Idahoans aim to block monuments

WASHINGTON — The Idaho congressional delegation Thursday introduced a bill to bar a president from creating new national monuments on Idaho land.

Expressing outrage at President Clinton's creation of a national monument on 17 million acres of Utah land the previous day, Idaho lawmakers sought the limelight with a proposal to block anything similar from happening in Idaho without an act of Congress.

"We will not allow to happen in Idaho what happened in Utah," Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, told reporters, saying

'No Utah here,' delegation declares in seeking OK for future preserves

Western officials were "shellshocked" by the way Clinton abruptly ended debate over coal mining on the Utah land by invoking a 1906 law to halt development.

Thursday's announcement comes as Congress hustles through numerous annual spending bills, with the hopes of adjourning next week to begin campaign season full-throttle.

Critics of the bill, called the Idaho Land Protection Act, saw Thursday's

announcement as just another attempt to cloak a pro-development initiative in pro-environment language.

"Calling this a land protection act is an absurdity," said John McCarthy, conservation director of the Idaho Conservation League. "Sen. Craig can't point to one river, one forest, or one canyon that he has tried to protect."

What's next

The Idaho delegation's bill appears to have only a slim chance of passing this year. The bill could be attached to House and Senate budget measures, but that would require the approval of the Republican leadership.

Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument has engendered a storm of opposition from Western Republicans. The new site instantly became the nation's largest national monument, and the first one to operate under Bureau of Land Management jurisdiction. In 1995, Please see LAND, Page A2

Restaurant fields calls, seats patrons

Hepatitis A case generates concern

TWIN FALLS — During its first four hours of business Thursday, Sodbuster Restaurant had received more than two dozen telephone calls from customers worried about possible exposure to hepatitis A.

"We'd be glad to talk to anyone. We're telling people honestly what happened," owner Gloria Palmer said. "They just want to know if it affected them."

Meanwhile, the South Central District Health Department had received hundreds of telephone calls from concerned people.

A cook at Sodbuster was diagnosed with hepatitis A Wednesday. As required by law, the worker's doctor reported the case to the health district, said Maggi Machala, public health nurse. The worker's name was not released.

"It has nothing to do with the cleanliness of the restaurant," Machala said.

But as a precaution, the health department is urging customers who ate at Sodbuster during the cook's shift to receive an immune globulin shot to prevent the illness or watch for symptoms.

Although the cook prepared hot meals and did not work in the bakery, he helped clean the pipes during his shift, so the health department is erring on the side of safety, Machala said.

However, if you purchased whole pies, there should be no problem.

Hepatitis shots available

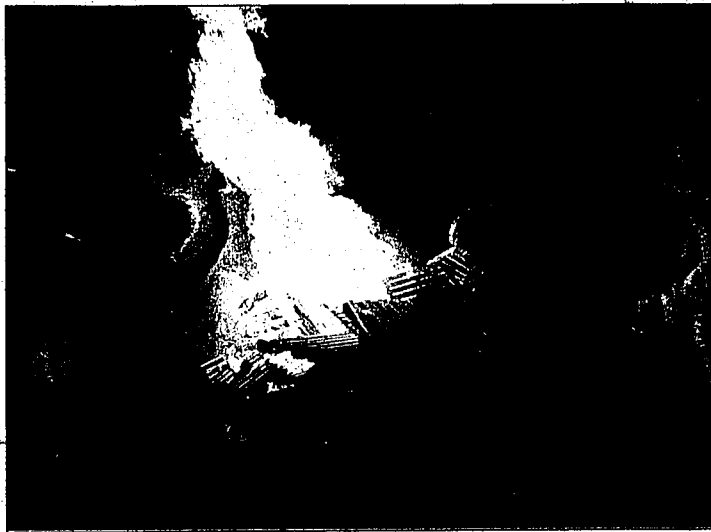
A person who ate a meal at the Sodbuster Restaurant between 8 a.m. to midnight on Sept. 8 to 9 and Sept. 13 may have been exposed to hepatitis A and should receive an immune globulin shot, which may be an effective prevention within 14 days of exposure.

☐ The shots will be offered today from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Health District office, 324 Second St. East in Twin Falls. The cost is \$110 to \$140, but no one will be turned away because of inability to pay.

☐ People who ate at Sodbuster on Aug. 23 to Aug. 26, Aug. 30 and 31 and Sept. 1 also may have been exposed, but the shot may not help.

House overrides late-term abortion ban veto but Senate support appears lacking

Issue will simmer through campaign

WASHINGTON — Scoring a big win for anti-abortion forces, the House voted Thursday to override President Clinton's veto of a bill that bans a form of late-term abortion.

But the Senate seemed very unlikely to follow suit.

The apparent lack of sufficient support there makes it unlikely that the attempt to overturn the veto of the so-called partial-birth abortion bill will succeed.

However, the House vote sent a message that the issue will not be ignored in the presidential campaign.

Republican presidential nominee Bob Dole has campaigned actively on the issue. He said Thursday that as more Americans become aware of the "horrible" practice, "the president has been left almost alone, defending the indefensible."

When Clinton vetoed the bill in April, surrounded by five women who had undergone the procedure, he criticized the legislation by saying it "does not allow women to protect themselves from serious threats to their health."

The 285-137 vote was four more than the two-thirds needed for an override in the House.

Seventy Democrats joined 215 Republicans to support revival of the bill, which would ban a procedure — generally performed in the third trimester — in which the fetus is partly delivered before being killed.

If enacted into law, the ban would mark the first time Congress has made illegal a specific abortion procedure since the Supreme Court ruled in 1973 that a woman has the right to an abortion.

Supporters of the ban emphasized with pictures and speeches the gruesomeness of the procedure but anti-abortion lawmakers also contended that the issue went well beyond such abortions, which are relatively rare.

"Our moment in history is marked by moral conflict between a culture of death and a culture of life, and today here and now, we must choose sides," said House Judiciary Committee Chairman Henry Hyde, R-Ill.

"It's a frontal attempt on Roe vs. Wade, plain and simple," said Rep. Carolyn Maloney, D-N.Y., who supports abortion rights.

Equal opportunity jail offers chain gang for females

Some inmates like chance to get out

PHOENIX — Calling himself an equal opportunity incarcerator, America's toughest sheriff put the nation's first female chain gang to work Thursday — picking up trash and cutting weeds along downtown streets.

Stacked at the ankles in groups of five, 15 women wearing bright orange jumpsuits and caps attracted a horde of reporters and the honking horns of passing motorists as they worked in the morning sun.

"I don't believe in discrimination in my jail system. Crime knows no gender and neither should punishment,"

Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio said above the din of morning rush-hour traffic.

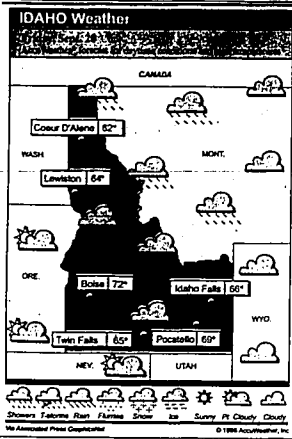
Critics said it was another publicity stunt for Arpaio, who gave Republican presidential candidate Bob Dole a tour of the county's "tent city" jail complex Tuesday.

"It was a circus," said Donna Ham, spokeswoman for the prisoner rights advocacy group Middle Ground, which protested along the chain-gang route. "We're all for inmates working on legitimate community work projects, but this was a zoo."

"These were not dangerous criminals. They did not have to be chained to pick up cigarette butts and bag up some weeds. They did not have to be guarded with high-powered rifles. It was all a big show to make people look down at these

Craig was among the sponsors of a bill to transfer BLM lands to the state.
A House staffer who works for Alaska GOP Rep. Don Young, chairman of the House Resources Committee, said federal officials had discussed creating a national monument in Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, which many Alaskans hope to open to oil exploration.
"We let the word out that you can call it a 'national monument' or you could call it the 'Statue of Liberty', but Congress would overturn it," he said.
Idaho's delegation has pushed several bills to protect state's rights and individual property rights under federal environmental regulation.
Rep. Helen Chenoweth, R-Idaho, has proposed a House bill to allow private owners to appeal any Endangered Species Act regulations that could limit the use of their land.

poor people."
The women did not seem to mind.
"Jail life is boring. It's dehumanizing," said Rebecca Lopez, 28, who is serving a three-month sentence for a parole violation. "But this chain gang isn't too bad. At least it gets you back into the outside world for a couple hours a day."
Several cities and towns across America have used female prisoners for street cleanup crews before, but Arpaio said he is the first to use female chain gangs.
The women, serving time for prostitution, drug possession, aggravated assault and other crimes, all volunteered for the chain gang. They are among 50 women in 23-hour-a-day lockdown for disciplinary reasons.
They can get out of lockdown by working six days a week for one month on the chain gang.
"I'll do anything to get out of jail," said Ernestine White, 33, as she wiped her brow. "I just started serving an eight-month jail sentence for a year. I want to get out. I have a 9-year-old daughter I can't even hug and kiss anymore."
Arpaio said the prisoners were "convicted criminals and escape risks" and needed to be guarded by a detention officer and an armed volunteer from one of the "I don't want them out in the desert chopping rocks. I want them out in the open where everybody can see them and show people that this could happen to them if they commit a crime," Arpaio said.
"This might get publicity, but it is not a stunt. I'm doing what I was elected to do — get tough on crime. I want inmates to hate jail so much they'll never come back. That's why I'm known as America's toughest sheriff."
Since taking office in 1993, Arpaio has banned coffee and smoking, dirty magazines and R-rated movies from the county's jail system. He's made headlines for making inmates wear pink underwear to keep the garments from being stolen.

Pentagon warns 5,000 about gas effects

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon is warning 5,000 Persian Gulf War veterans that they may have been exposed to nerve gas when U.S. troops destroyed an Iraqi weapons depot in 1991.
A spokesman said the number could grow.
The 5,000 figure is far higher than the number of soldiers officials said they were trying to con-

The complete text of Thursday's bill introduced in the Senate by Craig and Sen. Dirk Kempthorne, and in the House by Rep. Mike Crapo and Chenoweth runs to only one sentence.
"No extension or establishment of a national monument may be undertaken in Idaho after the date of enactment of this Act without full public participation and an express Act of Congress," the bill says.

demolition. Earlier this month, investigators for a presidential advisory panel said they believed as many as 1,100 U.S. troops were exposed to that incident.
However, an announcement Thursday described a second low-level exposure on March 10, 1991. Members of the 37th destroyed an unknown number of chemical rockets found in stacks of chemical munitions.

48-hour-care bill nearer passage

WASHINGTON (AP) — Moving to relieve some fears of expectant mothers, key House and Senate lawmakers agreed Thursday to require health insurers to pay for at least 48-hour hospital stays for mothers and their newborns.
Congress was expected to send the measure to President Clinton next week. He has made it an election-year cause, saying some babies sent home early had died.
Negotiators also agreed on a provision reducing insurance discrimination against mental ailments. Both provisions, which would take effect Jan. 1, 1998, were added to unrelated legislation providing \$84 billion in fiscal 1997 for veterans, space, environmental and housing programs.
Also included was a third provision, effective Oct. 1, 1997, that would extend benefits to Vietnam War veterans exposed to Agent Orange whose children suffer from the birth defect spina bifida.
The agreements came as Republicans rushed to finish needed spending legislation by the end of the month and avoid any chances of a battle with the Clinton administration that would cause a new federal shutdown.

"Palmer did not know how many people might have been exposed because some customers came in only for coffee. The cook, a college student, was sent home Sept. 13 because he was ill, but was not the only cook that night, she said. On Sept. 6 to 8, he was the only cook on the shift.
"We know how to handle it. That's why I'm in the building and not going to be in the building. He needs to get his health back," Palmer said.
Managers wouldn't comment on the cook's work status.
Palmer and husband, Carl, have been in the restaurant business for 32 years and have owned the Sodbuster for 11 years. She says business did not drop off Thursday because of the announcement.
"We are still seeing customers come in. We have a lot of regulars and they know this is an isolated event. It's not something we meant for this to happen," she said.
Hepatitis A is an infection of the liver caused by a virus in the intestines of an infected person.
If a person doesn't wash his or her hands after using the toilet, the virus may be spread by direct contact or by consuming food or drink handled by an infected person.
The illness has a four-week incubation period.
Early symptoms include loss of appetite, nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain and aches. Later symptoms include jaundice, or yellowing of the skin and eyes, dark-colored urine or light-colored stool.
Some hepatitis victims have mild flu-like symptoms; other victims require hospitalization.
The best prevention is hand washing after using the toilet or changing a diaper.
Restaurant workers who handle prepared foods that require no further cooking, such as lettuce or bread, are required to wear gloves, said Dan Bur, health department environmental director. If food is to be heated, gloves are not required because cooking kills bacteria.
"It's not known if the Sodbuster cooks wore gloves, Kruz said.
"We didn't feel we could take any chances," he added.
Health inspectors visited Sodbuster the first week of September to follow up on a previous violation and found problems had been corrected, Kruz said.

Dole urges media to help on drugs

DENVER (AP) — Bob Dole called on the news media Thursday to give more coverage to drug abuse and pay less attention to polls.

"The presidential race will be 'right down to the wire,' the Republican nominee asserted.

"The bottom line is we're going to win the election," Dole said.

He also trumpeted Nancy Reagan's support for his new anti-drug slogan in plugging his law-and-order theme one day after taking a startling tumble from a campaign stage in California.

Speaking to the Associated Press Managing Editors Association, Dole joked, "If they're waiting for a replay, it's not going to happen."

Earlier, the 73-year-old Dole was asked what he thought public reaction should be to his fall. "They ought to think, 'Boy, that guy's agile. He's young. He goes after 'em. He's tough.'"

Taking questions from editors, Dole asserted that polls have begun turning his way, even though they still show him trailing President Clinton.

"Don't worry about all those polls ...," Dole said. "It will be down to the wire, unless we break it open here."

"I think our criticism is getting out," he added.

Dole also pressed his criticism of Clinton for what Dole has portrayed as a lax anti-drug program and a casual attitude toward narcotics.

"Our administration will be anything but casual about drug use," he said.

Asked if a campaign ad appealing to blame Clinton for a rise in heroin use was fair, Dole said, "I think the ad is fair." He added that the ad was based on statistics put out by the Clinton administration.

"They're running ads, too — \$95 million versus \$28 million," Dole said. "I'm lucky to be in town, let alone in the game."

Dole also answered Democratic criticism that he voted against legislation in 1982 that established the

office of the White House drug czar. "We didn't need a drug czar in 1982. We had Ronald Reagan in the White House," he said.

Dole ridiculed Clinton for saying the war on drugs shouldn't be a partisan issue while making political points on other matters such as Medicare, Medicaid and the environment.

"You can't have it both ways, Mr. President," he said.

And he scolded Clinton once more on the drug issue: "The

actions of the president and the government he leads must convey the message that drugs and violent crime are morally repugnant in a great society."

A day after criticizing the entertainment industry for glorifying drug use in music and movies, Dole tailored his message to his audience of editors, urging them to dedicate more newspaper space to the issue.

He cited statistics from the Center for Media and Public Affairs showing that TV network news programs included 101 stories about drugs last year, down from 518 in 1989 at the height of the "drug war." The number bottomed out in 1992, at 45, and has increased marginally each year since.

On Wednesday, Dole announced that he would make "Just Don't Do It," his anti-drug slogan and promised to make it as well known as the "Just Say No" campaign launched by Mrs. Reagan during her husband's presidency.

Dole's campaign released a letter from Mrs. Reagan in which she wrote: "I am so glad you unveiled a new and powerful message in the tradition of 'Just Say No' to reach a new generation of young people. 'Just Don't Do It' will be a tremendous rallying cry."

Dole also continued to use humor to dismiss Wednesday's nasty tumble.

"We're reaching out," he told the press. "We're going to fight for every vote. That's what I'm doing yesterday in Chico, reaching out for a voter."

Nike unhappy with Dole's 'Just Don't Do It' campaign

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Nike to Bob Dole: Just be original.

The athlete shoe giant is not pleased with Dole's "Just Don't Do It" anti-drug slogan, which borrows from Nike's "Just Do It" ad campaign.

"That phrase is cemented in consumers' minds as a rallying cry of the couch and play sports," Nike spokesman Jim Small said Thursday. "We're a sports and fitness company and we're uncomfortable about being brought into the political arena."

"This is an important anti-drug message I think Nike would support."

ing the young crowd to chant it with him.

