ordinances.



# Cancer rates show higher in E. Idaho

TWIN FALLS - Brain cancer rates as statistically higher than expected in six eastern Idaho counties, according to a recent state study.

The state is preparing additional study of cancer rates in the area to find out

why.
"We know the rate is elevated, but we
don't know why," said Christopher
Johnson, a research analyst with the
state Department at Health and
Welfare.

Welfare.
The causes of brain cancers are not well known, said the author of the November report.
The study found elevated cancer rates in the small Binghaim County town of Moreland and in Bingham, Bonneville, Butte, Clark, Jefferson and Madison counties.

"Persons in the Moreland analysis area experienced significantly more assess of brain cancer than would be expected based upon Bingham County or state rates, "the report sold the Bingham County or state with the Bingham County or statewister than Bingham County or statewist rates. The six-county area showed 110 case-of malignant brain cancers. Statistically, 89 cases would be expected. That is significant, the report says.

State epidemiologist Dr. Jesse Greenblatt said the rates are alarmum. In a small population, however, one or two cases can skew results, so the statistics are tested by dropping one case still left. The cause of about 81 percent of the cancers is unknown. Among the hower causes for the remaining 20 percent are radiation, pesticides and other chem cals.

Other hypothetical causes have been

causes for the remaining 20 perceiv acruadiation, pesticides and other chemical causes have been suggested as well – cellular phones, healt voltage power lines and the artificial sweetners asparation, Greenblatt said. The state will study the statistics to look for trends in the six counties, to look for clusters of cancer cases and associations with potential causes, in geographic areas and at the same times. The study is not expected to find causes for the brain cancer rates, but might identify people who not do near toxic theory of the properties of the state of the data from such studies, he said: Some people exposed to cancer move, so they are exposed to the disease-and are diagnosed in Idaho.



# Light snow falls in northern states as storms roll into Southwest

Snow was widely scattered across the northern states Tuesday while isolated showers developed over parts of the Southwest.

The Plains states, however, had their first generally sunny day since last week.

Light snow flurries dotted the northern Plains and Great Lakes, from Montana and Wyoming to upstate New York. A few flakes also fell in parts of West Virginia.

In the Southwest, an area of low pressure was slid-

Virginia.

In the Southwest, an area of low pressure was sliding across Arizona and producing showers over central and southern sections of the state.

That precipitation was in the form of rain at elevations of less than 6,000 feet. Up to 3 inches of snow
was possible on higher elevations in central Arizona
and in the White Mountains of east-central Arizona.


Thunderstorms also were possible in parts of Arizona, and the area of low pressure was expected to carry its rain and snow into New Mexico duning the night and into Teast today.

Just to the east of that weather system, make air Mexico into southern and Mexico into the Castales and Sierra Nevada, and the rain was Eisely to reach across central California on Wednesday.

Elsewhere, snow showers were forecast overnight at higher elevinions of New England, with accumulations expected to be less than 3 inches.

BOISE (AP) — Interior Secretary Bruce Babbirt launched a campaign Tuesday for selective burning and thinning of up to 2 million acres of overgrown federal forest to reduce the threat of catastrophic wildfires.

"But it is not enough," he told several hundred people ar a Boise-State University speech. "I chall-lenge Congress to help us escalate the restorative use of fire to make forests aster, healthier and more resilient to reduce costs, dangers, wildland fires." I Rep. Helen Chenoweth, R. Rep. "He's talking about using a man-agement practice that costs money rather than using one that earns money," Chenoweth said, "While prescribed burns are indeed an acceptable tool in certain cases for forest and rangeland management, they are definitely not the only tool."

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



"But these trees are not cansing the fire hazard, and in most areas the old-growth has already been overcut," Babbitt said. "To take away the incentive to go after the remnant old growth we must plan timber sales based firmly on science."

"These sales will help pay for the fires needed to keep the forest healthy," he said. "Life is not as profitable as it once was, but there are markets for this timber."

The enzyme, creatine kinase, is released when the heart muscle is damaged and shows up in the blood six to eight hours after an angioplasty, a procedure for opening clogged heart arteries.

