# Director suspended without pay

## Mealey also must apologize to Idaho for 'mooning' action

BOISE — It was an incident that got out of hand, said the Magic Valley's Fish and Game Commission member. But ultimately, Fred Wood of Burley joined his commission colleagues Thursday in voting to suspend Director Steve Mealey without pay for two weeks and give him a letter of reprimand for "mooning" the shoreline of

Lake Pond Oreille. The commission meeting in a closed-door telephone conference, decided to suspend Mealey without pay from Sunday through Aug. 16. He will receive a letter of reprimand and must write an apology to the citizens of Idaho. Gov. Phil Batt said he supported the commission's decision. "I accept the commission's decision and will honor it," Mealey said. "I want to sincerely apologize to the people of Idaho for any inappropriate action on my part that may have been offensive. I con-

sider the matter closed and will have no further comment."

The incident happened aboard a four boat the commission and department officials chartered last Thursday night.

A half dozen people were in the bow of the boat as it passed a large, brightly painted metal sculpture on the shoreline about a half mile away, Commissioner Jeff Siskloway of Terreton pressed Mealey for his opinion of the structure in such a bucolic setting.

"It was one of those things like being in an elk camp and everyone tells a bunch of dirty jokes and then someone goes home and tells their wife."

Wood, referring to the fish and game "leadership" program, said a "cock of Mealey's arrogance."

Five commissioners, including Wood, voted for the sanctions. Siskloway abstained and Commissioner Tom Pownall

## Trevino sentenced to at least 35 years

TWIN FALLS — Rudolfo Trevino III was sentenced Thursday to at least 35 years in prison for the May 1995 murder of Ryan Wiggins of Castleford.

District Judge Roger Burdick called Trevino a "senseless killer" and imposed a life sentence with the possibility of parole in 23 years. Burdick added eight years to the sentence for the use of a firearm.

A Twin Falls jury in June convicted Trevino, 23, of first-degree murder. "There are no winners," Wiggins' mother, Flo Ostrand, said outside the Twin Falls County Judicial Building.

"Hopefully this will be the end and we can go on with our lives."

"Regardless, my son's not coming back."

"The closure of the whole thing is better than the sentence," Wiggins' stepfather John Ostrand said. Trevino declined comment and showed little emotion Thursday. Burdick said Trevino's lack of remorse and inability to admit guilt forced him to impose a stiff sentence.

"A lesser sentence would depreciate the seriousness of the defendant's crime," Burdick said. Former Twin Falls County Prosecutor Rich Heston — who resigned earlier this month but Thursday finished the case he

started more than two years ago — focused his arguments on Trevino's lack of remorse and the effect the murder had on Wiggins' family and the entire town of Castleford.

"I can hardly think of an example greater of utter disregard for human life," Heston said.

Emotional testimonies from Wiggins' family and Trevino's described the child the murder put into the lives of everyone in Castleford.

"He was a role model and all of the students looked up to him," said Castleford High School teacher Diane Clark. "We all lost Ryan. It wasn't just his family."

## UPS, union continue talks

WASHINGTON — Negotiators for UPS and the Teamsters union continued to meet early Friday past a midnight deadline as both sides geared up for a strike against the giant delivery service.

Matt Witt, a Teamsters spokesman, said shortly after midnight (10 p.m. EDT) that strike plans were put on hold temporarily, but added that could change at any moment.

"There's no limit on how long we'll talk or how long we'll hold off a strike," he said. UPS took out full-page ads Friday in The Washington Post, The New York Times and other major newspapers telling its customers to expect a disruption in service.

In what it called "an open letter to UPS customers," the company said it has been unable to reach an agreement with the union.

"Under these circumstances, we can no longer promise uninterrupted delivery service," the ad said. "We will, however, make every effort to continue to serve customers."

## Removing part of brain can reduce seizures

BALTIMORE — Jody Miller was 3 when she began having seizures that made her body jerk for hours, sometimes days.

When medication failed, doctors gave her parents a startling option: have half of her brain removed.

Jody had the hemispherectomy and became part of a Johns Hopkins University study that showed the radical surgery can, in many cases, stop or

reduce severe seizures in children and enable them to lead close to normal lives. Today, Jody is a healthy second-grader who hasn't had a seizure in four years.

"Parents of these children agonized about whether to allow this radical surgery," said Dr. Eileen P.G. Vining, the study's lead author and a Hopkins neurology and pediatrics professor. "The data prove their courageous decision was correct."

The operation itself, it now seems, it was not new; it has been around since the 1930s. **Please see BRAIN, Page A2**

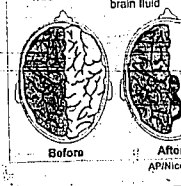

# Senate probe veers off on tangent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators investigating fund-raising abuses veered angrily Thursday into the world of a private detective who had offered to dig for unfavorable information on one their GOP colleagues.

The detective also testified that an Indian tribe told him it had donated to the Democratic Party after being assured by a fund-raiser it would get a favorable land ruling from the Clinton administration. That triggered a GOP accusation that the money had been a bribe.

Investigator Terry Lenzer, hired by President Clinton's legal defense fund to verify that contributions were legal, was summoned before the Senate panel to discuss his findings. — Including a senior aide's handwritten description of fund-raiser Yah Lin "Charlie" Trie as a "bag carrier."

But it wasn't his defense fund work that made the session intensely personal for Sen. Don Nickles, R-Okla., and caused several senators to rip into Lenzer, who two decades ago was a Senate Watergate lawyer.

An indignant Nickles was joined by Democratic and Republican colleagues in condemning Lenzer for a proposal he wrote this spring to help an Indian tribe search for unfavorable information on the Oklahoma senator, his wife and his business associates.

"I don't mind you messing with me, but I do mind you messing with my family," Nickles told Lenzer in one of several steely exchanges that came as the first round of Senate hearings into fund-raising abuses neared an end after four weeks.

Lenzer told the senator his offer was never carried out but would have been nothing more than a type of "opposition research" typically conducted by campaigns during elections.

# Statistics show high dropout rate persists among Hispanic students

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hispanics still drop out of school at a far higher rate than non-Hispanic blacks and whites, and leave school at an earlier age, the Education Department reported Thursday.

The Department's National Center for Education Statistics found that nearly one-third of Hispanics age 16 to 24 were dropouts in 1995, a rate that has held steady for more than 20 years.

By contrast, the dropout rate for black Americans age 16 to 24 has fallen and is approaching the rate for whites, the center said in its latest report on dropouts.

Advocates for Hispanic education said the reasons were complex and varied. They cited low education of parents, lack of access to early education programs such as Head Start, a huge problem with teen pregnancy, few Latino teachers to hold out as good examples and cuts in bilingual education.

"All the issues that are associated with urban poverty are certainly contributing factors," said Ronald Blackburn-Moreno, national director of Aspira, a group devoted to Hispanic education.

"But I think above and beyond that is the language and culture issue and the lack of role models in schools."

Critics who want to restrict immigration say the numbers show the failure by immigrants or their children to blend in.

"It points to a cultural problem of high-level immigration coming from countries where they do not have an expectation of high education completion rates," said John Martin, an analyst for the Federation for American Immigration Reform, which wants to control immigration.

The numbers point to the failure of bilingual education to break the cultural pattern, he said.

The statistical report said language problems were "associated" with failure to complete high school but stopped short of saying they were a cause.

Overall, 16 percent of young adults were not enrolled in high school and had not finished it in October 1995. That's nearly 4 million people out of 32.4 million. The rate has eased down from nearly 15 percent in 1972.

The rate was 30 percent for Hispanics, however, meaning 1.3 million people were dropouts. That compares with 7.9 million, close to 9 percent, for other whites.

There were 557,000 black dropouts, accounting for 12 percent of those young adults. The rate for blacks had exceeded 20 percent in the early 1970s.

The rate for Hispanics has been high in part because statisticians count those who enter this country with less than a 12th-grade education and never enroll in U.S. schools.

But analysts were able to determine for the first time that looking just at those who enrolled in U.S. schools at some time, the rate was close to 20 percent. Those who do attend school drop out sooner. In 1995, more than half of the Hispanic dropouts reported having less than a 10th-grade education, compared with 31.1 percent of non-Hispanic white dropouts and 27 percent of the black dropouts.

For those foreign-born Hispanics who never went to a U.S. school, fewer than 43 percent had finished the 10th grade or higher.

Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., confronted Lenzer with a memo he wrote last May, proposing a review of Nickles and his "links to the oil industry." The proposed investigation would have included database searches of Nickles, his wife, Linda L. Morrison, and his businesses.

Lenzer said he wrote the memo after a longtime acquaintance of President Clinton, Cody Shearer, helped arrange a meeting between Lenzer and members of the Cheyenne-Arapaho Tribe of Oklahoma.

The tribe last year made a \$107,000 contribution to the Democratic Party in hopes of winning the return of former tribal lands in Oklahoma. Nickles and other Oklahoma officials oppose the return of the land, and the tribe came to Lenzer seeking a possible investigation to see if Nickles' position might have been influenced by any financial ties to the oil industry, the investigator said.

In the course of the conversation, Lenzer said, tribal officials told him that a Democratic fund-raiser promised "favorable action, they were going to get the land exchanged in return for a donation."

Specter jumped on Lenzer for not reporting the incident to authorities. "That's bribery. You are an attorney. The bribery. Did you know reporting this?" the senator asked.

"I didn't know whether it was accurate," Lenzer responded, adding that the tribe's mention of the donation was essentially an aside.

The Democratic Party returned the contribution this year after the Indians' plight became public, including the fact that the contribution came from the tribe's fund set marked for emergencies such as funerals and hearing bills.

# Feds will review findings on 1950s radiation exposure

WASHINGTON (AP) — Energy Secretary Federico Peña said Thursday the Clinton administration will closely examine whether the government should compensate thousands of people who as children were exposed to radiation from Cold War-era nuclear bomb tests.

But Peña, asked about new findings by the National Cancer Institute concerning such radiation exposure, said: "We are not yet in a position to determine what our response would be." The institute's 100,000-page report, parts of which have already been laid out in recent days, found unexpectedly high levels of exposure to radioactive iodine-131 in at least a dozen states from the Cold War-era weapons tests. The greatest exposure came from children drinking contaminated milk.

The iodine-131, with the highest estimated exposures, were scattered in parts of 12 states: South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa, Missouri, Idaho, Nevada, Arkansas, Wyoming, Colorado, Utah and Montana, according to government projections.

Reno apologizes to Jewell over leak

WASHINGTON — Attorney General Janet Reno offered Atlanta security officer Richard Jewell an apology Thursday but limited it to the leak of his name as a suspect in the bombing at last summer's Olympic games.

"I think we owe him an apology," Reno told her weekly news conference. "I don't think any apology is sufficient when somebody has gone through what Mr. Jewell has gone through. What I need to do is to make sure that we take steps to try to avoid something like that in the future."

Reno was the first federal official to offer the word "apology," but she quickly made clear that — like those federal officials who offered sympathy earlier — she was referring only to the leak and its effects.

FedEx jet crashes and burns; all escape

NEWARK, N.J. — A FedEx cargo plane crashed and burned at Newark's airport early Thursday. All five people aboard crawled to safety out of a cockpit window, but the accident shut down the New York area's busiest airport for hours.

The MD-11 jet came down hard during a landing at 1:35 a.m. EOT, flipping over on its back and snapping off a wing as it skidded down the runway.

With flames spreading around them, the two crew members and three passengers pushed open a window — designed to be used as an escape hatch — and were out of the plane watching the aircraft burn when rescuers arrived.

FDA asked to require caffeine labeling

WASHINGTON — A consumer group asked the government today to force food makers to include caffeine content on their product labels, arguing that pregnant women especially need to know. "Knowing the caffeine content is important to many people," said Michael Jacobson of the Center for Science in the Public Interest. "All the companies have the information but they keep it to themselves."

The center petitioned the Food and Drug Administration to require that drug labels list caffeine content, just as they list amounts of fat, cholesterol and sodium.

Feds probing possible pension fund bilking

WASHINGTON — Agents from three federal agencies are investigating allegations that at least two Teamsters pension funds were bilked of millions of dollars.

Agents from the Securities Exchange Commission, the Labor Department and the FBI want to know if brokers and pension managers received kickbacks or gifts in exchange for steering investments to the former Shawmut National Bank in Boston, sources familiar with the investigation told The Associated Press.

