be developed on the west side of town within the city limits."

The least expensive route is along a natural drainage in the county, just west of the city limit, according to an engineering study.

Frank Rost Jr., husband of Mayor Gwen Rost, challenged that idea at Wednesday's meeting. "Are we going to build outside the city first, before we take care of the city?" he asked.

"We say, 'through the county,' but I think you all know that as soon as the sewer line is there, it probably will be part of the city and the city will reap the harvest in the end," said former Councilman Brad Christopherson. "It's a project that needs to be done."

Mayor Rost expressed concern about installing a sewer trunk line now because the city is upgrading its water system with money from a February bond issue.

"Right now the city is in a big water project," she said. "I don't know how our city employees can be putting in sewer lines and water lines at the same

time. We would like to, but we only have so much money and we can only do so much."

City Engineer Scott Bybee, of J-U-B Engineering in Twin Falls, said the state offers loans for sewer trunk lines at 4 percent to 4.5 percent interest.

"As a taxpayer I've got all the taxes I want," said Frank Rost. "I think we got a pretty good project with this water thing without tackling the sewer business."

"That's true, Frank," said Councilman Dale Bunn, "but five or six years ago (it) was the same argument."

The sewer line "has got to come," Bunn argued.

Several people argued that the project wouldn't cost taxpayers much because of money the city would receive from sewer connection fees.

"At \$1,300 (per hookup) for 65 potential (homes) is a considerable amount of money," said Jack Francis.

Mayor Rost said that sewer money could be slow in coming from homeowners or septic systems because the city probably would not demand that they hook onto the sewer line.

Others noted the higher cost of installing septic systems - \$2,500 to \$3,000, according to local developer John Wert - over connecting with city sewer service.

Councilman Dale Bunn called for a committee to study the matter. Much information on the proposed sewer system is already available for a committee to use, Bybee said.

"All we got to do is figure how to get it in, where the money's coming from, and how to pay it back," Bunn said.

Young man loses fight to play football

20-year-old with Down syndrome ruled ineligible

DENVER (AP) — Just about everybody wanted Gabriel Lane, a 20-year-old high school senior with Down syndrome, to play football with his beloved Wildcats of Greeley, Colo. Everybody but the keepers of the rules.

On Thursday, Lane looked up in bewilderment at U.S. District Judge Zita Weinschenk, then buried his head in his hands and wept when she told him he's just too old.

"I hope, Gabriel, that you'll have a really good year. Things will happen to the football team because of your inspiration," she said, but added that her hands were tied by Colorado High School Activities Association rules.

Lane, a 5-foot-3, 215-pounder, is honorary captain and plays tackle and guard in Wildcat scrimmages. The team wanted Lane to play a few downs in each game, said his mother, Sally, but if Lane took the field, the team would be disqualified "and that's not fair to the team."

Lane's attorney, John Culver, sought a temporary restraining order, arguing that the state association had violated the federal Americans with Disabilities Act, which requires public accommodations for the handicapped.

"This is not a disability issue. It's an age-rule issue," said Alex Halpern, an attorney for the association.

After the judge ruled, John

Borman, athletic director at the school, said Lane will be allowed to suit up and sit with the team but won't take the field. "A rule is a rule," Borman said. "We understand they have to draw the line somewhere. Gabe's still part of the team, and there's a lot of value in that."

CHSAA bylaws prohibit players older than 19 from participating in high school sports, to protect younger, smaller players from harm and maintain competition.

But under Colorado's special education program, handicapped students can remain in school until they're 21. Lane has a mental age of 7 but worked his way through the school system, taking courses like shop and photography.

He had failed to apply for a waiver to play another year.

The judge said courts should not get involved in deciding eligibility questions for high school sports.

But she suggested that the association reconsider its rules. "If I were the person making the rules for the association, I wouldn't hesitate for a minute to extend the waiver," Weinschenk said.

The association's Board of Control, which makes the rules, won't meet until January or April. The school football season ends Nov. 1, and Lane's high school football career along with it.

Group sues Air Force for bombing protected area

PHOENIX (AP) — An environmental group sued the U.S. Air Force on Thursday, charging it with bombing the desert habitat of an endangered antelope in southwestern Arizona.

In the suit, the Washington-based Department of Wildlife demands that the Air Force stop running military training missions over certain areas near the Barry M. Goldwater Air Force Range.

The range, just east of Yuma, Ariz., is the largest remaining and bomb practice range in the world. The group alleges the missions are harmful to the Sonoran pronghorn antelope, which was listed as endangered in 1967.

The mission violates the Endangered Species Act, which forbids harming, harassing, pursuing, hunting, shooting, wounding or killing an endangered species, said Bill Sape, a Defenders attorney.

The group cannot prove the missions have killed any antelopes, but it believes the bombings are at the least disturbing to them, Sape said.

The suit was filed in U.S. District Court in Washington.

Col. Michael Hauser of Luke Air Force Base in Phoenix said Thursday the two Air Force employees familiar with the issue were not available for comment.

The Sonoran pronghorn is the only endangered antelope in the United States, according to Arizona Fish and Wildlife Service. Of more than a million antelope nationwide, there are about 100 Sonoran pronghorns, all in Arizona.

The group boasts the highest number of antelopes in the nation, including the Sonoran pronghorn and two other subspecies in Arizona.

Sape said a compromise is typically worked out when military mis-

sions conflict with environmental laws.

"The Department of Defense is doing the right thing hundreds of times. This Air Force thing is the exception, not the rule," he said.

Potential conflicts between military training and the Endangered Species Act prompted U.S. Rep. Henry Bonilla, R-Texas, to attempt to attach a waiver this week to a Defense Department appropriations bill that was being debated in a House-Senate conference committee.

The waiver would have allowed the president to waive the Endangered Species Act for purposes of national security. The committee decided Thursday not to include it in the bill.

Military and environmental interests do come into conflict, said Angela Rogers, Bonilla's spokeswoman. She said two Texas Air Force bases suffered during this summer's drought because their water was cut back to accommodate an endangered animal.

"It's not specific to this situation," Rogers said. "This could happen anywhere in the country at any military installation."

Mike Bagley, an aide to U.S. Rep. Norm Dicks, D-Washington, said there are many instances where the military and environmental officials have worked together. Dicks worked to oppose Bonilla's waiver.

"Give me an example of an endangered bird that is a threat to national security," said Bagley. "The existing law has ample room for you to sit down and work this out."

Fire forces evacuation of terminal

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A small fire forced the evacuation of about 500 passengers and employees from terminal one of the Salt Lake City International Airport on Thursday.

Victor White, director of airport operations, said the fire ignited on the roof of the terminal at about 5:30 p.m. while a wedding crew was doing some work.

The fire was small but filled the terminal with heavy smoke, White said. Concourses A and B also were briefly evacuated as airport firefighters put out the fire.

Passengers and employees were allowed back into the building at about 6 p.m. White said it appears the fire caused little damage. However, about a dozen flights were delayed 30 to 45 minutes.

Utah governor urges Western states to set up regional primary committee

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Gov. Mike Leavitt is convinced that if western states band together they can have as much influence on primary presidential candidates as larger states, such as Texas.

He has been pushing for a regional presidential primary in order to attract candidates to the West and get them to focus on western issues including land, water and transportation.

If just five Western states hold a regional primary, they would have the push of some 150 delegates, Leavitt said. "You could get darn near as big as Texas," the governor said following a conference call on Thursday with several

Democratic and Republican representatives from neighboring states. Leavitt hosted the call to seek input on the creation of a proposed Rocky Mountain Regional Primary State Committee, which would coordinate a regional primary. Those participating in the conference call included representatives from Arizona, Colorado, Montana, Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, the Western Governors' Association and Council of State Governments-West. Another conference call was planned later between Leavitt and representatives from Idaho and New Mexico.

City balks at idea of beer at dawn

PAUL — City leaders appear reluctant to swallow a tavern owner's request for early-morning beer sales.

Dana Hull, owner of Mike's Place, has asked the council to let her sell beer beginning at 6 a.m. City's ordinance bans beer sales before 7 a.m.

The amended ordinance was read during a meeting Wednesday night. It will be read during the next two meetings and could be voted on during the council's November meeting.

Council members, except for one, voiced opposition to Hull's proposal. Norma Claridge, chairwoman of the Minidoka County School District, also spoke against the proposal.

During the meeting, Hull stressed that Mike's Place does not sell hard liquor, only beer, and her efforts to improve the business's image have cost her some customers. Hard liquor can be sold before 10 a.m., according to state law.

Hull said she hopes to revive the business if the council approves her request. By opening when graveyard shift workers are leaving work, she hopes to boost her clientele.

Council member Mandelon Greenwell voiced concern about children who walk past Mike's Place on their way to school. She said beer cans and bottles left on the street and increased traffic near the bar could be hazardous.

Mike's Place is located at 28 E. Idaho Street.

