

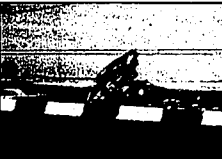

Jurors continue Diaz deliberations

BOISE—Jurors will begin a second day of deliberation today in the trial of Jesus F. Diaz, charged in connection with an April 1996 slaying of a Ruper man.
 A second trial stemming from the April 10, 1996, murder of Morgan went to an Ada County jury Thursday. Kody Butcher of Paul, has already been convicted of first-degree murder in a separate trial in February.
 Diaz, 39, is charged with aiding and abetting first-degree murder. Following closing arguments, the nine-woman, three-man jury took control of the case at 11:30 a.m. Thursday.

Despite having first and last opportunity to address the jury, prosecuting attorney John Bradley talked for less than half as long as defense counsel Andrew Parnes.
 Parnes spent 50 minutes emphasizing to the jury terms and concepts such as presumed innocent, burden of proof, reasonable doubt and the defendant's option of testifying. He also attacked individual items in the prosecution's case, trying to raise doubts of Diaz's involvement in the crime as well as shift the blame to Diaz's stepbrother, Gilbert Rodriguez.
 During the Butcher trial, testimony from two witnesses linked Rodriguez to the Morgan murder.

During Bradley's first talk, Parnes raised a heated objection to the prosecutor's use of phrases such as "snip doctors" and "cruel and crafty" in referring to defense strategy.
 Judge William Hart sustained Parnes' objection, but denied a defense motion for a mistrial made while the jury was in recess before Parnes' closing argument.
 "I am, in essence, outraged by Mr. Bradley's remarks," Parnes said to Hart when moving for mistrial. "I think he's tainted the jury."
 "I was trying to talk about the way the defense was trying to interpret the evidence," Bradley explained to the judge.
 In his argument, Parnes attacked most of the testimony of Angela Lara, who has

testified that Diaz threatened Morgan two weeks before the murder.
 Parnes said Lara was covering for Rodriguez, and investigators threatened and coerced her into testifying.
 Parnes also questioned the strength of the evidence of the sneakers, used to kick open Morgan's front door. He claimed Rodriguez wore the shoes that were positively identified by their print, and discovered by police in Diaz's bedroom.
 "This case is really built on the sneakers," Parnes said. "The prosecution found the sneakers and put the blinders on. You never heard any evidence that anyone ever saw Mr. Diaz wearing those sneakers."

Jerome students get education in business

JEROME—Linda Grey stood at the front of a classroom in Jerome Central Elementary School Thursday, showing the students a series of advertisements she had taken out of magazines.
 The fifth-graders responded excitedly to many ads, especially those with such celebrities as the cast members of the TV sitcom "Friends," or the cartoon series "The Simpsons."
 But Grey wanted her students to see more than famous faces and funny graphics.
 "The point I'm trying to make to you guys is that whenever a company is trying to sell a product, they try to focus your attention on something that will make it sell," she said.
 Grey is not the students' regular teacher. She's not a teacher at all. She

owns and manages Stained Glass Reflections in Jerome.
 Grey and several other local business volunteers are visiting fifth-grade classrooms for an hour each week during a five-week Young Achievement program sponsored by the Jerome School District.
 The program is in its second year and is part of a statewide effort to get JA into the lower grades, said Stacy Henrickson, district manager for JA in Boise.
 The program has been going in Boise for 42 years, she said, but hasn't expanded into many of Idaho's smaller school districts.
 The Jerome program includes lessons in business organization, management decisions, production, marketing and sales presentations. It's part of a larger effort to show students the real world of business and work, said George Shannon, the JA and school-to-work program coordinator at Jerome High School.

"We want to get teachers and students and business people working together," he said.
 So far, JA is only in the fifth grade in Jerome, run on a \$750-a-year grant that covers the cost of materials.
 The district hopes to expand the program into all grade levels.
 District Curriculum Director Sandra Thompson said showing students how businesses work can motivate them to do better in school. Business people can show students how they use math, reading and other skills at work every day.
 JA volunteer Barbara Morales, who works at the Jerome University of Idaho extension office, said the program helps students appreciate what goes into the production and marketing of everyday items.

Teen sex down, contraceptive use up, survey finds

WASHINGTON—After climbing steadily for more than two decades, sexual activity among American teenagers has declined, the first drop since the federal government began tracking the information in 1970, according to a new government survey released Thursday.

Among girls aged 15 to 19, the proportion who reported having had sexual intercourse had fallen to 50 percent in 1995 from 55 percent in 1990, the last time the study was conducted. A separate federal study showed the figure for boys had dropped to 55 percent in 1995 from 60 percent in 1990.
 The national studies also found that teenagers who are sexually active are more

likely to use contraceptives than they were in the past, and condom use has increased most dramatically.
 Those two changes — fewer teenagers having sex and better contraceptive use among those who are — explain why the birth rate among teenagers has fallen since

Clinton, lawmakers near balanced-budget deal

WASHINGTON—President Clinton and Republican leaders in Congress moved Thursday to the brink of a balanced-budget deal that would cut taxes, trim Social Security benefit increases and boost spending on education and the environment.
 The prospect of a budget accord between the White House and GOP leaders stirred fierce opposition in both parties — and especially angry remarks from Democratic congressional leaders who feel they have been left out of negotiations.
 An agreement could come as early as Friday, but some Republican leaders said an announcement might be delayed until Monday.
 Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., who has been leading the negotiations

for the GOP, said: "We're very close. We're hopeful that something can be worked out. There seems to be a lot of momentum."
 But criticism from both liberals and conservatives over details of the proposal indicated that passage in Congress could be unusually difficult.
 The deal under discussion projected a balanced budget in five years and called for \$135 billion in tax cuts, including a phased-in \$500 per child tax credit, capital gains tax reductions and a doubling of the estate tax exemption from \$600,000 to \$1.2 million.
 It also would include a version of Clinton's plan for tax incentives for college students, one of his prime campaign proposals. The net tax cut over five years would be \$85 billion to \$90 billion, largely as a result of \$50 billion in new revenue from extending the airline ticket tax and other proposals.

Forest Service reduces user fee proposal

Public comment in March and April sparked change

SUN VALLEY—The U.S. Forest Service announced Thursday reduced user fees proposed for the Sawtooth National Recreation Area and the Ketchum Ranger District, due to public comment in March and April.
 After more than 200 letters received, Ketchum District Ranger Kurt Nelson said there was "no evident mandate nor universal solution apparent" from the comments, but the majority supported some type of fee for recreation in the districts.
 Under the revised plan, a family of four would pay \$20 — rather than \$25 as originally proposed — for an annual pass. The revised fee schedule would include an individual day pass for \$2 and an annual pass for \$5 per person. Children under 7 would use the forest free of charge, and discounts for senior citizens and the disabled would be available through the Golden Age and Golden Access passports.

The revised proposal and public comments will be submitted to national headquarters for approval, with a decision expected by mid-May. If approved, user passes will go on sale by mid-June.
 "We adjusted our fee proposal to respond to the many concerns we heard about minimum-level pricing, simplicity and the need for improved road, trail and site maintenance," SNRA Manager Paul Ries said.
 The SNRA and Ketchum Ranger District were selected as part of a three-year test to determine whether recreationists will accept user fees.
 Under the plan set up by Congress, 100 percent of the fees collected must be used directly to enhance the area where they were collected, Nelson said.
 "The whole focus of this is to put money back into the facilities, trails and roads people are using," Nelson said, adding that this plan would keep the dollars here for much-needed forest improvements.
 Many people asked the Forest Service to waive fees for certain user groups, Nelson said. People who are unable to pay due to low income or financial hardship could receive a fee waiver.
 Other exclusions would be:
 • Use of developed recreation sites which already have an established fee, such as campgrounds.
 • Use of commercial businesses, private land and residential communities.

Rain spreads across East as Northwest dries out, warms up

A strong low pressure system moved northeast into New England on Thursday, bringing rain showers to a wide area from the Tennessee-Valley-to-Maine.

Thunderstorms along with high winds and hail were expected from eastern areas of Kentucky and Tennessee into Virginia, Pennsylvania and New York.
Strong winds continued throughout the Great Lakes and northern Ohio Valley, with gusts up to 45 mph. It was a calm but cool day from Illinois and Wisconsin to Alabama and Georgia.

A storm system in the central Rockies was creating scattered showers from Montana into northern Oklahoma, with thunderstorms expected later.
The Southwest was clear and dry, thanks to a high pressure system moving in off the Pacific Ocean. Temperatures were in the 80s and 90s in the desert areas.

The system was also bringing dry weather to the Pacific Northwest.
In Idaho, high snow fell over the southeast and higher elevations of northern Idaho.
Skies were cloudy over most of the state except in southern central Idaho, where afternoon skies were partly cloudy.
Temperatures across the state ranged from a high of 52 degrees at Lewiston and a low of 27 degrees at Mullan Pass.

• Use of organization camps and recreation residences under special-use permits.
• Legitimate nonrecreation business such as logging and grazing.
• Nonstop travel using the state highway.
• Search and rescue efforts.
Forest Service volunteer projects and school-sponsored educational events.
All other users would be required to buy passes at Forest Service offices and local vendors to display in their vehicles and carry in their wallets.

Forest Service officials said that with more than 1.5 million visitors annually, the Sawtooth National Forest has long been one of the state's most widely visited recreation areas.
"More than half of these visitors use areas of the forest where no fee is charged now but visitors expect maintained trails, Nelson said.
"With a 50- to 60-percent compliance rate, an estimated \$700,000 to \$1.3 million annually would be available for local improvements if users cooperate and purchase the passes, Nelson said.

