# Questions remain about Pit 9 project

## Subcontractor aims to complete cleanup effort

### Pit 9 at a glance

- Size — About one acre, eight feet deep.
- Used — From 1967 to 1969.
- Content — Plutonium and other radioactive materials and organic solvents along with parts of machinery and reactors; an old pickup truck bed.

**TWIN FALLS** — A multi-million-dollar project to clean up buried radioactive waste that threatens southern Idaho groundwater is on shaky ground.

After spending \$83 million, the Energy Department can't say for sure whether the project to clean up Pit 9 at the Idaho National Engineering and Environmental Laboratory will continue.

A major component of the project to dig up buried plutonium-contaminated waste failed last year. That leaves regulatory officials skeptical and the Energy Department facing fines. The project is up to 18 months behind schedule.

But nobody wants to see the project fail.

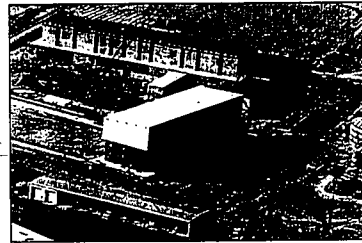
"We want to get the project back on track," INEEL spokesman Brad Bugger said this week. Wayne Pierre of the Environmental Protection Agency said there is still a need to find a way to dig up plutonium-

contaminated waste.

Subcontractor Lockheed Martin Advanced Environmental Systems, the Pocatello subsidiary of the company that operates the INEEL for the Energy Department, is committed to completing the project, spokesman Steve Harry said.

"Backing out of the project is not in the mix of options at this time," he said. The company expects to have a revised proposal and project schedule ready by the end of March or early April. Full scale tests were to have run in August 1996. The earliest those tests will run now is this fall or winter, or early in 1998.

Cleanup of Pit 9 is part of a December 1991 agreement with

# Wendell schools add up results from novel mathematics program

**WENDELL** — Victor Hidalgo, 10, clenched his eyes shut and rattled the dice in his hand hard enough to shake his entire body.

He rolled once. Twice. All he needed were two numbers which, when multiplied, total eight. That would complete a winning row on a multiplication bingo game he was playing with other students.

He tossed the dice across the table like

a gambler at craps. A third time, a fourth time. Nothing. His body sagged. He waited expectantly as other students took their turns.

The bell for recess sounded. It was his last chance to score. As the other students looked on, he shut his eyes and rolled his final roll.

"Yes!" he exclaimed as a two and a four rolled into view.

"All right, whoa, you did it," said his teacher, Mari Bennett, a Title One aide. Smiling, Victor slid his yellow square onto the numbered bingo card in the middle of the table. Victor is one of several dozen students benefiting from the HOSTS program, an effort by Wendell Elementary School to improve students' math skills.

School officials hope the program proves as successful as other recent

# Stakes high for Clinton in airline dispute

**WASHINGTON** — The stakes are sky high.

With the clock ticking toward a mid-night deadline, President Clinton faces a devil's choice in the American Airlines labor dispute: intervene and put his credibility on the line, or do nothing and watch a disruptive strike unfold.

For now, the president is riding out the turbulence, hoping the airline and its pilots settle.

"I'm not going to speculate at all about what happens if there is no agreement," press secretary Mike McCurry told reporters Thursday. "We want there to be an agreement by tomorrow night."

As he spoke, mediators struggled to close wide gaps in the parties' positions. And White House officials were getting

their first look at a critical Transportation Department report. It estimated the daily cost of a pilots strike at \$100 million to \$200 million. If Clinton decides to intervene, the report would bolster his case, administration officials say.

Under the Railroad Labor Act, designed to protect the economy against labor strikes, Clinton could act on the recommendation of the National Mediation Board and avert a strike with a 60-day "cooling off" period.

While the pilots continued to fly, a Presidential Emergency Board appointed by Clinton would take 30 days to propose a settlement. The parties would get another 30 days to resolve the dispute. If that didn't work, Congress could impose a settlement.

To order a cooling off period, Clinton

must find "a substantial economic threat" that deprives a region of a "central transportation service." White House officials said the pilots strike appears to meet the legal requirement for presidential intervention.

But will he do it? A Democratic president would face a tougher choice if the union in the dispute represented machinists or other blue-collar workers, Clinton's political aides say. In the American case, the pilots average \$120,000 a year and are haggling over stock options.

Clinton has another choice: He could use the presidential office to urge a settlement, or signal the administration's sympathy with one of the parties.

He has told both to "make maximum" use of negotiating time and avoid a strike that carries "huge implications."

# Senate votes to lower DUI alcohol level

**BOISE** — An emotional Sue Barsby, fresh from losing her only daughter in a drunken driving accident, was pleased to see overwhelming support on the Senate floor for a bill to lower the maximum blood alcohol content for drivers from .10 to .08 percent.

But the Boise woman had a question: How anyone could vote no?

"I believe some of these people down here have never been victims," she said. Seven senators voted against the bill, arguing that it would overburden the prison system with drivers, while lawmakers should turn to education instead. Twenty-seven senators voted for it.

The 19-year-old driver who killed Barsby's 18-year-old daughter, Amy Hulseby, had a blood-alcohol content of .09 percent.

"They need to hold these drivers accountable for what they've done," she said. "We'll never have Christmas with our kids anymore. I'll never be the mother of the bride."

Barsby was one of red-jacketed Mothers Against Drunk Driving members who dotted the balcony during the floor debate. The bill is now on its way to the House, where it passed 64-4 in 1996. It failed in the Senate Judiciary and Rules Committee last year.

That was because it arrived late in the session and didn't receive a full hearing, said committee chairman Denton Darrington, R-Idaho.

This year MADD also made a much more concerted effort in gaining support and disseminating information, he said.

Amheuser-Busch, the Idaho Hospitality and Travel Association and the Idaho Beer and Wine Distributors have opposed the bill.

Freshman Sen. Jack Riggs, R-Coeur d'Alene, drew on his experience as an emergency room physician to argue in favor of the bill.

At blood-alcohol content of .05 percent, most drinkers feel some effect, he said, and at .07 percent there's some impairment.

"My experience tells me that at .08, most — not all — have crossed that limit," he said.

Senate Minority Leader Marguerite McLaughlin, D-Ore., said the bill should remain where it is.

"That's the most difficult vote I have here, but it's what I'm going to do," she said.

# House mixes its messages

**WASHINGTON** — The House sent a mixed message on abortion Thursday.

It did so by releasing funds for overseas family-planning programs without provisions restricting abortion then passing a bill that would reimpose Reagan-era restrictions on future international family-planning aid.

In the first abortion tests of the 105th Congress, House members voted 220-209 to release \$385 million March 1 that the last Congress had frozen.

Hours later, lawmakers passed a measure, 231-194, that would bar U.S. funding of overseas family-planning agencies.

**The Northeast**  
 A wetty mix of rain, sleet and snow fell from West Virginia to North Carolina Wednesday, while heavy rain fell in parts of the Deep South.  
 Six inches of heavy, wet snow fell in Little Rock, Ark., in five hours.  
 Several fires in the South got more than 3 inches of rain overnight, and flooding was reported in parts of northwestern Texas and western Louisiana.  
 Heavy weather also diminished from the lower Ohio Valley into the Appalachians, which got hit with rain, freezing rain, sleet and snow. North Carolina and Virginia received 1 to 2 inches of snow.

 efforts. Two years ago, elementary students' math scores on standardized tests lingered below the national average, but they brought up the numbers, by focusing more on the math they teach.  
 On the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills in 1995, third-graders placed at the 36th percentile, fourth-graders at the 34th percentile and fifth-graders at the 29th percentile. The tests are ranked on a scale, not a grade, from one to 100. The national average is at the 50th percentile.  
 Then school officials changed their tack. Teachers began reinforcing math with 10-minute activities at the end of every school day, holding family math nights and acknowledging students who succeed in math with "math stars" on hallway corridors.  
 Their efforts showed results. A year later, third-graders placed at the 42nd percentile, fourth-graders at the 29th percentile and fifth-graders at the 42th percentile.  
 "They are low, but they are coming up significantly," said Wendell School District superintendent Manny.  
 The HOBS program is the latest addition to the effort to boost performance. Under the program, teachers are concentrating on all students in the first and fourth grades, and some second- and third-grade students who could use their help. The groups are small enough that teachers can attend to each individual student and their unique learning style.  
 Students such as Victor spend 30 minutes daily playing math games and drills in a room covered from ceiling to floor with math symbols and vocabulary. Last fall, the district spent

\$30,000 to start up the HOBS program, after visiting Vancouver, Wash., where HOBS Co., a private education company, is headquartered.  
 The program will cost \$15,500 a year for two years.  
 Schools all over Oregon and Washington use the HOBS program and students show results, said Karen Osman, Wendell Elementary School principal. The district will review the program's progress and decide whether to keep it, if students continue to increase their skills.  
 "We're hoping other districts will come take a look and see how it's done," Osman said.

## Axton charged after drug bust

HAMILTON, Mont. (AP) — Hoyt Axton, the singer and actor who wrote the lyrics "Mo, na, mo, I don't smoke it no more," was charged Thursday with possessing dangerous drugs and drug paraphernalia.  
 Axton was an honorary sheriff's deputy who spoke against drug use to school children.  
 He lost his badge on Wednesday after authorities found more than a pound of marijuana worth about \$3,000 in his house along with drug paraphernalia and drug residue, said Ravalli County Sheriff Jay Pratt.  
 Axton, 58, and longtime companion Deborah Hawkins, 43, were summoned to appear in court Tuesday.

 the EPA, the Energy Department and the state of Idaho. State and federal regulators must approve any project changes, to make sure the project still meets the terms of the agreement.  
 Lockheed Martin Advanced Environmental Systems was the contractor for the cleanup in October 1994.  
 "One of the systems that was to chemically flush plutonium from contaminated soil raised concerns that pumps wouldn't hold up and that the system couldn't be maintained and cleaned regularly."  
 Regular cleaning was required to prevent buildup of plutonium in the system, and prevent a potential "initially" — an uncontrolled nuclear chain reaction — and excessive worker radiation exposure.  
 Energy could not say whether the laboratory-scale system used in demonstrations during bidding for the \$179 million contract was the same — except for scale — as the system that failed during testing.  
 The revised project would replace chemical leaching with a combination of a new chemical leaching system and a physical soil-cleaning process, Buggy said.  
 But before the project is back on track, the contractor will have to convince the state and EPA that the proposed new technology and schedule will work, said Kathleen Tweener, head of the state's DEW Environmental Program.  
 "If in doubt, they have to bear the burden," she said.

company of the company doing the cleanup.  
 Buggy would not disclose how much the company has spent on the project so far. But the company is committed to fulfilling the terms of the contract.  
 If it doesn't, it doesn't get paid.  
 It is a fixed price contract, Buggy said. If the company doesn't meet the end waste product that meets government specifications, it must pay back any money it has received.  
 But the Energy Department can't interfere with how the contractor performs the job as long as it meets the contract terms. If the department orders changes, the contractor can submit claims for more money, Buggy said.  
 If the project winds up a bust, Lockheed may contend that the Energy Department made it impossible to meet the requirements of the contract.  
 Like most contracts, however, this one has allowances for unforeseen conditions, Buggy said. And that insulates the taxpayers. If the Energy Department were doing the work, it would pay the entire bill whether the project failed or succeeded, he said.  
 One reason Lockheed got the contract was that it agreed to a performance-based contract, Buggy said.