Claridge said if consumers bought beer at the local convenience stores, they would simply take it home and school children would be safer than if they walked past an open bar on the way to school.

Paul resident Troy Anderson said the potential for problems will be the same whether the tavern opens at 6 a.m. or 7 a.m. Anderson, supported Hull's request.

Hull argued that beer sales and consumption are already taking place before 7 a.m., despite the city's ordinance. She said beer is being purchased and consumed in parking lots next to convenience stores in Paul.

"It would look better if they were inside and out of public view," she said.

Council member Jim Johnson said Hull should be able to open her business, whenever she wants, but beer should not be sold at 7 a.m. Selling beer one hour earlier would make no significant impact on her sales, he said.

City Attorney Kent Fletcher said the proposed ordinance prohibits beer sales between 1 a.m. and 6 a.m.

State law is the same. Fletcher also reminded the council that any amendment to the ordinance will affect more businesses than just Mike's Place.

Hull said that 6 a.m. finds the same to graveyard workers as 5 p.m. does to people who work during the day. Her biggest concern is that the graveyard workers will leave Paul and spend their money elsewhere.

Council member Don Cutley said most of the local graveyard workers are employed by Amalgamated Sugar Co. and the sugar processing campaign lasts only from September to March. After March the clientele would decrease, he said.

Cutley recommended that the council suspend the rates and pass the ordinance immediately, instead of waiting until November.

Mayor Randy Jones said the amended ordinance should be read two more times to give city residents a chance to voice their opinion and concerns.

"I'd like to see some talking into it," he said.

Safety ranks first in Paul

PAUL — As the sugar beet harvest approaches, Minidoka County school officials want to increase safety at a busy intersection where students must contend with large trucks and increased traffic.

"We'd prefer to get safety funding for the area, but it looks like we might have to settle for the crossing guard instead," Superintendent Nick Hallert said. "With those big harvest trucks cutting by, we're going to at least need something there."

The council agreed to send a letter to the Idaho Department of Education explaining the need for safety funding in the area during harvest season.

Parents concerned about the intersection last year submitted a request to the district for safety funding. The district forwarded the request to the state, but it was denied.

Hallert said he believes it was turned down because the state sent inspectors to look into the situation at a time when harvest wasn't in season.

"Now is the time we're hoping to get them out here so they can see what we're talking about," Hallert said.

The state normally pays 85 percent of the cost to transport children who live more than a mile and a half from school. If the safety funding request is approved, students who live near the intersection also would be covered.

Paul Elementary School nurse Resue Hartley told the council Wednesday night that parents are concerned about the intersection again this year.

"Parents who live on the east side of town are concerned about their kids having to cross this intersection to get to the school on the west side," she said.

Hallert said the district would wait for the council's decision on hiring a crossing guard before talking further action.

"We thought we'd try this first and see what happens, but we are trying to get something that will help us quickly," he said.

The district also is concerned about a threat near the elementary school, whose owner is seeking to amend a city ordinance governing hours for the sale of beer.

Dana Hull, owner of Mike's Place on 28 E. Idaho St., wants to sell beer at 6 a.m. to boost her clientele. The city doesn't allow beer sales before 7 a.m.

Hullert said district officials are concerned that extending the bar's hours could further increase traffic in town.

federal Energy Department — chief executive officer of Boise-based Truss Joint company.

"Proposition 3 does nothing but hurt Idaho," Johnson said. "It will not stop nuclear waste from coming into the state; instead, it will void an unprecedented agreement that empowers Idaho in its relationship with the federal government."

Proposition 3 would rescind Gov. Phil Batt's agreement with the federal government to accept 1,133 shipments of highly radioactive waste for storage at INEL in exchange for a court-enforceable promise to move most of the waste now in Idaho out by 2035.

The agreement also would mandate cleanup, impose deadlines and keep out shipments of nuclear waste from commercial power reactors. And it would put Idaho in a better position to compete for federal cleanup dollars. Get the Waste Out says.

Rescinding the agreement would bring more waste into the state with no guarantee that it would ever leave, the group says.

"We must vote against Proposition 3 if we want to get nuclear waste out of Idaho and away from our water supply," Johnson said.

Supporters of Proposition 3, however, point out that INEL already was required by federal environmental laws to clean up nuclear and other waste.

"The cleanup at INEL was required long before Batt's deal," Peavey said. "And the feds themselves have called the deadlines in this deal 'non-enforceable target dates.'"

Nor does the agreement guarantee that waste will leave Idaho, said David Proctor, a spokesman for the Stop the Shipments campaign.

"It can't, because there's no place for it to go," he said. "And if there's no place for it to go, it stays here."

The only thing the agreement guarantees is that Idaho will get more waste, he said.

Though it limits the number of shipments of spent reactor fuel for the government's agreement calls for the establishment of a facility to treat radioactive waste mixed with hazardous chemicals. The treatment facility would have a capacity to treat about 6.3 million cubic feet of waste. About half of that is now at INEL; the rest, 3.15 million cubic feet, would come from Colorado and the Hanford Nuclear Reservation in Washington.

About 2.2 million cubic feet of buried nuclear waste at INEL is not covered in the governor's agreement. Solvents from that waste have seeped into the Snake River Plain Aquifer, and the government is working to

clean that up.

Proctor also disagrees with critics of Proposition 3 who say it can't stop the shipments of radioactive waste.

Serious questions have been raised about the amount of damage earthquakes would cause at INEL, Proctor said. Those questions should trigger a new environmental study of waste storage at INEL, halting the shipments until it is completed, he said.

Some agreed that the governor's deal probably should have been opened to public comment. But that's no reason the rescind the agreement now, he said.

"We've got the best we can," he said. Other state governors have sought similar agreements — so far, unsuccessfully.

Families forced out by chemical spill

ROCKFORD — Two families were forced to evacuate when a truck overturned and spilled 1,600 gallons of an agricultural fungicide.

State Highway 39 was closed for about 12 hours, but there was no injury from the spilled chemical.

Driver Wayne Woolstenhulme, 26, said he was northbound about a mile south of Rockford Wednesday when a pickup truck pulled out in front of him. To avoid a collision, Woolstenhulme swerved the truck. It missed the pickup but overturned. The driver of the pickup didn't stop.

Woolstenhulme was treated at a hospital for minor burns and bruises and said he would return to work today or Monday.

Study probes health of women mine workers

KELLOGG — Women who worked at the Bunker Hill silver smelter in the 1970s start menopause early and are more likely to have brittle bones, a federal study says.

The women employees of the now-closed smelter also reported more cases of hypertension, anemia and arthritis, according to the study unveiled Wednesday night by the U.S. Public Health Service.

The long-awaited two-year study was the first to examine health problems faced by women who worked at the Silver Valley smelter, which is being demolished under the federal Superfund program.

The study is also among a handful of studies nationwide examining the health impacts of lead exposure on women.

Valley County deputy finally reinstated

CASCADE — The man likely to be the next Valley County sheriff is back at work as a deputy after more than three months on paid leave during investigations of allegations leveled at him by the incumbent he defeated in the May primary.

Tommy Rhea, who defeated Sheriff Lewis Pratt and has no Democratic opposition in the November election, was notified of his reinstatement after the Peace Officers Standards and Training Council summarily rejected Pratt's claim that Rhea's law enforcement certificate should be revoked.

Pratt, who told Rhea to return to work this week, was asked in late August by the Valley County Commission to resign, but he has yet to formally respond to that request.

Church sued in pregnant woman's death

COEUR D'ALENE — A Post Falls church and the family of its late pastor are being sued over the death of a pregnant woman in a traffic accident almost two years ago.

Ramona K. Fickel, 27, of Troy, was killed Sept. 30, 1994, in a collision on U.S. 95 near Genesee. She was seven months pregnant, and the fetus also died. Moscow attorney David Savage filed suit last week in 1st District Court against Falls Mill Gospel Assembly of God Church and the estate of David O. Hutchison on behalf of Mrs. Fickel's husband, Christopher Fickel.

Jet boats banned in Hells Canyon in summer

LEWISTON (AP) — A new Forest Service plan will ban jet boats so silence can reign for 21 days each summer on 21 miles of the Snake River through the Hells Canyon National Recreation Area.

Opponents are protesting loudly. The Forest Service released its intent to manage jet boat traffic and commercial float and jet boat outfitters who cater to tourists.

Jet boats will be banned from running 21 miles of the Snake from Kirkwood Historic Ranch upstream to Wild Sheep Rapids for seven three-day periods each summer. Jet boat tour operators also will have limits placed on the number of trips they can make into the canyon.

Woody Fine, deputy area ranger

in Clarkston, Wash., said the agency's proposal is similar to a citizen task force proposal advanced nearly four years ago. That plan called for an average of 12 commercial jet boat launches a day while the Forest Service's new proposal calls for an average of 12.3.

Jet boat numbers on the stretch of the Snake protected as a wild river would drop 29 percent under the plan, Fine said.

