Loss of grocery on Main Avenue hurts neighbors

TWIN FALLS — Terriann Nute used to walk across the street regularly to shop at Anderson's Main Street Market for milk when she ran out, or for medicine when the kids were sick.

But the longtime grocery store closed Thursday, and the operators don't want to talk about it.

"I just used to go there every day and it's a bummer," said Nute, while holding clothes at the laundry next door. "We don't have a car so we depend on that."

Anderson's, at 512 Main Ave. N. in Twin Falls, will auction inventory and office equipment at 6:30 p.m. Oct. 10, said Joan Anderson, who has operated the store since 1988 with her husband, James.

However, Anderson did not want to discuss the closure or provide information other than the auction date.

The building's owner, G. Kent Taylor of Twin Falls, also had no comment.

Nute said she doesn't like to walk across Addison Avenue to another grocery store because it's too busy. But now she'll have to.

"It was cool — we could just walk across the street," she said.

By 5 p.m., the store was closed and the parking lot empty — which made an impromptu football field for a group of boys. With football in hand, Seth Brooks said he used to go Anderson's when he stayed with a friend in the neighborhood.

"It's time to go to a new store," he added.

The word apparently hadn't spread about the store's demise — an occasional customer would drive up, then leave after meeting closed doors.

At Sabe's Main Street Cleaners next door, Chad Sabe said of the closing, "It's kind of a bummer."

Although he worked only once a week at the laundry business, he noticed the grocery store's lot would be full.

While the store's demise may not hurt the business owned by his father, Richard, its location did help, he said. People would drive into the store and see the laundry's services.

"I think that kind of helped some," he said.

Craig promises changes in forest policy

Action will follow series of hearings

WASHINGTON — Sen. Larry Craig said the hundreds of witnesses who testified more than a dozen congressional hearings on national forest policy agreed on only one thing this year — the status quo is unacceptable.

Craig, R-Idaho, chairman of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources subcommittee on forests, said he intends to push a proposal in Congress next year to overhaul the National Forest Management Act of 1976.

"Consider this: In over 15 hearings

with 200 witnesses, no one supported the status quo," Craig said in a Senate floor speech this week.

"Let me repeat, no one from any walk, profession, interest group or point of view provided any testimony that suggested Congress need not act to fix the current situation," he said.

A loud critic of Clinton administration policies that have led to less logging on national forests, Craig said he'll unveil details of his pending proposal sometime after the November elections.

It's unlikely to be to the liking of envi-

ronmentalists, who have been highly critical in the past of Craig's efforts in some cases to expedite logging exempt from laws protecting fish and wildlife.

It was a provision of the National Forest Management Act that U.S. District Judge William Dwyer cited in ordering a halt to widespread logging of northern spotted owl habitat in the Pacific Northwest in 1991.

The so-called "viability requirement" in the law — adamantly opposed by the timber industry — requires the Forest Service to maintain viable populations of all species found on a particular national forest.

Under the Bush administration, the Forest Service proposed elimination of that requirement, but the then-Democrat

Parks bill fixes border near Craters

WASHINGTON — New borders for the Craters of the Moon National Monument and easy access to one of Idaho's great geological treasures are promised by a catchall package of lands legislation that the Senate passed as one of the 104th Congress' last acts.

The national parks legislation, stalled in Congress by months of legislative gridlock, now goes to President Clinton.

"This parks bill is long overdue, and makes good on the federal government's commitment to Idaho," said Republican Sen. Dirk Kempthorne. "The bill paves the way for much-needed improvements to two of Idaho's most popular and treasured landmarks."

In Idaho, the bill clears the way for the National Park Service to buy 65 acres of private property along the Snake River. The acquisition will expand the boundaries of the Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument in order to make space for a visitor and research center.

The bill also adjusts the borders of the Craters of the Moon National Monument to prevent contamination of the monument's drinking-water supply by livestock grazing adjacent lands. The new boundary also is expected to make it easier for grazers to control the movements of their cattle.

"I'm especially pleased the Snowbasin bill passed," Republican Sen. Larry Craig said. "I can't wait to see Picabo Street win a gold medal — she's one of Idaho's best ambassadors."

The measure authorizes a land exchange in the Snowbasin ski area, trading 1,320 acres of Forest Service land at the base of the ski area near Ogden, Utah, to the Sun Valley Co. for approximately 4,100 acres of company-owned property in Utah. The exchange will let Snowbasin owners construct facilities for the downhill and giant slalom venues for the 2002 Winter Olympics and the 1999 preliminary events.

The parks package contains more than 100 pieces of separate lands legislation affecting 41 states. Those include authorization to spend \$17.5 million to preserve the largest undeveloped parcel of land in the New York-New Jersey metropolitan area, and a new private trust to maintain San Francisco's Presidio Army base as a national park.

Girl, 7, escapes as abductor dies

YONCALLA, Ore. — A man kidnapped a 7-year-old girl and took her through 100 miles of terror Thursday, holding a gun to her head and shooting at motorists before he was killed by a police sharpshooter.

Kristina Jacobson, abducted 3 1/2 hours earlier from her babysitter's house in Salemt, ran from the car as police closed in. The slain gunman was not immediately identified.

"He had this little silver gun he put up on my head," Kristina told The Associated Press. "He said if I don't behave, he will put me in the trunk or

Lab mouse loses memory, as do humans

Researchers have way to test drugs against Alzheimer's

WASHINGTON — A laboratory-engineered mouse suffers the same decline from Alzheimer's disease as do humans: lost memory and wasted brain cells.

The mouse gives researchers a new and more accurate way to test drugs against the mind-destroying disorder.

The Alzheimer's Association called the mouse "an important new research tool," and a National Institutes of Health expert said the mouse is "looks like a nice piece of work."

"It is good news for patients with Alzheimer's," he said. "It will enable the testing of drugs that get at the basic disease process."

Drugs now available, he said, appear to treat only Alzheimer's symptoms.

'Maze experiments testing the animals' thinking ability show that the new mouse breed suffers from a loss of memory that mimics the decline seen in humans, Hsiao said. The mouse brain also develops beta amyloid plaques, a substance found in the brains of Alzheimer's patients.

"This is the first time that anybody has made a mouse that shows an association between plaques and a functional loss of Alzheimer's disease," Hsiao (pronounced show) said in an interview.

A report on the mouse study is being published today in Science, the journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Dr. Thomas Chase, an Alzheimer's disease expert at the National Institutes of Health, said developing the lab mouse "looks like a nice piece of work."

"It is good news for patients with Alzheimer's," he said. "It will enable the testing of drugs that get at the basic disease process."

Drugs now available, he said, appear to treat only Alzheimer's symptoms.

Zaven Khachaturian, a scientist who heads the Alzheimer's Association Ronald and Nancy Reagan Research Institute, said the most important element of the new mouse is that it "shows the behavioral deficits that are comparable to what is happening in humans (with Alzheimer's)."

He said mice developed in other labs have Alzheimer's brain lesions like those in humans but exhibit none of the changes in memory and learning ability that Hsiao demonstrates with the Minnesota mouse.

"Caregivers want their loved ones to retain their functional abilities as long as possible," Khachaturian said. "This mouse model should help us find those therapies."

The Minnesota researchers "made" the mouse by putting into a mouse egg the human gene that manufactures the compound amyloid precursor protein. This substance helps form beta amyloid deposits in the brains of Alzheimer's disease patients.

The resulting mouse was then mated with a normal mouse, Hsiao said, and half the offspring had the Alzheimer's gene.

"We call it the T2576 mouse," Hsiao said. "We haven't given it a cute name."

Cold spell chills Midwest as rain drenches Florida

Winter came early to parts of the Midwest and Great Plains Thursday, as temperatures dropped into the 20s from Montana to Iowa, setting record lows in Minnesota.

In Florida, the line of showers that plagued the rest of the East Coast earlier this week arrived, dumping more than 3V inches of rain on Mayport.

Widespread low clouds continued to shroud the Southeast and Mid-Atlantic on Thursday, but there was no repeat of Wednesday's heavy rain.

High pressure prevailed from eastern Montana to Minnesota, where record lows were set in Minneapolis, 26 degrees, and St. Cloud, 21 degrees — both a degree off the previously record lows in the chill autumn of 1989.

In the West, an upper-level low pressure area continued to produce thunderstorms over southwestern Colorado, parts of Arizona, New Mexico and Utah.

The rest of the West was mild with some low clouds. A stationary front off the Washington coast caused some light showers, but it did not affect the interiors of Washington and Oregon.

Bangor, Maine, had a 71-mph wind gust and Mayport, Fla., got 3.51 inches of rain.

"I was crying and asking him lots of questions. Where are you going to drop me off? When are you going to drop me off?"

The chase ended after the blue Pontiac the man stole ran over spikes set by police, veered into the median and eventually flipped over. The man negotiated with police for about an hour while sitting in the overturned car and holding a gun on the girl, until a sharpshooter killed him with one shot to the head.

"They could see that the gun was to the child's head," said Lt. Gregg Hastings. "They were believing the child was going to end up being shot by this person."

Kristina, who had requested police bring her Skittles during the negotiations, happily ate the candy as she recovered in a hospital with only a few metal fragments in her knee from the crash.

She said she was grateful to the sharpshooter.

"I wish he would come in the room so I can thank him," she said.

She said she managed to put a seat belt on, just as her mother taught her, even though her hands were taped.

"I have to, just in case we get in a crash and that's what happened," she said.

Kristina said she used her Bambi book to smash a window and escape because she didn't want the kidnapper's blood to get on her sun dress.

"She's obviously stronger than me," said her mother, Shanna Jacobson.

The ordeal began Thursday morning when the man showed up at the home of Kristina's babysitter.

Voters yawn, expect Clinton to win 2nd term

NEW YORK (AP) — Unenthusiastic voters largely expect President Clinton to win re-election next month but few expect to see progress on major national problems over the next four years, according to a poll released Thursday.

The Pew Research Center's national survey also found just 43 percent of voters plan to watch the presidential debates this year, down from 67 percent in 1992 and 55 percent in the two previous elections.

Two out of three registered

voters say they've already made up their minds and the debates won't matter, as do three out of four likely voters. The first nationally televised debate is Sunday night.

While Clinton held a strong re-election lead over Republican challenger Bob Dole, his performance as president got mixed grades from 1,517 registered voters surveyed Sept. 25-29.

Seven percent gave him an A, 40 percent B, 32 percent C, 20 percent D or F.

"What in effect you have is a C

candidate running against a D candidate, and C beats D," said Walter Dean Burnham, a University of Texas political scientist.

"Clinton is running against somebody who's got other vulnerabilities that we can't be large enough to overcome his own."

Still, Burnham was surprised Clinton's average rating in the Pew poll wasn't higher, as he has gotten some of the highest job-approval scores of his presidency in other recent polls.

The difference may be in ques-

tion wording. Other polls ask simply if you approve or disapprove of Clinton's handling of his job, and 55 percent or more have approved in most recent polls.

Some voters may generally approve of Clinton's job performance, yet give it only a C grade.

Overall, 51 percent of registered voters said they would support Clinton if the election were today, 35 percent favored Dole and 7 percent backed Ross Perot — little changed from a Pew poll in early September.

Crews battle to contain fire in Dixie forest

ST. GEORGE, Utah (AP) — More than 100 firefighters on Thursday were gaining the upper hand on a 200-acre blaze in Dixie National Forest, fire officials said.

Crews, aided by air tankers and a pair of engines and helicopters, had contained 60 percent of the blaze by evening, said Randy Beckstrand, dispatch center fire information officer.

Forest

Controlled Congress never acted on the proposal and the agency since has withdrawn it.

"Therefore our proposal will represent a starting point to see if we can build upon the only established consensus — that is, the status quo is unacceptable," he said.

Craig said he considered offering an outline of his proposal before Congress was scheduled to adjourn this week but that he didn't mind waiting until after the election.

He noted that the late Sen. Hubert Humphrey, D-Minn., had said in introducing the National Forest Management Act 20 years ago that it was the product of three years of work by four congressional committees.

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Clinton, Dole head north, south to prep for face-off

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — Secluding himself in New York's autumn splendor, President Clinton steeled himself Thursday to present an even-tempered defense of his record against debate-night attacks from his rival.

Bob Dole headed for Florida to hone a debate strategy that can shake up the race.

Both candidates tried to lower expectations. White House aides said Clinton was concerned that Middle East peace talks had stolen time from debate preparation. Dole portrayed himself as the underdog nonetheless.

"I read so much about this guy — how good he is — I'm not too anxious to get up there," the Republican nominee said of Clinton during a Tennessee campaign stop en route to Florida.

Dole joked that the two presidential debates — Sunday and Oct. 16 — offer him a golden opportunity "at least for the first few minutes, before people turn off."

The president avoided talk about the debates during an air port rally in Buffalo but he gave several hundred chilly Democrats a message he's likely to repeat on Sunday night. "This is a better country now" than four years ago, he said.

Clinton's larger-than-usual entourage then helicoptered to the Chautauque Institution, a southwestern New York intellectual center that has hosted eight presidents since Ulysses S. Grant.

The 750-acre complex, its trees bursting in color, offered Clinton a serene setting for long walks and golf. Aides went their boss rested and relaxed for Sunday's encounter.

Clinton will be joined by former Sen. George Mitchell, D-Maine, who is playing the part of Dole in mock debates. Press secretary Mike McCurry serves as a stand-in for moderator Jim Lehrer.

White House economic and foreign policy aides were on hand to brief Clinton. Speechwriters were working on opening and closing remarks.

Political consultants Michael Sheehan and Paul Begala were sharpening the president's oneliners. And White House counsel Jack Quinn came along to offer advice on legal issues such as Whitewater.

Dole planned to rehearse Friday in a first-floor ballroom at his high-rise Bal Harbour condominium. The room was set up as a duplicate of the debate stage, complete with podiums and television lights.

Earlier this week, Dole held two debate sessions in a 10th floor conference room of his campaign headquarters with Sen. Fred Thompson, R-Tenn., standing in for Clinton and Dole spokesman Nelson Warfield playing Lehrer.

Thompson said that Dole did well in the practice debates

although Clinton still scores better as a debater. "Those are the cards you're dealt," Thompson said in an interview.

Aides said Clinton's debate-night strategy is simple: • Mention his first-term accomplishments again and again and again.

• Offer a rosy outlook for a second Clinton term.

• Politely pick apart Dole's record.

Their goal is for Clinton to look presidential and deferential, without being too defensive. And above all, they don't want a major gaffe that gives Dole badly needed momentum.

Former Sen. Howard Baker, who was campaigning with Dole on Thursday, said the GOP nominee needs to display his trademark "wit and wisdom."

"After all, that's been his stock in trade for 30 years—almost," Baker said.

"Holding his own will be a major victory for Bob Dole."

Clinton's political advisers expect Dole to be highly critical of the president, and aides

believe their boss is most vulnerable to questions about Whitewater-related controversies, his integrity, drug policies and taxes.

