Sewage treatment goes high-tech

Twin Falls plant 'as good as it gets' in southern Idaho

TWIN FALLS — Most folks don't know it, but the city's sewage treatment plant has gotten a nearly \$3 million face lift that will boost efficiency, reduce wear and tear on equipment and decrease pollution of the Snake River.

"This is as good as it gets in southern Idaho," said John Kenady, sewer plant manager. "Money-wise, this is one of the biggest and most effective upgrades ever done at this plant."

The plant is bristling with recently installed new equipment, including:

- \$1.78 million worth of ultraviolet lights and solid-state ballasts to kill bacteria.

- \$1.12 million worth of improvements at the plant's new headworks, where gravel, plastics and paper products are screened out before they clog pipes and run pumps.

- \$22,000 worth of improvements to the belt-press building, where water is squeezed out of treated sewage at the end of the process.

The sewer plant went on-line in 1962, said City Engineer Gary Young on a Thursday tour of the facility; before 1962, untreated sewage was flushed directly into Kock Creek.

Over the years, the sewer plant has been upgraded to keep pace with urban growth and increasingly stringent environmental standards.

For example, 176 ultraviolet lights will supplant chlorine to kill hardy bacteria that are still kicking at the end of the treatment process. For years, the city relied on chlorine to kill the bacteria, but

that led to pollution problems in the nearby Snake River — where treated water ultimately ends up.

Ultraviolet lights are becoming standard fare in sewer plants around the country, but only one other plant — in Grants Pass, Ore. — uses solid-state ballasts, or modern electrical regulating devices, similar to the ones at the Twin Falls plant. Page A2

SHE'S BACK!

Space superwoman receives hero's welcome after walking off shuttle

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Astronaut Shannon Lucid, NASA's space superwoman, returned to Earth Thursday after six debilitating months of weightlessness and to everyone's amazement, walked off the shuttle Atlantis.

Doctors met her inside the space shuttle with a stretcher, figuring the 53-year-old biochemist would be too weak and wobbly to stand, let alone walk. But she surprised them, insisting, "I can stand up."

Two workers assisted her during the short walk onto an airport-style moving sidewalk and into a reclining chair.

After a record-shattering 188 days in space — most of that time aboard the Russian space station Mir — she was thrilled to be home.

"We could hear her laughing all the way up to the flight deck. I'll tell you, she was just so tickled," said Atlantis' commander, William Readdy.

She was still laughing when she met her family a few hours later.

"It was just a great mission and I just had a great time," said Lucid, who rocketed away in March and spent a longer stretch in space than any other American and any other woman.

Lucid was welcomed back to Earth with a 30-pound box of red, white and blue M&M's from President Clinton and an offer for 188 cases of potato chips — one for every day she spent in orbit. She had craved both while living aboard Mir.

Clinton called from the Oval Office to

congratulate her. "I couldn't believe you walked off the shuttle," he said.

Lucid, who traveled 75 million miles and circled the Earth 3,008 times, faces weeks of rehabilitation to recover from the effects of prolonged weightlessness, which include weak muscles, fatigue, vertigo, anemia and deteriorating bones.

Anti-drug campaign targets 'meth' use in Great Plains

4 mountain states included on list

WASHINGTON — Methamphetamine used to be the drug of West Coast motorcyclists gangs.

Now its use has exploded in the small cities and rural areas of the Great Plains, cooked up in mom-and-pop labs.

Attorney General Janet Reno announced steps Thursday to stop the methamphetamine problem in the Midwest, before it "sweeps across the country."

U.S. attorneys in 14 states will coordinate the effort, which will focus on public

education, improved sharing of intelligence on drug traffickers, and training of local law enforcement officials.

The 14 targeted states are Minnesota, Wisconsin, North Dakota, South Dakota, Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Illinois, Nebraska, Iowa and Utah.

The campaign comes as the Clinton administration is under attack from Republicans for a nationwide rise in drug use among teenagers. Reno also urged Congress to stiffen penalties for methamphetamine trafficking and crack down on chemical suppliers.

Since 1992, methamphetamine-related arrests have tripled in the Midwest and Rocky Mountain region, according to the Drug Enforcement Administration. There were 457 such arrests in 1995, and 356 this year.

Senate sustains veto of late abortion ban

Backers vow issue will remain alive

WASHINGTON — The Senate upheld President Clinton's veto of legislation that for the first time in two decades would have made a form of abortion illegal.

But supporters of the ban on so-called partial late abortions vowed Thursday to keep the issue alive during the election campaign.

After a wrenching debate, the Senate voted 57-41 to override the president's veto of the bill banning the late-term abortion procedure, falling nine votes short of the two-thirds majority needed.

"The most anti-choice Congress in his-

tory tried to hand a pro-choice president an embarrassing defeat less than six weeks before election day. Their campaign failed," said Kate Michelman of the National Abortion and Reproductive Rights Action League.

But abortion opponents said they had struck a political nerve that would continue to be felt.

"This will immediately become one of the most powerful issues of the fall election," said Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss.

The narrow defeat "underscores the importance of turning out in large numbers in November," said Ralph Reed of the Christian Coalition.

Clinton vetoed the ban in April on the grounds that, while it allowed for exceptions when the mother's life was at risk, it contained no exception to protect the mother's health.

Ethics panel widens probe of speaker's college course

WASHINGTON — The House ethics committee voted unanimously Thursday to expand an investigation of Speaker Newt Gingrich, to include whether he provided "accurate, reliable and complete information" to the committee on the college course he taught.

Reading the carefully worded text of the committee statement, Rep. Pat Schroeder, D-Colo., offered her transition: "That says they think he lied," she said.

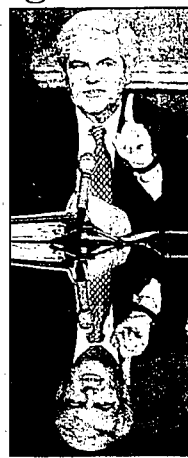
In a case stepped in election-year politics, the subcommittee running the probe said it also will examine whether Gingrich used resources of a private, tax-exempt foundation for official purposes — strictly prohibited by House rules.

In the last two weeks, Democrats have denounced Gingrich as unethical and demand that the committee release a summary of evidence prepared by James M. Cole, the outside counsel hired for the investigation. The summary was not released.

The expanded inquiry will attempt to learn whether Gingrich "provided accurate, reliable and complete information" in several areas regarding his Renewing American Civilization course.

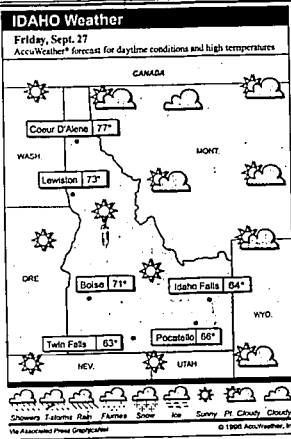
These include the relationship between a Gingrich-led political action committee, GOPAC, and the course, and the role of the Progress and Freedom Foundation.

The foundation is a tax-exempt think tank that received donations for the course. A complaint filed in September 1994 with the ethics committee contended the course was part of GOPAC's regular political operation, not a legitimate educational activity.

WEATHER FACTS You know them as high and low pressure areas, but scientists know them as cyclones or anticyclones. Either way, they tell the future for weather forecasting. The word cyclone comes from a Greek word "kyklos," or circle. Air flowing in a cyclonic system moves clockwise, forming a low-pressure system. When the air flows counterclockwise, a high-pressure system is present.

Both systems can be small and uneventful or large and life threatening.

ACROSS THE NATION

Flash floods, tornadoes strike Oklahoma, Arkansas

The Associated Press Storms ripped through the Midwest on Thursday, where flash flooding drowned three people in Oklahoma.

A tornado touched down at an Arkansas elementary school with a few children on the playground. No one was hurt.

The storms dumped up to a half-foot of rain on Oklahoma and left a trail of rising creeks, stalled vehicles, evacuated homes and school closings.

A van was washed off a highway near Tahlequah, killing the mother who was driving and her 3-year-old daughter. Her year-old son who was in the van was missing. In Pryor, where 5.85 inches of rain sent the local park's creek over its banks, a woman drowned while walking to work, police said.

In Lavaca, Ark., near the Oklahoma border, a tornado hit without warning, damaging buildings at Lavaca Elementary School. Students already were dismissed for teacher-parent conferences, which were canceled. A few students were on the playground, but they were not hurt.

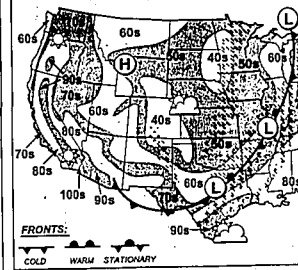
In Mulvener, Ark., 100 miles east, another storm resulted in numerous injuries, mostly cuts and scrapes, hospital officials said.

Many rivers across southern and central Missouri also were overflowing. Springfield, Mo., reported 2.7 inches of rain, breaking its record of 1.94 inches of the day set in 1935.

The same storm system created widespread snow showers across the Rocky Mountains of Wyoming and Colorado, and spread into the Black Hills of South Dakota. Winter Park, Colo., west of Denver, recorded 6 inches of snow in 24 hours.

Russia 'on edge of abyss,' security chief says

MOSCOW — With President Boris Yeltsin ill and on the sidelines, security chief Alexander Lebed took center stage Thursday and declared that Russia has reached "the edge of the abyss" with a military on the verge of revolt, nuclear reactors threatening to leak radiation and the national leadership in paralysis.

Lebed spoke for an hour at a press conference, hardly mentioning Yeltsin while describing the state of Russia in apocalyptic terms. Although Lebed has often espoused similar stark warnings in the past, his appearance underscored his determination to exploit the power vacuum left by Yeltsin's hospitalization for plans he has set out.

Isidore gains hurricane strength but may never threaten any land

MIAMI (AP) — Hurricane Isidore formed far away in the Atlantic and its winds strengthened to 100 mph on Thursday, though it may never threaten any land.

At 9 p.m. EDT, the hurricane was centered about 990 miles west of the Cape Verde Islands off western Africa.

Continued from A1 Falls facility. The upshot, Young said, "is that we can vary the intensity of the light to suit the flow." Monitoring equipment will determine how much of an ultraviolet flash is needed to sterilize water flowing through the system; extremely turbid water requires more of a blast than clear water.

The new ultraviolet system soon will face its final 14-day performance test, Young said. The new headworks aren't nearly as high-tech but are very basic as essential for trouble-free sewage treatment in years to come. The old headworks were designed to handle peak flows of about 8 million gallons per day, but the city has grown to the point where peak flows can hit 11 million gallons per day.

Babbitt delays river safeguard

The Associated Press Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt has postponed his trip to Phoenix next week to sign a measure that would change the operation of Glen Canyon Dam.

Another date had not been scheduled as of Thursday. Babbitt was expected to sign changes in the way Glen Canyon Dam is operated to protect portions of the Colorado River that flow through the Grand Canyon.

Babbitt also was scheduled to release a full scientific analysis of a man-made flood through the canyon this spring. In March, four giant tubes were opened at the base of the Glen Canyon Dam, releasing a torrent of water from Lake Powell. The goal was to help restore natural conditions.

THE CANDIDATES

BILL CLINTON: Signed a bill declaring an end to "drive-thru deliveries" by allowing new mothers and their babies to stay in the hospital for at least two days. "This law is common sense, and now it is the law of the land," he said at the White House.

BOB DOLE: Challenged Clinton to pull the plug on television ads that accuse him of trying to cut Medicare. "Why don't you tell the truth, Mr. President?" Dole asked at a retirement home in West Palm Beach, Fla.

AJ GORE: Said at the White House that the signing of the hospital-stay bill, which passed with bipartisan support, was "a victory of reason over partisanship."

JACK KEMP: Said the Dole-Kemp message will get out the word that Clinton is not good news from the American people. But he playfully declined a suggestion to go across the street from a rally in Billings, Mont., and try to convert the Clinton supporters who gathered to counter his visit.

Continued from A1 She could be dragging for months to come. Unaccustomed to the pull of gravity, she said she felt heavy, but noted that was normal. She also was wobbly, almost falling over when she got up from a chair at NASA crew quarters. She grabbed a table to steady herself. "It will take just a little bit to get fully adapted back to living in one-G (gravity) again," the president said.

CNN-USA Today-Gallup found the presidential race tightening a bit in the past week, with Clinton at 49 percent, Dole at 39 percent and Perot at 6 percent. A week earlier, it had been Clinton 55, Dole 37 and Perot 4. Each result was subject to sampling error of plus or minus 4 percentage points. Former Colorado Gov. Dick Lamm, who lost to Perot for the Reform Party nomination in August, said he holds no grudges and his former rival should get a chance to debate Clinton and Dole. "He's talking more about the future of the country than the other two candidates put together," Lamm said in a telephone interview.

Beaming, she gave a thumbs-up and shook hands with astronaut Carl Walz seated beside her. "She was like a space superwoman," Walz said. Lucid will make the final leg of her journey, home to Houston. Her return promised to meet her there. "You've given us all a great deal to be proud of and a lot of thrills, and we're glad you're home safe and sound," the president said.

Lucid rocketed away March 22 to the Mir station, expecting a 41-month mission and an early August homecoming. But booster rocket problems and two hurricanes delayed the shuttle's trip to get her, leaving her in orbit an extra seven weeks. NASA Administrator Daniel Goldin said Lucid "never, never flinched once" despite all the setbacks.

"This is a tough, brilliant, determined human being," Goidin said. "She's my hero." She's also Frito-Lay Co.'s hero. She expressed a desire for potato chips and other junk food while in orbit, so the Texas company offered her a truckload and threw in 188 cases to the charity of her choice. The Coca-Cola Co. also got into the act.

Agents, aliens skeptical of reforms

Say beefing up Border Patrol won't keep away illegals

McAlLEN, Texas (AP) — It's 7:30 on a weeknight in this town along the Mexican border, and while most families are clearing away the dinner dishes, Ramon de Anda and Leo Laurel are leaving for work.

Armed with flashlights and binoculars, pistols and handcuffs, the two men hop in a Ford Bronco and head toward the dimming sun.

"I'm ready to rock 'n' roll!" hoots De Anda, who at 42 has been a Border Patrol agent for 13 years. He has been back in the field for only four months now, after eight years preparing cases against aliens and smugglers.

At 51, Laurel is the veteran of the pair. He has worked all of his 27 years with the Border Patrol on the line, as it's called, and grows sarcastically at his partner's enthusiasm.

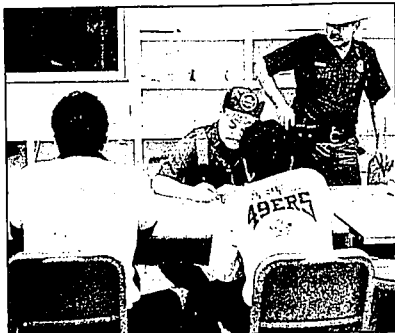
"When I was at his time in, I thought I could change the world," Laurel says. "Now I see the reality."

As Congress finishes work on legislation that would nearly double the size of the Border Patrol to about 10,000 agents and speed the deportation of aliens, law officers on the front line doubt the extra manpower will stop the men and women they see every night from illegally entering the United States.

"They could put a million agents on the border, and it wouldn't stop immigration," Laurel says. "It's an economic thing. They've got nothing to lose."

Even De Anda, the optimist, agrees that this latest effort won't work. The main problem is that the legislation lacks new sanctions against U.S. employers who hire illegals, he says.

"That's what they're coming for. They'll get a dishwashing job that pays more than a high-tech job in Mexico," he says. "You can catch illegal immigrants all day long and take them back, but they're going to keep on trying. What's better than the land of milk and honey?"

The Bronco lurches along a levee running parallel to the Rio Grande, which apart from the Border Patrol serves as the only barrier between Mexico and the United States. On the horizon, the lights of Reynosa, Mexico, guide the agents as the sun sets.

De Anda turns off the engine along a bluff and grabs a pair of binoculars. He and Laurel descend, wading through the mesquite, and reach a clearing next to the river where the water

is about 50 feet wide.

De Anda scans the riverbank on the Mexican side and spots a pile of driftwood stacked neatly, waiting to be used as a ferry to freedom. The spot is a popular crossing point for drug smugglers and aliens.

"It's actually pretty peaceful out here right now," Laurel says. "Sometimes it's real peaceful — sometimes."

Tonight, the action is elsewhere. Back in the truck, the radio crackles with voices of

other agents reporting hits on sensors hidden to detect movement. De Anda and Laurel go off to help their colleagues with the paperwork.

At a cramped processing station in Hidalgo, a tiny town just south of McAllen and an international bridge, 10 illegal immigrants file through the door. One is a woman, the rest are men and boys.

One by one they sit before an agent and answer the questions, familiar to most: name, age, city of residence, why they are here — the latter more rhetorical than anything else, because the agents already know the illegals are here for the jobs.

For Jorge Nunez Rodriguez, the process is hardly daunting. At 17, he estimates he has crossed the border illegally at least 100 times, and he started only two years ago.

A resident of Reynosa, he crosses over to work at a used clothing store in McAllen where he makes \$30 a day, a rich man's salary compared with the \$5 a day most laborers earn in Reynosa, if they can find work.

Rodriguez has heard about the proposed law to get tougher on illegal immigrants. "Laws or no laws," he says, "I'm still coming over."

Reymundo Sanchez feels the same. Sanchez, 30, who also lives in Reynosa, says he hasn't been able to find work there in four months. With two small children and a wife to feed, he decided to try his luck in the United States.

He says he is less afraid of the law here than he is of starving back in Mexico.

"It's a terror being over there because you can feel the death when your children are asking you for food and you have none," he says. "I can take the hunger. My wife can take it, too, but the kids can't."

"I don't care if they put soldiers on the border; hunger would still make me cross." With the processing complete, the immigrants file out toward the international bridge, and the agents watch as they walk home. For Laurel, it's a frustrating way to end a day.

"There's no sense of accomplishment," he says. "They'll be back tomorrow."

Clinton administration has cut Customs force

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Customs Service, which protects America's borders from illegal drugs, money and weapons, has quietly cut 662 investigative jobs and brought thousands fewer criminal cases since President Clinton took office, records show.