Police send separatists final offer, may move in soon

FORT DAVIS, Texas (AP) — Police negotiators sent 13 besieged Texas separatists a final offer Thursday night and will move in to arrest them if they do not accept, the group leader's lawyer said. The state confirmed the offer but would not elaborate.
Lawyer Terry O'Rourke, who represents Republic of Texas leader Richard McLaren, said he delivered the state's offer to the group in a "diplomatic pouch" at about 8 p.m.
"I closed the letter to my client by saying, 'It is essential you pick up the phone and say you are coming out because they've made it clear that they're going to execute the warrants,'" O'Rourke said. "I am advising my client in no uncertain terms to end it."
State Department of Public Safety spokesman Mike Cox refused to discuss the agency's timetable.

Land stages landslide

LONDON (AP) — The Labor Party stormed to a landslide election victory today, ending a generation of Conservative rule and making 43-year-old Tony Blair the youngest prime minister in 185 years.
As the vote count continued, Labor clinched a majority in the House of Commons early today by gaining 342 seats. It needed at least 330 seats in the 659-member House to take power.

Roosevelt's legacy seen across the nation

ADRIAN, Mich. (AP) — Moving slowly about his living room, his knees stiffened by arthritis, Norris Pentland is a living reminder of Franklin D. Roosevelt's legacy.

"Norris is a lot of hard work," he says, recalling his Depression years in a Civilian Conservation Corps camp.

On one granite wall of the monument to the man who served as president through the Great Depression and Second World War are these words of Roosevelt:

"I propose to create a Civilian Conservation Corps to be used in simple work."

Pentland's is a life shaped by those words.

"I think it's one of the most wonderful things that's ever happened," he said. "It sure did help a lot of guys."

Roosevelt wasn't all that popular in this corner of southeast Michigan. In his four successful campaigns for president, he never carried Lenawee County.

But his legacy is as strong here as elsewhere across America. It exists at Hayes State Park, largely built by Pentland's sign unit, and in the old gymnasium at Adrian College and in the airport and the home for the aged. Not long ago, it was easy to find the concrete sidewalks installed here by workers from the Works Progress Administration.

Beyond the brick and pavement, Roosevelt's legacy also lives in the blood and bone of human experience, in how people remember their lives during the Depression.

"We didn't have Social

Security," recalls Selma Larson. "Our parents were very poor. I'm second-oldest in a family of 14. We had a lot of children and I remember that my father, who was a farmer, he ended up having to go on the WPA for a while digging ditches and my brothers went to the CCC."

Mrs. Larson is 78 and has spent years working with issues of concern to the elderly. Older people survived the Depression, she says, because "the families all lived near each other and families took care of each other."

Passage of the Social Security Act of 1935 changed that.

"It freed the younger members of the family to go anywhere they wanted to work," said Mrs. Larson. "They didn't have to

have that immediate responsibility for their parents."

As director of the county historical society, Charles Lindquist can list many of the New Deal projects around Adrian — the hospital addition that later became the Stevenson Home for the Aged; the college gymnasium, and Hayes State Park.

No one realizes these are Depression-era projects," he said. "People don't much like the government around here. So they don't mind forgetting or covering up the fact that we have a lot of New Deal-era buildings."

As in Adrian, FDR's legacy is evident in landmarks across the nation.

"People probably drive by, use,

see landmarks throughout this country every day and have no awareness that these were built by the government," said Vernon Newton, director of the FDR Library and Museum in Hyde Park, N.Y.

"You see the notion today that government can't do any good. But I think that that was one of the greatest of FDR's legacies: to show what the government can do."

When the Depression came, banks were among the businesses hardest hit. Michigan was one of the first states to declare a bank holiday in an effort to stave off collapse of some of the largest financial institutions.

William R. Thompson was running the 100-year-old family bank in Hudson when the order came to close down.

In defiance of calls from state and federal banking officials, "My father did not close a single day during that bank holiday period," says William G. Thompson, who is a Republican like his father.

"My father told me he voted for Roosevelt his first term and then he regretted it afterward," Thompson recalls. "But I personally think that Roosevelt was quite a man. I admired him in a lot of ways even though I didn't agree with a lot of his policies. I think maybe he saved the country."

Faun Platt, a Republican all of the 1950s, readily agrees when people in rural communities helped each other. There was no other choice in that pre-Roosevelt time.

She recalls bursting into tears after giving birth at home in 1930 to her younger son.

"I've got a nice baby boy. I know," she told the doctor. "But what about the money? How am I going to pay you?"

"Sometime when you're down town, just bring me a dozen eggs," he replied.

Years later, Mrs. Platt served as chairman of the county Republican Party, a time she fondly recalls as "out of this world."

Military workers may soon be on their own

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the presidential election approaching, President Clinton promised to save jobs at two huge military bases that were closing in Texas and California.

Now, with the Pentagon scrambling to find money for new weapons, defense officials are telling workers at the bases that there are no guarantees. In addition, the Pentagon is signaling that an upcoming review of national military strategy will include a recommendation for more base closures.

Deputy Defense Secretary John White, the Pentagon's No. 2 official, made those points last Thursday to the Senate Armed Services subcommittee. That is, the thousands of military aircraft maintenance workers at McClellan Air Force Base in Sacramento, Calif., and Kelly Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas, may be on their own.

"Is there an administration guarantee on the number of jobs at Kelly and McClellan that will

stay at those areas?" asked Sen. Chuck Robb, D-Va.

"No sir," White replied. "We were very careful to say — obviously it was our expectation that there was an opportunity here — we could not make any guarantee."

Robb replied, "So the expectation would be based on optimism, hope, but no explicit guarantee?"

"That's correct," White replied.

The Pentagon's stance contrasts starkly with the pledges Clinton made in Texas and California during his re-election campaign.

When the 1995 base-closure commission proposed closing Kelly and McClellan, Clinton reluctantly agreed but said, "It's there a way to accept (the closures) and minimize the economic loss in the areas where I think it is plainly excessive? That is what we have been working on."

At a stop in San Antonio last year, Clinton said of Kelly, "We're not shutting this base down, we're transforming it."

The Pentagon called it "privatization in place," in which the military base would close but private contractors would continue to maintain military aircraft at the same site.

Now the pressure is on both the administration and Congress to find billions of dollars to build weapons such as the F-22 fighter and New Attack Submarine. Comments by White and Defense Secretary William Cohen indicate that an upcoming Quadrennial Defense Review of the nation's military will recommend more base closures to generate money for weapons.

"There should be another BRAC," said White, a reference to the base closure commission.

While White refused to name any bases as likely targets, he did note that there remains unused capacity at the three Air Force maintenance depots kept open in 1995: Tinker Air Force Base, Oklahoma City; Hill AFB, Ogden, Utah; and Robins AFB near Macon, Ga.

Lawmakers from these states were enraged by Clinton's plan to save jobs in California and Texas because, otherwise, their home-state bases would have gained Air Force jobs. Sen. Max Cleland, D-Ga., worried aloud in Thursday's hearing that another round of base closings would make Robins an obvious target.

In the meantime, "privatization in place" appears to have gone the way of the Edsel.

"Our closure strategies do not mandate 'privatization in place,'" White said. "There is nothing in our policy that requires private offerors to utilize these closing facilities."

Translation: Someone will continue to maintain Air Force planes, but not necessarily in Texas. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, said in an interview he never counted on Clinton administration pledges to save jobs at Kelly.

Bill protects volunteers from liability

WASHINGTON — The Senate approved a bill Thursday that would protect volunteers from some liability claims stemming from their efforts.

The measure, if passed by the House and signed by President Clinton, will serve as "a protective buffer, a shield for the well-meaning volunteer," said Sen. Paul Coverdell, R-Ga., the bill's chief sponsor.

"Volunteerism has been chilled and threatened and pushed back and been less exuberant ... because of the threat of legal consequences," Coverdell said.

The need for liability protection has grown "since the mid-1980s, when volunteers suddenly found themselves the targets of lawsuits in the act of volunteering," he said.

Worker dies at Antarctica research base

SYDNEY, Australia — "A winter darkness settles over Antarctica, American researchers in isolated McMurdo Station mourned a colleague who died of heart failure Thursday — two days before an attempt to fly him out.

Researcher Charles Gallagher, 50, had suffered for days from pneumonia, dehydration and fluid buildup around his heart, McMurdo staff told The Associated Press via e-mail.

Gallagher, a U.S. Navy retiree who was in charge of recreational activities at McMurdo, was the 48th American staffer to die in Antarctica since 1955. Nearly all the other deaths were due to accidents.

The U.S. Air Force had been preparing for a risky-winter airlift Saturday to bring Gallagher out for treatment. The base is a nine-hour flight from New Zealand, the closest country.

Comp time benefits to women stressed

WASHINGTON — The Senate opened debate Thursday on a bill that Republicans say would permit more flexible workplace schedules, benefiting hurried working mothers in particular.

"This would be the very best Mother's Day present we could give to the United States," said Sen. John Ashcroft, R-Mo., the main sponsor. "It would absolutely be of help to working mothers."

The bill is strongly opposed by labor unions who contend employers could force employees into accepting compensatory time off instead of overtime pay. President Clinton has threatened to veto it, and many congressional Democrats oppose it as an attack on the 40-hour work week first guaranteed in 1938. The House passed a similar bill in March.

'Ellen' coming out draws good ratings

NEW YORK — "Ellen's" coming-out episode scored more than twice its usual audience in the ratings of major media outlets, the network said Thursday.

The hour-long program Wednesday scored a 26.5 rating and 37 share in Nielsen Media Research's overnight measurements. The show had its highest ratings in Boston and Seattle, the network said.

