## All private land in SNRA could get scenic easements

STANLEY — No deal has been struck, but it appears likely that the developer of a 160-acre subdivision inside the Sawtooth National Recreation Area will drop his building plans in exchange for money, according to a Sawtooth National Forest official.

Developer Bob Piva, of Challis, did not return telephone calls from The

Times-News. His land, located on Anderson Creek about five miles northwest of Stanley, commands stunning views of the Sawtooth Mountains.

This summer, bulldozers punched a road into Piva's land, and the meadow still is dotted with survey stakes and flags identifying individual lots. Conduit for electrical service also has been brought to the building sites.

The idea of a new subdivision recently spurred Congress to appropriate \$800,000 to resume purchasing scenic easements for private land inside the SNRA. Landowners who sell a scenic easement continue to own their land, but what they can build on it is strictly controlled.

The SNRA was created in 1972 to protect the area's scenic charms from increasing development pressure. Over the years, Congress has appropriated more than \$29 million to buy scenic easements from private landowners, Ries said.

Momentum has diminished in recent years and SNRA officials purchased only one easement — for two acres — in the past decade, Ries said. Overall, about 90 percent of the private land in the SNRA is covered by scenic easements, he said.

"I think the Piva property got everyone's attention again," Ries said, "but that property was not the problem. The

## Plastics firm melts away from Idaho

### Many of workers in Twin Falls plant find other area jobs

TWIN FALLS — It was here for only 2 1/2 months, but Plastic Slip Sheets (U.S.A.) Limited has split the sheets with southern Idaho and is moving back home to Denver.

The local manufacturing plant employed 18 people before it ceased operations earlier this month. More than half of the workers already have found other jobs in the Magic Valley, the company's chief financial officer, Ken Ziel, said Friday in a telephone interview from Denver.

The closure has nothing to do with a late September workplace accident, in which a worker lost one of his hands, Ziel said.

"It was unfortunate that this happened so near the end," Ziel said, adding that the decision to shut down the Twin Falls plant had been brewing for six months.

The federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration is investigating the accident, said Jerry Hockett, assistant area director for OSHA in Boise.

No fines or citations have been issued, Hockett said, "and we certainly haven't shut them down."

Plastic Slip Sheets uses recycled plastic to make a modern alternative to wooden pallets used for warehouse storage.

Rapid company expansion spurred the decision to close the Twin Falls plant, Ziel said. The company has merged with another firm and acquired two plants in Denver and one in Houston since the Twin Falls operation went online in May 1994.

"We've expanded to what would be three operations in the Rocky Mountains," he said, "so the Twin Falls plant is no longer required. The facility served us well, but company dynamics have changed."

Twin Falls was lucky to land Plastic Slip Sheets in the first place, said Kent Just, executive director of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.

"It was kind of a fluke how they came here," Just said. "They were actually going to move their operation to Boise, but the building owner there raised the rent on them. They popped into town here and, within 24 hours, we had them a spot."

The company's departure, he added, "points out the volatility of the manufacturing business."

Twin Falls is still in the running to land another, larger plastic manufacturing company, Just said. The new firm would employ more than 50 workers, he said. An official decision is due in the next few weeks.

Plastic Slip Sheets had two assembly lines in Twin Falls, Ziel said. One line of equipment will go to the company's Houston plant, while the other equipment line will be sold. A Twin Falls-area buyer is eyeing the idled equipment, but no deal has been struck, Ziel said.

## Where there's political money, there's a hand

### Foreign nationals give to both parties

WASHINGTON — The Democrats aren't the only ones collecting contributions from foreign nationals.

Bob Dole and the Republicans have been the beneficiaries of donations from foreign-born U.S. residents as well.

Wealthy businessmen from Indonesian James Riady to Cuban-born Pepe Fanjul have a history of helping Republicans as well as Democrats.

House Speaker Newt Gingrich accepted money from resident foreigners who

attended a 1995 fund-raiser in California hosted by a leader of the American Sikh community.

for American businessmen at the Saudi and Russian embassies in 1990 as stages for fund-raising drives to entertain prospective donors. GOPAC didn't start identifying its contributors until 1994,

and Democrats pounced on the secrecy Friday.

Rep. Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo., sent a letter to five Republican committee chairman in the House saying, "I'm sure the American public, as well as your House colleagues, would like to know the details of these secret fund-raising activities." Go ahead and investigate Democrats, Schroeder wrote, but pursue the Gingrich matter as well.

Foreign contributions have become a hot topic on the 1996 campaign trail since news surfaced that the Democrats received hefty contributions from interests associated with an Indonesian banking conglomerate. Republican Bob Dole holds out the contributions as evidence of "foreign corruption of America" under the Clinton administration.

### Lili misses Florida; Midwest shivers as new storm hits West

The Florida Keys got stuck with ugly skies and choppy seas Friday, but avoided the brunt of Hurricane Lili.

Rain fell in the East and Pacific Northwest as a cold air mass gripped the Midwest.

A strong system made its way from the Pacific Northwest into the Intermountain region Friday afternoon, with a combination of rain and snow showers spreading into Idaho and Montana.

In the Midwest, temperatures dipped into the 20s and single-digit temperatures throughout the Rockies.

The low of 21 in Colorado Springs, Colo., broke its record of 22 for the date set in 1968. In Kansas, St. Francis hit a low of 22, breaking its 24-degree record from 1922.

It rained throughout the East. In New York City, forecasters issued a special weather statement that the opening game of the World Series may be in jeopardy at Yankee Stadium tonight due to a developing storm. The Yankees face the Atlanta Braves in the best-of-seven series.

Shutters were coming down from homes and businesses along the 110-mile Florida Keys chain as tropical storm warnings were lifted. The hurricane was centered over Cuba packing 90 mph winds and heavy rain, but was moving east.

Streets, neighborhoods and golf courses prone to flooding were under water as far north as the Fort Lauderdale area from days of rain that eased up Thursday.

Government offices were shut Friday and businesses waited for new tourists to replace the ones who fled.

problem is the 2,000-and-some acres of private land within the recreation area that still are not protected.

"Our problem has been that we didn't have any money," Idaho's Congressional delegation is looking for a reliable source of funding to underwrite the remaining purchases, said Susan Wheeler, spokeswoman for Rep. Mike Crapo, R-Idaho.

"Now that everyone agrees this is a priority again, people are saying this is something we need to take care of," Wheeler said in a telephone interview from Washington.

Ries said he is delighted to see movement on the enduring question of nailing down the SNRA's remaining scenic easements.

"That's the most interesting and exciting part of this — the commitment to start trying to fix the problem and not just treat the symptoms," he said. "This is the best shape we've been in in the 1990s."

SNRA officials are working to provide Idaho's congressional leaders with a complete list of private properties that still aren't protected by scenic easements. That list, along with a cost estimate, should be ready within a month, Ries said.

## Tobacco interests denounce study linking smoking to lung cancer

WASHINGTON (AP) — A chemical compound linked in a new study to the genetic changes of lung cancer can come from many sources other than cigarette smoke, a tobacco company said Friday.

The study, published in the journal Science, is the first to describe the specific parts of a cancer gene that are damaged by benzo(a)pyrene, or BAP, a chemical compound in cigarette smoke.

Anti-smoking groups described the finding as a "smoking gun" link between cigarettes and lung cancer that gives plaintiffs a powerful new weapon in lawsuits against tobacco companies.

But Brown & Williamson, makers of Viceroy and Barclay cigarettes, said in a statement that BAP is common in the environment and can originate from many sources.

"Benzo(a)pyrene is everywhere," said the statement. "It is in air, soil and produced by the combustion of any kind of organic matter. For example, it is produced by backyard barbecues and the exhaust of automobiles and trucks."

The tobacco company issued a statement saying the study published "will require careful study" and that the firm was issuing only "a few observations."

## Money

Gringrich said he anticipates that Congress will pass a law banning contributions from legal immigrants. That's a source of income that both the Republican and Democratic parties have tapped for years.

In addition to accepting contributions from foreign-born individuals, the Republican Party received more than \$2.4 million from 16 U.S. subsidiaries of foreign companies in 1995 and 1996. Foreigners who are legal U.S. residents are allowed to make campaign donations, as are U.S. subsidiaries of foreign companies if the money was earned in the United States.

Sen. Alfonso D'Amato, R-N.Y., raised \$100 from James Riady, a central figure in the Indonesian fund-raising furor that is troubling the Clinton White House. And D'Amato's campaign once got \$500 from John Huang, a former Riady company executive who has raised \$4 million to \$5 million for the Democrats from Asian-Americans this year.

Aileen Riady, wife of James Riady, contributed \$1,000 to Dole's 1988 presidential campaign. Mrs. Riady was listed as living in Los Angeles at the time. And Republican Rep. Jay Kim of California is under criminal investigation, with four Korean corporations pleading guilty to

criminal charges of making illicit contributions to his campaign.

Sen. Erank Marukowski, R-Alaska, was fined earlier this decade for knowingly accepting donations from a foreign corporation.

Gringrich put up an interesting defense for his accepting money from the fund-raiser last year by Sikhs: His contributions were smaller than the Democrats', said Gringrich, and the legal immigrants who contributed are still in the country.

That was an indirect reference to an Indonesian man and his wife whose father was a business partner of Mochtar Riady. The couple returned to their homeland after donating hundreds of thousands of dollars to the Democratic National Committee. The man was a landscaper, his wife a homemaker.

The Republican National Committee has benefited in a big way.

Fanjul, a wealthy Florida sugar grower, is a Cuban citizen who raised money for Dole and donating hundreds of thousands of dollars to the GOP.

Fanjul's company is the top recipient of federal support for sugar prices. His largesse has gone to Democrats as well. His companies gave \$110,000 to the Democratic National Committee

Health and Human Services Department said.

The increase roughly matches a 2.9 percent increase in Social Security benefits from 1997, announced earlier this week.

That cost-of-living adjustment will mean an extra \$21 for the average Social Security recipient. Medicare Part A deductibles, which cover hospital stays, are rising by \$24, from \$736 this year to \$760 in 1997.

The Part A deductible is the only cost for a recipient's first 60 days in a hospital.

After that, the cost is \$190 a day for the next 30 days (up from \$184 in 1996) and \$380 a day for the next 60 days (up from \$368).

The Part B program helps beneficiaries who pay for doctor visits, hospital outpatient service, laboratory work, equipment and supplies. The premium is set by a formula, with recipients paying 25 percent of the cost.

The department said in a statement that "these relatively modest increases" reflect lower-than-projected increases in Medicare spending.

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## Perot says he would have boosted debate ratings

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ross Perot thinks he knows why Wednesday's debate got the lowest ratings of any televised presidential face-off.

It's because he wasn't there.

The Reform Party nominee put the blame on the Commission for Presidential Debates, which

decided he should be excluded from the forums.

"The commission's censored show has had its run, and the results are in: It was a bomb," Perot's campaign said in a statement Friday.

According to Nielsen Media Research figures, the second debate between President Clinton and Bob Dole drew lower ratings than any other televised presidential debate.

**Dole accuses Clinton of money abuses**

DENVER — Bob Dole intensified his criticism of President Clinton's ethics Friday, accusing him of Watergate-style "abuse of power" and scandals "involving the foreign corruption of America."  
"Come clean, Mr. President," the Republican challenger said in a day of campaign rallies in three states.  
He stepped up the effort, begun five days ago, to tie Clinton to questionable campaign contributions to Democrats from Asian business interests.  
"They take money-laundering as an art form in this administration," Dole said at a rally in a park in Albuquerque, N.M. "Here's a president who often talks about a bridge to the future, but more often it seems it's a bridge to wealthy political donors."  
Firing back, the Clinton campaign noted three separate investigations of allegations of improper donations to Dole's campaign this year.

**Clinton to go after GOP states, help candidates**

WASHINGTON — Confident of an Election Day victory, President Clinton's political advisers are crafting a homestretch strategy that puts more emphasis on traditionally GOP states and helping Democrats in tight congressional races.  
Just how to divvy up Clinton's travel time and advertising money is a subject of considerable debate among Clinton's political team. Advisers hope to settle on a campaign endgame in weekend meetings during which they will review fresh polling and assess challenger Bob Dole's post-debate strategy.  
But top White House political aide Harold Ickes and others are more concerned about the prospect of low turnout among the Democrats' core constituency. They are reluctant to see Clinton take too much time away from his core states to dally in GOP territory.

**Gore decries use of 'wedge issues'**

BATON ROUGE, La. — Vice President Al Gore accused the Republicans on Friday of using "wedge issues" to divide Americans and make political headway in the presidential campaign.  
"You know what a wedge issue is?" Gore asked 1,000 students at a rally here. "It's an issue that is designed to divide people one from another. Designed to keep people apart, focus on differences instead of focus on what we have in common, which is an agenda for our common future." He gave no examples of such tactics by the Republicans.

**A bit of confrontation for Kemp in New York**

NEW YORK — Democratic mayors criticized his tax plan. Clinton-Gore supporters protested his appearance. There was a heated exchange with a New Yorker concerned about Republican views on AIDS. And that was all before Jack Kemp could even have lunch Friday. Addressing members of the Association for a Better New York, an urban issues group, he bridled when a questioner complained that Kemp and presidential candidate Bob Dole have had little to say about AIDS.  
"He moved from behind the lectern, jabbed his finger in the air and responded that he didn't have time to talk about a lot of other subjects either. "I didn't talk about Bosnia. I didn't talk about the Middle East," an indignant Kemp told Mark Aurigemma, a public relations consultant.