# Senate panel to subpoena fund-raising documents

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate panel voted Thursday to cast a dragnet of subpoenas for documents about Democratic Party fund-raising and efforts to give big donors access to President Clinton at the White House.

The Senate Governmental Affairs Committee demanded documents from former Democratic National Committee fundraiser John Huang and the Indonesian conglomerate where he worked before joining the Clinton administration, said Senate aides who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Subpoenas also sought information from a lengthy list of businessmen and lobbyists with ties to the White House, including Arkansas businessman C.J. Giroir, restaurateur Charles Y.H. Ho, lobbyist Pauline Kanchanachal and former White House aide Mark Middleton, aides said.

In separate votes, the panel approved to issue 43 subpoenas. Another nine were voted out over Democratic objections and with partisan bickering. Democrats said they needed time to work out the details, said Sen. Bob Dole, Senate aides said.

There were no immediate plans to demand documents from the White House, but those under republican challenge, former Sen. Bob Dole, Senate aides said.

They include subpoenas for records of the Lippo Group, and 10 related corporate entities, the conglomerate where Huang worked before he became a high-level Commerce Department official, the sources said.

Senate and Justice are subpoenaing for documents from the DNC, the Republican National Committee as well as presidential campaigns of Clinton and his Republican challenger, former Sen. Bob Dole, Senate aides said.

There were no immediate plans to demand documents from the White House, but those under republican challenge, former Sen. Bob Dole, Senate aides said.

They include subpoenas for records of the Lippo Group, and 10 related corporate entities, the conglomerate where Huang worked before he became a high-level Commerce Department official, the sources said.

Senate and Justice are subpoenaing for documents from the DNC, the Republican National Committee as well as presidential campaigns of Clinton and his Republican challenger, former Sen. Bob Dole, Senate aides said.

The House investigation, meanwhile, is meeting some early resistance, with four key witnesses saying for now they won't volunteer documents.

The chairman of the House Government Reform and Oversight Committee, said he would issue subpoenas in response to the refusal to voluntarily cooperate by former Justice Department official Webster Hubbell, Tim Middleton and Huang.

Barring any objections from Democrats, about 20 Senate subpoenas were expected to be issued today.

They include subpoenas for records of the Lippo Group, and 10 related corporate entities, the conglomerate where Huang worked before he became a high-level Commerce Department official, the sources said.

Senate and Justice are subpoenaing for documents from the DNC, the Republican National Committee as well as presidential campaigns of Clinton and his Republican challenger, former Sen. Bob Dole, Senate aides said.

There were no immediate plans to demand documents from the White House, but those under republican challenge, former Sen. Bob Dole, Senate aides said.

They include subpoenas for records of the Lippo Group, and 10 related corporate entities, the conglomerate where Huang worked before he became a high-level Commerce Department official, the sources said.

Senate and Justice are subpoenaing for documents from the DNC, the Republican National Committee as well as presidential campaigns of Clinton and his Republican challenger, former Sen. Bob Dole, Senate aides said.

There were no immediate plans to demand documents from the White House, but those under republican challenge, former Sen. Bob Dole, Senate aides said.

DNC arranged for the times to meet the president, the aides said.

If Democrats object, the panel, which Republicans control by a 9-7 margin, could vote to issue the disputed subpoenas anyway.

Among other things, the panel wants to get information about telephone calls that Huang made to Lippo Group while at the Commerce Department, the aides said.

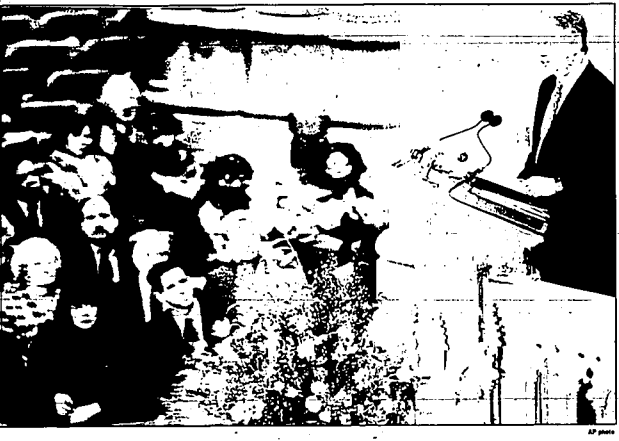
Meanwhile, the chairman of the House committee, Rep. Dan Burton, R-Ind., voiced dismay about lack of cooperation.

"I am disappointed that these individuals, some of whom were high-ranking Clinton administration officials, have declined to cooperate with the committee," Burton said Wednesday.

The four witnesses' lawyers gave varying reasons for declining the committee's document request for the time being. They included concern about an ongoing criminal investigation and previous negative experiences with Congress.

Burton can issue the subpoenas without a committee vote. They are expected by week's end.

Besides the congressional subpoena, a Justice Department task force is investigating whether any criminal violations occurred that may justify appointment of a special prosecutor.

# Mourners honor Pamela Harriman

WASHINGTON (AP) — From political leaders to fashion designers, the power elite who had been drawn to Pamela Harriman in life mourned the Democratic patroness and U.S. ambassador to France.

President Clinton eulogized her as an "inspirational" woman.

Wearing the necklace that was Harriman's last gift to him, the president led a congregation of nearly 1,200 in the grand Washington National Cathedral on Thursday as they said — with words from scripture and Winston Churchill — an official goodbye to the social and diplomat.

"Her country bids her farewell with profound gratitude," Clinton said. "She left to her bones America's special leadership role in the world. Today we see her legacy in the growing promise of a future and a future."

Harriman died in Paris last week after suffering a stroke. She was 76.

The eulogy at the Episcopal funeral service came from all corners of Harriman's extraordinary life — the British-born girl who weathered World War II as

Churchill's daughter-in-law, to adopted American who tossed millions of dollars at the Democratic Party.

"The journey has been enjoyable and well worth making — once," said Harriman's grandson, Randolph S. Churchill, quoting one of his great-grandfather's essays.

Former House Speaker Thomas Foley, Bosnia peace negotiator Richard Holbrooke and presidential adviser Vernon Jordan served as pallbearers, escorting Harriman's unadorned coffin through the sanctuary amid swells of "America the Beautiful" and "Bardic Hymn of the Republic."

The ambassador will be buried in a private ceremony today at Arden, the Harriman estate north of New York City.

Among those who half-filled the massive stone cathedral Thursday were: French Ambassador Francois Bujon de L'Estang, British Ambassador Sir John Kerr, New York investment tycoon Felix Rohatyn, actor Gregory Peck, designer Oscar de la Renta, and Katharine Graham, retired publisher of The Washington Post. The service was open to the public.

The president and first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton shared a front row with Vice President Al Gore, who read from Ecclesiastes, Tipper Gore and National Assembly Speaker Philippe Seguin, France's official representative at the funeral.

Clinton saluted Harriman for helping to revive Democrats after big losses in 1980, and acknowledged her moral and financial sustenance when he was still the little-known governor of Arkansas.

"She became organizer, inspirer, sustainer, captain of our course in our long march back to victory," Clinton said. "Today I am here in no small measure because she was there."

Surrounded by towering windows of stained glass filtering the cold winter sun, Clinton said he pondered "what made Pamela so remarkable" and concluded it was her insistence on success.

"It was more than the tilt of her voice and her laughter. More even, than the luminous presence that could light up a room, a convention hall or even the City of Lights itself... She was truly indomitable," Clinton said.

# Congressional Budget Office says Clinton budget in the red in 2002

WASHINGTON (AP) — Handling fresh ammunition to Republicans, the Congressional Budget Office said Thursday President Clinton's budget would leave at least a \$49 billion deficit in 2002, not the \$17 billion surplus he claims.

Though, the Republicans had long expected a finding in that range, they used the new number to hammer the \$19 trillion spending plan for 1998 that Clinton unveiled a week ago. So far, the GOP has employed a good cop-bad cop strategy of praising Clinton's package as an acceptable step for budget talks while simultaneously attacking it for claiming unrealistic savings.

"This is not like some Republican saying, 'Look, the Democrats are wrong,'" said House Budget Committee Chairman John Kasich, R-Ohio, whose panel received the report of the nonpartisan CBO.

He added, "There is a very false notion... that balancing the

budget is not going to be that hard. It is very hard. It is going to be extraordinarily hard."

Springing to the administration's defense, Democrats on the committee argued that CBO and White House budget projections have missed badly in recent years.

"It's been extremely difficult for both of you to precisely predict what would happen," said Rep. John Sprunt of South Carolina, the panel's ranking Democrat.

At the White House's Office of Management and Budget, spokesman Lawrence J. Hays said, "We obviously don't think we're going to be short at all."

The CBO figure, a preliminary estimate, is gloomier than Clinton's projection because congressional analysts are slightly more pessimistic than the White House about future economic performance. The weaker the economy, the more the government spends and the less revenue it collects, driving deficits

upward.

CBO analysts have not yet had time to examine the savings in the administration claims, Director June O'Neill told the House budget panel. She said that when Clinton's proposals for raising Medicare, defense and other programs plus raising some taxes are analyzed by the end of February, CBO's estimate of Clinton's 2002 deficit will probably get even worse.

"Through the years, CBO has been simpler than any administration in estimating... savings," O'Neill said.

The administration says if nothing is done, there will be a \$101 billion deficit in 2002. But it says its budget would produce a \$17 billion surplus, the first since 1969.

CBO, however, expects a 2002 shortfall of \$167 billion without any action. Assuming the administration's claim that it would save \$10 billion that year leaves a \$49 billion shortfall.

# Problems at FBI lab may affect 50 or more cases

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department has advised 50 prosecutors, half in state and local governments, that FBI lab problems could affect their cases.

And that figure might grow, Deputy Attorney General Jamie Gorelick said Thursday.

"Much of the cases... there would be an issue raised by defense counsel," Gorelick told a news conference. "We're just going to have to see how each unique raises to each separate fact pattern that's presented" before anyone can say whether lab errors will harm the prosecutions.

But a lawyer for the whistle-blower who first made allegations about lab errors said Gorelick was minimizing the problem. "The figure of 50 is considerably understated. We believe when finished it will be well over 1,000 cases," said Stephen Kellin, attorney for FBI-

enigmas Frederic Whitehurst.

Whitehurst, who triggered an investigation of the lab by the Justice inspector general, has charged that parts of the lab are contaminated, that supervisors lack adequate scientific training and that lab reports and testimony have been biased in favor of prosecutors. A still-secret draft report by the inspector general supports some but not all of his charges, officials have said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

# Weather Service to get new computers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Twenty-one computer terminals linking a variety of new technologies for weather forecasting will be installed this year in Utah and elsewhere across the country, the National Weather Service says.

Called the Advanced Weather Interactive Processing System, or AWIPS, the terminals will combine, at a single workstation, data received from new Doppler radars, automated ground observing systems and satellites to help forecasters analyze conditions and predict changes.

Installation of 21 units this summer and fall was approved by Commerce Secretary William Daley, the Weather Service announced Thursday. A decision on installing AWIPS across the country is expected to be made in December, following evaluation of its use at the 21 new sites as well as prior tests.

Plans call for 145 installations at a total cost of \$30 million.

Three of the new systems will go to Weather Service regional headquarters offices in Kansas City, Mo.; Bozeman, N.Y.; and

Salt Lake City.

Eleven will be installed at weather forecast offices in Oklahoma City, Minneapolis, Duluth, Minn.; Bismarck, N.D.; Hastings, Neb.; Dallas-Fort Worth, Tex.; Oklahoma State College, Okla.; Philadelphia, N.Y.; New York City and Washington, D.C.