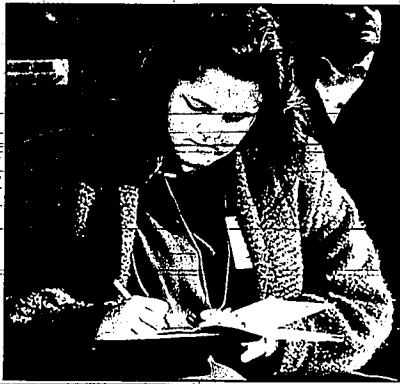
Product-tampering case appears isolated

McVeigh needed detonator 'bad'

DENVER (AP) — Six months before the Oklahoma City bombing, Timothy McVeigh was so eager to buy a detonator for a bomb that he was willing to drive across country to get it, a former arms-dealer testified Thursday.

"He needed it bad," said Greg Pfaff, recalling a phone call from McVeigh that came about the same time he purportedly told Lori Fortier of his plans to blow up a federal building to avenge the government siege at Waco, Texas.

McVeigh, who was calling from Arizona, said he would personally pick up the detonator from Pfaff, who had mostly given up the arms business and was running a deli in Harrisonburg, Va.

Pfaff told McVeigh that it seemed like a long drive.

"He said it didn't matter," said Pfaff, who was never able to produce the detonation cord.

Pfaff was the first in a line of prosecution witnesses who suggested McVeigh had the insur-

re- materials and a hateful motivation to build a large truck bomb before the April 19, 1995, blast that killed 168 people.

David Darlak, a high school friend from upstate New York, testified he hadn't heard from McVeigh in two years when he got a call from him in 1994 asking where he could buy some racing fuel.

Darlak said he didn't know, and asked McVeigh why he needed it. Darlak didn't elaborate on McVeigh's response.

Prosecutors say nitromethane fuel, often used in drag racing, was mixed with ammonium nitrate fertilizer to make the truck bomb.

A publisher of military how-to books testified the recipe was in a book McVeigh ordered in 1993 that gave step-by-step directions on how to build bombs that can destroy bridges, shatter steel and demolish tanks.

NRA leadership fights renewed ouster attempt

SEATTLE (AP) — The National Rifle Association has seen better days.

Membership and assets are down, the group is out of ammunition in the battle to repeal the Brady bill and assault weapons ban and top leaders are exchanging potshots at each other.

And as the association convenes here for its annual conference, more than 150 people are on the ballot for one seat on the 76-member board of directors. Candidates include actor Charlton Heston and former Reagan administration White House aide Oliver North. Heston appears ready to campaign actively for the seat and for current leadership.

The 126th convention of the nation's oldest and largest gun rights group is expected to pull 15,000 to 25,000 target shooters, hunters, gun dealers and collectors. Second Amendment activists, firearms manufacturers

and weapons safety instructors. It runs Friday through Sunday at the Washington State Convention and Trade Center.

Leadership battles could be resolved in a two-day board meeting that begins Monday.

Gulf illness panel blasts Pentagon

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon and CIA came under renewed fire Thursday from a presidential panel, including assertions they were overly cautious in investigating health problems among Persian Gulf War veterans.

It accused the Defense Department of obstructing the panel's work.

In a move to strengthen their credibility, the Defense Department and the CIA jointly appointed former Sen. Warren E. Rudman as an adviser on Persian Gulf War veterans' illnesses.

Rudman's role will be to "find the facts," Defense Secretary William Cohen said.

The New Hampshire Republican will emphasize questions about the handling and use of intelligence information during the 1991 Gulf War that could have prevented some troop exposure to chemical agents.

A memorandum released Thursday by the Presidential Advisory Committee on Gulf War Veterans' Illnesses blasted the Pentagon and the CIA on several fronts including the allegation of Defense Department obstruction.

"We remain guarded in our assessment of DOD's willingness to provide access to information critical to our work," the panel said in its memo to Cohen.

Bryan Whitman, a Pentagon spokesman, said the Defense Department did its best to cooperate with the presidential panel but believed it was prudent to take an intentionally deliberate approach to resolving chemical-exposure questions.

"We're doing the most we can to make this as open as possible," Whitman said.

Although scientists are divided over whether exposure to chemical weapons can cause the kinds of health problems Gulf War veterans have reported, the presidential panel said the Pentagon should have pursued the matter more aggressively.

"In the face of substantial, credible evidence to the contrary, DOD's consistent denial to June 1996 of the possibility of exposure of U.S. troops to chemical warfare agents cannot be justified," the panel said.

It added the Pentagon passed up chances to obtain information about possible troop exposures and as a result "undermined its credibility with much of the American public."

By appointing Rudman as an adviser, Cohen and George Tenet, the CIA's acting director, hope not only to dispel any notion they are hiding information about Gulf War illnesses but also to repair damage to their agencies' credibility. Rudman is vice chairman of the president's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board.

In an effort to outline Rudman's duties, he met Thursday at the Pentagon with Bernard Rosker, the Pentagon's chief adviser on Gulf War health matters.

During a Pentagon photo session, Cohen said Rudman's appointment constituted a further attempt to "find out the facts."

He said Rudman would act as ombudsman in dealings with the CIA and the Pentagon and would add a highly respected and independent "point of view" to the investigation.

Reflecting dissatisfaction with existing TV ratings, a Senate panel voted its support Thursday for legislation that could either require stronger ratings or ban violent shows when children are likely to be watching.

The Senate Commerce Committee voted 19-1 to send the bill to the Senate for consideration. The action turns up the pressure on the TV industry to voluntarily strengthen its six-tier, age-based ratings systems that went into effect New Year's Day.

"It's a sad day for the republic," said ABC lobbyist Billy Pitts. If the bill were enacted "shows like 'Schindler's List' could not be shown to broad audiences."

The Senate could vote on the measure this month, aides said. But there appears to be less enthusiasm for an identical bill in the House, creating uncertainty whether the legislation will ever become law.

The bill by Sen. Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C., responds to complaints that the industry's movie-like ratings don't give parents enough information about the type, amount and intensity of violence in each show.

"It may be the only way to get broadcasters to do what Congress envisioned... empower parents to protect their children from harmful television programming," said the committee's chairman, Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., who had voted against an earlier version of the bill.

Existing ratings use designations from "TV-G," programs suitable for all ages to "TV-MA," for mature audiences only. Most shows have been rated "TV-PG," parental supervision suggested.

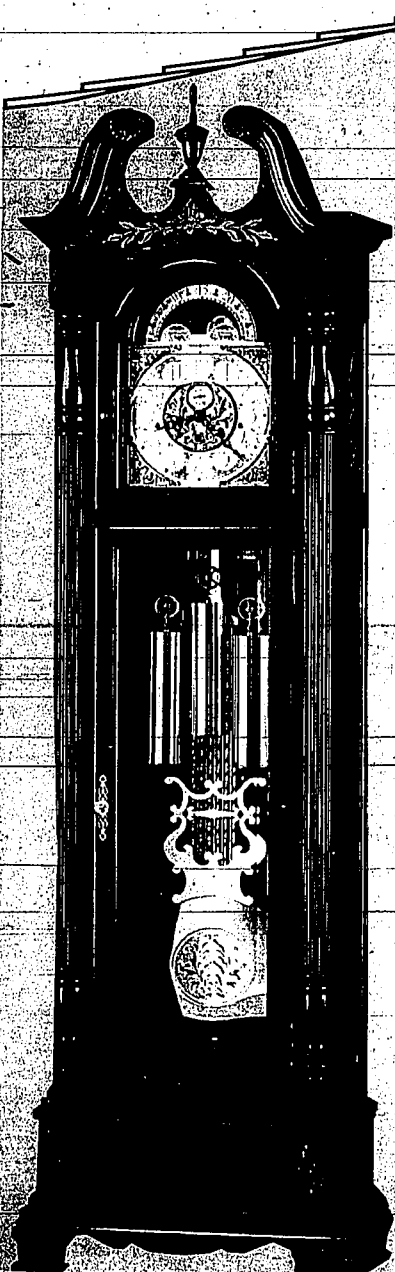

Russia, NATO arrangement remains elusive

MOSCOW (AP) — Despite the urging of Russian President Boris Yeltsin from his vacation dacha, American and Russian negotiators were unable Thursday to agree on terms for expanding NATO.

"We are earning our pay," Secretary of State Madeleine Albright told reporters after talking 2 1/2 hours with Foreign Minister Yevgeny Primakov on a charter to link Russia with an Atlantic alliance expanded to its western border.

Primakov noted jokingly that his pay probably is less than Albright's, then carefully spoke of the problems they face: "There are some outstanding issues without whose resolution it cannot be signed."

He added, "I think neither side has made its final positions on the details."

While NATO already has assured Russia there would be no nuclear weapons in the expansion area, nor many troops deployed, a senior U.S. official said the United States is

willing to clarify the assurances in a Russia-NATO charter. The official, who briefed reporters on condition of anonymity, said of the Russians: "In a deeply, deeply visceral way, they regard NATO as something that was founded to defeat them."

Pressing on the negotiators is a hoped-for signing of the charter in Paris on May 27. State Department spokesman Nicholas Burns said "the pace has got to quicken" to meet the target date.

TWIN FALLS - Tours, prizes and refreshments are planned to celebrate the new cardiac-vascular laboratory at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

The \$1.9 million laboratory is a new service in the region to diagnose heart problems. Previously, patients had to travel to Boise or Salt Lake City.

An estimated 171 patients are expected to be treated during the first year at the laboratory, which opened for use early last month at the county hospital.

In the procedure, a cardiologist inserts a long flexible tube into a blood vessel in the upper leg or arm and guides it to the heart. A dye is introduced, and on a monitor, the doctor can see blocked arteries to determine whether surgery or other medical treatment is required.

Jerome BMX track heads down new track

JEROME - Sponsors of a local BMX track hope to get a jump on this year's racing season through a temporary track at the Jerome County Fairgrounds.

