SAN FRANCISCO — The planned shipment of highly radioactive spent fuel rods through San Francisco Bay to Idaho has angered local officials who on Friday were seeking to have the state attorney general block the federal program. The U.S. Department of Energy backs the shipments, saying they will take dangerous nuclear material from Asian reactors and put it in U.S. hands, out of the reach of terrorists or rogue states.

Later this year, the fuel rods are scheduled to begin passing through California, Nevada and Utah on their way to INEE.

But local officials say passing the shipments under the Golden Gate Bridge and through the San Francisco Bay area is too dangerous. "I don't think that they've adequately addressed some of the safety concerns," San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commissioner Craig Johns said Friday.

### Despite lawsuits against tobacco firms, smoking gains in popularity

WASHINGTON — A cigarette manufacturer's extraordinary confession this week of tobacco's dangers could set the stage for a final assault on smoking. But don't count the tobacco companies out yet. As the Liggert Group confirms what most Americans already believed, smoking is actually rising among teens. The Marlboro Man is riding his way to record profits. The industry still has lots of friends in Congress. And tens of millions of Americans are still addicted. All this at a time when government scrutiny of the tobacco industry has never been harsher, when dozens of states are suing \$\textstyre{L}\$ \$\text{T}\$.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal budget deficit swelled to \$44 billion in February, putting red ink for the first five months of the fissal year 12 percent ahead of the same period in 1000

February's imbalance followed two monthly surpluses and brought the deficit since the Oct. 1 start of fiscal 1997 to \$90 bil-lion, the Treasury Department

said Friday.

The deficit hit a record high of \$2904 billion in fiscal 1992 and then dropped in each of the succeeding years, hitting \$107 billion, a 17-year low, in 1996.

The Clinton administration is projecting an increase to \$1256 billion this year. But it has been negotiating with Congress to produce a budget that would eliminate the deficit by 2002.

WASHINGTON (AP) — After winning approval for his panel's budget, the chief House investigator of President Clinton's fund raising disclosed plans for more subpoenas Friday and predicted hearings in four to six weeks.

The panel is investigating whether the Chinese government tried to buy influence in the Clinton administration by funneling political donations to the Democratic Party through fund-raisers such John Huang and Yah Lin "Charlie" Trie, a frierad of the president.

The Democratic National Committee has said it will return almost \$3 million in contributions, about half raised by Huang.

The committee is also examin-ing how Democratic donors were given special access to the White House, including opportunities to sleep in the Lincoln Bedroom or

steep in the Lincoln Bedroom or attend social events with Clinton. Burton denied Democratic charges that he was conducting a partisan probe. "I'm going to do my best to be fair and impartial. I view my role as quasi-judicial," he said. But "my first job is to



### Puerto Ricans seek God outside of Catholic Church

ORLANDO, Fia. As a teen-ager in Puerto Rico, Alfrede Velazquez felt a spiritual emptiness that was not filled by the Catholic church that had served his family for generations. So he went to a Protestant church, a congregation in which he found the personal relationship with Jesus he sought, and Velazquez never regretted his decision.

The 34-year-old engineer, who moved to Orlando two years ago, attends services with his family at Iglesia Fuente de Agua Vivo —Fountain of Living Water Church. For centuries, Catholicism has been the dominant religion among Hispanies. But in recent decades Protestant missionaries in Central and South America have been drawing hundreds of thousands of converts away from the faith of their fathers and mothers. As Spanish-speakers have flocked to the United States, Protestant churches have targeted them, sponsoring missions and congregations.



WASHINGTON (AP) — Sally and Kevin Flood know what textbooks toxt. With four children in Indianapolis public schools, the family paid \$400 this year to rent books at one-fifth their price.

With 44 million children in public schools, textbook costs rising and competition from computer purchases, families, states and school districts are struggling to make sure there are enough textbooks to go around.

A pending bill in New Mexico would give school districts the flexibility to use a bigger share of money for scholastic magazines, daily newspapers and CD-ROMs.

A measure in Oregon would let local districts charge students for paperbacks — such as Judith Guest's novel "Ordinary People" — to supplement state-ordered anthologies.

"Often the one you pick has three stories that you use for teaching, and you're paying \$54 for the anthology," said Tom Hayes, curriculum director at the Bend-LaPine school district in Bend, Ore.





LONDON — V.S. Pritchett, a master of the English short story and lean observed of humanity, has died at age 96.

Pritchett, who had suffered a stroke in January, died Thursday at Whitmington Hospital, said his son, Oliver Pritchett.