Louisiana gaming may roll to a stop

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Five years after welcoming casinos and video poker, Louisiana has that what-was-I-thinking morning-after feeling.

After a gumbo pot of corruption scandals, mob infiltration and a disastrous casino venture in New Orleans, voters will decide on a parish-by-parish basis Nov. 5 whether to bar gambling from their communities.

"Gambling is eventually going to suck our communities dry," said the Rev. Buford Eastley of the Williams Street Baptist Church in the New Orleans. "It destroys families. It destroys individuals. It will eventually destroy communities. It will destroy the state."

Ballot measures to introduce or expand gambling are on the ballot in at least eight states next month. But only in Louisiana are voters deciding whether to de-legalize gambling.

"If it's just the video poker machines that are voted out, it won't have a long-term effect," said T. Nelson Rose, a professor specializing in gambling issues at Whittier Law School in Los Angeles. "Casinos would be important. The fear there is that it could be a snowball that could spread nationwide."

Since 1991, Louisiana has become a gambler's paradise with 14 riverboat casinos, 16,000 video poker machines and the huge casino project in New Orleans, a city that cherishes its vices with a let-the-good-times-roll gusto.

Since then, however:  
• Twenty-five people, including a state lawmaker, were convicted on federal charges involving a mob scheme to infiltrate the video poker industry. Rep. Buster Guzzardo resigned and got three months in prison.  
• Former state Sen. Larry Bankston, who once headed a powerful committee controlling gam-

bling legislation, and B.B. "Sixty" Rayburn, who served 47 years in the Legislature, are awaiting trial on charges they took payoffs to head off legislation that could hurt video poker.

# Politics of 'New West' resist change

**BOISE** — Lynne Hise, a 55-year-old businesswoman who moved to Idaho's bustling capital city last year, is one of those people who some analysts have long predicted would change the face of politics in the West.

She and her husband, an information systems vice president of an agricultural company, came here from the San Francisco Bay area, one of the most culturally and politically progressive places in the nation.

Yet Hise, like many immigrants who have flooded the Rocky Mountain West in the 1990s, brought with her a set of beliefs that serve to reinforce the rock-ribbed conservatism of Idaho rather than change it. Though she misses some "amenities and art" of the San Francisco Bay area, she finds the "wholesome, simple living style" of Idaho an appealing contrast to life in California.

In my younger days I was a liberal, but the older you get, you realize a lot of these (government) policies don't work," Hise said. "I feel there should be less government intrusion in a person's life and that there is a tremendous amount of waste of the taxpayers' money."

To be sure, plenty else is changing in this corner of southwest Idaho.

In Nampa, a short drive up the interstate from Boise, the computer chip is powering an economic transformation as dramatic as the one a century ago when irrigation canals made the sagebrush desert bloom into one of the most productive sugar beet and seed crop regions in the nation. New housing developments are gobbling up farmland as developers race to accommodate a 28 percent increase in population since 1990.

This is the face of what is often called the "New West," where telecommunications developments have diversified and strengthened economies, once heavily dependent on natural resources; where tens of thousands of immigrants from both coasts are drawn every year by rapidly expanding job opportunities, unbeatable natural amenities and fewer social problems; where knowledge workers and entrepreneurs can work anywhere there's a telephone line often closer to a city.

From booming communities along the eastern edge of the Rockies in Colorado, to the Wasatch Mountains in Utah, to the Boise and Coeur d'Alene areas in Idaho, the West is in a period of breathtaking growth and economic diversification. Contrary to popular imagination, the West is not only the fastest growing region in America but also the one with the highest percentage of residents living in urban areas.

Yet in the midst of such change, the region's dominant political culture — largely conservative and Republican — has remained essentially immune to the kind of metamorphosis many "New West" visionaries predicted. If anything, the GOP's grip has tightened since the beginning of the decade, despite predictions the massive influx of migrants from other regions would weaken its control and dilute the political influence of long-powerful economic interests in the agriculture, energy, mining and timber industries.

"We've speculated about that for years, thinking that (growth) would moderate our politics," said Jim Wetherby, who directs the public affairs program at Boise State University and annually publishes a political survey of Idaho voters. "It hasn't. I think it has made our state more conservative."

Politicians such as Walter Minnick, Democratic candidate in the Idaho Senate race this year, note that high-tech people moving to the area are often distrustful of government and tend to be conservative in political outlook.

That is underscored by the 1994 midterm election: Republicans stripped the Democratic Party of three governorships (two had been in Democratic hands since 1970), a Senate seat, 15 House seats and four state legislative chambers. In the eight interior West states of Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming, Republicans control six governorships, 11 of 16 Senate seats and 18 of 48 House seats.

In Idaho, 1994 was a virtual GOP rout. Republicans won the governorship after a drought of 24 years, and captured all but one of the seven state constitutional offices. They defeated the long Democratic majority of the four-person congressional delegation. And they won 80 percent of the state legislative seats.

Idaho's legislature is now so dominated by Republicans that even Democratic governor Cecil D. Andrus said that "there's not even enough



Democrats to have a good polluck."

Democrats may reclaim some ground next month, but not enough to threaten seriously the GOP's

regional hegemony below the top of the ticket, political analysts say.

Republican gains in 1994 came on the heels of stunning growth and change throughout most of the region as the West has become a magnet for retirees, high-tech employees and a growing class of work-at-home modern jockeys. Though growth rates have slowed somewhat to more sustainable levels, the early 1990s were a time of dramatic change.

Between 1990 and 1993, the population growth rate in the Mountain West was more

than double the national average, and the region included six of the 10 fastest-growing states: Nevada, Idaho, Colorado, Utah, New Mexico and Arizona.

Western states led the nation in non-farm employment payroll growth. The top five states in overall job growth from mid-1994 to mid-1995 were all in the West.

Three of the states with the largest increases in median household income from 1992 to 1994 were Nevada, Colorado and Idaho.

David Evers, a 29-year-old training coordinator for chip maker Micron, is typical of those coming to Idaho. A California native, he has worked on both coasts, but has fallen in love with Boise since arriving there. When he lived in Santa Clara, Calif., it was not unusual to hear the sound of gunfire, he says, and in comparison he finds Boise nearly crime-free.

Though Evers says he would prefer a more diverse racial and ethnic environment than he finds in overwhelmingly white Idaho, on the whole "I would much rather raise a kid here than in California."

In 1970, Idaho had no electronics manufacturing. Today, huge employers like Micron and Hewlett-Packard, drawn by a productive work force and able to attract skilled workers because of the quality of life, dominate the regional economy around Boise. The electronics manufacturing sector employs more people than the timber and food processing industries, longtime powerhouses of Idaho's economy along with agriculture.

More than 50 percent of employment declined from 15 percent to 8 percent in the two decades ending in 1992, according to a recent study by Colorado College economics professor Walter E. Hesse. Yet, to the dismay of environmental organizations, economic and demographic shifts have had little appreciable impact on the political power structure's continued support for natural resource extraction industries that depend on ready access to public lands.

The politics have lagged behind, suggested Rep. Pat Williams, D-Mont., because the West's traditional resource industries are pouring huge amounts of money into the political system to preserve their power.

There is a pointed, orchestrated effort throughout the West by the extractive industries to prevent the normal marketplace of political ideas," Williams said.

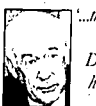
But other observers say the lack of a political shift in the West reflects a more simple reality: People moving here are fundamentally conservative; many are escaping from what they consider ill-conceived liberal government on either coast; and they either adopt or bring with them the kind of independent streak that

has always dominated western political thinking.

"These people tend to be Republicans, they tend to be upwardly mobile, they tend to think of themselves as self-sufficient, and they are often fleeing the machine politics of urban areas," said Thomas M. Power, chairman of the Economics Department of the University of Montana.

Four years ago, the campaign manager for Democratic House candidate Larry LaRocco intensively studied new voters in Boise and nearby Ada County.

"They really were a bunch of Perot supporters," said Martin L.

## Driver surveys track for next week's run

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Craig Breedlove surveyed northern Nevada's Black Rock Desert early this week in preparation for his scheduled attempt next week to return the land speed record to the United States.

"We just really are showing in the English record," Breedlove said.

"That will be considerably below the car's capacity. I think we easily have the power to do it."

Breedlove and his five-wheeled, jet-engine powered "Spirit of America" are expected to arrive at the desert site today.

Some low-speed trial runs are planned Monday, with possible record-breaking attempts on Tuesday or Wednesday.

An advance team is preparing the 11-mile course, removing rocks and other obstacles from the desert track 100 miles north of here.

Breedlove, 59, was the first to drive through the 400, 500 and 600 mph barriers. He set his first record in 1963 at the Bonneville Salt Flats.

fixure, Breedlove has never run on the Black Rock Desert.

He initially went to the Bonneville Salt Flats in Utah for his record bid. He conducted some high speed tests there this summer, but there was not a long enough dry course to try for the record.

"There's actually more room here at Black Rock, and that makes me feel better. There is more of a safety factor, more room to stop. I think generally Black Rock is

smoother than Bonneville.

"The drawback is probably the dust and it's a bit softer," he said.

Breedlove's ultimate goal is to break the sound barrier on land. At Black Rock that would require speeds of about 765 mph.

But that attempt is a few years down the road, he said.

SEATTLE (AP) — It's bad enough having to change planes on a transcontinental flight but if you're a cranky 490-pound gorilla, people pay attention.

Vip, a 17-year-old lowland gorilla bound for Seattle's Woodland Park Zoo, delayed a flight from Salt Lake City to Seattle by pitching a fit in the airplane's cargo hold, said Lee Werle, the zoo's mammal curator.

# Battle over One Percent Initiative continues to rage

BOISE (AP) — With Idaho budget writers already among the nation's most frugal, there is no way \$200 million more can be cut from state spending, a One Percent Initiative opponent claimed Friday.

"Where will you cut \$228 million?" asked Steve Ahrens, whose Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry is behind the effort to defeat the ballot measure. "There is not \$228 million worth of fat in a budget passed by one of the most conservative legislatures in the country."

He was interviewed on KTVB-TV's "Viewpoint," public affairs program to be aired Sunday, one of several events heading into the last two



weeks before the Nov. 5 election. The One Percent Initiative, Proposition One on the ballot, seeks to limit property taxes to 1 percent of taxable value, shifting all basic public school funding from local property taxes to the state.

Ahrens and Coeur d'Alene anti-property tax activist Ron Rankin, the initiative's primary sponsor, disagree about how much money is involved or whether it would require new state taxes to make up the difference.

On "Viewpoint," Rankin would

not say flatly that if the initiative passes it would require increases in other taxes, most likely the state's 5-percent sales tax.

Instead, he continued speaking that normal state economic growth and elimination of budget "fat" would cover the change.

But he would not say what should be cut. "That's up to the Legislature," he said. "That's why

we elected them."

Other developments:

- No on One Percent, a coalition against the initiative, said in a news release Thursday that Laird Maxwell, chairman of the pro-initiative group Idahoans for Tax Reform, admitted for the first time this week that passage of the initiative would require a tax shift.
- According to the opponents, Maxwell said it would be \$168 million.
- Maxwell denied that Friday. "The only shift will come when people have \$168 million more of their own money to spend," he said.
- Maxwell and Rankin filed a

complaint Friday with state election officials, claiming there was no identification on a brochure passed out by schools explaining the initiative's potential impact on schools.

Scott Peyron, spokesman for the anti-initiative groups, said, "This is an irresponsible charge, just as irresponsible as the tax shift Mr. Rankin is trying to sell to the people of Idaho. This campaign has scrupulously guarded against any use of public resources in this effort."

Penny Ysursa, chief of the election bureau, said the sponsors of the brochure would be contacted about the complaint. "We will weigh the facts after that," she said.

• Despite a poll showing support for the One Percent Initiative eroding, Maxwell remained confident of victory. "We're in good shape," he said. "Two-thirds of the undecided voters will go our way."

Ahrens estimated that if the initiative passes, the Legislature will have to increase the sales tax to 6 percent, extend the sales tax to services or other transactions now exempt or boost the corporate tax, although that would not provide much revenue.

He said it was unlikely the Legislature would favor increasing the state individual income tax, which now tops out at 8.2 percent.

### Burning issue heats up in Eastern Idaho

IDAHO FALLS — Scientists say full burning of fields to get rid of stubble is a practice that can't be defended on economic or environmental grounds.

Farmers acknowledge burning fields to get rid of stubble isn't a good idea in the long run, but they're unlikely to change.

Scientists and conservationists oppose burns, calling them irresponsible and impractical in almost every case.

"Air quality-wise and aesthetically, I find it repugnant," said Mary Hoyt of the Greater Yellowstone Coalition. "It seems to me like the Natural Resource Conservation Service and everybody like them has tried to convince folks that they shouldn't do it, but it hasn't stopped."