Christina Martin, spokeswoman for the Dole campaign, characterized the slogan as a slight modification of Nancy Reagan's "Just Say No," from the 1980s.

"Bob Dole has unveiled a very simple, very direct and very hard-hitting message aimed at America's teens," Martin said. "He's said it many times over in conversation. When it comes to drugs, just don't do it."

"This is an important anti-drug message I think Nike would support."

But Nike said this type of imitation is not flattering.

"While we support the senator's goal of keeping kids away from drugs," Small said, "our slogan is based in sports and we would have preferred him to use a slogan that is more relevant to this issue."

"Just Do It" is a registered trademark that's been in use since 1988, but Nike's lawyers said there is nothing that can be done to stop Dole because he's not using the words for commercial purposes, Small said.

A Dole campaign aide telephoned Nike's Washington, D.C.,

office on Monday to inform the company that it does not ask its permission — of the plans to use the "Just Don't Do It" slogan.

"Technically," Small said, "they didn't need to."

The Dole camp recently started singing a different tune after the music company that owns the rhythm and blues hit "Soul Man" got offended by the campaign's use of the refrain "I'm a Music man ..."

After Ronald Dole International Inc. demanded up to \$100,000 per use, the campaign stopped playing its version of the song at rallies.

Republicans accuse drug czar of Washington, D.C.,

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans accused White House drug czar Barry McCaffrey of suppressing a Pentagon-commissioned report that found the Clinton administration's drug policy.

At a House subcommittee hearing Thursday, GOP lawmakers for the first time directly criticized the former Army general, whose appointment by President Clinton earlier this year to head the Office of National Drug Control Policy was praised by members of both parties.

The criticism came five days before McCaffrey was to convene with Clinton to the United Nations for an address on drugs by the president.

Rep. John Mica, R-Fla., grilled McCaffrey about a think tank report requested by Defense Secretary William Perry. The report, Mica said, concluded that the administration's emphasis on treating cocaine addiction and other drug problems had been ineffective and that interdiction efforts would have been more cost-effective.

"Personally, I found those conclusions to be utter nonsense," McCaffrey responded, his voice rising in a rare moment of pique. He said he interpreted the report as "an apology for putting increased machinery" in the Caribbean for seizing drug shipments.

McCaffrey said he asked several

other independent experts to review the study, and they "almost dismissed (it) out of hand."

While he acknowledged that the report, completed in March, has not been released, McCaffrey denied that he ordered Coast Guard Commandant Adm. Robert Krampek, the national interdiction coordinator, to suppress it.

"I don't issue directives to Krampek," McCaffrey said. Krampek, asked after the hearing whether McCaffrey had pressured him about the report, said, "Unquestionably, no. He didn't do that."

Krampek said he agreed with McCaffrey at the time that the report shouldn't be released because the data needed to be ver-

ified by other analysts. Spokesmen for the Defense Department and the Institute for Defense Studies, which compiled the report, had no immediate comment on the matter.

But after the hearing, Mica said: "The report was suppressed and I believe that McCaffrey ... buried the report. It's a blot on his record and they didn't want the public or the Congress to learn about it."

Pennsylvania Rep. William Clinger, the Republican chairman of the House Government Reform and Oversight Committee, told the hearing before one of the panel's subcommittees that the administration is "a Johnny-come-lately to this crusade" against heroin.

Navajo president reminds Clinton of his pledge

GRAND CANYON NATIONAL PARK, Ariz. (AP) — A presidential meeting has produced a renewed pledge.

Navajo Nation President Albert Hale was at hand Wednesday as President Clinton began shaking hands among spectators after designating a 1.7 million-acre chunk of Utah wildlands a national monument.

Hale reminded Clinton that First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton had promised during the presidential campaign four years ago that Clinton would visit the reservation if elected.

"We're still waiting," Hale said later. "He said he remembers that promise and will fulfill it."

Dole's spending cuts would test lawmakers, reshape government

WASHINGTON (AP) — The dramatic economic plan dominating Bob Dole's presidential campaign relies on spending cuts that would reshape government — and exceed anything today's Republican-controlled Congress has shown a willingness to do.

Dole proposes cutting taxes by \$56.8 billion and balancing the budget by 2002.

Like many campaign-season proposals by White House hopefuls, his description of how he would pay for it is too ambiguous to conclude precisely what the effects would be.

Clearly, however, it would involve even more savings from benefit programs than the divided Republicans put in their own six-year budget in June — though Dole has exempted Social Security, Medicare, and veterans' and military retirees' benefits from cuts exceeding that plan.

Including inflation's effects, the plan would leave air traffic control, national parks and hundreds of other domestic programs competing for a pot of money at least 30 percent smaller in 2002 than it is today, according to AP calculations using campaign information and inflation estimates by the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office.

Indeed, the proposal is so far-reaching that an array of budget experts said they doubted the reductions would occur because of the political risk of forcing such changes to government's role.

"You are talking about changing government radically," said Randolph Penner, the Republican-appointed chief of the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office from 1983 to 1987, who is now an economic consultant.

"The cuts would just be too painful," said Robert Dereder, a former Reagan administration official who is also a consultant. Dereder predicted Dole would ultimately change his proposed mix of savings "or probably the tax cuts become smaller."

Dole's proposed cuts have their

defenders, chiefly Republicans and conservative economists.

They say the GOP Congress has already achieved savings in welfare, agriculture and many domestic programs, and that Dole would need savings just 6 percent deeper than the Republican balanced-budget outline Congress endorsed in June.

"How can you not be able to do that with a budget this size," said John Taylor, a Stanford University economics professor and adviser to President Bush who helped write Dole's plan.

"They don't frighten me. They're doable," House Appropriations Committee Chairman Bob Livingston, R-La., said of the cuts.

Dole would start with a GOP-written budget-balancing outline that narrowly passed Congress in June after Republicans fought among themselves over its spending reductions. That non-binding blueprint — opposed by President Clinton and most Democrats — envisioned six-year savings exceeding \$500 billion from Medicare, Medicaid and other domestic programs. It seemed as far as GOP conservatives and moderates could agree to go.

But Dole's plan goes further. It would be financed, in part, with an additional \$217 billion over six years from vaguely described spending cuts, tax loophole closures, asset sales and other steps.

Not everything is on the chopping block for the further cuts. In an ever-growing list, Dole has exempted Social Security, Medicare, defense, interest payments on the debt, veterans' and military retirees' benefits and New Mexico's two nuclear research labo-

raries from additional reductions.

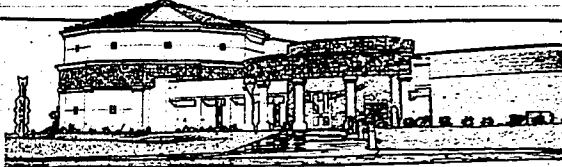
Thus, 70 percent of the budget would be shielded.

Dole's campaign has issued two documents describing where the extra \$217 billion in savings would

come from. But the documents have left budget analysts scratching their heads.

A paper released Aug. 23 says \$110 billion would come from cuts

in so-called non-defense discretionary programs. These are annually approved programs — from space shuttle launches to biomedical research — excluding automatically paid benefits such as Social Security.

'It's good to be back': Astronaut hauls luggage to U. S. spaceship

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Saying "it's good to be back" on a U.S. spaceship, astronaut Shannon Lucid hauled her baggage from the Russian Mir station and settled in aboard the shuttle Atlantis, her ride home after a record-breaking six months in orbit.

Back on Earth, church, business and women's groups and universities

already are clamoring to hear from the woman who cheerfully shattered space endurance records.

A total of 181 days into her flight, with just seven more to go, she was almost giddy with excitement.

"We don't typically grade people, but if we were going to, I'd give Shannon an A-plus," said Frank

Culbertson, director of NASA's shuttle-Mir program.

The 53-year-old astronaut-scientist, who has spent more time in space than any other woman and any other American, refused to take the day off or even slow down. She helped her eight fellow space travelers move food, clothing and other supplies from one

docked spacecraft to the other.

"She's probably the most strongly motivated to bring the bags that she has over to the shuttle, so I doubt she's going to wait on anybody else to get to them," Culbertson said.

"But she's always been that way on orbit and she's always been that way on previous shuttle flights, where she

pitched right in to do her part, and more. It's hard to keep up with Shannon sometimes."

Lucid became an official member of the Atlantis crew, and Atlantis astronaut John Blaha assumed her place on Mir, eight hours after the shuttle pulled up at the Russian space station Wednesday night 240 miles above Earth.

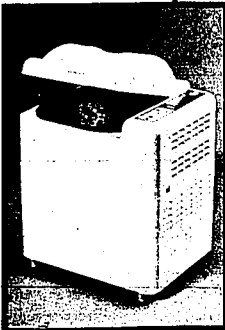

TV shows make another descent into the gutter

As surely as autumn brings a falling of leaves, so does it bring another plunge into televised tawdriness. Whenever you naively think television has sunk as far into sleaze as it possibly can, a new season arrives to set you straight.

A quarter-century ago, comedian George Carlin shocked and amused America with his routine about "The Seven Words You Can't Say on TV." This season, you can hear some of those once-taboo words during prime time - on shows you might be tempted to let your children watch.

Potty language is the least of TV's new assaults on the family viewing. The reason? Ratings. Between cable, satellite dishes and home video, viewers have more choices than ever. Only 65 percent of Nielsen homes were tuned to network TV last year.

Panic is prompting the networks to "push the envelope." That's the current buzz phrase for the getting nastier than the competition. It explains why we see sordidly kinky dramas such as "Millennium," in which a gay hustler has his eyes and mouth sewn shut and is buried alive with a stripper's severed head.

The same panic yields sitcoms in

which amoral characters blandly trade sexual innuendo. One new "family" show features a teen-age boy's lust for his stepister. The ironically named "Public Morals" displays a New York vice squad's wacky adventures in the skin trade.

At least one show, "Men Behaving Badly," has an absolutely truthful label. (One character uses soiled jockey shorts as a coffee filter.) The show's title prompts obvious questions: Doesn't TV already show enough men and women behaving badly? How about showing some examples of people behaving decently?

CBS is making a token attempt. "Touched Land," a spin-off of "Promised By An Angel," celebrates patriotism and family. But this stray dollop of virtue does little to soften the viciousness lurking throughout the schedule.

Despite public scoldings by the likes of Bob Dole and William Bennett, popular culture in the '90s is a race toward the sewers.

Perhaps things will get better. They're more likely to get worse. Meanwhile, parents beware. That seductive device in your living room is poisonous.

Desert Storm spreads plague
A plague is breaking out in America and in 27 countries which were involved in the Desert Storm war in 1990 and 1991.

Germ warfare was used by Saddam Hussein against the American and alliance troops in that war. Biological weapons were illegally manufactured in America and illegally sold to Iraq from 1985-90.

These biologicals were unleashed via Iraqi SCUD missile attacks.

Gulf War illness is a communicable, moderately contagious and potentially lethal disease, resulting from a laboratory modified germ warfare agent called mycoplasma fermentans (incognitus).

It is a biological which contains most of the human immunodeficiency virus envelope gene. It spreads far more easily than AIDS by sex, by casual contact, through perspiration or by being close to someone who coughs.

Drs. Garth and Nancy Nicholson, who have isolated the microorganism, say that it is airborne and moderately contagious.

Some of our troops died quickly from intense exposure to chemical and biological weapons, but most received low-level doses and returned home with the disease. It is now estimated that 100,000 to 200,000 of the 700,000 troops we sent to Desert Storm are now sick and/or dying with Gulf War illness and that 15,000 have died from the disease.

Furthermore, tens of thousands of wives, children and other family members are now contracting the disease from the veterans, and thousands of deformed babies are being born to these veterans like the thalidomide babies of the 1950s. (See the Nov. 1995 Life magazine special: The Tiny Victims of Desert Storm.)

Meanwhile, the U.S. government, which helped create the biological weapons, still deny that any biological agents were used in the Gulf War, flatly

denies the existence of Gulf War illness and is flatly denying medical treatment to several hundred thousand sick or dying Desert Storm veterans, spouses or their children.

Sen. Donald Riegle, D-Mich., said, "The veterans of the Gulf War have asked us for nothing more than the assistance they have earned."

It is past time to treat the Gulf War illness and expose the deadly nature of this disease and those who have provided the treasonous cover-up.

Please contact our elected officials to hold hearings to expose the truth and save innocent lives. These lives could be our own!

Yeltsin promises to transfer nuclear control

MOSCOW — Boris Yeltsin promised Thursday to transfer his full powers, including control over Russia's vast nuclear arsenal, to Prime Minister Viktor Chernomyrdin for the period of his heart surgery. Yeltsin's decree put an end to persistent speculation about who would be in charge during his absence. Chernomyrdin will enjoy Yeltsin's powers "to the full extent, including the authority to control the strategic nuclear forces and tactical nuclear weapons, for which purpose he will be given the corresponding technical means (nuclear button)," said the document. Yeltsin said he would issue another decree specifying when Chernomyrdin will take control.

Serbs abandon struggle for secession

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina — In a major concession, the ultranationalist Serb who will share power with Muslim President Alija Izetbegovic said Thursday his camp had abandoned the struggle for secession from Bosnia. One of the most fervent fighters for an independent Bosnian Serb state, Momcilo Krajsnik told reporters that postwar realities meant giving up that vision for now. "Utopia has cost us both too much blood," he said of Bosnia's 3 1/2-year war that left 200,000 people dead or missing before ending last year with the Dayton peace agreement. "Our wish (to separate) will always stay," Krajsnik said. "But if we are not realistic, we have no future."

Japan appears headed for general election

TOKYO — Japan appeared headed for general elections on Oct. 20 after its governing coalition agreed Thursday to let Prime Minister Ryutaro Hashimoto call an early vote. Hashimoto has not said so publicly, but he is widely reported to favor Oct. 20 rather than some later date because poll ratings for his Liberal Democratic Party have received a boost from a recent compromise over reducing U.S. military bases on Okinawa. The Liberal Democrats now govern in a coalition with two smaller parties, but would like to strengthen their own hand. The election will select the 500 members of Parliament's lower house, which chooses the prime minister.

7 North Koreans shot dead

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — With trained dogs, night-vision goggles and sophisticated tracking equipment, thousands of South Korean troops prowled the heavily forested eastern mountains Thursday in search of North Korean agents. They found seven. All were shot and killed in three separate shootouts, the Defense Ministry reported.

That brought to 18 the number of intruders killed since a North Korean submarine was found stranded off Kangnung on South Korea's east coast early Wednesday. One other North Korean was captured, and at least one more was believed hiding in rugged terrain. The infiltration has heightened North Korea's deepening economic woes and recent gestures of openness, it still has not abandoned its goal of communicating the problem to the West. North Korea has not commented on the latest incursion, the 14th reported since 1990. Nor has it ever acknowledged past infiltrations. It also refused to receive a protest letter Thursday from the American-led U.N. Command, which oversees the fragile cease-fire from the 1950-53 Korean War.

Canada cuts broadcast budget

TORONTO (AP) — Battling to survive drastic budget cuts, the Canadian Broadcasting Corp. said Thursday it will eliminate 2,500 jobs, drop all U.S.-made programs and air commercials for the first time on its national newscast. Confronted with government-ordered budget cuts, the 60-year-old public broadcaster announced that spending would be slashed for almost every part of its radio and TV operations. "The figure is drastic, but it's unavoidable," said CBC President Perrin Beatty. "We now have a plan in place to bring the CBC into the next century."

The Buhl Rescue unit arrived shortly after the deputy and transferred Bean to a Magic Valley Regional Medical Center ambulance.

Activists to bring replica of shipping cask to Halley

HAILEY - Anti-nuclear activists are bringing a replica of a nuclear waste shipping cask to town today as part of their campaign against Gov. Phil Bunt's agreement with Union-Carbide. The cask is a full-sized replica of a highway cask - 18 feet long, eight feet high, six feet wide - that rides on its own flatbed truck. The object is to call attention to the dangers of shipping nuclear waste on highways and railroads through small town, says Steve Hopkins, who will pilot the cask. The cask tour is part of the Stop the Shipments - Yes on 3 campaign to overturn Bunt's agreement. The agreement with the federal government accepts 1,133 shipments of nuclear waste for storage in Idaho in exchange for a court-ordered promise to clean up the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory and move most waste out of the state within 40 years.