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# Panel urges anti-missile air protection

WASHINGTON (AP) — A White House commission on air safety is recommending that the federal government find ways to protect commercial airplanes against missile attacks — while still insisting such

The White House Commission on Aviation Safety and Security sug-gested assigning a federal task force to develop a plan on protecting civil-ian flights from surface-to-air missile attacks and finding ways to keep such missiles out of the hands of ter-

attracts and maning ways as year shall missing such missiles out of the hands of terrorists idea is among 53 recommendations on making air rawel safer that the commission plans to present to President Clinton today. The Associated Press obtained a draft of the commission's findings Tuesday. In general, the commission concludes that modernization of air traffic control systems should be sped up, with the goal of completing it by 2005. It also calls for reducing the rate of airplane accidents by "a factor of five" in the next 10 years, through a major upgrade of Federal Aviation Administration safety and security measures.

Commissioners said that while the risk of dying in a plane crash remains low, reducing the accident rate is crucial. They noted a projection by Boeign Co. that unless the global accident rate is reduced, by 2015 an airliner will crash somewhere on Earth nearly every week. 



# Twin Falls School Board votes to upgrade classes

TWIN FALLS — Without public comment Tuesday evening, Twin Falls School Board members voted to spend \$812,518 on classroom technology for the Internet, e-mail, telephone and, someday, video transmissions.

Superintendent Terrell Donicht warned the public that "there will definitely be bugs" upon installation of the equipment, but that teachers and students eventually will reap rewards from the technology.

"Once they become accustomed to it, they probably will wonder how they got along without it," Donicht said.
The School Board followed administrators' recommendations to purchase mostly medium-priced equipment that will require the least maintenance. The board spent \$425,000 on 370 computers from Multi-Wave-Anson Co., \$186,357 on a telephone system for each school from Executione. Inc. and \$201,161 on data transmission equipment from Executione.

The purchases are the second phase

Executione.

The purchases are the second phase of the district's technology plant. Last year, the board spent \$528,144 on 285 computers and six severs. Eventually, officials want three to five computers in each classroom, a computer lab in each elementary, two labs in each junior high and a lab at Twin Falls. High School.

The districts the

The district hopes the technology will simplify communications between

parents and teachers, enhance student research; allow teachers at different schools to share instructional ideas and allow schools to share education videos and lectures between buildings through video broadcasting. Video capabilities are several years away, Donicht said.

In other business, the board approved an additional \$50,000 to remodel Anderson's Market on Main Avenue for Twin Falls' alternative school, Magic Valley High School.

Remodeling costs were estimated at \$300,000, but the district didn't figure extra costs for transferring the double-wide trailer that will house students' children for day care, setting up food service and adding cabinets, Donicht said.

The board also approved the state's review of the district's elementary and secondary schools' accreditation. This year, the elementary schools earned "perfect" scores on their accreditation, which is a state checklist to determine schools' safety and quality, Donicht said. The state is recommending merit status for Robert Stuart Junior High School.

Vera C. O'Leary Junior High School lost some accreditation points because five teachers have about four or five more students than they should, Donicht said. Six teachers don't have full professional "preparation," according to the state – two at Robert Stuart and four at Twin Falls High.

inspection at the Moritz campus in

Wood River Medical Center administrator Alan Stevenson said the cleanliness of both hospitals is a high priority,
but the recent incident points to a larger picture of staff shortages and old
buildings.

"We are finding it more difficult
everyday to maintain these two aging
facilities in a fiscally responsible manmer," he said. "These state deficiencies
reinforce the need for one new hospital
with state-of-the-art facilities and

Health and Welfare inspectors conducted an unannounced complaint

The move, considered a closed-door decision by critics, is on hold until April, when a remodel of the obstetrics department at Moritz is complete, Corrock said. 

# Growth retardants apply brakes to Mother Nature

A reader wants to know, "What are growth retardants and how are they used?"
Good question. Growers are using lots of new things on our plants today, and we'd like to know how they affect plants, as well as us.

we'd like to know how they affect plants, as well as us.
First of all, the term "growth retardant" isn't accurate. These hormones only help regulate growth. Growth regulators are used in these days of longer shipping and shell life. They occur naturally in plants (and animals), and scientists have figured out how to use them to our benefit.