"That's pretty much the underlying strategy" — to move the use to other parts of the river so it is reduced in the wild section, he said.

Sandra Mitchell, executive director of the Hells Canyon Alliance in Boise, said jet boaters and their allies had hoped for better from Wallowa Whitman National Forest Supervisor

Robert Richmond, who made the decision.

"It's not over. This is not going to be accepted easily," Mitchell said. "People have not given up; this is a setback."

Banning jet boats for 21 days is a sore point for the alliance, which contends the non-motorized periods cater only to a small group of commercial rafting outfitters. Rafters and jet boaters get along just fine in the canyon, Mitchell said, and her group will challenge the plan.

Richmond's decision sets the stage for the Forest Service to implement its overall river management plan next summer, including limits on private jet boat numbers. The Hells Canyon Alliance does not oppose that move.

Ric Bailey, executive director of the Hells Canyon Preservation Council in Joseph, Ore., said the plan is a step in the right direction, but the council wants a permanent ban on jet boats on the 21-mile stretch.

Businesses go to bat for steelhead fishing

BOISE (AP) — Steelhead fishing is a \$50 million industry that provides 2,700 Idaho jobs and up to 40,000 anglers buy steelhead tags each year.

That's an industry that must be protected and preserved, sporting and business groups said at a news conference Thursday.

They urged Idaho's congressional delegation and top officials to get together on a plan for steelhead recovery that will avoid the need

for an endangered species listing that could jeopardize sport fishing.

"We need Idaho's elected officials to take immediate steps to protect the fish and protect the fishery," said Justin Hayes of Idaho Rivers United.

In July, Idaho steelhead were listed for possible endangered species protection. Groups at the news conference said Idaho's leaders must aggressively attack the problems to pre-

serve sport fishing.

"This proposed Endangered Species Act listing is a wake-up call," said Mitch Sanchocha of Idaho Steelhead and Salmon Unlimited. "Our fishing is at risk. These magnificent and valuable fish have to be restored, and we're calling on Idaho's elected officials to show leadership on this issue and develop a plan that protects our fishing and restores steelhead."

## Guess Who guitarist spins tale of memorable band

TWIN FALLS — Who says rock 'n' roll feuds are eventually forgotten? "I don't have anything to say to (Randy Bachman and (Burton) Cummings, although Cummings is a business partner (of mine)," said Jim Kale, guitarist and one of the founding members of the Guess Who, which will play a concert Saturday night in Bruin Stadium. "People grow apart."

The Guess Who, one of the most successful rock acts of the late '60s and '70s, suffered a famously messy breakup in 1970 when Bachman, recently converted to Mormonism,

## Popular pianist releases 3rd CD

TWIN FALLS — Classical pianist Kelly Yost, who sells records like hotcakes despite living in a small town a long way from urban cultural centers, has released her third recording, "Roses and Solitude."

When Yost released her first cassette of "Piano Reflections" in 1987, the "New Age" genre of music was just getting started, and Yost was one of its first practitioners.

"Is Bach new age?" Yost asked. "When people heard my music they'd say, 'Oh, you're new age!' It's not intentional, I just fell into it."

Yost, who has sold 325,000 copies of her first two albums, plays soothing classical music selections, songs with familiar melodies, but "keeping it pure and uncluttered in (my) interpretations," she explained.

That's her entire philosophy when it comes to recording the music. It's something she learned from her undergraduate professor, Steven Romano at the University of Idaho, to whom this album is dedicated.

"When I went (to college), I had a glittering technique... with very fast fingers," Yost said. "He was not impressed. He taught me not to use the music for my own gain," or just for the applause.

Yost strives hard with each piece she records to let the song speak for itself and keep her "voice" out of it as much as possible. Each piece should be able to reach out to the listener, even if he's in the middle of his drive home from work. To reach this level of simplicity, Yost can practice about 100 hours on each piece, if it's fairly familiar to her.

"The whole recording procedure is very involved," Yost said. "I was quite

surprised. She said that she will record a song three times, or maybe over a span of three days to get just the right sound."

Luckily, Yost doesn't have to pay studio time since she and her husband, Sam, built their own custom recording studio in Twin Falls. It's home to their independent recording company, Channel Productions.

The first album was recorded in Ketchum, but that studio decided to shrink its facilities and sell the piano, a nine-foot Yamaha baby grand in beautiful condition. This forced Yost to record her second album, "Quiet Colors," in Portland, Ore.

Since the Yosts were producing Kelly's music themselves, it made sense to build their company in Twin Falls, near their home. In a stroke of luck, they were able to purchase the Yamaha piano from the Ketchum studio.

"I have to be really comfortable with the piano as well as with the acoustics in the room," Yost said. "This way, there are no adjustments to make and I can be very focused on the sound." Yost's focus has paid off. Writer Sarah Ban Breathnach, author of the best-selling "Simple Abundance: A Daybook of

Comfort and Joy" featured "Piano Reflections" in her book.

"Kelly Yost's exquisite gifts of passion and authenticity have long been a source of much comfort and joy for me," Breathnach wrote.

"It was a really interesting thing that happened, that we didn't know about until it had already happened," said Yost of Breathnach's book.

"The title, 'Roses & Solitude,' was inspired by a bed and breakfast in Oregon. It claims to have 'an atmosphere of roses and solitude,' and that sounded like the perfect garden," Yost said.

Like the title, many of the musical selections came out of nowhere as Yost was preparing the CD. Some are pieces she has loved her whole life, some she heard for the first time on a public radio station, and some are the recommendations of other friends and musicians.

"They've just appeared when I'm ready for them," said Yost.

"Roses and Solitude" is available today in music, book and gift stores, or it may be ordered by calling Channel Productions at (800) 234-3694. Yost's previous two recordings are also available.

## Where there's a Will: Rogers talks politics in Ketchum

KETCHUM — Will Rogers was a disorganized Democrat. Said so many times.

Still, Lance Brown ain't so sure. "He was for the common man, no doubt about it," said Brown, a Chicago actor who'll bring his one-man "Tribute to Will Rogers: A Voice for the '90s" to Ketchum's nexStage Theater Saturday night. "But he didn't believe that the government — or anybody else for that matter — should live beyond their means. In that respect, he was pretty conservative."

"I don't know what he'd think about this election," Brown said in a telephone interview from his home. "But he'd definitely have something to say about it."

It's hard to exaggerate Rogers' impact on the country during the Great Depression. Brown said — a period at the dawn of mass communications. He had a flourishing movie career, a must-listen radio broadcast and a nationally syndicated newspaper column.

When he died in a plane crash in the summer of 1935, Rogers was so popular that he was considered a potential threat to Franklin Roosevelt's renomination.

"He wasn't the first stand-up comedian — that came out of vaudeville, where Rogers came from — but he was the first stand-up comedian to do topical humor," Brown said.

Brown got to know Rogers through his father, who once saw him play polo — yep, polo — during a visit to New Mexico in the 1920s. After working for several years as an actor, the younger Brown began re-reading Rogers' material.

"He was a born performer, but he was a man who excelled at everything he tried," Brown said. "He would have been good politician, and if he'd lived long enough, a star on TV."

Rogers' aw-shucks demeanor was genuine — he really was part-Indian hayseed from Oklahoma — but he used it to disarm pretentious people, Brown said.

"After he started writing his column for the New York Daily News, he had to ask the proof-readers to stop correcting

# Seals, Vee bring their nostalgic sounds to CSI gym

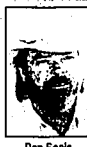
**TWIN FALLS** — Dan Seals has had more lives in the music business than any performer since, oh, Bobby Vee.

Not by coincidence, they'll both be here Wednesday night for a benefit concert for the Twin Falls Police Benefit Association, at 8 p.m. in the College of Southern Idaho gymnasium.

Seals, 48, has been, by turns, the younger brother of Jim Seals (Seals & Crofts), the tenor in the archetypal '70s acoustic duo England Dan and John Ford Coley ("I'd Really Love to See You Tonight," "Nights Are Forever Without You"), a country crooner ("Meet Me in Montana," "Everything That Glitters"), and a crossover star ("Pop").

Vee, 53, went from last-minute fill-in act for Buddy Holly, to teen heartthrob ("Take Good Care of My Baby," "The Night Has a Thousand Eyes"), to harmony ("Come Back When You Grow Up"), to one of the longest-running nostalgia acts in the world.

But about all he has in common, apart from staying power, is their heartland roots. Seals was born in the Texas Oil Patch to a pipefitter who was a guitar-picker. The Sealses had a family band, including Jim — five years Dan's senior — who won the Texas state fiddle championship when he was 15.

Dan played the stand-up bass, according to "The Insider's Country Music Handbook," standing on an apple crate to

reach some of the chords, and later changed to saxophone.