Jerome City Council covered variety of problems

JEROME - Jerome's City Council on Tuesday addressed sewer issues including treatment plant capacity, testing costs, new lines and rate hikes. Mayor Gerald Oleser asked Cliff Lough, OMI project manager of the wastewater treatment plant, what the treatment plant's capacity is. Lough said the Jerome plant is about two-thirds full; one-third of the capacity is left to fill before, by law, something has to be done. Lough reported that OMI's land-use permit for the wastewater treatment plant requires certain water - after it has been purified - to be used for irrigation purposes at the treatment plant. This stipulation had been overlooked when the budget was drawn up. Testing the purity of the water for irrigation is \$100 a month. The council decided to continue to pay the testing expense but to check on water rights and other irrigation water possibilities for the treatment plant. Block grant requests are being drafted to cover the cost of the new Bannock County Motel, under construction on South Lincoln, and water lines to Gilmer Trucking, also in the South Lincoln Corridor. City Administrator Jeff Bishop presented a rate study, which recommends a 44 percent increase in rates for the Jerome Cheese Co. plant and a 7 percent rate increase for residential customers. A work session will be scheduled for the council to examine the study.

Amateur emergency radio presentation made to county

JEROME - Jay Smith and Maria Semder recently presented an overview of the Bannock Amateur Civilian Emergency Services organization to Jerome County commissioners. RACES is a group of amateur radio operators who offer radio as a communication option during emergencies when other forms of communication may be nonexistent or overused. The Civil Air Patrol supports RACES as an emergency service. RACES helped with the Teton Dam disaster and with the Alaska earthquake. This year, RACES helped with the Boise fires and with fires in the South Hills. During the Elba Fire, some power lines burned down, so emergency personnel had to rely on the battery-operated disaster services radios for their communications. RACES is a backup system for emergencies. There are repeater towers on Mount Harrison and Hansen Butte and a portable repeater at the Jerome airport. From the Mount Harrison repeater, RACES can reach Salt Lake City and Boise. The disaster services office has money left over from last year's budget and wants to put a radio in the disaster services office at the courthouse as an additional emergency communications option.

Andrus accuses Craig of lying on nuclear issue

False advertising? Not so says Craig's campaign

TWIN FALLS - Sen. Larry Craig's most recent television ad taking credit for halting plans to dump nuclear waste from Ohio and New York in Idaho are "just flat untrue," former Gov. Cecil Andrus said Thursday. The ad, first aired in Idaho Wednesday, says, "In 1991, Larry Craig blocked New York and Ohio nuclear waste from coming to Idaho." Andrus, Idaho's governor during the 1991 waste controversy, said he could not leave Craig's claims unchallenged. "His latest ads are totally false when he claims he has spent all these years fighting to keep nuclear waste from coming into Idaho," Andrus said in a telephone conference call from Albany, N.Y. Not so, says Craig's campaign. "Everything in the ad is completely accurate," Craig's campaign director Mike Tracy said.

The conference call was organized by the campaign of Boise Democrat Walt Minnick, who is seeking to unseat Craig in the Nov. 5 election. Republican Craig and Democrat Andrus have been political adversaries for years. Andrus launched the fight over nuclear waste dumping in Idaho on Oct. 19, 1988, when he closed state borders to waste from a Colorado nuclear bomb factory. Craig, then a member of Congress supported those waste shipments, Andrus said. Craig's ad refers to assurances from James Watkins, President Bush's energy secretary, and Idaho Republican Sen. Steve Symms. Both guaranteed that waste from a facility in West Valley, N.Y., would not be shipped to Idaho - despite a "binding agreement" between

the facility and the Energy Department. Andrus said the decision not to ship the New York and Ohio waste was prompted by his own action closing the state's borders earlier in 1991 and legal challenges to waste shipments from a commercial reactor in Colorado. "Our politicized secretary (Watkins) wrote that letter at the request of Symms and Craig and had no idea that the document existed," Andrus said at the time.

In his criticism of Andrus' threat to blockade waste from Colorado, Craig called the waste valuable research material. But similar material had been sitting untouched in storage at INEL since 1986, Andrus said. "If they needed it for research, they had plenty of it already," he said. At the time Craig criticized Andrus'

confrontational approach with the Energy Department, saying his stance risked the jobs of the 32,000 jobs at INEL and Idaho's bid for a proposed weapons materials plant - the New Production Reactor. Thursday Andrus attacked Craig's record on nuclear waste. "Larry Craig has not until recently opposed the importation of waste into Idaho," he said Thursday. But Craig is no newcomer to the nuclear waste issue, Tracy said. Craig has been involved since he voted on the 1982 Nuclear Waste Policy Act as a member of the House, Tracy said. The difference between Andrus and Craig is more a matter of style than substance, Tracy said. While Andrus' style has been confrontational, Craig's approach has been to work through negotiations with the Energy Department. "Over the long run, that has proven to be more effective," Tracy said.

Salary freeze generates heated meeting

KIMBERLY - One after another, Kimberley teachers spoke of disillusionment and heartache over a newly crafted salary schedule that increases pay for most teachers, but freezes the pay of nine tenured instructors. "The motivation and the drive to work for this district has been lost," said David Emerson, a teacher with the Kimberley School District for 18 years. The change halts the special salary increases of anyone who decided to become a teacher later in life, then joined the Kimberley School District. In other words, the new salary rules no longer allow those teachers to receive extra pay for the years they spent in college taking a major other than education. Before a packed audience Thursday night, the Kimberley School Board said the change was directed by a 1994 state law.

The board delayed a decision on whether to compensate the nine teachers for more time they would have received under the old salary schedule. Several teachers said the schedule was unfair because they will use their first - non-teaching-related - bachelor's degrees in the classroom. Many objected to the way the changes were announced - by a hand-delivered memo from Kimberley Superintendent John Garner a day before a Sept. 5 board meeting. "There was no advance notice, there was no preparation, no one could look for a new job," said George McAdams, a Kimberley teacher, former mayor of Kimberley and former law officer. "We were set adrift without a leader." Board members apologized for the timing of the announcement and the wording of the memo they had directed Garner to draft, but said they didn't know who represented the Kimberley Education Association for negotiations. A new KEA

president was elected just this week. "We made an attempt to contact (the KEA president) and there was no president, there was no one to step forward," said board member Lois Glenn, as other board members shook their heads in agreement. McAdams read a letter on behalf of the KEA teachers' union accusing the board of violating the labor agreement that is automatically renewed every year. Board members unanimously agreed to study whether they had violated any labor agreement. But other teachers said they appreciated the salary changes, which at a maximum allow the most tenured teachers to earn \$2,000 more than they would have under the old salary schedule. Teacher Jim Hall told the School Board she was considering quitting three years ago because her pay was so low. "I thank you for keeping me in education," Hall said.

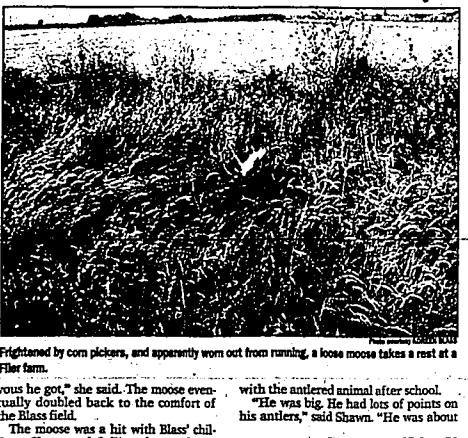

Crapo seeks money for fossil beds

HAGERMAN - It's been three years since a 2-million-year-old unperturbed log was found in Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument. But the log is still in its protective casing, unexamined, in a locked room at the monument's administrative offices. "The first bottleneck we have is that we don't have the proper amount of room to carry out state-of-the-art or proper preparation for the fossil material," said Greg McDonald, a paleontologist at the monument. The National Park Service has been lobbying for permission and money to build a paleontological research and visitor center near the monument. And this week, U.S. Rep. Mike Crapo's staff said he is seeking \$800,000 in federal Land and Water Conservation funds to buy 65 acres for the site. Park Service employees welcomed the news, calling it another step toward a visitor center. Crapo's Democratic challenger, John Seidl, dismissed the move as an election-year bid for votes. "He keeps saying he's a deficit hawk, but he's trying to get re-elected so he's changing his tune," said Seidl, considered a long shot in the race. "Do you want a leader or do you want to find someone to find money for special projects?" Instead, Crapo should find money to clean up a nuclear waste storage facility, Idaho National Engineering Laboratory near Idaho Falls, Seidl said. Still, Seidl wouldn't say whether he would turn down the money if he were in office. He doesn't know enough about the project, he said. Crapo's request would compete with other projects around the country. But it topped a list of four funding requests he submitted to the House Appropriations Interior Subcommittee. Also on the list: scenic easements in the Sawtooth Recreation Area; the purchase of Rock Creek Ranch in Hailey; and a land exchange between the U.S. Forest Service and Lucky Dog Ranch in Island Park, said Crapo spokeswoman Susan Wheeler. Seidl is "naive," Wheeler said, if he thinks cutting this allocation would reduce the budget. The money is a "drop in the bucket" compared to the entire budget, and not the source of budgetary problems, she said. "I think that the value to the public, to Idahoans as well as anyone in the United States, would be evident," she said. Community support for the project has been mixed in Hagerman. Critics say an influx of tourists would endanger the town's way of life, but the site already draws in 85,000 visitors and \$1 million a year, said Park Service spokeswoman Holly Sunduck. The \$800,000 appropriation is "good news" for the site, she said. "We don't necessarily know what's there," she said. "The more they study, the more we know about what animals are there and what fossils are in the ground." And scientist McDonald is eager to start work on the unperturbed log - delicate work and a costly one. Dole challenged to take stand on Craig nuke bill

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) - Gov. Bob Miller wants Republican presidential nominee Bob Dole to take a stand on Idaho Sen. Larry Craig's bill to locate a temporary nuclear waste dump in Nevada.

President Clinton has repeatedly promised to veto the bill that has cleared the Senate but is stalled in the House. In a letter to Dole, Miller this week said Nevadaans "have a right to know where all candidates stand on this critical issue."

The Democratic governor said Dole, campaigning in southern Nevada, declined to respond to the nuclear dump question when asked last March during an earlier visit to Las Vegas.

Meanwhile, the three members of the Idaho congressional delegation facing re-election this fall urged House Speaker Newt Gingrich to bring Craig's bill to a vote.

Craig and GOP Reps. Michael Crapo and Helen Chenoweth, who has been relatively silent on the waste issue until now, told Gingrich that the bill was critical to keeping the congressional commitment in 1982 to take responsibility of 92,000 loads of commercial nuclear waste in 1998.

But Craig's bill also would open the temporary dump in Nevada to waste stored at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, reinforcing the federal government's ability to comply with requirements of Gov. Phil Barr's 1995 agreement on removal of waste from Idaho.

Earlier, however, Nevada's Republican congressmen warned Gingrich that if he brought Craig's bill to a vote, both of them would be defeated in November on a measure

that would never take effect anyway because of Clinton's veto threat. Dole says he would not end any chance Dole has of winning that state.

Gold panning is part of living history class at Declo Elementary

BURLEY - With willow tents for classrooms and pioneers for teachers, Cassia County fourth-graders took a step back in time Thursday for a history lesson many said they wouldn't soon forget.

"That was awesome," said Shane Hoskins of Mt. View Elementary School, after watching gunpowder explode from a trapper's rifle.

"We see that again," the explosion was part of a demonstration by Glen Anderson, a "mountaineer" from Heyburn, who joined 13 other local presenters during the school district's annual Living Idaho History Day at the Cassia County Historical Museum and Fairgrounds.

As they sat cross-legged on the grass, Anderson explained how mountain men came to Idaho more than 150 years ago in search of fur to make top hats for the French and English.

When the mountain men arrived in the Magic Valley, disappointment quickly set in.

"They were being pretty good until they got here and found Burley and Twin Falls but nothing," he said. "Nothing but barren land and sagebrush."

Being self-sufficient pioneers, they persevered and later found other prospects in Idaho, namely, gold.

David Ryzak, a geologist from Pegasus Gold Black Pine Mining, explained that when gold was discovered in Idaho City around 1860, the town's population rose to 2,000 in less than a year.

"Unfortunately, it didn't last long and people started moving on elsewhere in just a few short years," Ryzak said. "It almost became a ghost town, and even today it's not exactly what you'd call a booming town."

Students had a chance to strike it rich themselves as they panned for gold in a big metal tub. They shook screen pans vigorously, but once the students saw the big sparkles, they knew they'd been caught.

"Yes, it's fool's gold, or iron pyrite if you want to be exact," Ryzak said.

Each school's students moved from one demonstration to the next, where a lesson about Idaho awaited them. Whether wool spinning or wood carving, students had an opportunity to hear firsthand accounts of how their ancestors lived.

Guy Von Dolhn - or "Wandering Antelope" - explained how Anasazi Indians survived by combining primitive skills with the offerings of Mother Nature.

"You see this seashell, what do you think they used it for?" Von Dolhn asked the students.

Before they could respond, Von Dolhn used its sharp edge to cut the grass in front of him.

"I kid people by telling them it takes me 11 days to cut the grass," he said. "But we can also use it for making jewelry or as a utensil for scooping up hot foods."

Von Dolhn also showed students how to make rope out of milkweed and stinging nettle, how a hammer could be used to dig marrow out of bones for soup and how cattails and willow can keep a person dry at night.

"This tent you see behind me

was made out of willows and cattails and can hold up for an entire winter," he said. "Willow is a real flexible wood found near most rivers, like the Snake River that all of you know."

With the threat of rain hovering over the fairgrounds, most students donned winter jackets Thursday afternoon as the temperature dropped into the lower 50s.

"We were hoping to have a little warmer weather today, but as long as it doesn't rain I don't mind," said Mary Lynn Bristol, the school district's public information officer.

"We've been doing this for six or seven years now, and it's always turned out pretty good."

Bristol said the annual event gives students a lesson in Idaho history they could never receive in a classroom.

"Fourth grade is when our students start studying Idaho history, and by coming here they can actually use their eyes and ears to see for themselves how their ancestors lived and how it used to be for them," she said. "A textbook cannot provide that."

Groundwater levels decline

RUPERT - Some farms receiving water from the A&B Irrigation District could see their supply slowed to a trickle if winter drilling projects don't tap new sources.

Five wells that have started to dry up will be drilled deeper this winter, said Virgil Temple, A&B manager.

The proposition of finding more water is a gamble, Temple said, and if the drilling fails, some farms are going to have to get by with less.

"We will pull those pumps and look to drill them to a deeper depth," Temple said. "So far, we haven't been very successful in drilling. Over the last four or five years, the odds are less than 50-50 when drilling."

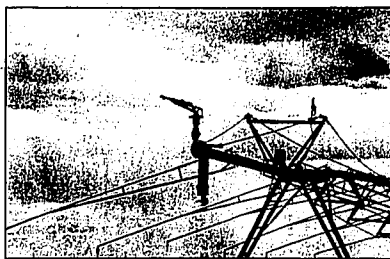
"If the water table continues to decline, we could be in trouble," he added. State and federal studies have shown groundwater levels declining over much of the Snake River Basin. Last year, the state spent more than \$800,000 on irrigation district recharging efforts.

A&B spent \$85,000 on one drilling project last year, and never found water.

A&B Irrigation District is the only agricultural water service in the Magic Valley that gets most of its water from the aquifer. A&B pumps more than 80 percent of its water from the ground.

The district's groundwater pumps used have been coming up dry at an alarming rate. A&B has lost a pump a year for the past five years, Temple said. Sixty-five of the district's 177 pumps are not supplying the amount of water they were designed to carry, because the water isn't available.

Because of the scarcity of water, some farmers had to make do with

less this season. "So far, we have not lost any crops, but we're running out of water to service them," Temple said. "There comes a point in time when it becomes economically not worth continuing to find water spending \$300,000 to drill a well to save a \$100,000 farm."

long-legged animal could be anywhere. "He could easily move 20, maybe 30, miles in a day if he put his mind to it," Hompland said.

Hompland said the Fish and Game Department is only monitoring the moose.

"You always run a risk anytime you try to move a large wild animal, because you may cause more problems than he would cause on his own," Hompland said. "We're in a bit of a dilemma, because the more you try to chase him, the

more he's going to be crossing crops, breaking fences and crossing roads."

Harold Peterson, who lives at the intersection of highways 20 and 93, didn't see the moose in his corn fields Thursday, but said he wasn't overly disappointed, having just returned from a successful moose hunt.

"We drove 300 miles to Island Park, and got a moose in the first five minutes we hunted," Peterson said. "It was a real thrill. You only get one tag in your life."