Soil scientists cite data going back decades showing that burning grain stubble is bad for air quality, depletes soil nutrients and increases erosion.

But farmers say it's the cheapest way to clear a field for the next year's crop.

### Developers working toward theme park

BOISE — The developers of a \$50 million amusement and theme park proposed for Nampa have obtained state permission but still have more obstacles to overcome.

Developers Bob Klosterman and Larry Eastland have not divulged where the money is coming from to finance Sweetwater Junction.

"They have investors lined up. But at this point they still don't want to make the names public," said Vern Nelson, a representative of Northwest Parks Inc., the corporation set up by Klosterman and Eastland to build the project.

Eastland said Thursday he had investors and may go public with a stock offering to finance Sweetwater Junction.

This week, the Idaho attorney general's office signed off on developers' plans to sublease 20 acres of state ground from the city of Nampa.

### 1994 campaign leader opposes 1996 initiative

BOISE (AP) — A founding member of the group that successfully campaigned for a 1994 term limits initiative in Idaho opposes a term limits measure on this year's ballot that calls for a constitutional convention.

Ada County Commissioner Gary Glenn, whose name appeared on the letterhead of Idahoans for Term Limits in 1994, said term limits supporters then publicly promised to oppose calling for a constitutional convention to pursue federal term limits.

"I strongly favor term limits. I even more strongly support federal term limits," Glenn said.

"However, there is no legally enforceable guarantee the convention called for by Proposition Four will even address term limits, and no guarantee it won't threaten the Constitution itself."

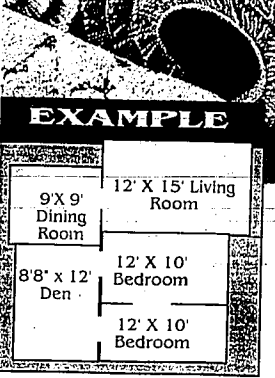
Idahoans for Term Limits won approval of a 1994 initiative limiting U.S. Senate terms to 12 years in the last 23, U.S. House terms to six years in the last 11, legislative, governor and other statewide offices to eight years in the previous 15, and county commissioners and school board members to six years in the previous 11. The federal limits have since been overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court.

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### Chenoweth attacks foe's abortion stand

BOISE (AP) — Looking for an edge in a re-election campaign much closer than could be expected, Republican Rep. Helen Chenoweth is attacking her Democratic challenger for his stand on partial birth abortion.

In a statement, Chenoweth reasserted her staunch opposition to abortion of any kind. But she quickly shifted from the general abortion issue that rippled at the core of Idaho Republicans in 1990 to partial-birth abortions that are opposed by even normally pro-choice voters.

Chenoweth was part of the overwhelming House majority that voted to ban the late term abortion procedure and then to override President Clinton veto. The Senate also passed the ban that would have subjected doctors to up to two years in prison and civil lawsuits but failed to override the veto.

"We're talking about a procedure that is positively barbaric, and I hope my opponent can someday forgive himself for supporting it," Chenoweth said.

### Dog tracks down work-release inmate

TWIN FALLS - A county work-release inmate who didn't return from jail had to be tracked down by Twin Falls county sheriff's deputies and a police dog.

Frank Ray Kinsman, 30, of Twin Falls, is being held in the county jail in lieu of \$5,000 bail. He was arraigned Thursday on charges of escape by a misdemeanor offender and obstructing a police officer.

Kinsman entered an innocent plea. Deputies were notified by the jail at about noon Wednesday that Kinsman had not checked back in to work, according to sheriff's office reports. Deputies eventually tracked Kinsman to his home at 388 Jefferson St., but Kinsman did not respond to calls to come out, the report said.

Deputies eventually got permission to search the building for Kinsman but found the apartment empty, the report said. The officers noticed the apartment had an attic and searched the apartment with help from a police dog, the report said.

Kinsman was found in the attic, covered with insulation, the report said.

KETCHUM - Democrat Dennis Wright says he threw his hat in the ring for the Blaine County District 1 commissioner's seat because he already has earned people's trust.

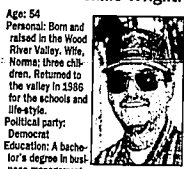

It was his duty, he said, to do more than just talk about the issues.

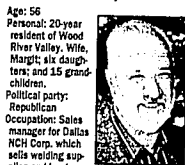
Some issues that concern Church are public lands access, the draft in-holdings plan, affordable housing and Proposition One - the initiative to limit property taxes to 1 percent of property value.

## Gooding receives proposal to manage emergency services

GOODING - Gooding County Hospital Administrator Ken Archer, at Tuesday's county commission meeting, presented a draft proposal for assuming management of emergency medical services.

Under Archer's proposal, the hospital would be responsible for hiring, payroll, benefits, billing, collections and maintenance of vehicles and equipment, as well as providing a medical director.

County funds would be transferred to Gooding County Memorial Hospital, and funds generated by the ambulance taxing district would go directly to the EMS cost center.

Archer said the hospital can offer supply-cost advantages, medical control and ability to obtain improved Medicare reimbursement.

The hospital also would begin charging for supplies used during runs, adding an estimated 25 percent to total billings.

However, despite community support for EMS at a recent public meeting, Commissioner Mitch Arkosch said he has not talked to one person who is in favor of a taxing district since that meeting.

Commissioners said an ambulance taxing district will be the last resort in their search for ways to maintain existing emergency medical services in the county.

Commissioner Jack Gough said that

Archer's proposal is going down the same road as they were at the public meeting.

The commissioners, having received more input from citizens since the meeting, hope to find a way for the service to eventually stand alone, break even and be able to update equipment.

While willing to re-evaluate his proposal, Archer said the present operating budget for the service contains no provision for replacing or refurbishing equipment. Refurbishing an ambulance runs from \$40,000 to \$50,000.

Archer plans to request assistance from a budget forecast - based on types of insurance coverage and estimated runs - from hospital auditors. He said that operating EMS without a taxing district is "a whole different animal."

In other county business: County City Manager Lucy Osborne presented a year-end report and a list of foreground projects she hopes to implement in the coming year.

Osborne also requested inception of a fair grievance board to review complaints before they appear before the commission. She will come up with a format and submit names for countywide representation.

The commission unanimously approved appointing Stacy Butler of Bliss and John D. Kieffer of Hagerman to three-year terms on the planning and zoning commission.

## Deregulation could hurt smaller electric customers, report says

TWIN FALLS - Small businesses and other electricity users in Idaho may face higher bills under proposed bills to deregulate the electric industry, according to a recent study.

Rates for small businesses may rise twice as much as they would without deregulation over seven years, said the study conducted for a New Orleans utility by Texas Perspectives Inc. of Austin.

Though it focused on Louisiana, the study also generally would hold true for other states with low electric costs, including Idaho, Jon Hockenoy, managing director of Texas Perspectives and co-author of the report, said in telephone interview Friday.

"The largest power customers would see a decrease in rates right away if they were permitted to shop around for their electricity," Hockenoy told the Wall Street Journal earlier this month.

"The smaller users - namely residents and small businesses - would have to pick up the tab in the short run with slightly higher rates."

Meanwhile, deregulation already is costing taxpayers money - so far more than \$1.5 billion - in bailing out rural electric power suppliers that might not survive deregulation with their heavy debt load.

A provision of the new Farm Bill eases the process of debt write-offs, by allowing the secretary of agriculture to forgive loans without the

attorney general's approval.

So far the Clinton administration has forgiven \$982 million of debt for the Snake River Power Cooperative, a southern Illinois utility; and \$530 million of debt for Desert Generation and Transmission Cooperative in Utah, according to the Wall Street Journal.

In the Northwest, power officials have recommended opening the entire electric utility industry to competition by the 2001.

And some utilities and large electric users are able to shop around to get power at lower costs.

The change has already benefited Ratt River Cooperative in Malta. It can buy power from lower cost suppliers, saving the co-op money, reports manager Bud Tracy.

The co-op once bought all its power from the Bonneville Power Administration, but now it gets only 75 percent of its power from the federal power-marketing agency.

It gets the rest from other sources at a lower rate, Tracy said.

JEROME - The Magic Valley Astronomers have come a long way from the group's founding 20 years ago.
The club celebrated its 20th anniversary Saturday at the Jerome Public Library, and club founders Gene and Jake Reichard were surprised with a party in their honor.
According to Gene Reichard, the club started as a project of Fairlyland Park, a five-acre plot set aside from the family farm where the Reichards home sits southeast of Jerome. The Reichards both came from music- and drama-teaching backgrounds in Moscow years ago. About 30 years ago, Mrs. Reichard started a marionette theater to keep neighborhood children occupied and off drugs. One particular child, Marsha Lickley, stayed with the puppet theater, and when she grew up married a young carpenter named Bill Mason.
Mason dreamed of becoming an astronomer and proposed that if the Reichards paid for the materials, he would build a small, family-sized observatory at Fairlyland Park. The observatory was built. Mason moved on to college at Laramie, Wyo., and now works at the Keck Observatory in Hawaii.
The observatory Mason built at Fairlyland Park houses a six-inch reflector telescope with a

College of Southern Idaho's planetarium, one of the Pacific Northwest's largest, gave a slide preview of planetarium shows - he invited the club to join forces with the planetarium and help with some star parties planned for next spring for public viewing of the Hale-Bopp comet.
Hale-Bopp is a new comet that is presently just a fuzzy blob visible through telescopes at about 4 a.m. By March 17 through April 14, when public star parties are planned in various communities around the Magic Valley, the comet will be much larger. Hopefully, it will be visible with the naked eye at a more convenient time as it moves from the morning sky to the evening sky.
Recently the Magic Valley Astronomy Club named telescopes on the CSI planetarium grounds for the lunar eclipse. Greenawalt estimated that more than 600 people attended that event. He likes the extra telescopes at star parties - they give more people a chance to look. He also suggested monthly star parties on the planetarium grounds.
Club president Forrest Ray said he wanted the club to be an observing link with the planetarium. By providing extra telescopes at CSI star parties, the Magic Valley Astronomy Club has greater access to more people. Club membership always rises after a college star party, he said.

Northern Idaho gets \$2.5 million flood help

BOISE (AP) - Northern Idaho communities will share \$2.5 million in federal funds to aid recovery from last winter's floods.

# Jerome has final hearing on comprehensive plan

**JEROME** - Nearly 30 people attended a final hearing Thursday to hear or voice concerns about the proposed Jerome County comprehensive plan, which is now on its way to county commissioners.

Art Brown, Jerome County planning and zoning administrator, said the plan - a countywide plan looking to future growth and assisting in orderly development of the county - is the result of hundreds of people's work and input since April 1995.

It is a joint countywide plan which includes the various plans of schools, highway districts, the College of Southern Idaho, the recreation district, the cities in Jerome County and the county.

Hazleton, the city of Jerome, the highway districts and the schools have approved their individual plans. The master plan includes provisions for land use and future growth, population, environment and natural resources, transportation, housing and recreation.

Many comprehensive plan writing committee members voiced concerns about changes the planning and zoning commission had made to the plan.

Michelle Fikel, a consultant from Science Applications International Corporation in Boise, said that this document was a collective community vision and goal. Community representatives had broken into groups, had identified issues, strategies, and then had begun writing, Fikel said. The writers wanted the plan to reflect what the

community was all about, Fikel said.

Mike Pepper, Jerome Recreation District director, said the plan was intended as a guideline. Since Jerome is less developed, a good plan can prevent problems before they happen, he said. The plan was developed by over 100 people volunteering their time in over 20 meetings, Pepper said. He urged the commission to revise the plan carefully.

Water use was among the top concerns expressed Thursday.

Dave Perrine, a biologist with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game in Jerome, said that the plan-writing committee had included provisions for the creation of wetlands to clean up agricultural flows and create wildlife habitat. There are natural wetlands and man-made wetlands, he said, and

wetlands are a good thing for the environment and wildlife.

Perrine asked why the planning and zoning commission had deleted the word "wetlands" from the plan. He also said that subdivisions, if unchecked, can encroach upon the migratory routes of wildlife.

Planning and zoning commission member Dick Greenwood, an attorney, said "wetlands" is a loaded word which brings federal restrictions and regulations with its use. All but two bodies of water in Jerome County are man-made, he said, and the commission doesn't want someone to be required by government to keep something; they created themselves.

If a farmer creates a holding pond for excess water and a few years later decides to drain it and do something else with the land,

the commission doesn't want the farmer to be required to continue using the pond simply because "wetlands" was used in the county plan, Greenwood said.

Lee Halper, a plan writer, said plan writers had concerns about converting of farm land, some writers wanted to discourage farmers from selling off unused water shares and leaving farmland with no water.

Other writers felt a person had the right to sell water shares.

The writing commission wanted to keep agricultural lands agricultural, recognizing that Jerome County is ag-based. Yet they wanted to use land to its full potential.

Discussion also focused on the plan writers' suggestion that greenbelts be created along irrigation canals. Greenwood said the canals were private property, and if the

public wanted to develop greenbelts an easement should be purchased. Concern was expressed about maximum density of the county, now at one house per acre, and about requesting open spaces in subdivisions.

After the public hearing, the planning and zoning commission made final changes to the plan. The commission altered wording to make agency names generic to allow future changes in agency names and responsibilities.