River forecast centers will put five of the new units, in Minneapolis; Fort Worth; New Orleans; St. Louis; and Portland, Ore.

And two will be installed in the Weather Service training center in Kansas City.

# Humbled GOP struggles as new Congress convenes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bold and confident two years ago, House Republicans are stumbling at the outset of the new Congress, facing embarrassing setbacks as they struggle to move beyond Speaker Newt Gingrich's ethics controversies.

The balanced budget amendment to the Constitution is stalled in committee two weeks after which it traveled through the House as part of the "Contract With America." A term limits measure went down on a wider defeat Wednesday than in 1995, and a debate marked by internal struggle among supporters.

And Thursday, anti-abortion Republicans — a majority of the caucus — lost in a House floor struggle over family planning funds. "We're learning to operate with a nine-one majority," one senior GOP leadership aide said recently, conceding it may be early March, two months after Congress adjourned, before the GOP can bring major legislation to the floor and be certain of success.

Democrats argue otherwise. "They seem to have lost some of their footing," said Rep. George Miller, D-Calif. "They were so certain of their agenda and the righteousness of it in the last Congress and this time they seem to be feeling their way because that agenda was rejected at the polls."

yet to say how he will pay his \$300,000 penalty and has largely stayed in the background. There are serious pressures constraining Gingrich's ability to "swashbuckle through issues" in the new Congress, one senior House Republican said. He added that last year's government shutdowns, and the political damage the GOP suffered, had left the majority "chastened."

The current difficulties include the balanced budget amendment to the Constitution, a measure that cleared the House easily two years ago. Two weeks ago, Gingrich and other GOP leaders unveiled plans for a floor vote on Feb. 26, although officials concede privately the announcement was designed largely to divert media attention away from the speaker's ethics controversy.

Since then, the measure has become stalled in the House Judiciary Committee, with a handful of Republicans reluctant to vote against a Democratic amendment to put Social Security off-limits to budget-balancing efforts.

The same proposal was brushed aside two years ago, but this time, said Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill., chairman of the committee, Republican lawmakers "are more anonymous than they were when we were trying to get the contract through."

The committee announced on Monday that work had been suspended until after the Senate acts, a roll call not expected until next month at the earliest. Leadership aides said there were two unpalatable choices — delaying the vote or bypassing the committee — and predicted the vote would be delayed.

said one GOP aide. They don't want a repeat with Social Security. Aside from the balanced budget amendment, Gingrich fulfilled a promise on Wednesday to hold an early vote on a proposal to slap term limits on members of Congress. Gingrich pledged such a vote two years ago when the term limits amendment became the only item in the "Contract With America" to go down to defeat in the House.

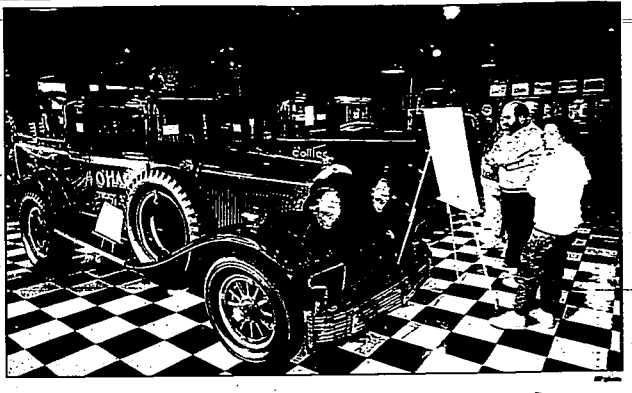
But House Majority Leader Dick Armey expressed unhappiness on Tuesday that a split among advocacy groups had rendered the issue "genuinely complex" and made it impossible to produce a strong result on the floor. The final vote was a 217-211 defeat that fell short of the result two years ago and left the issue doomed for the future.

Thursday's vote on family planning was a remnant of last year's surrender to Clinton on a variety of spending issues, in which Republicans were determined to adjourn for elections without so much as a hint of a repeat of the government shutdowns.

It gave Clinton leeway to return to Congress this year to propose accelerating spending for family planning overseas. Anti-abortion lawmakers countered with an alternative that would offer even more money — coupled with a reinstatement of Reagan-era restrictions that bar funds from going to organizations that also pay for abortions.

There are other signs of difficulty, including Gingrich's diminished standing. Last week, when Gingrich invited Jesse Jackson to be his guest at Clinton's State of the Union address, conservative activist William Bennett criticized him for trying to curry favor with liberals.

"I think he should either change course or step down," Bennett said in an interview. "Jesse Jackson and the other people he is praising are the people who had the greatest deal of contempt for the Contract With America."

## Tow truck fame and museum pulls them in in Chattanooga

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP) — Driving his Tin Lizzie over the rough, Old Byrd's Mill Road in 1916, John Wiley jerked the wheel to avoid a bump, landed upside down in a creek and inspired a wondrous invention of the automobile age: the tow truck.

Some 70 years later, the invention and the entire \$7 billion-a-year towing industry are celebrated at Chattanooga's International Towing and Recovery Hall of Fame and Museum, which pulls in people from all over the world, if only during their lunch hour in many cases.

Stephan Kloeber, 22, of Hamburg, Germany, was so intrigued he dropped by twice while visiting friends in Chattanooga. "We don't have tow truck museums in Germany," he said.

When Wiley wrecked his car, he called a former student of his business school to help him, Ernest Holmes. Holmes took nearly a day to right the car, stringing a wooden block in the top of a tree and getting a half-dozen men to help him pull the rope.

On his way home, Holmes started thinking: With the horseless car, he needed a way to lift disabled cars and haul them to his repair shop so he wouldn't have to work in the mud or the dark alongside the road.

He bolted a tripod of poles on the frame of a 1913 Cadillac, attached a pulley and ran a chain from the back, creating the world's first tow truck.

He patented the invention and shifted his work to manufacturing wreckers, leading the industry for decades and providing allied forces with more than 7,000 wreckers during World War II.

The towing museum opened in 1995 a few blocks away from Holmes' old shop. Friends of Towing, with 350 members in 21 countries, built the collection and the \$1.5 million hall.

"This honors not only Mr. Holmes, but the industry he started and the hard-working men and women who carry it on today," said Frank Thomas, museum curator and former salesman for the Holmes Co.

Collectors lent the 17 antique trucks now on display, ranging from a 1919 maroon-and-gold Holmes 485 wrecker towing a 1913 Locomobile with wooden-spoked wheels to a 1974 F-350 Ford with a Vulcan crane.

## Puppy digs up \$13,500 buried in the back yard

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Good boy! A Doberman pinscher puppy apparently dug up \$13,500 buried in its back yard Wednesday, sending \$100 bills drifting through the neighborhood, friends said Friday.

Dora Moya, a housekeeper caring for the home, called police after seeing money swirling through the yard. The owners of the house have been in California for two weeks, neighbors said.

Officers found \$11,600 in the yard and the rest of the money elsewhere around the neighborhood, some of it with teeth marks. The police and the FBI are investigating.

**Former FDA chief heads to medical school**  
NEW HAVEN, Conn. — Former Food and Drug Commissioner David Kessler, who led a Clinton administration crusade against the tobacco industry, was named Thursday as dean of the Yale University Medical School.

Yale President Richard C. Levin said Kessler was tapped for his private background, noting his broad experience in fields ranging from basic science to law to business.

**Harvard University admits Chelsea Clinton**  
LOS ANGELES — Harvard University reportedly has accepted Chelsea Clinton. Now the question is: Will the president's daughter accept Harvard?

President Clinton's daughter was accepted for early admission out of about 4,000 candidates, the Los Angeles Times reported Thursday.

Harvard spokesman Alex Blappe refused to confirm or deny the report about Chelsea's acceptance. At the White House, the president also declined to confirm or deny the report. Clinton did say that Chelsea doesn't know where she will be attending school. "She has literally made no decision," Clinton told reporters.

**Insurance executives cleared in Espy probe**  
WASHINGTON — Two former executives of a major crop insurance company were cleared Thursday of charges involving illegal contributions to the campaign of the brother of former Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy.

It was the first defense for Independent Counsel Donald C. Smaltz in his investigation into allegations of corporate favors received by the former agriculture secretary.

The jury in U.S. District Court found John J. Hemmingson and Gary A. Bluck innocent of one count of conspiracy to defraud the Federal Election Commission and two counts of filing false statements with the commission.

Hemmingson is the former chief executive and chairman of Crop Growers Corp. of Oswego Park, Kan., the nation's second-largest crop insurance company. Bluck is a former executive of the firm.

**CBO reports rise in fighter aircraft costs**  
WASHINGTON — The cost of ambitious Pentagon plans to build three new fighter planes in the coming decade is \$350 billion and rising, a congressional study said Thursday.

The Congressional Budget Office report could give opponents of higher Pentagon budgets ammunition needed to kill at least one of the three fighters.

As usual in the CBO report are the cumulative cost of the Navy F-18 E and F fighter, the Air Force F-22 and the multi-service

## Nominee says MIAs are top priority

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pete Peterson, a Vietnam War veteran and former congressman who is President Clinton's nominee as the first ambassador to Vietnam since the war, sailed easily through a Senate confirmation hearing Thursday.

Peterson told the Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee on East Asia and Pacific affairs that his top priority as the senior diplomat in Hanoi would be to press for the fullest possible accounting for U.S. servicemen missing from Vietnam's action.

Approximately 1,600 servicemen's names are on the list. "I think we're in for a long haul" of working with the Vietnamese government to resolve the remaining cases of American MIAs, Peterson said.

The subject probably cannot be settled within Clinton's second term, he said.

Peterson, shot down in his Air Force jet in 1966 and a POW for more than six years, said the pace of normalization of economic relations with Vietnam will depend on progress in accounting for MIAs.

Rejecting assertions by some that Vietnam's communist government is not helping enough in the MIA search, Peterson said cooperation "has never been better."

The panel's chairman, Sen. Craig Thomas, R-Wyo., said he disagreed with Clinton's decision to normalize relations with Vietnam, but supported Peterson's nomination.

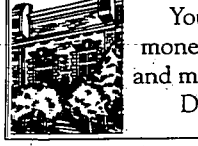
"Absent some unexpected revelation, I believe that he will find overwhelming support in both the committee and the full Senate," Thomas said.

Now comes Wade Mathews, a clown-for-hire by trade who would like to join the merriment at Twin Falls High School today. Rejected by the school administration, he has threatened to stage a protest.

We're sure that Mr. Mathews does his act admirably, but we agree with TFFHS Principal Carl Snow, who says there are too many distractions at school already.

Snow understands what many parents and an army of hired belly dancers, curlys, singing-and-dancing telegrams and other would-be thespians do not: Unless administrators say

no school will quickly turn into a non-stop circus.