They suspect Dole also will question the economy's strength, accuse the president of demonizing Republicans over Medicare and criticize his foreign policies — especially with the Middle East peace process off track.

Tuning up for the debates Thursday, Dole called Clinton's foreign policy "a string of failures." McCurry countered by calling Dole's campaign team "nattering naysayers of gloom."

New ads from both sides offered insights on their debate strategy. Dole released a spot that faults Clinton's latent liberalism; Clinton reacted two spots promoting his work in the White House.

One of the campaign's greatest fears is that Clinton flashes his temper to the national audience. A few aides are drafting questions designed to anger the president in debate preparation so he gets it out of his system.

Massacre survivor, gun advocate campaigns for Texas House seat

COPPERAS COVE, Texas (AP) — Five years ago, Susanna Griggs Hupp was having lunch with her mother and father at a Lubby's Cafeteria in Killen when a man crashed his pickup through the plate-glass window, leaped out and opened fire.

Mrs. Hupp's parents died along with 21 others in the deadliest mass shooting in U.S. history. The gunman also shot himself to death.

Hupp's own gun was 100 yards away in her car, as then required by Texas law. "The next day, I said I was not really mad at the guy that did it. We're talking about somebody that went insane," she recalled. "But I was mad at my legislators because they legislated me out of the right to protect myself and my family."

Convinced that she might have been able to stop the gunman if her own pistol had been in her purse, she emerged from the tragedy a leading supporter of the right to carry concealed weapons. And last year, she successfully pressed the Legislature to enact such a law.

Now Mrs. Hupp is running for the state House herself.

"The gun issue is certainly what put me in the limelight and apparently gave voice to a lot of people's views and what a lot of

people were thinking," the 37-year-old Republican said. "People began to come to me and say, 'Since you're so good at this why don't you go down there and pound on them about such-and-such an issue.' It doesn't take long and they're asking you to run for this or that."

Mrs. Hupp is a chiropractor in Copperas Cove, outside Killen, and also raises Arabian horses on her ranch. The legislative district stretches more than 100 miles, from Killen and the Army's Fort Hood west into ranching country.

Mrs. Hupp isn't a one-issue candidate; she favors protecting property and water rights, localizing welfare and creating a school voucher system. But one issue — guns — brings lots of attention on the campaign trail.

She calls Texas' concealed gun law a step in the right direction but says its list of settings where weapons are prohibited — such as churches and sports arenas, makes no sense because those are exactly the kind of places where "a nut that wants to kill

a bunch of people" is going to go. "While some relatives of shooting victims have become gun control supporters — among them, Sarah Brady, the wife of former White House spokesman James Brady, and Carolyn McCarthy, whose husband was killed and son paralyzed in the 1993 Long Island Rail Road massacre — Mrs. Hupp went in the opposite direction."

The other side, Mrs. Hupp said, makes the mistake of thinking that "that gun walked in there and pulled its own trigger." "The gun laws did not cause this guy to come in and shoot people," she said. "What the gun laws did was prevent me from protecting myself and my family." (The gunman, George Hennard, bought his guns legally in Nevada after a background check.)

Mrs. Hupp has testified before legislatures from Hawaii to Pennsylvania. When Texas took up the issue of concealed weapons, she walked around the table at a committee hearing, pointing her fingers like a gun at senators.

When she came to one opponent, she asked the lawmaker: "If this were you, would you like (the person next to you) to have a concealed weapon at this point or not?"

Female DIs don new Marine hats

PARRIS ISLAND, S.C. (AP) — The Marines are making changes to treat men and women equally, and they're starting at the top.

Women drill instructors will wear the same "Smoky Bear" hats worn by male instructors. The hats, officially called "campaign covers," replace the cords that women wear over their left shoulders. "We're one Corps, we're a total Corps, and we train the same. We wear the same uniform," said Gen. Charles C. Krulak, the Corps commandant.

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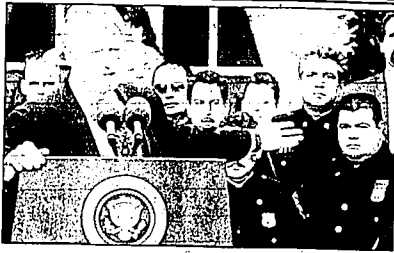
Clinton inks crime measures

President fights FBI memo lamenting lack of leadership

WASHINGTON (AP) — Declaring a "sea change" in attitudes toward crime, President Clinton signed into law Thursday bills to fight illegal drugs, keep track of sex offenders and provide college funds for the children of slain police officers.

Clinton signed the three bills in a Rose Garden ceremony just before leaving for a New York retreat to prepare for Sunday's debate with Republican nominee Bob Dole, in which crime and drugs are certain to come up.

"This is a good day for America because we have seen a sea change in the attitudes-of-our people, the action of our communities and the work in Washington on the problem of crime," Clinton said.



President Clinton said during a ceremony Thursday at the White House: "This is a good day for America..."

Dole's campaign knocked Clinton's record on fighting illegal drugs Thursday, and Dole himself continued to accuse Clinton of using executive privilege to hide a 1995 memo "telling him how bad his drug policy was."

In the memo, the heads of the FBI and the Drug Enforcement Administration complained about a lack of "any true leadership" in fighting an influx of heroin and cocaine, according to an August report in Newsweek magazine. Earlier this week, Clinton asserted presidential

privilege over the memo and refused to turn it over to a congressional subcommittee. "The president's claimed executive privilege. He doesn't want anybody to know before Nov. 5," Dole said during a campaign stop in Johnson City, Tenn.

Clinton signed the Comprehensive Methamphetamine Control Act, which allows authorities to seize chemicals used to make the drug, identified by law enforcement officials as the nation's fastest-growing drug problem. The new law also increases penalties for trafficking.

Pursuing suburban votes, Gore talks of TV violence, kids

GARFIELD, N.J. (AP) — Campaigning for support from suburban parents, Vice President Al Gore is promoting Clinton administration policies aimed at improving television for America's children. "We're giving parents a new tool to protect

children," Gore said Thursday, referring to the administration-backed v-chip, which will be installed in new-TV sets allowing parents to block out shows rated for violence, sex or other content. The v-chip and a rule requiring three hours of educational chil-

dren's programming each week are core pieces of the Clinton campaign's family issues program, which polls show is popular among women voters. Both parties are aggressively courting this vote, in New Jersey and elsewhere.

The health care reform legislation that was recently signed into law contains a provision for a limited number of companies to offer these accounts to their employees. The next step is to see how the medical savings accounts work before we expand them. The final decisions must be made based on the results of this pilot program."

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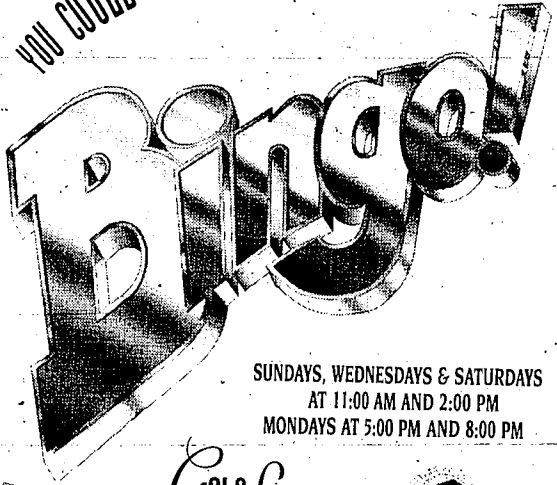
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When to ground old pilots?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Should airline pilots be allowed to continue flying after they reach age 60?

Lawyers clashed over that question before an appellate court panel Thursday as a pilots' association fought to overturn federal rules that ban them from commercial flying after age 60.

That 36-year-old regulation violates the law banning on-the-job age discrimination, argued attorney Nicholas Cobbs. He represented the Professional Pilots Federation, a group of about 2,000 pilots from 40 airlines formed to combat the age rule.

Christine Kohl, a Justice Department lawyer representing the Federal Aviation Administration, responded that as people age their skills deteriorate. She said setting a maximum age limit for airline pilots is a safety issue.

"What we're talking about is limiting risk," she said, "and that's a policy judgment."

While the courtroom battle focuses on safety and an apparent clash of federal rules, the background issue is jobs flying airplanes. Having a maximum age limit for commercial pilots guarantees a steady stream of openings for younger flyers.

As a result, the older pilots formed their own group to battle against the age limit. Both the giant Air Line Pilots Association, representing the majority of commercial pilots, and the Allied Pilots Association, representing American Airlines' pilots, favor keeping the age rule.

Cobbs argued that pilots over 60 are allowed to work for private corporations and said there is no evidence they are any less safe than younger flyers.

Under current rules, he added, the FAA can grant waivers to permit pilots with serious medical conditions to keep flying if they are regularly monitored, "but somehow, once a pilot gets over the age 60, we can't evaluate them."

"Our position is that the technology is sufficient to evaluate pilots on their individual abilities," said Cobbs, arguing for elimination of the age rule. He contended that flight simulators could be used to evaluate pilots' abilities.

Kohl responded that the FAA has not eliminated the possibility of some eventual change, but so far has been unable to find a way to test the abilities of aging pilots.

Atheist's son seeks probe of missing mom

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The estranged son of atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair wants police to unravel her mysterious disappearance.

Ms. O'Hair, whose lawsuit led to the landmark 1963 Supreme Court decision outlawing public school prayer, was last seen more than a year ago when she told friends she was going to New York City to picket the pope's appearance.

Her disappearance at age 76 gave rise to rumors she died and her followers kept it quiet because they feared Christians would claim she found God on her deathbed.

A missing persons report was filed Sept. 24 by William J. Murray, who disavowed his mother's atheist beliefs years ago. Murray said Wednesday he believed it was time authorities looked into the disappearance of his mother, his daughter, Robin Murray O'Hair, and his half brother, Jon Garth Murray.

"For the sake of my grandchildren and supporters and the public at large, the time had come for some central agency to make a determination as to what had happened to her," he said. "It just is that simple."

Porturer murdered

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A man imprisoned for torturing and killing his girlfriend's 5-year-old daughter was beaten to death in a prison yard after a talk show host did a show on his case.

Donald McDougall was slain at Avon Park Correctional Institution on Tuesday, a week after radio station WTKS in Orlando broadcast a program about the 1982 murder.

Seeming contradiction illustrates Batt's dilemma

Were you surprised to read that Gov. Phil Batt, just weeks before signing a deal allowing nuclear-waste shipments into Idaho, testified in court that such shipments would hurt Idaho's environment? Don't be.

Batt's agreement with the federal government is nobody's idea of perfection. Rather, it's Batt's earnest attempt to make the best of a bad situation.

Earlier this week, a front-page story described Batt's 1995 testimony in a lawsuit against the federal government. The testimony is instructive, but don't read too much into it.

When Batt took office nearly two years ago, he inherited a crummy situation. For decades, the federal government had been stashing radioactive refuse at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, and it wanted to send more. Batt's predecessor, Gov. Cecil Andrus, was mounting a fierce opposition in the legal and political arenas.

Batt kept up the fight after he took over. In September 1995, the state argued in court that any spent fuel brought to Idaho might be lodged here indefinitely, creating an inherent risk of accidents and endangering the Snake River Plain Aquifer.

Despite the rightness of that position, Batt saw that Idaho was running out of time. He could foresee a day

when the feds would be free to move unlimited quantities of waste to Idaho. The state's only recourse at that point would be to blockade the tracks. Batt didn't like that scenario.

So that October, Batt signed his now-famous agreement. It allows 1,133 shipments of spent fuel into Idaho, in return for assurances and deadlines for removing new and pre-existing waste.

Backers of Proposition Three, the initiative to repeal Batt's agreement, tend to cast the issue in moral terms. Nuclear waste is bad, and therefore any deal that lets waste into Idaho is bad too.

Batt's 1995 court testimony shows that the issue is not so simple. Rather than showing Batt's hypocrisy, it shows his dilemma: a choice between imperfect compromise and defiant futility.

Backers of the "Stop the Shipments" initiative want to second-guess Batt, turn back the clock and rely on defiance. Whether that's even legal is uncertain. (Can an initiative negate a contract?) But this much is plain: A successful Proposition Three would undo the benefits of Batt's agreement and force Idaho into an unequal struggle with Congress and the U.S. Energy Department.

In our view, that would be a mistake.

U.S.: Iraqi arms still a problem

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — The information Iraq has provided about its banned weapons programs still contains serious gaps, a top U.N. weapons inspector said Thursday.

A U.N. commission created to ensure that Iraq eliminate its nuclear, biological and chemical weapons programs has repeatedly accused the country of hiding important documents as well as actual weapons materials.

Thursday's comments by Charles Duelfer, deputy chairman of the commission, suggest the inspectors will again cite Iraq's lack of progress when it issues its next report, due later this month.

meetings with Iraqi government officials, Duelfer, an American, said there were still "serious problems" with Iraq's statements on its biological and chemical weapons programs as well as its long-range missile program.

Iraq claims it has complied with the demands of the commission, established shortly after Iraq's defeat in the 1991 Persian Gulf War. Iraq contends the continued sanctions are part of a U.S.-led effort to weaken Iraq.

But Security Council members insist Iraq is not in compliance, and have said that only if Iraq fully cooperates will they lift the economic sanctions imposed after Iraq's 1990 invasion of Kuwait.

Drifting wreckage hampers search off Peru

CALLAO, Peru — Salvage workers battled a fierce current and poor visibility Thursday in their search for wreckage from a Peruvian commercial jet that crashed into the Pacific Ocean with 70 people aboard.

Investigators were trying to explain why Aeroperu Flight 603 suddenly plunged into the frigid waters Pacific Ocean early Wednesday, apparently killing all its passengers and crew.

Authorities said the pilot reported that his navigational system had failed and that the plane was not responding to his commands.

Rescue workers returned to choppy, fog-covered waters to resume their search for survivors among the 61 passengers and nine crew members, but there were no signs of life.

Peru asked the United States for help in recovering the bodies and the plane's two flight data recorders, which were submerged along with the rest of the wreckage under nearly 600 feet of water.

Marcos jewels may be auctioned

MANILA, Philippines — The government plans to auction off \$12 million worth of jewelry confiscated from the family of former President Ferdinand Marcos.

Magtanggay Gumundo, chairman of the agency working to recover the wealth Marcos amassed illegally during his 20-year rule, said the government is drafting a contract with London-based Sotheby's to hold the auction in Manila.

The jewelry includes items seized by U.S. customs agents when the Marcoses fled to Hawaii after the president's ouster in February 1986. Other pieces were found in the Malacañang presidential palace.

China releases aide to dissident leader

BEIJING — An assistant to leading Chinese democracy campaigner Wei Jingsheng was released Thursday after 2 1/2 years in a labor camp and warned not to oppose the government.

Tong Yi said she was not allowed to read anything for all of 1995 and had to work in silence at the Hewan labor camp on the outskirts of the central city of Wuhan.

