Fairfield fights off Soldier Creek

Ice jams, rain, runoff menace homes in town; Lincoln, Gooding inundated

FAIRFIELD - After working all night to clear ice jams and reduce flooding, people in Fairfield awoke Thursday morning to find more rain.

And more muddy water. Rain and melting snow pushed Soldier Creek well beyond its banks New Year's Day, flooding one house in Fairfield and threatening more homes in Camas and Gooding counties. Water levels were dropping Thursday night, thanks to colder temperatures and the work of homeowners and officials.

Residents worried that more rain, instead of snow, could renew the flooding.

Ice flows jammed the bridge where U.S. Highway 20 crosses Soldier Creek on the east side of Fairfield, said Camas County Sheriff Harold Lee.

"Soldier Creek is on the rampage," Lee said. The creek runs along Second Street through Fairfield, and was running over the banks, he said.

"We have between 12 and 18 inches of ice in there, and it's breaking loose, and backing up. We've been using explosives to break up and move the ice around," Lee said.

Fairfield Councilman Ted Strickler said workers spent about four hours Wednesday night blasting ice chunks before water started to drain past the bridge.

"We had a lot of rain, and a lot of muddy water. It was kind of disheartening - we quit at 5 in the morning to go home for a few hours, but this morning there was more water in ponding," he said. With more hard work, the bridge was draining again by noon, Strickler said.

In the town of Soldier, two miles north of Fairfield, water flooded over the creek banks, Lee said. Soldier Creek Road and Base Line Road had as much as 18 inches of water over them, Lee said.

Strickler said the army brought in 2,500 sandbags, but only about half of them were needed to block off the areas that flooded Thursday.

"We have a bunch put together ready to go. We think the west side of town is ready to go next," he said.

Between 35 and 50 people showed up to fill sandbags, Strickler said. Churches and a restaurant offered coffee, cocoa and food to the workers, he said.

"It never falls, as soon as the chips are down, we all pitch in and do whatever needs to be done," Strickler said. "It is a pretty good bunch of people up here."

After working since 9:30 p.m. Wednesday, with only a few hours off early Thursday morning, Strickler said he felt tired, but good. "The creek is starting to cut a better channel, and our efforts on the other culverts seem to be paying off, because they're draining better."

Keith Lemons, who lives on the east side of town, said he was glad to see the creek draining better. **Please see FLOOD, Page A2**

A winter's worth already

Record snows close 11 lifts at Sun Valley

TWIN FALLS - Southern Idaho's mountains already have a typical year's worth of snow - and the snowaccumulation season isn't even half over, according to Uncle Sam's snow sleuths.

"The snowpack we're currently seeing is what we would expect to see in March or April," said Ron Abramovich, Boise-based hydrologist with the federal snow survey.

Snowpacks in the Snake River basin in Wyoming - where much of southern Idaho's irrigation water comes from - are at a 40-year high for this time of year, Abramovich said Thursday.

End-of-year measurements revealed that snowpacks in the Wood and Lost river drainages are the biggest since 1965, Abramovich said. Stream basins above the Oakley reservoir and Salmon Falls Creek have equaled a 12-year-old record for snow at this time of year, he said.

"We increased quite a bit in the last week," Abramovich said, "and we're looking for record December increases"

at some measurement sites.

New snow brought good news - and bad news - to the Sun Valley Ski Area. The good news is a record amount of snow at a measurement site near the Lookout Restaurant on Bald Mountain, according to Sun Valley publicist Jack Sibbach.

"The bad news is that high avalanche danger closed all but three of Baldy's 13 ski lifts Thursday. Ski runs on the Warm Springs side of the mountain were open for business, but the majority of runs - including everything in the River Run and Seattle Ridge areas - were closed."

"We're not hurting for snow, but we are hurting for safe conditions," Sibbach said Thursday. Even so, he was optimistic the avalanche danger would recede as cooler temperatures supplanted abnormally warm weather.

"The sudden surfeit of snow has put southern Idaho in an enviable position for spring and summer water supplies, Abramovich said. The steady stream of wet, winter storms is unlikely to stop abruptly, he added.

Mountain snowpacks are almost certain to set new records this winter. **Please see SNOW, Page A2**

Kayaker survives rugged ride on raging Malad River

Party attempts run below power plant

HAGERMAN - A Ketchum man survived a rough ride on the raging Malad River Thursday, but witnesses say it was only because of quick action by his kayaking companions.

Michael C. Stanley, 64, was treated for

hypothermia at Gooding County Memorial Hospital and released, according to Gooding County Sheriff's Department reports.

Stanley and three other kayakers, including his son Brent, attempted to run the Malad River from just below Idaho Power's Upper Malad Power Plant at about noon, the report said. A fifth man was with them, driving a chase car, the report said.

Jeff Cole, 45, an Idaho Power hydro specialist working at the Malad plants, said he and co-worker Bev Boyer saw four kayakers launch in the river. They

decided to drive downriver to check on them.

The Malad River is running high, said Randy Hill, regional manager for Idaho Power.

"It is pretty wild-looking. It's running approximately 4,500 cubic feet per second. The river channel is not very wide, and it's moving pretty fast through there."

"You'd have to see it to believe it - you wouldn't want to put in on it," Cole said. "It's got tremendous volume."

Cole and Boyer were looking for the kayakers below the U.S. Highway 30 bridge,

then a bridge by the Lower Malad power plant, but didn't see them. They drove back up the road before seeing the kayakers.

Cole said two of the kayakers, including Stanley and a son, had lost their boats, apparently shortly after putting in. One of the two remaining kayakers was pulling the father down the river, Cole said.

"He's the one really responsible for saving the guy's life. I mean, just holding out to the guy. He did an amazing job there," Cole said.

Governor adds more counties to flood disaster area list

Gov. Phil Batt added nine more counties to a list of emergency areas Thursday after completing a two-hour helicopter tour of flood-stricken western Idaho.

Rain and snow continued to pound most of Idaho, worsening flooding and road washouts that isolated four western Idaho communities. Batt said a rough estimate would be at least \$10 million damages, and it could be much higher.

"Devastating" was the description Batt had after touring the stricken area. In some places, where main highways were washed out, Batt said it was "a total disaster."

"Those areas won't be repaired for many months," he said.

Rep. Helen Chenoweth, R-Idaho went with Batt and said representatives from the Federal Emergency Management Agency were meeting with her staff Thursday afternoon.

"People who live along the Weiser River say the flooding is the worst they've seen," she said. "This will put a tremendous hardship on the state as well as the counties."

Batt signed a proclamation declaring "a state of extreme emergency" in Gem, Adams, Washington, Idaho, Clearwater, Valley, Payette, Elmore and Latah counties. Earlier, he declared emergencies in Boise, Bonner, Boundary and Shoshone counties.

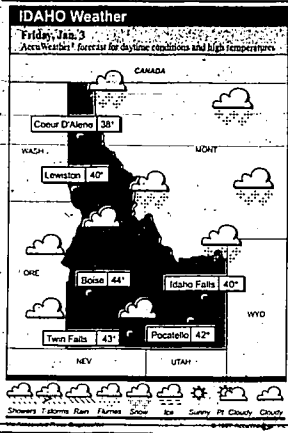
That covered most of western and northern Idaho.

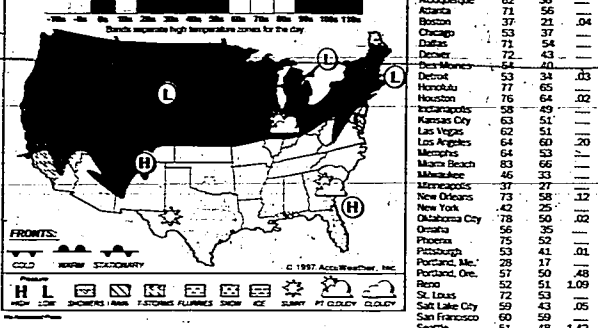

More rain drenches Pacific Northwest, California

More rain fell Thursday in the Pacific Northwest and California, adding to flooding and mudslide problems in the region.
The southern half of the country had unseasonably warm weather and the Northeast was cloudy.
Roads in Washington, Oregon and parts of California were closed because of high water or mud slides. Sinkholes developed in saturated Seattle. Rail traffic was also affected.
In Reno, Nev., the Truckee River pushed out of its banks and flowed over downtown streets. Sandbags were piled in front of casinos and most closed. Flooding also closed the airport.
Emeka in northern California had 2.68 inches of rain on New Year's Day, breaking a record of 1.56 inches set in 1942.

Lighter rain fell in Idaho, western Montana and northern Utah, with snow in the mountains.
Skies over Idaho were mostly cloudy statewide. Light rain continued from the south central mountains to the Magic Valley and at southeast locations. Fog was reported at Spencer and Sun Valley with visibility limited to a quarter of a mile.
Temperatures were about 5 degrees cooler with lower 40s to 50 in the lower valleys and mid-30s in the higher valleys.
Warm weather in the southern portion of the country was due to a high pressure system, Pueblo, Colo., in the southern portion of the state, had reached 74 degrees Thursday morning, surpassing the record high of 70 set in 1927.
Much of the Northeast was shrouded by clouds. There was rain in some areas and light snow showers in central and northern New England, especially in the mountains.

The kayaker managed to land with the man, but only after passing from the Malad to the Snake River. Deputies said the kayaker landed about a quarter-mile down the Snake from the Malad River confluence.
The man swam down the river and landed on the western shore by himself, Cole said.
Cole and Boyer climbed down a steep brushy bank and helped the kayaker lift Stanley out of the water and later pulled him up onto the bank. He said Stanley appeared close to death.
"He was very blue. We didn't know if we could keep him breathing," Cole said. "The guy who ferried him down had done super job of keeping him conscious, so that's what helped." The Hagerman Quick Response Unit was called at 12:38 p.m. The unit arrived on the scene rapidly, Cole said, and took over care of Stanley.

ern side of Fairfield, said he helped rescue neighbor Galen Coler's two horses from a corral at the edge of Soldier Creek.
"They were belly-deep in water and melted snow," Lemons said. "I waded into it up to my waist."
The horses were eventually removed, after neighbors used a backhoe to dig a road to the animals. "There were a whole bunch of people," Lemons said. "It was kind of a community effort."
Coler was the only horse that took on water in Fairfield, Strickler said.
The flood came on so fast, the town didn't have much time to prepare, Lemons said.
Lemons helped fill sandbags. "I've lived here my whole life, and I know most of the people working out there. It feels pretty good when somebody comes over and helps you out."

rain to increase because only 40 percent of the winter season has elapsed, Abramovich said. Jan. 15 is considered the midpoint of the snow-accumulation season, and snowpacks typically reach their zenith around April Fools' Day, he said.
End-of-December measurements revealed that snowpacks are:
• 147 percent larger than the long-term average for this time of year in the Big and Little Lost River drainages.

• 142 percent bigger than the long-term average in the Big and Little Wood River drainages.
• 125 percent larger in the Salmon Falls, Goose and Trapper creeks draining south of the Snake River.
• 122 percent bigger in the Henrys Fork and Teton river drainages.
• 109 percent larger in the Snake River drainage upstream of Palisades Reservoir, in Wyoming.
• 100 percent bigger in the Bruneau and Jarbidge river basins.
• 80 percent larger in the Owyhee River basin.
With larger-than-average snowpacks already in the mountains, Abramovich warned that spring-time flooding could plague low-lying areas.
Extended high flows are almost a certainty for most streams and rivers, he said. Cool and dry springtime conditions would minimize flooding problems, but a prolonged spell of warm weather coupled with rain would produce deep water woes, he said.

But said he couldn't compare this week's flooding to last winter's floods, which caused about \$10 million damage. That caused the Legislature to increase the state fuel tax by 4 cents per gallon, with the first \$5 million going to provide a state match to federal emergency funds.
People at McCall, Banks, Riggins and Lostanza were cut off when all highways were washed out, covered by floodwaters or buried under rock and mud slides. Ed said at Lostanza, people in isolated areas would be contacted for possible evacuation.
The road closures stranded a lot of people at McCall, a ski-recreation resort community normally two hours driving time north of Boise.
Kathy Crowther of McCall Air Taxi said she had about 260 people who wanted to be ferried by airplane back to Boise. "And they all are standing right here," she said.
The air taxi service had seven airplanes in the air Thursday morning taking people to Boise.
Harvey Braun, who lives in the Salubria area on the east side of the Weiser River and runs Cambridge Lumber, said his house was spared by the flooding, but getting to it is a problem.
"The Idaho Transportation Department said driving in the state was extremely hazardous."
"All indications are that conditions will probably get worse before they get better in all our areas," the agency said. The National Weather Service said rain and snow and unseasonably warm temperatures were expected to continue across much of the state but start improving this afternoon.
At Midvale, 40 homes were under several feet of water, along with many public buildings and schools. The Idaho Bureau of Disaster Services said about 80 families had been evacuated from Midvale and Cambridge. At least a dozen homes were under water at Weiser.
The swollen, Payette and Weiser rivers rushed over their banks, chasing hundreds of people from their homes.
The Idaho National Guard airlifted about 100 people from an area along U.S. 95 just south of Riggins, stranded by the swollen Little Salmon River.
Col. Jim Ball, Guard spokesman, said residents on the west side of the river were flown by helicopter to Riggins.
The Guard also flew about 10,000 sandbags into Council.
Transportation spokesman Bill Dermody said cleanup in highways closed by mudslides can't start until conditions improve.
U.S. 95 had a 1,000-foot break south of Riggins. The Transportation agency called it a long-term closure.
At Lostanza, a mountain community about 90 minutes north of Boise, a 1,200-foot segment of Idaho Highway 71 was destroyed when a culvert plugged. The damage was up to 100 feet deep.
"Right now, we can't do anything, the water is too high," Dermody said.