The commission directed Brown to have the plan typed up with its changes and sent, with the land use map, to Jerome County commissioners for adoption.

Once adopted, the plan can't be changed for six months, Brown said. After six months the plan can be changed, altered or fine-tuned.

## Judge survives battle with lymphoma

**BURLEY** - One of the most common forms of cancer in the United States is also one of the least familiar to the public, quietly afflicting thousands of people each year.

Fifth District Judge George Granata Jr. didn't know Hodgkin's Disease was a form of cancer until he was told in 1993 that he had a 50 percent chance to live.

Hodgkin's lymphoma and non-Hodgkin's lymphoma are forms of cancer that attack the lymphatic system, the body's mechanism for circulating antibodies to help fight off infection and bacteria.

Today is the final day of National Lymphoma Awareness Week organized by the Lymphoma Research Foundation of America in Los Angeles. The nonprofit foundation seeks to raise public awareness of the disease.

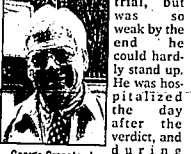
"The disease comes in many different forms," Granata said he started to notice symptoms of the disease in 1992, although he did not realize what was happening to him. He lost weight and experienced cold sweats.

"I thought for quite a while I had the flu," he said.

Recently Granata went to his doctor for a routine physical exam, and relayed the unusual symptoms. He then found himself undergoing a battery of tests.

His ailment continued to elude physicians, while he continued to grow weaker. He eventually was hospitalized, but in the beginning of 1993 he was scheduled to preside over a three-week murder trial in Rupert.

Granata made it through the

trial, but was so weak by the end he could hardly stand up. He was hospitalized the day after the verdict, and underwent exploratory surgery doctors found cancer in his spleen.

Granata was diagnosed with Hodgkin's lymphoma, which has a 75 to 80 percent survival rate according to the Lymphoma Research Foundation. In that sense, Granata said he was pleased he had developed one of the more curable cancers.

Sill, doctors gave Granata a 50-50 chance to live, he said. He became furious to think his life could be cut short, but at the same time knew he was going to survive.

"You have to have hope, and I'm convinced that your own determination, the gumption to fight the disease, is really important," Granata said.

Once the tumor was removed, Granata underwent seven months of chemotherapy. At times it can leave a person so weak, it is difficult to put one foot in front of another. Yet, a regular exercise routine helped him build his strength back.

Granata sees a doctor every six months for regular exams, but considers himself cured.

The trauma has left Granata with a different outlook on life. "I've always been a very close friend to my wife and close friends do matter, he said.

Granata had been a judge for 17 years, reporting to work every day in a shirt and tie whether he

had a court hearing or not. He describes himself as a serious person, perhaps overly conscientious. Today he wears ties only for hearings, a way to remind himself that life is too short.

"I still wanted to do my job to the best of my ability, but on the other hand not be quite so starchy, or try to be a little more relaxed," Granata said.

Mike Granata, Burley resident and Don Gallegos, 41, didn't know much about lymphoma before doctors removed a tumor bigger than a coconut from his stomach nearly two years ago.

Now his cancer is in remission and he is leading a normal life, minus a few indulgences. The raw product coordinator at the J.R. Simplot Co. in Heyburn no longer smokes cigarettes, and doesn't drink as much beer.

Non-Hodgkin's lymphoma is a different variation of cancer than Granata's. It comes in more than 15 forms, varying in severity, and many are incurable, according to the Lymphoma Research Foundation.

Gallegos was fortunate. He learned the type of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma he had comes with a 90 percent chance of being cured. People think cancer means "you're dead off the bat," he said.

Gallegos first noticed his symptoms in November 1994 when he came home at night feeling tired and hungry. He had stomach pain. He tried to make sure he lost 50 pounds. Doctors removed the tumor in January, and he started nearly five months of chemotherapy soon after surgery.

Gallegos sees his doctor every month for tests to make sure the cancer hasn't returned. Soon he expects only to have blood tests every six months.

## Federal money for homeless, hungry will be less this year

**BURLEY** - Less federal money to help the hungry and homeless will be available locally this year.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency is sending less money to Magic Valley counties, said Betty Wooten, executive director of the South Central Community Action Agency.

Cassia, Minidoka and Twin Falls counties typically receive disaster funds from FEMA, and in 1997 they will receive about \$5,200 less than the year before, when they received close to \$40,000, Wooten said.

Jerome County, which received about \$6,200 last year, isn't even on the list, she said.

"We are just absolutely thrilled to have anything," Wooten said.

FEMA will send about \$100 million in federal money to counties this year to help feed the hungry and shelter the homeless. It is the 14th year Congress has sent money to the local governments, where local boards pass out the money to nonprofit and government agencies.

In the Magic Valley, groups seeking money include homeless shelters, the Idaho Migrant Council, and Volunteers Against Violence, Wooten said. Service groups can apply for the money, but must show they will use it for either food or shelter.

The local public service groups will need to rely more on the community to make up for the lost money, Wooten said. The Boy Scouts of America annual food

drive and other events will have to help keep food banks full.

"I truly hope that when people look in their pantries, they think of us this year," Wooten said.

Capt. Tom Peterson with The Salvation Army in Boise is chairman of the State Set-Aside Committee, responsible for a general FEMA fund for Idaho. Peterson said he was surprised the federal government ever put any money into the fund.

This year Idaho will get more than \$80,000, according to FEMA. Last year the state received more than \$86,000, Peterson said.

"Several counties didn't use the money, but for those that rely on it the loss can be a problem, he said.

"It's the same old story. The less you have to distribute, the less you have to help," Peterson said.

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## Butcher, Diaz trial dates set

**RUPERT** - The dates have been set for the murder trial of Kody Butcher and Jess Diaz, but what evidence will be presented is still in question.

Jury selection will begin Jan. 21 in Ada County for the first-degree murder case against Butcher, 20. Butcher is accused of shooting Blake Morgan Jr. of Rupert in his sleep on April 10.

The trial of Diaz, also charged with first-degree murder, is scheduled to begin on Feb. 10 in Ada County, but the date could be pushed back, depending on the duration of the Butcher trial.

Andrew Parnes, the attorney assigned to represent Diaz, protested having to follow the Butcher trial, Parnes said he fears publicity

from the testimony of Todd Mass, Butcher's former jail cellmate. Mass says Butcher confessed to him that he killed Morgan, and Parnes fears the publicity could bleed over into the Diaz trial.

Another change of venue will be requested, Parnes said, if there is any concern with this publicity tainting a second Ada County jury.

Twelve jurors may not learn that a gun, bullets and a spent shell casing found in a van occupied by Butcher and Diaz link them to the murder of Morgan.

Fifth District Judge William Hart Friday denied a motion to preempt a hearing to suppress the evidence.

Minidoka County Deputy Prosecutor John Bradley said a ruling allowing the evidence in an armed robbery trial against

Butcher and Diaz should transfer to the murder case.

"It's been fully litigated. There's a 25-page decision on the matter," Bradley argued.

The motion to suppress the evidence will be argued in Minidoka County's 5th District Court Oct. 28 and 31.

At issue is a variety of evidence, including a Norinco 9mm handgun - confirmed by ballistics experts as the weapon used to kill Morgan.

Other evidence in question includes bullets, shells, a Nike shoe taken from Diaz' home that matches the footprints left on the front door of Morgan's home the night of his death.

Also at issue are statements made by Butcher after his arrest - including the jailhouse confession - made out-lined during a preliminary hearing in August.

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## Man pleads guilty to reduced charge in death

BLACKFOOT (AP) - Parson Scott Richards has pleaded guilty to aggravated battery for the Nov. 12, 1995, beating death of his girlfriend, maintaining his innocence but conceding he likely would be convicted.

Richards, 35, of Picoabo, originally was charged with murdering his girlfriend. But prosecutors filed with prosecutors for a reduced charge in return for the guilty plea.

Blaine County Prosecutor Tom Mack said he negotiated a plea because pathology reports from two doctors concluded Alves probably did not die from the cerebral edema, also known as brain swelling, she suffered after Richards beat her.

Initial autopsy reports suggested the edema was the cause of death, but further tests indicated Alves suffered from chronic alcoholism and diabetes, and those conditions more likely caused her death.

Alves, 32, and Richards had been dating since 1993. She also was from Picoabo, but Richards and Alves were living together in a Blackfoot apartment at the time of her death.

Richards told 7th District Judge James Herndon Thursday that Alves had come home late the night before the alleged beating with a cut on her lip.

"The next morning, she was sitting on the bed and I pushed her off the bed with my feet and then when I was walking out of the bedroom, I pushed her to the side, against the wall," Richards said. "I am guilty of that. It could have caused bruising but I don't know."

Richards is scheduled for sentencing Nov. 25. He faces up to 15 years in prison.

system is the way to go. I came across a farmer, (Dan Brown) in Glendale, that had the brilliant foresight to allow us to irrigate his field with our effluent. This is a perfectly clean product with a high-nitrogen content that a farmer would normally get from solid or gas fertilizer. It's a win-win.

Belleuve's business core has been renovated. Its Main Street has been improved to four lanes with a center turn lane, along with curb, gutter and street lighting.

"I'm not responsible for initiating that project. A group of businessmen came to me with the desire so we formed a committee, looked into improving the downtown business core and we've supported the LID if there hadn't been a majority, grass-roots support for the project. I just made sure that we got what we asked for and that it was done right," he said.

With any proposed project, Wright said, he likes to have majority grass-roots support before he throws his support behind it. He had about 70 to 80 percent of Bellevue voters behind him for the LID, he said.

The City Council created the LID that assessed costs for the improvements from Main Street property owners and property owners in Bellevue.

"Of course the property owners

on Main Street paid a higher ratio, but all of the people in Bellevue benefited from the improvements," Wright said. He said the city's taxpayers chipped in \$375,000, the Idaho Transportation Department contributed \$12 million and the city received a federal grant of \$500,000 which helped pay for the income residents with their portion of the assessment.

"When I was trying to sell the LID, I'd tell people that for every 37 cents that Bellevue taxpayers chipped, they'd get \$170 in return. You don't get that kind of return anywhere for your money, even if you find a runaway stock investment," Wright said.

Wright said the biggest job for Blaine County will be managing Wood River Valley's extreme growth, especially in the county's southern area.

"Blaine County needs to be aware that you can't subdivide and subdivide without providing public services such as water and sewer. In the end, the valley's quality of life will be greatly affected if these concerns aren't met," he said.

"I would like to see growth paying more of the share for its effect on the social infrastructure, roads, sewers, schools, etc.," he said. He mentioned "impact fees" as the source of such payments.

Regarding Proposition One, which would limit property taxes to 1 percent of property value, he said, "The One Percent Initiative isn't going to go away. It grows out of a frustration by some voters that feel present spending is too high."

When commissioners consider the county budget for the year, he said, "they should never take more than what is needed to fund necessary services. Anything beyond that spending is frivolous, the county will be constantly hounded by this segment of voters."

Blaine County has been able to collect for an "emergency fund" of \$10.5 million - without a lot of pain, he said, because county property valuations are so high. He said most county budgets range from \$3.5 to \$5 million.

Wright said that, since property values are increasing dramatically in the south valley, the tax burden "should moderate for north valley residents" because the burden would be more evenly spread over the entire valley.

He supports looking into the draft in-holdings plan because, "we'll need some (way) to allow for conditions before locating structures within these remote regions. The draft in-holdings plan would protect public interests when private property is developed in remote areas surrounded by public lands," he said.

"My work made it convenient for me to keep track of the legislation in the Statehouse - we saw the need for the legislation, so we wrote it," he said.

Church vows to protect the Big Wood River ecosystem by "keeping a close eye on stream alterations, riparian zones and future development," he said.

Church supports the idea of a private jail, used by several counties and located in Blaine County. "It would not require a bond to do this and would save Blaine County taxpayer money," he said.

Providing affordable housing in Blaine County would be a goal for Church.

"Blaine County should have been leading (in the effort to find housing solutions). We need to form an eight-person committee and get started working with Ketchum. We should be picking up part of his (Ketchum Housing Authority Administrator Karl Fulmer's) salary and have him working for us as much for Ketchum," Church said. "Planned growth has to be the key when dealing with this problem."

Church calls self a vehement supporter of private property rights. He said that the in-holdings draft plan, now in preliminary drafting stages, needs a lot more discussion. His intent is to protect public interests when private areas is developed in remote areas

surrounded by public lands.

"I haven't decided whether it's a good idea. It's a spin-off of hillside ordinances. I don't know that it's necessary. What's good for one may not work for another. Property owners should have some say in how they want to develop their property and not be dictated to. I think these areas need to be identified," he said.

Church is against Proposition One. He said it "won't have much effect Blaine County" because most property tax assessments are below 1 percent of property values.

"The people have to get the money from somewhere to pay for (county) services such as schools, fire and police. These part-time res-

idents have the money and should keep paying their share," he said.

According to Blaine County Treasurer Vicki Dick, residents in some taxing districts in Blaine County are billed as much as 1089 percent of the value of their property. The levies range from .587, to 1.089 in Carey. The lowest levies are in outlying areas that receive fewer services than do residents closer to cities.