After Jim went to Los Angeles, Dan got into rock 'n' roll in Dallas, playing in a garage band called Southwest F.O.B. that included Colley. Seals & Croft's monster hit "Summer Breeze" in 1972 opened some doors for Jim Seals' younger brother, and four years later England Dan and John Ford Coley had their first bone fide hit in "I'd Really Love to See You," which climbed to No. 2 on the

Billboard charts and eventually sold more than 2 million copies.

The duo had five more Top 40 hits over the next three years, but had a falling out in 1975 after releasing Todd Rundgren's "Love Is the Answer." Dan Seals performed as England Dan for two more years, but his solo career flopped and he soon went bankrupt.

According to "The Insider's Country Music Handbook," Seals talked a producer into letting him cut a country demo record in 1983, which became "Everybody's Dream Girl," a Top 10 hit in Nashville. His first country album, "Won't Be Blue Anymore," produced three No. 1 hits: "Meet Me in Montana," a duet with Marie Osmond; "Everything That Glitters," and "Pop," which also made the pop charts.

Seals' follow-up album, "On the Front Line," also produced three No. 1 singles: "You Still Love Me," "I'll Be There" and "Three Time Losers." In the seven years between 1985 and 1992, Seals had 11 No. 1 country hits, a pace surpassed only by Dolly Parton.

Seals continues to record. A member of the Bahai faith like his brother Jimmy, he lives in Hendersonville, Tenn., with his wife and two of his three children.

Vee was born Robert Velline way, way off Broadway — in Fargo, N.D. When he was 16, he formed a vocal trio, The Shadows, with his brother and a friend, that played clubs and school dances in the upper Midwest.

The Shadows happened to be in the right place — Mason City, Iowa — at exactly the right time, Feb. 3, 1959, when a plane crash killed Buddy Holly, Richie Valens and The Big Bopper (J.P. Richardson). Concert promoters, needing a fill-in act, booked the Shadows, and the media attention led Velline to a contract with Liberty records and a new name.

Liberty and Velline's agent packaged Bobby Vee as the boy next door, according to the "Rolling Stone Encyclopedia of Rock 'n' Roll," sending him to concert gigs wearing a high school letterman's sweater and finding him sweet, sweeter material to

sing — "Devil or Angel," "Rubber Ball," and most famously, "Take Good Care of My Baby," which spent three weeks at No. 1 on the Billboard charts in 1961.

During the Kennedy administration, Vee seldom was off the Billboard charts, culminating in "The Night Has a Thousand Eyes" in 1963. But after the British Invasion, his career quickly waned.

Undeterred, Vee reunited with The Strangers and produced the nostalgic "Come Back When You Grow Up" in 1967, which rose to No. 3 on the Billboard charts during the Summer of Love. (The Beatles' "All You Need is Love" and Bobbie Gentry's "Ode to Billy Joe" were No. 1 and No. 2 that week, respectively.)

Meanwhile, Vee's popularity in England, where he was a teen idol in the Cliff Richard mode, never really waned. According to the "Rolling Stone Encyclopedia," he still makes at least one concert tour a year to Britain.

Vee, who lives in Minnesota and owns his own record company, continues to tour extensively on the oldies circuit.

"days a year, developing the act," Kale said in a phone interview. "Now we play fewer dates, but in bigger arenas. We do our new songs, but we do music from the 'Guess Who' catalog too. That's why people come to hear us."

"Our audience is 6 to 60," he said. "It's the biggest range I've ever seen."

Kale and Peterson grew up in Winnipeg, Manitoba, along with Bay City and Alan "Chad Allan" Kobel. They formed a group, Chad Allan and the Expressions, in 1962.

The band quickly gained national attention in Canada, but that was a long way from the big time in the United States, Kale said. "There were all kinds of bands from Southern California and all kinds of bands from the British Invasion selling records in the states, but because we were a Canadian band, we automatically got put in a different category, no matter what we did."

Even the group's name, which it changed in 1966 after Allan left, is a reference to obscurity. "Disc jockeys would introduce us as 'guess who?'" he said. "Pretty soon the name stuck. I've always hated it, myself."

The group's producer, Jack Richardson, mortgaged his house and paid for the band to travel to New York City for a recording session in September 1968.

"That was the session that produced 'These Eyes,' (the group's

first Top 10 hit)," Kale said. "We had a pretty good run until 1975."

That run included 12 Top 40 and five Top 10 hits, most notably "American Woman," a Canadian-eye view of cupid and stupidity south of the border that spent three weeks at the top of the Billboard charts in the spring of 1970.

"We were playing a date in southern Ontario, and Peterson walked out on stage and started laying down this beat," Kale said. "Bachman and I joined him and Cummings came out — last, as usual — and started singing the lyric pretty much as you hear them on the record."

Despite its success, "American Woman" stirred up controversy in America, notably when the Guess Who was invited to the White House in 1971 to entertain the visiting Prince Charles and Princess Anne.

"The story is that Pat Nixon asked us not to sing it, but that's not true," Kale said. "Our government asked us not to. But back then, the Nixons got blamed for everything."

The Blue Moon of Kentucky will keep on shining, but Bill Monroe, the brightest star bluegrass ever knew, has finally set after 84 years.

Monroe, the father of bluegrass music, became the music's grand patriarch and perennial champion in a career lasting more than 60 years.

With his flowing mane of frost-white hair and stylish sideburns topped by a white ten-gallon hat, and possessed of a regal bearing unbowed by age, Monroe came to embody the music. His classic songs, his distinctive high-tenor style and, most of all, his endless devotion defined bluegrass to all those that came after — and, in truth, they all came after Monroe.

He was the music's proud papa — sometimes to the point of paranoia over others' being credited as originators.

It was Monroe's good fortune that the music took the name from his band, the Blue Grass

Boys, who had adopted it to honor the state that first proved hospitable to what musicologist Alan Lomax once called "folk music in overdrive."

It was an accurate description of Monroe's swift mandolin leads and the hard-driving instrumental fiddle play that still defines bluegrass.

On top of that, Monroe deliv-

ered the songs with his trademark high-pitched, piercing vocals, often enveloping them in sweet, brittle harmonies. What came to be known as the "high lonesome" sound was simply a variation on the authentic mountain singing he'd heard on the family farm and in church while growing up in Kentucky. It was the sound of home.

his spelling and grammatical errors," Brown said. "He put them there on purpose."

Brown, now 51, has been doing his one-man Rogers show for 10 years.

He's also done research and contributed material to the Will Rogers Memorial in Claremore, Okla.

"I'm learning new things about him all the time," Brown said.

Rogers' big break came from his encounter with impresario Florenz Ziegfeld in the early 1920s. Ziegfeld put Rogers, always wearing a battered Stetson with his straw-colored hair sticking out from underneath, in the middle of his Broadway revues, surrounded by barely adult starlets in feathers.

"Will got a lot of material from hanging around with working cowboys," Brown said. "And showgirls."

# French's 'My Summer With George': Triumph of novelist over feminist

As America's most uncompromising mainstream feminist, Marilyn French has all too often come across as a moralist who, having figured out what is wrong with the world, won't let herself smile until justice has prevailed.

Though an unfair simplification of a major novelist and a first-rate intellect, such a characterization is not without foundation. French's notion, however brilliant, tends to be so crucially relentless in its attack on patriarchy that it threatens to alienate all but the most open-minded of readers. Her first and most famous novel, the landmark 1977 best seller "The

Women's Room," is undercut as a work of art by its embittered polemic against men.

Yet no one who reads her fifth novel, "My Summer with George" (Knopf, \$23) will be able to view French that way again. Here, for once, donna gives way to art, and the novelist triumphs over the polemicist. The result is a mature and fully realized work of fiction that happens also to brim with delightful comic invention. Serious, yes, but also vastly entertaining.

The protagonist, Hermione Beldame, is a successful romance novelist living in sophisticated lux-

ury in New York. At 60, she is still attractive, though not the beauty she once was. Married four times — twice widowed, twice divorced — she feels herself beyond the delusion of romantic love, that longing for Prince Charming that she mines so effectively as her professional stock in trade.

Hermione meets George Johnson, a 55-year-old newspaper editor from Kentucky. She is instantly smitten, as much by his vulnerability as his attractiveness. "When he turned my way, I saw he had a beautiful face, sweet and thoughtful in repose, but what struck me most was the dejection of his posture. I thought I had never seen such a disheartened human being, and my heart immediately turned over in sympathy."

Her heart isn't the only thing that turns over. Before you could sing "Somebody my prince will come," Hermione is afflicted with the most passionate erotic fantasies of her life, all centered on George. When he shows the slightest interest in her, she is feverishly imagining him moving to New York, where she decorates his apartment, introduces him to metropolitan refinements such as the

theater and museums — though he hasn't even kissed her yet.

The only problem is that George is skittish and distracted, sending Hermione cripplingly mixed messages. He wants to see her, but never stays long. In her presence, he is distracted and inattentive. Hermione is feverishly planning the rest of their lives together, while George will hardly sit still long enough to have a decent conversation.