The cuts occurred even though Congress has increased the agency's overall budget by \$121 million since 1992, and politicians everywhere are clamoring for tighter border controls.

Big-crime cities such as Los Angeles, New Orleans, New York and Miami have taken some of the largest hits, according to documents obtained by The Associated Press.

The agency says the personnel cuts were necessary to free up money to modernize dilapidated equipment and bolster Southwest border patrols — and that it is now more efficient despite less manpower.

"I would say between '92 and now, because of our sophistication, that we are better able to protect our borders — with the caveat that we have less people," Customs Director of Operations Connie Fenchel said. "We are doing do better with less, but we could do very well more."

Not everyone agrees that the borders are now better protected, and they are upset by the personnel cutbacks.

"The agents are very concerned and know it was a mistake. They're

saying it's hampering the fight against the drug cartels," said Rep. Spencer Bachus, R-Ala., chairman of a House Banking subcommittee that recently heard complaints from front-line agents.

Statistics show Customs is securing a larger percentage of federal convictions, but its overall number of cases — particularly those in federal court — has dropped by thousands over the last three years.

The disclosure comes at a sensitive time for the Clinton adminis-

tration as Republican Bob Dole sharpens his attacks on the president's drug interdiction efforts.

The picture for Customs' field agents, however, isn't likely to improve any time soon. A memo from Customs headquarters this month instructed field supervisors to freeze current investigative staffs, and leave vacant positions unfilled for the foreseeable future.

Kevoorkian can carry concealed weapon

PONTIAC, Mich. (AP) — Dr. Jack Kevoorkian, fearing "right-wing nuts," has obtained a permit to carry a concealed gun.

Ans Oakland County licensing board granted the emergency 30-day permit Tuesday after Kevoorkian passed a background check. He has assisted in at least 40 suicides since 1990 but has been

cleared all three times he stood trial.

He is also seeking a permanent permit.

Kevoorkian sought the emergency permit last Friday, the same day Larry Blakeman, 39, an Ohio man, was arrested with a gun out side the office of Kevoorkian's lawyer.

Clinton signs 48-hours bill for new moms

WASHINGTON — Declaring an end to "drive-through deliveries," President Clinton signed a bill Thursday ensuring two-day hospital stays for new mothers and their babies.

The law also bars insurers from setting separate coverage limits for mental and physical illnesses.

"This law is common sense, and now it is the law of the land," Clinton said in a Rose Garden ceremony attended by families whose stories helped spur Congress to act.

The new law also ensures that children of Vietnam veterans born with the birth defect spina bifida can get medical care and rehabilitative training through the Veterans Administration. Research has shown a link between spina bifida and exposure to Agent Orange, a chemical used in the Vietnam War.

Government lets ValuJet return to skies

WASHINGTON — ValuJet got its wings back Thursday, winning federal permission to fly again three months after the budget carrier was grounded after a deadly crash and questions about its maintenance operations.

"ValuJet has met all of the FAA's requirements and they've met all of our requirements and we've certificated them to fly," said John V. Coleman, director of the Transportation Department's Office of Aviation Analysis. He said the airline is authorized to resume service "virtually immediately."

The department said it reviewed ValuJet's management and financial condition and concluded that it has "demonstrated a positive disposition to comply with all applicable laws and regulations."

Health officials fight overuse of antibiotics

BALTIMORE — Health officials plan a radio and television campaign to fight the unnecessary use of antibiotics, which can make microbes more resistant to treatment.

The campaign, to be led by the federal Centers for Disease Control and the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials, was announced Wednesday. Organizers said they would make commercials and have health officials make guest appearances on talk shows, hoping to convince overcautious parents who often pressure doctors for drugs. They also hope to recruit medical school curricula, too.

Some bacteria that cause maladies — like pneumonia and ear and blood infections — have evolved to become resistant to the arsenal of antibiotics available to most physicians, researchers say.

Bill penalizes use of drugs on rape victims

WASHINGTON — Use of Rohypnol and other powerful tranquilizers to subdue rape victims would carry a penalty of up to 15 years in prison under legislation approved by the House on Thursday.

"We simply cannot, in good conscience, stand by and leave our wives and daughters, sisters and mothers vulnerable to these sexual predators," said Rep. Gerald Solomon, R-N.Y., the bill's sponsor. "The only way to protect them is to guarantee hard prison time for these cowards."

The measure, which has yet to be considered by the Senate, passed 421-1. It makes it a crime to possess Rohypnol and other similar "date rape drugs" with the intent to commit a violent crime, including sexual assault. The potential jail term increases to 20 years when the victim is 14 or younger.

Tracking poll finds 10-point Clinton lead

NEW YORK — A national tracking poll released Thursday found the presidential race tightening a bit in the past week, with President Clinton's reaction lead at 10 percentage points.

The rolling average of CNN-USA Today-Gallup samples from Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights gave Clinton and Al Gore 49 percent, Republicans Bob Dole and Jack Kemp 39 percent, and Reform Party candidates Ross Perot and Pat Choate 6 percent.

While not statistically different from tracking results released Tuesday and Wednesday, the new numbers did represent some narrowing of the race since the Sept. 17-19 average of 55 percent for Clinton, 34 percent for Dole and 4 percent for Perot.

The new survey interviewed 737 likely voters. Each result was subject to sampling error of plus or minus 4 percentage points.

Plagiarism charge against Grisham dropped

WASHINGTON — A plagiarism suit filed against author John Grisham by serial killer Ted Bundy's lawyer was dismissed Thursday by a federal judge who found the copyright infringement claim to be "meritless."

Willy Nelson, who wrote "Defending the Devil: My Story as Ted Bundy's Last Lawyer," had submitted a lengthy list of "striking similarities" with the Grisham best-seller, "The Chamber."

Klaas' killer receives death penalty

Faces off with girl's father over abuse allegation

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — Polly Klaas's murderer was sentenced to death Thursday, moments after outraging her family by claiming the 12-year-old girl told him just before she died that her father molested her.

"Burn in hell, Davis!" Marc Klaas cried out, lunging at Richard Davis after Davis made his shocking allegation. Klaas was led from the courtroom by officers.

Addressing the court before formal sentencing, Davis was talking about problems in his interrogation when he said, "The main reason I know I did not attempt any lewd act that night was because of the young girl made to me while walking up the embankment: 'Just don't do me like my Dad.'"

Outside the courtroom later, Klaas called Davis' statement a "vile and sinister and evil act."

"I don't for a moment regret my response," Klaas said. "I only regret my words. He's a toxic pollutant on our society."

Davis' claim was reminiscent of his contemptuous action in court the day a jury found him guilty, when he thrust both middle fingers at a courtroom camera.

After Thursday's outburst, Superior Court Judge Thomas Hastings confirmed the sentence of death the trial jury recommended Aug. 5. He could have reduced it to life in prison without parole.

Davis, 42, was convicted on June 18 of killing Polly after kidnapping her from a slumber party in her bedroom on Oct. 1, 1993. Her disappearance touched off a nationwide search that did not end until Davis led police to the body weeks later.

Jurors found the "special cir-

U.S. to Cuba: Treat detained man fairly

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department appealed Thursday to Cuban authorities to provide fair treatment to a U.S. citizen working on the island while working undercover for a Cuban exile paramilitary group.

Spokesman Glyn Davies said Walter Van Der Veer, an engineer with links to the Miami-based Commando L exile group, slipped into Cuba earlier this year carrying military equipment.

circumstances" — aggravating factors that make a killer eligible for the death penalty — of kidnapping, burglary, robbery and attempting a lewd act on a child. That meant only two possible punishments, execution or life in prison without parole. The jury chose death.

Polly's father said before the hearing that he was looking forward to hearing the judge issue a death sentence for Davis.

"It's actually very offensive to have to breathe the same air as this individual," Klaas said.

Addressing the court before the sentencing, Klaas spoke at times movingly, at times angrily, remembering his daughter as a loving child who "deserves peace."

As he ended his comments, he snapped, "Mr. Davis, when you get to where you're going, say hello to Hitler, say hello to (Jeffrey) Dahmer and say hello to (Ted) Bundy."

After the sentencing, Polly's grandfather lashed out at Davis as a "sadist."

"As far as this man is con-

cerned, I wouldn't wipe him off my shoes! I'd burn the shoes and flush the ashes down the sewer and I still wouldn't get down to where he is," Joseph Klaas told reporters. "My wife became hysterical because this man succeeded in what he was trying to do, which was pierce my son through the heart and pierce the rest of the family. It was just despicable, and shows the kind of people child molesters are."

Hastings had the authority to set the jury sentencing verdict aside and give Davis to life without parole, but that would have been a very unusual step.

As Thursday's hearing began, Hastings rejected a defense motion for a new trial, based on alleged jury misconduct.

The allegations of misconduct stemmed from two incidents described in an account written by jury foreman Brian Bianco after the trial. At issue are a juror's reported threat to change sides at one point, as well as the foreman's decision to read a note from a friend to the panel.

Bianco denied allegations of misconduct, saying the note "certainly didn't influence anybody in either direction and it certainly wasn't intended to." He says the note merely commended the jury for its efforts.

Davis did not testify at his trial, and his lawyers acknowledged he killed Polly while disputing whether she was sexually molested.

Jurors saw a videotape of his confession to police in which he claimed to have been high on drugs and alcohol the night of the kidnapping. Davis told police he found himself driving around with Polly in the car and decided he had to kill her or risk going back to prison.

Outrage that Davis was on the streets despite a long criminal career helped pass California's "three strikes" law requiring longer sentences for repeat felons. In June, the state Supreme Court weakened the law, ruling that judges must be given the ability to modify sentences based on circumstances in each case.

AFL-CIO launches TV voter guides

WASHINGTON (AP) — The trusty voter guide, laying out in print how candidates come down on key issues, is getting a new look. The AFL-CIO is producing a TV version to publicize candidates' positions on Medicare, pensions and other matters in congressional races.

The spots herald a new way for non-profit groups, unions and corporations to help their favorite candidates or hurt those they oppose.

"Congressman J.D. Hayworth voted to cut college loans by \$10 billion and wants to eliminate the Department of Education," charges one spot targeting an Arizona Republican. "Steve Owens opposes cuts in college loans," the ads, beginning Friday in 24 districts, follow labor's high-profile ad campaign that ostensibly sought to influence lawmakers on matters

important to working families. Labor officials say they separated the new initiative from the grass-roots work of the federation's members to comply with federal election law. And the spots avoid expressly urging voters to support or oppose individual candidates.

They rely, however, on the same votes cited in the earlier ads, which Republicans repeatedly denounced as misleading.

"If they weren't over the edge previously, they have gone beyond what a reasonable person would assume to be issues advertising," said Craig Veith, spokesman for the National Republican Congressional Committee, which has filed a series of complaints with the Federal Election Commission in protest of labor's ads. "When you identify a Republican incumbent and then identify the

Democratic challenger, a reasonable person... would conclude that this is a political attack."

AFL-CIO spokeswoman Denise Mitchell sees it differently. "They really follow from what we've been doing all year — trying to reconnect working people to politics, looking at the issues that are important to them."

Mitchell and others said the federation's "electronic voter guides" are a first.

In July, the Sierra Club asked the FEC for an advisory opinion on its proposal to air television voter guides, but the request was withdrawn a month later.

The new AFL-CIO series will run for two to three weeks. Mitchell would say only that the cost would be "several million dollars."

Veith said the National Republican Congressional

Committee would file another FEC complaint to protest the new ads and committee lawyers would consider legal action against stations that air the spots, which he said contained untrue allegations.

The committee has fought to keep stations from airing previous AFL-CIO ads, with mixed results. The federation is relying on FEC rules allowing unions and others to distribute pamphlets or fliers that describe competing candidates' positions but don't endorse either candidate.

The Supreme Court has found that voter guides, judged in context, can cross that line without using the key words "elect" or "defeat." In one instance, an anti-abortion group's guide was deemed inappropriate because it plainly said which candidate was anti-abortion.

Americans' income up, poverty down in 1995

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans' real income increased in 1995 for the first time in six years, the Census Bureau said Thursday in its annual economic report, promptly trumpeted by President Clinton as "a good day for our country."

The analysis also found a decline in the number of poor, including the first time that the elderly had significantly less poverty than working-age Americans.

"Today it is clear that more and more of our people are sharing in that prosperity. We are growing — and growing together," Clinton said.

Median household income for Americans was \$34,076 in 1995, up 2.7 percent from the year before and the first real increase in six years, after adjusting for inflation, the Bureau said.

In addition, the agency reported that the number of poor Americans dropped 1.6 million to 36.4 million from 1994 to 1995. That resulted in a decline in the share of Americans living in poverty from 14.5 percent to 13.8 percent. The poverty threshold for a family of four in 1995 was \$15,569.

The increase covered both family and non-family households, a first since the those distinctions were made in 1980, said Daniel H. Weinberger, chief of the Bureau's Housing and Household Economics Statistics Division.

The Midwest led the way in income with a 7.2 percent increase in median household income to \$33,839, Weinberg said.

Indeed, the Bureau considered that the only region to have a statistically significant improvement. The change in the rest of the country fell within the statistical margin of error.

Changes in other regions were: West, up 1.6 percent to \$35,979; Northeast, up 0.5 percent to \$36,111 and South, up 0.2 percent to \$30,942.

Idaho figures

- Idaho had 14.5 percent of its households living in poverty in 1995, compared to 12.0 percent in 1994.
- Idaho median household income in 1995 was \$32,676, up from \$32,430 the previous year.

Other findings of the report, nationwide

- There were 40.6 million people without health insurance in 1995, 15.4 percent of the population, unchanged from the year before.
- Median income for blacks increased 3.6 percent to \$22,232. For whites it was up 2.2 percent to \$34,952. Income for Asians was down 2.4 percent to \$40,634 and for Hispanics — who can be of any race — it fell 5.1 percent to \$22,860.
- Hispanics had the highest poverty rate at 30.3 percent, followed by blacks, 23.3 percent, Asians, 14.6 percent, and whites, 11.2 percent.
- Poverty was 13.0 percent for non-born Americans. Foreign-born naturalized citizens had a 10.5 rate while 27.8 percent of foreign-born non-citizens lived in poverty.
- Poverty among children, those aged under 18, was 20.4 percent, down from 21.8 percent a year earlier.

JERUSALEM (AP) — Their fragile peace going up in thick black smoke, Palestinian police and Israeli troops fought with automatic weapons Thursday at holy sites and in the streets of the West Bank and Gaza, where thousands of Palestinians burned tires, threw stones and called for a revolution.

With at least 38 Palestinians and 11 Israelis killed in one day, the pitched level of violence surpassed that of the worst days of the six-year "intifadah" — the Palestinian revolt against Israeli occupation of the West Bank and Gaza that ended in 1993 with a breakthrough peace accord.

At least 43 Palestinians, 11 Israelis and one Egyptian army officer have been killed since the clashes began Tuesday, bringing the three-day death toll to 55.

Embattled areas Thursday resembled war zones, with smoke from burning tires blackening skies dotted by Israeli helicopter gunships.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu returned to Israel on Thursday and went into an emergency cabinet meeting on the crisis, cutting short a three-day trip to Europe.

Friday to discuss the mounting violence.

In street battles in the garbage-strewn alleys of Gaza and the rocky hillsides of the West Bank, Palestinian police in fatigues hunched behind trees and walls as they fired assault rifles and hurled firebombs at helmeted Israeli soldiers who responded with heavy bursts of gunfire.

Traditionally, Palestinians have used stones in their battles with armed Israeli troops. The involvement of the Palestinian police force, created under the peace accord, has made the most recent clashes more deadly.

Casualties mounted in part on Thursday because many of the Palestinian police shot wildly and, unlike the Israelis, had no flak jackets.

In the West Bank town of Nablus, a fierce gun battle between Palestinian police and Israeli troops broke out after thousands of Palestinians stormed Joseph's Tomb, a Jewish sanctuary. Six Israeli troops and a Palestinian were killed.

After the remaining Israeli troops guarding the tiny enclave were overwhelmed, protesters celebrated by setting fire to their jeeps and an armored personnel carrier. Trapped in the compound, some of the Israelis lit candles and one kissed a Torah, or Jewish holy book, in prayers for deliverance.

An Israeli army spokesman said the situation stabilized in the evening after Palestinian officials imposed a curfew in the vicinity of the tomb. About 15 Palestinian policemen and several dozen Israeli soldiers were deployed to guard the site.

Fighting also broke out in the two tiny settlements of Netzarim and Kfar Darom, isolated enclaves in the heart of the Palestinian-controlled Gaza Strip, after thousands of Palestinian protesters marched toward the settlements.

Israeli-Palestinian violence

The Israeli government has ordered more troops into the West Bank and Gaza along with tanks and helicopters. Fighting began on Tuesday after Israel's decision to open an archaeological tunnel alongside an Islamic holy site in Jerusalem.

Palestinian police force acts like unwieldy army

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israeli and Palestinian peacemakers envisaged a disciplined Palestinian police force resolving neighborhood disputes, directing traffic and keeping Islamic militants in check.

This week's deadly clashes exposed a different reality: Yasser Arafat's men form an unwieldy army of some 30,000, many able and willing to hit Israel where it hurts.

Some are veterans of Arafat's Beirut street battles, others are local heroes — veterans of the 1987-93 Palestinian uprising in the West Bank and Gaza Strip — and many Arafat took on to keep his people employed.

The Palestinian police are deployed in about 10 parallel, sometimes competing outfits throughout Gaza and the West Bank, where Arafat controls seven cities and shares authority with Israel in another quarter of the territory.

On Wednesday and Thursday, the Palestinian police battled Israeli soldiers. It was the first time the Israeli army has faced a well-armed Palestinian force in the territories; at least 40 Palestinians and 11 Israelis have died.

Reflecting the rage among many Palestinians at the stalled peace process and their wrecked economy, some policemen ignored orders by Arafat and, in some

cases, their more immediate superiors to cease fire.