When asked why he thought he was the better man for the job he joked, "I'm better looking."

"No, I'm not one to get into a draw-out, egg-throwing, run-your-opponent-down contest," he added. "I want to concentrate on the issues. It's not my personality to run someone down."

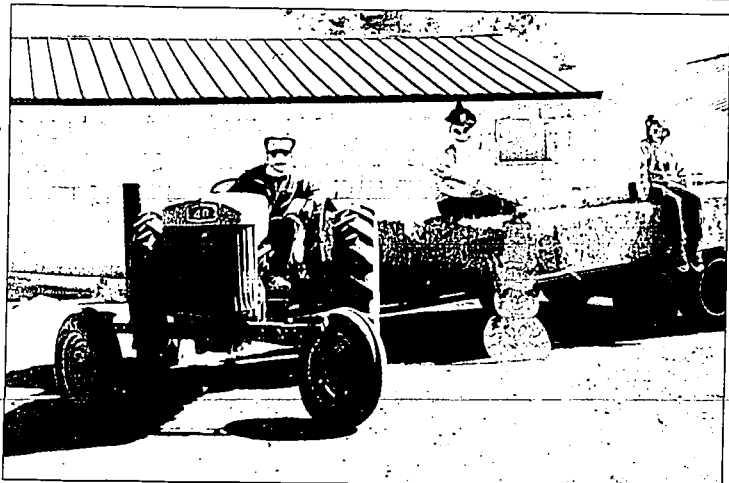

# Wendell takes key conference game from Bulldogs

**WENDELL**—The Wendell Trojans, after taking a week off after their first loss of the season, got back on the winning track Friday night while taking a giant step to gaining home-field advantage in the playoffs.  
Wendell (6-1) gained a game on the Kimberly Bulldogs (5-2) with a 35-13 victory on senior night, scoring on two of its first three drives and ending the game with an interception return by senior Mike Coehlo that sealed the victory.  
The Bulldogs relied heavily on junior Ron McLinnans in the first half, and though he carried the ball 17 times, the 5-10, 155-pound running back gathered just 47 yards.  
The Bulldog yardage was mainly due to the passing game, with quarterback Scott Plev completing four passes for 72 first-half yards. Plev finished 13-of-25 for 178 yards and one touchdown, but gave up three costly interceptions.  
Wendell took its opening drive 79 yards on 11 plays, including a 34-yard pass from Bryan Bendorf to Nick Kelsay that set up Ducey Vouroubek's 1-yard plunge.  
The teams traded possessions in the second quarter before Plev connected with Jake Osen for a 22-yard gain that set up the Bulldogs at the Wendell 29. But the Trojan-defense-stuffed McLinnans and sacked Plev to force a punt.  
Three plays later, Vouroubek found a hole up the middle and scampered 78

yards to set up Job Eckler's 6-yard touchdown with 3:46 remaining in the half.  
The Trojans began the second half having barely missed a step. Vouroubek took the third play from scrimmage 82 yards to put Wendell up, 24-0, and Eckles scored on a 31-yard dash on the next possession.  
Having found themselves down 28-0 with half of the third quarter still to play, the Bulldogs went again to their passing game. Plev completed four straight passes for 41 yards and finished the drive with a 12-yard completion to Stephen Engle for the first Kimberly points.  
The Bulldog defense then held Wendell to four plays and out, and the offense embarked on a 53-yard drive that ended with Cody Sears intercepting a Plev pass off receiver Brian Harshman's deflection.  
Plev found revenge three plays later, picking off Bendorf and engineering an eight play, 51-yard drive. McLinnans' 5-yard touchdown run cut the lead to 28-13 with just over four minutes in the game.  
Kimberly would not get the ball again until under half a minute showed on the clock, but Coehlo nabbed Plev's third interception and took it in for the final score.

# How the Yankees, Braves should match up in the World Series

**NEW YORK**—The Atlanta Braves are coming into the World Series night after a big win while the New York Yankees are well rested.  
Whether that will give either team an edge is hard to say, especially if the forecast is night and rain washes out Game 1 at Yankee Stadium on tonight.  
The only clear-cut advantage is the home-field one, which New York holds. No doubt the Yankees crowd will be even more raucous than usual — watch out, Atlanta outfielders — as the Series returns to the Bronx for the first time since 1981.  
The Braves, behind John Smoltz, Greg Maddux and Tim Lincecum in the Series for the fourth time in the last five postseasons.  
The Yankees made it this far with a five-game victory over Baltimore in the ALCS. Andy Pettitte pitched the clincher Sunday, Darryl Strawberry and Cecil Fielder again provided power and New York's bullpen was strong throughout.  
Atlanta surely is more healthy than the Yankees. The only player the Braves are missing is David Justice, whose shoulder injury may sidelined him for the rest of the season. It was his home run that beat Cleveland 14 in Game 6 last year, giving the city of Atlanta its first major sports championship.  
Strawberry, however, has a broken toe, and Wade Boggs, Paul O'Neill and Tim Lincecum are banged up.  
There's also the annual designated hitter debate. The DH is not used in the NL park, meaning at least one of the Yankees' key hitters will have to sit.  
Braves manager Bobby Cox, a former

player and coach for the Yankees, has no major worries. The DH will even allow him to get Ryan Klesko's bat in the lineup and leave 19-year rookie sensation Andrew Jones in left field.  
The Braves and Yankees have met in the Series before. Milwaukee beat New York in Game 7 to win in 1957, while the Yankees overcame a 3-1 deficit to win the next year.  
That happened long before high-profile owners Ted Turner of the Braves and George Steinbrenner of the Yankees came along, and they've spent millions building back to this matchup.

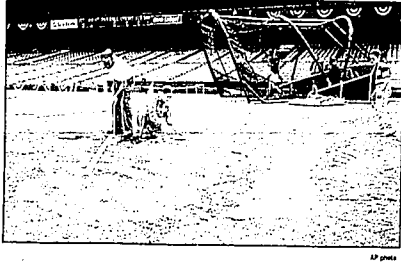

The Braves didn't get to the ballpark until nearly 8 p.m. — eight hours after leaving Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium and three hours after landing at Newark International Airport.

Before the Braves walked into Yankee Stadium, they spent three hours with the toughest foe in New York: traffic. It didn't help that they stopped first at their hotel in Midtown Manhattan during rush hour on a Friday evening.

"Once we saw the bus driver's face, we kind of knew what would happen," said John Smoltz, Atlanta's Game 1 starter.

"We just flew to the West Coast," he joked.

The Braves, who have won four of the last five NL pennants, planned to start Smoltz against Andy Pettite on Saturday night in a matchup of the probable Cy Young Award winners, then go with No. 4 starter Denny Neagle on Sunday night against Jimmy Key.

But forecasters said there was a 100 percent chance of rain for Saturday afternoon and predicted it probably would continue into the evening along with gusty winds. That left the possibility of the first Series rainout since Game 7 in 1986 — also in New York, at Shea Stadium.

If the game is washed out, the

opener would be pushed back to Sunday night. Braves manager Bobby Cox said he hadn't figured out what his rotation would be, but he would have the option of using Greg Maddux in Game 2 against Key on Monday night.

When the defending World Series champions return home for Game 3 on Tuesday night, Tom Glavine could then pitch against David Cone.

"Denny Neagle is a good pitcher," Cox said. "It's hard to bypass Neagle. He gave up two hits in his last start."

Pettite, 21-8 with a 3.87 ERA, started the playoff openers against

Texas and Baltimore, then won the Game 5 clincher against Baltimore last Sunday.

The 24-year-old left-hander said he was thrilled to start the Yankees' first World Series game in 15 years, but maintained his usual low-key demeanor.

Atlanta's lineup has left-handed power, including Fred McGriff and Ryan Klesko. Normally lefty pitchers do better against lefty batters, but not so with Pettite.

While righties hit just 259 against Pettite during the regular season, lefties hit 329.

"I really struggled against them," Pettite said. "In the post-season, for me, I've been trying harder to get lefties out. I'm going to focus in."

Atlanta outscored the Cardinals 32-1 in sweeping the final three games to overcome a 3-1 deficit, which the Yankees expressed the Yankees.

"The Braves are playing unbelievable right now," Pettite said. "What they've done in the last three games shows what kind of team they have. They've got an unbelievable pitching staff."

They've got three of the best arms in the league, and we're going to have to be on top of our game."

Smoltz is 1-0 in five career World Series starts, getting a win over Toronto in 1992. He led the majors in wins, going 24-8 with a 2.94 ERA.

"We know we have a chance to beat the best now," Torre said. "They were the Cardinals out."

## Saying the right thing is critical

You might say that Cindy was a child of the streets. Only in her case, it had nothing to do with socio-economics. It had to do with fun.

At age 6, Cindy loved to play in the street with her friends, an entertainment choice with which her parents were, at best, uncomfortable.

They did everything they could to keep her off the streets. They lectured. They bribed. They grounded. They even spanked.

Still, every time Cindy turned up missing, they found her out there on the streets with her friends.

"Thankfully, the street we lived on wasn't very busy," her father, Steven, recalls.

"In fact, it was sort of a winding, country road. But it was a route often traveled by soldiers on their way home from a nearby military base, and sometimes they would drive awfully fast."

Every time he drove by the lifeless form of a rabbit or dog that had wandered into the road, he shuddered at the thought of his little girl's propensity for street life.

And so he continued trying to teach her not to play there — with limited success. It was a frustrating time for father and child.

"I don't know that I'm going to do with that girl," Steven said to his wife, Susan, after yet another scolding session. "She just doesn't seem to understand what I'm saying to her."

Susan, who had been following the ongoing father-daughter saga for ... well, for as long as there had been a saga, said the entire situation around with one simple, gentle observation: "Then maybe you aren't saying it in the right way."

"Maybe," Steven said. "But what else can I do?"

"I don't know, honey," she said. "You'll think of something."

And he did. It came to him the next day as he was driving home from work. When he got home, he walked over to where Cindy was playing on the street, of course and scooped her up into his arms. "Come on, sweetheart," he said. "We're going to go for a little ride."

They drove into the country, finally stopping alongside a furry mound of ... something.

"What is it, Daddy?" Cindy asked as they got out of the car.

"Look closely, but don't touch it," Steven said. "Can't you tell what it is?"

She studied the object by the side of the road for a few minutes, unsure of its identity until she picked out its unmistakable ears.

"It's a bunny!" she exclaimed. "Is it dead?"

"Yes, I'm afraid it is."

"What happened to it?"

"It was playing in the road, and a car came along and ..."

"... and squished it?"

"That's right," Steven said. "It got squished because it was playing in the road."

"Yuck!" Cindy said. And for the first time, Steven saw understanding in Cindy's eyes.

At last, he thought he did until he came home from work the next evening and saw a group of children playing in the street, with Cindy standing by the side of the road, yelling right along with the other kids.

Steven jumped out of his car and began striding toward his daughter, prepared to lecture, bribe, ground and spank — perhaps all at the same time. And then he heard what Cindy was shouting from the sidewalk.

"Come on, you guys!" she yelled. "Quit playing in the street, or else you'll get squished!"

Today, Steven is a veteran teacher who spends much of his time training young teachers.

One of the most significant lessons he teaches is the one he learned from Cindy and Susan: If you're not communicating, maybe it's because you're not saying it in the right way.

Or because you've already been squished.

TWIN FALLS — For 50 years, every week, on radio station KTFI, southern Idaho listeners have heard the words, "Welcome to this Sunday's broadcast from the Immanuel Lutheran Church."

On Oct. 27, the Immanuel Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod will celebrate a record-breaking 50 years of broadcasting its Sunday morning hour of worship over the airwaves. More than 2,600 worship services have been broadcast from the Twin Falls church.

## Ministers view Graham crusade as unifying force

SAN JOSE — In the Christian world, Billy Graham is the Show. His preaching fills stadiums, changes lives. There is no other home-grown religious icon of Graham's stature and celebrity in the United States. And when his crusade comes to the Bay Area next year — first in San Jose, then Daly City and Oakland — clergy expect it to energize churches and bring thousands to faith.

Even a full year before his arrival, Graham's crusade seems to be producing benefits for a fragmented Christian community. All his life, Graham, 77, has appealed primarily to evangelical Christians. In his old age, however, the Southern Baptist has also emerged as a catalyst and senior statesman for Christian unity. Planning for his appearances here has helped galvanize Christian groups who aren't necessarily in the habit of praying together — or even talking to one another.

They're working across ethnic, economic and gender barriers among Christians of various denominations, the Rev. Frank Jackson, a Presbyterian minister and East Bay crusade organiz-

The complex planning process began in March 1995 when Sterling Huston, Graham's director of North American ministries, placed a phone call to the Rev. Karl Overbeck of Church of the Chimes in San Jose.

He asked Overbeck — who teaches in the Graham organization's continuing education programs — if there would be church and community interest in Graham coming here.

Overbeck and others met with Bishop Pierre DuMaine of the Roman Catholic Diocese of San Jose; DuMaine assigned a diocesan representative, the Rev. Eugene Boyle, to the crusade planning process.

Planners also approached Hugh Wiro, until recently the head of the Council of Churches of Santa Clara County, asking him to help. A Presbyterian minister and long-time liberal activist, Wiro accepted.