# Oates' 'Mulvaney's' chronicles an American family's decline

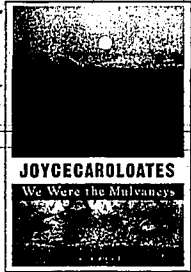

It's no accident that the Mulvaney home in upstate New York is called High Point Farm. The Mulvaney's — Michael and Corinne and their four fine kids — flourish in the historic lavender farmhouse for more than 20 years. Then, in 1976, "something happens" to daughter Marianna at her high school prom, and the Mulvaney's seemingly blessed life begins its downward slide.

Perhaps it was never that idyllic to begin with, but Judd, the youngest Mulvaney, who narrates much of Joyce Carol Oates' compelling new "We Were the Mulvaney's" (Dutton, \$24.95), remembers it that way.

They have such fun, all the Mulvaney's, the assorted cats and dogs underfoot, the canary feathers trilling in the back ground while Michael and Corinne dance around the kitchen table. Mike Jr., nicknamed "Mule," scores touchdowns; studious Patrick "Pinch" makes great grades; Marianna "Button" is cheerleader. # Music company asks Dole to stop playing imitation of 'Soul Man'

WASHINGTON (AP) - The music company that owns "Soul Man" doesn't want the rhythm and blues hit turned into "Dole Man" and may seek damages to the tune of \$100,000 per play from Bob Dole's campaign.

Rondor Music International Inc. has written Dole, complaining the Republican's campaign theme song, "Dole Man," violated its copyright to the 1967 song written by David Porter and Isaac Hayes for the duo Sam and Dave.

"Dole Man" mimics the "Soul Man" refrain: "I'm a Dole man, I'm a Dole man." The campaign has played "Dole Man" at rallies for months, including the Republican National Convention in San Diego.

Parodies are protected from copyright lawsuits but Mary Lee Ryan, vice president of business affairs for Rondor, said, "I don't think he's making fun of himself and I don't think he's making fun of the song."

In an Aug. 29 letter, which claimed unauthorized use of the tune "is tantamount to theft," Rondor set a Friday deadline for the Dole campaign to respond before the Los Angeles-based company takes action.

Ryan would not elaborate Tuesday, but the letter asks the Dole campaign to list when and where the song was played so Rondor can assess damages, which can be as much as \$100,000 per performance under federal law.

Dole spokesman Nelson Warfield said Sam Moore, half of Sam and Dave, actually worked with the Dole campaign on the tune.

"We're proud he modified it and produced the 'Dole Man' for us," Warfield said.

"Their lawyers are welcome to talk to our lawyers. We're just trying to have some fun and it looks like some lawyers are just trying to get some fees," Warfield said in Murfreesboro, Tenn.

**Police: Witnesses not talking in probe of rapper's shooting**

**LAS VEGAS (AP)** — Witnesses are refusing to cooperate with police investigating the ambush shooting of rapper Tupac Shakur, who was in critical condition after doctors removed his right lung, authorities said.

Shakur, 25, was a passenger in a car heading to a nightclub late Saturday when a white Cadillac with four men inside pulled up and someone opened fire, shooting the rapper four times. At least two bullets hit him in the chest.

"We did not receive a whole lot of cooperation from most of his entourage," Metro Police Sgt. Kevin Manning said Monday. "It amazes me when they have professional bodyguards that they can't even give us an accurate description of the vehicle. No one is telling us anything."

Denis Row Records Chairman Marion "Sugar" Knight, whose Los Angeles-based company specializes in gangsta rap, was treated for a minor head wound after being grazed by a bullet fragment or shrapnel from the car.

Police were unable to question Knight about the shooting, but his lawyer, David Kenner, promised to bring him in today,

police said. Shakur and Knight were driving to the nightclub after watching Mike Tyson knockout Bruce Seldon in a championship fight at the MGM Grand.

Investigators found no evidence to support rumors that Shakur or Knight had fought with another group at the MGM Grand, but were looking into reports that the shooting may have evolved from a dispute with another gangsta rap group, Manning said.

The attack was the latest of several shootings involving Shakur.

In November 1994, he was shot five times during a robbery in the lobby of a Manhattan recording studio.

Shakur has also been arrested at least a half-dozen times in the past three years. He was released from a New York jail last year pending his appeal of a sex-abuse conviction. He had served eight months in the prison.

The rapper, who starred opposite Janet Jackson in the movie "Poetic Justice," is working on another film, "Gridlock." His latest album, "All Eyes On Me," has sold at least 5 million copies.

# R.E.M.'s latest comes across as part of a logical progress

As much as the Beatles were celebrated for their inventiveness — the way they flirted with sonic instrumentation and dabbled in dozens of styles — in some ways the band's greatest achievement was how the band held onto its musical identity. Sure, the psychedelic opulence of "Magical Mystery Tour" may have had little in common instrumentally with the lean, four-piece sound of "Please Please Me," but each was unequivocally and unmistakably a Beatles album.

Four hands since have been both as creative and consistent, but R.E.M. undoubtedly belongs in those ranks. "New Adventures in Hi-Fi" (Warner Bros. 46320, arriving in stores this week) sounds no more like the raucous, rollicking "Monster" than "Monster" echoed the brooding melancholy of "Automatic for the People."

Yet "New Adventures" not only seems of a piece with the other albums, but actually comes across as part of a logical progression. Granted, even the most insightful listeners would have had a hard time predicting that the triumphant guitars of "What's the Frequency, Kenneth?" would ultimately lead to the scuffling feedback that caps "Undertow," much less the pounding two-beat guitar hook that powers "Departure."

Like the Beatles, though, R.E.M. grasps the difference between a change in sound and a change in sensibility. And as much as "New Adventures in Hi-Fi" finds the quartet working with a broader sonic palette, the attitude behind that sound is essentially unchanged.

Start with "How the West Was Won and What It Got Us." Stylistically, it's a hodgepodge, layering stabbing, staccato piano-chords over fatback drums, dub-style bass and Spaghetti Western guitar. But rather than come across as just a jumble, what those diverse elements convey is anxiety and unease, emotions that tie nicely into the muttered resignation of Michael Stipe's vocal. So even though the specifics of the arrangement may be new to R.E.M., the feel is

remarkably familiar.

Guitarist Peter Buck is probably the album's most prominent player, not because he dominates the songs in typical guitar-hero fashion (in fact, there's not a guitar solo to be heard), but because what and how he plays tends to

define the shape and feel of each arrangement. Granted, his work is louder than ever on this album, offering even more crunch and distortion than he did on the mighty "Monster," but apart from "Undertow," there's very little in-your-face guitar here.

# Wal-Mart won't sell new Crow CD

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Wal-Mart Stores Inc. says it will not carry the new album by Grammy winner Sheryl Crow because one song implies that the retailer sells guns to children.

"Selling a record implying behavior that is against all we stand for is something we just could not profit from," said Wal-Mart spokesman Dale Ingram.

The album, "Sheryl Crow," is scheduled for a Sept. 24 release by A&M Records. Wal-Mart is a top seller of albums and record industry executives said the ban could reduce Crow's sales significantly.

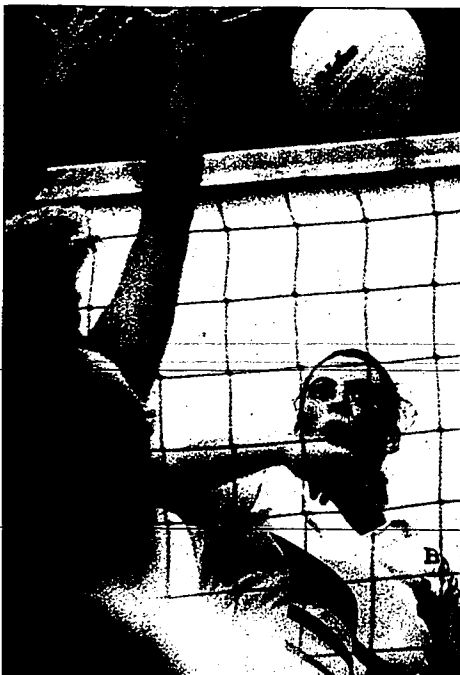

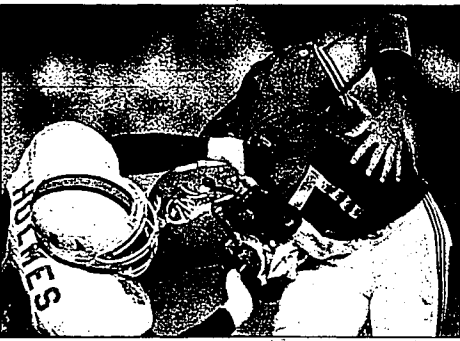
doing their jobs, but Whitney and Sara did their jobs well and allowed the others to make the big plays.”