"I worked alone, not with the others in the workshops. They didn't allow me to talk with the others or the others to talk to me. I was separated out, but always watched," Tong said in a telephone interview from her family's home in Wuhan.

Rabin's assassin given more prison time

TEL AVIV, Israel — A judge sentenced Yigal Amir and two others to prison Thursday for plotting attacks on Arabs and the assassination of prime minister Yitzhak Rabin — an act Amir said he lamented not accomplishing sooner.

"These sons of evil sat and planned and meticulously explored how to murder a man because they didn't approve of his policies and goals," said Amnon Strashnov, chief judge of the Tel Aviv District Court.

Amir, a 26-year-old Orthodox Jew, shouted "The law of God!" as he left the courtroom. Amir, who is already serving a life sentence plus six years for Rabin's murder, was ordered to serve an additional five years for conspiring to attack Palestinians.

Abortion law hits roadblock in Poland

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The upper house of parliament rejected the liberalization of Poland's strict anti-abortion law Thursday as thousands of protesters sang religious songs and prayed outside.

The leftist-dominated Senate voted 52-40 to reject the liberalization, which easily passed the lower house Aug. 30. The lower chamber, or Sejm, now has to muster a 50 percent plus one vote to overrule the Senate's rejection.

The liberalization of Poland's church-sponsored law would allow women to terminate a pregnancy up to the 12th week if they are in a difficult social, family or financial situation. Opponents, led by the Roman Catholic Church, argue that it is a return to abortion on demand.

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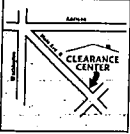

Sides reach temporary accord over road near scenic Utah lands

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — San Juan County officials have agreed to stop grading roads across public land in a potential wilderness area, at least for the moment, county and federal attorneys said.

The agreement also calls for Bureau of Land Management and county officials to meet and discuss the dispute over whether the county's grading this week of about 11 miles of spur roads off the Harts Point road near Canyonlands National Park.

The county claims it owns the road across the BLM land and has a right to maintain them. The BLM disagrees and on Tuesday served a cease and desist order, which the county ignored.

"Halting work temporarily was an important step in trying to address this problem," said U.S.

Attorney Scott M. Matheson Jr. His verbal agreement Wednesday with County Attorney Craig Halls came the same day the Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance (SUWA) filed suit asking a federal judge to halt the work.

The wilderness group sought a temporary restraining order. "The county's neglect for the law is matched only by BLM's irresponsibility in enforcing it," said Heidi McIntosh, staff attorney for SUWA. "The county's derelict road construction through sensitive BLM lands must stop."

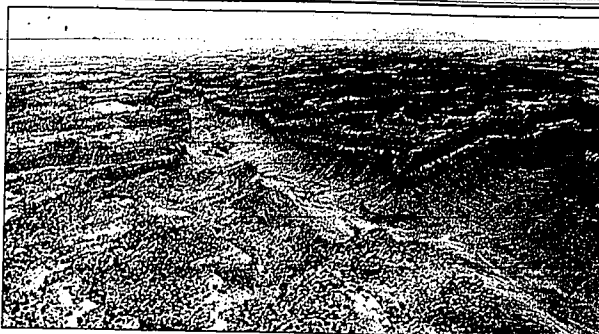
Dave Pacheco, SUWA's Moab representative, said Wednesday that the grading had stopped on Hart Point's side roads.

Rick Bailey, county commission administrative assistant, said he had not received official notice of

the agreement by late Wednesday and that no additional grading was done that day because the county road supervisor was busy with other projects. McIntosh said she will proceed with the suit despite the agreement. The problem is that the southeastern Utah county need only provide a day's notice to the BLM before resuming grading.

"There's still a dagger hanging over the roads in San Juan County," she said.

The suit names San Juan County, Commission Chairman Tyler Lewis and the Bureau of Land Management as defendants. It claims the county has graded roads that the BLM is evaluating for possible wilderness protection. Roads may make lands ineligible for wilderness designation.

SUWA claims that "until San Juan County demonstrates that it possesses valid rights-of-way on the routes, any grading is illegal" and that BLM's "failure to halt

the county's illegal activity is arbitrary and capricious."

"BLM's stalling to seek a court order halting the road-work which they themselves have cited

as illegal has forced us to file suit to protect the natural values of these spectacular public lands," added Mike Matz, SUWA executive director.

Environmentalists' log cutting draws ranchers' ire

JOHN DAY, Ore. (AP) — About 50 ranchers and joggers held a demonstration against a leading backer of a state ballot measure to force ranchers to fence cattle out of streambeds.

Protesters Wednesday stopped log trucks coming off the 960 acres owned by Dr. Patrick Shipsey and put bumper stickers on them urging people to vote against Measure 38, said local rancher Ken Brooks.

"While we support Dr. Shipsey's right to (log), we condemn his hypocritical attempt to destroy the rights of others to manage their grazing lands via Measure 38," Brooks said.

Brooks said protesters also objected to Shipsey building a log home inside the riparian zone along Dry Creek.

Shipsey countered that the riparian zone of Dry Creek was protected, and the water flowing through a turbine and fountain inside the house came

from a spring that normally doesn't flow into the creek.

"I think that is one of the rumors that maybe got this whole protest going," Shipsey said.

Shipsey has practiced general medicine in this small Eastern Oregon town for six years. He also operates a health club. He joined Bill Melett of the Oregon Natural Desert Association as a chief petitioner to get Measure 38 on the November ballot.

The initiative would require ranchers to fence their cattle out of streams that don't meet federal clean water standards. Many of the streams fail because they are too warm, which initiative backers argue is the result of the riparian zone being trampled and eaten by livestock.

"This ballot Measure 38 affects our very lives," said Brooks. "There is physically no way to function in the cattle ranching business if this passes, for most of us."

Report: SEC won't bring fraud charges against Denver airport

NEW YORK (AP) — The Securities and Exchange Commission says Denver International Airport officials adequately informed bond buyers of anticipated delays, two newspapers reported Thursday.

The New York Times and The Wall Street Journal said the SEC has decided not to bring fraud charges against the airport and its underwriters.

The SEC had been investigating whether Denver intentionally misled bond buyers about potential problems in finishing the \$5 billion airport, which opened early last year, 16 months late.

In its investigation, the SEC

had to prove not only that the disclosure was inadequate, but also that Denver's officials, underwriters and engineers sought to deceive investors, the newspapers said.

But instead the SEC concluded that Denver officials made adequate efforts on behalf of investors, the Times said, citing unidentified sources. Denver International Airport originally was scheduled to open in October 1993. Construction delays and problems with its high-tech baggage system delayed the opening until Feb. 28, 1995.

Denver sold more than \$3 billion worth of airport bonds.

Attorneys want judge to view tape

FARMINGTON, Utah (AP) — Prosecutors want a judge to watch a videotape of a defendant having sex with an 11-year-old girl before deciding what sentence to hand down.

Lee H. Allen, 43, faces up to life in prison after pleading guilty in August to first-degree felony charges of rape of a child and sodomy on a child in in August. Lawyers say the tape, which Allen apparently made himself last June, shows the defendant engaging in various sex acts with the young girl.

Allen was to be sentenced Tuesday, but Deputy Davis County Attorney Brian Namba asked 2nd District Judge Jon Memmott to watch the tape before deciding what punishment to mete out.

Allen's attorney, Glen Cella, objected, saying the only reason prosecutors want Memmott to view the tape is to inflame the judge emotionally.

Memmott did not indicate whether he would grant Namba's request. He postponed sentencing to Oct. 8.

The 3:35 p.m. accident occurred at the intersection of North Second Street East and American Legion Boulevard, the report said.

The boy, whose name has not been released, was dead upon arrival at Elmore Memorial Hospital in Mountain Home, police said.

Twin Falls man charged with rape of 13-year old

JEROME - A man arrested by the Jerome County Sheriff's Department on a parole violation charge has subsequently been charged with the rape of a 13-year-old local girl.

Dana Edward Dewey, 30, of Twin Falls, was booked into the Jerome County Jail Sept. 15, charged with a parole violation. He had been released from prison Aug. 6.

The rape reportedly occurred the day Dewey was released from prison, but it was not reported to Jerome County sheriff's deputies until after Dewey was in jail on the parole violation charge, sheriff's Detective Daniel Chatterton said.

Dewey was arraigned in Magistrate Court Monday and charged with rape, lewd conduct with a minor and sexual abuse of a minor child.

He was moved to the Cassia County Jail, where he is being held on a \$25,000 cash-only bond.

Dewey's court-appointed lawyer declined comment.

Buhl woman injured after fall from flatbed truck

BUHL - A Buhl woman is in critical condition in a Boise hospital after apparently falling off the back of a moving flatbed pickup truck Wednesday.

Barbara Voorhees, 41, is listed in critical condition with head injuries at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise.

Medical building headed for approval

TWIN FALLS - When it comes to a new \$9 million medical-office building, Magic Valley Regional Medical Center's board still must decide whether to dig in its own pockets or let private investors dig in theirs.

The board's finance committee voted Thursday to recommend to the board that a two-story medical-office building be approved but asked hospital staff members to provide an analysis of private versus public financing.

Magic Valley Regional, owned by Twin Falls County but receiving no tax money, has served notices to pay for the building and indeed has budgeted the amount in the new 1996-97 budget.

Most of the proposed 43,408 square feet already is dedicated, committed or leased, Administrator John Bingham told committee members. The building would be connected by a corridor to the

hospital. About two months ago, a group of Twin Falls investors, which included real estate appraiser Doug Vollmer, approached hospital staff members about the project, said Kent Taylor, the hospital's attorney.

Vollmer couldn't be reached for comment Thursday.

The property on the hospital campus would remain in county hands. Private investors might lease the ground, construct the building and lease the building back to the hospital, which could sublease it to doctors, Taylor said. Under law, however, a hospital can only lease its ground for 20 years.

"There was no discussion of selling to private investors. The only thing on the table is money," Taylor said. "They do have the money."

Finance Committee Chairman Bruce Brown leaned toward county financing of the project, which has been discussed for six years. Going with private financing may not give the county "flexibility" he added.

"If private does it, it will cost the patrons of the Magic Valley more. It may change the whole thing," Brown said. In addition, interest from private investors had come in the "11th hour,"

when the hospital board was ready to approve the project.

One of the reasons for the medical-office building is the increased financial pressure on physicians and hospitals because of fixed payments for medical costs through insurance and public-aid programs, Bingham said. There's also a trend toward more doctor and hospital consolidation.

Although it's not even built, the space already is spoken for.

On the first floor, 7,800 square feet would be used for services that doctor tenants can use, such as X-ray. There also would be a breast-screening center and 14,000 square feet for a physician's office.

The second floor would be dedicated to doctors' offices. Only 4,308 of the 19,808 square feet will be available for rent at \$14 per square foot said Dr. Ron Mickic led the committee that he and a group of physicians are

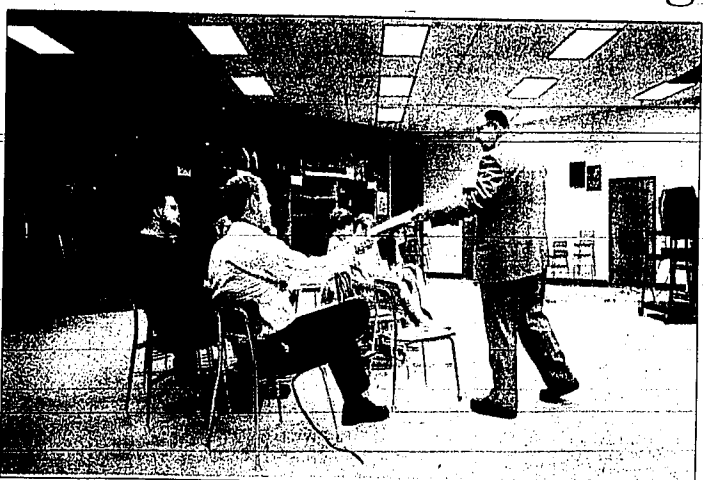
"Oh, that's great," one teacher exclaimed, scribbling on a yellow legal pad.

"I love it," said Paula Snyder, who juggles her own janitorial business with raising her daughter, Heidi, a Lincoln Elementary School student, and her son, Hauns, a Robert Stuart Junior High School student.

Man apprehended after high-speed chase; officer injured during arrest

TWIN FALLS - A Twin Falls man who led police on a high-speed chase through the western part of the city early Thursday morning is in custody.

Vernon Duane Thompson, 26, was arrested after running through a roadblock, three red lights and nine stop signs - at speeds up to 80 mph - and being tackled when he tried to run into a house, police say. A Twin Falls policeman was injured while making the arrest.

Gambrel said that as he drove into the office parking lot, Thompson drove out onto Fillmore, ran a stop sign, turned right, left the road, drove back onto North College Road and headed west.

The chase ended when Thompson stopped at Main Avenue West and jumped out of his car. He drove on Washington Street North, Addison Avenue West, Grandview Drive, 3700 North, Washington Street South, South Park Avenue West, Rose Street, Sixth Avenue West, Second Avenue West, Seventh Street West and Main Avenue West.

The report said Thompson got out of his car and attempted to run into a house at 843 Main Ave. W. As Gambrel ran up and grabbed Thompson, glass in the door shattered.

Gambrel pulled Thompson to the ground and was cut by the glass as he landed, the report said. Gambrel was treated for cuts at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center and released.

Gambrel noted in his report that he tested both his siren and overhead lights after the arrest; both were working, he said.

Filer students dubbed truants

FILER - About 50 Filer High School students who walked out of class Wednesday to protest a closed-campus policy will be written up as truants, said Principal Joseph Hendrickson Thursday.

"The bottom line is it's the community that wanted the School Board to institute the closed-campus policy," Hendrickson said. "Until the community says otherwise, the policy is going to stay in place."

The students left before their final period of class and gathered outside the high school until the final bell rang, he said. Other than the walkout, they weren't raucous and broke no other rules, he said.

The Filer School Board adopted a policy in August preventing students from leaving the high school during school hours. During a public meeting in May, about two dozen people asked for the policy, complaining of reckless teenagers on the road during lunchtime and the perils of crossing busy U.S. Highway 30.

As punishment, a few students will miss participating in some upcoming athletic games, while everyone will get a "zero" in attendance for the class they missed, which may affect their grade in that particular subject, Hendrickson said.

"There's no makeup," he said. "For instance, if you have five B's and a zero, you could go down to a B minus, or a C plus even. A zero could really bring an average down."

Minidoka special prosecutor may stay on job

RUPERT - The handling of three murder cases could affect the Minidoka County prosecutor's race. The county's hired prosecutor will likely stay on the job after the Nov. 5 election, both candidates agree.

Former Minidoka County Prosecutor John Bradley will continue to lead the murder cases against Corey Hood, Cody Butcher and Jesus Diaz, even if Rupert city attorney Rick Bollor ousts incumbent Bruce Newman.

"You don't want to jeopardize the continuity of litigation," Bollor said. "I think Bradley's very competent. I don't think he's getting much help from the

prosecutor."