Fittingly, Overbeck's congregation is part of the Reformed Church in America, a mainline Protestant denomina-

Continued from C1 Next week, Mike Hagen and his buddies are coming to Twin Falls.

"I tell young people to believe in themselves," Hagen said in a phone interview on Wednesday. "I tell them tough times don't last, but tough people do."

Tough is the operative word. Power Team members have been known to blow up hot water bottles, snap out of two pairs of steel bars, bend through 10 feet of ice with their skulls, rip pinebooks in half and lie in a bed of 4,000 sharp nails with a man on top bench-pressing 400 pounds.

After they are done, they tell their audiences they are out to wage war on the devil. From the looks of those biceps, Satan has a formidable foe.

Power Team members came out of the non-denominational Church on the Rock-North in Dallas, but their headquarters is the John Jacobs Evangelism and founder of the team.

The guys have a weekly TV show, "The Power Connection," which airs Saturday nights on the Trinity Broadcasting Network. They have been featured in People magazine and

and they taken their show on the road to seven countries. Hagen came to the Power Team from Montana, where he became a Christian when he was a junior at the University of Montana, playing football with theizzlies.

"I was going to get married, and I thought you should get married in a church," said Hagen, who talked with a campus minister about this.

"Steve Valentine" - he's still there - shared what it was like to have a personal relationship with the Lord, and my wife (to be) and I both received Christ in our hearts."

Today, Hagen's wife - who stays in shape with aerobics - is a full-time mom to the couple's three children ("they are all Christians, and they all stand up for Christ in their schools").

Hagen tours part-time and works out, lifting weights, four days a week. He doesn't use steroids, he said, and neither do the other members of the Power Team.

"I speak out against steroids, and we are drug-tested and polygraph-tested randomly," Hagen explained. "We tell people that some of the greatest athletes, 10 years later, are at the bottom of a beer can or at

the end of a joint." Some members of the Power Team have struggled with drug problems. One guy, who used to take steroids while playing football, ended up having a heart attack. Next week, the Power Team will tell Twin Falls audiences all about it.

Among other Power Team member pledges to make the trip to the Magic Valley with Hagen are Eddie Dalcour, a two-time California bodybuilding champion and runner-up in the Mr. America contest, who is nicknamed the Gripper because more than 50 men, 25 on each arm, cannot break his grip; Jeff Neal, dubbed the strongest man in the NFL in 1993 when he played for the Houston Oilers, who can burst 5 feet of concrete with his arms; and team leader John Jacobs, 6 feet 4 inches and 320 pounds, has 23-inch biceps and measures almost 5 feet around the chest.

# Back on a faithful track

Tammy Faye Messner triumphs over scandal, divorce, illness

RANCHO MIRAGE, Calif. — Go ahead and laugh at Tammy Faye Messner if you want. After a public lifetime of ridicule, she's used to it.

"It doesn't bother me," she said, batting her fake eyelashes for the millionth time over a lunch of tuna sandwich and hot fudge sundae. "I just laugh with 'em. As long as they spell my name right."

Though many may roll their eyes at the news that she has just published her autobiography, remember this: A decade after the PTL scandal exiled her family to a lifetime in the supermarket tabloids, the woman who cries at the drop of an eyeliner pencil remains a household name.

No longer, though, is she regarded as a reason so many people lost faith in televangelism.

After enduring first husband Jim Bakker's imprisonment, her divorce, second husband Roe Messner's fraud conviction and her own battle with prescription-drug addiction and colon cancer, it is a different Tammy Faye who commands the spotlight.

"Tammy Faye Messner, the survivor.

"I've had a lot of realities of life hit me right in the face," said Messner, 54. "But I've always believed the words 'you can make it.' It's not just something I sang at PTL. I never give up."

Before things get too serious, tiny Messner (she's 4 feet 11) in skin-tight stirrup pants and a low-cut top giggles as she brings back the side of her we know best.

"People always call me an icon," she said. "I'm still not sure what that is. It's good. What's my part in the culture? Makeup?" Messner is back in the public

eye, more than any time since Bakker's trial in 1989. She's appearing on prime-time TV, pushing her book at signings nationwide, peddling a motivational infomercial and marketing Tammy Faye Celebrity Wigs. They come in 16 colors.

"Tammy: Telling It My Way" (Villard, \$22.95) is competing for the public dollars with Bakker's autobiography, "I Was Wrong." Told that her ex-husband's 632-page tome is nearly twice the size of hers, she laughed: "Jim's is two of my books. He had a harder life."

Like her ex-husband, Messner argues in her book that they committed no crimes at PTL, their religious/entertainment complex that used to draw millions to Fort Mill, S.C. Despite Bakker's five-year prison term for defrauding followers out of \$158 million, she blames their downfall on misshandling of judgment, government takes of ownership, persecution and a vendetta by disloyal PTL employees and competing evangelists.

She also defends their opulent lifestyle, arguing that they needed their houseboat on Lake Wylie to get away from fans.

Roe and Tammy Faye Messner live behind guarded gates in a golf-course condo in the Rancho Mirage resort community 120 miles east of Los Angeles. Roe, 61, is free on bond while he appeals a 27-month sentence for federal bankruptcy fraud. A contractor whose company handled PTL construction, he was convicted of concealing \$400,000 in assets.

The Messners married in 1993, a year after Jim and Tammy Bakker divorced while he was in prison.

Messner retold her story on "PrimeTime Live" last week, due to appear on ABC-TV's "The Drew Carey Show" and recently taped a cameo for the Oct. 22 episode of "Roseanne."

Her book was featured in the National Enquirer, the Globe and the Star.

She has a dog named Tuppins III, a Yorkshire terrier. Tuppins II died last month of a swallowed heart brought on by the altitude during a Colorado visit.

The two Bakker children are Tammy Sue Chapman, 26, an independent minister, and Jamie, 20, a youth minister in Atlanta.

"Today, Tammy Sue is preaching around the country," Messner said. "She's singing, and she's with her dad... He (Jamie) is totally free of cigarettes, alcohol and drugs."

The public's support was evident at the Cedar Creek Inn in Palm Desert, Calif., where the Messners often have Sunday lunch after worship at nearby Victory Christian Center.

Messner talks openly about her colon cancer surgery in March, the four radiation treatments that followed and a faith that carried her through.

"I wasn't one bit afraid," she said. "I think God's peace came through for me. I believe he's going to keep me cancer-free. Roe's cancer-free, too."

He had prostate cancer.

Messner writes of becoming addicted to tranquilizers during the PTL controversy in the late '80s and how a stay at the Berry Ford Clinic in Palm Springs, Calif., helped her seize control of her life.

# Southern Baptists torn over issue of women in pulpits

While Southern Baptists have stirred controversy over family values and the Walt Disney Co., the nation's largest Protestant denomination is facing a more fundamental doctrinal crisis of its own: women in the pulpit.

Statements by a leading seminary president - calling the presence of women in the pulpit a heresy - and a new documentary have recently fueled a dispute at the highest levels of the denomination.

The 15.6-million-member Southern Baptist Convention admits women to its seminaries and recognizes their ordinations, but it opposes women as senior congregational pastors.

To enforce its position, the convention has cut off salary supplements to some churches that have appointed women as pastors. Some local Southern Baptist associations have gone further - expelling some churches for having women ministers at the helm.

"Southern Baptists have inveigled themselves by disfranchising their daughters,"

said Molly Marshall, a theologian and supporter of women pastors. She spoke last week at a leadership conference for ministers at Stony University in DeLand, Fla.

The fear of the feminine fuels the resistance to their leadership," said Marshall, a former Southern Baptist pastor and now a visiting professor at Central Baptist Theological Seminary in Kansas City, Kansas.

Marshall said she was forced out of her previous faculty position at a Southern Baptist seminary for her feminist views. Attacks on her from conservative critics are featured in a new documentary, "The Battle for the Mind."

In 1984, a resolution passed by the SBC said that women were disqualified from pastoral leadership because Eve was the first to sin in the Garden of Eden. Two years later, the denomination's Home Mission Board, which funds new congregations in rural and inner city locations, cut off financial support for all programs of churches with women as senior pastors.

These actions notwithstanding, the 45,000 Southern Baptist churches are autonomous in administrative matters. But only a relative handful - between 20 and 50 - have chosen women to lead them.

Catholics, Greek-Orthodox and Orthodox Jews do not ordain women. However, many other denominations - American Baptists, Methodists, Presbyterians, Episcopalians, Congregationalists, Unitarians and Reform and Conservative Jews - do.

The new Southern Baptist Convention president, the Rev. Thomas Elliff of Del City, Okla., made clear his opposition to women in the pulpit after his election in New Orleans last June.

All six Southern Baptist seminaries accept, train and graduate women. Baptist churches will ordain these and other women who feel "called" to the ministry, and permit them to serve as missionaries, chaplains, ministers for music, youth and education, and - less frequently - as associate pastors.

# Pope's health in question

ROME - Questions have been raised about Pope John Paul II's health. Those concerns have not been dispelled by the successful removal last week of his inflamed appendix.

A more serious concern: The possibility that John Paul, 76, has Parkinson's disease. A neurological disorder, it is characterized by tremor, slowness of movements and, from time to time, a masklike face - all observable in the pope in the last year.

The Vatican has attempted to draw a veil over this problem for if the pope does have Parkinson's disease, the implications for the future of his pontificate and the direction of the Roman Catholic Church as it approaches the Third Millennium of Christianity could be serious.

Those afflicted with the disease may be able to function for many years, but some mental changes, including depression and features of dementia, are not infrequent.

This is uncharted territory for the Vatican. Nothing

in canon law makes any provision for a situation in which a pope becomes unable to function permanently or for long periods.

# Ex-treasurer pleads innocent

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — The former New England treasurer of the Evangelical Lutheran Church pleaded innocent to charges he embezzled more than \$800,000 in church funds.

George A. Patrick, 55, refused to comment further Tuesday about accusations he used the money to send his children to college and pay for vacation homes.

Police charged Patrick last month with larceny by embezzlement and second-degree money laundering in his work at the New England synod, which has 77,000 members in 200 congregations.

Patrick, a certified public accountant who had been synod treasurer since 1983, resigned in December after an audit showed money was missing. He is free on \$125,000 bond and due back in court Nov. 6 for a pretrial hearing.

In July, the former national treasurer of the Episcopal Church, Ellen Cooke, was sentenced to five years in prison for embezzling \$1.5 million.

# Competing fishes exemplify creation-evolution debate

RALEIGH, N.C. — In the beginning, there was a fish on the back of a car. And it begat a "Darwin fish." And it begat a Darwin fish swallowed by a "Jesus fish."

Call it evolution or just smart business: Sales of competing fish emblems are booming in the Bible Belt.

For a while, Christian motorists were being one-upped by drivers who - tired of seeing the Jesus fish - glued on a mutated fish with outgrown feet that sports the word "Darwin."

The new design, created in the 1980s, was meant as a poke at biblical creationism.

It made me laugh out loud when I saw, and I'm not a bumper-sticker kind of person," said Barry Blanchette, the owner of Nice Price Books in Chapel Hill, who stuck a "Darwin fish on the back of his white Dodge Caravan."

Not everyone thought it was a funny comeback. An evangelical Christian in Tacoma, Wash., frustrated by the walking fish, began pushing a new item: the Darwin fish being swallowed by a larger Jesus fish.

"We're trying to level the playing field, so to speak," said Patrick McConaughy, a former Navy shipyard worker who started selling his swallowing fish decalation last fall.

The fish plaques all got started back in the 1970s, when Christians started putting the fish outline on the back of their cars as a symbol of their faith.

The solidarity soon spread to T-shirts and even advertisements in part to attract fellow Christians to local businesses.

While just who made the first Darwin fish is debatable, a design by Hollywood prop man Chris Gilman took off.

He got Daphne Bianchi, a friend from Texas, to help him sell the first 10,000 plaques. It took more than two years to do so, but at some media publicity in 1994, sales quadrupled

and Evolution Design items are now moving across the country.

Call it an end-of-the-century version of the 1925 Scopes trial, played out not in courtrooms but on bumpers.

The Darwin fish folk are rebuffing creationist teachings; the world was not created in seven days, they say, and animals have evolved.

But the fish is a hallowed symbol that is linked to the early church.

Jesus said he would make his disciples "fishers of men," and also represented baptism to early believers. And the Greek

word for fish, "ichthys," was made into an anagram translated as "Jesus Christ, son of God, the Savior."

"When I first saw the Darwin fish, my first reaction was that it was pretty clever," but then he thought "they were taking a symbol that represented Christianity and degraded it."

He wanted to make something just as clever. He considered 1 Corinthians 15:55, which describes death being "swallowed up in victory," and the two fish came to mind.

McConaughy has since sold 12,000 stickers and more than 2,700 T-shirts with the insignia. This summer, he started selling the plaques for \$4.99 each and hoped to market them at Christian bookstores.

# Walking down a familiar path

Ancient book of Genesis an intellectual rage among modern folk

In the beginning, Rabbi Burton Vitsky created a Bible study group and called it Genesis Project.

And his diverse class brought forth personal discussions of the book of Genesis so abundantly that a newspaper critic called it the best conversation in New York City.