The federal, legal and labor sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the agents are reviewing union and investment records in at least four states. They are trying to determine whether inflated commissions that the bank paid to several brokers compromised the pension funds.

Soldiers to be searched for gang tattoos

TACOMA, Wash. — All 19,000 soldiers at the Fort Lewis will be subjected to body searches for tattoos that indicate membership in gangs or extremist groups, the second Army base in the nation to take such a step.

"We have not had an incident to set this off," Fort Lewis spokeswoman Anna Huns said. "It's just that there are larger numbers of gangs and extremist organizations than in the past, and we want to protect and preserve the rights of all soldiers."

Commanders have been given catalogs of the objectionable tattoos, which include swastikas, Celtic crosses, rabbits with a black star on one ear, three-leaf clovers and skulls. Soldiers found with objectionable markings will be counseled or disciplined, Fort Lewis spokesman Maj. Eugene Pavlik said.

Congress-courts tension worries ABA

WASHINGTON — Increasing tension between courts and Congress "could degenerate into real threats" to judicial independence, an American Bar Association panel said Thursday.

"Recently, individual judges have been subjected to misleading criticism, demagogic attacks and threats of impeachment from representatives of both political branches in both political parties," the commission said.

The ABA formed its Commission on Separation of Powers and Judicial Independence last year after President Clinton and Republican presidential nominee Bob Dole criticized a federal judge in New York who threw out evidence in a cocaine case.

Cohen: General's actions insufficient

WASHINGTON (AP) — The commander of a U.S. air base in Saudi Arabia should have done more to avoid the terrorist blast last year that killed 19 airmen, Defense Secretary William Cohen said Thursday.

"The commander said he would retire 'with my head held high.'"

"Brig. Gen. (Terry) Schwaller recognized that a car or truck bomb ... posed a serious threat to his personnel, but he did not take adequate account of the implications of this terrorist threat or develop an effective response plan," Cohen told reporters at a Pentagon briefing.

Given several security failures at the Khobar Towers barracks, including the lack of an effective alarm system, inadequate evacuation plans and little anti-terrorism training for troops, Cohen said he believed Schwaller did not merit a second star and promotion to major general.

The defense secretary lauded Schwaller as a "fine officer" who had served admirably for more than 25 years, but one who did not take "elemental" steps to ensure the safety of those living on his base.

"He's not being made a scapegoat; he's being held accountable," Cohen said when asked whether it was proper for only one man to be punished in the wake of the June 25, 1996, attack. Members of Congress have pressed for some action in the matter. However, Gen. Ronald Fogleman, Air Force chief of staff, told lawmakers earlier this year he believes the incident was an "act of war" and impossible for one military officer to defend against.

Fogleman announced Monday he intended to retire as soon as possible, saying he felt "out of step" with Pentagon leadership on the Khobar matter. He has argued that a decision to punish

Forces in Europe, Gen. Michael Ryan, to succeed Fogleman.

Debates have raged in the Pentagon ever since the attack as to whether Schwaller was being held to too high a standard that no military officer could achieve. Gen. John Shalikashvili, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, appeared with Cohen and said he agreed with his findings. President Clinton, briefed on Cohen's decision, also concurred, the secretary said.

"He did an awful, awful lot," Shalikashvili said of Schwaller. "But that doesn't say he did everything ... Some lapses did occur."

Cohen pointed out that because protection of a base is the responsibility of its commander, and because Schwaller never brought any problems to his superiors to seek help, it was he who must bear the burden of accountability. "In this particular case, not enough was done," Cohen said.

U.S. forces worldwide are certain targets of terrorism today and "extraordinary precautions" must be taken, Cohen said, adding, "We can assume there will be other attempts."

Cohen's decision effectively ends the career of the officer, who later announced he had asked to retire.

In a statement, Schwaller said he was filled with "sadness for the victims and their families," and that he hoped those responsible for the bombing would be found and punished. He added that he was disappointed with Cohen's decision.

"In the long run it's not important to us on this earth judges you or how you are judged. It is important to do what's right, listen to your heart and conscience and to keep to the high ground. I have and will walk away with my head held high."

Schwaller was a three-year sergeant as a one-star general and therefore is eligible to retire at that level.

Cohen's decision goes against two internal Air Force reports, which contended Schwaller did

everything he could have done for the safety of the men and women at the Saudi-built housing complex.

The Air Force's first internal study was done after an independent Pentagon commission led by a retired Army general said that Schwaller for blame. It said he failed to respond adequately to clear danger signs that a terrorist act was possible at the apartment complex.

Schwaller was wing commander for the unit in Saudi Arabia, which flew flight-interdiction missions over southern Iraq. He has been serving as the Air Force's director of operations and training at the Pentagon.

But Shalikashvili said the decision to hold Schwaller accountable actually would help morale in the field, saying it was wrong to "circle the wagons" around a general officer just because he was a senior officer.

"We owe nothing less to those young men and women that we ... often lead into danger. We must provide them commanders who are held to high standards," Shalikashvili said.

Wagon train participant pushes on to reach ancestors' final destination

ALPINE, Utah (AP) — The valley of the Great Salt Lake was the right place only long enough for Sanford "Sank" Flake to briefly rest his weary bones and refresh his horse.

After riding 1,200 miles over prairies and mountains with the sesquicentennial Mormon Trail wagon train, Flake put spurs to his horse Denver Wednesday afternoon for another arduous trek. He'll straddle the spirited paint to Snowflake, Ariz., loosely retracing the trail his ancestors took 120 years ago when Brigham Young called them to sell everything and head south.

"We're commemorating the pioneers this year. We still haven't got to where they were assigned in the various valleys in the West," said Flake, the great grandson of William Jordan Flake, who as a boy walked across the plains and established what is now Snowflake in 1878.

Heber City resident Dave "Skinner" Collins will follow

behind Flake in a mule-drawn covered wagon. An experienced wagoner and blacksmith, Collins has put at least 8,200 miles on old western trails.

A rugged, intense chap, Collins isn't part of the Flake family: He said his progenitors were run out of Scotland and Ireland for being horse thieves.

"I guess it's no accident I'm doing this kind of stuff," he said.

Collins drove a wagon from Fort Laramie, Wyo., to Salt Lake City as part of the sesquicentennial wagon train. "I wasn't going to buy, I went to visit and got hired," he said.

With the white-bearded, leather-faced Flake as a tall-in-the-saddle outsider, the pair plan to make the 550-mile journey to Snowflake in four to six weeks. They'll roughly follow U.S. 89, stopping in some of the towns Flake's ancestors helped settle. A part of his cousins intend to join him for parts of the trip.

Snowflake got its name by com-

bing the surnames of its founders, the Flake family, and Erastus Snow, one of the first two men to enter the Salt Lake Valley. An LDS Church apostle, Snow visited the settlement to see how it was progressing.

The notion to push on to his hometown came to Flake, 65, along the Mormon Trail.

"I was moved to do it before I got off the trek," he said.

Flake bought two teams of large mules on the route, grey mules like the ones his great-great-grandfather, James Madison Flake, loaned to Brigham Young for the exodus west. Flake also set out to find something for Ben, Simon, Moutie and Pearl to pull.

Alpine residents Max and Diana Pictor during three months with the wagon train proved to be a blessing for Flake. Max Pictor, whom Flake described as an "exceptional pioneer," guided an Amish-built covered wagon from Nauvoo to Salt Lake City.

Investigators fear thousands of bad California licenses out on streets

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Thousands of fraudulent California driver's licenses were issued by clerks at the Department of Motor Vehicles for bribes of up to \$1,000 each, investigators say.

Seventy-nine employees have been fired.

In most cases, the licenses were issued without requiring the applicants to show required documents such as a prior license, a birth certificate or other form of ID. Some of the licenses bear bogus Social Security numbers or phony identities.

However, if the licenses are

checked by a police officer during a traffic stop, they will come back as valid.

The California driver's license, held by 20.2 million motorists, is a basic identification document, a "gateway" card for other forms of ID.

And these days, licenses are needed for more than just getting into a bar. They're used as proof of identity for everything from applying for welfare to buying a gun and checking baggage before getting on an airplane.

The California card incorporates numerous safeguards, including holographic images,

sophisticated coding and layering — that make it all but impossible to counterfeit or tamper with.

As a result, people who need licenses and can't get them legitimately — undocumented immigrants, people with revoked licenses, some felons and others — try to buy them by bribing clerks.

"It's a problem we have been aware of for a long time," DMV director Sally Reed said. "Ironically, as our documents became more tamper-proof it's become more of a problem, and the department is always looking at the possibilities of fraud."

Head of Bonneville Power Administration resigns

WASHINGTON (AP) — Randy Hardy, the head of the Bonneville Power Administration, said Thursday he's resigning effective Oct. 1 to spend more time with his family.

He also said he wants to give his successor a jump on the anticipated deregulation of the electric industry and other challenges facing the Pacific Northwest's largest power wholesaler at the turn of the century.

After meeting with Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., Hardy told reporters he had no immediate plans and intends to take the including several weeks to volunteer at an orphanage in Mexico.

Hardy, 53, has commuted between Seattle and BPA headquarters in Portland since he took the job nearly six years ago. He said he was quitting primarily for personal reasons.

He emerged from Murray's office with a picture of a balloon his son, Christopher, 4, had drawn

with the caption, "If I were a balloon, I would fly to Portland because my Dad is there."

"This picture is worth 1,000 words," Hardy said. "I need to spend more time with my wife and my son."

Hardy said Bonneville Power is beginning an important transition that will take two to three years, as Congress moves toward deregulation of the electric industry.

"There's no way I can stay on that long after the sacrifices I've already asked my family to make," he said.

As leader of the largest power wholesaler in the Pacific Northwest, Hardy has been in the hot seat as Congress considers proposals to privatize the BPA and struggles with the costs of protecting endangered salmon in the Columbia River's hydro power system.

He has spent much of the past two years fighting proposals on Capitol Hill to dismantle the power marketing agency, instead urging restructuring and staff cuts.

Republican congressman to plead guilty

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Rep. Jay Kim and his wife agreed to plead guilty to federal charges that they accepted more than \$230,000 in illegal campaign contributions, the U.S. attorney said Thursday.

Charges were filed earlier in the day against the Republican congressman from Diamond Bar, his wife, June, and the Jay Kim for Congress Committee, U.S.

Attorney Nora Manella said in a statement.

Kim became the nation's first Korean-born congressman when he was elected to the House in 1992.

Kim agreed to plead guilty to three charges: that he knowingly accepted an illegal \$50,000 contribution from a Chinese national, contributed more than \$83,000 in

illegal corporate contributions from Jay Kim Engineers Inc. to his own campaign and accepted an illegal \$12,000 corporate contribution from Nikko Enterprises Inc.

He also agreed, on behalf of his campaign committee, to enter guilty pleas to five counts of concealing more than \$210,000 in illegal contributions in reports to the Federal Elections Commission.

Parents arrested in child's death

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — A mother's drug-laden milk contributed to her baby daughter's death, according to police who arrested her and the father on first-degree murder charges.

Amore Powell, 24, and Robin Johnson, 33, were being held Thursday in the July 11 death of 7-week-old Eve Powell.

An autopsy showed she died of oxygen deprivation. Toxicology test results were pending, but police said her mother's milk probably was laced with heroin and methadone because of Ms. Powell's addiction.

### Lockheed a welcome partner in building Magic Valley's future

Looking a gift horse in the mouth isn't such a bad idea — as the Democratic National Committee recently learned. So it's only prudent to ask what Lockheed Martin Idaho Technologies Co. wants in return for its big donation to the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.

The answer is simpler than it may seem. Lockheed wants to be liked.

The Magic Valley has always been a political trouble spot for Idaho's nuclear establishment. Situated downstream from the Idaho National Engineering and Environmental Laboratory, we get 100 percent of the worry about potential nuclear contamination, but none of the economic benefits of federal contracting.

Lockheed's donation pushes a sliver of the federal pie in our direction — a sliver whose eventual value is likely to far exceed its initial cost.

The company gave the chamber \$200 this week, with the promise of at least five similar contributions in years to come. The gift will act as seed money for an economic development fund, eventually helping to create hundreds of local jobs.