Two events that will draw BMX racers from all over Idaho and neighboring states are set for May 24 and 25, said Bill Cavthra of Jerome.

Cavthra has been the main sponsor of plans to build a BMX track southeast of town on land donated by retired rancher Ray Lickley.

But the project hit a snag last month, when Cavthra missed the deadline to submit a special-use permit for the track from the Jerome County Planning and Zoning Commission.

Cavthra said the special use permit request will probably go before the planning commission later this month, but the delay means this track might not be finished until next summer.

Meanwhile, an 1,100- to 1,300-foot racing track will be built at the fairgrounds in mid-May so it can be ready in time for the upcoming races, Cavthra said.

The track will be open only for organized races or supervised practice sessions for racers, he said.

Fairgrounds manager Rob Lundgren said the Jerome County Fair Board gave the BMX sponsors the go-ahead to build the track in a hay field on the west end of the grounds. The board wants \$500 to cover lost hay production.

Whether the track will stay depends upon the results of the first racing weekend, Lundgren said.

If the races go well and draw a big crowd, the fair board may decide to keep the track open and ask for a percentage of concessionaires' profits from future races, he said.

Cavthra said the May 24 race will be sanctioned by the American Bicycle Association, and racers will compete to build up points for the state finals. There will be a \$15 entry fee and only

ABA registered racers can participate.

Temporary ABA memberships will be available at the track for \$15, while full memberships will cost \$35, he said.

The following day, the fairgrounds track will host the "Race For Life," which will raise money for the Leukemia Society, Cavthra said. There will be a \$10 entry fee, but racers do not have to be ABA registered.

Racers can also get sponsors to help raise money for the Leukemia Society, Cavthra said. Race For Life sponsorship forms are available at George's Human-Powered Sports and The Spoke and Wheel Bike Stop in Twin Falls, and Rock's Cycling and Fitness in Burley.

Cavthra said he hopes the events will draw several hundred racers from around the region.

He also hopes for donations from area businesses to pay for the fairgrounds track, which will probably cost several thousand dollars to build.

Jerome auto dealer Con Paulos said

the track will give local youngsters something to do and will also bring money into Jerome during big races.

"I think it's good for the kids; they'll be using physical energy," Paulos said.

"We're probably going to be one of many local businesses that will be helping with the track."

Ron Choate of Jerome said his 12-year-old son, Roy, spent several months earning about \$200 through odd jobs to buy a new BMX bike, only to hear the track southeast of town had been delayed.

"He was pretty bummed," Choate said.

But Choate said he hasn't given up on BMX catching on in the Magic Valley and will try to make it to the races at the fairgrounds.

"Right now, there's only about three or four kids who race in Twin Falls and Jerome," Choate said.

The course will be taught at the state Police Officer Standards and Training facility in Meridian.

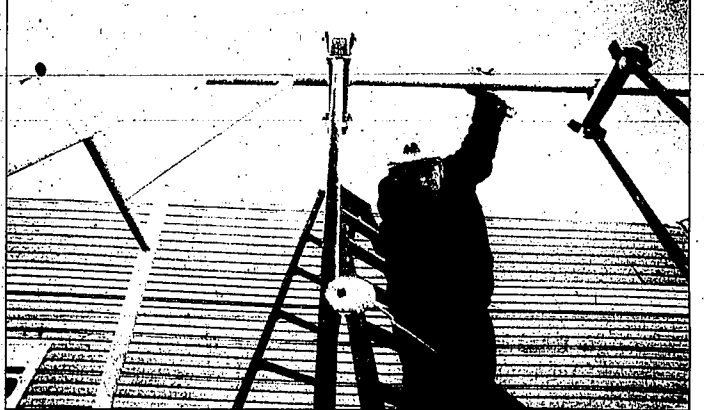

Public hearings set on bombing range

MOUNTAIN HOME - Public hearings on an environmental impact statement for proposed bombing and electronic combat ranges in Owyhee County have been set.

Hearings will begin in June, and the public comment period ends Aug. 6.

"The goal of this proposal has been to balance realistic training with the environmental and traditional land uses," base spokesman Col. Bill Richey said.

Critics question the need for the proposal that they say would harm wildlife and recreation in Owyhee County.

The impact statement analyzes the environmental effects of bombing and electronic combat ranges proposed over the eastern portion of Owyhee County. The proposal consists of 12,000-acre bombing ranges and 12,000-acre electronic combat ranges, plus five simulated target areas and 30 electronic sites.

The target areas are spread over about 1 million acres between state

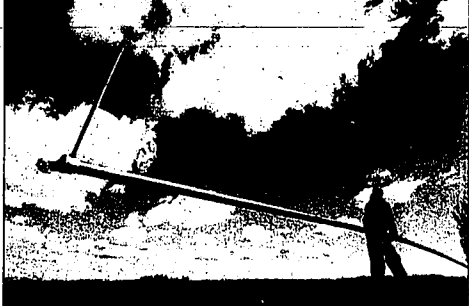
Hearings also will be held at the Dick Valley Tribal Headquarters in Owyhee, Nev., and at Boise State University.

Paul moves ahead with \$2.3 million water plan

PAUL - With more than \$1 million in state and federal grants, the city of Paul is moving forward on plans to bring its almost 80-year-old water system up to date.

Public Works Director Richard Rau said the city and a \$1.2 million bond passed by residents last November gives the city \$2.3 million for a project that will increase Paul's water storage by 25 times and upgrade service lines to every home and business in the city.

Rau said the project, which he expects to begin this summer, will start with a new well and 1 million gallon holding tank on land south on West

Minico Junior High School. A 40,000-gallon tank built in 1919 serves the city, but on some summer days about 850,000 gallons are pumped through the system.

"From 40,000 gallons to 1 million is a long, long upgrade," Rau said.

He added the new well's pumps would have a power backup system to keep water flowing even when electricity cuts out.

State economic development block grants boosted the project. Mayor Randy Jones said Revenue bonds approved by voters last year gave the city the matching funds needed to apply, but the \$500,000 grant did not officially come in until this week.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's rural development fund awarded the

city a second grant of \$600,000 and then purchased the city's revenue bonds. The action lowered the interest rates on the bonds, which will save the city money as it pays off the debt over the next 30 years.

"We have been just waiting on the grants," Jones said. "But now that it's passed, we want to get the project going as quick as we can."

Rau said new 12-inch pipes will run from the new tank into town, and east to west on Clark Street. He said the city also plans to replace the 15 to 20 fire hydrants installed in 1919 and 1920.

The new system should increase water pressure and improve the quality of the water delivered to the around 450 homes and businesses the city serves.

Rau said the well will be deeper to access better water, and many old "dead end" pipes will be looped together to eliminate any stagnant water in the system.

The project plans are about 75 percent complete, according to the city's engineer, William Teuscher of Forsgren & Associates in Rexburg. He said plans should be finished within the next few weeks.

The plans will then need state approval, Teuscher said, and that could take two weeks to a month.

"We're looking at a bid opening date sometime in late June," he said.

New hiking trail will skirt Baldy; chairlift planned for summer runs

SUN VALLEY - A hiking/biking trail which will skirt the perimeter of Bald Mountain has received a stamp of approval from the U.S. Forest Service.

The Forest Service also approved Sun Valley Co. to begin chairlift operations during the nonhiking months to transport mountain-bikers, hikers and sightseers to the top of Baldy.

Sun-Valley Co.'s special-use permit to conduct commercial operations on Baldy will be amended to allow the resort to operate the Lower River Run and Lookout Express and/or Challenger chairlifts during summer months.

The company's general manager did not return phone calls to confirm plans for chair-lift operations on Baldy.

Nearly 12 miles of new trails will be constructed to encircle much of the mountain, said Forest Supervisor Robert W. Utz.

Utilizing nearly 5 miles of existing ski-area roads, the 17-mile trail will be a Forest Service trail open to the public.

The new perimeter trail will begin at the Warm Springs Lodge on an existing access road. From there it will exit the ski permit boundary and run parallel to Warm Springs Creek to a saddle southwest of Broadway Saddle.

An arterial trail will branch from there to Broadway Saddle and then follow existing roads to the top chairlift terminals for Challenger, Lookout Express and Chert Superlift.

Proceeding along the south side of Seattle Ridge, the trail will run through Turkey Bowl and down Cold Springs Gulch, ending at the existing Elaine County Bike Path.

Audit: Forest Service costs taxpayers millions

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Forest Service identity crisis is costing taxpayers millions and may not be resolved until Congress and the agency decide whether its priority is logging, recreation or wildlife protection, a congressional audit said Thursday.

"The Forest Service's decision-making process is clearly broken and in need of repair," said the report by the General Accounting Office, the investigative arm of Congress.

"However, any legislation that may be needed to clarify or modify the Congress' intent and expectations requires that the Forest Service and the Congress reach agreement on the agency's long-term strategic goals," the audit said.

The agency's current split personality is costing taxpayers as much as \$100 million a year in the form of inefficient environmental reviews and decisions on logging and other activities across

192 million acres of national forests, the GAO said.

"This lack of agreement is the result of a more fundamental disagreement, both inside and outside the Forest Service, over which uses the agency is to emphasize under its broad multiple-use and sustained-yield mandate and how best to ensure the long-term sustainability of these uses," the audit said.

The Forest Service has increasingly shifted its emphasis from consumption to conservation as it established management plans for individual national forests over the past 10 years, the audit said.

The increasing emphasis on sustaining wildlife and fish conflicts with the older emphasis on producing timber and underlies the Forest Service's inability to achieve the goals and objectives for timber production set forth in many of the first forest plans, the GAO said.