DENVER (AP) - For once, the California Angels got a chance to hear on John Smoltz and the Atlanta Braves.

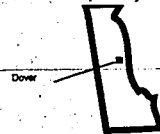

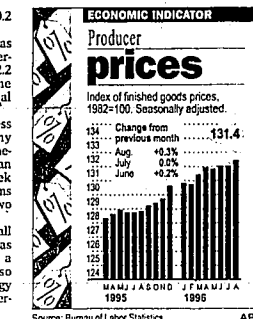

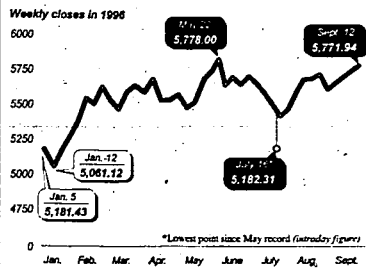

# Dow just misses record close

The Dow rose 17.02 to 5,771.94, finishing about 6 points shy of its highest close of 5,778.00, set May 22. The famed barometer of 30 big U.S. companies had gained nearly 40 points in the afternoon, moving within 2 points of its daily high of 5,796.10, which came during May 23's session.

Stocks drew a lift from the bond market, where traders welcomed news that wholesale prices fell 0.1 percent last month, excluding the volatile food and energy sectors. Overall, producer prices rose 0.3 percent in August. ## Feds provide break for long-term care insurance

**DENVER (AP)** — If you have been delaying the purchase of long-term care insurance because you expect the federal government to step forward to pick up the nation's tab for nursing home care, delay no longer. It's not going to pay the bill.

"The message is clear: Do it yourself because the government is not going to do it for you," says Mandell Winter Jr., a senior academic at the College for Financial Planning, a division of the National Endowment for Financial Education.

Out-of-pocket (unreimbursed) expenses paid for long-term care services will be eligible for the medical expense deduction (based on the 7.5 percent floor). This has been a murky area. Before the act was passed, long-term care expenses could be deducted only if medical treatment was involved, such as medicine and injections.

Custodial care not involving medical treatment, such as for an Alzheimer's patient, usually was not deductible.

• Employers who provide long-term care coverage for their employees can take a tax deduction for the cost and the employees do not have to treat the benefits as taxable income. However, the act does not allow employers to offer long-term care insurance as a qualified benefit under a cafeteria plan (where the employee gets to pick and choose benefits). Also, employer-provided coverage through a flexible spending account will be treated as part of the employee's gross income.

In light of these new provisions, Winter expects to see more consistent, competitive long-term care policies.

## Gillette to buy Duracell

**BOSTON (AP)** — Gillette took another step at the checkout line Thursday, adding the biggest name in disposable batteries to its best-selling razors with the \$7.1 billion purchase of Duracell.

The deal gives Gillette Co. yet another well-known product to sell through its worldwide distribution network, while offering Duracell International Inc. a chance to grow in markets where Gillette already has strong clout.

"At the checkout counters there's going to be nobody who can touch the magnitude of what we'll be able to do," said Alfred M. Zeien, Gillette's chairman and chief executive.

Duracell, the world's largest producer of alkaline batteries, sells its copper-zinc in supermarkets, drug stores, other places where Gillette sells its Sensor and Good News razors, Right Guard deodorants, Oral-B toothbrushes and Paper Mate pens.

## MONEY IN BRIEF

**Regulators eye rising credit card debt**

**WASHINGTON** — A jump in credit card debt and soaring personal bankruptcies have federal banking regulators closely monitoring the plastic money business.

But a top Federal Reserve official said Thursday the problems do not threaten to send the economy or banks into a tailspin.

While the banking system isn't about to suffer a repeat of last decade's lending disasters, witnesses at a House Banking Committee hearing grappled to explain what caused the problem and how it affects the lives of ordinary Americans.

On Wednesday, the FDIC said banks suffered \$3.8 billion in losses on credit card and consumer loans in the second quarter, up 36 percent from the same period last year. It blamed higher personal bankruptcies, which may exceed 1 million in 1996, for most of the problem.

Federal Reserve Board Governor Lawrence Lindsey offered his theory for the plastic meltdown: First, consumers are outspending any increases in their income. For every extra dollar of new income, consumers are spending \$1.10, he said.

## Hecla in joint deal for Nevada mine

**COEUR D'ALENE** — Hecla Mining Co. and Santa Fe Pacific Gold Corp. have agreed to develop a gold mine in northwestern Nevada, the companies said Tuesday.

Coeur d'Alene-based Hecla and Albuquerque, N.M.-based Santa Fe plan to share in joint assets on a 50-50 basis, with Hecla operating the mine, the companies said. One will be trucked from the mine, located about 50 miles west of Winnemucca, Nev., to Santa Fe's Twin Creeks mine for processing.

The underground, high-grade gold deposit is expected to produce an average of 100,000 ounces of gold annually for five years, the companies said. Production is expected to begin in the second quarter of 1997. The companies signed a letter of intent May 28, and construction began at the site in August. The companies announced the signing of a final agreement Tuesday.

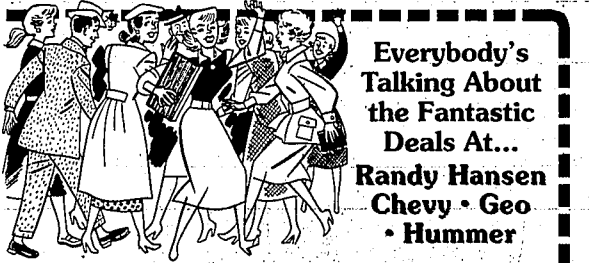

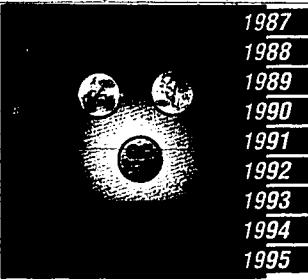

**How to Buy a Great Used Car**

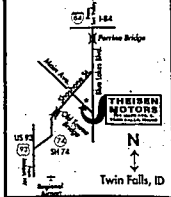
- There are certain basic things you should look for when you examine a car.
1. Find out the previous owner's name.
  2. Automatic Transmission fluid should be pink and not smell burnt.
  3. Coolant shouldn't be rusty and no green stains on the radiator.
  4. No oil spots around the engine.
  5. Look for rust, especially in the trunk, wheel wells and rocker panels under the door.
  6. Look for new welds, ripply body work, panels that don't match.
  7. Uneven tire wear may mean an alignment problem.
  8. Make sure the car comes with a useable jack and lug wrench.
  9. To check shocks and suspension push down and quickly release each corner of the car. It should not bounce more than 2 times.
  10. Seats shouldn't be saggy or ripped. Make sure belts and controls work.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff

"A pessimist is a man who looks both ways before crossing a one-way street." — Laurence J. Peter

With an optimist at the controls, South sees only one problem with today's game. With six solid trumps and three aces, all he needs is a diamond ruff in dummy to reach 10 tricks. A pessimist will see another danger. What if the solid trumps break 4-1?

The optimist wins dummy's spade ace and quickly leads a diamond to his ace. He surrenders a diamond to East, and East returns a trump to South's ace. South ruffs a diamond in dummy and ruffs a spade, ready to claim the contract. "Drawing trumps," claims South.

"Nice try," corrects West. "We got a trump, a diamond and two clubs on our side. It's too late for any retractions and South meekly concedes.

The pessimist sees that instead of a trump trick, South is instead ruffing a diamond at trick two, he ruffs a spade. Now, he cashes his diamond ace and concedes a diamond to East, who leads a trump. South wins and ruffs a diamond, but he doesn't claim. Instead, he ruffs another spade. When he cashes a high trump and East discards, South gets his other chance. He crosses to dummy's club ace to ruff dummy's last spade and West must follow helplessly. South scores all three of his low trumps via spot tricks, and instead of nine tricks, he earns his vulnerable game.



# Ken Burns' latest project embraces 'The West' on PBS

# Inside:

### TV Data

Far in the Western United States live the world's oldest trees, taking three millennia and more to grow tall and thick and fragrant in mountain groves.

When filmmaker Ken Burns ("The Civil War," "Baseball") and his protege Stephen Ives talk about "putting our arms around" the history of the West, the Giant Sequoia comes to mind. The human arm span can embrace only a portion of a side of the redwood.

New Englanders Burns and Ives do embrace the West, though, in an emotional sense. Indeed all Burns' films, whether about the building of the Brooklyn Bridge or Joe DiMaggio's 56-game hitting streak, are set on an emotional plain. There Burns

does "emotional archeology," looking for resonant truth, which he calls myth - anything that shapes the American identity.

For "The West," airing in eight parts beginning Sunday, Sept. 15, on PBS (check local listings), Burns assumes the role of executive producer and consultant, while Ives serves as researcher and director. Burns' longtime writing partner Geoffrey C. Ward contributes a companion volume closely paralleling the documentary.