This was a smart move by Lockheed. As a division of the nation's biggest defense contractor, the company has plenty of weight to throw around — but it needs to throw carefully. Pumping too much money into political contributions would be seen as heavy-handed. A blatant public-relations campaign might similarly backfire.

Donating to Twin Falls' economic development program is part of the company's "effort" to "win friends" in this valley. Ever since becoming INEEL's main contractor,

Lockheed executives have made a point of visiting the valley to show the locals that they don't wear horns and hoes.

(In the interest of full disclosure, we should note that the publisher of this newspaper is co-chairman of the chamber's Economic Development Committee and was involved in accepting the donation.)

The fact that Lockheed hopes to win the valley's goodwill shouldn't dampen anyone's gratitude for the money. Being courted always feels nice, even if you're under no illusions about the courtship's motives.

Environmental activist Peter Rickards was simply wrong when he called the donation "obvious bribery." No amount of money could change this valley's opinion about the waste at INEEL, or our insistence that it be cleaned up.

Rickards was right when he said, "What Idahoans really want is clean water." But his implied suggestion that our water is unclean is nothing but scaremongering.

INEEL's buried nuclear waste creates a tiny but worrisome risk of contamination. But risk of contamination is not contamination. This valley's drinking water is enviably pure and will be for the foreseeable future. Keeping it that way is everybody's business.

Citizens, business leaders and political officials from this valley will continue to insist that the federal government meet its obligation to protect Idaho's environmental future. Meanwhile, Lockheed Martin is a welcome partner in building this community's future prosperity.

### Tobacco deal sells out Idaho

Attorney General Al Lance has hired a Seattle attorney to represent the state of Idaho in obtaining funds from the tobacco industry. He justifies this by stating that any payment to the state's law firm would be paid by the tobacco industry out of the suit proceeds. Funds which would be coming to the state of Idaho will go to the Seattle law firm.

While the state of Idaho has a major campaign called "Buy Idaho," he cannot find any attorney in Idaho capable of pursuing the tobacco industry settlement. That certainly comes as a surprise to the major law firms in Idaho. Thirty-nine other states have already filed suit. If we just slow down, the other states' attorneys will do all the work and we can get our fair share. We don't need a Seattle lawyer taking our money.

Is such a settlement in Idaho's best interest? The settlement will ban class action suits or any additional funds to the state for tobacco-related illnesses. That means that the tobacco industry can continue its current programs, knowing that no single individual can take on the entire tobacco industry. By selling away Idaho's class-action rights against the tobacco industry, he is providing the tobacco industry total immunity from its conduct. If a state or county provides medical assistance to an individual for a smoking-related illness, the county or state cannot recover from the tobacco industry, again held blameless.

Idaho is slated to receive approximately \$19 billion (that's with an M) over six years. The state of Mississippi, the poorest in the nation, is scheduled to receive \$3.6 billion (that's with a B) if the national program is not approved by the federal Congress, 75 times as much as Idaho. Why?

The answer lies in Lance's list of campaign contributors. He received \$2,000 from Philip Morris for his campaign. I do not expect Lance to be above reproach. However, I am offended that he would sell out Idaho for a paltry \$2,000. I don't mind so much that he has been bought but that he was bought so cheaply.

All Lance needs to understand that "Buy Idaho" means buy Idaho products and services, not for the tobacco industry or a Seattle law firm to buy the Idaho attorney general. M. LYNN DUNLAP Attorney At Law Twin Falls

# Arafat: Too weak to crack down on militants - or too unwilling?

JERUSALEM (AP) — Yasser Arafat, already weakened by a corruption scandal in his cabinet, is losing credibility over the faltering peace process.

Now, Israel is demanding he crack down on Palestinian militants in the wake of the Jerusalem market bombing.

The question: Is Arafat strong enough to do it? Arafat today is considerably weaker than he was last year. In March 1996, he jailed leaders of militant groups that killed more than 60 people in a series of suicide bombings.

Back then, though, the peace process was robust, and Arafat and his supporters had just won a referendum backing in the first Palestinian elections.

Arafat also had been strengthened by Israeli troop withdrawals in the West Bank and wanted to help the then-Israeli Labor government of Shimon Peres to win re-election.

The hardline government that beat Peres at the polls would like to see Arafat fall.

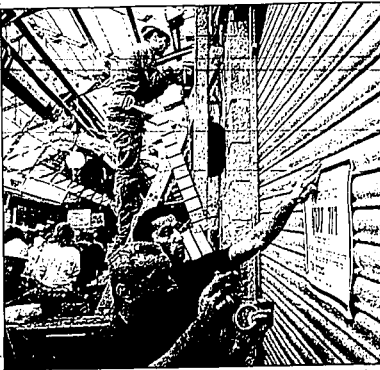
Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu is pressing Arafat to rein in the militants and threatens to send his forces to do the job if the Palestinian police fail to deliver.

President Clinton, with \$100 million a year in U.S. aid under his control, is demanding "concrete steps" and Palestinian cooperation with Israeli security forces.

But Arafat may not be in any position to mobilize against the militants.

He has been losing credibility among Palestinians because he hasn't been able to do anything about controversial steps taken by his sometime peace partner, Netanyahu. Foremost is the building of a Jewish housing project in Jerusalem on land Palestinians regard as their own.

It also was seen as ineffective in responding to Netanyahu's decision to open a new entrance

riding around the poverty-stricken Gaza Strip in luxury cars — have raised resentment among ordinary Palestinians and concern among international donors.

"On top of the scandal, economic conditions are worse, the legitimacy of the Palestinian Authority is threatened by allegations of human rights violations, and the peace process is dangerously derailed."

"If the Israelis and Americans expect Arafat to produce miracles, they are mistaken. He can't fix too weak and too discredited," said Khalil Shakaki, head of the Center for Palestine Research and Studies, an independent think tank in the West Bank.

"That's especially true, he said, when Israel is imposing a travel ban that keeps Palestinians from going to jobs in Israel or even from moving between autonomous towns in the West Bank."

"During the past year, Arafat's credibility and popular standing have weakened in the Palestinian street," Shakaki said.

# Russians: Astronaut switch no problem

MOSCOW (AP) — Russian space officials said Thursday substituting one U.S. astronaut for another on a Mir flight should not disrupt the planned repairs aboard the troubled space station.

NASA announced Wednesday it would not be sending astronaut Wendy Lawrence to the Mir because of a foot ailment, she was too small for the bulky Russian space

suit she would need if she were required to perform a spacewalk. Instead, her backup, David Wolf, will fly to the Mir in September.

Russian deputy flight commander Viktor Blagov said he only learned of the change in plus this morning during a phone call from an Associated Press reporter.

But Blagov, who coordinates the Mir flight, said space officials had considered every contingency for the bulky Russian space

program is for peaceful purposes only, but western experts think the communist country might make at least one launch.

Under a 1994 deal with the United States, North Korea is required to freeze and eventually scrap its old nuclear program.

# Seoul to finance North Korean nuclear project

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korea said Thursday it will provide \$45 million for an international consortium to start building two nuclear plants in North Korea.

Seoul will foot most of the \$5 billion bill for the nuclear plants in exchange for North Korea's

promise to freeze a nuclear program suspected of developing atomic weapons.

# India to revive missile plans

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Despite strong international opposition, India intends to resume development of a long-range ballistic missile capable of hitting targets deep inside China or Pakistan.

Work on the Agni missile, which has a range of 1,550 miles, was halted three years ago after criticism from the United States and other Western nations that India was escalating an arms race in South Asia.

"It has been decided to accord high priority to the next phase of the Agni program," Defense Minister Mulayam Singh Yadav said in a statement given to Parliament on Wednesday and made public Thursday.

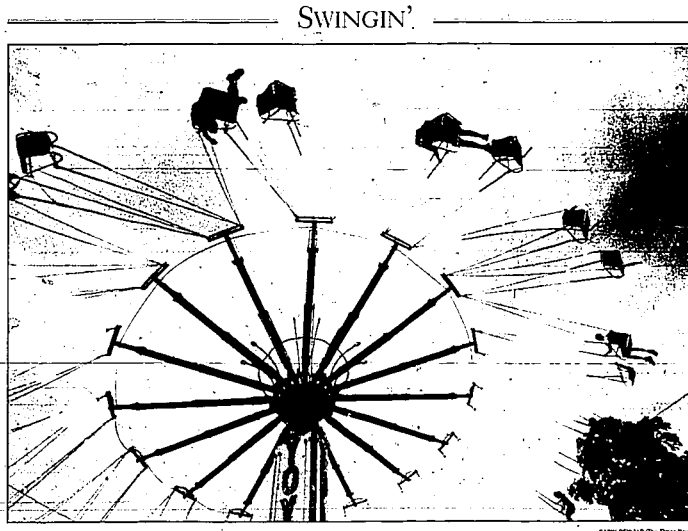

Idaho men allege sexual assault at prison

BOISE (AP) - Three Idaho inmates say they were sexually assaulted at a private Texas prison, leading to the arrest and firing of two prison nurses.
The nurses allegedly fondled the prisoners in April at the Frio County Detention Center in infancy, south of San Antonio. They were indicted by a grand jury and arraigned last week, and now are out on bond.
State Department of Correction spokesman Mark Carnopis said Idaho officials are satisfied the matter has been handled appropriately and do not plan to move the 248 Idaho prisoners at the Texas prison.
"We're happy that they took swift and decisive action" by firing the nurses, Carnopis said.

Still, the charges come as the Correction Department is struggling to keep tabs on its growing out-of-state inmate population. About 750 of Idaho's 4,100 inmates are housed in Texas, Minnesota and Louisiana because the Idaho system lacks space.
Last week, Idaho prisoners unhappy with conditions in Louisiana rioted and smashed at least \$30,000 worth of furniture and appliances in the dorms. Two Correction Department officials are inspecting the Basile, La., prison this week and could release a report as early as Friday, Carnopis said.
The inmates claiming sexual assault in Texas had threatened civil lawsuits but have not followed through, said Russell Rau,

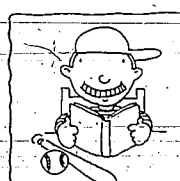
senior vice president of Correctional Services Corp., the Saratosa, Fla.-based company that operates the Frio jail and about 17 other detention centers nationwide.
Any damages awarded would be the responsibility of Correctional Services, not Idaho, based on the contract between the two entities, Carnopis said.
Frio Detention Center nurse Gary Majors has been charged with three sexual assaults on two Idaho inmates, said Roy Moran, assistant district attorney in Frio County.
Majors, a lieutenant at Lackland Air Force Base near San Antonio, has been released on \$50,000 bond. His brother, nurse Larry Majors, faces one count of sexual assault on a third inmate, Merin said. He is out on \$20,000 bond.

Former adult services employee allegedly stole clients' money

LEWISTON (AP) - A former employee of the Area Agency on Aging, and Adult Services has been charged with three counts of grand theft in connection with money missing from the accounts of handicapped clients.
Susan L. Butts, 37, who also has been a minister for Methodist churches in the area, is scheduled to appear in 2nd District Court on Aug. 13.
Butts is accused of writing checks on an individual account set up by the agency for clients who are developmentally disabled or born with Down's Syndrome and need assistance handling their money and paying their regular living expenses.
The program, set up by the Social Security Administration in 1991, allows an agency representative to deposit federal disability checks into each person's account and then pay monthly bills and disburse an allowance to the individual.
Prosecutors allege that in the majority of the incidents Butts would make out checks payable

to cash on the accounts, endorse and cash them herself and make entries in the check register and monthly financial report indicating the money was deposited into nonexistent savings accounts.
The incidents occurred between March 1995 and February 1996, according to the complaint. The first count alleges Butts wrote checks totaling \$5,900 on one person's account. The second count alleges \$1,600 was taken as four checks from a juvenile enrolled in the payee program.
The third count lists six people who allegedly lost a total of \$2,968. One of the apparently lost a total of \$2,250 taken in three checks, according to the auditor's report in the court file.
The checks to pay clients' bills or other needs are supposed to be deposited in the check register. Some copies in the court file have one; others have two. Two Area Agency on Aging employees said they occasionally signed blank checks for Butts, assuming she would then use them to pay a bill for a client.