If we planted some flower seeds and did nothing, they would jump right up and get their life cycle going. Plants want to thrive. Plant growers and breeders, though, start more seeds than we've ever-seem—and tend them carefully until they:

are at the right stage to be shipped, and possibly put them on a shelf somewhere until you take the flowers home. If the flowers were left to their own devices, they would probably be leggy and not all that pretty by the men you see them. The solution is to slow nature down. Just a little. Let's say, for example, that a grower put some growth regulator on some sinhias on April 1. These flowers were sown into middle of March; sinh

We see shorter, cooler spring and summer weather than wherever it is they print those little information tags in the plant pots.

As a result, we get flowers much later than the rest of the country, and flowers that almost never spread out as much as they would in, say, Texas.

When the tag says to plant 10 inches apart, space them only about half as far. Feed your flowers with a liquid soluble fertilizer labeled for that plant, and water before you see wilting. Finch off the spent blooms so that the plant can use all its energy on new flowers.

If the tag advises full mun, pick a sport-

where the plant gets sun all day. If you choose impatiens, which need shade, make sure you, don't put them out so soon that the ground isn't warmed up. And watch the watering: It's easier to promote root rot in shade where things stay wet for longer periods of time.

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

# Most furnace filters easy to replace and help keep home free of dust

Filters in warm-air furnaces and central air conditioners often get too little attention, but they have an important effect on the have an important effect on the form. Most homeowners know that a very dirty filter can impede the free fluw of air through the ducts, reducing the efficiency of the furnace, but there is less awareness of the comparative air-cleaning ability of various types of filters. Cleaner indoor air can help relieve some respiratory problems associated with houses that are closed up tight during both cold or hot weather.

Modern replaceable furnace/

electronic (wired) air cleaners,
which use an electric current to
create filtering action. Both types
of filters sift the air that passes



A: Woodpeckers choose their locations for several reasons. They drum against hard surfaces to establish their territory and carry out courtship rituals, and they make bigger holes for nesting.

. In any of these cases, there are several deterrents to try. However, if you suspect there is a nest with baby birds or eggs, wait until the birds have all left the nest before you take any action.

If the damage is concentrated in one spot, try taking a soft substance, such as cloth or foam rubber, over the area. Strips of aluminum foil or disposable pie tins lung in front of the damages area may also deter the wood peckers. A model of an owl or snake meant for scaring off birds is worth trying, too.

if the problem persists, you can try tacking nylon webbing, plastic or thick cloth (available at hardware stores) over your walls. It will be a little unsightly, but it can be removed once the

walls. It will be a little unsightly, but it can be removed once the woodpeckers get discouraged and move on to another site. Woodpeckers also drill into wood to look for insects. If your siding is providing the birds with food, they will keep coming back for more.



Her confidence stems from the fact that for, the first time in years, she's not dealing with problems or injuries.

She finished fourth in 1991 after spiking herself in the ankle while trying to avoid a collision with Tonya Harding during practice.

Her futher had a mild heart attack two days before the 1993 nationals and needed double bypass surgery. She came in third. During those years, she was also majoring in both psychology and communications at Baldwin-Wallace College, from which she graduated in 1994.
"I think the past couple of years, ever since graduating from college, I've been able to concentrate more on my skating," she said.

Proof that she hit her groove came last year, when she had her best finish at nationals, second bedtind Michelle Kwan. She followed that by finishing eighth at the world championships.

Now she's ready to challenge Kwan for the national title. Kwintkowskis's new long program, set to Hungarian Rhapsody No. 2, is different from anything she's ever done—technical yet emotional.

"I really love to get into this program," she said. "It's really fun to do." Still fun even at her advanced (for skaning) age; only Kathalenc Cutone (29) is older than Kwiatkowski in the women's competition, and Cutone's best finish\* at nationals is 11th in 1995.

Why keep skating? Kwiatkowski sees herself as the veteran whose experience is her best weapon in a sport dominanted by smilling, jumping enenagers like Kwan (16), 1995 champion Michel Bobek (19), Tara Lipinski (14) and Sydne Vogel (17).


