RICHFIELD - In one of the year's nore intriguing School Board elections,

The Richfield School District declined to reveal preliminary vote figures, but both winners had "quite a substantial majority" of votes, district clerk Charlene Loyne said Tuesday night.

Bellevue employer, worker at odds over who owns gold coins

BELLEVUE — The old saying about streets paved with gold has taken a new and litigious twist in Blaine County. Two men paving a driveway ran across a hidden treasure which could be worth six figures. But the treasure hunt has turned ugly, and who gets to keep the stash will be argued in court.

And the question of who buried the dough could remain unanswered forever.

House nears budget vote; liberals lead opposition

WASHINGTON — The ground-breaking federal budget agreement faced its
first major test in Congress Tuesday, as
the House moved toward passage of a
resolution calling for eliminating the
deficit by 2002 and providing the first
major tax cut since 1983 for families,
investors and college student by budget the

Proponents hailed the measure as a riumph of fiscal discipline and a turning
point in the long history of failed efforts

Senate passes abortion ban but loses guard against veto

WASHINGTON — The Senate Tuesday approved legislation to ban "partial brin" abortions but fell three votes short of the two-thirds margin needed to override a promised veto by President Clinton.

The vote was 54 to 36, with anti-abortion forces coming close enough to a veto-proof majority of 67 to keep the issue alive and ensure another politically explosive fight when Congress attempts to override the veto, possibly in a month or two.



DENVER (AP) — Attempts by Timothy McVeigh's attorneys to launch a full-scale attack on the FBI crime lab were cut shor Tuesday when the judge barred questions about the fallout from a scathing federa

Gore pre-empts Congress on IRS changes

WASEINGTON — Holding the line against those who want to turn tax collection over to private contractors. Vice President Al Gore said Tuesday the administration instead would create three separate parties on improving the Internal Revenue Service.

The announcement — which pre-empts next month's report by a congressional commission expected to seek broader changes — comes as the IRS tries to reclaim critics' confidence after botching a major computer upgrade last year.

One task force, led by IRS employees, is to report within 90 days on how to make the agency more "customer-friendly." Other initiatives meant, through executive order and subsequent legislation, to make tax collectors more efficient.

WASHINGTON — Kay James, a university dean with a background in conservative social issues, was appointed Tuesday to lead a national study of legalized gambling — a selection that drew immediate criticism from the gaming industry.

James, dean of the school of government at Regent University in Norfolk, Va., was selected by House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R.Ga., and Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R.Miss, to pilot the two-year, \$5 million study on how legalized gambling impacts America.



The most common of these flaws — present in about half of all cancers — are in a gene called p53. This gene is a kind of genetic watch dog that ordinarily stops cells from reproducing if any of their other genes are damaged. The two experimental approaches were described Tuesday at a meeting of the Concology, Both use cold virtues to carry in genes that exploit cancer's reliance on a damaged p53 gene. The treatments are in early



McCain, other senators surprisingly receptive to base closings

WASHINGTON (AP) — Key lawmakers were surprisingly receptive to the idea of-closing more military bases but told Defense Secretary William Cohen on Tuesday that the shut-downs must be free of political influence from the White House. Faced with warnings that keeping unneeded bases could force the Pentagen to kill major weapons such as the Air Force F-22-or-Navy-FA-18 E and F fighters, lawnghers broke from the erraditional-posture-on-Capitol-

ers, lawmakers broke from the traditional-posture-on-Capitol-Hill of vigorously defending home-state bases. "I hope that this committee will authorize another round of base closings," said Sen. John



McCain, R.Ariz.

"It is clear-that-the-need-is-there," said Sen. Chuck Robb, D-Va. "I and many other are prepared to join with you."

Members of the Senate Armed Services Committee even talked

about passing legislation that would lift the requirement that the Pentagon get congressional permission before shutting down any base with more than 300

any base with more than 300 employees.

The surprisingly favorable ecception for what Cohen acknowledged was a politically unpalatable idea came with a major cavent, however.

Republicans sternly cautioned their former-Senate colleague—the—1995—prisod—in—which-President Clinton intervened to save jobs at two closing bases in California and Texas, states important to his re-election.

"We cannot have a repetition

of the situation ... where (there) is the perception, if not the reality, that politics have invaded that process," said Sen. John Wurner, R.Via.

Officials fear welfare changes will overwhelm child care services

CALDWELL (AP) — When Idaho starts new welfare rules in July that require many recipients to work or be in training programs, Canyon County officials fear there will be a serious shortage of child care facilities.

They estimate up to 700 local parents-will be forced into the job market.

.job market.

—The county-already-is-near-a-crisis because of a shortage among child care providers, said Pat Howe with the Western Idaho Community Action Program, WICAP. And a shortage already exists for infant care.

"It's a problem. There's no get-ting around it," Howe said. Her agency recruits child care

providers and refers welfare and other parents to day care centers under a contract with the Department of Health and Welfare.

Weifare.
Under reform, those receiving assistance will be required to enter job training or a work place-internship in-exchange for a monthly cash stipend and child care benefits.