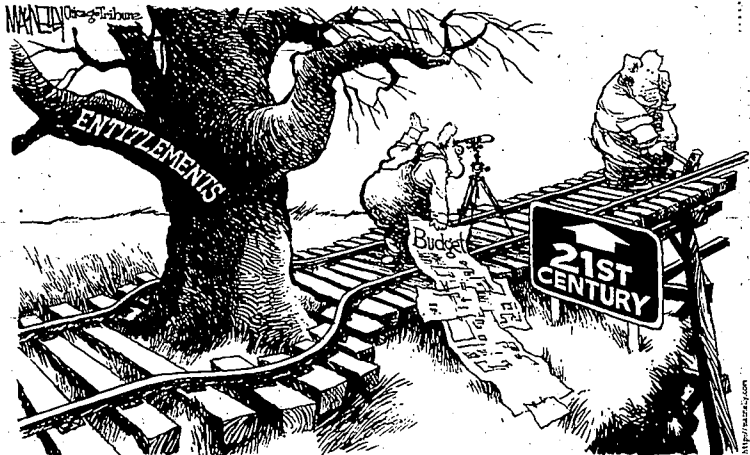

### Malpractice law applies to Idaho

I was quite interested in your article, "Attorneys take on state law governing malpractice cases," in Sunday's (Feb. 9) paper. As a physician, I hold licenses in three states: Massachusetts, California and Idaho. In all of those states, the applicable standard of health care practice of a community is used to evaluate claims of malpractice.

Should a physician practicing in Gooding be held to the same standards as one practicing in Boston or Boise? Remember that the physician in Gooding does not have immediate access to the sophisticated instrumentation that is available in larger communities. Working in Twin Falls, I have access to all modalities necessary to provide a level of care well above the basic standards. I do not have access to special equipment and modalities that were readily available in Boston and Los Angeles. However, placing expensive equipment at all health care facilities, rather than at a central community use facility, would rapidly drive up already high health care costs.

I would also like to point out that any time a patient undergoes medical treatment, some risk is involved. That risk is weighed against the risk of uncontrolled disease if no treatment is rendered. Some procedures, such as some surgeries, may involve a 1 percent to 2 percent chance of the patient having an adverse outcome. If the surgeon follows the standard of care in performing the procedure and the patient falls into the 1 percent category, should the surgeon be sued? My assumption is that Mr. Pederson believes it should be his right to sue for that patient.

If one remembers the \$2.5 million that Mr. Pederson won for his client in 1992, and if one knows that typical contingency fees are 40 percent to 60 percent of the judgment, simple mathematics would indicate why Mr. Pederson and the rest of the trial lawyers believe as they do.

Remove the "applicable standard" and it's unlikely any health-care worker will want to risk working in a small community. The trial lawyers are trying to deprive our rural working farmers and our other rural citizens of easy access to adequate health care.

# Measure would let cities pick tax

BOISE (AP) — A House panel has introduced legislation that would let every city in Idaho except Boise to ask residents to approve the kind of local sales tax now reserved for "resort" cities.

The measure introduced Thursday on a unanimous voice vote by the House State Affairs Committee was sent to the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, which in the past has flatly rejected local option tax proposals.

Idaho law now allows only cities with 10,000 or fewer residents and where the economy depends primarily on recreation and destination-resort business to seek voter approval for the resort cities tax.

That list includes only Lava Hot Springs, Sun Valley, Ketchum and Stanley. Bills to include cities with as few as 20,000 residents have been quickly shot down in the past.

The new proposal drafted by the Nampa Chamber of Commerce would raise the limit to 55,000 residents and eliminate the requirement that recreation and resort business dominate the local economy. The legislation would authorize a legislative tax on motel stays and restaurant food and beverage sales if at



least 60 percent of city voters approve.

Nampa Chamber of Commerce President Jerry Gunstrem said businesses in his city — where such tax fractions as the Idaho Center for sporting events and the proposed Sweetwater Junction theme park are in the works — consider the proposal a use tax that would be imposed primarily on visitors to help pay for local marketing and advertising efforts.

"We need to be able to have some funds to promote our city," said the bill's sponsor, Rep. W.W. "Bill" Deal, R-Nampa.

Gunstrem said the tax probably would be no more than 3 percent in Nampa. He estimated that could generate more than \$100,000 in the first year.

Gunstrem said the support from residents who stand to gain use tax and expand the tax base by increased promotion of Nampa has been tremendous so far.

# Lance pushes bill to raise cost of getting documents

BOISE (AP) — Pulling public documents out of Idaho's state and local governments could become expensive under legislation being pushed by Attorney General Alan Lance.

Deputy Attorney General William von Tagen is pressing the Senate State Affairs Committee to approve authority for government agencies to charge for the labor it takes to comply with large public document requests.

Idaho's daily newspapers opposed the bill in Wednesday's hearing, saying it would set up a financial barrier to government information.

But von Tagen said many attorneys and news reporters abuse the system by taking a scatter-gun approach to collecting public documents rather than narrowing their search.

# Man pleads innocent to murder charge

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A Spirit Lake man has pleaded innocent to a first-degree murder charge in the death of his girlfriend's 20-month-old toddler.

Ralph Reyes, 22, will stand trial on June 2 for the death of Anthony Mitchell. He entered his plea on Wednesday and could be sentenced to death if he is convicted.

Reyes was arrested on Oct. 29 after he allegedly confessed to punching the child several times in the stomach just before he died earlier that day.

According to autopsy reports, the boy died from a liver laceration and a torn bowel caused by blunt impact to his abdominal region.

# Leaders mull cutting Batt's school aid proposal

BOISE (AP) — The Republican legislative majority moved behind closed doors Thursday to consider cutting Gov. Phil Batt's 1998 school aid proposal by millions of dollars.

The GOP majority already has cut the current year's school aid package and eliminated cash for a modest 1998 state worker pay raise.

"We talked about the politics of lowering the school budget" from the \$705 million Batt recommended, House Speaker Michael Simpson admitted. "The fact is we may not have enough money

to provide \$705 million."

No specific amounts were discussed in the 20-minute House Republican caucus, Simpson said, although he mentioned the prospect of lowering Batt's recommendation to \$700 million or \$701 million.

The Senate Republican majority met on the issue several hours later.

Simpson made no attempt to lull concern about spring flood damage to the latest talk of paring back the governor's already spare spending plan for the year that begins July 1.

He said flatly that cuts above the \$13 million legislative leaders pitched out last week were being driven by a mounting concern that Batt's forecast for revenue collections during the new budget year is overly optimistic at 5.5 percent.

"Talk to anybody out there off the record and none of them will tell you he thinks revenues are going to come in at 5.5 percent," the speaker said.

Batt's school aid proposal was just \$15.5 million more than this year's original general tax support package, but \$19 million less than the Board of Education requested.

Batt's proposal turned more lucrative earlier this week, however, when budget writers voted to cut this year's general tax allocation by \$10.7 million.

The latest maneuvering came as budget writers cut their 1998 budget-setting teeth on the Fish and Game Department.

With a new director and a governing commission controlled by appointees of the Republican chief executive, the agency was handled by the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee with much less hostility than it has felt in past years.

# Juvenile corrections director resigns

BOISE (AP) — Juvenile Corrections Director Michael Johnson resigned Thursday, citing a state investigation that has raised questions about the legality of some of his actions.

In a letter to Gov. Phil Batt, Johnson said his resignation was the result of a state investigation that has raised questions about the legality of some of his actions.

"The recent investigation by the Department of Law Enforcement suggests some actions or decisions on my part may be in question," the former Republican state representative from Rexburg wrote. "Until such allegations can be cleared up, I feel it is in the best interest of the department that I step aside."

Late last year, Batt ordered a full-scale investigation into possible unethical or criminal behavior involving two department employees at a Rexburg youth facility.

One, Roger Clark who had been the department's regional liaison, was accused of using what he claimed was his friendship with Johnson to get Johnson to cancel a department contract with a private facility whose operators complained about interference from Clark.

In a statement issued after receiving the resignation, Batt said that while Johnson has been dedicated to making the 19-month-old department a success "there have been some serious errors in judgment concerning personnel matters and the awarding of contracts."

# Magic Valley native, actress dies

LOS ANGELES — Marjorie Reynolds, a Magic Valley native and actress who endeared herself to audiences as the long-suffering television wife of William Bendix in "The Life of Riley," died Feb. 1. She was 80.

Reynolds, who danced with Fred Astaire and sang with Bing Crosby in the 1942 Irving Berlin musical "Holiday Inn," died Feb. 1, her family said Wednesday.

The "Holiday Inn" classic, which featured Crosby singing "White Christmas," crowned Reynolds' hard-won place in Hollywood: She never topped it.

In the 1940s, she went on to star in the drama "Ministry of Fear" opposite Ray Milland, ham it up in the comedy "Up in Mabel's Room" opposite Dennis

O'Keefe, and dance in another musical, "Bring On the Girls," with Eddie Bracken.

But she largely drifted back to B pictures until the Riley series was resurrected in 1955. As Peg Riley, Reynolds became a familiar face in American living rooms. She played the role opposite Bendix's Chester A. Riley, aircraft plant worker, from 1955 to 1958. Smiling benignly, Reynolds made audiences believe every tangled plot would come out all right despite Bendix's customary exclamation: "What a revolvin' development this is!"

Born Marjorie Goodspeed in Buhl, the actress moved to Los Angeles with her family when she was a child. She began acting in her childhood under the stage name Marjorie Moore.

As she grew up, with time out to spend time from Los Angeles High School, she won roles as a leading lady — but in westerns and B action picture. She made about 35 others with cowboy stars Tom Mix, Buck Jones and Ken Maynard, and several short melodramas with Boris Karloff.

The actress changed her screen name to reflect her marriage to production manager and screenwriter Jack Reynolds. The marriage later ended in divorce.

After the Riley television series, Reynolds appeared in the films "Lute Box Rhythms" in 1959 and "The Silent Witness" in 1962, but largely abandoned her acting career.

Reynolds, the widow of film editor Jon M. Huffman, is survived by one daughter, Linda Hinshaw, of Los Angeles.

**Karen rebel base captured; insurgents flee**

BANGKOK, Thailand — Bearing down on Burma's most inveterate insurgents, government soldiers captured the ethnic Karen rebel base on Thursday only to find it destroyed and abandoned.

Earlier Thursday, the insurgents set fire to the headquarters of the Karen National Union, then retreated into the jungle, a Karen officer said.

"We didn't want to leave the Burmese anything," said Col. Isaac, an officer in the Karen National Union. Like many Karen, he uses only one name.

About 500 Karen National Union troops had been struggling to hold Teakaplay, an eastern Burma, against 1,500 Burmese government troops, Isaac told The Associated Press by telephone.

**Security up after 9 die in church attack**

MINYA, Egypt — Police stationed armored vehicles around churches in southern Egypt on Thursday after assailants stormed a church charity meeting and killed nine people.

Police blamed Muslim militants for the attack. At least 79 people were arrested by nightfall Thursday.

Gunsmen burst into the Mar Gregis Church in El-Fiqriya on Wednesday and opened fire, killing eight people. A ninth person died Thursday of his injuries. Five people were wounded.

**Ex-hostages thank Japanese ambassador**

LIMA, Peru — More than 100 captives freed during Peru's 2-month-long hostage crisis thanked the Japanese ambassador Thursday for protecting them from heavily armed rebels while they were held in his home.

Ambassador Morihisa Aoki is one of 72 remaining hostages; it is unclear whether he has seen the letter of gratitude, published in the daily newspaper Gestion.

In it, the former hostages said they felt "morally obligated to give thanks for the gentlemanly, loyal and dedicated actions of the Ambassador of Japan... for our physical and moral well-being."

**News-agency: Warlord kills U.N. observer**

DUSHANBE, Tajikistan — A rebel warlord had his gunman kill a U.N. military observer, one of 14 people being held hostage in the former Soviet republic, Russian news agencies said Thursday.

ITAR-Tass and Interfax quoted their correspondents, who are also being held hostage. They did not identify the U.N. observer.

"We are aware of the incident," a spokesman, Hiro Ueki, said in New York. "However, we are not confirming this yet. We are still waiting for further details from the field."