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Weather usually doesn't prevent inauguration events

WASHINGTON (AP) — The snow blew into drifts and even toppled utility poles; 6,000 shovellers struggled to clear the streets between the Capitol and White House.

Yet as noon approached on Inauguration Day, it was still snowing and the temperature was at the freezing mark. "I always knew it would be a cold day when I got to be president," William Howard Taft quipped to a reporter on that frigid day in 1909.

Mother Nature doesn't always frown on presidential inaugurations, but occasional storms have been miserable, even fatal.

William Henry Harrison declined the offer of a closed carriage and rode on horseback to the Capitol, braving cold temperatures and a northeast wind on March 5, 1841.

After speaking for more than an hour he returned to the White House, again on horseback, catching a chill that eventually turned to pneumonia. He died a month later.

"He was the first American president to die in office, a victim of his militant disdain for the elements," historian Patrick Hughes observes in *Weatherwise* magazine.

Ronald Reagan, who broke Harrison's record as the oldest man to become president, was more cautious in 1953 when the coldest weather in inaugural history struck Washington. Reagan moved the ceremonies indoors and canceled the parade.

When Franklin Pierce was sworn in on March 4, 1853, the weather was raw and windy with light snow falling. Abigail

Fillmore, wife of outgoing president Millard Fillmore, caught cold while sitting on the windy inaugural platform. She died of pneumonia within weeks, Hughes says.

Originally, presidential inaugurations were held on March 4, a date selected in an era of slow travel so that all the participants could be present for the ceremony.

By the 1930s transportation was much better and politicians wanted to shorten the long "lame duck" period between the November election and the inauguration. So a decision was made to change the date to January.

Weather records show that Jan. 20 tended to have mild conditions so it was chosen. But the first ceremony on that date, in 1937, took place in a deluge, with 1.7 inches of rain pouring on the capital city.

Aides tried to talk Franklin D. Roosevelt into moving the ceremony indoors but he latched on to the "soggy crowd and reported 'If they can take it, I can take it.'"

Weather historian David M. Ludlum reports in his book "The Weather Factor" that Sen. George Norris of Nebraska, author of the amendment changing the date, declined to accept blame for that fiasco.

Before complaining, he said, wait until March 4 and see what the weather is like on the old date. It was sunny and 67 degrees.

Roosevelt's successor, Harry S. Truman, replied to the formal invitation to his 1949 swearing-in this way: "Weather permitting, I hope to be present." He took the oath of office

beneath sunny skies in 38-degree weather.

Indeed, despite the bitter cold for Reagan, a blizzard for John F. Kennedy and the rain that drenched Roosevelt, Jan. 20 has a good track record.

Meanwhile, miserable weather has occurred on March 4 the past three inaugurations, according to statistics compiled by Tom Ross of the National Climatic Data Center in Asheville, N.C., and reported in *Weatherwise*.

Here's a look at some extraordinary inauguration Day weather.

• Fillmore in 1850 had the hottest inaugural on record at 92

degrees. He was sworn in on July 10, following the death of Zachary Taylor, who had collapsed from heat exhaustion at the dedication of the Washington Monument.

FDA moves to fight 'mad cow disease'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government is preparing to ban slaughterhouse parts in livestock feed because of links to "mad cow disease" — an effort to ensure that cattle epidemics like the one that hit Britain never happen here.

There was an uproar last year over mad cow disease, or bovine spongiform encephalopathy, after the British government announced that a new version of a fatal human brain illness might have been caused by eating infected beef. At least 10 Britons died of this new type of Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease.

Whether eating infected beef sickened the humans is still unproven, and the U.S. government insists it has found no mad cow disease in American cattle regardless.

But animals are known to get the fatal brain disease by eating the tissue of other infected animals. British cows, for example, probably were infected by eating feed made from sheep who get a similar illness.

Arguing that the nation would be at risk if even one U.S. cow

were somehow sickened and then used in feed, the Food and Drug Administration proposed the ban Thursday.

"If we don't take preventive action today, we may regret it three to four years down the road," explained FDA Commissioner David Kessler. "By saying that cattle and sheep cannot get fed any products that cause this disease, we are in essence erecting a fire wall that will reduce whatever risk humans have even further."

Putting these "ruminant" products in animal feed not only recycled otherwise unusable parts of slaughtered animals, it added protein.

But last year, the livestock industry announced it would voluntarily ban sheep parts from U.S. animal feed, because of Britain's implication of sheep. The FDA's proposed ban goes further, ensuring no cows or sheep would eat feed made with proteins from cows, sheep, goats, deer, elk or mink — species known to be vulnerable to these fatal diseases that literally eat spongy holes in their brains.

Study holds hope for asthma sufferers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The incidence of asthma has doubled in the United States and other developed countries in the last 20 years.

A study suggests the reason may be that the young are suffering fewer childhood infections.

The study, being published Friday in the journal *Science*, reports the rate of asthma among Japanese children who reacted strongly to a tuberculosis vaccine was only about a third of the asthma rate among children who showed only a mild TB reaction.

"The data support the hypothesis that a decline in infection — is a factor underlying the rising severity and prevalence of (asthma and allergic disorders) in recent decades in developed countries," the research report says.

Lawmakers file suit challenging president's new line-item veto power

WASHINGTON (AP) — A day after President Clinton gained the historic authority to veto specific items in spending bills, six lawmakers filed suit challenging the power.

Thursday's U.S. District Court lawsuit questions whether the line-item veto tips the balance of power too far in favor of the executive branch of government and away from Congress, the legislative branch.

"This is constitutional nonsense," said Rep. David Skaggs, D-Colo., one of the congressmen who filed suit. "It's not only

unconstitutional, but it's unwise because it gives one individual extraordinary power that's now held by the people's representatives in Congress."

The lawsuit was filed in U.S. District Court by Sens. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va.; Mark Hatfield, R-Ore.; Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y.; and Carl Levin, D-Mich., and Reps. Skaggs and Henry Waxman, D-Calif.

White House spokesman Barry Toiv said Clinton plans to use the line-item veto to help him eliminate excessive or unnecessary spending and deny special

interest tax breaks that often become attached to bills.

"The president has long supported the line-item veto. He believes it's a long overdue tool for reducing wasteful spending," Toiv said.

Previously, presidents had only the power to approve or veto a bill in its entirety. Now, they can not only slash specific spending items in bills, but also strike out targeted tax breaks covering 100 or fewer people and new or expanded entitlements, such as Medicare or veterans' benefits.

When Clinton signed the legislation last April, he said it would help slash "special-interest boondoggles, tax loopholes and pure pork." It went into effect on Wednesday with the start of the new year.

Nationwide, 44 governors have such line-item veto power.

The Republican-controlled Congress passed the line-item veto law last year as part of its "Contract With America" to control spending and balance the budget. It's a power that nearly every U.S. president has sought over the past century.

Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., who sponsored the measure, said the law protects the legislative branch because it "gives Congress the last word" with the ability to override a president's line-item veto.

Under the new law, the president may sign a bill and then within five days reject a line item. Congress may then pass a separate bill to reinstate the specific item and the president has the power to veto that bill. At that point, the presidential line-item veto, like any other veto, can be overridden by two-thirds votes in both houses of Congress.

Women gaining in workplace

WASHINGTON (AP) — Women are making slow headway toward parity with men in the workplace, say the authors of a study on women's changing lives in America.

"The picture of women in the workplace is one of clear, albeit slow, progress toward equality with men," Suzanne M. Bianchi and Daphne Spain report in the study: "Women, Work and Family in America."

Between 1970 and 1995 the share of women 25 to 54 who work outside the home climbed from 50 percent to 76 percent, with the biggest gains shown by married women with children, the study published Thursday by the independent, nonprofit Population Reference Bureau said.

This increase follows steady improvement in women's educational levels, as illustrated by statistics from 1993 compared with 1977. Among whites, women earned 54 percent of bachelor's degrees in 1993, up from 46 percent in 1977. For blacks, the percentage of women increased to 63 percent from 57 percent.

Women's shares of doctoral degrees jumped from 25 percent to 44 percent among whites and from 39 percent to 55 percent among blacks.

"Whereas poor, minority and working-class women have long contributed economically to their families in whatever way they could, now most women, not just those with the greatest economic need, expect to work for pay outside the home," Bianchi and Spain wrote.

Women have also narrowed their earnings gap, bringing home 79 percent of men's wages in 1994 compared with 59 percent in 1970.

This may not be entirely good news, however, since the study found that in some cases women's situations improved compared with men's not only because they worked more hours, but because men's wages were relatively stagnant.

On the negative side, the study also noted that, despite their increased time and effort in the workplace, women remain responsible for most housework and child care.

While married mothers scaled down housework from about 30 hours a week in 1965 to 20 hours in 1985, fathers have picked up only part of the slack, increasing from 5 hours to 10 hours weekly.

"Although women do more household work than men, studies find that when asked, women as well as men tend to report their household division of labor as fair. Why this should be the case in the face of overwhelming evidence to the contrary continues to puzzle researchers," they concluded.

Toddler dies as brother burns

SANTA ROSA, Calif. (AP) — An 18-month-old boy was hospitalized in critical condition Thursday after trying unsuccessfully to rescue his 3-year-old brother from a house fire in a rural area between Santa Rosa and Sebastopol.

Fire officials said Tommy Tyler, the son of Bill and Suzanne Tyler, died from smoke inhalation in the fire that destroyed the family's ranch-style house Wednesday. The cause of the fire was under investigation.

Tommy's half-brother, 14-year-old Steven Tyler of Meridian, who was visiting for the holidays, was severely burned when he ran into the house to try to save the toddler.

Steven Tyler was being treated on Thursday at St. Francis Memorial Hospital burn center in San Francisco. Hospital officials said the boy has third-degree burns over 60 percent of his body and suffered smoke inhalation.

United Way collected \$238,000 of pledges

TWIN FALLS - The United Way of Magic Valley finished the 1996 calendar year \$29,000 ahead of the previous year.

Through Tuesday, the organization had pledges in hand for \$238,000 - 14 percent more than at the end of 1995, when it had \$209,000.

Although the campaign is over, the United Way will collect pledges through the end of January, according to Executive Director Diane Boyd.

"We still have accounts of large accounts to come in," she said.

The United Way collected \$264,961 in pledges last year - and 21 percent or \$55,961 came in after the campaign officially ended.

The drive has a goal of \$300,000.

The United Way's allocations committee will meet Jan. 13-17 to hear requests from 18 member agencies. The campaign's board of directors will divide the money and announce the allocation Jan. 29.

Hugh Robinson has carried plenty of rich and famous people around in his job driving a limousine for the Sun Valley Co.

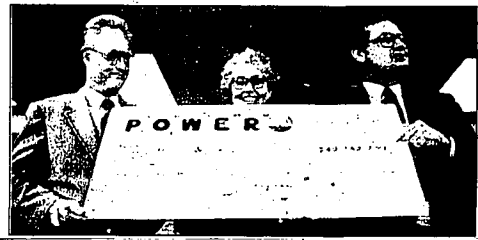
"Never thought I would be in the class, though," he said.

Lots of interchange, little solutions about Jerome exit

JEROME - The question of exactly how to go about improving the interchange of Interstate 84 and U.S. Highway 93 stumped local officials and business owners during a meeting called Thursday by the county.

"I think we've got a lot of agencies controlling property around an intersection with flashing red lights, and they're all looking at the others and saying 'What are they going to do? Somebody has to step forward and say what we can and can't do,'" said Scott Bybee, a project engineer with J-U-B Engineers Inc. in Twin Falls.

The firm is studying the interchange, under contract with local investment companies which own the property surrounding the Petro 2 truck stop.

The results of the study are expected next month, and will probably be used to help the Idaho Transportation Department decide what improvements the interchange needs.

That work could include anything from extending the interstate access ramps to building a cloverleaf interchange.

Several other private and public entities own property near in the area, including the Jerome Historical Society, the Crossroads Ranch commercial devel-

opment company and the state Department of Lands.