Li. Ihab Abu Mustafa, a regiment commander in the West Bank town of Ramallah, told the Associated Press that when Arafat ordered police to refrain from shooting, some men took off their uniforms and joined the fighting. Some took their weapons and others threw stones, he said.

"I hate the Israelis. I have the same feeling," said Abu Mustafa, 23, who decided to stay out of the fray.

The breakdown in discipline comes after the poorly trained Palestinian police in recent months won praise for closely coordinating with Israel in neutralizing Islamic militant groups.

But the militants' most recent wave of attacks — in which 63 people died in Israel last spring — was enough to discredit the peacemaking, and hard-line Benjamin Netanyahu edged out peacemaker Shimon Peres in Israel's May elections.

Netanyahu has delayed the planned troop pullout from Hebron indefinitely, sidestepped Israel's commitment to withdraw from most West Bank rural areas and suspended talks on a final settlement, declaring he will never agree to the independent state Palestinians had assumed would evolve.

Dog gets valor medal for saving kids from snake

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — A dog that leaped into a swimming pool to save three children from a poisonous snake has become Australia's first canine to receive a medal for valor.

The Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals awarded a Purple Cross Bravery medal to Fizo, a fearless 8-year-old silky terrier, at a ceremony Wednesday night.

Hugh Wirth, the society's president, said Fizo plunged off a balcony onto a poisonous, 5-foot long brown snake as it recoiled, ready to attack Fizo's 9-year-old owner and two playmates.

Although the dog was bitten several times, Fizo held the snake in its mouth until the venomous reptile died. The dog collapsed and was taken to a nearby animal clinic to receive a venom antidote.

Vietnam, U.S. closer to full pact

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — Six days of talks between the United States and Vietnam have produced several agreements and brought the two countries closer to a full trade pact, the Foreign Ministry said Thursday.

U.S. trade officials, however, were less optimistic, saying significant "gaps" still divide the negotiating teams.

The United States and Vietnam have been unable to reach a trade pact since they formally established diplomatic ties more than a year ago. But Foreign Ministry spokesman Tran Quang Hoan insisted the latest series of talks, which ended Thursday, had narrowed their differences.

"The two sides reached agreements on several key points," he said.

Officials declined to specify what areas they agreed upon.

The United States has been critical of Vietnam's trade restrictions and endless bureaucratic snags that delay business transactions.

Joseph Diamond, the top U.S. trade negotiator visiting Hanoi, said it was in Vietnam's best interest to adopt international trade rules.

"It will help spur economic growth and enable Vietnam and the United States to conclude a bilateral trade agreement," Diamond said.

In two previous rounds of talks, both sides have said progress was made, but officials in Vietnam are concerned over the length of time it is taking to iron out an agreement.

The trade talks are expected to resume in November.

Vietnam is eager to gain trade recognition from the United States as a stepping-stone to membership in the World Trade Organization.

Among the outstanding issues are Vietnam's desire to gain full most-favored-nation trade status from the United States, and Washington's push for intellectual property rights protections.

In August, Premier Vo Van Kiet expressed frustration over U.S.-Vietnamese relations, saying they had fallen victim to domestic politics in Washington.

President Clinton in the past has been cautious about Vietnam, in part because he did not fight the war, in an election year.

FBI announces plans to open Ukraine office

KIEV, Ukraine (AP) — The FBI will open an office in Ukraine to help fight organized crime, drug trafficking and international terrorism, the U.S. Embassy in Kiev said Thursday.

Two FBI agents from the United States will be full-time in an office in the Kiev embassy, and will work closely with their counterparts in this former Soviet republic.

Ukrainian Deputy Interior Minister Viktor Korol said the office would open in October.

"It's a great sign for us. It will help both sides cooperate more openly," Korol said.

The FBI opened an office in neighboring Russia in 1994 to address the growth of Russian organized crime and the threat of nuclear smuggling, among other issues.

Federal government shouldn't be responsible for local projects

Sever improvements in Wendell. A nicer rodeo arena for Oakley. In Shoshone, a shady spot to sit and watch the trains go by.

Swirl projects. Sources of community pride. But wait a minute. How did these strictly local improvements get to be the federal government's responsibility?

If we wonder why the federal government devours such a burdensome share of our national substance, we don't have to look far.

All of these projects, highlighted in a story on Thursday's front page, are part of a Sawtooth National Forest program to help communities near the forest. You may have thought the Forest Service had enough to do, just taking care of the woods. But Congress in 1990 decided the agency ought to be in the small-town-improvement business, too.

So far, the Rural Community Assistance Program has handed out \$205,260 to towns in south-central Idaho.

Maybe we shouldn't get worked up over a piddling 200 grand. The Pentagon loses that much behind the sofa cushions.

But the principle is important. Projects like these reflect an insidious paternalism by Congress and the federal bureaucracies. The unspoken message is, *You yokels are too dumb and lazy to fix up your own towns, unless Uncle Sugar gives you a cash transfusion and a*

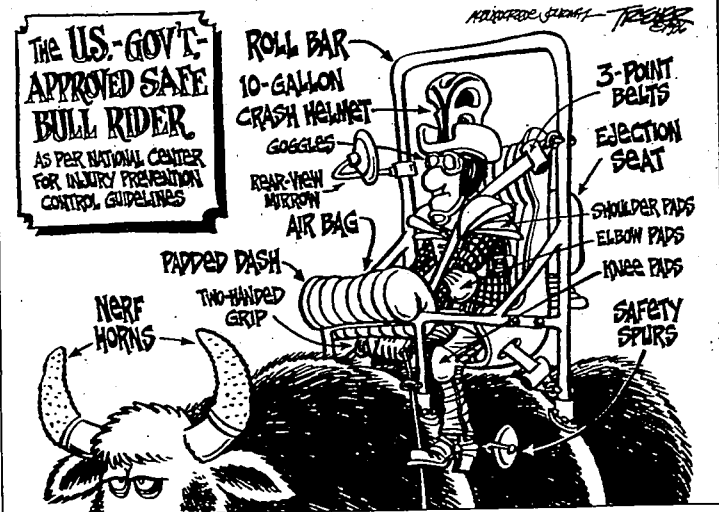
kick in the hindquarters. But system works this way: Congress extracts tax money from Oakley and Wendell and Shoshone and ships it to Washington. Then it pays a lot of project administrators and budget analysts. Part of what's left comes back to us in the form of generous gifts.

This Forest Service program is just a tiny example. The real money is in major urban projects and federal backing for state programs. The theory is, all these important chores wouldn't get done without federal leadership. But maybe they would, if federal taxes were lower. On the other hand, maybe some of them wouldn't. Local taxpayers might prefer to do without.

Would that be so bad? If we Americans are serious about reducing the federal government's influence and cost, we have to kick our fondness for federal handouts. We have to recognize that some projects - rodeo arenas and train-viewing platforms, for instance - are local government responsibilities. If we want them, we should raise the money at home.

The habit is tough to break: Congressmen love to shovel money to their home districts. Local officials would rather collect federal grants than wheedle the money out of tightfisted local taxpayers.

But if we really want to slim down the federal behemoth, then responsibility and self-restraint must begin at home.



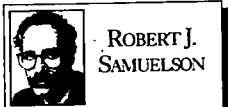
Clinton's 'bumper-sticker politics' misleading

Bill Clinton has perfected a new brand of politics: bumper-sticker politics. It's more than snappy sound bites or election-year exaggerations. It's the shriveled use of entire federal programs mainly to create political slogans.

As he campaigns, Clinton is full of impressive claims. He's "putting 100,000 police on the streets," providing an increase in the minimum wage for "10 million workers" and enabling "12 million Americans" to take advantage of the 1993 Family and Medical Leave Act.

Clinton seems to be delivering massive benefits to vast portions of the population. He isn't. The genius of bumper-sticker politics is that it creates the aura of accomplishment on the cheap. All of Clinton's statements are based on programs whose size and effects are modest. But they lead themselves to misleading claims of "doing it good" that can be exploited for political advantage.

Consider four Clinton claims: Cops on the Street: Only 20,000 police have been financed under the Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994. The total is \$100,000 by the year 2000. But the new police aren't fully subsidized. Federal grants pay only 75 percent of the first three years of costs. The law will probably temporarily subsidize police who would have been hired anyway. Since the late 1980s, states and localities have added about 10,000 police annually. In 1994, their police forces to-

led 562,000 officers, up from 496,000 in 1989, says the FBI.

Family Leave: Clinton's 12 million figure is a huge exaggeration. (Under the Family and Medical Leave Act, workers in companies with 50 or more employees can generally take 12 weeks of unpaid leave for their own illness or to care for a new baby, a sick child, parent or spouse.) Perhaps 1.5 million to 3 million people used the law between early 1994 and mid-1995, according to a government commission. The effect was small because most large and medium-sized firms already had maternity and sick leave policies before the law. Clinton's higher estimate assumes that most leaves at covered companies resulted from the law. Minimum Wage: Maybe 10 million workers will get a raise, but it's doubtful. Under the new law, the minimum goes from \$4.25 to \$4.75 on Oct. 1 and then to \$5.15 on Sept. 1, 1997. In 1996, there were 3.7 million workers earning \$4.25 or less and one-third earning less than \$4.70. Most will get an increase, though some are exempt from the law. But there were also 5.5 million workers earning between \$4.70 and \$5.15. Wages

are rising about 3 percent a year. By late 1997, wages for many of these workers will be near or above the minimum.

Reinventing Government: Clinton brags that the federal civilian work force "is the smallest it's been since John Kennedy." True. But the drop mostly reflects the end of the Cold War - and not the "reinventing government" program. Since January 1993, the work force has declined by about 240,000, of that about two-thirds came from the Defense Department. The nondefense work force (almost 12 million) is nearly 40 percent higher than in 1963, when Kennedy died.

Should the federal government pay for local police? Is the obsession with reducing the federal work force harming important programs? These are good but irrelevant questions for the main purpose of these programs is to generate political slogans: "We're Fighting Crime" or "We're Battling Bureaucracy."

The process of overpromise is bipartisan. Republicans make outsized claims about how (through tax cuts and regulatory "reform") they can get government "off our backs." Democrats make outsized claims about how (through government subsidies and mandates) they can relieve various popular anxieties.

Once in office, political leaders cannot for modest, realistic promises. People feel misled. What starts as campaign rhetoric ends as popular contempt.

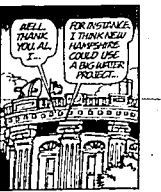

Judge orders congresswoman's ex-husband jailed immediately

WASHINGTON (AP) — Joseph Waldholz, former husband of congresswoman Enid Greene, R-Ill., Thursday after prosecutors accused him of writing bad checks and using heroin as he awaited sentencing in a \$3 million check-kiting scheme.

On June 6, Waldholz pleaded guilty to four criminal charges: bank fraud, making false statements, failure to report campaign contributions and assisting in filing a fraudulent tax return. Some million check-kiting scheme when Waldholz managed his then-wife's 1994 congressional campaign.

Waldholz was represented in court by A.J. Kramer, a federal public defender. His own lawyer, Barbara Nicastro, asked to withdraw from today's hearing, explaining her reasons in a bench conference beyond the hearing of others in the courtroom.

"This court believes there is one thing it can do, and that is to take you into custody so that you cannot commit additional crimes," said U.S. District Judge Norma Holloway Johnson.

She ordered that a doctor test Waldholz for drugs in the courthouse before being taken to the District of Columbia jail. He will remain there until the judge receives medical advice on whether he needs drug treatment.

Waldholz told the judge he underwent treatment at St. Francis Hospital in Pittsburgh and that he would like to return there. Johnson said she could not do that.

"I have learned a great deal about the disease called addiction, and I have a great deal more to learn," Waldholz said. "Joe Waldholz was an honored and honorable person. With treatment, I would like to get that back."

He was to have been sentenced this month, but the date was postponed to Oct. 23 at the request of his probation officer. He was released on personal bond after agreeing to live with his father and stepmother in a Pittsburgh suburb and to commit no further crimes, a standard clause in such releases.

"Since he pleaded guilty, he has been in violation of the conditions of his release in a number of different ways," said assistant U.S. attorney Craig Iscoe. "He has used drugs and committed crimes."

Neither Waldholz nor his lawyer contested the allegations brought by the prosecutor.

Iscoe said they included:

- Using heroin daily for two months
- Forging a prescription for 24 tablets of Vicodin, an addictive pain-killer, on the prescription pad of Harvey Waldholz, a dentist, telling the pharmacist they were for his grandmother.
- Stealing checks from Marilyn Waldholz, his stepmother, and forging his father's signature on a \$415 check made out to himself.
- Writing seven bad checks to his parents for a total of \$24,600.

31 hurt when bus crashes into tractor-trailer rig in New Mexico

LAS CRUCES, N.M. (AP) — A bus driver apparently dozed off just before the bus slammed into the rear of a tractor-trailer rig early Thursday west of Las Cruces, injuring himself and 30 passengers, authorities said.

"The little boy saved our lives. He hollered and woke the driver up. He said, 'Wake up, you're going to sleep,'" said Geneva Johnson, 47, of Jackson, Miss., a passenger on the Greyhound bus.

The bus careened down an embankment after the collision, but the driver kept it upright, said Ms. Johnson, who boarded the bus in San Diego.

"The front of the bus is just bang — jumbled up," she said.

Lt. Donald Morrison of the New Mexico State Police said that "there are indications from different sources that the driver could have dozed off, but I'm not sure of that."

The driver, Marvin Wells, 49, of Mesa, Ariz., was flown by helicopter to Thomason Hospital in El Paso, Texas, where he was listed in good condition, authorities said. El Paso is 34 miles south of Las Cruces.

Blake Lewis, a spokesman for Greyhound Bus Lines in Dallas, said he does not confirm whether the driver fell asleep.

State police, Greyhound and federal transportation officials were investigating what caused the accident. Wells, a five-year Greyhound veteran, has a clean safety record, Lewis said.

The bus route originated in Los Angeles and was bound for Dallas, Lewis said.

The crash occurred about 12:30 a.m. MDT on Interstate 10 some 20 miles west of Las Cruces in flat, yucca-dotted desert country, Morrison said.

Traffic was routed around the crash and the highway was not closed.

The flatbed truck was hauling a load of red chili pods and was out of control in the slow lane when the crash happened, he said.

But Ms. Johnson said she thought the truck was parked at the side of the road at the time.

"Oh God. Everybody was screaming. There were some at the back of the bus screaming. We were seated in the front of the bus, and we were just numb," she said.

Ruth Padilla, spokeswoman for Memorial Medical Center in Las Cruces, said all 30 patients the hospital got were in fair to good condition.

Maj. Roger Payne of the state police said all the patients were passengers. The truck's driver, Jose Olivias, 40, of Chihuahua, Mexico, was not injured.

Ms. Johnson, a convenience store manager, said she was reading in her seat, the third behind the front door on the right side, when the accident happened.

"Passengers kept saying it was cold, so he (the driver) turned the heat up, then it got really stuffy. I

kept saying, 'I can't breathe.' But he didn't pay that much attention," she said.

The bus began to veer of the side of the road, Ms. Johnson said.

"The little boy said, 'He's asleep.' But the driver said, 'I got it under control,'" she said. "Then, after that, I looked back down and he must have dozed off again."

"When I looked up again we were facing the back of the truck. The truck was parked at the side. He (the bus driver) pulled to the left not to get the full impact of it," Ms. Johnson said.

"It hit, then it went down an embankment. Everybody kept flying everywhere," she said.

"The bus was wobbling, shaking back and forth, left and right, but it kept the steering wheel and he applied the brakes," Ms. Johnson said.

"He held it and he stopped it and then he collapsed," she said.

Johnson said passengers could not open emergency exits because seats were shoved forward and jammed them shut.

"We had to kick them open," said Ms. Johnson, who had been on her way to see a daughter in Dallas.

Passengers suffered cuts, bruises, back pain, nose bleeds and "a lot of knots on heads," Ms. Johnson said.

Prosecutor wants portion of casino robbery trial closed

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A federal prosecutor is asking that a judge close a portion of an upcoming trial for two Los Angeles gang members accused of planning the 1994 takeover robbery at Harrah's casino here.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Tom O'Connell admitted the request was unusual, and said he could not recall making such a request before. He declined to say why he made the request.

Melvin Foster and Chet Govan, both 29, are expected to stand trial later this year on charges they orchestrated the \$97,000 holdup at the Strip casino. They are named in an indictment charging them with conspiracy to interfere with commerce by threats or violence, use of firearms in a crime of violence, aiding and abetting, money laundering and forfeiture.

Four others who participated in the April 1994 robbery already have been sentenced to up to 10 years in prison. It is not known if they will testify at the upcoming trial. A juvenile also was charged in the case.

Employees and patrons of the casino were held at bay with weapons during the robbery.

Candidates disagree on school rules

SHOSHONE - As Idaho moves toward easing rules for schools, the argument over local control perhaps does not get clearer than this:

The proposed changes either threaten educational quality by weakening standards and oversight, as a Bailey Democratic legislative candidate says, or they help districts tailor education programs to suit them, as his Shoshone Republican opponent says.

Democrat Darren Clemenhagen, a

high school government teacher, fears local control will allow districts to skimp on sex education and AIDS awareness, assign teachers to subjects they are not qualified to teach and hire teachers not certified to teach at all.

"I don't think we should water down teacher standards, which I see happening," he said. "I'm a history teacher. I wouldn't even begin to go into a math class and pass myself off as an algebra teacher."

But Shoshone mayor, his hauler and incumbent state Rep. Tim Ridinger

said rule changes are necessary to allow schools to come up with the mix of curriculum and instruction methods that uniquely suits them.

"If they're giving more control back to the local districts, that's a good idea because each district is a little different," he said. "The local people can govern their schools."

Clemenhagen is challenging Ridinger, a freshman, in District 21, which takes in all of Blaine, Camas and Lincoln counties and portions of Elmore and Gooding counties.

Clemenhagen fears one rule change

Butcher, Diaz trial may move to Ada County

RUPERT - Moving the trial of accused killers Cody Butcher and Jesus Diaz to Ada County heads off a potential appeal if the two are convicted of first-degree murder, the lead prosecutor in the case said.