The trials of Butcher and Diaz, both charged with first-degree murder in the April shooting death of Blake Morgan Jr., won't begin until late January in

Ada County.

If Bradley's attempt to set aside a plea agreement with Hood is approved, the 22-year-old Burley man will be tried on two counts of first-degree murder sometime next spring.

Bradley's contract as a deputy prosecutor hired specifically to handle the three homicide cases expires Jan. 1. His contract will have to be re-evaluated, but Newman said she foresees no changes.

"I'm not so worried about John Bradley coming off (the capital cases) as I am about someone new coming on," Newman said. "If John didn't want to stay on, I'm prepared to continue."

County commissioners on Aug. 1 approved Bradley's contract. They

opposed Raymundo Pena, Newman's first choice for a special prosecutor.

By that time, Pena had already helped Newman through a battle with the Attorney General Al Lance over jurisdiction in the three capital cases. The fight went all the way to the state Supreme Court.

Pena is suing the county for nearly \$50,000 in legal fees which commissioners have refused to pay.

The tussle with Lance and the hiring of an additional prosecutor at \$125 an hour were unnecessary, Bollor said.

"It doesn't seem the most financially prudent move, especially when (Lance) would provide a special prosecutor," Bollor said. "Knowing what I know

Engineer: Lacking support, Wendell sewer project likely down the drain

WENDELL - Much of the city will continue to have no sewer service unless residents push for a change, City Engineer Scott Bybee told the City Council Wednesday.

On the town's west side, most homes from Wallace Street west to the city line are on septic tanks, and owners of numerous undeveloped lots are pushing for sewer service.

"I think it's going to take a group of people... to work together with the city... to develop a plan that's fundable and doable," Bybee said. "Any one of these lots, by itself, cannot be developed cost effectively. You have to take a large number of lots to make it cost-effective."

side routes for sewer trunk lines with lift stations were proposed. Costs ranged from \$143 million to \$169 million. The least expensive option - which would follow a natural slope west of Hagerman Street - is controversial because it runs outside city limits.

By law, such property must be contiguous with the city to be eligible for a city-built sewer line, former mayor George Benson said. Most of the proposed cheap sewer routes just and the council has yet to solve this dilemma.

Some property owners have offered to give sewer easements to the city. City Superintendent Paul Isaacson said.

Last month, Cecil Potter offered the city a sewer easement through his west side property. Other property owners would give an easement if they

didn't have to pay a \$1,300 sewer connection fee.

Developer Bob Servatius said the proposed sewer line would have to be built from south to north if it were to be done piecemeal. Bybee added that it would be cheaper to build the entire line at once.

Bybee discouraged the chaotic development that would result from individuals installing their own home lift stations, and suggested a survey of west side residents to find out how many homes would connect to a new sewer service.

"It's going to take a majority of folks, who really have an interest, to make it happen," Bybee said. "But as yet, there is no citizens' group working to develop a plan for the west side, even though Councilman Dale Bunn called for such a committee Sept. 11."

Paul residents discuss water system upgrade

PAUL - Only about two dozen residents showed up for a hearing Wednesday to learn about a proposal to upgrade the city's water system.

When city residents go to the polls Nov. 5, they will be asked to authorize \$1.2 million in revenue bonds. If approved, the money will be paid back over 20 years through a rate increase.

The city is planning to apply for a \$500,000 state grant to supplement the water bond. If the bond passes and the grant is awarded, water rates will increase by about \$31 per household per month.

The \$1.7 million would be used to replace the water tower with a new tank, replace five hydrants, replace several water lines, buy a backup generator and drill a new water well, according to public works director Richard Dou.

The current system doesn't meet the city's needs. Last summer low water pressure and contaminated well posed problems for many residents. In

What's next: The water bond issue will be discussed again at a City Council meeting at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday at City Hall. Another public information meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Oct. 30, at West Minico Junior High School.

August, one city well was shut down due to coliform bacteria contamination.

"It seems that everything wears out," Mayor Randy Jones said Wednesday.

William Teuscher, a project engineer from Forsgren Associates Inc., said the engineering design could be completed this winter and the project could begin in early spring if the bond passes. He estimated a 90-day completion schedule.

Several residents spoke but did not identify themselves during

the meeting.

They questioned the plan and if there were any other ways to fund the project other than a revenue bond.

They asked why water metering was not part of the plan. They also questioned if the project would attract new businesses and how those businesses would be billed.

Jones said the revenue bond would be paid off through the scheduled rate increase. With a revenue bond, Jones said, rates should decrease once the project is paid.

Jones said installation of water meters throughout town would cost too much and the city wouldn't get the water development it really needs. He added

that new businesses will be charged a hookup fee and regular rates.

Rau said the city's entire water storage system, less 3,000 gallons stored in fire trucks, was depleted

during a 45-minute power outage last summer. With no backup power and only 3,000 gallons of water, firefighting is difficult at best, Rau said.

Better water pressure will improve fire protection which could result in lowered insurance premiums for many homeowners, Rau said.

The city's water system is rated at seven on a one-to-10 state scale. A one ranking is considered excellent, while a 10 is improved.

Decreased premiums could balance out the higher water rates, Jones said.

"Rates will have to be raised regardless of whether or not the bond passes," Jones said. "We're running in the red."

Although the city is running a deficit, the city has no loan or bond debt, according to the election ballot.

The City Council passed a moratorium last year to keep housing developers from building in the city because the water system could not support any more water users, Jones said.

Campaign posters need permits

BOISE - Placing campaign posters on utility poles, trees, rocks or temporary stakes within any highway right of way is prohibited, according to Jeff Stratten, public affairs officer for the Idaho Transportation Department.

Election posters may be affixed to utility poles within the right-of-way when written permission from the pole's

owner is submitted to the nearest ITD district office and a fee permit is issued by that office.

Posters also may be affixed to privately owned fences bordering the right of way, subject to local zoning ordinances, providing no portion of the poster protrudes onto public property.

All posters without a fee permit or otherwise unauthorized will be removed by highway maintenance personnel, Stratten said.

Interested in consolidating and using 20,000 square feet, which Bingham said would require another floor in the medical-office building.

"We'd like to be a player on this," said Miciek. "We'd not like to see our hands tied going into it. We're not happy with leases that have been offered to us."

Under the lease agreement, physicians can continue to provide services they already offer at their existing locations, even though they will compete with the hospital, Bingham said.

However, if doctors want to offer

new services, they must talk with Magic Valley Regional about a joint venture.

Miciek says another alternative would be financing their own building, but adds that the doctors would lose to compromise.

"You have to give something up and we have to give something up," said the doctor. "We'd much rather work with the hospital than against them."

"We have to be responsible to the community," Brown said. "The hospital's medical-office building is just one relocation option. As the group of doctors prefers that option, Miciek said

after the meeting. The advantage of being near the hospital is ready availability of medical tests.

The disadvantages would be difficult access for patients because of a larger parking lot, and doctors' fear of being controlled by a larger agency.

But whether the hospital building is the site or not, consolidation of physicians is a necessity in these days of fixed reimbursement, Miciek said.

"The individual physician has a tougher and tougher time. The overhead costs go up and the demands we have for information

systems, for building systems, it's getting hard and harder. So the necessity really is to form groups in order to spread some of those costs and to hold things down," the doctor said.

"If you have a well-functioning group, there is a lot that's positive for patient care. The building of any building presents us with an opportunity to restructure that way."

Hospital plans originally called for one floor, but active physician interest resulted in plans for two stories, Bingham says. The building can be expanded to five stories in the future.

This year, topics included motorcycle safety and cutting-edge math.

About 60 teachers who couldn't travel out of town registered locally for a seminar sponsored by the Twin Falls School District, the federally funded School-to-Work program.

Speakers Thursday, besides Pauls, included a local judge and a museum curator.

In Pauls' class, the enthusiasm of new teachers for his advice was palpable.

"Boy, I can't wait to get into the classroom and see if it works," said Sheri Carson, a physical education teacher at I.B. Perrine Elementary School, after the seminar.

"If it doesn't work, you revamp

it and get it to work."

After his comments, several teachers raised their hands to discuss wide-ranging topics, including lack of student motivation at home and ways to use his advice in their classrooms.

Twin Falls teachers receive two days of in-service now, and four additional days of training scattered through upcoming months, said Mary Ann Ranells, curriculum and instruction director for the Twin Falls School District.

This summer, 215 school personnel attended a three-day program in Twin Falls to learn new grading and standards techniques, Ranells said.

"I think it's the biggest commitment to the district that it values

lifelong learning and teacher preparation," Ranells said.

"To set those two days aside with the expectation that teachers attend something to improve what they do in the classroom, it's commendable."

As educational resource booms, so does the popularity of in-ser-

vice days among teachers, said Melvin Skeen, superintendent of the South Lemhi School District.

"I think (in-service programs) are much better, taking a good interest in what school districts really need," Skeen said. "And I think there was a time when they didn't do that."

Attorney in INEL case contends witness will lie on stand

POCATELLO (AP) — Steve Garcia's lawyer contends the key witness against the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory technician will be lying when he testifies that Garcia helped cover up improper disposal of waste samples.

Jay A. Johnson, Garcia's former supervisor at the INEL, pleaded guilty in August to improper disposal of wastes and to making a false statement about his actions to the U.S. Department of Energy.

He admitted that he lied in a Dec. 8, 1994 memo about the disposal of 145 jars of hazardous, low-level radioactive and mixed waste, and that he put a cadmium prefiler containing hazardous waste into an INEL dumpster.

"He lied to his boss. He lied to the government and he's going to come here and lie to you — a government witness," defense attorney David Nevin of Boise said during opening arguments Wednesday at Garcia's jury trial before

U.S. District Judge Lynn Winmill. Assistant U.S. Attorney George Breitmeier accused Garcia, 35, of helping Johnson prepare the 1994 memo when they worked together for Lockheed Martin Idaho Technologies Co. at the INEL's Environmental Monitoring Unit. But Nevin said Garcia was unaware of Johnson's actions.

"During this process, Steve did not know that Jay was putting false information in this memorandum," Nevin told

jurors. "He is not guilty of that because he did not know."

Karen Smith, a former technician who worked with Garcia, testified Wednesday that she saw Johnson and Garcia handling waste sample containers on Nov. 30, 1994.

"They were either pouring samples down the drain or rinsing them. I'm not sure which," Smith said.

A worker later photographed the empty, sample containers with their

labels ripped off, Smith said.

Prosecutors allege that the men dumped the samples to avoid an environmental audit that could have shown they had held onto some samples too long. Federal regulations allow specific timeframes for hazardous samples to be tested and returned to secure storage.

Breitmeier told jurors there is no evidence that the illegal dumping resulted in threats to the environment or human health.

Rexburg joins cities with youth curfew

REXBURG — Rexburg has joined the growing list of eastern Idaho communities and counties with a youth curfew.

From now on, Rexburg teen-agers caught out after 11 p.m. may cost their parents up to \$250 or jail time.

The City Council approved an ordinance Wednesday night that bans children under 16 from public areas between 11 p.m. and 5:30 a.m. Sunday-Thursday and from 12:30 a.m. 5:30 a.m. Friday-Saturday.

Parents of children who violate the curfew can be fined for a misdemeanor.

ISU will offer Shoshoni for language credit

POCATELLO — Idaho State University has gained approval to offer Shoshoni for foreign language credit.

That meets one of the school's long-range education goals. The Fort Hall Indian Reservation, including the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes, is not far from Pocatello.

ISU faculty believe the school is the first university in this country to offer Shoshoni as a regular course offering. Elementary Shoshoni was taught in the Indian Studies Program last year, and intermediate courses were added this year.

Indian Studies Program director Christopher Loether said people who speak Shoshoni fluently can receive academic credit by exam.

Scheduling snafu stalls sandhill crane hunt

BOISE — Opponents have forced the Idaho Fish and Game Commission to delay a vote on creating a permanent sandhill crane hunting season.

The commission planned to make its decision Thursday or Friday. But an attorney for Friends of the Sandhill Crane pointed out that notice of Wednesday night's public hearing on the issue did not comply with state law.

The commission acknowledged the blunder and rescheduled a hearing and vote for its December meeting.

"When you talk about changing something in place for 80 years I don't think that's enough notice," said Debra Kronenberg of Ketchum, attorney for Friends of the Sandhill Crane.

Lawyer seeks to move withers lawsuit

REXBURG — An attorney for Dr. LaVar Withers has asked a judge to move a civil lawsuit against the retired physician from Bingham County to Madison County.

The suit was filed on behalf of five women seeking \$25,000 in damages for each time Withers allegedly touched them improperly during his 30 years practicing in Rexburg.

Boise lawyer Jeremiah Crane took over as Withers' attorney two weeks ago and filed a motion to have the suit moved. A hearing on the motion is scheduled for Oct. 21 in Blackfoot.

BSU president declines to debate One Percent leader

BOISE (AP) — The leader of the One Percent Initiative campaign has challenged Boise State University President Charles Ruch to a debate over the property tax limitation measure.

But Ruch declined the offer Wednesday, saying others with a broader view of the effects of the initiative should be represented.

Ron Rankin, Coeur d'Alene anti-property tax activist and president of the Idaho Property

Owners Association, said he wanted to debate Ruch after the university president outlined positions on the tax cut and its effects on Boise State, and its students.

"President Ruch has been shooting at the One Percent property tax relief initiative from his taxpayer-financed ivory tower," Rankin said. "Let's test his anti-tax cut doom and gloom perspective in an open public debate."

Ruch said he had not personally heard from Rankin, but that a debate on the initiative should include more than higher education — such as tax policy and the effects on public schools, economic growth and local government.

"My statements regarding the initiative have focused only on the impact it will have on higher education in general and the students at Boise State in particular," he said.

Crash claims Lava Hot Spring mayor

LAVA HOT SPRINGS (AP) — Mayor Mark "Buddy" Campbell, 63, has been killed in a traffic accident, leaving residents of this small Bannock County community in shock.

"We're all just trying to digest the news," said Bruce Hansen, a city councilman who will be acting mayor until an election to pick a replacement.

Campbell was killed when he drove into the path of a Union Pacific train at a crossing on U.S. Highway 30 Wednesday evening.

The Caribou County sheriff's office investigated.

Campbell, who owned a plumbing and excavation business, was driving home after working in Soda Springs. He was driving a two-ton truck pulling a trailer loaded with a backhoe, according to the sheriff's office.

Alternative country appeals to those turned off by Nashville

When the Country Music Awards beamed throughout the nation Wednesday night, somewhere Hank Williams Sr. was spinning in his grave. And so was Patsy Cline.

That's because there's a new Nashville — one the awards show will celebrate — where people like Shania Twain and her ilk are the leading lights. It's all high gloss and cool hats, posing under the spotlight and trying to get a hit so big it becomes a Chevy commercial.

Let's face it: Country music has gone pop, with all of the attendant shame that comes with it.