And television journalist Bill Moyers saw what Vitsky had done. "Genesis is only part of a much larger cultural phenomenon - a surge of interest in the first book of the Bible."

More than a score of books with Genesis themes have hit bookshelves in the past six months.

Universities, churches, Jewish

centers and shopping malls are offering Genesis classes.

Across the country, libraries, museums and bookstores are planning exhibits.

There's even a Genesis diet, which promotes grains and says you should have the attitude that "all the fat belongs to the Lord."

Moyers has published a companion book to the TV series called "Genesis: A Living Conversation" in that image, so it would have domination over the PBS network airwaves for 10 weeks.

Why this intense interest in the first book of the Bible? Judith Moyers, executive coproducer of the series and wife of Bill Moyers, notes that in recent years more people have

begun tracing their family genealogies.

Bible, many believe, is the ultimate source.

Genesis is also foundational for billions of Christians, Jews and Muslims, all of whom embrace Abraham as their spiritual founding father.

But there is something else that makes the 3,000-year-old book so current: Genesis unsurprisingly delves head-first into moral themes that preoccupy modern society: rape, murder, incest, adultery, child-rearing problems, family feuds, racism, environmental desecration, jealousy, rage, greed, the search for peace, the search for self.

Lynn Batten, a UCLA English professor who is teaching several community Genesis seminars, says that, unlike some theological tomes, "Genesis is great fun

to teach and study."

Batten teaches the Bible as literature.

Recently, some of Batten's students read Genesis 6:4, which talks about giants having sex with human women: "They were really blown away that that was in the Bible."

The book of Genesis starts with the creation of the world, hurries on toward Adam and Eve's temptation and fall, the murder of Abel, and the story of Noah. Then there are Abraham and Sara's fertility problems and the attendant strife this causes. There is Sodom and Gomorrah. And at the end there is Joseph's abandonment by his brothers and then the forgiveness that heals family wounds.

Scholars have many theories as to who may have written the book of Genesis.

One long-held theory, now disputed, points to four authors. But most agree it began as ancient stories told around the evening fire.

# Biting into the dog biscuit market

## Couple banks on health-minded pet owners for next gourmet niche

MEDFORD, Ore. (AP) — Christy Davenport got into the gourmet dog biscuit business because she didn't want to feed her beagle preservatives, and she couldn't afford the high-priced brands.

She and her husband, Steve, are both students from Riddle who moved to Ashland to major in business at Southern Oregon State College. Her beagle, Tucker, is in charge of household research and development.

"I have always done a lot of cooking," she says. "What's a dog biscuit? You're starting with a bread or cookie with stuff for dogs — bone meal, some vitamins."

She started out in her kitchen about a year ago.

"My mom was saying people would really buy these because there's nothing like it," she says. "I called around and got a few bites right away."

In starting Tucker & Co. — she named the business after the dog — Davenport leaned on ingenuity in lieu of capital.

"People would be trying to sell us something and they'd say, 'It only costs \$100.' We're students; sometimes we can't even scrape together \$5."

She sent samples to local pet stores. Three told her they like the products but they wouldn't buy the biscuits because they'd be infested quickly by moths.

Davenport tracked down a source of coffee bags in Washington state. The bags' plastic liners keep the moths out.

To save on printing costs, she labels them with rubber stamps. "I can do 50 bags in an hour while I'm watching TV," Davenport says.

Acetate transfers detailed information, including a half-tone photo of Todd, their newest beagle, and Tucker. "It's when he was skinny, before he started being our tester," she says. "He's not fat anymore, since we put him on life biscuits."

The company offers all-natural biscuits in six flavors: cheese, bacon, peanut butter, beef, lite and bread biscuits.

"We buy the cheese at the Creamery in Central Point," she says. "We get the brand of bacon with the fewest nitrates."

Cheese and peanut butter are the best-selling flavors. "You should smell my kitchen when we're baking the peanut butter biscuits," she says.

"They're the top sellers among the major brands," Davenport says. "I do a lot of research at the library and on the Internet. Sometimes I'll just call a company and ask questions."

Rejected flavors include chicken, liver and cheese-garlic.

A bag comfortably holds 21 or 22 biscuits, about a half pound, and sells for \$3.75. That's about one-third the cost of other gourmet biscuits. The shelf life is about 16 weeks.

She also markets dog biscuit mixes in several flavors, tossing in a bone-shaped biscuit cutter. And Tucker & Co. offers T-shirts, aprons and bone-shaped Christmas stockings packed with biscuits, rawhide chews and assorted toys.

"We started making stockings because what's on the market is just junk," she says. She says she and her husband hope to make a profit within a year.

"We're doing about 35 bags a day," she says. "About 80 percent is through local stores we just started mail order."

Tucker & Co. has a page on the Internet — <http://www.ashlandweb.com/dogtreats> — and the Davenports also take a booth to dog shows.

"I did our first dog show on Labor Day weekend," Christy says.

"Some of the dogs were so nervous they wouldn't touch our biscuits. I was really worried. But they'd be back 20 minutes later when they were through with their part, and they'd eat anything we'd put in front of them. A couple of bull mastiffs just about knocked down the booth."

Christy, 24, is going to school part-time until Steve finishes his degree.

"I planned to go full-time then, but I'll probably go part-time and do this part-time," she says. "We are always finding ways to get faster, but I always seem to have less and less time. I keep getting up at 6 and going to bed at 12."

## New area code for western Canada rings up

VANCOUVER, British Columbia — Technicians at more than 200 BC Tel switching stations in British Columbia were to activate the province's new telephone area code at midnight Friday.

The Greater Vancouver area, the Fraser Valley east to Hope and the coast to the Willoughby region will keep the existing 604 code. Vancouver Island and the rest of British Columbia will be switched to the new code, 250.

A second code was needed because the province is running out of phone numbers due to an explosion in the past decade in the use of fax machines, cellular phones, pagers and computers, as well as population growth.

Callers who haven't noticed the change will still be able to get through using the old code for three months.

The two-code system is expected to fill British Columbia's needs for the next 10 to 15 years, at which time a third area code might be required.

## Health insurers refuse to cover pap tests

WASHINGTON — Ads proclaim it "the safety net for your Pap smear" — a way to rescreen test results to check whether a lab technician may have overlooked any hard-to-spot cervical cancer.

But many insurance companies are refusing to pay for the Papnet computer test, calling it unnecessary and costly duplication despite its approval late last year by the Food and Drug Administration.

Manufacturer Neuromedical Systems Inc. has signed up only one managed care company to cover it, and has started a massive advertising campaign telling women they may have to pay the \$40 tab on their own.

As a result, 7,000 women have called Neuromedical in the last month seeking help in getting the rescreening or in persuading their insurers to pay for it, said company scientist Dr. Laurie Mangro.

## U S West's credit rating plummets

DENVER — U S West Inc.'s imminent acquisition of Continental Cablevision has led to a drop in the company's credit rating.

Fitch Investors Service, a major credit-rating agency, on Thursday dropped the company's rating three levels to BBB-plus, from A-plus.

U S West Inc. is the parent company of the regional telephone company U S West Communications Inc.

All of the parent company's debt remains "investment grade," although Fitch analyst Stephanie Babich noted the downgrade will reduce the number of qualified investors to acquire U S West Inc.'s bonds and notes.

Babich said BBB securities are investment grade bonds and the obligor's ability to repay is considered adequate. But adverse changes in economic conditions are more likely to have a negative impact on these bonds and impair timely payment, she said.

## AT & T reports drop in quarterly profits

NEW YORK — AT&T Corp. stung by credit-card losses and harsh competition for long-distance customers, reported Thursday its profits dropped 11 percent in the third quarter.

Investors' reaction to the results was muted, as AT&T warned a month ago to expect profits to be off about 10 percent. AT&T stock was unchanged at \$39.87 per share in trading on the New York Stock Exchange.

But the results gave a close look at the bruises on the nation's largest telephone company, from its heated battle for customers with MCI, Sprint and a host of smaller providers of long-distance service.

AT&T said in the three months ended Sept. 30 it earned \$1.36 billion, or 84 cents a share, from continuing operations, reflecting its spinoff of Lucent Technologies, its high-technology equipment business, and other parts of its previously announced breakup.

That was down from profits of \$1.53 billion, or 96 cents a share in the third quarter of 1995. Results last year also were adjusted to eliminate results from Lucent and other units for purposes of comparison.

Revenues grew 2 percent to \$12.23 billion from a restated \$12.92 billion.

## KeyCorp quarterly earnings near '95 level

SALT LAKE CITY — The parent company of Key Bank of Utah, Cleveland-based KeyCorp, has reported third-quarter earnings of \$218 million, or 95 cents a share.

The report excluded a one-time charge of \$17 million mandated by Congress last month to recapitalize the Savings Association Insurance Fund, said KeyCorp chairman Robert W. Gillespie.

Including the assessment, third quarter earnings were \$207 million, or 90 cents per share, compared to \$209 million or 90 cents per share for the same period last year.

"Results for the third quarter were in line with our expectations and represented another quarter of improved earnings," Gillespie said Thursday.

He noted that earnings per share, after adjusting for the S&P assessment, were up 6 percent from the year-ago quarter and 3 percent from the 1996 second quarter. Revenue was up 8 percent from a year ago, reflecting a 3 percent increase in net interest income.

## Perot tells how to succeed - for \$13.99

DALLAS — Even if they don't elect him president, Americans can still tap into Ross Perot's wealth of business knowledge by picking up his new book.

"Ross Perot My Life & Principles For Success" is part autobiography and part personal business principles. Perot first wrote down his homilies more than a decade ago when his son, Ross Jr., now 37, graduated from college.

The Texas billionaire, listed as one of the richest Americans by Forbes Magazine since 1982, is running for president for the second time — this year — and is polling only in the single digits this year.

"This book will be widely distributed prior to the November election in order to inform voters about Ross' life and the principles that guided him," Perot's spokeswoman Sharon Holman said in a statement.

# 'Double witching' pushes market to new high

NEW YORK — Blue-chip stocks jumped in the last hour of trading Friday, fueled by options trading on individual stocks and stock indices — commonly known as "double witching."

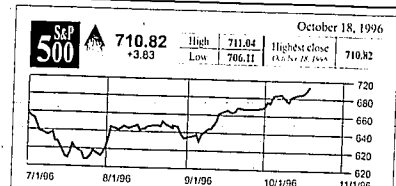
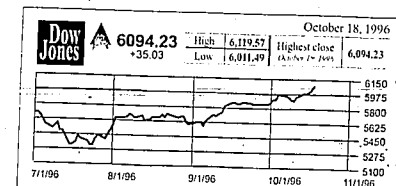
Traders said some investors are buying stocks as they unwind options positions at the expiration — in a late surge that is bringing some of the major market indices into record territory.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average closed up 35.03 points at a record 6094.23. Some major index also finished at all-time highs, with the S&P 500 up 3.83 at 7108.2 and the NYSE composite up 1.91 at 378.32.

Meanwhile, the NASDAQ composite index rose 0.54 to 1242.49, as technology stocks closed in mixed trading.

Scott Fullman, options strategist at Swiss American Securities, said happiness and some volatility in stock prices are characteristic of an expiration. But he added that the market takes back at least half of its advance on the session after expiration.

Traders and analysts said that market sentiment remains positive. Earnings results for the third quarter have been coming in largely above expectations and economic reports have pointed to no acceleration in inflation and



softening economic growth. Despite being in an overbought condition, the market's path of least resistance remains up, they said.

If not for weakness in Dow component Philip Morris Cos. Inc., the blue-chip index would have closed above 6100. Shares

of that tobacco company fell 5 3/8 to 92, which comprised about 16 Dow points.

"You've got two big losers — tobacco stocks, and Xerox with lower-than-expected earnings," said Hildegard Zagorski, stock market analyst at Prudential Securities, noting that the latest

medical report had revived fears about consumer lawsuits against tobacco firms.

A new study released in the journal Science demonstrated a link between lung cancer and cigarette smoking, reigniting concerns that tobacco companies could be held liable for tobacco-related illnesses. Such a development could cost billions of dollars in litigation for the tobacco industry, analysts said.

As for Xerox Corp., its shares plummeted 8 1/4 to 48 3/4, after reporting disappointing earnings.

Third-quarter net income from its document processing businesses was \$250 million, or 68 cents a share fully diluted, vs. \$256 million, or 70 cents a share, in the year-ago period.

But some technology stocks remained weaker, as investors continued to take profits.

Shares of IBM jumped 3 3/4 to 129 3/8, rebounding from recent losses. IBM is a major component of the market's dramatic turnaround. Big Blue will report its third-quarter results before the market opens Monday.

Semiconductor giant Intel Corp. ended 3/4 lower at 110, trimming a 1 1/2-point loss earlier in the day, while personal-computer maker Dell Computer Corp. rose 1 1/8 to 83 3/4 — indicative of the technology sector's mixed performance Friday.

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Q: I've been a fan of Diane Keaton's for a long time, and I loved her in "The First Wives Club." What has she been doing lately? — E.H.

A: Earlier this year, the 50-year-old actress became a mother for the first time, adopting a baby girl, Dexter. So, like many women, she's balancing career and family responsibilities, particularly since her career seems busier than ever.