Warlord Bakhran Sadirov had promised to free the hostages — eight U.N. workers, four Russian journalists, their driver and Tajikistan's security minister — once 40 guerrillas were flown home from neighboring Afghanistan.

**Nauru chooses 5th president in 4 months**

SUVA, Fiji — Nauru, a tiny Pacific island struggling to revive its dying economy, has named its fifth president in four months.

The 18-member Parliament appointed Kinza Clodumar president on Wednesday following weekend general elections. Voters also returned the four previous presidents to Parliament.

The government said in a statement that the elections were expected to bring stability to Nauru, an 8-square-mile island with only 10,000 residents.

Infighting has led to a revolving-door presidency, with a succession of leaders winning or losing no-confidence motions by one-vote margins.

**Libya insists on right to defy U.N. ban**

CAIRO, Egypt — A U.N.-approved plan for Egypt to fly thousands of Libyan pilgrims to the Muslim holy cities in Saudi Arabia is unacceptable, the Libyan news agency said Thursday.

The United Nations has banned air travel in or out of Libya since 1992, trying to force it to turn over two suspects in the 1988 bombing of a Pan Am jetliner over Lockerbie, Scotland.

Libya's leader, Col. Muammar Gaddafi, defied the ban in 1995 and 1996, sending a plane each year carrying some Libyans to the annual pilgrimage to Mecca and Medina. Muslims are obliged to make the pilgrimage, or hajj, at least once in a lifetime if they can afford it.

**Diplomat allegedly caught smuggling ivory**

HARARE, Zimbabwe — A North Korean diplomat has been holed up in his country's embassy since being caught allegedly trying to smuggle \$5,200 in elephant ivory, the Financial Gazette reported Thursday.

Jang Myong Sik, who is based at the North Korean Embassy in neighboring Zambia, was released into the custody of the North Korean Embassy in Zimbabwe after his arrest Jan. 24, the independent weekly said.

He allegedly was caught with 33 pieces of ivory in his luggage at Harare International Airport.

China must decide defector's fate

BEIJING (AP) — China, North Korea and South Korea maneuvered frantically Thursday trying to decide what to do about a high-ranking North Korean — a former tutor to the country's leader — who defected to South Korea.

South Korea pressed China to let them whisk Hwang Jang Yop immediately out of the country and find out everything he knows about North Korea's secretive government.

North Korea refused to believe the defection, insisted he must have been kidnapped and tried to get past Chinese police protecting the consulate — where he asked

for asylum. Chinese officials pleaded for calm and wondered how they were going to get out of the explosive incident between the North, a long-time ally, and the South, an important new trading partner.

But there was no way to avoid the question — Beijing must decide whether to turn the 72-year-old party stalwart back to North Korea or agree to Seoul's request to let Hwang fulfill his wish to go to South Korea.

By late Thursday, however, no negotiations on the issue had begun, a South Korean official said.

Hwang, a Central Committee member of the ruling Workers' Party and confidant of North Korean leader Kim Jong Il, walked into the South Korean consulate in Beijing and asked for asylum Wednesday.

"After a long period of agoniz-

ing deliberation" Hwang said he decided to defect to help reconcile the two Korea rivals and to discuss with Seoul how "to save our nation from misery," according to a statement released by the South Korean government.

In his three-page statement, Hwang said his "family and others will think me crazy," but added: "Is it the action of sane people to call each other enemies and talk of turning the other into a sea of fire?"

The statement added: "Can we

call people sane when they talk of having built a utopia for the workers and the farmers when the workers and farmers are starving?"

Two years of floods have devastated North Korea's food supply. This week, the U.N. World Food Program issued an appeal for 110,000 tons of emergency food aid for North Korea.

After being challenged by North Koreans on Thursday, Chinese police widened the security zone around the South Korean consulate, fearing the

defector would be kidnapped. After warily watching the building for hours, a dozen North Koreans walked up to police lines Thursday night and were turned away when they tried to go past, witnesses said.

They stood face to face with police before walking away and returning to their cars.

Chinese police then ordered reporters and the North Koreans to move a block away from the three-story building on a back street of a diplomatic district.

The proposal, sponsored by the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry, was one in a package of sweeping proposals to reform the worker's compensation system in Idaho. # Police expect long, slow investigation in shooting

TWIN FALLS - The suspect in a Wednesday afternoon shooting has not yet been arrested, and detectives are preparing for a long, slow investigation. "We're going to move slowly, and do as thorough and as neutral of an investigation of the incident as we can," said Twin Falls police Detective Dennis Rinehart. "We have a lot of ground to cover before we get to any conclusions." Meanwhile, the victim of the shooting, John Brent Richardson, 33, of Twin Falls, is in critical but stable condition at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, said Twin Falls police spokesman Sgt. Bill Hanchey. Police say Richardson brought a woman to a house in the 1400 block of Eighth Avenue East at about 5:30 p.m.

Wednesday to retrieve her belongings. The woman, Bridget Campbell, had been living at the house, police say. When Campbell was collecting her belongings, Richardson became involved in a dispute with the male resident of the house, police say. The man shot Richardson in the neck with a small-caliber weapon, police say. Police say they're not sure whether the weapon was a handgun, and whether Richardson was shot inside the house or in the front yard. Campbell and Richardson got into the car they'd driven to the house in, and Campbell drove Richardson to the hospital, where he underwent surgery for his wounds, a police report said. Despite being shot in the neck, Richardson should still be able to walk and talk, police say. Police say people in the neighborhood were concerned about activity at the

house, and that police are too. Neighbors say the house had a great deal of traffic, and had "tons" of visitors at all hours of the night. A Twin Falls County charge against Campbell of grand theft by receiving was dismissed Feb. 2 at the preliminary hearing, court records say. Prosecutors moved the charge be dismissed. Another charge of grand theft against Campbell was dismissed Jan. 17. Campbell was arrested by Twin Falls police Nov. 29, while driving a car reported stolen, according to court records. Prosecutors asked the charge be dropped after they were unable to locate a witness, according to the case file. Campbell has an outstanding charge of failing to purchase a driver's license or operating a vehicle with an invalid license, according to

court records. A pretrial hearing in the case is scheduled for March 25, court records say. Campbell and Richardson both were victims of bombings in February 1996. Early on the morning of Feb. 23, a bomb destroyed Campbell's 1994 black Jeep, which was parked at 745 Blue Lakes Blvd. S., inside Twin Falls city limits. The explosion flipped the Jeep upside down. Seven minutes later, another explosion damaged an older model pickup truck at 336 Filer Ave. owned by Richardson. No one was injured in the blasts. Twin Falls County Sheriff Wayne Torrey announced at the case that the bombings were connected with a Jan. 7 explosion, in which a car owned by Steve Thompson, a 37-year-old resident, blew up outside his home at 217 Adams St. in Twin Falls.

# Chopping block: Minidoka County considers cost-cutting capital cases

RUPERT - With legal costs now exceeding \$300,000 and the possibility that appeals could string the cases along indefinitely, Minidoka County officials are working to limit the growing expense of three capital cases. Verdicts are in against two of the three defendants in three murder cases that shocked Minidoka County residents last year. The publicly funded prosecution and defense have reached a total of \$339,383 for the cases, with one trial still to go. "That's an amazing figure for something that's not even done yet," Minidoka County Prosecutor Rick Bollar said. At the recent rate of increase, Minidoka County may have to find additional sources to pay the bill for the cases. In just a month, the bill grew by more than \$80,000. Minidoka County budgeted an additional \$475,099 above normal costs for its justice fund. A bill from attorney Randy Stoker, who defended Kody Butcher during a recent trial in which the 21-year-old Paul man was found guilty of first-degree murder, is expected to put the current bill at almost \$400,000. Stoker, who is paid \$125 an hour for his work on the case, has filed for a new trial and promised an appeal of

the verdict. "In the greater scheme of things, the most costly part of any trial is the appeals process," Bollar said. Appeals in capital cases can be made on numerous issues. Between filing motions, writing briefs and finding new avenues for appeals, the process

is time-consuming for attorneys. In his instance, that means money-consuming for taxpayers, who have had to pay for two special prosecutors and 10 other attorneys retained for either defense or related legal issues in the murder cases. The public defender's office, citing conflicts of interest and a lack of resources to deal with the cases, has been involved in only one of the trials. Bollar would like to control some costs by roping the public defender's office into the appeals process and dismissing Stoker from the Butcher defense. "There is no reason why the paid public defender should be assuming representation now," Bollar said.

on vacation in Australia, Stoker could not be reached for comment. Stoker's fees so far, not including his bill for the trial, are the cheapest of any attorney. Stoker and Laird Stone, who represented Butcher during the first few months of proceedings, have billed taxpayers for \$53,701.98. The most expensive case to date is the case that hasn't gone to trial. Andrew Parnes, Brian Elkins and their investigative team have turned in bills for \$104,049.17 for the defense of Jesus Diaz charged in connection with the death of Blake Morgan. The Corey Hood case has cost \$102,027.41. Legal fees in the case include bills from four different attorneys, three of whom represented other people once implicated in the murders of Wendy Hunter and Mae Hood. Hood agreed to plead guilty to two counts of first-degree murder after a seven-day hearing ended in January. Hood's attorney, Mark Manweiler, billed the county more than \$32,000 for that hearing. Prior to the Butcher trial, the bill for prosecuting the cases totaled \$52,497.39, consumed mostly by special prosecutor John Bradley. Additional court costs, including hotel rooms in Ada County for the Butcher jury while it deliberated, stand at \$18,106.99.

# Legislative aid on the way for some areas

BOISE - Magic Valley lawmakers this session plan to address the stark costs in rural capital criminal cases and ways to contain them through a committee study. Cases like the three murders in Minidoka County which cost taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars have sparked discussions about better ways to deal with the monumental costs of justice in serious crimes. Rural Republican Celia Gould soon will introduce in the House a resolution to form the special committee of judges, prosecutors and county officials. "It's an extremely important problem and it needs to be done right," said Sen. Deann Darrington, R-Deer, the Senate Judiciary Committee chairman. "We can't give this a quick fix." Darrington, who is promoting the resolution with Gould, said the proposal has a fair chance for success. If passed, the committee would study several means of lessening the stark costs in capital cases, including establishment of a fund like the current medical catastrophic fund for trial costs. Smaller counties are hit particularly hard when forced to pay for prosecution and defense of murder cases, but larger counties feel the budget crunch as well, Darrington said. In Minidoka County, the publicly funded prosecution and defense of three murder suspects has cost more than \$325,000 to date, with one murder trial yet to start.

Proponents of the bill said it would prevent double dipping. Workers don't directly pay workers' compensation premiums, said Allen Marsh, workers' compensation administrator for Amalgamated Sugar Co.

"We just want to give employers a break," he said.

Steve Ahrens, IACI lobbyist,

agreed.

"Such duplicate benefits increase costs to employers and are contrary to the basic purposes of the worker's compensation and Social Security systems," said the statement of purpose for his legislation.

Committee members listened passively to arguments on both sides, asking no questions and engaging in no debate.

The bill died for lack of committee action.

It introduced other worker's compensation bills, including one from IACI to protect from third-party lawsuits for companies who hire temporary workers, and one from the trial lawyers to clarify when rulings from the industrial Commission may be appealed.

"When I first started, there were no computers," she said, "so we posted everything in ledgers."

The water department's first computer, a clunky IBM model, arrived around 1980. More sophisticated computers have followed over the years, helping bring order to the city's 11,000 individual water accounts.