And time spent fighting the move could have threatened the defendants' right to a speedy trial, said Minidoka County Special Prosecutor John Bradley.

"In this case, it looks like the bad decision was to fight the change of venue," Bradley said. "Judges are granting change of venues with a lot less publicity than this case."

Fifth District Court Judge William Hart is expected to approve the change of venue in a hearing this morning. Hart also will hear arguments about consolidating the cases of Butcher and Diaz into

If a Minidoka County jury convicted Butcher and Diaz, an appeals court could overturn the decision by ruling their right to a fair trial was not met. In that case, murder charges could not be filed against them. Agreeing to the defense motion to move the trial doesn't affect the strength of the case or the evidence, Bradley said.

Prosecutors also had little to gain by fighting the change of venue. It's probably a losing battle because of media coverage of the case and coverage of two other recent murders in Minidoka County, Bradley said. Ada County court officials Thursday were not aware of the change of venue, but 4th District Court Administrator John Trayler said the Boise courts could handle the case.

"We're short courtrooms as it is, and it does impact us, but we'll accommodate the trial just like we do for other outside judges," Trayler said.

Rather than move the trial to Ada County, attorneys could have chosen to bring in a jury from another county. Recent high-profile cases in Idaho Falls and Lewiston were decided by juries from Cassia and Twin Falls counties, respectively. But it's costly and complicated to sequester an out-of-town jury.

"It's actually easier, and doesn't cost as

much if just the judge and attorneys move," Bradley said.

It probably costs about a third as much money to move a trial than it does to bring in an out-of-town jury, 5th District Court Administrator Linda Wright said. But either option costs more than holding the trial in front of a Minidoka County jury.

A change of venue has not been granted in a Magic Valley capital case since 1991, when John Odiga's murder trial was moved from Twin Falls to Ada County. The jury found Odiga guilty of two counts of second-degree murder, one count of attempted first-degree murder, two counts of aggravated assault and using a firearm in the commission of a felony. In 1992, 5th District Judge James I. May denied a request to move the trial of Donald "Bud" Stradley, accused of killing a 2-year-old girl. A Twin Falls County jury acquitted Stradley.

Wendell's sewer development sluggish

Larson wants to finance a lift station for servicing houses he plans to build along Sixth Avenue West, but the sewage would need to enter the city's system after being pumped south to the top of the hill.

Mayor Gwen Rost said the city first needs to build a workshop on the four sewer trunk line options already presented by City Engineer Scott Bybee.

Bybee presented the options last year, and the council has two new members who were not at those meetings.

JEROME - Jerome County commissioners this week awarded Gary Bond Construction a contract to build the proposed emergency services building - contingent upon the Department of Commerce releasing the funds - and heard cost orders' concerns about proposed privatization of the county's ambulance service.

The new \$254,500 EMS building is to

be named the Mel Grindstaff Building, after a former Jerome County commissioner very active with children's projects. Construction is expected to begin Monday; the target for completion is Feb. 1.

Also Monday, a committee - made up of Dr. Elizabeth Sugden of St. Bernard's Medical Center and county medical director of the present ambulance service, Jerome County Ambulance Service Administrator Larry Wood, and other

Supreme Court overturns ruling U of I Associated Students withdraw lawsuit support

BOISE (AP) — Last week, employees in the attorney general's office were passing around an unusual exhibit. It was the plastic-encased remains of a melted wastebasket. A cigarette tossed into that basket on New Year's Day 1992 is believed to be the cause for a fire that eventually caused \$3.4 million damage to the

90-year-old capitol building. The incident later caused then-Gov. Cecil Andrus to ban smoking in the Statehouse. Chris Rich, an aide to Attorney General Alan Lance, said the Boise Fire Department was about to throw the melted wastebasket out from its evidence room, so he went over and picked it up. After the grimy

plastic blob went around a few offices, it was sent over to the Idaho Historical Society. They'd better go get it back. The Idaho Supreme Court on Thursday vacated a district court ruling that held the basket's manufacturer, Rubbermaid, Inc., an Ohio corporation, couldn't be blamed for the fire.

MOSCOW (AP) — University of Idaho students who have been held holding a \$3,500 legal bill now that student government wants no part in a lawsuit against the university seeking access to teacher evaluations. The Associated Students University of Idaho Senate voted 9-1 on Wednesday to reject Quast's request to transfer \$3,500 from its print advertising budget into a professional services account to pay legal fees.

The 2nd District Court lawsuit was filed Sept. 18 by Quast, the student body advertising manager, against interim Provost George Simmons, the University Senate, and the State Board of Education. It contends teacher evaluations are open records under state law. Student Sen. Jeff Daniels, representing the Student Media Board, cast the only dissenting vote Wednesday. "I felt that pursuing this question of whether evaluations are public or not needs to be answered," Daniels said. "I think there is a very good chance the lawsuit will be won."

Before the meeting, Daniels said the issue was access. "This is a taxpayer-funded, land-grant university and I think students as well as taxpayers have a right to see information on how students rate their professors," he said. But student Sen. Chris Houck said not every student supports the fight. "Other avenues could have been taken to come up with a satisfactory answer without filing a \$3,500 lawsuit against ourselves," Houck said. Student Senate Pro Tem

Brandon Jessup said he was leaning toward supporting the lawsuit until he found out three of the five living groups he represents don't care. ASUI is obligated to represent the needs of the students, not stand up for the rights of the press," Jessup said. Student Body President Brian Kane withdrew his support for the lawsuit even before Wednesday's meeting, saying Quast did not follow student government rules and regulations in pursuing the teacher evaluations. "ASUI advertising and the Student Media Board have exceeded their authority and acted without the approval of the ASUI," Kane wrote in a Sept. 19 memo to Quast. Quast's attorney, Charles Brown of Lewiston, said on Monday that the First Amendment was an overriding consideration. "This is true in a situation involving the freedom of the press, regardless of the fact that it involves a student-run newspaper," Brown wrote in response to Kane.

Reservation office returns to park

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — A centralized reservation system in Denver produced a disastrous summer, so the chief concessioner in Yellowstone National Park is moving the operation back to Yellowstone. "It was a nightmare all summer," said Edna Good, chief of concessions management in Yellowstone. The move will create 90 new jobs, mostly seasonal. She said the National Park Service had requested the move. People trying to reserve one of the park's 3,278 lodgings or 1,746 campground spaces had to call a Denver number all spring and summer. But they often got nothing but a busy signal. If they got through, they often were put on hold. And if they ever did reach a

human being, they often got bad information or a confirmed reservation only to find no room available when they got to the park. "It was never any better than it was in April," when the problems started, Good said. AmFac Parks and Resorts runs the hotels, campgrounds and restaurants in Yellowstone, along with facilities in several other state and national parks around the country. When it took over the Yellowstone operations last winter, it moved its reservations booking system from the park to a centralized program in Denver. People in Denver didn't know the park, didn't understand the wide variety of lodgings available there, and didn't know where the accommodations were located,

Good said. Some visitors were told things that "were completely, ridiculously wrong," Good said. "We continued to get numerous complaints every day." AmFac President and CEO Andrew N. Todd said in press release Wednesday it will move the reservations center to park headquarters in Mammoth later this year. He didn't mention all the problems. Todd said reservations for other parks will continue to be taken in the centralized office in Denver. Good said Yellowstone is unique because of the variety of available lodgings and because of special problems like area closures for bears and road repairs.

Group says Fish & Game broke law

POCATELLO (AP) — A regional wildlife group contends the Fish and Game Commission violated state law when it advertised for a successor to Director Jerry Conley without requiring applicants to have a wildlife background. Director Jerry Conley resigned after accepting a job in Missouri and will leave next month. The commission's advertisement said the new director should have "demonstrated leadership in the field of natural resources management." But state law requires the

director to have "knowledge of and experience in the protection, conservation, restoration and management of the wildlife resources of the state," the Region 5 Wildlife Council says. The commission's reference to natural resource management leaves the job open to a person working in timber, mining or agriculture, groups that generally don't consider wildlife as a top priority, said Bill Davidson, wildlife council secretary.

The council is angry with the Fish and Game Commission and sent members a letter asking them to comply with state statute and require the new director to have a wildlife background, Davidson said.

Delbert Schmidt, director of the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center's ambulance service, said that if the hospital gets the contract, it would rotate its ambulances. His idea is to combine the units of Jerome and Twin Falls counties and station one ambulance at the Traveler's Oasis to service the Eden, Hazelton, Hansen and Kimberly area. If that ambulance was called out, another would go to the Traveler's Oasis to reach its place.

Prescott said that Mini-Cassia ambulances should respond to the old ordinance.

Certain wording in the proposed ordinance had been improved by City Attorney Craig Hobbey, Rost responded, and George Benson suggested City Attorney John Goss limit anyone outside the city limits wants to join into our city services, it should be at their expense because we have a lot of inadequate services now.

Commissioner Harriet Weixel said it has gotten around the county that this is a done deal, but it is not.

Den Ur, fire chief of the First Segregation Fire District of Eden, said people should write to commissioners to let them know which way they want the county to go.

Weixel said commissioners have voted yes as to whether to go with a private contract or to stay with the county-operated service.

Prescott said dates of the public meeting at which a decision will be made will be published in both the North Side News and The Times-News.

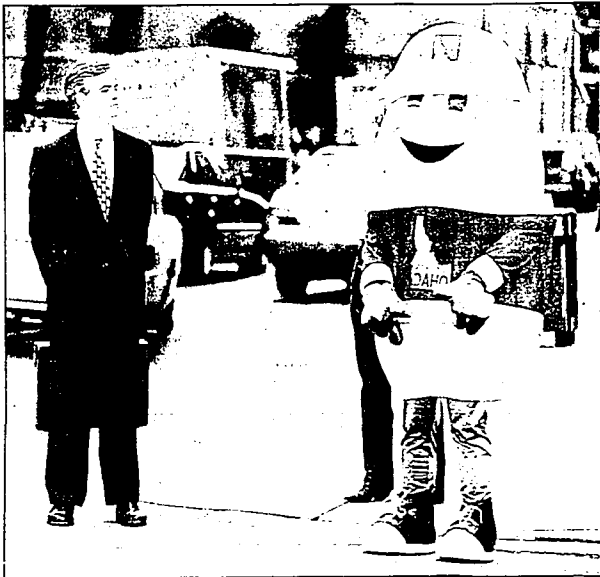

Contractors fear One Percent will bring about 'economic destruction'

BOISE (AP) — Critics contend the One Percent Initiative will make it more difficult for growing communities to spend money from any source. Even outright gifts such as the \$600,000 base pay for a poof this year and federal grants for roads could not push budget increases beyond 2.6 percent without voter approval.

The initiative on the Nov. 5 ballot would cap property taxes to 1 percent of taxable value.

The 2.6 percent cap on budget increases is another, less examined provision. It says the entire budget of a local government agency cannot rise more than inflation.

The Idaho Building Contractors Association issued a scathing attack on the initiative.

"The economic destruction the One Percent Initiative imposes will force our children to move out of state," President James Shervik said. "And, with the initiative's crippling effect on local government services, we will be unable to build new

homes for current Idaho residents." Builders fear fees such as sewer hookups and development impact fees would figure into local budgets, eventually forcing officials to deny building permits if that money would push their budgets over the cap.

Idaho Power Co. economist John Church said a slowdown in building would have a noticeable impact on the state's economy; construction accounts for about 8 percent of the non-agriculture economy.

So far this year, building permits have been issued for \$1.05 billion in Idaho construction projects. Church said the impacts on local government services pose bigger long-term economic problems for the state.

"If roads are bad, schools are bad and buildings are deteriorating, it's a disincentive for business to locate here."

But Laird Maxwell, chairman of Idahoans for Tax Reform, said the initiative is designed so taxes on new construction would be exempt — and the Legislature could clarify that if it wanted.

He said government officials have nothing to fear as long as they want to spend money the way voters will support.

"Holding an election is not a big deal," he said. "The government managers want to retain the power to increase spending at will."

The initiative could force cuts in services for growing areas like the Meridian School District, where enrollment is rising at 5.5 percent per year.

That could send patrons to the point repeatedly to vote on spending. If those votes fail, the budgets would be capped. Meridian Schools Superintendent Bob Haley said that would devastate operations.

"We hired 64 new teachers this year. If I had only a 3 percent increase to work with, I probably could hire only 15 teachers and not give anyone any kind of raise," he said.

Sheep-killing she-wolf moved to wilderness area

LEWISTON (AP) — Federal officers trapped a wolf that had been killing sheep near McCall and relocated it to a remote area of the Clearwater National Forest late last month.

The female was trapped in the headwaters of the Payette River's North Fork upstream from Payette Lake after it and a male had been killing sheep owned by Phil Soulen of Weiser.

Soulen first reported sheep losses in early August, said Roy Heberger, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service biologist overseeing the agency's Idaho wolf program.

Nez Perce Tribe wolf biologist Curt Mack said the Animal Damage Control branch of the U.S. Agriculture Department sent a trapper to the area Aug. 6.

The trapper and biologists tried to capture the animals on three differ-

ent occasions. The wolves would show up and harass or kill sheep about every five to eight days, Mack said.

Each time the trapper set out the traps, the animals would disappear for a week. Thinking the incident was over, the traps would be pulled and the team would head home.

On the third attempt, the female was caught in a leghold trap Aug. 28. She was then taken north to the edge of the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness.

Schools' top official wants out

SANDPOINT (AP) — The dismal financial shape of the Bonner County School District has Superintendent Max Harrell humming for a new job.

Harrell has led the troubled district of 6,000 students for only one year. He is among six finalists for a superintendent position in Casper, Wyo., but has declined comment about the Natrona County job.

Bonner County School Board members were informed about Harrell's job search last weekend. They said it would be a blow to the district to lose him.

"It would be absolutely devastating," trustee Willard Osmunson said. "He is of the caliber and experience that our community and students need, but people abandon sinking ships."

Bonner County is mired in budget problems because of a lack of funding and failed levies. The district may lose another \$500,000 in funding this year because of statewide cutbacks.

Currently, the district needs more than \$1 million just to fix school roofs. Building inspectors closed five classrooms at one elementary school because the leaks posed a safety hazard.

The purchase of buses, textbooks and classroom technology also has been put on hold, as have salary increases for employees. Voters have rejected three levies, and the district plans to try again in November.

The mounting problems prompted Harrell, the fourth superintendent in Sandpoint in five years, to look for a new job. Harrell has a three-year contract and makes about \$75,000 a year in Bonner County. The Wyoming district is offering more than \$100,000.

"He should have been seen as an action-oriented superintendent who is stymied at every turn by lack of funding," said a summary prepared by the Natrona County hiring committee.

Federal mediator summoned to settle Boise Cascade strike

BOISE (AP) — A federal mediator has been called in to settle a strike by the Southern Council of Industrial Workers against Boise Cascade Corp.

The strike has slowed or shut down production at 11 Boise Cascade plants in Idaho, Oregon and Washington.

A total of 431 workers at three plants in Emmett and Cascade have refused to cross picket lines all week in a show of support for fellow union members.

"There was a meeting Tuesday but no conclusion was reached," Boise Cascade spokesman Doug Bartels said. "There hasn't been a date set for the next meeting."

The strike started Sept. 12 when a union contract expired in Louisiana. The union workers are upset at the wages being offered by Boise Cascade and premium sharing on health-care benefits.

"This strike is about Boise Cascade's failure to come to the bargaining table and bargain in an aboveboard, give-and-take manner," said Ray White, leader of the Southern Council of Industrial Workers.

"Boise Cascade wage rates are behind every other major forest products employer in the South. On top of that, the company wants to reach into every employee's pay envelope and take out a big payment for the health plan."

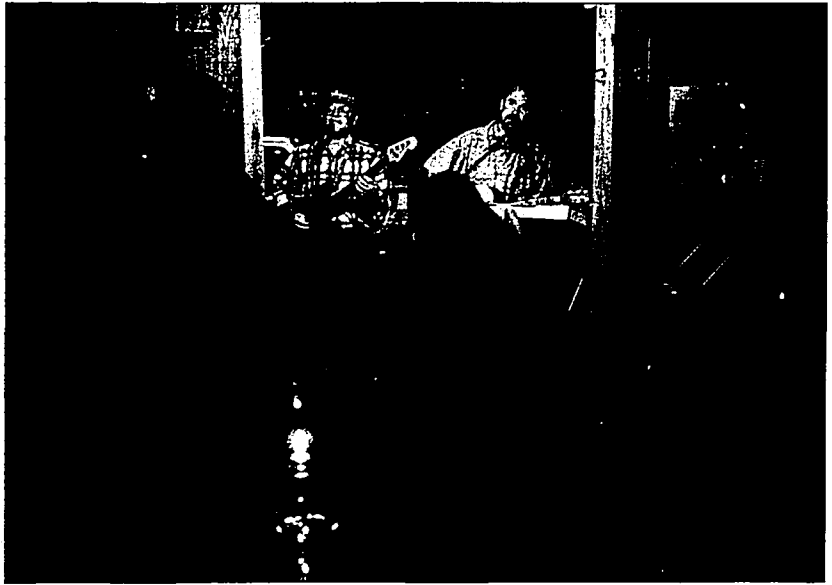

Bright lights, small town

Bruce Willis' Mint has transformed Wood River Valley's music scene

KETCHUM — Time was in this tourist colony — where unpretentiousness is highly esteemed — that glitzy entertainment only meant that the bass guitar was played in.

No more. The lights burn brightly at actor Bruce Willis' Mint in Hailey (population 5,200), home of marquee musical acts and celebrities in multi.

In the 15 months since Willis open his bar and restaurant on the site of the venerable Mint Bar, the likes of Charlie Daniels, B.B. King, Bo Diddley, War and the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band have come to Hailey.

Funkmaster George Clinton, of Parliament/Funkadelic, is due in November, and Willis' own band, The Accelerators, appears frequently.

Though there's no longer live music in every bar in the Wood River Valley, local musicians and innkeepers generally welcome the rising tide of talent that The Mint has generated.

"It's business as usual," said Bob Royce, who owns Whiskey Jacques, a popular downtown Ketchum nightspot, with his wife Karen. Even Willis played Whiskey's in his pre-Mint days.