Kniphred in 1975 for services to literature, Pritchett published more than 40 books of short stories, novels, essays, literary criticism, travel and autobiography. He was noted for his brilliant portraits of people in his stories and journalism.

In an interview with The Associated Press before his 90th birth-day, Pritchett offered this advice to aspring writers. "Unself yourself, Try for a moment to be the man you are listening to."

"I made a point of believing what I heard even though it was fantasy, because it is part of a man's nature to have fantasies. It has been succeeded in the part of the story of the story and The Times of London said of his travel stories, of the short story and The Times of London said of his travel writing: "Everywhere he slips unobrussively into the life of the country and lets it speak for itself."

RANGOON, Burma — The largest market in the city of Mandalay remained closed Friday and a curfew was in place following anti-Muslim rots earlier this week.

Tensions eased slightly in Burma's second-largest city, with fewer security parrols visible, but military guards were posted at several monasteries to regulate the movements of Buddinst medis, who participated in the riots.

Still, some shopkeepers in Mandalay, 450 miles north of Rangoon, the capital, kept their stores closed Friday. Residents said armored personnel carriers and army foot patrols were posted at key points to deter further violence.

About 300 fliers were placed on car windshields in the Twin Falls High School west parking lot March 13, offer through a Twin Falls post office box. Hrough a Twin Falls post office of through a Twin Falls part in Falls. Over the weekend, the fliers were distributed at City Park in Twin Falls. The "Cookbook" is collection of

instructions for making bombs, setting fires and creating civil unrest, and is available in many forms, including the Internet. The Hiers advertised a 600-page book for \$30.

Futting advertising on car wind-Futting advertising on car wind-shields is a violation of city ordinances, said Twin Falls. High student resource officer Brian Fike, a city police officer. But that's not the only reason Fike and city detectives are investigating the filers.

"Our concern is in what may be the motives behind it," Pike said. "If it's money, that's one thing. If it's trying to promote anarchy, or domestic terrorism that's something else."

The train also stops in Shoshone whenever there are passengers to pick up or drop off. The cut will leave southern Idaho without passenger train service.

### Strange bedfellows produce bills | ISU, UI want to pool resources on mining reform, jobless comp

BOISE (AP) — Traditional opponents surrounded Gov. Phil Batt on Friday as he signed consensus legislation on two habitually contentious issues — mining reform and unemployment compensation. And the cooperation between miners and environmentalists, labor and business on those bills reflects the way the nation's most Republican Legislature is dealing with ited and the way others are dealing with it. "It's good for the state of flasho," Batt said after signing both bills into land.

into law.

Mining reform requires actual cost bonding for reclaiming the land once the ore plays out and for miners to submit a formal plan for

operations and reclamation.

It was a significant moment to many in the Statehouse when Jack

Lyman of the Idaho Mining Association and Mike Medberry of the Idaho Conservation League stood together before legislative committees in support of the bill. Lyman called the measure the

stood together before legislative committees insupport of the bill. Lyman called the measure the most significant revision of the state's mining law since it was canacted Ze years ago. "It's going to make it tougher for us, more expensive for us, but we think that's the environment we'll be facing in the cuture." he told the governor. Medberry called the proposition are assonable approach to protecting the environment and taxpayers, who otherwise are left holding the bag for reclamation costs. While Bast has a reputation for trying to bring diverse views to some kind of consensus, the 1996 election's near elimination of

Democratic opposition from the legislative chambers was a key factor. With its traditional allies left ressentially powerless, environmentalists were forced to compromise as were many Republicans out to show that their overwhelming majority did not give business and industry free rein under the dome. "That forced us to be moderate, to build consensus," Medberry admitted, "and that forced moderate Republicans to be moderate." The employment compensation bill cuts the taxes employers pop to finance benefits for haid off workers by nearly \$23 million. Presidents Council at Thursday's state Board of Education meeting. Vocational Education Administrator Tutty Anderson, who originated the proposal, pointed out the disparity between fees for occational programs at the four-year schools. On average students pay 65 percent more for a two-year program at a fuery are school than at a two-year technical college, she said.

### Batt signs bill reforming citizen initiative process

BOISE (AP) — Dramatic changes in Idaho's 64-year-old cirizen initiative process have been signed into law by Gov. Phil Bart even though he says he has concerns about some of them.

"I'm a little concerned that some of the provisions are a little stringent," Batt said on Friday. "But they can be changed later."

