# 'This stuff is darkness'

TWIN FALLS — Crank is flooding the juvenile courtrooms of Judge John Varin, and he's sounding the alarm. Varin, a magistrate judge,

metes out justice to juvenile offenders in four counties, and he's worried by how many of his cases involve methamphetamine, which he calls an exceptionally pernicious and addictive drug. "When the light goes on, the darkness leaves," Varin said.

"And this stuff is darkness." Methamphetamine, a manufactured drug, is commonly known as crank or tweed. It's similar to the drugs that used to be called speed, but it is not like drugs parents are better acquainted with, such as marijuana and alcohol.

"Those are depressants. This is the opposite — it speeds them up. They're very acutely aware of what is going on. They're paranoid," Varin said. "It causes a person to become crazy. The doctors believe it's actually a form of manic-depressive disorder."

## Meth becomes a growing concern in juvenile justice

Varin said juveniles tell him they believe the drug enhances their capabilities. "It makes them feel like they're smarter, more physically attractive. That's particularly dangerous because we're dealing

# Experts expect El Nino to hang around

WASHINGTON — The El Nino weather pattern that has lashed parts of California and Florida with severe storms and record rainfall while warming normally frigid northern states will continue at least through April, federal forecasters predicted this Tuesday.

"El Nino is still going strong and will for two, more months," Commerce Secretary William Daley said at a news conference. "Much of the South will see increased rainfall and cooler temperatures," Daley said. "And much of the rest of the country will continue to see warmer weather than normal."

There seems to be no relief in sight. The El Nino pattern will continue "much the same" in both California and Florida, chiefly in the form of "heavy episodic events," said Ants Lettman, director of NOAA's Climate Prediction Center in Washington.

"This is the critical period for the United States — January, February, and March," Lettman said. Many of the already experiencing conditions that rank in the top 10 warmest, wettest or driest years of the century.

Through April, Lettman's office predicts, temperatures will remain uncommonly high in Northern California, the Pacific Northwest, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan. It will be substantially cooler than normal in Texas and the Gulf states, and generally cooler throughout the southeast.

Most states immediately south of the Great Lakes will be drier than normal, as will much of New England. Abnormally high precipitation will continue in California, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas, as well as in southern Florida. That may be a grim prognosis for California.

## High court will decide item veto

WASHINGTON — In a ruling hailed by backers of a local sugar beet co-operative, a federal judge struck down the new Line Item Veto Act as unconstitutional Thursday, saying Congress had engaged in an "unauthorized surrender" of its lawmaking power to the president.

Thursday's ruling sets the stage for a final Supreme Court ruling on the issue later this year. The justices are likely to act within a few weeks to schedule arguments in the case so as to hand down ruling by July. Armed with the new veto power, President Clinton

remained 82 spending items last year from appropriation bills passed by Congress. They included 38 military construction projects. Clinton's first use of the line-item veto in 1997 was when he struck down a provision which would have benefited the Texas billionaire who sold Amalgamated Sugar Co. a growers' co-op.

Salt Lake City attorney Randon Wilson, one of the founders of the veto, said he was less concerned with the constitutionality of the line-item veto than with the benefits of the vetoed provision. "This is really going to help farmers and family farms all over the country," he said of the ruling.

In the sugar co-op's role in the proceedings was integral because the court would only rule on the veto if a plaintiff actually had to suffer directly from the ruling.

"We have a unique role to play on behalf of farmers and co-ops," he said. "We're not a growers' co-op, the ruling

could mean a more aggressive purchasing stance," Wilson said. The deal with Texas billionaire Harold Simmons for the Amalgamated Sugar Co. will be mostly unaffected, he said, but we can clean it up a little."

The provision would allow companies to defer the taxes on the sales of facilities to co-ops, a luxury they enjoy when selling to other corporations, Wilson said.

"The co-op put acquisitions on hold after the veto, he said, but is already in discussions with a processor now.

"We can go in with more confidence and talk to processors about buying their facilities," he said.

Sen. Larry Craig applauded the ruling, but reiterated his stance that the line-item veto should occur.

"The ruling produced a fair and just result for farmers in Idaho and across the nation, regardless of where you might stand on the line-item veto," he said in a news release, adding later, "Depending upon the decision of the Supreme Court, Congress may have an opportunity

to revisit the line-item veto. I think the law can be written better, and I will work with my colleagues to do that."

For the first time, Congress in 1998 gave the president the authority to cancel spending items from larger funding bills. Before, the president had the option to sign the spending bill in its entirety or to veto it.

While the vetoes will save the taxpayers \$1.9 billion over the next five years, they angered many of the intended recipients of the funds.

U.S. District Judge Thomas Hogan agreed Thursday that the act "disrupts the balance of powers" between Congress and the White House.

While Congress may pass a law that gives the executive branch the power to write rules to enforce it, the Line Item Veto Act goes further and gives away Congress's power over the purse, he said.

For Congress to give away the final authority over some spending items, he said, is "an unconstitutional transfer to the president of an inherently legislative function."

Yet treatment is the biggest problem facing the system.

"I think even the kids sense how bad this stuff is for them, too, but we don't have it, and we can't do anything about it," Varin said.

what will we be paying for next year?" Garner said. "There are a lot of 'what-ifs' particularly with Old Towne joining the BID - but we'd be making a big commitment."

Filing a full-time director, perhaps Schlinso, "could be a good thing," said Kevin Newbury of Magic Valley Auto Parts. "The good could come in the long run, but the pressure would really go on him."

BID has been building momentum in the right direction, he said.

If Schlinso gets the job, he said he would draw on his eight years of experience with what works and what doesn't work - while resisting the urge to make immediate changes.

An obvious first step would be to develop a "district" attitude for the BID, he said. "One where we're not independent businesses, but interdependent businesses."

For example, a "design committee" could be used to draft an appealing "streetscape" plan - with better lighting, landscaping, and safer sidewalks, he said.

### Lance doubts abortion bill is constitutional

BOISE (AP) - Attorney General Al Lance says a bill that sponsors contend changes Idaho's partial-birth abortions probably is unconstitutional.

The bill comes up for a final House vote Monday.

An earlier opinion on a bill sponsored by Rep. Don Maloney, Genesee, and Right to Life of Idaho Inc. indicated questions but said the state should wait to see how the U.S. Supreme Court rules in a related Ohio case.

# Lewinsky returns to Washington; focus turns to service

WASHINGTON (AP) — Monica Lewinsky headed home to Washington Thursday as prosecutors summoned a retired Secret Service officer and subpoenaed an active-duty officer to determine whether the president's protectors can shed light on the Clinton-Lewinsky matter.

Further testimony by Ms. Lewinsky's mother, Marcia Lewis, was put off after she was shaken by two previous days of questioning that she required medical attention. Negotiations to broker a deal under which Ms. Lewinsky herself would testify remained at a standstill.

Retired Secret Service officer Lewis Fox, who claims to have seen President Clinton and Ms. Lewinsky alone in the Oval Office in 1995, spent less than an hour at the U.S. Courthouse early Thursday and left without comment. It was unclear whether he was actually questioned before the grand jury.

Prosecutors also have subpoenaed an unidentified active-duty

officer, according to a senior government official who spoke on condition of anonymity. Neither Fox nor the second officer served on the personal protective detail that has the most direct access to Clinton.

Ms. Lewinsky was returning to her Watergate apartment after

spending 10 days in California with her father, a Los Angeles doctor. The former White House intern was described as eager to be near her mother, who underwent more than seven hours of questioning before the grand jury Tuesday and Wednesday.

"Her mother needs her right

now," said Ms. Lewinsky's attorney, William Ginsburg. "This is a family thing."  
He described the questioning of Ms. Lewinsky by prosecutors as "more than rough and tumble. If this is the way the prosecutorial system normally operates, then all Americans should take notice. It is frightening."

Billy Martin, an attorney for Ms. Lewinsky, said the questioning had been "overwhelming and emotionally draining" and that a date for her to resume testifying had not been set. He said Ms. Lewinsky and her daughter were close to one another.

"Right now, at a time when they could probably use each other's support, these proceedings cause them to be drawn further apart," he said.

Prosecutors are particularly interested in Ms. Lewinsky's testimony because Ms. Lewinsky reportedly confided to her mother about her alleged relationship with the president.  
Ginsburg said there had been no progress on efforts to secure a deal for Ms. Lewinsky's cooperation in exchange for immunity

from prosecution.  
In the absence of testimony from Ms. Lewinsky, investigators continued to pursue other witnesses and documents that could help prove or disprove allegations of a presidential affair and cover-up.

# Not all Secret Service officials are elite agents

WASHINGTON (AP) — To the public, they may all seem like men in black.

But there are different faces to the Secret Service, and not all outfits are alike. There are the highly trained, well-armed agents who have the elite duty of protecting the president. And there are the uniformed officers who are basically security guards.

The retired Secret Service officer who has become a witness in the Monica Lewinsky investigation — Lewis C. Fox — was one of the latter.

He wore a police officer's uniform to work every day, not a dark suit.

The distinction is important, because under normal procedures, according to White House officials and former Secret Service agents, Fox normally wouldn't have been in the position he has said he was — posted right outside the Oval Office — while the president was inside.

Instead, there would have been a plainclothes agent standing there.

When the president is not in the Oval Office, the door is open and the uniformed officer maintains the security there," said

Hamilton Brown, executive secretary of the Association of Former Agents of the U.S. Secret Service.

"When the president goes to the Oval Office, the (plain clothes) agents follow him to his place of work and stand outside. The (uniformed) officers then move on to other assigned tasks, but not anywhere near that corridor."

The bulk of the Secret Service, which is part of the Treasury Department — neither wears a uniform nor regularly protects the president. The main mission of the service, carried out in field offices across the nation, is investigating counterfeiting, forgery, credit card fraud and certain types of embezzlement.

When the president travels, agents in the field offices are usually pressed into duty to help protect the president.

The Secret Service employs approximately 2,000 special agents, 1,200 Uniformed Division officers and 1,200 other technical, professional and support workers.

Current Secret Service officials would not talk about the routines of agents and officers. But White House press secretary Mike

McCurry said, "The general practice is — you've got agents posted outside the door, and the Uniformed Division folks reside elsewhere when the president is in the Oval."

Fox has told reporters that he stood in the hallway while Ms. Lewinsky spent about 40 minutes alone with Clinton in the Oval Office on a weekend afternoon in September, October and November 1995. The Washington Post reported that Fox said he was posted outside one of the Oval Office doors and that Ms. Lewinsky arrived with papers for

the president to review and Clinton instructed Fox to usher her into his office.