The Royces think The Mint gives music lovers broader entertainment choices.

"There is room enough for everybody," Bob Royce said. "Plus, it's 12 miles down the road."

Ask Brant Cooper, a regular customer of both The Mint and Whiskey Jacques, to pick his favorite hangout.

"You can't compare them," he said. "We go to The Mint for concerts, but Whiskey Jacques is a get-up-and-dance kind of place."

Both clubs book local and out-of-the-area talent, but "We have a much

Whiskey's has two acts going for it that The Mint supposedly can't claim — The Bobos, a popular local five-piece band, and The Vuarnettes, four

"Bruce ignores us," said Vuarnette Karen Hale, whose group skewers the actor with "He's a Local" to the tune of

'Star Trek' at 30: The art of discovering new life

This month marks 30 years since the Starship Enterprise blazed toward the final frontier on its five-year mission "to explore strange new worlds, to seek out new life and new civilizations, to boldly go where no man has gone before."

It's safe to say, mission accomplished:

Though the "Star Trek" television series ran for only three years after its NBC debut Sept. 8, 1966, it has discovered new life — much of it strange — through syndication, three spinoff TV series, videos, animated series, video games, seven movies and merchandising ranging from a \$398 "tricorder" to plastic Spock ears. It has influenced our language, our culture, even our science.

The merchandising alone is a \$1 billion-a-year industry, says Neil Newman, marketing vice president for Viacom Consumer Products, the Viacom division that controls

licensing. The movies have earned Paramount \$700 million.

Star Trek conventions have become a growth industry worldwide — drawing anywhere from 500 to 10,000 people. The stars, playing the seven key crew members — William Shatner, Leonard Nimoy, DeForest Kelley, James Doohan, George Takei, Nichelle Nichols and Walter Koenig — fetch \$8,000 to \$20,000 for convention appearances; stars of the TV spinoffs — "The Next Generation," "Deep Space Nine" and "Voyager" — command even more.

"Star Trek" is our only modern mythology," says Majel Barrett Roddenberry, wife of "Star Trek" creator Gene Roddenberry, who died in 1991 at age 70.

In 'Golf Dreams,' Updike gives America what fore

"They steal upon the sleeping mind while winter steals upon the landscape, sealing the inviting cups beneath sheets of ice, cloaking the contours of the fairway in snow."

With that sentence, the venerable John Updike conjures a season so deftly that we shiver a bit, wondering whether we should fasten the top button of our shirt or perhaps fetch a sweater from the closet.

And he's just warming up. The sentence opens "Golf Dreams" (Knopf, \$23) a compilation of 30 pieces Updike has written over the years about his favorite game. Yet, with it, he serves notice that this is not so much a book about golf the game as it is about golf as metaphor for life itself.

If it is true that language deftly handled has a power to beguile, then this coming together of John Updike and golf is a godsend.

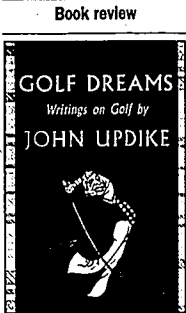
After all, golf is a game that lends itself more than any other to a marriage of the physical and the spiritual. Golf addicts — Updike has been trying to play this game for 40 years — are forever talking of how the game teaches eternal truths, how it speaks to the soul about the meaning of life.

Who better to explain the ethereal meaning of this odd sport than a man famous for his perceptive chronicling of suburban angst in modern-day America?

As much as anyone, Updike understands the facility of trying to propel a tiny ball over 400 yards of ground, around lakes and sand traps and trees and into a small hole in the ground.

In an essay, "Tee on a Trip," he announces that he is about to describe the greatest shot of his life. Then he tells how he badly smothered his drive into deep rough, how his second merely mended a lot of grass, how his third mended the ball six feet out onto the short green grass of the fairway. There, exhausted and humiliated, he found himself faced with a downhill, sidehill lie 230 yards from the green. A difficult lie for a pro golfer, much less an author of fiction.

Trying to emulate the great swings he had seen on television, he then took "a divot the size of an undershirt" 18 inches behind the ball. In his anger, he cast any attempt at a classic swing aside and attacked in a fury.



"Perfectly demented by frustration, I swung as if the club were an ax with which I was reducing an orange crate to kindling wood. Emitting a sucking, oval sound, the second ball, smitten, soared far up the fairway, curving toward the fat part of the green with just the faintest trace of a fade, hit once on the fringe, kicked smartly toward the flagstick, and stopped two feet from the cup. I sank the putt for what my partner justly termed a 'remarkable six.'"

In one richly told anecdote, he succeeds in conveying the cruel vagaries of the game — one moment a torture chamber, the next a passionate love — and why we keep going back to it.

But to Updike, golf is more than a challenge. It is a moral exercise that reminds us of our place in the greater scheme of things.

"This world," he explains, "conspires to flatter us; only golf trusts us with a cruelly honest report on our performance. Only on the golf course is the feedback instantaneous and unrelenting. ... The game and its swing provide a means of self-critique; there is no evading. What often four hours' activity can chasten a magnate with so rich a variety of disappointments, or unman a lothario with so many rebuffed desires? Golf is a square shooter. In the sound of the hit and the flight of the ball it tells us unflinchingly how we are doing, and we are rarely doing well."

Why then, do we keep going back? Why are record numbers of Americans setting up residences in this chamber of mental horrors?

The Great Scott: A century of Fitzgerald

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — Under glass in a university exhibit, a book published in 1922 shows a couple forever young. A tuxedo-clad man with a strong, jutting jaw line poses next to a fine-featured beauty with a thick, blond bob, her slender arms naked in an evening gown.

This fictional pair could be anyone, but it is no accident that they look almost exactly like the book's author, F. Scott Fitzgerald, and his wife, Zelda.

Fitzgerald, born 100 years ago this week, made a career out of blurring the line between life and art, creating an irresistible image of youth, celebrity and excess — an image even more potent today than it was in the 1920s.

He was only 23 when he published "This Side of Paradise," his first and immensely successful novel about the yearning and cynicism of a Princeton undergraduate. "Here was a new generation," he wrote at the end, "... a new generation dedicated more than the last to the feat of poverty and the worship of success;

grown up to find all gods dead, all wars fought, all faiths in man shaken."

With these words, Fitzgerald established himself as the chronicler of an era — the one he christened the Jazz Age. But he could easily have been writing about the aspirations of aging Baby Boomers or the anxieties of Generation X. Eternally modern, Fitzgerald like no other writer is a bridge from the century's start to its end, built by the lyricism of his fiction and the wild drama of his short life.

So omnipresent is Fitzgerald today it seems impossible anyone could grow up in America without knowing something about him. "The Great Gatsby," along with "Romance and Juliet" and "Hamlet," has for decades been one of the top 10 required texts for high school juniors.

Many might envision Fitzgerald looking something like Robert Redford, who played Fitzgerald's misguided hero — Jay Gatsby, the dreamer who accumulates an ill-gotten fortune in a vain attempt to repeat the past and recapture the rich girl he loved years before.

Or maybe you rented your prom outfit at a formal-wear shop called Gatsby's, or got your hair permed at Zelda's salon. Maybe you got toused at one of the many bars called Gatsby's or Zelda's or Scott and Zelda's, a somewhat insensitive homage considering the alcoholism that led to Fitzgerald's heart attack at the sad age of 44. Princeton, where Fitzgerald went to school, is no exception: It, too, has a Zelda's.

and decadence, and the pursuit of only the best of times.

"The names have become synonymous with style," says Princeton historian Don Skemer, who every Sunday searches The New York Times for a Fitzgerald reference and every Sunday finds success. One week a "Great Gatsby" passage in a book review about Afghanistan. The next, a 15-letter crossword answer: Fitzgeraldesque.

Skemer, an animated scholar with large glasses and a ready wit, is trolling among the glass cases of the Fitzgerald exhibit he organized for the Princeton University Library in honor of the Sept. 24 centenary.

"I'm not a Fitz-head," says Skemer, the curator of manuscripts for the library's rare book and special collections department.

"I'm just fascinated at how he works on two levels. On one level, he's this serious writer studied by serious scholars. And on the other level there's this popular appeal."

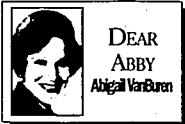
Women's magazines accused of peddling trash

Turturro laughs again - thanks to 'Grace'

NEW YORK — John Turturro shows up for lunch with sunken cheeks and tightly cropped hair, looking so thin that the waiter talks him into a wheat germ "health shake" and a huge chicken sandwich.

It's a bright sunny day and Times Square is bustling, but he seems shy and subdued, nothing like Joel Miller, the fast-talking, big-hearted record producer he plays in "Grace of My Heart."

Loosely modeled on producer Phil Spector, Miller is mentor and mother hen to a singer-songwriter not unlike Carole King, shepherding her to stardom from doo-wop days in a song factory on Broadway.

He wheedles, begs and schemes to get hit music from his protegee, — and she loves him for it. It's a pleasant departure for Turturro, whose many characters haven't exactly been the kind of guys you'd invite home for dinner. He also has some of the funniest lines in the film. "Last night, I saw this movie and I actually enjoyed it," says Turturro, an intense perfectionist. "I was laughing again. It was good for me."

Turturro has been feeling gloomy since getting back from Ukraine, where for the past 19 weeks he's been immersed in the role of Primo Levi, an Italian Jew who survived Auschwitz and described his experiences in a series of remarkable novels. It was a tremendously fulfilling experience — and exhausting.

"I think he's just a marvelous writer. Very humane and delicate and detailed and not overdramatized. It's overpowering because it's so subtle."

Usually, films are about events, not their aftermaths. But "The Truce," which recounts Levi's nine-month journey home to Turin, Italy, through Poland and Russia, is all about consequences, the living through of things, he says. "It's sort of a comic, tragic, beautiful story. You're dealing with the joy and pain of life again versus this overpowering image of where they just came from in the camps. It's a beautiful story, beautiful."

To prepare for the filming with acclaimed Italian director Francesco Rossi, Turturro studied the accents of Turin

(Turturro's own family is largely Sicilian), and read every book of Levi's he could find.

He also dropped 25 pounds, eating tuna fish alone in his room.

"I ate by myself a lot, which, you know, is lonely. It was good for what I was doing, to save my energy for it. It's just sometimes, you can go a little crazy that way."

With his soulful, dark eyes and crooked, tentative smile, Turturro seems at times like what he needs most is a good hug. Along with his obvious intelligence, it's a quality that comes through even in his stranger roles, and helps to make manic

screenwriter "Barton Fink" or "Quiz Show" loser Herbert Stempel somehow sympathetic.

But Turturro insists he'll soon emerge from his funk, and unlike Miller's protegee, played by Heena Douglas, he won't need anyone to cajole him into asserting himself.

"I never had to have somebody push me," he says. "My wife (actress Katherine Borowitz) always says I'm very healthy that way. It's innate. I just go, 'Well, if they knock me down, I'll just get back up.'"

Turturro is an accomplished stage actor with a master's in drama from Yale University, but for years he worked in his

father's construction business, tended bar and even taught 5th and 6th graders while trying to get film roles. His first was in "Raging Bull" — as an extra. But with his quirky features and intense acting style, he didn't last long as a typical wise guy.

Along with Fink and Stempel, which earned him an Academy Award nomination, he has played a psychotic rapist in "Five Corners," a conniving Jewish gangster in "Miller's Crossing," a series of blue-collar bigots in Spike Lee movies and a deeply depressed widower in "Unstrung Heroes." Many of them had a nervous, edge quality, as if they were struggling on the rim of madness.

"I know Madonna a little bit, and she'd seem me do something — 'Miller's Crossing' — and she said, 'You go so far out, you've got to be really normal to do that. You've got to be really stable, or you wouldn't be able to do that.' And I think in a way she's right."

Most of his roles also have been "ethnic," and although they have so little in common that it's hard to imagine any of them sitting down to lunch together,

Turturro still struggles with the idea that his range is limited somehow by his olive skin or Queens accent.

"There's something prejudicial there," he says. "I mean, you go to a country like Italy, you see people of all different classes, doctors, garbage men. It's a whole society there. And no one asks Marcello Mastroianni if he always plays Italian characters."

Medium cool



4 decades after his death, James Dean rules

They still go for it in high school. They try real hard — try to look as if they're not trying at all. They lean against lockers and hang out in shopping malls, jeans pegged, faces clouded with brooding looks, waiting for girls to come along. And the girls do.

This is cool — an enduring, modern, youthful, collective-unconscious cool embodied in the attractiveness of alienation, the magnetism of vulnerability, the simmering sensuality of self-imposed isolation.

Much of today's cool came from one man — one moody boy, really: James Dean.

He was a man encumbered with the world's weight and an overabundance of

The Dean filmography

James Dean starred in only three films in his brief career. But each made an impact, and each endured:

- "East of Eden" (1955): Dean plays Cal Trask, the troubled son of Adam Trask and brother of the polished Aron Trask in this adaptation of John Steinbeck's biblical allegory about a boy trying desperately to win his father's love. This was Dean's debut to the world, and he played it with flair — stirring his words, skulking around, giving life to the troubled-youth persona.
- "Rebel Without a Cause" (1955): A day in the life of Jim Stark, tortured youth starting at a new

school and trying to make new friends — including introverted loner Plato (Sal Mineo) and mis-guided teen-age girl Judy (Natalie Wood).

This film, more than anything, established Dean's rebellious image.

- "Giant" (1956): Released after Dean's death, this epic about two generations of a Texas family cast Dean as intrepid outsider Jett Rink, a brooding ranch hand who falls for the lady of the ranch (Elizabeth Taylor) and clashes with her husband (Rock Hudson) before striking oil on his small parcel of land and becoming rich but never really happy.

sex appeal, a poster boy for the tortured netherworld between child and adult.

Eyes deep, hair tousled, body brimming with emotion so obvious, yet so hidden.

That was James Dean: haunted anti-hero, sensitive male of a pre-sensitive age. Tough when provoked, tender when encouraged. Forever adolescent — be it Jim Stark of "Rebel Without a Cause," Cal Trask of "East of Eden" or even Jett Rink of "Giant," who was allowed to age but not grow into a man.

Each character was running from something — each desperate to take family, world, friend, loves, and pick them all apart with conflict and heartache, then somehow reassemble them into some newly chiseled sense of belonging.

This weekend, 41 years after Dean died at the age of 24 in a car crash, "Giant," for which he received a posthumous Academy Award nomination, is being re-released to a world filled with

people who may never have seen his movies but undoubtedly know of the actor who many believe never really knew himself.

"I gotta know who I am," Dean's Cal Trask says. "I gotta know what I'm like." Today he is — like all good, prematurely deceased icons from JFK to Marilyn to Morrison to Hendrix to Lennon to Elvis to Cobain — whatever his public wants.

Dean remains fresh despite a limited oeuvre of bit parts, stage appearances, scattered television shows and, of course, three memorable starring roles in movies he made before death came at a rural California intersection.

Why does he endure? In a word: cool. The iconography of modern cool — white cool, at least — starts, really, with James Dean.

Some of the those little things filmmakers to that annoy us

Odds and ends from a summer when movies reminded us about all the little things filmmakers do that annoy us:

- The Exploding Fish Tank. When watching an action movie, you can be sure that whenever you see a gigantic fish tank, it is just about ready to explode. It happened last year in "Outbreak" and "Bad Boys." It happened again this summer in "Mission: Impossible," a movie about a government agent whose boss turns out to be corrupt. A few weeks later, another fish tank blew in "Eraser," a movie about a government agent whose boss (James Caan, corrupt in three movies this summer) turns out to be corrupt.

Speaking of "Eraser," the movie won wide praise from critics for its ultra-original stunt featuring Arnold Schwarzenegger leaping from a plane, grabbing a parachute in mid-air and safely deploying it.

Ultra-original, except Keanu Reeves did the same thing a few years ago in "Point Break," and was soon topped in "Terminal Velocity" by Charlie Sheen, who jumped from a plane, crawled into a free-falling Cadillac, took the keys from the ignition, opened the trunk, rescued Nastassja Kinski and deployed his chute before hitting the ground.

• The Convenient Drawbridge. Need to make a getaway from the cops?

Head for the nearest drawbridge, which is sure to be raised

just as the police arrive, enabling you to make a narrow getaway. This dog-eared device cropped up in "The Net," "Just Cause" and, most recently, "Chain Reaction," although Keanu Reeves — yes, the parachute guy — faked everybody out by pretending to beat the cops across the raised drawbridge, then doubling back under the bridge, just in case anyone had seen "The Net."

• The Carefully Placed Table. When someone falls from a great height to their death, they thoughtfully make the whole thing cinematic by falling first through a skylight, then into a glass coffee table to boot. Check it out in "Bad Boys" and "Virtuosity."

• The Crouching Varmint. The suspense can always be height-

ened by having a small animal jump out of shadows and scream at the protagonist — "The Indian in the Cupboard," "Species."

• The Curse of St. Elmo's Fire. A curse hovers over male members of the cast, part of the once-great Brit Pack, now so obscure they are routinely killed or beaten as part of the plot.

Andrew McCarthy, playing a gay hustler in "Mulholland Falls," is shot to death. Rob Lowe has a cameo in the same movie, and is on screen only long enough to be punched in the face by Nick Nolte. An elevator crushes Emilio Estevez in the opening scene of "Mission: Impossible."

The curse is catching up to female cast members as well. After box-office superstardom, Demi Moore bombed with "The Scarlet Letter" and "Striptease."

Mare Winningham got an Oscar nomination but was forced to listen to Jennifer Jason Leigh sing in "Georgia."

• Tinker, Tailor, Soldier, Sculptor. Though only one person in a billion makes their living as a sculptor, in movies, professional sculptors appear to account for roughly half of the gross national product. Jeff Daniels welds metal dinosaurs in "Fly Away Home," Liam Neeson fashions giant Du Champ knockoffs in "Before and After," Lois Smith makes metal pinwheels in "Twister" and Demi Moore designs interactive box sculpture in "The Juror."

• Wouldn't You Really Rather Drive a Humvee? Though only one person in a billion owns one of these Desert Storm monstrosities, in movies they are more commonplace than pickup trucks, especially in San Francisco.