"While the agency continues to reduce its emphasis on consumption and increase its emphasis on conservation, the Congress has never explicitly accepted this shift in emphasis or acknowledged its effects on the availability of other uses of national forests."

Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, the chairman of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources subcommittee on forests, has been urging changes in U.S. environmental laws to improve efficiency. He has been critical of the downturn in federal logging.

"The report's conclusions — while not particularly surprising — are deeply troubling given this era of tight federal budgets and shrinking discretionary spending," Craig said.

They "provide further testimony that fundamental changes are needed if our public land management agencies are to work in the way they ought to," he said.

Environmentalists and Clinton administration officials have resisted such changes.

"Without agreement on the Forest Service's mission priorities, we see distrust and gridlock prevailing in any effort to streamline the agency's statutory framework," the GAO said Thursday.

The Forest Service spends more than \$250 million a year conducting environmental analyses and preparing environmental documents to support project-level decisions such as timber sales — an estimated 20,000 documents annually.

Forest Service Chief Mike Dombeck said the agency already is taking steps to streamline the reviews and conduct broad analyses.

He gave as an example the Interior/Columbia Basin ecosystem project which will be used to update a variety of forest management plans in the Northwest and Northern-Rocky Mountains.

Judge keeps \$10 million lawsuit alive

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A federal judge has refused to block a group of eastern Idaho irrigators who want Utah Power & Light Co. to pay them \$10 million for refusing to sell them power at wholesale rates as it does other cooperatives.

U.S. District Judge, Lynn Winnill ruled that the utility and its parent company, PacifiCorp, were not immune from the antitrust laws and that the federal court system has primary jurisdiction over the dispute.

The 900-member Snake River Valley Electric Association

maintains that since it is organized under Idaho's electric cooperative laws it is entitled to power at the wholesale rate rather than the higher retail rate Utah Power & Light insists on charging.

But the utility claims that no matter what laws the group is under, it is nothing more than a bunch of end power users trying to get electricity for irrigation pumps at a customer rate.

With Winnill keeping their damage claim alive, the association says it is time for Utah Power & Light to work out an arrangement

under which cheap electrical power can be wheeled to irrigation pumps and farmers' homes.

But utility spokesman Dave Eskelsen said the company has not ruled out the possibility of going to court. It has until May 9 to respond to Winnill's ruling.

"We still think we have a good case," Eskelsen said, essentially discounting any prospect for a imminent out-of-court settlement.

"My understanding is that they have been asking things that are unrealistic," he said.

Operations over Owyhee County would include super-sonic flight no lower than 10,000 feet above the ground. And it includes the use of chaff — bundles of tiny aluminumized fibers — and flares,

both released by fighter jets as defensive maneuvers to avoid simulated enemy air defenses.

The proposed range would require congressional action to fence off 12,000 acres of public land for military use. Federal law requires any withdrawal of

public land in excess of 5,000 acres to be approved by Congress.

JonBenet's parents proclaim innocence in secret meeting with media

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) — The parents of JonBenet Ramsey proclaimed their innocence Thursday in their first meeting with reporters since days after the 6-year-old was found slain in their home.

"I did not kill my daughter," John Ramsey told six local reporters who had been invited to meet with the couple in a secret Boulder location. "I will miss her dearly for the rest of my life." Patricia Ramsey, JonBenet's mother, told her husband with her hands clasped, said, "I did not have anything to do with it. I loved that child with my whole heart and soul."

Six-year-old JonBenet was found strangled Dec. 26 in the basement of her family's expensive Tudor mansion, about eight hours after her father said she found a ransom note demanding \$118,000. An autopsy said the little beauty contest winner may have been sexually abused.

District Attorney Alex Hunter recently acknowledged that the couple were the focus of the investigation. They were questioned by police at length on Wednesday — separately, as investigators had demanded — after months of wrangling over the terms of the questioning.

In their media interview Thursday, the couple asked the help of public in searching for their daughter's killer. Mrs. Ramsey also used the interview to send a message. "God knows who you are and we will find you," Mrs. Ramsey said.

As for the suggestions that the girl was molested, Ramsey said, "I can tell you those were the most hurtful innuendoes in us as a family. They are totally false. JonBenet and I had a very close relationship."

"The media interview was in a secret location. It was the couple's first such appearance since they talked at length to CNN on Jan. 1.

Reporters from the Boulder newspaper, two Denver newspapers and three Denver TV stations were forbidden from asking about the interviews with police or about the night of the slaying, according to sources familiar with the meeting. Other reporters were excluded entirely.

The couple had less success imposing conditions on the police interview, agreeing to police demands that Mrs. Ramsey be interviewed before her husband, that the sessions be taped and that there be no time limit on them. The couple were allowed to have their

lawyers with them. Sources who spoke on condition of anonymity said that Mrs. Ramsey was questioned for six hours Wednesday and her husband for two.

It was their first discussion with police since they spoke briefly with officers the day JonBenet's body was found. Hunter refused to say whether there would be any further police interrogations. "I can't speak on that," he said.

In January, police rejected the Ramseys' demands that they be interviewed together and that their lawyers choose which officers would interview them.

Separate interviews initially were scheduled for April 23, but police canceled those meetings the day before when the FBI's Child Abduction and Serial Killer Unit advised that the terms were not acceptable. One rejected demand was that the interviews last no longer than two hours.

In the days that followed, the Ramseys' relationship with authorities turned ugly. Letters from the couple's lawyers implied that the police were the obstacle to setting up interviews and accused authorities of launching a "cowardly smear campaign" against the family.

2 friends of suspect in Ennis Cosby murder reportedly witnessed slaying

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The man convicted of killing the actor Bill Cosby's son, Ennis, was with two friends who witnessed the slaying, according to court documents cited Thursday by USA Today.

In court Thursday, defendant Michael Markhasev was appointed two public defenders because his family cannot afford to pay private attorneys who were working the case.

According to USA Today, Eli Zakaria, 23, and Sara Ann Sines, 21, both of Huntington Beach south of Los Angeles, told police they were driving around with Markhasev shortly after midnight on Jan. 16.

Zakaria's uncle, Carlos Rodriguez, says Zakaria told him the three were high on drugs and looking for a drug dealer to find money. "He told me he was out of it and that they pulled over to use the phone," Rodriguez said.

According to their statements to police, Zakaria and Ms. Peters stopped with Markhasev at a telephone in a parking lot about 450 feet from the isolated spot where Cosby was shot to death on a road just off Interstate 405 as he fixed a flat tire on his Mercedes-Benz.

While Zakaria spoke on the phone, Markhasev headed up the street toward Cosby. He witness statements say: Zakaria told Rodriguez that Markhasev was going to rob Cosby, but "just lost it," shot him and then came running back to the car and said, "Let's get out of here." The witnesses told police the same story.

Court papers show Christopher So and Michael Chang of Los Angeles told police that Markhasev called Chang days after the slaying and asked for help in finding the pistol he had thrown away the night of the shooting.

Chang, So and Markhasev searched for the gun without success, the newspaper said. So subsequently reported the incident to police and led them to Markhasev, the newspaper said.

"The USA Today story came as a surprise to me," outgoing defense attorney Charles Lindner said outside court. "I'm curious as to how they obtained the documents they claim to have."

Co-counsel Darren Kavinoky denied that the defense leaked the documents.

The attorneys' comments were limited because of a gag order in the case. Markhasev, an 18-year-old Ukrainian immigrant, was arrested March 12 and has been held since then pending trial. He pleaded innocent to initial charges of murder with special circumstances of attempted robbery and use of a firearm during a crime.

Industrialist flies LDS missionary back to Utah

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Wounded Mormon missionary Orrin A. Voorheis, still comatose, has returned to Utah in a Gulf Stream jet provided by industrialist Jon M. Huntsman.

Voorheis has been in a coma since he was shot by a robber in Buena Vista on April 9.

Family members and church

officials gathered at a Salt Lake City International Airport hanger Wednesday night for his return.

"I want you to know we love each and every one of you," said Huntsman's wife, Karen. "We feel we are part of your family," she told the parents and eight siblings of the 20-year-old missionary from Pleasant Grove.

Huntsman provided his jet and a three-person flight crew, and LDS Hospital donated a three-person medical team and equipment to monitor and care for Voorheis during the 15-hour flight that touched down at 7 p.m. Voorheis was then taken by ambulance to University Hospital.

California arms cache may have Freeman ties

YUBA CITY, Calif. (AP) — Days after a Freeman militia sympathizer was seriously injured in an explosion at his home, a powerful cache of explosives was seized at the motor home of two of his associates.

If it had been detonated, the material taken Wednesday — 500 pounds of an explosive called petrogel — would have been felt for three miles, Yuba County Sheriff Gary Tindel said.

Taken into custody for questioning were Kevin Quinn, 37, and Vernon Weckner, 66, who lived at the motor home in this city 100 miles northeast of San Francisco, Tindel said.

Authorities said Quinn and Weckner are friends or associates of William Goehler, 34, who was seriously injured in an explosion Sunday that ripped through his home in nearby Olivehurst and broke windows two blocks away.

Goehler underwent surgery for a severe neck injury after Sunday's explosion.

His 2-year-old daughter suffered a head cut. Goehler was arrested for investigation of using a destructive device and child cruelty.

TWIN FALLS — No musical composition is ever really complete until somebody performs it publicly.

But that's especially true of "Random Acts of Music for Audience & Orchestra," a piece Magic Valley Symphony conductor and musical director Ted Hadley has created especially for tonight's performance.

The final concert of the 1996-97 season will begin at 8 p.m. in the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Center auditorium.

Hadley, who teaches music at Robert Stuart Junior High School, got the idea for "Random Acts" last year when his fellow music teachers nationwide began promoting a program called "Get America Singing."