Keaton has a new movie out in December, "Marvin's Room," in which she plays a terminally ill woman who reaches out to her estranged sister (Meryl Streep). She should be starting a new one soon, "Tennessee Valley," in which she plays a middle-aged woman having an affair. And she might repeat her role in "The First Wives Club" — the movie's success has spawned plans for a sequel.

Q: I remember reading that Keanu Reeves had turned down the lead in the sequel to "Speed." Does that mean there won't be a sequel? — L.H.

A: No, the producers were a little surprised that Reeves, 32, would turn down a megabucks offer to star again as the daredevil Los Angeles cop, but he preferred to tour with his band, Dogstar.

Jason Patric, 30, took on the part, co-starring with the returning Sandra Bullock, and filming just got under way. This time, the villain is played by Willem Dafoe, and the moving vehicle that has to be stopped is a ship.

## Celebrity Gossip

Q: I was a big fan of Dana Delany's and the series "China Beach." Will she ever come back to TV? — D.F.

A: She already has. Well, at least her voice has, as Lois Lane in Saturday morning's animated version of "Superman." The series first aired as a prime-time special in early September. Delany, 40, says she is having a lot of fun doing the show.

She will also star in "For Hope," an ABC-TV movie directed by Bob Saget, about a woman stricken with a potentially fatal disease. It is based on the story of Saget's sister. It will air on Nov. 17.

Delany is in Texas now, working on a CBS miniseries called "True Women." It explores the lives of the first female pioneers of Texas. It should hit your screen sometime in February.

And lastly, there's a prestigious project in development for her at the moment. Author Patricia Cornwell is writing a series for ABC in which Delany and Helen Mirren, 51, would be teamed as agents in the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. If it comes together, it should be on the air next fall.

Q: I just saw the movie "Nixon" on cable. The actor who played Pat Nixon looked so much like her. Who is she? — R.K.

A: Joan Allen, 40, a Chicago-area native now living in New York, owes her career to college classmate John Malkovich, who invited her into his theater company years ago. She's best known for her work on the New York stage, but since her Oscar-nominated role in "Nixon," her film career has also picked up quite a bit.

You'll see her next in "The Crucible," (a role originally offered to Emma Thompson) and then "Ice Storm," opposite Sigourney Weaver and Kevin Kline. Both films are due out later this year.

A real departure for her, though, will be her next film, "Fargo Off," in which she plays the wife of a detective (John Travolta) who surgically switches faces with a terrorist in order to go undercover. The director is Hong Kong action specialist John Woo.

Q: I think Daniel Day-Lewis is brilliant. Is he involved with anyone? — R.T.

A: The Oscar-winning

star of "My Left Foot" is so charismatic that the answer is generally yes, but the names change with some frequency. Just ask Isabelle Adjani. The French star had quite an intense relationship with Day-Lewis, 39, but while she was giving birth to their son, Gabriel, last year, he was off with Julia Roberts, with whom he had earlier been involved.

At press time, there are reports linking him with Rebecca Miller, daughter of famed playwright Arthur Miller, author of "The Crucible." Day-Lewis stars in the film version of Miller's play, due out in November, and the advance word is so strong that another Oscar nomination is likely.

After that, the actor, who's also an amateur boxer, reteams with producer-director Jim Sheridan in "The Boxer," about an Irish practitioner of that sport who solves various personal crises after becoming involved with a woman.

Q: I always enjoyed watching Connie Chung. What is she doing now? — D.J.M.

A: Since being removed from the "CBS Evening News," the 50-year-old former newscaster has

spent the majority of her time as a mother.

She and her husband, TV talk-show host Maury Povich, 57, had been in the process of adopting a baby boy when she lost her high-profile spots on the news and her interview show, "Eye to Eye," in May of last year. The adoption was finalized four days later and since then, son Matthew has been her priority.

So was moving. To accommodate the expansion of their family, the two bought a \$5 million, 11-room apartment in New York City's famed Dakota.

In the past few months, however, there have been some business rumblings. Chung and Povich are developing a TV show to help them, set to debut when his current contract expires in 1998. And she plans to spend next semester lecturing at Harvard.

Q: When I was in New York recently, I saw the musical "Cats." Did they ever consider making it into a movie? — G.D.

A: Numerous times over the years, but the project never seemed to come together. Recently, though, a new team signed on to the transformation of the Andrew Lloyd Webber-T.S. Eliot hit, which has been running for 14 years on Broadway, and hopes are high that this one will work.

The team behind the animated hit "Toy Story" is currently reworking the script for an animated feature; if all goes well, it could finally go into production next year.

Q: When will Oprah Winfrey do another movie? — T.K.

A: Doing her TV talk show has kept her pretty busy, but Winfrey, 42, who earned an Oscar nomination for her movie debut in "The Color Purple" (1985), has continued to look for other projects through her production company, Harpo. Now it seems she's found one, the adaptation of Toni Morrison's novel "Beloved," the Civil War-era story of a former slave. Winfrey will produce and star.

Q: I just saw the movie "Two Days in the Valley" and was wondering who the blonde actress was who played one of the killers. I've never seen her before. — F.G.

A: Newcomer Charlize Theron, 21, was on view mostly in TV commercials before being cast in this ensemble drama. But her appearance as a cold-blooded killer "hired by Teri Hatcher obviously got her noticed. In her next film, "Devil's Advocate," she plays the wife of a young lawyer (Keanu Reeves) who's in conflict with his boss (Al Pacino). She supposedly auditioned without makeup.

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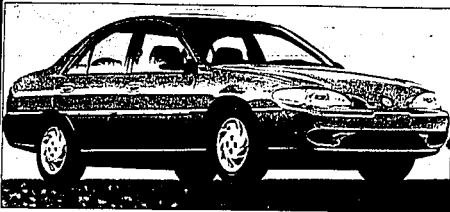

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# Jane Curtin's Place in the 'Sun' (Hollywood)

HOLLYWOOD — Even a seasoned comedy writer like Jane Curtin admits it's often difficult to keep a straight face on NBC's hit sitcom "3rd Rock From the Sun."

"When it comes to the actual doing of the show, we try desperately to make sure we are professional," says Curtin, who came to fame in 1975 as one of the original Not Ready for Prime Time Players on "Saturday Night Live" and then starred for five years in the sitcom "Kate & Allie."

"But," she adds, "there have been a couple of times when it has gotten to our benefit to break up."

Such as the time when John Lithgow's gooney alien character, Dick Solomon, was strutting around like a peacock in skin-tight, black leather pants that squeaked.

"I don't know anybody that has ever been on this show who doesn't love it so much," she says. "There's not one person who doesn't get to do something that either they have always wanted to do or has always wanted to be put in that position where you can just sort of be stupid."

Curtin didn't even care what "3rd Rock" was about initially; she was just eager to work again with creators and executive producers Terry and

Bonnie Turner. "They did 'The Coneheads' (movie)," she says, referring to the 1993 film in which she, Dick Solomon and Laraine Newkirk re-created their popular "Saturday Night Live" characters. "Bonnie was my saving grace. She kept me company while I

was sitting on the set in the director's chair with one on my head. She would have serious conversations with me about kids and I had the cone on my head. I just loved them."

But doing the series meant that Curtin, her husband Patrick Lynch, a producer, and 13-year-old daughter Tess had to relocate to Los Angeles.

"I am here for the duration of the show," Curtin says. "When the show is over I can go back to Connecticut."

Curtin, who has appeared on Broadway ("Candida"), starred in feature films ("How to Beat the High Cost of Living," TV movies ("Divorce Wars — A Love Story") and miniseries ("Common Ground"), says the sitcom is her favorite format.

"I had tried everything. I kept looking for the perfect forum for the perfect job. This is the most fun. I like instant gratification. You get to do a show in front of an audience and in front of a camera and then forget it and go on. Next week you have a whole different play to produce."

The actress won two Emmy Awards for her sparkling performance as the old-fashioned, sweet,

divorced mom Allie Lowell in the 1984-89 CBS sitcom, "Kate & Allie," which also starred Susan

"Kate & Allie," she says, had a lot of heart. "It had a wonderful sense of humor. Overall, it was done very, very well and the character was so much fun to play. I had a ball doing it."

Curtin also had a ball doing "SNL," along with Chevy Chase, John Belushi, Gilda Radner, Bill Murray, Garrett Morris, McKay and Newman.

"It was the '70s and '80s, which was just a ridiculous period where people were tremendous by self-indulgent and behavior was reprehensible," she says. "But the 90 minutes of the show were the most exciting thing you could ever imagine. There were so many elements that just came bombarding you 10 minutes before the show started, and then you were shot out of the cannon."

"During her five seasons on "SNL," Curtin played such memorable characters as the caustic "Update" anchor, the sweet, slovenly Mrs. Looper (mother of Lisa), and the matriarch of the Conehead alien clan from the planet Remulak.

"I hated doing the Coneheads because of the glue," Curtin says with a shudder. "The glue was just horrible. I liked Mrs. Looper the best because I got to wear a house coat and big fluffy slippers."

"3rd Rock From the Sun" airs Sundays on NBC.

After spurning his fervid romantic advances most of last season, Mary finally has succumbed to Dick's puppy dog charms. Curtin believes Mary could have held out a little longer before linking up with Dick.

Part of the fun of "3rd Rock" is that, on the sur-

## Popular children's quiz show morphs into history bee

PITTSBURGH (AP) — In a television-happy culture, it would just figure that Carmen Sandiego helped the Leader of the Free World out of a diplomatic jam.

"I had a pretty good education. But I learned a lot because Chelsea had seen 'Sesame Street' and 'Where in the World Is Carmen Sandiego,'" President Clinton said in July. "When I met the co-leaders of San Marino at the Olympics, I know where it was because of Carmen Sandiego." Hopefully, he learned everything he needs to know, because after five years on the air, the popular geography quiz show ran its course.

But PBS already has lined up a replacement: Carmen herself, re-tooled and re-styled with history trivia. "Where in Time Is Carmen Sandiego," a history spin-off of the geography show, premiered last week. The program is set up as a game show with three middle school-age children answering questions about decades past for a chance to win a computer system, an encyclopedia or other highbrow prizes.

"We're trying to re-create, if you will, what happened in geography," said Jay Rayvid, one of the show's two executive producers. "We often can shine a very powerful spotlight on educational concerns."

The show, a co-production of PBS stations WQED in Pittsburgh and WGHI in Boston, blends history and pop culture in a quiz-show format. Carmen Sandiego, the title character, is a computer-generated archvillain who steals historical artifacts that contestants recover by correctly answering questions.

The set has been changed from a 1940s detective office to a spaceship, and figures making cameo appearances range from Abraham Lincoln to Elvis.

"Older people may say pop culture is history lie. But our audience is 12 years old," Rayvid said, whose producing credits at WQED include such PBS staples as "Once Upon a Classic" and "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood."

The question writers work with the Encyclopaedia of British teachers. Unlike geography, a cut-and-dried subject with verifiable answers, history requires a thoughtful approach.

"It's a heck of a job in history," Rayvid said, "because history, by its nature, examines a time when males had all the roles when various ethnic groups were shut out."

One series of questions about World War II refers to the intermarriage of Japanese-Americans in U.S. concentration camps.

"We'd thoroughly study during World War II, Japanese-Americans who were very good people who were put into camps against their will," Rayvid said. "We try to deal with controversy in a very straightforward, educational way."

Most of the old faces of the show are gone, including host Greg Lee, who was replaced by Kevin Shinick. Actress Lynne Thigpen is back in her Emmy-nominated role as The Chief, instructing contestants on their assignments and acting out skits with clues to the answers.

This summer, 65 episodes were shot in two months, sometimes at the rate of four shows a day. And if the schedule wasn't enough to put pressure on Shinick, the contestants were the children at the buzzers were sharp — Rayvid calls them "brainsiacs" — but they were in diapers when Boy George was a pop star.

"I see a giant need for a show like this," Shinick said. "During the session, we asked the contestants to make people with occupations. Two matched George Bush with a game show host." Shinick said he often finds himself playing along, even while he tries to maintain an aloof, tree-be-like posture of knowing it all the answers. Some times, he even finds himself wedding his "Carmen Sandiego" into casual conversation.

"We're sitting at dinner and I'm the guy saying, 'Oh my God, baked beans — first canned in Maine!' — and

...other things that nobody else cares about," he said. Shinick, who appeared on Broadway and had small parts in the feature films "The Paper" and "Quiz Show," hopes the show will be a springboard for his career, the way other PBS children's shows

helped launch Morgan Freeman, Easy Reader of "The Electric Company," and Michael Keaton, who once played a giant bee on "Mister Rogers." "Educational television has spawned some huge people," Shinick said. "As an actor, that's what I'm thinking."















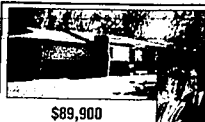






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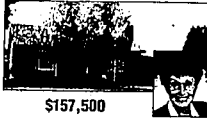
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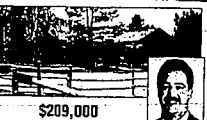


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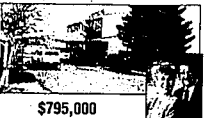


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