# Residents rally on Pena's behalf

RUPERT — Minidoka County commissioners found themselves outnumbered and unprepared Thursday morning when almost 30 residents showed up for a meeting they thought was scheduled to discuss the county's ongoing court case with Raymond Pena.

Pena's relatives, area residents and local attorneys first filed into the commissioners' meeting room, which proved too small, and then into a larger room in the courthouse case.

The commissioners met with them at 8 a.m. though they had not planned to discuss making a statement about the Pena proceedings until 10:30.

"Once settled in the bigger room, the crowd immediately began voicing its concerns over the commission's decision to appeal a Pocatello judge's decision entitling Pena to money from \$45,000 in back pay and damages."

Attendants and commissioners were given a list of 10 questions for the county and a cost analysis of the case.

Pena's brother David Pena posed several of the questions on the list.

He asked whether the county had made an offer to Pena; commissioners authorized one for around \$15,000, but after the

judge granted Pena that much in his first summary judgment.

He asked whether the commission had an executive session with Pena while he was helping then-prosecutor Gara Newman; Commission Chairman John Rensberg remembered meeting with him, but not when.

He also asked how often a judge's summary judgment is overturned on appeal.

"I think if I knew the odds, about that, then I'd be in Las Vegas, not here," said county Prosecutor Rick Bollor. "They are overturned routinely."

Newman hired Pena, a Rupert attorney, to help her fight the attorney general's office in a struggle for jurisdiction over county murder cases. The arrangement entailed to pay Pena's \$15,000 bill because they had not approved his hire or entered into a contract with him.

Sixth District Judge William Woodland ruled a few months ago that the county owed the \$15,000 because Newman had the power to hire help. He ruled in Pena's favor again recently by deciding Pena had been a county employee, not an independent contractor, and entitled to three times his lost wages under the state's Claim for Wages Act.

Several people asked why the commission had spent so much time and money on the case.

Bollor said the issue was mainly which branch of county government has final say on budgetary matters. The commissioners simply want to know if other elected officials can authorize spending money from budgets the commission controls.

But at least one resident said the county should just pay Pena, even if future hirings are prohibited.

"If a change needs to be made, then the change needs to be made now, for the future," said Curtis Stoiker, a Rupert public accountant.

The commissioners said they would schedule another open meeting, this time in the evening to allow more citizens to attend.

But Rensberg reminded those in attendance of the circumstances facing the county last year — when three looming murder cases, other court cases and the battle with the attorney general left the county strapped for money and the commissioners without much legal guidance.

"We had no counsel, Gara Newman would have been — should have been — our counsel, but she was tangled up in these other things," he said. "We had to make some decisions in a vacuum."

# Age irrelevant, trekker proves

## 86-year-old eldest on Mormon Trail

BURLEY — When Weldon Beck learned of this year's 1,300-mile trek along the Mormon Trail, he decided right away that he was going.

The 86-year-old's family and friends weren't as thrilled, but Beck was determined to see for himself what his ancestors encountered on their route from Omaha, Neb., to Salt Lake City.

"I'm a lot them said, 'You're foolish,'" Beck said. "But I said 'I'm going.'"

By the trip's end July 22, several people had told Beck he was the oldest person to complete the three-month journey.

"That's what they told me, but I don't know for sure because I didn't see everybody's birth certificates."

Although Beck endured cold, dreary weather throughout Nebraska and had to ride instead of walk much of the trip because of his tired legs, he said things went smoothly until a wagon accident.

The afternoon before the 30 covered wagons pulled into Salt Lake City, the wagon Beck owned — driven by Val and Gloria Robins — crashed while going down a steep hill. Val Robins was thrown from the wagon and broke his wrist, but none of the other five passengers was seriously injured. Beck escaped the accident by just minutes, when he decided to ride with other people because his wagon had too many passengers.

"I got out just before they went over that steep hill," Beck said. "It was just my luck; I guess."

Beck's son Leonard heard about the accident, but wasn't aware his father had any involvement with the destroyed wagon until he was notified by a reporter. He and his family were relieved to learn Beck wasn't hurt.

"He never did call us but we had an opportunity to speak with Val Robins' sons and they told us what happened," the son said.

Kathryn Goodfellow, a friend

of Beck, said she remembers him slowing down at times on the trip, but it never stopped him from wanting to visit with others.

"He'd get tired, but when he got into camp he was eager to talk about our wagon and our country," Goodfellow said. "As a rider along the Oregon Trail in 1993, the Utah Trail last year and others, Beck has had similar experiences, but none have had weather as bad or lasted nearly as long," he said.

The kindness and generosity of people he met along the way, Beck said, meant the most to him. At one point in Nebraska, travelers walked into a small country store and were told to help themselves to whatever they needed, free of charge.

"That's what America is all about," Beck said.

When he arrived in Salt Lake City, Beck was greeted by three of his four children and many grandchildren.

He was disappointed, he said, that he wasn't able to drive his own wagon in the parade of 80,000 people, but riding in it was a feeling he won't soon forget.

"He had tears in his eyes... either that or they were real bloodshot," Leonard Beck said. "He's never been one to let age stand in his way whether it be a cause or an issue or something like this."

Mattel Inc. in November will release a talking Barbie with a little computer — on a pink desk, of course — and real computer software that can be used to customize what she has to say.

A demonstration Thursday of the \$90 Talk With Me Barbie Doll started with Barbie quizzing her little chin to say, "I'm ready to sit at my computer."

"It's the first time any doll has personalized to this degree," executive producer Cynthia Wolf said.

Talking has gotten Barbie in trouble before. In 1992, Teen Talk Barbie was denounced by women's groups for uttering canned lines such as, "Math class is tough."

Talk With Me Barbie comes with a minicomputer on a desk, cables to connect to a home computer and a CD-ROM.

Barbie owners put the CD-ROM of their home computer,

and use it to choose conversation topics ranging from careers and dating to make-believe and playing house. They can also program in their name, birthday, hair and eye color and information about four of their friends, too.

Then the computer sends the information to Barbie's little PC. It, in turn, transmits the information by infrared beam to her gold necklace in much the same way a TV remote control works.

During the demonstration, Barbie talked about going on a date with Ken: "Help me pick out earrings... I like sparkly earrings when I'm dancing."

Talk With Me Barbie isn't the only new Barbie hitting store shelves. University Barbie is dressed in cheerleader outfits that correspond to the colors of 19 colleges.

Also new this year is a Dentist Barbie that says, "In 1996, sales of Barbies and Barbie accessories reached \$1.7 billion."

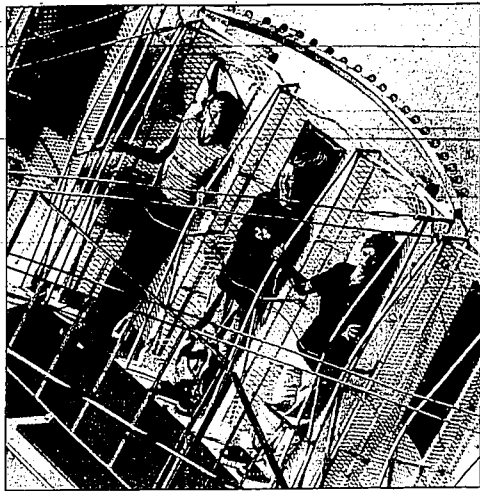

# ISU professor asks judge to order grant for research

BOISE (AP) — An Idaho State University professor asked a federal judge on Thursday to order the state Board of Education to approve a \$30,000 grant for researching the turn-of-the-century development of gay communities in the Northwest.

"The lawsuit was not commenting on the board until after it has seen it."

But Peter Boag claimed that in denying his grant request, board members ignored the criteria it applied in approving other

research grants because it feared the political fallout from a project involving homosexuality.

He maintained that violated his First Amendment constitutional right to freedom of expression and the board's constitutionally required to disburse public money without discriminating against individuals because of their viewpoints.

At the time of its \$3 decision in mid-April and in dealing with the controversy since then, the board has said it rejected Boag's grant

request over the recommendation of its Higher Education Research Council because the project had no commercial application.

The lawsuit was filed in U.S. District Court after the board declined to return to the American Civil Liberties Union request on Boag's behalf that it reconsider the decision.

In addition to asking for court-ordered approval of the grant, the suit seeks financial compensation and penalties against the board for the expenses and lost

opportunity Boag has suffered.

The ACLU, which is representing Boag, pointed out that commercial application was not a stated criteria for approval in the application guidelines and that the board has underwritten other projects very similar, if not identical, to Boag's except for the controversial subject matter.

Among the 15 grants approved at the time Boag's was denied were projects entitled "Marching as to War: Presbyterian Missions and the Origins of Amer-

ican Relations with Iran" and "Editing the Clarendon Edition of George Eliot's 'Adam Bede'."

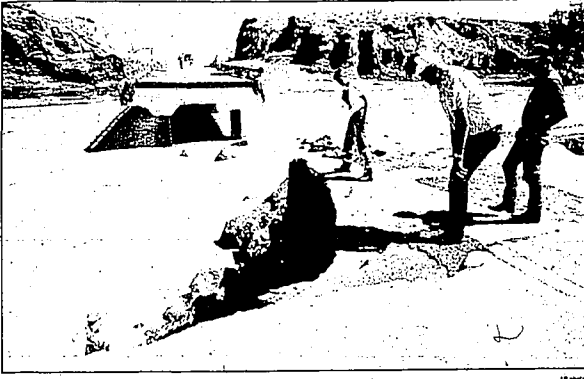
"This kind of intimidation on the part of public officials when exercising control over public funds stifles free speech in learning," said Jack Van Valkenburgh, ACLU director in Idaho. He called the suit the first of its kind.

The board action, Van Valkenburgh argued, also aggravates Idaho's image as a backward state full of white supremacists and other bigots.

Board members dissenting from the majority decision complained that grants for projects without obvious commercial applications had been approved in the past, and at one point former Executive Director Robert Barton was quoted as saying Boag's research was rejected because it was not

# Crackdown on illegal workers comes to an end after 205 arrests

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The area's biggest roundup of illegal immigrants in years ended with the last of 205 arrested people flying out of Twin Falls bound for Texas and, in most cases, the Mexican border.

While exhausted U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service agents prepared to head home this week, families separated from loved ones and businesses in the region are grappling with their losses.

The arrests have led a representative of potato packing plant owners to call for an overhaul of how immigrant workers are handled.

"It seems to me there is a better way to do it than arresting and detaining and throwing money down a rat hole," said Dave Smith, president of the Idaho Grower Shippers Association, an Idaho Falls-based trade association representing 58 potato packing companies.

Owners of potato plants, the target of most of this year's raids, are upset at losing workers while being left without a way to catch widespread forgeries of work documents, Smith said.

The increased raids come on the heels of Clinton administra-

tion calls for a crackdown on illegal workers and an Immigration and Naturalization Service budget that hits more than doubled since 1993. They have netted more than 400 workers in Idaho alone this year, most at raids at 17 eastern Idaho packing plants.

Instead of more raids or better ways to catch forgeries, Smith said lawmakers should come up with an easier way to legalize the workers needed at the potato sheds.

"Some way, somehow, we've got to find ways for these people to become legal," he said.

Complaints about the raids have reached Idaho's congressional delegation. U.S. Rep. Michael Crapo, R-Idaho, is investigating ways to deal with complaints about an inability to screen illegal workers, spokeswoman Susan Wheeler said. Smith said he is meeting with Crapo next Tuesday to discuss the matter.

Potato sheds could solve the problem by raising wages or using an existing program to recruit foreign workers, said Randolph Robinson, assistant director of investigators for the Immigration and Naturalization office in Helena, Mont. More legal workers could be attracted to higher-

paying jobs, leaving less room for illegal workers, he said.

Starting pay at many sheds hovers around \$5 an hour, shed owners say. But raising wages would not make up for a lack of workers willing to endure the noisy, strenuous work, Smith said. And he dismissed the government's foreign worker program as unworkable.

Robinson said the weeklong operation was a success and opened jobs for legal workers.

# Inmates start fire, destroy property

OROFINO (AP) — Six prisoners in the Idaho Correctional Institution at Orofino went on a rampage Thursday, destroying property and igniting fires in the closed-custody block.

The other inmates in the maximum-security block were evacuated and the six involved brought under control by the Special Operations Response Team. The entire prison was locked down, Correction Department spokesman Mark Carnopis said.