"I thought, why not a piece in which the audience gets involved?" Hadley said. "Anyone who goes to a symphony concert has some musical smarts to begin with, and perhaps experience in making as well as enjoying music."

The six-part "Random Acts" included audience sing-alongs of the standard spirituals, "Over My Head" and "Amazing Grace." In between, the audience will also read poetry, create sound effects and even have a chance to deliberately make the kinds of rude noises that usually drive conductors, musicians and concertgoers to distraction.

"Meanwhile, the orchestra will toss aside the usual classical demands for

'Beyond Recognition': Ridley's believe-it-or-not

BELLEVUE — Don't flush that toilet. Blaine County-based mystery novelist Ridley Pearson, a writer with a knack for finding out the darnest things, figures that flushing at the wrong place and the wrong time could incinerate you and pretty much everything else nearby.

At least that's the premise of "Beyond Recognition" (Hyperion, \$22.95), Pearson's 10th novel.

"About five years ago, I was sent an article on a series of (high-temperature accelerant) arson cases that intrigued me to the point I considered the topic for a novel," Pearson said recently in an interview released by his publisher. "These fires burned so hot (3,000 degrees to 4,000 degrees Fahrenheit) that they set steel girders on fire—burning them as fuel — so hot that some of the fires had burned themselves out in less than 10 minutes, so hot that when firefighters aimed water onto the burn, the water broke down and its elements — hydrogen and oxygen — actually exploded, fueling the fire. All evidence was lost to the heat of the fire. For me, this had 'thriller' written all over it."

In little words, "high-temperature accelerant" is liquid rocket fuel — the stuff that powers some intercontinental ballistic missiles. It's a substance so volatile that its two principal components are stored separately and only combined within a rocket engine.

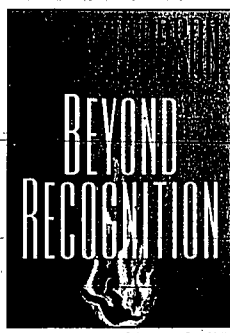
So what's that got to do with plumbing?

Household sewage systems have to be vented to the outside of the building; if the vent supply to the pipes is cut off, they won't drain.

Theoretically, all an arsonist needs to

do is to place small amounts of the two rocket-fuel components in different vent stacks — or at different spots in the same vent stack — and hold them temporarily in place with plastic food wrap secured by an O-ring.

When a toilet is flushed, draining about five gallons of water into the system, it creates enough of a vacuum in the pipes to rupture the cellophane. The rocket fuel drains into the pipes, and the two components meet in a pipe somewhere in the basement. Then, in theory, the house explodes in a 400-foot-tall purple flame.

"No detonator or evidence of detonators had ever been found in HTA fires," Pearson explained. "As I continued to nibble at my research, fire investigators in Seattle released video of an abandoned supermarket they burned using a homemade HTA accelerant. Within a few months of the release of

the video, for unexplained reasons, the (federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms), FBI and certain fire inspectors began distancing themselves from even the existence of HTA fires, suddenly claiming such fires did not exist.

"Such is a surefire recipe for forcing my interest — just go ahead an claim it doesn't exist."

The arsonist in "Beyond Recognition" is a Seattle sociopath horribly scarred years earlier by an HTA fire. He torches divorced women who remind him of his slutish mother, who was the real target of the blaze that disfigured him.

A jaded homicide detective, Lou Boldt, and a police psychologist, Daphne Matthews, battle time, twists of fate and police bureaucracy to prevent him from striking again.

Kentucky HeadHunters return, packing bib overalls

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Fred Young, drummer for the Kentucky HeadHunters and owner of one of the most popular pairs of sideburns, can still get pretty worked up about the last season of "Hee Haw."

For those who don't remember, producers tried to boost ratings by taking the proudly blueky TV show out of the cornfield and gussying it up a bit. It was quite a contradiction for a show named "Hee Haw."

Young, 38, views it as nothing less than a conspiracy to rob country music of its soul. He traces the plot back to the 1970s, when Olivia Newton-John scored big hits on the country charts with dubious records like "Have You Ever Been Mellow."

"That started fizzling out," Young said, his long whiskers dusting the giant table-top in the RCA Records conference room as he nodded. "Then they tried to change 'Hee Haw,' a show which everybody all over the country liked. They wanted to take those overalls off people."

As happens often in this band that has been playing together in various combinations since they were teen-agers, someone else finished the thought: "They're trying to get over the fact that everyone thinks we're a bunch of idiots and that we're not country music."

Phelps, once the HeadHunter's

basist, and now its rhythm guitar player and lead singer.

"But you know what? You can wear bib overalls and be barefoot and still have a lot of intelligence, and have a lot of wisdom."

The Kentucky HeadHunters, pride-of-Mercer County, Ky., have already made the national record with long hair, rumpled clothing and chops.

Fred, their cousin Greg Martin, and brothers Ricky Lee and Doug Phelps stormed south to Nashville in 1959.

In a town where many bands have stashed-to-perfection stage clothes but don't play on their own records, the HeadHunters were a real band with long hair, rumpled clothing and chops.

Hardly anyone expected their souped-up versions of songs by country greats like Bill Monroe and Weldon Jennings to get much notice. "That was a mistake. 'Pickin' On Nashville' sold over a million, and produced his like 'Oh Lonesome Me' and 'Dumas Walker'."

For a blink of the eye, artificial

Nashville notes

boundaries between country and rock seemed to come tumbling down, as did pretensions of taking country music uptown. It didn't last.

"Our second album sold almost a million copies," said group leader Richard Young, 42. "And by Nashville standards — I guess because it sold less (than the first) — we were doing something wrong."

"And I don't think that's true."

The group imploded under the pressure to repeat its success, with Ricky Lee and Doug Phelps going off to form a duo, Brother Phelps. The Kentucky HeadHunters continued, adding bassist Anthony Kenney (another Young cousin) and vocalist Mark Orr. The next album, "Rave On," leaned decidedly to bluesy rock. It bombed in

1993, and the band, left Mercury Records.

In 1995, starting at the ceiling from a motel room bed in Ohio and facing the loss of another lead vocalist (Orr was tired of the road), Richard Young said to himself, "OK, enough's enough."

He got on the phone and set up a meeting with the Phelps brothers.

"It was a convenient time for this to happen," Richard Young said. "Neither one of us was burning up the airwaves or the TV waves."

Ricky Lee Phelps, the original lead singer, declined to return because he wanted to go into the ministry. He suggested his brother return alone, this time as lead singer.

If worked: all agree; and the band started writing songs at once. They took the finished CD to RCA and were signed in short order.

• **"Looking for Richard" (PG-13)** — Seventeen years ago, Al Pacino gave a notoriously bad performance as Richard III on Broadway. He more than makes up for it with "Looking for Richard," his documentary on actors preparing to do "Richard III." The film

is loose, funny, instructive, and very shrewd about the way actors think and work. The staged scenes from the play are terrific. Contains staged violence.

• **"The Preacher's Wife" (PG)** — An angel (Denzel Washington) lends strength and support to an embattled church pastor (Courtney B. Vance) whose church needs repair and whose local young men are being carried off to jail and foster homes. Director Penny Marshall's remake of the 1947 "The Bishop's Wife" paints a relatively realistic portrait of African-American working-class communities. But the movie's various episodes seem predictable and disjointed, and the main characters are little more than cutouts. Even the immensely talented Washington has to pour on the charm to be more than just a bright-faced Ken doll. Whitney Houston's unemotional diva mask, stiffness and dated look (especially tired wigs) make her an odd romantic heroine in the title role. But as Houston's suge and sassy mother, Jenifer Lewis steals most of her scenes. Contains nothing objectionable.

precision and perfection in favor of improvisation and imagination.

"That's what Hadley has in mind, anyway. At a rehearsal where players were reading part of "Random Acts" for the first time, there were furrowed brows, puzzled expressions and a few big grins.

"There's a verse of "Amazing Grace" that talks about 'danger,' Hadley told his musicians, exhorting them to find a frantic, dizzying sound — a chaotic hum like that in "The Beatles." "Day in the Life."

"This is some strange stuff," he added. "Please be patient with me and I'll do the same with you."

Soon, symphony members were catching on to Hadley's meaning, abandoning control in favor of chaos.

"Cool!" Hadley said.

"Random Acts of Music" is Hadley's first major orchestral work since his 1983 "Comemorations," with which he

Pocarelli composer Thom Ritter George's "Piano Concert No. 3," which Hadley describes as a "devilishly difficult" piece for the keyboard.

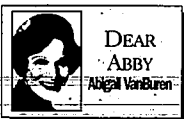

We would like to express our disappointment with the local police department and Times-News for their inability to support or substantiate statements regarding our necessary fund-raising activities. To date the Police Department and the Times-News have never contributed financially by supplying staff to assist the Twin Falls Crime Prevention Association ("T.F.C.P.A."). It is always so easy to criticize rather than offer assistance or alternatives. Contrary to the Police Department, T.F.C.P.A. members are volunteers who are happy to give as much of their personal time as possible to the worthy activities of the T.F.C.P.A., but unfortunately can not be available full time to serve the organization and conduct fund-raisers to keep the organization in existence.

The Twin Falls Crime Prevention Association is a non-profit organization of concerned citizens that believed it or not is a "support group" for the local police department and local law enforcement. We help educate the citizens of the county as to how to more effectively prevent crime through the Crimestoppers & McGruff Education programs, upgrading security in the private homes, and develop new and revised community watch programs.

Regarding our choice of professional fund raisers and fund-raising activities, the T.F.C.P.A. has chosen to conduct a fund-raiser that is also a business venture. Why? Because we generate business and employment opportunities for the community and provide a product (i.e., event tickets and advertising exposure), to our generous contributors, instead of asking for donations and offering nothing but good will in return.