About 30 people from various agencies and businesses met in Jerome City Council chambers to discuss the future of the interchange and the land surrounding it, but little was decided except to have another meeting later in the month.

"The interchange is a hub, and we have to design it for traffic 50 years from now," said ITD District 4 Engineer Larry Van Oker.

"We need to enhance the ability of people to get off the interstate, and to have things to do and things to keep them there," said Jerome Recreation

District Director Mike Pepper.

Dave Cooper, the chairman of the investment companies which own the Petro 2 property, said it might be too expensive to develop much of the rocky ground near the interchange.

"It's no accident that the area hasn't been developed yet," he said.

But Jerome County Planning and Zoning Administrator Art Brown said the county should still prepare for commercial development, and for the prospect of growth in the area.

Another meeting was tentatively scheduled for 9 a.m. Jan. 16 in the basement meeting room of the Jerome County Courthouse.

High bids drive Jackpot club house into sand trap

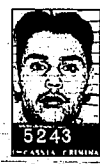
RUPERT - The two women closest to confessed killer Corey Hood took the witness stand Thursday and denied they tried to protect him during investigations.

"Yes," Baker said.

Bradley was aggressive cross-examining Garrett, while trying to demonstrate that Hood can deceive her.

"Do you know what your son's conduct is like after he has murdered someone?" Bradley said, his voice booming.

"No sir," Garrett replied. "Do you have any idea how many cigarettes your son smoked after he killed Wendy Hunter?"

"No sir."

There were few new developments in the fifth day of the hearing to determine if Hood's plea agreement should stand. Hood has confessed to killing

Cloud seeding equipment idle with wet winter

Rain on snow at high elevations could cause some of the heavy snowpack to melt early. Snake River reservoirs won't have trouble filling reservoirs this year.

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Murder investigation concludes

BURLEY — Two teenagers suffered gunshot wounds, in the midst of a gasfire from a double homicide and suicide last Friday, police said Thursday. Police also said they had closed their investigation into a shootout that left three Burley residents dead.

Interviews with four witnesses and other evidence proved Richard Choate, 37, shot Jerry Centino, 46, and Cheryl Choate, 36, with a 12-gauge shotgun before shooting himself in the head with the same gun at 1101 Burton Ave., the Cassia County Sheriff's Office said in a news release Thursday.

The release says a witness standing near Centino was hit in

the legs by shrapnel from one of four shotgun blasts fired by Richard Choate. Another witness who was asleep in a bedroom was hit by a round Centino fired from a .22-caliber handgun.

Both wounds were superficial and neither was life-threatening, the release said.

According to the release, Centino was found in a small hallway inside the home with two shotgun wounds, one to the chest and one to the right side. Cheryl Choate was found laying on a bed in the master bedroom with a shotgun wound to the head. Richard Choate's body was also found on the bed.

Centino fired four rounds from the .22-caliber handgun in the direction of Richard Choate but missed, according to the release. Eight rounds were shot four from

the shotgun and four from the pistol.

Police say the motive in the shooting was Richard Choate's stress, frustration, depression, anger and jealousy. Based on the findings, no criminal charges will be filed, the news release said.

Lt. Alan Smith said Thursday the investigation is complete, although officials are still waiting on one piece of evidence that he declined to identify. Drug and alcohol tests on the Choates and Centino are still being conducted. Cassia County Coroner Paul Young told *The Times-News* Monday that two of the witnesses were the Choates' daughters, Nicole, 17, and Joni, 14. The other witnesses were a friend of the family and a cousin of the two daughters, he said.

Young said Richard Choate

shot Centino at around 1:20 a.m. Cheryl Choate, also known as Cheryl Choate, died shortly afterward from a gunshot wound in the back, fired from the same shotgun.

A witness inside the home called 911 shortly after the first two shootings, Young said. Two witnesses quickly left the home when the shooting started and the two others followed shortly afterward.

Richard Choate's stepsister, Eileen Kay Butcher of Burley, told *The Times-News* Monday the Choates had been separated for four or five months, but appeared to be "working through their differences."

Butcher said Centino was a friend of the family, but was more Cheryl's friend than Richard's.

Japanese crazy for Oregon's '70s shoes

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Oregon runners are making a killing on their smelly old sneakers.

A Japanese fashion frenzy over used running shoes — especially brand names such as Nike, Adidas, Puma and Converse — has the owners of vintage shoes racing to the banks scoring 10 to 15 times the original price.

The fashion trend isn't as big with most Americans, but overseas and in certain hip circles in the States, the shoes are considered collectors' items. Vintage sneakers have become such big business that shoe hunters called "pickers" raid thrift stores, swap meets and garage sales, in search of soiled shoes.

Few, however, are better poised to profit than longtime runners in Oregon, home of Nike and legendary runner Steve Prefontaine. Last year alone, one of the largest vintage shoe buyers in the Pacific Northwest bought more than 500 pairs of old sneakers from Oregonians.

"Running in Oregon in the '70s was like grunge rock in Seattle in the '90s," says Tace Chalfa, co-owner of The New Store in Seattle. "We get shoes from all over, but the best quality come from Oregon."

Like the gold lame racing flats designed for Olympian Michael Johnson, Nike created funky shoes for the running elite back in the age of bell-bottoms and feathered hair.

Models included the Disco, a red shoe with a silver lame Swoosh; the Pinwheel, which combined several Swooshes in a circle; and the "Ear Me," which bore the rebellious phrase on both heels. Even flamboyant rock star Elton John got a pair of platform sneakers from the fledgling shoemaker.

For common folk, Waffle Trainers and Internationalists lavished store racks with furious color combinations such as orange and tan, orange and green, and blue and yellow.

"People think Nike does weird stuff now, but these guys have always been wild," says Chalfa, who first fell for vintage running shoes when she spotted the Nike Stings, orange sneakers with green

Swooshes and honeycomb-patterned soles.

Oregonians who latched onto the running trend bought Nikes in the '70s for their revolutionary, supportive designs. But they saved them and other brand-name running shoes for sentimental reasons perhaps only runners can identify with: There's the pair in which you broke three hours in the marathon, the pair you ran your last race in, the pair that led you to your spouse.

"Older runners like me like to bring out the old shoes and talk about them in general and advancements that were made" in shoe design, says Randy Banks, 46, of Beaverton. "Back then, they were comfortable, but when you put them on now, you wonder how you even got past being injured."

The sentimentality paid off. Banks made close to \$1,000 for seven pairs of tired sneakers. Robert Towne of Springfield got \$255 for a pair of worn Nikes. And Jeff McCaffrey of Aloha landed \$135 for two sets of racing flats.

"They wish they had just hung on to the dozens of soiled shoes they wore for miles and miles of training for relays, 10ks and marathons, even if it would appear a bit odd."

"It's sort of a geeky thing to hang on to a pair of running shoes they wore for miles and miles," says McCaffrey, 31. "I'm going to keep my eyes open for them in thrift stores."

Many runners unwittingly happened upon the fad flipping their way for miles and miles of Runner's World Magazine, where The New Store and its local competitor, Heller's Cafe, placed advertisements offering up to \$1,000 for a good pair of vintage shoes.

The New Store's Chalfa began collecting Nikes on her own and then later for the antique store she owns with her husband.

The trend appears to have started in Japan, says Chalfa, in which Tom Hanks' character sports a pair of old Nikes. The fad could skyrocket after a film about Steve Prefontaine, the James Dean of track and field, hits theaters.

Idaho senator resolves Visa stress for WW II hero's German stepdaughter

A visa problem has been resolved that threatened to keep Vernon Baker's German stepdaughter from seeing him become the only living black World War II veteran to receive the Medal of Honor.

Mark Snider, a spokesman for U.S. Sen. Dirk Kempthorne, said Alexandra Pawlik was granted a tourist visa by the U.S. Embassy in Berlin on Thursday after the Idaho Republican contacted the State Department.

"Apparently they were not really aware of the circumstances surrounding her request for a visa, that it was

for a Medal of Honor ceremony," Snider said.

Baker, who lives near St.

Maries, is scheduled to receive the nation's highest award for battlefield valor at a White House ceremony on Jan. 13. It will be the first time he has met his 23-year-old stepdaughter, who lives in Osnabrueck, Germany.

Her mother, Heidi Baker, said U.S. Embassy officials told Alexandra on Dec. 23 that she could not get a tourist visa because she is single, jobless and unlikely to return to Germany. But her mother said Pawlik works at home as a tailor, has a round-trip plane ticket and has traveled to the United States and Canada before on a tourist visa.

The Bakers also appealed to

the White House, but were told there was little that could be done to help them without, as Mrs. Baker put it, "lots of papers."

Snider said the fact that Pawlik officially is "stateless" — neither a U.S. nor a German citizen — complicated the matter. But Kempthorne contacted the State Department last Friday, and embassy officials in Berlin later agreed to let Pawlik reapply.

Eccles Foundation's \$78,000 gift provides new roof for tabernacle

WELLSVILLE, Utah (AP) — A \$78,000 gift from the George S. and Dolores Dore Eccles Foundation will pay for a new roof at the historic Wellsville tabernacle.

"We're just tickled about this, it's fantastic," said Kelly Maughan, second vice president of the Wellsville Foundation. "We never dreamed they'd fund the entire project. When

Hunter and his 74-year-old grandmother Mae Hood.

He agreed to plead guilty to two counts of voluntary manslaughter in exchange for testimony against three people he said helped him clean the crime scene after Hunter was slain. But when defense attorneys poked holes in Hood's story implicating Brian Mack, Matthew Mines and Shannon Reeves, prosecutors requested the plea agreement be set aside so they could file first-degree murder charges against Hood.

Drawing near the conclusion of the hearing, Hood's attorney Mark Manweiler spent most of the afternoon in court with witnesses who testified about the activities of Mack, Mines and Reeves following Hunter's death.

Before he was picked up by police, Mines had his girlfriend take a knife he carried. Forensic testing later failed to connect the knife to any crime.

Manweiler earlier said Mines

turned the knife over to his girlfriend because it was used to dig up bloody carpet in Hood's home.

Plea hearing continues Monday

The hearing to determine if Corey Hood's plea agreement should stand or be withdrawn breaks off Monday at 9:30 a.m. Hood's attorneys are expected to contest the presentation of their case Monday. Unless prosecutors have an extensive rebuttal case, the hearing should conclude Monday.

But Cassandra Cole denied that, saying she got the knife "because (Mines) was scared because the cops wanted him for questioning."

Police lack any physical evidence linking Mack, Mines or Reeves to the Hunter crime

scene. But Manweiler has questioned their alibis, and has insisted they helped Hood clean up blood at the crime scene, tear up bloody carpet and carpet padding, and dispose of Hunter's body.

Most of Manweiler's argument hinges on the validity of the "Stanton alibi."

Mack, Mines and Reeves say they met with Barbara Stanton in a parking lot at the time Hood claims the three were helping him clean the crime scene. Manweiler has maintained the alibi is false, and the product of Mack's association with a gang known as the South Meridian Barrios.

Minidoka County Sheriff Capt. Randy White testified that Mack is a known member of the gang, which has ties to other local criminals, including Cassia County drug-trafficking suspect Gilbert Rodriguez.

Reeves is listed as an associate of the gang, White said.

Ensure maximum bang for drug-resistance buck

You'll never read a discouraging word about flyfishing in this column. No-siree. It's a fine sport.

And yet - When Idaho lawmakers channeled a portion of cigarette taxes into school anti-drug programs, flyfishing probably wasn't what they had in mind.

Neither was skiing. Or drama club. Or choir. Programs of those kinds, which in the Kimberly school system are sparking some controversy, may undergo increased scrutiny as competition for tobacco revenue intensifies. And that's probably a good thing.

Kimberly school and state education officials are at odds over Kimberly's use of state drug money for a variety of clubs and activities. Kimberly's theory is that the activities will help "at-risk" students stay off drugs.

That may be true. But the same thing could probably be said about any wholesome activity. The question is, how much direct bang should the state demand for its buck?

The danger is that drug-resistance programs may become a screen for siphoning state money into extracurricular activities. Such activities have a place in schools, but they ought to be

supported with local, not state money.

John Garner, Kimberly's superintendent, insists his school district is following the rules: "We feel we were within the guidelines that were written for the grants, and if indeed that is not the intent, the guidelines need to be changed," he said.

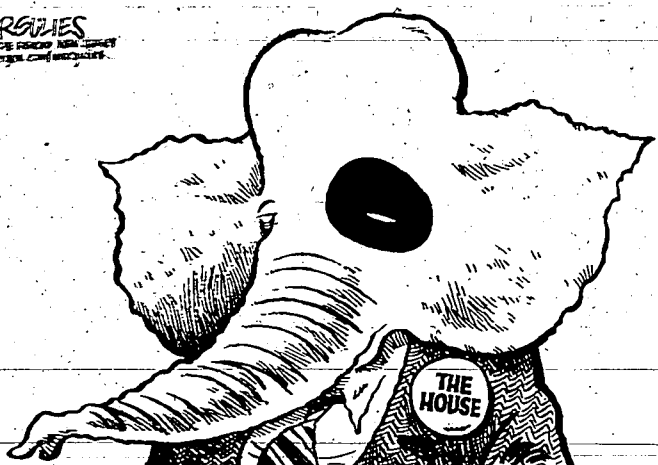
Exactly right. If the current rules appear to encompass flyfishing and drama, then the Legislature should revisit the issue. It should review how all Idaho school districts are using cigarette money.