"At this time, things seem to be in control," Deputy Warden Dean Allen said. "The ones who caused it have been subdued."

An investigation is under way into the cause of the disturbance.

There are 32 inmates in a tier, 96 in the A-Block of Unit 2. In the early afternoon, six inmates in one tier were outside in the open area of the block.

"They began starting fires, set the TV on fire and mattresses and other flammable things," Carnopis said. "It didn't spread beyond those six, because everyone else was in their cells and these cells were locked."

Other prisoners broke windows because of the heavy smoke. Those 90 inmates were evacuated to the prison yard. Clearwater County sheriff's deputies and guards were posted on the perimeter for security and local fire departments were on stand-by, Allen said.

One inmate was injured in the chest, apparently not seriously, and was being checked by medical personnel, Carnopis said.

Fans were brought in the block to air out the building, Allen said.

# Kamiah residents protest propane tank placement near school

KAMIAH (AP) — A new 30,000-gallon propane tank installed at the recently completed Kamiah Middle School continues to generate far more heat than the school board expected.

At three public meetings, residents angry that the tank was put only 10 feet from busy Idaho Highway 162 urged local governing officials to do something to eliminate the risk of explosion.

"If that tank was to blow up you would have at least a quarter of a mile fireball," John Peletek said Wednesday. "Can you evacuate this town in 10 minutes? If not, that tank shouldn't be there."

Mayor Howard Daugherty told about 50 people that the Kamiah School Board already has indicated it is willing to negotiate moving the tank. Trustees will meet next Tuesday to discuss the issue.

# Jury clears Pocatello man in stabbing

POCATELLO (AP) — A Bannock County jury quickly acquitted a man of aggravated assault and a weapons charge as the presiding judge condemned the investigation in the case.

Abel Flores, 37, of Pocatello, was accused of stabbing Joyce Whitomy, 34, on Oct. 26, 1996. The jury spent less than an hour deliberating Wednesday before acquitting him.

The state's case against Flores fell apart when the jury learned the alleged weapon, a knife blade found behind a Pocatello bar, was not tested to confirm that a rust-colored substance on it was blood.

"This is sloppy work," presiding Judge Peter D. McDermott said in the presence of the jury.

He also agreed with public defender Jack Ross that there was a problem in that one officer listed as handling evidence was not mentioned anywhere as part of the investigation.

State witness Robin Denson admitted she lied to police about what happened that night because she was afraid of Flores and did not trust authorities to protect her.

## Turn a potato into art Saturday in City Park

**TWIN FALLS** — A spud may only be a spud to the untrained eye, but to the trained a spud can be anything a person wants it to be.

Even a piece of art. Those folks, and anyone else who's curious, are invited to the first annual spud art contest Saturday at Twin Falls City Park in conjunction with Art in the Park.

Dee Burgess, co-owner of Elmer's and a member of the Magic Valley Restaurant Association, thinks this event could be a good thing for Idaho, and a lot of fun. "This could be a big thing in Idaho, with the artistic ability in our area it could be very big," Burgess said.

There will be two categories of potato art with three different age groups for each category: potato carving and mashed potato sculpture.

All spud carvings must be delivered to the park by 10:30 a.m. Potato sculpture entrants are limited to two gallons of mashed potatoes and the application of potatoes must be completed at the park between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m.

### The rules

- Potato carving must be done at home and delivered to City Park between 9 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.
- Potato sculpture entrants are limited to two gallons of mashed potatoes and must finish their sculpture at the park.
- Support connectors and braces can be made beforehand but must not be visible on the surface.
- Sculptures must be completed at the park between the hours of 10 a.m. and 1 p.m.

A prize of \$75 will be awarded to best of the show, \$50 to best mashed potato sculpture, \$50 for the best carving, and \$10 to a first, second, and third place in each category. Prizes will be given in dinner coupon value. A stuffed potato doll will also be given in each category as well as Idaho pins.

The only rule for both categories is that supports and braces must not be seen from the outside.

"The rules are as minimal as possible so that everyone can be creative as possible," Burgess said.

"I think it's going to be tremendously

fun," she said. "How could it not? How often do you get to carve something as unique as a potato?"

Trish Borrsen, project coordinator for the Magic Valley Arts Council, says the day is for both adults and children.

"Come have fun," Borrsen said. "Let the little kid out. Both children and adults are welcome. Children have a lot of creativity, let them loose and let the child inside come out."

The Magic Valley Arts Council together with the Magic Valley Restaurant Association is sponsoring this event.

"We'd like to promote Idaho and the potato industry," Burgess said. "It's a large part of the business industry and it's one of those crops that you either make money on or go broke."

This will be the first potato art event in Idaho.

"There aren't any art events in the state of Idaho that use potatoes as a focal point," Burgess said. "We decided that we should do something to promote the Idaho potato, partly because prices have fluctuated so drastically in the past year."

• "Jungle 2 Jungle" (PG) — Tim Allen's comedy is divided between hilarious-stupid and monotomous-stupid. Self-absorbed businessman Allen travels to an Amazon jungle to finalize a divorce from the wife he hasn't seen for 14 years; the wife tells him he has a 13-year-old son who wants to visit dad's Manhattan "jungle." But uproariousness ensues only intermittently when man and boy arrive in New York. One running joke involves Allen's attempts to pick-off houseflies with a blow gun;

another involves American grown-ups' crazed reactions to a pet tarantula. Both Allen and Martin Short (who plays his business partner) provoke major guffaws in several scenes. But these moments come so quickly; the bland ones drag on too long. Contains bathroom humor.

• "Albino Alligator" (R) — Character actor Kevin Spacey's directorial debut is nothing but characters — eight of them — trapped in a bar "No Exit" style. The plot is more convenient than prophetic — three bungling robbers trying to make a getaway stumble into a

sparsely populated after-hours bar and are quickly trapped there by the police, leading to the inevitable hostage crisis. Spacey and writer Christian Forte don't get for action entertainment so much as talk detente. The criminal element is well portrayed by morally ambivalent Matt Dillon, world weary Gary Sinise and coolly hardened William Fichtner; there are genuine tensions as they seek escape at the expense of their hostages (Faye Dunaway, M. Emmet Walsh, Skeet Ulrich, John Spencer and Viggo Mortensen).

• "Angel Baby" (Unrated) — This

movie means its title earnestly; it's about a couple who believe they are going to have an angel for a baby. Also, they are clinically mentally ill, and when in the interests of sound medical practice they refrain from taking their stabilizing pharmaceuticals, they essentially doom themselves. Both John Lynch and Jacqueline McKenzie are effective in the Aussie kitchen sink drama but the thing is so overwrought it exiles rather than absorbs you. It's Australia for "bad." Contains graphic sexuality and gory emergency room scenes.

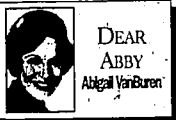

# Who put the pomp in the pomp-pomp-pomputus?

## Barry's latest covers long list of bad songs

In his new book, Dave Barry speaks of the pomputus of bad songwriting. Specifically, those songs that burrow into your mind and can never be removed, even with explosives.

You know, Jimmy Webb's "MacArthur Park" ("someone left the cake out in the rain"), The Ohio Express' "Yummy Yummy," Paul Anka's "You're Having My Baby," "Timothy," a song about cannibalism, by the Buoyis.

Readers of Barry's syndicated column, in fact, voted these four songs as the worst of all time.

"Although there are many songs that I hate more than MacArthur Park," he writes, "it's hard to argue with the survey respondents who chose it as the worst. All the elements are there: A long song with pretentiously incomprehensible lyrics that was

popular enough to get a huge amount of airplay and thus was hammered deeply and permanently into everybody's brain."

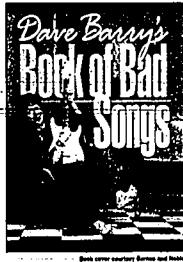
But many, many songs fit that description, as Barry found out when he started writing about the subject in 1992.

More than 10,000 responses later ("I think more people voted in the presidential election," he writes), he had the material for "Dave Barry's Book of Bad Songs" (\$12.95, Andrews McMeel).

Barry doesn't know everything about pop songs, of course. He can't, for example, name three songs about men having relations with inflatable love dolls ("Be My Girl ... Sally," by the Police, "Ms. Pinky" by Frank Zappa, "In Every Dream Home a Heartache" by Roy Music).

But as a conduit for making fun of popular songs, there's no one better suited than Dave Barry, who can tell you in great detail about the duo Patience & Prudence's songs like "Open Up Your Heart and Let the Sun Shine In."

"They had another hit," he said. He sings: "I know you

belong to someone new but tonight you belong to me." So Patience & Prudence turned out to be slits after that. Unless they were singing to each other, in which case they turned out to be lesbian slits. I don't know.

In a telephone interview from his office in Miami, Barry talked about his book and the bad songs within. He promised this would be his first and only volume about bad songs.

"God, no," he said, "no Greatest Hits Vol. 2."

Q. Everything else being equal, would you expunge bad songs from the public consciousness, like so much Russian history, if you could?

A. I don't think it's possible to do that. You'd really have to give everybody a major lobotomy because obviously the brain devotes most of its available memory to that very issue of the bad song. We'd reduce to the level of state legislators, in the brain department, if we tried to expunge all that.

Q. You point out that bad songs ask a lot of questions. I'm wondering if you have any answers. Specifically, why do birds suddenly appear every time you are near?

A. "Suddenly" is what I like about that. They don't just appear. In my life, birds come flying in. You can see them from a distance. But they "suddenly" appear in that song. I'm assuming that's because we needed the

extra beats there. But I don't want birds or any other wildlife appearing suddenly in my life. I want them to announce their arrival.

Q. Do you like pina colodas and getting caught in the rain?  
A. My idea of fun is standing out with a tropical drink in the rain. If you've got to get caught in the rain, you might as well have a pina coloda, is my feeling. But as a rule, no, I don't like either one of those that much.

The thing about pina colodas is, they have an enormous fat content. So I picture these really bloated people out in the rain. Really drunk, fat people.

Q. Did you find out who put the bomb in the pomp bombom bombom?

A. Yeah, that was put in there by the Department of Energy. It cost millions and millions of dollars and it still doesn't work.

Q. What will you say if Jimmy Webb calls?

A. Based on the lyrics to "MacArthur Park," I don't know

that Jimmy Webb can operate a telephone.

Q. "Timothy" — the cannibal song — you knew this song?  
A. Yeah. The funny thing about that, it was not a huge hit. (It reached No. 17 in 1971.) It's just one of those songs that you hear it and your jaw drops.

The Buoyis, who recorded "Timothy" — and nothing else — later claimed that Timothy was a mule. That's true. At first, I guess they thought that was a cool idea for a song. But it was so startling that I think they realized they were going to be known forever as the band that sang the song about two guys who ate a mule?

Q. They should have claimed that Timothy was a chicken.  
A. Or a bird who suddenly appeared.

# Romance writer apologizes for plagiarizing young rival's work

Heaving bosoms and throbbing loins are all very well, but if you really want to make a romance writer breathe heavily, try pinching her prose.

Janet Dailey, who has sold more books than any other woman in the United States, begged forgiveness Tuesday for plagiarizing from a younger rival, Nora Roberts.

At least for the moment, Roberts wasn't accepting it. "I am continuing to evaluate my options," she said, including a lawsuit. "I would sympathize with any problems she may have, but plagiarism under any circumstances is a line that cannot be crossed."

By Dailey's own admission, she has big problems. In a statement, she said her "essentially random and non-pervasive acts of copying" were attributable to a psychological problem that she never even suspected she had. She has already begun treatment for the disorder and has been assured that, with treatment, this behavior can be prevented in the future.

Roberts, who learned about the plagiarism from an online discussion of the books' similarities, certainly intends to do just that. From Florida, where Wednesday she will be attending the Romance Writers of America convention, she wondered about Dailey's use of the word "non-pervasive."

"I don't know what that means in this case," said Roberts, who lives in Western Maryland. "It seems pervasive to me."

Dailey, 53, who lives in Branson, Mo., acknowledged that two of her 90-plus books, "Aspen Gold" and "Notorious," contained passages and ideas copied from Roberts' work. Her statement said the plagiarism occurred in the early '90s when she was under great professional and personal stress, including her husband's lung cancer and the loss of two brothers to cancer.