Eco-friendly 'wet cleaning' gets the wash test in L.A.

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — Step inside the Cleaner by Nature shop on Wilshire Boulevard, past the window display of antique washboards, dried flowers and green plants to racks of clean clothes on hangers. Then sniff.

"That's poppourri you smell in the air, not perchloroethylene, the cleaning fluid used by more than 80 percent of U.S. dry cleaners and the trademark odor that hits you as soon as you walk through their doors.

Owner Deborah Davis has traded the heavily regulated chlorine solvent — a suspected cancer-causing chemical — for a high-tech variation on good old soap-and-water.

In the process, the former Price Club regional marketing director has targeted the emerging market of ecologically friendly products and services.

She runs one of fewer than 10 "wet cleaners" that have sprung up in strip malls and main streets around the country.

They rely on a computer-controlled washing machine that uses plain water, biodegradable soap, fabric conditioners and finishing to gently wash the dirt out of the unthinkably immensurable: wool suits, silk wedding dresses, camel hair coats. A computerized dryer stops before clothes get to be bone dry. "In the past, cleaners took water out of the equa-

tion and substituted a solvent. Now we have the capability to control other factors so we can put water back into the equation," said Davis, a newcomer to the \$5.1 billion cleaning business. "Water is really the best cleaning solvent of all."

Among the shop's satisfied cus-

tomers is Elyse Gunter, an attorney at 20th Century Fox who dry cleans most of her wardrobe.

"There should be more places like this. I just got tired of getting my clothes back smelling like used chemicals," said Gunter, who complained only that a T-shirt with some Spandex "came back a little stretched-out."

She'd stick with Davis' shop as long as prices remain competitive.

By controlling water temperature, heat and agitation to minimize shrinkage, the new green cleaners and the environmentalists who love them hope to see dry cleaning go the way of the Edsel.

For their part, many of the nation's 34,000 dry cleaners see wet cleaning as a potential adjunct — not a replacement — for what they do.

"If water were the solution to

the problems of textiles, there would never have been a dry cleaning industry to begin with," says William Seitz, the non-sense executive director of the 4,000-member, New York-based Neighborhood Cleaners Association-International. After experimenting with wet cleaning, he cautions against pushing it as an all-purpose replacement for chemical methods, especially when improved equipment is making pure use more efficient and less polluting.

"There is nothing at the moment that does as good a job as perc does. Unless and until something comes along that's better, the industry is going to use it," he says.

For Barry Gershenson, vice president of the California Fabricator Institute and an advisor to a University of California, Los Angeles, group evaluating Davis' operation, "the future of the industry is not in 100 percent wet cleaning. It is in a blend of the two."

Gershenson would be happy if fabric manufacturers replaced "dry clean only" care labels with "professionally clean only" instructions. Such a change, discussed Sept. 9-10 at a Washington conference on alternative cleaning technologies and labeling, would give cleaners leeway to use water or cleaning fluids.

Conservation groups don't oppose Grandmother timber sale

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — An environmental group says it generally approves of a proposed Forest Service timber sale, even though some of the logging would occur in the 40,000-acre Grandmother Mountain Roadless Area. That's one of the largest roadless areas in northern Idaho, but the Forest Service's Hobo-Cornwall sale calls for logging

nearly 7 million board-feet of timber east of St. Maries.

Logging there is a problem because the Grandmother mountain area is popular with back-country equestrians, huckleberry pickers, hunters, fishermen and backpackers.

Conservationists say they like parts of the latest logging proposal. "It protects what's left of

Grandmother Mountain," said Lurry McLaud of the Idaho Conservation League. The Forest Service people "are listening to the people and incorporating what they hear into a timber sale, and that is a novel concept with the Forest Service in Idaho."

"We are not endorsing the whole thing, but this is progress," he said.

One Percent would turn power to voters, advocate tells officials

LEWISTON (AP) — Passage of the One Percent Initiative would enable voters to decide what local government services they really need, initiative sponsor Ron Rankin told county officials.

"What is wrong with putting it on the ballot and letting the people decide which services are vital?" Rankin asked Wednesday at the annual Idaho Association of Counties conference.

"If you can't plow the snow or fix the potholes, put it on the ballot."

The measure on Idaho's Nov. 5 ballot would require a majority vote for taxing districts to increase budgets by more than the annual cost-living increase in Social Security benefits, aside from revenues generated through growth and annexation. A two-thirds vote would be required to exceed the property tax limit of 1 percent of taxable value after exemptions.

Twin Falls County Commissioner Dennis Maughan said it is unrealistic to suggest voters cast ballots each time they were increased services.

"They vote when they vote us in," he said. "They voice their opinions at budget hearings and

board of equalization hearings." Maughan said the Twin Falls County Commission conducted only six hearings on property tax appeals last June.

"If there is a great clamor for property tax relief, we aren't hearing it," he said.

But Rankin said there were 960 property tax appeal hearings conducted in Bonnevill County last year. Bonnevill County Commissioner Roger Christensen said there actually were 765 hearings held by the county commission, but that has been reduced to 50 this year.

Under questioning from several county officials, Rankin repeatedly contended the intent of the initiative is to limit the annual hike in property tax bud-

gets — not overall budgets — to the cost-of-living increase for Social Security recipients.

"Perhaps we should have spelled it out more clearly," he said.

Nez Perce County Commission Chairman Earl Ferguson reiterated his support for the initiative, which he said would force local elected officials to deal with the issues and ultimately restore people's trust in government.

But Ada County Treasurer Barbara Bauer said wealthy landowners would be the beneficiaries of the One Percent Initiative when average homeowners are the ones who really need property tax relief.

"The \$50,000 cap on the homeowner's exemption should be increased, she said, and value of land should be eligible for the exemption as well.

"We aren't into class struggles and hitting one class against each other," Rankin replied. Bauer's proposals would shift property taxes to commercial property owners, he said. "Everything you buy will cost proportionately more because businesses don't pay taxes," they pass them on to consumers.

Court to decide fate of 300 dogs

WEISER (AP) — The future of nearly 300 dogs found at a rural Midvale residence may be decided Monday in a Washington County court.

Sherric Erickson is charged with allowing more than 50 dogs to live on her premises and failing to provide them with proper food and water. The charge filed Sept. 4 also alleges she housed the dogs in unsanitary conditions and failed to provide treatment for parvovirus.

Prosecutor Ira Burton also asked Magistrate Judge Greg Cui to decide the fate of the animals. Officials said they can do nothing permanent with the animals until Erickson relinquishes ownership or a court order is entered.

Erickson denies she's done anything wrong, maintaining the dogs were well-cared for until she was barred access to the property. "I love my dogs. They are my babies. I have names for all of them ... and I want my babies back," she said.

Officials estimate there were more than 300 dogs at the residence, 25 miles east of Midvale in the Crane Creek area. The Idaho Humane Society removed about 70 animals, most puppies. Pat Vance, Humane Society manager, said at least six puppies have died since being moved and parvovirus has appeared in some of the young dogs.

Limiting kids' TV viewing is tough task

CHICAGO — For many parents, sits like a beast in the living room, asking for a fight or wanting to devour the meats of an inaccessible member of the household.

It's the TV, of course; and as almost all parents know from transmittal experience, getting kids away from it isn't as simple as quietly requesting parental responsibility.

If it were, there would be many more scenes of happy families gathered around the coffee table playing Parcheesi instead of having shouting matches over whether their kids can watch "The Simpsons" after preschool or Ses can see her favorite rock stars gyrate on MTV.

So it might have seemed like something of a godsend that the venerable American Medical Association put its full weight behind a set of guidelines it issued Sept. 9 about kids and TV, titled, "Media Use Suggestions for Parents," designed "to help parents reduce exposure to media violence."

Yet a pass through the AMA guidelines — from No. 1, "Be alert to the shows your children see," through No. 3, "Limit the use of media — no television before school" and on to No. 6, "Decide in advance if a program is worth viewing" — may leave more than a few parents scratching their heads over whether the AMA has actually been in a household with a TV lately.

As kids would say: "Duhhh!"

While the guidelines might strike most as blatantly obvious, that doesn't mean they won't have

'Media Use Suggestions for Parents'

- Be alert to the shows your children see.
- Avoid using TV, videos or video games as a baby-sitter.
- Limit TV use to no more than one or two quality hours per day.
- Keep TV and video players out of your children's bedrooms.
- Turn the TV off at mealtimes.
- Decide in advance if a TV program is worth viewing. Don't turn the TV on "to see if there's something on."
- Don't make the TV the focal point of the home. Avoid placing the television in the most prominent location in your home.
- Watch what your children are watching. This will give you an opportunity to discuss it with them.
- Be especially careful about viewing just before bedtime.
- Learn about movies that are playing and videos available for rent or purchase and be explicit with children about your guidelines of what is appropriate.
- Learn how to critically evaluate media offerings, such as advertising.
- Limit your own TV viewing. Set a good example.
- Let your voice be heard: insist on better programming for children.

who reviewed the guidelines for the AMA.

"Even though they're obvious, children are watching an average of 28 hours a week," Hogan said. "Something needs to be done."

For most parents, the issue is not believing that children should watch less TV and better shows. The question is, "How on earth can you accomplish this in the face of young wills that make Winston Churchill look like a wimp?"

"In a lot of families, having a reasonable discussion with children about limiting TV watching is not going to work because the children, even those as young as 3 or 4, have control over TV watching," said Leonard Jason, professor of psychology at DePaul University and author of an upcoming book about children and TV.

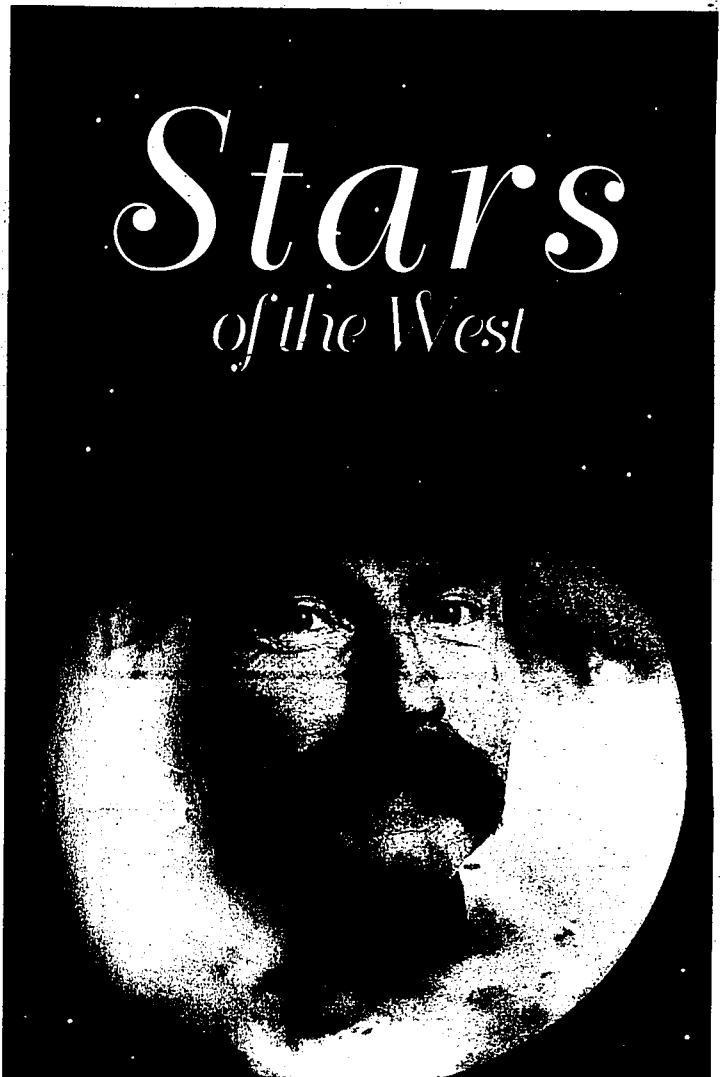

Western Opera tour groups travel by bus, with a truck of 15,000 pounds of scenery, costumes and lighting.

"I love the travel," said Seo, whose only concern is leaving behind his wife of two years who's studying music education at the Peabody Institute.

Seo and his wife live in Baltimore, and Seo studies opera performance at the Curtis Institute of Music when he's not on the road. He already holds a graduate degree from the school.

On tour with "Barber," Seo attends practice sessions every day.

"When I am behind the stage, I'm really really nervous," he said, "but on stage, I'm not like that."

Besides, "The Barber of Seville" is a lot of fun.

It's the story of Count Almaviva, who is in love with Rosina and has come to serenade her. But instead, the count does a lot of hiding. Eventually, he enlists the aid of Figaro, a resourceful barber, to arrange a meeting with his intended. Rossini's opera will be sung in its original language (Italian) in Twin Falls. There will be English super-titles (English translations of the text projected near the stage). Sometimes, the opera is performed with piano accompaniment. Sometimes, there is an orchestra.

The San Francisco Opera production is utilizing the skills of internationally renowned stage director John Copley, who, along with John Coaklin and Michael Stennett, developed a

visual concept known as "Magritte."

This unusual form of production design features the lightness and precision of Rene Magritte's work, as evidenced in the cloud paintings which form the backdrop for "Barber."

The Western Opera Theater will take the opera to 37 cities this time around.

Since Seo began touring, he's been recognized "a couple of times in bars and cafes." His career isn't

as glamorous - or as lucrative - as that of a movie star, he said, but every once in a while, people send him letters.

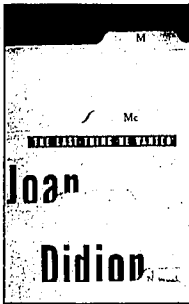
Didion's 'Wanted' is story of transitions

Elena McMahon, the anti-hero of Joan Didion's provocative, film noir-like portrait of evil, "The Last Thing He Wanted" (Knopf, \$23) is a genius at that fine old American custom of re-inventing oneself, of shedding one's past to explore a new frontier.

With chameleonlike ease, McMahon moves from newspaper reporter to pampered, high-society dame married to a rich, powerful California nabob. Without a beat, Didion's protean character is transformed back to a reporter covering the presidential campaign of 1984, haunted by dreams of death and her recent bout with breast cancer.

And finally, in her most dramatic role, she becomes the unwitting center of a deadly political conspiracy, a giant arms deal for the Contras and assassination plots and counterplots hatched on a small Latin American

tions impulsively, almost unconsciously, seeming to improvise her way through life.

While covering the campaign trail for The Washington Post, she abruptly ducks out and winds up in Florida with her dying father, Dick McMahon, an old hand at arms dealing. This less-than-grand patriarch is too sick to consummate the biggest deal of his life, one that would give him his first million-dollar payoff.

The old man, who, oddly enough, has a strong element of Willy Loman lurking in his glad-handing

character, puts together arms deals "on credit, on goodwill, on a shared drink here and a promise there and a tale told at the Miami Springs Holiday Inn at two in the morning."

The old guy has a certain crusty charm rooted in American bluster and directness. But he's also a bigot, an Archie Bunker among arms dealers. Like most characters in the novel, he's a wheeler-dealer with no ethics. And in his 50 years in the business, he's built up countless contacts with shadowy power figures all over the world.

Only Humphrey Bogart, in his later years, could bring the right sort of edge to this amoral, curmudgeonly character.

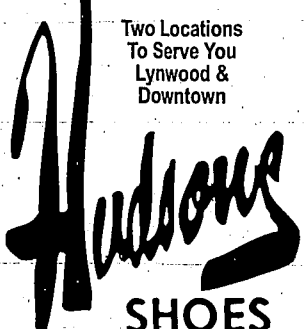

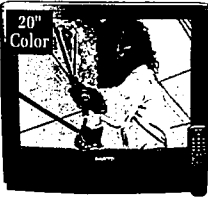

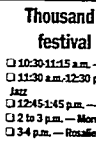

people will attend Saturday's celebration of art and music. The show, which drew 600 people the first year, 1,200 the second, and 1,800 the third, has developed a reputation of having the best artists in Idaho, O'Brien said.

"We are tremendously excited about the caliber of artists in the show this year," she said, explaining that each person's work is examined by a jury for acceptance. "Since we have a small site, this will never be a big show. There are always many more applicants than there are slots to fill." The ferry, she added, is the best way to get to the festival because there is ample parking space at Sligra's Resort and the boat ride across the river is an enjoyable scenic tour.