The epicenter of country music, by virtue of exporting and rewarding people like Twain while virtually ignoring legendary acts like Johnny Cash and Willie Nelson, has lost all credibility.

Even hardened country fans in the radio and record business have said that Nashville is more pop than ever before. Its artists are disposable. You just put another hat on another act or tell a young female singer to wear shorter shorts.

What happened in Nashville? "Multi-platinum albums. That's what happened," says Rob Bleeststein, the man behind a new industry music chart — Americana — that documents the success of bands who are not churned out by the Nashville hit machine.

Who's lost, of course, is soul. You don't banish Johnny Cash to a non-Nashville record label or ignore all your past heroes without a price. While Nashville embraces prefab pop-country,

other genres are stepping up to embrace the rootsy Americana feel that used to be a trademark of classic country.

Gavin, the respected radio industry news magazine out of San Francisco, was the first to start the Americana format, giving a name to the American roots music movement. And High Tone records out of Oakland, Calif., became one of the country's premiere exponents of the sound. With grunge out and punk on the downside after peaking for the second time, artists have begun reaching for something a little more traditional and eclectic.

And that's the sound of country.

"I think these bands are — if I can steal a line from Jay Farrar (of alternative country band Son Volt) — searching for a truer sound," Bleeststein says.

Rock bands tapping into country is nothing new, of course. The Byrds did it.

Old guard reigns at country music awards

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The country music industry gave its most prestigious awards to old favorites Brooks & Dunn and George Strait and made white-hot sellers LeAnn Rimes and Shania Twain cool their heels.

After dominating the vocal duo category for five years, Kix Brooks and Ronnie Dunn won that one again Wednesday and added the evening's top award, entertainer of the year.

Strait ended a six-year dry spell and won the most Country Music Association Awards of any artist Wednesday night, getting nods for best male vocalist, single and album.

"It's been awhile since I walked up those stairs," said Strait, who has been a consistent hitmaker for 15 years, but was last recognized by the industry voters who award CMAs in 1990, when he was named entertainer of the year.

Rimes and Twain, perched one-two on the country album sales charts, both came up empty. Twain has sold over 8 million of her "The Women in Me" CD over the past 18 months.

Both were recognized with prominent performance slots during the show broadcast live by CBS from the Grand Ole Opry House.

"Man, she's awesome," said host Vince Gill after the 14-year-old Rimes sang the evening's first number, her hit "Blue." Rimes lost out on the Horizon Award for most promising artist to Bryan White, and voters picked Strait's "Check Yes or No" instead of her

Gram Parsons did it. Elvis Costello cut an entire album of country covers and has collaborated with both Cash and Jones. Not long ago, however, acts like Lyle Lovett (who was never embraced by Nashville, even though his early albums are pure country) and the Cowboy Junkies made it cool to cross over. Now more and more artists are finding that going "Americana" doesn't mean they have to wear a cowboy hat. They just don't have to fly the flannel, either.

"I think there's been a flood of them lately and I think it's because there's a chart that acknowledges them," says Larry Slatin, who runs HighTone Records. "It starts to get an identity."

And once it gets an identity, it gets known. And then people listen — even seek out the albums, rescuing them from falling into

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Flashback music from '70s, '80s is hot, hot, hot

Radio programs, night clubs, albums let you get retro

These days, tunes you can "shake, shake, shake" to are all the rage.

Retro music and fashion has hit an all new high.

While some people cringe at the return of '70s or '80s clothing platform or clunky shoes?!! — others have jumped at the rebirth of disco and dance songs.

"Something old is new again," says Pam Koszczewski, manager of a Blockbuster Music in Gaston, N.C. "It's recycled itself."

More radio deejays are hosting retro music programs. Dance clubs promote "Retro '80s" nights. Eighties music even rocks Charlotte Rage arena football games.

Music video TV networks also have hopped aboard the retro craze. Take, for example, VH-1's "8-Track Jukebox" featuring none other than "Partridge Family" star David Cassidy, an icon of 1970s teeny-bopper mania.

In short, retro is hot, hot, hot. "While everyone says 'Retro '80s,' it really goes as far back as 1977 or 1976," says John McFadden, program director at Sunny 107.9 FM in Charlotte, N.C.

The station broadcasts its

Rock beat

"Retro Dance Party" on Saturday nights. "It's consistently in the top three in the ratings," he said.

McFadden estimates the program attracts an estimated 100,000 listeners an hour who are an average 30 years old.

According to McFadden, these songs are among the most requested:

- "Bad Girls" by disco goddess Donna Summer
- "That's the Way" by K.C. and the Sunshine Band
- "Love Rollercoaster" by Ohio Players
- "Knock on Wood" by Amii Stewart
- "Ring My Bell" by Anita Ward
- Koszczewski says she noticed the trend picking up about eight months ago.

"There's a lot more awareness out there," she says. "The clubs are all playing it, and so are the radio stations. It's a fresh sound. There's not a lot of negativity in '70s music."

Retailers say that while albums by individual artists of the period don't sell well now, compilations are going gangbusters.

"Divids of Dance," a four-installment collection of '70s and early '80s music by various singers, sells briskly. Others include series such as Billboard's mix albums, some of which are compiled by year.

Retro music blazes from many nightspots.

Jody Sullivan, who books bands for The Baha, a Charlotte, N.C., club, organized a live '80s concert series at the club this summer.

Sullivan insists '70s disco has fizzled and '80s dance tunes are in.

"We won't do 'Flashdance' — there are points of cheesiness we don't hit," Sullivan said. "But we'd be killed if we went a night and didn't play 'Come On, Eileen.'"

McFadden said people tuning into retro tunes feel nostalgic remembering the era when the songs were a hit.

"I think people go back in 20-year spans," he said. "When

they got to their 30s, they reminisce about the times when there weren't the complications of everyday life."

Don Killian, a sociology instructor at Gaston College in Gastonia, N.C., agrees. Dance music, he said, kicked in right after the Vietnam war.

"We were in a recession and there was an oil shortage. Times were uncertain and tough for kids," he said. "Disco dancing is loose, fun, unstructured — it would be a nice break from what's going on out there."

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Stephen King's 'Desperation': Good vs. evil in a Nevada mining town

The year 1996 has been a busy one for Stephen King.

In March, he began publishing his death-row saga, "The Green Mile," in monthly installments—the first novel in recent memory to be serialized in book form. Now, with the sixth and final part of that work freshly on the racks, he has completed "Desperation" (Wiking, \$27.95). King's glibly pseudonymous "The Regulators" published under the name of Richard Bachman, is being issued by Dutton at the same time.

This is the kind of prolificacy that makes your head spin, but when it comes to King, it's nothing new; over the past two decades, he has published nearly 40 books, including five novels that came out under Bachman's name in the late 1970s and early 1980s because his publishers were afraid of provoking a glut.

For all his productivity, though, King seems anything but a drudge. Actually, he appears to be just the opposite: a man who can't stop writing because he's having too much fun. In "The



Green Mile," he draws inspiration from the conventions of the serial novel, allowing the genre's structure to heighten the tension of the story itself. "The end of each episode made the reader an almost equal participant with the writer," King suggests in a foreword to the first installment, "(because) you had... to try to figure out the next twist of the

snake." And with "Desperation" and "The Regulators," he carries things one step further, developing a matched set of novels which, if not exactly reflections of each other, work as alternate versions of the same story in which characters, themes, scenes and even specific bits of dialogue are repeated, but only after having been filtered through a funhouse mirror that renders them fundamentally changed.

Of the two books, "Desperation" is by far the most substantial, and not only because it weighs in at nearly 700 pages. The story of a group of travelers who find themselves stranded in the mining town of Desperation, Nev., it is, more than anything, a religious novel in which the forces of goodness are led by David Carver, an 11-year-old boy with a direct pipeline to God. David has been drawn to Desperation along with his family and several supporting characters, including Johnny Marinville, a burned-out, Norman Mailer-esque

writer, to do battle with an ancient demon named Tak, who, until it was disturbed, had spent centuries buried in an abandoned copper mine. Tak is vicious, and Tak is hungry, and Tak's entire purpose is to destroy. By the time the novel

begins, it has murdered everyone in town, but perhaps the most profound manifestation of Tak's evil is the way it strips away its victims' faith before it kills them, leaving nothing to hold onto but despair. As David discovers, "What's gone

on here makes Agent Orange look like sugar candy. There will be no sweetening this earth. It must be eradicated — sown with salt and plowed under... The poisoned field is a perversion and an affront to God!"

Polish poet wins literature Nobel

Wisława Szymborska called 'Mozart of poetry'

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Polish poet Wisława Szymborska, whose work went from socialist realism to comparing Josef Stalin with the Abominable Snowman, won the Nobel Prize in literature Thursday.

The Swedish Academy, in its official citation, said she has been described as the "Mozart of poetry" who also combines "something of the fury of Beethoven" in her work.

Szymborska (pronounced vees-WAH-wah SHEEM-BOR-skah), 73, also is a critic. The Nobel laureate, who appears frail and withdrawn but often flashes a twinkle in her eyes, lives in the Polish city of Krakow. "I am very happy, stunned and frightened," she said on Poland's Radio Zet in her first reaction to the news. "I'm afraid I will not have a quiet life now."

Szymborska "is very reserved, some call her shy but she is a very intense person," academy secretary Sture Allen said in announcing the prize.

Praise quickly poured in from her native country for the first of this year's Nobel laureates.

"She is Poland's best female poet since the war," Tadeusz Nyczek a writer and literary critic told the Zycie daily.

Stanislaw Lem, a Polish science fiction writer, told the Polish Press Agency PAP that "Wiska simply deserved it."

'Twister' storms into area video stores

Grangeville writer Gildner to read work Monday at CSI

New videos in Twin Falls stores this week:

• "Twister" (PG-13) — With all the subtlety of an airborne, three-story Victorian, the tornado movie "Twister" arrives, bringing with it the blustery gusts of the summer movie season and what might be construed as a blasphemous new strain of filmmaking hubris.

Most similarly constructed thrill flicks design to provide a source of evil, even if it's attributed to sharks, dinosaurs or — in the case of "Twister" director Jan De Bont's previous film, "Speed" — Dennis Hopper. Here, however, the source of anxiety is the weather.

And whom, besides God, do you blame for that? It's pretty funny watching Bill Paxton, as ace tornado chaser Bill Harding, railing against the injustices of meteorological phenomena. He's obviously mad with wind? He should be more concerned with lightning.

Within the funnel of "Twister's" exciting illogic and formula humanity — created by the extraordinarily successful and equally insubstantial Michael Crichton — lies a lot of standard-issue stuff: Bill has just returned to the fields of Oklahoma to get his divorce papers signed by soon-to-be-ex-wife Jo (Helen Hunt), a tank-wielding fellow storm nut who's getting ready to launch Dorothy (as in Judy Garland), a device full of tracking sensors designed to provide breakthrough information on predicting tornadoes.

It's Bill's design — she still loves him, the big lug — but just to show he's not as smart as he's made out to be, he has brought along his fiancée. It's a classic movie matchup: The earthy, courageous, wheat-blond Jo vs. the starchy, pleat-

ed, brunette Melissa, a therapist calls on her cellular phone while in the back seat of a pickup doing 80 down an Oklahoma dirt road that's being chewed up by tornadoes. Around them are Jo's crew (they're like Snow White and the Seven Irrespressible Weather Nerds) and some really impressive, 300-mph cosmic Osterizers (Newsday) (Hastings, Blockbuster, Video West).

• "Fargo" (R) — When you have to argue like "You're damn tootin'" "You bet" and "Heckuva deal" in a movie about kidnapping, multiple murders and mutilation in the American heartland, you know you're in a world that could only spring from the minds of David Lynch or the Coen brothers.

You're in luck with "Fargo": It's the Coen brothers.

The sixth movie from the whimsical, genre-riffing siblings — Ethan producer, Joel directs — is almost conventional, alongside the earlier "Raising Arizona," "Barton Fink" and "The Hudsucker Proxy." They are, after all, dramatizing true events — a faked crime that led to a string of murders in 1987 — and though it is beautifully filmed by Roger Deakins, "Fargo" adopts what for them is a muted style.

Yet the jolting contrast of extreme violence against the monotonously ordinary lifestyle of rural Minnesota becomes, in the Coens' hands, a huge entertainment. Their use of the uniquely corny local idiom and flat speech pattern, the equal importance they give to the minor dramas in their characters' daily lives, and the casting, combine to make "Fargo" the most satisfying film of this young year.

The Coens have reset the crimes in their native Minnesota, even shooting some scenes in their old neighborhood in suburban Minneapolis, and though the dialogue sounds comical to the outsider's ear, we're assured it's the way folks in this largely Scandinavian area talk (Newsday) (Blockbuster, Hastings, Video West).

• "Great White Hype" (R) — Early in Reginald Hudlin's "The Great White Hype," a sleazy boxing promoter and his minions are sitting around a television set in a Las Vegas suite watching a parade of heavyweight fighters being knocked out. The images are taken from videotape of actual fights, and, blown up for our benefit to the size of a movie screen, they are spectacularly brutal.

If Hudlin wanted to add his voice to the growing chorus calling for an end to boxing, he could not have found a more

effective device. But "The Great White Hype" doesn't have a serious bone in its body, fractured or otherwise, and the underlying context of the video clips scene, combined with the laughter of those watching, is even uglier than the knockouts. The promoter and most of his fighters having their heads snapped are all white.