Secret Service agents never wear uniforms to work. Around the White House, both male and female agents wear suits or slacks and jackets. On the road, they sometimes wear less formal attire to fit in with the event — but they never wear uniforms. Agents are highly trained and college-educated, usually with degrees in criminal-justice disciplines. They are required to take special courses and have prior law-enforcement experience.

# Marines face new hazing allegations

PARRIS ISLAND, S.C. (AP) — A year after the nation was shocked by bloody images of Marines pounding medals into each other's chests came a new picture of young Marines being subjected to beatings, Thursday night fights and mock crucifixions.

Four privates are in the brig at Parris Island, charged with hazing and severely beating a fellow Marine because he supposedly had gotten his platoon in trouble for failing to do some routine tasks.

Pvt. Maciej Lugowski, 20, of New York City lost his spleen and suffered other injuries in the assault Dec. 17 — six months after the nation's top Marine instructor in Corps would not tolerate hazing.

"It's despicable to us to see this type of activity," said Maj. Rick Long, a spokesman for the Corps' training depot here. "People are shocked that Marines would engage in this type of activity against other Marines."

After a week in the hospital and a month's leave, Lugowski is back at Fort Knox, Ky., the Army base where the assault took place.

He and his alleged assailants were among about 350 Marines, many fresh out of basic training, who go through the Army's armor school each year to learn to be tank mechanics and drivers.

At a preliminary hearing Wednesday for one of the accused, defense attorney Maj. Bill Weber said new trainees at

Fort Knox were soon visited by other Marines who punched, cursed and dragged them into the hall. Those who did not fight back had their heads fluffed in the toilet, he said.

He said his client, Pvt. Jacob Isaacs, 18, of McKee, Ky., had been "sparring" with Lugowski in his room, just as other Marines did all the time, when the other defendants came in and things got out of hand.

# State will try to find deadbeats through birthdays

BOSTON (AP) — The state is trying to reach the purse strings of hundreds of deadbeat dads and moms by tugging at their heartstrings.

Over the next three months, 1,650 parents who owe \$1,000 to \$5,000 in child support will receive cards marking their youngsters' birthdays.

"Birthdays can be very special, especially for children, and the absence of your support is most certainly being felt," read the cards being sent by the Revenue Department.

"A Birthday Message" will be printed on the envelopes in the hopes they will be opened by recipients who usually throw

away mail from the department.

"We're trying to work with guilt here," Revenue Commissioner Mitchell Adams said. "We're saying, 'Your kid's got a birthday. Here's your flesh and blood.' It's like putting the kid's picture right in front of them."

# Forces join census battle

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lawyers and legislators waded into the battle over counting Americans on Thursday.

The Southeastern Legal Foundation filed suit in federal court challenging the Clinton administration's plan to use a system called statistical sampling in Census 2000.

And the House Government Reform and Oversight Committee announced it has formed a new subcommittee to oversee the count.

Sampling has already drawn sharp complaints from Republicans in Congress, who fear it could result in higher counts in normally Democratic urban areas.

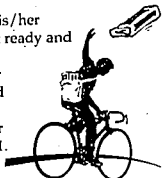

# Russian defense minister scolds U.S.

MOSCOW (AP) — Russia's defense minister accused the United States Thursday of being "uncompromising" in dealing with Iraq and rushing to military strikes before diplomatic avenues are exhausted.

Defense Secretary William Cohen termed Russia's "so-called compromises" unlikely to end the standoff with Saddam Hussein.

Russian Defense Minister Igor Sergeev, in an unusually strong rebuke at the opening of talks during Cohen's first visit to Moscow, also warned that a U.S. military strike against Iraq would harm the two countries' post-Cold War military cooperation.

Cohen calmly took notes during Sergeev's 10-minute lecture, several aides sat motionless with stumped looks on their faces. Normally at such appearances, both sides exchange pleasantries for the cameras.

"Does the uncompromising and tough stand over the situation in Iraq help to strengthen stability in the world? ... Is America ready for all the possible consequences?" Sergeev quizzed Cohen, speaking through a translator. "Force can conquer

all, but its victory is short-lived," the defense minister added, noting that he was quoting Abraham Lincoln on his birthday.

"For a military man, it is the worst thing to be late, but it's also had to hurry too much while assessing the situation," said Sergeev.

Cohen, a former Maine senator, asked to respond.

"One should make haste slowly and that is precisely what President Clinton has done for the past several months in the

face of Saddam Hussein's tactics of delay, deception and trickery," Cohen said, launching into a vigorous defense of the administration's position.

He said the issue was not one of American rigidity, but Iraqi intransigence. Every country that he has visited, including Russia, on his weeklong swing through Europe and the Persian Gulf has said U.N. inspectors must be allowed into presidential sites in Iraq, the secretary said.

Sergeev said: "We not only listened to each other, we also heard each other."

In Washington, White House press secretary Mike McCurry said, "They clearly had a disagreement about the tactics that the international community ought to consider as we bring pressure to bear on Iraq. But there is no disagreement that Saddam Hussein, and Iraq, needs to be in full compliance, and they spent a great deal of time talking about how they can go about achieving that end."

The Clinton administration acknowledges that international support for attacking Iraq has not reached the level of the 1991 Persian Gulf War. Many in the Republican-controlled Congress, meanwhile, are skeptical that limited airstrikes can force Saddam into compliance with U.N. resolutions.

In congressional testimony Thursday, Secretary of State Madeleine Albright said the long-range aim is to remove Saddam as president, but not with American combat troops.

"Iraq would be better off without Saddam Hussein," she said, "and we look forward to working with a post-Saddam regime."

## U.S. will check report saying Russia aided Iraq

WASHINGTON (AP) — Apparently surprised by a report Russia may be helping Iraq develop biological weapons, Secretary of State Madeleine Albright assured Congress "we'll certainly follow this up."

Albright gave no indication Thursday she had heard of the possible delivery of a fermentation vessel until she read about it in The Washington Post.

The newspaper said the information came from the U.N. special commission that inspected Iraqi suspect arms sites. Albright told the committee not all the data accumulated by the U.N. commission in its searches was shared with the United States.

### Training range becomes Idaho's never-ending issue

By now, most Idahoans are numb to the tedious and technical debate about the Air Force training range proposed in Owyhee County. The plan has been through four incarnations in eight years. The Air Force's tenacity is seemingly inexhaustible - unlike the public's attention span.

*The Air Force seems to be wearing down critics of its plans for an Owyhee County training range, but it still hasn't demonstrated why it needs to be buzzing those canyons in the first place.*

So far, the fourth proposal fails, there surely will be a fifth, and then a sixth. Eventually, the Air Force seems likely to have its way. The skies above the precious Owyhee canyons will, sooner or later, shriek and boom with the passing of silver eagles.

And yet, as this fourth proposal nears the end of its decision process, a key question is still unanswered: Where is the demonstrated need for this facility?

Mountain Home Air Force Base is home to the 366th Composite Wing, a mixed gaggle of fighters, bombers and tankers training together. The Air Force wants 12,000 Idaho acres and a big chunk of Owyhee County airspace in which to practice realistic warfare without flying to training ranges across the state line.

Such a notion sounds reasonable, especially to patriotic Idahoans who want the best possible training for the men and women who defend America. Yet the Air Force has never overcome a basic contradiction.

When it moved the 366th to Idaho, it insisted that no new range would be necessary.

That underlying evasion of the truth set the tone for the ongoing debate. Now the planes are here, and the Air Force is patiently grinding away at the environmentalists, cattlemen and Indians who cherish the canyons.

The latest environmental impact statement (a four-volume set of soporific promises) is to be sensitive to local concerns. It promises

to restrict supersonic flying, to take precautions igniting wildfires - and even to avoid disturbing recreationists during popular holiday weekends. Skeptics note that fighter pilots generally don't train during holiday weekends anyway. Furthermore, promises cannot guarantee the real-world behavior of adrenaline-charged jet jockeys. The world saw that fact below during a truly last week, when a negligently piloted U.S. military jet clipped a gondola cable.

But these details don't really matter much. They are skirmishes on the edges of the real issue. The real issue is, will the military be allowed to disrupt this irreplaceable gem of God's creation, for the sake of a shorter commute? Eight years into this debate, we still haven't heard a convincing explanation of why it should.

### Superintendent defends school drug-testing policy

Often time when letters critical of public agencies appear in local newspapers, public officials may choose not to respond to the charges because debating public policy in a newspaper often serves no purpose. However, the recent letter that (in effect) condemns the Buhl School District's random drug-testing policy does serve a truthful and rapid response.

With respect to the privacy issue, I have been assured by representatives of the Twin Falls Sheriff's Office that students are not directly observed by their personnel when a student is providing a urine sample. Students are asked to provide a urine sample in the privacy of a restroom with no other person present; a representative of the Twin Falls Sheriff's Office remains outside the door while the sample is being provided. The restroom is purposely left door ajar to ensure the student does not violate the integrity of the urine sample. The school district does not promote and/or endorse voyeurism in any form or fashion.

The subtle charge of racism is unfounded. At the beginning of each academic season (fall, winter, spring), Magic Valley Regional Athletic Association sanctioned teams; from this list, a randomly selected list of student ID numbers representing 10 percent of the number of participating student athletes from each team are faxed each week to the district superintendent's office. There is absolutely no way hospital personnel are capable of pre-identifying and selecting

students' ID numbers based on race, gender, socio-economic status, etc. With respect to the issue of being selected on more than one occasion, the computer system is deliberately designed to choose at least one student ID number from a previous week's list of numbers. For example, a male Caucasian member of the Buhl High School football team had his student ID number selected four consecutive weeks this past fall. Being selected on more than one occasion is a function of chance, not race, gender, socio-economic status, etc.

Finally, if a representative of the district informed any student that they lose their rights after they "step into the school," I will most certainly apologize. All citizens of our wonderful nation are guaranteed fundamental rights guaranteed by our respective state and federal constitutions. While (situationally) a person's age may determine certain limitations on those rights, the Buhl School District ensures a number of students' rights vis-a-vis district policies. I encourage any student and their parents to review these policies at their leisure.

If a member of our community has any concerns about this policy or any other district policy/practice, I encourage you to schedule a meeting with district officials or participate at regularly scheduled School Board meetings.

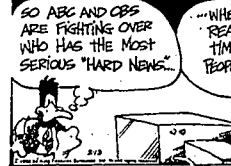

# Senate OKs easier access to offender registry

**BOISE (AP)** — The Idaho Senate Thursday voted overwhelmingly for easier public access to information on the statewide sex offender registration list.