Anderson heard plenty of stories from people after they learned their water service was

about to be shut off for lack of payment. Some were more poignant than others, but one woman's plea stuck a chord with Anderson.

"She said, 'Give me a minute so I can fill my bathtub,'" Anderson said.

On the whole, Anderson said her years with the water department have been good ones.

"This is a nice place to work, with good benefits," she said. "I'm going to miss the people I work with."



Hailey opens door again to prefab homes

HAILEY - The city of Hailey did an about-face this week, allowing manufactured home construction in single family residential areas.

But the decision doesn't open city lots for trailers or mobile homes, as some feared.

The council Monday overturned a 1996 planning board decision which found manufactured homes didn't comply with the city's comprehensive plan.

Last December, the commission voted manufactured homes went against "civic pride and community image."

City Councilman Rick Davis, who toured the city in search of existing manufactured homes, said he was surprised at the appearance and location of manufactured homes. He found several in the Delta View subdivision, one of the town's more expensive subdivisions, located in the city's southwest corner, adjacent to the Big Wood River.

Some argue manufactured homes could help supplement the city's shrinking inventory of affordable housing. But officials tacked on requirements which could make the homes less affordable.

All manufactured homes must have a pitched roof, be multi-sectional, have vinyl or wood siding, and a permanent foundation.

Even so, those in the industry say it's a cheaper way to build a home.

Homes America, based in Twin Falls, sells Fleetwood Homes, a leader in manufactured homes nationwide. They've sold several homes in the Wood River Valley, particularly in Gannett.

"It's much cheaper than building a home from scratch," said salesperson Rick Huntley.

A three-bedroom, two-bath home meeting Hailey's requirements would cost \$100,000 to build in Hailey, Davis said. The estimate doesn't include land.

Homes America offers land/home packages at about \$700 a month.

To date, there have been limited areas in Hailey open to manufactured home building. And these homes usually face a 10 to 15 percent decline in resale value, developer Chuck Grubb said.

"There's a stigma attached," said Grubb, who owns one of the few areas previously zoned for manufactured homes.

Current manufactured home designs "are beautiful," Davis said. "I think everyone's blown it away out of proportion," Davis said of the controversy, but got nothing but positive feedback.

But others offered only cautious support for manufactured homes.

Council member Beaver Burke voted to allow the homes, fearing legal repercussions. A 1994 state law requires all municipalities allow manufactured homes in any area zoned for single-family homes.

Mayor Steve Kearns said Hailey can test its design requirements with manufactured homes, and said the vote wouldn't likely set up an uncontested wave of trailer-park development.

"We're not going to see any double-wides on the Fairways Loop," said Kearns, referring to a multi-million dollar neighborhood adjacent to the Sun Valley Golf Course. "It's not going to happen."

And for now, it remains a moot point.

Because of a sewer moratorium the Environmental Protection Agency imposed last fall, the city will accept no building permits for new homes.

2 Wendell policemen resign; chief wants higher pay

WENDELL - Police Chief Phillip Cowell said the City Council and two policemen have resigned, and he asked for higher pay for himself and the other veteran officer still on the force.

Policemen Arnold Morgado and Thomas Ledbetter have taken jobs with the Gooding and Jerome sheriff's departments, respectively, Cowell said Wednesday.

Cowell estimated a \$500-per-month salary difference between the two officers who left and the recruits who will be hired, and asked the council to split that money equally between himself and Lt. Dave Fisher.

"We're the ones that are going to have to carry the weight we have to do the training," Cowell said. "We have to still maintain the integrity of the police department - continue on with our cases - which means our work load for the two of us keeps going up."

The money would bring his and Fisher's wages more in line with those of other police in Idaho, Cowell said.

The council will consider Cowell's request, Mayor Owen Rost said.

Cowell said he has received 12 applications for the two vacancies and will do background checks. "We have to still maintain the integrity of the police department," Rost said.

Also Wednesday, George Benson questioned city officials at length about the installation of water and sewer lines on the west side of town. The city had to make various adjustments to planned construction to meet Division of Environmental Quality regulations.

Benson also said the council had approved installation of a sewer line

Digital TV - set to hit stores next year - will bring more than pictures, sound

TV is about to look a lot better. It's also going to cost more.

Starting in 1998, high definition television sets will be headed to store shelves, bringing movie-quality pictures to consumers.

The arrival of these digital HDTV sets hints to analysts a revolution in how we watch TV — as well as an economic boom for TV makers and Silicon Valley companies. The new digital technology will boost the efforts of cable TV operators and telephone companies to bring more TV channels to consumers.

Champions of this new generation of television promise that HDTV will bring consumers crystal-clear images, sharper

sounds and even goodies of computer information tucked inside the transmission. Plus, analysts say, American TV technology would leap ahead of what's available in other countries, including technological arch-rival Japan.

This means TV sets will get smarter as well as better. Today's TV signals are delivered using radio waves emitted from a broadcast tower. Tomorrow's HDTV information will be transmitted, processed and relayed from a tower but using a format understood by computers — the binary language of 1s and 0s. HDTV information will be transmitted as a stream of digital bits and bytes that can be handled like computer files.

"This is going to bring a whole

new approach to entertainment to the home," said Carlo Basile, head of the research department at Philips Consumer Electronics, a big U.S. TV manufacturer.

"TV sets will be able to perform a lot of the functions that are often performed inside of a computer."

For example, customers could use a digital television set to obtain online data such as stock prices, sports scores, vacation information or recipes at the same time they are watching a TV program.

"Broadcasters will have a lot of choices in what they send you," said Charlotte Wolter, head of New Media Strategist, a Santa Monica, Calif.-based technology newsletter. "It doesn't have to be HDTV all day long."

# 'Zone' introduces new approach to eating

Doctors have an old and sleepier saying: "Use new drugs quickly, while they still work." They know that enthusiasm can make some people feel better, whether the new pills are really effective or not.

Diet books can work similarly, by offering readers inspiration and a new strategy to lose weight or better health. Some become popular, but few endure.

One of the most popular these days is "Enter the Zone" (Dutton, Collins, \$25) by biochemist named Barry Sears. The key to healthful eating, in Sears's view, is to maintain the right internal balance of hormones, especially insulin, and a group called eicosanoids.

Furthermore, he claims that "virtually every disease state — whether it be heart disease, cancer or autoimmune disease, like arthritis and multiple sclerosis — can be viewed at the molecular level as the body simply making more bad eicosanoids and fewer good ones."

How are you supposed to regulate these hormones? By eating meals in which the relative amounts of protein, fat and carbohydrates are strictly set, he

writes. Protein should provide 30 percent of calories, fat should provide another 30 percent, and carbohydrates should provide 40 percent.

The fat percentage he proposes is the same as the federal government's Dietary Guidelines for Americans, while the protein percentage is essentially absent, which usually is recommended. Thus, his diet is essentially a high-protein, low-carbohydrate diet.

Every time you eat, Sears maintains, the body secretes a hormone-regulating drug. When you do it in the right proportions, you enter "the Zone," where "the animal is relaxed, you're relaxed and especially focused. Meanwhile, the body is blood strong and apparently indestructible. It's almost euphoric. There are no distractions, and time seems to slow down to a graceful walk."

In "Enter the Zone," Sears attacks the common low-fat, low-calorie diet. "Society," he writes, "has been misled by low-fat, high-carbohydrate diets are likely to promote heart disease. If you're eating this way, you're putting yourself in danger."

# 'Cloud Chamber': The old sod of Montana

Michael Dorris's new novel, "Cloud Chamber" (Scribner, \$24) begins with a black-haired Irish lass' betrayal of her lover in County Mayo and ends half a world away on a Montana Indian reservation. There, teenage Rayona — part black, part white, part Native American — is preparing to take as her ceremonial name that of her great-grandmother Rose, the self-same girl we met at book's beginning.

"Cloud Chamber" is Rose's story and Rayona's, but it's also that of the generations in between and what they know and don't know about one another. As he did in his previous novel, 1987's "A Yellow Raft on Blue Water," Dorris deftly employs a chorus of first-person voices to spin a persuasive story of personal and family identity.

So it is that we get to know some remarkable people. There is Rose's son, Robert, for whom amnesia is a way to deal with the disillusion and disappointment dealt him by his mother and his wife. There are his daughters, Edna and about one another. As he did in his previous novel, 1987's "A Yellow Raft on Blue Water," Dorris deftly employs a chorus of first-person voices to spin a persuasive story of personal and family identity.

And there is Elgin, whose black heritage is ignored until he joins the Army, where his lesson in family history sends him far away to Seattle and in Christian, whose heart-wrenching loss of his son is more than I am." Rayona is their child.

Readers of "A Yellow Raft" will remember the Christmas and Rayona from that book. Dorris also has reworked two short stories, "The Dark Smoke" and "Decorations Day," from his 1993 collection Working Men into chapters of "Cloud Chamber." This tells us that Dorris has been thinking about and living with his characters for a long time, pondering their links between them — an old song, a cigarette case, bitter mess, jealousy, resentment, love.

It's no surprise then that many of Dorris' characters take on a life of their own according to exist outside these pages. For sure, we'll recognize Rose if we meet her, the black hair that turned to gold when she was an old woman in the wake of a tragedy. But Edna and Elgin also make indelible impressions, both as young women on a fateful vacation on Lake Superior and as old women on a pilgrimage to Ireland.

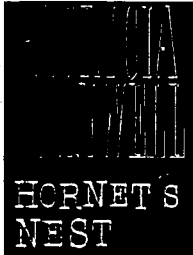
# Comwell's Hornet's Nest: Southern comfort

Before she became the author of the best-selling mystery series featuring medical examiner Kay Scarpetta, Patricia Cornwell was a reporter for the Charlotte Observer. Such experience should have benefited "Hornet's Nest" (Putnam, \$25.95) a novel about a young reporter and Charlotte's police department.

But Cornwell apparently has forgotten anything and everything that would lend her fiction the believability of her journalism.

The story proceeds by way of a series of vignettes ranging from the impalpable to the ludicrous. Amy Brent, a good-looking 22-year-old TV listings clerk, is promoted to police reporter, even though he has no training as a



journalist and moonlights as a volunteer cop. "Brazil, simply

put, was a writer, a scribe of life and all in it. He had accepted his calling with humility and a brave heart.

In a public relations move, Virginia West, the good-looking 42-year-old deputy police chief, is ordered by her boss, Chief Judy Hammer, to let Brazil ride shotgun with her on patrol. After initial bickering on both their parts — she doesn't trust him, he thinks he's being fobbed off on the brass — they find themselves chasing robbers, looking for run-aways, settling domestic disputes, cleaning up after fatal car crashes, irritating a good ol' boy to the point that he starts stalking them and, of course, hunting for a serial killer.

Interspersed with the chronicle of their uneasy partnership are short takes featuring Chief

Hammer's dealings with local politicians and her sad, pathetic husband; Brazil's relationship with his alcoholic mother; West's sometimes affair with a hunky paramedic; and the musings of Niles, West's Abyssinian cat.

Cornwell relies on stereotypes for characters, and her portrait of Charlotte as a conflicted Southern metropolis is equally superficial. Only every now and then — as when a young teen named Wheatie attempts to rob a Hardee's — does one get a glimpse of the book's dramatic potential.

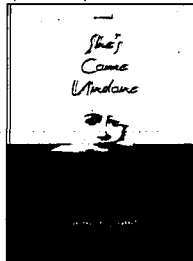
Even so, Edna Buchanan does this sort of thing much better in her Britt Montero series set in Miami. Readers should stick with her, and Cornwell should stick with Scarpetta.