The governor, who had indicated earlier his inclination to let the changes become law, specifically cited the new requirement for geographic dispersion of the signatures required to put an initiative on the ballot. Currently, there is no limitation on where registered voter-frameures goand to 10 percent of

taitive on the ballot.
Currently, there is no limitation on where registered voter eignatures equal to 10 percent of the last vote for governor must be gathered. They can all be gathered from one county, although that has never happened.

The new law adjusts the signature total to 6 percent of the registered voters in the previous election, currently the equivalent of 10 percent of the last vote for governor. That is intended to end the fluctuation in the total signatures needed based on election rumout.

But it also requires that at least 6 percent of the registered voters

in 22 counties sign the petitions.
Batt said that may be excessive although the could see the merit of some kind of requirement for geographic dispersion.

Gov. PHII Batt The bill also limits petition campaigns to 18 months before the early-luly deadline for submitting signatures in an election year, requires petition circulators to say whether they are paid or volunteers and allows the Supropriets claimed the vote.

Employers try to retain low-wage workers by offering helping hand

Executives at more than two dozen of the nation's largest corporations have been meeting quietly over the past year to brainstorm ways to recruit and retain workers who make less than \$8.50 an hour. Scattered labor shortages in parts of the country have made the issue more acute.

The human resources executives, gathering Thursday and Friday in Miami, have dubbed themselves the Employer Group, Of the 26 major corporations participating, only 10 have agreed to go public, with others fearing a potential public stigma of acknowledging a large portion of their workers earn less than federal poverty guidelines.

The companies that own fast food restaurant chains Burger King and Fizza Hut are in the Employer Group, as are Hyant Hotels Corp., financial services giant Aerna Life & Canaulty Co. and clothing manufacture of the companies of the control services of the control of the

The executives describe their motives as economic, not adrustice. All operate in highly price competitive industries that depend on stable, low-wage work forces, and they say market realities make it impossible to raise salaries significantly. Yet, the executives say they have learned it is in their interest to help workers cope with a variety of life's crises.

"We are being dragged into all these issues, forced to recognize this work force exists," said Charles Romeo, director of employee benefits at ConAgrar Refrigerated Foods in Geneva, Ill., the meat processing company that produces Swift and Armour products and Butterball turkeys. "If we don't, we won't exist. We need to better manages it." "We're simply trying to attack out challenges more effectively," said Jay Hundley, director of personnel at retailer J.C. Penney Co., a cofounder of the group along with Marriot International Inc. Hundley said J.C. # Companies turn to call centers for connection to customers

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — DirectIV employs 800 people in California to beam signals via satellite to customers' clevisions. But the fast-growing company has nearly triple that many people working on sales, marketing and customer service. And they're not even employees.



DirecTV is one of hundreds of companies outsourcing the customer contact part of their businesses. The trend is fueling phenomenal growth in a middle-aged but now retooled industry—teleservices.

What was, a decade ago, an industry of a thousand tiny companies with phone banks—not only the companies of the most in the contact of the companies of the companies had intial public stock offerings and nonther six had secondary offerings of stock, raising \$1.4 billion in capital from the public, according to the Dain Bosworth investment firm.

In the case of DirecTV, it was simply that the purent company, Hughes Electronics, didn't have a clue how to deal with consumers; its expertise was in satellites and defense customers. "Given the short time frame that we had to amass the expertise, we simply couldn't do it," said DirecTV spokesman Robert Mercer.

DirecTV contracted with Matrixs for all its sales, marketing and customer support nearly two years before it was launched

in June 1994. The company, now the biggest supplier of television channels via pizza-sized satellite dishes, has 2.4 million sub-

dishes, has 2.4 million sub-scribers.

The contract was pivotal for Marrix, a Cincinanti-based sub-sidiary of Cincinanti Bell and the largest of the teleservice compa-nies with \$367 million in revenue last year.

Matrixa employs 15,000 people at 19 call centers in eight states, with nearly half of its employed and centers in the contract of the with nearly half of its employed and centers in the delicated to the DirecTV account.

Two more centers are under way in Logan, Utah, and in Oklahoma City. Matrixx is the third largest private employer in Utah, behind Intermountain Health Care with 18,000 and Brigham Young University with nearly 15,000. Like Nebraska, lowa, Virginia, Florida and Ohio, Utah is attracting increasing numbers to the large of the control of

Florida and Ohio, Utuh is attracting increasing numbers of teleservice companies drawn by an educated labor force, many of whom are willing to work partime and speak multiple languages. The fact residents of those states speak without an accent helps.