With its 32-2 vote, the Senate emphasized that protection of potential victims far outweighs concern for former offender rights.

The bill, sent to the House, also creates a special board that determines whether convicted sex offenders should be classified as violent sexual predators who must register every 90 days with authorities as long as they remain in Idaho.

Republican Sen. Gordon Crow of Hayden said the legislation, which conforms Idaho's law to federal requirements, "assured that 'any rights to protect my family are at least equal to those of the violent predatory sexual offenders.'"

Critics claim the measure goes too far and will foster vigilantism against ex-convicts who have already served their sentences. They will awaiting Senate action in another bill creating a similar registration scheme for juvenile sexual offenders.

Failure to comply with the federal mandate on adult offender registration could cost the state \$300,000. Since the state first created its adult sex offender register in 1993, 1,700 released felons have been convicted of violent sex crimes. Judiciary Chairman Denton Darrington, R-DeLo, said about 10 percent of those convicted of

violent crimes would likely be designated violent sexual predators by a special board created to evaluate offenders.

Other offenders can have their names removed from the register 10 years after they are released from prison if they can prove to a judge they are no longer a threat to reoffend. That irked the American Civil Liberties Union, which claimed it turned America's innocent-until-proven-guilty justice system on its head. Advocates of the registry also failed to respond to critics, who suggested that if a public registry of sex offenders was such a good idea, registries should be created

for murderers or other violent criminals.

"If I've got an alcoholic living next to me, I think I'd like to know that," Republican Sen. Coell Ingram of Boise said. "If we've got somebody with a problem with theft, I think I'd like to know. Maybe I'd make in my house at night or my sprinkler. ... The fact is how long are we going to persecute."

Conservative Stan Hawkins of Oneida called the legislation not only a "political response, and frankly, I think people will re-elect you if you vote for this bill. But we're not solving the problem, and we're not protecting the public."

# Panel will protect, enhance Capitol

**BOISE (AP)** — After 93 years, the Idaho Capitol Commission is coming back to life.

The board created by the Legislature in 1905 to build a new Statehouse in Boise will have a slightly different name. But the State Capitol Commission proposed to the Legislature Thursday will have many of the same goals as its long-gone predecessor.

The old State Capitol Commission had authority to issue bonds, sign and negotiate contracts and approve architectural plans for a state capitol building. That resulted in completion of the central core of the present Statehouse in 1912 and of the east and west wings in 1920.

The new commission is to make long-range plans, hire a part-time architect for the Capitol building and supervise the new Capitol Extension Fund to pay for upkeep, maintenance, and enhancement of the building's historic features.

"We need to do some planning for the future of this building," House Speaker Michael Simpson told the State Affairs Committee on Thursday. "There are a few things in disrepair and need fixing up."

Long-range plans include possi-

ble acquisition of the Ada County Courthouse, across the street from the Statehouse, when a new courthouse is finished at another location.

The committee gave quick preliminary approval to a bill to create a commission nine members, four appointed by the governor, one each by officials of the House and Senate and three state agency heads.

One of those officials is the director of the Department of Administration. Director Pam Ahrens said there are "a tremendous number of repairs that need to be done to the building."

She said other states have programs set up to enhance their capitol buildings, but Idaho does not.

The bill declares that the Idaho Statehouse is "a public monument representing the spirit of Idaho's citizens, a symbol of Idaho's sovereignty and one of Idaho's most renowned landmarks."

It says a building that is "one of the most vital and preeminent public buildings in Idaho" must be preserved and maintained.

The five-story Statehouse has more than 200,000 square feet of floor area and contains 50,646 square feet of four different kinds

of marble. It was declared a Boise Historic Landmark in 1976 by the Boise Centennial Commission.

Simpson said one of the major jobs for the new commission will be to make sure that structural changes or alterations are in harmony with the original design.

The nine-member commission will review all proposals involving objects of art, memorials, statues or exhibits to be on temporary or permanent display in the Statehouse or on its grounds.

The Department of Law Enforcement is given authority over the Statehouse, but with help. Ada County and Boise city can enforce their laws and ordinances and the Department of Administration is authorized to hire private contractors for security, which is the present practice.

# Welfare reform hits budget writers

**BOISE (AP)** — Legislative budget writers ran up against the stark reality of welfare reform on Thursday.

The Batt administration detailed a 1999 spending plan that not only consumes modest savings from a plunging direct welfare caseload, but also adds nearly \$20 million more.

Health and Welfare Director Linda Caballero tried to sum up the message Gov. Phil Batt has been sending since he launched the welfare reform drive early in his term: It could cost more in the beginning to turn welfare from a demoralizing way of life into a safety net that quickly returns people to productive roles in society.

But House Appropriations Chairman Bob Geddes remained upset that the governor wants this year's \$236.6 million general tax budget hiked to \$25.9 million, and that was after Batt cut \$22 million from the original proposal.

"We have one of the best economies the state of Idaho has ever known, virtually no unemployment, and yet we see the need that's here," Geddes said.

"If just can't comprehend with the circumstances we have in Idaho, ... that we have to ask for an 11 percent increase in the budget in Health and Welfare," the Preston Republican went on. "What's going to happen when we have a downturn in the economy and there's a real

need out there?"

But while the state's Work over Welfare program has been successful in dramatically slashing cash welfare payments and increasing individual self-reliance, Caballero said that "a fundamental change in our thinking at Health and Welfare" has occurred in the last year.

# 2nd crossing accident grabs notice

## Railroad spokesman says drivers are at fault

**JEROME** - A second collision at a rail crossing near Jerome has raised concern at the Idaho Transportation Department, a spokesman said. "Two accidents in a five-month period are going to get that crossing noticed quickly," the department's Reed Hollinshead said. But a spokesman for Eastern Idaho Railroad - which owns the tracks crossing U.S. Highway 93 just north of the Petro 2 truck stop - said drivers were clearly at fault in both accidents. "We don't consider that crossing to be a problem," Dave Buccolo said Thursday

from company headquarters in Pittsburgh, Kan. "The visibility is pretty wide open there. If you're paying attention," Delbert Harmon, a 49-year-old serious injury at about 1 p.m. Wednesday, when the pickup he was using to pull a flatbed trailer carrying another truck collided with a moving train. Buccolo said Harmon's trailer, which was tipped over and dragged off the road, caused body damage on both the train's locomotives. Twin Falls County residents William Couch, 20, and James Johnson, 54, in October 1997 walked away from their pickup's collision with a train at the same crossing. Couch - who claimed the sun's glare blocked his view of flashing lights at the crossing - was cited for failure to yield at a red light. Harmon's accident was still under

investigation by Idaho State Police, and a final report isn't expected before Tuesday. Trooper Scott Earle, who investigated the scene Wednesday, said it appeared Harmon's pickup was overloaded, making it impossible for Harmon to stop in time. Buccolo said both collisions appeared to be caused by people forgetting the potential danger at a crossing they often drive over. "We run trains there as often as two times a day, five or six days a week," he said. The crossing is equipped with flashing warning lights on either side. Such lights are usually considered adequate at single-rail crossings in rural areas, such as where the accidents occurred, Hollinshead said. The railroad would put additional safety measures at a crossing without the state's authorization, Buccolo said.

The railroad is free to put up any safety devices it wants but would have to foot the entire bill if it acts alone, Hollinshead said. Federal money is available for work done in conjunction with the ITD, he said. The Highway 93 crossing ranks low on the department's list of more than 90 crossings that might need safety improvements, Hollinshead said. About three to five crossings on the list are improved each year according to their ranking. "But the accidents are sure to be on the crossing up the list," Hollinshead said. If the department decides it needs work, a set of overhead flashing lights probably would go in, he said. It's unlikely dropping gates - usually reserved for urban crossings - ever will be installed there, he said.

Without mentioning his opponent, Republican Attorney General Alan Lance, Groom said the state used a "legal loophole" to argue successfully for the dismissal of a lawsuit demanding the state build and repair schools. Neubert, a crash firefighter at the West Palm Beach airport, enlisted the help of local firefighters to surprise the daughter he hasn't seen since she was 3 months old. "Every time I'd walk into a store, I'd wonder if that was my little girl behind the counter. I had no idea she was in Idaho," Neubert said. "I've hoped for a long time that I'd get to see her." With the aid of Lewis' husband, Ron, and her mother, Kathy McKisick, he made Melanie Lewis' 27th birthday at Applebee's Neighborhood Grill and Bar a day to remember. "This has been a wonderful birthday," Melanie Lewis said between hugs with her mom and dad. "I can't believe everyone was in on it. I'm so excited to finally see my dad."

Her father arrived in full crash suit, his face hidden behind a reflective gold shield, and personally delivered the present that told her he was there. "I watched her walk into the building and it was all I could do not to go to her then. I'd rather jump into a burning plane than have to do this again. It's really great and yet it's so hard," Neubert said. "I'm so grateful to everybody that helped get us together. This is just great." Melanie Lewis found her father with the help of her uncle, a New Mexico attorney, last October. "We've talked to each other every day on the phone since she called me the first time," Neubert said. "She's so special. I found out I was a grandpa. I couldn't wait to see them. Melanie's been pretty ill lately and I'm so glad she found me." Melanie Lewis was diagnosed with IHSS - idiopathic hypertrophic subaortic stenosis, a heart condition that is rare in someone so young - after suffering a mild stroke earlier last year. 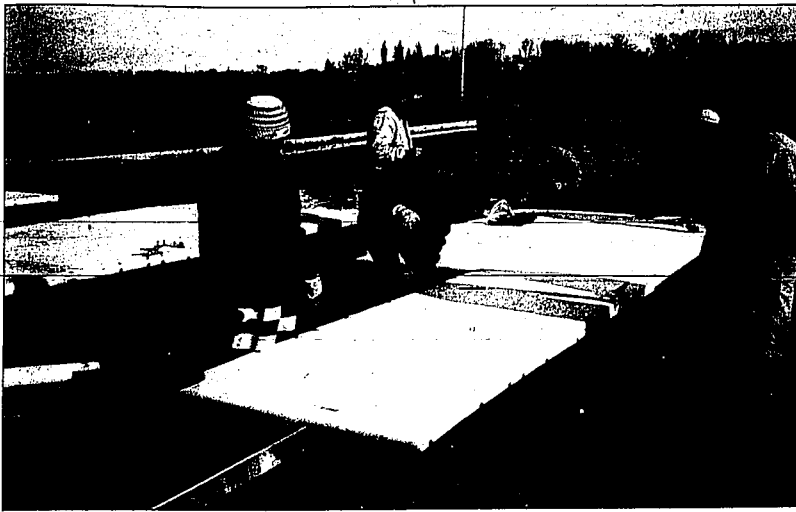

# Minidoka schools campaign for levy

**RUPERT** — Voters will decide this spring whether to approve a short-term levy Minidoka County School District has proposed to help maintain schools, grounds, equipment and the bus fleet.