# Little-known author catches Winfrey's interest

A month ago, Wally Lamb came home from the funeral of one of his writing students, a 17-year-old girl who had been hit by a truck. It was the start of a horrible event that makes readers cry up all night thinking on their own links, which is what Lamb had done the night before, having sleep. She was innocent and beautiful and desperate.

Then the phone rang. It was talk show host Oprah Winfrey, telling him she had chosen this first, and so far only, novel for her February book club selection. His publisher, Pocket Books, immediately printed 700,000 copies of "She's Come Undone," a novel that only a very few newsstands ever touch.



"It was hard to take in," Lamb said recently. "This won-

derful thing, right after this horrible tragedy, and all happening at the same time."

The 46-year-old Lamb teaches at the Norwich Free Academy in Norwich, Conn. Winfrey had called him a few years ago, just to tell him she liked the novel, so her call this month wasn't a complete surprise. She has been very clear about the fact that she is choosing only those novels she loves.

The heroine of "She's Come Undone" is Delores Price, and she takes us on quite a journey as she ages from 14 to 40," Winfrey told her audience as she introduced the book on Wednesday. "Abandoned and abused, she drowns her sorrow in Milky Ways and Mallomars — sound familiar? — until she becomes obese

and completely undone. You'll probably cry at her breakdown. I certainly did — cheer at her breakthrough, and you won't lose sleep, because you won't be able to put this book down."

The enthusiasm always communicates to her audience, which is between 15 million and 20 million strong. Most of them are women between 18 and 54, which just happens to also constitute the largest readership for serious fiction.

But the market has never been consistently enlarged like this before. "I've been a teacher for a lot longer than I've been a fiction writer," said Lamb, whose book came out in 1992. "What really excites me is the way she's made people excited about reading."

# New mysteries: Exotic backdrops don't always work

Not all mysteries are easy to categorize, which probably drives publishers crazy. How do you market something when it doesn't quite fit the normal guidelines?

Still, sometimes a reader who says a hit off the beaten track is somewhat with little gem.

"The Missing Chain," by Paul Mann (Fawcett, \$22.95) — A nuclear environmental disaster

in an ancient culture provides the basis for this unusual mystery.

A chemical spill on the Ganges River turns the Indian shrine of Varanasi, where the bodies of the devout dead are burned on ghats, into a horrific charnel house, killing more than 1,000 people.

George Sami, a former police detective, is appointed to investigate the tragedy by an old friend now in a position of power. Readers learn early on that a

ruthless businessman is probably responsible for the spill.

Despite the sweeping scope of the novel, and the opportunity to examine a fascinating society, the characters remain disappointingly static.

"The Exile Way," by Ann Woodward (Avon, \$5.50) — This unusual story is described as a mystery of ancient Japan, but it is probably better described as a political thriller.

Lady Aoi, the central figure,

serves in the household of one of the primary ministers of state. An expert in Chinese herbs, she uses her medical skills to help the emperor fight a disease that threatens blindness.

Infighting and treachery mark the court and Aoi's medicines and scrolls are stolen when an arson fire destroys the compound. Other fires and deaths follow, and Aoi and the Minister of the Right are arrested and sent into exile.

Hospital spokesman Ben Wise said the Jacksons, with their newborn, left the hospital about 8 a.m. destination unknown.

Jackson, 35, announced in November that Ms. Rowe, a 37-year-old nurse who worked with dermatologists, was six months pregnant with his child. They wed later that month.

# Boot camp BR5-49 gains a following

## The Boot Camp

Nashville, Tenn., was all black hair, slick back, and sticker pop when members of BR5-49 started performing together at a downtown boot camp a couple of years ago.

At the time, the commercial prospects for old western songs by Moon Mullican and Ernest Tubbs were just about zero.

"Ten, 15 years ago, if you'd tell people you're into Hank Williams, you were looked down on," says Don Herron, who plays steel guitar, mandolin, dobro, fiddle and acoustic guitar for the band.

**Nashville notes**  
At a time when surviving legends such as George Jones and

Haggard were having a tough time commercially, those who played decades-old tunes were looked upon as novelties — if they were looked upon at all.

"Still, folks got wind of what BR5-49 was doing at Robert's Western Wear. Lines formed around the block. Eventually, the store got rid of clothes to make more room for the crowds (although they kept selling the boots).

"Man, that was a blast," Herron recalls, over the phone from Athens, Ga.

Without worrying about making it big, getting a record contract or fitting in, five guys who shared a fondness for old-time music began drawing crowds as diverse as their own musical backgrounds — from gospel to funk.

The gig had an odd start. The clothing store — on Nashville's Broadway, down the block from the back door of the former Grand Ole Opry house, three doors from Foose's Orchard Lounge — initially hired acoustic acts to stand in the window and draw in nighttime customers.

Gary Bennett, who grew up in the American Northwest, where he played in a country gospel band, was hired to sing solo there. He brought in a friend, Chuck Mead, who had played in punk bands in Lawrence, Kan. They traded songs and combined voices into old-time Delmore Brothers harmonies.

Mead knew drummer "Hawk" Shaw Wilson from his Kansas days; he in turn knew a stand-up bassist, "Smilin'" Jay McDowell, from the band Hellbilly, who brought a rockabilly bounce to the band. Herron rounded out the band with some fiddle and steel guitar.

Like the others, Herron had learned to love the music early in life and was astounded to find like-minded musicians.

"I played for square dances when I was a kid," Herron says. "My folks were into it and had all the records, Kitty Wells and everybody."

Plus, being raised in Virginia, he had an ear to the country-western on clear-channel WWVA from Wheeling, W.Va.

"It was really strange to meet people who knew who Ernest Tubbs and Hank Williams, Ray Price and the Delmore Brothers were," says Herron. "I thought: These are the kind of people I need to be around."

The excitement of the boot store gigs was captured in an EP, "Live from Robert's," that preceded the band's major label studio debut, "BR5-49" on Arista. Soon, the band was playing places where boots were not the

main thing sold.

BR5-49 went on the road: opening for everyone from Rose Maddox to the Black Crowes. And they started getting a big following of traditional country fans.

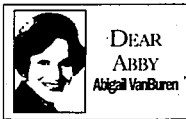
Contemporary country radio tends to scratch its head at its retro style — the group's first single, a revival of Moon Mullican's "Cherokee Boogie" stalled in the Top 40. The group's second single "Even If It's Wrong" has just been released.

And programmers ought to be even more confused by the next single, an original dirty that tells of a punk fan turned hillbilly fan, "Little Ramona."

"Some of them have played us, but some of them are a little nervous," Herron says of radio stations.

• **"Absolute Power"** — Master thief Clint Eastwood's caper gets him entangled in a murder involving the president of the United States. Eastwood directs a cast that includes Gene Hackman, Ed Harris, Scott Glenn and Judy Davis. From William Goldman's script and David Baldacci's novel. (R, for violence, sexuality and language.) (Mall Cinema, Jerome Cinema, Century Cinema of Burley)

**Capsule review**

• **"The Beautician And The Beast"** — The Tastykake of snack movies, this shameless and intermittently funny parody of all those fairytales about the upbeat teacher who brightens up a gloomy castle and its monarch-stars Fran Drescher and Timothy Dalton. PG (double-entendres) (Twin Cinema, Jerome Cinema)

• **"Dante's Peak"** — Disastrous disaster pic with Pierce Brosnan as a dapper volcanologist who arrives in town with dire warnings about lava and tsunamis, and then gets to play Mr. I-Told-You-So when his prophecies turn true.

Ralph Fiennes is a horribly burned amnesiac, fitfully piecing together the circumstances that brought him to his death in an Italian villa in World War II; Kristin Scott Thomas plays the woman of his dreams, Juliette Binoche the faithful nurse. Rated R; violence, sex. (Jerome Cinema)

• **"Fierce Creatures"** — Nine years later, the cast of the hilarious "A Fish Called Wanda" is reunited, but lightning fails to strike twice. This farce about a British bureaucrat (John Cleese) and his efforts to save his zoo from a billionaire and his demented son (both played by Kevin Kline) is more forced than frantic.

The other members of the original quartet, Michael Palin and Jamie Lee Curtis, are just sight gags. Curtis is the subject of more breast jokes than Dolly Parton. Rated PG-13; sexual references. (Acc Theater of Wendell)

• **"Fools Rush In"** — This beguiling winner is in the best tradition of Hollywood love stories, romantic and amusing, yet possessed of depth and in touch with reality and with

• **"Jerry Maguire"** — A hip and on-the-money romantic comedy with Tom Cruise as a sports superagent who has a moment of honest self-appraisal, which is suited in his huckstering profession. Cruise has traveled the hustler's path to redemption many times, but the glitzy sleaze of modern sports gives it new life and the performances are first-rate. PG-13 (language, nudity). (Twin Cinema)

• **"Jingle All the Way"** — Arnold Schwarzenegger is in so much trouble in Brian Levant's "Jingle All the Way" that Phil Hartman, playing a smarmy neighbor, exclaims, "You can't bench-press your way out of this." Given the leaden nature of the material, Schwarzenegger probably couldn't even bench-press the script. Who talked the Big Guy into this? (Twin Cinema)

• **"Michael"** — John Travolta as an arch archangel, a beer-swilling, chain-smoking debauchee whose mission is to restore cynical journalists William Hurt and Andie MacDowell their hearts. A slight comedy that strains for feather-lightness. PG (discreet sexual innuendo) (Gooding Cinema)

• **"Mother"** — Albert Brooks' drolly serious comedy about a twice-divorced writer who returns to the home of his mother in order to resolve his conflicted feelings about the woman who defined his relations to women.

• **"101 Dalmatians"** — It's supposed to be about dogs. It's not supposed to be a dog. Disappointing live-action remake of the Disney animated classic stars Glenn Close as Cruella, the kiddie Lady Macbeth who is upstaged — and outacted — by the spotted doggie thespians who play Pongo and Perd. The dogs are great, the humans forgettable. G (below-the-belt punches, cartoon violence) (Liberty Theater of Hailey)

• **"The Pest"** — Where's the surgeon general when you really need protection from toxic products? This hideously unfunny effort about a Miami con artist who will do anything for money wastes the talents of John Leguizamo. PG-13 (profanity, sexual situations, lewdness) (Twin Cinema)

• **"The Relic"** — A creature stalks the basement tunnels of a museum and eats the brains of its victims, whose ranks include the screenwriters. Penelope Ann Miller is the scientist trying to figure out the monster's origins as heads roll — literally — among museum guests trapped by bad dialogue and sealed fire doors. R (graphic violence, language.) (Liberty Theater of Hailey)

• **"Scream"** — Horror maven Wes Craven puts the usual suspects in the path of a stalking

# Michelle Shocked divorces record label

Mention "Mercury" to Michelle Shocked and her temper rises. In 1987, the 34-year-old artist signed to Mercury Records, the label that made stars out of Rod Stewart, Def Leppard and John Mellencamp. Despite critical acclaim and a hit with the touching "Anchorage," Shocked says their relationship — which was severed out-of-court in April after a feud that kept her out of the studio for four years — was acrimonious at best.

The two parties bickered over everything from album-cover art to the stylistic direction of her jazzy "Captain Swing" and her soul-stirring, intensely personal "Kind Hearted Woman." That album, partly inspired by the 1994 death of her grandmother in Dallas, was rejected by Mercury and has just been released by Shocked's new label, Private Music.