What Rev. Fred Sultan (Samuel L. Jackson), a silver-winged version of Don King, is doing is looking for a credible white heavyweight to sign as the challenger to his undefeated black champion, James "The Grim Reaper" Roper (Damon Wayans). With gate and pay-per-view receipts on the wane, the heavyweight division needs a shot in the arm, and Sultan plans to fill the syringe with the bile of racism (Knight-Ridder Newspapers) (Video West, Blockbuster, Hastings)

• "Bogus" — Surprisingly dark for a kid-appealing film, this is a tale of two orphans, one is the other Whoopi Goldberg, who learn to draw on their imaginations to bring joy into their lives. Gerard Depardieu plays the child's fantasy companion. Rated PG, one dirty word, no francis. (Twin Cinema)

• "Bulletproof" — Damon Wayans and Adam Sandler team in this crude, lewd and more than slightly strange spin-off "48 HRS." a generic action-comedy goosed up with kinky humor and a couple of unexpecting wacky detours. James Caan plays a crazed criminal, car chases abound. (R profanity, violence, raunch) (Jerome Cinema)

• "D3: The Mighty Ducks" — Emilio Estevez leads his slapshooting charges into the embrace of prestigious Edie Adams, where they unite with their schoolmates against a common foe. (PG, for some hockey roughhousing and mild language.) (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley)

• "Dragonheart" — Following the pattern of "Rob Roy" and "Braveheart," this Sean Connery-Dennis Quaid vehicle features spasms rising against the tyranny of kings, broadsword clanging, hand-to-hand combat. But the new film adds the dragon (Connery), which is alternately terrifying and cuddly, engaged in an inventive medieval scam with a dragonslayer (Quaid.) (Sun Valley Opera House)

• "Extreme Measures" — A medical thriller in need of life support systems of its own. A change of pace for Hugh Grant as a dogged doctor investigating a doctor's doings in his own hospital. Gene Hackman costars (R, violence, language, some nudity and graphic ER activity.) (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Ski Time 4 Cinema of Ketchum)

• "First Kid" — This bland, smooth-as-glass serious comedy tells how Sinbad's secret agent comes to the rescue of a lonely adolescent-presidential son (Brock Pierce), dedicated to making those around him as miserable as he is. (PG, for some violence, language and brief partial nudity.) (Ski Time 4 Cinema of Ketchum)

• "First Wives Club" — Blessed with Goldie Hawn, Diane Keaton and Bette Midler as entertaining stars, the creators of this tale of sweet revenge by a trio of discarded spouses acts as if a coherent story is a luxury that can be dispensed with. (PG, for the thematic elements, some mild language and sensuality.) (Mall Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Ski Time 4 Cinema of Ketchum)

• "Fly Away Home" — Director Carroll Ballard ("The Black Stallion") and the animal kingdom prove a winning combination one more time in the story of an estranged father and daughter (Jeff Daniels and "The Piano's" Anna Paquin) who help a flock of geese migrate. One of the rare films that manages to be irresistible without resorting to emotional blackmail. (PG, an opening accident scene and

some mild language.) (Twin Cinema)

• "The Hunchback of Notre Dame" — More of an operetta than a Broadway-style musical, this lush, loose retelling of the Victor Hugo novel is one of the best Disney animated adaptations, retaining the poignant of the original story even as it takes the usual dramatic liberty of a happy, hopeful ending. The misshapen Quasimodo, voiced by Tom Hulce, is given the romantic soul of a teenage outcast, and the cynical Esmeralda (Demi Moore) is drawn as the anti-Snow White. The sexual implications may fly over young children's heads, but older kids will feel the heart, even if they don't understand it. Rated G. (Gooding Cinema)

• "Independence Day" — Mean, marauding aliens hit planet Earth planning to take no prisoners. Spectacular special effects are joined to a cardboard story line that exactly reproduces the famous sensibility of the 1950s. (PG-13, for sci-fi destruction and violence.) (Twin Cinema, Burley Theater)

• "The Island of Dr. Moreau" — The newest version of H.G. Wells' 1896 novel is a travesty that at least allows Marion Brando a great comic prurayal of the mad scientist Moreau, who thinks if you cross animals and humans you create evil. David Thewlis is game as the young Englishman, who, after a plane crash in the Java Sea, winds up in Moreau's island retreat, but the rest of the cast needs all the compassion it can get. (PG-13, for sci-fi violence, horror and gore involving mutant creatures.) (Shovine Showhouse)

• "The Sappho Comedy" — starring Robin Williams as a 10-year-old boy who looks 10. Indifferently directed by Francis Ford Coppola, whose work is getting harder to differentiate from the nonentities (Sun Valley Opera House)

• "Last Man Standing" — Walter Hill transposes Akira Kurosawa's 1963 samurai classic "Yojimbo" to a Texas border town during Prohibition and casts Bruce Willis as a gun-for-hire who plays two rival underworld gangs against each other. (R, violence, language, and it looks and sounds great, but it winds up an empty display of extreme violence. With Bruce Dern and Christopher Walken. (R, for pervasive strong violence and some sexuality.) (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Liberty Theater of Hailey)

• "Maximum Risk" — Jean-Claude Van Damme's latest is an often needlessly confusing international adventure which nevertheless has lots of terrific action set-pieces and affords Van Damme one of his most reflective roles as a man who investigates the death of the identical twin brother he never knew he had. (R, for strong violence, and for some sexuality and language.) (Motor-Vu Drive-In)

• "The Nutty Professor" — This remake of the 1963 Jerry Lewis movie — itself a variation on the theme of Jekyll and Hyde — is a geyser of flattery and fat jokes, some of

them genuinely funny but most of them stinky as you know what. • "Phenomenon" — The title refers to the event that transforms small-town every-day Joe into a telekinetic genius, capable of cracking uncrackable military codes, growing cucumbers the size of torpedoes and learning Portuguese in 20 minutes. But the real phenom is the actor who plays him, John Travolta, who transforms what might have been a maudlin, muddled movie into something with real humanity, and, yes, intelligence. Rated PG, mild bedroom scene. (Sun Valley Opera House)

• "The Rich Man's Wife" — Halle Berry has a rotten husband, but she doesn't want him dead. A lowlife does the job anyway, and enmeshes her in the crime. An utter dog of a movie, with lousy acting, dialogue and a completely nonsensical ending. Rated R, violence, language. (Ski Time 4 Cinema of Ketchum)

• "The Rock" — Slick and forceful, largely unconcerned with character, eager for any opportunity to pump up the volume both literally and metaphorically, "The Rock" is the kind of efficient entertainment that is hard to take pleasure in. It's this year's model of a dangerous sports car or a designer knife. You don't know whether to admire it or run for cover when it approaches. Rated R. (Jerome Cinema)

Alison Elliott gives a gritty performance as a troubled actress who goes to work as a waitress in a small-town diner. As slick and manipulative as the melodrama is, its star's performance is real and affecting. With Ellen Burstyn, Marcia Gay Harden and Will Patton in the Battle of the Down Eastern Accents. PG-13 (adult themes) (Twin Cinema, Liberty Theater of Hailey)

• "That Thing You Do!" — Tom Hanks makes a (what else but) likable writing and directing debut with the story of a 1964 rock band's climb to the pinnacle-of-teen-mania: Good humored and reeking of innocence, it's determined to leave audiences feeling good and it succeeds. (PG, for some language.) (Twin Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley, Magic Lantern Cinema of Ketchum)

• "Tin Cup" — Kevin Costner shows why he's a major star as Roy "Tin Cup" McAvoy, a ne'er-do-well golf pro who tries to turn his life around after he falls in love with Rene Russo's attractive psychologist. 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Collection captures Nirvana's legacy

Although rock 'n' roll has seen more than its share of tragedies, few were as generally unsettling as Kurt Cobain's suicide in April 1994. It wasn't just that he had been so desperate to opt out of rock stardom, what really left people reeling was the way his death seemed to underscore the despair running through his songs. For many commentators, Cobain was a symbol for his generation's lack of hope and self-esteem, and over time his death became almost more important than the music he made with Nirvana.

"In that sense, 'From the Muddy Banks of the Wishkah' — a collection of concert recordings compiled by surviving Nirvana members Dave Grohl and Krist Novoselic — is a godsend for the band's legacy.

"Not only is it a great live album, conveying both the sound and the

fury of the band's stage show, but it also serves as a reminder that Nirvana's success came not

because Cobain and company captured the spirit of a generation, but because they rocked.

Rather than rely on a single concert, Grohl and Novoselic culled material from five years of tour tapes. The earliest are two tracks from a 1989 date at the Astoria Theatre in London, cut when the band was opening for Tad; the latest is a version of "Milk It" from a show in Seattle mere months before Cobain's death.

Yet as varied as the recordings are — some were recorded with original drummer Chad Channing, others with tour guitarist Fat Smeear fleshing out Cobain's parts — the performances are remarkably consistent. "From the Muddy Banks of the Wishkah" doesn't just shore up Nirvana's reputation, but actually furthers it, demonstrating that the band was even better than its studio recordings indicated.

Blessid Union of Souls believes in power of positive thinking

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — If the name Blessid Union of Souls conjures up some moment of great spiritual enlightenment or divine intervention, singer Elton Sloan can immediately bring you down to earth.

The name's origin, he says, is much more humble.

"It's weird when people ask me where the name came from — they think it just came to me one night when the stars aligned or something," he says.

"I got it off of 'N.A.S.T.I.' I heard Frank Burns say it. He was having a conversation with somebody else. He said, 'You know what? If we could all just come together as one blessed union of souls.' I was like, 'Oh, that's cool,'" he said with a laugh.

The Cincinnati band's debut album, "Home," is a collection of upbeat, positive songs full of hope and optimism. These guys don't moan about despair, low self-esteem or how bad the world is; they think things will get better and they're not afraid to say it. Their arrangements are lovely, wrapped in strings, embraced by piano and acoustic guitar, and sent soaring by Sloan's soulful tenor.

Their top 10 hit, "I Believe," describes Sloan's relationship with his ex-girlfriend, who is white. Sloan is black. Her father was dead set against the relationship, but Sloan firmly believes, as he says in the song, that "love is the answer."

Sloan maintains that he didn't think the band was "going to try to change the world with one song — I thought we could probably open a few eyes, and that we'd done."

He spoke of a fan letter he received that proved to him that the song's message got through.

"She was in her mid-40s. She had a couple of kids that were grown up and in college," he said. "She was taught to think that black people were bad ... She said she heard the song and it just totally opened her eyes."

But unfortunately, the woman toward whom the song was directed has remained silent. Her father gave her an ultimatum — either stop dating Sloan or she'd get no more money for college.

"I think she was afraid to call. She broke up with me about three or four months before the song

started getting air play. On one hand, I couldn't blame her; she had her head on right as far as what she heard on to die in life," the 30-year-old Sloan said in an interview from a McDonald's phone-booth somewhere in Cleveland.

In another song, he writes lovingly of his grandmother in "Nora"; he credits her for instilling a sense of spirituality in him.

"Being around her just really kept things in balance for me," he said.

Stone Temple Pilots ready to hit the road

LOS ANGELES — The Stone Temple Pilots, grounded for the last five months while singer Scott Weiland battled drug addiction, have been cleared for takeoff.

The Los Angeles-based alternative-rock band has announced plans for a sixweek U.S. tour that will kick off Nov. 4 at the Universal Amphitheatre in Los Angeles.

"I feel like a young kid," Weiland said as he and bandmates Dean DeLeo, Robert DeLeo and Eric Kretz made their announcement during an interview on the Westwood One radio network. "I'm really excited ... I did what we had to do, and things are coming around. We have a great opportunity. I'm just really grateful to go out and play with these guys. I really missed being around them and playing with them."

Weiland, who will be 29 this month, spent the summer in a court-ordered program at the Impact Alcohol and Drug Treatment Center in Pasadena while his bandmates, forced to cancel plans for a summer tour, sat idle.

The band was set to tour in support of its third album, "Tiny Music ... Songs From the Vatican Gift Shop," which has sold 1.1 million copies since its release in March, according to SoundScan. STP's debut album, 1992's "Core," has sold 4.1 million

copies and its follow-up, 1994's "Purple," has sold 3.8 million.

Weiland, who was arrested in May 1995 in Pasadena when sheriff's deputies allegedly found cocaine in his car and heroin in his wallet, completed the inpatient program at Impact about a month ago and moved into a halfway house in Pasadena where he still resides.

Weiland is free to come and go but must meet a nightly curfew. Bob Timmins, a Santa Monica-based addiction intervention specialist who has worked with

Weiland and other entertainers, said the timing is right for the singer to return to work.

"It's crucial that he do this — in part for his recovery and in part to repair his relationships with his bandmates, his fans, and everybody else who has supported him in his career," Timmins said.





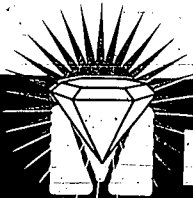

Local runners leave pack trailing behind at Twin Falls Classic

TWIN FALLS — Not even close. That's where the second-place finishers found themselves in both the boys' and girls' divisions of the Twin Falls Classic cross country meet at Canyon Springs Golf Course Thursday.

Sharlyn Maughan of Minico and Casey Crumrine of Valley posted stellar times in the 80-degree heat to win easily. Caldwell's Vallivue High School took the boys' team title and Pocatello ran away from the girls' field in one of the largest regular-season cross country meets in the state.

Crumrine, the only Valley runner among the 131 varsity boys in the field, wasn't even in the lead pack when it rolled past the half-mile mark.

But before the midway point of the 5,000-meter (3.1-mile) course, the senior — who took up the sport for the first time this year — had taken command.

"I thought I could pass on the downhill there," he said, waving eastward to the point where the runners double back from the 1.5th green and head past the start line along 16.

"I thought it would be a lot closer, really," the soft-spoken Crumrine said. Instead, running against a field that includes Class A-1 and A-2 powerhouses, he blistered the course in 17 minutes, 36.44 seconds.

Some coaches speculated it might be a course record, but the course for this meet changes almost annually, making year-to-year comparisons meaningless, meet organizer Larry Lewis said.

Still, Crumrine's feat — and feet — amazed many as he blazed across the finish line, 20 seconds ahead of Vallivue's Ryan Jensen.

"I've run faster than this, but not on this course," said Crumrine, who sported new racing stripes — blue, green and orange — painted into his close-cropped hair.

The obvious question for the Dennis Rodman of local cross country — Is it the hair that makes him run so fast? — drew

a typical low-key response.

"It's just something new, I guess," Crumrine said, rather sheepishly.

Winning is nothing new for Minico's Maughan. She assumed her customary leader-of-the-pack position from the starting gun and never looked back — although she admitted glancing over her shoulder on the corners.

"I couldn't tell, really, how far behind she was," Maughan said, referring to No. 2 finisher Rana Reavis of Pocatello. For the record, Reavis was nearly a full minute behind Maughan's 20:37 finish.

The state mule champion was all alone by the half-mile mark, 12 seconds ahead of the field. She built that to 37 seconds with just over half a mile to go and was never challenged.

"It seems really slow today," Please see RUN, Page D3

Kimberly wins thriller in Buhl

BUHL — So who won this game, anyway?

You would be hard pressed to tell by talking to the coaches after Kimberly's 21-20 high school football victory over Buhl Thursday night.

"I'm really proud of the effort," Buhl coach Gary Krumm said. "This is definitely a positive for next week."

Sophomore John McCauley scored three first-half touchdowns — including a 98-yard return on the opening kickoff — for Buhl, which played perhaps its best game of the year.

The Indians (4-1) go into their homecoming match with non-conference foe Grace next Friday having played two solid games, while across the way, Kimberly coach Kirby Bright was shaking his head. "Buhl" got after us. They came out ready to play football and we didn't," he said.

The Bulldogs (4-1) will concentrate on some basics and "goring healthy" next week before taking on Declo in an important Canyon Conference game for both teams.

Despite the coach's hand-wringing, Bright's defense came up big in the late going to turn back the fired-up Indians. Early in the fourth quarter, junior

lineman Richard Luff was left unblocked and hit Buhl quarterback Luke Chivers as he stepped back from center on a second-down play at the Bulldog 8-yard line.

Chivers fumbled and Luff recovered, halting a 48-yard Indian drive.

After stopping the Bulldogs, Buhl got the ball back with 3:26 remaining in the game, still trailing by a point. The Indians were unable to solve the Kimberly blitz, as Tom Mikota sacked Chivers twice, and Mikeota sacked Chivers twice, with 20 seconds left in the game.