This year's featured musician is Idaho City folksinger Rosalie Sorrels. Sorrels, 62, writes emotional songs about her life in the mountains and her travels on the road. In a telephone interview this week, Sorrels said she is happy to be invited to perform at the Thousand Springs Preserve. The singer recalled visiting this huge island when she was a child living with her grandparents in Twin Falls. Although it has been a long time, she remembers it as a beautiful spot. "I've always thought it was kind of a magical place," she said. "There's nothing else like it."

Sorrels, who was born in Boise, said she lives now in a cabin her father built on land where his parents lived. For recordings and a book she wrote, Sorrels has researched Idaho songs and their histories, and so, she explained, the old tunes of Idaho pioneers are especially dear to her heart. "Maybe I'll sing a couple old Idaho songs," she said, "and some songs that have to do with the feeling of wanting to save old things and not throw them away. That's a theme of mine."

Willis said the preserve, surrounded by clear, flowing spring water, is especially beautiful in September. The 65-acre island has colorful orchards, rolling lawns, fields of tall native grasses for wildlife habitat and a 1920s state-of-the-art dairy barn, where the Minnie Miller farm raised national champion Guernsey cattle from 1918 to 1954. The island later was owned by U.S. District Judge Willis Ritter. The conservancy purchased the land and its nearby springs from his estate in 1986.

TWIN FALLS— There's a barn roof over the back bar, but Kevin Aires says you're as likely to hear the Macarena in his new establishment as "Boot Scootin' Boogie."
"It started out as a country-western dance club, but we got talking to people and they told us they'd rather have a mix," said Aires, who'll formally open his new 7,600-square foot Boot Scooters on Wednesday. "So we'll play a country song, then maybe rock 'n' roll, dance music—even disco."

Boot Scooters, with a 1,000-square foot dance floor, can accommodate between 200 and 250 dancers at a time, he said.
That's a lot, by Magic Valley standards.
"During the Macarena, you'll look

around and most of the tables will be empty," Aires said. "Everybody's out on the dance floor."

The bar, located at 1539 Fillmore Street on Twin Falls' north end, will feature live music on Fridays and Saturdays, except for next week, when Redstone will play for the club's grand opening Wednesday through Saturday nights.

Twister, a local band, will be on stage this weekend.
Boot Scooters will be open Wednesdays through Sundays from 5 p.m. to 1 a.m. On weekends, bands will play from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

"We just thought there was a demand for a place like this in Twin Falls," said Aires, a 25-year-old Twin Falls High School graduate who owns the club in partnership with his wife, Sarah, and his parents, Pat and Patti Aires. "Growing up in Twin

Falls, it seemed like there was nothing to do."

The younger Aires, who worked for Hostess in Boise, set out to build a health club in Twin Falls.
"But Gold's Gym wouldn't consider a city with less than 80,000 population," he said. "When the liquor license became available, this seemed like a good investment."

Aires said his was the first liquor license issued to a bar (not including restaurants and super clubs) in Twin Falls in 26 years. (Although two other establishments, The Royal Lounge and a new bar in South Park, will open soon).
"We wanted to have a place where people could come and feel comfortable, whether they dance or not," he said.

The club's black walls are highlighted with neon-rimmed beer and liquor signs, and lights surround the dance floor. A vintage yellow Volkswagen sits over the door.

"That's never coming down," Aires explained. "I'll sell the bar before I go through trying to move that again."

Boot Scooters employs six security guards ("The bank didn't like the word bouncers," Aires said) to circulate among the crowd and head off trouble.

"When the place is full, we can get 335 people in here, and we had waiting lines last weekend," Aires said.

There's a \$3 cover charge on Friday and Saturday nights. Finger foods are available.

Will gangsta rap outlive Tupac?

While the hip-hop world expressed sympathy, if not surprise, over the shooting that left rapper Tupac Shakur dead, one top record executive predicted that the incident could have a chilling effect on the progress the industry has made in recent years in opening the doors to black entrepreneurs.

"What the shooting is going to affect is the establishment perception of young black men in the record business — and it's going to have a very, very negative effect," said one top West Coast executive, who, like most others interviewed did not want his name used in this article.

"People don't want to be associated with stuff like this. They are going to look at other young hard-core executives and artists who come up from the streets and they are going to generalize."

This, he suggested, could lead to some potentially gifted rap artists being shut out of the industry because labels might be fearful of being embroiled in violence and confrontation.

Other executives, however, say that many in the industry are already wary of working with hard-core rap artists and entrepreneurs.

"People already have been nervous about doing business with some of these guys," an East Coast executive said. "This is a weird kind of thing to say, but at least (Shakur's murder) was in the confines of a group of people who were already perceived as being violent ... where if it had spread into another camp that I think it would be much more alarming. It is reinforcing the existing perception that there are certain camps that are dangerous."

Shakur was shot at least four times late on Sept. 7 following the Mike Tyson-Bruce Seldon fight in Las Vegas. Shakur was a passenger in a car being driven by Marion "Suge" Knight, the head of Shakur's label, Los Angeles-based Death Row Records. Knight was also grazed in the head by the gunfire that reportedly came from a passing car just off the jammed Las Vegas Strip.

Shakur died five days later in a Las Vegas hospital.

His shooting is the talk of the rap community around the country. In New York City, DJ Mister Cee, director of A&R at Mercury Records and a disc jockey at WQHT-FM, said he thought young rappers may be sobered by the weekend shooting.

"If there are artists living that lifestyle, I think they'll step back and look at the Tupac situation and be a little bit more cautious in what they do — and even in what they say," he said. "They'll check themselves twice — maybe even three times — before saying or doing anything that's going to incriminate them later on — mentally or physically."

Alan Light, editor in chief of Vibe magazine, which has written extensively about Shakur, said he doubted that the shooting would do much to change the direction

of hard-core rap.

"If it truly were a wake-up call they would have awakened before now," he said. "It's not

like this was the first time. Certainly in his recent interviews and records, Tupac's tone has been invincible."

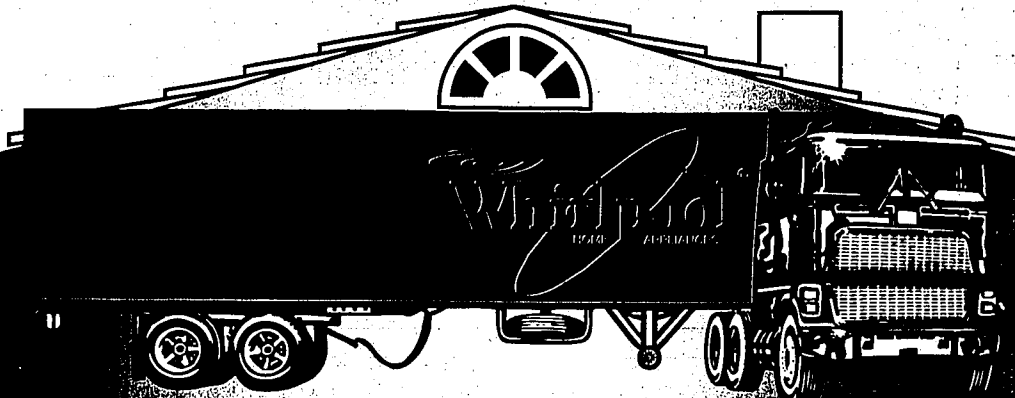

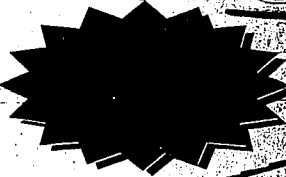

TWIN FALLS - Jerome was on autopilot, cruising to a volleyball tri-match sweep over Highland 15-7, 15-5 and Twin Falls 15-4, 15-4 Thursday.

Jerome's dominance left the dramatic responsibilities to Twin Falls, which edged past Highland 15-4, 15-12.

Twin Falls was energized by the home crowd and Highland was plagued by errors in a quick Bruin rout of game one.

Then the unforced error virus spread to Twin Falls.

The Bruins began game two with five errors and Highland's Erin Ricks pounded one down the middle to give the Rams a 6-0 lead.

The Bruins managed to summer their offense behind the setting of Whitney Trainor, who set up four kills staging a comeback at 5-8.

Twin Falls senior Jenny Corn locked the game at 9-9 with two aces.

"We played relaxed but aggressive and that made things happen," said Twin Falls coach Mike Federico.

The score remained tied for six rotations until a kill from Kelsey Kleinokopf pushed the Bruins ahead by one.

Despite another run from Highland, the tie had turned and carried Twin Falls to victory.

It appeared that the Bruins were still reveling in their Highland win when Jerome took the court and developed an 11-0 lead in the first game. Jerome's Lanie Barnes had seven kills in a very offensive Tiger win.

"Jerome took us out of our game," said Federico, "and we gave them more free balls and they kept swinging away."

The Bruins spent game two scrambling to retrieve Jerome's serves and the power behind the Tiger kills intimidated Twin Falls. "We were tentative and Jerome served tough which made our passing difficult," said Federico.

The Bruins will have another shot at the Tigers this weekend in the Jerome tournament.

"We need to be more consistent. So far, we've said 'I can't have fun' but we need to be more intense throughout the games," said Federico, "but it's a long year."

Health officials say helmets may cut bull riders' injuries

ATLANTA - Conjuring up images of the Marlboro Man in a helmet instead of a Stetson, government health officials reckon it may be time rodeo bull riders wear protective headgear.

This is a fairly hazardous sport with a high risk for injuries. Joseph Sniezek of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's National Center for Injury Prevention Control. "We need to look at prevention strategies, and that might include a helmet."

And what's next? Seat belts on the bulls? Padded horns? Slapping the dust off your jeans with a cordless vacuum?

"If I can't have my hat on, it just doesn't seem right," said Scott Breeding of Elger, Wyo., a college champion and 21-year rodeo competitor. "It's the code of the West - the tradition. Most people who get into this sport know the risks they take. It's part of the thrill."

Bull riders, whether bucked off, kicked, tossed or stomped on, bite the dust hard and wind up with 37 percent of all rodeo injuries, according to the CDC.

The agency looked at five riders with varying levels of experience who took a beating on bull rides in Louisiana in 1994 and 1995. One 28-year-old man with 15 years' experience snapped his neck when he was thrown to the ground. He left the hospital paralyzed and unable to eat, dress or walk by himself.

"Some riders - even champions -

Nowhere to run

Cowboys' Smith tired of stacked lines, expects better results soon

IRVING, Texas - Emmitt Smith is all suited out with nowhere to run.

"I look up and see eight-man fronts all the time," said Smith, the NFL's top rusher in four of the past six seasons. "We're not running the ball like we should. I just hope we get it figured out soon."

Smith has only 253 yards in the Dallas Cowboys' first three games, averaging only 3.7 yards per carry. That average ranks him eighth in the league.

"Nothing is a given anymore," Smith said. "Teams are picking up on things we have been successful doing in the past."

The defending Super Bowl champions have stumbled to a 1-2 start because the lack of passing proficiency has put a strain on the running game. Teams are loading up to stop Smith, forcing the Cowboys to the passing game that is missing suspended wide receiver Michael Irvin and injured tight end Jay Novacek.

"Teams are loading up on us," Smith said. "We have to find a way to make them pay."

Complicating the Cowboys' run problems is the fact that Smith isn't running on all cylinders.

"I'm not 100 percent," Smith said. "I still have some things bothering me." Smith wouldn't get specific, but he

still hasn't recovered from a twisted knee suffered in the preseason.

"I'm not used to being this banged up this early in the year," he said.

The Buffalo Bills present Smith's next challenge.

"Buffalo didn't look great against Pittsburgh, but they'll make plays against us," Smith said. "Everybody plays their best games against us. Even the sorriest team in the NFL gets up for the Cowboys. That's the high standard we have to play to. We almost have to play perfect football to win games."

Offensive lineman Nate Newton said the Cowboys haven't run like they should because the team isn't in what Newton calls "pounding shape."

"Each player has to check himself out and get a sense of urgency," Newton said. "We need to get into pounding shape where we can just pound the ball at other teams and they can't stop it. That's the way we usually run our offense around here."

Smith said he knows the Cowboys eventually will start running the ball better.

"For whatever the reason, we're not running the ball like we used to," Smith said. "But we've still got the guns to do it. It's too early to panic."

Homecoming more like home-leaving for Bruins

Favre appeals NFL booze ban

CHICAGO - Brett Favre is appealing his NFL-imposed ban on alcohol, following his conviction in July that the league had no right to prohibit him from drinking after he admitted a dependency to the pain-killering medicine Vicodin. The Green Bay Packers quarterback maintains the confusing league substance abuse policy blindsided him and he never should have been placed under an alcohol ban because he was a "self-referred" patient rather than a "behavior-referred" one. That distinction means the difference between being able to drink beer after a game and total abstinence monitored by random drug tests. His status also stipulates he undergo counseling twice a week and that he inform the NFL as to his whereabouts. His appeal is to NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue.

"I don't want people to think, 'Now he's playing well so he wants to go back to partying,'" Favre told the Green Bay Press-Gazette on Wednesday. "There's nothing wrong with the program. It's just that I shouldn't be in it because I'm voluntary. I've thought that from the beginning. This isn't about being able to drink. I haven't touched a drop (of alcohol) in five months, so that's not a problem. This is about me regaining my freedom." Favre spent 46 days in the Menninger Clinic in Topeka, Kan., last May and June and expressed dismay at a July press conference when it was revealed he was under the substance-abuse umbrella that included alcohol. He has continually denied reports he has a problem with drinking and said doctors at the clinic agreed he had no alcohol problem. "It's been rumored my prob-

lem also involved alcoholism. (An unnamed expert on prescription medicine) stated unequivocally that I do not have a problem in this area, namely that I am not an alcoholic," Favre said in a July 19 letter. Under the printed terms of the NFL substance abuse program, "self-referred players will be given drug tests while in treatment, but the results will be used for treatment, not disciplinary reasons." That the league's most valuable player thinks he is being disciplined unfairly after voluntarily entering a program is a problem that can't engender confidence from players with lower profiles. The league consistently hides behind "confidentiality rules" and refuses to discuss or clarify nuances of the policy. Packers coach Mike Holmgren, who wants Favre to win his case, was caught off guard Thursday when asked of the alcohol appeal.

Olympic officials vote Saturday on allowing pros into baseball

LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP) - Imagine a pitching duel between Hideo Nomo and Roger Clemens in the Olympics. With such a tantalizing vision in mind, the International Baseball Association this week is expected to open the sport to professionals for the Sydney Olympics in 2000. The IBA is holding a special congress Saturday to vote on a change in its amateur-only rules and bring baseball into line with basketball, tennis, ice hockey and other sports with pros in the Olympics. Even if the vote passes, however, several hurdles stand in the way of a major league Dream Team competing in Sydney. In June 1994, the baseball federation narrowly rejected a propo-

posal to embrace professionalism. The measure fell three votes short of the two-thirds majority needed to pass. Since then, the IBA has added more than 10 new members, and the proposal is expected to gain approval this time. Delegates from 101 member countries will vote on the rule change, which would allow pros to play in the world championships and other major international events as well as the Olympics. The move would benefit not only the United States, but teams from Latin America and Japan. "The opening, in addition to raising the level of the international competition with the participation of the best players, should encourage a greater coop-

eration among all those who make up the world of baseball," the IBA said in a statement this week. The future of baseball as an Olympic sport could be on the line. IOC president Juan Antonio Samaranch wants only the best athletes from each sport be eligible for the games. If baseball doesn't comply, there is a danger the sport could be dropped from the Olympics. "If we don't get the pro like they do in basketball, we have a chance of going down," IBA secretary general Richard Case said earlier this year. The timing of the vote is significant. It comes less than a month before the IOC holds a series of meetings to finalize the sports program for the Sydney Games.