This is not an occasion to argue for local control. When the Legislature sets money aside for a particular purpose, the state has a responsibility to see that the money is spent as intended.

Local officials have a similar responsibility, as well as a practical motivation for following the Legislature's intent. Revenue is a precious and much-valued commodity in Boise. The Legislature already has shunted part of the cigarette money to juvenile corrections.

If lawmakers get the idea that schools are misusing their share by squigging it into unintended uses, the fishing hole might run dry.

Eye of Newt

This religious group makes a difference

If someone could make every Sunday a meaningful period would sound like this. It is 7:15 a.m., dark, cold and drizzling when, from the sidewalk in front of the window some steps that lead to the door of St. Ignace's Parish Academy, the contest begins. It is the sound of young males belling with an exuberance undampened by the damp, the hour or the fact that this is a day for final exams.

They come from 19 zip codes, some leaving home before 6 a.m., some riding three buses. They head for home at 5:15 p.m. with several hours of homework ahead. The 58 boys (49 African Americans, two Africans, four Hispanic Americans, three Catholics) at this inner city middle school, now four years old, that offers grades six, seven and eight, begin their day with a ritual of civility. They shake hands with their 21-year-old headmaster, Jeff Smoller, and with the Rev. William Waters, S.J., C.M., looking each in the eye and saying "Good morning."

Only 13 of the boys are Catholics. The rest of America should be grateful that the church devotes scarce resources (a large building, and \$120,000 in start-up funding) to proving a nonsecular point about religious observance as a predictor of the capacity to resist the myriad pathologies of modern metropolitan living. It is a point David Brooks makes in the current issue of The Public Interest concerning why religious institutions do better than secular institutions at molding character. It is not only that they have a particularly powerful sense of mission, and hence are especially demanding, but also that "they place human life in a transcendent context."

Brooks notes that, whereas in the 1980s policy intellectuals talked like economists, nowadays they talk like ministers. For example, Professor Glenn Loury, an African American economist at

Boston University, who says: "I doubt that the cleverest economist - could design an incentive scheme for responsible parenting that would be as effective as the broad acceptance among men and women that they are God's stewards in the lives of their children. The best pregnancy deterrent may be to inculcate in the heart of each adolescent the belief that, as Paul wrote to the Corinthians, 'Your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit.' ... Therefore honor God with your body."

Recently many religious organizations have been denouncing governmental reductions of welfare services. Columnist Cal Thomas notes that if each of Maryland's 5,000 places of worship became responsible for 10 welfare families, or 37 individuals, all of Maryland's caseload would be covered.

TV commercials also need to be rated

While services for children's TV and Hollywood are working, about what will take away violence, violence - not to define a program rating under the new V-chip system, they are ignoring the need for a far more crucial V-chip feature: the ability to let viewers block out violent commercials, as well as violent adult-oriented programs.

Recently, my family was watching a rerun of "The Mary Tyler Moore Show." Suddenly, a commercial for the film "The Glimmer Man" came on. It featured 30 seconds of non-stop violence: guns, fire, knife kills, crashing windows and other mayhem. During that 30 seconds, my 7-year-old son saw more violence than he had seen in the hundreds of hours of programs and movies he'd watched with me. That commercial certainly wouldn't receive the same V-chip rating as "The Mary Tyler Moore," a program we selected to put for family viewing because of its lack of violence.

Adults who dislike the screen violence have the option of switching channels. But after choosing a non-violent program to watch, the whole purpose of the V-chip will be defeated if a violent commercial suddenly comes on.

If V-chip technology truly is going to be effective in helping parents to protect young kids from seeing violence on TV, here are three types of commercials that they should have the option to block:

- Commercials for violent films. Many of these commercials assemble a film's most violent moments into an action-packed 30-second spot.
 - Commercials for products that are inappropriate for children, such as beer, phone sex lines and other products you must be 18 or 21 to buy.
 - Commercials containing fast cutting between different shots - young children can't read "what's on the screen as quickly as adults," and this subliminal content can have mind-controlling power.
- I am not advocating censorship; the parents will choose whether to use the V-chip. I am arguing that commercials should not get preferential treatment.
- The added cost for rating commercials would be negligible, especially compared with the billions spent producing and placing them. Commercials for nationally advertised products - fast food, cars,

soft drinks, soap suds, etc. - are arguably the most lavish media productions in existence, commonly costing upward of \$1 million for a 30-second spot.

The real cost of V-chip is in lost viewers. The business of commercial television is selling V-chip technology will hurt that business. That's why the TV industry has resisted such ratings, and why the U.S. government has demanded that the industry now adopt this "voluntary" system.

The most desirable set-up for consumers would allow the V-chip to work continuously, blocking commercials on a program-by-program basis (rather than on a program-by-program basis). But that approach might suggest to consumers that it would be technically feasible to offer a feature that blocks out all commercials - and that obviously would be an anathema in the broadcast business. So, if commercials do get rated, most likely it will be on a program-by-program basis.

Making the V-chip system respond to signals encoded into commercials as well as into programs wouldn't require any technical breakthroughs - all that's needed is the will to do it.

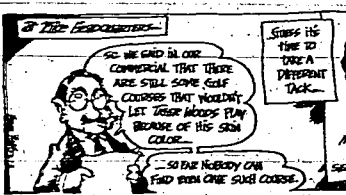

Despite releases, rebels still holding select list of hostages

LIMA, Peru (AP) — The rebels in the Japanese ambassador's residence are gradually freeing hostages but holding onto the president's brother and several other select figures to keep their bargaining power high.

A partial list published Thursday named five Supreme Court judges, eight generals, five congressmen, two foreign ambassadors and Pedro Fujimori, the younger brother of President Alberto Fujimori, as among the 74 still held since the crisis began on Dec. 17.

In a statement Thursday to The Associated Press, the Tupac Amaru rebels said they are respecting international conventions regarding hostages and "in this sense the people inside the residence are treated with the respect that corresponds to their conditions as human beings and prisoners of war."

"That is not the case with the treatment the government gives to political prisoners," the statement fazed from the leftist rebel group said.

The Japanese government said it was pleased with the release of seven hostages Wednesday, the 11th time rebels have let captives go. But officials in Tokyo also expressed concern over the

The government announced that six of the generals among the hostages, including two in charge of security matters, have been released.

The two are Gen. Maximiliano Rivera Diaz, in charge of anti-terrorism, and Gen. Guillermo

Bobbio, head of state security. Both are with the National Police. It was unclear whether the replacements were temporary.

The government order signed by Fujimori gave no explanation, but the two men's jobs included preventing incidents such as the takeover of the residence in the upscale San Ysidro suburb during a posh party celebrating the

Japanese emperor's birthday. Rebels gained entrance by posing as waiters.

The rebels in recent days seem to have hardened their stance, reviving their original demand that 300 comrades be freed from Peruvian jails as a price for the hostages' liberation. Fujimori reportedly has said he will not permit that, even though his brother is among those held.

"The situation is becoming more tense as the number (of hostages) nears a level the guerrillas can control," Prime Minister Ryutaro Hashimoto said.

A reduced number of hostages could increase the likelihood of an attempted breakout — with or without the hostages — or make the Peruvian government less

reluctant to use force to end the crisis, one of the worst of Fujimori's administration.

It also would give the rebels fewer cards to play with because they need to hold a certain number of hostages to retain their bargaining power.

The gradual releases, meanwhile, have kept attention focused on the rebels, to the embarrassment of a government

Osorio brings angry moose to its knees

OSLO, Norway — Facing an angry moose, a Norwegian politician did what came naturally: He used the power of speech to vanquish his adversary. Svein Harald Falleraas, deputy mayor of the southern Norwegian village of Songdalen, was hunting rabbits when he was charged by a moose protruding her young, the Oslo newspaper Verdens Gang reported Thursday.

"I unleashed a tremendous shout," the politician told the newspaper. "The moose instantly collapsed onto the ground, a meter (yard) from me." After a few seconds, the stunned moose staggered to its feet and wobbled quickly away, giving the politician the last word.

2nd Israeli soldier detained on suspicion

JERUSALEM — A second Israeli soldier was detained Thursday on suspicion that he knew of plans by off-duty Pyl. Noam Friedmann to open fire on Palestinians in a crowded Hebron market.

Friedmann, 22, said he acted alone in planning and carrying out Wednesday's shooting in which five Palestinians were injured. He said he hoped to hamper Israel's planned pullout from most of the West Bank city.

Bomb explodes on Damascus bus

DAMASCUS, Syria — A bomb that exploded aboard a bus in the capital killed nine people and injured 44, the government said Thursday.

It blamed the New Year's Eve blast on Israeli intelligence agents. The statement by an unidentified government official was Syria's first comment on Tuesday's explosion near the downtown Baramkeh bus station.

The statement said that 11 of the victims of the bombing were from a single family.

Sources in Damascus reached by The Associated Press earlier today from Cairo said as many as 12 people had died. Those sources, who insisted on anonymity, said least 40 people were hospitalized after the explosion and that eight to 12 were killed.

Annan likens 1st day in office to school

UNITED NATIONS — New U.N. chief Kofi Annan likened his first day in office Thursday as head of the United Nations to starting the school year.

"Everybody expects a lot from you, and you get into it with considerable trepidation," said the secretary-general, who assumed the U.N. chairman's title on New Year's Day and made his first appearance at the office this morning.

Rebels capture Mobutu's gold mine

BUNIA, Zaire — Zairian rebels have captured President Mobutu Sese Seko's personal gold mine and expanded their control of northern Zaire, residents and rebels said Thursday.

The rebel Alliance of Democratic Forces for the Liberation of Congo-Zaire captured the town of Manqabwila, 25 miles north of Bunia, on Saturday, according to Mike Ndoyn, the new, rebel-appointed commissioner for Ituru region.

He said the rebels also seized Mobutu's privately owned Kilo-moto gold mine concession, which covers 32,000 square miles and reportedly has reserves of 100 tons of gold.

Clintons take family vacation

ST. THOMAS, U.S. Virgin Islands (AP) — As warm, moist breezes drifted in off the Caribbean, President Clinton settled into seaside solitude with his vacation reading, two books with Irish themes and a government report on Gulf War illness.

On the first full day of a four-day Virgin Islands retreat, the first family — Clinton, first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton and their daughter, Chelsea — stayed out of public view Thursday in a private villa called the Sand Dollar.

"They are relaxing and enjoying themselves," said deputy White House press secretary Mary Ellen Glynn.

Although golf is a near-constant ambition for a vacationing Clinton, intermittent rain kept him and steamy sunshine kept him indoors Thursday.

Glynn said the president was keeping abreast of developments in the Middle East, where special envoy Dennis Ross was expected to meet again with Yasser Arafat to push for talks with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to complete a deal on an Israeli troop pullout from the West Bank city Hebron.

Clinton had telephoned Palestinian leader Arafat after an off-duty Israeli soldier sprayed bullets into a crowded Hebron market Wednesday, wounding five people. Clinton said the shooting should not be allowed to interfere with the talks on the Israeli pullout.

Glynn said Clinton's vacation reading had an Irish theme. One book, "The Greening of the White House" by Irish author Conor O'Clery, is about the Clinton administration's focus on the Northern Ireland conflict.

The other, "Irish Lace" by Andrew Greeley, is a novel about an Irish-American's return to Ireland.

Predicting weather remains an uncertain task

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — To modify the words of a song: "Whirl start the rain?" Drenched and windblown on Sunday, Northern California residents dreaded additional downpours during the last days of last year. With good reason: Weather satellites showed other big, fat storms stretched across the Pacific.

Monday came, then Tuesday, bringing little drizzles here and there. But a deluge? Not yet. We had to wait until Wednesday for that.

What delayed Act Two? Forecasters blamed the holdup on two old gripes:

- The erratic behavior of the jet stream, that high-altitude river of high-speed winds whose wormlike wriggles are as hard to forecast as, well, he wriggles of worms.
- A literal sea of ignorance — the Pacific Ocean. Despite all those expensive weather satellites, forecasters know frustratingly little about hour-by-hour shifts in the Pacific atmosphere's winds, temperature and water-vapor flows at different heights.

"There's no data to the west, which stretches for 8,000 miles to Japan," Dave Reynolds of the

National Weather Service said with only slight exaggeration.