"They seemed to show up at crunch time," Bright said.

Although it hardly seemed like it at the time, the play of the game turned on the official's whistle late in the first half. After McCauley caught a near-lateral from Chivers and rambled 64 yards for a score to bring Buhl within 21-20, the Indians were whistled for holding on the successful point-after attempt.

The second kick — from 10 yards further out — went just left and proved to be the difference.

"That's a terrible way to win a ball game," Bright said.

It overshadowed a first half filled with offensive fireworks and hard-nosed running by both teams.

After McCauley's kickoff return put the Buhl fans on their feet, Kimberly sat

them down again with a 15-play drive that included three fourth-down conversions and another on 3rd-and-14.

Stephen Engle capped it with a 3-yard drive to pass from Scott Flew on a route that gave the Indians fits for the entire opening half.

Engle started the Bulldogs' next drive when he forced a fumble. Six plays later, a scrambling Flew hit Jake Osen in the back of the end zone.

Buhl replied with a 68-yard drive keyed by Sean Brown's 27-yard run up the middle. McCauley caught a 12-yard scoring pass from Chivers on a roll-out, and Jeremy Walker kicked the point after to tie it.

Ron McLimans, Kimberly's 195-pound running back, pounded away at the Buhl defense for 32 rushing yards and 22 more on a pass reception on the next drive to give Kimberly the lead for good. McLimans finished with 100 yards on 16 carries.

His six-yard burst capped the 64-yard drive, and Shane Bell's third successful conversion turned out to be the game-winner.

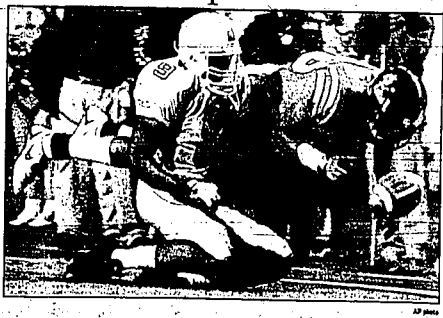

The Braves had to overcome two costly errors that led to the Dodgers' runs. Los Angeles has lost six straight games, including its last four of the regular season.

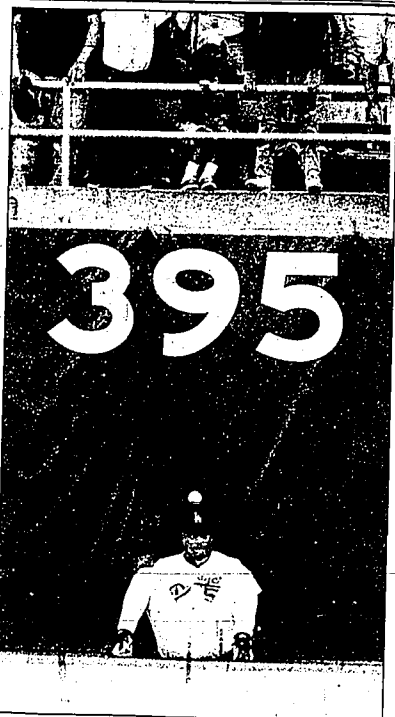

Tom Pagnozzi, who played on the 1987 World Series team before the Cardinals had several mediocre seasons, drove in the game-winning run with a short relay over Trevor Hoffman's glove in the eighth inning Thursday, giving St. Louis a 5-4 win over the San Diego Padres and a 2-0 lead in their NL playoff series.

The Cardinals, playing only their second playoff game since 1987, moved back to San Diego with a chance to sweep the Padres. After an off day, the teams resume the best-of-5 series Saturday. Donovan Osborne will start for St. Louis against Andy Ashby. St. Louis had blown a 4-1 lead, allowing San Diego to tie it in the eighth on Steve Finley's RBI groundout.

Brian Jordan drew a leadoff walk in the eighth off Doug Bochler and advanced on a groundout before John Mabry, who hadn't hit the ball out of the infield in six playoff at-bats, was intentionally walked.

Bochler's wild pitch moved the runners into scoring position, and Pagnozzi hit a 1-1 pitch just to the left of Hoffman, who got the tip of his glove on the ball but couldn't catch it and it bounced to second baseman Jay Reed, who threw to first as Jordan scored.

Benes struck out nine, one short of his season high, and allowed four runs on six hits. He tied in the eighth, leaving after allowing a leadoff single to pinch-hitter Scott Livingstone and a walk to Ricky Henderson. Utah State skidding, but BYU coach takes cautious approach

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — Want to etch another furrow into Brigham Young coach LaVell Edwards' already weathered brow?

Well his No. 21 Cougars are a cinch to win when they play a rare Friday night college football game at Utah State, a state rival stumbling home after a three-game road skid.

They have a lot of motivation. No. 19 it's us," said Edwards, recalling Utah State's 56-56 upset victory the last time the Cougars played at Romney Stadium in 1993.

The next year in Provo, the last time the schools met, BYU beat the Aggies 34-6.

More motivation.

"The Aggies still are in great shape. They have a real shot of winning their own (Big West Conference) championship," said Edwards, who played center and linebacker at Utah State in the early 1950s. "They want to get things going, and they feel they can win the rest of them."

While BYU (4-1) routed Western Athletic Conference opponent Southern Methodist 31-3 last weekend, Utah State (2-3) fell 58-20 at Texas Tech — the third of three losses that followed a 2-0 start, including a 20-17 opening upset of Utah, now ranked 24th.

But Utah State's loss at Texas Tech

was the worst defeat in a dismal string that began with a 31-24 setback at Southern Mississippi. The next week, the Aggies lost 31-17 at Oklahoma State.

It's been a long three weeks and it's taken its toll, Utah State coach John Smith said. "I feel better about this week because the team we play is more our style. ... They like to throw the ball and they're starting to run more efficiently."

Friday night's game — scheduled so as not to conflict with the Mormon Church's weekend general conference in Salt Lake City — will spotlight the NCAA's top-ranked quarterback in BYU's Steve Sarkisian (184.4 passing efficiency). The Cougars rank sixth in passing offense at

328.8 yards per game.

"He's very smart, makes real good checks and doesn't make many mistakes," Smith said of Sarkisian. "He keeps his eyes downfield."

Added Edwards: "Sarkisian doesn't have a bullet for an arm, but he had such good decision-making ability."

A major problem for Utah State is Sarkisian's pattern of throwing to a variety of receivers.

Inula Mill leads the nation's tight ends in receptions (25) and receiving yards (376). But Sarkisian is just as likely to throw to Kaipo McGuire, K.O. Kealahou or Chad Lewis or to a host of other running backs and receivers.

Last week, the Cougars discovered a running game, too. After sputtering in earlier games, BYU rushed for 170 yards and three touchdowns against SMU.

The Aggies, however, are not without weapons. Their passing attack under quarterback Matt Sauk (331.2 yards a game) ranks just two spots below BYU's and is complemented by Abu Wilson, whose three-year total of 3,590 yards and 32 touchdowns makes him the NCAA's active career rushing leader.

Nakia Jenkins is ranked ninth with seven catches per game and 15th in receiving yards (108.8); but Sauk has thrown for just three touchdowns and has six interceptions.

Florida linemen a question

'Title' aura surrounds game

Penn State, Ohio State square off in battle of No. 4 and 3 teams; loser will carry heavy load

For so long, the rivalry between Penn State and Ohio State has been played out in the living rooms of high school seniors all over football-feral Ohio and western Pennsylvania.

The playing field has expanded. Rapidly.

With Penn State in its fourth Big Ten season, recruiting wars are now overshadowed by Rose Bowl fever. And sometimes, like this season, the stakes are even higher.

When the No. 4 Nittany Lions (5-0) play the No. 3 Buckeyes (3-0) before 95,000-plus at Ohio Stadium on Saturday, the winner also remains in the national title chase.

"It's becoming a very intense football game," Penn State coach Joe Paterno said. "As we play games and they become significant ones like this one, there will be a tradition that will build up."

The foundation, thanks to annual battles for players, has been there for decades. And now that the schools are playing on a regular basis, it's remarkable to see how similar the programs really are.

In addition to recruiting many of the same players, the Buckeyes and Lions are among the NCAA all-time leaders in victories, bowl appearances, attendance and sending players to the NFL.

Penn State has 700 wins, 32 bowl appearances and 32 players on NFL opening-day rosters. Ohio State has 682 wins, 21 bowl appearances and 35 players on NFL rosters.

Ohio State had a Hall of Fame game in Woody Hayes for 28 years; Penn State has Paterno, in his 31st season. Both teams have similar approaches to the game.

On defense, the watchwords are attacking and hard-hitting. The Lions have allowed 27 points in five games; the Buckeyes 23 in three games.

On offense, it's power and patience, with Ohio State throwing in a dose of explosiveness. Ohio State leads the nation in scoring at 67 points per game, while Penn State averages 32.2 per game.

Penn State-Ohio State really heated up last season in the 11th game between the border rivals. Ohio State's Eddie George ran 66 yards for a score with 1:42 left to lift the Buckeyes to a 28-25 win at

State College. Penn State leads the series 7-4. "The fact that we've played them the last three years, I think more about them and they know more about us," Ohio State coach John Cooper said.

The schools are 311 miles apart, but recruiters travel the same interstates in search of high school stars. The competition is fierce, and it's probably one of the main reasons the on-field rivalry has become so intense so quickly.

Many of the players in Saturday's game, including Penn State running back Curtis Enis and Ohio State cornerback Shawn Springs, received the full recruiting treatment from Paterno and Cooper.

Enis, Ohio's Mr. Football in 1993, was pursued from all angles. And when the Buckeyes slipped up, the Lions moved in

for the kill.

As a sophomore at Mississippi Valley High School, Enis received a recruiting letter from Ohio State. It was addressed to: Chris Enis.

Oops. Enis said the mistake snuck with him and it gave Penn State the edge. But the Buckeyes didn't give up until Enis signed on the dotted line.

"I was still within the recruiting process and they wanted to see if I would adjust my decision to go to Ohio State," said Enis, who needed a year at Kiski Prep to qualify academically. "But I gave coach Paterno my word."

Paterno wasn't thrilled with Ohio State's extra effort. "I didn't think he was wavering. I know Ohio State put a lot of pressure on him to get him to change his mind, which obviously we were not happy with."

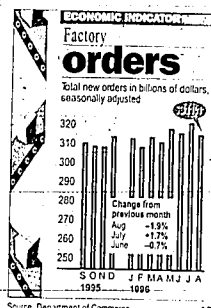

Mortgage rates dip again

WASHINGTON — Thirty-year, fixed-rate mortgages averaged 8.06 percent this week, down from 8.16 percent last week, according to a national survey released Thursday by the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp.

It was the lowest since Aug. 22, when rates averaged 7.93 percent. Average rates reached 8.34 percent Sept. 5, the highest since the 8.47 percent peak in early July before rates began to fall.

On one-year adjustable-rate mortgages, lenders were asking an average initial rate of 5.70 percent, down from 5.82 percent last week.

Fifteen-year mortgages, a popular option for people refinancing mortgages, averaged 7.58 percent this week, down from 7.68 percent a week earlier.

Downpayment a great gift

WASHINGTON — Searching for an

alternative to the usual blender or crystal bowl wedding gift for that special young couple?

Federal officials have a suggestion: cash for their dream house.

Housing and Urban Development Secretary Henry Cisneros unveiled a program Thursday that he said will give couples a head start in making a down payment on their first home.

"It's the kind of help we used to get in an earlier era, when family members and friends pitched in to build the house ... only they're helping financially," Cisneros said. "And it helps avoid the problems of the fourth, avocado-colored blender."

The federal program allows couples who are getting married to open an interest-bearing savings account at a Federal Housing Administration-approved bank. Family and friends can deposit cash gifts in the account toward a down payment, Cisneros said.

Fred Meyer ordered to pay

PORTLAND, Ore. — A woman who was questioned by employees at a Fred Meyer store has been awarded \$475,000 by a jury that found the retailer's theft-deterrence policy includes randomly groping and detaining customers.

Gregory Kafoury, the lawyer who represented Yolanda Blume in her lawsuit, said Oregon law requires such detentions be used only when store employees have "probable cause" to suspect something has been stolen.

The incident occurred May 22, 1995, at the Hollywood West Fred Meyer store in Portland. Fred Meyer has more than 100 stores around the West.

Any policy that gives complete discretion to employees to randomly stop and detain customers for receipts creates an obvious risk that it will not be

applied even-handedly," Kafoury said.

Testimony for the two-and-a-half-day trial revealed the policy is unwritten but well-known by employees, Kafoury said. "It's done in a manner that you don't feel free to leave, and that's what the jury found," he said.

Stocks await jobless data

NEW YORK — The stock market's record-setting advance paused Thursday, pulling most indexes lower as investors waited to see if Friday's employment report justifies an optimistic outlook on inflation and interest rates.

The Dow Jones industrial average, which closed at new highs on Tuesday and Wednesday, slipped 1.2 to 5,932.85 after trading slightly lower for most of the day.

The session was characterized as a natural pause in the market's speedy recovery from July's tumbles, highligh-

ed by a 750-point rebound in the Dow.

"Today was a time-out. The market has done well in recent days, so it deserves a rest, and we have this employment report in front of us," said A. Marshall Acuff Jr., market strategist at Smith Barney.

The monthly employment reading has joined the financial markets repeatedly this year with indications of rising payroll costs that could prompt manufacturers to raise prices. But many economists expect the September data to provide further evidence that economic growth is slowing enough to keep inflation under control without higher interest rates.

Last week, Federal Reserve policy-makers cheered investors by deciding not to boost the central bank's key lending rates. Higher borrowing costs would help contain inflation by slowing demand, but the drop in consumer spending can hurt stocks.

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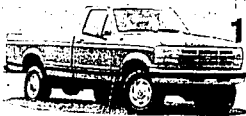

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE

"If a man takes no thought about what is distant, he will find sorrow near at hand."

— Confucius

Today's East saw only the dangers of dummy's imposing spade suit. And instead of a logical analysis, in a state of panic he made a misguided switch.

South ruffed the second diamond and passed his trump six to East's king, showing off his strong trump holding. In search of two more tricks before South might win 10, East impulsively led a club. He was right to think that's where two more defensive tricks might lie, as he was wrong in thinking they could disappear. South ducked East's low club to force West's ace and the rest was routine. South drew the trumps and claimed his 10 winners.

After winning his trump king, East should lead either a trump or a spade. How does he conclude it's best to lead up to dummy's strength instead of dummy's weakness?

South is known to have five heart winners and four spade winners. With no trick coming from diamonds, South must core club trick to make his game. If South needs a club trick, eventually he must lead the suit himself. And if he must lead the suit himself, he must lead for East to allow him to do it rather than doing it for him.

After a major suit exit at trick four, South can discard one club on dummy's long spade. But when he leads a club from dummy, the defense gets two club winners, and the game goes one down.

It's difficult to find the best defense unless one is willing to do some basic counting.