We would like to set the record straight! After careful review, the T.F.C.P.A. has determined that of every dollar generated from our fund-raiser, S.E.G. receives 10% to professionally conduct all of the public relations and fundraising activities. More important, 60-70% of every dollar remains local as local spending in the community providing Twin Falls with an "economic boost," hiring and compensating fifty (50) employees and disbursing funds for printing, office rent, telephone service, gym rental, players' meals, accommodations, and other expenses. And finally, the balance of the 20-30% (not only 10% as the Times-News reports) of every dollar goes to the T.F.C.P.A. to fund our activities. It's okay if it "takes money to make money" as long as all of the money remains in our local community! Don't you agree?

The United Way is a national organization funded by the federal government that may retain a higher percentage of the proceeds, but ask how much of the 100% of the funds raised remain local in our community and you'll be quite surprised! T.F.C.P.A. spoke to a number of law enforcement organizations, both locally and statewide, regarding the public relations and financial results of fund-raisers conducted by S.E.G. since 1987 and only received enthusiastic and positive responses of the utmost satisfaction.

Finally, regarding the city ordinance requiring fund-raiser solicitor licensing, S.E.G. successfully registered within hours of notification. However, one must question the police department's intent considering their long-term in-house Police Benefit Assn. concert fund-raiser's telemarketing campaign and financial contract as it is set up exactly the same as our event. Why then has the police department suddenly chosen to enforce a ten year old city ordinance during our T.F.C.P.A. fund-raiser and as stated by L.C. Craig, President of the Police Benefit Assn., while never before during their own organization's fund-raiser? We don't quite understand that, do you?

The Crime Prevention Association sincerely hopes that the citizens of the Valley will support our fund-raiser when contacted and respond generously with an open mind! We'll look forward to seeing you at the game to say thank you!

Important note: Unfortunately, the Crime Prevention Association had to utilize our limited resources to "purchase" advertising space (not front page) for this "Letter to the Community" in defense of the Times-News negative publicity. Is the Times-News really concerned about how our budget is generated and what expenses are disbursed? What do you think?

TWIN FALLS — Avid moviegoers are in for a treat: cheaper movie tickets.

Interstate Amusement is celebrating its 30th anniversary by selling tickets at its 13 theaters and two drive-ins for \$1.50.

"We're starting out in the drive-ins Friday and Saturday night," said Larry Roper, Interstate Amusement's president. "Tickets will be \$1.50 for adults, and kids are free."

Roper said they will also be having live music before the movies, starting at 7 p.m. with the band Renegade. There will also be free pony rides and free cotton candy for the kids before showtime at the Motor-Vu Drive-In on Eastland Avenue.

"Accession prices will have to remain the same. Magic Valley residents have seen many changes and improvements in Interstate Amusement over the past 30 years. What began as two drive-ins, an indoor theater and a few holdings in Montana has blossomed into most notably a 12plex theater."

"We've remodeled seven times since '69," Roper said. "We acquired the downtown theater (the Mall Cinema on Main Avenue) in '75 and have been there for 22 years. We've been in Jerome since '78."

The growth isn't over yet. Roper said that even in the last remodel, he and the company were looking for other places to build. He said they are looking mostly on the northwest side of Twin Falls.

"I'm sure the year 2000 will see us putting in another four- or sixplex on the northwest end of town," he said. "But we don't want to be on Blue Lakes."

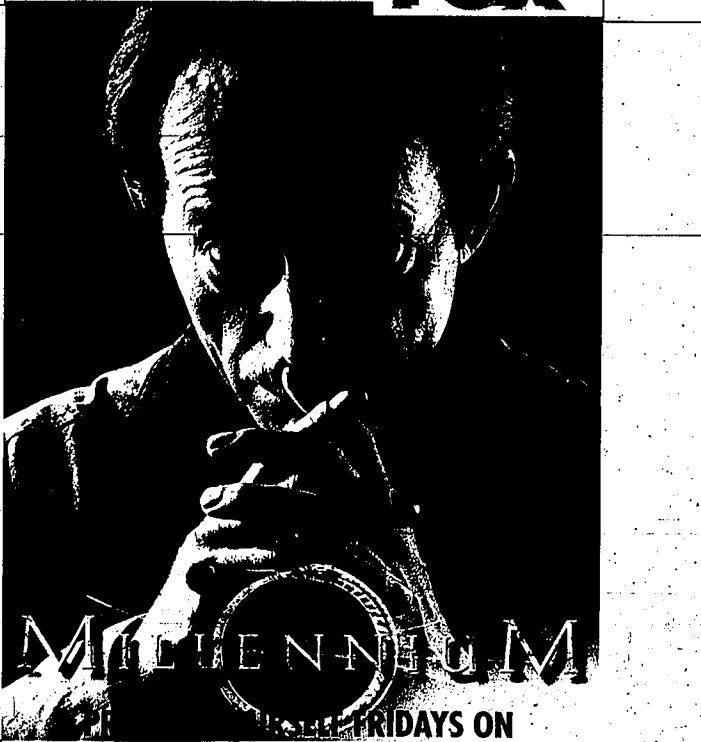

"Blues Hat" is Daniels' new live recording. In describing the album, the country singer told reporters he decided to "throw out all the technicalities and just go in and play music."

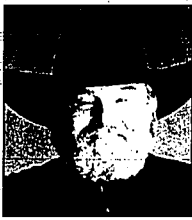
Daniels is actually blending Southern rock with blues, jazz, roots and boogie.

"It's only in America that something like Marilyn Manson could exist," Warner, a self-proclaimed Satanist, said. "(The band) is kind of universal for anyone who feels like they don't belong. They can belong with our band, because we're trying to stand up for people who have been considered unfit for the rest of society."

U2 isn't afraid to stir things up a bit

It's sad if that's true, but I think it might be. We need this sense of chaos and risk.

Q. Unlike other artists that shy away from it, U2 seems to embrace the goal of being the biggest band in the world. Why?

A. That's always been the thrill of it, isn't it? Not to be the biggest but the best, to take it as far as it can go. That was part of the momentum of the Beatles and the Stones. — The job of rock 'n' roll was just to burn real brightly and to disturb the equilibrium, if you can, of the mainstream, which can be very safe.

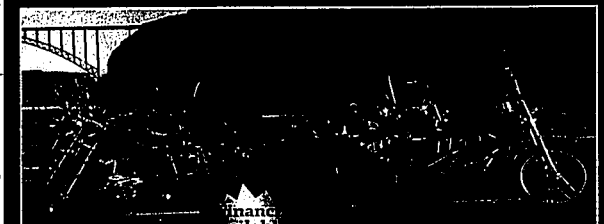

Spartans rip Bobcats, share title

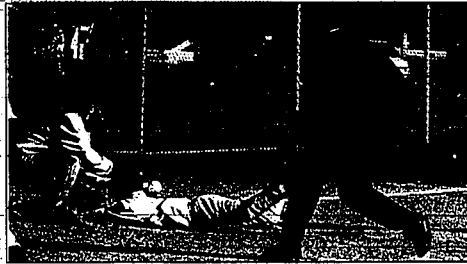

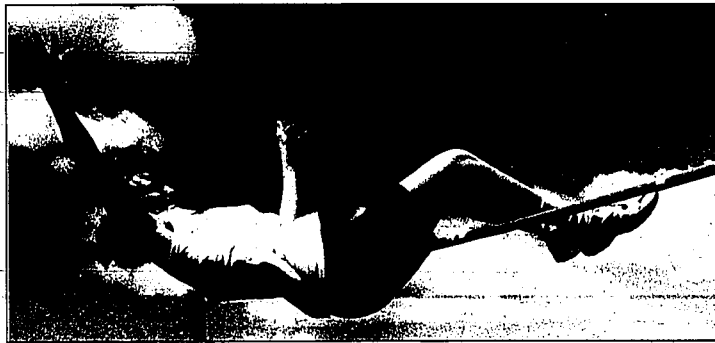

Mets pitcher's prognosis good after being diagnosed with TB

NEW YORK (AP) — Doctors believe New York Mets pitcher Jason Iringhausen is suffering from a treatable form of tuberculosis, they said Thursday.

Mets internist Dr. John Olichney, who has headed a team of specialists examining the 24-year-old pitcher, said a final diagnosis is not expected until next week.

The Mets had worried about the severity of Iringhausen's condition, especially because doctors had not ruled out more serious diseases, such as cancer.

Olichney called those concerns somewhat. "It is looking like a mass," he said. "We are convinced it is all lymph nodes, very likely inflamed. Cancer is way down our list."

If the final diagnosis is tuberculosis, Iringhausen can expect recovery in six to eight weeks. Olichney warned, however, that the tests are not complete.

Iverson said he never took that shot, "I wished it (the streak) had ended right there."

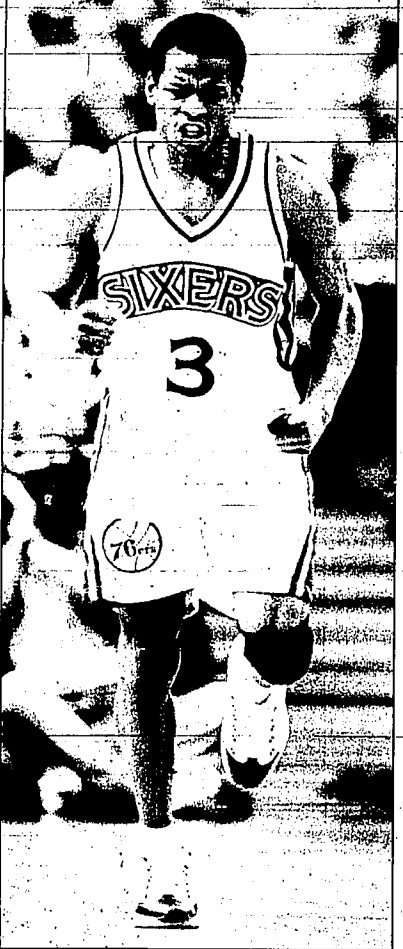

Back to business at Indy, a year after the CART split

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The first year was for credibility. This year, it's back to racing.