"The West' is the story," Burns explains, "of one of the great intersections, crossroads, in human history, a place where tragically and heroically the best of us met the worst of us, and nothing was left unchanged."

"The West was a place for Americans to

start over, to get away, to make a new story, to make a new fortune, a place to find a new place to worship in a new way.

"It is also the story of a wound in the heart, a sense that the cost of that hope was a devastation to the landscape, the wildlife, the people and the spirit of the West that had been there before."

"The collision of these forces is simply what our series is about."

As important as myth is to Burns' storytelling, process is to his filmmaking. The Burns process and style, now frequently imitated, mixes anecdotal evidence, diaries and other personal records and illustrates it with still photographs and documents, re-enactments, newsreels and contemporary film footage.

Guest voices bring the words of the pioneers to life. "The West" features 56 readers, including Adam Arkin, Matthew Broderick, John Cullum, Hector Elizondo, Julie Harris, Amy Madigan, Gary Sinise, Jimmy Smits and B.D. Wong. The documentary's narrator is Peter Coyote.

These "emblematic stories" - there is one per episode of "The West" - are corroborated by interviews with scholars and novelists. What Shelby Foote was to "The Civil War," Kiowa poet-historian N. Scott Momaday is here.

Momaday, a Pulitzer Prize winner, presents the viewpoint of indigenous peoples as they came into contact, and frequently in conflict, with white Americans, as well as Hispanics, Asians and former slaves known as Exodusters.

Q: Who is the actor starring in the sequel to "The Crow"? I've never seen him before. —E.H.

A: His name is Vincent Perez, and if you lived in France, you'd definitely know him. He was voted one of the sexiest men alive there. Despite his life in residence in that country, though, the 31-year-old actor isn't French; he's Swiss, from the city of Lausanne, and is the son of a Spanish father and a German mother.

His sex-symbol status is the result of films such as "Indochine," in which he was the romantic lead opposite Sophie Deny, and "Queen Margot," opposite Isabelle Adjani. His offscreen entanglements have included Jacqueline Bisset and model Carla Bruni.

These days, Perez is devoting his time to establishing a movie career, and to that end, has moved to New York.

Q: I've heard that there's a feud between Cindy Crawford and Elizabeth Seal. Is that true? —K.L.

A: There have been reports that Crawford, 30, wasn't thrilled about the closeness between Seal, 33, and Val Kilmer, 36, while they were filming "The Saint" — Crawford was dating Kilmer at the time — and that Crawford has told designers not to admit Seal to fashion shows when she's on the runway.

Seal, for her part, insists that her relationship with Kilmer has been strictly professional and that her marriage to filmmaker Davis Guggenheim is still intact.

Anyway, it's all in the past for Crawford. Seal seems to have resumed with old boyfriend Randy Gerber.

Q: I know that Sylvester Stallone has a new baby daughter. But doesn't he have other children? —W.S.

A: Indeed he does. Stallone, 50, has two sons from his first marriage, one of whom is following in dad's footsteps as an actor. Son Sage, 20, first co-starred with Stallone in "Rocky V" (1990) and will be featured again in "Daylight," the story of an emergency services chief who has to save drivers who become trapped in a tunnel between New York and New Jersey following an explosion.

Sage may share the screen but certainly not the paycheck — the elder Stallone received a reported \$17.5 million salary for this film.

Q: While watching the U.S. Open recently, I saw clips of one of the great tennis rivalries, Martina Navratilova and Chris Evert. Have they played each other since retiring? —L.L.

A: Absolutely. Even during the heat of their rivalry, Evert, 41, and Navratilova, 39, were good friends, and they have con-

tinued to be since both retired from the pro circuit.

Evert doesn't have as much time for tennis anymore. She devotes a lot of her time to her family, husband Andy Mill and their three sons, Alexander, 4, Nicholas, 2, and Colton Jack, who was born June 14.

But a friend of mine in Aspen recently saw the two former stars hitting a few balls back and forth. It was a friendly match; no winner was declared.

Q: I recently saw "The Net" on cable and thought that Jeremy Northam was terrific. What can you tell me about him? —A.P.

A: The 34-year-old English actor, who plays the charming villain in that film and the charming romantic hero in the critically praised "Emma," has a classical theater background. He has won rave onstage in productions with the Royal National Theatre and the Royal Shakespeare Company.

Over here, you might have seen him in small parts in the 1992 remake of "Wuthering Heights" and in "Carrington," in which his part was small but notable — he played the younger lover, Bernard Fenwick, and was mostly unseen. Heardam is currently filming "Mimic"

with Mira Sorvino.

You may not believe it from looking at him now, but Northam says he was quite a homey child. And, unlike the computer whiz in "The Net," he says he's hopeless with computers.

Q: Is George Clooney really going to shoot "Batman and Robin" and "ER" at the same time? —C.H.

A: That's the idea. But both are going to be filmed on the lot at Warner Brothers, so Clooney, 35, doesn't have far to go. He'll work four days a week on the movie, and the remaining three days on the television show.

When the movie debuts next week, audiences should expect a different interpretation of the role. As director Joel Schumacher explains, the previous occupant of the Batmobile, Val Kilmer, was a boy Batman; Clooney brings a different range and maturity.

"Beats," Schumacher says, "he looks great in the suit."

Q: I thought Newt Nease was wonderful in "Kin Cop." Can you tell me something about her? —S.K.

A: The 42-year-old actress is a Burbank, Calif., native who didn't find as beautiful growing up as she appears now. She was

tall and gangly and, at 10, had a serious medical condition, curvature of the spine, that required a body cast for four years.

Nease dropped out of high school in the 10th grade, but a few years later, she was at the top of an unopposed profession — modeling. When she was 17, an agent spotted her as a Rolling Stones concert.

She remained a top model for 12 years but, bored with it, retired and spent three years studying theology before moving into acting with her debut in "Major League" in 1989.

Since then, she's costarred with some of the biggest stars — Clint Eastwood in "In the Line of Fire," Dustin Hoffman in "Outbreak" and John Travolta in "Get Shorty" — but is known to be a down-to-earth, not particularly diva-y actress. She doesn't have to be like she keeps getting paid roles.

Next up is "Reason," in which she and Mel Gibson play parents whose son is kidnapped. K's director is Ron Howard, her former high school classmate upon whom, she has admitted, she once had a crush.

Nease and her screenwriter husband, Danny Gilroy, have a 3-year-old daughter, Rose.

Q: Are the Rolling Stones going on tour again? —D.R.

A: Not likely. For the time being, Mick Jagger, 53, is instead going to pursue his long-held interest in the movie business. Jagger, whose acting debut years ago in "Red Kelly" failed to lead to other roles, is becoming a producer — with a vengeance.

Among the projects being discussed is the love story "Tania," for which he's hoping to talk Antonio Banderas into playing revolutionary Che Guevara again (Banderas' first Che will be in the musical "Evita" opposite Madonna later this year); and the spy thriller "Eragon."

But Jagger is also appearing in a newsworld movie about the Stones in concert — "The Rolling Stones Rock and Roll Circus." The concert film, also featuring the Who, John Lennon and Eric Clapton, was filmed in 1968 but was never released. It is finally going to see the light of a projector's beam at the New York Film Festival in October. A more widespread release will probably follow.

Q: Is it true that Nancy Reagan is using the Secret Service men who are always provided for former presidents as escorts for her husband, so that she doesn't have to hire help for him? —L.F.

A: No. Nancy Reagan hired the former White House nurse to live with them, and she also employs a male attendant to care for her husband during the day. The Secret Service men chauffeur the ex-president around and also accompany him on the walks he takes daily, but those tasks are in their normal surveillance capacity.

The ex-presidential bear most prized by the Secret Service is guarding the Ford. They are known to be extremely nice people, and they shuttle between two very desirable locations, Palm Springs, Calif., and Val, Colo.

## Macht plays - and is - a doctor on TV

Unlike the actor who says, "I'm not a doctor, but I play one on TV," Stephen Macht not only plays a doctor on "One Life to Live," but he's entitled to be called Dr. Macht off camera as well.

Macht, who plays Dr. Elliot Durbin, a psychiatrist employed by the nefarious Carlo Hesser

(Thom Christopher) to hypnotize Viki (Erika Slezak) into eventually killing her son, Kevin, holds a Ph.D. in Dramatic Literature and Theory. He boasts a long list of theater, film, and episodic television credits that includes playing Sharon Gless' lover on "Cagney & Lacey." "OLTL," however, is his first venture into daytime drama — an experience he found "quite surprising."

Like many actors who come to the medium from stage, film and prime-time TV, Macht was surprised to find that "they do everything so well despite having so little time to do it ... I'm learning between the 12 and 15 pages of dialogue every day," Macht says.

And with so little time for rehearsal, "I've found that it's pretty much a stand-and-deliver operation. When it's time to do your scenes, you'd better be ready."