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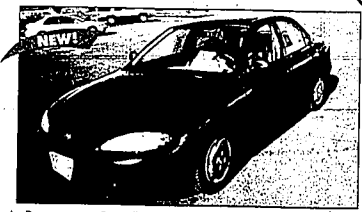
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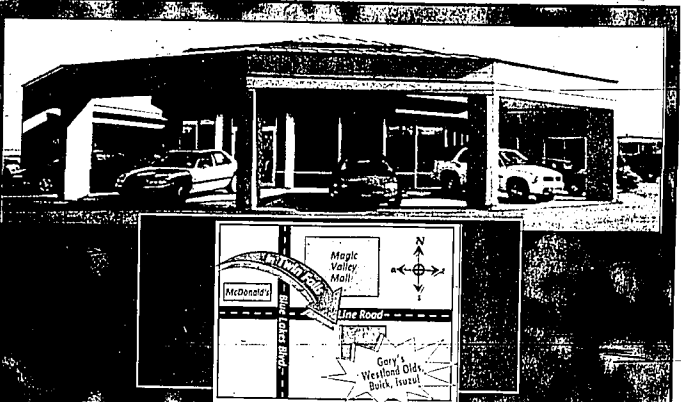
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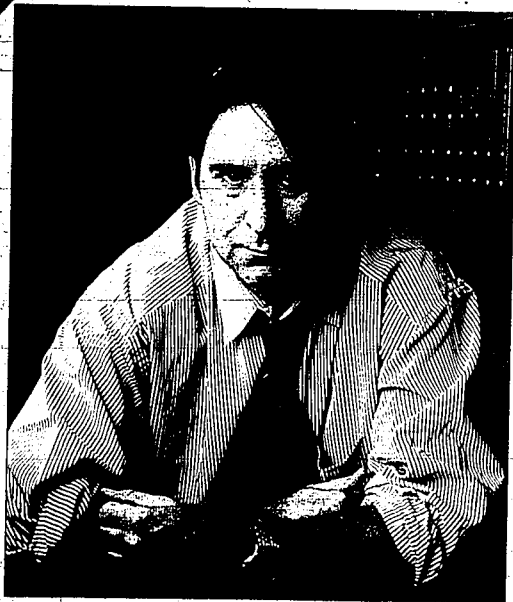
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Celebrity gossip

Q: What can you tell me about Greg Giraldo from the series "Common Law"? —J.N.

A: With Giraldo, what you see is what you get. In the new ABC series, the 31-year-old native New Yorker is playing a Harvard-trained attorney, and that's exactly what he is — or was.

The son of immigrant parents from Colombia and Spain, he was at Columbia University studying English when he took the law school exams, got a nearly perfect score and then went on to Harvard Law.

He found it less compelling than it is on TV, so one night he tried out on the comic at Caroline's comedy club in New York, went on to various television shows and the Montreal Comedy Festival and wound up in meetings with TV executives. That led to a development deal with ABC and a show that mirrors his life.

Q: I haven't seen *Sigourney Weaver* in much lately. Will she be in anything soon? —O.J.

A: Weaver, who turns 47 this week, has been working. Some of her recent films such as last year's "Jeffrey" and "Death and the Maiden" before that haven't been widely seen, however. Still, "Copycat" in which she co-starred with Holly Hunter, did get a major release.

Weaver has a film coming out in December that's bound to get some attention. In "Ice Storm" she plays a woman having an affair with her next door neighbor (Kevin Kline).

If you're anywhere near New York, she's opening in a play this week called

"Sex and Longing." It is written by her pal from Yale Drama School, playwright Christopher Durang, and deals with two sex addicts who publish a tell-all book. After that run, she steps into familiar territory, that of alien fighter Ripley, in the fourth installment of the "Alien" saga.

Q: I remember reading that there were tensions between Carrie Fisher and her father, Eddie Fisher. Are relations easier with his other daughter, Joely? —E.J.

A: The 68-year-old veteran singer always had nice things to say about his ex-wife Connie Stevens, 58, mother of Joely, 28, and her sister Tricia Leigh, 26. Their marriage wasn't marked by the same public drama as his earlier marriage to Debbie Reynolds, Carrie's mother.

As evidence of the Fisher family harmony, you can check out an episode of the series in which Joely co-stars, "Ellen," later this month. Her father will be making an appearance, playing himself. Last year, Stevens did a voice over on the show, and Carrie 39, did a guest appearance. Tricia Leigh was on recently, playing a waitress.

Q: It seems that Meryl Streep can do anything.

Has she ever been in a musical? —A.F.

A: If you saw the movie "Postcards from the Edge," you may remember the scene in which Streep and Shirley MacLaine, playing her mother, do a dueling song performance at a party.

Otherwise, Streep, 47, was once tapped to play "Evita," long before this year's version with Madonna. And Andrew Lloyd Webber has promised her a shot at the screen version of his current hit, "Sunset Boulevard."

Her next film, though, is a drama. In "Marvin's Room" she plays a bitter, blue-collar mother of two who comes to the aid of her terminally ill sister (Deanne Keaton). It's due for release in December.

Q: I always read about TV stars making movies when their shows aren't in production. Did Alan Thicke of "Hill & Grier" do that? —L.J.

A: No, the Canadian actor spent his summer hiatus going back to his roots as a stand-up comic, performing in Las Vegas, among other spots. Thicke spent most of his time on-stage before moving to the States and becoming a TV performer in the long-running hit "Growing Pains" and his short-lived talk

show, "Thicke of the Night."

Q: Laurence Fishburne is one of my favorite actors, but he seems slightly dangerous. What's he like in real life? —K.C.

A: Slightly dangerous. Fishburne, 35 and best known for his role as Ike Turner in "What's Love Got to Do With It," has immense charm but also an edge that flashes if you venture into territory that he doesn't like. Perhaps it's the result of a life spent in show business.

He started acting at 7, and one of his formative experiences was, at 17, spending more than a year in the Philippine jungle shooting "Apocalypse Now" with such overpowering personalities as Marlon Brando, Dennis Hopper and Robert Duvall.

His mother was responsible for his early career. Perhaps that's why the two have been estranged; he will not talk about her. She has also in the past been quoted as saying that she's asked him for money and he's refused.

It's not because he doesn't have it. Fishburne is in the recent release "Fled," is shooting the gritty drama "Hoods" and will be tapped next for Francis Coppola's film version of John Grisham's best seller

"The Rainmaker."

Q: I think Halle Berry is just gorgeous. Was she a model before she became an actress? —D.S.

A: Yes, and also a beauty contest winner. She was the first runner-up in the 1986 Miss USA pageant. Berry, 28, the daughter of a white mother and African-American father, has obviously been a stunner since her school years; she was elected prom queen her senior year in high school. (There was some controversy, however, that may have stemmed from racial prejudice. She was accused of ballot stuffing and was forced to share the title with a white, blonde and blue-eyed classmate from her Ohio high school.)

Her beauty helped her land her first TV role, that of a model in the series "Living Dolls," but it worked against her when she was trying for more serious roles. She had to convince Spike Lee to cast her as a crackhead in "Jungle Fever," but her performance won raves and led to other films such as "Boomerang," "Losing It" and the current "Rich Man's Wife," the first time she has headlined a film.

Watch for her next in the outrageous comedy "B.A.P.s."

Q: I've been a fan of Tom Petty's for a long time. Is he married? —L.H.

A: At press time, that's a hard question to answer. The veteran rocker, who turns 46 later this month, and his wife, Jane (in the inspiration for singer Stevie Nicks' hit of a number of years back, "Edge of 17"), have separated. They had separated once before in 1989. The two have been

married for 22 years, but Petty has admitted that the rock 'n' roll life of long road trips and partying has definitely taken a toll on the marriage.

Q: I saw a book recently called "Murder at San Simeon" written by Patty Hearst. Is that the Patty Hearst? —S.G.

A: Indeed it is. The heiress and 1974 kidnap victim has turned to writing. This is her second book, a mystery. Unlike the statements attributed to her persona "Tania" when she was the Symbionese Liberation Army's captain, Hearst, 42, obviously has never against her family's background now — the setting is the castle her famous ancestor, William Randolph Hearst, built.

Q: I've always liked Ethan Hawke. What has he been doing lately? —G.N.

A: Indulging his literary side. The 25-year-old actor has written a novel called "The Hottel State." In it he describes the soul searching and romance searching of a twentysomething actor in New York. Inside word while the manuscript was being passed around wasn't stellar, but at least one editor liked it. And if it gets picked up for the screen, guess who will star?

Marcy Walker: It's the simple life for her

On October 13, ABC is scheduled to air "Sudden Terror: The Hijacking of School Bus 17" (check listings as title and date may change) starring Marcy Walker (Liza Colby, "All My Children") as police Lieutenant Kathy Leone, along with Maria Conchita Alonso Bruce Weitz ("Hill Street Blues") and

Marcy Walker created three daytime characters: She originated the role of "All My Children's" Liza Colby in 1982. She later earned an Emmy as "Santa Barbara's" Eden Caswell, who, along with a Martinez's Cruz Castillo, became one of daytime's most popular couples. Before returning to Pine Valley as Liza in 1995, Marcy appeared on "Guiding Light" as Tangle Hill.

Michael Paul Chan. The film — a fictionalized account inspired by a true event — involves Chan's character hijacking a bus filled with mentally-challenged children. Alonso is the bus driver who must keep the hijacker from hurting the youngsters. Walker and Weitz are the police lieutenants in charge of the case.

Marcy, who once told me she looks for something positive in every character she plays — whether the character is good or evil — found many things to like in

"She was a strong woman who chose a profession that would inevitably lead her into life-and-death situations. While it's not a career I would choose for myself," Walker said, "I certainly admire someone like her who goes into it for all the right reasons knowing the risks involved."

"Probably what I most enjoyed was her sense of drive and her ability to embrace not just having to make a difficult life-and-death decision, but also to accept the possibility that it may be the wrong decision."

Marcy agreed that making tough decisions often takes courage.

"But most of the time," Marcy said, "the person is sustained by the fact that she or he is doing the right thing. For Kathy Leone, however, it was not quite so clear cut."

Walker, who has starred or been featured in a number of films over the years ("The Return of Desperado," "Midnight Child," "Terror in the Shadows," etc.) says that while she enjoys working in daytime, "I feel taking time out to do a movie helps keep a certain balance in your work."

"She goes on to explain, "Stepping away from the soap and into a film is no less exhausting, nor does it demand less commitment from you. What it does is allow you to take a break from what you have been doing by giving you a chance to play a different character involved in another situation. It also allows you to experience playing the beginning, the middle, and the end of a piece. You can't do this on daytime since a soap is more like a parallel reality that just continues."

Speaking of parallel realities, while Marcy's alter ego on the soap, Liza Colby, endures daytime's typical emotional challenges, real life for Marcy Walker is far less storm and drang and far more "simple and easy," she says.

"I get to play out all the problems here in the studio," Walker says, "and then I go home to my little man — my son, Taylor, who is 74, and we'd do all the things we should be doing. Life may not be easy for Liza, but for me, it is, as I said, simple and quite manageable."




Lois and Clark finally tie the knot Sunday - with little trouble

HOLLYWOOD — You are hereby cordially invited to attend the nuptials of the Daily Planet's ace reporters, Lois Lane and Clark Kent. When Sunday night — Where: ABC's "Lois & Clark: The New Adventures of Superman."

Lois (Teri Hatcher) and Clark/Superman (Dean Cain) were supposed to tie the knot during the all-important ratings sweeps period last February.

But their dream wedding turned into a nightmare when Lois' ex-fiance, Lex Luthor, kidnapped her and substituted the bride-to-be with a frog-eating clone.

Executive producer Eugene Ross-Leming swears that this time around the couple will actually say their "I do's."

She acknowledges that fans were a tad upset when the lovebirds' highly publicized march down the aisle was thwarted.

"You could have predicted that," she says. "People have a huge investment in their relationship. They want some sort of gratification."

But that's not to say Lois and Clark won't be placed in jeopardy on this wedding day. In fact, Delta Burke is set to play as the evil Wedding Destroyer.

"She tries to undermine the wedding," Ross-Leming says. "She is sort of famous for breaking up marriages. She takes credit for Liz Taylor's marriages, Di and Charles." That is her goal in life — to get Lois and Clark. It's a tragic story from her standpoint. The series' stars say

they are very happy that Clark is finally marrying the love of his life.

"I like the show to get into uncharted territory," Cain says. "I like when we do things different — make things happen."

"My favorite part of the show is the work that we do together," Hatcher says. "The romance and chemistry is very special. I know that Dean and I have our more fun with those scenes. So happily, their-being-married will facilitate more of that."

Three days after TV's Lois and Clark marry, their DC Comics' counterparts also will be tying the knot after going together for more than 50 years.

"Superman! The Wedding Album," a 96-page comic book, will be available in stores Wednesday.

Tony Jonas, president of Warner Bros. Television, which produces the TV series for ABC, says the studio discussed the marriage with DC Comics when the show was being developed.

"Our attitude (with the series) was we wanted to explore human relationships," he says. "We wanted to plot the realistic highs and lows and sexual tensions of a '90s couple."

So the wedding was something we had always talked about be-

cause that was going to be a logical conclusion."

Last year, Jonas says, Warners informed DC that the couple would probably marry in this, the fourth season. "They said that would be fantastic," Jonas says. "The comics' people have killed him, brought him back to life and this would be another milestone."

Don't look for wedding bells to chime, though, on the new "Superman" cartoon series on WB.

"I think the way things stand with the animated show is that they are introducing the whole mythology and relationship (of Lois and Clark) to a new generation," Jonas says.

"It doesn't behoove the animated version of the show to be leaping to (a marriage) at this point."

In the past, several prime-time series — most notably "Moonlighting" — lost their charm when their characters became a couple.

But Cain, Hatcher and Ross-Leming believe the marriage will only strengthen "Lois & Clark."

"I think these two characters work together very, very well," Cain says. "I think the closer they are, the stronger their bond and the more enjoyable the show is" because then there's

jeopardy when you really care about the other person."

Plus, Ross-Leming says, "Lois all of a sudden doesn't become passive and inquisit just because she puts on a wedding ring. He's also heroic as a man and heroic as Superman. That's a secret they share, so it makes her a more powerful ally. She is the only functioning human besides his parents who knows his secret, which makes her a cool partner."

Hatcher says the first few episodes deal with the wedding deal with house hunting, the beginning of living together and, she adds, laughing; "sex. Let me mention that."

The couple soon will be getting their own love pad in Metropolis. "It's like a brownstone," Ross-Leming says. "It has balconies he can land on when he flies home late at night. It has a secret panel for his capes. So we are happy about that. It is the perfect love nest."

So is there a Superpberry in the future?

"We are looking at (a season) finale that will in some way deal with a baby," the producer says. "We also deal with the fact that Lois and Clark are, in a way, different species."

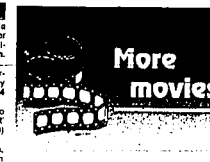