True, satellites generate pretty pictures of incoming Pacific storms. But to make better forecasts, weather seers need detailed "vertical profiles" of the Pacific atmosphere — three-dimensional profiles of the air, its contents and motions at different heights, said Reynolds, National Weather Service science and operations officer at San Francisco International Airport.

As for the jet stream, it has fascinated and frustrated meteorologists since it was accidentally discovered by high-flying bomber pilots in World War II. Like a giant cobra, the jet stream follows a writhing, ever-shifting orbit around the North Pole. Its hurricane-force winds fuel and steer tempests in the lower atmosphere.

By early this week, Reynolds said, everything was in place for continued heavy rains in California — everything, that is, except the jet stream. Like a prima donna still messing with her makeup while the rest of the cast is on stage, the jet stream lingered far at sea.

Once the jet stream moved over California, its high-speed winds

would suck low-level air skyward, causing the abundant Pacific moisture to concentrate over Northern California, Reynolds said.

He compared this effect to a child who pokes a hole in an earthen dam. Suddenly, water gushes into and through the little hole. As moisture rises, it cools and condenses into big clouds, then falls as rain.

It wasn't until Monday that the jet stream began moving toward California, Reynolds said. As a result, he predicted, considerable wind and rain would hit the state Wednesday or a little later.

"The ground is (already) so wet that we (may) see mudslides and local ponding along highways, and urban and small stream flooding, within The City," Reynolds said on Tuesday.

His predictions for Wednesday "catastrophic flooding north-of-San Francisco, in Napa and the Russian River basin" — proved all too true. He also forewarned "heavy rains, mudslides and local flash-flooding" south of San Francisco, in particular, the Santa Cruz Mountains "and maybe in the coastal regions of Monterey County."

Term limit opposition grows stronger, debate continues

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho House Speaker Michael Simpson has picked up a powerful ally in his challenge to the constitutionality of the federal term limits initiative approved by Idaho voters in November.

Jerry Twigg, president pro tem of the Idaho Senate, said on Tuesday that he might join Simpson and the American Civil Liberties Union in a lawsuit expected to be filed in the next 10 days.

But Twigg, who like Simpson is a Blackfoot Republican, said he also might try to get the Legislature or voters to overturn the 1994 initiative that limits terms of school board members, county commissioners, sheriffs and other local officials.

"I'd like to see that issue back on the ballot again and see if that's what the people really want," said Twigg, who has indicated he might retire from the Legislature after his current term.

While voters wanted to limit the terms of federal and state legislators, they might not have wanted limits on school trustees or county officials,

"What 32-year-old-qualified person will run for treasurer knowing that by the time he's 40 he'll be out of a job?" Twigg asked.

Even if the issue does not qualify for the ballot, the Legislature could overturn what voters did in 1994 by a simple majority vote.

"We can flat change the law," Twigg said. "A new Legislature is not bound by anything that's been done before."

Donna Weaver, the Hayden Lake woman who led the campaign for the 1996 initiative, would like to see the debate end.

"How many times do we have to say Y-E-S to term limits before these career politicians listen?" Weaver said.

"To have the speaker and the president pro tem join with the ACLU is a sad day for Idaho," she said. "They are members of the permanent class of career politicians speaking to overturn the overwhelming majority of people who would like to see rotation in office."

The 1996 initiative, which passed with 55 percent of the vote, requires future ballots to identify

candidates who have not done everything possible, including calling for a federal constitutional convention, to force term limits on members of Congress.

Those candidates who the secretary of state says have not worked to force term limits would have a message printed by their names on the ballot: "Disregarded voters' instructions on term limits."

Simpson and the ACLU maintain the ballot wording requires the state to sanction a political belief on the ballot, illegally squelching political debate. Their case is bolstered by an advisory opinion from Attorney General Alan Lewis, who said the initiative likely is unconstitutional.

"I don't think the voters were aware of the implications of what they were voting for," Twigg said. "They especially don't think this issue is nearly as important as to call for a constitutional convention."

The 1994 initiative was approved by 59 percent of voters, but the U.S. Supreme Court later ruled that term limits on federal officeholders are unconstitutional.

Jobless rate hits record low in '96

BOISE (AP) — Unemployment in Idaho last year dropped to a record low 5 percent, but the Department of Labor on Thursday said the state's slowing economy will push the jobless rate upward this year and next.

"Idaho is a good, strong economy, particularly in terms of employment, but we think it's slowing down in terms of growth," analyst Jim Adams told the joint legislative committee assessing Idaho's economic prospects.

After dropping a tenth of a point below the old record set in 1989, the unemployment rate will edge back up to 5.1 percent in 1997 and to 5.3 percent in 1998, according to figures supplied to the House-Senate panel by the department.

The record low unemployment rate came as business expansion to catch up with pent-up demand

over the past seven years of growth collided with slower population growth as economies in other states, particularly California, recovered and offered their own job prospects to workers.

The number of jobs increased almost 3 percent in 1996 to \$28,000 after averaging more than 4 percent annual growth the previous four years. But the department forecast the growth rate at just 2.4 percent in both 1997 and 1998.

And while job growth last year was solid, if not stellar, the department estimated that the average annual wage rose only 1.8 percent from 1995. The new average of \$21,663 was less than \$400 more than the 1995 average.

Retail trade, local government and employment in service sectors like hotels, recreation and accountancy continued to account for a

third of all jobs, and each had an average annual wage below the statewide average. Retailing, which is a sixth of the state's job base, had an average annual wage just over \$13,000 in 1996.

The state's average wage is forecast to increase by 2.3 percent a year in both 1997 and 1998, leaving it under \$23,000 and more than 15 percent below the national average.

The state's employer mix has also changed dramatically since the economic recovery began in the late-1980s, shifting from small businesses to a few dozen of the largest operations.

While small businesses — those with fewer than 50 workers — still employ 40 percent of the labor force and pay 33 percent of the wages, they are not as big a factor in Idaho's labor picture as they were just seven years ago.


















Underground art

Twin Falls painter finds his muse in makeshift subterranean studio

TWIN FALLS — To see the big picture, you'll need to step downstairs.

Down there — past the boxes of coffee filters and bottles of espresso flavoring — Chris Frazier stands in an 18-inch-deep trench and paints his life.

"The theme is 'passing it on,'" said the 35-year-old artist, surveying a 30-foot-by-10-foot wall of canvas that stretches from ceiling to subfloor, all under the glare of floodlights. "I believe very strongly that art should be passed from generation to generation — that's kind of my working title."

A small but steady stream of visitors — accountants, lawyers, students who patronize the Metropolis Bakery Cafe — treks downstairs to see the work in progress, and most people ask the same question:

"How are you going to get this out of here?"

"I'll roll it up," Frazier said. "Just roll it up and haul it out."

When the mural-sized work is finished, probably within the next two weeks, Frazier will display it for a while in the cafe upstairs. It will occupy a whole wall of Eric and Susan Estesvold's coffee house and bakery.

"It might be kind of overwhelming," Frazier said. "There are a lot of bright colors."

Eric Estesvold told Frazier, who moved to Twin Falls from Boise six months ago, that he could use a corner of the unfinished basement for the project. The massive canvas hangs on a lava-rock wall 10 feet below Main Avenue.

"It's hard for an artist to find a place to work on a canvas this size," Frazier said. "This place was ideal."

Well, almost ideal. In order to make the canvas fit, he had to dig a trench along the base of the wall.

"When I started digging the ditch, I wondered if it was worth it," Frazier said. "I thought my ditch-digging days were over."

He works construction during the warm months, as a surveyor. It helps support a passion for art that he's nursed since he was a high school student in Michigan.

"There's not a big market for canvasses. Please see ART, Page B2

The quartet started singing in small clubs in the early 1950s and soon landed a recording deal with Spark Records. They called themselves the Robins and recorded hits like

The group began to tour throughout the United States and recorded more hits, such as "Poison Ivy" and "Along Came Jones." Today, the Coasters are considered supreme comedians, rock 'n' roll. Group manager is Billy Richards, who joined up 25 years ago.

this size," said Frazier, who normally works in a studio in a converted garage in his home on Twin Falls' east end. "But I think I may be able to sell it — maybe for public art, to be displayed in a public building or outside."

Five visitors, even Frazier's wife, Zoe, offer advice. But the Ettesvolds' young daughter sketched a picture of a child on the empty canvas, and she's allowed to pitch in with some brush strokes whenever she's in the mood.

"A lot of artists are putting in a lot of effort nowadays trying to get back to the way they painted as 2-year-olds," Frazier said. "I

wouldn't discourage a child from painting on my work."

Eventually, Frazier — whose work ranges from textured oil paintings to sculpture and has had his work exhibited in New York and San Francisco — would like to paint an even larger canvas.

"I've done murals for years," he said. "It's exciting to be able to paint this way on canvas."

But first, "Generation to Generation" will have to be taken down and laid flat for some finish work, then rehung to be completed.

"When it's finished, you'll still be able to see the images, but they'll come through the rest of

the painting."

The vivid, mostly primary colors describe circles and loops and an assortment of images, including military decorations, a ladder, a child, and a fierce-looking face.

"One of the things that makes me angry is politicians who don't appreciate the value of the art to society," he said. "People like (Idaho congresswoman) Helen Chenoweth."

So is the forbidding visage Chenoweth's?

"Well, it could be," Frazier said with a laugh. "Or maybe (state Superintendent of Public Instruction) Anne Fox."

Woman abused as child still bears pain of waiting to talk about it

DEAR ABBY: I am writing in response to the letter signed "Living in God's Glory and Grace," which described a so-called respectable, churchgoing man who had been a child molester for years, but nobody suspected it until he was caught.

Recently my 10-year-old niece was molested by a family member. She is not getting counseling and seems to be fine; however, this event brought out an issue that my sister and I kept hidden for close to 20 years.

We are now 28 and 29, but when we were 10 and 11, a family friend molested me on a camping trip. He had repeatedly molested my sister prior to that, but I found out only after I confessed my tragedy. Although the man never threatened to harm us, it was an unspoken command that we were going to keep it to ourselves.

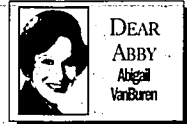
The day after my niece came forward, a flood of emotions overcame me.

We were at my sister's house and I told my mom everything. Mom contacted the police and they sent someone out. We learned that this man now lives in Florida. (We live in California.) The police in both states did extensive background checks, but no records of any kind were found. We were told that they did not have enough manpower to pursue this, also, too much time had elapsed. Today this man is free to do whatever he pleases — including molesting other children.

I pray every day that this was a one-time incident, but somehow I'm not sure.

Please tell your young readers never to be afraid to tell someone right away. Twenty years proved far too long to wait.

• **"Beavis and Butt-Head Do America"** — This lively diversion unleashes the geeky duo on the big screen with big laughs as they're caught up in cross-country adventures — all because someone stole their TV. (PG-13, for continuous crude sexual humor and language, and for a drug-related scene.) (*Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Burley Theater, Ski Time 4 Cinemas of Ketchum*)

• **"Daylight"** — An underwater tunnel explodes and Sylvester Stallone saves the day. You were expecting maybe Daniel Day-Lewis? Persuasive in its action moments but puny in terms of character and plot. (R, for disaster-related peril, death and destruction.) (*Twin Cinema*)

The seventh grader, who's called Wiener Dog at school, doesn't get relief from either. Her mother clearly favors Dawn's irritating kid sister, Missy (Daria Kalinina), who pirouettes all over the garden in a pink tutu. And Dawn's older, computer-nerd brother Marz (Matthew Faber) has few words of comfort for his suffering sister. In the tradition of "Parents," another dark venture into the private purgatory of growing up, "Welcome to the Dollhouse"

Etheridge now looks to build a family

"It just doesn't get better than this... Or so Melissa Etheridge thought at the time.

Back in 1989 Etheridge stood onstage at Red Rocks Amphitheatre near Denver and told the audience all her dreams had come true.

"When she was a little girl in Leavenworth, Kan., she said, her family had visited the magnificent natural amphitheater in the foothills of the Rockies. It was foothills the Beatles had played. The place that two decades later, U2 would make famous with a live disc.

"Now it was sold out, overflowing with fans screaming for her. Thank you for making my dreams come true," she said.

But that peak now seems like a small hill in a career since filled with Grammys, platinum sales for albums such as "Yes I Am" and "Your Little Secret," heavy airplay for songs such as "Come To My Window," liberating personal freedom, and friends such as Bruce Springsteen.

After having all her dreams come true — and then going 10 times past that — does she still

have goals to set?

"I still put dreams in front of me, yeah," she said in a dreamy voice from a hotel suite in Houston, thinking back on the Red Rocks experience. "It seems like musically there was definitely a high with 'Yes I Am.' Now what I would like, what my dream is, is to maintain a career.

To become an artist that contributes to our musical consciousness and is remembered as such. That takes work and not letting it go."

"I have a nice confidence now that is very pleasant. I don't think, 'I've done it!' I now have to maintain it. I don't want to be 'Where is she now? Remember that "Window" song?' I want to be respected and have a good career."