"There are roles such as Henry II in 'Lion in Winter,'" Macht said, "in which you're on stage most of the time, but you have four weeks rehearsal before the play goes."

Stephen Macht taught drama at Queens College in New York City from 1970 to 1975. "During that time I was building my career on Broadway and off-Broadway. Eventually, I got to Hollywood. I've been fortunate that I've been able to play some really wonderful characters — especially over the last five years. And I definitely

count Elliot Durbin as one of them.

"What I love about characters like Durbin," Macht says, "is that these people have problems that make them unable to care about where their lives are taking them. It's like the 'Dog Day Afternoon' character I played on a 'Kung Fu' episode. These people live in the moment. They do whatever it is they feel they want to do when they want to do it. If Durbin wants to gamble, he'll gamble. If he wants to form an attachment with a beautiful, intelligent woman like Viki, he'll do that. And he won't let anyone stop him. And I think that therein lies some conflict between Durbin and Hesser."

Macht likes to research the characters he plays. "There are some interesting books on psychiatry that provide some important insights," he says. "One that I've just finished reading is 'The Myths of the Repressed Memory,' which deals with false memories and allegations of past sexual abuse."

Stephen Macht is happy to be back in New York where "OLTL" is produced. "I'm having a great time seeing friends. I've known and worked with for years, such as Michael Moriarty. I also want to do more theater."

# Skip the Met Opera's mediocre 'Forza del Destino,' Wednesday on PBS

Today it's "family values"; in earlier centuries it was "family honor," usually invested in the virtue of wife, daughter or sister.

In both cases the result: ar. disasterous: the person so highly prized is done in by the principle upheld with so much pride.

Take a mediocre presentation of Verdi's "Forza del Destino" — the one slated for public television on Wednesday is a magnificent example of a mark miserably missed — and you're close to a parody of the parade of prejudice that masks as valence and virtue.

The Metropolitan Opera has made a song commitment to Verdi in its recent Texaco-sponsored telecasts. But this "Forza," taped in March 1996, a month after the premiere of the production, falls painfully below the standard set by the company in "Stiffelio" and "Simon Boccanegra," the most recent Verdi offerings telecast through the Lincoln Center house. (All three, by the way, plus last year's "Madama Butterfly," are the work of director, conductor Giancarlo del Monaco, son of Mario, the famous tenor of mid-century.)

"Forza," despite its unworldly work that presents a director with a host of challenges.

The title recalls the house of Atrous and the undoing wrought through generations by the curse hurled by the gods upon the head of Agamemnon. For the Greeks, however, fate was truly an inexorable force

against which all human striving was in vain.

Verdi's Calatravas — the Marquis father, daughter Leonora and brother Carlo — re-vested in the slopes Olympus. Their obsession with honor speaks more of self-willed self-destruction than of mysterious machinations of fate. Only a hard-driven and passionate performance lets the listener overlook the personal pettiness that makes this plot a partner to parody.

And in this case that quality comes only from conductor James Levine, working closely — as he has done for a quarter century — with the magnificent Met orchestra.

Despite some respectable singing, no one on stage is totally with the maestro in this performance.

In the twilight of his 50s, Placido Domingo — fighting the fate of a half-breed Incan prince incognito — is growing a bit old for an Alvaro subject to the close-ups of the television camera.

He's the same wonderfully intelligent, perceptive and gentlemanly tenor that he has long been, but it's only in the one-on-one death-bed exchange with Vladimir Chernov (Carlo) that he achieves the dramatic intensity demanded by this opera.

And Chernov, so magnificent as Boccacagna, also disappoints. Like almost everyone in the cast, he seems ill at ease in his role; only in intimate and milder moments is he recognizable as one of the great baritones of the day.

Sharon Sweet (as one character — the premiere noted) hardly lives up to her name as the uncertain, tormented Leonora: Taken as an oratorio aria, her "Pace, pace, mio Dio" is a pearl of vocal prize, but it speaks little of dramatic involvement in the opera at hand.

And as the fortune-telling gypsy Preziosola, Gloria Scalchi suggests a Carmen having fumbled her way on the wrong stage.

If the blame for the many shortcomings of this "Forza" is to be assigned to one person (and doesn't it search for such a point of origin in confronting fate), it's decidedly del Monaco who is the fall guy.

Famous in Europe for his salary as artistic director of the Bonn opera (the figure suggested Alberich reborn with an eye on the Rhine gold), the Italian director has shocked and stimulated Germans with a "Butterfly" set in Saigon (long before Broadway got the idea) and a "Forza" fought out

between the hostile forces of the Spanish civil war.

In New York, however, where opera exists without the huge government subsidies known in Europe, a director must serve up more sober stuff that can survive on stage season after season.

Perhaps del Monaco has tried too hard to be tame in this production. (In last year's "Butterfly," for example, he dared to have Pinkerton rip the clothes off his bride at the end of Act I brought forth "boos" from Licia Albanese, perhaps the most famous portrayer of this role in the Mer's history.)

Sets as dull as they are dark underscore the listlessness of this endeavor; the realism of Michael Scott's decor is near-photographic in its realism.

Verdi might well have chuffed off some thing too big for his bite in "Forza," and del Monaco lacks the metaphoric choppers needed as an aid to digestion this high-protein product.

In an interview with a Detroit writer, Met general manager Joseph Volpe called this production "a disaster." One wonders at the decision to subject an entire nation to it via television.

Better times can be hoped for from the Met, when last year's new "Così fan tutte" is televised Dec. 30.

# Fox's new Monday offerings are tasteless and dull

All lip, no style. The heroines of Fox's new sitcoms "Party Girl" and "Lush Life" talk a lot about sex, work and fashion. But nothing they're saying is particularly engaging or humorous. Chastity belt jokes, anyone?

Fox should have sent both mind-numbing sitcoms, which debut Monday, back for rewrites. Other networks have demanded fixes on new series this season, the most fluid in memory.

Fox, for instance, has changed the title of "L.A. Firefighters" to "Fire Co. 132" and penciled in a Nov. 10 return for the drama, which flopped this summer.

CBS has postponed "Ink," the Ted Danson comedy, to Oct. 21, in its place, Rhea Perlman's "Pearl" will get a five-week run at 8:30 p.m. Mondays starting Sept. 16. "Pearl" also will air in its regular slot, at 8:30 p.m. Wednesdays, once on Sept. 18 and settle into that time period on Oct. 23.

CBS hasn't announced premiere dates for "Public Morals" and "EZ Streets." The fledgling networks, UPN and The WB, rushed on new series to get a jump on the Big Four, even though most of those programs weren't ready for prime time.

It's impossible to draw any conclusions about how good the coming season will be. TV critics are still receiving revised versions of new series. One of the most ballyhooed, NBC's "Suddenly Susan" with Brooke Shields, seems markedly worse after all the fussing.

Some "fall season" it is, with premieres sprawling from June to November. It should quickly be apparent to

viewers that things are askew this year. Desperate networks yield desperate shows.

One such show is "Party Girl," debuting at 9 p.m. Monday. It underwent a major revision when it added Swoosie Kurtz ("Sisters") as boss and godmother to the title character. In her thoughtless role as Judy, Kurtz has to pant about touching books, whine about her bad luck and chew out irresponsible "party girl" Mary (Christine Taylor, Marcia-Marcia-Marcia of "The Brady Bunch" movies).

Mary decides to curb her wild ways and clerk at Judy's library. But first Mary has to stop hiding books in the bathroom and prove her worth.

To that end, she breaks into the library at night with two pals and learns the Dewey Decimal System in a ridiculous sequence that unfolds like a music video.

The opening credits pay homage to "Breakfast at Tiffany's," and Taylor has a fetching style. Yet for a show that makes such a big fuss about fashion, the premises and dialogue are threadbare.

The stereotyped characters include a doofus bartender, a snippy co-worker who rats on Mary and a flamboyant-

ly urges Mary, "Think of a library as a great walk-in closet."

In the first show, Mary wins patrons by turning the library into a disco. In the second, with Lucy Ricardo-style antics, Mary wins the library an important exhibition but disgraces herself by trying on a chastity belt she can't remove. What to do? Throw a fashion show, of course. Do you detect a painfully trite trend here?

The dialogue dips low. Rhysopadding about the feel and smell of books in man-hungry terms, godmother Judy says, "I love books."

Mary's comeback: "Me too. I just don't feel them up."

If we lucky, "Party Girl" will move a few viewers to turn off their sets and pick up books.

"Lush Life" is a bit worse, because it has no appealing characters. Dippy Georgette "George" Sanders (the charmless Lori Petty)

blathers on about her artwork and sexual conquests. Lifelong friend Margot Hines (Karyn Parsons of "The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air") whines about her unfaithful husband and her Italian synthetic hair.

They are surrounded by types, not characters: a flamboyantly gay bartender who calls himself Margarita, a hunky neighbor who flirts with Margot, a tense band member unsure of him-

self.