The Indianapolis Motor Speedway opens for practice on Saturday with new cars, new drivers, and a who-needs-'em attitude about the rival Indy-car series. Championship Auto Racing Teams. "I think all the glitz and glamor we went through last year ... now it's not something that's unexpected. It's expected," second-year Indy driver Tony Stewart said Thursday. "So this year, it'll be a little easier to focus on getting your work done each day and going out and trying to be fast."

Last year's 33-car field was the fastest ever for the 500, averaging 227.807 mph in qualifications. But speeds won't be nearly that fast this year because of the new chassis and engines mandated by the Indy Racing League, which appears no closer to a reconciliation with CART than it did a year ago.

So what, asked Stewart, of the young, rising stars in Indy racing — CART or IRL?

"I think both series can survive on their own," he said. "I think CART is a strong series, and I think their vision of where they want Indy-car racing to go in the next 10 years is right for what they want to do, but I think (Speedway president and IRL founder) Tony George had a vision of where he wants the IRL to be in the next 10 years, and I think he's very right on what he's trying to do also."

"Both series will survive without the other," said Stewart, who will embark on a NASCAR career next season with Joe Gibbs Racing.

The feud in Indy racing kept most of the recognizable names away from Indianapolis last year because of a boycott by CART in protest of a qualifying rule that awarded up to 25 of the 33 spots to IRL regulars. It will do so again this May.

Romario, Baggio could be headed back to World Cup

It could be Romario against Roberto Baggio all over again. Baggio, whose goals sent Italy into the 1994 World Cup final, scored on his return to the national team, a 3-0 victory over Poland on Wednesday night in a qualifier for the 1998 tournament. "I really hope to remain on the squad," Baggio said after the victory over Poland in Naples maintained Italy's four-point lead in Group Two. "(Coach) Cesare Maldini knows that if he wants, he can continue to call on me.

Officials disqualify older marathoners

BOSTON (AP) — A married couple, whose winning times at the Boston Marathon had vaulted them into the elite of older runners, were disqualified Thursday after they failed to appear on official surveillance tapes.

Race officials were suspicious of John Murphy, 61, and Suzanne Murphy, 59, of Cypress, Calif., as soon as they crossed the finish line April 21 at the heads of their age divisions.

The Murphys have a history of national-class marathon results. But doubts about the validity of their times — John Murphy was the second-fastest ever for a runner his age — led the Boston Athletic Association to withhold their awards and review the tapes.

Race referee Steve Vaitones recommended their disqualification after speaking to John Murphy on Thursday.

"Following an intensive review of our surveillance videotapes ... the two individuals have been disqualified from the race and their names will be removed from the results," said Guy Morse, the race director.

Race officials would not elaborate on the conversation with Murphy and calls by a reporter to a phone listed in his name went

unanswered. The disqualifications were the first of a Boston division change since officials stripped Romario of the women's crown for slipping into the race in 1990. Two months ago, City of Los Angeles Marathon disqualified its women's champion for cutting through a gas station.

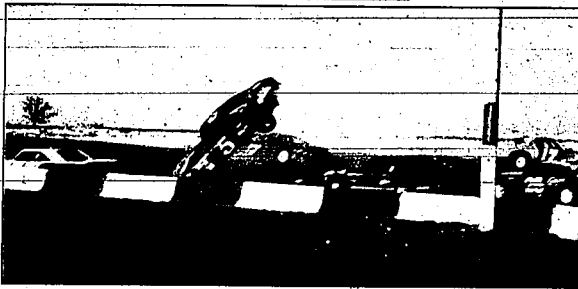

Reports: Income, spending increase; manufacturing slows

WASHINGTON—A burst of data provided an unclear picture of the economy Thursday.

It showed personal income and spending on the rise at the same time construction and manufacturing activity were slowing slightly.

Some analysts said the reports portrayed an economy that is showing signs of braking from its torrid first-quarter pace. Others, however, said the data was affected by special factors including flooding and strikes.

The Federal Reserve boosted short-term interest rates in March. Analysts are divided over whether it will vote another increase at its next meeting May 20.

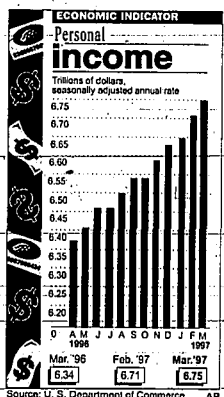
The National Association of Purchasing Management's index of April business activity slipped to 54.2 percent in April from 55.0 percent in March, suggesting the manufacturing sector continued to grow but at a slower pace.

The widely-followed industry survey did not indicate any inflation pressures as the second quarter began. Prices paid for raw materials fell for the first time in five months.

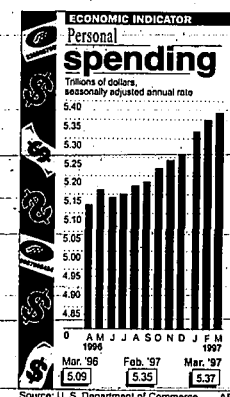
Consumer spending, supported by a 0.6 percent increase in personal income, rose in March by 0.5 percent for the second straight month. The Commerce Department did not indicate any inflation pressures as the second quarter began.

Spending totaled \$5.37 trillion at a seasonally adjusted annual rate, compared with \$5.35 trillion a month earlier.

Consumer spending, two-thirds of the nation's economic activity, shot up 1.2

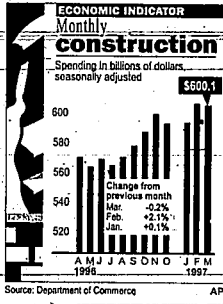

percent in January. It was the driving force behind the economy's explosive 5.6 percent growth rate in the January-March quarter. Still, incomes rose to an annual rate of \$5.75 trillion, up from \$6.71 trillion in February.

Private wages and salaries, the most closely watched component of income, rose \$2.7 billion to top of a \$48.7 billion gain in February.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 32.51 to 6,976.48 as investors secured some of this week's gains before Friday's employment report. The last of this week's big economic readings.

Broader market measures were mixed, with technology and small-company shares boosting the Nasdaq market to its fourth straight gain.

The Dow, which slid by as much as 95 points before rebounding, gained 270 points during the prior three sessions, moving above 7,000 on Wednesday for the first time since March 12.

Utility sees slowdown in customer growth

BOISE — After a long period of robust customer growth, Idaho's largest utility says it's starting to get a slowdown in new accounts.

During the first three months of 1997, Idaho Power Co. said it added just 1,015 new customers, down sharply from the 1,721 added one year earlier.

The utility said in a newsletter Thursday its Pocatello region showed a net loss of customers, down 25 accounts for the quarter. The company attributed the slower growth to a slowdown in housing starts, higher mortgage interest rates and a seasonal reduction in the number of people moving into Idaho.

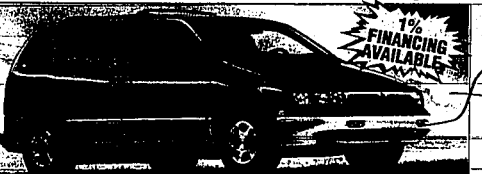

Matt Battaglia: So good at being bad

As J.L. King, the ruthless drug lord on "Days of Our Lives," Matt Battaglia has managed to create a character who is both fearsome and fascinating. In short, the definition of the perfect villain.

Battaglia, a former All-American middle linebacker who played with

the Cleveland Browns and the Philadelphia Eagles, admits King can be a charming man, but he refuses to romanticize him. He says, "King is a bad guy. A really bad guy. He's interested in building his wealth and in creating a powerful empire, and he doesn't care who gets hurt in the process."

He paused. Then added, "In some ways he's a lot like some so-called legitimate businessmen."

"Days" is Matt's first soap. After leaving the gridiron, he followed in the cleats of other former footballers who became actors such as Les Majors, Burt Reynolds, and Gene and Clark's Dean Cain. He did theater and feature films and also appeared on numerous TV shows. He starred in the Showtime series, "Redmeat."

Last month, "Raven," his movie with Burt Reynolds, and Krista Allen, who plays Billie on "Days," aired on the Movie Channel.

"On 'Days,' I give Billie a hard time," Matt says. "But in this film, she's my fiancée."

He just finished his first screenplay, "The Last Stick of Chalk," which he says is "about revenge and redemption."

Redemption, of course, is the technique soap's use to save a villain from oblivion when the actor who plays him becomes a fan favorite. With Matt's growing popularity, does he feel that King might ultimately

earn salvation in Salem?

"I have no idea what they plan for King," Matt says. "My job is to play him today and not be concerned about what they may or may not do down the road."

Playing King on "Days" has its moments of the unique challenges that an actor faces on a soap.

"The time factor affects everything you do," Matt said. "There is so much dialogue involved in just one day's shooting. And you have to memorize lines so quickly. Still, with all the pressure to get it done in the time they give you, there are days when I feel I've done some of my best work ever. Then there are other days when it's all I can do to get my lines memorized and recite them before they yell cut."

"Another thing I've learned was that the person who said that in acting, less is more, probably never did a soap. When you're working with film, you can be subtle; the film will pick it up. But when you do a soap, you're doing it on videotape, and subtlety doesn't really work. You really have to move your eyebrows and whatever else it takes to show what you're thinking, and even when you do a tight shot, it won't look as if you're overdoing it."