"They (record companies) know how vulnerable creativity is and that the slightest attack can make artists feel like an abused child and they'll

retreat," she says by phone from a California tour stop. "I refuse to look at them as my parents. I just look at them as equals in a power struggle." "This was a battle over creative destiny, and there's no hard-and-fast law that says just because you're pursuing your creative destiny that you need to be treated abusively," she says. "I need to be able to decide the direction and the appropriateness of the project I choose to do. Otherwise, let the vice president of business affairs make the record."

During a regular season where they won only four regular season games, the Bobcats turned the ball over frequently, got out-rebounded regularly and sent opponents to the line often.

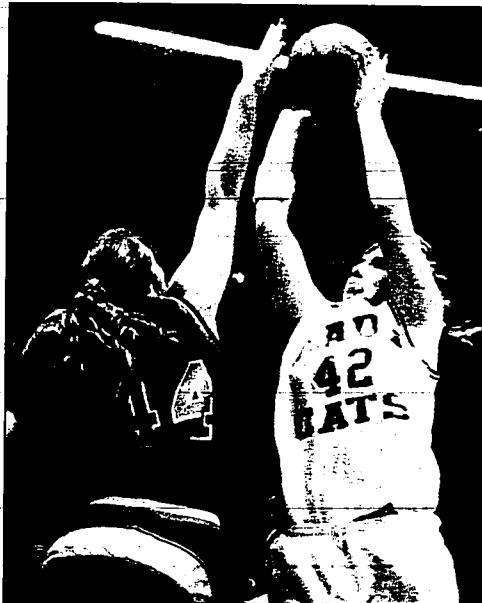

# Belle gambling case likened to that of Dykstra

CLEVELAND — Albert Belle probably will get at most one year's probation if major league officials determine he bet only on sports other than baseball.

Belle's security head is investigating Belle's testimony that he gambled on pro football, college basketball and golf games with friends; a high-ranking baseball official said Thursday on the

condition he was not identified.

Several baseball officials likened the situation to that of Lenny Dykstra. The Philadelphia outfielder was placed on probation for one year by then-commissioner Fay Vincent in 1991 after testifying about taking part in high-stakes poker games.

A source close to acting commissioner Bud Selig, who spoke on the condition he was not identified, said baseball wants to make sure Belle did not bet on his own sport. If baseball determines Belle didn't, the sport wouldn't impose a penalty more severe than probation, the official said.

Belle, the game's highest-paid player at \$11 million per season, said under oath he lost as much as \$40,000 gambling on sports, prompting baseball security head Kevin Hallinan to investigate. "Major league baseball will look

into the situation regarding the alleged gambling of Albert Belle, as it does with any issue," said another league spokesman Rich Levin. "Any media report that characterizes what action major league baseball will take, if any, is completely false."

Cleveland Indians general manager John Hart said Thursday that Hallinan warned him in March 1996 about Belle's possible involvement in gambling.

SEATTLE (AP) — In a sudden about-face, the Seattle Mariners are leaning toward playing the 1999 season in the Kingdome rather than their new \$450-million retractable roof.

The reason: The new 44,000-seat ballpark's retractable roof isn't expected to be completed until mid-1999 to spring 2000.

The Mariners' vice president Isaki told The Seattle Times. "It is too much of a financial risk. I can't overemphasize how big a risk that is."

One month after the Seattle Mariners' owners said a stadium opening in 1999 was essential to the franchise's economic livelihood and the team staying in Seattle, stadium officials now were looking into playing

an extra season in the Kingdome.

Team officials expect to make a decision about 1999 in the next few weeks, he said.

In December, the owners put the club up for sale and said King County officials were backing away from the new stadium project.

At that time, the owners insisted the ballpark be ready for the opening pitch in 1999 — even without a roof.

On Tuesday, the Mariners' owners said they had moved the club lost \$13.2 million although a club-record 2.7 million fans showed up at the Kingdome last season.

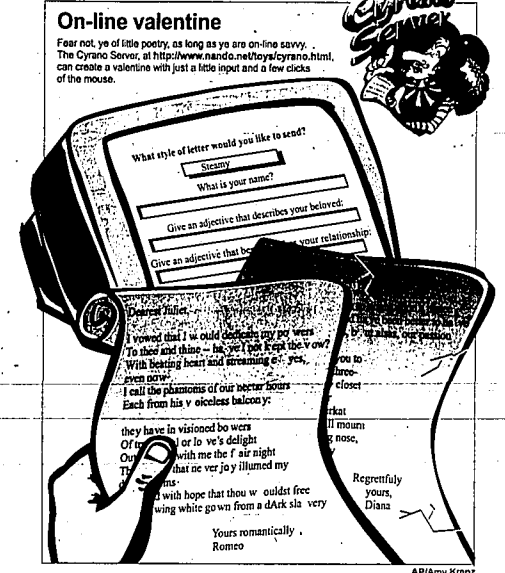

30-year fixed-rate mortgage rates decline over week

WASHINGTON — Thirty-year, fixed-rate mortgages averaged 7.65 percent this week, the lowest in seven weeks, according to a national survey released Thursday by the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp.

The decline, from 7.74 percent the week before, put that at the lowest level since the week ended Dec. 26, when it was 7.54 percent.

On one-year adjustable rate mortgages, lenders were asking an average initial rate of 5.52 percent, up from 5.51 percent last week.

Thirty-year mortgages, a popular option for those refinancing mortgages, averaged 7.14 percent this week, down from 7.25 percent a week earlier and the lowest in nine weeks.

The rates do not include add-on fees known as points.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Bobby Wolff

"Defeat is a school in which truth always grows strong."

West was the goat in today's defense. He knew enough about the layout to create a problem for declarer. Unfortunately, his good start, he set his sights on the wrong target.

South took dummy's heart jack and led dummy's spade queen, losing to West's king. Unsure of where the spade and diamond cards might be, West led another heart to South's ace. However when South led a club toward dummy, West could safely ace South held the spade ace. With both major suits blocked, West now had enough information to win his club ace and switch to diamonds. South's one-trump response precluded his possession of the ace of hearts.

Good analysis by West. His execution in diamonds was not. He led his diamond queen at trick three, concentrating on bagging the king. He succeeded in trapping the king but it was not victory. After the defenders took the ace and jack, South had two diamond winners to make his game.

To defeat the game, West must lead his diamond queen instead of his queen. Trapping dummy's king is not the issue, the objective is to win diamonds. If you win diamonds, you win the game.

After West leads the diamond queen, South's best chance for success is to play dummy's king. (East's holding either the queen or jack twice as likely as his holding the ace.) And when South makes the percentage play of the king, East wins and returns the suit for one down.

# Meryl Streep returns to TV in ABC drama

It's been nearly 20 years since she last did a drama for television, but two Oscars later, Meryl Streep is returning to it.

The esteemed actress went from her Emmy-winning performance in the 1978 miniseries "Holocaust" to Academy Awards for both "Kramer vs. Kramer" and "Sophie's Choice," and on Sunday, ABC scores a coup by bringing her back to TV in the new movie "... First Do No Harm." The title is a phrase in the Hippocratic Oath taken by doctors, and it's used in an ironic sense given the context of the story, since Streep plays a woman determined to find a successful treatment for her epileptic young son (portrayed by Seti Adkins) when she sees traditional medical avenues failing.

She researches a "Ketogenic Diet" that offers hope though it's officially untested, then but a doctor (Allison Janney) who feels the boy would fare better by undergoing surgery instead. The script was inspired by actual experiences of the film's director, Jim Abrahams ("Airplane!," "The Naked Gun"), whose own son was in a

verly similar situation; additionally, several of the cast members include Freddi (The Right Stuff) and Leo Burmester ("The Abyss"). Streep had no worries about trading a motion-picture schedule for the notoriously quicker pace of making a TV movie, since she maintains, "I've been working fast a lot. One of my most recent things was 'The Bridges of Madison County,' and [director and fellow star Clint Eastwood] made that in shorter time than this project. I frankly don't remember if it was really different back when I made 'Holocaust,' because that was the beginning of my career, and I was scared and just doing everything everybody said."

However, Streep adds, "This was a schedule I had a vested interest in

fulfilling, because I was an associate producer on the movie. We were funded by a very personal sort of fire on this; it was not purely an entertainment piece. It's unapologetically got an agenda, so we wanted to get the work done and we did. We'd talked about making this as a feature, and we thought only seven people would see it that way, so we figured the best way to get the largest possible audience would be to put it on TV."

The origins of "... First Do No Harm" date back to Streep's Abrahams children being schoolmates while she was working in California on some movies, and she recalls being aware of the "oral" of Abrahams and his wife "as they sort of negotiated this medical-labyrinth to find a treatment for [their son] Charlie's letter, and I can make him better. They had access to all the best medical advice on both coasts and in-between, and still there was not a good solution. (Abrahams) really found the Ketogenic Diet in a library, just before Charlie was due to have an other brain surgery."

## Celebrity gossip

Q: I remember hearing something about George Clooney becoming a father. Are he and his girlfriend expecting a baby? —J.E.

A: No, and they're not likely to be anytime soon. Clooney, 35, was recently quoted as saying that he "doesn't want children and would likely get a vasectomy to prevent it."

Girlfriend Celine Ballarin, whom he met at a

bar in Paris, reportedly wants children very much, so his comments were something of a shock. Clearly, Clooney's feelings that being an uncle is enough of a relationship with children may not suffice for Ballarin. Stay tuned.

Q: I remember reading that Brigitte Bardot was on trial in France. I thought she was living quietly, working for animal rights. What is this

about? —H.B.

A: Bardot is still devoted to animal rights causes, but she's become a bit noisier lately on other subjects, some very right-wing.

Last year, the 62-year-old former sex symbol penned a letter to the French newspaper Le Figaro blasting the invasion of her country by foreigners, mostly Muslims. Part of her complaint was about the Muslim ritual of slaughtering sheep. So, in response, two French anti-racist groups brought a suit against her, accusing her of inciting racial hatred. But she was cleared of the charges in court.

## 'Asteroid': A world in chaos

Whether or not Earth is ever struck by a large object from space, there's no doubt that the concept is hot as major hits out of screen time being devoted to big rocks falling from the sky.

"Two feature films begin spitting this sprit: 'Armageddon,' from Touchstone; and "Deep Impact," from Paramount and DreamWorks SKG. Last week on television, Discovery Channel premiered "Three Minutes to Impact," a two-hour special about past and future asteroid collisions. It repeats on Feb. 16 and 19.

Next week on NBC, National Geographic presents "Asteroids: Deadly Impact," that explores the risks posed by asteroids, comets, and meteors, and with geologist Gene Shoemaker and his astronomer wife, Carolyn. They, with David Levy, discovered Shoemaker-Levy 9, the comet that fragmented and crashed into Jupiter in 1994.

Between these actual explanations of disaster lies NBC's blockbuster miniseries "Asteroid," airing Feb. 16 and 17. Bradford May ("Darkman II & III") directs Peter Ware (Fox's "Doctor Who") is supervising producer. Sam Nicholson, president and CEO of special-effects house

Stargate Films, Inc., was visual effects producer.

Ironically, the story takes place around the Fourth of July, just like the devastating alien invasion in last summer's megahit feature film "Independence Day." But in "Asteroid," Earth has little or no chance of defeating this enemy from space.

Michael Biehn stars as Jack Wallace, the direc-

tor of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), who gets a call from Colorado astronomer Lily McKee (Annabella Sciorra). She has discovered that an approaching comet has disintegrated two large asteroids from their orbits in the asteroid belt between Mars and Jupiter, and they are on a collision course with Earth.