The companies hire people to either take or make calls to belp a customer figure out how to reboot a laptop computer, use baby formula or choose a credit card.

And increasingly, they're

And increasingly, they're responding to e-mail queries with e-mail answers.

"Quite often these days, if you dial an 800 number for any orga-

dial an 800 number for any orga-nization... you can prety much rest assured that you're not call-ing that company directly." said Frank Casale, executive director of The Outsourcing Institute in New York.

"Most organizations... don't have the expertise nor the resources to build and manage a telemarketing department, he said. "That's why it (telescribe, tended to fairly quickly pop up as an ideal candidate for out-sourcing."

### Americans' economic confidence soars, but worrisome debt lingers By John Cunniff

NEW YORK — You have to admire the implications of those high consumer confidence levels, because they that good old American opinisms, that old-time faith in the future, is still alive. You might have thought that with all the talk of rising interest rates and such it would have began to crode a bit. But no. The Conference Board's data show consumers are the most optimistic they've been this decade.

They are confident because there are jobs to be had; the jobless rate is down to 5.3 percent.

And because inflation is checked; consumer prices are rising at only 2.3 percent annually.

And because incomes are rising; disposable incomes were up at a better

than 5 percent annual rate in the first quarter of 1997.
All this is pretty remarkable, none more so than the disposable income figure, which is computed after taxes. Last year the Tax Foundation estimated the average household tax bill was between \$23,000 and \$24,000.
Nothing:

523,000 and \$24,000.

Nothing, it seems, can undermine American-style confidence for long, it's a trait you can trace from the very beginning of U.S. history; and, with some notable exceptions, it has been justified. Faith and confidence pay off. It is so inherent in the American character that waves of immigrants all but sacrificed their lives because in doing so they were confident they were investing

in their children's future. They knew it would be worthwhile. But that was then. What about now? Fillings for personal bankruptcy last year surged past 1 million for the first time. "Surge" is the correct term; the one-year increase was 35 percent to 1,242,700.

1,242,700.
It isn't the only evidence of a major change in finances.
The number of Americans behind on credit-card bills rose at the end of 1996 to a record. The fourth-quarter delinquency rate was 3.72 percent, highest since 1973. That's when the records were first kern.

since 1973. That's when the records were first kept.
That, you would think, would suggest financial stress, but maybe not.
The industry mailed more than 2 billion solicitations lest year, slowing the pace only in the fourth quarter. Banks fought each other for customers — for

customers they knew rather little about. Some critics saw this as oblandy, but not many. Most people be theved lenders, who earlier had created the treign boar fiasco of the 1970s and the savings & loan debade in the 1980s, were sage and prudent people.

To bank economists — yes, even to some Federal Reserve bankers — the use of credit cards and mounting debts were evidence of economic confidence. Otherwise, they explained, people wouldn't dare take on debt.

Moreover, they add, household assets, such as housing prices and stocks, have risen sharply. And they are correct. But how do you tap housing prices and stocks — convert them to east— without selling? Or borrowing on them?

And because she's a co-owner, she'll automatically become sole owner of the bonds after your death, Nelson said. By law, savings bonds go directly to the surviving co-owner upon the other owner's death.



"They not only can go to her; they must go to her," Nelson declared.

By the way: The names of co-owners, as printed on the face of a savings bond, are always joined by the word "or" to indi-cate co-ownership, never by the word "and", Nelson said. (If the word "and" appears, it's by mis-take, she said.)



"West's pre-empt made the trump finesse against East a big favorite," announced South. "However, iddn't want to lose to a singleton queen with West." "You didn't," answered North. "Instead, you lost to an impotent queen with East." West's vulnerable pre-empt advertised a very long suit, so South Knew enough to expect West to hold distributional values. Correctly, South played West to hold a singleton trump. Had South cashed both high trumps, expectings a 2-2 break he would have had no chance. Four losers would have been unavoidable.

Unfortunately, South did the mext worst thing. He won dummy's heart ace and cashed dummy's trump king before taking the trump finesse. The finesse won, but it was not enough. If South drew East's last trump, he would lose two hearts, a club and a diamond. And when he tried to ruff a heart in dummy. East scored an overruff for the same one down. The winning move is to take an immediate trump finesse at trick two. When it wins, South gives West a heart trick but he retains control. If West leads a third heart, dummy ruffs with the king and another trump finesse picks up the trump suit. (If West loossn't exit in hearts, South ruffs one high himself.)