The district began its levy campaign Thursday at a Mini-Cassia Chamber of Commerce luncheon at the Rupert Elks Club.

"We know that economically our county faces some challenges right now," schools Superintendent Rick Thaller said.

An election on the proposed two-year levy will be held April 28. The levy needs 51 percent voter approval to pass.

The levy would replace the district's 10-year plant facilities levy that expires this year, Hallett said. The district, however, eventually must pass a bond issue to get its buildings in adequate shape.

A levy allows the district to collect an annual sum from taxpayers without accumulating interest on a debt. It is different from a bond issue, which provides districts with a large sum of money up front to pay for a big project such as a new building. Property owners pay off the debt and interest over a number of years.

The plant facilities levy can be used to pay for capital expenses. The 10-year levy brought the district \$618,996 annually. The proposed levy would provide \$200,000 for two years.

The increase mostly would be used to equip each of the district's nearly 250 classrooms with a current computer and printer, said county administrator Lewis Roberts.

The rest of the increase — about \$100,000 a year — would help with basic upkeep.

## Get out your calculators

To figure out how the April 28 Minidoka County School District's proposed plant facilities levy would affect your taxes, multiply the taxable value of your property by .000428. The result would provide the annual cost of the levy under current market conditions. If voters pass the levy, a home with a taxable value of \$70,000 would pay another \$30.03 a year. A home with a taxable value of \$40,000 would pay another \$27.18 a year.

"Our schools are old enough that they really do need a lot of maintenance," Hallett said.

They don't even meet Americans with Disabilities Act standards, he said. The district deals with student needs as they arise.

The district fell behind on maintenance but is catching up, Hallett said. The roofs are in good shape and, he said, only a few buckets are needed after each rainstorm.

"It's scary to fall behind, and we've fallen way behind on our bus fleet," he said.

The district buys about six buses a year — priced between \$50,000 and \$55,000 each — just to help the levy does not pass, the district will delay maintenance, Hallett said.

"The day comes when you get into trouble when you do that," he said.

# Curiel faces March trial for offenses

## Plea agreement in sex offense case denied

**BURLEY** — Reinstatement of a plea agreement was denied Thursday for Manuel Ramirez Curiel, a suspect in a sex offense case.

The agreement was withdrawn in December after a prior sex offense was discovered on Curiel's record. He will go to trial March 30.

Curiel, 37, had just finished serving a term for burglary when he was arrested in July 1996, and charged with two counts of lewd and lascivious conduct with two

females under the age of 18, conduct that allegedly occurred in 1993.

The original plea agreement offered Curiel a 5-year suspended sentence, 90 days in jail, and probation with sex-offender counseling and treatment.

Former Twin Falls County Prosecutor G. Richard Bevan, the special prosecutor in this case, asked the court to withdraw the agreement after discovering Curiel had a prior felony conviction for a sex crime.

During plea bargaining, Curiel denied having prior felonies, and a check of his record did not turn up the former conviction.

Curiel's attorney Kent Jensen insisted Curiel's prior record was never specified in the agreement, and the agreement was not made

contingent upon his not having a prior felony record.

Jensen asked the court to rule to exclude from the trial admissions of guilt and other statements made by Curiel in the plea agreement.

Bevan said this restriction would put Curiel in a position of perjuring himself since he admitted to the crimes under oath when he accepted the agreement, and he will be claiming his innocence during his trial.

District Judge George Granata Jr. granted Curiel's motion, saying that while the plea agreement was done voluntarily, it

was done with difficulty since the defendant was concerned about risking a lifetime prison term with a jury that would hear testimony from two young girls claiming Curiel had harmed them.

"If the records check had indicated the prior conviction, both sides would have been in better negotiating positions," Granata said.

Granata prohibited the state from using Curiel's previous statements during trial.

"He must be tried on the evidence presented; I will not restrict the defendant's ability to testify," Granata said.

# Protest march called off; company agrees to study employee concerns

**POCATELLO (AP)** — FMC Corp. retirees angry at increases in their health insurance premiums and the terms of their coverage agreed to call off a planned protest march after meeting with company officials.

In return, Paul Yochum, manager of FMC's elemental phosphate plant, agreed after meeting with retirees and a union representative on Wednesday to more closely study retirees' concerns.

"They had quite a good dialogue," said Paul Prochno, business agent for Machinists Union Local 933. "The retirees are waiting for some answers to some questions."

Retiree Ray Robinson said an official from FMC's corporate headquarters in Philadelphia is scheduled to talk to retirees in March following a study of the issues. Retirees will take no further action until then.

"Let's see if we can get this resolved without anything else," retiree Red Phillips said.

Retirees and union representatives question the legal interpretation of the 1995 contract FMC signed with the machinists that prompted the company to pass on all health insurance cost increases to its retirees.

Effective Jan. 1, FMC retirees under 65 began paying \$43.50

more in monthly health insurance premiums and those over 65 started paying \$11 more. About 230 local retirees are affected by the rate hikes.

But retirees' biggest concerns appear to stem from 1996, when retirees were faced with rate hikes as high as 700 percent.

After demonstrations outside the plant by retirees and legislators, the union accepted FMC's offer to move the pool of local retirees into a corporate-wide insurance pool of more than 7,000 salaried employees. That sharply curtailed increases in insurance costs but reduced benefits.

# More than \$23 million in bonds will finance prison

**BOISE (AP)** — Idaho investors snapped up more than \$23.5 million of the Idaho State Building Authority's largest bond issue in history to help finance construction of Idaho's first privately operated prison.

The sale on Wednesday totaled more than \$66.4 million in bonds.

Almost \$59 million will finance the 1,250-bed prison to be built south of Boise, and the rest will cover partial refinancing of two other state projects to save \$530,000 in interest, the Building Authority said Thursday.

# Lomow faces multiple charges including fraud

Idaho man pleads innocent in California

**OKLAHOMA** — The Boise man who is president of a former garbage-collection contractor for Contra Costa County pleaded innocent to charges of defrauding customers of \$2.8 million.

William D. Lomow of the Orinda-Moraga Disposal Service — who also was involved with an unfinished, financially troubled landfill project eight miles west of Burley — was arraigned Tuesday before a federal magistrate. He remains free on bail.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Martha Boersch said.

The company's chairman, Robert M. Slepka of San Juan Capistrano, is scheduled to appear before the magistrate next Tuesday.

Orinda-Moraga Disposal Service had a garbage-collection contract with the Contra Costa Sanitary District from 1990 to February 1996, serving 11,000 customers in Orinda and Moraga.

A federal grand jury indicted

ment, unseized Jan. 30, accuses Lomow and Slepka of pocketing \$1.44 million in ratepayers' money by submitting expense reports to the district in the names of 11 sham companies for services that never were performed.

They are also charged with diverting \$1.37 million from the district by failing to report revenues from three major customers — Safeway, St. Mary's College and the Bay Area Rapid Transit District. The 49 criminal charges include money laundering, mail fraud and illegal transportation of stolen property.

Lomow owes \$50,000 in back taxes to Cassia County for the property he owns west of Burley, Cassia County Administrator Tim Hiest has said.

Another Lomow company was the longtime trash disposal contractor for southwestern Idaho's Ada County until his demand for a 34 percent rate increase prompted the county to find another contractor in 1994.

**Wendell raises irrigation rates, designates one-way street**

**WENDELL**—Irrigation rates for Wendell residents who use city irrigation service will increase in 1998, but nonusers' rates will remain unchanged.

Mayor Gwen Rost said at Wednesday's City Council meeting that the city needed to raise rates because the irrigation account has been running in the red.

The city annually assesses an irrigation fee for every lot in town, even if it is without irrigation service. But to make assessments fairer, the council raised rates for users from \$12 to \$20 per 50-foot lot. The \$12 rate for nonusers remains the same.

The city's 19 large-acre owners will be charged \$15 per 50-foot lot if they use city irrigation but the same \$11 rate if they don't.

In another matter, officials OK'd creating the city's first one-way street.

C Avenue West from Idaho to Shoshone streets will become one-way, east to west, to reduce traffic congestion at Simerly's General Store.

"What will eliminate a big headache," Councilman Fred McCloud said.

The only cost to the city, Police Chief Philip Cowell said, will be six to eight traffic-control signs and the extra patrolling required until residents adjust to the change.

The council authorized spending \$9,500 for the city engineer to do surveying, design engineering, drafting, construction observation and testing of a planned city sewer line north of, and leading to, the Ambrose development west of town.

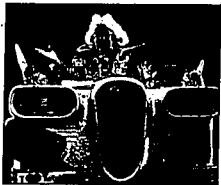

So for a few thousand dollars, they hired the cozy, 150-seat Sullivan Theater in New York City and set up shop there, hoping for bigger things.

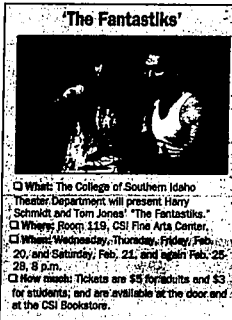

• "The Ghost and Mrs. Muir" (1947) — Everyone knows that passion increases the longer it is forbidden. Gene Tierney is a pressure cooker after a lifetime of being in love with the ghost of a dashing, captain sea captain. Rex Harrison plays the lusty shade who fails to scare the new tenant off the premises. As they live side by side, they grow on each other, though relations remain necessarily chaste. However, since Capt. Gregg can make himself visible or not at will, conceivably he could be watching Mrs. Muir in the bath — and don't think that didn't occur to audiences of 1947! The ending of "Titanic" takes a page from this movie, but Tierney and Harrison did the ghostly-reunion thing better.

Men like this movie because it's more romantic to remember the perfect woman if she was cut down in her prime, before the perfection tarnished. And women like it because they secretly hope their exes spend the rest of their days pining away for them in a drabby house. Fated love can be so satisfying.