The one thing the state guarantees is a "fair" schedule with an adequate number of games. 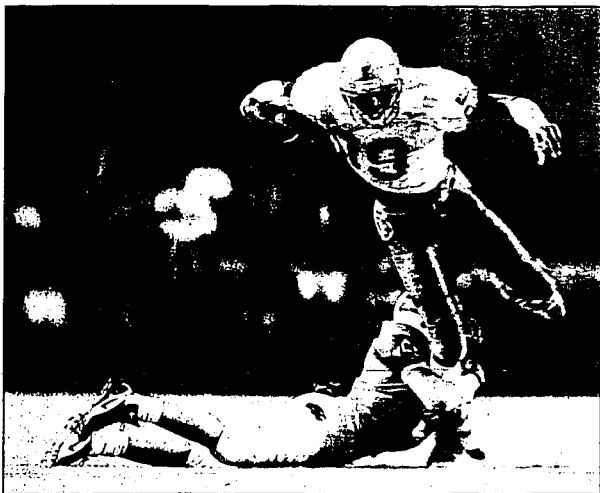

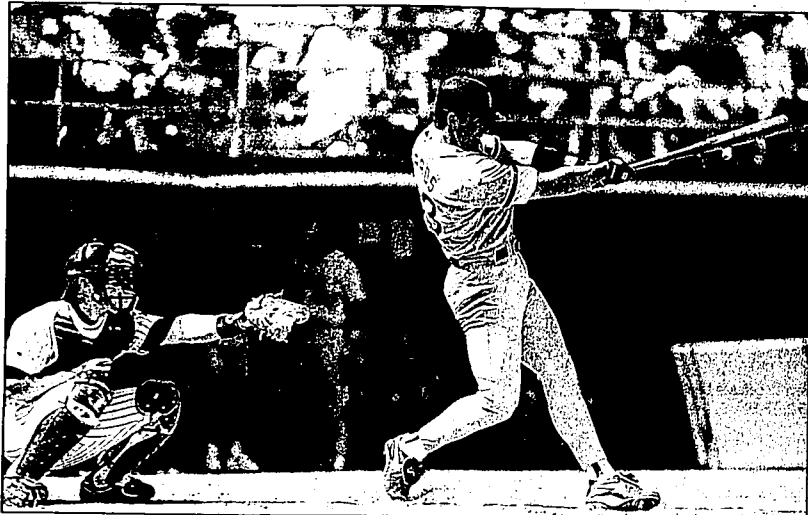
FSU's defense, meanwhile, was

Dodgers' pitching swings: Padres fall in six-hitter

SAN DIEGO — They arrived in the morning for the tailgate parties, sauntered into San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium, ordered their margaritas and fish tacos, and danced the night away. San Diego Padre fans, who have waited 12 years for this, were ready to put on a fiesta that could be heard from Coronado Island to Camp Pendleton.

Instead, the paid crowd of 41,287 sat in a catatonic state, watching the Los Angeles Dodgers methodically dismantle the Padres, 7-0, behind Ramon Martinez.

The Dodgers took painful strides not to boast or gloat afterward, but their message was clear. "We're the (defending National League West) champions," night fielder Raul Mondesi said. "They have to take it from us. Now, we made it even harder for them."

"We have a lot of confidence." The Dodgers (87-66) opened a 1-7 game lead over the Padres (86-68) with the victory and, more important, are two games up in the lost column with only nine games remaining.

The Dodgers' magic number suddenly is eight. "Every game right now is important, but in my mind we had to get a win today," Martinez said. "I wanted to get us started."

The Dodgers, who maintained all along that their veteran starting rotation would be the difference in this crucial four-game series, sat back and watched Martinez pitch his finest game of the season against former teammate Fernando Valenzuela.

Martinez not only pitched a six-hit shutout, he struck out 12, getting at least one batter in each inning. Martinez retired 18 of the final 19 batters he faced, and shut down the heart of the order. He limited the Nots 3 to 7 hitters —

Steve Finley, Ken Caminiti, Greg Vaughn, Wally Joynt and John Flaherty — to two hits in 18 at-bats and got nine of his strikeouts against them. "He had a good live fastball and good live arm action on his change-up," said Caminiti, who

struck out three times. "Ramon Martinez beat us today. That's all you can say." Who could blame the Padres for suddenly having the suspicion that they are in trouble? The Padres, who had hoped Valenzuela would provide some

magic, watched him get knocked out of the game after only 1.23 innings. Valenzuela now has a 5.83 earned-run average in seven starts against the Dodgers. The Padres' demise began quickly when Dodger center fielder Chad Curtis led off with a

sharp grounder to Caminiti. Caminiti couldn't pick it up, and Curtis was safe on the error. Curtis, watching Todd Hollandsworth fall behind in the count 0-and-2, decided to steal second. He took off and Hollandsworth slapped the ball to right field, moving Curtis to third. Mike Piazza, who had only one hit in the Dodgers' series at Coors Field, then hit a line drive to left field, scoring Curtis on the sacrifice fly.

That brought up Eric Karros, the hometown boy from San Diego. Karros remembers the glory days of the Padres. He was sitting in Section 36, between third base and home, when Tim Flannery hit a grounder between Chicago Cub first baseman LeRoy Durham's legs, sending the Padres to the 1984 World Series. He was there for Steve Garvey's dramatic homer in the playoff series. And he was there those nights when everyone was on first-name basis in the stands. "I was there those nights when people came to the games to see the Famous Chicken," Karros said, "because there wasn't anything to cheer about on the field."

Guess who turned this into another one of those games, with the Famous Chicken making a guest appearance in the eighth inning.

Karros waited for a pitch he liked, then, on a 2-2 pitch, homered into the left-field seats for a 3-0 lead. "I just stood up there because I saw 2-2 pitches because of nothing I looked good for me to hit," Karros said. "The next pitch was right down the middle. I think he was trying to throw a screwball. It didn't do anything. It just stayed straight."

Expos keep Braves from celebrating; Pirates run win streak to 8

ATLANTA — The Montreal Expos are delaying Atlanta's celebration and trying to ensure one of their own. David Segui hit a two-run single in the ninth and Moises Alou followed with a two-run homer as Montreal beat the Braves 5-1 Thursday night and moved ahead of San Diego in the NL wild-card race.

Weber State puts its status as one of only two undefeated Big Sky Conference schools on the line when the Wildcats travel to Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo this weekend.

In going for his third victory in a row Saturday night in Mustang Stadium, Weber coach Dave Arslanian also will try for a second straight win over independent Cal Poly.

The odds favor the Wildcats, who owned the Mustangs 57-3 in Ogden last year. This season, Cal Poly is winless, having lost to the Big Sky's Idaho State 35-32, and then Montana 43-0.

...But Arslanian predicts the Mustangs, marking their home opener, will give his Wildcats — ranked 17th in the Division I



AA poll this week — a stiff test.

"They lost a tough game at Idaho State to open up the year, one which they led 25-3 and eventually lost in overtime," he cautioned. "It's their first home game of the year, which should really get the pumped up."

Arslanian is especially concerned with Cal Poly's Kamui Lusk, "maybe the best receiver we face all season." Last year, Lusk caught three touchdown passes against Weber.

"We need to figure him out this week," Arslanian said.

In other games involving Big Sky schools, Northern Arizona (2-1) opens conference play at new league member Portland State (1-1); Montana State (0-1) hosts Minnesota-Duluth (0-2); Idaho State (1-1) visited by Western Montana (1-1); Southwest Texas (2-0) travels to Eastern Washington (1-3); Cal State-Sacramento (0-1) is at UC-Davis (0-1), and Cal State-Northridge (1-1) is on the road against New Mexico State (0-3).

Defending I-AA and Big Sky champion Montana (2-0) is idle this week.

NAU has never lost to FSU, leading the series 3-0. The last time the Lumberjacks beat the Vikings, though, was in 1981, winning 34-10 in Portland. This time, FSU debuts as a Big Sky member, though games it plays this season won't count in the standings.

Both teams are coming off strong showings: NAU beat Southern Utah 43-13 last week, while PSU was similarly convincing with a 25-7 win over Sonoma State.

Montana State coach Cliff Hysell looks for his first victory of 1996 within the cozy confines of Reno H. Sales Stadium, and likely will get it against winless Division II foe Minnesota-Duluth.

For the Bobcats, coming off a 31-7 thrashing at Nevada, the Bulldogs should be the balm they need so much — but Hysell takes nothing for granted.

"Minnesota-Duluth is a good football team," he insisted. "They're always big and physical... We're going to have to move the football (better)."

Getting well also is the theme in Pocatello. The Bengals come off a bye with a healthier Alfredo Anderson, their

star running back. However, he still was recovering from an ankle injury and considered questionable for Saturday's game against Western Montana, an NIAA school.

Backup Craig Joseph may start in Anderson's place.

"We needed some time off," said ISU coach Brian McNeely. "We had 31 players in the training room (Sunday) getting treatment. Alfredo did not practice last week (and) if I need to hold him (out) to get him ready for Montana State (Sept. 28), I will."

Eastern Washington, fresh from its 27-21 upset of former Big Sky power Boise State, looks to get a winning streak going. Eagles coach Mike Kramer likes his chances with former walk-on Harry Leons proving a gem of a quarterback.

Utes wary of struggling FSU Packers' running back looks to hang on to another 4-year streak

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Fresno State is winless, and coming off a bye week after a 62-0 rout by Auburn. Fresh meat for a Utah program on a roll, right?

Wrong, insists Utes coach Ron McBride. "They got embarrassed the week before (and) that program has a lot of pride," he said of Saturday night's dash with the Bulldogs in Rice Stadium. "(Coach) Jim Sweeney is not going to lose again if he has his way."

For FSU (0-2), the time off was salve for both wounded pride and bruised bodies. Once more, the Bulldogs are thinking of winning and averaging Utah's 25-21 come-from-behind victory last year.

"We needed (the bye) after getting beat so badly," Sweeney said. "That can happen to any team that goes to the deep south."

"We needed time to get over the physical pounding that we took." But if McBride's players (2-1 overall, 1-0 in the Western Athletic Conference) have been listening, the Bulldogs will get more of the same this weekend.

"We have to really prepare ourselves and be ready to go," he said. "I know what their mentality is right now, and that worries me."

In a 21-17 win at Southern Methodist last week, the Utes rallied after giving up the lead in the fourth quarter. Then Utah's

secondary had to survive four straight SMU passes into the end zone as time ran out.

"It was dog-eat-dog the whole game," McBride said. "(But) we were three-for-three in the red zone, so it appears we have put that problem behind us."

One reason: Senior quarterback Mike Fouts, who was 22-of-29 for 220 yards and three touchdowns to earn WAC Offensive Player of the Week honors.

Fouts has yet to be intercepted this season, and currently is hitting 62 percent of his passes. Rocky Henry (eight catches and one TD against SMU) and Kevin Dyson (five receptions, one touchdown) are Fouts' favorite targets.

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — Based on his track record, Green Bay's halfback Edgar Bennett might cough up the football again in the year 2000.

His lost fumble against San Diego last Sunday was his first in four years and 726 carries.

Nobody was more stunned than Bennett when the ball popped out after he was drilled by safety Kevin Ross following a 13-yard run in the fourth quarter of Green Bay's 42-10 rout. "That's not supposed to happen to me," said Bennett, who hadn't lost a fumble since his rookie year in 1992, a span of 63 games.

"I'm never due. He just got me," Bennett said. "He put his helmet right on the ball. I give him credit. He made a great play. I just hate the fact that I let it go." "You don't want to ever experience that. I felt like all the air had been let out of my chest, and it didn't come from the hit. It just came from the fact that I actually lost the ball," he added.

Bennett fumbled once in 316 carries last season, but he recovered it. After fumbling in a victory over Detroit on Nov. 1, 1992, Bennett was benched for two games. Then, he made his first start and rushed for 107 yards against the Bears. Although he also lost a fumble in that game, his benching left an impression on him. "I didn't lose another until Sunday."

"It hurts when you do some-

Bennett's teammates marvel at his reliability. "There's situations where they hit the ball and I don't care how tight you have it tucked, how good you protect it, it's going to come out of there," Jackson said. "This guy is unbelievable."

Cougars play host to No. 25 Ducks

FULLAMON, Wash. (AP) — What could have been a battle of the backlogs between Washington State and No. 25 Oregon was averted Thursday when Cougars starting quarterback Ryan Leaf returned to practice.

Despite their poll ranking, the Ducks (3-0) are a 2-point underdog against the Cougars (1-1) at Martin Stadium in a Pacific-10 Conference opener for both teams.

Cougars fans had a scare when Leaf limped off the practice field Wednesday after spraining his right ankle, apparently by stepping on a teammate's foot.

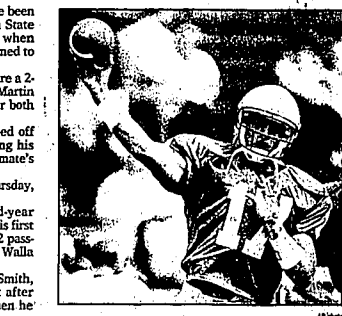
But Leaf returned to the practice field Thursday, apparently none the worse for wear. If Leaf had been unable to play, second-year freshman Steve Birnbaum would have made his first varsity start. No. 24 Washington (1-1 overall, 0-1 Pac-10) will play Arizona (2-1) in the Wildcats' conference opener Saturday at Husky Stadium.

The Huskies are 5 1/2 point favorites. Lambright's problem? Comparative scores. Washington is com-

ing off a 29-17 victory over BYU.

BYU came into Husky Stadium last Saturday with a win over Texas A&M under its belt — but Texas A&M lost to Southeastern Louisiana last week. All of a sudden, the BYU measuring stick — lost some of its credibility.

After facing Arizona State's Jake Plummer and BYU's Steve Sarkisian, two of the nation's top passers, the Huskies will go against Arizona redshirt freshman Keith Smith.

Against BYU, the Huskies jumped out to a 14-0 first-quarter lead and then, knowing Sarkisian was going to have to pass, went after the quarterback. Washington finished with eight sacks, 1/2 by redshirt freshman nose tackle Mac Tulena and three by speed pass rusher, Jason Chork.

DAVIE, Fla. (AP) — Standing at his locker, Steve Emtman fidgets and mumbles, clearly uncomfortable with the topic of conversation.

Emtman is talking about himself. "I don't want to be in the spotlight. I'm not interested in doing interviews or getting my picture in the paper. I've had enough of that stuff in my time."

But circumstances this week — specifically the NFL schedule — inevitably draw attention to the Miami Dolphins' shy defensive tackle.

Reconstructed and rejuvenated, Emtman returns to the RCA Dome in Indianapolis for Monday night's matchup of unbeaten teams. He looks forward to taking the field, where he spent little time while with the Colts.

"If I stood here and said I wasn't excited to play the Colts, I'd be lying," he says. "I've been waiting for this week to get here."

Indianapolis made Emtman the first pick in the 1992 draft, expecting him to make an impact. On Monday he'll try to do just that.

The former Outland Trophy winner played just 18 of 48 games in his three seasons with

Emtman, who lived in a hotel last year, figured he would go elsewhere in 1996. But when Jimmy Johnson replaced Shula in January, Emtman decided to remain with the Dolphins. He sold his house in Indianapolis and bought one in Davie.

"I knew I'd be given an opportunity," Emtman said.

Healthier than he's been since his rookie season, Emtman won a spot in Johnson's rotation of seven defensive linemen. At 6-foot-4 and 284 pounds, he's a big reason Miami (3-0) leads the NFL in rushing defense, allowing only 43 yards per game and 2.5 per carry.

In just three games, Emtman has been on the field for nearly as many plays as all of last season. He started the past two victories and received a game ball following Sunday's 36-27 win over the New York Jets.

Dugger, 36, said he plans to move up the Grand American Modified class next year.

• "Anyone can make a Chevrolet fast, but it takes a real die-hard to compete with a small-block Ford," Dugger said. Ford fans will be hoping he brings a fast Ford the Modified

Season finale set

Magic Valley Speedway takes a night off tomorrow, but the season finale Sept. 28 promises to be one of the best ever.

The Intermountain Short Track Championships will be held that night. The largest field of Grand American Modified cars ever assembled at the Speedway is expected, as the race will be open to cars from all over the Intermountain area. They will be competing for the largest purse in Speedway history. The Modified race cars, Pony Stocks and racing trucks also will battle for a piece of the prize pie.

• Kurt Campbell, 33, used a 1983 Ford Mustang to win the Pony Stock title on the strength of six wins and 13 top-five finishes over the 20-week Speedway season.

His Mustang is much smaller than Dugger's and is powered by a 2300-cubic-inch four-cylinder engine.

"I will be satisfied to win the Pony Stock championship," Campbell said earlier this summer. "I have no desire to race anything bigger."

When Campbell made that statement, Speedway rules allowed racers to win the division just once. The rules have changed since then to allow former winners to compete.

• Toby Stapleman used a 1974 Chevrolet Monte Carlo to win the Thunder Stock championship. These cars are required to remain almost totally in stock condition, with the addition of safety items. Stapleman is only 15 years old, and this was his first year on the track. As the Thunder Stock champion, he can no longer compete in this class, and Stapleman said he hopes to race a Pony Stock stock car next year.

"I got hooked watching from the grandstands and when I finally got to drive, it was even more fun than it looked," Stapleman said.