Sanford Brokaw, a Los Angeles publicist for Dailey, said there were other factors, too. "They had a dog that was 13 years old that died," he said.

"Brokaw said that a settlement had been reached involving a contribution by Dailey to the Literary Veterans of America.

"It's not settled," countered Roberts. "And this wasn't just a matter of the early '90s, since an upcoming manuscript was also copied, and it's now the late '90s."

Brokaw confirmed that "there was a third book, but we're stopping that." He didn't know the title.

"Notorious," published by HarperCollins last year, stars Eden Rossiter, who beats a murder charge and then must save the family ranch — with the help of an ex-otop star whose sleepy look almost conceals his cold, hard blue-eyed gaze. Roberts said HarperCollins has agreed not to accept further orders for the book. No one at the publisher could be reached for comment late Tuesday.

Meanwhile, Roberts was planning to look through all of Dailey's recent books before she accepted any apology. "There's

a pattern here," she said.

In her statement, Dailey said, "I can only apologize to Nora, whom I've considered a friend."

Responded Roberts: "I considered her a friend. I do not consider her a friend at this time."

Dailey's first novel appeared in 1976 from Harlequin; she eventually wrote more than 50 novels for that firm alone. Her total sales, according to one of her more recent publishers, are about 300 million worldwide. She once identified her audience as "like me. They are work-oriented women who are under a great deal of stress. They are very involved ... and they need an escape."

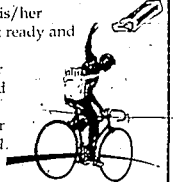

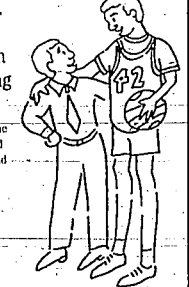

# Pop culture picks up and moves out of Seattle

SEATTLE (AP) — It happened slowly, almost imperceptibly. First record sales leveled off. Then the bands began to come apart.

Some of the nightclubs were disappearing, and before long the city that launched one of the most influential musical movements since the 1960s British Invasion had become just another footnote in pop culture history. Grunge, the minimalist rock that reinvigorated the industry in the early 1990s, was dead.

"It had to happen. Of course it had to happen," says Jonathan Peneman—the co-founder of Sub Pop Records, which introduced Nirvana, Soundgarden and several other bands.

"If you're going to be blessed with good times in this business, the not-so-good times are right behind them."

But Peneman, who rose from record-store clerk to the man in charge of one of the country's most influential music labels, harbors no resentment.

"That's what keeps indie (independent) music vital. It's the idea that this is not somebody's fiefdom. Nobody has a guaranteed lock on the public's ear. It's about the outsiders wanting in."

Peneman and partner Bruce Pavitt were responsible for creating Sub Pop's original stripped-down sound. Then they instituted a highly successful marketing plan that included importing foreign journalists who quickly declared the Emerald City "the next Liverpool."

The company's low-key breakthrough came with Mudhoney's 1988 release, "Touch Me I'm Sick," which many consider the first grunge record.

Then Nirvana, a group of post-punk disciples from Washington state's rural southwest coast, transformed the musical landscape.

Sub Pop released their debut

album, "Bleach," in 1989. Their smash "Nevermind" came two years later.  
Kurt Cobain's tortured lyrics and Nirvana's merciless riffs tore to shreds the bloated heavy-metal and pop scene of the '80s.  
Pearl Jam released the multi-platinum "Ten" on Epic Records in 1991. Soundgarden followed with "Badmotorfinger." Then

came hits from Alice In Chains, Hole and the Screaming Trees. The Seattle music scene reigned supreme.  
It provided the backdrop for the hit movie "Singles," Cameron Crowe's homage to slacker love. The trademark flannel shirts, knit caps and torn jeans found their way to New York's high-fashion runways. Goatees and body piercings seemed ubiquitous.  
"It was such a strange time," says Barrett Martin, drummer for the now-defunct Screaming Trees. The beginning of the end came on a drizzly April day in 1994, when Cobain's body was found at his Seattle home. The 27-year-old father's shotgun suicide came shortly after "In Utero" hit

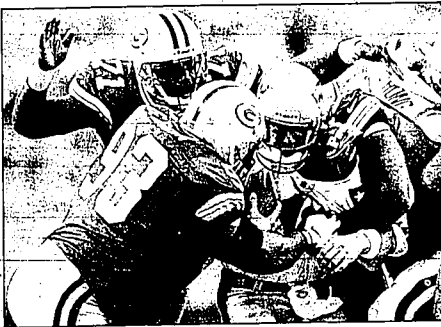
GREEN BAY, Wis. — The Green Bay Packers might be regretting their divorce with Chris Jacke.  
Rookie kicker Brett Conway missed three field goals in Thursday night's 7-3 victory over the New England Patriots, giving him four straight misses over six days.

The Packers, who declined to try a 40-yarder with 20 seconds left, bid under-par to Jacke, an unrestricted free agent, when they picked Conway out of Penn State, in the third round of the NFL draft.

In eight mostly productive seasons, Jacke scored 820 points for the Packers — three shy of the team record held by Don Hutson — including 114 field goals last season.

Jacke, a fan favorite in Green Bay, signed with Pittsburgh earlier this month and kicked three field goals in

# McGwire sent to St. Louis; Mariners get help

The rumors became reality Thursday night when the Oakland Athletics sent Mark McGwire to the St. Louis Cardinals for three pitchers.

McGwire, 33, led the majors last season with 52 homers, and has honored with more frequency than any player in history other than Babe Ruth. The deal will reunite McGwire with Cardinals manager Tony La Russa, who was with the A's from 1986-95.

"It's not an easy decision to make, but I think you come to a crossroads in your life, where change is good," McGwire said.  
McGwire has hit his 363 career homers in 4,448 at-bats or in only 12,225 at-bats. Ruth averaged a home run every 11.76 at-bats.

In return for McGwire, the A's got right-handed pitchers T.J. Mathews, Eric Ludwig and Blake Stein.

Three other prominent deals were completed Thursday.  
San Francisco got pitchers Wilson Alvarez, Roberto Hernandez and Danny Darwin from the Chicago White Sox for six minor leaguers.

The Cleveland Indians helped their ailing starting pitching by acquiring left-hander John Smiley from Cincinnati in a six-player deal and getting right-hander

Jeff Juden from Montreal for rookie left-hander Steve Kline in a deal announced after the midnight EDT deadline.

And the Seattle Mariners finally got some help for their struggling bullpen. They traded promising outfielder Jose Cruz Jr. to the Toronto Blue Jays for closer Mike Timlin and set-up man Paul Spoljoric, and dealt catcher Jason Varitek and pitcher Derek Lowe to Boston for Heathcliff Slocumb. The second round swap was announced a half-hour after the trading deadline.

In a minor deal, the Baltimore Orioles sent pitcher Mike Johnson to Montreal Expos for a player to be named.

Teams can still make players to their rosters for them to be eligible for the postseason. Last year, the New York Yankees got reliever Graeme Lloyd and third baseman Charlie Hayes with late August deals.

For the rest of the season, teams are required to place a player on waivers before they can trade them, giving other clubs an opportunity to proposed deals.

Seattle was reluctant to trade the 23-year-old Cruz, but manager Lou Finella had been begging general manager Woody Woodward for some quality relief help, and the Mariners pulled the

# Rangers sign 'Pudge' to 5-year deal

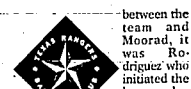
ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The Texas Rangers and catcher Ivan 'Pudge' Rodriguez agreed Thursday to a \$42 million, five-year contract extension that will keep the six-time All-Star with the team through at least 2002.

The agreement came as Rodriguez's days with the Rangers appeared to be numbered, either through a trade before the midnight EDT deadline or through free agency after this season.

The two sides split the difference between the \$38 million offer he rejected last week and the \$45 million his attorney, Jeff Moard, said Rodriguez wanted.

The five-year, \$42 million deal includes salaries of \$6 million in 1998, \$8 million in 1999, 2000 and 2001, and \$9 million in 2002. Rodriguez also gets a \$1 million signing bonus and a \$2 million severance payment when his term — with the Rangers ends, but in 2002 or if it is traded.

After months of unsuccessful negotiations and posturing



between the team and Moard, it was Rodriguez who initiated the talks through.

Without telling his attorney, Rodriguez walked into Moard's office at 9 a.m. Thursday.

"He said he wanted to be a Texas Ranger his whole career and he wanted to see if he could work out a deal," Schieffer said. "That really meant a lot to me, and I think it meant a lot to this franchise."

Moard said Rodriguez's desire to remain in Texas overrode the temptation of potential free agency after this season.

"We always believed the Rangers were entitled to a Texas discount," Moard said. "For all the riches that were laid out in the free agent marketplace, we feel that in the end, Pudge's career interests are best served

by him continuing his career in Texas."

Barring Thursday's deal, the Rangers had little choice but to trade Rodriguez if they hoped to get anything more than a draft pick for him after the season.

The New York Yankees and Baltimore Orioles were among the teams reported to be interested in trading for Rodriguez.

Rodriguez, 25, was the third youngest player promoted to the major leagues in club history when Texas brought him up from Double-A Tulsa on June 10, 1991.

Rodriguez is a career 291-hitter with 79 home runs and 387 RBIs. He had drawn out an average of 44 percent of base runners, but he had stolen 11 bases above the major league average — entering this season.

Last year, Rodriguez hit 47 doubles, 44 while he was a catcher, setting a major league record for the position.

Rodriguez is batting .332 with 11 home runs and 47 RBIs this season.

# Giants get 3 pitchers for 6 minor leaguers

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The San Francisco Giants, desperate for experienced pitching in their lead has shrunk in the NL West, acquired starters Wilson Alvarez and Danny Darwin and reliever Roberto Hernandez from the Chicago White Sox for six minor leaguers Thursday.

For the three pitchers, who have 34 years of major league experience among them, San Francisco sent the White Sox four pitchers, an infielder and an outfielder.

"I absolutely send the message to our organization that we're committed to winning a championship this year," San Francisco general manager Brian Sabean said. "You only get so many opportunities like we have this season, and we're determined to make the most of it."

The White Sox obtained right-handed pitchers Lorenzo Barcelo, Keith Foulke and Bobby Hoyle and left-hander Ken Viny, as well as shortstop Michael Caruso and outfielder Brian Manning.

Foulke, who had two brief stints with the Giants this season, is the only one of the six players with major league experience.

"We're extremely excited to get six players of this caliber," White Sox general manager Ron Schuler said. "We still believe we can win in 1997, but we were burned last year by the Alex Fernandez situation and we couldn't allow it to happen again."

Fernandez, a top White Sox starter for several seasons, left Chicago in the offseason and signed with the Florida Marlins. With starters Osvaldo

Fernandez and Pat Rapp on the disabled list, San Francisco has struggled in recent weeks to put together a starting rotation and the Giants' bullpen has been overworked.

Fernandez is out for the season following elbow surgery. Rapp, acquired from the Florida Marlins earlier this month, made his one start for the Giants before being sidelined with a strained rib cage muscle.

Rapp was obtained after the Giants sent the ineffective William Van Landingham, a member of the starting rotation for the past three seasons, to the minor leagues.

San Francisco, which had a six game lead in the NL West at the All-Star break, began Thursday with a half-game lead over the Los Angeles Dodgers.

The White Sox went into the day a 1/2 game behind Cleveland in the AL Central. It was the second big trade of the week for Chicago — it sent designated hitter Harold Baines to Baltimore on Tuesday for a player to be named.

Alvarez, 27, and Hernandez, 32, both are eligible to become free agents following this season's career record with a 3.79 ERA. He was 9-8 this year with 110 strikeouts in 22 starts and ranked fifth in the AL with a 4.03 ERA.

The left-handed Alvarez pitched as a no-hitter in 1991 against Baltimore and pitched in the 1994 All-Star game.

# Irvan shakes off emotions to win pole

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Ernie Irvan kept his emotions bottled up and his focus on the racetrack Thursday as he won the pole for the Brickyard 400.

Irvan, whose mother suffered respiratory failure and is in a hospital in Concord, N.C., somehow kept his mind on business long enough to set a qualifying record of 177.736 mph in his Robert Yates Racing Ford Thunderbird.