"Casablanca" (1942) - The One That Got Away has a lot of emotional appeal, even if you're happy to love the one you're with. Humphrey Bogart doesn't know whether to love her or hate her when Ingrid Bergman walks back into his life (and his saloon) on the arm of noble but colorless freedom fighter Paul Henreid. He winds up compromising - he loves her and then leaves her under the guise of its being for the best. But, just as in "Gone with the Wind," we know there'll come a day ...

"The Bridges of Madison County" (1995) - When an Iowa drudge blows her paltry household allowance on a new dress, she'd better have a darn good reason. Clint Eastwood is that

reason, and as midlife-crisis affairs go, he's certainly worth a new frock or two. Eastwood is a photojournalist who straggles onto Meryl Streep's property just when Streep's husband is away with the kids and this Italian farmer war bride is feeling a little washed out. There's nothing like a three-day fling to put some spring in her step and to make the rest of life's housewifehood seem so unrewarding after all.

"The American President" (1995) - As any White House intern can tell you, dating at the top of the political food chain has its appeal. At least Michael Douglas as the commander-in-chief has the decency to be a widower before he starts putting the moves on lobbyist Annette Bening. It's been so long for him - Hey, it's only a movie! - that he gets rather adorably nervous when Bening finally changes into something more comfortable and pins the First Bed to test it for firmness.

Just because we don't have a royal family doesn't mean Americans don't require their fair share of fairy tales, and the White House is as close to a palace as we get. (Apparently, some people are getting more access than others; wassup

with that?)

"Dirty Dancing" (1997) - No one puts Baby in a corner! Virginal Jennifer Grey is having a lousy summer in the Catskills until the resort's hot (but sadly misunderstood) mambo instructor, Patrick Swayze, teaches her how to feel the rhythm in her body. Now she gets it, thank you very much! Kenny Ortega's vibrant, suggestive choreography is a translucent metaphor for sexual initiation.

"It Happened One Night" (1934) - Times have changed since Claudette Colbert protected her modesty from Clark Gable with a blanket strung on clothesline between their beds. Today, the salt-of-the-earth journalist and the madcap heiress would be making a home video of their love for the Internet. But love was so much classier back in 1934, when these two gorgeous stars took to the road and fell in love in spite of themselves and of the financial straits looming between them much more insistently than that Wall of Jericho. (This was after The Crash, after all.) Colbert revealed more leg than she wanted to for the hitchhiking scene ("Why don't you take off all your clothes and stop 40 cars?" gripes Gable). Gable, meanwhile, made undershirt stock tumble when he appeared without one.

"Mrs. Brown" (1997) - This sleeper is an intensely romantic movie, one in which the only flesh that's bared is Dame Judi Dench's rosy cheeks after an invigorating ride with her loyal Scottish stableman (Billy Connolly). Dench plays Queen Victoria, whose pronounced

mourning for her late husband is getting in the way of running the empire. What she needs is a good, clean, gallop in the fresh air. The devoted stableman makes sure she gets just that, whenever,

wherever. Queen Victoria was certainly not the most attractive woman in the history books, but it just goes to prove that there's someone for everyone, on Valentine's Day as on any other.

# Professor, ex-student join in book about dying, living

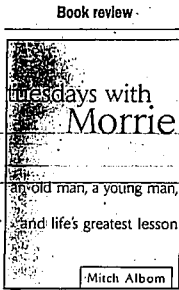

As he drifted toward death, his energy sapped by Lou Gehrig's disease but with his unshaken, sociology professor Morris Schwartz remained a teacher to the end.

And his one-time student, Mitch Albom, again was taking notes. "Can I tell you the things I'm learning most with this disease?" the teacher asked. "The most important thing in life is to learn how to give our love, and to let it come in."

It was a Tuesday in 1995. Schwartz, at 79, was months from dying. Albom, at 37, was a nationally acclaimed sports columnist for the Detroit Free Press, a frequent ESPN guest and a keyboardist with a benefit band of writers including Stephen King, Dave Barry and Amy Tan.

Though close while teacher and student at Brandeis University in the late 1970s, Schwartz and Albom had been out of touch for 15 years. It took

Schwartz's illness to reunite them. Now, they were taking up where they left off. Once again the lessons came on Tuesdays.

For 14 Tuesdays, Albom flew to Massachusetts to join his mentor in thinking and talking about living and dying — lessons leading to what the professor called their final thesis.

That thesis is "Tuesdays With Morrie" (Doubleday, \$19.95). Albom's chronicle of his mentor's deathbed seminar last fall, the book has been a fixture on The New York Times best-seller list and has sold 300,000 copies.

In learning how to die, Schwartz teaches you learn how to live. "A few times when it got really personal, I'd tell him, 'Morrie, you don't have to tell me this,' Albom said recently. "He'd just say, 'I want somebody to know my story.'"

At first, Albom thought he had nothing to say, nothing "good to report." Later, when his work brought him wealth and fame, he found little time for distractions. "I was in a hurry to accomplish things, and work always won," he says. "Everything else could be put on hold."

# Grisham: Takin' it to the 'Street'

Imagine that you turn on the national news one evening and right up there with White House scandals and Midwest unrest is a story about a homeless Vietnam vet taking a bunch of rich lawyers hostage at a D.C. law firm.

Sure sounds like something that could happen. And it does happen at the beginning of "The Street Lawyer" (Doubleday, \$27.95), yet another timely tale from John Grisham. His ninth novel, however, shows not only that Grisham has his finger on the public pulse but that he's also out to prick its conscience.

Narrator Michael Book, a 37-year-old antitrust lawyer on the fast track to make partner and millions at the huge firm of Drake & Sweeney, is among those taken hostage in a conference room by the armed homeless man known as Mister.

Michael escapes with his life, but it's a life that he immediately begins reevaluating — the long hours he puts in at the office, the dying marriage to a surgical intern, the Georgetown apartment, the shy Leona.

Michael's primed for a change even before he meets Mordca Green, Mister's charismatic attorney who works out of a neighborhood legal clinic, and learns that Mister apparently was illegally evicted from a warehouse apartment by representatives of Michael's own firm and its real-estate developer clients. After a homeless family he encounters at a shelter meet a tragic fate during a winter storm, Michael discovers they were among those evicted with Mister. He quits his job to go to work for Green's clinic but "borrows" a file on his way out of the door that can prove

his firm's culpability. Branded as a thief by Drake & Sweeney, Michael helps Green plot a lawsuit on behalf of the homeless family. Although the legal maneuverings fascinate and help generate suspense, Grisham balances the sometimes cynical gamesmanship with Michael's evolution as a street lawyer, learning about lost checks, jobs, benefits, housing and hopes.

Grisham's certainly not subtle. Nor is he particularly deep. He could have done a lot more with developing characters and subplots. As in "The Rainmaker," the good guys, like Michael and Green, are on the side of the angels, while the bad guys — the fat-cat lawyers — are the devil's minions. Easy target.

Still, give Grisham credit. He's aiming not only at them, but also at us — his comfortable, captive readers. With its deft plotting and compelling social agenda, "The Street Lawyer" is entertainment and advocacy.

company by building a wall between their houses.

Though a tad idealistic, the two old folk sing, "How clever we are to manipulate our children!" as they examine the way kids behave. But, they decide that that is the nature of the beast. Just as, "A dog's got to bark, A mule's got to bray, and children ... must get their own way."

So it stands to reason that the boy and the girl fall in love, especially since they are forbidden to do so. They meet secretly, whispering sweet things across the wall. The parents gleefully listen in, and decide that their children are just about ready, that they cannot stand the separation any longer. So the wall topples.

The lovers fall into each other's arms. And they separate. The thrill is gone. The boy goes out into the world to find himself, the girl is seduced by a scoundrel. They suffer. They embrace and vow to "live and love within our own four walls."

"Everyone grows a little, everyone learns a little," Mannen said. "It has a happy ending when everyone realizes they didn't know what they had 'til they lost it."

The musical is best remembered for its signature song, "Try to Remember," and for its original narrator, Jerry Orbach, who went on to a long Broadway career (he's now Detective Lennie Briscoe on NBC's "Law & Order."). "The Fantastiks" was the longest-running play in New York theater history, and through local theater companies, has become one of the most-performed musicals in America.

Although Mannen typically prefers to have the students perform dramas, he couldn't resist "Fantastiks" this year.

"Usually actors learn more with legitimate plays, rather than musicals, but I've got a lot of high-energy kids this year," he

said. "And, these kids work well together because we're a family," complete with all the attendant ups and downs.

Within the cocoon of a family, though, these young actors feel they have the freedom to let loose and have a good time with "The Fantastiks."

"My daughter is fantastic," declares Bellomy in the play. "My son is fantastic," chimes in Hucklebee. Indeed, they are all Fantastiks.

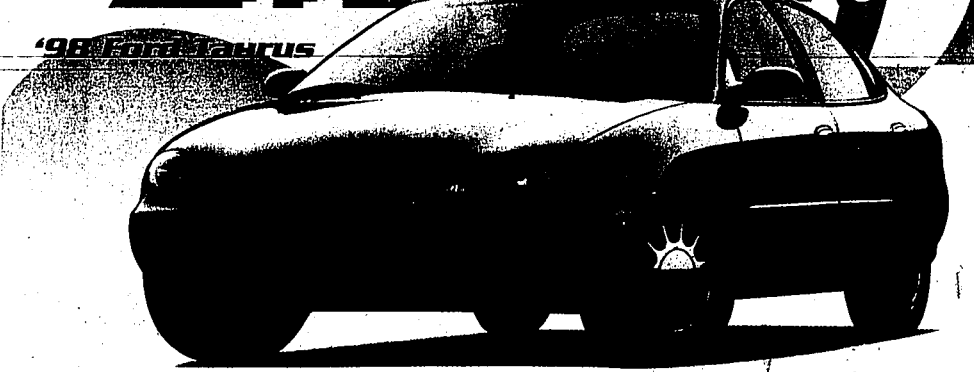

# Is the luster off the Pearl Jam? Momentum falters

Pearl Jam may go down in history as the group that had straddled in its hand — and then walked away from it.

In October 1992, almost a million copies of the Seattle band's second CD, "Vs.," were sold in a week. A few days later, lead singer Eddie Vedder was on the cover of Time.

Pearl Jam was inheriting the biggest-act-on-earth title because young alternative fans found the band could rock as hard as heroes of the past (the Who and Neil Young) but also had a clear-eyed, realistic sensitivity. Vedder, meanwhile, was both star and savior. He was wary of too much media attention (he wouldn't talk to Time for the cover story) but he led the band through amazingly intense, cathartic shows. And audiences loved him — and the band.