Thus, in "The Rock," when Sean Connery sprints out of a San Fran hotel and steals the first vehicle, it's a Humvee. Maybe it belonged to Wesley Snipes, who in "The Fan" plays a Giants outfielder who drives a Humvee, later stolen by Robert De Niro.

Actors swing into their own stunts

LOS ANGELES (AP) — There's Tom Cruise hurling himself through a plate glass window as a huge aquarium explodes behind him. Then there's Helen Hunt facing down twisters as homes and cows fly by. And, of course, there's Arnold Schwarzenegger doing... everything.

It seems all the rage these days — actors doing their own stunts in action blockbusters. And while industry insiders say the Big Names are doing more stunts, there's still a lot of work out there for the men and women who make a living risking life and limb for that extra heart-pounding shot.

Stunt professionals say some actors do as much as 90 percent of their own stunts. But it's that last 10 percent — the high falls, the ear-drum-shattering explosions — that are generally left to the experts.

"A lot of the time, you get a Sylvester Stallone, a Bruce Willis, and these are ballsy guys," says longtime stuntman Roy Clark. "Depending on the actor, he wants to let the public (see) him doing everything. There are times you have to tell an actor not to do his own stunt."

One actor who won't allow anyone else to do his stunts is Hong Kong phenomenon Jackie Chan, who prides himself in doing all of his action sequences.

Chan has been doing his own inimitable brand of martial arts mayhem for 15 years but his big breakthrough in the United States came with "Rumble in the Bronx," which included in the final credits some of the stunts he botched, including a leap in which he broke his ankle.

The 41-year-old star is a walking miracle of physical endurance. He has broken numerous bones doing stunts, and sports a hole in his head the size of a quarter, suffered when he fell out of a tree during a

stunt. But conditions in Hollywood are a little different in Hong Kong, where any insurance is hard to come by, says Chan's "Supercop" co-star Michelle Khan.

Can you imagine, she says, sitting down with a local insurance agent and demanding accident coverage for 40-foot falls, ear-splitting explosions and leaps between skyscrapers. And that's just the opening scene?

Khan laughs. "Here we're almost not really covered by insurance," she said.

Operating under different handicaps, action filmmakers stateside at least try to make it look like the famous faces are performing every stunt.

"Hopefully, you should never know," Clark said. "That's the mystique of the business. You of the paying public, we don't want you to know."

Still, actors pushing the stunt envelope abound.

Christian Slater apparently did a lot of his own stunts for "Broken Arrow," including working out with boxer Carlos Palomino, a former World Boxing Council welterweight champ, to add to the authenticity of the film's opening sequence when he spars with John Travolta's character in a gym.

Sylvester Stallone, no stranger to danger, was deemed "super-heroic" for the work he did in his upcoming film "Daylight," which includes a scene of him running between the massive revolving blades of a "monster machine."

And Helen Hunt's work in "Twister" reportedly left her battered from the effort of doing much of the work herself.

It was rumored that she got a concussion from filming one scene in which she opened the door of a vehicle that was speeding through a cornfield, according to Entertainment Weekly.

Getting tomorrow's news today

'Early Edition' hero saves the day with *real* early edition of Chicago newspaper

CHICAGO (AP) — Gary Hobson can be a millionaire any day. Or every day.

He can be a hero, or a bum. It's all up to him, thanks to the Chicago Sun-Times plunked down on his doorstep every morning that gives him all the news that's fit to change lives. The twist: He gets tomorrow's paper today.

That's the premise of "Early Edition," a one-hour CBS drama premiering at Saturday and starring Kyle Chandler (from ABC's "Homefront") as Hobson, the dare-to-be-decent stockbroker with his own psychic newswire that grants him the power to shape the future.

Disasters? He can stop 'em. Sports scores? He doesn't need a point spread. The stock market? This guy doesn't need any tips from Louis Rukeyser.

The story begins as Hobson's wife tosses him out (for some unknown reason) and the paper mysteriously pops up at his hotel door, along with a telegenic tabby cat.

Once Hobson realizes what's happened — he has the next day's paper — he makes a killing at the track, then gives his \$15,000 winnings to a blind co-worker who needs cash for a guide dog. The next day, another early edition leads him to prevent a hostage situation, robbery and massacre at a bank.

So will this turn out to be Hobson the Hero doing good deeds every week because of his mystical — and free — home-delivery? "What we don't want to have happen is a guy gets up in the morning, reads the paper and says, 'I'm going to be Superman,'" promises Michael Dinner, the show's director and an executive producer, whose credits include "Chicago Hope."

"There are forces at work through this guy," Dinner says. "There also will be twists. Just when you start to figure it out as an audience, you'll be led down

an alley, a blind alley. Sometimes he'll succeed. Sometimes he won't."

"The character will be quite human and mistakes will be made," confirms Chandler, who has been living in Chicago, occasionally bicycling to work, while the show is filmed here. "His good deeds will be more poignant."

Co-starring in the show are Fisher Stevens, his greed-is-good best friend Chuck, who calls his buddy's gift "opportunity with a capital O" as in dough, and Shanasia Davis as Marissa, the saintly blind receptionist who urges him to use his knowledge to do good.

"This guy's got a devil on one

shoulder and an angel on another," Dinner says. "He is a kind of Everyman. ... He wants to do the right thing, but he doesn't want this thrust on him."

"Early Edition" makes use of Chicago as a backdrop, with familiar scenes of the "el," downtown and neighborhoods, as well as a few tired Cubs games. The Sun-Times also gets a nice plug: the newspaper gave the show's producers permission to use its name.

Despite the real-life location, the show depicts a cozy, sweet Chicago — don't look for any explicit-spewing David Mamet characters lurking in the corner bar — that resembles one big Bedford Falls. The hero even

greet the owner of his corner newspaper stand by name.

"At times, the feel of the show is very real," Dinner says. "At times, it's like a fairy tale. ... There's a certain sense of whimsy in the story, a sense of irony. People used to say Capra-esque. Maybe that's what it is."

And how would Chandler, the actor, respond if he knew the headlines a day in advance? "The first thing I'd do," he says with a smile, "is go to a convenience store and get a tall fountain drink and fill out some lotto tickets."

And then? "I would help people. I would hope so."

Faust. "Yes, I think I would."

long and profitable run. Now make way for instructional CD-ROMs. One of the newest is "eMedia Guitar Method," a disc aimed primarily at adolescents and adults learning guitar for the first time.

"eMedia Guitar Method is a collection of 60 guitar lessons. It starts with the most basic of the basics, such as holding the guitar and picking, and continues through advanced picking styles and strumming techniques.

Most lessons feature still pictures and video and audio clips that let students see and hear what they are trying to achieve.

This offers a clear advantage over instructional books. And the \$59.95 price for the CD-

ROM is much less expensive than personal guitar lessons.

Too bad this disc puts so much emphasis on traditional folk tunes in its lessons.

In one sense, that's a benefit because folks tunes are widely recognized, so beginners already know what they should sound like. But on a CD-ROM capable playing an audio clip, knowing the songs in advance is less of a requirement than it is with printed books.

The downside, though, is that people who want to learn guitar — especially younger students — rarely get excited over the chance to play "Frere Jacques," "Home on the Range," "The Yellow Rose of Texas," or "Jingle Bells."

Written by the 30-year-old Louisiana native after she locked her boyfriend out of the house, "Did I Shave My Legs for This?" finds the narrator putting on a new dress and painting her nails in hopes of getting some attention from her beau, who responds by plopping himself down in front of the TV and popping open a beer.

"Well it's perfectly clear, between the TV and beer! won't get so much as a kiss/As I head for the door I turn around to be sure/Did I shave my legs for this?"

"When we do it live, it's pretty much acoustically based like the record, and it's sparse, so it kind of commands your attention, and the women listen intently to the words," says the raspy-voiced singer from her Nashville home. "It's kind of shocking to hear someone singing about that. But by the time we get around to the women listen intently to the words, and everybody starts screaming and clapping."

However, Carter's label, Capitol Nashville, has chosen to introduce the outspoken blonde to country audiences with more radio-friendly "Strawberry Wine," vivid coming-of-age song. Label executives say "Did I Shave My Legs for This?," the title track from her debut album released last week, is being considered for a future single but no

decision has been made. Record companies tend to shy away from releasing songs that are too personal, powerful or political as singles because they fear country radio won't play them. Even Reba McEntire's groundbreaking AIDS ballad, 1994's "She Thinks His Name Was John," was released only after two Texas country stations played it and got strong listener response.

The critically acclaimed title track to Mary Chapin Carpenter's 1994 album "Steady as the Road" — in which she traces the failed ideals of the baby-boom generation — earned airplay on public-radio outlets but was never released as a single.

The airplay climate hasn't changed: Lorrie Morgan's "I Can Buy My Own Roses," about a jilted woman who wants more than just flowers as a peace offering, is not yet scheduled to be released even though it's the best on her new album, "Greater Need."

Stretch Peters' "On a Bus to St. Cloud," a moving examination of loss, already bombed as a single when Trisha Yearwood recorded it, for 1995's "Thinkin' About You."

It's unlikely to get a second

chance with Peters' version, one of the stellar tracks on her debut record, "The Secret of Life."

By design, country radio is a haven for upbeat, three-minute ditties catchy enough to leave a few lyrics and a melody in the listener's head but not so involved that they provoke further thought.

"Radio is entertainment, and most programmers feel that people want pretty upbeat, bright entertainment from their radio 90 percent of the time," says Lon Helton, country editor for trade publication Radio & Records. "If you're in a great mood, you probably wouldn't want to see a movie that you read was really dark."

"Any time you have a record left or right of center, when you first put it on, it takes the audience a little longer to warm up to it," says Helton. "Every time you use the radio, you are doing something else, you're not really sitting there paying attention to lyrics. The songs that are really meaningful take a little longer to sink in."

As a result, some artists don't even bother approaching country radio. Kansas City, Mo.-based Iris DeMent is considered a country artist by virtue of her raw, Appalachian sound, her blue-grass-tinged soprano and her connection to Merle Haggard, who recorded one of her songs and featured her in his touring band last year.

But DeMent's Warner Bros. albums are promoted out of Los Angeles, not Nashville, and her songs are staples on American stations and public radio, not mainstream country outlets.

How Yearwood got 'Believe Me Baby (I Lied)'

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The setting is a quaint bluesgrass club, the event is a listening party for singer-songwriter Gillian Welch.

Welch, a fine artist, had the spotlight that April evening at the Station Inn.

This story is about a bit of business on the periphery, something that happens over lunches and at shows and in conversation at many Nashville events: finding the right home for a song.

The tune at stake that night was "Believe Me Baby (I Lied)," written by Kim Richey, Larry Gottlieb and Angelo. Everyone who heard the song thought it was a hit, and they were proven right when Trisha Yearwood recorded it.

Superstition prevented Scott Borchetta, who does radio promotions for MCA Records, from saying outright the smash hit would go No. 1, but he thought it was a "No. 1 contender." The record is a breezy slice of pop with a lyrical twist and an irresistible chorus, reminiscent of the Linda Ronstadt hits from the 1970s that remain Yearwood's favorites to this day. "You're definitely going to choose songs that you feel some kind of connection with," she said.

Yearwood's producer Garth

By Nashville music industry etiquette, a song put on "hold" by an artist is untouchable to other artists until the first-comers opt against recording it.

By the time Sisters Morales let it go, Richey was preparing to record her second album for Mercury Records, after a poor reception by radio stations to her first one. So, she could keep the song in hopes of using it to achieve her own first hit, or go with a sure thing in Yearwood.

Scott Faschall, right-hand man to Fundis, sprang into action when he spotted Richey at the Welch event. He was scouting for good uptempo songs for Yearwood for what became her "Everybody Knows" album. On each Yearwood project the same problem creeps up — too many ballads and not enough of the

uptempo material radio programmers prefer.

Fundis said Richey seemed a little depressed because her single, "Those Words We Said," which has also been recorded by Yearwood, had not become a hit.

"Scott started hitting on her ... You sure you don't want to give another shot at the song?" And Kim looked at Scott and looked at Luke (Lewis, head of her record label, Mercury), and she said, "Let's talk tomorrow."

The Welch event happened on a Friday night. "I called him late Sunday night and said, 'You can have the song,'" Richey said.

At MCA Records, executives listened to the new Yearwood CD in hopes of finding the right first single. It was a crucial decision, because Yearwood was coming off a flop at country radio — but a hit on adult contemporary stations — with the beautiful ballad, "On a Bus to St. Cloud."

"By the second run through the album, this was the one screaming to be the first single," Borchetta said. "You want a single that kind of screams 'new album project' at you. With Trisha we've had more success with songs that have a little bit of tempo and this is a great tempo song with great lyrics."

CMA award elusive for Shania Twain, other country artists

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Like many a big-selling country music artist who has never taken home a Country Music Association award, Shania Twain maintains that the accolade is not all that important.

Until, that is, you win one.

The 30th CMA Awards will be broadcast live by CBS at 6 p.m. EDT Wednesday from the Grand Ole Opry House. Vince Gill will be host of the show.

"If I win something I'll hit the ceiling and be jumping for joy 'cause it always feels great," said Twain, who has been selling more albums than anyone else in country music for most of the past 18 months.

Despite selling over 7 million of her "The Woman in Me" CD, Twain has never won a CMA Award. Three nominations this year give her six since 1995.

Her success was recognized last year with a Grammy and two awards from the Academy of Country Music, a California-based rival to the CMA.

"I have to admit that being accepted by the industry that you work amongst and with — it means a lot," Twain said.

Twain is up for CMA awards this year for best female vocalist and the Horizon Award for most promising. Also, her "Any Man of Mine," written with husband-producer Mutt Lange, is up for best song.

A short list of hot artists who have never won a CMA Award would include Twain, Dwight Yoakam, Faith Hill, Tim McGraw, Tracy Byrd and Wynonna Judd as solo artists.

All-time great Buck Owens, who will be inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame during this year's show, never won a CMA Award during his heyday.

Snagging a performing slot on the show may be just as valuable in business terms as winning. Last year, Twain made a big splash (and likely sold some CDs) opening the television show by vamping through the star-studded audience singing "Any Man of Mine." This time around, she'll preview her new single for the

There were some fresh nominations this year. Bryan White and Collin Raye are nominated for best male vocalist, and the 14-year-old Rimes is up for the Horizon Award and best single for her breakthrough Patsy Cline soundalike, "Blue."

With only five nominations apiece in 12 categories, a CMA nomination (by industry voters) is not easy to snag.

"To be quite honest with you I really wish that I did have more recognition," said singer Travis Tritt.

Tritt has been nominated for 13 CMA awards. He won the Horizon Award in 1991, and three others over the years in minor categories. He hasn't been nominated for best male vocalist, or entertainer of the year since 1992.

"I've sold 14 million albums. Knock on wood, I've been very, very fortunate in this business but I've done it without a whole lot of recognition not only from the CMAs but from any of the awards ..."

"I would be much more scared ... about my career if exactly the opposite was happening, if I was winning all kinds of awards with the CMA and couldn't sell an album to save my life, or I couldn't sell a concert ticket to save my life. That would be a terrible situation to be in."

Bad Religion not about rules, labels

"There's all these rules about being punk now," says Bad Religion guitarist Brian Baker. "Which I think is kind of interesting. Because those of us who — oh, I don't know — STARTED the thing, we didn't really have that."

He laughs, and rightly so. Baker may be a recent addition to Bad Religion, but he's no newcomer to punk rock.

In fact, by the time Bad Religion released its first album, in 1982, Baker already had a presence on the D.C. hard-core scene, having moved from Government Issue to Minor Threat; since then, he's also put in time as a member of both Dag Nasty and the Meatmen. Clearly, the guy is no Johnny (Rotten)-come-lately.

Maybe that's why he seems so bemused by those punk purists who complain that Bad Religion has "sold out." After all, carp these critics, the band not only left the independently owned Epitaph label for Atlantic Records, but split with Epitaph owner (and former Bad Religion guitarist) Brett Gurewitz. Obviously, the band is therefore a slave to corporate rock, right?

Wrong. "The label has absolutely nothing to do with the creative output of Bad Religion," says Baker. "The only thing the label has to do with our band is the name on the back of the record, and the fact that you can go into a Kmart in Nome, Alaska, and buy it."

"To me, anybody who is upset about what label the band is on is, I think, a lot bigger fan of whatever label, you know? A bigger Epitaph fan than a Bad Religion fan."

That's not the case in Europe, where Bad Religion's latest album, "The Gray Race," has been a significant success. "Whatever people perceive us to be over in Europe, I don't think that it's 'punk' first and then 'contemporary second,'" he says.

"We're not really very niche-specific there. It actually seems to be a bit more of an open-minded situation."

Mellencamp plugs in on latest album

John Mellencamp is famous for having one of the shortest tempers this side of Henry VIII. But after suffering a heart attack two years ago, the singer has stopped touring, started exercising, changed his diet — he's even named his new album "Mr. Happy Go Lucky."

But if you take the album title at face value, Mellencamp has some oceanfront property in his home state of Indiana. He'd like to sell you, "I'm still a red head, a definite Type A personality," he says by phone from his Bloomington, Ind. recording studio. "I have grown up since the heart attack, but there are plenty of times today when I turn into a 14-year-old. I'm not proud of that, but that's still who I am."

Mellencamp, 44, has come to a crossroads in his checkered career that began 20 years ago under the name "Johnny Cougar" (a sobriquet foisted on

him by his then-manager). Tired of endless touring — and wary of the toll it takes on his body — he's refusing to perform concerts

to support "Mr. Happy Go Lucky." Worried about falling into a rut, he's replaced his trademark heartland-rock with a bold fusion of hip-hop and Delta blues.

The singer hired Brooklyn techno-dance producer Junior Vasquez to craft the album's electronic rhythms — a move which caused drummer Kenny Aronoff to quit the band after 20 years. While Mellencamp admits such changes might seem drastic, he says they were long overdue.