"Obviously, it's real tough," said Irvan, who himself came back from near-fatal injuries in 1994 to resume his racing career. "There's nothing I can do at the hospital right now except to sit. I've been there for the last three days and there's not much we can do. The Good Lord has blessed me and hopefully is blessing the other drivers."

Adding to the emotional stress on Irvan is the fact that he is job hunting for the next season. Team owner Yates recently informed the driver that his contract will not be renewed.

It was the 18th career pole for Irvan, who became the 13th different Winston Cup pole winner this season.

Darrell Waltrip, who has struggled to be competitive all season and has been forced several times to use the former series champion's provisional to make race fields, set the early target with a lap of 176.866 mph.

That broke the track qualifying mark of 176.419 set last year by Jeff Gordon.

The 35-year-old Waltrip, a three-time Winston Cup champion, brought a big cheer from the crowd when he did a joyful dance after climbing out of his Chevrolet. Asked by a track broadcast announcer how he felt, the loquacious Waltrip bellowed,

"I am just riddled to death." Irvan's teammate, Dale Jarrett, the defending Brickyard champion, knocked Waltrip from the pole with a lap of 177.494. Irvan then bumped his teammate's pole to the second spot.

Late in the session that saw 51 cars make qualifying attempts, Joe Nemechek, recently dubbed "Front Row Joe," knocked Jarrett and Irvan from row with a lap of 177.550. It is his fourth front-row start in six races, including two poles.

Gordon, who won the inaugural Brickyard race in 1994 and started from the pole the past two years, wound up a disappointing 24th at 175.156, although that was good enough to assure him a starting spot. The top 25 qualifiers were locked in Thursday.

"It looks like the track caught a lot of guys off guard, and it caught us off guard. We're going to pay the price for it," said Gordon, who has seven wins this season and leads the Winston Cup standings.

Reminded that Jarrett won this race after starting 24th last year, Gordon said, "I do feel good about this car once we get it into a race pace. We came here to win this race, but we will take the best finish we can possibly get."

Dale Earnhardt, who won the 1995 Brickyard but is riding a 45-race winless streak, was a solid fourth at 176.536. He was followed by teammate Mike Skinner, who came back from a crash in practice the previous day to post a 176.415. Skinner, the leading candidate for rookie of the year in last year's Brickyard after relieving the injured seven-time series champion early in the race.

# Robinson cleared in Grambling probe

GRAMBLING, La. (AP) — The NCAA cleared Grambling football coach Eddie Robinson of any violations, but placed the university on two years' probation for minor infractions by his son and the play of two academically ineligible basketball players.

Thursday's announcement came as Robinson — the winningest coach in college football with 405 victories — prepared for his final season at the school.

After the long investigation into numerous allegations of impropriety, Grambling president Raymond Hicks clearly was relieved that the NCAA didn't impose stiffer sanctions, such as a postseason ban or a loss of scholarships.

"Today we probably look like a rose and smell like a rose, but without putting anybody through the investigation, we had some harsh experiences," he said.

"You go through a painful experience when people question your integrity and your intentions. I said from the beginning that we have made some technical mistakes. I don't think anybody was trying to put the university in a position where we were trying to cheat to get a competitive advantage."

The football violations included improper recruiting contacts with prospective transfer athletes and out-of-season practices. The NCAA said all of these resulted from ignorance of the rules rather than a willful disobedience of them.

"I'm happy to get it behind us, and we'll live with the NCAA's decision," said Eddie Robinson Jr., the quarterback and receivers coach who was cited for most of the football infractions. "I've always felt the NCAA dealt fairly with me from the start."

Hicks said Eddie Robinson Jr. didn't realize that certain actions by a coach, like simply watching a pickup game or practicing by the offseason, violated NCAA rules.

The 78-year-old Robinson had agreed to retire after this season following an effort to force him out last winter.

a move unrelated to the NCAA investigation. He has won eight Black College Championships and 17 Southwestern Athletic Conference titles — or co-championships in 56 years as Grambling's coach, but had two consecutive losing seasons for the first time the past two years.

In women's basketball, the NCAA said Grambling improperly allowed a student-athlete to practice and receive financial aid during the 1993-94 and 1995-96 seasons after her ACT test score had been invalidated.

The men's basketball program also was cited for allowing a student to play in five games in 1993 while he was ineligible. The student didn't complete required classes during the previous year, and the NCAA said Grambling was cited for failing to educate its football coaching staff on NCAA rules governing out-of-season practices and try-outs.

In addition to probation, the women's basketball team must forfeit games in which the ineligible athlete played in the 1993-94 and 1995-96 seasons.

Football coaches must cut the number of visits to recruits in 1997-98, and must get on-campus education about NCAA rules from the school's compliance officer.

The school must also develop a "comprehensive athletics compliance education program" with annual reports to the NCAA during the probation period.

# Injury snags another Bronco defensive player

GREELEY, Colo. (AP) — The Denver Broncos defense had another setback Thursday when Jumpy Geathers, a cornerback, aggravated his Achilles tendon during a routine pass-rushing drill.

For the 36-year-old Geathers, the injury was the end of his season and possibly his career. "I won't be back this year and I don't think he would come back and ever play again," Broncos coach Mike Shanahan said. "At his age, it is very tough to come back."

But Geathers was more optimistic. "They have already put me away like a funeral after a crash, but I think I can play again," Geathers said. "They've counted me out a lot of times. I've always had the last say so."

The Broncos scheduled Geathers to have an MRI to determine the extent of the damage, followed by surgery and a lengthy rehabilitation period.

Geathers is the second defensive player who suffered a significant injury during training camp. Starting cornerback Tyrone James was sidelined for the season after injuring his knee in last week's exhibition game.

There also are other nagging injuries on defense.

Cornerback Ray Crockett and safety Tyrone Braxton, who have hamstring injuries, were unable to practice Thursday. Safety Steve Atwater's knee injury has flared up, which means he is questionable for Monday's game against Miami in Mexico City.

And defensive end Neil Smith, who was signed in the

offseason from Kansas City, has been experiencing some discomfort in a knee he injured during the first week of training camp.

The Broncos made it through most of the regular season last year without putting anybody on the injured list. In the final game, quarterback Bill Musgrave injured a shoulder.

The 6-foot-7, 300-pound Geathers, who is in his 14th NFL season, was acquired by the Broncos as a free agent from Atlanta.

Shanahan will look to veteran Maa Tanuvasa, and 1997 first-round draft choice Trevor Pryor, among others to replace Geathers. He ruled out trying to get former Kansas City lineman Dan Saleaua.

"If he jumps out of Kansas City, I would be interested in him here," Shanahan said. "To bring in a guy for \$1.7 million, you might have to cut five players."

Geathers' plans include going to Hawaii after surgery, going through rehab and getting ready for next season.

"If it doesn't work out here I'll get another try somewhere else," he said. "Show me somebody else my age that can do what I do."

# Barkley jury begins fight deliberations

CLEVELAND (AP) — A fight involving Charles Barkley that lasted about 10 seconds kept a jury deliberating for three hours Thursday without reaching a verdict.

The eight jurors told the judge they would return today to decide whether to award damages to Job Tyler, who is suing the NBA star for \$550,000.

"Just because you don't like somebody doesn't mean you have the authority to beat the hell out of him," lawyer Timothy Ita said in his closing argument.

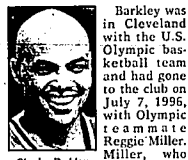
Barkley's lawyer said Tyler deserves no compensation and argued that the Houston Rockets forward was the victim.

"This case is about fame and fortune," Larry Peskin said. "Charles Barkley has it. Job Tyler wants it."

Tyler, a 24-year-old business equipment salesman from Spencerport, N.Y., testified that he was acting as a peacemaker between a friend and Barkley, who had gotten into an argument over a woman at the club.

Barkley testified that he pushed Tyler because he was a "drunk redneck" who was threatening him.

"All hell broke loose, you understand that?" Barkley said. "I was swinging at him, then they dragged us away. That's it."

Both sides agree the fight started when Tyler's friend, 27-year-old David DiGiaccio, asked a woman if she was sleeping with Miller.

No criminal charges were filed. During his testimony, Barkley criticized rednecks, lawyers and knuckledrums that can be found in bars and in the NBA. He smiled and shook his head during Ita's closing argument and laughed out loud when the lawyer described traveling with the U.S. Olympic team as a vacation.

The jury was told Barkley makes at least \$5 million a year. "Do I think I should give him \$550,000?" Barkley asked the plaintiff lawyer. "No, I think frivolous lawsuits — what you do for a living — are a scam. You're wasting people's time."

# Drugs at Albert's name found in slain dominatrix's black book

NEW YORK (AP) — The "Marv Albert" phone number listed in the address book of a dominatrix slain in her apartment last week was an out-of-state number belonging to the NBC sportscaster, a police source told The Associated Press on Thursday.

The source said, however, that Albert, 58, had been linked in any way to the killing of Nadia Frey.

The 58-year-old woman was found Saturday in her apartment

on Manhattan's Upper West Side. She had been shot four times. Police said there was no sign of a break-in.

It is not clear whether the outdated number was for Albert's home or office.

Albert, 58, was indicted May 9 in Virginia on one count of Albert's sodomy and one count of assault and battery after a woman acquaintance claimed he bit her and forced her to perform oral sex on him.

# Welch pleads no contest to domestic violence

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Former Olympics organizer Tom Welch pleaded no contest Thursday to a charge of domestic violence after a week of denying that he ever abused his wife. He said he took the action to help his family "find balance in which we can deal with each other."

Welch, who went a decade bringing the 2002 Winter Games to Salt Lake City, still contends he never roughed up his wife during a July 9 argument over her relationship with another man. A Salt Lake City lawyer said the plea was aimed at quickly resolving the case.

Alma Welch, who stands by everything she told the police, said she was "very pleased" with her husband's plea.

"This will offer the relief that our family needs and deserves," she said. The couple are parents of six children.

Welch to a year's probation that includes mandatory family counseling. The misdemeanor charge will be withdrawn and the case dismissed if he successfully completes probation.

A no-contest plea is a decision by the accused not to fight the charge and carries the same consequences as a guilty plea. Welch had been scheduled for arraignment Aug. 28.

Welch said his focus now would turn to his family.

Tom Welch, a 52-year-old former Mormon church bishop, resigned as president and chief executive officer of the Salt Lake Olympic Organizing Committee.

The next day, the committee's executive board recommended he receive a \$2 million

compensation package. Alma Welch told investigators that her 11-year-old son "saved her life" by calling police after the couple grappled in the garage of their home. The scuffle, which left her bruised, came during an argument in which she tried to get at gifts and letters involving the unidentified other woman.

Welch was on an African safari with another son when the charges were filed. He cut short the trip, returning home to find his professional and private lives in shambles.

At a news conference last Friday, he said his relationship with the other woman was platonic. On Monday night, he and Olympic organizers cut a deal in which he would resign and receive a consulting job as well as his compensation package, sources said.

Alma Welch said her husband told her of his decision to enter the plea during a brief conversation Wednesday.

Tom Welch's lawyer said his client will participate in family counseling to better enable him to assist his family, particularly his children, through this traumatic episode in their lives.

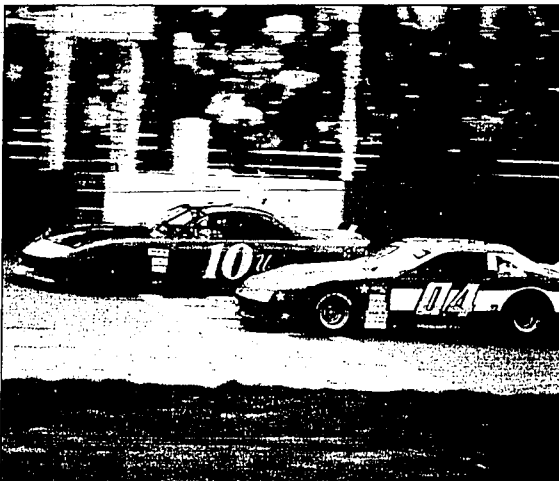

## MECHANICS' CORNER

The 20th in a series of tips from crew members at Bahari Racing's Ponzoni-sponsored team and driver Johnny Bonson: "For closing a fogged windshield, dry air is better than moist. That's why most cars

engage the air-conditioning compressor automatically whenever 'do-fog' or 'defrost' is selected. But some imports leave it to the driver to activate the compressor. It's especially important when the outside temperature is between 35 and 50 degrees Fahrenheit."