Four messy years later, all that has changed. After a highly public war with Ticketmaster, a botched tour of alternative venues, more shows played abroad than in the United States and a lot of downtime, Pearl Jam last week released its fifth CD, "Yield."

But who remains to listen?

Thanks to all that time away from the American concert stage, a shifting musical climate and a general feeling by some that the band whined too long and loud about Ticketmaster, Pearl Jam has lost the enormous momentum it built up between 1991 and 1994.

Their last CD, "No Code," sold only 1.3 million copies, a far cry from the 8 million sold of their debut effort, 1991's "Ten."

"Yield" may sell even fewer. The battle with Ticketmaster and the troubled 1995 tour were the first real crack in the armor. Although the band's intentions were certainly honorable, the result was fan displeasure: They couldn't see their favorite group in concert.

And after that the band drew inward. Gigs were played, but they were out of the country as often as in, and various members worked on side projects. Bassist Jeff Ament recorded and toured with 3 Fish, and Vedder collaborated with Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan on two songs for the "Dead Man

Walking" soundtrack. "Yield" represents a reassertion of purpose — the band is touring New Zealand and Australia in February and March, they're doing a few interviews, and a U.S. tour may well follow in the summer.

But whether or not that's all enough to rekindle the fire is a big if. And the answer may well be no, especially if they're still

unwilling to mount significant U.S. tours. Small, select-date tours, like the one in 1995, will frustrate more fans than it will please. This is a band, remember, that broke largely due to word of mouth and rigorous roadwork — when the shows became less frequent, the CD sales dried up.

Add to this the change in taste. Hard rock has been on the ropes for years, and the Seattle sound

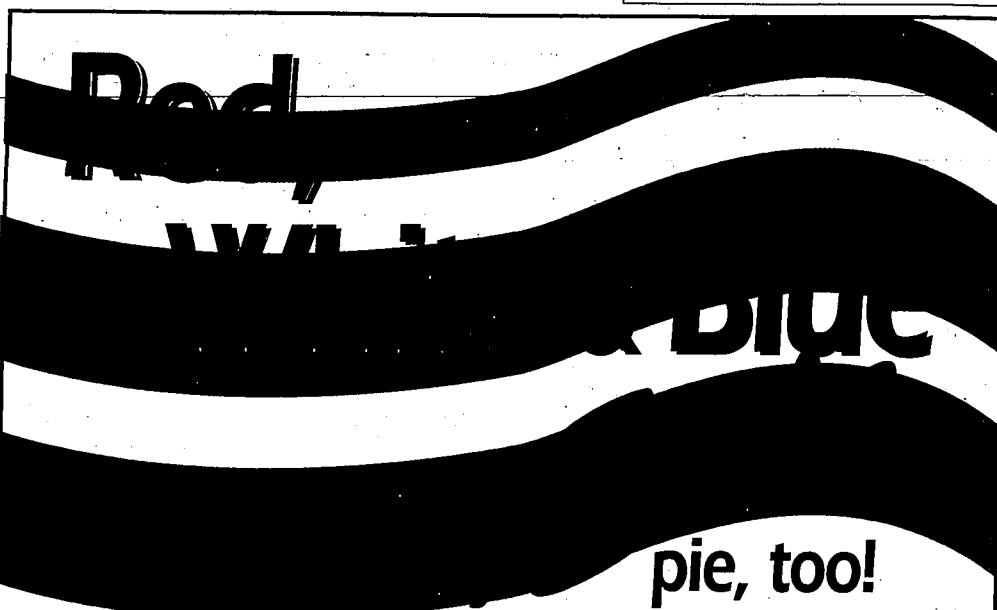
is an anachronism: Nirvana and Soundgarden are gone, Stone Temple Pilots is on at least temporary hiatus, Alice in Chains is AWOL. Mudhoney never broke out of club level success, and the Melvins were dropped by a major (Atlantic) and now record for the much smaller Amphetamine Reptile.

Whether or not the band cares is a far different question.

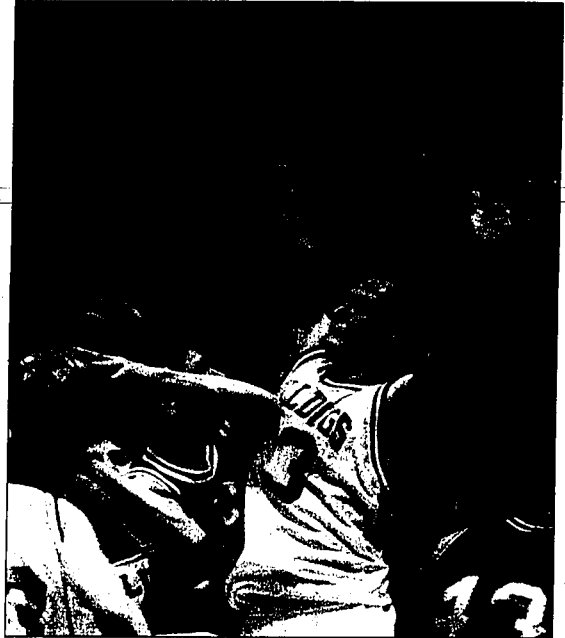
Both coaches made sure the game would be played end-to-end with full court pressure applied for most of the game. Fouls trouble affected both teams early as several starters picked up early fouls.

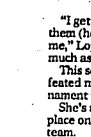

### Ricks takes out CSI women

REXBURG—Southern Idaho sophomore Charlotte Norman could not have had a better game against a more appropriate opponent—35 points on the same court of CSI nemesis Ricks College.

But as the Golden Eagles were successful going inside to Norman, the team was 9-for-14 from 3-point range and fell to the Vikings, 75-69.

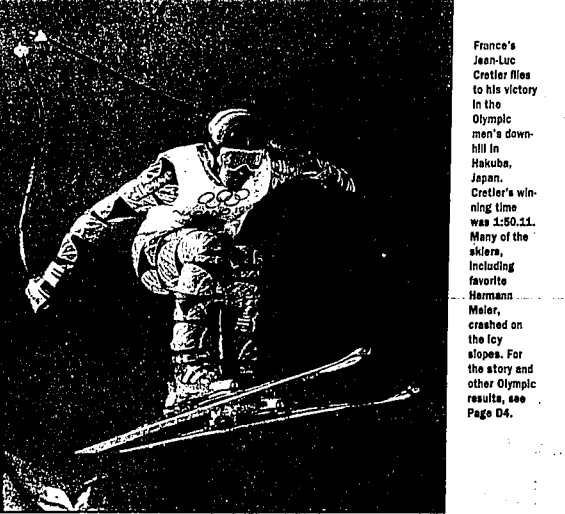
Spartan coach Jodie Mills said the noisy Minico crowd kept her team pumped even when they were down by 10.

# Frenchman wins treacherous downhill

HAKUBA, Japan (AP) — France's Jean-Luc Cretier skied to gold down a treacherous course that sent favorite Hermann Maier crashing through two safety nets Friday as the weather-plagued Olympic men's downhill finally was run after three postponements.

Cretier finished in 1 minute, 50.11 seconds to become the first Frenchman to win the Olympic downhill since Jean-Claude Killy in 1968. Lasse Kjus of Norway was second in 1:50.51 and Hannes Trinkl saved face for the mighty Austrian team by taking the bronze medal in 1:53.

Defending champion Tommy Moe of Jackson, Wyo., finished 12th in 1:51.43.

"It was a lot faster than before, but I made it through OK."

Only 11 of the 120 racers were able to finish the race. Seven skiers fell off the course at the same spot as Maier, and one was badly hurt.

Days of heavy snow and a night of rain turned the Happono course into a sea of ice and slush that left many skiers struggling to keep their balance.

Gusty winds at the top of the

course forced officials to delay the start by 50 minutes Friday morning (Thursday night EST) while three dozen workers shovelled frantically to reduce a jump.

Maier lost control on an icy bend shortly before that Alpen jump, which officials altered minutes before the race because they feared the high winds would make the area unsafe.

That bend was part of the course added at the insistence of International Ski Federation officials, who waged a two-year battle with Japanese organizers over the length of the course.

Maier, who has won 10 of the 30 events on the World Cup circuit this season, flew sideways through the air and barreled through the orange safety nets before stopping. He walked off the course and did not appear to be badly injured.

Lucia Cattaneo of Italy was not so lucky at that spot. He slid sideways into the safety netting. He bruised his left ankle and had to be airlifted off the slope, causing a 29-minute halt in the race.

Also canceling off the course at that spot were defending world champion Bruno Kernen of Switzerland and AJ Kitt of Boulder, Colo.

# Men's skating shootout begins; Eldredge in 3rd

NAGANO, Japan (AP) — Nobody cracked. Nobody did anything spectacular, either. Maybe they're saving it all for the big showdown.

And what a show it could be. Ilya Kulik with his classical style and strange costumes. Elvis Stojko with his crowd-pleasing, judge-irritating funkiness. Todd Eldredge, with or without his quard, but definitely minus his Olympic blues.

"I went out and skated well, and that's enough for me," said the five-time U.S. champion, who finished behind Kulik and Stojko in Thursday's men's figure skating short program.

"If you make one mistake, you can basically get the flight home tomorrow," he said. "It's real tough if you make a mistake in the short to do what you want to do here. And we all want to win it!"

Despite all of his titles and success, Eldredge has never really had that chance. Given an injury bye to the 1992 Games because of a bad back, he was too out of shape to contend at Albertville. He nearly quit, then rededicated himself to the sport and his pursuit of Olympic gold medals.

This time, when his name was called, he cruised around the ice and breathed deeply. As the strains of music for his new routine to "Les Miserables" began, he looked straight ahead — and went for it.

His first jump was a triple Axel-triple toe loop combination. And it was perfect. So was that double Axel. By the time he reached his footwork section, Eldredge was smiling, playfully weaving his way across the ice. By the end of his final combination spin, he was going so fast he was a blur.

As he came to a stop, the crowd rose in a

# You think ski jumpers are brave? Let 'em board the media bus

HAKUBA, Japan — I went up to this picturesque mountain village to watch the ski-jump competition, along with what I believe is the most popular crowd in Japan, including deceased ancestors.

Ski jumping is hugely popular here, which is not surprising: People die here in large numbers, not octopus on an attack are not going to be afraid of hurling themselves off cliffs. I had never seen ski jumping in person. My only exposure to it had been while lying on the couch at home, watching TV, and when you see it that way, you can't appreciate how spectacular this incredible, death-defying sport is, because so much of the screen is blocked by your stomach.