"By the early '90s, the John Mellencamp band had become bloated ... When we made the album 'Human Wheels,' everybody was sitting around the studio talking on their cell phones, reading newspapers and I was like, 'For crying out loud, can we get focused here?'" he says.

His new focus is bound to draw accusations of bandwagon-jumping. A millionaire rock star from the cornfields of Indiana has no business playing hip-hop, the skeptics will say.

But the Hoosier rocker vehemently denies charges of musical free-loading and compares "Mr. Happy Go Lucky" to his 1987 LP, "The Lonesome Jubilee," on which he fused Stoney rock with the hillbilly folk sounds of mandolin, fiddle and dulcimer. The album drew massive critical acclaim and spawned the hits "Paper in Fire" and "Cherry Bomb."

"We used all those Appalachian instruments in a much different way than they were intended to be used, and that's exactly what we're doing here — we're using hip-hop tools, but we're tinkering around and we're using them in a totally different fashion than hip-hop artists do," he says.

The singer is promoting his 14th album in a vastly different fashion as well. In place of his kinetic live shows, he'll rely on radio and video stations to spread the word of "Mr. Happy Go Lucky" and its first single,

"Key West Intermezzo (I Saw You First)." Touring, he says, is one part of his job he's grown to loathe.

"I've been on tour my whole life — part of the time you end up putting a smile on your face and going on autopilot ... and it's like being an actor," he says. "I always make sure fans have a damn good time, but to be honest, there are times where it's 10 minutes before show time and there's 18,000 people out there, and I'm asleep backstage. Someone says 'John ... better wake up — it's time to go on.' And I say 'Huh? What?'"

He got the loudest wakeup call of his life in 1994 during his "Dance Naked" tour. After going to his doctor complaining of fatigue, he found out he'd suffered a mild heart attack a few days earlier.

Doctors told him his life wasn't in danger — 90 percent of his heart remained healthy — but the news threw him for a loop.

Rush trims sound; Keith Sweat goes sensuous, sensitive

• Rush, "Test for Echo" (Atlantic) — With all the stuff about modems and modern media on the lyric sheet, some fans might expect to find Rush experimenting with the computerized crunch of techno or industrial music.

Instead, the band's sound is surprisingly conservative this time around, downplaying synth tricks and multiple overdubs in favor of lean, guitar-based arrangements. Many songs, in fact, rely on a sort of riff-based writing style that harks back to the band's early days.

Of course, that slightly retro writing strategy shouldn't be taken to mean Rush has abandoned the pop-friendly approach it has been refining since "Signals," for the songs here are as tuneful and tightly structured as ever. From the urgent momentum of the title tune to the soaring majesty of "The Color of Right," these tracks invariably emphasize the vocal melody, relegating the instrumental interplay to the background.

But in a way that gives the

band the best of both worlds; the likes of "Time and Motion" and "Virtuality" are full of intricate interplay while avoiding any sense of self-indulgence. So what the listener comes away with isn't a sense of Rush's technical acumen, but an appreciation for the band's ability to make tuneful, challenging music.

• New Edition, "Home Again" (MCA) — There was something inevitable about the New Edition reunion, especially given the deep slumps into which the individual members' solo careers had sunk.

But there was no reason to have expected the reunion album to be as good as this is. Granted, it doesn't hurt that this is the super-expanded New Edition, including both Bobby Brown and Johnny Gill, as well as Ralph Tresvant, Ricky Bell, Mike "Biv" Bivins and Ronnie DeVoe. But it isn't the assembled star power that carries the album so much as it is the strength of the material. New Edition was always about cooper-

ation, not solo spots or star turns, and supporting all those voices puts a lot of pressure on the songwriting.

But the album's best songs have no trouble meeting that challenge. For one thing, there's plenty here for these six to harmonize on, whether in the silky, sophisticated style of "I'm Still in Love with You" or in the more free-flowing fashion of "Oh, It Feels So Good"; for another, this older and wiser Edition is able to work a groove with greater authority, as "Something About You" makes plain.

Who'd have thought New Edition would really deliver something new?

• Suzanne Vega, "Nine Objects of Desire" (A&M) — Even though she was originally lumped in with the '80s folk revival, Suzanne Vega is no more a "folk singer" than Paul Simon is.

So don't worry about the odd array of sounds she's assembled for her fifth album, "Nine Objects of Desire," because

though these songs may sound different from her earlier efforts, they feel very much the same. Naturally, a lot of that has to do with her ability to be both tuneful and conversational in her songs, a gift that gets put to excellent use in the wryly observed "Stockings" and the oddly meditative "Honeycomb Suite."

But there's also a chameleon-like quality to the writing that allows her to appropriate new musical styles without losing her artistic sense of place. So "Thin Man" takes on a tropical lilt (with echoes of Steely Dan in the keyboards), "Caramel" melts into languid, bossa nova cadences, and "No Cheap Thrill" flirts with calypso rhythms throughout its Runyonesque verse.

No wonder, then, that Vega's "Nine Objects" sounds so desirable.

• Keith Sweat, "Keith Sweat" (Elektra) — With all the freaky grooves getting folks hot and

bothered in the two-year absence of slow-jam maestro Keith Sweat, one was beginning to wonder if he could keep up with the pace when he got back into the mix.

But instead of being out of step, the songwriter-producer's self-entitled fifth album only shows how mature and sexy his material is compared to the hum-and-grind grooves of the charistanday.

Though Sweat may not be any Luther Vandross or R. Kelly when it comes to his vocal skills, he more than makes up for it with his sensuous grooves, like the steamy "Yumi." He also heats up things with guest vocalists such as Gerald Levert and Ronald Isley.

Though Sweat is straight-forward, he doesn't get too explicit and allows listeners to figure out things for themselves.

And the new-jack king shows he can still provide the up-tempo jams, as shown in his No. 1 smash, "Twisted," a low-key groove that's still perfect for the dance floor.

Foo Fighters emerge from Cobain's shadow

Former Nirvana drummer Dave Grohl pulls new band onto its own musical pathway

Nirvana will always be remembered as Kurt Cobain's band. But the group's rendition of "Come as You Are" during its 1993 "MTV Unplugged" performance shone a brief spotlight on another talent in the band.

That would be drummer Dave Grohl, who worked his snare drum and high-back cymbal and provided haunting backup vocals for a tense but restrained dynamic that subtly drove the song.

That moment provides an inkling of the alt-rock musicality Grohl displays on his album, "Foo Fighters" — a hard-rocking affair with enough melodic sensibility to keep it from being just another slab of grunge-orama.

After years of playing in bands before Nirvana, you can understand what Grohl's getting at when he sings: "Trace around the corner, this is what I've learned/Always waited for my turn."

"Foo Fighters" is both an album title and a group name. With the exception of Alghan Whig Greg Dulli, who plays guitar on the song "X-Static," Grohl is the lone musician on the album.

He began working on the 12 songs even before he joined Nirvana in 1990.

But since it was recorded, he's fleshed out the Foo Fighters — the nickname for Japanese fighter pilots during World War II — to include former Gorms guitarist and Nirvana sideman Pat Smear, as well as bassist Nate Mendel and drummer William Goldsmith from the group Sunny Day Real Estate.

The "Foo Fighters" demo tape became the subject of considerable music industry buzz and an intense bidding war when it surfaced in 1994.

Were it not for the recently released Neil Young/Fear! Jam collaboration, "Mirror Ball," it

would easily have been the rock release of the summer of 1995.

And with good reason: "Foo Fighters" is a killer of an album, sounding like a fiery group effort rather than a one-man project. But it's a deeply personal record, too, as Grohl digs deep into his psyche, dredging through the pain of Cobain's suicide — which makes you wonder why he chose to put a pistol on the "Foo

Fighters" cover — and of his own uncertainty about where to go next.

That terrain is understandably bleak at points: "Where have all the wishes gone? Now that all of that is done/Wish I would've felt I've won for once," he laments on "X-Static." But the conclusion he reaches on "I'll Stick Around" is ultimately hopeful, as he resolves to "learn from all that

came from it."

Grohl clearly has learned his lessons well. More serviceable than memorable as a singer, on "Foo Fighters" he shows a gift for layering instruments to achieve maximum dynamics.

Dense walls of guitar drive rockers such as "Weenie Beenie," "Alone and Easy Target" and "Good Grief." "Watershed" is blazing hard-core

rock, while "For All the Cows" employs a relaxed cocktail jazz beat.

The urgent album-opener "This is a Call" is indeed a call to arms, with an anthemic refrain that's as catchy as Nirvana's "Smells Like Teen Spirit."

And "Exhausted" with its gloomy, distorted guitars, evokes modern rock spiritual forebears Neil Young and Crazy Horse.

Want to party? Pack bags for Florida State

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Florida State University is national champion, but not in football. FSU was named the No. 1 party school in the country by the Princeton Review's "Advantage Guide to the Best 310 Colleges."

And to delight the hearts of Seminoles all the more, the book ranked arch-rival University of Florida No. 3.

"That's the good," said Tom Guillot, a 22-year-old junior at FSU. "We beat 'em again. We beat 'em in everything."

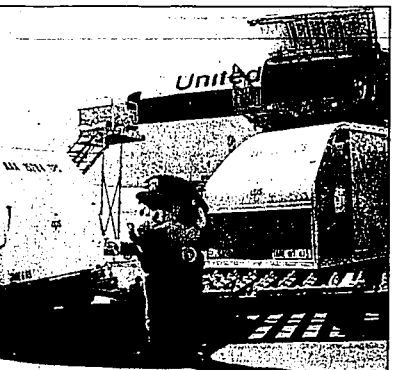
FSU dethroned three-time champion University of Rhode Island, which failed to finish in the top 10 after banning alcohol on campus last year. George Washington University in Washington was No. 2.

FSU, which won college football national championship in the 1993 season, was ranked fourth in the guide's first edition, and then came in second three years in a row behind Rhode Island.

This is the first year it came in No. 1. "That doesn't surprise me," said Calista Moser, a 21-year-old FSU music major, upon learning of the ranking. "Where did we come in academics? No. 350?"

FSU President Sandy D'Alemberte said he assumed the list had destroyed the school's academic reputation before he took the time to read the entire entry.

From Nintendo comes the 64-bit question: Will it sell?

Scott McCall couldn't wait for Monday's U.S. release of Nintendo's 64-bit video-game system, so he ordered one from Japan.

"Anybody who has played on this machine is really impressed with it," says Scott, 18, who lives in Elizabeth, Pa., and is the Webmaster of an unofficial Nintendo home page on the Internet. (See <http://www.nauti.com.net/www.capscott/>) "This will definitely be a big seller this Christmas."

That is certainly the hope of Nintendo, a company that watched its main rivals, Sega and Sony, battle it out in Christmas 1995 with their 32-bit systems, the Sega Genesis and the Sony PlayStation. Nintendo stayed with its 16-bit system while working on the 64-bit model. (The higher the bit number, the more power.) Nintendo, Sega and Sony command more than 90 percent of the \$5 billion U.S. video-game market.

The war for your video dollar is

about to begin in earnest. Sega and Sony are gearing up by dropping the price on their hardware to \$199. Sega also lowered prices on most of its games by \$10.

And they know their market. Research shows that 73 percent of the console players are boys, so most of the new games are heavy on fighting.

If you are trying to choose which system to take home, here are some things to consider. Nintendo 64 is no doubt the biggest and newest technology. "It's the most highly anticipated development as far as gamers and kids are concerned," says Paul Anderson, senior associate editor of Game Informer Magazine, published by Funco in Minnesota.

It's fun to play. The graphics and special effects are described by many who have played the game as being well beyond anything out there.

Nintendo uses a cartridge system, not a CD-ROM format. The advantage is plus-and-play speed. And the action is faster with a cartridge than a CD, which needs

time to boot up. The disadvantage is cartridges are more expensive to produce.

But Nintendo 64 is expensive. The price for the hardware is \$199, like the others. But add Super Mario software (\$69.95) and an extra controller (\$29.95) and you're already up to about \$300.

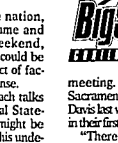

4 take Speedway points championships

TWIN FALLS—Eddy McKeen accumulated 1,294 points, Doug Dugger 824 points, and Toby Campbell 930 points and Kyr Simpson 793 points in winning the four track championships contested at Magic Valley Speedway in 1996.

Qualifying pays 12 points for setting the quick time in the class with the second quickest paying 10 points, and third through 11th are reduced from nine to one point. The beat races pay the same number of points as the qualifying races for the first 11 places.

The Main event is worth 50 points for the win and two points less for each position down through 25th. This makes the maximum number of points for any event 74 for winning the main event, heat race and being the quickest qualifier.

The Mountain Dew Grand American Modified drivers also participate in the NASCAR Winston Racing Series. Magic Valley Speedway is in the Great West Division. Eddy McKeen finished first in the region and seventh in the national standings. In the regional standings, the top 10 is made up of the 10 track champions from that region. Drivers

must win their track championship to finish in the top 10 in the region.

The region standings are determined by an index system that uses the percentage of main event victories in 20 weekly starts and that number being taken times the number of cars competed against. The cars are then placed in order of this index. The larger the number of cars in the field, the more the win is worth.

The national standings are determined the exact same way by taking the 10 regional winners and ranking them in the same index system.

This Saturday night, the largest crowd in Speedway history will be up for grabs. The Intermountain Short Track Championships will go to the event winners. McKeen will go head-to-head with Todd Ellison, who finished third in the region in a field of Modifieds expected to number over 30.

The very fast Midget race cars will be in action, as will Pony Stock cars from Idaho, Utah, Nevada and Oregon. For the very first time, full-sized racing pickup trucks will be coming from Utah. Time trials are at 6:30 and racing begins at 7 p.m. Adult admission is \$10.

New signs of slowing economy point to contained inflation

WASHINGTON — Fresh signs of a slowing economy emerged Thursday, supporting this week's Federal Reserve decision against raising interest rates to avoid a new round of inflation.

Government reports showed that orders for big-ticket durable goods in August suffered the biggest loss in 16 months, and new claims for unemployment benefits jumped last week to the highest level since mid-July.

"These numbers make Chairman Greenspan look pretty smart," said economist Maury Harris of PrattenWebber Inc. in New York. "All the data is telling the same story: The economy is slowing down."

Fed Chairman Alan Greenspan has held in recent weeks that inflationary pressures did not necessitate interest rate hikes.

Thursday's news sent stocks and bonds higher on Wall Street, with the Dow Jones industrial average up 17.38 points at \$5,894.74 at midday.

Bonds rallied for a third straight session, sending the yield on the 30-year Treasury bond to 6.87 percent, down from late Wednesday's 6.92 and the lowest level in more than a month.

After meeting secretly for almost five hours on Tuesday, Fed policy makers surprised many analysts and voted to hold interest rates steady, apparently convinced the economy was slowing on its own and not threatening renewed inflation.

It was the Federal Open Market Committee's last meeting until Nov. 13, eight days after the presidential election. Some analyst believe officials will use that occasion to raise rates as insurance against an overheated economy.

For instance, economist Richard Bomer of the Mellon Bank in Pittsburgh said the current economic moderation was just the end and predicted: "We will see somewhat stronger growth as we go into the fall."

In one report, the Commerce Department said durable goods orders fell 3.1 percent, to a seasonally adjusted \$167 million. It was the biggest drop since a 3.4 percent decline in April 1995. Analysts had expected only a slight 0.1 percent decrease.

The report also showed orders in July were weaker than first thought, rising 1.4 percent rather than the earlier 1.7 percent estimate.

Durable goods include items such as cars and computers expected to last more than three years. They are considered a key gauge of the nation's manufacturing sector, since declines could mean lower production and loss of jobs.

All major categories suffered in the July, including transportation orders, which fell 7.5 percent since 11.9 percent last April. Orders for aircraft and parts accounted for over half of the loss, although demand also weakened for motor vehicles and parts.

Excluding transportation, orders fell 1.6 percent, largest since March.

Orders for electronic and other electrical equipment decreased 5.6 percent, the first decline since May. Orders were down 2.7 percent for primary metals and 0.7 percent for industrial machinery and equipment.

Orders for nonmilitary capital goods excluding aircraft fell 5 percent, erasing a 3.9 percent gain in July. These orders often are a barometer of business plans to expand and modernize.

Regulators urge banks to improve credit offerings

WASHINGTON — Feeling pretty smug about those preapproved credit card applications banks keep sending you? Impressed that your credit rating is so good?

Don't be.

The federal agency that regulates 2,800 national banks sent letters Thursday advising them it would be better not to offer such prearranged credit without first checking the potential borrower's creditworthiness.

The letter from the Comptroller of the Currency's office said banks are ignoring basic lending controls as they aggressively compete in the fast-growing credit card business.

Eugene Ludwig, the Comptroller of the Currency, said consumer lending poses no fundamental threat to banks at this time, since banks are earning near-record profits and have large reserves against potential losses. Nevertheless, Ludwig said, "There are some problems with credit card lending that neither regulators nor the banking industry can ignore."

In the advisory letter to national banks and regulators, Ludwig's agency identified "weaknesses in some preapproved solicitation programs." The comptroller's office declined to specify banks with such problems but referred to the major banks that send out preapproved credit card applications.

"In these highly competitive environments, they, like the rest of us, sometimes cut corners and need to be reminded that these are important issues," said Jimmy F. Barton, chief national bank examiner.

In 1995, banks mailed 2.7 billion credit card solicitations, or about 17 for each adult American, according to a survey by Behavioral Analysts, Inc.

Credit card loans, while only a fraction of overall bank lending, have grown faster than any other type of consumer loan in the past three years. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. said this month that bad consumer loans — chiefly credit card debt — rose 36 percent to \$3.8 billion in the second quarter from the corresponding period a year before. The American Bankers Association reported that credit card delinquencies hit the highest rate since the agency began keeping records 22 years ago.

Higher personal bankruptcies were cited as a prime cause for the rise, but Barton, the bank examiner, said he sees a connection between the delinquencies and weaknesses in mass-mailing of credit card applications.

The comptroller's letter identified problem areas including "a poor choice of solicited customers" and failure to test and analyze properly markets targeted for mass solicitations.