And things are unfolding just as she expected in this good career of hers.

She hit the platinum heights with "Yes I Am."

Now she's coming back down to earth. "Your Little Secret" hasn't sold as well as "Yes I Am," but Etheridge has the vision to look past the numbers that are so important to the music industry.

"It's actually not as bad as I thought it would be. I knew it would come," she said.

In fact, she said, one reason "Your Little Secret" followed so closely on the heels of "Yes I Am" was to get the inevitable over with.

"It's not going to sell as much as the last one," she said,

"because I just know that's not possible."

And the lessened expectations work "all right well" in Etheridge's personal schedule.

"Now that I'm starting a family, I don't see myself touring for a year," she said. "I will pick and choose my tours much more carefully. I will be less and less available."

Of course, you've heard the big news. Etheridge is going to be a mom. So is her mate, Julie Cypher. The ex-wife of actor Lou Diamond Phillips, Cypher is actually carrying the child. Two women in the public eye. Together. Sperm donor. Baby.

About the only thing that hasn't been asked was whether this pregnancy was planned.

Etheridge — not so much the idea of starting an unconventional family but the public scrutiny. She was in fear of it for years: in the closeted '80s and early '90s she was accused of the off-the-record question from sympathetic interviewers: What will you do if your personal life becomes public? She'd just sigh and say, "I hope that doesn't happen, but if it does, I'll deal with it."

And breezy irreverence still obvious, if anyone feared it might vanish in a baby-powder whiteness.
The milk truck is back! Madonna calls it as she returns to an interview interrupted for the task of breast-feeding her 2-year-old daughter, Lourdes Maria Ciccone Leon.
In the public eye almost nonstop since scoring with her first record, 1984's "Like a Virgin," Madonna has reached a

new level of fame with motherhood and her starring role in the movie musical "Evita."
Highlights of an interview with The Associated Press:
Q: You lobbied hard for the "Evita" lead. Why did this project mean so much to you?
A: First of all, it's a great role to play for any actress, and I was I feel because of that. And also I feel there were so many parallels about her life I could relate to, that I was sure I could capture her better than any other actress could.
Q: How much does your future as an actress depend on whether "Evita" is a success?
A: Unfortunately, a lot is tied up with this. The way the industry works... if you're not in a successful movie, you won't get the part. It

will affect the work I want in the future.
Q: Eva Peron's power was political. It seems you've sought a different kind of power — you've talked about influencing people through your work, through such projects as your book "Sex."
A: Well, I think I have done that, whether people like to admit it or not. As much as people disagree with what I was doing or were shocked by what I did, I think I provoked a dialogue, started it on its way. I think that's a good thing.
Q: The cult of celebrity seems to have reached a new level...
A: It's out of control.
Q: Any regrets?
A: Je ne regrette rien (I regret nothing), to quote (French singer) Edith Piaf. A good line to end on.

Pearl Jam may be stuck in a rut

BARCELONA, Spain — The five members of Pearl Jam will look a lot more comfortable in 24 hours when they perform before 8,000 cheering fans at the Palau Dols Exports arena than they do now as they gather after dinner in the lounge of their hotel for an interview.
On an off night in one of the most glamorous cities on any European tour itinerary, lead singer Eddie Vedder and his equally media-shy mates would rather be almost anywhere else. Yet Pearl Jam knows that it has some explaining to do.
The question throughout the rock world: Are Pearl Jam's days as a multiplatinum act over?
With album sales slumping and its credibility being questioned, Pearl Jam is the subject of widespread discussion.
Quipped one industry veteran: "Pearl Jam always said they didn't want to be stars. Well, it looks they may soon have their wish."
That possibility seemed unthinkable as recently as six months ago when the Seattle band was the toast of the record industry, having racked up \$250 million in album sales in five years despite turning its back on videos, interviews, marathon tours and other promotional activities long considered essential to success in the pop world.
"Pearl Jam seemed to feel invincible when it declared war in

1994 on Ticketmaster, vowing to use alternative ticketing systems rather than support a company that it maintained charged fans excessive service fees — a move Ticketmaster called a "marketing play."
Then things appeared to start unraveling.
The first hint of trouble was the grumbling last year of frustrated fans who complained they were unable to play in premier rock venues such as the Forum in Los Angeles because those facilities have exclusive contracts with Ticketmaster — the band sometimes scheduled its few dates in out-of-the-way places that proved to be logistical nightmares. The band was called everything from arrogant to naive.
The shock, however, came in September when the group's fourth album, "No Code," sold only 367,000 copies in the United States in its first week.
Rolling Stone magazine went for the jugular in an October cover story that suggested that Vedder, who has spoken in interviews of a troubled childhood, was actually a popular student in high school, active in drama classes. The implication was his whole anti-rock-star persona was an act.
To some, all these events sug-

gest that Pearl Jam is at a crisis point — at least commercially.
"I think they are still a very, very important band culturally, but they've got to rethink the way they promote themselves if they want to continue to be one of the big players," said one executive who has no business ties to the band or its label, Epic Records. "The way it is now, they are hurting themselves off from their fans. With some changes, however, they could be as big as ever. It's their choice."

Highland rallies late to beat Bruins

TWIN FALLS — In the books, Highland's 55-51 Region III boys' basketball victory over Twin Falls Thursday will go down as another win for the top-ranked, undefeated defending state champion.

A closer look at those books will reveal that the two teams were as close as teams could be without shared income tax forms and a two-car garage. . . . Twenty-one field goals apiece. Four 3-pointers each. Eleven team fouls to rattle. The game had the statistical balance of a rain-out.

But it was the same problem that the Bruins (4-3; 1-2 in region) have experienced all season long — maintaining the lead — that prevented their upset of the No. 1 Rams (6-0, 3-0).
"We've got to find a way to win it in the fourth quarter," Bruin coach Dan Vogt said. "We did it against Hillcrest, but when we got into region games against Pocatello and (Highland), we couldn't."

Highland outscored Twin Falls 18-6 in the final eight minutes of play and held the lead for just three of the 32 minutes, but as Highland coach Chris Frost noted, "the kids came through when we needed it."

Team captain Joe Green hit a 3-pointer after the Rams grabbed an offensive rebound from a free throw, which gave Highland a 52-51 lead. Highland added three free throws in the final minute and a half as the Bruins struggled to get possession.

Ben Kohring's attempt at his third 3-pointer of the night came up short of the rim as the final seconds ticked away and the Bruins evened their home record at 2-2.

Kohring scored seven straight points in the first quarter as the Bruins took an 11-6 lead. Todd Welch smacked the final Ram shot out of bounds to protect the 16-12 first-quarter lead.

While the Bruins were getting scoring from over — trays from Kohring and Eric Riggan, tough play in the paint from Mark Thrashi and a smooth base-

line move from Jake Robertson — the Rams were limited to the perimeter, scoring eight of their 12 points from just inside the arc or beyond it.

Kohring finished the half with 10 of his game-high 16 points as Twin Falls led 33-29 at intermission.

The Bruins then held Highland to just

two field goals in seven minutes as they built their lead to 45-37 after three quarters.

Highland finally exploited its inside game, tying the match with three minutes to play with quick passes under the basket to Brandon Mickelson, who scored six of his eight points in the final period.

Gators demolish Seminoles, 52-20

NEW ORLEANS — Steve Spurrier can stop complaining.

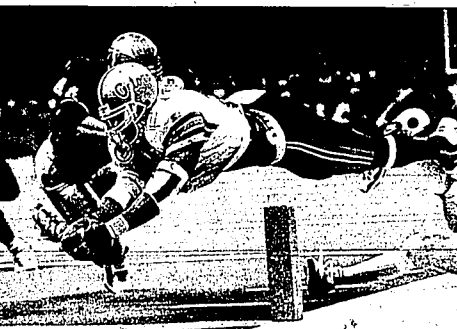
Throwing out of the shotgun, Danny Wuerffel delivered more hits than he got Thursday night, leading No. 3 Florida to a 52-20 victory over No. 1 Florida State in the Sugar Bowl and an almost certain first national championship.

The Heisman Trophy winner shook off brutal shots all night and came through with three touch-down passes to Ike Hilliard and a 16-yard scoring run that helped the Gators average two defenses with one win.

Just 33 days ago, the Seminoles (11-1) ranked the Gators out of the No. 1 ranking with a 24-21 win in Tallahassee.

In the rematch, just the 11th time two teams have met in the same season, the Gators not only avenged that loss, but wiped out last year's 62-24 whipping by Nebraska in the title game at the Fiesta Bowl.

The Associated Press Top 25 will be well released Friday morning, but with the top two teams having lost in bowls, the Gators (12-1) are likely to win the title with their record-breaking performance. Wuerffel withstood everything the

Seminoles threw at him, including All-American ends Peter Boulware and Reinard Wilson, as Spurrier devised a shotgun offense that allowed running backs to remain in the backfield for pass protection.

Since the loss to Florida State, Spurrier has accused the Seminoles of

late hits and dirty play against Wuerffel, who was sacked six times and intercepted three times.

In the game that counted most, though, Wuerffel was 18-of-34 for 306 yards as the Gators scored more points than any other team in Sugar Bowl history.

Western Nebraska fielded two 7-foot-2 twins and a 6-9 Lithuanian and controlled the boards, outbounding CSI 31-18 in the first half and holding the Eagles to just four offensive boards.

The loss was the second in three games for the Eagles, who will undoubtedly slip a few spots from their No. 7 ranking in the national poll.

Miguel Indurain, 'Pocket Hercules' announce retirements

"Pocket Hercules" needed only a few seconds to win his third Olympic title. Miguel Indurain was in the spotlight for three whole weeks for his fifth Tour de France triumph.

Yet Naim Suleymanoglu, the extroverted Turkish weightlifter, and Miguel Indurain, the modest cyclist from Spain, had much in common, and on Thursday both announced their retirements.

They were national heroes. Suleymanoglu would be carried through the streets on the shoulders of his countrymen after he had triumphed at Olympics or world championships. Equally, the Spaniards loved Indurain and follow his name whenever he appeared in Spain.

They both won their last major titles at the Atlanta Olympics — Suleymanoglu in the 141-pound competition and Indurain in the time trial.

Both appeared unbeatable in their specialty. Indurain won his first championship title in 1995 and an Olympic gold medal a year after. He became the first rider to win the Tour de France five

times in a row when he triumphed in 1995 by his biggest margin.

He became Spain's most famous sports figure and some would argue the greatest sportsman the country has ever produced. That in a country where soccer is easily the dominant sport.

"I've dedicated enough time to professional cycling," Indurain said Thursday. "After deliberating this decision for a long time, I believe I have made the best decision for myself and my family."

Indurain almost seemed out of place in the flashy, big-money world of international sports and kept himself low key.

"It is not easy to forget all that Miguel has done, but in the end we will remember Miguel the person more than the cyclist," said Abraham Olano, 1995 world road champion.

"The public knows him as an athlete, but his teammates and friends who have been with him have always said he is a fine person and he always treated his teammates very well," said Ramon Gonzalez Arriena, who rode for Indurain with Banesto.

Others were amazed by Indurain the cyclist.

"There have been years, in which I was myself stunned by the almost perfect performance of Miguel Indurain who, during the Tour de France never gave the impression of failing," said the race director, Jean-Marie LeBlanc. "He is a champion who perfectly served his sport."

"Pocket Hercules," only 4-foot-11 and 141 pounds but capable of lifting three times his weight, would sit quietly behind the stage, deliberately missing his turn, as his rivals attempted breaking lifts to try and beat the little man.

When they could lift no more,

Suleymanoglu would make his first appearance. He would offer more weights on the bar and lift it with ease, a broad smile spreading across his face as he held some 400 pounds above his head.

His rivals gasped in awe. For Suleymanoglu, it was another world record and another gold medal. In Atlanta he became the first weightlifter to win three Olympic titles, his first coming at Seoul in 1988 after he had defeated from the Bulgarian team to become a Turk.

While Indurain, 32, believes he could get himself into shape to win an unprecedented sixth Tour de France and beat five-time winners Eddie Merckx, Jacques Anquetin and Bernard Hinault, Suleymanoglu, 30, said he couldn't hang around until the next Olympics in 2000.

"Weightlifting has given me a lot, and it has given me a lot of joy," he said. "But for now I only have one goal — to rest for a long while and catch up on all that I have missed out on in my youth."

"My next target would have been the Sydney games. But I cannot remain in active weightlifting for four more years."