Kyle Petty, in addition to being the son of NASCAR's winningest driver, is one of stock car racing's most interesting personalities.

The multi-talented Petty, a third-generation driver, is also adept at organizing a charity motorcycle ride across the United States, or even writing songs and strumming the guitar.

Petty was only 19 when he made his first Winston Cup start and he was 25 when he won his first race. Prior to his Cup debut, he won an Automobile Racing Club of America (ARCA) event at Daytona the first time he ever officially competed.

Twice, in 1982 and 1993, Petty has finished as high as fifth in the season point standings. Next year he may become one of NASCAR's driver-car owners. He is departing the team of long-time car owner Felix Sabates at the end of the season.

His grandfather, Lee Petty, won his first NASCAR race in 1949. Richard Petty, Kyle's father, won for the first time in 1960 and ended up his career with 200 victories, the most in the history of the sport.

Kyle's won only eight races coming into 1995, but he had won enough money to rank 13th on the all-time list. In fact, he was only \$567,711 behind his father in career earnings despite the elder Petty's 192 more victories. Here's more about Kyle:

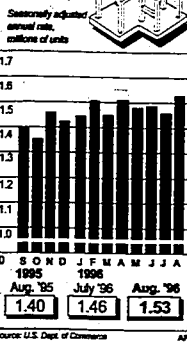
PHONE CARDS, THE NEXT GENERATION: For people who like the idea of prepaid phone cards, but who can't stand having to punch in all those numbers, help has arrived in the form of tone dialers. According to Intele-Card News, a magazine that tracks trends in the phone card business, the dialers—which actually have been available to the public for about 15 years—allow phone numbers and personal ID numbers to be quickly dialed by producing the same tones that touch-tone phones employ. Telephone card marketers have found ways to incorporate the dialers into their products, increasing the likelihood of the cards actually being used.

A HAPPY COMPANY IS A PROFITABLE COMPANY: It's a widespread belief in corporate America today that companies care less about their workers than they used to. But management consultants at Deloitte & Touche find that most of the high-level executives they surveyed recently believe there's a link between how well they treat their employees and how well their companies do. Eighty-four percent of the respondents saw a link between worker commitment and profitability, and 67 percent said their companies are making more of an effort than they were five years ago at balancing the needs of employees with those of customers and shareholders. One way to keep workers happy is to use teams in decision making, and 71 percent of the respondents said their companies use this approach.

PUTTING THE BOTTOM LINE ONLINE: Corporate annual reports often gather dust and then can't be found when you need a vital fact or figure. But if they're on the World Wide Web, it's a different story. Ink Design, a graphics art company that designs annual reports, in a survey of about 75 big U.S. firms, found half are linking their annual reports to their home pages on the Web. The companies said their financial highlights and letters to shareholders are the two most frequently viewed sections of the annual report when it's online.

Economic reports fuel jitters over new hike in interest rates

WASHINGTON (AP) — Stronger-than-expected housing starts and shrinking claims for jobless benefits bolstered arguments Thursday the Federal Reserve will boost interest rates next week to keep the economy from overheating.

Regionally, housing starts climbed 13.5 percent in the West to a 378,000 rate. They were up 7 percent in the Northeast to 138,000 and 2.8 percent in the South to 667,000. But they declined 2 percent in the Midwest to 342,000. The Commerce Department said construction of single-family homes and apartments shot up 4.5 percent in August to a seasonally adjusted 1.53 million annual rate — highest in nearly 2 1/2 years.

Analysts had expected a slight drop.

Regionally, housing starts climbed 13.5 percent in the West to a 378,000 rate. They were up 7 percent in the Northeast to 138,000 and 2.8 percent in the South to 667,000. But they declined 2 percent in the Midwest to 342,000.

At the same time, the Labor Department reported new claims for unemployment insurance dropped last week by 2,000 to 329,000 and said 7,000 fewer applications were filed the previous week than initially thought. Economist Sung Won Sohn of Norwest Corp. in Minneapolis said the reports present a strong case for higher rates as insurance against any surge in inflation.

Although he did not specify a desired growth rate, Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan told Congress this summer that unless the economy slowed soon, the central bank would be forced to raise rates.

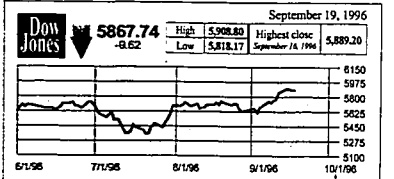
"There's a good chance they will vote to tighten by 25 basis points, but a slightly better chance they won't," contended Fannie Mae economist David Berson. "It's a close call."

Stocks struggle as data undercuts bond market

NEW YORK (AP) — Semiconductor shares rallied again, but stocks were mixed Thursday as interest rates rose once more in the bond market after a strong reading on housing construction aggravated inflation worries.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 9.62 to 5,867.74, its third straight losing session after two record highs. The retreat has amounted to less than 22 points, with many investors remaining optimistic for a run at 6,000.

Most broad-market measures turned positive after a weak start with bonds. The Nasdaq market rose for the 10th straight session, continuing its gradual crawl back toward record levels amid renewed investor interest in computer-industry shares.



Stocks initially followed bonds lower after the government reported that construction of new homes and apartments unexpectedly shot up in August to the highest level in nearly 2 1/2 years. The report was the last major economic reading before Tuesday's Federal Reserve meeting on interest-rate policy. It spurred worries that rising demand for building materials and home furnishings will pressure an already tight labor market, forcing higher payroll costs that might be passed on to consumers.

Northeast parents spend more on college tuition

WASHINGTON (AP) — Parents in the Northeast must spend more household income to send their children to in-state public colleges and universities than parents elsewhere, a federal study says.

"As a percentage of household income, tuition has doubled over the last 15 years," Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun, D-Ill., said Thursday in releasing a study she requested from the General Accounting Office, the investigative arm of Congress.

"Access to higher education is getting more and more out of reach for working and middle-class Americans," the Illinois Democrat said.

Nationally, parents spent about 9 percent of their median household income last year on in-state tuition and fees for their sons and daughters attending public four-year schools, the GAO says. That's up from 4.5 percent 15 years ago.

Average tuition as a percentage of median household income varied greatly from state to state, the report said.

For example, Hawaii's average

tuition last year was less than 4 percent of median household income in the state. Hawaii, however, recently approved an 85 percent increase for in-state, undergraduate tuition at the University of Hawaii's Manoa campus. By comparison, Vermont's average tuition for four-year public colleges and universities was more than 15 percent of median household income.

Dave Merkwitz, a spokesman for the American Council on Education, which represents higher education institutions, said he was not surprised that Northeastern states had lower rankings on the affordability scale. States in the Midwest and West have a tradition of low or no-cost public systems of higher education, while there is a greater concentration of higher-priced private schools in the Northeast, he said.

Recent cutbacks in state funding have pushed tuitions higher nationwide. But public support for colleges in the Midwest and West historically has been strong, resulting in lower tuitions, Merkwitz said.

Sanborn, portfolio manager of the Chicago-based Oakmark Fund, his highly rated fund has been struggling relative to the Standard & Poor's 500.

"While our holdings are generally reporting satisfactory to better-than-expected business results," Sanborn says in a new quarterly report to shareholders, "in total the market is not rewarding us right now for these results."

"There are going to be occasions when our holdings will be out of market favor. They are inevitable, and we will waste no time trying to anticipate market psychology."

"Rather, we will continue to spend our time trying to better

understand the businesses of which we are part owners. If the businesses prosper, so will — sooner or later — their stock."

One of the decisions fund investors must make every so often is whether and how long to stick with successful funds like this that run into cold spells.

But with all the uncertainties that can arise, advocates of stock-by-stock fundamental investing say their endeavor still is much more rational than speculation, rewarding diligent research and patience rather than luck.

"I've never known anyone successfully able to predict the market," says Ron Baron, manager of the Baron Asset Fund and Baron Growth & Income Fund in New York.

Wall Street firms debut on list for working moms

NEW YORK (AP) — The bulls and bears are starting to welcome the kids.

For the first time, two Wall Street firms — Merrill Lynch and Bankers Trust — made the Working Mother list of the best 100 companies.

The 11th annual survey by Working Mother magazine also found greater use of flexible work schedules, a wider recognition of the child-care needs of employees working at branch offices, and expanded leave benefits for new fathers and adoptive parents.

"Work-family issues are finally receiving the recognition and support they deserve from all types of companies," said Judson Culbreth, editor in chief of Working Mother.

The magazine notes that the Clinton administration has encouraged companies to provide more support for workers juggling careers and children. Vice President Al Gore, speaking at the magazine's awards breakfast in New York this morning, said that the administration would like to take the Family and Medical Leave Act even further.

In its October issue, Working Mother chooses its best companies based on pay, advancement

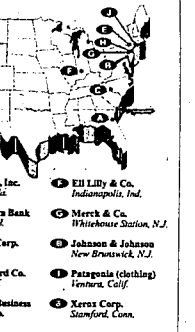

While many companies fail to offer women any paid maternity leave, the New York-based Merrill Lynch & Co., offers 13 weeks off at full pay, the most generous on the list.

New dads get five days paid leave, and the primary care giver who adopts a child gets five weeks of leave.

The financial services company, which has 39,830 employees — 42 percent female — last year instructed managers on how to make alternative schedules work.

Women managers outperform men, survey indicates

WASHINGTON (AP) — On everything from meeting deadlines to generating new ideas, female managers outperform men, a new survey indicates.

The study, by the newly formed Foundation for Future Leadership, surveyed 915 managers and the people they work with, asking them to evaluate managers on 31 skills. Women outscored men in 28 of them.

"Women should not be discriminated against as they, in fact, have the edge in terms of their effectiveness," concluded the study, released Wednesday.

The surveys were completed by 6,403 work-

ers who were asked to evaluate themselves and their peers. Women comprised about 30 percent of the managers evaluated, which is comparable to their proportion in management positions in the American work force, the study said.

Participants were given a list of behaviors and asked to rate the manager on a scale of 1 to 5.

Men scored higher than women in two areas: handling pressure and coping with frustration. Men and women tied in delegating authority.

The study found that both groups did best

in intellectual areas and worst in interpersonal fields.

While women have traditionally been recognized for strong interpersonal skills, the organization, staying on top of work, delivering projects on time and keeping commitments.

The study's authors noted that 25 of the 31 measures were statistically significant, but they cautioned that the differences between men and women were small. On average, women scored 3.64 on the 1-to-5 scale; men scored 3.54.



How to Buy a Great Used Car

- There are certain basic things you should look for when you examine a car.
1. Find out the previous owner's name.
 2. Automatic Transmission fluid should be pink and not smell burnt.
 3. Coolant shouldn't be rusty and no green stains on the radiator.
 4. No oil spots around the engine.
 5. Look for rust, especially in the trunk, wheel wells and rocker panels under the doors.
 6. Look for new wheels, ripply body work, panels that don't match.
 7. Unseen fire wear may mean an alignment problem.
 8. Make sure the car comes with a usable jack and lug wrench.
 9. To check shocks and suspension push down and quickly release each corner of the car. It should not bounce more than 2 times.
 10. Seats shouldn't be saggy or ripped. Make sure belts and controls work.

North-South did well to reach today's excellent diamond slam. But South failed to make it. He played for a heart distribution he thought he wanted, only to discover he should have played for one he didn't want.

Dummy's club ace won and South's top trump failed to stop the queen. South's only chance now was to find good luck in dummy's heart suit. How should he play the suit?

South tried the same procedure in hearts as he did in diamonds. He cashed his heart king and led another heart to dummy's ace. East's discard bringing moans from South. The defenders were due a heart, a trump and a club, and the slam went two down.

"Perhaps East's pre-empt should have warned the suit would break badly," lamented South.

"Maybe so," replied North. "But why didn't you make a play that would win instead of one certain to lose?"

North's criticism was just. When South played for a 2-2 split in hearts, he was playing for a combination that could not win. Had they split 2-2, South would not have lost a heart trick but he would have surely lost a trump and a club.

South's only hope was to find West with Q-x-x in hearts. To succeed, South should have cashed his heart king and finessed to dummy's jack. Then the ace and another heart would have provided for a club discard and the declarer would have taken only one trick.





Fox serves up 'Pretty Poison' in remake of 1960s thriller

In 1968, a psychological thriller titled "Pretty Poison," starring Anthony Perkins and Tuesday Weld, jarred moviegoers with its unusual insight into the human psyche.

Executive producer Lawrence Turman ("The Graduate," "The River Wild") made the film after reading the novel "She Let Him Continue" by Stephen Keller. The screenplay was a New York Film Critics Award in 1968.

"It was an unusually strong story," Turman says. "People are not what they seem."

On Tuesday, Sept. 24, a new version of "Pretty Poison," also produced by Turman, airs on Fox.

The television version stars Grant Show ("Melrose Place") as recently released psy-

chiatric inmate Dennis Pitt.

Wendy Benson ("Beverly Hills, 90210") plays Sue-Ann Stepanek, a pretty high-school cheerleader whom Dennis wants to date.

In this off-key variation of boy-meets-girl, the socially awkward Dennis spins a tale of mystery and intrigue to impress Sue-Ann.

The seemingly innocent cheerleader takes the bait, but as their relationship evolves, it becomes evident that she may be even more mentally imbalanced than he is.

"You don't really know what she's up to until the end of the third act, until the end of the first hour," says David Burton Morris, director of Fox's "Pretty Poison."

"That's where the twist is. If you remember the original film,

you kind of think she's being stalked by Dennis and that she's in danger. It turns out that he's the guy that should be watching his butt, because she's got a lot of things in store for this guy."

The audience is at first concerned for Sue-Ann's safety, as the slightly weird Dennis pursues her.

But gradually, Sue-Ann's psychopathic personality emerges and the audience eventually sees Dennis as the victim.

"Dennis is a sensitive, wounded person who is very needy, and who accidentally did something in his past that he has paid dearly for," Turman says.

Conversely, Sue-Ann appears undamaged and innocent.

"Pretty Poison" also stars Lyane Thigpen as Dennis' parole officer and Michelle

Phillips as Sue-Ann's mother. The roles were originally played by John Randolph and Beverly Garland, respectively.

Turman says the environmental concerns arising from Dennis' employment at a New England chemical plant play a larger part in the new version of "Pretty Poison."

"The environmental issues and sexual overtones are dealt with in a little better fashion in the '90s than in the '60s," he says.

Turman wanted to remake the film for two reasons: to explore the environmental issues with a little more depth, and to take advantage of today's less puritanical Hollywood to show how the couple's sexual-relationship plays into Sue-Ann's subtle manipulation of Dennis.

Q: I've always admired Elizabeth Berkley. Does she have anything new coming out? And are she and Grey Adams still together? —P.J.

A: If you have HBO, you might have seen Rossellini, 44, in "Crime of the Century" earlier this month as Anna Hauptmann, the wife of Bruno Hauptmann, the man convicted for the kidnapping of the Lindbergh baby.

She had serious moral concerns about taking the role, figuring that she had to know for sure whether Hauptmann was guilty or innocent before appearing in a film that took a stand on the issue. It was actor Alan Rickman ("Sense and Sensibility") who sealed it for her.

"He told me that the actor's art is storytelling; you don't have to decide innocent or guilty," she says. "Still, it would have been difficult for me to do anything that fabricated anything. This movie didn't."

The New York-based actress turns down roles that would take her too far from her 13-year-old daughter and adopted 3-year-old son. That wasn't the case with her next two films: "Big Night," just released, and the upcoming "The Funeral." She's also writing a book, due out next year.

Regarding her romantic life, she bristles when discussing Oldman, whom she met when they co-starred in "Immortal Beloved" two years ago. The two are still in contact but seem to be going

through some difficulty at the moment.

Q: What's happening with Richard Dean Anderson of the "MacGyver" series? He would be great in a romantic movie. —D.L.

A: Anderson, 46, would be great in more MacGyvers, according to ABC, which aired the series for seven seasons and then produced two TV movies starring the character; Anderson says he isn't interested. Instead, he stars in an NBC miniseries, starting Nov. 3, called "Pandora's Box," in which he plays an airline captain who must cope with a crisis in the air.

Q: My friend says that Jane Seymour's only children are the twins she recently had. Another friend says she has none. How many children does she have? —R.P.

A: Four. Her twins with fourth husband James Keach, John and Kristopher, will be 1 year old on Nov. 30. Seymour, 46, also has two children with former husband David Fyzn, Katie, 14, and Sean, 11.