So I was looking forward to seeing it, and I will never forget my reaction when the first skier leaped down the ramp and launched himself into space. My reaction was: "I wish I could see that." At the time, I was sitting in the press box, which was creeping along toward Hakuba in a massive traffic jam on a road that was designed for vehicles no wider than a subcompact gerbil.

I don't mean to harp on this bus thing, but it tends to be on your mind when you are spending six or seven hours per day in

a crowded, hot, airless space as part of a press corps that has been wearing the same garments for so many consecutive days that our pants come running when we whistle for them in the morning.

Finally got to Hakuba, where thousands of Japanese were thrugging in the narrow streets. Filming cameras were everywhere, you can openly thrug in public here, and nobody says a thing: People were blowing horns and, as we trudged past, came out the traditional greeting, "Chiketto ga Hoshii desuka?" ("Anybody need tickets?") The demand was so great that scalpers were getting 10,000 yen for a single ticket. Do you have any idea how much money that is? Neither do I! And Two been here for a week!

Finally I got to the ski-jumping stadium, which was packed with 40,000 spectators, who were making a lot of noise by Japanese standards, by which I mean they were about as loud as a single

New Yorker hailing a cab. I made my way to the bottom of the hill and looked up. From where I stood, I couldn't see the top, but I could hear the muffled murmur as the skier started down. Suddenly, WHOOSH, he rocketed into view. WAY overhead, soared through the air in ridiculous distance, and then, with an impossibly easy grace, splatted on the ground so hard that his internal organs were scattered over an area the size of a tennis court.

No, that is what I thought was going to happen, but somehow the jumper managed to land safely. In fact, they all landed safely, although the cumulative impact of all these landings has clearly taken its toll in the form of causing the letters in their first names to get all jumbled up. There were competitors out there who are now saddled with such comical monikers as "Bjarte," "Magnus," "Tambet," "Rommel" and "Jrs."

After each jump, the jumper received a score calculated from the distance of the jump in meters (one meter is equal to seven degrees Celsius) and "style points" — usually around 18 or 19 — awarded by the judges to indicate how many quarts of sake they would have to drink before

they would ever participate in this sport.

The gold-medal winner was a Finnish jumper named Jani Seppinen, who hails from the town of Jyvaskylae (civic motto: "We Can't Pronounce It, Either"). According to his official Olympic athlete biography, his coaches are named "Lepistoe," "Risto" and "Kalso," and his hobbies are listed as — I swear — "Rock Music, Dog."

After the jumping it was time to leave the stadium and participate in what has now become the most hotly contested sport at these Games: The 800 Reporters Trying To Get On A Bus With A Capacity of 62 Event.

As usual, the German reporters were. They must have some kind of bus-boarding training facility. If America is going to compete at

the Olympic level, we need to build one, too. But first we need to do our laundry.

# Snowboarder gets his gold medal back

NAGANO, Japan (AP) — Clutching his reinstated gold medal over his head and smiling tentatively, Canadian snowboarder Ross Rebagliati promised to change his lifestyle but vowed to stand by friends whether or not they smoke marijuana — the drug that almost got him kicked out of the Olympics.

"I may have to wear a gas mask from now on," Rebagliati said Friday (Thursday night EST), a day after he was reinstated as his rebellious sport's first Olympic champion when an appeals panel overruled a drug test that found traces of marijuana in his system.

Rebagliati, 26, argued successfully that the International Olympic Committee didn't play by the rules when it stripped him of his prize. He said any signs of the drug had come not from marijuana he smoked but from that smoked by friends at parties during his month in Whistler, British Columbia.

Some schemes in brief
Q Posing: Victims' money is never invested in anything. Early investors are paid "fees" out of money put up by later investors.
Q Pyramid: Investors are sold the right to become a sales representative for a product...
Q Earnings: Excessive trading of a customer's account by a broker who has received "hot" trading decisions and whose sole purpose is to generate commissions.

a couple who invested \$70,000 with Oliver found that the deeds of trust they were given as collateral were not signed by the property owners listed in the county land records and therefore were worthless as security.

In hindsight, it's easy to say that the victims of such scams should have known better. But the "bottom line" is that if most investors do even a little investigating, they could avoid losing a lot of money.

"Consumers want so badly to believe in what they are being offered," said Holly Cherico, spokeswoman for the Council of Better Business Bureaus. "In the case of investments, they want to believe in the rate of return."

And let's be honest: "Ignorance and greed are the allies of swindlers," as the authors of "How to Be an Informed Investor" point out. "Con artists know that many people generally do not understand what is being offered to them and hear only the promises that they can make a great deal of money easily and quickly by handing over their savings to the promoters," the Better Business Bureaus and the North American Securities Administrators Association say in the book, which the two organizations put out late last year.

Recently, a number of Northern Virginia families were alerted to a scam that was as much as \$1 million by the accountant who had helped prepare their taxes.

accountant, Victor Oliver, has been indicted on two counts of grand larceny in connection with the scheme. According to police reports and court documents, Oliver was brokering high-interest loans, ranging from 14 percent to 28 percent, as investments for clients of his tax-preparation service. Oliver allegedly offered to lend a client's money to another client for home improvements and mortgage down payments.

The loans were supposed to be secured by property Oliver said was owned by the borrower. But court records show that the loans weren't secured. In fact, in one case

Blue chips drive market to 3rd day of records

NEW YORK — Blue-chip stocks drove the market higher Thursday, notching a third straight session of record highs. Despite a shaky day in Southeast Asia that jostled confidence in that region's fragile recovery.

The Dow Jones industrial average overcame some early profit-taking for the second day in a row, closing a 76-point deficit before erasing 55.53 points to 8,569.50. The Dow, which had not posted a shakily day in six months, has now closed at new highs for three consecutive sessions. Among other popular measures, the Standard & Poor's 500 index and the New York Stock Exchange composite index both closed at new highs for the seventh time in nine sessions.

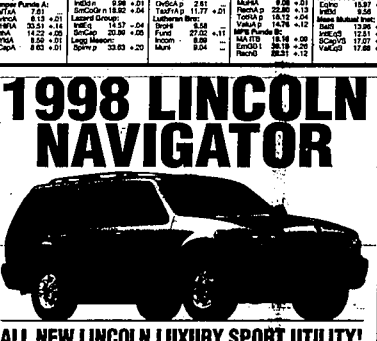

Lawyers ask to see cable-car evidence

ROME — Lawyers representing the four-man crew of the U.S. jet that recovered a six-gondola cable last week asked an Italian judge Thursday for permission to view evidence collected in the crash.

The Italian lawyers, Bruno and Antonio Malaciti, complained they had been barred from participating in the technical tests performed so far by U.S. and Italian investigators.

The cable car operator and 19 others were killed Feb. 3 when the cable car crashed to the ground in the Italian Alps. The U.S. military has acknowledged the plane, an EA-6B Protoner stationed at Aviano base, was well below the approved altitude of 500 feet when it sliced the cable during a training flight.

The lawyers also requested further tests on the remains of the cable car and the sliced cable before they are removed from the accident site. The lawyers said in a statement the tests were necessary to determine the exact height of the cable and the gondola at the time of the accident.

The lawyers asked the Italian prosecutor leading the probe, Francoantonio Grano, to check whether Italian cables had ever informed pilots flying in the area of the presence of cable car lines.

On Wednesday, Italy's defense minister said he has ordered the minimum altitude for flights over Italy to be raised from 2,000 feet for flights over the northern Italian Alps and from 500 to 1,000 feet for the rest of the country.

Plane crash in Sudan kills vice president

KHARTOUM, Sudan — A plane carrying military and political leaders crashed in rebellious southern Sudan Thursday, killing the government's vice president and at least eight others, the government said.

The government blamed the crash on fog and strong winds, denying a rebel movement's reported claim that its fighters had shot down the plane.

The Sudan People's Liberation Army made the claim in a statement from its Nairobi office, the BBC said.

"These are lies," Information Minister Brig. al-Tayeb Ibrahim Mohamed Kheir, who said he was on the flight, said in the reported rebel claim.

Neither side's claim could be independently verified.

Among those killed was Maj. Gen. Zubair Mohamed Saleh, the first vice president and a prominent Islamic leader.

Crews recover bodies from Bolivian slide

LA PAZ, Bolivia — Rescue crews who reached a gold mining camp buried in tons of mud and rocks recovered 32 bodies Thursday.

The mudslide Wednesday killed at least 50 people, said Gen. Carlos Montero, head of civil defense. Another 80 people are missing. The slide was blamed on heavy rains caused by El Niño.

Relief workers stay away from Iraq

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — The United Nations admitted relief workers on leave from jobs in Iraq Thursday may not return because of concerns over a possible U.S. military strike.

Their absence will further hamper efforts to aid Iraqis suffering under international sanctions. The decision affecting about one-quarter of the U.N.'s relief staff in Iraq is part of a contingency plan being drafted as diplomatic efforts to end the standoff over weapons inspections appear to falter.

The aid workers work separately from the arms inspectors trying to ensure that Iraq has destroyed its weapons of mass destruction.

The United States has threatened air strikes against Iraq unless its inspectors have free access to all sites where weapons may be hidden. Iraq has denied them access to Saddam Hussein's

palaces and other sites that Iraq considers to be symbols of its national sovereignty.

The move to reduce the U.N. presence in Baghdad follows the rejection of Iraq's latest overture to resolve the crisis. Iraq offered to open eight presidential complexes for two months to new weapons inspectors selected by the U.N. secretary general — concessions the country's foreign minister described as the "red lines" that "Baghdad cannot cross."

Foreign Minister Sa'eed al-Sabih called the American rejection of Iraq's offer "a bluff" that could backfire: Britain also flatly dismissed the Iraqi proposal.

British Prime Minister Tony Blair, who has promised full military support for any air strike, has ordered a second aircraft carrier, the HMS Illustrious, to the Persian Gulf.

British pilots deployed on the HMS Invincible, which has been in the Gulf since early last month, intensified training Thursday.

The Clinton administration acknowledges there is less international support now for bombing Iraq than there was during the 1991 Persian Gulf War. Even so, the State Department said its list of countries backing force as a last resort was growing and that countries such as France are hedging publicly to give them more leeway to use diplomacy.

The Russians, however, are making their opposition even more pointed: Russia's defense minister lectured Defense Secretary William Cohen on Thursday, describing America's stance as "rigid and uncompromising."

Cohen expressed doubt over the usefulness of any "so-called compromises" proposed by Russia to

end the weapons inspections standoff.

Even U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan admitted diplomacy has a long way to go before a peaceful solution can be found to the crisis.