Micron fights tax assessment on Utah plant

PROVO, Utah — Micron Technology Inc. is challenging Utah County's tax bill for its unfinished semiconductor plant, saying the assessment is based on an excessive valuation of nearly \$700 million.

In July, the county assessor's office determined the real estate at Micron's Lehi site is worth \$35 million. Improvements were appraised at \$626 million, and land Micron owns in unincorporated areas adjacent to the plant is valued at \$3 million.

"The facility is obviously not completed," Micron spokeswoman Julie Nash complained. "Really all we've done is shell in those buildings. We haven't equipped them yet."

However, County Commission Chairman Jerry Grover said the county is standing firm on the assessments by County Assessor Claude Richards.

"We try to do as good a job as we can," Grover said. "If anything, we're conservative."

Appealing Tuesday at a county Board of Equalization hearing, officials of the Boise, Idaho-based company said their Lehi-area real estate is worth only \$13 million. The value of improvements, according to Micron, is in the \$350 million-\$400 million range.

The company agrees land it owns outside Lehi boundaries is worth \$3 million.

Nash said Micron has asked an independent appraiser to assess the value of the company's land and buildings. The results will be presented to the Board of Equalization at its meeting next month.

Assessors evaluated how much construction Micron had completed as of Jan. 1, which was just weeks before the company virtually stopped construction work on the \$2.5 billion plant.

County officials say they evaluated how much of the project was finished based on a target completion date of June 30, 1996. Micron appraisers, however, say the completion date is now June 30, 1999, meaning the project has not progressed as far as county assessors think.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

A routine defense will not beat East's game. To succeed, East must take the charge of the defense in time to make a crucial shift. If East doesn't take time to think, he's the big favorite to miss his opportunity.

West leads the diamond king. East encourages, and West leads the deuce to East's ace. Who next? If East carelessly returns a third diamond, the game belongs to South. He trumps, cashes two of his high trumps and takes the spade finesse. It loses to East's king and East shifts to clubs, but it's too late. South wins his ace, leads a trump to dummy's king and safely discards his two clubs on dummy's spades. The defenders get only three tricks, and South escapes with his game.

It's obvious East should shift to a club at trick three. Why? East can expect to win a trick in spades in addition to the two diamond tricks already won. To beat the game, the defense must win another trick. If West has a trump trick, it should be the ace and cannot disappear. What can disappear is a club trick. And that's why East should shift at trick three.

It's easy for East to lead a third diamond. It requires no thought and a bit of blindness as well. However, when West continues with the diamond deuce (original fourth best) at trick two, East should realize South will ruff the third round, reducing the dia-

mond continuation to a futile and costly gesture.

Q: I know that Julia Roberts and Liam Neeson were once involved and that they recently made a movie together. Were there tensions between them? — F.K.

A: As one source close to the production says, it was Julia's choice to make the film and if there had been any bad feelings, she wouldn't have done it. Clearly, she didn't remember a comment Neeson, 46, made a few years ago, that Roberts, 28, should take acting lessons.

The film in question is "Michael Collins," due to open in a couple of weeks. It's the story of the political leader who led Ireland's fight for independence from Britain, and it's a controversial one. Afraid that it could incite violence, the studio is holding back its release in Britain, Ireland and Europe.

It certainly stirred up feelings in the Northern Ireland-born Neeson; he was up at the White House discussing the Irish situation with presidential advisers.

Q: I recently saw the movie "Flirting With Disaster" and thought Patricia Arquette was great. What else has she been in? — P.L.

A: The 28-year-old actress, the sister of Rosanna Arquette and granddaughter of Cliff Arquette, a.k.a. Charley Weaver, has had a pretty rapid rise in the business. Her early credits weren't too great — one of the victims in "Nightmare on Elm Street 3," for instance — but within a few years, she was cast in Sean Penn's "The Indian Runner," "True Romance" and, most notably, as the vibrant Mattie Silver in

"Ethan Frome."

Her showiest part was probably last year's lead in "Beyond Rangoon," in which she played a plucky tourist who has to fight her way out of the country when she's stranded in Burma during an uprising.

This year will be even busier; among her upcoming films are "The Secret Agent," "Nightwatch," co-starring Nick Nolte, "Infinity," a film directed by her co-star Matthew Broderick, and "Goodbye Lover" with Ellen DeGeneres.

Q: I've been a fan of Van Halen for a long time. Is David Lee Roth really getting back together with the band? — J.F.

A: It doesn't look like it. Despite a recent appearance at the MTV Music Awards with the band, all is not harmonious between its members, particularly Eddie Van Halen and the former lead singer. Van Halen was reportedly unhappy with Roth's drinking while in the studio recording two new songs for the band's upcoming greatest hits album. Plus, with Van Halen due to be sidelined for several months with hip replacement surgery, there isn't a great need for Roth's services at the moment.

Q: I still watch reruns of "My So-Called Life" on MTV — it was a great TV

show. Did Claire Danes go on to anything else? — F.H. A: Yes, a big-time movie career, starting with the film "Little Women" in 1994. But the 17-year-old will hit her stride this fall, starring opposite Leonardo DiCaprio in "Romeo and Juliet," and as Michelle Pfeiffer's daughter in "To Gillian on Her 37th Birthday." She's also due to join the ranks of actors who have starred in big-budget John Grisham adaptations when she shoots "The Rainmaker" next year. And she'll be reunited with one of her "Little Women" co-stars, Gabriel Byrne, playing her father, in "The Polish Wedding."

Q: My kids want to know if there will be any more "Mighty Ducks" movies. — B.C.

A: Yes, "D3: The Mighty Ducks" is on the way. Emilio Estevez agreed to star in the film if the studio would bankroll a film he wanted to direct, an adaptation of the Vietnam story "The War at Home." The studio put up 75 percent of the money for the film, starring Estevez's dad, Martin Sheen, Kathy Bates, Kimberly Williams ("Father of the Bride," the new TV show "Relativity") and Estevez.

Q: I read somewhere that Jenny McCarthy is ob-

essed with buying shoes. Is she another Imelda Staunton? — D.V.

A: She may wind up with a collection like Imelda's, but she hasn't spent her own money to buy them. One of the perks of hosting MTV's "Single'd Out" is that the network gives her 20 pairs of shoes each season.

"I've got 60 pairs at home," says McCarthy, 23, who has three sisters who wear the same size. So she spreads the wealth around.

Q: I'm glad Peter Straus is back on TV. I've always thought he was cute. Is he married? — E.K.

A: Straus, 49, is engaged to actress Rachel Ticotin, 37, but given their schedules, there hasn't been time for a wedding. He's shooting his new series, "Moloney," and she's shooting the film "Con Air" with John Malkovich and Nicolas Cage.

Spending as much time as they'd like with their children is also a challenge: He has two sons Justin, 12, and Tristan, 10; Ticotin has a 12-year-old daughter, Greta, and actor David Caruso. One of the ways they arrange family routine is doing homework by fax machine. It's a tip given to Straus by another busy friend, Scott Bakula.

Q: It seems that Tina

Turner hit it big again and then disappeared. Is she still performing? — A.J.

A: The 57-year-old took six years off after a grueling work schedule in the late 1980s, but she went back to work last year to record the theme for the Bond film "GoldenEye." A new album, "Wildest Dreams" followed.

Turner is currently on tour in Europe, where she lives. She and boyfriend Erwin Bach, a record company executive, moved to Switzerland for his job. Expect her back in the United States next spring; her managers are putting together a tour for her then.

Q: I'm crazy about Gabriel Byrne. Could you tell me about him? — P.W.

A: The 46-year-old Dublin-born actor has an interesting past. He didn't go into acting immediately; first he was an archaeologist, a Spanish teacher at a girls' school, a short-order cook and even a firefighter. Along the way he drifted into amateur theater and was obviously so proficient that it led all the way to Dublin's prestigious Abbey Theatre company, and his film debut in "The Outsider" in 1979.

The brooding good looks and gritty talent have kept the work coming ever since, in films such as "Miller's Crossing," "Little Women" and, most notably, last year's stunning whodunit, "The Usual Suspects."

In the last couple of years, though, Byrne has branched out from acting, writing a well-received book of autobiographical sketches, "Pictures in My Head," and producing films such as "Into the West" and "In the Name of

the Father."

Next year, he'll do just so many of his fellow actors have done: direct a feature film. "Doctor's Wife" is about a woman's extramarital affair.

But he'll hardly stop acting. Due for release this fall are "The Last of the High Kings," which he also produced and co-wrote, and "Mad Dog Time," in which he co-stars for the fourth time with ex-wife Ellen Barkin, 42. They have two children: Jack, 6, and Ryan, 3.

Early next year he'll be seen in "Smilla's Sense of Snow," co-starring Julia Ormond, 31, with whom he's currently involved.

Q: What is going on with former "Beverly Hills 90210" star Shannen Doherty? — L.S.

A: Doherty, 25, well known for her combative ways, has been somewhat inactive lately, both professionally and personally. She and boyfriend director Rob Weiss have been seen around Hollywood parties. Doherty has had a few women from time to time with whom she thought were becoming too friendly with Weiss, but no fights have broken out. Careless, she's "looking at some scripts," according to her agents; meaning, there's nothing new.

mer school teacher says: "I was also very nervous, but everyone welcomed me into the 'Days' family and they all soon put me at my ease."

Once Krista knew she had the role, she immersed herself into learning everything she could about Billie and her links to the other residents of Salem. (She had some help from her mother and grandmother who have watched the show for 30 years without missing a day.)

Would she want Billie as a friend?

"Very much so," Krista said. "She's generous. Loyal. You can trust her. She's everything a friend should be."

As for what advice she'd give her pal regarding Bo Brady (Peter Reckell), Krista says, "I would tell her to move on with her life, but it's doubtful she would listen. She's still devoted to him and probably always will be. She stepped aside to make it possible for Bo and Hope (Kristian Alfonso) to recapture what they had before she came into his life. It wasn't easy for her, and she's still in a lot of pain."

As excited as Krista is about the big break in her still young career as an actor, she says, "I will always treasure the time I spent as a teacher."

Krista was still student-teaching when she was assigned to her first kindergarten class. "The most critical time in a child's life is between the ages of 3 and 7," she pointed out. "It's during these years when parents

It helps reinforce positive experiences. Children learn socialization. They are encouraged to develop their artistic skills. They are also being prepared for the challenges they'll face in first grade. Most of all, they learn how to learn. These lessons stay with them all through their school lives and beyond. The time and money school systems put into kindergarten are among the best investments that can be made for our future."

Kindergarten can also be the first place a child can let someone know she or he needs help. Krista recalls a little boy who constantly disrupted the class. "He was full of rage, but wouldn't talk about it to anyone. I gave him paper and crayons and he drew himself with a big red blob representing blood. I suspected — and it was later confirmed — he was being brutalized at home. He felt his father wanted to kill him. The school called in the mother who also proved to be an abuse victim. With counseling, though, she was able to start a new life with her son."

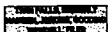

Life after 'Cheers': Reha Perlman goes to college in TV's new 'Pearl'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The rehearsal is at the historic Sunset Boulevard studio, where Al Jolson began his "moores" revolution from silents to sound by exclaiming, "you ain't heard nothin' yet, folks" in "The Jazz Singer."

Flash forward 70 years. The new CBS sitcom "Pearl" is having its "network runthrough" on Stage 9 of what is now the KTLA television lot.

In other words, the cast will enact the show on the sets without cameras but before an audience of network bigwigs, Witt-Thomas Productions officials, writers, technicians, and various hangers-on, including one reporter.

Two elements impress the casual visitor. One is almost a cinematic number of scene changes. The action jumps from a restaurant to Rhea Perlman's kitchen to Malcolm McDowell's classroom to the kitchen, back to the classroom, to the restaurant, etc.

The other element was a question mark: How can people who have heard the same jokes over and over in rehearsal laugh so heartily when they are spoken again? To keep up the actors' morales, perhaps.

"Pearl" is one of the new series which carry CBS' hopes to break out of the ratings doldrums. It was originally scheduled for Wednesday nights. But with the delay of the Ted Danson-Mary Steenburgen "Ink," it has been slipped into the post-Cosby slot on Mondays at 8:30 p.m. Eastern until Oct. 21 when a revamped "Ink" is set to air. ("Pearl" had an encouraging first outing this week, landing a ro-

ust 25 percent of all TV homes watching TV that half-hour.)

Perlman plays a working mother who decides to go to college. This puts her at odds with her gruff humanities professor, McDowell, in his version of the John Houseman role.

Since she is also the executive producer of "Pearl," Perlman went to a conference with the other powers for a critique of the rehearsal. The final result would be played before an audience two days hence.

"I got a big mouth, and I get to use it," she laughs, a reference to her role as Pearl Conrad.

Why take on a series when she has three growing children at home and a husband (Danny DeVito) who is gainfully employed?

"The work is very double in terms of having a family," she explains. "The hours are more set, I'm here, it's not far from home, I have a comfortable place where my kids can hang out. It's like a family feeling. You're not in a trailer all over town or someplace else, waiting for whenever you're going to be called."

"It's much more stable. I love this project. I have to be the executive producer because it's my show, it was my impulse to do it."

She had long harbored the idea of a woman who "follows a

dream" and goes back to school. She also had the notion of a professor who would be her antithesis, a brilliant scholar but in life situation "he doesn't have a clue."

Perlman grew up in working-class Brooklyn, so she understands Pearl's tenacity, sense of justice and straightforwardness. Unlike Pearl, she made it all the way through college — Hunter, in the Bronx. When she started as an off-off-Broadway actress, she had limited ambitions.

"I never pictured myself in California," she says. "I just thought I would be a character actress in New York on the stage. I never really had that stardom goal, I just wanted to be able to work as an actress, and not as a waitress."

"All this is really a surprise to me. I ended up here just because of Danny. He wanted to come out for his career, and I was really reluctant."

Obviously she had more of a future acting than waiting tables. She remembers one

restaurant job that lasted three days, working in the swanky Rainbow Room in Rockefeller Center. The job required her to carry big silver trays up three flights to the dining room.

"I was waiting on a table that included David Rockefeller, all the way in the back," she recounts. "I had this tray with a million plates on it. I made it all the way across the dining room up to the table, and I just went whoosh! Everything was gone!"

"I don't remember leaving the dining room. Somebody picked me up by the collar, and I was gone!"

Perlman would welcome another long series run, like "Cheers." "You couldn't have a job better than that," she recalls fondly. "The people were so wonderful, and we had so much fun at the time."

"Pearl," she said is different.


"You're not the kid, you're a grownup. You can't be goofy. That's OK, I'm ready for that."

The 'Law & Order' of things: Carey Lowell Joins Its Cast

NEW YORK (AP) — Football. Leaves turning. Someone new in the "Law & Order" cast. All sure signs of fall.

Carey Lowell should be grateful for such autumn signposts, at least that last one: She is the most recent in the "Law & Order" of succession.

"Law & Order," of course, is the splendid cops-and-lawyers drama that launched its seventh season last week, and — with the passing of "Murder, She Wrote" — won bragging rights as prime time's longest-running drama, all the more so after NBC recently renewed the show through 1997-98. It airs Wednesdays at 10 p.m. EDT.

Meanwhile, making "Law & Order's" fall tradition tenable is a corresponding spring-time custom: the departure of a cast member.

Last spring, it was Jill Hennessy who left the show — which meant the demise of her character, Assistant District Attorney Claire Kincaid, after a car crash in the season finale.

Now Jamie Ross, played by Lowell, has become the new partner for Assistant District Attorney Jack McCoy (Sam Waterston). The series' six-member ensemble cast thus has its 14th inductee.

Lowell has been a criminal defense lawyer, Lowell explains between scenes at the show's Manhattan studio, "but she became very disillusioned representing scumbags and getting them off, and getting rich doing it." She also became dis-

illusioned with her marriage to another defense lawyer. Now a single mother working the other side of the courtroom, this seasoned, tough-as-nails attorney isn't subject to "that mentor-protégé thing that Sam's and Jill's characters had," Lowell says.

"Sam and I are more on equal footing. We have a bit of a contentious relationship, along with mutual respect."

Fine. But of no less importance to the "Law & Order" faithful is what measure of attraction might crackle between them. The series' gritty stories don't leave much time for romance but, still, during three seasons working together McCoy and Kincaid clearly had shared more than a counsel table.

Moreover, it should not go unnoted that Lowell, like her predecessor, happens to be blonde. She bears a certain resemblance to Princess Diana. And she's very tall.

How tall? "I'm 5-feet-10," she says. "No, she's not," objects Waterston, zipping past at that moment. "She's about 6-feet-5!"

Well, then: Will history repeat itself with McCoy and Ross?

"Right now, they're barely on speaking terms," Lowell says approvingly. "But we'll see how it plays out."

"It's a great character, a great show, and I couldn't ask for a better situation," says the actress, herself a single mother set on raising her daughter in Manhattan. "It's the perfect



thing to do."

But, curiously, as "Law & Order's" producers were looking around for Hennessy's successor, 35-year-old Lowell was filling out a college application.

"I had decided that I was going to study documentary filmmaking at NYU," she explains.

"Classes were meant to start July 1, and I got this job on June 29 — just two weeks after first auditioning."

The almost-film-student-*"L.O."*-initiate was the same Carey Lowell who, seven years ago, carried a gun in a high thriller in the James Bond thriller "Licence to Kill." But despite her global visibility as a Bond Girl, she upstaged her own career.

"I got pregnant. I actually conceived the night of the film's premiere in Los Angeles. Then I became a mother and I stopped acting for two years."

She played the Geena Davis role ("I wore a wig") on the 1993 sitcom "A League of Their Own," but it didn't last long. Lowell was glad: "I would have had to move to Los Angeles and wear that wig for the next I-don't-know-how-many years."

She appeared in "Leaving Las Vegas" as the bank teller put upon by a very shaky Nicolas Cage. "But by last summer, she says, "It had been a year since I did a film. I just thought, it's time to find something else. It wasn't that I was giving up acting. I just needed to be doing something to occupy myself, and I wanted to go to film school."

Which was all it took to get her acting in "Order." She laughs knowingly. "The minute you decide to do something else and plop down the tuition ..."

Look good. Feel good.