Q: Does Woody Allen have any new movies coming out? —O.J.

A: The prolific director

always has a new movie coming out. His next, "Everyone Says I Love You" is due for release in December. It features, as usual, a top-drawer cast, in this case Goldie Hawn, Julia Roberts, Tim Roth, Drew Barrymore, Alan Alda and Allen.

But there are two differences from his usual efforts: This one's a musical, so you'll hear him and the other cast members singing. And he's wrapping out of his beloved New York to shoot other scenes in Venice and Paris.

His next film, so far un-titled and set to start shooting soon in New York, will star Demi Moore and Julia Louis-Dreyfus.

Being busy is a good thing: expatriate life. Farrow is writing a book about her life due out next spring, and Allen's involvement with her adopted daughter Soon-Yi Previn and their subsequent court custody battles over their adopted children and natural son, Satchel, will undoubtedly get a great deal of space.

Q: Whoever happened to Sarah Brightman, who starred in "Titanic of the Opera"? Is she still

performing? —M.S.

A: She is still performing, but mostly on her home turf, England. These days, although she does come over from time to time for a concert, Brightman, who got her biggest career boost from then-husband composer Andrew Lloyd Webber when he insisted that she star in the Broadway production of "Phantom," clearly maintains a good professional relationship with him. She's been performing a concert of his songs.

Q: I love Janeane Garofalo in "The Larry Sanders Show." Will she be on again next season? —G.W.

A: The almost 32-year-old actress (her birthday is Sept. 28) will be back with Gary Stouffer this season but only on a couple of episodes. The reason is her blossoming film career. She just finished filming the movie "Sweetheart," is currently shooting "Copland" with Sylvester Stallone and Robert De Niro and moves next to "Romy and Michelle's High School Reunion," co-starring Lisa Kudrow of "Friends."

Garofalo is also investigating the possibility of doing a radio talk show, just like her character in the comedy "The Truth about Cats and Dogs." Q: Who is the guy on the Infiniti commercials? —D.E.

A: The actor in those moody, stylish ads is Jonathan Pryce, a 49-year-old Welshman best known for his controversial but Tony-winning role as the Eurasian pimp in the Broadway hit "Miss Saigon." (The Actors Equity union objected to a non-Asian playing the part.)

Pryce has a distinguished career onstage and in film (among his credits: HBO's "Barbarians at the Gate" and "Glenngary Glen Ross"), but he is best known in this country for the ads, something that he's had to defend back home in England, even though the ads aren't shown there. "It wouldn't be such a prestigious thing to do in England," he says. "(But) the advertisements were not damaged by credibility as an actor. If anything, they've enhanced it."

Last year, he won the prestigious Best Actor prize at the Cannes Film Festival for his role as the libertine writer Lytton Strachey in "Carrington." This December, he'll be on widespread display when he co-stars opposite Madonna and Antonio Banderas in "Evita" as Juan Peron. He also begins filming the Biblical movie "David" with Leonard Nimoy this fall.

Q: A friend says that Judith Light, who's played Angela on "Who's the

Boss?" and Tracy Wiliams, the host on ice skating specials, are sisters. Is this true? —M.K.

A: If so, it's news to Light, 47. Watch for the busy actress in a new TV movie, "Murder at My Door," airing Oct. 8, another upcoming TV movie called "Dead Giveaway" and one that just finished filming called "Snakes and Ladders," in which she plays the mother of a disabled child; Christopher Reeve has a cameo appearance.

Q: Robert De Niro always plays such strange roles, so I was wondering what kind of father he would make. Does he have kids? —P.L.

A: From all reports, De Niro, 53, is more of an involved father than one might think. And he does have kids, under several different circumstances. He and ex-wife Diahnne Abbott have a son, Raphael, 18; he also adopted her daughter, Drena, 27.

And, in a most unusual situation, he and ex-companion Toukie Smith, a New York restaurateur and former model, have twin sons, Aaron and Julian, born in October last year. De Niro fathered them with a surrogate mother four years after he and Smith ended their relationship.

The two have shared custody, but recent reports have surfaced that there are tensions between them over the extent of his visitation rights and the amount of his support payments.

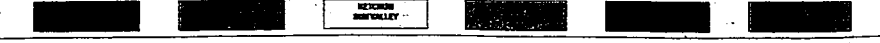

Vulgarity reigns in 2 new sitcoms, 'Men Behaving Badly' and 'Townies'

Do you remember tastelessness?

It's in short supply in two sitcoms debuting Wednesday night, NBC's "Men Behaving Badly" and ABC's "Townies." Both series come from the Carsey-Werner Co., producers of "Roseanne," "Grace Under Fire" and "3rd Rock From the Sun." Both new series focus on young adults and sexual attitudes. Both shows want to get frisky. Immediately.

Now "Frasier" or "Seinfeld" can address a sexual plot with wit, class, understatement. Who can forget the "Seinfeld" master of your domain "episode? But "Men Behaving Badly" and "Townies" are determined to flash their naughty bits without blushing. Oh, for some restraint.

"Men Behaving Badly" opens as roommates Jamie (Rob Schneider of "Saturday Night Live") and Kevin (Ron Eldard of "ER") compare driving a car to making love to a woman.

The show clearly has one thing on its mind. The men find the belongings of a new female neighbor. The goofy Jamie goes to a job interview and blathers on about the prospective employer's daughter being "hot." Kevin burns his contraceptives to prove to longtime love Sarah (Justine Bateman of "Family Ties") that he's ready to have children.

Of course, the over-grown boy is not. The show is determined to prove a point, made by the female narrator, that "men are dogs. They just are." (The show airs at 9:30 p.m.)

"Men Behaving Badly," which is based on a

British comedy of the same name, dramatizes the men's loutish behavior in vivid ways. Unable to find a coffee filter, Jamie picks up underwear from the floor and puts it to use. A neighbor praises the brew as being "very earthy."

"A program called 'Women Behaving Badly' would probably never fly on broadcast TV, but the NBC sitcom proceeds on the male-bashing route without apologies.

The female neighbor, shocked to learn that Jamie has gone through her belongings, tells him, "You couldn't get any lower."

He happily responds, "You don't know me." But how many people want to? The show reduces its male characters to dense gooblers, limiting the series' potential for growth.

"Married... With Children" helped push network television down the road to coarseness. By applying the vulgar "Friends" formula to the "Men Behaving Badly" could become another hit for NBC. But it's not the kind of show that makes you feel good about television or comedy. NBC is stooping to the Fox trough of humor.

That said, I have to acknowledge that Eldard and Schneider perform with energy and that Bateman plays the sensible girlfriend with charm. If only she could

migrate over to the farther competition on ABC. "The Drew Carey Show."

Wednesday's premiere of "Men Behaving Badly" concludes, in the gutter naturally, with the guys talking about sperm banks. Next week, the men date tire models, one of whom announces, "I know what it's like to be in a monogamous relationship. My boyfriend is married."

The train of thought on "Men Behaving Badly" is headed in one direction. You have been warned.

"Townies," a slack show about slackers, comes with a warning as well. This alleged sitcom should not be in the family hour, but the powers at ABC have put it there anyway (at 8:30 p.m.). Red alert, parents.

Three twentysomething pals, waitresses all in a New England town, talk a little too freely about sex. Carrie (Molly Ringwald) learns that good-time gal Shannon (Jenna Elfman) has spent the night with a man.

Carrie: "You're such a slut."
Shannon: "I'm not a slut. I'm just a quick judge of character."

Wonder what Walt Disney would make of that?

Carrie and Shannon are to be bridesmaids in the wedding of Denise (Lauren Graham), who has decided to marry the father of her baby. (She

tears off her wedding gown for a nurse.)

But Denise spends most of her time fretting that her brother will sleep with Shannon and later finds them in a suggestive embrace. Denise and Shannon have a falling out, but Carrie saves the day with some unorthodox detective work.

"Townies" also sets fit to make light of religion. Carrie's devoutly Catholic ma announces, "I don't know where I'd be without the church." Carrie shouts back: "Divorced and happy."

The show is offensive, but it's so flatly performed that you sit there wondering how it wound up on the ABC schedule.

The actors don't have a chance. Though she resembles the young Carol Burnett, Ringwald seems to have no comic talent. As the bride, Graham is shrill. The fetching Elfman may be a star, but she has to demean herself at every turn as man-hungry Shannon. (In an upcoming show, her character chases college men.)

At Wednesday's fade-out, a male pal tells Carrie, "We're like two characters trapped in some absurdist play."

Absurd is right. Why can't TV comedy have more class? You expect more from Carsey-Werner, ABC and NBC.

They've taken the low road in a show called "Companies Behaving Badly."

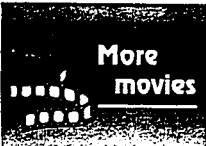

'Ellen' sparks controversy

Big, fat TV season! Forty new fall shows to binge on!

Yet upstaging them all is a 2-year-old renegade, a series distinguished up to now by its utter lack of distinction. Now, perhaps, this lost soul of a sitcom is poised not only to find itself but to break new ground on the television landscape.

Don't look for any bombshells on "Ellen" when it begins its fourth season on ABC at 8 p.m. EDT.

Any upheavals that may await what is suddenly TV's most talked-about series remain just talk—talk triggered by a TV Guide report last week that the sitcom's title character, Ellen Morgan, just might declare herself a lesbian before the season is over.

Will it really happen? The series' producers and star Ellen DeGeneres are lobbying for the character to come out of the closet, according to the TV Guide story (which appears in next week's issue). Folks at the Walt Disney Co.—which both produces "Ellen" and owns ABC—aren't commenting.

In short, this is shaping up as the Hollywood equivalent of a Washington trial balloon. You know, where you're a politician with a proposal you want to try out on the public, so you leak it to the press, which reports how "insiders" say you're pondering a certain course of action, whereupon you refuse to comment while watching to see how the idea plays.

Whether or not folks at "Ellen" or Disney strategically fed the story to TV Guide, you can bet that the news items are tuned in to the ensuing debate—and that the public reaction will influence "Ellen's" fate.

Oddly enough, this could take some of the heat off Steven Bochco and his upcoming comedy

"Public Morals" which is about a squad of rambly-talking vice-squad detectives and has already stirred up a fuss. A Wednesday show whose premiere date CBS has not yet announced, "Morals" is in the Bochco tradition of pushing to in a more adult direction—while making the most of the controversy.

Every viewer recalls how months before the Fall 1993 premiere of another Bochco series, he described "NYPD Blue" as "TV's first R-rated show." The next thing you knew, a Tupelo, Miss., minister-activist had branded the show, sight unseen, "soft-core porn." He pledged that, with his supporters, he would agitate it, "NYPD Blue" would last "six to eight weeks, max."

Now the Rev. Donald Wildmon is back. Within hours of the "Ellen" story breaking last Friday, his American Family Association issued a statement in which he blasted Disney, threatened an advertiser boycott and declared this "troubling moment in network programming."

Troubling, sure, if you are troubled by a network series identifying its central character, however benignly, as a homosexual. And if you regard that character's presence on the airwaves as tantamount to social engineering by the media.

In any case, as more and more gay characters find audience acceptance in the supporting casts of series, "Ellen" would (in Wildmon's words) be breaking "the glass ceiling" of homosexuality on television.

Maybe it's time. And maybe "Ellen" is the perfect opportunity.

"Ellen" centers on a single woman in her mid-30s who is by turns whimsical and added, who has pals but no man in her life. Beyond that, it's hard to say what "Ellen" is about, or who Ellen Morgan is. Especially from one



year to the next. The show has been in a conceptual drift since premiering in February 1994 with another title, "These Friends of Mine," and its soon-to-be-discarded supporting cast, producers and premise. Personnel changes and creative overhauls have gone on

ever since. The biggest change of all may lie ahead: Clarifying Ellen Morgan to her viewers and herself as someone who happens to be gay. It could make "Ellen" click, at long last. It could make a rather ordinary sitcom something special.

Look good. Feel good.

Carey Lowell joins the cast of NBC's 'Law and Order'

Having grown up in Long Island, Libya, Holland, France, Virginia, Texas and Colorado, being the new kid is old hat for Carey Lowell.

As the child of an oil company geologist, "Law & Order's" newest cast member "became much more open-minded to possibilities of life and other cultures," says Lowell, who debuts on Wednesday night's seventh-season opener as assistant district attorney Jamie Ross.

The second of four daughters, Lowell lived in Holland and Libya before her 6th birthday. That kind of globe-hopping "gives you an incredible capacity to blend in and acclimate to other cultures."

Lowell will meet it at "L & O."

The longest-running drama on network TV, Dick Wolf's acclaimed NBC series is also one of the most boy-heavy. Lowell, best-known as a "Bond Girl" in "License to Kill," is one of only two major female players. (The other: S. Epatha Merkerson, L. Vanuren.)

"I'm not uncomfortable with that," says Lowell, 35, Richard Gere's girlfriend and the divorced mom of 6-year-old Hannah. Lowell says she's equally at ease with joining a show that's had more turnovers than Peppercorn Farm.

Not a single actor from the pilot is still around. (Steven Hill came aboard as D.A. Adam Schiff on the first episode.) Lowell replaces Jill Hennessy, whose Claire Kincaid was killed off in an auto-accident on the season finale. Hennessy wanted out so she could pursue a movie career.

Ironically, it was "L & O's" high turnover that attracted Lowell to her first series. "I didn't feel like I was the first newcomer entering a group that had been together for years," she says. "I felt I would be more

readily accepted in a constantly changing cast of characters."

Character-wise, Kincaid "was an extreme feminist, in a different space from the men she was surrounded by," Lowell says. Jamie Ross, a former defense shark who got tired of winning cases on technicalities for guilty clients, "is a little older. She's been around the block. She's not afraid to use her sexuality to get where she wants to go. She knows it's a playing card in her favor."

Hold on here. Ross "is no ingenue," says Wolf, "but she won't necessarily be throwing her heels up in the air. As a former defense attorney, she will do anything to win. She's the same as a prosecutor. She knows defense attorneys better than Sam does."

Sam, to "L & O" devotees, is Sam Waterston, of course. As A.D.A. Jack McCoy, his relationship with Ross will be more contentious — and less intimate — than his charged dynamic with Kincaid, according to Wolf. The new colleagues have a "junior-senior partnership" rather than a "mentor-protégé" gestalt.

As for McCoy getting up close-and-personal with Ross, don't count on it. At least in the first season. "For him to have lost his love in a tragic accident and then hop into bed with the new attorney would be in incredibly bad taste," Wolf objects.

"That doesn't mean it won't happen. I specialize in incredibly bad taste."

The debut of Bill Cosby's sitcom Monday did boffo box office for CBS.

In the national Nielsen, "Cosby" scored an impressive 17.3 rating and 27 percent-audience share — the best rating for the premiere of a new 8 p.m. series on any network since Andy Griffith's "Matlock" debuted on NBC on Sept. 23, 1986, CBS reports. (Each rating point equals 970,000

homes.)

"Cosby" was also the highest-rated 8 p.m. comedy premiere on any network since well, NBC's "The Cosby Show" on Sept. 20, 1984. (At that time, the Big 3 ruled the TV universe.) "Cosby" was up 37 percent over the premiere of Fran Drescher's "The Nanny" in the CBS slot last fall, the Eye says.

Major schedule changes at NBC-owned CNBC: Conan O'Brien's NBC "Late Night" will run at 10 p.m. weekdays on a 30-day delay beginning Dec. 2. Current occupant of the slot, Charles Grodin, moves to 11 p.m., dumping "America After Hours," with Mike Jerrick.

"This will be interesting," says O'Brien, who's scheduled at 12:35 a.m. on the Peacock. "My show has never been seen by people who are completely awake." (Roger that, Come-man.) On weekends, as of Oct. 5, yackers Cal Thomas and Al Roker will be replaced at 6:30 and 7 p.m., respectively, by "Strictly Business," with Bill Griffith and "Weekly Business," anchored by Ted Davis.

Short stuff: This just in — CBS' Mike Wallace has landed the first interview with Richard Jewell, the accused-but-never-named suspect in the Atlanta Olympics bombing. The piece, taped Tuesday at Jewell's home in Atlanta, airs Sunday on "60 Minutes." Christina Applegate of "Married ... With Children" will host the second-season premiere of Fox's "Mad TV" at 11 p.m. Saturday ... Elizabeth Dole, wife of GOP presidential wannabe Bob Dole, will make her first late-night talk show appearance Sept. 30 on Jay Leno's "Tonight Show" on NBC.