Survey: Consumers pay almost \$30 a year more at large banks

WASHINGTON — Consumers pay almost \$30 a year more on average for checking accounts at big banks than at small ones, says a private group critical of a trend toward big bank mergers.

The U.S. Public Interest Research Group, which released a survey of bank charges Thursday, blamed the disparity on the industry's consolidation movement.

"Merger mania is making the fee-gouging banks even bigger," said Ed Mierzwinski, PIRG's consumer program director. "Fewer and bigger banks means consumers face fewer choices, less competition and even higher fees."

As a result of rising fees, the consumer group said, more than 12 million American families can't afford to maintain bank accounts, and many others pay too much.

With bank profits rising strongly, the survey added fuel to already vigorous criticism of bank fees by lawmakers, other consumer groups and smaller banks.

"It's a no big shock to us," said Robert Forbus, a spokesman for the Independent Bankers Association of America. He said the survey's finding of a "hand-in-glove" with recent reports by the small banks' group and government

An official of a group dominated by large banks said the comparison is unfair.

"With more than 40,000 financial institutions competing for customers, today's consumer is in a 'buyers' market' for bank services," said Donald Ogilvie,

executive vice president of the American Bankers Association. "No bank could overprice its services and remain viable."

The PIRG survey, Ogilvie maintained, assumed that a typical bank customer bounces checks, deposits bad checks and pays bills late, so that he or she cannot be charged higher fees.

The survey, which covered 419 banks in 29 states and the District of Columbia, found that consumers annually pay an average \$27.94 more to maintain a regular checking account at big banks, an average \$218.27, than at small ones, \$18.73. That compared with a 1995 difference of \$17.76 between \$211.74 for big banks and \$193.98 for small ones.

The average cost of a checking account at a credit union was found to be \$10.08.

Among banks surveyed, the lowest-cost states were found to be, in descending order, Montana, Iowa, New Mexico, Vermont and Colorado.

The highest-cost states were New Jersey, Illinois, Louisiana, Florida and North Carolina. Consumers in New Jersey are able to get low-cost, "no-frills" checking accounts, however.

# New Lockheed chief well-suited for leading corporate giant

As a young man, Vance D. Coffman would get up before dawn on winter mornings, mount the horse he bought for \$150 in chore money and ride along the creek on his family's farm, checking muskrat traps. It's tempting to write about the stars in the cold to his sky above him, and how those would one day draw the young man to the top of American industry. But Coffman himself would never put it that way.

Coffman, 53, is an unpretentious space engineer who doesn't like to tell personal stories, write books or coin aphorisms. His burden is that he takes over as chief executive of Lockheed Martin Corp. today from a man who does.

Lockheed Martin's broad industrial interest include being the primary contractor at the Idaho Engineering and Environmental Laboratory.

Norman R. Augustine is a celebrity CEO — adviser to presidents, symbol of an industry, a Lee Iacocca with war-heads. It's easy to find his replacement lacking by comparison. The difference matters. The head of Lockheed Martin will command about 230,000 employees — more than the Marine Corps and its reserves — and almost \$40 billion a year in revenue.

As one of the nation's top two builders of warplanes, missiles, space launchers, satellites and defense electronics, Coffman will be in a position to influence military policy and international relations.

Along the way, he'll have to figure out how to do something Augustine hasn't accomplished: make the Lockheed Martin colossal work-on a daily basis, over time.

Counting the pending \$11.6 billion purchase of Northrop Grumman Corp., 22 formerly separate companies have to learn to live as one.

That may be the hardest task of all, and the one for which the studious Coffman is best suited. "If Vance doesn't thrive (leading) this corporation, it's because they've gotten too big, too fast and maybe no one could do it," said Val P. Peline, former president of the Lockheed space

division. Outsiders from Wall Street, Washington and the media have to take such sentiments on faith.

Coffman rose out of virtual darkness; he can't even talk about 20 of his 30 years at Lockheed, having spent them on top-secret satellite missions at the company's space and missiles division in Sunnyvale, Calif.

All that professional secrecy combined with a Midwestern farm boy's natural disdain for blabbing makes Coffman a challenge to interview.

How did he rise from the obscurity of secret programs to corporate prominence? "Lucky," he says.

Guarded to the point of shyness, the man is easy to pigeonhole as a Spock to Augustine's Captain Kirk. Associates say that's only part of the picture, that Coffman is an ambitious man who learns by listening to others and who earns loyalty with his deep, unshakable foundations.

"The theme for any story on Vance has got to be he had solid, Middle America roots, and he went out and got himself educated ... and his intellect allowed him to succeed. And he never lost his roots," Peline said. Coffman was born in 1944 in Kinross, Iowa, a village of grain

and dairy farmers that today has 89 residents, a post office and two churches.

The family moved across the state in 1949 to Winthrop — a bustling 600 souls — where his father bought land to raise soybeans, grain and corn. Coffman said he learned discipline early

in life, rising to do chores at 6 a.m. and doing them again every evening at 5. He helped a neighbor with cattle, saving money to buy his first horse.

That, too, taught him lessons — including what may be as close as he can get to an Augustine-style aphorism: "If you have a horse that you'd like to ride in the summer, you have to take care of it in the winter-time as well."

Coffman doesn't ride horses more than a couple-of-times-a-year now, with one of his two daughters. While he may look more like a desk jockey in photographs — aviator glasses, wide forehead, sober smile — he remains an expert horseman, regularly winning rodeos staged by an elite group of aerospace executives who go on a Western retreat every year.

But the rustic life was never Coffman's aim. His father had studied chemical engineering, and left college halfway through to buy a farm. "In hindsight, I think he felt that there were lots of ways to make a living that were different than being on a farm," Coffman said.

Coffman and his three brothers — one older, two younger — all went to Iowa State University and majored in science and engineering, he race. When he graduated in 1967, the

cash-strapped Coffman cast a practical eye at the job market. Lockheed had a program that offered to pay for graduate studies at Stanford.

High Dougherty was Coffman's first supervisor at Lockheed, and says the town stood out almost right away. "Vance was always interested in getting ahead. That's not negative, that's positive. — He was a very focused person," Dougherty recalled.

Coffman got into the Stanford graduate program in 1971, seeking a doctorate in astronautics. Splitting time between work and school, Coffman had no time for the turbulence of the era. He remembers stepping over student protesters to get to class.

Peline, who was over both Dougherty and Coffman in those early days, said Coffman had a natural call to lead.

"I think among his peer group that Vance was always the leader, and the interesting thing was that other people would always let Vance lead," Peline said. He was no charismatic guru. Coffman inspired confidence through his steadiness, intellect and decisiveness — as well as an unexpected openness of spirit.

"Vance was also a poet," Dougherty said. "He had this ability to capture his ideas in poetry with the guys." After one particularly challenging classified satellite project, the engineers held a ceremony to mark completion, and Coffman surprised his co-workers by reading a poem celebrating what they had done.

"He had a lot more depth than some of the other people, being a little more sensitive," Dougherty said.

Key people in the company noticed, and Coffman began climbing.

"The grapevine was saying, 'Here's a really attractive young man who has technical skills, management skills and people skills,'" said Daniel Tellep, who became president of Lockheed Missiles & Space Co. in 1984 and chairman and CEO of Lockheed Corp. in 1989.

A decade out of Stanford, Coffman reached a vice presidency. He became president of the Space Systems Division in 1988.

Tellep grew to trust Coffman as one of his top advisers. "People use the word 'goalless' for Vance, and that is not a bad description," Tellep said. "His self-interest is deeply subordinated to what is right for the program or right for the company."

Tellep saw — a man — who absorbed information to a prodigious degree; he said. That meant genuinely seeking the thoughts of others, and it meant taking copious notes in meetings even on topics outside his field, when others had long since disconnected, Tellep said.

"He listens to inputs, sorts through information and makes a decision. Then he has four or five effective words that he uses ultimately. Those words are, I want you to, followed by what he wants you to do. They signify that he's made up his mind, but that it's not an overbearing way. It's just a very

"In the Lockheed Martin (merger), he had the hardest job of it," said Augustine.

Coffman has spent his career at one company. He married his high school sweetheart, though he grimaces at that term. He tries to leave work at 6 p.m.

most days to spend time with his wife, Arlene, and to read. His primary outside interest is golf, though he disparages his 15 handicap.

He admits to a penchant for information, to the point that he seems incapable of a gut decision.

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE

Look round the habitable world:

Know their own good, or  
knowing it, pursue it.

Seeing no danger of losing four diamond tricks, today's South claimed that a successful heart finesse would give him his quickest and best chance to score his game. He was right about his diamond spade; he was wrong about his diamond trump.

A tricky West chose to lead diamonds second suit, rejecting the lead of the unbid suit. Given the strong bidding by North and East's failure to overcall, the spade lead gave him little hope for success.

This imaginative lead paid a huge dividend. It tempted South to duck in dummy, hoping to win his 10. Instead, it led to an embarrassing defeat. East took his heart queen and switched to a low diamond, and South was in a trouble. His 10 went to West's queen, a diamond return went to East's king, and a third diamond lead gave the defense a miffing win. South's third was indeed unlucky, but he made his own troubles. If the heart finesse would win, it would win later as well. Therefore, South should refuse the tempting finesse at trick one and test his luck in the black suits. He catches the ace, queen and king of clubs, and when no jack appears, he tries the spades. He catches the ace, king and queen, and when the suit splits, he doesn't need the heart finesse. And had spades not been 3-3, South still had time to try a delayed heart finesse for his ninth winner.

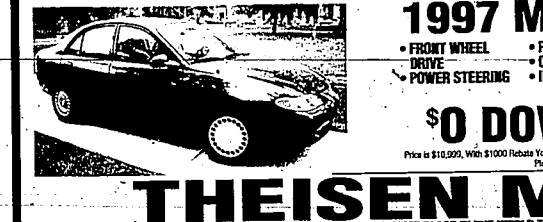

Lesli Kay Sterling, who plays the oft-tempest-tossed Molly Conlan on "As the World Turns," says she can sometimes see something of who she once was in the troubled Molly. But, where Molly is still trying to come to terms with her past, Lesli Kay has long since embraced a personal passion for life that allows her to say, "I am now a happy person and I like myself."

Lesli Kay Sterling didn't always like the person she was. As with many intelligent young women, she set unreasonably high standards for herself, and then blamed herself for not being able to live up to them. There were also some painful situations with other people that left emotional scars. She was becoming a candidate for a serious eating disorder and by the time she was in her teens, she was both dangerously anorexic and bulimic.

The day she spoke, I told her that the news had just come over the radio about the death of a young member of a New York ballet company. No cause was given, but it was suspected she may have had an eating disorder.

"I'm sure of it," Lesli Kay said. "I think there is so much pressure on dancers to stay thin that they'll do anything it takes to keep the weight off. I know, I was a dancer—was also a model, and I can tell you from personal experience that many models also have eating disorders."

Sterling noted that girls in grade school are now developing anorexia and bulimia, and it's also turning up more frequently in young men. The irony is that with all our well-placed concerns for other potentially fatal medical conditions, very little attention is given to eating disorders.

"There's nothing out there," Sterling said, "to help friends or family members to know what to do for someone with an eating disorder. There's no one to advise on what I say or not to say so that

you don't unwittingly make the situation worse while you try to get them help and on the track to better health."

The soaps have done some "eating-disorder" stories in the past, but nothing in recent years. Asked if she thought daytime should do more, Sterling said, "I wish that if they did have an eating disorder story line, that it would stay true to the disorder. In that way, it could really help. The power of this medium is very strong. People relate to our characters. I've had letters from viewers who tell me—as Molly—was I keep looking for the child she and Holden (Jon Henning) had, and which she had to give up for adoption.

"What I would really like to see are actors in reality shows who have eating disorders, come out and do public appearances and talk about how they got help and how they regained their health. That's what I want to do."

Researchers have found some common threads among anorexics. As Lesli Kay said, "Most are very intelligent. They have to be to be as manipulative as they are to make people believe that they're eating. Another common thread is not wanting to grow up, for one reason or another."

In short, whatever the cause or causes may be, they need to be discussed, diagnosed, and dealt with.

"Exactly," Sterling said. "You can be helped. I was."