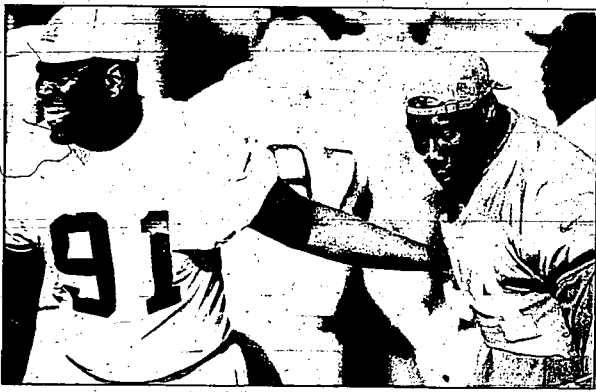
But the experience factor won't be decisive. For this isn't a three-time Super Bowl champion against a bunch of expansion neophytes.

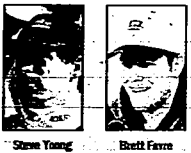

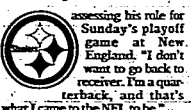

imagine it," Rubin said. By virtue of its 2-1 win, the United States finished on top of Group A in the round-robin competition and will face either South Africa, Romania or Switzerland in Saturday's title match. It is the first time since 1991 the Americans have made the final.

Gimelstob and Rubin were paired on the American team after Richey Reneberg withdrew because his wife was overdue with their first child.

Ranked only 155th in the world and a pro since June, Gimelstob, of Livingston, N.J., flew direct from a vacation in Miami Beach into Australia, playing his first match only 12 hours after his arrival.

"I played well all week (in singles) and lost some close ones, so it is nice to come through and win," Gimelstob said.

TORONTO (AP) — Shareef Abdur-Rahim of the Vancouver Grizzlies and Kerry Kittles of the New Jersey Nets shared the NBA's rookie of the month award for December.

Abdur-Rahim averaged 18.9 points, 7.5 rebounds and 2.2 assists per game in December as the Grizzlies went 4-10, tying the most number of wins in a month in the franchise's history.

The third selection in last June's draft, he ranked first in rebounds and third in scoring

and blocked shots among rookies last month.

Kittles, the eighth pick in the draft, averaged 19.9 points, 4.0 rebounds and 2.7 assists per game while leading all rookies in steals with 2.33 per game.

Other candidates considered were Boston's Antoine Walker, Houston's Matt Maloney, Indiana's Erick Dampier, Milwaukee's Ray Allen, Minnesota's Stephen Marbury and Philadelphia's Allen Iverson.

Brown to leave LSU after season

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Dale Brown, assailing college sports as riddled with greed and no longer a place for amateurs, is retiring as LSU's basketball coach after the season.

"When I entered coaching 43 years ago, athletics was a component of education," he said Thursday. "Today it's about making money and winning big. There is a professional intensity creeping into intercollegiate sports."

The news conference was packed with players, former players and supporters, some sobbing loudly. Athletic director Joe Diermeier was there.

Shaquille O'Neal, the Los Angeles Lakers star and most prominent player to play for Brown, said in a statement:

"Coach Brown taught me a lot about the game of basketball and life. He's had a tremendous impact on my career and the success I've had. Dale was great for college basketball and I wish him the best of luck."

Brown, who has been called "Billy Graham in tennis shoes" and Mr. Motivator, has long been given to high-flying rhetoric and grandiose analogies. On Thursday, he cited Walt Whitman, Nelson Mandela, Jonas Salk, Martin Luther King and Pope John Paul II and St. Ignace.

Brown, 61, is in his 25th season at LSU. He took over the basketball program in 1972 at a school that traditionally cared only for football and built it into one of the most successful in the Southeastern Conference.

He led the Tigers to the NCAA tournament 13 times and to the Final Four twice. He is the winningest coach in LSU history and the second winningest in the SEC.

With Brown as coach, LSU appeared in 10 straight NCAA tournaments and 15 straight national tournaments before the last two years of his reign.

Earlier this season, there was speculation Brown would be forced out if he did not produce a winner this year. At that time, Brown said he planned on serving the last two years of his contract and wanted a chance to rebuild the team before retiring.

The Tigers are 7-6 entering conference play, which begins this weekend. Brown's teams have gone 35-48 over their last three seasons and have failed to finish above fifth place in the SEC West.

"Some will think I was pressured into my decision, but they couldn't be more wrong," Brown said.

The lack of commitment by athletes to education has grown, said Brown, who has lost a string of players en route to the NBA, including O'Neal, Mahmoud Abdul-Rauf, Stanley Roberts, Randy Livingston and Ronnie Henderson.

Also, for the first time, the IRS is allowing telephone filers to get refunds directly deposited. For paper filers, a space on returns allows the filer to request direct deposit without submitting a separate form, as necessary last year.

Another change for 1996 returns: Exemptions for yourself, your spouse and dependents have been increased by \$50 to \$2,550; the standard deduction by \$100 to \$4,000 for single people and by \$150 to \$5,700 for couples.

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Mortgage rates mixed; 30-year fixed up a bit

WASHINGTON — Thirty-year, fixed-rate mortgages averaged 7.67 percent this week, up from 7.64 percent last week according to a national survey released Thursday by the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp.

It was the highest since Dec. 19, when rates averaged 7.74 percent.

On one-year adjustable rate mortgages, lenders were asking an average initial rate of 5.56 percent, down from 5.57 percent last week.

Ameritech seeks approval for long distance in Michigan

WASHINGTON — Ameritech asked federal regulators Thursday for permission to provide long-distance service to its local customers in Michigan, the first of the nation's Bell companies to make such a request.

MCI and other long-distance companies were the first to assert that Chicago-based Ameritech had not satisfied federal requirements for the move.

A law enacted last February permits local Bell companies to provide long-distance service, and Ameritech is either offering or plans to offer such service in more than 40 states where it does not provide local phone service.

The real fight is over the Bell companies providing long-distance service to their own states. That is where the Bells see their biggest opportunity to offer one-stop communications shopping most cheaply and efficiently.

It is also where the entry requirements are the toughest and the potential the greatest. The federal Communications Commission, with input from the Justice Department, has 90 days to act on the Ameritech request.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Measure a thousand times and cut once... Turkish proverb

Today's aggressively bid slam is a good one. Unfortunately, many would fail and transfer the blame to bad breaks. Those who fail consider only a routine plan. Those who succeed, visualize making dummy the master hand (dummy reversal). East wins his heart ace, returns the suit, and South ruffs. After a quick count of potential winners, South sees 12 easy tricks with good breaks. He counts five trumps in his own hand, the diamond ace, a diamond ruff, and five club winners — a total of 12 tricks. Unfortunately, the club suit breaks 4-2 and the slam falls one short, even after South manages two diamond ruffs in dummy. A 5-3 club break offers only a 36 percent chance.

To make the slam, South must visualize making dummy the master hand. Instead of ruffing his losers in dummy, he must ruff dummy's losers with his own trumps. Dummy's trumps are used to draw the enemy trumps. After ruffing the second heart, South should cash his trump ace and cross to dummy in trumps. He ruffs dummy's last heart and cashes the ace and king of clubs. Next, he ruffs a low club with the club queen (trying to cash the club queen would prove fatal), and crosses to dummy's diamond ace. Dummy can now draw East's last trump, and South can claim the remaining tricks with dummy's high trump and the good clubs.

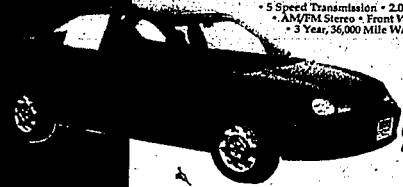

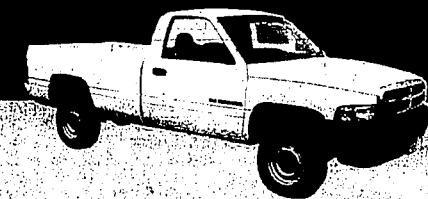

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CBS looking to 'Orleans' to add more spice to its lineup

CBS has a nice, warm getaway destination in mind for viewers this week: It's the land of Tabasco, crawfish and Mardi Gras. The natives call it "Nawlin's," but without the "New" the cadence changes to "O'-LEENS."

"Orleans" debuts Wednesday, Jan. 8, with a two-hour pilot. Six hourlong episodes air on Wednesdays beginning Jan. 15. Producer John Sacret Young ("China Beach") is co-creator of the series with Toni Graphia, on whose family background the show is based. Graphia first worked with Young as a writer on "China Beach."

"I'm from here," Graphia says on the phone from the series' location set, "and the

show is inspired by my family. My dad is a judge, and I have one brother who's a lawyer, and one brother who's a highway patrolman."

Larry Hagman ("Dallas") plays Hon. Luther Charbonnet, a divorced father of four. One son, Clade (Brett Cullen), serves on the city police force. Another, Jesse (Michael Reilly Burke), is new to the city prosecutor's office. Daughter Paulette (Colleen Flynn) is the iconoclast, a recovering drug user who runs a riverboat casino. A second daughter, missing for 16 years, was kidnapped when she was 6 years old. That incident led to the judge's divorce.

Now Luther's love interest is one of his former students, defense

attorney Rosalee Clark (Vanessa Bell Calloway). Like the Harley-Davidson motorcycle he rides, the fact that his lady friend is black is a sign of Luther's status as a new man in the Old South.

"On the beach, His Honor's maxim is, 'There's only one way to settle this.'" Whether the question is if the crawfish crossed the road or if the burlesque dancer was legally nude, the judge finds a demonstration can be very informative.

But "Orleans" isn't "Law & Order" with a side of gumbo. It's more like what happens in a warm, moist petri dish.

As Cullen puts it, "The city is a gutter and a blooming

flower."

The pilot, written by Graphia, is steeped in nighttime soap opera conventions, with plenty of high rollers, backroom deals and shapely feminine silhouettes. Older brother Clade is a good but emotionally battered cop in a city rife with corruption. Paulette is a tough beauty, a self-appointed black sheep who might play dirty to get what she wants.

Young Jesse is a political and professional innocent. Raised in California by his mother, he returns to Louisiana with a prized surfboard.

His weakness is for his first cousin, lovely Renee Doucette (Lynette Walden), who is engaged to another man.

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Q: Why in the world would Woody Harrelson, who seems so nice, want to make a movie about Larry Flynt?—G.F.

A: Harrelson is nice but, in truth, has an edge side in person, which he works with yoga, meditation, crystals and other spiritual devices to control. Besides that, though, he wanted to do the part because he sees Flynt as an important crusader for freedom of speech, something that's also important to him, along with other causes.

As you're probably aware, Harrelson was arrested a few months ago for climbing San Francisco's Golden Gate Bridge to protest the lack of protection of Northern California's redwood forest. One charge was dropped, but he's due back in court on Jan. 14 on a trespassing charge if convicted. He could be sentenced to a year in jail.

Q: Who played Shirley Maes's rival in "The Evening Star"? I've never seen her before.—H.R.

A: The woman in question is Miranda Richardson, 38, an English actress who, like many colleagues before her, is adept at mimicking a Southern accent, in this case the Houston drawl of her rich divorcee character, Patsy.

It's Richardson's first entry into mainstream movies. For the past few years she's turned in critically lauded performances in less widely seen, usually English films, such as "The Crying Game," "Enchanted

April," "Damage" and "Tom and Viv," for which she was nominated for an Oscar.

Next up is "The Apostle," co-starring Farrah Fawcett and Wilford Brimley. It's directed by Robert Duvall.

Q: Is it true that brothers Randy and Dennis Quaid aren't speaking to one another? What happened?—G.M.

A: There are family problems in the Quaid family, but the trouble isn't between the brothers, it's between their wives. Reportedly, Meg Ryan and Randy's wife, Evi, are on the outs, with Evi accusing Meg of spreading lies about her. It certainly made the holidays a little tense for all concerned.

Q: I heard that there was a fight over Jerry Garcia's estate after his death. Are the other members of the Grateful Dead squabbling?—J.L.

A: No, but they're practically the only ones who aren't. After the Grateful Dead guitarist's death in August 1995, his widow, Deborah, stopped announcing payments to his ex-wife Carolyn, also known as Grateful Dead lore as "Mountain Girl," claiming that she had manipu-

lated him into promising her \$250,000 a year for 20 years or a \$5 million payment. Needless to say, the ex-Mrs. Garcia is protesting.

Other ex-lovers and business partners are also suing for pieces of the estate that they claim are rightfully theirs, to a tune overall of \$30 million. The free-spirited Garcia would have been appalled.

Q: I thought "Tin Cup" was the best movie Kevin Costner had done in years. Will he be doing any more sports movies?—E.K.

A: Others obviously agree; he's up for a Golden Globe for that performance. And the lesson wasn't lost on Costner, who's due to return to an area that's been very good for him in films—baseball.

Following his successes in the movies "Bull Durham" and "Field of Dreams," he'll star as a washed-up pitcher reflecting on his career in "For the Love of the Game." It's due to start filming sometime next year. First, he'll direct and star in a futuristic story called "The Postman"—not to be confused with the Italian im-

ported "Il Postino."

Q: Is David Bowie still making records?—L.H.

A: Like his generational colleagues Ted Stewart and Rod Stewart, Bowie just keeps on going.