As those parents enter programs that take them from home, they'll have to find some-place or someone who will care for their children, Howe said.

Even new mothers aren't exempt. After 12 weeks, new mothers have to find a job or enter-training. And they have to find care for their infants.

Health and Welfare officials in Canyon County admit that a child care crunch could be on the horizon.

But the response so far is to hope that the marketplace keeps pace with demand.

Waste threatens Middle Fork of Boise River

of Boise River

BOISE (AP) — Heavy runoff washed through a tailings dam near Adanta, sending potentially washed through a tailings dam near Adanta, sending potentially toxic mine mill waste into the Middle Fork of the Boise River.

The fine silt from inactive gold mines is running into the East Fork of Montezuma Creek and turning the Middle Fork turbid. As much as a million yards of tailings could run-into-the-river-if-the dam is not plugged, Idaho Division of Environmental Quality officials said Monday. Steve West, the agency regional administrator, said the tailings pose a "significant ecological risk," to the Middle Fork, a popular lishing river and a propular lishing river and a propular lishing river and a propular lishing river and saver of Boise.

Officials are still assessing whether the tailings pose a threat to human health. However, the intake for Adanta's water supply comes from above the tailings ponds, and no other wells.

A artha makes the desert bloom





At home in the garden she has enjoyed for 18 years, Martha Ellinger of Kimberly has created a wall-to-wall flower garden by planting many bulbs around a natural landscape of lava rocks and letting Basket of Gold 'just grow

artha Ellinger took four acres of sagebrush and turned it into a gardener's paradise.

The flower packed grounds around Ellinger's 18-year-old cedar home near the canyon in Kimberly were carefully planned to take advantage of the natural landscape.

Ellinger, mother of 5, grandmother of 13 and great-grandmother of seven, once had a flower shop in Twin Falls. But she taught herself to garden back home in Nebraska.

"I do all the work myself," she said, sitting in her living room, amid colorful planters and hanging baskets. "I even do my own lawnmowing."

Ellinger insists this is no big deal, but most people don't have wall-to-wall flowers outside every window of their home.

The walls are rock walls, and Ellinger began adorning them by purchasing six plants and scattering them among the natural contours of the rocks. Now, there are blooms coming out of almost every crack.

blooms coming out of almost every crack.
"It took three years," Ellinger explained. "They just started spreading."
She has Basket of Gold alyssum, pink

and purple creeping phlox, multicolor tulips, daffodils and poppies – colorful seas of them. The only plants she can't seem to grow around her place are pansies.

She doesn't know why.

Ellinger tries to plan her flowers according to where they will get the right amount of sun or shade. An underground sprinkler system waters part of the yard, but Ellinger waters much of it by hand.

She buys her lawn and garden fertilizer from Simplot.

"As soon as the tulips are up and, before they bloom, I sprinkle it around and water – that's when the tulips are making bulbs for the next year," she said. "I don't fertilize again until I plant the petunias."

Ellinger said she usually spends around \$40 a year on plants. That's what she generally pays for

her petunias, which she plants in the numerous milk cans that line her rustic

"I choose all one color, for a better showing," she said.

This year is red.

Ellinger often shops at Kimberly Nurseries. She also hit a sale at Fred Meyer recently.

Throughout her rock gardens, Ellinger has placed decorative chairs, statues of deer, birdhouses and a Chinese lantern she made.

she made.

She said she doesn't have to work in her gardens every day, because "a lot of this -just comes up on its own." Her junipers, for example, are native to the area – but

she moves them around all the time. She also tends what she calls an "easy-care" vegetable garden, with peas, carrots, beets, cucumbers, tomatoes and potatoes ("with the rich soil around the sagebrush, the spuds roll out of the

sagebrush, the spuds roll out of the ground like gold"). She buys her vegetable seeds at Globe Seed & Feed.

"Every time I go out, I just grab a hoe and keep the vegetable garden weed-free," she said. "If I get behind, I have one of my kids rototill between rows."

That's about it, Ellinger said. She loves to spend-

time outdoors, but she's not about to get silly about it.
"I don't bother with roses," she said, "because I don't have time."





WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve passed up a chance to raise interest rates on Twesday amid signs and the passed up a chance to raise interest rates on Twesday amid signs are passed to the passed to

The Fed announced at the end of a 4√ hour meeting that there would be no change in interest rates.

no change in interest rates. Financial markets rallied on the news with the Dow Jones industrial average gaining 74.58 to close at 7,303.46, just 30 points shy of its all-time high set last Thursday. Rising-demand-for-bonds-pushed-the-yield on the 30-year Treasury down to 6.90 percent.

The reaction was quite different on Maych 25 when the Fed announced its first rate increase in two years, pushing its target for the federal funds rate, the interest that banks charge on overnight loans, up a quarter point to 5.5 percent.

In the weeks following that move, stocks lost 9.8 percent of their value as investors feared a series of rate increases would be needed to slow the economy to a more sustainable pace.

However, stocks have now recouped those losses as evidence mounted that the 5.6 percent economic growth rate of the first quarter, was slowing to a more sustainable pace.