Annan met for 90 minutes Wednesday with the ambassadors of the United States, Russia, China, France and Britain — the first time permanent members of the Security Council had met together to review the state of negotiations spearheaded by Russia, France and the Arab League. They agreed to meet with Annan again Friday.

Annan has been urged by the Russians, French and others to take a leading role in diplomatic efforts to resolve the crisis without a U.S. air strike. They have asked him to travel to Baghdad to take personal charge of the negotiations.

Cuba to release dozens in response to pope's appeal

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Cuba announced Thursday it was releasing 40 prisoners in response to Vatican appeals, giving Pope John Paul II the first major concrete success of his historic mission last month to the communist island.

Those released include some dissidents, whose plight was underlined by the pope's dramatic plea to free "prisoners of conscience."

The release was first announced by the Vatican, which said Cuba called it "an act of clemency and good will in memory" of John Paul's five-day visit to the island last month.

It was confirmed in Havana by the Cuban government, which said dozens of prisoners were in

the process of being freed and more than 200 soon would be. The names of the prisoners freed were not released, and it was not immediately clear how many were political prisoners. Cuban rights groups say that Cuba holds at least 500 political prisoners.

During his trip to the Caribbean island, John Paul pushed for expanded freedom and tried to pave the way for the Roman Catholic Church to play a greater role in Cuban society after nearly four decades of communism.

The Vatican specifically presented a list of several hundred prisoners, including dissidents, refugees from families and human rights organizations.

Cuban Foreign Minister spokesman Alejandro Gonzalez said 106 of them "were already at liberty. Several dozen more soon will be put at liberty through a pardon, which is in the process of being applied."

He said still others will be pardoned in line with a Vatican appeal for clemency for other prisoners not on Vatican lists.

Those were "justified from a humanitarian view, for reasons of age, health or other similar circumstances" and included both common criminal and political cases.

In Cuba, opposition leaders and relatives of imprisoned dissidents wanted to learn who was being freed. They are waiting very close beside the telephone, said Gerardo Sanchez, a member of

the Cuban Commission of Human Rights and National Reconciliation, which monitors and documents political judgments in Cuba.

"Even a single case is good news for us," Sanchez said by telephone from Havana.

In his public appeal in Cuba for the release of "prisoners of conscience," John Paul asked that they be allowed to remain on the island, not expelled as in past cases.

"It would be a gesture which honors the authority promoting it," he said, adding a stop at a shrine outside Havana.

The Vatican saw the releases as a victory for John Paul.

"The pope's request for the release of numerous prisoners is accepted," said Vatican Radio.

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

At times, duplicate players are likely to do foolish things — all in the name of gaining a possible slight advantage for a possible trick. Today's West tied his own nose. His misguided lead-directing double backfired, and the opponents were quick to hang him.

Over North's 20-21 HCP opening, South bid three diamonds, promising five or more hearts and asking opener to bid hearts (Jacoby Transfer). Left alone, North would have bid three hearts and South would have raised to four. North would then have made five or six hearts, depending on whether West gets his two aces.

With such a good hand and with four excellent diamonds, North redoubled and that became the final contract. The result was truly bizarre.

West led the club 10, and South promptly cashed four top clubs, discarding all his spades. A spade ruff came next, followed by a low heart to dummy's king for another spade ruff. A second low heart went to dummy's ace. South and dummy's last club was led, South ruffing with his last trump. West overruffed, but regardless of what he did now, he could win only two more diamond tricks. Making the redoubled contract with an over-trick produced the unusual score of 1,140 points for North-South, earning a bottom score for East-West.

What did the lead-directing double rate to gain? Not much. North was the favorite to hold the diamond king, so the possibility of gaining an extra diamond trick was, at best, remote.

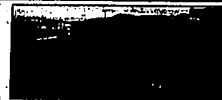

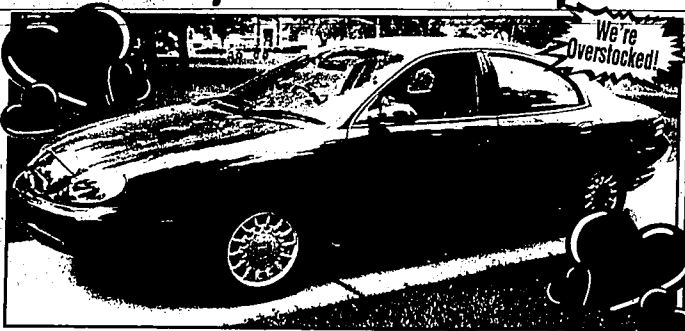

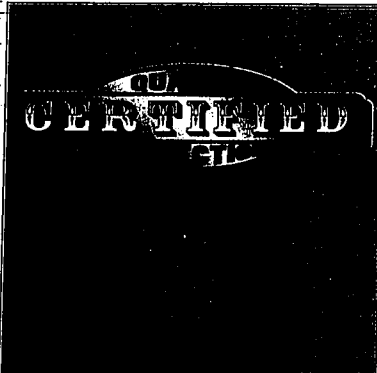

# 'Law & Order' gets triple play

If you're looking for more than your fair share of 'Law & Order,' this is your week.

Partially as a tribute to its Emmy win last fall for Outstanding Series in the long-running, New York City-based show occupies NBC's entire prime-time lineup Wednesday (starting at 8 p.m. ET). The three encore episodes were among eight submitted last year to the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, leading to the Emmy nomination that ultimately resulted in the program's victory.

First up is the 1996-97 season opener, which introduced Carey Lowell as attorney Jamie Ross in the case of a carjacked woman's murder.

The second repeat finds Assistant District Attorney Jack McCoy (Sam Waterston) dogging every move of a paroled rapist (guest star Young). The last tale...has personal implications for Ross and McCoy's boss, Adam Schiff (Steven Hill), during the on-air denigration of a seemingly anti-Semitic crime.

"It's a great compliment to the show that we'll probably be up against ladies' figure skating, so it's a mixed blessing," muses "Law & Order" executive producer Dick Wolf about the triple bill's scheduling opposite Winter Olympics coverage on CBS. "I don't think

anybody expects huge ratings from this, but for fans of the show, it'll be a great night of programming. The three stories being shown are probably our whole staff's favorites from last year.

"They're all emotionally draining episodes, so I can honestly say this will be a night of high drama. I suffer from the same addiction that many viewers have on Wednesdays, when you can go right from the network broadcast on 'Law & Order' to one of the reruns on A&E (11 p.m. ET). That's a sweet, but it will be four hours of the earlier A&E showing (7 p.m. ET)."

For a while, it seemed "Law & Order" would never have such a chance. The show was "first sold to Fox by Trainor, then to the network's then-president Barry Diller telling him, 'Wait a minute. I love the show, but I ain't a Fox show,'" Wolf then shopped it to CBS, which also bought it and ultimately passed on it. Finally, it landed on NBC in 1990, making what Wolf deems "a really unique story, to be handed off among the networks and still survive."

# Motown music lives in ABC miniseries

Dianna Ross and the Supremes.

The Four Tops. The Temptations. Smokey Robinson and the Miracles. Stevie Wonder. Marvin Gaye. Martha Reeves and the Vandellas.

Those are some of the famous names that helped build the recording empire named Motown, and the hit music they made is timeless.

The 40th anniversary of the Detroit-based label founded by Berry Gordy is celebrated Sunday and Thursday (9 p.m. ET each night) in the new ABC Music Is Forever." Narrated by Ross and co-produced by former Motown executive Suzanne de Passe, the four-hour documentary recalls the deeply personal interest Gordy took in the acts he signed, through his comments reveal that they considered Motown Records a true home as well as a workplace. 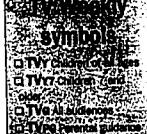

So, they are different Christopher Loyds.

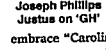

## Rhonda Ross: Women and empowerment

 Actor-singer Rhonda Ross Kendrick made her daytime debut in March 1997 when she joined "Another World" as Toni Burrell, one of Bay City's intrepid police officers.

Kendrick, who holds a B.A. degree with honors from Brown University, says what intrigued her about her character "...is the fact that if you were going to have a role model for women, Toni, a police officer would have to be pretty close to the ideal. She's a woman who successfully enters what has been a traditionally closed male society. She's strong, intelligent, and well-trained to protect herself and the people of her community."  
 "I was in Toni, and she was brutally raped. After the attack, she was determined to see her rapist brought to justice."  
 "I heard from a lot of women when—when—that happened," Rhonda said. "Many had been through that ordeal, or knew women who did. They told me they saw Toni as a hero for standing up for herself, and not allowing herself to be 'destroyed' by the attack."  
 Toni accused the wrong man, when she said Nick (Mark Mortimer) did it because he was standing over her when she regained consciousness. "That's true," Rhonda said. "But I believe the women in our audience felt that she hadn't lied in accusing him. She truly believed he was her attacker, and what these women admired was that she was determined he wasn't going to get away with it. When she learned Nick couldn't have attacked her, she was just as zealous in getting the real rapist."  
 Kendrick believes that a character like Toni Burrell reinforces the importance for women not to blame themselves for the outrage committed against them. "It's in the darkest, more enlightening time, women often, think they somehow caused it to happen. Toni had some doubts for a while. Maybe she shouldn't

have worn that short dress. Maybe she should have been more alert. Maybe this. Maybe that. But all those maybes didn't change the fact that she was a victim, and she didn't commit it. The rapist did."

Rhonda — who is married to famed jazz pianist Rodney Kendrick — had a career largely in theater — both in drama and musicals — and in films before joining "Another World." She is also a well-known vocalist who has been a headliner at some of the hottest night clubs in New York and Washington, D.C. As the daughter of singer-actor Diana Ross and music legend Berry Gordy, Jr., Rhonda comes by her acting and music talents quite naturally. Asked what sort of roles she'd like to play over the course of her career, Rhonda said, "Generally, I like telling stories that are human stories about the human experience. But when I get to the specifics, it will be about black women in this society, or in past societies. My major in college was Black Women's Literature, and I wrote my thesis on Toni Morrison. Writers like her and Alice Walker write wonderful historical fiction. They take places or characters that could have been, and tell a story about them. So, in choosing characters, I would like to play, I'd want them to be strong women, who may be flawed and vulnerable, but can somehow make a difference in the world."

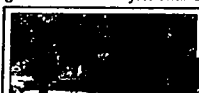

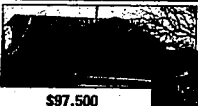

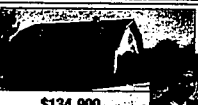