He's due to turn 50 this week (Jan. 8). To celebrate, he is throwing a concert the next night at New York's Madison Square Garden as a benefit for the Save the Children Federation.

He also has a new album, "Earthling," due out Feb. 11. And watch for the video of his last movie, "Basquiat," the story of the life of the young 1980s artist; in it Bowie turns in a remarkable performance as Andy Warhol.

Q: Is it true that Winona Ryder is going to be in the next "Alien" movie? Why? She's such a serious actress.—G.N.

A: Ryder, 25, and currently riding the tide of praise from her recent performance in "The Crucible," has a warm spot in her heart for the "Alien" films. She saw the first one when she was 10, and it had a huge impact on her because she hadn't seen a woman in the hero's role, as the alien-fighting Ripley,

played by Sigourney Weaver, certainly was.

So, inasmuch as she's co-starring with Weaver in "Alien: Resurrection," which starts shooting this spring, the only drawback is that to bulk up to alien-fighting shape, she's had to work out with a trainer for six hours a day.

Q: I've admired Cliff Robertson for years, but I haven't seen him in much lately. Is he still making movies?—F.R.

A: The 71-year-old actor, best known for his role in the movie "P.T. 109" and his Oscar-winning role in "Charly," went through a period of exile from Hollywood, in the late 1970s and early 1980s. He was a whistle-blower in a studio scandal, so his name hasn't been seen in much around then.

In recent years, he's done some TV work, such as the miniseries "Judith Krantz's Dazzle," and in films such as "Renaissance Man," "Escape from L.A.," and the upcoming "Assignment Berlin."

But he clearly doesn't think much of the current state of Hollywood, or at least the current slate of projects he's being offered. He was recently quoted explaining that he is resigned to the roles he's playing, often in less cerebral action films, but that he hopes the industry will move on and do better projects.

Q: Whenever you see Melanie Griffith these days, she's standing around at Antonio Banderas' movie openings. What is she going to do next?—E.H.

A: Well, Banderas, 36, has had a lot of movie openings, and just opening "Evita" took them all over the world. Plus, Griffith, 38, was getting back in shape after the birth of their daughter in September.


But talks seem to be ongoing for her to co-star with Chaz Palminteri, 45, in "Reconcilable Doute," a political thriller about a female attorney who takes the case of a man accused of killing a Supreme Court justice and stumbles into a wider political conspiracy. That voice in a courtroom should be interesting.

Q: I've always wondered how stars keep their kids from becoming spoiled, considering how famous their lives are.—E.K.

A: The same way any nonfamous parent does: by not giving in to all demands, although stars' children do have lofter lives because of the lifestyle they observe. One Christmas-list conflict of this past holiday season, for instance, involved the daughters of Arnold Schwarzenegger, 43, a man who certainly gets anything he wants.

Five-year-old Christina faxed him a list of her Christmas requests; 7-year-old Katherine announced that she wanted her own American Express card. Despite their ability to indulge both, Schwarzenegger and wife Maria Shriver gave in to only a few of the items on Christina's list, and Katherine has to leave home without it; she didn't get her card.

Soap sums Set Groves

Noone plays a delightful character named Aunt Bette who, she says, can be described in nine words: "Hang on to your hats, guys. Bette has arrived." Bette is fun-loving, a mite mischievous, but always caring and loving. Not since Auntie Mame (played on stage by Angela Lansbury, and on film by Rosalind Russell and Lucille Ball) have we seen so delightfully eccentric a character as the beautiful, and sometimes misbehaving Aunt Bette.

"She is a little outrageous," Noone says, "but I try very hard not to make her a cartoon. I want her to be someone whom you can believe, and also be a lot of fun." Kathleen, who has two new features coming out, "Citizen Ruth" with Laura Dern, and "Skeletons" with Ron Silver, was a rather full dance card these days. Besides "Sunset Beach," she'll continue to appear regularly on "Party of Five" and "Ellen." She also manages to stay involved with her first love, the stage ("I love the connection with a live audience") and, of course, there are the good causes, such as Animal Rescue and Special Olympics, to which she devotes much of her time. As a matter of fact, her dog, Gallagher, (who was barking in the background) came from Animal Rescue.

"He's a wonderful dog," Noone says. "He barks because he feels he has to protect me. He'll also bark if he sees another dog go by because that's what he had to do to survive a father desperate life be-

fore he was rescued." I asked Kathleen how she prepares herself to play each of her current roster of TV characters. "Ellie, the woman I play on 'Party of Five,' is a little hard-edged, very conservative. She's somewhat different from me. So I just take her way down and think very upright, very controlling. Of course, I know people like her in my own life, and I try to use them."

"The character on 'Ellen...' is a woman who can appear to be very sweet, very kind, very nice — and then comes that last line, and," Noone says, "there's a change! So, here we have someone who in her own sweet, charming way can also be very controlling."

As for Aunt Bette? "Oh, I just let myself think of all the fun things I love to do, and there she is." Kathleen Noone started her career in music (she was a trombone player who switched to singing because she wouldn't have to carry the instrument around) and spent many years in both dramatic and musical theater. She was also on "Knots Landing" for three years, and has guested in any number of episodic productions. However, it was in daytime where Noone won an Emmy (for her role as Ellen Shepherd Dalton Chandler on "All My Children") and began building her loyal cadre of admirers. After 11 years on "AMC," Kathleen went west and immediately found work in nighttime dramas.

Aaron Spelling launches his first daytime soap for NBC

LOS ANGELES (AP)—After producing more than 3,000 hours of prime-time programming over a 40-year television career, Aaron Spelling is plying new waters: daytime TV.

Introducing "Sunset Beach," presented in the finest Spelling tradition of beautiful people doing nasty things in exotic settings. But don't call it an afternoon version of "Baywatch."

Why's he exploring daytime? "I don't know why because it was there," he replied, facetiously. "Actually, the idea for "Sunset Beach" emerged a couple years ago in a chat with Don Ohmeyer, president of NBC West Coast.

"And then, I started thinking about it and you know my daughter (actress Tony Spelling), she's crazy about daytime, she watches everything," Spelling said. "So I thought it might be an interesting idea and we came up with "Sunset Beach."

"Like an idiot I asked Don if he'd be ordering 13 or 22 episodes," Spelling said, referring to the standard production contracts for nighttime series.

"And he said, 'I'm ordering 230 hours,' so that was my first shock," Spelling said.

But daytime is not really that much of a stretch for Spelling. After all, this is the man who brings us such salacious nighttime fare as "Melrose Place" and "Savannah."

And who can forget the wild and woolly "Hawaii Five-O" reigned in Spelling's 1980s hit "Dynasty," which he created along with then-partner Leonard Goldberg?

Videotapes of the heavily promoted "Sunset Beach" weren't available for review before its debut on Monday.

But if you've watched NBC at all recently, you couldn't have missed those alluring ads depicting a format some-

thing along these lines: Gorgeous, bare-chested men walking seductively along a beach or embracing shapely women in skimpy bikinis, all against a personally golden sunset.

Looks like daytime "Baywatch" to me, Aaron. "No, gosh, I think I'd slit my throat," Spelling said — before confessing to having two lifeguards in the cast.

But while "Baywatch" films its scenes along the star-studded shores of Santa Monica and Malibu, "Sunset Beach" shoots its exteriors 30 miles down the coast at less-glamorous Seal Beach.

With its pier and boardwalk, the quaint Orange County town radiates a feeling that "everybody on that beach knows each other," Spelling said.

That helps the soap achieve one of its main objectives, said head writer and co-creator Robert Garrow.

"What we tried to do is create a community, make the town itself a character," he said. "Kind of like how Giedy, Alaska, was in 'Northern Expo-

sure.' It's a special place where people gravitate to and where the people live a little larger than life."

The town also works well, Garrow explained, in promoting the legend behind "Sunset Beach," which goes something like this: "In the 1920s, a brokehearted but handsome European aristocrat, Armando Deschanel, came to Southern California determined to start a new life. At Sunset Beach, a beautiful woman dressed in black appeared at the water's edge. Basking in the beauty of the setting sun, they fell in love. Armando built a beachfront castle as a monument to their eternal love. The castle no longer stands, but the legend continues."

With this in mind, Spelling went about inhabiting the modern-day "Sunset Beach" with the typical daytime fare: a high-powered defense attorney (Sam Behrens) possessing the moral code of a snake, his beautiful but indifferent wife (Lesley Anne Down), a mysterious European (Ashley Hamilton) — the spitting

image of town founder Armando Deschanel, a crooked cop (Peter Barton), two male lifeguards (Casey Mitchell and Casey George) and the town's confident (Leigh Taylor-Young), who owns Elaine's Waffle House and keeps the legend alive.

And let's not forget Randy Spelling, as the rebellious son of wealthy parents.

"Who's that?" the elder Spelling asked coyly.

Randy Spelling, who also was cast in his father's now-defunct show "Malibu Shores," won't confess much about his role. "Well, my mom's an alcoholic. I don't get along with my father, and there is a murder that happens and I am semi a part of that. That's all I can say," said the 13-year-old.

Despite his TV veteran status, the elder Spelling actually admits to being a little anxious about his new project. "I'm going to be a nervous wreck," he said. "I hear it's very hard to launch in daytime. We'll find out."

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Starting Monday the man beside Katie is Matt

NEW YORK (AP) — Next Monday will be the biggest day of Matt Lauer's life, his dream come true, as history is made at the venerable "Today" show and a new chapter in morning television begins.

On the other hand, Lauer would prefer that "Today" viewers not go blowing things all over proportion.

Fact: Next Monday at 7 a.m. EST, Lauer will officially succeed Bryant Gumbel, the "Today" host who took office early in the Reagan presidency and now leaves NBC's 45-year-old program in its best shape ever (including its 5.4-week-and-counting ratings dominance over ABC rival "Good Morning America"). And then?

"It's not so much a matter of how the audience reacts to Matt, because Matt's been there," says Matt. "It's a matter of how they react to Bryant's NOT being there" (an absence that more commences with a final "good bye" on Friday, then a new job, as yet undisclosed).

"For the moment," Lauer sums up, "I'm the footnote to the story." "I've just sort of gracious to a fault, but he has a point. By now, he is a known quantity to "Today" viewers.

He first substituted as host four years ago and since then has filled in scores of times for Gumbel (most recently, last week and Monday) as well as for co-anchor Katie Couric.

He became an official member of the team in January 1994 as news anchor, which calls for reciting headlines, conducting the occasional interview, and swapping joyful quips with his "Today" confreres on a daily basis.

Self-described as "a quiet study and a cool head," Lauer, who turned 39 on Monday, has consistently displayed on-air polish and a prismatic appeal that seems to transmit to each viewer the appropriate color (pal, brother,

boyfriend, son).

Such skills were honed during years in TV news and talk at the local level. But it was a career that seemed prematurely at its end in 1991 when he was dismissed as host of an interview program on New York City's WWOR. Weeks later, with bills to pay, he applied for a job at the Westchester home as a tree surgeon.

But before he got his hands on a chain saw, he was hired as anchor of a WNBC newscast. The "Today" show, with its national audience, was just a few floors away.

A year ago when Gumbel had announced he was stepping down from "Today" on his 15th anniversary, Lauer seemed a shoo-in as successor. As the months passed and no other candidate emerged, his promotion seemed all the more a slam dunk.

Finally, making no more news than if it had confirmed Clinton's reelection, NBC News two weeks ago officially named Lauer as co-host, joining Couric. Weathercaster Al Roker remains on board of course, and a replacement news anchor will be sought unless Bud (Stanley Anderson), ABC, is chosen.

Now that it's all in the open, let there be no doubt that Lauer is psyched.

"I probably have not been so vocal about it up to now, simply because I didn't want to sound like, 'Hey, Bryant, I'm gunning for your job,'" Lauer says of the role-mold-turned-friend with whose family he has spent the past three Christmases. "But I've always thought he had the best job in TV."

Starting Monday that job is Lauer's, as he claims the chair Gumbel filled so long for so long, and begins, a bit gingerly, the process of recasting the irreplaceable. "I do know I'm going to take a day or two to get down how deeply loved Bryant Gumbel is into the fabric of this show," Lauer says, "and I think there'll be a time when his absence will be greatly noticeable and maybe my own emergence might not be so noticeable.

"Six months from now, people are going to wake up and say, You know, the 'Today' show has changed in tone." I'm not sure which direction it's gonna go. But it will be a different show.

"But that's a bunch of to-come after us very hard," he adds.

"But the important thing for me is not to go on the air and force it, not to say, 'I've arrived,' but just to take it slowly, to let it evolve.

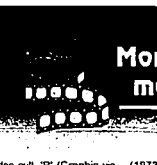

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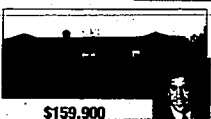
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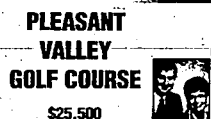
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
